Jury law goes unobserved

For a decade in Twin Falls

TWIN FALLS — For the past decade, juries in Twin Falls County have been chosen contrary to state law, a procedure that led to the overthrusting of 21 grand jury drug indictments Tuesday by two 5th district judges.

The jury selection was carried out by deputies of County Clerk Richard Pence, but responsibility for the selection procedure lies with the district judges sitting behind Twin Falls County benches.

But those judges say Pence never told them how the jury selection was performed and they never ordered Pence to use the faulty procedure.

The deputies say Pence never told them how to choose the juries and they operated in virtual isolation from his direction.

The most important fault with the procedure, according to arguments used by Twin Falls County Public Defender Mike Wood in hear-

ings challenging the drug indictments, was that the county only used voter registration lists to draw up its master jury list, while state law requires the addition of drivers license lists to that master list to obtain as broad a cross-representation of residents as possible.

"The jury system is truly the jewel in the crown of democracy," says 5th District Judge Daniel C. Hurlbutt, who was one of the judges who overthrew the grand jury indictments. "The right to trial by jury is mentioned in the Constitution at least three separate times, and those juries are supposed to represent a cross-section of the community."

In addition to using only voter registration lists, Wood and three other defense attorneys said in those hearings that the jury-selection procedure used by the county was flawed because:

County clerk's job spurs legal doubt

TWIN FALLS — Although bonded by a common responsibility, the operation of the county government public officials are divided by different jobs.

The lines dividing the responsibilities between county clerk and judge were drawn and tested this week in Twin Falls County.

Fifth District County Judges Daniel Hurlbutt and Daniel Mehl set aside 21 drug-related indictments because the county jury-selection process was flawed.

County Clerk Dick Pence, also the clerk of the district court, said the trial court administrator, Hurlbutt in this case, was responsible for determining how juries are selected.

A recent Idaho Supreme Court opinion seems to back up Pence by placing the ultimate responsibility for court-related activities squarely on the shoulders of the court system.

That ruling came from a Nez Perce County case where Clerk Donna Crooks sought a legal curtilment of what she saw as "interference" from Second District Administrator Judge John Maynard with her clerk duties.

The case started with the hiring by Crooks of a deputy clerk for the district court in April 1985. Maynard refused to allow the new deputy to perform court duties because he did not have the opportunity to evaluate the qualifications of the deputy.

Reagan was injured

Shultz tried to resign post; says president was deceived

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State George P. Shultz testified Thursday that President Reagan was deceived by his closest advisers about his administration's Iran-Contra activities and that "I've never seen the president so mad" as when Shultz laid out some details of the story.

He also said, in a day when one disclosure tumbled over another, that he three times tried to resign his post, including a time in August last year.

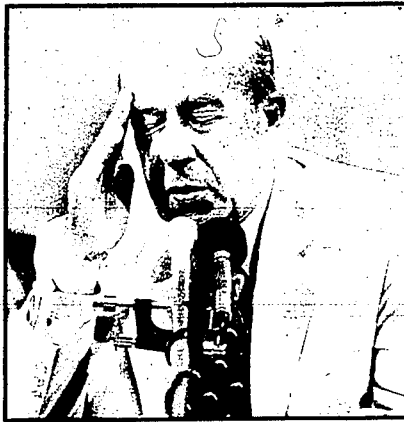
"You can't do the job well if you want it too much," he said. "You have to be willing to say goodbye and I am."

In the August instance, he said, he perceived that other officials thought he was out of step with the administration and he felt he had become the target of "guerrilla warfare." He said Reagan stuck the resignation letter in a drawer, said "You're fired, it's about time to go on vacation" and nothing ever happened.

None of the threatened resignations directly concerned the Iran-Contra affair. Shultz said he waged "a battle royal" against others who had the president's ear, to persuade Reagan to get the facts out last November after a Lebanese newspaper revealed the United States had sold arms to Iran.

He said he told Reagan directly last November. "We've been deceived and lied to," and he cautioned the president against making any more declarations that there had been no arms-for-hostages dealing.

In Shultz's words, Reagan reacted "like he had been kicked in

the belly" when he was told about another secret proposal, involving freeing terrorists convicted and held in Kuwait for the 1983 bombings of the U.S. and French embassies in that nation.

"His jaw set and his eyes flashed and both of us, I think, felt the same way about it," the secretary said.

Meanwhile, the congressional committees released handwritten notes of Alton Keel, deputy national security adviser, that appeared at odds with previous statements by Attorney General Edwin Meese III, who is to testify at the hearings next week.

The notes, taken at a Nov. 10, 1986 White House meeting with Reagan and top administration officials, includes the notation: "Ed: We didn't sell (Israel sold). Was multi-phased transaction." Com-

mittee investigators say the reference is to Meese, and is an indication Meese was aware of the 1985 Israeli weapons shipments to Iran at least by Nov. 10 of last year.

Meese has said repeatedly that he first learned of the 1985 arms shipments to Iran on Nov. 17, Nov. 18 or Nov. 19, 1986. On one of those days, a Meese aide, Charles J. Cooper, assistant attorney general in charge of the office of legal counsel, obtained chronologies prepared by the National Security Council mentioning that fact.

Elsewhere, the top U.S. military official in the Persian Gulf criticized the administration's secret sale of U.S. arms to Iran, saying they harmed U.S. relations with Arab nations. "I think from a strategic or sort of political-military point of view,

there have been complications," Rear Adm. Harold Bursen, commander of the Middle East Task Force, said at a news conference on the USS Kidd, a destroyer that is one of the ships escorting two reflagged Kuwaiti tankers up the gulf. "Obviously, it makes folks a little skittish if we claim to support the gulf Arabs and we are seen to help their declared enemy," he said.

Shultz characterized the clandestine attempts to free Americans held hostage in Lebanon — by making deals with Iran — as pathetic and said the "people who were doing this, they got taken to the cleaners."

Quoting a trademark line of the late comedian Jimmy Durante, Shultz said of being secretary of state: "Everybody wants to get into the act."

He said that part of the policy of trying to free the hostages "has to be making it plain that you will not pay ransom, bribes or whatever for them" because "the minute you do that, you expose the vast numbers of Americans traveling around to greater risk."

Shultz, who testified for seven hours and will return for more on Friday, made clear his support for the Contra rebels.

"But I don't think that the desirable end justified the means of lying, deceiving, of doing things that are outside our constitutional process," he said.

He defended Elliott Abrams, the assistant secretary of state who admitted misleading Congress about some aspects of the affair. "He made a mistake, he knows it and he is full of remorse about it," Shultz said. "I think he is a very able, energetic, fine person with a real instinct for public service and I think the country needs people like that."

He told the congressional Iran-Contra committees that he felt National Security Adviser John Poindexter and CIA Director William Casey "had a conflict of interest with the president" in trying to persuade him to hide the truth from the country and to "bail them out."

Convoy safely past halfway point

MANAMA, Bahrain — Two Kuwaiti tankers moved northward Thursday, under the American flag and U.S. Navy escort, through an area between Iran and Saudi Arabia where Iranian speedboats have attacked several merchant ships.

Iran's news agency quoted Foreign Minister Ali Akbar Velayati as saying Kuwaiti oil was "prohibited goods," implying that ships carrying it would be attacked, but Velayati said in West Germany that Iran would not shoot first.

By sunset, the ships were in the last stage of their 500-mile voyage up the Persian Gulf from the

Strait of Hormuz to Kuwait's Al-Ahmad oil terminal. Sources following the convoy's progress said three warships made the entire trip and others of a nine-ship U.S. fleet in the gulf joined from time to time.

Salvage officers based in Dubai said their main concern was mines in the Al-Ahmad shipping channel, where at least four vessels have been hit in recent months. American, Kuwaiti and Saudi experts declared the channel safe after a minesweeping operation last weekend.

The Kuwaiti vessels, a 401,382-

ton supertanker and 46,723-ton products carrier remained the Bridgeton and Gas Prince, were to arrive Friday. After loading they will steam south, again with a guard of Navy ships.

Velayati was quoted by Iran's official Islamic Republic News Agency as making the indirect threat of attack in a message sent Wednesday to U.N. Secretary General Javier Perez de Cuellar.

On Thursday, Velayati said in Bonn: "If Iranian ships are not subjected to attack, if no ships are attacked by the Iranians, no ships will be attacked in the Persian Gulf."

He called the U.S. warships "a threat to Iran" but sidestepped questions about Iranian response. • See CONVOY on Page A2

Jones: Idaho should respond to threat of 'energy farming'

TWIN FALLS — Attorney General Jim Jones said Thursday Idaho could turn into an "energy farm" by letting private corporations wanting to send energy out of state, and he said the state should begin dealing with the threat.

"It is a source of great concern," Jones said at a press conference in Twin Falls. "We ought to have a policy to insure applications are subject to a good deal of public scrutiny and input. We should keep our resources for Idaho."

Jones said he will ask the Idaho Public Utilities Commission to exercise jurisdiction, over individuals and corporations proposing to build facilities for out-of-state hydro-power sales. PUC now exempts out-of-state proposals.

Jones is the latest state official reacting to two major proposals to

send Idaho energy elsewhere. Jones was specifically referring to a joint plan by Idaho Power and Tacoma, Wash., to build a dam near Bliss and ship energy to Tacoma City and Light. But he said the proposal by Western Power Inc., and co-president J.R. Simplot, to build transmission lines to the southwest is also of concern.

Gov. Cecil Andrus said last week Idaho did not have surplus water for "any diversion." He was also said to be skeptical about the state's energy laws to control the sale of energy out of state.

And state Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, suggested the Legislature might look at putting the sale of electricity from one corporation to another under PUC control.

Gary Richardson, spokesman for the PUC, said the PUC legal staff has been researching the issue and PUC commissioners will issue a decision soon.

But Jones said he believes the state PUC already has the authority to require all persons, organizations and utilities to obtain a certificate of public convenience and necessity for construction of transmission lines and most hydro-power generating facilities intended for out-of-state markets.

"What concerns me is that we have such an interest in harnessing hydro-power potential in Idaho for out-of-state customers, and we have the ability to call the power back when we need it," Jones said.

If the state fails to develop a policy, Jones said residents might end up paying higher energy costs if all the good dam sites are taken by out-of-state concerns, and Idaho Power had to build more expensive coal-fired plants.

"The state must take a serious look at these proposals to insure that Idaho does not become an • See JONES on Page A2

Soviets propose deal on missiles

MOSCOW — Soviet officials said Thursday the superpowers can reach a quick accord to ban medium- and shorter-range nuclear missiles but that the United States must yield on four points.

One obstacle in the way of the agreement — and a potential summit meeting between Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev and President Reagan — is the Soviet insistence that U.S.-controlled warheads on Pershing I-A missiles in West Germany be scrapped.

The other points involve on-site inspection of U.S. bases, the time period for destroying the missiles, and that the missiles not be converted to other weapons categories. Some U.S. intelligence specialists want to make some U.S. facilities off-limits to the Soviet inspectors,

saying they're too sensitive. In remarks made public Wednesday night, Gorbachev offered to eliminate Soviet medium-range nuclear missiles in Asia if the United States does not insist on keeping 100 medium-range warheads outside Europe.

The Soviet leader also said his country would scrap its shorter-range SS-12 and SS-23 rockets east of the Urals, which the United States has regarded as a threat to China and Japan.

The superpowers have been negotiating a ban on medium- and shorter-range rockets in Europe since Gorbachev announced Feb. 28 that the Soviet Union was no longer insist an accord also encompass strategic and space weapons.

Like Gorbachev's February offer, the Soviet proposal for banning the missiles in Asia as well as Europe seemed designed to put pressure on

the United States by removing a point of contention the Americans saw as frustrating progress in negotiations.

Observers have also said Gorbachev wants an arms control agreement in order to divert resources from the military to the country's social and economic needs and to further cement civilian control over the Soviet military establishment.

Since he became Communist Party chief in March 1985, Gorbachev repeatedly has stressed the Kremlin's desire for a "ban" on nuclear weapons, and accused the United States of frustrating progress toward disarmament.

"We hope for a new impulse to the arms talks," Yull M. Vorontsov, the chief Kremlin arms negotiator, told a news conference called to explain Gorbachev's latest proposal.

Heat kills thousands of chickens

The high heat and humidity which have made life bearably for people across the eastern half of the nation have taken a toll on livestock, with broiling chickens in their coops and killing the appetites of cattle and hogs.

"People were coping better than some experts had feared, although at least three deaths have been attributed to heat this week."

"I am surprised we are not seeing more people," said Dr. Douglas Carroll, an emergency room physician at Greater Baltimore Medical Center, which treated three people Wednesday.

"But problems usually increase during a heat wave," Carroll said. "It sometimes takes a couple of days for people to feel the effects."

"I just talked to the chief of our trauma unit and he thinks it's because it's been hot for so long, people are learning how to cope," said Bernice Cooper, a spokeswoman for Lelia Hospital and Health Center in Battle Creek.

From Connecticut to California, there was barely a cloud in the sky Thursday afternoon.

Record temperatures at mid-afternoon Thursday included 92 in Alpena, Mich., 97 in Harrisburg, Pa., and 99 in Jacksonville, Fla.

serve on a jury commission with the clerk of the district court, in this case, Pence.

The duties of the clerk of the district court was delegated to deputy clerks with no clear supervision, no clear responsibility and those jury-selection procedures were performed in their spare time.

Questionnaires sent to prospective jurors were not clarified and questionnaires not returned were ignored.

"Clerks did not keep any record of why jurors were disqualified. Those 21 grand jury indictments on drug charges were thrown out."

Hurlbut and 6th District Judge Daniel Meehl Tuesday because the jury selection procedure for the grand jury was "substantial non-compliance" with Idaho law.

The grand jury indictments were handed down after a six-month investigation in Twin Falls County by law enforcement agencies.

Greg Brewer, Ada County Prosecutor and former president of the Idaho Prosecutors' Association, said he has not heard of grand jury indictments being overturned in Idaho because of improper jury-selection procedures.

A poll by The Times-News of the other seven counties in the 5th Judicial District found that Twin Falls County is the only county using just one registration lists to draw up its master list. The 5th Judicial District includes Twin Falls, Jerome, Blaine, Minidoka, Lincoln, Gooding, Camas and Blaine counties.

A 1971 Idaho state law and Idaho Supreme Court rule on procedure require counties to use voter registra-

tion and drivers license lists in its master list.

Jerome County Clerk Cheryl Watts says she uses both drivers license lists and voter registration lists "because that is the way Idaho Code sets it out. It tells you exactly how to proceed."

"It is required by law to use a voter registration list and one other list," said Mary Green, Blaine county clerk. "The drivers license list seems to have the majority of people on it."

In Camas County, Clerk Rollie Bennett said, "We try to get as broad a spectrum as possible. Although there is quite a bit of duplication, that is less of a problem in my county because there are fewer people."

Why not in Twin Falls County? Pence said, "I do not have any idea. I suppose we could call it tradition."

He said he cannot say whether the jury-selection procedure in Twin Falls County was unlawful and that decision can be made only by a judge.

"You have to look at a law in light of what people meant when they wrote it," Pence said. "And our list was fine until somebody decided it was not."

Hurlbut, currently trial court administrator in the 5th District, said he did not hear about the full extent of jury-selection problems in the county until attorneys challenged the grand jury drug indictments earlier this month.

Former 5th District Judge Theron Ward, who was trial court administrator until 1983, says he never told Pence to use only voter registration lists.

Gary Whitwell, who was county clerk for a short period during 1977 before Pence was appointed to the job, said he remembers using voter registration lists and drivers license lists.

Harold Lancaster, who resigned from the county clerk position December 1976, said he instituted a system shortly after the 1971 law requiring that drivers license lists be added to voter registration rolls for master jury lists.

Lancaster was in office when the 1971 Idaho Uniform Jury Selection and Service Act was passed.

He said he had residents who applied for a drivers license complete a questionnaire asking if they were registered to vote.

If they answered no, they were added to the master pool for jury selection, Lancaster said.

Former Deputy Clerk Cleo Lancaster who ran against Republican Pence last year as a Democrat, said she thought the county quit using drivers license lists shortly after Lancaster left the county clerk post.

"I cannot tell you for sure, it has been so long ago," Robinson said. "If the county stopped using drivers license lists, I am not saying it happened under Pence."

She said she thought the decision was made under Ward when he was trial court administrator. Robinson has worked in Twin Falls District Court for more than 20 years.

Pence said he directed Robert Stevenson, the county's data processor, on how to draw a random selection of jury candidates out of the master list.

The failure seems to come more from a lack of communication between Pence and the judges in Twin Falls County, he directed.

Hurlbut said Pence never told him directly how the jury-selection procedure was carried out in Twin Falls County, but he did discuss the procedure with Ward, he never talked to Hurlbut about his procedures.

"I had to assume it was being done correctly," Hurlbut said. "At no one time did I learn the whole panoply of problems until the hearing (the challenge to the grand jury indictments)."

The argument over who was responsible for the jury selection procedure in Twin Falls County remains unresolved.

Deputy clerks Sherri Broyles and Bonnie DeVall testified in the grand jury hearings that Pence never directed, supervised or participated in the jury selection process. Instead, the two said, he passed the responsibility to them.

Although Robinson did not testify at those hearings, she also said Pence did not exercise strong supervision over his deputies.

"I never heard anything in our office," Robinson said. "He brought the mail in and would lay it down and walk out."

Pence has argued that although he is clerk of the court, he is only responsible for clerical duties under the direction of judges. And the district clerk court that he wears only represents one of his three constitutional responsibilities.

He also works as the recorder and auditor for the county.

Hurlbut said the ultimate responsibility for the operation of courts is clearly with the court, but the vagueness of Idaho law makes it hard to determine who is responsible for creation over day-to-day affairs.

For instance, he said, the deputy clerks are hired by Pence, and no clerks are hired by Pence until an Idaho Supreme Court ruling earlier this year, court officials and clerks were fighting over the control of hiring and firing of deputy clerks.

There has been a very checked and incomplete history over who runs the courts, Hurlbut said.

Hurlbut said he learned that the county used only voter registration lists in its procedure early this year. But he waited until July 10 to make a change that partly to see if the

county continually arises if the manuals can be imposed on other county officers, he said.

"It is a gray area where it appears they could not have sufficient authority to impose it. The better way is cooperatively work with other offices in the county," Holden said.

Two Falls County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman said the commissioners did not know about the problems with the jury-selection process until they were revealed last week. Even if they had known, they could not have ordered Pence into any remedial action.

County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter said county elected officials are responsible but not to each other because each is a duly-elected official.

Any elected official, as with any citizen, would have the right to tell elected officials about what they see as problems, she said. But she would not have the authority to tell them what to do.

Baxter said that part of her job is to act as legal adviser to other county elected officials. But they do not have to follow her advice.

The commissioners and other elected officials have stayed at least partially aloof on the sidelines when Pence was embroiled in a controversy over his opening of absentee ballots before election day in November 1986. The action was investigated, however, by Baxter, who declined prosecution on any election violation because of lack of criminal intent.

Baxter said her involvement was not a matter of crossing command lines between county officials. She was involved because someone complained to her, which kicked into gear her prosecutorial duties.

Holden said the greatest level of responsibility for the commissioner over other elected officials is when

Idaho Supreme Court would rule on supervisory responsibility in district courts.

That case started when 2nd District Judge Roger Maynard threw out Perce County Clerk Donna Crooks in jail on April 24, 1985, for contempt of court after she hired a deputy clerk.

Maynard was ordered that the new clerk would perform no duties related to the district court.

The Supreme Court ruled that administrative judges have the power to overrule the hiring of a deputy clerk, if the deputy clerk is inappropriate or unacceptable to the court.

Hurlbut said that he, sensing a fight with Pence over changes in the jury selection system in Twin Falls, decided to wait until that decision to change the jury system.

Now, he says, the lines of authority have become clear.

"It is unfortunate there has been resistance to courts running the courts," Hurlbut said. But under the Maynard Supreme Court decision, "The running of courts is up to the presiding judges, not the clerk or anybody else."

The 21 quashed grand jury indictments will be sent through another grand jury as soon as possible, says County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter, who is using the grand jury system to save the county time and money.

The original grand jury was impeached after six months, but only met for about a week. The 16 jurors were paid \$10 for each day.

That new jury should be ready Sept. 1. Kathy Noh was appointed to be Twin Falls County jury commissioner and will be 5th District Administrative Judge Phillip Becker.

Hurlbut said Noh has already drawn up a new master jury list, combining the voter registration list in Twin Falls County with the voter registration list in the surrounding out questionnaires to jurors.

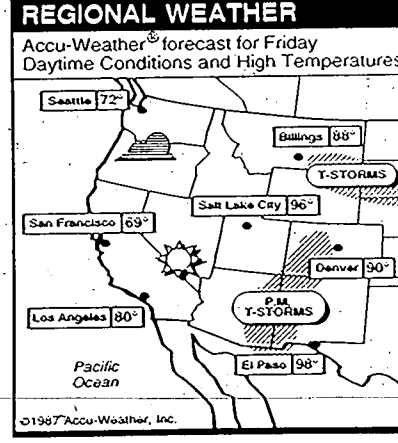
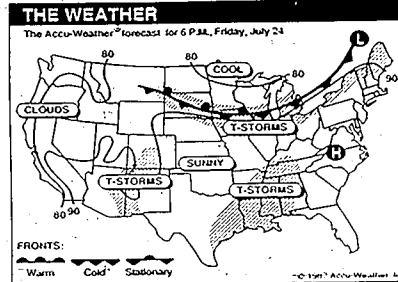

Tension in the gulf

Iran must weigh ideology against gains in U.N. plan

KUWAIT — The U.N. Security Council decision to impose a cease-fire in the Persian Gulf war has presented Iran with a thorny dilemma: whether to adhere to goals dictated by revolutionary ideology or to reap some pragmatic gains from the respite offered by a truce.

Iran has given no official response so far to the 10-point resolution adopted unanimously by the Security Council Monday. The resolution, which is theoretically binding on Iran and Iraq as members of the United Nations, calls for an immediate cease-fire in the almost seven-year-old war and withdrawal of all troops to recognized international boundaries.

But Iranian authorities have left little doubt about their distaste for the Security Council's action. "The Islamic Revolution will not allow the United Nations to dictate to Iran," said a spokesman in Tehran Tuesday that his government "will pursue the war until the elimination of the regime governing Iraq," according to a press agency account from Tehran.

This is in accordance with Iran's long-standing condition for ending the war, which began in September 1980 when Iraq's President Saddam Hussein, hoping to take advantage of weaknesses in the Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's Islamic revolutionary regime in Tehran, sent his troops across the border.

In the intervening seven years, the Iranians have pulled the Iraqis back to the border on all fronts, even going beyond that in a small salient of Iraqi territory that they occupied last year near the port of Al Faw and still hold.

Iran's spiritual leader, the 84-year-old Khomeini has declared that Iran will not enter negotiations to settle the conflict until Saddam Hussein and his Arab allies are overthrown and Iraq agrees to pay war reparations. For obvious reasons, the conditions have never received much of a hearing in Baghdad.

In addition to the strong patriotic argument against giving up the struggle before achieving victory, Iranians often cite America's attitude towards the Japanese in World War II — diplomats in the region also see domestic political reasons supporting the revolutionary rationale for continuing to fight.

Among the reasons cited by regional envoys are that the war serves to keep in check contending factions in Tehran, which have been jostling for power in recent months.

At the war were to end suddenly, a rash of economic problems, including large-scale unemployment, would suddenly surface.

There is no widespread discontent in Iran with current conditions. The diplomat noted that the majority of Iranians, even under the late shah, lived in relatively austere conditions, without such amenities as running water or electricity.

The army's image has been skillfully turned into that of a victorious people's militia. If the war ends, the army's leaders will return to the capital as a new power center with which the military politicians would have to be content.

To accept the cease-fire terms now would put Iranian leaders in an

awkward position since they were offered essentially the same terms four years ago. It would be difficult to justify the truce, perhaps hundreds of thousands of additional casualties suffered without apparent gain for Iran.

Whatever Iranian officials say about the resolution, the true test of Tehran's intent will come in the ensuing weeks, when U.S. Navy warships settle down into the routine of escorting re-registered Kuwaiti tankers through the gulf.

In large measure, diplomats believe, Iran's actions will be governed by Iraq, which is under immense Western and Soviet pressure to abide by the cease-fire. Since the start of the "tanker war" in 1983, Iran has attacked shipping from Arab ports only after Iraqi warplanes have attacked tankers carrying Iranian crude oil from Iran's Kharg Island terminal.

The diplomatic weight of the resolution will be hard to ignore. It is a rare occasion when the five permanent members of the council — the United States, the Soviet Union, Britain, France and China — can agree on using the U.N. charter to force an end to a conflict.

The last time that the council invoked that power, which is laid out in Chapter 7 of the U.N. Charter, was over Korea in the 1950s, according to diplomats here, and that action took place only after the Soviet Union boycotted the event.

A factor important to both sides is the fact that under Chapter 7, whichever party first violates the truce becomes the aggressor, no matter who started the war.

But diplomats believe that, these days, the U.S. and the Soviet Union exercise even greater pragmatism in observing a de facto truce.

Without a tanker war, Iran would be free to export its oil to the Far East at appreciably lower costs than before. Shipping costs would be reduced, as would repair of damaged installations.

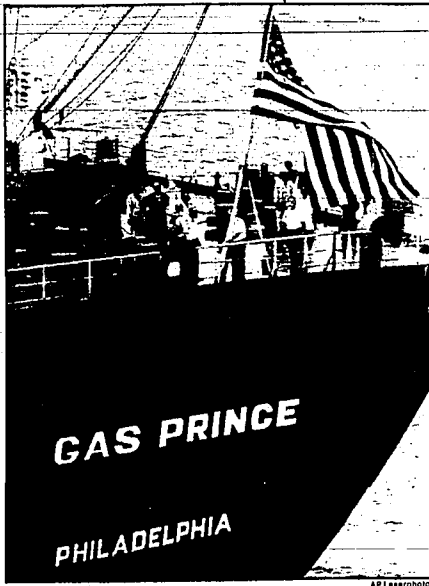
With oil prices hovering around \$20 a barrel, Iran stands to gain significantly at a time when it needs to fill its empty coffers with foreign exchange.

Iran buys most of its weaponry on the international black market, at prices considerably higher than those charged by national governments.

If Iran is worried about the consequences of an arms embargo, the penalty that most observers believe the United Nations would apply if Iran does not comply with the resolution, it may want to replenish its stockpiles in advance.

Such pragmatic considerations, Western diplomats believe, are probably only temporary at best. When the summer temperatures over the gulf get hotter, Iran will sense a chance to further tighten its grip on Iraq, the chances are strong that it will risk alienating world opinion by launching a new offensive.

"Iranians aren't fools," they commented one diplomat. "They will do whatever is in their short-term best interests. Right now, that means observing the cease-fire."

Task force chief says Iran arms sales hurt gulf relations

ABOARD THE USS KIDD IN THE PERSIAN GULF, the top American military officer in the Persian Gulf said Thursday that U.S. relations with Arab nations have been harmed by the Reagan administration's sale of arms to Iran.

"I think from a strategic or sort of political-military point of view, there have been complications," said Rear-Adm. Harold Bersens, commander of the Midwest Task Force.

Bersens's naval group, based in Bahrain, is responsible for overseeing U.S. interests in the oil-rich gulf. He spoke Thursday at a news conference aboard the USS Kidd, a destroyer that is one of the ships escorting two reflagged Kuwaiti tankers up the gulf.

Kuwait's request for the United States to place 11 Kuwaiti tankers under the Stars and Stripes was first made last December, according to an administration chronology of the controversial policy.

That was a month after it was revealed that the administration had secretly been selling missiles to Iran while publicly trying to block the sale of weapons to that country.

Iran and Iraq have been fighting a bloody war at the top of the gulf since Sept. 22, 1980, and Kuwait and

other Arab gulf nations have publicly voiced their fears about an Iranian victory.

U.S. congressmen who recently visited the gulf region said Arab leaders in the area were angry that the United States had been selling weapons to Iran.

Bersens, asked if the arms sales had complicated his job, answered, "On a day-to-day basis, no. I don't think it's complicated my task. I think from a strategic or sort of a political-military point of view, there have been complications."

Asked to explain complications, he said, "Obviously, it makes folks a little skittish if we claim to support the gulf Arabs and we are seen to help their declared enemy."

"Their feelings obviously aren't very positive about that sort of thing," he said. But he added that the United States has long been friendly with gulf Arabs "and I think the recent activity in the gulf indicates just that."

"When they see that we are indeed supporting their interests, they are more than willing to come forward and help us and provide support for us," he said.

Officially, the United States is neutral in the Iran-Iraq war, despite claims by critics of the reflagging policy that the move is a large step toward taking sides in the war.

Kuwait has provided aid to Iraq. Bersens disagreed with the argument that the reflagging of Kuwaiti tankers means the United States is backing Iraq, but he made clear where he believes American sympathy lies.

"I don't think it's a tilt," he said.

Iran's guard cadre plans to conduct naval maneuvers

NICOSIA, Cyprus — Iran's Revolutionary Guards will conduct naval maneuvers codenamed "Marlyroun" early next month to demonstrate how they will try to defeat the U.S. Navy, Tehran radio said Thursday.

It quoted a military spokesman as saying the exercises would be held in the Persian Gulf and Strait of Hormuz and "will show the world that the navy of the Revolutionary Guards Corps can crush arrogance and implement the Guard Corps' special methods."

All Akbar Velayati, the Iranian foreign minister, said his government will not allow Kuwait to export oil in tankers reflagged with the Stars and Stripes and protected by U.S. warships, but also told a news conference Iran would not attack first.

Iran accuses Kuwait of receiving arms for Iraq, the emirate's eastern neighbor at the northern end of the gulf, and has made regular attacks since last September on ships owned by or serving Kuwait.

Iraq's ports have been closed since shortly after its war with Iran began in September 1980. Kuwait and Saudi Arabia export 500,000 barrels of oil daily through the gulf on Iraq's behalf.

The first convoy of two reflagged tankers and escorts was to arrive Friday at Kuwait's Al-Ahmedi oil terminal. After loading, the tankers are to sail south in four or five days.

Revolutionary Guards naval maneuvers will include tests of "equipment the corps has produced," he radio said.

It did not elaborate, but the fanatical followers of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini have said they were preparing their own anti-ship missiles.

The design is thought to be based on Soviet-made SS-N2 Sixx weapons captured from Iraq early last year in the Faw Peninsula campaign.

According to the radio, the maneuvers will "demonstrate to America that such things as an arms

embargo will not only fail to have the slightest impact on our resistance but will result in the growth of our industrial and military self-sufficiency."

The United States has been trying to negotiate agreement in the U.N. Security Council for declaring an arms embargo on either the Persian Gulf combatants that does not accept a cease-fire resolution passed Monday.

Iraq supported the resolution, but Iran said in advance that it would reject the measure as it has similar resolutions in the past.

Speed boats operated by the Revolutionary Guards, who have their own naval bases, can attack shipping from bases on several small islands in the gulf. The naval exercises will be the second by Iran in a month, following five days of maneuvers earlier in July.

It was not clear whether the August exercises in the narrow Strait of Hormuz, southern gateway to the gulf, would coincide with the expected entry of a convoy of U.S.-escorted Kuwait tankers about Aug. 6.

Iran's official Islamic Republic News Agency quoted Velayati as saying in a message Wednesday to U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar that Kuwait's oil exports will be considered "prohibited goods."

On Thursday, Velayati said in West Germany: "If Iranian ships are not subjected to attack, if no ships are attacked by the Iraqis, no ships will be attacked in the Persian Gulf."

He called the U.S. warships "a threat to Iran" but sidestepped questions about an Iranian response. He met with reporters after talks with Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher.

Velayati did not mention his message to Perez de Cuellar. It indicated that the Iranian navy, which intercepts vessels entering the gulf and searching them for Iraq-bound cargo, might stop vessels leaving the waterway as well.

Sessions to meet with Meese amid FBI speculation

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. District Judge William S. Sessions was scheduled to meet with Attorney General Edwin Meese III on Friday, an administration source said, amid speculation that he was the leading candidate for FBI director.

Meanwhile, an informed source outside the administration said that a man thought to be the leading candidate, U.S. District Judge Ralph G. Thompson of Oklahoma City, had turned down the post because he feared a Democratic president could force him out of the job in little more than a year.

A number of names have circulated in recent weeks as the administration has sought a replacement for William Webster, now the CIA director.

Sessions' candidacy is being pushed by Sen. Phil Gramm and Rep. Lamar Smith, both Texas Republicans. He is also said to be supported by former Sen. John Tower, R-Texas, who recommended Sessions for nomination to U.S. attorney more than a decade ago.

Sessions, 57, the chief judge of the Western District of Texas, left San Antonio for Washington on Thursday but declined comment on reports concerning the speculation.

"It would be inappropriate for me

to comment," Sessions said. The administration source, who spoke on condition he not be identified, confirmed, however, that Sessions would meet Friday with Thompson.

Patrick Korten, a Justice Department spokesman, said he had no comment on speculation that Sessions was the leading candidate for the job.

Thompson was among five candidates whom Meese originally asked the FBI to conduct background investigations on.

The others were U.S. District Judge Jensen of San Francisco, who turned the job down because he did not want to return to Washington; former Pennsylvania Gov. and Justice Department criminal division chief Richard Thornburgh, who let it be known that he did not want the job because it would remove him from politics for 10 years; former Marine Corps

captain F.X. Kelley, who was ruled out because of the Marine spy scandal; and U.S. Circuit Judge Peter Fay of the 11th Circuit, who may still be in the running.

U.S. Circuit Judge William Wilkins was added to the list under pressure from Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., but he withdrew his name from consideration.

Dunn water decision is victory for public

It is not likely to be the final word on the subject, but the Niagara Springs decision this week by retiring Water Resources Director Kenneth Dunn will probably be seen in years ahead as a major case in the development of Idaho public interest water law.

The essence of Dunn's decision is that water in Idaho is a public trust resource, of which scenic beauty and recreational value are a part.

The state has a responsibility — indeed a duty — to protect those public uses, which may take precedent over prior vested water rights.

Idaho water law has been moving in this direction for some time. The Legislature, for example, has gradually expanded the "minimum flow" concept and applying "public interest" as part of the criteria on which "minimum flow" is determined. The Swan Falls agreement also includes the public interest concept as a criterion for adjudication of water rights.

But Dunn's decision goes further. It gives scenic and recreational aspects at the Niagara Springs site a higher value, at this time, than the beneficial economic use to which the individual developers would put the water.

If that concept is expanded in future cases, we may look back on the Niagara Springs cases as one which helped lay the groundwork for an expanded public resources doctrine in Idaho.

It is also likely that Dunn's decision will go into both the legislative and judicial arenas.

Water, in Idaho, is both money and power, and the history of the state is in no small measure a study in its control and use.

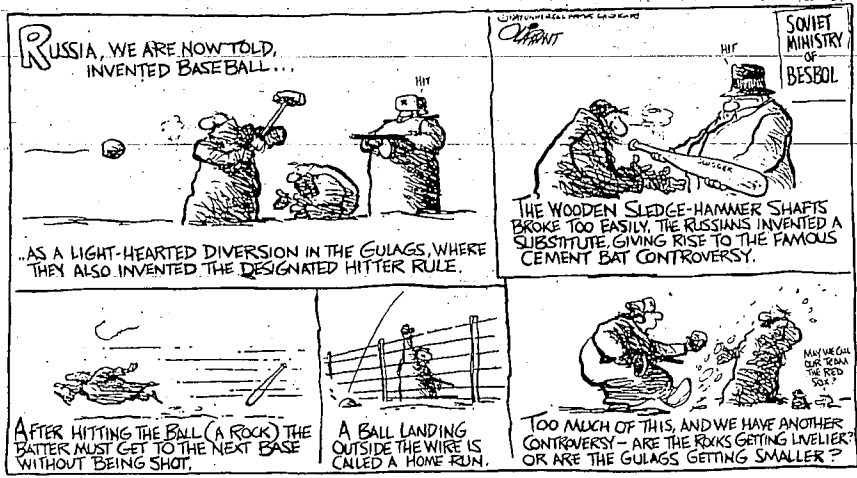
No one would suggest, at this point, that Idaho should go as far as a state like Oregon, which has developed broad public use and access principles into its laws governing land, water and ocean shoreline.

But neither should Idaho remain tied solely to water use doctrines which were developed a century ago and which, from time to time, may need updating and modifying.

Dunn's decision speaks wisely to this issue. It sketches broad principles for future water decisions involving public interest, but it leaves to future directors the allocation of water at any given time.

In doing so, it recognizes that, as Dunn puts it, "public interest is a dynamic concept subject to change as the needs and desires of the people in the locality and throughout the state evolve."

That language alone is an important element in what is a clear victory for public rights.

Using tax laws to catch up with child support cheaters

BOSTON — Ira Jackson has the happy heart of a social reformer and the merciless soul of a tax collector. As reigning head of the Massachusetts Department of Revenue, this engaging and hard-driving man has — let us be honest here — gotten his kicks seizing a Rolls-Royce, putting a lien or two on a yacht, and snaring up some \$268 million last year in delinquent taxes.

So the fact that child-support payments in this state have just come under the wing (or eye, or claw) of his tax department is of more than casual note. As of July 1, any parent who is late, or late or outright recalcitrant in making payments is inviting the scrutiny of this agency and, eventually, its computers. Computers that, he likes to recall, never sleep.

"I don't want to sound menacing," says Jackson, who looks more like the cherub than the avenging angel, "but we intend to make some very visible actions." There is a "Make My Day" gleam in his eyes as if he were just waiting for a sports superlative or corporate biggie to miss a payment.

At the moment, Massachusetts stands

as the only major state using its tax department for child-support enforcement. But Jackson's zeal is not unique. It's indicative of a change in attitude — a change that may not be exactly sweeping the country, but is chugging across it at a decent rate of speed. There is a re-emerging get-tough approach toward parents who walk out of their kids' lives, letting them slide into the economic chute.

These days, virtually every plan to help kids out of poverty, every plan to overhaul welfare, is geared toward the new old-fashioned notion that parents are responsible for their kids. Plans like the one Sen. Patrick Moynihan introduced in Congress on July 21 have the same two crucial components: job and education programs

for single parents on welfare, and streamlined programs to enforce child-support payments.

For a long time, says Jackson, "society simply went brain dead" on the subject of getting dads to pay. "It was like drunk driving or tax evasion," he says, returning to his favorite analogy. "We condoned it, we wrung our hands over it, we allowed it. Only three out of ten fathers were doing what they were supposed to be doing, paying an average of \$2,300 a year, the cost of putting up one dog at a kennel." A man was more likely to get arrested for a traffic violation than for a child-support violation.

Child support suffered from its place in the messy wrangling between adults. It was just money to be argued over. But during the 1970s, the rate of divorce and single parenthood rose and with it the child-rates of poverty. Welfare critics noted that 87 percent of recipients of Aid to Families with Dependent Children were on the dole because of inadequate child support. And many were in lower-middle-class.

One study in Colorado found that two-

thirds of fathers paid more in payments for their cars than for their kids. California research found that, in the year after divorce, the standard of living of the mother and children had gone down 73 percent, while the father's had gone up 42 percent. Still another study proved, not surprisingly, that the stricter the enforcement of child-support payments, the higher the rate of compliance.

"We're now saying the issue is not parents, it's kids," says Jackson, reflecting a view built into the 1984 federal law requiring state child-support guidelines. "We're not the government intervening between husband and wife but protecting kids."

Few states have set up as aggressive a posture as Massachusetts, but a standard emerging that says children should not live measurably worse than their parents. This policy has its opponents, especially among men who resent transferring money to their ex-wife's household. There is resistance by men who feel that support checks are their only leverage in the power struggle

for visitation rights.

Public policymakers have trouble staying above this fray. But a pro-feds, law-and-order coalition has made enforcement a popular position for politicians of all stripes. Not the least of them is the head taxman of Massachusetts, whose close friend and governor, Michael Dukakis, is running for President as a tough-minded liberal.

"A thousand years of common-law tradition says you are liable to support your kids," adds Jackson. "We lost perspective and we're going to turn that around." It will take time and some help from the legislature to get the program up to megachip speed. But anybody who doubts Jackson's ability to "persuade" people to pay what they owe ought to chat with some recent converts to the overweening joys of paying taxes, right on time.

Republican John Scoresby eyes race against Stallings

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Republican John Scoresby says he's thinking about running against the man who knocked his boss out of his congressional seat three years ago, Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho.

Scoresby was a field representative for Republican George Hansen until Hansen was defeated by Stallings in the 1984 election. He has been listed as a Hansen aide recently and works with Hansen's consulting firm.

He said he expects to decide by October whether to make the race.

"This is not something that can be made late," Scoresby said.

"I'm well-known in the Upper Valley, but I'm pretty much unknown in other parts of the district."

Scoresby, Region-7 Republican chairman, said the strength of his candidacy would be partly credentials and his experience working for Hansen.

"What this district needs is someone who will fight battles with the federal government," he said.

Scoresby, 42, said if he ran, that probably would mean that Hansen will not. Hansen, a former seventh-term congressman, is serving a federal prison term stemming from violations of financial-disclosure laws. He was released last December, brought

back in May for parole violations and is scheduled to be released in November.

"He probably wouldn't run against me—and I probably wouldn't run if he decided to run," Scoresby said. "But I'm not saying it couldn't happen. That option is still available to him."

Scoresby said, however, that Hansen can afford to enter late.

Scoresby has been involved in three campaigns against Stallings involving his father, Clifford, who defeated Stallings in a legislative.

"I've been familiar with Stallings for a longer period than any politician," he said.

Missing kids found, returned OK

MCCALL (AP) — Three children missing for five days after being picked up by a family acquaintance were found Thursday near the remote community of Yellow Pine and returned home to Nampa, Valley County Sheriff Blair Shepherd said.

"The children are fine. They're en route to Nampa at this time with their grandmother and other relatives who came up here to look for them," Shepherd said Thursday evening.

Claudia Mata, 12, Enequina Mata, 9, and Clemente Mata, 6, were reported missing last Saturday by their mother, Angolita Vela.

The children reportedly were found by a Valley County sheriff's deputy near Yellow Pine, about 50 miles east of McCall, with John

Leach, who had picked them up last Friday for what was supposed to be an overnight stay at a house where he was staying.

The children were taken by Valley County sheriff's officers to McCall, where they were met by family members and checked by state Health and Welfare officials, Nampa Police Detective Alan Bidwell said.

There was no immediate indication that the children had been abused.

Mrs. Vela said Leach, who had represented himself as an evangelical church pastor and who the children referred to as "Reverend Johns," had promised to return the children home Saturday morning. She filed a missing-persons report when they were not returned by the end of the day. Leach's brown pickup truck had just been seen early Sunday afternoon in McCall.

No formal charges had been filed against Leach on Thursday in connection with the children's disappearance. But Bidwell said he was being charged with a felony parole violation stemming from a previous armed robbery conviction. He remained in the Valley County Jail and was expected to be arraigned on Friday, Shepherd said.

Bidwell said Leach had discussed taking the children on a two-week camping trip several weeks ago. Mrs. Vela said she refused and told the children they could not go.

Leach befriended the children and their mother in May after he stopped at their house asking for an address, authorities said. Ms. Vela said he returned a week later with food and religious literature and began visiting the home every day.

Pocatello mayor calls for halt of fee

POCATELLO (AP) — Mayor Dick Finlayson has ordered the city to halt collection of its monthly street utility fee, ruled invalid by a district judge.

The city will file an appeal with the Idaho Supreme Court in hopes of overturning 6th District Judge William Woodland's ruling. Finlayson said at a news conference.

Woodland on Monday ordered the city to make a limited refund of the fee he declared void earlier this month.

The city will also ask the court to consider applying Woodland's refund order to all Pocatello utility customers, rather than just to those who have paid the fee under protest, Finlayson said.

"The city council felt there would be too much confusion if we went

ahead and continued to collect the fee," Finlayson said.

The mayor said the city would delay making the court-ordered refunds until the issue has been decided by the state's high court.

By filing the appeal, the city is granted a seven-day stay on Woodland's ruling. That will enable the city to delay making refunds to an estimated 600 to 900 utility customers who paid the fee under protest.

"At this point, we are very confident the state fee will be upheld by the Supreme Court," Finlayson said.

In the meantime, he will recommend the city council adopt a resolution allowing residents to make voluntary contributions for street repair, similar to what is now allowed for beautification.

Money raised will be put into a dedicated fund for use exclusively on street repairs, he said.

The idea for the voluntary contribution came after officials began receiving numerous letters and phone calls from residents supportive of the street fee and the city's street repair program.

Meanwhile, despite the fee's uncertain future and a projected \$10,000 shortfall in the city's street budget, street crews are going forward with the \$1 million repair program. It depended heavily on the \$500,000 to \$600,000 raised by the street utility fee, said Street Superintendent Curt Neville.

Completing the work, however, will seriously deplete the department's cash reserves. The problems could be compounded if Pocatello suffers from a bad winter, he said.

Tribal judge: FMC must fire 13 non-Indians

POCATELLO (AP) — A Shoshone-Bannock tribal court judge has ruled that FMC Corp. must dismiss 13 non-Indian employees hired since August 1985 for jobs on the reservation because the company did not properly post the open-

ings.

Tribal Court Judge Robert Hunter said the elemental phosphorous manufacturer didn't give adequate notice to potential Indian applicants.

"TERO Director Tami Trahan said

the tribes are "extremely pleased" with the court decision because it could help eliminate employment barriers on the reservation. However, she said she doesn't believe the order will end the controversy.

Crane fatality suit transferred to federal court

BOISE (AP) — A lawsuit filed against a construction worker who was decapitated in an industrial accident at Lucky Peak Dam was transferred from 4th District Court

to U.S. District Court here.

The lawsuit was filed by survivors of Robert K. Campbell Sr., a construction worker killed Jan. 26 when a crane fell.

The lawsuit named as defendants a Wisconsin company, Montowac Engineers, Inc.; Essex Crane Rental Corp.; New Jersey and Morrison-Knudsen Engineers.

Utah Guard, health officials investigating strange illness

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The Utah Army National Guard and the Health Department are trying to determine the source and nature of an illness which has claimed the life of one guardsman and hospitalized another, an official said Thursday.

Leslie Davenport, 34, of Price, died Thursday at 4:37 a.m. at Castleview Hospital in Price after being admitted the night before with respiratory distress and fever, said Robert Furlow, director of the Health Department's southeastern division.

Another man, like Davenport a member of the Price-based 1457th Engineer Battalion, was admitted to Castleview on June 15th with similar symptoms, but his condition was improving, Furlow said.

A common link appears to be a summer training camp about 75 miles from the 1457th attended from June 14-20 at Camp Williams, about 30 miles southwest of Salt Lake City, state epidemiologist Craig Nichols said at an afternoon news conference.

Up to 1,500 Utah guardsmen are rotating through Camp Williams doing a six-week period for regular summer training exercises.

One member of a southern Utah

unit who reported becoming ill after an overlapping session and four others from the unit were being flown Thursday to the Veterans Administration hospital in Salt Lake City for tests, Nichols said.

Flu, fungal and bacterial infections were being considered, but Legionnaire's disease, meningitis and Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever have been tentatively ruled out, he said.

An autopsy and blood tests were being performed Thursday on Davenport by the state medical examiner, but results were pending, Furlow said.

Influenza-like symptoms, including fever, chest pains and chills have been associated with the two serious cases, Nichols said.

He said the Davenport and the ill guardsman did road-building work and it was possible they had contracted a fungal infection from upturned dirt and dust.

"You have to take that kind of outdoor activity very seriously," Nichols said.

In addition, about 11 men, including the hospitalized man, reported becoming ill after drinking water from a large container at the

camp, said Col. Tom Brewer, chief of staff at guard headquarters in Salt Lake City.

Brewer said Davenport reportedly had become sick during the camp, but there was no record he had checked into sick call. It also was unclear whether Davenport drank from the water tank.

About six other men had come to Castleview's emergency room with symptoms similar to Davenport's, but none had been admitted, said a hospital nurse who requested anonymity.

Nichols said no one related to the two 1457th guardsmen had become ill.

Guard medical personnel, assisted by Health Department workers, were pursuing all avenues in the attempt to track down the source of the illness, Brewer said.

"We're waiting for more information," he said. "We're really not sure where to go and what to look for until we have more information."

There were no indications the illness was related to an outbreak of hemolytic uremic syndrome, a rare bacterial infection which killed three people in Utah and Salt Lake counties earlier this month, Nichols said.

Salt Lake police identify corpses found shot, left near city's airport

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Authorities have identified bodies of a Salt Lake City couple killed by multiple gunshots and found west of Salt Lake City International Airport.

Det. Don Bell identified the victims as Norman B. Armstrong, 39, and Janet Marie Armstrong, 38. He said both were living in the Salt Lake County area, but he declined to release a more specific address.

Police Thursday still were seeking clues in the case.

"We don't have anything on motive right now," Bell said. "I think it's fair to assume we don't think it's drug related and we don't think it's robbery."

The bodies of the man and woman were found Wednesday afternoon lying face down side-by-side on a dirt road near railroad tracks and the Interstate 60 and 6500 overpass.

Police say an unidentified man found the bodies about 5 p.m. Wednesday as he was in the area cleaning irrigation ditches.

Salt Lake City Police Lt. Larry Stott said officers found numerous shell casings from a small-caliber weapon, but no gun was found.

Stott said there appeared to be no sign of a struggle. He said the man's wallet was found in his back pocket and did not appear to have been disturbed.

Under the man, who was wearing blue jeans, a gray T-shirt and heavy shoes, police found a crumpled, blood-covered straw cowboy hat.

The woman, dressed in dress slacks and a T-shirt, appeared to have been shot in the lower back.

"They were both shot multiple times and at close range with a small-caliber weapon," Stott said.

"One, maybe both, were shot in the head."

Stott said it did not appear to be an execution-style shooting.

Evidence indicates that the couple fell where they were shot," he said.

The area under the overpass where the bodies were found appears to be

a gathering place and shelter for transients. There was a bench-type seat from a car, a mattress and numerous broken bottles.

Police said a witness reported seeing three people target shooting in the area about 1:30 p.m. Some of the broken bottles in the area appeared to have been shot at. He said detectives confirmed that a makeshift target range had been set up in the area south east from where the bodies were discovered.

"It's possible they were just there target practicing and then the third person, of course, would be our suspect. But we don't have a specific suspect," Stott said.

One witness said he saw a green flatted truck near where the two bodies were found as he passed nearby on I-80 in his semitrailer truck.

Following several leads on vehicles spotted in the area, police also were looking for a 1969 or 1970 lime green, four-door Chevrolet car with a male, white driver.

AIDS panel represents range of views

Reagan appoints AIDS commission, visits young victims

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan on Thursday visited hospitalized children suffering from AIDS, mourned the disease's toll on friends and former associates and challenged his newly constituted study commission to help "beat this disease."

Reagan named a dozen people, including a homosexual geneticist, a Roman Catholic cardinal, a former chief of naval operations and four women, to complete the ranks of the 13-member panel headed by Dr. W. Eugene Mayberry, chairman of the Mayo Clinic's board of governors.

Reagan flew by helicopter to the National Institutes of Health in suburban Bethesda, Md., where he visited with children suffering from AIDS and then met with members of the commission.

He also visited the laboratory of Dr. Samuel Broder, where the first virus was done on the use of the drug AZT to fight the AIDS virus.

"After the visit to the ward today and after the death by AIDS of friends and former associates, this is my prayer: One way or another, whether by breakthrough or steady progress, we will beat this disease," the president told an audience of about 250 at the NIH.

"I will do all that God gives us the power to do, to find a cure for AIDS. We will not stop, we will not rest, until we send AIDS the way of smallpox and polio."

Reagan did not name any friends or onetime associates who had died from AIDS. The president and his wife Nancy sent a message of condolence when actor Brock Hudson died from the disease, and they expressed grief over the AIDS-related death of Rep. Stewart B. McKinney, R-Calif.

As he was escorted through the pediatric ward, Reagan was introduced to four children.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The members of President Reagan's new panel on AIDS range from a homosexual activist to an Illinois legislator who pushed through controversial bills aimed at stemming the spread of the AIDS virus.

"I am aware that my homosexuality must have been a factor of considerable weight in my selection for this honor," Dr. Frank Lilly, chairman of the genetics department of the Albert Einstein Medical Center in New York City, said Thursday in a statement.

Lilly said later in an interview that the officials who appointed him view him first as a scientist and then as a member of the gay community.

The New York activist has led AIDS education efforts by the Gay Men's Health Crisis and the National Academy of Sciences. He said he first learned of his appointment at the end of June and had been unaware of the debate over whether an openly gay person would be named to the panel.

"It never crossed my mind that a gay person would not be appointed to the commission," Lilly said.

The 13-member panel held an organizational meeting after a short public session with President Thompson. Reagan said he was putting the group right to work; however, Lilly said its first meeting would not be held until after Labor Day.

Lilly, who declined to specify his political affiliation, said he was not familiar with the views of other panel members. Asked if such a diverse group is likely to agree on a unified national approach to solving the AIDS crisis, he replied, "I can only say I hope so."

Another appointee, assistant Illinois House Minority Leader Penny Pullen, is a leading spokeswoman for the conservative wing of the state GOP. She was the moving force behind two bills now on Gov. James Thompson's desk: one to require AIDS testing of couples applying for marriage licenses, the other requiring public health officials to track

down and notify the sex partners of people found to be infected with the AIDS virus.

"I believe there is a strong current of concern in the public that nothing could be done is being done," she said during debate on the measures in May. Thompson is expected to sign the marriage license bill; he has not indicated what his plans are on the other measure.

Indiana health commissioner Woodrow A. Myers Jr., also on the panel, has told his state that "we do nothing, we will become a San Francisco or New York when it comes to this disease." He is the only black on the commission.

Senate rejects bid to strengthen budget law

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate on Thursday rejected a Democratic proposal for reviving the Gramm-Rudman budget balancing law, and lawmakers predicted emergency action would be needed to prevent a government financial catastrophe next week.

The Senate rejected 71-25 a plan to strengthen Gramm-Rudman offered by Senate Budget Committee chairman Lawton Chiles, D-Fla.

Republicans, seeking also to toughen the law but with language more favorable to President Reagan, then offered their version.

The vote by the Democratic-controlled chamber magnified the budget stalemate blocking urgently needed action on the national debt ceiling. The Treasury needs more borrowing authority by the middle of next week or the government might default on its obligations for the first time in history.

Both amendments were designed to create a constitutional mechanism to restore the law's original program of automatic spending cuts that enforce annual deficit targets. These cuts were ended by a Supreme Court ruling last year.

Both amendments also would ease the original targets so Congress would have a more realistic chance of meeting them, with the Democrats seeking also to toughen the law but with language more favorable to President Reagan, then offered their version.

Administration boosts pressure on Panama

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration, escalating pressure on Panama to reduce military influence in governing the country, has suspended a \$20 million aid program and told American diplomats to shut the powerful Panamanian defense chief, U.S. officials said Thursday.

The moves were the latest in an effort to show U.S. dissatisfaction with the behind-the-scenes rule of Panamanian Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega, who has been accused by a former high-ranking military officer of complicity in the murder of an opposition figure, corruption, and vote fraud.

The level of administration ire rose considerably last month when an anti-American demonstration allegedly arranged by pro-Noriega factions caused an estimated \$106.8 million in damage to the U.S. Embassy in Panama City.

Administration officials, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the aid freeze was instituted without fanfare after the demonstration and

was to be lifted once Panama fulfilled promises to reimburse the United States for the embassy damage.

Now, the officials said, thought is being given to making the freeze continue even if restitution is made.

A Panamanian diplomat reacted angrily to the administration decision, which he said was relayed to Panama through the U.S. Embassy in Panama City.

"This is clearly an attempt to destabilize my country," said Aquilino Boyd, a special envoy sent by Panama to Washington earlier this month. "This is not what you expect when two countries are supposed to enjoy good relations."

He said the aid cutoff would boom against the United States by angering poor Panamanians who depend on U.S. development programs.

"Relations are linked sour," he said.

The suspension stops new contracts under an aid program worth \$20 million in economic support and \$5 million in military programs.

First Senate salvos in Bork debate fired

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senators who are months away from formal consideration of President Reagan's nomination of Robert H. Bork to the Supreme Court engaged in preliminary debate Thursday over the highly controversial appointment.

Two key senators who are presidential hopefuls clashed over whether the Senate should examine political issues in deciding whether to confirm Bork.

In a lengthy speech on the Senate floor, Judiciary Committee Chairman Joseph R. Biden Jr., D-Del., said Reagan is playing politics by picking Bork.

He was followed by Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., who accused Democrats of bowing to special-interest groups in challenging the nominee.

Vice President George Bush, meantime, issued a statement, chastising Biden, saying "I find it ironic" that Biden "would take issue with Judge Bork's judicial philosophy. That philosophy is one of judicial restraint, and what that

means above all else is that Congress should make the laws, not the court."

"Three years ago, President Reagan and I made the case very forcefully to the American people that we support such a philosophy," Bush's statement said. "(Democratic presidential nominee) Walter Mondale, in turn, warned that President Reagan might get the chance to reshape the Supreme Court. The voters considered that possibility and pulled the Reagan-Bush lever."

"Judge Bork is a thoughtful and extraordinary jurist who has served with distinction on the U.S. Court of Appeals. This is a superb nomination that should be promptly confirmed by the Senate."

Biden is an announced candidate for the 1988 Democratic presidential nomination; Dole and Bush are expected to run for the GOP nomination.

Sens. Alan K. Simpson, R-Wyo., and Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, joined in denouncing Democratic opponents.

QUANTICO, Va. (AP) — A U.S. Marine charged with giving secrets to a Soviet woman was offered hope Thursday when a judge agreed to consider releasing him from solitary confinement.

The attorneys for Sgt. Clayton Lonetree, the first Marine to face a court-martial on espionage charges, also pressed the government to produce classified material that they contend will show the former Moscow Embassy guard did not intentionally reveal secrets to the Soviets.

Lonetree, 25, of St. Paul, Minn., faces 13 charges in a court-martial at the Quantico Marine Corps Base, where he received his embassy guard training.

In addition to espionage, which carries a possible life sentence, Lonetree is accused of revealing the identities of covert U.S. agents and providing information about embassy floor plans and office assignments.

Lonetree's attorneys have said

their client fell for a Soviet woman who worked in the embassy but did not betray his country.

The second day of the court-

martial ended at mid-day because of a power failure that affected the entire northern Virginia base. Marine officials said the proceedings would resume Friday morning.

Unlike the first day of the court-martial, which was conducted mostly behind closed doors, Thursday's proceedings were open. During one recess, Lonetree's grandfather, an American Indian, performed a prayer ceremony in the courtroom.

Sam Lonetree, 72, wore a full feather headdress and blew into an eagle-bone whistle. "May the Great Spirit bless you all," he said.

Defense attorney William Kunstler urged Navy Capt. Phillip F. Roberts, the trial judge, to grant his client greater freedom of movement, calling he solitary confinement conditions draconian and "needlessly cruel."

Lonetree has been in solitary for eight months.

State Department investigation rips Contra-related contracts

WASHINGTON — The State Department hired contractors who were involved in the Iran-Contra affair for work its own employees should have done, including one job that was so poorly executed the department should seek a refund, an internal report said Thursday.

International Business Communications and its founder, Frank Gomez, received \$436,000 worth of public relations contracts with the State Department in 1984 and 1985, during the time the firm was also working closely with then White House aide Lt. Col. Oliver North on the private effort to fund the U.S.

backed Contra rebels in Nicaragua. Gomez's partner, Richard Miller, is one of two people who has pleaded guilty to conspiracy to defraud the government by using a tax-exempt organization to raise money for Contra weapons.

The IBC contracts with the State Department were principally geared to promote the administration's pro-Contra and El Salvador policies.

An investigation by the department's inspector general, released Thursday, found a pattern of procedural violations in those contracts, plus one involving a foundation set up by IBC principals called Institute For North-South Issues.

The investigation followed

disclosure earlier this year that the department's Office of Public Diplomacy For Latin America had a \$276,000 classified contract with IBC that raised questions about the possibility of improper lobbying of Congress.

The investigation cleared the department and IBC of any illegal lobbying, saying there was no evidence of taxpayer funds used for that purpose.

While it found the Public Diplomacy office provided floor speeches and information to congressional supporters of the Contra policy, the report said, that did not constitute forbidden lobbying.

Lawmakers: North's support slips

WASHINGTON (AP) — The near-unanimous public support Oliver L. North received after beginning his congressional testimony July 7 tumbled off by the time he finished on July 14, according to calls and letters reaching several committee members' offices.

However, other lawmakers, principally North's strongest backers, saw nothing but unwavering pro-North sentiments the entire time.

And, in another indication of support, a spokesman said more than \$1 billion has poured into North's legal defense fund since his testimony began.

Informal surveys indicated that in some offices initial news accounts of

North's massive support spurred a second wave of callers and writers who more often than not opposed him.

In other cases, North still commanded support from a majority, but the percentage in his favor dropped considerably.

North testified for six days in his crisp Marine lieutenant colonel's uniform, telling the joint committees and a national television audience how he managed secret arms sales to Iran and assistance to the Nicaraguan Contras.

There were indications that many of those calling and writing reacted to the style of the former National Security Council staffer as much as

to the substance of his comments.

For instance, several offices reported that the pro-North comments included the message that the chief House Iran-Contra counsel, John W. Nields Jr., should "get a haircut."

Nields' long hair contrasted sharply with North's close-cropped military haircut.

Typical of staff comments on the change in attitude toward North was that of Bruce Frame, press spokesman for Sen. Paul Sarbanes, D-Md. By the second week of North's appearance, he said, "Stories would say, 'I saw those people (on the pro-North reaction) and they don't reflect my views at all.'"

Nofziger vows fight to save his reputation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former White House political director Lyn Nofziger pleaded innocent Thursday to charges that his lobbying of former government colleagues violated conflict-of-interest laws. He vowed to fight to save his reputation.

The judge allowed the defendants to remain free on personal recognizance.

Afterward, Nofziger told reporters, "I am absolutely convinced of my innocence."

"I'm sorry to waste all the government's money on this kind of situation where they literally destroy a person's business, they destroy a person's finances, they try to destroy a person's reputation and we're not going to let that happen," he said.

"This kind of thing just isn't something anybody would go out and deliberately do," Nofziger said. His lawyers have contended Nofziger and Bragg repeatedly consulted an attorney.

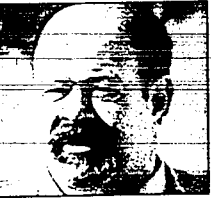
Attorney General Edwin Meese III, Mark Bragg, the former presidential aide's business partner, pleaded innocent to a charge of aiding and abetting Nofziger's alleged violations of the Ethics in Government Act.

Nofziger, President Reagan's political adviser from 1981 until he left the White House in 1982, was arraigned before U.S. District Judge Thomas A. Flannery who set a Nov. 16 trial date.

Defense attorney Paul L. Perito entered the innocent plea for his client to charges in the six-count indictment. It alleges Nofziger "profited from the political reputation and influence" he had in the Reagan administration.

Nofziger is accused of improperly contacting former administration colleagues on behalf of several clients including Wedtech Corp., a defense contractor involved in a legal storm that has touched At-

Dallas edges Houston in new population list

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dallas edged past Texas rival Houston in the Census Bureau's latest population estimates for the nation's 281 metropolitan areas, but New York continued to lead the list by a wide margin.

The Dallas-Fort Worth metropolitan area moved up from ninth to eighth place on the list of the nation's largest urban areas, with a population estimated at 3,655,300 as of July 1, 1986, up from 3,535,800 in 1985.

At the same time, Houston slipped back one notch, despite an estimated population growth from 3,605,500 to 3,634,300.

Overall, the Dallas area grew a huge 24.7 percent since the 1980 national head count, while Houston gained 17.7 percent over the six-year period.

In general, Sun Belt metropolitan areas in the South and West continued to have the strongest growth in the nation. Some northern "Rust

LOS ANGELES — Peter Holm testified Thursday in his bitter divorce battle with Joan Collins that he didn't feel a prenuptial agreement was "a proper way to start a marriage," but he composed one to appease the "Dynasty" vixen.

"She mentioned a prenuptial agreement. I objected to that idea," he said.

"I didn't think it was a proper way to start a marriage," but he wrote it anyway on his computer, Holm said. "We worked on it together."

Holm said earlier he didn't consider the document legally binding but simply a way to indicate "our mutual respect for each other."

Holm, self-assured, smiling and often pleaded ignorance when confronted by celebrity attorney Marvin Mitchellson in the courtroom.

"It's hard to get a hold of this. It's like a squirrel running in front of you," a frustrated Mitchellson said in court at one point, describing Holm's answers.

Still at issue in the third day of the

divorce trial is the validity and understanding by both parties of the agreement signed three weeks before the couple married on Nov. 6, 1985.

Holm at first said he didn't recognize a key paragraph on the one-page, five-item document, one which dealt with payments to Holm after a divorce, providing him with nothing.

"She said she wanted something in writing to clarify some of the arrangements we had," Holm said, adding that the disputed paragraph in his mind did not waive any marital rights.

"I wouldn't have signed it if it said that."

Attorney Frank Steinschreiber asked again if he ever intended to give up marital rights.

Holm replied, "Certainly not, sir."

Holm is seeking \$80,000 a month from the actress to maintain what he called his accustomed style of life, pending a final settlement.

The third floor courtroom was jammed with scores of "Dynasty" fans, off-duty jurors and reporters who watched Miss Collins come and go.

Holm was asked questions about

his purchase of a \$300,000 home and an \$80,000 boat in the south of France. He also was asked by his attorney to discuss how he spent the \$1.3 million he received from the 54-year-old actress.

"It was for clothes, petrol expenses, tips, traveling, computer things, things like that," he said, adding, "I bought expensive gifts for her."

Holm repeatedly mentioned his unfaithful love for Miss Collins, who plays "Dynasty's" Alexis Carrington Colby. "I don't want a divorce, sir, I want to reconcile. I still love her," he told the judge.

Holm said the couple never discussed the prenuptial agreement after they were married.

"We had fights... and she talked about divorce. Usually, when she threatened things like that, I didn't take it seriously because it was like the Alexis thing," Holm said. The judge had the Alexis reference stricken from the transcript.

At one point, Mitchellson went to a blackboard and with a marking pen wrote down the disbursement of Miss Collins' income, showing she was in a 50 percent tax bracket and that her agent got 10 percent and Holm got 20 percent.

Computer crime ring charges expected

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Computer hackers across the country may face felony charges following the arrests here of nine teen-agers who illegally obtained everything from clothes to skateboards through a sophisticated computer network, police said Thursday.

"It's a big business. These companies lose millions," said Police Officer Tim Howell of suburban Mount Lebanon, where the youths live.

"This is only one small isolated incident and there are thousands of people involved in it across the country."

"As long as plastic America exists, we're going to have this," Howell said.

Eight boys and one girl were charged with computer fraud, a felony, and several other charges following a six-week investigation by police and the Secret Service. Their names have been withheld because they are minors, ranging in age from 14 to 17.

Daniel Mayer of the Secret Service in Pittsburgh said arrests of juveniles and adults implicated in the ring also are expected following the completion of "investigations" in Dallas and San Antonio, Texas; Omaha, Neb.; Augusta, Ga.; Fresno and Los Angeles, Calif.; New York City; Newark, N.J.; and Toledo, Ohio.

The nine students at Mount Lebanon Junior-Senior High School allegedly raid the files of a credit card authorization center on the West Coast and obtain lists of credit card numbers and expiration dates.

They used the numbers to buy thousands of dollars worth of goods and services, including clothes, sporting goods and computer hardware and software, Howell said.

"They were items that wouldn't attract a lot of attention," he said.

Nevertheless, authorities said, it was a \$140 skateboard bought through an illegally obtained credit card number that triggered the investigation.

"Once you find out this is going on, you start coming up with other names and facts and incidents, and it just pyramids from there," Howell said.

Three more Marcos suits filed

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — The government filed three more suits Thursday seeking the return of a vast fortune it says deposited by President Ferdinand E. Marcos from the country.

One accuses a Marcos associate of taking kickbacks from the Westinghouse Electric Corp. of Pittsburgh.

The new civil suits raise the total number of suits filed against 13 defendants to the government's legal attempt to recoup Marcos' alleged "ill-gotten wealth."

Each seeks return of the \$10 billion the government says Marcos plundered during 20 years in power plus \$2.5 billion in various damages. The three suits raise the total sought so far from more than 100 defendants to 157.7 billion.

One claims businessman Hermino Disini "obtained staggering commissions from Westinghouse in exchange for securing the nuclear plant contract from the Philippine government."

Five killed in Bangladesh fight

DHAKA, Bangladesh (AP) — Rock-throwing protesters battled police Thursday on the second day of a nationwide strike called to demand the resignation of President Lt. Gen. Hussain Mohammad Ershad.

In central Dhaka, riot police opened fire on a crowd of rock-throwing protesters, killing two people and injuring two others, the government said in a statement.

The government said three other people were killed — one each in the port cities of Chittagong, Khulna and in northwestern Sirajganj. The statement did not say how they died.

Local newspapers said that two people were killed when police fired on protesters in Chittagong and Sirajganj and that one person died in Khulna during rioting between protesters and government supporters.

World reacts to Soviet offer

Western European and Japanese leaders Thursday hailed the Soviet Union's proposal to ban medium- and shorter-range nuclear missiles worldwide.

"If it is without conditions we warmly welcome it," said Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher of Britain.

In remarks made public Wednesday night, Kremlin leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev offered to eliminate Soviet medium-range nuclear missiles in Asia if the United States does not insist on keeping 100 medium-range warheads outside Europe.

The Soviet leader also said his country would scrap its shorter-range SS-12 and SS-23 rockets east of the Urals, which the United States has regarded as a threat to China and Japan.

Mrs. Thatcher said an agreement on eliminating nuclear missiles "must be thoroughly verifiable."

Any agreement on nuclear missiles would have to be looked at "in relation to the state of other defenses, in particular chemical and conventional weapons, too," she said.

In Japan, Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone said the proposal "is a policy to welcome."

Six wounded in Haiti shooting

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — Six people were injured Thursday when a plainclothes policeman fired into a crowd of about 2,000 at the end of a peaceful anti-government demonstration, witnesses said.

The shooting triggered a stampede in which protesters smashed store windows.

The State University Hospital admitted two men and four women with gunshot wounds to the arms, legs and buttocks. None appeared to be seriously injured, a hospital official said.

The incident was the latest in a series of clashes between law enforcement authorities and opposition groups demanding the provisional junta led by Lt. Gen. Henri Namphy resign.

Demonstrators were returning at noon to the slum neighborhood of Bel Air, where the rally had begun two hours earlier, when a man ordered them to disperse and then opened fire with a revolver, witnesses said.

The incident took place about 200 yards from police headquarters in downtown Port-au-Prince.

Brazilian police save hostages

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — Police rescued a mother and her 12-year-old daughter and shot to death three gunmen who tried to flee after taking the two hostage during a robbery of their home, officials said Thursday.

The gunmen entered the house of businessman Marcos Ramos on Governor's Island, on Rio's north side, late Wednesday and took his family hostage, police said.

The three gunmen ate and drank wine and whiskey and threatened to kill the mother, Adina Ramos, her 12-year-old daughter, the girl and two boys, ages 10 and 15 — and a 16-year-old neighbor who was visiting, police said.

A suspicious neighbor called police, and 100 state and municipal police led by Brazil's best-known manhunter, police chief Helio Vigi, surrounded the house.

The assailants then took Mrs. Ramos and her daughter, Renata, hostage and tried to escape in the family's car. But police trapped them on the bridge leading from the island, pulled the hostages out during a traffic jam and killed the assailants after a shoot-out in which about 100 shots were fired.

The dead gunmen were identified as Ezequiel Batista, 20, Fernando Da Silva, 18, and a third man only known as "Quito."

91-year-old climber scales Fiji

MOUNT FUJI, Japan (AP) — Hulda Crooks, a 91-year-old mountaineer from Loma Linda, Calif., reached the top of Japan's tallest peak at dawn Friday after a difficult three-day climb. She is the oldest woman to conquer Mount Fuji.

Mrs. Crooks stepped through a special gate marking the top of the sacred 12,385-foot dormant volcano at 2:45 a.m. as a pink sun rose over the horizon and waved an American flag tied to her walking stick.

"It's wonderful," she said, bundled in a down jacket at the summit in near-freezing weather. "You always feel good when you made a goal."

In the last leg of her climb, Mrs. Crooks left a rest hut at 1 a.m. and inched her way up the final 200 yards, resting in a camp chair every few minutes. Hundreds of Dentsu employees followed her with flashlights.

Palestinian cartoonist shot

LONDON (AP) — A Palestinian political cartoonist was shot and critically wounded outside a Kuwaiti newspaper office in London, and police said Thursday they were investigating a possible foreign political motive.

Ali Najj Awad al-Adhami, whose satirical work for Middle Eastern newspapers over the last 25 years is well known in the Arab world, was shot by a lone assailant on Wednesday in London's Finsbury Park district.

Police said Adhami was struck in the head by a single bullet fired at close range from a handgun.

Titanic salvagers make tests

PARIS (AP) — Deep-sea treasure hunters tested a mini-submarine and a robot Thursday in preparation for a disputed salvage mission to the wreck of the Titanic.

The French Institute for Research and Exploitation of the Sea, which sent a ship to the vicinity of the wreck site 350 miles off the coast of Newfoundland on Wednesday, said the \$2.5 million, 54-day expedition could begin Friday.

The institute and the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution of Massachusetts located the Titanic in September 1985 after decades of speculation about the ship's location and condition.

Jihad: No release unless demands met

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Pro-Iranian kidnappers said Thursday they will not free any French captives unless France meets their demands, which include stopping arms sales to Iraq.

Islamic Jihad, or Islamic Holy War, made its declarations in a 32-line statement in Arabic accompanied by a black-and-white picture of French hostage Jean-Paul Kauffmann.

He looked thin and haggard in the photograph and had black circles around his eyes. It was the third Kauffmann picture released by Islamic Jihad in 26 months.

The statement was delivered to the independent Beirut newspaper An-Nahar and a Western news agency after nightfall.

"We assert once again that our demands are clear and the French government knows them perfectly well," the group said. "None of the captives will come alive unless all our demands are fully met."

It did not spell-out the demands. Islamic Jihad previously has demanded the release of 17 comrades — held in Kuwait for the December 1983 bombings of the U.S. and French embassies there and that France stop selling arms to Iraq, with which Iran has been at war since September 1980.

Islamic Jihad's statement denied that it made a telephone threat last Friday to kill two of the four French hostages it holds because France broke diplomatic ties with Iran earlier that day.

Two other Frenchmen are missing in Lebanon, for a total of six, but Islamic Jihad has not claimed responsibility for their disappearances.

France severed relations with Iran in a dispute over the refusal of an Iranian Embassy translator to be questioned by a magistrate investigating terrorist bombings in Paris last September.

The written statement was the first issued by Islamic Jihad since Syria deployed 7,500 troops in west Beirut on Feb. 22 to stop a factional war between Muslim militias.

It accused France of exploiting the reported telephone threat to "issue threats in case any harm befell the captives."

Last Friday, telephone calls made almost simultaneously to two Western news agencies claimed French hostages Marcel Carton and Marcel Fontaine would be killed immediately because of France's decision to sever ties with Iran.

Carton, 63, protocol officer at the French Embassy, and Fontaine, 46, the embassy's vice consul, were abducted separately in west Beirut on March 22, 1983. Islamic Jihad claimed responsibility.

Kauffmann, a 42-year-old journalist, was kidnapped May 22, 1983, along with French research analyst Michel Seurat.

Islamic Jihad claimed March 5, 1986, that it had killed Seurat, 37, in retaliation for France's deportation of two pro-Iranian Iraqi Shiite activists. His body has not been found.

In Thursday's statement, Islamic Jihad gave this repetition of its previous claim that Seurat was dead: "We had executed it (France's) agent Seurat and announced that, without any hesitation."

Survivor relates Mozambique village massacre

MAPUTO, Mozambique (AP) — An American agronomist described Thursday how he watched as armed men marched into a southern Mozambique town, "shooting every person and building in sight," the official news agency reported.

At least 386 people died in the massacre Saturday in the town of Homoine, 300 miles north of Maputo, which was carried out by rebels seeking to overthrow the country's Marxist government, according to the agency, AIM.

AIM identified the agronomist as Mark von Koevering, a 39-year-old

Michigan man working for the Menonite Church on a seed multiplication project. It quoted him as saying he had to hide for 10 hours in a hotel's utility room to save himself.

The agency quoted other survivors as saying the attackers shot, clubbed and bayoneted their victims.

The government blames the attack on the Mozambique National Resistance, or RENAMO. RENAMO denied involvement and claims the government staged the massacre as a propaganda ploy. RENAMO has been fighting 10 years to overthrow the Marxist government of Presi-

dent Joaquim Chissano.

Mozambique has also claimed the rebels who attacked Homoine had been supplied through parachute drops from the air force of neighboring South Africa. The Pretoria government vehemently denied the accusation.

Von Koevering was quoted as saying he heard gunfire at about 5:45 a.m. on Saturday, looked out of his hotel window and saw tracer bullets.

"The fighting continued for a while and then got very loud. There was a tremendous amount of fire," he told AIM, which quoted von Koevering as saying he soon saw people fleeing toward a nearby village where a group of army veterans live.

The American then saw "40 or 50 armed troops coming down the street. I first thought they were probably soldiers from Homoine because they had uniforms and were very well equipped. But they were shooting every person and building in sight," AIM reported.

He was quoted as saying: "They were very well organized. They came in one group with a bearded man in front leading, and directing his people down different streets."

Sugar beet contract talks off to rocky start

TWIN FALLS — Contract negotiations between Idaho and eastern Oregon sugar beet growers and Amalgamated Sugar Co. have begun on a sour note this year, with the two sides \$8-\$9 million apart.

Separated by the widest gap in history, the farmers and the processing company that buys their beets are dickering over changes including cuts in sugar beet prices, longer payment schedules and automatic termination of the pact.

Amalgamated has proposed dropping crop prices paid to growers by about \$1.60 and \$2.30 a ton, depending on sugar concentrations in the beets. Both sides say the reduction would cut income between \$8 and \$9 million.

The company also has proposed spreading out payments over a longer period. Finally, it would cancel part of the contract, the U.S. Department of Agriculture or the federal Commodity Credit Corp., which provides price-support loans to sugar processors, makes any changes in the federal sugar program.

All three company proposals are opposed by the growers, even though Amalgamated has made the unprecedented offer to open at least some of its books for examination.

The Idaho Sugarbeet Growers Association, which negotiates for growers dealing with Amalgamated factories at Twin Falls and Paul, has combined with two other farmer organizations to negotiate the pact this year.

Taken by surprise by the Amal-

gated proposals, the farmers made "one initial demand" for a three-year pact, said Myron Huettig of Hazelton, secretary treasurer of the Idaho association.

Although talks opened on March 13, only one negotiating session has been held to date, he said. For the first time, the combined growers also have hired a professional negotiator, a former CEO of Holly Sugar Co.

Idaho Sugarbeet Association growers are to get a newsletter next week detailing the proposals, Huettig said.

Rick Turner, executive secretary of the Nyssa-Nampa Beet Growers Association, calls the contract offer "incomprehensible," though he is pleased with the chance to look over Amalgamated books.

"It has never been done before; it is a first for the industry," he said. "But we will have to see what they allow us to see."

Turner says negotiations have been cordial so far and feels the contract will be settled eventually, but adds, "Eight million dollars is a lot of money."

Allen Lipman Jr., president of Ogden, Utah-based Amalgamated, says the \$8 million figure could change if company figures are shown to be incorrect. But, "We are serious about pursuing some kind of change in the relationship," he said.

Both sides do agree that after two meetings the contract talks are still in the early stages and that they hope to settle the issue early to avoid crisis negotiations next year over the \$125 million state sugar beet crop.

Currently, the association intends to audit company figures and the company is readying to do a study of growers production costs, Huettig said.

Beet farmers operate under a unique contract system that allows them to negotiate directly with the company, that purchases their products.

Growers are represented by the Nyssa-Nampa association on the western side of the state and eastern Oregon, the Elmore and Owyhee county areas and the Idaho beet growers associations. The farmers and the company sign individual contracts on acreage to be planted while the associations negotiate the broad contracts that regulate prices and payment schedules.

Historically, the two parties have split the proceeds from the sale of the refined sugar on about a 60-40 basis with the largest share going to the growers. Both sides profit when the market is up and lose when it drops.

Lipman said Amalgamated recalculated grower costs based on its figures and USDA regional averages. The figures show the company's return is not commensurate with its investment, he said.

Turner argues the figures used do not accurately reflect the growers' costs. Lipman says figures are sophisticated and accurate, though he is willing to discuss them.

In a letter to members, Turner wrote, "From our viewpoint, the

Craig wants to see ICL objections to park plan

TWIN FALLS — When it comes to a proposal by Rep. Larry Craig to make a national park out of the Boulder-White Clouds, the advice of two chapters of the Idaho Conservation League is "drop it Larry."

But Craig said Tuesday first he wants to see the letter urging him to do so. The first district Republican says he hasn't received it yet.

Craig didn't sound any less enthusiastic about his idea trotted out several months ago as a way of preserving natural resources while building the tourist economy.

"I don't want Idaho to become another Appalachia. If we are not careful in some areas of the state this will happen," says Craig referring to places such as Sulmon and Challis.

The Wood River Valley and Stanley ICL chapters say the single most valuable asset in the region is the area to support economic growth in central Idaho is to support a wilderness designation for the White Cloud, Boulder, Pioneer and Smoky mountains, says an ICL press release.

ICL criticized Craig for not sending out a questionnaire on the national park issue to people affected by the study.

"This is a state issue, not a pro-chlorine issue," Craig says. And the government won't let him use his free mailing privileges outside his first district which doesn't include the Boulder-White Clouds area, he says.

Most of the ICL chapters' 260 members depend on central Idaho's recreation economy and most local businesses support more wilderness, ICL says.

Region IV development plan includes data base, projects

TWIN FALLS — An 1987-1988 economic development plan for the Magic Valley approved by Region IV Development Association board of directors at its meeting Thursday.

The plan, called the Overall Economic Development Plan, includes a rundown on the strengths and weaknesses of the economy of the Magic Valley and a list of possible projects. The federal government requires an annual OEDP from authorized districts before qualifying for funds under the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965.

The key to the economic development strategy is planning, according to the report. In order to do this, Region IV plans to develop a data base with profiles on communities, infrastructure, industries and other economic factors.

The corporation plans to work with the College of Eastern Idaho in establishing the data base.

The next step will be to develop economic development plans for each county, then use the data base

and county economic development plans to form a district-wide economic development plan.

The plan also says the Magic Valley economy is suffering because it is based primarily on agriculture.

To remedy this, Region IV says it will concentrate its efforts on economic diversification, and on local business and tourism development.

The OEDP includes more than 100 potential projects in Blaine, Camas, Cassia, Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln, Minidoka and Twin Falls counties and four projects to benefit the entire region.

Joe Herring, executive director of Region IV, said his efforts are going to be concentrated on developing a Southern Idaho Development Center and finding a use for the Jerome Tupperware plant.

Tupperware Co. recently announced it will close its plant in Jerome. The plant will be closed in phases, starting later this year. More than 700 workers will be affected by the closure.

Herring would not comment on what angle Region IV is taking to fill the Tupperware plant, saying the plans are too tentative for comment.

Jerome Mayor Ralph Peters said at the meeting that Tupperware has not decided yet what they will do with the plant.

"We have not gotten word that they will be closing the plant," Peters said. "Until then nothing can be done with Tupperware."

The Southern Idaho Development Center is envisioned as a facility to include all the development activities for the region, according to the plan.

The center would include the Idaho Small Business Development Center, which has already been established, to act as an incubator for small business development, assistance, provide training to improve the competitiveness of the Magic Valley labor pool and assist the area in international trade development.

Other potential projects include a center for tourists at the intersection of U.S. 93 and Interstate 84, improvements to Magic Mountain Ski Area and a convention center in Twin Falls County.

Herring said about \$2.5 million was provided through various grant and loan funds for projects last year.

School district cuts deficit

CASTLEFORD — The Castleford School District has reduced its deficit from \$16,000 to \$10,000, said Superintendent Ron Erickson at the School Board meeting Tuesday night.

"We were hoping to knock out the deficit," said Erickson, "but because the state reduced the final ADA (average daily attendance) appropriations we're short about \$4,000 in our ADA payment."

The amount of money school districts receive from the state, calculated in terms of classroom units, was overestimated by the state by \$45 per classroom unit during the past year, leaving the last payment to all districts short.

"Fiscally, we have improved our position substantially, and the deficit should be taken care of by the

Home builders official advises caution in face of slowdown

TWIN FALLS — The National Association of Home Builders is warning its 962 Idaho members of a looming slowdown in housing markets based on expectations of higher interest rates.

Shirley McVay Wiseman, its third-ranking officer, said home contractors should be "very cautious" in building houses and in buying land through the end of the year.

Increases in mortgage interest rates are likely to cut significantly the sales in many areas of the country, said Wiseman, vice president and treasurer of the 138,000-member trade group.

Speaking at the annual convention of the

Idaho Building Contractors Association in Twin Falls, Wiseman said NAHB Economist Dave Siders and other experts are forecasting a rate rise of as much as 1 1/2 percent in the next few months.

"The increase would boost the prevailing conventional mortgage rate close to 11 1/2 percent. At that level, there will be a definite decline" in home sales, she said later in an interview.

Each 1 percent hike in mortgage interest rates 450,000 prospective buyers out of the market.

Effects on the new home market in Idaho — depressed for several years — are less certain. IBCA President Lyle Frazier of Twin Falls said local building permits for new homes have fallen behind last year, a

"distressed year."

Most new construction has taken place in the high-priced category above \$80,000, he said. Those typically are large homes built by higher-income families.

Part of the reason is a hefty inventory of existing homes in medium and modest price ranges.

Wiseman, in line to become the association's first woman president in 1989, also took Idaho's Congressional delegation to task for voting against a bill authorizing federal housing programs.

The legislation, which has passed both houses of Congress and now faces a threatened veto by President Ronald Reagan, would prohibit new user fees paid by

homebuyers and prevent a hike in Federal Housing Administration mortgage insurance premium to 5 percent, proposed by the Reagan Administration, from the current 3.5 percent.

The bill also would raise limits for FHA-insured mortgages to \$101,000 from \$90,000 in the highest-priced markets in the nation. The current Twin Falls area limit is \$67,500.

Wiseman cited a NAHB survey of 1,500 households saying that Congress should override any veto of the housing bill.

Last year, the FHA ran out of money six times, forcing prospective buyers to delay purchases and miss financing opportunities, Wiseman said. She also con-

tested views of the legislation as too expensive.

However, a spokesman for Sen. Jim McClure said the bill clearly is a budget buster based on expected costs.

"Our position has always been that the best thing for the housing industry is to balance the budget, to get the government out of the economy as much as possible," said Chief Legislative Aide Jack Gerard. A balanced budget would lower interest rates and make housing more affordable, he said.

The IBCA continues its annual convention at the Holiday Inn in Twin Falls through Saturday. The meeting includes a small trade show.

Gooding School District seeks coverage in state insurance pool

GOODING — The Gooding School District will be among the last districts to join the state insurance pool, after two large suits were filed against the district last year.

Superintendent Lester Diehl told the board at its July meeting that the district is being dropped by Farmer's Insurance Group and will have to seek Idaho school districts are already part of the pool, which was established because of the difficulties government agencies were having two years ago getting liability coverage.

Farmer's coverage will end Oct. 10, and Diehl has been authorized to seek new insurance with the state school pool.

"All it takes is a couple of lawsuits," Diehl said about the district losing coverage.

The two large lawsuits filed against the district last year were the result of injuries to students.

A \$200,000 claim filed by Ricky and Susan Heffley on behalf of their son Glenn was settled out of court this spring. The Heffleys claimed their son was injured Feb. 10 during a physical education class at Gibbons Elementary School when he attempted "some form of tumble."

A \$2.55 million suit was filed last year by Russell and Rose Czapliski in the Jan. 6 death of their son Garrett. The first-grade student died following a fall at Gibbons Elementary School.

Also named in the suit is the Gooding Ambulance Service and owner Gilbert Schmidt. Schmidt and the district have filed motions naming each other as

Hot tub proposal wins support

TWIN FALLS — While the state is pondering whether to issue regulations for hot tubs and spas, the idea has won backing of the local environmental health director and health club operators.

Pools are regulated by the state and city but hot tubs aren't. "The demons bacteria thrives in hot water, says Alan Biermann, environmental health director, South Central District Health Department. The bacteria can produce a rash, he says.

Biermann says public hot tubs should be regulated.

Jim Jenkins, manager of The Club, 798 Falls Ave., and Gary Clawson, manager of the Twin Falls Athletic Club, Pole Line Road East, agree on the need for

regulation.

It has been talked about since 1983 but there is no money to accomplish it, Biermann says.

"We're currently short-handed in the programs we have," he says.

Jerry Yoder, state Division of Environment water quality engineer, told The Associated Press the drafting of regulations has stopped and he is unsure if the project will resume. Yoder could not be reached for comment Wednesday.

Biermann estimated there are 100 to 150 hot tubs in the eight county area covered by the South Central Health District.

He says he has no way of knowing the number of health problems related to hot tubs because knowledge by pseudonyms are not reportable to the district.

There are many variables involved in determining whether hot tubs will harbor bacteria including

the type of construction, their filtration and the management of chlorine, says Biermann.

Clawson of the Twin Falls Athletic Club says he would support state regulations within reason. He says he uses a book that comes with the hot tub to maintain the hot tub at his facility.

Jenkins of The Club says he uses a combination of ultraviolet light, chlorine draining the water and changing the filters to keep his two hot tubs clean.

Neither club has had reports of rashes from members who use the hot tubs, the managers say.

People who buy hot tubs for their homes get a full orientation on how to safely maintain the water, says Yoder. The manager, Snake River Pool and Spa, service and maintenance director.

Utah's chief federal judge accused of erring in drug case

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Utah's chief federal judge abused his authority by refusing to allow key prosecution witnesses to testify at pretrial hearings when he dismissed drug charges against a Boulder, Colo., U.S. attorney says.

U.S. Attorney Brent Ward and Assistant U.S. Attorney Wayne Dance filed a notice of appeal and five-page statement Wednesday with the 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals that challenges a ruling issued two weeks ago by U.S. District Chief Judge Bruce S. Jenkins.

A clerk for Jenkins said Thursday his policy is not to comment on court cases.

In his ruling, Jenkins scolded Dance for acting "spasmodically and

reluctantly" in his prosecution of M.K. Fadel, who was charged with four felony cocaine counts.

Jenkins dismissed all charges against Fadel, 49, with prejudice meaning they cannot be refilled. The judge said the government failed to refute Fadel's claim that he was entrapped by a government informant with whom he had a sexual relationship.

Jenkins' ruling and the prosecutors' notice of appeal disagree sharply over what happened during pretrial hearings in the case held May 21 and June 24.

Jenkins says Dance failed to respond to four opportunities he gave him to present evidence to refute Fadel's claims; Dance says Jenkins refused to allow him to present

witnesses and made several errors of law.

It's not the first time Jenkins and Dance have clashed: Earlier this year, the judge and prosecutor exchanged barbs during a major cocaine trial involving eight defendants. Later, Jenkins ruled that comments Dance made in his final rebuttal statement constituted misconduct, though it did not prejudice the jury.

In the Fadel case, a federal grand jury issued an indictment against Fadel and co-defendant Carl E. Schettler on March 25. In his motion to dismiss, Fadel claimed he was entrapped by government informant Kar Sugar, a woman he had known before but had seen little of in the last three years.

Fadel said Sugar renewed the friendship in March 1986, at a time when she was working as an informant. Eventually, the relationship became sexual and Sugar, claiming financial hardship, pressed Fadel to help her get into the cocaine business, according to Fadel's sworn statement.

Fadel admitted that he provided financing to Sugar, arranged two cocaine buys and then sold an ounce of cocaine to Charles Hafan, an undercover South Salt Lake police officer.

But Fadel claimed he was induced to commit the offenses by Sugar and was not predisposed to such criminal behavior.

Central to the entrapment issue was whether the prosecution contested Fadel's assertions. If Dance

could establish a factual dispute on that point, then, according to several legal precedents, the issue must be presented to a jury.

Jenkins ruled Dance never presented evidence contesting the entrapment, therefore there was nothing to present to a jury.

In the government's notice of appeal, Dance disagrees. The prosecutors claim Jenkins "abused his judicial discretion" by refusing to defer ruling on the entrapment until after the jury had heard the judge, whether Jenkins erred in dismissing the entire case and whether he failed his judicial obligation to "secure fairness," seek a "just determination" of the matter and "to the end that the truth may be ascertained," as required by federal rules.

Bangerter says extradition of MacKay being evaluated

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Gov. N. Bangerter says an Illinois court ruling has given him some leeway in deciding whether to grant an extradition request for Utah businessman Michael MacKay, who is charged in the death of a Chicago-area worker.

MacKay, a vice-president of the now-defunct Film Recovery Systems Inc., and four other company executives were charged in the 1983 cyanide poisoning death of Stefan Golab, a plant worker at Elk Grove, Ill. Film Recovery recovered silver from used X-ray film by dipping it into a chemical solution containing cyanide.

Three officials were convicted of murder and reckless conduct and sentenced to prison, but Bangerter and his predecessor, Scott McInneson, have thrice denied Illinois' requests to extradite MacKay.

The appellate court's recent ruling upheld a lower court decision that business firms and their executives cannot be prosecuted under state laws for allowing workers to be exposed to dangerous working conditions, when the workers consent.

"On the surface it appears this gives-us a little more wiggle room" in deciding whether to grant the request, Bangerter said at his monthly televised news conference.

However, the governor noted the Illinois ruling followed a U.S. Supreme Court decision holding that federal courts can force states to extradite fugitives, and said the state's legal counsel was evaluating the possible ramifications.

Bangerter said he had not received a fourth extradition request, but was consulting the attorney general's office for an update on the state's possible response should the request arrive.

But he said public workers resented being used as "whipping boys" for the state's economic troubles and said the UPEA, which endorsed and supported the state's 1984 campaign, would reserve judgment on which gubernatorial candidate to support in the 1988 election.

Rhetor Potter, executive director of the UPEA, said Thursday that Bangerter's request that department heads eliminate 464 more jobs is "galling" to those who remain, particularly when they have received most-of-their or merit raises in the past five years.

Officials pessimistic about building site

RIGBY (AP) — After meeting with U.S. Postal Service officials this week, Rigby city leaders said they are pessimistic about their chances of receiving a decision to build a new post office on the outskirts of town.

The city wants the facility constructed closer to downtown.

The city offered them several concessions, we received no concessions from them," City Attorney Keith Walker said. "I feel backed up against the wall."

Highway Mayor Keith Shack said he expected more from the meeting.

"It's hard to negotiate when you don't know what you are negotiating for. I don't know what more can be done," he said.

City officials offered to waive sewer, water and garbage fees for several years and provide free snow removal for the life of the building.

They also offered to clean up ground possibly contaminated from gas tanks in the area.

The concessions were an attempt to lower the cost of the proposed building, which is likely to cost \$1 million.

Representatives also told postal officials they had not planned for the costs of installing street lights and upgrading the road system to the proposed building site.

Postal office officials from Salt Lake City and Pocatello considered the proposals during a recess from a two-hour session at the Idaho Falls office of Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho.

They then replied that the price of locating the post office downtown was "well apart" from their proposed location, Walker said.

He said a formal written list of proposed concessions was being mailed to postal officials for further consideration.

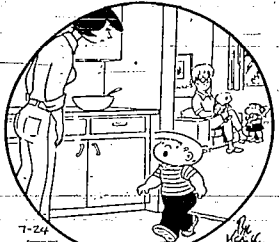

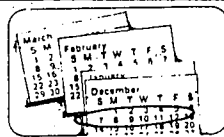

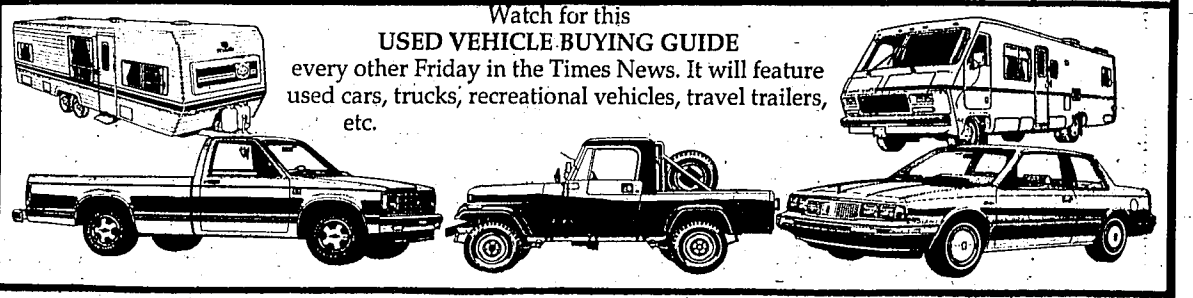

"A disputant no more cares for the truth than the sportsman for the hare."

Hot words were exchanged over South's play of today's trump suit. However, North and South were so embroiled over trumps that they both missed the best play for game.

South won his club ace and had eyes only for his trump suit. He led a heart to dummy's king and led a trump, gazing "upstairs" when East followed low. He chose to finesse, losing his seven to West's queen. West exited safely in clubs and the game was doomed. Since South could manage to take one finesse in diamonds but not a second, the defenders ended up with two trump tricks and two diamonds for one down.

"Why didn't you go up with your trump king at trick two?" inquired North. "That would have cinched the game."

"That's purely a result comment," retorted South. "My play in trumps wins not only when East has the queen but also when he has A-Q-x. When trumps are 2-2, it is purely a 50-50 guess."

Left unmentioned was the diamond suit, which offered a 75 percent chance for two winners via two finesses.

At trick two, South should lead the trump king from his hand, willing to lose two trump tricks while trying to drop a singleton queen. Later, after trumps are gone, he plays dummy's two heart entries for two diamond finesses, scoring 10 tricks without the need for good guessing.

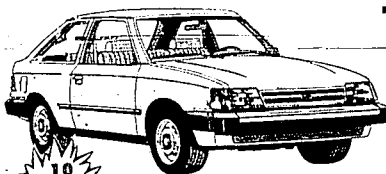

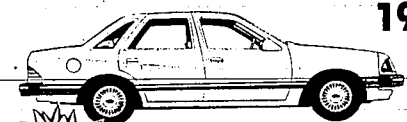

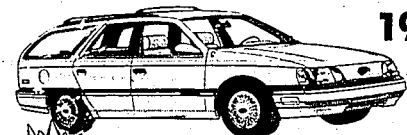

Braun Brothers: 20 musical years

With a little help from their friends, the Brauns are celebrating their Idaho brand of music this weekend in Stanley

STANLEY — Several inches of sawdust cover the floor and lap up the legs of each table in the bar. From any seat you can see the sun treading toward the sharp ridges and peaks of the Sawtooth Mountain Range. A light wind blows across the Stanley Basin into the outdoor bar, variously called "the beer garden" and "the Pavilion," built this spring next to the Mountain Village in Stanley. The bartender smiles a cowboy smile. On the stage in the corner of the bar, Muzzie Braun looks out at the mountains as he plugs his guitar into a new amplifier — strum, s-t-u-m-m-m.

At 7 p.m., just an hour before he'll begin playing for the folks in Stanley — a town with a population of 89, Muzzie Braun sits at one of the tables sipping a coffee. The oldest of the three Braun brothers, Muzzie wears jeans and cowboy boots. His black felt hat is tipped slightly back, revealing lively eyes and a tightly cropped black beard.

Muzzie has been playing solo for the past 10 days at the Pavilion — it's an inauguration of sorts. This weekend his brothers will join him for a 20th anniversary reunion performance.

The bartender ambles across the sawdust floor carrying a half empty glass coffee pot. He fills Braun's cup. "The dregs?" Braun asks.

The bartender smiles again and then laughs. Twin Falls, 1967 — Muzzie Braun, 17, the oldest son of Musky and Becky Braun, forms a rock and roll band with his younger brothers. They call the band The Syndicate. By his own account, Muzzie "just stood there and sang" as brother Gary, then 15, played drums and brother Billy, just 13, played a wild electric guitar. "We weren't all bad," says Muzzie.

Stanley, 1987 — Twenty years later, after several Braun Brothers albums, after many solo Braun albums, after becoming intermountain celebrities, after spilling up, pursuing solo careers and family lives, and after a new Braun generation — The Little Braun Brothers — have graced many Idaho stages, it's finally time for a family reunion, the 20-year reunion of Muzzie, Gary and Billy Braun.

It happens tomorrow at the Mountain Village Pavilion in Stanley. The music begins at 5 p.m. and continues until 8 p.m. Tickets are \$7 for adults and \$2 for children under 12. At 8 p.m. there will be a barbecue costing \$6.55.

Muzzie says the five-hour affair will include six different musical sets, spanning the 20 years of Braun Brothers music.

Muzzie Braun will perform songs from his two latest albums, "Muzzie" and "Born a Hundred Years Too Late." The Billy Braun Band, a three-piece group Billy has formed in Boise, will play songs from their latest album, "Someone Waits for You." Muzzie's sons, The Little Braun Brothers, all of whom are under 11, will also be called on stage to perform a set. For the finale, the Braun Brothers plan to go back 20 years, back to The Syndicate times, to resurrect some '60s rock and

roll. Along with the Braun Brothers, many musicians will perform, including Les Fairchild, Keith Carroll, Dennis Tubbs, Del Rupert and Carter Wilson. These musicians and others from around Idaho, says Muzzie, played with the Braun Brothers Band and with the Brauns individually throughout the Braun's 20 years.

It's been a decade since the Braun Brothers have really played as a group, says Muzzie as he finishes his coffee. "I've done four albums since then," he says. He's also had four children.

Indeed, The Little Braun Brothers may be the most up-and-coming group of the reunion show. Muzzie's children seem to be following in their dad's musical footsteps. Cody, 10, Willy, 9, Gary, 7, and Micky, 5, will be plugged-in-on-stage, singing their own version of the western classic "Home on the Range" as well as a few originals.

"It's a kick in the pants to watch them and play with them," Muzzie says of his kids. "I'm teaching them all how to play. Cody plays the fiddle, Willy plays the drums. Gary plays the keyboards and Micky is learning the bass."

This fall The Little Braun Brothers and Muzzie will travel around and play to other kids at elementary schools in Idaho. Muzzie's also interested in recording a Little Braun Brothers album. "I'd like it to be a kids album," he says.

It sounds curious, four children under 11 years old traveling around Idaho to play music — what about their school? The family lives 40 miles from Stanley in a house without electricity, telephone connections or hot water. "We live in an isolated area," Muzzie says. "So we teach our kids at home. You just adjust to it."

Perhaps the isolation is part of the musical spark that drives Muzzie Braun. As a teenager, Muzzie was the songwriter for The Syndicate. Now Muzzie says that songs evolve for him. "It can start with anything," he says. "An occurrence, a place I visit, a person I meet. Basically a song starts with a lyric. For me the lyric is more dominant than the musical structure, at least at first."

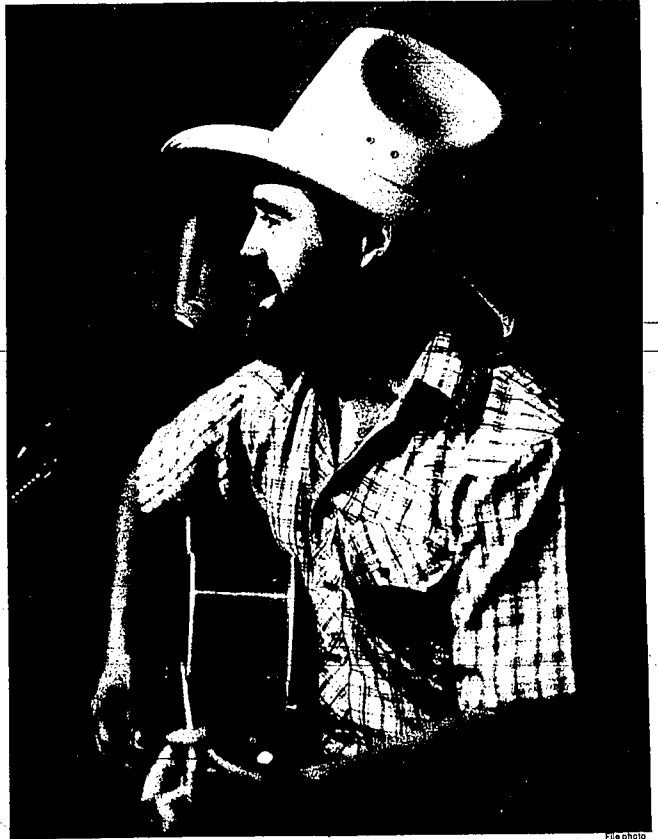
During a telephone interview from Boise, Muzzie's brother, Billy, joked, "don't believe anything Muzzie says about the reunion." He pauses. "Just kidding."

The Billy Braun Band, a trio from Boise, just put out an album, "Someone Waits for You." Billy says, "the album is a compilation of songs from the '40s, '50s and '60s. There are quite a few songs that our father used to play." Billy's father, Musky Braun, was a well-known Idaho entertainer for many years.

Of the reunion, Billy says, "It's real exciting, kind of an anthology reunion. Everyone will play all of their old songs."

After the reunion this weekend, The Billy Braun Band will be playing at Angell's Bar and Grill in Boise. They will be at the Sandpiper in Twin Falls Aug. 26-29.

On Sunday, July 26, there will be a musicians' yard sale and auction, Muzzie smiles, "a place for musicians to sell their old junk." Afterward, all the musicians will tune up for the Idaho "Jam" session. Muzzie says it will

be an interesting show, with lots of other Idaho performers playing along with the Braun Brothers. "We've got the tables and the sawdust floor. Over the fence, the sun formers playing along with mail, sending cassettes to each beans the last rays of the day over the jagged Sawtooth Range. Muzzie tunes his guitar, thinking Muzzie walks through the sawdust back to the stage perhaps, of 20 years ago.

Valenti came to the conclusion after talks with Soviet officials in charge of the movie industry, Alexander N. Komshchalov, and Elem Klimov, head of the Cinematographers Union and a major force in film making.

But he said it was too soon to tell whether the Soviet Union would enter a new era by accepting more films made in the West and, in turn, producing more Soviet movies for the world market.

"There are possibilities here that never existed before," Valenti said in an interview before his departure. "Soviet leader Mikhail

S. Gorbachev really wants refreshing winds of change to blow. He said Soviet officials went to get more involved in international cinema marketing, obtain more American films for Soviet audiences and enter into more co-production agreements or joint ventures, with foreign concerns.

But Komshchalov said that the Soviet Union can spend only \$2.5 million a year for all foreign films. Valenti reported, adding that only 15 American films were sold here in the last five years — for very low prices, ranging from \$40,000 to \$250,000 each.

Valenti said he suggested that perestroika, or restructuring, be applied to the method of paying for American or other foreign films.

Rather than a flat price for each picture, Valenti said, films should

Artist donates landscape to state

TWIN FALLS — Internationally known artist, Frank Mason, visited the Magic Valley this week to complete a landscape painting which he will donate to the state of Idaho. Mason says that he is donating the painting because he wants to show his love for the Gem state.

The artist made his first visit to Idaho in 1953 and fell in love with Sun Valley and the surrounding areas. He says that he was impressed with paintings by Thomas Moran, especially one of Shoshone Falls painted in the early 1900s.

Mason also plans to paint the falls during a later visit to Idaho. This week he chose to do Sun Valley landscapes, finishing a work entitled "Trail Creek," which he presented to the state of Idaho Thursday night at the Rosemary Baker Gallery in Boise.

Mason was raised by parents who had artistic interests. His father was a collector of 19th century paintings and his mother was a musician and painter. When he was just 12 years-old, Mason began a three-year apprenticeship with Manuel Reyes, the Spanish painter and poet. At age 16, he transferred to the Music and Arts High School in New York. After high school, he studied under Frank DuMont and George Bridgeman at the Art Students League in New York. When DuMont died, Mason took his place on the staff, where he has taught for the last 35 years.

In his teaching and painting, Mason believes in the timeless new in art, borrowing many techniques from the old masters. He

grinds colors and cooks them in varnish and prepares his canvases from fine linens. In addition to landscapes, Mason paints religious iconography, human figures, still life and portraits.

In 1962, Mason was awarded the Cross of Merit by the Sovereign Military Order of Malta in recognition of eight paintings which were hung permanently in the 11th Century Church of San Giovanni of Malta in Venice. Mason is the only American to receive this award, and the first artist to have received it in 400 years. He has also received numerous prestigious commissions and awards. His portrait subjects have included the late Prince Giacomo Colonna of Venice, Averell Harriman, John Cardinal Wright, Louis Auchincloss and Thomas Wolfe.

One of Mason's greatest contributions to art, according to one art journal, has been the conservation and restoration of art of the past. He was recently elected president of the International Society of Preservation of the Arts, a group that is currently lobbying for the proper restoration of the Sistine Chapel in Rome.

Mason is also working toward environmental preservation here, in the United States. "I feel that as a major painter in the country I must use my gifts to record the beauty," he says.

Mason says he is glad that Idahoans are aware of the need for preservation of the Sawtooth Ranges. He feels that Idaho should turn into "condominium city" and says, "Your children will curse you on your graves for this."

"We have had to fight or we would not have had the Grand Canyon," he says. "Little is left but Idaho."

Reeves returns in 'Superman IV'

TWIN FALLS—The following are brief reviews of movies playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times reviewers.

SUPERMAN IV: THE QUEST FOR PEACE. The Man of Steel (Christopher Reeve) returns to do battle with the nefarious genius Lex Luthor (Gene Hackman) once again — this time the stakes are much higher: nuclear war. Also stars Margot Kidder, Mariel Hemingway and Jon Cryer. Directed by Sidney J. Furie.

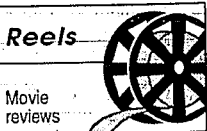
INNERSPACE (PG). Densely inventive and consistently hilarious, this tale of technological miniaturization and personal growth is blessed with two warm and marvelously adroit actors to carry it along. Dennis Quaid, as the relentlessly macho yet quite vulnerable test pilot, has gotten a corner on the securely sexy American male roles, while Martin Short, a brilliant Canadian actor-comedian, serves as there; not may be anything he cannot do. Directed non-nonsensically by Joe Dante, "Innerspace" is certainly crammed with action, but it is one of the rare Spielberg-touched productions that does not suffer from numbing gargantuanism.

LA BAMBA (PG-13). A cinematic biography of Ritchie Valens, a young rocker who made it big before dying at 17. Stars Lou Diamond Phillips, Esai Morales, Danielle von Zerneck and Elizabeth Pena. Written and directed by Luis Valdez.

DRAGNET (PG-13). It is a shame that decisions were made to interrupt this fine celebration of the old show with slam-bang car-crashes, silly gang rituals and other Big Movieisms. A double shame, because there are patches of brilliant dialogue in the script by Dan Aykroyd, Alan Zweibel and director, Tom Mankiewicz. Aykroyd and Tom Grammer play off each other with Paul Hanks effect. It makes the film seem absolutely schizophrenic.

JAWS THE REVENGE (PG-13) Uh, oh — that big ole bad great white is back again, and this time he means business. Stars Michael Caine, Mario Van Peebles and Lou Revino. Garry. Directed by Joseph Sargent.

PREDATOR (R). A military rescue unit — led by Arnold Schwarzenegger in a terminal glow — hacks through a jungle rotten with snakes, vultures, poisonous reptiles and skinned corpses only to run into a murderous extraterrestrial, a monster that dresses like a robot with dreadlocks and kills them one by one while dripping green goo over everything. This high-tech-v.-Stone Age action saga has a high-



tech production (brilliant Don McAlpine photography, punchy Alan Silvestri music, flashy direction by John McPurren) and a Stone-Age script, one of the emptiest and most derivative in years.

ROBOCOP (R). This comic book-style sci-fi actioner about a automated cop — in a futuristic Detroit where private industry has taken over the police — has been assembled with ferocious, gleeful expertise. It is crammed with humor, cynicism and jolts of energy. The script nastily parodies everything from vacuous TV commentators to dope dealers to cut-throat corporate warfare; it satirizes a society — an exaggeration of our own — where every tendency toward dehumanization and centralization has gone helter-skelter out of control. Directed by Paul Verhoeven — aided by top-notch Hollywood pros — does a sensational job here; this may be the best action movie of the year.

'Summer School': Believable teens

HOLLYWOOD — In the bright and buoyant "Summer School," it is countdown time at Oceanfront High. With only seconds to go before the start of summer vacation, gym teacher Freddy Shoop (Mark Harmon) is ready to rush off to Hawaii with a blonde — only to find himself strong-armed into teaching remedial English.

Laid-back Freddy, alas, needs to shape up just as badly as his students, and that is part of the fun of "Summer School." It is no thigh-slapper like "Back to School" with Rodney Dangerfield, but it is exceptionally good-natured and perceptive, and Harmon, in his first starring screen role, is a real charmer. His Freddy wears Hawaiian shirts as well as Tom Selleck does, and Freddy is equally disinclined to take life too seriously. At first he even has the notion that he and the kids can party away the summer.

His students are virtually his counterparts, yet each is so much an individual they all need to be identified and described. There are the irrepressible prankster buddies Chainsaw (Dean

Cameron), so nicknamed for his passion for horsing around, and Dave (Gary Riley), blond surfer Pam (Courtney Thorne-Smith), who would love to make waves with the teacher; pretty Denise (Kelly Minter), whose dyslexia has never been diagnosed; nerdy Alan (Richard Steven Horvitz); good-looking Larry (Ken Olandt), whose chronic sleepiness has a surprising cause; lovely foreign student Anna-Maria (Fabrizio Udine); and pregnant, unwed Rhonda (Shawnice Smith), whose plight brings out a sweet protectiveness in a football player (Patrick Laborteaux).

The course of "Summer School" is easy enough to predict, yet it is not just another routine teen summer movie. What sets it apart from most of its kind is that director Carl Kichell and writer Jeff Yanflin (who collaborated on the original story with Stuart Birnbaum and David Dashev) clearly care for these youngsters. "Summer School" is not just one more depiction of teenagers as all emotion and no thoughts except of sex.

These are all likable, almost unbelievably articulate kids, but, like Freddy, they need to grow up. They need to discover why it is important to have an education and to take responsibility for themselves. As Freddy becomes aware of these things, he realizes that he has a gift for communicating with youngsters in the classroom as well on the football field. Harmon as Freddy is so convincing that there is no reason why the film makers should not have depicted him, if only for a few seconds, teaching the kids how to write a sentence, the parts of speech and how they fit together. Learning, after all, is a pleasure — and if it is not, you really have not learned; "Summer School" might have spelled out this truth a bit more clearly.

Better, who appears briefly as a teacher with a winning lottery ticket, knows how to keep things flowing gracefully, and "Summer School" certainly looks good. There is much pleasant, easy rapport between Freddy and Kirstie Alley as a witty, gorgeous brunette teacher who knows what being adult is all about. Robin Thomas as the priest, self-indulgent, principled, is an amusingly perfect example of why kids can be so apathetic about school. 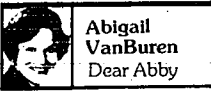

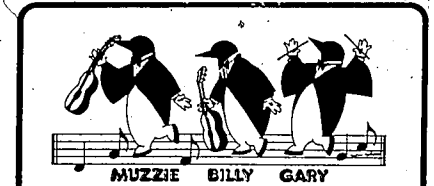
Collector has whopper shell

Harper transforms her character from Rhoda to supermom Valerie

She looks familiar — comforting, nurturing — why, it's sitcom mom! Sitcom mom is everywhere — counseling the children, driving the car to work. One of the most prominent of these moms is played by Valerie Harper on NBC's "Valerie," which airs Mondays.

Harper's character, Valerie Hogan, may sound like a typical suburban mom. But look closer. Valerie Hogan manages to typify just about every conception of the modern woman. She has a husband (she's married), but he's a pilot and is always jetting off to Tokyo (she's kind of divorced). She is almost single-handedly raising three children (single mom) and holding down a job (working woman). But it's not really a career, because she's at-home a lot (stay-at-home-mom). But the job has arty pretensions (cultured mom). It's as if Jane Wyatt from "Father Knows Best" woke up in the body of Mary Richards on "Mary Tyler Moore." It's the new version of having it all: It's having a little bit of everything.

Not only has Harper combined various views of the modern woman, she has also built upon her own past TV persona. From Rhoda Morgenstern, the single, wisecracking neighbor on "Mary Tyler Moore," she progressed to marriage and divorce on "Rhoda." "Valerie" was the logical next step, a married woman with children. And while Harper may typify the new breed of sitcom moms, she has one up on the competition in believability. Her sitcom-mom contemporaries, like Maggie Seaver (Joanna Kerns) on ABC's "Growing Pains," and Elyse Keaton (Meredith Baxter-Birney) on NBC's "Family Ties" may be spighttler, but they're not as real. Elyse rarely acts like a mom, except when she carries her 5-year-old around. And the problems Maggie deals with are on the level of helping her son decide who to take to a dance. For the most part, neither's problems transcend the superficial. "Valerie" sometimes resorts to pat endings, but the show conveys a sense that Valerie occasionally wishes she could ditch it all and run off to Club Med. She doesn't have all the answers — and sometimes even the questions are different. The much-ballyhooed "Valerie" episode on contraceptives, for instance, showed a baffled mom dealing with her son's sexuality, while an episode



where her husband (Josh Taylor) was on strike showed a woman who was used to her freedom and didn't want to give it up.

For all her comfortable confusion, however, it is not Harper's "Every Woman" stance or "Rhoda" past that carries the show. Its success is due largely to the presence of Jason Bateman as her teen-age son David. (There are also twins — Mark, the smart one, and Willie, the athletic

one.) David, paralleling his sitcom mom, has all the necessary components of the modern male. He's cute (pin-up material), sensitive (he realizes that raising children is hard work) and with dad gone, he is unofficial man of the house (power). But he's also brash enough and handy enough with the girls to be a real red-blooded American boy. Less surreal than college student-going-on-bank-chairman Alex Keaton ("Family Ties"), less cocky than Mike Seaver ("Growing Pains"), David is an aw-shucks kinda guy you'd love to take home to mom. If Valerie is "Everymom," David is "Everyteen."

So what is "Valerie" — throwback or trend setter? Well, it's almost like a '50s sitcom trapped in an '80s sensibility, trying to be all things to all people.

performed on record and stage with some of popular music's best-known artists and has earned an equally impressive reputation in the advertising industry, singing in scores of commercials.

Critics have characterized her style as "classy and elegant," with "a way of blending uptown

sophistication with the street-corner grit." Her performances combine "touches of soul and funk, with generous helpings of romance and danceable rhythms," wrote one reviewer, and another called her "one of the most talented and accomplished pop singers in music today."

Lemmon-the-younger comes into his own

NEW YORK (AP) — When your name is Chris Lemmon, the comparisons are inevitable, especially when you have all those great little speech mannerisms and look so much like your father, Jack Lemmon.

But thanks to a cathartic film role opposite his father, a series of commercials for a men's cologne and a standout supporting role on the Fox Broadcasting Co. sitcom "Duet," Lemmon-the-younger has come into his own.

He had struggled for years to carve out an acting career for himself. Until the well-written Fox comedy came his way, he said, he had eschewed situation comedy because of a bad experience in the failed NBC series "Brothers and Sisters" over a decade ago.

Lemmon, 33, said people mistakenly assume that the son of a famous actor would have no trouble getting cast on his own.

"People say, 'Oh, yeah, it's Lemmon's kid. He's never had to work.' I got news for 'em all. You're dead wrong. It made it twice as tough," he said.

"They really make you prove yourself, and they constantly expect you to be as good as your parent, who's had 35-40 years more experience. And that's the worst thing they can do to young actors, the comparisons."

Lemmon said he and his father always "got along great," but he had difficulty in his younger years accepting the burden of being identified as "Jack Lemmon's son."

"The way I dealt with being identified as a thing and not as a person was to overcompensate, to come on too strong, to constantly try to be the center of attention. 'Hey, look at me. I'm not Jack Lemmon's son. I'm Chris Lemmon, and I'm funny, and I'm the center of attention. I'm the big man on campus.' Well, of course, I was immediately ostracized," he said. "So I was very lonely during my high-school years. I was a really solo unit, and it was very tough at times."

He said that changed after he was cast as Josh Fairchild, TV-actor son of movie mogul Harvey Fairchild, in Blake Edwards' touching film about family love, "That's Life."

"When I finally got a chance, thanks to Blake, to give that character those idiosyncracies and those problems, it was like a purging, and it was a very healthy thing for me as a human being to portray Josh Fairchild, and thusly get out my ghosts, get my skeletons out of the closet."

"To be honest with you, our relationship, which was great to begin with, my father's and my relationship, since that film it's grown twice as strong. I think probably that's because I'm ready to be his son now."

In the lean years, Lemmon, a classical pianist, composer and writer in his spare time, supported a passion for skating with work in commercials.

By the time he landed the role of Richard Phillips, the Yuppie best friend on "Duet," he was already known as "the Aramis Man" from commercials and print ads.

"God bless Aramis, because it started my career, not only in other people's eyes but in my own. Because now I wasn't Jack Lemmon's kid. I was the Aramis Man," Lemmon said.

Connors getting teeth into "Werewolf" role

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Chuck Connors has played a few bad guys in his acting career, but he views his new role in "Werewolf" as evil incarnate.

"I see my part as the devil," he said. "He doesn't have one redeeming feature. I think the kids will like him, like him because when he's on the screen it's much more frightening, the action is more intense."

Connors stars in the new Fox series as Yanos Skorzeny, an old werewolf who has infected others into becoming lycanthropes. "Werewolf," a half-hour drama laced with black humor, also stars John York as a young man doomed by the werewolf curse. York is pursuing Skorzeny and is himself pursued by a bounty hunter.

"It's a colorful role," said Connors, who says he'll appear in about

one in four episodes. "The makeup is fabulous. I turn into a wolf in three transitions. It's incredible. I'm still a kid at heart. I love to play around with this. It's fun to just look at yourself in the mirror. I even love the name of the character — Yanos Skorzeny!"

The makeup was created by Rick Baker who did the special effects for the film "An American Werewolf In London."

"Werewolf" was created by Frank Lupo, whose name means wolf in Italian. His credits include "The A-Team," "Riptide" and "Hunter." Lupo called on Connors after seeing him in an episode of "Matt Houston."

"I'd played a wild heavy, a man on the brink of insanity," Connors said. Connors' best-known role was as the hero Lucas McCain in "The

Rifleman," still running in many places around the world. He also played evil slaveowner Tom Moore in "Roots."

The 6-foot-5 Connors was born in Brooklyn 63 years ago.
