Reagan upbeat on pact

Post-summit views cover broad area

VENICE, Italy — An upbeat President Reagan told a post-summit news conference Thursday there is "an increased opportunity" for a Soviet-American nuclear arms agreement and a possible summit meeting with Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev this year.

In an optimistic mood after the conclusion of three days of summit talks with allied leaders, the president praised Gorbachev as a "personal gentleman" with economic problems and other practical reasons for wanting an arms accord.

Reagan noted that the Soviets also have vessels escorting oil tankers in the Persian Gulf, and appealed for Moscow's cooperation in applying diplomatic pressure through the United Nations for an end to the Iran-Iraq war.

"They have a stake, too, in peaceful shipping and the openness of the international waters," Reagan said at a sun-drenched meeting with reporters in a hotel garden on the heavily guarded island of Giudecca where he stayed for the summit.

Reagan's conciliatory remarks to the Soviets came on the eve of his return to Washington today by way of West Berlin, where he will deliver a foreign policy address within sight of the Berlin Wall, the grim symbol of East-West divisions for the past quarter-century.

On other topics, Reagan: • Said much of the testimony in the congressional Iran-Contra hearings was merely "hearsay, denied flying orders authorizing private weapons deals for the Nicaraguan rebels, and said he wouldn't pass judgment on fired White House aide Oliver L. North "until he had his day in court."

• Gave a tepid endorsement to Assistant Secretary of State Elliott Abrams, who has acknowledged making misleading statements to Congress about U.S. involvement in Contra aid efforts but has vowed to stay in office, with support from Secretary of State George P. Shultz.

• Repeated demands that laws forbidding or restricting U.S. aid to the Contras applied to him. In any case, he said, "I don't think that the law was broken."

• Quoted Chancellor Helmut Kohl as saying that West Germany had not yet decided whether to grant a U.S. extradition request for suspected Lebanese terrorist Mohammed Ali Hamadi. But Reagan said Hamadi will be put on trial in one country or the other in connection with the June 1985 hijacking of a TWA airliner and the murder of U.S. Navy diver Robert Stethem.

Radicals on rampage after march in Berlin

BERLIN — Hundreds of radicals in ski masks smashed store windows and hurled paving stones at riot police after a mass march to protest a visit to the divided city today by President Reagan.

Police with helmets and shields charged into the crowds with clubs and fired tear gas to disperse them.

A file of thousands of protesters marched, along central Kurfuerstendamm boulevard Thursday evening through intermittent rainfall. Violence began just east of the downtown area, in and around Urania and Nollendorf squares.

Store windows smashed included those of the noted KaDeWe department store.

When police charged, the mobs threw bottles, rocks and sidewalk paving stones.

Witnesses reported seeing a few gasoline bombs flung at police, at least three injured demonstrators

and an injured officer. Police said late Thursday night that 18 people had been arrested and scattered incidents were still continuing.

The witnesses said several stores were looted, including a liquor store and jewelry shop, and a van and barricade set ablaze.

Some demonstrators dropped tack-like devices on the street to puncture the tires of police vehicles, they said.

Reagan is to arrive at Tempelhof U.S. Air Base and visit the Berlin Wall, which communist East Germany erected in August 1961 to divide the city and halt mass migration to the West. Both are far from the scene of violence.

Organizers of the march claimed 80,000 people took part, but police estimated the total at 24,000.

Tech in the center section of the march wore black ski masks and dark clothing, an unofficial uniform of radical demonstrators in West Germany. Riot police marched beside the masked protesters.

Thatcher triumphs; Labor scores gains

LONDON — Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher won a third successive term in Thursday's elections, but with a smaller majority in the House of Commons.

The opposition socialist Labor Party made a strong comeback from its election disaster of 1983, with a more moderate platform and the leadership of Neil Kinnock, eloquent son of a Welsh miner.

"It has been a wonderful day," declared the 61-year-old Mrs. Thatcher, leader of the Conservative Party, Britain's first woman prime minister and now the first since 1826 to win three elections in a row.

"It is wonderful to be entrusted with the government of this country, this great country, once again . . . The greater the trust, the greater the duty," she told exultant workers at party headquarters in London.

With 592 of the 650 seats in the House of Commons decided, the Conservatives held 347. Labor 225 and the centrist Social Democrat-Liberal Alliance 14. Other seats went to smaller parties. The Conservative share of the popular vote after 266 seats had been decided was 42.9 percent. Labor had 32.3 percent, and the Alliance 26.6 percent.

Word came at 2:30 a.m. London time that Mrs. Thatcher's Conservatives had the 326 seats necessary for a majority.

Computer predictions gave the "Iron Lady" of British politics a majority of about 95 seats, compared with the 144-seat landslide majority she won at the last election in 1983 and more than double the 44 when she first came to power in 1979.

Kinnock, leader of the defeated Labor Party, said Britain was falling into "an even greater abyss of division."

"There are people who will have voted today thinking they are secure and safe and becoming instead of victors, 'victims,'" he said, "hinting the well off may pay a bitter price.

Protesters shouted "Fascist scum!" at Mrs. Thatcher earlier Thursday night when she appeared at her north London constituency of Finchley to claim victory in her own race for a Commons seat.

The last prime minister to win a three consecutive terms was Lord Liverpool in 1826.

Millions of voters swung to Labor in depressed northern England and in Scotland, but the party did not get a breakthrough where it most needed one — in the prosperous south and the central England industrial belt.

The centrist Alliance was the main loser to the Labor revival, dropping nearly half its seats.

Alliance co-leader David Owen saw his hopes of playing power broker in a stalemated Parliament dashed and said: "Mrs. Thatcher is still in."

"We didn't come through strongly enough to give people confidence to leave the Conservatives."

In a sweep reflecting what Thatcher critics call the north-south divide, the swing to Labor was ranging at 8 percent in Scotland, 10 percent in Wales and 5 percent in northern England.

Critics in Congress demand allies help safeguard their supplies of oil

WASHINGTON — President Reagan said Thursday he is satisfied with the limited support given him at the Venice summit for his Persian Gulf security policies, but congressional critics maintained that Western Europe and Japan need to do more to protect their oil supplies.

"I'm pleased with the support our allies have shown," Reagan told a news conference in Venice, Italy, that followed the three-day summit meeting of seven industrialized democracies.

Reagan did not ask, and was not offered, military help for his plan to have the United States protect Kuwaiti tankers. Instead, the sum-

mit partners issued a communique pledging limited diplomatic support for the U.S. policy.

Reagan said he and the other leaders "spoke of the need for having a kind of single approach to maintaining the international waters there as international waters and so forth. And we're gratified completely by the response."

"I think it has been excellent that there was no criticism from any of our allies about this," the president said of his policy for the oil-rich region.

The U.S. plan is protect Kuwaiti tankers by putting them under American flags and captains and providing them with escorts by Navy warships.

Because Kuwait is an ally of Iraq, congressional critics worry that the United States will be drawn into the Iran-Iraq war. Those worries have been heightened by last month's Iraqi missile attack on the Navy frigate Stark, which killed 37 U.S. seamen.

Capitol Hill critics also say American allies should do more because the United States gets only 6 percent of its oil from the gulf, while Japan receives 70 percent of its fuel from the region and Western Europe 40 percent.

"Standing by your friends is a two-way street," Rep. Bill Nichols, D-Ala., said Thursday. "We say we'll stand by our friends, but how many?"

Collider: Super benefit or super expensive?

LOS ANGELES — A proposal launched by President Reagan to build a \$4.4 billion atom smasher, potentially the most expensive scientific instrument ever built, is drawing increasing criticism on grounds it would drain money from more practical research.

The superconducting super collider "is supposed to be so wonderful and so good and so pure, but when you get right down to it, it's too expensive," said physicist-engineer Robert L. Hirsch, a former federal energy official who is research vice president for Arco Oil and Gas Co. in Plano, Texas.

Cornell University physicist Neil Ashcroft said, "There's a real danger other scientific enterprises, particularly those of immediate practical benefit to the country, will be underfunded or unfunded," despite administration pledges to the contrary.

The collider has been hailed as physicists' equivalent of landing a man on the moon. Because it is aimed at answering some of science's

Kimberly water expert helping Idaho try to land project

BOISE — A Kimberly-based water expert is helping the state prepare information to attract the \$4.4 billion Superconducting Supercollider project.

Chuck Brockway, associate director of the Idaho Water Research Institute, will be confirming the adequacy of water resources at Idaho's proposed site for the huge atom smasher, says Rick Tremblay, Idaho's coordinator for the project. Brockway is also a professor of agricultural and civil engineering at the University of Idaho.

Brockway will be joined by other researchers from the University of Idaho, Idaho State Uni-

versity and Boise State University who will look at geologic and seismic data that Tremblay wants collected in the event that the National Academy of Sciences or National Academy of Engineers has questions on the state's proposal.

The academics will recommend the best sites to the U.S. Department of Energy in December 1987, according to DOE. Idaho and the other states vying for the world's largest atom smasher project have to submit their proposals to DOE by Aug. 3, says Tremblay.

The work by the university researchers will be completed after the state's proposal is submitted to DOE. The data will be used for backup in the event the National Academy of Sciences or the National Academy of Engineers has ques-

tions, Tremblay says.

"We're looking for insurance policies after the main work of the proposal is completed," he says.

Brockway will determine the current water rights at the proposed Idaho National Engineering Laboratory site and what rights need to be applied for, Tremblay says. He also will determine what permits will be required from government agencies should the INEL site west of Idaho Falls be the ultimate site. Secretary of Energy John Herrington will announce the final site selection in January 1989.

The Idaho research work will be paid for by a \$27,000 special appropriation made by the state.

most profound questions — what is matter and how was it created in the infant universe — opposition remains "in the grumbling stages," said William Brinkman, research and physics director at AT&T Bell Laboratories in Murray Hill, N.J.

However, Rep. Don Ritter, R-Pa.,

a collider foe, predicts "political clashes the likes of which we've not seen in science" will occur once the "cost-sinks in and once the collider site is selected in July 1988 from among the two dozen competing states.

The collider, endorsed by Reagan

in January, carries a price tag of \$4.4 billion in current dollars and \$3.3 billion in 1996, the year it's slated for completion. The device is expected to create 4,500 construction jobs, 2,500 permanent jobs and have a \$270 million annual operating budget.

Inside the machine, an

underground, racetrack-shaped tunnel 33 miles in circumference, two beams of subatomic particles called protons would collide head-on with 20 times more energy than can now be achieved by the largest existing particle accelerator.

Without the collider, high-energy

physicists say they won't be able to learn as much about the nature of matter than quarks and leptons exist. They would also be stalled in their efforts to develop a "grand unified theory" or "theory of everything" to explain the particles and forces that make up and influence all matter.

Despite the collider's scientific value, Cornell's Ashcroft said there must be "a limit to what you're willing to pay to know the answer to an intellectual puzzle, no matter how challenging and intellectually fascinating it is."

Even supporters fear the "big science" collider will bleed money from "little science" in which individual scientists or small groups conduct basic research that often yields major discoveries. Others say it will hurt applied research, which produces practical innovations to help keep U.S. businesses competitive.

So among scientists, "there is a small minority in opposition; there's a much larger majority nervously in favor," said physicist Leon Leder-

Seoul police, students battle near cathedral

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Hundreds of students occupied the compound of the Roman Catholic cathedral, built barricades and battled police Thursday night with firebombs, rocks, wooden clubs and iron bars.

Several thousand demonstrators chanting "Down with military dictatorship" and demanding the ouster of President Chun Doo-hwan's ruling party clashed with helmeted riot police in the downtown Seoul for a second day.

The National Coalition for a Democratic Constitution, an alliance of opposition politicians, religious and human rights activists, said Wednesday's protests were the start of a

nationwide drive to oust Chun's government and initiate reforms for greater freedom. The protests were timed to coincide with the convention of Chun's Democratic Justice Party, which on Wednesday endorsed the ex-general's designated successor, Roh Tae-woo.

Newspapers also reported outside Seoul on Thursday, with hundreds of students, clashing with police in the streets of the southern port of Pusan after they tried to march on a U.S. cultural center.

Yonhap, the Korean news agency, reported protests on campuses in Pusan and in the central city of Taechon and said hundreds of students clashed with police.

Panama calls out military

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) — The government declared a state of emergency Thursday, sending hundreds of troops into the capital's streets after two days of battles between police and demonstrators protesting military leadership.

The emergency declaration temporarily suspends eight articles of the constitution, among them those guaranteeing freedom of expression and assembly and freedom from undue search and seizure.

It also suspends freedom of movement and the inviolability of

correspondence and telephone calls, the right of habeas corpus and the right to be informed of the reason for arrest and to consult an attorney.

By evening there had been no respite of the clashes that rocked the capital Tuesday and Wednesday, and only a few cars moved through the streets.

Twice during the day, the sounds of explosives, car bombs and pots and pans could be heard. Protesters had urged residents to create the noise at noon and 6 p.m.

of these attacks, "I think the American public is hearing only rhetoric."

Nichols commented to Assistant Secretary of State Richard Murphy at a hearing of a House Armed Services subcommittee. Critics of the administration position also came as a House Foreign Affairs subcommittee hearing with Michael Armacost, undersecretary of state for political affairs.

Both Armacost and Murphy defended the administration's policy change, telling the two panels that it was intended to protect U.S. allies, discourage the Soviet Union from moving into the gulf and show resolve to America's friends in the Arab world.

Armacost and Assistant Defense Secretary Richard Armitage faced another round of sharp questions in the afternoon from the Senate Armed Services Committee.

"We have some real questions as to the degree of commitment" of U.S. allies to defending the oil lines, said Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz.

Sen. John Warner, R-Va., said, "I want to support the president, and I'm struggling to do so" because the administration has done an inadequate job of explaining its goals.

Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, said "we got into the ditch" by approving the Kuwaiti plan without first winning public support.

He questioned if U.S. allies aren't more active, Armacost said, "because many of our allies don't perceive an increased threat in recent months."

Experts

Reagan said the U.S. plan is aimed at deterring attacks on oil tankers, but he declined to say whether the Pentagon is planning a pre-emptive strike at Iran's Silkworm missiles. The Chinese built weapons could be fired at ships going through the Strait of Hormuz at the entrance to the gulf.

"When you get down to actual tactics, how the balance is to be done, you're in a field that I cannot answer nor should," he said.

Rep. Stephen Solarz, D-N.Y., told Armacost that "the president has used grandiose and grandiloquent rhetoric that bears little relation to the reality of the situation."

Rep. Tom Lantos, D-Calif., called the reflagging of U.S. Kuwaiti oil tankers "a very much overblown. These ships will continue to be owned and operated by Kuwait."

Lantos is co-sponsoring a bill that would allow private money to be raised. Congress approves it first. Armacost said the administration will oppose the measure if it passes Congress.

Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., chairman of the Armed Services Committee, told Murphy that the administration policy "does have a lot of support in this country." And he said, "see no evidence that any policy was ever pursued other than granting the Kuwaiti request."

Rep. Dan Daniel, D-Vt., said his constituents "are very much concerned that we're not getting much help" from U.S. allies.

Murphy, while defending the administration's policy, agreed that "I know there is a concern among the states that this is foreign policy by impulse."

Murphy said "allied efforts can take many and varied forms," chiefly in the international political arena where he said they support U.S. efforts to end the Iran-Iraq war.

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Board of Education recently. The money will allow the universities to cover the costs of teaching replacements for the professors doing the consulting on the SSC, says a spokesman for the board.

The money is part of a \$2 million appropriation by the board. A board committee will make recommendations on how the balance is to be used, the spokesman says.

BSU's Walt Snyder, a geologist, will review and provide comment on the geoscience and physical data at the site, Tremblay says.

Geological stability is one of the criteria set by DOE for a proposed site. The Supercollider is a 52-mile-in-diameter particle accelerator which scientists hope will give them new

insights into the most basic elements of matter.

Studies on what would happen if there is a major earthquake at the proposed site will be done by Jack Pelton, a BSU geologist, says Tremblay. Pelton will evaluate ground motion and do vibration and seismic monitoring.

Pelton will probably complete his work by December 1, Tremblay says. Jerry Howard of the University of Idaho will do basalt rock excavations to provide confirmation of the cost and scheduling for construction, Tremblay says.

Dave Rodgers and Bill Hackett, both BSU geologists, will examine current U.S. Geological Survey data at the proposed site and verify its accuracy.

"It's a good thing the timing is in the summer. It's either now or we just can't do it," says Tremblay. He says during the winter months projectors can't do much geological field-work and their schedules clash in the fall and winter conflict with consulting.

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man, director of the Fermi National Accelerator Laboratory in Batavia, Ill., site of what is now the nation's largest atom smasher.

Reagan strongly opposes cutting other science funds to finance the collider and has proposed doubling the National Science Foundation's budget for research — a proposal Lederman said "relieves us a lot."

But it will fall to Congress to decide whether to allot money to the collider or finance other costly projects such as the space station, space plane and Reagan's "Star Wars" antimissile defense system, Ritter said.

Brinkman, Hirsch, Ritter and other collider critics argue that U.S. industrial competitiveness would benefit more from research into superconductors, semiconductors, computers, robotics and manufac-

turing processes.

"We need practical technology in this country to create jobs, reduce the national deficit and reduce the trade deficit," Hirsch said.

Alvin Trivelpiece, a former assistant secretary of energy and now top staffer of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, counters that about one-third of the gross national product "owes its existence to our basic knowledge of the atom and its subatomic parts. A lot of that knowledge comes from research in high-energy physics."

A few collider critics also argue the device will use outmoded technology: superheated metal superconductors in the 10,000 magnets that bend and compress its proton beams. Newly developed superconductors, which are made of ceramic substances, could shave up to \$200 million from the collider's cost, Ritter said.

Reagan to call for end to Berlin Wall

VENICE, Italy (AP) — President Reagan plans to stand at the Berlin Wall's Brandenburg Gate today and challenge Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev to "open this gate" and tear down the wall that has divided East and West Berlin for 26 years.

In a speech released Thursday night prior to a planned telecast throughout Europe, Reagan declared, "Es gibt nur ein Berlin."

"There is only one Berlin," he said. "If you seek peace, if you seek prosperity for the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe, if you seek liberalization, come here to this gate," Reagan said in the speech to be read before the gate which is the wall's most famous landmark.

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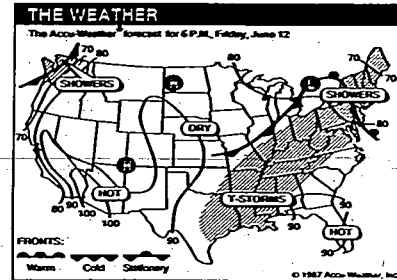
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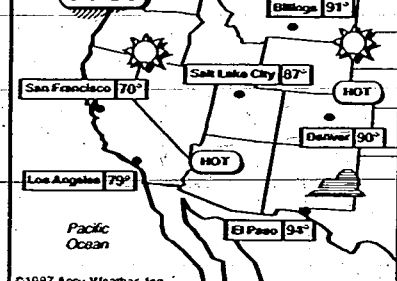

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FAA tightens procedures to slow traffic into busy airports

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Aviation Administration, pressed by critics to do something about mounting concern over air safety, implemented lighter procedures Thursday to slow down the air traffic flow into some of the country's busiest airports.

While the new air traffic restrictions are expected to ease pressure on controllers during busy parts of the day, agency officials acknowledge that the move also is likely to add to the mounting flight delay problem.

More planes are expected to be held on the ground or spread farther

apart in flight, officials said in describing the new restrictions.

The FAA said it already has implemented the lighter controls on the flow of traffic into 22 airspace "sectors" that feed the busy airports at Chicago, Atlanta, Newark, San Francisco and Detroit.

In all, about 125 of the 652 air traffic control "sectors" — most of them high-altitude airspace — were singled out by FAA as being likely targets for the traffic flow restrictions in the coming months, officials said.

Agency officials acknowledged

that the procedures, which include keeping planes on the ground, ordering pilots to reduce speed or rerouting some traffic in the air, are likely to aggravate delays, about which travelers have been complaining for months.

But Transportation Secretary Elizabeth Dole said the department already has taken a variety of actions to reduce delays and suggested the additional flight restrictions are needed to "keep pace with the growth in air traffic."

"On any given day, the FAA will restrict air traffic in as many [airspace] sectors as necessary to

keep the system at safe levels," Mrs. Dole said in a statement.

The FAA has been under fire from the National Transportation Safety Board and members of Congress for not doing enough to assure that controllers do not become overworked as the busy summer travel season begins.

Meanwhile, the FAA also is asking general aviation pilots to provide notice of up to four hours in advance before flying in air space above 23,000 feet to help the FAA manage traffic demand. This would affect mostly private business jets as well as some other general aviation air-

craft.

In a related matter, the FAA announced it was asking interested parties to comment on a proposed regulation which would expand so-called terminal control areas around the country. The TCAs are sections of airspace around busy airports in which a pilot must have certain equipment and air traffic control permission before being allowed to enter.

The FAA said after the 1986 collision of a Mexican jetliner and a private plane inside the Los Angeles TCA that it would seek to have these types of restricted airspace expand-

ed to 30 miles from an airport.

The NTSB recently warned of an "erosion" of safety because of a rising number of flights and too few air traffic controllers. It called for a broad reduction in flight departures and arrivals at busy airports during heavy traffic periods.

The newly imposed "flow control" restrictions are hoped to accomplish largely what has been sought by the NTSB and members of Congress without actually interfering with airline scheduling or putting specific limits on departures at a large number of airports.

Reagan cancels sale of missiles

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration bowed to overwhelming congressional opposition Thursday and withdrew a proposed \$360 million sale of enhanced Maverick air-to-ground missiles to Saudi Arabia.

At least 67 senators — the exact number needed to override a presidential veto — co-sponsored a resolution of disapproval. Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., the deputy Democratic leader, said the final tally would have been higher than that.

"It's probably a reading of the handwriting on the wall," said Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va.

Even Republican leader Bob Dole of Kansas said he would have voted for the disapproval resolution, partially on grounds the administration sent its arms sales proposal to Capitol Hill in a surprise move without adequate consultations in advance.

The development constituted a serious foreign policy reversal for the administration.

President Reagan, in a statement issued from Venice, said he deeply regretted "the necessity, to temporarily, to withdraw the proposal to sell modified Maverick air-to-ground missiles to Saudi Arabia."

He cited "strong congressional

opposition."

"To avoid further delays, I will undertake additional consultations with Congress and resubmit the necessary notifications at the earliest possible date," Reagan said.

He said that arms sales to Saudi Arabia "do not upset the military balance in the region" and "are directly related to the protection of our long-term interests in the Persian Gulf."

The enhanced Maverick missile is an effective anti-tank weapon with a range of four to five miles. It has a radar guidance system for night attacks. Saudi Arabia had said it needed additional Mavericks to deter a military threat from Iran.

But the sale had been vigorously opposed by Israel which said it posed a threat to its security.

Several key senators said widespread opposition to the sale, coming at a time of rising tension in the oil-rich Persian Gulf, should sound a warning to the administration not to place the American flag on tankers belonging to Kuwait until Congress has been fully consulted.

Dole said he had advised the administration to send up the sale notification informally to permit adequate discussion of it.

Experts say bigger quake coming for Midwest

CARBONDALE, Ill. (AP) — An earthquake that rocked 16 states caused low-level alerts at several nuclear plants without interrupting service, but seismologists warned Thursday that a much more severe jolt is inevitable.

"It will be ugly," said E. Eric Jones, executive director of the Central United States Earthquake Consortium. "There's going to be an earthquake before the turn of the century. But we're not prepared."

Only scattered property damage was reported Wednesday and no serious injuries, although it was scary for a time.

"I thought I was on my way to heaven," said Essie Anderson, a custodian at the 35-story Indiana National Bank tower in downtown Indianapolis. "When you're on the ninth floor and the building gets to rocking and reeling, you get to thinking."

Three nuclear plants in Illinois, two in Michigan and one in Minnesota declared "unusual events" — the lowest form of alert — because of the earthquake, said spokesman Jan Strasma of the federal Nuclear Regulatory Commission in Glen Elly.

There were no reports of damage

or disruption of service to any plant, and the declarations have not been lifted, Strasma said.

"Unusual events" largely are notification to governmental authorities that there has been some sort of incident or event with the potential to affect the nuclear plant, but which has not created a public hazard," Strasma said.

Four nuclear plants in Illinois did not report "unusual events," he said.

According to the National Earthquake Information Center in Golden, Colo., Wednesday's quake, at 5:49 p.m. MDT, was centered near Lawrenceville, Ill., 55 miles north of Evansville, Ind. It measured 5.0 on the Richter scale.

It was the Midwest's strongest earthquake since Nov. 9, 1968, when one measuring 5.5 struck just north of Harrisburg.

Wednesday's tremor broke windows and rattled walls from Kansas to South Carolina and parts of Canada.

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Firing laid on Meese

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former Commerce Department official said Thursday he was fired in 1983 by then-White House counselor Edwin Meese III after forcing defense contractor Wedtech Corp. to repay \$3.2 million in delinquent loans.

Carlos Campbell, ex-assistant secretary in the Commerce Department's Economic Development Administration, said his removal came in part because he resisted pressure from former White House political director Lynn Nofziger and Nofziger's lobbying partner, Mark Bragg, to "rubber-stamp" a plan to assist the now-scandal-plagued firm four years ago.

Through their lawyers, now-Atorney General Meese, Nofziger and Bragg all denied Campbell's claims. Campbell, who left the EDA amid allegations that he had awarded

grants to friends' businesses, is one of several Reagan administration officials who were pushed out of their jobs shortly after impeding various forms of federal assistance to Wedtech, based in the Bronx, N.Y.

"The Wedtech proceedings had much to do with Meese removing me as assistant secretary," Campbell said in an interview. "I was sent in there to collect bad debts and protect the government's interests. That's what I tried to do with Wedtech and I was the one who paid for it."

Hall's testimony shreds claims as surely as vital evidence

WASHINGTON — When Fawn Hall testified that she shredded remains of secret White House documents last fall and then walked out of her office with incriminating classified papers stuffed inside her boots and dress, the Iran-Contra affair entered a new phase of public consciousness.

After her sworn testimony, no one can ever claim credibly that this episode was merely a sad example of official good intentions gone awry. Nor can anyone argue convincingly that, however many mistakes were made, this was not a case of corruption.

Hall's testimony shredded those claims as surely as the shredder in the late National Security Council's office pulverized vital evidence last November. What was revealed by her and by others testifying in the last six weeks, is a White House strategy of historical cover-up. In the scope of its lawlessness, it rivals the Teapot Dome scandals in the Harding administration and Watergate under Richard M. Nixon.

The Iran-contra affair is exposed as a massive attempt at an official cover-up after lengthy and elaborate attempts to circumvent the spirit and letter of law and the expressed will of Congress over several years. When their illicit actions began to surface, U.S. officials lied, destroyed evidence, conspired to keep silent and thus obstructed justice.

From the highest levels of government, no one emerges from this story looking good. For example, the late testimony detailing the desperate attempt to destroy evidence and to cover up inside the White House complex makes a mockery of claims by Attorney General Edwin Meese III last November after the scandal erupted. Despite published reports that documents had been



shredded in Lt. Col. Oliver L. North's NSC office, Meese then cited no need to call in Federal Bureau of Investigation agents and secure evidence because no reason existed to suspect criminal actions.

Ironically, the witness whose actions seem most understandable is

Hall, the loyal, dedicated young secretary. She, at least, committed her acts out of what she thought the best of motives — to save admired higher-ups in whom she believed and to preserve a secret official policy that she also deeply believed to be in the country's best interests.

"I was very emotional at the time," she told congressional investigators Monday in explaining why she shredded documents and altered classified papers, "and I was concerned about protecting the Iran initiative and the Contra initiative."

The same cannot be said so easily about motivations of others who implicated in the affair.

A sordid story of greed and corruption has been spun before Congress and the public. Many of those who came before the select investigating congressional committee

tees claimed that they acted out of purely patriotic motives. Now they have been tainted by hard evidence of profiting. The desire to make big bucks is at the center of a tale characterized by great amounts of cash, much of which remains unaccounted for and which flowed secretly into many channels and pockets.

Sen. William S. Cohen, R-Maine, referring to accounts of dealing and double-dealing by administration officials and their operatives, put it best when he described the episode as "a story of betrayal."

It has also been a story of true believers, zealots with misguided notions of patriotism.

"I don't like people coming in here waving the flag and spitting on the Constitution," Senate ethics committee Vice Chairman Warren B. Rudman, R-N.H., said in obvious disgust during a recent break in testimony.

Senate committee Chairman Daniel K. Inouye, D-Hawaii, memorably expressed another aspect, saying he has been disturbed by laughter that frequently greeted comments of some of the private-public operatives who testified about their roles as secret agents for the United States. To find, he said, in tones of utmost dignity, "an American lieutenant colonel, who everyone suggests is second only to the president of the United States, committing this country, its power and majesty, to defend Iran, without even consultation with the Congress of the United States, is just unbelievable. . . . I just hope the people of the United States realize this was not a funny business. This was very tragic business."

That encapsulates the testimony. If the American people find this amusing or acceptable, in the 200th anniversary year of the Constitution, then God help the Republic.

Time is right to change banking laws

WASHINGTON — Timing is everything — and the time is right to change the post-deposition laws under which banks and other financial institutions operate.

A recent measure approved by the Senate offers a viable framework for addressing this need. Banks, particularly agricultural and energy lenders, are failing at a rate unseen since the Great Depression. In part, their demise is due to restrictive state and federal laws that create an inflexible regulatory system and impose artificial geographic and product boundaries on the markets in which they can operate.

At one time, these laws protected banks by allocating markets and prohibiting deposit institutions from the excesses of unrestricted competition. Today, declining profit margins and rising failures reflect a fundamental change: banks required to operate under these antiquated protectionist statutes are unable to supply the range of products and services demanded by consumers.

As consumers turn to other, less regulated suppliers of financial services, "full service" banks increasingly lose out to "niche service" competitors.

In struggling with the question of how to restructure the financial system, the Senate has demonstrated that it recognizes the problem has not been solvable at the regulatory level. The parties in interest are too persuasive, their PACs too strong and the territory too lucrative. Further, the interested parties have not attempted or been able to settle the issue among themselves.

As a result, senators are proposing to establish a blue-ribbon presidential commission, like the Social Security study group chaired by Alan Greenspan, to evaluate the problem and seek a solution acceptable to all segments of the financial services industry. It's an idea the conference committee should adopt when the Senate and the House get together to iron out differences between their plans to rehabilitate the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation.

The commission proposed by the Senate would have representation from every constituent group that has contributed to the unending debate over the future of our financial system — the industry, regulators, lawmakers and consumers. This approach holds the potential to bypass competing "hired gun" lobbyists and "his" services, "he" shall have power to make treaties, and "he" may do all kinds of other things. When Nancy Kassebaum of

could be undertaken of the needs of banks and other financial institutions, insurance concerns, investment banks and real estate interests.

A good starting point for these deliberations would be an evaluation of the various proposals presented by numerous academics, the New York Fed's Gerald Corrigan, Federal Reserve Board member Robert Heller, the Association of Bank Holding Companies and others.

The commission should deal with these questions:

- Is it necessary to require the separation of banks from various types of business activities? Corrigan says "yes," and he would add new regulatory layers to achieve this objective; many of the academics say "no." This concept has many followers and has influenced the debate concerning the future of the financial services industry. It should be tested. The burden of proof that such a separation is necessary should be on those who would place additional regulatory restrictions on the industry.
- Because banks, as all agree, must be subject to safety surveillance to ensure a stable banking system, what does this mean for their owners and affiliates? Should they be subject to the same kind and level of supervision?

Our banks are in a competitive battle at home and abroad. We cannot afford an overly complicated and costly regulatory system. We want to preserve the safety of our banking institutions, but this objective should be accomplished simply and at the least possible cost. The commission should determine whether a non-banking

business can own a bank and whether a bank can affiliate with a securities firm, insurance company or any other type of business entity without exposing itself to excessive risk.

It must address the question of whether regulators can adequately insulate a bank so it is not jeopardized by the other business activities of its owners, subsidiaries or affiliates. If they can — and professional regulators at the FDIC believe banks can be effectively insulated — our regulatory approach could be simple and focused on banks, not on tiers of holding companies, as envisioned in the Corrigan approach.

Discussions regarding the future of our financial system have been going on for more than a decade. We should wait for a crisis before taking decisive action.

Leaders of the financial community, both in and out of government, should reason together and fashion a sensible response that offers a structure all can support and which will have the basis and consensus on which to act.

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House of Our Fathers will continue to serve the nation well

WASHINGTON — In this bicentennial year of the Constitution, most of the commemorative programs seem to be aimed at venerating the old girl, and up to a point this is fine.

As a product of time and circumstance, the charter that emerged from the "miracle of Philadelphia" deserves all the praise that is heaped upon it.

But as Justice Thurgood Marshall reminded us last month, the Constitution, great as it is, remains in many respects a product of the 18th century. The worst of its original provisions, among them slavery, were wiped out by the Reconstruction Amendments of 1865-70. Other archaic provisions remain, and though these are largely of antiquarian interest, they have little or no place in a contemporary constitution.

Suppose, to be supposing, that a new constitution were to be ordained, with instructions to tidy up the document. Mind you, I am not proposing any such thing; I would fight like a tiger against the actuality. The thought of 53 delegates sitting down in the

District of Columbia Convention Center, with an unlimited power to rewrite the Constitution, is enough to strike terror into the hardest heart.

Even so, as a pleasant summer pastime, speculation on constitutional revision is more rewarding than watching "Wheel of Fortune." The topic offers a refreshing escape from the mazes of the Iran-Contra affair. What might be suggested toward improving the house of our fathers?

Like any remodeling job, some of the work would be cosmetic, some of it substantive. Our hypothetical convention might begin with paint and wallpaper.

There no longer is reason to give Congress

or the states the power to grant letters of marque and reprisal. The provision should be eliminated. The power to establish "post roads" must be clarified. A clause relating to the erection of "forts, magazines, arsenals, dockyards and other needful buildings" could use some attention. It seems most unlikely that any state would attempt to grant a title of nobility; the prohibition is surplusage.

As a gesture toward those who find "sexism" abhorrent, parts of Articles I and II should be polished up. The Constitution assumes that senators, representatives and presidents will be men. Thus a representative must be "an inhabitant of the state in which he shall be chosen." A senator must be "an inhabitant of the state for which he shall be chosen." (Notice, if you please, the precise choice of prepositions.) As for a president, "he" shall take the oath of office, "he" shall be compensated for "his" services, "he" shall have power to make treaties, and "he" may do all kinds of other things. When Nancy Kassebaum of

Kansas becomes president, these gender-specific clauses would be an embarrassment. The most useless provision in the Constitution says that a president "may require the opinion, in writing, of the principal officer in each of the executive departments upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices." Strike it out!

Under Article III, Congress is given power to declare the punishment for treason, which is desirable, but the clause goes on to say that "no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture except during the life of the person attained." What ever that means, it has no place in a Constitution for the 21st century.

Much discussion is heard of more substantial revisions. These go beyond cosmetic improvements and get into structural renovation. The Committee on the Constitutional System, a private group of scholars and public officials, proposes major changes in the procedure by which we elect members of the House and Senate. In an effort to strengthen party government, the commit-

tee would have us cast two ballots — one for the individual candidate of our choice, and a second "for the political party the voter chooses to have a majority of the House of Representatives vote for."

That recommendation generally is linked to a companion proposal by which the terms of representatives would be changed from two years to four years, thus coinciding with the election of a president. The idea is to achieve more efficient government, and it is the kind of idea that makes me so wary of any tinkering with the Constitution. Jefferson's admonition still contains great wisdom: "Beware of energetic governments! They are always oppressive."

All this is summertime reading, mostly speculation in a slowly swaying hammock. No such contemporary convention will be convened. We will muddle along for another 200 years with the same old house of our fathers, and it will continue to house us well.

'Here to stay,' Bakkers say on return to home, PTL park

FORT MILL, S.C. (AP) — Deposed evangelist Jim Bakker, who said Thursday he was "here to stay," was cheered by hundreds of supporters as he made a surprise visit to the Christian theme park he had abandoned amid a scandal of marital infidelity and financial extravagance.

It was Bakker's first return to the ministry's Heritage Village since he resigned in disgrace in March, and the public appearance, lasted only moments.

Asked why he came to Heritage Village, Bakker replied: "To say goodbye to it all. If Jerry Falwell lets us, we'll come back. But otherwise we are going to start a new ministry."

Last month, Bakker said he wanted to "return" to his television pulpit. However, the Rev. Jerry Falwell, who stepped in to direct PTL at Bakker's request in March, has said recently that Bakker has not repented of his greed and arrogance and is not welcome to return.

On Thursday, Bakker and his wife, Tammy Faye, were taken by motorboat from the rear of the lakeside home at Tega Cay, which PTL had ordered them to vacate. Then they got into one of two Mercedes-Benz limousines and were driven to Heritage USA — PTL's theme park and ministry headquarters, five miles from the home in Tega Cay.

C.J. Sloan of Melbourne, Fla., said Bakker shook his hand. Bakker "shook a few hands, kissed a couple of kids, got back into the car and left," Sloan said. Reporters and Bakker's fans were not told where the Bakkers were heading. Falwell spokesman Mark DeMoss said he did not know what was behind Bakker's visit to Heritage Village.

"He's certainly entitled to go on the grounds," DeMoss said. "He's not going to regain this ministry by walking on the grounds."

Hours earlier, Bakker had stood in front of the Tega Cay home and declared, "We're here to stay."

In that brief exchange with reporters, Bakker did not elaborate on the remark and it was unclear whether he intended to defy the eviction order from the new leaders of the PTL ministry.

Harry Hargrave, PTL's new chief operating officer, said PTL officials will meet with the Bakkers over the next few days, and work with the Bakkers to determine which of the contents of the home belong to PTL and which to the ministry.

The Bakkers have been sequestered in their Palm Springs, Calif., home since March when Bakker handed PTL over to Falwell after admitting a sexual encounter with a church secretary.

Hargrave wrote the Bakkers three weeks ago that they have until June 15 to get their belongings out of the \$1.5 million Lake Wylie home.

The Bakkers have been back on television within 30 days, and that he has received five offers to return to television ministry.

"I assume he is talking about somewhere else, not on PTL," DeMoss had said earlier.

Gasoline fumes spew from break

CENTREVILLE, Va. (AP) — Hundreds of homes were evacuated Thursday after a bulldozer ruptured an underground pipeline, spewing gasoline 100 feet into the air and releasing flammable vapors, Fairfax County authorities said.

The line was shut off almost immediately but officials evacuated the area because "it is a very volatile material and because there is a danger of explosion if it reaches an ignition source," said county fire department spokesman Lt. Mike Reilly.

The rupture occurred at the top of a hill and gasoline spilled down it. Firefighters diverted the gasoline into a storm sewer and two nearby ponds.

The gasoline drained for nearly one hour after it was shut off, and authorities doused it with foam and other materials to contain it, Reilly said.

There was no fire and no injuries were reported.

Residents of two townhouse developments, one of which is still under construction, were evacuated to a school and an elementary school about one-mile away was also evacuated. About 375 homes were evacuated, officials said.

Return to cooperative spirit needed in world

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — West German President Richard von Weizsaecker told Harvard University's alumni and graduating class Thursday there must be a return to the cooperative spirit that allowed the Marshall Plan to help rebuild Europe after World War II.

"We must find currencies other than just military power for (East and West) dealing with one another," Weizsaecker said.

"We do not want new conflicts about borders. We have learned painful lessons from history. But borders should lose their divisive nature for people," he said.

"The plan was visionary as great victors seldom are. The aim of the United States was to restore the confidence of the Europeans in their own strength, in their own political future," said Weizsaecker, in a speech prepared to commemorate another given 40 years ago in Harvard Yard.

In June 1947, at another Harvard commencement, Secretary of State George C. Marshall took 12 minutes to outline the economic prescription to repair Europe that came to bear his name.

"The Marshall Plan is and will remain the most fundamental achievement of the Western world

since the war," he said. Weizsaecker said Marshall's speech would "go down in history" and recalled for the audience the times in which the plan was put forth.

When President Harry S. Truman signed the plan in 1948, in the form of the Foreign Assistance Act, he authorized \$17 billion for grants and loans to European governments over the ensuing four years.

With that help, European countries, including West Germany, restored industry and agriculture, stabilized their currencies and saw their gross national products swell as much as 25 percent.

Weizsaecker spoke to more than 20,000 people at the annual meeting of the Harvard alumni association. Earlier in the day, more than 5,000 graduate and undergraduate degrees were conferred.

'Christian-bashing' by GOP may drive evangelicals into 3rd party

WASHINGTON (AP) — A leader of the religious right, citing a joke Vice President George Bush told about Oral Roberts, said Thursday that Republicans are engaging in "Christian-bashing" and may drive conservative evangelicals to desert the GOP and form a third party.

"It's a bunch of baloney," retorted a spokesman for the Republican National Committee, when asked about the accusation.

The Bush joke was one of several incidents singled out by Robert Grant, chairman of Christian Voice, in a report called "Crisis in the GOP."

"Tension between Vice President Bush and the religious right is mounting in key primary states," said Grant, who has complained in the past that Republicans were mistreating conservative Christians.

Christian Voice is a lobbying group that issues a "Biblical Scorecard"

on what it calls "the family-moral-freedom issues." They include not only abortion and school prayer, but also support for increased defense spending, "Star Wars," and aid to anti-communist insurgents in Nicaragua, Afghanistan, Angola and elsewhere.

Party spokesman Robert Schermund brushed aside Grant's complaint as baloney and said GOP chairman Frank J.ahrenkopf Jr. "has stated publicly many times that we welcome the support of the so-called evangelicals."

Schermund said there may well have been instances of clashes between evangelicals and party regulars but they were "few and isolated instances on the local level."

Grant wrote that in March "the conservative evangelical group was outraged when Vice President Bush referred to the Lord's name in a trite and disrespectful manner.

when joking about Oral Roberts' claim that God will 'call him home' if he did not raise \$8 million.

"Bush reportedly said that a new fundamentalist group had been formed called 'LORD,' which he said stands for 'Let Oral Roberts Die.'"

Gayle Fisher, an aide to Bush, said the vice president was at a closed fund-raiser in Michigan and repeated a joke he had heard.

"There was no malicious or harmful intent," she said.

Grant also cited an instance in Michigan last summer where Bush supporters competing with the Rev. Pat Robertson for support in GOP precinct delegate elections, circulated fliers headlined, "Keep Religion Out of Politics. Supporters of Rev. Pat Robertson are trying to take over the party."

The Christian Voice leader also cited criticism of evangelicals by Bush and Sen. Robert Packwood, R-Ore., as examples of "Christian-bashing."

He quoted the vice president as criticizing fundamentalists who "dictate their interpretation of morality on the rest of society."

Grant quoted Packwood as attacking conservative Christians because they want "the government on your backs, under your beds and in your minds."

Packwood aide Etta Fielek said the quote was accurate.

Controllers vote for a union

WASHINGTON (AP) — Amid increasing complaints about working conditions, the nation's air traffic controllers decided by a better than 2-to-1 margin Thursday to again embrace a union — six years after a devastating strike saw more than 11,000 controllers fired.

The controllers in five weeks of balloting voted 7,494 to 3,275 to accept the National Air Traffic Controllers Association as their bargaining agent. The new union specifically forbids a strike.

The Federal Labor Relations Authority made the vote public after four hours of counting ballots. In all, 84 percent of the eligible controllers voted, the agency noted.

About 70 percent of the controllers who voted approved the union. A majority approval from those who voted was required for the union to

be certified as the controllers' bargaining agent.

John Thornton, the union's national coordinator, had said before the vote that he expected about 70 percent to be the margin of victory after it was determined that better than four of every five controllers had cast ballots at the airport towers and 20 air route traffic control centers around the country.

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Martin fired afterburners

RIVERSIDE, Calif. (AP) — Actor Dean Paul Martin crashed his Air National Guard jet into a mountainside after he inexplicably switched on the afterburners while an air traffic controller tried to order a course change, an Air Force report says.

Martin, the son of entertainer Dean Martin, apparently never heard the controller's order because transmissions from other aircraft interfered, according to a transcript of communications between the California Air National Guard pilot and a Federal Aviation Administration controller at Ontario International Airport.

The report was obtained Wednesday by The Press-Enterprise of Riverside.

Martin's last words before slamming into a mountainside were a request for a course change the controller had transmitted already.

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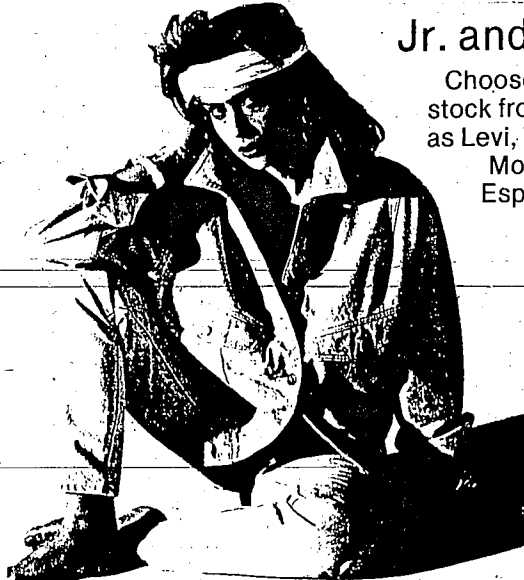
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Pope lauds Solidarity, draws Poles' cheers

GDANSK, Poland (AP) — Pope John Paul II on Thursday declared the outlawed Solidarity movement essential to the struggle for freedom, and throngs of Poles cheered his strong words of praise for the outlawed independent labor union.

A wildly cheering crowd of 300,000 in the town of Gdynia just outside Gdansk chanted, "Stay with us, stay with us!" after the speech by the Polish-born pope.

While Solidarity banners were held aloft by the crowd.

As the people cheered and the sun set on this far-northern town, the pontiff boarded a motor launch on his way down the Baltic Coast to Gdansk for a meeting with Solidarity chief Lech Walesa.

The two talked for 40 minutes late Thursday in the company of two other church officials.

An elated Walesa returned to his Gdansk apartment shortly before midnight and told waiting journalists that "the meeting was great."

"The atmosphere was great because we were in a place we know and we could just be ourselves," Walesa said. He did not reveal the details of the talks.

In Gdynia, the faithful continued to sing until only the running lights of John Paul's launch were visible on the horizon.

"Solidarity is a way of life," the pontiff told the crowd in Polish in one of his extemporaneous remarks during the speech at the outdoor prayer service.

The pontiff's speech fit into his strategy of helping keep alive the spirit of Solidarity while trying to salvage some of the reforms promised by Poland's Communist government during the union's heyday in 1980 and 1981.

Critics rap renewal orders

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa: (AP) — Domestic and foreign critics of the South African government said Thursday renewal of the year-old state of emergency was unjustified and claimed suppression of dissent created a false sense of peace.

"The South African government's activities and decisions show a lack of appreciation for the fundamental causes of unrest and violence there," U.S. State Department spokeswoman Phyllis Oakley said in Washington.

She called the action unjustified and said reinstatement of emergency measures "will only continue to undermine opportunities for dialogue which could lead to a resolution of South Africa's internal problems."

The new decree extending for up to a year the state of emergency declared June 12, 1986, was announced Wednesday by President P. W. Botha, who said "the security of the state is at stake."

Guerrillas bring down plane

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — Radio Kabul reported Thursday that Afghan guerrillas firing U.S.-made Stinger missiles shot down an Afghan passenger plane, killing 53 of the 55 people on board.

The report from the Afghan capital, monitored in Islamabad, quoted government officials as saying the Soviet-built Antonov-26 plane was shot down as it flew from Afghanistan's Qat state to Kabul.

Radio Kabul said the 53 dead included the crew and passengers, among them 16 children and 10 women. There was no immediate claim from any guerrilla group that it shot down the plane.

At least two Afghan transport planes have been shot down this year in the increasingly active air war. Soviet-built jets have carried out attacks on Afghan guerrilla camps in Pakistan and Pakistani F-16 jets range along the border.

Iran ousts 4 British envoys

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Iran ordered Thursday that four more of Britain's diplomats leave the country, bringing to 14 the total expulsions by both sides in a dispute that began with the brief abduction of a British envoy.

State-run Tehran radio said Christopher MacRae, head of the British interest section at the Swedish Embassy in Tehran, was summoned to the Foreign Ministry and handed a note demanding that the Britons leave within 72 hours.

The four are John D. MacDonald, second secretary and head of the visa section; Robert V. Welborn, first secretary and consul, and attaches John N. Thornton and Marilyn McLaren.

Five other British diplomats were expelled Saturday, including first secretary Edward Chaplin, who was abducted in Tehran on May 28 and held for 24 hours.

Britain expelled five Iranian diplomats in response.

Air show at Paris takes off

PARIS (AP) — With thousands of police and soldiers patrolling the ground and sky, President Francois Mitterrand on Thursday inaugurated the 37th Paris Air Show, the world's biggest marketplace for planes and spacecraft.

"The face of aviation in the 21st century is being assembled here," Mitterrand said on French television, after arriving by helicopter at Le Bourget airport outside Paris to open the biennial show.

This year's show, the largest yet, drew nearly 1,500 exhibitors from 31 countries. It opens to the public today with more than 300,000 people expected.

Advanced military hardware, new space technology and the latest passenger planes crowd the exhibit halls, the outdoor display areas and the skies at the normally quiet airfield.

France wants to join talks on strategy

REYKJAVIK, Iceland (AP) — France, reversing a 20-year go-it-alone policy, told its NATO allies Thursday it wants a role in planning nuclear strategy toward the Soviet Union, a senior U.S. State Department official said.

"They are interested in participation," said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity. "We are not troubled by this. It is broadly in our interest to have everybody there who is a legitimate player and France is a legitimate player."

France's move, on the first day of a two-day meeting of 15 NATO foreign ministers, overshadowed the officials' consideration of the first prospective U.S. Soviet nuclear arms accord since 1979.

The ministers were expected to endorse on Friday the prospective superpower agreement, which would eliminate hundreds of medium- and shorter-range nuclear missiles from Europe.

France left NATO's integrated military command in 1967 while remaining a member of NATO. The U.S. official said France, while wanting to participate in allied consultations on nuclear arms, would remain outside of the decision-making process.

He said NATO was at a major turning point in devising arms control strategy. Now that a missile deal with Moscow is in sight, Secretary of State George P. Shultz is seeking to resolve differences with West Germany and France over where to go next in negotiations.

Universal workers to vote on joining union

TWIN FALLS — More than 600 non-union workers at Universal Frozen Foods, a Twin Falls potato processing plant, will vote on joining a Washington-based local of the International Union of Operating Engineers later this month.

After three months of organizing, Operating Engineers Local 220 of Richland, Wash., has gained a chance to represent the factory's production line and maintenance employees, union officials said Thursday.

The National Labor Relations Board, a federal agency that oversees union representation ballots, will hold the election June 25 at the plant on the city's south side, Local 220 Business Manager Don Busbey said.

If accepted as bargaining agent, the UFF will enter talks immediately with UFF management, he said.

UFF executives did not return phone calls and could not be contacted Thursday for comment.

Organizers have been holding meetings, contacting individual employees and passing out leaflets in order to form a bargaining unit. During the drive, close to 60 percent of the plant's employees have signed cards

petitioning for an election, roughly double the 30 percent threshold demanded by the NLRB, Busbey said.

Disaffected workers contacted an Operating Engineers agent who was working in Idaho to defeat the Right-to-Work referendum last year, said Roger Blades, chief organizer.

"Their biggest gripe out there is not being treated with dignity. Wages don't seem to be a big problem with them," he said. "They seem to work in fear of losing their jobs."

Some employees have charged that workers have been fired for being hurt on the job or for other reasons that would fall under

grievance procedures, the union representatives claimed.

"We've had statements from some of the employees that they have been intimidated" by managers because of their organizing activities, Busbey said. A committee of 15-20 UFF employees is working with union organizers on the drive.

Local 220 represents 2,000 industrial and public workers in factories in eastern Washington, eastern Oregon and Idaho. The local bargains in several other frozen potato plants in Washington, but UFF's second factory at Walla Walla, Wash., is not among them.

The election will be held at the plant on all three shifts during an extended lunch hour on June 25.

If approved, the local bargaining unit would include production, maintenance and in-plant warehouse workers. It would not include clerical employees, guards or supervisors, Busbey said. Almost all work full-time but a few technically are part-time employees.

Busbey said the local will base a staff representative in the area and conduct other organizing if it gains collective bargaining, rights at UFF.

Former police officer settles for \$20,000

Insurance companies reach agreement in Kimberly case

KIMBERLY — A former Kimberly police officer who asked \$1 million in damages against the cities of Kimberly and Twin Falls, their law enforcement officers and other officials has settled out of court for \$20,000.

Dave Mason filed a complaint last August in U.S. District Court in Boise, charging harassment in connection with an investigation of the Kimberly Police Department.

He named as defendants the two cities, Kimberly Police Chief J. Campbell, members of the Kimberly City Council, Twin Falls Public Safety Director Tim Qualls, Twin Falls city detective Gary Corder, the College of Southern Idaho and Wesley Deane, who heads the CSI law enforcement training program. Kimberly City Council members at the time the suit was filed, who were also named as defendants, are Jack Wright, Ted Wasko, Avis Allen and Sterling Crothers.

The suit did not name Ron Jones, who was mayor of Kimberly at the time and who called for the Idaho Attorney General to investigate police activities.

Kimberly City Attorney William Hofffield said the settlement is shared by all 11 defendants and all have settled and are clear of further court proceedings.

The suit filed by Mason charged that harassment forced him to resign in September 1985. He contended that his career as a police officer was ruined. In addition, he claimed he was forced to give up his police training at CSI because of the alleged harassment.

The settlement was reached between the insurance companies which represent the defendants, and the attorney for the plaintiff.

Hofffield said three insurance companies were involved and that it was their decision to settle out of court. He said the individual defendants have no choice in the matter.

The attorney general's staff was investigating allegations against the Kimberly police department when some personnel files disappeared from the police chief's office. Mason filed a second investigation requested by the Kimberly council and police chief to look into the removal of items from the police chief's files.

Councilman Jack Wright indicated Wednesday that he did not support the out of court settlement although the city apparently has no recourse.

He said it is time lawyers be held accountable for their actions in filing frivolous lawsuits. He said insurance companies should also be required to do what is morally right, rather than take the cheapest way out.

"There is a small percentage, and it is a very small percentage, of lawyers," Wright said, "who are concerned only about money. I think these men should be disbarred. Criteria for passing the bar is not as rigid as it once was."

"We have reached a point where anyone can file a suit against anyone for whatever reason and be assured that they will collect some money."

Wright said these easy settlements make insurance rates climb and it becomes a vicious circle.

"Cities then have to cut back on other costs to stay within their budgets. Sometimes this means salaries and we find the highly qualified and experienced city employees leave for better pay somewhere else," Wright explained.

He said the threat of lawsuits over minor things also discourage knowledgeable individuals from seeking of

Novelist tells of hard road to publishing

TWIN FALLS — Up to 8,000 pages of outlines, rough drafts and re-writes for a 325-page book may be written before accepted by a publisher, said local author Ridley Pearson.

Pearson, 34, lives in Halley and is the author of three published books and a 325-page book for Sawtooth Press Club members Thursday afternoon. Pearson told of his experiences as a novelist and free-lance article writer.

He grew up in Long Island, N.Y., and started writing seriously in 1976. Before novels, he was a songwriter for a band he performed with in the East. He wrote lyrics for about 300 songs, he said.

Lyrics began to stifle his creativity, so he turned to writing screenplays and, eventually, novels. "Trying to tell a story in 25-30 lines got to be claustrophobic creatively," he said.

He wrote his first novel with the intention of having it published as a paperback. In search of an agent, Pearson said he was asked if he were a "long-haired writer," which meant someone who refused to have his work edited.

"I told them that I was used to giving a song I'd written to a group of hippies and having them tear it apart," he said.

Being able to handle criticism and editing is important for writers who want to get their work published, he added.

The first novel he wrote was rejected at 18 publishing houses. "I've got the proverbial file at home and have enough rejection letters to wallpaper my bathroom," he said.

His agent then advised him to start another book, which was later published under the title "Never Look Back." Though the work was eventually published, it seemed to be heading in the same direction as the first.

"My agent told me it was time to write another book. Three days later, he called back and told me he had sold it," Pearson said.

Getting the book on store shelves was no easy task, he said. The publishing company, St. Martin's, told him they wanted him to change two aspects of the novel—the premise and the ending.

After writing almost 8,000 pages, worth of revisions, they printed 1,500 copies of the book, which sold out in seven days. The second printing, also 1,500 copies, sold out in 10 days. A final printing of 2,500 copies took about a month and a half to sell out, he said.

His second published novel, "The Blood of the Albatross," was a spy thriller and demanded extensive research, he said. Because the story is set in Canada and involves bio-genetics material, Pearson studied both to provide "firm research roots and make the story fully believable," he said.

Preparation for the novel also included a trip to Seattle to visit with an FBI official. "He told me what was realistic and what was not. He even had

Airport promotion advances slowly

TWIN FALLS — After almost two months of work, promotion efforts for the Twin Falls-Snow Valley airport are moving slowly ahead.

Since April, airport board member Greg Kadlec has been writing letters and working with travel agencies and airline companies to promote use at the Twin Falls airport.

"I know Greg is frustrated, but these things take time," board chairman Dick Shotwell said at a board meeting Tuesday.

At an April meeting, Kadlec said 70 percent of the Magic Valley travel agency customers drive to Salt Lake or Boise instead of using the Twin Falls airport, according to an informal survey conducted last year.

One idea that may take form is a promotional sign in the airport terminal. Kadlec proposed the sign and said the city of Twin Falls has offered to donate the funds for the sign.

The board recommended to airport manager Gary R. Meck that the promotional efforts, particularly constructing the billboard, continue.

At a May 12 board meeting with

several representatives from travel companies. It was noted that high fares may be keeping residents from using the airport.

"It's very superficial, they slept through half of it," said Black, who

attended the hearing. "They had already made up their minds — they couldn't let a new precedent."

Commission Chairman Lawrence Sirhal said commissioners "rehashed" all the materials Spooner submitted during the hour-long hearing later in a four-hour decision. He said the five-day time limit for decision in grievance hearings wasn't necessary.

"Just to make it look good to hold off for five days doesn't make any sense," Sirhal said.

Spooner acknowledges that as a field consultant he could be fired for no reason. But he is upset with the reasons given by his boss, Administrator Gary Silvers.

Silvers reasons for firing Spooner included suggestions of poor physical and mental instability and inability to work with others — all of which Spooner denies.

Spooner submitted more than a dozen letters from his doctor, co-workers and associates contradicting the allegations.

Silvers' fellow administrator, Gary Arnold, upheld the termination. Sirhal declined to outline reasons for upholding the dismissal.

"As a judge in those matters, we don't have to go into what our reasoning was," Sirhal said.

The commissioners' letter reads in part, "After considering all information presented, the commissioners conclude it is in the best interest of all parties, including the Industrial Commission and yourself, that your employment with the Industrial Commission be terminated effective today, June 9, 1987."

Black said the decision was unfortunate and that he would try to change the category of Spooner's former position from one where a state worker can be fired for no reason. He threatened to take up the topic when the commission's budget is before the Joint Appropriation and Finance Committee next session.

"Good people are losing their jobs because of political hacks," Black said.

Administrators and commissioners at the Industrial Commission are appointed by the governor.

Jerome lawyer James Meservy said he has discussed Spooner's case with him. Meservy said he is still digesting the material Spooner collected and that a decision on whether to sue the Industrial Commission should be made in a month.

Jones, who is a member of the small Aryan Nations group in Magic Valley said earlier this year

the state requested that Jones be required to file the tax return.

Dispute over firewood ignites shooting in park

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP) — A dispute over two sticks of firewood in Yellowstone National Park led to an exchange of gunfire and the subsequent arrest of two Utah men and a Texas man, officials said Thursday.

No one was injured during the altercation, which erupted early Tuesday at the Fishing Bridge campground on the north shore of Yellowstone Lake, park spokesman Greg Kirkland said.

Arrested were Stephen Glover, 38,

of Belton, Texas; Timothy Tippets, of Ogden, Utah; and Robert Chapman, 31, of Roy, Utah, according to Kirkland.

Tippets and Chapman were staying in the park together, he said.

Glover was charged with disorderly conduct, possession of a firearm, and discharging a firearm, he said. Tippets was charged with the same three counts, while Chapman was charged with possession of another person's property, said Kirkland.

The initial investigation indicated

that at least three shots were fired, either into the air or the ground, said Assistant Law Enforcement Specialist Pat Ozment.

"Apparently all of the shots were one or the other, not toward anybody that we're aware of," he said.

Under a plea bargain, U.S. Magistrate Steven Cole levied a \$1,000 fine against Glover and suspended the disorderly conduct charge, said Ozment. The Texas also was placed on probation for two

years, he said.

Tippets also entered guilty pleas to the charges and was fined \$150, had the disorderly conduct charge suspended, and was placed on probation for one year, the officer said.

Chapman, whose gun was unloaded, was not fined but was placed on probation for one year, according to Ozment. Wapman told authorities that relatives had given him the weapon. Ozment said the investigation indicated that the gun had been stolen.

Motor home plunge claims man

RIGBY (AP) — An Arizona man died at the wheel of a motor home that left the road and plunged into the South Fork of the Snake River, authorities said.

Kelli Killian, 66, of Lake Havasu, was driving the motor home at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday on U.S. 20 about five miles north of Rigby when the vehicle went off the pavement, through a fence and into the river, authorities

said.

Idaho State Police dispatcher Vickie McKinney said Killian's wife, Ludene, was in a car traveling behind the motor home, which the couple was reportedly delivering to a new owner.

The driver's side of the motor home was submerged in the water, the dispatcher said, and Killian had his seatbelt on.

Labor choice of candidate to be careful

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — AFL-CIO President Lane Kirkland says his 13 million-member organization would like to endorse a presidential candidate before the 1988 primary season, but isn't committed to doing so.

Kirkland was the keynote speaker Wednesday at the 20th constitutional convention of the American Federation of Grain Millers.

The AFL-CIO leadership will interview each candidate, Kirkland said. So far, 13 declared and potential presidential candidates from both political parties have been sent a list of five questions concerning organized labor.

"Their answers will be available to the membership through our various union publications," Kirkland said. "We want the membership's input into this process. It is important that we hear from members on this."

The organization's executive board will meet in October to possibly choose a candidate based on comments from union members. A two-thirds vote of the board will be needed for someone to be endorsed.

One candidate who may get a second look from the organization is Rep. Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., whose labor-supported bill to cut America's \$170 billion trade deficit is now in the Senate.

"This bill will save jobs and we have to get it passed through the Senate and then fight any veto attempt," Kirkland said. "But this is just one of many issues organized labor is facing."

Another issue is corporate takeovers and junk bonds which, Kirkland said, "are squandering billions of American dollars and costing American workers their jobs."

Kirkland said he was not too familiar with the federal government's proposed takeover of the Teamsters Union but added "it just doesn't seem to be a correct move by the government."

Hunt for missing child, 9, continues

AMERICAN FALLS (AP) — A 9-year-old Pocatello boy was missing and feared drowned in American Falls Reservoir on Thursday, the Power County Sheriff's Office said.

The boy, whose identity had not been released, was last seen floating in an inner tube at the boat and beach area of the American Falls Marina about 4:30 p.m. Wednesday.

The boy apparently fell off the inner tube, went under water and did not surface again, a sheriff's spokeswoman said.

Searchers, including the sheriff's department, American Falls police, Power and Bannock county search and rescue teams and divers from American Falls and H & H Dive and Salvage of Pocatello combed the area until midnight Wednesday and began again early Thursday.

Bowen goes home

POCATELLO (AP) — Idaho State University President Richard Bowen is recovering at home after being hospitalized for choking.

Bowen, ISU's president since 1985, was taken from the president's residence to Bannock Regional Medical Center Sunday night. Bowen's sons performed cardiopulmonary resuscitation on him en route to the hospital, said Sam Nichols, Bowen's administrative secretary.

She said Bowen called her Thursday and said he was doing well.

Pocatello man draws 15 years

BLACKFOOT (AP) — A Pocatello man has been given an indeterminate 15-year prison term for the stabbing death of a Sun Valley man last winter, but Douglas Flora and his attorney have not decided whether they will accept the sentence.

Flora, 25, was ordered imprisoned on Thursday by 7th District Judge H. Reynolds George for second-degree murder in the slaying of Lynn Olsen last Jan. 11 at a residence in Blackfoot.

Olsen, a laundry supervisor who graduated from high school in the Blackfoot area, died from the stab wound to his chest a few hours after the assault, and Flora was arrested the same day.

Flora was initially charged with first-degree murder, but in a plea bargaining agreement with prosecutors he agreed to plead guilty to second-degree murder last month.

Public Defender Dave Parmenter said he would talk to Flora soon about whether to accept the sentence or withdraw the guilty plea and demand a trial.

New fund manager appointed

LEWISTON (AP) — The former manager of the government worker pension fund in America Samoa has been named as the new director of Idaho's bill and pension systems.

Lawrence Carson will succeed Robert Venn, who is retiring this September after 20 years with the state Public Employee Retirement System and the last 4½ as its director.

Carson's appointment was approved by the five-member board that oversees the system. He will begin a six-week orientation course in mid-July.

The new director joins the fund in the midst of a running battle between the board's majority and Gov. Cecil Andrus over financial control of the \$1.2 billion account. The board incurred Andrus' wrath just after the November election when it voted unanimously to turn control of the fund over to a Tacoma, Wash., trust company.

Conference on labor sought

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ten members of the Pacific Northwest's congressional delegation called Thursday for a meeting with the Immigration and Naturalization Service and the State Department to discuss a solution to the region's shortage of migrant labor.

Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, said the delegation wants to meet with representatives of those agencies next Tuesday on problems keeping Hispanic workers from entering the Northwest to help with the harvest of fruit crops.

"It won't solve the current labor shortage effecting the Idaho cherry crop," Craig said. "But hopefully we'll get the problem solved so we have the labor force for sweet corn detasseling and other fruit crops."

He said a "bureaucratic boondoggle" has created a bottleneck in the flow of migrant labor to the region, cutting the farm work force by some 35 percent.

Laxalt postpones Gem visit

BOISE (AP) — Former Nevada governor and senator Paul Laxalt has postponed his scheduled trip to Idaho and Utah to gauge his support for the Republican presidential nomination.

Secretary of State Pete Cenarrusa said Thursday he has been notified that Laxalt, who was scheduled to appear in Boise and Salt Lake City on June 11, has been forced to reschedule the events because of other commitments.

Cenarrusa, who along with Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, heads Laxalt's Idaho exploratory committee, said Laxalt still is involved with the settlement of a lawsuit filed against a California newspaper.

Cenarrusa said the Laxalt visits to Utah and Idaho have not been rescheduled, but Laxalt still intends to make the visits.

Patrons reject school bonds

THOY (AP) — Patrons in northern Idaho's Whitepine School District have rejected \$23 million, 15-year bond issue that would have allowed some consolidation of the district's far-flung student population.

District spokeswoman Annette Erickson said 730 people, or 58.7 percent, voted against the proposal Wednesday, while only 512, or 41.2 percent, voted for it. There was one spoiled ballot.

A two-thirds majority was needed for passage.

The money was earmarked for construction of a unified high school for the district north of Thoy and a unified junior high school in Deary.

Arson case suspect in jail

ST. ANTHONY (AP) — St. Anthony police have arrested a local man suspected of starting a fire that did an estimated \$50,000 in damage to the city's post office.

Police Chief Don Powell said he saw the suspect, Layne Hansen, 31, running from the scene shortly after police arrived at 11:20 p.m. Wednesday.

Hansen was arrested about 1:30 a.m. Thursday and was being held in the Madison County Jail on arson charges, Fremont County Prosecutor Jack Hoopes said.

Federal charges could be filed pending an investigation by U.S. Postal Inspector William Klenzie of Boise.

The fire apparently started inside the letter drop box in the lobby of the building. Postmaster Leo Harker said, "It was not what I would call natural causes."

Banker says commitment recovery key

BOISE (AP) — Economic development requires commitment — and not just for one year, says an Idaho economist.

V. Dale Blickenstaff, vice chairman of Moore Financial Group, told a group of school educators here Thursday that the Idaho Legislature made a good start on economic recovery in the last session.

School funding was improved and the Legislature put up \$2 million for economic development, Blickenstaff told the Idaho Association of School Administrators.

But Blickenstaff said he was dismayed shortly after the session to hear talk that money would be short next session, indicating that

the economic development effort system, including the basic fact that there are limited resources available to meet unlimited wants of people.

Blickenstaff said Idaho has not shared in the economic recovery that started elsewhere in 1982, he said.

Blickenstaff told the educators he was a teacher in Kansas for several years before moving into other fields.

Like other state leaders, he said, administrators are important in that process, perhaps the single most important factor. "You hold the key to state lagging badly in such areas as job opening effectiveness and facilities."

He suggested five ways to improve Idaho and its economic characteristics.

Teachers must have a better understanding of the economic system, Blickenstaff urged the educators to support or buy stock in the Idaho Company, a private, for-profit organization to boost economic development.

In states that have been successful at economic development, it has taken a state-private partnership, Blickenstaff said.

In the last six years, he said, Idaho has lost 11,854 residents, or about 32 per cent, with estimates that the state will lose another 4,700 in the next two years.

If those people had been kept in the state, he said, it would have meant an additional payroll of \$236 million.

"Everybody is going to win when the economy gets moving again," Blickenstaff said.

Dallas' defense fund tops \$13,000; founder says he plans to repay it

BOISE (AP) — More than \$13,000 has been raised to help pay for legal expenses in defending convicted game-warden killer Claude Dallas from an escape charge.

And Laura Miller of Boise, administrator of the Claude Dallas Legal Defense Fund, said Thursday that the former trapper and ranch hand plans to repay all contributions after his release, even though it might take decades.

"I can tell you that is his intention when he's able to work again," Mrs. Miller said. "I can't speak for his exact plans."

She said the defense fund had reached its initial goal of meeting all the immediate costs of Dallas' case, including securing a new defense attorney after the resignation of Boise lawyer Bill Mauk.

"We've had a lot of small contributions, but we've also had a couple of rather significant ones," Mrs. Miller said.

She has said that Mauk indicated he would need \$15,000 to handle Dallas' case. The defense fund has "an agreement" for payment with the new attorney, Lance Churchill of

Boise, but she would not disclose its terms.

Dallas, 37, will appear before 4th District Judge George Carey on Tuesday to enter a plea to a charge that he cut his way out of the Idaho State Penitentiary and escaped into the southern Idaho high desert on Easter night 1985.

Churchill said after a preliminary hearing before Ada County Magistrate Patricia Borah this past Monday that Dallas would plead innocent and request a jury trial.

Dallas, who has been characterized by some as a mountain man and a loner, was on the FBI's Ten Most Wanted list until being captured March 8 outside a southern California convenience store.

Mrs. Miller said Dallas supporters hope to raise more money to cover additional legal expenses in preparation for his escape trial, though no specific goal has been set. Expected costs include witness depositions, and perhaps transportation and housing of witnesses.

A conviction could add five years to the 30-year prison term Dallas is serving for voluntary manslaughter in the 1981 slayings of Fish and Game officers Bill Pogue and Conley Elms.

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Packing plant strike ends

BOISE (AP) — A 105-day strike against three Ada County meat-packing companies by a food-workers union has ended, and a number of the employees have returned to work, officials said.

The United Food & Commercial Workers District Local 368-A of Nampa called the strike Feb. 24 after contract negotiations broke down when the companies wanted employees to accept a 7½-cent-per-hour wage cut, officials said Wednesday.

Companies involved were Boise Valley Packing Co. of Eagle and Gem Meat Packing Co. and Davis Packing Co. Inc., both of Garden City.

Doren Ellis, vice president of Boise Valley Packing, said only five of his employees went on strike, and four had withdrawn from the union and returned to work. The company employs 16.

Davis Packing went out of business on March 13. Manager and part-owner Bill Dunn blamed the Treasure Valley grocery wars for his reason to quit business.

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Pay up overtime, U.S. orders firms

BOISE (AP) — Two Boise companies have been ordered to pay over \$15,000 in back overtime pay to their employees, the U.S. Department of Labor announced.

The orders, issued by the U.S. District Court in Boise at the department's request under the Fair Labor Standards Act, require CTM Engineering Inc. to pay just over \$12,500 to 16 workers and The Boisean Motors, \$2,500 to 14 employees.

The department said the payments reflected the failure of the two companies to comply with the federal wage laws.

'War on shore' becomes bomb at box office

"The War at the Shore" is a bomb at the box office.

Tickets for the closed-circuit telecast of Monday night's heavyweight fight between Gerry Cooney and Michael Spinks in Atlantic City, N.J., are selling so poorly that some exhibitors are bailing out.

"It's a disaster," says Tommy Gallagher, who gave up his two sites in New York after failing to sell a single ticket. "Nobody's talking about this fight. Nobody cares."

A scheduled telecast at 20,000-seat Joe Louis Arena in Detroit was canceled Wednesday because fewer than 30 tickets had been sold.

"There's no magic with this fight," said Bob Fox, who is handling two other closed-circuit sites in the Detroit area. "Gerry Cooney can't create the spark, and Michael Spinks never had the spark to begin with."

Fox expects to break even on the fight because — due to a lack of bids, he got the closed-circuit rights in Michigan free. Exhibitors who had to pay big money for their rights are not so lucky.

"I feel sorry for them," Fox says. "They could lose their shirts."

Apathy about the fight apparently extends to Cooney's home area —

the New York City suburbs on Long Island. At Nassau Coliseum, which can seat 14,000 for the closed-circuit show, fewer than 1,200 tickets had been sold by Wednesday.

"That's Cooney's backyard," says Gallagher, who trains and manages fighters. "If they can't sell the fight there, they can't sell it anywhere."

The promoter for the fight, Butch Lewis, cites two main reasons for the slow closed-circuit sales: concern that Cooney might pull out at the last minute, and the decision not to promote the fight as a black-white confrontation.

"Some people are mad at me for not playing up the racial angle," he

says. "But I refuse to stoop to racist tactics to sell tickets. I don't want to see any of my exhibitors get hurt, but I'm not going to sacrifice my ethics for anyone."

Lewis and his closed-circuit coordinator, Lou Falgout, claim they aren't discouraged by the lack of advance sales because closed-circuit fights traditionally gain momentum in the final 24 hours.

"Normally, you do 50 to 90 percent of your business the day of the fight," Falgout says. "I think when people realize this fight is actually going to come off, we'll start selling a lot of tickets."

The fight will be shown at about

550 sites across the country, about half the number that showed the Sugar Ray Leonard-Marvelous Marvin Hagler middleweight title bout in April. The Leonard-Hagler fight grossed more than \$60 million in closed-circuit revenue, tops in boxing history.

"That's one of our problems," Lewis says. "No matter what we do, everyone is going to compare us with Leonard-Hagler. That's a hard act to follow."

Others think the main problem is Cooney, who has fought only seven rounds since Larry Holmes stopped him by the 13th round of their World Boxing Council title fight in 1982.

Cooney's last fight was May 31, 1986, when he knocked out Eddie Gregg in the first round.

Because of his inactivity in the ring, Cooney's desire to fight has been questioned.

"Right now, his popularity is at an all-time low," says Joe Hand Jr., who owns the closed-circuit rights for Cooney-Spinks in Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Delaware and southern New Jersey.

Gallagher, who was Gregg's trainer for the Cooney fight, agrees.

"Cooney's a joke," he says. "He's trying to fool the public, but they're not buying it."

In the profit mode Celtics rip Lakers by 15 to bring on game No. 6

BOSTON (AP) — Winning in Boston Garden was relatively easy for the Boston Celtics Thursday night.

But, their task of coming back from a 24 deficit, never before accomplished in the NBA Championship series, gets considerably harder starting Sunday, when they meet the Los Angeles Lakers in the first of two games scheduled for the Forum in Inglewood, Calif.

"We're going to transport the parquet floor out there," Celtics Coach K.C. Jones said after Boston's 123-108 victory in Game 5. "We have to go out there and slow them down."

Danny Ainge hit five 3-point baskets, one from 40 feet at the halftime buzzer and four more in the third period for the Celtics.

"You can't think of beating the Lakers three times in a row," Ainge said. "That's mind-boggling. But we didn't want them to celebrate at Garden."

"It wasn't a do-or-die situation," Magic Johnson said after he led the Lakers with 29 points and 17 assists. "We've been playing well out in L.A. On Sunday, we are going to win."

Ainge hit five of six shots from 3-point range and finished with 21 points as all five Boston starters scored 21 or more, led by Dennis Johnson with 25.

"I've been shooting 3-pointers all year long," Ainge said. "They were so concerned with us underneath that I was just spotting up at the 3-point line and they were afraid you're open, the 3-point shot is not that difficult. I'll shoot it every time if I'm open."

The Celtics led the entire second half of Ainge's buzzer-beater — but before halftime.

"I think the Lakers were not at their best because they want to win it in L.A.," Ainge said. "We had to win this one. We had to win. We have to think only of the next game."

"We accomplished one thing," Lakers Coach Pat Riley said. "We came in here and got the advantage. Now we go home with two chances to win the championship."

"We play better at home," Lakers guard Byron Scott said. "It's more comfortable at home. You're not in hotels where there are fire alarms in the middle of the night."

The Lakers, like the Celtics, are seeking their fourth title since 1980, if they can't do it Sunday, Game 7 is set for the NBA Finals, and Game 7 of the previous 18 has overcome that deficit.

To do it this season, Boston would have to reverse its recent fortunes in road games. The Celtics have won four consecutive games away from Boston Garden, with all but one of those losses by more than 10 points.

Larry Bird had 23 points, Kevin McHale 22 and Robert Parish 21 for the Celtics. Magic Johnson led Los Angeles with 29 points, while

Kareem Abdul-Jabbar and Mychal Thompson had 18 apiece. Myles Worthy, after a 1-for-9 first half performance from the field, made his first five shots in the third period, helping Los Angeles get within eight points on three occasions after trailing by 15 at halftime.

But Boston answered every challenge as Ainge hit four 3-pointers in five attempts in the quarter. The Celtics scored 12 of the last 14 points of the period for a 96-77 bulge.

Los Angeles fought back again as reserve center forward Thompson scored nine points in the first 4:43 of the fourth quarter, leading a 4-6 spurt that made it 101-93 with 6:57 left. But the Celtics, who blew a 15-point lead in Game 4, pulled away from them as Dennis Johnson scored nine points.

The Celtics, who haven't lost two straight games here since the Lakers did it in the 1985 playoffs, forced the series back to California by duplicating a feat the Lakers managed in Game 2.

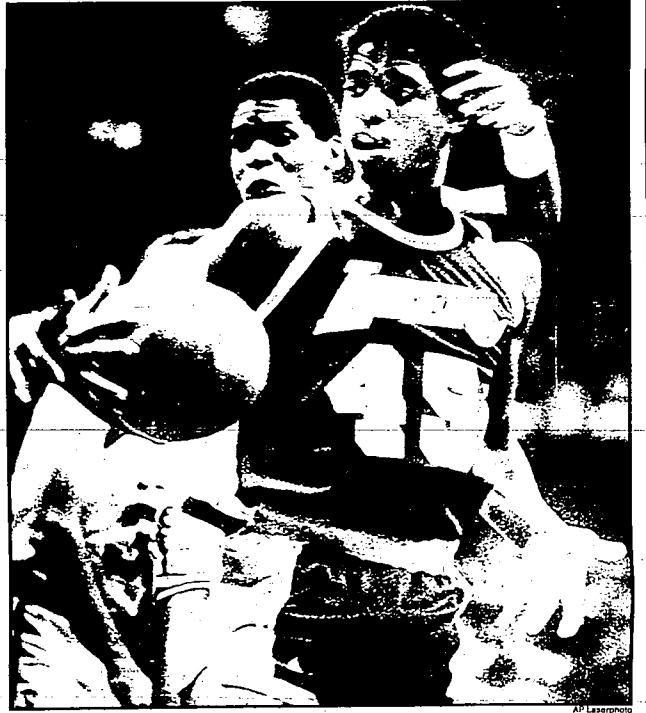
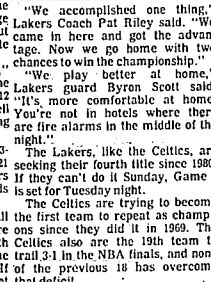
Michael Cooper had a championship series record six 3-pointers and, like Ainge, scored 21 points as the Lakers also had five scorers with 21 points or more, led by Byron Scott with 24.

"The 3-point shot has a way of knocking down the other club," Jones said. "Cooper did it to us in L.A. and Danny did it tonight. What a job Ainge did for us."

"It was our fault," Worthy said of Ainge's 3-pointers. "You can't give him space when he's hot. We just didn't play well."

Bird scored 18 points and Ainge hit 40-footers at the buzzer as the Celtics outscored the Lakers 33-17 in the final 10:02 for a 63-48 halftime lead.

The Lakers led 31-30 with 10:17 to go in the second quarter, but the Celtics then took charge. Boston started with an 11-2 spurt, with Bird hitting a 3-pointer for a 41-33

Bosworth control over draft hits test today

NEW YORK (AP) — Brian Bosworth, the outspoken one-of-a-kind linebacker who will play for just five of the NFL's 28 teams, will be the principal prize Friday when the NFL holds its lottery-style supplemental draft.

Bosworth, who has already played for five of the top three picks in the regular draft, bypassed it because he did not want to be chosen by the Indianapolis Colts or Buffalo Bills, who were ready to take him. He had that option because he still has a year of football eligibility remaining, even though he has graduated from the University of Oklahoma and had signed with an agent, making him ineligible to play.

He enters Friday's draft having written letters to all 28 teams declaring that he will play only for the New York Jets or Giants, the Los Angeles Rams or Raiders and the Philadelphia Eagles. His field is based on Bosworth's desire to play for a 600-year-old team in a major market in Philadelphia's case.

His feeling he would star immediately as the middle linebacker in Coach Buddy Ryan's "46" defense.

Those five bids of the 406 team logos that will be drawn from a drum to decide who gets the first pick in the draft, meaning Bosworth has one chance in 9,474 to be assured of being chosen by a team he wants.

"Even today's a longshot," concedes his agent, Gary Wichard. "This is Russian roulette. This is the lottery system."

But there are indications that nothing is written in stone. For example, Bosworth told the Orlando Sentinel Thursday he would be willing to play for Tampa Bay, which has 28 bids in the draft.

"People have speculated for months that all Brian Bosworth wants to

do is go play for a winning team or one that is already established," Bosworth told the Sentinel. "That's not true. I want to play for a team that, to me, possesses a challenge. I've sat down and looked at it. Tampa Bay has the challenge. The Celtics have and on the opposite side of the spectrum, Bosworth's father told Newsday that he might not be too enthusiastic about the Giants because they might suffer a letdown after their Super Bowl victory. To which Tom Bostuire, the New York team's director of personnel responded: "We'd love to have him. He'd be a damn good backup."

The system to be used is one adopted because of the way quarterback Bernie Kosar was drafted by the Cleveland Browns in 1984. In the past the supplemental draft order was the same as the regular draft and the Browns, for whom Kosar wanted to play, traded with the Buffalo Bills, who had the first pick, to get him.

Salmon season reopens

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — The Idaho Fish and Game Commission has decided to reopen the sport fishing season for spring chinook salmon on along a four-mile stretch of the Little Salmon River near Riggs.

Fish and Game spokesman Hugh Wilson said the season opened Friday at noon and will continue until further notice or until the summer chinook run makes its way into the river, probably about July 1.

Wilson said the commission took the action because the Department of Fish and Game has surpassed its goal of capturing 5,000 spring chinook for egg extraction to bolster smolt populations at its Oxbow, Pahsimero and Rapid River hatcheries.

More than 5,000 fish had been captured for "spawn taking" by Wednesday, he said.

The commission initially opened the spring chinook season from May 29 through June 1, then again June 5 through June 8 after a surge of chinook — nearly 1,500 — entered the Rapid River hatchery May 27.

The two previous weekend openings also included sport fishing on the Rapid River near Riggs, but Wilson said that fishery now would be open only to members of the Nez Perce Tribe.

Sport fishing limits on the Little Salmon will remain two a day, four in possession and six for the season. The open area run from about 200 yards from the river's mouth near Riggs to the mouth of the Rapid River. After the opening day, fishing hours are 4 a.m. to 9:30 p.m.

NEW YORK (AP) — Dr. Harry Edwards, a black sports sociologist, will be named a special assistant to Baseball Commissioner Peter Ueberroth, according to a published report.

Friday's editions of the New York Times said Edwards, of Berkeley, Calif., would be named although Edwards told the newspaper he could not confirm the appointment until it announced by Ueberroth.

Edwards told the newspaper that he has been working with Ueberroth behind the scenes since former Los Angeles Dodgers vice president Al Campanis said blacks might not have "some of the necessities" to be managers and general managers.

Campanis, who was with the Dodgers' organization for 41 years, was fired a few days after making the remark on national television.

Edwards, a consultant for the San Francisco 49ers of the National Football League and the Golden State Warriors of the Na-

tional Basketball Association, said he and Ueberroth has discussed racial issues and how baseball should be "responsive and responsive."

Ueberroth had made a concerted effort since Campanis' remarks to make sure baseball increased the number of blacks working in the front offices of the major-league clubs.

On Wednesday, Ueberroth and the owners met in Philadelphia with Rev. Jesse Jackson to discuss affirmative action programs.

"It was a small step for me and a giant step for baseball that a little oxygen got into that room today," Jackson said after meeting with the owners.

"Every team in major-league baseball will have a strong and positive affirmative action program in place within the next 30 days," Ueberroth said at a news conference with Jackson.

Last month, Jackson gave Ueberroth until June 29 to devise an affirmative action plan to get minorities into front-office positions or potentially face boycotts or other economic measures by civil-rights activists.

Jackson said Wednesday the situation would be reviewed June 29 before a next step is considered. He played down prospects of a boycott.

"Owners are making up for lost time," Jackson said. "The momentum that has begun to take place is impressive."

Edwards, 41, an associate professor of sociology at the University of California at Berkeley, tried to organize a boycott of the 1982 Olympics at Mexico City by black athletes. The boycott failed, although American runners Tommie Smith and John Carlos were involved in one of the most famous moments in Olympic history when they raised gloved fists during a medals ceremony at Mexico City.

Hall of Fame outfielder Monte Irvin, who's black, was an assistant to Commissioner Bowie Kuhn from 1959 to 1984.

Skilled hands guide area's youth leagues

There may be larger youth baseball and softball programs centered in the more heavily populated cities of the Magic Valley, but none of those covers a wider geographical area or serves more communities that does the Magic Valley League.

all boys baseball as well as girls A and double A softball while Filer recreation director, Bob Parent, performs those chores for girls B and C teams.

"The reason that Bob and I do the scheduling is simply that we are basically the only two paid people involved," Fowler explained. "We feel that because of our paid positions we should do that."

"Don and I do the scheduling the same year," Parent added. "We're both in similar positions. I think Wendell and Filer are fortunate to have recreation districts that fund the programs. That's one of the reasons that we have a (swimming) pool here."

Each took on the same responsibilities at the same time, but the similarities don't end there. Each is a native midwesterner whose full time profession is education.

Don, who hails from South Dakota, became an Idahoan pretty much by chance.

"It was random selection," he says. "I started writing to colleges. At that time I didn't even know where Missouri was."



Don Fowler, recreation director at Wendell, appreciates volunteer help in programs

Fowler graduated from the University of Idaho about the same time that Parent was completing his degree at Morehead State College in his home state of Minnesota.

While Fowler teaches typing and accounting, Parent's specialties are the physical education, math and health at the junior high level. Each has held a number of coaching positions in his full time career.

"One of the high points has been watching previously established programs grow and expand throughout the valley."

"When I started in it they had a little league spread throughout the Magic Valley," said Fowler. "How it originated, I'm not sure. We've increased the program, especially the girls. Originally there were only two brackets for the girls. Now we have four."

Their education, experience and interest made both men prime targets to fill available positions in their respective departments.

"I had a boy who got involved in a league the first year," Bob smiled. "And I was approached by someone on the board about the recreation position the next year — he kind of got me on the hook."

With 174 young people signed up in Wendell and 158 involved in Filer

and hundreds of kids representing numerous other communities taking part, the numbers are about equal. But there is room for improvement in a couple of areas.

"We've had a drop in the A and double A girls league this year," Fowler said. "We lost both Hansen and Shoshone at the A level. We picked up a Buhl team in double-A, but lost an A squad there and covered that by adding another in Gooding."

Parent's main concern lies in a separate area, but possibly for a number of reasons common to many such youth programs.

"We've been off about the same level of participants for about three years," he said. "What disturbs me most is the older kids programs. As a matter of fact, Filer didn't even field a baseball team this season. I think that might be the first time in history."

"I don't know what it is," he continued. "The kids may have to work at home or hold part-time summer jobs or maybe the interest is just declining to Parent."

Parent went on to explain that Filer, with 45-50 six, seven, and eight-year-olds playing in the T-ball leagues is lacking the problem in the younger age brackets.

"We're up a bit there," he says. "Hopefully, if we can get them interested at that age, they'll stay in the program longer."

Although their own contributions play a major part in the success of the Magic Valley Leagues, Fowler and Parent are quick to attribute much of the credit to volunteer help.

"I really appreciate those people who volunteer," says Fowler. "Normally, a parent stays with his kids through two or three years. Although some really enjoy the contacts and continue on. But this is one of the frustrating parts of the job — some folks seem to just lack the confidence to get in and do it."

Over in Wildcat town volunteers have been abundant in recent years

"I've always been kind of amazed that we have no trouble getting coaches," he says. "And we've had at least a couple each of the past two years who no longer have kids playing. It's just unbelievable the time and money those people put into the program. Some parents don't understand that. There are a lot of expenses, travel and all that fall on the coaches."

Through the efforts of the volunteers, working in conjunction with a few salaried directors, growth has been consistent. Even more noticeable has been the continual upgrading of programs and facilities.

"You know those guys run one of the best programs anywhere," says Bob Waymott of Hansen, himself involved part-time in city recreation. "I'd never pull out of it. They've done a great job and that (the boys) tournaments are held in Wendell each year is a tribute to Fowler — he puts on good ones."

Daniels pleads guilty

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Nevada-Las Vegas basketball recruit Lloyd Daniels pleaded guilty Thursday to a misdemeanor charge of attempting to buy rock cocaine at a crack house this year.

Daniels, a 6-foot-8 prep star from New York, must enter a three-month drug rehabilitation program and undergo two weeks weekly analysis, under terms of a plea bargain reached with prosecutors.

If he successfully completes drug counseling, the 19-year-old Daniels must appear again before Justice of the Peace James Kelly to have his misdemeanor record sealed.

Daniels was recruited by Nevada-Las Vegas and had been expected to play for the Rumin' Rebels next season.

NEW YORK (AP) — A recruiter for sports agents was questioned by federal authorities about the cocaine-induced death of Cleveland Browns defensive back Don Rogers, a newspaper reported Thursday.

Newspaper said authorities are investigating a possible link between Rogers' death last year and Terry Bolar, a former Long Beach State football player who has worked as a recruiter for several sports agents.

Rogers, 23, died of a cocaine overdose last June 27, a day before he was to marry his college sweetheart. The former UCLA All-American hours earlier had attended a bachelor party at a hotel in Sacramento, Calif.

TWIN FALLS — The Northside Playhouse production of "Guys and Dolls," opening tonight in the Jerome High School auditorium, will be seen in a new light. An inadequate stage lighting system at the high school has been replaced just in time for this production, which will run through Monday and again June 18-20.

"The Lion's Club has been working very hard to get this done," said Shawna Fuller, who produces the show with her husband, Greg Fuller. Jerome is economically kind of crunched but they're hanging in there. For them to go out and be able to put in a \$4,500 lighting system is wonderful. We bypassed the old system and put in a whole new lighting board.

"Every year we're getting bigger

and bigger audiences," said Shawna. "People are finally realizing that this is not a high school play. We use the Jerome High School auditorium and they see that on the posters. Now they are realizing it is a legitimate musical theater play that is on the par with what Dilettantes are doing."

The Dilettantes of Magic Valley is a long-standing, area-wide theater group that produces an annual musical.

In 1981 the Fullers saw a need in the community and began Northside Playhouse. "A lot of people really could not afford to be driving back in the winter to participate in Dilettantes productions," Shawna said. "We provide a vehicle for these many talented people who live maybe as far away as Gooding."

This year's show is directed by Mike Winterholter of Jerome, with musical direction by Keith Lien of

Jerome and choreography by Kelli Turner of Twin Falls.

"Guys and Dolls" is set in New York City in the late '40s and based on a romantic Damon Runyon tale about gamblers and two women who love them.

Dan Mink of Jerome plays Sky Masterson, who has made his fortune by winning outrageous bets and is a hero among the street characters who populate much of the show.

Marlon Brando played Masterson in the film version. "I don't think I'm quite the heavyweight that Marlon Brando is," said Mink, "so my character is a little bit more the street person, a little more vulnerable."

Mink—who is a lawyer in Jerome, studied drama at the College of Southern Idaho—performing numerous roles, including Tybalt in "Romeo and Juliet," Matthew Har-

Twin Falls desert Afghanistan look-alike? State hopes so

BOISE (AP) — One day in April, Georgia Smith escorted a bone-weary production designer through the arid desert, hills and caves north of Twin Falls.

They were performing one of moviemaking's grinding chores: scouting locations. The designer was looking for Afghanistan-like landscape on which to film the multimillion-dollar Sylvester Stallone movie "Rambo III." Ms. Smith, public information specialist for Idaho's division of travel/promotion, was looking for a sale.

Production of "Rambo III" is on hold, but Idaho still is being considered as a location site for that film and three other projects.

Increasingly, movie companies on location are forsaking the overused city streets of Los Angeles and New York for places in the heart of America: Places like Waxahachie, Texas and Boise.

The Gem State, not content to sit modestly out of camera range, is hustling for a bigger part of that action. The state garnered \$5 million in 1984 alone when Clint Eastwood filmed "Pale Rider" north of Sun Valley.

Realizing the money to be made, the 1987 Legislature appropriated about \$80,000 to the Idaho Film Bureau — up from the current \$12,000 — and in July a full-time employee will be hired to zoom in on movie business.

The Film Bureau could have plenty of business this year. Productions set in the state are Richard Pryor, "Moving," a small portion of which was recently shot in Boise — without Pryor; and "Hemingway," a six-part, independently produced mini-series starring Stacy Keach.

'Western Wall Street' stands in for New York

LOS ANGELES — The Christmas episode of "Cagney and Lacey" unfolded against the splendor of a Fifth Avenue department store, decorated for the holiday with blinking fairy lights and animated reindeer, and flanked by wide-eyed children watching from a snow-covered sidewalk.

But it was all an illusion — part of the magic that film crews perform regularly in downtown Los Angeles, using the beautiful old buildings in one of the few parts of this city that can be used to simulate the "big city" look of Manhattan.

In this case, the Fifth Avenue store masquerading as Macy's was really the old, empty Rowan Building

at the corner of Fifth and South Spring streets in downtown Los Angeles. And because it was really filmed in August, police stood sweltering in 100-degree heat, on guard to keep away the area's ever-present drunks and derelicts.

The area along South Spring Street, between Fourth and Eighth streets, has become a favorite location with filmmakers, with its elegant, but neglected office buildings, erected years ago by rich men intent on establishing it as the "Wall Street of the West."

But while the filming brings money to an area badly in need, it is so frequent that it also provokes controversy among those doing business downtown over whether the benefits are worth the traffic and parking.

impressive sand dunes, rolling white water and frigid mountain aeries.

Carl Wilgus, state tourism administrator, thinks Idahoans' nonchalance toward the rich and famous can help sell the state to filmmakers.

"There's an attitude, a cordial indifference, sometimes," Wilgus says. "People in Idaho can work around filming. They don't get in the way."

Idaho is boosting its profile at a critical time, because it faces competition from other star-struck states.

Even California, de facto center of the film universe, established a state film office in 1985 to help keep film productions in the state.

The move may strike some as odd and unnecessary — a little like the Library of Congress opening a used bookstore. But not when you consider that California is trying to staunch a hemorrhage of "runaway productions." Only 51 percent of movies now are filmed there, says Michael Walbrecht, production analyst at the California Film Office.

New York and Chicago are popular location sites, and Texas has enjoyed a production stampede that includes "Places in the Heart," "Square Dance" and the soon-to-be-released "Madame." Seven movies, including the Debra Winger mystery "Black Widow," were shot in the state of Washington last year. And 14 movies, including "Crimes of the Heart" and "Blue Velvet," were shot in North Carolina, where producer Dino De Laurentiis moved his DEG company two years ago.

Self-promotion is essential if Idaho is to grab a larger share of film business.

"You cannot control what writers, directors and producers are doing," Wilgus said. "Unless people are predisposed to know about Idaho, we're not going to get business."

Until July, the work falls to Ms. Smith.

"You have to be very organized before they get here," she said, "because time very much is money to them. You've got to be willing to put a lot of time into a project and not expect quick results."

Ms. Smith says even though producers in charge of scouting sites may soo about how perfect Idaho is, weeks or months may pass before she hears from them again.

Because she has other duties to perform on behalf of Idaho tourism, Ms. Smith usually has to react to calls from producers, rather than solicit their business. When

producers inquire about the state, she tries to get copies of scripts or plot summaries. Then she mails them photographs of areas that might be suitable backdrops.

She also arranges on-site tours for producers or their minions.

In addition to those duties, the full-time employee will compile a list of studios, producers and directors to be lobbied.

Guidebook cites Hemingway's haunts

KETCHUM — Ever had the urge to eat dinner at the same table where Ernest Hemingway enjoyed eating 30 years ago during a visit to Ketchum?

Would you like to stay in the same room the author favored or find his grave?

A 30-page guide entitled "Hemingway in Idaho" allows you to do just that.

The booklet, published late last year by The Computer Lab in Ketchum, describes six places in and around the Sun Valley area that

Hemingway frequented. It also describes the train station at Shoshone, his grave, the Hemingway memorial and the grade school named after him.

Marsha Bellavance Johnson, author of the booklet, says a letter from her mother last September inspired the project. "My mother sent me a clipping from a French newspaper about Hemingway. It described him in French, where he hung out around the world, like Key West, Cuba, Venice. I decided Ketchum needed the same type of thing."

In the introduction, Johnson notes that 1986 was the 25th anniversary of Hemingway's death, another prod to

compile the guide. She says there's a lot of Hemingway interest around the world, but that the author's connection with Ketchum is not so ballyhooed. "Key West," she offers as an example, "has a Hemingway festival each year."

The guide briefly describes 10 sites of interest, including places where Hemingway ate, slept and lived. There is also a map of the area that pinpoints many of the sites. Along with each description is a pen and ink illustration of the site by Allison Gosney.

Interwoven throughout the booklet is a brief history of Hem-

ingway's life around the world and in Ketchum, detailing his flyfishing in Silver Creek, his early-career writing for the Toronto Star, and his troubling over "The Garden of Eden," a novel published posthumously last year.

The book can be found at bookstores in Ketchum and Sun Valley, a bookstore in Boise and perhaps soon in Twin Falls.

"Hemingway in Idaho" is available at bookstores and gift shops in Ketchum and Sun Valley. Made in Idaho in Twin Falls and The Mini-Mart in Shoshone.

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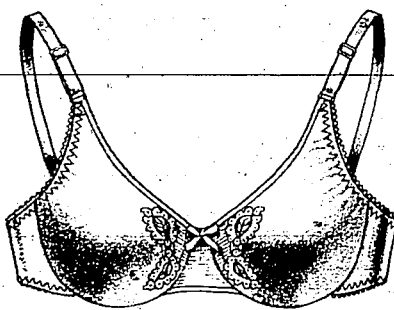
Ice cream tops Soviet singers' tour in Vermont

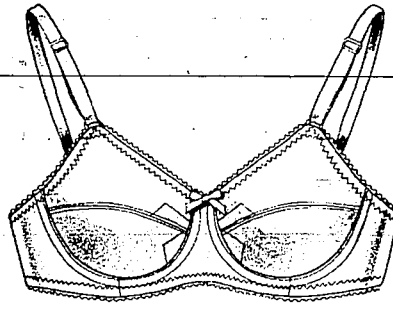
their ensemble.

Guvatski called the event "propaganda. ... Here we're listening to these Soviet children sing, while no children sing in Afghanistan."

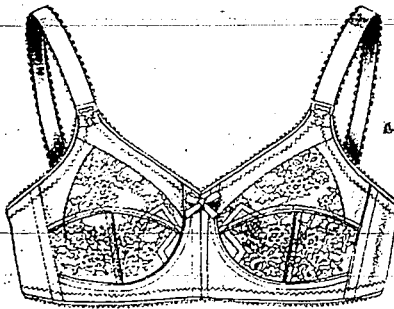
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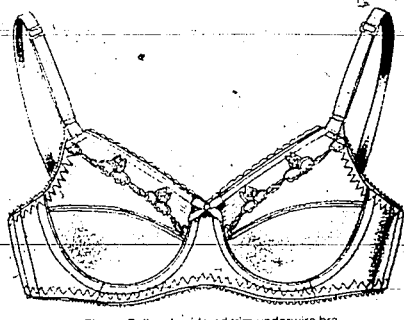
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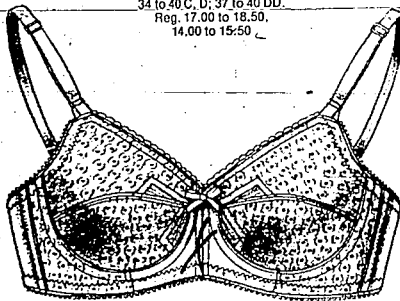
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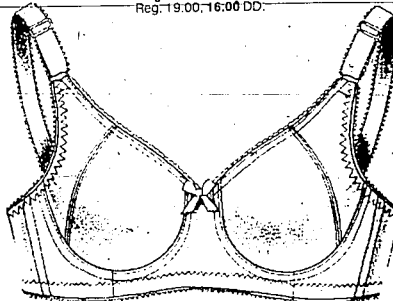

'The Believers' exploits, sensationalizes religions

"The Believers" opens with an extremely unpleasant scene. Cal Jamison (Martin Sheen) returns from an early morning jog, kisses his wife, banters with his son Chris (Harley Cross), and jumps in the shower after spilling some milk on the kitchen floor. His wife steps in the milk, touches a shorting coffee maker and is electrocuted before the eyes of her horrified son.

Out to a tribal scene with black bodies wearing grotesque masks writhing around an open fire. A white couple carry their obviously very sick child and offer the boy to a masked celebrant. Is this a healing ritual, or what? And what do these two scenes, so powerfully juxtaposed, have to do with one another?

Nothing at all, we find out much later in the film. The death of the woman turns out to be just a way to get the movie off with a kick-start. It has nothing to do with the story that follows. The woman's hideous death is just a little bit of local color, to set the mood.

This is what is called exploitation. The movie is chock full of it. Director John Schlesinger wants so desperately to make this movie terrifying, an "Exorcist" for the '80s, that he loses all sense of what makes a good story in the process.

It is the prime fault of a severely faulty film.

Cal and Chris move to dark and dirty New York City from white bread Minneapolis, and start a new life. Cal is a psychologist specializing in policemen's problems, and the first one he encounters is a doozy. A young detective, Tom Lopez (Jimmy Smits) is found ranting hysterically in an abandoned theater where the mutilated body of a boy is found stretched out on a pagan altar. In a mental hospital, Lopez tells Cal that the spirits are after him, and that they are already killing him, and that there is no defense. Typical paranoid schizophrenic delusions, right? Nope.

Cal learns from a cop investigating the boy's murder, Sean McTaggart (Robert Loggia), that Lopez belongs to a religion called Santeria, an old African blood sacrifice religion translated to the new world by the slaves of

Haiti and Cuba and still practiced by millions of Americans. Taggart admits that the believers' practices are not criminal, but adds, "I don't cut cutting up chickens a religion."

This cheap laugh line expresses the film's philosophical attitude towardoodoo.

Underlying all the film's 'grue and gore is the racist assumptions about religions other than the handful of standard American ones. The half-hearted apologies in the film about how Santeria is really all right and only its perverted form is evil ring hollow. The whole reason for making the film is to exploit and sensationalize the rituals. The idea is that the city is infested with these primitive jungle cults that the nice civilized white folks do not know anything about.

This is not a movie that wishes to enlighten, no matter how seemingly serious and lacking in humor it is. The movie simply wishes to frighten and resorts to racist bigotry to do so.

For all its faults, "The Believers" has been made with a good deal of basic movie making skill by director Schlesinger, and was well shot by the great cinematographer Robby Mueller. There are also a number of cheap thrills to be had in the movie, but little else worth noting.

Police flicks 'Cop,' 'Untouchables' control 60% of Top Ten receipts

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Crimefighters topped the week's two top box-office spots with Paramount Pictures' duo "Beverly Hills Cop II" and "The Untouchables," controlling 60 percent of the Top 10 turnstile take.

Taking the No. 1 spot for the third consecutive week was Eddie Murphy's "Beverly Hills Cop II," ringing up \$12.4 million for a whopping three-week total of \$84 million. It should surpass \$100 million in 10 days.

If that wasn't enough to make Paramount executives happy, "The Untouchables" took in \$10 million at the registers in its opening weekend. The two law-and-order flicks brought in more than \$22 million for the studio.

A Brian DePalma adaptation of the popular TV show that ran from 1959 to 1963, "The Untouchables" stars Robert DeNiro as Chicago mobster Al Capone and Kevin Costner as his adversary, U.S. Treasury agent Eliot Ness.

The Paramount rent may have contributed to the barely respectable \$4.1 million box office debut of Steven Spielberg's "Harry and the Handicapped," an adventure story about a family that discovers the fabled creature Bigfoot during a camping trip and takes him home to the suburbs.

But the week's No. 3 movie in the box office sweetpicks gets a second chance as more school-age kids ease into summer vacation.

It was followed by two comedies: "E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial" with \$2.3 million, "The Secret of My Success" with \$2 million and the horror film,

thriller "The Believers," Jack Nicholson's "Witches of Eastwick" and Arnold Schwarzenegger's "Predator."

"Creepshow II" was eighth with \$855,738.

New approach to family comedy in down-to-earth "227" on NBC

Most current TV families are solidly middle or upper-middle class. Not the inhabitants of the Washington, D.C., apartment building around which the NBC Saturday-night series "227" is based. They're not exactly poor, but they do struggle to make ends meet, and problems from the real world — such as drugs, vandalism and truancy — seem to intrude a bit more often than they do on most other half-hour series.

"The masses rarely see themselves represented on TV," says Maria Gibbs, who stars as Mary Jenkins. "That's what we strive to represent — the masses."

"227" is, first and foremost, a comedy, but Gibbs likes to lace the humor with messages. "People say if you had an hour, you could do those kind of things, but in 22 minutes of comedy how much can you do? Well, I think you can do it any time you open your mouth. Twenty-two minutes is a lot of time to say a lot of things. And you owe it to yourself and to the public to give the best television you can in 22 minutes."

The series rarely clobbers viewers over the head with these messages, but it has managed to say a fair amount in its first two seasons about such subjects as self-esteem, what graffiti and vandalism can do to a neighborhood, the damage drugs can inflict on young lives, and the importance of mutual respect in relations.

In addition to being the show's star, Gibbs is one of its producers. But she often finds it an uphill battle to bring meaning to the series. "I think they worry about so many messages going on," she says. "There's a feeling that in comedy you should stick to comedy. But comedy really evolves out of something serious. Things we laugh at now, are often things that were very uncomfortable when they were happening."

Gibbs, 56, says she has been preparing for "227," all her life. "As a child, I was at the movies day and night. Afterwards, we would debate all the way home: 'What was wrong with that scene? What was wrong with that movie?'"

When she landed the role of Florence, the strong-minded maid on "The Jeffersons," she continued to

observe. "I was always on the side watching everybody," she says. "When you get a show, there's so much you need to know — not only about being your character but about the people you're going to be surrounded with. More time under your belt makes you more assured, because each year you learn something. Even in the fifth season of 'The Jeffersons,' when they asked me to leave and do my own show, I

didn't want to. I'd rather be No. 9 on a hit than No. 1 on a flop." The key to success, she decided, is a strong ensemble in which every supporting character gets a few moments to shine.

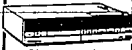


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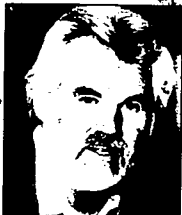
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Rogers trades glitter for horses

Conference on TV and families presents unorthodox viewpoints

Santa Barbara, Calif. — During the National Council for Families and Television's annual conference, members of the business community look on the television industry, charging that writers and producers have unfairly made big business the new villain of TV fiction.

But one conference panelist, Dr. Ella Taylor, an assistant professor of communications at the University of Washington, startled both representatives of TV and big business by attacking a different TV villain: "The Cosby Show."

The subject was "Television, Families and Work," and the group gathered at Santa Barbara's Four Seasons Biltmore Hotel for the council's sixth annual conference last weekend consisted of representatives of the television industry — including Marcey Carsey, co-executive producer of "Cosby" — and the chief executive officers of major companies from across the United States.

Most of the weekend's discussion was devoted to how television depicts business and to how it reflects the changing American family.

But until Taylor's presentation, no one questioned the purity — and goodness of that ultimate TV family on NBC's top-rated "The Cosby Show."

Saturday night, Carsey spoke earnestly about the responsibility of television to "save the American family." She cited "Cosby," with its universal themes that transcend ethnic barriers and its perfect family — headed by America's favorite father, Bill Cosby — as a model to which real families can aspire.

"Because everything is not like what is depicted (on TV) doesn't mean it shouldn't be done," Carsey said to an audience that responded warmly to her comments. "There's nothing wrong with showing Bill Cosby as something of an ideal, the father we'd all like to have."

In a panel discussion Sunday, Taylor blasted Carsey's theory, calling "Cosby" an "enormously sexy and glamorous show" that "provides the same sort of satisfaction as a commercial" in its celebration of "yuppie consumerism" and its "extraordinarily rosy view of the ordinary."

Taylor is not the first to question

whether TV's currently popular TV families — those happy, affluent, well-behaved nuclear units found in "The Cosby Show," "Family Ties" and "Growing Pains" — truly represent the American family at a time when the median family income is about \$27,000 a year, only 4 percent of U.S. households represent traditional nuclear families and the divorce rate hovers at 50 percent.

Taylor, however, said that she believes the atypical wealth and nuclear bliss of the Huxtables, the Keatons, the Seavers and other TV families of the 1980s are not the biggest problem with those shows. "TV, like all forms of story-telling, is not supposed to be realistic," she said. "You aren't going to see a show called 'Middle Manager' or 'Keypunch: The Miniseries.'"

She argued that the lack of serious family problems or real conflict among "Cosby's" Huxtable family, or among the Keatons of "Family Ties," lulls children of the '80s into an unhealthy complacency and lulls parents into believing that raising children is easy. Such television represents a "dull fundamentalism" rather than a highly charged forum for exploring the changing American family, she charged.

Taylor criticized Cosby's much-lauded ability to find humor in simple problems, such as a fruit juicer not working properly, contending that it focused attention on material possessions and luxuries and on trivial, easily solved dilemmas. Even when a controversial issue is explored on "Cosby," she said, it usually happens comfortably outside the family unit, as in an episode in which a friend of Denise Huxtable's came to Dr. Huxtable when she developed a sex-related health problem.

The 1970s were "the real golden age of television" for the family, Taylor said, when shows such as "All in the Family" and "Maude" showed families at war with one another, the victims of divorce and financial woes, juggling family and career less ably than the Huxtable clan. These shows, she said, "set up an argument with many different perspectives of what family means."

"I am quite worried by shows like 'Cosby,' 'Family Ties' and, to an extent, 'Growing Pains,' which show this monolithic family intact," Taylor added. "There is no such thing as the family. There is certainly no such thing as the nuclear family."

Taylor compared what is happening to family TV in the 1980s to what happened in the late 1950s and early 1960s. Although others have cited shows such as "Leave It to Beaver" and "Father Knows Best" as realistic reflections of a more innocent time in America, Taylor said that, rather than reflecting society, these series represented society's denial that the family unit was even then falling apart; the divorce rate began rising at an alarming rate during the era. She cited the return to such ideals in recent years as yet another denial, "a nostalgic throwback to things which never existed."

Although not all agreed with Taylor, most found her comments thought-provoking. "I was struck with her (Taylor's) comment that the Cosby family doesn't allow room for dissent," said Winifred White, NBC vice president for family entertainment programming.

Teresa Heinz, chairman of the National Council for Families and Television, agreed that Taylor's comments were worth considering.

young fellow named — Charlie Chaplin.

Q. What actress really is going to star in the remake of "Born Yesterday," playing the part the late great Judy Holliday made famous. I heard Whoopi Goldberg was interested but that it isn't about to happen. — D.L.

A. The story of Goldberg playing the Billie Dawn part was something ground out by the Hollywood publicity mill but the part is really going to Bernadette Peters with Walter Matthau playing Billie's millionaire junk-dealer boyfriend. Whoopi, who is determined to lead the way for

blacks breaking out of traditional movie roles, was not that inconceivable in the part.

Q. It struck me as coincidental that the title of Michael J. Fox's new movie hit, "The Secret of My Success," seems to sum up this talented young actor's own career. Are his popularity and success still spiraling? — N.Y.

A. You bet. Recently, Michael came to New York for location filming in connection with his newest assignment, "Bright Lights, Big City." At first, security was sanely tight. Warfield cultivates intimidating presence as Night Court's bailiff

LOS ANGELES (AP) — As a stand-up comic, Marsha Warfield has little trouble with hecklers.

"I didn't try to be intimidating," she said, "but I give the impression that if you take a shot at me, you're going to get one back."

Warfield has carried that same look into her role as Roz Russell, the brash, salty bailiff on NBC's "Night Court."

"I don't think anybody knew what Roz was about when I got the role last year," she said. "I think we discovered her together. We're still discovering her. I think the idea was that she was a lot like me. The first impression is that she's intimidating, a not-to-be-messed-with person."

"A lot of me is in Roz and a lot of the stuff's not me. You don't see her that much. She's the authority figure in me. But that's the only side we've seen so far. I really don't know what else she's like."

Warfield was cast in the role last year following the death of Florence Halop, who played bailiff Florence Kleiner. She in turn had replaced Selma Diamond, who died the year before. Both actresses died of lung cancer.

"I was originally supposed to do three or four guest shots," she said. "I'd heard they were going to have several rotating bailiffs and let the audience decide. Then they picked up my option. All the others at the audition were black actresses in their 30s. I was the biggest one. All the others were cute."

The character was originally called Harper, but it was changed to

Roz Russell and it was explained on the first show that her mother was a fan of the late movie actress.

Warfield said that on stage she takes advantage of her intimidating presence. "I use it to the extent I get what I want," she said. "I don't have hecklers. I like to keep control of my act. People don't give me trouble."

"But I think they know it's a prop. I'm a big teddy bear. People may feel intimidated, but they don't feel threatened. They know I'm not going to hurt anybody."

Warfield admits she herself felt intimidated when she joined the hit NBC comedy show. "I was in virgin

territory," she said. "I'd only done one other series before and it wasn't a sitcom. I was scared. I was working on instinct."

Her other series was "The Richard Pryor Show" in 1977, which left the air after just two months.

She grew up in Chicago where, she said, "I didn't do standup comedy until I was divorced. I was 20. I had married young for no reason and divorced for the same reason. I read a story in the newspaper about a place where you could do comedy. I decided that's what I was going to do."

"I was terrified, but that's to be expected."

NBC sees nothing to stop it this summer

NEW YORK (AP) — Television viewers helped themselves to "Life in the Fat Lane" last week, making it the best-rated NBC news documentary in a decade.

That and the continuing popularity of NBC sitcoms, despite reruns, gave the network its 19th weekly win in a row in the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings.

"Life in the Fat Lane" with Connie Chung was 11th in the rankings, with a rating of 15.7 and a 28 share.

The last NBC news documentary did as well as the 3-hour "Violence in America" in 1977.

The rating is a percentage of the nation's estimated 87.4 million households with television. The

share is a percentage of the viewers tuned in during a particular time period.

"NBC Nightly News" won its eighth week in a row. CBS' third-place for the second week in a row was a first, according to NBC analysts. "CBS Evening News" anchor Dan Rather has been off on assignment, and the schedule has been disrupted by basketball playoffs, however.

In prime time, NBC won the week ending June 7 with an average, prime-time rating of 13.8. CBS was second with 11.5 and ABC, third with a 10.0.

He said NBC is in a position to do even better this summer, with

youth-appeal shows like "Miami Vice" unchallenged by first-run, night-time soaps, and female-appeal shows like "Valerie" drawing viewers from the alternative baseball.

Except for CBS' "60 Minutes" and NBC's tryout comedy "The Days and Nights of Molly Dodd," the top 10 shows last week were repeats:

"The Cosby Show," "Family Ties," "Cheers," "Growing Pains," "60 Minutes," "Who's the Boss?" "Golden Girls," "Murder, She Wrote," "Molly Dodd" and "Moonlighting."

The bottom-rated shows were: "West 57th," "Our World," "Dads," "Gung Ho," "A-Team Special."

New book defends children's TV, sugared cereals, toy commercials

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Cy Schneider strides boldly out on a limb in his new book, in which he actually defends commercial kids' TV, "Children's Television: The Art, the Business, and How It Works."

Schneider not only sticks up for most children's shows, but for sugared cereals and shows wrapped around toys as well. In addition, he chides Action for Children's Television, the self-appointed guardians of what's good for children on TV.

"I wanted to write a positive book," he said. "I wrote it because no one else did and I don't think anyone else will. I thought someone ought to tell the other side of the story. Children's television has gotten a bad rap. I think there's some good in it we ought to look for."

Although his views are often contrary to those of television's critics, his credentials are solid and his reasoning is often persuasive.

Schneider, now chairman of Bozell, Jacobs, Kenyon & Eckhardt-Pacille, an advertising agency, won a Peabody Award for children's programming in 1983 as founder and general manager of Nickelodeon, the first cable network for children. He was closely associated with Mattel when the toy manufacturer first began to advertise on television in 1954.

The forward of his book is written by Fred Silverman, the former president of NBC who earlier headed programming at CBS and ABC.

"I think the majority of the shows are at best banal," Schneider said in an interview. "It's neither negative nor positive. I think a small amount of it is really bad. But there's a lot more good stuff than the industry is given credit for. I wish I could say most of it's good. It's banal and harmless."

Schneider said he considered the programming on public television to be instructive but not very entertaining. He commended the Disney Channel, Nickelodeon, such cable shows as "Fraggle Rock" and "Faerie Tale Theatre," such commercial fare as Jim Henson's Muppet show, "The Muppet Babies," "Wuzzles" and Pee Wee Herman's Saturday morning show on CBS, "Pee Wee's Playhouse." He said he also liked NBC's "ALF" and said the animated show "Thunder Cats" was "a wonderfully produced fantasy."

"Kids watch about 25 hours a week, which I've always thought was too much," he said. "If you watch 25 hours it's hard to find good things, but if parents monitor their viewing and are selective there's a lot of rewarding stuff out there."

Schneider has some praise for ACT, saying the group focused the attention of broadcasters, producers and advertisers on children's TV. The group was founded by Peggy Charren in a Boston suburb in 1968 and has since been heavily financed by foundations. But mostly he criticizes.

"Their first premise was to take advertising out of children's television, which I thought was the result of a lot of fuzzy thinking," said Schneider. "If there were no advertisers who would support it? That continues to be a running thread through the tapestry of the issues they have taken up."

ACT has also attacked TV commercials for sugared cereal. "Yes, too much sugar in anyone's diet is not good," said Schneider. But "dentists and others have pointed out that there is probably as much sugar in an apple as sugared cereal. It's the parent's responsibility to monitor the amount of sugar in a child's diet."

He said that while ACT continues to call for more children's programming, there is already a glut. "As for the so-called good shows that are information and educational rather than being cartoons, enlightened advertisers have tried that and kids don't watch them," he

said. He agreed that "Sesame Street" was a success, but said it had a large budget, no competition and is repeated up to 18 times a week.

Schneider also defended programs based on toys, which have been criticized as being 30-minute commercials. "There is no reason why, if a toy is really a conceptual toy, that you can't use it," he said. "It doesn't matter which came first, the toy or the program. If the show's successful, there's going to be a toy. However, I do think in some cases the stories have been forced to fit the toymaker's concept."

He said he objects to shows and toys that are too violent or that promote war toys. "I think it's wrong to use violence as entertainment," he said.

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
