Override thaws road work in Idaho

BOISE — When the U.S. Senate voted 67-33 Thursday afternoon to override President Reagan's veto of the highway bill, the impact on Idaho was immediate.

It freed Idaho's frozen federally funded highway construction program, state highway administrator Keith Green said that clears the way for letting of contracts and work on several major projects.

And it also triggered an increase in Idaho's speed limit on about 580 miles of interstate highways.

Gov. Cecil Andrus Wednesday afternoon signed a bill approved by the Legislature raising the speed limit to 65 mph, 30 days after Congress gave its approval.

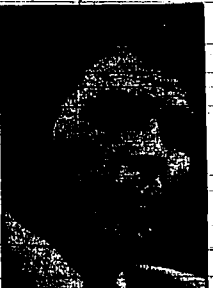
That happened Thursday afternoon, thanks to an amendment tacked on to the highway funding bill by Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, allowing the speed limit to be boosted on rural interstate highways.

Green said about May 2, the new speed limit will go into effect on all interstate highways in the state, except a 25-mile stretch in the Boise area, an area between Pocatello and Idaho Falls, and a segment of Interstate 90 in Fourth of July Canyon where the higher speed limit is not practical.

The Transportation Department will start making new signs immediately, although they will not be needed until the change goes into effect.

The bill signed by Andrus on Wednesday keeps a provision in state law for a fine of only \$5 for anyone breaking the new speed limit, up to 70 mph. But anyone traveling more than 70 mph will face regular penalties.

Idaho's two congressmen, Republican Larry Craig and Democrat Richard Stallings, voted with the majority earlier to override the veto in the House.

Symms said Thursday afternoon in a telephone interview from Washington that he was emotionally drained because of the battle to override the veto. Symms was one of 14 Republicans who voted to override the veto. Sen. James McClure of Idaho twice voted to sustain the president.

McClure said he voted to sustain the veto because he felt the president was making a stand against excessive government spending.

With a \$2 trillion national debt, it's hard to cut spending, McClure said.

"I don't think you can get to that kind of restraint when you must test like this one," he said. "The president threw the ball to us. The Congress dropped it."

Symms thus fulfilled a pledge he made repeatedly in last fall's campaign against Democrat John Evans, that there would be action to raise the speed limit this year.

President's last-minute plea fails

WASHINGTON — The Senate rejected a personal last-minute plea from President Reagan and voted Thursday to override his veto and enact into law an \$88 billion highway and mass transit bill.

The 67-33 vote, exactly the two-thirds majority necessary, capped two days of political struggle over the bill that became a high-stakes test of wills between the Republican president and leaders of the Senate's Democratic majority.

Democrats reclaimed one vote they had lost in an initial test on Wednesday, but Republicans were unable to switch any of the 13 GOP senators who voted to override the president's veto the day before.

Besides authorizing highway and mass transit projects that the president had opposed as overblown, the bill permits states to boost the speed limit on rural stretches of interstate highways to 65 miles per hour from the current 55 mph.

But arguments over the substance of the legislation were overtaken by the political fight.

Afterwards, though, the winners and losers alike sought to minimize the impact on the president's influence.

"This isn't going to make or break the president of the United States," said Senate Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va. "There will be other votes."

Reagan issued a statement saying he was "deeply disappointed" by the outcome but vowing to continue the

Soviets crow over defector

MOSCOW — The Kremlin announced Thursday that an American soldier and his West German wife have defected to the Soviet Union and been granted asylum because they feared political persecution.

The U.S. Army in West Germany and the Pentagon in Washington could not verify the defection, which would be the first by an American serviceman to the Soviet Union since the Vietnam War.

The Pentagon, however, is investigating an enlisted man who had deserted in West Germany a month ago and has a name similar to that of an officer in the Soviet Union, it said. The officer may be the person named in the (Soviet) reports.

The reported defection came at a time when the U.S. Embassy in Moscow was trying to deal with a spy case in which two former Marine guards have been charged with espionage.

Foreign Ministry spokesman Gerasimov announced the defection at a "regular news briefing" and said the couple has "chosen the Turkmenian S.S.R. for their new home."

William F. Roberts of the U.S. Army, who he said had been stationed in West Germany, Gerasimov identified Roberts as a U.S. Neumann, a West German.

Both have been granted political asylum because "they were afraid of being victimized for their progressive views," Gerasimov said. He said Roberts "had been persecuted" while stationed in West Germany, but provided no details.

Gerasimov did not say when Roberts and his wife entered the Soviet Union, where they were given "provide" other details.

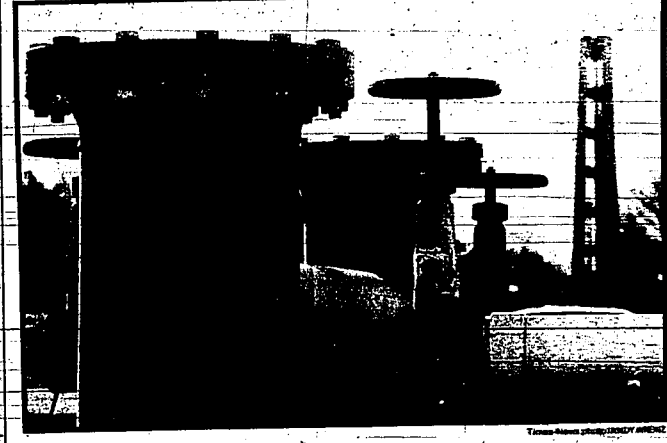
The Tass news agency said it would release a photograph Friday showing the couple in Turin, a Central Asian Soviet republic that borders Iran and Afghanistan.

Army Maj. Dennis Finkham, spokesman for the U.S. European Command in Stuttgart, West Germany, said military officials were attempting to verify the report.

In Washington, the Army announced Thursday afternoon that a soldier assigned to West Germany, Pvt. 2nd Class Wade Evans Roberts, had been declared a deserter. It noted that his name differed from that released by Moscow.

Roberts was assigned to Bravo Battery, 2nd Field Artillery, 25th Infantry Division.

Leaking hot water wells to be sealed

BOISE — Sometime this summer, workers will begin capping 3,520 square miles of land in southern Idaho, making for the equivalent of a leaky faucet.

The Legislature approved a \$300,000 ground water survey to find and plug leaking hot water wells. Legislators said it will have a major impact on ground water resources.

The problem, say officials, is that old, broken free-flowing wells are draining the aquifer. In some areas, the water table has dropped as much as 10 feet.

In the process, heavy investments in geothermal heating and a fledgling shrimp farm were threatened.

Another problem is that geothermal wells are leaking into cold water domestic wells, Noh said. In some cases, the geothermal wells may contain high levels of fluoride, although Noh added that such con-

Legislation was more of a nuisance than a health hazard.

"Our main focus with this legislation was economic," Noh said.

Through the years, farmers have often dug wells to tap the warm water for livestock. But more wells means less pressure.

And the problem is not just with cities and homes, but also with agriculture. The College of Southern Idaho filed suit against Burton Perrine Jr., and the Professional Investors Insurance Co. for abandoning a geothermal well to heat part of the campus, said the abandonment well constituted a public nuisance and a waste of geothermal water resources.

Casey aide left CIA to direct contra net

WASHINGTON — A special assistant to former CIA Director William Casey left the intelligence agency early last year to work secretly in Europe and help manage White House activities to aid the contra private network to aid the Contras, according to government sources.

The former CIA aide, identified as Ben E. Wickham Jr., is CIA station chief in Managua, Nicaragua, from 1982 to the autumn of 1984. He later served as a CIA headquarters official for a year before resigning to work for one of North's dummy companies abroad, said knowledgeable officials who refused to be named.

The CIA declined comment when asked in mid-March and again Thursday about Wickham's activities. Wickham was the past that it obeyed congressional restrictions on CIA-backed military aid to the contra-

Sources have called Wickham a potentially critical link in the CIA's arms-for-hostages program, which involves a multimillion-dollar secret military aid program for the Nicaraguan rebels.

One knowledgeable official said that Wickham resigned his CIA post at the suggestion of Casey, who is said by some to have orchestrated North's secret contra-supply activities since Congress cut off funding for the rebels in October 1984.

"Find Ben and you'll find all the keys to Ollie's operation," the official said. "One reason he left the CIA was to be Casey's eyes and ears on what North was doing in Europe." Wickham wants to return to private work with a Democratic operation.

Surrogate mom to fight for her 'Sara'

RED BANK, N.J. — Surrogate mother Beth Whitehead, stripped of the right to see her daughter again, vowed Thursday to continue her legal battle for the little girl known as Baby M.

"Until Sara comes home, my fight will continue," Mrs. Whitehead said haltingly, with tears in her eyes. "We will not accept the decision of one judge as the final determination of a whole society that we should be permanently separated."

"We love each other very much," she said in her first public statement since Tuesday, when Judge Harvey R. Sorkow issued the nation's first ruling upholding a disputed surrogate parenting contract.

"I believe that there is something so wrong and so harmfully unnatural about the surrogate practice that our New Jersey appellate courts will return Sara to me," she said, adding that she will keep the child's crib set up.

Mrs. Whitehead named the year-old child "Sara," but since Tuesday's historic ruling, the baby has his 121-page decision allowed Stern's wife, Elizabeth, to adopt the child.

eyes of the law. The biological father, William Stern, was easily overruled by the court after reading Mrs. Whitehead's case.

The case, which brought the surrogate termination of Mrs. Whitehead's parenting was sparked by Mrs. Whitehead's refusal to honor the \$10,000 contract under which she was artificially inseminated with Stern's sperm.

The 29-year-old housewife refused to give the baby to the Sterns and, with police officers at her Beck Township home, handed the baby out a window to her husband. After hiding 8 days in Florida, she was found by law officers and the baby went to the Sterns' temporary custody. The three-month trial ensued.

"There will never be a termination of the love I have for Sara," Mrs. Whitehead said. "Her husband Richard at her side. 'Her will there even if he terminates by the next State law for her real mother."

Mrs. Whitehead's attorney, Harold Cassidy, said the appeal, probably to the New Jersey Supreme Court, will be filed by Tuesday.

But two law professors have joined Mrs. Whitehead's case.

Cassidy said he first must block Sorkow's ruling and halt the adop-

tion, the change-of-name and the surrogate termination of Mrs. Whitehead's parental and visitation rights to the baby. A hearing was set for Friday.

Cassidy said the appeal will contest the surrogate motherhood is "indecent and the worst form of exploitation of one human being for the gratification of another."

"He misunderstood so much about the facts Sara and I have for each other," Mrs. Whitehead said. "Mrs. Whitehead said she wants no part of the \$10,000 surrogate payment, but has not ruled out book or movie offers."

Floodwater laps at rooftops in Maine

Water lapped at rooftops as canoes floated across flooded streets Thursday in Maine, where a 23-year-old British-born was swept away by a large, fast-moving flood.

Rivers swollen by rain and melting snow were still rising Thursday in northern Maine, while floodwaters receded in the southern and eastern parts of the state after ripping out bridges and sweeping houses downstream. With the rain over, conditions should improve statewide in the next several days, weather forecasters said.

At least one person was missing and believed drowned in Nashua, N.H., where witnesses said a person

(fell into the Nashua River. While New England strained under water, there was record high temperatures in the Northwest and record lows in the Southeast. Snow continued to plague the Midwest.

In Maine, damage appeared to be worst along the Kennebec River, where the flood was recorded as a "50-year event" by National Weather Service hydrologist Jerry French — an event that could take place an average of only once in 500 years. Gov. John D. McKernan declared a state of emergency Wednesday.

The cold in the South pushed the thermometer in Key West, Fla., to a record low — 43 degrees. But peach farmers said that although some were hurt badly, damage was less than feared.

"We'll end up with an average of 30 inches of rain," said Robert Dickey, head of the Georgia Peach Council. "We're going to have good quality and very large peaches" because the cold left few blossoms on trees.

It will be at least a week before statewide losses to Georgia's \$20 million crop can be computed, Dickey said.

To the South, Georgia's Dickey said his own 800-acre farm was among the worst hit. He estimated the damage at about \$20,000.

Florida Agriculture Commissioner Doyle Conner said Thursday that freeze damage around the state was isolated. A few peach growers had crop damage but the cold inflicted little harm on the state's citrus crop, he said.

The record-breaking low prompted Key West residents to break out Robert Dickey's hat and wear slippers from the Northwest to ward off the weather. Many wore slippers, shorts and even bikinis.

Michigan's snowfall led a near-billion, while up to 18 inches of snow fell in the Upper Peninsula. The National Weather Service warned Thursday that a wet, thundershower, erosion and flooding from Gary, Ind., to Mackinac City, Mich.,

Massachusetts, in the Pacific Northwest, office air conditioners were strained Thursday by a record warmth that attracted more than 8,000 people to a Seattle zoo on April Fools' Day. The thermometer hit 82 on Monday for the hottest April 1 on record. Another record was expected to fall Thursday.

Packing house blast leaves worker hurt

Rescuers bring 54 trapped miners to surface Idaho

MURDOCHVILLE, Quebec (AP) — The last of 54 men trapped by fire and smoke in a copper mine under this one-industry town emerged to safety Thursday night, officials said.

One miner had to be taken to a shelter in a lunchroom 2,600 feet down.

The survivors were found Thursday in three groups, the last few being brought to the surface early in the evening. There were no reports of serious injuries.

Some of those rescued said they thought the "fire" in the shaft during a shift change Wednesday evening was an April Fools' Day prank, but then smoke from nearly 2,000 yards of burning conveyor belt began rolling

through a 74-mile stela of tunnels in the Gaspé Mine.

Ange-Marie Kenney, a 36-year-old drillier with two children, was felled by smoke that filled the track he was driving down a shaft ramp.

Kenney, who had survived previous accidents, died before he could reach one of the underground lunchrooms that double as emergency shelters and have water, ventilation and radio telephones.

His brother, Jean-Paul, was with him, but had the luck to be near a hose pumping compressed air into the shaft. He was taken to a hospital suffering from smoke inhalation.

"It's great news," a spokesman for the mine company Noranda Inc. said when rescuers made contact with the last 13 missing men via radio telephones.

They were safely sealed inside lunchrooms at different levels of the smoke-filled mine.

"One of the men was able to call his wife, which made things a bit more reassuring," said a spokeswoman, Dominique Archambault.

The rescue operation continued throughout the day. Twenty-nine of the 249-foot level, said Ms. Archambault.

Officials said there was no indication of what caused the fire, which began near 11:00 a.m. on Wednesday during a shift change. A resident of Murdochville reported hearing an explosion, but officials on Monday said a short circuit was more likely.

Symms said it was hard to say no, but he was determined to vote against the bill. "The temptation is to give in, to vote once more for the old compromise," Symms said.

"I have no apologies for voting for the bill. It was a mistake, but I think that somehow the fate of the presidency hangs on a veto."

"In my view, he came out of the house in a bad position, and he fought for it," said Symms. "Ronald Reagan will go down in history as one of the greatest presidents since George Washington."

"It was emotionally draining to have all your friends beating up on you," he said. Symms said he and the other 12 members of the Senate Republican caucus agreed that it would be a single senator who switched. It would have been all 13 or none of the Republicans, he said.

"I would have switched if they all had, but it would not have been on the basis of right and wrong," he said. Green said work will begin very soon on the largest of the projects authorized for Idaho as soon as the Senate overrides the veto.

One is a \$7 million project to improve U.S. 95 just south of Coeur d'Alene. The second is a \$4 million improvement of Idaho 33 between Rexburg and Sun Valley.

The congressional action also gives the green light to the long-delayed \$5 million first segment of the Broadway-Childen Connector project in Boise. Overall, the highway bill contains authorization for \$20 million as the state's share of that project.

Green said some work will be done on the Childen interchange, but the bulk of the work is to be put under contract next year, now that funding is assured.

The federal action also clears the way for a contract for approaches to the 9th Street Bridge. A new bridge is being constructed under a separate contract that's expected to cost about \$400,000.

Including carryover authorizations, Green said Idaho could expect to get \$75 million between now and Oct. 1, and then about \$85 million per year for the five-year life of the new highway law.

Andrus also signed into law Wednesday legislation raising the state's legal drinking age from 19 to 21 as of April 11 at 12:01 a.m. That staves off the threatened withholding of 5 percent of this year's federal highway funds, which Andrus said was \$1.1 million.

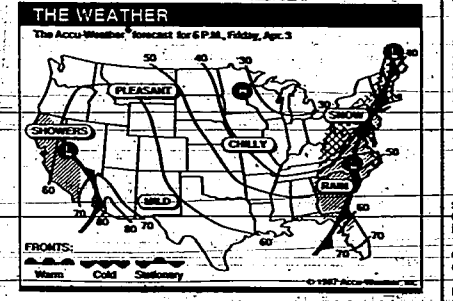
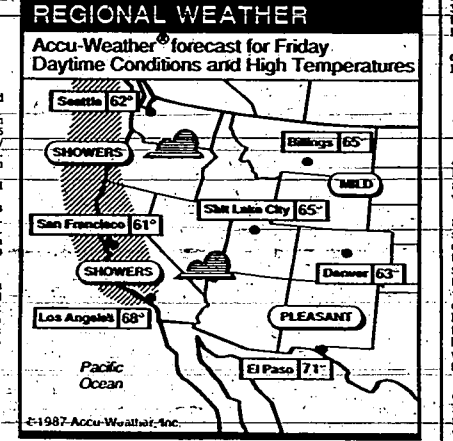

Although other U.S. citizens have received asylum in the Soviet Union in recent years, defection of an American soldier would be the first by a member of America's armed forces since the Vietnam War.

A 47-year-old American cancer specialist, Arnold Lockshin, was granted political asylum in the Soviet Union last year after charging that he was persecuted after he was discharged from his job because of his fight against Washington's defense policy.

Lockshin, of Houston, Texas, arrived in Moscow on Oct. 8 with his wife, Lauren, and their three children.

Edward Lee Howard, a former CIA agent, defected to the Soviet Union in August of last year.

Howard disappeared from his San Francisco home in September 1985. The FBI was about to arrest him on suspicion of spying. He reappeared in public on a Soviet television broadcast in September.

Authorities said they also plan to charge Rhoades with murder-and-robbery in the March 17 death of convenience store clerk Nolan Haddon in Idaho Falls. Rhoades also is a suspect in the March 3 kidnaping and rape of a Ricks College coed in Rexburg.

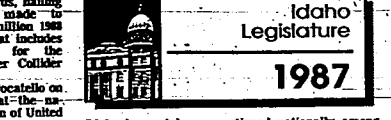
Governor signs provision for commerce agency funds

POCATELLO (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus, halting the commitment state lawmakers made to create a state grant program for the Commerce Department appropriation that includes money to underwrite Idaho's bid for the multibillion-dollar Superconducting Super Collider project.

Andrus said the fivefold increase in state spending for economic revitalization through the Commerce Department was a "recognition that our economy would continue to stumble unless we went out and created some action."

The bill, which had nearly unanimous legislative backing, earmarks another \$300,000 for the state campaign to secure the huge atom smasher at the National Engineering Laboratory along with the money to finance the ambitious campaign of Commerce Director James Hawkins to breath new life into Idaho's stagnant economy.

The legislative action was the real key to provide us with the tool," said Andrus, who also announced that he would travel to Washington, D.C., next Wednesday to testify before the House subcommittee that is holding hearings into the SSC project.



Idaho has not been mentioned nationally among the primary contenders for the federal project and the thousands of jobs it will create. But Andrus said the state was still in the hunt because it has the available land, the right geology, the proper facilities at INEL, the ability to handle the population influx and the commitment of the Legislature this winter to quality in higher education.

"We are in for a battle to land that project," the governor concluded. "But I think we have a number of things going for us. All in all, it is a very attractive package, but we'll have to sell it."

The expanded budget for Commerce Department operations beginning in July comes on top of the infusion of \$50 million into the current budget by lawmakers this winter. Hawkins has been using \$100,000 of that for initial work on the SSC proposal and the rest to flesh out what had been just a skeleton staff in preparation for launching the economic development drive.

Death of worker in truck plunge not safety-related, foreman says

BOISE (AP) — The death of a construction worker whose truck plunged into a 36-foot pit at the Lucky Peak Dam project cannot be blamed on unsafe work conditions or practices, a project supervisor said.

Brad Tracy, a foreman for the project's main contractor, Weyerhaeuser, said the death Tuesday night of David Barnett, 36, Nampa, stemming from driver error, unlike another fatal mishap at the site near Boise earlier this year.

On Jan. 25, Tracy's brother-in-law, Robert Keith Campbell, 34, was killed when a crane boom fell onto him. "Bobby's death is something else entirely," Tracy said.

Barnett died instantly from chest injuries when the cement truck he was backing up fell into a pit where the power plant is being installed.

Work continued at the site Wednesday, said Vern Nelson, spokesman for Morrison-Knudsen Engineers, a subsidiary of Boise-based Morrison Knudsen Corp., M-K Engineers is the project manager.

Morrison Knudsen, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration and Ada County are investigating the incident.

It was the fourth major accident since the project began in 1984.

In September, a 10-ton crane was destroyed when its brakes failed and it careened down a hill into a powerhouse. No injuries were reported.

On Jan. 13, a crane tipped over and pinned its operator, Tom Corey, 57, Boise. He was treated at St. Luke's Regional Medical Center and released.

After his brother-in-law was killed in the January crane accident, Tracy quit his job as shift supervisor because of what he called "unsafe conditions."

However, he returned three weeks later when safety was improved, including installation of new crane cables.

UP&L refund plan OK

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Utah Power & Light Co.'s offer to reimburse its customers in Idaho and Wyoming \$8.6 million over the next seven years was won the approval of those states' public service commissions, officials said.

The refund stems from a settlement between UP&L and Utah's Division of Public Utilities that was accepted by Utah's Public Service Commission last week.

The division had originally sought \$103 million in refunds from alleged overcharges resulting from waste and mismanagement at UP&L's central Utah coal operations.

UP&L has also agreed to reduce

Utah rates by \$60 million over the next seven years.

Regulators favored the settlement because it would avoid a lengthy hearing and appeals process to order a refund.

To both Wyoming and Idaho customers — the UP&L refund — will mean an average 37 rate reduction per customer each year.

UP&L has about 53,000 customers in southeast Idaho and southwest Wyoming.

Remaining to be approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission is a \$8.6 million UP&L refund to municipalities that purchased UP&L power.

Idaho Falls power plant on schedule

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The Gem State Hydroelectric Project will reach a milestone this summer when contractors build a temporary coffer dam to divert the Snake River while they work on a permanent earth-filled dam.

After nearly two years in construction, the \$60 million hydroelectric project south of Idaho Falls is on schedule with only \$2 million worth of contracts left to award. It is scheduled for completion in September 1988.

The Idaho Falls City Council met with consultants Wednesday to review progress to date.

Midnight with the Idaho Fish and Game Department and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service requires the city to stock the reservoir with 5,000 pounds of fish annually as well as create new riparian habitats and water fowl nesting areas.

Work already completed includes construction of dikes on either side of the dam, spillway and powerhouse excavation and excavation of a 3,000-foot tailrace to carry water from the turbine back into the river.

Americans' deaths sobering reminder

The deaths of two U.S. citizens in El Salvador's civil war is a sad reminder that the conflict is still unresolved more than seven years after it began. Worse, the conditions under which one of the U.S. aviators died suggest that the war could go on much longer than many analysts had thought.

One of the dead is an unidentified employee of the Central Intelligence Agency, killed when a helicopter crashed on a reconnaissance flight. The other was Army Staff Sgt. Gregory Fronius, 27, one of 78 people who died in a surprisingly ferocious attack by leftist guerrillas on a major military base in the northern province of Chalatenango. The region is one of three that Salvadoran government forces have been trying to wrest from guerrilla control for several years.

Before Tuesday's attack, military officials in the Salvadoran government and at the U.S. Embassy in San Salvador had been suggesting that the guerrillas were facing an imminent demise because of the increasingly aggressive pursuit by an army that is larger, better trained and better equipped than it has ever been.

Yet since the start of this year, as if to respond to those confident claims, the rebels have begun inflicting serious damage on government forces with troubling regularity. Although the attack that killed Fronius is certain to get the most attention in the United States, it was only the most recent setback for the Salvadoran army.

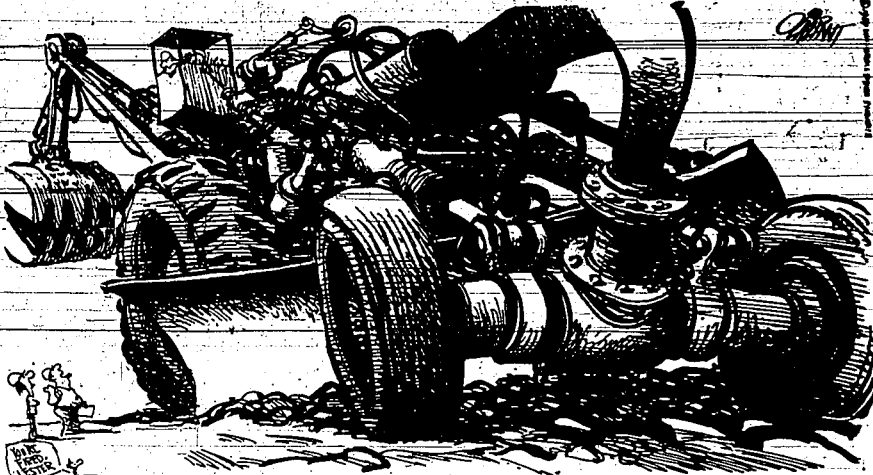
Since Jan. 1 the guerrillas have launched four attacks in which they massed enough troops to strike at major military installations. They have also continued a strategy of methodically sabotaging the nation's electrical and transportation systems, and have expanded into areas where they had rarely operated before — such as El Salvador's western provinces.

So while they are not nearly as powerful as they were two years ago, the Salvadoran rebels are far from defeated. That sobering reality suggests that El Salvador's President Jose Napoleon Duarte should once again try to renew the long-stalled peace talks between his government and the guerrillas' political representatives. Unless he does, the war will claim many more lives — not just of North Americans but of many, many more Salvadorans.

In spite of decision, prejudice remains

BOSTON — By now I am not surprised at any reaction to a firmative action.

The issue has been hanging around so long that attitudes have hardened into reflexes. Indeed, last week when the Supreme Court made a definitive — at last, at least — decision upholding a voluntary plan in Santa Clara County, Calif., that takes gender into account in hiring and promoting, the comments sounded as if they were all pre-scripted.

The winner, Diane Joyce, cried out: "A giant victory for womanhood." The loser, Paul Johnson, growled: "Putting it mildly, I think it stinks."

From the left, Judith Lichtman of the Women's Legal Defense Fund volleyed: "Estate!"

From the right, Clarence Thomas of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission thundered: "Social engineering."

So it wasn't the predictable public noises that struck me this past week. It was rather the undertone. I heard the low and lingering rumble of a thing you believe that firmative action is a pole vault by inferior candidates to jump over their superiors.

In the wake of this decision, almost all of those opposed to firmative action are even those who support it. Talk as if the Court had simply chosen gender over merit. As if they were allowing employers to favor national women or minorities over qualified men and whites.

These are the same perverse or reverse rumblings heard in a thousand offices when someone "new" gets a post from which "their kind" was excluded. At least one disgruntled co-worker is sure to suggest that the firmative action is a pole vault, she wouldn't have her promotion today.

With this widespread sort of sentiment, it is

possible to win the advantages of affirmative action in the courts and lose them in the public consciousness.

But if this case can clear up the fuzzy legal status of plans such as the Santa Clara County one, it can also be used to clarify the whole peculiar matter of "qualifications."

Consider the protagonists, Diane Joyce and Paul Johnson. When the job of road dispatcher came open in 1979, Diane, a 42-year-old widow and Paul, a 34-year-old, were among 12 applicants. Nine of the 12 were considered "qualified."

They went before a board and "qualified" Paul tied for second with a 75 and Diane came in right behind with a 73. This is how Paul got the public title of "more qualified."

These objective, even scientific-sounding numbers were assigned by a subjective oral interviewing process. In the real world, there is little pure and perfect ranking of qualifications.

Paul and Diane were then given a second interview by three agency supervisors. Who were these arbiters of merit? The same men who had been selecting and promoting the candidates for skilled work at this agency throughout its recent history. Not a one of their 238 skilled workers was female.

Diane, who was also the first woman to be a road maintenance worker, had reportedly had some run-ins with two of the three men. Indeed

one is said to have called her "a rabble-rousing skirt-wearing person," whatever that might mean.

As you might have predicted from this history, the board unanimously chose Paul. So it is not shocking that the county, instead, gave Diane the job. Their affirmative-action plan was made for the Diane Joyce, excellent candidate for jobs in a carefully kept male preserve.

The scales of tradition were balanced against her; the affirmative-action plan did just what it was intended to do, add weight to her side, to open the door for women.

As the Brezman opinion makes clear, the plan didn't discharge a white male, it didn't set up quotas; and most of all it didn't give preference to women whose only credentials are their chromosomes. It said, in essence, that a subjective two-point difference between Diane and Paul wasn't as important as a 238-job difference between men and women.

I think this distinction is important, because there is something foolish about the "qualification" issue. For most of history, the men in power determined that women were fit to do a job. It was their job. Eventually we labeled that attitude discrimination. But when we implement plans to open up the work world, many carry along the closed mind.

Women, such as Diane Joyce, who were once barred on account of their sex, are now held they were only chosen on account of their sex. Permit me a groan.

After this decision, Charles Murray, a conservative political scientist, commented that "affirmative action is just looking a poison into the system." But the poison was already there. It's wearing the same old label: prejudice.

Computer security proposal would protect civil liberties

One of the nation's top intelligence agencies, the code-making and -breaking National Security Agency, is to request that Congress restore and protect Americans' freedoms.

The bill, HR145, would give a non-defense agency, the National Bureau of Standards, the job of making the security of civilian computers and telecommunications systems. The NSA now has that authority under a national security directive approved by President Reagan in September 1986.

Concerned about this extension of military supervision to civilian information, Jack Brooks, D-Texas, Dan Glickman, D-Kan., and others introduced HR145 to protect information in a way more consonant with American values. By assigning the security of national security data to a civilian agency, the bill removes a major temptation for the military to abuse individual rights.

The NSA opposes the bill and maintains it should remain under overall control. Its director, Lt. Gen. William E. Odom, testified last month before Brooks' subcommittee on legislation and national security that the bill "would create a wasteful, redundant bureaucracy" that would not be "practical or cost effective."

Odom has forgotten that, in the American form of government, some things are more important than efficiency. Civil liberties, for example. To concentrate too much power in

one agency would jeopardize individual freedom. This is why the Constitution has those noncost-effective checks and balances.

And while the NSA performs its intelligence duties with excellence, its domestic track record does not inspire confidence. In the 1960s and '70s, it listened to Americans' telephone conversations and read their cabigrams until the practices were uncovered in an investigation led by late Sen. Frank Church of Idaho.

Beyond the issue of civil liberties lie practical matters that further argue against the directive.

First, the NSA's intelligence interests conflict with the public interest. The code-breaking side of the NSA wants the world to use ciphers that it can break; researchers, high-tech manufacturers and others need ciphers that are secure. Which way will the NSA decide in case of a clash? In its new all-eavesdropping program, the NSA will supply the ciphers people will use. But in a cryptographic wonder whether the NSA has built into the ciphers a secret "trap door" that it can use to sneak into the coded messages.

Then, the NSA's computer security abilities may not be as great as Odom sought to paint them. Computer consultant Robert Courtney noted that the advice of the NSA's Computer Security Center "is not even accepted by the major data-processing operations within the NSA."

In addition, the NSA's track record in helping the public is poor. Among the most useful ciphers are so-called public-key systems, devised by university cryptologists in the mid-1970s. They permit, among other valuable applications, electronic signatures that can't be forged and non-secretly tamper-proof arms verification reports. The NSA had invented this technique earlier but never revealed it, depriving the public of its many benefits. And this is the agency that wants to run the nation's sensitive cryptography!

Many of the witnesses assailed a clause of the directive requiring protection for "sensitive but unclassified government or government-derived information, the loss of which could adversely affect the national security interest."

member of Congress from criticizing a government official, since such criticism could disclose a weakness to an enemy and so harm the nation. Thus the Association of American Lawyers is asking that this government's definition of sensitive information... is so broad as to allow it to be applied arbitrarily to restrict access to any information in a government or private data base.

Unfortunately, HR145 has a similar provision. In its garbled language, it would require securing "any information the loss of which would be a serious and identifiable national interest or the conduct of federal programs."

From that point of view, HR145 leaves civil liberties as much as does the Reagan directive. The provision should be eliminated before the bill becomes law. But the bill is far better than the directive, and it deserves the support of all Americans who cherish their liberties.

Laxalt says he's a candidate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former Sen. Paul Laxalt, saying "as far as my head is concerned and I'm concerned, I'm a candidate," is telling supporters he will form a presidential exploratory committee this month and move ahead with a bid to succeed his close friend Ronald Reagan.

Laxalt said the only question to be answered is "whether the money is there."

If the former Nevada senator goes ahead with his plan to enter the race for the 1988 Republican presidential nomination he would get the support of many old-line Reagan loyalists.

Laxalt was chairman of Reagan's presidential campaigns in 1976, 1980 and 1984.

Tax return backlog smaller

WASHINGTON (AP) — The backlog of unprocessed federal tax returns is 18 percent lower than at this time a year ago, indicating a shorter wait for refunds, the Internal Revenue Service said Thursday.

Through last Friday, 22.8 million couples and individuals had filed returns, down from the 84 million received during the same period last year. But the IRS has processed 42 million returns this year, up 3 percent.

That leaves a stack of 10.8 million unprocessed returns, down from 13.2 million at the end of March 1986. During the comparable period of last year, computer problems slowed processing. In all, the backlog was more than 24 million returns.

Most people who have filed this year have been getting refunds in about five weeks. Those who wait until closer to the April 15 filing deadline may have to wait six weeks or longer, the IRS says.

Treasury official resigns

WASHINGTON (AP) — Deputy Treasury Secretary Richard G. Darman, an administration official who attacked big business as bloated and inefficient, is resigning to join Shearson Lehman Brothers, one of the country's largest investment firms, the White House announced Thursday.

Darman, 43, will leave government service in two weeks to become a managing director of Shearson Lehman Brothers.

A longtime aide to Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III, Darman took over the No. 2 Treasury job in January 1985 when Baker switched jobs with Donald T. Regan, who became White House staff chief.

Before that, Darman had served as deputy White House chief of staff when Baker was chief of staff during President Reagan's first term.

Ban on arms sales has leaks

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department said Thursday that a 10-year-old international ban on arms sales to South Africa has not stopped that country from importing weapons from "a wide variety of sources worldwide."

The report, required to be submitted to Congress under last year's anti-apartheid law, named seven countries as homes to weapons makers who have violated the ban, some with likely knowledge of their governments' and often under a cloak of secrecy.

The list includes France, Italy, Israel, Germany, the United Kingdom, the Netherlands and Switzerland.

Sales of weapons to South Africa were prohibited in 1977 by the United Nations in an international attempt to isolate the South African regime and weaken its apartheid policies. The ban was enacted a year after riots in the black township of Soweto, which produced a global outcry.

CIA official set to retire

WASHINGTON (AP) — A CIA official whose analysis provided justification for selling weapons to Iran plans to retire at the end of the year, the agency said Thursday.

Graham Fuller's decision to leave the agency was made long before the Iran-Contra controversy erupted last November, and had nothing to do with the case, CIA spokesman George Lauder said.

"It's a human decision made for other reasons," Lauder said. "He will be retiring when he turns 50 at the end of the year."

Fuller, who is vice chairman of the national intelligence council, would not accept calls from reporters, the CIA said.

Lauder said Fuller wanted to pursue writing and research projects, perhaps at a Washington-area research institution, after retirement.

FAA switches drug test labs

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Aviation Administration said Thursday it will no longer use its own drug-testing laboratory in connection with aviation accidents, pending a review of the laboratory's operation.

The accuracy of drug testing at the FAA's Civil Aeromedical Institute in Oklahoma City came into question after disclosure this week about possible flaws in the way tests were handled in connection with an Amtrak railroad accident near Baltimore on Jan. 4 that killed 10 people.

"We have put a hold on further toxicological tests (at the laboratory) with regard to aviation accidents... until all this can be sorted out," FAA spokesman Stephen Hayes said.

Hayes said the agency also has asked the Armed Forces Institute of Pathology to make "a thorough assessment" of the toxicological testing back at the Oklahoma City laboratory.

Audio recorder testimony discordant

WASHINGTON (AP) — With loudspeakers blaring a Barbra Streisand song and a pianist's four-note scale, a congressional panel heard discordant testimony Thursday about whether a digital audio tape (DAT) recorder is a threat to the U.S. recording industry.

Jason S. Berman of the Recording Industry Association of America said the "digital audio tape" (DAT) for short, is "threatening to escalate home taping and worsen commercial piracy of copyrighted U.S. recordings."

But Charles Ferris, a former chairman of the Federal Communications Commission who represented a coalition of recording equipment manufacturers and consumers, disputed Berman's claim that DAT recorders will hurt sales

revenues of record companies and music publishers and discourage songwriters from producing new music.

"The DAT doesn't pollute and it doesn't exist," Ferris said, arguing against any legislation that would impede introduction of DAT recorders on the U.S. market this summer or fall.

The joint hearing was held by two House and Senate Judiciary subcommittees to examine DAT technology in light of legislative proposals to equip recorders with electronic coding devices aimed at discouraging home taping and protecting copyright holders.

Berman said DAT is the tape version of compact disc or CD technology. Ferris said DAT uses

the basic method of a VCR video recorder and the electronics of a CD player to play digital tapes that have the same high-quality sound of a compact disc.

Berman said the DAT can make "perfect clones" of a recording, on cassettes half the size of current magnetic cassettes and holding up to two hours of music.

Berman endorsed legislation sponsored by Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., and Sen. Albert Gore Jr., that would require manufacturers to equip DAT recorders with coded scanners to prevent taping of copyrighted audio recordings. The scanners are designed to detect "notches" of deleted sound on a protected recording and to interrupt taping for 25-second intervals.

Star Wars faces deep fund cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) — In the year's first major decision on "Star Wars" spending, a 74-vote subcommittee Thursday approved deep cuts in President Reagan's budget request for his anti-missile research program, sources said.

The decisions were taken by the research and development subcommittee of the House Armed Services Committee during a series of votes as it worked on a budget blueprint for the fiscal year starting Oct. 1, said the sources, speaking on condition of anonymity.

The votes came as the Democratic-controlled panel's subcommittee worked behind closed doors to write budgets for their various areas. Those decisions will be going to the full committee next week and the entire bill will be sent to the full House later this year.

The Democratic-led Senate will also go through the same process and the differing bills passed by the two chambers will eventually have to be reconciled in a House-Senate conference committee.

Overall, Reagan wanted \$312 billion for the Pentagon next year, which would be a 3 percent hike beyond inflation. Both Republicans and Democrats agree he is unlikely to win that amount, but the committee is writing its version of the defense budget based on the \$312 billion request.

In another decision, the subcommittee voted Thursday to give the Air Force more than \$300 million the service wants to fix the new B-1B bombers, but rejected a proposal to make the Air Force find that money by cutting other programs.

Reagan had sought \$5.8 billion for the next fiscal year for the Strategic Defense Initiative, as Star Wars is formally known. That would have included \$5.2 billion in Pentagon spending and another \$600 million in the budget of the Energy Department, which oversees some SDI research.

The current SDI budget is a total of \$3.6 billion for Reagan's four-year-old program of research into a high-tech shield against Soviet nuclear attack. That was a reduction by Congress from the original request of \$5.3 billion.

Durrani convicted

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP) — A jury Thursday rejected a claim by a Pakistani national that he was part of the Reagan administration's effort to trade arms for hostages and found him guilty of illegally exporting missile parts to Iran.

After deliberating for 80 minutes, a federal jury found Ali-A. Durrani, 37, of Westlake Village, Calif., guilty of two counts of exporting weapons without a license and one count of exporting without a registration.

Durrani faces a possible year in prison and a \$1 million fine on each count.

Wonder drummer Rich dies at 69

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Buddy Rich, the legendary jazz drummer who began his career more than a half-century ago as a vaudeville song-and-dance prodigy, known as "Big Boy" Traps the Drum Wonder, died Thursday. He was 69.

Rich, a self-taught drummer who played with Artie Shaw before starting his own band 21 years ago, had undergone surgery March 16 at the UCLA Medical Center for a brain tumor and had been undergoing daily chemotherapy treatment at the hospital.

"He had just come back from having treatment... had a seizure, and they took him right back," said family spokesman Jackie Green.

New ambassador to Moscow arrives at troubled embassy

MOSCOW (AP) — The new U.S. ambassador look over an embassy Thursday that is beset by a sex-riy scandal, crippled by the loss of Soviet household staff and may be full of bugs that enable the KGB to hear everything said inside.

Ambassador Jack F. Matlock's biggest immediate task is to make sure he has a secure link to Washington. U.S. officials said this week they suspect the spy case, in which U.S. marine guards are charged, has compromised embassy communications.

In a meeting with reporters at Moscow's Sheremetyevo Airport, Matlock said his target date for solving the security problem is the visit April 12-14 of Secretary of State George P. Shultz.

"We assume we will have secure communications when he's here," the 57-year-old ambassador said.

The Shultz visit comes at an important stage of negotiations between the United States and Soviet Union on a potential agreement to scrap medium-range missiles now deployed in Europe.

Matlock, one of the leading U.S. experts on the Soviet Union, said he did not want to discuss the espionage scandal.

"I'm not going to comment on any condition of the embassy before I see it," he said.

Asked whether the problems made new job more difficult, Matlock replied: "It is harder or softer."

"All sensitive communications now

are being hand-carried to the American consulate in Frankfurt, West Germany," he relayed to Washington, according to State Department officials.

Two former Marine guards at the embassy, Sgt. Clayton Lonetree and Cpl. Arnold Bracy, are charged with allowing KGB agents into secure areas of the embassy. The Soviet secret policemen were said to have seen codes used in transmission of secret communications.

The Marine Corps alleges that Lonetree and Bracy were lured into spying by Soviet women who worked

at the embassy. Another former guard, Staff Sgt. Robert Stanley Stebbins, also is suspected of sexual contacts with Soviet women.

The 28 Marine guards now at the embassy are to be replaced, with the next month as a "precautionary" measure.

Security is not the only problem at the nine-story eastward-facing building on Moscow's Garden Ring Road.

Foreign Service officers must do chores that had been handled by more than 200 Soviet cleaners in a dispute with the United States over embassy staffing.

Diplomats now take care of everything from making their own coffee to carrying out the garbage.

Matlock said there are "new perspectives and new prospects for improving U.S.-Soviet relations in '87," but he is playing a part in putting the relationship on a more durable basis.

He replaces Arthur A. Hartman, who spent five years in the job. It was the longest service for a U.S. ambassador to Moscow since World War II.

Matlock has been instrumental in U.S. policy toward the Soviets, speaks Russian fluently and is considered an expert on Soviet culture and history.

Before taking the Moscow job he was a special assistant to President Reagan for national security and senior staff director of European and Soviet affairs for the National Security Council.

Musician Paxton says relationship with Bakker's wife wasn't sexual

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Music industry veteran Gary S. Paxton developed a close relationship with the wife of TV evangelist Jim Bakker while producing her gospel music records, but he said Thursday they did not have a sexual relationship.

Bakker was once worried about the relationship between his wife, Tammy Faye, and Paxton, according to Thursday's editions of The Washington Post.

"A lot of things have been said," said Paxton in a telephone interview with The Associated Press. "I've outlined this for a long time. There wasn't anything bad in the first place."

"If they say it's sexual, I'll sue for slander," Paxton said. "My pastor said not to talk right now."

The Post reported that Paxton and Mrs. Bakker spent hours alone together in recording studios in the late 1970s and that Bakker's suspicions about their relationship may have pushed him into a one-night stand with a 21-year-old church secretary.

Bakker resigned March 19 as head of the PTL ministry in Fort Mill, S.C., after admitting to the trust wilderness habit.

Paxton, who produced such hits as "Monster Mash" and wrote the country hit "Woman, Sensuous Woman," was very helpful with Mrs. Bakker's career, according to her private secretary, Linda Wilson.

The Post quoted Paxton as saying he and Mrs. Bakker were "just friends, never more than that," although he thought the relationship was becoming too close.

"You're with somebody a friend and become 'em close — and sometimes, then realize you're too close and quit," he was quoted as saying.

The newspaper quoted Paxton's former wife, Karen, as saying Mrs. Bakker was in love with Paxton, or at least thought she was.

Paxton has said that he had everything because of drugs and alcohol, and that he tried to commit suicide several times. He said in a 1976 Associated Press interview that he moved to Nashville, had a religious conversion and resumed his career.

In 1976, he recorded a gospel album, "The Amazing, Outrageous, Amazing, Incredible, Believable, Different World of Gary S. Paxton."

Court orders competency hearing for Bundy

ATLANTA (AP) — A federal appeals court Thursday ordered a competency hearing for a man convicted of slaying a woman, whether he was competent to stand trial for the abduction and murder of a 15-year-old schoolgirl.

The decision is the second in this year ordering further hearings on death sentences Bundy faces in two murder convictions and prevents Florida from executing him until decisions are reached.

The 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals said a federal district court judge should not have relied on a state-court finding that Bundy was competent. The judge also gave too much consideration to the fact that

Bundy's attorney failed to raise the issue at trial, the appeals court said.

Bundy's attorneys had asked the 11th Circuit to throw out his death sentence in the 1978 slaying of Kimberly Diane Leach, arguing that a lower court did not properly consider his appeal.

The three-judge appeals court panel refused to lift the death penalty but sent the case back to a lower court because a determination that Bundy was competent to stand trial "can be made only after a full and fair evidentiary hearing."

In January, the same three-judge panel ordered a district court to hold a full hearing in Bundy's appeal of a death sentence he received for kill-

ing two Florida State University students in Tallahassee.

The panel said Thursday the competency questions arising from that case should be consolidated with the Leach case and ordered the hearing to be held "expeditiously."

Coleman said he hopes he will have time to build his case without the pressure of blocking death warrants.

LaRouche groups dodging fines?

BOSTON (AP) — Corporations tied to political extremist Lyndon LaRouche may be trying to avoid paying \$21.4 million in contempt fines by selling off property and converting it into "readily concealable cash," federal prosecutors charge.

The estimated \$7 million in properties listed by federal prosecutors in court papers in the contempt case include Dykes Farm, LaRouche's fortress-like mansion in Leesburg, Va.

But Matthew H. Feiberg, an attorney for the LaRouche organizations, Thursday rejected the government's contention, saying none of the properties is owned by the four groups that have been ordered to pay contempt fines.

U.S. District Judge A. David Mazzone assessed the fines against the groups two years ago for refusing to comply with subpoenas of a grand jury investigating an alleged credit-card scam to fund LaRouche's 1984 presidential campaign.

The prosecution's charge that the properties were being sold was detailed in a legal memo filed a week ago, urging Mazzone not to stay his February order allowing the government to begin seizing assets from the LaRouche organizations for not paying the fines.

Mazzone rejected the stay request Tuesday without comment. Attorneys for the LaRouche groups have filed a notice of appeal to the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

Two of the organizations, Caucus Distributors Inc. and Campaigner Publications Inc., are among the LaRouche organizations and 13 associates that were indicted on conspiracy charges in the alleged credit-card scam.

The other two groups cited for contempt, Fusion Energy Foundation and the National Democratic Policy Committee, were not charged in the indictment, and neither was LaRouche himself.

Dance teacher Murray attributes longevity to a strict diet

HONOLULU (AP) — It's easy to guess one way Arthur Murray kept his "When we go to dinner at the Kahala Hilton, we usually order and every Saturday," Murray said Wednesday, three days before his 92nd birthday.

But one of the world's best-known dance teachers attributes his longevity to a strict diet that doesn't allow for mixing food.

"The best thing is to eat only one kind of food at a time, and not a lot of different kinds of foods," he said. Murray said he was unsure how his wife of 61 years, Kathryn, and their friends planned to celebrate his birthday, saying it was going to be a surprise.

The 350-Arthur-Murray-Dance-Studios and their 10,000 students throughout the world will mark the birthday by holding dances, said Barbara Johnson, queen of the Walkiki School.

Murray sold the studios in 1952 for \$5 million, but remained manager of the chain until 1964, when he and his wife moved to Hawaii.

He started his first dance studio at age 16, and his students included Eleanor Roosevelt, John D. Rockefeller Jr., and the Duke of Windsor. He also sold mail-order dance courses, and during the 1950s, "The Arthur Murray Party" was a popular television show.

The son of Jewish immigrants from Austria, Murray said he based his diet on his own version of Jewish dietary laws. He abides by prohibition against eating meat and milk products at the same time, but shortens the intervals to coincide with his own digestive system.

"The Jewish dietary laws exaggerate a little bit," he said. "So after I've eaten meat, I'll wait at least two or three hours; with milk I wait maybe an hour afterwards."

Murray is also a non-smoker and drinks only an occasional glass of wine.

Idahoan issues new appeal on tape

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Hostage Jesse Steen, wearing a blue and white track suit, said the group was firm in its demand that a swap be arranged. The group had claimed responsibility for the Jan. 24 abduction of the four Americans held hostage for 68 days.

His voice was barely audible in the tape. Reporters who saw and listened to it said they were having difficulty transcribing what he said. Some speculated that the kidnapping was the statement in Arabic and translated it into English, which would account for the awkward English of the tape message.

Previous communications from the group said Steen, 47, of Boston, was dangerously ill and might die. It cited high blood pressure and breathing difficulties.

The group said Steen's illness prompted it to renew its offer of the swap, which Israel has rejected.

Steen, Turner, fellow American Robert Poihill, 53, of New York City, and Indian Mithleshwar Singh, 60, were kidnapped at the U.S.-affiliated Beirut University College in Beirut's Moslem sector. Singh is a legal resident alien of the United States.

The release of the new tape came a few hours after students rallied on campus to demand the release of the four teachers held hostage for 68 days.

Twenty-four foreigners, including eight Americans, are missing in Lebanon and believed kidnapped since March 1985. Also missing is Anglican church envoy Terry Waite, who dropped from sight Jan. 20 while trying to win the freedom of foreign hostages.

Crowd welcomes pope to slum district

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Slum dwellers thronged to welcome Pope John Paul II on Thursday but stoned the police who escorted him.

Some shared his podium to accuse Chile's military regime of torture, murder and causing their poverty.

The pope took a conference of bishops later that he hopes for a quick return of democracy to Chile.

Before setting out for La Bandera slumtown, John Paul spent nearly 45 minutes with President Augusto Pinochet, who the pontiff has said runs a "dictatorial" government.

Vatican sources described the meeting as courteous but would not reveal details.

Protesters smashed all the windows of two police buses that led the pope on a crisp, brilliant autumn morning to the squalid slum whose 20,000 people are plagued by drug addiction, prostitution and grinding poverty.

Helmets riot police used their shields to push the crowds back. Witnesses reported seeing several people who appeared to be injured.

The scene was repeated when John Paul left and police fired tear gas into the stone-throwing crowds.

For reasons that were not clear, the local church erected a backdrop on the makeshift stage that depicted wooden shacks but hid the real ones.

People chosen by Roman Catholic priests were brought to the pope's side and spoke out against Gen.

Pinochet's government to a crowd of several hundred thousand.

University radio and television stations carried the denunciations, but government television cut the sound during that portion of John Paul's appearance and substituted background music.

The pontiff nodded solemnly as Luis Rivero, who is missing since March 1985, complained of "no money, terrible housing and having to get up at 5 in the morning to get a place in line at (the government) health clinic."

"We want a dignified life, but without dictatorship," she said, and asked papal intercession for political prisoners, including 14 facing the death penalty.

John Paul embraced her.

Others spoke of torture, burning and killing by the government. People in the audience, some waving banners that said "Pope, you torture and kill here," shouted "Bravo!" with each denunciation.

Television stations operated by the University of Chile and the Catholic University of Chile carried the scene live including sound.

"I have listened to you with much attention, and my spirit is deeply moved," the pope said. He urged the faithful to "use all means within your power to banish from your country—all the causes of unjust poverty."

Rebels threaten American advisers

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) — The rebel group that killed at least 60 Salvadorans and a U.S. Green Beret in an attack this week threatened Thursday to kill more American soldiers involved in the 7-year-old civil war.

"As the American invaders deepen their intervention they put themselves closer to the sights of our rifles, and we will fulfill with honor the patriotic duty to bring about justice upon the agents of war that offend the national dignity," the rebels' clandestine Radio Venceremos said in a broadcast monitored here.

On Tuesday, the Farabundo Martí National Liberation Front staged a pre-dawn assault on the army's 4th Infantry Brigade in El Paraiso, 37 miles north of the capital.

Military analysts Thursday revealed additional details about the raid, and suggested at least one infiltrator may still be at the base.

Salvadoran troops meanwhile searched for guerrillas in two provinces.

Staff Sgt. Gregory A. Fronius, 27, of Scotland, Pa., became the first American soldier to be killed in battle in the attack. He was among a group of 35 U.S. military advisers working with the Salvadoran army forces.

About 60 Salvadoran troops were wounded by hand-made bombs, mortars, grenades and rifles during more than two hours of fighting.

A U.S. Embassy spokesman who requested anonymity for security reasons said guerrillas shot Fronius while he was fleeing from his room for cover and that his body then was hit by mortar fire.

The highest price, 4.3 million francs (\$2.9 million) was paid for a 31-carat diamond ring. Tokyo diamond dealer Tassano Takagi said he would keep the ring for his own display and would not resell it.

Safety-five top lots were offered on the first evening of the sale of gemstones that recall the celebrated romance between American Wallis Warfield Simpson and King Edward VIII, who gave up the British throne 50 years ago to marry the twice-divorced compeer.

By the Duchess' will, proceeds of the sale will go to the Pasteur Institute in Paris, which has recently been in the forefront of the fight against AIDS. The money is to go toward building at least one laboratory for research on retroviruses, cancer and AIDS; the auctioneer announced before bids began.

A ruby and diamond necklace, a 40th birthday present from the Duke in 1936 one year before they were married, went for 3.55 million francs (\$2.4 million) to an anonymous phone bidder.

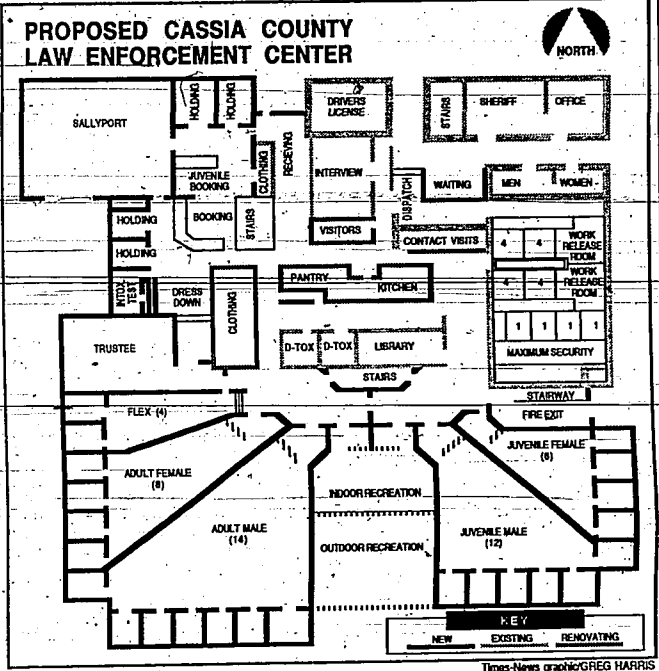

Geneva closing now certain

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — USX Corp., which in February placed Utah's Geneva Works and its 2,200 workers on "indefinite furlough," announced Monday it is permanently closing the steel plant this summer.

However, USX spokesman Jack Bollow said the plant steel company was not closing the door on "local interests" exploring the possibility of purchasing the Geneva plant, located in Orem.

Bollow said the United Steel Workers of America "union" was notified Thursday that Geneva will be permanently closed as of July 1, a 90-day period that meets contractual notice requirements.

"Meantime, the company has indicated it is continuing its discussions with local interests in Utah concerning the sale of Geneva Works," he said from USX's Salt Lake City office.

Bollow identified one of those interested in buying the plant as Basic Manufacturing and Technologies of Utah Inc., a corporation formed in January to explore the future of the plant. The company's officials confirmed they want to buy the plant.

"We are investigating and continuing discussions with USX for the purchase of Geneva," said Robert Gray, a member of Basic Manufacturing's board of directors. "We are hopeful that they will be successful and we are optimistic that with all parties affected — working workers and their families. As I've said before, the workers were the best this nation had to offer, and as hard as we have tried to relay that information to USX, our best fight was not enough."

Rep. Howard Nielson, R-Utah, whose 3rd congressional district encompasses Geneva, said the closure announcement disappointed him, especially when so many good people have done everything possible to make it economically attractive to keep the plant open.

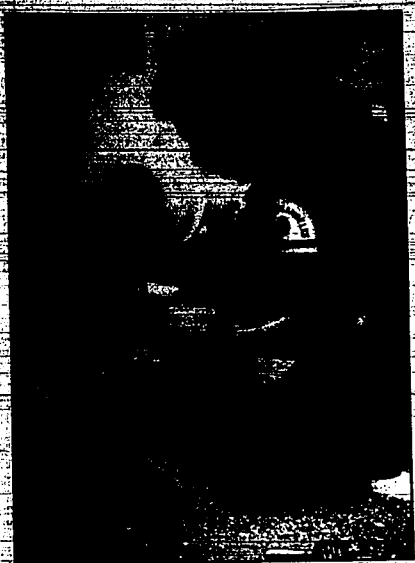

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Parking enforcement officers have started attaching the immobilizing "Denver boot" to cars when owners ignore five or more parking tickets.

City officials said they decided to use the Denver boot to counter the estimated 65,000 violators who owe \$20 million in fines. The boots clamp to the wheels of cars, and to get them removed motorists must pay their outstanding tickets and a \$35 fee.

"We hope this program will make it clear that the city is getting tough on parking violations," City Councilman Mike Woo said Thursday as officers clamped a boot on a Subaru to officially kick off the program.

Teel Mirkov, chief parking enforcement officer for the Department of Transportation, said a number of cars were fitted with the devices Wednesday, but he could not say how many.

The city has 220 boots, said Don Howry, manager of the Transportation Department.

Officials from state, utility investigating electrocution

WALLA WALLA, Wash. (AP) — State and utility officials began investigations Thursday into the electrocution of a 42-year-old Sandpoint, Idaho, man who was cutting trees away from power lines.

Coy O. Clark suffered severe burns on his right shoulder, left fingers and right leg Wednesday, according to the Walla Walla County sheriff's office.

He was an employee of Trees Inc., a Houston-based company contracted by Pacific Power & Light Co. to trim trees away from sea power lines.

Statements taken by the sheriff's office indicated Clark and three co-workers thought the power lines were turned off.

Sheriff's Deputy Mike Steeters said Clark was hit with between 7,200 and 12,000 volts of electricity. He said Clark was in a safety harness topping branches from several trees when a co-worker saw that he wasn't moving.

PP&L's Walla Walla Division Manager Bud Prince said investigations were planned by PP&L, Trees Inc. and the state Department of Labor and Industries.

Idaho agency to take over collections

ST. ANTHONY (AP) — A California collection agency that has contacted former patients of Fremont General Hospital about bills with Westworld Community Healthcare Inc. will transfer its eastern Idaho accounts to a local collection agency.

An official with the Idaho Department of Finance had advised former patients of Fremont General Hospital against cooperating with Medical Accounts Control Inc. because the company does not have an Idaho license.

But Rob Spargur, owner of Medical Accounts, said California law compels his company to notify people with outstanding bills, their status before turning the accounts over to local collectors.

"It's really a courtesy to them so that they can pay off those bills before they get a record with their local credit bureau," he said, adding that his company was transferring the Westworld accounts to the Credit Bureau of Idaho Falls.

The Finance Department had received complaints that Medical Accounts had incorrectly stated amounts owed to Westworld. Spargur said Westworld had not yet provided his agency with current financial statements, which accounted for the incorrect figures that his agency had used.

Spargur said his agency is handling Westworld accounts in 16 states, and will transfer to local collectors in each state.

Meanwhile, Westworld has contacted its eastern Idaho creditors, asking for patience with its debts as Westworld tries to avoid filing for bankruptcy protection.

Westworld operated the St. Anthony hospital from November 1983 until last year when the California-based company withdrew from its contract with the South Fremont Hospital District. The hospital closed earlier this year.

In addition, industry experts will speak on safety equipment and toxicology concerns of dinoseb, Ms. Toohy said.

Ms. Toohy said she expects growers to attend meetings in Pullman and nearby Moscow, Idaho, this weekend for pea and lentil growers planning to apply the pesticide dinoseb.

Attendance is required even for licensed pesticide applicators.

The chemical was banned in October by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, but the EPA cleared it for use this year only on dry pea, lentil and chickpea crops. Special restrictions were set, including certification.

Growers can attend either of the meetings, which are set for 6 p.m. Saturday in the Beasley Performing Arts Coliseum at Washington State University in Pullman and 2 p.m. Sunday in the Kibbie Dome at the University of Idaho in Moscow.

Mary Toohy, pesticide registrar with the Washington Department of Agriculture, said officials expect up to 700 people at each meeting.

The meetings, each expected to last two hours, will be joint efforts of the Washington and Idaho agriculture departments and the cooperative extension staffs at Washington State and Idaho.

Stocks close higher after quiet session

NEW YORK (AP) — Stock prices closed modestly higher after an uneventful session on Wall Street Thursday.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks rose 4.40 to 2,320.45.

Advancing issues — outpacing decliners by a margin of about 11-to-7, with 940 stocks up, 610 down and 409 unchanged on the New York Stock Exchange.

NYSE volume totaled 112.55 million shares, against 118.63 million the previous session.

Analysts said there was little news to influence the overall market, although there were developments that affected the performance of individual stocks.

For example, Morgan Stanley advised its customers Thursday to buy Digital Equipment, instead of IBM, which rose 1/4 to 163 1/2. IBM dropped 3/4 to 144.

IBM unveiled a new generation of personal computers Thursday, but analysts said investors had already done their buying in anticipation of the announcement.

Topping the NYSE most active list was Hewlett, which rose 2 1/2 to 21 1/2.

On Wednesday, company's dominant stockholder launched a bid to take the cosmetics giant private at \$18.50 a share.

Several other technology stocks fared well. Unisys rose 1 1/2 to 9 1/2 and Texas Instruments jumped 2 1/4 to 150.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

Today's slam depends upon how South tackles the round suits. If he thinks only in terms of which finesse to take, he's headed for a sure minus score.

South wins his diamond ace and draws trumps—in two rounds. He then discards two presently equal opponents in the rounded suits. He can take a club finesse, planning to discard his diamond loser on the long club, or he can take the heart finesse, discarding his diamond loser if that finesse wins.

Unfortunately—the only thing equal about those finesses is that they both lose. Taking either one results in a quick one down.

The best-play for the slam is to combine the chances in the play of both suits. First, he leads the club jack (in case West obliges with a cover) and when West plays low, dummy's ace is played.

In today's layout, East's king trumps and South's king not dropped. South would have returned to his hand in trumps to try the heart finesse. Combining the chances of dropping a singleton club king and finessing successfully in hearts increases South's overall chances to about 62 percent. It's much better than relying on either 50-50 shot.

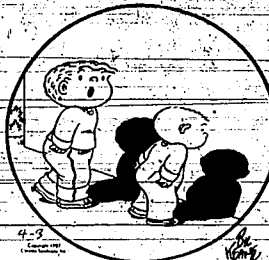

Flamingos come out for Ketchum spring prom

KETCHUM — So how is it to ride a flamingo? "Wonderful," said Sid Tomlinson. "They're easy to train, they eat hardly anything and you can just turn them loose in the pond every night. You don't need a saddle and they're gentle so they don't ever kick."

But how is it exactly to ride one? Said Cynda Jacobs, "You just could never tell anybody unless you tried it yourself." Then Tomlinson and Jacobs rode off on their pink, feathered mounts

into the noisy, ballooned mass of people at Ketchum's 10th annual Spring Prom last Saturday night in the Lighthouse Room at the Sun Valley Inn. Hundreds of peach-balloons hung from the ceiling and lights strobed over the 75 people attending the event. Daddy, most people looked as

though they had just walked off a movie set — in outrageous, spiked, blue hairdos; strapless ballroom dresses — and weird lights, tuxedo jackets and bathing suit combinations. Just outside the Lighthouse Room stood a photographer from Photographics with a setup that

could have brought back high school dance memories. Bunches of people lined up and then piled all over the floor in front of the lens and a background screen sporting pink palm trees and white, fluffy clouds.

Inside the room, music from Gib Hochstrasser and his "Kings of Swing" 21-piece orchestra swirled through the dance floor for all those with a twitch in their legs.

Hochstrasser and his Boise-based band have played the Spring Prom for the past eight years. "It's busy, but we love it," Hochstrasser said. "We like to come up here, for the prom."

Tickets for the event said "Black Tie Attire," but not many people actually sported black ties.

Michael Badell, one of the prom organizers, said, "Black Tie" doesn't mean a tuxedo per se. Badell said that's part of the reason it's such a fun event.

"We call it 'Ketchum Black Tie,' which means whatever you're comfortable with. People who like to dress up feel comfortable and people who like to wear crazy things, sporting typical prom-type attire, feel comfortable too."

their senses. Then I leave. All I ask of them is to have pleasure, to be surprised."

 NEW YORK — The Broadway revival of Noel Coward's "Blithe Spirit" is a gorgeous romp that arrived this week at the New Stage Theatre to deal with the complications of Coward's comedies are easy to ruin. Weigh them down with post-modernist style, clamp them up, act them too naturalistically, and you lose the rhythm and shape of his language — these are the approaches that would often damage his delicate design. TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) — Members of the first rock band U2 were described as embarrassed but determined to perform after they learned they were opening their tour in a state where the King holiday was canceled.

"They aren't playing for the governor of Arizona," the band's publicist Paul Wasserman said Wednesday. "They're playing, hopefully, to an audience who thinks like they think. They wouldn't be swayed by a governor who was elected by a minority vote."

The group is known for political protest music. Their sold-out concerts were scheduled for Thursday and Friday in Tempe and Saturday in Tucson.

In January, Gov. Evan Mecham canceled the King holiday, declared for the state's executive branch workers by his predecessor, Democrat Bruce Babbitt. Mecham, a Republican elected in November in a three-way race, said Babbitt had no legal authority to declare a holiday for state workers.

Wasserman said U2 members "were embarrassed and aghast" when they learned earlier this week of Mecham's action, and planned to make a contribution to a group that has proposed recalling Mecham.

Gubernatorial press secretary Ron Beebe said U2's position was misplaced.

"It's unfortunate that people are reacting emotionally over something that was a legal-technical matter, but it is not familiar with the laws of Arizona."

"They should have lobbied against Governor Babbitt for creating an illegal holiday," he added.

The group plans to implement a King holiday in Arizona as called





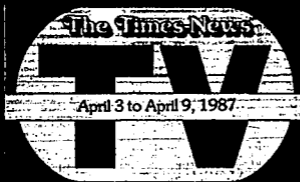

Academy fights Hollywood image in staging annual awards program

By LYNN HOOGENBOOM

Country music has spawned two separate network-broadcast awards shows: the Country Music Association Awards, which air in the autumn on CBS and the Academy of Country Music Awards, shown 8 p.m. Monday on KSNB and KUTV.

In recent years, the California-based Academy has had a reputation for being a bit more "Hollywood" than the Nashville-based Association. Dick Clark, who's hardly a country-music staple, is executive producer, and in past years the Academy has used hosts and presenters whose country credentials were less than auspicious.

The tendency is demonstrated again this year with the inclusion of Patrick Duffy, who will share hosting duties with a genuine country, and multi-nominated, mother-daughter act, the Judds.

"Patrick Duffy writes country songs, he has performed country songs on television, he has appeared frequently on The Nashville Network and he's a big country fan," said Academy executive director Bill Boyd in defending the decision.

Still, Duffy is hardly the voice of traditional country, a direction the musical genre has headed toward during the past few years.

Boyd takes exception to such pronouncements.

"I keep hearing people say that it's turning more traditional," he said, "but I don't know what they're talking about."

Randy Travis (nominated for Top Male Vocalist, Single of the Year, Song of the Year and Album of the Year) is probably as traditional as

anybody, but Ricky Skaggs (nominated for Entertainer of the Year and Album of the Year) is not traditional. He's primarily bluegrass, and that's not tradi-

tional. Reba McEntire (nominated for Entertainer of the Year, Top Female Vocalist, Single of the Year and Song of the Year) and George Strait (nominated for Entertainer of the Year, Top Male Vocalist and Album of the Year) are primarily Texas swing, and that's not traditional. People say country music is turning traditional. I can't think of but two or three artists they can be talking about.

Nonetheless, crossover mania, which was so pronounced a few years ago, is on the wane, and many country artists are returning to their roots. They may be Texas swing and bluegrass roots, but they're roots just the same.

And instead of dozens of nominees trying to clone each other's sounds in search of the perfect crossover, this year's crop include dozens of strong individual performances, from the star-bop of Alabama to the ultra-traditional Travis.

A. Streisand regards herself with justification as one of Hollywood's most potent movie box office names. Television, except perhaps for an occasional music special, is definitely beneath her, careerwise. But TV is also a big brass ring for Streisand. She has her own production company which has come up with a sitcom pilot — tentatively titled *Mabel and Max* — about an older and younger woman, both actresses, who share a New York apartment. The older actress will be portrayed by Geraldine Fitzgerald; Mary Ward has the other role. As for Streisand, she's strictly the producer on this one.

Q. Didn't Carrie Fisher survive a long bout of fighting drug abuse? — V.L.

A. Her just-completed first novel, *Fishface: From the Edge*, is an apocryphal story about a character mixed in drug addiction. Although it hasn't been published, it's already been sold to the movies, and Fisher herself is expected to write the script.

Q. Is it true that Shelley Long is leaving the TV cast of *Cheers* because she can't stand star Ted Danson's off-camera behavior anymore? — L.M.

A. Long says she's departing the *Cheers* program to concentrate on her movie career, going great guns with the success of her comedy with Belle Miller, *Outrageous Fortune*. Despite the rumors of friction between Long and Ted Danson, he swears he's "going to miss her very much. She brought a lot of love and respect to the set." Danson will stay on her another sixth, *Cheers* year while the show's writers try to figure out a short plot gimmick to

Things got so spirited that Ball at one point got up from her chair to deliver quick impersonations of the late Tallulah Bankhead and Katharine Hepburn, two former acting mates. Savvy Deidre Hall turns LACC gig into multi-entertainment pursuits

Deidre Hall must be exhausted. Besides continuing her long-running role as Dr. Marlena Evans in *Days of Our Lives* she is also tackling the enormous job of appearing in the prime-time series *Our House* and running two thriving specialized video services.

"It's a matter of staying focused," she says of her demanding regimen. "I love what I'm doing so I find the energy to do it all. And, of course, I have a personal life."

"It took me a lot of time but I just don't absorb tension. I just don't involve myself with conflict that may be going on around me. I walk away and keep my center calm."

Hall was raised in a middle-class home which housed three generations, not unlike the setting in her prime-time show.

"When I was attending Los Angeles Community College as a psychology major, I did some modeling and took some acting jobs to help with the tuition," she said. "Then it dawned on me that I could probably act full time. I guess my naivete was a good thing at the time. No one told me it was supposed to be hard. I just went straight ahead. I didn't have tearsheets or anything like that, but I got jobs."

Her turning point came on *Days of Our Lives*. She took the Evans role and made it something special, which has endeared her fans to her. The respect is reciprocal, Hall giving a small luncheon for them which has mushroomed into an annual event drawing 2,500 to a theater. She also has a "Deidre Hot Line" (1-213-650-1142) by which fans can keep tabs on her.

Hall's next career move is to feature films and possibly television directing.

According to ratings from 13 major markets, the Oscars got a 33.8 rating and a 53 share Monday night.

The movie awards extravaganza on ABC was only head-to-head against the game on CBS after 9 p.m. EST. The game had started at 8 p.m.

Indiana won in the final seconds, 74-73. But the game's rating against the Oscars was only 19.1 with a share of 27.

Rivers' opts for new hand

HOLLYWOOD — In a move aimed at calming the sometimes frantic pace of Joan Rivers' late-night show and improving its ratings, the show's producer has been replaced with one who used to work for Barbara Walters.

Bruce McKay, who had produced Fox Broadcasting's "The Late Show Starring Joan Rivers," since its premiere last October, was notified a month ago that his contract would not be renewed, Fox spokesman Brad Turell said March 27.

McKay's replacement, who began work Monday and produced her first Rivers show the next day, is JoAnn Goldberg, who had been an independent producer with Ramadam Productions in New York and previously produced the "Barbara Walters Specials" for ABC Entertainment from 1976 to 1983.

The reasons for the change, Turell said, were "basically to help improve the show" and to "calm the pace of the show a little bit."

"We don't anticipate format changes," he added, but the one-hour talk-variety program might reduce the number of guests who appear on it each night from four to three to allow for greater depth in interviews.

The show has two executive producers — Rivers' husband, Edgar Rosenberg, and William Sameth. Each will remain with the program.

NBC's audience was down last week, but it still won the weekly Nielsen ratings as its competitors also attracted fewer viewers.

NBC's prime-time average for the week ending March 29 was 16.6, compared with a season average of 17.9, Nielsen reported Tuesday. Second-place CBS dropped from a season average of 16.0 to 14.5 and ABC slid from 14.1 for the season to 13.3 for the week.

"That's going to happen at this time of the year," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president of research projects.

"In fact, we sent a little note to our top management explaining that at this time of the year all ratings come down. It's light longer and people are a little less likely to get to the TV set early."

"The Cosby Show," "Family Ties" and "Cheers" from NBC's Thursday line-up topped the ratings, followed by NBC's "Golden Girls," CBS' "60 Minutes" and "Murder, She Wrote," ABC's "Growing Pains" and "Moonlighting," the CBS Sunday movie "A Stranger Walks" and ABC's "Who's the Boss?" ABC's "Our World" was at the bottom of the 69-program pile with a rating of 6.9 and an 11 share.

NBC's "Nightly News" had a rating of 11.5, or one-tenth of a point better than the CBS "Evening News." Each had 22 percent of the viewing audience. ABC's "World News Tonight" averaged 10.8 and a 20 share.

NBC's "Today" show won the first quarter of 1987 in early-morning ratings competition against "Good Morning America" ABC and CBS' "The Morning Program," according Nielsen figures released by NBC.

"Today" had an average rating for the first three months of 1987 of 5.6

and a 25 share, its fifth consecutive quarterly win. "Good Morning America" had a 4.5 rating and a 20 share. CBS averaged a 2.7 rating and a 12 share in the time period. "The Morning Program" didn't debut until Jan. 12.

The rating is a percentage of the estimated 87.4 million households equipped with television. The share is a percentage of the acts in use during a particular time period.

NBC's three-part miniseries, "Nutcracker: Money, Madness and Murder," staggered to a disappointing finish. Monday's installment ranked 55th with a rating of 11.5 and a 19 share, but the finale on Tuesday jumped two full rating points and had a 22 share to finish 45th.

Michael Eisenberg, director of TV research for CBS, said his network and NBC had higher ratings last week than in the comparable week a year ago, though ABC was down.

This week's ratings emphasized how important "The Cosby Show" is to NBC, Eisenberg said.

"Night Court," normally a top-10 show on Thursday night, dropped to 34th last week when it was shown on Wednesday. "Roomies," which was a top 10 show for NBC last week in the Thursday night slot occupied by "Night Court," dropped to 47th last week when it was on Friday.

"It further emphasizes how one program has affected the competitive situation," Eisenberg said.

Still, "Roomies" handily defeated its competition, "Charlings" on ABC, which finished 61st, and "Nothing is Easy" on CBS, which was 62nd.

NBC's "Mallock" starring Andy Griffith as a wily lawyer, placed 11th for the week with a rating of 20.3 and a 30 share.

"That is a big number," Jaffe said. "I just feel like 'Mallock' is a potential big hit on the horizon, if not this spring, then certainly next season."

For the season, "Mallock" ranks 16th overall with an 18.5 average.

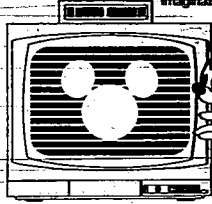

Fox launches prime-time schedule

Advertisers upbeat over prospects

LOS ANGELES — Fox Broadcasting was scheduled to inaugurate the first night of its prime-time schedule Sunday and that calls for the familiar Fox fanfare.

Trumpets, drums and sweeping searchlights, the traditional opening for 20th Century Fox movies, seem a fitting introduction for what promises to be a new era of television.

It's the beginning of what could become a fourth commercial network, although so far Fox has not revealed any plans for programming beyond prime time and "The Late Show Starring Joan Rivers," introduced last October. Nor has Fox ever called the project a fourth network, referring to it instead as "a satellite-delivered national program service."

But advertising executives are bullish about prospects for a Fox network.

"It's close to a sellers' market and that's definitely working to the advantage of Fox," says Don Mohr, vice president and director of network broadcasting for the New York advertising agency of Saatchi & Saatchi Compton Inc.

"They're introducing their new

slate in spring at a very opportune time. I mean the marketplace has been very tight and there's been a lot of demand. There are some clients who may not get everything they want on the three networks and this gives them an opportunity for

exposure." Frank McDonald, executive vice president and media director for Cunningham & Walsh, says, "What I think they're going to do is slowly improve their lineup and it will grow in strength. It looks like they've got the bucks to make it work. They've got the seven Fox stations and the luxury of seeing what works."

But media consultant John H. Mitchell says he thinks Fox couldn't have started the network at a worse time "from an economics standpoint." He says that to be successful Fox needs some breakthrough shows that ignore the same old formulas.

There has not been a fourth commercial network in more than 30 years, since the DuMont Network went off the air. The last time ABC, CBS and NBC had competition, the Korean War had just ended, Dwight Eisenhower was in the White House and Lucille Ball and Jackie Gleason had the most popular shows on television. DuMont went on the air in 1946, two years before either ABC or CBS, but was gone by 1955.

Fox will introduce four new shows in April, a fifth Sunday show in May, and its Saturday schedule on May 20. The company is bidding for Monday night professional football, but if it does not gain that it will not add any

new programming... until... until January, when it will begin programming for Friday night.

"We're starting on Sunday because that's the highest viewing night of the week," says Garth Ancier, senior vice president for programming at Fox Broadcasting. "It's a very competitive night and we wanted to go with four comedy shows. We got lucky because NBC and CBS pulled out their comedies."

This Sunday, Fox will introduce two comedies, "Married... With Children" and "The Tracy Ullman Show." Both shows will be broadcast three times during the evening.

The following Sunday, "21 Jump Street," an action-adventure show, will join the lineup with a two-hour pilot movie. The two comedies also will be shown. On Sunday, April 19, "Duet" will have its premiere with a special one-hour episode. On April 26, Fox will broadcast the four shows plus the sneak preview of a Saturday show.

In May, "Mr. President" joins the Sunday lineup. On May 30, Fox will introduce its Saturday lineup of "Down and Out in Beverly Hills."

"Karen's Song," "Werewolf" and "The New Adventures of Beans Baxter."

Fox has had no problems attracting top talent, either in front of or behind the camera. George C. Scott stars in "Mr. President" and Patty Duke in "Karen's Song." Among the creators are James Brooks ("The Mary Tyler Moore Show") and "Terms of Endearment"), who is doing "The Tracy Ullman Show." "Duet" is from Gary David Goldberg ("Family Ties") and "21 Jump Street" is from Stephen Cannell ("The A-Team").

Ancier says Fox is placing fewer moral restrictions on its producers than the three networks.

"I think we'll be ahead of the networks," he says. "We'll have different standards for different shows. It all depends on who's producing and how they will pull it off tastefully. We don't have a standards and practices department, the way the networks do. We'll trust the producers and tell them to use their best judgment."

"We don't want to be socially irresponsible. At the same time, it's

not our job to play school counselor. It tends to be stifling. We encourage our producers to be daring and innovative and provocative."

Fox will offer programming only until 10 p.m.

"Most of our large stations have a 10 p.m. newscast," Ancier says. "Our late night starts at 11 o'clock with Joan Rivers. First, we have to make these two nights work. Then next January we'll start on the third night, which will be Friday."

"I think the Fox network is going to succeed," says Les Brown, editor of Channels magazine. "It's not going to succeed on network terms. It's going to succeed as a syndicated service. And the reason it's going to succeed is that there's a need for it. There are several hundred independent stations out there who need this. There are 150 new stations, on the air just since 1980."

"It gives them distinction in their markets and national programs that draw an audience. It's efficient for advertisers looking for national exposure and it's an economical way to program for a fixed number of stations."

Division of ABC-TV considers changing 'World News' look to eliminate concern on ratings

NEW YORK (AP) — ABC News is considering different formats to help boost the ratings of its "World News Tonight" broadcast, the network said March 26.

Its news division is most concerned about its evening news broadcast with Peter Jennings, which continues to trail NBC and CBS in the news ratings, which many analysts attribute to the low ratings of ABC's prime-time schedule.

The New York Times reported March 26 that ABC executives were shown last week a secret prototype of a newscast dramatically different from the standard evening news

format, with extended segments on a couple of big stories interspersed with capsule news reports.

"We've fooled around with things on tape before. This isn't anything new," Olwert said.

Any dramatic change in the look of "World News Tonight" will have to be weighed against the adjustments in technical operations that would be required, Olwert said.

"The point is, we are trying to change the broadcast and trying to make it better, and we're not in any big rush to do it," she said. "It may be the kind of thing where we gradually change it over time."

'Upstairs, Downstairs' returns

NEW YORK (AP) — Imagine an intimate, four-year correspondence — every week a fond letter from a far-off place. Then imagine, after a decade-long interruption, unexpectedly coming upon a trove of the old letters.

For many of the 11 million people who regularly watched "Upstairs, Downstairs" on PBS 10 years ago, that's how the series is recalled and how the rerunning of all 55 episodes, which started in March, has been anticipated.

Those faithful expect the news from 165 Eaton Place in London to be as fresh and evocative as when it was first received.

Critics and viewers have called for the series' return almost since the day it ended a four-season U.S. run in 1977.

Jean Marsh, who won one of the show's nine Emmy awards for her portrayal of Rose, the head parlormaid, said she and her friend, actress Eileen Atkins, first conceived a show about two working-class women who become actresses.

Then, she said, "We went back a

bit further."

"Upstairs, Downstairs" follows the Bellamy household in London's fashionable Belgravia section and mirrors the history of the first three decades of the 20th century. The matriarch is lost on the Titanic, the scion is wounded in World War I and the stock market crash of 1929 changes the family forever.

It is presented by WGBH in Boston instead of "Masterpiece Theater," and so the "latter's" host—Allstar Cooke, who introduced each segment before, is missing this time around.

Each week, the trials or triumphs of an upstairs character entwine with those of one downstairs. Though the characters evolve, the episodes are mostly self-contained.

Pauline Collins, the maid who becomes a music hall performer in "Upstairs, Downstairs," also credited careful research for the show's authentic feel.

She added, "I think everybody loves nostalgia. The kind of speed with which the world runs nowadays is very exhausting."
