House passes sweeping trade bill

WASHINGTON — The House on Thursday approved 296-137 a sweeping trade bill with still retaliatory features, defying a presidential veto threat and forecasts that the Senate would wipe out its most stringent provisions.

"Although you may not like parts of the bill let's move it into the process," House Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas, told lawmakers. He acknowledged

that the Senate "surely" will make modifications.

President Reagan promised Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone he would veto legislation requiring trade retaliation. Republicans scoffed at any notion that the 290 votes for the measure, exactly the two-thirds of the 435-seat House needed to over-

ride a presidential veto, could actually survive an override attempt.

"I don't think anybody in this House today believes this bill will go through the Senate and be signed by the president in its present form," Rep. John J. Duncan, R-Tenn., said.

"I hope all of you realize that this bill isn't going anywhere."

On the roll call, 247 Democrats and 43 Republicans voted in favor of the measure, while six Democrats and 131 Republicans voted against it.

Rep. Sam Gibbons, D-Fla., almost guaranteed a seat on any House-Senate conference committee, said that House conferees would defend the bill's anti-surplus provisions in any dispute with senators on the panel.

"We are required to and we will," the chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee's trade subcommittee said after the vote. He said he doubted that Reagan would veto the final product that emerges from Congress.

Nakasone visited senators shortly after the House acted. He issued a statement saying that while

he shared "the serious concern of the U.S. Congress over the trade imbalances, I am apprehensive that the bill, if legislated, may lead to a contraction of world trade. I sincerely hope that the current bill will not be legislated in its current form."

The Senate Finance Committee, which is drafting its own trade legislation, may take up a punitive provision similar to one sponsored by Rep. Richard A. Gephardt, D-Mo., and adopted by the House on Wednesday by a four-vote margin.

Reagan says 'thorn' stays

WASHINGTON — President Reagan promised Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone on Thursday he would veto legislation requiring trade retaliation against Japan, but he refused to lift sanctions already in place without proof Tokyo has stopped unfair sales practices.

Nakasone called the sanctions "a very sore thorn sticking in our small finger. We have to remove that thorn as soon as possible."

In a move that pleased U.S. officials, Nakasone told Reagan he had directed the Bank of Japan and the Finance Ministry to lower short-term interest rates.

Lower interest rates would stimulate economic growth in Japan, providing "a major opportunity for increasing markets for U.S. goods, for increasing the buying power of Japan," said presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater.

"Anything that stimulates markets abroad is good news for American workers and American products," Vice President George Bush said.

Reagan and Nakasone met at the White House against the background of the sharp trade friction between the two countries since World War II, fueled largely by America's huge trade deficit with Japan, which totaled \$38.6 billion last year.

The two leaders met again over breakfast today and held another round of talks before issuing a final statement.

Thursday's meeting came one day after the House passed a trade bill a provision that would trigger trade

retaliation against countries, such as Japan, that maintain large trade surpluses with the United States.

Reagan told Nakasone he would veto the measure if it reached the White House, and noted that its narrow margin of approval — just four votes — insured that the veto would be upheld.

"At welcoming ceremonies on the South Lawn, under a brilliant sun, Reagan told Nakasone that "even the closest of friends have differences" and "we must address the current unsustainable trade balance."

He said the trade deficit with Japan has spawned calls for protectionism that would undo the shining economic accomplishments we've achieved together."

Later, Nakasone met with Senate leaders in the Capitol. Senate Majority Leader Robert Byrd and Republican Leader Bob Dole presented him with clippings from cherry trees from Washington's Tidal Basin that had been given to the United States by Japan in the early 1900s.

Sen. Alan Simpson, R-Wyo., the assistant minority leader, said that Byrd had urged Nakasone to buy more coal and steel from the United States — but that Nakasone had replied that Japan could get it more cheaply from three other countries.

Dole told Nakasone that this nation's trade imbalance with Japan was "a serious, serious issue," Simpson said.

Sen. William Roth, R-Del., said after the meeting that while the bill was anticlimactic, the Senate

President not in on Channell arms plot, spokesman says

WASHINGTON — President Reagan had no part in conservative fund-raiser Carl R. Channell's conspiracy to defraud the government in raising weapons money for the Contra rebels, White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said Thursday.

"In the legal view of the White House, the president is not a part of this conspiracy," Fitzwater told reporters.

Channell, who pleaded guilty to a single

conspiracy charge on Wednesday, set up meetings between Reagan and supporters of Channell's tax-exempt foundation at the White House in 1985 and 1986, but Reagan believed he was thanking the supporters for their purchasing commercials for the Contra cause, the spokesman said.

Fitzwater said several such meetings occurred. He said he could not provide an exact number.

Channell pleaded guilty to a conspiracy to defraud the government of

millions in contributions for military aid to the Nicaragua rebels. He cited former White House aide Lt. Col. Oliver North as a fellow conspirator.

In the first criminal charge brought in the Iran-Contra affair, the fund-raiser agreed to cooperate with independent counsel Lawrence Walsh's investigation.

Channell did not implicate Reagan in the illegal activities.

Congressional Iran-Contra investigators have said one crucial aim of their probe is to

learn whatever they can about possible presidential involvement, but they declined comment Wednesday when asked if Channell was expected to testify during public hearings that begin next Tuesday.

Fitzwater rejected reporters' requests that he question Reagan again on the subject in light of Channell's guilty plea of conspiracy.

In another development on Thursday, it was learned that the telephone number of a secret U.S. intelligence operation in Hon-

duras was discovered in papers confiscated by federal drug agents from a plane they seized in Florida last month.

A knowledgeable U.S. government source indicated to The Associated Press this week that the intelligence operation was aiding the Contras. The papers, apparently belonging to the plane's pilot, also contained the names and telephone numbers of top Contra

Upside down plane flies to new sale

TRENTON, N.J. — Ever since William Robey spent \$24 for a sheet of 100 air mail stamps at a post office nearly 70 years ago, collectors, investors and even thieves have yearned for a piece of his purchase.

The blue Curtiss Jenny airplane in the center of each red-framed stamp was printed upside down. It was an embarrassment to the U.S. Bureau of Printing and Engraving and a bad omen for the nation's new air mail service, but a blunder of undisturbed good fortune for Robey, a stamp collector.

"My heart stood still," Robey once recalled. "It was what you might call a thrill that comes once in a lifetime."

prices but below the \$198,000 paid for one during the collectibles boom in 1982.

Stamp collectors with deep pockets and others with only big dreams are expected to attend the auction.

The stamps have been coveted by eccentric millionaires, pursued by greedy investors and, on at least three occasions, stolen. Some have even tried to counterfeit the stamp.

One stamp barely survived the blitzkrieg of London in World War II, and another was rescued from a Wilkes-Barre, Pa., bank vault hours before the building was inundated in the city's 1972 flood.

Kenneth Wegner, a Fort Lee stamp dealer who has eight inverted Jennys, including a block of four once owned by Princeton University, attributes the stamp's mystique to it being "the most extensively publicized of all errors ever."

Linder family attends Nicaragua burial of son

MATAGALPA — Benjamin Linder, an American volunteer killed in an attack by U.S.-backed Contra rebels, was buried with honors Thursday in this provincial city among the people he was trying to help.

The 27-year-old mechanical engineer from Portland, Ore., and two Nicaraguan militiamen were killed Tuesday near the hamlet of La Camaleona in northern Nicaragua, where Linder worked as an unpaid

volunteer in a rural electrification project.

"He believed that through work he could make life better for the Nicaraguan people and help strengthen democracy," Linder's father, David, said during the funeral ceremony.

"It is clear to me that people here understand what he did. My family and I are very proud to have Benjamin interred in your city."

The elder Linder spoke in English at the cemetery and his wife, Elisabeth, translated his words into Spanish.

President Daniel Ortega, who escorted the family from Managua and was present at the funeral, compared Linder's death to the John Donne's poem and the title of Ernest Hemingway's novel, "For Whom the Bell Tolls."

"For whom the bells tolls, Hemingway would ask," Ortega said. "It tolled for Linder and seven European volunteers killed Contra attacks in Nicaragua since 1983, he said."

Linder's family, including his brother John and sister Miriam, flew to Managua from the United States earlier in the day for the funeral, which was attended by many American volunteer workers and top officials of the leftist-Sandinista government.

When Linder's parents arrived at a hotel in the capital Thursday morning, Ortega embraced Mrs. Linder and was heard to say: "It is a blow to every one of us."

Fugitives elude searchers in Montana

WOLF CREEK, Mont. — Three heavily armed desperadoes eluded searchers for a third straight day Thursday, and a weary sheriff said trackers temporarily lost their trail in rugged country along the Missouri River.

"We feel there is a distinct possibility that they doubled back on us and are heading into Forest Service land further back," Lewis and Clark Sheriff Chuck O'Reilly told reporters

Thursday night.

The sheriff said there is a possibility the fugitives, including two men believed to be escaped killers from California and an unidentified "mystery woman," were headed in a southerly direction, into steeper and more rugged country.

O'Reilly said several heavy helicopters and fresh searchers are being called in, but he left open the possibility that the search would be called off if new leads aren't found. More than 100 county, state, and

federal officers started the day hoping they were closing in on the suspects, who have not been seen since slipping away into the hills following a four-hour gun battle with deputies Monday night on a ridge overlooking Hootler Lake, a reservoir on the Missouri midway between Helena and Great Falls.

Citizens reported hearing several gunshots Thursday, but O'Reilly said they were not related to the manhunt. Officers also patrolled Interstate 15 between Helena and

Great Falls looking for a black car with Colorado plates, possibly driven by a woman identified as Miller's wife. One car was stopped, but O'Reilly said there was no connection.

The sheriff called off a briefing earlier in the evening, leading to speculation the fugitives had been sighted north of the original search area, but that also proved to be a false alarm.

Lutheran branches merge

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Most of the nation's Lutherans united Thursday, ending two centuries of separation, and immediately plunged into a drawn-out election of their new presiding bishop.

Delegates from merging denominations, themselves largely products of a long succession of the gradual intertwining of about 50 strains of Lutherans, unanimously approved founding documents of their merged denomination.

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America combines a membership of 5.5 million people, fourth-largest in American Protestantism. Its constitution pledged ecumenical cooperation with other churches to "foster Christian unity" in a divided society.

Promptly after the historic action, which followed a service of prayers and hymns, the convention went into a prolonged voting process for the new top officer.

Leading on the first five ballots were Bishop Herbert W. Christlorn, head of the Minnesota regional synod of one merged body; the Lutheran Church in America, followed by Bishop David W. Preus, head of another merged body, the American Lutheran Church.

The Rev. William A. Kinnison, president of Wiltenburg University in Springfield, Ohio, and head of the joint commission, told the 1,045 delegates they came here from different churches, but "we leave as one."

Here are key House bill provisions

WASHINGTON (AP) — Here are the central provisions of the omnibus trade bill approved by the House of Representatives on Thursday.

- Requires countries that maintain large trade surpluses through unfair trading practices with the United States to reduce the imbalances by 10 percent or face restrictions in the form of dollar-for-dollar quotas or tariffs. The so-called "Gephardt amendment" would likely apply to Japan, West Germany, Taiwan, South Korea and Italy. Countries with which imports exceed exports by 175 percent would qualify for the possible sanctions.
- Prohibits in a so-called "Buy America" provision the federal government from purchasing products made in nations that have trade barriers against U.S. products.
- Transfers from the president to the U.S. trade representative authority to determine what relief, if any, should be granted to U.S. industries that are battered by imports.
- Gives automatic federal benefits to workers who are laid off in a plant that is being sold to a foreign buyer. Trade Commission determines have been "adversely affected by imports."
- Permits, for the first time, tariffs to be applied on products assembled overseas that contain parts that are sold at prices far below their true value. Current law only permits such tariffs to be lodged directly against the "dumped" item, not against products containing them.
- Gives the U.S. trade representative expanded authority to act to bar the importation of products that violate U.S. trademark, patent or copyright laws.
- Authorizes a \$1.3-billion-a-year program to retrain and re-educate workers who lose their jobs because of import competition — with up to \$4,000 going to each worker who qualifies for the assistance.
- Requires the treasury secretary to negotiate with other major industrial countries to set up a

multinational financial institution that would by existing Third World long-term-private banks at a discount.

- Requires foreign inventory who hold — or intend to buy — at least 10 percent of U.S. farm lands worth \$5 million or more to file reports with the Commerce Department.
- Authorizes an additional \$124 million this year and \$130 million next year to enhance export promotion activities of the Commerce Department.
- Directs the Treasury Department to determine the most advantageous exchange rate for the U.S. dollar against other major currencies and requires the president to pursue international negotiations "to achieve this competitive exchange rate."
- Increases federal subsidies from \$1.5 billion to \$2.5 billion for agricultural exporters to increase the competitiveness of U.S. farm products in overseas markets.
- Authorizes the president to engage in a new round of international trade talks in Geneva under the auspices of the 1979 General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade.
- Strengthens enforcement of a prohibition against importing goods from Cuba.
- Suspends most-favored-nation trade status for imports from communist Romania on grounds of human rights violations.

But Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, the committee chairman, says he does not expect either the panel or the full Senate to approve the measure, which calls for sanctions to enforce 10 percent rollbacks in trade surpluses by Japan and other nations it takes fail.

The final vote, the House rejected, 268-156, a Republican substitute that had been on the floor Tuesday.

The House also refused to remove from the measure provisions that would suspend so-called most-favored-nation trade benefits for communist-led Romania and re-register foreign investors in the United States.

It turned back an effort to delete a provision that would bar the government from purchasing goods from foreign countries unless those goods had buy products from the United States.

Rep. William Frenzel, R-Minn., one of the measure's major critics, said the vote on the Gephardt amendment showed that Democrats "do not have a margin that will sustain enactment and so surely you can understand why we are not going to vote for your bill."

The House also refused to make "meat tag" in trade balances and cause drastic increases in interest rates.

The Republican substitute, offered by Rep. Robert J. Michel, R-Ill., would have deleted the Gephardt amendment as well as provisions involving international banking, foreign investor registration and buy-American requirements.

The overall bill would provide the administration with new authority to reach agreements under the current Uruguay Round-of-trade talks.

Support of the bill is sought by the administration.

leaders told Nakasone "There would have to be a dramatic breakthrough to resolve the overall problems."

Rohs said he had proposed to Nakasone holding a bilateral trade summit with Reagan, and the Japanese leader said he would study the idea.

Nakasone, making good on a pledge he made before leaving home, urged Reagan to lift \$300 million in sanctions imposed on Japanese products in retaliation for the alleged violation of a 1986 agreement not to sell computer chips at unfairly low prices.

Nakasone, meeting with Secretary of State George Shultz, said "We hope to see early lifts" of the sanctions. He said the solution to the world's economic problems is free trade and, in an apparent reference to trade restrictions being debated on Capitol Hill, said the world is keeping a close watch on the developments in Congress.

Shultz called U.S.-Japanese economic disputes "short-term problems" and said that changes in currency ratios, the reduction of the U.S. trade deficit is "an inevitability."

Fitzwater said that during May, the United States will examine trade with Japan. He said "if that is persuasive in terms of a changed pattern of trade with Japan."

At this point, the United States believes Japan now is in compliance with the agreement but is waiting for proof.

"Unless we have negative data which runs counter to what we think we see emerging, I would expect we could be ready to lift the sanctions prior to the economic summit of the seven major industrialized nations June 8-10, said an administration official, speaking on condition of anonymity.

The official said that could mean either that the sanctions would be lifted by then, or that an announcement would be made that they would be lifted.

Aside from the sanctions issue, Fitzwater said, "It was clear that the prime minister and the president are on the same wavelength in terms of the goals for the two countries, in terms of general approaches and in terms of a commitment to working together."

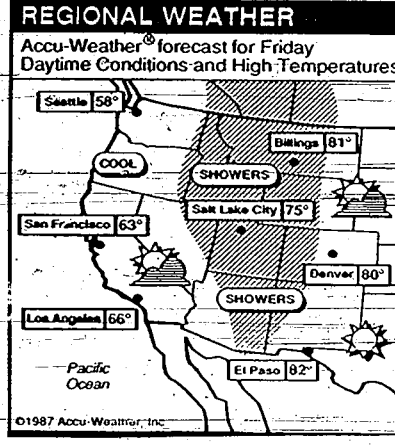
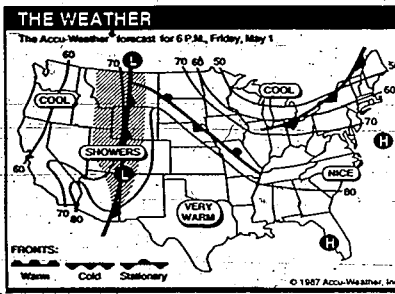
The rainfall total at the Boise air terminal was 2.1 inch at 3 p.m.

State radio said the leftist Sandinista government had awarded the Order of Commander Jose Benito Escobar to the dead volunteer. It is the highest citation for valor and had never been given to a foreigner.

Shortly after arrival, David Linder said of his son: "He worked here and he gave his life here, and he must be buried here. He belongs here. He wanted to make this a better place for people to live."

The Contra rebels are supported by the U.S. government, which considers the Sandinistas a threat to regional stability because of its close ties to the Soviet Union, Cuba, and Cuba.

Benjamin Linder was one of about 200 Americans doing volunteer work in Nicaragua since the Contra began their guerrilla war five years ago. Seven Europeans have been reported killed since 1983.

The young engineer was a member of the Nicaragua Appropriate Technology Project NICAAT, based in Bellingham, Wash. His parents supported Linder's service in Nicaragua, where he had worked since 1983.

The precise circumstances of his death remained unclear.

U.S. Embassy spokesman Al Laun said Thursday no team from the mission would be sent to remote Jinotega province to investigate because it was too dangerous.

trio is in the area, because their trail followed Wednesday was through such heavy underbrush that they could not move quickly.

"They can't possibly make five miles in that area," they have never come out in the open."

The men are believed to be Steven Miller, 34, and John "Doc" Whitlits, Jr., 38, who escaped from a California prison in 1976. Miller was convicted in 1976 of two slayings, including an Ontario, Calif., police officer. Both are wanted for questioning in the slayings last week of two people near Byers, Colo., a farm community about 50 miles east of Denver.

O'Reilly said an FBI profile of the fugitives suggests "they are not going to be taken without a fight... unless we're extremely lucky."

"They're killers, they're cold-blooded killers (who) show absolutely no remorse for their actions," he said.

Butler in stable condition

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — The condition of the Rev. Richard Butler, head of a north Idaho white supremacist church, remained serious but stable Thursday, said a spokeswoman at Sacred Heart Medical Center.

Butler, 69, underwent extensive medical tests at Sacred Heart on Wednesday, the day after he complained of chest pains while being held in the Kootenai County Jail in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho.

Doctors at Sacred Heart said Butler continued to experience an irregular heartbeat.

Butler was stricken on the eve of a court appearance on federal charges that he plotted to overthrow the U.S. government.

Tornado hits Payette school

PAYETTE (AP) — A small funnel cloud touched down momentarily in Payette Thursday afternoon, ripping the roof off a classroom and library at Westside Elementary School, eyewitnesses said.

Superintendent Dick Dillon said no students were in the building at the time. But he said even if students had been inside, they probably would not have been injured.

The damage occurred about 3 p.m. There was no immediate estimate of damage. Dillon said students using the damaged classroom would not have classes today.

The reported funnel cloud came as the National Weather Service in Boise was issuing a tornado warning for Washington, Payette and Gem counties.

Severe thunderstorms throughout southwestern Idaho produced damaging winds and heavy rains. The Weather Service received several reports of structural damage to roofs and downed power lines and trees.

Juvenile center plans progress

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Nine eastern Idaho counties are progressing with plans to convert a vacant Idaho Falls building into a juvenile detention center, Bonneville County Commissioner Cliff Long said.

Public hearings on the proposal should be conducted by the end of May, and Long estimated that the old Idaho Department of Employment building could be converted into a detention center for about \$60,000. "It's already zoned, and has water and sewer hook-ups," he said.

Officials say the building could house 12 to 20 juveniles, and would be managed by one or two people. A new building would cost more than \$1 million, Long said.

Bonneville County and its neighbors face a problem common to rural areas throughout the nation, said Mike McMillan, a Chamber of Commerce, III, corrections consultant. State and federal laws bar counties from holding juvenile offenders within sight or sound of adult inmates.

Board drops plan for cottage site sale

BOISE (AP) — Because of a lawsuit filed by lease holders, the Idaho Land Board is dropping plans to sell cottage sites at Priest Lake.

That was the unanimous vote of the board Thursday. In a special session following an executive session to discuss a lawsuit filed against the Priest Lake with the Cottage Site Leases Association.

The Department of Lands came up with a proposal that would have resulted in tripling lease rates on General Jim Jones. With the Cottage Site Leases Association, some of which is lawsuit, way we can do it this year. We are going to have to do something else to determine values at Priest Lake, he said.

The board then decided to sell Jones made a motion for the state legal requirements are being met.

Farm labor law deadline set today

WASHINGTON (AP) — A last-minute change in proposed rules earlier, aliens would have had to enter this country before Nov. 6, 1986, to register for the special worker program this year.

The deadline now is May 1, which is today. Alien workers who enter the United States after today must return to their home countries to register for the program.

"The initial deadline proposed in the preliminary regulations was ridiculous," the senators said. "If it would have stuck, the upset of the farmers who use alien workers."

Under regulations proposed spring and summer work season returned to work in the United States after the New Year would not have been able to work through this fall's critical harvest season."

The Idaho officials urged changes in the proposed rules in a 30-day comment period which closed earlier this month. They said the change would "avoid big problems" for Idaho farmers who use alien workers.

Jury decision favors tenant

CASCADE (AP) — A Valley County Magistrate Court jury has found that Idaho state Treasurer Lydia Justice Edwards and her husband Frank wrongfully evicted a tenant from one of their Donnelly buildings.

After deliberating for about three hours last week, the six-member jury found in favor of Linda Bates, a Donnelly woman who said she planned to open a store in the building.

Ms. Bates contended that her one-year lease on the Edwards Building No. 3 in Donnelly was unilaterally terminated by the owners about a month after it began in May.

The jury awarded her \$285.80 in damages—including \$256 for moving expenses and \$35.80 for costs of preparing the building for use for a store. Ms. Bates had asked for \$9,750 in damages.

Mrs. Edwards testified at the trial that Ms. Bates was using the building as a residence in violation of the rental contract. But Ms. Bates testified that Edwards had told her she could live on the premises temporarily.



There are a lot of candidates out there you don't know yet

WASHINGTON—By this time, nine months before the flow of elections, almost everyone who cares about politics has heard about the biggies in the race.

Before we get swept away by the ecstasy of the leading candidates, something should be said for those whose names are not yet household words.

As of mid-April, the Federal Election Commission had received filings (503) on behalf of 112 candidates for president and three candidates for vice president. The notification lineup includes a dozen heavy hitters — Bush, Dole, Duffant, Hagel, Kemp, and Robertson for the Republicans; Hart, Babbitt, Gephardt, Simon, Bradley, Biden, Cuomo, Dukakis and Jaccoca for the Democrats. You'll be seeing more than you may really want to know about some of these ambitious gentlemen.

Incredible as it may seem, roughly 100 others have let their aspirations be publicly known. Most of these candidates are in fact incredible, but here springs eternal.

My thought is that the unknowns look at the prospective field; they see themselves riding in Air Force One and dining in the East Room; they know that, as president, they are going to have a private jet, an elevator or search for a place to park. After they have thought upon these things, they look in the mirror and find the prospects enchanting.

They ask the mirror, "Why not me?" So they form a committee.



Thus we have a stable of horses invisibly dark. Among the hopefuls is Edward Matthew Bateski of Ripon, Wis., candidate of the Nouveau Century Party of America. Kenneth George Robichaux of New Orleans intends to head the ticket of the -Prix Party. From Indianapolis, James H. Ricketts Sr. will be the nominee of the Army of the Reconvention.

At least two candidates hail from Wyoming: Al Hamburg of Torr-

ington, spearheading War Veterans Against Nuclear Weapons, and Michael Lee Hamburg of Hawk Springs, on behalf of the Jobs for Students, Jobs for Youth Party. Punch B. Burger of Chapel Hill, N.C., will be the choice of the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Voters.

From Jackson Heights, N.Y., comes the nomination Charles J. Ott, on behalf of Chuck Ott's Believe It or Not, Serious Presidential Committee.

Texas is big this year. Roughly a dozen Texans have tossed their Stetsons in the ring, among them Rickey Lynn Swinney of Fort Worth, candidate of the American Dream Party.

Women are as hopeful as men. Seeking the Democratic nomination are Mrs. Frank Stewart of Centre, Madison, Tenn., Mildred Glover of Atlanta; and Dolores Yolanda Gutierrez of Sunnyvale, Calif. Across

the aisle, campaigning for the Republican prize, is Alice Feggins Sheppard of Freeport, N.Y. Concetta Marie Lamagno of Sreator, Ill., heads the New Israel With Concetta Marie Party. Mrs. Nell K. Flota of Burnsville, Minn., carries the banner of the New Millennium Party. Karen-Lee Blauvelt of Billerica, Mass., is running for president on her own.

Three of the 1988 prospects have advised the FEC that their ambi-

tions are a bit more modest. Alfonso Jones of Detroit, William M. Dagunan of San Francisco, and Samuel Dale Darnell of Durant's Neck, N.C., are not seeking the Oval Office. They are running for the vice presidency only.

Well, I say the more, the merrier. In the fairly recent past our presidential elections have seen an astonishing number of parties actually get on ballots here and there. In 1980, by way of example, Barry Commoner ran in 35 states as nominee of the Citizens Party. John R. Rarick represented the American Independent Party. Maureen Smith got on the California ballot for the Peace and Freedom Party. Harley McLean ran in North Dakota for the National Peoples League. In New Jersey, Bill Gahres carried the banner of the Down With Lawyers Party. I'm not 1,716 votes.

Let me get for the Army of the Unknown. Most of the FEC's obscure candidates may be edicts or screwballs, but some of the hopefuls have ideas worth trotting out for inspection. Back in the 1920s, we regularly had candidates from the Socialist Labor and Farmer Labor Parties; many of their campaign planks eventually wound up in the Democratic platform.

The Prohibition Party started fielding presidential candidates in 1872—and look what happened. They got the 13th Amendment. Single taxers, populists, right-to-lifers and reformers of various hues have gone for the presidential prize. Let the winds of defiance blow! That was Milton's sage advice. And if the winds blow hard in 1988, the blowards of this world deserve a little recognition, too.

Rise in inflation not really surprise

Inflation has raised its hideous head again, a reminder to the short-sighted that the predictability is still something to be taken for granted at a nation's economic peril.

From 1963 to 1979, inflation repeatedly resisted official attempts to contain it. In 1980, it rose to 13 percent. In 1981, it rose to 14 percent. In 1982, it rose to 11 percent. In 1983, it rose to 9 percent. In 1984, it rose to 7 percent. In 1985, it rose to 7 percent. In 1986, it rose to 7 percent. In 1987, it rose to 7 percent.

Now, suddenly, we have had three consecutive months of unusually high inflation rates. Those who imagined that something cosmic changed in 1979, or that Reagan had found the magic bullet which would kill inflation without raising the economic growth, have learned better. Inflation has seized the markets. Gold, the traditional shelter from inflation, is moving up again. So is silver.

The Federal Reserve will become the object of intense scrutiny by people trying to figure out whether Paul Volcker wants to be remembered as the greatest inflation fighter of the 20th Century even if this means visiting another Fed-driven recession on a world economy that is far less prepared for one than it was in 1982.

We are, to be sure, wiser than we were in the 1970s. But only to the extent that we now know that brutal monetary policies: mercilessly applied until they induce a painful recession, will bring about fundamental reductions in the inflation rate for at least four or five years.

We learned in the recession of 1982 that the population will tolerate much higher rates of unemployment than we had previously imagined if this is seen as the price of reducing inflation. But we don't know what

will happen if the punitive doses of recession are applied to a world and domestic economy that is vastly more overburdened than it was in 1982.

The sudden rise in the inflation rate should not really surprise us. It is the inevitable result of a steeply declining dollar which has, in effect, raised the price of everything we import. Not only that, but American producers, reeling from the pressure of cut-priced imports, now are feeling free to return to ingrained pricing habits that proved so disastrous in 1979. A rising dollar helped feed the disinflation process just as a fallen one is now feeding inflation.

"The process," says Alan Sinal of Shearson Lehman Brothers, "now is self-feeding and circular and dangerous and unknown in its implications for the dollar, inflation and the financial markets."

The great strength of Reaganomics to date, of course, has been that it has been implemented against a background of steadily encouraging disinflation, a trend that has made the president look masterful even to those who remembered that Reaganomics was supposed to be about balanced budgets and self-financing tax cuts.

If it becomes clear that disinflation was a transient event merely coincidental to Reaganomics, that it had more to do with Volcker's monetary policies and cyclical declines in oil and other commodity prices than it did with doctrinal wisdom in the White House, then what was Reaganomics and what was it for?

Iceland: A hotbed of feminist politics

BOSTON—When Iceland floats into the American consciousness from time to time, it's as a setting for some embarrassing East-West confrontation.

In 1972, there was the chess match between a boorish Bobby Fischer and Boris Spassky. In 1986, there was the mismatch between a confused Ronald Reagan and Mikal Gorbachev. But the image of this land as summit site has just been overhauled. On April 26, Iceland became the international hotbed of feminist politics. The homeland of 240,000 people is the scene of the women's movement that rears.

In national elections, 10 percent of the voters cast their ballot for The Women's Alliance, a feminist political party that won six of the 63 seats in Parliament—otherwise known as the Althing. More importantly, since this election gave no coalition a majority, these women now hold the pivotal role in the formation of a new government.

The Alliance sounds like textbook feminism. It's a party that allows men to be members but not candidates. They profess to have no belief in hierarchies. They profess to have no leader who will sit in Parliament, so that no one will be in power and out of touch with grass roots for more than six years.

Anyone who wants to form a government is going to have to come to terms with them, and their terms sound like the ten-point program of economic and social issues on every feminist list.

One of the party's seat-holders, Gudrun Agnasondottir, who I reached by telephone in Reykjavik put it this way: "Our main emphasis is to improve the condition and status of women. We ask for a changed set of values so that looking after people is as equally respected and well-paid as looking after machines and money.

We regard all issues in society as women's issues. We want better wages, better care for children, longer maternity leaves. And we want it as soon as possible." Sound familiar?

Just how did this happen? Iceland has the oldest Parliament in the world, dating from the Vikings in 930. From 1842 to 1932, there had been a grand total of 12 women elected to Parliament. How did the oldest become the first where a women's movement gained serious power? How did a country the size of Virginia with a population slightly larger than Jackson, Mississippi, become a breeding ground for feminism?

I am tempted to say it has something to do with the Icelandic literacy rate, the highest in the world at 99.9 percent. But by and large, the current moment of glory has come from both activism inside and outside the system, a grassroots movement and a decision to play politics.

Iceland has always had a touch of feminism, at least in name. The women's last names, which they keep after marriage, and in "dottir" the men in "son." They've also had a touch of lordliness. About 80 percent of the women work outside their homes, but for 40 percent less money than men. Women do the bulk of work inside the home.

The first of the double-burden/low-wage protests came in 1975 when 25,000 women joined a strike day. That's ten percent of the population; as 175 million American women struck.

In the years since then, there have been

changes. Iceland has had an equal rights amendment since 1976. In 1980 and 1984, the people elected Vigdis Finnbogadottir as President, a symbolic but visible post in the small town of a suburb of Reykjavik, where almost any citizen can make an appointment with the chief of state. Even members of Parliament — as I discovered — are in the telephone book.

The decision by the Icelandic women's movement to form a political party was highly controversial. Many thought they should work within the existing system and that they went it alone and, under the system of proportional representation, won three seats.

This year they were the beneficiaries of disaffection from older parties. But how they'll help form a new government remains to be seen. They spent the first day dealing with the international press.

"The other intriguing question is how traditional leaders of the older parties will deal with a group that philosophically operates like a consensus-raising circle. They don't understand how it can function without a leader," said Agnasondottir, who had just refused to identify herself as one. "We do it by sharing and rotating and having a consensus form of government." GM meets Ms. magazine.

Before this coalition is even formed, there are rumors that it won't last. Shades of Cory Aquino. For the moment, however, it is a victory worth savoring. Just last fall, when men came from the United States and the Soviet Union to talk about nuclear arms, women were left outside the conference rooms. Today, in Reykjavik, women hold the balance of power.

While on a mission in Germany, as the lengthening shadows of intolerance spread over the land, I saw and heard the "Great Furrier" (leader) as he welded his followers into a unified nation of robots who conformed to his single-track philosophy and gave the world a blood bath.

Conversely I walked in the walled courtyard in Augsburg where a truly great man, Martin Luther, had been held prisoner; a man among men who lifted the darkness by giving the Bible to the people of Germany.

I have read the lives of other great reformers such as Wesley and Tyndale, and even now I have a little booklet by my pillow about the life of John Wesley, who founded methodism. I thank God for the lives of these men. They all contributed to giving us the freedom to follow the dictates of our own conscience, including to those who would

deny it to us. And from our "Mormon Hymnal" we sing songs by John Wesley such as "Hark, the Herald Angels Sing."

Joseph Smith, our own prophet suffered torture and death in keeping alive the freedom that our own heavenly inspired Constitution guarantees. The true essence of Mormonism was expressed in a nutshell in The Times-News insert to expell false imbeliefs. Those who fall when the article was paid for by the church, I think that any subscriber one extra cent. It did not ask for any outside contributions as many churches do, and I would eagerly read any and all equivalent articles directly from the leadership of any denomination, because I would know that it was their true doctrine, unworped by their enemies.

Sometimes wonder what kind of religion those people have, who, instead of building up their own and spreading its goodness abroad, squander their time and energy in a vain attempt to tear down and defile the sacred beliefs of others.

Rubble yields 3 more bodies

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP) — The wall of ambition silted, filling the hole Thursday as construction workers marked a week since at least 22 colleagues died in an apartment building collapse and as searchers recovered three more bodies.

Twenty-eight construction workers were buried in tons of concrete and steel when the unfinished building gave way April 22. Six men remained missing Thursday, officials said.

Ambulances waiting outside the L'Ambiance Plaza site as the search went on sounded their sirens at 1:30 p.m., the time of the collapse.

Three bodies were pulled Thursday from the rubble, once piled about 40 feet high but now reduced to below ground level.

The search for the missing focused on areas near the building's exits.

Another supremacist nabbed

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. (AP) — A white supremacist who had vowed to wage a race war and overthrow the government was captured Thursday when 40 federal agents surrounded a mobile home in southwestern Missouri, the FBI said.

Glen Miller, former leader of the White Patriot Party, and two associates were ordered held at a medical center for prisoners until a hearing Monday to determine whether they should be returned to North Carolina, said Tanna Bolen, a spokeswoman for the U.S. Attorney's Office.

Arrested with Miller were Douglas Sheets, Robert "Jack" Jackson and Tony Wydra. Sheets and Jackson were ordered held with Miller at the U.S. Medical Center for Federal Prisoners, while Wydra was released without being charged.

Following the hearing, Jackson told reporters: "We are political prisoners being prosecuted for our religious beliefs."

Falwell seeks PTL donations

FORT MILL, S.C. (AP) — The Rev. Jerry Falwell, in his final days as host of the "PTL Club," pleaded for donations Thursday and promised to account for every penny.

The fundamentalist evangelist and host of the "Old Time Gospel Hour" show in Lynchburg, Va., said he will step down as the "PTL Club" host in Fort Mill on Monday and may name his replacement today.

Exiled evangelist Jim Bakker turned the ministry over to rival Falwell on March 19. Subsequent disclosures have described Bakker's sexual tryst with a church secretary and the \$1.6 million in salary and bonuses paid to Bakker and his wife, Tammy, in 1986.

"PTL's new chief operations officer, Harry Hargrave, said his first priority is finding a new 'PTL Club' host who can bring in donations."

"We're trying to spiritualize, theologize, collectively with our business practices put our house in order," Falwell said Thursday.

PTL auditors this week are searching for assets that can be sold to cover the ministry's \$50 million debt.

USSR purchases U.S. grain

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviet Union will buy 4 million metric tons of U.S. wheat — about 147 million bushels — for delivery through Sept. 30 under an export subsidy program, the Agriculture Department announced Thursday.

The sales, long rumored in agricultural circles, will mark the return of Moscow to the U.S. wheat market. The Soviets had not purchased any American wheat since last year and their only 152,000 tons. It resumed buying corn earlier this year.

"Four million tons of business is very welcome. We're glad to have it," Agriculture Secretary Richard E. Lyng said, announcing the sales, which will be made through the Export Enhancement Program.

He said the subsidized sales through commercial grain export companies was the result of an offer by

the United States in March that the Soviets could buy wheat through the program.

Bennett backs AIDS testing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Education Secretary William J. Bennett said Thursday that all hospital patients, prison inmates, potential immigrants, and couples seeking marriage licenses should be forced to undergo blood tests for AIDS.

Bennett, in a speech and news conference, said President Reagan's Domestic Policy Council is divided over whether to recommend mandatory tests as an option for dealing with the AIDS epidemic.

After the speech at Georgetown University, two gay activists from New York City leaped to their feet, unfurled a "Lavender Hill Mob" banner and shouted, "Test drugs, not people!" and "We're dying!"

The two, Michael Petrelis, 28, who said he is dying of AIDS, and Marty Robinson, 44, were hustled out of the lecture hall by campus security guards, detained briefly and released.

Pesticide checks inadequate

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Food and Drug Administration's process of monitoring domestic and imported foods for potentially hazardous pesticides remains inadequate, with some contaminated foods reaching market shelves before tests are completed, a member of the General Accounting Office said Thursday.

"As best we can determine, FDA is annually testing less than 1 percent of food being consumed in the United States," said J. Dexter Peach, assistant comptroller general for the resources, community and economic development division of Congress' investigative arm.

The major problem is imported food "where not only is there inadequate coverage of certain pesticides, but some foods coming from various countries are not being tested for any pesticides at all," Peach told the House Energy and Commerce subcommittee on oversight and investigations.

Mother vows to keep up fight

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — Maria Desillers flew home in mourning Thursday to bury her son, Ronnie, whose third liver transplant failed, but she vowed to continue her fight for life-saving organ transplants.

"Until the very last minute Ronnie fought... like a man," Ms. Desillers told reporters after she arrived at Fort Lauderdale Executive Airport. "We're all proud of him."

Ms. Desillers, who was met by a half-dozen relatives, was flown back to Florida with her son's body aboard a corporate jet owned by millionaire industrialist Victor Posner, who also had donated \$200,000 toward Ronnie's operations.

Before she left Pittsburgh, Ms. Desillers pledged: "The nation will keep on hearing Ronnie's name. The nation will keep on hearing about organ donation—and I don't care if I have to travel to the ends of the Earth to get that message across to people."

Air Force calls test success

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force said Thursday it had scored a success early this week in testing of its new AMRAAM air-to-air fighter missile.

The test, conducted Monday over the Gulf of Mexico, marked the first time one of the missiles had been fired by an F-16 Falcon fighter against a drone using radar-jamming gear. It was also the first to be flown by a British test pilot, the Air Force said.

The test involved a single AMRAAM fired by the fighter while flying at an altitude of 20,000 feet, the Air Force said. The missile's radar succeeded in locking onto a target drone flying at an altitude of 4,500 feet and guided it to a successful interception despite the drone's use of radar-jamming gear.

The mission was flown by Squadron Leader Simon Wood of the British Royal Air Force, who has worked with the AMRAAM program since last year.

6th U.S. nuclear test of year shakes wide area of Nevada

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — The who added he had seen greater shaft 2,000 feet beneath Pahute ground motion in other tests. Mesa, 100 miles northwest of Las Vegas.

Guards at Moscow embassy knew all safe combinations

WASHINGTON (AP) — Marine guards at the U.S. Embassy in Moscow were provided with combinations for all secure rooms and safes, making the penetration of sensitive areas much easier for KGB agents alleged to have probed the building at night, intelligence sources said Thursday.

Rooms in which CIA and Defense Intelligence Agency operatives worked, as well as the communications vault, were closed at night by steel doors with combination locks, said one intelligence source, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

A State Department source also said that until last year, a code expert was stationed in the communications vault 24 hours a day, but that after that, no one was assigned to the room between midnight and 6 a.m. Another development which would make it easier for the KGB to penetrate the area.

Congressional and administration investigations continued into the alleged penetration of the old embassy, the budding of a new U.S. office building being erected nearby, and the American decision to allow the Soviets to construct an embassy complex on a high hill in Washington.

Among the developments:

- Senate Majority Leader Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., said he would co-

sponsor legislation introduced by Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, to move the Soviets off Mount Alto in Washington. Intelligence experts say the high vantage point allows the Soviets to eavesdrop on sensitive U.S. government communications.

• The State Department said Secretary of State George P. Shultz has rejected a House subcommittee subpoena seeking documents concerning security problems at the Moscow embassy. Spokesman Charles Redman said Shultz had returned the subpoena to Chairman Dante Fascell, D-Fla., of the House Foreign Affairs Committee. Redman denied that any documents were being withheld and said "there was absolutely no justification for the subpoena."

• Attorney General Edwin Meese III said the Justice Department is looking into whether State Department personnel could be prosecuted for negligence in the espionage scandal, although there was not a full-scale criminal investigation into the matter.

• The Senate Appropriations Committee tentatively approved language that would prohibit spending of any money on the new U.S. Embassy office building in Moscow "except as necessary to demolish the building."

- Ronald Spiers, the undersecretary

of state for administration, told the House Foreign Affairs Committee that he thought the government should erect a separate smaller office building in which to conduct classified work in Moscow alongside the as yet incomplete new canopy.

But he said the department was awaiting a recommendation from James Schlesinger, the former defense secretary and CIA chief, who is studying electronic eavesdropping devices incorporated into concrete beams, precast offsite away from U.S. supervision, and put in the building by Soviet workers.

The Senate Intelligence Committee recommended in a unanimous 15-0 report Wednesday that the building be demolished. The government, it said, has spent \$23 million out of \$65 million earmarked for the building in the \$191-million project. The other eight structures in the complex are already in use.

Two of the most important intelligence jesses from the alleged penetration of the old U.S. Embassy in Moscow could have been the identities of Soviet citizens cooperating with the United States and the codes and design of coding machines used for classified communications between the embassy and Washington, according to administration officials.

Bracy's pre-trial hearing halts; investigative woe reports bubble

WASHINGTON (AP) — The pre-trial hearing for a Marine embassy guard accused of espionage recessed Thursday after a day of testimony as the Pentagon's chief spokesman defended the performance of military investigators probing the sex-and-spy scandal.

The Marine Corps said the so-called Article 32 hearing for Cpl. Arnold Bracy started Thursday at the Quantico, Va., Marine Base with roughly six hours of closed-door proceedings.

The hearing was then recessed until May 19 at the request of defense attorneys, who asked for more time to prepare their case, said Lt. Col. John Shotwell, a Marine spokesman.

During Thursday's proceedings, a military hearing officer heard testimony from one government witness and three defense witnesses, Shotwell said. Additional witnesses are expected to be called when the hearing resumes, he added.

At the Pentagon, meantime, spokesman Robert Sims sought to play down reports of disarray among investigators and prosecutors.

And he also announced that one of the four Marines arrested since the scandal erupted would be transported to Quantico "within the next week to 10 days" to face pre-trial hearings.

"At some point before those hearings for Sgt. John J. Weirick begin, the Marine Corps will have to unveil formal charges against the Marine. He has been arrested on suspicion of espionage while waiting as a guard at the U.S. consulate in the Soviet city of Leningrad.

As for the conduct of the investigation, Sims said Navy Secretary James H. Webb Jr. had provided a report to Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger on the matter, concluding "that he had the utmost confidence in the ability of the Naval Investigative Service to conduct a thoroughly professional investigation."

Sims was questioned on the per-

formance of military investigators in the wake of reports that at least five Marine embassy guards have either recanted statements they gave to investigators or complained to superiors about "strong-arm" tactics being employed by interrogators.

Those reports have originated with defense attorneys representing Sgt. Clayton J. Lonetree, the first guard arrested in the case. Lonetree and Bracy have both been accused of allowing Russian agents to roam the embassy building in Moscow on numerous occasions last year.

Attorney Michael V. Stuhf, in an interview earlier this week, said at least three other Marines besides Lonetree and Bracy had complained to superiors in recent days about the tactics of investigators from the Naval Investigative Service, which is spearheading the probe.

Stuhf had disclosed earlier that Bracy had withdrawn — or recanted — an incriminating statement he had given to investigators just before his arrest in March. The defense attorney asserted that without that statement, the prosecutors had little in the way of a solid case against Lonetree.

Magazine says swap offer made for Waite

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — A magazine said Thursday an Iranian Embassy employee has been kidnapped in Moslem West Beirut and the abductors offered to trade him for missing Anglican church hostage negotiator Terry Waite.

Embassy officials said they had no record of the alleged kidnapping. He was identified as Mohammed Khatami by Ash-Shiraa, the magazine that first reported the secret U.S. armistices to Iran.

There have been no reports for the past three weeks regarding Waite's whereabouts or the fates of 24 other missing foreigners, who include eight Americans, Waite disappeared Jan. 20 after leaving his West Beirut hotel to meet with captors of American hostages, most of whom are believed held by Shiite Moslem extremists loyal to Iran.

Assorted reports since have said Waite was being held captive, was seen moving about freely in west Beirut, was wounded while trying to escape and had been killed.

Ash-Shiraa is aligned with Iranian radicals and known to have sources close to the Iranian and Syrian governments.

Syria, which has 25,000 soldiers stationed in east and north Lebanon, sent 7,500 of them into the city's Moslem sector two months ago to stop a factional war, but the troops have not entered the Shiite sums of south Beirut. Most foreign captives are believed to be held there.

It did not cite sources or say when the alleged kidnapping occurred, but reported that Khatami was being held "at an apartment run by a political party outside Beirut."

No group has claimed has claimed to hold Waite. Jumbatt has accused the Iranian-backed Hezbollah, or Party of God, and Hezbollah denied it.

KGB chief visits Soviet frontier areas

MOSCOW (AP) — KGB chief Yuri Chebrikov has visited frontier areas where Afghan guerrillas recently killed at least two Soviet border guards, the official news agency Tass said Thursday.

Tass said Chebrikov's six-day visit, which ended Thursday, included talks with military and Communist Party officials.

The KGB security police are in charge of securing the nation's frontiers as well as intelligence-gathering.

Among Chebrikov's stops was the border settlement of Pyandzh in the republic of Tadzhikistan. On March 8, two missiles fired by Afghan rebels killed a man and injured two people there. On April 8, two guards were killed at an outpost on the Pyandzh River. Soviet media carried delayed reports of the attacks.

Chebrikov also was in the border town of Termez in Uzbekistan.

Pope defends church acts in Hitler era

COLOGNE, West Germany (AP) — Pope John Paul II condemned Adolf Hitler's "death machinery" Thursday and strongly defended the conduct of German bishops and the Vatican during the Nazi era.

The denunciation of the Nazis and their 12-year rule is believed to be the strongest the pontiff has ever issued. He did not mention Pius XII, the pope during World War II, who has been accused of not being forceful enough in speaking out against Nazism and protecting Jews.

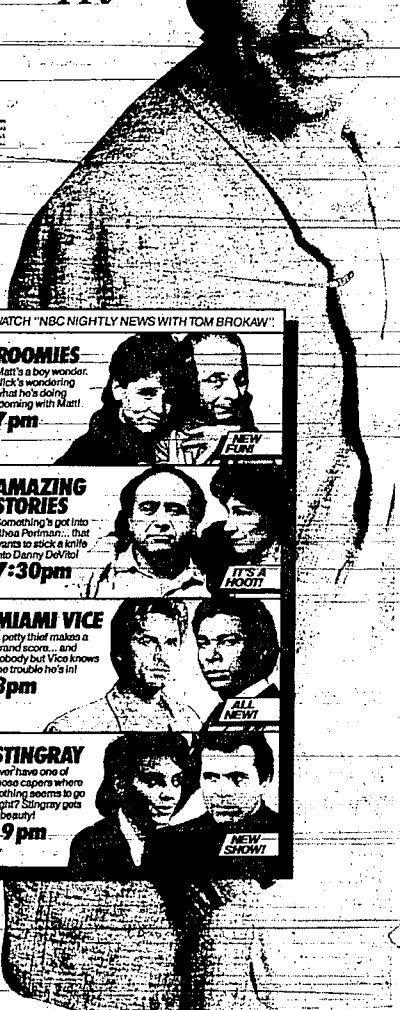
At the outset of a five-day pilgrimage to West Germany, the pope sought to ease tension between Roman Catholics and Jews over his plan to beatify a "martyred Jewish-born man today. John Paul said the Nazis sent her to a gas chamber both because she was a Christian and because she was born a Jew.

"Edith Stein, a Jew and a Catholic nun, demonstrated her solidarity with the Jewish people by sharing their suffering and martyrdom," the pope said in his arrival statement.

The pontiff praised Edith Stein and the Rev. Rupert Mayer, a Jesuit priest persecuted by the Hitler regime. He will beatify Mayer in Munich on Sunday. Beatification is a step toward possible sainthood.

Sister Teresta and Father Mayer "light up the horrifying and dark chapter of an entire historical epoch," John Paul said.





Guards at Moscow embassy knew all safe combinations

WASHINGTON (AP) — Marine guards at the U.S. Embassy in Moscow were provided with combinations for all secure rooms and safes, making the penetration of sensitive areas much easier for KGB agents alleged to have prowled the building at night, intelligence sources said Thursday.

Rooms in which CIA and Defense Intelligence Agency operatives worked, as well as the communications vault, were closed at night by steel doors with combination locks, said one intelligence source, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

A State Department source also said that until 1983, a code expert was stationed in the communications vault 24 hours a day, but that after that, no one was assigned to the room between midnight and 6 a.m., another development which would make it easier for the KGB to penetrate the area.

Congressional and administration investigations continued into the alleged penetration of the old embassy, the bugging of a new U.S. office building being erected nearby, and the American decision to allow the Soviets to construct an embassy complex on a high hill in Washington.

Among the developments:

- Senate Majority Leader Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., said he would co-

sponsor legislation introduced by Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, to move the Soviets off Mount Alto in Washington. Intelligence experts say the high vantage point allows the Soviets to eavesdrop on sensitive U.S. government communications.

- The State Department said Secretary of State George P. Shultz has returned the subpoena to Chairman Dante Fascell, D-Fla., of the House Foreign Affairs Committee. Redman denied that any documents were being withheld and said "there was absolutely no justification for the subpoena."
- Attorney General Edwin Meese III said the Justice Department is looking into whether State Department personnel could be prosecuted for negligence in the espionage scandal, although there was not a full-scale criminal investigation into the matter.
- The Senate Appropriations Committee tentatively approved language that would prohibit spending of any money on the new U.S. Embassy office building in Moscow "except as necessary to demolish the building."
- Ronald Spiers, the undersecretary

of state for administration, told the House Foreign Affairs Committee that he thought the government should erect a separate manager-of-five building in which to construct classified work in Moscow alongside the as yet incomplete new chancery.

But he said the department was awaiting a recommendation from James Schlesinger, the former defense secretary and CIA chief, who is studying electronic eavesdropping devices incorporated into concrete beams, placed outside away from U.S. supervision, and put in the building by Soviet workers.

The Senate Intelligence Committee recommended in a unanimous 15-0 report Wednesday that the building be demolished. The government, it said, has spent \$22 million out of \$60 million earmarked for the building in the \$281 million project. The other eight structures in the complex are already in use.

Two of the most important intelligence losses from the alleged penetration of the old U.S. Embassy in Moscow could have been the identities of Soviet citizens cooperating with the United States and the codes and design of coding machines used for classified communications between the embassy and Washington, according to administration officials.

Bracy's pre-trial hearing halts; investigative woe reports bubble

WASHINGTON (AP) — The pre-trial hearing for a Marine embassy guard accused of espionage recessed Thursday after a day of testimony as the Pentagon's chief spokesman defended the performance of military investigators probing the sex-and-spy scandal.

The Marine Corps said the so-called Article 32 hearing for Cpl. Arnold Bracy started Thursday at the Quantico, Va., Marine Base with roughly six hours of closed-door proceedings.

The hearing was then recessed until May 19 at the request of defense attorneys, who asked for more time to prepare their case, said Lt. Col. John Shotwell, a Marine spokesman.

During Thursday's proceedings, a military hearing officer heard testimony from one government witness and three defense witnesses. Shotwell said. Additional witnesses are expected to be called when the hearing resumes, he added.

At the Pentagon, meantime, spokesman Robert Sims sought to play down reports of disarray among investigators and prosecutors.

And he also announced that one of the four Marines arrested since the scandal erupted would be transported to Quantico "within the next week to 10 days" to face pre-trial hearings.

At some point before those hearings for Sgt. John J. Weirick begin, the Marine Corps will have to unveil formal charges against the Marine. He has been arrested on suspicion of espionage while working as a guard at the U.S. consulate in the Soviet city of Leningrad.

As for the conduct of the investigation, Sims said Navy Secretary James H. Webb Jr. had provided a report to Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger on the matter, concluding "that he had the utmost confidence in the ability of the Naval Investigative Service to conduct a thoroughly professional investigation."

Sims was questioned on the per-

formance of military investigators in the wake of reports that at least five Marine embassy guards have either recanted statements they gave to investigators or complained to superiors about "strong-arm" tactics being employed by interrogators.

Those reports have originated with defense attorneys representing Sgt. Clayton J. Lometree, the first guard arrested in the case. Lometree and Bracy have both been accused of allowing Russian agents to roam the embassy building in Moscow on numerous occasions last year.

Attorney Michael V. Shuff, in an interview earlier this week, said at least three other Marines besides Lometree and Bracy had complained to superiors in recent days about the tactics of investigators from the Naval Investigative Service, which is spearheading the probe.

Shuff had disclosed earlier that Bracy had withdrawn or recanted an incriminating statement he had given to investigators just before his arrest in March. The defense attorney asserted that without that statement, the prosecutors had little in the way of a solid case against Lometree.

Magazine says swap offer made for Waite

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — A magazine said Thursday an Iranian Embassy employee has been kidnapped in Moslem west Beirut and the abductors offered to trade him for missing Anglican Church hostage negotiator Terry Waite.

Embassy officials said they had no record of the alleged kidnap victim. He was identified as Mohammed Khatami by Ash-Shiraa, the magazine that first reported the secret U.S. arms sales to Iran.

There have been no reports for the past three weeks regarding Waite's whereabouts or the fates of 24 other missing foreigners, who include eight Americans.

Waite disappeared Jan. 20 after leaving his west Beirut hotel to meet with captors of American hostages, most of whom are believed held by Shiite Moslem extremists loyal to Iran.

Assorted reports since have said Waite was being held cap-

tive, was seen moving about freely in west Beirut, was wounded while trying to escape and had been killed.

Ash-Shiraa is aligned with Iranian radicals and known to have sources close to the Iranian and Syrian governments.

Syria, which has 25,000 soldiers stationed in east and north Lebanon, sent 7,500 of them into the city's Moslem sector two months ago to stop a fratricidal war, but the troops have not entered the Shiite slums of south Beirut. Most foreign captives are believed to be held there.

It did not cite sources or say when the alleged kidnapping occurred, but reported that Khatami was being held "at an apartment run by a political party outside Beirut."

No group has claimed he claimed to hold Waite. Jumblatt has accused the Iranian-backed Hezbollah, or Party of God, and Hezbollah denied it.

Pope defends church acts in Hitler era

COLOGNE, West Germany (AP) — Pope John Paul II condemned Adolf Hitler's "death machinery" Thursday and strongly defended the conduct of German bishops and the Vatican during the Nazi era.

The denunciation of the Nazis and their 12-year rule is believed to be the strongest the pontiff has ever issued. He did not mention Plus XII,

the pope during World War II, who has been accused of not being forceful enough in speaking out against Nazism and protecting Jews.

At the outset of a five-day pilgrimage to West Germany, the pope sought to ease tension between Roman Catholics and Jews over his plan to enter a "martyred Jewish-

born nun today. John Paul said the Nazis sent her to a gas chamber both because she was a Christian and because she was born a Jew.

"Edith Stein, as a Jew and a Catholic nun, demonstrated her solidarity with the Jewish people by sharing their suffering and martyrdom," the pope said in his arrival statement.

The pontiff praised Edith Stein and the Rev. Rupert Mayer, a Jesuit priest persecuted by the Hitler regime. He will beatify Mayer in Munich on Sunday. Beatification is a step toward possible sainthood.

Sister Teresia and Father Mayer "light up the horrifying and dark chapter of an entire historical epoch," John Paul said.

KGB chief visits Soviet frontier areas

MOSCOW (AP) — KGB chief Viktor Chebrikov has visited frontier areas where Afghan guerrillas recently killed at least two Soviet border guards, the official news agency Tass said Thursday.

Tass said Chebrikov's six-day visit, which ended Thursday, included talks with military and Communist Party officials.

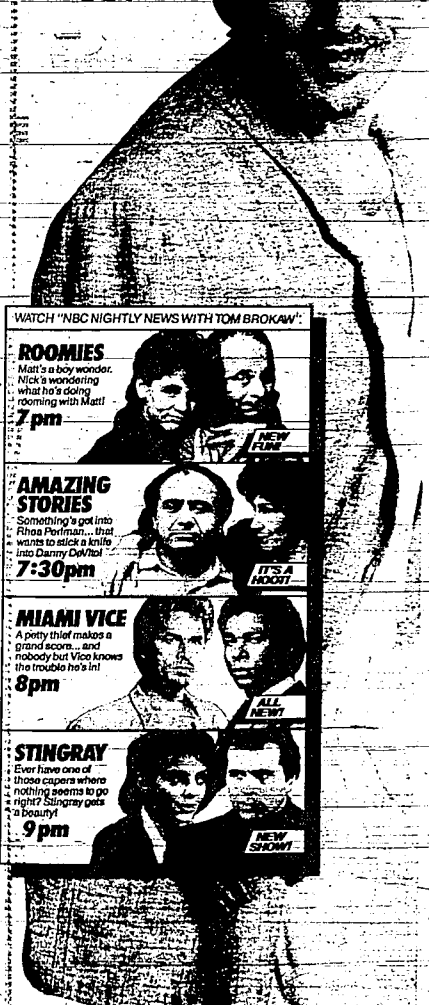
The KGB security police are in charge of securing the nation's fron-

tiers as well as intelligence-gathering.

Among Chebrikov's stops was the border settlement of Pyandzh in the republic of Tadzhikistan. On March 8, two missiles fired by Afghan rebels killed a man and injured two people there. On April 8, two guards were killed at an outpost on the Pyandzh River. Soviet media carried delayed reports of the attacks.

Chebrikov also was in the border town of Termez in Uzbekistan.

Districts reject salary hike for new teachers

TWIN FALLS — Idaho legislators resolved that increasing public education funding \$20 billion this year meant also raising the state's lowest teachers' salaries to \$15,000 at the expense of all other raises.

But many Magic Valley school districts find the burden too great to lift from salaries from current \$13,000-plus ranges. Despite the strength of this year's additional funding, officials say they are sticking to the idea of raising entire salary schedules equally, rather than favoring only the newest teachers.

Twin Falls Trustee Steve Tolman said "intangibles" such as morale of experienced teachers were taken into account while negotiating the district's new contract with

a \$14,400 base salary. Tolman, who participated in negotiations, said he understood the need to attract new teachers and said the \$15,000 minimum might be met next year.

But that reasoning is exactly what some legislators tried to avoid.

"We don't need to worry about keeping good teachers if we can't get good teachers," said Sen. Jerry Twigg, R-Blackfoot. Twigg supported a resolution "strongly" suggesting districts meet the minimum salary level. But in addition to Twin Falls, district officials in "negotiations" in Jerome, Hansen, Gooding, and Kimberly are also pessimistic about meeting it this year.

Twigg is a legislator who, with district officials, expects the minimum to become law next year if districts don't meet the resolution voluntarily this year. Beyond that,

legislators said a statewide salary schedule in a few years may return state control of education to where it was during the 1960s.

While not advocating a statewide schedule, Sen. Michael Crapo, R-Idaho Falls, said, "I'm no one who does not fear a statewide salary schedule."

All agree mandating a minimum salary would remove some local discretion in determining salary levels. A mandated schedule would eliminate all local control. School officials fear losing local control but legislators said they deserve a voice for the amount of funding provided.

"Salaries should be set by representatives of local taxpayers and not the state," said Blaine County District Superintendent David Noonan.

"It's my feeling they're going a little too far unless they're going to mandate a

statewide salary schedule," said Camas County District Superintendent Harold Stroud.

Noonan, Stroud and others in Magic Valley opposed losing local control, but said the state might as well order a salary schedule and fund it if a minimum is set.

"It means somebody has to send some money," said Jerome Superintendent Richard Kugler of the \$15,000 minimum.

Blaine pays \$15,441 base this year and Camas pays \$15,000. Stroud added that his salaries were raised voluntarily to attract teachers to his rural district.

Still, legislators note most districts don't meet that level. And several — such as Boise, where base salaries have risen \$252 in the past four years to \$12,836 — have pumped money only into the upper end of the schedule.

Base salaries have risen during the past four years in Magic Valley, but not enough for the tastes of some legislators. Between 1983-84 and 1986-87, Twin Falls was \$13,500, from \$12,500; Kimberly was \$12,800 from \$12,200; Jerome was \$12,803 from \$11,500; Gooding \$14,450 from \$12,000; Hansen \$17,600 from \$11,750. Large jumps, such as Twin Falls' new contract, are expected in each of the districts this year.

Rep. Dean Sorenson, R-Boise, argued that six of seven states surrounding Idaho had \$16,000 or better for starting salaries. Montana said Idaho's higher salaries than Idaho, he said.

Twigg said Idaho's low salaries illustrate the fact new teachers aren't represented at the bargaining table. To substitute for that representation and replace inadequate

Four vie to serve school district

TWIN FALLS — Four people registered by the deadline Thursday evening to run for an opening in the Twin Falls School District Board, according to district clerk Jenny Dougherty.

In another board seat to be decided in the May 19 election, trustee Calvin Lamborn will run unopposed.

The four competing candidates seek the seat of Board Chairman Gene Champlin, who is stepping down after nine years on the board. Champlin represents zone five, which roughly covers the district south of Addison Avenue and east of Highway 74, excluding the downtown area bordered by Locust Street and Rock Creek.

Running for the three-year term are Charles Bergman, Lois Cowan, Rev. Bert Remaley and Dave Sommer.

Bergman, 55, said he is interested in following how the district spends money and what it gets for the dollar. He, like the other three candidates, has not served in public office before.

He said he has served on the board of a private school, St. Peter's Parochial School in Ontario, Ore., for several years.

Cowan, 46, has two children in high school and would like to take part in the district's decision-making process before proposing changes.

Remaley, 65, is a Methodist minister who has served in Idaho and Oregon. He said he is interested in serving the community in the spare time available since retiring two years ago.

He said he's been a substitute teacher and is interested in teachers and the district's administration working as a team rather than confrontationally.

Sommer, 38, farms south of Twin Falls while he has a legislative office. Sommer is Republican committee man for precinct 22.

He said he is interested in learning how the board operates before deciding what improvements or changes might be adopted in the district.

Lamborn's seat covers zone two, which runs roughly south of Highway 33 and west of Highway 74.

Lamborn, 53, has served on the board six years. He said the district's administration is as good as he's seen, so that he's eager to look toward improving the excellent education.

"I'm looking forward to moving beyond some of the concerns and struggles of (past years) and get down to more effective use of personnel and money to go for that excellence," he said.

Lamborn holds a doctoral degree in plant disease and plant breeding. He researches plant disease at Gallatin Valley Seed Co., where he is vice president.

Bob Burks, Wendell, admires Niagara Springs' beauty

TWIN FALLS — Bob Burks of Wendell says he has pleasant memories of family picnics at Niagara Springs but he fears the remembrances will be shattered by additional water diversions planned by a trout company.

Burks says the diversions threaten the aesthetics of the springs and he is protesting them at a state Department of Water Resources hearing May 28.

But Rim View Trout Co. of Boise says it is Idaho Power Co. that raised the issue of the diversions.

Niagara Springs is several miles south of Wendell on the Snake River.

Rim View is giving up its priority on some of its water rights to allow IPC more water to increase its steelhead hatchery production, said Earl Hardy, Rim View president. Rim View operates a trout farm next to the hatchery.

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission is requiring IPC to increase steelhead smolt production from 200,000 to 400,000 pounds over a year. The increase is to make up for fish destruction on the Snake River caused by the company's dams. "It takes water to do that," says Larry Taylor, IPC spokesman.

For its part, Rim View says it will get the right to use part of the discharge water from IPC's hatchery, Hardy said. This will allow Rim View to expand its operation, he said.

IPC and Rim View concluded an agreement on the issue and the state Fish & Game Department agreed to withdraw its protest of the diversion provided the terms of the agreement are followed, according to a letter sent to Hardy by F&G.

Burks is protesting Rim View's filing for 295.3 cubic feet per second of spring flow at Niagara.

"I raised my family within 3 miles from there (Niagara). Because I was in the dairy business, that's where we went for recreation. You couldn't be gone long," said Burks, who is president of the Idaho Water Users Association. Burks says he is protesting on his own and not as an officer of the association.

Niagara Springs appears as a waterfall but is actually an outlet for the Snake River Plain aquifer. The roar is like the Niagara back East. After spilling from the northern canyon wall, the water tumbles below to a pool where some of it is diverted for the hatchery and trout farm.

The historic flow at Niagara is 260 cfs, a figure which Hardy disputed. Of the 295.3 cfs Rim View filed for, 180.3 cfs involves reuse of water for fish farming. Rim View is already entitled to 140.3 cfs, ac-

ording to DWIR. And IPC is entitled to 132 cfs, DWR says.

Burks says taking more water from the springs will destroy the aesthetics of the area. He says it will further reduce the flow to Niagara Springs Creek, a popular trout fishing spot below the springs. Reuse of water will also allow fish waste to get into it, according to DWR. Burks says he is concerned about pollution, too.

Hardy says the discharge is permitted by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and he called the 50 cfs flow at Niagara Springs Creek adequate.

The negotiations between IPC and Hardy on this issue date back to before 1981, said Steve Goddard, deputy attorney general for F&G.

Hardy, who owns trout farms in Buhl and Filer, has also been involved in protracted negotiations with the U.S. Bureau of Land Management over diversions in Box Canyon which is also south of Wendell.

TWIN FALLS — Mountain Bell customers in Twin Falls will be receiving ballots by mail sometime in June asking them to select from a long-distance phone company, said a spokesman for the company Thursday.

Boise, Ketchum-Sun Valley, Declo and Burley have already switched to 1-plus dialing and residents in these locations have access to various long-distance companies. Rick Hays, Mountain Bell spokesman, said. This is possible because these areas have digital switching, Hays said.

With the breakup of the Bell System, former Bell companies such as Mountain Bell can only offer long-distance service within Idaho. Calls outside of Idaho must be made through long-distance companies.

Minidoka elementary students will get new reading program

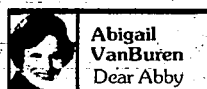

Offspring missing

Mothers march in protest ritual

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)—Ten years ago and Thursday since, mothers who lost children in the military's "dirty war" against leftists have marched in front of Government House.

The time they carried blood-red roses.

Many more have joined the 14 who began the ritual of protest, but few have found their children.

They are older. On the 10th anniversary, gray hairs peeped from beneath white kerchiefs bearing the names of vanished loved ones embroidered in blue.

Tears welled and most linked of the 200 marchers arms as they circled on the route they have followed so many times around the independence obelisk in the huge Plaza de Mayo.

About 2,000 sympathizers and admirers joined the slow and solemn walk, including a blind couple, two men in wheelchairs and a young man on crutches.

Kerchiefs said:

"Jorge Agustín—Palacios. Disappeared 1978. Argentina."

"Oscar Miranda. Feb. 2, 1977."

"Aldo Luis Neecha. Dec. 21, 1976."

There were pictures, including photographs taken for high school graduations.

A young man holding a girl in his arms at a dance with "Carlos Gustavo Cortinas. April 15, 1977."

"Gustavo Horacio Picarel" was a bearded man with a hint of a smile.

"Niel Ruben. Taken from his home March 3, 1978" wore a red bowtie.

Thousands of other white kerchiefs—signed by sympathizers from around the world decorated the plaza.

"We will never forget," said Hebe de Bonafini, leader of Mothers of Plaza de Mayo who marched in defiance of military juntas that ruled the country for nearly eight years until the civilian government was installed in December 1983.

"We have had too many years fighting, suffering, of not knowing what happened to our children," Ms. Bonafini told two sons during the military regime's campaign against suspected leftists. They and thousands of others who disappeared were never found.

As disappearances grew through the 1970s, so did the number of marchers. Membership now stands at about 250 and the weekly vigils attract about 50 women.

As their numbers increased, mothers began wearing white handkerchiefs with the names of their lost children and carrying placards bearing pictures.

This Thursday, the mothers sent a message to President Raul Alfonsín, a human rights lawyer, saying Argentina cannot call itself a democracy "if all the crimes committed universally as against humanity are not judged and punished, no matter who did them."

S. Africa bans blacks' May Day rallies

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP)—Magistrates banned 20 May Day rallies planned by black unions, a labor leader said Thursday, and police fired tear gas at students demonstrating on two university campuses.

Police detained two ABC employees filming the demonstration at the University of the Western Cape in Cape Town, and confiscated film from a Reuters photographer during the protest at the University of the Witwatersrand in Johannesburg.

The actions came despite a court decision Friday overturning emergency restrictions on press coverage of unrest and security force action.

Police officers said ABC cameraman Henry Bantula and soundman Philip Pretorius would be held overnight.

"They were detained and that's all we can tell you. It was an illegal gathering. They definitely will be held overnight," said Constable Sarelle Hayward at the Belleville charge office. She said attorneys

were visiting them.

ABC News President Roone Arledge sent a letter to U.S. Secretary of State George Shultz calling the detentions "deplorable" and asking that Washington demand the immediate release of the two.

Bantula has a British passport, and Pretorius is South African.

South Africa celebrates its first official May Day on Friday, as 25,000 black transport and post office workers continue the longest public-sector strike ever.

Day Naidoo, secretary-general of the 600,000-member Congress of South African Trade Unions, or COSATU, told a news conference that city council magistrates had banned 20 outdoor May Day rallies in major cities.

"Most didn't give reasons," he said.

Naidoo presented documents showing that some magistrates had been advised by police that emotional subjects were likely to be raised at the rallies, endangering public order.

"It is in fact an official rejection of

workers' aspirations and a total clampdown on our right to speak and meet as organized workers," said Naidoo. "It makes a mockery and shows the meaninglessness of (President P.W.) Botha's Workers Day announcement."

Both this year declared the day a workers' holiday, avoiding a massive protest strike like the one in which hundreds of thousands of students and workers participated last May Day.

But unions and anti-apartheid groups plan a nationwide two-day protest anyway on May 5 and 6, to coincide with elections for the white chamber of Parliament.

By law and custom, South Africa's system of apartheid establishes a racially segregated society in which the 24 million blacks have no vote in national affairs. The 5 million whites control the economy and maintain separate districts, schools and health services.

At the student demonstrations, police closed a major Johannesburg road and marched across it, firing tear gas, to keep hundreds of black

students on the campus of the University of the Witwatersrand.

Protesters threw rocks and carried posters with militant slogans, raised clenched fists and sang songs at the predominantly white school.

Eight students were reported arrested at the "colored" University of the Western Cape, where the South African Broadcasting Corp. said police used whips and tear gas against student demonstrators.

Meanwhile, Mike Roussos, spokesman for the South African Railway and Harbor Workers Union, condemned the Tuesday killings of four railway workers who had defied the seven-week transport workers' strike.

He denied police claims that the victims had been beaten at COSATU headquarters. The transport union is an affiliate of COSATU.

The state-run South African Broadcasting Corp. reported Thursday that a fifth transport worker had been abducted from his workplace, assaulted and set on fire. It said his burnt body was found east of Johannesburg.

Shamir says meeting threatens government

TEL-AVIV, Israel (AP)—Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir said Thursday he firmly opposes a Middle East peace conference, and it would be "a tragedy for all of Israel" if the coalition government collapses over the issue.

Shamir said the growing dispute over the proposed conference could split the rival factions in Israel's government and necessitate early elections.

Shamir, leader of the right-wing Likud bloc, contends Israel would be outnumbered and forced into making territorial concessions at such a conference.

Foreign Minister Shimon Peres, head of the left-center Labor Party, favors the meeting, saying it represents the best chance for peace.

Labor and Likud are in the third year of a fragile coalition, and the two leaders traded jobs in October.

"If one of the partners stubbornly thinks that it's necessary to end the government, it would be hard to stop that," Shamir told reporters upon his return from a three-day trip to France.

Elections "would be a tragedy for all of Israel. It would be total responsibility to throw us today into the whirlpool of elections, to endanger our accomplishments and to return us, God forbid, to inflation and instability," Shamir said.

Shamir said he had been unable to convince French leaders to drop their support of a United Nations-backed conference. The meeting also has the support of the Soviet Union, which would be included.

Meanwhile, back at Frontier Field, Coach Jim Walker and his Golden Eagles will be seeking a berth in the baseball regional, slated somewhere in Utah next week.

The Eagles will go against the Treasure Valley-Chukars in a doubleheader starting at 1 p.m. today and then host the North Idaho Cardinals at the same time Saturday.

CSI split with those teams on the road last weekend but moved into a mathematical lead by taking a pair on the home field from Ricks College

Tuesday. A sweep of the weekend would just about clinch a spot for the Eagles since North Idaho and TVCC have to play each other again next week. Ricks' low in the northern division standings at 2-4, has some advantage in that its final six regional games are on the home grounds.

"I have never missed the regionals since I've been here and I would like starting that now," said Walker.

He has nominated lefty Tony Morrison to go against Treasure Valley in the opener and leaves open the possibilities of who will follow.

"With so much riding on the line, he says not to be too surprised to see a quick hook."

"Both teams are solid clubs. Treasure Valley is a very heady team that doesn't make many mistakes and won't beat itself. They play hard for every run and they

fight defensively to protect every run they get," Walker said.

"North Idaho seems to have a little more power in its lineup. They hit the ball pretty well against us in Coeur d'Alene. They have solid pitching and they play a little more for the big inning," the coach summarized.

Probably righthander Dave Carter will get the call to open against North Idaho Saturday since he pitched a complete game against Ricks Tuesday. North Idaho jumped on Carter for four runs in the first inning Coeur d'Alene.

TVCC Coach Rick Baumann notes "I've been more encouraged by the way we've practiced the last few days than with the way we've played (splitting with NIC and CSI). It puts us 4-3-3 and in a situation where if we play well on the road, we can still go to regionals."

Hurting the Chukars is the loss of

third baseman Jim Straw, the team's top hitter, because of mumps. He was holding a .469 average.

"We know what to expect against CSI," he added. "We know that if we don't play good baseball, we're not going to win, especially over there."

At Rexburg the question is: Is this the year the Ricks College track and field Region 18 junior college dynasty will finally crack?

College of Southern Idaho track Coach Rick Neill thinks it could be.

"I think it will be a flip-flop from last year, when our women were very competitive," said Neill of the weekend's Region 18 meet here.

"This year I think our men have a real chance of beating them."

If the Eagles do, it would be the first time in almost a decade anyone has. Ricks has dominated Region 18 since the late 1970s when it included the western Oregon junior college.

Pilot boys, Declo girls grab Canyon league's track titles

Kimmes shelves shot put record

KIMBERLY — There were no surprises in the team championships and Gooding senior Todd Kimmes was the only individual able to break a record as the Canyon Conference fought through its track finals on a day of intermittent sun, wind and rain.

Kimmes, the defending A-3 state champion, put the shot 55 feet, 10 inches to eclipse a 13-year-old record set by Saras of Shoshone at 54 feet, 4 1/2 inches.

In the team races, the Declo girls stumbled about as badly as they could and still wound up with a 141-116 decision over runner-up Glens Ferry. Glens Ferry took the division with what was first announced as a six-point deficit over Wendell, causing Wendell Coach Jack Lancaster to state "I'm surprised we were able to stay that close."

It was right after the meet, a scoring error in which 12 points won by Glens Ferry in the 1600-meter run had been incorrectly given to Gooding, jacked the lead from 141-116 to 153-104.

Kimmes, the switcher, also jumped Declo into third place with Gooding slipping to fourth from the original announcement.

With the A-3 district finals starting with some field and distance finals and all preliminaries Wednesday afternoon at Jerome, the question for Wendell is how to pick those points up on Glens Ferry's boys.

"I think the question is where can the other teams help us take points away from them because with just 16 boys on our team, we don't have a lot of maneuvering room," Lancaster said.

The most obvious place we need help will be in the sprints and the sprint relays. We don't have a sprinter and Glens Ferry makes a lot of points on us there. I think we can beef up the anchor a little by having (senior halfiler) Mike Hansen run the medley but that's about it and it just doesn't seem like enough right now," he said.

Declo girls Coach Jay Darrington was surprised with the win

— let alone the margin — over Glens Ferry. "After Dana (Tanner) false-started out of the hurdles and (Tracy) Giles couldn't run the open quarter, I thought we'd given up enough points that Glens Ferry would get us," he said. He said Giles had felt a leg muscle twinge in the 800 and "we decided to rest it because district's coming up next week and there's no sense taking chances now."

Glens Ferry Coach Ken Fast was more than happy with his team's performance, the Pilot girls coming up with six first places to lead all teams in that category.

His daughters, Jody and Kim, were major contributors along with hurdler Barb Johaneck and a combination of those girls along with Jenny Berry and Zabala picking up two relay firsts.

"I think my most excited moment was when Jody won the 100-meter dash. She went through all that major knee surgery and therapy last year and here she is winning the 100-meter dash. I went up to congratulate her and she was crying. I thought, 'Oh, no, she re-injured the knee.' But she said no, she was just happy to have won," the coach said.

Kim Fast was to have 200 and 400 meter dashes and was joined in the double-winners circle by Cindy Holcomb of Kimberly in the weights, and Paula Warlturf, Gooding, in the two long distances. But perhaps the biggest individual point generator was Valley's Lori Loner, who won the two distance jump events and was second in the 100-meter dash.

The boys division was largely dominated by double winners, Glens Ferry sophomores Jesse Loner, taking the 1600 and 3200; Chris Thackeray of Wendell winning both hurdles; Kimberly's Doug McAdams claiming the long sprints; Wendell's Hansen winning the long jump and half-mile; Kimmes tackling the discus title on to his record shot put effort.

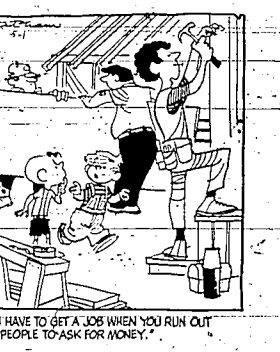

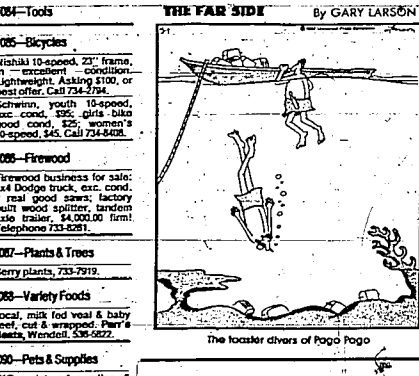

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

"Genius is but a greater aptitude for patience"

— Georges Buffon

West's opening lead identifies three quick tricks for the defense. However, East will never get a fourth unless he shows a little patience.

West's opening lead is clearly a singleton, so East knows immediately that his side can win at least the diamond ace, a diamond ruff and the ace of trumps. What happens if East gives West his ruff at trick two?

West ruffs the diamond but all hope to beat the game, east hopes to on the first trump lead but whether he leads a heart or whether he tries for a trump opening, the defense is finished. If East leads hearts, South rises with his ace, draws trumps and safely discards his hearts on dummy's diamonds. Another diamond lead by East fares no better. West cannot overruff any of declarer's trumps.

East's trump ace tells him that he can afford to try to build a defensive heart suit before he gives West his diamond ruff. At trick two, he switches to hearts, and South's game is scuttled. Whether he finishes or not makes no difference. The defense is destined to score a heart winner to go with the three defensive winners that are obvious at trick one.

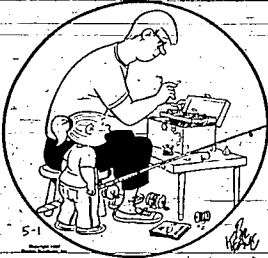

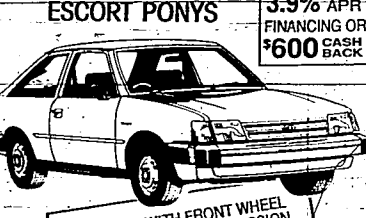

National arts council steers focus on West

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—For the first time in a decade, the National Council on the Arts is meeting outside the nation's capital, hoping to learn how to better develop the arts in rural states.

National Endowment of the Arts Chairman Frank Hodsohl said Thursday the group is meeting in Utah to "gain a greater familiarity with the arts and their audiences in the 13 states of the western region."

Hodsohl said \$7.1 million already has been earmarked for artists and art groups in the western states for fiscal 1987, a figure that could grow by year's end.

"One of the questions the council will be asking is how to develop artists in the rural states," Hodsohl said. "It is an issue I don't think has been adequately addressed in the past, but we are looking at it now."

The NEA has a \$165 million budget for fiscal year 1987. Of that, \$150 million is scheduled to go to artists and art groups, Hodsohl said.

"The National Endowment for the Arts is a federal agency created by Congress in 1965 to support American arts. It takes money appropriated by Congress and awards tax-exempt grants to arts organizations."

During the early years of the Reagan-White House, the NEA had its budget sliced by more than \$10 million. Nevertheless, Hodsohl maintained that the President Reagan is committed to the arts.

"The president has said that support of the arts is important," Hodsohl said.

"There is more emphasis on high quality, leading to a fewer number of grants in higher amounts."

He said the NEA also has attempted to build up local matching funds for the arts.

Although the council's budget has remained fairly constant in recent years, Hodsohl said support from private and local groups has jumped from \$3 billion to \$5 billion since 1981. State arts budgets have gone from \$115 million to \$215 million in six years.

The NEA also has placed more emphasis on art education, he said. "We are encouraging a greater art education in the school system," Hodsohl said. "I think an extensive art education is just as important as teaching reading, writing and arithmetic."

He said there is evidence the country is falling behind other countries in technology because of inadequate arts education in public schools.

"It is important to have a solid art education because art teaches creativity," he said.

The council will make proposals to Congress in December on how to improve art education, he said.

Following the NEA's quarterly meeting, council members will tour the other 12 western states to meet with local artists and art boards. The western region includes Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Washington, Wyoming and Utah.

They are concerned with the fate of their creations after they have had their night in the limelight. "We have put so much into them," she said. "We just feel like they should be able to give more enjoyment to people than for just one night."

'Trio' is country western dream come true

UNIVERSAL CITY, Calif. (AP) — The musical union of Dolly Parton, Linda Ronstadt and Emmylou Harris is finally in harmony after bickering managers, busy schedules and other pressures stalled the collaboration for a decade.

Few albums have been as eagerly awaited by fans as "Trio," a delicately balanced blend of three of the most popular artists in both pop and country music circles. The Warner Bros. LP was in Billboard magazine's Top 20 after three weeks of release.

The three singing stars recently talked about their careers and the 11-song LP in an interview with The Associated Press at the Sheraton Premiere Hotel.

Q: Was there any arguing about who would sing lead?
Parton: We just knew what songs we should do and 99 percent of the time we were in total agreement on what we should and shouldn't do. ... The fact that we are all strong-willed was really good because we all agreed on the music. The music was the boss. We didn't let our personalities or our egos ... get in the way.

Harris: It's got real similar tastes when it comes to this kind of music. We decided we wanted to do an acoustic album. As far as singing lead, the only problem we had was convincing Linda that she had to sing lead on more than one song. We talked her into it.

Ronstadt: All we wanted to do exactly what we pleased, and we were all pleased to do the same thing. We were dreaming the same dream. It was actually Dolly that sort of insisted finally that we sort of divide it up because she felt that it would be over the other one ... as one of us hogging it over the other one.

Q: The "Trio" idea has been knocking around for 10 years, reportedly due to infighting among the three record companies representing each of you. What took so long?
Parton: That was part of it, and managers bickering on who was going to be able to work this out. But the big part of it was we didn't have the time to do it properly. When we said we were going to do this project everybody got so excited ... It put so much pressure on us it scared us to death. ... It is just perfect now. Our careers are in a slight lull right now. ... Linda's last two albums weren't as great as the ones before and Emmylou ain't really settin' the woods on fire and I damn sure ain't, as far as record sales.

Harris: It would be real hard to say what the true reason was because I think time was the biggest enemy. We didn't have a focus at that time. We were so excited. You have to understand that when we

heard each other sing together it was like a new toy. It took us awhile to decide we needed to focus on one particular kind of music.

Ronstadt: It wasn't really any of these things. Our lives weren't very well organized. Mine and Emmylou's lives were bouncing off the moon. All three of us were amazingly busy with careers that seemed to have taken their own lives. ... So we just decided we wouldn't be in a hurry and we wouldn't feel any pressure from anybody or anything.

Q: Your fans consider you legends. Is that hard to live up to?
Parton: I don't think any of us realize that we are. I think it's nice to be recognized and it is certainly nice to be appreciated. I don't think anybody really realizes what they mean to the public. I know I've accomplished a lot and I've got a lot of fans and it makes me feel real good, but I never think of myself as a legend.

Ronstadt: I have no thoughts on it. It is totally superfluous to what my existence is or what my goals as a person are, you know. I don't think of myself as a legend or a star. I left Tucson with one thought in mind. I want to be a singer. And I want to be a better singer.

Harris: Being a legend, whatever that means, is in someone else's mind, not really in your own. I think that being a legend is nothing more than surviving, being fortunate enough to be able to do what you feel instinctively and in your heart is the right thing.

Q: In the video of "To Know Him Is to Love Him," Miss Harris sings while looking at a photograph of her husband, Miss Ronstadt looks at a picture of her boyfriend, filmmaker George Lucas, and Miss Parton looks at a picture of Miss Ronstadt's father, Gilbert. What is the story behind that?
Ronstadt: It's his high school graduation picture and it happened to already be in that antique frame. Dolly has always been very private about her marriage ... so I loaned her my daddy. She would have loaned me her daddy, I know.

New technologies keep coming along, of course, making it possible to experience deep space or filmic warps or the boundaries on imaginary planets, or to see in the dark. But there are also the film-makers with what can be called the extended imagination, who are trying to move beyond stretch limits of storytelling — to convey states of soul and mind and distorted, distended emotional upsets.

The heirs of "The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari," that pioneering German mental processes, are very much among us. The innocent dream sequences — and even some of the nightmare — that pervade the Hollywood past look very innocent, by comparison. I am not sure that "Gothic,"

Ken Russell's essay in historical hallucinatory state, called "Gothic" (The music by Thomas Dolby is extremely positive and impressive, a Russell trademark). But beyond these acted-out merely preposterously mannered. Yet there are sequences in which Russell's camera, and his moods, do convey something like the real horror of altered perceptions. And the true horror of those altered states Russell is demonstrating is not that they are wholly unbased and imaginary (pink elephants turning out to be real), but that the most shattering of these waking-alightmares arise from, and make visible if not tangible, all the subject's deepest fears. It is their immediacy, and the credibility that comes of having thought about them during normal or non-altered times, that generates the awful power of these visions.

Old films yield trove of silent classics

DAYTON, Ohio (AP) — Workers at the Library of Congress film restoration laboratory have found a treasure of silent films among reels recently discovered in a Michigan barn. After a week poring over the 250 cases of film, they identified a full version of the classic "The Italian" and even a comedy in which Oliver Hardy plays a villain, said Paul C. Spehr, assistant chief of the library's motion picture, broadcasting and recorded sound division. The restoration laboratory is located at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base near here.

"We consider that almost any silent film found is an important find because almost nine out of 10 silent films produced in the United States are lost," Spehr said. "The restoration work is painfully slow and could take more than a year because the films are on nitrocellulose, which can explode, he said. Jo Leslie Collier, an assistant professor of film at the University of Toledo, said a student, Robert Uhl, told her his family had discovered

the cache of films in a barn in Temperance, Mich. Uhl's grandfather, Clement Uhl, apparently collected the motion pictures while studying filmmaking in the 1920s, Collier said. The film was taken to a university warehouse, the American Film Institute was alerted and the AFI called the Library of Congress, Collier said. About 50 out of 200 reels were too badly deteriorated to salvage, Spehr said. The remaining reels combine to form print runs of 65 to 70 silent films in an American collection, he said. The film starred Sessue Hayakawa.

The copy of "The Italian" is important because producer Thomas Ince was; next to D.W. Griffith, the most important producer of the period, Spehr said. The film, about life among the poor in New York City, was filmed on location, he said. The library already has two versions, but they are incomplete and of poor quality, Spehr said. "The three reels of "Typhoon," also badly deteriorated to salvage, Spehr said. The remaining reels combine to form print runs of 65 to 70 silent films in an American collection, he said. The film starred Sessue Hayakawa.

Fox's chutzpah lifts 'Success'

It also features some of the finest acting you could hope to see, by Gene Hackman as the coach with a dark past, Dennis Hopper as the alcoholic ex-hoops star, and Barbara Hershey as Hackman's initial adversary. The film has a few burrs (some plot elements are grafted on and the editing rhythms are not always right) but you can hale basketball and yet still have a sensational time

at "Hoosiers." **PLATOON (R).** This is movie making with a zeal's fervor. Director-writer Oliver Stone, a decorated Vietnam infantryman himself, clearly wants us to understand what fighting in that war was like. He frightens us with an immediacy that is rare in war movies of the past, even the greatest ones, seem like crane shots by comparison. "Platoon" is at ground zero. And, not incidentally, Stone may have put a stake through the heart of all the sick Rambo heroes ever to slide on a screen. **POLICE ACADEMY IV (PG).** It is amazing that the "Police Academy" movies keep being made even though they stopped being funny after the hilarious original. This one is not so crass as the last two and director Jim Drake is at least brisk and amusing. Stars Steve Guttenberg, Bubba Smith, Michael Winslow, Bobcat Goldthwait and G.W. Bailey.

Museum officials emphasized that while their doubts about the sculpture were grave, they were not categorical, the newspaper said. "It's very difficult to prove that something's fake," said James H. Frank, chief of the Met's conservation department, who has headed the museum's scientific study of the Egyptian cat.

John Ross, a museum spokesman, told the Times that it was the Met's policy not to announce formally that an object was a fake until the museum's scientific and curatorial scholars had reached a consensus and formally presented the director with their written conclusion.

According to museum records, the Egyptian cat was sold to the museum in 1958 by Charles Morley, a "gentleman of means" and private art collector in New York. Morley, known to museum curators as a reputable source for ancient Egyptian artifacts, gave the museum no record of the object's history.

Tests of the cat show that it was made of a lead and copper alloy, instead of a tin and copper alloy normally used during the period when the sculpture was supposed to have been made.

NBC drama updates Dickinson in new version of 'Police Story'

On Sunday, May 3, NBC reaches back into its past for "Police Story: The Freeway Killings," a three-hour TV-movie update of the popular "Police Story" series, which aired from 1973-77.

When NBC Entertainment President Brandon Tartikoff first contacted the show's producer, David Gerber, about a revival, however, the last thing he had in mind was uniforms. The first character Tartikoff wanted included in the new script was undercover vice Sgt. Pepper Anderson. She was played — often in slit skirts — by Angie Dickinson in "Police Woman." That successful "Police Story" spin-off aired from 1974-78.

Dickinson does star in "Police Story: The Freeway Killings," but not as red-hot Pepper. Instead, she plays uniformed officer Anne Cavanaugh. "When people hear I'm playing a police woman, they automatically assume I'm playing Pepper, but I'm not," she says, managing to sound adamant, despite her trademark low, breathy voice. "I wanted to play someone completely different. Anne is a more traditional, by-the-book officer. She's also more vulnerable and more emotional, because she's involved with a married man — the captain of her division." He is played by Ben Gazzara.

Anne Cavanaugh's story is just one in a tapestry of many interweaving storylines. "Richard Crema — he's so marvelous in all those TV movies — plays the police chief," says Dickinson. "He's what I would call the spine of the show. But I work the most with Ben Gazzara. He's so-o-o attractive, both as a performer and a man — don't you think?"

One reason Dickinson is content with a scaled-back role is that she wouldn't want to shoulder the burden of a starring role if "Police Story: The Freeway Killing" is turned into a weekly series. "I would love to do a weekly series where there's an ensemble, but I'm not willing — either physically or mentally — to do that kind of work alone again. It was back-breaking."

Dickinson had a clause written into her "Police Woman" contract allowing her to be home every night

in time for dinner with her then-husband, Burt Bacharach, and during their teen-age daughter, Nikki, but that rarely happened. "It was a 14-hour day, with an hour for a shower on both ends," she recalls. "It was an unnatural family situation." Subsequently, she and Bacharach divorced.

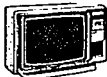
Since "Police Woman," Dickinson created a sensation in Brian De Palma's "Dressed to Kill" (1980) and played a Hollywood agent in the Jackie Collins miniseries "Hollywood Wives." "It was a big let down," says Dickinson. "The script left out

all of Jackie's humor, Jackie's husband, and during 'Hollywood Husbands' start work on a new film, "Big Bad Mama II," which co-stars William Shatner. It's a follow-up to their 1974 film.

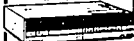

A. No, but Bob Urich recently has been leading a high-pressure life. He was hurrying to finish the latest full season of the "Spenser" TV series, followed by a cross-country promotion tour on the show's behalf. After that, he had unpleasant knee surgery, the result of an injury sustained during one of the show's earlier installments. Bob told me that he planned to get away from things by heading into the Maine woods for a week of solitude. Then, back to civilization for a family vacation.

Q. Whenever we see pictures of John and Caroline Kennedy they both tend to look a little shabby. Do they have any money of their own? — T.R.

A. Lots. They both inherited a trust fund from their grandfather, Joe Kennedy, and were left money in the will of their father, the late President John F. Kennedy. Some insiders estimate each has an income of about half a million annually. The two also will inherit eventually from Jackie's enormous estate.

Q. Is it true that Dean Martin is so aggrieved by the death of his son that he's decided to quit show business? — B.S.

A. The senior Martin was, obviously, hard-hit by his son's death when young Dean Paul was killed in an airplane crash in California. The younger Martin, a former actor, was close to his father despite the fact that Martin has been divorced from Dean Paul's mother for years. The good news is that Dean senior is pull-

Q. I enjoyed "The Secret of My Success," Michael J. Fox's new movie comedy in which he plays a kid from Kansas who comes to New York hoping to conquer the corporate world. What I couldn't quite figure out was why New York, as shown in this film, seems so glamorous, sleek and spotless. What happened to the jungle I see every day? — P.E.

A. Their mother did receive a home in the San Fernando Valley in the will, but there was a clause stating she would lose the house if she challenged the document in court.

A. Strictly speaking, it didn't. This musical version of Truman Capote's novel (which inspired a hit film) co-starred Richard Chamberlain and Mary Tyler Moore on stage during the 1960s. Audience reaction to this dud proved so disastrous the show's plug was pulled during previews, literally before it had a chance to officially open (despite the fact that posters were distributed all over town proclaiming "Broadway's Newest Musical Hit").

McCay dedicates herself to fans who appreciate extra attention

After years of bickering and politics, the Daytime Emmy Awards people are beginning to grow up. Television Academy board member Peggy McCay says photos of performers will accompany entries this year, a major breakthrough.

"Next year we'll see clips," says Peggy. "We can afford it. So can the networks."

At the moment, only judges see clips of the nominees. McCay won two Emmy nominations last year, for her portrayal of bad Caroline Brady on "Days of Our Lives," and for a guest appearance in a "Cagney & Lacey" episode. This year, she says, Oprah Winfrey will be in charge of the 14th Annual Daytime Emmy Awards Tuesday, June 30, from 3 to 5 p.m. on ABC. Nominations will be announced May 14.

One of the few who crosses the line yearly between daytime and prime time, McCay specializes in villainy after years of being nice. "I don't like sympathy all the time," she declares. Off camera, the actress takes the opposite tack. She can be found with administrator Jim Anderson at Rancho Los Amigos, visiting paraplegics from the Vietnam War.

Recently, vets watched a taping of "Days" on the Gower-Sunset stage, a movie inspired by McCay that will be repeated. The payoff came from the somber face of a vet unable to speak. While he was watching the show, a big smile appeared on his face, a breakthrough.

"Now doctors think there's a chance he will try talking," notes McCay. "This is something we have to do more often. Get the vets out. They live on television. We should reciprocate."

After visiting an old friend in a nursing home, Peggy realized that senior citizens require a spotlight too. She organized a group of performers to visit the homes, and brought some seniors to the set of "Days," thereby establishing a bond and letting the elderly know they aren't left out. Peggy even pushes for pets in nursing homes, a no-no so far.

"It can be done," says the battler. "Pets would do wonders for lonely seniors in homes. Administrators

look with horror on the idea. But the focus should be on the patient."

If Peggy can push the pet idea and win, she should win two Emmys. Looking back, the actress laughs. "I wasn't always a fighter. How did I get that way?"

Viewers help networks pick new shows

LOS ANGELES (AP) — If you're wondering why all these series are premiering so late in the season, they're just the networks' way of putting shows in previews — with the opportunity to close the curtain if they bomb.

"In effect, we're letting the public in on the program-making process," said Bud Grant, president of CBS Entertainment. "By that I mean instead of someone at the network saying, 'This show is good or bad,' we put it on the air, and let the public make the decision. It's like a Broadway-bound show opening in New Haven. The producer sees the public's reaction and can decide whether to take it to New York."

ABC, CBS and NBC have more new shows this spring than ever before. In all, they're offering 18 shows to see if any of them might become the late-season bloomers that "Three's Company" and "Dallas" did in past years.

"One reason there are more limited-run series is the high cost of making pilots," said Brandon Tartikoff, president of NBC Entertainment.

"You generally can't afford to pay the overhead of a top comedy producer to get him to do one or two pilots a year," Tartikoff said. "The people you used to get to do a pilot for you are now unattainable at that level of commitment. You have to give them six or eight episodes."

NBC has seven limited series, but it's had to squeeze them into a concentrated period because it had only two cancellations, "The A-Team" and "You Again." The network has an embarrassment of riches. Seven new shows introduced in September made it to a full season, a reversal of NBC's fortunes in September 1983, when all nine of its new fall shows failed.

NBC is trying out the comedies "Sweet Surrender," "Nothing in Common," "Rags to Riches," "Me and Mrs. C," "Roomies" and "Days and Nights of Molly Dodd," which doesn't make its debut until mid-May, and one drama, "The Bronx Zoo," starring Ed Asner.

CBS, on the other hand, has put on four dramas, "Houston Knights," "Spies," "Shell Game" and "Hard Copy," and the comedies "The Popcorn Kid," "Roxie" and "Take Five." The latter two were yanked after only two showings.

ABC has the fewest number of shows, four, including "Max Headroom," a critical success and ratings disappointment. "I can tell you after three episodes of 'Max Headroom' what the audience is saying about that show," said Tartikoff, who passed on it when it was offered to NBC.

"You can tell very quickly where a series is going. What it does not tell you is if you've mischeduled a show or if it's in an impossible time slot. What you need is a lot of promotion, more than for a fall show, and a network programmer who has a defined game plan as well as a set of expectations of what the show is capable of doing in the place you've put it in."

Tartikoff said he thinks "Roomies" and "Rags to Riches" are promising. "Nothing in Common" has been top-rated, thanks to a tryout in the time period usually occupied by the top-10 "Night Court."

Grant said CBS' "Houston Knights" and "The Popcorn Kid" have shown "a degree of audience acceptance that would make them candidates for the fall."

Carson produces new comedy series to compete with White House 'humor'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Johnny Carson said Monday that "Mr. President," his new half-hour Fox comedy series starring George C. Scott (shown May 3 at 8 p.m. on KTRV) is up against some tough real-life competition from Washington.

"I think we'll be hard put to come up with any humor that's funnier than what's going on in the White House," the comedian said at a news conference with Scott in the Oval Office set of the new show.

"Mr. President," starring Academy Award-winning actor Scott as President Samuel Arthur Tresch, will premiere Sunday, May 3, on the Fox Broadcasting Co.'s "fourth network."

Barry Diller, chairman of Fox Inc., opened the news conference on Stage 7 at Paramount Studios, where the series is being filmed.

"When one comedian, one great actor, and two great producers come to you, all I had to do was say 'yes,'" said Diller.

Carson, host of NBC's "Tonight" show, said he first took the idea for the series to NBC, but said he got only an ambivalent answer. Apparently they just didn't need any product.

Instead, he sold the show to Fox, the same network that lured away Joan Rivers from her job as permanent substitute host for Carson's show.

Asked why he took the show to the studio that had hired Miss Rivers, Carson said: "I felt I owed Mr. Diller one. I have no further comment."

Scott, whose last TV series was "East Side, West Side" in 1963, laughed and said he was lured back to doing a new show by thoughts of retirement.

Scott swept his hand over the Oval Office desk toward Carson, coproducer Gene Reynolds and costars Conrad Bain and Carlin Glynn, and said, "Seriously, if everybody does right, I'll be out of here. I'd like to get on a boat and stay there."

Carson said he and Ed Weinberger came up with the idea for the show while trying to create a concept that would interest Scott.

"We didn't want him to play a lawyer, because that's been done," said Carson. "We thought that if anybody has the authority to play the president, it's George C. Scott. We went to George's house, and George said: 'By God, the president — I like that,'" said Carson, imitating Scott's gravelly voice.

"And that was that," said Carson. Scott won an Academy Award in 1970 for "Patton," but he refused the Oscar and has never claimed it.

Carson said the stories would be mainly built around the private-family life of the president, and would not get into politics or issues.

"This is a drama with humor," said Carson. "He's not going to have a funny aide. The kids are not going to do one-liners. If it's not believable, we won't do it. It will be family relationships with humor."

'Murder Ordained' concerns Lutherans

NEW YORK (AP) — The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod is unhappy about fiction blended with fact in the CBS miniseries "Murder Ordained," the story of one of its former ministers who was convicted of murder.

The 4-hour miniseries, airing Sunday and Tuesday, May 3 and 5, portrays a love affair between the Rev. Thomas P. Bird of Emporia, Kan., and his church secretary, and their conspiracy to kill their spouses.

In real life, Lorna Anderson Eldridge, the remarried former church secretary, pleaded guilty in a plea bargain arrangement last year to soliciting the murder of her first husband. Bird was convicted of similar charges and, later, first-degree murder in the death of his wife. He has maintained his innocence.

Both are serving prison sentences. Bird's case is on appeal.

Lorna Anderson is played by JoBeth Williams. Stage actor Terry Kinney plays Bird. Keith Carradine is a highway patrolman who investigates Sandra Bird's death.

The Rev. Paul Devantier, a spokesman for The Lutheran Church-

Missouri Synod, a large, conservative denomination of Lutherans, said he had seen the miniseries, and it confirmed his fears.

"It leaves a perception that we think could be harmful to the church, its teaching, its clergy, and more importantly the innocent victims, the children of Lorna Anderson and Tom Bird, the parents, the close friends, all of whom will have to live for the rest of their lives with 'Murder Ordained' as part of the history of the case," he said in a telephone interview from St. Louis.

He said the church would have preferred either a documentary or a totally fictionalized account.

"The problem we see is mixing the two and giving the impression, and I think the impression was clearly given in the miniseries, that what was being portrayed was basically fact," he said. A disclaimer says the miniseries is based on a true story and real names are used for the main characters, though the name of Bird's church is changed.

The miniseries was shot on location in and around Emporia, where the events on which it is based occurred in 1983.

"Murder Ordained" is a high-quality production, a compelling murder mystery with a first-rate cast, down to the supporting roles. The direction, by Mike Robe, and the writing, by Robe and James Sadwith, are excellent.

The story is told without sensationalism.

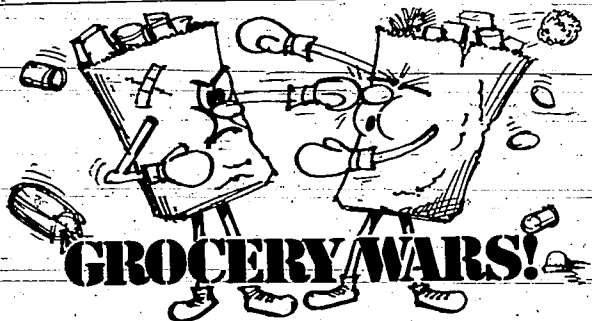

Urich campaigns for 'Spenser'

NEW YORK (AP) — Robert Urich hit the road this month in a campaign to keep "Spenser: For Hire" on ABC's schedule, but he thinks the show has hit a dead end unless the private eye's old girlfriend comes back.

"We've made some mistakes," Urich said. "I think Spenser is not Spenser without Susan Silverman around. I think we've got to have her back."

But first, the show and its fans have to persuade ABC to bring back the low-rated series for a third season.

"Spenser," based on the books by Robert B. Parker, has occasionally been in the bottom 10 in this season's A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings; it ranked 2nd for the season. Most weeks, "Spenser" was soundly beaten by NBC's "Hunter." Last week, it moved to Wednesday and was punched out by CBS' "Magnum, P.I."

Urich visited New York and Los Angeles to promote a "Save Spenser" letter-writing campaign that began in Boston, where the show is filmed and where he, his wife and two kids have become full-time residents.

The show "doesn't feel finished to me," Urich said, "I think we're just kind of zeroing in on the elements that could make it work."

One of those elements is Susan, played by Barbara Stock, who was dropped at the start of this season.

Carolyn McCormick was installed as the new female interest. Assistant District Attorney Rita Fiore, but she and Spenser still seem to be just friends.

"Towards the end, I thought, they've gotta do something, they've known each other this long, they have to at least try to come to terms with how they feel about each other," Urich said. "But it was never a Susan-Spenser relationship, ever."

Juanita Bartlett, the show's exec-

utive producer, ditched Susan because she saw nowhere to go with the couple.

"There were too many things already prescribed about the relationship," Urich agreed. "In the pilot I asked her to marry me, and she says no. In episode four, she's having an abortion. I fought and fought not to do that episode, although it turned out to be a good show. It was too early for that kind of stuff."

"But now, I think we could use all that stuff, coming back and starting over again. Now we can come back and say, 'Why are you back? Where have you been? Why didn't you come after me?'"

Urich argues that the show didn't have a chance on Saturday night, following a string of feeble ABC shows. He'd like to be back on Tuesday nights — who wouldn't? — following ABC's hit series "Moonlighting."

And if "Spenser" crashes, well, "it's not terminal. I'll survive — and then I'll have to find a job real quick," Urich said.

He has crashed before, and faster: His first lead role, as Bob on "Bob & Carol & Ted & Alice," lasted six weeks in 1973. He played a lecherous tennis pro on "Soap," a first season; an air-headed TV personality on "Tabitha," a spin-off of "Bewitched" that survived one season; and a cynical former CIA man for five months on "Gavilan."

Police shows need more relationships

LOS ANGELES (AP) — David Gerber echoes a common complaint about recent television police shows being little more than "shoot-em-ups."

Gerber is no casual observer of the scene. Now president of MGM-UA Television, Gerber in the past produced such shows as "Police Story," "Police Woman," "Joe Forrester," and "Elschield."

He's now bringing back "Police Story," one of the best cop shows of them all, for a two-hour movie on NBC. The movie, "Police Story: The Freeway Killings," will be telecast Sunday.

"We used to have great dramatic police shows like 'Kojak' and 'Police Story' and 'Streets of San Francisco' and 'The Rockford Files,'" said Gerber. "The crime wasn't as important as the personal relationships. Those shows had top spot; the personal story."

"Today, what have you got? You've got shoot-em-ups. You have concepts that don't allow for relationships, like 'Miami Vice,' which is a very stylized show. 'Hill Street Blues' is a great ensemble show, but what's missing is a strong individual presence. 'Spenser: For Hire' had a great chance the first year, but they changed it. He had a great relationship with Susan Silverman. They had great, sophisticated conversations."

Gerber complains that the only "legitimate solo male star" to emerge from television in the last decade has been Tom Selleck, the star of "Magnum, P.I."

"You have boy-girl teams, ethnic teams, ensemble teams, but no great leads," he said. "If you have a loner, you have to get inside him. If he's angry, you feel angry. If he's sad, you feel sad. You have to identify with him. It's time—we should look for someone like that."

The movie revival of "Police Story" tells three overlapping stories:

There's a political story of selecting a new police chief for a large city, with Richard Crenna as the major candidate.

There are the cops on the street, Don Meredith and Tony LoBlanco, partners once again as they occasionally were in the anthology series when it ran on NBC in the mid-1970s. They are the ones actively trying to solve the freeway killings.

Angie Dickinson, who starred in "Police Woman," is involved in a romance with another officer, played by Ben Gazzara.

"Police Story," created by policeman-author Joseph Wambaugh, was perhaps the most realistic of all police shows.

There was also talk of a series for Meredith and LoBlanco, who returned several times to play partners.

Nielsen rates repeat shows as winners

NEW YORK (AP) — Repeats dominated the schedule and the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings last week, as the networks took a breather between the traditional end of the season and the beginning of the May sweeps.

Forty-two of the 70 prime-time programs in the week ending April 26 were repeats. CBS' "60 Minutes," which tied for fifth with NBC's "Golden Girls," was the highest-rated original programming.

The only other original programs in the top 10 were NBC's "Nothing in Common" in seventh place and "Pack of Lies," a "Hallmark Hall of Fame" presentation on CBS, in ninth place.

Last week's top 10 were "Family Ties," "The Cosby Show" and "Cheers" on NBC, ABC's "Moonlighting," a tie for fifth between NBC's "Golden Girls" and CBS' "60 Minutes," followed by "Nothing in Common" and "Matlock" on NBC, "Pack of Lies" on CBS and "L.A. Law" on NBC.

NBC finished first in evening news with a rating of 10.5, followed by CBS at 10.3 and ABC at 9.3.

The four lowest-rated programs were all originals: "Follow Your Dreams" on CBS, the "Grand Reopening" of Carnegie Hall on CBS, "Our World" on ABC and, in last place, an "ABC News Closeup" report on nuclear bomb factories.

Carol Olwert, a spokeswoman for ABC News, said the low ratings for this "Closeup" would not discourage further documentaries.

"It's not unusual for a documentary not to get good ratings, and that's not why we do them," she said.

ABC's new venture in news, "The Jennings-Koppel Report," placed 55th on its premiere with a 9.6 rating and a 17 percent share of the audience.

NBC, with seven of the top 10 programs, won the week with an average rating of 14.4, followed by CBS at 11.9 and ABC at 11.7. For the 31 weeks of the current season, NBC's average is 17.6, followed by CBS at 15.7 and ABC at 14.0.

Each rating point represents 874,000 homes with television; the share is the portion of sets in use at the time.

Olwert said ABC plans three more Jennings-Koppel programs this year and four next year.

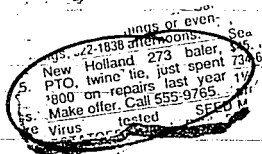
