Anonymous listing gives votes on 17 bills

Report irks Magic Valley legislators

TWIN FALLS — An anonymous report detailing votes on bills by Magic Valley lawmakers and the impact on taxpayers has rankled local legislators and gotten the Associated Taxpayers of Idaho in hot water.

The "Legislative Report" lists votes of all Magic Valley lawmakers on 17 bills that will raise an estimated \$106 million in taxes and fees.

"It was an unfair use of the figures," said Rep. Ron Black, R-Twin Falls, who is shown voting for \$92 million worth of bills. "It was an isolated pick of things."

The "Legislative Report" was stapled to another report sent out by Associated Taxpayers of Idaho, a watchdog tax group, giving

the appearance that that group had prepared the information.

But Russell Westerberg, president of Associated Taxpayers, said his group never issued the list of voting records. As far as he knows, he said the list was only prepared on lawmakers in the Magic Valley.

"We have no idea at all who did this, not a clue," Westerberg said on Thursday. "Our group has never made a reference of how an individual voted or not voted."

The report outraged lawmaker Celia Folkings, a Bull Republican, who showed Westerberg a copy of the report last Friday.

In the report, Folkings, considered a fiscal conservative, ranked among the top spenders in the 1987 session. Her votes will mean an estimated \$104,634,600 in taxes and fees to residents, according to the anonymous report.

"I thought it was quite misleading, and I was a little bit upset," Folkings said on Thursday. "The report is no reflection of the true picture."

She said when she first saw the report, she naturally assumed it came from Associated Taxpayers.

"Everybody thought I did," she said. Also ranking at the top were Rep. Russ Newcomb, R-Twin Falls, and Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Doon. The report shows Newcomb, a Twin Falls physician and moderate Republican, and Darrington, a Declo high school teacher and conservative, voted for \$106 million in increases in fees and taxes.

Ranking at the lower end of the taxing scale were state Sen. Larry Anderson, a Twin Falls Republican; Rep. Jerry Callen, a Jerome

Gunmen seize U.S. writer in Lebanon

BEIRUT, Lebanon — Fourteen kidnapers grabbed American journalist Charles Glass, beat him and stuffed him into a car trunk, then abducted the son of Lebanon's defense minister when he told them to stop, police said Thursday.

Police said the gunmen in four cars intercepted Glass and Ali Ouseiran in Ouseiran's chauffeur-driven white Volvo on Wednesday in Ouzal, a suburb of Syrian-policed Moslem west Beirut.

The gunmen, most of them bearded, dragged Glass out of the car, hit him with rifle butts and bundled him into the trunk of a silver Toyota near a fish restaurant only 350 yards from a Syrian army checkpoint, police said.

Alli Ouseiran, 40-year-old son of Lebanese Defense Minister Adel Ouseiran, shouted at the gunmen to stop, police reported. But the kidnapers grabbed him and his Lebanese chauffeur, a police officer who doubles as bodyguard.

Glass, 36, of Los Angeles became one of nine Americans kidnapped in Lebanon. He was also the first foreigner kidnapped since Syria moved 7,500 troops into Moslem west Beirut Feb. 22 to quell fighting among militias.

No group claimed responsibility. The Iranian-backed Shiite Muslim Hezbollah, or Party of God, has base a few yards from the restaurant.

Hezbollah is believed to be an umbrella for several small underground factions that have claimed responsibility for many of the abductions in the past two years. Besides Glass, 24 foreigners are missing after being abducted in Lebanon.

Glass, who has worked for the ABC television network, was in Beirut researching a book he is writing on the Middle East. In Washington, ABC spokesman Elise Adad said Glass was on a leave of absence as a full-time ABC correspondent, but she has retained his services on a free-lance basis.

He was kidnapped while driving back to Beirut after visiting the Ouseirans, a prominent Shiite family, at their house in Sidon, 25 miles south of the capital.

"It looks like the kidnapers wanted to grab Glass alone. But

Pentagon looking at forecast again

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon will review its long-range forecast about U.S. attacks to U.S. servicemen in the Persian Gulf in the face of a CIA judgment which forecasts higher risks, congressional sources said Thursday.

The assessment was offered during a meeting on Capitol Hill between legislators and top administration national security officials, the sources said. At the same time, the White House said it regards as "personal to moderate" the risks for U.S. personnel and ships in the gulf.

AS William Webster, the new CIA director, briefed senators on Capitol Hill about the potential dangers in the administration's plan to place U.S. tankers under U.S. protection, presidential spokesman Martin Feltwater said the CIA assessment "relates to the possibility of terrorism against Kuwait, which is something different than the risk to our military fleet."

As for the risk against U.S. military personnel, Feltwater said the White House shares the Pentagon's view that it is "low to moderate."

Asked if the Reagan administration "regrets that it is to moderate" risk as acceptable, Feltwater said, "Yes. That's assumed in the decision."

During the two-hour meeting, administration officials said the Pen-

tagon was in the process of reviewing its assessment of the threat, according to sources speaking on condition of anonymity.

The risk arises from the administration's decision to put 11 Kuwaiti oil tankers under U.S. flags and captains and offer them the protection of the U.S. Navy as they pass through the Persian Gulf. The refueling is scheduled to start in July.

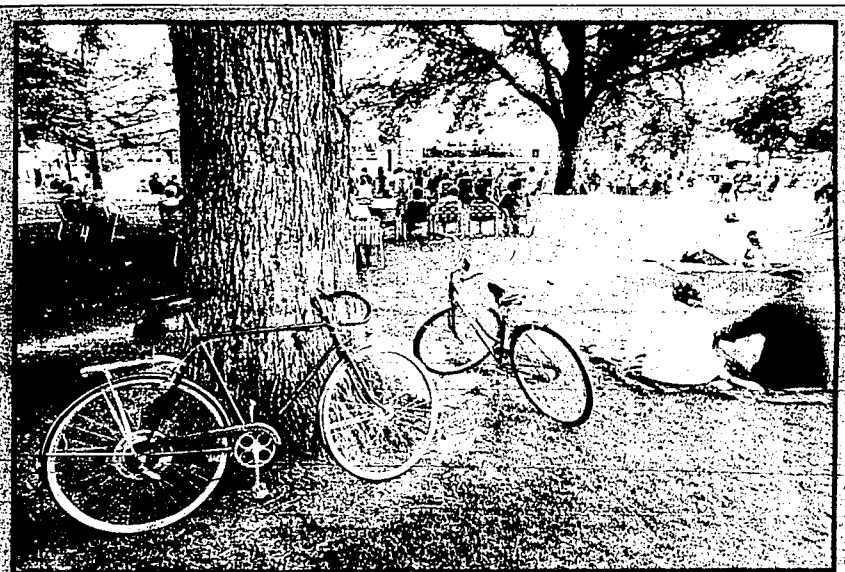
The risk is an ally of Iraq in the Iraq-Iran war, and the apparently accidental May 17 missile attack by an Iraqi warplane that killed 37 sailors aboard the Navy ship Stark.

Pentagon sources disclosed that the Stark skipper, Capt. Glenn R. Brindle, will be relieved of his command before the ship sails for home early next month. The officials, who asked not to be named, said a decision was made earlier this week to assign another Navy officer to the ship to sail it home after temporary repairs are completed in Bahrain.

NBC News, meantime, reported Thursday the military board of inquiry that investigated the attack by the Stark had recommended Brindle be court-martialed for negligence.

Reagan administration sources said the Pentagon has dispatched Navy experts to the Persian Gulf to assess the danger posed to shipping

President denounces budget by Democrats

WASHINGTON — A congressional conference committee, with no Republican support, approved a Democratic \$1 trillion fiscal 1988 budget on Thursday and President Reagan promptly denounced it as "an offer I can refuse."

While Democrats called for compromise by Reagan, they also approved language to force a government financial crisis late next month if he decides to veto the \$19 billion tax bill mandated by their spending plan.

"It's going to be one big High Noon," said Sen. Ernest F. Hollings, D-S.C.

In a statement released by the White House, Reagan said: "If Congress has its way, national security will decline in real terms for the third year in a row. Their price for meeting our national security needs

is this: 'for every \$1 of defense it will cost \$10 in new taxes. That's an offer I can refuse.'

"Only through new taxes and not through spending restraint can Congress come up with a plan. That's why I said we are at a breakpoint. The American people don't want more spending. They want better results."

Democrats, who control the House and Senate, are expected to give the budget final congressional approval next week. It rejects Reagan's call for domestic spending cuts and would allow a modest increase in military spending only if the president goes along with the tax boost.

Reagan spokesman Martin Feltwater said the plan's call for \$64.5 billion in taxes over the next three years, including \$19.3 billion next year, was "a pickpocket way to lift your wallet to pay for your dinner."

Investigators adopt tough stance on North

WASHINGTON — Congressional investigators, toughening their stance on Lt. Col. Oliver North's refusal to testify in private, declared Thursday that North would not be allowed to dictate how the committees run their Iran-Contra inquiry.

Democrats and Republicans alike suggested the matter would not simply rest with North's refusal, sent via his lawyers one day earlier, to be questioned for a private deposition in preparation for later public testimony.

If the former White House aide proves to be trying to get around Congress' subpoena and evade an appearance altogether, "the colonel would move in the eyes of many of us from the posture

having been a man trying to serve his country and his president . . . to a figure . . . with serious legal problems and obviously not the pillar of patriotism that he would like to have portrayed," said Rep. Richard Cheney, R-Wyo., the House panel's ranking Republican.

North's attorneys told the panels on Wednesday that he would refuse to appear in a private session as other witnesses have, arguing that to do so would violate his rights to due process of law.

Rep. Lee Hamilton, D-Ind., chairman of the House panel, said after a meeting of the committee that members believe getting private testimony from North be-

Astronomers discover hints of planets outside solar system

NEW YORK — Astronomers say they have found the strongest evidence yet for possible planets outside the solar system, signs that celestial bodies 20 to 3,000 times as massive as Earth are orbiting up to seven stars.

Although little is known about the objects, "I think it's fair to say they will be giant gaseous bodies, not unlike Jupiter," said Bruce Campbell, research associate at Dominion Astrophysical Observatory in Victoria, British Columbia.

The objects must be studied further before they could be labeled planets, but their masses lie much closer to those of planets than of stars, he said.

Campbell said in an interview before presenting the work Thursday at a joint meeting of the American Astronomical Society and Canadian Astronomical Society in Vancouver, British Columbia.

Scientists have long tried to find planets outside the solar system,

driven by potential clues to understanding the sun's planetary system and the possibility of finding life elsewhere. But previous claims of detecting other planets have not withstood scientific scrutiny.

Campbell said he believes his evidence is stronger because of a new method that allowed detecting smaller celestial bodies, and because seven out of 16 stars studied showed evidence of such bodies.

In interviews, other astronomers said they would have to look closely

at the data before evaluating whether it formed a firmer case. But "I think that it is a strong belief," said William Baum, director of planetary research at the Lowell Observatory in Flagstaff, Ariz. "It appears to be a solid piece of work."

The technique Campbell's team used "appears to be a major step forward," he said.

The new evidence is based on six years of observing 16 stars with sunlike masses about 59 trillion miles to 295 trillion miles from Earth.

The work was done at the Canada-France-Hawaii Telescope in Hawaii. Working with Campbell were Gordon Walker and Stephenson Yang of the University of British Columbia in Vancouver.

The researchers measured tiny variations in the speed at which the stars were moving toward or away from Earth, because the variations would betray the gravitational tugs of bodies orbiting the stars.

Campbell said researchers were able to measure changes as small as

25 miles an hour, representing 50 to 100 times more sensitivity than previous techniques allowed.

He said they found definite evidence of bodies orbiting two stars, Epsilon Eridani in the southern autumn sky, and Gamma Cephei, which appears in the vicinity of the Pole Star.

Campbell said less clear-cut but still statistically significant evidence of orbiting bodies appeared for five other stars, which he declined to name.

Rice passes up the question

NEW YORK (AP) — Donna Rice said in an interview broadcast Thursday that as a matter of "dignity" she wouldn't say whether or not she had a sexual relationship with married presidential candidate Gary Hart.

In her first lengthy interview about her relationship with Hart, Rice told ABC's Barbara Walters that she met Hart at a party at the home of rock musician Don Henley, and later ran into him by accident on a party boat in Miami. She said Hart later invited her to go to Bilimbi on the boat.

Rice said Hart told her he was married, but the two "didn't discuss it."

Walters: "But what everybody wants to know, of course, Donna, is whether it was aboard the yacht, the Monkey Business, or in Washington, is: Did you share a room, did you sleep with Gary Hart?"

Rice: "I don't want to answer you. The reason is because it's a question of dignity. Whether I did, whether I didn't, with Gary Hart or anybody else, I wouldn't answer it one way or another."

King to get a proclamation

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Gov. Evan Mecham, under fire by civil rights leaders since he rescinded a holiday honoring the Rev. Martin Luther King, announced Thursday that he would honor King with a proclamation.

Supporters of a King holiday denounced the move and said they would continue to press for a boycott which already is estimated to have cost the state tens of millions of dollars in convention business.

Mecham, a Republican, says the original holiday was declared illegally.

Competition drives up rates

CHICAGO (AP) — Competition among hospitals may drive prices up, according to a study which found it was 26 percent more expensive to stay in a hospital which was fighting for business.

The finding suggests competing hospitals use expensive new technologies in their efforts to attract new patients and doctors, said the study, which was based on hospital bills in 1982.

Since then, some experts contended, price has become more important in hospital competition, especially because of changes in federal Medicare reimbursement policies.

Price competition works best when the consumer can readily compare the quality of products, which is not the case with hospitals, said the report published in today's Journal of the American Medical Association.

Ozone study a joint effort

WASHINGTON (AP) — A cooperative effort to study ozone and other gases which could affect the earth's climate is being launched by scientists from the United States and Soviet Union.

The new agreement, announced Thursday, calls for a particular emphasis on Antarctica, where scientists have detected a hole in the ozone layer high in the atmosphere. The ozone layer protects the world from damaging ultraviolet radiation from the sun.

While the evaluation has yet to be completed, Navy and Pentagon officials are convinced at this point that Iran's use of mines would pose "a manageable threat," the sources said.

"We aren't overly concerned," said one Pentagon official.

The differences between the CIA and the Pentagon were among the topics Thursday at a closed-door, informal Capitol meeting of senators and top administration national security officials.

Along with Webster, the meeting was attended by Frank Carlucci, President Reagan's national security adviser; and Adm. William Crowe, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Among the participating lawmakers were Sens. John Warner, R-Va., ranking Republican on the Armed Services Committee, and James Sasser, D-Tenn., who returned from a gulf visit three weeks ago.

There was some very frank talk from the Pentagon, which officials think the administration has failed to understand the depth of concern in Congress about this issue.

"I don't think everybody's going the same thing," Sasser continued. "There is a divergence in the intelligence community as to the degree of risk. Our military planners view this in terms of rationality — that is, what a rational opponent would do. But if we've learned anything, it's that the Iranians aren't rational."

During the meeting, the administration officials said they would reassess the Navy's plans to respond to threats to major supply lines that the service looks at the larger picture, according to one source.

for his scheduled mid-July public appearance is highly important and that staff lawyers would emphasize that in negotiations with North's attorneys.

If Congress accepts North's refusal, "then Colonel North would be dictating the procedures" for the hearings, Hamilton said.

He said he had spoken about the matter to Sens. Daniel Inouye, D-Hawaii, and Warren Rudman, R-N.H., leaders of the Senate committee, and added: "My impression is the House and Senate are together on this now. They recognize the benefit of having him in private session."

Benefits include the ability to check North's statements and corroborate them before he appears in public and to make the public testimony more direct and orderly, he said.

Hamilton also said the panels would seek to obtain relevant documents held by North before he appears before them. He said no final resolution on the dispute could be expected before next week.

Senate Majority Leader Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., called North's move "a preeminent display of arrogance," but added that it would require Congress from getting the facts.

"It was unmitigated arrogance on his part, a man who once was called a hero by the president of the United States," Byrd told reporters.

The congressional investigating panels also announced a list of witnesses for the hearings that will resume on Tuesday, including former CIA general counsel Stanley Sporkin; former National Security Council consultant Michael Ledeen; Charles Cooper, an assistant to Attorney General Edwin Meese III; several former military officials and Glenn Robinette, the former CIA

The witness list for next week, in addition to Sporkin, Ledeen, Cooper and Robinette, includes: Noel Koch, former deputy assistant secretary of defense for international security affairs; Dr. Henry H. Goddard, director of plans for the Defense Security Assistance Agency, and Lt. Gen. Colin Powell, former military assistant to Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger.

The House committee, meanwhile, was involved in a dispute with the Justice Department that had delayed the testimony of William Weld, assistant attorney general for the criminal division. Cheney said the two sides had reached agreement that would permit Cabinet members to have copies of their private testimony before the panels, but that lower-level administration officials would have to review the testimony only on Capitol Hill, except under special circumstances.

The panels are investigating Attorney General Edwin Meese III's handling last November of a fact-finding inquiry into arms sales to Iran that uncovered the diversion of money to the Contras.

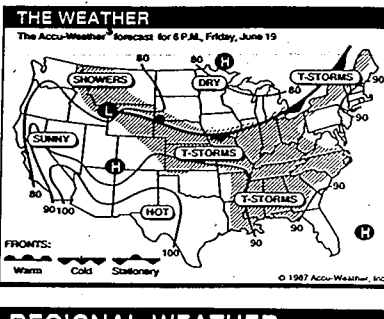

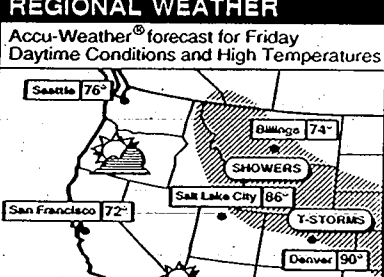

Republican, and Sen. John Peavay, a Democrat.

Westberg this week issued a letter of explanation and denial to all 18 Magic Valley lawmakers listed in the report. In the letter, Westberg said "it was not preparer, Westberg or in any way endorsed by myself or anyone on the staff of Associated Taxpayers of Idaho."

When the report gives a misleading impression of who prepared it, the facts themselves appear to be accurate.

The voting records were taken from the Legislative Data Center which keeps a record of votes on bills. And the dollar figures were taken from a list prepared by Associated Taxpayers.

The votes were on a variety of bills ranging from the 5-cent sales tax to the cigarette tax, the migratory waterfowl stamp, a part-mitral tax and a state tax increase.

Westberg said the bills and the fiscal impact looked accurate.

But others said the report was misleading in other respects because it made it appear all Idaho residents would bear the brunt of a \$106 million tax and fee hike, and that was not the case.

The bill, for example, is expected to raise \$6.3 million in taxes from insurance companies, but will not offset individual taxpayers, said Mike Ferguson, with the Financial Management office.

Westberg said he had no idea how many people have received the bogus mailing.

TRIM, chairman of TRIM Tax Reform, immediately, said he saw the report several weeks ago, and assumed it was from Associated Taxpayers.

"It looked like their kind of thing and their format," said Arp, who could not recall where he received a copy.

After hearing that Associated Taxpayers disavowed responsibility, Arp still was not convinced.

"It sounds like they're getting scared and they want out of the kitchen," he said.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mayor Marlon Barry Jr. vehemently denied a local TV station's report Thursday that a former friend allegedly said him cocaine 20 to 30 times and used the drug with him.

The woman, Karen Johnson, who also asserted she was Barry's former lover, made the damaging statement only on Capitol Hill, in a secret meeting with prosecutors during the past month, WUSA-TV reported, citing documents it obtained.

The report said it had obtained a handwritten diary in which Johnson wrote of a former sexual relationship with the mayor.

FBI agents on May 22 seized records and personal effects from a number of offices and private homes, including Johnson's house.

The president isn't buying it and neither will the American people."

Reagan has repeatedly vowed to veto a budget bill that Democrats to agree to budget reforms that give him more power, such as a line-item veto for spending bills, before negotiating on a deficit-reduction plan. He plans to highlight that message in trips around the country beginning next week.

Democrats contend some new tax increases are needed to reduce deficits that have reached record levels during Reagan's term, exceeding \$200 billion a year and pushing the total government debt to \$3.3 trillion, more than twice what it was when he took office.

Democratic leaders concede enacting new levies or other deficit-reduction action is unlikely without Reagan's support.

"If you don't have the president of the United States trying to help, it's very, very tough," said Sen. Lawton Chiles, D-Fla., chairman of the Senate Budget Committee.

Even with their tax increases, the Democrats, like Reagan, fail to meet the mandate of the Gramm-Rudman law to produce a deficit no larger than \$108 billion in fiscal 1988.

The Democratic plan claims to cut \$37 billion, a billion dollars more than the president's budget. From what otherwise would be more than \$170 billion in red ink.

Conservatives want sentence commuted

Group launches drive to free Hansen

WASHINGTON (AP) — A conservative group began a petition drive Thursday aimed at persuading President Reagan to commute the prison sentence of former congressman George Hansen.

The Washington-based Conservative Action Foundation is staffing a petition van that will travel with "Don't Read" on "Me" flags and distributing red and yellow stickers which depict a pair of hands behind bars and bear the motto, "Set George Hansen Free."

Hansen, 56, a conservative Republican from Idaho, was convicted in 1984 of violating ethics laws while a member of the House in 1981. He was released Dec. 19 after serving six months of a five-to-15-month sentence, but jailed again in April on charges he violated his parole.

"I think he was railroaded. There were other people who've gotten in trouble for the same sort of things and they've gotten a slap on the wrist," said Lee Bellinger, foundation president.

"George Hansen is a political prisoner. Like Alexander Solzhenitsyn, who was imprisoned by the Soviets for his political views, Mr. Hansen is being held an example for of his outspoken views," he said.

Bellinger pointed to what he said was the

comparatively lenient treatment of former Democratic vice presidential candidate Geraldine Ferraro and Rep. Fernando J. S. Germain, D-R.I.

Ferraro was accused of not reporting her husband's finances and improperly handling a loan from family members during her 1978 congressional campaign in New York. The Justice Department, after an investigation, declined to bring either civil or criminal charges.

St Germain was cleared in April by the House ethics committee of charges he improperly used his influence as House banking committee to build a \$2 million real estate fortune.

Hansen, the first congressman prosecuted under the 1978 Ethics in Government Act, was convicted of failing to disclose \$324,000 in loans, including some from Texas billionaire Nelson Bunker Hunt, plus profits from the sale of silver contracts and other transactions.

Bellinger said the petition van would seek signatures outside the offices of mainstream conservatives, whom he criticized for virtually ignoring Hansen now that he's down.

"Nobody in the conservative movement has really done anything about it," Bellinger said. "I don't know why. Creeping respectability, maybe."

Frank Campbell, Hansen's attorney, said the former congressman has been working as a janitor at a prison dormitory since U.S. parole commissioners on May 11 ordered him returned to the Petersburg Federal Correctional Facility in Virginia.

As a condition of his parole, Hansen had been ordered to stay in Virginia and file periodic financial reports. He failed to file the reports and was arrested in Omaha, Neb., after a series of speaking engagements outside Virginia.

Hansen's projected release date is Oct. 18, Campbell said, adding that his client has ended a hunger strike begun in April to protest his treatment by federal authorities.

Noting that Hansen will have served more time than many of the Watergate principals, Campbell said: "It's just beyond me he should suffer that kind of disproportionate punishment for much less culpable conduct. Certainly a commutation would be in order."

Bellinger described his foundation as a group of anti-communist activists. It lobbies for President Reagan's research program to develop a space-based missile shield.

Gem juvenile justice system under scrutiny

BOISE (AP) — One of the first things juvenile offenders learn is that Idaho's legal system won't be tough on them until they turn 18, says Ada County Prosecutor Greg Bower.

"There's a certain class of offender that recognizes it isn't hardball until age 18," Bower said Thursday. He was among witnesses testifying before a legislative study committee on the state's juvenile justice system.

The first three witnesses appearing before the committee agreed the state needs more options in dealing with offenders.

"I wish I could bring you a magic bullet" that would solve all the problems, said Bower. But he said among society's hardest problems is what to do about youthful offenders.

Ada County Magistrate Judge John Dutcher urged that more low-cost counseling be made available to families of moderate income.

youngful offenders find the cost of counseling is beyond their reach, with costs up to \$50 per hour.

Social agencies should provide more counseling at moderate cost, he said, because that cost is much less than the cost of keeping a juvenile violator in an institution, or a criminal in prison.

It can cost \$3,000 per month to keep an offender in an institution such as the Youth Services Center, St. Anthony, Dutcher said, and \$25,000 per year to keep an inmate in prison.

Committee cochairman Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo, is a junior high school teacher. He agreed with Dutcher that often it is possible to get the children who are headed toward trouble; the problem is what to do about it.

Darrington said a common problem appears to be refusal to accept responsibility.

Simplot heading power export project

BOISE (AP) — Idaho potato baron J.R. Simplot and other investors announced ambitious plans on Thursday for a \$1 billion energy project to export surplus power from Idaho to the Southwest.

"We don't know what we can do at this point," Simplot said. "We're not guaranteeing anybody anything. ... But if we don't start something we'll never get there."

The plan by Western Power Inc. calls for construction of a 600-mile, 2,500-megawatt electric transmission line from southern Idaho through Nevada to the southwest. It would ultimately carry up to 800 megawatts of power produced by independent generators across the southern part of Idaho under agreements with Western Power Inc.

"The surplus power is currently not being utilized in any market," said Jay Jackson, a Boise contractor and co-owner of Western Power with Simplot. "By opening up this potential for selling power to areas that need it, Idaho and the Northwest

will gain many new jobs and millions in new dollars."

Jackson said the current north-south transmission lines are being used to near capacity, meaning hundreds of megawatts of power are being wasted because they cannot be diverted to areas that could use them.

Excess capacity in the transmission line could be leased by utilities to wheel any excess power they have to other areas.

The cost of the line itself could hit \$750 million, Jackson said, with additional costs for completing the network likely to run the total cost over \$1 billion.

"Western Power's market survey results indicate a significant potential market as early as 1992," Jackson said of sessions with power consumers in Arizona, Southern California, Nevada and New Mexico.

"We hope that within the next few months some of the power sales contracts in the Southwest can be consummated."

Officials said the line should be

constructed within the next two to three years and be in operation by the early 1990s. Jackson estimated the entire project could generate up to 1,000 new jobs for the state along with significant income for independent power producers and tax revenues for state and local governments. He said it would have no adverse effect on low power rates now being provided by Idaho Power Co. and other utilities in the state.

"We hope to be compatible with Idaho Power," Jackson said. The 800-megawatt potential of the project equals nearly a third of the power capacity of Idaho Power, the state's largest electric utility.

With the Northwest experiencing an energy surplus, Idaho Power has been trying for years to get out of from under the contracts it has been mandated by law to sign with private power producers. It claims the price it is required to pay for that cogeneration is four times higher than what the power can be sold for.

Jackson said the project might tap some of those existing Idaho Power cogenerators although Simplot said he felt the price in those contracts was too high for Western Power.

Western Power has already received over 20 inquiries about hook-ups from potential cogenerators, Jackson said, predicting the number could hit 60 by the time the transmission line is in place.

Judge denies motions, starts trial

BLACKFOOT (AP) — Accused killer Tyrone Edmo has lost his bid for a new judge and a delay in his first-degree murder trial for the slaying of a Pocatello teenager.

Jury selection in the trial began Thursday after 7th District Judge James Herndon refused to disqualify himself from the proceedings and then denied a request to delay the trial three months so the effects of recent publicity in the case could wear off.

Defense attorney William Mauk made the request, arguing first that comments Herndon made a week after the sentencing of Edmo, chief sponsor of the legislation, said Thursday he was confident the full House would approve the budget proposal next week.

Edmo's motion for his disqualification, Herndon said his comments were based on the facts of the crime as they pertained to Eagle's participation, and that a determination on the sentence Edmo receives would be made the same way.

Mauk then asked for the 90-day continuance, arguing that a delay in the trial would at least give potential jurors time to forget about Herndon's comments and the news reports of them.

Reagan, Carter have had biggest of all Tehran headaches

WASHINGTON — Iran has been a perennial headache for American presidents since Franklin Roosevelt, and it has proven particularly prickly for the last two occupants of the Oval Office.

Ronald Reagan rode to victory in 1980 on a wave of popular dismay over Jimmy Carter's handling of the Tehran hostage crisis, but now finds himself facing not one but two Iran crises of his own.

At home, the remaining 18 months of his administration appear mired in investigations of secret arms sales to Iran that were designed to win release of American hostages in the tumult of the Iranian revolution.

And in the Middle East, Reagan's plan to protect Kuwaiti oil tankers from Iranian attacks is under fire from members of Congress who fear it will embroil the United States in the Iran-Iraq war.

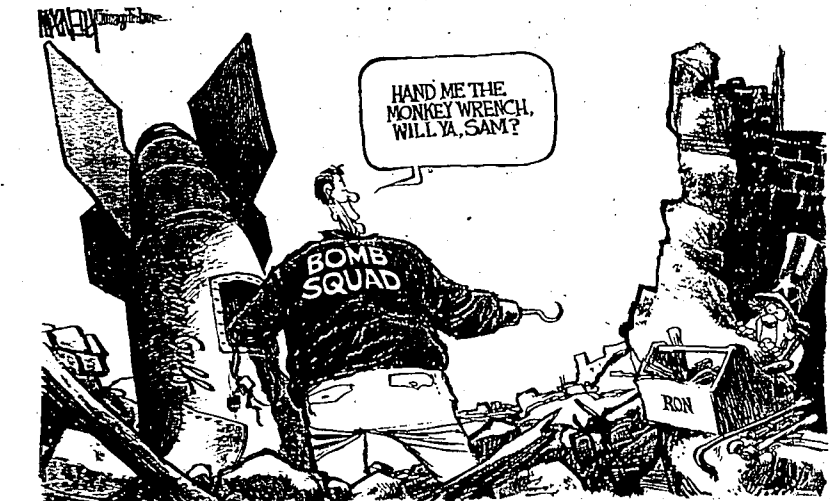
To ice the cake, the Lebanese magazine Ash-Shiraa, which first disclosed the secret arms sales last November, reported that some of the American hostages in Beirut have been moved to Cyprus, raising the specter that they could be punished if the United States takes military action against the Khomeini government.

Although U.S. officials and other experts don't believe the hostages are in Tehran, the report was ominously reminiscent of the uncertainty that marked the last year of Carter's presidency.

Many of America's difficulties in Iran stem from U.S. involvement there from World War II until the revolution which toppled Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi in 1979.

The shah, one of the closest U.S. allies in the Middle East, acted as a surrogate policeman for the United States in the region, dominating the Persian Gulf with his made-in-America military machine.

The shah's successor, Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, whips his people into a frenzy by, with passionate



rhetoric branding the United States "the Great Satan." — and his government is believed to sponsor terrorist groups who have attacked or kidnaped Americans in Lebanon.

U.S. involvement in Iranian affairs began in earnest during World War II, when President Franklin D. Roosevelt pressured Britain and the Soviet Union to agree to withdraw occupation forces from Iran after the conflict.

In his memoirs, President Harry Truman wrote that he worked behind the scenes to compel the withdrawal of Soviet troops from the occupied northern Iran until 1947.

The Truman administration tried

to play a moderating role after the interests in 1951, but under President Truman government headed by Dwight D. Eisenhower, the CIA Prime Minister Mohammad helped chase Mossadegh from power.

In the early 1960s, President Kennedy

nedy prodded the shah into a social reforms designed to narrow the gap between Iran's rich and poor. But the reforms languished under Presidents Lyndon Johnson and Richard Nixon.

Resentment of U.S. involvement in Iran fueled the passions which toppled the shah and led militants to seize 52 American hostages on Nov. 4, 1979.

Two weeks before the 1980 presidential election, candidate Reagan said he wasn't sure what he would do to free the Tehran hostages, "but I certainly wouldn't stand by and do nothing."

His uncertainty over how to free

hostages has not diminished.

The Tehran were seized the day Reagan took office, but early in his administration, shadowy Lebanese terrorists believed to have ties to Iran began grabbing Americans off the streets of Beirut. Eight are now in captivity.

Armed with the knowledge that Carter's preoccupation with the Tehran hostages had crippled U.S. foreign policy, Reagan at first gave the Beirut captives scant public attention.

But the pleas of hostage families impelled him into the arms-for-hostages deal that has shackled his foreign policy.

Reagan's desire to break those shackles contributed to his decision to let 11 Kuwaiti oil tankers fly the Stars and Stripes and to offer them U.S. Navy protection, according to some congressional and administration officials.

The purpose of this policy seems to be to help the administration recover from the disgrace of supplying Iran with missiles in exchange for hostages," Rep. Charles Bennett, D-Pa., sponsor of a bill to halt the reflagging of 11 Kuwaiti tankers, said Tuesday.

State Department and private terrorism experts say they do not believe the nightmare scenario reported by Ash-Shiraa — that Iran had moved the American hostages, back to Tehran and that they may be put on trial.

"Iran has been very careful for the last several years to distance itself from hostage-taking and terrorists," says Shaul Bakhash, formerly editor of a Tehran newspaper and now a professor at George Mason University in Fairfax, Va.

But the report may have been planted, he said, in response to Reagan's plans to reflag Kuwaiti vessels. "It may be a way of saying, 'You make life difficult for us, and we can make life difficult for you.'"

Soviet foreign policy will follow 'new thinking' of military

The style of Soviet foreign policy has changed radically since Mikhail Gorbachev assumed the leadership of the USSR.

Is this just tactics and rhetoric, or is it a genuine new direction? And if genuine, does the new direction depend on Gorbachev's leadership, or does it reflect something more fundamental?

Changes in Soviet military doctrine, which constrains foreign policy, argue the latter. What Gorbachev has done is to pick up the ball and run with it.

The Soviet doctrine that "new political thinking" is necessary because of profound changes in contemporary world developments. They assert that nations are now interdependent and global issues are all interrelated, that national security depends on mutual security, that the arms race has reached a new and dangerous stage, and that there would be no victors in a conventional world war, while nuclear war would destroy mankind.

One can only agree with the thrust of this new thinking, but do the Soviets mean what they say?

There are obvious foreign policy benefits to be gained from this approach, and a relaxation of tension would allow the Soviets to switch resources from offense to the domestic economy. Is this, then, just part of perestroika — a big-time exercise in self-restructuring — or will it allow the Soviets to restructure their economy and then return to the fray? Arguing against that conclusion are Gorbachev's arms-control initiatives. These are hard to explain except in terms of the changes in military doctrine.

force requirements and, in the past, these military requirements have imposed significant constraints on Soviet foreign and domestic policies. By the same token, shifts in doctrine that lead to less stringent requirements can relax these constraints and allow new initiatives in foreign policy. This happened in the late 1960s and again in the early 1980s.

The 1960s' shift sharply reduced the Soviet requirements for nuclear forces. Previously, doctrine had ruled that a world war would inevitably involve nuclear strikes on the Soviet Union. In such circumstances, the optimum Soviet strategy was to strike at the enemy as fast as possible, before the war was unavoidable. This required nuclear superiority and no arms control.

The changed doctrine held that escalation to an intercontinental exchange was no longer desirable, and the new strategy of deterring U.S. strikes on the USSR meant forgoing Soviet strikes on North America. This removed the need for nuclear superiority, and introduced a new requirement for parity at as low a level as could be negotiated.

In the late 1960s, the Soviets reversed their policy on arms control, resulting in treaties that imposed restrictions on both generations ICBMs. At the end of the 1970s, the replacement of these missiles by four-by-generation systems was also cut short, to conform to the SALT II (Strategic Arms Limitations Treaty) restrictions. These developments led directly to Reykjavik and to Gorbachev's proposal to reduce nuclear arsenals to zero over a 15-year period.

The 1960s' doctrinal shift favored reduced nuclear inventories but increased the requirement for conventional forces. Since the U.S. military-industrial base would be spared, it was essential that the United States be denied the bridgehead in Europe that worked so well in World War II, but U.S. forces from the continent had to be evicted without precipitating intercontinental escalation. In 1967-68, the Soviets set about restructuring their forces to provide the capability, using conventional means only, to disable the nuclear delivery systems of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and to mount a blitzkrieg into Western Europe.

A variant of this wartime strategy to occupy Western Europe had existed since the early 1950s and had always incurred heavy political costs. The new Soviet conventional capability was largely in place, despite the political costs, by the second half of the 1970s. But a change in military doctrine in the early 1980s provided the opportunity to relax this constraint on Soviet foreign policy and reduce its demands on the Soviet economy.

The Soviets had always assumed that major conflict with the United States would involve world war. But in between 1979 and 1982 there emerged the concrete possibility of major conflict with the United States in the area north of the Persian Gulf, and the Soviet leadership had to decide whether or not such conflict could be contained. If, however, escalation was not inevitable, then the priority objective would be to contain the conflict by sweeping reductions in the two sides' forces. There is the new structure of theater commands, the new emphasis in their military writing on strategic defensive operations, and their new approach to conventional arms control, including proposals for sweeping reductions in the two sides' forces. than 70 years, an enduring element of Moscow's defense policy has been the requirement to be able to mount a continental-scale offensive to the west.

By downgrading this enduring strategic imperative, the Soviets have removed a linchpin from the framework of Soviet strategic thinking and allowed political and economic factors to assume a new salience.

Another concrete factor that is pushing the Soviets towards "new thinking" about foreign and defense policy is the impending "revolution in military affairs" being generated by emerging technologies. This threatens a new arms race, which the Soviets especially need to avoid. One way is to admit the interactive nature of the arms race and to act to dampen it. Another is to redefine the nature of the security environment and hence the nature of Soviet military requirements.

The changes in military doctrine have made both these approaches possible and both have been adopted. Undoubtedly, this "new thinking" served Soviet interests, but most of the underlying conclusions were reached long ago by thinkers in the West. Over the years, western leaders have paid lip service to many of those ideas, but it now looks as if the Soviet leadership is about to take them seriously. We are faced with a new Soviet line, and the weight of evidence argues that this is not a tactical adjustment but a fundamental new direction in Soviet defense and foreign policy.

The West has proved adept at responding to Soviet threats. Will it be equally successful in responding to this new type of challenge?

After-tax incomes up sharply in May

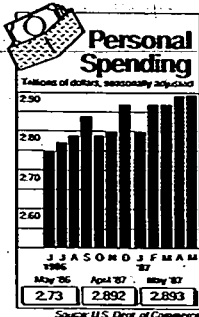
WASHINGTON (AP) — After-tax incomes shot up a record 3.4 percent in May as Americans recovered from the tax hike in April, the government reported Thursday.

Personal savings, which tumbled to an all-time low in April as Americans clipped last month's savings to pay their taxes, recovered as well, giving encouragement that consumers will resume at least a moderate spending pace in the months ahead.

After-tax disposable incomes had plummeted 2.7 percent in April, the biggest decline in 12 years. The higher-than-usual tax bills covered profits made at the end of last year as Americans sold long-term investments. The profit-taking was spurred by the overhaul of the tax law which raised the government's take on long-term capital gains beginning Jan. 1.

Before taking taxes into account, personal incomes rose a slight 0.2 percent in May following a 0.4 percent April gain.

The Commerce Department reported consumer spending edged up just 0.1 percent following a much



Consumer spending, which accounts for two-thirds of overall

economic activity, has supplied most of the power to keep the economy moving since the 1981-82 recession. But while consumer spending rose 4.1 percent last year, analysts are looking for just half of that gain in 1987 as auto sales weaken further and housing sales decline because of rising mortgage rates.

Purchases of durable goods, including autos, fell at an annual rate of 5.9 billion during May.

General Motors announced Thursday that it was expanding its rebate and cut-rate financing incentives to six additional Chevrolet passenger car lines in an effort to spur sales.

In May, personal consumption spending for non-durable goods rose at an annual rate of 11.2 billion while consumer purchases of services, which have been strong all year, climbed at a rate of \$6.2 billion.

Douglas Cliggett, economist for the New York investment firm of Merrill Lynch, said that spending this year would be held back by higher inflation, which will cut into workers' modest income gains.

The savings rate, savings as a per-

cent of disposable income, had plummeted to an all-time low of 0.1 percent in April because of the tax bills but climbed back in May to 3.3 percent. While this is a still a historically low level, economists said they expected consumers will continue spending rather than trying to build their savings any higher.

Wages and salaries, the key component in incomes, increased \$8.8 billion in May, slightly faster than the \$7 billion rate of increase in April.

This gain included a \$1.6 billion rise in manufacturing payrolls, which contrasted with a \$1.3 billion decline in April. Economists said the wage gains in manufacturing reflected increased production spurred by higher export sales and they predicted this trend should strengthen in the months ahead.

Farm income fell \$1.1 billion in May compared with a \$6.7 billion April decline. The decreases were attributed to declines in government subsidy payments. Excluding government aid, farm incomes would have risen small amounts in both months.

Marine will face trial

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Marine staff sergeant who was the latest chapter in a sex and spying scandal that included two arrested on espionage charges, will be court-martialed for alleged improper contacts with Soviet women, the Defense Department said Thursday.

Staff Sgt. Robert S. Stufflebeam, 25, of Washington, Ill., was ordered to trial by Lt. Gen. Frank E. Petersen, commanding general of the Quantico, Va., Marine Base.

Petersen made his decision Wednesday evening after reviewing the record of Stufflebeam's pre-trial hearings, which concluded June 8, the Pentagon said.

The decision to try Stufflebeam was the latest chapter in a sex and spying scandal that included two arrested on espionage charges, will be court-martialed for alleged improper contacts with Soviet women, the Defense Department said Thursday.

The Pentagon said Stufflebeam would stand trial on nine different charges, ranging from violating standing orders involving fraternization to making "false official statements" and lying about his conduct under oath.

If convicted on all counts, he could be sentenced to up to 14 1/2 years in prison, a dishonorable discharge, loss of all pay and allowances and a reduction in rank to private.

Nuclear arms use condoned

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. (AP) — by the United Methodist and Roman Catholic churches.

The governing body of the 160,000-member Presbyterian Church in America has issued a policy statement that says use of nuclear weapons can be justified to protect the United States from communism.

The document, three years in the making, runs counter to anti-nuclear statements adopted in recent years by the United Methodist and Roman Catholic churches.

It was approved Tuesday by more than two-thirds of nearly 900 commissioners at the PCA's annual general assembly at Calvin College.

The assembly was in conjunction with a meeting of the National Association of Presbyterian and Reformed Church synods.

Course of AIDS may be clarified soon

WASHINGTON (AP) — Surgeon General C. Everett Koop predicted Thursday that AIDS testing of surgery patients will be routine and it should be clear in several months whether AIDS will explode among heterosexuals.

Koop also told a House panel he believes young children can be taught to abstain from sexual relations before they marry, but condoms must be offered to the 70 percent of adolescents who already are sexually active.

"If you tell that 70 percent to just say no, they find it very difficult," Koop told the House Subcommittee on Children, Youth and Families during a hearing on teen-agers and AIDS.

Koop said adolescents exploring their own sexuality and possibly in-

travenous drugs are particularly vulnerable to AIDS. He said they are "extraordinarily difficult to deal with" because they believe they are immortal and resist changing their behavior.

"I was talking to some teen-agers about long-term monogamy and this one girl said 'How long?' A semester?" Koop recalled.

"You have to introduce such things as condoms, knowing that it offends the sensibility of some people, but that is a public health officer... the only thing I can do is offer them," he said.

Rep. George Miller, D-Calif., the committee chairman, said 148 teen-agers had AIDS, acquired immune deficiency syndrome, as of June 8. But he said many of the 7,500 AIDS victims aged 20 to 29 probably were infected as teen-agers, given the

two-to-10-year latency period of the disease.

"We must not let the currently low number of teen-agers with AIDS dissuade us from taking the threat to youth seriously," Miller said.

Koop said the federal Centers for Disease Control is conducting a study to determine the incidence of AIDS infection in the general population.

"The thing we would like to tell you, but we can't, is if we are standing on the threshold of a heterosexual explosion of AIDS," Koop said six to eight months.

Asked whether hospitals should routinely test patients for AIDS upon admission, Koop said the real problem is with surgical patients. He said doctors and nurses in the

operating room are exposed to pin pricks, knife cuts and other incidents that could endanger them.

"There will be an increased demand" by medical personnel for AIDS testing, he said. "The day is not far off when the testing of surgical patients in hospitals becomes much more routine."

Lawmakers angry about lax security

WASHINGTON (AP) — Angry lawmakers, saying security at American airports leaves travelers vulnerable to weapon-toting hijackers, said Thursday they are ready to force the facilities to improve their detection systems.

Their wrath was fueled by a congressional report that disclosed that when Federal Aviation Administration inspectors tried to carry 2,19 live guns and weapons to 20 airports in late 1986, 496 — or 20 percent — were not detected at security checkpoints.

"It disturbs me no end to think that anyone somebody gets on that airplane, they're playing Russian roulette with their lives," said Rep. Cardiss Collins, D-Ill., chairman of the House government activities and transportation subcommittee, which held a hearing on airport security.

The tests were conducted at 28 major American airports and the report, based on FAA records, was prepared by the General Accounting Office, Congress' investigative branch.

Mrs. Collins and other legislators used the hearing to repeatedly call for government standards for airport screening systems.

Raymond A. Salazar, director of the FAA's Office of Civil Aviation Security, agreed that such performance standards were needed, but he said the agency needed three more months to study the X-ray and metal-detection systems.

"If you don't have minimum standards set in the next three months, I'll write legislation myself," Mrs. Collins told him.

Salazar said that since screening began in 1973, security systems in the United States have detected 37,000 firearms, led to 16,000 arrests and prevented 117 hijackings.

Under prodding by Rep. Major Owens, D-N.Y., Salazar said the FAA believes none of the incidents involved organized, trained terrorists.

Students seize heart of Seoul as violent street battles rage

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Tens of thousands of students seized the heart of the city Thursday during massive street battles that erupted after police used tear gas to break up marches by people demanding a ban on tear gas.

Violence raged in Seoul and at least seven other major cities as opposition groups held an "Anti-Tear Gas Day" to demand the authoritarian government stop using the powerful irritant to suppress political dissent.

"Expel tear gas from our land," protesters in the capital and other cities chanted. "Destroy the military dictatorship."

But police repeatedly used tear gas to break up what had been largely peaceful rallies. Hundreds of students briefly seized the center of the city and trapped scores of riot police.

Students stood and sang the country's national anthem as they cheered and applauded their victory. "We love our country," students in

jeans and T-shirts shouted before police recaptured the area.

President Chun Doo-hwan's government was reported to be considering "drastic measures" to end the worst political violence the country has seen since it took power in 1980.

A crowd estimated at 80,000 people, made up of students, workers and residents, surged through the southern city of Pusan chanting, "Down with military dictatorship." Police advancing in massed formations fired volleys of tear gas to control the protests in the country's second largest city.

Thousands of protesters carrying South Korean flags battled police in the southern city of Taejeu and attacked three police stations. Students fought police who tried to stop them swarming off campuses in the southern city of Kwangju. There were street battles in the central city of Taejeon.

Thousands have been injured in the fighting, but there have been no

confirmed deaths.

So far, the riot police have not carried out any heavy rioting on tear gas and truncheons. Special attack squads are trained in martial arts.

Scores of people were injured and several students were hit at close range by rifle-fired tear gas canisters. But officials declined to provide any figures.

About 80 riot police were seized when students overran their unit after crowds seized the main square in front of the Bank of Korea and held it for nearly an hour. Protesters overran another unit of about 30 men in front of the city's main railway station and held it for about two hours.

Kneeling officers begged the attackers to stop beating them. But enraged students hurled rocks from a few feet away, hit and kicked the huddled police and stripped them of their weapons and equipment.

Moscow welcomes American pilot

MOSCOW (AP) — A 61-year-old American who was detained after he flew from Ohio to Moscow in 1985 landed his single-engine plane in Moscow Thursday and emerged for a VIP welcome this time.

Millard Harmon, a retired educator from Delmar, N.Y., produced a purple piece of paper as he came out of the Beechcraft-36 cockpit after his 4 1/2-hour flight from Washington.

"I've got a visa," Harmon said. A dozen Soviet journalists at the Sheremetyevo airport surrounded

Harmon, who was presented with bouquets of yellow and purple flowers.

Harmon ran afoul of Soviet authorities when he flew from Dayton, Ohio, to Moscow in June 1985. After he touched down, Soviet officials found he had no visa and he was locked in a transit hotel for three days.

Asked why he had made this flight, Harmon said, "I think we need a few more friendship bridges between Moscow and Washington."

Harmon criticized Mathias Rust, a 19-year-old West German who flew from Finland to Moscow in a single-engine Cessna, buzzed Red Square and landed by the Kremlin wall.

"Frankly, teen-agers are impetuous, young and really don't have a whole lot of sense," Harmon said, criticizing what he said was a "prank."

"Soviet (air force) pilots exercised a whole lot of restraint, and if the whole world doesn't recognize that, that's their problem," he added.

Contra raid takes 8 lives

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — Contra rebels attacked a farming settlement in eastern Nicaragua early Thursday, killing eight civilians and wounding 10 others, the government radio station reported.

The Voice of Nicaragua provided no details of the incident, which it said occurred in Muthan in Chontales province, about 105 miles east of Managua.

The U.S.-backed Contra rebels are fighting to oust Nicaragua's leftist Sandinista government, which came to power in July 1979 after defeating the pro-American government of the late Anastasio Somoza.

The U.S. Congress last year approved \$100 million in military and non-military aid for the Contras. That money will run out this fall, and President Reagan is considering asking for \$150 million more, to be spread out over 18 months.

With the financing, the Contras have stepped up their guerrilla actions inside Nicaragua.

The Nicaraguan Democratic Force, the largest Contra group, has maintained bases inside neighboring Honduras since it began fighting five years ago.

A three-man team of observers from the U.S. Senate Foreign Relations Committee flew into Nassau to report on today's balloting for 49 members of the Bahamian Parliament. The election will determine who governs the island nation for the next five years.

Irregularities in the voting system could throw the outcome into doubt.

Linders campaign for funds for plant

MIAMI (AP) — The family of an American engineer slain by Contra guerrillas in April kicked off a fund drive on Thursday to complete the small hydroelectric project he was building in Nicaragua.

John and Mirlam Linder, who are seeking \$200,000 to complete the project, also condemned the Contras who killed their brother Benjamin as "bired guns."

The Contras, who are funded by the U.S. government, initially said Linder was killed accidentally in a firefight on April 28, but recently told The New York Times the American was mistaken for a Cuban adviser and shot.

Miami, the first city on the Linders nationwide tour, is the site of the U.S. headquarters for the Contra umbrella group, the Nicaraguan Resistance.

The Linders, who were also beginning a drive to oppose further U.S. aid to the rebels, distributed copies of an autopsy by New York Dr. Michael Baden stating the weapon that killed

ed their brother was "less than one inch" from his head when fired. Linder may have been wounded in the legs before the fatal shot, the doctor said.

Her brother "was immobilized, they walked up to him, they put a gun to his head and they pulled the trigger," said Ms. Linder.

"A statement" issued by the two pointed to extensive U.S. economic and military aid to the Contras, calling the guerrillas "simply hired guns" for the United States.

"My brother was killed by a policy that begins here," said John Linder. "It is here the policy must be ended."

The State Department has refused to communicate with the Linders about the case other than to send the family an autopsy report and his passport, said the brother.

The Linders' tour, which features a Nicaraguan-made documentary about Linder's life and work, could take them to as many as 50 communities before they return to Portland, Ore., said Ms. Linder.

The tour is sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee and other local and national groups opposing Contra aid.

Radio reporter doesn't regret plug by Reagan

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — The reporter who got President Reagan to plug her radio station during a news conference said Thursday she isn't bothered by criticism of the promotional play.

"It's a fun promotion, our listeners love it and we got a lot of mileage on it," said LIZ White of WSM.

And the station continues to run the Reagan pronouncement despite scorn from other broadcasters and a White House request to pull it from the airwaves.

During a news conference about the Iran-Contra affair in Washington on May 15, Mrs. White handed Reagan a slip of paper and pleaded with him to read it, saying her boss wouldn't let her return to Nashville without the endorsement.

Reagan chuckled, paused, then read: "I'm Ronald Reagan. Whenever I'm in Nashville, I listen to radio 650, WSM, the 50,000-watt blowtorch of the South."

Jerry Dahmen, news director for WSM, which has broadcast the Grand Ole Opry for 62 years, called Mrs. White "spunky" for asking Reagan to do the promotion.

"She was willing to take a risk and not (get) hauled out by the Secret Service," Dahmen said.

"I felt like it was a bush-league job. It was not professional at all," said Eric Marshall, program manager at country music station WSIX.

Judy McNutt, program director for rock music station WKDF, said she thought reporters ought to avoid doing promotional work.

"I just think certain kinds of behavior are expected and when you're in a press conference kind of situation you're not expected to have a... promotional hat on," she said.

She added, "No offense to Ronnie, but he probably was unaware of what he was doing."

Mrs. White said station manager Bob Meyer jokingly suggested she get the promotion. "I just took it on," she said.

She realized she might alarm Secret Service guards when she handed Reagan the request, so she moved very carefully. "I was scared to death," Ms. White said.

The following day, White House Deputy Press Secretary Albert R. Brashear called Dahmen and asked him not to use the promotional material except as a news item.

Dahmen went ahead anyway. "If (Reagan) had every right to say no to the request, he said.

Official blocks Hofmann story sale

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A bookseller's plan to sell the literary rights to confessed bomber Mark Hofmann's story to recover a \$14,000 court award has been thwarted by the Salt Lake County Attorney.

Marcus Theodore, attorney for bookstore owner Sam Weller, had planned on auctioning all copyrights to any books, television or movie production resulting from Hofmann's story on the steps of the 3rd District courthouse Thursday.

However, county attorney David Yocom on Thursday obtained a temporary order blocking the sale, and 3rd District Judge Raymond Uno is to hear arguments June 29.

Hofmann, 32, pleaded guilty earlier this year to two counts of second-degree murder in the Oct. 15, 1985 bombings and to two counts of theft by deception in a plea bargain arrangement. Twenty-six other counts were dismissed and Hofmann was sentenced to life in prison.

As part of the arrangement, he agreed to reveal all the details about his five-year career as a dealer in

historical documents, many books, and the bombings that killed Steven Christensen, 31, and Kathleen Sheets, 50.

Theodore said Utah's victim restitution statutes provide that any profit derived from Hofmann's story — including the transcript of the debriefing sessions — should go to his victims.

But Yocom sought the restraining order because prosecutors are conducting the debriefing sessions as part of Hofmann's plea-bargain and have promised transcripts will be made available at no cost to the press.

Court rules polygamy not factor in custody

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Children cannot be taken from their mother just because she lives in a polygamous household, the Utah Supreme Court has ruled.

"Moral character is only one of a myriad of factors the court may properly consider in determining a child's best interests. In this regard, we have previously held that a parent's extramarital sexual relationship alone is insufficient to justify a change in custody," the court said Wednesday.

The case stemmed from a custody dispute between Jennifer Sanderson, Cedar City, and Robert L. Tryon, Tyrone, who had other wives, had three children with Ms. Sanderson before they split up and she started a relationship with a man who also had other wives, the decision said.

Tryon forsook polygamy and went

to court to gain custody of the children, contending they were living in an immoral environment where the mother and stepfather were not legally married. The judge agreed, and awarded him custody.

However, the high court said the judge had made no ruling on who was the better parent or what would be in the best interests of the children. The justices sent the case back to circuit court for additional findings of fact.

Polygamy was practiced within the Mormon Church until 1890. Since then the church has excommunicated those who advocate it, but it continues to be practiced by followers of some offshoots of the church. It is against state law, but charges have not been brought under the statute for decades.

Crews contain fire in Utah

VERNAL, Utah — A 20-person crew hoped to contain a 90-acre fire in a mountainous area west of here Thursday, while most Utah firefighters rested for what could be another lightning assault this weekend.

"Right now, it looks pretty good," said Kim Bartel, Bureau of Land Management fire dispatcher in Vernal.

He said the fire began in a stand of sagebrush and juniper after a lightning strike on Tuesday, but "precipitation buried the smoke and we couldn't find it."

On Wednesday, he said, smoke was spotted and crews were called out to

the site on BLM and state land 12 miles west of Vernal.

Bartel said there was no threat to life or private property and crews were expected to contain the fire by 4 p.m. Thursday.

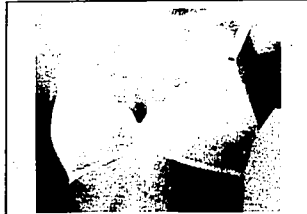
It was quiet in other areas of the state Thursday, but forecasts called for more dry thunderstorms this weekend, an Intergency Fire District dispatcher said.

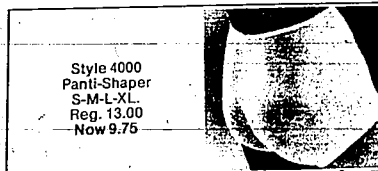

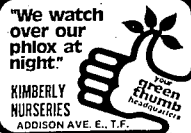

NLRB rejects union charges against plant management

TWIN FALLS — The National Labor Relations Board has rejected five union charges of unfair labor practices at Universal Frozen Foods in Twin Falls.

The federal agency found insufficient evidence to support any of the allegations filed last month by Local 280 of the International Union of Operating Engineers, which now is trying to organize the UFF plant, Larry McCargar, assistant director for the Seattle Region, said Thursday.

The NLRB did not investigate a sixth complaint involving

discrimination because it lacks jurisdiction, he said.

UFF previously had denied the charges. "We always felt they were unfounded," said Plant Superintendent Mike Johnston on Thursday. "While pleased with the decision, it most certainly doesn't surprise us."

However, Local 280 spokesman Ron Green said late in the day the union is still considering its options in the wake of the NLRB action. "We are contemplating an appeal," he said.

In the May 6 charges, Local 280 had accused UFF of:

- Retaliating against employees serving as union committee members by placing them in

"deplorable and degrading work";

- Confiscating union literature illegally;
- Interfering with union recruiting efforts by interrogating employees about union sympathies;
- Engaging in surveillance of employees or creating that impression;
- Revising longstanding policies about safety infractions to retaliate against union activists.

The NLRB could not verify any of the charges, McCargar said.

It did not probe another complaint of job discrimination against female employees in promotions, saying the complaint does not fall within the

agency's jurisdiction. That charge also has been filed with the Idaho Human Rights Commission, according to UFF and union spokesmen.

Local 280 now has the choice of withdrawing the charges or appealing the dismissal to the NLRB's Office of General Counsel in Washington, D.C.

The NLRB finds "no probable cause" and dismisses about two thirds of the charges lodged nationwide, McCargar indicated. The remaining third go through formal settlement procedures with employers and, if necessary, before an administrative law judge for adjudication.

FBI suspect may tie into Twin Falls woman's murder

MOUNTAIN HOME — Law enforcement agencies investigating the June 9 murder of Lisa Szubert, 22, of Twin Falls, say they still have no definite suspects.

But a Federal Bureau of Investigation bulletin on a 27-year-old man is being circulated along with other material on the case.

Lt. Dave Pursell of the Mountain Home Police Department said officers have information that the man on the FBI's Most

Wanted List as a suspect in similar killings in other states may have been in the Mountain Home area recently. Pursell said the man has been on the FBI list since well before the Szubert woman was killed.

"We have nothing that definitely points to him as a suspect in this case, but if he has been in this area, we certainly want to find him and check him out," Pursell said Thursday.

The FBI bulletin, also circulated with law enforcement agencies, is on the FBI's Most

Indigent claims take up 20% of county's budget

TWIN FALLS — In a steady, relentless flow, the applications from indigents seeking help from the county practically drown the courthouse in paperwork and eat up 20 percent of Twin Falls County's budget.

About 50 percent of the commissioners' time is spent on indigent applications, estimates Commissioner Marvin Hempleman. "It seems like there's a brand new one every workday."

indigency claims at the conference, Hempleman said. Each county wrote a section of the handbook and information came from the 75 county representatives at the conference.

"The whole idea is to get a little bit of uniformity throughout the state," Hempleman said. "It's not going to get easier, but hopefully it will get smoother."

He used the example of the required interview to demonstrate how the process can be fouled up by the county's mistakes.

"That's a skill in itself," he said. "You have to ask all the right questions — people won't volunteer all the right information."

Hempleman said the increase in indigency claims over the past 6 years is due to 2 factors: the law and 'the times.'

Hempleman, who recently returned from a conference on indigency in Wallace, said there is little hope the situation will improve, although a few changes in the climate may ease the process of deciding an indigency claim.

Recent court decisions have made denying an indigency claim harder. One case, involving-Minidoka County, negated the rule that indigents have to apply for assistance within 45 days of incurring a medical expense.

Hempleman says these court rulings have made it hard to deny a claim.

"We don't really have anything to lean on as far as denial," he says.

But Idaho counties are banding together to ease the process. During the past legislative session, the Idaho Association of Counties cooperated with its perennial sparring partner over indigency issues, the Idaho Hospital Association, to pass a bill channeling medical indigency money through the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare to get more federal money for the claim.

The counties also cooperated to create a handbook for processing in-

The Legislature's medical indigency bill may not help the county's budget much, Hempleman said, but they won't know its effects for a couple years.

The bill removes the Medicaid cap of \$20 a month on prescription drug payments and the limit of hospitalization payments of 40 days.

Counties used to have to pay 100 percent of the bills over those limits for indigents, but now Medicaid will pick up 70 percent of those bills and the counties 30 percent.

But Hempleman said there are only two patients and several prescription accounts affected by the bill.

Meanwhile, Twin Falls County continues to process applications. Hempleman said the commissioners are booked through August with hearings on denied claims.

Hempleman said the increase in indigency claims over the past six years are due to two factors.

"It's a little bit because of the law, which doesn't exist because of court cases, and because of the times," he said.

Statutes effectively don't guide indigency decisions any more, he said, because court cases have loosened restrictions and made it harder to deny an indigency application.

He also said the bad economy increases the number of people who don't have the resources to pay medical bills.

The county budgeted about \$1 million for indigents this year, while six years ago — when Hempleman came on the commission — it spent \$3,000.

"It really got deep in a hurry," he said.

City officials look at development strategies

SUN VALLEY — City officials are looking at economic development — and how their communities can share in the benefits new business would bring.

Some 333 delegates gathered here Thursday for opening sessions of the 40th annual Association of Idaho Cities conference. Meetings run through Saturday.

"The main attention this year will be on economic development and how cities can get their share of the pie," said Executive Director Jim Weatherly. "After all, if economic growth is to occur in Idaho, it will be in the cities and counties."

Thursday, delegates from District 5, which includes Pocatello, Blackfoot, Chubbuck and American Falls, approved a resolution urging the AIC to hold its 1990 convention in Pocatello. "If Pocatello can get the conference, it could be an economic boon to the community," said Mayor Dick Finlayson.

A vote on the resolution may be taken by the full AIC membership Friday. Other resolutions under consideration include requiring the federal government to pay for federally mandated programs imposed on cities.

"If the federal government is going to demand we do these things, then they should be prepared to pay for it because cities can't afford it," said

Chubbuck Mayor John Cotant Jr.

Another resolution urges the Legislature to stop dipping into the Water Pollution Control Account to pay other state bills. In recent sessions, the Legislature has taken money from a fund which is supposed to be held for sewage and water treatment improvements, and used the cash for other things.

Pocatello's controversial street utility fee and how it might be used by other cities in Idaho was scheduled for discussion in one of nine workshops planned for delegates.

Gov. Cecil Andrus will address delegates on Friday and Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, is a featured speaker on Saturday.

Fireworks cache confiscated

TWIN FALLS — Acting on an anonymous tip, Twin Falls police have located and confiscated \$3,400 worth of fireworks they say do not fall within legal limits of safe and sane materials.

Commander Garry Corder said that as a result of an investigation, officers obtained a search warrant for a garage at 576 Harrison Street, where numerous boxes of fireworks were located. The boxes were taken to the police department where they were being stored Thursday afternoon.

Corder said two charges — illegal possession of fireworks and keeping gunpowder and other explosives within the city limits — were filed Thursday afternoon against Helen Lewis, 51, of Twin Falls. She was arrested and released on her own recognizance Thursday afternoon pending arraignment in magistrate court.

Officers said an undercover person went to the Lewis home and was allegedly taken to the garage on Harrison Street and allowed to

purchase several fireworks items. A search warrant was then obtained by city police and the merchandise was seized.

Police said "this is one of the largest amounts of illegal fireworks to be collected at one

time in Twin Falls. The \$3,400 value represents the wholesale purchase price and retail value would probably be nearly double that, Corder said.

Some of the larger displays were marked \$10 each. He said there

were several sizes of rockets and firecrackers and some large "fire balls" that contain as many as 96 fire balls each.

Rockets, overhead display items and ground discharges were in-

EPA: Acid rain poses no problem in Idaho

TWIN FALLS — Acid rain is not posing a problem to mountain lakes in the Sawtooths and other regions of the state, according to a U.S. Environmental Protection Agency report.

But the region's lakes lack the capacity to neutralize even low levels of acid, particularly in the Idaho-Montana border, the study says.

Acid rain has destroyed aquatic life in the East, damaged buildings in Europe and may pose a threat to forests, crops and even human health, according to a recent issue of Idaho Clean Water, a newsletter of the Idaho Water Quality Bureau.

The study, based on EPA sampling two years ago, was reported in Clean Water.

Researchers surveyed 72 lakes in the Sawtooth Mountains and in the Idaho Batholith including the Clearwater, Salmon River, Sawtooth and Bitterroot mountains, the Clean Water report said.

Lakes that lie on bedrock and receive most of their water from precipitation are more vulnerable to acid rain, the study says. Thin soils also compromise the ability to buffer acid rain, the study says.

One factor responsible for these results is that the amount of sulphur being deposited on the lakes is dropping, according to the EPA. This is largely because of recent closings of large metal smelters in the West.

"It's good the government is doing research on acid rain but overall it is too limited and too slow," says Norm Dean, director, pollution and toxics, National Wildlife Federation in Washington, D.C.

The fall sampling did not take into account the problem of seasonal acidification caused by a surge into the lakes from snowpack runoff in the spring, he said.

"This was a fall study. You don't get the seasonal impact," Dean said.

Lakes in the West have less of an acid buffering capacity due to their granite bases. The limestone base of eastern lakes buffer acid better, Dean said.

Despite closing of western smelters, nitrogen oxide and sulphur dioxide, components of acid rain, can travel to Idaho from smelters as far away as Mexico, Dean said.

Other sources of acid rain are coal-fired power plants and motor vehicles.

Among the factors that determine whether acid rain will form is the type and amount of soil, the vegetation, water flow and the presence of alkaline dust in the air.

J.R. Simplot introduced as co-president of company with ambitious power plan

BOISE (AP) — Idaho potato baron J.R. Simplot has been introduced as co-president of Western Power, a three-year-old privately owned Boise company that has ambitious plans for a \$1 billion energy project.

The project involves generating and transmitting unregulated surplus electricity from Idaho to the Southwest.

"I'm kind of a babe in the woods on it, but I see the potential in the long run," Simplot said at a press conference Thursday in Boise.

"Nothing ventured, nothing gained; that's the way I look at it," Simplot said. "After all, during these pretty good years, and I'd like to stick around a while longer and see what we can create here in the Boise Valley."

Simplot, 78, and fellow President Jay Jackson said Western Power intends to build a 2,500-megawatt transmission line that would run 600 miles from southern Idaho through Nevada to Las Vegas. The line — which could cost between \$400 million and \$750 million — ultimately would distribute 800 megawatts of power to consumers in California, Nevada, Arizona and New Mexico.

"Western Power's market survey results indicate a significant potential market as early as 1992," Jackson said. "We hope that within the next few months some of the power sales agree-

ments in the Southwest can be consummated."

Simplot and Jackson said repeatedly that the company will not go forward unless it secures sales contracts or letters of intent from Southwest consumers. They ducked questions about how much money has been invested.

"We've got a little (money) left," Simplot said. "We'll keep paying our bills. We're not going to go broke if that's what you're talking about."

In Idaho, electricity would be generated at several locations, bringing the total cost of completing the network to over \$1 billion. Among the promising sites in Idaho are undammed rivers and food processing plants which could be retrofitted with cogeneration equipment, as well as underutilized existing dams. Discussions are underway with irrigation districts, food processors and other small-power producers.

Jackson said one possible site is on the North Fork of the Payette River, a location that Idaho Power had considered but abandoned last year. Environmentalists and sportsmen have opposed power development in that area.

Western Power is assisting the Gem Irrigation District of Homedale, which has filed an application with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission for

a permit to build a 350 megawatt underground hydroelectric plant at the North Fork site, Jackson said.

While denying that Western Power would be in direct competition with Idaho Power, Jackson said: "The accumulation of this (surplus) power has been too great for our current power company, which of course is Idaho Power, to use in their current systems. Consequently we have... put together a company that could sell and market power in the great Southwest."

Jackson said Western Power hopes to be "compatible" with the Boise-based utility. The 800-megawatt potential of the project is roughly equivalent to one-third of Idaho Power's total power capacity. The Boise-based utility has had difficulty selling its surplus power outside its distribution system. It does not have its own transmission lines that reach the Southwest and has had problems getting access to Bonneville Power Administration lines.

Idaho Power reacted cautiously to Western Power. "I guess we're not really up to speed," Joseph Marshall, vice president of planning resources and rates for Idaho Power, said later. "We don't know enough to be opposed to it or for it."

Legalization is one major provision of the Immigration Reform and Control Act. The other significant new program mandated by the legislation concerns the hiring of illegal aliens by employers in the United States. It will be the responsibility of the employer to reasonably assure himself that all persons hired are either American citizens or aliens who are legally authorized to work in this country.

Prior to Nov. 6, 1986, it was not against the law for an employer to hire a person who resided in this country illegally. That is no longer the case. For the first time, fines will be imposed on persons or organizations knowingly hiring illegal aliens, and the fines will be increasingly more severe for repeating offenders.

School honored for shots level

TWIN FALLS — A Twin Falls elementary school has become the first-ever honored for the immunization levels of its students.

Twin Falls School District nurse Kim Kvale announced that I.B. Perrine elementary school reached a 94 percent immunization level, surpassing the 90 percent shooting level recommended by the Centers for Disease Control.

The Certificate of Achievement was issued by Fritz Dixon, chief of the bureau of preventive medicine for the state Department of Health and Welfare, Jerry Evans, superintendent of public instruction and Gerald Hurst, director of the local South Central District Health Department.

Sawtooth elementary school also had a goal of reaching the 90 percent level this year, but fell just short, at 89.6 percent, Kvale said.

The award marks the end of the first year of a program to get two Twin Falls elementary schools to the recommended level each year. Full immunization means proving each student between kindergarten and 5th grade has had four shots for diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis; three doses of polio vaccine and one shot for measles, mumps and rubella.

Landing system may be delayed

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Operation of an instrument landing system at Coeur d'Alene Airport that guides pilots during inclement weather may be delayed if the port's runway extension project isn't finished on time.

Project engineer Jim Coleman of J-U-B Engineers, Inc., said an initial project completion date of Sept. 15 has been bumped up to the beginning of the month.

Ideally, this would give the Federal Aviation Administration time to check and approve the airport's Instrument Landing System, which helps guide pilots to the runway during foul weather.

The landing system is usually not needed during the fair-weather summer months, said Fern Lake, Coeur d'Alene Airport Advisory Board chairman.

Mrs. Lake said she expects completion of the system is not operational by October, when the weather becomes less predictable.

Coleman said he's confident the runway extension project can be completed by Sept. 1, giving the FAA sufficient time to have the instrument landing system checked by Oct. 1.

However, if the project is delayed or an emergency disrupts the FAA's equipment-testing schedule, the system may not be approved until as late as Dec. 17, said Jerry Nauman, FAA spokeswoman in Seattle.

The FAA is scheduled to inspect Coeur d'Alene's instrument landing system Sept. 13, said Jerry Hambleman, aerospace systems inspection pilot from the agency's Sacramento, Calif., office.

However, the inspectors are allowed an 18-day grace period on either side of the slated inspection date, Hambleman said, meaning the date of inspection could take place as late as Oct. 1.

Lake said even if the instrument landing system is not working by October, the airport has other guidance systems options.

Utah confident of making supercollider 'finals'

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — State officials remain confident that Utah will end up on the Department of Energy's "short list" of sites to house the multibillion-dollar supercollider project.

"We have felt from day one that we have the land and the technical capability and the geology of our site that can make us one of the final few, and we've felt that right from the beginning," State Science Advisor Randy Moon told reporters after a meeting of the governor's supercollider task force Thursday.

A technical committee has cut the list of potential sites for the \$4.4-billion atom smasher to Delle and Knolls, located in the western desert some 50 miles from Salt Lake City.

Outlining the latest developments in the state's \$1 million bid for the project, Lt. Gov. Val Oveson said former Republican National Committee Chairman Richard Richards has been hired to lobby on Utah's behalf in Washington. Gilman Advertising, of Salt Lake City, also has been contracted to help prepare the bid.

Richards, a former chairman of Utah's Republican Party and now practicing law and consulting in Washington, will be paid \$25,000, Moon said. But that amount could grow as the bidding war intensifies.

"The real effort of a lobbyist will occur once Utah is listed on the short list," he said.

Francine Glani, press secretary to Gov. Norm Bangert, said Richards will work with the Department of Energy and members of Utah's congressional delegation.

"He's just going to keep a hand on the pulse of things back there and keep us apprised of what we need to be aware of," she said.

Meantime, a Salt Lake City developer has proposed building a housing community in Knolls or Delle, depending upon which area is selected as the final choice.

Crenshaw crafts 1-shot Open lead

SAN FRANCISCO — For golf historian Ben Crenshaw, the U.S. Open figures to be his toughest major tournament to win. If recent history means anything, he has a fine shot at this one.

Having stumbled out of the blocks each of his last three Opens, Crenshaw shot a 3-under-par 67 at Olympia Club Thursday and gained the first-round lead by a stroke.

Crenshaw is perched atop a leader board oozing with promise for a weekend shootout among the stars. For a change, the only Open pretender within three strokes of Crenshaw is lightly regarded pro Jay D. Blake, who calls himself "Just a 60-burn."

Otherwise, nearly everyone close to the lead belongs. Seve Ballesteros, winner of four Majors, and defending champion Ray Floyd are tied for second with the man who

had a chance for victory in the final round of the most recent British Open, Tommy Nakajima.

The group at 69 includes 1985 Masters champion Bernhard Langer and two men (Denis Watson and Nick Price) familiar with major pressure.

At even par are former British Open champion Sandy Lyle, defending PGA titlist Bob Tway and the man of majors, Jack Nicklaus, who has stopped using a putter that looks like an anvil and started making putts.

Never in his career has Nicklaus arrived at a major more down on his game, he said. But he stroked in a bunch of long putts with his old, conventional putter and said: "Hey, something's happening here."

"Going down the 10th fairway," he joked, "I almost felt like I knew what I was doing... If you had said on Tuesday that I'd shoot 70 Thursday I'd have said to make it 72 or 73 and I'd be very happy to move along. I actually topped two 3-woods last week at Westchester (where he missed the cut). One went 50 yards,

the other less than 100."

Floyd called his experience "a dream day." He was determined to enjoy the role of defender, and surprised himself by hitting all but two greens in regulation.

A tight course with slick greens usually frustrates Crenshaw, whose least reliable club is the driver. It did the last three Opens, his first-round scores being 80, 78, 76.

Last year, Crenshaw followed that to finish three 69s and tied for sixth. He is not daring to think of anything so grand this year. Not publicly at least.

"It's almost like you can't prepare yourself for enough patience," he said of the par-70 layout. "There is a relentless succession of (par) 4s... I'm tickled to death."

By his estimate, Crenshaw has frittered away a half-dozen majors. Mostly, he says, because his temper has gotten out of control.

"I'm trying to approach it with a more common-sense nature," he

said. "If I keep the ball in play (the next three rounds), I'll do better. It's that simple."

Crenshaw's round was not so simple as it seemed. He saved par three times and sank 60- and 35-foot putts for two of his five birdies. His only hole over par was the 14th, which he double-bogeyed.

Of the often-erratic Crenshaw and Ballesteros, the former was less wild off the tee. Ballesteros missed the fairway on four of the first five holes, yet remained even par. That was because of his nerves and touch around the green.

Ballesteros saved par from a bunker 50 yards from the pin at the first hole and held par putts of four and 15 feet later. He made two 20-footers and a 10-footer for birds on a stretch of four holes on the back, and was alone on the early leader board standing on the 14th tee.

This was where Crenshaw, a few groups ahead, had met his biggest trouble. The gallery had shouted in

awe as his tee ball bore low and long toward the left side of the fairway. Ben Crenshaw was getting angry, knowing a drastic kick left was about to take place.

Sure enough, his ball bounded off the fairway and into thick rough. It was a heading cut. If not quite balling left, because a gouged 7-iron shot ended in a greenside bunker on the 417-yard hole.

Off an awkward stance, his right foot higher than the ball, Crenshaw popped the ball only to the fringe, perhaps 25 feet from the cup. His chip ended five feet above the hole — and he missed for double bogey.

The swing of three shots, a Ballesteros birdie and Crenshaw's double bogey, left the European master ahead by a stroke among players who teed off by midmorning.

That soon changed, for Ballesteros missed the fairway on the 600-yard 16th hole and made bogey, as he failed — for one time to get on the first green. See OPEN on Page B4

Utah placed on probation; Buck visit may be reason

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The NCAA has imposed a one-year probation on the Utah football program and ordered other sanctions against the Western Athletic Conference school, officials say.

The NCAA penalties, imposed Thursday for recruiting violations, prohibit the university from conducting any football recruiting during the week of Dec. 1-8 and reduce the number of student-athletes allowed for recruiting visits from 95 to 75.

Dave Didion, NCAA assistant enforcement director in Kansas City, said the university was cited for allowing a student-athlete an illegal recruiting visit to the school, then altering documents to delete any reference to the visit.

Another NCAA official said a student-athlete is "allowed" one visit to each school, but did not say more than five schools. Didion said the school, whose name was not named, was visiting his sixth school.

Although the NCAA did not name so Thursday, investigators interviewed recent Brigham Young University graduate Jason Buck

of St. Anthony, who told them he made a visit to Utah when he was not entitled to do so under NCAA rules. Buck, a defensive lineman, was a first-round selection in this spring's NFL draft.

Norcutt, Elsner solidify spots at CNFR

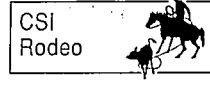

Women alcoholics exceed 2 million

DEAR READERS: According to the newsletter "Update on Human Behavior," published by the Associated Psychotherapists of Colorado, there are more than 2 million female alcoholics, and their numbers are increasing at a faster rate than male alcoholics.

Alcoholism usually starts later in life for women, but progresses much more quickly. Why? Because women have less water in their bodies to dilute it.

Women are more likely to drink alone, to hide their drinking, and to feel guilty and ashamed about it. They suffer more alcohol-related depression, and are more likely to develop other kinds of chemical dependencies — prescription drugs, for example.

Nine out of 10 wives stay with alcoholic husbands, but only one husband in 10 stays with an alcoholic wife.

Most alcoholics know deep down that something is wrong, but the denial that is part of the disease prevents them from seeing that alcohol is the root of their problems.

ARE YOU AN ALCOHOLIC?

If you have experienced three or more of the following, the chances are high that you are an alcoholic, or are becoming one:

1. Absence or tardiness at work due to drinking.
2. Conflict or unhappiness at home due to drinking.
3. Drinking to overcome shyness or to build self-esteem.
4. Requiring increasing amounts of alcohol to "relax" and "unwind."
5. Having regrets about drinking.
6. Suffering financial difficulties because of drinking.
7. Pushing drinks on others; feeling uncomfortable when others don't drink.
8. Lack of concern about your family's welfare when you're drinking.
9. Decreased ambition since the start of drinking.
10. Difficulty in sleeping due to drinking.
11. Drinking in the morning.
12. Poor job performance due to drinking.
13. Drinking alone.
14. Drinking to forget your troubles.

16. Resenting those who want you to stop drinking.

All right, so according to the results of the above test you are an alcoholic. Now what do you do?

For openers, find Alcoholics Anonymous in the telephone directory. Then attend a meeting at one of the chapters near you. There are no dues, and you need not identify yourself unless you want to.

If you need treatment, your local mental health professionals can help you. They are among available community resources for expert, professional treatment. Another excellent source of help is The National Council on Alcoholism, 733 Third Ave., New York, N.Y. 10017.

AND WHEREAS, the following amendments to the City Code are necessary to rectify the abuses:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TWIN FALLS:

Section 1. That Twin Falls City Code Section 9-7-8 (C) be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

"9-7-8. **Illegal Parking:** (C) Unlawful to Park Except in Lot or Space: (1) It shall be unlawful for any person to park or permit to be parked any vehicle in designated public parking lot or space, whether the same space or another space, for a period of time longer than the two (2) hour designated time limit between the hours of 9:30 A.M. and 3:30 P.M., with the exception of the parking lot or space designated herein as a validated parking system in which a validated parking system is in effect for any person to park or permit to be parked any vehicle within the designated parking space except as provided herein.

"9-7-9. **OPERATING HOURS:** Operating hours of off-street parking lots shall be between the hours of 9:30 A.M. and 3:30 P.M. on every day of the week except on New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Armistice Day, Christmas and other special days designated by the City Council.

SECTION 2. That this ordinance shall become effective immediately upon passage and publication.

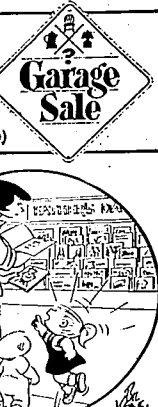

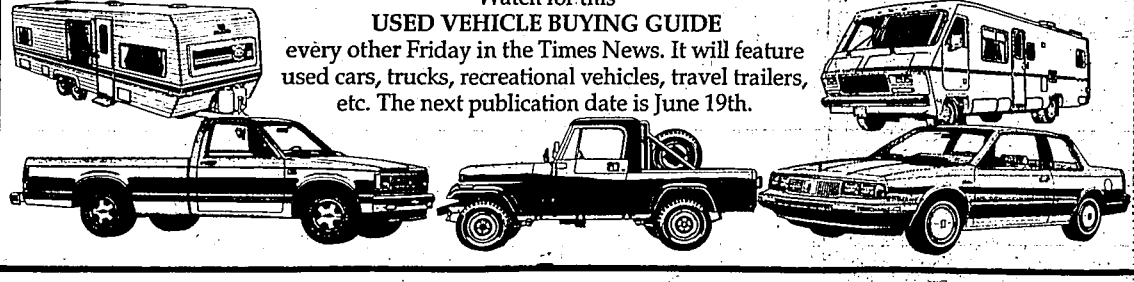

Does the play of today's trump suit strike a familiar chord? If so, look again. The correct play in some situations is a poor play under other circumstances.

South ruffed the second heart and led his low club to dummy's king to lead a trump from dummy. East played low and South played the jack, a play usually correct with this trump holding. West won his king and punched South with another heart, the game falling when East took two more trump tricks.

South's play in trumps would have been correct had he held one more entry to dummy to lead a second trump. With only one entry, the best play of the trump suit becomes a different matter.

If trumps are 2-2, all plays will win; if they are 4-0, all plays will lose. Therefore, the relevant distributions are the 3-1 splits. If West has a singleton high honor, South must play his nine over East's eight; if West has a singleton 10, he must play his honor. Since a singleton ace or king with West is twice as likely as a singleton 10, the odds are 2 to 1 in favor of the winning play of the nine.

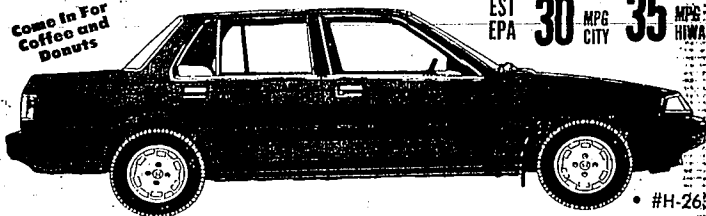

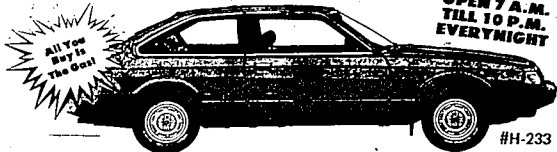

The urge to write:

Young Authors program involves all grade levels in creative writing process

TWIN FALLS — Julie Schwerman was one of 850 people who recently attended the fourth annual Young Authors of Magic Valley competition held at the College of Southern Idaho.

The program, sponsored by the Magic Valley Reading Council, is designed to promote creative writing for children at all grade levels.

354 Magic Valley students participated in the competition sponsored by parents, teachers, business and civic groups.

"Just the opportunity for children to write their stories down I think is wonderful," said Schwerman.

Her daughter, Maren, 8, won first place in the second-grade short story division, for a tale about a pig entitled "A Tale of Horror."

"My teacher said, 'Okay, we're going to write stories and we're going to enter them into the Young Authors contest,'" said the younger Schwerman. "And then she said, 'Now, we're going to write about a pig, but this pig is going to have something weird about it that not all pigs have.'"

"It's fun. I just kind of make up something and then read what I've written to see what else could go with it."

Schwerman was one of 354 entrants from Magic Valley schools who participated in the regional level of the contest. The annual competition is sponsored by parents, teachers, local businesses and civic organizations.

Beverly Taylor, Schwerman's second-grade teacher, said she feels the contest has been a great motivator.

During the year many teachers will save the stories and poems that their students have written.

Then, in the spring, before the Young Authors conference, they go through the student's writing and pick the best samples.

"I let my kids pick the stories they wrote that they felt were good," she said. "We go through them together and rewrite and edit. We do it about twice. They rewrite their stories and then go through them again. Maybe they want to change some thought or do a few corrections."

Sandy Braga, a former teacher and this year's co-chairman of the Young Authors conference, said that after the top five short stories and poems for each grade

have been chosen at a school, the entries are given to a committee of judges who choose the first-, second- and third-place winners for each category and level.

She said all the judging is done blindly.

"A teacher can't grade her grade level, but she can grade another grade level's books," said Braga. "Sometimes the judges are teachers; sometimes they're former teachers. Sometimes they're parents who are not teaching, but have taught either English or elementary school."

Authors of the first-place entries for each school are then invited to participate in the next step of the Magic Valley Young Authors competition.

All the local first-place stories are judged again on a regional level. Medals are given to the first-, second- and third-place winners for best prose and best poem at each grade level.

Honorable mention certificates are awarded to the other participants.

Braga said that the organizers of the conference try to invite a published author to speak to the students each year.

This year's guest speaker was Stephen Cosgrove, author of the Serendipity series of children's books.

"I think they (authors) are a real inspiration to the children to continue writing and continue working," said Braga. "They also help the children realize that it doesn't come easy. They have to be willing to write and then rewrite and work on it and put it away and come back to it."

"The authors encourage the children to save everything, because even though it may not work at that time, there's a time when it can come together. And it's a reward system in that you do your best and you work hard and it's a special treat to get to meet an author."

Margaret Cluff, 18, won the first-place regional prize for the 12th grade in the poetry division.

She said winning the Magic Valley Young Authors competition has made her look at writing in a different light.

"I really never took it very seriously," she said. "I did it because I enjoyed it. But now I want to take some classes in English and poetry and creative writing in college. Before that I never did because I didn't think I was very good."

"When we got to listen to Stephen Cosgrove that inspired me a lot. You know, you have writers — and I read lots and lots of books — but you never really think of them as real people. And then you see one and know that people can write and do write and can make a living off writing. And it's something, you know, that is a serious thing that people can do. But I never took it that seriously before because I didn't think writers were real people."

Teater art show, sale to benefit the handicapped

JACKPOT, Nev. — The second annual Archie B. Teater art show and sale at Cactus Pete's Resort Casino will be held Tuesday through Thursday.

All proceeds from sales will go into the Archie B. Teater Fund for Handicapped Inc.

The show and sale are being held in the mall of the new hotel at the Cactus Pete's casino and there is no admission charge.

Paintings will be shown in small groups, with the selections rotated during the three days to give visitors and interested buyers an opportunity to spend time viewing and selecting purchases without confusion, said Eleanor Lind.

Lind of Boise is a member of the Teater Fund for Handicapped board of trustees which handles the paintings for the handicapped program. She said this year's show will feature a number of Teater's outstanding floral paintings and portraits.

"Few people realize he was an excellent still-life and portrait artist," she said, "but these paintings are favorites of many people who knew the artist."

The mountain scenes, especially of the Tetons and Sawtooths and other landscapes for which the Hagerman Valley artist was best known, will also be included in the Jackpot showing.

Lind said that at the first Jackpot show last year numerous people came in to talk about the artist as much as they came to see his paintings.

"It seems that nearly everyone who attended the show knew Archie and Patricia Teater and each had a story to tell about how they met them or something special they had shared with Teater," Lind said.

She said there was an excellent turnout last year for the show and a number of Magic Valley residents adults.

took advantage of the event to acquire a long-wanted Teater painting. From sales made at shows such as the Jackpot event, 100 percent of the proceeds goes to the handicapped fund, as opposed to sales through art galleries where a percentage must go to the gallery for its handling and marketing. All of the Archie B. Teater Fund for Handicapped board members serve strictly as volunteers and pay their own expenses to assist and conduct shows and sales, Lind explained.

Hayden, publicist for Cactus Pete's and a long-time friend of the artist, will be arranging the Jackpot show and sale.

Sixteen years ago, Teater celebrated his 70th birthday anniversary with an art show in Boise in which all proceeds were given to a handicapped children's camp program. Cecil Andrus, who was governor of Idaho in 1971, was a guest at the event, and a Teater painting still hangs in the governor's office where Andrus again holds the state's top elective position. Lind said a permanent invitation is extended to the governor to visit the Teater shows and gallery displays.

In their wills, the couple left the majority of the Teater Collection to be sold for the benefit of handicapped children.

Lind said Ada County Association for Retarded Citizens is one of several organizations selected by the Teater fund trustees to benefit from the Teater's gift. It is a non-profit corporation working in Idaho to allow mentally retarded individuals to live more productive and meaningful lives. In addition to programs for the mentally handicapped, the corporation works with parents to help in the solution of their problems and to bring them into association with other such parents. The group also supports research and public understanding of the problems and needs of retarded children and adults.

Death Row inmate wins poetry prize

BLACKFOOT (AP) — A former Blackfoot resident has been awarded the "Golden Poet Award" of the World of Poetry organization, based in Sacramento, Calif.

Richard A. Leavitt, 27, won't be able to pick up the award. He's on Death Row in the Idaho State Penitentiary, appealing his first-degree murder conviction and death sentence.

Leavitt's poem, "Plenty of Beauty," was entered in the 1986 National Poetry Contest held in April, by World of Poetry.

The poem, selected for an award from among more than 2,000 entries, is to be published in a book, "The Great American Poetry Anthology."

About 2,000 poets have received the Golden Poet award in the organization's history out of the more than 900,000 members of World of Poetry, according to an organization

spokeswoman.

"The Golden Poet Award is to poets what the Academy Award is to actors," poetry editor Eddie-Lou Cole said. "It is the highest honor World of Poetry is able to bestow upon poets."

Awards are to be presented in Las Vegas during the Third Annual Poetry Convention Aug. 11.

Leavitt was convicted of the stabbing and mutilation murder of Danette Elge in September, 1982, and was sentenced to death in December of that year. His execution date was vacated for various court appeals.

I heard some people talking about the world today; they were saying it was ugly, as they hurried on their way.

I thought to myself, why don't they stop and look around, because there is plenty of beauty

just waiting to be found.

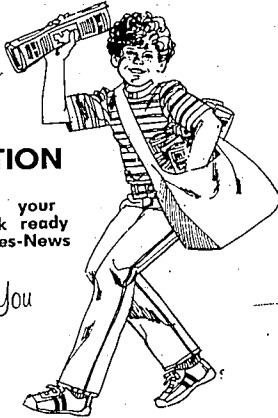

Colorless Eliot Ness dulls De Palma's 'The Untouchables'

HOLLYWOOD — In "The Untouchables," director Brian De Palma serves up a moral dilemma, 1930s style: Can a very, very good man — Eliot Ness — battle a very, very evil one — Al Capone — without sinking to his opponent's level of corruption?

It is a juicy premise with moral shadings that might be expected to intrigue playwright-screenwriter David Mamet ("Glengarry Glen Ross," "The Verdict"). And it is an overripe, operatic period in American corruption that would seem to be a natural for De Palma ("Scarface").

Sure enough, "The Untouchables" has a great look; two big action set-pieces and a pair of performances by old-pro smoothies, Sean Connery and Robert De Niro, might be reward enough for moviegoers tired of the jangling assault of current movies. But those are its pluses.

What one never gets from "The Untouchables" is the sense of cumulative corrosion that must have overcome Ness, whose life was more complex than the film hints at. Mamet does little to characterize men on either side of the law: only the white-suited Frank Nitti (Billy Drago) stands out in Capone's gang, and Ness (the handsome Connery) has been reduced to three: Connery, Andy Garcia and Charles Martin Smith. Chicago cops and accountants who can inexplicably ride horses like John Wayne and shoot like Sgt. York.

It is easy to believe that De Palma's heart is not with his straight-arrow hero (Ness is played by Costner), who has a boring wife, a boring house, an adorably boring child and a private life so stuffily dull you suspect De Palma-Mamet to shy rather than brace yourself for the kicker that never comes (The wife, child and home life are all fleetingly anyway; you might think that if the makers were going to go to the trouble of making up characters, they might have put a little life in them).

From the evidence of his past movies, this hood, dull strait-jacket within which Costner operates does not seem to be his fault. He had a devilish, steal-the-film fair in "Silverado," and he was interesting even when the

movie was not in "American Flyer." As the dead-central character of "The Big Chill," only Costner's cuff links showed and even they were more interesting than Eliot Ness.

It is the moments with Sean Connery as the disillusioned, dryly knowledgeable Irish street cop who will become Ness's profane father-figure, or the even bristlier moments with the elegant, murderous Capone, that seem to get the movie's real juice.

Lumpish again you begin to worry for De Niro's heart while his sizzling and shudding weight, and icily murderous when he needs to be, De Niro's very brief scenes give the movie its rare and very needed feelings of danger, and its sarsaparilla of humor.

Capone's surroundings seem, in memory, to be all marble or gilt or malachite, the trappings of a Roman senator. One can understand how the Chicago press ate up his pronouncements, given so freely and so regally from the steps of the Lexington Hotel. Given the choice between Ness, and his rallying cry of "Let's do some good," and the lurid, quotable corruption that was Capone, one can sense De Palma moving toward the man with the heat.

In telling his fairy tale with real characters, De Palma has touched the truth only occasionally. Yes, Capone was indeed a victim of the tax man. No, Frank Nitti did not meet death with a "veritigo"-like Hitchcock flair. In fact, Nitti *was* a suicide. The shock is how gray and undifferentiated most of these wild men have become.

Ness, a suicide. There is a story with an almost Greek ring to it. It is strange that in this somewhat inspection of moral fiber and what causes it to fray, De Palma could not have made his hero at least as interesting as his villain, and both of them at least as complicated as they were in life.

Reagan, first lady honor artists, patrons

WASHINGTON (AP) — A painter, a singer, two poets, a choreographer, a sculptor and a composer took the spotlight at the White House Thursday as the president and first lady Nancy Reagan honored winners of the National Medal of Arts.

Medals were also presented to four patrons of the arts in a ceremony that followed lunch in the White House East Room. All the winners were present except for Robert Penn Warren, 82, the poet and novelist, who is ill, and philanthropist Armand Hammer, 89, who suffered a broken rib Monday during an accident at his home.

Warren's medal was accepted on his behalf by John Broderick, associate librarian of the Library of Congress, where Warren is consultant in poetry, a position which also carries the title of poet laureate.

The medal for Hammer, chairman

of Occidental Petroleum Corp., was received on his behalf by William McSwaine, president of Occidental International in Washington, a unit of the Los Angeles-based corporation.

Other artists honored were painter Romare Bearden, 72; singer Ella Fitzgerald, 69; poet Howard Nemerov, 67; sculptor Isamu Noguchi, 82; choreographer Abrin Nikolaiev, 76; and composer William Schuman, 76.

The other patrons of the arts were J.W. Fisher, 72, founder of the Gramma Fisher Foundation, which

supports American opera; and Sydney and Frances Lewis of Richmond, Va., who were honored for support of artists and art museums.

Ms. Fitzgerald, who was in a hospital when she received news of the award, was asked what it meant to her.

Looking back on her long career, she said, "I think of the way we used

to ride the buses going to the one-nighters and everything and coming through the years and finding I not only have the fans of my day, but in young ones of today. It means it was all worth it."

Mrs. Reagan, who presented the medals after a brief talk by her husband, said, "Ella Fitzgerald is indeed our first lady of song."

Outspoken Pickles says meaty roles for women difficult to find

"It's a curious business we're in," says Christina Pickles. "You're hot or you're cold; you're nothing or you're something."

Pickles, who was born in Yorkshire, England, but has spent her entire adult life in the United States, is not in an upbeat mood today. The workshop play that she has been doing in New York recently closed, she doesn't have an exciting new play waiting for her back in Los Angeles, and she's sitting in a small conference room at NBC's New York headquarters chatting to a reporter, instead of wandering around outside. Moreover, the writers seem to have run out of things to do with Helen Rosenthal, the strong-minded head nurse she plays on "St. Elsewhere," which airs Wednesdays on NBC.

"My-story line has been extraordinary for a woman in television," Pickles admits. "I've had a mastectomy, a reconstruction, four marriages, five children, a lover, an affair. I've never taken up a great deal of air time, but I've always been part of the show, and I've been nominated for an Emmy three times, so I guess they've given me enough air time."

She's also proud of the quality of the show, which she attributes to "the writing and the writing and the writing. They should write more for women, but..."

And that may be the crux of her problem. "St. Elsewhere" is really not about nurses," she explains. "It's about interns and doctors. And most interns and doctors are men. It's unfortunate, but that's the way it is."

Then, there is television itself. "I love trying and failing," says Pickles, "but you can't really afford to fail in television. You'll get fired. At times in the play I just did I was very, very bad. I was trying things, and I was daring to fail, and I failed in a big way. But ultimately, I was better than I ever would have been if I hadn't failed. You can't afford that luxury in television."

But the discontent she is feeling on this particular day goes beyond doubts about television. "It's hard being an actor, you know. Unless you're hot, which obviously I'm not right now, there's very little excitement generated around you. If you're up for an Emmy or something, people get a little more

interested. But I've been up for so many that no one's interested in that anymore. And St. Elsewhere" is old news."

It's obviously time for the talented actress to make a move. "It's really time to do something else," she says, "but how can you when you're on the same old series and you're the same old character, and they're never going to have the stuff that the men have."

"I'm tired. I'm tired of pushing, and I'm tired of fighting. You're not supposed to say those things. You're

supposed to be all confident and posy many that no one's interested in itive, but I'm not today. It all seems rather foolish to me."

Pickles admits that she might do a complete about-face if she lands an interesting play back in Los Angeles — or if something exciting develops for Nurse Rosenthal.

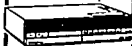

Bittersweet comedy adapted from Updike short story to air on PBS

Can a "freshman odd-couple" survive their first college semester together? That is the question asked in the 90-minute film, "The Roommate," co-starring 1985 Tony Award winner Barry Miller ("Bluxi Blues") and Lance Guest, which will have an encore broadcast on American Playhouse Monday, June 22, at 9 p.m. on PBS.

John Updike's short story "The Christian Roommates" was adapted for "The Roommate" screenplay. Immediately following the film's telecast, American Playhouse will present a 20-minute interview with John Updike. Conducted by China Altman at the author's Massachusetts home, Mr. Updike discusses his methods of writing, his daily approach to his work, and he will read from his early writings.

"The Roommate" is a bittersweet comedy set at Northwestern University in 1952 that focuses on two freshmen roommates with conflicting personalities and philosophies. Orson Ziegler (Lance Guest), the "star" of his small North Dakota town, is a conservative church-goer who was class valedictorian, president of his high school senior class and captain of his school's baseball and basketball teams. Orson is a young man bound for glory.

When Orson arrives at college, every step of his life has been planned: he has selected his future wife, the medical school he'll attend and where he will practice medicine upon

graduation. What he hasn't planned on is a roommate like Henry "Hub" Palamontain (Barry Miller).

Hub's unconventional habits and attitudes challenge all of Orson's beliefs. Hub would rather practice yoga and study the teachings of Mahatma Gandhi than study for his science exams.

The conflicts between these two polar opposites become humorously explosive, creating a semester neither of them will ever forget. The

"The Roommate" has been screened to much critical acclaim at various film festivals, including the U.S. Film Festival in Park City, Utah.

Talk about casting against the grain. Sweet Shaun Cassidy, the boy next door from "The Hardy Boys" and "Breaking Away," makes his "General Hospital" debut in prison, and has a thing about collecting bullets.

That's only the come-on for Shaun's Dusty Walker, a sinister drifter off on a singing tour with Terry Brock (Robyn Bernard).

Cassidy spells trouble this summer on "General Hospital." Dusty Walker is far from a goody-goody—he can sing like a bird, but his heart is cold and black.

Dusty's life on "General Hospital" is destined to be sort and bumpy, since Cassidy has only signed for a summer run. Unless the character takes off and he decides to hang around rather than return to the stage, don't look for him next fall.

The idea of a young star from the recent past enticing vacationing kids came from the show's new boss, Wes Kennedy. Wes talked Cassidy into a summer job and told him to "go for it, take acting chances" with the new character.

Ten years ago, 18-year-old Shaun Cassidy reigned as an overnight wonder with his records and "Hardy Boys" series. It was an explosion of fame, one that robbed Shaun of any semblance of a normal life. Realizing what he was missing, young Cassidy backed off, got married, had three kids, and savored his privacy.

Unlike other teen-age wonders, Shaun took to the books, eager to discover what he'd missed on the concert road. Next, he decided to learn his trade—the acting business.

"I did it in reverse," says Shaun. "My dad (Jack Cassidy) and mom (Shirley Jones) started in the theater. I fell into television, and didn't know anything. I couldn't even handle interviews because I had nothing to say."

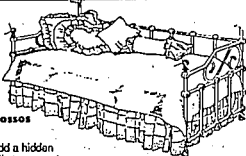

Many actors add directing duties to acting

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Linda Gray and Larry Hagman do it. William Daniels does it. Ted Lange does it. Alan Alda does it. Georg Stanford Brown does it a lot. Probably no other actor does it more than Michael Landon.

They are among the growing number of actors who direct. Many direct only their own shows, but some gain enough experience to seek other assignments.

Many actors would like to direct. Frequently, it takes the clout of having a television series to get the opportunity.

"It wasn't in my contract," said Robert Hays, star of ABC's "Starman." "It was something I told them I'd like to do, and both Columbia and the production company liked the idea that I was interested. They got behind me and it was very helpful."

Hays directed the final episode of "Starman" for the season, which turned out to be the last show of the series. ABC did not renew it.

Michael Landon and Victor French star in NBC's "Highway to Heaven" and share directing duties. French directs every third show and Landon directs the other two. "It's very time-consuming, but it's amazing how easy it becomes when you do something you love and with people you love," French said.

Landon began directing when he played Little Joe on "Bonanza," and he directed many episodes of his series. "Little House on the Prairie," that ran for nine years on NBC.

For Debbie Allen, star and choreographer of "Fame," the NBC series that later went into first-run syndication, it was a natural progression to directing the show. Later, she was given the opportunity

to direct "Family Ties" and "The Bronx Zoo."

Ted Lange, who was Isaac Washington, the bartender on ABC's "The Love Boat," recently directed episodes of CBS' "The New Mike Hammer" and the syndicated "Gidget."

Lange has had wide experience directing stage productions and won the James Cagney Award for directing at the American Film Institute in 1974. After writing several episodes of "The Love Boat," he got to direct his first show in the 1982-1983 season.

Two of the most prolific directors are Georg Stanford Brown, who began as an actor on "The Rookies," and Thomas Carter, who was an actor on "The White Shadow." Brown has directed numerous television shows, including CBS' "Cagney & Lacey," which stars his wife, Tyne Daly.

Carter has directed episodes of CBS' "The White Shadow" and NBC's "St. Elsewhere," "Hill Street Blues" and "Fame." He directed

several pilots, including the 2-hour pilot of NBC's "Miami Vice" and the pilot of NBC's new series, "Beverly Hills Buntz." Last year he directed the NBC miniseries "A Year in the Life" and is currently scheduled to direct a feature film for Zanuck-Brown Productions.

Other stars who have directed episodes of their series include Don Johnson and Edward James Olmos of "Miami Vice," Larry Hagman and Linda Gray of "Dallas," Stacy Keach of "The New Mike Hammer," William Daniels and Eric Laneville of "St. Elsewhere," and Al Waxman of "Cagney & Lacey."

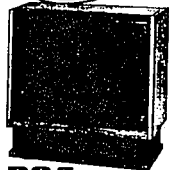

Bernsen struggled before becoming 'Arnie'

NEW YORK (AP) — Corbin Bernsen, the actor who plays sharklike divorce lawyer Arnie Becker on "L.A. Law," struggled for years in New York before going home to Los Angeles to land the standout role on the hit NBC show.

So imagine coming back here with a big part in a major movie, "Hello Again," with top stars Shelley Long and Judith Ivey and noted director Frank Perry.

"That's the best! That's the best!" Bernsen exclaimed, clinching his fists and interrupting for the moment his laid-back status on the sofa. "On the plane back here I was going, 'I'm gonna shove it to this person, and I'm gonna shove it to that person, and I'm gonna tell them what I think.'"

When it came down to it, though, he admitted he couldn't "shove it" to anyone, though he said he was still lying in wait for a couple of unidentified unfortunates who had never even let him in the door, believing rumors he was "cold and calculating."

"Because I'm a lot of things, but I'm not those things," he said, "and those people I can't wait to see."

When not licking his chops over the prospect of meeting up with persons who slighted him in leaner years, Bernsen comes off more as earnest and unassuming than cold and calculating.

Though he had his pick of movie roles, he says he chose a part not too removed from his TV self, because that's what he thinks people expect to see. He describes the movie character, a plastic surgeon, as "to medicine what Becker is to law."

He talks eagerly about his continuing efforts to write — he has a master's degree in play writing from UCLA — and how he likes the writing style on "L.A. Law," which he finds reminiscent of his favorite play, Murray Schisgal's two-character, black comedy, "The Tiger."

"I try to write like that. I'm not great at it, though," Bernsen said.

Dressed casually in T-shirt and blue jeans, he looks younger than he does on television — he is 32 to Becker's late 30s. He may be a TV star, but he's staying in a relatively modest apartment overlooking Central Park, where he runs every morning. His only request was a piano.

He has synthesizers back home and composes by ear.

In his six years in New York, he took acting lessons and did some work on stage. He even built a theater in a loft for his acting school.

He learned carpentry from his mother, Jeanne Cooper, a star on the soap "The Young and the Restless" (she played Becker's mother on an episode of "L.A. Law"), and his godfather, an L.A. builder.

"I live in one of his places out there now, one of his places I helped build," Bernsen said.

"I've always liked it (carpentry). Other than acting, and sometimes writing when the writing happens, it's probably the most satisfying thing in the world."

He was the Winston man in the cigarette ads, then landed a part in the soap opera "Ryan's Hope."
