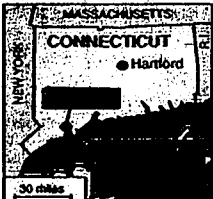


Rescuers dig through rubble of collapsed apartment building in Bridgeport, Conn.

Apartment building collapse kills 7, injures 12, traps score

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. — A high-rise apartment building under construction collapsed Thursday, killing seven workers, injuring a dozen and trapping 11 others under tons of concrete and twisted steel beams, the mayor said.



Major Harding, one of the volunteers, said he saw "six or seven slabs of concrete nanked on top of each other." There were conflicting reports about how many stories were built by the time of the collapse.

"The chances of finding anyone alive are very minimal," Mayor Thomas Buccia said at a news conference shortly before 8 p.m. MDT. "We haven't given up hope. We're hoping there are pockets within the destruction where survivors are located," he said.

Major Harding, one of the volunteers, said he saw "six or seven slabs of concrete nanked on top of each other." There were conflicting reports about how many stories were built by the time of the collapse.

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State George P. Shultz, assuring the NATO allies that the United States has an awesome and flexible nuclear arsenal, said Thursday the West "shouldn't be afraid to take yes for an answer to our proposal" for missile reductions.

Shultz last week delayed a final response to Gorbachev until the officials could consider the prospective U.S. pact with Moscow. Some NATO officials, as well as several members of Congress, have expressed concern about not deploying new U.S. nuclear weapons in Western Europe.

All foreign aid funds cut out

WASHINGTON — The House stripped all foreign aid money from a budget-busting money bill Thursday, and lawmakers said final passage of the measure was in doubt until the House voted on the amendment.

Democratic leaders, who had been working to bring the bill essentially intact, began working in support of an amendment, drafted by Rep. Buddy Mackay, D-Pa., designed to cut the bill back by more than \$2 billion to bring it within budget guidelines.

Democratic lawmakers would refuse to supply. He said that if Republicans voted against the measure as expected, it would then pass.

Indictments may be unsealed today

Judges, officials on racist's 'hit list'

SEATTLE (AP) — A fugitive white supremacist who has declared war on the government in the name of the paramilitary group The Order has a "hit list" that includes federal judges and government officials, a federal grand jury said.

The list is being carried by Glenn Miller, 46, former leader of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan in North Carolina and founder of the White Patriot Party, said Robert Christian, chief deputy in the U.S. Marshal's office in Seattle.

Published reports this week said an investigation of white supremacists, including Miller, is to culminate in the next few days with unsealing of federal grand jury indictments in Arkansas alleging sedition, assassination plots and civil rights violations.

Earlier this month, Miller issued a declaration of war against the federal government and minorities under the name of "The Order," the paramilitary organization that staged a wave of robberies and other crimes in the West in 1983 and 1984 aimed at establishing an Aryan homeland. Twenty-two Order members were convicted or pleaded guilty to racketeering.

Miller mailed the declaration in a letter to 5,000 subscribers of publications produced by

the White Patriot Party.

U.S. District Judge Walter McGovern, chief judge in the Western District of Washington, and Assistant U.S. Attorney Gene Wilson, who headed the prosecution team in The Order trial, were not named in the hit list but were advised about it, Christian said Wednesday.

The only person identified by name on the hit list was Morris Dees, head of the Southern Poverty Law Center in Montgomery, Ala. Dees also was named as an assassination target during testimony in the 1985 Seattle trial.

The grand jury in Fort Smith, Ark., issued two sealed indictments Tuesday. The Fort Smith Southwest Times Record reported on Wednesday that at least 14 white supremacists are named in the indictments on charges of murder and plotting to kill a federal judge and an FBI agent.

On Thursday, the Spokesman-Review in Spokane said the indictments will be announced either today or Monday at news conferences at Fort Smith and Washington, D.C., after those indicted have been arrested or told of the charges against them.

U.S. Attorney Michael Fitzhugh of Fort

Smith has said he would announce today when the indictments would be unsealed.

The Spokane newspaper cited unidentified sources as saying those likely to be arrested because of the investigation include Miller and Richard G. Butler, 69, leader of the Church of Jesus Christ Christian (Aryan Nations) based in Hayden Lake, Idaho. The Order was a splinter group from Aryan Nations.

Ten members of The Order were convicted in December 1985 of racketeering. Prosecutors alleged they staged a string of crimes in late 1983 and 1984, including the June 1984 machine-gun killing of Denver radio host Alan Berg, and a July 1984 robbery of a Brink's armored truck near Eureka, Calif., that netted \$3.8 million. Twelve other Order members pleaded guilty.

Miller, convicted last year in North Carolina for operating a paramilitary training camp, has been free on bail pending an appeal of his conviction and six-month prison sentence.

A fugitive warrant was issued Monday, charging Miller with violating his bond conditions. Baugh said FBI agents know that Miller has been in Arkansas since approximately April 7.

Pires draws 20-year term

BOISE (AP) — Robert E. Pires, 22, whose testimony led to the arrest of three other persons involved in a bombing plot in the Coeur d'Alene area last year, was sentenced to 20 years in prison by a federal judge here Thursday.

U.S. District Court Judge Harold Ryan sentenced Pires, Silver Springs, Md., to 20 years for attempted bank robbery. He then sentenced Pires to terms of 10 years each for malicious destruction of federal property, possession of an unregistered automatic firearm, and possession of counterfeit money.

Pires was fined \$200.

The terms will run at the same time as the 20-year prison term, and Pires received credit for time served since Oct. 6, 1986.

That was when Pires turned himself in to federal authorities after a brief involvement with the white supremacy organization, the Bruder Schweigen Strike Force II. He sought protection under the federal witness protection program.

Pires was brought to Boise for an unannounced court appearance, and was taken away under heavy security immediately after sentencing.

Red Cross evicted

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The local American Red Cross received an eviction notice from Bonneville County Wednesday.

"Evicted, not asked to leave," said Kent Whittington, chairman of the board of directors. "We're being evicted."

Home for the last nine years has been a basement room in the courthouse. The county says it needs the office space, so the Red Cross chapter must find new quarters by June 30. It has a budget of \$3,600 per year, but officials say that won't go far paying for rent, utilities and upkeep.

Idaho woman ready for trip home from Kansas

JOIA, Kan. (AP) — An Idaho woman whose trip to Kansas to visit her sister in Iowa became an odyssey of bills and wrong turns is hoping a trip home Friday will bring an end to her troubles.

"I just told my sister I hope they don't hijack the plane — that would be the last straw," Nellie Obendorf said Thursday, her sense of humor intact.

Her husband, 71-year-old Orville, suffered from frostbite after the couple spent 13 days trapped in their car by a succession of Kansas blizzards. He flew to Idaho last week and was admitted to a hospital in Caldwell. Mrs. Obendorf said his feet

were amputated Wednesday.

"He seemed to adjust to it real well, he seemed real well," she said after talking with him Wednesday.

Obendorf, who was listed in fair condition Thursday at West Valley Medical Center, was expected to remain hospitalized for several months.

Mrs. Obendorf also learned this week of another setback.

"We had a little bad luck, somebody broke into our house (in Nampa, Idaho) and stole our car and took it out. As if enough hadn't happened," she said.

Detective Riley Newton of the

Nampa Police Department said, family member reported that some things were taken from the home, but there was no evidence of forced entry.

Mrs. Obendorf, 65, and her husband were traveling from Nampa to the Iowa home of her sister, Georgia Roberts, when they took a wrong turn and became stuck in a blizzard that buried their car up to its roof near Norton.

A second blizzard came days later, and the couple was trapped in their

snow-covered car until a farmer discovered them April 4. They survived on soda and Girl Scout cookies during the ordeal.

The couple, married 45 years, has been plagued by health problems. Obendorf lost half his foot because of a blood clot several years ago, and Mrs. Obendorf has had two cancer operations in the past four years.

Mrs. Obendorf seemed in good spirits Thursday, and said she was looking forward to being home again.

Hansen retains hope for political comeback

BLACKFOOT (AP) — Former Idaho congressman George Hansen, in a Virginia jail awaiting a decision on whether his parole from prison will be revoked, has suggested he might attempt a political comeback after his legal problems have been resolved.

And the seven-term Republican says he thinks conservative Idaho voters will support him once they know the full story about his battle with the federal government.

"I've been elected under indictments. I've been elected or nearly elected within a hundred votes when the convictions were going on, and I think we have a fair-minded, nice, good, independent-minded bunch of people in Idaho," Hansen said. "And I think when they make sure they get the full story on this one, I think they would vote with me."

Hansen made his comments in a telephone interview from his Alexandria, Va., jail cell on Wednesday with Blackfoot radio station KLCE.

In the ninth day of a hunger strike at the city jail south of the nation's Capitol, Hansen did not elaborate on what his future political ambitions might be, saying only that Idaho voters "have stood with me very, very well."

In the interview, Hansen reiterated his claim that he was victimized by the government because of his battle to rein in its power.

Hansen also claimed he never agreed to the travel and financial reporting restrictions in his parole and made that clear to officials when he was released, telling them "if you can't do that, leave me in jail."

"I've not violated anything," Hansen said. "They're the violators by trying to say I agreed to something I didn't and impose conditions I didn't agree to."

Judge denies inmate's plea

BOISE (AP) — U.S. District Judge Harold Ryan has turned down a bid by a state prison inmate to overturn his conviction and 10-year prison term from Blaine County.

Ryan on Thursday dismissed a petition from prison inmate Gene A. Camp, who in 1983 was sentenced to a fixed, 10-year prison term for a slaying near Driggs. Ryan ruled Camp has not gone through the state appeals process, and must do that before carrying his complaints to federal court.

Camp alleged that he was first charged with murder in Wyoming, but the case was later transferred to Idaho when it was discovered that the incident occurred in Idaho.

Silver price floor would be a mistake

It may play well as Idaho political rhetoric, but as economic policy, we think it would be a mistake for Congress to adopt the suggestion of Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, and Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus to set a purchase floor of \$7.50 an ounce under the price of silver.

Both Democrats are playing to an Idaho constituency with this suggestion. Stallings should know better. Andrus is clearly interested in preserving his support among North Idaho mining communities, which have been hard hit by the decline of competitiveness of the American silver industry.

But the way out of this problem, both should know, is not to create yet another federal subsidy program, which would, in effect, obligate the American consumer to underwrite the mining of American silver, even if the economics of doing so didn't make sense themselves.

Programs like that are one of the main reasons the federal deficit is out of control and the American economy teeters along.

Instead of proposing still more programs which fall on the taxpayer and protect special interests, we ought to be looking for ways to trim or eliminate the ones which are now in place.

Even from an economic perspective, the silver support idea is a weak one. Setting a floor on silver prices would mean higher costs to consumers for many products which use it in manufacturing, such as computers. That would, in turn, make these products less, not more, competitive. This, in the end, would cost more jobs.

In a climate of increasing protectionism, it is easy to jump on the bandwagon and proclaim support for local industries. Certainly, there is political merit in protecting the North Idaho silver communities.

But the way to return jobs to that industry is to make it competitive through modern capital investment and a wage structure which reflects the competitive nature of the world-wide silver market.

Temping as it is for local benefit, Americans don't need another subsidized industry. That way leads, in the end, to less competitiveness, not more.

A nightmare come true
The letters from Will Buhler and Charles Wilson concerning Claude Dallas were the last straw for me.

My husband is an officer with the Idaho Fish and Game Department. What Mr. Buhler and Ms. Wilson (and a lot of other people) seem to fail to realize is that PTL officers are hired, trained, and authorized by the state of Idaho to enforce Fish and Game laws.

They are law enforcement officers just the same as the highway patrol, the local sheriff, or city police. Their job is to enforce the laws enacted by the Legislature and to arrest people for illegal acts.

There is absolutely no doubt in my mind that without Fish and Game laws and law enforcement officers, in no time at all there wouldn't be any fish to catch or game to hunt because of the people like Dallas who think they are above the law — the people who regularly take whatever they want, when and where they want, with total disregard for the law.

If these laws didn't exist, the public would quickly demand them to protect our enjoyment of wildlife and to assure hunting and fishing for law-abiding citizens.

IF&G officers (men and women) are hard working, well trained, conscientious state employees. Mr. Buhler and Ms. Wilson imply that officers Pogue and Elms had no business even approaching known-poacher Dallas, and that the officers did so with their guns drawn — neither of which is fact.

If the highway patrol stops a driver and discovers that he is armed, the person is promptly disarmed and considered dangerous.

Pogue and Elms disarmed Dallas, but evidently failed to frisk him to discover the second weapon that Dallas subsequently used to shoot both officers.

With Fish and Game officers, virtually everyone they encounter is armed, and officers frequently work alone in isolated areas. The murder of Pogue and Elms was the nightmare come true of every law enforcement officer and his family.

Fortunately most citizens understand and accept our laws, and appreciate the countless men and women who risk their lives to enforce them for our protection.

T-N policies questioned

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — The army's new chief of staff, Jose D. Carid, warned troops Thursday against slaying more rebellions like those in the last week that led to the resignation or firing of 24 senior officers.

President Raul Alfonsin pronounced all was quiet Thursday among the armed forces and declared the military crisis had been "absolutely overcome."

But his statements were challenged by House of Deputies leader Jose Luis Manzano, head of the opposition Peronist Reform faction.

Revamp economy, Japan told

TOKYO (AP) — Japan should restructure its economy to make it more "harmonious" with the rest of the world by reducing its dependence on exports and improving market access for foreign companies, an advisory group to Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone recommended Thursday.

It said Japan should begin immediately to deregulate its economy and open up more to foreign firms, including construction companies that want to join in building a multibillion-dollar airport near Osaka in western Japan.


The group, led by former Bank of Japan Governor Haruo Maekawa, said in a report submitted to the government's Economic Council that Japan's trade surpluses "cannot be allowed to continue, either for the Japanese economy itself or for the harmonious development of the world economy."

Korean students, police clash

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — About 700 students hurled firebombs and stones at a police Thursday in clashes at Seoul National University after a memorial service for a student who died after police torture, witnesses said.

Protests against the government also were reported at 13 other universities.

Last week there were campus protests almost every day, but intermittent rains this week seemed to cool the situation until Thursday.

Silver price floor would be a mistake

It may play well as Idaho political rhetoric, but as economic policy, we think it would be a mistake for Congress to adopt the suggestion of Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, and Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus to set a purchase floor of \$7.50 an ounce under the price of silver.

Both Democrats are playing to an Idaho constituency with this suggestion. Stallings should know better. Andrus is clearly interested in preserving his support among North Idaho mining communities, which have been hard hit by the decline of competitiveness of the American silver industry.

But the way out of this problem, both should know, is not to create yet another federal subsidy program which would, in effect, obligate the American consumer to underwrite the mining of American silver, even if the economics of doing so didn't make sense themselves.

Programs like that are one of the main reasons the federal deficit is out of control and the American economy teeters along.

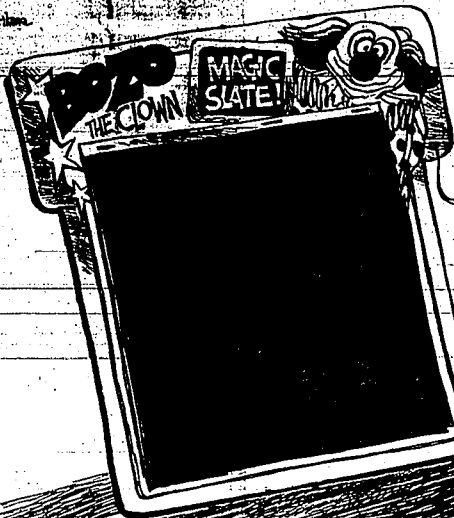
Instead of proposing still more programs which fall on the taxpayer and protect special interests, we ought to be looking for ways to trim or eliminate the ones which are now in place.

Even from an economic perspective, the silver support idea is a weak one. Setting a floor on silver prices would mean higher costs to consumers for many products which use it in manufacturing, such as computers. That would, in turn, make these products less, not more, competitive. This, in the end, would cost more jobs.

In a climate of increasing protectionism, it is easy to jump on the bandwagon and proclaim support for local industries. Certainly, there is political merit in protecting the North Idaho silver communities.

But the way to return jobs to that industry is to make it competitive through modern capital investment and a wage structure which reflects the competitive nature of the world-wide silver market.

Tempting as it is for local benefit, Americans don't need another subsidized industry. That way leads, in the end, to less competitiveness, not more.

Warning for Argentine troops

BUENOS AIRES (AP) — The army's new chief of staff, Jose D. Cardil, warned troops Thursday against staging more rebellions like those in the last week that led to the resignation or firing of 24 senior officers.

President Raul Alfonsín pronounced all was quiet Thursday among the armed forces and declared the military crisis had been "absolutely overcome."

But his statements were challenged by House of Deputies leader Jose Luis Manzano, head of the opposition Peronist Reform faction.

Revamp economy, Japan told

TOKYO (AP) — Japan should restructure its economy to make it more "harmonious" with the rest of the world by reducing its dependence on exports and improving market access for foreign companies, an advisory group to Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone recommended Thursday.

It said Japan should begin immediately to deregulate its economy and open up more to foreign firms, including construction companies that want to join in building a multibillion-dollar airport near Osaka in western Japan.


The group, led by former Bank of Japan Governor Haruo Maekawa, said in a report submitted to the government's Economic Council that Japan's trade surpluses "cannot be allowed to continue, either for the Japanese economy itself or for the harmonious development of the world economy."

Korean students, police clash

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — About 700 students hurled firebombs and stones at police Thursday in clashes at Seoul National University after a memorial service for a student who died after police torture, witnesses said.

Protests against the government also were reported at 13 other universities.

Last week there were campus protests almost every day, but intermittent rains this week seemed to cool the situation until Thursday.

Wheat subsidy wins approval

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal payments for winter wheat growers unable to plant because of floods won Senate approval Thursday after lawmakers scuttled efforts to add a \$1.6 billion soybean subsidy.

The measure, passed on a voice vote after a two-day debate, would allow winter wheat growers to receive 82 percent of normal payments while leaving idle all their acreage eligible for subsidies but still to be planted.

Only the 1987 crop would be affected.

Defeat of the soybean plan on grounds that it would bust the fiscal 1987 budget prompted withdrawal of a separate proposal to spend up \$2.8 billion in corn payments. The corn plan remained alive in the House where the Agriculture Committee's wheat and feedgrains subcommittee approved it on a voice vote.

Boesky enters plea of guilty

NEW YORK (AP) — Ivan F. Boesky, the millionaire stock speculator whose meteoric Wall Street career crashed in an insider trading scandal, pleaded guilty Thursday to one count of violating federal securities laws.

He faces penalties of up to five years in prison and a \$250,000 fine when sentenced Aug. 21 by U.S. District Judge Morris E. Lasker.

The 52-year-old financier, looking subdued and exhausted, entered his plea in a courtroom packed with nearly 200 reporters, sketch artists, lawyers and other onlookers.

He was released without bail and, flanked by his two lawyers, left the courthouse through a side door without comment. Photographers swarmed around the black limousine that whisked him away.

Scientists scoff at Star Wars

WASHINGTON (AP) — Challenging Reagan administration assumptions about "Star Wars," a group of top American physicists said Thursday that at least a decade of research is needed to determine whether high-energy lasers and particle beams can be used to knock down enemy missiles in space.

In a 422-page technical study, 17 members of the American Physical Society delivered the sharpest scientific challenge yet to administration plans to deploy space- and ground-based ballistic missile defenses as early as 1991.

"On purely scientific and engineering criteria, one would not make a decision on early deployment. But in the international arena, there are other forces," said Kumar Patel, a physicist at AT&T Bell Laboratories and co-chairman of the study group.

Marines cut guard duty tour

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Marine Corps, in a move designed to limit the exposure of embassy guards to "hostile intelligence threats," has decided to reduce the length of guards' assignments in 11 cities around the world.

Robert Sims, the Pentagon's chief spokesman, said Thursday that assignments for Marine guards in the cities — most of which are located in communist countries — would be reduced immediately from the standard 15 months to one year.

He acknowledged the move was a response to the espionage scandal that has rocked the elite Marine guard force. Three enlisted men have so far been arrested or charged with espionage while working in the Soviet Union, and a fourth has been charged with improper fraternization with Russian women.

"In reviewing our procedures and having concerns about Soviet efforts to use their hostile intelligence capability and to reduce or otherwise have some way of misleading our people, we believe that one of the problems that could be associated with dealing with that hostile intelligence threat is the tour length," Sims said.

Senate probe finds most of Contra trail

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate investigators, nearing the end of the private phase of their Iran-Contra probe, said on Thursday they probably will never be able to trace the affair's complex international money trail completely.

But Sen. Daniel Inouye, D-Hawaii, chairman of the committee conducting the investigation, said that "on a scale of 10, we've got nine."

Inouye offered no elaboration on his claim as he met with reporters after a closed-door committee session at which lawmakers voted limited immunity from prosecution in order to compel the testimony of two witnesses. He described the two as "very minor figures" but refused to identify them.

Inouye also said that a key figure in the case, former Air Force Major Gen. Richard Secord, may agree to testify voluntarily at committee hearings. Other principal figures, including former National Security Adviser John Poindexter and his

former NSC aide, Oliver North, have cited their constitutional rights against self-incrimination in refusing to testify.

Poindexter has been granted limited immunity, and investigators are expected to begin questioning him in private on May 2 or shortly after.

The public hearings are scheduled to begin on May 5 and last through July.

Inouye said committee lawyers have been meeting with Secord's attorney, and the senator said, "It is possible he (the former general) will testify voluntarily."

Asked why Secord would agree to appear without immunity when other key figures have not, Inouye replied, "I'm certain he feels he has done nothing wrong."

Secord and the Senate committee have been battling in court for several weeks over the panel's attempt to force him to direct foreign banks to turn over account records relevant to the investigation.

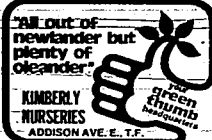
A federal judge has rejected the

Senate's request, saying it would amount to a violation of Secord's right to avoid self-incrimination.

Secord, a close associate of North, reportedly played a major role in arranging the sale of arms to Iran and the funneling of arms to the Contra rebels fighting the Nicaraguan government.

His testimony has long been regarded as vital for investigators hoping to untangle the web of financial arrangements that underpinned the assistance that flowed to the

Contras during a time when U.S. government military assistance was banned.



'Shape up,' senators tell U.S. airlines

WASHINGTON (AP) — A string of senators warned airlines Thursday to shape up, improve services and cut delays or face possible re-regulation or heavy government-imposed penalties for shoddy operations.

"The airline industry in its zeal for competition has gone absolutely hog wild," declared Sen. J. James Exon, D-Nebr., during a hearing where senior executives from three major airlines acknowledged a consumer backlash because of the rising number of delays and other complaints.

The executives from American Airlines, Continental Airlines and Delta Air Lines told the Senate panel they are prepared to make on-time flight information and other consumer information available to travelers if other air carriers are required to do the same.

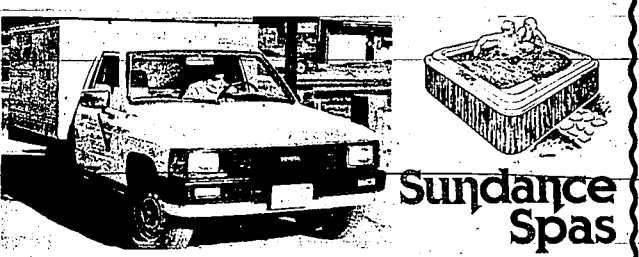

Gooding faces steep cost to close hospital

GOODING — Gooding County commissioners found another mile in the path toward stabilization of the county hospital's financial status.

The choice of outright closing Gooding County Memorial Hospital would cost the county an estimated \$25,000 because of a federal grant the hospital received in 1970.

Also during a three-hour commissioners' meeting Thursday, of which two hours were closed to the public, discussion revolved around changing hospital services, personnel matters and raising money for the hospital. Decisions on those issues may be made at a commissioners' meeting set for 2 p.m. next Wednesday at the hospital.

The only action taken after the closed executive session featured the commissioners unanimously passing a motion to appoint a task force to raise community donations for the hospital. No money is available from a proposed taxing district, which voters approved but has not yet been installed, until Jan. 20, 1989.

GCMH's financial outlook remains bleak.

Hospital operating losses continue to mount, totaling about \$52,000 more than \$12,000 in March revenues, according to Randy McVay, a Hospital Corporation of America employee who oversees the hospital's books under a management contract.

The hospital currently owes at least \$125,000 in accounts payable, but the figure is probably higher, McVay said. Precise figures are unavailable because of incomplete bookkeeping before HCA began managing the hospital April 1, he said.

To pay off those debts, a collection agency hired in early April has begun to collect bills owed the hospital. McVay said Central Adjustment, of Boise, collected \$5,000 in the past two weeks from GCMH's \$70,000 in past due accounts.

Central Adjustment's commission is 21 percent, McVay said. The company estimates it may retrieve between \$150,000 and \$170,000 of the hospital's accounts, he said.

But the hospital's financial ground is still unstable. Bookkeeping in many areas appears incomplete, McVay said, "and at this point we're not sure why."

McVay is continuing to study GCMH's books to get a clearer picture of its financial standing. Operating losses and debt remain unclear, he said.

Stumbling out of the fog this week was the discovery of a federal grant requiring the hospital to remain open until December 1990. Cutting services is allowed, but eliminating medical care on the site is not.

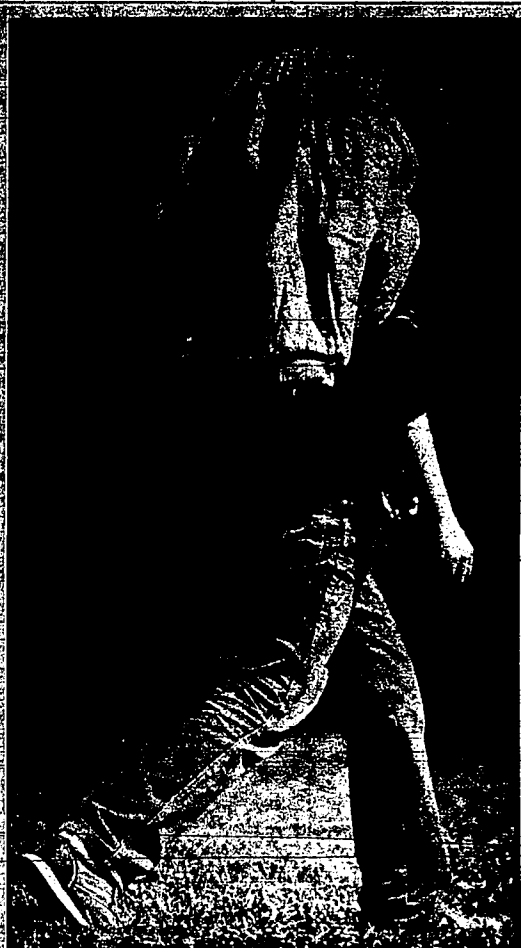
GCMH Administrator Janet McKinney said \$281,705 received in 1970 under the Hill-Burton Act funded about 47 percent of the hospital's construction.

The act stipulates the hospital must remain open for 20 years, or the county has to pay back 47 percent, or \$325,000, of the cost to replace the hospital at today's market value, McKinney said.

But she added that any eligible parties — non-profit health care — occupying between 25 and 50 percent of the hospital would apparently meet the Hill-Burton requirements. Same-day services such as X-rays and lab work, or new health care such as from the health department would apparently qualify, McKinney said.

During the two-hour executive session commissioners discussed HCA financial projections McVay prepared for options to change services the hospital offers. Details of

Blaine, Elmore seek disaster aid for drought

BOISE — Two Magic Valley counties have turned to the federal government for help in coping with a looming drought this summer.

Gov. Cecil Andrus on Thursday asked the U.S. Department of Agriculture to declare Blaine and Elmore counties as disaster emergency areas because of anticipated drought conditions.

The governor also asked similar status for Adams County, bringing the total statewide to six. County commissioners in each of the counties involved approved resolutions requesting emergency declarations, Andrus said.

If the USDA approves, the declaration by Andrus would free federal money for emergency water conservation measures in those and adjacent counties.

The USDA would share costs with farmers for construction or deepening of wells, for temporary pipelines and, possibly for rental of irrigation equipment, said Larry Silver of the U.S. Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in Idaho.

Blaine County requests, Agricultural emergency boards in the counties have recommended the declarations, saying water shortages are inevitable and could damage farmers.

Some southern Idaho counties are facing the driest irrigation conditions in a decade — and possibly the worst in half a century, said Jerry Beard, director of the Idaho Snow Survey run by the U.S. Soil Conservation Service.

Lack of spring rain is aggravating the shortage of runoff from mountain snowmelt in Washington, Canyon and any of the normal spring rain, had

the temperatures have been above normal," said Bill Kawamura, chairman of the county's USDA emergency board and ASCS executive director in Blaine County.

Snowpacks in mountains above the Big Wood River, Little Wood River and Camas Creek ranged from 30-53 percent of normal on April 1, Beard said. The Snow Survey was predicting the Big Wood River near Bellevue would carry only 40 percent of normal water from April through July and the Little Wood River would carry about 30 percent.

It also forecasts that runoff would be too small to fill Magic Reservoir, which depends on the Big Wood and Camas Creek for water.

Since April 1, available snow has melted steadily, but too slowly to fill up streams. Instead, much of the meltwater is being absorbed by soils before getting to the streams, Beard said.

"I think the figures (for early May) are going to look even more bleak" than in April, Beard said.

Without some spring rains soon, the situation will worsen beyond 1977, the worst year since the 1930s, he said. "I'm expecting we might see some stream flows near that 1977 level, but the irrigation demands might be even greater than '77," he said.

Elmore County stream flows will be less than 50 percent of normal, Andrus said in his letter to U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Richard Lyng. The Adams County stream flows for irrigation purposes are forecast to be zero by June 15, the governor said.

Andrus now has asked for disaster declarations for six counties. He previously had sought similar action for Washington, Canyon and Ada counties.

Chain to buy Safeway stores Monday

SALT LAKE CITY — Borman's Inc. will complete its previously announced purchase of 60 Safeway supermarkets in five states on Monday, less than 10 days after sealing new contracts with labor unions.

Spokesmen for Borman's and Safeway Stores Inc. said the Detroit-based grocery chain will begin operating the stores, several manufacturing plants, a central warehouse and distribution fleet in the Salt Lake Division.

Safeway operated supermarkets in Twin Falls, Buhl, Burdett, Rupert, Borman, and Jerome.

Borman's also will hire Safeway's 3,715 workers, said Darrel Blevins, Safeway division manager for human resources and public affairs. They were filling out formal job applications this week.

Borman's has created a new corporation, SEG Stores Inc., to operate the Salt Lake City. However, President Paul Borman has not yet chosen a name under which the stores will do business, said spokesman Gilbert Borman. The company operates 33 discount supermarkets in the Detroit area under the name Farmer Jack.

also will produce more revenues for the company, which sells more than \$1 billion worth of groceries yearly, he said.

Safeway's Salt Lake group comprises 17 stores in Idaho, 34 in Utah, two in Nevada, six in Wyoming and one in Oregon. The division headquarters includes ice cream, yogurt and milk plants, a bakery, warehouse and fleet of trucks. Sales for the year ending Jan. 31 were about \$350 million.

Parent company SSI Holdings Inc. has been divesting its less profitable divisions to pay off debts incurred when it bought the supermarket chain last year at a cost of \$4.2 billion.

The Salt Lake group was omitted from those being kept by SSI late last year. "Obviously, we wouldn't sell something that's doing real well," Blevins commented in announcing the tentative agreement on March 4.

Safeway also is closing the Dallas division on Saturday, Blevins said. About 70 percent of its 141 stores have been sold, and the remainder along with distribution facilities will be shut.

Borman's was founded in 1927 by Al Borman; it is publicly traded on the New York Stock Exchange, but the Borman family owns controlling interest with about 23 percent of company stock.

Lawmakers see easing of funding pressures

TWIN FALLS — Local governments will be under less funding pressure because of more state money for education and changes in laws that require counties to pay the medical costs of indigents, according to legislators.

The Twin Falls school district received a 9.2 percent increase in funding this year. The state also changed the funding formula so that districts with lower property values receive a higher percentage of education funds from the state than wealthier districts.

Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, said Twin Falls citizens played a key role in getting the "very difficult, politically sensitive" financial complex equalization bill passed.

Noh said the changes made by the Legislature this year should take some of the funding pressures off local governments.

As Borman's takes over the Salt Lake operations — its largest acquisition — the Detroit chain will "review every single site that would be in the company" to maximize sales and profits, Borman said. Managers now are taking inventory at the stores before final papers are signed Monday.

Eventually, Borman's is likely to expand some stores and add new product lines, Blevins said. Within the past 10 days, Safeway employees from four unions — United Food and Commercial Workers, Teamsters, Retail Bakers and Steelworkers — satisfied a prime condition of Borman's buy-up by approving new labor contracts calling for pay concessions.

Under the agreements, a journeyman food clerk formerly making \$10.11 an hour now will make an average \$2 less in base pay, Blevins said. At the same time, union officials have said the contract gives employees substantial bonuses beginning in December, if sales increase. Senior employees also have gained improved job security, UFCW spokesmen said.

Borman's purchase is largely a move to diversify away from the weak economy of the Detroit area, where its stores currently are concentrated, Gilbert Borman has said. The expansion

Family pursues dream of detention center

GOODING — A Gooding family is interested in developing the old state mental hospital into a juvenile rehabilitation and detention center.

Don and Mae Morrow and their son, Bart, have pursued the idea for the past four months because they see a need for such a center. And, there's another reason.

"We've got to do something around Gooding to boost the economy," Bart Morrow said.

The family owns 17 acres and a building at the site to the east of the newer building owned by the state. The newer building was formerly occupied by the Walker Act Center. Both buildings are now vacant.

The family envisions a juvenile facility that would make use of all the buildings at the site, Don Morrow said. Bart Morrow said their concept is one of a long-term youth rehabilitation

center, similar to the state facility in St. Anthony. They plan also to provide an "open environment" to status offenders, such as runaways, and a minimum-security detention unit. Future additions might include a youth diagnostic testing center, similar to the state facility in Orofino.

The family hasn't decided if its proposal would be for-profit, non-profit or offered for lease by the state, he said.

"If we realize our dream, and now it's just a dream at this point, it will be a pretty good-sized facility," Morrow said.

Because their center would offer more than detention, it will not compete with the private Southern Idaho Youth Center near Jerome, Morrow said. There will still be a need for short-term holding facilities.

The city of Gooding has sponsored the family's application for a \$15,000 grant to commission a feasibility

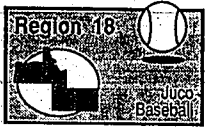

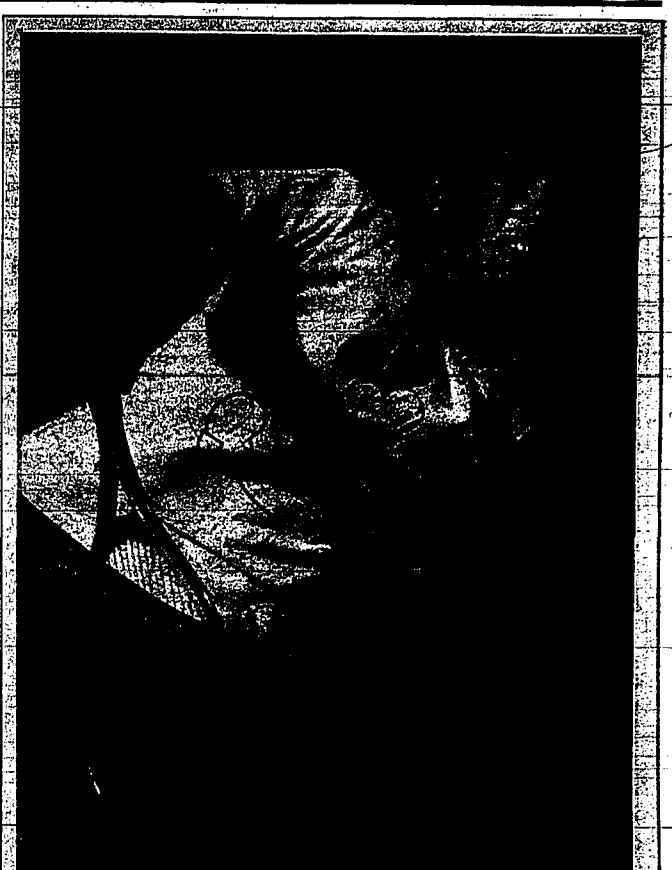

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — With the award of two National Basketball Association franchises, Florida lacks only a major league baseball team to bolster boasts that the state is becoming the world's leading sports playground.

"Our No. 1 priority for Florida needs to be professional baseball," said Ron Sanford, special assistant to the commerce secretary.

"We know we are the sports capital of the world."

Sanford was hired by the state to bringing pro sports to the tourist mecca where golf, tennis, swimming, fishing, boating, and long water sports have traditionally dominated.

The competition for the entertainment dollar in Florida is fierce.

Fiscal 1985-86, more than \$62 million people paid to see Jai Alai, horse racing and dog racing in Florida and beat \$1.85 billion, said Michael Gouge, a spokesman for the Florida Division of Pari-Mutuel Wagering.

Another billion dollars were spent at the state's 700 golf courses and another 170 courses are under construction to handle the demand. More than a million people visited the state to play golf last year.

Amateur team sports also are big. Miami, Florida and Florida State field powerhouse football teams and 10 schools compete in NCAA Division I basketball. Four bowl games are played in Florida.

In its effort to attract professional teams and Super Bowl games, the commerce department, now run by Jeb Bush, the son of Vice President George Bush, has aggressively lobbied the NBA, the NFL and major league baseball on the virtues of this rapidly growing state, which is now ranked even in the low ranks of the nation's fourth largest state.

"The development of professional sports (is) a high priority in my ad-

ministration," said Gov. Bob Martinez.

The NBA responded Wednesday, awarding Miami a franchise for 1988-89 and giving Orlando approval to start the following season.

Miami and Orlando attracted franchises with millionaire owners and new facilities now under construction.

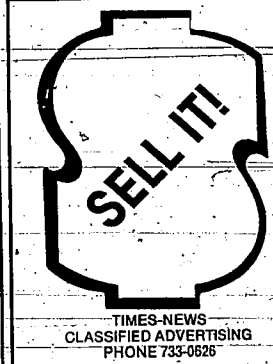

Jazz heavyweights congregate for Boulder conference

BOULDER, Colo. — All it takes to bring jazz into almost any setting is one dedicated enthusiast. This city has long had just such a propagandist in the person of Betty Weems, a committee member of the recent Conference on World Affairs here ever since the annual convalesce began in 1948.

Weems, a lifelong jazz fan, was able to persuade her colleagues and conference founder Howard Higman that what this event needed was a first-class concert and, with the help of Henry "Spike" Robinson, a greatly underrated tenor saxophonist, she was able to bring it to fruition five years ago, and annually since then.

There was a second secret weapon: Jazz has long been a force at the University of Colorado, where the conference was staged. The biggest and most popular class on campus is one on jazz history, which currently attracts 400 students to its twice-weekly seminars, conducted by Wayne Scott.

"Jazz was never a stranger to this campus," said Scott, who started a stage band (a euphemism for jazz band) at the university in the mid-1950s. In addition to the history class, Scott conducts a course in improvisation and lends his arranging skills to concerts featuring the works of everyone from Duke Ellington to Irving Berlin.

Scott's students provided a good foundation for the audiences at several panel discussions during the week-end of the sessions had de-

liberately provocative titles: "Who Owns the Word Jazz?" and "Whatever Happened to the Blues?" and "Jazz is Not Dead, But..." Participating in these panels were Johnny "Hamdell," the former trombonist who gave up the instrument to become an award-winning film and TV composer and songwriter; Bob Wilber, the saxophonist-composer-arranger whose superb adaptation of Ellington's music for the film "Colton Club" won him a Grammy; Ben Sidran, whose associations have ranged from London sessions with the Rolling Stones and Eric Clapton to U.S. albums with Phil Woods, Richie Cole and other jazz eminences, and this writer.

Wilber, an eloquent and provocative speaker, launched the "Jazz is Not Dead, But..." discussion (the title was his own idea) by advancing a theory often promulgated by adherents of the old school: The golden age of jazz ended in 1946, when GIs returning home found a strange, incomprehensible music called be-bop on New York's 52nd Street.

As the other discussants were quick to point out, far from being hostile, Dizzy Gillespie and others in the new jazz movement of the day related well to their audiences; Gillespie was even accused of being too much the entertainer and showman. Moreover, the "unfathomable" be-bop not only was duly understood but, over the years, was absorbed into the jazz mainstream.

Readers Theatre: CSI professor's textbook explains 'radio-like' form

TWIN FALLS — Watching students gain self-confidence and learn to work together as a team is what keeps Dr. Fran Tanner excited about the speech and drama

classes she's taught at the College of Southern Idaho since its founding in 1965.

"Readers Theater Fundamentals," a text for use in high school and college classrooms published by Clark Publishing of Caldwell, is Tanner's third book. It is a com-

pilation of the knowledge that Tanner has accumulated in teaching this relatively new form of theater. Many of her CSI students are pictured in the text.

Although she enjoys working with conventional theater and speech, Tanner's first love has

been Readers Theater.

"In Readers Theater we use all kinds of literature," she said, "to evoke the audience's imagination to create in their own minds the characters, action and setting. We don't do it all for them. It's something like radio drama with the added visual dimension."

She said that this is a style of presentational theater in which the actors "erase the fourth wall" and have visual contact with the audience. Instead of focusing on each other, as in conventional theater, the action is focused off-stage, in the audience.

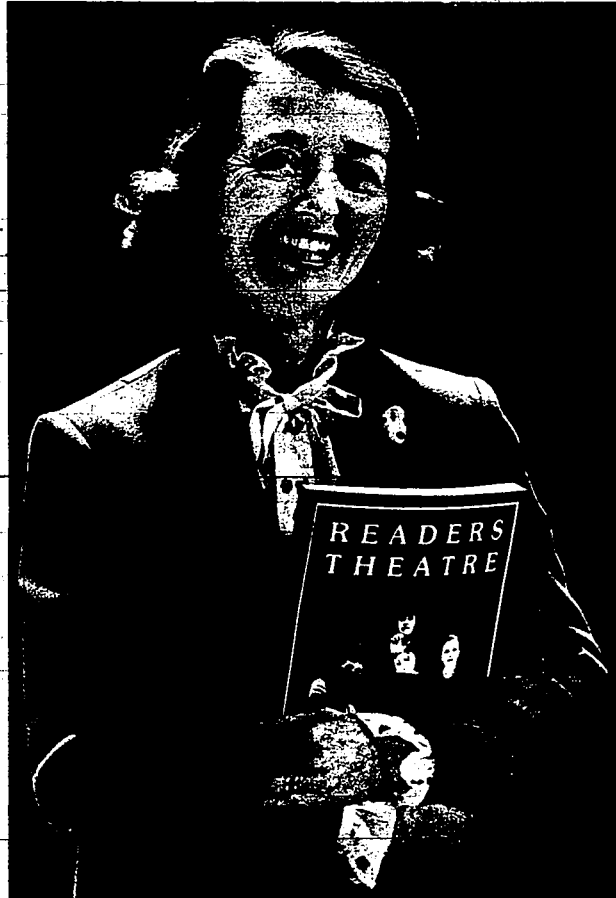
Another difference—in Readers Theater is that it draws material from many sources. "There are dramatic qualities in all kinds of literature," said Tanner. "Something can be exciting or dramatic in poetry, prose, diary entries, letters or newspaper columns. Sometimes the most dramatic thing is a pervasive mood, maybe it's a series of mystery that through vocal orchestration of all these readers, you can create what the author had in mind that is not explicitly written."

Tanner's approach is based on her belief that, "If you're successful at something, you're excited about it." Her book is designed to provide a series of successful experiences for the student.

"It fills a need of people," Tanner said of her book, "who have to teach these classes, who have, perhaps not majored in drama. They can use it successfully because everything is given in easy-to-follow directions. All the basics are there. Specific activities are completed by the students in each chapter."

There aren't many scripts available for Readers Theater. "You have to learn to create your own," Tanner said. "By the time they are through with the book, students know how to perform Readers Theater and also how to create scripts and the theory and technique they need to direct some."

"Although speech and drama are fields that many people are afraid of, once they can get into it, in a non-threatening situation of learning, then they can have a lot of fun and there can be wonderful benefits."

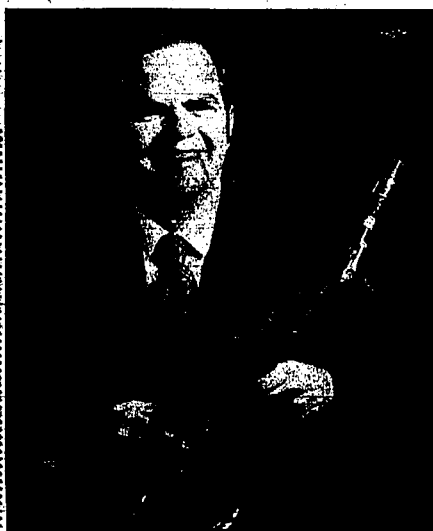

'Blind Date' is best unseen

TWIN FALLS — Following are capsule reviews of movies currently playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

Movie Reviews

BLIND DATE (PG-13). What boggles the mind is how this bit of novel tint could have seemed remotely funny to any one at any stage along the way. The single feeble premise is this: A woman (Kim Basinger) with no tolerance whatsoever for alcohol goes on a blind date with a yuppie executive (Bruce Willis) who, warned about her problem, feeds her quantities of champagne and watches in outraged dismay as she goes out of control. This from the director of "Victor/Victoria" Blake Edwards.

Willis, though he has a good track record in comedy, would be well advised not to quit his nighttime job. Basinger, retains a dignity and vulnerable charm that are almost unbelievable, given her assignment.

BURGALAR (PG). Whoopi Goldberg's new movie, about the coolest of the San Francisco cat burglars, is a triple threat: a comedy that does not make you laugh, a mystery that does not make sense, and a thriller without any thrills. The contributions of director Hugh Wilson and the writers could kindly be described as dubious, and most of the funny jokes are from Bob Goldthwait, whose strangled-voice shtick can pall quickly.

HOOSIERS (PG). This film is as engaging, as modest, as utterly American and as thrilling as the real life story it is based on: the rise of a tiny town's high school basketball team to the Indiana state finals. It also features some of the finest acting you could hope to see, by Gene Hackman as the coach who, in dark past, Dennis Hopper, as the alcoholic ex-hoops star, and Barbara Hershey as Hackman's initial adversary. The film has a few burrs (some plot elements feel grafted on, and the editing rhythms are not always right) but you can hate basketball and yet still have a sensational time at "Hoosiers."

LETHAL WEAPON (R). For the first half here, when Mel Gibson and Danny Glover are sketching in their characters, this buddy-buddy cop thriller works very well, even though snatches of "48 HRS.," "Magnum Force" and "Hustle" keep floating

over the story like scum on a lake. It is Gibson's first big juicy mythic-hero part since Mad Max — suicidal, crazy, magnetic — and he is terrific (so is Glover as his straight man). After that, it is as if some anonymous, all-purpose kung fu-Los Angeles street action unit rolled in and took over the picture, flinging logic to the winds and crashing cars.

PLATOON (R). This is movie making with a zealot's fervor. Director-writer Oliver Stone, decorated Vietnam infantryman himself, clearly wants us to understand what fighting in that war was like. He succeeds with an immediacy that is frightening. War movies of the past, even the greatest ones, seem like crane shots by comparison.

POLICE ACADEMY IV (PG). It is amazing that the "Police Academy" movies keep being made even though they started being funny after the hilarious original. This one is not so crass as the last two and director Jim Drake is at least brisk and amiable. Stars Steve Guttenberg, Bubba Smith, Michael Winslow, Bogart Goddard and G.W. Bailey.

RAISING ARIZONA (PG-13). The astonishing thing about this film — concerning the madcap kidnapping of a quatuorpet by an ex-con and his ex-policewoman wife — is how it can move so fast, be so loud and remain so relentlessly boring at the same time. Directed, written and produced

ed by Ethan and Joel Coen, "Raising Arizona" is miraculously adept technically, transcending viewpoint.

THE SECRET OF MY SUCCESS (PG-13). A misfiring comic fantasia on executive and sexual success in the Reagan era — mixed-up from scraps of "The Apartment" and "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying." The writers, Jim Cash and Jack Epps Jr. ("Top Gun") do scripts so derivative you may get deja vu during their trailers, and their central play here — mallroom boy poses as executive worked out. But director Herb Ross and cinematographer Carlo Di Palma sometimes capture a fairytale Manhattan here.

Deadline near for ICA rural tour series

BOISE — Artists and groups who want to be included in the touring roster for the new Arts in Rural Towns Series have until May 10 to submit their names to the Idaho Commission on the Arts.

Arts in Rural Towns was initiated a year ago by the ICA and funded through a \$5,000 challenge grant from the National Endowment for the Arts. The pilot program included four Idaho communities: Kamiah, Grangeville, Bonners Ferry and Orofino. Because of its success and response, the NEA offered another challenge grant; this time for \$50,000, that was matched by the Idaho State Legislature.

Jim Owen, ICA touring programs coordinator, said the series will begin this fall and will involve 20 communities throughout the state. "There are some things about these communities artists should know and understand before submitting applications."

"First, all of the towns are truly 'rural'; they have populations of 5,000 or less. And second, the facilities are usually a school gymnasium or multi-purpose room that, in many cases, have no more than a 120V electrical outlet."

Further, he said, the artistic fee cannot exceed \$1,000 including travel, lodging and all other costs.

"One other thing we have to emphasize," Owen said, "is that these first-year presenters may be very inexperienced and will need patience, understanding and a lot of TLC."

When submitting applications, Owen said artists and groups should include what they propose to do or present; the arts to be used, including background material; dates available; services offered; fee schedule; technical requirements and a touring kit, including promotional materials.

Those who were lurid last year by one of the commission panels have the option of either submitting new documentation or abiding by last year's review. Criteria for inclusion on the Arts on the roster will be artistic quality and the ability to work with the limitations imposed by a rural setting.

According to Owen, all applications will be reviewed by the full commission. Decisions will be made at the June commission meeting.



CBS drama 'Pack of Lies' traps friends in spying and betrayal

By FRANK SANELLO

"Pack of Lies" is a story of friendship and betrayal. Ellen Burstyn plays Barbara Jackson, a quiet suburban London housewife. Teri Garr plays her best friend, Helen Schaefer, an outgoing American expatriate living in England. The man who comes between them is the dashing Stewart, played by veteran British actor Alan Bates. The CBS special, which is also the 153rd presentation of the Hallmark Hall of Fame, airs Sunday, April 22.

This drama, however, is anything but your typical romantic triangle. Espionage, not romance, creates a rift in the friendship of the two women. Helen Schaefer may be a spy for the Soviets. And as Barbara Jackson's suspicions begin to grow, she allows—Stewart, a British secret-service agent, to use her home for surveillance on the suspected spy who is also her closest friend.

"Pack of Lies" is set in the early '50s, as the Cold War is still raging, and is based on a true story. Veteran playwright/screenwriter Hugh Whitmore ("Sleeve," "4 Charing Cross Road") wrote a play about the incident and adapted his stage play for television.

The role of Helen Schaefer is a welcome departure for Teri Garr, who has specialized in playing ditzy blondes and comic victims during her 20-year-plus acting career.

"This is a different kind of thing than I usually do," says Garr. "Helen is a woman who's very

calculating, smart, coniving. On the surface, she's one thing: very happy-go-lucky, jolly—a real love-of-life character. But on the inside, she's a Communist spy."

Garr is equally bullish on her co-star, Ellen Burstyn, who won an Oscar for her performance in "Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore" (1975). "She's a wonderful actress. Very much the method actress. You know, she stayed in character when 'Entertainment Tonight' visited the set and interviewed her: I saw her

turn into this soft-spoken, demure Englishwoman."

After an early start on episodic TV in "Star Trek," "It Takes a Thief," and "The Sonny and Cher Show," Garr took her penchant for comedy to the big screen, where she enjoyed small but juicy roles in "Young Frankenstein" (1974), "Oh, God!" (1977) and "Close Encounters of the Third Kind" (1977), where she played Richard Dreyfuss' distraught wife.

But Garr makes it clear that she's through playing music-arm ornaments and comic foils with feather dusters for brains.

"My next film is called 'Stiffs,'" says Garr. "I murder my husband and blame it on his partner. John Lithgow is the partner. I play a real sharpie. She's a victim who's angry and pays people back."

"Just like Helen in 'Pack of Lies.' She was victimized in America during the McCarthy era, and now she's getting her revenge."

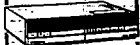

Q. A newspaper feature on Gunther Gebel-Williams, the legendary wild animal trainer again touring with the Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey Circus, maintained that he was born and raised in circus life. True? — P.L.

A. No and yes. The statement you read was the imagination of an overzealous press agent. Fact is, the 52-year-old German-born Gunther was 12 years old when his mother was hired by the well-known Circus Williams in Cologne — as a seamstress. Soon, the lad proved a gifted animal trainer totally undaunted by elephants, lions, tigers and other wild beasts, exhibiting near-mystical qualities in their presence. Under Williams' guidance (the family adopted the boy), Gunther became an ace showman by the age of 16, and ultimately ran the entire show until 1963, when it was purchased by Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey for \$2 million — primarily to acquire his services as animal trainer extraordinaire.

Q. It was refreshing to see Matthew Broderick in a change of pace role in his new movie, "Project X," in which he plays a young Air Force pilot assigned to a top-secret military program involving a very intelligent chimp. Is it true, as I read, that Broderick's role was written with him in mind? — D.W.

A. That may make interesting reading, but accurate it isn't. "The role wasn't originally written for Matthew at all," explains Lawrence Lasker, one of "Project X's" coproducers. "However, when we learned that we could get Matt, we made significant changes in the script to accommodate his own special brand of screen communication, molding the scenes to fit him like a glove. There are obvious differences, of course (Matthew is far more sophisticated than Jimmy Garrett, the character he portrays). I think it all comes together beautifully, and now it's up to the public to judge."

Q. Which is the largest movie set in the world? — J.P. (Note: The set in "The Godfather Part II" was the largest set in the world.)

world's largest set is the 007 Stage at London's Pinewood Studios, home of the James Bond epics. But even that wasn't large enough to become Afghanistan, locale of the 15th 007 adventure, the soon-due "The Living Daylights," starring Timothy Dalton in his first outing as the world's most public secret agent. So the producers had to shoot the movie's climactic sequences in a somewhat larger locale — the Sahara Desert!

Q. We were fascinated by Debra Winger's recollections of appearances in such films as "Urban Cowboy," "An Officer and a Gentleman," "Black Widow," plus a brief mention of "Legal Eagles" on the recent television interview conducted by Barbara Walters. Didn't she leave some lilies out? — G.C.

A. Of course she did. One big omission by the talented Winger was her starring role in "Cannery Row," partially derived from the John Steinbeck novel (in which she replaced Rachel Welch). This film generally failed to ignite either audiences or critics, which may account for why the fiery Debra chose not to refer to it. Still, in the interest of her overall film career, it should at least have been referred to.

Q. Harold Ramis was so great in "Ghostbusters" — which I understand he co-wrote. What is his background, and what is he up to now? — P.J.

A. The talented Ramis, who virtually created an entire school of film comedy, having co-written "Animal House," "Meatballs," "Stripes" and "Ghostbusters" (to name but a few) was born and raised in Chicago and originally intended to become a neurosurgeon. His first two post-college jobs — orderly in a locked mental ward and substitute grade school teacher in one of Chicago's roughest neighborhoods — hardly seem preparation for a humor man. But after starting out as a

jokes editor for Playboy, Ramis joined Chicago's famed Second City troupe — and the rest is entertainment history. You'll be able to see Harold next as Diane Keaton's live-in love in "Baby Boom," due this fall.

Q. With all the current controversy over TV ads for condoms in this country, what's the situation in other parts of the world? — P.L.

A. Many European countries countenance advertising for the sex aids. And believe it or not, in Italy, which is 99 percent Catholic and where the Vatican opposes any form of birth control, TV ads for condoms are distinctly old hat. They've been running on all channels at all times for at least the past five years and more.

Q. The multi-talented and popular Bill Cosby must be making a fortune. Any idea how much? — M.E.

A. Some TV insiders hear Cos' eventual take from his series will be approximately \$300,000,000 (yes, three hundred million!) — and that's not counting all the money from the sale of his fabulous hardcover book "Fatherhood," which Berkley Books is reissuing as a mammoth May reprint in deluxe trade paperback edition. They'll print close to 2,000,000 copies.

Q. None of the many speakers at the memorial services for Andy Warhol at St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York seemed to present any truly illuminating views of this famed pop artist. Didn't any of the eulogies come up with something unexpectedly telling about his personality? — E.M.

A. John Richardson, an art historian, told the huge assemblage that though Andy Warhol was frequently surrounded by a group of rather unsavory types, he himself remained a decent and highly religious person with good moral values. He said: "I have a question to write to Robin Adams-Sloan, 435 E. 45th St., New York, N.Y. 10017."

Shortridge combines designing with working on popular soap

On the air barely a month, "The Bold and the Beautiful" sticks to Bill Bell's game plan — nurture the young members of the cast while John McCook and Susan Flannery show how it's done.

"The show has jelled," reports young Stephen Shortridge, who is cast as cop Dave Reed, eager to marry coed Brooke Logan (Katherine Kelly Lang). "It's come together already."

Shortridge watches Susan Flannery playing John McCook's troubled wife Stephanie. "Susan takes pretty dramatic lines and underplays them. It's very effective."

New to soaps, Shortridge comes from "Welcome Back, Kotter," guest shots in "Murder, She Wrote" and dozens of commercials, so he has an outsider's view.

"I see a soap style," Stephen says. "Writers overdo the dramatics. And if you play it too close to the script you can mess up. Susan Flannery is my guide."

Shortridge is used to sitting around all day on a set in the prime-time shows, waiting for his three lines. Working with the same performers daily remains a surprise.

"We relate," Stephen says with a note of astonishment. "On 'Murder, She Wrote' I left a trail for Angela Lansbury, and then went home. Grateful for the job, but I didn't learn anything."

"The Bold and the Beautiful" becomes a new ball game. You may sit around waiting, but once on camera you work. Stephen admires Bill Bell's touch with a daily cliffhanger.

"Bell works off character emotions; their reactions. Out of that you get a story. He's concerned with what happens to the people. You may have talking heads, but one is affecting another. That's soap. Action doesn't work in this medium. At least, I don't think it does. Usually it looks so stacy and false."

Shortridge really intends to be a painter some day, and expects the store to make that possible financially. A third grade Garden Grove, Calif., teacher, Miss Evans, saw talent in Stephen's drawings and changed the boy's life.

"I was born in Iowa, and when my folks came to California, I didn't adjust too well. I was beating kids up, stuff like that. Miss Evans encouraged my art. I've been drawing, making furniture and things, ever since."

Another beach bum makes good. Proof: the surf and California sun don't necessarily singe your brain or fry desire. By day Shortridge performs, by night designs.

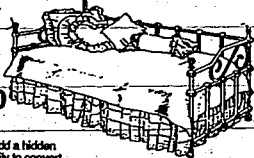

'Dynasty' battles its way back to the top

LOS ANGELES (AP) — When an audience begins to tune out a top-rated show and it nosedives in the ratings, the end is usually at hand.

But for ABC's "Dynasty" it was only the cliffhanger.

Blake, Krystle and Alexis (played by John Forsythe, Linda Evans and Joan Collins) have battled their way back after losing 20 percent of their audience.

The night-time soap is not on top again, but it is beating its competition Wednesday. In the most recent Nielsen ratings, it was 17th, ahead of "Magnum, P.I." on CBS and NBC's two-half-hour combatants, "Night Court" and "The Tortellis."

The heady days are gone for all the prime-time soap operas. CBS' "Dallas," which used to be neck-and-neck with "Dynasty" in the ratings, also has slipped. But "Dallas" never fell as far as "Dynasty," and it consistently trounces its Friday night competition from NBC, "Miami Vice."

Part of the answer was that television's pendulum took another swing, and situation comedies, led by NBC's "The Cosby Show," regained their old popularity.

The other part of the answer is that "Dynasty" began to self-destruct.

"I think the beginning of it was when we launched 'The Colbys' in 1985," said Esther Shapiro, one of the show's executive producers and co-creator with her husband, Richard.

"We should have gotten the show

going earlier. It took some of the focus away from 'Dynasty.' Our energy was going in two directions."

In addition, the Shapiros were engaged in a lawsuit against Aaron Spelling, the other executive producer. "Aaron was going public with his company and we owned a substantial part of the show," she said. "Our feeling was he couldn't take his part public. It was a devastating year, but we still worked together until it was resolved out of court."

Shapiro said some of the fun of do-

ing "Dynasty" evaporated in that period, and she leaned toward stories that were not much fun for the audience.

The Carringtons became mixed up with royalty in a tiny country called Maldavia and got caught in an attempted coup. Krystle was kidnapped and replaced by a double, Alexis was regularly getting the better of Blake, Alexis kicked Blake and Krystle out of the mansion.

"Alexis was trying to get the house and I think I was viewing that as my goal," Shapiro said. "It took some of the fun out of it. I think, too, as the Reagan years slipped away there was less interest in pomp and glitz. 'Dallas' was never much into that and wasn't too affected."

"People love the characters, particularly when they're playing as the audience expects them to be. But too many characters made it hard to emphasize the stories you want for your major characters. We brought the focus back to our three main stars and to stories of romance."

"People want to see the fantasy of Joan. The love between John and Linda, I think 'The Cosby Show' proves that people want to see stories about people who like each other. We had love in conflict, then got away from it and now we're back to it. Conflict between people who love each other."

In one recent sequence, Blake suffered temporary amnesia after an oil rig accident, allowing him and Alexis to re-live their old romance in exotic Singapore.

Survey shows many kids pick programs

NEW YORK (AP) — It's Sunday right. "60 Minutes" takes a look at the Nicaraguan crisis; "Punky Brewster" stuns her new party dress in a rerun. So what do the kids watch?

In three out of 10 American homes, whatever they want, according to a survey by Parents magazine.

The telephone survey of 1,012 adults showed 29 percent allow their children 18 and under to decide on their viewing, while 30 percent said they tell their children what to watch. Thirty-six percent said they

allow the kids to make selections but retain veto power.

The study also showed 40 percent of the respondents felt television has a negative effect on children, while 19 percent felt it was positive.

Forty percent of the parents fell their kids — who watched an average of about two hours a night — spent too much time in front of the tube. But the parents confessed to watching more television than the children — an average of 2½ hours more per week.

And even though they admitted to

nightly viewing, 60 percent of the parents believe most shows are not worth watching and 72 percent feel there's too much violence on television.

The magazine said the survey's margin of error was 3 percent.

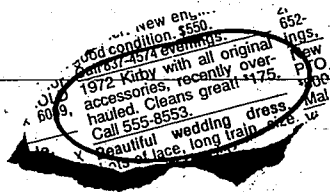

ABC to run new and old Disney movies

LOS ANGELES — Gary Barton says the first season of ABC's "The Disney Sunday Movie" taught him that the public wants fun, excitement and adventure.

"We've not only spent a lot of time going over our concepts for next season, but changing our development plans—and abandoning some projects that don't fit into what we're doing," said Barton, who is senior vice president in charge of the ABC movie at Walt Disney Productions.

"Brandon Stoddard (president of ABC Entertainment) is very enthusiastic and agrees with our decision to do more comedy and adventure. We'll still do one or two dramatic pieces a year. But they'll be uplifting, like 'The Girl Who Spelled Freedom.'"

"The Disney Sunday Movie" project, which began on ABC last February, is the first time one studio has taken on the task of delivering a complete movie package to a network. This season the studio provided 22 movies, 19 made especially for ABC and three originally made for the Disney cable channel.

"It's a very unusual commitment to have," said Barton. "We also make 'The Golden Girls,' a spinoff series called 'The Empty Nest' and a series for Fox based on the movie 'Down and Out in Beverly Hills.' We've also got a number of pilots in the works."

Disney, of course, is the only studio whose movies have product identification. The public has an expectation of Disney movies they wouldn't have, for instance, for a film from Paramount.

"We're excited about next season, because we have a very specific direction," he said. "We're trying not to exclude adults. Our weakest demographics are teen-agers. We're trying to do more stories about teens to attract them, but we also want to hold our main audience."

A "Disney Sunday Movie" miniseries, in production for next year, will serve as a pilot for a series. The four-hour presentation, "Earth-Star Voyager," will cost \$10 million.

"Basically, it's a futuristic story about a group of teen-agers who go into outer space to find another planet," Barton said. "The reason the ship's manned by teen-agers is that they have to be young enough to survive the lengthy voyage."

The miniseries, based on an original screenplay, is being filmed in Vancouver, Canada, on the site of Expo '86. James Goldstone, who directed the pilot of "Star Trek," is directing.

"This is by the far the most ex-

pensive thing we've ever done," Barton said. "We feel an obligation to do something special. We at Disney feel it has a strong series potential."

Barton acknowledged that such a series could conflict with Paramount Studio's "Star Trek," a syndicated reprise of the popular science-fiction drama, but with a new cast.

Other films in production for next year include "The Shaggy Dog Returns" and "Splash II."

"The Shaggy Dog Returns" is a contemporary sequel to the 1959 slapstick movie, hipper but with "the charm and whimsy of the original," Barton said. Actually, it will be a second sequel: "The Shaggy D.A." came out in 1976.

"Splash II" is a followup to Disney's 1984 hit comedy film about a mermaid who finds love on land. "We had to do a little rewriting to make it acceptable for TV because it was to be a feature film," said Barton. "It was so right for what we wanted to do on the 'Sunday Movie.'"

Barton said "Earth-Star Voyager" and "Splash II" would be filmed at a deficit, but are considered good investments. He said the studio had little interest in making original, weekly television movies.

The studio will also continue to make movies for the Disney Channel, its pay cable operation. "Our audiences are very similar," he said, "and if they have a movie we think is really terrific, we'll air it as part of the 'Disney Sunday Movie.'"

Barton said Disney has a project called "Spooner," that has interested Neil Diamond. It's the story of a wrestling coach who goes to a high school with a lot of students in trouble and helps turn it around. He said he also hopes to persuade Jerry Lewis to do a version of "The Nutty Professor."

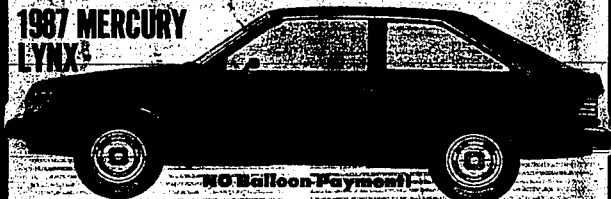
