North describes shredding, cover-up plans

WASHINGTON — Lt. Col. Oliver North testified Thursday that he shredded evidence as part of a long-planned cover-up of his role in the Iran-Contra affair even as investigators from the attorney general were searching his office a few feet away last November. The Justice Department disputed his account. He also boasted he was the "fix-it Ollie" who got sensitive jobs done and said the plan was that he would "take the hit" to shield President Reagan if the Iran-Contra dealings were revealed. "For whom were you going to be the scapegoat?" asked Senate Iran-Contra committee counsel Arthur Liman. "For whomever necessary," North

replied. "For the administration, for the president." He said he particularly wanted to hide the connection of the late CIA Director William J. Casey with the scheme involving using profits from Iranian arms sales to supply weapons for the Nicaraguan rebels. North said he planned to go silently all along, and that he believes people who placed him in the "fall guy" position — such as Casey and former National Security Adviser John Poindexter — never foresaw that he might face criminal charges. "I do honestly believe they expected that somebody would go quietly," he said. "And Ollie intended to do so right up to the day that somebody decided to start a criminal prosecution." After the joint committees ended their televised session, they moved to closed-off

fourth-floor offices in the Capitol with North to review classified matters, some of which arose from documents he had turned over. No participants questioned would give details, but one panel member said the atmosphere was "very calm and noncombative" compared to the public hearing. At the end of the two-hour meeting, North left under heavy guard and was driven away in a six-car motorcade with red lights flashing. Between the public and private sessions, North showed reporters a stack more than a foot thick of yellow telegrams that he said supported him. "These have come in this afternoon," North told reporters. "I once again would like to thank all the thousands and thousands of Americans who expressed their support."

North said he shredded documents until practically the moment he was fired by President Reagan at mid-day on Nov. 25. He described one incident that occurred a few days earlier in which three investigators for Attorney General Edwin Meese III were in his office next door to the White House looking for evidence relating to secret arms shipments to Iran. In the meantime, North said, he was combing his files and removing "documents that could demonstrate U.S. control of a covert operation" — the use of Iranian arms sales profits to aid the Nicaraguan rebels. As he found them — including some that identified "people in Europe who helped get weapons for the Contras," — he carried them to the shredder just outside the door. Meese's men saw him and could hear the

machine but didn't ask him to stop, North said. "They were working on their projects; I was working on mine," he said, as laughter broke the tension in the hearing room. He wasn't only shredding, he said, but also working on the problem of the U.S. hostages being held in Lebanon. Asked by Liman "do you deny you were destroying documents to avoid the political embarrassment of having them seen by the attorney general's staff?" North replied: "I do not deny that." Justice Department spokesman Terry Eastland disputed North's story about the shredding. "I have talked with both John Richardson and William Bradford Reynolds in detail about this," he said. Attack stresses value of escorts

WASHINGTON — An Iranian attack on a U.S.-owned tanker Thursday does not require reprisals but does underscore the protection U.S. warships could give to American-flag vessels in the Persian Gulf, Reagan administration officials said. The attack on the Peconic "shows the risk involved to unescorted ships in the area," said Defense Department spokesman Robert Sims. "It is certainly less likely that ships would be attacked if they are under military escort than if they are not." U.S. warships escorting American-flag vessels have intercepted approaching Iranian patrol boats in the past and informed them that the merchant ships were not carrying war material to Iraq, and the Iranians have not interfered, said Sims.

Letter sent to Magic Valley Regional Medical Center

Insurance firm warned against portions of policy

TWIN FALLS — Magic Valley Regional Medical Center's insurance company sent a "strongly worded" letter to discourage the hospital from adopting portions of a controversial policy, according to two officials. Despite that warning, the letter was not distributed to board members who adopted the policy Monday. And officials refused to release the letter Thursday, leaving the decision to release the letter to hospital counsel Kent Taylor. Twin Falls County Commissioner Judy Felton and MYRMC Assistant Administrator for Support Services

Mitch Bausman each said the letter sent to Bausman was "strongly worded" and that it recommended against adopting a provision in a policy for not resuscitating dying patients. The letter recommended the do-not-resuscitate policy should not allow doctors to order DNRs over the phone, Felton and Bausman said. But without having seen the letter, the hospital board approved a do-not-resuscitate policy Monday under Trustee Dr. A.C. Emery's motion allowing doctors to phone in DNR orders. Emery contended that doctors familiar with patients' wishes should be allowed to order a DNR over the phone.

Taylor said he is studying the Idaho Open Records Act to determine whether the letter must be released publicly and expects to make his decision today. He said it was his understanding the letter wasn't distributed to board members because it was strictly an administrative matter. Taylor said the Farmers Insurance Group is the company handling the hospital's coverage affected by the DNR policy. It was only intended to be discussed, Taylor said. "I think it was primarily an administrative matter." Voting against the DNR policy were Trustees Jim LaGrone and

Frank Arana. While respecting Emery's ability to care for patients, LaGrone said Thursday he heeded an insurance consultant's warnings from last spring to not allow the phone calls. "As a trustee of the hospital, it was where I saw my duty was," LaGrone said of his vote. He said he hadn't seen the letter from the insurance company. Arana also said he hadn't heard of a letter, but that he sensed the insurance company was against allowing the phone calls. "I think we're getting vibes from the insurance company," Arana said. "My understanding is that they want something more concrete

than the doctor's call." Bausman said that after speaking with Taylor Thursday he would not release the letter. Bausman said since the letter wasn't distributed to board members for their decision, it wasn't a public document. Felton also deferred to Taylor for whether the letter would be released. Beyond Bausman, Felton and Taylor it is unclear how many people have read the letter. It is also unclear what effect the risk of allowing phoned-in DNR orders would have on hospital insurance rates. "I don't believe it (letter) addresses the rates," Taylor said.

ACLU checking into state pay raises

TWIN FALLS — The American Civil Liberties Union is investigating whether the Idaho Personnel Commission is discriminating against women and minorities in doling out pay raises for state employees. "As a result of our investigation, we have grave concerns regarding the methodology used by the Idaho Personnel Commission in performing its salary survey," said Stephen Farr, an attorney with the ACLU office in Denver in a letter to Richard J. Hutchison, state personnel director. Farr said on the surface, "the rate study performed by the IPC appears to discriminate against the lower classifications of employees consisting predominantly of women and minorities." Hutchison said Wednesday the

state system was equitable. "People all the way up and down the line are receiving raises," Hutchison said. "It doesn't discriminate against any group." But a female resident disagrees. "Essentially, the situation is that those receiving more money will get more money, and those at the lower end will get nothing," said Thany McNevin, who studied the state's salary survey. "It isn't right. There's nothing fair about it." McNevin, a sociologist who has done consulting work for the state, contended the Mountain State's Regional office of the ACLU after he finished a month-long investigation on behalf of some state employees in the Magic Valley. McNevin's wife, Anne, works for the state Health and Welfare Department, but she will be getting a raise, he said. McNevin said he found the state's system was "seriously flawed."

In particular, he criticized the way the state Personnel Commission conducted its salary survey that became the basis for who will get pay raises. In January, Gov. Cecil Andrus recommended a 5 percent across-the-board pay hike for all state employees. But the Legislature chose instead to adopt a percent "payline move" effective Sept. 20. The move means 6,000 state employees will receive a 5 percent pay increase, and 230 employees will receive a 10 percent pay hike. But about 2,500 state employees will receive no pay raise. McNevin said the Personnel Commission used two different methods to determine salaries. The state uses a point system to rank state employees. Employees below 320 points were compared to in-state positions, while employees at 320 points or over were compared with out-of-state positions that paid

more money. "I kept asking why they drew this arbitrary line and there was no answer," McNevin said. "There was no rhyme or reason." The survey is based on what's going on in the marketplace, Hutchison said. If you have a Burger King in Twin Falls, you don't care what the Burger King in Portland is doing because somebody from Portland is not going to move to Twin to work for minimum wage," he explained. "But if you have to recruit a doctor, you have to look more at national rates." Hutchison said the same reasoning applied to state employees. Idaho does not have a pool of profes-

Inactivity has strong link to heart disease

ATLANTA — Lack of exercise may be as strongly linked to heart disease as are three better-known culprits: smoking, high blood pressure and high cholesterol, the national Centers for Disease Control said Thursday. Prompted by a lack of solid findings in previous research on physical activity and heart disease, the CDC launched a two-year analysis of 48 previous studies on the topic. When suspected flaws in some of those studies were taken into account and removed, the CDC said, researchers were left with a consistent statistically

significant association between a lack of exercise and coronary heart disease. The CDC also found that people at the lowest levels of physical activity had a risk of heart disease 1.9 times greater than those at the highest level. That risk is statistically similar to the increased risks for pack-a-day smokers, people with high blood pressure and those with elevated serum cholesterol levels. "The results indicate that physical inactivity raises your risk of coronary heart disease," said Dr. Carl Caspersen, a researcher with the Atlanta-based CDC. "In general, most studies have seemed to indicate a consistent statistically

Aryan congress turns to family events

HAYDEN LAKE (AP) — With many of its leaders in jail or under federal indictment for setting the annual Aryan Nations congress Saturday and Sunday will stress "family-oriented" activities, a spokesman says.

More than 250 leaders of right-wing extremist groups, including some white supremacists facing federal sedition charges, are expected to gather north of Hayden Lake this weekend for the national Aryan Nations Congress, spokesman Richard Masker said.

Among those expected to speak are the Rev. Richard Butler, pastor of the host Church of Jesus Christ, Christian (Aryan Nations), and Robert Miles, self-proclaimed pastor of the right-wing Mountain Church of Cohectah, Mich. Both Butler and Miles were among more than a dozen white supremacist leaders indicted in April on federal charges of conspiring to overthrow the U.S. government.

Activities planned at the congress include horsehoses, an astronomy session, singing and games for children, Masker said.

Meanwhile, a group of Montana residents say they will stage a peaceful picket outside the entrance to the Aryan Nations compound on Saturday.

"These Nazis and KKK'ers want to come to the

Northwest because they feel there are no 'minority problems' here," said Missoula resident Perry Glessman, a member of the group planning to picket. "We plan to directly show them that their problem will be with the vast majority of Northwest residents who know that racial and religious diversity is a valued and necessary component of our society."

The second annual Kootenai County Human Rights celebration, held last year as a response to the Aryan congress, will be held July 18-19, a week after the white supremacists have gone, said Norm Gissel, a Coeur d'Alene attorney on the Kootenai County Task Force on Human Relations.

"If there's a response, our conference on the 18th would be the answer to how people in this community feel about racism," Gissel said.

Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus is expected to give the keynote address at the human rights celebration.

Butler's trial on the sedition charge was originally scheduled to begin July 6 at Fort Smith, Ark., but has been continued. A federal indictment alleges plans to overthrow the government were made at Butler's compound during a similar gathering in 1983.

Masker said the leadership conference gives

participants a "chance" to "communicate" with similar groups throughout the country.

The congress is to "awaken Americans to the international conspiracy that is destroying the fabric" of the country, encourage more white supremacists to come to the Northwest and to strengthen the bonds within the international white supremacist movement, he said.

The groups contend there is a conspiracy by Jews and minorities to subvert the white race and deliver the United States into communist hands.

"This is not a secret meeting to do any plotting against the government," said Masker, who calls himself an international "conspiratorologist" doing research in northern Idaho.

The congress is open to the public and law officials have been invited to attend, he said.

Kootenai County Undersheriff Larry Broadbent said the department will not have a representative attending the conference, although it is likely officers will do surveillance work at the compound entrance during the two-day conference. He estimated about 400 people attended last year's gathering.

Butler, 65, has described his church as white separatist, modeled on South African apartheid, rather than white supremacist.

Sunday liquor sales issue returns

PARIS (AP) — Bear Lake County tavern owners are getting another chance to revive the county ordinance allowing the sale of liquor by the drink on Sundays during the summer.

The county commission has scheduled a public hearing on the controversial issue next week to give Bear Lake residents the opportunity to voice their opinions on easing the local liquor laws.

Earlier, the commission approved Sunday liquor by the drink sales on a 2-1 vote only to unanimously rescind that decision after consulting with County Attorney Lynn Brower.

Commissioner Warren Wright opposed the emergency ordinance allowing Sunday sales between Memorial Day and Labor Day, contending the commission should, first, hear "the voice of the people."

Cheaper than new generating plants

Council pushes power conservation

POST FALLS (AP) — Conservation practices remain cheaper than building new electrical generating sources, according to a preliminary study endorsed Thursday by the Northwest Power Planning Council.

The four-state panel also agreed to continue to develop strategies to convince financial institutions to give preferential treatment to customers buying or building energy-efficient homes.

The council spent most of its session discussing the draft Analysis of Conservation Measures, a five-year review of conservation measures and resources implemented by the Bonneville Power Administration under the Northwest Power Act of 1980.

Under the act, energy conservation is considered a power source, just as hydroelectricity or thermal power are considered resources.

To ensure that conservation is given priority, the law gives it a 10 percent cost advantage when relative cost-effectiveness of resources is

considered.

"The council must complete the analysis by Oct. 1."

"The question we have to answer is whether conservation is hurting the BPA or the consumers," said Duley Mahar, spokeswoman for the council. "The preliminary finding is it is not. Our finding is that conservation is cheaper than other generating resources, even without the 10 percent break," she said.

In order to analyze the cost-effectiveness and consumer equity of conservation, it was compared to the power source it would most likely displace, a large coal plant.

BPA offers residential, commercial, industrial, and irrigation power conservation programs.

Conservation is also the region's most flexible resource because it can be developed in increments and put into use immediately, the analysis says.

For instance, it would take years to build coal-fired or nuclear power plants. If a perceived need

for more power fails to materialize—the region would then be stuck with the plants, like the four nuclear projects that were abandoned or mothballed by the Washington Public Power Supply System.

Conservation can come on line immediately when homes are built using the Model Conservation Standards, Ms. Mahar said.

"We believe that houses built to MCS are our most important resource to benefit the region," she said. "It's a cheap resource, one that you'll benefit from immediately as we increase the population and increase the demand for electricity."

A council briefing paper said most appraisers do not include the value of energy-saving measures, even though guidelines established by lenders authorize them to. Builders have said exclusion of the value of conservation measures in home appraisals is the single greatest deterrent to constructing energy-efficient housing in the Northwest, the paper said.

U of I a long way from getting off list

MOSCOW (AP) — Four years after being blackballed, the University of Idaho is as far as ever from being taken off the "censure list" of the American Association of University Professors.

That is the assessment of local AAUP officials, who point the finger at the "Idaho Board of Education."

"The financial exigency policy approved by the board of regents last fall really moved us farther away than closer to removing the censure," said James Jones, an agricultural economics professor and president of the local AAUP chapter.

The association censured the Moscow school in 1983 after the firing of Lois Pace and six other tenured professors during a declared financial emergency in 1981.

Ms. Pace sued the university in 1982, and the Idaho Supreme Court eventually upheld her contention that a financial emergency did not actually exist when she was fired and that university officials should have examined other options before the firings.

Ms. Pace accepted an out-of-court settlement in December 1986 of \$325,000, plus attorney

fees. All but one of the other professors also have received cash settlements.

Following court rulings in Ms. Pace's favor, the Idaho Board of Education revised its definition of financial exigency, over the vehement objections of higher education faculty throughout the state.

The new policy changed wording in the definition of a financial emergency from "a demonstrably bona fide, imminent financial crisis which threatens the viability of an agency, institution, school, office or department as a whole" to "a demonstrably bona fide financial crisis which adversely affects..." the institution.

Jones said loosening the definition only hurt the UF's position as far as meeting the AAUP standards. "It leaves very little safeguard for faculty in there," he said.

An article in the July 1 issue of the Chronicle of Higher Education listed institutions still censured by the AAUP following the organization's 73rd annual meeting last month. The University of Idaho was on the list.

Inquest probable in shooting death

DUBOIS (AP) — Coroner Ernest Sill said he will hold an inquest. The shooting occurred at Sullivan's home, about 20 miles west of Dubois near Liddy Hot Springs.

But Sill said Wednesday that he would wait for reports from the Idaho Bureau of Investigation before deciding whether to look further into the June 27 slaying of Thomas E. Sullivan, 65.

"Before we can hold an inquest we need all of the information," Sill said. But, "it looks very much as if

we will hold an inquest."

The shooting occurred at Sullivan's home, about 20 miles west of Dubois near Liddy Hot Springs.

Idaho high court to receive award

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court will receive the American Judicature Society's Special Merit Citation July 15 in San Valley for its contributions to improving the administration of justice.

The Idaho Supreme Court has gained national prominence for its efforts to reduce court delay and has set — an example — for courts throughout the nation, a society news release said.

Idaho was the first state to adopt suggested national time standards for trial courts and to adopt appellate time standards. Idaho also was cited for instituting a statewide "delay reduction program" using computerized reports to monitor the progress of cases.

Bork nomination is no guarantee of conservative victories

Few predictions or prophecies are so perilously prone to error as those concerning the future opinions of U.S. Supreme Court nominees.

The president's newest nominee, appellate court judge and former Yale Law School professor Robert H. Bork, is more easily predictable than most.

As a scholar, he has set forth his views with specificity, notably on antitrust, where he has favored fewer restraints on mergers and less regulatory interference with free enterprise.

As a judge, he has sculpted in virtual stone positions that will be difficult, if not impossible, to reshape.

On homosexual rights, for example, his majority opinion in *Bronenberg vs. Zech* rejects emphatically the claim that there exists a constitutionally protected right to homosexual conduct, and presages a limited concept of constitutionally founded privacy rights.

His concurring opinion in *Ollman vs. Evans* indicates with equal explicitness a desire for judicially crafted rules limiting claims of libel plaintiffs and protecting the press from "a freshening stream of libel actions" that may threaten First Amendment rights.

As a scholar and writer he has commented prolifically — denouncing, for example, the U.S. Supreme Court's decision in *Roe vs. Wade*, which struck down state laws against abortion.

Underlying and uniting many of these positions is a general set of conservative principles:

Courts should practice restraint — interpret the law, not make it — and respect judicial precedent. Courts should invalidate statutes only when they are clearly unconstitutional.

In interpreting the Constitution, the intent of the founders, not the philosophies of particular judges, should determine the outcome.

To the extent any philosophy is appropriate in interpreting statutes or the Constitution, less government is preferable to more; the less governmental intervention or regulation, the better.

As prolific and specific as Bork, 60, may have been in the past, he has not addressed directly many of the most significant issues likely to arise in the two decades or more that he may be expected to serve if he is

confirmed by the Senate.

On the issue of job preference for women and minorities in cases of employment discrimination claims, for example, he has no clear record and his vote will be the swing one in light of the court's 5-4 split in recent decisions.

More important, there is something about being a Justice of the Supreme Court that changes people and their opinions. Perhaps it is the guarantee of life tenure or the curious combination of collegiality and contentiousness among nine people bound for life as an institution. It may be the majesty of the physical setting or the isolation and austerity of the lifestyle. Or it may be that people of great creativity and restless intellect simply tend to grow, especially in changing times.

Whatever the reason, justices and their views do change, sometimes to the immense chagrin of the presidents who appoint them.

One example is Harry A. Blackmun, another former U.S. appellate court judge who was expected to be a "conservative" when President Nixon appointed him in 1970. Blackmun was initially nicknamed one of the "Minnesota twins" — Chief Justice Warren E. Burger being the other — and was expected to be Burger's ideological shadow. He proved to be the opposite.

As a law clerk to Blackmun during the 1974-75 term, I recall vividly his wrestling with questions of criminal law, civil rights, affirmative action, abortion and other issues on which he has made a mark and record that set him far apart from other Nixon appointees.

It was, and no doubt has continued to be, a process of deliberation and debate — with his law clerks in the privacy of his chambers, with litigants in open court and with his fellow justices in their conferences open to no one but themselves. He listened attentively and his initial leanings were often open to influence by the force of law, logic or fact in the record.

Bork is regarded, with more than a little respect, as a doctrinaire conservative, making him less pragmatic and more predictable than Blackmun and other conser-

vatives who have been appointed to the court.

Bork and Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia, who served with him on the appellate court, constituted the intellectual leadership of the conservative faction and provided the impetus for that court's shift in ideological approach. They set the court, once one of the most liberal in the nation, in an entirely different direction, encouraging a similar transformation on other benches.

If he is confirmed, Bork must have in mind the impact on public opinion and respect for the court of massive reversals of precedent on which lower courts and the country have relied.

The court has no "divisions" to enforce its orders and opinions. It must rely on the respect accorded it by other branches of government and the individuals who control them, and the mystique it commands in the country at large. Abrupt turns of legal

principle undermine the stability of the system and support for the court. In this context, a justice may feel more secure in a lonely minority of two or three, where his impact is problematic, than in the swing vote making a majority in a decision that dramatically changes the law. Being doctrinaire and eschewing pragmatism is a luxury more easily enjoyed by a justice who speaks only for himself or other dissenters than one who writes for the court and whose every word will be scrutinized for its precedential import.

In addition, a major reversal of Supreme Court doctrine would conflict with a fundamental tenet of Bork's conservative philosophy, namely judicial restraint, which places a premium on precedent and strictly limits the role of judges as lawmakers. Similarly, Bork would contradict his own views of judicial restraint were he to impose his personal philosophy on the legal process, which is supposed to be objective and more lasting than any participant.

As a matter of personality, Bork is inclined to listen — to hear out those with different or opposing views. When I was a student of Yale Law School, I had occasion to seek him out as well as take his courses. His *sometimes dour mien* masked a lively wit and sense of humor, which he was likely to turn on himself as others.

His views were expressed with articulate force in debates with students and fellow faculty members, who often disagreed with him during his years on the Yale faculty. Similarly, on the bench, Bork is reputed to be a good listener and lively debater, unafraid to be in a dissenting minority.

Whether his opinions were ever changed by debate is another question. With an intellect so disciplined, beliefs so strongly held and a position of such enormous power, his mind may be impregnable and his views unalterable. That question, perhaps an enigma even to him at this point, poses a challenge to senators who must advise and consent to his appointment.

His opponents are not willing to wait for the answer in light of his record. They are making the vote a litmus test of liberalism.

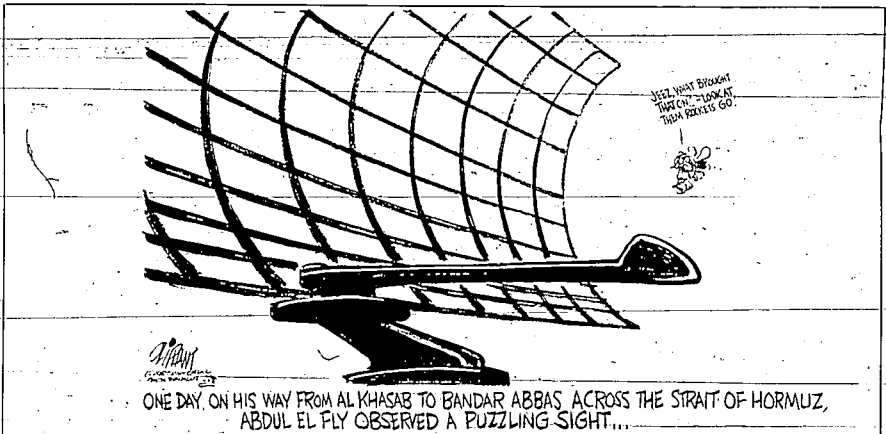
Hanford and INEL here in Idaho are in competition for the SIS project. Hanford's success or failure in getting this project underway is of critical importance to the future of the Tri-Cities. As stated in the recent Times-News article the Tri-Cities is economically dependent on plutonium production and an estimated 17,000 jobs would be lost if defense work were to end there. Do we here in Idaho want to put ourselves in a similar situation? Changes in technology or changes in our government's defense strategy could suddenly turn what some view as a positive economic move into economic disaster. Do we want our economic future based on the production of war materials? Do we want to see a continued arms buildup, an ever-increasing tension among the

countries of our world and a guaranteed economic decline? Hanford is becoming a less desirable site for the DOE because of ever-increasing concern by people of the area of the dangers that this type of industry presents. There have been numerous reports of radiation problems and coverups of these problems. Do we want the DOE to transfer these problems to our area?

Why is the SIS project needed anyway? DOE plutonium production takes place at Hanford, Washington and at Savannah River, S.C. All of the production reactors are old and unsafe. The N-Reactor at Hanford has been shut down for safety improvements, although restart is planned, opposition by citizens of Washington, Idaho and Oregon may delay or prevent startup. There is also increasing talk in Congress of permanent closure. With this setback in production, DOE proposes to use the SIS to refine about six metric tons of plutonium that is in storage at Hanford or enough to keep SIS in operation for seven years. The whole SIS project is a ploy to use it to extract weapons grade plutonium from nuclear waste of commercial power plants. This is currently prohibited by law.

Enough nuclear weapons and material to build them exist already. We need no further production. Presently our government is not able to inventory present nuclear materials or account for missing stocks. Who has our plutonium? Enough is enough. Let us, the citizens of Idaho, stand up and take an interest, an active part in our economic future and our country's destiny. People pushing this military-industrial complex have no concern for anything but their profits and in reality they have no concern for us themselves. There are only losers in this game. Some of us are ignorant, some apathetic and most victims of our government's irresponsibility as citizens of a free society.

The challenge of the conversion of our economy to peaceful purposes can start with us here in Idaho. If it does not take place, through the fact that much of our country's labor, wealth and resources are spent on the production of war, our society can only continue to spiral upward until it reaches a point of no return. Andrus' perception completely wrong

Gov. Andrus wants the public to believe that NRA leaders in Washington, D.C., and California graded his positions on gun-related issues last year and decided to oppose him in the gubernatorial race. The problem with the perception Andrus is fostering is that it's completely wrong. On September 10, 1986, Andrus's responses were graded in Idaho, by Idahoans. I was there, along with several others representing the Idaho Rifle and Pistol Association, the Idaho Hunter's Association and Idaho members of the NRA. We graded all the questionnaires submitted by candidates and endorsed both Democrats and Republicans. Democrat Richard Stallings was endorsed and ultimately received \$9,800 in campaign contributions from the NRA. Candidate grades were based on information they provided and on their records on hunting and gun-control issues. Of great significance in scoring Andrus was his performance as Secretary of the Interior, when he attempted to keep hunters out of 40 million acres of prime hunting

land in Alaska. He succeeded in closing some 20 million acres.

Rupert Andrews, a former director of the Alaska Fish and Game Department, has said " Cecil Andrus is no friend of sportsmen and hunters." In Idaho, we were "and are concerned that Andrus might repeat such performances here. The Governor's staff knew about the local grading system in September '86. An Andrus supporter also met with an NRA official that day. Andrus surely knew about the session soon after. Why, then, does he insist on blaming NRA leadership for decisions made by Idaho hunters and sportsmen? Perhaps it is less embarrassing for him to blame his low score on an out-of-state group.

His actions have earned him the praise of Handgun Control, Inc., a gun-control lobby in Washington, D.C., which applauded him. Barbara Lautman, of Handgun Control, Inc., was quoted in a July 1987 story in the Moscow-Idahoan as saying "I think it's encouraging when someone like Gov. Andrus will stand up to them (the NRA)." That's the real embarrassment — having the Governor of a prime hunting state earning the praise of a group like Handgun Control.

The Governor still owes an apology to NRA leaders and members. Otherwise, his refusal to apologize and his talk of "retribution" will give Idahoans cause for more concern about the Governor's attitudes and future actions toward the hunting rights they have guarded throughout the history of this state.

Plant closing, layoff notice provisions win senators' OK

WASHINGTON (AP) — Union-backed provisions requiring 60-day notice of plant closings and layoffs survived a hard-fought effort to delete them from the Senate's sweeping trade bill Thursday.

"The American worker has waited 15 years for this," Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., declared as the Senate rejected, 60-40, an effort to veto the plant-closing provisions. Critics said it made a presidential veto likely and thus threatened to torpedo the whole trade bill.

After the plant-closing vote, the Senate, in a sharp switch, eased provisions aimed at narrowing the president's leeway to turn down import curbs designed to shield U.S. industries from foreign competition.

That action, approved on a voice vote, marked a reversal from Tuesday when trade bill sponsors fought off an effort by Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore., to broaden the president's latitude to reject import curbs recommended by the U.S. International Trade Commission.

The Senate approved first an

amendment sponsored by Sen. Bill Bradley, D-N.J., that would allow the president to reject such tariffs and quotas if the burden of import relief would fall "disproportionately" on the poor. It then accepted a proposal by Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, to empower the president to turn down such tariffs if they would unduly hurt farmers.

"Almost all import relief disproportionately burdens the poor," Packwood said.

The two proposals were accepted with few senators on the floor after only a few minutes of discussion. The action came two days after the Senate defeated Packwood's proposal, eliminating a four-hour delay.

Packwood said the Bradley amendment allowed 90 percent of his concern and the Gramm proposal "the other 10 percent."

"I don't know, I just can't account for it," Packwood said after the Senate did its about-face. He scoffed at any notion that the amendments were passed through at dinner time without many lawmakers knowing

what was coming. "The Senate knew all about it," he said.

Sen. Howard M. Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, the chief sponsor of the plant-closing provisions, said he reported that "the workers of this country, if we bring it to full passage, will have received a very significant right that is humane, decent and fair."

The bill would require 60 days' notice to employees of impending plant closings or large layoffs at companies with at least 100 workers.

Sen. Dan Quayle, R-Ind., its leading critic, said the only remaining hope for winning presidential approval of the bill was to get the plant-closing provisions were removed in a House-Senate conference committee: House trade legislation passed April 30 contains no similar features.

The 10 Republicans and 50 Democrats who combined to fend off a move to drop the provisions would fall short of the two-thirds majority vote needed to override a presidential veto.

Lab identifies remains of 2 American fliers found in Laos

WASHINGTON (AP) — An Army laboratory has identified the remains of two Air Force fliers whose plane crashed on March 29, 1972, near Savanakket in Laos, the Pentagon announced Thursday.

So far, the Army Central Identification Laboratory in Hawaii has

identified eight of the 14 crew members of the AC-130 gunship, the announcement said.

The most recent remains were those of Air Force Capt. Charles J. Wanzel III, born July 31, 1947, of New York, and Chief Master Sgt. Edwin J. Pearce, born Dec. 8, 1947, of

Milford, Pa. It said.

Their remains were recovered between Feb. 17 and March 1 last year in a joint excavation by representatives of the United States and Laos, one of the Indonesian nations taken over by communist forces in the 1970's.

Tactics questioned

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Bill Bradley, D-N.J., asked the Interior Department on Thursday to investigate charges that rangers at the Statue of Liberty are using "strong-arm" tactics to solicit donations from visitors.

Bradley asked Secretary Donald Hodel to look into "overzealous solicitation" of donations by National Park Service employees. Bradley said his concern was sparked by an account this week in The New York Times.

The newspaper reported that the donations were sought to replace revenues lost last month, when Congress overturned a new admission fee to the New York Harbor land mark. Bradley was a sponsor of legislation outlawing the fee.

Prosecutor charges Deaver lied to protect his earning potential

WASHINGTON (AP) — Michael K. Deaver lied about his lobbying to protect his ability to make millions of dollars of income for relatively little work, the prosecutor in the former presidential aide's perjury case charged Thursday.

Deaver, former deputy White House chief of staff, is charged with two counts of lying to the House Energy and Commerce subcommittee and three counts of lying to a grand jury.

Both panels were investigating Deaver for possible violations of the Ethics in Government Act in connection with his lobbying business, Michael K. Deaver & Associates.

Deaver "knew that truthful testimony would end all chances for the sale of his business for millions of dollars, most of which would have gone to him personally — and would directly jeopardize his lucrative client contracts which generated income ranging from \$100,000 to \$475,000 per year," independent counsel Whitney North Seymour Jr., said in court papers.

The prosecutor's brief was filed in advance of Monday's scheduled start

of the perjury trial in U.S. District Court.

"One of Deaver's motives for perjury was to protect himself against embarrassment that would result

from public exposure of his ability to earn large sums of money by getting access to well-placed friends and former colleagues from making a few telephone calls," Seymour said.

Deaver has not been charged with violating the statute, which prohibits former officials from lobbying their old colleagues in government within a year of leaving office.

But Seymour said "the proof at trial will show that all the surrounding facts suggested Deaver engaged in numerous potential violations of the statute," Seymour said.

Deaver "knew that truthful testimony would reveal not only potential violations of the Ethics in Government Act... but also violations of White House policy on post-employment contacts," Seymour said.

The prosecutor said the investigations were beginning last year as several lucrative one-year contracts with such clients as Philip Morris, Canada and TWA were about to expire.

After he left the White House in 1985, TWA and Philip Morris had retained Deaver's firm for \$250,000 a year and Canada for \$100,000.

Grand jury challenges drug

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal grand jury in St. Louis, Mo., on Thursday charged a drug manufacturer, a distributor and three individuals with misrepresenting the safety and effectiveness of a drug used in treating premature infants.

The indictment alleged that the drug company received reports that "several infants" treated with the drug died from symptoms associated with the product's use. Amy Brown, a Justice Department spokeswoman, said she could not confirm that infants had died.

Assistant Attorney General Richard E. Willard, head of the Justice Department's civil division, said the indictment alleged that the manufacturer and distributor of E-Ferol Aqueous Solution knew the drug was potentially dangerous to the health of infants and had not been approved by the Food and Drug Administration for its intended use.

The indictment charged that

Carter-Glogau Laboratories, Inc., the drug's manufacturer, formerly of Phoenix, Ariz., and O'Neal, Jones and Feldman Inc., the drug's distributor, formerly of St. Louis, "developed, manufactured and marketed E-Ferol without any scientific testing to determine whether it was safe and effective for use in premature infants."

Despite the lack of testing, the indictment said, Carter-Glogau and O'Neal, Jones indicated to physicians specializing in the care of premature infants and to other medical professionals that E-Ferol could be used to treat retrolental fibroplasia, a disease that can cause blindness in premature infants.

The indictment alleged that in October 1983, O'Neal, Jones sales representatives were told to say, if asked, that E-Ferol was approved by the Food and Drug Administration for intravenous use.

Between November 1983 and April 1984, Carter-Glogau manufactured and shipped to O'Neal, Jones about 40,000 vials of E-Ferol, about 26,000 of which were distributed to doctors and hospitals nationwide, the indictment charged.

Until April 1984, the drug manufacturer and distributor "continued to represent to medical professionals that E-Ferol was safe and did not disclose to anyone using or considering using the product the severe adverse reactions and deaths which had been reported to them," the indictment said.

The indictment further alleged that all the defendants knew by Dec. 19, 1983, that "there were questions by scientific researchers concerning whether Vitamin E acetate (the type of Vitamin E used in E-Ferol), when administered intravenously, did in fact reduce the severity and incidence of retrolental fibroplasia."

Senator says Meese delay hinted at conflict of interest

WASHINGTON (AP) — An unapologetic Attorney General Edwin Meese III refused to accept blame Thursday for the failure to meet financial disclosure requirements of the federal ethics laws, telling Congress that his ties to a businessman involved in the Wedtech Corp. scandal were proper "in all respects."

"If legitimate questions existed, the proper and more responsible course of action, and the one required by federal law and regulations, would have been to ask me directly," Meese told the Senate Subcommittee on Oversight of Government Management.

Meese said he is still waiting for the Office of Government Ethics to tell him precisely what steps he must take in order to comply with the 1978 Ethics in Government Act.

Earlier Thursday, ethics office director David Martin told the subcommittee that Meese still isn't in compliance with ethics laws, despite the attorney general's year-long disclosure Monday that he made nearly \$40,000 in profits on 23 highly speculative one-day stock trades in 19 months on an investment of \$54,500.

Martin said Meese must provide additional detail on the transactions and amend his financial disclosure forms to add the information.

Meese said the newly released information, which comes after months of controversy, demonstrates "the propriety of the blind partnership arrangement in all respects."

He also said they "show conclusively that none of the partnership investments involved in any way the Wedtech Corp."

In a confrontation with subcommittee chairman Carl Levin, D-Mich., Meese conceded he "in-

advertently omitted" the investment with former Wedtech director W. Franklin Chinn on a May 24, 1985 list of his assets that was circulated to other Justice Department officials. Meese had signed the limited blind partnership with Chinn the previous day.

But Meese said the list was "not a legal requirement," even though a subordinate had written him a memorandum saying he must update the list with any new investments. The attorney general said the list had been compiled several weeks earlier, before he signed the agreement with Chinn.

Meese acknowledged that he didn't update the list, and the existence of his financial arrangement with Chinn didn't become known for more than a year, until last summer when his financial disclosure form

for 1985 was filed.

Federal ethics law requires government officials to disclose details of their investments unless they get approval from the ethics office to set up a qualified blind partnership.

Meese's only reference to the Chinn investment in his financial disclosure forms for the past two years was a three-line reference to money being invested in Financial Management International Inc., the name of Chinn's firm.

"You're the top law enforcement officer in the nation, you're the attorney general ... that's the law," Levin told Meese. "Unless you get something approved (by the ethics office), you have to report the details."

"That's not what I was told," said Meese. "I felt I was doing what the law said."

Meese said his limited blind partnership with Chinn had been approved by Justice Department attorneys after they raised questions about it last summer — and — that he was unaware the ethics office, an arm of the independent Office of Personnel Management, had any questions about it.

"They never contacted me," Meese said of the ethics office, adding that he first learned of the ethics office's objections when he read press accounts last week.

Levin also criticized Meese for failing to correctly list the entity in which Meese invested his money, Meese Partners, instead of the Financial Management International Inc. notation.

Former Defense Secretary James Schlesinger, author of a recent report recommending reconstruction of the embassy's three top floors for security reasons, declined to say if tunnels were part of the Moscow eavesdropping system, the Times said.

Tunnels not considered threat

WASHINGTON (AP) — The new U.S. Embassy in Moscow not only has walls planted with electronic spying bugs, it stands astride a network of tunnels, the State Department said Thursday in acknowledging another "potential security threat."

The tunnels, which lead to the waterworks, the electric works and the main sewer, "are not a new discovery by any means" and the parts within U.S. property "are regularly monitored and controlled and inspected by the U.S.," department spokesman Charles Redman said.

Redman commented on a Washington Times report that described the tunnels as possibly part of an elaborate Soviet intelligence eavesdropping system whose discovery has prompted the Reagan administration to consider rebuilding or even demolishing the still unfinished embassy structure.

Korean mother loses son again

Los Angeles Times
KWANGJU, South Korea — One month ago Thursday, Paek Eun Shim lost her eldest son in the South Korean political battle for Democracy when he was gravely injured by a police tear-gas grenade that struck him in the head.

He died 27 days later on a hospital life-support machine, never having regained consciousness.

"I lost" her son's body to the same cause, Thursday night when student leaders insisted that the site selected for his burial be changed and that he be laid to rest alongside the graves of 194 Kwangju residents who were killed in an uprising here seven years ago against President Chun Doo Hwan's military-backed regime.

"He is no longer only your son," one student leader told Paek. "Your son belongs to the people now."
 Paek's son, Lee Han Yol, 21, a sophomore at Yonsei University of Seoul, was finally buried after a marathon, 18-hour funeral that began with a three-mile march that drew an estimated 1

million people in the streets of Seoul, then traveled 170 miles south to this traditional anti-government stronghold.

Here in Lee's hometown, seemingly all of Kwangju's 1 million citizens poured into the streets in mourning and protest, and authorities finally deployed riot police early Friday to reclaim the downtown area that had been taken over by mourners, for nearly six hours.

Wearing riot helmets and gas masks and banging their riot shields, police charged into the streets here just after 7 a.m. to break up what had become a festival of defiance.

Some of Lee's classmates and middle-class supporters were detained. Cab drivers who had been sounding their horns and backfiring their engines in protest were stopped and ticketed.

After the huge funeral procession in Seoul, a cortege that some say matched that for slain President Park Chung Hee in 1979, other multitudes turned out to watch and applaud the procession along its route into Kwangju.

Aquino says she's relieved by U.S. restrictions on Marcos

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — President Corason Aquino expressed relief Thursday that the United States restricted ousted President Ferdinand Marcos to Hawaii after discovering his alleged plot to overthrow her.
 "I am very pleased that this statement came about at this time that again, rumors are circulating that Mr. Marcos and or Mrs. Marcos are

planning to return home," Mrs. Aquino said. "This should put these rumors to rest."
 Presidential spokesman Teodoro Benigno said the United States was watching Marcos "very, very closely." He said Mrs. Aquino had not relaxed her ban on Marcos and his immediate family from returning to the Philippines.
 In Washington, State Department

spokesman Charles Redman said the Reagan administration Aquino and had restricted Marcos was "seriously concerned" about another coup attempt against Mrs. to Oahu.

Sikh-Hindu violence continues

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Sikh terrorists killed a local Communist Party leader, his three children, a relative and a bodyguard on Thursday, the United News of India reported.

Strikers shut down New Delhi and 21 other cities to protest the massacres of 72 Hindu bus passengers by Sikh separatists earlier this week.

Five Sikh gunmen raided Chunawan village in Faridkot district of Punjab state and sprayed bullets on local Communist Party leader Sakshinder Singh and family members who were sleeping on the terrace of their home, the news agency said.

It said Sikh extremists killed two other people in separate incidents.

In New Delhi, Hindu mobs set fire to a Sikh shrine and Sikh homes, businesses and vehicles.

Police arrested 236 people, almost all Hindus. Officers fired tear gas to disperse mobs, recovered a crude bomb and ordered 300,000 residents to stay home under a curfew.

In New Delhi we have reports of only 10 incidents of violence, but no one has died. This is remarkable in view of the tension," said Rajendra Mohan, the city's No. 2 police official.

The strikes shut down most businesses, shops, movie houses and restaurants. Government offices were sparsely attended. Authorities closed schools and suspended bus service.

More than 18,000 police and an unspecified number of federal paramilitary troops were deployed in New Delhi to prevent Hindu backlash against the Sikhs, said a police source who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Violence by Hindus against the Sikh minority erupted after Sikh extremists killed 72 bus passengers in separate incidents Monday and Tuesday in Hariana and Punjab states. Militant Sikhs have been waging a guerrilla and terror campaign for a separate nation in Punjab state, where they are a slight majority.

Salvadorans stage strikes after shooting

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) — Thousands of workers, students and peasants staged strikes and demonstrations in the capital Thursday to demand higher pay and protest a police shooting in which 65 people were hurt.

In some instances, student demonstrators threw rocks at police, but no officers appeared to have been struck. Demonstrators also punctured tires on some cars near the U.S. Embassy.

There appeared to be no significant violence and no reports of arrests.

According to the National Unity of Salvadoran Workers, a loose coalition of anti-government unions that organized the protests, thousands of laborers took part in an eight-hour strike at 25 privately owned utility companies.

The stoppage was planned before Wednesday's disturbance, when police fired wildly, mostly into the air, inside the Social Security building after hundreds of striking workers forced their way in.

Unofficial reports said 65 people suffered injuries, mostly from pushing and stick-swinging during the melee.

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — Mother Teresa met Thursday with Nairobi city administrators to plead for free municipal water for a children's home her Roman Catholic order runs here.

Mother Teresa, who arrived in the Kenyan capital on Tuesday from her headquarters in Calcutta, India, handed a recent water bill to Nairobi City Commission Chairman Ngila Mwendwa and said her Missionaries of Charity Order could not afford to pay it.

Neither she nor the chairman discussed the amount, billed by the commission to the Missionaries of Charity Home for 800 slum children at Huruma in Nairobi.

"I do not intend to give the government any money that should instead go to serving the poorest of the poor," Mother Teresa, 76, told the chairman. "We have many sick and dying people in the home ... who need plenty of water. Our water bills are very high and I would appreciate if you can provide such water for free."

Mwendwa promised that "your application will be considered favorably."

Mother Teresa's order operates hospices and feeding centers for the poor and the dying in 77 countries. She was awarded the Nobel Peace prize for her charity work.

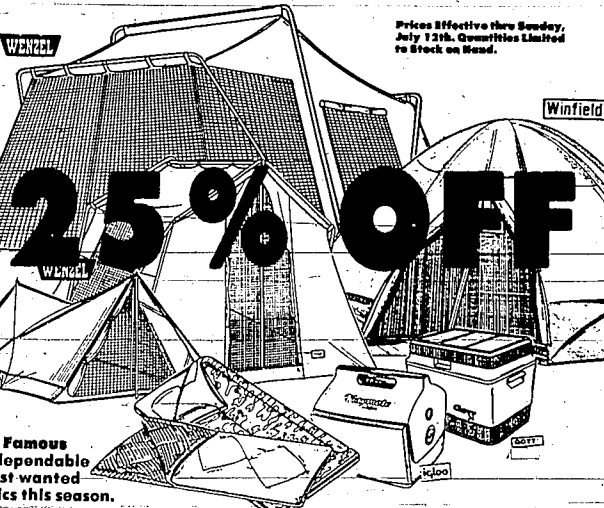

"This is the all-male retreat, for better or worse," said one of the club's 11 directors, who spoke on condition that he not be identified.

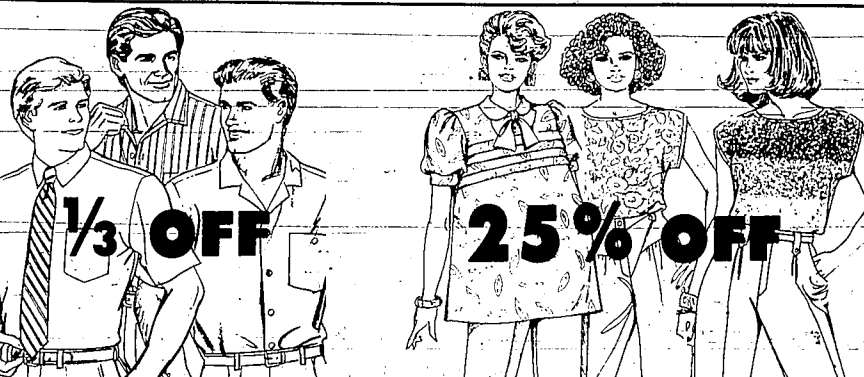
"I think most men feel that men should have the right to be away from women some of the time if they choose to be."

The U.S. Supreme Court dismissed the club's appeal September, it will be required to start an affirmative action program in hiring.

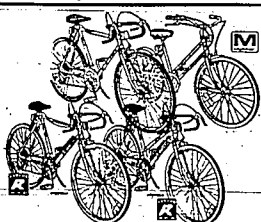

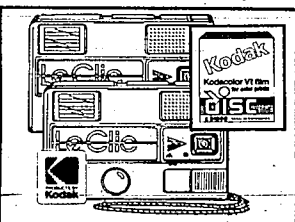

Expanded home care urged

TWIN FALLS — A state program allowing 400 Idahoans to receive health care at home instead of at an institution may be expanded to accept all Medicaid recipients.

A task force developing improvements for home-bound health care recommended that expansion to the director of the state Department of Health and Welfare, which oversees the Personal Care Services program, said task force chairman Ken Patterson.

"The overall directions were received well," said Patterson, who is also H&W Region I director in Coeur d'Alene.

However, he cautioned that the proposal to open up PCS from nurs-

ing-home oriented to a Medicaid-based system must still be studied because of costliness of accepting more people and ironing out how the new set-up would work.

He said specific recommendations, with projections of how much the program will cost, will be presented to H&W administration for final approval Aug. 1.

Two other "global recommendations" from the 13-member statewide task force feature developing a bureaucracy for hiring PCS providers and organizing a philosophy statement for PCS.

PCS helps handicapped or elderly people who don't need full-time nursing care. Instead of paying for the full care of a nursing home, those eligible can get an apartment and hire aides for specific hourly

work.

For every dollar H&W funds the program, the federal Medicaid program sends \$2.60. And PCS is only granted when savings from in-home services are cheaper than institutionalization.

But complaints prompting the task force's appointment included problems of being accepted into the program. Boise lawyer Brent Marchbanks called the process a Catch-22 because PCS recipients must prove they require institutionalized services, but are still fit enough to live on their own.

Other issues centered around complaints of H&W paying the aides, or providers, who assist PCS recipients in their homes. Aides said psychics sometimes faced months of delays, adding frustra-

tion to the \$6-an-hour job.

People with several aides each working part-time also ran into payment problems because H&W's computer would accept only one time-card for each patient.

Patterson said a state organization may be set up to hire PCS providers instead of allowing the patients to hire their own providers, as happens now.

"The services will probably be delivered better if they are delivered through a provider agency format," Patterson said.

A general philosophy statement will also be developed to further direct PCS in the future. He noted the PCS program began about four years ago serving 20 people and has grown to serve about 400.

Tupperware delays plant phase-out, underscores closure

JEROME — Tupperware is postponing the phase-out from its Jerome plant container plant temporarily, but a top executive Wednesday again closed off any possibility that the plant's announced closure could be delayed.

Clark Leslie, vice president of manufacturing for North America, said Thursday the company's gradual withdrawal will begin about one month later than anticipated.

"We're estimating it will be at least the end of September before we begin phasing down," he said in a phone interview from the company's Orlando, Fla. headquarters.

Tupperware previously had scheduled the first job losses around the end of August and the closing by the end of 1987.

The shutting of the factory might be delayed a month or two by the new schedule.

But, Leslie again doused hopes by Gov. Cecil Andrus and community leaders that the plant stay in production, saying there "really weren't (any terms) under which we would reverse the decision."

Andrus, the president of Idaho Power Co., and the state Department of Commerce had considered ways to cut Tupperware's cost of operations in order to keep the plant producing plasticware. "It (The decision) really was in no way an issue of costs, particularly any of the costs that could be influenced by the state," Leslie said.

The company, a division of Fremrak International Inc., has said a new distributor system makes it more economical to consolidate the production from the Jerome plant in two others at Hall's, Tenn., and Hingham, S.C.

Leslie, Jerome plant manager John Forbes, managers of the two remaining U.S. factories and other top corporate officials met Tuesday in Orlando to coordinate the phase-out of the 16-year-old Jerome facility.

Most of Tupperware's salaried

work force in Jerome and more than 100 hourly employees currently are seeking transfers to the Tennessee or South Carolina plants. Although less than 100 seem immediately available, Leslie said Tupperware expects to be able to take on a "high proportion" of employees interested in moving with the company, he said.

Officials from the other plants will be interviewing Jerome workers who are seeking transfers and will be contacting some skilled employees in critical jobs, Leslie said.

"Tupperware has agreed to mesh its outplacement activities for workers with those of the Idaho Department of Employment. The company also will join a Joint Labor-Management Adjustment Committee, barring any unforeseen legal difficulties," Leslie said. "I think it's a formality at this point," he said.

The factory, which has been a work force act as an advocate for dislocated workers and coordinates job-seeking efforts among various agencies. It also opens the door for federal funds to aid job placement efforts.

Although designing the phase-out itself, the company has not yet placed its 600,000-square-foot factory in a 30-acre site south of Jerome up for sale. Nevertheless, "Our intent is to try and sell the land and facilities," Leslie said.

The state and county leaders have sought donation of the 90-acre site to a local government for sale to a new industry. However, giving it away is not an immediate likelihood. "That becomes, I guess, a consideration if the building is difficult to sell... but it's much too early in the process to even consider that option at this point," Leslie said.

2 small telephone companies seek rate relief

BOISE (AP) — The elimination of a special statewide fund used to subsidize costly rural telephone service has prompted two small phone companies to seek rates three to more than five times higher than those now charged their far-flung customers.

Albion Telephone Co. Inc. and Cambridge Telephone Co. have filed petitions with the Idaho Public

Utilities Commission seeking \$423,720 and \$182,118 a year in additional revenue, respectively, to offset the toll settlement program.

In identically worded statements announcing the rate applications, Albion and Cambridge officials said the requests were the result of the P.U.C.'s decision to eliminate, effective March 1, the program of pooling other companies' long-distance revenues of all Idaho

telephone companies and then allowing them to reclaim amounts needed to cover expenses.

The pool was a victim of the 1984 court-ordered breakup of the national Bell System. Mountain Bell, the state's largest telephone company, generally underwrote the pooling of other companies' tapping Mountain Bell's contributions.

"The long-distance pooling arrangement tends to benefit Idaho phone customers who live in rural areas. Through the pooling process, local rates were kept lower than they might otherwise be. Now that's changed," Cambridge manager Rick Wiggins and Albion President O'Deen Redman said.

Jones ordered to jail for contempt of court

TWIN FALLS — Wayne E. Jones, owner of Jones Glass in Twin Falls, who was ordered to do more than pay taxes, was ordered to jail Thursday for at least five days.

Coors family members cheer on Burley barley growers

BURLEY — Idaho barley could be the base for the next lead of malt going to the Asahi Brewery in Japan. The next swallow from a Coors can in New York or Burley could have started in a field at Burley or Burley.

Fast on the grow into new markets, Adolph Coors Co. hasn't forgotten where 120 million pounds of its barley grew up last year.

"The making of Coors beer begins in your fields," John Coors, company malthouse manager, told more than 500 barley farmers and their families Wednesday at the company's annual Idaho Field Day.

The third and fourth generations of the Coors family show up yearly at the company's barley elevator and research farm at Burley to greet the growers that put the flavor in millions of gallons of the company's drinks.

Deliberately conspicuous in baseball caps and blue denim shirts decorated with barley seed heads, Coors executed

fruits fierce competition, Chairman Bill Coors said.

"Business in the brewing industry is not that good. Sales are a bit disappointing," he said, "but, on the other hand, I think we are getting our share."

Consolidation in past decades from 800 independent brewers to about 6 majors now has intensified the battle for market shares.

The state of the industry hasn't been ignored in stock markets where the price of Coors stock has lost ground this year. And, on its home turf at its brewery in Golden, Coors management is facing a union organizing drive for the first time in 10 years, the 71-year-old chairman told the farmers.

After years of union-led boycotts, Coors boils at what he calls "demands" from the United Brotherhood of Teamsters to capitulate, recognize them as bargainners and help to sign up 4,000 workers at the plant, about half of the total work force.

"Outrageous," the foisty brewer said. "If our people want a union, they'll have a union (through an election); if

they don't want a union, they won't have a union," he boasted.

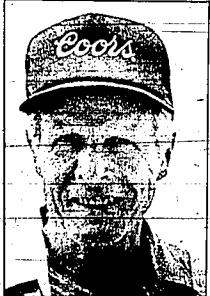
Despite its trials, the production and marketing muscle of Adolph Coors Co. remains strong, the Coors chairman said. The company is estimating significant sales growth for 1987. "Our sales should be up at least 6 or 7 percent," Coors said.

The first grains of this season's Idaho barley were to arrive at Coors' elevator in Burley Thursday, said Idaho manager Rich Greenawalt.

"This year's harvest will become the 'soul' of Coors beer, as John Coors described, in 1988."

In 1986, Coors took 30 percent of its barley from 47,000 acres grown by Idaho farmers. The company paid \$13 million for the barley, according to a press release.

Overall, Coors took 500 million pounds of barley from 1,337 growers in Idaho, Montana, Wyoming and Colorado at a cost of \$60.8 million. Similar field days are held in the other states.

WASHINGTON — The U.S. Senate has a new china policy. It didn't come out of the Senate's Foreign Relations Committee, but from an equally formidable group, the ladies of the Senate.

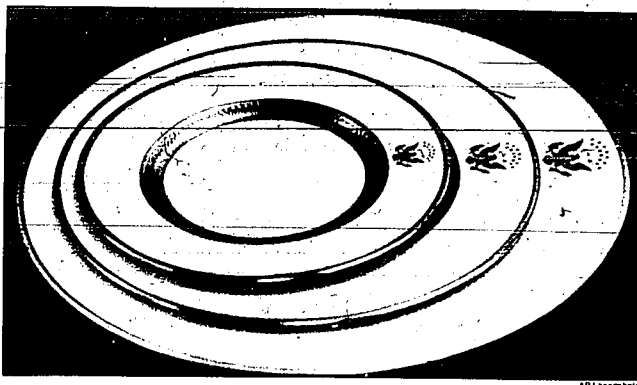
The chinaware policy, though the wives had a lot on their plate, was finally voted out in time (though many despair) for the first sample firing to be presented to Sen. Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., and his wife Erma at their 50th wedding anniversary dinner May 28, given by 50 or so senators and wives at the Library of Congress.

Sens. Robert Dole, R-Kan., and Jay Rockefeller, D-W.Va., put together the gift of 10 place settings (about 60 pieces of plates, cups, saucers and bowls) that should arrive, one hopes, before their 51st celebration.

A great deal of bipartisan effort through many Senate sessions has been necessary to be able to set the table.

The china service, designed and commissioned by the Senate wives and American-made (of course) by Lenox, will be available to all the senators and their wives, but not their children, constituents, lobbyists, PACs or Fat Cats. (Nothing, however, says you can't take up a collection for your favorite senator and hope he wills the set to you.) The china policy doesn't violate Gramm-Rudman, because the china-ware bill will be private, not public.

"I know we've been talking about choosing a Senate china-ware pattern for 25 years," said B.A. (Mrs. Lloyd) Bentson. "Carolyn (Mrs. Russell) Long tried years ago to get a consensus. But the women couldn't agree, or they'd forget what had been done so far. Time would go by, another group would be interested.

...about five years ago we took it up again. This time we got around to having Lenox make several samples for us. Not too many, because we'd be back where we started. We had a bipartisan committee, and it finally boiled down to a few of us. Someone had to make a decision."

Dishing it up was not that easy. David Marcos, head of Senate stationery supplies, worked with the women's group and Lenox. "We didn't want the seal to be so big it would be obscene or overpowering," he said. "We settled on a 1 1/2 inch diameter. We were using a bastardization — variation sounds better — of the 1804 Senate seal — stars, branches and eagle. We were

...between a rock and a hard place, because you can't have it too much like the Great Seal of the United States. So we took the stars out and put them back in — there's only so much you can do with an eagle."

The pattern starts with what Lenox calls the Mansfield shape (no relation to the former senator) and uses the Lowell pattern's gold rim. The prices aren't all firm, but Marcos bets on \$140 to \$160 per six-piece setting of dinner plate, salad, butter, cup and saucer and soup dish.

How many Senate wives will feel they can't invite anyone to dinner without having the status china has yet to be determined. "Not many of us are getting married at this point," said B.A. Bentson, married 43 years. "But I know I want the demitasse and maybe the dessert plate. I have plenty of china,

but this is important. You think that 100 years from now your children would turn over a plate and see your name on the back."

The Senate likes to think it sets the tone. But in this china policy they are behind the House of Representatives, which has had members' china for at least a quarter of a century. The White House has presidential china, with the Reagan pattern's having been provided by their friends at the beginning of his term.

Barbara Bush (who has vice presidential china), by virtue of her husband's office, traditionally presides over the ladies of the Senate.

Now the other ladies of the Senate, when their china is delivered, can borrow china from each other. Talk about pork barrels — think about china barrels!

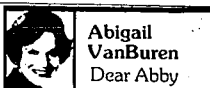
The person who committed this crime was sentenced to 14 years in prison, served only eight years, and then because of a "flawed law," was released for "good behavior!"

Burley hopes for economic boost from upgraded boat race

BURLEY — Wall Street would be impressed. On an investment of about \$80,000, organizers of this year's Burley Regatta expect an injection of as much as \$1 million into the area economy. That's a return of better than 10 to 1.

Not bad for a race that started just 11 years ago with a small group of local enthusiasts.

This, the 11th annual regatta is different because race organizers have joined with state and local government officials to make the event a showcase of what Idaho has to offer at a time when the Gem State is struggling to patch up its depressed farm economy.

"The cooperation among state bureaucrats, local government officials, and area business leaders who developed the 1987 regatta, is any indication, tourism just might

become the key to recovery.

"The state tourism department in Idaho, quite frankly, is the best I've ever worked with. . . I'm really just kind of overwhelmed with the esprit de corps from the chambers all the way up to the state capital," said Terry Phipps, owner of Phipps & Co., the Tulsa, Okla., production company that organizers have hired to put together a one-hour program on the regatta for national syndication.

"We really feel like the benefit to the state of Idaho, and specifically to Burley, is in raising the country's

consciousness about southern Idaho," said Paul Matthews, president of the Burley Chamber of Commerce and one of the prime architects of the regatta's heightened status.

"The intent, Matthews added, is to show the country, 'Not only do we raise good potatoes, we raise good boats. And many other things.'"

To that end, Matthews and other local officials have parlayed a \$20,500 promotional grant from the Idaho Travel Council into an estimated \$90,000 fund with nearly \$60,000 in prizes. Up from 10,000 spectators last year, the '87 regatta is expected to draw 15,000 to 18,000 people to this town of less than 9,000.

With floods of fans, not to mention racers and their crews, local officials expect an infusion of \$800,000 to \$1 million into local businesses over the weekend.

The effects already are being felt: all area motels have been booked for four to six weeks, Matthews said,

with some people being forced to find lodging in Twin Falls. In addition, several convenience stores have reported that orders for beverages have doubled.

And merchants handling ticket sales expect to have drained their supplies. Cindy Wiberg, co-owner of the 7-Eleven store at 2205 Overland Ave., said she had sold 150 advance tickets by Wednesday afternoon and expects the 1,800 she has left to be gone by Saturday night.

"I will be asking for more, but we probably won't get them," Wiberg said, and added, "I fully expect (business) to increase 25 to 30 percent over the last regatta."

That's just what Matthews would like to hear.

"The nice thing about this is that it's a new dollar, from out of state. We're not just trading pockets," he said. "If we can bring in new dollars, it's like a drab coin come true for Idaho tourism."

To take advantage of the economic opportunity, and to avoid gridlock on city streets from the added traffic, Burley-area merchants have commissioned Trans IV bus service of Twin Falls to shuttle people between the race site and several city shopping areas. Trans IV also will take people in Twin Falls from the Weston Inn, Holiday Inn and Canyon Springs Inn to the race site.

In marking the all-out effort to put the regatta together, Gov. Cecil Andrus held a press conference Wednesday at the Statehouse in Boise with Matthews, Phipps and others involved in the event. Andrus will fly to Burley about 4 p.m. Sunday for the final races and awards ceremony.

Nick Cozakis, executive secretary of the Burley Chamber of Commerce, credited officials from the state Department of Commerce, the travel council and the Sun Valley Co. with providing much-needed sup-

port.

"This is of primary significance as far as our travel industry is concerned," Cozakis said.

Adding to the event's impressive status are deals which already have been struck to syndicate the Phipps & Co. production of the regatta on several Idaho and Utah stations, including KMYR-TV in Twin Falls, which will air the program Aug. 1 at 1:30 p.m. But the "cornerstone of national syndication," as Phipps put it, is an agreement with the NBC affiliate in Reno, Nev., which will show the program sometime in the fourth quarter of the year.

Using a market-by-market strategy to reach network affiliates all across the country, Phipps said he also hopes to make deals with several cable networks, including the 25-million household Nashville Network.

Talks with ESPN, the cable sports network, are continuing.

Boyd's way

Ex-CSI coach hopes to rein in his emotions in Colorado State job

FORT COLLINS, Colo. — Few who know former College of Southern Idaho Coach Boyd Grant doubt that the coach can make Colorado State basketball a consistent 20-game winner. They fear that he might die trying.

Once before, coaching threatened to kill Grant. Unable to manage the pressure, he quit California State University, Fresno only 15 months ago.

Grant needed wins to relax, and in a dozen years somehow weren't sufficient. His Fresno State teams — almost annual entrants in the NCAA tournament — made a balding, bespectacled man the biggest on campus, but in town. Rather than bask in the adulation, the coach agonized over fame's burdens.

During games, veins quivered in his neck. At the end of the final buzzer, pressure rolled the blood. Grant produced one good memory after another for fans, yet intense anxiety sometimes prevented the coach from remembering how to perform the simple task of writing a check.

Success made Boyd Grant sick. "Yeah," he admits. "The doctor told me I had to change. And it was no different than when a doctor confronts somebody who is drinking too much; he tells him, 'If you keep drinking, you're going to be dead.'"

"That's exactly what the doctor told me: Learn to relax or you're in deep trouble."

By his own admission, Grant's hypertension was so severe he'd risked a stroke as long as he coached.

So, at age 52, he quit. "He's one of the few coaches who could realize it was necessary to step away from coaching before he did have a serious health problem," says William Kennedy, Grant's physician.

One year later, however, Grant rolled off the couch and into Fort Collins, Colo., vowing to revitalize Colorado State's basketball program, dormant since last obtaining a postseason bid in 1969.

"He made a mistake in going to Colorado State," grins predicts Odes-Thompson, a friend so close that when he told Grant to leave Fresno State the coach listened. "Being a Colorado State alum, having so many friends and acquaintances there, it's getting right back in the very same pressure cooker."

"He's right back to where he was in Fresno. I've got to believe he'll feel responsible to everybody in the community. It will be the same bad situation."

Grant often talked to himself, ignoring signals of falling health. Not until 1984, stuck in a room silent with wall-to-wall embarrassment, was Grant forced to acknowledge the danger. An acknowledgment. See GRANT on Page C2

Rhoden, Smith fail to make All-Stars

NEW YORK (AP) — Rick Sutcliffe of the Chicago Cubs, the National League's only 11-game winner, heads the eight-man NL pitching staff named Thursday for major league baseball's All-Star game by Manager Davey Johnson.

Sutcliffe, 31-4 with a 3.47 earned run average, will be joined by 10-game winner Mike Scott of Houston and Orel Hersher of Los Angeles, nine-game winner Sid Fernandez of the New York Mets and Rick Beuschel of Pittsburgh, who has a 7-4 record and leads the league with a 2.32 ERA.

Bret Saberhagen of Kansas City, coming back royally from a season of injury and frustration, will lead a nine-man pitching staff chosen Thursday by Manager John McNamara for the American League team.

The AL staff has four left-handers, including Bruce Hurst, the only member of McNamara's Boston Red Sox's staff on the team. The other left-handers are Mark Langston of Seattle and relievers Dan Plesac of Milwaukee and Dave Righetti of New York.

The rest of the AL staff includes right-handers Jack Morris of Detroit and Mike Witt of California — and relievers Tom Henke of Toronto and Jay Howell of Oakland.

New York Yankees pitcher Rick Rhoden, third in the American League in victories, says he was left off the All-Star team because of accusations he throws scuffed pitches.

"I don't know what else it could be," he said shortly after the nine-man AL pitching staff was named. "I'm sure they'll say it wasn't the reason, but I'd like to know what it was then."

Rhoden, 31-5 with a 3.76 ERA, has won more games than all but two of the AL All-Star pitchers — Saberhagen and Morris.

"I'd deserve to go as much as anybody," he said. "I'm a little frustrated and a little angry."

Malay begins defense of his state amateur title

JEROME — Joe Malay of Weiser, Idaho's men's amateur state golf champion by acclaim, has accepted, and begins his quest for an official two-year reign today.

He will be defending the title he won at Pocatello's Riverdale Municipal Golf Course a year ago over the next three days at the Jerome Country Club.

It is, of course, totally possible that Malay can be unseated. The truth is, Idaho golf will never be a loser with Malay around — but other parts of the amateur world will be.

Malay has been a continual bulldozing dominating force in the Idaho amateur game for many years. Not only because he is considered the consistent, consummate driver by many or because he last year finally attained the title — about the only thing that has

eluded him over the years.

He has become the personality of Idaho golf.

There's little doubt this has been a banner year for Idaho amateur golf and Malay. He has visited the Oregon Amateur, the Pacific Northwest Amateur and, most recently, the prestigious Sunnahauna Amateur in Pennsylvania where he finished sixth.

But the key thing for Idahoans to remember is that Malay represents Idaho golf. Once he's on the site, the media gravitate to him.

"I've had a lot of traveling with Joe to some of this out-of-state tournaments and it's the same thing whether he's in Oregon, Hawaii or Pennsylvania," says Idaho Golf Association Executive Director Wayne Berry. "Joe attracts the media — and more than his share."

"I talked to the director of the Pacific Northwest Amateur just last week. He told me that Joe had been

the main reason for some major coverage in the Portland Oregonian. He's loving it. He said we've never had coverage like this before and it's all because of Joe. I've seen the stories they wrote about Joe during the Sunnahauna in Pennsylvania. For the Oregon Amateur."

"The great thing," Berry enthused, "is that his demeanor, his dress, his public image, his ability to communicate with galleries and the media — they complement all the things we are trying to accomplish in Idaho amateur golf."

It was for sure that even his closest competitors were obviously pleased when Malay beat them out last year.

"I am pleased," four-time winner Scott Masingill, Fayette, said at the time — and meant it.

So it matters only from an official standpoint whether the reign of Malay goes for two years.

How does he feel about this increasing praise that comes his way — especially when applied to the mental preparation aspects for defending that title?

"I guess it really hasn't hit me," he said. "I've been very proud to travel around this year as the Idaho amateur champion."

"I'm really not that susceptible to that kind of pressure," he said of being defending champion. "That's because I've played in a lot of tournaments, won some titles and lost some. I think if I feel pressure it is because people really come out to watch me hit the tee shot. Fortunately, I started hitting the driver pretty good today (in a practice round). It's been giving me a few problems the last couple of weeks. But I know the people are here to see me hit the big drives and I think I put more pressure on myself from that standpoint than on my score."

Wichard said the Seahawks should move more quickly in submitting a formal offer.

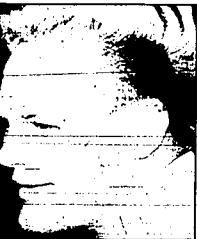
"He called Knox 'one of the

Small-town rec director winds up wearing a number of different hats

HANSEN — If an unpaid position as recreation director isn't tough enough to handle, a number of problems common to smaller communities more than fills the bill.

Most all Hansen parents can affirm the minimal \$10-fee charged their child per sport to offset insurance costs and, oftentimes, participation fees required to compete in a larger city's offerings. However, should money be the stopper, it's a good bet that a youngster can find a way to work it out and will get to play alongside his or her classmates.

"We try to run self-supporting programs — any way we can raise a penny we'll do it," says Bob Wayment, who has handled youth recreation for the City of Hansen since 1979. "There are few businesses in town. Daws Market has given us a good discount on supplies for the cockshack and most of the others have sponsored some teams—but it's just not fair to hit-up the same people all the time."



Assisted by his wife Kathy and their two children, Wayment has followed the Magic Valley rodeo circuit working the food booths in order to supplement the recreation department coffers.

"I don't know about this year, but we've finished in the black every year but one so far," Wayment said. "I've never had a hassle with the city council. They have been great about helping the program even after revenue sharing funds were cut out. And a lot of coaches who work in Twin Falls have been able to get their companies to provide sponsorship. It's pretty hard to go into another city cold and find someone to sponsor a bunch from out-of-town."

A lifelong sports enthusiast — he participated in all sports as a sophomore at Richfield High School before moving to managerial positions when his family moved to Durley — Wayment credits Wendell Rex Director Don Fowler and Twin Falls' Dennis Bowyer with imparting knowledge crucial to performing his tasks.

But, unlike many of his counterparts, Wayment has found qualified coaches hard to line up in recent years and has compensated for that shortage by employing teenagers who are familiar with the program, but lack experience.

"The younger kids like to see them do it," he said. "I think

every small town uses high schoolers as coaches because they don't get enough volunteers any other way. Besides, I think it's neat when a kid goes through the program then comes back to help in various aspects of recreation. It's a one-hus Wayment cites is that his entire family takes part in various aspects of recreation. His 13-year-old daughter Shanna was barely old enough for tee-ball and Eric, two years younger, too young for even that when he assumed his present position—nearly eight years ago, but Eric now pitches and plays infield for Bob's little league squad and he coached his daughter to a knothole basketball title this past winter.

He's been backed against a tree by an angry parent and taken good criticism to last a lifetime, but the end justifies the means according to Wayment's philosophy.

"I just like working with kids," he said. "Helping them have a little fun while they're growing up makes it all worthwhile."

'Birdie': JUMP takes major step

TWIN FALLS — It looks like school's in session, with one exception — these kids are serious. Forty-eight junior high and high school drama students sing, shout, squeal and gyrate to music provided by a four-piece combo band. They keep an intent eye on their instructor.

"Okay, walk off!" calls Robin McCracken, the blonde, bespectacled, director of the troupe.

McCracken is directing the full-length musical production of "Bye Bye Birdie," which will be performed by the Junior Musical Players (JUMP) Company at the College of Southern Idaho Fine Arts Auditorium on July 16, 17 and 18 at 8 p.m.

The musical, set in the 1950s, features a popular rock star named Conrad Birdie, a character modeled after the real-life Elvis Presley. Birdie is played by Dan Rice, 18, of Twin Falls.

Birdie's agent, Albert (Raymond Robinson, 16, of Jerome), and his secretary and girlfriend, Rosie (Kamie Hobbs, 14, of Twin Falls), decide to write a song called "One Last Kiss" after the rock star is drafted into the army. They plan to have Birdie give this one last kiss, on the nationally televised Ed Sullivan show, to a fan who has been picked at random.

McCracken, who studied set design at Brigham Young University, has been involved in all aspects of theater for the last 10 years. She said this is the first time she has directed students in a full-length musical.

"I find more and more that kids are who I enjoy working with the most," says the 25-year-old director. "I enjoy working with them and seeing them progress. It's just amazing to see what you start out with and then what you get as the end product."

McCracken says that working with the JUMP Company, which is open to children and young people from pre-school age through high school, gives her an opportunity to work with students who are serious about performing.

"These kids are just amazing," she says. "You get 50 kids up on stage exerting all of their energy and it's really something to see. That's why, a lot of the time, I prefer working with the kids. You can throw something at them that they've never done before, and they get excited about trying it instead of saying, 'No, we've never done that before; we can't do it.' What's exciting is their energy and freshness on stage."

Vera Redman, president of the board of directors for the acting company, says that the children do all of the performing and the adults work to support them.

"Right now it's the only existing theater group in the Magic Valley that we know of that's just for kids," she says. "The only adults in it are involved in an organizational capacity."

Redman says the company was started four years ago by Marty Mead of Twin Falls, who ran a drama workshop for children. Financing has come from the ticket sales to several minor productions put on each year, as well as from contributions made by businesses and individuals in the community.

"This community, as a whole, has been very supportive of the arts," says Redman. "We're holding some sort of it's just that we're really new yet."

You know, when you've only been in existence 3 or 4 years, it takes a while for people to know who you are or what you do."

Redman says that "Bye Bye Birdie," with its cast of 40 teen-agers and a large number of backstage volunteers, is by far the largest musical JUMP has attempted to perform as a theater group. The size of future productions will be determined, in part, by the public response to "Birdie."

"If the community is responsive in saying, 'We like what you do and we can support it financially, then I'm sure we'll go on and do more of this kind of thing, because it involves more kids at one time,'" she says. "But again, when you're dealing with four-digit figures, you know it makes a difference. When it's thousands of dollars to produce a show, you're tak-

ing a much bigger risk."

JUMP actress, Kamie Hobbs, says participation in the all-student group has built her self-confidence as well as given her many new friends.

"First of all, you get the experience of performing for people," says Hobbs. "The more you perform, the more comfortable you are performing. I think it also probably helped me just to be more friendly and outgoing because you're kind of forced to meet people. You learn how to talk to people and you feel better about yourself. When you get praise, it's really neat. When you're criticized, you strive to do better. It's a really great learning experience."

Seventeen-year-old Sjaan Zimmerman agrees. She plays Kim MacKee, the lucky fan of Conrad Birdie who gets the one last kiss. She said she's been in-

olved with several community theater groups in the past, but that being in a play made up entirely of young people from all over the Magic Valley has been a special experience.

"It's kind of refreshing to have a whole bunch of kids to do a whole musical. It's really a good opportunity for younger kids. I highly recommend it. I wish I knew about it when I was younger," she says.

Tickets for "Bye Bye Birdie" will be on sale in Twin Falls at Julie's Flowers, Ann's Hallmark and Jeffrey's Hallmark; in Buhl at Sav-Mor Drug, and in Jerome at Natural Way Health Foods. Tickets will also be sold at the door. Admission is \$5 for adults; \$4 for senior citizens and children 12 and under. Family-tickets, \$15 for a household, will be offered on Thursday night only.

'Witches of Eastwick' dissolves meaty premise into 'Poltergeist' brew

TWIN FALLS — Following are capsule reviews of movies currently playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.



WITCHES OF EASTWICK (R) — Under director George Miller ("Mad Max"), this film begins so promisingly, has such smashing separate moments, so succulent a cast and so interesting a premise — three lovely single-women meeting up with the Devil himself — that watching it crumble into stomach-turning crudeness and "Poltergeist" scale special effects is deeply painful. Yet whatever the movie's failings, and they are monumental, the moment in which the devil throws the definitive post-Freudian male fit, his face screwed up in awful self-pity, makes "The Witches of Eastwick" worth all we must endure in between.

HARRY AND THE HENDERSONS (G) — In this comic fantasy about a Seattle family taking home an injured Bigfoot, writer-director William Dear has so completely immersed himself in the sensibility of Steven Spielberg that he seems to disappear. The movie has Spielberg optimism and a high beautiful Spielberg sheen — but it lacks the boss' fairytale acumen; the humor and morals are closer to "Bookends and Broomsticks" than Hans Christian Andersen. But there are two triumphs: Kevin Peter Hall, in Rick Baker makeup, as Harry the E.T.-ish Bigfoot, and John Lithgow, whose gift for frenzy gets another workout as Henderson.

PREDATOR (R) — A military rescue unit led by Arnold Schwarzenegger in a terminal glover — hacks through a jungle rotten with snakes, vultures, gorgeous guerrillas and skinned corpses only to run into a murderous extraterrestrial, a monster that dresses like a robot with dreadlocks and kills them one by one while dripping green goo over everything. This high-tech-vs.-Stone Age action saga has a high-tech production (brilliant Don McAlpine photography, punchy Alan Silvestri music, flashy direction by John McTiernan) and a Stone Age script, one of the simplest and most derivative in years.

ROXANNE (PG) — It is hard to recall a current movie in which every element is in such balance as "It's Here," in a modern retelling of the Cyrano story that becomes a warm, nimble, utterly contemporary modern-romance. There is a tenderness to writer-star Steve Martin's performance as C.D. Bales that is magnetic, and Darryl Hannah's Roxanne, an astronomer, is

smart and sublimely beautiful all at once. What is interesting is to discover that the essence of the original play's love triangle — a beautiful woman finding out just who she loves, and why — is as strong in sunshine as in shadow.

THE SECRET OF MY SUCCESS (PG-13) — A misfiring comic fantasia on executive and sexual success in the Reagan era, mixed up from scraps of "The Apartment" and "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying." The writers, Jim Cash and Jack Epps Jr. ("Top Gun") do scripts so derivative you may get deja vu during their trailers, and their central play here — mallroom boy poses as executive — is ridiculous and perfunctorily worked out. But director Herb Ross and cinematographer Carlo Di Palma sometimes capture a fairytale Manhattan here.

Pagan ritual puts the drag on 'Dragnet'

HOLLYWOOD — Who put the drag in "Dragnet"? Not the actors, heaven knows. Dan Aykroyd's been off, perfecting a heavy-bodied, off-beat, spiky-footed walk, the better to play the nephew of Joe Friday. Tom Hanks has been polishing up his throwaway-ironic-delivery, the better to play Friday's fat, while Dabney Coleman has whipped up, a prissy-pervasive accent that the kids probably will have down pat by Saturday night.

But somewhere it was decreed that this beloved cop caper needed a band of hedonistic zealots in goal-skin leggings, the PAGANS — People Against Godness and Normalcy — to hold bacchanalian sacrifices as the centerpiece of its plot. Or, more likely, Joe. Doesn't anyone in Hollywood learn from anyone else's mistakes? "Young Sherlock Holmes" was a perfectly proportioned charmer until, out of

nowhere, up popped 3,000 chanting priests making ritual sacrifices under the streets of London, and everything was knocked out of whack.

Whatever the "Dragnet" radio and television shows were, they were close to the fabric of Los Angeles, which did not, as memory serves, include virgin sacrifices and pagan ritual. The "Black Dahlia" was bad enough.

It's a shame, because there is real affection for the old show knocking around for this car-chase disaster movie, rated PG-13, and there are patches of bright dialogue in the script by Aykroyd, Alan Zweibel and the movie's director, Tom Mankiewicz. It makes the film seem absolutely schizophranic.

The plot sets the new Joe Friday, still methodical, still so square you could put photo-mount corners on him, against new partner Pep Streebck (Hanks). (Actually, with that unaccustomed weight, Aykroyd looks a lot closer to Jack Webb's TV

partner, Ben Alexander, than to Webb himself.) Political and operational polar opposites, the two make a lovely non-couple, Friday smiling in scorn at anyone looser than George Bush; Streebck the '80s incarnation of the '60s free spirit.

In the course of tracking down these pesky PAGANS, on the orders of their boss, Capt. Bill Gannon (still Harry Morgan, thank goodness), the

partners come up against the ruler of a Playboy-like magazine and empire (Dabney Coleman), an unctuous TV minister (Christopher Plummer) and the Police Commissioner of Los Angeles (Elizabeth Ashley playing it like Cruella DeVil).

But the plot has miles to go before it can sleep. And the fun is some, left on the highway somewhere with the transmission of that Yugo (Plug).

TV writers earn awards for enrichment

HOLLYWOOD — In spite of what television creator Gene Reynolds called the "enormous profit imperative" dictated by the hard-line business of television, a record number of teleplays was submitted to the 13th annual Humanitas Prizes this year from television writers eager for something more meaningful than ratings success.

The winners of \$70,000 in Humanitas awards announced Tuesday included writers of CBS' "Kate & Allie," NBC's "Family Ties," NBC's "Smurfs," the CBS television movie "Promise" and a CBS "Schoolbreak Special" entitled "The Day They Came to Arrest the Book."

Finalists were selected from 440 scripts, about 100 more than were submitted last year to the Human Educational and Cultural Institute, based in Los Angeles, which gives the awards to prime-time television programs that "enrich the human person."

In addressing the group, Reynolds, a writer, director and producer for such series as "M.A.S.H.," and "Lou Grant," said: "There must be a reason why the Humanitas event has grown from a modest meeting of a few dozen people to this impressive congregation, why recipients value this prize as much as they do other prestigious awards." He paused, then added jokingly: "Maybe it's the money."

"Or maybe," Reynolds continued, "writers appreciate the encouragement Humanitas gives them in the face of the enormous profit imperatives of our business that flatten even the most committed." Humanitas reminds us yearly that there are other values to express, other experiences to convey beyond the shocking and the sensational, that America's viewers can get something more from prime time than a quickened pulse."

Writer Fay Kanin, another program speaker, said that she thought the Humanitas Prizes were particularly important in 1987, as the world watches the "moral and ethical bankruptcy which seems to have invaded our society" in the televised Iran-Contra hearings.

The 1987 awards, funded by an endowment established by a group of broadcasting companies, were made in five categories: 30-, 60- and 90-

minute programs, plus children's animated and children's live-action programs.

The \$25,000 prize for programs 90 minutes or longer went to the two-hour drama "Promise," a CBS movie that explored the issue of mental illness and starred James Garner and James Woods. The drama, cited for "its insightful probe of the arduous demands that love and fidelity can make on us" and its

"revelation of the transparent beauty of the mentally disabled," was written by Richard Friedenberg from a story by Kenneth Blackwell, Tennyson Flowers and Friedenberg.

In the 60-minute category, the winners of \$15,000 were Gary David Goldberg and Alan Uger for a special, hourlong episode of NBC's "Family Ties" entitled "A My Name Is Alex," in which Alex Keaton (Michael J. Fox) goes to a

psychiatrist to try to get over the death of a close friend. The program, mostly a monologue as Alex addresses the psychiatrist, had no commercial interruptions during its second half-hour.

The winner of \$10,000 in the 30-minute category was Bob Randall for an episode of the CBS comedy "Kate & Allie" entitled "Jennie and a Jason."

Sterling performances polish lazily paced 'Crimes of the Heart'

The following are reviews of recent releases of videocassettes of special interest.

Videocassettes

Lorimar's "Crimes of the Heart," directed by Bruce Beresford, is peopled with playwright-screenwriter Beth Henley's favorite people — lovable eccentrics. Set in a small Mississippi town, it is a few days in the life of the three thoroughly neurotic McGrath sisters. It comes across like a spoof of one of those Tennessee Williams dramas teeming with neurotic Southern women. Diane Keaton, who does the best acting in the movie, plays a whiny spinster while Jessica Lang plays a sassy singer who washed out in Hollywood. Both sisters rally around Babe (Sissy Spacek), who is facing an attempted-murder rap for shooting her husband after he finds out about her black teen-aged lover. Many critics raved about the performances, singling out Oscar nominees Spacek and Tess Harper, who plays a sniping busybody. Writer Henley does not fully explore the dramatic potential of the situation. Instead she plays up the dark comedic aspects and allows the characters' eccentricities to run wild. The pace is very lazy, which many will find annoying. In this kind of movie, you enjoy the dazzling performances and the witty dialogue. If you are in the market for a serious, intense drama, avoid this one.

Lightning Video's "Every Time We Say Goodbye" did not get much attention in theaters because fans did not want to see comic actor Tom Hanks in a drama. Too bad — they missed an entertaining little love story and a creditable performance by Hanks. In 1922 Jerusalem, a Gentle American soldier (Hanks) romances a Jewish woman (Cristina Marsillach) from a devoutly religious clan violently opposed to the affair. Of course, the lovers, also battling time (he is about to ship out), resort to secret rendezvous. A perfect rental for those in the mood for a decent, against-all-odds love story.

There is not much good to say

about Paramount's "The Men's Club," about seven buddies in the throes of assorted emotional crises. Peter Medak's direction and Leonard Michaels' script are the main reasons this drama seems bogus. Actors Roy Scheider, Harvey Keitel, Frank Langella and Treat Williams sink to the occasion.

In the movie, the pals go on a booze-and-sex binge which, of course, leads to all sorts of character revelations. Their night begins with a rowdy, destructive discussion in a shrink's living room, then segues to a fancy bordello. The movie then slides into soft-core porn: "Unbuttoned" in the second half, this movie, which did not play in theaters very long, is a popular rental. People certainly are not renting it to marvel at the performances.

Continental's "Witchboard" is an "Exorcist" rip-off, about an evil spirit unleashed by an Ouija board. And as usual, the spirit finds a pretty young woman (Tawny Kitaen) to terrorize. (Don't those spirits ever scare, the obligatory terror-in-the-shower scene and an implausible ending, there are plenty of genuinely frightening moments along the way. Director Kevin Tenney deftly sustains the eerie atmosphere.

COMING MOVIES: "The Golden Child," "The Color Purple," "That's Life" and "Marlene" are in release this week. "Something Wild," "Duet for One," "Allan Quartermain and the Lost City of Gold" and "The Assault," the Dutch movie which won this year's best foreign language film Oscar, will be released after July 12. Media's "Nightmare on Elm Street 2: Dream Warriors," a box-office smash, is due Aug. 5, the same day as Paramount's "Crocodile Dundee."

Warner Video's "The Mission," the drama set in 18th century South America that earned seven Oscar nominations, is scheduled for Aug. 26 release.

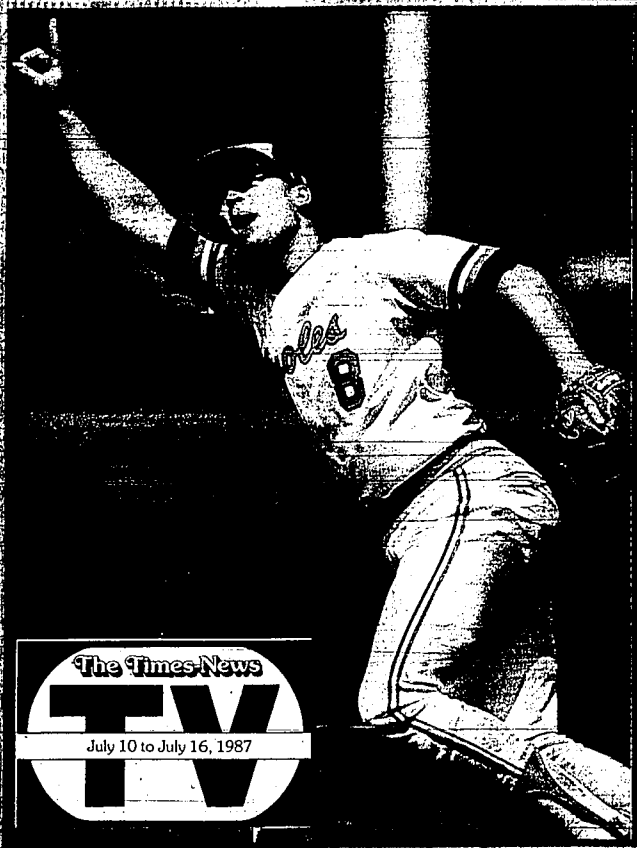

Baltimore Orioles pitcher Ripken squares off against best pitchers

Despite all the speculation about a livelier ball this year, one constant is irrefutable in the game of baseball. Good pitching will beat good hitting — usually. And in mid-summer classics, where pitchers have the advantage of exploiting their stuff against hitters who are seeing it for the first time since spring training, the men on the hill often dominate.

The 58th All-Star Game will be played Tuesday, July 14, in Oakland Alameda County Coliseum, home of the Athletics since 1968. It's already considered a pitchers' park since the ball simply doesn't carry well there. Balls fly further in warm, humid air, and Oakland is not Atlanta. The Baltimore Orioles' Cal Ripken Jr., for example, the AL's starting shortstop the past three years and the likely starter this year, has a lifetime batting average of .288, but he has hit only 248 in Oakland. Factor in the starting time, 5:05 p.m. Pacific Coast Time, when the sun will be setting down the third-base line, and the final score should be low and tight.

The most pitching-dominated All-Star Game ever was played 20 years ago in Anaheim, Calif. The score was close enough, with the Nationals beating the Americans for the fifth straight time, 2-1, in 15 innings. But the pitcher/batter relationship was

a slaughter. The pitchers began their domination at 4:15 p.m. Pacific and it ended 30-strikeouts later. Not a single walk was issued. Chicago, Cub Ferguson, Jenkins struck out six, tying Carl Hubbell and Johnny Vander Mer for game-high honors. Yet if Jenkins hadn't offered up a gopher ball to Brooks Robinson in the 6th, most of the K's wouldn't have transpired. Philadelphia Phillie Dick Allen's solo shot in the second off the AL's Dean Chance was the NL's only run until the 15th, when Kansas City Athletic pitcher Catfish Hunter, pitching his fifth inning of relief, fed Tony Perez a fastball that the Cincinnati Reds slugger sent over the centerfield fence for the winning run.

Three years ago, in San Francisco's Candlestick Park, a twilight start helped account for the nine-inning strikeout record. Twenty-one strikeouts were recorded. Los Angeles Dodger Fernando Valenzuela mowed down Dave Winfield, Reggie Jackson and George Brett in the fourth and New York Mel Dwight Gooden whiffed Lance Parrish, Chet Lemon and Alvin Davis to establish a consecutive strikeout mark of six.

Ironically, 50 years ago to that day, on July 10, 1934, Carl Hubbell of

the New York Giants performed the monumental pitching feat in All-Star history. Without the benefit of twilight, the 30-year-old lefty from the Ozarks screwed ball his way into baseball lore by striking out five future Hall of Famers in succession: Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig and Jimmy Foxx in the first, then Al Simmons and Joe Cronin in the second, before Bill Dickey singled on a 1-2 pitch. Lefty Gomez swung and missed to end the inning.

Valenzuela became the Hubbell of the modern era last year as he struck out Don Mattingly, Cal Ripken Jr., Jesse Barfield, Lou Whitaker and pitcher Teddy Higuera in succession before Kirby Puckett grounded out to Ozzie Smith. No pitcher wants to be taught a lesson in front of his peers, and when the pitcher bears down, the ball stays down and the score stays down, no matter how "lively" the ball may be.

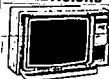

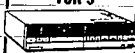

The series intro, written by executive producer Frank Lupu (whose surname means "wolf") and directed by David Hemmings, also includes some brief, partial male nudity, since the man who turns into a werewolf at night isn't wearing clothes when he awakens at dawn.

Yes, but of course the "good" werewolf, college student Eric Cord (John Voth), is driven to violence: murders, mutilations. He's so sorry, but he just can't help it.

Having seen his mild-mannered friend Ted Nichols (Raphael Sbarge) turn into a raging, uncontrollable werewolf, he has already obliged Ted's last request by killing him with a gun loaded with silver bullets melted down from a cross owned by his late mother.

Unfortunately, Cord not only faces a murder charge, the body of the werewolf having turned back into the corpse of Ted, but Cord also has suffered a bite from Ted-the-fiend.

So Cord knows what's in-store for him after the next commercial. To say that his future with his girlfriend Kelly, Ted's sister, is in jeopardy would be an understatement if it weren't for the fact that

debut actually invites Cord to move. In with her, knowing that he is a werewolf. Because Ted left his sister a taped explanation, she knows he was one too.

Cord, searching for a way to stop the carnage without losing his own life, concludes that he must kill the antecedent of the bloodline, Janos Skorzeny, a one-eyed sea captain from Baja California who delights in his nighttime role.

The evil Skorzeny is played by Chuck Connors, former star of "The Rifleman." His appearance comes fairly late in the show.

Fortunately, we meet a series of smaller characters who provide a bit of humor along the way: the bail bondsman who doesn't appreciate the value of Cord's 1967 Mustang convertible, given in security; the clumsy young lawyer who fills in for his father at Cord's arraignment and soft-pedals the charge; and the red-neck owner of the storage shed Cord-as-Werewolf — demolishes ("Nothin's dirtier ... in this world than vandalism," he declares — but of course there is).

Johnson, as Cord's girl friend, is engaging, but gets some unbelievable lines.

Soap Opera Scene

Lucci overlooked again for Emmy

The daytime Emmy Awards presentations had some surprises and a good measure of disappointments. The major disappointment, of course, was Susan Lucci's losing for the eighth time. The press room where many of the people covering soaps were watching the telecast became silent when the Best Actress Emmy was about to be announced, and when last year's Best Actor (David Canary) opened the envelope and read Kim Zimmer's (Reva of "Guiding Light") name, there was a hush followed by a strong verbal reaction — "She didn't win — AGAIN?"

Of course, the camp was divided as to Miss Lucci's failure to cop the Emmy. The nicest remarks ranged from "She really deserves it after all this time" to "The Academy ought to be ashamed of itself for not giving it to her." The other side of the coin was represented by slurs such as "Maybe they were going to give it to her until they saw the dress she was wearing" to "In seventeen years, she hasn't changed her expression."

Comments notwithstanding, Susan Lucci is the most famous soap star in television. Even those who aren't addicted to the daytime dramas know who she is. That degree of popularity coupled with her capable and consistent performance in "All My Children" should have earned her an Emmy by now.

There have been many daytime Emmy Awards won by less deserving and certainly less actors and actresses. The big question is, why? Is there a true backlash against the actress because of her "standout" status as a soap star or have the soap magazines created an animosity among her peers by quoting her enormous salary (in the vicinity of a half million dollars a year) too often?

Kim Zimmer, who picked up her second Best Actress Emmy this year, is undoubtedly a consummate actress and certainly deserves recognition. However, she has already been rewarded and, by all indications, it really seemed as if it was finally going to be Susan Lucci's year. Miss Lucci couldn't help but have been disappointed, but she put up a brave front, facing a barrage of reporters. She smiled and said, "I'm grateful that I have the best fans in the world. Being nominated is also an honor."

Some might say that Miss Lucci's performance at the Emmys this year was a great example of acting.

CBS cancels contract with Nielsen Co.

NEW YORK — CBS canceled its contract with the A.C. Nielsen Co. on Monday, saying the network is not satisfied with the new "people-meter" ratings system set to go into operation this fall.

David Poltrack, CBS vice president for research, said the network might still sign with Nielsen before the new television season starts in September, but the notification of cancellation was necessary to avoid automatic renewal of the contract.

"We believe there is still time to rectify the system, and we will still work with Nielsen to that end," said Poltrack. "But it is certainly possible that we will not be a client of Nielsen come the fall."

Nielsen spokeswoman Jo LaVerde said the company would not comment because the negotiations are continuing.

The Chicago-based Nielsen company sells its detailed research statistics on audience size to both advertisers and broadcasters for use in negotiating advertising rates. If

one or more networks does not subscribe to Nielsen in the fall, it could complicate the negotiations.

The weekly Nielsen ratings ranking television shows are provided to the news media by the networks.

ABC canceled its contract with Nielsen earlier this year.

All three commercial networks are negotiating with Nielsen, but none has renewed its contract for the new television season because of controversy over the people-meter system that Nielsen plans to use, beginning in September.

The networks say the people-meter sample is not sufficiently representative of the television audience and will cause their ratings to drop.

The current system is made up of audimeters, devices that automatically report what station the television is tuned to, and written diaries of what viewers watch.

In the fall, families who participate in the ratings survey will use people meters, hand-held devices resembling remote controls. Each viewer punches in on an assigned button when watching television.

People meters are favored by advertisers because they provide more detailed data about viewers and allow advertisers to target commercials to audiences most like to buy their products.

"ABC's main concern, said Paul Sonkin, ABC vice president for audience research, is that viewers will tire of button-pushing.

NBC is worried that younger people will drop the button-pushing habit at a faster rate than older viewers, distorting the ratings, said Bill Rubens, NBC vice president for research.

CBS has signed a one-year contract with a Nielsen competitor, the European-based AGB Television Research, which also plans to have people-meter ratings in the fall.

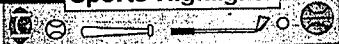



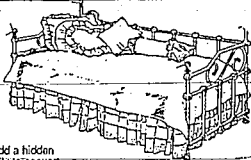

Gibson settling into David Hartman's chair

NEW YORK (AP) — Since becoming co-host of "Good Morning America" four months ago, Charles Gibson has learned to talk to guests from every walk of life.

His problem is getting them to stop talking.

"I think Joan (Lunden) puts something in the water, because her guests naturally wrap up ... and she has time to say, 'Thank you. And in our next half hour ...'"

"My guys seem to be sort of cooling off... and then another thought hits them, and a new burst of eloquence ushers forth from them. I don't know what it is. I can't get 'em to stop. I have to always say, 'Shut

up, you boor! We'll be back after this.' It's inevitable I get caught."

Gibson settling into David Hartman's chair

NEW YORK (AP) — Since becoming co-host of "Good Morning America" four months ago, Charles Gibson has learned to talk to guests from every walk of life.

His problem is getting them to stop talking.

"I think Joan (Lunden) puts something in the water, because her guests naturally wrap up ... and she has time to say, 'Thank you. And in our next half hour ...'"

"My guys seem to be sort of cooling off ... and then another thought hits them, and a new burst of eloquence ushers forth from them. I don't know what it is. I can't get 'em to stop. I have to always say, 'Shut

up, you boor! We'll be back after this. It's inevitable I get caught."

In an interview, Gibson exhibits the same easy candor and dry wit that has made him an instant success at the unenviable task of replacing "GMA" host David Hartman, who left the show after 11 years.

Although reaction to Gibson has been almost universally positive, he worries about his interviewing style and feels the need to study for encounters with show-biz types.

He can't get used to New York or the early schedule, although he hopes that will change once his fami-

ly joins him. His wife, Arlene, a girls' school headmistress, will transfer in the fall to a New Jersey girls' school that the couple's two daughters will attend. The family will live on campus.

Meanwhile, Gibson lives in a midtown Manhattan apartment and commutes on weekends to Washington, where he has spent most of his career. Before joining "GMA," he was ABC's Capitol Hill correspondent and a regular substitute for Ted Koppel on "Nightline" — a job he is continuing, filling in for two weeks, beginning Monday.

Q. Richard Worley, a Maine construction worker, was recently on "Good Morning America" after it was announced that he had become a

British earl following the death of an English relative. Hasn't there been a movie using that plot device, and if so, what was its name? — P.B.

A. Life imitates art, and ironically, there have been several such fictionalized movie plots on that theme. In "The Earl of Chicago," a 1930s movie, Robert Montgomery played a brash American gangster who's unexpectedly informed that he's become an earl and goes to London to claim his title and inheritance. Freddie Bartholomew's "Little Lord Fauntleroy" cast him as a New York youngster who is groomed for his title after his father had been disinherited. More recently, the Broadway Tony-winning smash "Me and My Girl" told the story of a Cockney bloke who inherits a title, ancestral home and fortune — all with hilarious results.

Q. Is it true that boxing champ Mike Tyson will be Sylvester Stallone's opponent in the next "Rocky" movie? — B.L.

A. Anything is possible of course.

Previous Stallone ring foes in the "Rocky" moves have been Carl Weathers, Mister T and Dolph Lundgren. Weathers is doing nicely acting on his own; Mister T is too busy cutting down trees on his estate in Lake Forest, Ill.; and Lundgren is seeking starring parts as a solo. All I can say is that I spotted Stallone offering his congratulations to Tyson, at a Hollywood restaurant recently, where the boxer consumed three orders of pasta, Inghair of fish and a steak while chatting with Sly. Maybe he's getting in training for a rocky encounter.

Q. Can you tell us if our favorite comedian, Henny Youngman, is writing a book about himself? — G.S.

A. Youngman, 81, has decided to tell all about himself — for a nice price. Henny, always a careful man with a buck, tells me that not one but four publishers are bidding on the rights to his autobiography. The book will be called "Take My Life Please," a play on his famous "Take My Wife Please" line.



Inroads into culture evident on travel show

NEW YORK (AP) — It's easy enough to travel. The tricky part, whether you stay two weeks or two years, is understanding what you see.

That's a caution, not a criticism, about a travel series running on public television: "The Human Face of the Pacific," which began a four-week run on July 6.

The show tells only part of its story, and sometimes you can only guess at what's missing.

The Pacific series began with a visit to Tabiteuea Atoll in Kiribati, formerly the Gilbert Islands, where the people live in very traditional ways. They fish the lagoon from outrigger canoes, they labor in their taro patches, the young learn the ancient songs and dances.

Have these people chosen the life, or is it chosen for them by economic forces or the accidents of



geography?

The program doesn't tell you how people live in the capital on Tarawa, or why traditional life flourishes on tiny Tabiteuea while it struggles for life in New Caledonia, Tahiti and the Marshall Islands, the next three destinations in the series.

In the last of the four parts, "The Human Face of the Pacific" visits the people who were moved off Bikini Atoll when their home was selected for atomic tests in 1946. The old people pine for Bikini; the kids hang out in pool rooms, drink beer and watch Kung-Fu movies.

"Now we only sit around, feeling sad for our children," an old man says. "They will be pitiful, but there's nothing we can do."

What the narrator doesn't say is that this generation gap is common throughout the islands; it's not just a problem for the Bikinians. The half-hour, produced in Australia, is eloquent on how the Bikinians have been harmed by Washington, but it says nothing about why younger islanders eagerly embrace the tawdry version of Western life available in the island capitals.

Actors get most money from ads

LOS ANGELES — Cliff Robertson ran through the reading for the third time on Stage 11 at the Culver Studios.

"Let's do it again," said the director. On the fourth try, Robertson stumbled over a word. A woman standing by the director held a stop watch. On the next reading, the director still wasn't satisfied, but agreed that Robertson had the right pace.

Robertson had just flown in from Canada for three long days of filming and sound recording commercials for AT&T. A limousine was waiting outside to take him to the airport for a flight to London.

Several times, people walked onto the stage during recording despite the red warning light. Robertson shook his head in disbelief. "The light doesn't stop them," he said. "It used to be sacrosanct. Everybody kept quiet."

Although Robertson is a major star and appears regularly in motion pictures and television, a substantial part of his income comes from his commercials for AT&T.

In 1985, actors working in film earned \$287 million, or approximately half of all their income, from commercials, said Mark Locher, a spokesman for the Screen Actors Guild. A large percentage of the commercials are made in New York, the only area of production where New York is ahead of Los Angeles.

"Commercials are really the bread and butter of the working actor," said Locher.

They are also the cavalier of many stars. Figures are hard to come by, but multimillion-dollar contracts are common.

Pop star Michael Jackson has made millions for his commercials for Pepsi Cola. "Moonlighting" star Bruce Willis has a multimillion-dollar contract with Seagrams for wine cooler commercials.

John Wayne reportedly received \$2 million for his spots for a savings and loan company. Henry Fonda once said he made more from commercials filmed in five days than from all the rest of his movies that year.

Bill Cosby is probably the star seen most often in current TV commercials. His spots for Jell-O seem to be everywhere, frequently run with his top-rated series on NBC, "The Cosby Show."

Marty Ingels, the first and the biggest of the "celebrity brokers," persuaded stars to do commercials after setting up his company in 1976.

"You see stories about Michael

Jackson or Alan Alda signing \$5 million contracts, but those are for four or five years, with yearly options," he said. "The big money is there, but it's spread over a number of years."

Ingels said the fees paid to stars are going up for some, but they are falling for others because of an oversupply of celebrities. He also feels that many stars have become overexposed.

Robertson worked through the lunch hour on the voiceover recordings. Later, he moved to another sound stage for a commercial set in an airport terminal. In the background, a model of a Boeing 747 was on an all-but-invisible wire strung at an angle. The model was pulled across the stage and appeared to be taking off.

"We're doing five commercials, plus some voice work," he said. "The great thing is that they go to where I am, to film these. I've been doing

them for three years and we've done them in London, New York, Florida."

Ingels said the kind of commercials Robertson does are "the best kind."

"There are three categories of commercials at the top and three categories at the bottom," he said. "The best kind is the institutional commercial. You come out and talk about a company's overall policies. Essentially, you are selling yourself as much as the company."

Other best commercials, according to Ingels, are cameo appearances and those in which a person performs. At the bottom are commercials for dog food, deodorants and female products. "Ten years ago nobody would have considered those, but stars are doing them today," he said.

Tom and Dick Smothers have signed to do commercials for Magnavox.

ABC captures No. 2 place in ratings

NEW YORK (AP) — For weeks, the big story in the news ratings has been, NBC No. 1, CBS No. 3.

"I think you should pay more attention to No. 2," says Peter Jennings, anchor of ABC's "World News Tonight."

When you've been in last place for almost a year, being second is worth noting.

During the unprecedented five weeks that CBS has been in third place, ABC has been second. The last time ABC was out of third place was the week of Aug. 25, 1986, when CBS was first and NBC was third.

"Even when we were third, I was quite happy with our ratings," Jen-

nings said in a telephone interview.

"Of course, it's nicer to be No. 2 than No. 3, but in this shop for well over a year, we have all been very content with the ratings."

Week after week, Jennings and the "World News" crew have had to read that their newscast was in last place among the three networks in the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings. But staying as close to first as 1 1/2 rating points was an accomplishment, considering that the network's prime-time schedule was 4 points behind the leader at the end of the season.

The rating is a percentage of the nation's estimated 87.4 million households with television.
