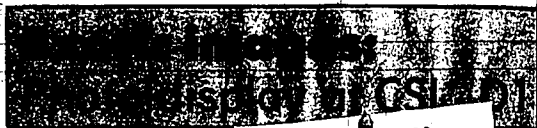

Dallas' hearing April 27

BOISE — Convicted killer Claude Dallas Jr., the self-styled mountain man who twice was the object of an intensive manhunt, arrived back in Idaho in shackles and handcuffs Thursday to face prison-escape charges.

Dallas, one of the FBI's Ten Most Wanted fugitives since last spring, was captured Sunday in Riverside, Calif.

Dallas, 37, was serving up to 30 years in prison for killing two Idaho Fish and Game officers when he escaped from the state prison south of Boise last Easter Sunday.

He was arraigned by Magistrate Patricia Barah on a felony escape charge Thursday afternoon from his jail cell in a routine closed-circuit television proceeding.

Outside the jail-courthouse complex, about a half-dozen people protested Dallas' imprisonment, carrying signs with messages such as "A Man's Home Is His Castle."

Supporters, who have described Dallas as somewhat of a folk hero, claim he shot the two game wardens in self-defense. His case drew widespread attention and was the subject of a made-for-television movie.

Killeen said Dallas and a contingent of Ada County deputies left Riverside on Wednesday afternoon in the sheriff's department's small airplane, and spent the night in...

Accord on water hits snag

TWIN FALLS — The much-delayed Swan Falls water rights agreement has hit another snag.

It is stalled in the U.S. House Energy and Commerce Committee because of objections by several national environmental groups to its effect on the Deer-Flats-National Wildlife Refuge.

They would like to increase the minimum stream-flow on the Snake River at Swan Falls to better protect the white sturgeon and water fowl at Deer Flats, said Cary Jones, an aide to Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho.

Deer Flats is located on the north side of Lake Lowell, between Nampa and the Snake River.

Representatives of the National Wildlife Federation, Audubon Society and Friends of the Earth met in Washington recently with Stallings, a representative of Idaho Power Co. and state officials to iron out objections.

Another meeting is expected in Boise, Stalling said Thursday.

The Idaho Wildlife Federation has also urged Stallings to conduct hearings in Idaho regarding the financial and environmental impacts of the flows specified in the agreement between the state and Idaho Power Co.

Stallings said this would be expensive and would have no meaning on the final outcome of the agreement.

The agreement requires the state Department of Water Resources to ensure that IPC gets a minimum Snake River flow at the Swan Falls dam to turn its hydroelectric turbine. IPC used a series of court decisions in its favor to take steps to protect its water rights on the river.

U.S. presents tough plan to monitor missile installations

WASHINGTON — The United States presented the Soviet Union Thursday a tough monitoring plan to guard against violations of a proposed treaty to eliminate medium-range nuclear missiles from Europe.

Among the key provisions is the stationing of Russians at American missile factories and U.S. inspectors at Soviet plants.

The Soviets have already accepted the principle of on-site inspection. But it was not immediately clear how they would respond to the detailed U.S. plan.

"I wouldn't want to make a prediction," said Charles E. Redman, the State Department spokesman, as he released details of the proposal that was presented at the negotiating table in Geneva.

The treaty, which Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev said on Feb. 23 should be worked out "without delay," would require the scrapping of 268 American missiles now deployed in West Germany, Britain, Belgium and Italy, and 243 Soviet missiles aimed at Western Europe over five years.

Monitoring and inspection would be conducted in three phases. First, inspectors from the two sides would go to the missile sites to confirm the number of weapons that are deployed.

Second, inspectors would be present to make sure the missiles were eliminated.

Third, permanent U.S. monitors would be stationed in Asia where the Soviets could keep 100 warheads, with the Soviets having a matching right to check on the storage of 100 U.S. warheads, possibly in Alaska.

The U.S. proposal also called for separate surveillance of the factories in which American and Soviet medium-range missiles are built and stored.

If questions arise about compliance, inspections of other U.S. and Soviet nuclear facilities could be carried out with "short notice."

Also, the U.S. proposal would require the Soviets to agree to a ban on the concealment of information on missile tests.

President Reagan, in three reports to Congress, has accused the Soviets of encrypting missile flight data.

In outlining the U.S. proposal, Redman said the three basic U.S. objectives were "to ensure confidence" in the treaty, to deter violations and to permit quick detection if there are any.

"The United States looks forward to working out with the Soviet Union in Geneva an effective verification regime," the spokesman said.

Usually, the two sides do not make public the kind of details of their negotiating positions that were announced at the State Department.

Redman said the Soviets "obviously know what the contents are" and he made the details public—also because there was "a great deal of interest in this question."

Other U.S. officials said a number of issues remained unresolved. These include whether the missiles eliminated from Europe would be destroyed, or only dismantled, and where the 100 allowable Soviet SS-20 warheads would be stored.

Price of mailing a letter likely to go up

WASHINGTON — Postal officials say Americans may have to start paying more to mail a letter sometime next year, edging toward but probably not topping a quarter for first-class postage.

They aren't saying how much more, or exactly when the price of postage will rise, but they say it is likely to go up because of an increase in the cost of a postal employee retirement program.

Since Feb. 17, 1985, the charge for mailing a first-class letter has been 22 cents. While managers plan to propose an increase, the final decision on rates is up to the Postal Service's governing board, postal spokesman Bob Hoobing said Thursday.

The level of the proposed increase hasn't been determined yet. But Hoobing said that when asked if it could be as much as 4 cents, setting the first-class rate at 26 cents, Deputy Postmaster General Michael S. Coughlin replied: "Probably not."

A rate increase designed to take effect next year, a year earlier than originally expected, will be urged, Coughlin has told a meeting of bulk mail companies in New York.

Although the Postal Service finished last year \$304 million in the black, it faces some \$2 billion in added costs over the next two years because of a change in the federal retirement system, Coughlin said.

"This new requirement will force the Postal Service to propose an increase in postal rates to go into effect in 1988, a year earlier than we had planned," Coughlin said.

The Alliance of Non-Profit Molders reports that the question of higher rates will be on the agenda for the Postal Service Board of Governors when it meets April 6-7 in Dallas. Hoobing said the agenda for that meeting has not been completed.

The timing outlined by Coughlin would be in line with remarks in January by Postmaster General Preston R. Titcher when he said postage rates would remain unchanged for about a year but would probably increase after that.

Raising rates is a long and complex business, taking between 12 and 16 months. Thus, action would have to start soon to complete the process and institute the new charges in 1988.

To increase postage prices, the agency must propose the new rates to the independent Postal Rate Commission, which then holds hearings and either approves or rejects the new charges.

If approved, the new rates can then take effect. If denied, the Postal Service can still impose the new rates if its Board of Governors votes to do so unanimously. Otherwise, it can either accept rates suggested by the commission or submit new rates and go through the hearing process again.

The Postal Service reported a surplus of \$304 million in fiscal 1986, a substantial gain over the \$231 million loss the agency suffered in 1985, when first-class postage went from 20 cents to 22 cents.

Child-proof containers too often found ineffective

ATLANTA — Child-proof prescription drug containers too often don't keep youngsters out, according to a study of prescription drug poisonings in children.

Nearly two-thirds of the "child-resistant" containers checked after accidental prescription drug ingestions by children were ineffective, according to a Consumer Product Safety Commission study reported Thursday by the national Centers for Disease Control.

Each year, more than 60,000 cases of accidental prescription drug ingestions by children under 5 are reported in the United States, according to the American Association of Poison Control Centers.

The CPSC investigated more than 2,000 of those reports from nine poison control centers last February, March, April and May. The study is not a random sample, but shows information about the poisoning cases the centers handled.

In 65 percent of the cases studied, the medication was in its original container when the child took it, the CDC reported. The CPSC received 222 containers for testing; 80 percent of them were "child-resistant." But tests showed that 65 percent of those containers didn't work. Nearly 70 percent of the containers were ineffective.

### Perle leaving Pentagon post

WASHINGTON (AP) — Richard N. Perle, an uncompromising hardliner who has helped shape the Reagan administration's policies toward the Soviet Union for six years, announced Thursday he would resign his Pentagon post this spring.

"For personal and family reasons, I am herewith resigning my post as assistant secretary of defense, effective this spring after an orderly transition in my office," Perle wrote in a letter to President Reagan.

Perle told reporters that Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger has asked him to continue serving as a part-time adviser.

### Surrogate mother trial ends

HACKENSACK, N.J. (AP) — The woman fighting for custody of the baby she agreed to bear under a \$10,000 surrogate contract was finally only of "loving her baby too much," her lawyer said Thursday in closing arguments.

The court "must not set a precedent of taking children under these circumstances from their mothers," Harold J. Cassidy said at the end of the landmark custody battle for the child known as "Baby M."

Superior Court Judge Harvey Sorkow, who has presided over 31 days of testimony in the two-month non-jury trial, heard more than four hours of closing arguments.

### Alabama to appeal book ruling

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — The state board of education narrowly voted Thursday to appeal a decision by a federal judge who banned 44 textbooks from Alabama's public schools for promoting secular humanism as a religion.

"I don't want to see this board held hostage and I don't want to see our children held hostage," said board member Willie J. Paul, who initially opposed the appeal but changed his mind.

The board decided 5-4 to appeal U.S. District Judge W. Brewster Hand's March 4 decision after a 3½-hour public meeting. Hand ruled the books violate the U.S. Constitution's separation of church and state because they advance the ideas of man-centered secular humanism as a religion.

### Judge allows book publication

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — A judge today denied Britain's request to block publication of a book by a former British secret agent, saying the information in it might be embarrassing but would not harm national security.

Judge Philip Powell of New South Wales Supreme Court gave the British government 28 days to appeal, but ordered it to pay the legal costs incurred by Peter Wright and his publisher, Heinemann Aust. He also said they could apply for damages to cover losses incurred from a temporary ban imposed in late 1985.

# Girl Scouts celebrate 75th year, sharp rise in membership growth

SAVANNAH, Ga. (AP) — The Girl Scouts, founded here 75 years ago by Juliette Gordon Low, had two record years of membership growth last year, their 75th birthday and their largest membership growth in 18 years.

Scouts from the founder's hometown were among the 2,000 girls who gathered in Washington for an afternoon ceremony featuring first lady Nancy Reagan and the organization's national president, Betty Pilisbury of Laurens, S.C.

The ceremony, which followed release of a new 22-cent stamp honoring the Girl Scouts, marked the beginning of an around-the-world recitation of the Girl Scout Promise:

"On my honor, I will try to serve God—and my country—to help people at all times and to live by the Girl Scout laws."

Scouts were asked to gather at 4 p.m. local time to recite the promise in every time zone around the world, beginning on the East Coast.

The Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. has 174,000 troops, including members in 52 other countries who are children of U.S. civilian or military personnel, said Brenda Burrows, a spokeswoman for the national headquarters in New York.

Although the organization saw its membership drop in the 1970s, part because of a smaller population of school-age girls, the number of Girl Scouts grew to 2.9 million in 1986, a 4.1 percent increase over the previous year, Ms. Burrows said.

In addition to participating in the "Promise Circle," local Girl Scout councils around the nation planned activities that included some veteran scouts.

Winifred McNair, 71, of Colchester, Va., was honored in her hometown for those democracies.

But Sen. Gordon Humphrey, R-N.H., the only senator to vote against the resolution, called it "a large portion of pabulum... a big dose of drizzle... just more talk."

The pollen count in Twin Falls Thursday was 84 particles per cubic meter of air.

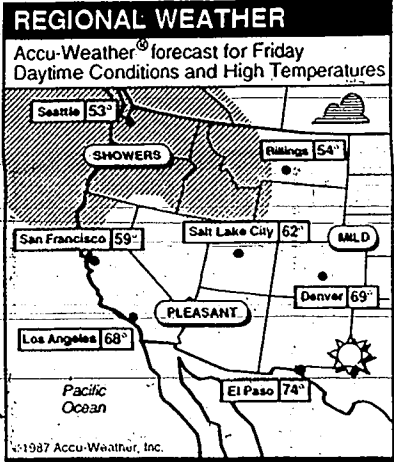
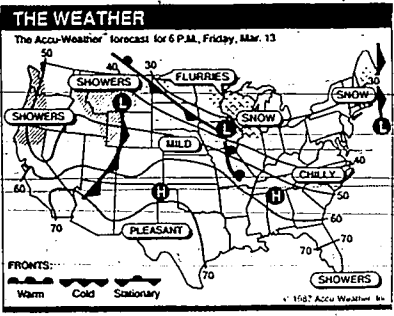

 tinuous threat, "child-resistant" caps on bottles for liquid medicine were ineffective, usually because the medicine had leaked on the threads.

More than half of the lug-type, "child-resistant" container caps didn't work because the mechanism was worn out.

Two hundred ineffective containers in a small study do not mean that most "child-resistant" packages fail, said Barbara Jacobson, a consumer safety officer with the commission. But CPSC officials are nonetheless concerned about ineffective packaging, she said.

"We are concerned that there were a number that weren't working," she said.

The CDC, in its weekly report, stated "The present technology for child-resistant packaging may provide incomplete protection from prescription drug poisoning."

Still, the CDC said, the death rate from child poisonings has dropped steadily since the Poison Prevention Packaging Act of 1970, and "the use of child-resistant packaging should be strongly encouraged."

The CPSC study noted that 17 percent of the episodes involved children accidentally taking grandparent's drugs, and 14 percent of the episodes occurred at grandparent's homes.

Other problems not relating to failure of the "child-resistant" packaging were parents' failure to close containers, keeping pills loose and putting medicine in a different container, the CDC said.

 The Oct. 25, 1984 agreement also limits new agricultural development and provides for a block of water to be held in trust by the state of domestic, commercial, municipal and industrial development.

 The 97th Senate vote came on a resolution, watered down at the insistence of Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., to commend "the thrust" of the Arias peace plan.

Helms said he had feared the Senate would be put in the position of endorsing the actual contents of the Arias plan. He said he would never do that because it calls for ending aid to the Contras.

The proposal also calls for a cease-fire for all the region's conflicts—together with negotiations aimed at political settlements and free elections not only in Nicaragua but also in El Salvador and Guatemala.

# Budget writers back liberal education bills; tax hike likely

BOISE (AP) — Despite conservative warnings that Idaho taxpayers are being pushed beyond their limits, legislative budget writers on Thursday handed Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus major victories on 1988 spending for economic development and higher education.

After a series of votes, the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee also appeared to have struck an acceptable compromise on state support for public education. Similar decisions were expected to be made by the committee on budgets for vocational education and junior colleges.

But the committee's action granting Andrus' \$2.1 million request for the Commerce Department, adding over \$2 million to his \$99.5 million request for higher education and effectively matching his \$342.2 million allocation for public schools severely aggravated the already gaping disparity between his 1988 spending commitments and anticipated revenues under the state's current tax scheme. The proposed education budgets ranged from 12 to 15 percent higher than current base spending levels.

"This will give us the opportunity to everybody in this Legislature to decide if



is this the right amount, and in turn I would hope they would vote for the tax increases," needed to underwrite such ambitious spending levels, House Appropriations Chairman Kathleen Gurnsey, R-Boise, said.

The committee, by only a narrow vote, did strip the usual recommendation for passage from its higher education budget plan, and some members speculated that it might be rejected on grounds that it is excessive.

Both supporters and critics of the committee-approved education budgets acknowledged that they may be trimmed down, particularly the liberal higher education bill, before they gain final approval in both Houses. But they also acknowledged that the eventual measures will meet the governor's recommendations.

Even at that, however, Mrs. Gurnsey acknowledged that a major tax increase would be needed to finance the overall spending plan.

House Republicans dropped any plans to meet behind closed doors on the emerging budget blueprint and the tax hike it mandates, ready to let the bills run their course unimpeded. Caucus Chairman Dean Sorenson, R-Boise, said.

And Senate Republican Caucus Chairman Jerry Twigg of Blackfoot said after a brief closed-door meeting of that majority that while no consensus emerged Thursday there was a chance that a working majority would back the public school bill.

The budget panel agreed to send the public school fund to the Senate for its first look test while the higher education bill will go to the House for an initial vote.

Based on Andrus' administration assessment, the committee's decisions on Thursday, normally the highest of those to be put to a vote in consideration of any specific budget, was the lowest of those before the committee.

But at Idaho State University, where An-

drus was addressing school administrators as the committee cast its votes, the governor said, "I can show them where the money can come from, but they have to show the desire."

The cornerstone of the Andrus revenue scheme was repeal of the investment tax credit, a \$14.5 million proposal the governor tied directly to the education spending improvements he and nearly all the lawmakers promised voters during last fall's political campaign.

But the Republican legislative majority solidly rejected repeal, pledging to maintain that business incentive, keep overall state spending below the governor's \$662.6 million while still meeting or exceeding his education and economic development recommendations.

Since the overspending of available revenues began, however, discussion of the repealer has begun to resurface, and representatives of the key industries fighting to save the tax credit — railroads and utilities — were in the committee room during the education budget voting.

## Local governments to get more revenue from fuel tax

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho House has decided to channel more of the revenue from a proposed fuel tax increase of 3 cents per gallon to local governments instead of the Department of Transportation.

At the urging of Rep. Gary Robinson, R-District 1, the House voted Thursday to move about \$2 million of the extra revenue to the counties, highway districts and cities and out of the Department of Transportation funding.

The House is considering a bill raising the fuel tax by 3 cents per gallon. That would make motorists pay 17.5 cents per gallon after April 1, when the tax increase is scheduled to go into effect.

Overall, the tax increase would generate \$15.9 million per year. Sponsor Rep. John Sessions, R-Driggs, recommended giving \$9.6 million to DOT so the agency can catch up with badly needed preventive maintenance and repaving projects.

That would leave \$3.8 million per year for highway districts and counties, and \$1.6 million for the cities.

But Robinson said House members on Thursday agreed that an agreement was reached giving local agencies half the increased revenue, not one-third as proposed in the Sessions bill.

On an unrecorded vote, the House voted to amend the bill. But it rejected two attempts to make the tax increase 4 cents per gallon, which would have given Transportation an extra \$8 million per year.

But Robinson said House members on Thursday said Robinson, defending his action to send more money to local highway agencies. "There are a lot of repairs out there that need to be done," he said.

Sessions argued against the amendment, saying the state highway system needs extra money. And he said the extra revenue will go to counties' current expense fund, and there is no guarantee the money will go into highway projects.

## Senate rejects changes in pardons

BOISE (AP) — Legislation supporters claimed would restore political accountability, to amnesty proceedings has been rejected by the Idaho Senate.

On a 24-17 vote Thursday, the Senate defeated the bill that would have reorganized parole and clemency procedures by redesignating the Commission of Pardons and Parole as the Board of Pardons with its members appointed by the governor instead of the Board of Corrections.

In addition the bill would have required that the governor sign all pardons or sentence commutations, which now are the sole province of the governor should have this responsibility.

With the Andrus administration opposed to that last provision, the

Senate's Democratic minority secured the support of eight Republicans to defeat the measure.

Sen. Gail Gray, D-Boise, contended that while the bill made acceptable changes in the appointment of the pardon board and the clarification of various types of parole and clemency actions, the attempt to in-ject the governor directly into the pardon and commutation decisions was improper.

Citing the scandal in Tennessee where a former governor was accused of selling pardons, Mrs. Gray said, "No honest governor wants to take on this responsibility and no dishonest governor should have this responsibility."

## Director of state's supercollider campaign pleased with progress

BOISE (AP) — The five states leading the race for the multibillion dollar Superconducting Supercollider project have mounted expensive public relations and scientific campaigns.

In comparison, Idaho's bid for the project is a far more low-budget. And that suits Rick Tremblay fine.

"I like the idea of them fighting with each other and spending money on studies," said Tremblay, Idaho project coordinator.

Texas has spent about \$2 million and has been working to capture the physics project since 1984. The state's coordinator rates his state third in the top five, behind Illinois and California, out of 45 contestants.

Illinois has spent \$4.5 million so far, while California has reached \$1.5 million.

Colorado, at \$1 million, and Ohio at \$2.2 million, fill out the top five, by consensus of those involved in the program.

The Gem State has expended less than \$150,000, and won't exceed \$750,000 total. Work to win the supercollider began informally in 1983, but Tremblay punched in only 18 months ago, and was named ad-

ministrator of the new state Division of Science and Technology only last week. The agency was created with a \$100,000 appropriation.

Thursday he was expected to go to legislators to ask for \$400,000 for fiscal 1988.

"We are clearly underfunded compared to other states," Tremblay said. "And I hope the perception persists that Idaho will get accepted under."

He was up Tremblay's sleeve is INEL.

The Idaho National Engineering Laboratory west of Idaho Falls is a \$3 billion atomic energy experimental station on a geologically perfect government-owned site, nearly the size of Rhode Island.

## House approves PUC pay increases

BOISE (AP) — It took the House only minutes Thursday to agree to legislation giving the three members of the Public Utilities Commission big pay raises.

### Editorial judgement dropped Doonesbury

The question of censorship has arisen out of our decision Wednesday to suspend publication of Doonesbury Thursday and for the next two editions of the strip.

Running it, while the subject was a character named "Dr. Whoopee," selling condoms door-to-door in a college dormitory, had drawn a steady stream of criticism from readers who argued that it was in poor taste and offensive to them. Some readers argued that the strip did not belong on the comics page, where it could be read by children.

The strip, which has often been controversial and under attack from readers, was reviewed by Publisher Bill Howard and City Editor Mike Sullivan. It was decided that the subject that inspired the theme — AIDS — was no longer being dealt with responsibly and that the strip had little going for it beyond shock value. Upcoming strips broke no new ground — they simply elaborated on the idea of safe recreational sex on a college campus. On this basis, it was decided to suspend publication of it.

Reader reaction to that was sudden, and strong. The basis for criticism was censorship, with some readers saying they resented our decision not to let them see the strip.

The reaction, while considerably stronger than expected, is understandable. Readers should be concerned about the censorship of news. The question is, however, what is meant by censorship?

The editors of The Times-News, as well as all other newspapers, and the news directors of all radio and television stations make judgements every day on the fitness of what is disseminated to the public. The sheer volume alone of the material provided to the news media dictates that judgements be made as to what is passed on to the readers and viewers and what is not. The judgements are based on several considerations, including news value, general interest, significance and good taste.

Of all the considerations, the matter of taste is probably the one most subject to debate. What one person considers to be poor taste may be humorous to someone else. It's not an easy judgement to make, and the decision to suspend Doonesbury was not made lightly. But, it is, after all, a comic strip.

When a comic strip is no longer comical, when its subject matter seems to have little redeeming value, and when several readers are disturbed enough by it to complain to the editors, an assessment is called for. Ours was that the critics had a valid complaint.

That could be called censorship, but we look at it as judgement. Not long ago a singular judgement was made by the editors on an Associated Press photo that we received showing a state official in Pennsylvania blowing his brains out with a revolver. We decided the photo was offensive, in bad taste, and we chose not to run it. Some people, no doubt, would have liked to see it. You can't please everyone.

We appreciate the comments from readers and feel that it is essential that The Times-News keep in touch with what its readership expects.

In this case, we do not feel that any important information was withheld, regarding AIDS, condoms, or anything else. The strip will return when the subject changes.

In my several years experience working with highly qualified DVMs, I have yet to meet a veterinarian who loves money more than animals.

More than once I have seen hard working, loyal and dedicated veterinarians weep at the loss of a patient. Many times they have attended these patients most of the animals' lives, as well as into the wee hours of the morning, praying as well as doing everything humanly possible to save a precious life.

I feel that clients often do not realize that a veterinarian spends 8-10 years at school in order to prepare them for the services they provide to pets and their owners. Therefore, they are justified in the fee schedules they must, out of necessity, maintain.

Clients also often misunderstand the limitations they impose on DVMs when they cannot or will not invest the money needed to perform diagnostics, surgery, therapeutics, etc. We must understand that individuals in the medical profession, be it animal or human, are not omnipotent. They seldom have the ability to look at a patient in the examination room and make an immediate definitive diagnosis. Clients must be willing to allow them to perform the procedures they deem necessary under the circumstances.

The bottom line is, veterinarians have the knowledge and the skills needed to help animals live quality lives. However, animal owners must be willing to meet them halfway and do their part as well, or the dedicated, caring veterinarian's abilities will be totally useless and wasted.

# Judge dismisses North's challenge to independent counsel

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge, declaring Thursday that the nation needs "expeditious and complete disclosure" of the Iran-Contra affair, dismissed lawsuits by Lt. Col. Oliver North that sought to stop an independent counsel's investigation of his central role.

U.S. District Judge Barrington D. Parker, said North was premature in seeking a ruling that the office of independent counsel was unconstitutional.

"Courts have almost over found that an ongoing criminal investigation imposes a sufficient hardship to the person investigated to warrant judicial review prior to his or her indictment," Parker said in his order.

"The plaintiff has not suffered an injury of sufficient keenness to warrant the court's intervention," Parker said. "For that reason, the court finds that plaintiff's challenge to the constitutionality of the independent counsel machinery is not ripe for adjudication and that his complaints should be dismissed."

Parker said the nation needs "an expeditious and complete disclosure

of our government's involvement in the Iran-Contra affair" and said that independent counsel Lawrence E. Walsh "is pursuing the investigation energetically and responsibly."

Meanwhile Walsh, in an interview with ABC News, said he would try to wrap up sound criminal case in the affair over the next 90 days.

"We want to develop as much evidence as we can and have it under seal," he said, before some key figures in the probe can give testimony before Congress under a grant of partial immunity from prosecution.

Walsh has asked Congress for a 90-day delay before immunity could be granted to North and former National Security Adviser John M. Poindexter.

The presidentially appointed Tower commission said in its recent report that North was heavily involved in both the secret arms sales to Iran and in supplies for the Nicaraguan rebels, who are known as Contras. Attorney General Edwin Meese III said last November that some of the profits from the arms sales had been diverted to the Con-

trast.

Parker noted on Thursday that Meese has appointed Walsh as a special Justice Department prosecutor "to ensure that the investigation continues unimpeded" should Walsh's separate court-appointed position eventually be found unconstitutional.

North—who was fired last November from his post as a National Security Council aide, had filed two lawsuits. Parker dismissed both.

The first contended the independent counsel was operating unconstitutionally because he was appointed by a three-judge federal court instead of by the president or other executive branch officials.

The second suit argued that Walsh's position was still unconstitutional even with the Justice Department appointment.

Parker said the overall case "presents issues of particularly grave constitutional importance" because North's challenge calls into question the constitutionality of vesting prosecutorial power in in-

dependent agencies and non-executive branch institutions.

But the judge said, "The strong policy against intervening in ongoing criminal investigations also persuades the court to refrain from reviewing plaintiff's substantive claim."

Parker said in his ruling "of North's suit that there are three reasons against the court's intervention in a criminal investigation:

- The courts want to protect the public's interest in the fair and expeditious enforcement of criminal laws. Permitting challenges at this pre-indictment stage would saddle the grand jury with mini-trials.
- The courts need to balance the defendant's need to assert his interests against the judiciary's interest in conserving its resources.
- The principle of separation of powers counsels courts against intervening in a criminal investigation conducted by another branch of government.

## Federal appeals court stops effort to gain indictment against Deaver

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal appeals court Thursday temporarily blocked independent counsel Whitely North Seymour Jr. from seeking a grand jury indictment against lobbyist and former presidential aide Michael K. Deaver.

The U.S. Court of Appeals said the injunction against Seymour would remain in effect until 5 p.m. next Tuesday. The court also asked Deaver and Seymour to submit legal briefs addressing Deaver's constitutional challenge to the office of independent counsel.

The court said that Seymour should "take no further action to return an indictment pending further order of this court."

This is the second temporary reprieve Deaver has received since Seymour announced in court Feb. 25 that he planned to have the grand jury vote on four perjury counts.

Seymour has contended that the court should not interfere with the grand jury process, adding that Deaver can move to dismiss an indictment if one is returned. He contended his office is constitutional.

In opposing Deaver's motion Thursday, Seymour said Jackson ruled that Deaver "cannot make a substantial showing that he is likely to succeed on the merits, and found that the plaintiff is not entitled to injunctive relief to prevent a grand jury proceeding from going forward."

The order was issued by a three-judge panel consisting of U.S. Circuit Judge Lawrence H. Silberman, Stephen L. Williams and Douglas H. Ginsburg.

"We're very pleased we've gotten the stay," said Randall J. Turk, one of Deaver's attorneys, after the decision was announced. He said Deaver's attorneys would file legal briefs on March 16.

Last month, U.S. District Judge Thomas P. Jackson issued a temporary restraining order to block Seymour's move. But the emergency order was dissolved Wednesday when Jackson refused Deaver's request for a longer-term preliminary injunction.

Deaver's lawyers had asked the appeals court for an expedited ruling because "it is anticipated that an indictment against the plaintiff will be sought immediately."

Deaver wants the status quo to remain until his attorneys are heard on his contention that only the executive branch can conduct a criminal prosecution.

An independent counsel, who investigates top current or former federal officials, is appointed by a three-judge federal court under provisions of the 1978 Ethics in Gov-

ernment Act.

Nor, Seymour said, can Deaver demonstrate he would be irreparably injured if he is indicted because he can challenge the indictment itself.

## Weinberger leaves for Spain Sunday

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger will visit Spain next week for talks that will include a review of demands by that government for a reduction in the U.S. military presence, the Pentagon said Thursday.

Weinberger leaves Washington Sunday for Spain, remaining in Madrid through Tuesday, the Pentagon said. He will then travel to Turkey for consultations with defense officials there, flying home on March 20 by way of the Azores where he will visit briefly with U.S. troops.

Such a "key topic" that Weinberger will certainly raise it, the official added.

Weinberger leaves Washington Sunday for Spain, remaining in Madrid through Tuesday, the Pentagon said. He will then travel to Turkey for consultations with defense officials there, flying home on March 20 by way of the Azores where he will visit briefly with U.S. troops.

## Sale to Iran of computers sparks fight

WASHINGTON (AP) — Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldrige, turning aside objections by Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger, strongly defended on Thursday the proposed sale of equipment containing American-made computers to Iran.

"I see no reason to put U.S. manufacturers at a disadvantage," Baldrige told a Senate panel, claiming that the relatively unsophisticated equipment involved could be easily obtained by Iran from foreign manufacturers.

The dispute, the latest argument between the two Cabinet officers on the issue of export controls, flared with reports that Weinberger was seeking to have the proposed sale reviewed by the National Security Council, and possibly even President Reagan.

Baldrige said he was miffed by Weinberger's strong reaction, and suggested that the Pentagon should not even have a role in the proposed sale. "This is not a defense issue. This is a foreign policy issue," he said.

# Dozens of students pay visits to counselors after suicides

BERGENFIELD, N.J. (AP) — Dozens of troubled high school students met with counselors Thursday to talk about the suicides of four teen-agers, and a psychologist said he didn't think the death pact extended to other young people in the community.

"Kids yesterday were in shock. The students were feeling numb and they were crying," said Thomas Kavanagh, the school's psychologist. "Today, they're talking about their feelings and losses. Today, they're trying to make sense of it."

The counseling by psychologists and social workers was offered to Bergenfield High School students and their parents following the Wednesday deaths of the two boys and two girls, all of whom either were attending or had just graduated from the school, Superintendent John Habeeb said.

The four teen-agers, two of whom sisters, died early Wednesday after locking themselves in an idling car in an apartment complex garage.

Habeeb said Thursday there was no evidence or indication the pact extended beyond the four. The New York Post on Thursday reported that the four had tried to lure a fifth teen-ager into their pact.

The paper quoted an unidentified woman who said her daughter had until last week been a girlfriend of the one of the four and that she had declined to accompany the group Tuesday night.

Bergen County Prosecutor Larry McClure said the apparent cause of death was carbon monoxide poisoning. Autopsy results had not been released by Thursday afternoon.

A note found in the car was signed by all four victims — Thomas Olin, 19, Thomas Rizzo, 19, and Lisa and Cheryl Burrell, 17 and 18 — and stated that they wanted a joint wake and to be buried together, but did not explain why they killed themselves, McClure said.

Funerals were being planned for today and Saturday, according to funeral home directors.

Many friends speculated the youths were depressed over the September death of a friend, Joe Major, who fell from a cliff overlooking the Hudson River. Authorities have said the fall was accidental, but others, including the mother of one of the suicide victims, believe Major killed himself.

That death was among four last year — of Bergenfield youths. All either were accidents or suicides.

Most Bergenfield High students did not want to talk with the news media Thursday, and some became angry, shouting obscenities at photographers and reporters outside the 1,150-pupil school.

"Leave them alone, they just wanted to die in peace," yelled one student.

Teachers were told to encourage students to leave classes at any time during the day if they needed to talk with counselors, Habeeb said, adding that about 80 to 100 students had sought help since Wednesday.

"Kids are coming in because they're anxious to talk," he said.

Two teams — one with a psychologist and a social worker and the other with two social workers — were established Wednesday to help the students, he said.

In addition, two student assistance counselors who specialize in drug and alcohol counseling were available at the school and a social worker was prepared to talk with students' families, Habeeb said.

He added that police were working to find places in town where the school's support teams could work during the weekend.

## Briefly

**Autos lead retail sales surge**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Buyers returned to auto showrooms last month and other retailers rang up modestly higher sales in all categories, boosting retail sales in February by a healthy 4.1 percent, the government reported Thursday.

The Commerce Department said the seasonally adjusted sales totaled \$122.3 billion last month, compared with \$117.5 billion in January. Auto sales were up 14.4 percent, to \$26.9 billion.

The figures showed a strong rebound from a bleak January, when auto sales plummeted and sent total sales into a nosedive. The department said Thursday that the dive was even steeper than reported earlier.

Total sales plunged a record 7.4 percent in January, not the 5.8 percent it had estimated earlier, the department said. Auto sales dropped a record 27.7 percent, not the 22.4 percent reported last month.

**Firms attack Bell deregulation**

WASHINGTON (AP) — A coalition of telecommunications companies on Thursday attacked a Justice Department proposal to deregulate the local Bell telephone companies, saying the move would put many companies out of business.

The coalition — including newspaper publishers, computer services, burglar alarm companies, long-distance carriers and equipment manufacturers — says a recommendation to let the Bell companies make phone equipment and provide long-distance and information services would stifle competition.

"The company that controls the monopoly ... has a built in competitive advantage," Chuck Tower of Dun & Bradstreet Inc. said at a news conference.

Though Tower's objection is specifically against allowing the Bell companies into electronic publishing, his argument is the same as those against lifting any of the restrictions: that the Bell companies still control access to the local telephone network.

**U.S. planning to move base**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Navy Secretary John F. Lehman has ordered plans drafted to move a U.S. support base for Antarctic operations from New Zealand because of that country's refusal to allow nuclear-powered or nuclear-armed ships to make port calls.

Lehman, in what was supposed to be an off-the-record speech earlier this month, said he wanted to move the U.S. support base at Christchurch, New Zealand, to Hobart, Australia.

"Hobart is a very attractive place," Lehman said in a speech March 4 at a conference on Pacific affairs at the Hoover Institution in Washington.

Lehman's remarks were reported Wednesday in the New York City Tribune. The Navy subsequently confirmed the newspaper's report, but said Thursday that Lehman "was expressing his own personal views and was not speaking for the U.S. government or the Defense Department."

**Conservatives call for release**

WASHINGTON (AP) — A group of conservative Republican congressmen called Thursday for the Soviet Union to release nearly 600 political prisoners to give the West a "yardstick of reality" by which to measure Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev's recent efforts to reform Soviet society.

Rep. Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., the leader of the group, told a news conference that conservatives should welcome Gorbachev's efforts to open up his country and respond positively, rather than with the suspicion that would be the "natural instinct" of most conservatives.

Gingrich and 30 other conservative Republican House members sent a letter to Soviet Ambassador Yuri Dubinin asking for a "full accounting" of the 582 persons listed by the Helsinki Commission as political prisoners in the Soviet Union.

## Telephone charge will help poor

WASHINGTON (AP) — A state-federal advisory panel on Thursday endorsed a plan to raise telephone charges by up to \$1.50 a month over the next two years and use part of the increase to subsidize phone service for poor people.

The move virtually assured approval by the Federal Communications Commission.

The plan to raise the \$2-a-month subscriber line charge to \$2.60 in June, \$3.20 in September 1988 and \$3.50 in April 1989 was approved unanimously by the panel, which includes three of the FCC's five members.

The increased charge, which shifts more of the costs of the local telephone network from long-distance rates to subscribers, is expected to reduce long-distance rates by at least 15 percent over the next six years.

Consumer interests immediately attacked the increase as unnecessary, and members of Congress, while applauding the aid program, remained unconvinced the higher charge is justified.

Long-distance rates have dropped about 30 percent since the subscriber line charge was first imposed at \$1 in June 1983, as long-distance companies have had to pay less in access charges to connect to the local phone network.

A small part of the estimated \$17 billion in savings that would accrue to long-distance companies from lower access charges would be used to subsidize the cost of telephone service for poor people under a new program called Linkup America.

The program would pay half the cost, up to \$30, of telephone installation charges for low-income households. Members of the advisory panel, called the joint board, did not estimate the total cost of the program.

They hoped to "link up" 1 million of the estimated 5 million American households without phones in the first year of the program, said FCC spokesman John Kamp. If the maximum \$30 were paid in each case, that would be \$30 million for the first year.

## GOP trying to undo raise

WASHINGTON (AP) — A half-dozen Republican members of Congress asked a federal judge on Thursday to rescind a \$12,000 salary boost, saying Democratic House leaders may have miscalculated themselves out of a pay raise.

This latest effort to undo the controversial pay raise centers around the 30-day deadline that congress had to disapprove the presidential recommendation, which increased Senate and House pay to \$89,500 a year.

Reagan sent his recommendations to Congress on Jan. 5. The Senate rejected the pay raise on Jan. 29. On Feb. 3, the day that pay raise supporters identified as the 30th day of the deadline, House Democrats quickly adjourned the chamber without allowing a vote on the pay raise, thus allowing it to take effect automatically.

The following day, Feb. 4, with the pay raise safely in pocket, the House voted to disapprove the salary boost, a vote that both sides agreed then was meaningless.

On Thursday, however, opponents said they believed Congress did not receive Reagan's recommendations until Jan. 6.

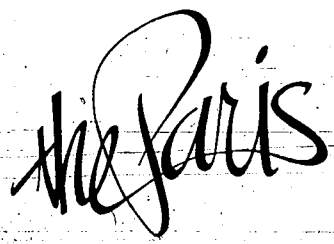

## Sweden bans S. Africa trade

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — Sweden announced a trade ban against South Africa Thursday, pledging one of the harshest packages of sanctions ever imposed by an industrialized nation against the white-led government to protest its apartheid policy.

Foreign Minister Sten Andersson said the Swedish government hoped the decision will influence the United Nations to recommend binding sanctions.

The ban takes effect July 1 and imposes a deadline of Oct. 1 for Swedish companies to end all trade with South Africa, Foreign Trade Minister Anita Gradin reported.

It bans all trading of goods, including those passing through third countries. The measure calls for a parliamentary committee to study divestment and a parallel ban on services.

The ban imposed on Sweden's traditional policy of neutrality and of departing only those sanctions recommended by the U.N. Security Council.

## Forged identity card hinted

JERUSALEM (AP) — John Demjanjuk said the Soviets may have used a photo from his Red Army draft records to forge a document saying he was trained as a Nazi death camp guard, an Israeli policeman testified Thursday.

The 66-year-old retired Ohio auto worker was extradited from the United States last year and is on trial on war crimes charges.

He is accused of being a Ukrainian guard at Treblinka known as "Ivan the Terrible" whose acts of terror, torture, murder and mutilation have left witnesses who described them near emotional collapse.

Superintendent Arty Kaplan, 39, said he posed as a prison guard for two months trying to elicit a confession from Demjanjuk, who has been held at the maximum-security Ayalon prison since his extradition in February 1986.

## Shamir picks spy case probers

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir chose two men Thursday to conduct a confidential investigation of the Pollard spy case, but he said their conclusions will not be binding.

Critics said the government should commit itself to act on the commission's findings.

Strict secrecy also marked the beginning earlier Thursday of a parallel investigation by Parliament's seven-member subcommittee on intelligence, which took 3½ hours of testimony from Defense Minister Yitzhak Rabin.

Until Wednesday, Shamir had opposed investigating the scandal in which Jonathan Jay Pollard sold U.S. military secrets to Israel while he was a U.S. Navy analyst. Last week, a federal court in Washington sentenced Pollard, 37, to life in prison.

## Soviets ready to widen talks

LONDON (AP) — The Soviet Union is prepared to negotiate on short-range nuclear missiles in Europe at the same time it discusses the elimination of medium-range missiles, a senior Soviet arms control official said Thursday.

Viktor Karpov, a veteran arms negotiator, said the "parallel" talks would not be linked nor would there be a package deal covering the two types of missiles.

Karpov said that if on-site inspection was decided upon this would mean an exchange of Soviet and Western inspectors to make sure neither side was cheating.

## Blacks, whites join in rallies

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Blacks and whites joined in rallies and lighted candles Thursday for the thousands of people jailed without charge under South Africa's 5-month-old state of emergency.

The Rev. Beyers Naude, an Afrikaner who broke with the mainstream of the dominant white ethnic group over apartheid, told the largest gathering on National Detainees Day.

"We call for our country to be free of dictatorship and tyranny. As long as one child remains in prison and detained, our country remains in shackles."

"Don't remain silent any longer!" he appealed to other Afrikaners. "Stand up and be counted!"

People in the audience of about 800, which included many prominent anti-apartheid activists, raised cheers and fists in response. A hall at Johannesburg's Central Methodist Church was packed to hear Naude, who is general secretary of the South African Council of Churches.

## Ecuador quake toll may surpass 2,000

QUITO, Ecuador (AP) — As many as 2,000 people may have been killed in northern Ecuador in a wave of earthquakes that caused flooding and deadly mud slides last week, a chief provincial official said Thursday.

Prefect Jorge Gonzalez, chief administrator of Napo Province, said he based his estimate on aerial inspection of the area. He reported several villages completely wiped out when torrents of mud and water crashed through streets, splintering homes and entombing people in mud as high as rooftops.

The International Red Cross has said 300 people were killed and 4,000 are missing. But Gonzalez maintained at a Thursday news conference that about 5,000 people were unaccounted for.

The national government has not released an official death toll. It says 75,000 people have been driven from their homes.

The 10 earthquakes rumbled along the nation's 23-mile-high Andean spine a week ago, striking an area from the Colombian border to Riohamba, 95 miles south of Quito. The hardest-hit area was a 640-square-mile zone surrounding the volcano

El Reventador, 40 miles northeast of Quito. The region is home to about 100,000 people, Gonzalez told reporters.

The earthquakes spawned floods and avalanches that swept away homes and cut transportation and communication links, delaying word about the magnitude of the tragedy for several days.

Gonzalez said officials may never know the final death toll from the earthquakes, the worst catastrophe to strike this small Andean nation this century.

"The human drama is terrible," he said. "There are homes buried or submerged in water, there are bodies in the mud and the rivers are contaminated with oil," said Gonzalez.

The mudslides destroyed a 30-mile stretch of the nation's main oil pipeline, forcing Ecuador to stop payments for this year on its \$9.2 billion foreign debt.

On Thursday, Venezuela said it had tentatively agreed to supply Ecuador's customers with oil until the pipeline is repaired, an estimated five

months from now. Officials said details of the plan were still being negotiated. Ecuador had proposed that it continue receiving export payments, and repay the donor country later with oil.

Meanwhile, the shattered pipeline also caused environmental damage, spilling oil into rivers near Baeza, 40 miles southeast of Quito.

Some of the worst quake damage, he said, was in Quito and Gonzalo Pizarro, where all 400 residents disappeared after a muddy wall of water slammed into the town.

"In the village of Playas de Alto Coca, where 300 people lived, only 50 people have been rescued" from a sea of mud, he said.

Gonzalez appealed to the International community to maintain an air bridge between Quito and the devastated Napo areas to ferry food and supplies.

The Spanish Red Cross said \$20,000 worth of supplies were on their way to Ecuador on Thursday, while World Vision, a Christian relief agency, said it was donating \$10,000 worth of emergency supplies.

## Ferry survivor, 8, ready for school

LONDON (AP) — Eight-year-old Martin Hartley, who lost his parents and grandparents in the ferry disaster off Belgium, is kicking a football again and is eager to return to school, his teacher said Thursday.

"He's a shining light at the moment," said John Flindall, deputy principal in the former mining town of Colmanhay in central England.

"It's absolutely not struck him. It's going to be a long, long time before it sinks in."

The last thing Martin remembers is his mother rolling in her wheelchair across the enclosed top deck as the ship tipped over, and his father being trampled under water by other passengers scrambling to escape.

The British ferry, the Herald of Free Enterprise, capsized last Friday just outside the Belgian port of Zeebrugge.

Of 543 people aboard, 409 survived, 54 are known to have died and 80 are missing and presumed dead. Martin's stepbrother, Lance Hartley, traveled to Belgium on Thursday to identify his relatives.

Martin has said his mother told him shortly before the disaster, "Don't stand on the table or the boat will capsize."

Martin will now be raised by his 21-year-old stepbrother and his stepbrother's girlfriend in Colmanhay. The couple has a 2-year-old child.

"He's very badly bruised, but he's more mobile than I anticipated," said Flindall who visited the boy Thursday at his new home across the street from the school. "He was

kicking a football around in the lounge. He's talking very matter-of-factly about things."

"Martin is a very resilient boy, very bright and sparkling, full of happiness and life," Flindall said in a telephone interview. "He's a very lovable lad."

## Captive under death threat

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — A group of pro-Iranian extremists on Thursday threatened to kill a French captive within 48 hours if France does not clarify its policies on French hostages in Lebanon and military aid to Iraq.

The Revolutionary Justice Organization, thought to be made up of Shiite Moslems, made the threat in a three-page Arabic statement delivered at 3:15 a.m. MST to the office of a Western news agency in Moslem West Beirut.

The statement was accompanied by a photograph of hostage Jean-Louis Normandin, 36, a lighting engineer for the French television station Antenne-2 who was kidnapped March 8, 1986. The picture showed a bearded Normandin from the waist up, wearing a dark blue track suit.

The kidnapers demanded that French Premier Jacques Chirac clarify a statement made Tuesday by French President Francois Mitterrand.

## Northside Canal to fill insurance agreement

TWIN FALLS — The Northside Canal Co. will buy additional insurance after receiving a warning from Idaho Power Co. that it would take legal action against cogenerators who fail to meet its insurance requirements.

Northside needs to guarantee that it will produce the amount of electricity in its contract with IPC, said Ted Diehl, Northside general manager. He said he didn't know the cost of the insurance, but the company

would get it rather than risk being sued. Without the insurance, the utility would move to end cogenerator's sales to the utility, according to an IPC newsletter. IPC says that 34 of the 36 cogenerators with existing contracts with IPC are in violation of their agreements regarding proof of insurance.

Northside operates a small hydroelectric turbine at Billss and sells the electricity to IPC. The canal company is based in Jerome.

KW Co. of Twin Falls, another small hydro operator, was also warned by IPC but KW owner Ron Kasel said his insurance company

assured him there was no problem. The Public Utilities Commission requires IPC to pay cogenerators more than their power is worth for the first 20-25 years of their contracts, said an IPC newsletter. Typically, contracts run 35 years. The so-called "levelized" rates are offered as an incentive to cogenerators, said IPC.

IPC and the PUC require cogenerators to insure against a loss which would result if cogenerators interrupt their contracts in the first 20-25 years due to an accident, such as a fire or a dam washout.

The utility calculates that under the cur-

rent scheme it will make more than \$30 million in overpayments by the year 2009 if all the existing cogeneration contracts were interrupted by accidents.

"We are getting more stringent. It's a huge liability out there," said Larry Taylor, IPC spokesman.

In new contracts, the company is seeking a provision which would protect it if a cogenerator walks away from his contract. This is a point of dispute being negotiated by IPC and Cook Electric of Twin Falls, which wants to build a cogeneration project at Magic Reservoir.

Relations between IPC and cogenerator have been stormy in recent years. IPC has recently appealed new cogenerator licenses issued by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

The company argues that it pays too much for the power produced by cogenerators at night when there is a surplus of power in the Northwest.

Cogenerators argue that there is a market for the power and they are entitled under federal law to make contracts to sell electricity to IPC.

## Miss Rodeo America: 'Be yourself'

## JFAC deadlocks; CSI's chances for budget up in air

BOISE — A Joint Finance and Appropriations Committee spending spree on the education budget Thursday morning was tempered with reality in the afternoon, and the College-of-Southern-Idaho was left hanging.

JFAC became deadlocked late Thursday afternoon after voting a higher budget than requested by Gov. Cecil Andrus in the morning.

"Now the game has changed," said Sen. Darrel McRoberts, R-Boise, a freshman member of JFAC. "The Democrats don't want to give one more cent to education because it will make the governor look bad. And Mack's out to break the budget."

Rep. Mack Neibaur, R-Paul, consistently offered substitute millions giving more money to vocational education than either Democrats or moderate Republicans wanted.

Neibaur was proposing a straight 12.1-percent increase for vocational education.

Fair was fair, said Neibaur. He told the committee that if they were going to up the ante for higher education and public education, they



should ante the same amount for everything.

After JFAC adjourned at 6 p.m., McRoberts was worried that CSI's chances for more money may be hurt.

"I think this is going to hurt CSI's budget chances," McRoberts said. Magic Valley lawmakers are fighting for a 9.6-percent increase for CSI, the same amount requested for higher education.

But there was some feeling that legislators had shot their wad before lunch, voting for \$10 million for higher education, or \$3 million more than Andrus requested.

Sen. Laird - Nob, R-Kimberly, listened in on Thursday afternoon's session and was more optimistic than McRoberts.

"I think there's still hope," Nob said.

## Abused women seek support in changing lives, relationships

TWIN FALLS — A handful of abused women gathered Thursday, struggling with the idea of changing their lives.

One woman concluding her divorce from a verbally abusive husband attended the workshop, "Risk Taking," for reassurance that her choices for a new job and lifestyle were the right ones.

"I was very frightened when I moved out," she said. "I still need this to make sure I'm on the right track and doing the right things."

Another woman seeking help recently left someone who beat her.

"I know I need this group, so that I don't have to do it on my own," she said. "It's tough to not go back and open that door."

Overcoming the stagnation of remaining in those relationships was the theme of the 2-hour workshop at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, sponsored by Volunteers Against Violence and the Women's Health and Education Center at the hospital.

The free program was the first of eight scheduled weekly for women suffering abuse.

Marcie Donner, of the College of Southern Idaho's aging office, told the women they must overcome fears about changing their predicaments. She compared the helplessness of accepting an abusive relationship to that of a puppet where "somebody else is pulling the strings."

"I hope that, by the end of this session, you will be willing to make your own decisions," Donner said. "Everything we get out of life is because we take a risk."

Donner compared the image of jumping across a crevasse along life's path to making necessary lifestyle changes. Once the uncertainty and fear are understood, which can take some time, the jump should be attempted to avoid losing self-confidence by turning away and giving up.

Another workshop participant, who feels members of her family risk too much and take advantage of her, said the push of that image would help in her situation.

"I'm beginning to face more problems I couldn't deal with 2 years ago," she said.

Donner said several people in her discussion groups usually aren't prepared to make that proverbial jump during their first meeting. VAV Coordinator Karen Mack said that because the five women were ready to make that commitment Thursday, they may not be fairly representative.

"These people are here because they need to be here and they are in a transitional phase," Mack said. She added that she hopes women still facing apprehensions will participate in the workshop in coming weeks.

"Domestic Violence and How It Affects Children," featuring Judy McAllister, a Relationship Place counselor, is scheduled for March 13.

## Late-session move revives farm mediation bill

BOISE — Rural lawmakers have retrieved a proposal ordering mediation of lending disputes from the Idaho Senate's wastebasket.

Members of the Senate's Agricultural Affairs Committee, got the bill uncrumpled for consideration Thursday with a late-session approach to the State Affairs Committee, the panel that dropped it less than a day earlier.

"When we impressed on them the urgency, they decided they would put the bill out," said Sen. Laird

Noh, R-Twin Falls, a main mover in the attempt.

The bill now returns to the Agricultural Affairs Committee where, "We'll see if we can muster enough votes to get it passed out to the full Senate," Noh said.

The measure orders mediation of all farm-lending disputes before a lender can seek foreclosure in court. It also gives farmers access to a financial counseling service before the mediation session.

If approved, the bill would bring borrowers and lenders before the mediation service, run by the Idaho Department of Agriculture.

However, the mediator could not order any settlement or prevent foreclosures. The lender or borrower could reject any proposals, pushing the dispute to court.

The mediation meeting must take place within 42 days of notification, according to the law.

The proposal, patterned after a similar law from Iowa, offers a last opportunity to head off foreclosure, proponents have said. Consultation with a farm financial expert also could find new alternatives, they said.

However, other lawmakers and some bankers have said the measure

will do little more than delay foreclosures. By that time, borrowers normally are too deep in debt to climb out with any reasonable solution, they argue.

Some legislators have argued in favor of eliminating mandatory mediation, while keeping the consulting service.

Gov. Cecil Andrus is scheduled today to talk with top executives from Boise-based banks about the mediation proposal and other topics.

The Idaho Department of Agriculture also has said it will need at least \$200,000 to administer the program.

## Gun club sets sights on charitable status, tax exemption

TWIN FALLS — Members of the Twin Falls Rod and Gun Club have set their sights on a charity-tax exemption, saying theirs is a profitable and benevolent organization.

But Twin Falls County Assessor Dorothy Hamby walked back at a Wednesday hearing that the club was more recreational than charitable.

The Twin Falls County Board of Commissioners, sitting as the Board of Equalization, took the request under advisement on Wednesday. It will issue a written decision.

At stake is about \$600 — the amount of 1986 taxes the club paid on its property near the rim of Snake River Canyon. The property, which includes a building and about 16 acres of land, has been valued for 1987 taxes at \$43,000, Hamby said.

Confusion kicked off the hearing on Wed-

nesday. County attorney Beth Smith said she believed the board was supposed to be reviewing its denial of the club's application for a hardship exemption filed in January, by a member who wasn't present. The request for the exemption based on charitable status was a different issue.

Club attorney Fred Decker said he was not aware of the hardship application and had come to discuss the charitable exemption. The club, however, will supply the necessary financial statement missing from the hardship application.

Hamby said that testimony on the request for charitable status could be heard and the club can apply later.

Decker said the organization fell under the state's definition of "benevolent" and charitable, and deserved exemption from paying county taxes.

The club was open to the general public for trap shooting, he said. In addition, the

organization allows many non-profit and social groups to use the facility at no charge for training, educational or fund-raising activities.

The club, started in 1928, was a non-profit corporation. But in 1984 it had a loss of about \$3,500, Decker reported. Its biggest expense was the cost of targets, reflected in the fee to people using the club range.

Shells and gun components are sold at the clubhouse, with a small markup for handling, Decker said. Club President Leonard Hanson said the items were sold for the convenience of the shooters.

"It's by no means a way for us to make money," Hanson said.

When Smith asked if losses were standard for the club, Hanson said it varied. The loss in 1984 reflected some improvements to the facility.

Club member Ben Ledbetter added, "We very seldom came out in the hole."

Other members testified the club didn't seek donations from the public, and that any profits went back into the facility. Most of the improvements and repairs at the club were donated by club members, they said.

The club has about 160 members, with fees ranging from \$150 for a lifetime membership to \$15 and \$25 for an annual membership, Hanson said. Members were entitled to a refund on their dues.

Smith asked if there were any circumstances that made it impossible for the club to pay its taxes.

Hanson replied, "I can't think of any. We have paid taxes in the past."

Club member Chuck Woodland said, "I feel the club is there for the community and I think the community should help us."

Hamby, however, saw the club as taxable. There was no pattern in the state for taxing gun clubs, she said.

The Elks Club is an exempt charitable to cut costs.

"The gun club doesn't do that," she said. "Look at several things. You look at the primary purpose. Is your primary purpose to benefit the public or as a recreational benefit? I believe its primary purpose is for recreational trap shooting."

Hamby said she wasn't unfamiliar with the sport, as her husband is an avid trap shooter. But some county residents were struggling to pay taxes on the bare necessities, she said.

Hamby added that the Secretary of State's Office reported that the club's incorporation certificate had expired in 1978.

Following the meeting, Hanson said the gun club had sought the exemption this year because the new board was looking for ways to cut costs.

# Judge orders woman to tell supply source in drug case

BOISE (AP) — A district judge here says there are a number of reasons why he likes the idea of making drug users reveal their supply sources as a condition of probation.

"I like it fine," said 4th District Judge Robert Newhouse. "If someone is to ask me for mercy, to ask me to put them on probation, then they should cooperate and be a good citizen and cost less."

"I don't think we're in a group of kids where we don't rat on one another," he said.

Tracy Phillips, 26, is serving a 30-day jail term in the Valley County Jail at Cascade for possession of cocaine. But before she gets out, scheduled for April 7, she'll have to decide whether to meet a Newhouse order to reveal her source of the drug.

If she won't, Newhouse could order her to serve up to three years in prison and fine her up to \$3,000.

Her attorney, William Killen, Mc-

Call, said he doesn't know how she will respond. "I don't know what she's going to happen," he said.

"Both my client and I did a lot of soul-searching about this... it was something that came as a surprise to everybody," he said.

Ms. Phillips originally was charged with selling cocaine, a charge which carries a term up to life imprisonment.

After plea-bargaining, she pleaded guilty to possession of 8.4 grams of cocaine.

Valley County Prosecutor Carl Kerick recommended a withheld judgment and 30-day jail term, \$1,000 fine, 100 hours of community service and three years probation.

But Newhouse, not required to accept terms of the plea-bargain, as a condition of probation ordered Ms. Phillips to reveal her source of cocaine and to cooperate with the prosecutor in any future court actions against the supplier.

He placed her on five years proba-

tion and fined her a total of \$285.

Killen said he understands why Newhouse would order his client to reveal her source, but added that he does not think it is an appropriate condition of probation.

"While it makes a certain amount of sense, it doesn't relate to any future conduct or preclude future criminal conduct," he said.

"I think it's inappropriate, as I understand the conditions of sentencing and probation and withheld judgments, to direct someone to act as an informant," Killen said.

Newhouse says he's been using that requirement for years. He said it generally keeps defendants away from drug use in the future. "I think they would be scared to death to be around drug dealers," he said.

He said sometimes defendants comply, sometimes they don't. If they do not, they are in violation of probation and subject to the penalties of the original charge.

## Prison escapee still at large

TWIN FALLS — Law enforcement officers in Magic Valley Thursday were continuing to look for escaped Idaho State prison farm escapee Vincent Randolph Waggoner, after the state-owned vehicle in which he was traveling when he escaped Wednesday was found in Twin Falls.

Officer Dale Atkinson, a 1984 Dodge pickup and a white Ford pickup truck, were reported stolen in Twin Falls Wednesday night or early Thursday morning. One of the vehicles had a gun in it when taken, the owner reported.

Police said one of the pickup trucks may have been taken by Waggoner as a means of continuing his flight from Idaho.

Waggoner, 24, was a minimum security prisoner at the state farm when he drove away Tuesday in a state owned vehicle with state Department of Corrections markings on the doors.

The car was found parked near the Pioneer Bar, on Kimberly Road, Wednesday afternoon. It was originally thought he had left the Twin Falls area again by Thursday night, but after the two stolen vehicle reports Thursday, officers said he may have remained in Twin Falls until late Wednesday night.

Twin Falls, was bound over to 5th District Court Thursday when he appeared for preliminary hearing on a charge of possession of 40 pounds of marijuana.

Guzman was arrested for possession of a controlled substance on Feb. 26 at his home just outside of Twin Falls. When city, county and state officers entered the residence of Gulch Lane with a search warrant, they confiscated two large plastic-wrapped packages of marijuana, valued at more than \$100,000 and weighing about 40 lbs.

Guzman has been held in county custody in lieu of \$50,000 bond since his arrest. No date has been set for his arraignment.

# Girlfriend: Wentz said Miller killed actor Duffy's parents

BOULDER, Mont. (AP) — Sean Miller, saying, "here, take the —" Wentz said Thursday co-defendant Kenneth Miller grabbed a shotgun from his hands and "blasted" Terry and Wendy, the father of actor Patrick Duffy, during a holdup attempt.

"Miller just blasted him with blood; he just blasted him," Wentz told a Jefferson County District Court jury during Miller's trial on deliberate homicide charges Wednesday.

Wentz said it was Miller who pulled the trigger and killed Duffy's wife, Marie, in the bar the couple owned and operated in Boulder Nov. 18.

Wentz and Miller, both 19-year-old Helena janitors, are being tried separately on identical charges of deliberate homicide, robbery and assault. Each has blamed the other of actually doing the shootings.

In earlier testimony Thursday, Wentz's girlfriend Wentz had blamed the shootings on Miller, and police testified that when Wentz was arrested, he shouted that Miller was the one who did the shooting.

Wentz, a California native, denied statements made earlier that he was a member of the Aryan Brotherhood, a white supremacist group, but he admitted that he and Miller intended to rob the Duffy's bar, The Lounge, on the night of Nov. 18.

He said Terry Duffy was alone on the customer side of the bar and his swing around and grabbed the — shotgun Wentz carried into the bar.

"This really flipped me out. I thought, 'Wow, what am I going to do now?'"

At the same time, he said, Miller was at his side, screaming "shoot him, shoot him," and Duffy held up his hand. "It was really sad, the look in his eyes."

Wentz said he thinks the gun went off while he and Duffy were struggling, and then he handed the gun to

Miller, saying, "here, take the —" and Miller shot Duffy.

He said Miller then gave him back the gun and Mrs. Duffy emerged from a back room.

"Miller just looked at me and walked up—and pulled the trigger when the gun was in my hand," Wentz testified.

His account differed markedly from Miller's story, as outlined by defense attorney Edmund Sheehy in opening arguments: Miller "is expected to testify when the defense presents its case next week."

Sheehy told jurors Tuesday that Miller will testify that Wentz shot both Duffys and threatened to shoot Miller as well.

Wentz's testimony also differed from the account of state criminal investigator Tom Adamo, who said only two shots were fired and there was no indication of a struggle.

Wentz denied threatening Miller, and when he was asked by Jefferson County Attorney John Connor whether Miller was afraid of him, Wentz replied, "no, not even close."

After the shootings, Wentz said, he was confused and disoriented.

"I don't know what I was really thinking," he said, adding he thought he said something about the shooting and "Nothing really mattered any more."

He and Miller returned to Helena, stole a truck and a jeep and went to the apartment he shared with his girlfriend, Tammy Harding.

"I just wanted to get some clothes and get out of there. I wanted to get away, you know?"

Harding testified earlier Thursday that Wentz told her that night that "two people were down" and had been killed.

"He pointed over at Ken and said, 'Ken did it,'" she said.

Wentz said Miller gestured no and then said "Don't tell her anything, just forget it, forget it."

But she denied that Miller leaped over and told her to call police, as his defense attorney suggested in opening arguments. Instead, she said, he told Wentz, "let's go blow up the trucks."

Ms. Harding, who said she loved Wentz, broke down in tears early in her testimony Thursday when she was asked to identify the jacket he was wearing the night the Duffys were killed.

She said Miller appeared calm and unemotional but appeared to be drunk. "He was stumbling all over the place," she said.

Wentz, she said, seemed hyper and excited. "The first thing he said was 'the world's going to end in two days,'" she said.

Ms. Harding said Wentz asked her to go with him, but she declined. He asked where the shotgun shells were and then left with shells, cigarettes and clothing.

She said she tried to persuade them to turn themselves in, but they shook their heads.

Her father, Kingman Harding, testified his daughter was hysterical when she telephoned him after Wentz had been there.

He quoted his daughter as saying: "Dad—my God, my God, I've got to get out of here, and when he asked if Wentz was drunk, she responded: 'Dad, it's much worse.'"

The two Hardings testified they were in the apartment talking to a police officer when they heard on his walkie-talkie that there had been a double homicide in Boulder.

"That's when I really went crazy," because it was proof this was really happening," Ms. Harding said.

At that same instant, they heard screaming tires. Wentz and Miller had returned, and police converged on them—they were apprehended a short time later.

## Jerome court hears guilty pleas

JEROME — John Wesley Decker and David Roy Mullins and Edward M. Wetstein have also entered guilty pleas in 5th District Court.

David Roy Mullins pleaded guilty during arraignment on two separate charges. The first charge, possession of a controlled substance, carries a maximum sentence of five years or a \$15,000 fine or both.

In the second charge, Mullins is accused of sexually abusing a child under the age of 16 years. This charge carries a maximum sentence of not more than five years.

A \$10,000 bond was posted for each

pleaded guilty to the charge of first degree burglary in Jerome's 5th District Court, during his arraignment March 10 before Judge Phillip M. Decker.

Decker, 32, is accused of attempting to burglarize the Circle K store at Main Street East and Buchanan on Feb. 11. The charge carries a maximum 15 year penalty. Bond was set at \$10,000.

Wetstein will be set upon completion of a pre-sentence investigation.

A \$10,000 bond was posted for each

count. Mullins' trial date will be set upon completion of a pre-sentence investigation.

Edward M. Wetstein pled guilty to the charge of writing insufficient funds checks and waived the delay in sentencing caused by the usual pre-sentence investigation.

After requesting the sentence be imposed immediately, Wetstein was ordered to pay restitution and sentenced to two years to run concurrently with a sentence he is currently serving.

# Wood-cutting enforcement to tighten

TWIN FALLS — Enforcement of wood-cutting regulations in the South Hills area of the Sawtooth National Forest is being stepped up, and forest officials expect to issue more violation notices and fewer warnings this year.

5th District Ranger Don Oman said a total of 85 incident reports were made in the 3-month wood-cutting season last fall. Of these, 26 were violation notices which carry a \$75 fine.

Oman estimated that one-third of the trees that is taken from the South Hills, is removed illegally.

Wood cutters, he said, either fail to obtain the permit or they buy the basic permit for 2 cords of wood, but cut much more.

Oman said the number of incident reports last year represents a significant increase over previous years. He said many wood cutters fail to display their load tags and cut without permits.

In the past, he said, forest personnel has been lenient about citing the violators.

The reason for this is that over the last couple of years he has made some major changes in our

firewood-cutting program. Our approach is to initially take an educational approach, rather than strict enforcement when changes are made," Oman said.

The regulations have been in effect several years and violators will be receiving more citations and fewer warnings this year, Oman said.

Honest people are paying the cost of the program, Oman said, and unless full payment for the firewood is received—it is difficult for the Forest Service to provide a good-cutting program.

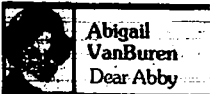
**DEAR ABBY:** This is the first time I've written to you. I don't know where else to turn.

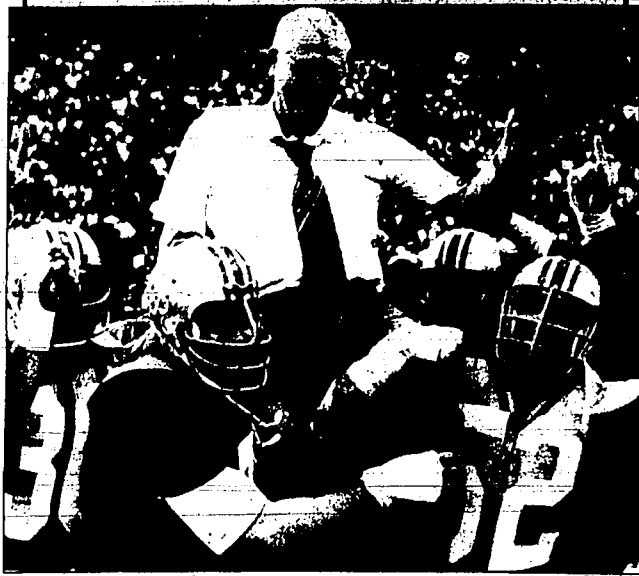

# Hayes, 5th-winningest coach on college grids, dead at 74

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Woody Hayes, who guided Ohio State to two national championships before a temper tantrum ended his successful 33-year college football coaching career, died in his sleep Thursday. He was 74.

Hayes suffered an apparent heart attack and was found in bed by his wife, Anne, at their suburban home, said Dr. Robert Murphy, Hayes' physician.

Services were scheduled Tuesday. The game's fifth winningest coach, Hayes' often-stormy tenure on the sidelines ended in 1978, a few hours after the Buckeyes lost to Clemson in the Gator Bowl.

During a nationally televised game, Hayes struck Charlie Bauman, a Clemson nose guard who had intercepted an Ohio State pass late in the game. Hayes refused to apologize, and was fired.

"His passing was something I thought I would be prepared for, but it still hit me pretty hard," said Archie Griffin, a tailback for Hayes and the only two-time winner of the Heisman Trophy as the nation's outstanding football player. "He was father figure to me."

Wayne Woodrow "Woody" Hayes joined the Big Ten school in 1951, and led the Buckeyes to a 205-61-10 record in 28 seasons, including 10 national championships in 1954 and 1956. He turned out 13 Big Ten champions and eight Rose Bowl squads.

In more than three decades of coaching, all in his native Ohio, he posted a 228-72-10 record. Hayes led his alma mater, Denison University, to a 19-6 record in 1947-48, and then took Miami of Ohio to a 14-5 mark in 1949-50.

Only four other college coaches of Athletics Hugh Hindman, a

former assistant coach to Hayes, announced Hayes had been relieved of his coaching duties.

Twice Hayes was placed on probation by the Big Ten Conference — in 1956 for making personal loans to his players and in 1977 for a sideline altercation with an ABC-TV cameraman during a game at Michigan.

He also was cited in 1959 by the American Football Coaches Association's ethics committee. He had been involved in a ruckus with two California sports writers following a 17-0 loss at Southern California. The Los Angeles Times filed assault charges against Hayes, charging that he had pushed a camera into the face of staffer Art Rogers prior to the 1973 Rose Bowl. The charges were later dropped.

Earle Bruce, a former Hayes assistant who later succeeded him as Ohio State coach, said, "What sticks out in my mind right now are all the good things he did for his former players and coaches. He always had a lot of time for them."

Hayes spent his later years at numerous speaking engagements, answering his mail and supporting various Ohio State fund-raising programs. He was a frequent speaker at Ohio State football practices, and the university named a street after him.

Hayes had been in failing health in recent years. In 1981, he underwent two operations, one on his gall bladder and the second to remove a surgical sponge left in him. He suffered a stroke in 1984 and 1985, and a heart attack in 1985.

He is survived by his wife and a son, Steve, who is a municipal judge in Columbus.

# Despite a hot temper, Hayes recalled as compassionate man

Woody Hayes, a scowling, irascible figure along the sidelines in three decades of college football, was remembered Thursday as a compassionate coach who cared deeply for players.

Hayes, 74, suffered an apparent heart attack and died in his sleep early Thursday at his suburban

home.

"He was a tremendously different person off the field than on. Off the field, he knew everybody's name and always had a word of advice. On the field, he was quite demanding, to say the least," said Earle Bruce, who succeeded Hayes as head coach at Ohio State in 1979 and had been a player and assistant under him.

"He always had time for other people. It just amazed me what he

did with his time. On his vacation, he would go to Viet Nam."

"I remember the way Coach Hayes cared for people. He was unreal in that kind of way. He was a great, great man," said Archie Griffin, who twice won the Heisman Trophy as a running back at Ohio State during Hayes' 23-year career.

"In the minds of the people who loved him like I did, he'll never die."

President Reagan, in a statement

issued by the White House, called Hayes "a legend in college football."

"Colorful and sometimes even controversial, he cared deeply about his players, his team and his school," Reagan said. "Nancy and I extend our deep sympathy to his family and to the Ohio State University community."

Former President Nixon said, "Woody Hayes is widely known as one of the greatest football coaches

of our time, but I knew him also to be a man who had a remarkable grasp of history and of foreign policy. Like all great men, regardless of profession, Woody Hayes understood the great forces that moved the world. I was privileged to know him as a loyal friend and as an insightful, wise counselor."

Vice President George Bush recalled, "As Woody was helped up

the steps at a big dinner in Columbus last year, the entire audience rose to its feet; and when he finished a very general introduction, there wasn't a dry eye in the place. He spoke from the heart. He led with the soul."

"He was a great personal friend of mine and this is a great loss," said Michigan coach Bo Schemmbocker, a former assistant to Hayes at Ohio State.

# Ex-SMU grid coach Collins is searching

For employment for coaching staff

DALLAS (AP) — Former Southern Methodist head football coach Bobby Collins said Thursday he has been job hunting since the Mustangs' slush fund scandal broke — not for himself, but for his former assistants.

"I've got six coaches placed and I believe the other three will be hired in the near future," Collins said.

Collins and Athletic Director Bob Hitch resigned Dec. 5, shortly after the airing of the allegations that led to the NCAA's suspension of SMU's football program in 1987, as part of the harshest penalty ever imposed against a college football program.

Texas Gov. Bill Clements, who resigned as chairman of SMU's Board of Regents here, taking office in January, disclosed last week that he and several other board members learned of the illicit payments in 1984 and decided to continue them.

In a phone interview Thursday, Collins refused to say whether he had any knowledge of the payments, which the NCAA said involved a total of \$61,000 to 13 players.

"I haven't commented on it since December 5 and I feel strongly about not commenting on it," Collins said.

Asked if he felt he was a victim of a cheating system that was well-entrenched when he arrived, Collins repeated, "I just feel it's best I don't comment. I hope you understand."

After Collins left Southern Mississippi as head coach to come to SMU five years ago, the Golden Eagles were put on NCAA probation for violations that occurred during his tenure.

Collins was head coach when SMU was put on its sixth probation in August 1985 for improper recruiting. The school had just ended a probation in 1983 for recruiting violations that took place during the head coaching career of Ron Meyer, now coach of the NFL's Indianapolis Colts.

The Mustangs received a form of the "death penalty" Feb. 25, the school's recording seventh probation. The NCAA said improper payments continued at the Southwest Conference school even after the 1985 sanctions.

Collins said, "I have no control over that," when asked if he thought he could land another coaching job with his reputation for being associated with colleges on probation.

"I'd miss coaching," he said.

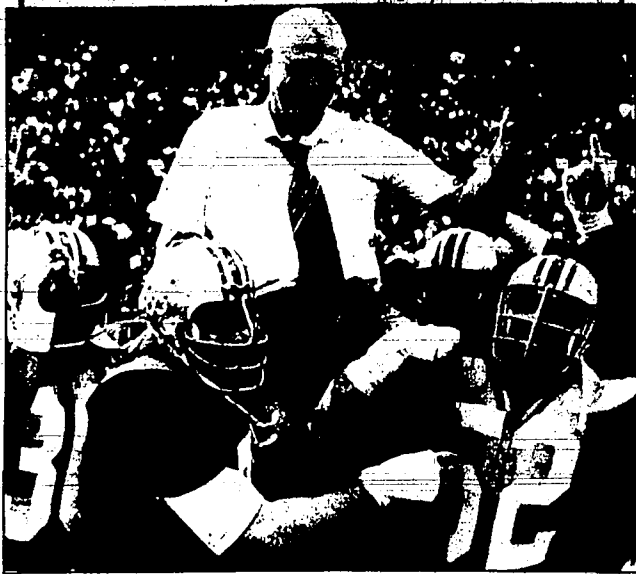

Hayes' teams also produced two Heisman Trophy winners — tailback Howard "Hopalong" Cassidy in 1955, and Griffin, in 1974 and 1975.

"I just remember how Coach Hayes cared for people. He was unreal in that kind of way. He was a great, great man," Griffin said.

Hayes was born in Clinton, Ohio, on Feb. 14, 1913. He grew up in Newcomerstown, where his father was the school superintendent until his death in 1925.

After graduation, Hayes attended Denison in Granville, where he played offensive tackle for three years. He graduated in 1935, majoring in history and English.

After a shaky 4-3-2 record in 1951, his first year at Ohio State, his program took off. But throughout his many successes at Ohio State, he was continually dogged by controversies of his own making.

Hayes had been in failing health in recent years. He had, in the last two operations, one on his gall bladder and the second to remove a surgical sponge left in him. He suffered stroke in 1984 and 1985, and a heart attack in 1985.

He is survived by his wife and a son, Steve, who is a municipal judge in Columbus.

# Despite a hot temper, Hayes recalled as compassionate man

Woody Hayes, a scowling, irascible figure along the sidelines in three decades of college football, was remembered Thursday as a compassionate coach who cared deeply for players.

Hayes, 74, suffered an apparent heart attack and died in his sleep early Thursday at his suburban

home.

"He was a tremendously different person off the field than on. Off the field, he knew everybody's name and always had a word of advice. On the field, he was quite demanding, to say the least," said Earle Bruce, who succeeded Hayes as head coach at Ohio State in 1979 and had been a player and assistant under him.

"He always had time for other people. It just amazed me what he

did with his time. On his vacation, he would go to Viet Nam."

"I remember the way Coach Hayes cared for people. He was unreal in that kind of way. He was a great, great man," said Archie Griffin, who twice won the Heisman Trophy as a running back at Ohio State during Hayes' 28-year career.

"In the minds of the people who loved him like I did, he'll never die."

President Reagan, in a statement

issued by the White House, called Hayes "a legend in college football."

"Colorful and sometimes even controversial, he cared deeply about his players, his team and his school," Reagan said. "Nancy and I extend our deep sympathy to his family and to the Ohio State University community."

Former President Nixon said, "Woody Hayes is widely known as one of the greatest football coaches

of our time, but I knew him also to be a man who had a remarkable grasp of history and of foreign policy. Like all great men, regardless of profession, Woody Hayes understood the great forces that moved the world. I was privileged to know him as a loyal friend and as an insightful, wise counselor."

Vice President George Bush recalled, "As Woody was helped up

the steps at a big dinner on Columbus late last year, the entire audience rose to its feet; and when he finished a very general introduction, there wasn't a dry eye in the place. He spoke from the heart. He led with the soul."

"He was a great personal friend of mine and this is a great loss," said Michigan coach Bo Schembechler, a former assistant to Hayes at Ohio State.

# Ex-SMU grid coach Collins is searching

For employment for coaching staff

DALLAS (AP) — Former Southern Methodist head football coach Bobby Collins said Thursday he has been job hunting since the Mustangs' slush fund scandal broke — not for himself, but for his former assistants.

"I've got six coaches placed and I believe the other three will be hired in the near future," Collins said.

Collins and Athletic Director Bob Hitch resigned Dec. 5, shortly after the airing of the allegations that led to the NCAA's suspension of SMU's football program in 1987, as part of the harshest penalty ever imposed against a college football program.

Texas Gov. Bill Clements, who resigned as chairman of SMU's Board of Governors before taking office in January, disclosed last week that he and several other board members learned of the illicit payments in 1984 and decided to continue them.

In a phone interview Thursday, Collins refused to say whether he had any knowledge of the payments, which the NCAA said involved a total of \$61,000 to 13 players.

"I haven't commented on it since December 5 and I feel strongly about not commenting on it," Collins said.

Asked if he felt he was a victim of a cheating system that was well-entrenched when he arrived, Collins repeated, "I just feel it's best I don't comment. I hope you understand."

After Collins left Southern Mississippi as head coach to come to SMU five years ago, the Golden Eagles were put on NCAA probation for violations that occurred during his tenure.

Collins was head coach when SMU was put on its sixth probation in August 1985 for improper recruiting. The school had just ended a probation in 1983 for recruiting violations that took place during the head coaching career of Ron Meyer, now coach of the NFL's Indianapolis Colts.

The Mustangs received a form of the "death penalty" Feb. 25, the school's record-tying seventh probation, because the NCAA said improper payments continued at the Southwest Conference school even after the 1985 sanctions.

Collins said, "I have no control over that," when asked if he thought he could land another coaching job with his reputation for being associated with colleges on probation.

"I'd miss coaching," he said.

## 'Crosscurrents' blazes trail in photo images

TWIN FALLS — If you're into carbon prints, cibachrome, photogravure and split-toned gelatin silver, then you'll definitely want to check out the photo exhibit at the College of Southern Idaho's Herrett Museum.

The show features the work of Cal Sparks, Peter Vincent, Dianne Kornberg, Craig Law and Wesley Wada, all of whom deal with experimental photographic images and printing methods.

However, even if you don't have a clue as to what any of that technical stuff is, and you're more into pocket cameras and one-hour photo processing than long lenses and printing techniques, the exhibit still gives anyone interested in photography a good look at the versatile world of contemporary photographic art.

The four-man, one-woman show, entitled "Crosscurrents: Experimental Visions in Photography," features 125 photographs assembled into 25 separate works. Photographic techniques used include conceptual art; arranged imagery, hand-coloring, three-dimensional work and non-silver printing processes.

"This show is basically pictures of ideas, more than pictures of scenes or objects," said Wesley Wada, exhibitor and co-curator of the "Crosscurrents" exhibition. "It's really a different kind of show for this area, I think."

Wada, an assistant professor of art at CSI, said that the photo exhibition is the first major showing of contemporary photography at the Herrett Museum. His own work, which he describes as "miniature museum displays," are rolled into a three-dimensional format which gives each work a different look when viewed from a different angle.

"I've been doing the three-dimensional work for quite a while," he said. "Most of them are what you call 'low sculpture relief.' They don't stick out very far from the wall."

His "Ritual Wing," a photographic group of green-banded feathers, appears real enough from a distance to pluck. In "Magic Rainbow Matrix III," eyes from the heads of a random pattern of open-mouthed trout follow you halfway across the room, then flip to reveal another group of trout who observe you from the other side.

Some of his inspiration for photographic subjects is derived from trips he and his wife, Linda Anthis, official photographer for CSI, have taken around the American West.

"Four years ago we got a big van and gutted it and installed stoves and a refrigerator and things like that," he said. "We try to travel as much as we can, and I'm heavily in the summer. It's really an incomparable experience. I wish everyone could experience it at least once. It changes your whole idea about a lot of things."

Wada said that he's visited "just about any Indian ruin in the Southwest that was worth visiting" and has been particularly interested in the artifacts he's found in North and Southwest Indian museums.

"That stuff fascinates me, particularly the ones where people don't have any idea of what the object was used for," he said. "So in a series prior to these (in the exhibit), I was trying to create fake archeological artifacts, things that looked like they'd been dug up and were indecipherable. You looked at them and knew they meant something, but you didn't know what."

Wada, a Japanese American, said that for a long time he avoided photography because he didn't want people to stereotype him.

"One of the things that I had to work myself around was the whole idea of the cliché of the 'Japanese photographer,'" he said. "When you're growing up, you're really conscious of things like that. I didn't want to fit into a cliché, so I actually avoided photography for the longest time."

However, his work does reveal some of his ethnic background, he said.

"The format I'm working right now is very Eastern. It's a long horizontal format made of many verticals. I think the fact that I like to work with natural objects is also an Eastern trait. But, basically, my upbringing is very American."

"My knowledge of Japanese is limited to cuss words," he added, smiling.

"Personally, photography is something to me that I don't think I'd feel right without. It satisfies something in me that I can't get any other way."

"I really enjoy the process. I like seeing images materialize on a blank, white sheet of paper. My wife and I use it in lots and lots of different ways. One of our professional goals is to be able to do it all well, whether it's landscape photography or color work or portraiture or photojournalism — do it all rather than get to a point where we just spend our time in one thing and perhaps get in a rut."

Wada's work has appeared at the Denver Art Museum, the Boise Gallery of Art, and in the experimental photography showcase, "New Photographics" in Ellensburg, Wash. He has also exhibited widely, mostly in the western United States.

Exhibitor Peter Vincent, whose hand-colored work has sprung from his reactions to "the incredible overabundance of imagery available" today, has exhibited in New York City. His work is in the permanent collections of the Sun Valley Center, the Boise Gallery of Art and the College of Southern Idaho. He currently resides in Colorado Springs, Colo.

Dianne Kornberg, a Portland resident, works with still "lens" objects found along coastal beaches, estuaries and inland waters. She has exhibited regionally and nationally, and is represented by Ledel Gallery in New York City. Her work is in the collections of the State of Oregon, the Portland Art Museum and the Costa Rican Museum of Art.

## Innovators in exhibit took craft into art

Images Gallery shows works by Littleton, Lindquist, Voukos

KETCHUM — Three artists noted for transforming a craft into an art form have their works on exhibit at Images Gallery in Ketchum.

Featured in the show which opened last week are glass sculptor Harvey Littleton; ceramist Peter Voukos and wood turner Melvin Lindquist.

Gall Severn, director of Images Gallery, worked for over two years to bring these artists to the gallery. "It's amazing that they are showing their work here in Idaho," Severn said. "Mostly they only show their work in museums now."

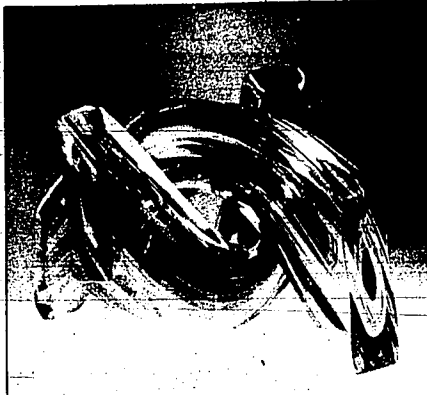
Severn describes the artists as "the fathers of their fields" because each is responsible for transforming a craft into art. "It's amazing that they are showing their work here in Idaho," Severn said. "Mostly they only show their work in museums now."

"Glass," Severn said, "was something to use, something functional like a wine glass or a bottle. Similarly, wood was used to make spoons and chairs and stools. Glass, clay and wood were never thought of in terms of sculpture, only craft."

According to the gallery owner, Littleton, Voukos and Lindquist "are the most responsible for bringing their media above the craft realm and into the fine arts realm in terms of sculpture."

Littleton works at his own glass studio in North Carolina. In the late 1950s, Littleton took glass blowing out of the factory and into a small studio to make art rather than blow bottles and wine glasses. He began by smashing a series of glass shapes and then remelting them in a flagrant denial of functionality.

Twenty years later, after exhibiting his work at, among other places, the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York, Littleton was generally regarded as worthless. But Lindquist learned to tool the spalled wood, often cutting the inside of a wooden vase without being able to see by using his "blind boring" technique.

Lindquist is a wood worker who specializes in wooden vessels. He spent much of his life working for the General Electric Company as a turret lathe operator. Using those skills, he developed a way to form wood into vase-shaped vessels by cutting the wood with tools as it turned, eventually exhibiting his work at the Smithsonian and the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

In the late 1950s, Lindquist pioneered the use of spalled, or rot-damaged, wood in his work. Spalled wood was generally regarded as worthless. But Lindquist learned to tool the spalled wood, often cutting the inside of a wooden vase without being able to see by using his "blind boring" technique.

The power of Lindquist's work lies in his use of spalled wood, knotted wood and natural finishes, said Severn. "Lindquist brings out char-

acteristics inherent in the wood rather than manipulating the wood into a form or shape" of apparent beauty.

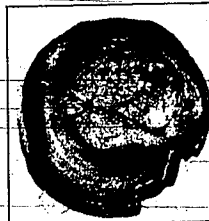
Images is showing five Littleton sculptures, including several in the suspended light series.

In the late 1940s, Voukos took a class in ceramics at Montana State University. According to Voukos it was then that he began to understand what art was all about through clay.

Over 30 years later Voukos has works in the permanent collections of the Museum of Modern Art in New York City and the Smithsonian.

Voukos' experiments with clay-cutting the surfaces and adding slabs to create relief, to create art rather than pottery utensils. Several called Voukos' work "primitive, hard for people to appreciate."

Severn said there's an energy in



Voukos' art, and it's important to understand the process and the history behind the pieces.

The exhibit, which will be reviewed in the national publications American Craft, Art in America and Art News, will run through April 30.

Clark was formerly a professor of religious art at Davidson College in Davidson, N.C., until he fell in love with the elf-like characters — and began creating their figures and faces in clay. He now works full-time with the Cairn Studio in Davidson.

Benno and Marjorie Deters say the public is invited to meet the artist,

get a first-hand look at how the sculptor works and inspect a large collection of his art. He will also autograph his works for collectors.

The Deters recently attended a similar showing by Clark in Salt Lake City. # Rourke, De Niro play tasty counterpoint in 'Angel Heart'

**TWIN FALLS** — Following are capsule reviews of movies currently playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**ANGEL HEART (R).** Alan Parker's sumptuous, occasionally overwrought visual sense stands him in great stead in this deceptive story, which begins like '50s film noir and ends like an occult mystery with voodoo overtones. Micky Rourke's scabrous gunshoe is one of his best performances. elegantly counterpointed by Robert De Niro as the mysterious gentleman who hires him to track down a '40s crooner, the missing Johnny Favorite. Lisa Bonet is suitably fine, but the film's earlier X rating was peculiar to say the



least; other films have had sex, nudity and violence in these proportions and remained unscathed.

**CHILDREN OF A LESSER GOD (R).** A passionate and loving love story between a teacher (William Hurt, Oscar nominee for Best Actor) of speech to the hard of hearing and a beautiful deaf woman (Marlee Matlin, Oscar nominee for Best Actress) who refuses to try to speak. An exceptionally adroit stage-to-

screen adaptation of the acclaimed Mark Medved play. With Piper Laurie, Philip Bruns and nominated for five Oscars, including best picture.

**CROCODILE DUNDEE (PG-13).** The sunny, reassuring personality of Paul Hogan (the fellow who says "G'day" in the Australian tourist ads) is at the heart of this most popular film he designed and co-wrote for himself. It is more than enough to carry it: a "fish out of water" story, with Hogan as adventurer-hunter Dundee, wooing Linda Kostowaki's inquisitive Newsway reporter in the Aussie outback, and then in the wilds of Manhattan itself. "Dundee" is really nothing more than a pleasant, amiable, good-natured crowd-pleaser, but it is hard to think of many crowds it could not somehow please.

**THE GOLDEN CHILD (PG-13).** High in the wind-lashed mountains of Tibet sits the Golden Child — whom many believe is the true, perfect soul humanity has long awaited — surrounded by Evil Forces: heinous killers, slaving brutes, vile demons surging up from the bowels of Hell. Will he survive? Oh, sure. And does in your own local movie-house lies "The Golden Child," which many believed would be the great new Eddie Murphy comedy we have long awaited. It is best by even more Evil Forces: heinous scripling, slaving special effects, vile clichés surging up from the bowels of Hollywood. Can it survive? Nope.

**HEARTBREAK RIDGE (R).** The

material here is thin, thin, thin — has the pelion of a no-ready-for-prime-time director's combat platoon uniting before the Big Battle-lasted this long already? — but director-producer-star Clint Eastwood, his trademark growl reduced to a near-inaudible purring rumble, turns in an engaging performance that occasionally transutes the film's anemla.

**HOOSIERS (PG).** This film is as engaging, as modest, as utterly American and as thrilling as the real-life story it is based on: the rise of a tiny town's high school basketball team to the Indiana state finals. It also features some of the finest acting you could hope to see, by Gene Hackman as the coach with a dark past, Dennis Hopper (Oscar nominee for Best Supporting Actor) as the alcoholic ex-hoops-star, and Barbara Hershey as Hackman's int'l-adv'sary. The film has a few burrs (some plot elements feel grafted on, and the editing rhythms are not always right) but you can hate basketball and yet still have a sensational time at "Hoosiers."

sort of cute. Gollieb has a fairly lively, TV-commercial style and a smart, bright cast (Andrew McCarthy, Kim-Catrill, Estelle Getty, Mesach Taylor) who mug a lot. They keep things sort of diverting — but only for undemanding audiences.

**THE MISSION (PG).** The film is hauntingly spectacular, serious and passionate — and in many ways — successful; it provides Jeremy Irons with a chance for his purest and most searing film performance, and it gives Robert De Niro another of those nearly impossible physical challenges he thrives on. But the picture teeters with its idealized views of the Guarani Indians, its general lack of surprise and occasional deadly lines of dialogue that would defeat Olivier (they rout De Niro).

**A NIGHTMARE ON ELM STREET 3: DREAM WARRIORS (R).** Horrible Freddy Krueger (Robert Englund) is back yet again, but by now his movies are becoming burlesques of the morbid original. The result here is an ambitious horror comedy with some imaginative fantasy, acquiesces and some hilarity; now you can laugh at the grueliness. Heather Langenkamp is back as Intrepid Nancy Thompson, now a psychiatrist determined to help a new group of youngsters menaced in their dreams by Freddy. With Craig Wasson, John Saxon and a psychotic (this is movie making with a zealot's fervor. Director-writer Oliver Stone, decorated Vietnam infantryman himself, clearly wants us to understand what fighting in that war was like. He succeeds with an immediacy that is frightening. War movies of the past, even the greatest ones, seem like crane shots by comparison; "Platoon" is at ground zero. And, not incidentally, Stone may have put a stake through the heart of all the slick Rambo heroes ever to slide onto a screen.

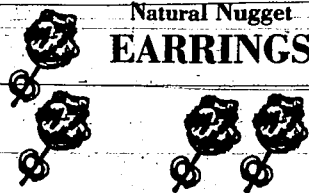

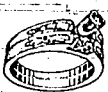

# Emmy-winner 'Cagney & Lacey' celebrates 100th airing on CBS

By ANDREW J. EDELSTEIN

"Cagney & Lacey" — the Emmy-winning series that has flourished after extremely rocky beginnings — airs its 100th episode 9 p.m. Monday on KMYT, KBCI and KSL.

Despite the milestone, rumors persist that 1984-1987 may be the last season for the CBS series.

The show has won acclaim not only for its depiction of the relationship between two female police officers, but for its exploration of such social issues as apartheid and sexual harassment and health issues as breast cancer. Earlier this season, the episode "Rites of Passage" was believed to be the first series TV show in which the word "condom" was spoken.

The 100th episode, "Special Treatment," which was directed by Jackie Cooper, will also have a political theme. While off-duty, Mary Beth Lacey (Tyne Daly) is arrested at an anti-nuclear demonstration at Queens College. Because they don't like to arrest their own, the police offer to let Lacey go. But she insists on being treated like anybody else. It is the sequel to an earlier episode in which Lacey first had her political consciousness raised about the dangers of transporting nuclear waste.

"We have never shied away from doing controversial stories," says producer Georgia Jeffries. "But we're not preaching. The stories are done to show how they affect the characters in an emotionally provocative way and to pique the audience to think and feel along with the characters."

Originally developed as a series, "Cagney & Lacey" was turned down by all three networks. It finally

aired in October 1981 as a TV movie starring Loretta Swit as Christine Cagney and Daly as Lacey, two New York undercover officers. The TV movie was so successful that it was spun off into a series, which debuted in March 1982. Instead of Swit, Meg Foster played Cagney. The show, a first of its kind, focused on two female police officers who were not only partners, but friends. It found an immediate and loyal audience.

But when the series returned in September, Foster had been fired, replaced by Sharon Gless. Some see COVER on Page 4.

## Nielsen ratings 1st to 'Ties'

NEW YORK (AP) — A rerun of "The Cosby Show" knocked the series out of the top spot for only the fourth time this season, but NBC's "Family Ties" took over as No. 1 in the ratings from the A.C. Nielsen Co., and the network won the week. Despite preoccupation with 214 layoffs and a Writers-Guild strike, CBS managed to stay on NBC's coattails in the news ratings. NBC averaged a rating of 11.6 and a 23 share; CBS had a 11.5 rating and 21 share; ABC had a rating of 10.1 and an 18 share.

The top 10 prime-time shows were: "Family Ties," "Cosby," "Cheers," "Night Court," "Murder, She Wrote," "Who's the Boss?," "Growing Pains," "60 Minutes," "Golden Girls" and the movie "The Karate Kid."

NBC won the week with an average prime-time rating of 18.4. CBS was second with 17.2 and ABC was third with 13.3. The season-to-date average rating for NBC is 18.0. CBS is at 16.1 and ABC, 14.2.

The lowest-rated shows, from the bottom, were: "Our World," "Spies," "Sledge Hammer!" "Sidekicks," "Wizard," "Hotel" the TV movie "Passions," "Home," "Outlaws" and "Ohara."

Gerald Jaffe, NBC vice president for research projects, said the 21 weeks of the season that NBC has won out of the 24 so far equals the network's all-time high number of weekly wins from last year.
