# Some believe McFarlane, others say they'll wait and see

WASHINGTON (AP) — Did Robert McFarlane tell the truth? Was President Reagan's former national security adviser a consistently credible witness of the House and Senate Iran-Contra committees who heard McFarlane testify during four days this week — answering hundreds, perhaps thousands of questions — say he left behind a trail of words that may conceal more than it reveals.

Others say that judgment is too harsh, that McFarlane, in testimony many characterized as anguished and painful, admitted in public that he had altered documents, misled the Congress and failed to shut off a covert operation running out of control.

Such damaging admissions certainly smack of the truth, they said.

And, some members say that although a final judgment cannot be made until all the evidence is in, until all witnesses have been heard and

interrogated, their initial reaction is that he told it the simple truth.

Rep. Michael DeWine, R-Ohio,

resorted to the classic lawyer's formula: Listen to the words, watch the demeanor and wait for the testimony of other witnesses.

DeWine said he has and will do all that. His initial reaction: "He told the truth."

But Rep. Lee Hamilton, D-Ind., chairman of the House investigating committee, described McFarlane's testimony as a historic document of immense usefulness that nonetheless leaves him deeply troubled.

McFarlane is a Marine officer turned State Department and White House bureaucrat. Some said his testimony bore the mark of the verbal indirection they have come to expect from these Washington institutions.

"I think he has been schooled in a course of bureaucratic legalistic imprecisions and linguistic gymnastics," said Sen. Howell Heflin, D-Ala., a former chief justice of the Alabama Supreme Court.

He said it appeared McFarlane had tried to avoid direct responses on some key issues. But he added: "At least he was endeavoring not to make any untruthful statements."

Sen. Paul S. Trible Jr., R-Va., said: "Mr. McFarlane's testimony struck me in its lack of clarity and precision on many important points."

However, as Rep. Dante Fascell, D-Fla., said it, McFarlane was "trying to set the record straight."

He noted that when McFarlane was asked whom he was trying to shield in his initial attempt to minimize Iran-Contra disclosures last fall, the witness replied he was trying only to protect himself.

"I appreciate your willingness to shoulder great responsibility," an eagerness, an anxiousness" to assume full and complete responsibility.

"I am convinced that you tried to be truthful with the panel," Hamilton said. But he also said he was concerned with a "disparity" between McFarlane's opening statement and the remainder of his testimony.

"To my mind, at least, they are hard, if not impossible, to reconcile," Hamilton said.

## White House aide quits after name crops up

WASHINGTON (AP) — Johnathan S. Miller, director of the White House office of administration, resigned Thursday after a witness at the Iran-Contra hearings testified Miller cashed traveler's checks from Oliver North for distribution to a leader of the Nicaraguan Contra rebels.

White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater said Miller "voluntarily resigned today."

"I don't know why," Fitzwater said. "We've not been informed that he's under investigation."

Efforts to reach Miller by telephone were unsuccessful.

The spokesman said the White House was told Tuesday that information about Miller was to come up in the hearings conducted by a

special Senate-House committee but officials had no information at that time that Miller intended to resign.

"We advised him privately to see a lawyer," Fitzwater said.

Asked whether the resignation had anything to do with Thursday's testimony by Robert Owen, a former State Department consultant, Fitzwater said, "I won't have any comment."

Owen testified that he believed Miller was either on loan to the National Security Council or working out of the State Department when the cash allegedly was transferred to the rebel leader in March 1985.

When asked whether anyone else was present at the time he received the checks from North, Owen said, "Yes... it was an individual by the

name of Johnathan Miller."

Asked whether Miller also cashed checks, Owen said, "It was felt that there were probably too many checks for me to cash in the amount of some traveler's checks."

"I think he may have done three thousand and I did four thousand or we both did thirty-five hundred or three thousand and three thousand," Owen said.

"In any event, Mr. Miller gave you the cash and you then made the appointment to pay the money to the Contra leader?" Owen was asked.

"Yes," he said.

The Contra leader was not named.

North, a Marine Corps lieutenant colonel serving on the National Security Council staff, was fired in November after disclosure that funds from secret sales of arms to Iran had been diverted to aid the Nicaraguan rebels, known as Contras.

Miller worked from 1983 to 1985 in a State Department office that sought to generate public support of time that the administration's Central American policies.

He was a principal contact of International Business Communications—a private group which assisted the administration in that task under a series of State Department contracts.

## Duarte appeal denied

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration, saying it would set a bad precedent, turned down Thursday a request from El Salvador that hundreds of thousands of illegal aliens not be forced to return to that economically deprived country.

Salvadoran President Jose Napoleon Duarte had said his country is unable to absorb the return of large numbers of aliens.

But the State Department, in announcing the decision, said a large-scale exodus of aliens is unlikely because of provisions in recent legislation that permit many such persons to continue living in the

United States.

Department deputy spokeswoman Phyllis Oakley said the administration gave Duarte's request "the most serious consideration" but "we wish to avoid exceptions which others might take as precedents."

Duarte estimates that 400,000 to 600,000 Salvadoran aliens might be forced back to their homeland, aggravating an already serious unemployment problem and housing shortage.

The Salvadoran economy has been plagued for years by civil war and suffered an additional setback last October when the country was hit by a devastating earthquake.

## More accurate initial Hart story could have altered events

Now it turns out that a significant part of what Gary Hart said after he was spied upon by The Miami Herald might have been true, leaving the original story and the press' role as guardian of political morals subject to further skepticism.

It was a risky role for the paper to have assumed in the first place, but since it did, it had a heavy obligation to be thorough and accurate.

Not only did the Herald leave the doors unguarded, it was not aware that its own photographer at the stakeout scene had observed a car belonging to William Broadhurst, Hart's lawyer friend, outside Hart's house on Saturday.

That raised the possibility that Hart and Donna Rice might indeed have gone out Saturday afternoon for a spin with Broadhurst and Lynn Armistead, as Hart has maintained all along.

The paper's original story said that the candidate and Rice disappeared into the house late Friday night and were not seen again until Saturday evening.

The Herald, however, is not backing down. It maintains that the new information, which to its credit it publishes on its own this week, doesn't substantially change anything. Hart and Rice were alone in the house for a sufficient time to call his judgment and discretion into question, according to this

somewhat Victorian approach to the news.

In addition, points out managing editor Pete Weitzel, Hart had taken her on a boat trip to Blimie called her several times and appeared to have altered his schedule to meet her in Washington. In other words, if



the story turned out to have a few holes in it, so what?

That kind of approach to the news won't wash, however, and probably would not even be invoked if the story in question had not created such an uproar.

Editors are not usually so

generous toward the screwing up of a story, except from motives of self-protection. It is in the Herald's interest to minimize its flaws while pointing to Hart's and is no less reluctant than he is to concede the ramifications of its mistakes.

First there was the matter of the back door left unguarded, which did not seem to register as important to the editors the night they rushed the story into print. Now there is the matter of Broadhurst being at the scene when heretofore the Herald clearly did not believe that he was. In the latest admission, it turns

out that a photographer followed the wrong car and did not develop film of activity he had witnessed outside the Hart house that Saturday until five days later.

The photographer had been watching the house through the rear window of his auto when he saw a maroon car pull up, a man get out and return with another man in a white jersey. His view was partly obstructed by passing cars.

By the time he bent down to get his camera and focus it, the car was pulling away. He followed a maroon car to a nearby church, discovering only when he developed the film that there were two similar cars involved and that the other one was leased by Broadhurst.

The party getting into Broadhurst's car could have included Hart and Rice. Weitzel concedes "We don't know." It is also clear by now that the Herald does not know how much time Rice spent in the house.

Weitzel denies it, but it is hard to see how the first-day story could have been written as damagingly as it was if all of what has emerged since were known and published at the time.

In the end, Hart might still have been driven from the campaign, but the point is that we now know how events might have developed if the first story had been more responsible and accurate.

## Miracle lies in quality of American jobs

With 14.4 million new jobs created in the past five years, Americans have been expanding employment faster than any other major industrial nation.

Responding to the incentives of supply-side policy, U.S. citizens have launched a job miracle that amazes the leaders of the planned economies of the world.

But the real jobs miracle in America comes not in the amount of employment but in the dramatic improvement in the quality of American jobs.

Contrary to widespread complaints about a low-wage "McJobs" economy, the new opportunities in the United States are unprecedented in their challenge, remuneration and real productivity.

The rise in the quality of work springs from a transformation of technology. Americans are mastering new technologies and starting new businesses at an unprecedented pace.

They have launched about 14,000 new software companies in six years, transforming the computer from an alien device to a popular appliance. Using nine times more small computers than the Japanese, Americans are revitalizing the job market with the challenging new opportunities of the information age.

The new tools of knowledge are personal technologies, increasingly available to individuals, enabling people to launch new products and ideas from their own homes or garages. There now are cheap workstations on which any individual can learn to design a computer chip, a new toy, a manufacturing plant, a dress or a complex business plan. The new employment in America consists of opportunities that are truly new, reflecting new skills and services rather than the subsidized, retired patchwork of industrial employment provided in the so-called job-creation projects in European social democracies.

Economic analyst Warren Brookes of the Heritage Foundation estimates from the latest Department of Labor data that two-thirds of the additional jobs created in America since the Reagan administration tax cuts in 1981 have been managerial and professional slots paying more than \$29,048 a year. In addition, with new business starts more than doubling since 1978, to 640,000 a year, and with venture capital rising 200-fold over the average level during the high-tax years between 1970 and 1977, millions of Americans have begun earning entrepreneurial

returns rather than wages and salaries. — With rising job opportunities, soaring real estate values and the stock market tripling the worth of individual retirement account and pension holdings, the middle class has reduced debt as a proportion of assets and sharply expanded its share of the national economy. Meanwhile, despite the upsurge in new jobs, the percentage of workers at the minimum wage has dropped 31 percent since 1982, with the downward trend in low-paid jobs accelerating since 1984 as a proportion of the total.

By the only measure that counts — take-home pay — job quality has risen sharply. Real after-tax income per capita is up 11.3 percent since early 1981, and the rise is even greater if you take fringe benefits into account.

Nonetheless, in the ceaseless search for a new proletariat as a vanguard of Marxist revolt, the prophets of envy and gloom continue to tell of a job crisis in America. In Florida falsehoods and lurid television images, media gurus prattle of a "vanishing middle class" and speak of a society riven between "greed at the top" and "need at the bottom and hunger everywhere."

Rep. Richard A. Gephardt, D-Mo., announced his presidential candidacy with a whole series of imaginary complaints, from falling wages to inadequate employment. He says the problem is Japan, which, as anyone knows who drives a car or uses a videocassette recorder, is a major asset for the U.S. economy.

The VCR, in fact, is responsible for an exciting revitalization of the American movie industry and for the emergence of huge new job and entrepreneurial opportunities in videocassette magazines, home movies, education and software far exceeding the VCR manufacturing employment in Japan.

Most of the advocates of a job crisis end their statistics in 1983 to catch the two recessions of the early 1980s and to miss the second-longest recovery of this century.

The Joint Economic Committee of Congress went to the extreme of appealing to Barry Bluestone and Bennett Harrison, a pair of leftist economists from Boston University, to find a new proletariat to save. They came up with the

theory that the jobs were no good. Ignoring that new jobs always tend to pay less than established jobs, they brought forth the shocking news that 55 percent of the new jobs created under President Reagan were below the minimum wage (less than \$7,012 a year).

To conjure up this statistic, Bluestone and Harrison actually didn't count jobs at all; instead, they counted people doing jobs. This was clever because low-paid jobs are held by more people (they have higher turnover) than high-paid jobs. If a McDonald's job was held by four teen-agers during the course of a year, it was counted as four jobs. If a lawyer chose to take off 10 months of a year to have a baby or write a book, the two-month income made the law practice a low-paid job.

The first principle to understand about the quality of work is that it is an effect of the quality of workers. There is no such thing as an "economy" that creates jobs. People create jobs by producing more than they consume, by performing work that is useful to others.

In recent years, the most successful job creators in the United States have been immigrants. Black and Hispanic immigrants are more likely than white natives to earn more than \$25,000 a year. Cuban and Mexican immigrants who don't even know the language quickly out-earn American citizens who prefer leisure and welfare to entry-level jobs.

The entire concept of "bad jobs" is deeply misleading, because it suggests that the "society" can somehow will "good jobs" into existence. Good jobs are the effect of hard work by productive workers and entrepreneurs. All the positive trends in the U.S. economy will gain new momentum from the new tax reform, lowering the top rates and opening new horizons for every wage and salary earner.

With the emergence of such new technologies as superconductivity, artificial intelligence, parallel processing, bioengineering and computerized chip design, job possibilities and entrepreneurial opportunities are more exciting than ever. Nonetheless, no one is going to create a job for you. You have to learn one of these fields — or get into one of the others — and make yourself a creative worker. There is no such thing as an economy; you are the economy.

## Emerging arms accord will improve security in Europe

The emerging arms control agreement between the United States and the Soviet Union on medium-range (INF) and short-range (SRNF) missiles obviously could be improved.

But that does not mean that the formula deserves to be repudiated or requires far-reaching renegotiation. On balance, it will improve security in Europe, while its political disadvantages can be contained.

It would have been better if the administration had not accepted in Reykjavik a formula for zero medium-range missiles in Europe and 100 for each side plus stationed in Soviet Asia and the United States. Either a worldwide zero formula or 100-100 in Europe would have been more desirable. Total zero would have made verification easier and would obviate concern among Asian countries that the United States had accepted 100 Soviet warheads deployed in Asia. The 100 formula for both Western Europe and the Soviet Union would have reassured those Europeans who fear that any reduction in the American nuclear presence in Europe is a step toward "decoupling."

But other wise, the proposed accommodation is acceptable. Primarily, it leaves the United States and NATO in a better posture than otherwise would be the case. The Soviet side will dismantle a considerably larger number of warheads: in medium-range missiles, the respective numbers are 316 for NATO and 1,223 for Moscow, and in short-range systems NATO has none while the Soviet Union has more than 100. Without the agreement, the Soviet side would be likely to

increase its advantage even further.

At the same time, NATO will continue to rely on the five U.S. Poseidon submarines and the 150 F-111 bombers directly assigned to Western Europe's defense, together capable of delivering 850 nuclear warheads to targets within the ranges covered by the U.S. cruise missiles and Pershing IIIs that are to be dismantled. Some of these weapons could also be targeted against areas that could be covered by U.S. short-range missiles if NATO were ever to choose to deploy them.

In the event that the Europeans insist on some nominal deployment by the United States of short-range nuclear weapons on Western European soil, it is essential that the United States not get into the same debate that was generated by the neutron bomb. In other words, if the United States is to accommodate the Europeans, they should come up with both a proposal for the deployment and an explicit advance commitment from the pertinent countries for such deployment on their soil. Otherwise, the Soviets will have a field day in creating additional strains between Europe and America.

The critics claim that the agreement involves a significant step toward decoupling of Western European security from the

United States by creating a gap in the escalatory ladder. This argument is difficult to comprehend, for in the absence of such an agreement the Soviet margin in the intermediate-range and short-range weaponry would be significantly greater. With the agreement in force, the deterrent credibility of the West's capacity to escalate will in fact somewhat improve, given the continued availability of other systems.

Our most significant military concession involves the Pershing IIIs, which cover in a timeurgent fashion hard targets in European Russia; however, these weapons would have had to be employed within the first hours of a conventional war in Europe; otherwise they would be vulnerable to preemptive strikes. In other words, to exploit the military potential of the Pershing IIIs the United States would have had to escalate a conventional war almost immediately to the level of a strategic engagement — a quantum leap not to be undertaken in haste.

Politically, the agreement perhaps could generate broader momentum toward general denuclearization of Western Europe. Quite likely the next Soviet proposal will involve removal of battlefield weapons. Our negotiating strategy must be designed to make this objective impossible for the Soviets to reach.

It is ironic that some of the arguments against the agreement will make such a Soviet initiative more likely and appealing. For instance, it is asserted that battlefield nuclear weapons are more dangerous and

that they, and not INF and short-range systems, ought to be the object of negotiations. Such an argument provides grist for the Soviet propaganda mill and will strengthen the public impact of likely Soviet proposals. As a result, our outcry about decoupling could become a self-fulfilling prophecy.

Anticipating this political danger does not require scuttling the proposed agreement. But it does mean the administration should now propose specific, appealing initiatives regarding both battlefield nuclear weapons and Soviet conventional forces. For example, a proposal to dismantle and destroy 50 percent of all tanks deployed by both sides on the central front could focus public attention on the Soviet tank superiority that poses the greatest threat to European stability. And given NATO's relative strength in anti-tank systems, some reductions in battlefield nuclear weapons could be contemplated if accompanied by a spectacular "bonus" for a major portion of the tank forces of both sides.

The West must hold fast to its INF verification proposals. These are significant for this agreement and critical to any subsequent progress in START. Verification was not central when arms control at best slowed down the arms race and provided for elimination of only a portion of existing arsenals. But with INF and START involving possibly the termination of entire weapon systems, verification becomes critical. More should be made of the fact that

Soviet strategic secrecy is incompatible with strategic stability. Worse, secrecy is not only a threat to security, it fuels the arms race. The Soviets develop and deploy their weapon systems in total secrecy. They give the West little opportunity to respond to strategic weapons decisions taken and put into effect unilaterally. Secrecy thus compounds the hazards associated with weapons of total destruction and means of delivery that leave practically no time for response. Its gradual lifting should become a major focus of the strategic debate and a political target of the West.

The prospective agreement on INF and SRNF is a step forward. But it is neither a strategic nor political breakthrough in U.S. Soviet relations. It should be signed either at a working summit abroad or somewhere outside of Washington or by foreign ministers. A Washington summit would become a festival of feigned friendship, obscuring particularly the dangerous reality of continuing Soviet aggression against Afghanistan. That aggression potentially threatens the stability of Pakistan and Iran and could eventually give the Soviet Union dominance over the Persian Gulf region. A grand summit in Washington should await genuine progress on this key geopolitical issue. If such progress takes place, there would then be something to welcome and celebrate.

# Colonel, Fiji governor general both claim to be in charge

SUVA, Fiji (AP) — The army colonel who led a bloodless coup named a new government Thursday but the governor general, an influential chief who represents Queen Elizabeth II, said he had assumed executive power.

It was unclear who was in charge since Lt. Col. Siliveni Rabuka and about 100 soldiers stormed Parliament on Thursday morning, placing Prime Minister Timoci Bavadra and his entire Cabinet under arrest. The coup against Bavadra's first-independence government was the most in the South Pacific.

Later in the day, Rabuka named a 15-member "council of ministers" he said would govern until a new constitution drafted and called national elections. He designated the former prime minister, Ratu Sir Kamiseva Mara, as foreign minister.

Mara, a 66-year-old hereditary high chief who is staunchly pro-Britain, had led Fiji's government since independence from Britain in 1970.

Bavadra, also a native Fijian, defeated him last month and formed his first Cabinet with an ethnic Indian majority. Ethnic Indians outnumber ethnic Fijians 49 percent to 47 percent in the 300-island archipelago.

A popular tourist area, Fiji has a population of 715,000, Indians, many of whom are descended from indentured laborers brought in to work on British-run sugar plantations in the 19th century, now dominate the island's commerce.

Ethnic Fijians traditionally have controlled the government and army.

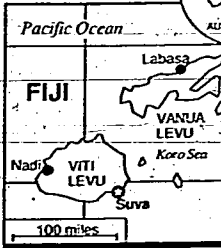
Rabuka, who is 38 and the 2,000-man army's third in command, said he was taking over to stop incidents of racial violence that began after the election last month, which was the fifth since independence.

He claimed to have the army's support. Some reports said his men arrested Col. Jim Sanday, ranked second in the military. The army commander, Brig. Ratu Epeli Nalatakau, was visiting Australia.

Fiji's police force of 1,000 men carried out its duties normally Thursday and appeared not to have been involved.

Several hours after the coup, Gov-

ernor-General Ratu Sir Penaia Ganilau declared a "public emergency" and said he had assumed executive power under the constitution, which was written by the British.

Ganilau, whose office normally has little power, declared in a radio broadcast that he was taking immediate steps to "restore the lawful situation." As governor general, he is the representative of Britain's Queen Elizabeth II, who is Fiji's formal head of state. Fiji is a member of the Commonwealth.

His appeal, believed smuggled to a cassette tape, told Rabuka and his rebel followers to return to their barracks. As governor general, Ganilau is the nation's commander in chief.

The lieutenant colonel responded by ordering the station to stop broadcasting and announcing his "council of ministers," many of whom were members of Mara's Alliance Party and had served in his Cabinet.

Observers were skeptical of the announcement, which was broadcast on national radio. They said there was no evidence that those named had accepted the posts. Mara has not issued a statement.

Rabuka, a decorated veteran of peace-keeping duties in the Middle East, has said Bavadra and his Cabinet will be set free but kept under house arrest until new elections. More than half the Fijian army serves with peacekeeping units in south Lebanon and Egypt's Sinai Peninsula.

Timur Goksel, spokesman for the U.N. peacekeeping force in Lebanon, said Rabuka, an ethnic Fijian, was "known as a strong military commander."

Australia and New Zealand, the region's major powers, condemned the coup.

Prime Minister Bob Hawke of Australia called it a "ragged" and tentative in Fiji to shun the self-proclaimed military leadership.

## Thousands protesting in Korea

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Demonstrations by thousands of students who oppose the government swept the country Thursday and at least 50 people were reported injured in battles between police and students hurling firebombs and rocks.

Students shouted "Down with dictatorship" and burned effigies of President Chun Doo-hwan. Police used armored cars and clubs to break up protests and nearly 3,000 arrests were reported.

News reports said nearly 10,000 students demonstrated at 34 universities and colleges across the country. The Yonhap News Agency and campus sources reported at least 50 injured at four of the campuses, but no figure was available for the number of injuries nationwide.

Public protests have mounted since Chun announced in April-13 that he was stepping down on all-constitutional grounds and that his successor will be chosen under the country's current electoral college system. The opposition has called for direct presidential elections, saying the electoral college system favors the government. Chun, a former general, has said repeatedly he will not seek re-election.

Some students have escalated their protests in the last few days to prepare for the seventh anniversary on Monday of a nine-day armed insurrection in Kwangju in 1980 in which nearly 200 people were killed, according to official count.

South Korea's 120,000 police were put on maximum alert to deal with the anti-government outbursts.

Thursday's most violent clash was reported in Kwangju, 165 miles south of Seoul, where 2,000 students staged running battles with riot police on the Chonnam University campus for more than eight hours.

A 20-year-old student underwent brain surgery after being hit by a tear gas canister. Yonhap said his condition was not immediately known. Thirty people, including 17 policemen, were reported hurt at Chonnam.

Yonhap said a police officer, taken hostage by the students during a morning clash, was rescued about two hours later. The officer, with his hands tied behind his back, was beaten by students.

# Protective hospital isolates cardinal even from papal calls

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Not even Pope John Paul II could get through on the telephone at first when Cardinal John Krol was hospitalized in New Orleans, the cardinal says.

"Krol, who spent three days at the Hotel Dieu undergoing tests after suffering a bout of weakness, said Wednesday he told his secretary to be sure he didn't get any calls. He probably didn't expect the pope to try to reach him."

"I think the hospital said, 'No, he's not to be disturbed,'" the 76-year-old cardinal told a radio station when he arrived in Philadelphia on Wednesday.

"The pope got through the next day and just told me to take care of myself, to ease up a little bit," Krol said.

After the cardinal returned to Philadelphia, he checked into a hospital for further tests, said Marie Kroy, a spokeswoman for the Philadelphia Roman Catholic Archdiocese.

Tests in New Orleans ruled out heart attack or stroke but failed to pinpoint the source of weakness, she said.

The saxophone virtuoso who rose to fame in the 1940s and had a hit in the 1960s with "The Girl from Ipanema" testified that his wife controlled him for his money, forcing him to tour the world constantly to keep her children from a previous marriage in exclusive foreign schools and maintain their estate in Tarztown.

"I'm a jazz musician, not a rock star," he said. "I had to work all the time."

Mrs. Getz, who is contesting the divorce, argued that he was a drug addict who led life in the fast lane, neglecting his family. Her attorney, Abraham Reingold, admits she gave him pills, but contends it was an act of love to stop Getz from drinking.

Getz told the civil court jury that



# Abducted American looks healthy in videotaped message

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Millions of kidnappers released a videotape Thursday of American hostage Alann Steen, and he appeared in good health despite earlier claims by his captors that he was near death.

It was the first communication from any group of kidnappers since April 2, when fellow American hostage Jesse Turner said in a videotaped message that Steen would die in a few days.

"We are very pleased to see that Alann is still alive and that he is still

trying to cope with what has happened to him," Steen's wife Virginia said while viewing the videotape at Beirut University College where she works.

"It was really encouraging to see Alann speaking and talking," said Mrs. Steen, 40.

The videotape contained no clue as to when it was made.

Steen and Turner were kidnapped Jan. 20 along with two other teachers at Beirut University College. Twenty-four foreigners, including eight Americans, are missing after

being kidnapped in Beirut since March 1985.

In the three-minute tape released to the Beirut newspaper 'An-Nahar,' Steen repeated his kidnappers' demand that Israel free 400 Arab prisoners.

The tape, delivered to the newspaper in a white envelope, showed Steen reading a statement in awkward English phrasing that suggested may have been written by his captors.

Steen, 48, of Boston, said members of the Islamic Jihad for the Libera-

tion of Palestine who hold him had saved his life. He also condemned American policy in the Middle East.

Previous communiques from the kidnappers said Steen would soon die, citing high blood pressure and breathing difficulties. But he looked healthy in the tape delivered Thursday.

Wearing spectacles and a black T-shirt, Steen had a light beard and was seated. He only occasionally looked up at the camera.

Before he started reading, the shadow of an unidentified person

could be seen on the wall to Steen's right. But his was the only voice on the tape.

"Once again I show up as a witness who is still alive, a witness that was thrown by American officials with his people into this prison," Steen said. "I know that they wish us a longer absence and a death."

Steen said his captors tried "all possible ways in order to save me because they are Muslims. I don't deserve all this but they have their sacred ideological motives that don't allow them to leave me to

die."

Steen and Turner, 39, of Boise, Idaho, were kidnapped Jan. 24 along with two other professors by gunmen posing as riot police on the campus of the U.S.-affiliated Beirut University College.

The other two are Robert Polhill, 52, of New York City, and Mihleshwar Singh, 60, a native of India and a legal resident alien of the United States.

Islamic Jihad for the Liberation of Palestine has been demanding the release of 400 Arab prisoners.

## S. African crackdown imminent

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Authorities gave activists legal warnings Thursday to end a rent boycott in Soweto, Johannesburg's black township, and ordered two British television correspondents to leave the country.

The nation's largest daily newspaper, the Star of Johannesburg, said it was losing security credentials on news media, unions and universities was imminent.

It said government sources confirmed a decision had been made to issue emergency regulations recently overturned by provincial courts before the nation's highest court hears the government's appeals. The regulations were issued under the emergency state of emergency that was imposed June 12, 1986, because of agitation against apartheid.

No reasons were given for the Home Affairs Department's order that Michael Burk of the British Broadcasting Corp. and Peter Sharp of ITN television news leave the country within 10 days, when their work permits expire.

Unofficial accounts said the deputy information minister, Stoffel van der Merwe, summoned both reporters two weeks ago to defend their reports on clashes between white students and police at the University of Cape Town, and about battles between police and striking black railroad workers at the Johannesburg headquarters of the Congress of South African Trade Unions.

The government said Thursday it would dismantle the news censorship board established in December because reporters have refused to submit stories for review. It also said that, beginning Friday, police rather than the Bureau for Information will give reports on unrest.

Winnie Mandela and other prominent activists in Soweto, where 2.5 million blacks live southwest of Johannesburg, got notices Thursday saying they face legal action unless they pay arrears on rent and utility bills.

Soweto is one of dozens of black townships where most residents protest government race policies by refusing to pay rent and utility bills.

## NATO settles on response to Soviet bid

STAVANGER, Norway (AP) — NATO defense ministers agreed Thursday that the alliance should block any Soviet attempt to abolish nuclear weapons in Europe. U.S. Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger said.

The ministers failed, however, to reach a consensus on whether the United States should accept the latest Soviet offer of adding Europe of medium-range and shorter-range nuclear missiles, he said.

The Reagan administration has indicated its support for the Soviets' "double zero" approach, but some European nations worry it could weaken the alliance's ability to deter an attack.

Under the terms of draft treaties discussed at the Geneva arms talks, the U.S. fleet of British-based F-111 long-range bombers, which can be equipped to carry nuclear arms, would be removed.

The ministers reached no firm conclusions on whether the United States should add certain other nuclear weapons in Europe to offset the proposed removal of middle range Pershing 2 and Tomahawk cruise missiles, Weinberger told reporters.

Earlier, U.S. and European officials who spoke on condition of anonymity said the ministers would discuss the option of adding to the U.S. fleet of long-range bombers in Britain and putting more nuclear missiles on submarines in the European area.

## Bond sale next step on road to building jail

**TWIN FALLS** — Now that the vote is final, the county has \$3.8 million to spend on a jail, right? Well, it isn't that easy.

What the voters authorized Tuesday is the selling of \$3.8 million in bonds, which under state law takes at least a month.

And the process could cost the county \$20,000 in fees paid to financial analysts, legal counsel and bond-marketing consultants, said Bud Way, Idaho First assistant president of public finance.

After the county adopts a bond-sale resolution one month before

selling the bonds, Way, who is the county's bond-marketing consultant, draws up papers outlining the conditions of the sale.

The county can choose to have a rating service determine the financial stability of the county government, Way said. There are several advantages to paying the approximately \$4,000 to have a company rate the financial condition of the county, he said.

A good rating can lower the interest rate the county has to pay on the bonds and draw more companies into the bidding, he said.

After all the legalities of a bond sale are taken care-of, Way said, the county advertises for bids on the

bonds with the marketing effort that will blanket the United States.

State law requires all bids to be at least \$3.8 million, but a variety of factors influence what various banks or investment firms will bid on the bonds, Way said. The bids include a interest rate.

Whichever firm wins the bid buys the bonds and has the option to add the bonds to its investment portfolio or offers them to the public.

Finally, Twin Falls County has its \$3.8 million to spend on the jail. Since the money comes in one lump sum and pays it out in monthly drawdowns, Way said, the county can invest unused money and earn

interest itself.

Twin Falls County Commissioners found a small but welcome mistake while canvassing the votes for Tuesday's \$3.8 million jail bond election — 10 extra yes votes. That gave a total of 4,166 to 1,559, a 73 to 27 percent margin.

## Bonneville restoring plant habitat ruined by road project

**TWIN FALLS** — Pending a consent decree from the U.S. Department of Justice, Bonneville Pacific Corp. of Salt Lake City this week is restoring plant habitat destroyed by road construction several years ago for hydroelectric projects at Pigeon Cove and Cedar Draw.

The work is proceeding in the Snake River canyon north of Filer while the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and Bonneville await Justice Department approval of a decree about how Bonneville is required to make up for the damage.

Bonneville has spent about \$250,000 to remove a rock spill in the river which was created by the blasting at the Pigeon Cove site, says Michelle Stevens, an environmental protection specialist with the EPA in

Boise.

The total for the replanting and other work to repair damage at the two sites will be substantially more than that, says Carl Peterson, a Bonneville senior vice president.

Bonneville is cooperating with EPA and they have hired a qualified consultant to supervise the planting, says Stevens. "They have a willingness to get in there and get it done," she says.

Bonneville plans more hydro projects in the Magic Valley and Peterson says he is aware the company is under scrutiny by federal agencies involved with environmental protection and hydro licensing. Stevens of EPA says this scrutiny has increased since the accidents.

Bonneville wasn't supposed to build the roads in the first place and the blasting was not authorized by the

Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, which licenses hydroelectric projects, says Stevens.

A total of 31 acres of riparian and canyon wall scrubland were disturbed by scoring and deposition of talus at Pigeon Cove, according to a report by Ecosystem Research Institute, the Bonneville consultant.

The consultant estimates restoration at 30.9 acres of the 45.1 acres which contained vegetation before the damage. This means there is a net loss of 14.2 acres at Pigeon Cove, according to the report.

The consultant says it cannot predict how much of the new vegetation will take and the quality of the habitat.

At Cedar Draw, one-half acre of wetlands was lost, according to a letter by Dean Anderson, a Bonneville vice president. Stevens says despite the plantings, the habitat will

never return fully to its original condition. "It means we have lost habitat. These sites are critical islands of wildlife," she says.

Asked about Stevens' comment, Peterson of Bonneville said "the whole plan is approved by all the agencies involved. It is a joint effort. It is a joint effort. It has been our position to work in every way we can to restore the area."

The habitat is important environmentally because it traps sediment, pesticides and herbicides present in irrigation runoff from going into the river, Stevens says. Shade from the vegetation protects the river water temperature important to fishery, she says.

Deer winter in the area, but animals prefer a continuous band of vegetation and once it disappears, they do not return, she says. There is a band of hillsides at Pigeon Cove that is a jumble of rocks and boulders where planting is impossible.

Workers looked like specks on Wednesday as they planted willows, wild roses, rabbit brush and bitterbrush along the sheer hillside beneath the canyon wall at Pigeon Cove.

Some grasses and herbaceous plants have come back on their own, says Cindy Johnson of Ecosystem Research Institute, the consultant hired to supervise the plantings. The work will be done next week, she says.

The problems at Pigeon Cove were discovered in April 1984 by a person who lived near the construction, says John Olson of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in Boise. Olson and Kathy Kunz, environmental protection specialist with EPA in Seattle, joined Stevens in checking the replanting.

The federal Clean Water Act gives the corps authority to regulate streams, rivers and wetlands, says Olson. In addition to problems at Pigeon Cove and Cedar Draw, the corps covered problems with a Bonneville project at the Fell Dam in eastern Idaho near the site of Teton Dam which collapsed.

All three sites had problems caused by the construction of roads, the federal officials said. Technically Bonneville could have been fined \$100,000 per day for unauthorized discharges in boxes of sediment.

"That's why they entered the consent decree. They could have been fined a great deal of money," Stevens says.

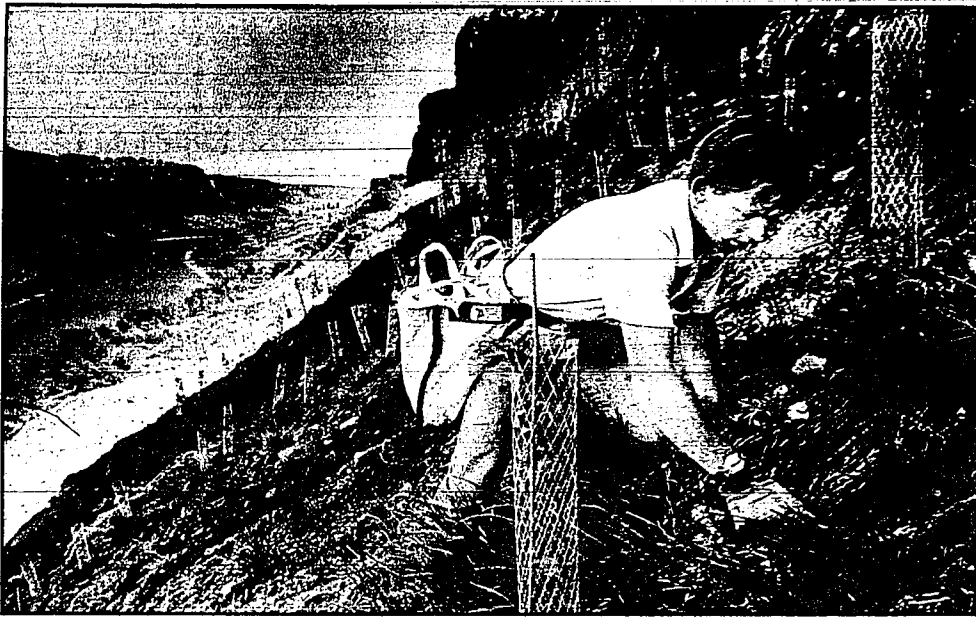
Bonneville's has plans for hydroelectric projects on the Snake at Star Falls near Filer. The project would be a \$45-million project which would set up a 20-foot-high 500-foot long gravity dam on one of the most scenic stretches of the river.

Wayan Johnson, Bonneville's president, says there will be "no construction accident or slip-up at Star Falls." He says the company will have tighter control over the construction than on previous projects.

The subcontractors involved in the Cedar Draw, Pigeon Cove and Fell projects are Summit Construction of Twin Falls and Bingham Engineering of Salt Lake City, Stevens says.

Bonneville also is completing a 1.9 megawatt hydroelectric project at Rock Creek in Twin Falls County and has projects at the lower low-line canal in Hansen, the Dietrich drop and the Lincoln bypass in Richfield, Peterson says. Peterson estimated Bonneville has invested more than \$40 million in hydroelectric projects in the Magic Valley since 1982.

The company which was founded in 1980 has 13 operating facilities in the West and five additional sites under construction, Peterson says. It is one of the largest alternative energy producers in the United States, he says.

## Tests show Cassia students improving

**BURLEY** — Test results for students in Cassia County schools have been improving and most rank above average, Curriculum Director Gene Coltrin told trustees during a board meeting Wednesday night.

"I think we're making a lot of progress with the students in this district," he said. Coltrin released statistics from recent student tests, including scores from the Iowa Test of Basic Skills, the Cassia County Minimum Proficiency Test and the 1987 SDE Writing Assessment Test. Almost 3,500 Cassia County students were given these tests, he said.

Coltrin said that since the district has been placing an emphasis on improving test scores, and also started using its own proficiency test for elementary students, most test scores have been rising. Statistics

show that districts that establish minimum proficiency tests usually also find an increase in standardized test scores, he said.

The district average composite ITBS score for 1,953 second-through seventh-grade students was 59 points, or nine points higher than the national average of 50.

The results showed that second-grade students received the best ITBS scores in the district. With a composite score of 76, second-graders ranked a full 26 points higher than the national average. Third-graders ranked lowest in the district, but were still above the national average, with an average composite score of 52.

The ITBS test includes sections on listening skills, word analysis, vocabulary, reading, language, mathematics and word ability. These tests are graded separately and a composite score is derived from the

total. Coltrin said that the district had been concerned about its average ITBS vocabulary score, which last year was 43, or 7 points below the national average. The district adopted a new reading series last spring, with vocabulary improvement in mind, and this year the average district test score had risen to exactly meet the national average of 50. "I think we're made a gain in that area," he said.

Individualized ITBS student test results were returned to teachers and to the parents of third through seventh-graders within two weeks, he said. District computers were used to tabulate results and complete letters to parents, he said. Second-grade and eighth-grade results were

tabulated by the state, and while the second-grade scores have been well, however, with only 72.55 percent receiving a passing score. The eighth-graders did not perform as well as the second-graders, with only 65.16 percent receiving a passing score. "See TESTS on Page B2."

Coltrin also released an evaluation of ITBS results from Deek Elementary School students, who have had a new computer-assisted teaching program in effect since last fall. Scores for students in grades four, five and six showed a dramatic improvement, while grades three and seven were the same as last year.

Coltrin said he believes there is a some link between the introduction of the computer labs and test score improvement.

The statewide 1987 Writing Assessment Test showed 82.69 percent of Cassia 11th graders passing the test with a score of three or above. ## Charboneau can fire attorney, judge says, but appeal dwindling

**JEROME** — Fifth District Judge Phillip Becker ruled Thursday that attorney Jaimi Charboneau can fire court-appointed attorney Greg Fuller, his fourth defense lawyer on the case.

But the judge warned Charboneau the "clock is running" on his appeal of the death sentence for the execution-style murder of his former wife, Marilyn Arbaugh, on July 1, 1984.

"You're already gone through several lawyers. Your rights have been more protected than the victim's. She didn't have any lawyers," Becker said. "You're out-of-it" until Charboneau informs the court he has changed his mind or the court reappoints him.

Before his unexpected departure from the case, Fuller raised an unsuccessful objection to Becker's rejection of a request for a new trial or a review of the conviction. The case had warranted a retrial because Charboneau's previous attorney,

Golden Bennett of Twin Falls, based his defense strategies on clairvoyance, Fuller claimed.

At the Thursday hearing, Fuller asked Becker to reconsider his ruling after he had received testimony from a hearing in February over the alleged clairvoyance connection.

Fuller said several witnesses he testified that Bennett had discussed the subject of clairvoyance frequently. Bennett even introduced his former investigator as a clairvoyant and was engaged for hours of contacts with the "spirit world."

"This man (Bennett) relied on clairvoyance in the defense of Jaimi Charboneau," Fuller said. "In a brief response, State Deputy Attorney General Peter Erbland, the special prosecutor in the case, said Becker's ruling was well founded."

Bennett had previously denied using clairvoyance, didn't attend the Thursday hearing.

But Becker denied Fuller's request, saying there was no evidence to support the defense's claim. Fuller asked that Charboneau if he wished to keep Fuller as counsel. Charboneau had previously written several letters to him explaining his reasons. "See CHARBONEAU on Page B2."

## Army Corps orders Malad hydro work to stop

**TWIN FALLS** — The Army Corps of Engineers has issued a cease and desist order regarding construction work at a hydroelectric project on the Malad River near Interstate 84, said a corps spokesman on Wednesday.

They were dredging in the river without approval, said John Olson of the corps' Boise office. The 700 kilowatt project is owned by the Vern Ravenscroft family and is just upstream from the Grand Coulee footbridge, Ravenscroft said.

The corps did not get to see what they were going to do before work started, Olson says. Ravenscroft says he doesn't need a permit to remove material from the river.

lended to prevent other construction work at the site from flooding.

The project has been generating electricity since 1984 and is temporarily shut off due to low flow in the river, Ravenscroft says. Workers are using the hiatus to expand the site and correct some design deficiencies, he says.

Ravenscroft estimates 25-30 cubic yards of material had been moved and he calls this a minimal amount. The dam is 20 feet long, five feet high and six feet wide. He says it juts out into the river three feet.

"The corps will inspect the situation and we will take proper action," he says.

Under the Clean Water Act, the corps can include activities involving almost every stream, wetland, lake and pond. The law

specifies that wetlands have inherent values, says Kathy Kunz of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency regional office in Seattle.

Ravenscroft owns a company called Consulting Associates which assists people in developing hydroelectric resources, but he says the flap with the corps has nothing to do with his company.

He says the project includes a number of measures to enhance the environment including increasing the size of off-stream wastewater ponds. Riparian habitat is growing around the ponds and ducks are nesting there and pheasants use the area for escape cover, he says.

Ravenscroft says he has let water into gravel areas near the site providing fishing that wasn't there before.

# Supremacist Pires sentenced for murder and bombings

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Robert Pires, a white supremacist who asked for government protection in exchange for information on white supremacist activities, was sentenced Thursday to a life prison sentence for murder, and a 20-year sentence for his role in bombings that rocked this city last September.

The sentences came two days after a district judge halted sentencing on the first-degree murder count, saying facts surrounding the case did not support the charge.

Prosecutor Phil Robinson in Bonner County, where the murder of Kenneth Shroy occurred in August, said he reworked a factual basis on the charge, allowing 1st District Judge Dar Cogswell to go through with sentencing.

The life sentence will run concurrently with the state sentence on

bombings hunted down Thursday, and a 20-year federal sentence handed down recently on bombings, weapons and counterfeit charges.

Supremacist County Prosecutor Gene Walker, whose jurisdiction includes Coeur d'Alene, said a three-way plea bargain stipulates Pires, 27, must serve at least 10 years before he is eligible for parole.

The bargain was struck with Walker, Robinson and federal prosecutors in Spokane, Wash.

A motion by Walker that Pires be held in the Coeur d'Alene County Jail was granted by 1st District Judge Tim Judd. Walker said Pires will continue to provide authorities with information on Shroy's death, the bombings and other white supremacist activities.

Pires, of Silver Spring, Md., and Shroy, of Ballantyne, were acquainted through their connection to

the Church of Jesus Christ Christian (Aryan Nations), based at Hayden Lake.

Shroy's bullet-ridden body was found Aug. 18 near Clark Fork in Bonner County.

During a trial for two white supremacists on countering charges, Assistant U.S. Attorney David Hines in Spokane told a judge that another white supremacist, David Dorst, may have been the triggerman in Shroy's death.

Dorst, and Edward and Olive Howley all were charged with countering. Prosecutors said they ran a countering operation to finance a white supremacist revolution.

The bombings in Coeur d'Alene were to act as a diversion for a bank robbery, prosecutors said. The robbery never occurred.

# Attorney commits suicide

JEROME — Jerome attorney John J. Hezler, 41, a former Jerome County public defender and deputy prosecutor, died Wednesday of a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

Jerome County Coroner Gerald Ostler said Hezler probably died somewhere around 4 p.m. Wednesday but the death was not discovered until just after 9 p.m.

An irrigator who was checking water in a field notified officers after seeing the body near the parked pickup of Hezler at 1124 N. Hall. Hezler drove his pickup to a narrow dirt roadway about three miles north of the junction of U.S. Highway 93 and State Highway 25 in Jerome.

Hezler had walked 100 to 150 feet from the vehicle where he shot himself with a .44 Magnum pistol, Hall said. Ostler said Hezler died instantly.

Hall said Hezler's wife reported he had been depressed recently. Hezler was described by friends as an avid outdoorsman who moved to

Idaho to take advantage of outdoor recreation.

Hezler, a thurstonian, former Jerome County prosecutor, said Hezler was a hunting enthusiast, an outstanding marksman and enjoyed water recreation.

He said Hezler had a very loyal group of clients who appreciated his talents and assistance.

"I believe the entire legal community of Jerome feels the loss. He was a fine individual," Adamson said.

James Meseray, a Jerome attorney, agreed that Hezler will be greatly missed in Jerome.

"Anything like this is always tragic, but John was active in the community and deeply concerned about Jerome. He worked hard on the economic development effort and things like the maple tree project," Meseray said.

# Support for bird farm leasing urged

WEENEDELL — Fewer pheasants to hunt has hurt the tourist economy of Gooding County and its surrounding area, says Wee Gates of the Magic Valley Hospitality Association and Idaho Game Birds, Inc.

Gates urged members of the Wendell Chamber of Commerce Wednesday to support the IGB in an effort to lease the state game bird farm near town.

The IGB, he said, will meet tonight at 7 p.m. in the Jerome High School cafeteria to total up funds and decide if leasing the farm is possible.

The Idaho State Fish and Game Department does not want to raise pheasants anymore at the bird farm, started in 1932, Gates said.

"The Fish and Game would like the farm to stay open, but does not want to be in the bird production business," he said.

The IGB needs \$3,200 to take over management of the game bird farm and another \$5,000 to purchase all the stock for this year, Gates said. The minimal amount needed by the meeting today is \$12,500, and if that goal is not met, he said, "We will have a check-burning party."

Gates said the farm can be run at a profit, and more importantly, can produce pheasants for this area to make it, once again, "the pheasant capital of the world."

He said that, based on state figures, upland game bird hunting in Idaho in the 1983 season generated \$58 million. In 1985 the estimated amount of money generated was only \$11 million. These figures, he said, are based on licensing fees and the average amount of money spent daily (about \$120 per hunter).

# ACLU investigates Ashton high school

ASHTON (AP) — The American Civil Liberties Union has launched an investigation into alleged discrimination at North Fremont High School at Ashton, according to the ACLU and a member of the school district.

Stephen Pevar, ACLU regional counsel, said he is investigating four allegations of discrimination against females at the school involving student programs or courses and the

dismissal of a tenured teacher. He declined to identify the actual complainants.

Pevar said he was contacted the latter part of April about the alleged discriminatory conduct on the part of the district.

The charges included a claim that girls were being discriminated against in athletics because of the limited number of sports available to them, that the girls' drill team

was not receiving adequate administrative support, and that the home economics program was eliminated and home economics teacher and drill team advisor Shirley Robinson, a tenured teacher, was laid off.

Pevar said the ACLU was trying to determine if "there are any improprieties in the manner in which home economics has been discontinued."

 state average percentage of 82.34 was over 10 percent higher than Cassia's average.

Last April the state Board of Education met to discuss the coverage to include passing the 11th grade Writing Assessment Test as an acceptable option to meet high school graduation requirements, or to allow students who are having difficulty meeting the C-average rule now know whether or not the writing test will help them graduate.

"If a student who didn't have a C-average didn't pass this, he's in a little hotter water than he was before," Coltrin said.

Of the 13 percent of elementary students who took the Cassia County Minimum Proficiency Test when it was first given, results from retakes showed that students in the

first, second and third grades usually passed the CMPT test the second time around. Fourth, fifth and sixth graders were least successful in passing the test, with only 34 percent of sixth graders passing the test.

He said that students who fail the test both times will have the option of attending a "special" summer school program so they can continue on to the next grade level.

Superintendent Norman Hurst praised Coltrin for his efforts in analyzing and quickly obtaining the student test scores. Tabulating the scores in the district office has dramatically decreased the time it takes to obtain results from a few months to only two weeks, he said. Scores returned while the teachers are still in school, and not out on a summer break, make the testing program more meaningful to

everyone, he said.

In other business:  
 A district policy was approved changing the summer agriculture program from 12 to 10 weeks. The state will pay only one week of the program, but trustees agreed to pay for an additional two weeks of the program because they don't want to see "any further reduction" in the program.

## Mosaic depicting freed slaves may be altered by city residents

EDWARDSVILLE, Ill. (AP) — A mosaic in front of City Hall, depicting a freed slave smiling and standing with emancipated slaves, should be changed to be more dignified, according to a committee studying the artwork.

This is supposed to be a freed black, but he still has that stereotypical Southern kind of image," said Shirley Carlson, a member of the committee of the Edwardsville Elman Relations Commission.

The 38-by-48-foot mosaic shows white pre-Civil War settlers in covered wagons and the freed slave, with a broken rope hanging from his wrists, celebrating his freedom from slavery.

"The whites are either shown migrating to Edwardsville or going to church or to school, rather than just standing there," said Carlson, who is black.

"In a situation where everybody else is looking serious and he's smiling, it looks very undignified," she said Wednesday.

The committee, consisting of five citizens and one commission member, was formed last month to make recommendations to the full commission on how to alter the mosaic.

Carlson, a history professor at Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville, said the committee had decided to recommend that the black figure be changed to a farmer holding a hoe on one shoulder and a plow on the other.

"He's a smiling mouth more assertive than the figure presently looks — who doesn't have the grin that we found offensive," she said. "He's going to have a somber look, a placid look, a more serious look."

The change would cost about \$1,000 and will be collected from private donations, Carlson said.

Committee members have until mid-June to submit their recommendation to the commission, which in turn will make its recommendation to the City Council.

The mosaic, constructed in the mid-1960s, was designed to portray the pre-Civil War history of this Southern Illinois city. Of Edwardsville's 12,000 citizens, about 840 are black, Carlson said.

The mosaic shows white families on covered wagons entering the city, white pioneers approaching a church, a city founder's log cabin, an Indian smoking a peace pipe and the lone black man, the only person who's smiling.

Tim Earley, a member of the Human Relations Commission who supports changing the mosaic, agreed that it is demeaning to blacks.

"The first time I saw that was years ago, I said, 'Gee-whiz, how can that be on front of City Hall?'" But not being a black person, it didn't stick with me.

Edward Kane Sr., who designed the mosaic, has maintained his work was an accurate portrayal of city history. He was out of his office Wednesday and could not be reached for comment.

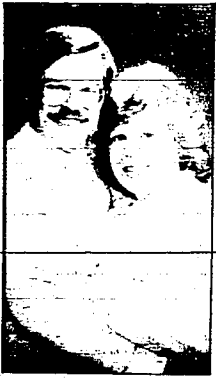

## Ignore myths about ulcers

WEST POINT, Pa. (AP) — Myths about ulcers can lead people to avoid seeing doctors and instead to diagnose and treat themselves, sometimes delaying needed medical help, according to Marsh Sharp & Deane Research Laboratories.

The firm, developer of Pepcid, a new drug approved to treat the most common form of ulcers, says it's a myth some people have "ulcer personalities." In fact, all kinds of people get ulcers. And, while it was once widely believed that mostly men get ulcers, in the 1980s, women in about equal numbers get them, too.

Further, the company held no firm, ulcer funds cause ulcers has never been scientifically proved. And, though many people think milk and bland foods are good for ulcers, while they may ease ulcer pain temporarily, they can also stimulate production of excess stomach acid.

Also, it's not necessarily true that when pain is gone, an ulcer is healed. Treatment may ease pain in days, but ulcer healing usually takes four to eight weeks.

# Bonneville County board approves halting development along river

IDAHO-FALLS (AP) — The Bonneville County Planning and Zoning Commission has approved a proposal that would halt development for 18 months along 15 miles of the Snake River between Granite Creek and Spring Creek.

The commission had considered a draft ordinance that would have halted all development in the county along the Snake River, but amended it Wednesday.

Members also agreed that farmers who own property should be able to build sheds and corrals while the moratorium is in effect.

Residential development would be prohibited, however, until the county can approve a comprehensive plan or zoning ordinance to deal with growth on the river.

The amended draft ordinance, passed by an 8-1 vote, now goes to the Bonneville County Board of Commissioners, which will hold public hearings before deciding on the ordinance.

Testimony at public hearings held April 29 and May 6 ran heavily against a moratorium, a sentiment echoed by some members of the planning and zoning commission.

"I personally don't see how we would dare pass this moratorium," said Dell Robertson.

"I think we stepped down the road a little further than we intended to," said Larry Jacobs.

The moratorium's proponents say a development ban is needed along the river, especially between Fall Creek and the Heise gauging station.

Without it, they say, nesting bald eagles and waterfowl would be threatened, and winter wildlife habitat would be disrupted.

Development would also jeopardize flood control and produce stream bank erosion, said Steve Elle, fisheries manager for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game's Region 6.

Commission member Dan Traugher said he felt the commission hadn't been presented enough solid data on the development issue.

# Plan to attack computer troubles being formulated

BOISE (AP) — A plan of attack is expected to be in place by the end of next week to correct problems that have plagued the Health and Welfare Department's computer system that processes welfare benefits, said Stephen Weeg, who coordinates the system.

Officials from Systemhouse, Inc., Arlington, Va., arrived in Boise Tuesday to help sort out the problems that have delayed benefits to thousands of Idahoans. The company put together much of the \$3.2 million EPICS computer system.

Weeg said Thursday department officials have spent the last several days briefing Systemhouse representatives on the problems encountered with the system.

The state will ask the company to provide several computer programmers to work with the system during the summer, he said.

He said he had no estimate of when problems with the system would be entirely corrected.

to pinpoint." The system launched in November was supposed to provide state-of-the-art ability to determine welfare benefits and issue benefit checks to the 30,000 Idaho families receiving welfare payments each month. But it was riddled with problems from the onset.

All but 3 percent to 5 percent of benefits are going out on time now, he said. But that includes 15 percent of benefits being processed manually, Weeg said.

He said the ideal timetable would be to reduce the number of benefits assigned manually to 3 percent by the end of the summer, and 1 percent by the end of the year.

# Otter says state drought may have bright side in higher farm prices

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Lt. Gov. Butch Otter says the drought plaguing Idaho agriculture could have a bright side because crops that do emerge would bring prices higher than normal.

"It will give a fair return for those who can farm," said Otter, speaking Wednesday to the Idaho Mortgage Bankers Association.

Idaho has been bogged down for years by overproduction, which has lowered the price of some agriculture products, but Otter said the trend is reversing in at least two areas — hay and livestock.

"If you don't have a mortgage on hay, you had better get some, because the price is going up," Otter said. "Two weeks ago, you could have bought all the hay you wanted for \$32, and now you can't touch it for less than \$45 a ton."

A second cutting of hay in the Magic Valley may not be forthcoming, but Otter said that would increase the price of hay that is available.

"In every problem, there's an opportunity," he said. By producing less beef than the market demands, those in the livestock industry have seen prices increase dramatically.

"In March of 1985, if you had told those people having to take 49.5 cents a pound for beef on the hoof that they'd be getting 72.5 cents a pound live, they would have said you were crazy," Otter said.

However, wheat production in Idaho is expected to be at its lowest point this year since the drought of 1977. But overproduction nationally is expected to further depress wheat prices.

"Other said there are signs that Idaho's economy is turning around. The timber industry is beginning to put people back to work, he said.

Unemployed in Idaho in April reached its lowest point, 5.9 percent, in six years, due in part to the timber industry being able to work through the mild winter. But modernization has permanently eliminated many timber jobs.

State forecasters predict that timber employment will remain at approximately last year's level of just over 13,000, which was down a thousand from 1984, and down almost 6,000 from its peak in 1978.

Works in the timber industry also have taken huge wage and benefit concessions in recent years.

Otter said an increase in silver prices to about \$8 an ounce has given new hope for 6,000 miners waiting to return to work in northern Idaho.

"It was below \$5 before the legislative session, so there has been about a 50 percent increase since then," he said.

# Survey finds low use of belts

BOISE (AP) — An Idaho Department of Transportation survey indicates up to three out of every four Idahoans are not obeying a state law requiring the use of seat belts in motor vehicles.

Results of a statewide survey of 1,200 Idahoans in April showed:

- 24.8 percent said they buckled up every time they got into a vehicle.
- 20.9 percent said they used seat belts almost every time.
- 16.7 percent said seat belts were a half habit the time.
- 37.7 percent said they used seat belts less than half the time, almost never or never.

More than 12 percent were unaware that Idaho had a law requiring use of seat belts. The law went into effect in July, 1986.

Tina Kircher, traffic safety specialist for the Transportation Department, said the results of the survey are surprising. "We thought we would have a better use rate," she said.

She said Utah, Nevada, Washington, Arizona and Oregon all have higher seat-belt use rates, with about half of Washington's motorists reporting they use seat belts all the time.

"It's a hard sell" in Idaho, Ms. Kircher said. "We want people to know that they are at a higher risk by not wearing seat belts."

# Craig opposes any form of ATV regulation

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. Rep. Larry Craig says any attempt to ban, recall or regulate all-terrain vehicles could only be construed as improper government intervention.

"What is needed are standards to provide safety information and training for the riders," Craig on Tuesday told the House Subcommittee on Commerce, Consumer Protection and Competitiveness.

The subcommittee is considering reauthorization of the Consumer Product Safety Commission, which has proposed optional recalls, mandatory training and Justice Department action regarding all-terrain vehicles.

Craig said regulation only would be proper if justifiable evidence is presented that controls are needed, and he said such evidence is lacking.

During the past two years in Idaho, at least four Idaho three-wheeler riders have died and dozens have been injured.

Craig said a report by the Government Accounting Office discredits the safety commission's contention that all-terrain vehicles pose a greater consumer hazard than other recreational vehicles, such as minibikes and snowmobiles.

"We cannot protect people from themselves," he said.

# A runner's injury, stress fracture, taking toll in NBA

BOSTON — Michael Jordan was earth-bound for an extended period last season. Bill Cartwright was lost to the New York Knicks for almost a year and now has a screw in his foot.  
Andrew Toney was basically useless to the Philadelphia 76ers this year. And Portland's bristled-legged Sam Bowie fell victim once again.

And now the Boston Celtics are trying to cope with injuries to both Bill Walton and Kevin McHale.

Stress fracture. It has become the injury of the '80s in the National Basketball Association.

"We think at least 30 percent of the players in the NBA have either had a stress fracture of the tibia or foot while in the pros or in college," said Norman Scott, the New York Knicks' team physician.

"And we think that is a conservative estimate."  
A stress fracture is an incomplete or hairline break of an extremely bone that often does not show up on a normal X-ray. The length of time required for healing differs, but usually the only effective long-term treatment is rest.

Stress fractures were common in the military when they were known as "marching fractures." Long-distance runners also have had a relatively high incidence of stress fractures.

It is impossible to know if stress fractures are increasing in the NBA because, until recent technological advances such as bone scans and CAT scans, stress fractures often were diagnosed as sprains, strains or other ligament, tendon and muscular injuries.

"I think that's a fair statement," said Thomas Silva, the Celtics' team physician.

Nonetheless, the problem has become acute enough and affected so many big-name players that the NBA is spending \$30,000 to help sponsor a study of why stress frac-

tures occur and perhaps even how to prevent them.

Researchers at the Penn State University Center for Locomotion Study are collecting information on the variables involved in stress fractures, from the physical demands on an NBA player, to training techniques and body types, right on down to the brand of basketball shoes players wear and the surfaces on which they play.

It is believed to be the first study of stress fractures.

So one knows why stress fractures occur, Scott said, because it appears they can be caused by any number of things.

For example, Walton, whom Silva called "the granddaddy of stress fractures," has had several stress fractures believed to be caused by a foot anomaly.

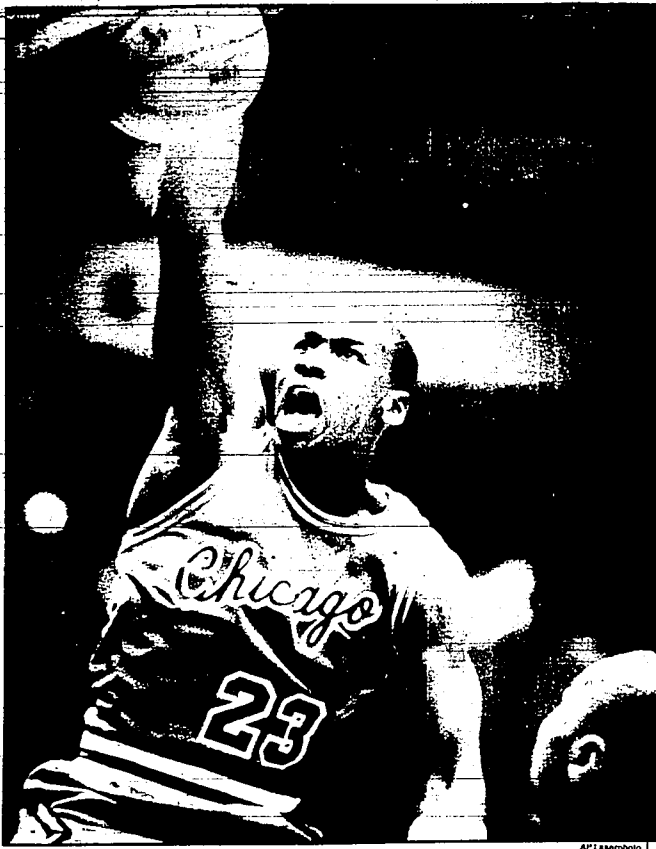
Bowie, who has had stress fractures of both tibiae, or shin bones, is believed to have a particular physical weakness in that area.

Celtics guard Jerry Sichting had a stress fracture of the third metatarsal bone in his right foot last season (1984-85) with the Indiana Pacers. It was caused, he said, when an injury to his left knee forced him to overcompensate with his right leg.

Scott said that stress fractures may be caused to a large degree by "excessive force applied to one area."

The Penn State study is using high-speed cameras and sensors to determine "hot spots" where pressure from running and jumping is excessive.

The solution might be as simple

as a new basketball shoe design or as complicated as custom-designed shoes for every player. Or the mystery may never be fully explained.

"It's too early to tell," Scott said.

Walton has had foot problems dating to high school. He has mis-

sed almost all of this season with a problem in his right foot, and last week it was determined that he was suffering from a stress fracture of the navicular bone in that foot.

The NBA study is too late to help Walton. He will miss the remainder of this series against the

Milwaukee Bucks, which the Celtics could wrap up Wednesday night.

"I've been studying them (stress fractures) for a long time, trying to figure out what causes them and how not to get them," Walton said.

# Red-hot Buhl eyes state at B district

MORELAND — In this, the inaugural season of the program, the balls have been flying off the Buhl Indians' bats.

And that's why they're coming in to the District 4-5-6 Class B high school baseball tournament with confidence despite the close field they'll be in today.

## Prep baseball

Four teams, including Buhl, will fight it out in the two-day tourney at Snake River High School for the right to advance to the state tournament, also in Moreland — South Fremont (11-5), Shelley (11-4) and the host team, Snake River (8-6). The Snake River Panthers have already gained a berth into the state tourney since they are the best team, so, actually, it'll be the other three teams battling for two spots.

Today's games will feature Shelley and South Fremont hooking up at 3 p.m., with Buhl facing Snake River, a team the Indians have beaten twice this season, at 5:30 p.m. The championship game will be played at noon Saturday with the consolation game preceding it at 9:30 a.m.

For Buhl, Coach Joe Shepard, whose ballclub has won eight of its last nine games, the tight field isn't bothersome. Having beaten Shelley 4-3 earlier this season, twice defeating Snake River and knowing the Panthers split with South Fremont, Buhl considers itself the favorite.

"I think our chances are pretty good," said Shepard. "We have a solid pitching staff and we've been hitting the ball pretty good lately. In fact, if we can just keep hitting the ball like we have been, we'll do real well. We won't be sneaking up on any teams this year."

The Indian charge is led by center fielder Derrick Brinkman, hitting a blazing .472 while catcher Kelly Atkinson (.442 with 22 RBIs) and leftfielder Shane Wiggins (.428) have also sent several pitchers to the

showers early.

Walton has tried everything — surgery, arch supports, modified shoes, different conditioning techniques. All to little or no avail.

"You never know when they're going to come," Walton said.

He has a simple but perhaps accurate theory as to what causes stress fractures — "playing basketball."

Silva still holds out hope that Walton will be able to play in the conference finals — if they get past the Bucks, as it seems they will — or by the time Boston gets to the NBA finals, if it does.

Walton does not sound as optimistic.

"I'm having trouble walking on it right now," he said.

Although surgery seems to have solved Walton's left foot problems, Silva said that no surgery was being contemplated for the right foot.

Meliga has been playing with a stress fracture of his right navicular bone for perhaps as long as two months. It was not diagnosed as a stress fracture until a week ago.

## Business inventories edge up in March but keep growing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Business inventories edged upward in March for the third consecutive month, and economists said sales will have to pick up soon to justify the growth in unsold stock.

The Commerce Department said Thursday that inventories rose by 0.4 percent in March, to a seasonally adjusted \$662.8 billion. The March figure followed increases of 0.2 percent in February and 1 percent in January.

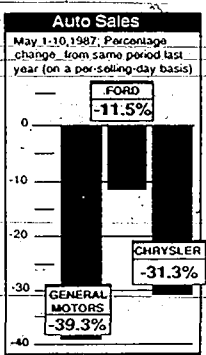
Business sales were up 0.8 percent in March, to \$446.7 billion, outpacing the inventory build-up.

But economists pointed to the three-month trend in saying that inventories are continuing to accumulate.

"By and large, the March figures represent the heavy inventory rebuilding that went on in the first quarter," said Allen Scharn, chief economist for Sherrill Lehman Brothers in New York.

"Provided that sales come on stream in the second quarter, the business sector is in a reasonably good shape," Scharn said. "If sales in the second quarter do not come on to justify the very large inventory build-up, then the American economy will have a very big problem on its hands."

"The inventory numbers show a continued build-up that cannot be sustained by the weak demand we've seen recently in the retail and auto sales numbers," added Jerry



Jasinski, chief economist for the National Association of Manufacturers.

The inventories report came the day after the Commerce Department reported that retail sales in April were up only 0.1 percent, to \$125.38 billion, with much of the increase reflecting higher prices for food and gasoline rather than more

buying.

Auto sales were down 0.9 percent from March levels, while sales of furniture and home furnishings were down 1.1 percent.

The new report noted that automobile dealer inventories were up 2.8 percent in March, to \$53.2 billion, and were 7.3 percent above March 1986 levels. Total retail trade inventories were up by 1.7 percent, to \$193.7 billion.

Scharn noted that the March inventory build-up was "especially pronounced in retail and autos, where for sure the inventory building was unwanted."

Manufacturers' inventories showed a slight decline in March, but other categories were up.

The 0.8 percent business sales increase was led by sales of durable goods, those expected to last three years or more, which were up 1.2 percent from February.

Within the durable goods category, retailers showed the sharpest gain, up 2.1 percent, led by manufacturers' sales, up 1.2 percent. Wholesalers' sales of durable goods were virtually unchanged, and total sales of non-durable goods also showed little movement.

The changes in sales and inventories left the inventory-to-sales ratio at 1.48 for the month, down 0.01 from February. That means it would take 1.48 months to deplete existing inventories at the March sales pace.

## Senate OK's thrift bailout but leaves it on banking bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate on Thursday passed legislation to pump \$7.5 billion into the beleaguered Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corp., the thrift industry's deposit insurance fund, but refused to remove the bailout from a comprehensive banking bill.

The Senate approved the measure, an exact copy of one passed in March, by voice vote after rejecting, 62-37, an effort by Sen. Jake Garn, R-Utah, to strip the two-year aid bill of everything but the FSILC recapitalization.

On May 5, the House passed a two-year, \$5 billion FSILC proposal with no frills attached. The action came after the chamber rejected a five-year, \$15 billion measure supported by the Reagan administration and House Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas, and Rep. Ferdinand J. St. Germain, D-R.I., chairman of the Banking Committee.

Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., chairman of the Senate Banking Committee and chief sponsor of the bill, said the comprehensive measure containing several controversial provisions would not impede the rescue of FSILC, which the congressional General Accounting Office has said is insolvent.

"We're going to have to have a conference with the House," he said during the debate. "By adopting this bill we're not delaying this at all."

Garn, however, felt otherwise, saying "I feel very strongly we should not encumber recapitalization of FSILC with any other provisions."

The Utah senator, who was the Banking Committee chairman until the December 1986 election of the Senate this year, decried the House's \$5 billion bill, saying it would not even cover the fund's \$6 billion deficit.

He also said the House would not accept the broader Senate version, which contains provisions curbing new limited-service banks and a temporary

ban on new authority for banks-to-engage-in securities, real estate and insurance activities.

Proxmire's major goal is to close the so-called "non-bank bank" loophole, which allows limited-service banks to escape regulations faced by traditional banks. Non-bank banks either take deposits or make commercial loans, but do not do both.

As a result, a long and difficult conference is expected on the FSILC legislation, despite White House warnings that fast action is needed to rescue the \$5.1 insurance fund from imminent default.

"We should waste time sending a controversial package back to the House," Garn argued in the debate. "We know they will reject it."

Proxmire said, "Once we get to conference I am sure we can work out an accommodation rather quickly, even in a day."

House rules and general parliamentary procedures may make it difficult to get the two different versions of the FSILC bailout before a joint House-Senate conference to iron out the differences in the two bills.

One House Banking Committee aide, who asked not to be identified, said he did not think the conference could be convened until after the congressional Memorial Day recess, May 22-26.

In a statement released Thursday, the Office of Management and Budget urged Congress to recapitalize FSILC with \$15 billion over five years.

OMB said the administration's proposal would result in a responsible level of funding that will allow the insurance fund to protect depositors and avoid the risk of a budget-busting bailout.

"Insufficient funding now will increase the ultimate cost of dealing with insolvent savings and loan institutions," the statement said.

## Depositors sue over missing silver

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — A class-action suit has been filed in U.S. District Court here against the owner of a Spokane depository where officials have searched in vain for silver bullion that investors believed was stored there.

National Safe Depository Corp. sold the metal and agreed to store it, giving investors certificates detailing their holdings, said Spokane County resident Diane J. O'Neill in her suit. She said she bought 348.18 ounces of silver in 1981, resold the metal to the firm on March 13 and has not received the \$1,912 she said was owed.

Spokane County sheriff's Detective Jim Finke said law enforcement

officers found no bullion at the depository after serving a search warrant last week. State Securities Division officials said at least \$300,000 worth of bullion, and probably more, should have been on hand.

Depository owner Steve Baldwin has not been available since the warrants were executed to explain the discrepancy. He has an unpublished telephone number in Spokane.

The class action suit filed Tuesday seeks \$2.6 million in damages for investors and \$10 million in punitive damages, claiming that defendants Baldwin, National Safe Depository and an affiliated firm known as

American Metals Exchange Inc. were guilty of fraudulent and malicious conduct.

Spokane attorney Walter Berhalter filed the suit and said the damage figure was derived by figuring that more than \$200,000 in tax obligations owed by National Safe Depository and affiliated companies represented the sales tax on precious-metal sales.

The tax obligations were owed when the state Department of Revenue closed National Safe Depository on April 15 for non-payment of taxes.

## Bank merger wins approval

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — Old National Bancorporation stockholders have approved a merger with U.S. Bancorp of Portland, Ore., that will pay them \$46 for each share of ONBC common stock.

The deal announced in December and completed in January, will create the Northwest's largest banking institution, with assets of \$11 billion.

Chairman David Clark told a sparsely attended special shareholders' meeting Tuesday that 2,899,368 shares were voted in favor of the merger, with 14,932 against. There are 3.9 million ONBC common shares outstanding.

Shareholders should receive payment for their shares within 60 days, following Federal Reserve Board ap-

proval and Justice Department approval, said ONBC president D. Michael Jones.

Washington will allow interstate banking beginning July 1.

West's defense against today's game is left much to be desired. Put yourself in his shoes and see if you can come up with the winning play. South ruffs the second diamond and draws trumps in two rounds, ending in dummy. Dummy's heart jack is led, East plays the four and South the eight. What should West play after he wins the king?

The answer to this puzzle depends upon South's heart holding. If he has four hearts, he will enjoy only one club discard from dummy and will be forced to play the club suit himself. And if South holds K-x-x in clubs, West dare not cash his club ace. How does West avoid guessing at trick six?

The answer is that he should wait until trick seven or eight before winning his heart king. When West ducks the first heart, South must repeat the play, and all becomes clear. East's discard reveals the distribution and West knows it's now or never in clubs. He cashes his ace and leads to East's king, and instead of stealing a game, South is forced to concede one down.

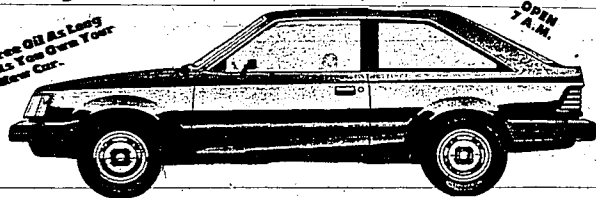

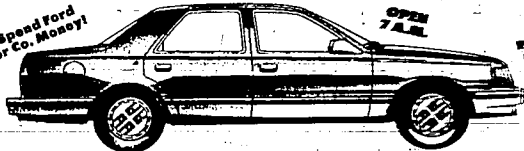

## Women in arts: Museum concept born in disbelief

WASHINGTON (AP) — Wilhelmina Cole Holladay recently described the effort to bring her concept of a women's museum to fruition like a confident pugilist recalling the path to the championship title.

"I haven't found anything difficult," said the philanthropist and president of the National Museum for Women in the Arts. "It's been a wonderful challenge."

The museum, dedicated to the contributions women have made to the arts, opened April 7 with assets of \$17 million, a six-story renaissance revival building, a growing membership roll of 66,000 and a woman with business acumen at its helm.

The concept of a women's museum, though, was born in disbelief. Mrs. Holladay, and her husband, Wallace, were traveling in Europe in the early 1960s when they discovered the works of 17th century Flemish artist Clara Peeters at Austria's National Museum and Spain's Prado Museum. Upon returning to the United States, the two combed through standard art reference books for some information about Peeters, and were surprised to find no mention of her or any other women artists.

The two began collecting the works of women artists, accumulating paintings and sculptures by 100 women. Docents — special museum guides — gave tours through the couple's exclusive home on the edge of Georgetown to see the works.

In 1981, the Holladays considered donating their extensive collection to another museum or gallery, but instead decided on a new museum.

With a disbursement of \$1.5 million from an anonymous donor, the museum purchased a building designed in 1907 by Waddy Wood as a Masonic Temple and recently used for Kung Fu movies. The building has a \$6 million mortgage and a new look.

Fund-raising campaigns helped pay for the building's restoration, and corporate sponsors were recruited. Martin Marietta donated \$1.5 million and the Great Hall, built with its tricolor marble and cut-crystal chandeliers, was named in the company's honor.

A United Technologies grant of \$500,000 financed the inaugural exhibition, "American Women Artists 1830-1930," and the reading room is named for AT&T.

The fund-raising efforts we've done have been aided by the fact that we have a national constituency," said Anne-Imelda Radice, the museum's director who served as curator to the Capitol's architect in five years.

However, the museum's doors hadn't officially opened before feminists and art historians leveled charges against the concept and its collection. Feminists complained

about the museum's collection, which they said is not feminist in time.

Art historians called the collection uneven and noted that the museum may emphasize mediocre female artists.

Mrs. Radice laughs at the comment and notes there are plenty of men's museums around. "We're off to a good start," she said. "We have a fine core collection. The Holladay family donated about 300 works of art and the remainder has been donated by other individuals, so we're attracting other works."

Eleanor Tufts, a professor at Southern Methodist University and guest curator of the inaugural exhibition, said the museum has moved female artists out of the basement and into the gallery.

"I've been going for 20 years to museums all over the world, finding works of women artists, and now they're here in one museum," said Mrs. Tufts, who recalled a trip to London's National Gallery in an album office. "I've told her works of the female artists for which she was looking could be found downstairs."

"Unfortunately, for whatever reason, there has been less than 1 percent of all works in museums that are done by women," Mrs. Holladay said.

The inaugural exhibition includes the works of two of the most famous women artists, Georgia O'Keeffe and Mary Cassatt. It also spotlights the works of lesser-known artists, who capture examples of an early feminism, humor and maternal figures.

Alice Barber Stephens, a former student of Thomas Eakins, depicts an all-woman art class during a female nude — a rare occurrence in the late 19th century — in her 1859 "Female Life Class."

In Lily Martin Spencer's 1866 oil painting, "Wax Spill at Home," a young mother reads the front page of the New York Times while cradling her infant. Her other children celebrate Grant's victory at Vicksburg on July 4, 1863.

In Spencer's other painting, "The Year's End," Mrs. Washington completed in 1864, a young man angrily struggles with a spilling food basket, grabbing a chicken covered by broken eggs, a head of lettuce and tomatoes as it falls to the ground.

Cecilia Beaux's 1872-73 painting of her sister Anne Ernesta shows a young woman leaning back in a chair with her son resting contently against her chest. She gazes off at him with an expression of motherly love.

Mrs. Holladay has insisted on the belief that her branch will bring recognition to women artists.

"Our hope is that through exhibitions, concerts, programming, publishing and our advanced study center, we can establish women artists and make them well known so they will be collected," she said.

SUN VALLEY — The art of creating a sparkling jewel from rough stone will be demonstrated by a number of the best factors in the Northwest and the nation May 23 and 24 in Sun Valley.

The Northwest Faceters Conference, the first show and workshop sessions sponsored by the newly organized Intermountain Faceters Guild. The guild is made up of men and women gem factors from northern, Utah and southern and eastern Idaho.

The faceters conference has attracted exhibits from Oregon,

Washington, and as far away as Pennsylvania, say committee members Norma and James Berkley of Twin Falls. The show and demonstrations are open to the public at a \$1 admission charge. It will be held Saturday and Sunday, May 23 and 24, in the Limelight Room of the Sun Valley Inn. Hours are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday.

Mrs. Berkley, who has a three-year assignment as public relations person for the Northwest Federation of Gem Shows, said there will be competitive exhibits from factors from the Northwest. Three judges will select the "best collection" and display of faceted stones. Berkley,

one of the competitors, said he will be showing more than 21 of his best faceting efforts using stones of all sizes and shapes.

There will be awards for novice, advanced and master factors along with cases of natural and man-made stones.

He said equipment will be set up to demonstrate how the faceter shapes and creates the gems. There will also be dealers present with materials, equipment and finished products for sale.

Several national ranking factors, Dr. Elwood Rees of Twin Falls, Cliff Jackson of Burley and Ed Romack of Idaho Falls, will be participating in the programs.

Deadline for entry of exhibits is May 22 at 5 p.m. Conference sessions open at 9 a.m. Saturday with specialists in faceting discussing techniques and information on some specific stones. Chief Judge Dr. Robert Carlson will present awards to winners of the faceting competition at noon Saturday.

Workshop sessions for factors will be held Sunday afternoon. Each covers a different subject and lasts about 45 minutes. These are also open to the public.

Berkley said the Intermountain Faceters have a total of 64 members and the committee expects at least 48 cases of finished stones to be shown during the two days.

## Young authors chat, hear about books

Eastern Idaho schoolchildren submit 500 original books to the writing conference

REXBURG (AP) — It doesn't take a household name and a publisher for a book to get written, burnt and read.

All it takes is some imagination and lots of diligence.

An estimated 500 children from 14 eastern Idaho school districts proved that recently when they met at Eck's College to celebrate the books they had recently written.

For a full day, the children listened to testimonials from their peers and author Dean Engstrom of Provo, Utah. They attended workshops on writing and illustration. They mingled, chat-chatted casually about their shared interests as only authors can.

The annual Young Authors Conference is sponsored by the East Idaho Reading Council to encourage youthful writers to continue in the craft.

"Many kids are interested in soccer and football at that age of life, and other kids are inter-

ested in writing and spelling bees," said Cheryl Reeser, council president. "We concentrate on a specific group."

The fourth- or sixth-grade students are the most accomplished writers in their schools and were selected by their teachers to attend the event.

The 500 books submitted for the competition ranged from science-fiction to poetry. The students had three months to finish them and all were original stories.

Glen Ritchie, 11, was one of the first-place winners for a story about an acquaintance of his great-grandfather who found the hideout of a gang of outlaws.

"I'm pretty surprised about it, but I'm pretty glad," the fifth-grader said about his award. "It took a long time to write the story."

Most of the books were simple collections of pages bound together in common school folders.

Some exhibited an effort beyond the obligatory work of producing a plot, characters and dialogue. Some had hand-penned illustrations or

photographs from magazines.

Marianne Ingleit, a fifth grader at Falls Valley Elementary School, produced one of the seminar's more ornate books. "The Quest for the Cure" was chock-full of original illustrations depicting a fable about a group of people searching for a cure to a debilitating illness.

Spread on three tables on the Manwaring Center's second floor, the books were testaments to the imaginations of children.

"One little read 'My Abnormal Family.' Then there was 'The Battle on X24,' 'Fat Frank Meets a Friend' and 'Why Me?'"

Holl Granger, 11, was a first-place winner for "Flushed." It was a tale about a pet fish that gets accidentally flushed down a toilet. The fish is found alive in the sewer by the father of the girl who lost it.

She based the book on an incident in which a pet fish of hers was similarly flushed. The story reflected some wishful thinking on her part, since the fish she lost was discarded after having

### Suzuki violinists in concert

TWIN FALLS — Hundreds of strings will be humming Saturday night when students of the Suzuki method of violin instruction from throughout the Magic Valley gather to perform at the "Spring String Thing."

The concert will be held at the College of Southern Idaho Fine Arts Auditorium at 7:30 p.m. and admission is free.

The Suzuki method is called the "mother tongue method," says Juliette Slaughter, organizer of the concert at Magic Valley State's studios. "The reason we have it here is because they learn their instrument before they learn to read."

Slaughter, who taught with a traditional approach before she adopted the Suzuki method in 1982, said she notices a lower dropout rate among her Suzuki students.

"I think they stick with it because they have a better sound about themselves," she said. "They can make a better sound sooner and start playing melodies from memory."

Katherine Collier, Slaughter's daughter, begins studying the Suzuki method when she was four years old. She was her mother's youngest student.

Collier is solo concert mistress of the Magic Philharmonic Orchestra in Burley. She will be featured guest artist in the Saturday concert, performing "Souvenir d'Amérique" by French composer Henri Vieuxtemps. Marilyn Whiting of Burley will accompany her on the piano.

Collier's daughter, Jennifer, who studies with Slaughter, will be one of the 80 students participating in the concert.

Other teachers whose students will perform are Judy Cull, Christine Hanks and Linda Seaman, all of Twin Falls, and Sheila Allen of Filer.

For some humorous notes, "Touch of Class String Quartet," led by Julie Davis, will play "Rach at the Double for Swing Trio."

## Songwriter, kids celebrate animal crackers' 85th year

'Animal crackers in my soup, monkeys and rabbits loop the loop' were lyrics made famous by Shirley Temple in '35

NEW YORK (AP) — The man who wrote "Animal Crackers in My Soup" led a lively children's singalong Thursday to mark the 85th birthday of the enduring cookie in the string-handled box.

Broadway lyricist Irving Caesar, who's even older than the cookies, belted out the song Shirley Temple made famous and captivated 40 nursery school pupils with tunes and tales at the F.A.O. Schwarz toy store.

"Animal crackers in my soup, monkeys and rabbits loop the loop!" the 91-year-old Caesar sang in a gravelly baritone, blowing kisses to the children. The song was written in 1935 for the movie "Curly Top."

The white-haired songwriter remained in his chair, but his feet kept time with a soft-shoe shuffle. "It makes me so happy to hear you sing my songs," he told the children. "I love all of you very, very much."

Mindful of his sponsor, Caesar gobbled Nabisco's "Barnum's Animals" throughout his performance. Nabisco introduced the cookies, modeled on English animal crackers that had been imported since the 1870s, in 1902. The box, which depicts a P.T. Barnum circus wagon, was designed to be hung on Christmas trees.

A Nabisco spokeswoman, Arlene Gross, said company officials were unsure how the product became known as "animal crackers," but noted two possibilities: They originated in England, where the word "cookie" was not used, and they are not as

sweet as other American cookies.

They were a nickel a box then. Now — 35 billion crackers later — they sell for around 59 cents. The recipe has stayed the same.

Although 37 animals have been used over the years, there are 18 in use today: tiger, cougar, camel, rhinoceros, kangaroo, zebra, sheep, bear (standing and sitting), hippopotamus, lion, lion, hyena, monkey, gorilla, seal, giraffe and elephant.

The discontinued animals include the alligator, goat, ram, reindeer, bull and even the musk ox, beasts that have become extinct "cookies either because they broke easily or because they were hard to recognize," Ms. Gross said.

The list of songs for which Caesar wrote the lyrics is longer than the animal list, and he told the crowd, "I'm an old man. I can't sing as much as you can." But then he launched into a dozen more choruses.

First, there were children's songs, like "Remember Your Name and Address." Then, for the parents and teachers, came some of his popular tunes: "Tea for Two" and "I Want to Be Happy" from the 1924 Broadway show "No No Naniette"; "Swanee," co-written in 1918 with George Gershwin and made famous by Al Jolson; and "Just a Gigolo," written in 1930.

The lyricist has at least 2,000 songs to his credit and still is writing. "I'm a joy addict. I'm always having a good time," he said.

## Bon Jovi off to good start with year to date's top-sellers

HOLLYWOOD — It is no wonder that Rolling Stone magazine chose Bon Jovi for the cover of its current "What's Hot" issue. This is changing up as the year of Bon Jovi, the prototypical hard-rockers from New Jersey.

The group, which toned down its original black-leather, heavy-metal trimmings in favor of a more sexy and polite stance that would be more attractive to teen-age girls, is the early leader in the race for this year's most popular album and single.

Because sales figures are not generally available in the record business the way box-office grosses are in the film world, Billboard magazine's weekly sales and all-play charts are generally regarded as the most accurate measure of popularity.

Under a formula that gives 10 points for every week at No. 1 on the chart, nine for every week at No. 2 and so forth, Bon Jovi's "Slippery When Wet" has registered 174 points so far this year.

That gives the album, which has sold nearly 7 million copies so far (companies do often release sales figures on key best-sellers) a comfortable lead over the Beastie Boys' "Licensed to Ill," which has 135 points.

Bon Jovi's "Livin' on a Prayer" also finished first among singles, scoring 57 points, 3 ahead of the runner-up, "Nothing's Gonna Stop Us Now" by Starship.

Here are the most popular albums for the first third of the year (through the May 9 issue of Billboard). The number of points is also registered.

The race in this category is wide open because the Top 10 list span of singles is so short. Where a hit LP can stay in the Top 10 for months, it is rare for a single to stay in the Top 10 for more than six to eight weeks.

The turnover is so fast, due to the high turnover factor on radio and the industry's strategy in releasing new singles to help stimulate album sales, that 10 different singles have already reached the No. 1 position this year. "Livin' on a Prayer" was able to tally the most points because it spent two weeks at the 1, twice as long as any other record.

## Rapping rockers set joint tour

NEW YORK (AP) — Run-DMC and The Beastie Boys announced Monday that they are taking their rocking rap music on a joint national tour this summer, under light security.

About \$500,000 will be spent on the whole tour for private guards, crowd control barriers, metal detectors and training sessions for personnel, said Robert Ford, a vice president at Rush Productions, which manages both groups.

During a Run-DMC tour last summer, 39 people were injured when a wave of fights and stabbings erupted at their Long Beach, Calif., appearance. In New York, 18 people were arrested in a series of robberies during and after the show at Madison Square Garden. Other incidents were reported in St. Louis and Pittsburgh.

"There were some misconceptions about Run-DMC last year," Ford said. "We want to make people feel secure."

This year's 49-city "Together Forever" tour will begin June 13 in Honolulu and move east for a final show in New York Aug. 17. Tickets for the early concerts are already on sale; tickets for other concerts will go on sale about six weeks in advance.

"We're going to go out and rap on the road together," said Joseph Simmons of Run-DMC at a news conference announcing the tour.

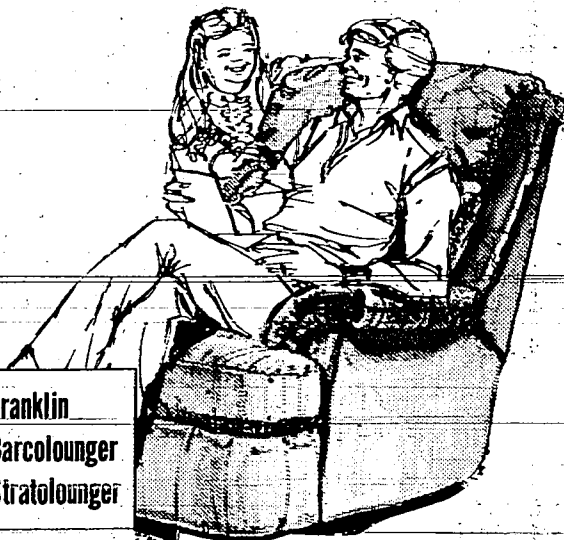

# Threat of strike by directors has Hollywood working hard

**HOLLYWOOD (AP)** — Not a single picket sign has been raised but the threat of a directors strike this summer is so strong that television shows are working overtime, studios have cleared their July shooting schedules, and movie releases are being rationed.

Talks begin May 7 between the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers and the Directors Guild of America. The producers, representing the major studios and networks, want to stop making payments to directors for videocassette sales and theatrical movies shown on pay television. Directors earned \$9.8 million from those payments last year.

Producers also seek a reduction of the payments, called residuals, for reruns on television. In all, residual payments to guild members totaled \$48.7 million last year, up 11 percent from the previous year.

**Works win top honors for Foster**

**BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP)** — David Foster was named songwriter of the year and "Separate Lives," the love theme from the film "White Nights," was honored as most-performed song of the year by Broadcast Music Inc.

The awards were presented during ceremonies Wednesday night for the 35th annual BMI Pop Awards dinner. BMI's Citation of Achievement Award, issued in recognition of popularity in the field of pop music, was bestowed on 84 songwriters and 66 publishers of 63 songs. The awards were based on performances from Oct. 1, 1985, to Sept. 30, 1986.

Foster was honored for "Glory of Love," from the film "The Karate Kid, Part II"; "Love Theme from St. Elmo's Fire"; "Now and Forever (You and Me)"; and "St. Elmo's Fire."

"Separate Lives" was written by songwriter Steven Bishop. Publisher of the year honors went to Warner-Tamerlane Publishing Corp. Canadian songwriter Jim Vallance received three BMI Pop citations. Gilbert Alexander, Gabriel Steven George, Daryl Hall, Will Jennings, Howard Jones, Nicholas William Laird-Clowes, John Lang, Richard Page, Carole Bayer Sager and Ina Wolf received two citations each.

BMI keeps track of the use of songs and determines royalties to songwriters and publishers.

# Previn ill at ease with Philharmonic

LOS ANGELES — André Previn has just completed his second official year as music director of the Los Angeles Philharmonic. The orchestra season closed on April 17 with the First Symphony of Sir Edward Elgar, a typical Previn speciality. Some might call it a typical Previn indulgence.

Almost before the final protracted cadences of Victorian bombast could evaporate into the air, the maestro and his faithful, sometimes merry, band were off on an ambitious tour of Europe.

This is their first foreign sojourn together. It provides an important if somewhat frantic opportunity for public-relations coups, for glamorous overseas adventures and for all-purpose reputation consolidation.

Serenity, prosperity and happiness have returned to the most prestigious and best-endowed musical organization in Los Angeles.

Look at all those empty seats at the beginning of many a Previn program. Look at how the number of empty seats often increases, dramatically, after intermission.

Look at the mail that reaches this office. The same subscribers seem to think concerts have become very dull at the Philharmonic.

Look at what happens when certain guest conductors take up the slack.

Kurt Sanderling invokes generalizations of such old-school sacred as Bruno Walter, Wilhelm Furtwängler and Fritz Busch. The muted flash of young Esa-Pekka Salonen quickens many a pulse out front. The authoritative presence of an interpretive insights maestro Rattle, stimulate the collective imagination. The uncompromising brilliance of Pierre Boulez makes even the most difficult music seem "attractive," if not "allegretto" accessible.

It is wonderful when guest conductors can elicit hysterical cheers and attract full houses. It is alarming when, at the same time, the resident conductor—draws—relatively—small, unenthusiastic crowds and receives only polite applause.

The problem may not lie completely with Previn. Los Angeles audiences have always been star-struck. They have always tended to respond to images as much as to achievements. When it comes to conductors, they have enjoyed gawking at the feet of bigger-than-life personalities.

They adored Zubin Mehta because he came across as a handsome, distinguished, moody, obsessive musical poet. They didn't mind if his music was often muscle-bound and insensitive.

They adored Carlo Maria Giulini because he came across as a handsome, distinguished, moody, obsessive musical poet. They didn't mind if his music was sometimes raged or mangled.

Previn doesn't give the audience an image to cherish. Although his distant past embraced show-biz piazzas and Hollywood glitz, he has been anxious here to deny any traces of flamboyance, or perish the ignoble thought, vulgarity.

## Rainmakers

### The road to rock stardom for new group runs through Midwest

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The road to rock'n'roll stardom, the Rainmakers have found, can lead down some strange paths, such as the one that took the four-member group to a music festival in Belgium.

"Most of the groups were like the headline act, Killing Joke, which has a big following in Europe," recalled lead singer and songwriter Bob Walkenhorst. "They're kind of into Tasciic rock — they all wear black, their fans dress in black."

"So here we are performing right before the headline group. We've got our own multicolored clothes and our goofy attitudes. We were just up there to have fun. Before you know it, the audience bought it. They thought, 'These guys really are having fun! Why are we being fascists? Let's have fun too.'"

The fun hasn't stopped for the Rainmakers, who have risen from relative obscurity as a Midwestern rock band to a critically acclaimed national recording act.

Newsweek called the Rainmakers' first album the hottest rock debut of 1986, and said their music embodied the best of rock: "simply, sincerely, and with velocity." The group also placed fifth in the best new

American band category of an annual readers' poll published in February by Rolling Stone magazine.

The group — Walkenhorst, lead guitarist Steve Phillips, bass guitarist Rich Ruth and drummer Pat Tomek — toured extensively in the United States and Europe following the release of their debut LP, "The Rainmakers." They appeared with such groups as Berlin, Big Country, the Beach Boys and Marvell Greenbaum and went on a late-winter tour with the rejuvenated band, Kansas.

The first LP, released last August, had a respectable showing, selling about 100,000 copies in the United States and another 20,000 abroad. It climbed to 83 on Billboard magazine's pop sales charts.

Plans for their songs "Let My People Go-Go" and "Downstream" have received air play on Music Television and other music video TV shows.

Their second album for PolyGram Records is due for summer release.

"When you make the first record, you don't know if it's going to go from the recording studio to the record company or the eat-out bins or the trash bins," said

Walkenhorst. "I feel like we've got an audience now."

Originally known as Steve, Bob & Rich, the Rainmakers developed a cult following by playing nightclubs throughout the Midwest for more than three years before signing with PolyGram. Walkenhorst came up with the group's new name after Tomek joined the band last year.

The band members are all Midwesterners. Walkenhorst is from Norborne, Mo.; Phillips and Ruth hail from Kansas City, and Tomek is from Wichita, Kan.

Because they lived far from the record companies on both coasts, it took the band a little longer to solve the mystery of how to go about making a record, Walkenhorst said.

"When it finally worked for us, it was so simple it was just silly," he said. "All you do is write some good songs, record 'em, get somebody to take the tape to the record companies. The record company says, 'Let's make a record.' It really is that simple."

Their first album took a consciousness-raising approach, tackling such issues as alcohol and drug abuse, suicide, the inequities of government welfare and even religion.

"We tried to focus on the fact there are a lot more shocking things to life than sex, drugs and rock'n'roll," Walkenhorst said. "You don't have to scream, you don't have to really talk about anything bizarre. Just talk about real life."

But the band also has a lighthearted side. "Downstream" is about a mythical trip down the Mississippi River with a boatful of the famous: Mark Twain, Harry Truman and rock legend Chuck Berry.

The album cover has the bright and boisterous painting, "City Activities With Subway," by the American painter Thomas Hart Benton.

The Rainmakers are a down-to-earth bunch. They favor casual clothes over flashy costumes. There are no pyrotechnics in their concerts. And they don't live the stereotypical life of rock excess.

"We're doing it on our own terms," a Walkenhorst said. "We write the best songs we can, we play them for all we're worth and we go home and live life. I think better music will come out of being a human being instead of what you think a rock'n'roll star ought to be."

## Hype, hard-sell dominate film festival

CANNES, France — Swarms of rubbernecking French film fanatics crowd La Croisette — which sounds like a breakfast food, but is the main drag in this Mediterranean coastal town. Their objective: to get a look at Brian Dennehy having lunch.

Dennehy, star of Britain's "The Belfry of the Architect," is a good actor, judging by his wailing, which is featured prominently in the new film by Peter Greenaway, "Belly," one of 25 official entries in the contest for the Golden Palm prize.

Other "must-see" signs from the judges, but some viewers required Maxol after viewing the story of god and gulls earlier this week.

Among "highly-competitors" is Tennessee Williams' "The Glass Menagerie" as directed by Paul Newman, who confronted the quirky European press corps and a smattering of American newsmen Tuesday. Crisp in a blue oxford cloth shirt but cranky as a bear with jet lag, the Oscar-winner was in no mood for the sorts of questions that are apt to come from the Director's questions like "What does the word 'dream' mean?"

The 40th film festival at Cannes, which appropriately enough is the older city of Beverly Hills, is a film hit. Sometimes, you can barely keep from being crushed to death when an ordinary French woman is mistaken for Diane Keaton, whose film "Heartburn" is screening in the Director's Fortnight, a special showcase for new directors.

Cannes is full of poodles and women in itchy-bitty miniskirts — not just show-biz but tight-rope dancers, too. In answer to Rodeo Drive is the Rue D'Antibes, where one may spot Jean-Luc Godard window-shopping to the theme from "Rocky III" while he and his entourage are fixed the wrought iron balconies. The fashionable rue is festooned with filmstrip, leis and its windows are decorated with glossy photos of Clint Eastwood "as Robert" Bedford meant to attract shoppers' attention to bath towels and electric massage machines.

Godard, one of the co-directors of last week's closing night film "Aria" — a series of arias conducted by renowned directors, will also screen his work in progress, "King Lear." The "Lear" deal was struck on a napkin in one of the local bistros here last year, or so legend has it. Norman Mailer was set to play Lear with Woody Allen as the fool, but now Burgess Meredith has the title

role, with Molly Ringwald as Cordelia. Godard is said to play the fool himself.

Everything is conceivable in this city of cinema by the seashore. It becomes harder and harder to separate the reality of Cannes' carbo-genic daredevils sunning topless by the sidewalk from the fantasy of its many screen and stage scenes.

You can choose from among some 1,500 movies from around the world in this 13-day sideshow of hard sell, where third-rate actresses are treated as respectfully as senators from New England. It's the Las Vegas of art — the Super Bowl of film festivals. —There's even a blimp flying over the coast that says "Up La Croisette" at a time when Cannes (pronounced c-o-n-n-a, not c-a-n-s) is probably a pretty odd port town when it isn't decked out in movie posters like Sunset Boulevard.

But now the Carlton Hotel, where the dealmakers hang out, is papered in superhero-sized cutouts of Christopher Reeve in "Superman" and the cast of the festival's "Delta Force," and giving a press conference, vowing to stamp out violence in film.

To enter the Carlton, you must walk between James Bond's cardboard legs, which is a lot like wading through one of those drive-through sequoia trees. Once in the lobby, you are likely to be shoved by some of the 3,000 press corps members covering the festival into the likes of Bob Derek, or perhaps one of five starlets prancing for photographers in film-strip bikinis — sort of cellulite and celluloid.

Up La Croisette from the Carlton is celeb central — the Majestic Hotel, where stargazers may glimpse notables, should they be able to see through all the paparazzi. About 200 photographers at a time wait in the circular driveway for a shot at the likes of John Travolta, Mel Gibson and Liz Taylor. The cameras click and flash and coo maddeningly. It must be like being trapped inside a popcorn popper.

If you miss Mel or Liz outside the Majestic, you can catch them on the "Star 97" show, the festival network's big gala on a row of 40 TV sets in the basement of the festival headquarters at the Grand Palais on Alee Costas-Gavras. The room is a sort of high-tech version of Dante's Inferno, redecorated so that people will not feel like moles at ground

zero — thus, the little blue outdoor cafe umbrellas under which the French journalists sit to watch themselves covering the celebrities.

The Grand Palais itself looks like something Albert Speer might have created while in a frivolous mood. Only nobody here is feeling frivolous, just exhausted. Cannes is more convention than circus. People at sidewalk cafes don't talk about auteurs — they flack stars and make deals. It's not so much festival as market.

One of the hottest tickets so far comes from a new company called Troma. "The Animal of Troma" is the smell of \$\$\$." Is-Troma's motto. Its premiere of "Nazi Blue" drew the A-critics like Rex Reed, the B-critics and so on. You couldn't get in if you wanted to, and those who got in wouldn't get out fast enough. First out the door was a woman identified as critic Roger Ebert's significant other.

Described as "Hang 10, Gestapo-Style," "Suff Nazis" concerns the rise of a neo-Nazi movement in the south-Southern California after the earthquake. Other Troma titles include "Curse of the Cannibal Con-

federates" and "I Was a Teenage TV Terrorist," whose director describes it as a revolt against the media as parents. A competing firm has come up with "Assault of the Killer Bimbos" in hopes of winning a share of the big profits to be made in this genre.

Newman, of course, has a different market in mind. When he wasn't hired, he was eloquent about his drive to adapt "The Glass Menagerie" for the movies.

# 'The Hanoi Hilton' makes 'Hogan's Heroes' look deep

TWIN FALLS — Following are capsule reviews of movies currently playing in the Magic Valley. Listings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**THE HANOI HILTON (R).** You could say this portrayal of America's Vietnam War MIA's is closer to "Hogan's Heroes" than "Grand Illusion" — but that would be insulting "Hogan's Heroes," which has slightly richer characteristics (despite Michael Moriarty and Jeffrey Jones in the cast). It starts about halfway through the nightmarish film: a gloomy parade of war-torn suffering. Readers' biggest-style sermons, swaggering Williams, and liberal, albeit anti-war, dunes, and it all but suggests that if you do not respond, you must be a lingo, too. Ridiculous. "Hanoi Hilton" is unworthy of the men it wants to ennoble.

**ANGEL HEART (R).** Alan Parker's sumptuous, occasionally overwrought visual sense stands him in great stead in this deceptive story, which begins like "The Godfather" and ends like an occult mystery with voodoo overtones. Mickey Rourke's searous gumshoe is one of his best performances, elegantly countered by Robert De Niro as the mysterious gentleman who hires him to track down a '40s crooner, the missing Johnny Favorite. Lisa Bonet is suitably fine, but the film's earlier rating was peculiar to say the least. Other films have had sex, nudity and violence in these proportions and remained unscathed.

**BLIND DATE (PG-13).** What bogglers the mind is how this bit of navel lint could have seemed remotely funny to any one at any stage along the way. The single feeble premise is this: A director (Jim Basinger) with no inference whatsoever for alcohol goes on a blind date with a yuppie executive (Bruce Willis) who, warned about her problem, feeds her quantities of champagne and watches in outraged dismay as she goes out of control. This from the director of "Victor/Victoria" Blake Edwards. Willis, though he has a nice flair for physical comedy, would be well advised not to quit his nighttime job. Basinger, retains a dignity and vulnerable charm that are almost unbelievable, given her assignment.

## 'Secret' still succeeds; 'Gardens' gets praise

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "The Secret of My Success" remained in first place in the nation's box office tally after a two-week run, while buying that also saw the debut of Francis Coppola's "Gardens of Stone" in fourth place.

"Gardens of Stone," an account of the Vietnam War, was fought at home, received generally good reviews from the critics but finished fourth among ticket-buyers last weekend, collecting \$1.6 million.

The film, which stars James Caan, Angelle Huston and James Earl Jones, could not unseat the Michael J. Fox hit, "The Secret of My Success."

"Success," featuring the NBC-TV "Family Ties" star, has been the most popular film in America since opening five weeks ago and took in an additional \$1.8 million last week for a total of \$10 million so far.

The fighting star Bruce Willis' first feature film, "Blind Date," moved up to second place from third. Although it was released seven weeks ago, "Blind Date" continues to gain in popularity, taking in \$2 million more at the box office.

Virtually all releases out for more sales from the previous week, with "Success" and "Blind Date" down 17 percent and 14 percent respectively.

Movie theaters compete with seminars, fine arts, and amusements during May, and distributors are holding back for the summer movie release season.

**HOOSIERS (PG).** This film is as engaging, as modern, as utterly American and as thrilling as the real-life story it is based on: the rise of a tiny town's high school basketball team to the Indiana state finals. It also features some of the finest acting you could hope to see, by Gene Hackman as the coach with a dark past, Dennis Hopper as the alcoholic ex-hoops-star, and Barbara Hershey as the coach's initial adversary. The film has a few burrs (some plot elements feel grafted on, and the editing rhythms are not always right) but you can hate basketball less, and still have a sensational time at "Hoosiers."

**PLATOON (R).** This is movie making with a zealot's fervor. Director-writer Oliver Stone, decorated Vietnam infantryman himself, clearly wants us to understand what fighting in that war was like. He succeeds with an immediacy that is frightening. War movies of the past, even the greatest ones, seem like crane shots by comparison: "Platoon" is at ground zero. And, not incidentally, Stone may have put a stake through the heart of all the slick Rambo heroes ever to slide onto a screen.

**POLICE ACADEMY IV (PG).** It is amazing that the "Police Academy" movies keep being made even though they stopped being funny after the hilarious original. This one is no less so as the last two and director Jim Drake is at least brisk and

amiable. Stars Steve Guttenberg, Bubba Smith, Michael Winslow, Bobcat Goldthwait and G.W. Bailey.

**THE SECRET OF MY SUCCESS (PG-13).** A misfiring comic fantasia on executive and sexual success in the Reagan era, mixed up from scraps of "The Apartment" and "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying." The writers, Jim Cash and Jack Epps Jr., "Top Gun" do scripts so derivative you may get deja vu during their trailers, and their central play here — mailroom boy poses as executive — is ridiculous and punctorily worked out. But director Herb Ross and cinematographer Carlo Di Palma sometimes capture a fairytale Manhattan here, full of glass-pala buildings and cars, and Michael J. Fox's effortless chutzpah is just right.

**STAR TREK IV: THE VOYAGE HOME (PG).** Breathes there a non-Trekkie with hide so tough he will not find something to enjoy in this rollicking, humanistic super-space opera? Perhaps, but he will be outnumbered. The reunited Enterprise — under the guidance of director Leonard Nimoy and Captain (excuse us: Admiral) James Kirk crew travel backward in time to a primitive era (our own) to rescue two humpbacked whales and thereby save Earth. There has been a conscious effort to lighten things up after the "sturm und drang" of the first three movies. "Star Treks" and the result will almost certainly be the best loved of the four: full of the old crackling Enterprise crew badinage and a lot more. Even the audience members with a terminal Spock block should be amused.

**TIN MEN (R).** The same sensibility that infused Barry Levinson's "Diner" runs through his latest, a dryly hilarious and special love story with vena undertones: life among the "tin men," the bucksterring aluminum-drug salesmen of the late 1950s. The initial triangle, Richard Dreyfuss, Barbara Hershey, Danny DeVito, heard a perfect cast, an example of ensemble playing at its most deft and practiced. Highly recommended.

# 'Golden Child' has matching price, kicks off video season

HOLLYWOOD — Video rentals invariably drop off in the summer. People are generally less interested in renting movies, or watching television in general, as they focus on vacations and outdoor activities. Consequently, video companies usually save their top titles for other seasons.

But this summer there will be a greater number of appealing titles than usual. For instance, Paramount's "Golden Child," starring Eddie Murphy, will be out July 1. The cost is worth noting. At \$79.95 rather than \$29.95, it is not priced for sales. Unlike other Murphy films, Paramount apparently figured that fans would not be eager to own this one, about a social worker hunting for a youngster with supernatural powers. It was not a real blockbuster in the theaters but it should be a hot rental.

July 8 is also the release date of another movie, Warner Video's "The Color Purple," that is also destined to be a rental smash. Directed by Steven Spielberg and starring Whoopi Goldberg and Danny Glover, it is about the metamorphosis of a Southern black woman. So far it has grossed nearly \$100 million. "Next week's major releases are "Heartbreak Ridge," starring Clint Eastwood, and "Streets of Gold," featuring Klaus Maria Brandauer, in the week of May 24. "Wanted Dead or Alive" and "Jumpin' Jack Flash."

NEW RELEASES: Touchstone's "The Color of Money" should dominate the rental market for the next month or two. It not only features Paul Newman's Oscar-winning performance but also, most important for the rental market, co-stars Tom Cruise, who has an army of devoted young female fans. He is the big attraction in "Top Gun" — the biggest hit in video history.

Directed by Martin Scorsese, "The Color of Money" is a dramatic update on Fast Eddie Felson, the pool shark who retired at the end of "The Hustler," director Robert Rossen's 1961 classic. Felson is now a liquor salesman who becomes the financial backer of a young hustler (Cruise) traveling with his girlfriend (Mary Elizabeth Mastrantonio) on the pool-hall circuit. Newman played Felson in the original, losing the 1961 Oscar to Maximilian Schell ("Judgment at Nuremberg") in what some film historians still call one of the great injustices in Oscar history.

Paramount's "Children of Lesser Gods" is an intense drama about a stormy affair between a maverick speech therapist (William Hurt) and a defiant young deal woman (Marlee Matlin), was, according to many critics, one of last year's best movies. Matlin won the best actress Oscar over favorite Kathleen Turner. The movie was also nominated for best picture, best actor (Hurt) and best supporting actress (Piper Laurie, who plays the deal woman's mother).

HBO's "Mona Lisa" boasts a per-

formance by Bob Hoskins that won him his major acting award except the Oscar. He plays a trashy ex-cop who chummers a high-class London call girl (Cathy Tyson). The budding love-hate relationship is the end of a long, suspenseful and packs a wallop. The Cockney accents are hard to understand at times; you will be using your rewind button frequently.

Vestron's "Tai Pan," an action-adventure movie set in Hong Kong in the 1800s, was a horrible flop. Critics hated it and fans did not go to see it. Bryan Brown and Joan Chen star as the lovers. If you are willing to wade through bad dialogue and performances, there is a great typhoon sequence. The film was a setback for Brown, who was on his way to becoming a major star. Regrettably, Vestron's purchase of the expensive video rights for this movie, which does not look like a home-video hit, is one reason for the company's current financial crisis.

OLD MOVIES: MCA has just released two of the best movies of the '40s — "Double Indemnity" (1944) and "The Lady Eve" (1941) — at \$29.95. Both star Barbara Stanwyck. "Double Indemnity," co-starring Fred MacMurray, is a tawdry tale of an insurance fraud. "The Lady Eve," a comedy directed by Preston Sturges, features Henry Fonda as a well-heeled gambler who falls into the clutches of a card shark (Stanwyck).

Some Fred Astaire fans prefer his dancing with Eleanor Powell to his more acclaimed work with Ginger Rogers. In "Broadway Melody of 1940" (MGM-UA, \$29.95) his dancing with Powell is exemplary, particularly the "Begin the Beguine" number. The plot, about the competition between dancing partners (Astaire and George Murphy), is slight but the Cole Porter score, including "I Concentrate on You," is great.

Fans of the Astaire-Rogers team will enjoy "Roberta" (1935, MGM-UA, \$29.95). Though it is considered one of their least interesting movies (they play supporting roles to Irene Dunne and Randolph Scott), it was their breakthrough film. It lacks the charm and wit of other Astaire-Rogers movies, but one can see in this early dancing collaboration their first steps toward stardom. The best numbers are "Smile Gets in Your Eyes" and "Lovely to Look

AL — "Dancing Lady" (1933, MGM-UA, \$29.95) is well known to trivia buffs because it is Astaire's first movie. But it is also an underrated backstage musical — tacky but fun. Joan Crawford plays an ambitious hooper who has romantic entanglements with Clark Gable and Franchot Tone. Her dancing is memorable because it is so awful. The Three Stooges are featured in some funny bits.

# Hartman leaves life of poverty in 'Roses Are For The Rich'

As rock singer Ciji Dunne on "Knot's Landing" (and later as that character's look-alike, Cathy Geary), Lisa Hartman was the only lead actress on the show under 40 — and she flaunted it outrageously in cut-up-to-there miniskirts, moussed hair and a single earring. When not playing the only hip woman among a sea of polyester, Hartman seemed to wile away the hours posing for the tabloids in one cut-out outfit after another, each of which exposed another part of her perfect body. Oh, for that perfectly flat stomach! This woman, this cosmetically perfect woman, she...she...does bench presses!

Hartman shows up at CBS headquarters in New York to discuss her upcoming miniseries, "Roses Are for the Rich," which airs Sunday, May 17, and Tuesday, May 19. It's 9 o'clock in the morning, and Hartman is wearing a simple black suit and no makeup at all. And she looks gorgeous! But the astute Hartman wants to show that she's really just one of the girls. "Don't you just hate makeup?" she says. "The older I get the less I wear, because I think women look more beautiful with less makeup on. In my miniseries, they kept wanting me to get glamoured and glitzed up, but I wanted my character to stay earthy. Don't you think that's really what makes a woman sexy?"

In "Roses are for the Rich," Hartman plays Autumn McAvan, an orphan who grows up determined to survive the poverty and repression of an Appalachian coal-mining town and eventually marries wealth. "I get to play so many different ages, types and attitudes," says Hartman. "And there are so many twists in her life that the character almost gets to play characters herself. The plot — rags to riches — has been done before, but I took the role because Autumn's so interesting."

Hartman's reasoning is no cop-out. As Autumn, she's in every frame of the miniseries, and the role is as juicy as they come. After Autumn's first husband Lonnie (Jim Youngs) is killed in a mine explosion, she has a miscarriage — and a nervous breakdown, and begins a life-long obsession with getting revenge on the mine owner, Douglas Osborne (Bruce Dern). She eventually marries him and is charged with his

murder, but not before she gets passionately involved with a department-store magnate (Joe Penny) and a bar owner (Richard Masur).

Hartman claims that she wasn't intimidated by the scope of the miniseries role. "There was so much work to do that I never had the time to feel that way." She credits both Dern and Masur with helping her develop her character. "I've been lucky to work with people from whom I've learned a lot. When I was on "Knots," I worked with Julie Harris (who plays Lillimae). That cast is

very, very serious about their work. Most nighttime soap actors come in, do their work, and go off to make endorsements. At "Knots," they stay and rehearse for the next day."

Lisa Hartman battles her way up from poverty, and Joe Penny is the department-store mogul with whom she becomes involved in "Roses Are For The Rich." The CBS miniseries airs Sunday, May 17, and Tuesday, May 19 on KMTV at 8 p.m.

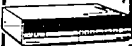

Some of the biggest stars on CBS' "Falcon Crest" plunge into San Francisco Bay in a car chase. Alexis Canning (Cathy) wrecks her car at the end of ABC's "Dynasty."

It's that time of year when the network series call up their cliffhangers to keep the audience guessing until the new shows start in the fall.

There probably would be few cliffhangers today without the shooting of J.R. Ewing on CBS' "Dallas" in 1980. The mystery of "who shot J.R." stirred worldwide interest, and "Dallas" shot to the top of the Nielsen ratings. The episode that revealed his assassin attracted 76 percent of the audience.

"Dallas" once again has a cliffhanger, which this year centers on Victoria Principal leaving the show Friday, May 15. How will her character, Pam Ewing, be written out of the show? If she dies, a future return to the show would be difficult but, as the show's writers have demonstrated, not impossible.

When Patrick Duffy quit, his character Bobby Ewing was killed. After a year's absence the producers persuaded him to return. His death, and all the previous season, was passed off as a dream by Pam.

Pam and Bobby re-married, so they're going to need a valid reason to explain her disappearance. In addition, J.R. (Lucy Regan) has gotten himself into a fix with the government and the ownership of

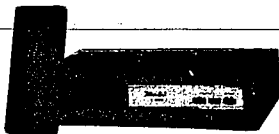

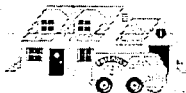

## CBS unveils summer prime-time shows

NEW YORK (AP) — Fans of CBS midseason replacements that didn't make it will get a chance to see the shows once more in prime time this summer, the network said Monday.

CBS also will rerun the miniseries "Space" and "Master of the Game." Beginning June 5, CBS will air pilots developed for the 1987-88 season. Those will be announced later. CBS announces its fall schedule later this month.

"Hard Copy" a short-lived police reporter drama from the season just ended, will be back with six new episodes beginning Friday, May 29.

The six episodes of "Shell Game," a short-lived private eye comedy-drama, will be run Wednesdays,

beginning June 3.

"The Equalizer," which is expected to be in CBS' fall lineup, will be back with new episodes on Wednesdays, beginning May 6. May is a sweeps month when ratings determine local advertising rates.

"West 57th," the newsmagazine show, will offer some scarce original programming on Tuesdays.

CBS had previously announced that it would run in prime time later this summer two of its original, late-night series: the action-adventure "Alderly," and the detective drama "Night Heat." "Alderly" will be seen on Fridays beginning Aug. 7, "Night Heat" on Thursday beginning Aug. 6. Those will be origi-

nal episodes, not reruns.

"Master of the Game," starring Dyan Cannon and Harry Hamlin in a nine-hour epic based on Sidney Sheldon's novel about a South African family, will air on four Saturdays beginning June 6. The astronaut drama "Space," based on the James Michener book and starring James Garner and Susan Anspach, will be rerun in nine hours on four Saturdays beginning July 4.

## 'World Turns' leads Emmy nominations

NEW YORK (AP) — The long-running CBS soap opera "As the World Turns" received 20 Daytime Emmy nominations on May 7, including two for outstanding lead actor in a drama series.

It was the second year in a row the CBS soap won 20 nominations.

Scott Bryce, who plays Craig Montgomery, and Larry Bryggman, who plays Dr. John Dixon, were nominated for the 14th annual awards which will be announced in a daytime telecast June 30. Another soap, "The Young and the Restless," also had two lead actor nominations.

NBC's "Santa Barbara" received 14 nominations and CBS's "Pee-wee's Playhouse" and "The Young and the Restless" each received 12.

Susan Lucci was nominated for the eighth time as outstanding lead actress in a drama series for her role as Erica Kane on ABC's "All My Children," setting a daytime Emmy record. She has never won the award.

Nominations cover the broadcast period from March 6, 1986, through March 5, 1987, and were made by members of the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences and the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences.

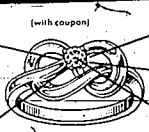

## ABC is aiming for new TV 'Golden Age'

NEW YORK (AP) — Shakespeare on ABC? The network that gave us "Three's Company?" "Charlie's Angels?" "Laverne and Shirley?"

Shakespeare remains in the offing, but ABC, after its worst ratings season in recent history, is doing some image-building by offering Harold Pinter and Neil Simon, and perhaps later Harvey Fierstein and Edward Albee.

ABC's image has been on the mend for some time, with such challenging and innovative programs as "The Execution of Raymond Graham," "The Day After" and "Amerika" and the series "Moonlighting" and "Max Headroom."

Now ABC plans to offer unusual 60- and 90-minute one-time programs. It is such old anthologies as "Playhouse 90" or "Philco TV Playhouse."

The first was a 1-hour television production of the Pinter play "The Dumb Waiter," directed by Robert Altman ("Nashville," "Streamers.")

Gary Pudney, vice president in

charge of specials and talent for ABC Entertainment, calls the new programming an attempt to return to the "golden age" of television.

"I really hope that the audiences — which, I think, for a change we're showing a little respect for — will respond favorably and give us a chance to do more," Pudney said in an interview.

"I think success will be better for us than failure, but even if we aren't able to enlist large audiences, I think in some of the cases like Pinter, even a lower share of the audience is more people than have ever seen a Pinter play, and I think that's terrific.

Next season, Faye Dunaway will star in a 90-minute drama called "Circe and Bravo," the code names for the President and first lady. It is being produced by Gale Anne Hurd ("Allens").

To hear Pudney tell it, he has been having a ball going to stars and asking them what they want to do for ABC's effort to reclaim the golden

age.

"It's a nice way to be able to approach some of the stars, because you're able to provide them with a form to work in that they can't ordinarily get in a motion picture," he said.

Dudley Moore will do a comedy next season, as will Burt Reynolds. Julie Andrews will do a Christmas variety show. Carol Burnett will do "Plaza Suite."

Pudney said he is looking for properties for Jane Fonda, who starred in "The Dollmaker" on ABC, and for Katharine Hepburn. ABC has also approached playwrights Fierstein and Albee.

"Not only are you bringing the quality to the audience, you're helping the image of the company," Pudney said. "I think we're kind of brave in coming forward with something like Pinter. It's just something you don't normally see."

"If handled right, I think they can be some jewels in the crown."

# NBC unveils strong fall schedule

WASHINGTON (Wash. Post) — Here's an early peek at NBC's fall schedule, which the number one primetime network will unveil to the advertising community May 13 in New York.

As you might expect, the House of Hits has made relatively few changes in its powerful schedule, introducing only four new hours — composed of three one-hour programs and two half-hour situation comedies — while hanging in there stoutly with what have become known as "NBC-type" (i.e., "quality") shows.

Only the Monday and Saturday schedules are unchanged from the regular 1986-87 season lineups. "Miami Vice" will continue to contend with "Dallas" on Fridays, and the network is pitting two sitcoms against CBS' "Murder, She Wrote" on Sunday nights. Otherwise (with new shows in CAPS):

— On Monday night next September you'll see: "ALF" at 8; "Valerie" at 8:30; and the Monday night movie.

— Tuesday: "Mallock" at 8; "J.J. STARBUCK" at 9; and "Crime Story" at 10. ("Gimme a Break" and "Hill Street Blues" are gone).

— Wednesday: "Highway To Heaven" at 8; "A YEAR IN THE LIFE" at 9; and "St. Elsewhere" at 10 ("The Tortellis" and "Bronx Zoo" are finito).

— Thursday: "The Cosby Show" at 8; "A DIFFERENT WORLD" at 8:30; "Cheers" at 9; "Night Court" at 9:30; and "L.A. Law" at 10 ("Family Ties" moves to Sunday).

— Friday: "Rags to Riches" at 8; "Miami Vice" at 9; and "PRIVATE EYE" at 10 ("Roomies," "Amazing Stories" and "Stingray" are gone from the most recent regular schedule for this night).

— Saturday: "Facts of Life" at 8; "227" at 8:30; "The Golden Girls" at 9; "Amen" at 9:30; and "Hunter" ("Sweet Surrender" and "Me & Mrs. C" are gone from current schedule).

— Sunday: "Our House" at 7; "Family Ties" at 8; WHO'S DAD? at 8:30; and the Sunday night movie.

"J.J. Starbuck" stars Dale Robertson as a wealthy Texan who goes around helping people. "A Year in the Life," which received excellent critical reviews when it aired during the holidays as a miniseries, stars Richard Kiley as a Seattle widower with a loving family.

"Private Eye," set in Los Angeles of the 1950s, stars Michael Woods and is in the stylish mode of Anthony

"A Different World" is the "Cosby Show" spinoff in which daughter Lisa Bonet enrolls at Hillman college.

"Who's Dad?" is about a young girl whose mother has died and who ends up being cared for by the two men with whom Mom was romantically involved in college (Mom was apparently not sure just who dad was, hence the title).

Second-place CBS and third-place ABC will make their fall schedule announcements later this month.

As the CBS affiliates prepare to journey to the West Coast next week for their annual spring meeting with network brass, management Monday moved to forestall an open revolt against "The Morning Program," whose low ratings from 7:30 to 9 a.m. are causing concern throughout the system.

In a 22-minute closed circuit presentation to the affiliates, network president Tom Leahy — who is in charge of "The Morning Program" — announced a multimillion-dollar "major promotion" effort on behalf of the current 7 to 9 a.m. schedule (which includes a half hour of "CBS Morning News" at 7 a.m.) that will get underway in early summer. TV on-air promos, as well as print and radio ads, are in the mix.

Leahy told the affiliates CBS had withheld a heavy promotion effort until "Morning Program" had become established, after debuting in mid-January... and "because we are so committed" to the current programming in those hours.

Affiliates also heard from Tony Malara, senior vice president-distribution of the network; David Poltrack, research vice president; and Jerry Dominus, vice president of

network sales... Dominus told the affiliates that advertisers have noted the increase in female viewers for "The Morning Program," and major accounts like Colgate, Hallmark, Nabisco, Stouffers and Campbell Soup had recently signed on.

Leahy also quoted an interview that NBC "Today" show executive producer Steve Friedman gave American Film magazine in December in which Friedman was asked how he would establish a new morning program.

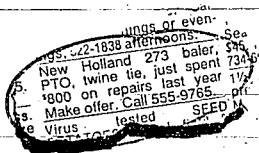
