UFF workers turn down union's bid

TWIN FALLS — The three-month bid of a Washington-based union to represent workers at Universal Frozen Foods ended Thursday in the same way others have — with a lopsided rejection.

By more than 76 percent margin, production and maintenance workers at the Twin Falls frozen potato factory voted against joining Local 280, International Union of Operating Engineers.

The vote was 147 for the union, 463 against. Another 18 votes were challenged and most likely will not be counted by the National Labor Relations Board, the federal agency conducting the election.

UFF executives, who predictably had opposed Local 280's organizing drive, took Thursday's ballot as a vote of confidence from employees, while union organizers accepted the defeat graciously.

Local 280, branch of the 350,000-member IOU, had passed out handbills outside the plant on the city's south side, knocked on doors and conducted a limited advertising campaign in an effort to persuade the plant's 675 eligible workers to form a bargaining unit.

Local 280 general organizing agent for Local 280, described union leaders as disappointed at the outcome. "We came in to help the people," he said. "We hope things will be better for them."

Under NLRB rules, Local 280 still can object to the election. Blades said no decision had been made late Thursday on a challenge.

Located in Richland, Wash., the union represents more than 2,000 employees in food processing plants, some government operations and other businesses involving machinery.

Universal Frozen Foods managers

predictably had opposed the union organizing drive. In meetings, they said and noticed an "outsider" between management and the workers would hurt, not help, employee relations.

After the vote totals were tallied, UFF Personnel Director Gene Hoskins said, "We basically feel like it's a vote of confidence from the employees that we can work our problems out together," he said.

Wages and economic fringe benefits were not major issues in Thursday's election, union officials and workers said. A group of employees last fall had asked Local 280 to organize the plant. They complained of bad treatment by some management, unfair firings, safety problems and other job security issues.

Some of the charges later appeared in an unfair labor practices complaint filed later with the NLRB, but the federal agency said it could not find any convincing evidence for action against UFF.

General Teamsters Local 483 also was approached by employees, said Secretary-Treasurer Roy Corson. The union initially filed to be on the ballot, but later withdrew to avoid dividing union votes.

Thursday's turn-down is the latest in a long history of union rejections at the plant under its two owners — UFF and Idaho Frozen Foods Corp.

Corson, whose Teamsters have tried to organize the plant several times, could commiserate Thursday with the Operating Engineers' agents.

In past elections, large percentages of workers have sought an election, only to reverse field when the time came to mark their ballots, he said.

"The streets of Twin Falls are paved with tears from business agents down there," he said.

Thursday vote at plant was 4th over 22 years

TWIN FALLS — Thursday's election marked the fourth time that labor unions have come calling for employees' votes at the Universal Frozen Foods plant in Twin Falls, federal records show.

The recruiting drives began shortly after Idaho Frozen Foods Corp. opened the potato processing plant in 1965. Until Thursday's balloting, the organizing campaigns were spectacularly unsuccessful. Unions lost by large margins.

General Teamsters Local 483 from Boise made three previous attempts at representing workers in the potato processing factory, according to the National Labor Relations Board, the federal agency which conducts the elections.

Local 483 moved to get on the ballot for Thursday's election, but later withdrew its request, said

Larry McCargar, assistant director for the NLRB's Seattle Region.

Amalgamated Meatcutters and Butcher Workmen of North America, Local 218, from Burley made the first try at organizing the IFF plant in February 1967. It employed a much smaller work force then, with only 264 production, maintenance and trucking employees eligible.

The initial vote was close, with 108 for Local 218 and another 138 against. Eight votes also were recorded for the Teamsters, who intervened and gained a spot on the ballot, according to NLRB records.

But the vote was promptly challenged. After two years of legal proceedings, the NLRB commissioners in Washington, D.C. ordered a new election allowing workers to choose among Meatcutters Local 218, Teamsters Local 483 or no union at all.

Tacoma's olive branch gets wary eye

TWIN FALLS — City of Tacoma officials pledged Thursday to work with state and federal agencies concerned about the environmental impact of a proposed A.J. Wiley hydroelectric dam near Bliss.

But though the olive branch was extended, it was eyed warily by state Department of Fish & Game officials attending a consultation session at the Roadrunner Cafe in Bliss.

"The department views this with a great deal of concern," said Jerry Conley, state director of Fish & Game.

Conley said he didn't want to pre-clude the project but it would be tough for a construction firm to come up with a solution to replace white sturgeon habitat along the reach of the Snake River where the dam would be built. White sturgeon is a state species of "special concern," F&G officials say.

"The department is on record as opposing the project, which would generate about 8 percent of the electrical load for Tacoma, Wash."

"If these scale of developments are done by out-of-state interests then when we testify to deceive will we go into other sites (on the Snake) more damaging or have to buy power out-of-state at higher prices?" Conley asked after the meeting.

Tacoma City Light, the applicant for the project, will hold a series of meetings with state and federal agencies over the summer as required by the Federal Energy

Dam major threat to white sturgeon

TWIN FALLS — The white sturgeon is a fighter that has overcome many threats to its survival over the years.

But the Wiley dam project may be its biggest threat yet, according to the state Department of Fish & Game.

If the Snake River is dammed at Bliss, white sturgeon won't be able to survive, F&G officials say flatly. The project would eliminate the free-flowing water necessary for sturgeon to survive.

Until the state took remedial action in 1970, the white sturgeon population in the Snake River was declining due to overfishing, F&G said. Another threat was the Bliss and Lower Salmon dams. The dams prevented migrating of various white sturgeon populations, thereby reducing the genetic pool, F&G said.

About 1970 white sturgeon started to rebound when F&G re-

quired fishermen to throw them back, says Bob Bell, F&G officer in Jerome.

"It takes them 20 years to get them to spawning size," he says. And in order for the eggs to hatch they have to have free flowing water, F&G says.

"There is a real good population in that stretch of the Snake" between the two dams, says Bell.

The section is also good for rainbow trout fishing, he says. Tacoma City Light, applicant at the Wiley site, says it can make up for the damage to the white sturgeon, other wildlife and habitat. But City Light officials say it is too early to tell how that can be accomplished.

By flooding the canyon and damming it, City Light would not only wipe out free flowing water but eliminate resting spots for water fowl and habitat for quail, F&G says.

"It's one of the unique areas in the state as far as wild and isolated habitat," says Ted Chu, F&G biologist.

alternatives to building the dam, such as buying power from small hydro producers along the river. But he says this alternative is not economical.

This isn't the first time a dam proposal surfaced at the A.J. Wiley site near the Bliss Bridge site.

FEIC turned down Idaho Power Co.'s application in the early 1980s because the company could not demonstrate the need for power, says Larry Taylor, IPC spokesman.

Tacoma officials say they will use information from the IPC project as a base and build data from there.

"We are not trying to Xerox IPC's (idea) and push it through," said Gary E. Johnson, chief planning engineer for City Light.

City Light would like to concentrate its studies on how to make up for environmental damage from the project which will flood part of the canyon, officials said.

"We are very flexible and want an open process. We're sincere about working with you people," said Ron Campbell, an environmental consultant with Beck Construction in Washington State.

But F&G officials say there is no way to make up for damage to sturgeon habitat. "Sturgeon has to have running water to reproduce," said Bob Bell, F&G officer in Jerome.

Following the meeting attended by about 40 state, county and federal officials, everyone went on a tour of proposed sites for the project near the Bliss Bridge.

The location is framed by towering canyon walls capped by volcanic

Unraveling of Iran-Contra affair produced rush of false testimony

WASHINGTON — An assistant attorney general testified Thursday that senior administration officials prepared false testimony to deceive Congress and then lied to Attorney General Edwin Meese III as the Iran-Contra affair was unraveling last November.

Charles Cooper also told the Iran-Contra committees, in a day of dramatic testimony, that President Reagan expressed complete surprise when he was told that some of the profits from arms sales to Iran had been turned over to the rebels fighting the Nicaraguan government.

Cooper himself took the brunt of committee members' criticism of Meese's first investigation into administration involvement in the af-

fair — with suggestions that the probe should have been conducted by experienced investigators and that it might have done significant harm by lifting off Lt. Col. Oliver North and others that records would be sought.

Sen. Warren Rudman, R-N.H., said, "There is other evidence you are unaware of and only the committee is aware of about shredding."

By the time you got to looking at things, there was enough shred to fill up a half of a boxcar. You telegraphed what you were doing to North on Sunday afternoon and North knew exactly what to do when he heard what you had."

Sunday, Nov. 23, when Meese and aides told North they had his memo spelling out the diversion plan. North's secretary, Fawn Hall, has testified that she and North

Pope receives Waldheim

VATICAN CITY — While police kept shouting protesters from approaching the Vatican, Pope John Paul II on Thursday received Kurt Waldheim of Austria at a controversial audience in the quiet of the pope's library.

About 100 people protesting the pope's meeting with a man accused of complicity in Nazi war crimes shouted "Assassin!" and "Shame!" as Waldheim's motorcade crossed cobblestoned St. Peter's Square. One group held up a makeshift gallows.

The square was closed to tourists as part of tight security around the meeting, which ends Waldheim's diplomatic isolation, since he became president of Austria last July.

After the 15-minute private audience, which has been denounced by Jewish leaders in Israel, the United States and elsewhere, Waldheim said he and the pope touched on the controversy over Waldheim's past.

"Yes, I talked with Pope John Paul II this morning about the accusations leveled against me about

what I'm alleged to have done during the war, but in a marginal way," said Waldheim.

"The pope knew from the start the problems that the visit might raise, but he wished it to take place nonetheless," he added. "The fact alone that the pope did receive me in such a cordial way speaks for itself."

Waldheim, accused of helping send Jews and partisans to Nazi death camps while serving in the German army in the Balkans, has denied any wrongdoing.

Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir of Israel said in Jerusalem that the meeting "caused us great anguish," adding: "We might have expected better of the Vatican."

Vatican officials have said the pope agreed to meet Waldheim only after repeated requests from the president. They have pointed out that the pope has spoken out strongly against the Nazis, particularly on his May trip to West Germany.

In his speech during the audience, Waldheim said, "As a representative of a predominantly Catholic

Check hold limits receive approval

WASHINGTON (AP) — House and Senate negotiators voted Thursday to limit the time banks can hold deposits without crediting them to the depositor's account.

Under the agreement, the Federal Reserve Board would be required to develop within regulations within 12 months a plan for the 45 billion over two years, while the Senate provides for \$7.5 billion over two years. The Finance Administration wants a five-year, \$15 billion rescue for local checks and four intervening business days for non-local checks.

The proposal, introduced by Sen. Christopher J. Dodd, D-Conn., is expected to be included in the first regularly scheduled mailing for that account and annual mailings. Require banks to post a notice of their general policy at each branch and provide a brief reminder on deposit slips and at automatic teller machines that check deposits may not be available for immediate withdrawal.

* Require institutions to begin computing interest on funds deposited to an interest-bearing account no later than the date on which the institution receives provisional credit for the deposits.

* Authorize the Federal Reserve to add an additional day to all of the fund availability schedules, per financial institution, if it determines that more than 25 percent of deposited checks are not being credited within the allowed hold period.

viding a pathway for transmitting the power to Tacoma.

Joe Marshall, IPC's vice president of planning and resources, left the door ajar, to some sort of participation with City Light. When IPC needs power in the late 1990s it would like to tap the City Light project for electricity if it is the lowest cost resource IPC can find, he said. IPC would also benefit on construction costs from the tax-exempt bonds City Light could float, Marshall has said.

After IPC was turned down on its own attempt to build the project, City Light received a preliminary permit from FERC to investigate the feasibility of construction.

Morrison-Knudsen is doing a \$1 million engineering study on the project, which will take a couple of years to complete, says Johnson of City Light.

The project is one of 10 new hydro projects City Light is examining to reduce its dependence on Bonneville Power Administration Electricity. City Light buys about half its electricity from BPA, which is facing a cost crunch and higher rates.

With the 10 possible projects City Light is like a poker player trying to determine its best hand, Johnson said.

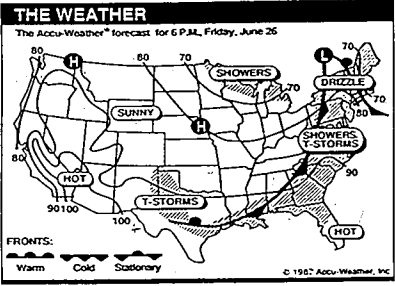
All but two of the projects are in Washington and the other out-of-state project would be on the North Fork of the Payette River in Idaho. The environmental impact of the Payette project wouldn't be as bad, says Conley. There are no surgen in there, he says.

Asked whether state agency opposition is enough to stop Wiley, Conley said FERC in recent years has tended to favor the recommendations of natural resource agencies.

"It will depend a lot on the resource agencies, the politicians in the state (Idaho) and the economics," he says.

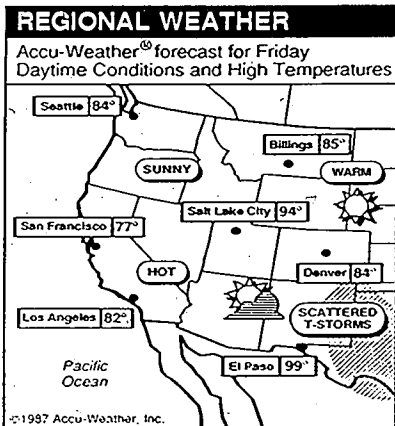
Sunny skies, light winds and warm temperatures were the rule around the state Thursday afternoon.

The vote this time was clear. Exactly two thirds — 185 of 277 voting employees — turned down any union contract.

Local 218 won 53 votes and Local 483 had 59 ballots. The Burley local never returned to the plant.

December 1972, the Teamsters local from Boise took its second crack at representing IFP's workers. Once again, the Teamsters came up short of support. The final count showed 115 voting yes and 212 rejecting representation. Five votes were challenged and not counted.

In the next few years, IFP expanded its work force sharply. By March 1978, when the Teamsters local mounted its third bid, 831 employees were working in production jobs and 115 were in cast ballots.

Despite the larger numbers, the Teamsters did not fare any better. When the vote was counted, 140 workers favored the Teamsters and 113 chose no representation. The NLRB reported. Three votes were challenged and not counted.

The proposed bargaining units generally have remained the same throughout the elections. They generally have been restricted to formal elections.

When Casey delivered his testimony to the Senate Intelligence Committee, the day after the meeting, Meese said something "analogous to 'Oh, damn,'" when he learned, as Cooper said, as laughter erupted in the crowded hearing room, he additionally reported. "Perhaps more strenuous than the president's reaction to the news, as described by Meese who told him on Monday, was 'one of those complete surprises... complete surprise... I think it is.'" Cooper replied quietly.

country, it was to me a special concern, indeed, a heartfelt wish, to pay my first official foreign visit to the head of the Holy Roman church, to which I belong."

Since his election, Waldheim has been isolated because of allegations which he was involved in Nazi atrocities while serving in the German army in the Balkans during World War II.

But Waldheim, whose office is largely ceremonial, said in an interview he did not feel isolated.

"I had never heard already I will be on a visit to Jordan. I have invitations from Asia, Africa, Europe and Latin American," Waldheim said.

The U.S. government has barred his entry into the United States, where he once lived while serving as secretary-general of the United Nations.

McClure looking at running

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Sen. James McClure apparently has a message for fellow Republicans who may be eyeballing his office in 1990.

Forget it.

The 62-year-old McClure, first elected to the Senate in 1972, has hinted that he may not run for re-election in 1990.

But he is holding a political fund-raiser Saturday in Boise in an effort to beef up his campaign war chest to more than \$250,000.

Two staff members say that their boss may be trying to squelch rumors of his retirement in 1990.

"The rumor mill has really been working, and I think he wants to put a stop to this," said Mike Field, McClure's chief of staff in Boise. "He doesn't act like somebody who is about to retire in 1990, and he's not the kind of person who would have a fund-raiser unless he's serious about the future."

"I think it can be assumed that he is going to run agin," said McClure's Washington press aide, H.D. Palmer.

McClure plans a \$50 per plate brunch at Brown's Gallery in Boise from 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, and a rally from 6-8 p.m. at Lake Harbor. The evening event will be \$25 per family and \$10 per person.

Teachers to receive honors

MOSCOW (AP) — High school teachers from Moscow and Fruitland have been named statewide winners in the University of Idaho Alumni Association's Teaching Excellence Award program.

Judy Chavez, English teacher and chair of the Language Arts Department at Moscow High School; and Dwaline Tesoschlehd, vocational agriculture instructor at Fruitland High, are recipients of the annual award.

They were picked from among 41 local winners at high schools statewide, said Mary Kay McFadden, UI associate director of alumni relations.

The teaching excellence award is presented to teachers, administrators or counselors who have made significant contributions in preparing high school students to advance academically in higher education, maintain participation in student activities and continue developing high standards of citizenship.

BPA may raise power rates

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Eastern Idaho power customers could be paying more by this fall if a proposed increase in wholesale electricity rates is approved for the Bonneville Power Administration.

The BPA is seeking an 8 percent to 9.5 percent increase in its wholesale rates to utilities, said Bob Reed, BPA spokesman in Portland, Ore. Approval from BPA administrator Jim Jura is expected by October. Congress will have final say.

If approved, customers of Idaho Falls' municipal electric system could expect rates 6 percent to 7 percent higher, said Steve Harrison of the city's Electric Division.

"This would be about a million-dollar increase in our purchase-power cost for the BPA," he said.

Richard Westerberg, who manages the Rexburg office of Utah Power & Light Co., said UP&L residential customers would pay 2.7 percent more, and irrigation customers under rate option C would pay 6.8 percent more.

Slaying suspect back in state

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — A man charged with the fatal shooting of a Boise man was being returned to Idaho Thursday after being arrested Wednesday in Montana.

Jerry R. Brazzell, 35, Boise, waived extradition Wednesday night at a court hearing in Dillon, Mont., Beaverhead County Sheriff Rick Lester said.

He was being held in the Beaverhead County Jail in Dillon in lieu of \$250,000 bond. Two Ada County sheriff's deputies planned to return him to Idaho on Thursday night, Lester said.

Brazzell is charged with first-degree murder and using a firearm to commit a felony in the shooting Monday of Tony Gail Kille. Kille died of multiple gunshot wounds in a basement apartment southeast of Meridian.

Two others who had been sought, Michael Williams, 24, and Robert Blaine Wald, 23, surrendered Tuesday to Ada County sheriff's deputies.

Outlook for economy better

BOISE (AP) — Despite gloomy news this week about the closure of Tupperware's Jerome plant, Idaho's economy is doing better than last year and will pick up substantially next year, says the chief economist of First Interstate Bancorp.

The Reagan administration is shifting from its tight-fisted policies that curbed inflation to monetary tactics that stimulate the U.S. economy, said Jerry Jordan, senior vice president of the Los Angeles-based bank holding company.

Idaho is "starting to do better, playing catch-up." "By 1988, we have Idaho maturing or somewhat exceeding the national performance," he said.

Jordan said the recovery in Idaho will be broad-based, with virtually all sectors playing a part. Largely because of the decline in the value of the dollar, prices for forest products, metals, phosphate fertilizers and most agricultural commodities are rebounding, he said.

Report critical of Evans campaign aid

BOISE (AP) — The 1986 Senate campaign of former Gov. John Evans was assisted by a pro-Israel group that The Wall Street Journal suggested in Wednesday's editions frustrated campaign finance laws limiting political action committee donations to \$5,000.

The Journal report on the American Israel Public Affairs Committee (AIPAC) began with an anecdote about Evans and quoted him in the second paragraph.

Evans received \$204,950 for his unsuccessful race against Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, from groups that AIPAC "steered" to Evans, according to the front-page article.

Despite the initials in its name, "AIPAC emphasized constantly that they were not a PAC (political action committee)," which gives money to candidates, the Journal quotes Evans as saying. "But they noted that there were Jewish organizations all over the country that had their own PACs and that if we would contact them, they would be able to help us."

The Journal said, "AIPAC did

much better than an ordinary PAC could do for Mr. Evans."

Federal law limits PACs to a maximum contribution of \$5,000 per race. Groups that coordinate their spending are counted as one PAC.

"But AIPAC steered Mr. Evans to a series of supposedly independent organizations — many of them run by people with ties to AIPAC — that gave him \$204,950 for his losing race against Republican Sen. Steve Symms," the Journal said.

Evans, who ended nearly 10 years as Idaho governor in January, now is president of a Burley bank.

He said Wednesday the newspaper missed the mark. "What they really overlook is that early on our campaign we hired a fund-raiser in Washington, D.C., Myrna Frankel, and Myrna had all the contacts with the Jewish political action committees."

"We recognized that Steve Symms' negative voting record against Israel gave us an opportunity," Evans said. "My position was the opposite: that we needed to support Israel."

The Journal cited a computer-aided analysis of 1986 Federal Election Commission reports. The reports show that at least 53 pro-Israel PACs — most of which draw money from Jewish donors and operate under obscure-sounding names — are operated by AIPAC officials or by people who hold seats on AIPAC's two major policy-making bodies.

The study shows 80 pro-Israel PACs spent more than \$6.9 million during the 1986 campaigns, making them the nation's biggest-giving, narrow-issue interest group, the newspaper said.

Three of seven "regional chairpersons" at AIPAC direct PACs, and 26 more PAC chairmen or treasurers sit on AIPAC's 131-member executive committee, which meets four times a year and sets overall lobbying strategy. Twenty-two more PAC leaders hold seats on a second, advisory body, the 200-member national council, the newspaper said.

While the pro-Israel PACs represent diverse and supposedly bipartisan Jewish communities in almost

every major city and region in the country, their spending patterns are remarkably similar, according to the Journal.

The paper said that of \$3.9 million given directly to candidates, the pro-Israel PACs focused their power on three Senate races, spending \$642,000 on Democrats in South Dakota, Idaho and California. In these races, only one \$5,000 donation went to a Republican.

Evans said Wednesday the pattern is a coincidence.

"They certainly are like-minded," he said. "They are very active in their own communities. I early on recognized there was a definite dividing line between the two groups. Their overlapping membership is not a violation of the legal spending limits."

The Journal said AIPAC leaders, including Executive Director Thomas A. Dine, refused repeated requests for interviews on the group's relationship with the pro-Israel PACs.

Hansen suit says rights violated

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP) — Former Idaho congressman George V. Hansen has filed a suit charging that the government violated his civil rights when he was arrested in Omaha on April 15.

Hansen was arrested on charges of violating parole conditions that required him to remain in the state of Virginia, federal officials said. He has since been returned to prison to serve the remainder of a term for violation of ethics laws while a member of the House of Representatives.

Hansen, in a lawsuit filed Wednesday in U.S. District Court in Alexandria, said he has requested a modification of parole conditions to allow him to travel and give lectures as a political consultant. It was on a lecture trip that he was arrested, he said.

A hearing on his request for freedom to travel outside Virginia was scheduled for April 21, six days after he was arrested in Omaha, court papers indicate.

Hansen's lawsuit named Attorney General Edwin Meese and other government officials, saying he was arrested without a warrant and his civil rights were violated. It did not specify damages, asking that an award of real and punitive costs be made at trial.

Hansen's suit charged that, in arresting him, government agents violated his Fourth Amendment rights against illegal search and seizure; Fifth Amendment protection against imprisonment without due process of law and right to equal protection under the law, and First Amendment rights to free speech and public trial.

He also charged that the action was designed to inflict emotional distress and resulted in false imprisonment.

Hansen, 56, a Republican, served six months of a 5-to-15-month sentence for failure to disclose \$234,000 in loans, including some from Texas billionaire Nelson Bunker Hunt, plus profits from the sale of silver contracts and other transactions. He was the first congressman to be prosecuted under the 1976 Ethics in Government Act. He was released on parole Dec. 19.

2-year sign-up legal July 1

BOISE (AP) — Starting next Wednesday, Idaho residents who don't want to go through the bother of registering their motor vehicles every year can do it two years at a time.

The Transportation Department said a new state law allows owners to register passenger cars or pickups for two years.

Douglas Kraemer, chief of the Motor Vehicle Bureau, said vehicle owners can register for one year or two, but nothing in between. The two-year registration fee is twice the yearly fee but owners can save on administrative costs.

Kraemer said two-year registrations can be transferred from one vehicle to another but the fees will not be refunded.

Both sides are bums in budget showdown

The approval this week by the U.S. Senate of a \$1 trillion budget has set up a showdown with the White House, but we suspect most people already have decided that, as they say at Dodgers and Mets games, both sides are bums.

Congress is not exactly blameless in this mess, having for years relentlessly funded virtually every program for which an identifiable constituency or special interest group has spoken.

And so has the White House, although this administration has focused its attention mostly on military funding at the expense of domestic issues.

Both sides want to spend more than the government takes in. Congress prefers a plan which would hold defense spending to a smaller amount than the administration's request, but still more than last year.

The hook is that, if the administration wants more defense money, it would have to raise taxes. That is something President Reagan has said will never come to pass in his administration.

Neither side seems willing to give much. Reagan, pressing to put a final stamp on his presidency, is trying to assure a huge defense structure.

Congress, which has moved solidly into Democratic hands, is trying to position itself for the coming elections. That means spreading the money around. They don't much want a tax increase either, but asking for one at this point is relatively painless, as it is highly unlikely.

Looking back on this period of American history, future commentators may well identify the 1980s—as "The Great Gridlock" era of national policy, a time in which Congress and the White House went through years of effective stalemate.

The annual budget battles reflect that unresolved contest, and the tug-of-war which is shaping up this summer seems likely only to deepen the conflict.

Attention to academy leaves officers highly embarrassed

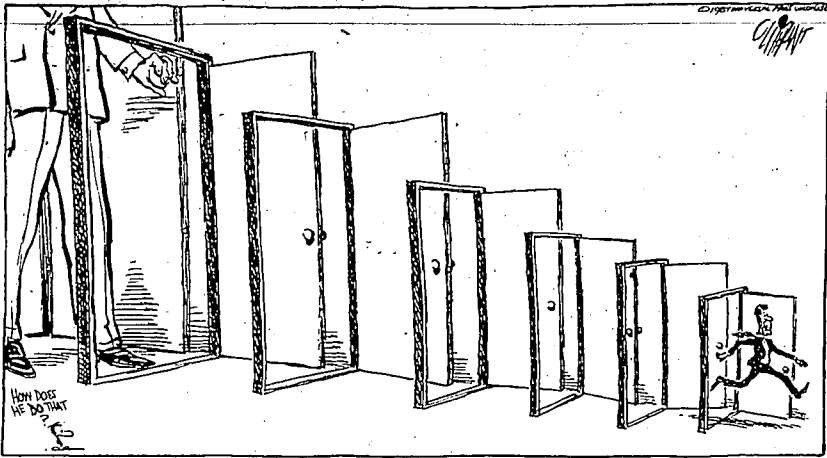
WASHINGTON — The National Academy of Sciences got more attention for its membership election this past April than it ever gets for the scientific studies it helps the government pursue.
Alas, it was a burst of attention that has the officers of the academy stiff-necked with embarrassment. In full council, the academy membership voted to reject the nomination to its ranks of Harvard political scientist Samuel P. Huntington — on the grounds that, no matter how prestigious the political scientist was among his own colleagues, he was not "scientist" enough to receive this honor.
It sounds at first like a minor quibble among academicians, and a linguistic quibble at that. Huntington practices something which it has been common usage to refer to as "political science" since early in this century. The National Academy has reserved a section for honoring "social and behavioral scientists" since 1971. Huntington's colleagues, who have nominated him to the academy two years in a row, think he practices political science pretty darned well.
But a cadre of the "hard" scientists in the academy insisted otherwise, and their condemnation of Huntington's "pseudoscience" was taken, correctly, as an attack on the profession as a whole on the man. It was this that elevated the matter to national level, despite its flimsy aspects, from an interneet squabble to a revealing commentary on what the "scientific" outlook, long triumphantly ascendant, can do to the rest of our intellectual life.
The 1971 decision that psychologists, anthropologists, sociologists, economists and

the like were eligible for honor as "scientists" was academically but unambiguous. The same year saw a mighty flap at Princeton's Institute for Advanced Study, where several mathematicians fought tooth and nail to prevent the appointment of the institute's first non-mathematician. Plenty of "hard" scientists — especially mathematicians — still resent the presence of softies. And, of course, a fair portion of the general public also feels skeptical about the sweeping claims made by these new bearers of the scientist mantle, who apply arcane-seeming notions to subjects — such as human behavior and international relations — that have historically been discussed in words, not numbers.
The Huntington snub pleased quite a few people who tell jokes like "What does an economist do when he finds himself stranded on a desert island with only one object, a sealed can of baked beans?" He assumes a can opener." The buzzword "pseudoscience" evokes all those flagrant sillinesses and illusive pretensions that social-science trappings have added to the public discourse. On the other side of the coin, there are howlers like the article in the American Political Science Review (first flagged by Steven Waldman in the Washington Monthly) which "proved" that "the average (Italian) government falls when it has accumulated exactly one unit of political stress." Less egregious but more inescapable, clogging

the communal psyche, are all the three-decimal-point poll data on the national mood. Not to mention Nielsen ratings.
But the National Academy's vote didn't strike a brave blow against meaningless numerical obfuscation. On the contrary, scientists' rejection of an essentially traditional analysis was a very significant statement, and there — Huntington — constitutes a stirring call for more of it.
To understand why, one has to speculate why such stuff has currency in the first place. The answer is not very different from the one given by scientists, but just the opposite: their moral authority. Social scientists have gradually internalized the criticisms that scientists make of their work. Models and formulae seem more reliable than mere accounts. An inquiry can be considered serious and valid — "rigorous" is the term of choice — unless it is fuzzed out with numbers.
Most people trace this self-hatred by humankind to the post-Sputnik science boom, when science and technology took precedence over humanities and classics in the curriculum for the first time in the Middle Ages. The danger in it is the point of the can-opener: inquiry made specifically by numbers tend to ignore or shortchange those realities that, though not expressible in equation form, may be quite important in understanding the situation.
Consider the indictment against Huntington. The substantive part of the debate focused on some "equations" which the "mathematicians attacked as bad math but which Huntington insisted were genuine, intended as real equations at all. He said they were supposed to be shorthand ways of

describing theory, showing that certain social forces were directly or else inversely related. A fair debate, perhaps. But other criticisms suggested that the mathematicians were taking Huntington a bit too, well, literally.
Serge Lang of Yale, the main anti-Huntington voice, took exception to an article in which Huntington described his own previous book "The Soldier and the State" as an "unabashed defense of the professional military class." "A scientist," Lang noted, "is never attributed to the academy members before the election, 'does not give an unabashed defense' of the object of his study." He also quoted a 1968 article by Huntington in Foreign Affairs: "The realities of the situation in Viet Nam will not please the extremists on either side." Lang: "Huntington's description of how his analysis would be received by 'extremists on either side' is also an opinion, for which I know of no basis in fact." A Washington mathematician turned policy analyst calls this kind of thinking "mathematical McCarthyism."
One might reasonably ask: So what? If social scientists are happily working away on the problems they find interesting, why should they care about the outside honor conferred by a bunch of scientists? The answer is peer pressure. Scholars of Huntington's stature, secure in a Harvard chair, will continue their research. Huntington has been badly harmed. But younger social-science scholars, notoriously frantic and paranoid in their quest for tenure, already inhabit departments torn between "qualitativist" and "quantitativist" inc-

tions. Many will see this public disdain of the non-numerical as just one more hint.
Some scholars don't need persuading. Steven Weber, a professor at New York University, is considered a shining example of the up-to-date, technically sophisticated, space-age political scientist; an official of the American Political Science Association offers his name as an example of "someone who uses numbers properly, whose science isn't at all pseudo." Brams applies principles from an advanced branch of mathematics called game theory to the intricacies of political choice and decision-making, such as arms control. He says mathematicians never give him any trouble about his use of math. ("In fact," my trustee, "I find Wiley I prefer lecturing to mathematicians.") He is full of enthusiasm for the "strength" and "rigor" of mathematical-political-science models, and guesses that older scholars in the field, who object to his methods, are "obstinate" because "we're using tools they can't have."
Asked whether there are any fields of inquiry that would not benefit from a dose of this rigor, that do not lend themselves to analysis by the numbers, he answers in all seriousness, "I don't think you could show that, no." "No field at all, on any question?"
"No," says Brams, "I don't think I could work up an impossibility theorem on it. A few more years of this, and we may all be assuming can openers."

Campaigning for money, not for votes

When most Americans think of political campaigns they picture cheering crowds listening to a candidate's speech, intellectual debates about issues, and high-minded discussions of strategy. But the experience that I had as a candidate for the U.S. Senate in 1986 was far different.
I remember waking up at 5:30 a.m. in Goldendale, Wash., to begin another day of "dialing for dollars" — making phone calls not to potential constituents but to political action committees asking for thousands of dollars. During 1986 I began most of my days this way.
I remember a weekend strategy meeting on Orcas Island (off the coast of Washington) in early August at which, instead of talking issues, we discussed the fact that we did not have the money to make even a modest television purchase for the coming primary. I remember meetings that should have been devoted to discussing the trade deficit but, instead, were spent discussing the campaign deficit.
I remember calling old friends and former staff members who were now successful lawyers and lobbyists. They took my calls and tried to help, but time and time again they said, "Brook, you cannot win unless you raise more money." Why couldn't I raise more money? Because I was not a credible candidate. Why was I not a credible candidate? Because I had not raised enough money. The ability to raise money, rather than a willingness to raise new ideas, has become the centerpiece of campaigns.
As a former congressman and with 35 years in public life, I was not a stranger to the people who traditionally support candidates of my ideology and interests. Yet I found that potential contributors, particularly PACs, were not interested in what I would do as a senator; they were concerned about how I would do as a

candidate.
I never imagined how much of my personal time — at least 50 percent — would be spent on fund-raising. Most of the time I was not talking to constituents about contributions; I was talking to professionals who control PACs and lobbyists who were far removed from the voters of Washington state. I was campaigning for money, not campaigning for votes.
After six months of campaigning I came to the conclusion that my campaign for the Senate, my lifelong dream, was going nowhere. My candidacy had not been measured by the number of voters I met or the issues they raised. My credibility was not determined by my response to dairy farmers losing their herds or to students who could not obtain college loans.
The bottom line was: The folks in Washington, D.C., who controlled the money had not been persuaded that I could win. It was not a question of how many doorbells had been rung or how many requests I had for yard signs. No one asked how many of the 39 counties I had campaigned in. The first and last question was: How much money have you raised? At the same time, my friends were asking: Why don't we ever hear anything about your race?
Suddenly it occurred to me that we were expected to run campaigns in both Washingtons. I had thought that my contacts in the nation's capital would be thrilled to learn that I was in the state, working 12 hours a day, seven days a week. However, we were forced to use limited resources and staff time to change the percep-

tion in Washington, D.C. — the perception that I could not win.
Well, I did win. But I wish that I had been able to win by debating the issues with my opponent rather than debating my prospects with political bankers.
Campaign finance reform is not just an attempt to make our lives as politicians easier. It is designed to make our politics better. I do not believe that any U.S. senator would "sell" a vote for a campaign contribution. However, as the amount of money we raise increases, so does the perception that all those folks are getting something for the millions that they contribute to a campaign.
Beyond the illusion of "vote selling" is the reality that Congress is not making the tough decisions that it should make. Too often we seek the easy answer, the compromise that will offend the least number of contributors. We hate to offend because we know, particularly as incumbents, that a PAC or a large donor will not oppose us unless we have voted consistently against their interests. We know that incumbents can collect money from all sides of an issue if only they hedge. I believe that the current campaign finance reform measure sponsored by Senate Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., and Sen. David Boren, D-Okla., is an important step toward the reform of a system gone amok.
To those who say that public financing is an "undesired rake on the taxpayers' pockets," I would suggest that public funding is the only way you can create incentives to make candidates accept campaign spending limits.
Sen. Brock Adams, D-Wash., was elected to the U.S. Senate last year.

Democrats draft resolution saying reflagging unneeded

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress' Democratic leaders drafted a resolution Thursday that called President Reagan's plan to protect Kuwait oil tankers in the Persian Gulf unnecessary but stopped short of asking Reagan to abandon the policy.

Meanwhile, Republicans blocked a vote in the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on three measures offered in an attempt to find a consensus on the issue. Kuwait tankers are a key means of transporting oil to the West and Japan.

One would reverse Reagan's decision to place the Kuwaiti ships under the American flag and protect them with U.S. naval power. Another would trigger the 1973 War Powers Act that limits a president's ability to commit forces to situations of imminent danger. A third would extend U.S. protection only to American-owned ships in the gulf. The stalemate underscored congressional indecisiveness on the issue.

Rep. Jim Courter, R-N.J., who supports Reagan's move, said, "We in the Congress prefer to vote 'maybe' on controversial issues." The Democratic resolution was drafted at a closed, morning meeting of Democratic leaders from the House and Senate and later considered by the House Foreign Affairs

Committee. The resolution says Reagan's "planned reflagging of 11 Kuwaiti tankers is unnecessary for the protection of United States interests in the Persian Gulf" but also concludes that "neither proceeding with reflagging nor withdrawing the proposal advances United States interests."

Even that measure couldn't be voted on by the Foreign Affairs Committee because Rep. Danie Fassel, D-Fla., the chairman, told his colleagues that more work was needed to write a measure that all could support.

Many in Congress fear that Reagan's program would draw the United States into the 6½-year-old Iran-Iraq war because Kuwait has provided aid and facilities for Iraq.

House Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas, said the Democrats were seeking a broad-based measure that Republicans could support. He said congressional leaders would ask to meet with the president next week to discuss the issue.

The caucus of House Democrats later met behind closed doors to discuss the Persian Gulf issue, but took no action.

"We had a good discussion about our concerns about the high risk factors of reflagging," said Rep. Mike Lowry, D-Wash. He said no decision

was made because Democrats are still seeking a consensus. "The last thing we're trying to do is be confrontational," he said.

Sen. Claiborne Pell, D-R.I., chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and author of the bill halting the reflagging plan, said after Republican objections blocked action in his panel that he would try to bring the measure to the Senate floor.

Pell said the reflagging should be halted because it "involves a high risk of a U.S.-Iranian clash while making only a marginal contribution to the protection of U.S. interests in the Persian Gulf."

Since the reflagging effort could begin as early as next week, Democratic leaders have generally conceded that no move to block the Reagan plan is likely to succeed.

"We're not going to get anything through in time to have an effect on reflagging," said Sen. Terry Sanford, D-N.C.

Sen. Brock Adams, D-Wash., criticized reflagging as "a very bad decision" but said Congress should respond by invoking the War Powers Act. The law says a U.S. commitment of forces could not extend beyond 60 days unless Congress approves it.

Americans' life span reaches 75 years

NEW YORK (AP) — American life expectancy has reached a record 75 years, according to insurance company figures released Thursday.

The gain came after two years in which average life expectancy had remained steady at 74.7 years.

Preliminary calculations showed that a girl born in 1986 figured to live to age 78½ and a boy to 71½, Metropolitan Life said.

The expected lifespan was even greater for those who were older. Women who reached age 65 last year had an average of 18.9 more years to live and men 14.7 years.

Longer life was achieved "despite increases in mortality from influenza, AIDS and cancer," said

Stanley Kranczer, Metropolitan Life statistician.

Kranczer said AIDS could come to have an adverse effect on national life-expectancy figures because it hits people who might otherwise have lived many years more. Influenza, on the other hand, ravages the older.

Infant mortality fell to an estimated record low of 13.4 deaths per 1,000 live births in 1986, Kranczer said. It was the 24th consecutive year of decline in the infant death rate.

Fatal cardiovascular disease, although declining the past 18 years, continued to be the leading cause of death. Death from cancer increased in 1986.

Libyan jets eye U.S. vessel

WASHINGTON (AP) — Libyan jet fighters, in the first such overt military move since the U.S. bombing raids last year, twice last week flew so near a Navy cruiser in the Mediterranean Sea that the ship's crew manned battle stations, Pentagon sources said Thursday.

The Pentagon, in a statement in response to a reporter's query, confirmed that the Soviet-made MiG-23 "Flogger" fighter jets approached the nuclear-powered USS South Carolina twice on June 17.

Pentagon sources, who spoke on condition they not be identified, said the flights had sent the crew of the heavy cruiser to battle stations both times.

The cruiser was steaming with two other smaller Navy ships in the central Mediterranean, approximately 100 miles from the Libyan

coastline and above Libya's so-called "Line of Death," at a time when no U.S. aircraft carrier was in the region.

Two Libyan jets first approached the cruiser around 4 p.m., and this time flying within seven miles of the ship, the Pentagon said. A second flight by another pair of MiG's occurred around 4 p.m., and this time the fighters flew over the ship at an altitude of approximately 6,000 feet, the Pentagon said.

In both instances, the fighters had been monitored by the cruiser almost from the moment they flew northward from Libya over the Mediterranean, but the aircraft "did not demonstrate hostile intent," the Pentagon said.

A Pentagon official, who asked not to be named, elaborated by saying the MiG's did not activate any radar

for their weaponry and never maneuvered into a position to fire missiles.

The South Carolina "look every precaution" as the planes approached and was prepared to open fire at a moment's notice, but the Libyans withdrew without making any threatening moves, the sources said.

The Pentagon declined to confirm the flights had forced the South Carolina to battle stations, saying only that the ship "was ready for any eventuality had the MiG 23's demonstrated hostile intent."

"We assume they just wanted to take a look-see," said one official, noting the Navy had filed a "Notice to Mariners" indicating that U.S. ships would be conducting an exercise in the area.

AMA backs abuse tests in few cases

CHICAGO (AP) — Employees should be tested for drug and alcohol abuse only in cases where there is reasonable suspicion of impaired job performance, the American Medical Association said Thursday.

Such tests should become a condition of employment only in cases where the prospective employee's job would affect the health and safety of others, the AMA said at the close of its annual five-day meeting.

The AMA's policymaking body, the 406-member House of Delegates, adopted the stance by voting to accept the recommendations of its Council on Scientific Affairs.

The recommendations were adopted by voice vote without debate and with no apparent dissent.

Using tests to monitor possible drug and alcohol abuse among employees is also acceptable as part of a program to treat and rehabilitate those with substance abuse problems, the recommendations also said.

Bakkers in hiding at resort

GATLINBURG, Tenn. (AP) — Jim and Tammy Faye Bakker went into hiding in this Smoky Mountain resort town Thursday, and some residents expressed irritation at the stream of tourists waiting to catch a glimpse of the exiled evangelists.

"I don't know if they're at a motel or at someone's house. All I know is they are here," said Ben Humphries, assistant director of the Chamber of Commerce.

He said an associate of his spoke with the Bakkers after their arrival late Wednesday or early Thursday. He would not identify the associate by name.

The Bakkers were spotted eating lunch Wednesday in Hendersonville, N.C., en route from the Tega Cay, S.C., home.

Their attorneys said the couple plans to rest here for a few days before returning to South Carolina to pack up their belongings and move to this Great Smoky Mountains resort of 3,400 year-round residents.

Ex-official draws jail term

NEW YORK (AP) — Former U.S. Treasury Secretary Robert Anderson was sentenced Thursday a month in prison and five months of house arrest for evading taxes and illegally operating an unregistered offshore bank.

Anderson, 77, also was sentenced by U.S. District Judge Edmund Palmieri to five years' probation and ordered to try to repay investors in the failed bank.

"Your record of distinguished service is now sullied by the allegations in the information to which you have pleaded guilty," Palmieri told Anderson.

Anderson, who pleaded guilty to the charges March 26, rose before he was sentenced and apologized for his crimes.

Anderson was treasury secretary in the Eisenhower administration from 1957 to 1961, after serving as secretary of the Navy and deputy defense secretary. He advised subsequent presidents while working as an international banker.

Senate works on trade bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate began work on a mammoth trade bill Thursday, approving measures that signaled displeasure with an alleged freezeout of U.S. contractors seeking work at Japan's new Kansai Airport and subsidies provided by European governments to the Airbus Industrie aircraft maker.

Working late after a day of speechmaking, the Senate approved on a voice vote a measure that would prompt the administration to investigate alleged bias against U.S. contractors seeking overseas work.

The Senate next approved on a voice vote a measure to reshape the method in which subsidies for foreign manufacturing consortiums are calculated for the purpose of imposing tariffs.

Earlier, one possible roadblock to approval of the Senate's trade bill was removed when lawmakers announced that they had reached an agreement to keep legislation to aid the textile industry off the measure.

Clinic head to lead panel

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dr. W. Eugene Mayberry, the head of Mayo Clinic who acknowledges "I'm no AIDS expert," was named Thursday by President Reagan as head of a blue-ribbon commission charged with trying to help prevent the spread of the deadly epidemic and discover a cure.

Ten other commission members will be named later, and there was a strong indication the White House would ignore the demands of gay organizations to have a representative on the panel.

"I would be very surprised if an administration opposed to making appointments on the basis of race or sex would agree to make an appointment based on bedroom habits," said Gary Bauer, the president's assistant for policy development.

He said Mayberry, 57, was selected for his "unimpeachable medical credentials" and the favorable reputation of the Mayo Clinic.

Dole blasts Bonn's decision

WASHINGTON (AP) — West Germany's decision not to extradite accused terrorist Mohammed Ali Hamadi to the United States is a "tragic mistake," Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole said Thursday.

The Kansas Republican said the decision "makes me angry. It makes me sad. And I might say, doubly sad, recalling the conversation I had last week with the family of Robert Stethem."

Stethem was the Navy diver slain by terrorists during the June 1985 hijacking of a TWA jetliner. Hamadi, a 23-year-old Lebanese Shiite Muslim, has been indicted in the United States on charges of air piracy and murder arising from the hijacking.

West Germany earlier rejected President Reagan's request to extradite Hamadi to the United States.

He termed the Hamadi case a test of how well nations can cooperate in the fight against terrorism.

Court upholds governmental immunity

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court, in a case that dissenting justices said evokes memories of Nazi atrocities, on Thursday barred a former soldier given LSD without his knowledge from suing the federal government and its agents.

By a 5-4 vote, the court said the broad immunity from lawsuits enjoyed by the military leaves the soldier — who said his life nearly was ruined by the secret chemical warfare tests — without legal recourse.

Approximately 1,000 members of the armed forces took part unwittingly in the tests during the 1950s.

In other decisions as it neared the end of its 1986-87 session, the court:

- Gave military officials broad new power to prosecute members of the armed forces for crimes unrelated to military duty.
- Upheld the 6-3 ruling approving the court-martial of a Coast Guardsman sentenced to a year in prison for sexually assaulting two young girls in Alaska.
- Ruled, 5-4, that the U.S. Olympic Committee has the legal authority

to bar a homosexual rights group in San Francisco from sponsoring an athletic competition called the Gay Olympics.

- Gave federal law enforcement officers new protection from lawsuits when they conduct searches of homes without a court warrant.

- The 8-1 ruling in a Minnesota case said FBI and other federal agents may not be sued for conducting unlawful searches if they believed they were not violating anyone's rights.

- Provided a victory for women seeking financial support from men they say fathered their children, ruling that proof of fatherhood need not be "clear and convincing."

- The 8-1 decision, in a case from Pennsylvania, upheld a liberal evidence standard used by most states.

- Upheld the way eligibility for benefits has been calculated since 1984 under the federal Aid to Families with Dependent Children program.

- The 6-3 ruling in a North Carolina case, depriving some children of eligibility for benefits, supports a change in AFDC that has saved the government some \$455 million.

- In the LSD case, Justice Anthony Scalia said for the court that permitting the lawsuit, "would disrupt the military regime."

- He was joined by Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist and Justices Harry A. Blackmun, Lewis F. Powell and Byron R. White.

- In a bitter dissent, Justice William J. Brennan said the government's conduct reminded him of Nazi doctors who treated humans like laboratory animals in conducting medical experiments.

- As the Nuremberg war crimes trials determined, Brennan said, "Experimentation with unknown human subjects is morally and legally unacceptable."

- He added, "Serious violations of the constitutional rights of soldiers must be exposed and punished. Soldiers ought not to be asked to defend a Constitution indifferent to their essential human dignity."

- Brennan was joined by Justices Thurgood Marshall and John Paul Stevens.

- Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, in a separate opinion, said, "Conduct of the type alleged in this case is so far beyond the bounds of human decency that as a matter of law it simply cannot be considered a part of the military mission."

- The case involved former Master Sergeant James B. Stanley, 51, who volunteered in February 1954 to take part in a program at the Army's Aberdeen Proving Grounds.

Syrian units prepare for Beirut raids

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Syrian troops restricted access to the city's Shiite Muslim slums Thursday and prepared to raid militant strongholds because kidnappers have not freed American journalist Charles Glass.

Sources close to the Syrian command said its 7,500 soldiers in Beirut's Muslim sector were ordered to prevent suspected Shiite militants from leaving the south Beirut slums where many of the 25 foreigners missing in Lebanon are believed held.

Fourteen gunmen seized Glass; All Ousseiran, son of Lebanon's defense minister, and Ousseiran's driver June 17 while they drove through Ouzal, a south Beirut stronghold of the radical Iranian-backed group Hezbollah.

Syria demanded they be freed and

the two Lebanese were released Wednesday, but Glass remained in captivity.

The case has embarrassed President Hafez Assad of Syria, who is Lebanon's main power broker and sent in the soldiers Feb. 22 to end fighting among Muslim militias in west Beirut.

The sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said Syria appeared to be preparing for a virtual blockade of Iranian-supported Shiite factions in Beirut.

"Even their religious and cultural offices are going to be closed down throughout west Beirut," one said. "Troops are poised to begin the raids." No word was available on when the Syrians might act, but nothing is likely to happen until Brig. Gen. Ghazi Kenaan, commander of the troops in Beirut,

returns from Damascus. He was in the Syrian capital with senior aides Thursday for consultations.

Ousseiran, 40, refused to answer questions from reporters Thursday about the whereabouts of his American friend, a former ABC television correspondent who was in Lebanon working on a book about the Middle East.

"We say what we can say," he told reporters at the home in the seaside town of Rmeileh south of Beirut.

His father, Adel Ousseiran, told reporters after All's release Wednesday: "Charles Glass is still alive." He heads a prominent clan of conservative Shiites.

All Ousseiran's driver, Suleiman Salmaan, was quoted in an interview published Thursday as saying Glass, 35, was separated from the the other

two and they were blindfolded throughout their week in captivity.

Salmaan, 27, commented to the leftist Beirut leftist newspaper As-Safir.

"I was hearing and distinguishing that All was next to me," he said. "I heard Glass for one day and then I did not hear him speaking any more. Glass stayed with us for one day only, then he was taken away."

Salmaan said he and Ousseiran were not moved or questioned.

On the day of the release, "we were taken blindfolded into a car and driven for about an hour before we were taken out. We were told to count to 100 and then remove the blindfolds," he said.

"We did that and found ourselves on a dirt road near the southern entrance to Sidon." The ancient port city is 25 miles south of Beirut.

Cardinal escapes attack

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Unknown assailants hurled a grenade at the walled home of Cardinal Jaime L. Sin on Thursday, a day after the archbishop of Manila spoke out against urban violence. Sin was not hurt and slightly injured.

Patrolman Benito Angeles said the grenade exploded about 6 p.m. at the cardinal's residence in suburban Mandaluyong. He said the attackers fled in a white car.

Sin, the leading Roman Catholic prelate in the Philippines, was in his bedroom at the time, said his spokesman, Felix Bautista.

Bautista said the cardinal had no immediate comment. A spokesman at Malacanang Palace said President Corason Aquino had been told of the attack, but also had no comment.

Gorbachev calls for party to revive economy

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev urged the Communist Party on Thursday to revitalize the economy by freeing managers from red tape, removing wage ceilings and making every factory pay its own way.

Gorbachev accused the United States of taking advantage of the Kremlin's own openness to push the Soviet Union toward "false aims and defective values" he did not define.

He said a West German pilot's unhindered flight to Red Square last month revealed inefficiency in the Soviet military.

The Soviet leader delivered a

lengthy address to the opening session of the Central Committee's semiannual meeting. The official news agency Tass provided a summary of his remarks.

Much of the speech addressed the need for "radical reform" in management, which he has stressed since coming to power in March 1985. Gorbachev's proposals are a radical departure from the top-heavy central planning system that has built up since the Bolshevik revolution of 1917.

Western diplomats have predicted a cool or even hostile reception from some of the committee's more than

300 members, many of whom are party and ministry functionaries whose jobs will either change or disappear if his plans are implemented.

Gorbachev also said the Soviet Union was experiencing "inflation processes," which he blamed on a combination of too much money and too few desirable goods. It was believed to be the first time a Soviet leader has acknowledged the existence of inflation.

He said some citizens would lose their current jobs under the new system, but emphasized that Soviet, the nominal parliament, at a session that begins Monday.

Soviet Union and efforts would be made to find other work for them.

It is a "first-priority and urgent task" to develop an integrated, effective and flexible system of nationwide economic management, he said.

The Kremlin leader told the Central Committee it would consider "concrete decisions" this year to streamline management and bring it into line with a proposed law on state enterprises.

That law goes to the Supreme Soviet, the nominal parliament, at a session that begins Monday.

Chief of cartel assails U.S. protection move

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — U.S. congressional proposals to give import protection to domestic oil producers could, if enacted, hasten the emergence of a new energy crisis, OPEC's president said Thursday.

"They would be powerless to change the inevitable future scenario, namely, an imbalance in the sources of energy supply," said Nigerian Oil Minister Rilwanu Lukman, who was reelected OPEC president in the opening session of the cartel's regular summer conference.

A trade bill being considered by Congress includes a provision sponsored by Sen. Lloyd Bentsen of Texas that instructs the president to keep oil imports below 50 percent of national consumption.

"We regard these (U.S.) efforts as acts of confrontation," Lukman added in an address to the meeting, which was closed to reporters after his opening remarks.

The meeting was expected to reaffirm the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries' existing strategy of limiting oil production and fixing prices at an average of \$18 a barrel, a barrel is the equivalent of 42 gallons.

The 13 OPEC oil ministers met for only a few minutes after hearing Lukman deliver a stinging attack on U.S. legislative proposals aimed at shielding the domestic oil industry from the effects of rising imports.

Later, they held a two-hour evening session and said afterward that detailed discussion of the key issues would not begin until today.

Korean opposition calling for protests

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Opposition leaders urged people Thursday to step up anti-government street protests and a U.S. envoy cautioned President Chun Doo-hwan not to use soldiers against demonstrators.

Cities were relatively quiet after more than two weeks of violent protest, but about 100 people attacked a police station in the southern city of Kwangju and students fought riot police with firebombs at Sogang University in Seoul.

Medical students said they would march Friday on the Blue House, the presidential residence in Seoul.

Leading opposition figures rejected a government call for negotiations, and the head of South Korea's Roman Catholic Church urged Chun to accept the demand for democratic presidential elections.

Chun met with Kim Young-sam, head of the main political opposition,

on Wednesday to seek ways of ending the disturbances. It was the first time the Chun had met with Kim in more than seven years as president. Chun offered negotiations but Kim denounced the former general's government, saying Chun simply wanted to retain power, and the opposition vowed to continue protests.

On Thursday, the government repeated its offer of talks and appealed to its critics.

Presidential spokesman Lee Jong-yong said in a statement: "The political opposition should end its insistence on solving all problems hastily in one sweep and should instead approach the issue in a more patient and earnest attitude."

An announcement from the prosecutor general's office said most of the 321 people still in detention would be released, except for those facing serious charges. More than 8,000 arrests have been reported since protests began June 10.

After meeting with leaders of both sides Thursday, Assistant Secretary of State Gaston Sigur urged the government and its opponents to negotiate a peaceful solution. "Our position is crystal clear," Sigur said. "We oppose martial law and would hate to see anything like that happen in this situation. Any use of the armed forces in this situation is unwarranted."

"Hopefully, the dialogue that was begun yesterday will continue," he told journalists before leaving for Washington.

The United States has 40,000 soldiers in South Korea under a mutual defense agreement and has been trying to mediate.

A new opposition alliance called the National Coalition for a Democratic Constitution called for nationwide protests Friday in its campaign to oust the government. National police chief Kwon Bok-kyung issued a statement saying the

protests were illegal and his 120,000 men would take "stern action" against violence. Security was increased around important public buildings and the U.S. Embassy warned Americans to stay off the streets.

"The reckless and illegal demonstrations planned by the National Coalition for June 26 are aimed at driving society into extreme chaos and anxiety to achieve its subversive political objectives," Kwon said.

Protests began June 10 to coincide with a convention of the ruling Democratic Justice Party that endorsed the president's choice of party chief Roh Tae-woo, a fellow ex-general, to succeed him when his term expires in February.

At least two people have been killed and thousands injured in the worst political violence since Chun rose to power after President Park Chung-hee was assassinated in 1979.

Visitors find tensions high at site of truce talks

PANMUNJOM, South Korea (AP) — At the cluster of blue and tan buildings that straddle the armistice line where the Korean War ended, the strain of conflict that began 37 years ago Thursday was not eased.

"I didn't realize there'd be as much tension and concern as the late Chas. Bremer at Cass Lake, Minn., visiting for the first time since he fought in the war in the surrounding granite hills. I really thought it was a quiet, peaceful area."

The three-year Korean conflict started June 25, 1950, with a pre-dawn North Korean attack across the 38th parallel, the dividing line established in 1945 in treaties ending World War II in the Pacific.

The United States rushed men and arms to help the outnumbered, ill-equipped South Korean army. Chinese forces entered the war on the side of their Communist ally, North Korea. More than 2 million people died, and damage was in the billions of dollars.

The fighting ended with an armistice — but no peace treaty — on July 27, 1953. North Korea and South Korea, still divided by the 38th parallel, remain in a state of truce under the longest military armistice in recorded history.

The United States still has more than 40,000 troops based in South Korea to help guard against the north.

North Korea observed the anniversary of the start of the war Thursday with thousands of people attending rallies in several cities to denounce the U.S. military presence

in South Korea, official North Korean media reported.

The Korean Central News Agency, monitored in Tokyo, said the rallies also urged the South Korean opposition to continue nationwide protests calling for the ouster of President Chun Doo-hwan.

The cluster of buildings in Panmunjom make up a neutral zone where the armistice commission still meets regularly. It is the only meeting point on the 150-mile demarcation line.

General warns against 'gullibility'

STUTTGART, West Germany (AP) — Gen. Bernard W. Rogers, the retiring NATO commander, passed the U.S. European Command to his successor Thursday with a warning against the Kremlin's "seductive rhetoric" on arms control.

At a ceremony handing over the U.S. European Command to Gen. John R. Galvin, he said in prepared remarks:

"Although the seductive rhetoric of the Soviet leadership falls on

many receptive and gullible ears in the West, we have yet to see any reduction in Soviet military capabilities or any modifications in the expansionist Soviet policy."

The general who commands the 225,000 U.S. troops in Europe automatically becomes supreme commander of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. Rogers will transfer the alliance command to day at NATO headquarters in Mons, Belgium.

Thatcher assaults socialism

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, armed with a third-term electoral victory, on Thursday launched her toughest assault on socialism on a legislative program read by Queen Elizabeth II at the glittering opening of Parliament.

The program included stringent curbs on left-wing city administrations that are the main bastions of the opposition Labor Party, new clampdowns on already battered labor unions, and an overhaul of education.

Mrs. Thatcher also proposed the sale of the national water utility, the latest state enterprise to be sold, and the curbing of the right of teenage smokers to welfare.

"This government that knows the price of everything and the value of nothing," declared opposition Labor leader Neil Kinnock.

Retorted Mrs. Thatcher: "The population of our country is becoming home-owning and share-owning and saving-owning... These class shibboleths of the 1930s have no relevance at all to our modern society."

"People know full well they have a higher standard of living than they have ever had before."

Observers regarded the program critics charged the most right-wing package announced by Mrs. Thatcher since she first took office in 1979.

Following through on pledges in the platform on which Mrs. Thatcher swept back to power in the June 11 general election, the package of 17 bills also had measures to extend pub opening hours to 12 hours a day and tighten immigration controls.

Furious debate erupted in the Commons within hours of the magnificent formal opening of Parliament by the queen.

Dressed in long white gown, cloak and the jewel-encrusted State Imperial Crown, the monarch read the 10-minute speech from the throne to the ermine-robed peers and diplomats seated in the unselected upper House of Lords.

According to centuries-old tradition, Commons' members stood huddled at the rear of chamber. They clustered behind Mrs. Thatcher, 61, and Kinnock, 45, who scarcely glanced at each other.

The thrust of the controversial measures was aimed at the tax-raising and other powers of councils in the large cities, dominated by Laborites.

Contras surprise town with attack

LAS MERCEDES, Nicaragua (AP) — Survivors of an early morning raid by Contra rebels on a northern farming cooperative said they were taken completely by surprise.

The rebels struck Tuesday at Las Mercedes, 94 miles northwest of Managua. The town had last been touched by combat in 1983.

"The attack came all of a sudden as we were getting ready for work," said Juan Vicente Castillo Ramirez, a 42-year-old farmer, speaking Wednesday from his hospital bed in Leon, 70 miles southwest of the farming cooperative.

"We never expected combat there (Las Mercedes)," he said. "The only thing I did was try to save myself."

Gleason hid cancer battle from fans, kept woes to himself

LAUDERHILL, Fla. (AP) — Jackie Gleason, the "Great One" who dedicated his life to making people laugh, hid his battle with cancer from his fans and never wanted to share his problems with the world, a friend said Thursday.

The 71-year-old television pioneer and hustler's bus driver of "The Honeymooners" died of cancer Wednesday night at his home. A public, closed-casket viewing is scheduled today in North Miami. No details of a private funeral Saturday were disclosed.

"Jackie dedicated his career to making people happy," said Hank Meyer, Gleason's former publicist and a close friend. "I never heard him utter a negative word. He never wanted to share his problems and sadness with the outside world."

"When you'd say 'How do you feel?' He would say, 'Great, wonderful,'" Meyer said. "The Great One was always a great dramatic actor. To the last he was jovial, relaxed and in a good mood."

Gleason was released June 18 from Imperial Point Medical Center in Fort Lauderdale after spending

Aimed to make people laugh about a month there. During his stay, family and friends tried to discuss his health, although rumors

swirled that he was extremely ill. Prate continued to roll in Thursday for Gleason, who was called a giant in the entertainment industry.

"Television and Jackie Gleason were simply made for each other," said CBS Chairman William Paley. "His career at CBS spanned almost 25 years, and he was an original from start to finish. . . His work seems as fresh as ever today. Happily, that part of him will be with us forever."

Art Carney, who played Ed Norton on "The Honeymooners," said Thursday that he and Gleason "had a closeness which is hard to explain."

He said he had spoken to Gleason the day after he left the hospital. "He didn't say a word about his ailment. He immediately asked me how I was doing, how I was feeling. . . That was the last time I talked with him."

June Taylor, his longtime television choreographer, said on NBC's "Today" show that Gleason was inspiring, enthusiastic and sensitive. "Every Saturday night before the show, he used to send the 16

dancers and myself a box of roses, every single week. No one ever knew that," she said.

"Jackie was a great actor and a great performer," said Sid Caesar. "He really believed in 'how sweet it is' — living the life he wanted, both on stage and in real life."

Tom Hanks, Gleason's co-star in his last film, "Nothing in Common," said Thursday that the veteran performer was a natural.

"Instinct told Jackie Gleason what to do," Hanks said. "He had a pure uncompromised instinct that told him how to live, how to act and how to make us laugh. There were the instincts of a legend."

Gleason, who garnered an Academy Award nomination for his role as a pool shark in "The

Hustler," was always performing. Bill Dettlaff, head golf pro at Inverrary Golf Club near Gleason's home, recalled the entertainer's antics on the golf course.

"He was a character. He was quite enjoyable," said Dettlaff. "He'd sink a putt and he did the old 'Away — We — Go!' dance across the green."

Gleason's drinking, smoking and hard living were legendary. He once ballooned to more than 230 pounds and smoked as many as six packs of cigarettes a day. He underwent triple coronary bypass surgery in 1978.

Sydel Spear, a longtime friend and personal secretary, said the family would not elaborate further on the cause of death, which has been reported as colon cancer. Gleason had two daughters, nightclub.

Geraldine and Linda, by his marriage to Genevieve Halford, which lasted from 1936 to 1971. He married Beverly McKeltrick in 1971, and they were divorced three years later. He then wed Marilyn Taylor, the younger sister of June Taylor.

Gleason also is survived by a stepson and four grandchildren.

The comedian was born in Brooklyn in 1916 and hustled his way into show business, starting as a master of ceremonies at a local theater, taking home \$4 a night.

His mother died when he was 18 and he spent the next several years roving the backwaters of entertainment, working as a carnival Barker, a daredevil driver, a stunt diver, a disc jockey and a comedian in nightclubs.

'Honeymooners' fans facing void large as Ralph Kramden himself

NEW YORK (AP) — For those who have committed to memory all 114 episodes of "The Honeymooners," the loss of Jackie Gleason, a.k.a. Ralph Kramden, leaves a void as large as the man himself.

"His characterizations really touched a chord in people. There was the 'King of Truth,'" said Bob Columbe, co-founder of the Royal Association for the Longevity and Preservation of the Honeymooners, or RALPH.

He said RALPH, created in 1983 as a movement to bring back "Honeymooners" reruns on New York television, is a testament to Gleason's stature. The comedian — Columbe prefers to call him a "comic actor" — died of cancer Wednesday at his home in Lauderdale, Fla. He was 71.

More than 12,000 people pay annual dues of \$5 to RALPH, which was founded by Columbe and Peter Crescenti, administrators at C.W. Post College.

In Chicago, wearing Raccoon Lodge regalia, studying dresser drawers and an icebox from the original set, and staging a Ralph and Alice Kramden "Baby You're the Greatest" kissing contest.

Columbe said "Honeymooners" reruns are broadcast by more than 200 stations. These shows include "the classic 39," the original shows, and 75 "lost episodes" that RALPH helped to unearth, Columbe said.

Gleason and the RALPH hierarchy met only once, when it was announced that those lost episodes — actually, Honeymooners skits that originally were part of larger variety shows — would be broadcast.

Gleason "told us how much he appreciated what we had done," Columbe recalled. "I was unprepared for the kind things he said to us."

Unlike some meetings of celebrities and their fans, this get-together was not disappointing. Of course, "we didn't go in expecting him to do Ralph Kramden or Reggie van Gleason III or something," Col-

ombe said. Though Gleason claimed he was not bothered by his failure to win an Emmy award, Columbe and the Raphies are affronted. They had waged a "Give It to Gleason" campaign, seeking a lifetime achievement award for his idyl.

It galls Columbe that people who never honored Gleason will now issue "glorious tributes" to the Great One.

Columbe is no teen-ager, spoofing a pop-culture figure. He is 41, and "really grew up with the Honeymooners, as many people in New York did." But the appeal of Ralph the bus driver, his friend Ed Norton and their wives, Alice and Trixie, is not limited to New York, he said.

"Ralph Kramden is really everyman," he said. "Each week he has another hare-brained scheme, a way to get rich, and in the end he's back where he started. But he's back again the next week, trying to better his life."

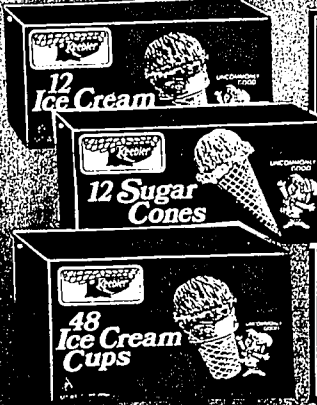

Region IV eyes grants for Tupperware crisis

TWIN FALLS — Still reeling from the economic carnage of Tupperware's plant closure, the Region IV Development Association board Wednesday started a path toward applying for \$1 million in federal assistance.

And the Idaho Department of Employment has proposed a cooperative effort with Tupperware to find jobs for the 700 workers who will be idled by the planned year-end closure of the company's Jerome manufacturing plant.

Personnel representatives from Tupperware met Tuesday with department officials to outline the formation of a Joint Labor Management Adjustment Committee.

Employment Department spokesman Bob Cooper said.

The group would be composed of management, employees and an independent chair. It would coordinate re-employment efforts for

those laid off by Tupperware to avoid any duplication.

A similar program has been used to find employment for workers at the Innisfree Concepts Inc. plant in Idaho Falls, which idled about 125 employees when it shut down this spring.

The project would be funded by a grant being sought from the U.S. Department of Labor.

The Employment Department has set a goal of finding new jobs or training opportunities for 75 percent of Tupperware's workers who intend to return to the labor force.

The state Job Service, Department of Health and Welfare, Region IV Development Association and the College of Southern Idaho will assist the committee on referrals and coordinating retraining efforts.

"Tupperware is doing a pretty admirable job of trying to help out their employees," offering them jobs at their other two plants in the Southeast and allowing them ample lead time, Cooper said.

Ken Baumgartner, personnel

manager in Jerome, will take the proposal back to Tupperware officials in Florida next month and the committee could get under way by the second week in July.

At the Region IV board meeting, Executive Director Joe Herring outlined "the Tupperware disaster," noting that the severity of the business loss may qualify Jerome and Twin Falls counties for U.S. Department of Commerce grants.

Sudden and Severe Economic Dislocation grants are available to areas losing jobs for more than 2 percent of their workforce, Herring said. Twin Falls and Jerome counties each housed about half of the 700 Tupperware workers affected by the plant closure, which qualifies both counties for the assistance, he said.

SEED grants typically total more than \$1 million to develop and implement plans to attract and expand businesses, but details of the local grant must still be worked out beginning Monday, Herring said.

While not paying for relocation, Herring said the grant money could

go for expanding businesses' buildings, roads or water and sewer service.

Herring said he will meet with Jerome Mayor Ralph Peters and others to create a task force deciding which businesses would most help the area. Herring said a study by Fankus Co., a consulting firm hired by the city of Twin Falls, rated 200,000 businesses in the United States that could come to Magic Valley.

"What we need to do now is boil

the four-digit codes down to the names of businesses," he said of the study.

Peters, who is also a Region IV board member, presented a grim update on the plant closure.

He said on-site counseling is being set up at Tupperware and that the state Department of Health and Welfare is setting up alcohol and chemical dependency rehabilitation for the "depression which will probably be created by the shock of this particular business."

Looking to the future, Peters added that another plant opening set for next May could bring 135 jobs, while a possible cheese plant could employ 35 to 100 people and a proposed truck stop at Interstate 84 and Highway 93 could bring other jobs.

But Peters said he wants to explore other alternatives for quick results.

"Right now we have to identify what we can do and what we want to do," Peters said.

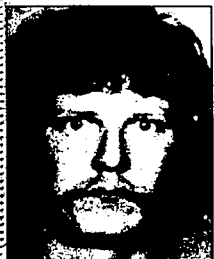

FBI aims search for fugitive along I-84

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho branch of the FBI is concentrating its manhunt for Darren Dee O'Neill, listed as one of the agency's Ten Most Wanted Fugitives and wanted for questioning in the murder of a Twin Falls woman, to the Interstate 84 corridor.

Since O'Neill is on the FBI's list, the search has spread to all 59 divisions of the FBI with "great intensity," said FBI agent T.C. Brock of Boise.

Cassia County Sheriff Billy Crystal said another sighting of O'Neill was reported at John's Grocery, 1600 Overland Ave. in Burley. But Crystal said he hasn't confirmed that the person was O'Neill.

O'Neill is wanted for questioning in the strangulation murder of 22-year-old Lisa Szubert of Twin Falls.

He is also wanted for questioning in the murder of a Pierce County, Wash., woman who disappeared in March. Police found her body and skeletal remains May 25 near Greenwater, Wash.

Crystal said the person who reported yesterday's sighting in Burley described O'Neill's tattoos. The FBI warrant for O'Neill said he had a small star tattooed below his left eye and the letters "J-U-N-E" tattooed on his left hand.

The sighting is still unconfirmed, Crystal said, and there's a 50 percent chance the person was O'Neill.

Crystal said the Cassia County sheriff's office received Thursday about six to eight reports from people who said they saw O'Neill and about that many reports of blue clothing, the description of a Monday report.

A Burley woman reported Monday that a man matching O'Neill's description tried to get her into a light blue van. But Crystal said he hasn't linked O'Neill to a blue van and an Idaho FBI officer also said a link hasn't been established.

At this point we don't know that he has one," Brock said. "In the past he has picked up stolen cars for transportation."

Brock said Thursday the FBI in Burley is concentrating its search for O'Neill to the corridor along Interstate 84, from the Oregon to Utah border. He said law enforcement agencies are receiving a lot of sightings, or "look-alikes," but the only "positive sightings" have been in Nampa, Mountain Home and the Burley area.

Brock said a report is considered positive after a law enforcement officer interviews the person making the report and determines the description matches. "I suspect that O'Neill isn't a Brock said he will be questioned about it."

Nature group guards falls

Conservancy fights to keep Hagerman site undeveloped

BUHL — Four years ago, Guy Bonnivier answered for someone and was presented the chance to seize a dream.

If the Nature Conservancy was interested, there was a piece of property coming on the market with the largest concentration of free-flowing clear springs left on the Snake River. Not just narrow rivulets of pristine water, but a wide clear stream that tumbled out of the side of barren cliffs, nurtured a lush growth of shrubs and formed a pool of water so transparent, you can see the long braids of moss weaving to and fro on the bottom of the pond.

He was interested. Bonnivier is the executive director of the Idaho Nature Conservancy, a private, non-profit real estate group whose sole purpose is to buy threatened and endangered pieces of land and water for preservation.

Formed in 1951, the national Nature Conservancy has saved more than 2.6 million acres in 50 states from development.

Bonnivier was still wrapped up with raising money for the Silver Creek acquisition, a 2,359 acre preservation and restoration effort in Blaine County. But he was looking for the group's next big project.

In the Hagerman Valley, the land known as the Thousand Springs Farm and the Minnie Miller falls, sandwiched between two private fish hatcheries and the Thousand Springs Power Plant operated by Idaho Power Company, seemed an intriguing prospect.

"This was something that was really unique," Bonnivier said Tuesday as he tossed a bag into the fishbowl stream for his two dogs to retrieve. "On the North American continent, nothing matches this."

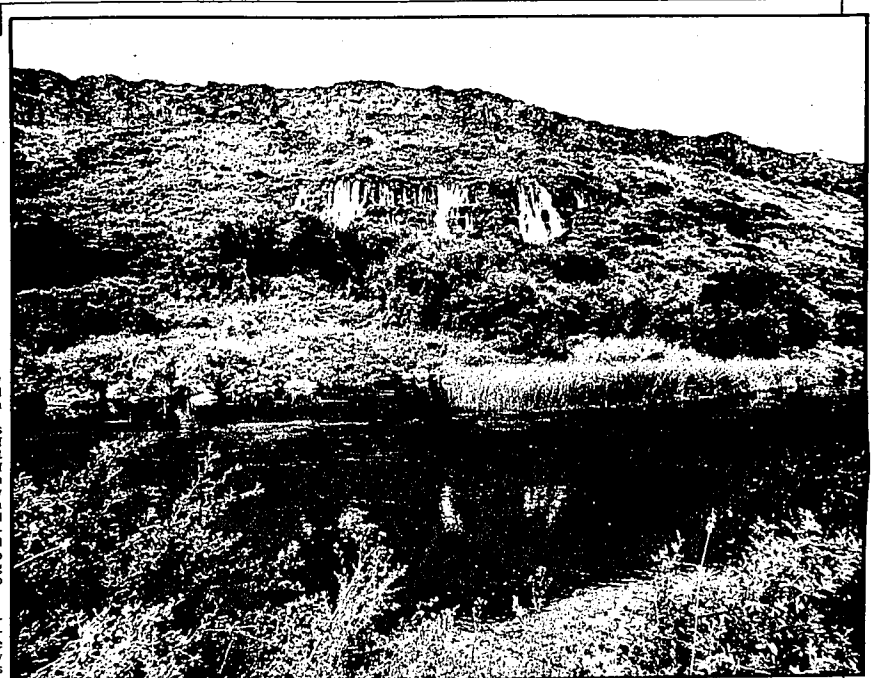
It is not merely hyperbole. Dressed in a blue polo shirt, jeans and tennis shoes, the 36-year-old Bonnivier speaks with authority and is armed with opinions from experts.

On the staff of Idaho's Nature Conservancy are scientists in Boise who use the word "outliers" and a sophisticated system, rank Idaho's endangered wildlife and endangered areas.

"They do nothing but identify areas for me to focus my efforts on," Bonnivier said.

And out of 25 potential sites, "Thousand Springs came out on top," he said.

In addition to the Minnie Miller falls being the last of the undiverted springs in the Hagerman Valley, the site is also home to the Shebone sculpin, a small fish that evolved in the spring system and is now endangered, Bonnivier said.

Power Company, and made the court an offer it couldn't refuse.

Had the Nature Conservancy not purchased the land, developers were willing to bulldoze the hills, bottle the springs and turn the Thousand Springs Farm into another large commercial fish hatchery, Bonnivier said.

It would have been a major loss, not just of the aesthetic beauty, but of the area's history as well, he said.

The farm, first owned by Minnie Miller, was an award-winning dairy, the subject of a National Geographic article in the 1940s, he said.

The Ritter property also contains the area's first ferry site in the valley built in 1870, according to historian Virginia Rickellets.

"People take it for granted until it's missing," he said as he drove along the three-mile stretch of cliffs, land and springs and pointed to a golden eagle soaring over a nest containing her two young.

Not far away, poking out of the craggy, stern rocks beside an insignificant waterfall was a glimpse of the future had Nature Conservancy not bought the land — a rusted pipe.

The pipe was inserted by someone ready to develop a small hydropower project with the capability of making \$100,000 a year on just one of the area's numerous falls.

Bonnivier stopped his Bronco, pointed to the pipe and said proudly, "We stopped it from happening."

The Nature Conservancy's project has become more valuable than ever as more applications to water are made along the route. At Niagara Springs, about 10 miles up river, residents are fighting an application to expand a commercial hatchery by owner Earl Hardy, a plan that will dry up the natural springs, opponents say.

want to do more than just play a role at Niagara Springs. Some residents have suggested the state or groups buy back developed springs and restore them to their natural state.

Bonnivier has his doubts it will happen. The state Parks Department had a chance to buy Thousand Springs Farm, "but they just had no money," he said.

As for citizen's groups, they play a role in alerting people of endangered areas. But it would be hard for local groups to mount the same preservation effort that the national Nature Conservancy can muster, he said.

"We spent \$45,000 in legal fees to buy this land, and we'll spend another \$30,000 to manage it," he said. "It's a lot of work."

He has crisscrossed the country to raise \$700,000 from 120 people to help pay back the loan. But unless he can raise another \$800,000 in less than 12 months, the Conservancy will lose the land.

Bonnivier is now turning to southern Idaho's residents to help. The more small donations, the wider and broader the range of interest and "the stronger we are," he said.

When the land is secured, the Nature Conservancy will begin opening it up to scheduled tours. Boaters and fishermen may already use the area, he said.

"We want people to see this," he said.

The Nature Conservancy also has been able to do what other groups have not because "we're not a bunch of wild-eyed crazies," said Bonnivier, who has worked as a freelance writer, forest ranger, farmer and owner of a construction company. "We're private enterprise, people respect private enterprise."

Earl Hardy, seen as the villain of the Hagerman Valley by local residents, is one of the contributors to the Nature Conservancy, Bonnivier said. "We're in a state of change in Idaho," he said. "People are more

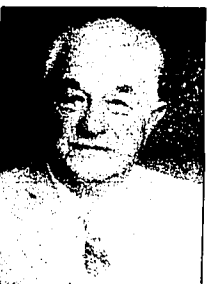

Southern officials echoed the point. "We just don't give anything away," said Bob Elton, with the Tennessee Department of Economic and Community Development's division of existing industry.

The southern states didn't need to. Idaho's property tax rate is lower in South Carolina and Tennessee than Idaho and the difference is getting bigger.

Idaho's corporate rate swelled from 10 percent at the beginning of the year to 8 percent after Jan. 1, 1987.

South Carolina's 6-percent rate will drop to 5 percent after Jan. 1, 1988. Tennessee has a 6-percent "excise" or corporate income tax.

"You're comparing apples and oranges there many times," said Jay Engstrom, economic development specialist for the Idaho Department of Commerce.

But officials from all three states say corporate taxes are calculated using the federal tax code.

Beyond the tax rates, standard property tax deductions and employment tax credits appear more generous in South Carolina.

All South Carolina companies receive a five-year property tax abatement for expansions, said Deb Woolley, public information manager for the state Development Board. However, school taxes are still levied, she said.

Yanez led the scene, drove west to Wendell exit, left the Interstate and drove onto a frontage road, McFall said, with several witnesses following him.

McFall said Yanez left his car after stopping on the frontage road and started to run away, but when several of his followers yelled at him, he returned to his car. At that point, McFall arrived on the scene and arrested Yanez.

In addition to the traffic citations, McFall said he cited Yanez for littering and onto the eastbound lane backward, making the front of a 1982 Mercury four-door driven by John Webster of Jerome, McFall said.

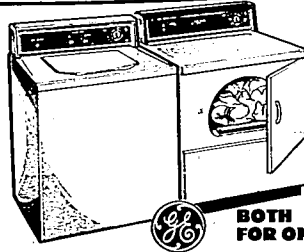

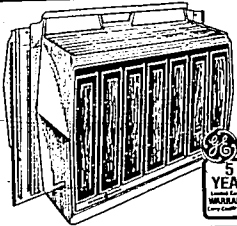

Navratilova, only player to finish match, beats rain, Inoue

WIMBLEDON, England — Defending champion Martina Navratilova beat the rain and Japan's Akiko Inoue to become the first player to reach the third round and the only player to finish a match Thursday at Wimbledon.

With a backlog of almost two days' worth of singles matches, 44 players had yet to complete the first round. Even Navratilova, who has spent less than 1½ hours of playing time in the tournament, said the weather was affecting her style.

"I don't think I rushed to get the



match over with but I did rush in between the points. I suppose you can call it controlled rushing," she said after eliminating Inoue 6-1, 6-2.

The two actually played 41 minutes, but there was a 3½-hour rain delay. The first set as rain continued to disrupt the grass-court championships. Only one other match was started

under the cloudy skies. On Centre Court, Italy's Paolo Canale led Czechoslovakia, the world's top-ranked player, 6-3, 5-5.

Alan Mills, the tournament referee, said that if the inclement weather continues, there was the possibility some events could be changed or canceled. But he emphasized the tournament, which saw all of Monday's play rained out and a curtailed schedule on Tuesday, is not that desperate ... at this point in time.

"Up until last night, we were approximately 70 matches behind, and if we don't get any play today we'll

be about 140 matches behind," Mills said. Later in the day, he canceled all matches with only Navratilova's being completed, leaving the backlog at 139.

"If you think about 1982, when we had so much rain we only had two completely clear days out of the 13, we had only played 152 matches by the end of the first week, but we still completed the tournament on time," Mills said. "So far we've played 166 matches, and with a little bit of luck we may have reached 182 by Saturday, which was the figure in 1982."

According to statistics compiled by the British Broadcasting Corp.,

this year's start is the worst for the tournament. Wimbledon's library said it could not confirm the figures.

Among the players who haven't seen any action are eighth-seeded Claudia Kohde-Kilsch of West Germany, No. 13 Barbara Potter of the United States and No. 14 Katerina Maleeva of Bulgaria.

"I am so lucky to have been able to finish my match," said Navratilova, who is seeking a record sixth straight Wimbledon singles crown and her first title of 1987. "The worst thing is to be stopped in the middle." She took nine minutes more to

dispose of her first-round opponent, West Germany's Claudia Kohde-Kilsch. Navratilova said, "Then she started with more problems than did the German-teen-ager."

"At the beginning Eltsuko was serving hard first and second serves," Navratilova said. "Then she started serving some double faults, which I figured she would. I was able to break her after she took a little off the serve."

That came in the fourth game, which Inoue began with a double fault, her second of the match.

W Welty earns 19th high jump spot; Bernhagen misses

Shadow of turmoil grows long as Seoul Olympics approach

SEOUL, South Korea — The government vows to stage a successful 1988 Seoul Olympics, while its foes call the event a second Nazi Games. The shadows of political turmoil in South Korea grow longer as the Games approach.

Many Koreans worry the clash between government and opposition groups could endanger the Games, that it could rob the nation of what is seen as a huge triumph capping what has been called South Korea's "economic miracle."

The Olympics have become a political game, with the government and opposition each using them to justify their own positions. Both sides say they support the Games, but many Koreans are worried they could lose them.

"If the nation should forsake its hard-earned rights to host the world sports event due to civil unrest, the Republic and its people would suffer a critical blow to its prestige," The Korea Times said in a June 23 editorial.

"In that event, Koreans would be doomed to lose face as a creditable nation in the world community," the paper said.

Koreans regard the selection of their country to host the next Olympics with enormous pride. People often talk about the responsibility of hosting the Games, and many say political problems must be solved to ensure the event is a complete success.



cannot be held if South Korea is not a democracy. Opposition leader Kim Young-sam caused national furor when he charged the government wanted to use the Games in the same way Adolf Hitler tried to use the 1936 Berlin Olympics as a Nazi showcase.

"If the Olympics are to be a self-advertisement for the government, and if the people are to be forced, by the use of government force, to participate, then our Olympics will be no more than a re-enactment of the Berlin Olympics of 1936 under the Nazis," Kim said in a May speech.

Kim has continued to demand complete democracy before the Olympics, although the opposition has not threatened to disrupt the Games.

The opposition is demanding direct presidential elections and full political freedom in a country where the opposition are rarely tolerated and riot police stand guard on the streets.

President Chun Doo-hwan repeatedly has used the Olympics to justify the government's authoritarian policies, saying stability is vital to ensure the Games are a success.

Lewis breezes to 2 victories, eyes long jump

SAN JOSE, Calif. — Carl Lewis began his quest for the gold medals in the USA-Mobil Outdoor Track and Field Championships on Thursday by breezing to victory in heats of the men's 100-meter and 200-meter dashes, and qualifying for the long jump final.

Lewis, winner of the 100-meter dash, 200-meter dash and the long jump in the 1984 national championships at Indianapolis, is trying to win three events again this year.

"I'm in the best shape that I've ever been in," Lewis said. "The way I'm running is at least as good as it's ever been. I run very relaxed and very smooth and jumped rather easily."

Danny Harris, who ended Edwin Moses' 122-race winning streak earlier this month at Madrid, Spain, and Moses each won their heats in the 400-meter intermediate hurdles.

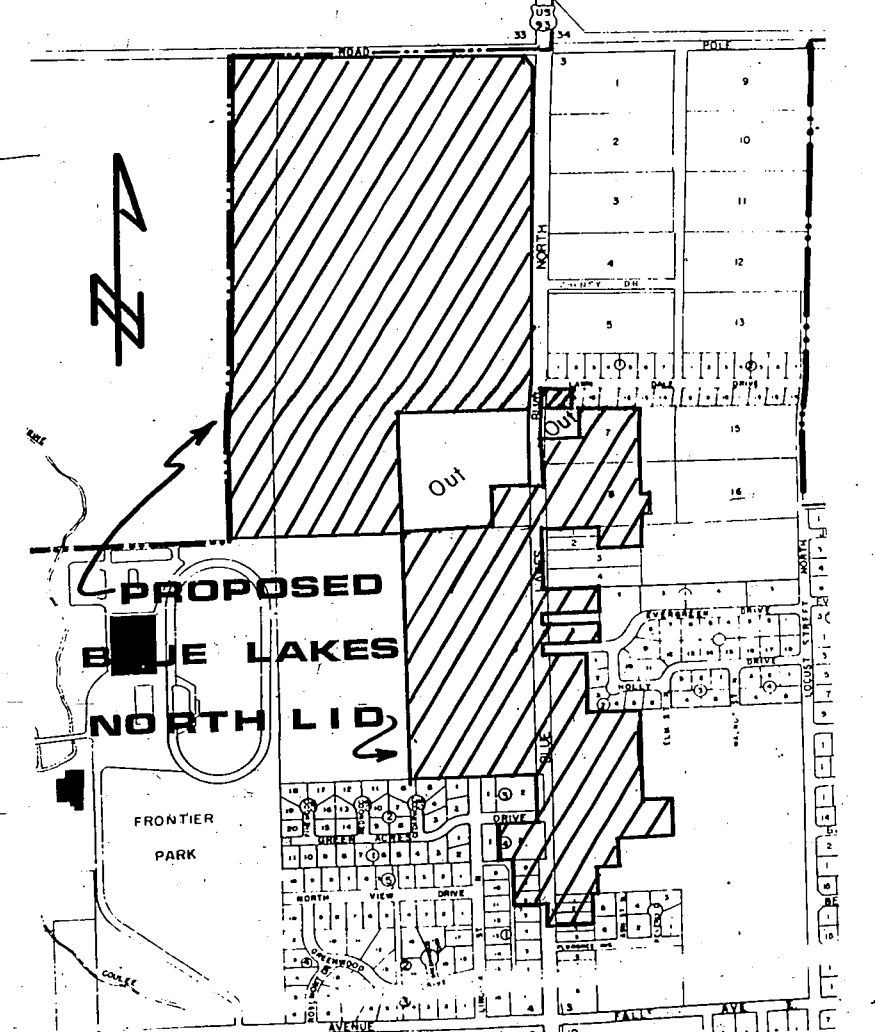

Square dancers heed June call

Every year, dancers do-si-do at weekend gathering in mountains

Every summer toward the end of June, the Sawtooth hills come alive with the sound of music and the voice of a square dance caller.

Like bees returning to a hive, approximately 120 square dance enthusiasts of all ages move out from Twin Falls, Jerome, Boise, Shoshone, Burley, Paul and Rupert to join a caravan of campers, fifth-wheelers and motor homes twisting its way over Couch and Fleck summits on the way to the Methodist Camp, north of Fairfield. The hive is a log lodge nestled in an Alpine-like valley southwest of Elk Point mountain.

The honey in the hive is a weekend of square and round dance workshops mixed with volleyball, horseshoe pitching and just plain visiting. Of course, fishing, hiking and motor bike safarries are sandwiched between the other activities.

The weekend is sponsored by the Buttons and Bows Square Dance Club of Jerome and features their club caller, Wilford Allison, and other guest callers.

Evening activities begin at about 6:30 p.m. A migration of dancers unfolds before the eyes of the mule deer feeding in the shadowed valley. In groups of two or four, or in strings of six or eight, they move out from tents and campers.

The walking dancers compliment the natural beauty of the setting as they stroll along the well-worn trails to the lodge.

The Right Hand Ladies wear bright-colored skirts of red, yellow, green or plaid. The Corner Gents sport blue, white, green or purple shirts accented with pointed-tip neckerchiefs.

The evening is young, and these caller came to dance. So the music begins, and the caller "squares 'em up!"

Enthusiastic is the favorite adjective of Square Dancers, and the evening dances at the Methodist Camp prove it. With the rustle of skirts and the clapping of hands, the squares are filled, and the dance begins.

The caller creates a kaleidoscope of colored skirts, shirts and scarves as he moves the dancers through their do-si-dos, promenades and spin-chain-thrus.

It's now impossible to find an unsmiling face, for square dancing brings twinkling eyes and ear-catching grins.

Friendship is no problem among square dancers. They learn to be friendly and forgiving at the very beginning of their training.

As one progresses on the way to becoming a square dancer, one's mind fills with various calls and the need to know your left hand from your right hand. There are times of forgetfulness and a dancer will turn the wrong way. The result is a broken square, a humbled dancer and the need for forgiveness from the other seven dancers in the square. Forgiveness, it's said, is a major step to friendship, and thus, square dancers learn early the art of forgiving and making friends.

Normally a square (that's eight dancers standing in a square formation) will move through a series of calls in a smooth, timed fashion and end the dance in the same position they started in.

It's been said that a square dancer must perform a call at least 80 times before becoming a proficient dancer. And there are 500-plus calls in square dancing. Square dancing is divided into several levels of difficulty such as Basic, Mainstream, Plus and Challenge, thus offering a level of movements for all.

In the Magic Valley, beginners usually spend at least one night a week from November to May learning the movements of the Basic and Mainstream levels. Once these movements are mastered, the dancer can enjoy a lot of square dancing, and if the dancer is inspired, he can go on to Plus and

Challenge dancing.

However, if you think the dancers have a lot to learn, pity the poor square dance caller. This person not only must know the calls for the multitude of movements, he must know where the dancers are supposed to be as he moves them through the dance.

Put yourself in the caller's shoes. While overlooking a group of weaving and twisting dancers, you are filling in time between calls with the lyrics of the dance tune, you must picture where the dancers are supposed to be positioned next, and you must know the call that will get them there.

Don't think square dancing is as disorganized as it might look to a spectator. Callers are trained by the International Association of Square Dance Callers, which specifies the terms and calls of square dancers throughout the world. If you dance in Dallas, Texas, or Tokyo, Japan, the calls are the same even though the accents will be different.

An "after-party" on Saturday night features humorous skits organized by one of the dancers and performed by members of the Square Dance Ham Actors Guild.

On Sunday square dancers gather for a non-denominational service featuring square dance gospel singers, square dance preachers and square dance prayers.

If you don't square dance now, it's too late to enjoy this special weekend this year, but if you think it sounds like fun, join with the square dance beginners in Jerome, Twin Falls, Shoshone or Paul next November and you'll be ready for the time of your life next June.

SUN VALLEY — Fusion, crossover, Baroque, classical and ethno are just a few of the types of music to be presented at this year's Wood River Music Festival.

Reaching out in new directions to explore a diversity of musical styles, the sixth annual Wood River Music Festival, sponsored by the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities, will feature a range of classical and jazz artists.

Opening the three-week concert series on Saturday is the Michael Brecker Band jazz vocalist Bobby McFerrin, a three-time Grammy Award winner, will perform on Wednesday.

Ten saxophonist Brecker, a forerunner in the realm of jazz fusion, will perform with percussionist Adam Nussbaum, bassist Jeff Andrew, keyboardist Kenny Kirkland and guitarist Joe Calderazzo.

Brecker has just released his first solo album, "Michael Brecker," for MCA/Impulse. Joining him on the album are guitarist Pat Metheny, bassist Charlie Haden, keyboardist Kenny Kirkland and drummer Jack

DeJohnette.

Brecker's performance in Sun Valley is his first tour as a featured soloist, but he has a 20-year musical history working with the likes of Chick Corea, Quincy Jones, Charles Mingus, Bruce Springsteen, John Lennon, Eric Clapton, Chaka Khan, James Taylor, Steely Dan, Billy Joel, Dan Fogelberg and Freddie Hubbard.

In the late 1960s Brecker formed a band called Dream, a group considered visionary for using a horn section on top of rock rhythms and creating jazz riffs with electronic instruments. Dream's two albums are seen as seminal documents of fusion, the cross-fertilization of rock and jazz.

Throughout the late '70s Brecker performed with his brother, trumpeter Randy Brecker. The Brecker Brothers released six albums from 1975 through 1981. In 1979 they opened Seventh Avenue South, a popular downtown Manhattan jazz club. Informal gigs at the club led to the formation of the group, Steps Ahead, a band co-founded by Brecker and vibraphonist Michael Mainieri. Over its tours and albums, Steps Ahead has

become recognized for its innovative use of synthesized instruments.

The Michael Brecker Band will perform at 6 p.m. Saturday at the Trail Creek Cabin grounds at Sun Valley. The grounds will open at 5 p.m., and concert-goers are urged to bring picnic meals. Others should bring blankets or lawn chairs as the only seating is at picnic tables.

Tickets are \$12 general admission and \$5 for those under 19; for Sun Valley Center members, general tickets are \$10, \$4 for those under 19.

The second concert in the series features "The Voice," Bobby McFerrin.

Awarded a Grammy for Best Male Jazz Vocalist in both 1986 and 1987, McFerrin does not consider himself a jazz singer but a vocal performance artist.

At 37, McFerrin has developed the ability to sound like virtually any musical instrument or any kind of singer. His intention is not to imitate, but rather to be inspired by all the sounds of daily life around him.

A&M celebrates 25 years of recording

HOLLYWOOD — It was, almost certainly, the first time that Herb Alpert, Suzanne Vega, Barry White, Joe Jackson, Richard Carpenter and David Crosby had been in the same room together.

And it was quite likely the first time that a single display case of promotional items included a Peter Frampton watch, a Cat Stevens yo-yo, Cheech and Chong candles and a Police (the band, not the department) whistle.

And it was definitely the first time that a wall of Herb Alpert memorabilia was on public display; a letter from RCA Records turning him down for a job in the A&M department, a sales chart showing Alpert's 1962 recording of "The Lonely Bull" at No. 6, an early newspaper clipping headlined "Many Expect Herb Alpert to Be the Most Talented" and even the small reel-to-reel tape recorder on which the original version of "The Lonely Bull" was recorded.

The paraphernalia was on display and the musicians were in attendance at the A&M Records sound stage Tuesday night for a cocktail party celebrating the 25th anniversary of A&M, the Los Angeles-based record label that grew from a two-man operation out of Herb Alpert's garage into the best-known and most prestigious independent label in the United States.

Symbols of that success were displayed on wall panels at Tuesday's bash. One named every artist ever signed to A&M. Another listed the label's Top 100 hits (the top five are the Police's "Every Breath You Take," Carole King's "It's Too Late," the Carpenters' "Close to You," Alpert's "This Guy's in Love with You," and the Captain & Tennille's "Love Will Keep Us Together").

However, the real story of A&M, the shifts in musical tone over the

years, was told in the display that occupied one side of the room. One portable wall showed A&M's artists from the '60s, when the emphasis was on soft-rock and pop acts. Another dealt with the '70s, with artists like Joe Cocker, Cat Stevens, Supertramp and Slyx reflecting more of a contemporary rock edge and a third dealt with the diversity of the '80s: from Bryan Adams and the Police to Janet Jackson.

For the week-long celebration, the label has flown in staffers from 45 countries as well as virtually all its American employees. Besides a marathon of daytime meetings, private nighttime concerts are scheduled.

Things got under way with Tuesday's party on the sound stage where Charlie Chaplin shot many of his films. A&M President Gil Friesen (the company's third employee) welcomed the staff and introduced Herb Alpert and Jerry Moss (the A and M of A&M).

Said Alpert, who launched the label with record producer man Moss in 1962, "Twenty-five years ago, I never even imagined that I'd be standing in front of this many people associated with A&M. I don't want to take away from the joy of this for anybody else, but it almost seems like this means a hell of a lot more to other people than it does to me. As far as I'm concerned, we're just doing our jobs and having fun, and that's what we're going to continue to do."

Elsewhere, Nashville-based roots-rocker John Hiatt chatted with Glen Tilbrook, an English singer-songwriter from the pop band Squeeze. The party's visual-displays were designed to be fairly low-key. "We didn't want to inundate you with memorabilia," Moss said, "but some of it's kind of cute."

"I don't think of A&M as any age," he said. "A very good friend of mine died a couple of weeks ago at the age of 82, and I don't think of him as being that old, either — I just thought of him as my good friend."

Alpert, who is also celebrating the anniversary with "Diamonds," his biggest hit in years, shrugged. "I don't think of it as a milestone. Legal battle brews over Swedish film director's book

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — A legal scuffle was brewing Wednesday over the unpublished memoirs of Ingemar Bergman in which the Swedish film director writes of his many loves, five marriages and his early fascination with Adolf Hitler.

The book due out this fall was described in a three-page article in the Aftonbladet tabloid as a "merciless account of himself" by Bergman, a pioneer of psychological realism on film and stage. It will be published early next year in English.

The Norstedt publishing house said it may sue Aftonbladet for copyright violations for its report Tuesday on the manuscript of Bergman's script as saying that Bergman's "Laterna Magica," latest marriage is happy. He wed actress Ingrid von Rosen in the early 1970s.

Managing Director Lasse Bergstrom of Norstedt said Bergman was enraptured with film after he saw a film in which he was the star. Bergstrom seeking joint legal action with the publishers. "From our point of view this old, the paper said, he once swapped his camera for his brother Olof got for 'Nonsense,'" replied Aftonbladet Christmas.

Bergman's older brother was a founder of the Swedish Nazi party and Bergman himself remained a Hitler supporter through the war. "When the truth about the Nazi concentration camps was revealed he reacted with sorrow and despair and despised himself with all the intensity he had," Aftonbladet said.

Bergman devotes a chapter to his conflict with Swedish tax authorities that climaxed when he was nearly arrested by tax police at the Stockholm Dramatic Theater, the paper said.

The authorities failed to prove tax charges against the police who were widely condemned for their handling of the case, which led Bergman to leave Sweden for self-imposed exile in West Germany.

Bergman was quoted in the manuscript as writing that the affair at first plunged him into a severe depression that later turned to a rage and forced him to leave his country.

Bergman is now back in Sweden directing at the Dramatic Theater. His latest production, a modern interpretation of "Hamlet," produced a fierce debate in Swedish cultural circles, but won rave reviews when it opened in London earlier this month.

I knew that if I started listening to other singers it would take me years to develop, so I put myself off from other singers for a long, long time."

He sang with bands for six years before going a cappella. "When he achieved a solo European tour, promoters who couldn't imagine him holding an audience's attention without backup musicians canceled half the dates. For those who dared to present him, the response was overwhelming.

Soon there were constant requests for solo concert dates throughout Europe. The German critic proclaimed him "Stimmwunder," or "Wonder Voice."

His second album, "The Voice," was recorded live in capturing a 1984 tour of Germany. It brought him critical acclaim and led to a number one vote for best male vocalist in both the Downbeat critics and readers polls. It also was recognized by Rolling Stone and Esquire.

In 1986 he also won a Grammy Award for Best Vocal Arrangement for his work on Manhattan Transfer's recording of "Another Night in Tunisia." McFerrin wordlessly sang the Grammy-winning theme song in movie "Round Midnight" and can be heard on a TV commercial for blue jeans.

"His voice can sound like a walking bass or a growling trumpet, a bebop saxophone, an opera singer, a Beatle, a female rhythm and blues singer, a lead guitarist, an air by Bach, or any of the above in tandem. Meanwhile he mimes, taps his feet, clicks his tongue and beats his chest," a critic wrote in the International Herald Tribune.

'Spaceballs' tries space opera satire using the same old shtick

HOLLYWOOD — Midway through "Spaceballs," Mel Brooks' latest movie parody appears in one of his roles: waddling along, robed in pickle green, face coated with something he describes in the press book as a "Jewish gift." "Just plain Yogurt," a kosher version of Yoda from "The Empire Strikes Back" whose catch phrase is "May the Schwartz be with you!"

But, actually, Yogurt sounds more like Brooks' 2,000-Year-Old Man, or the irascible art-house kvetcher of his short "The Critic." And this sporadically hilarious movie could use some kvetching to puncture the super-spectacle nonsense engulfing it.

"Spaceballs" Brooks is satirizing space opera; primarily the "Star Wars" trilogy and its merchandising empire, with a few sideswipes at "2001," "Dune," "E.T.," and the Flash Gordon serials and a double blast at "Alien" and at Chuck Jones' cartoon "One Froggy Evening" (the latter prompts one of the movie's funniest and most sight-gaggy).

This lavish tale of the intergalactic war between smiling Druids and vicious Spaceballs is also full of his usual hipster shenanigans, laced with inside Jewish humor.

Yet, because the gags are a little lacky — because berine (Princess Vespa) (Daphne Zuniga) is called a "Drush princess," because Lone Starr (Bill Pullman) drives a "Vinebag" with rocket jets and his sidekick, Bart (John Candy), covers her with a tail hole — it seems wrong somehow that the sets and effects are not more tacky, too. "Spaceballs" might have been much funnier and more inventive on a much smaller budget.

Occasionally the expense pays off, as in the wonderful opening shot of an insanely elaborate starship that sweeps over us against

paroxysm, or maybe see a huge slithering hunk of gelatin fish out on those "Dune"-like dunes. Yet the gags often do not seem to extend themselves far enough; only a few, like the merchandising satire, really run through.

Brooks' humor works so much out of frontal assault, calculated hysteria and aggressive hyperbole that he seems to need cures with a real gift for frenzy and explosion — like Zero Mostel, Ron Moody, Sid Caesar, Brooks himself or Gene Wilder.

"Spaceballs," there is a brief bit with the nattering mozzarella space-gangster "Pizza the Hutt!" where the movie suddenly seems to find its right pitch. Dom DeLuise, doing the voice, roars the jokes across, just as Mostel or Caesar would have.

Comparatively, some of the other actors — Daphne Zuniga, Bill Pullman, Dick Van Patten, even Joan Rivers (as a robot's voice) — are good, but too polite. The ones who get properly extreme are DeLuise; John Candy as Bart, the poor man's Chewbacca; Brooks as both Yogurt and Skroob the unscrupulous; and Rick Moranis playing "Dark Helmet," who has resonant James Earl Jones-ish tones with his visor down, and turns squeaky little nerd with the visor up.

If "Spaceballs" (rated PG, despite raunchy puns) disappoints you, it is not because it is unfunny or not entertaining. Brooks at medium pressure is still more amusing than most movie makers.

But there does not seem to be any sensible reason why the man whose first film was "The Producers," a masterpiece of vulgar all-stops-out satire, should still be cranking out these increasingly grotesque, grandiose movie parodies almost two decades later, especially when you compare him with Woody Allen, who did not start out nearly as well. Shouldn't Brooks look at "Broadway Danny Rose" or "Hannah and Her Sisters" and feel a little sheepish?

Early on, there is a terrific moment when the villains try to outpace the heroes by getting an early-release "Spaceballs" videocassette and running it on the ship's monitor; eventually they are watching a movie of themselves watching a movie.

Watching this, you want Brooks to pick up the gag and wind it all the way through; VCR and reality getting hopelessly entwined. You would like him to close with some special-effects hyper-warping

'Witches' barely edge past 'Predator'

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "The Witches of Eastwick" brewed up \$8.25 million in ticket sales at the weekend box office, edging out Arnold Schwarzenegger and "Predator."

"Witches," a supernatural tale of devilish Jack Nicholson seducing three lonely New England witches, opened about \$2,000 more than "Predator," the action yarn about a commando leader who battles an unearthly killer in the Central American jungle.

"Predator" took in \$8.22 million. Both films were in their second week of release.

Eddie Murphy's "Beverly Hills Cop II," jumped over the \$100 million mark after taking in \$7.4 million more last weekend. "Cop II," which finished third, has earned \$109.2 million in five weeks for Paramount.

Holding strong at fourth place is Brian DePalma's gangster thriller, "The Untouchables." The adaptation of the popular television series took in \$7.1 million at the box office for a total haul of \$35.8 million in three weeks.

"Roxanne" aided by critical praise, brought in \$4.5 million in its debut weekend to place fifth. The romantic comedy, which stars Steve Martin and Daryl Hannah, is about a latter-day Cyrano de Bergerac who helps another man woo the woman he secretly loves.

Finishing sixth again was "Harry and the Hendersons," the adventure tale of a family who meets Bigfoot and brings him home with them. The movie, produced by Steven Spielberg's Amblin Productions, took in \$3.5 million.

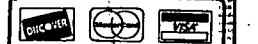

Winfrey combines entertainment with look at problem of illiteracy

When Oprah Winfrey was a child, her father required her to read a book a week. "Most of my success comes from the fact that I was encouraged to read at an early age," she claims. "The road to my success was paved with a literate mind."

And that's the primary reason Winfrey is hosting "A Star-Spangled Celebration," an Independence Day special that combines entertainment with a look at the problem of illiteracy in America. The three-hour special, filmed under the Gateway Arch in St. Louis, airs Saturday, July 4, on ABC.

Winfrey first became interested in the problem of illiteracy in 1985, with her involvement with Project Literacy U.S. (PLUS), an anti-illiteracy campaign sponsored jointly by ABC and PBS. Later, she addressed the problem on "A.M. Chicago," the precursor of her popular syndicated talk show, "The Oprah Winfrey Show."

"I've done several shows on it," she says. "It's very difficult to do, because there's so much shame involved. But if you get people to talk about it, they realize there are millions of people just like them."

The special, the first of four PLUS-sponsored programs, will feature interviews with adults who only recently learned to read. Barbara Bush, wife of Vice President Bush and a prominent PLUS supporter, will appear. And stars such as Elizabeth Taylor have taped messages encouraging adults with literacy problems to seek free tutoring.

But most of the program will be entertainment, supplied by a 200-piece brass band, a 500-member choir and a cast of celebrities that includes co-host Robert Urich, Suzanne Somers, Bernadette Peters, Ben Vereen, Peter Allen and the Radio City Rockettes. Dwight Yoakam and Loretta Lynn will sing a country-music medley, Jennifer Holliday will sing a blues medley, and Chubby Checker will lead the audience in the twist.

"The whole reason I'm doing this is the literacy project," she adds. "This week is like Oprah Winfrey Week — like Overexposure City for me (she also is hosting the Daytime Emmy Awards, which will be airing on ABC on June 30). So I wasn't going to do it — I don't want to be on too much."

"But it's for Project Literacy, a

good cause, so I said yes. I'll leave the Daytime Emmys and fly straight to St. Louis.

"Last Fourth of July, I was at a picnic in some backyard," Winfrey says. "That's where I'd be this year too, except that I was asked to do this."

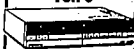

American Playhouse encores with sizzling "Cat On A Hot Tin Roof"

American Playhouse, public television's critically acclaimed weekly drama anthology series, will conclude its sixth season over the Public Broadcasting Service (PBS) on Monday, June 29, at 9 p.m. ET, with an encore presentation of Tennessee Williams' classic American drama, "Cat On A Hot Tin Roof." (The drama was originally broadcast on June 24, 1985.)

The production, directed by Jack Hofsis, stars Academy Award winning actress Jessica Lange, Tommy Lee Jones, Rip Torn, Kim Stanley, Penny Fuller and David Dukes.

When it was first produced 32 years ago, "Cat On A Hot Tin Roof" won both the Pulitzer Prize and the Drama Critics Award as the Best Play of the 1954-55 season. The original production was described by Brooks Atkinson, the legendary drama critic of the New York Times, as "Mr. Williams' finest drama. It faces and speaks the truth."

Since Tennessee Williams' death in 1983, enormous attention has been focused on all of his works, but especially "Cat On A Hot Tin Roof," which has been a successful film (starring Elizabeth Taylor and Paul Newman) as well as an American stage classic.

The American Playhouse/Showtime production of "Cat On A Hot Tin Roof" is based on a revision of the script that the playwright did 12 years ago for the American Shakespeare Theatre at Stratford, Connecticut. The production, which starred Elizabeth Ashley and Keir Dullea, later moved to Broadway and was considered by Williams to be the definitive version of his sexually obsessed drama, which had been softened for its Broadway premiere in 1955.

Director Jack Hofsis believes this production is "a little more feverish" than any preceding it. "I think we've been able to embrace and project the sexuality of the play more strongly than its ever been expressed before," he says. "This is a very elusive play. It is virtually plotless. It just happens. It is so true to life that it gives us ambiguities instead of answers. When you interpret it, you must find a way to make those ambiguities dramatically satisfying. That's what makes it so exciting."

"Cat On A Hot Tin Roof" is a searing drama about a southern family coming apart at the seams. The head of the family, Big Daddy, portrayed by Rip Torn, an Oscar

nominee for his performance in "Cross Creek," is stricken with cancer and the debilitating illness robs him of his power over the family. Kim Stanley, who won an Emmy Award for Best Supporting Actress in this production of "Cat On A Hot Tin Roof," plays the shrill but well-meaning Big Mama. Tommy Lee Jones, an Emmy Award winner for his performance as Gary Gilmore in Norman Mailer's own adaptation of his "Executioner's Song," plays Brick, the son, a former football hero who questions his sexuality when his sex-life with his hot-blooded wife, Maggie, the cat of the title, begins to hit a sour note. Jessica Lange, who won an Oscar for her role as a soap opera actress in "Tootsie," portrays Maggie.

David Dukes and Penny Fuller play Gooper and Mae, Brick's brother and sister-in-law, whom Maggie is struggling to prevent from inheriting Big Daddy's plantation —

"Twenty-eight thousand acres of the richest land this side of the valley Nile."

When it originally opened on Broadway in the mid 1950s, "Cat On A Hot Tin Roof" was considered somewhat shocking even though most of its four-letter words had been watered down to euphemisms and its homosexual theme tempered with ambiguity. It is well known that Williams changed the play considerably to accommodate its director, Elia Kazan, who was anxious about Broadway's reaction to the script's smoldering aspects. At Kazan's insistence, Maggie and Brick were given a reconciliation scene at the end of the play, a decision Williams regretted the rest of his life. In the version telecast on American Playhouse, the fate of Brick and Maggie's relationship is left to the audience's imagination, a denouement which had Williams' stamp of approval.

PBS designs an educational Parents' TV Guide for Kids

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Corporation for Public Broadcasting has put together a guide for parents to use television to help their children learn.

The 20-page pamphlet, titled "TV Tips for Parents," is designed to build awareness and viewership of children's programs on public television as well as increase station membership, CPB said Tuesday.

The guides, available in English and Spanish, advise parents with 10 tips, ranging from setting a child's

TV schedule to making public TV a companion for "latchkey" children to using television to promote writing.

It also includes a list of children's programs available on public stations.

The pamphlet is available free to the public by writing to the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, Box 33039, Washington, D.C., 20033.

The U.S. Department of Education is planning its own television guide for parents in the fall.

Ziering grew up from modeling to new role in "Guiding Light"

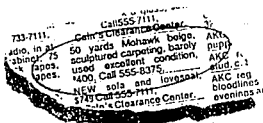

CNN's Mary Alice Williams guards privacy

NEW YORK (AP) — When the seven vice presidents of Cable News Network link up for a conference call, Mary Alice Williams says she has increasingly become the conservative voice, especially when it comes to invasion of privacy.

Having recently gone through a divorce and seen her name in the gossip columns linked to people like playwright Neil Simon, that's an issue close to her heart.

"When you have your own personal crises and newspapers decide to make a big deal out of it, you understand how much that hurts," says Miss Williams, who heads CNN's New York operation and is an anchor for "NewsWatch" from 5 to 6:30 p.m. "When I couldn't go out on a date without a cameraman following, it was very upsetting to me.

And that wasn't serious."

What is serious, she says, is "showing a mike into peoples' faces at ghastly times in their lives."

But the 37-year-old Miss Williams, who started out working part-time in TV news at age 18 in her hometown of Minneapolis, doesn't always get her way at CNN.

When the question arose whether to televise a trial concerning a bar-room rape near Providence, R.I., Miss Williams was against it. "The unfiltered testimony that would come out would be toward the prurient. I couldn't figure out what earthly good that would do."

But the decision went against her, she says, and the mail, especially letters from women, applauded the trial's being televised.

Miss Williams is from a Min-

neapolis family of five children. Her best friend as a toddler was Mary Abigail McCarthy. The mothers called for Mary Alice or Mary Abigail. Miss Williams still doesn't like her name shortened to just Mary.

Q. A retrospective article on Rita Hayworth's career claimed the lovely actress appeared in no less than three different period movies, all set during the Gay Nineties. The only one I can recall is "Down to Earth." What were the others? — F.C.

A. Hey, you're about 2,000,000 light years away! Rita did indeed appear in "Down to Earth," cast as Terpsichore, mythical muse Muse of the dance — a far cry from the Gay Nineties. The trio of films in which she sported nostalgic, turn-of-the-century parasols and hourglass gowns included "The Strawberry Blonde" and "My Gal Sal," both produced in 1942, and "Cover Girl" (made two years later) which, though contemporary in theme, contained flashbacks in which Hayworth acted as her own grandma, circa the year 1890.

Q. What's become of Jerry Brown, the onetime governor of California who used to date singer Linda Ronstadt? Is he still in politics? — M.R.

A. Since leaving the California governor's office, the 49-year-old Brown, who studied for the priesthood before turning to law, has pursued private concerns. His association with Ronstadt is long since a thing of the past. For the last year or so, Brown has been holed up in Japan — alone — more or less finding himself.

Q. Is Marie Osmond upset because of the recent remarks made at her expense by her brother Donny? — M.B.

A. Marie remains as sunny as ever, on the surface. "Life is really great," she enthused to me recently. Marie is working hard at her country-and-western singing career, and is traveling quite a bit — "my home is an airplane," she says. But she's also involved in various charity events — occasionally with brother Donny. Despite the recent furor about his effort to distance himself careerwise from Marie, Donny remains a supportive and loving brother.

MOVIE PILFERAGE: The problem of stealing films to copy for the enormous VCR market has become a major problem for the movie companies. One major studio has started checking the trunk of every fifth car that leaves the lot to make sure no valuable cans of film are on their

Q. Is Dustin Hoffman really as remote and impersonal in private life as he's reputed to be? — F.V.

A. Hoffman? Hardly. Recently, the actor stopped at Serendipity, the trendy Manhattan ice cream parlor, with his daughter (who happens to be dating a young waiter employed at this establishment). On being introduced to the clean-cut lad, Hoffman warmly beamed, "Welcome to the family. It makes me happy to see a nice boy like you working hard!"

ALI TALKS: It looks as though Ali MacGraw is going to write her autobiography — negotiations with a publisher are underway. Hollywood will be anxiously awaiting the juicy details of her marriages to Steve McQueen and Bob Evans.

Q. A local radio deejay well known for his vast fund of film trivia, claimed that Charles Laughton recreated a role in two different sets of historical movies. I'm aware that he reprised his famous interpretation of Henry the VIII created in "The Private Life of Henry VIII" in a second film, "Young Bess." Isn't the deejay misinformed when he states that Laughton played still another historic character twice? — G.R.

A. Methinks it's you who are misinformed. Laughton performed the title role in "Captain Kidd," released in 1945. Seven years later, he spoofed the very same pirate in the wacky B-movie, "Abbott and Costello Meet Captain Kidd." I Kidd you not.

Q. Anything to stories that John Ehrlichman, former assistant to President Nixon who got into trouble in the Watergate scandal, is about

to become a movie actor? — R.R.

A. Ehrlichman has been dabbling in showbiz ever since his infamous Watergate days, without notable success. He's a glib talker and something of a name so he's landed some jobs — like pushing ice cream in TV commercials. His fortunes are looking up, however. Ehrlichman's going back to court — "Divorce Court," that is. He recently taped a segment of the TV show portraying a witness. It was old home week since Ehrlichman and the show's Judge William Keene were once college fraternity brothers.

Q. We were delighted to hear that Joseph Cotten is recovering from a recent stroke. Can he speak as beautifully as he used to? — H.J.

A. Happy to report Cotten, 62, is feeling as good as he looks these days. He's also been pretty busy. His witty autobiography, "Vanity Will Get You Anywhere," is being exceptionally well received. His wife of 26 years, actress Patricia Medina, is at his side. And two film museums have mounted retrospectives of Cotten films. Perhaps best of all, Cotten is articulating beautifully again.

Q. What's this about Clint Eastwood trying to get Nancy Reagan to appear in his next movie? Is he nuts? — A.R.

A. Clint and the First Lady will appear on film together. But it's a non-acting stint that's strictly non-commercial. She'll appear with Eastwood in one of a dozen one-minute spots urging youngsters to say "no" to crack — the cheap and highly addictive form of cocaine. The bits will turn up at movie theaters this summer.

Clark takes viewers back to basics

LOS ANGELES (AP) — If diner food is making a comeback over nouvelle cuisine and big convertibles over compacts, then Dick Clark may have read the trend right with "In Person From The Palace" — live performances of hit music.

"I don't think there is anything terribly new about people performing their music," said Clark in a recent interview, "but it hasn't been presented in this way for 15 years or so. We've been so overwhelmed by the video aspect of the music business."

Clark doesn't care to comment directly on music videos, but he doesn't need to say much. The father of "American Bandstand" has cultural antennae a mile long, and he says it's time to get back to basics.

"In Person From The Palace," from Dick Clark Productions, occupies a time slot reserved for the past few years for syndicated music-video review shows. Clark's 1-hour show airs on KMYT at 11 p.m. on Friday. Rock journalist and drummer Bobby Colomby is host.

"He came to our attention by knowing who he was from his days with Blood, Sweat and Tears, for what he knows about the business, and for his work on the 'CBS Morning Show,'" said Larry Klein, the producer of "In Person."

Clark also said Colomby was chosen because he's astute enough "not to ask questions like, 'What's your favorite color?'"

Colomby was the drummer for Blood, Sweat and Tears, the group that combined a big-band sound with rock music during the late 1960s and

had such hits as "Spinning Wheel," and "You've Made Me So Very Happy."

"In Person" is taped at the Palace nightclub in Hollywood before an audience, and performers thus far have included the Beastie Boys; Cyndi Lauper, Anita Baker and Wang Chung, among others.

Unlike "Bandstand," where the focus was on the audience and the performances were lip-synched, Klein said about 90 percent of "In Person" performances are live to tape.

"It isn't anything other than straight-ahead music," said Clark. "There are no comedy sequences, there are no videos, there are no tap dancers, no jugglers. It's really not a complicated device."

Clark said the show may be a revelation to a new generation of viewers

raised on music videos.

"It has the same formula for the success of the 'In Concert' series that we and Don Kirshner did for ABC," said Clark. That series was part of the "ABC Late Night" entertainment lineup during the early 1970s.

"The music has now returned to the artist, away from the film director. What you've seen in the last four or five years is music through the eyes of a director," Clark said.

"We looked at the opportunities available to us, and obviously it wasn't to follow along in the video path," said Clark of the show's development. "The only thing you could do, by reasonable business research, is see that the concert business is on the upswing. Therefore, why not translate that into television?"

Translating trends into television has served Clark well. The taste for awards shows led his production company to produce the highly rated "American Music Awards" and the "Academy of Country Music Awards."

Clark earlier this year put "American Bandstand" into syndication after 30 years on ABC, after the network suggested trimming the show from one hour to a half-hour.

"We said, 'It's an hour program, folks. It's been nice, but we'll finish up the 30 years and go on our merry way in syndication,'" Clark said. "The show is doing very well. I believe, certainly by the end of the year, we'll be on more stations than were on ABC, and at more advantageous time periods."

Networks complain about "people meters"

NEW YORK (AP) — Television network executives called Friday for an industry-wide rejection of the Nielsen "people-meter" system until an independent, cooperative analysis ensures the new audience measurement system is accurate.

"We need to know what is going on here before we pass the point of no return," said Bill Rubens, NBC vice president for research.

All of the big three commercial networks have refused to sign with Nielsen for next fall, when the company plans to institute the new system to determine not just how many people are watching television, but also each viewer's sex and age.

In the meantime, CBS has signed with AGB Research, a Nielsen com-

petitor.

The networks want Nielsen to continue its current metering system, which simply records what channel the television is tuned to, in conjunction with people meters for at least a year. Nielsen has resisted the idea for competitive reasons.

Not only is the European-based AGB establishing a people-meter system, but so is Arbitron, the well-known measurer of local station ratings. Arbitron's system is to be ready in 1988.

Speaking to the Advertising Research Foundation, Rubens called for a summit meeting of advertisers, broadcasters and ratings services to determine why test data from people meters vary, often widely, from the current Nielsen data.

"An untried measurement system can't be the underpinning for a \$3 billion investment," said David Poltrack, CBS vice president for research, referring to the value of the advertising the networks sell in one season.

Networks have begun marketing their shows for next season based on estimated ratings, but Rubens said NBC didn't use the people-meter for its Saturday-morning shows because there are not enough children participating in the system.

The networks say children can't be relied upon to punch in and punch out on the people meter, a hand-held device that resembles a remote control.
