# Disease strikes Wendell girl, spurs warnings

**TWIN FALLS** — A mysterious and sometimes fatal disease breaking out in Utah has also struck a 3-year-old girl in Wendell and a local pediatrician has warned parents to respond quickly to certain symptoms.

The disease, labeled HUS for hemolytic uremic syndrome, often accompanies blood in diarrhea. The disease can strike rapidly, sometimes within 24 hours. It can lead to kidney failure and sometimes death.

The Wendell girl survived, but three of five confirmed victims in Utah have died since June 24 and another 9 Utah residents may be infected with the disease whose origin and transmission are unknown.

HUS killed a 21-month-old Wendell girl in 1981, according to relatives.

While there have been a relatively low number of cases recently — with one in Wendell and two others in Boise and Pocatello — doctors, health officials and parents of HUS victims warn its symptoms may often be overlooked.

"It's not a common diagnosis and it's not the first thing to come to mind," said Dr. Ben Katz.

The Twin Falls pediatrician has treated several patients suffering from HUS during the past several years and diagnosed 3-year-old Brittnie Bjornn, of Wendell, on June 17.

There is no cure for HUS and its means of transmission are unknown. Health officials said a patient's own immune system must overcome the disease.

Katz said initial symptoms point "an ominous picture," with diarrhea often carrying blood and, sometimes the urine looks like Coca-Cola.

Dark urine, along with possible weight gain caused by water retention in the body, are signals of kidney failure that can strike in as little as 24 hours and requires artificial dialysis, he said.

Ronda Bjornn, 25, said her two daughters each had diarrhea in mid-June. Her 22-month-old daughter Brooke suffered diarrhea and then 3-year-old sister Brittnie developed diarrhea two days later.

"It worried us as parents, seeing a bad case of diarrhea in the little one — seeing the blood and thinking it will go away," Ronda Bjornn said. "If parents don't know this can lead to fatality, they might not take their children to a doctor," she said.

When Brittnie's kidneys failed two days after that and she stopped urinating, Katz diagnosed the HUS and sent the girl to University of Utah Health Sciences Center for dialysis.

HUS usually strikes children less than 4 years old, according to Utah state epidemiologist Craig Nichols. Since there is no dialysis available to children in Magic Valley, HUS patients are usually sent to Utah for the equipment and added medical expertise, Katz said.

Brittnie recovered on dialysis and no longer requires the treatment. She was released July 6 when her

kidneys began functioning again, after spending three weeks in the hospital, Ronda Bjornn said.

Another HUS patient from Wendell died in 1981, despite dialysis. Beverly Tracy said she remembers clearly a day in late May that year when she was looking forward to a summer off from teaching. Beverly Tracy said her 21-month-old daughter Deidra was running and playing in the yard in bright red-and-green patterned shorts, with white shirt, socks and black shoes.

But the next day Deidra became listless, suffered from diarrhea and five days later she died, Beverly Tracy said.

"I would never have dreamt that that would happen to me," Taylor said.

"I can remember exactly what she had on and the next day she

## Law requiring jury commission long overlooked

**TWIN FALLS** — The action taken by Judge Daniel Hurlbutt to create a county jury commission was ordered by state law in 1971, but was not implemented until last week, despite several officials knowing the law existed.

Hurlbutt, who became trial court administrator for the district in 1983, said part of the reason he didn't change the procedure was that he wanted to wait until this year when Idaho Supreme Court standards on jury selection were formulated.

He said he didn't know why his predecessors didn't initiate the procedure.

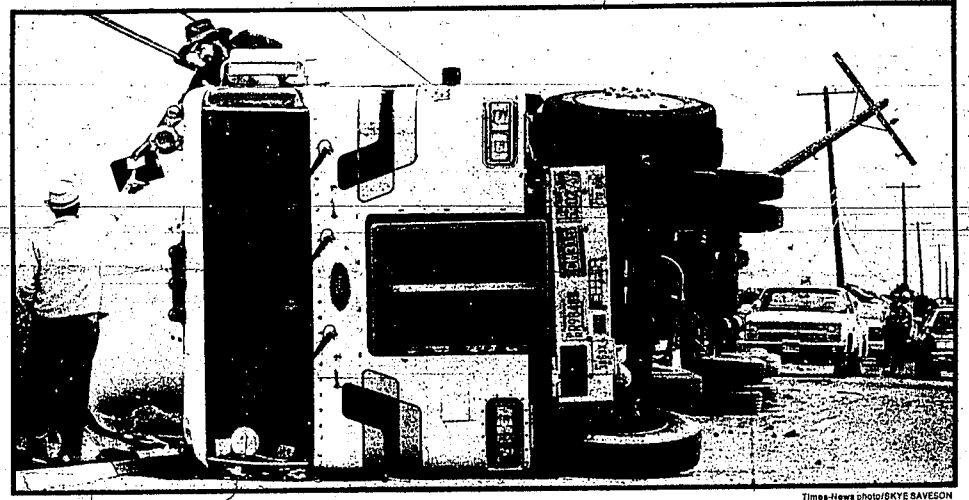
The new procedure, outlined in a judicial order signed July 10 by all judges in Twin Falls County, sets up a jury commission comprised of the county clerk, Richard Pence, and a jury commissioner, Kathleen Noh of Kimberly.

Noh was appointed last week. She will be paid \$7 an hour for the position which is now part time.

The administrative order came on the heels of hearings more than 20 grand jury indictments in which defense lawyers argued the indictments should be quashed because the county's jury selection procedure was improper and contrary to state law.

Although Pence is still officially part of the two-member commission, Noh will be merging the current jury list drawn from voter registration lists with driver's license lists and implementing the new selection procedure.

## Congressional delegation celebrates spirit of the Constitution

**PHILADELPHIA** — The compromise that made the Constitution a reality 200 years ago was celebrated here by Congress Thursday amid shouts of protesters and claims that the Reagan administration tried to shred the system of checks and balances.

In a hushed and solemn ceremony in the assembly room of Independence Hall, the official 55-

member congressional delegation, matching the number of Americans who wrote the nation's basic charter in 1787, praised the enduring nature of the Constitution and signed a resolution commemorating the event.

Rep. Lindsay Boggs, D-La., was elected chairman of the delegation and presided, in resplendent red, over her mostly male colleagues in dress blue suits in the historic chamber.

They celebrated the "Great Compromise" of July 16, 1787, which set-

ted rivalries between large and small states.

The compromise resulted in the invention of Congress, with the establishment of a House of Representatives based on population and a Senate with equal representation from every state.

Shielded by the Constitution's free-speech protections, protest groups included about 100 supporters of the National Organization for Women pressing for an Equal Rights Amendment and chanting: "Hey, hey. What do you say! Ratify the ERA!"

Other demonstrations were organized by the Gay and Lesbian Task Force and by groups opposed to Reagan administration foreign and domestic policies. Protesters demonstrated despite what they considered efforts by program planners to keep them away from the action. A federal court had ordered authorities not to interfere with peaceful, non-disruptive protests.

"They think this is a pageant and they can write the script," said Barry Steinhart, executive director of the American Civil Liberties Union for Pennsylvania. "They don't want anyone deviating from the lines."

Security was tight and officials enforced a judge's ruling that demonstrators did not have the right to march within sight of the lawmakers. Authorities said hundreds of U.S. Capitol Police, National Park Service forces and city police were on hand to control the crowd.

The 55 delegates, all wearing red roses — the national flower — walked from Independence Hall to Congress Hall where representatives gathered on the first floor and senators on the second, they attended sessions. Speaker Jim Wright of Texas presided over the House group and Senate President Pro Tempore John Stennis of Mississippi leading the Senate delegation.

## Nofziger indicted by grand jury

**WASHINGTON** — Former White House political director turned lobbyist Lyn Nofziger, one of the many public figures pulled into the Wedtech scandal, was indicted by a federal grand jury Thursday for violation of federal conflict-of-interest laws, said a government source close to the probe.

The indictment was obtained by independent counsel James McKay, who also is investigating Attorney General Edwin Meese III's involvement with the Bronz defense contractor.

Nofziger, who received 22,500 shares of stock in Wedtech Corp., the Bronx defense firm that was awarded hundreds of millions of dollars in a no-bid Pentagon contract, began lobbying for the firm shortly after leaving the White House in January 1982.

The sealed indictment, which is expected to be announced on Friday, concerns Wedtech's efforts to obtain a \$32-million contract to build small engines for the Army, said the source, speaking on condition of anonymity.

CBS News and NBC News also reported Thursday that an indictment against Nofziger would be announced Friday.

Four months after leaving the White House, Nofziger wrote a letter to deputy White House counselor James Jenkins to ask his help in obtaining the Army contract, the Justice Department said in court documents filed early this year seeking an independent counsel.

Federal ethics law prohibits high public officials from lobbying their former agencies for one year after leaving the federal government.

The 1978 Ethics in Government Act provides for a maximum penalty of up to two years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

## Poindexter misled Congress on aid

**WASHINGTON** — Former National Security Adviser John Poindexter testified Thursday that he sent Oliver North a "well done note after the aide misled Congress about the secret Contra supply program, and he said President Reagan made a mistake in firing North when the affair became public.

"Our objective here all along was to withhold information" from Congress, said Poindexter in a second day of testimony before the congressional Iran-Contra committees. "There's no question about that."

The stocky rear admiral, dressed in civilian clothes, defended again his tearing up of a signed presidential order — known as a "finding" — that authorized sending arms to Iran in the expectation that that would result in release of American hostages held in Lebanon.

"I simply didn't want this document to see the light of day," said Poindexter.

"Admiral Poindexter, what made you believe that the president of the United States would want you to destroy a finding in order to save him from a political embarrassment?" asked House committee counsel John Nields.

"I recognized that it was politically embarrassing," said Poindexter. "I thought one of my jobs was to protect the president."

Asked whether the purpose was also to protect himself, Poindexter said, "In no way."

Reagan, queried by reporters at the beginning of a Cabinet session on the budget, repeatedly refused to comment on Poindexter's testimony, saying, "I'm going to be making a statement when all these hearings are over, and then I will be ready to talk."

Spokesman Marilyn Fitzwater said

preparations were under way for a Reagan speech after the end of the hearings.

Poindexter said Wednesday he believed Reagan would have thought the diversion a good idea if he had been told. But Fitzwater said Thursday that Reagan "has said on past occasions that had he been told, he would not have allowed, and he should have been told."

An ABC News-Washington Post telephone poll of 787 Americans Wednesday night found that 48 percent believed Poindexter did not tell Reagan about the diversion; 44 percent, however, believed he did tell Reagan. Since the poll has a margin of error of four percentage points, this represents a virtual tie. The poll found that 64 percent believe Reagan knew about the diversion earlier than he claims.

On Capitol Hill, there were again frequent clashes between Richard Beckler, Poindexter's attorney, and a Senate committee counsel, Arthur Liman. Responding to a Liman question, • See CONTRAS on Page A2

tion that touched on the origin of the Reagan finding, Beckler said:

"If I could want to know what the president knew—and what—the thought of when he signed that document, then perhaps you ought to have the president come down here and answer that because we haven't spoken to the president on this subject."

There were only about three hours of testimony because many on the committee were among the 200 members of Congress who were in Philadelphia to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the constitutional compromise that created a two-house national legislature.

Pointdexter "testified" under immunity from prosecution based on his words, profaned many of his answers with "I don't recall," and said several times that his memory was "fuzzy" on some events more than a year old.

He said that when Attorney General Edwin Meese III began an inquiry last November into the Iran-Contra affair, he did not tell Meese, nor did he tell the president's emissary, the full story.

Pointdexter said he told Meese he had been generally aware of the

diversion of Iranian arms sales prohibited to the Nicaraguan rebels. "I told him I was ready to resign and I trusted him to recommend to me the timing of my resignation."

That word came the next day and Pointdexter said he tendered his resignation in an Oval Office meeting with Reagan and his top aides.

"The president responded and said that he had great regret, and that this was in the tradition of a naval officer, of accepting responsibility," said Pointdexter. "And I shook hands with everybody and let the office know that this was the last time I saw the president."

Later that same day, Reagan and Meese appeared in the White House press room to reveal the money diversion and to announce Pointdexter's resignation and North's ouster. The admiral said the latter came to him as a surprise.

"To this day I don't know how that came about," he said. "I think it was a mistake." But, he added, he thought the news media were blowing the affair out of proportion and that the appointment of an independent counsel "was a gross overreaction."

# Spokesman: Reagan was ill-served

WASHINGTON — President Reagan's chief spokesman said Thursday the president is ill-served when "not involved in making decisions that are presidential," but the spokesman said he wouldn't judge former National Security Council aides for making a comment on Pointdexter's testimony in the hearings.

Pointdexter testified Wednesday that he approved a diversion of proceeds from Iranian arms sales to aid

Nicaraguan rebels and did not advise the president.

Presidential spokesman Martin Fitzgaurd said that Reagan "has been told, he would not have allowed, and he should have been told."

Reagan, queried by reporters at the beginning of a Cabinet session on Thursday, reportedly refused to make any comment on Pointdexter's testimony in the hearings.

"I'm going to be making a statement when all these hearings are over, and then I will be ready to talk," Reagan said. Pressed again, he said, "I'll make my comments when it's all over."

Secretary of the Treasury James Baker said after the Cabinet meeting about Pointdexter's testimony, "I think there was some surprise at some of those revelations." He said his own reaction was "disappointment at some of them."

Secretary of Commerce Malcolm Baldrige told reporters the hearings did not come up at the Cabinet meeting. ■

"I thought it was important to have her work from top to bottom, start to finish, to see what she thought best should be done," Hurlburt said. "We need Kathleen to make sure standards were fulfilled—and to have her—how best in Twin Falls to implement them."

"The standards are outlined in Idaho statutes, 1971, which say," the jury commission is established in each county to manage the jury selection process under the supervision of the court. The jury commission shall be composed of the clerk of the court and two jurors appointed for a term of two years by the administrative judge."

"I can't speak for my predecessor's position why there was no commission," said Hurlburt, who was attending the 1987 Idaho Judicial Conference in Sun Valley. "When I started, there was confusion whether Dick (County Clerk Richard Pence) was jury commissioner."

"It was clear to me, it needed to be clarified and have a more formal process," Hurlburt said.

It still took about four years to change that system.

Hurlburt said, in addition to waiting for Supreme Court guidelines on jury standards to be developed, he had other changes to make.

"I had not here it was assured everything was running well," by the clerk and the staff of the other judges, Hurlburt said. "And there was some resistance to changing the system."

"The other reason, I think, is that it was acknowledged the Twin Falls County court system was not well managed. A number of changes needed to be made."

He said the Twin Falls court system was underfunded, had inadequate staffing, no secretaries or law clerks, no court security and an inadequate bailiff system.

"I think the first task was to bring the Twin Falls court system into the 1980s," Hurlburt said.

Pence, who was also attending

the 1987 Idaho Judicial Convention in Sun Valley after attending a National Association of Counties convention in Indianapolis until Wednesday night, said he had discussed changing the jury selection process in Twin Falls County with other judges before, but not with Hurlburt.

Pence said he didn't have any authority for deciding how to choose the jury pool, but merely follows the county's administrative trial court judge, in this case, Hurlburt.

"The clerk does the ministerial or executive actions, the same way with elections or anything to do with county government," Pence said. "I don't have the damn authority for it (changing procedures)."

"We've always had juries, and I've always thought they were representative of people in Twin Falls," Pence said. "We don't have that many types of people in Twin Falls County. They're just people."

At mid-afternoon, skies across the Great State were mostly cloudy to overcast over the north, southeast and southcentral and partly cloudy in the southwest.

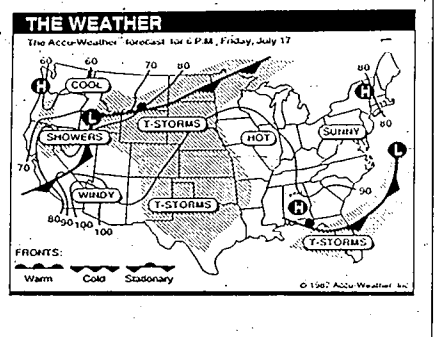
Temperatures remain well below normal for this time of year with readings in the 60s over the north and central sections of the state and mostly in the 70s across the south.

The pollen count in Twin Falls Thursday was 96 particles per cubic meter of air.

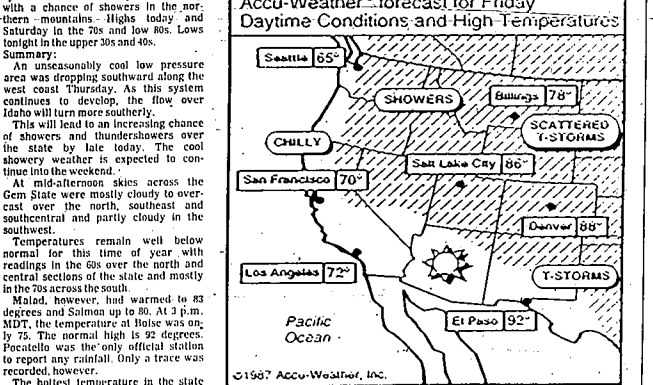

Senate and House sessions there since the federal government moved to Washington, D.C.

Senate Republican leader Bob Dole of Kansas repeated Thomas Jefferson's reply to George Washington on why a Senate was needed at all, Jefferson responded with a question, Dole said, asking Washington why he poured coffee in a saucer. To cool it, Washington replied, and Jefferson said that was why a Senate is needed, "to cool hot legislation." Dole said.

was listless and just wanted to be held," Tracy continued. "She got up and had bloody diarrhea and I was so upset because I knew it wasn't just a stomach ache."

Deidra suffered convulsions two days later while hospitalized in Twin Falls and was then transferred to Utah. Dialysis didn't help and an autopsy revealed both kidneys were destroyed, were the brain and other organs because of the kidney failure, Beverly Tracy said.

"I don't think she ever really came out of it," Tracy said.

Since the severity of HUS is unknown, Tracy said she was relieved to see Brittain Bjorn back in church Sunday.

"I just had to give hugs and kisses because she was so happy," said Beverly Tracy. "Doctors still don't know what causes HUS. Routes for contracting the disease, such as in Tracy's and Bjorn's cases, are unknown."

However, a link to a bacteria called E. coli O157:H7 is a known carrier of HUS, Nichols said. Katz recommends parents bring all children suffering bloody diarrhea to see their doctor.

Nichols recommended several preventive measures for infection, including good hygiene, such as hand washing, and thorough food preparation, such as cooking all meats completely.

While there is no cure for HUS, symptoms such as diarrhea or infections can be remedied with antibiotics, and dialysis is absolutely necessary to survive kidney failure. Nichols said there is a 5 percent fatality rate for the disease and that

# Hundreds battle wildfires through Pacific Northwest

Hundreds of firefighters battled wildfires that charred thousands of acres of forest and rangeland in the Pacific Northwest on Thursday, leaving two lumberjacks dead, destroying dozens of homes and burning out cars and telephones.

The blazes, driven by dry weather and sparked by lightning, struck in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, California, Utah and Montana. Smoke filled valleys and prompted the National Weather Service to issue a warning to drivers and those who suffer respiratory problems.

Planes and helicopters dropped fire retardant and airlifted reinforcements, growing bulldozers carved out fire lanes and U.S. Army troops helped control a blaze near a military firing range.

In Idaho, helicopters ferried crews as 550 people fought a fire near Boise that raced through 1,800 acres. In the desert, 200 firefighters battled six lightning sparked fires, including the 3,000-acre Peterson Gulch fire.

Authorities decided to allow a 300-acre fire in northern Idaho's Neepawa National Forest to burn naturally. That fire sparked by lightning July 1 but lay dormant

until warming temperatures and moderate winds blew it to life this week.

"I got a pair of pants and a shirt," said Pat Sims, forced to evacuate her home near Spokane in eastern Washington by a fast-moving blaze. "I didn't even have a chance to get my wallet."

Rescue workers Thursday found the bodies of two loggers who died trying to salvage equipment from a fast-spreading fire southeast of Tokeburg, Ore.

The fire came up the hill to them," Douglas County Under-sheriff Iray Duncan said. "From everything we've seen it must have been moving very fast. It appeared they crawled under one of the loaders to escape the flames."

The blaze burned 7,000 acres by Thursday afternoon, destroying eight homes and closing a state road. Sixty people evacuated from the Milo Adventist Academy, a boarding school, and parts of Milo were evacuated.

"It was a firestorm. You couldn't have done that with 100 flamethrowers," said Frank Ruble, looking at a burned hill near his home.

State Department of Forestry spokesman Jim Fisher said about 500 people and 22 bulldozers were on the fire lines, helped by over-

cast skies and diminished winds. Authorities said the blaze was human-caused, but they did not know if it had been set.

Sheriff's spokeswoman Jennie McAllister said radio operators were maintaining communication after the fire burned down telephone poles.

The 900-acre Spokane fire destroyed 24 houses, many of them worth more than \$100,000, and damaged 12 others before it was contained Thursday. Three people suffered minor injuries and more than 400 firefighters fought the blaze.

At the height of the blaze Wednesday night, cars exploded and fire leaped across streets, witnesses said. Authorities believe the blaze was sparked by a tree branch blown onto a power line.

In Washington, an 800-acre fire fought by 60 people burned in Okanogan National Forest, and Canadian authorities provided air tankers to help fight an 1,100-acre fire in sage and pine northeast of Tonasket.

Army and National Guard soldiers at the Yakima Firing Center joined local firefighters to douse a 20,000- to 25,000-acre blaze that started in brushland. Col. Dale Hill called it a "complete community-military effort."

# Yeutter will review tariff request

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration has agreed to consider Cyprus Minerals Co.'s request for reimposition of a tariff on imported molybdenum that the company contends has glutted the U.S. market and forced the layoffs of hundreds of workers at its Thompson Creek Mine in central Idaho.

The review is expected to take about 12 months, with a final decision expected next July.

Sens. James McClure and Steve Symms, both R-Idaho, called the decision by U.S. Trade Representative Clayton Yeutter "a first step toward the rebirth" of the nation's beleaguered molybdenum industry.

Three of the five largest molybdenum mines in the U.S. have closed in the past three years.

Denver-based Cyprus is one of the

world's largest producers of the mineral used to harden steel. It operates the Thompson Creek Mine near Challis, where a layoff announced last week reduced the work force from about 300 to 150. More than 500 workers were employed at Thompson Creek until late 1985.

Production at the mine since has been cut to about 40 percent of capacity as molybdenum prices plummeted.

Idaho's congressional delegation and Gov. Cecil Andrus wrote to Yeutter in June, urging him to suspend the tariff waiver granted in July 1984. Chilean molybdenum concentrate and oxide pending an investigation into alleged workers' rights violations in Chilean mines.

In their letter, Republican members of the delegation called the tariff "the single thread that

kept the mine economically viable." "If unfair production or trade tactics miners are injuring our domestic miners, then action must be taken," McClure, Symms and Rep. Larry Craig said Wednesday in a joint statement.

# Public's radiation dose down in '86

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP) — Fallout from the Soviets' Chernobyl nuclear accident made radiation readings soar at the Hanford nuclear reservation for a period during 1986, but the maximum radiation dose any citizen received from Hanford operations decreased slightly during the year, a report shows.

The Department of Energy's annual environmental report for the reservation estimated the dose for a hypothetical "maximally exposed individual" at 0.09 millirems in 1986, a maximum dose in 1985 was 0.1 millirems.

A rem is a measure of radiation absorbed in living tissue, and a millirem is a thousandth of a rem. A chest X-ray involves about 20 millirems. High radiation doses are known to cause illness and death, but less is known about the effects of smaller doses.

To calculate the maximum dose from Hanford activities, the report by Battelle-Northwest assumes the maximally exposed individual has eaten more locally grown foods and fish caught in the Columbia River than the average area resident.

The estimated average radiation dose was 0.03 millirem, or a third of the maximum dose. The average and maximum doses were well below DOE and Nuclear Regulatory Commission standards.

DOE rules allow Hanford activities to expose nearby residents to an occasional dose of 500 millirems and a prolonged dose of 100 millirems. The NRC limits residents near commercial reactors to 25 millirems.

Environmental data for 1986 show a sharp increase in radiation readings at Hanford following the Chernobyl nuclear accident. In-

creases in radioactive iodine, cesium and ruthenium were detected in air samples in the month following the Soviet disaster, the report said.

"It was much greater than what we ever see," Dick Jacquish, a project manager with Battelle's environmental monitoring program, said Wednesday. "It was like a thousand times higher."

Traces of radioactive isotopes from the Chernobyl fallout were found in Tri-Cities area crops and milk, but were within acceptable levels and comparable to other areas affected, said the report, which was released Wednesday.

The report also said plutonium levels in air samples taken during 1986 were down slightly after an additional filter was installed at Hanford's Plutonium-Uranium Extraction facility.

# Caldwell men sue Boise winemaker

BOISE (AP) — The quagmire of litigation over Idaho sales has thickened with a \$3.6 million lawsuit filed by the former owners of the Louis Facelli Winery against Boise winery owner Pete Eliopoulos.

Frederick and Norman Batt of Caldwell last week argued in 4th District Court that Eliopoulos defaulted on payments to purchase the Wilder winery in February 1986.

That month the men, who are brothers, and their wives, both named Ellen, agreed to sell the winery for about \$1 million to Eliopoulos and his wife Janet.

In addition, the Eliopouloses

defaulted on a contract to buy grapes, the lawsuit says.

Eliopoulos could not be reached for comment.

Early this year, he acquired the interests of his partners, Bill Broich and Jerrald Bookwater of Pasco, Wash., in the Winery at Spring Creek. Eliopoulos now operates the Petros Cellars Winery at the Spring Creek site, seven miles north of Boise on Idaho Highway 55. Last year, the Winery at Spring Creek made its wine at the old Facelli winery.

Bookwater and his wife Jean also are defendants, as is the Idaho State

Bank.

The complaint seeks more than \$3.3 million in damages. The Batts allege that Eliopoulos caused damages for alleged fraudulent and negligent acts by the defendants.

Eliopoulos filed a \$1 million suit against Broich in April alleging Broich violated an agreement not to compete against Spring Creek and that he made false and damaging statements about him.

The Broiches, meanwhile, have filed for protection from creditors under Chapter 12 of the U.S. Bankruptcy Code.

# Jury weighs charge against former Idahoan

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. (AP) — A mother who tied down her 13-year-old son, spanked him and made him eat his body wastes is guilty of some crimes, but did not murder him, her attorney said before a jury began deliberating Thursday.

The defense and prosecution presented closing arguments in the murder trial of Karen Diehl a day after her husband, Andrew Diehl, was convicted of first-degree murder and three other charges in the Oct.

29 death of the couple's adopted son, Dominick J. "Andrew" Diehl.

The Diehls admitted they disciplined the emotionally disturbed child by restraining him naked with handcuffs, a clamp on his neck. They spanked him with a stick until his buttocks bled and forced him to drink his urine and eat his feces to punish him for defecating on family belongings.

The case omitted some crimes, no question about that," Mrs. Diehl's attorney Thomas B. Shuttleworth told the Circuit Court jury of nine

men and three women.

"She did some things that were terrible and some things that were disgusting," he said. "She didn't murder her son."

Mrs. Diehl, 36, is charged with murder, abduction, malicious wounding and felony child neglect. Her attorney conceded that she could be guilty of all charges except murder.

Andrew Diehl died while the Diehls were living in a Virginia Beach campground. They had left their Post Falls home in 1984 to travel around the country.

# Body of man identified as missing person

BOISE (AP) — A homicide victim found stuffed head first into a sleeping bag along a highway last year has been identified by Oregon State. Police as a Boise man who disappeared in November 1985.

The man was identified Wednesday as Nolan E. Maddox, 23, who died after being shot twice in the head with a handgun, Oregon Police Sgt. Bill Sargent said. The body was found in May 1986.

A former Boise man is being held in Yakima County Jail in Washington connection with the killing, Sargent said.

Police have arrested Shaun K. Washburn, 23, in Union Gap, Wash., a neighboring community of Yakima, in connection with Maddox's death. Washburn, also known as Shaun K. Wheeler, was being held in lieu of \$50,000 bond. He waived extradition and was expected to be taken to Burns, Ore., for arraignment Tuesday.

The arrest last week stemmed from several anonymous tips, which led police to renew efforts to identify the body, Sargent said.

On May 23, 1986, a couple traveling on U.S. 20 discovered the badly decomposed body after stopping at the Drinking Water Summit in Harney County, Ore., Sargent said.

### Nation was ill-served by North, Poindexter

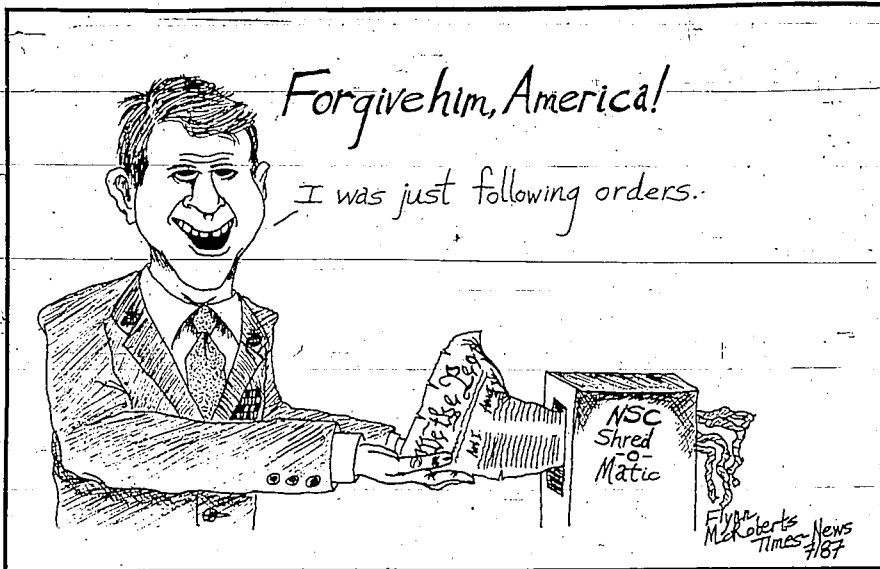
None of this is really anyone's fault but our own. We elected Reagan knowing he had little capacity for the day-to-day elements of the job.

## U.S., Soviet summit may not measure up to its billing

WASHINGTON — White House officials have suddenly become pessimistic that a summit meeting between President Ronald Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev will be held here this fall, as the United States had expected, to sign an agreement to eliminate intermediate-range nuclear forces from Europe.

As American and Soviet officials accused each other of holding up an agreement, senior officials told *Newsday* that there are growing doubts within the administration that such a summit can be scheduled before next year, if that.

"My sense is that the negotiations have become more protracted than some had hoped," said one of the officials. "The negotiations have become tougher than expected. It's not going to be easy to get an agreement. The hope for a fall summit has not completely faded, but it now looks like it will slip to early next year and maybe later."

Another official said, "There doesn't seem to be anyone who has a firm idea of what is happening, or where things stand. But there is no doubt the timetable has slipped, and unless things suddenly change, the summit may not be possible until next year."

American officials blame sudden, unexplained Soviet "stalling" for the screening halt in progress towards an INF agreement in the current Geneva negotiations, and caution that the Soviets could just as quickly end their stall and break the deadlock. One White House expert suggested that political changes and bureaucratic battles within the Soviet Union have preoccupied Gorbachev.

Arms control experts outside the administration suggest, however, that the Soviets

may have toughened their negotiating stance as a consequence of the Iran-Contra affair and their perception that Reagan has been weakened and needs an agreement for political purposes.

White House officials concede that signing an agreement to eliminate nuclear arms from Europe would help the president politically, but they insist that Reagan won't sign an agreement unless it is clearly to the advantage of the United States.

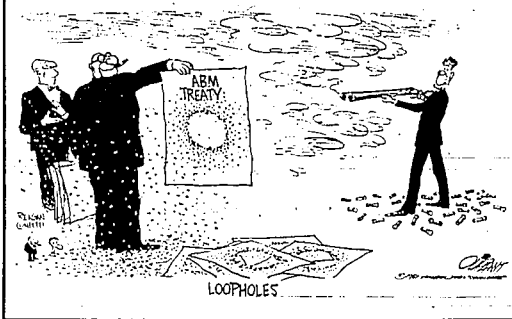
"It will be a substantial political accomplishment if the president gets an agreement," said one presidential aide, "but it's got to be a good one, an agreement that will be to our advantage."

White House chief of staff Howard Baker has told interviewers that "this president is equally able to walk away from a bad agreement, as he is to celebrate a good agreement... He's no pussy in the final 18 months of this term."

While attending the Economic Summit in Venice last month, Reagan spoke hopefully of his efforts to conclude a treaty with the Soviets, and he acknowledged that preliminary talks were under way to fix a summit date.

Only two weeks ago, White House aides were so optimistic about the prospects for a fall summit that their private, tentative schedule for the president left October and November open for a meeting between Reagan and Gorbachev.

Since then, however, the Soviets have delayed scheduling a crucial meeting be-



tween Secretary of State George P. Shultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze to iron out major difficulties concerning the proposed treaty and to agree on a date for the summit. That meeting had been scheduled to take place this week or next, said an official, who added, "It now looks like it may not take place until September. That means a fall summit is unlikely."

Although it was obscured by the Iranian hearings, Baker signaled the doubts about a fall summit when he told an interviewer July 5 that "there have been indications that the Soviet Union may or may not think kindly of our proposals." He said

that Shultz and Shevardnadze would not meet this month, as expected, adding that they "will get together on some basis and talk... but I do not have a prediction to make about when that will be."

On July 10, State Department spokesman Charles Redman said that Soviet Ambassador Yuri Dubinin, after returning to Washington from Moscow, met with Shultz but was unable to suggest to him a date for the critical meeting with Shevardnadze.

And Redman added that "the Soviet Union seems to be drawing back" from efforts to make progress in the arms talks.

For their part, the Soviets charge that the United States has jeopardized an agree-

ment by insisting on the right to convert the outlawed intermediate-range weapons, the Pershing 2 missiles, to shorter-range Pershing 1Bs, which would be capable of reaching the Soviet Union. In addition, according to Deputy Soviet Foreign Minister Yuli M. Vorontsov, while the Soviets would move to Asia the SS-20 missile it would be permitted to retain, the United States wishes to re-deploy its remaining Pershing 2 missiles to Alaska, within range of the Soviet Union.

Despite the slippage in the timetable, White House officials expressed cautious confidence that there would be an agreement on intermediate range nuclear forces. The president has expressed hope that he and Gorbachev could sign an agreement that, as Reagan has said, would reduce the number of nuclear weapons for the first time, Baker has pressed for such an agreement, according to officials, in part because he favors arms reduction and in part because he believes it would help revive Reagan's presidency. And Shultz hopes for such an arms agreement before his tenure ends.

But one official conceded that "the more things slip, the more the possibility that we will lose an arms agreement." And he pointed out that most European allies, especially West Germany, have been cool towards the proposed treaty. And its opponents here include former President Nixon and former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, both of whom have personally appealed to the president to toughen his bargaining position.

## On the major points, Reagan has been telling the truth

WASHINGTON — Until about 11:45 Wednesday morning, the Iran-Contra hearings had been mostly prologue. From now on the House and Senate committees will be writing epilogue. The key element in this drama came and went in a matter of seconds.

Arthur Liman, chief Senate counsel, put the question squarely to John Poindexter, former national security adviser. Did you tell the president that profits from the sale of arms to Iran had been diverted to aid the Contras in Nicaragua?

In the hearing room, reporters noted a sudden, audible stillness. No shuffling of papers, no clicking of camera shutters. Poindexter gazed levelly at his inquisitor.

"I did not," he said.

It was a moment of vindication that Reagan has sought since this ordeal began in November. Over and over, Reagan has insisted that he never was informed of the diversion. Polls indicated that half the country thought he was lying. We now know, through the uncontradicted testi-

mony not only of Poindexter, but of other witnesses also, that on this crucial point the president has been telling the truth. I never doubted it.

On the matter of honor, the vindication is complete. My president is not a liar. On the matter of executive competence, the verdict is equally clear. In an operation of this sensitivity, Reagan should have insisted on being fully informed. He should have asked about disposition of proceeds from which the president disavowed; may be criticized. It was an inept performance on his part, and it cannot easily be excused.

The hearings will drag along for a few more days or weeks, but barring some complete surprise, further testimony will add nothing of significance to what is now known. The picture is clear.

Reagan never concealed his feelings. Robert C. McFarlane, former national security adviser, testified that the president wanted "no stone unturned" in this regard. Overriding the objections of such wise old hands as Secretary of State George Shultz and Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger, the president unwisely authorized the

arms deal.

I am satisfied that the president believed he was telling the truth when he insisted that he had not "traded arms for hostages," and that he had not "negotiated with terrorists." As Reagan saw it, he was negotiating not with terrorists, but rather with Iranian intermediaries, and he saw the token amount of arms as a kind of fee for helpful intervention. It is a universal characteristic of humankind to believe what we want to believe.

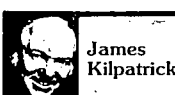
The president made other desires equally clear to the people around him. He wanted the cause of the Nicaraguan resistance kept alive. He pleaded this cause from one end of the country to the other. His wishes went down the line, to McFarlane, to Poindexter, to CIA Director William Casey, to Lt. Col. Oliver North. He wanted to preserve the Contras, an North put it, "body and soul."

We know what happened. In their zeal to serve their president, the team rode off in all directions. Everyone "assumed" he had

authority for the actions that were taken. Poindexter and North mounted a covert operation. In the nature of such operations, secrecy was imperative. A leaking and vacillating Congress, they believed, could not safely be informed. So they lied. They set out to deceive, and they were a tangled web.

What now? Eventually the joint committees will file a portentous report, huffing and puffing with outrage while acknowledging the need for just such covert operations. Congress will adopt some of the committees' barn-door recommendations for procedural safeguards. The legislative acts will be as misbegotten as the lamentable War Powers Act. If criminal prosecutions are undertaken, the prosecutions will fail. The final curtain is months away, but as of Wednesday morning the curtain began to fall.

## Deaver's trial set back at least 3 months by judge

WASHINGTON (AP) — The perjury trial of Michael K. Deaver, President Reagan's former aide and longtime confidant, was postponed for at least three months Thursday by a federal judge whose attempt to conduct jury selection in private was rebuffed by an appellate court.

U.S. District Judge Thomas Penfield Jackson dismissed a 91-member jury pool and tentatively set Oct. 19 as a new trial date, pending a possible Supreme Court review of Wednesday's decision by the Court of Appeals that interviews of the prospective jurors be conducted in public.

Deaver's attorney, Herbert J. Miller, said he would make the appeal to the high court, even though his client is "anxious to get this case over with and behind him. He doesn't like my decision, but he respects it."

If the Supreme Court, which is not scheduled to meet again until early October, decides to hear the case, Deaver's trial could be delayed further, perhaps a year.

Deaver, how a lobbyist, served

as deputy White House chief of staff during Reagan's first term and is a longtime friend of the president and his wife Nancy.

Under the appellate ruling, based on protests from news organizations about the judge's closed-door methods, Jackson still could have proceeded with the jury pool assembled Monday by conducting remaining interviews in public.

But Jackson said, "I am no longer confident of my ability to obtain from this panel a fair and impartial jury who would be willing and able to trust my rulings and to follow my instructions, making a trial a distinct likelihood later on."

The judge noted that at the outset, he had assured all the prospective jurors "of the total confidentiality" of their responses during the interview process, known as voir dire. "I am now certain that many, if not all, of them have lost faith in my ability to protect their confidences," he said.

## News media told to steer clear of U.S. ships in gulf

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Defense Department warned news media organizations Thursday to keep their distance from U.S. Navy warships and planes operating in the Persian Gulf.

Robert Sims, the Pentagon's chief spokesman, took time out from briefing call reporters' attention to a U.S. "Notice to Airmen" that has been in effect for the gulf since 1984.

The notice warns private aircraft to stay at least five nautical miles away from American ships and at an altitude of at least 2,000 feet.

"I'm getting reports from various countries around the Middle East that there are large numbers of newsmen and women who are gathering in the expectation that something that might happen..." Sims said.

"And some of the news organizations appear to be chartering planes from a channel leading to Kuwait's main oil terminal."

"They were set to go and they had final authorization from Washington," said one official who requested anonymity. "But we haven't gotten word back yet on whether they're finished."

Sims, meantime, played down news reports that the Iranians were conducting more aerial exercises near the Strait of Hormuz and moving some American-made F-14 jet fighters to the Bandar Abbas naval base near the strait.

"The Iranians have air defenses both in the north and south of their country," Sims said. "I presume that they exercise them from time to time. But I don't know of anything that's new or interesting in that line."

The spokesman added the Iranians had only a limited number of F-14s that were still operable and those that had been observed were based in the north. The United States sold Iran the F-14 before the downfall of the shah in 1979.

Under the new rules of engagement, ship captains are authorized to open fire on any aircraft or vessel that appears to be maneuvering for an attack.

While Sims agreed that private planes chartered by television networks and other news organizations might not display any evidence of hostile intent, he cited the higher readiness and added: "It is just prudent to stay well away from them."

## CIA taped Poindexter-Casey meeting

WASHINGTON (AP) — A telephone conversation between Rear Adm. John Poindexter and the late CIA Director William Casey was secretly taped by the spy agency, using a special system that records sensitive overseas communications, the Iran-Contra hearings were told Thursday.

Poindexter said "I did not know" of the taping, which preceded crucial testimony by the two men before congressional intelligence committees on U.S. arms sales to Iran.

Days later, on Nov. 21, 1986, Casey told Congress he had understood an Israeli shipment to Iran in

November 1985 contained merely "bulky cargo." In fact, a number of CIA and other administration officials knew the Israelis shipped Hewlett-Packard computers, which sometimes substitutes for secret, written cable traffic.

The counsel said the committees have received transcripts of a number of conversations held over this communications link, but did not identify the others.

"When that system is used, the calls are taped by CIA headquarters and an index maintained, so there is a record equivalent to what would exist with operational cables," Liman said, adding that he was speaking with CIA permission.

"My understanding is that the CIA personnel are aware of this, and they are the people who normally use it," Liman said. "When a call takes place, which is I understand infrequent... I do not know whether the non-CIA person knows that his call was being recorded."

The chairman of the Senate panel, Daniel Inouye, D-Hawaii, then asked

Poindexter whether he knew of the taping, and the witness said no.

Poindexter said he called Casey the week of Nov. 17, 1986, to request his early return from Central America to Washington, so they could discuss their upcoming testimony. The director agreed to do so, and a number of administration officials did meet on the matter.

News stories had been appearing on the arms sales since the initial Nov. 4 disclosure of the transactions in a Middle East publication, and Poindexter said he realized that some explanation must be given Congress.

## North appeals order to give handwriting sample

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorneys for Lt. Col. Oliver North on Thursday moved to appeal a federal judge's order that he comply with a grand jury subpoena obtained by the independent counsel investigating the Iran-Contra affair.

North's lawyers filed a notice of

appeal to an order issued July 10 by Chief U.S. District Judge Aubrey E. Robinson Jr. The notice of appeal was placed under seal because the case involves grand jury matters. More than 29 envelopes of sealed material was also transmitted to the U.S. Circuit

Court of Appeals here, according to the docket sheet in the case.

Robinson last week rejected North's challenge to the authority of independent counsel Lawrence E. Walsh to obtain the grand jury subpoena.

Court records indicated that North was held in contempt of court May 8 for refusing to comply with

the subpoena, which sources say seeks a sample of his handwriting.

The contempt order was appealed to the circuit court, which ordered Robinson to consider North's challenge to Walsh's prosecutorial authority.

Robinson upheld Walsh's authority in his ruling last week. He also issued a sealed order.

## U.S. envoy confident of cease-fire chances

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. Ambassador Vernon Walters, citing unusual unanimity on the part of U.N. Security Council members, said Thursday he is confident the international panel will approve a resolution next week calling for a cease-fire in the Iran-Iraq war.

The envoy to the United Nations also expressed the hope that his most recent discussions with Syrian President Hafez Assad may produce a movement regarding American and other foreign hostages held in Lebanon.

Walters predicted after his discussions with the five permanent members of the Security Council on a Persian Gulf resolution. The five are the United States, the Soviet Union, Britain, France and China.

Walters declined to discuss Reagan's plan to keep oil moving through the gulf by offering U.S. naval protection to 11 Kuwaiti oil tankers, which several lawmakers

have said will begin next Wednesday.

Coast Guard spokesman Nicholas Sandifer said, meantime, that the service has completed processing applications for placing the ships under U.S. flags "and has delivered the necessary documents for the first two vessels to representatives of the company" that owns them.

But he added "they are not officially refueled" and could not say when that would become effective.

"We want a resolution calling for the end of a war, and if we do (get it), it will be the first time the five permanent members... have ever agreed to such a binding call," the ambassador said.

He said he favored giving Iran and Iraq 30 to 45 days to comply with the resolution, after which the Security Council members would decide on what further steps to take.

Although Walters declined to be specific, he said an arms embargo would be useful.

## Japan to toughen policies

WASHINGTON (AP) — Japan, seeking to defuse U.S. anger over a Japanese company's sale of sensitive technology to the Soviet Union, has vowed to toughen its export-control policies to prevent any repeat occurrence, the Commerce Department announced Thursday.

Japan's trade minister, Hajime Tamura, also promised Commerce Secretary Michael Baldrige that his government would pursue its investigation of the sale "with a view toward criminal prosecution," according to a Baldrige spokesman.

U.S. officials have said the sale to the Soviets of computer-controlled machine tools by Toshiba Machine, a subsidiary of the giant electronics company, enabled the Soviets to make silent-running submarine pro-

pellers — making their subs more difficult for Western allies to track.

Japan has also agreed to sharply increase its financial contributions to — a Paris-based — international organization that polices trade between the West and the Soviet bloc.

— The Coordinating Committee for Multilateral Export Controls (COCOM), said the Baldrige spokesman, B. Jay Cooper.

Baldrige earlier in the day accused Japan of being the "weak link" in that organization, which otherwise has roughly the same membership as the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO).

"It is important they step up their leadership in that forum," Baldrige told a group of reporters.

# Trade bill called 'best shot' to get windfall tax killed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Oil state senators said Thursday the Senate's sweeping trade bill represents their best chance to repeal the windfall profits tax that energy companies have been fighting for seven years.

"Getting it over the goal line here is the most important thing because I think that this is our best shot," Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, told a news conference hours after the Senate voted 88-0 in a post-midnight session to attach a repeal amendment to the trade bill.

"I remember vividly the bitter day when the windfall profits tax was approved," Gramm added. "I said that I was going to be here and be a leader when it was repealed."

The tax approved in 1980 represents an attempt to capture for the government some of the soaring profits driven from sharply increased oil prices in the energy crisis of the 1970s. There were forecasts of oil selling for \$70 a barrel at one point.

The steady decline in oil prices in 1986 hammered the oil states economically and left the tax moribund. It has generated no revenue lately with prices well below trigger levels that start the tax. There have been creeping up again in recent months past the \$20-a-barrel level.

Gramm said he has a finding from the Congressional Budget Office that the tax costs the government \$1.5 billion a year in lost revenue from repeal of the tax "at existing prices."

Senate supporters of the oil industry said the size of the victory would provide leverage when they sit down with House members in a conference committee and work out a compromise version of the sweeping trade bill.

The Senate passed a repeal measure last year only to see it die in the conference committee.

Sen. David Boren, D-Okla., said House Speaker Jim Wright will provide additional leverage for repeal forces now that he has succeeded Rep. Thomas P. O'Neill Jr., D-Mass.

"The speaker last time was Speaker O'Neill of Massachusetts — the speaker this time is Speaker Wright of Texas," Boren said.

"With this strong vote in the Senate, with Senator Bentsen chairing the conference committee, and with the previously declared support of Speaker Wright, I think we have the best chance we've had to actually repeal the tax," Boren said.

Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, is a stalwart advocate of repealing the oil tax.

Boren said that even if the trade bill goes every oil supplier will be back to get another vote on repeal of the tax.

Repeal arises primarily from a concerted drive by the oil industry to obtain relief from a tax that it claims unfairly makes the companies a target.

Hard times in oil country have made the repeal idea easier to sell in the Senate this year, although the same has not been so in the House. This also marks Bentsen's first year as chairman of the Finance Committee, a post that carries with it considerable Capitol Hill clout.

The lawmakers said they have assurances from Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III that the Reagan administration will support the effort to keep repeal alive this year.

# Dole to FAA: Get tough with airlines

WASHINGTON (AP) — Transportation Secretary Elizabeth Dole ordered the Federal Aviation Administration on Thursday to get tougher with airlines, including imposing fines, when lax security is found at airport passenger checkpoints.

Airport security checks have been the object of increased criticism in recent months. A congressional report last month concluded that one in five mock weapons carried through checkpoints during FAA tests were never detected.

Mrs. Dole, in releasing a task force report on airport security, told the FAA to "take more aggressive enforcement actions" to get airlines to tighten procedures for screening passengers and carry-on baggage at the nation's airports.

The task force concluded that while some airlines have successful screening programs, others "have an interest in minimizing the costs of providing security" resulting in poor security practices.

Airline industry spokesmen had no immediate comment on Mrs. Dole's directive.

William Whittington, acting FAA administrator, said in a statement that the FAA wants "to draw the security net as tight as needed (and) ... these new aggressive enforcement actions will help get the job done."

The task force found that while no major overhaul of the 14-year-old airport security screening program is needed, "the system must be strengthened" by the air carriers, Mrs. Dole said in a statement.

Passenger and baggage screening at airports is normally conducted by private security firms under contract to airlines that use an airport.

But Mrs. Dole sent a clear message to the nation's air carriers that if the airlines do not undertake a greater role in security screening matters they will face the possibility of civil fines.

Mrs. Dole told the FAA to increase its spot checks and tests of security screening personnel and "target specific airlines or security contractors whose performance is consistently substandard."

The FAA was told to clarify its security standards to assure that they agree and may impose civil penalties against air carriers if security screening is found to be lax. Mrs. Dole said airlines should face civil penalties whenever screeners fail to detect mock guns or weapons during FAA-sponsored tests.

# Mediator meets with labor unions, postal service

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal mediator met with officials of the Postal Service and two unions Thursday after the labor groups broke off contract negotiations.

Kay McMurray, director of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, met with union leaders in the morning and with postal officials in the afternoon, but officials at his agency declined to discuss whether any progress had been made.

However, Vincent R. Sombrotto, president of the National Association of Letter Carriers, said he expected an effort would be made to bring both sides back to the bargaining table, perhaps on Friday.

Chief postal negotiator Thomas J. Fritsch issued a statement saying that "management stands ready and willing to bargain at any time."

Three years ago, when the Postal Service and unions were unable to reach agreement, the contract was submitted to binding arbitration for settlement.

# Reagan extends specialty steel import quotas, tariffs

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, saying the U.S. specialty steel industry continues to face "widespread trade problems," Thursday extended for 26 months the quotas and tariffs he put into effect for such steel five years ago.

The relief program had been scheduled to expire on Sunday.

"Part of the difficulties arise from persistent global overproduction, some of it subsidized, as well as trade barriers and distortive practices used by our trading partners to produce their domestic industries and to stimulate exports," the White House announcement said.

For stainless steel sheet, strip and plate, the president continued in effect an import tariff starting at 3 percent and declining to 1 percent of value.

For stainless steel rod, bar and alloy tool steel, the existing quota program will remain in effect.

"The president's decision to extend import relief to the specialty steel industry is part of his comprehensive approach to trade problems in steel," presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said.

"The objective of that program is to bring an end to constant trade disputes over steel by reversing global trends toward excess capacity, greater subsidization and increasingly protected foreign markets."

The Specialty Steel Industry of the United States and the United Steelworkers of America issued a joint statement Thursday calling the move "good news for our industry, our workers and our nation which depends on advanced specialty steels throughout the economy."

# NASA sets full-scale booster test firings

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — NASA agency officials said Thursday they have decided to put three more full-scale tests firings of a redesigned solid rocket engine on the schedule for the shuttle recovery program.

John Thomas, NASA manager of the team redesigning the flawed engines that caused the Challenger accident, said the three tests were scheduled after some astronauts and a National Research Council committee recommended more test firings on the new engines.

The additions bring to eight the total number of firings planned with the redesigned rockets.

Thomas said he hopes all three additional tests can be performed before shuttle flights resume next June, but added that the schedule was "exceptionally tight."

"The three extra tests are not mandatory before the next flight," he said. "We expect to get at least two of the three, but hopefully we get all three."

Challenger exploded, killing its seven-member crew, after one of two solid rocket boosters leaked flame and caused a fuel tank to burst shortly after launch on Jan. 28, 1986.

A presidential commission blamed the accident on a flawed design in joints and O-ring seals of the solid-rocket booster, manufactured by Morton Thiokol.

Thomas and a team of engineers from Thiokol and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration have corrected the flaws in the rocket joint and will conduct full-scale tests to prove the new design at the Thiokol plant in Brigham City, Utah.

Originally, four full-scale firings of the new design were expected before the first shuttle flight, with one test later. But when the first flight was bumped from January 1987 to the following June, Thomas said he decided there was time for the suggested additional tests.

Full-scale test firing using the Challenger rocket design was conducted on May 27, and Thomas said it resulted in useful data on pressures inside the rocket and on materials that could be used for the rubberized O-rings that seal the joints.

After the tests, engineers found "unusual erosion areas" on the rocket nozzle cone, he said, but he attributed this to a known flaw in the manufacturing which would not be permitted on rockets used in actual flight.

There also was some erosion, or burning, of a primary O-ring in the engine, he said. This was expected, said Thomas, because investigators believe the O-rings failed completely in the Challenger accident.

## Boston mayor's heroics are risky, says expert

BOSTON — Mayor Raymond Flynn may be a hero since he helped end a police standoff earlier this

week with a distraught 60-year-old junk dealer. But one expert says he shouldn't make a habit of getting involved.

Flynn helped police subdue James Chaney on Tuesday after the man barricaded himself in his home and fired five shots at abandoned cars, officials said.

James Ginger, a Washington-based expert on hostage negotiations, says Flynn and Police-Deputy Superintendent William Ceteber broke the first commandment of negotiating.

"It goes against everything that is taught in the United States to have the chief decision-maker involved directly in the negotiations. It's even a bad idea to have the mayor on the scene. . . . If the guy asks for something, the mayor can't say he's the guy 'Let me check this out,'" Ginger said.

Flynn is known to need little sleep and routinely drives around the city chasing fires or police calls in the early hours.

In 1986, when a fire forced the evacuation of the 52-story Prudential Tower, Flynn forged past police orders to help rescue an injured woman on the 14th floor.

Wednesday, Flynn pooh-poohed the naysayers. "You're always going to be criticized for what you do in this business. It's a judgment thing and you can't be so cautious that you can't get anything done."

## Restaurateur Theisen pushes for Farm Aid

"We would be fools not to have it here," Theisen said. "We're talking about millions of dollars and helping people in 40 or 45 states."

The Omaha businessman said the university can use his donation however it wants.

Theisen said he originally offered the money to help offset costs to the university for holding Farm Aid III. Officials have said that all expenses will be paid by the Farm Aid organization.

## Judge refutes woman's claim to Williams cash

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — A judge has ruled against a woman who

claims she is the illegitimate daughter of Hank Williams Sr. and has a right to proceeds or royalties from the singer's estate.

Montgomery County Circuit Judge Mark Kennedy said that even if Williams fathered Cathy Stone she has no claim to his estate because he never tried to legitimize her and because she was adopted twice.

Hank Williams Jr. and trustees of Fred Rose Publishing, which handles the elder Williams' song rights, filed suit to have Stone barred from trying to establish that Hank Williams Sr. was her father.

Stone filed a federal suit in 1985 in New York seeking copyright renewal royalties from Williams' music. The suit is pending.

## Former Kentucky gov. recovers from bad hip

LEXINGTON, Ky. — Former Gov. John Y. Brown Jr. is home recuperating from surgery to repair his arthritic left hip, his sister Betty McCann said Thursday.

Brown was released from Centinela Hospital Medical Center in Los Angeles on Saturday and first went to Palm Springs, Calif., to recover, said Lawrence Dorr, who performed the same operation on Brown's right hip in February 1986.

The surgery was performed July 7. Brown returned to his Cave Hill estate in Lexington on Tuesday.

Mrs. McCann said, "He is using a walker and just doing great on it."

Brown will need crutches for about six weeks and will be able to resume normal activity in about three months, Dorr said. His long-term prognosis is good.

Dorr said Brown's left hip deteriorated during his unsuccessful campaign for the Democratic nomination for governor last spring.

# Hart not yet prepared to discuss demise of his campaign

DENVER — Gary Hart said Thursday he will discuss the collapse of his presidential campaign "when tempers have cooled and people are a little more objective about it."

Hart said he would not talk about it now "could very well be harmful to my family."

In his first face-to-face interview since he withdrew May 8 from the race for the Democratic nomination, Hart also said the Iran-Contra affair shows that President Reagan was too "insulated" both from what his subordinates were doing and from what the American people want.

He declined to answer questions

about the demise of his campaign, which came less than a week after The Miami Herald reported he

spent the night with Florida model Donna Rice at his Washington townhouse. Hart, 50, denied that allegation, but persisting questions about his personal life forced him to abandon the race.

"Well, I would like to (talk about it) — but I think circumstances don't permit it right now," Hart said. "We've talked to an awful lot of people and tried to figure out when an appropriate time to discuss personal matters might be — and the general consensus of people whose advice I trust is to wait awhile."

"I don't see how we can get into those matters without opening up some areas that could well be very

harmful to my family — and that's the reason I got out of the race in the first place — so there's no reason right now to go back," he said. "But I think there will probably be a time when tempers have cooled and people are a little more objective about it."

Hart, a former senator now practicing international law in Denver with the firm of Davis, Graham & Stubbs, lives in nearby Troublesome Gulch with his wife, Lee. They have two grown children, Andrea and John.

Hart plans to go on the lecture circuit both in the United States and overseas in September. He also is working on two books and has plans

for a third detailing the last 20 years of his life.

During Thursday's interview in his law office, Hart said he was unwilling to judge Reagan for the Iran-Contra affair — but he would have handled matters differently.

"The president shouldn't be as insulated as he was here," Hart said. "He has to know in more than general terms what people think in the country. The point is that he didn't know (about the diversion of funds to the Contras). I don't think there are relative degrees of judgment. The president has to be held accountable for his actions."

"I would have insisted on knowing details. I would assume responsibility. I wouldn't have sold arms to the Iranians," Hart said.

# Divers find champagne, but no gold

ABOARD THE SOSI INSPECTOR (AP) — Divers searching a 1909 shipwreck have come up with trappings of the many millions who fled the sinking vessel, and they say they are closing in on an area where a fortune in gold might be found.

The search is taking place 55 miles south of Nantucket Island, where the RMS Republic, a 600-foot long "floating hotel," collided with another ship in the foggy early morning hours of Jan. 23, 1910.

Salvagers say their research has led them to believe there may be as much as \$1.2 billion in valuables that could be recovered.

But after two weeks of diving, the elaborate and dangerous deep-sea salvage, which costs about \$25,000 per day, has yielded only unopened bottles of champagne, kelp-encrusted steamer pots, broken plates and a rolled-up pair of ladies' black stockings.

The ship was owned by J.P. Morgan's White Star shipping lines, the owner of the Titanic. More than 400 millionaires, many of whom were aboard the Titanic when it sank in 1912, were among 900 passengers on the Republic who were ferried to safety in the largest open-ocean rescue to date. Six people died.

The ship is rumored to have carried \$3 million in American gold coins, destined for Czar Nicholas II of Russia, who was bankrupt and threatened by the Germans and rising Bolsheviks.

The salvage organizers, through what amounts to painstaking detective work, had concluded that gold was aboard, near the second-class baggage section, but admit there is no way they can be sure.

Several of the salvors said they have been fascinated by the wreck of the Republic since they were children.

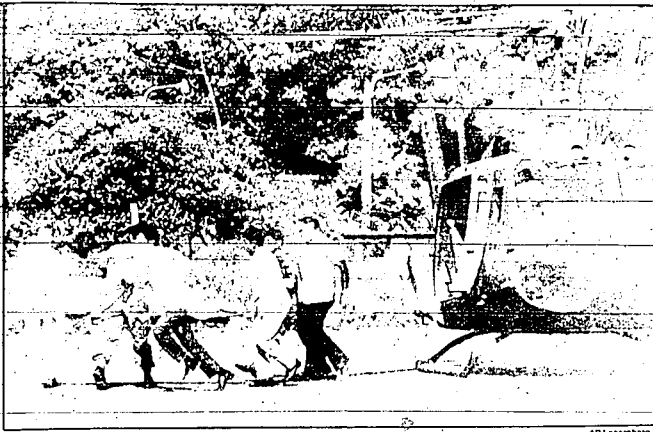

# Six U.S. military men killed in crash of relief helicopter

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador — A U.S. military helicopter crashed in a squall, killing six American servicemen on a mission to aid a wounded U.S. military adviser, the U.S. Embassy said Thursday. One of those killed in the crash Wednesday night was the deputy commander of the U.S. Military Group attached to the U.S. Embassy in San Salvador, according to a Defense Department spokesman in Washington. One of the seven aboard survived.

The crash brings to 12 the number of U.S. servicemen killed in El Salvador since the war between the U.S.-backed government and leftist guerrillas began in 1979. The Huey UE-1H helicopter went down "because of bad weather" at 10:52 p.m., seven minutes after it left the capital, said Col. Ron Sconyers, director of public affairs for the U.S. Southern Command in Panama.

The servicemen were bound for the Salvadoran military training center in La Union, 115 miles east of the capital, to pick up a U.S. trainer wounded in the neck in a gun accident there, Sconyers said. The wounded advisor had been taken back to the center from a military hospital in nearby San Miguel.

The craft hit a steep cliff along the side of Ilopango Lake, a volcanic crater filled with water about 10 miles east of San Salvador, he said. Robert Sims, the Pentagon's chief spokesman, said the U.S. helicopter was trying to return to the Ilopango Airport at the time of the crash.

"The survivor of the crash climbed a hill and found a Salvadoran national who assisted in his call for help," Sims added. "U.S. and Salvadoran personnel were then dispatched to the crash site." The survivor and the soldier wounded in La Union were in very serious condition at the military hospital in San Salvador, the embassy said.

Among the dead was Air Force Lt. Col. James M. Basile, 43, of Chesapeake, Conn., the deputy commander of the U.S. Military Group at the embassy, said Capt. Nancy LaLuntas, a Pentagon spokesman.

The other five dead all were Army personnel, and their identities were being withheld pending notification of relatives, she said. However, Nesbia Alvarenga, a Salvadoran justice of the peace, identified them as Lt. Col. Joseph Librado Lujan, 43; 2nd Lt. Gregory J. Paredes, 24; Sgt. Linn V. Keen, 27; and John Douglas Rablon, 39, and Douglas Lee Adams, identified only as soldiers. Their hometowns were not provided.

In El Salvador, a justice of the peace serves the function of a coroner, making identifications in deaths. Ms. LaLuntas said the identity of the survivor and the soldier who was shot also were being withheld. She said she did not know why Basile was with the others on the medical evacuation.

Witnesses said the bodies were strewn along a grassy incline. U.S. military personnel and Salvadoran soldiers recovered the bodies and put them aboard U.S. helicopters. The helicopter that crashed was one of several maintained in the capital for use by U.S. Embassy and military personnel.

Gen. Aldo Blandon, Salvadoran military chief of staff, said the soldier was accidentally fired a weapon. Basile was with the report, another embassy spokesman, Joseph McManus, said, "I can't deny it." Leftist guerrillas trying to overthrow the U.S.-supported government had nothing to do with the crash, said U.S. Embassy spokesman Jacob Glickman.

"It was not shot upon," he said. "As far as we can assume, the cause was weather, a squall line that came in."

The flag in front of the embassy in San Salvador was lowered to half-staff.

There are about 150 U.S. military personnel, including 65 advisers, in El Salvador. The advisers arrived in 1981 to train the Salvadoran army in their fight against the rebels, grouped as the Farabundo Marti National Liberation Front. Congress set a ceiling of 55 military advisers, and those who are banned from going into combat situations.

A classified number of CIA personnel, however, work with the Salvadoran army and are not under restrictions. In March, a CIA agent died in a helicopter crash in eastern El Salvador.

On March 31, rebels attacked the northern El Paraiso garrison, killing 70 soldiers, among them U.S. Army Sgt. Gregory Fronius.

On Oct. 19, 1984, four CIA workers were killed when the plane in which they were flying on a reconnaissance mission crashed into the San Salvador volcano. Another CIA agent died in a March helicopter crash in eastern El Salvador.

On May 25, 1985, guerrillas shot and killed naval Lt. Cmdr. Albert Schaufelberger as he sat in his car at the Central American University. Guerrillas opened fire June 19, 1985, on an outdoor cafe in the capital and killed four U.S. Marines assigned to embassy guard duty. The United States provides more than \$1.5 million a day in military and economic aid to El Salvador. Aid has totaled \$2.7 billion since 1980, with about three-fourths of that going for military aid and to repair damage caused by the fighting. An estimated 63,000 people have been killed in the civil war.

shelter in schools and government buildings.

Rescue crews dug through the debris of smashed houses, looking for survivors—and bodies—as neighbors and other residents helped.

Chong Han-yong, 27, survived an earthquake that demolished his home in Kwangju, 165 miles south of Seoul. He buried seven relatives and tenants, said he was swamped in mud and rocks when an embankment fell on the house.

"I fainted for a while, but shortly regained my consciousness and managed to escape from the mud," he was quoted by police as saying. "When I escaped... my brother was alive," he said, "I tried for help after saving my life, but there was no one nearby to rescue my brother."

The flank of the typhoon struck a glancing blow at the southern coast, and the main body of the 120-mile storm did not touch the Korean peninsula, weather officials said. The typhoon was downgraded to a tropical depression as it moved out to the Sea of Japan.

The 300-ton freighter Hanjin-ho, carrying cement, sank off Pusan and nine of its crew were missing and feared drowned, officials said.

Hundreds of fishing boats and other vessels moored in harbors or drawn up on the shore were destroyed or damaged by wind and waves, officials said. At least 360 boats had been destroyed or damaged, they said.

"We think the number of casualties and property damage may increase as communications are restored in remote areas," said a rescue official in Kwangju. Only 23 people were reported injured, apparently because most casualties were caused by landslides that flattened houses and left no survivors, officials said. Five people were killed when a landslide swept away four homes in Hamyang and four members of a family died when their home was buried by a landslide in the town of Milyang.

The storm also badly damaged fields newly planted with rice seedlings and disrupted industry. Officials in Seoul and the storm-hit areas of the south reported extensive property damage, but said they had no overall figures. The Seoul-based newspaper said the storm caused at least \$22 million in damage.

South Korea often has been hit by typhoons during the midsummer rainy season. Typhoon Brenda killed 68 people and caused extensive damage when it hit southern coastal areas in July 1985. A typhoon in 1959 left 849 people dead and more than 373,000 homeless.

# South Korea launches huge rescue effort; typhoon rages

SEUL, South Korea (AP) — Rescuers hunted for "victims" Thursday after Typhoon Thelma unleashed floods, mudslides and storm seas that killed 55 people and left at least 81 missing along the southern coast.

The Home Ministry, which released the casualty figures, said the toll was expected to rise as more victims were found. About 110,000 rescue workers, including thousands of military reservists, were mobilized to search for survivors and to repair roads, waterways and buildings, officials said.

The typhoon, packing winds of 50 mph, sent sheets of heavy rain over South Korea Wednesday night and early Thursday, causing rivers to burst their banks and flood villages.

Tons of dirt and rocks cascaded onto towns, destroying hundreds of homes and other buildings. Many victims were feared trapped in the debris.

Some of the worst damage was in an area around the southern port of Pusan, the country's second largest city. Local officials said up to 16 people were killed, including two or three who died after being hit by heavy objects propelled by the strong winds.

Local officials said the damage was being cleaned up by work crews and conditions were returning to normal in the port. Nationwide, at least 1,300 homes were destroyed or badly damaged and 7,300 people were left homeless, officials said. The homeless sought

# French premier orders check of deadly, flooded campsite

GRAND BORNAND, France (AP) — Premier Jacques Chirac said Thursday he had ordered a safety investigation of a campsite where a flash flood and mudslide killed at least 22 people. Eleven still were listed as missing.

Chirac visited this Alpine valley for an hour, viewed 15 coffins lined up in the grey stone church, and spoke to relatives of victims.

Earlier Thursday, authorities had said 22 people were killed but revised the number of dead and missing later, as they have done several times. Officials said they had counted one body twice.

The fact that two events of a comparable intensity and both abnormal took place at the same site in a century... creates a heavy presumption of risk."

Regional officials said 11 people were still missing at 9 p.m. Thursday, when the search was called off for the night. At least nine people were seriously hurt and dozens were treated for shock.

Some people originally listed as missing turned up unharmed in the village, to which they had moved from the campsite when heavy thunderstorms began Tuesday evening. The campground is next to the village. Both are on the banks of the Birne, a fast-moving mountain stream.

An eerie silence hung over the crowd of about 350 people who came to see the premier in the main square of Grand Bornand, a popular ski resort 30 miles south of Geneva.

Chirac said the wall of mud and water that inundated the campsite was an act of "fate that could not be helped."

At a news conference later, he warned against "hasty and premature judgments" but said an investigation was under way.

Chirac said 27 regions, including this one, were under study and "no one, in the current state of things, envisioned the closing of the campsite." The water, mud and rocks that swept over the campsite split trees and crushed recreational vehicles and carried campers and trailers down the Birne. Bodies were found as far away as the Arve River on the outskirts of Geneva.

# Aquino government files suit on Marcos for \$22 billion

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — The government sued deposed President Ferdinand E. Marcos and his family Thursday for more than \$22 billion, claiming they plundered the treasury, betrayed the public trust and abused power.

Marcos fled the country he ruled for two decades on Feb. 26, 1986, driven out by a military-civilian uprising that put his 17-year-old son, Aquino in power. He and his wife Imelda now live in Hawaii.

Officials also said they refused an offer by a Saudi Arabian businessman to invest \$1 billion in the Philippines if actions against Marcos were dropped.

Criminal charges are to be filed next week against the former president. The officials did not specify the charges, which are expected to cover the same ground as the civil action. The Presidential Commission on Good Government filed the civil suit

in a special anti-graft court. Mrs. Aquino appointed the commission and gave it the mission of finding the fortune Marcos is accused of stealing.

According to the court papers, that fortune is "conservatively" estimated at \$10 billion. The suit asks the court to make Marcos return that sum, pay \$12.5 billion in actual, moral and exemplary damages, and reimburse the commission for \$12.5 million it spent in tracking his wealth.

Also named as defendants are Mrs. Marcos; their children Ferdinand Jr., Imee Manolac and Irene Aranaeta, and sons-in-law Tomas Manolac and Gregorio Aranaeta III. The Marcos children also live abroad, but their whereabouts are not known. Commission chairman Ramon Diaz said the government also will file civil actions against about 40 people associated with Marcos.

It says he also misappropriated public funds, took bribes and kickbacks on government contracts and established coconut and sugar monopolies.

Listed among items the government seeks to recover are property in the United States worth \$75 million, \$20 million in bank deposits and other investments in America and elsewhere, \$10 million in jewelry and cash held by U.S. Customs, and paintings by masters including Michelangelo, Gauguin, El Greco, Royce, Manet, Renoir and Picasso.

Domestic assets listed include \$84.4 million in two bank accounts, shares in various corporations worth \$83 million and jewelry and real estate valued at \$15 million.

Diaz said the commission will file criminal charges despite problems posed by Mrs. Aquino's refusal, for security reasons, to let Marcos return to the Philippines. The constitution forbids the trial of absent defendants on criminal charges but not in civil cases.

If the problem is not resolved, "our case in the United States and... Switzerland will not progress," Diaz said. Officials of the commission said earlier that some criminal proceedings might be conducted elsewhere, but it would need U.S. permission to take Marcos to court in Hawaii.

Switzerland issued a freeze order last year on Marcos assets under its jurisdiction. A recent Swiss court ruling said banks could help recover the money if criminal charges were filed against Marcos at home.

# Earthquake hits Pacific off of Japan

TOKYO (AP) — A severe earthquake hit underneath the Pacific Ocean off the east coast of central Japan Thursday afternoon, the Central Meteorological Agency said. There were no immediate reports of damage or casualties from the quake, which had a magnitude of 6.5 on the Richter scale, a National Police Agency official said. The meteorological agency said there was no danger of tsunami, the post-seismic waves triggered by undersea disturbances. The Richter scale is a gauge of the energy released by an earthquake, as measured by the ground motion recorded on a seismograph. Every increase of one number means that the ground motion is 10 times greater.

# Iran issues France threat

Conflict on mission may sever relations

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Iran said Thursday it is reducing the staff of its Paris embassy and will break relations unless France quits blockading the mission and punishes policemen who allegedly beat an Iranian envoy.

France responded Thursday night by strengthening the police detail at the embassy.

Pierre LaFrance, the French charge d'affaires in Tehran, was summoned to the Foreign Ministry and handed a note saying ties would be ended in 72 hours unless the conditions were met.

Iran's official Islamic Republic News Agency, monitored in Nicotia, said the diplomatic staff in Paris was being reduced to a "minimum."

It did not say how many people would be withdrawn, or give the number of Iranians now on the staff. French officials say about 40 Iranians work at the embassy, including five diplomats.

A statement Thursday night from the Interior Ministry in Paris said: "The French government Thursday night gave instructions that the ring around the Iranian Embassy in Paris be considerably reinforced." It gave no details.

Foreign Minister Jean-Bernard Raimond was on an official visit to the Ivory Coast, but cut it short and returned to Paris.

Police have been checking the identities of Iranians who enter or leave the embassy.

Premier Jacques Chirac's government demands that the mission turn over Wahid Gerdji, who is identified as an Iranian interpreter without diplomatic immunity and has taken refuge there.

He is wanted for questioning by an investigating magistrate about five bombings in Paris last year that killed 11 people and wounded more than 150.

Chirac said in an interview published July 7 that France might break relations with Iran unless Gerdji presented himself.

French sources say privately that Gerdji actually is the embassy's No. 2 man, with ties to the Iranian secret service and at least one person arrested in the bombings.

France began trying to normalize relations with Iran after Chirac took office in March 1986 but has refused to alter its policy toward Iraq, a long-time friend and major arms customer. Iran and Iraq have been at war since September 1980.

The official Iranian news agency said Iran also demanded punishment of French customs police it accuses of beating an Iranian diplomat Saturday—at the Geneva airport.

# Opposition demands cabinet changes

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Opposition leaders demanded Thursday the nation's four-day-old Cabinet resign in favor of a neutral government that can ensure fair elections.

Kim Young-sam and Kim Dae-jung, the two top opposition leaders, also said President Chun Doo-hwan's resignation last week as head of the governing Democratic Justice Party was not enough to ensure his neutrality and urged him to give up his party membership.

The present Cabinet should resign as soon as possible because it is not expected to manage the upcoming elections in a fair manner, the two Kim's said in a statement after a long meeting.

Chun, reacting to an opposition demand, made changes in his cabinet Monday. He appointed Kim Chung-ryul, 70, as prime minister and replaced seven ministers in an effort to guarantee government neutrality in upcoming elections. All ministers with governing party membership were dismissed.

But the opposition said Chun's Cabinet shuffle fell short of their demand for a neutral government, which they said should be formed from the governing and opposition parties as well as independent and dissident groups.

"The country...we think, needs a truly neutral government to effectively push democratization and national reconciliation," the two Kim's said.

Kim Young-sam, president of the main opposition Reunification Democratic Party, repeated the call for the resignation of the new Cabinet when the newly appointed prime minister made a courtesy call on him later Thursday.

# ICL director questions water protection plan

**TWIN-FALLS** — A proposal to classify all 7,000 miles of Idaho's streams to protect water quality is already coming under fire by the Idaho Conservation League, even before a series of public meetings.

ICL Executive Director Mary Kelly on Thursday raised concerns about the proposed "anti-degradation" plan to meet federal requirements of the Clean Water Act.

Kelly said one section appears to be at odds with the Clean Water Act and takes the side of industry over citizens and environmentalists.

Specifically, Kelly is concerned about a classification called B2, that would allow water quality to be lowered immediately.

"It appears to put the burden of proof on citizens and environmentalists, rather than potential developers," she said. "We have a problem with it, and we hope it will be a major part of the workshop discussion."

The anti-degradation proposal is the result of a year of negotiations and meetings among the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare and the Idaho Department of Lands and members of an ad hoc committee.

"Now citizens will have a chance

to study and comment on the proposal," Idaho's Water Quality Bureau will hold a public informational meeting in Twin Falls July 27 to explain the plan.

The meeting at the College of Southern Idaho in one of six workshops being held around the state. On Aug. 3, another meeting will be held at the Tyrolean Lodge in Ketchikan.

During each of the six workshop sessions, participants will be given information about the federal requirement and the proposed Idaho plan. Representatives of the Water Quality Bureau and Idaho's Department of Lands will explain the

major provisions of the plan, answer questions and distribute brochures, maps and water quality classifications for river segments within each region.

Formal hearings on the plan are scheduled for October. The final plan must be submitted to the Idaho Legislature for approval in February 1988.

If the state fails to develop an acceptable plan, the Environmental Protection Agency will establish a federal standard.

Larry Jones, with the Department of Lands, said he did not think EPA would impose its own standards.

"They haven't done it to any other state, although they are concentrating on Idaho," he said.

In 1985, EPA notified Idaho it was not meeting water quality requirements. In 1986, then-Gov. John Evans appointed a team to resolve conflicts on nonpoint source activities and the impact on water quality in Idaho. Nonpoint source activities include forestry, grazing, farming and mining that discharge pollutants to surface waters through overland runoff.

The team that developed the anti-degradation plan included four members from each state department and ad hoc members representing forestry, agriculture, mini-

ing, environmental group and the Nez Perce Indian Tribe.

Jones said the proposed plan-the group developed should not have a major impact on the Magic Valley. "A lot of agricultural lands will be in the C category, which means they can't lower the water quality any further because those streams are below standards now," Jones said. "It doesn't preclude activities, it just makes people think about them."

He said the real impacts on development will be in Idaho's back country where waters are still pristine.

The public meeting in Twin Falls will begin at 7:30 p.m. at the Shields Building, Room 116, at CSI.

# Twin Falls County in limbo on proposed jail

**TWIN FALLS** — Twin Falls County is in legal limbo.

Should it proceed to sell bonds to finance a new jail if Arlo Kent intends to appeal the dismissal of his lawsuit that questioned bond-election procedures?

That's the \$3.8 million question the Board of County Commissioners has asked its bond counsel, Chapman and Cutler of Salt Lake City.

The county has taken more direct action in another aspect of the case. Defense attorneys filed a request on Thursday asking 5th District Court to order Kent to pay the \$13,688 in attorney fees and costs it took to fight what the

county claims is a "frivolous" lawsuit.

Kent's lawsuit, in which County Clerk Dick Pence and Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter were named as defendants, was dismissed Monday by 5th District Judge Daniel Mehl. Kent, a mechanic and former state legislative candidate, had failed to file a tort claim with the county before filing the lawsuit in court.

In his lawsuit, Kent claimed Pence failed to register voters for the May 12 election, in which voters approved the sale of \$3.8 million in bonds to pay for the construction of a new county jail.

Kent said he sued Baxter because she failed to prosecute Pence on a prior election violation, resulting in the violation in the bond election.

Kent, who could not be reached for comment Thursday, indicated previously that he will appeal the dismissal to the Idaho Supreme Court.

Commission Chairman Judy Felton said the county asked Chapman and Cutler to issue a legal opinion on whether the county should proceed on the bond sale.

A copy of Mehl's decision was sent to the bond counsel this week.

Bud Way, a Boise banker handling the bond sale for the county, said, "Next week we should have some idea if we are going to go ahead or not."

If the word is go, then it will take about one month to prepare for the bond sale. Way said. The commissioners would first have to adopt a bond resolution, establishing the procedure for the sale.

In the newest filings in the case, defense attorneys claim the defendants are entitled to attorney fees and costs because they were the prevailing party in a "meritless" complaint.

Kent had known about the tort-claim requirement because other lawsuits he had filed were dismissed because he had failed to file the claims first with the public entity he was suing, the motion stated.

"At least an award of attorney fees in this case may cause him to think twice before he acts without any basis in law or fact and files a lawsuit," the motion stated. (Kent) cannot hide behind his status as a layman now that the court has ruled against his frivolous complaint."

If the defense is successful and fees are

granted, the money doesn't go to the county. Defense attorney Paul Penland was hired by the county's insurer, the Idaho Counties Risk Management Program, a non-profit organization formed by Idaho counties. Any costs or fees ordered by the court against Kent will go to the insurance program, Felton said.

The bond sale is already a month behind schedule because of the lawsuit. Before the action was filed, mid-July had been the tentative date of the bond sales.

For every month of delay the county is paying between \$12,000 to \$16,000 a month for the costs of boarding county inmates in other jails because of a cap on the jail population that resulted from a different lawsuit.

## Driver dies in rollover

**TWIN FALLS** — A one-car, end-over-end rollover south of Twin Falls killed a 16-year-old Jerome youth Thursday.

Timothy Eugene Hoshaw, 16, of Jerome, died after his 1976 Triumph TR7 went off Blue Lakes Boulevard South at 3000 East Road, according to state police reports.

The location is about 4.6 miles south of Twin Falls. State police said the accident was reported at 5:39 p.m.

His passenger was his sister Jacqueline Waggoner, 23, of Twin Falls. She was treated at and released from Magic Valley Regional Medical Center.

State police dispatchers gave this account of the accident: Hoshaw's car was traveling north exceeding the posted speed limit, when it drifted off the left side of the road.

The car then hit a cement ditch and flew through the air for 90 feet before landing on its top. The car flipped end over end before coming to a rest upside down, pinning Hoshaw's legs under the car.

Authorities had to use extrication devices to remove Hoshaw from the wreckage.

Waggoner was not thrown from the car.

Two Idaho State Police and two county sheriff officers responded to the accident. State police said neither Hoshaw nor Waggoner were wearing seat belts. Police also said there was no alcohol involved in the accident.

## Bellevue budget brings water rate hike

**BELLEVUE** — A budget of \$233,218 has been approved by the Bellevue City Council for the coming budget year. The amount is up by about \$3,000 from last year, said City Administrator Milton Waltz.

A 10 percent increase in water rates was approved for the upcoming fiscal year and will become effective Aug. 1. The increase is expected to raise between \$8,000 and \$9,000 for the city, Waltz said.

The council has not received any negative public input about the rate increase, he added. "There's been

no comment one way or the other—think people realize we need to raise the rates," he said.

Animal control, currently shared with Blaine County and the city of Halley, was cut completely from the budget. "We didn't think we were getting our money's worth," Waltz said.

The city will continue to have an animal control law, but no enforcement, he said. The \$4,800 previously spent on animal control will be used for "more important needs," he said.

At the recommendation of Councilmember Ron Reese, the council approved a \$6,394 increase in the fire

department budget, which will be \$25,783 for the upcoming fiscal year.

The money will be used to purchase new equipment, including hoses, nozzles and tools. A \$6,000 air compressor has also been purchased, Reese said. The compressor will allow Bellevue firefighters to fill their own oxygen bottles instead of buying air, he said.

The council also voted to establish a 75¢ fee for the services of the Bellevue Fire Department. Because the number of fires each year is not predictable, the amount of money to be generated by the fee is unknown, Reese said.

Money collected from the service charges will go into the general fund, Waltz said, because we need more revenues and we can only raise taxes so much."

Residents will probably not have a problem with the new service charge, Reese said, adding that most homeowner's insurance policies cover fire department fees.

The city will "make a stab" at constructing a maintenance building this year and budgeted \$20,000 for the project, Waltz said. The building would be for use by the city's maintenance man-to-repair equipment, he said.

## Sun Valley plans test of water for asbestos

**SUN VALLEY** — The city of Sun Valley will test for asbestos fibers in its water supply, says Jack Brown, manager of the water and sewer district.

Brown says CH2M Hill, the city's engineers, will take a number of water samples from the city system in the next few weeks and have them analyzed at independent laboratories. It will take three weeks to a month to get the results.

Asbestos is a suspected cancer-causing agent in water systems, some researchers say. But Dick Rogers, senior water quality engineer for the state Division of Environment, says there are no documented health problems from absorbing low levels of asbestos. EPA has given higher priority to testing for other water pollutants, he says.

The city tested for asbestos five to six years ago and found there was no problem, Brown says.

The asbestos testing this time is

## Water rights case applies to local area

**BOISE** — The state and a Hamer farmer have settled a dispute alleging illegal diversion of water for irrigation, in a case which has application to southern Idaho.

Similar practices in the area are under investigation by the state Department of Water Resources, DWR says.

In the Eastern Idaho case, farmer Blaine Larsen agreed to provide replacement water to cover that portion of his 1987 pumping that was in controversy, DWR says in a recent press release.

The case marks the first test of a 1986 state law that gives DWR the right to stop diversions from a natural watercourse or ground water without a valid water right.

Larsen will also pay a fine and will refrain from irrigating any lands in 1988 or thereafter for which he does not have a valid permit or DWR approval, DWR says.

The amount of the fine and acre-feet of water to be replaced will be determined by a joint inspection by Larsen Farms and DWR, says Norm Young, DWR spokesman. An acre-foot is an acre of water one foot deep.

"We're literally going to go out and count acres and pumps," says Young. The inspection will be in the next few weeks, he says.

DWR will drop its request in 7th District Court for an order banning Larsen from making further diversions, DWR says.

DWR is also dropping a July 15-17 administrative hearing on the issue. In October, DWR accepted a bond from Larsen and agreed to begin processing his water rights applications and authorized him to construct wells, says Jeffrey C. Feraday, Larsen's attorney. When President Reagan vetoed

the bill sealing the Swan Falls water rights agreement a month later, DWR suspended its new regulations, Feraday says.

Larsen's bond money was used to rent water but when the First District Water Supply Bank declined, the irrigation season was under way and Larsen lacked sufficient water to cover his needs, Feraday says.

At this point DWR took action to stop his pumping, he says. The settlement was the best practical course of action and will inform all water users of new rules regarding the diversion of water, says A. Kenneth Dunn, DWR director.

# Rhoades to face murder, kidnapping trial

**BLACKFOOT (AP) —** Accused multiple murderer Paul Ezra Rhoades has been bound over to district court for trial in the kidnapping and murder of a Blackfoot convenience store clerk.

Bingham County Magistrate James Martesch ruled Thursday at the end of a two-day preliminary hearing that there was sufficient evidence to try the 30-year-old Idaho Falls man on six of the eight counts filed against him for the Feb. 29 slaying of Stacy Baldwin.

Rhoades is charged with first-degree murder, first-degree kidnapping, robbery and three counts of using a firearm in the commission of a felony in Mrs. Baldwin's death.

Martsch dismissed a charge of assault with intent to commit rape and one firearm count, ruling that prosecutor's had not

shown probable cause. However, he dismissed the two counts without prejudice, which could allow the charges to be filed again if new evidence turns up.

Rhoades is scheduled to be arraigned July 27 in 7th District Court. He has been held without bond since being arrested near Wells, Nev., in late March.

Rhoades also faces an October trial in neighboring Bonneville County for the March slaying of clerk Nolan Hildebrand, a junior high school teacher Susan Michelbacher. Charges in that case include two counts of first-degree murder and 11 other felonies.

The body of Mrs. Baldwin, 21, was found outside Blackfoot the morning of Feb. 29 after she was discovered missing from her job at the Red Mill Barn.

Nancy Tyler, a waitress at Stan's Grill in Blackfoot, testified Thursday that Rhoades came in the restaurant about 2 a.m. on Feb. 29.

Idaho Falls Police Detective Dennis Shaw testified later that Rhoades' boot prints were similar to tracks found near Mrs. Baldwin's body, and that a wristwatch found in Rhoades' jacket pocket was identical to the same one being worn by Mrs. Baldwin when she disappeared.

Shaw also testified that a .38-caliber pistol found in Rhoades' car was the same gun used in the robbery of an Idaho Falls lingerie shop and the murders of Mrs. Baldwin, Mrs. Michelbacher and Haddon.

Bonneville County Sheriff's Officer Clyde Burkness testified that Rhoades, while in the Elko County Jail in Nevada, denied any involvement in the crimes. He said Rhoades

had admitted purchasing the gun, but that he could not remember when.

The prosecution's final witness was Mrs. Baldwin's mother, Verma Taylor. She testified that the watch found on Rhoades was her daughter's, "or one just like it."

Testimony from a pathologist on Wednesday indicated that Mrs. Baldwin was shot three times, with the fatal shot fired into her back and going through her lung.

A forensic expert also testified that footprints found outside the convenience store where Mrs. Baldwin worked could have been made by the boots Rhoades was wearing when he was arrested in Nevada.

Defense attorneys have said in court documents that they plan to use an alibi defense for Rhoades in Mrs. Baldwin's murder. They indicated a witness would be

called to testify he saw Rhoades in a bar during the time that the woman was killed. Court-appointed lawyers in Bonneville County also have asked for a ruling on the constitutionality of Idaho's law barring the use of insanity as a criminal defense.

Rhoades reportedly has undergone a series of psychological evaluations since his arrest.

Before Thursday's hearing ended, members of Rhoades' family protested their exclusion from the courtroom during the proceeding.

Bingham County Prosecutor Thomas Moss, supported by Martsch, required the family to leave after being told by defense attorney David Parmenter that he intended to use testimony from family members in supporting his alibi defense.

"My rights have been violated," said Pauline Rhoades, Rhoades' mother.

## ICL urges wilderness for areas

**BOISE (AP) —** A spokesman for two chapters of the Idaho Conservation League has urged Idaho Congressman Larry Craig to drop his study on making two central Idaho mountain areas into national parks.

Instead, he said in a letter to Craig on Thursday, the congressman should support wilderness designation for the Sawtooth and White Cloud mountains.

Tom Pomeroy, Ketchum, said members of the Wood River Valley and Stanley chapters of the ICL wrote Craig after the congressman sent 1st District constituents a questionnaire. It asked whether they should continue his studies on making the areas into national parks.

Pomeroy said the questionnaire was not sent to people who live in the communities involved, because the area is in Idaho's 2nd Congressional District.

"We don't object to people in Coeur d'Alene or

Lewisville telling Cong. Craig their opinions about the White Clouds and Sawtooths," Pomeroy said. "But we did think it was odd he didn't ask any of us who live in the area what we think."

The ICL chapters said they told Craig the best thing he could do to support economic growth in central Idaho would be to support wilderness designation for the White Cloud, Boulder, Pioneer and Smokey mountains.

"Most local businesses support the designation of substantially greater wilderness areas and the economic benefits they provide," they said.

The ICL spokesman said members felt the existing Sawtooth National Recreation Area is better for the region's economy than a national park would be.

The SNRA is one big reason our part of Idaho has escaped serious economic troubles in the last few years," Pomeroy said.

Craig was in Philadelphia Thursday for a historic reenactment and could not be reached for comment.

## Idaho Supreme Court backs PUC cogeneration ruling

**BOISE (AP) —** The Idaho Supreme Court has agreed with the Public Utilities Commission that Washington Water Power Co. could not be forced to sign a power purchase contract with Empire Lumber Co.

In a 4-1 ruling released Thursday, the Supreme Court agreed that Empire Lumber was not "ready, willing and able" to sign a specific contract with the Spokane-based utility to purchase power.

Under a federal law, utilities are required to purchase electricity from small power producers or cogenerators, under certain conditions.

Empire Lumber Co. entered into contract talks with WWP, proposing to build a facility to burn waste wood products to generate electricity at mills at Kamiah, St. Maries or Weippe.

After long negotiations failed to produce an agreement, Empire Lumber asked the PUC to force WWP to sign a long-term contract at its "avoided" costs. That's a term used under the federal law to calculate how much a utility would save by not having to build new generating

plants because of cogenerated power purchases.

The PUC ruled that at the time the complaint was filed, Empire had not made a specific proposal, and thus was not a "qualified facility" under the federal law. It was not until after the complaint was filed that Empire proposed to build a 9.9 megawatt generating plant at Kamiah, the PUC said.

The Supreme Court rejected Empire Lumber's appeal, agreeing with the PUC that the company was not a "qualified facility" with a specific proposal.

"We deem it clear that the purpose of (the federal law) is not to require an electrical utility company to enter into a contract to purchase electrical power from an entity which in essence only desires to obtain an option to sell some amount of electrical power to be generated at some plant of unknown size or capacity," the court said.

The evidence clearly supports the decision of the Idaho Public Utilities Commission that at no time during negotiations was Empire ready, willing and able to sign a contract with Washington Water Power," the court said.

Justice Stephen Bistline dissented, saying it would make more sense to send the matter back to the PUC with instructions to reopen negotiations with the goal of meeting the intent of Congress in enacting the federal law.

"There is still lying in the woods and around the mill in the area of psychological clearwater River an abundance of forest waste products which can and should be put to work producing electricity," Bistline said.

In other decisions Thursday, the Supreme Court:

- Reversed the Industrial Commission and ruled that Theodore Paulaus was an employee of Andersen Excavating when he was injured in an industrial accident at Twin Falls, and thus eligible for benefits from the State Insurance Fund. Paulaus was hurt while working in a ditch excavated for a resort but the Industrial Commission ruled he was an independent contractor.
- Reversed and ordered new court proceedings in part of a lawsuit filed over a traffic accident at Eagle, Leonard and Vesta Hurd of Donald and Charlene Wells sued F.B. Truck Line Co. and driver, Charles MacGinnis, over the accident.

## Official draws canyon fire parallels

**SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) —** Trendy housing developments near forested areas could invite another disastrous fire like the one that swept through an exclusive subdivision and destroyed 24 homes, state officials say.

The fire, which caused the worst property damage in Washington in more than a decade, roared through the Hangman Valley south of Spokane and damaged 12 other homes before it was contained at 6 a.m. Thursday.

Three people suffered minor injuries, and residents of 90 to 100 homes were evacuated.

State Lands Commissioner Brian Boyle said such an event is likely to

repeat itself as more people seek homes in rural areas.

Boyle drew parallels to fires in California that have destroyed high-value homes in rural canyons.

"Washington has approached, obviously, where California has been for the last decade," Boyle said.

"Friends development near forested areas, which has been gradually increasing in the Northwest in the past decade, has state and federal agencies concerned," said Bill Berrigan, state Department of Natural Resources operations manager.

"We had not come up with a lot of solutions to counteract it," Berrigan said. "Obviously, we spend a lot of time on (fire) prevention work and

## Cooler temperatures aid crews battling blaze at Minneha Creek

**IDAHO CITY — (AP) —** Cooler temperatures gave firefighters the advantage they sought in fighting the Minneha Creek Thursday night fire losses declared the 1,900-acre blaze 85 percent contained and estimated fire lines would be complete in less than 24 hours.

"We're 20 percent cooler than we were yesterday," Boise National Forest spokesman Greg Spangenberg said, explaining that cooler temperatures prevent a fire from burning as aggressively.

The weather helped the Bureau of Land Management, which extinguished both of its fires Thursday.

The National Weather Service said the cooler temperatures were expected to continue for the next several days.

With temperatures Thursday in the low 70s, Spangenberg said plans to build a back fire in the Boise National Forest had been put on hold. The cooler fire losses had planned to set a back fire Thursday evening to the east of the raging eastern front in hopes of burning some 200 acres back toward the face of the blaze to close off the rest of the wooded area.

But Spangenberg said strategy Thursday evening was changed, with firefighters scurrying to complete the fire line on the stubborn eastern front.

He said firefighters were estimating the fire would be completely contained by 6 p.m. Friday, when mopping up efforts were hoped

to begin. Fire losses hoped by Sunday to declare the fire under control.

Fire losses from the fire no longer was in danger of jumping the fire lines.

Earlier Thursday, helicopters ferried crews to the remote active end of the fire north of Boise, and firefighters managed to hold the blaze to 1,900 acres, giving up only another 100 acres to flame during the heat of the afternoon.

Spokesman Greg Spangenberg said. More than 550 firefighters, supported by nearly 100 others, were committed to the blaze after 200 reinforcements were called in Wednesday when forecasters predicted high winds and dry lightning. Although the fire erupted over steep slopes and in moderate winds and high temperatures Wednesday evening, the storm never materialized.

**Bank employee sentenced on embezzlement charges**

**BOISE (AP) —** Bank employee Sherri K. Grow told federal investigators she was dismayed to see a customer come into the bank after she had heard the woman was dead.

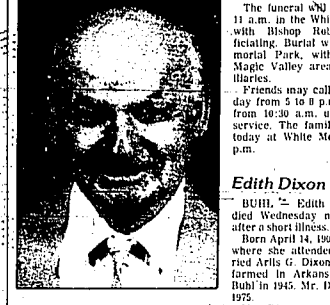
Ms. Grow, sentenced in U.S. District Court on Thursday on embezzlement charges, said she earlier had cashed two certificates of deposit belonging to the woman, and used the money to pay personal obligations, court records show.

Ms. Grow, 31, was sentenced to two years in prison by U.S. District Judge Marion Callister, but all but three days was suspended. The woman was ordered to repay First Security Bank \$17,435 and will serve five years on probation.

She was indicted by a federal grand jury on March 12 on embezzlement and making false statements and later pleaded guilty based on a plea-bargain agreement with federal attorneys. Court records showed she was an employee of the Glenwood Branch of First Security Bank in Boise.

Ms. Grow said she decided to admit her misdeeds after the "dead" customer came into the bank. Court records said she also admitted opening checking accounts and making credit applications under "phony names."

in conjunction with some other water utility, checking involving city water tanks.

About four to five miles of Sun Valley's 40 miles of pipe are asbestos-cement. Brown says. The pipe is located in the Elkhorn area, he says.

Boise Water Corp., which has 60 percent asbestos-cement pipe, is also testing for asbestos fibers after the Idaho Conservation League, issued a call for testing in response to a newspaper article.

The city of Twin Falls has no asbestos pipe, says Joe Koon, water superintendent. Some cities went to asbestos pipe because in the short-run it was cheaper.

But in the long-run, more durable cast iron or ductile iron pipe is cheaper, he says.

A common denominator in Boise and Sun Valley water is corrosiveness which can loosen asbestos fibers but not the real cause of this nasty Rogers' disease.

Hailey, and other communities near Sun Valley have corrosive water, but they don't have asbestos pipe, says Gary Burkett, DOE environmental engineer in Twin Falls.

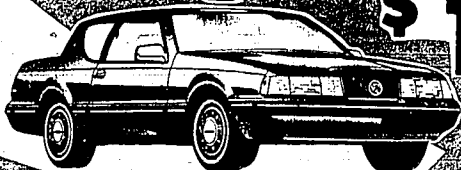

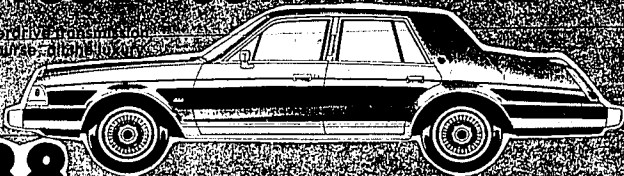

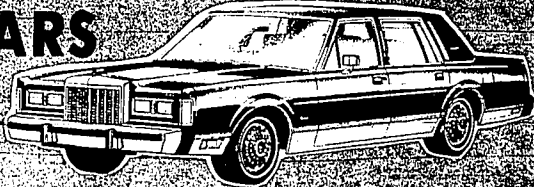

# Ex-innkeeper leads British Open by 3 shots

MURFIELD, Scotland (AP) — Roger Davis, a little-known Australian who once gave up pro golf, said he made only one mistake in a 7-under-par 64 to give him a 3-shot lead in the 116th British Open.

Greg Norman, the defending champion, said he made two.

"My only tactical error was in using a driver off the tee on the 10th hole," said Davis, who scored his only bogey of the day after that shot found a bunker.

Then the man who said he was "forced back on the tour" after a "moral business venture" failed, talked about his hopes of gaining playing rights on the American tour.

"I'm thinking about moving there," Davis said.

"He ought to be thinking about

how he's going to play the next three rounds here," Norman said.

Davis had an answer for that — stay out from those steep-faced, punishing bunkers.

"It's not the guy who stays out of the rough who will win this championship," he said. "It's the guy who stays out of the bunkers."

Norman and Seve Ballesteros can offer testimony to that. Each was in the sand on the 18th during the first round, and each made a double bogey.

Davis' one venture into the bunkers cost him a share of the British Open scoring record.

Still, it was "probably my best round ever," Davis said.

And it could have been even better.

"It isn't the thing to do to say you're unlucky with a 7-under, but this could have been anything," said Davis, 36.

Taking advantage of ideal early conditions, he scored eight birdies on Murfield's testing course.

In addition, he:

- Left three other birdie putts one inch short dead in the throat of the hole.
- Missed from 5 feet on another attempt.
- Brushed the hole with an eagle putt.
- Had a chance to put some distance between himself and the field, and he took it," Norman said. He got a break from the weather in doing it.
- "It was just perfect out there."

Davis said of the light breezes and mild temperatures that favored the early starters:

"It was the luck of the draw, probably the luckiest I've ever had."

An agreed Lee Trevino, another early starter and one of three Americans tied for second at 67.

Also at that figure were PGA champion Bob Tway and Ken Green, who holed a 58-yard shot from the fairway for an eagle-3 on the 17th.

There would have been four Americans at 4-under-par but for another "brush" with the "rules" by Craig Stadler, who was bruised with a 2-shot penalty that turned his 67 into a 69.

"Someday I'm going to learn the rules," said Stadler, who was disqualified in San Diego earlier this

year when a television viewer saw a film clip of Stadler playing a shot from beneath a tree while kneeling on a towel.

This time, he took a drop from an embedded lie in the rough on the fifth hole, thinking the embedded ball rule was in effect. It was not.

Spectators brought the infraction to the attention of officials and Stadler was informed after he had completed play. "He appealed, but the ruling stood. It was at Murfield that the rules of golf were created in 1744."

"I should have known the rule," said the former Masters champion, a non-winner for three years. "I finally got to playing good and get nothing out of it."

"That 67 was the highest score I

could have shot today. And I take a 69."

A couple of the pre-tournament favorites, Bernhard Langer of West Germany and rebounding Tom Watson, were in a large group tied with Stadler at 69.

Stadler, along with most of the other first-round leaders, played in the gentle conditions of the morning.

But the weather took a turn for the worse in the afternoon, with occasional showers and a chilly wind gusting in from the Firth of Forth.

Scores went up.

"We had the toughest conditions in the afternoon," Norman said. "The wind turned around 180 degrees and that's the wind that makes this course the toughest."

## Smith closes with flourish to win second state golf crown

**BURLEY** Finishing with a flourish after opening a fizzle, Boise's Jean Smith grabbed the 1987 Idaho State Women's Amateur Golf Championship with five strokes to spare Thursday afternoon.

But before you understand that too quickly, understand that she saw a seven-point advantage melt to one in the first four holes and she then fought off three-time former champion Karen Darrington over the next 16 holes before ending it with a 12-foot birdie putt to seal the victory.

Smith, who had been cuffling Burley Municipal Golf Course around since a 65 in Monday's pro-am, thus proved she was mortal after following with rounds of six-under 68 and 70 in the first two days of the tournament.

It might have been the strongest three-day showing in the history of Idaho women's golf.

But Smith understood she was mortal and, truth be told, she really started feeling that way before she hit the No. 1 tee Thursday.

"I went out to the driving range to warm up and I started hitting the ball pretty well. But the longer I stayed out there, the worse I hit it," she said with a smile.

Actually, she didn't play that badly in the watching that seven-stroke drop to one. Darrington was playing well.

Darrington birdied No. 1, parred the three-par No. 2, birdied No. 3 and parred No. 4 to go two under.

Smith lost a shot with a par on No. 1, another with a bogey on No. 2 and then saw her tee shot on No. 3 go out of bounds — leading to a double-bogey six and loss of three strokes right there. She missed a tie 30-gether to bogey No. 4 and there was Darrington, one stroke behind.

"I hate playing that badly," said Smith. "If Karen had beaten me I would have deserved it."

Darrington had some memories of her own during the time — like the year she went into the finals with a six-stroke lead and lost. She was hoping to help Smith understand that feeling.

But Smith then gathered herself and began scoring "pretty well" although "I knew I wasn't swinging well at the ball. I was just stopping my swing."

On the long par three fifth, Darrington's tee shot found the bunker and her sand wedge bladed the ball over the green. She got up and down for a good four under the circumstances but Smith parred to open the lead.

On No. six, Smith dropped an



eight-foot birdie putt while Darrington's 20-footer stopped perhaps six inches short. After rebuilding her lead to three strokes, Smith's next anxious moment came on No. 8 when she took off a tee lead to a bogey six. Darrington had five and Helen Lakes' Karen McLandress birdied to pull into contention, too.

But Smith continued to fight them off until No. 17 arrived.

"That was the key hole as far as I am concerned," Smith said. "Karen was already on. I had put my ball in the water (beside the green) yesterday and the way I was swinging I was thinking about that, too."

"But I told myself I had to make a good swing at the ball, be aggressive and hit it. It was the only solid shot I hit all day," she said of the iron that left her ball about 12 feet away. She trained that for a birdie and when Darrington's long birdie putt went past the cup, it was over.

Smith's final margin came on the 18th where she parred while Darrington bogeyed. Boise, 214; 4. Jan Zollinger, Pocatello, 223.

"I got it down to one and I was trying to make a story out of it," Darrington said. "But Jean simply refused to wilt. She came back after that shaky start and played quite well. Not as well as she had the first two days of the tournament but a very mentally-tough game."

McLandress, who hit her two-irons as far as the rest were hitting drivers in the tournament, said she was "pleased to be third in this tournament."

Defending champion Sue Kushlan, Caldwell, finished well back this time around but made another prediction.

"Give (Boise's Lori) Lyke another three years and she's going to be very tough in this tournament," she said of youngster who went unplaced this time around but showed improved length off the tee and excellent accuracy with her approach.

## Cowboys release Tony Hill

DALLAS (AP) — The Dallas Cowboys released wide receiver Tony Hill Thursday after Coach Tom Landry said the 10-year NFL veteran was overweight and did not show up for three weight-loss sessions.

Hill, 31, had 479 career receptions with the Cowboys, only 11 short of the NFL club's all-time record of 490 held by Drew Pearson. He has played in three Pro Bowls and holds the Cowboys' record for yardage gained by a receiver.

Hill weighs about 230 pounds, more than 30 pounds over his assigned weight, according to the Cowboys.

"He had weight problems," Landry said. "He just didn't fire up as everyone else did."

Landry informed Hill on Thursday of the decision to place him on no-recall waivers.

Hill blamed his firing on offensive coordinator Paul Hackett.

"Coach Hackett made a comment that Tony Hill just wasn't in their plans. Hackett and I didn't get along very well. Our relationship wasn't good," Hill said.

He said he still respects Landry. "I owe a great deal to Coach Landry. I think Coach Landry supported me through, thick and thin. I'm in debt to Coach Landry. I want to say one thing: When I came to

Dallas I was smiling and when I leave Dallas I'll be smiling."

Last season, with the addition of rookie Mike Sherrard, Hill played less of a role in the offense, grabbing 49 receptions for 770 yards, compared to 74 receptions for 1,113 yards in 1985.

"We just felt that the time had come and we needed to make a change for the best interest of the club and Tony Hill himself," Landry said. "I like Tony very much. It's one of the toughest things I have to do, when I have to let a veteran go."

Hill indicated to Landry that he wanted to continue playing, and another NFL team could claim him.

Earlier, Landry had said that Hill did not appear to be heeding warnings that more would be expected this off-season of Cowboys veterans that were in the club's history.

## U.S. cage team remains unbeaten

ZAGREB, Yugoslavia (AP) — The undefeated U.S. men's basketball team, paced by Iowa guard B.J. Armstrong's 15 points, coasted to a 93-83 victory over Canada Thursday, earning a semifinal berth at the World University Games.

The Americans, who came here unheralded and without a 7-footer on the roster, have relied on speed to register six straight victories and become a strong contender for the Universiade gold medal.

Coach Mike Krzyzewski of Duke again used 11 of his 12 players, repeating a move which had been successful in previous games, and allowing him to have fresh players throughout the game.

Armstrong hit consecutive baskets with eight minutes to play that gave the United States a 76-73 lead they never relinquished.

Mitch Richmond of Kansas State and Troy Lewis of Purdue each added 13 points for the Americans.

In Friday's semifinal matchups, the United States will face Cuba, which was defeated 104-66 Thursday by Yugoslavia. If the Americans defeat Cuba, they will play for the gold against the winner of Friday's Yugoslavia-Spain game.

In the track-and-field competition Thursday, Americans managed one gold medal while the Soviet Union earned two.

Mike Powell won the men's long jump going 26 feet, 10 1/2 inches to edge Paul Emordi of Nigeria, who went 25-7 1/2.

But another American favorite, LaVonna Martin, failed to get a medal in a thrilling 100-meter hurdles final. Martin, of Dayton, Ohio, led the field over the last hurdle but then failed to produce a winning kick.

Four competitors hit the finish-line virtually

together and the final standings came only after a long check of the photo.

Helke Theele of East Germany, Alluska Lopez of Cuba, and Florence Colle of France, were all timed in 12.85.

Vaieri Vandiak of the Soviet Union was a surprise winner in the 3,000-meter steeplechase. He trailed Juan Conde of Cuba and Shigeyuki Akiyo of Japan only to outsprint them easily down the homestretch. Vandiak had a time of 8:33.23, while Conde was at 8:33.86 and Akiyo 8:34.23.

Marek Kaleta of the Soviet Union won the men's javelin with a throw of 267-1 on his first and only attempt.

Paula Ivan of Romania was an easy winner in the women's 1,500, moving ahead on the backstretch and was never again threatened. She was clocked in 4:01.35, beating Svetlana Kitova of the Soviet Union, who was timed in 4:03.03.

Slobodan Popovic of Yugoslavia took the sixth track gold of the day in the men's 800 with a time of 1:46.15.

Yugoslavia beat the Soviet Union 80-73 for the gold medal in women's basketball. The bronze medal went to China, an 88-81 winner over Bulgaria. The United States was fifth, having defeated Canada 67-59.

With three days left in the competition, the Soviet Union extended its lead in the gold medal count over the United States to 20-16. The Soviet Union has taken 55 medals overall, 11 more than the United States.

Anderson, 17, swam the 400 in 4:17.00, then rallied the North 'A' team to victory in the 400-meter medley relay in 4:19.75. Anderson already had won gold medals here in the 200- and 800-meter freestyles and the 400 and 800 freestyle relays.

"This is getting to be a very good habit. It feels terrific," Anderson said. "I didn't expect this coming in to the meet. The people back home couldn't believe it. It's great being in local celebrity."

## Cowboy's art brand: REALISM

TWIN FALLS — He looks like a California boy, with his red Hawaiian shirt, honey-brown shaggy hair, jeans and blue tennis shoes. In fact, the only immediate clue to Dyck Godby's rural background is a slow, country drawl.

But put a guitar or a paintbrush in his hand, and you know this artist is a cowboy at heart.

Godby, a 29-year-old Western singer and artist who trains horses, judges rodeos and once rodeoed professionally, is one of more than 100 artists and performers who will be featured in the 28th Annual Art in the Park show this weekend in the Twin Falls city park. Godby will sing Saturday night from 4 to 7 p.m., and Sunday afternoon at 2:30. Prints of his artwork will also be on display.

Godby, who writes much of his own musical material, has been recording demo tapes in a Twin Falls studio owned by Glen Nelson Jr., a friend and fellow country-western singer and songwriter. They send copies of original songs to recording studios and entertainers all over the country.

"We're hoping that someone might like one someday," smiles Godby, who is thinking of recording an album this fall.

He noted that music, painting and working with horses are all important aspects of his life. His artwork, however, is taking more and more of his time. He usually paints at least 12 hours a day and turns out 15 to 20 paintings a year. Godby's acrylics and prints have been exhibited at art shows and rodeos from Phoenix to Portland, and precedes the sale of his paintings, which sell for \$200 to \$2,500 a piece, puts bread on the table right now, he says.

Godby calls himself a realist.

contemporary, Western artist. His scenes depict everyday life on farms and ranches. He says he admires Norman Rockwell's work and would like to be able to portray ranch and farm living as well as Rockwell illustrated small town life.

"I like Rockwell's realism, as far as the faces and the expressions go," he says. "But mostly I like the human interest involved in each painting. I like the ideas behind each one, whether it's a real candid moment with kids, or a real serious moment with an adult. Some guys do old stuff from the 1800s. I don't do that. I do the modern cowboy, the modern buckaroo, the ranch scenes that you would see today. The people I see are mostly cowboys, farmers and ranchers, and then the livestock that goes with it around here."

He says that he has just finished a 22-by-20-inch canvas called "The Family Operation." The subjects are a young boy, a young man and an "older fellow" around 50 years old.

"The three of them have a calf down and they're branding and docking and ear-tagging it. It's up in the mountains with some snow, and there's pine trees and a meadow. And then they're working in an old, pole corral," he says.

Godby grew up on a horse ranch west of Gooding where his father, Bud, still raises quarter and paint horses. He and his wife, Peggy, train horses and live on property nearby.

Godby studied art at the College of Southern Idaho for three years and at the same time competed on the CSI rodeo team. He joined the Professional Rodeo Cowboy's Association in 1976 and rode professionally until six years ago, when a serious accident took him off the pro-rodeo circuit.

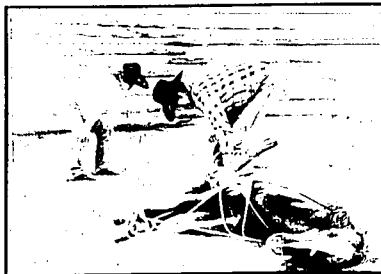

## What's comic Jay Leno's beef? Way deep down, nothing

NEW YORK (AP) — Jay Leno is a man with a beef.

He beefs about fast food, television, Mom, skin mags, Rambo, two-speed vacuum cleaners, calcium supplements, Mr. Potato Head, foreign food and tiny imbeciles — Oh — geez, god, he whines, and then lines up another target.

National Condom Week? "Boy, there's a parade you don't want to miss, huh?"

With hair bristling and his magnificent jaw jutting, Leno takes on the world like Popeye in the first throes of a spinach rush.

He defends women, castigates cor-

porations and worries about his country, a nation that no longer makes steel or huge cars like his '85 Buick Roadmaster.

"You know, I tend to be more like my Dad than like people my own age," he said, slumping deeply into an armchair and puffing on a pipe.

"I mean, I find it very odd that we buy steel from places like Korea, and I find that when you make jokes about that subject it strikes a chord with people, especially older audiences."

"There's an attitude in America I find very interesting now. Like, you meet somebody and you say, 'I want to buy that kind of car.' And they go, 'Oh, don't buy those cars. They're awful.'"

"How do you know?"

"Hey, I make 'em! I know they're awful!"

"Isn't that terrible to sell something that you don't believe in?" Leno said. "The nice thing about jokes, they're just jokes, but at least they're my jokes and if I tell them I take a certain pride in them."

Now, after all the sniping at David Letterman and other "armchair comedians," Leno will go to work this fall as part-time host of NBC's "Tonight Show."

"Yeah, but it's only on Mondays. I'll be out on the road the rest of the week," said Leno, who claims to feel like a con man running an ever-expanding pyramid scheme, dashing from town to town to keep his film-flam afloat.

He did it this summer while film-

ing "Collision Course" co-starring Pat Morita. Before coming to Long Island a Sunday show, he had been in Washington Thursday night, back to the set in Detroit, then to Los Angeles on Friday night and Valley Forge, Pa., on Saturday.

And, yes, he was only kidding about disdainful "armchair comedy."

"When you're a comedian, the 'Tonight Show' is really the job-I think that everyone has, fantasy-wise, in the back of their mind," he said.

"Like me — I'm starring in a movie, and it's neat and it's fun, but it doesn't seem quite as big as the 'Tonight Show' to me."

Although he now admits he had dreamed of being host, Leno dis-

avows any ambition of succeeding Johnny Carson.

Nor does he claim to be a social critic, though he sounds like one when he talks about Mr. Potato Head being the key to understanding why other countries hate America. He imagines showing a potato to a starving African child who wants to eat it. "No, no, Kimba. You put this little hat on it."

On "Late Night," Letterman cracked up over Leno's squeaky child's voice, and later proposed a fight between Kimba and tiny actor Emmanuel Lewis. So much for serious comedy.

"Yeah, but that's OK. The idea is to entertain," Leno said.

"I mean, there is nothing I hate more than pontificating comedians.

If someone can't figure out my viewpoint from watching my act, that's fine. If you can, that's fine, too.

"I'm not out there to teach."

So deep down, does Jay Leno really have a beef?

"I think most comedians, the good ones, tend to have some sort of anger, real or imagined," Leno said. "And in my case I think it's mostly imagined."

"I tend to make fun of things I am a part of," he said. "I mean, I am one of these guys who will stop and watch TV for a few minutes rather than pick up something and read it, which I should be doing. I do wind up eating at these fast-food joints."

"You know, I have seen the enemy and he is me."

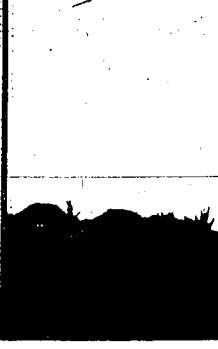

ing very well," he recalls. "I won about \$3,500 the month before I broke my leg and thought there'd never be another poor day. I was riding better than I ever had and then that happened."

"That was a compound fracture of his lower, right leg after he was bucked from a saddle bronc during a rodeo in Albuquerque, N.M.  
"I stepped off the horse and I hit on my feet and the bone broke," says Godby. The wound made by the fracture opened for four years and doctors operated on the infected leg 20 times.

"They finally got things straightened out, but I'm unable to get on any more broncs," he says. "So I just started painting a lot. I did before, but I would only do one or two pieces a year because I was too busy showing horses and riding broncs. I've always drawn and painted, but I just never was serious about it until the accident. Then I didn't have any choice - I couldn't do anything else."

Godby says he's come to feel that the accident has been a blessing in disguise.  
"It's probably the best thing that ever happened to me, for a lot of reasons. One is that I guess God didn't want me to ride broncs any more, but He wanted me to do something else. I started studying the Bible more because I had time. I

settled down a lot and got married. There were a couple of depressed days during that four years, but there was nothing I could do about it, and I knew He knew best. When He knows best, you've got to follow Him; that's the whole deal."

Godby says he had done several paintings for people on commission before the accident, and so he began doing more. He also joined the Professional Rodeo Cowboy Artists' Association, "an organization he credits with enabling him to turn a hobby into a career."

"They're all guys who have their professional rodeo cards, or did, anyway. Some still ride; some used to, like myself. We go to art shows together and critique each other's work a lot. It's really gotten my career off the ground," he says.  
He paints from photographs taken by himself or bought from professional wildlife photographers. His paintings are composites of people, buildings and scenery from different places.

"A lot of the subjects are people I know," he says. "I'll go to a ranch and stay a few days and take photos and work off of those. It's like writing a song or anything. It has to be pieced together, like building a house. Painting it is easy; I can see what I want. What's more difficult is getting it to come out smooth and fluid - like a song."

# No life, laughter in 'The Squeeze'

**HOLLYWOOD** — In the opening scene of "The Squeeze," Michael Keaton, who is having a streak of bad luck at poker but is an incorrigible bluffer, dangles some ear buds, offering as collateral a cherry 69 Fleetwood that we can glimpse through the open door behind him. Alas, in the "very next instant" the car's actual owner appears and drives it away.

This gag is good for an honest, though modest, laugh. You better cherish it because it marks the comic high point of this slick, by-the-numbers romantic-comedy-thriller that teams Keaton with Rae Dawn Chong only to waste the opportunity.

Keaton is Harry Berg, a free-wheeling New York artist-designer whose ex-wife cons him into picking up a package at her apartment (which contains a deadly secret). Chong is Rachel Dobbe, a scrappy skip tracer ambitious to graduate to full-fledged private eye. She is after Harry to serve him a summons for back alimony, and as debating screenwriter Daniel Tapulita's murky yet simplistic plot has it, she ends up pursuing that package as well. It contains an ultra-powerful electromagnetic device with which a panel of bad guys, including a sweetly psychopathic played by Matt Lanf, intend to rig a giant lotto offering a \$56 million prize.

The point of Harry and Rachel's relationship is that she is a square shooter whose impact upon him is to get him to stop cutting corners and straighten up and fly right — and that this happens while they are up to their necks in adventure and therefore have no time to realize they are falling in love. This is a piece of cake for Keaton and Chong, who have plenty of wit and sparkle, but we do not care, thanks to the glum circumstances.

"The Squeeze" owes its inspiration entirely to old movies rather than to life, and it does not help that there is no lightness in the steady, get-on-with-it approach of director Roger Young, a TV veteran whose last feature was the similarly mundane "Lassiter."

### Movie review

Because "The Squeeze" is so staid, its people and its incidents are continually upstaged by grandiose settings. For example, Harry's vast loft in an old railroad station, in which he is constructing a giant neon-trimmed dinosaur out of old TV set parts — and incorporating 64 working TV sets in it — for a disco. Production designer Simon Wintern calls it a "video creation... a primordial beast encrusted with the refuse of today's technological society," but what all this means for the movie, except for a bad dent in the budget, remains obscure.

Keaton's Harry is a smart aleck who is a good guy underneath the brashness, which means that Keaton has played him before, and Chong's Rachel is not much of a stretch for her either. They make a lively and endearing team, but you wish you were watching them in something other than "The Squeeze" (rated PG-13 for standard thriller violence).

# Murphy just childishy crude in 'Cop'

**TWIN FALLS** — The following are brief reviews of movies playing locally in the Magic Valley:

**BEVERLY HILLS COP II (R)**, Fifteen minutes of this careening, screaming experience and you begin to know how a tendered flank steak feels, even though — to his credit — Eddie Murphy avoids the trappings of infallibility that the screenwriters would lumber him with. And when the trademark Murphy scatology mixed with gratuitous nudity, the effect is not worldly fun but childish crudity.

**HARRY AND THE HENDERSONS (PG)** In this comic fantasy about a Seattle family taking home an injured Bigfoot, writer-director William Dear has so completely immersed himself in the sensibility of Steven Spielberg that he seems to disappear. The movie has Spielberg optimism and a high beautiful Spielberg sheen, but it lacks the boss's fustigate acumen; the humor and morals are closer to "Bedknobs and Broomsticks" than Hans Christian Andersen. But there are two triumphs: Kevin Peter Hall — in Rick Baker makeup — as Harry the E.T. ish Bigfoot, and John Lithgow, whose gift for frenzied gets another workout as Hendersons.

**ROXANNE (PG)** It is hard to recall a current movie in which every element is in such balance as it is here, in a modern retelling of the Cyrano story that becomes a warm, nimble, utterly contemporary modern romance. There is a tenderness to writer-star Steve Martin's performance as C.D. Bales that is magnetic, and Darryl Hannah's Roxanne, an astronomer, is smart

and sublimely beautiful all at once. What is interesting is to discover that the essence of the original play's love triangle — a beautiful woman-finding-out-just-who-she-loves-and-why — is as strong in sunshine as in shadow.

**SPACEBALLS (PG)** Mel Brooks satirizes the "Star Wars" trilogy, with side-swipes at "2001," "Dune," the Flash Gordon serials and a double blast at "Alien" and "One Froggy Evening." It is an intergalactic war tale full of his usual hipster show biz jibes and inside Jewish humor — with Brooks, John Candy, Rick Moranis and the others.

**DRAGNET (PG-13)** It is a shame that decisions were made to interrupt this fond recollection of the old show with slam-bang car-crashes, silly pump rituals and other Big Movie-isms. A double shame, because there are patches of bright dialogue in the script by Dan Aykroyd, Alan Zweibel and the movie's director, Tom Mankiewicz. And Aykroyd and Tom Hanks play off each other to great effect. It makes the film seem absolutely

**PREDATOR (R)** A military rescue unit — led by Arnold Schwarzenegger in a terminal glow — hacks through a jungle rotten with snakes, vultures, gorgeous guerrillas and skinned corpses only to run into a murderous extraterrestrial, a monster that dresses like a robot with dreadlocks and kills them one by one while dripping green goo over everything. This high-tech-vs.-Stono Age action saga has a high-

# Pianist plays mix of classic, modern

WENDELL — When Sir Wladimir Jan Kochanski gives his piano concert in Wendell Saturday night, he may follow the program, or he may not.

If the works of Liszt, Rachmaninoff and Beethoven aren't matching the mood of his audience, the artist may break into some modern popular music and other less serious selections, says former audience member Joyce Layton of Wendell.

"He played Beethoven like Beethoven was sitting right next to him, and yet he had the ability to play the show tunes and the hymns," she says. "I could have sat there forever."

DEAR BOWLEGGED: I consulted Dr. Bernard Morrey, consultant in orthopedic surgery at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn.

He said: "Bowed legs cannot be corrected by exercise. However, there is an operation known as a 'high tibial osteotomy' which is well known by orthopedic surgeons everywhere. This procedure is used to relieve severe knee pain due to bowed legs and not generally done for cosmetic purposes. The woman who wrote to you should consult an orthopedic

surgeon in her own community for an examination and evaluation." DEAR ABBY: Another girl and I have shared an apartment for three years and have a great relationship. # Boosted KBSU signal unlikely to reach area

TWIN FALLS — KBSU, a public radio station at Boise State University, has received approval from the Federal Communications Commission to boost its signal from 3,000 watts to 19,000 and to move its transmitter from Table Rock to a higher spot on Deer Point. But the \$200,000 transmitter's range will still fall short for most Magic Valley residents, a station official said on Wednesday.

"We know for sure our signal will reach Mountain Home," said Jim Paluzzi, KBSU general manager. "Magic Valley residents living on higher ground may be able to pick up KBSU after the new transmitter is installed in May, Paluzzi said.

Public radio buffs may also be able to pick up the station by hooking their television cable to their FM radio receiver. However, Paluzzi said it is too soon to tell whether the tv-radio connection will work in the Twin Falls area.

"We are aware that Twin Falls has no public radio station to speak of, and we are in the process of researching the feasibility of extending our facilities down to the Magic Valley," he stated.

The station will have to secure the approval of the FCC before it can expand its services into the Magic Valley. Paluzzi expects that process to take at least 14 months.

# Through several identity shifts, '20/20' aims to inform, enhance

Since its premiere in June 1978, the ABC news-magazine "20/20" has gone through several changes of identity. It has been a straightforward news show, a "60 Minutes" clone, and a glitzy hour of celebrity profiles. But within the past few years — Barbara Walters' much-watched interview with Donna Rice notwithstanding — the show seems to have settled into a format that emphasizes health, consumer and human-interest features.

"What constitutes a news feature has changed for us," says host Hugh Downs, who joined the show after the premiere drew low ratings and unfavorable reviews. "Now we try to enhance the lives of people."

Downs can pinpoint when the program adopted its current approach. It was in July 1981, when correspondent Tom Jerriel investigated the collapse of walkways inside the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Kansas City, Mo., which killed 43 persons and injured 150.

"Up to that time, we would have approached the story in a certain way," Downs says. "We would ferret out the architects and the builders and find out who was to blame. But that time, we found a different angle. Tom focused on the heroism of the firemen and the ordinary people who went in to rescue."

"Now, we don't do things just to say, 'Isn't that awful, folks?' unless the subject is one that has some legitimate hope, one where some action can be taken."

One beneficiary of the change in direction has been consumer correspondent John Stossel, who joined the show in 1981. Stossel has covered such subjects as child care, the tobacco industry, and the marketing of unnecessary drugs.

"There has been more emphasis on information that people can use to enhance their lives," Stossel says. "When the show started, it did a lot of profiles of musicians and famous actors. But now everyone's doing that."

The show hasn't shifted toward the probing-investigative journalism that characterizes "60 Minutes" and "Nightline," but toward what Stossel calls "service stories." "An investigative story isn't usually a news-you-can-use story. Like we're

doing," Stossel explains. "For us, the emphasis has been on service stories. We're still doing the other kind, though."

In one upcoming segment, Stossel will report on waste and inefficiency in the Soviet economy — an intriguing subject for a consumer correspondent.

"The intent was to take a consumer reporter who's always complaining about this society, and have him look at a society that's even worse off," Stossel says. "Most consumer reporters are supporters of big-government intervention, whereas I'm a supporter of the free

market. Going to the Soviet Union certainly confirmed that."

This fall, ABC will move "20/20" from Thursday to Friday nights. Downs has called the change "not a wise move." Stossel is more optimistic.

"I'm not convinced the switch will hurt," he says. "(On Thursday nights) We've always had rough competition. There was 'Hill Street Blues,' of course, and 'Knots Landing,' which topped us both one year. And now there's 'L.A. Law.'"

"There are certainly less people watching on Friday night," he says. "But we'll also have less competition."

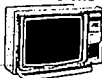

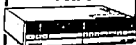

Although she admired Astaire, Rogers hints that he was not one of her lovers. We'll have to wait until the book comes out.

**BIG QUESTION:** A famous movie star and his equally famous lady love have been carrying on a passionate romance through two movies, and now the question on both coasts is whether wedding bells will be ringing in the near future. Everyone agrees they're really in love, but insiders are willing to bet he'll never marry her.

# Wolter having fun with evil role

What's a nice actress like Sherilyn Wolter doing in a role like evil Eleanor on daytime's "Santa Barbara"? Having a lot of fun. Wolter, whose TV credits include the impetuous yet goodhearted Celia Quartermaine on ABC's "General Hospital," relishes the opportunity to play a villainess.

"It was perfect timing. I've wanted to do a lot of different characters, and I was intrigued with the part. I'd also heard 'Santa Barbara' was an innovative, well-written show. This role's a real challenge."

Wolter left "General Hospital" because three years in one role was enough. "I was getting bored with Celia. This character, Eleanor, is made up of so many different elements. She's very methodical and at the same time a bit psychotic. It's challenging to try to get those two facets to mesh."

Eleanor is a beautiful, mysterious woman who appeared out of thin air and attempted to murder Eden Capwell (Marcy Walker). With Eden out of commission in the mountains and dead as far as everyone in Santa Barbara knows, Eleanor is trying to endear herself to Cruz. (A. Martinez) and destroy the Capwell family. Wolter, who studied psychology in college, is intensely curious about what motivates Eleanor to wreak such havoc.

"I've always been interested in sick minds," Wolter laughs. "What could have brought a person to that point? People can and do feel hatred and bitterness but they should control them. Children can't — they immediately express them. Eleanor is like a child that way. She acts immediately on her feelings. She's like an animal too, working on gut instinct — though very carefully. She feels threatened so it's war. She has to get rid of what threatens her."

At first it was very difficult for Wolter to find a way to like Eleanor enough — so that the performance would ring true.

"She has to believe she's great, that she's doing the right thing, but the writers want her meaner, badder, more evil. I've found a little bit of her core now, which makes me more successful in my portrayal. The impulsive child/threatened

animal connection is very important."

The role can prove a bit much at times. In one of Eleanor's fantasy sequences, Wolter found herself in a wedding gown, kissing Cruz and telling C.C. Capwell that she killed Eden and all of his children. "It gave me some chills — being kissed on the neck while saying 'I earned him. I killed them all.'"

Reality is much more sane. Once she is no longer needed to bring down the house of Capwell, Wolter plans to do as many different roles as possible. "I'd love to do romantic comedies, like Hepburn-Tracy movies. And more stage work. And historical pieces — everything."

Right now she's off to Hawaii with her fiancée to research a script he's writing. "We've been engaged for five years. I haven't seen many happy marriages, so for now I'm happily engaged."

The healthy life-crazed role split might strain lesser psyches, but the arrangement is suiting Sherilyn Wolter just fine.

## Universal provides an exciting 'Vice' tour

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The setting is a smuggler's lagoon on a Caribbean island, and the action starts when Crockett and Tubbs race in on a Scarab speedboat.

The action races for 15 minutes: gun battles, explosions, fireworks, spectacular stunts, a runaway mine trolley, a Hovercraft, and a helicopter crash that sends up a fireball as big as a napalm strike.

The live-action spectacular, based on exploits of Sonny Crockett and Ricardo Tubbs on NBC's "Miami Vice," is the newest attraction on the Universal Studios Tour.

# Fox's 'Werewolf' premiere a hit in network's first ratings week

NEW YORK — Fox made a difference in its first week as part of the Nielsen pack with a 2-hour premiere of its series "Werewolf" coming in second in its time period ahead of CBS and ABC.

Fox has signed up for the same Nielsen numbers as the three networks, although none of the three plans to include Fox in the weekly rankings of prime-time shows or in the network averages that they provide the news media. Fox is releasing its numbers on its own.

Gerald Jaffe, NBC vice president for research projects noted the Fox numbers, though, and said Fox "hurt us on Saturday night," referring to the total, three-network rating, which was lower than usual.

Fox has just gone to a two-night schedule and plans to add a third in the fall.

"Werewolf," a teen-lycanthrope tale that will be a weekly half-hour show, got a 6.5 rating and a 15 share. Fox's Sunday-night average was 3.5 and a 7 share.

The rating is a percentage of the nation's 87.4 million households with

televisions. The share is a percentage of the viewers tuned in during a particular time period.

If it had been among the network rankings for the week, "Werewolf" would have been 54th out of 63 shows.

It would have been well ahead of "Dallas," however. Viewers in droves are taking a vacation from the prime-time soap, sending last week's repeat to second-to-last in the rankings.

NBC's "Miami Vice," also in repeats, has been beating "Dallas" this summer, but the cops were pre-empted by baseball, so ABC won the night with its regular series plus a rerun TV movie, "Consenting Adult."

NBC made it 24 in a row with an average, prime-time rating of 11.6 to CBS' 10.5 and ABC's 9.8.

"Family Ties" was the top-rated show with a rating of 21.0 and a 39 share. It was followed by "The Cosby Show," "With Intent to Kill," "Murder, She Wrote," "Growing Pains," "Cheers," "Shattered Vows," "Who's the Boss?" "60 Minutes" and "Valerie."

First-run shows were few and far between. NBC's new "Days and

Nights of Molly Dodd" went up against the CBS movie "Where the Boys Are '84" and dropped out of its usual top-20 position to 23rd, one place behind a repeat of "L.A. Law," which follows it on Thursday night.

CBS was especially hurt Saturday night, when the second part of the repeat miniseries "Space" was the only show to rank lower than "Dallas." The third-lowest show was "West 57th," the newsmagazine that followed "Space."

Here are the week's lowest-rated shows: "Twilight Zone," NBC baseball, "Our House," "Starman," "Wizard," "Our World," "Webster," "West 57th," "Dallas" and "Space, Part 2."

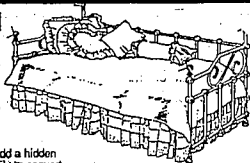

# Quality of video tubes is improving

By VIDEO MAGAZINE

The quality of the picture produced by television tubes has quietly been improving over the past few years—in some cases dramatically.

According to an article in Video Magazine, companies such as Hitachi, Mitsubishi, Sony, Toshiba and Zenith have, without fanfare, been going to great lengths to produce super-sharp screens with brilliant color that rivals anything seen before.

Improvements range from producing flatter screens that decrease the image distortion caused by viewing two-dimensional pictures on rounded surfaces, to increasing color purity by cutting down on "doming"—an unsightly color shift caused by thermal expansion which is most noticeable near the edges of the larger tubes.

While advanced tubes are becoming flatter, Zenith will carry this trend to the ultimate next year by introducing a television tube with a completely flat front.

Toshiba has attacked the doming problem by coming up with a new alloy for the shadow mask called Invar which is capable of absorbing 10 times as much energy as conventional masks.

These and other changes taking place inside today's advanced television tubes are enabling them to supply the biggest, sharpest and brightest pictures in history.

The article also offers tips to help consumers comparison shop for the new televisions. Since the tube can only produce a picture as good as that supplied to it, it's suggested the source used for the comparison be either a videocassette or a Super VHS or SuperBeta videotape deck. Conventional VCRs can't deliver the resolution needed to adequately compare TV picture quality. Although over-the-air broadcasts can be a good source, the signal quality inside many video stores often is inadequate.

The advanced televisions cost considerably more than run-of-the-mill sets. The 30-inch Toshiba CS-3077, for example, lists for \$2,499, or about \$83 per screen inch. A TV with a conventional 25-inch tube lists for about \$259, or roughly \$30 per screen inch.

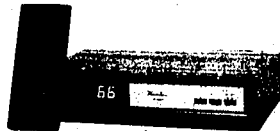

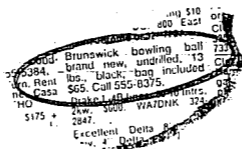

## 'Nightline' tops 'Tonight' with hearings

NEW YORK (AP) — Late-night viewers are apparently more interested in revelations from the Iran-Contra hearings than reruns of "The Tonight Show," giving ABC's "Nightline" a rare beat on NBC's talk-show king, Johnny Carson.

According to Nielsen ratings from the 15 biggest television markets, "Nightline" drew a rating of 8.3 and a 22 share on Thursday night to the 8.0 and 19 for "Tonight." A CBS news special on the hearing trailed with 5.3 and 13.

nation's estimated 87.4 million households with television. The share is a percentage of the audience tuned in during a particular time period.

On Wednesday, "Nightline," with a 9.4 and 27, also beat a Carson repeat, with a 7.9 and 20.

ABC's daytime coverage of the hearings is also outdrawing the competition in the 15-market overnight ratings.

The ratings also showed that viewers who strayed from their sets during the second-day apparently

tuned back in Thursday to catch up on the action.

On Thursday, ABC had a 6.4 rating and 21 share, NBC had a 4.8 and 16 and CBS had a 4.1 and 13.

The ratings had gone down slightly Wednesday but rebounded Thursday to within 0.2 rating points of the first-day audience for all three networks.

The three networks' average for the first three days of North's televised testimony, Tuesday through Thursday, was: ABC, 6.1 and 20; NBC, 4.6 and 15;

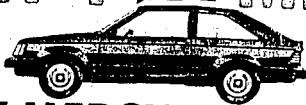
