## Fewer teenagers sought work in June U.S. jobless rate lowest since 1970s

WASHINGTON — Fewer teenagers seeking summer work slowed the nation's civilian unemployment rate in June to 6.1 percent, the lowest it has been since the 1970s, despite a paltry increase of only 116,000 new jobs, the government said Thursday.

286,000 to 7,260,000 — the lowest it has been since March 1980 — a decline in the seasonally adjusted labor force of nearly 500,000 people was responsible, for virtually all of the rate decrease.

"Teen-agers" accounted for more than two-thirds of the decline in the number of job-seekers, the bureau said. That dropped the jobless rate among teenagers almost two percentage points to 15.9 percent. For black teens, the unemployment rate dropped nearly six percentage points to 33.3 percent, the lowest it has been in 13 years.

## Reagan seeks solid barrier to tax hikes

WASHINGTON — President Reagan, seeking to make it harder to increase taxes, today will propose amending the U.S. Constitution so that tax increases could be imposed only with the approval of an unspecified "super" majority of Congress, a senior White House official said Thursday.

The president will make the proposals in a speech outlining an "Economic Bill of Rights" at the Jefferson Memorial, at the start of the Independence-Day holiday in Washington.

As outlined by the White House official, who spoke on the condition of anonymity, the four elements of the so-called Economic Bill of Rights focus on a constitutional amendment requiring the federal budget to be balanced; greater emphasis on the private sector in the national economy; freer markets and greater world competitiveness in trade; and a reduction of government regulation of the economy.

The address is intended to draw attention to the White House economic program and its fight with Congress over the federal budget — at a time when the Senate and House are hailing an imposing tax cuts. Reagan is seeking Congress has just passed a \$1 trillion budget that would spend more on domestic programs, and less on defense, than Reagan has sought.

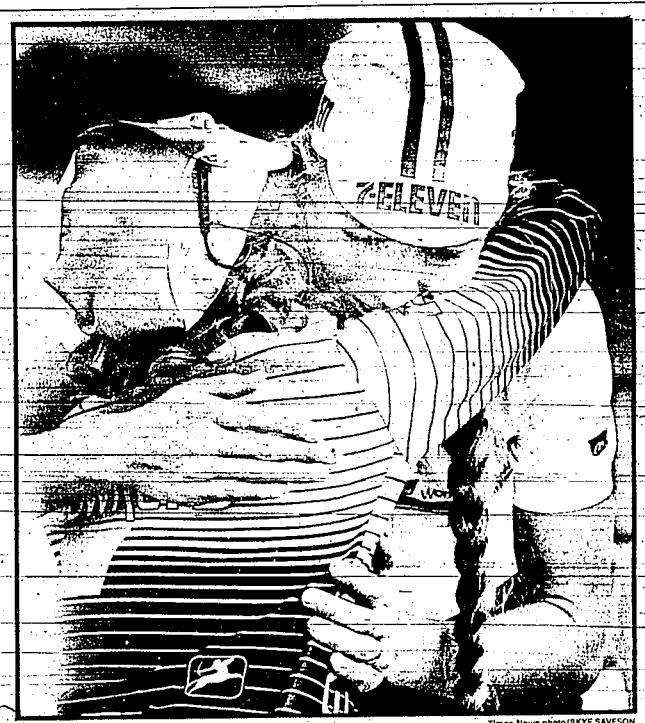

"I believe this is our path out of this problem," Health and Welfare director Rich Donovan said Thursday in releasing the 104-page EPICS Recovery Plan.

The plan is aimed at eliminating glitches in the \$8 million Eligibility Programs Integrated Computer System that have delayed welfare payments to thousands of Idaho residents and had citizens' groups up in arms since last fall.

The recovery plan calls for spending almost \$2 million to correct hardware, software and administrative problems with the system, with a goal of having the distribution of welfare benefit payments to all full speed by the end of October — about a year after EPICS first came on-line.

"The primary responsibility I see for this entire term is to get benefits out any way we can," Donovan said. Allen Karhonen, administrator of the department's Division of Welfare, said the system should be ready for a federal certification review by the end of the year. But that's contingent on funding for the recovery plan, the costs of which will be split equally, \$982,482 each, between federal and state government.

"We're taking everything we can within the department's power to whittle this figure down," Donovan said. "But I don't think we have the necessary resources right now."

## Heat kills 18 aliens riding inside locked boxcar

SIERRA BLANCA, Texas — Eighteen illegal aliens trapped in a locked, overheated boxcar were found dead in a stifling, 120-degree temperatures Thursday in what authorities called a botched smuggling effort.

They were dehydrated," said William Harrington, assistant chief patrol agent for the Border Patrol. "There's blood on the floor," Williams said. "Some of their tongues are chewed, their mouths are chewed. It's a gruesome sight."

Williams said the temperatures in the boxcar probably exceeded 120 degrees and the victims apparently died from the heat. The bodies of the aliens were found about 3 a.m. MDT during a routine Border Patrol inspection of boxcars.

A 19th man survived by using a spike to punch a hole through the floor and breathe through the U.S. Border Patrol in El Paso. Others apparently tried to claw through the wood-lined door.

The aliens had boarded an eastbound Missouri Pacific freight train late Wednesday afternoon at El Paso, about 90 miles west of Sierra Blanca on the Texas-Mexico border, Williams said. They apparently were making their way to the Dallas-Fort Worth area, he said.

"I could hear (the survivor's) pleas for help. 'Please help us. We need help!'" said Stanley Saathoff, Border Patrol supervisory agent. "I opened the door and saw him standing at the end of the door. He was very wet and in his underwear, crying some, visibly shook."

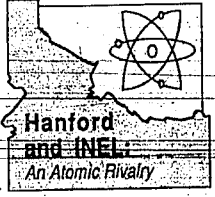

## LaRouche facing obstruction count

BOSTON — Extremist presidential candidate Lyndon LaRouche conspired to stymie federal investigations into an alleged \$1 million credit card scam used to finance his 1984 campaign, the government charged in an indictment unsealed Thursday.



The indictment said LaRouche tried to obstruct a grand jury investigation by ordering his followers in five the country, to spread documents and to stall federal agents through a variety of tactics, including making false statements.

LaRouche, who was returned to West Germany after testifying before the grand jury Monday, told CBS-TV in a telephone interview — that prosecutors were "cooking up something out of rumors and whistles and interpretations."

LaRouche, who has said he is seeking the 1988 Democratic presidential nomination, faces up to five years in prison and a \$250,000 fine if convicted at a trial, scheduled to begin Sept. 21.

The charge of obstruction of justice adds to a list of "obstruction of justice" charges that LaRouche has been charged in the alleged credit card fraud and obstruction scheme.

## Balloon sets distance record

**CARRABASSETT VALLEY, Maine (AP)** — A British tycoon and a Swedish-born balloonist broke a distance record Thursday by sped along at up to 142 miles in 40 hours as they attempted the first Atlantic crossing in a hot-air balloon.

Traveling far faster than expected, Richard-Bronson and Per Lindstrand covered the first 1,000 miles of their 3,400-mile journey in a little more than 40 hours. They broke the distance mark for hot-air balloons at 907 miles while passing about 140 miles southeast of St. John's, Newfoundland, at 27,900 feet.

"It has been the most spectacular and magnificent flight," Bronson said by radio. "When we arrived, 47,000 feet we hit the very cold weather about 40 below zero. There was an enormous cloud behind us that created a massive vapor trail. For a moment I thought the balloon was on fire."

The balloons maintained their early speed, they would reach their destination — Great Britain — in about 40 hours, said Jim Mitchell, a spokesman for the flight.

## Haiti drops election decree

**PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP)** — The government Thursday night revoked an election decree which triggered a general strike that shut down Haitian cities for the third time this week.

Four people died in clashes with soldiers on Thursday and at least 17 others were injured.

## Few seek amnesty, INS says

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Only a fraction of the estimated 3 million people eligible for the government's one-year amnesty offer have come forward and applied, according to a report released Thursday.

By the end of June, two months into the program, 204,000 illegal aliens had applied for temporary legal status, the Immigration and Naturalization Service says.

"This lack of participation is not only unfortunate, since it means that many aliens are not taking advantage of an extraordinary opportunity, but it also has the potential to jeopardize the entire legalization program," Rep. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., said in releasing his report.

Legalization, or amnesty, was part of the comprehensive immigration reforms approved by Congress last fall after a decade of compromise.

## Violence erupts in Panama

**PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP)** — Hundreds of people demonstrated against the military Thursday morning and set fire to a building owned by the publishers of an opposition newspaper while riot police watched.

A few hours later, authorities ordered Radio Mundial, a privately owned opposition station, indefinitely closed for allegedly inciting public disorders.

Police, issued the order taking the radio off the air, claiming that fiery anti-government manifestos broadcast June 30 were a violation of the country's penal code.

It was the second day of protest after the government lifted a state of emergency Tuesday.

Riot police clashed with students Thursday morning near the University of Panama. Witnesses said they saw several injured students and police took others away.

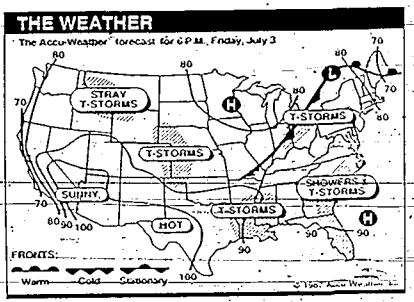

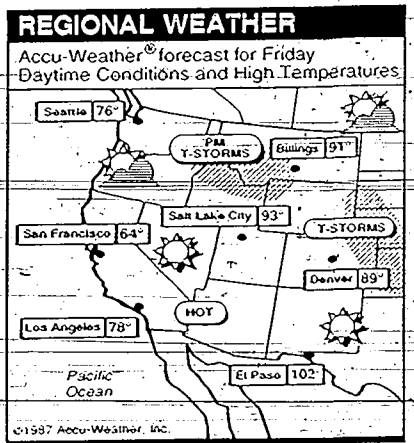

on the other indicated some had tried to break through the wood that underlaid steel.

"It is definitely an organized smuggling effort," Williams said, assuming that some of the aliens were planning on riding the train on the outside, in a different boxcar, with the idea of opening it up the first chance they spotted. But he haven't got any proof.

"Obviously, it was a terrible and tragic mistake to do this, and we are working on trying to find out who that individual was from the surveillance," said Williams.

Two guides and a smuggler accompanied the aliens, Williams said. The guides, also believed to be illegal aliens, got into the boxcar and the smuggler unlocked it from the outside, he said.

The survivor, Miguel Tostado Rodriguez, 21, was examined by a doctor in the town of Van Horn and taken to the hospital. He was placed in a room with other inmates, piece together what happened.

# Groups launch studies of pension fund investment strategy

LEWISTON (AP) — Organizations representing thousands of current and retired state workers have launched an independent study of investment strategies for public pension funds amid the continuing battle between Gov. Cecil Andrus and a majority on the Public Employees Retirement System board.

Since the money in the \$1.2 billion state pension trust earmarked for those 61,000 workers "We have an interest in the situation and will continue to inquire," Idaho Education Association Director James

Shackelford said. Officials of the IEA and four other public employee organizations will meet July 13 with Robert H. Venn, executive director of the retirement system, Shackelford said.

At that time, a number of options on the future course of the employee-groups' study will be considered. Among them are consultation with banking industry officials and a possible meeting with state banks and an out-of-state firm should manage the fund.

The employee organizations have agreed on a common goal of ensuring the largest return possible on each pension dollar invested, and if that can be done with Idaho banks, the groups would support the governor, Shackelford said.

Joining the IEA in the investment study were the Idaho Public Employees Association, the AFSCIO, the Service Employees International Union and the Retired Teachers Association.

Andrus has been in a running battle with the pension board since late last year when it voted unanimously to shift management of most of the retirement fund from four Idaho banks to the Frank Russell Trust Co. of Tacoma, Wash.

The board cited an extremely poor earnings performance of the fund under the stewardship of the banks and the prospect of an increase of as much as \$41 million in earnings with the Russell Trust in control.

But Andrus has contended control of such a significant amount of money should not be moved outside the state, particularly at a time when Idaho is pressing to breathe new life into its stagnant economy.

When the board refused to follow his desires, Andrus replaced one board member and is replacing another next week, declaring that he will continue putting new people on the board until he has a majority to work his will. But unless one of the remaining members changes his mind, it will be another year before any of their terms expires and Andrus can replace them.

### No health problems on record

COTTONWOOD (AP) — State officials say a 21-year-old inmate who collapsed and died while jogging at the North Idaho Correctional Institution had no previous record of health problems.

Preliminary indications are that Robert Lloyd Ginter, 21, died of acute pulmonary edema on Saturday, said Robert R. Gates, deputy attorney general assigned to the corrections department at Boise.

### C of I accreditation affirmed

CALDWELL (AP) — The College of Idaho has had its accreditation reaffirmed by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges.

Gov. Cecil Andrus, chairman of the private Caldwell school's Board of Trustees, said Thursday that the action means the four-year liberal arts college has received a total academic and financial review and come through with flying colors.

### Laxalt plans to visit Boise

BOISE (AP) — Former Nevada senator Paul Laxalt will be in Boise next Tuesday to talk to supporters and campaign workers about his possible Republican presidential candidacy.

Secretary of State Pete Cenarrusa and Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, are co-chairmen of Laxalt's Idaho campaign committee. Laxalt had planned to attend the International Basque Cultural Festival, or Jaialdi, in Boise last month, but had to cancel because of a scheduling conflict.

"Laxalt's credentials and understanding of the West make him a natural choice for Idaho," Cenarrusa and Craig said in a news release. "This visit combined with the interest in his candidacy will make for a dynamic and effective campaign organization."

The announcement of his visit came the day after three other top Idaho Republicans announced the formation of a state exploratory committee for the presidential candidacy of Kansas Senator Robert Dole. Sen. Steve Symms, Attorney General Jim Jones and state Treasurer Lydia Justice Edwards all are in the Dole camp.

### Medical care basis for suit

BOISE (AP) — An inmate who says he has tested positive for the AIDS virus has filed a lawsuit in 4th District Court in Boise alleging he is not receiving adequate medical care.

David Cartwright, who is seeking an indeterminate life sentence for lewd and lascivious conduct, said in the lawsuit filed against the Department of Corrections that he is supposed to see a doctor every six weeks. But the suit said he hasn't been examined for six months.

He alleges in the suit that his treatment amounts to cruel and unusual punishment, which he said would violate his constitutional rights.

Prison officials on Thursday declined comment, and would not say whether their records show Cartwright as having tested positive for the virus that causes acquired immunodeficiency syndrome. However, Dr. Kelly Mutch, Corrections Department medical director, said Monday that only one inmate has been found with the AIDS virus.

### Idaho Guard sued over deaths

BOISE (AP) — The parents and relatives of four New Mexican freighters killed last summer in a truck crash have filed suit in 4th District Court against the Idaho National Guard and two National Guard members who were driving the truck.

The freighters were part of an 18-member crew from Jemez Pueblo, N.M., who were fighting a fire in the Boise National Forest in August. A truck carrying two guardsmen from Eastern Idaho, a liaison officer from Albuquerque, N.M., and the crew crashed while in transit to a rest camp on Aug. 21.

## Network of sabotage tied to trail spikes

SALMON (AP) — The spiked boards found buried last week along a popular trail in the Lemhi Mountains south of Leadore are only a portion of what Forest Service officials say is a network of environmental sabotage in the region's national forests.

The spikes, nails pounded through and protruding about one inch above 1-by-4 boards buried just under the trail surface, were found by a forest trail crew during routine maintenance. Five boards containing about 20 nails each were found along a three-mile stretch of trail.

Jim Guest, forest branch chief of range, recreation, wildlife and watershed programs, said it was the first known incident of environmental sabotage in the Salmon National Forest.

The trail, located a few miles south of Leadore, is a 2-mile-long Timber Creek trail within a 180,000-acre tract in northern Lemhi Mountains proposed for wilderness designation by the Idaho Conservation League and the Idaho Wildlands Defense Council.

The ICL offered a \$500 reward for information leading to the conviction of those responsible for the spiking. Director Mary Kelly said no "responsible conservationists" in Idaho, or in organization or any other, would conduct or condone such idiotic action.

## Fires at Boise started by 'incendiary devices'

BOISE (AP) — Arsonists used some sort of "incendiary device" to start a string of devastating fires in the foothills northeast of Boise this week, Bureau of Land Management investigators determined Thursday.

"It appears that someone or some group of people are starting these fires by throwing an incendiary device from a moving vehicle," BLM spokesman Larry Rose said.

A rash of fires Monday night burned more than 2,000 acres, destroyed a city fire truck, a \$150,000 house, two Mercedes-Benz cars, a Porsche and a pickup truck, and forced the evacuation of dozens of local residents.

The city and BLM spent an estimated \$70,000 to fight the fires. Rose said two more fires were reported in the foothills Wednesday night. They were controlled without any damage to structures.

"We need help," Rose said. "We need to know if someone up there has seen anything suspicious, any moving vehicles, anything out of the ordinary up there."

He said investigators had determined that all this week's fires had been set by the same person or group of people using the same type of device.

"What that device is I don't know," Rose said. "It was not matches. It's some sort of ignition device they're throwing from a car. I wouldn't call it a fire bomb. We have a lot of this stuff still being analyzed in the laboratory."

He urged anyone with information about the origin of the fires to call the BLM at 334-5323 or Crime Stoppers at 343-2677.

## New post office site sparks battle at Rigby

RIGBY (AP) — Residents in Rigby are protesting the decision of the U.S. Postal Service to build the new post office on the outskirts of town despite city efforts to keep the facility downtown.

But the Postal Service's regional manager says the site is the most logical reason why they should build the post office out there, said Gene Purser, a Rigby businessman who was among several dozen protesters picketing the current downtown post office on late Wednesday.

Residents claim the postal service has ignored them in the two-year site selection process, and they dispute the government's contention that the new post office would be less expensive to construct at the site on the edge of town. They argue the new site would be inconvenient, particularly for senior citizens.

Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, has been trying to convince Postal Service officials to travel to Rigby to discuss the problem, but the Postal Service has only offered to meet with town leaders in Salt Lake City, an offer that has been rejected.

City officials and civic leaders have offered some free land and free water and sewer hookups if an alternative site to get the new facility located downtown.

But Postal Service Regional Manager Bill Takemoto said the building had taken all things into consideration. As far as he is concerned the decision to build the post office is final and protests will not change that decision.

"We need to make the postal service more responsive," said Davenport to come and meet with the mayor. They haven't taken time to come and meet with the mayor, city council and citizens," said City Attorney Keith Walker.

Davenport said the proposed downtown location had concerned post office officials because of possible toxic waste from underground gas storage tanks near the site. But Mayor Keith Scott said the people who currently own the land have promised to take care of any problems in that area.

### SIS offers bridge into next century

Earlier this year, The Times-News raised questions about the proposed Special Isotope Separator for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory near Idaho Falls. We felt, at that time, that the cons of building the project outweighed the pros.

Today, we change our position and give the proposal a qualified endorsement, chiefly on the grounds that it would provide an important technological bridge for INEL into the 21st century.

In doing so, we do not express any fondness for nuclear weapons production, which the SIS is designed to enhance. Like most people, we think there are plenty in the world and we would like nothing better than to see a nuclear treaty between the United States and the Soviet Union which would make their large numbers unnecessary.

Nor do we agree with INEL officials that such issues are irrelevant at the local level and thus, should not stand in the way of the SIS development.

Local communities have a right to express their opinion on all subjects of local and national importance and we see nothing wrong with a robust and continuing debate on these issues.

But given the fact that the SIS will be built somewhere, we think Idaho should examine the project carefully and make a measured bid for it.

Our chief reason is economic. The SIS would help — but not assure — INEL's present work force. Without it, or some other large substitute, that work force may well drop sharply in the 1990s, with resulting consequences throughout Idaho.

What is unknown is how long an SIS project would remain viable. Even its supporters acknowledge that it would last less than a decade; at least as a facility designed to refine weapons-grade plutonium. What it would be used for beyond that point is unknown.

The main caveat here is that the SIS project is, in effect, a bridge from INEL's present technological role as primarily a commercial, nuclear research facility to one with a far larger defense role.

With the SIS, the missions of INEL would be heavily tipped in the direction of defense contracting, something which has not existed to a large extent in Idaho before. The implication of that is something all Idahoans should consider:

There are pros and cons to that expanded role. But to rule out a project like the SIS simply because of opposition to nuclear war (who, indeed, favors nuclear war?) strikes us as short-sighted.

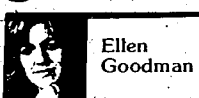
## Choice of high court nominee means abortion fight

BOSTON — Kate Michelman was in the middle of her talk, a stock speech on how important the 1988 presidential campaign would be for reproductive rights, when everything changed. Someone handed her a note saying that Supreme Court Justice Lewis Powell had resigned.

Suddenly, Michelman, head of the National Abortion Rights Action League, was looking straight into her own worst scenario, the one penned in the most hyperbolic of the League's newsletters. Ronald Reagan, enemy of women's rights to abortion, now had the chance to appoint the justice who could wipe that right.

By late the same night, Michelman had heard that three women supporters, including her three grown daughters, who were, she says, "all shocked at the reality they faced." Despite the fact that the overwhelming majority of Americans—including 72 percent of Republicans—continue to support choice, "it could happen that we wouldn't have legal abortion."

Powell had not been the perfect pro-choice justice. The man in the middle had

cast the swing vote against Medicaid funding for poor women and had devised a compromise that left standing parental consent laws for minors. But when the chips were down, he had voted with the shrinking majority that continued to support the reason for the 1983 Roe v. Wade decision. He believed that there was a right of privacy in the Constitution and that it protected "this most recognized and essential element of personal liberty."

What will happen now? When Atty. Gen. Edwin Meese recently told an audience that the administration has no plans to test for its Court candidate, it all sounded bleak. There is a test and it's anti-abortion. The leading contender for the job, Appeals Court Judge Robert Bork, passes

with flying colors. He has called the Court's use of the privacy argument in Roe "judicial imperialism."

The scenarios for a new court that will emerge from a Reagan appointment range from bad to catastrophic. The good news is that no one believes the Supreme Court would define the fetus as a human being. The current justices are split four to four on abortion as a constitutional right, but the four dissenters don't all agree with each other.

It is possible that a new court would merely take its now relatively erudite right to abortion by limiting access. It's possible they would merely uphold an increasingly long and obstructive list of state regulations governing consent forms, medical procedures, rules that limit when and under what conditions women can have abortions. There are 200 cases about such regulations now in the courts. One of them, testing an Illinois statute, comes up before the Supreme Court next fall.

It's also possible that the new court would overturn Roe altogether, finding no

constitutional guarantee for abortion. That would throw the issue back to the states. The 50 state legislatures and the state courts would have to decide individually whether abortion would once more become illegal.

There is no record of a democratic country reinstating a ban on abortion. Socialist countries (Rumania) or fascist countries (Nazi Germany) have done so. History, like public opinion, is in the direction of allowing women the choice of abortion.

But as Kathleen Sullivan, a constitutional law professor at Harvard, warns: "We could go back to a patchwork where there are free states and criminal states. We could go back to the pre-Roe days when the right to a legal abortion hinged on whether a woman could afford a plane ticket to New York or California. Abortion would be illegal in some places, merely impossible in others."

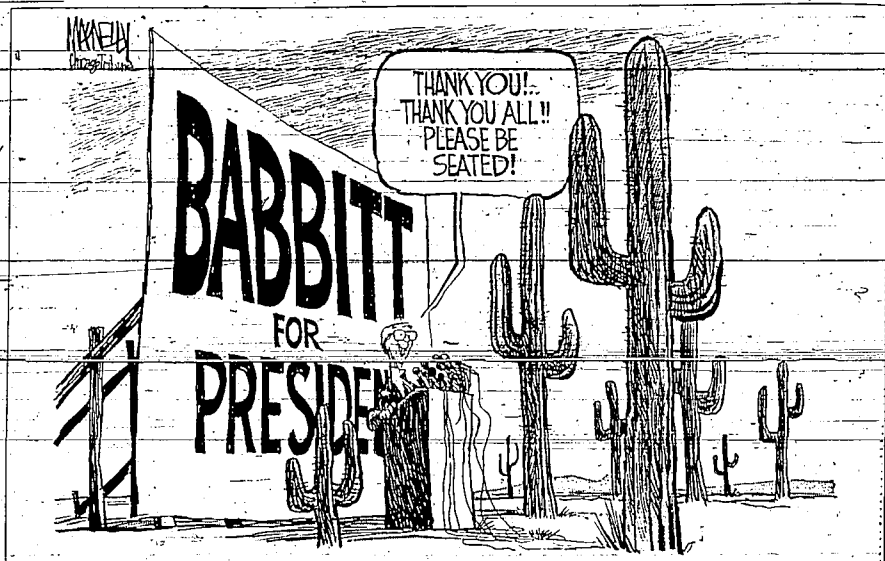
I don't want to write as if this were a fait accompli. Justice can surprise us and their Presidents. More to the point, any nominee

must be confirmed by the Senate; one out of every five is rejected. Joe Biden (D-Del.), the chair of the Judiciary Committee, has had a mixed record on abortion, but he is running for the Democratic nomination for President.

Civil-rights and women's-rights groups are gearing up for a major fight. "The next appointee stands between us and a radically different life in this country," says Michelman. "This will be an all-out, no-stops battle if the President nominates a right-wing ideologue." Every member of the Senate will be held accountable.

Nevertheless, it's gloomily believed that the President has found a winning Supreme Court candidate, and that candidate has privately or publicly passed the big test. So, says Prof. Sullivan, "We can't declare the day of legal abortion is over, but it's going to be in-for-some-rough-times." And these times begin right now.

## Consider a life-giving technology

The view is spectacular! Our plane had just taken off from the Tri-Cities airport at Pasco, Wash., in route to Seattle, and I was marveling at the checkerboard and circular mosaic of greens and yellows created by the miracle of modern irrigated agriculture. Truly, as Isaiah had long ago predicted, this was the age in which "the desert shall rejoice and blossom."

But the scene was replaced by another that was equally awesome. As we crossed over the Columbia River from east to west the contrasting landscape was like day and night, worse like life and death. Whereas the east side of the river was a lush and beautiful, the west side was a lifeless desert little better than a dusty moonscape.

"Why is there no agriculture on the west side of the river?" I asked myself. The answer soon loomed into sight. The west bank was the location of Hanford, a 570 square mile site consisting of plutonium reactors, radioactive waste dumps, and a 120 square mile area dedicated to the study of environmental research, research concerned with the interaction of radiation and plant and animal life.

As fate would have it, the passenger seated next to me was a lieutenant colonel in the Air Force Reserve who lived in the Tri-Cities area. I struck up a conversation.

"So, that's the infamous Hanford plant that's attracted national media coverage. How do the folks here really feel about it?" I asked.

"Well, there are a few farmers and horticultural groups that have started up quite a controversy over the radioactive contaminants distributed by the plant," he answered. "But most people here view it as a necessary facility and will accept the risks that go with it. Besides, a lot of people in the Tri-Cities work there and aren't about to jeopardize their jobs by opposing the plant."

"So you think that the dangers of excessive radiation being given off by the plant are not as great as the farmers and horticultural groups say?" I queried.

"Not really," answered the colonel. "Sure, the

plant gives off low levels of radiation, but not enough to cause problems. Besides, research shows that low doses actually stimulates the human body. In reality, all the media attention given to Hanford is similar to the media blitz given to the Asynx Nation incident in Idaho. As usual, the media made a big issue over a little thing!"

I told him about the growing concern over the Special Isotopes Separation Plant planned for the SIS project. It is really unnecessary, and the very great plutonium created at the plant could pose certain risks. What's your view on this?" I asked.

"Well, our scientists and engineers are able to handle radioactive products quite safely today," he answered. "But to be quite honest, the transportation of these products from eastern Idaho to Hanford is a real concern. If a truck breaks down, is hijacked or has an accident it could pose a real danger to people and the environment. But those are risks that we have to take if we wish to keep our nation free."

I had a lot of other questions that I wanted to raise but thought it best to drop the subject. Like the employees at Hanford and the communities which benefited economically because of the plant, the Lt. Colonel also had a stake in such enterprises. After all, he was being paid by the Department of Defense.

So why should he accept the fact that the media, in drawing attention to issues like Hanford and the Aryan Nations, might ultimately help prevent a disaster like the Chernobyl incident or Hitler's Nazi experiment?"

Why should he agree with Dr. Robert Gale, the American physician who treated Chernobyl victims, that the possibility of a major nuclear disas-

ter like a core meltdown is 50 percent over the next 20 years, a possibility based on studies by the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission?

And to discuss the immorality of the excessive economic and physical dangers of the arms race itself seemed pointless. After all, if we banned all nuclear weapons tomorrow it wouldn't insure a world peace. People would simply resort to other means of self and social destruction, like biological or chemical warfare, electronic warfare, the use of lasers and solar rays or even the possibilities of using hurricanes, snow and changing weather, coming under the heading of "meteorological" warfare. All these are now part of our "war technology" research and development programs.

So what is the answer to this dilemma, or is there one?

As Dr. Sitomovskoy once noted, "There's no evil in the atom; only in men's souls." The truth of this statement lies in the fact that humanity has always paid more attention to war than to peace. Consequently, mankind is much more knowledgeable about the nature of war than that of peace; the scientific community is engaged more in the science and technology of war than of peace; and the business and governmental leaders of the world are much more committed to financing a technology of war than a technology of peace.

I believe that the time has come to shift our economic, educational and scientific priorities from further building up a technology of war to creating a much needed technology of peace. If we in Idaho don't want greater than a half a lifeless moonscape that surrounds Hanford and seduces the people of the Tri-Cities then we should urge our leaders to begin thinking about the kinds of economic and social development programs that will say yes to a life-giving technology of peace. We might begin by re-allocating a portion of the \$800 million designated for the SIS project to attract some progressive new business to Jerome. What have we got to lose?

MAYPORT NAVAL STATION, Fla. (AP) — The families of 44 sailors from the USS Stark greeted the crewmen with hugs, kisses, tears and homemade signs on their arrival home Thursday, six weeks after the frigate was attacked in the Persian Gulf.

The C-41 Air Force cargo plane lumbered into Mayport Naval Station about 2:40 p.m. MDT and was immediately boarded by several Navy officers who went aboard the windowless aircraft to brief the men about leave.

"It's like having my own children back after I lost them for awhile," Rear Adm. Michael Kallers, commander of Cruiser-Destroyer Group 12, said after their arrival.

Kallers said the 42 crewmen and two officers, whom he described as

# U.S. delays mine search helicopters

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon is delaying plans to send helicopters to Kuwait while Saudi Arabia attempts to organize regional forces to complete removal of at least 11 mines apparently laid by Iran off the main Kuwaiti harbor, administration sources said.

Saudi Arabia has four U.S.-made minesweepers, and is "trying to organize a force from a number of other Persian Gulf states, rather than introduce a lot more U.S. or Western equipment," said one Pentagon source who, like others interviewed, spoke on condition of anonymity.

The Dutch government has also offered the use of a minesweeper in the gulf, but those arrangements were under negotiation, according to officials of the Defense and State Departments.

While the diplomatic maneuvering continued, the Pentagon also delayed plans to fly sonar equipment from Rota, Spain, to assist in the effort to search for and remove mines, a Pentagon source said.

An 18-member "Explosion Ordnance Disposal" team, operating from small craft, continued to patrol waters off the main Kuwaiti port of Al-Ahmedi to locate new mines and either remove or mark the 11 mines already found.

There were conflicting reports on how many mines had actually been removed, with some sources saying that all or most were gone, and others saying that one had been detonated and another removed by U.S. frogmen.

The mines were identified as Soviet-made Mark-60's, believed to be made by North Korea, which has been one of the major suppliers of arms during the bloody seven-year Iran-Iraq conflict.

The Navy had planned to send a squadron of MH-53E Sea Dragon helicopters, a variant of the EH-53D Super Stallion, from their base in Norfolk-Van to Kuwait to deal with the mine threat, sources said.

While the helicopters remained in the United States, the Pentagon bolstered its naval force in and around the Persian Gulf this week with the cruiser's Reeves and Worden, which had been assigned to the Indian Ocean fleet.

# NEA wants fast AIDS education drive

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The nearly 800 teachers at the National Education Association convention called Thursday for a crash drive to put AIDS education and prevention programs in place in all schools in the coming school year.

The delegates overwhelmingly approved a resolution that calls for frank instruction "about prevention options, including 'abstinence and medically accepted protective devices.'"

"We as educators have a responsibility not only to teach students how to succeed, but to teach them how to survive," said Nancy J. Finklestein, the president of the Massachusetts Teachers Association, who offered the proposal.

Earlier, the delegates gave NEA President Mary Hatwood Futrell a standing ovation when she said teachers "are going to war" in 1988 to replace the Reagan administration with "the first education president."

Education of Teachers, out of business and to launch a 5-year, \$10 million drive to increase its school reform foundation.

The union's executive director, Don Cameron, released an NEA-sponsored Gallup poll that he said showed "an overwhelming majority

of the U.S. public — 80 percent — believe teachers should be paid more for the work they do."

But the percentage of people willing to pay higher taxes to raise teachers' salaries dropped sharply, from 54 to 43 percent, from a similar poll last year, Cameron said he was at a loss to explain the erosion of support.

U.S. Secretary of Education William J. Bennett issued a statement blasting the NEA, saying, "The NEA leadership has long since lost any legitimacy to speak in behalf of the quality of American education."

"The AIDS resolution urges the establishment of a comprehensive AIDS-prevention program in schools and colleges during the 1987-88 year."

"These programs should be developed at the local level by educators, administrators, parents and community representatives," Futrell said.

The Massachusetts affiliate last month called for making condoms available to all students in grades 7-12. Finklestein said, "We made a conscious decision not to bring that controversial position here."

The delegates also urged school boards to ban possession or use of tobacco products by students on school grounds.

Futrell left little doubt that the NEA's ideal candidate looks nothing like Ronald Reagan as she spelled out the union's specifications for the next occupant of the White House.

"In 1988, the voters of America finally rejected voodoo economics. In 1988 they will reject voodoo education," she said. "In 1988 we will elect the first education president."

She said Americans have watched the world "becoming more complex, more competitive and more dangerous as their leaders become more confused and more reactionary."

She said the NEA's political action committee ranked third behind the American Medical Association and the National Realtors Association in political contributions in 1986, when it took in \$1.7 million.

"In 1988 we will be No. 1. We will have the biggest campaign war in a war for a better future for the children of America," Futrell said.

Several Democratic presidential hopefuls planned to journey here to court the teachers. The NEA plans to make its endorsements in December.

# Hodel orders new oil lease plan in effect

WASHINGTON (AP) — Interior Secretary Donald Hodel has ordered the department's new five-year leasing plan for oil and gas on the Outer Continental Shelf, the department announced Thursday.

Hodel made no changes from the final draft published in April.

Hodel's signature means that the schedule of lease sales and areas that may be offered are now fixed and may be changed only by sale.

Areas that the secretary has ruled closed to exploration may not be opened until the end of the five-year plan, though additional areas may be ruled off limits in the 38 planned lease auctions as each proceeds.

"These sub-area deferrals cover some 213 million acres and will not be considered for any sale in this five-year plan," Hodel said.

All "federal waters cover about a billion acres.

Federal offshore leasing, frequently opposed by environmentalists worried about spills and

onshore interests concerned about the "impacts" on coastal communities, has been controversial for decades, particularly so after the 1969 Santa Barbara, Calif. oil spill.

The Interior appropriations bill passed by the House includes a ban on spending money to offer the area around the Georges Bank fishing grounds off Massachusetts. California opponents are still seeking some way to close off most of their coast, though they did not seek an appropriations ban this year.

In Los Angeles, the department issued its call for information and nomination of tracts by the industry for a sale of Tracts off California scheduled for September, 1989.

The southern California area, originally 300 million acres, was reduced by Hodel to 14.4 million acres and the department's Minerals Management Service has further reduced the area of potential drilling to about 5 million acres, said spokesman Tom Detlefer.

# ICC puts tentative OK on merger of bus lines

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Interstate Commerce Commission gave temporary approval Thursday to the merger of Greyhound and Trailways, the nation's two largest bus companies.

The 5-0 ICC vote approving the joint operation of Greyhound Lines and Trailways Lines Inc. came as the Justice Department advised the commission that Trailways qualified as a "failing company" under federal antitrust laws and that therefore the merger would not violate those laws.

Justice Department attorneys, economists and financial analysts found Trailways "on the brink of bankruptcy" with "virtually no chance of being restructured as a viable entity" and there are no other potential purchasers for the firm, the department's antitrust division said in a filing with the ICC.

Under the temporary approval granted by the ICC, GHI Acquisition Co., which controls the Greyhound bus system, will operate Trailways Lines Inc. under a lease agreement. Greyhound characterized the temporary order as permitting a purchase of Trailways' assets, subject

to reversal if the ICC decides not to make the merger permanent.

Trailways operates along the East coast and south of a line from Washington, to Oklahoma City to Los Angeles.

The proposed merger would not include 34 small, independent bus companies operating in limited areas under the Trailways name. Greyhound announced June 19 it wants to purchase Trailways for \$80 million.

The two bus lines will begin operating as one next week and "I think the transaction is really good news for users of low-cost transportation," Fred G. Curry, Greyhound's chief executive officer, said in an interview.

# Marines charge ex-guard

WASHINGTON (AP) — The restriction and Marine Corps said Thursday it has charged a former security guard at U.S. embassies in Bern, Switzerland, and Moscow with copying classified documents, falling in port contacts with Soviets and dealing on the black market.

Sgt. Kenneth J. Kellner, 32, of Chincoteague, Va., was not charged with espionage. But he was re-assigned to the Marine Security Guard Battalion at Quantico, Va., and faces a hearing Monday to review the charges against him, the announcement said.

The investigation against Kellner is continuing, the announcement said. It said he is "not confined or on

parole," and was not technically under arrest.

Kellner was assigned to the Moscow embassy from September 1984 to March 1986, and to Bern from March 1986 to March 1987.

The charges against Kellner stem from the investigation launched following charges brought against two other Marine security guards whose assignments in Moscow partially overlapped with his.

# Soviets deny Western news reports of missile agreement

MOSCOW (AP) — A government spokesman on Thursday denied Western news reports that U.S. superpowers have ironed out differences on the elimination of medium-range missiles from Europe.

The agreement in principle is scheduled here with no reason for Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze to go to Washington, ministry spokesman Boris D. Pyadyshv told journalists at a regular news briefing.

Pyadyshv also disclosed that U.S. Ambassador Jack Matlock met with Shevardnadze on Tuesday and delivered a letter from President Reagan to Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev. He declined to discuss its contents.

Soviet and U.S. negotiators at the Geneva arms talks reportedly have been near agreement for months on eliminating medium-range missiles from Europe.

But the talks have bogged down recently, and U.S. officials disclosed last week that Shevardnadze was expected in Washington in mid-July for talks with Secretary of State George Shultz to spur the arms control process.

Pyadyshv repeatedly denied reports by Western news agencies that the Soviet Union is negotiating U.S. forces, and Soviet Col. Gen. Nikolai Chervov had proposed a compromise two weeks ago in Geneva to U.S. negotiator Maynard Gillman.

According to the reports, the Soviets would agree to dismantle their 462 missiles in Europe with a range of 315 to 3,125 miles, and 221 additional missiles in their Asian territory.

In return, the United States would remove its 316 ballistic from Europe. It agrees not to deploy shorter-range rockets and accept two basic restraints: that the 207 ground-launched Cruise missiles and the 100 Pershing 2 rockets could not be modified into shorter-range Pershing 1b weapons.

"I would like to declare that there is no understanding between Gen. Chervov and the American representatives," Pyadyshv said. "Nothing which can be construed as a proposal, or something near a proposal, was made on the side of the general."

Chervov is a familiar figure at 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul.

Moscow news briefings on the subject of arms control, but his exact role in the Soviet military is not known. He is described only as the head of a department of the general staff.

Pyadyshv said "newer and newer obstacles" are being put in the path of agreement by U.S. negotiators, whom he accused of frustrating the talks on medium-range rockets.

The American delegation puts forth new conditions, new restrictions, which create new hindrances in moving forward," Pyadyshv said.

Soviet President Andrei A. Gromyko, who served as foreign minister for 28 years, received former U.S. President Jimmy Carter in the Kremlin on Thursday and made similar complaints.

"I must note with regret that the position taken by our partners still creates difficulties on the road to this agreement," Gromyko told Carter, according to the Tass news agency. "Many other important Soviet initiatives directed at solving key questions concerning arms control received a constructive reply."

# Korea frees first political prisoners

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Leaders of the governing and opposition parties declared jointly Thursday that work on democratic reforms must begin at once, and the government freed nearly 30 political prisoners.

Officials said hundreds more would go free in coming days to meet President Chun Doo-hwan's pledge. Chun announced Wednesday that he accepted opposition demands, including direct presidential elections and the release of political prisoners.

Roh Tae-woo, head of the governing Democratic Justice Party, made a surprise call Thursday at the headquarters of the main opposition Renminization Democratic Party to meet with party president Kim Young-sam.

The gesture by Roh, who is Chun's personal choice to succeed him in February, was astonishing in light of the traditional bitter hostility in South Korea between government and opposition parties.

Roh said after the meeting, "What happens today is the will and victory of the people. Politicians should conduct dialogue on all matters of concern as a frank matter."

Kim said, "Negotiations must begin soon on the political timetable and an amendment to the constitution."

Chun declared April 13 that all discussion of democratic reform would be postponed until after the

1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul. He capitulated after weeks of street protests that attracted an unusual degree of support and participation from businessmen, housewives, shop workers and others who normally avoid political turmoil.

Roh stunned the nation by demanding Monday that the president give in, threatening to quit all his posts and the candidacy otherwise.

Officials at both sides said Thursday they want talks on reforms to begin by mid-July so the National Assembly can consider the results by August. Spokesmen for the governing party said privately they might have draft proposals ready by Friday.

Opposition spokesman Kim Tae-ryong said a direct presidential election should be held no later than November. The governing party also said it wants a quick election.

In his April declaration, Chun had said his success would be chosen by the current electoral college system, which the opposition claims favors the government.

Kim Dae-jung, the other principal leader of South Korea's opposition, did not attend the meeting with Roh.

Speculation is growing about which of the two Kims, who have often rivaled in the past, will be the opposition presidential candidate. Kim Young-sam declined to answer questions on the matter Thursday.

# Deported from U.S., Linnas dies in clinic

MOSCOW (AP) — Karl Linnas, convicted in the Soviet Union of Nazi war crimes and deported from the United States to face a firing squad, died in a London clinic Thursday, the Tass news agency reported.

Tass said the 67-year-old Linnas, accused of being a concentration camp director in World War II, died at 11:45 a.m. of heart failure after undergoing two operations.

The agency declared the case "another warning to the countries which were untruthful and suggested that Linnas died unpunished."

"Time goes by, and in future it may so happen that age and aged-related ailments will prevent prosecution," the agency said.

Tass complained that U.S. officials delayed 26 years before deporting Linnas, a retired land surveyor from Greenlawn, N.Y.

A Soviet court in 1962 convicted Linnas in absentia and sentenced him to death. Witnesses said Linnas supervised the execution of thousands of inmates, mostly Jewish women and children, at the Tartu concentration camp in Nazi-occupied Estonia. He was deported from the United States on April 1, 1967.

Tass listed numerous ailments suffered by Linnas, including heart disease, circulatory problems, internal hemorrhaging and cirrhosis of

the liver. Linnas had fallen seriously ill way back in the United States but no thorough medical examination had been made there, Tass said.

The exact nature of the operations conducted on the condemned man, was not made clear in the news reports.

It had been allowed a visit by his daughter, Anu, and his defense attorney, former U.S. Attorney General Ramsey Clark, a day before his death.

Tass said the visitors "expressed satisfaction with the medical aid being given by Soviet physicians."

In New York, U.S. Attorney Rudolph W. Giuliani, who argued twice before the federal appeals court in Manhattan to have Linnas deported, had no comment on his death. But he said the record against Linnas contained "proof to a certainty" that he was a mass murderer and a butcher.

George McElroy, 47, who lived next door to Linnas in Greenlawn, said Linnas aged visibly "going through trials and all the garbage he went through. You could see him aging."

"I don't know of anybody on the street who didn't like him," said McElroy. "In one way, his dying is the best way."

# Peron's tomb entered

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — Former President Juan Peron's hands were severed and stolen by thieves who broke into his tomb, a judge confirmed Thursday, and authorities investigated possible links between the thieves and ultra-Rightists.

Civil Court Judge Jaime Far Sitau said the thieves also took Peron's sword and a letter from his third wife during a break-in last weekend at the Peron underground crypt at Chacarita Cemetery just days before Wednesday's 13th anniversary of his death.

The judge ordered the coffin opened for examination. Then the presumed thieves asked for \$8 million ransom.

President Rafael Alfonsin described the mutilation of Peron's corpse as "a macabre act," and said those responsible "conspire against the peace of Argentina and insult the memory of Gen. Peron."

Similar events have happened twice before in recent Argentine history, beginning with the 1955 theft of the body of Peron's second wife, Eva Peron, and the 1974 stealing of the corpse of former President Pedro Aramburu.

Peron, the most popular Argentine leader of the 20th century, was president three times from 1946 until his death July 1, 1974. He was succeeded by Isabel Peron, his third wife, and then vice president

# Iranian Guards reinforce island bases

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Iran said Thursday its Revolutionary Guards have reinforced island naval bases near the Strait of Hormuz, the Persian Gulf's narrow southern entrance, in case of U.S. attacks. It also said Iraq may have used biological weapons in a bombing raid last weekend on the northwestern mountain town of Sardasht that killed 12 people and wounded 630.

One cause of increasing tension between Iran and the United States is the Reagan administration plan to register 11 Kuwaiti tankers as U.S. vessels and give them Navy protection. Kuwait also has chartered three Soviet tankers. Iran began regular attacks last September on ships bound to and from Kuwait, a Persian Gulf emirate that supports Iraq in the 7-year-old war.

# Salt Lake sheriff, attorneys at odds over hiring of agent

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Salt Lake County Sheriff Pete Hayward has questioned the ethics of prosecutors and investigators hiring a movie agent in the Mark Hofmann murder case.

Hofmann, 32, was sentenced to life imprisonment after pleading guilty in January to second degree murder in the 1985 pipebomb slayings of Steven Christensen and Kathleen Sheets in an apparent attempt to prevent disclosure of fraud and forgery in his dealings in Mormon and other documents.

Salt Lake County Deputy Attorney

Robert L. Stott, detained the nine prosecutors and investigators, including himself, who hired a Los Angeles attorney to handle their affairs. He said no money has exchanged hands and no contracts have been signed.

Stott said there is no conflict of interest because the case is completed and interviews conducted with Hofmann have been concluded. He said movie producers want to get as many releases signed as possible so that names can be used in the event a film is made.

Hayward said he believes such an arrangement is a conflict of interest.

"No one in my office has any contracts for movie rights, and none of us are seeking agents on any confidential or investigative matter we've been involved in," he said. "I have some great concerns about this, both ethically and legally."

Bruce Egan, deputy director of the Utah Department of Corrections, said prison policy prohibits employees from selling, trading or bartering information they've gained from their state jobs.

"Employees shouldn't profit from a state job they've been hired to do," he said. "Once they leave they're on their own, but while they're in the employment of the state, we don't think they should profit from their experiences with other people's problems."

Paul Warner, associate deputy attorney in the Utah Attorney General's Office, said prosecutors and investigators haven't broken any laws by hiring an agent, and state law forbids only perpetrators from profiting from crimes.

# State, area unemployment rates nosedive

**TWIN FALLS** — Unemployment plunged in the Magic Valley and in Idaho during June, reaching lows not seen in more than half a century.

In the Twin Falls-Jerome-Gooding area, seasonally adjusted unemployment dove to 5.2 percent from May's 5.6 percent (retired from the original 5.7 percent).

The June rate for Idaho was even lower: it tumbled 0.5 percentage point to a flat 5 percent during June, the Idaho Department of Employment said.

The state rate fell to its lowest level since November 1972, when it was 4.6 percent.

Department analysts interpreted the June report as a solid sign of an improving job market. "Even if some of the current gains are the result of earlier-than-usual build-up of this spring's seasonal work force, it appears certain that we have experienced a turnaround of the labor-force trends experienced in 1985," said chief research analyst Jim Day. Last June, the Idaho rate was 6.3 percent and the Magic Valley's hovered at 5.8 percent.

The local rate posted a half-decade low, dropping to 5.2 percent for the first time since August 1981.

The Magic Valley figure was showing benefits of seasonal employment in agriculture, construction, retail and tourism industries, said Janell Hoyer, a state job force analyst. The department's June estimate showed 1,770 workers actually off the job and 37,750 employed in the three- and continue through the rest of the year.

Last month also marked the second consecutive month in which the state's unemployment rate was better than the close of both the Boise and Pocatello outlets.

"We're having some positive movement in Idaho's employment situation this year," Hoyer said. 1986 largely was a static year for the jobless rate, she said.

Nevertheless, overall-disturbing factors still threaten the local and state unemployment pictures. The recently announced closing of Tupperware Home Parties plasticware plant at Jerome will idle as many as 700 workers. The layoffs will begin in August and continue through the rest of the year.

Grocery store layoffs are expected because of this week's announcement by Buttery Food and Drug Stores that it will close all its Boise and Pocatello outlets.

On a large scale, the state's labor force has been shrinking steadily. It is 11,800 workers smaller than in February, and 6,500 disappeared between May and June. Some may have left the state for other job opportunities.

Nevertheless, department experts point out the June labor force is 2,600 workers larger than a year ago.

At the same time, the numbers in the two components of the labor force employed and unemployed — have been contracting. The June count of employed workers was 6,000 fewer than February's.

Last month, there also were 2,400 fewer workers who lacked jobs. The numbers of unemployed fell to 4,500, the first time the figure has been docked in 7 1/2 years.

The good-job news permeated every area of the state but the Panhandle, where an increase in unemployment was blamed on early...

### DOT study finds Idahoans resisting new seat belt law

**TWIN FALLS** — As the Idaho seat belt law nears its first anniversary, observations by the Department of Transportation show that compliance with the law has not seen considerable change over the past year.

The rate of seat belt use in the Twin Falls area was recently calculated to be 15 percent, a figure which remains unchanged from figures compiled before the law became effective on July 1 last summer, said Lt. Bob Wright with the Idaho State Police.

The compliance rate for Idaho in general is 24 percent, said Dave Tway, administrator for the Idaho Safety Restraint Coalition. Northern Idaho has the highest rate by region at 48 percent.

The state figure reflects an increase of two percentage points since October, when the rate was 22 percent. Despite the increase, the state is still lagging behind 21 of the 24 states surveyed by the Department of Transportation, Tway said.

The reasons for the low compliance rate are varied, Wright said that people need time to get used to wearing their seat belts and called the law an "educational experience."

"It (seat belt usage) hasn't changed much and it probably isn't until the people themselves want to be more safe. It's just a habit people need to get into," he said.

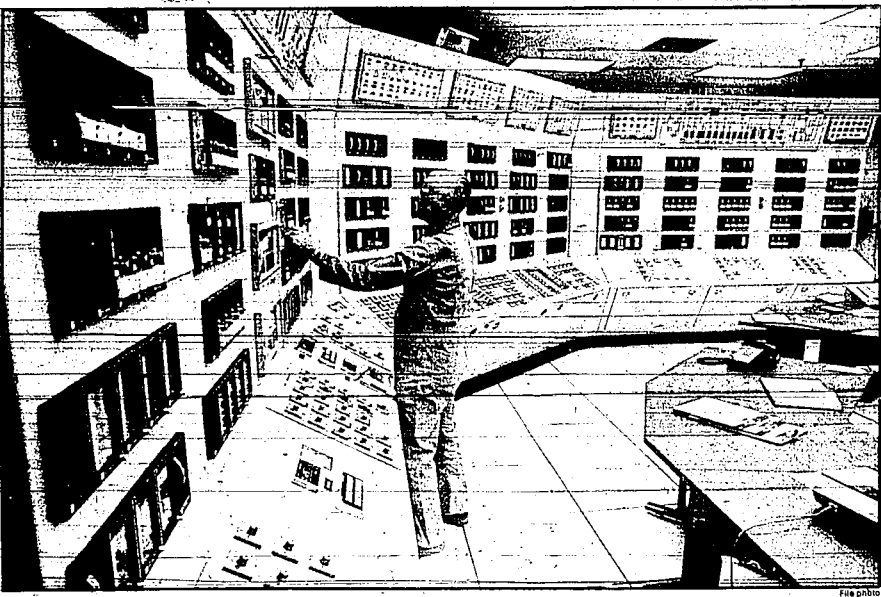

### Police gather forces for holiday celebrations

**TWIN FALLS** — Motorists and others who celebrate the holiday in Magic Valley will have a lot of extra enforcement officers to stay on the safe side of traffic laws and fireworks regulations.

Idaho State Police, county and city officers will be on duty in full force to enforce speed limits, drunk driving laws and help prevent fires and injuries through careless use of fireworks on public lands.

A special task force led by state police will be working a saturation system to control drunk drivers on Interstate 84 and other major highways.

The C.A.R.E. (Combined Accident Reduction Effort) will be in full swing. The concentration of traffic enforcement began Thursday at 6 p.m. and will continue through midnight Sunday.

"We have changed some work shifts to give us the maximum number of officers on duty for what we expect will be an extremely busy holiday weekend," Neal said.

Probably one of the busiest law enforcement agencies in the area will be the Blaine County Sheriff's Office.

Blaine County Sheriff Walt Fleming said long lines of campers, trailers and other vehicles were moving into Blaine County by mid-afternoon Sunday.

"It's traditionally a heavy weekend here," he said, "and we expect it to be even heavier than usual."

In addition to the regular summer camping and recreation activities, there is a "bike and fireworks display. The state figure reflects an increase of two percentage points since October, when the rate was 22 percent. Despite the increase, the state is still lagging behind 21 of the 24 states surveyed by the Department of Transportation, Tway said.

The reasons for the low compliance rate are varied, Wright said that people need time to get used to wearing their seat belts and called the law an "educational experience."

"It (seat belt usage) hasn't changed much and it probably isn't until the people themselves want to be more safe. It's just a habit people need to get into," he said.

A lack of enforcement is the explanation Tway finds for the low rate, saying because a driver must be stopped for another violation before being warned or issued a citation for not wearing a seat belt, many people can get away with not obeying the law, she said.

Rural areas also tend to have lower rates, she added. The conservative nature of many Idahoans is another factor in the low rate. "We're rural and we're conservative. Some people feel it's a violation of their personal rights to enforce the use of seat belts," she said.

States below Idaho include Oklahoma, with a rate of 10 percent and Kansas at 12 percent. States with the highest rate of compliance are Connecticut at 83 percent and Hawaii at 67 percent.

States where seat belt usage is a primary law and do have better rates, Tway said, but that still doesn't excuse Idaho's low figure. California's seat belt law is secondary, but the state has a compliance rate of 70 percent on the highway and 46 percent in the cities, she added.

Twin Falls Police Chief Tim Qualls said that "very few" citations have been issued since the law's passage. Most motorists stopped by Twin Falls police only receive warnings, he added.

"We don't see a lot of people wearing seat belts until they have to be stopped for another violation before we can warn them," he said.

There were 255 traffic-related fatalities last year in Idaho, a 22 percent decrease from 1985, but significantly by stronger enforcement. The state of New York, for example, has a primary seat belt law and saw a 20 percent decrease in traffic fatalities since passage of the law.

Dick Eardley, former mayor of Boise, said he is "convinced" that seat belt use will be higher if enforcement is stronger.

**IDAHO FALLS** — The highway creeps a little about 30 miles west of here, then drops abruptly into a flat valley of sagebrush.

In the valley, smaller roads branch to the north, connecting remote clusters of buildings to an artery. Nothing in the high desert landscape hints that 10,000 workers make their living here.

Tri-Cities would see similarities between these 894 square miles and the land that form the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory and Hanford's 570 square miles of Mid-Columbia desert.

The 1980 census listed Idaho Falls' population at 39,602. The city's planning department estimates a current population of 44,000. "It's a nice healthy rate," Campbell said.

"He expresses optimism about the future. "There's always an SIS or something that comes on-line and keeps us growing," Campbell said.

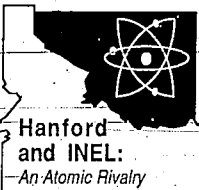

### Jerome cracks down on fireworks outlets

**JEROME** — Five Jerome County businesses had their fireworks sales eliminated or greatly reduced by county law enforcement officers Thursday just as the peak demand for July 4 profits arrived.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Larry Webb said that a large quantity of illegal and some legal fireworks were found in a day-long crackdown operation by county officers. He said the collection would probably have a retail value between \$5,000 and \$7,000.

Acting under the authority of a Jerome County ordinance and with the assistance of several persons who "made buys," county officers obtained search warrants and inspected a total of five sales outlets.

Two stands south of Jerome were alleged to have been selling illegal fireworks. Officers visited those two outlets, buying and destroying another stand at the junction of U.S. Highway 93 an State Highway 25 east of Jerome was added to the list later in the day. Webb said search warrants had failed to obtain illegal fireworks found in three places were confiscated.

Two other establishments "lost" their fireworks inventories because they had failed to obtain county permits, Webb said.

### Ed board relaxes credit transfers

**TWIN FALLS** — The state board of education opened doors a little wider at Idaho's four state universities for students transferring from two-year schools like the College of Southern Idaho.

"It does give the community colleges a much better position in the state's higher education program," said CSI director of continuing education Gerald Beck.

But university officials, while advocating the principle of standardizing educational requirements, said the policies favored community college students over four-year students.

Registrar Bob Wright estimated 200 CSI associate-degree graduates go on to the state's four-year schools each year. But because of differences in requirements at each of the public

universities, CSI students found some credits wouldn't transfer to a specific school.

"It was very difficult for us to come up with a general education core that match their requirements," Wright said.

To smooth out that transfer, the state board adopted June 25 two policies intended to usher students more easily into four-year institutions. A committee studied proposals for a year to standardize general education requirements.

The statewide articulation policy allows students with associate degrees to transfer without question as Juniors to the state universities. The board also approved policy aimed at standardizing general education requirements.

"It is very important for us to come up with a standard general education core," said George Williams, faculty council chairman for the University of Idaho, commenting on different amounts of credit hours state schools require.

CSI now requires 32 hours of core classes for associate of arts degrees and 26 hours for associate of sciences. Boise State University requires 42 hours of core classes and University of Idaho requires 36 hours Williams said.

The state board decided all core programs must require 36 hours of credit, said Rayburn Barton, the state board's chief academic officer.

Barton said the board also outlined six subject areas for those hours — communications; English composition; behavioral and social sciences; humanities; fine arts; or foreign language; natural science and math.

But dispute arises even within those guidelines. Williams argues that the transferring institutions must be the one to decide which classes make up the general education core.

"They could take blackjack and call it a transfer," he said.

# Commerce plan submitted

**BOISE (AP)** — Declaring his fledgling agency is ready to get on to its commitments, Idaho Commerce Director James Hawkins has submitted an ambitious plan for launching the state's bid to regain economic health.

The goals of the department for the next 12 months, outlined in a 10-page document submitted to state lawmakers last week, included a massive advertising campaign to bolster tourism in the state, development of an aggressive, coordinated financing scheme for up to 500 businesses seeking capital backing and drastic expansion of export promotion of Idaho goods and foreign investment in the state.

"The enthusiasm is here, and we have a million people working together," Hawkins said Thursday in announcing that first-year state marketing and promotional plan had been finalized.

But he stressed that under the plan the state will play more of a coordinating role in trying to get Idaho's economy breathing again.

"We're facilitators at the state level," Hawkins told the Idaho Press Club. "Communities or the economic development."

He also re-emphasized that his agency, which has only been actively pursuing the economic development campaign since April when adequate state funding became available, cannot be expected to produce concrete results immediately. The impact of a successful development drive may not be felt for several years, he said.

During the coming year the department will work with Idaho financial institutions, sources of venture capital including the newly-formed Idaho Company and other sources of financial assistance to provide the kind of economic information needed by entrepreneurs considering expanding current businesses or locating new ones in the state. Hawkins said as many as 500 inquiries about financial assistance would be handled.

"We believe our strength will be in the growth of small companies, the ones with 15 or 20 employees," Hawkins said.

The department will also work with Idaho Diversification Project at Boise State University, which provides aid for researching business innovations and it will help as many as 200 businesses get a piece of the \$200

million the federal government spends on procurement each year.

On the international front, the plan calls for the department to survey 1,200 Idaho companies to determine interest in entering the export market and then to develop an export handbook to help interested companies. In addition, the department will intensify efforts to gain footholds in the markets of Canada, Japan, Taiwan and Korea.

A \$30,000 tourism promotion program is outlined. It will target not only the western states but also Canada, Japan and the United Kingdom. An advertising campaign totaling \$20,000 along with a \$20,000 promotional film will target 3 million people in 11 western states and Canada. The film will be translated into Japanese for use in that country.

A \$106,000 television ad campaign will be launched to lure visitors to Idaho from Spokane and Salt Lake City, and another \$400,000 campaign, conducted in conjunction with private businesses, will focus on attracting people to winter activities in the state.

"We in the state of Idaho have a great natural resource," he said.

# High court cites herding, trailing difference in ruling against Simplot

**BOISE (AP)** — There is a difference in Idaho law between herding sheep and trailing or driving them, the Idaho Supreme Court ruled in upholding a district court decision against J.R. Simplot Co. and one of its truck drivers.

The high court decided unanimously on Wednesday that 5th District Judge Ronald D. Bruce was right to reject Simplot's request for admission of evidence on the existence of a herding district in Mindoka County.

Etcheverry Sheep Co. of Rupert filed suit against Simplot over an accident on a county road near Rupert that killed 123 Etcheverry sheep. According to court records, Simplot's Verio Weikel was driving on the truck and trailer when he ran some 150 feet into a band of about 1,600 sheep after topping the crest of a hill.

Etcheverry sued to recover its loss but Simplot argued that the sheep company had been negligent by herding its sheep on a public highway within a herding district.

Simplot argued that the magistrate eventually accepted Etcheverry's argument that the sheep were not being herded, but rather were being trailed or driven by the men in charge of the move.

A jury found for Etcheverry. But Simplot contended on appeal to district court, and later to the Supreme Court, that the magistrate was wrong to exclude any evidence of trial on the existence of the county's herding district, within which it is illegal to have livestock "trailing or being herded" upon the public highways.

Simplot argued that herding, trailing and driving were synonymous, but the high court agreed with Bruce that Idaho law and prior cases make it clear that there is a difference between the terms.

When the car is struck, it is often heaved on a speed of 55 miles per hour, the driver is usually dead in seven tenths of a second, he said.

In the second tenth of the first second, instinct causes the driver to stiffen his legs against the crash and they snap at the knee joints. During the third tenth, the steering wheel

disintegrates under pressure from the driver's chest and he is impacted on the steering column by the fifth tenth, Gardley said.

In the seventh tenth of that second, the driver's head breaks the car windshield and unbelted passengers in the back seat fly forward, hitting the now dead driver, he said.

The coalition encourages motorists to keep in mind the importance of seat belt use while on the road this summer, especially

during holiday traffic, Tway said.

was selected as the headquarters for the National Reactor Testing Station.

Over the years, 52 reactors have been built at INEL. In 1974, the name was changed to Idaho National Engineering Laboratory. In 1981, nuclear fission was first used to produce electricity at Experimental Breeder Reactor No. 1, briefly. The reactor now a national historic landmark.

Theo, in 1955, nearby Arco, Idaho, became the first town in America to be powered by nuclear energy in a two-hour experiment. Thirteen test and experimental reactors remain in operation at INEL today.

The site's budget has grown 42 percent in the last four years.

In fiscal 1984, the funding level was at \$91 million. It grew to \$93 million in 1985, \$95 million in 1986 and finally to \$97.8 million in the current fiscal year.

By comparison, Hanford's budget grew by about 12 percent over the last four years, increasing from \$123 million in fiscal year 1981 to \$123 million in the current fiscal year.

Seven contractors share the work at INEL. The prime contractor is EGG&G Idaho. About 3,500 people work for the company in a variety of jobs on projects such as waste management programs and site support services.

The site's biggest employer, with 1,400 workers, is the Idaho Chemical Process Plant, operated by Westinghouse Idaho Nuclear Co. Uranium is extracted at the plant from spent reactor fuel, chiefly from the spent fuel of the Shippingport reactor, currently undergoing about \$500 million in upgrades.

Westinghouse Electric Co. operates the Naval Reactors Facility.

Approximately 1,400 workers conduct research and development for the Navy and provide training for Navy personnel.

Argonne West, with 690 employees, operates an experimental breeder reactor program. American Protective Service provides site security, employing 290 people.

Morrison-Knudsen is the construction contractor, with an average of 850 workers. Rockwell-INEL employs 270 at the Special Manufacturing Capability facility, an ultra-secret project, dubbed Project X by the Idaho press.

DOE employs 310 people in Idaho. Various other governmental agencies, including the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, the Bureau of Mines and the U.S. Geological Survey, employ another 1,620 workers.

The department's projected employment levels for the next decade are for slightly increasing employment over the next few years, peaking at 11,324 in 1983, then declining slowly to 10,760 in 1995. No similar projection is made for Hanford.

DOE estimates that the peak employment at Hanford this year will be 14,400. Rockwell Hanford is the largest employer, with 5,700. U.S. Nuclear Industries employs 3,000. Westinghouse Hanford has 2,600. Battelle, Newport, DOE — 335 and Kaiser Engineers, Boeing Company Services Richland and Hanford Environmental Health Foundation — a combined 1,665.

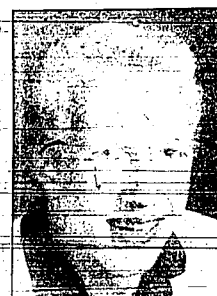

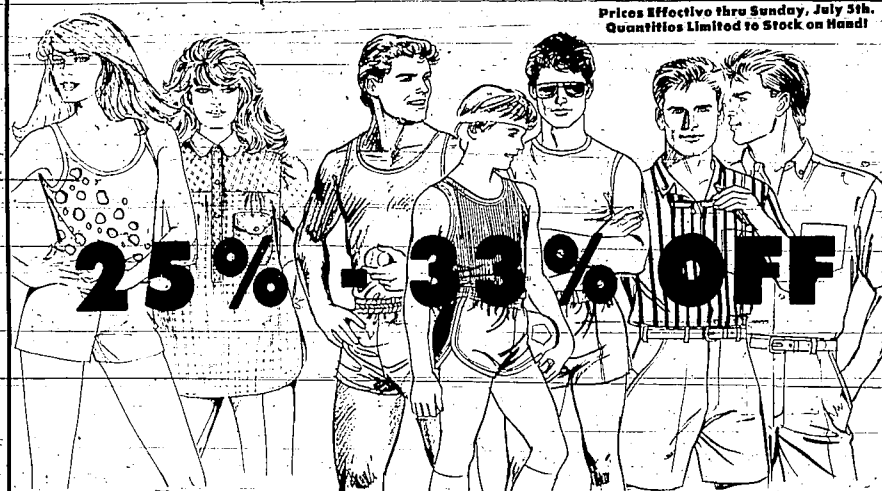

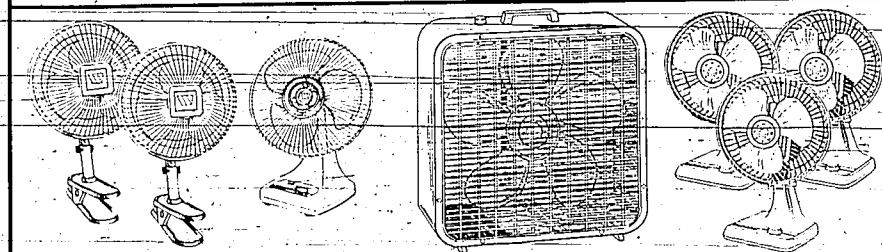

# Navratilova outlasts Evert in classic match

**WIMBLEDON, England (AP)** — Martina Navratilova struggled past rival Chris Evert in a classic Centre Court confrontation at Wimbledon Thursday and set up a showdown with new rival Steffi Graf to determine who is No. 1 in women's tennis.

Navratilova, who has held the top ranking since November 1985, defeated Evert 6-2, 5-7, 6-4 in her drive for a record sixth straight crown and a record-tying eighth singles title at Wimbledon.

"I'm right now," Navratilova said after the two-hour, three-minute match that she said "wasn't the best match we ever played" in 73 career meetings with Evert.

Graf, the West German teenager who can displace Navratilova as No. 1 in the world by winning Saturday's final, had no problem zipping past fifth-seeded Pam Shriver 6-0, 6-2.

"She's got to wake up one day and realize that she's doing," Shriver said of Graf, who has yet to lose in 1987 and has won 45 consecutive matches.

It will be the second straight Graf Slam tournament in which the 20-year-old Navratilova and the 13-year-old Graf have met for the title. Graf beat her in the French Open last month 6-6, 6-6.

"It's not like Martina fears me, but I don't know what goes into her mind," Graf said. "I think she's more confident than I am in Paris, she won it so many times."

On Friday, the men's semifinals will be second-seeded Ivan Lendl of Czechoslovakia against No. 4 Stefan Edberg of Sweden, while 34-year-old American Jimmy Connors, the No. 7 seed who has won Wimbledon twice in his long career, faces No. 11 Pat Cash of Australia.

Navratilova has led the Women's International Tennis Association computer rankings for 20 consecutive months, but has yet to win a tournament this year. Graf has won seven in a row since losing to Navratilova in the finals of the Virginia Slims Championships last November.

Navratilova likes the Wimbledon grass and the history that surrounds it, and said that gives her an edge.

"I've been confident the whole tournament and now I'm in the finals," she said. "Wimbledon is not just a trophy, it's an incentive."

She needed to play her best game to survive the semifinals.

"This was the best match the two of us ever played on grass," Evert said. "It might have been the best match we ever played. The highest quality," Navratilova said.

They battled from the baseline.

They battled from the net. They criss-crossed the court over and over many times on just one point.

Twice Navratilova launched herself into the air to hit winning shots.

It was dramatic theater, and it came on Centre Court of the world's most prestigious grass-court tournament before a packed audience that included Princess Diana and world middleweight champion Sugar Ray Leonard.

"That was as high as anything, if not the best, because there were just a few unforced errors," Navratilova said. "It was incredible. It was winners, just winners or forced errors. Chris never served better against me or hit the ball deeper or more consistently. It was definitely the best that she ever played that I still won."

Since 1973, when they first played

Navratilova was holding serve relatively easily, and was up 40 love in the sixth game of the second set when Evert raised her game yet another notch.

Evert ripped a forehand service to take a 3-1 lead. After Evert fought off three break points to hold in the fifth game, Navratilova ripped off the next three games to close out the opening set.

It was the next-to-last point in the first set that highlighted the high quality of play. In a rally considered long by grass-court standards, Navratilova was forced to put up a defensive lob. It was short, about a service line deep, and she im-

mediately took off running to the other side of the court.

Evert smashed the ball cross-court, but Navratilova launched herself in the air, somehow got a racket on the ball and sent it into the open court for a winner.

**KETCHUM** — Today's lesson for all of you cycling aficionados: winning isn't everything.

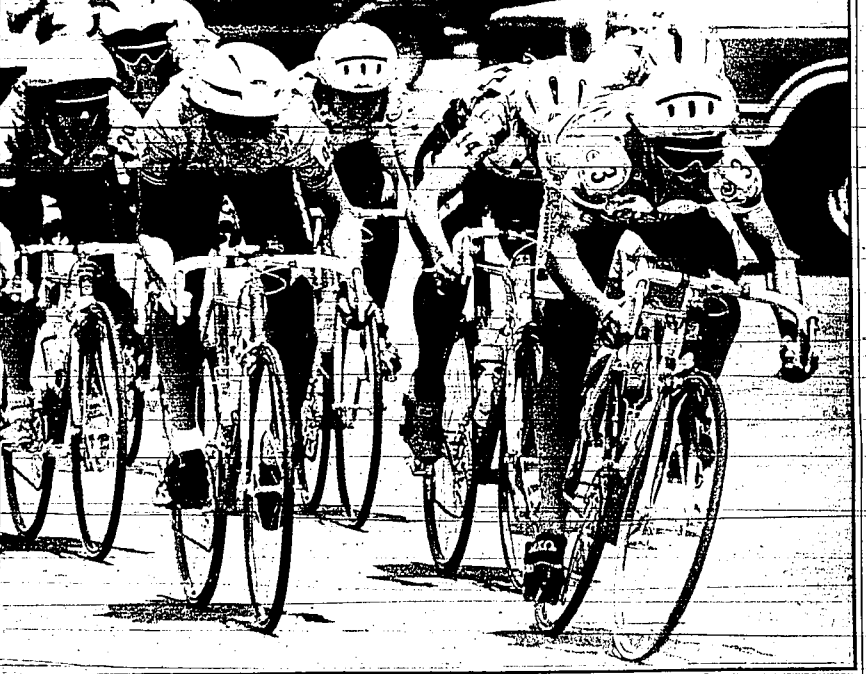

## California may reverse fight verdict

Denkin said Filippino has acknowledged the complaint, but that Filippino failed to follow the proper procedure.

## Virginia Tech airs basketball problems

**BLACKSBURG, Va. (AP)** — No basketball players admitted to Virginia Tech from 1982 to 1986 have graduated from the school, administrators said Thursday in releasing a report on a probe into alleged NCAA violations.

In reviewing the academic records of basketball athletes, it is evident that most are not serious students, the report said. "In individuals have been advised to take courses in order to remain eligible not to make progress toward a degree."

The report said 30 alleged violations of NCAA were reviewed, and 12 violations were found to have occurred. But university president William E. Lavery, interim athletic director Raymond Smoot and vice rector W. S. White Jr. declined to say whether they planned to fire Coach Charlie Moir.

Speaking at an afternoon news conference, the three said the basketball investigation launched in March revealed that a university faculty member had given a basketball player a passing grade for a course before any course work was completed after being asked by the basketball staff to assist in retaining the player's eligibility.

Of the remaining NCAA violations cited in the report, there was evidence that:

- A prospective student-athlete participated in informal basketball games with enrolled student athletes during visits to the campus.
- A former member of the coaching staff assisted student athletes play basketball outside the permissible practice season.
- The basketball coaching staff employed a tutor for a prospective student-athlete.

A coaching staff member and a representative of the University's athletic interests set up free or cheap lodging for players and prospects in conjunction with summer jobs.

"Several prospective and enrolled student-athletes received free meals at a restaurant owned by a representative of the University's athletic interests."

A prospective player received at least one souvenir on a campus visit.

"Representatives of the university's athletic interests who acted as 'foster parents' for two student-athletes, gave Christmas gifts to the young men."

Two such "foster parents" entertained a basketball player at local restaurants and allowed him to use a car.

"A representative of the University's athletic interests" took a player from Blacksburg to the Roanoke airport.

Complimentary game tickets were sold by a player.

"A representative of the University's athletic interests provided auto financing in an amount of \$7,200 for the wife of an enrolled student-athlete."

Two outside investigators hired to investigate the basketball program were continuing their work, and Virginia Tech officials say they plan to present the findings to an NCAA "infractions" committee, perhaps as soon as August.

Lavery, Smoot and White declined to answer a number of questions from reporters, referring them to a copy of a report prepared on the basketball probe.

## Pro golf Sindelar's closing eagle putt earns lead

**OAKVILLE, Ontario (AP)** — Joey Sindelar ran in a 25-foot eagle putt on the final hole that lifted him into a one-shot lead Thursday in the first round of the \$600,000 Canadian Open Golf Tournament.

Sindelar's dramatic finish late on a day of occasional rain completed a round of 4-under-par 68 and vaulted him from one stroke behind to one in front.

It also completed a blitz of the par-5 holes on the Glen Abbey Golf Club course.

"Sindelar, one of the longer hitters in the game, played the four long holes in five under par, with three birdies and the eagle. He hit irons in the green on all four and two-pulled for the three birdies."

"The key was that I hit my best tee shots on the par-5s, and you kind of look to them as the pickup holes," Sindelar said.

"You know you're going to make some mistakes and make some bogeys on this course, so you look to the par-5s to offset those mistakes," said Sindelar, who had six birdies, an eagle and four bogeys in his erratic effort.

Tom Purtzer, winner of two titles in a 12-year PGA Tour career, put a birdie-birdie finish on a 69 that left him again in second.

Richard Zokol, seeking to become first Canadian to win his country's national championship since 1954, was tied for third with a 70, two strokes off the pace.

"Right now my game is very solid. I just want to continue to play good, basic golf and try not to put too much pressure on myself," he said.

Zokol was tied with defending champion Bob Murphy, Steve Pate and Ernie Gonzalez.

Jack Nicklaus, seven times a runner-up but never a winner of this event, was two under and one shot off the lead going to the 10th hole of the course he designed as a permanent home for the Canadian Open.

But Nicklaus' third shot, from the wet rough, went into the water near the 10th hole and he made a double-bogey 7.

"An easy way to spoil a good day," Nicklaus said after his 72. "A 70 would have been a very good score today."

Former champion Curtis Strange led a large group at 71. Also at that figure were South African David Frost, Mac O'Grady, Dan Pohl, Danny Edwards, Morris Hatakey, Pat Mcowan and rookie Jim Carter.

# NBC executives to replace strikers

NBC's coverage of major league baseball may not be up to its award-winning standards Saturday.

The network will use management and clerical workers to fill in for striking technicians, producers and editors on its Texas-New York telecast from Yankee Stadium.

"We're not kidding ourselves," an NBC executive said. "The quality isn't going to be the same. We just hope it isn't too noticeable to the fan at home."

In some cities, including Houston and Atlanta, NBC can use production crews that don't belong to the striking union, the National Association of Broadcast Employees and Technicians. In most cities, however, the network will have to use in-house substitutes.

"We won't be perfect, but we'll do our best," said John Wendell, vice president of operations for NBC Sports. "I'm surprised at the hidden talents some of our people had."

NBC's live Wimbledon coverage this weekend shouldn't be affected by the strike because only three members of its London production crew belong to the striking union.

Watch out, Peter Ueberroth. "Today" host Bryant Gumbel covets your job.

"I love baseball," says Gumbel's "Quarterly" co-host Jim Lincecum. "I would like to be commissioner. I really would."

Gumbel, who will anchor NBC's coverage of the 1988 Summer Olympics, also told the magazine that sports announcers often make racist remarks.

"Every black is gifted, and every white guy works hard and uses his brain," said Gumbel, who is black. "I don't want to sound like a preacher, but I could watch sports any weekend and point out a racist comment every five minutes."

When WFAN went on the air Wednesday, it became the only radio station in the country broadcasting sports 24 hours a day.

The format includes sports updates every 15 minutes, talk shows, features and play-by-play of New York Mets games.

The station's talent lineup includes Jim Lincecum of ABC, Chris Berman of ESPN, Will McDonough of CBS and the Boston Globe, and Greg Gumbel of the Madison Square Garden Network.

Longtime Cleveland talk show host Pete Franklin will join the station as soon as he recovers from a recent heart attack.

The Gerry Conroy-Michael Spinks fight, which bombed on closed-circuit, didn't do much better on network television.

ABC got a pretty 6.8 rating for its replay of the fight Friday night. In 1980, ABC received more than double that rating for its prime-time replays of the Larry Holmes-Muhammad Ali and Sugar Ray

Leonard-Roberto Duran fights.

The dispute between Leonard and former undisputed welterweight champion Donald Curry has taken on a television twist.

Leonard, who is being sued by Curry for \$1 million, is scheduled to be one of HBO's ring-side announcers July 18 when Curry meets World Boxing Association junior middleweight champion Mike McCallum in Las Vegas, Nev.

Curry's handler, Akbar Muhammad, doesn't think Leonard can be objective and wants him removed from the telecast. HBO is considering the request.

"Maybe Akbar has a point," said HBO Sports executive Seth Abraham. "We've got to make a judgment call here."

Curry contended that Leonard and his manager, Mike Trainer, steered him away from a lucrative fight with Marvelous Marvin Hagler so that Leonard could fight Hagler first.

### Aouita runs second best mile

HELSINKI, Finland (AP) — Said Aouita of Morocco ran the second fastest mile in history today, covering the distance in 3 minutes, 46.76 seconds at the grand prix track meet.

It was a new national and African record for Aouita, who took the lead for good with one lap left. He missed the world record of 3:46.32 set by Steve Cram of Great Britain, two years ago in Oslo, Norway.

Mark Hacksteiner of Switzerland was runnerup in 3:55.67. Sydney Marec, the American record holder in the 1,500, 2,000 and 5,000 meters, finished third in 3:55.99.

### Drug may end Wilson's career

CINCINNATI (AP) — Cincinnati Bengals running back Stanley Wilson may be suspended Thursday by the National Football League for renewed involvement with cocaine, and the team says his career may be over, according to a newspaper report.

Wilson made a comeback with the Bengals last season after being suspended from October 1984 to May 1985 for violating the league's drug policy.

Wilson may be eligible for reinstatement after June 1, 1988, but Bengals assistant general manager Mike Brown told The Cincinnati Enquirer that Wilson might not come back a second time.

"He may be gone for good," Brown said after learning of an NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle's decision to suspend Wilson indefinitely.

"It was my understanding that he was down to his final chance (in 1986)," Brown said.

Brown would not say whether the Bengals would accept Wilson if he is reinstated. The league said a decision on whether to reinstate Wilson will also show two factors, including avoidance of drugs and Wilson's general conduct.

## BYU opens on TV against Pitt

NEW YORK (AP) — ESPN will open its 1987 college football coverage Sept. 2 with a "primetime" telecast of the Pittsburgh-Brigham Young game, the cable network announced Thursday.

Nine other ESPN telecasts were announced, including a Sept. 5 doubleheader featuring Texas-Auburn and LSU-Texas A&M. ESPN will also show two games on Sept. 19 (Washington-Texas A&M and Michigan State-Notre Dame) and Sept. 26 (Miami-Arkansas and Penn State-Boston College) and Dec. 5 (Arkansas-Hawaii and South Carolina-Miami). On Nov. 21, the network will telecast the Clemson-South Carolina game.

## Gwynn gets NL monthly honors

NEW YORK (AP) — San Diego's Tony Gwynn, who hit 473 in June to earn National League Player of the Month Thursday.

Gwynn had 44 hits in 93 at-bats last month, including five doubles, five triples and one home run. He also scored 22 runs, drove in 16 runs and stole 12 bases.

## Gretzky weighs cup options

NEW YORK (AP) — Edmonton Oilers center Wayne Gretzky wants at least a couple of more weeks to decide if he can play in the Canada Cup, his business agent said Thursday.

"Wayne is weighing two desires, one to compete with the best players in the world and the other to do what's best for the Edmonton Oilers," Mike Barnett said Thursday in a telephone interview from the Toronto area. "He is attempting to make a decision that will be compatible to the desires of all parties."

It had been announced earlier that Gretzky would make an announcement of his decision on Wednesday. But Barnett said he had postponed that decision until the middle of July when Gretzky would be able to get together with Oilers' Coach and General Manager Glen Sather at a golf tournament in Edmonton.

Gretzky, who has already played in two Canada Cups and one world championship along with four Stanley Cup Finals in the last five years, said at the end of this year's playoffs that he was exhausted and needed a rest.

"I absolutely want to play in the Canada Cup," Gretzky was quoted as saying in Friday's edition of the New York Daily News, "but I also realize that 63 days between seasons may not be enough to prevent fatigue in January or February and that wouldn't be fair to the fans of Edmonton."

Gretzky, quoted through his business agent, was not available for any other comment.

Barnett said that both the Stanley Cup champion Oilers and Philadelphia Flyers, who waged a bitter, seven-game final series that ended with the Flyers in the last game of May, have expressed the intention of giving their Canada Cup players some time off before the start of the regular NHL season in October.

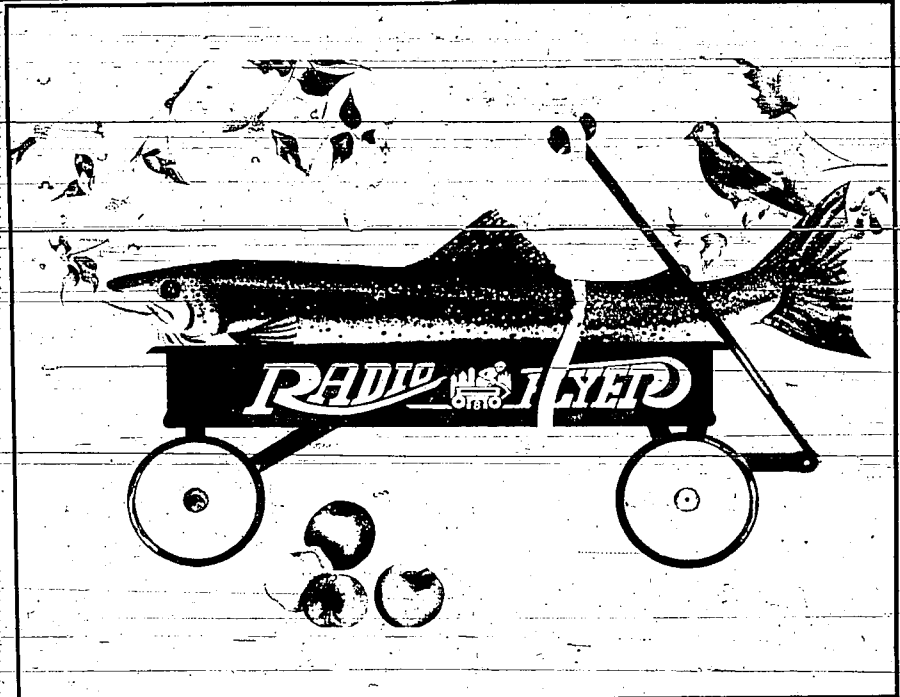

## Wharton: Printing with glass

BUHL — Artist David Wharton returns to Sun Valley armed with a fresh catch of his oft-humorous trout prints for a one-man show today through Aug. 5 at the Gail Severn Gallery in Ketchum.

Gallery owner Gail Severn calls Wharton's work "very contemporary."  
"David does imagery which generally has a focal point of a theme or an icon of some kind," she said. "The majority of pieces in the show have trout in them, but they are in no situation you'd expect trout to be in."

One piece, entitled "Radio Flyer," features a trout in a child's red wagon. Another watercolor, "Rainbow Trout," shows a rainbow trout in a teacup, tea sloshing over the sides.

Wharton, director of the fine arts program at the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities for nine years, will be present at an opening reception at the gallery on July 10 from 6 to 9 p.m.  
A series of prints in the exhibit, entitled "Six

Steelhead," are examples of the glass printmaking process Wharton and artist Harvey K. Littlejohn are developing.

"Harvey's intention, and mine, is to see more schools and more people begin using the glass process," he said in a recent telephone interview from North Carolina, where he is collaborating with Littlejohn, a master glass printmaker.

They are developing the use of glass plates as a printing element, a process known as vitreography.

"We're really excited about it," he said. "There again, it all goes back to that same idea—that because the process is new and unique, and quite beautiful in its appearance, it will catch on and become exciting to galleries and museums and collectors and whoever takes the time to work with the process."

Engraved glass plates are inked up and the plate is either wiped clean or rolled with ink and then run through a hand-etching process.

"You get a very rich kind of print out of that," he said.  
Wharton said the technique of using glass in printmaking was first introduced around 1750.

But the process was never completely explored because other technological advances such as lithography and photography were attracting more attention.

"Although Wharton is currently teaching vitreography in workshops throughout the nation, he said he is thinking about coming back to Idaho to start a fine arts publishing business. His shop would specialize in large art books, using glass plate printmaking as well as other more established processes.

"I think there's a need. There are a lot of publishing shops going here and there, but very few of them are expanding their vocabulary of the services they offer artists. They'll do woodblock prints or lithographs, and so the work begins taking on this sameness from print shop to print shop," said Wharton.

Gallery hours are 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Sunday. The Gail Severn Gallery is located at 60 Sun Valley Road in the Walnut Avenue Mall in Ketchum. For more information, call 726-5079.

## Universal City opens mega-theater

The public got its first Wednesday of the Cineplex Odeon Universal City Cinemas.

Nestled in the heart of the Universal Studios compound, the \$16

million, 120,000-square-foot Cineplex has 18 wide-screen theaters with 9,500 seats on two levels.

The next-largest competitor, Radio City Music Hall in New York, has 5,874 seats. The company that built the complex here has another 18-screen theater in Toronto, with fewer seats.

A gala premiere was held Tuesday for 6,000 guests, and the movie lot setting was enhanced with a couple

of the stars of the 18 all-time favorite movies that were shown.

The crowd hushed, then broke into applause, when Stewart walked into the lobby and took the escalator to see his hit "It's a Wonderful Life."

In another theater, Heston watched "Ben-Hur."

The two-acre complex, outfitted in purples, pinks and greys, centers around a 46-foot-high, skylight-topped lobby. The entrance to each theater is surrounded by a blaze of neon.

The National Heritage Fellowships are one-time-only grants of \$5,000 each, awarded to exemplary master folk artists and artisans who have been nominated by their peers. The nomination criteria are authenticity, excellence and significance within a particular artistic tradition.

Castellanoz' nomination was spearheaded by Robert McCarr, folk arts coordinator for the Idaho Commission on the Arts, who recognized her skills in making a Mexican-American corona, or traditional

ritual flower crown. "Through her flower-making," McCarr said, "Genevra Castellanoz has become a source of inspiration and stability to many people, especially the girls and women of her community."

She was born in Guanajuato, a state in central Mexico, and moved with her family at the age of two to Texas. It was there she learned to make flowers. Her father, with other migrant workers, was often contracted to do field work near Nyssa, and often discussed his wish to move there. After Eva grew up and married, her entire family eventually settled in Nyssa.

In Nyssa, Castellanoz has become a central figure and an interpreter of the Mexican ritual traditions in which her flowers play a major, and often symbolic, role.

Although the flowers are made of inexpensive materials, such as typing or crepe paper and candles,

two seat 800 each — are wrapped around a curved staircase, flanked by marble columns. A cafe with seating on both levels overlooks an intimate outdoor floral garden.

Pink and gray terrazo floors and plush carpets line the lobby with garden cafes gleaming with chrome and peppered with fresh carnations.

The ushers wear burgundy tuxedos and there's real butter for the popcorn, to be washed down with a horchata or a mojito.

Tickets are \$6 for adults, \$3.50 for children.

"We aim to bring majesty back into the viewing of movies. If the setting in which you actually see a film turns out to be a letdown, the whole complicated enterprise has failed," said Garth Drabinsky, president of Cineplex Odeon Corp. of Toronto, which owns half of the complex.

If expectations are realized, Cineplex will bring in 50 million during the center's first year. Drabinsky said that would make it the highest grossing film complex in the country.

Drabinsky, a former entertainment lawyer and film producer, turned Cineplex Odeon into North America's second largest theater chain, after only 10 years. His endeavor got a big boost last year when NEA, which owns Universal Studios, bought half of Cineplex's stock.

With the addition of the Universal City Cinemas, Cineplex Odeon operates 1,528 screens at 478 theaters in 21 states and six Canadian provinces. It is also working on development of Universal's planned

Florida studio and tour facility and has the money to buy several more theaters throughout North America.

Building the cinemas in the middle-20s-foot long outdoor glass canopy. There are 444 speakers and more than 60,000 watts of sound power in the 18 theaters.

# In 'Roxanne,' Steve Martin has perfect nose for comedy

Nothing that Steve Martin does in his new film "Roxanne" is run-of-the-mill. Every gesture is blessed, inspired—C.D., the tire-chief of the tiny, hillside town of Nelson, his smallest movement—a flourish, an opportunity for gallant display.

Just walking down the street, he moves as if he were riding the crest of a wave, deftly shifting his weight as he skims across the ground. A simple set of stairs presents an invitation to the dance, and he marks his arrival at the top, knock-kneed, with a modest celebration—his arms raised to the skies. It's just a nod, really, but the movie seems to unveil a gallery of cherubic angels who, flitting invisibly around him, attend his every feat, cheering him on to greater glory.

"Roxanne" is the most unabashed, and most satisfying, romantic movie to come along in years. It's a swooning, delicate, heart-on-its-sleeve work. It requires a leap of imagination from the viewer to get on its wavelength.

Few recent movies, though, reward the stretch as this one does. The picture is Martin's adaptation of Rostand's "Cyrano de Bergerac," and C.D.'s variation on the playwright's nostril-cavaler C.D. carries on a constant dialogue with the heavens, for, clearly, he has been singled out, touched by the gods. The mark of distinction is, of course, his nose, that wondrous, fleshy, awe-inspiring beak. C.D.'s nose is the tapering symbol of his uniqueness, his special, charming status. But, though this aspect of Rostand's material has been downplayed, it's his burden as well.

Martin's C.D. is a natural romantic—he's a nose-out-of-his-nose. And yet, his, alas, is not a lover's visage. C.D. yearns for fulfillment in love; for a night of hand-holding and walking in the moonlight. "But then," he says, "I see the shadow of my profile on the wall."

What Martin and the film's director Fred Sechelpi have created out of Rostand's work is an exhibit of comic love story about the glories of eccentricity, the triumph of peculiarity, of one-of-a-kindness. The mixture of romance and physical comedy here created is nearly perfect. And in a hundred details that's precisely what it is.

The film's plot is set in motion when two newsmen, an exhibit of eccentricity, a new man at the fire station, and Roxanne (Daryl Hannah), a visiting astronomer, arrive in town. When C.D. first meets Roxanne she is rather at a disadvantage—asked and her door locked behind her—but C.D. comes to her rescue, and clambering up the outside of her house, executing a few perfect-to



moves as he goes, he's like Buster Keaton working his way up the bridge of his boat in "Steamboat Bill, Jr." And, like Keaton, in an instant, he's hopelessly smitten. Yet, though C.D.'s moves impress her—she thinks he's funny—it's the hunky Chris she falls for.

But Chris, though he looks like a ladykiller, gets all tongue-tied and nauseous when a class-lady shows interest. (Chris, a good-time guy, actually likes more easygoing—less over-the-top women.) Roxanne doesn't quite know how to approach Chris, either, and the scene in which she asks C.D. to break the ice for her is heartbreakingly painful. It's a slap in C.D.'s face, and we feel it as much as he does.

The scene is a tricky one, because with it, the filmmakers run the risk of losing our affection for Roxanne. Momentarily, her preference for Chris causes us to become disenchanted with her. We think she's too conventional, too unimaginative for the heavens, for, clearly, he has been singled out, touched by the gods. The mark of distinction is, of course, his nose, that wondrous, fleshy, awe-inspiring beak. C.D.'s nose is the tapering symbol of his uniqueness, his special, charming status. But, though this aspect of Rostand's material has been downplayed, it's his burden as well.

Martin has built glorious layers in his script, and Sechelpi's direction brings them out beautifully. Watching the picture, you revel in its poetic detail, its grace notes. The movie is filled with marvelous, subtle touches like the pink ribbon Hannah strings through her hair, or the way Sechelpi's camera pans from the ground up to discover C.D. perched on a rooftop.

Schepi's handling of the film's setting is important, too, because it creates an enchanted world for a highly conceptualized, passionate character like C.D. to exist in. Near by everybody in Nelson accepts C.D.'s miraculous sneeze, and they accept him as the town's natural leader too—its dashing, eccentric hero, whose life is a sylvan rite-tale—enclave—for-drowsy, oddballs. The way Sechelpi has shot in it, Nelson is all steep inclines and pitched rooftops; there's not a level piece of ground in the entire city. Everything's slightly askew, at an angle. And that's perfect for its inhabitants.

The local luncheonette, Dixie's, is

run by Shelley Duvall, who also gives advice to the lovelorn on the side. And the firehouse gang is staffed by a cartoon cavalcade of bumblers—they're Mack Sennett firefighters, stumbling over their noses and spouting each other with water—led by Michael J. Pollard. The town's mayor (Fred Willard) wants to transform their little village into a bustling ski resort, like Aspen, and to attract attention, chooses a sweet-faced-cow as its mascot and stages the city's first Oktoberfest—in July.

The movie has hitting, rhapsodic comic rhythms. Its one extended set piece, in which Chris tries to woo Roxanne, with C.D. prompting him from the sidelines, is a remarkably adroit piece of romantic slapstick. And the sequence has a lovely payoff. Bidding on Rostand's original, it plays like a sappy variation on the balcony scene in "Romeo and Juliet."

In it, C.D., posing as Chris, speaks his love for Roxanne, who, swept away with emotion, nearly tumbles over the railing. It's an entrancingly sweet, intoxicating sequence.

Though the movie is far too fully realized to be merely a star turn, the tone is set by Martin's performance. In his script, Martin marries the romanticism in Rostand's material to the tradition of unregimented yearning in the silent comedies.

# Hall's total dedication to career propelled her to nighttime series

As Jessie Witherspoon, the widowed mother of three on NBC's Sunday-night series "Our House," actress Deldre Hall, is soft, loving, compassionate — and unambitious. As psychiatrist Marlena Evans for 11 years on the daytime soap "Days of Our Lives," she was also soft, loving, compassionate — and unambitious. But ambition runs through the core of Hall's real life.

She was a model with minimal professional acting experience when she arrived on NBC's "Days of Our Lives" at age 28. Through masterly self-promotion, she quickly worked her way up to the unofficial title of "Queen of NBC Daytime." Her new status brought a high salary and a legion of fans, but there has been a long-held Hollywood taboo against hiring soap actors for nighttime TV.

Most of the actors who have crossed the chasm between daytime and nighttime have gone through a significant period of unemployment first. But Hall managed to clinch the role of Jessie on NBC's "Our House" while she was still working on "Days of Our Lives," and, in an unprecedented move, she refused to quit her lucrative daytime job during the first year of "Our House." Instead, she banded both jobs.

"Everyone thought it would be exhausting," she says with a shrug. "I found it exhilarating." Hall has never been lazy. Before "Our House" jammed up her schedule, she would often spend her weekends flying across the country, actively courting her large following. Eventually, Hall's fan club, which she ran with the help of a computer out of a spare bedroom in her San Fernando Valley home, became the largest and most militant in daytime.

"All the other actors warned me not to associate with my fans," says Hall. "But when I reached out and touched them, I found many wonderful, loving friends."

Hall has actively denounced the recurring rumors in the daytime world that she is expelling her fans. Those charges were fueled by the release of a sugary "video biography" that Hall produced with her best friend, actress Cheri Ingram. It was marketed on cassette for \$79.95 through a company the two owned. Its purpose, according to Hall, was "to answer all the questions my fans

always asked." The success of this video led Hall, Ingram and close friend Mary Hart ("Entertainment Tonight") to found a now-thriving Beverly Hills business that specializes in making custom video resumes for actors.

"There's no one who's shrewder in the business end of the business than Deldre," says longtime "Daytime TV" magazine editor. Jason Bonderoff, who is also the author of a recent book, "Soap Opera Babylon" (Putnam). Other daytime fan-magazine editors have speculated that the connections Hall made while she was queen of NBC Daytime might have led to her eventual casting in NBC's "Our House." "That's totally untrue," says Hall. "I got the job through my agent."

"You have to understand that Deldre is extremely career directed," says former "Days of Our Lives" cast mate Susan Sealorh Hayes (who now plays JoAnna Manning on "The Young and the Restless"). "When it comes to getting what she wants — success — she has a tunnel vision close to genius. Deldre, if motivated in another field, could yet be the president of the United States."

# Matt Frewer: Man behind the Max

NEW YORK (AP) — It must be weird to be Matt Frewer, walking the streets anonymously while his face looks down at him from posters all over the city.

True, the face has been transformed by 4½ hours' worth of makeup and some clever post-production video techniques into Max Headroom, wiseguy video jockey, soda pop salesman and network television star.

In the ABC series "Max Headroom," Frewer plays the dual roles of Max — an electronic image on a television set — and his human counterpart, ace global-network correspondent Edison Carter.

It is the first continuing, dual-starring role on a network series since Patty Duke played twin sisters in "The Patty Duke Show" in the mid-1960s. In that show, a double was photographed from the back when the sisters were in the same shot.

Max is filmed and played back, putting Frewer, as Edison Carter, in the position of playing opposite himself.

"The way it was put to me was it was in my own best interests to get into the makeup and pre-record Max, because then I can have Max to play with," Frewer said in an interview. "It's very interesting. The first time I did it, I thought, 'God, that guy has great timing.' It's a little on the disconcerting side."

"Max Headroom" made its midseason debut to praise from critics, largely because of its irreverence toward television. Frewer said he originally balked at the idea of a network show because he feared a "gag" on Max, who had been free to say almost anything on cable TV.

"I was worried that there would be a lot of things that we got away with in the past that would be, 'Sorry, can't get away with that on network,'" he said. "Fortunately, they were pretty loose about that. If

anything, they kind of said, 'OK, here's the ball, now run with it.' They could have very easily sweetened Max to the point where he was this sort of ineffectual, 'I'll, kids! And I certainly didn't want him to turn into that kind of gimmick.'"

Some actors might be concerned about getting stuck in the public's mind in one character — especially an electronic one. Frewer's insouciance might be explained by the fact that when he's playing Max, he's being himself.

Meet Frewer and witness Max's speech patterns, gestures, giggle and good-naturedly off-color sense of humor.

When he signed on to do Max, Frewer said, "I was looking for a vehicle for my own stuff and something that didn't involve kind of standup comedy."

"Although I admire those kinds of guys, I find there's a certain kind of

sadness about them. It's so desperate. Please love me. I was looking for something else that would be weird and at the same time accommodate a lot of the things I want to do in front of the camera."

Frewer was born in Washington, D.C., and raised in Canada. He passed up an honors degree program in biology to go to London and study acting.

"It was something I enjoyed in high school, but it wasn't that I had wanted to tread those boards since I was knee-high to a grasshopper." It wasn't that at all.

In London, he met producer Peter Wagg, the creator of Max Headroom. (The name comes from the warning signs that suggest tall people duck.)

Frewer had the "transatlantic" accent that Wagg was looking for, and that elusive quality that became Max's personality. Frewer said his audition consisted of ad-libbing for a half-hour around eight lines of written dialogue.

Before starring in a cable movie that eventually became the premise of the network series, Max was host of a British music video show. At first it was just Max and the music. Then rock stars began to appear on the show.

"The whole thing evolved into this Johnny Carson with an extension cord," Frewer said. He is reprising the talk show format on Cinemax in July.

## New TV show based on USA Today

WASHINGTON (AP) — GTG Entertainment, formed by former NBC President Grant Tinker and Gannett Co. Inc., is developing a nightly television program based on Gannett's USA Today newspaper, the production company announced Tuesday.

As currently envisioned, the program would adapt the news, money, sports and life sections of USA Today to a TV format. Tinker and

Gannett Chairman Allen H. Neuharth said.

The program would preview material in the following morning's editions of the national newspaper. It would air five nights a week and have a weekend edition, Tinker and Neuharth said.

"We believe The Nation's Newspaper (USA Today) has as much to offer the USA's television viewers as it offers newspaper readers," Neuharth said.

# Buttons plays mysterious character in soap

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Red Buttons, the veteran stand-up comic and Oscar-winning actor on his way to a prime-time soaper, says he learned his craft through his mistakes and is now making his "11th comeback."

The Academy Award-winning actor recently signed as a guest star on CBS' "Knots Landing," playing a mysterious character who shows up at the California cul-de-sac. He is Al Baker, described by Lorimar-Telepictures as "a rugged individualist who appears to be a borderline dropout and vagrant."

It's the first series for Buttons in more than 20 years. His last show was "The Double Life of Henry Phylle" in 1966. "The Red Buttons Show" ran from 1952-55, but was dropped when the ratings faded.

Buttons says he will be in six of the first nine "Knots Landing" shows. "After that, either my ship

will come in or the pier will collapse."

Buttons confesses he really doesn't know much about Al Baker. "I'm still working on it," he says. "He's kind of a maverick... an iconoclast. He doesn't put up with any nonsense. I'd say he's a critic of society. An interesting guy. He's really his own man."

"I come into the show through Kevin Dobson, but it isn't fully explained: I do some delivery service. I'm a guy who lives out of his car, an eccentric."

"Knots Landing," starting its seventh season in September, is undergoing more changes. Douglas Sheehan and Hunt Block have left the show and Constance McCashin will leave after six or seven shows into the new season.

Block's character, Sen. Peter Hollister, was murdered in the cliffhanger show ending the past

season. The show ended with Abby Ewing (Donna Mills) thinking her daughter, Olivia (Tonya Crowe), had killed him and Olivia thinking her mother was responsible.

Michael York also will join the show as a recurring character in the fall. He will play Charles Scott, a communications entrepreneur who was once romantically involved with Abby.

Buttons, whose trademark is his bright red hair and a comedy routine about famous figures who "never had a dinner," has been working since he graduated from knickers to long pants. At 20, he became the youngest second banana in vaudeville at Minsky's Gaiety Theater. Young Aaron Chwatt, who was already known as Red Buttons, took the job after returning home one summer from the Catskills. "I was a gutsy kid," he said.

## Spy thrillers for "Mystery!" in production

LONDON (AP) — The game is afoot this summer, as television cameras track spies, counterespies and moles from Mexico City's Presidential Palace to Berlin's Checkpoint Charlie.

Two British miniseries, based on spy thrillers by Len Deighton and John Le Carre, are in production for future broadcast.

"Game, Set and Match," a 13-hour series based on a trilogy by Deighton, is filming in Britain, West Germany and Mexico. It will not complete production until October and probably will open the 1988-89 season of "Mystery!" on public television in the United States.

"A Perfect Spy," which combines espionage with Le Carre's remembrances of his father, winds up filming in July. The seven-hour miniseries is expected to be the first offering in the 1988-89 season for Mobil's Masterpiece Theatre.

"By the time we finish 'Game, Set and Match' it will have taken four months longer than the first world war," said Brian Armstrong, who is producing for Granada Television International.
