## Bell Rapids slide threatens disaster

HAGERMAN — A landslide crushed the Bell Rapids Mutual Irrigation Company's No. 1 pumping station early Thursday afternoon, causing \$1.5 million damage to high-lift irrigation equipment, posing a potential disaster to farmers at the start of the irrigation season, and threatening the nearby Hagerman Fossil Beds.

Bell Rapids project farmers were still meeting at the Oxbow Cafe in Bliss at press deadline to discuss the outlook for the coming irrigation season with the system shut down.

There were three Bell Rapids employees in the vicinity when the slide occurred about noon, but one was hurt, a Twin Falls County Sheriff's Department spokesman said.

"They looked up and saw a cloud of dust coming at them," said Merlin Haycock Sr., an operator at Bell Rapids' No. 2 pumping station.

The slide occurred about 15 miles northwest of Buhl, on the south bank of the Snake River. The site is 1 mile north and 2 miles east of the Bell Rapids beel dump, near U.S. Highway 30.

Jim McLean, of Glenns Ferry, and another unidentified Bell Rapids employee were at the bottom of the hillside when the slide occurred. Vern Mavencamp, 61, a Bell Rapids ditch rider from Hagerman, was at the top of the hill and went down to check on his friends after he saw the earth let go, said the Sheriff's Department spokesman, who did not want to be identified.

The pump station is on the Snake River and forces river water uphill several hundred feet through a pipeline to the irrigation canals.

Several hundred feet of line was snapped like broken matchsticks by the force of the slide. A torrent of muddy water rushed back down the hillside from the irrigation system, threatening the Hagerman Fossil Beds, which contain world-renowned prehistoric specimens.

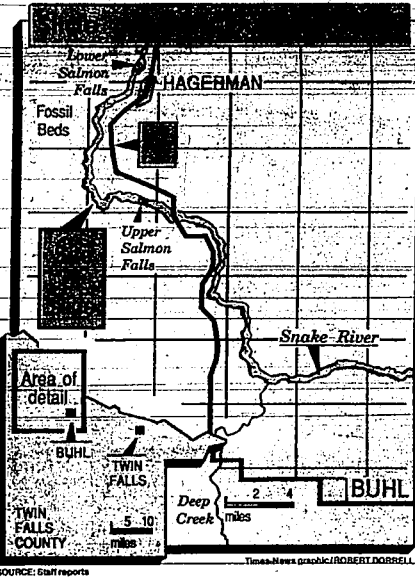
Erosion of the beds has increased markedly in the past few years, and irrigated farming on the Bell Rapids tract on the plateau above the beds may be the reason, U.S. Bureau of Land Management officials have said in the past.

The BLM has said that more than \$800,000 should be spent to protect the beds, a designated national landmark described as in "100-percent poor ecological condition."

Ted Weasama, a paleontologist with the BLM in Boise, told The Times-News Thursday that he was concerned about damage to the beds and would travel to the site Friday to check on them.

"Normal erosion is not a problem, but rapid erosion from a stream of wastewater is. The stuff is gone before you have a chance to see it," said Bill Akersten, curator of vertebrate paleontology at the State Museum of Natural History in Pocatello.

The slide buried two pickup trucks and knocked out electrical power to the pump station. The station appeared to have been destroyed, with its roof crushed and walls knocked askew. A muddy torrent of water



## Missile accord nearer

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. — President Reagan said Thursday he is optimistic about making a deal this year to limit U.S. and Soviet medium-range nuclear missiles but that there must be "a prospect" of being able to arrive at some very substantial agreements before a summit is held.

"We've narrowed the gap a little more," the president said after meeting for more than an hour with Secretary of State George P. Shultz at Reagan's mountaintop home, Rancho del Cielo.

Shultz briefed the president about the Kremlin proposal to eliminate U.S. and Soviet medium-range missiles from Europe. The secretary flew to California after meeting in Brussels with NATO allies following three days of talks with Soviet leaders in Moscow.

Reagan said the Soviet proposal would be discussed thoroughly with America's West European allies.

Shultz, in a news briefing later with reporters, said Reagan "hasn't made a decision" about whether to accept the Soviet offer.

Asked when a response from the United States and its allies might be made, Shultz said he "didn't want to put a time down on it." He did say, however, that he believed an answer would be given "long before" the allied economic summit scheduled to be held in Venice in June.

"It's clear to me that the visit was very useful," Reagan said in a brief statement to reporters after his meeting with Shultz.

The president said that "important progress was made in arms reductions," specifically in the area of medium-range missiles.

"I remain optimistic about an agreement this year," Reagan said. "There was movement on nuclear testing talks and on a ban on chemical weapons. On strategic defensive reductions and defense in space, the talks were detailed and useful and will intensify."

Reagan asked whether he was reconciled that there will not be time in his presidency to negotiate a cut in intercontinental ballistic missiles and other long-range weapons said, "I'm not reconciled to that at all. We feel — take that very seriously and we intend to keep on that path also."

Asked whether a completed arms agreement must be on the table before a summit, the president said, there "have to be some substantial agreements that would

## Marine hearing put off until May

WASHINGTON — A pre-trial hearing for a former Marine embassy guard accused of spying ended Thursday with an unexpected defense motion to continue the proceedings until next month.

Defense attorneys for Sgt. Clayton J. Lonetree said they had requested — and received — a continuance after receiving new evidence from investigators. William Kunstler, one of the lawyers, indicated the evidence was provided in response to a defense discovery motion.

But Kunstler and a colleague, Michael V. Stufif, declined to elaborate, saying they had been warned by the military hearing officer on Thursday not to discuss the case with the press.

"We got more discovery last night," Kunstler said after noting the attorneys had been "very gravely warned" about not talking.

"There are more witnesses to think about. The prosecution agreed to it (the delay) and they know that it's a legitimate request."

The Pentagon, in a brief statement, said Lonetree's hearing had been recessed until May 11.

"The purpose of the request was to allow the defense additional time to prepare its case," the Pentagon said. "The Article 32 hearing is expected to reconvene on May 11."

## Hansen leaves jail in custody of marshals

OMAHA, Neb. — Former Idaho congressman George Hansen, jailed in Omaha on alleged parole violations, was released to federal marshals Thursday night.

Douglas County Corrections Center spokesman Cindy Ray said the marshals took Hansen from the jail about 6 p.m. MDT. She said she had no information about where Hansen was taken.

Amy Brown of the U.S. Justice Department said in a telephone interview from Washington Thursday night that she had no new information on Hansen's whereabouts. Details of prisoner transfers usually aren't made public, she said.

Earlier Thursday, federal officials reportedly were making arrangements to transport Hansen from Omaha to Virginia.

Hansen was taken to the Omaha jail after his arrest Wednesday night. The conservative Idaho Republican faces possible revocation of parole, Justice Department spokesman Joe Corvicky said from Washington.

Federal deputies arrested Hansen at Apple Airport on a warrant issued Tuesday by the Philadelphia regional probation commissioner.

Frank Campbell, Hansen's Washington attorney, said the conditions of his parole are unreasonable because they restrict his ability to earn a living as a political consultant and restrict his First Amendment right to free speech.

"I'm just outraged, absolutely outraged," Hansen's wife, Connie, said in a telephone interview from their Virginia home. "They are treating him like he is a danger to society or something."

Hansen had been in Nebraska to speak earlier Wednesday at Faith Baptist Church in Louisville, said its pastor, Everett Sileven. Similar speaking trips around the country are among the reasons for the arrest warrant, Justice Department spokesman Joe Corvicky said.

Sileven led 175 people Thursday afternoon in protest of Hansen's jailing. Protesters marched around the corrections center, knelt to pray and sang "God Bless America." Some people carried signs reading "IRS terrorism" and "Nebraska is America."

"Mr. Hansen is a political prisoner," Sileven said. "He must be released immediately."

Sileven said people had contacted the White House asking for Hansen's release.

Sileven and the Rev. Robert McCurdy of East Point, Ga., said Hansen had committed no crime and is being persecuted for his political views. Hansen never agreed

## Idaho holds 41st place in nation on per capita income list

WASHINGTON — Idaho's per capita income is higher but it is still 41st in the nation.

The income figure remained stable last year, in relation to the other states, but ranking fell from 35th in 1980.

Idaho slipped a notch in its regional standing, as it continued recording annual gains below the national rate.

The Commerce Department reported 1986 per capita income in Idaho at \$11,432, up 2.7 percent from 1985 to maintain the state's cent last year to stand at \$14,641, a slower growth rate than experienced between 1984 and 1985.

Mississippi remained the lowest state in the nation, the only one with per capita income still below \$10,000. Connecticut edged Alaska as the state with the highest average income, jumping just over the \$19,200 level while Alaska suffered an actual decline of 2.2 percent in its average income to fall below \$18,000.

In addition to Mississippi, the states with average incomes below Idaho's in 1986 were Utah, Alabama, Arkansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, New Mexico, South Carolina and West Virginia.

Compared to its six border states, Idaho's standing slipped from 10th in 1985 to 12th last year as Montana reported an increase in average income during 1986 of over 8 percent. That pushed its national ranking from 2nd to 38th and put its per capita income at nearly \$300 above Idaho's.

Utah remained the lowest state in the region as its average income rose only 2.4 percent to \$10,743. That anemic performance was hit hard by the oil-price depression.

Idaho had the highest average income of the state's bordering Idaho at over \$15,000.

In addition to Utah and Alaska, only seven other states recorded percentage increases in average income below the 2.7 percent rate in seeing its per capita income actually decline, and most of the other states with lower percentage increases have economies heavily reliant on the energy industry, which was hit hard by the oil-price depression.

 make it worthwhile to have a summit.  
 "I look forward to and am hopeful that we can have a summit. But it must be one carefully planned and prepared and there must be something that we feel we can accomplish," Reagan said. "... we should have a prospect there of being able to arrive at some very substantive agreement."

Asked by a reporter whether he could sell it to the Europeans, Reagan said, "that's what we're working on."  
 "I feel very good," the president said. "We think that progress was made."  
 Shultz, asked whether Soviet Leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev had put the alliance in a potentially difficult situation with the proposal of removing nuclear weapons from Europe, said, "I don't think that at all. The secretary said his meeting in Brussels had been very good" and added, "the opportunities before us... are all very positive."

Shultz arrived at Reagan's ranch about 6:30 p.m. MDT, and Nancy Reagan greeted him with a kiss in the driveway.  
 They were posed for pictures, Shultz was asked if he had obtained any sort of commitment by the Soviets to attend a summit in this country later year and replied, "I'm going to discuss that with the president."  
 Asked how he felt about the summit, Shultz said, "I feel fine. I had a very good time in Moscow — a good meeting."  
 Reagan, asked if the drive for a U.S.-Soviet arms control agreement will be complicated by allied concern about the Soviets' superiority in conventional fighting capability, Shultz said, "I don't think so."  
 Shultz left foreign ministers from nine North Atlantic Treaty Organization countries behind in Brussels to ponder whether the Soviet proposal should be accepted. It would mean the elimination of about 50 shorter-

range Soviet nuclear missiles in East Germany and Czechoslovakia, and could also involve the dismantling of about 55 other Scudballer and Spider missiles in the Soviet Union.  
 Gorbachev offered to include those weapons, which have a range of 550 to 600 miles, in a treaty to scrap medium-range U.S. and Soviet nuclear missiles except for 100 warheads on each side.  
 Shultz stopped at Pease Air Force Base in New Hampshire in early afternoon before continuing on to California.

By offering to eliminate the shorter-range missiles in East Germany and Czechoslovakia — and those in the Soviet Union over a year's time, as well, if details can be worked out — the Soviets are causing NATO to re-evaluate the alliance's nuclear capability.

Not only would U.S. Pershing II and cruise missiles, with a range of 600 to 3,000 miles be withdrawn, the United States would not be able to deploy new or modified shorter range rockets if all of the Soviets are withdrawn as well.

Shultz stopped short of specifically endorsing the Soviet proposal at a news conference in Brussels after explaining it to the NATO foreign ministers behind closed doors.

The ministers represented Britain, Canada, West Germany, Italy, Luxembourg, Norway, Denmark, the Netherlands and Spain.

Lower-level officials from Belgium, France, Greece, Iceland, Portugal and Turkey also attended.

Shultz told reporters "we have the prospect for a good INF (Intermediate-Range Nuclear-Forces) agreement and we have basic elements in place."  
 He said NATO would have to make some adjustments in its defenses if the Soviet proposal was accepted.  
 A high-level NATO defense group will meet in Washington on Monday.

 from the irrigation system, rushed by. Soil on the hillside was dark brown where the break occurred, in contrast to dry, sandy-colored earth a few hundred feet to either side.  
 An electrical transmission tower near the pump station was knocked on its side near where one of the pipelines had burst.

Between 100-150 gallons of motor oil from the pumping station was found to have been spilled into the water, Idaho Power Co. and U.S. Environmental Agency officials said. Other polluters, some of which were being assessed at press deadline Thursday night. There was no indication then that any PCB's, a cancer-causing substance often found in electrical transformers, were involved in the spill.

The cause of the slide was unknown Thursday night, but there were unconfirmed reports of water seepage at the site prior to the slide.

# Penalty orders due out

The site is located on BLM Land. BLM personnel inspected the damage from the air Thursday with Bell Rapids - Manager Ken Strickler. Strickler reportedly told the Sheriff's Department that damage was at least \$1.5 million.  
 Strickler could not be reached for comment on Thursday.

Hours after the slide occurred, debris was still hurling down the hillside sporadically. Despite the danger, a steady stream of onlookers drove to — Jursanound pass — the pump station. Other onlookers, some with binoculars, surveyed the damage from the river's north bank.

The irrigation company set up road blocks Thursday afternoon to keep pawkers away from the slide. There is still danger from additional slides and the Sheriff's Department advised people to stay out of an area one-quarter-mile west and one-quarter mile south of the slide.

WASHINGTON — Japan's chief trade negotiator "head" — Masahiko Kuroda — and his colleagues have failed to dissuade the Reagan administration from imposing stiff trade penalties that are due to be ordered today by President Reagan.  
 Makoto Kuroda, vice chief of the Ministry of International Trade and Industry (MITI), denied administration charges that Japan had failed to live up to an 8-month-old semiconductor trade accord. But Kuroda edged in the two countries differ on the terms of the agreement.  
 "Apparently there are differences of views of what we agreed upon," Kuroda, the chief Japanese negotiator of the accord, said in an airport interview.

President Reagan on March 27 called for the 100 percent penalty tariffs on a variety of Japanese electronics products, which would double their import prices.

Japan had failed to adhere to two major provisions of the semiconductor trade pact. The president said Japan failed to stop its semiconductor manufacturing in other countries at less than the cost of production and did not increase its purchases of American-made chips.

Kuroda said the trade sanctions, the first since the end of World War II, stunned his country because its compliance with agreements is a matter of national honor.

Allegations "that we are not abiding by promises is a most serious word to Japan," Kuroda said.

The U.S. sanctions involving the semiconductor accord have sharpened longstanding trade differences between the United States and Japan, its major Pacific ally.

Kuroda, for instance, questioned the methods used by the Commerce Department to conclude that Japan had not stopped dumping semiconductors at their cost of production.

He said it will take time for the agreement, reached in July, to achieve its objectives because "we are dealing with market economies that cannot be changed overnight."

Nonetheless, Japanese efforts have improved both U.S. semiconductor sales and the dumping issue "slowly but steadily," and "the desired results are here already," he said.

Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldrige said it will take at least three to four months for the United States to collect and analyze information that will provide the "clear evidence" that Reagan said is needed before the sanctions can be lifted.

Kuroda said Japan warned the United States Wednesday that it will take its complaint about the sanctions to the international compact that regulates world trade.

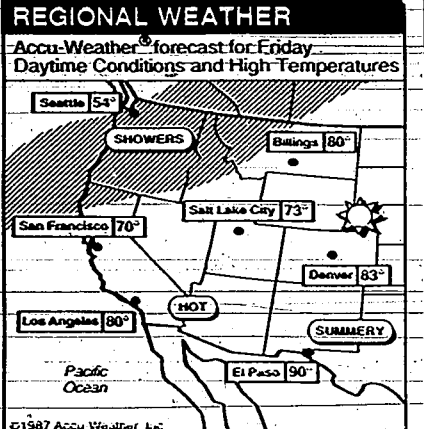
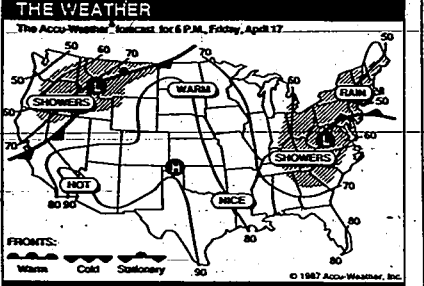
Meanwhile, warm high pressure centered over southern Idaho. This weather pattern will change dramatically by Friday night as a strong Pacific cold front moves into Idaho.

 trial hearings for Lonetree's alleged accomplice, Cpl. Arnold Bracy, had convened late Thursday but that his case, too, had been continued.

He said Lonetree's attorneys asked for a continuance of his hearing until April 30, in order to have the newly provided military counsel, Lt. Col. Michael L. Powell, informed of the details of the case. The request was approved.

The 25-year-old Lonetree, a former guard at the U.S. Embassy in Moscow, entered a hearing room at the Quantico, Va., Marine Base at 8:30 a.m. for what had been expected to be the final day of his pre-trial investigative hearings.

Thursday's session, which was closed to reporters, dragged on until late in the afternoon when it broke with word of the unexpected continuance.

The hearing, part of what is known as an Article 32 investigation, is a

similar to a grand jury proceeding in civilian courts. The Marine Corps has charged Lonetree, who was arrested last December, with 24 violations of the Uniform Code of Military Justice, including two charges of espionage.

Lonetree and Bracy are accused of becoming involved with Soviet women and then allowing Soviet agents to roam the embassy late at night.

In a related development, the Marine Corps said Thursday that five guards who had been assigned to the Moscow embassy had arrived in Quantico for questioning by investigators probing the affair.

Lt. Col. John Stotwell, a spokesman, said another nine Moscow guards were expected to arrive at the Virginia base "within the next few days" and that 16 new Marine guards had arrived in Moscow to replace those withdrawn.

 to the parole conditions he is accused of violating, they said.

"Those of us involved in the struggle for freedom are aware the government is not always honest," Sliven said. He served time in the Cass County jail during a dispute over his unapproved church school.

A. J. Lowery of Clinton, Ark., led more than 20 of the men in the group in an offer to serve Hansen's time in jail.

"The government is a bunch of criminals," Lowery shouted to the crowd.  
 Hansen was convicted in 1984 and sentenced to five to 15 months in prison for falsifying financial reports filed with the House of Representatives. He was fined \$40,000, and

released from a federal prison camp in December 1986 after serving six months.

Hansen's probation was to have lasted until September and included standard restrictions. Corvick said. Among them were requirements that he remain within his probation officer's jurisdiction in eastern Virginia and make monthly financial statements.

The government alleges Hansen was given a formal reprimand in February, then continued to violate restrictions on his travel and refused to submit financial reports, Corvick said.

Hansen, 56, is scheduled to appear before the national-probation commission in Washington Tuesday to appeal the restrictions.

# Andrus chides BPA's air, says it should serve region

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus on Thursday chided the Bonneville Power Administration for being an energy "godfather" that must return to its roots of providing a service to the Pacific Northwest.

"Bonneville — fancies itself — a management organization that establishes public policy," Andrus told the about 400 people attending the second annual Electricity Futures Symposium. "That... is a job Bonneville has no business dabbling in."  
 "The most notable excursions into the policy area have cost us dearly," said Andrus. "We'll pay for the WPFS (Washington Public Power Supply System) in Idaho... for the rest of our lives."

Andrus made his comments during a luncheon address at the all-day seminar.

Jim Jura, BPA administrator, later said there is a perception in the region that BPA has acted heavily-handed. He said the big federal agency's job is to make difficult decisions that can't possibly satisfy everyone.

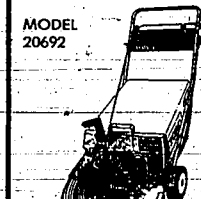

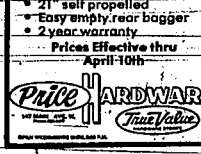

# Symms skeptical of arms agreement

TWIN FALLS — The United States would gain little by a "zero-zero" nuclear weapons agreement with the Soviet Union because it would leave U.S. allies at a disadvantage with conventional forces in Europe, Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, said Thursday.

He said an agreement to eliminate short- and medium-range nuclear missiles in Europe, proposed last week by Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev, would not be lived up to by the Soviets.

"They have never abided by a treaty in the past," Symms said.

Symms called the "claimor" for a nuclear arms agreement "the biggest show I've seen," but he said it was mostly centered in the United States as an issue between "conservatives and liberals."

Symms also said he thought the new American embassy in Moscow should be knocked down and a new one constructed by an American firm, but at Soviet expense.

In the meantime, Symms said, the Soviet Union should be prohibited from occupying a new Soviet embassy site in Washington.

Symms called the new American embassy building in Moscow a "microphone" because all the listening devices reportedly embedded in it. "We should go over there and blow it down," he said.

Symms expressed his disappointment with the Marine Corps and the U.S. State Department for poor supervision of Marine guards at the embassy in Moscow, some of whom are accused of helping Soviet personnel obtain access to classified information.

He called the scandal "outrageous," and said responsibility for the breaches of security should fall on higher-ranking officials than the Marine guards themselves.

In a wide-ranging interview, the Idaho senator also:

- sympathized with former congressman George Hansen, who was arrested Wednesday in Omaha, allegedly for violating travel conditions of his parole from federal prison.
- Symms said he had visited Hansen last year while Hansen was in the prison at Petersburg, Va., and that he had hoped Hansen would "get on with his life."
- It was nothing that the prison term would be the end of it," Symms said.
- He wondered if Hansen didn't "want to be arrested" as a way of maintaining his visibility.

He called a German-American political action committee a "bunch of wackos" and stated his decision this week to give contribution money from the group to two pro-Jewish organizations.

The German-American group had given Symms a \$1,000 campaign contribution last year. When the group's Nazi sympathies were learned, Symms gave the money away. Symms staff member Phil Reberger said the group has since tried to "talk us out" of giving the money to Jewish groups, but Reberger said "we told them to stick it in their ear."

He defended his vote last week to fund nationwide highway projects, despite the opposition of President Ronald Reagan, who called the projects "pork."

Symms said the projects in Idaho would help the state's economy rebound.

He said he hoped the United States "could avoid a trade war" with Japan, but thought the "pressure" America had brought on the Japanese recently on trade issues "was appropriate."

"The United States can't have trade agreements which are all one-way streets," Symms said.

## Korhonen new welfare director

BOISE (AP) — Former state Health and Welfare management services administrator Allen Korhonen has been named the new director of the Division of Welfare.

He succeeds Theo Murdock, who was among the department's top managers swept out of office almost immediately after the inauguration of Gov. Cecil Andrus.

# Decision sends price of water soaring

CALDWELL (AP) — Forget about gold and silver; the most precious commodity in southwestern Idaho this summer will be water.

Those who have it will sell, and those who don't will either buy or go without. For those who go without, this could be their last season as farmers.

Advertisements for water already have begun to appear in area newspapers, and the law of supply and demand and decisions by the Boise Project Board of Control have begun to indicate prices.

Stanley Robison and Dick Symms, both Sunny Slope fruit farmers, and

Phil Batt, an onion grower in Wilder, all want to buy water. Jim Bush, who grows seed corn in Sunny Slope, would like to buy it but can't afford it. Some of his ground will go dry this year.

Max Takasugi, a Sunny Slope farmer, has water to sell but doesn't think he should have to give up half the water he pumps into Boise Project canals.

Farmers knew it was a dry winter, but they didn't know how dry until last week. The Boise Project Board of Control announced it would allot each of its customers 1.25 acre-feet of water instead of the usual 3 acre-

feet.

On Tuesday, the board also decided that any well owner who wanted to add water to the canal system could sell only half the water. The board maintained that about half the water shipped through the canal would be lost because of evaporation, absorption and other factors.

That upset Takasugi, who wanted to sell water to a neighbor only 200 feet away, he said he would pipe the water to the neighbor, who happens to be Symms, and avoid the canal system.

For others, the situation is more complicated.

"We're in a bind," said Robison, owner of Robison Fruit Ranch. He drilled a well during the 1977 drought, but it won't provide enough water this summer.

"We're trying to buy water now," he said, adding that he would wait a week or two for prices to even out before making a deal.

# Judge lets state prison plan stand

BOISE (AP) — A federal judge has left intact state plans to transfer some inmates from the main prison to the minimum-custody prison farm to comply with his order to reduce overcrowding in some cellblocks.

He ruled from the bench after a four-hour hearing on Thursday, U.S. District Judge Harold Ryan said it was premature to seek a court order barring such a plan since the state Board of Corrections has not decided it would follow that course.

Ryan's ruling came on a request from inmates at the prison farm, who have objected to the board's consideration of the transfer option to comply with his June 30 deadline for a reduction of at least 110 inmates.

mates at the main prison south of Boise. The prison farm is adjacent to the penitentiary.

The board has decided to seek an extension of the deadline, and it has made no final determination on how it will cope with the population reduction order pending construction of a new 248-inmate maximum-security prison authorized by lawmakers and the governor this winter.

Ryan did set a Feb. 8 date for trial on the overall inmate suit seeking a population cap of 130 on the prison farm. Although the facility was built to handle 96 prisoners, the suit said there have been as many as 200 or more housed at the farm at various times.

The suit, filed by inmates Richard Wright and Timothy Gawron, is similar to the one filed about four years ago that led to Ryan's order for a cut in the population at the main prison.

Wright and Gawron claimed conditions at the farm have deteriorated

to the point that the safety of inmates has been jeopardized. They had argued that consideration of the plan to mix medium-custody inmates from the main prison with minimum-custody prisoners at the farm would only aggravate that situation.

The suit contends that 130 inmates is the maximum possible capacity for the farm unless structural modifications are made.

# Cooling off time delays conference

OLYMPIA, Wash. (AP) — A June conference between legislators from Washington and Idaho has been delayed until October to give lawmakers time to cool off over a so-called "border war" between the two states, said Sen. James West, R-Spokane.

West, who was coordinating the conference, said the delay will give Idaho officials time to determine whether they want to meet with their Washington counterparts.

Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus and Washington Gov. Booth Gardner, both Democrats, have been invited, West said in a news release.

West introduced a bill that would place an excise tax on Idaho citizens working in Washington. He said he introduced the bill to protest the Idaho Tax Commission's imposition of an income tax on railroad workers and truck drivers who pass through Idaho on their routes.

The bill is now before Gardner.

The conference was scheduled June 5-6 in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. It has been tentatively rescheduled for Oct. 9-11 in Coeur d'Alene, said Todd Michie, an aide to West.

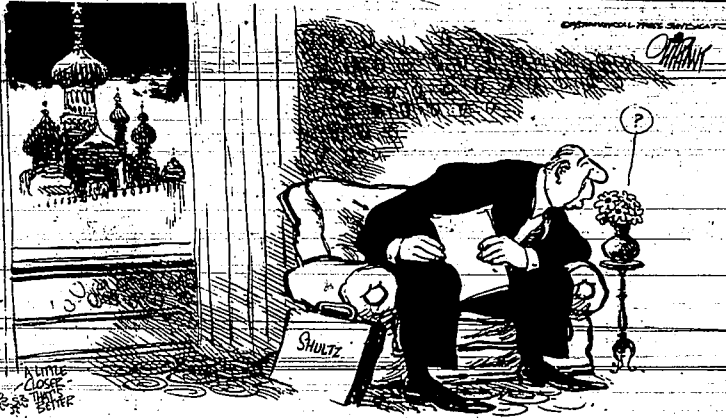

## Accent of anxiety shows in comment

BOSTON — A friend of mine, prone to misplacing her keys and the names of colleagues, marks this weakness with some of the hand remark about it being "a symptom of early Alzheimer's."

She says this lightly, mind you, but she says it frequently. It isn't hard to hear in her words the accent of anxiety.

The woman has, in fact, seen this disease rob others in her circle of their memory, and then their ability to reason, and then their lives. If each of us focuses on some future dread, hers comes with a name.

Not surprisingly, it was this friend who pointed out the article. A biochemist, Miriam Schreiber, has announced she will not test that we can diagnose Alzheimer's in its early stages, that may indeed be used in the future to identify healthy people who are at risk. Would you, she asks me, want to know? Would you want to know, clearly, the handwriting on the wall?

I don't answer her right away. It occurs to me that I have thought a great deal more about the right to know than I have about the right to know.

Twenty years ago, doctors and families often conspired to keep the truth about terminal diseases from patients. Even today, in the glaucoma Soviet Union, doctors regard openness about cancer prognosis as cruel. Yet it has always seemed clear to me that adults should know if they are sick, should have the name for their "long illness."

That is not an easy question to answer, but of course, it is a test for AIDS. There are already thousands, perhaps millions, of people trying to decide whether and when they want to know.

That is not the test positive for HIV infection may not give symptoms of AIDS for three or five or eight years or, perhaps, ever. It is my impression that people at low risk may experience nervous desire — even an urgent need — to be tested while many at high risk express equally enormous reluctance.

The gay neighbor of a prominent California public-health official checks himself daily for symptoms, but rejects entrance that he be tested for infection. "I couldn't stand it," he has said. A well-known doctor who had a number of trans-

sions after his own surgery a few years ago tells me that he, too, has consciously decided not to be tested. Playwright Larry Kramer speaks for many when he says, "I don't want a word of Damocles hanging over my head if I test positive." Yet others clearly want the verdict, and some want to know the name. Some may choose thoblockless (form of control-tylphage) of those with Huntington's (commit suicide), but they choose to know.

I do not mean to lump these diseases or decisions together. AIDS is clearly a special case. It is infectious (the men I mentioned take pains to say they are not endangering others), and there are some treatments if not cure. Furthermore, society has motives for knowing about AIDS infection that go beyond those of the individual. There are different but real consequences for knowing a bleak medical future, in terms of employment, insurance, social ostracism.

But each of these tests may offer healthy people the same science-fiction possibility: the morbid ability to see into the future. Increasingly, scientific tools modify the unknown with statistics of chilling likelihoods. It may be possible to predict not the day and street corner, but the likely end. And to decide whether we want a present shadowed by a future.

"Would you want to know?" my friend asked. I confess a prejudice toward information. I don't want to shut my eyes during the scary parts. But what a curious sort of knowledge this is. I can't think of it as an unmitigated blessing. In the most graphic and immediate way, it brings up all the questions about fate and free will, how to live with certainty and uncertainty.

There is an ironic thought written by playwright Tom Stoppard: "Life is a gamble at terrible odds. If it was a bet, you wouldn't take it." Now scientists are composing a tip sheet. I wonder how we will take that.

## Sticking to ABM treaty good first step

Recent exchanges between Washington and Moscow have given cause for optimism that we may make progress in radically reducing the number of intermediate-range missiles in Europe.

But before we can find similar cause for optimism in reducing the vast U.S. and Soviet arsenals of strategic offensive weapons for intercontinental range, three serious issues that are raised by President Reagan's commitment to strategic defense will have to be solved.

What program of strategic defenses should the United States pursue to meet our important national security needs and goals?

Should the United States follow the urgings of Secretary of Defense Caspar W. Weinberger and others and press ahead toward early deployment of a partial strategic defense system that includes space-based interceptors?

What should be the future of the anti-ballistic-missile treaty that was ratified in 1972 and is in force today?

I believe that there are clear answers to all three questions.

First, a robust and balanced program of research and technology in strategic defense and countermeasures would meet U.S. security needs by protecting us against technological surprise, by deterring a possible Soviet breakout from the ABM treaty and by minimizing the effects of such a breakout. It would also respond to the president's request to determine whether it is possible to render nuclear weapons "impotent and obsolete."

This program should be carried out strictly in accord with the traditional interpretation of the 1972 ABM treaty. It is my technical judgment that, for the coming decade, a requirement to comply fully with the ABM treaty will pose no hard technical burden on this program. The gap between today's technology and the requirements of an effective defensive system is so great that it is too early for any program in

strategic defense to consider technology demonstrations of types that could interfere with the treaty. A funding level of \$3 billion per year would be substantially more than adequate to support a strong Strategic Defense Initiative that avoids technically premature and costly demonstrations, regardless of their public-relations value.

Second, a decision to begin early deployment of a partial strategic defense system cannot be justified technically, and would not serve U.S. security interests. We must still surmount major technical obstacles before we can consider systems testing. Let alone deployment.

To cite one example, the critical first layer of a nationwide defense must destroy the enemy's salvo of attacking missiles during their "boost phase," within minutes after they are launched and before they can deploy their many thousands of multiple warheads and their potentially hundreds of thousands of decoys. The only technology now available to accomplish that defensive mission must rely on spacebased chemical rockets guided by heat-seeking sensors known as "smart rocks."

One at a time they have been successful in recent demonstrations against single targets that were planned and therefore known to the experimenters in advance. However, tens of thousands of them would have to be orbited by the United States on many hundreds of satellites in order to counter the current Soviet missile threat, and the required numbers could increase rapidly if the Soviets introduce countermeasures. With the available technology for sensors and guidance, such weapons would require that the United States launch many millions of pounds into space in order to deploy

the satellite fleet that must carry them. And, once in space, the satellites would be extremely vulnerable to direct attack as they circle the Earth like ducks in a shooting gallery.

A politically motivated requirement to drive toward early deployment of such an ineffective system will harmfully distort the U.S. program in strategic defense.

Third, the ABM Treaty has provided the basis for U.S. and Soviet efforts to achieve stability, seek reductions in nuclear arms and avoid war. Though progress in achieving reductions in nuclear arms has been disappointing since the treaty was ratified, we certainly should continue to enforce it unless technical and political developments make it possible to supersede it by a superior peace-preserving regime. What is needed is an effort to strengthen the treaty, in consultation with the Soviet Union, by resolving outstanding issues of compliance and by clarifying its application to new technologies in strategic defense.

The administration's so-called "broad interpretation" of the ABM treaty is not in the strategic interests of the United States. The treaty contains provisions that were designed liberally to allow the signatory nations to pursue research and technology in strategic defenses while at the same time preventing preparations for the rapid development of a nationwide ballistic missile defense. Our trip was intended to maintain these restraints on the extensive Soviet program in strategic defense. For the coming decade they are also appropriate for our own "Star Wars" program.

An agreement to abide by the provisions of the ABM treaty will provide a strong impetus to negotiations aimed at deep cuts in the offensive strategic arsenals of the United States and the Soviet Union.

### SIS plant is not assured

The construction of the Special Isotope Separation plutonium enrichment plant is not a fait accompli. Many decisions have yet to be made before construction of the clear weapons plant is possible. Public opinion on this issue will be of the utmost importance in many of the upcoming decisions.

1. The Department of Energy (DOE) must complete an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) at the plant site. There are four options they must choose between, one of the options being that of no action. The DOE is legally required to document the impacts of not building the SIS plant and must seriously consider that alternative. When the Draft EIS is released in the fall of 1987 there will opportunity for the public to comment on the document.

2. Congress has not authorized the con-

struction of the SIS plant. All they have done is approve the preparation of the EIS. Congress can not legally authorize the construction of the weapons plant until after the EIS is completed.

3. The SIS technology is still under development at the Livermore Laboratory in California. It is not a proven production technique at this time. DOE officials have assured me that ground will not be broken for the SIS plant until a demonstration plant has been operated successfully at Livermore.

If you are concerned about the SIS plant, there is still time to stop it. You can start by writing to Governor Cecil Andrus, Statehouse, Boise, 83702, and your congressmen, U.S. House of Representatives, Washington, D.C. 20515. A short simple letter is all that is needed. Say no to the nuclear arms today.

### Another look at Nicaragua

I have just returned from a two-week visit to Nicaragua, a moving experience I wish to share with your readers. In the interest of better understanding of that small country against which our government is waging an undeclared war.

I went to Nicaragua as part of a work-team from the Oregon-Idaho Conference of the United Methodist Church. Our trip was coordinated by CEPAD, an organization of about 60 evangelical denominations in Nicaragua, supported by churches in the USA, Canada, and Europe, which organized development projects for the needy people of that land.

Our team built in a 20 houses in a mountain pass near Jinotega, a town about the size of Burley. Ten Christian farm families in that area have invited 10 families displaced by the war to join them in this cooperative community. Habitat for Humanity, an international Christian housing ministry, is loaning the money for construction materials and providing supervision. World Vision provided a portable sawmill to cut local trees into lumber for the houses. Our team, along with the local people, donated the labor to start the project.

From living two weeks in this poverty-

stricken country with ordinary citizens, I have seen first-hand the severe hardships they face, but I have also observed their hopeful spirit. Part of that is because of their strong religious nature; part because they now have a government which, though no more perfect than ours, now assists them rather than oppressing them as the Somoza dictatorship did for over 40 years. I also believe they are hopeful because 30 North Americans were willing to travel thousands of miles to share life with them for a few days: men and women, teens and grandparents, working with them as "amigos."

I share with you a request of Senora Candide, CEPAD's work director: "Please let your people that Nicaragua is working for peace and for the children. And tell your leaders to stop their war against us so that we can get on with the difficult task of helping the children."

# FCC tightens its definition of indecency over airwaves

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Communications Commission today tightened its definition of indecency over the airwaves, and issued warnings to two stations and an amateur broadcaster Thursday, put broadcasters across the country on notice that it will prosecute a broadcaster if it violates the new standard.

The commission asked the Justice Department to consider prosecuting a California radio station for broadcasting an allegedly obscene program, and issued warnings to two other stations — including one airing controversial morning-show personality Howard Stern.

The FCC also warned all broadcasters it would no longer limit its definition of indecency to the "seven dirty words" broadcast in a George Carlin monologue of the same name, which led to a Supreme Court decision. The agency also said broadcasting after 10 p.m. was no longer safe harbor.

"What we are doing is correcting an altogether too narrow interpretation of indecency," said Commissioner Dennis R. Patrick, who will take over as FCC chairman next week, succeeding Mark S. Fowler.

"As for those who will say we are playing fast and loose with the First Amendment, I would say there is no commission that has been more adamant about protecting the First Amendment rights of broadcasters," he said. But he added that the FCC's definition does not protect indecency.

"We will not flinch in enforcing" the new standard, he said.

The FCC sent the case of Pacific Foundation, Inc.'s KPFK-FM, Los Angeles, to the Justice Department for possible prosecution for broadcasting a program allegedly containing graphic depictions of homosexual acts. The commission found the program was clearly indecent and "may have crossed the line" to obscenity.

It also issued written warnings to Infinity Broadcasting Co., whose Philadelphia station, WFSB-FM, and New York City station WXRK-FM, air Howard Stern's morning show, and to KCSB-FM, licensed to the University of California at Santa Barbara, which broadcast a rock concert on its station — infringing on their First Amendment right to free speech.

Its authority to regulate indecent broadcasts on the amateur radio service — issuing a warning to amateur broadcaster David Hildebrand of Hollywood, Calif., for repeatedly using offensive language on the air.

FCC General Counsel Diane Kilroy said the material aired by the Infinity stations and KCSB-FM would be considered indecent under the commission's new, broader interpretation. However, the commission could not sanction the stations under the new standard without first advising stations of the standard and giving them a chance to meet it.

"We took the most stringent action we could take under the law given the change in the enforcement standard," she said. "We're putting these and all broadcasters on notice" that the broader definition will be enforced in the future with a range of sanctions — from fines to revocation of licenses.

Officials of the stations deplored the FCC action and said the new standard infringes on their First Amendment right to free speech.

# Safety money went for Thiokol 'slush fund'

WASHINGTON (AP) — One of the most Thiokol engineers who tried to stop the fatal launch of the space shuttle Challenger claims the company received money from NASA to hire its quality control and safety people but this money was used instead as a slush fund for Thiokol.

Engineer Roger Boisjoly said also, in a paper filed with U.S. District Court, that his warning in July 1985 of possibly catastrophic failure of seals on the shuttle booster rockets was immediately classified as "company private" by Thiokol and withheld from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The Challenger exploded on Jan. 28, 1986 after 73 seconds of flight, killing the crew of seven. The Rogers Commission that investigated the disaster found it was caused by a

leak of hot gases streaming from the ship's right booster rocket.

Boisjoly is suing the company on his own behalf and on behalf of the taxpayers. He accuses Morton Thiokol — the sole manufacturer of booster rockets for the space shuttle — of fraud by falsely certifying the safety of the rubberlike O-ring seals at places where rocket booster segments are joined.

# Israel's answers about role played in Iran-Contra affair still not ready

WASHINGTON (AP) — Israel has failed to answer questions about its role in the Iran-Contra affair two months after Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir promised to cooperate fully with the U.S. investigation, according to a senior congressional investigator.

An Israeli source conceded Thursday that Israel had not yet sent back questionnaires prepared by the American. But he said the Israelis were still "filling them out; we want to be precise and that takes time."

That source, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the process was taking longer than anticipated "because we don't want to have any contradictions" between respondents' answers.

"There's no question of evasion on our part," he added.

Meanwhile, the Senate committee investigating the Iran-Contra affair was thwarted on another front

Thursday when a federal judge refused to order retired Air Force Maj. Gen. Richard V. Secord to release records of foreign bank accounts that investigators believe are tied to Iran-Contra arms deals.

U.S. District Judge Aubrey E. Robinson Jr. denied a request by the committee that he order Secord to sign a directive releasing records of accounts in Switzerland, Panama and the Cayman Islands.

Lance Margan, a spokesman for the Senate committee, said, "We intend to seek an expedited appeal."

Robinson, in his ruling, said that forcing Secord to sign the directive would violate his constitutional protection against self-incrimination.

As for the Israelis, the congressional investigator, who spoke only on condition he not be named, said that although no deadline had been imposed on Israel, U.S. officials had expected some responses by now.

Shamir pledged during a visit to Washington in February that the Israelis involved in the affair would respond in writing to investigators' questions. The questions were submitted more than one month ago.

"They have a problem. They can't really tell us the complete truth," said the American investigator. "A foreign intelligence service can't cooperate fully with other services. It would be like expecting the CIA director to testify on something to an Israeli commission."

He said he did not expect Israel to change its mind about refusing to allow oral testimony from the Israelis involved.

The investigator also said that until now no pressure had been applied on the Israelis to speed up their response, primarily because Israel had powerful friends on both the House and Senate panels investigating the affair.

# Writers end CBS strike

NEW YORK (AP) — Members of the Writers Guild of America ended their six-week strike against CBS Thursday, voting overwhelmingly to accept a new three-year contract calling for a 9 percent wage increase and concessions on job security.

Among the writers, editors, graphic artists and desk assistants meeting simultaneously in New York, Washington, Chicago and Los Angeles, the vote was 266 in favor of the pact and 24 against.

"This strike has proven that it is possible for 325 people to say 'No,' to a Fortune 500 company that believed it could undo a hard-won contract simply because it wanted to," said Mona Manning, the guild's chief negotiator.

CBS had no immediate comment on the settlement, but network spokeswoman Anne Luzzatto said the strikers would be called back to work as soon as possible, immediately. Some could even go back today.

# Philadelphia Inquirer wins 3 Pulitzers

## Briefly

### 19 held in cocaine trade setup

NEW YORK (AP) — A senior partner of a Wall Street firm, 16 other financial workers and two other people were arrested Thursday and charged with using cocaine "as a regular method of exchange" in business.

Wayne D. Robbins, a senior partner in the firm of Brooks, Weinger, Robbins & Leeds Inc. was arrested as a search warrant was executed Thursday at two of his firm's Wall Street offices. U.S. Attorney Rudolph W. Giuliani said.

The firm has offices in nine cities and authorities have filed a civil action seeking to seize assets of part of the firm because of narcotics violations.

"The firm has for a long time been involved in manipulating issues of 'penny stocks' — stocks in new companies that trade at a very low price," Giuliani said. More charges and arrests are expected, he said.

"Cocaine was used as a regular method of exchange, allegedly in the business of this firm," Giuliani said. "Insider trading was only a minor part of what they allegedly did wrong."

Calls to Brooks offices seeking comment Thursday evening went unanswered.

### Traditions first, Indian says

TOPPENISH, Wash. (AP) — Ancient traditions take precedence over modern tribal laws, a Yakima Indian testified Thursday in his trial for allegedly fishing outside the tribal fishing season.

Wilbur Stockish Jr., a descendant of one of 14 Columbia River tribal chiefs who signed an 1855 treaty setting out fishing rights, said the Indians had not damaged fish runs as much as the hydroelectric dams built by whites.

Stockish, 42, of The Dalles, Ore., and four other Indian fishermen are on trial in Yakima Tribal Court for violating tribal fishing seasons in 1981 and 1982.

The five were convicted in federal court in 1983 for violating the federal Lacey Act, which makes it a crime to possess or sell fish or wildlife taken illegally. A 1982 amendment made the law applicable to Indians.

### Divers give up searching ship

MIAMI (AP) — Divers abandoned the dangerous search for three crewmen missing from a capsized freighter Thursday, but rescuers continued to scour the ocean for signs of survivors.

Four men were found alive Wednesday and divers recovered the body of a fifth person in the Haitian-registered Aristeo after its cargo apparently shifted suddenly and rolled the boat over in the Atlantic Ocean.

Coast Guard rescuers pounded on the hull trying to locate the three missing men while six Navy divers swam through the 465-foot ship Thursday morning, but their search was finally called off.

### Columnist search into finals

CHICAGO (AP) — The Chicago Sun-Times on Thursday narrowed the field to seven finalists in its nationwide search for a new advice columnist — and one finalist says he already has lined up some salt-of-the-earth consultants.

An advisory board of "regular Joes" is standing by to help Jeffrey Zastow dispense advice if he wins the contest, he said. The job came open last month when nationally syndicated columnist Ann Landers — also known as Eppie Lederer — moved from the Sun-Times to the Chicago Tribune.

"Nobody knows everything," said Zastow, 28, of Chicago, of his advisory board, which includes a cab driver, a bill collector, a stevedore and a telephone operator, all named Joe or Josephine.

NEW YORK (AP) — The Philadelphia Inquirer won three 1987 Pulitzer Prizes for journalism Thursday. Including two for investigative reports that revealed pervasive court corruption and helped free an innocent man from prison.

The Los Angeles Times and New York Times each were awarded two of the prestigious prizes, which carry \$1,000 stipends.

The public service award — a gold medal — went to The Pittsburgh Press' Andrew Schneider and Matthew Breils for stories that found inadequacies in the Federal Aviation Administration's medical screening of pilots.

Schneider was a co-winner of the 1986 award for specialized reporting, and the Press was prepared for a repeat — a three-piece band entertained the newsroom with its rendition of "Happy Days are Here Again."

The Inquirer newsroom, too, was jubilant, awash with cheers and champagne. It was "a great day, a great year and the continuation of a great trend," said Inquirer publisher Sam McKeel, whose newspaper has now won 13 Pulitzers, all of them in the past 15 years.

One of the investigative awards went to Daniel R. Biddle, H. G. Bissinger and Fredrick N. Tulsky of The

Inquirer for their series "Disorder in the Court" involving scandals in the Philadelphia court system. The stories led to federal and state investigations.

Bissinger said the announcement of the prize was "the second most wonderful moment in my life next to the birth of my children."

A second investigative award went to John Woestendiek for his "outstanding prison beat reporting" including stories that helped free an innocent man.

The Inquirer's third award, for feature writing, went to Steve Twomey for a profile of life aboard an aircraft carrier.

The Los Angeles Times' awards went to Richard Eder in criticism, for his book reviews, and to Michael Parks for foreign reporting — for "balanced and comprehensive" coverage of South Africa.

Alex S. Jones won the first for his profile of the breakup of the Bingham media empire, including The Louisville Courier-Journal and The Louisville Times, and the divi-

sons in the family that forced them to break up.

The Times' national reporting

award honored the staff's work in the aftermath of the Challenger disaster, including examination of flaws in the space program and the shuttle's design.

The Pulitzer Prize Board also awarded another prize in national reporting to the staff of The Miami Herald for "its exclusive reporting and persistent coverage" of the Iran-Contra scandal.

A third New York Timesman also won a Pulitzer, although not for work published by the newspaper. David Shipley, the former Midwest correspondent, now based in Washington, won the award for general nonfiction for his "Arab and Jew: Wounded Spirits in a Promised Land."

Other arts awards included: Drama: "Fences," by August Wilson.

Fiction: "A Summons to Memphis," by Peter Taylor.

History: "Voyagers to the West: A Passage in the Peopling of America on the Eve of the Revolution," by Bernard Bailyn.

Biography: "Beating the Cross: Martin Luther King Jr. and the Southern Christian Leadership Conference," by David J. Garrow.

Poetry: "Thomas and Beulah," by Rita Dove.

Musical: "The Flight Into Egypt" by John Harbison.

Everywhere there were winners, there was excitement. Jeff Lyons and Peter Gerner of the Chicago Tribune won the explanatory journalism award for a series on gene therapy, including the implications of the new medical treatment.

The commentary award went to Charles Krauthammer of the Washington Post Writers Group for columns on national issues.

The general news reporting award went to the Akron-Beacon Journalist staff for its coverage under deadline pressure of the attempted takeover of Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co. by a European financier.

The editorial writing award went to Jonathan Freedman of the Tribune of San Diego for editing during the first major immigration reform in 34 years. Berke Breathed of The Washington Post Writers Group won the award for Editorial Cartooning for his off-beat "Bloom County" comic strip.

The award for spot news photography went to Kim Komersich of the San Francisco Examiner for his coverage of the fall of Ferdinand Marcos.

# Korean university students protest, clash with police

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Thousands of students throughout the country chanted "Down with dictatorship!" and fought police Thursday in protest of President Chun Doo-hwan's decision to strip the country of its 1988 Summer Olympics bid.

News reports said the demonstrations involved 12,000 students at 24 universities in Seoul and other cities.

There were no overall reports on arrests and casualties, but witnesses reported at least 10 demonstrators injured in Seoul.

Chun declared last week that no changes will be made in the constitution until his successor is chosen by a national election in February. The opposition has demanded an amendment providing for direct presidential elections before his term ends.

The government says strict action

will be taken against anyone who attempts to sabotage "social chaos" and endanger the 1988 Summer Olympics, of which South Korea is host.

Prosecutor General Suh Dong-lwan met with his senior officials Thursday and ordered a special crackdown on political dissent.

About 600 students at Gogang University in Seoul hurled rocks and fire bombs at riot police Thursday and the officers fired tear gas in response, witnesses reported. They said at least 10 students were injured, including two hit in the head by tear gas canisters.

Students chanting slogans against the Chun government and the United States tried repeatedly to break through police lines, according to the report. The national newspaper Chosun Ilbo said there were at least nine arrests.

Campus sources and newspaper reports said students demonstrated at eight Seoul universities and 16 schools in other cities, with all protests confined to campuses. There was no immediate comment from police.

Anti-American feeling was strong at University in Seoul, where students flung stones and eggs at Park Bo-ki, a confidant of the Rev. Sun Myung Moon, leader of the U.S.-based Unification Church.

Park, 58, was unharmed, but at least one of his bodyguards suffered a head injury and his superior officer was a virtual hostage for more than an hour after trying to deliver a speech on "Korean Unification."

One student said later: "We don't like the Unification Church because it is close to the government."

# Solidarity led to martial law planning

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Poland's leadership began planning for martial law immediately after the creation of the Solidarity trade union in 1980 and fought off repeated threats of Soviet intervention before imposing military rule 16 months later.

The Paris-based Polish emigre journal Kultura printed what it said was an interview with Col. Ryszard Jerzy Kuklinski, giving one of the most detailed accounts yet of the crisis faced by Poland's

communist leadership in 1980-81. Kuklinski was directly involved with preparations for martial law before defecting in November 1981.

A copy of the April edition of the magazine was obtained in Warsaw.

The magazine said the interview was conducted last December on the fifth anniversary of martial law.

In December 1980 and again in the spring of 1981, Soviet, Czechoslovak and East German troops were on the brink of invasion.

# Argentine major urged to give up

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — President Raul Alfonsin on Thursday urged a renegade army major and his backers to surrender rather than fight.

The confrontation represented the worst crisis of Alfonsin's 49-month-old administration.

The major, Ernesto Barreiro, took refuge in Regiment 14 late Wednesday in defiance of federal judges seeking his testimony in connection with the abductions, tortures and disappearances of suspected leftists

from 1976-83 at La Perla detention camp.

"There is nothing to negotiate. The Argentine democracy is not negotiable," Alfonsin said in a nationwide radio and television address before a cheering Congress. "Obey the orders of your superiors (and give up)."

He said Argentina since is not willing to surrender "so much as a millimeter in its support of democracy," and said an outpouring of popular support across the nation Thursday "demonstrates the firm-

ness of the decision to consolidate democracy and the isolation of the rebels."

Barreiro and his supporters issued a communique demanding the resignation of Army Chief of Staff Hector Rios Erenu and a replacement meeting their approval, amnesty for all military officers accused of human rights abuses; and an end to the hostility they said the administration had displayed toward the military in the media.

According to Channel 10 in Cordoba, provincial Gov. Eduardo Angelos, accompanied by a group of businessmen and political leaders, had entered the 14th Regiment headquarters to speak with the rebellious officers. No further information was immediately available.

# Soviet dissidents returned to prison

FRANKFURT, West Germany (AP) — Four Soviet dissidents have had to be transferred from labor camps to prison because they refused to sign confessions prepared by Communist authorities, a human rights group said Thursday.

The International Association for Human Rights also said Anatoly Koryagin, a Soviet dissident freed from prison last month, had called to say he expects to leave for Zurich, Switzerland, with his family April 23.

The group said the four dissidents had been transferred from labor camps or prisons to other prisons because they refused to sign confessions prepared by Communist authorities, a human rights group said Thursday.

The Frankfurt-based group said it obtained information on the four dissidents from Valery Senderov, a Soviet human rights activist released from prison last month.

# Elder Hinckley says focus is on fear, not on son's recovery

WASHINGTON (AP) — The father of the presidential assassin, John F. Kennedy Jr., said Thursday that the government is trying to keep his son from leaving a mental hospital to visit his family.

Jack Hinckley said prosecutors seized on newly disclosed correspondence between his son and President Theodore Bundy as a way to bar Hinckley from a 12-hour unescorted pass to visit his parents on Easter.

"If there were some deep plot, some plot for escape, that would be the thing, but for them (letters) to be innocuous, just one letter from a patient in a maximum security mental hospital to a death row inmate about to die — I have a hard time understanding why people don't understand," he said in an interview.

John was sent to St. Elizabeths for therapy and recovery and rehabilitation. He wasn't sent there because it's not a prison, it's a hospital," he said.

Hinckley said he and his wife, Joan, had experienced "a frustrating time" in which they saw St. Elizabeths Hospital withdraw its request for the unescorted pass for their son, who was sent there after being found innocent by reason of insanity in the 1961 shootings of President Reagan, press secretary James Brady and two others.

"We came up here with great expectations and they were frustrated almost from the beginning. We were just beginning to hear about John's improvement in the courtroom and it came to a halt because of the letters," the elder Hinckley said.

## Python pilferer nets prison term

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — A snake attendant at the Kenya National Museum was sentenced Thursday to two years in prison for stealing a python valued at \$60 from the museum's snake park.

Eroti Wadia Mboloni pleaded guilty to stealing the snake on April 6, 1986, and taking it to his home.

Mboloni said in court Thursday that he had intended to sell the python to an unidentified man who had expressed interest in the serpent.

He said when he went to the buyer's house, the man had left, so he returned home.

The Bundy letters were disclosed in court on Monday. Hinckley apparently told his psychiatrist at St. Elizabeths, Joan Turkus, on April 7 that he had written to Bundy last year after watching a television movie about the convicted killer, who is awaiting execution on Florida's death row for the slayings of a 12-year-old girl and two sorority sisters.

Bundy subsequently told the Secret Service that he had thrown away Hinckley's letters, but two letters from Bundy were among documents taken from Hinckley's room under court order on Tuesday. The letters were sealed by the court.

The prosecution and U.S. District Judge Barrington Parker were upset they hadn't been told of the Bundy letters, as well as a 1981 letter to Hinckley from Lynette "Squeaky" Fromme, a disciple of murderer Charles Manson. Fromme tried to kill President Ford in 1975.

Hinckley disagreed with the government's view that his son is still dangerous.

"The risk is zero in my view. Mrs. Hinckley said I have been through too much trauma and to have the Brady's and so have the Reagans that we aren't about to participate in anything that we thought had the potential to make us sorry for life."

Asked whether the prosecution capitalized on the disclosure of the letters, Hinckley said, "They're focusing on fear rather than John's recovery."

U.S. Attorney Joseph diGenova "would like to put John away forever. But he's not going to do it," Hinckley said. But he later asked to retract the statement about diGenova, saying, "I regret making the statement. I don't want to get into personal confrontations at all with anybody. It slipped out. I'm frustrated and tired."

The Hinckleys also acknowledged their son was romantically involved with Leslie deVaan, a former St. Elizabeths patient, acquitted by reason of insanity in the 1982 shotgun slaying of her 10-year-old daughter.

"We're really very fond of Leslie. She's a lovely person," said Mrs. Hinckley, who was silent for most of the interview.

"We're in favor of it," the elder Hinckley said. "If that sounds sordid to you, it's sordid to me."

"Leslie and John both committed terrible acts while severely mentally ill. The culprit here is not Leslie and John, it is mental illness. They are mentally ill through no fault of their own."

The Hinckleys took up the cause of the mentally ill after their son's commitment. They founded the American Mental Health Fund in 1964 to raise money to sponsor research. They also wrote a book, "Breaking Points," published in 1985.

They said their son receives therapy, takes an anti-depressant drug called Imipramine, holds down a job in the hospital's accounting department and takes psychology courses toward a degree from Texas Tech. Hinckley's doctors have said his mental illness

is in remission. The Hinckleys said they moved from Denver to the Tidewater region of Virginia to be closer to their son, whom they said they see every other week.

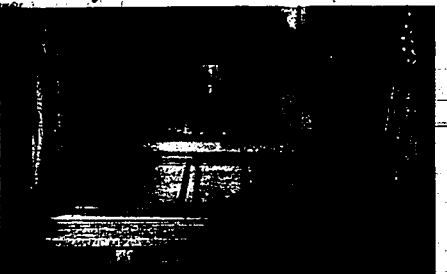

## Farmers skeptical of new immigration law

**BURLEY** — Despite assurances of cooperation Thursday night, farmers are skeptical of the government's sweeping new immigration reform law. Farmers are worried migrant workers will not qualify under the new law, leaving them without a labor force to harvest this year's crop. "It sounds great until you try to make it work," said Burley farmer Kent Searle. But Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, who originally proposed the immigration reform bill, said the law has potential.

"I'm not completely pessimistic about realization of the law," Symms told 30 farmers in Burley. "I charge of writing regulations to implement the law. It's not a seasonal agriculture workers program." The new law makes it illegal for any person to knowingly hire, recruit or refer for fee any alien not authorized to work in the United States. The law also requires employers to verify the residency status of all new hires by examining valid identification. The law also allows an amnesty program for aliens who have resided continuously and illegally in America since Jan. 1, 1982. But the system is fraught with potential problems, which even INS officials acknowl-

The current program does not work, said Mike Ayles, an INS official in Washington, D.C. But Ayles said INS was committed to trying to make the new program work. Symms said he also was assured of cooperation from the Department of Labor. Jim Bailey, northern regional director for

INS out of Minneapolis, Minn., encouraged farmers to send their complaints and suggestions to INS and Labor Department officials. But farmer Robert Allen said farmers were reluctant to trust INS. "INS people are very unwelcome on my property," Allen said. "They've harassed me in the past. That's why I don't write." The problem with making the system work is trying to decide who is eligible for the law's amnesty program and who will be able to obtain the documentation necessary for legalization, Symms said.

## Blaine approves school override

**HAILEY** — The Blaine County School District passed its ninth consecutive school override yesterday with 63 percent of Blaine voters approving the measure, one of the largest margins of support ever. During the eight hours the polls were open Thursday, 1,865 Blaine County voters cast ballots. Some 1,195 people voted for the override, while 690 people voted against it. It needed a 50 percent majority to pass. For the past three years voters in Blaine County have approved an override of the same amount, \$1.6 million. In 1985, 58 percent of the voters favored it, and in 1985, 62 percent of the voters supported it. Next year the \$1.6 million Blaine override will account for 25 to 30 percent of the district's total operating budget, according to Blaine County School Superintendent

David Noonan. When the override was announced several weeks ago, Noonan declined to discuss what would be cut if the override had failed. "Imagine if 30 percent of everything we do is eliminated," he said. "We (the school board) are extremely pleased" with the vote, he said Thursday night. Next year the district will try to pass a two-year override. Legislators this year approved a bill allowing districts to ask voters for the two-year levies beginning in June. "We'll have to do it half as often," Noonan said. He also said the new bill will mean "half as many gray hairs." The one-year levy passed Thursday will add \$73 of tax for every \$50,000 of property value. Counting the override, Blaine County residents pay about \$258 for every \$50,000 of property value. The state average for \$50,000 of property value is \$310.

## Jerome County picks Horgan for prosecutor to finish vacated term

## Agreement critical to acquisition plans Safeway workers to vote on contract

**TWIN FALLS** — Union negotiators and executives for Borman's Inc. have forged a labor contract critical to Borman's plans for acquiring 60 supermarkets in the Salt Lake Division of Safeway Stores Inc. Unionized grocery workers and meatcutters from the Magic Valley were voting on the pact Thursday in Twin Falls—the last of Safeway employees across Southern Idaho to be polled. The 5-year agreement opens with lower wages, but builds in a future bonus plan and new job security clauses, said Sam Miller, president of Local 368A of the United Food and Commercial Workers Union. "I think it will go overwhelmingly," he said after meeting with union members. Results of voting in Idaho and other states will not be available until after Easter, Miller said. Borman's, which runs 84 discount supermarkets in the Detroit area, said in March that a new labor contract is a prime condition for buying the division's stores in Utah, Idaho, Wyoming and Nevada. SSI Holdings has been selling off parts of Safeway Stores Inc. to pay off a \$4.25 billion debt incurred in its leveraged buyout of the national chain. The union and Borman's bargained the agreement over a 4-week period in Salt Lake City,

Miller said. The proposed contract involves: • immediate pay concessions for most union members, with the highest-paid taking the biggest cuts. Some workers at the lower end of the scale will get increases: Wage rates will range from \$3.40 an hour for entry-level positions to \$11.25 an hour for top-ranked meatcutters. Miller said the complexity of the contract made figuring average pay cuts difficult. • a bonus plan pegged to increasing sales in stores. Journeymen workers who lost wages would recoup wages first under the bonus plan, and then the benefits would be spread to the rest of the employees, Miller said. The bonus system, which goes into effect late this year, could return wage concessions quickly, Miller said. "There are a lot of variables, but we think the potential definitely is there," he said. A Safeway bonus plan had been linked to profits, a much narrower guideline. • more liberal seniority rules. Workers with more time on-the-job will be allowed to bump lower-seniority workers within a geographic region. Previously, bumping had been allowed only within the same store. They also will be able to transfer to any of the 60 stores, if a position is available, Miller said. • a continuation of health insurance and other benefits. The contract will cover all stores in the division, including Safeway outlets that formerly

had no union representation or only partial union coverage. Among them were the stores at Buhl, Ketchum and Rupert. Safeway employees had been apprehensive about their jobs after finding out late last year that the division was not on Safeway's "keep" list. Dave Marsh, produce manager at the Jerome Safeway, said the contract will drop base pay for produce managers such as himself by about 9 percent—to \$8.75 an hour. The cut will hurt, Marsh said, but he described the contract as "good." "We got to keep our seniority, and that's what everybody was worried about," said Marsh, an 18-year employee. Borman's officials could not be contacted for comment on Thursday. The company employs 5,600 workers. Its main operation, the Farmer Jack chain, is unionized. Miller said union negotiators are "very pleased" with the contract and the talks leading up to it. He described Borman's bargainers as "straightforward" and reasonable. In meetings this week at Nampa, Blackfoot, and Jackson Hole, Wyo., members seemed relieved at the outcome of the talks. Morale, which had been flagging in past months under Safeway, has risen markedly, he said. "We see a future now," Miller said.

## Forum prepares for school levy failure

**MURTAUGH** — A citizens group is supporting sending Murtaugh students to Valley High School next year and paying tuition if an override election scheduled for May 1 fails. The group is taking no stand on the override, but is sponsoring a forum Monday to discuss the options. Murtaugh School District will face if its upcoming override election fails. The forum comes during a controversial campaign over the Murtaugh School Board's second attempt to get a \$125,000 override passed for the upcoming school year. It's an issue that has become emotional. The school board has threatened to close Murtaugh High School if the override doesn't pass. But it hasn't decided where to send the high school's students if the school is closed, said Superintendent Frederick Diaz-Granados. The students of Murtaugh High School, apparently not content with being mere pawns in the struggle, have inserted a letter of support for the override in a school newsletter.

"We feel that as we students are worth a \$125,000 override in order to better our education," the letter says. It emphasizes the accomplishments of past Murtaugh graduates. Representatives of the organization sponsoring the forum, Citizens for a Better Murtaugh, say they have a core of about 25 people, and 150 more have expressed interest in their efforts. The school board isn't officially endorsing or sponsoring Monday's forum; but is encouraging attendance "so that all sides of the issues may be adequately heard." The forum will feature four area legislators and two Department of Education employees. Legislators include Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly; Sen. Larry Anderson, R-Twin Falls; Rep. Mack Whitman, R-Fairfield; and Rep. Steve Antone, R-Twin Falls. Participating from the Idaho Department of Education are David Steadman, chief of the bureau of instruction, and Mark Fox, chief of the bureau of finance. It is being held in the Murtaugh High School gym at 7:30 p.m. Spokeswoman Judy Tesch said Citizens for a Better Murtaugh set up the forum to provide information to Murtaugh school district patrons on

the viability of small school districts like Murtaugh and what options the school district has if the override passes and the high school is closed. Murtaugh School District voters already voted a one override attempt. On March 20, 56 percent of the voters cast ballots against a levy of the same amount the school board is asking for this time. "Ten days after the defeat, the school board announced that after talking to patrons and carefully weighing their comments, they decided to schedule another override election for May 1." The school district is facing a deficit of \$90,170. Should this override pass, the school board plans to allocate \$15,000 toward reducing that debt. "But if the override fails," the board says it would rather close the high school than operate a system that does not meet the needs of the children of the district. The school has been placed on the state's list of schools accredited with an "advised" status. If improvements are not made the school could drop to "warned" status and lose its accreditation. "If the override does not pass, the district will have obligations to provide high school education." See LEVY on Page B2

# Night moves: Army tests infrared devices on juniper-covered range

**REDMOND, Ore.** — Sitting in the back of a Huey H-1 helicopter, technician Wayne Simmons scanned the juniper-covered plain with the infrared camera mounted in the nose turret.

Images of an M-60 tank, an M-113 armored personnel carrier, a 25-ton truck and National Guard troops appeared on the green-and-white screen of the monitor.

"What we'd like to do is have that thing scan the scene, put the crosshairs on it and have the pilot say, 'OK, I agree, and push the button,'" said Paul Travesty, director of the Army's Center for Night Vision and Electro-optics.

Rather than firing missiles, the helicopter has been shooting videotape as it flies repeated passes over the vehicles and people hidden among the junipers. Russian thistle and cheat grass that cover the volcanic soil of the Central Oregon test and evaluation facility.

The Redmond range is 55 acres of federal land just a few miles down the road from the airport where skiers land for Mount Bachelor and from a U.S. Forest Service smokejumper base. Another range covering 170 acres lies outside Bend.

Established in July 1984, they have been used to test night vision devices for weapons ranging from M-16 rifles to tanks and helicopters.

A National Guard tank unit is based nearby and provides the men and vehicles used in the tests.

Between the Redmond range and the one outside Bend, the Army has its choice of two different sorts of terrain — juniper and rocks.

Add those factors to the wide open spaces of the high desert east of the Cascade Range, and you have a place that makes field test director John Farr's mouth water.

"Finding a good place to test is rather difficult," said Farr. "This is a dry environment, with exposed rock. It's similar to battlefield conditions. On a battlefield, there would be a lot of scorched earth along with vegetation, which all adds to the clutter."

The clutter Farr speaks of is thermal clutter, obscuring the warm images of men and fired-up tanks against the cold night earth.

While the Army already can see at night, this project is trying to develop a computer program working through Forward Looking Infrared images that can help the pilot of an attack helicopter identify targets and decide whether to fire.

"If you look at a helicopter scenario, they may get directed into an area with enemy problems," said Travesty. "Normally, they're after tanks. The Army's always after tanks. So the helicopter may be flying low behind a tree line, using it for cover. They'll only have a short time to pop up, put the crosshairs on it

and fire. What we are trying to do is reduce that time."

While computer-aided target recognition would reduce the time a helicopter is unarmable, it could also eliminate the need to have a gunner on board with the pilot, Travesty said.

A smaller helicopter would be cheaper, and smaller crews would allow the Army — fixed at a strength of 780,000 people — to put more of them in the air, Travesty said.

Though the 20-year-old helicopter and the 10-year-old prototype Forward Looking Infrared system are time-worn, they serve well enough to gather images to develop target signatures, Farr said.

"You can say, OK, that's a wheeled vehicle with ribs on the back and say it's a deuce-and-a-half (cargo truck) without even thinking about it," said Farr. "For a black box to do that is monumentally difficult."

It's the same idea as the automated equipment used to identify ZIP codes at the post office, only more complicated because of the variety of targets and combat conditions.

"You want to know which is more of a threat," said Simmons as he scanned the vehicles on the field in front of him. "They probably wouldn't expend a high-dollar fire-and-forget missile on a deuce and a half, whereas they would on a tank or something that could knock them out of the air."



East put up his heart king at trick one and South faced a decision: If he took the trick, he could later develop dummy's 16 into a winner. What would happen if he took this short-sighted view?

South takes the heart ace, draws trumps and takes a losing finesse in diamonds. Back comes a heart to West's queen, and the marked club shows through dummy's king nets the diamond suit down. What use did dummy's good heart 10 serve?

South makes the game easily if he frets about that second heart winner. He ducks the first trick and with the continuation with his ace. After he has drawn trumps, the diamond finesse loses but dummy's club king is safe from attack. Regardless of what East does, South can claim 10 tricks to bring home his game and rubber.

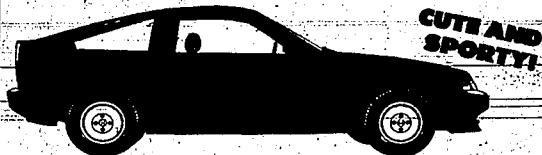

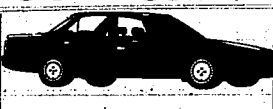

## COFFEEHOUSE READINGS

### Under the smell of coffee beans and a full moon, writers gather in Ketchum to voice their work

KETCHUM — When you walk into the Ketchum Coffee Grinder, a deep coffee smell permeates the place. A fan that hangs above the cash register rocks as it spins. But from the dark rug to the knotted tables made of cross-sections of huge trees, the coffee smell wafts the ambience, the coffee bean atmosphere of the small coffeehouse.

Early Monday, as the full moon worked its way toward the Magic Valley and Ketchum, the monthly Full Moon Reading took place at the Grinder. A portable podium was set up near the front door — anyone with a poem or short story could stand up and read.

Although the reading was advertised to begin at 7 p.m., at 7:30 everybody continued to mill around and talk about stories and poems they

were working on or jobs they once had. When the reading finally began, fifteen people listened intently as three writers read short fiction, stories of romance and danger and ghosts from the past.

One of the readers wore shorts and sported a full, red mustache. In his story "Roadhunters," two friends wait in their car, trapped in an unlikely November snowstorm, living off a deer they shot and wondering when the helicopters loaded with brandy will appear from the snow-colored sky.

Pat McCarthy read on, leaning over the small podium. The two friends in "Roadhunters" try to walk out to the highway but Jim breaks through the ice that covers a small creek. As he tries to dry his boots, Jim talks about the helicoptered rescue party that must be on its way.

"The pant cuffs were frozen around the top of

his boots. Brandy," he said again aloud. "Just drop it. You don't have to pick up today. Just a thermos now. Come back tomorrow with more coffee, more brandy, maybe a rope ladder. How about a burger while you're at it."

McCarthy is a carpenter in Ketchum. He is also a writer and the organizer of the weekly writer's workshop, held Tuesdays at the Grinder. At the workshop each week, writers from around the area meet and critique each other's work. McCarthy says he began the writer's workshop and Full-Moon Readings as an impetus to his own writing.

"It's bleak to try writing on your own, sending things out and not knowing," says McCarthy. "And it gets tough to trust your friends to comment on your work, you need some real critics. Workshoping brings people together who are interested in the same thing. It creates direction and gives you incentive to keep writing."

Another writer, Hselen Potts, read her story "On The Way Home." In it, Potts attempts to weave "a young girl's relationship with a boy together with her own feelings of displacement in the world. Potts describes the piece, though, as an exercise. She says that the weekly workshop allows her to experiment with her writing. She can "try new things" and then listen to others comment and critique her at

## Egyptian slab discovered

PROVO, Utah (AP) — Discovery of an inscribed stone slab in the desert sands near Cairo link a 4,600-year-old pyramid to the Pharaoh Sneferu, whose son, Cheops, built the famous pyramid of Giza, a Brigham Young University archaeologist says.

C. Wilfred Griggs, professor of ancient scripture at BYU and director of the dig, said the March discovery at the Sneferu pyramid also indicate the site may have been

part of an ancient cultic center. Further, Griggs said the relics found were so different than those previously discovered that it will redefine and expand existing knowledge about ancient Egyptian cultures.

Excavation of a 2,000-year-old cemetery about 1.5 miles from the pyramid also yielded 140 graves from which BYU archaeologists gained information about burial practices, religious symbolism and textiles.

## Local sculptor creates commissioned series for Constitution event

TWIN FALLS. — Publicity and promotions to heighten awareness of the United States Constitution which will celebrate its 200th anniversary this Sept. 17, are mounting.

Danny Edwards, a local, self-taught sculptor, was selected last year by the Bicentennial Commission, provisioned by Congress to promote the Constitution, to create five commemorative sculptures, one for each year of the celebration of the Constitution.

His contract was finalized with the commission in Washington, D.C., four weeks ago.

Edwards' series of bronze and pewter sculptures begins this year with an American bald eagle clutching the Constitution. He said he hasn't decided yet what the remainder of the sculptures will depict.

"I heard about them (the commission) and contacted them. I told them other things that I had done that were similar. They were open to the suggestion, so I went ahead and created a sculpture and they liked it," Edwards said.

Edwards was born and raised in Twin Falls and graduated from Twin Falls High School in 1965. He earned a bachelor of arts degree in fine arts from Northwest Nazarene College in Nampa.

He was designing furniture for several local manufacturers three

years ago when he met Earl McAdams, a metal sculptor, in the Twin Falls City Park.

"I chatted with him quite a bit and I told my wife, 'I think I can do that,'" Edwards said. Inspired by his newly found friend, Edwards began sculpting in wax and clay, working out the problems of finding correct proportion and understanding the basics of sculpting.

In late 1985, Edwards met up with Legends-Enterprises, a soon-to-be nationwide marketing firm. He worked with them on a few pieces, and made a clean break with business and furniture making to become a full-time sculptor on Jan. 1, 1986. That year, he sculpted 22 pieces, mainly of wildlife and old West scenes. They were on commission, mainly for several organizations for fund-raisers.

Edwards' work is available nationally in airports and gift shops.

President Ronald Reagan was given one of his Bicentennial eagles by a friend, Edwards said.

Edwards' sculptures will be made at a foundry in Los Angeles, where workers dismember the wax original and make molds of each part of the sculpture. All the pieces are cast and then welded or soldered back together.

The limited edition commemorative sculpture is available in either pewter or bronze. Only 3,500 of each medium will be produced. For more information, call Edwards' Silyertip Studios at 734-3440.



## Anthropologist to discuss aborigines

# Gritty ABC drama 'Mariah' attempts to portray prison life



"Mariah," a new one-hour drama that airs Wednesdays on ABC, focuses on those who live and work on both sides of the prison bars in a state penitentiary. From the role of a prisoner's family to suicidal inmates to a corrections officer drawn into a drug ring, "Mariah" will attempt to explore the world left off-screen in "Hill Street Blues" and "L.A. Law."

The problem of selling a show with a group of criminals at its core has been a cause of worry for the producers. The show was called "Mariah State" originally, and now it is simply "Mariah." This change from the specific to the generic would seem to reflect an attempt to appeal to a wider range of people who, presumably, won't realize the show is about a prison until someone announces it.

How truthful a portrayal is it? "In the best of cases, we'll approach some sort of dramatic truth," says John Getz, who plays First Deputy Superintendent Ned Sheffield. "In the worst, we'll try to compact a series of stories into an hour."

Getz's character is totally absorbed by the world of the prison. "Ned is the Hamlet of Mariah State," Getz says. "He's after the truth. He wants to fix everything. His father was a cop who deserted the family when Ned was young, and he's always had a love/hate relationship with the idea of the law. He's fascinated with the people his father discarded."

## Donahue' cut in hometown

CHICAGO (AP) — Phil Donahue's daytime TV talk show is being canceled by a television station in the program's old hometown, officials said April 9.

WBBM-TV, a CBS affiliate, notified the syndicated "Donahue" show that its contract would not be renewed when it expires in mid-September, said a spokesman who asked not to be identified.

WBBM plans to replace "Donahue" with "The People's Court," the spokesman said.

"Donahue" was taped at WBBM from January 1982 until it moved to New York in late 1984. Before WBBM, the show originated from WGN-TV in Chicago.

be easily implemented," the actor explains. "It was important to let go of my preconceptions, so I could understand what really went on."

At Sing Sing, Getz was surprised by the degree to which many of the prison staff were committed to their jobs. And he was struck by the "serious, releasing humor, even on serious topics." Both the obsessiveness and the dark humor were incorporated by Getz into his portrayal of a man completely wrapped up in his job.

"Mariah" is a venture into the world of discarded people, a world where both the prisoners and the staff lead complicated, often despairing lives. It also deals with the kinds of subjects that television often prefers to wrap up in sagary endings. The medium has had some success mining the gritty underside of dark subjects, but the future of "Mariah" may come down to a basic question: Are the lives of the keepers just as grim as those of the inmates? If the answer is yes, ABC may have a hard sell on its hands.

# SOAP Cross wants it all in 'One Life'

When Marcia Cross was a kid and doing her school productions, her sisters thought it was cute, but that she would grow out of it. They called Marcia meant it when she said she wanted to be an actress when it came time to go to college. She went for brochures to many of the leading drama schools. She did stage work primarily after that, at various regional theaters, and had no intentions of doing another soap. However, when the role of anthropologist Kate Sanders came along, she returned to the afternoon dramas.

Marcia, the actress knows that you can only spend a certain amount of time in a soap before moving on. However, she is not that rigid and has set no time limits. Like all actresses of her generation, Marcia wants to work in films, but her devotion to the stage will never take a back seat.

## Rooney goes back

NEW YORK (L.A. Times) — "60 Minutes" humorist Andy Rooney, taken off CBS News' payroll April 6 after he refused to work during the Writers Guild strike, will April 15 be going back to work now that it appears the strike will end.

"I'm on my way in now," he said in a brief phone interview from his home a day after the guild urged its 315 members at CBS to approve a new contract proposed by the company. They went on strike March 2.

Rooney said his on-air return to the show will be next week. He said that producer, (Don) Hewitt, had pretty much set the show for broadcast for this week and there was no room for a new segment.

A guild source said it was expected that the striking CBS workers would approve the pact when they vote on Thursday. A guild strike against ABC, also begun March 2, is continuing, as are negotiations to end it.

Rooney has been a guild member for 30 years.



## Allen moves on to new roles

CULVER CITY, Calif. (AP) — Dancer and choreographer Debbie Allen says now that "Fame" is coming to an end she is getting antsy to get on to other things, such as directing.

"I don't care about being the first black woman director or anything like that," she says. "I just want to be good."

Allen has been with "Fame" from the start, from a brief role in the 1980 movie version, to stardom in the television series, first on NBC, then on first-run syndication.

She plays dance teacher Lydia Grant in the series, which is set in New York City's High School for the Performing Arts. She started out doing the show's choreography and was directing by the third year.

Now she is moving on to other projects, directing segments of such shows as NBC's "Family Ties" and "The Bronx Zoo." She has an open invitation to direct "The Bill Cosby Show," which stars her sister, Phylicia Rashad, as Clair Huxtable.

"It's done a lot for me being in 'Fame.' What limitations I've felt as an actress, I've made up as a producer and director," she says. "I couldn't have had a better school. But I've started to get antsy about getting out and doing other things."

She may not be off the tube for the long. She has a pilot deal with CBS.

"Fame" is the finger-popping, raised-our-vent, I have the feeling dancing show that helped prove that they want the stage space for their network cancellation is not necessary. It makes sense."

The show ran on NBC from January 1982 to August 1983 and after it was canceled MGM-UA Television put it into first-run syndication in 1984. Earlier, "Too Close for Comfort," "Hee Haw" and "The Lawrence Welk Show" had gone into syndication with new shows after being canceled by a network. "The Paper Chase" was picked-up by the Showtime pay channel after it was dropped by CBS.

The last episode of "Fame" was filmed in late March, with Allen as director and choreographer. Some of the earlier members of the cast, including Lee Curreri, Cynthia Giff, Erica Gimpel, Valerie Landsburg and P.R. Paul, returned for the final show.

"We canceled 'Fame' for economic reasons," says David Gerber, president of MGM-UA Television. "We did the show for six years, but it didn't make sense to do it for another year. We've been running a deficit here, although it makes money overseas."

Allen says she believes the show was caught in a cost squeeze when Lorimar-Telepictures bought the MGM studio from Atlanta television entrepreneur Ted Turner.

"They bought the studio and all the sound stages and everything in them," she says. "They're already

## Many crossing over from film to television

NEW YORK (AP) — Charlton Heston says there just aren't many good roles for "grown-ups" in today's teen-dominated movies. Alan Arkin says his agent told him the "us against them" conflict between film and television had ended.

Movie producers Richard Zanuck and David Brown wanted the "immediacy" of television. Director Robert Altman was having trouble getting a new movie made, but ABC's offer to direct one-hour dramas meant getting on the air within weeks.

With fewer movies being made and

at increasingly higher costs, more and more film types are turning to the small screen, where a constant need for more material means no waiting — and the number of viewers tuned in each night dwarfs that of fans in movie theaters.

Not only are film people coming to television, but when they arrive, they often find the material rather familiar.

"Gung Ho," "Starman" and "Nothing in Common" are under this scanner. "Down and Out in Beverly Hills" and "Peggy Sue Got Married" are being adapted for next

season.

"Perfect Strangers" was inspired by Bronson Pinchot's bit part in "Beverly Hills Cop." "Beverly Hills Buntz" is the tentative title of a possible spinoff from "Hill Street Blues."

Producer Zey Baram has moved to television from theatrical-release films. His pilot "Tour of Duty" is bound to be compared to "Platoon," though Baram said the TV show was not an CBS remake. "Platoon" was released last year. "Platoon" doesn't hurt," he said.

# Award-winning 'Hill Street Blues' turns in its badge for final season

AT TELEVISION'S PREMIERE, NBC's darkly humorous police show that won more awards than any dramatic series in TV history, will turn in its badge next month after seven seasons, the producers announced April 13.

Cancellation of the show, which drew a fanatical following but never boasted huge ratings, had been expected for weeks. A number of its cast members had said they would not return for an eighth year.

"Hill Street Blues" will have its last original telecast on NBC on Tuesday, May 12, with an episode called "It Ain't Over 'Til It's Over," said Arthur Price, president of MTM Enterprises, one of the show's owners. The gritty drama, which has moments of black comedy and frequently populated by black characters, has been a hit in many urban areas. Its writers and producers pushed televi-

sion network standards to the limits with its depiction of sexual situations, and raw human emotions. It was often a chaotic show, marked by overlapping dialogue and crisscrossing stories that sometimes continued from week to week.

"I think it's a shame when shows limp off or are canceled, in effect, rather than leaving them laughing," said Grant Tinker, former chairman of MTM and former president of NBC. "It's time for 'Hill Street' to get off. It's a wonderful body of work. It's a much better memory than if it had run out of gas."

Price echoed that sentiment, saying "We have enjoyed seven very satisfying seasons making 'Hill Street Blues.' It seems appropriate to close this happy venture on a high note and to permit the show's vast talented staff of writers and actors to pursue other projects." "Hill Street Blues" executive pro-

ducer in 1985: "It was a wonderful seven years, and it's time."

Brandon Tartikoff, president of NBC Entertainment, said "Hill Street" was the series that "signaled a new NBC when it premiered back in 1981. Its talented team has consistently hit and bettered the standard of excellence the series established for dramatic television."

Daniel J. Travanti, who played Capt. Frank Furillo, a man beset by personal problems as well as those of the precinct, was out of town and could not be reached for comment. Travanti had said, however, that he would not return for another year if the show was renewed. Several other stars, including Veronica Hamel, Bruce Weitz, James Sikking, Betty Thomas and Joe Spano, had indicated they did not plan to return either.

Representatives of Charles Haid, Weitz, Sikking, Michael Warren and Robert Prosky said they were also out of town. But Weitz's spokeswoman, Nancy Paul, remarked that Weitz "wouldn't have gone back anyway."

"Hill Street Blues" made its debut in January 1981, delayed because of an actors' strike the previous summer, and nearly sank because of low ratings until it won eight Emmy awards that September.

The show went on to win 26 Emmys from the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences. Only "The Mary Tyler Moore Show" with 29 won more. In all, "Hill Street" won 104 awards, including a Peabody and two Grammys for its musical theme.

It was voted the outstanding dramatic series four years straight.

"Hill Street" rarely made it into television's Top 10 ratings and seldom surpassed its CBS rival, "Knots Landing." Nevertheless, it had a loyal following of young, af-

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A brief history of sex on television:

—1952: Lucy is pregnant but may not say the word on "I Love Lucy."

—1961: Rob and Laura sleep in separate beds on "The Dick Van Dyke Show."

—1973: Maude Flinidy gets an abortion on "Maude."

—1985-1987: Teen-ager David brings home a box of condoms on "Valerie," Arnie Becker and a client have a sweat-soaked encounter in bed on "L.A. Law" and millions of viewers tune in for the climactic marriage of Maddie and David on "Moonlighting."

People on television are now doing what they once couldn't even talk about. And they are talking about it — a lot — with gulps, asides, innuendos and double entendres.

"The basic position I always take, right or wrong, is that we're writing and producing adult television for adults, and it is a medium considerably grown-up," said Steven

Bochco, co-creator of NBC's hot new show, "L.A. Law," as well as the ground-breaking "Hill Street Blues."

"I think we as adults have a responsibility to monitor things children watch," Bochco said, "but I am fundamentally opposed to the notion of censorship. If there is something that offends you, turn it off. I think ultimately the audience is the best censor of all."

"I think over a long period of time a number of taboos have fallen by the wayside," said Leonard Goldberg, president of 20th Century Fox and producer of "Something About Amelia," an award-winning, made-for-television movie that dealt frankly with incest.

"In recent years, we've been able to devote programs to once-taboo subjects," he said. "Obviously, there are still a number of taboos, which for the most part I think are rightly there. Television is a medium that's available to the whole family."
