Kremlin shows off 'American' devices

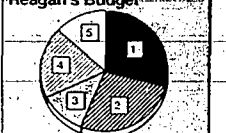
MOSCOW — The Soviet Union on Thursday displayed microphones and other gadgets it said were dug from the walls and floors of its U.S. missions and claimed the devices prove that Soviets are victims of American spies. The devices, some crammed with miniature electronics and no bigger than a pencil, are "material evidence of who is really intruding into the sovereign territory of others," Foreign Ministry spokesman Boris Pyadyshev said at a news briefing. The briefing and the display of objects allegedly planted at Soviet missions and residences in Washington, San Francisco and New York was a clear-Kremlin response to reports that the KGB faced the U.S. Embassy in Moscow with bugging devices and compromised its security. The Soviet counterattack came as American officials were trying to gauge a sex-and-spy scandal that allegedly involved U.S. Marine guards who became sexually involved with Soviet women and were enticed into allowing KGB agents inside the American Embassy. It was not possible for journalists to verify that the transmitters, receivers and other electronic devices had actually been planted on Soviet property by U.S. agents. John Carl Warnecke, who helped design the new Soviet Embassy in Washington, said the Soviets took extraordinary measures to protect the mission after bugging devices were found in some of the early construction work. In a statement released in Washington, Warnecke said the discovery of listening devices caused the Soviets to "scrap each inch of steel the night before it was put up. It's like the window frames were disassembled and inspected, and X-ray the facade of the embassy for three months after it was complete. The Soviets have denied that they spied on the U.S. Embassy in Moscow. And officials have claimed

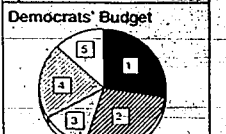
House passes \$1 trillion Demo budget

WASHINGTON — The House on Thursday approved a \$1-trillion Democratic budget that would raise \$18 billion in new taxes, slash President Reagan's military buildup and block White House plans for sharp decreases in domestic programs. The House endorsed the plan, drafted by its Budget Committee, 230-192, with no Republicans voting for it. Reagan criticized the measure and the budget process afterward. "The resolution today adopts a very solid budget which many economists believe can make a difference between continued economic growth in the United States and economic stagnation," said Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas. This budget reduces deficit in a balanced way," he said. However, most lawmakers expected the blueprint would fall to meet the \$108 billion deficit target of the Gramm-Rudman budget-balancing law. Democrats argued it did more to cut red ink than any other option, including the president's. And Reagan called the Democratic plan "just business as usual: cuts in defense, that potentially threaten our national security and passing the buck to the American taxpayer to pay for their excesses." "It's time for Congress to admit that the process hasn't worked, and steel the nerves so that we can do a credible, credible and reliable," the president said in a statement he read after an appearance at Purdue University in West Lafayette, Ind. "I don't see how we can do that unless we have a budget made Democratic priorities clear to the voters. All you care about is cutting defense and raising taxes," she told the majority party. "The American people now know what they want."

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President, Baker denounce Soviet espionage

WASHINGTON — President Reagan called Soviet spying in the U.S. Embassy in Moscow "outrageous" Thursday and his chief of staff said while he assumes this country keeps an eye on Soviet diplomats it would never do "what the Soviets have done." The remarks by both Reagan and his aide, Howard Baker, came in response to an accusation in Moscow by Soviet Foreign Ministry spokesman Boris Pyadyshev that an "extremist, militarist wing" in the United States had fabricated charges that the KGB planted listening devices in both the old U.S. Embassy and the new embassy that is to replace it. Reagan deplored Soviet-bugging of the U.S. Embassy in Moscow but declined to say what America does along those lines. "I'm not going to discuss our intelligence or counter-intelligence or there wouldn't be any that would be useful any more," Reagan told reporters at West Lafayette, Ind. after delivering a speech at Purdue University. "Baker said the scope of Soviet spying on Americans in Russia 'really represent an invasion of our sovereign rights.' 'I assume that we have intelligence capability related to Soviet installations, but I don't know that,' Baker said. 'I don't think the United States would do what the Soviets have done.' Said Reagan: 'I cannot and will not comment on United States intelligence activities. Nonetheless, I can say that what the Soviets did to our embassy in Moscow is outrageous and we have protested strongly. We are conducting a full investigation and will take whatever corrective action is necessary... Diplomatic institutions cannot be secured from Soviet spying.' In other developments, the Senate adopted, 70-30, a resolution urging Secretary of State George Shultz to either cancel his planned talks with Soviet officials

GAO raps lax security at nuclear arms plants

WASHINGTON — The Department of Energy consistently fails to a "scam" to sell classified documents required security investigations for thousands of its employees, many of whom have access to highly sensitive nuclear-weapons materials, General Accounting Office auditors said Thursday. In testimony to Congress and in a report, GAO officials pointed out dozens of instances where DOE officials have received damaging allegations about employee actions, including reports of major felonies, but made no immediate attempts to investigate them. "The major message of this report is simple: The Department of Energy is not doing its job of investigating and reinvestigating its people no assurances that our most precious national secrets are safe," director Keith Fultz, who testified before the House Government Operations Committee's subcommittee on energy. The report said the department's most flagrant failure to follow up breaches has happened at home: allegations involved a senior laborer

technology at the Oak Ridge nuclear facility whom the FBI investigated in 1981 in connection with a "scam" to sell classified documents and uranium to the Palestine Liberation Organization. A U.S. attorney ultimately decided not to prosecute the technician, but in 1982 the FBI sent DOE a letter about its investigation. The department lost the letter. After he was arrested in 1984 for carrying a concealed weapon, the Office of Personnel Management, which conducts federal security clearances, discovered other allegations against him, including reports that he had committed rape, burglary, arson for his car with the engine running and "The point is that the Department of Energy can give the American people no assurances that our most precious national secrets are safe," said Mike Symon, D-Ohio, a researcher for Esasams, a Marconi sister company, where the Defense Ministry says he was working on an air defense systems contract.

Ruling opens gate for subsidy dodge

WASHINGTON — The Interior Department reversed itself and said Thursday it will continue to let Western farmers avoid acreage limitations on irrigation subsidies. Under regulations announced by the Bureau of Reclamation to carry out the 1982 Reclamation Reform Act, land farmed by one operator for a flat fee under a management contract that leaves the risk of crop failure with a separate owner will not be counted against acreage limits. "This was a 180-degree reversal from the draft regulations published last fall, which defined all non-owned land as leased land subject to the limits," Rep. George Miller (D-Calif.), a principal author of the 1982 law, said the new regulations were a "prostitution of the law." The act is designed to force farmers to pay the full cost of water used on land in excess of certain acreage. For new and renewed contracts, the ceiling is 500 acres of owned or leased land. Regulations covering these were published in 1983. The rules announced Thursday cover old contracts, some of which expire every year out to the year 2007. Congress in 1982 set a deadline of next Wednesday — the "exammer clause" — for farmers to decide whether to switch to new contracts or remain under the old law. The old law, which dates from 1902, said water would not be provided above 160 acres. A 1945 Bureau interpretation made the limit 200 acres for a husband and wife. Ever since, though, larger operators have found ways to skirt the limit. It may be to a farmer's advantage to remain under the old law, because some contract rates are very low. Rates in new contracts will have to cover at least the operation and maintenance of the project involved. A "full-cost" rule would cover repayment of the cost of building the project. Subsidies can be large. In perhaps the best-known example, the Westlands Water District in the San Joaquin Valley of California, farmers pay \$7.50 per acre-foot where the operation and maintenance costs \$18 and the full cost is \$27, according to the bureau — add \$32, according to the Natural Resources Defense Council. Only 495 farms receiving federal irrigation water are larger than 960 acres. Three hundred five of them are in California. An acre-foot is the water that will cover an acre to a depth of one foot, or about 325,000 gallons. This is what a family of five might use in its home in a year.

Mystery of dead scientists could baffle Sherlock Holmes

LONDON — On March 30 scientist David Sands climbed into his car, trunk packed with tanks of gasoline, and drove into the front of a vacant restaurant. He died in a fireball that incinerated him almost beyond recognition, the fifth British scientist involved in a security-related case, has a mysterious death in mysterious circumstances been made known. Three of the scientists worked for Marconi Underwater Systems at Watford, London, as a junior software engineer check-ing torpedo guidance systems. It's not known why he traveled to Bristol, 105 miles west of London. On Oct. 28 Ashraf Sharif, a computer design expert Richard Pugh was found dead at his home east of London. On Feb. 22 Peter Peapell, 36, a lecturer at the Royal Military College of Science at Shrivenham near Swindon, died tying under his car with the engine running and garage doors shut. The Defense Ministry says Peapell was working on a non-classified study of Soviet advances in beryllium metallurgy. Beryllium is widely used in atomic reactors. Sands, the most recent scientist to die, was a researcher for Esasams, a Marconi sister company, where the Defense Ministry says he was working on a tender for an air defense systems contract.

On Jan. 8 Avtar Singh Gida, 26, vanished. A researcher at Loughborough University's electronics department, he was finishing his doctorate in acoustics technology and was engaged on an unclassified research contract placed by the Ministry of Defense, according to a ministry spokesman who insisted on anonymity. 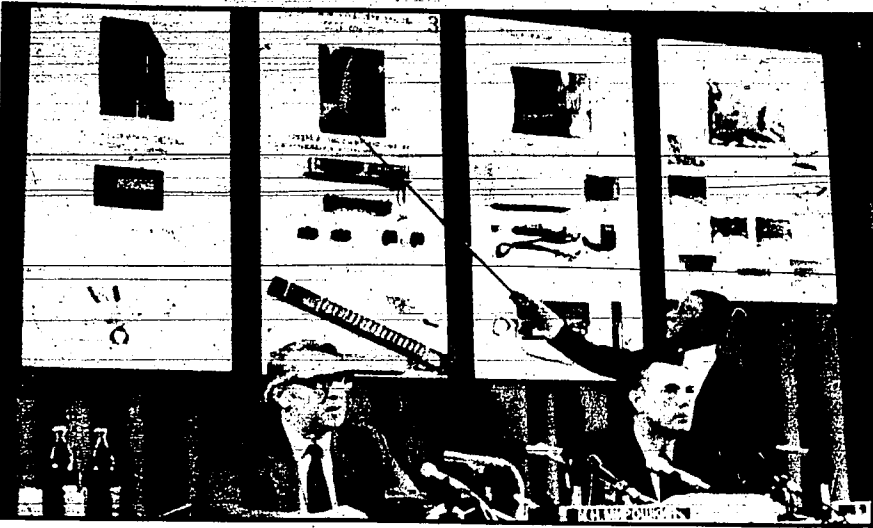
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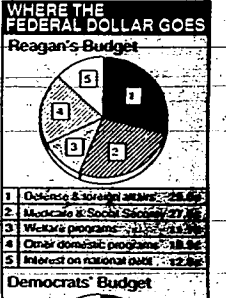

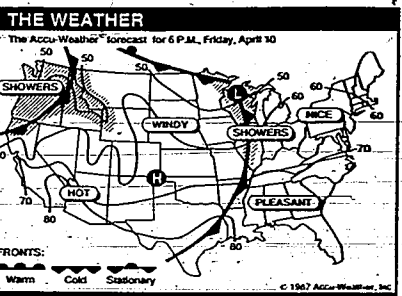
Town residents flee big blaze

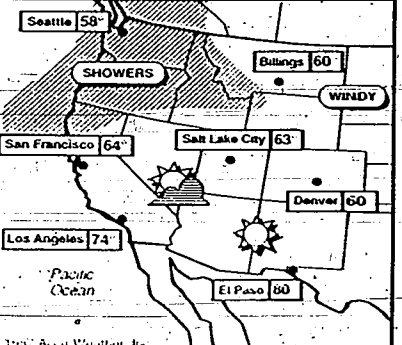

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Shultz ordered to take hard line with Soviets

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan has ordered Secretary of State George P. Shultz to spurn a proposal regarding new underground nuclear tests and to stretch out a proposed 50 percent reduction in long-range weapons, a U.S. official said Thursday.

Fees at BSU to increase \$12

BOISE (AP) — Student fee increases at Boise State University for 1987-88 will total \$12 per semester, BSU President John Keiser says.

The increase for full-time students includes an outdoor activity fee of \$1, \$9 for the health center and an increase of \$2 for music and marching band purposes. Total student fees will be \$50 per semester for full-time resident students, he said.

In addition, Keiser announced a fee increase of 5 percent for room, board and food services on campus.

Other fee increases for the 1987-88 school year include a \$10 student fee increase planned, while University of Idaho students will see a \$1 increase.

Butler closes event to media

HAYDEN LAKE (AP) — The head of a northern Idaho white supremacist church says the news media will not be allowed into the Aryan Nations' seventh summer meeting to be held at the church compound in July.

The Rev. Richard Butler said the media created "a circus atmosphere" last year at the Church of Jesus Christ Christian (Aryan Nations), based near Hayden Lake.

This year's conference, according to a church newsletter, "will be a closed two-day session with no outside media in attendance."

Plans for the Aryan Nations Congress July 11-12 are proceeding, Butler said Wednesday, even though federal criminal indictments could be handed down before then against white supremacists.

Butler, 69, said this year's conference will go on even if he is in jail.

Hall heads regional GOP unit

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Idaho Republican Party Chairman Blake Hall has been named to head the GOP's Western States Chairman's Association.

Hall, who has led the Idaho party since the death of former Chairman Dennis Olsen two years ago, said Idaho's lead position in the 12-state group should give it a greater impact on presidential politics over the next couple of years that may not have otherwise existed.

As head of the association, Hall will serve as liaison between the Reagan White House and party organizations in Idaho, Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming and the territory of Guam.

He succeeds former Secretary of the Navy Howard Callaway of Colorado.

Jury process halts Edmo trial

BLACKFOOT (AP) — The first-degree murder trial of a Shoshone-Bannock tribal member was halted Thursday when the judge ruled the process used to create a pool of potential jurors systematically excluded Indians.

Seventh District Judge James Herndon held that the computerized system used by Bingham County officials to select members of the jury list eliminated critical statutory steps to ensure a random selection reflecting the county's population makeup.

A portion of the Shoshone-Bannock Reservation lies inside the county.

Herndon's decision came in the midst of jury selection in the capital murder trial of Tyrone Edmo, 21, of Fort Hall. Edmo is charged with the July 1986 slaying death of a Pocatello, Delbert Clinton McCoy, 78, whose body was found at a diversion dam near Blackfoot.

The trial was rescheduled for June 24. But the decision also will affect jury selection in other trials. County Clerk Jean Espin said work already was under way to revamp the system, which is based on voter registration and driver's license lists.

Boise farmers' water slashed

BOISE (AP) — Boise area farmers will receive only one-third of their normal amount of water this year, the Boise Project Board of Control has announced.

Farmers from Boise to Nyssa, Ore., will be allocated 1.04 acre-foot of water per acre. Normal allocation is 3.2 acre-feet.

"We're pretty much guaranteed a foot, and we're looking at maybe a foot and a quarter," said Carl Padour, project manager. Without rain, no more is likely.

The board's consensus came during a tense five-hour meeting in Boise Wednesday. The panel includes representatives of each of the five irrigation districts in the Board of Control.

The lack of water is a result of snowpack less than half of normal this spring in the Boise River drainage.

Water will begin entering the canal system today. By Monday, canals should be at their highest levels of the year.

Settle fuss over wild area, Andrus says

MOSCOW (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus said Thursday night he wants Idaho's long-running wilderness controversy resolved, and he predicted an agreement might come this year.

Andrus, in a speech prepared for the Idaho Outfitters and Guides meeting here, said a majority of Idahoans want an end to the decade-long controversy over how much of the state should be preserved as permanent wilderness.

He said he won't put up with those who simply want to protect the bottles.

"After all, just look at what the debate has given us over the last decade — no resolution of the wilderness issue and constant controversy. I'm not interested," said Andrus.

"What I am interested in, and what the vast majority of Idahoans want, is a resolution of the conflict. And they don't want it done so that someone is a big winner and someone else is a big loser."

"They want balance. Common sense. And above all, they want the best of both worlds. We want it all — and it's my belief that we can have it all," Andrus said.

"We want, and need, the jobs that are created by a natural resource economy, and we want the quality of life that goes along with protecting pristine areas . . . the governor said."

Andrus said he is convinced that there will be an increase in wilderness in Idaho. But he said he is not ready to recommend how much.

He said he plans to consider the potential areas one at a time.

He said it will take "some work, some compromise and common sense" to reach agreement.

"Reasonable people are going to solve this issue. Those who want to grind an ax for some personal or partisan-political gain just aren't going to have much to say about it," Andrus said.

The governor said any increase proposal must be balanced, both protecting the best areas for hunting, fishing and recreation, and using responsibly the natural resources vital to the state's economy.

Prison bidding competition sought

BOISE (AP) — The Permanent Building Fund Council wants competing bids for a negotiated agreement with a single company, for a contract to make \$20 million worth of improvements to the state prison.

On a 4-1 vote Thursday, with Chairman Thomas Bourke objecting, the council ordered Public Works Director Anne Barker to revise requests for proposals which were to go out later in the day.

Ms. Barker said the agency was sending out requests to companies interested in designing, building and then leasing a new maximum security prison to the state. The project also involves expansion of prison facilities at Orofino and major improvements to the water and sewer systems at the main prison south of Boise.

More than 70 companies expressed an interest, she said. Her plan, as outlined to the council on Thursday, was to select a few firms or teams that appeared best qualified, and then pick one to negotiate a contract.

Under the agreement, the winning company would put together financing, design and construction of a new 240-bed maximum security prison near the existing prison at Boise.

The same company would supervise the Orofino improvements and utility upgrading. They would lease the new prison to the state under a lease-purchase agreement.

But the council would have none of that, Council members Jerry Hess and Sen. Kermit Kiebert, D-Idaho, both contractors, argued it was unfair to limit the possibilities to one company.

"It's just a good business principle to have competition," said Hess.

And Rep. Kathleen "Kitty" Gurnsey, R-Boise, also a board member, said, "All we need to have is two bidders to make sure we have a competitive price."

Ms. Barker and agency architect, Doyle Allen said leaders in the industry suggested only one company be picked to negotiate an agreement. Allen said it could cost a company up to \$30,000 to prepare complete preliminary designs for the prison, and companies might not want to do that without some assurances they'd get the contract.

Kiebert and Hess both said that's the way competitive bidding works. If companies are interested enough in going for the contract, they will make the investment even knowing they might lose out, Kiebert said.

Suspect in 3 Idaho deaths arraigned in Blackfoot case

BLACKFOOT (AP) — Accused killer Paul Ezra Rhoades has been arraigned in Bingham County on charges of robbing, abducting and killing a convenience store clerk.

Bingham County Prosecutor Tom Moss said Rhoades was arraigned Thursday before 7th District Magistrate James L. Martson on charges of first-degree murder, first-degree kidnapping, robbery, assault with intent to commit rape and four counts of using a firearm in commission of a felony.

Public defender David Parmenter was assigned the case and a preliminary hearing was set for May 21, Moss said.

Bond was denied, as it was in Bonneville County, where Rhoades has been charged in two other slayings, Moss said.

The charges in Bingham County were filed in the abduction and killing of Blackfoot convenience store clerk Stacey Baldwin, whose body was found Feb. 28 five miles from town. Her death was the first with which Rhoades was charged.

Senate highway override recalls one of Browning's poems

WASHINGTON — To look at last week's disarming roll call in the Senate, overriding the president's veto of the highway bill, is to recall one of Browning's better poems.

Thirteen Republican senators to sustain their leader. Just for a 65-minute they left him, just for the pork they denied him a vote.

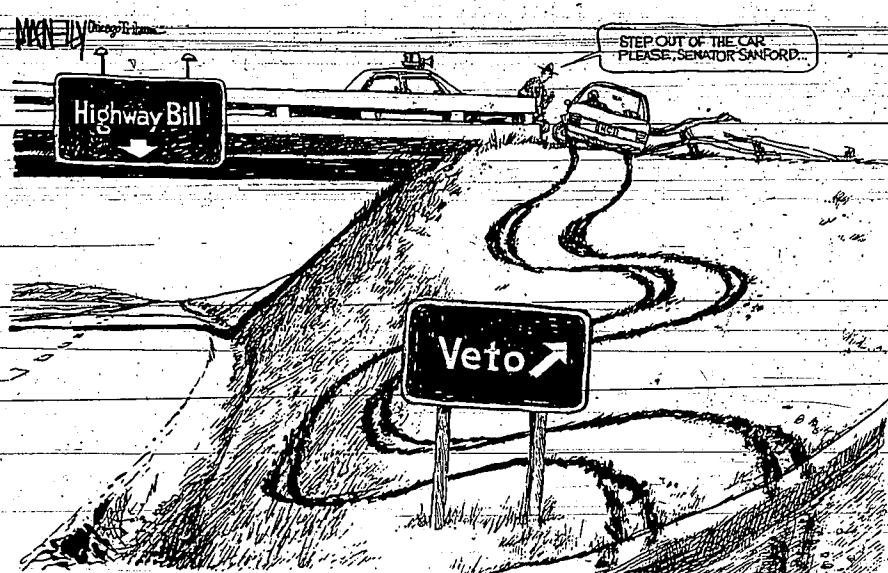
Consider the circumstances. Here was a Republican president, struggling to recover from the wounds of the Iranian arms affair, fighting to re-establish his leadership role.

Here was a bill indefensibly larded with pork barrel politics. Packed into this plump sausage were scores of "demonstration" projects, all of them to be financed with federal funds, few of them subject to rigorous examination for need.

And here was the president's veto: "The bill authorizes funding levels of \$87.5 billion over five years, \$10.1 billion more than my original request and more than is brought in by highway user taxes. It represents a failure to constrain federal spending, especially pork barrel spending.

Some of the unaffordable provisions include add-on funding for 152 special interest projects. The five-year federal cost of the 152 highway projects is estimated to be \$1.4 billion, and nearly \$300 million of this amount is not subject to any spending controls. The total cost to complete these projects is estimated to be \$5.5 billion, and they have not even been selected through the established mechanism that relies on the expertise of state and local officials."

The president had other valid objections. Massachusetts would benefit unfairly. At the expense of all other states, through expansion of the Boston Interstate highways, Los Angeles would get up to \$70 million for its metrotrans system. Eleven cities would gobble up 80 percent of the fund for mass transit. For these and other reasons, he returned the bill without his signature.



With a defiant whoop and a lusty holler, the House on Oct. 1 voted to override. Republican "leaders," notably Bob Michel of Illinois, were in the vanguard of the militia. Their desertion can be explained if not excused: It is more immediately important to representatives than to senators to bring home a few pounds of bacon.

The Senate's final vote to override arouses — what? Scorn? Contempt? Incredulity? Thirteen Republican senators heard a personal plea from the president, begging them to stand with him. Not one — not one! — would come to his side.

Some of the defections were expected. Not one drop of party loyalty flows in the veins of Connecticut's Lowell Weicker: any man of integrity, given his views, would move his chair across the aisle and let the GOP say good riddance to bad rubbish. Pete Wilson of California comes up for re-election next year; he would have been hard for him to vote against a bill that rewards California so richly. Hecht of Nevada and

Durenberger of Minnesota also faces the voters in 1982; the 65-mile authorization was important to them. Some of the others? Kit Bond and John Danforth of Missouri, who earlier had voted to override Reagan's veto of the clean water bill, again refused to support the president. John Heinz and Arlen Specter of Pennsylvania similarly defected. Al D'Amato of New York succumbed to the lure of subway money. It baffles understanding to know why Thad Cochran of Mississippi, Larry Pressler of South Dakota and Mitch McConnell of Kentucky would not answer the president's plea.

And what of Steve Symms of Idaho? Yes, his constituents probably would like a 65-mile-per-hour limit on parts of the highway from Boise to Pocatello, but could that have justified his vote to override? Symms was just re-elected, in large part because of Reagan's energetic campaigning in his behalf. Under the unwritten rules of the game, Symms owed Reagan a favor in return. When Symms refused to budge, Reagan might have recalled a line from Kit Leary: How sharper than a serpent's tooth it is to have a thankless child.

Some of the reporters and editorial writers have described the Senate vote as a humiliating—or "stunning"—defeat for the president. The descriptions were quite wrong. My guess is that the 13 rebellious Republicans will suffer whatever "humiliation" may be spread around.

Reagan himself will benefit from the admiration that goes to a fighter who fights the good fight against overwhelming odds. The president emerges as a man of conviction. His complaisant colleagues emerge as men of expedience only.

Sharp rhyme time along nation's highways remembered

After reading letters in the paper constantly about jills, schools, teachers, Reagan, Contras and all that has to do with politics, I thought I would write about something different for a change. Something most older people will recall from quite a few years ago and as they say, their decisions seemed simple to resolve.

It seemed like the end of an era when we suddenly noticed the absence of the Burma Shave signs along the nation's roadways. One of the company's roadside jingles read: "If you can't recall the half-pound jar Then you haven't traveled Very far. . . Burma Shave" And it was true. For years, these miniature

quips were a joy to the tired traveler. They were placed on every main and secondary road in the United States. And they served a purpose: safety. Few drivers ever failed to slow down enough to read the little sign serials, and they never thought they'd been had — even when the signs message turned out to be about safety.

Keep well To the right Of the oncoming car Get your close shave From the half-pound jar. . . Burma

And the signs were always tasteful. They never let their comic rejoinders get out of hand. For example, this one was never seen on the road — it came out of dust-covered files. "Listen, brosd Those signs cost Money So roost awhile, but Don't get funny. . . If it wasn't thought to be in the best possible taste, it was voted down from among the thousands of five-line jingles that do, but in Britain and in the field of East-West relations. Mrs. Thatcher lauded the Gorbachev proposals for "a more open society, new incentives, restructuring." But Gorbachev's reforms are more than a policy of decentralization. They seem to signal a historic struggle to decentralize and democratize power, reduce bureaucratic control and revitalize initiative from below in culture, politics and the workplace. Western leaders will have to fundamentally reconsider the agenda for

socialism in Eastern Europe. Thus far, ideological combat between East and West has been based implicitly on a trade-off between the economic securities of the Soviet system and the personal freedoms and political liberties of Western traditions. In attempting to put some crucial principles of democracy into operation within a socialist economy, Gorbachev challenges these ideological verities. It is not only the "Iron Lady" who will find it difficult, and politically dangerous in both domestic and geopolitical terms, to recognize how deep the transformations may be in Soviet society, scrap

the sorry phrases about totalitarianism and resist the instinct to red-bait passionately at the first hint of trouble. Without such a recognition, however, the fundamental reconstruction of East-West relations seems unlikely.

Mrs. Thatcher's hard line on the necessity of nuclear deterrence follows closely from this ideological blind spot. In this case her fundamentalist view toward nuclear arms threatens to throw a wrench into any accord that the superpowers might achieve. It is also sharply at odds with Soviet policy, expressed most notably in the Reykjavik proposals, that the dismantling of nuclear arsenals is the best security against nuclear disaster. Indeed, within a few days of Mrs. Thatcher's departure from the Soviet Union, Moscow was carefully registering the distance between the two sides. It vividly stressed the "resolute disagreement" over the principles of nuclear deterrence, a more analytic and diplomatic characterization of the problem discussed earlier by spokesmen for the Soviet Foreign Ministry, who referred to Mrs. Thatcher as a "nuclearphilliac."

Finally, one must remember that while Mrs. Thatcher went to Moscow to speak for the Western alliance, it will be up to the Americans to negotiate the agreement with the Soviets. That is the problem. Reagan's record of performance and inconsistency on arms control and the broader spectacle of foreign-policy disarray encourage congressional suspicions about any last-minute treaty. Foreign-policy confrontations between the White House and Congress, over Nicaraguan contra aid and "Star Wars," to name but two issues, are brewing while the intra-contra investigations run their course.

It seems unlikely that a new arms-control agreement will emerge from this mess to make tangible whatever atmospheric improvements were registered in Moscow last week. Without such gains, a new openness in East-West relations seems mainly wishful thinking.

Thousands of Czechs welcome Gorbachev

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — More than 150,000 people warmly greeted Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev when he arrived in Prague on Thursday for a visit that has raised hopes among many Czechoslovaks that their conservative leadership will adopt recent Kremlin reforms.

Although welcoming crowds are arranged for Soviet visitors, Prague residents say they could not recall such a big turnout since the first man in space, Yuri Gagarin, came to Prague in 1961.

Gorbachev stepped into the crowds to shake hands and told one group in Russian, "We are old friends."

Gorbachev, whose trip was postponed three days because of a cold, held his first talks with host Gustav Husak, the 62-year-old president and party leader, after an airport welcome and a ceremonial greeting in front of Hradcany Castle on a hill overlooking the old city.

Little detail emerged from the talks, but a Soviet spokesman said they concerned cooperation between the Communist parties in Moscow and Prague.

Gorbachev indicated to Prague residents that he would not make public any differences with Husak. State television showed Gorbachev telling residents of a city suburb that "We have complete trust in (your) leadership."

Husak came to power in 1969 after a Soviet-led Warsaw Pact invasion in August 1968 crushed reform attempts by then Czechoslovak party leader Alexander Dubcek.

Since then, Husak's regime has gained a reputation as one of the most conservative and repressive governments in the Soviet bloc.

Husak last month lent strong verbal support to Moscow's selected reforms, but made clear they will come slowly — if at all — to Czechoslovakia.

But it seemed clear that the Czechoslovak public is interested in the possibility of reform and that the enthusiasm of the crowds was genuine. At the airport people waved small Soviet flags and shouted, "Long live Comrade Gorbachev."

U.S., Britain cast vetoes

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The United States and Britain on Thursday vetoed another Security Council resolution calling for broad sanctions against South Africa for blocking the independence of Namibia.

U.S. Ambassador A. Walters told the council that the proposed punitive sanctions would "seriously limit" Western mediation efforts aimed at speeding the independence of Namibia, also known as South-West Africa.

West Germany also vetoed against the resolution, debated for four days. But, as one of 10 non-permanent council members, the Bonn government's vote did not count as a veto. Only the five permanent members — the United States, Britain, France, China and the Soviet Union — have veto power.

Italy, France and Japan abstained; nine of the Security Council's 15 members voted yes.

Pope lauds immigrant settlers

PARANA, Argentina (AP) — Pope John Paul II paid homage Thursday to the immigrants who settled Argentina's vast interior and urged all nations to embrace newcomers.

"In some places, one still notes the existence of prejudices toward immigrants, of the fear that a man from the outside — even if admitted for certain types of work — will upset the society that welcomes him."

"Be aware of this fear and these prejudices that are based on nothing else but selfishness. There exists an art and a meaning of hospitality that is impossible to codify with regulations and laws, but which ought to be written in the hearts of every Christian."

The pope's last stop was a barnstorming tour of the Argentine hinterlands was Parana, a pretty northeastern city in a lush rice and citrus-growing region between the Parana and Uruguay rivers. He came from Corrientes, where he and his audience were drenched by a tropical downpour.

Philippine peace talks stall

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — The government and Moslem rebels suspended peace talks indefinitely Thursday after the guerrilla leader accused the military of starting a battle on Mindanao Island.

In a letter to President Corazon Aquino, rebel leader Nur Misuari said the fighting Monday in Zamboanga del Sur province "opened up the war between your government and the Moro National Liberation Front."

Misuari, who leads the largest of at least three Moslem rebel groups, warned that if the clash leads to a renewal of full-scale fighting, "the cause of such war will clearly rest on your government."

The government denied that it provoked Monday's battle.

Food reaches besieged camp

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Syrian troops interceded to allow food to flow into another besieged Palestinian refugee camp Thursday and the wounded to come out, but Shiite militiamen blocked delivery of medical supplies.

The first major battles of the year between Christians and Moslems were reported, along the sectarian line that divides Beirut and in the hills southeast of the city.

Israeli helicopter gunships attacked Palestinian targets near Sidon in south Lebanon.

Many dead from ferry identified

ZEBRUGGE, Belgium (AP) — Forensic experts used dental charts and pieces of clothing Thursday to identify many of 112 bodies recovered from a ferry that capsized off this North-Sea port five weeks ago, officials said.

Most of the victims were believed to be British. Divers in the mud-clogged upper decks of the partly submerged Herald of Free Enterprise pulled out eight bodies Thursday after removing 104 on Wednesday, bringing the confirmed death count to 173, said Mark Van De Wal, a spokesman at the naval base where bodies were taken.

The bodies of 61 victims were recovered shortly after the British ferry capsized March 6. The final death toll is expected to approach 192.

The British and Belgian divers told of nightmarish scenes inside the ship, which is in about 30 feet of water a mile outside Zeebrugge harbor.

The bodies of a man and woman were locked in a death embrace, their arms around each other. A little girl was still cradling her doll.

"I think we will all suffer long-term scarring in our minds that will live with us forever," said Commander Jack Birkett, who was directing the British Royal Navy divers.

The capsized ferry was sighted Tuesday by allowed divers to enter and retrieve most of the remaining corpses.

Identities established Thursday were not released. Belgian judicial authorities said that 31 of the identified bodies were taken to a hospital mortuary in nearby Brugge. Of the bodies recovered, about two-thirds were identified, they said.

About 340 people are believed to have survived the March 6 disaster.

The ferry owner, Townsend Thoresen Co., originally said 409 had escaped, but Belgian and British police determined that some survivors had been counted twice. The ferry had been en route to Dover, England.

The divers were aboard the mull-docked ferry for 18 hours from Tuesday evening until Wednesday evening, with only one break.

Soviet space linkup held up

MOSCOW (AP) — An unmanned spacecraft made contact with the orbiting space station Mir on Thursday, but technical problems prevented completion of the linkup, the official Tass news agency said.

Tass said the two space vehicles had a mechanical grip on each other but were not docked. It was the second attempt to dock the module with the space station.

"All of a few centimeters remain in order for the module and the orbital complex to be actually docked," the report said.

A rod from the module Kvant stuck after making its way nearly 15 inches into a dock of the space station, and efforts by the two cosmonauts on board Mir to inspect the docking area also failed, Tass said.

The report, the second issued Thursday on the situation, provided no other details but said specialists were trying to find a solution.

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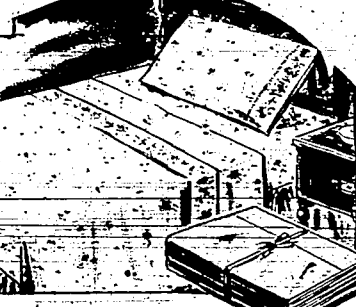
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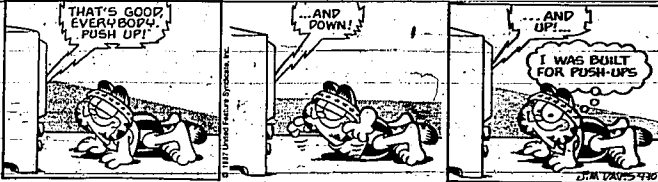
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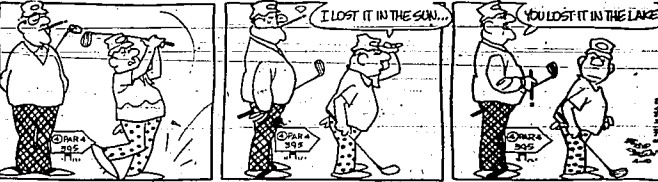

Reagan sees high tech help

WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. (AP) — President Reagan predicted Thursday that high technology will provide millions of jobs and... American jobs that are not being filled by it.

Speaking to students and faculty at Purdue University, Reagan, pressing his campaign to improve American competitiveness, said the nation had adjusted well to the recent economic changes in which other industries sometimes gave way to newer.

Noting that about 113 million Americans are working, Baker said, "Technology is not the enemy of job creation but its parent... the very source of our economic dynamism and creativity."

Reagan was buoyed by an enthusiastic reception by hundreds of people at Purdue University Airport, and said the crowd made him feel "three inches taller."

He made a short speech, then walked over and shook hands and visited briefly with young people, mostly college students, standing behind the ropes.

Trade problem still knotty

WASHINGTON (AP) — Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III told finance ministers Thursday that current trade imbalances "simply are not sustainable," but officials of the world's major industrial powers seemed hard pressed for new ideas to deal with the problem.

Analysts suggested it unlikely that any new strategies on either the trade or international debt front would emerge at least until the heads-of-state economic summit in Venice in early June.

A seven-nation currency stabilization accord reached the day before to help ease some of those imbalances appeared to be producing the reverse effect on currency markets of what had been intended.

Despite that accord, the dollar dipped on Thursday on Tokyo, London and New York markets.

Airlines scheduling scored

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Transportation Department on Thursday scored two airlines of deceptive scheduling at the Atlanta airport and said it was expanding its probe into airline scheduling practices at three other busy airports.

The department, which began its investigation of scheduling at Atlanta's Hartsfield International Airport several months ago because of airline delays, said it has tentatively found Delta Air Lines and Eastern Airlines engaging in "unrealistic" scheduling that is "deceptive and unfair" to air travelers.

The department gave the airlines until May 11 to respond to the preliminary findings. If flight scheduling by the two airlines is not changed, enforcement actions could amount to as much as a \$1,000 fine for each violation, the department said.

Eastern spokesman James Ashlock said, "we categorically deny any inference that there's anything unfair or deceptive about our scheduling." Delta issued a statement in Atlanta, also denying the allegations, and saying the DOT's action is "a misguided effort to shift responsibility for the delays away from the government's failure to staff and maintain an adequate air traffic control system."

FAA officials under attack

WASHINGTON (AP) — Top Federal Aviation Administration officials came under attack Thursday for an increasing number of reported near-collisions involving commercial aircraft and other problems with the air traffic control system.

"The number of reported incidents, especially those involving controller ... errors, has increased significantly during the past three years," Jim Burnett, chairman of the National Transportation Safety Board, told a House investigations subcommittee.

FAA Administrator James Easton told the House subcommittee that the agency officials "remain concerned" about the threat of mid-air collisions, "as well as so-called 'runway incursions' in which hazardous conditions develop at busy airports."

Last year, there were 856 reports of near-collisions in the air and another 497 incidents on airport runways and taxiways, both increases over previous years.

Plane's fast turn injures pair

WOODBURY, N.J. (AP) — A flight attendant and a passenger aboard a commuter airplane were injured Thursday when the pilot made a sharp right turn to avoid a military transport jet, officials said Thursday.

The incident occurred about 8:45 a.m. EDT Wednesday about six miles northeast of McGuire Air Force Base in southern New Jersey, base spokesman Lt. Michael Muri said.

The pilot of the Fair Air Express commuter plane said Air Force controllers did not report that radar showed two planes in the area, Pan Am spokesman Alan Loftin said.

The National Transportation Safety Board, the Federal Aviation Administration and Air Force officials, as well as Pan Am, were investigating.

FAA spokesman Fred Farrar said it was not immediately known how close the two aircraft came, but preliminary information indicates the pilot of the commuter plane made a right turn to avoid the military jet.

Floodwaters fall, loss figures climb

Floodwaters receded slowly in the Northeast while damage estimates soared past \$114 million Thursday, with Maine health officials warning that raw sewage may expose rescue workers to disease and the National Guard on patrol in Lawrence, Mass., after a man shot at suspected looters.

President Reagan declared seven of Maine's 16 counties a disaster area Thursday because of flooding, which has left treatment plants pumping raw sewage into the water.

"The flooding of the last week has caused much heartache for the people throughout the state," said Gov. John R. McKernan on Thursday. "I know that this presidential declaration is the first step toward helping Maine people put their lives back together."

Officials in Maine estimated damage at \$63 million, while in Massachusetts state Secretary of Public Safety Charles Berry said there may be \$50 million damage in Massachusetts because of flooding.

Floodwaters receded slowly in most areas, the National Weather Service said Thursday, although flood warnings remained in effect in Billerica, Mass., Civil Defense Director John Riel said it may be nearly two weeks before all 35 evacuated families can return home.

The Concord goes down just as slowly as it goes up," said Riel. "No body is going to pull the plug the minute we say it's created."

Flood warnings were issued for creeks and rivers in southern Ohio and in West Virginia, with major flooding expected Friday on the Clinch River in Virginia.

In upstate New York, divers found another car when they entered the murky waters of Scholarie Creek for the first time since a New York Thruway bridge collapsed Sunday. Three bodies have been recovered so far and seven others are missing. The bridge has valued at \$1.6 million.

In Pittsfield, Mass., the body of an Episcopal priest was pulled from a reservoir, while officials in Concord said waters were still too high to search for a man missing since Monday.

In Lawrence, police arrested three people for looting evacuated homes, and Capt. Samuel Allano said Thursday there have been at least 15 reports of looting since the weekend.

The National Guard sent 30 military policemen to help patrol an evacuated area a quarter-mile in diameter.

"They are taking advantage of it," said resident Miguel Torres of the looters.

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Deputy given help in wake of 'tag' death

RANCHO CUCAMONGA, Calif. (AP) — An anguished deputy sheriff was taken off duty and counseled Thursday after fatally shooting a teen-ager who was using a toy laser gun in mock combat with friends in a dark schoolyard.

The unidentified six-year veteran of the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department had been called to Central Elementary School at 10 p.m. Tuesday after a passer-by walking a dog reported armed prowlers.

The sheriff's spokesman Jim Bryant said Thursday, Leonard Joseph Falcon, 19, who had been playing Lazer Tag with three friends, was shot to death after he fired a flashes of light from the toy gun at deputies, Bryant said.

He died of two 12-gauge shotgun wounds, coroner's investigators said.

"This kid was in the game and that this officer coming around the corner was one of his opponents," Bryant said.

He said Falcon's eyesight may have been hampered by the darkness. "I agonize for that family," said Bryant, "but I also agonize for the deputy involved because I know he's a compassionate human being at a good citizen."

He said witnesses reported seeing the deputy sitting on a curb weeping after the shooting.

The dead youth was also "a good, solid citizen," a Chaffey Community College student who was studying electronics and worked at a fast-food restaurant, Bryant said.

One participant in the game, Ronald Gross, 20, said Falcon, "one of my best friends," had bought the Lazer Tag set only last weekend.

Church funds used to seek Hahn silence

ROANOKE, Va. (AP) — Former PTL leader Jim Bakker used ministry funds to buy the silence of a woman with whom he had a sexual encounter in 1980 and to avoid a potentially destructive scandal, according to a report published Thursday.

The television ministry paid the money because it was "a sensitive time in the financial life of PTL," lawyer Norman Roy Grutman told the Roanoke Times & World-News from his Greenbelt, Conn., home.

In 1979, The Charlotte Observer reported that Bakker raised about \$350,000 for programs in South Korea, Brazil and Cyprus, but used the money to pay bills at home, including the costs of building Heritage USA, a Christian theme park.

The story prompted an inquiry by the Federal Communications Commission, which regulates television stations. It was dropped in 1983 when the Justice Department said there was insufficient evidence to warrant further investigation.

Although Grutman refused to disclose the amount paid to Jessica Hahn and her emissary, he described it as a justifiable attempt to avert a lawsuit.

The PTL needed to "protect its own image," said Grutman, who is general counsel for PTL.

PTL agreed to pay \$255,000, including a \$150,000 trust fund for Ms. Hahn, a former church secretary from New York who was 21 when she met Bakker at a Florida hotel in December 1980, according to Paul Roper, who represented Ms. Hahn.

Shareholders favor shorter watering season

Prefer a full water allotment

SHOSHONE — Most of the shareholders who attended a meeting of the B. Wood Canal Co. Thursday night said they preferred a full allotment of water for a shorter period, rather than a reduced allotment for a longer time.

The shareholders favored the 100-percent allotment by a vote of 23-14. The canal company will also hear shareholders views at a meeting at the Senior Citizens Center in Richfield at 7:30 p.m. Friday. Then it will be up to the board to make a decision, said Richard Oneida, canal company manager.

Farmers here and elsewhere in the Magic Valley are facing water shortages this growing season because of below-normal snowpack runoff and a dry March and April.

The Idaho Snow Survey projects that the Big Wood River and Camas Creek will carry only 30 percent of the normal runoff for a Magic Valley year, which feeds the company's canal network.

Oneida presented the 70 shareholders attending the meeting at the Shoshone Sale Yard with two alternatives: One was to use an estimated 180,795 acre feet of water at 100-percent allotments between May 1 and August 19. This is a 109-day period. The other choice is to operate at an 80-percent allotment between May 1 and Sept. 17, a 137-day period.

If we don't have 100 percent, it will be hard to irrigate the ditches up-northward of the Haysler, who lives north of Shoshone.

Haysler said there would be the same loss of water due to seepage if 80 percent is delivered. "So why not deliver 100 percent?" he asked.

Sen. Astle of Dietrich agreed. He said he would like to have 100 percent and he would like to have it earlier than May 1.

"Otherwise you'll have 45 acres of sand in the canals. I wonder what kind of grain crop I can grow without 100 percent," Astle said.

Gary Bowman of Dietrich said he would like to have 80 percent and the longer irrigation period, noting that the sandy soil in his area requires more water than the heavier soil in Richfield and Shoshone.

A number of farmers acknowledged that using 100 percent and having a shorter irrigation season would hurt potato growers.

But those with hay crops said they need the full allotment and they needed it as early as possible.

The shareholders and the canal company managers also discussed the possibility of shutting off the water flow for a period if there is a good rain.

Another suggestion, from Glen Richfield, was to urge the head ditch-riders who control the head gates to shareholders' fields to be more careful about locking the gates. Unlocked gates waste water, Oneida said.

He said that if the canal system, which serves 300 farmers and ranchers, is to be shut off for a period, there would have to be a substantial financial stake to fill the canals with water.

Farm Hotline, its funding deleted, seeks help to keep going

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho Family Farm Hotline, which has extended a helping hand to troubled farmers for almost 2 years, is now itself going out, but in hand, for operating money.

The Idaho Legislature cut the hotline's \$15,000 appropriation from the state budget last week, leaving it without any funding. Idaho Director of Agriculture Dick Rush must decide by July 1 whether to keep the free phone ringing. "We haven't made a final decision on it yet," he said this week.

The hotline most likely will survive in some form. "We're going to try to find every way we can just to keep some kind of minimal hotline-referral program going," Rush said.

The phone, so far, has operated on about \$37,000 worth of grants and donations. Agencies such as Farm Aid, the Idaho AFL-CIO and the state's Division of Vocational Education contributed large amounts. But

with money dwindling, Rush also had to get special permission from Washington to take \$10,000 from a rural rehabilitation loan program overseen by the U.S. Farmers Home Administration.

"We're stretching it pretty hard to make it through this fiscal year (June 30)," he said.

The hotline's phone bill, staffing costs and other expenses soon will use up that funding, forcing the department to look for new money. Next week department officials will begin seeking a new round of grants.

The money will be critical to continued operations, said Rick Phillips, Rush's assistant and head of the program. At the same time, the state department is sounding out the depth of support for the hotline among the farm community.

"Dick (Rush) and I are totally convinced we need a hotline, but we don't know if we're speaking for the agricultural industry," Phillips said.

Depending upon the funding and the industry's comments, the hotline may face a different future.

It now operates under Phillips' direction with one part-time staff member, former rancher Dan Christian, and miscellaneous department help. His primary job is to take phone calls from farmers and refer them to professionals — or, in some cases, trained volunteers — who can help with their problems.

Since opening in June 1985, the hotline has handled 545 cases requiring specific aid and several times that number of simple-phone inquiries, Christian said.

Supporters who sought the hotline 2 years ago say they are convinced a hotline still is necessary. But, they differ on some operations.

Some say paying for a toll-free 800 number is too expensive. It could be run from volunteers' homes, said Dick Parrott, a Twin Falls area farmer and head of the hotline's

original staff of volunteers. "We would take the money they spent on this thing and run it for 6 years," he said. "There's a lot of people that would be happy to do it, if they just had the money to call them (farmers) back."

The system also would put callers in contact immediately with farmers who understand their plight and are equipped to offer advice, he said.

The farmer-to-farmer help that originated with Phillips is disappearing, he said. Susan Westendorf of Shoshone, a trained counselor who has been instrumental in the Southern Idaho Family Farm Hotline, agreed. "My opinion is the state should fund a sort of telephone hotline to run a hotline and pay those volunteer farmers some small wage for their time and knowledge to give a chance for farmers to help other farmers."

Volunteers could spend the time to evaluate a family's needs and help them actively, she said. "The hotline would then become an advocate for the family."

The state hotline does not give direct advice, but does steer farmers to counselors who can provide help, Christian said. One advantage of the current hotline is that it is available on regular hours and can refer quickly.

With large numbers of farmers still facing financial problems, a hotline remains essential, said Gene Myers, a well-known Jerome farmers' advocate.

Phillips said the department probably would look first to its previous grant givers, such as Farm Aid, for hotline money. At the same time, officials will explore the role of the hotline and the way it should operate, he said.

The Idaho Family Farm Hotline is available at 1-800-257-3376.

The Southern Idaho Family Farm Hotline, which was run from her home, is "semi-active," Westendorf said. Although it responds to limited requests for help, it does not solicit calls any more.

TWIN FALLS — An education expert who has spent a lifetime in education, U of I professor Larry Quim said that the state should invest in education, not just in highways and other infrastructure.

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His executive officer and president are U of I professors. "I've been in education for 30 years," Quim said. "I've seen the state invest in highways and other infrastructure, but not in education."

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"B" average or better. An unprecedented seven students entered with perfect math scores on ACT college entrance exams. And students from Dietrich and Kamona are going to the University of Idaho.

He noted that students from those two towns contributed recently to developing a computer chip that can quickly make 2 million calculations — from satellites. That's like computing the school's entire library in milliseconds, he said.

"Times-News could use it," was blurted from the audience to laughter. Another newspaper, The New York Times, called U of I "one of the best buys in American education," he said, according to his reports.

"You don't usually get the chance to do that," he said. "Think goodness." Beyond those serious accomplishments, U of I has a student population of 15,000, ranking it the 11th biggest city in Idaho, behind Burley and Twin Falls.

Speakers at CSI give views on Constitution, impact on U.S. today

TWIN FALLS — Lawyers, a judge and a college professor gathered Thursday night to offer perspectives on the U.S. Constitution, while celebrating the document's 200th birthday next year.

An eclectic series of topics, ranging from the importance of jury trials, free speech to the fundamental states' rights issue of the federal government's authority to raise highway money to get higher state drinking ages.

District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt feared that jury trials, guaranteed three times in the Constitution, were falling out of public favor. Although not occurring so much in Twin Falls, Hurlbutt said he's noticed more people refusing to serve on juries, coming up with more excuses than he could simply not showing up when called.

But he urged people to support jury trials by serving on them. They offer public input into government and relief from governmental oppression that should not be lost, he said.

"The jury is truly one of the jewels in our crown of democracy," Hurlbutt said. He said the judicial branch is the most democratic branch of government because neither the governor nor the legislature asks the public daily to render decisions.

"That's what's done each and every day in our judicial system," Hurlbutt said. Hurlbutt spoke at "The U.S. Constitution — A Bicentennial Review" at the College of Southern Idaho, which attracted about 30 people for a night of eight commemorative events scheduled around Idaho. The Idaho Humanities Council and the Idaho Trial Lawyers Association organized these state-wide events as part of

the national constitutional celebration.

CSI professor Larry Quim spoke about freedom of speech as well as against other rights to due process of law. He said "porno shops and other undesirable manifestations of speech" are allowed in exchange for the right to express an opinion without fear of retaliation.

"We allow naughty speech because we understand what every small child understands, that sticks and stones can break my bones, but words will never hurt me," Quim said.

Change, not only in content but in its authors' intent, was central to discussing the "living" Constitution spanning the framework of U.S. government and two centuries of interpretation. For instance, the freedom of speech brought up by Quim was not included in the Constitution, but added in an amendment ratified 4 years after the Constitution was written.

After changes, the concerns are more or less the same. The extent of federal and state power has remained central from constitutional framers — in 1787 — to present, said local attorney Robert Payne.

The Constitution limited, as much as granted, federal power, said Payne, who illustrated the point by saying the First Amendment prohibits laws restricting free speech.

Payne and fellow attorney Mark Stubbs joined Hurlbutt and Quim for a question-and-answer forum after the speeches. Payne offered observations on the recent federal threat to withhold highway funds if Idaho's drinking age were not raised to 21, a classic conflict over states' rights versus federal power.

"Very little has changed," Payne said.

IPC road plan raises no environmental objections

TWIN FALLS — No environmental objections have been voiced to Idaho Power Company's plan to build a road to the Snake River and construction is expected to start in July.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency have no environmental objections to the plan, a spokesman for the U.S. Army Corps of

Engineers says. "There are some concerns among local history buffs about the effects of the road on an 1890s mining town, in Walla Walla, Wash. However, Gary Stone, who owns land where the town is located, told The Times-News, "I can't see where (the road) is going to affect the town so much."

The FWS said it knows of no environmental impacts that would pertain to environmental issues but EPA officials had the right to use the road, she said. The only environmental impact resources on the river were protected, said Lindsay Malesherfer, U.S. Corps of Engineers spokesman in Walla Walla, Wash. The Pacific Northwest Waterways Association also supported IPC's construction request, she said.

The Corps was taking public comment on the project until last Monday. There was one comment from one citizen, Malesherfer said. It did not project environmental issues but the right to use the road, she said. The only environmental impact

Survivors of a dead person can't sue for his pain — court

BOISE (AP) — Survivors of a dead person may not sue for pain and suffering by the deceased, the Idaho Supreme Court says.

The court on Thursday upheld a ruling by the district judge in Daniel Hurburt Jr. in-lawsuit filed in 1984 Twin Falls County traffic accident.

Bret Haley and Richard Vulk were fatally injured in the accident; Vulk surviving several hours.

Vulk's parents, Robert and Leona Vulk, sued Haley's parents. The Haley estate admitted responsibility for Vulk's death, leaving other issues to be resolved. Hurburt threw out the part of the suit alleging pain and suffering. The jury ruled against the Vulk's claim for loss of companionship, love and affection, court records show.

Records reveal that when Richard Vulk was 15, his parents alleged he was uncontrollable and surrendered custody. Vulk lived with another family from that time until his death, had no contact with his father and received no financial support from him, the court said.

The Supreme Court ruled that one cannot claim for damages for pain and suffering.

But the court ruled that Hurburt improperly awarded the Haley family \$23,445 in the case, including \$20,310 in legal fees. Hurburt concluded the lawsuit was frivolous or had no merit.

The Supreme Court said a father and son possess a unique relationship. Despite the temporary estrangement, it would be unusual case where a father's action in seeking damages for the loss of his son would be considered frivolous, the court said.

In another decision released Thursday, the Supreme Court upheld a 4th District Court ruling against Charles Brannon. Brannon tried to sue Twin Falls attorney Elliott F. Pike Jr. Brannon's attorney in a workmen's compensation case. The Supreme Court ruled that only the Industrial Commission may hear matters related to workmen's compensation disputes, not district court.

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HCA has takeover bid worth \$5 billion

NEW YORK (AP) — Hospital Corp. of America, the nation's biggest hospital management concern, Thursday, three investors have proposed acquiring the company in a deal that it estimated would cost them about \$5 billion.

The company said the group proposed in a letter-to-pay \$47.5 million for all of HCA's common stock. The company has about 82 million shares of common stock outstanding, according to HCA spokeswoman Mita Gaertner.

That would make the proposed stock acquisition worth about \$3.85 billion. In addition, she said the company has about \$1.2 billion in outstanding debt.

HCA said its management "does not believe that this proposal is in

the best interests of the HCA shareholders and friends to discuss the proposal with the HCA board of directors and respond in due course."

In composite trading on the New York Stock Exchange, HCA fell 1/4 share to \$38.12 1/2.

M. Gaertner said the company disclosed the proposal after the stock market closed.

HCA identified the bidders as Charles E. Miller, Richard E. Ragsdale and Richard L. Scott. Ms. Gaertner said Miller and Ragsdale are former officers of Republic Health Corp., a Dallas-based health care concern that was taken over in a leveraged buyout last year. Scott is a partner in a Dallas law firm.

It said the bidders told the com-

pany in their letter that they were "highly confident" they could arrange financing for the deal "based on discussions with several major financial institutions."

But the statement said the letter gave no indication that they had actually made arrangements to obtain the financing.

HCA was founded in 1968, and owns, manages or has consulting agreements with 408 hospitals with 75,594 beds in the United States and six other countries. Among those hospitals is Magic Valley Regional Medical Center.

It employs about 75,000 people in the United States, spokesman David McAdams said.

HCA posted a profit of \$174.6 million on revenue of \$4.83 billion in 1986.

Couple reported missing again

HOA, Kan. (AP) — A couple trapped in a snow-bonded car for 13 days were reported missing again Thursday after they failed to arrive at a relative's home following their release from a northwest Kansas hospital.

The Kansas Highway Patrol issued an all points search for Robert and Mrs. Obendorf on Wednesday.

The Obendorfs left Norton about 10:15 a.m. Wednesday for Iola, about 200 miles away in southeast Kansas, according to Bill Archard, a dispatcher at the patrol's Norton office.

A state trooper helped them later Wednesday at 7:25 p.m. when their car ran out of gas on Interstate 70. The patrol's search for the couple ended in the wrong direction and needed to turn around.

They haven't been seen or heard from since then, the trooper said.

"I figure they may have stayed at a hotel overnight. But I haven't heard a word from them, and I'm concerned," Georgia Roberts, Mrs. Obendorf's sister, said Thursday night.

A spokesman for the Norton hospital said Obendorf was to have been admitted to an Iola hospital upon his arrival for further treatment.

The couple was driving the same light-colored Chevrolet in which they were stranded in the weeks by roof-high snowdrifts, surviving on Girl Scout cookies and diet soda.

They had been traveling to Iola when Mrs. Obendorf took a wrong turn and their car became stuck in a ditch near Norton on March 27. They endured blizzards before a farmer clearing snow rescued them last Saturday.

Plane missing for 38 years discovered in wilderness

LEWISTON (AP) — An airplane that disappeared in 1948 carrying prominent Lewiston businessman Joe Rosenkranz and another Lewiston resident has been found in the Selway Bitterroot Wilderness, ending years-long speculation that the Selway wilderness.

The maroon Stinson plane disappeared Oct. 24, 1948, after Rosenkranz and W.J. Bolick took off from the Moose Creek Ranches in the Selway wilderness. Their skeletal remains were found at the crash site.

Rosenkranz, the plane's owner and pilot, was attempting to fly west to Lewiston in the waning minutes of daylight and before a major storm arrived.

The plane was reported missing two days later. Hunters in the area reported hearing the plane navigating the Selway River's twisted canyon after that. Others reported seeing the plane crash.

A search was conducted by more than two dozen military and civilian aircraft, but the plane was not sighted. Searchers believed the plane was buried by snow, search records show.

A man searching for elk and deer aners found the plane Monday, Idaho County Sheriff Randy Baldwin located the wreckage Wednesday.

"It was a pretty tremendous crash," Baldwin said.

Lack of proof that the plane had crashed prompted a deluge of rumors about a possible hijacking of the plane.

"There's been so many stories it's pitiful," said Delbert Dox, a former Forest Service worker who participated in the plane search.

"It's something that I've been hoping for years — that I'd live long enough to see it found, because I was so closely involved in it," Cox said.

Rosenkranz was a prominent rancher and vice president of Empire Air Lines. Bolick was an electrician.

Rosenkranz had been campaigning for the state Legislature, and was elected to the House Nov. 4, 11 days after his disappearance.

He was declared dead Dec. 3. Baldwin said he's notifying relatives of the two men to inform them the wreckage has been found.

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Cook crowds field at Masters

AUGUSTA, Ga. — Everything was green at Augusta National Golf Club Thursday except for the greens, some of which were so thirsty for water they were turning blue.

That also was the color of much of the language used by the players, few of whom could finesse their shots to hold on the rock-solid greens during the first round of the Masters.

"These greens are harder than Chinese arithmetic," Lee Trevino had said after a practice round Wednesday. On Thursday, he shot 69. Nine other players shot as high or

worse.

The most exasperated player was Scotland's Sandy Lyle, who hit all 18 greens with his approach shots Thursday but watched with increasing aggravation as his ball bounced off nine of them. He shot 77.

It was bump-and-run golf.

"I've never putted on greens like these," said John Cook. "I was trying to lag some four-footers."

Cook didn't hit many greens in regulation but scrambled into the lead at 3 under par and one shot ahead of Augusta's own Larry Mize. They had the advantage of feeling off Thursday morning, before the sun and wind dried out the greens and made them play like sidewalks.

"They'll get their tomorrow (Friday), when they have to tee off in the afternoon," said Greg Norman, who shot 73.

Of the 85 players, only 13 shot par or better. Among those at 71 are former champions Tom Watson and Bernhard Langer, and this year's leading money winner on the Professional Golfers' Association tour, Corey Pavin.

Also at 71 are Calvin Peete, Payne Stewart and Curtis Strange.

Last year's champion, Jack Nicklaus, began defense of his title with a bogey on the first hole.

"I hit the worst tee shot I've ever hit on the first hole," he said.

But he birdied the second hole and

was under through 11 before playing the next two holes at 3-over and finishing with a 74.

From a historical standpoint, that's not a bad place to be. He also shot 74 in the first round last year, when he won his sixth Masters.

"Relative to the field, I think it's a better score," said Nicklaus, who in 1986 was six shots behind the first-round leader, Ken Green.

Nicklaus said that he couldn't remember the greens being so firm and so fast at Augusta since 1966.

"I had set the course record in 1965," he said of his 17-under 271. On-Lay Floyd in 1976 has shot as well here since.

"We knew they wouldn't let us

shoot for the record again." The greens were very, very firm that year. We had the same problem keeping the ball around the cup."

That was the year Miller Barber said that chipping from the lush grass around the fringe onto the greens was "like hitting from a hay field onto the highway."

Nicklaus won again in 1966 but with a score 12 strokes higher than the previous year's, an even-par 280.

The positioning of the Jerome boys easily took advantage of a quartering west wind to hydrofoil the discus paid off with a career best by Tiger Kevin Pedrow, who hit a 147.6 effort. Murtaugh's Steve Andersen also benefited with a 139.3 throw.

As expected the Jerome boys easily corralled the two relay finals, taking the two-mile in 9:04.4 by a wide margin in the 800 in 1:33.4.

"I was pretty pleased with that 800 relay time, considering the time of year and the weather conditions," said Jerome boys' Coach Tim Dunne.

The long distances also went to Jerome athletes with Glenn Leavitt winging the boys side with a 10:29 time and Laura Jensen besting the girls in 12:00.9. Nancy Stevens of Buhl sailed 174 to win the long jump and Dana Vogel of Jerome was the shot put tilts at 32.7.

Judge stiffens Gooden probation terms

TAMPA, Fla. — A judge approved stricter terms of probation for Dwight Gooden on Thursday, ordering the New York Mets pitcher, who fought with Tampa police four months ago to submit to random testing after completing a drug rehabilitation program.

Meanwhile, the chief assistant state attorney said the prosecution's involvement with cocaine came as no surprise to some law enforcement people.

"I know a lot of people in the community, including the law enforcement community, who have been concerned about his welfare for a couple of years," said Chris Hoyer.

He told Sports Illustrated that surveillance reports saying that Gooden had visited a notorious "drug bar" had been sent to Commissioner Peter Ueberroth's office.

Ueberroth, in Los Angeles for the Dodgers' home-opening game against San Francisco, withheld comment on the report until he had a chance to read it, according to Rich Levin, director of news for the commissioner's office.

Gooden's probation, which was toughened Thursday, stemmed from his arrest on Dec. 15 when he and



four companions scuffled with officers after a traffic stop. The 22-year-old pitcher pleaded no contest to battery on an officer and resisting arrest with violence and was sentenced Jan. 23 to three years probation. Hoyer prosecuted the case.

Last week, the baseball player's off-the-field problems put him in the headlines again when urinalysis administered by the Mets revealed Gooden had used cocaine.

Hillsborough Circuit Judge John P. Griffin had the power to revoke Gooden's probation and send the pitcher to jail for as long as five years.

Instead, he approved the request for random drug testing sought by corrections officials and Gooden's attorney, Charles W. Ehrlich.

"I think they have shown a willingness to be concerned for what's good for the individual here, not just strictly punish the person, by allowing him to have this treatment," Ehrlich said.

Gooden, who had been scheduled to be the Mets' opening-day pitcher earlier this week, entered the Smithers Alcoholism and Treatment Center in New York on April 2.

Erio Alvarez, senior circuit administrator for Florida's Probation and Parole Services in Tampa, said the pitcher probably would be tested twice a month for drugs once he completes rehabilitation.

Alvarez called the testing provision "an opportunity for Mr. Gooden to get himself turned around and still comply with conditions of the probation."

"We haven't talked to him directly since he's been in the treatment program," Alvarez added. "But he did talk to the probation officer when the news was initially breaking and seemed very concerned about it and aware of what his options are."

Hoyer said the prosecutor's office voiced no opposition to stricter terms of probation instead jail time.

"There's no reason to quarrel with the recommendation," Hoyer said. "I think under the circumstances that Mr. Gooden should be given another chance, one chance."

He's bigger than life to a lot of people, and right now he's another patient," Hoyer added. "And if he screws up one more time, he'll just be another prisoner. But I think what they've done is right."

Hoyer was quoted in the April 13 issue of SI as saying that Gooden had been listed on Hillsborough Sheriff office surveillance reports as having visited a bar in Ybor City known as a drug hangout. He said he believed that Ueberroth's office had shared the information with the Mets.

Gooden, who won the Cy Young Award in 1985 with a 24-4 record and 1.53 earned run average, was 17-6 last year with a 2.84 ERA. The Mets have said he could miss as much as two months of the 1987 season while undergoing treatment.

Ehrlich said he plans to go to New York Sunday or Monday to talk with Gooden. He said the Mets pitcher was aware that "the resolution of drug use could have meant a jail term for him."

"He was pretty distraught about the entire situation and was prepared to do anything that probation, parole or the courts felt was necessary, and he is cooperating fully to the extent he can," the attorney said. "He realizes he has a problem that has to be dealt with, and that's what he's doing."

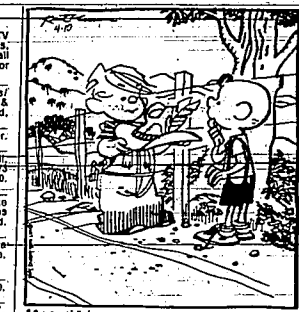

Today's game rests with which South stays at trick two. If he doesn't start the clubs immediately, West will be too late for them to be of help.

South took his spade ace and carelessly led the trump king. West won and led another spade, and the game fell beyond reach. Dummy's spade king won and the remaining trumps were drawn, but there was no way to avoid the loss of one trick in each suit.

When dummy appears, a brief study will tell South that the only avoidable loser is in the spade suit. Why can this loser go? The most reasonable answer is on the club suit. But that's not all. There is also the matter of vital entries.

Dummy's spade king should win the first trick and the club king should follow. West ducks and another club goes to South's queen and West's ace. (Note the importance of playing dummy's spade king at trick one.)

West continues the attack in spades, but South wins and cashes his club jack to discard dummy's last spade. South's last spade is ruffed with dummy's trump 10, and now it's safe to lead trumps.

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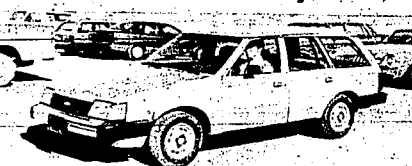

Allen Vizzutti: Man with horn is one to watch

TWIN FALLS — Trumpet player Allen Vizzutti, who will be featured in the Magic Valley Symphony's Pops Concert on May 1, is in the midst of a career in music that has taken him all over the globe and into the elite world of the rich and famous.

Vizzutti has played frequently with Doc Severinsen's Tonight Show Band and has toured and recorded with Chuck Mangione, Chick Corea and Woody Herman. He has performed on albums by Barbra Streisand, Frank Sinatra and the Commodores and has recorded music for hundreds of movies and television shows.

Vizzutti has acted as producer for several of Doc Severinsen's albums, including the Grammy award-winning The Tonight Show Band, featuring Doc Severinsen.

His own albums reflect his varied tastes, ranging from jazz, pop, classical and rock sounds. "Vizzutti, Red Metal" on Bainbridge Records is jazz fusion, combining elements of rock and jazz.

He has performed in 30 countries and his albums are sold around the world.

Yet all this success has done little to rattle the down-to-earth composer and realistic outlook of a country boy from Missoula, Mont., whose father was his first music teacher.

When he moved in 1978 to music capital Los Angeles, he didn't know that his friend and colleague, Doc Severinsen, had made a few well-placed phone calls on his behalf. Vizzutti's phone started ringing with requests for his talents to be used in television, movies, cartoons and commercials.

"The phone rings and they say 'Can you be at Universal Studios at 10 o'clock on Wednesday?'" Vizzutti said. "You say yes or no. That's all they want. You don't know what the music is, how difficult or how easy."

He had to be prepared to perform whatever music was put in front of him with only one or two run-throughs.

Connections gave him an opening in Hollywood, but he knew the rest was up to him.

"When you pick up your horn and play, if you come through with the goods, give them what they need, they ask you back."

"I'd love to write for film some time," he said. Young writers often break into the genre by ghost-writing for well-known composers who are over-committed. Vizzutti said that it is less common for people who have been successful in the record business to be asked to write for films, though some, like Mangione and Maynard Ferguson, have done so successfully.

"Because they're successful artists, filmmakers want to use them," he said with an optimistic grin. "I'm hoping someday that I'll get a crack at a film that way."

His work in Los Angeles has brought him in contact with superstars and great talents.

"There are certain people I've been around that have really impressed me," he said. "Like Shirley MacLaine and Streisand. When you think back—the movies and the dancing and the awards and everything they've done. It's just incredible."

He seems to take it in stride.

"I'll say good morning to Robert Wagner in the hall at Universal Studios," he says.

But he's quick to explain that he keeps it all in perspective. "If I can be ego-less about success and failure, then I can enjoy my ego in terms of getting it give me the energy and creativity to continue. Ego isn't conceit; it's a force you can use."

Like when he walked out into the center of the field at the Rose Bowl to play for 100,000 people.

"At that moment," he said, "you've got to be saying to yourself, 'You're one of the greatest in the world... go for it... bang.' Or (like a boxer) you'll be out in one round."

Working as a record producer has given Vizzutti another slant on the business.

"Production means the logistical hassles, like budgeting and finding the right people and the right studio," he said. "Then you have to be the ears that hear if it's played correctly so that everything... sounds right."

Sometimes you have to be the bad guy and tell Doc Severinsen, "You have to do it again."

"I was with Chick Corea. He had four violins on stage and I was afraid a violin would get hit. It was the first time I'd seen them do the thing with

"I've run into some really good musicians in small towns — people who could be successful anywhere they want. But they like it where they are."

Twin Falls, Vizzutti said, "is remarkably cultured for the size of the city. Having spent a lot of time here over the last year and a half, I've noticed that. There's more going on here than in cities five times as big."



TOKYO - To the Yasuda Fire & Marine Insurance Co., the auction of Vincent van Gogh's painting "Sunflowers at Christies in London was "a never-again" opportunity. That is why the company paid a record \$39.85 million for it, a spokesman said here Thursday.
Yasuda, Japan's second largest non-life insurance company, was not identified as the buyer "March 30. But the company gave Christies' permission Wednesday to disclose its name in London after worldwide clamor developed over the mystery. It also issued a news release on the purchase here Thursday.
The price that Yasuda paid, more

than three times the highest previously paid for a painting at auction, does not herald the beginning of a new price spiral or competition in the world art markets by either Japanese in general, or Yasuda in particular, said Yoshio Kori, a section chief in the company's public-information department.
Rather, he said, it was a one-time phenomenon.
In Japan, Van Gogh's "Sunflowers" paintings are special, Kori said. The painting of dazzling yellow sunflowers in a vase have a fame that no other Van Gogh's indeed, no other Impressionist painting - enjoy, he said.

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Filmmaker: 'Sullivan's Pavilion' is a 'personal comic memoir'

SARANAC LAKE, N.Y. (AP) — He calls himself Adirondack Fred: dreamer, schemer, movie mogul of the mountains, a woodchuck Woody Allen.

Fred G. Sullivan is an independent filmmaker struggling to make it in the rough and rustic Adirondack Mountains, far from the glitz and glamour of the Hollywood Hills.

His first full-blown foray into feature filmmaking was "Gold River," the story of two children lost in the Adirondack wilderness. The film got mixed reviews as Sullivan peddled it to movie theaters around the country in 1981; he said the Baltimore Sun panned it as "the worst wilderness film of the year."

"Gold River," which was financed by private investors, lost \$1.2 million at the box office.

At the time, Sullivan was supporting a wife and four young children. They lived in a tiny, gray-shingled bungalow in a lakeside village 300 miles north of Manhattan.

"We were down to \$24 in the bank," he said in a recent interview. "And the world of movie-making wasn't exactly beating a path to my door."

He thought of taking other jobs — even considered becoming a lumberjack. But his celluloid fantasies beckoned. So he went back to his loyal backers and the local bank, and set out to make another movie.

The movie is called "Sullivan's Pavilion," an offbeat comedy about a struggling filmmaker in the Adirondacks who raises a family and tries to pursue the muse amid dirty diapers and pitchers of beer.

"A personal comic memoir is what I call it," he said.

Sullivan is a big, bearded, beanie-dwelling, toothed curls and a broad, disarming Irish smile. He dresses in classic L.L. Bean back country style: red suspenders, blue jeans, rubber boots.

The office and studios of his Adirondack Alliance Film Corp. are behind the papered-over windows of an old storefront on the dusty main drag of downtown Saranac Lake, between the post office

and the Back Door bar.

Sullivan grew up in Glens Falls, N.Y. He made a brief stab at law school before he decided to pursue a boyhood dream of making movies. For his master's thesis at Boston University in 1973, he came to Saranac Lake to make a wilderness documentary called "Of Rivers and Men." He and his wife, Polly, decided "the friendly, small-town atmosphere and scenic mountain surroundings were perfect for raising a family."

"Sullivan's Pavilion" is the life story of the filmmaker who refers to himself in the movie as "Fred G." "FGS" or "Adirondack Fred." The self-effacing comedy stars Sullivan, his wife and their four children, all playing themselves. There are also dozens of local residents and six professional actors who play other oddball characters.

The 85-minute film comes off as an elaborate home movie that veers crazily from scatological humor and overly beer-drinking to musings on the deep love of a parent for a child.

There are snippets from 8mm back yard epics Sullivan made when he was 12, film footage from Vietnam and scenes from the 1980 Winter Olympics at Lake Placid. Documentary segments are interwoven with many fantasy sequences and scenes from the sometimes chaotic, often poignantly sweet family life of the Sullivan brood.

"Saranac Lake isn't your typical jerkwater burg," says Fred in the movie.

"It's a 'B' like Vermont, before Vermont was discovered," says Polly.

"All of our children were born here," says Fred, "yet people keep asking, why Saranac Lake?"

Woody Allen's 'Radio Days' airs vignettes of our last innocent era

TWIN FALLS — Following are capsule reviews of movies currently playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

RADIO DAYS (PG) — Woody Allen's heartfelt, evocative film draws you close to it, just like that glowing radio dial. It seems buoyantly simple; narrator Allen sharing his prize stories from radio's Golden Age, and mostly it is vignettes. But it becomes a homage to life at either end of the rainbow and both sides of a radio dial during our last innocent era, the late '30s through 1944. The large cast, including Dianne Wiest and Mia Farrow, is sublime, making this one of the friendliest of the Allen canon.

BURGLAR (R) — Whoopi Goldberg's new movie, about the coolest of the San Francisco cat burglars, is a triple threat: a comedy that does not make you laugh, a mystery that does not make sense, and a thriller without any thrills.

The contributions of director Hugh Wilson and the writers could kindly be described as dubious, and most of the funny jokes are — from Bob Goldthwait — strangled-voice shtick can pull quickly.

CRIMES OF THE HEART (PG-13) — Excruciating: a combination of Beth Henley's insistently eccentric screenplay — based on her Pulitzer Prize-winning play — Bruce Beresford's frenzied direction and the sight of three singular talents (Diane Keaton, Jessica Lange and Sissy Spacek) playing three ditzy Southern sisters who reunite after years apart) on an acting roller coaster with no one riding the brakes. The resulting pure is one of the great crimes of the art.

HOOSIERS (R) — This film is as engaging as modest, as utterly American and as thrilling as the real-life story it is based on: the rise of a tiny town's high school basketball team to the Indiana state finals.

It also features some of the finest acting you could hope to see, by Gene Hackman as the coach with a dark past, Dennis Hopper as the alcoholic ex-hoops star, and Barbara Hershey as Hackman's initial adversary. The film has a few burrs (some plot elements feel grafted on, and the editing rhythms are not always right) but you can hate basketball and yet still have a sensational time at "Hoosiers."

LETHAL WEAPON (R) — For the first half here, when Mel Gibson and Danny Glover are sketching in their characters. This huddy buddy cop ticket — sales — and "Nightmare on Elm Street III" earned \$1.9 million in its sixth week.

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'Police Academy' top spot at box offices, without any previews

less crass

HOLLYWOOD — What is so amazing about the "Police Academy" movies is that they keep being made even though they stopped being funny after the hilarious original. We are now up to No. 4, and the most you can say for it is that it is the least bit better, not quite so crass as the last two.

"Police Academy 4: Citizens on Patrol" takes its subtitle from an idea of absent-minded Commandant Lassard (George Gaynes), to the era of Neighborhood Watch, the commandant thinks it would be a good thing to train citizens at the Police Academy to serve as auxiliary cops.

There might have been some comic possibilities in this, but writer Gene Quintano strays widely from the premise to toss out, hit-and-miss fashion, a series of pranks involving much slapstick humor and outlandish in-some-serial-foolery involving hot-air balloons and a pair of ancient biplanes. Unfortunately, the film never takes flight itself.

Steve Guttenberg and all the other "Academy" regulars are on hand, including G.W. Bailey as the humorless, applepie-Capt. Harris and Bobcat Goldthwait with his patented routine of googly-eyed angst. (What fun it might be to see Goldthwait, a comedian clearly on the way up, directed by someone whose talent is as offbeat as his is — Jim Jarmusch, or John Waters, for example.)

Director Jim Drake is at least brisk and amiable; if nothing else, "Police Academy 4" (rated PG) is good-natured and does not drag.

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Those wacky guys and gals of "Police Academy" are back on the beat, collecting an arresting \$8.5 million in ticket sales last weekend to make it the top box office draw.

"Police Academy 4" opened without any previews for critics, so the popularity of the first three installments rather than reviews brought moviegoers back for more.

Moonlighting — from his television series didn't hurt Bruce Willis, whose first feature film, "Blind Date," was the second choice of movie audiences. The film took in \$5.7 million in its second weekend and has earned \$15 million so far.

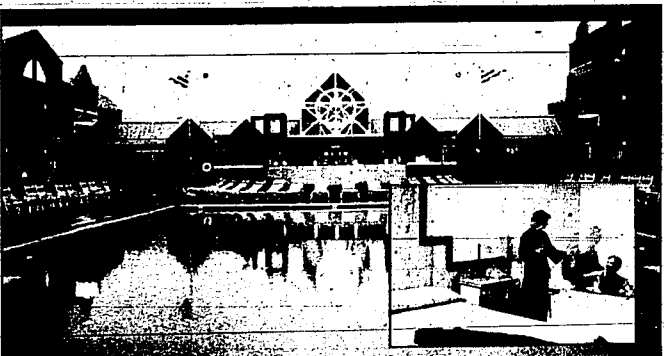
The Academy Awards gave a boost to "Platoon," recipient of four Oscars, including best picture.

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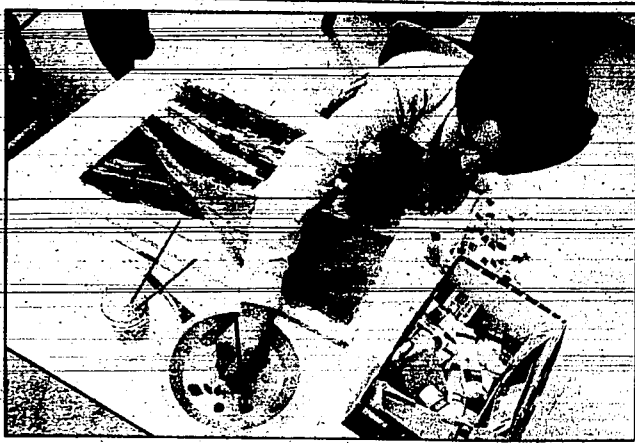

Klee at MOMA draws long lines

NEW YORK — "Art is the equivalent in American society to what the appendix is in the human body," said Alfred Steiglitz in 1916. Today, judging by the lines for the Paul Klee exhibition at the Museum of Modern Art, art has become a less expendable organ, maybe the adrenal glands.

Anyone who has liked modern art since it was an esoteric pursuit suited only to weirdos and miffers in black turtle-necks is bound to be heartened by what appears to be a quantum leap in its general appreciation. At the same time, the devotee misses his sense of being privy to cabalistic secrets and trailing serenely empty galleries for hordes of citizens in a ruminative conga line.

Oh well, tempus fugit or something. Besides, this time all those festal bodies turn out to harbor mute wisdom casting light on the art itself.

Wait a minute. Why is anybody doing a Paul Klee show now? Of all the great modernist innovators, he is first they were ink drawings, so among the most beloved. Even people who still don't understand Edvard Munch or the abstract work of Piet Mondrian, he is also a grotty classic and fixed get a kick out of his female nude leaning on a skull-top-witily titled "The Twittering Machine." But it is neither the anniversary of his birth in 1879 nor of his death in 1940, so why has the Modern organized this 300-work show leading the view to May 31 along with the work grew out of Klee's youthful-Kunstmuseum in Bern and the left-wing political convictions, Foundation? According to Carl Lancher, MOMA's curator of painting and sculpture, the idea is to clear up "a tendency critical as well as popular, to see his work as peripheral to the mainstream of 20th-Century art."

Is that what we thought? Sometimes when museums tell us that they are out to straighten out our thinking we wind up feeling they are really up-to-straightening-out their own.

As long as anyone can remember, Paul Klee has played the role of the Tinkerbell of modern art, a tiny magical presence who made small glowing abstract watercolors. Listening to Buddy Rich paid royal dividends

The king of the big-band drummers left us last week. Let's have a moment of silence for Buddy Rich.

Without doubt the passing of Buddy Rich has left a great void in the hearts of hundreds of musicians and thousands of jazz enthusiasts. I count myself among them. I was one of those fortunate people who, living in the right place at the right time, was able to catch the last years of the Big Band Era. Reno, Nev. In the 1950s served as an oasis for almost all the big bands including Count Basie, Duke Ellington, Woody Herman, Stan Kenton and Harry James. I was in college and ran with a gang of fellow jazz buffs. Many was the night that we hung out till the wee hours of the morning to catch the sounds of one of those groups.

But when Harry James, the legendary jazz trumpeter, came to town we were especially thrilled. Why? Because Buddy Rich was Harry's drummer and Rich was just no way we were going to miss that combination.

When Rich played behind a band something truly "magic" happened. Not that other drummers weren't equally good. Certainly Jake Hanna and Louis Bellson were among the best of the best. But there was just something about the way that Buddy laid down time and rhythm that made the bands he played with sound fantastic. And when he soloed

You were always in for a real treat. Buddy's mastery of his instrument was so great that he could play an entire solo on the snare drum or even the cymbals and create the most exciting, surprising and musical sounds.

One can always tell when a soloist is special by simply looking at the musicians who Buddy worked with always seemed to delight in his breaks. As New York studio drummer, Grady Tate, put it: "As for Buddy Rich, here is one drummer I would like to under any conditions — in total darkness, all by himself, no orchestra, nothing. This man is just a phenomenon."

Curiously, Rich did not build his record of countless accomplishments by advancing in a straight line. His career was an erratic one, marked by changes of direction and even by occasional threats never to play again.

Here's an overview: Buddy began working with Wilson and Rich, his parents' vaudeville act, when he was all of 18 months old. As a teen-ager in the '30s he was already making a name for himself playing for Joe Marsala's combo and Tommy Berigan's big band, 1938. Artie Shaw, '39; Tommy Dorsey, '39-41; 44-46 and '54-55; Marine Corps, '44-46; tours with Norman Granz's Jazz at the Philharmonic in the late '40s; Harry James, '53-54, '57 and '61-66. He also played with a variety of small groups on his own and even became a solo personality, a Sinatra-inspired

... In 1966 Rich struck out on his own again to form his own big band. Everyone thought he was crazy. It's hard to write music for a thing of the past," they warned. But Buddy made magic once again and produced one of the hottest, most exciting jazz bands of recent years. A Rich reminder: "They all laughed at Charles Gooden." I never had the pleasure of playing in a band with Buddy. Nonetheless, I feel that those magic moments spent listening to him paid today's royal dividends. For nearly 50 years I worked as a professional musician and was privileged to perform with some of the great giants of jazz including Louis Armstrong, Al Hurd, Carl Fontana, Doc Severinsen, Peggy Lee, Pearl Bailey and Louis Bellson, Ella Fitzgerald, Nancy Wilson, Sammy Davis Jr. and Mel Tormé.

So I say... Thank you Buddy Rich for your inspiration and fantastic jazz legacy. And may the Good Man upstairs bless you with the hottest big band in heaven. You deserve it, brother."

K49AZ's popular new Bingo show makes the score in Nielsen ratings

TWIN FALLS — It's 5:25 p.m. in the lone studio of K49AZ.

Trudy Young applies makeup, keeping an eye on the clock.

Seconds before broadcast, Young straightens her dress and puts on a smile. The taped opening revs up.

It's 5:30 p.m. TV Bingo is on the air. And, it just may be a hit.

Kris Harvey, manager of the low-power Twin-Falls station, says the signs of success are many.

Between 14,000 to 18,000 free bingo cards are distributed each week. Different sponsors say the distribution ranges from slow as syrup to fast as the perverblal hot cakes.

The daily show, along with some of the station's other programming, has found an audience, according to a Nielsen survey conducted in February. While the numbers aren't earth-shattering, compared to those for the network-affiliated KMVT,

Harvey is pleased. Bingo is up against CBS News on KMVT.

Low-power stations don't usually appear in Nielsens, she says. Her area station, in fact, is one of only four.

Harvey says there's no sign that the popularity of the program, which she boasts is the only locally produced live game show in the state, is waning.

The secret of Bingo's success, Harvey contemplates, is that it allows people to participate without having to leave their home.

Production and Program Director Tim Whaley, the station-skeptic about bingo, admits the response to the show is a constant amazement.

Evidence: when the station sponsored bingo at area malls, 200-300 people played.

Bingo winner Wilma Thompson of Kimberly loves to play, but she also loves all game shows. Young Jason Smith, who barely made the eligibility age limit, says his entire family plays.

"It's fun," Smith chortles. While K49AZ bingo has a long ways to go, the idea of a game show bealing out news isn't unique. In Boise, "Wheel of Fortune" beat two local news programs.

The idea for a TV bingo program was brought back by Harvey from a convention: Live participation shows are "in," she says.

When the show debuted in February, it caught on. Employee Jofflonwide to accomplish such a feat. Ring says the station received 40-50 telephone calls a night. That's the onslaught of more telephone calls by allowing the hosts to call more numbers.

While some may argue the production looks amateurish with its staid camera work and garish balloons above the bingo board, Harvey says it's costly to produce. The station buys the prizes and purchases cards from a Littleton, Colo., company, from which it also bought \$2,000 worth of bingo equipment. In addition, seven to eight people a night are needed to make Bingo work.

Whaley admits earlier shows were "rough," plagued by audio and visual problems.



The hearings will be held April 28-30 in Washington by the telecommunications, consumer protection and finance subcommittee of the House Energy and Commerce Committee.

Irving said the coming three-day session will be an "oversight" proceeding, and that the subcommittee chairman, Rep. Edward J. Markey, D-Mass, is not considering any new legislation that would affect broadcasting.

The hearings were announced a week after a member of Markey's subcommittee, Rep. Dennis E. Eckart, D-Ohio, urged that they be held, saying that "we are deeply concerned that with the rush to (network) profits, the public interest has been trampled."

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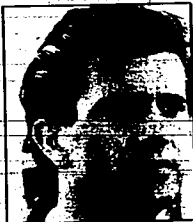

Last week's show gains in ratings for 'Moonlighting'

NEW YORK (AP) — For three years, he's leered and she's sneered, but fans of "Moonlighting" knew all along there was passion beneath the bickering, and a record 60 million of them tuned in to see that they were right.

According to ratings from the A.C. Nielsen Co., the ABC comedy detective show got its biggest audience ever for last Tuesday's episode, billed as, "No more between the lines. Tonight's between the sheets."

The typically top-10 show has averaged a 34 share this season, but Tuesday's episode got a 29.5 rating and a 44 share.

The rating is a percentage of the nation's estimated 87.4 million homes equipped with television. The share is a percentage of the audience viewing during a particular time period.

In a recent storyline, Maddie, played by Cybill Shepherd, had been dating old flame Sam, played by Mark Harmon, while her detective partner David, played by Broce Willis, named, got drunk and trashed his office. Maddie had to choose between them when Sam proposed.

Just to build the tension Tuesday night, everybody stayed relatively

vertical for about 55 minutes into the hour-long episode. Then Maddie went home to tell Sam she couldn't marry him because of her feelings for David. She got into bed with Sam, but it turned out he had left, and David was sleeping in his place. Still no "horizontal," as David calls it, however. Maddie was furious because David wouldn't say the "L" word. He said he didn't have to. They cursed, they kissed, they robed on the floor, they hit the sheets. End of episode.

Next season, "Moonlighting" will have to contend with Miss Shepherd's real-life pregnancy. She is expecting twins in October, well into the series' fall shooting schedule.

Tuesday's episode was delayed by the show's erratic production schedule and the broken collarbone Willis suffered skiing. True to its penchant for making fun of itself, "Moonlighting" opened with old newsreel footage showing Americans climbing tall buildings to amuse themselves until the new episode was ready.

ABC's Maddie, David and Oscar lands last week's second place

NEW YORK (AP) — Ogling and Oscar were not enough to win the week for ABC in the Nielsens, but the network did get a lift out of last place for only the third time this season.

NBC won the week, its 25th win out of 28 weeks so far.

ABC got a boost from the Academy Awards show, even though it was the second-worst-rated Oscar show, and from a best-ever audience ever for a "Moonlighting" episode, fouted as the night that bickering defectives Maddie and David would finally get "between the sheets."

After Tuesday night's "Moonlighting," ABC had a 10-point rating advantage on NBC, said Gerald Janie, NBC vice president for research projects.

But when the numbers for the week ending April 3 were in, NBC had overtaken ABC with an average prime-time rating of 16.7 and a 26 share to ABC's 15.8 and 25. CBS had 15.2 and 24. NBC's season-to-date average rating is 17.9; CBS' is 16.0 and ABC's is 14.2.

The rating is a percentage of the nation's estimated 87.4 million homes with televisions. The share is a percentage of the audience viewing during a particular time period. ABC had five top-10 shows.

"Moonlighting" was 13rd. The Academy Awards show was fifth. "Growing Pains" was sixth. A Barbara Walters special that preceded the Oscars was ninth, and "Who's

the Boss?" was eighth.

As usual, NBC's "The Cosby Show" was the top-rated show of the week, with a 37.9 rating and 56 share. "Family Ties" was second, and "Cheers" was fourth.

CBS' only top-10 entry was "Murder, She Wrote" at seventh. NBC's "Golden Girls" was 10th.

CBS won in the news ratings, with an average rating of 12.8 and a 23 share to NBC's 12.4 and 22. ABC had a 10.9 and 19.

The networks are assessing the

performances of mid-season replacement shows to decide what ones will be put on the fall schedule.

NBC's "Rags to Riches" went from riches to rags, dropping to 46th in the rankings. The premiere of "Nothing in Common" was 14th, but it was in the strong "Cosby" lineup on Thursday. "Roomies" was in 50th place. The high-school drama "Bronx Zoo" was only 50th. The "Cheers" spinoff "The Tortellis" continued to do poorly at 51st.

ABC's "Max Headroom," a critically praised sci-fi drama, debuted after the boffo "Moonlighting" and was 25th. But the "The Charmings" was not charming audiences and was 53rd. The new prison drama "Mariah" was in dungeon territory at 55th.

"Still Crazy Like a Fox," a movie based on the canceled series, was 12th, improving the odds that CBS will bring the comedy detective series back next season.

CBS' cop show "Houston Knights" continued to hold strong at 38th. But the network's new comedies did not fare well. "The Popcorn Kid" was 57th, "Take Five" was 64th and "Roxie" was 65th.

The lowest-rated shows in the 70 rankings were, from the bottom: "Our World," "Jack & Mike," "Walter Cronkite at Large," "Wizard," "Destination America," "Roxie," "Take Five," "Cagney and Lacey," "Our House" and "Winter of Our Discontent."

Grant Tinker gets phone calls

CULVER, CITY, Calif. (AP) — When Grant Tinker talks, people listen — even if it's the middle of the night. That's when the former NBC chief remarked that he was looking for writers to help his new production group get started.

The day after his off-hand comment on CBS's "Nightwatch" last week, his switchboard was lighted like a beacon.

"We were thinking about changing the (telephone) number," Tinker said. "And that show was on in the middle of the night! I didn't think anybody was watching."

The new Grant Tinker Gannett Entertainment, known as GTG, will probably produce two or three sitcoms and one or two dramatic series for the 1988 CBS fall season, he said.

GTG has \$40 million to work with, a studio with 12 sound stages and an antebellum-style mansion here as headquarters. GTG's studio has in the past been been used by David O. Selznick to burn Atlanta in "Gone With the Wind" and by Orson Welles to make "Citizen Kane."

The mansion will be featured in the GTG logo, as it was in Selznick's.

Tinker has chosen such people as Jay Sandrich, Jack Clements and Stu Erwin Jr. to run the operation and describes himself as the "appreciator," the fellow who recognizes talent and tries to get it as cheaply as possible.

Tinker was responsible for such television hits as "Hill Street Blues," "The Mary Tyler Moore Show" and "Lou Grant." He resign-

ed as NBC's chairman last summer, but says he doesn't feel like a traitor by helping CBS.

"NBC is doing so well that there just is not enough potential business to do there," he said. "There are not only a lot of shows that are working and, therefore, less failure and replacement need."

"I also know something about what they've got on the shelf, and they've got a lot of good stuff in development."

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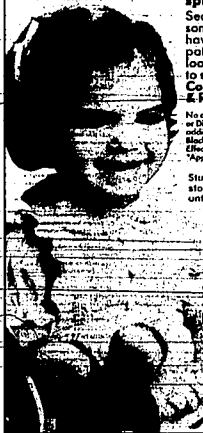

'Wild Kingdom' makes way for new adventure series

CHICAGO (AP) — "Wild Kingdom," the television show that for a quarter-century look Marlin Perkins in jungles, swamps and even a wrestling match with a giant snake, has joined some of its animal stars on the endangered species list.

Mutual of Omaha, the show's only sponsor, has decided to halt production of the syndicated program in favor of a new real-life adventure series aimed at a different market, officials said Wednesday.

Since the first "Mutual of Omaha's Wild Kingdom" was broadcast Jan. 6, 1963, the show has taken viewers on adventures in 50 countries and helped spark the animal rights and environmental movements. It won about 60 awards, including four Emmies.

"Most people in this country who are animal lovers were made so by the 'Wild Kingdom.' It is the sire of all the animal documentaries that are now on the tube," said J. Fred MacDonald, curator of the Museum of Broadcast Communications in Chicago and a professor at Northwestern Illinois University.

Three new episodes are being filmed this year — Nos. 327, 328 and 329 — and officials at Mutual of Omaha, based in Omaha, Neb., say the show won't be extinct because reruns will be broadcast over "Wild Kingdom's" syndication network of about 200 stations.

But company officials decided last year to halt production of new "Wild Kingdom" episodes in favor of a series called "The Spirit of Adventure," aimed at network television, said Len Tondt, executive vice president of public relations.

The new show is "the usual type of documentary and it's just not our style at all," said Don Meier, the Chicago producer who created "Wild Kingdom" with Perkins.

"Marlin was a guy who wanted to live the experience personally," Meier said.

Over 25 years, "Wild Kingdom" gripped television viewers — as Perkins, who served as host until he died in last June at age 81, narrated stories about encounters with wild animals.

Max Headroom has own new series

Our boy, M-m-m-max is going legit, stopping just short of selling out. First the computerized darling of England conquered America via cable, then he got away with being the commercial spokes-thing for Coca-Cola. Now he is landed a weekly series on ABC.

Producer Peter Wagg's admirable hope for the "Max Headroom" series beginning Tuesday night is that it is "not bland like just about everything else on the telly."

In fact, the new series looks like nothing you have seen before, unless you caught the original British version on HBO two years ago. The story is unchanged and three of the original cast members are back. Only the look is cleaner, due to the ABC standards and practices depart-

ment. "There were some things we couldn't do for American broadcast TV," Wagg said. For instance, there was the moment on the "Dr. Dunkins Video Symptom Show" — a video within the video — in which "a big fat man took his trousers down." ABC spared us.

What is left, however, is an inventive start to what could be an exceptional series if the budget remains high enough to sustain the kind of dense, futuristic look that gives "Max Headroom: 20 Minutes Into the Future" its punch. Wagg's visual reference point was Ridley Scott's "Bladerunner."

"As the story opens, we are in an uncertain post-apocalyptic time when televisions no longer have 'off' buttons, viewers choose among 4,000 channels and ratings are the

networks' only concern (remember, we are talking 20 minutes into the future). Network XXIII, an omnipotent conglomerate that monitors the world through hundreds of satellites, leads in the ratings.

Corrupt Network XXIII executives have overseen the invention and secret use of "blipverts," advertisements condensed into a few seconds and transmitted directly into the viewers' brain to prevent channel switching. The blipverts' lethal side-effect, particularly for sedentary types, is spontaneous combustion. Network XXIII's star reporter, Edison Carter (Matt Frewer) is onto the scheme and ready to expose the network.

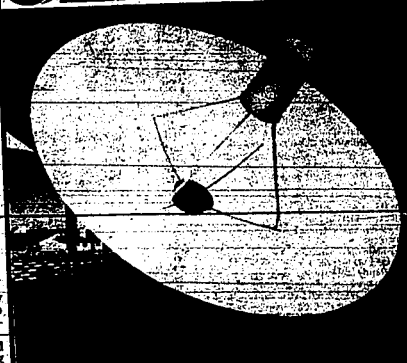
This is the kind of network bashing usually reserved for off-air diatribes. But why should TV critics have all the fun?

Back in the studio, the tension builds: Guest host and deejay Arlis "Straightarrow" Tranter picks out the numbers from the popcorn-type machine spitting out the numbered balls. Young echoes Tranter like Ed McMahon echoing Carnak.

"O-61," he says.

He picks up a new bingo number, inspects it and asks Young "What do they call these? Bingo balls?"

Young laughs so hard she cries, the live camera catching it all.
