Senate wants to know risks in Persian Gulf

WASHINGTON — The Senate, reacting to the Iraqi raid which killed 37 American sailors on the USS Stark, called on President Reagan Thursday to inform Congress of the risks of growing U.S. involvement in the Persian Gulf.

Sen. Frank Lautenberg declared he had no intention of letting the attack on the guided missile frigate force the United States to abandon relatives of the sailors killed in Sunday's shipping lanes.

"As we grieve the loss of our brave sons," Richard W. Murphy, an assistant secretary of state, defended the administration's decision to put the American flag and Kuwaiti.

Today, the president and Mrs. Reagan will fly to Mayport Naval Station near Jacksonville for a memorial service with the frigate force the United States to abandon relatives of the sailors killed in Sunday's shipping lanes.

In related developments, Richard W. Murphy, an assistant secretary of state, defended the administration's decision to put the American flag and Kuwaiti.

U.S. Navy investigators began their probe in Manama, Bahrain, of the Iraqi missile attack on the USS Stark, but they were silent about early findings and what they were looking for.

Navy spokesman Michael Cherry said the investigation results will not be released until the ship is anchored 3 miles off this island.

There is a risk that the ship was busy repairing the ship, and some were telephoning their families in the United States.

Pentagon officials disclosed that Iraqi defense officials have told U.S. Embassy of the warplane that attacked the USS Stark fired two French-made Exocet missiles at the frigate. The officials, who asked not to be named, said the Defense Department was not sure what to make of the Iraqi report, because the Mirage F-1 fighters used by Iraq are supposed to be capable of carrying only one Exocet at a time.

Donors tie North, fund drive

WASHINGTON — Three wealthy donors told congressional investigators Thursday of a fund-raising campaign on behalf of the Nicaraguan Contra rebels that included White House briefings and, in one case, the promise of a meeting with President Reagan.

Brewery magnate Joseph Coors testified that the late CIA Director William Casey told him White House aide Oliver North was "the guy to see" to donate money to Nicaraguan Contra rebels during a congressional ban on U.S. aid.

Another contributor testified that a private fund-raiser promised a meeting with the president in return for a donation to the rebels of \$300,000 or more.

Winding up the third week of the House-Senate hearings, the donors to the rebels' cause said it began administering the money never directly solicited money from them.

However, some committee members said the intent was clear when potential contributors would get briefings from North on the plight of the Contras followed by pitches for money from private fund-raisers.

"I call that the one-two punch. It's a fiction for anyone to assume that's not a facilitation," said Sen. Warren B. Rudman, R-N.H., vice chairman of the Senate committee investigating the Iran-Contra affair.

"There's no question but that North was obviously assisting directly in raising money," said Rep. Ed Jenkins, D-Ga.

In other developments:

- House Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas, said "it is increasingly evident" that laws including the two-year congressional ban on U.S. military aid to the Nicaraguan rebels "were systematically violated by members of the executive branch of government."
- Larry Thomas, a spokesman for Vice President George Bush, said

Bush has been assured by independent counsel Lawrence Walsh that he is not the target of a criminal investigation, Thomas was responding to a report in the May 25 issue of the National Law Journal that Walsh's staff has "begun to focus more directly on Bush's personal involvement" in fund-raising for the rebels.

Walsh issued a subpoena to David Kimche, the former director of Israel's foreign ministry, according to Asher Naim, information director at the Israeli Embassy in Washington. Naim said Walsh was "going off on his own and violating agreements reached between Israel and the United States" by issuing the subpoena to Kimche, who was involved in U.S. arms shipments to Iran. A Walsh spokesman said he had no comment.

There was grumbling on the congressional committees over moves in Swiss courts to block the release of records of bank accounts controlled by retired Air Force Maj. Gen. Richard V. Secord, his business partner, Albert Hakim, and Iranian arms dealer Manucher Ghorbanifar. Such actions by Secord, who testified earlier, "will inevitably frustrate and delay the pursuit for truth and are totally inconsistent with his words of cooperation and good faith," said Sen. Paul Trible, R-Va.

The hearings, which concluded for the week with more testimony from retired Army Maj. Gen. John Singlaub, a middleman in some Contra arms deals, have been piecing together details of how money was raised for the Contras during the official U.S. cutoff, where the money came from and how it was spent.

Hakim will be the witness when the hearings resume next Wednesday.

Singlaub wrapped up his testimony Thursday by saying he never spoke with Casey in 1985 and 1986, but never about Nicaragua. If Singlaub tried to bring it up, he would say, "I'll throw you out of my office" using an expression indicating that he did not want to be raised that subject with him since such discussions with intelligence officers were off limits under the congressional ban.

Singlaub also said he undertook a high-profile round of fund-raising activities to divert attention from North and Secord.

Extra cash comes along in odd ways

WASHINGTON — Members of the House of Representatives made extra money last year in ways that are not so old-fashioned: selling hay and old coins, dealing in stocks, playing poker and acting in "The Love Boat" on television.

And making speeches — lots of speeches. Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, led the way in for-pay race hands down, picking up \$177,500 in honoraria. Abiding by House rules that members can keep only \$22,500 in such income, he gave \$155,000 of it to charity.

The information was contained in financial-disclosure reports that are required by the post-Watergate Ethics-in-Government Act. All but about two dozen of the 438 House members and non-voting delegates (there are two vacancies) released their reports Thursday — and they indicated the House has far fewer wealthy members than does the smaller Senate.

That does not mean the House is a chamber of paupers. Freshman Rep. Joseph P. Kennedy III, D-Mass., earned more than a quarter-million dollars last year and his net worth was a minimum \$25 million. Bill Green, R-N.Y., is worth at least \$5 million and perhaps well over \$12

million, Rep. Jimmy Quillen, R-Tenn., is worth at least \$3.5 million. Rep. Tommy Robinson, D-Ark., a former sheriff, listed assets of no more than \$15,000 and liabilities of at least \$500,000. Rep. Daniel Lungen, R-Calif., reported no assets and no liabilities. Rep. Mickey Edwards, R-Okla., had no assets but as much as \$30,000 in liabilities. Les Aspin, D-Vt., chairman of the Armed Services Committee, showed no assets and no liabilities.

The disclosure forms are drafted in such a way that a member of Congress who so desires can hide part of his or her income or assets. Some members apparently list all their property in their spouses' names, since disclosure of such specifics is not required. A member's home need not be reported as an asset.

Nevertheless, the forms do provide some insight into how the lawmakers supplement and spend their salaries, which for most members was \$75,100 last year.

Rep. Fred Grandy, R-Iowa, whose previous job was in Hollywood, received \$392,000 in 1986 for acting work done in 1985 on "The Love Boat," the situation comedy in which he played the role of Gopher, the ship's purser.

U.S. compiles record budget surplus

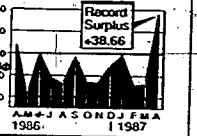
WASHINGTON — The federal government enjoyed a record \$38.7 billion surplus in April as both individual and corporate tax payments rose sharply, the Treasury Department said Thursday.

The huge surplus, representing the difference between what the government took in and what it spent last month, helped to reduce the deficit for the first seven months of the fiscal year to \$83.3 billion.

That figure is 34 percent lower than the red ink run up during the first seven months of the 1986 budget period, a year in which the federal government suffered a record deficit of \$20.7 billion.

The Reagan administration has been forecasting that the deficit this fiscal year will shrink to \$17.2 billion, earlier projection of a \$190 billion

Private economists said Thursday that this goal is not as far out of reach as they once thought.

Allen Sinai, chief economist for Shearman Lehman Brothers, said the Reagan administration has been forecasting a deficit of \$182 billion for fiscal 1987, down from an earlier projection of a \$190 billion

shortfall, based on higher tax revenues so far this year.

"Inflation is higher and the dollar is lower and that helps corporate profits," Sinai said.

Even with the improvements, the federal deficit will still be above the \$144 billion target set by the Gramm-Rudman balanced budget law. The deficit target for the fiscal 1988, which begins Oct. 1, is \$101 billion.

While the government annually posts a surplus in April, the deadline for filing income tax returns, the surplus this year of \$38.7 billion was almost four times higher than last year's April surplus of \$9.9 billion.

Government receipts totaled \$172.9 billion last month, while spending totaled \$134.2 billion.

Individual income tax payments amounted to \$7.3 billion of the revenue figure, up 59 percent from a year ago. Corporate tax payments totaled \$11.2 billion, up 28 percent from April 1986.

As usual, the largest spending categories in April were the military followed by Social Security, other programs in the Department of Health and Human Services and interest on the national debt.

Military spending totaled \$2.8 billion last month and \$158.5 billion for the fiscal year so far, up 3.9 percent from the same period a year ago.

Spending for Social Security totaled \$15.4 billion last month and \$114.8 billion for the past seven months, up 1 percent from the same period in the 1986 fiscal year.

Truck wreck dumped transformers, PCBs near Fairfield

FAIRFIELD — A truck carrying transformers for Idaho Power Co. which crashed six days ago near Fairfield, spilled PCBs into a borrow pit along U.S. Highway 20, officials confirmed Thursday.

The accident site is nine miles east of Fairfield. State and federal investigations are continuing, but Idaho Power admitted Thursday that it failed to notify the trucking company that hazardous materials were being shipped.

"It was in error," said IPC spokesman Jim

Taney, referring to the truck manifest, federal laws, with fines totaling up to \$12,000, which should have listed that the shipment for each violation. His investigation is continuing.

He said the truck manifest listed only PCBs are poly-chlorinated biphenyls, materials were "drained or tested for which are commonly used in transformers, scrap."

The chemical is a suspected cancer-causing agent, particularly when inhaled as smoke and dirt from the accident site revealed 10 to 15 percent of the PCBs, which are legally high amounts of PCBs, which are suspected of causing cancer.

Preliminary clean-up efforts, undertaken with the help of 41 Idaho Power employees, were completed Sunday after the accident material on the manifest violates state and

local, brought to a Highway Department yard in Fairfield and sealed with plastic material, said Dan Kriz, environmental health specialist with the South Central District Health Department.

Kriz said that after being called to the accident at 5:20 a.m. Saturday, he was the regulatory official at the site for two days.

Bill Fruetel, of the Environmental Protection Agency, who has assisted in directing clean-up efforts, was at the accident site Thursday and not available for comment.

Health risks from the spill were not immediately available.

Kriz found the truck on its side in a "borrow pit" along the highway, with transformers spread for 100 feet in the pit, and transformer oil and diesel fuel running 30 feet downhill from the truck.

He said rain — nearly three inches in 36 hours — hampered clean-up efforts and threatened to contaminate surrounding land. He built a berm to contain the spill, but a layer of dirt from the area will still have to be removed to a chemical dump when it dries out.

Kaho Power filled a 10,000-gallon tanker truck Sunday with rain water accumulating

at the site. The water was being pumped to a nearby pond.

Warships put Hearing on automatic defense alert

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — Warships are searching their systems on automatic since the USS Stark disaster and, as one authority put it, the Persian Gulf "is not a healthy area for unidentified aircraft."

"Every pilot who comes in and doesn't hit the boys who he is likely to get a dusty answer," Maj. Bob Elliott, a spokesman for the International Institute for Strategic Studies, said by telephone from his headquarters.

The frigate Stark's Phalanx defense system was on manual Sunday night when one or more surface-skimming Exocet missiles fired by Iraqi aircraft hit it, broadside, destroying the electronic control center and killing crew members.

Officers said manual operation was a precaution against hitting the wrong target in the gulf, where Iraq and Iran have been fighting each other since September 1980 and attacking commercial shipping for more than three years.

U.S. Navy investigators arrived Wednesday to begin an inquiry expected to focus on why the Stark did not use its sophisticated defenses to shoot the missile.

Iraq said the U.S. Navy vessel was hit by mistake.

Contrast, adding it was a "source of great irritation" to learn later that Secord — the prime operative in the Iran-Contra connection — had \$2 million sitting in Swiss bank accounts. He also learned Secord was charging the Contras double his prices for some arms.

"I would prefer not to answer that," Singtaux replied. "You've answered it," Rudman said. "Thank you."

Coors told the committee that he decided he wanted to help the Contras and arranged a June 1985 meeting with Casey, a friend.

Casey's "reason was that he couldn't do anything for me along these lines but he knew a person — that could help me and that was Col. Oliver North," Coors said. "Point blank he said, 'Ollie North's the guy to see.'"

Coors said Casey immediately arranged for him to meet privately with North at the White House later that afternoon — at that meeting, Coors said, North said the Contras' greatest need was for new small

planes to replace a worn-out DC-3 that was half-way aircraft.

Coors said that after meeting North he wired \$65,000 to a Swiss bank account, whose number North had provided.

Ellen Garwood, a wealthy Austin, Texas, woman, told the hearing she gave nearly \$2 million to the Contras after North told her they "might cease to exist if the weapons are not replenished."

Later, she said, she and other contributors attended a White House

meeting with Reagan, North and Assistant Secretary of State Elliott Abrams. She said Reagan thanked the donors for their support of the Contras. But she also said there was no connection between her contribution and her invitation to the meeting.

New York oil and gas executive William O'Boyle, another contributor, who testified Thursday, said he met with conservative fund-raiser Carl Channell in Washington in the spring of 1986, and received a White House briefing from North about the Contras' problems and the potential threat to the United States from the Sandinista government in Nicaragua.

O'Boyle said he told Channell after the North briefing that he wanted to help with weapons for the anti-Sandinista Contra forces. He (Channell) said there was a small group of Americans the president wanted to help in that kind of contribution," O'Boyle said.

He also said Channell told him, "if one were to give approximately \$300,000 or more, the president would actually meet with the contributor and thank him personally, spend 15 or so minutes with him on an off-the-record kind of meeting."

O'Boyle said he sent a \$130,000 check to Channell's organization in March 1986 and later sent \$30,000 more. He said he never sought a meeting with Reagan.

Nader turns critical as festivities open

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Two hundred years ago delegates began arriving on horseback to write a Constitution for a country of fewer than 4 million people.

This weekend more than a million people, few of them in saddles, are expected to join in the festivities marking their efforts.

Monday marks the anniversary of the opening of the Constitutional Convention, and the city was preparing for a concert and fireworks display tonight to kick off a summer-long party honoring the work of George Washington, James Madison, Benjamin Franklin and other patriots in 1787.

The weekend activities feature most of the governors of the original 13 states. Vice President George Bush and retired Chief Justice Warren are expected to be more than 1 million people are expected to join in four days of celebration in the historic square mile that includes Independence Hall, the Liberty Bell, Betsy Ross' house — and the buildings where the first Congress and the first Supreme Court met. Jazz

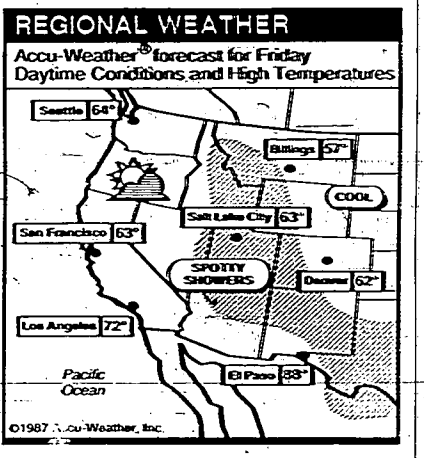
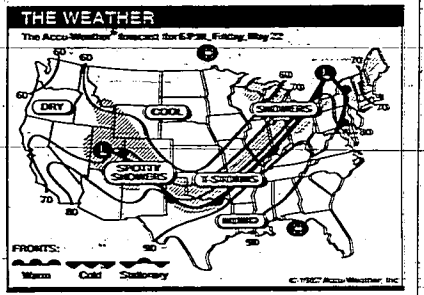

Continued from Page A1. Behind the berm that was removed because officials suspected it was contaminated with the transformers' PCB oil.

Taney said the water was brought to Boise, is being tested and will be disposed of appropriately. He added that the failure to document the shipment was "puzzling" and was being investigated.

The rain-soaked dirt will not be removed until it dries, he said. It may be delayed until after the Memorial Day holiday weekend, Haderlie said.

The transformers, sold by Idaho Power to an Idaho Falls salvage company, were transported from Boise to Idaho Falls.

Haderlie said samples taken from the transformers registered 400 parts-per-million of PCBs, which is twice the amount that should have been reported under state and federal law. Kriz said tests of dirt at the accident site registered up to 610 ppm.

Last Monday, Kriz met with officials from the Environmental Protection Agency, Idaho Power, and the Highway Department and they decided to take samples of the asphalt roadway. Those tests are still being run on asphalt in the area in anticipation of tearing up some of it.

Haderlie was finishing up two days of on-site investigations Thursday. Fruetel was also at the site, as was Idaho Power's Sherman Smith, who oversaw that company's clean-up efforts.

He brought 10 men, a backhoe, a dump truck and six metal containers Saturday to clean up the area, in addition to the tanker-truck for the water. Smith was at the site Thursday and unavailable for comment.

All the contaminated materials must be sealed before being moved to a chemical dump, Haderlie said. The owner of Rocky Mountain Supply, the trucking company chief, said the materials was out of town Thursday and could not be reached for comment.

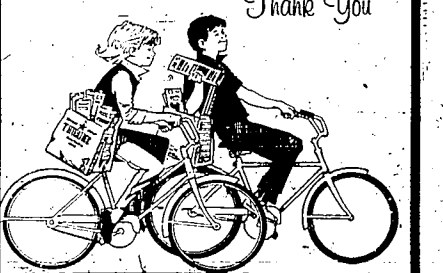

Tilt toward Iraq may bring another foreign policy debacle

WASHINGTON — The Reagan administration, by tilting toward Iraq in the Persian Gulf war without publicly spelling out why, may be signing on to another foreign policy debacle.

For the first time in the 6½-year conflict, President Reagan has identified Iraq as the villain and ordered the seven U.S. warships in the Gulf to shoot back if threatened by either Iranian or Iraqi aircraft.

But the administration has not explained how it intends to avoid getting drawn into a tit-for-tat escalation of hostilities with Tehran, or where that could lead.

If Congress and the American public would not support U.S. participation in the Gulf war, the administration could be forced to back down, an embarrassing reversal that could further dim the U.S. light in the region.

On the positive side, if Iran chooses not to accept the American challenge and curbs its attacks on Gulf shipping, Reagan could be seen as a peacemaker and champion of free

The gamble may be worth the gamble, but Reagan could make a mistake if he does not explain the risks in advance.

How would the United States respond, he was asked, if Iran did attack an American warship or a Kuwaiti tanker under the U.S. flag?

The most specific answer he could offer was, "A good deal of work is going into that."

Throughout his presidency, Reagan has sought to overcome the reluctance that Congress and the American people have shown since the end of the Vietnam War in 1972 to engage U.S. military forces overseas.

The apparently mistaken Iraqi attack on the Stark, which claimed 37 American lives, has sharpened fears of foreign entanglements.

Gary Sick, a White House aide in the Carter administration, says, "We may be pulled into a military role in the Iran-Iraq war."

"We have a role to play, to defend freedom of navigation," Sick said in a telephone interview. "But there is a political dimension. We are never going to solve the problem militarily."

He urged the administration to enlist the United Nations to help negotiate an end to the war.

Henry Schuler, a Mideast expert at the Center for Strategic and International Studies, said, "If the U.S. wants to back the Iraqis, which is what this amounts to, we should say that our intention lies in the preservation of Iraq, and that we are prepared to commit military forces to do it."

"If the going gets tough, and the administration decides they want to get out, we are going to face a disaster in the Gulf." "Before we undertake a contrivance such as this, which puts our forces in harm's way, I would hope the administration would give consideration as to whether they will have congressional and public support."

Soviets allege U.S. ship violated waters

MOSCOW (AP) — A Foreign Ministry spokesman on Thursday alleged that a U.S. nuclear-powered warship violated Soviet waters of Kamchatka peninsula twice this week and he warned such actions could have serious consequences.

Yuri Gremitskiy said the guided-missile cruiser Arkansas violated "the state border of the Soviet Union" in Avacha Bay, on the Bering Sea side of Kamchatka, on Thursday and last Sunday.

He told a news briefing that he did not know how close the vessel had come to the coast, or whether Soviet army forces had forced the Arkansas to leave waters claimed by the Soviet Union.

Gremitskiy did not say why the Arkansas had been sailing near Kamchatka, but Avacha Bay is offshore from Petropavlovsk-Kamchatsky, one of the Soviet military's biggest

bases in the Far East.

The Foreign Ministry official said the Soviets had delivered a "strong protest" to the United States over the incident.

"The American side was told that such violations could have most serious consequences, all responsibility for which would be squarely on the United States," Gremitskiy said without elaboration.

He said the Soviets had also demanded that the United States "take every essential measure" to prevent such incidents from happening in the future.

According to Jane's Fighting Ships 1987, the 515-foot-long Arkansas is equipped with Harpoon anti-ship missiles, Tomahawk cruise missiles, anti-aircraft rockets, two 5-inch guns and torpedoes.

The American warship, commissioned in October 1960, carries a crew of 2,000 officers and 438 enlisted men.

Iraqis say jet fired 2 Exocets at Stark

WASHINGTON (AP) — Iraqi defense officials have told U.S. Embassy officials the warplane that attacked the USS Stark fired two Exocet missiles at the frigate, Pentagon officials said Thursday.

The officials, who asked not to be named, said the Defense Department was not sure what to make of the Iraqi report, because the Mirage F1 fighters used by Iraq are supposed to be capable of carrying only one Exocet at a time.

"The Iraqis have told one of our people in Baghdad that there were two Exocets," said one source, adding the information had been relayed by the Iraqis to the defense attaché's office at the U.S. Embassy.

"They've been saying one plane and one pilot. Now they've said two Exocets."

"It's puzzling. (The Pentagon) doesn't want to come out and say they've said two missiles and we believe them."

The official also disclosed a team of Pentagon and State Department officials would probably depart for Baghdad by Friday night to open a joint investigation with the Iraqi

government. Earlier, a Pentagon spokesman had said the American delegation wasn't expected to leave until next week.

The report of the Iraqi statement came as U.S. military investigators were still puzzling over some of the most essential facts regarding the incident. Chief among them are the questions of how many Iraqi airplanes participated in the night-time attack, and how many and what type of missiles were fired at the American frigate.

Publicly, the Pentagon refuses to speculate, saying it won't prejudice the results of a U.S. military inquiry that began Thursday in Bahrain, where the Stark is now anchored.

"What we have said from the beginning is that there were one or two aircraft and one or two missiles," Robert Sims, the Pentagon's chief spokesman, said Thursday.

The Iraqi government has said there was only one aircraft, Sims noted, and a U.S.-crewed AWACS surveillance plane, monitoring the Persian Gulf airspace last Sunday night also tracked only one plane.

"I have no evidence that there were two," Sims added. "But it is

premature for us to speculate on range. Pentagon sources asked about the report, however, said they had no idea whether such a modification would be possible.

The skipper of the Stark, Capt. Glenn R. Brindel, indicated Wednesday his crew had been tracking what he thought was a single Iraqi warplane. Brindel said his ship was struck by two missiles.

But that, didn't answer the question of what type of missiles were used against the ship. The reason, according to Sims, the unexploded warhead recovered from the frigate was definitely that of an Exocet missile.

And according to a French defense official interviewed Thursday by The Associated Press, the French-made Iraqi fighters "absolutely could not" carry more than one Exocet missile.

"That means one of two things... That means one of two things... The Pentagon official who was asked not to be named, "Either there really were two fighters, each carrying one Exocet. Or the missile that exploded was not an Exocet."

ABC News quoted unidentified military sources Thursday as saying that the jet had been modified to carry two Exocet missiles, with one missile placed under each wing and an external fuel tank hung from the fuselage to preserve the plane's



Sailor describes ordeal after missile struck

MATTOON, Ill. (AP) — A sailor aboard the USS Stark says he passed out amid smoke and flames after a missile hit the ship, then apparently was rescued by a fellow crew member.

"He cried and screamed about how his buddies died and his ship was destroyed," said Kathy Hunter, mother of 18-year-old Steve Hunter of Mattoon.

Hunter telephoned his parents Wednesday and described what happened on board the USS Stark on Sunday when it was attacked in the Persian Gulf.

He told them he was in a small room near the back of the frigate doing some paperwork when the Exocet missile, fired by an Iraqi fighter jet, hit the ship's port side and killed 31 sailors.

"He said the entire room was engulfed in flames and he was trapped inside," Mrs. Hunter said. Crouching under a table, he grabbed an oxygen mask to keep from being overwhelmed by the smoke, but the mask ran out of oxygen and he lost consciousness, Hunter said.

"I thought I was gone," his mother quoted Hunter as saying. "Somebody must have pulled me from the ship."

Hunter suffered first-degree burns on his arms, his parents said. The incident left him "an emotional wreck," said Mrs. Hunter.

Idaho students still weak in some areas

New test scores of Idaho eighth and 11th graders show that Idaho students are improving overall skills. But between the lines, the picture isn't so good.

First, the good news. Idaho eighth graders, on average, scored barely above the 50th national percentile, up 2 points.

But by 11th grade, skills are considerably higher. At that point, Idaho students score at the 69th percentile nationally. That's up nine points in two years.

The numbers confirm an impression that the investment Idaho citizens are making in their schools is beginning to work.

The state Board of Education has increased standards and implemented a "C" Average rule. Classes are tougher. Teachers are assigning more homework. Schools are upgrading textbooks and paying more to attract better personnel.

All these changes should result in better scores. We'd be surprised if they didn't.

But the bad news is that, despite the improvements, key areas of student performance are still far from acceptable, much less exceptional.

Eighth graders, for example, are still very weak in spelling and math computation, ranking five points below the national average in spelling and eight points below in math computation. The math score actually declined from a year ago. Obviously, a real commitment needs to be made here.

In the 11th grade, scores were higher, but in math, Idaho students still were barely over the 60th percentile nationally.

The conclusion is that, while some progress has been made, this is no time for students, parents, teachers or citizens to rest on past accomplishments.

Students need to be reminded that, yes, school is hard work. But so is life. If America is going to lead the world in the 21st century, we cannot do it with a society of illiterates. The bottom line, young people, is that life mostly gives you back what you earn.

Parents should remember that firm support is still the best tried-and-true way to help children learn. A home environment in which ideas and education are appreciated is still the most important ingredient for a student's success. Turning off the television isn't a bad idea, either.

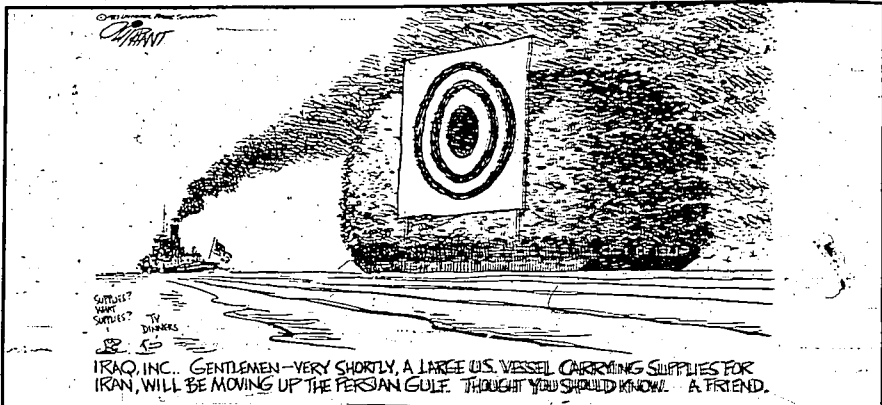
Many teachers say they want students to be able to "compete," but some don't always want the same standard applied in their own ranks.

Career ladder plans; special incentives to attract good people into the teaching profession and particularly into hard-to-fill teaching fields like math; and greater accountability for what students learn would all help raise the professional standards of teaching.

For citizens, more and closer monitoring of educational achievement is essential. It is not enough for Idahoans to simply throw money at educational problems. We all have a right to expect increases in performance, of which test scores are one measure.

Citizens in every district in Idaho have a right to individual scores for their schools, which they can compare to state and national standards.

The latest test scores suggest that Idaho schools are improving. Let's all work to keep them on that track.



U.S., allies should try to end Gulf war

The attack on the USS Stark graphically demonstrates once again the chilling effectiveness of modern sea-skimming anti-ship missiles.

In May 1982, during the Falklands war, the British destroyer Sheffield was crippled in an attack by an Exocet missile launched by the Argentine air force. The extent of the damage to the Sheffield by a single missile raised the question of the viability of deploying expensive surface ships that can be so effectively neutralized.

But the attack on the Stark, as it patrolled the Persian Gulf, also raises questions about U.S. policy in that part of the world, and whether any long-term plan has ever existed. The American public's shock and outrage over the incident is only compounded by a sense of bewilderment as to why ships are even in a high risk area without any apparent clearly defined goals.

The administration's Middle East policy and America's image in the region have been dealt significant setbacks over the last three years.

The withdrawal of U.S. Marines from Lebanon after suffering major casualties to no apparent purpose did a great deal to cast doubt on President Reagan's foreign-policy objectives. The Iran-Contra affair has only added to the sense of confusion among America's friends and allies in the region, such as Kuwait and Saudi Arabia, who view any expansion of the Iran-Iraq war as a distinct threat to their own internal stability. It is against this background that the attack on the Stark has to be examined.

The public has every right to be outraged at the attack on a U.S. Navy vessel by seemingly friendly aircraft. But there have been U.S. Navy vessels in the Persian Gulf for the last 40 years. To withdraw U.S. ships as a result of this incident would only serve to cripple America's prestige further in both the Persian Gulf and the Middle East, and deprive the chances of ever bringing any type of lasting peace to the area.

The Reagan administration must exercise both caution and resolve in carrying out its duties in the Persian Gulf. Parity that results must include clear-cut policy objectives. The president has taken the right step by informing both sides that any plane showing hostile intent toward a U.S. vessel now will be subject to that vessel's defensive measures. But it would be a mistake to dramatically increase the U.S. naval presence within the narrow geographic confines of the Persian Gulf. Greater militarization of those waters is not the right step.

U.S. Navy vessels have a significant array of on-board defense weapons to protect themselves. Why the Stark did not respond to the incoming missiles should be left to a board of inquiry to determine, not to speculation. Should it be discovered, however, that the on-board systems failed to operate as necessary, then immediate steps must be taken to discover why. Any ship so vulnerable to such an attack, but if the systems failed to operate for any reason, that would cast serious doubt on any U.S. warship's ability to defend itself.

American ships have a right to be in the Persian Gulf to protect vital U.S. interests and to help ensure the freedom of navigation in international waters. The United States also has the right to ask for at least a token American presence from its West European allies and Japan, who import a far greater volume of oil from the region than the United States does.

While U.S. oil imports from the area are far lower than those of its allies, a closure of the Persian Gulf would have dramatic economic consequences for everyone.

An active foreign policy is not risk-free, and the United States should not retreat in the face of what appears to be an isolated incident. In the past nine months, Iraqi aircraft have flown more than 300 missions launching 90 anti-ship missiles, 40 of which have hit targets such as tankers and radar reflectors, or land-based targets on the Iranian side of the Persian Gulf. Some of these firings were against U.S. merchant or Navy vessels.

Thus it would appear that the attack was indeed an unfortunate accident, and the quickness of Iraq's apology seems to underscore that explanation. Yet that in no way excuses what happened. Iraqi aircraft possess a deadly capability with air-launched Exocet and laser-guided missiles. Their pilots should clearly identify their targets first and not just randomly fire at a blip on the radar screen that is perceived to be a hostile target.

In trying to take a neutral stance in such a precarious war, the United States is faced with an almost imponderable set of options. It cannot ignore its duties to the international community, especially when requests for assistance come from nations like Kuwait.

The United States is a global naval power; it cannot and must not retreat from its commanding position on the high seas.

But the Reagan administration should, along with the allies in the region and the industrialized nations of the world, attempt to bring about a diplomatic end to the Iran-Iraq war — and without a heightened military presence, which surely would drag the United States deeper into the conflict.

Defense lessons will arrive through mail slot

BOSTON — Imagine for a minute that you are a citizen of Australia. Population: 16 million. Number of AIDS cases: 412.

Turn on the telly down under and you'll be greeted with a government-sponsored ad that shows the Grim Reaper knocking down AIDS victims as if they were pins in a bowling alley.

Imagine next that you are a citizen of Great Britain. Population 55 million. AIDS cases: 750. Just last January, the postman would have dropped you a leaflet from the government. One that warned: "AIDS: Don't Die of Ignorance."

But what if you are a citizen of the United States? Population 243 million. AIDS cases: 35,500. If so, you have seen no federally sponsored television ads and received no national mailings.

Indeed, in all likelihood you have heard more from Washington about AIDS fears than AIDS facts.

In our nation's capital, AIDS and information, health and education go together about as well as the Surgeon General and the Secretary of Education, C. Everett Koop and William J. Bennett. The people who regard AIDS as a medical disease and those who regard it as a moral dilemma have fought each other and progress to a standstill.

The proposal for a mailing to every

household is currently stuck in a holding pattern. The piddling \$1 million that's slated for national television ads has yet to find its way to an ad agency. The federal government is dealing with AIDS as if the virus was a problem that didn't travel along interstate highways and was none of its business.

It's this lethal national inertia in the face of the most devastating epidemic of the late 20th century that finally prompted one congressman to strike out on his own.

Gerry Studds has begun to treat his constituents like foreigners — in the best way. The 268,000 households in his congressional district of Massachusetts are about to receive the first mass mailing of the "Surgeon General's Report on Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome."

Rep. Studds' unique action came out of deep frustration — his own and that of Koop, who authored the report that's been languishing since its fall publication. "When I talked with Koop," said Studds, "he was despairing of ever getting a national mailing

of this administration.

Furthermore, if we did get one out of this bunch of ideologues, it would probably be such mush it wouldn't be worth mailing.

"Given the fact that the only defense we have against AIDS at the moment is public education, I can't understand how there is any debate in any rational mind about putting the best information in the hands of people. I think its unconscionable, criminally negligent. I get so angry I'm out of adjectives."

Studds asked himself if there wasn't something one member of Congress could do besides dream up new adjectives of outrage.

"It occurred to me that we have one tool that is uniquely ours. The franking privilege." It's the way that elected representatives routinely mail newsletters to each "postal patron" in their district, at taxpayers' expense.

The report that each postal patron in the New Bedford and Cape Cod area will get has been alternately described as "frank" or "explicit." It doesn't have sippy copy or catchy phrases. It is not a graphic designer's delight. It is not a reader-grabber. It's simply likely to be as effective as a serious and hip television campaign.

But the report does answer basic questions about AIDS in an intelligible and direct

fashion. Is even that likely to be a problem? "Someone asked me," says Studds, "what if it's lying around the house and you read it? Well, I hope they do."

Studds' willingness to take on the AIDS education issue and to put forth with this mailing may come in part from his own open identification with the gay community.

But he is convinced that others underestimate the public's willingness to accept the "frank" and the "explicit."

His aim is not just to inform one district, but to break the federal logjam. The postage around it, Studds says, sends a letter to his congressional colleagues asking that they follow suit. If only 50 or 60 of the 435 members do so, the pressure will build for a national mailing.

On June 5, it will be exactly six years since the first report of the disease was now called AIDS. Since then, the Surgeon General has said repeatedly that "our only weapon is education."

But the administration has spent most of this time fighting about AIDS, instead of fighting the disease itself. Now at least some New Englanders will be getting their defense lessons through the mail slot.

Tennessee question displays depth of Reagan's Iran crisis

WASHINGTON — President Reagan went to Chattanooga, Tenn., with a speech saying people in Washington "spend a lot of time worrying about a lot of things that are only important to them."

Presumably, the Iran-Contra affair is one of those things. Then Reagan ran into a Tennessee reporter who asked him a question few, if any, Washington journalists have had the gall to bring up: Was he considering resigning if it turned out he had done anything illegal?

The president didn't answer the question,

repeating instead his assertions that he has not violated any laws.

The fact the question was asked illustrates how difficult it is for Reagan to get away from the crisis that has dogged his administration since November.

He tried it on May 10 in Tuskegee, Ala., telling inquiring reporters, "Let's, just for a few moments, decide that there is enough controversy and we'll leave it in Washington for today."

The questions kept coming, however, not

only from the capital press corps but from Southeastern reporters with whom he met in Washington last Friday.

At one point, Reagan was even reduced to answering a question in the subjunctive. On May 12, facing reporters before going into a closed session with Republican congressional leaders, he was asked if he had personally solicited funds for the rebels from Saudi Arabia or other countries.

"I'm not going to answer any questions on those things until this is over," he said. But he added, "If I were going to answer any questions, I'd say no."

In Chattanooga on Tuesday, the president said, "The only thing about which I have no answer is the apparent funds in the Swiss

bank accounts supposedly that came from our shipment of arms to Iran."

If the meetings with out-of-town reporters were aimed at diverting attention to other matters than the one that has preoccupied the White House press corps, they didn't seem to work.

With reporters last Friday in Washington he opened up with statements on the budget and his "Star Wars" missile defense program, but didn't get a single question about either. All the questions except one were related to the Iran-Contra affair.

In Chattanooga, he got a reprieve, although hardly of a kind he or any president would welcome. The Tennessee reporters focused on the Iran attack on the U.S.

frigate Stark that killed 37 American sailors. They asked only one Iran-Contra question.

It was a zinger, though. Noting that House and Senate investigating committees had just resumed their joint hearings, a reporter asked, "If there is any evidence down the road that you did do something illegal, is there any consideration whatsoever of resigning, if it turns out that something was done illegally on your part?"

"Well, I have to tell you, I know absolutely that I did nothing illegal," the president replied.

Today, Reagan will join in a memorial service for the fallen sailors of the Stark at Mayport Naval Station in Florida.

Policy on disease to be debated Reagan favors AIDS tests for marriages, immigrants

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, appearing to side with conservatives advocating mandatory testing for AIDS, was said Thursday to "look favorably" on tests for marriage-license applicants and immigrants to the United States.

White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater said the issue of mandatory testing for Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome will be debated next week at a meeting of Reagan's Domestic Policy Council and the panel's recommendations will be sent to the president.

Reagan has branded the disease America's "public health enemy No. 1," and he is scheduled to appear at an AIDS benefit with actress Elizabeth Taylor on May 31.

Fitzwater, asked about Reagan's stand on testing, said, "There is a general leaning in favor of testing under those circumstances... where you already have mandatory tests for contagious diseases and the two most prominent examples are marriage licenses and immigration."

The testing question is a matter of heated debate among officials as the administration is attempting to forge a response to the deadly disease. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop has opposed testing, arguing it would be expensive and ineffective, driving victims of disease into hiding or subjecting them to discrimination. Education Secretary William Bennett has voiced the approach of some conservatives in the administration of testing among marriage applicants, immigrants, hospital patients and prisoners.

On Capitol Hill, the Senate voted 63-32 Thursday against an amendment sponsored by Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., that would have called for mandatory testing of immigrants and marriage license applicants. At the same time, the Senate approved 74 to 21 another measure to provide \$30 million for treatment of 3,000 AIDS patients with the drug AZT.

Fitzwater said Reagan has made no decision on the matter—and that he had not heard the president express a specific position, but he believed he understood Reagan's thinking on the matter.

"I think the president is concerned for the health of the population and testing for issues like marriage licenses and immigration is something he would probably look favorably on at this time, yes," Fitzwater said.

He said Reagan "feels this is a very serious disease and health problem and should be considered from this standpoint."

"When you have a number of contagious diseases where there is mandatory testing — such as syphilis and tuberculosis and a number of other diseases where mandatory testing is required — such as immigration purposes or marriage licenses and so forth, there is a very real bias in favor of testing for AIDS under those circumstances as well," Fitzwater said.

Immigrants seeking resident status already have their blood tested for a variety of diseases, and also are required to undergo examination by a doctor.

For the most part, Reagan has stayed out of the argument among his advisers, which also touches on whether information about AIDS should be included in sex education programs in schools. The president has said that any such instruction should emphasize values and the advantages of abstinence.

Fitzwater, asked about reports that Reagan had been critical of Koop and officials of the Center for Disease Control, said, "We have no problem with the comments of the Surgeon General or the CDC in this matter. They have done an outstanding job."

The spokesman noted that while the immigration matter was one of federal jurisdiction, the question of marriage licenses falls to the states, and that the White House discussion on that point is "yet to come."

Each of the 500,000 or so immigrants applying for permanent resident status in the United States each year would be tested for the AIDS virus under a public health service recommendation made public last week.

Such a requirement, if adopted, would not apply to tourists or visitors not used to deny a temporary visa to a foreign citizen seeking treatment for AIDS.

Relaxation on experimental drugs places burden on firms

WASHINGTON (AP) — The final version of a federal regulation designed to make experimental drugs more readily available to people with AIDS and other life-threatening diseases places additional burdens on drug companies to demonstrate the safety and effectiveness of the new medicine.

The rule issued Thursday, fine-tuning a tentative regulation published in March, contains other changes that will tend to make it more difficult than originally proposed for experimental drugs to win approval for sale.

The final rule, which takes effect in 30 days, follows the intent of the March proposal by establishing a new category of Phase and Drug Administration approval that will give dying patients wider access than ever before to promising, yet unproven, new drugs.

Both the original and revised versions spell out that such approval is available only for those with fatal illnesses for which no proven effective treatment is available, and who are likely to die within a year without some treatment.

Although there was wide support for the compassionate intent of such an approach, the original proposal came under attack from many doctors and researchers on two basic grounds:

Doctors said it would have required the FDA to approve sale of experimental drugs unless the agency could prove the drug was dangerous and ineffective, even if only scanty scientific evidence was available on which to make a judgment.

Researchers said approving experimental drugs for sale would leave an incentive for seriously ill patients to volunteer for clinical trials in which some of them would be given the experimental drug and others a placebo. In such tests, none of the patients know whether they are receiving medicine or a substance with no medical value.

The revised rule spells out that the company seeking approval for an ex-

perimental drug must submit enough scientific data for the FDA commissioner to make a reasoned decision on the safety and effectiveness of the drug.

A new section says the approval may be denied or withdrawn unless the drug company has and maintains clinical trials to further study the drug's safety and effectiveness.

FDA Commissioner Frank Young said in a telephone interview he was pleased with the final rule, which he described as a "modification to make a stronger, more effective... clearer regulation."

Rep. Ted Weiss, D-N.Y., chairman of the House Governmental Operations human resources subcommittee, joined several witnesses — including government researchers and former FDA officials — in criticizing the original proposal during an April 29 hearing.

Weiss was particularly critical of the Office of Management and Budget, saying the White House agency had overridden Young's recommendations "for more safeguards in the original proposal."

Soviet probes to sit on, hop over Phobos

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Two Soviet spacecraft orbiting Mars in 1988 will send a probe to sit down with bumpers on the moon Phobos, and another to hop over the moon's surface, a Soviet scientist said Thursday.

The two main unmanned spacecraft will be launched within a few days of each other on June 20, 1988 during a 400-day mission, said Vladimir Linkin, a laboratory director at the Soviet Institute for Space Research in Moscow. They are to arrive near Mars in April 1989 to send out the first probe. The second probe is to be sent to the moon several months after that, Linkin said.

Activist derides plan to sell planes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress should turn down the administration's proposal to sell F-5 fighters to Honduras because the Central American nation doesn't need the jets, a Senate committee was told Thursday.

The sale is a "provocative act" designed to goad the leftist Sandinista government of neighboring Nicaragua into obtaining high performance planes from the Soviets, said Victor Johnson, representing the Inter-American Dialogue.

The organization is a private group which has been critical of the administration's Central America

policy. Johnson's assessment came in testimony to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

The administration last week announced its intention to sell Honduras a dozen F-5 jets from surplus Air Force stocks. The planes would go to a nation which has become a key staging ground for U.S. military maneuvers, particularly near the Honduras-Nicaragua border.

Honduras has also been the main staging area for the U.S.-backed "contra" guerrillas who are trying to overthrow Nicaragua's government.

Resolutions to block the sale have been introduced in both the House and Senate. For the deal to be halted, both chambers would have to pass the resolutions within 30 days.

Sen. Claiborne Pell, D-R.I., chairman of the committee, said he was "very concerned about the escalation that the sale could provoke."

"I am worried that the Nicaraguan government would use the sale to further justify their acquisition of MIGs from the Soviets," Pell said. "There is also the prospect that El Salvador, the traditional adversary of Honduras, might want to acquire similar aircraft."

Former aide denies profit from contract

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former White House aide said Thursday he "never received one penny" from Wedtech Corp. and wanted to help the defense contractor get a \$32-million no-bid contract solely to boost employment in the poverty-stricken South-Bronx section of New York City.

Henry Zuniga conceded in an interview that his efforts on the company's behalf five years ago might have violated the payola law, but he said the White House boss, Elizabeth Dole, against becoming involved in the awarding of individual government contracts.

But he said the Wedtech contract was "an unusual situation involving a minority contractor. It would have been an exception to the policy. I considered a service to help provide jobs" in an area that needed them "so badly."

Zuniga worked for Mrs. Dole's public liaison office at the White House in 1981 and 1982, but he said he didn't tell her of his efforts to assist the company.

Retirement board awaits first report from trust manager

BOISE (AP) — The Public Employees Retirement Board gets its first report next week from a controversial new trust manager.

Board member Fred Radd, an executive of Albertsons, Inc., told a legislative committee Thursday the report from the Frank Russell Trust Co., Tacoma, Wash., will be presented to the board at its meeting on Wednesday.

Radd said the report will specify fees being charged by the Washington company to manage Idaho's \$1.1 billion public employees trust fund.

Radd appeared before a legislative committee on personnel matters at the request of chairman Sen. Phil Batt, R-Idaho.

Radd said he doesn't agree with a decision by the board before he was appointed to hire an outside trust manager for the trust funds. "I represent a different school of thought," he said, later describing himself as "The new kid on the block" on the board.

Gov. Cecil Andrus also didn't agree with the board's decision to send the trust funds out of state.

After he was elected in November, Andrus asked the board to delay the change until at least after he was inaugurated, to allow more study. The board went ahead with its plans to hire Frank Russell Trust as the trust manager.

Andrus appointed Radd to the board, and informed Chairman Maria Eshchen, Boise, that she will not be re-appointed when her term ends July 1. There are five members on the board.

Radd said he doesn't like the idea of turning everything over to an out-of-state manager. "I'm more comfortable with a hands-on approach with the board making decisions," he said.

He likened the Frank Russell Trust Co. to a general contractor, hiring subcontractors for specific jobs.

"I think the board should be the contractor and hire the subs (investment managers)," he said.

Radd said his preliminary study of fees charged by Frank Russell Trust indicated they were a bit high. Robert Venn, executive director for the board, said Frank Russell runs continuous performance checks, and the state has hired an independent company to do the same thing. The state agency also does its own performance comparisons, he said.

Venn said the first-quarter performance of Frank Russell Trust probably will be low, because of the losses associated with shifting assets to a new manager.

Stallings pressing for collider funding

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, on Thursday urged a House committee to approve preliminary funding for the proposed superconducting super collider research project.

Idaho is among many states trying to land the research project for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory. Its estimated cost is \$4.4 billion, and the project would provide thousands of construction and operating jobs.

Idaho is spending \$400,000 preparing its bid for the project.

Stallings urged the House Water and Energy Development Committee to approve \$25 million for continuing research and development on SSC and \$10 million for preliminary construction.

Stallings said he will oppose an amendment to the Department of Energy authorization bill allowing a five-month extension of the site proposal schedule. The current schedule calls for site reports to be submitted by August but the delay would postpone the deadline until the end of December.

Stallings said the site selection process as announced by the Department of Energy in April provides "an open and competitive process which should ensure fair and equitable treatment to all interested states."

Tribes will appeal employment ruling

FORT HALL (AP) — Shoshone-Bannock tribal officials say they will appeal U.S. District Judge Marlon Callister's decision to temporarily lift a tribal court's order barring FMC Corp. from hiring non-Indians for jobs on the Fort Hall Indian Reservation.

"We are prepared to fight this issue all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court," Arnold Appenay, a member of the Fort Hall Business Council, said Thursday. He accused FMC of discriminating against Indians in its hiring practices.

"It's the kind of discrimination that comes off the bathroom walls," Appenay said. "It's an attitude of 'Indians and dogs keep off the grass.'"

The tribes contend FMC has not hired enough Indian employees for its operations on the reservation. The company extracts elemental phosphorus from Fort Hall's Gay Mine for use at its fertilizer manufacturing plant.

Marvin Osborne, another business council member, said Callister's

decision will affect not only the jurisdiction of the Shoshone-Bannocks but all Indians nationwide.

Callister on Tuesday invalidated two restraining orders issued by the Shoshone-Bannock tribal court, pending FMC's appeal to the tribal appeals court. The mid-April orders prohibiting any new hiring were amended on May 1 to restrain FMC only from hiring workers for temporary, entry-level or clerical jobs.

At a Thursday news conference, tribal leaders said Callister's ruling was misguided and ignored federal laws requiring that all avenues be exhausted in tribal courts before turning over cases involving Indian issues to the federal courts.

The restraining orders were issued for two alleged FMC violations of the Shoshone-Bannocks' Tribal Employment Rights Ordinance, said Tammy Trahan, TERO director for the tribes. Officials alleged FMC

was hiring non-Indians to fill the temporary employee pool and that it chose a non-Indian subcontractor over a qualified Indian company for some work on the reservation. FMC argued that it was meeting TERO guidelines and could not violate union agreements.

"FMC unfairly tried to smear the tribal court," Shoshone-Bannock leaders said Thursday in a prepared statement. "The tribal court is as competent as any in the nation to rule on this issue."

Callister's ruling allowed the company to begin filling a number of jobs.

"We are opening up bids today,"

Harvey Herbert, FMC resident manager, has argued that TERO applies only to hiring for the company's temporary employee pool, not for permanent jobs.

Tribal officials disagreed.

"Any person with any common sense would think that a company the size of FMC, which utilizes the resources of the reservation would not resist further employment of qualified tribal members," the tribes' statement said.

"Our thyme is your thyme!"

3 Idahoans lose lives in crash

CODY, Wyo. (AP) — Federal investigators spent Thursday afternoon picking through the wreckage of a twin-engine plane that crashed and burned while attempting to land at its destination.

Authorities still had not positively identified the Idaho men who perished in Wednesday evening's crash, although their relatives had been informed of their deaths. Park County Sheriff Dan Hodge said.

The Idaho Falls Post-Register reported that it had learned the victims were John Chaffin, Stephen Burggraf and Gary E. Cain, all of Idaho Falls. The three were en route to Cody from Idaho Falls to bid on a Wyoming Highway Department construction project.

Chaffin, 49, was president and general manager of Chaffin Oldsmobile, Inc.; the 41-year-old Cain was project manager, corporate secretary-treasurer and part owner of Robert V. Burggraf Co. Inc.; and Burggraf, 37, was corporate vice-president and part-owner of the Burggraf Co. Inc., the newspaper reported.

While the Park County coroner worked Thursday afternoon on identifying the bodies, National Transportation and Safety Board investigator Greg Feith examined the wreckage.

Feith planned to use the help of representatives from the companies that manufactured the airplane and its engine in his investigation.

The turbo-prop plane crashed about three-quarters of a mile east of the runway about 5:30 p.m. Wednesday while the pilot was making a second approach to F.E. Faust Regional Airport, according to airport manager Al Vanderpool.

"The aircraft burst into flames upon impact, witnesses said. There were snow squalls at the time of the crash, but Vanderpool said pilots have landed under similar conditions in the past.

Boise teachers win 6% pay increase

BOISE (AP) — Boise School District teachers will get a 6 percent salary hike next year as part of a two-year contract unanimously ratified by the Boise School Board.

The Boise Education Association membership approved the contract Tuesday by a vote of 680 to 240, BEA President Sam Snider said, but results were not released until after the board ratified the agreement Wednesday.

The contract will be in effect from September 1987 through August 1989.

Convictions lost

BOISE (AP) — The drug convictions of a Boundary County couple have been overturned by the Idaho Supreme Court, which ruled that the judge involved should have disqualified himself before trial.

Robert and Sara Schaffer were convicted in separate cases of possession of an illegal drug with intent to deliver.

The Supreme Court, in a unanimous decision released Thursday, agreed with their appeal argument that 1st District Judge Walt Prather should have disqualified himself.

Briefly

Fiji chiefs support colonel

SUVA, Fiji (AP) — The colonel who led a coup to assure dominance for native Fijians got support from the paramount chiefs Thursday. Ethnic Indians, a slight majority of the population, stayed home and locked their doors.

Fijians danced in streets that a day earlier were the scene of riots in which gangs of young Fijians chased down and beat about 50 Indians.

When the Great Council of Chiefs adjourned its meeting, a Fiji military band played the popular rugby song "Who Wants to Challenge Me?" Some of the chiefs danced with girls from the crowd in the park outside the meeting hall.

It was the second day in session for the chiefs without reaching a compromise with the governor general, Ratu Sir Penalia Ganilau. He serves as the representative of Queen Elizabeth II and has opposed the week-old coup by Lt. Col. Sitiveni Rabuka.

Lt. Eroni Volavola, spokesman for the 2,000-man army, told reporters a compromise was close and would be announced Friday.

Arson suspected in clinic fire

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — A clinic founded by black activist Winnie Mandela was destroyed by fire Thursday in a small town where she was banished for eight years. Police said arson was suspected.

Mrs. Mandela, wife of jailed African National Congress leader Nelson Mandela, told reporters she believed the fire was set in retaliation for her anti-apartheid activities.

The government has blamed ANC guerrillas for the blasts, which killed three white policemen and injured 15 people outside a Johannesburg courthouse.

The clinic is in the black section of Brandfort, a town in Orange Free State province. Mrs. Mandela was banished there from 1977 to 1985 because of her anti-apartheid activities.

The African National Congress, the main guerrilla group fighting to end white-minority domination and apartheid in South Africa, said Thursday it did not know who was responsible for the car bombings.

Tom Sebina — chief spokesman at the ANC's headquarters in Lusaka, Zambia — said the organization had not been informed about the blasts by its units in South Africa, as would usually happen if the ANC was responsible.

Jewish settlers bury slain boy

KARNEI SHOMRON, Occupied West Bank (AP) — Thousands of weeping Jewish settlers on Thursday buried an 8-year-old Israeli boy who had been beaten to death and his body left in a cave near his home.

Army officials said the investigation focused on Palestinian residents of the area; but they did not report any arrests. The army put three nearby Arab villages under curfew and interrogated all male residents.

Crying relatives surrounded the grave of the boy, Itami Chaba. His mother Ruti demanded that his killers be sentenced to death.

Tensions between Jewish settlers and Palestinians in the occupied West Bank have increased since last month when a firebomb attack killed a pregnant Jewish woman and settlers responded by rampaging through a nearby Arab town.

Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir, Foreign Minister Shimon Peres and other political leaders expressed outrage over Thursday's slaying.

Cambodians recall massacres

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — Cambodians burned incense and sang haunting songs to honor the dead as they held their annual "Day of Hate" to recall the massacres committed by the Khmer Rouge.

About 5,000 people on Wednesday crowded into the courtyard of Tuol Sleng, a high school which the Khmer Rouge converted into a grisly extermination center during its 1975-79 reign of terror. The government says about 20,000 people were tortured and executed there.

Cambodia's top leaders, including Prime Minister Hun Sen, placed wreaths at the foot of a Buddhist funerary shrine erected at the center of the courtyard.

Communist Party Politburo member Math Iu claimed that 3.3 million people perished during the 3 years, 8 months and 20 days of "sorrow, horror and holocaust" under the Khmer Rouge. Others put the number killed at hundreds of thousands and up.

Witness links Barbie, roundup

LYON, France (AP) — Gestapo chief Klaus Barbie personally directed a roundup of Jews in France on Feb. 9, 1943, that eventually led to the execution of 44 people, Michel Thomas, a naturalized American, testified Thursday.

Thomas, 73, a Polish-born member of the French Resistance who later worked for the U.S. Army Counterintelligence Corps in Germany, spoke on the ninth day of Barbie's trial for crimes against humanity.

"There is not the slightest doubt that it was Klaus Barbie who personally directed the roundup at Rue St. Catherine," said Thomas of New York.

He is the only witness so far to place Barbie at the scene of the Gestapo raid at the Lyon headquarters of the General Union of the Intellectuals of France. The organization was created to help Jews during the German occupation of France in World War II.

In a related development Thursday, a 43-year-old man who said he went to St. Joseph's prison in Lyon two days ago to kill Barbie, was charged with illegal possession of arms and carrying false identity papers.

Hostages accused of spy tie

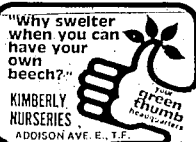
BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Turner, 39, of Boise, Idaho, Robert Pothlitz, 54, of New York City, and Americans and an Indian claimed Mithalshwar Singh, 60, an Indian Thursday their hostages were in, who has legal resident status in the United States.

Their captors have offered "to a statement from the group entitled "Liberation of Palestine, said it awaited "the completion of this information and the necessary measures to take the adequate action, to bring the four to reckoning and announce the outcome of the investigation."

The two-page handwritten statement in Arabic was delivered to the Beirut newspaper An Nahar with a photograph of American hostage Alan Steen. The kidnappers released earlier this year that Steen was dying.

He and the others were abducted Jan. 24 from the U.S.-affiliated Beirut University College in Moslem west Beirut, where they were on the faculty.

Steen, 48, is from Boston, Mass. Kidnapped with him were Jesse

Economic push

Commerce chief vows business growth this year

TWIN FALLS — Jim Hawkins is not waffling on the prospects for Idaho's economic development. "We're going to have results for you this year," the director of the Idaho Department of Commerce promises without hesitation.

Hawkins says several new — but as yet unnamed — businesses will open or expand in the near future in Idaho. They could bring as many as 400 new jobs.

An economically enlightened Idaho Legislature doubled department funding for the current fiscal year and then quadrupled it for the year beginning in July.

Hawkins is studying a newly hired staff for action, and he has headed into the Idaho countryside himself to

mobilize community leaders. Instead of issuing orders, he's taking orders for a long-term strategy to develop the state's economy.

Economic development starts at home, he tells his audiences. So, "The state should not tell you what to do," he says.

Hawkins was preaching the gospel of economic harmony Thursday as he spoke to Magic Valley business leaders at a breakfast meeting of the Greater Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce. "I want to be on your team!" he said.

Instead of searching separately, private businesses and government must collect their wits and hunt for development prospects together,

says Hawkins, who himself was recruited from private business by Gov. Cecil Andrus.

"You cannot have duplication; you

cannot have fragmentation," he says. "If I do not know what you're doing, it could be a problem."

Hawkins spent part of Thursday morning gathering economic development ambitions from local Chamber officials and from business boosters from other parts of the Magic Valley.

His strategic plan will direct future efforts to market Idaho products and spark business growth. The department plans to increase its meager programs to attract tourists, promote Idaho sites for moviemaking, enhance business climates in the state's communities, and seek out international trade.

In fiscal 1988, the agency will have \$1.76 million to spend from state revenues, more than five times the original 1987 budget of \$343,000, Hawkins says.

It also will conduct the state's \$300,000 bid to locate the giant Superconducting Super Collider at Idaho National Engineering Laboratory near Arco. The giant machine, designed to research the basic structure of matter, could bring thousands of jobs.

"We meet all of the criteria," Hawkins says. If the U.S. Department of Energy selects solely on the facts, he expects Idaho to beat out states spending tens of millions of dollars. "If that happens, we are on the short list, and we will be the finalist," he says.

Hawkins echoes optimism in other areas. What others call liabilities, he terms "opportunities for improvement."

He sees Idaho's small, dispersed

population as an economic advantage, not a weakness. "We can move Idaho National Engineering Laboratory near Arco," Hawkins says, and Idahoans are talking about economic development.

Magic Valley economic groups already are moving in the same direction, "cons ahead" of some other areas, he says.

But, despite promises of economic results on the horizon, Hawkins stops short of promising immediate transformation of the state's economy. "You cannot solve economic development in a year," he says.

Instead, Hawkins says he's looking for a long-term commitment to Idaho's economy from both the public and private sectors.

Lawmakers ought to help boost profits — IACI president

TWIN FALLS — The pursuit of profits for Idaho businesses should drive the state's lawmakers as they search for ways to bolster the economy, the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry says.

"Hobbled by a not very vibrant economy," businesses statewide need incentives to relocate here, to invest here, to retool here," IACI President Greg Casey said this week at speeches in Twin Falls.

In the next six months, the business lobbying group will prepare legislation designed to aid businesses in boosting their profits, the executive said.

IACI now is starting to gather ideas for an economic offensive that will concentrate on tax policies and "capital formation" programs.

"There is a great void out there in venture capital," Casey said. "Financial institutions have dollars to lend, but many small and medium-sized companies cannot obtain it."

Casey balked at what he called "bank bashing," instead advocating cooperation between the private and public sectors in making dollars available for emerging and expanding businesses.

Casey also spoke at gatherings of both the Twin Falls Rotary Club and a leadership

training seminar sponsored by the Greater Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce, said lawmakers should remember the underlying source of the state's wealth.

"Government programs to stimulate the economy can't replace the essence of prosperity," Casey said. "For Idaho to achieve prosperity, we have got to have companies making a profit."

With population decreasing, growth of business is essential. "The only way to fund that level of (state government) services, is to have a growing tax base," he said. Corporate profits turn into capital available for expansions and into tax base.

Tax savers also stoke the bottom line, he

said. Some states, such as Colorado, are considering expanding — instead of repealing — their investment tax credits to help spur business development, Casey said.

IACI and other business interests beat back a bid to repeal the investment tax credit during the 1987 legislative session.

Casey also identified improvements in the capital-gains tax laws and, in a later interview, broadening the sales tax base as measures which could stimulate development and revenue.

He said the Legislature should not return to "the taxes we raised this year" in next session to generate revenue. Expanding the sales tax base was one of the "only

places to go and remain relatively revenue neutral."

Nevertheless, this year's Legislature moved ahead in several ways favorable to business. Ranking high among them was greatly increased funding for the Idaho Department of Commerce, Casey said.

"We have had a very anemic Department of Commerce funding level, and the Legislature has seen fit to increase that funding level," said Casey with approval. The Legislature also poured enough money into education — at some expense to business and industry — to adequately fund the state's schools and universities, he said.

Base teacher pay in Buhl rises 5.3%

BUHL — Buhl teachers will receive a 5.3 percent increase in the base salary paid to beginning teachers next year under a new salary package approved Tuesday.

The increase will bring the base salary of the district to \$15,000, meeting the minimum salary recommended by the state Legislature this winter.

"We not only satisfied legislative intent, but the Buhl School District will not have an override," said Superintendent Gus Spiropoulos.

The head of the Buhl Education Association said he felt good about the decision.

"We felt very positive about it," President Charles Humphries said. "We think we're trying to get the same place — to benefit the kids, to benefit the students."

The raises will cost the school \$95,000 next year. Spiropoulos estimated the school will receive an income increase of about \$148,000 next year.

The extra income not used for teacher raises will be divided between administrative personnel salaries and new operational costs.

Spiropoulos said \$55,000 of that extra \$148,000 will come from increased property taxes and about \$93,000

from increased state support.

The school set up raises on a 2.5 by 2.5 index. That means that one year's experience will bring a teacher a 2.5 percent raise. In addition, 15 credits of outside courses, if approved by the board, will advance a teacher 2.5 percent on the salary schedule.

Humphries said he would have rather gotten a 3 by 3 index on salary advancements, but that teachers "have to recognize there are limitations as to what we could get."

The teachers also asked unsuccessfully to reduce the number of years between the lowest end of the salary schedule to the top from 15 years to 12 years.

Eugene Clemens, the head negotiator for the Buhl Education Association, also said he would have preferred seeing the increments increase, but the package overall was realistic and responsible.

"I'm really pleased we were able to settle," said Spiropoulos. "We got a good package for teachers, the school and the community."

"The School Board and I personally feel gratified we were able to settle in such a timely fashion," he said. "It gives me the green light to send out contracts for teachers, and therefore the school year will end on an up note."

Citizens' groups air health care concerns

TWIN FALLS — Idaho had the fewest doctors per capita of any state in the country in 1983.

Only 10 percent of those doctors unquestionably accepted Medicare patients.

And for the patients that do make it to an Idaho hospital, costs have risen nearly 850 percent between 1964 and 1982.

These figures were part of a statistical study of health care in Idaho presented by two citizens' groups representing low-income residents: Idaho Neighbors Network and Idaho Fair Share published the report at a press conference Thursday.

The report and speakers at conferences in Twin Falls, Boise, Pocatello and Coeur d'Alene highlighted inadequacies with Idaho in particular and with rising health care costs in general.

"A lot of times bankruptcy is inevitable," said INN organizer Pam Shropshire.

"She added that many people whose income falls below poverty level still are not granted government assistance because of eligibility requirements. Those requirements must be switched to accommodate "medically necessary" conditions,

instead of "categorically necessary."

The local groups are part of a National Health Care Campaign aimed at increasing eligibility for Medicare and Medicaid, and getting more doctors to accept that form of payment. The national campaign features scores of union, church and social groups.

Twin Falls INN Chairman Glennia Welch characterized herself as typical of many people who fall through cracks of Medicare eligibility. Surgery last February for problems including high blood pressure and high blood sugar racked up \$4,000 in medical costs. Her husband's recent heart attack rang up another \$7,000.

With the couple's combined incomes of about \$10,000 a year, Welch doesn't qualify for government assistance. And on that income, Welch said the couple can't afford insurance, which isn't provided with their jobs.

"There's got to be a place for us," Welch said.

INN also plans to hold hearings before the next legislative session to gauge problems with health care in Idaho. Meanwhile, Shropshire said INN is scheduling meetings with Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, and Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, next week to discuss health care.

Trust buys equipment for sex abuse exams

TWIN FALLS — A contribution of \$7,396.35 from the Florence M. Gardner Charitable Trust fund has purchased a new type of equipment called a colposcope, which is to be used in the examination of sexually abused children in the Magic Valley.

Lois Biser, manager of radio sta-

tion KTFF in Twin Falls, said the project was approved by trust officer Lenore Parker in keeping with the trust's goal of financial support of worthwhile youth projects.

Application for the funds to purchase the equipment received the endorsement of Twin Falls County Prosecutor R. Ellen Baxter, Idaho Department of Health and Welfare for the local region and Dr.

Burton W. Adrian of Twin Falls. Dr. Adrian is a pediatrician who works with Baxter and law enforcement officers in Magic Valley in the investigation of sexual abuse cases.

He said the equipment will make it possible for more than one medical opinion without additional embarrassment and difficult examinations of the child. It will also provide clear evidence for court juries and judges

hearing child abuse cases.

"The number of cases we have been seeing is skyrocketing and I think this is a problem that is not going to go away," Adrian said. "It has probably been with us a long time and we are just now beginning to believe and recognize the problem."

Baxter said the machine is especially useful for court juries and judges hearing child abuse cases.

McClure behind BLM office decision

TWIN FALLS — Sen. James McClure's clout with Robert Burford, head of the U.S. Bureau of Land Management, appears to have been a key factor in the BLM's decision to keep offices in Shoshone and Burley instead of transferring them to Twin Falls.

McClure told Burford, it made more sense to keep the offices in Shoshone and Burley, close to the people who are served by them, said

McClure spokesman H.D. Palmer on Thursday.

A lot of the credit for keeping the offices in Burley goes to former state Rep. Vard Chaburn of Albion and a lot of the final say to McClure, wrote Nick Cozakis, executive director of the Burley Area Chamber of Commerce.

The BLM announced on Wednesday that, despite years of talk about moving the offices to Twin Falls to save money and make them more centrally located, the offices would stay where they were.

It appears Twin Falls made little or no effort to attract the offices which have a combined annual payroll of \$2.7 million.

However, if the offices were to move, there would not be a wholesale transfer. Some personnel would have remained in Shoshone and Burley, according to BLM spokesmen.

Twin Falls was considered for the combined location because the traffic patterns make it accessible to the most people and city offers numerous community services, BLM said.

The U.S. Forest Service's Sawtooth National Forest headquarters is on Kimberly Road in Twin Falls.

However, if the offices were to move, there would not be a wholesale transfer. Some personnel would have remained in Shoshone and Burley, according to BLM spokesmen.

Reactor opens to the public

IDAHO FALLS — The world's first nuclear reactor, located at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory west of here, opens to the public today. The reactor, called EBR-I, generated the world's first usable quantities of electricity on Dec. 20, 1959, and was dedicated on July 4, 1962. It is a breeder reactor that can create more fissionable material than it consumes, according to an INEL press release. The reactor is a registered National Historic Landmark. The facility is located just south of U.S. Highway 20, about 20 miles east of Arco and 55 miles west of Idaho Falls. It will be open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., seven days a week, through Sept. 9 with tour guides on duty at all times. There is no admission charge.

Large flag meets city code

TWIN FALLS — The high-flying flag above Latham Motors, which has been the subject of inquiries, stares and letters to the editors,

Rex Champneys of the City Building Inspection Department said the construction of the 140-foot flagpole and its concrete base at the car dealership at 510 Second Ave. S. was inspected and met city codes. Robert Roundtree of the Federal Aviation Administration reports that the FAA requires a construction proposal for structures over 200 feet in height. Structures under 200 feet aren't reviewed by the FAA unless there is a complaint from a flyer that the structure constitutes a hazard. But aircraft shouldn't even be flying that low above a city, he added. Federal rules require aircraft to fly at least 1,000 feet above congested areas. LaMar Orton, the city development director, said there are no height ordinances pertaining to towers, antennas or flagpoles. Officials from Latham Motors declined comment.

McClure requests FBI to probe destruction of backcountry airstrip

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, has asked the FBI to investigate the apparent deliberate destruction of a backcountry airstrip in Idaho's Frank Church National Preserve. McClure said the airstrip was used by the federal land south of Selway Lodge in the Nez Perce National Forest. McClure said someone placed salt licks on the airstrip about two years ago. Since then, deer, elk and moose using the licks have trampled a large hole near one end of the strip, forcing the U.S. Forest Service to close it to public use. Last month, McClure said someone dug 21 holes in the airstrip with a post-hole digger and put salt in each one. He said that was a clear attempt to attract more game to the area and destroy the strip completely. Backcountry airstrips are considered navigational facilities under Idaho law. Their destruction is a felony, carrying a maximum penalty of a \$10,000 fine and 20 years in prison. "In my opinion, this is a far more serious matter than simply a problem at Shearer," McClure said in his letter. "If the culprit(s) are successful in this attempt, there is no doubt that they will do the same to other strips." He also has asked James Overbay, the Forest Service's northern regional forester, to work with other federal and state officials in an investigation.

Continued from Page B1 — BLM and was in conjunction with a land interchange proposal between BLM and the forest service. "The idea of the interchange was to make the land management boundaries between the two federal agencies more consistent, according to BLM. This way, a rancher would not have to deal with two separate agencies, said Trudie Olson, a spokesman for BLM statewide offices in Boise. The interchange proposal appears to have generated little interest in Congress, she said. Meanwhile, Burley and Shoshone city officials lobbied the BLM and the Idaho-Congressional delegation to keep the offices in their present locations. A stand of Burley officials lobbied at the BLM statewide offices in Boise, said Burley Mayor Ken Frank. Frank says he told the BLM the move would eliminate 12 to 17 positions from the Burley office, which employs 30 people. The move would involve acquiring an office and property in Twin Falls. BLM owns its property and service yards in Burley, he says. Frank said having to acquire property and building in Twin Falls would be difficult. And the departure from Burley would hurt the local economy, he said. The offices in Burley are saved for now, but Frank says he has no idea what the outlook is for the offices staying there. Shoshone Mayor Tim Ridinger says "it's great" the offices are staying in Shoshone. BLM employs 46 people there. "If you lose two people there, it has an impact," says Ridinger of the small community between Twin Falls and Bellevue. Ridinger says when he took office in January 1986, it was assumed around Shoshone City Hall that BLM was going to move. Olson of the statewide BLM offices in Boise was sketchy about the economic details of the proposed moves. At minimum \$60,000 per year would be saved in positions because there are presently two district directors and assistants in Burley and Shoshone and there would only be one director and assistant under the consolidation, she said. John Iddo, BLM Shoshone district manager, referred to a detailed economic analysis as a basis for the decision to leave things as they are. He also said there was "a lot of concern about the impact on Shoshone and Burley." Olson said she did not have the economic studies readily available and was unable to provide figures from them. BLM received negative comments from Burley and Shoshone but as far as Twin Falls "we didn't hear much from them," Olson said.

Baxter noted that she personally handles all Twin Falls County cases involving sexually abused children and in nearly all of these cases Dr. Adrian is asked to make the medical examination. The machine will be kept in his office for use in the future, he said. Willard Abbott, Region 5 director for IHW, said current trends in the health and welfare department indicate there will be more than 200 sexual-abuse cases in Magic Valley this year. He said the copioscope is a relatively new device that can detect signs of such abuse. It will allow victims to be examined with less embarrassment and more conclusive evidence. He said it will also make it less likely for false accusations of sexual abuse. 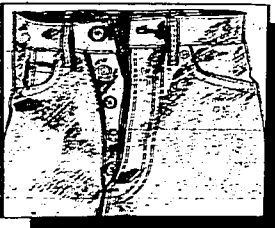

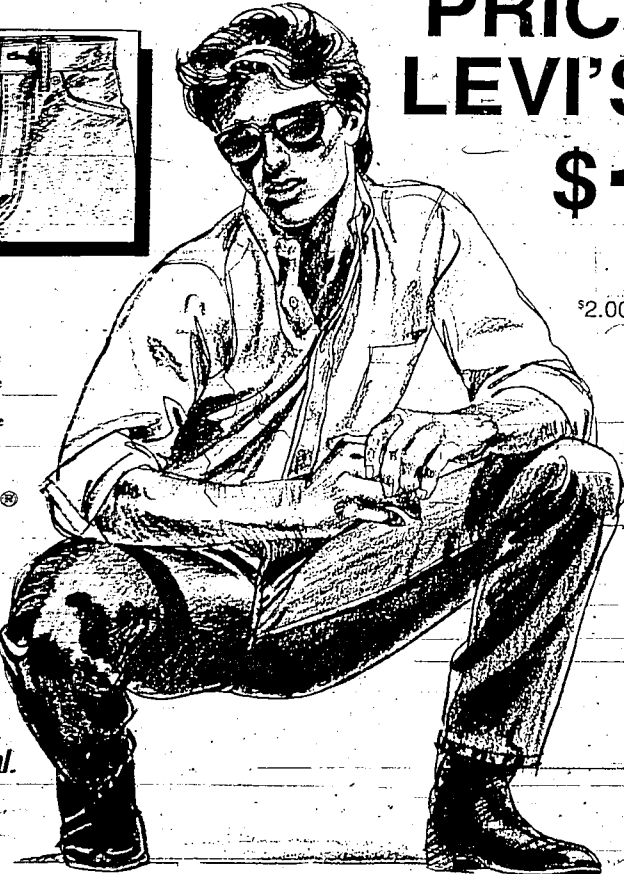

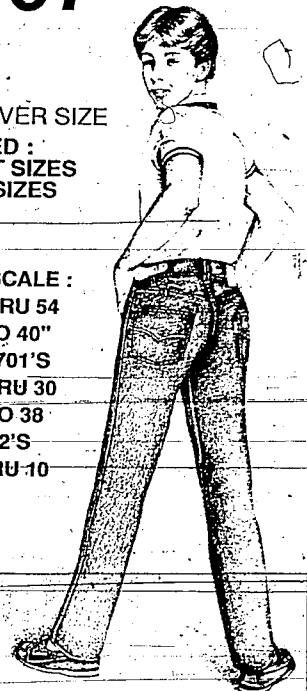

McClure requests FBI to probe destruction of backcountry airstrip

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, has asked the FBI to investigate the apparent deliberate destruction of a backcountry airstrip in Idaho's Frank Church Preserve of No Return Wilderness.

In a letter to the FBI's regional office in Butte, Mont., McClure asked Friday that the Bureau probe the destruction of the Shearer airstrip, which is on federal land south of Selway Lodge in the Nez Perce National Forest.

McClure said someone placed salt ticks on the airstrip about two years ago. Since then, deer, elk and moose using the ticks have trampled a large hole near one end of the strip.

McClure said the hole is about 200 feet long and 20 feet wide. He also has asked James Overbay, the Forest Service's northern regional forester, to work with other federal and state officials in an investigation.

Backcountry airstrips are considered navigational facilities under Idaho law. Their destruction is a felony, carrying a maximum penalty of a \$10,000 fine and 20 years in prison.

"In my opinion, this is a no more serious matter than simply a problem at Shearer," McClure said in his letter. "If the culprit(s) are successful in this attempt, there is no doubt that they will do the same to other strips."

He also has asked James Overbay, the Forest Service's northern regional forester, to work with other federal and state officials in an investigation.

Fire damages vacant house

TWIN FALLS — The interior of a vacant house on Second Avenue North was damaged by fire Thursday night, keeping Twin Falls firemen and equipment on the scene for several hours.

The residence at 402 2nd Ave. N. has been vacant for some time. When firemen were called, flames were already in the structure.

It was not clear what caused the fire at press time. The two-story brick structure is an early-day Twin Falls building which had been converted to apartments in recent years.

Reactor opens to the public

IDAHO FALLS — The world's first nuclear reactor, located at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory west of here, opens to the public today.

The reactor, called EBR-I, generated the world's first usable quantities of electricity on Dec. 20, 1951, as demonstrated on July 4, 1953, that a breeder reactor can create more fissionable material than it consumes, according to an INEL press release. The reactor is a registered National Historic Landmark.

The facility is located just south of U.S. Highway 20, some 20 miles east of Arco and 55 miles west of Idaho Falls. It will be open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., seven days a week, through Sept. 9 with tour guides on duty at all times. There is no admission charge.

Large flag meets city code

TWIN FALLS — The high-flying flag above Latham Motors, which has been the subject of inquiries, stares and letters to the editors,

meets applicable city code requirements, city officials say.

Rex Chinnpeys of the City-Building Inspection Department said the construction of the 140-foot flagpole and its concrete base at the car dealership at 610 Second Ave. S. was inspected and met city codes.

Robert Rundness of the Federal Aviation Administration reports that the FAA requires a construction proposal for structures over 200 feet in height.

Structures under 200 feet aren't reviewed by the FAA unless there is a complaint from a flyer that the structure constitutes a hazard.

But aircraft shouldn't even be flying that low above a city, he added. Federal rules require aircraft to fly at least 1,000 feet above congested areas.

Lamar Orton, the city development director, said there are no height or clearance pertaining to towers, antennas or flagpoles.

Officials from Latham Motors declined comment.

BLM and in conjunction with a land interchange proposal between BLM and the forest service.

The idea of the interchange was to make the land management boundaries between the two federal agencies more consistent, according to BLM. This way, a rancher would not have to deal with two separate agencies, said Trudie Olson, a spokesman for BLM state offices in Boise.

The interchange proposal appears to have generated little interest in Congress, she said.

Meanwhile, Burley and Shoshone city officials lobbied the BLM and the Idaho Congressional delegation to keep the offices in their present locations.

In a coalition of Burley officials lobbied at the BLM state offices in Boise, said Burley Mayor Ken Frank.

Frank says he told the BLM the move would eliminate 12 to 17 positions from the Burley office which employs 25 people. He says the move would involve acquiring an office and property in Twin Falls. BLM owns its property and service yards in Burley, he says.

Frank said having to acquire property and building in Twin Falls would be difficult. And the departure from Burley would hurt the local economy, he said. The offices in Burley are saved for now, but Frank says he has no idea what the outlook

tremely valuable in presentation of the cases since it produces verifiable evidence of the actual physical damage. Bader noted that she personally handles all Twin Falls County cases involving sexually abused children and in nearly all of these cases Dr. Adrian is asked to make the medical examination. The male victim will be kept in his office for use as needed. Bader said.

Willard Abbott, Regional Director for H&W, said current trends in the health and welfare department indicate there will be more than 200 sexual abuse cases in Magic Valley this year. He said the computer is a relatively new device that can detect signs of such abuse. It will allow victims to be examined with less embarrassment and more conclusive evidence. He said H&W also make it less likely for false accusations of sexual abuse.

ATLANTA (AP) — George Burns, struggling with his game in recent weeks, took advantage of ideal playing conditions to shoot an 8-under-par 64 and take the first-round lead in the \$600,000 Atlanta Golf Classic Thursday.

"This is a total surprise," Burns said after taking a one-shot advantage over long-hitting Davis Love III, who had two eagles in his round and finished birdie-birdie-eagle.

"The eagles definitely made the day," said Love, who as a youngster often played well here. But Burns, who had missed the cut four times in his previous six tournaments. "This is a real plus for me."

Burns captured his fourth title in 12 years on the tour when he won the Ardy Williams Open earlier this year.

Burns, a defensive end on Maryland's football team during his college days, got his round off to a solid start when he saved-par from a bunker on the first hole.

He birdied the second from six feet, rolled in a 25-footer on No. 4 and then pitched in 30 yards for another birdie on the fifth.

"It was kind of ideal weather," Burns said. "It was overcast so I could see the pins well, there was no wind to speak of and the greens were real receptive to your second shots."

NFL to try 40-second clock between plays to shorten game

CORONADO, Calif. (AP) — A proposal to change the time between plays was approved Thursday by NFL owners in hopes of quickening the pace of games without sacrificing any action.



The owners, concluding a two-day meeting, also gave Commissioner Pete Rozelle the authority to return the NFL collegiate draft to a two-day format, which Rozelle said he would implement beginning in 1988.

Tex Schramm, president of the Dallas Cowboys and chairman of the league's Competition Committee, said a 40-second interval between plays will be tried in the first three preseason games. "If you're going to save time, you don't want to take action out of the game, so you save time between plays," Schramm said. "We think that in the long run, it will shorten the game by eight minutes on the average."

Last year, NFL games averaged three hours, 11 minutes. "Our goal is to try to get down to an average of two hours," Schramm said. He said the commission's experimental plan was the change by some owners.

International steroid ring uncovered

SAN DIEGO (AP) — A federal indictment charging 34 people, including the strength coach for the University of Miami's football team and a former Olympic runner from Great Britain, with smuggling and distributing illegal anabolic steroids nationwide was unsealed Thursday.

The steroid ring, which authorities said was started by former British Olympian David Jenkins of Ocean-side, Calif., was supplied with steroids manufactured at two laboratories in Tijuana, Mexico. The labs also were named in the 110-count indictment.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Phil Halpern said alleged co-conspirators in the ring claimed to control 70 percent of the U.S. black market for the drugs, used primarily by athletes and bodybuilders to increase muscle bulk.

The use of steroids has been linked to liver cancer, heart disease, hypertension, premature baldness and scarring acne. They are illegal except by prescription in the United States.

Jenkins, 35, who placed seventh in the 400-meter run in the 1976 games in Montreal and the 1980 games in Moscow, was arrested about three weeks ago, Halpern said. He is being held without bond in the federal Metropolitan Correctional Center in San Diego.

Pat Jacobs, 31, assistant University of Miami football coach in charge of strength and conditioning, was arrested after agents seized steroids, hypodermic needles and cash from his apartment.

U.S. Customs Service spokesman Patrick O'Brien said in Miami that about \$2,000 in steroids — worth far

more in street value — was found in Jacobs' apartment.

"These are steroids manufactured for use by veterinarians on animals," O'Brien said.

Jenkins, who was freed Thursday on a personal bond of \$100,000 by U.S. Magistrate Christine Sargentino, was the only person indicted with direct ties to college athletics, O'Brien said.

Director Sam Jankovich announced Thursday that Jenkins had been suspended, and said the university was conducting its own investigation of the affair, although he noted Jacobs was innocent until proven guilty.

"We will not take these allegations lightly," said Jankovich. "This is very disturbing news and we are very disappointed."

The Food and Drug Administration has clamped down on the range of prescription steroids available, creating a black market for the drugs.

These steroids have been found during this investigation in high schools, colleges and in gyms across the country. And it's not just professional athletes who are using them, O'Brien said.

The manufacture and sale of steroids, which are chemically derived from the male sex hormone testosterone, is legal in Mexico.

Halpern said the illegal activity began with the commercial packaging of the drugs and their smuggling across the border into San Diego.

In the months leading up to the indictment, hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of steroids were seized at border checkpoints and from aliens entering the country illegally, U.S. Attorney Peter Nunez said.

All of the steroids were found to be linked to the ring allegedly headed by Jenkins and Juan Javier Macklis of Tijuana.

Halpern declined to say whether Macklis was in custody. Macklis, 48, steroids.

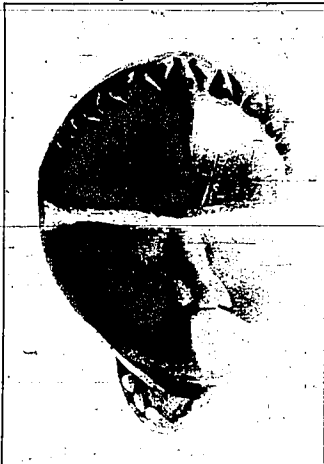

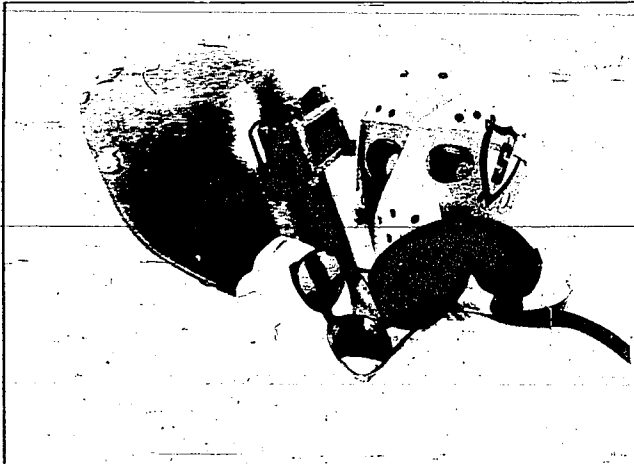

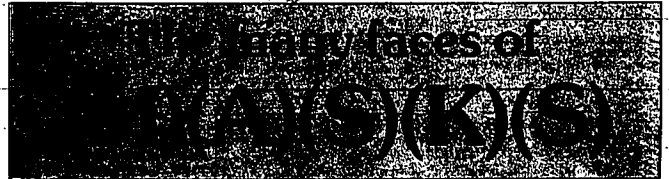

Herrett Museum peels back uses of masking in new show

TWIN FALLS — Masks, masks, masks. Masks, disguises, masks as art, masks as protective devices, masks as symbols and masks in ritual will be explored in depth in a new art exhibit at the Herrett Museum at the College of Southern Idaho.

The exhibit, entitled "Facing the Mask," opens Tuesday and will run through Aug. 15.

"This is masks as art, but a little deeper, because there's a monograph to go with it," said Bill West, curator of exhibits at the Herrett. "So it's a little more cerebral—than just rolling out the masks and saying, 'Aren't they arty?'"

Featured on the cover of the monograph, an illustrated essay in brochure form, is a collage of geometric facial figures designed by West. The drawing serves as a basis for the floor design of the exhibit as well as a sculpture which will be installed later in the summer.

"I tried to come up with a graphic image which was a loaded image," said West. "It appears abstract and sort of jagged and kinetic at the beginning, but then faces start surfacing in it. Then parts of one face become different parts of another face; an eye becomes a mouth, a forehead becomes a jaw. There's a nesting of images, like a nest of Tupperware bowls."

West said that the purpose of "Facing the Mask" is to relate modern masks to ethnic ones and give viewers an awareness and appreciation of masking as an idea.

"Anything you put on your face changes your expressive power and the viewers' impression of you," he said. "If you put on a welding mask, people relate to you differently. A surgeon's mask brings with it power and circumstance, an awe and an air of professionalism."

West said contemporary masks featured in the exhibit will include one of Darth Vader, one of a Halloween monster, and masks worn by different people as part of their professions.

Ethnic masks exhibited are borrowed from the collection of the Idaho Museum of Natural History, the collection of Dr. and Mrs. Louis G. Bush of Pocatello and the Herrett's own mask collection.

"They represent masks made by peoples from the Amazon and Africa, he said, as well as some made by Pacific Northwest Coastal-Indian tribes. A number of masks constructed by children from the Duck Valley Indian reservation in Nevada will also be on display.

West said that the art exhibit may result in two spinoff projects this summer.

The first might be a slide presentation which would feature "masks of the Magic Valley."

The second project would entail a children's workshop on mask-making.

"Children will always relate to masks," West said. "They really enjoy them. They easily participate in the magic of the whole thing."

Bill Studebaker, author of the monograph each viewer will receive, said the museum is approaching the theme of masking from two perspectives.

First there's the practical notion of using a mask to protect yourself, he said. Then there's the mask that is used as art or is suggestively mystical.

"Somehow the mystical takes on a protective value and somehow the protective, like the welder's helmet, starts to take on a mystical value," said Studebaker, a published poet and English instructor at CSI.

"The notion of making a layered notion. Human beings put a lot of symbolic value on masks. And as a consequence, you know, the Miller time commercial will have a welder throw up his helmet and grab a beer. You know everything about the welder because of his mask, his helmet. We don't have a clue how good a welder he is, but we know he's a tough, macho man who deserves a beer."

Studebaker said that a video-on-demand, exploring makeup as a mask, will be shown during the exhibit. The short video is the middle section of a three-part movie made by Penelope Price, an instructor at Arizona State University.

"We've tried to balance the show out, between masculine and feminine," said Studebaker. "That's one thing the video helped us do — move into the feminine realm of masking—it's the notion that there's another form of mask, not only the makeup, not only the cultural overlay of values, but the personality change that takes place."

Studebaker said that the exhibit explores masking on a number of different levels.

"We're taking the face through various dimensions and trying to portray that one of our fascinations as human beings is with our own face and what we can do with it. How we distort it, how we represent it, how we protect it, how we symbolically use it. That sort of thing."

Camcorders:

Video enthusiasts are snapping up camera-recorders

Julia Ramos' first grandchild is not due until September, but the Santa Monica, Calif., resident is wasting no time. Last week, she bought a camcorder to videotape the baby's every move.

"I want to be prepared," Ramos said. "Not only that, but we're having a family get-together this week and they're coming in from north and south."

New video enthusiasts like Ramos are turning the camcorder, as the compact combination of a video camera and recorder is known, into one of the fastest-growing consumer electronics products, according to the Electronic Industries Association.

Camcorder sales rose 50 percent in the first four months of the year, compared to the same period of 1986. In April alone, sales jumped 203 percent from the year before. At the same time, sales of the older video cameras with large, separate recorder packs have dropped sharply.

Prices of camcorders have dropped somewhat, but the average wholesale price hovers around \$1,000.

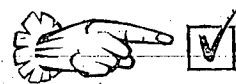
"It's the hottest video product since VCRs themselves," said Allan Schneider, a vice president of the Washington-based industry group. "Nothing comes close to it."

Baby pictures are just the beginning. Salespeople report that customers are buying camcorders to photograph special events, to study their golf swing or to send video postcards to relatives. One Los Angeles man even used his camcorder to document progress in his weight-reduction diet.

"Video cameras are fun, but these things are really fun," said Mark Kramer, a salesman at a Federated Group store in Los Angeles. "You can take them on vacation. You can take them with your family — especially with your family. It's like instant gratification forever."

Cannes film festival ends with exhaustion, a sour Mailer

CANNES, France — A surreal malaise has come over the 40th Cannes film festival, a sort of exhausted sanity replacing the glitz. With only one day to go in this 13-day movie deal-a-rama, adrenaline-sapped film brokers and would-be starlets, flacks and hacks and a few genuine geniuses just want to go home.

Cannes has calmed. Les ambiances — street entertainers hired by the festival — have disappeared. Elizabeth Taylor,

shoulder-length earrings dangling like chandeliers, has gone on to Paris to accept the Legion of Honor.

Now it's up to the likes of Norman Mailer — an avid, fat guy in corduroy — to give us the glamour, to wow the driving audience. He sits on a fourth-floor balcony of the Carlton Hotel, staring out toward North Africa, through the drizzle.

His "Tough Guys Don't Dance," a literary film noir produced by Menahem Golan's Cannon Group, was screened outside the competition. His anti-heroes are tough guys' egos for work. Certainly his heroes are win-Guys, set to open in October, Mailer will take another shot at directing. (He did three halts.)

"I am just so wrong for this imbrogllo." Or and-or homophobes. Mailer denies this but despite plenty of evidence to the contrary: "In the name of decency, let me speak." But they don't dance.

"The Silence," Embassy, \$29.95. This is the third film in an informal trilogy—on man's relationship to God—which Ingmar Bergman made in the early '60s. At the time, "The Silence" was regarded as an explicit shocker; in retrospect, it is a fine film, one of the director's master-

pieces. A small boy, his mother (Gunnel Lindblom) and aunt (Ingrid Thulin)—one sister lusty and animalistic, the other intellectual, sick and masturbatory—are trapped in a weird, war-torn, vaguely Eastern European country. None of them speak a language, which was invented for the film, and their only communications are through sign language or anonymous sex. "The Silence," done almost without

dialogue in cryptic, menacing images, is a nightmare. Its theme is the world-in-God's-absence, and it was the work in which Bergman cast off, irrevocably, his earlier religious obsessions. (4 stars)

With "Mother Teresa," film makers Ann and Jeanette Petrie have made a documentary worthy of their remarkable subject, an Albanian-born member of the Irish Sisters of Loretto who in 1946 heard the call of God to work in the slums of Calcutta, India. Simply put, the chief characteristic of this film, as it is of Mother Teresa, whom the Petries followed on and off for five years over four continents. So alive is "Mother Teresa," with humanity's infinite possibilities for good in the face of evil and despair that it is exhilarating, offering a real lift to the spirits. "God speaks in the silence of

Subtitled in English and Chinese, this Peking Opera Company performance of an intimate, charming, with-the-falsetto singing, delicate movement and farcical plot complications executed with great flair. Office manager wins bad writing contest

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - An office manager with a passion for purple prose has taken top honors, or dishonors, in an annual bad writing contest that drew more than 10,000 turgid entries. "I didn't expect to win," said Sheila Richter of Minneapolis. "I knew my entry was dreadful, but I didn't know it was that dreadful." Ms. Richter, who works at the University of Minnesota, wins a personal computer and "whatever public humiliation may come her way," said Scott Rice, an English professor at San Jose State University and founder of the Bulwer-Lytton Fiction Contest.

The winning entry, "The notes related skyward as the sun rose over the Canada geese, feathered rumps mooning the day, webbed appendages frantically pedaling unseen bicycles in their search for sustenance, driven by crust Nature's maxims, 'ye shall begeth, ye shall work, and at last I knew Pittsburgh.'" Ms. Richter, 37, said the entry began as an assignment in a poetry class. "I wrote it in about a minute and a half," she said. "I thought it was really bad, so I sent it in."

The contest, which has resulted in collections of the nasty narratives, is named for Edward George Bulwer-Lytton, a contemporary of Charles Dickens, who began an 1830 novel with the phrase, "It was a dark and stormy night."

The event is in its sixth year and the number of entries continues to grow. One man, Tim Poston of Venice, Calif., submitted more than 1,000 entries this year, Rice said. Ms. Richter submitted only the one, and doesn't plan to enter again. "I think I'm going to rest on my laurels," she said in a telephone interview. "I think once is enough."

Continued from Page D1 family vacations throughout the '80s, '90s and '70s gave way in the late 1970s to the first video cameras. These cameras and accompanying recorders allowed consumers to instantly play back the images on a television set rather than waiting for the film to return from the lab. But video cameras are heavy, often weighing 8 or 10 pounds.

The compact camcorder, with the recorder actually built into the camera, was introduced in 1984, but sales did not take off until the last few months of 1985, Schlosser said. Camcorders weigh only a few pounds, and one model sold by JVC tips the scales at a mere 1.65 pounds.

Camcorders come in three formats. One type uses a full-size VHS tape that can be popped right into a VCR for immediate playback. Another type, called the C-cam, uses a smaller tape that must be placed in an adapter before it can be viewed in a VCR. The third kind uses 8-mm tape, and a cable must be run from

Puns are always prevalent among the entries, Rice said. Witness this "dishonorable mention" entry from R.W. O'Bryan from Perrysburg, Ohio: "Although Sarah had an abnormal fear of mice, it did not keep her from eeking out a living at the local pet store."

Rice admits to being a little weary of the contest, but he plans to continue it.

"It's just like opening oysters, looking for pearls," he said. "Occasionally I find one, although it seems like the stacks of oyster shells are getting higher and higher and my fingers are bleeding more."

Kapow! Superman speeds toward 50th year

NEW YORK (AP) — How does the guy do it? He doesn't look a day over 28, there isn't a gray hair on his head, and — get this — he's still faster than a speeding bullet.

And yet, earthlings, Superman is about to turn 50.

The actual Super Birthday isn't until June 1988, the 50th anniversary of the month that Action Comics No. 1 hit the stands with Superman on the cover, "hitting a car over his head."

Nonetheless, DC Comics, which owes a lot to the Man of Steel, kicked things off Tuesday with a news conference to announce a year's worth of "Super Sentimental Events."

There's to be an exhibit at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, a birthday party in New York, a new Superman movie, a "superman" television special and the unveiling of a Superman statue in Superman's real hometown — Cleveland, not Smallville.

It was in Cleveland in 1933 that teen-agers Jerry Siegel and Joe Shuster came up with the idea of a comic-strip hero with superhuman strength who would fight for Truth, Justice and the American Way.

It took four years of mounting rejection slips before their efforts paid off. In 1937, Harry Donnell hired Siegel and Shuster to create a Superman story for his new Action Comics, to debut the next summer.

With the world plunging into war and America still caught in the miseries of the Depression, the time was right for a superhero who was more powerful than a locomotive, able to leap tall buildings in a single bound. Superman was a smash.

Half a century later, he is still a success — and largely unchanged.

"The essence of the myth never changes," said Paul Levitz, the executive vice president of DC Comics. "He's still the last son of the doomed planet (Krypton) a brought here," raised by Ma and

Pa-Kent, given our values to become super-hero."

—There have been changes in Superman's world. Over the years, the Superman myth grew more complex, with so many characters and plot twists that DC was at risk of losing all but its most rabid readers. As part of a general overhaul of its comic kingdom, DC published a special, six-part series last summer called "The Man of Steel" that retold the Superman story from the beginning, with a somewhat more contemporary look.

John Byrne, the writer and artist who took over the new Superman series, said the new Man of Steel is a little weaker than he had become in recent years ("he can't push whole planets around") and Clark Kent, promoted from reporter to columnist, is not quite as much of a wimp as he used to be.

But Byrne said he has remained faithful to the original mythology and has tried to make Superman look exactly as he always has. "We're talking about icons," he said. "Underneath the fantasy, there has to be a recognizable figure."

Superman has been, in fact one of the most recognizable American icons of the past half-century. Rock musician-Mek Jones, who attended Tuesday's announcement, recalled that in the postwar England where he grew up, Superman "really attracted me to America. That was my first American literature."

Carl Scheele, the curator who designed the Smithsonian's upcoming Superman exhibit, said Superman has been almost unique among similar cultural images for lasting so long.

"Now, there is something going on there," Scheele said, explaining why the Smithsonian is studying Superman. "If you're dealing with everyday life in America and you run into something that's sustained itself for 50 years with such energy, it's worth taking a look at and thinking about."

L'Amour's wife decries crime link to novels

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) — Theories that Western author Louis L'Amour's novels may have inspired a man to farm two women in Washington state are "absolutely ridiculous," the author's wife says.

"Louis' characters are law-abiding citizens who respect women," Kathy L'Amour said Tuesday in a telephone interview from the couple's Durango home.

Authorities in Bellingham and Pierce County, Wash., are looking for Darren O'Neill, 27, in connection with the disappearance of the two women. O'Neill also is wanted in Colorado for jumping bail after his arrest on a charge of sexual assault.

Investigators who searched O'Neill's apartment in Edgewood, Wash., said they found numerous L'Amour novels. Authorities also say O'Neill used aliases that may be names of L'Amour characters.

Bellingham police Lt. Dave Duffy said the FBI would contact Bantam Books, L'Amour's publisher in New York, for more information.

However, Stuart Applebaum, vice president of Bantam Books, said if there is any connection between L'Amour books and the alleged crimes, "it's a rather tragic misreading of Louis L'Amour's novels."

"He certainly got the L'Amour frontier ethics very twisted," Applebaum said. "If L'Amour characters violate the law, they pay a debt to society."

L'Amour, Applebaum said, "hopes this fellow will turn himself in to police."

One of the missing women, Robin Smith, 22, was last seen in O'Neill's apartment March 22, authorities said. A second woman, Wendy Aughe, 23, disappeared April 23, and authorities said O'Neill's fingerprints were found in her car.

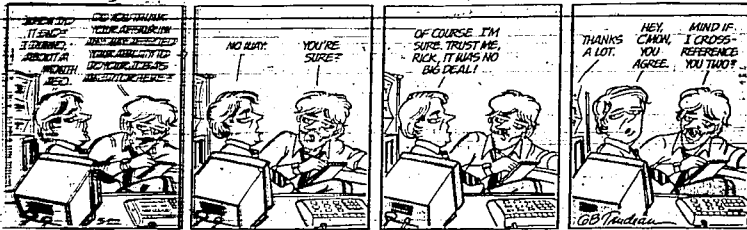
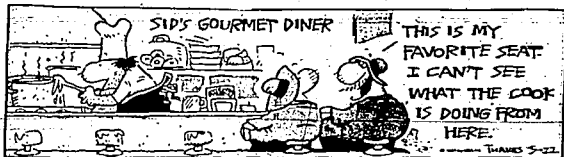

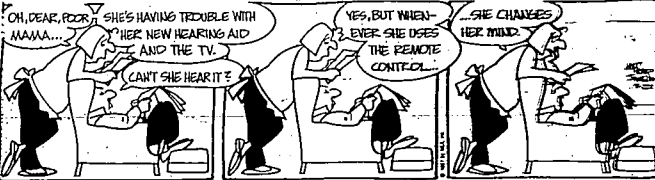

Elaine May pays tribute to show-biz dreamers with 'Ishtar'

HOLLYWOOD — In the guise of a sort of liberal's rethinking of the Hope-Crosby "Road" movies, Elaine May has created a love letter to show-biz dreamers and called it "Ishtar." It is a smart, generous, genuinely funny affair. Sometimes, like the camel who almost ambles away with the picture, it is laugh-out-loud but it is also an extremely astute vision of life.

Writer-director May suggests that passionate dedication to one's art in the face of no discernible talent is no joke. Instead, it is admirable and rather sweet and certainly no discernible talent," describes Rogers and Clarke ("Warren Beatty and Dustin Hoffman, respectively), her pair of over-the-hill singer-songwriters, whose "singing" suggests a man with no life preserving clinging to a man who cannot swim. As acting partners, however, Beatty and Hoffman are an unshakably inspired pair, creating character, not schtick. In its first 25 minutes, the show-biz comedy is a gem, depending our good will, as May fills



with affectionate wit every detail we could want to know about this wildly disparate world. The image of the secondly-assured Beatty wanders inside the sweetly naïf Lyle Bridges, a Southern country boy completely in awe of Hoffman's seemingly assured Chuck Clarke. To Lyle, Chuck is Tom Jones and Barry Manilow rolled into one compact little bundle of talent. For his part, Chuck, who likes to call himself "Hank," is content to tank in Lyle's supposingly common of them as an inspired tunesmith, as well as a Manhattan ladies' man without peer.

Actually, these two should not be let anywhere near each other. Lyle, who wants "Hot Fudge" while driving an ice-cream delivery truck

and Chuck, author of "There's a little love in my eyes... Try it and see if there's something your size." They are already such kindred spirits it is frightening.

It does get them an agent of sorts, the splendidly seamy Jack Wexler, and his offer of 10 weeks work in Morocco gets this "Road" movie on the road. The desert engagements will include Arab revolutionaries, ancient maps, hovering satellites, a beautiful, veiled girl, a Russian impostor, but not underemployed, and the omnipresent CIA (Charles Grodin) — the stuff that usually produces dumb comedy of contrivance.

Although the space between laughs — or appreciative chorles,

which is closer to "Ishtar's" consistent level — does get tiring once we are out of sight of New York, May does not get rattled and blow it all. "Ishtar" may have trouble finding the exit signs, but it remains a deadpan comedy of character and observation.

After its superstars, "Ishtar's" nilfist character actor is Grodin's sly, untrustworthy CIA chief. When properly used, his manic intensity set firmly in reality, the button-eyed Grodin is unparalleled, and this may be his finest hour.

"Ishtar" also remains "doggedly enduring." Unlike the 1940s "Road

movies, where squabbles over the girl always threatened to split up Crosby and Hope, Lyle and Chuck are a passionate bond — their (heaven help us) art. And when both are deserted by the women in their lives, they really do have each other.

May fills the edges of her screen with quirky filigree work while the plot, such as it is, unfolds center stage. At the American Embassy in Ishtar, an overwrought Beatty pounds the wall for emphasis, as the cinematography of Vittorio Storaro, the costumes of Anthony Powell and the damndest, most memorably awful songs that becomes a kind of anticlitical counterpoint to the action.

Then there is the blind camel, who begins as a secret password and goes on to be the biggest scenic element since Baby Lotte. It might be argued that this witty detailing is sometimes at the expense of the big picture. Agreed. Lawrence of Arabia" this is not. It is not even an epic spoof. "Lawrence of Arabia" is merely an entirely intelligent, drolly funny comedy with something on its mind. It has two exquisitely detailed characters, three lapidary performances, the cinematography of Vittorio Storaro, the costumes of Anthony Powell and the damndest, most memorably awful songs that Paul Williams and Elaine May could devise.

'The Allnighter' is more like a snooze

THE ALLNIGHTER (PG-13) Remember those beach-blond movies from the 60's, where the guys do their hair and the girls do their nails? Well, "The Allnighter" is a comedy that has a different bikini for each day of the week? They have returned, 1987-style. In this lame sex comedy that is loaded with hip teen lingo but utterly lacking in any intelligence or insight. It is a major embarrassment to see a woman filmmaker presiding over a movie with such a flirty, boy-toy sensibility. This failed beach-bunny comedy is a total snooze — it misses the perfect wave by a mile.

BLIND DATE (PG-13) What boggles the mind is how this bit of navel lint could have seemed remotely funny to any one at any stage along the way. The single episode premise is that a woman in a wheelchair has no tolerance whatsoever for alcohol goes on a blind date with a yuppie executive (Bruce Willis) who, worried about her problem, feeds her quantities of champagne and watches in outraged dismay as she goes

out of control. This from the director of "Victor/Victoria" Bixbe Edwards. Willis, though he has a nice flair for physical comedy, would be well advised not to quit his nightgown job. Blazinger, as usual, a dignified and thoughtful director, has almost unbelievably given her assignment.

EXTREME PREJUDICE (R) Walter Hill's recent, off-putting anti-adventure is so much in it wagers on garbage. It is a comedy that is almost completely of nonsense. Shooting Texas Ranger Will Witt's determination to take in Powers Boothe, his boyfriend, and current flamboyant drug king as thrown away by a top second DEA member led by a ruthless Michael Winslow. Once again, Hill is concerned with defining masculine courage amid moral chaos; but this entertaining film is not to be taken too seriously.

PLAYBOYS (R) This is a movie making with a realist's fervor. Director-writer Oliver Stone, dramatized Vietnam infantryman himself, clearly wants us to understand what fighting in that war was like. He succeeds with an immediacy that is frightening. War movies of the past, even the greatest ones, seem like crane shots by comparison. "Platoon" is at ground zero, and not incidentally. Stone may have just a

stroke through the heart of all the sick Rambo heroes ever to slide onto a screen.

POLICE ACADEMY IV (PG) It is amazing that the "Police Academy" movies keep being made even though they should be funny after the hilarious original. This one is not so crazy as the last two and director Jim Abrahams is at least brisk and zany. Stars Steve Guttenberg, Rhythia Smith, Michael Winslow, Robert Goldfarb and G.W. Bailey. **THE SECRET OF MY SUCCESS (PG-13)** A misfiring comic fantasia on executive and sexual success in the Reagan era, mixed up from scraps of "The Apartment" and "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying." The writers, Jim Cash and Jack Epps Jr. ("Top Gun") do scripts so derivative you may get deja vu during their scenes, and their central plot here — a multimillion pay poses as executive — is ridiculous and perfunctorily worked out. But director Herb Ross and cinematographer Carlo Di Palma sometimes capture a faintly Marlon Brando feel of the glass-palace grandeur of "The Apartment" and Michael J. Fox's effortless clutzpuff is just right.

STAR TREK IV: THE VOYAGE HOME (PG) Breathes there a non-Trekkie with hide so tough he will

not find something to enjoy in this rollicking, humanistic space-space opera? Perhaps, but he will be outnumbered. The reunited Enterprise — under the guidance of director Leonard Nimoy and Captain (voice use) Admiral James Kirk (George Takei) — is back in a primitive era (our own) to rescue two humpbacked whales and thereby save Earth. There has been a conscious effort to lighten things up after the "return to drang" of the first three movies "Star Trek" and the result will almost certainly be the best loved of the four: full of the old crackling Enterprise crew badinage and a lot more besides. Even audience members with a terminal Spock block should be amused.

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Ishtar," the much-publicized \$40 million comedy starring Warren Beatty and Dustin Hoffman, took a shaky first place in the weekend box office ahead of a horror flick made for one-tenth its cost.

"Ishtar's" first week of release yielded earnings of \$4.3 million from 1,139 screens, a low-key \$3,803 per theater.

Beatty and Hoffman portray a couple of awful Manhattan publicity chasers who only can manage to get booked at the Chez Casablanca in Morocco. On the way, they pass through the emirate of Ishtar, where they become caught in intrigue involving a CIA agent, Charles Grodin, and a beautiful rebel played by Isabelle Adjani.

The movie, written and directed by Elaine May, recalls the Bob Hope-Bing Crosby "road" movies, especially "Road to Rio." But critics, especially "Ishtar" is not worth its \$40 million budget.

The movie was delayed from its originally scheduled Christmas release, and its director has been accused of using their leverage to push through Columbia Pictures.

Poignant family drama on CBS

Lithgow and Hurt must make decisions in 'Baby Girl Scott'

By LYNN HOOGENBOOM

When it comes to choosing roles, Mary Beth Hurt is almost in a class by herself. She is not yet in the superstar category where the best roles are automatically hers to accept or reject, but she has demonstrated an unusual knack for picking quality roles — and avoiding clunkers.

Her movies include "Interiors" (1978), "The World According to Garp" (1982) and "Compromising Positions" (1985). On stage, she is a three-time Tony nominee — for "Trelawny of the Wells" (1976), "Crimes of the Heart" (1982) and "Benefactors" (1986). On Sunday, May 24, she is making a rare television appearance in "Baby Girl Scott." This moving CBS drama centers on the dilemma faced by the parents (played by John Lithgow and Hurt) of a premature 1-pound 4-ounce infant. They begin to think that the procedures the doctors are performing on their daughter are needlessly painful — and wonder if the damage that these procedures are doing to her fragile body might be robbing her of any chance to have a meaningful life.

Hurt attributes her success in picking roles to "instinct, luck and the ability to say no," placing special emphasis on the last quality. "That's the only option the actor always has," she explains. "From the time that you're just starting out, you can say no. And certain scripts you can just tell are bad. It doesn't have anything to do with instinct. You say, 'This is bad. This is a stinker.'"

"There are times you can't say no," she admits. "I've done things because I needed money or needed to work, many times. But I like having time off, — and I'm not very ambitious, which in a sense gives me a lot of freedom."

She was first attracted to "Baby Girl Scott" because of the script. "I liked the dynamics between the husband and wife. One is not the strongest all the way through. And I thought it was an extremely careful and in-depth look at a touchy subject."

Although the viewer tends to sympathize with the parents, Hurt denies that the movie presents only

one point of view. "What the doctors do in many of these cases is heroic — and amazing. But I think the parents have a right to be included in the discussions.

"What is right for one baby in one family may not be right for another baby in another family," concludes Hurt, who is a parent herself. (She and her husband, director Paul Schrader, have a 3-year-old daughter, Molly.) "This is why medical ethics are so difficult to legalize. Because the moment you make a rule, there is an exception to that rule."

Among her many successful roles,

Hurt claims she doesn't have a real favorite. "It changes," she explains. "I sort of tend to remain attached to the last one."

The interview is almost over, but there is still one question that continues to puzzle fans: Was she married to William or John Hurt? "William," says Hurt with a laugh.

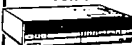

PBS airs award-winning farcical drama on American Playhouse

Swoosie Kurtz, John Mahoney and Julie Hagerty will recreate their award-winning performance when American Playhouse presents the public television premiere of John Guare's farcical drama, "The House of Blue Leaves," Monday, May 25, at 9 p.m. ET, over the Public Broadcasting Service (PBS).

Originally produced Off-Broadway in 1970, the play was revived in 1986 by the Lincoln Center Theater. Critically acclaimed, the production was moved to Broadway later that year and won four Tony Awards. The recipients were Swoosie Kurtz and John Mahoney, set designer Tony Walton and stage director Jerry Zaks. Julie Hagerty won a Theatre World Award for her performance.

"The House of Blue Leaves," which was Guare's first full-length play, displays the playwright's aptitude for farcical writing. The play has an undercurrent of sadness, laced with ironic wisdom; yet it is also impassioned and hilarious. The zany characters in Guare's tragic-comedy all share the same fate: their hopes, dreams and deluded values ultimately result in humiliation.

New York City's Borough of Queens, the setting for "The House of Blue Leaves," is only 14 minutes by subway from Manhattan — the mecca of cultural intensity, the test market for realizing dreams, the gathering place of ferocious intellects, the most alluring place in the world. Queens, on the other hand, is a community of dreamers, through whose windows the glittering skyline of Manhattan beckons.

This madcap story takes place on October 4, 1965, the day the Pope is scheduled to arrive in New York to address the United Nations on ending the war in Vietnam. The setting is the small apartment of Artie and Bananas Shaughnessy (John

Mahoney and Swoosie Kurtz), just a short distance from where the Pope's motor caravan is scheduled to pass.

Bananas Shaughnessy, a zookeeper, is a frustrated songwriter. He aspires to be Hollywood-famous, like his boyhood chum Bill Einhorn (Richard Portnow), a rich and successful movie producer. But until that happens, he must be content with singing his unpublished songs at the local El Dorado Bar and Grill.

His dreams of success and happiness are focused on Bunny Fingus (Christine Baranski), his blonde, floozy neighbor and girlfriend. Bunny wants Artie to commit his slightly off-the-wall wife, Bananas, to a sanitarium so that they can (um-off) together to Hollywood and the glamorous life.

Bananas Shaughnessy is a schizophrenic who presents herself as an obstacle to Artie's conscience while he struggles with whether or not to honor a marriage gone mad. The Shaughnessys have one son, Ronnie (Ben Stiller), a slightly weird young man, who goes AWOL from the Army in order to assassinate the Pope.

On the day of the Pope's visit to New York, Bunny and Artie have plans to watch his motorcade, with Artie carrying the sheetmusic for his songs, in the hope that the Pope will bless his music as he passes by.

The plot takes another zany turn when the Shaughnessys receive an unexpected visitor, the beautiful, and totally deaf Corrima Ströler (Julie Hagerty), a movie starlet and Billy Einhorn's girlfriend. Having lost her hearing during the filming of her last movie, the result of an accidental bomb explosion, she has hidden her deafness from the public. She has come to New York to meet the Pope and, hopefully, have him perform a miracle that will restore her hearing.

Bananas Shaughnessy, during one of her moments of insanity/insight, probably best epitomizes this Guarian American tragedy when she says, "You know what I dream? I dream I'm just waking up and I room around the house all day crying because of the way my life turned out. And then I do wake up and what do I do? Room around the house all day crying about the way my life turned out."

Presidential hopefuls will debate on NBC next winter

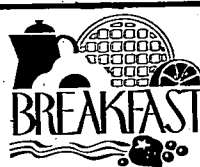

TV movie — playing a mother who pursues a career as a rock singer. Since Phylcia's sister, Debbie Allen, is an accomplished Broadway musical star, the "Cosby" mom should have no trouble at all playing the singing mom.

Dolly Parton is important part of new ABC autumn schedule

NEW YORK (L.A. Times) — "Our World," which looked at contemporary history, is history now. But Dennis Weaver, Dabney Coleman and John Ritter, part of TV's past, are in the network's future. So is Dolly Parton. All have new series slated for next fall on low-rated ABC.

ABC's new schedule, which, with Parton's show, returns the long-absent music-variety format to TV, also will bring back the futuristic "Max Headroom." But that show, which had an unspectacular six-week run on Tuesdays this spring, may face similar ratings woes next season. It has been shifted to Fridays opposite CBS' durable "Dallas" and NBC's cool-hued "Miami Vice."

A total of eight new series — four sitcoms, three dramas and Parton's variety show — are in the fall lineup for ABC, which has fallen on hard times in the Nielsen. It came in third in the prime-time ratings last season for the third consecutive season.

In girding for September battle, the network axed ABC News' "Our World" after one season. While critically acclaimed, the Linda Ellerbee-Ray Gandy effort, aired opposite NBC's hit comedies "The Cosby Show" and "Family Ties," had ratings so low it was said that divers were dispatched each week to find them.

Another ABC casualty, one that got a weak lead-in from "Our World" on Thursdays, was "The Colbys," a "Dynasty" spinoff that lasted 1½ seasons. Also dropped: "Mr. Belvedere," "Webster," "Jack & Mike," "Mariah," "Harry," "Slidekicks," "Starman" and ABC's Sunday-night movie. In addition, "The Disney Sunday Movie" was cut from two hours to one.

A veteran ABC News series, "20-20," survived. But it was shifted from Thursdays to a different night — Friday, part of an all-new ABC lineup on that evening.

Five other returning series also will be in new time periods, including "Spenser: For Hire," which now will face CBS' hit "Murder, She Wrote" on Sundays at 8 p.m.

"Spenser" will be followed by the Parton variety show, then Weaver's new series, "Buck James," in which the folksy former "McCloud" star plays a trauma center's "crack surgeon," one who has an estranged wife and children. Those roles aren't

cast yet, ABC said.

Another newcomer, this slated for Tuesdays at 10 p.m. after "Moonlighting," is "Thirtysomething." A yuppie drama-comedy, it stars Ken Olin and Mel

Harris as a 30ish couple who've given up one of their incomes and urban life for suburbia and a new baby.

Two new sitcoms will check in on Wednesday. The first, "Hooperman," from "L.A. Law" creators Steven Bochco and Terry Louise Fisher, stars John Ritter of "Three's Company" as a plainclothes cop in San Francisco who also owns an apartment building full of lively tenants.

The second, "Slap Maxwell," stars Dabney Coleman, formerly the loveably nasty host of NBC's cheered but short-lived "Buffalo Bill." For ABC, he'll play a crusty sports writer — CBS also has one in its new "Frank's Place" — who divides his free time between his estranged wife and his girlfriend. Those roles have not been filled yet, ABC said.

Friday will bring "Full House," a sitcom about a widower (John Posey) with three daughters aged 10, 5 and 6 months. He is aided in raising his kids by his rock 'n' roll-star brother-in-law (John Stamos) and a young stand-up comic (David Cozler).

Another new Friday sitcom, also featuring a widower with children, is "I Married Dora." The kids (Juliette Lewis and Jason Hirst) have a nanny (Elizabeth Pezal) from El Salvador. Upon learning she faces deportation, the widower (Daniel Hugh Kelly) marries her.

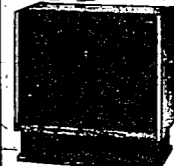
