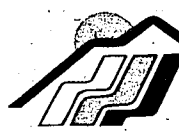

Shultz, Shevardnadze arrange to confer

September session could set summit

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State George P. Shultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze have arranged a three-day meeting here in mid-September that could set the stage for a visit to America by General Secretary Mikhail S. Gorbachev before the first snowfall.

Their principal tasks in the Sept. 15-17 talks, announced Thursday by the White House, are to plan a summit agenda and to try to resolve whatever differences might stand in the way of a treaty banning U.S. and Soviet medium-range nuclear missiles.

In principle, Gorbachev accepted President Reagan's invitation for a Washington summit when they first met in Geneva, Switzerland, in November 1985. But the Soviet leader has delayed setting a date. "Generally, without reason, I do not go anywhere, particularly America," he said last April in Moscow.

A treaty scrubbing all U.S. intermediate-range missiles now deployed in Britain, West

Germany, Italy and Belgium, and comparable Soviet rockets trained on Western Europe and Asia is nearing completion at the bargaining table in Geneva.

A signing ceremony could crown a Washington summit, the third between Reagan and Gorbachev. Besides their Geneva session, they met last October in Reykjavik, Iceland, and tentatively agreed to reduce U.S. and Soviet long-range bombers, intercontinental ballistic missiles and nuclear submarines by 50 percent.

But progress in Geneva is slow. On Wednesday, Soviet negotiators said a deal depended on significant restrictions in Reagan's Strategic Defense Initiative, known popularly as "Star Wars."

Its aim is a space-based shield against missile attack which the Soviets and many American critics say is barred by a 1972 U.S.-Soviet treaty.

The White House statement said only: "It has been agreed that Soviet Foreign Minister

Eduard Shevardnadze and Secretary of State George Shultz will meet in Washington on Sept. 15-17, 1987.

The U.N. General Assembly begins its annual two-week session on Sept. 15, the opening day of the Shultz-Shevardnadze talks. The two officials are expected to attend some of the meetings, and could resume their own discussions in New York.

The major obstacles to an arms control agreement is a Soviet demand, rejected by the Reagan administration, that American warheads for 72 medium-range West German missiles be destroyed. Soviet negotiator Alexei Obukhov said Wednesday in Geneva that the United States had not offered compromises on that and other issues of concern to Moscow.

State Department spokesman Charles E. Redman emphasized Tuesday that Shultz would not confine his discussions with Shevardnadze to arms control, but would also bring up U.S. concerns about human rights in the Soviet Union and a number of regional disputes.

Fewer living in poverty, report claims

WASHINGTON — Poverty in America edged down by about 700,000 people last year as family income posted a fourth consecutive increase, the Census Bureau reported Thursday.

President Reagan promptly welcomed the report, saying the figures "demonstrate once again that sustained, non-inflationary growth is the government's single best tool for fighting poverty and building a better life for our nation's families."

But Robert Greenstein of the private Center on Budget and Policy Priorities termed the improvement disappointing for this stage in an economic recovery.

"Median family income increased by 4.2 percent between 1985 and 1986, after adjustment for inflation. This was one of the largest annual increases in real income in the past 15 years, and the fourth consecutive year that real income has increased," said Gordon Green of the bureau.

"That helped reduce the number of Americans living in poverty to 32.4 million, down from 33.1 million a year earlier, he said.

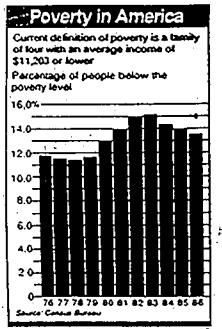
It represents a decline in the national poverty rate from 14 percent to 13.6 percent, the third consecutive annual decline, Green said. The poverty threshold for a family of four in 1986 was \$11,203.

The continuing recovery from the recession of the early 1980s is a prime reason for the decline in poverty and the income growth, although other social and economic factors played a hand, Green said.

According to the bureau's annual study of income and poverty, median family income was \$29,458 last year, up from \$29,269 a year earlier.

It was not a record. Median family income was \$29,647 in 1978 and even higher, \$29,734, in 1973. All those figures are 1986 dollars.

They want to stay

Evergreen Manor residents make feelings clear

TWIN FALLS — Edna Church sat in her wheelchair following an afternoon communion service, ready to chat about her home, Evergreen Manor.

Resting her head on her right hand, Church occasionally sat up to gesture, punctuating her satisfaction with the home and her desire to stay.

"One girl wanted to know if I wanted to move and I said 'No, I have already moved around too

much," said Church, echoing others at the home. A native of the Boise Valley, the 84-year-old also lived in Oregon and Boise each for two years and moved around Twin Falls before settling at Evergreen last November.

"That moving is for the birds," said Church with a wave of her hand. "It is kind of nerve wracking."

Counselors also face that sentiment with the prospect of helping Evergreen residents find a new place to live.

Residents often want to remain

at home, regardless of its flaws, after growing accustomed to the home for years. But state and federal authorities are threatening to close Evergreen, for the sake of its residents, within two weeks if care is not improved.

While inspectors and even nursing home operators say regulations are needed, enforcing the rules becomes a painful ordeal.

"It is a really chaotic experience," said Willard Abbott, regional director of the Department of Health and Welfare. "I still think it is a very traumatic thing unless you can

cushion it with time and order" that are in short supply.

Evergreen Manor faces the loss of state and federal certification as a skilled nursing facility because of critical H&W inspections in May and July. But new management has taken over and pledges to bring Evergreen up to snuff before a deadline Aug. 15.

Despite complaints cited in inspections, Evergreen residents expressed confidence in nursing care at the home. Staff shortages were noted, but residents shied away

Helicopter crash kills 1; 3 missing

WASHINGTON — A Navy helicopter on a routine ferry flight crashed into the Persian Gulf on Thursday as it was nearing the USS LaSalle for a landing, leaving one man dead and three missing, the Pentagon said.

Five other men aboard the chopper were rescued.

The Pentagon said the SH-3G Sea King helicopter crashed into the water at 5:58 p.m. local time, or 2:58 a.m. MDT, as it was flying from a land base to the LaSalle, the command ship of the Midcast Task Force.

The helicopter was ferrying equipment and personnel, the Pentagon said.

Pentagon officials who asked not to be named emphasized that the helicopter was not engaged in any mine-sweeping operations in the area and had not come under any type of attack.

"This was just a routine ferry flight and something went wrong," said one source.

CBS News reported that the rear rotor of the helicopter apparently struck the ship, but Pentagon sources said they could not confirm the report.

"The only thing we know is that it went down fairly close to the ship," said a source who asked not to be identified.

The Pentagon said at 8 p.m. MDT Thursday that search efforts for the

three missing continued through the night. The body of the one victim who has been confirmed dead has been recovered, the Pentagon said.

At the time of the accident, the LaSalle and the destroyer Kidd were steaming on routine patrol in the central Persian Gulf, the Pentagon said.

The LaSalle is a lightly armed communications ship that serves as the flagship for Rear Adm. Harold J. Bensen, the man in charge of U.S. Navy forces in the Gulf. Bensen has been overseeing U.S. escort operations for Kuwait oil tankers in the area as well as mine-sweeping efforts.

The Kidd is one of the three Navy warships that participated in the first convoy operation last week.

The Pentagon refused to say Thursday which land base the Sea King had departed from. But the main staging area for the Midcast Task Force is located in the gulf state of Bahrain.

The Pentagon and the U.S. Central Command, which oversees the task force, said in a statement: "The Navy is continuing its search for the missing men. The names of the dead and missing are being withheld pending notification of next of kin."

Lt. Cmdr. Mrl Sundin, a Pentagon spokesman, said late Thursday that the commanding officer in charge of the search would determine how long the search should continue. "They don't make any presumption at this point" as to whether the missing men are dead, he said.

Hofmann's tale of forgery career becomes public today

SALT LAKE CITY — Mark Hofmann's account of his career as a forger who turned to murder will be made public today amid allegations he violated a plea agreement to tell all he knows about his crimes.

"He has not performed and it will rest on his shoulders," Salt Lake City Police Chief Bud Wiloughby said Thursday of Hofmann, who killed two people with bombs in 1985 when his lucrative schemes with bogus historical documents began to unravel.

This morning, the Salt Lake County at-

torney's office will release 544 pages of verbatim transcripts of 10 prison interviews of Hofmann by county prosecutors.

The interviews were part of a January plea agreement in which the former Mormon documents dealer pledged to answer "truthfully and completely" all prosecutors' questions about his frauds, forgeries and murders with the understanding his responses would be made public.

But Hofmann himself banned police investigators from the interviews and refused to discuss the bomb blasts in the final sessions set aside for them.

Thus, the long-awaited transcripts focus

exclusively on Hofmann's trafficking in forged documents that for five years fooled archivists and scholars and virtually set the agenda for research on early Mormon history.

Salt Lake County Attorney David Yocom said he would include with the verbatim transcripts, a 14-page summary of Hofmann's three unrecorded talks with prosecutors prior to the plea agreement. Those sessions included, as a show of Hofmann's good faith, responses to questions about the murders.

Yocom declined Thursday to comment on Hofmann's post-plea reticence, saying he

would do so at a news conference Friday because the public and his victims deserve to know, Wiloughby and his investigators don't plan to attend.

"They're not going to have the opportunity to use us as a prop," Wiloughby said. "As far as I'm concerned the case is not complete until we've had the opportunity to interview him."

The police chief blames Hofmann, not Yocom, for an incomplete public accounting by Hofmann of his spectacular rise and fall.

"He's gone back on his word. If there's any remorse in his soul, he needs to talk

because the public and his victims deserve to know," Wiloughby said.

"We're entitled to those answers by the agreement and Hofmann's failed to uphold the agreement," he said.

City Police Detective Ken Farnsworth said he had been briefed on Hofmann's early statements about the "two fatal" bombings and a third blast that critically injured the bomber and led to his arrest. He said there were discrepancies with the known evidence on the third bomb.

"He said that he was trying to commit suicide and the evidence is contrary to that," Farnsworth said.

At least 39 die in plane crash

MEXICO CITY (AP) — A commercial cargo plane crashed on vehicles on a crowded highway Thursday, slamming into a restaurant, exploded and caught fire, officials said.

At least 39 people were killed and 17 or more injured, they said.

The Boeing 377 carrying eight passengers and four crew members slammed onto an eight-lane highway during rush hour on the city's western outskirts two minutes after taking off from the international airport, said airport and Red Cross officials.

The four-engine, propeller-driven 377 — a model dating back to the late 1940s — was transporting 18 horses to Miami, airport officials said.

"The work of pulling survivors as well as bodies from the debris is continuing," said Ignacio Flores, commander of the city police department, three hours after the crash.

Officers now shooting targets

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Law officers found themselves among the targets Thursday of the latest random attacks along Southern California highways, as one officer was fired upon and the window of a patrol car smashed with rocks.

Nine other motorists also suffered smashed windshields in the 5:40 a.m. rock-throwing from an overpass on the Golden State Freeway in the San Fernando Valley, and a tractor trailer-rig had its rearview mirror damaged, said Highway Patrol Officer Ernie Garcia.

Authorities reported the rash of roadway violence was spreading past the Los Angeles county line to adjoining Ventura and Riverside counties, where guns were brandished at motorists in Palm Springs and Thousand Oaks.

Nicaragua looking for planes

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — Nicaragua is looking for warplanes to intercept alleged CIA flights purchasing supplies to Contra rebels, the Sandinista army's intelligence chief said Thursday.

"We do not have planes to intercept the supply flights, and while we do not, we cannot stop them," Maj. Ricardo Wheeler said at a news conference.

He said the anti-government rebels in Nicaragua depend heavily on the airdropped supplies from what he said were CIA-manned and organized flights.

Other military officials of the leftist Sandinista government have said the CIA is parachuting supplies to rebels inside Nicaragua once a week.

Congress last year authorized a \$100 million military assistance program to the Contras.

States could test for AIDS

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bill introduced Thursday to expand voluntary and confidential AIDS testing wouldn't stop states from compelling tests or taking other steps to curb the disease, its House and Senate sponsors said.

"This bill would not preclude the states from deciding on mandatory testing," said Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., chairman of the House Energy and Commerce health subcommittee.

Waxman, chief sponsor of the House bill, said states could also set up a reporting system, require tracing of a victim's sexual contacts, or use any means necessary to halt the spread of AIDS.

"We leave it to the public health people to use flexibility, given where they live and the population at risk," Waxman said at a news conference with Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., the Senate sponsor of the bill.

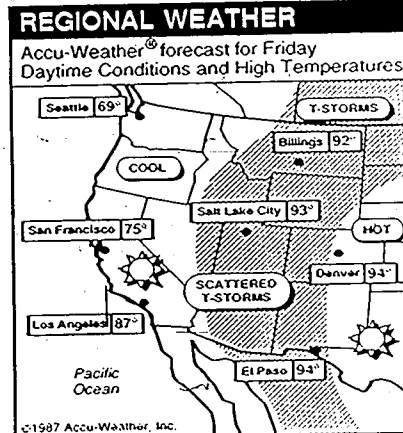
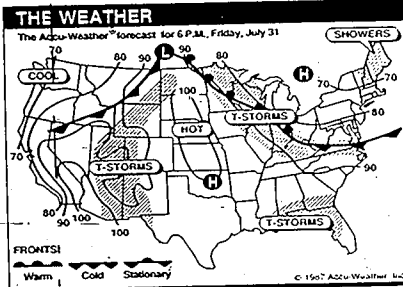
Sunny skies were reported over most of the state mid-afternoon Thursday.

divers hunt for mines

KUWAIT (AP) — American divers hunted for mines Thursday on the southeast route a tanker-warship convoy will follow.

Iran said the effects of its 7-year-old war with Iraq could spread to the United States and its allies if they challenge Iran in the Persian Gulf.

Choppy seas again delayed loading of the 401,385-ton supertanker Bridgeton, which was damaged by a mine last Friday on the voyage north from the Strait of Hormuz under U.S. Navy escort.

High winds and nine-foot waves had driven the Bridgeton, a Kuwaiti tanker flying the American flag, away from its moorings Wednesday.

Earlier reports from the Pentagon said three Navy ships, the USS Anson, USS Johnston and USS Johnston, would be ordered to international waters off Kuwait soon to join the Bridgeton and the 46,723-ton products carrier Ga Princes.

A French aircraft carrier and three support vessels sailed for the Middle East. France already has at least three warships in the Persian Gulf area.

Britain said it was giving "most serious consideration" to a note from Washington that was believed to involve a request for minesweeping help. Britain has 37 minesweepers, but none in the Gulf area.

Shipping sources said the Bridgeton was being kept away from Kuwait's deep-water Sea Island oil terminal 10 miles offshore. One said: "She has a big surface area and any wind or waves would affect her. The only thing is to wait until the wind calms down."

The Ga Princes has loaded its cargo of liquefied petroleum gas and moved away from the loading dock, the sources said.

It was not clear whether the loading problems would delay the 500-mile trip down the gulf by the first two of 11 Kuwaiti tankers to be registered as American vessels. The three-day voyage has been expected to begin by the weekend.

Richard Murphy, U.S. assistant secretary of state, said Wednesday the remaining nine tankers should be refueled within six weeks.

from faulting the nursing staff for them.

Florence Moore, 81, spoke only in complimentary tones about her home of more than three years. Nestled in her bed and surrounded by pictures of great-grandchildren and a stuffed "Beagle named 'Cutie,'" Moore said she had only one suggestion.

"Sometimes a bell can be taken care of sooner, but they are busy and cannot come so quickly," said Moore, with a groan. "I'm sure you'll get it here, but she added, "When you're up to 80, you aren't so spry yourself."

Elsewhere in the home, 86-year-old Grace Davis also defended the nursing staff.

"At the time we're short on staff, but that's not their fault," said Davis from behind black, horn-rimmed glasses adorned with silver on the top frames. "If people don't come in and apply for jobs, you can't hire them."

Hospitals and nursing homes across Magic Valley find nurses in short supply. The College of Southern Idaho, virtually the only local supply of nurses, will not graduate enough nurses this year for the appetite of Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, leaving aside the 10 nursing homes in the area.

During inspections, problems are defined as "immediate care." That term does not distinguish whether it resulted from too few staff or poorly trained staff.

For example, the May Evergreen inspection found some call lights were not answered quickly, while on other occasions nurses aides turned off call lights without helping residents to the bathroom.

After a critical survey, nursing home operators must decide where the problems lie and convince state inspectors they will be corrected.

Because federal officials agreed to waive the state certification, the new operators, Keith and Delta Holloway, must also file a "credible allegation" mapping out planned corrections with federal Health Care Finance Administration officials to avoid losing Medicaid and Medicare funding of more than \$3,700 a day.

Formal plans have not yet been filed, but Delta Holloway said solutions will be offered on both fronts — by increasing training of current employees and hiring more people.

Holloway said the geriatric rehabilitative program, which includes dressing, feeding and physical therapy, will be improved. Also, Holloway said she plans to hire more employees, although the number is not yet set.

Residents and counselors hope the Holloways are successful.

"I hope they keep the place going because we need it badly," Davis said. "There are some very old people who need care and where would you put them all here?"

"Need. That question resounds through the halls across town at the regional H&W office. Without authority to move people, H&W workers have to wait until a home's doors are practically swinging shut before they can help move residents, Abbott said.

And full closure is apparently a rare event, with local H&W workers and the ombudsman at CSI's Office on Aging all on unfamiliar terrain at the juncture with full closure.

When the home was de-certified under different owners one year ago, when it was named Skyview-Hazelden Manor, certification was reinstated before residents had to move.

Inspections during the past year focused on inadequate rehabilitative training that helps residents maintain flexibility and mobility.

Area nursing home administrators said inspections were necessary, but that problems will be found. Ralph Chinchurreta, administrator during the critical inspections before the Holloways took over, said, "Whenever you walk into a nursing home, you will always find deficiencies."

St. Chinchurreta agreed with others that inspections are necessary.

"How else can facilities be checked?" asked Joseph Naylor, administrator at Mountain View Care Center. "The residents — it is hard for them to defend themselves."

"There's no question we need some regulation," said Helen Shewmaker, administrator at Wood River convalescent Center in Shoshone. "But I think sometimes we are overregulated in this business."

Naylor and Shewmaker each said Chinchurreta is a respected administrator and such a good negotiator and such a good negotiator and keeping adequate nursing staff.

Median family income for whites rose 3.7 percent to \$30,809, while blacks had a 2.9 percent rise to \$17,694 and Hispanic increased 0.1 percent to \$19,951, the report said.

By sex, women had median per capita income of \$16,322 in 1986, up from \$15,925 a year earlier. But that was still below men's income of \$25,256, up from \$24,661.

From 1985 to 1986, median family income rose the most in the South, climbing 4.5 percent to \$26,708. It was up 3.9 percent to \$28,524 in the Midwest and 3.3 percent to \$32,160 in the Northeast. The 2 percent growth to \$30,965 in the West was not considered statistically significant, the bureau said.

that," Farnsworth said. "The assumption is then that it can't be right."

Police and prosecutors always have maintained Hofmann was accidentally detonated the bomb that blew him from his sports car Oct. 16, 1985. They believed that the post-police interviews would reveal an intended third victim, or another use for the device. Hofmann thought would be help him escape exposure.

Farnsworth said Hofmann told prosecutors he had been driven to suicide by remorse for the twin blasts the day before which killed Steven Christensen, a 30-year-old Mormon bishop and documents enthusiast, and Kathleen Sheets, 50, wife of former Christensen business associate Gary Sheets.

Not only does that contradict the evidence, Farnsworth said, but it would be completely out of character for someone as coldly calculating as Hofmann. The former Mormon missionary and father of four min- imally innocent came to close family members before abruptly pleading guilty to reduced murder charges on Jan. 23.

"He does what's good for him. It doesn't matter what happens to other people as long as it suits his needs," Farnsworth said. "Not telling your family you're running a scam on your own family."

The soft-spoken Hofmann, 32, under pressure from the Mormon Church and others to produce a cache of Mormon historical documents he'd sold but never had, killed Christensen to prevent his fingering him as a forger, prosecutors con-

tended during his 1986 preliminary hearing. They said Sheets' murder was a diversion to deflect suspicion from Hofmann.

Bob Stott, present at most of the Hofmann interviews, declined to discuss the contents of the transcripts, but said, "It was always our contention that he was responsible for the third bombing and that he wasn't trying to commit suicide."

President will have tissue removed from nose today

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, afflicted with skin cancer for the third time in two years, will have more tissue surgically removed from his nose today at Bethesda Naval Hospital, it was announced Thursday.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said tests on a lesion removed Wednesday from the tip of Reagan's nose revealed it to be a "basal cell epithelioma" and that "further excision of tissue" was required.

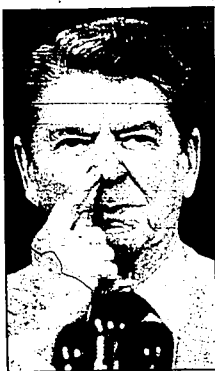
Because of the chance that he might remain overnight at the suburban Washington hospital, Reagan canceled his normal weekend trip to Camp David, Md., Fitzwater said.

"The president is in excellent health," he added.

Basal cell epithelioma is the same type of skin cancer as basal cell carcinoma, and two such cancers were removed from Reagan's nose in 1985. Fitzwater gave no reason for making a distinction, but the White House in the past has been sensitive about reporting of Reagan's health and physicians say such usage is common if one wants to avoid the word "carcinoma," which is more widely known as a term for cancer.

Reagan, addressing a group of anti-abortion activists earlier in the day, joked that the bandage on his nose was a "billboard that says ... stay out of the sun."

Later, the president told journalists and a group of exchange stu-

dents from Central America that he felt "fine."

"Oh, my nose gets laughed at," he said when asked if the skin cancer on his nose was a serious matter. Queried whether he was worried about his hospital visit, Reagan replied, "No more than about any other tomorrow."

The president's skin cancers are considered to be rarely dangerous and have no relation to his 1985 bout with colon cancer.

Fitzwater said the most recent lesion was not a melanoma, which is a very rare form of skin cancer that occurs in about 5 percent of cases and is often fatal.

About two to three millimeters of tissue were removed from the tip of Reagan's nose on Wednesday, Fitzwater said, and physicians determined that they would "have to go back and take a little more" to be sure all the cancerous cells had been removed.

Elaine Crispin, press secretary to Nancy Reagan, said the first lady learned of the test results while spending Thursday at a youth camp in Maine and planned to accompany her husband to the hospital.

She noted that Mrs. Reagan had a similar skin cancer removed from her upper lip several years ago and said the first lady urges people to use sun blocks and to stay out of the sun.

Fitzwater said an overnight hospital stay "was not expected" but that a decision would be made following the procedure, which will be done under local anesthesia.

Reagan's personal physician, Col. John Hutton, and two other physicians — Adm. William Narva, Congress attending physician, and Capt. Theodore Porette, the chief of dermatology at Bethesda — will be present, Fitzwater said.

Adelman resigns as chief of U.S. arms control office

WASHINGTON (AP) — Kenneth L. Adelman resigned Thursday as the U.S. arms control director, saying he planned "a new very exciting life ahead" that includes teaching Shakespeare.

Predicting an nuclear weapons reduction treaty and a Washington summit meeting by year's end, Adelman said at a news conference: "I wanted to leave at a time when it was clear that everything was coming up roses."

Actually, the 41-year-old head of the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency made his resignation effective in mid-October. In a letter to President Reagan he also offered to stay through a Reagan summit with Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

"Thanks to your leadership, this year we will conclude a solid arms control agreement," Adelman wrote. He referred to a treaty banning U.S. and Soviet medium-range missiles that is in the final stages of negotiation in Geneva, Switzerland.

Still, his decision to depart as the administration nears its first agreement with the Soviets was a surprise.

Adelman acknowledged to reporters that as the director of a small agency he had less "bureaucratic clout" than Cabinet officers and the military Joint Chiefs of Staff in advising Reagan.

"At one time or another in the last 4½ years I think I have disagreed with everyone," he said.

But he said his resignation was not caused by any policy dispute. "I have had no gripes, I have no complaints on being cut out of any arms control participation," Adelman said.

At the White House, spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said Adelman "has done an outstanding job guiding our arms control effort. He's been steadfast since the early days of this administration in pursuing the president's goals, and we owe him a large measure of gratitude for his leadership."

He said Adelman's resignation "doesn't give any signal on the sub-

stance of arms control."

Secretary of State George P. Shultz said through his spokesman, Charles E. Redman, that Adelman had served "with creativity and distinction."

But the arms control director also had his critics.

Rep. Robert K. Dornan, R-Calif., said Adelman earlier this month, "required a staff member who had been suspended for 18 months for taking classified documents home and linking information."

"I never ran into anybody that seemed so cavalier about security violation," Dornan said of Adelman. "I was taking it to the president himself. ... Now this is moot."

Asked if the dispute had forced the resignation, Dornan said, "I haven't the faintest idea. I'm certainly not taking credit for it."

Adelman, who worked for the Reagan administration for two years as deputy ambassador to the United Nations, informed the president he wanted to return to research, writing and speaking on public policy issues.

Abortion aid money target

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, promising to push "just as hard as I know how for pro-life measures," moved Thursday to end the use of federal family planning assistance money for abortion counseling and referral.

Reagan also said he has ordered Surgeon General Everett C. Koop to prepare "a comprehensive medical report on the health effects, mental and physical, of abortion on women," although there was no immediate indication how much time Koop would have to submit such a study.

These were among a series of steps Reagan announced to anti-abortion activists gathered in an Old Executive Office Building auditorium, and as he ticked off each initiative, the president was given a loud ovation.

Pro-choice groups condemned the proposals.

In his speech, Reagan said: "We must not rest — and I pledge to you that I will not rest — until a human life amendment becomes a part of our

Constitution."

But he acknowledged that battle will be a long one, and said in the meantime, other alternatives must be found to discourage — if not abolish — abortions.

Reagan said he has ordered the Department of Health and Human Services to draft a proposal to eliminate language in Title X of the Public Health Act that requires recipients of federal funds to suggest abortion as an alternative for the pregnant.

Among the specific changes Reagan suggested were these:

- Rules governing disbursement of federal family planning money should "specifically state that a program that does provide counseling and referral for abortion services as a method of family planning will not be eligible."

- Regulations covering Title X grants would be revised so that "any organization that provides abortion-related services will be required to clearly separate these services" from programs for which federal money is used.

Baxter should drop grand jury proposal

Twin Falls County prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter says she is thinking about establishing what amounts to a standing grand jury in Twin Falls County to consider all felony cases and issue indictments.

The idea, in our view, is not a good one, for many reasons. One is that the use of grand juries would extend the prosecutor's power far beyond what is warranted today in the county and would effectively raise taxpayer costs by forcing many routine cases into needless jury trials.

Centuries ago, the grand jury was a common institution in criminal court proceedings. Made up of hand-picked citizens, often drawn from ruling classes, its function was to hear what passed for "evidence" and to issue formal charges or indictments. The accused had no right of representation, or appearance, either in person or through counsel.

Grand juries were often abusive in nature. They were often under the close control of the monarch and frequently were used to bring what amounted to political charges.

Along with "Star Chambers," special courts which had extensive jurisdiction, grand juries were considered the most threatening vehicles of the state's prosecution power. Their danger was recognized by the framers of the American Constitution, who structured the Bill of Rights in large measure to ensure fair treatment for individual citizens against the overwhelming power of the state.

The use of grand juries has diminished directly with the growth of other means to ensure fair criminal proceedings for both the state and the defendant.

Grand juries have many of their original characteristics today. They only issue indictments; they do not weigh guilt and innocence as a regular or petit jury does.

They are most useful in complex cases involving interconnected criminal activity, such as interstate fraud and organized efforts at civil disruption. Thus, they are mostly used in federal courts.

Except for an occasional cocaine sale, Twin Falls County is not exactly a center for this kind of criminal activity.

Furthermore, the recent use of the grand jury in local drug cases — in which all indictments were quashed because of a flawed jury selection process — suggests that local officials, including Baxter, could stand some review on how the process ought to work.

Baxter admits that, until the indictments were challenged, she had not read the state law on grand jury selection. She assumed, as did many others, that County Clerk Richard Pence was handling the selection procedure properly.

Given the problems this first effort at using a grand jury brought on, Baxter should wait at least until the air clears before proposing a sweeping change in how cases are prosecuted locally.

Baxter also seems motivated to use the grand jury because of what she perceives of the increasing workload on her office in handling preliminary hearings, which is the standard procedure in criminal law for bringing a criminal case.

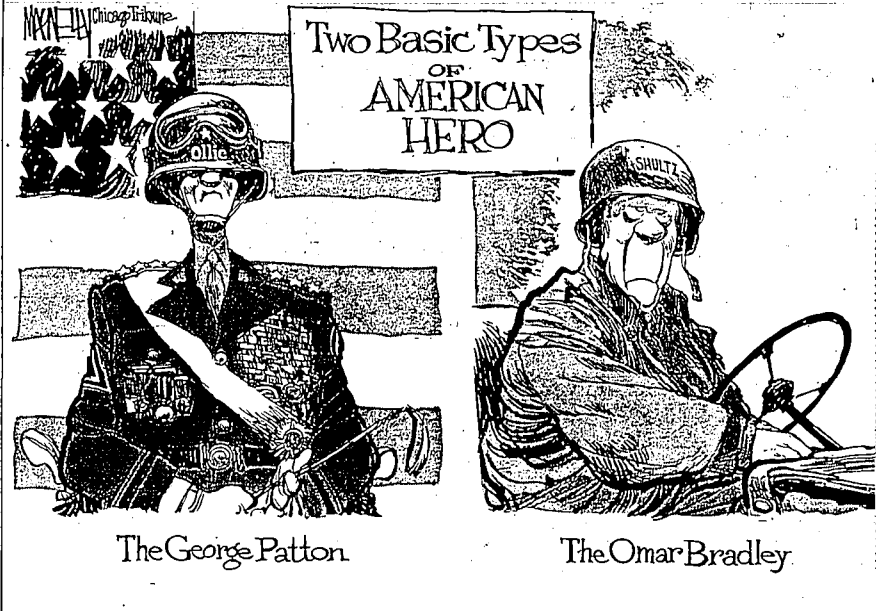
She blames Public Defender Michael Wood and other defense attorneys for increased use of the preliminary hearing.

But from our perspective, Wood and other attorneys are doing precisely what they should. The purpose of the preliminary hearing is to make certain that a criminal charge has enough probable cause to go forward for trial. Cases which do not meet that standard don't go forward.

American criminal law is structured to give considerable protection to defendants because the Founders knew the immense power which the state could bring and its potential for abuse. The preliminary hearing is part of that protection.

If Baxter is concerned that cases are being lost in preliminary hearings, the solution is not to eliminate them, but to screen cases more carefully and prosecute only those which merit prosecution.

The grand jury process is a tool open to much potential abuse. We think its use, if at all, should be narrow and selective, not broad and general, as Baxter proposes.

Regan says he repeatedly urged Reagan to break off sales

WASHINGTON (AP) — Blunt-spoken Donald Regan testified Thursday he repeatedly urged President Reagan to break off arms sales to Iran, once telling him "we have been snookered again."

And when it became known late last year that money from those sales had been diverted to the Nicaraguan Contras, Regan said, he pushed for making a clean breast of the story despite the opposition of National Security Advisor John Poindexter and the doubts of the late CIA Director William Casey.

Regan, who was fired in February as Reagan's chief of staff after being blamed by the Tower commission for allowing "chaos" to descend on the White House, was the next-to-last public witness of the long congressional Iran-Contra hearings.

He testified despite a throat problem, and after six hours. Sen. Daniel K. Inouye, the Senate committee chairman, gave him a choice of continuing into the evening or returning today. Regan, noticeably hoarse, opted for the latter. He is to be followed by Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger.

"The former official, known as a hard-nosed administrator, allowed his combativeness to show through when he defiantly told one questioner who asked about officials' willingness to take wounds for their president: 'don't mind spears in the breast. It's knives in the back that concern me.'"

Regan said he never knew that Lt. Col. Oliver North, a member of the National Security Council staff, was conducting covert operations, including the transfer of Iranian arms sales profits to the Contras.

Asked his reaction when he learned last November, he replied in a single word — "horror."

Regan said North and Poindexter did the president "a grave disservice" by not telling him about the diversion plan before he held his Nov. 19 press conference.

"I do think they should have discussed this with the president and allowed him to divert funds or not," Regan said. "Knowing that the cover had been blown and this would eventually come out, they ... hurt him badly by allowing him to go before the nation's media and not know that these deeds had been done."

Regan also said: "The president rejected his advice and that of Secretary of State George Shultz and Weinberger on the arms sales because Regan 'honestly wanted to improve relations with Iran (and) also had a major concern for the lives of those hostages.'"

"It did not occur to me that men of that caliber (Poindexter and North) would be destroying documents or ... clean up the record." Both men testified that they destroyed papers when inquiries began.

"While he admires the enthusiasm and ingenuity of North, 'I think he might have asked permission or shared with us his (diversion) plan rather than put it in effect in this unauthorized way, with this outcome.'"

The former Wall Street executive also said he has "wrecked his brain" but has no knowledge of a formal document the president reportedly signed in December 1985 approving the weapons sale as part of an arms-for-hostages deal.

He said that last November, when the story began to appear in public, Poindexter opposed his idea of a quick public accounting and Casey questioned whether he knew what he was doing.

Regan said that after he and the president learned about the money diversion from Attorney General Edwin Meese III — with the president reacting as if "punched in the stomach," he talked with Casey at CIA headquarters.

"He said, 'What are you going to do about it?' and I said, 'We are going to go public with it tomorrow.' I said, 'We have got to get this story out. We cannot sit on this one.'"

Casey, he said, asked whether he realized the consequences, that "you are going to blow the whole Iranian thing, and possibly blow the lives" of the Americans held hostage in Lebanon.

House panel OKs bill forcing airline reports

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House subcommittee approved a bill Thursday that would force airlines to issue monthly public reports on the quality of their services, a requirement lawmakers hope would result in fewer delays and other problems.

"This legislation is critically needed," said Rep. Norman Mineta, D-Calif., chairman of the House aviation subcommittee, which passed the measure. "Airline service has deteriorated over the past year in some drastic proportions. Airline passengers are outraged."

Last month, the Department of Transportation received 5,155 complaints from the public about problems flying on U.S. airlines, compared with 843 the agency tallied in June 1986.

The bill would require the nation's airlines to file monthly reports with the Transportation Department containing figures on delayed and canceled flights, lost and damaged baggage, and passengers who have been "bumped" off overbooked flights.

The department would be expected to provide the reports on request, and to distribute them to airline ticket offices and travel agencies.

"If the traveling public can receive data ... passengers who are concerned about quality can choose a carrier on that basis," said Rep. Newt Gingrich of Georgia, the subcommittee's senior Republican.

The measure, similar to a bill the Senate Commerce, Science and Transportation Committee approved July 14, is advancing as the airlines and the Transportation Department try to head off congressional action.

The department has said it believes regulatory action by the agency, rather than legislation, should address airline problems.

On Thursday, the department announced it had convinced the airlines they should change the way ticket and travel agency computers list flights.

Army unwittingly aided Nicaragua initiative

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army was not part of a scheme to overcharge Iran for TOW missiles and to use the profits for the Nicaraguan Contras rebels, but it unwittingly aided such a goal, a House panel reported Thursday.

The 51-page Armed Services Committee report said Army officials charged too little when they, in effect, sold the weapons to the CIA.

The lower cost to the spy agency therefore increased the potential profits when the CIA supplied the TOWs to Iran at prices that were inflated — according to testimony at the Iran-Contra hearings — by up to 600 percent.

Had the Army followed proper procedures, it would have charged the CIA \$4,819 per missile instead

Judge grants limited access to file on North

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge Thursday partially granted access to a sealed court file involving a contempt proceeding against Lt. Col. Oliver North.

But Chief Judge Aubrey E. Robinson Jr. of U.S. District Court here ruled that news organizations could not see any material that would reveal proceedings of the grand jury investigating the Iran-Contra affair.

Ruling on a lawsuit by The Wall Street Journal and The Washington Post, the judge ordered North's attorneys and independent counsel Lawrence E. Walsh to file "under seal" redacted copies of their pleadings which do not reveal matters occurring before the grand jury.

"Each side will have an opportunity to contest the inclusion of any material in the other party's material before it is filed in the public record," Robinson's order said.

Robinson also issued an order on a similar motion that had been filed by Public Citizen, an advocacy group founded by Ralph Nader. The order in that case was filed under seal, said Patricia Goldman, a Public Citizen attorney.

Robinson's orders essentially adopted a suggestion by Walsh on how to release the file to the public.

Despite squabbling, Bork hearings on track

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite GOP calls for quicker action on the nomination of Robert Bork as a Supreme Court justice, the confirmation hearings will probably begin Sept. 15 as scheduled, Senate Judiciary Committee chairman Joseph R. Biden D-Del., said Thursday.

The setting of a hearing date for Bork has prompted some partisan squabbling.

Two Republican members of the panel, Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-Ga., and Sen. Arlen Specter, R-Pa., are seeking an earlier hearing date. Specter suggested Thursday that the committee move up the date by six or seven days so the public would believe that Congress was not trying to delay Bork's confirmation.

Biden said he would consider the request, but added, "I'm inclined to keep the Bork hearing as scheduled."

He pointed out that he himself had argued earlier for an August hearing, since he wanted to campaign in Iowa in September. Biden is seeking the Democratic presidential nomination.

"No one seriously recommended the hearings start in August except me," he told the panel.

Senate Minority Leader Robert Dole, R-Kan., recommended Monday that President Reagan place Bork on the high court by a recess appointment without Senate confirmation.

Dole has been seeking the Republican presidential nomination, although he has not formally announced his candidacy.

Biden said he was upset over the implication that he had tried to delay the hearings on the Bork nomination.

"Dole is being his typically partisan, cheap-shot self," he said.

Powerful car bomb leaves 68 injured

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — A car bomb described by police as the most powerful terrorist device ever used in South Africa wounded 68 people Thursday when it exploded downtown outside a military headquarters.

The bomb broke windows in a five-block area.

A reporter for the government-supervised television news said police estimated the bomb weighed about 180 pounds. Three Cabinet ministers accused the African National Congress guerrilla organization of planting the bomb.

Tom Sebina, spokesman for the ANC in Lusaka, Zambia, said he had no immediate comment.

"We have not yet heard from our people in South Africa," he said.

The television report said the bombing marked the 68th anniversary of the founding of the South African Communist Party, outlawed by South Africa in 1960 along with the ANC. The government says the ANC is dominated by Communists.

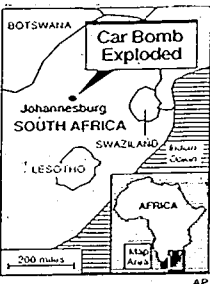
The African National Congress claimed responsibility for a car bombing in Johannesburg on May 20 that killed four policemen and injured four officers and 10 civilians. Defense Minister Magnus Malan called Thursday's explosion a "deed of the SACP (South African Communist Party) through their stooges the ANC."

Malan, quoted on the state-supervised broadcast, also issued a warning to South Africa's black-ruled neighbors about "harboring terrorists."

The television broadcast said Malan specifically named President Kenneth Kaunda of Zambia and President Joaquim Chissano of Mozambique.

"South Africa holds these leaders and their governments responsible for terrorist acts ... and reserves the right to protect itself," Malan was quoted as saying.

Government-run Radio South Africa said earlier a bomb in the back of a delivery truck caused a floor to collapse inside the 12-story brick building of the South African Defense Force. It demolished the



heavy wooden front gates and injured some soldiers.

Minister of Law and Order Adrian Vlok blamed the ANC. He said the fact that half the injured were black gave the lie to the ANC claim that its target is the country's white minority. Minister of Justice Hendrick Joubert Coetzee told Parliament the African National Congress claimed responsibility, but there was no explanation of when or how the claim was made.

A police spokesman, Col. Frans Malherbe, said the bomb left a three-foot-deep crater in the street and was "the heaviest bomb yet in Johannesburg."

There have been 11 explosions in the city this year, and none of the devices detonated outside Johannesburg has rivaled Thursday's for power.

Malherbe said soldiers and children were among the injured, which included 29 whites, 32 blacks and seven of mixed-race. Malherbe said four whites remained hospitalized, in satisfactory condition, but he did not have figures for the other races, who went to a different hospital.

The bomb destroyed or damaged 20 vehicles. It sent a large piece of metal from the delivery truck into a tree 600 yards away.

Arms agreement could hurt West

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — Gen. John R. Galvin, head of U.S. and NATO forces in Europe, said Thursday an expected agreement to eliminate American and Soviet "clear weapons from Europe would significantly weaken Western defenses.

Galvin added, however, that he was not opposed to such an accord because the NATO nations were planning to improve not only the remaining nuclear forces in Europe but also their conventional weaponry. Galvin's remarks, in a speech to European diplomats, were his first public comments since assuming the command June 26.

Without what he called a "buttressing" of existing NATO defenses, "there will be a higher risk than we in the West should accept," Galvin said.

He also stressed that a U.S.-Soviet deal, now under negotiation in Geneva, would seriously reduce Moscow's flexibility in planning for the possible use of its remaining arsenal of nuclear weapons in Europe.

"A zero-zero agreement will directly affect the theater-based nuclear leg" of NATO's defenses, "reducing significantly the military capabilities that are part of the foundation of NATO's deterrent strategy," Galvin told the diplomats.

The four-star general took over

from Gen. Bernard W. Rogers as Supreme Allied Commander Europe and as chief of the U.S. European Command.

Rogers had been critical of the removal of about 350 U.S. cruise missiles agreement, saying it would hurt Western military capabilities by leaving NATO without land-based nuclear weapons in Europe that could hit Soviet territory.

In a similar vein, Galvin said the removal of about 350 U.S. cruise missiles and Pershing 2 nuclear missiles from Western Europe would mean, "you have more risk than before, more risk that your deterrence won't work."

"I don't like the risk at present levels," he said, adding that NATO must carry through with commitments already made to modernize existing battlefield nuclear weapons such as nuclear artillery and to improve the alliance's ability to defend with conventional arms.

Among the defense improvements needed, he said, were the deployment of an improved short-range Lance nuclear missile in Europe, the development of a new air-launched nuclear rocket, improvements in NATO aircraft's ability to survive Warsaw Pact air defenses and a greater capability to deliver air strikes deep into enemy territory.

He said all of these improvements already had been recommended by Rogers. Galvin acknowledged that governments had been slow to implement some of them.

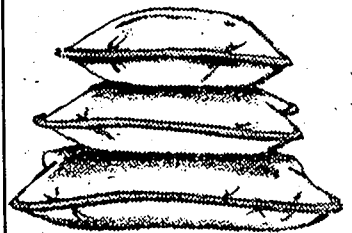

Haitians protest slayings

PORT-AU-PRINCE (AP) — Soldiers patrolled deserted streets Thursday as residents of the capital observed a general strike to press for the resignation of the military-dominated junta.

The strike was in protest of Wednesday's killings by security forces of at least eight people taking part in a peaceful anti-government demonstration.

The coalition that called the shutdown issued a statement saying the deaths showed that the provisional National Governing Council was made up of "terrorists" and "fascists." The group has said the strike that began Thursday was indefinite.

Unidentified gunmen riddled the facades of buildings housing seven radio stations before dawn Thursday. No one was reported injured in the attacks.

Radio Metropole said the strike also paralyzed the towns of Jacmel, Jeremie, Legane, Les Cayes and Hinche. In the larger cities of Gonaives and Cap-Haitien north of Port-au-Prince, businesses were open but there was no public transportation, the station said.

The strike, the 10th in this Caribbean country of 6 million since June 29, was called Wednesday by a coalition of 67 peasant, political, student and labor groups hours after soldiers opened fire on 2,500 people marching in downtown Port-au-Prince.

The National Governing Council, led by Gen. Henri Namphy, has ruled Haiti since President-for-Life Jean-Claude Duvalier fled to exile in France on Feb. 7, 1986 after weeks of sustained anti-government protests.

The council is supposed to hand power to a civilian government after elections tentatively set for Nov. 27.

In the capital, businesses and government offices were closed. There was no public transportation.

The only vehicles circulating were a few army jeeps, trucks and motorcycles. There were no burning barricades or demonstrations like those that characterized earlier strikes. Many protesters appeared afraid to venture onto the streets.

Some factories in the industrial zone near the airport in the northern sector of the capital were operating Thursday, but at reduced capacity.

Jean Claude Bajeux, one of the co-ordinators of the strike and a political moderate, called for an end to the violence.

"Finding bodies in the street in the morning, shooting into crowds, shooting in other towns to break up demonstrations — we need a change as soon as possible to stop this violence and put the country back on the track of democracy," he said in an interview with Radio Metropole.

Indian forces moving in

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka (AP) — India landed 3,000 soldiers Thursday in Tamil-dominated northern Sri Lanka and they started moving into rebel areas to disarm militants fighting in the island's 4-year-old ethnic civil war.

An Indian official said more were on the way to carry out the terms of an Indian-Sri Lankan agreement to end the war between the minority Tamils and majority Sinhalese, which has cost more than 6,000 lives.

The soldiers came by ship and Soviet-built Antinov transport planes the day after President Junius R. Jayewardene and Indian prime minister Rajiv Gandhi signed the accord.

Soviet space capsule returns; medics examine pale cosmonaut

MOSCOW (AP) — A Soviet space capsule dropped safely to Earth in a cloud of dust Thursday and medics immediately examined one of the three cosmonauts aboard, who is suffering from heart problems, Tass said.

The cosmonaut, Alexander I. Laveikin, 35, looked pale but smiled at onlookers after the examination, the official news agency said.

The decision to bring Laveikin home following nearly six months in space was announced after a three-man Soyuz TM-3 capsule docked with the Mir orbiting space station last Friday.

Laveikin changed places with cosmonaut Alexander P. Alexandrov, the flight engineer of the TM-3, who remained on the Mir.

Laveikin returned to Earth with fellow Soviet cosmonaut Alexander Vitorenko and Syrian spaceman Mohammed Paris aboard the TM-2

capsule that Laveikin and pilot Yuri V. Romanenko blasted off in last February.

The Soyuz TM-3 that left Earth last week remained linked to the Mir.

Officials said irregularities had been detected in Laveikin's electrocardiogram, but they did not elaborate.

The TM-2 touched down shortly after 6 a.m. Moscow time (8 p.m. Wednesday EDT) about 1 1/2 miles from a small settlement in the Soviet republic of Kazakhstan.

Before touchdown, the craft's braking engines were switched on for 3 1/2 minutes and then two parachutes were released, Tass said. The Tass report said farmers in trucks and tractors from the town sped toward the landing point. "We even saw a boy spurring his horse in the direction of the capsule," the news agency said.

Soviet and Syrian reporters were ferried on helicopters to the landing site in Soviet Central Asia, where Syrian journalists sprinkled the laughing cosmonauts with rice grown in Syria, the agency said.

Paris, the first Syrian in space, told reporters he was tired because he had slept little. "There was much to do and I didn't want to lose a single minute," he said.

Paris photographed his homeland from space in what he said was an effort to locate new sources of water and mineral resources. He was the 12th foreigner to travel aboard a Soviet space capsule, Tass said.

The cosmonauts also successfully completed an extensive program of scientific and medical testing, including tests on human adaptation to weightlessness, Tass said.

The two Soviet cosmonauts who remain aboard the Mir, Romanenko and Alexandrov, will soon fly the TM-3 capsule around the station and dock it at a different port, Radio Moscow reported.

Clashes mar testimony

JERUSALEM (AP) — John Demjanjuk clashed with the judges and prosecutors Thursday during his fourth day of testimony at his Nazi war crimes trial and at one point stammered: "I can't think properly. I don't know how to answer."

The 67-year-old retired Ohio auto worker is accused of being "Ivan the Terrible," a sadistic Ukrainian guard at the Treblinka death camp in Nazi-occupied Poland, where 850,000 Jews and other prisoners were killed in 1942-43.

Judge Dov Levine, president of the three-judge panel, rebuked the defendant at one point in Thursday's proceedings for conflicting testimony he gave in a U.S. court about his duties at the Chelm camp, where Demjanjuk claims he was held.

"Nobody had prepared me like you prepare witnesses in Israel," Demjanjuk replied, and Levine shot

back: "You don't need to be prepared to tell the truth. Either it is in your memory or it isn't."

Prosecutors Yonah Blattman and Michael Shaked sought to discredit Demjanjuk's story by emphasizing conflicts in his testimony. He faltered over names, numbers and dates, even those unrelated to the critical 1942-43 period.

City turns cable flap over to attorney general

TWIN FALLS — Local television deals are in the hands of the attorney general, after the Twin Falls City Council decided on Thursday to refer the concerns of K49AZ-TV of Twin Falls and KBCI-TV of Boise to his state office.

The two stations are arguing with the King Videocable Co. over their placement on the local cable dial.

The state agency is the most appropriate to proceed with the matter, City Attorney Shane Bengochea said. Even if the city

found any problems with cable operations, "we couldn't do anything about it," he said.

Attorney General Jim Jones was one step ahead of the city, however, because KBCI Manager Tim Bever visited him on Wednesday with his concerns.

Deputy Attorney General Dan Chadwick said his office will approach the matter from three different areas: the creation of the franchise between the city and the cable company, in which the company pays a fee for public right-of-way; the economic impact of the potential loss of K49AZ, which its manager claimed could go dark if not moved to another channel; and alleged restraint of trade concerning cable com-

pany operations.

Chadwick said he could not be more specific about the areas of concern or what approach the office will take until the attorney general reviews information from the city.

Bever, who could not be reached for comment Thursday, had contacted the attorney general before he decided to take the city in June, Chadwick said. At the time, Bever was directed to the city because it is office policy to allow the local government to resolve any problems.

Bengochea said Bever had also raised a concern with the attorney general over the validity of a June 1984 cable franchise con-

tract because cable manager Chris Talkington had been working for the cable firm and serving as mayor until a few months before the agreement was reached.

Talkington had been hired by the company in May 1983 and left the city in December 1983.

From his investigation, he found no conflicts, Bengochea said.

Talkington said on Thursday that he had stayed out of any discussion concerning the cable company while he was a city official.

The bottom line of the conflict is that K49AZ, a low-power station, and KBCI want onto the cable channels between 2 to 13, which all television sets can receive

without special equipment. Older sets cannot receive the additional channels.

With its present position on channel 19, K49AZ does not have wide access to viewers and is losing advertising revenue.

Manager-Partner Kris Harvey said, "KBCI was moved by the cable company" last year from channel 2, where it had been for a decade, to channel 15. As a result, advertising revenue was lost, Bever told the council on Monday.

Harvey and Bever also alleged on Monday that King Videocable controls advertising sales on at least six of the most-watched stations. The local system sells

Newcomer Bon bolsters mall's bottom line

TWIN FALLS — The Bon at Magic Valley Mall will stay in the spotlight as the newest store in the retail chain only a few days. Next week, Chief Executive Officer Will Bur Fix will snip the ribbon to open another gleaming Bon at Kelso, Wash.

Nevertheless, Fix and other executives of the Bon and the mall have big ambitions for the Twin Falls store.

The importance of The Bon to the Magic Valley Mall was apparent Thursday with the presence of John Price, chairman of Salt Lake City-based Price Development Co.

The arrival of the department store will help fill a string of as-yet unoccupied shop fronts at the west end of the shopping complex, Price said.

The nine-month-old mall should grow substantially. "We do have some (in negotiation) that will take us to 80 percent (full) by year-end," he said.

It now is 70 percent full.

The Bon and the stores that follow also will boost the mall bottom line substantially. So far, "Sales have been less than what I would have liked them to have been," Price said. Although the mall itself is not yet turning a profit, a mall typically "does not make money for the first four to five years," he said.

The Magic Valley Mall, like others, also was somewhat overbuilt to allow for growth, Price said.

At the opening of the new Bon store Thursday, Price praised the Seattle-based retailer as a longtime Northwest merchant skilled at offering quality goods in a middle-income market.

Built at a cost of \$4 million and outfitted with another \$2½ million in merchandise, the new store represents a major investment for the Seattle-based retailer, Fix said Thursday. Although the building is leased from mall-owner Price Development Co., The Bon designed, constructed and furnished the interior.

The payoff comes in the future. The Bon expects to double the sales of the store just closed in downtown Twin Falls, Fix said.

"We need 80 percent of the people in the community to like what we do," he said.

The first wave of customers poured through the new Bon store just before 10 a.m. Thursday. They were queuing, not grabbing for their billfolds, as they wandered through 22 departments.

The Bon plans to open those wal-

lets with a sophisticated, high-tech atmosphere, a product mix tailored to Twin Falls and a staff that caters to customers, Fix said.

"Even though the orders are entered in Seattle, the merchandising comes to each community" to decide what will go on the racks, he said.

The Bon primarily is selling fash-

ion and value. In recent years, Fix also has begun catering more to the shopper by giving "sales associates" power to make customer service decisions once reserved for management.

More fashionable times also-stores in the Pacific Northwest have been providing opportunity for The Bon and its competitors, he said. "There is more of an inclina-

tion to dress up," he said.

The opening of The Bon is being accompanied by a flurry of events, including hot air balloon flights this morning and Saturday.

The Bon operates more than 40 stores in the Pacific Northwest and is likely to expand significantly under its new owner, Campaign Corp. of Canada, Fix said.

Officials in Bliss see boon in dam plan

GOODING — A proposed electricity-generating dam on the Snake River could benefit the economy of Gooding County and the state, say officials of the city of Bliss.

Most other agencies in the Magic Valley and state officials have denounced the project. But Bliss Mayor Roland Zollinger and Councilwoman Fern Cannerusa told Tacoma consultants at a meeting in Gooding Thursday that "there is another side to the river and the story."

The dam, if built by Tacoma City Light of Washington, would fall within the Bliss city area of impact.

"I am concerned about the economic future of the area," Zollinger said. He told Kothe Howe and Kent Leyden of Beak Consultants Inc. that the state has spent a lot of money helping to promote tourism in the Bliss and Hagerman Valley area and there are proposals to make the Hagerman Fossil Beds a national site.

"This project will work hand-in-hand with that to bring tourists to the area," Zollinger said.

He said boating facilities on the Lower Salmon Dam are crowded and the area would benefit from an enlarged water sport resource. "Idaho's economy is declining," he said. "We can't count on agriculture to keep us going. Tourism is what we've got to look at."

In response to questions about the sturgeon habitat and fishing uses on the river, Zollinger said sturgeon have been produced more successfully in hatcheries than naturally in the river and are being produced at Clear Springs.

"They (hatcheries) can produce more in 10 years than the river could in a thousand years," he said. "If the sturgeon issue is the stopping point, it's a poor log to stand on. If they stock the reservoir with hatchery sturgeon, fishermen could catch and keep them. That will attract a lot more people than fishing where you

Twin Falls to solicit donations for new pool on water bills

TWIN FALLS — On their August water bills, Twin Falls City residents will have the opportunity to put their money where a city pool soon should be.

The city will begin soliciting a \$3 or more monthly donation, via water billing, to pay for the construction of a new city pool, the City Council decided at a Thursday work session.

The city has already set aside \$500,000 for the project, estimated to cost about \$1 million.

First Federal Savings donated another \$80,000, and \$270,000 will be budgeted to the pool construction in the 1987-88 city budget. About \$25,000 more

should arrive through fund raising, estimated city officials. And, that leaves the remainder to be generated by water-bill contributions.

If 75 percent of the water users donate an average of \$3 a month, the necessary funding will be raised in six months, estimated city officials.

The council discussed at length how to ask for the contribution on the water bills to obtain good responses. Some council members wanted wording on the bills that would attract donations over \$3.

Whatever wording is selected, it can be changed later if it does not work, Councilman Gale Kleincopf said.

Council members mixed the idea of a one-time sign

Shallow area similar to Harmon's

TWIN FALLS — While plans for a new Twin Falls city pool are not set in cement, shallow water for children should reflect what was available at the old Harmon Park pool.

Both the proposed pool and the old pool should have about the same size area with water five-feet deep or less. However, the shallowest areas of the old pool will be less deep than those planned for the new pool.

But then Harmon pool would not meet current state standards because it started so shallow, at two-and-a-half-feet, said City Manager Tom Courtney.

State law requires shallow ends of public pools start at between three feet and three-and-a-half feet, Courtney said.

With that in mind, city plans suggest a separate wading pool, 30 feet in diameter and between 6 inches and 12 inches deep, and a shallow portion join-

ing the large pool.

Courtney said state law allows portions of pools to be less than two feet deep. But the area must be separated from the rest of the pool and its water must be replaced every two hours, as opposed to the pool's regular exchange rate of every six hours, he said.

That recessed area adjoining to the shallow end of the pool tentatively measures 18 feet by 30 feet, Courtney said. The overall pool is expected to stretch 60 feet by 50 meters, or about 163 feet.

The city is calling for design/build bids from contractors to not only map out their own plans for the pool, but also build it. Since bids are still being solicited, specific plans are unavailable.

City Parks Director Chad Browning said the Harmon pool measured 82 feet wide by 160 feet long. About half that was five-feet deep or less, which meant about 6,150 square feet of surface area.

Total surface area of half the new pool, five-feet deep or less, the adjoining shallow area and wading pool is also 6,150 square feet.

Police have suspect in Buhl murder case, release sketch

TWIN FALLS — An intensive investigation, which has continued since late last May when the partly decomposed body of Donald Edward Smith was found in the desert northwest of Buhl, has sent officers on the search for a black man believed to be 30 to 35 years of age.

Twin Falls County Sheriff James Munn and his chief deputy, Harold Jensen, said Thursday in an updated report on the investigation that Smith was seen in the company of a black individual around the time that has been set as the date of death.

The officers said the missing 1984 Ford pickup truck owned by Smith was found in Denver, Colo., May 16, after it was involved in a hit-and-run accident in that city.

Munn said witnesses reported seeing the driver, a black male about 30 to 35 years of age, run from the vehicle. The abandoned vehicle was impounded and processed by the Denver police. It contained registration papers in the name of Donald Smith of Hemet, Calif., Munn said.

"We also believe we have found the murder weapon, but we will not know for sure until more test results are available from police in Denver," Munn said.

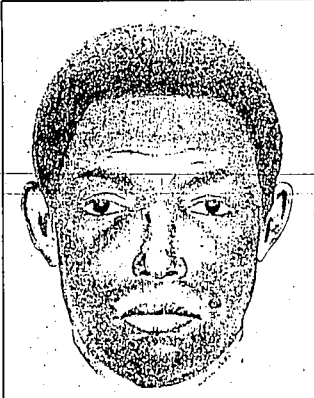
He said a tire tool, probably a lug wrench-type object, was found in the pickup truck, and Denver officers believe it may have been used to administer the fatal blows that killed Smith.

The body of Smith, 35, was found May 27, near a road in the Miracle Hot Springs area. It has later determined the man probably died early May 14.

Munn said it is not known if he was killed at the scene where the body was found or if he was killed somewhere else and the body was then taken there and thrown down an embankment near the road.

Other information officers have put together indicates that Smith was first seen with a black male when he stopped in Blackfoot to visit relatives on May 12.

Then next day, May 13, Smith was in Park City, Utah, where he wired friends in Washington for money

and received \$200 which he was to use to go to the state of Washington.

On May 14, he had reached Heyburn when he made a purchase from a convenience store using a \$50 bill for the transaction. The receipt for the purchase was found at the scene where the body had been left, Munn said.

Murder-caesarean case goes to grand jury

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — Bernalillo County District Attorney Steven Schiff said Thursday a grand jury could consider a provision calling for the death penalty in a case in which a pregnant woman was abducted and strangled and her unborn child was removed in a crude caesarean.

Schiff told a news conference he will ask a grand jury Aug. 6 to return an indictment against Daniel Kirtland Pierce, 39, charging her with first-degree murder, kidnapping and child abuse in the July 24

death of Cindy Lynn Ray, 23. The grand jury could find probable cause that the homicide was committed intentionally in the course of a kidnapping, a provision that carries the death penalty if Mrs. Pierce is indicted and convicted, the district attorney said.

Authorities said Mrs. Ray, who was 8½ months pregnant, was abducted while on a prenatal care clinic at Kirtland Air Force Base, where her husband Samuel is a staff sergeant.

The 5-foot-4, 175-pound Mrs.

Pierce, the child's wife of a Kirtland airman, was arrested July 24, several hours after she arrived at the University of New Mexico Hospital. Pierce, a 19-year-old girl, and told authorities she had just delivered the child and wanted the baby checked. Doctors determined the woman had not given birth.

Mrs. Pierce, after being questioned by police for several hours, led officers to the body of Mrs. Ray in the Manzanito Mountains east of Albuquerque.

She was arraigned Monday on

murder and kidnapping charges and ordered held under \$500,000 bond.

Dr. Ross-Zumwalt, of the Office of the Medical Investigator told the news conference a fairly blunt object was used to cut open Mrs. Ray's abdomen and uterus and removed her child.

"It was not a knife," he said. "It could have been anything."

He said the object could have been a key, but he said he was not able to determine conclusively what was used.

"Zumwalt said the horizontal incision was made just above the pubic area, the same way many caesareans are performed in hospitals.

Appeals court orders guilty plea withdrawn

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Court of Appeals says a defendant was not properly advised what could happen to him when he pleaded guilty to a criminal burglary after a Gooding tavern shooting.

The court on Thursday ordered the guilty plea from Harry Noel withdrawn, and vacated the man's sentence of five years in prison for burglary, and ordered him to serve another five years for using a firearm to commit a felony.

In a petition for post-conviction relief from his 1981 prison sentence, Noel asked to withdraw his guilty plea to a charge that he

shot another man in the nose in June of 1981.

The Court of Appeals accepted his argument that he was not advised the state had to prove specific intent. The court also overturned the sentence because Noel was not given sufficient notice that the judge could add more time on the firearm charge.

The Court of Appeals also said a sentence enhancement statute not in effect at the time of the crime was used by the judge, retired District Judge Douglas Kramer.

Zöllinger said he was also confused about opposition to electricity being sought by state.

The alternatives provided good access from the streets and a large grassy barrier between the neighbors and the pool. The area would probably be turned into a park, City Manager Tom Courtney said.

The third alternative, which the council rejected quickly, placed the pool on the side of the tennis courts and near Sawtooth Elementary School. Munn said he disliked the scheme because it left too large a grassy area to control.

City officials will meet with neighbors today to gauge their feelings about where the pool should be located on the site. The location of the pool was not available at press time.

The council also approved a set of criteria it will use to select a design/build proposal for the pool.

Normally public entities hire an architect to design a project and prepare specifications for bidding. The lowest bid must be accepted.

In this case, the city is calling for pool proposals from a team consisting of both designer and contractor.

Idaho delegation makes reactor pitch



WASHINGTON (AP) — Idaho's political leaders plan a meeting with Energy Secretary John Herrington at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory on Monday to urge the official to locate a proposed federal facility in Idaho.

The Idahoans are going after the proposed New Production Reactor, which would make weapons-grade plutonium and tritium. Construction of the NPR would cost about \$4 billion, and employ a work force of 4,000 to 5,000. After construction, sponsors say the facility would require a permanent work force of 1,000.

The Department of Energy started work on site selection in 1983, but two years later, DOE determined that construction could be delayed for up to 20 years.

Members of the Idaho congressional delegation, Gov. Cecil Andrus and officials of the Idaho Falls Chamber of Commerce will meet with Herrington at INEL.

The Idaho leaders said in a joint news release on Thursday that former Energy Secretary Donald Hodel selected INEL as the best possible site for NPR in 1983, and they have no reason to think that has changed.

"Almost four years ago to the day, the Department of Energy announced that Idaho was the preferred site for the NPR," the officials said.

"We believe that decision still stands today, and we're going to lay out the facts before the secretary on why Idaho is the best site for the NPR," they said.

Environmental groups opposed the effort to land NPR because it would be used in the process of manufacturing nuclear weapons.

In May, the governors and congressional delegations from South Carolina and Georgia visited Herrington, urging him to locate NPR at the Savannah River plant at Aiken, S.C.

That site, along with the Hanford Reservation near Richland, Wash., came in behind INEL in 1983 as DOE's preferred location for the reactor.

The Idahoans said the reasons why INEL was favored four years ago are still valid.

"The INEL has technical expertise, strong community support, and outstanding labor-

management relations," they said.

The officials said the decision to delay construction of NPR, combined with safety concerns at Hanford's N Reactor and with four heavy water reactors at Savannah River, "have endangered the United States' ability to produce adequate supplies of defense nuclear material."

Those backing construction of a new production facility argue that it is questionable whether the aging reactors at Hanford and Savannah River are able to produce significant amounts of plutonium and tritium, still will be able to operate at safe levels 10 years from now. It takes 10 years to construct a new breeder reactor, they said.

Pocatello wins fee order stay

POCATELLO (AP) — The city of Pocatello has won a court stay temporarily blocking an earlier order directing it to refund tens of thousands of dollars collected under its legally questionable street repair fee.

The temporary stay was granted upon the city's appeal to the state Supreme Court of 6th District Judge William Woodland's ruling voiding the unique fee that generates about \$550,000 a year to finance street improvements.

City Attorney Ivan Legler said the high court has been asked to make that stay permanent pending full review of Woodland's decision.

but he said no date has been set for a hearing on that request.

City officials have estimated that Woodland's refund directive would affective up to 900 people and total as much as \$50,000.

Ashton police widen murder probe's area

ASHTON (AP) — The investigation into the July 15 murder of the co-owner of a local grocery store has moved outside the Ashton area, authorities said.

"We have done close to 200 interviews and have taken a flood of phone calls," Fremont County Sheriff's deputy Butch Thomas said.

"We have pretty well eliminated local people as suspects," Thomas said. "We believe the person who perpetrated the crime was someone passing through the area."

Teresa Rice, 34, of Chester was found shot to death in the rear office of Jacks Super Food Store,

which she ran with her husband. Her body was discovered the next morning by her husband, but authorities said Mrs. Rice was killed sometime after 9 p.m. on July 15 after she closed the store.

Police said several hundred dollars, including silver coins, were missing from the store after the murder, and they have asked local merchants to report any transactions involving silver coins.

But Thomas indicated the investigation was shifting toward locating the person described in composite drawings being circulated throughout the region.

Craig: Sanction those who leak information

MOSCOW (AP) — Fewer U.S. congressmen should be involved with foreign policy and intelligence committees and those who are should be subject to sanctions if they leak secret information, says Rep. Larry Craig.

Craig said in an interview here he would not seek membership on those panels. He is calling for reorganization of such committees because of the Iran-Contra scandal.

Craig said because members of Congress can't be trusted to keep confidential information secret, that has led to a tendency by the White House to conceal foreign policy initiatives.

"Since Vietnam, the Congress of the United States has attempted to become a major player in the conduct of our foreign policy," he said.

"But Congress has not created the vehicle by which to become a legitimate participant. I'm not saying they shouldn't participate."

"I'm saying their track record is very poor. Advice and consult is one role, but to be outright obstructionist on a continuing basis is self-defeating," Craig said.

Craig said he believes the Iran-Contra matter demonstrates the need for a joint review of foreign policy by the administration and Congress.

Craig said one solution might be to combine the Senate and House intelligence committees.

Court orders firm to pay for widow's legal fees

BOISE (AP) — In a decision released Thursday, the Court of Appeals ordered the John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance Co. to pay attorney fees, after a policyholder was forced to sue to collect the proceeds of a life insurance policy.

Sandra L. Thomas, now a resident of the state of Washington, filed a claim on the policy after her former husband, John Thomas Cole, disappeared. The claim was denied, but five years later her former spouse was declared legally

dead.

Former district judge John Maynard refused to award Mrs. Thomas attorney fees in the case, but the Court of Appeals overturned the decision. The court said the insurance company did not meet the requirement to pay insurance proceeds within 30 days of being furnished proof of loss.

In other decisions: — Ordered new proceedings in legal action filed by Craig and Katherine Nalen against Edward

Jenkins, doing business as American Homes, to determine the amount of legal fees the Nalens should receive from Jenkins under the Idaho Consumer Protection Act. The court also ruled that as the prevailing party, the Nalens were entitled to legal fees for their appeal.

— Upheld the 26-year prison sentence, with a five-year term for escape to follow, ordered for Fred H. Ramirez after he was convicted of robbery in a Canyon County case. The court rejected Ramirez' argu-

ment that the sentence by 3rd District Judge Edward Lodge was unduly harsh, or that the man was denied effective assistance of counsel.

— In an Ada County case, ruled that a person can be charged and convicted of two separate offenses, burglary and petty larceny, for a single incident. The court said that because the elements of proof for each of the crimes are different, both can be filed over a single incident.

Jones: Idahoans may get refunds

BOISE (AP) — Idaho residents may be eligible for full cash refunds from a nationwide telephone sales promotion, says Attorney General Jim Jones.

Jones said Thursday the company involved, Kelly, Inc., Eugene, Ore., doing business as Western Express Service Co., has signed a voluntary compliance order in an Oregon court.

The compliance agreement covers solicitation made since last October to Idaho residents from the company's Oregon or Las Vegas offices.

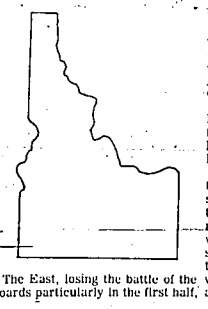
West stars shine

Coeur d'Alene's Wombolt pumps in 35 points as Western boys throttle East, 128-113

BOISE — Kyle Wombolt of Coeur d'Alene, bound for Boise State University's basketball program later this year, pumped in 35 points to lead the West All-Stars past the East 128-113 in the Idaho State Coaches' Association All-Star Boys' Basketball Game here Thursday night.

The girls' and boys' basketball all-star games were a prelude to tonight's state all-star volleyball match at 6 p.m. in Bronco Gym, followed by the all-state football game at Bronco Stadium. Wombolt, a 6-foot guard, was 7-for-7 at the free throw line and hit four three-pointers in leading the untested Westerners to the victory.



The East, losing the battle of the boards particularly in the first half,

could not match the West's outside firepower. When Justin Cammack of Rigby and Darren Johnson of Idaho Falls' Bonneville High School could not hit on their long-range jumpers, the game swung quite easily.

East Coach Elliott Anderson of Rigby, not used to losing games on this campus, noted afterward that his team's players' lack of familiarity with each other may have hurt. "I thought we would play better together than we did," said Anderson, whose Rigby High ballclub won the state A-1 championship in the nearby Pavillion last winter after winning the state A-2 title in the same building the year before. "We tried to stress that in practices this week and told them we had to have a good team effort to beat them

(the West). We thought we had them convinced, but they had a little pressure and got them down. We also struggled defensively a little bit."

The East's defensive problems hit early in the second half when the West parlayed a comfortable 60-48 halftime lead into a quick 73-52 in the third quarter advantage thanks to two conservative Wombolt three-point goals.

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The New York Mets not only handed the St. Louis Cardinals a seventh straight defeat Thursday night, they won a battle over a bat also.

"It's a perfectly sound bat," Howard Johnson said after St. Louis asked to have his bat inspected following Johnson's eighth-inning home run to cap New York's 5-3 victory. "This is an inspected 'I've hit home runs all my career' bat."

Johnson, following a quick inspection of the bat by umpiring crew chief Paul Ruge, received it back at the game's completion. Johnson has had a career-high 25 home runs this season.

"We had no way of keeping it," Ruge said. "We took it out of the game to prevent a fight. The grain looked like it had not been tampered with," the umpire said.

Johnson's sloop of the bat ran contrary to what Cardinals Manager Whitey Herzog claimed. Johnson's bat, the same one the New York player used for a homer on Wednesday night, had been tampered with.

"I knew there was cork in it. The hit home run but it's not Babe Ruth," Herzog said. "I wanted to check his bat last night, but the batboy got away with it."

Johnson's home run punctuated a three-game Mets sweep that reduced St. Louis' lead to four games in the National League East over the Montreal Expos and 5½ over New York.

"It was the foul 4-6 break that got us," chastised North. "You should have survived it," chastised North. "West's lead of the spade duck promised no more than four cards in that suit. Had he held a longer suit, no doubt he would have led it."

South succeeds if he first plays his club queen before leading to dummy's honors. East discards, and then it is an easy matter to pick up the hand with a repeated lead to ward dummy.

Chinese ballerina shares Russian technique

Dance workshop offers youths a foreign view

TWIN FALLS - Piano music wafts through an almost empty auditorium. With grace and precision, a ballet mistress skillfully executes a series of ballet steps in front of 11 attentive students. Foreheads furrowed and ponytails bobbing, they work to imitate her movements.

"You already tired?" she asks, repositioning a young student's leg.

Yi-Qi (pronounced Eee-Chi) Cheng, a petite, animated graduate of the Peking School of Dance, is one of six instructors presenting a two-week dance workshop at the College of Southern Idaho.

The dance camp, which began July 19 and will run through Saturday, is sponsored by the Idaho Dance Arts Alliance in conjunction with the CST Office of Continuing Education.

Beverly Hackney, director of the workshop, says the camp is providing students with a chance to work with professional instructors experienced in ballet technique, modern technique, jazz, pointe, musical theater and tap.

She says she thinks workshop students will benefit from Cheng's foreign training. "Most of her teachers were Russian, so she has that Russian background that she can impart to the students," says Hackney. "It's not often, nowadays, that we get trained, Russian dancers in America. It's kind of an opportunity for the children to learn what we would call the Russian technique."

Cheng says that youngsters from small towns who want to become professional dancers may have as much of a chance as those from larger cities. However, they must work hard, find a good teacher, be naturally gifted and willing to eventually move to an urban area to train.

"In the big city, they do see more performances; they do see more art," says Cheng in heavily accented English. "But it's very hard to tell if someone from a small town can make a very great ballet dancer or maybe a great artist. A lot of artists have natural ability. That's very important, I feel."

She says that in ballet, it is necessary to start a child's training by the age of 10. Someone who is especially talented may start at the age of 14, but usually no older. Parents can help their children develop by exposing them to as many of the arts as possible, she says.

"I think, of course, maybe parents could help them to find a good teacher. Then maybe parents can help them to enjoy another kind of art. Maybe music. Maybe plays. Maybe movies. You know, the love of things — maybe painting a picture — this, I think, all helps."

Cheng noted that in China, students must meet stringent physical requirements before they are allowed to take ballet training.

"You look at how long their legs are, how long is their body, what kind of shoulder, and what kind of neck. The face must be good and pretty. And they want not only long legs; they want a beautiful leg shape."

Cheng says that while all great ballet dancers must eventually meet those requirements, she's glad that in this country training is available to anyone who wants it.

"In China you might close the door on a lot of talent; you might miss some talent. In the United States, a lot of people can try it and enjoy it," she says.

After being determined a promising young student, Cheng started ballet training at the age of 8 under the tutelage of two Russian instructors who had fled from their country to China during Russia's revolution. When she was 13, Cheng entered the Peking School of Dance, where she was instructed by another Russian ballet master, a former director of the Kirov Ballet School.

Cheng says that she lived at the school and that the instruction was excellent, though demanding.

"The teachers were all artists," says Cheng. "Artists see your talent, maybe, and they wish you to become very, very good — to become great. So they push you very hard. That's a Russian teacher's way. They don't talk so much, and say 'Oh, see, right now maybe you are expending more energy and a lot of time, but you will have a very good future.' They won't do that. They just push you hard, but in their heart they are saying, 'I understand, but right now we are training students. Why I push you hard is for a beautiful you, not a beautiful me.' But at that time, they didn't express that to me."

She was allowed to visit home only twice a year. Even though she says she missed her own family, her ballet instructors became like parents to her.

"They were very good, very strong," says Cheng. "They were very earnest and dedicated to the arts, and their hearts were very kind. Right now I still miss them."

She says she once tried to write to one of her teachers who now resides in Russia, but never received an answer.

"Someone said maybe the government does not like the letter," she says.

After graduating from the Peking School of Dance in 1978, she moved to the United States.

'L.A. Law,' NBC lead in Emmy nominations

LOS ANGELES — "L.A. Law," NBC's stylish legal series, took the Television Academy to court Thursday and was awarded 20 nominations for the 39th Annual Primetime Emmy Awards.

The first-year show, another demonstration of the skillful mixture of drama and comedy that writer-producer Steven Bochco patented with "Hill Street Blues," dominated the pre-dawn announcement of the Emmy nominations.

NBC's "Golden Girls," a sassy comedy about four retired women in the same house in Miami, and "Moonlighting," ABC's light-hearted, sexy detective series, each won 14 nominations.

"Moonlighting" was the big flop at last year's awards ceremonies, getting one award out of 16 nominations. A year earlier, NBC's "Miami Vice" nearly matched that with one award from 15

nominations.

NBC led the nominees with 140, while ABC and CBS each had 75 nominations. PBS got 25 and Fox Broadcasting, five. Seven nominations went to syndicated shows.

NBC grabbed all five nominations for best comedy series, and all four members of the cast of "Golden Girls" were nominated — three for best actress and one for best supporting actress. "The Peacock Network" also dominated the nominations for best miniseries.

NBC's "St. Elsewhere" received 11 nominations and "Cheers" got 10. Two NBC miniseries came in for multiple awards: "Nutsacker: Money, Madness and Murder," with nine, and "The Two Mrs. Grenvilles" with eight.

'La Bamba': Rock 'n' roll myth-making, fresh at source

Lou Diamond Phillips, the star of "La Bamba," Luis Valdez's film about the life of rock 'n' roll singer-songwriter Ritchie Valens, has the broad, noble face of a Mayan deity. It's a face with great inherent beauty and dignity, a great face for the camera, a great face to myth-making. And rock 'n' roll myth-making is what Valdez is up to.

Set in the dusty, dirt-brown valleys around Los Angeles, "La Bamba" is the story of the emergence in the late '50s of a 17-year-old Mexican American boy — Valens, whose real name was Ricardo Valenzuela, was a third-generation American who couldn't speak a word of Spanish — from the migrant camps and fruit groves to the front lines of rock. Basically, it's a love story — an up-from-the-basement account of a pop comet — but the movie has an energetic, almost naive spirit. It plays like a film about a neighborhood hero made by an adoring youngster down the street, and the hero worship is so unrestrained that it has a kind of infectious freshness that overwhelms any objections.

Admittedly, Valens had the kind of career that rock legends are made of. From start to finish, it lasted all of about eight months.

Gold rush celebrated

IDAHO CITY — A week-long celebration commemorating the discovery of gold in the Boise Basin begins Sunday near the site where gold was discovered 125 years ago. That discovery triggered a rush of miners to southwestern Idaho, then officially the Oregon Territory.

Gold panners, professional and amateurs, are expected to line Grimes Creek at its junction with Idaho Highway 21, about 28 miles east of Boise, in competition for prizes and gold. To ensure that modern prospectors make a "strike," celebration organizers have saluted some of the area with gold.

Panners still occasionally prospect the creek, which was named after George Grimes, a member of the original prospecting party who was killed by Indians.

The Grimes party, which included D.H. Foggus, the prospector who carefully and successfully panned the first gold at Boston bar, about 16 miles north of where the celebration begins on Sunday, made the original gold discovery on August 2, 1862.

during which time he had three Top 10 hits, and culminated in 1959 with the plane crash that took his life as well as those of Buddy Holly and the Big Bopper.

It was the kind of success, the film tells us, that Valens always expected for himself. When we first see Ritchie, it's the summer of 1957, and he is picking apricots in the groves near where he and his mother (Rosanna De Soto) and his two little sisters live. The camp is cramped and squalid, but though the characters complain about the conditions and their lack of a real home, Valdez presents their lives poetically. Cinematographer Adam Greenberg captured the look of laborers working in the idyllic, sun-drenched California weather, and the light ennobles them and softens their hardship. Though clearly they are living in poverty and slaving away in the heat for almost no money, as you look at the life as Valdez depicts it here, it almost does not seem so bad.

Little of this appears to have an effect on Ritchie. Almost never without his white hollow-body guitar slung over his shoulder — sometimes he carries a dark green electric — he cares about, he says, is his music. And his family. And his dreams, he tells his brother Bob (Easi Morales), are pure rock 'n' roll.

From the opening shots on a schoolyard basketball court, Valdez lays on the grainy portraits, showing slow-motion shots of ominous, gliding planes and midair explosions. Flying images — a winged guitar that pops up on a poster and later as a tattoo on the arm of Ritchie — and his Thunderbird — ricochet throughout the film. As the story goes, his best friend was killed on a playground by a crashing plane, and had Ritchie not attended his grandfather's funeral, he would have been killed too. All his life, Ritchie says, he has known he will die on a plane. "La Bamba" is a puzzle — a real mixed bag. Some of it, like the

mystical implications of his material in his own head, much less in the film. And I'm not sure it would do us much good if he did. According to Valdez, if Valens was prepared for the kind of success he achieved, his end didn't come as much of a surprise either.

It feels as if he has lived a story similar to the one the movie tells — it sounds rooted in that life — and that may have something to do with why his versions of the songs, some of which are improvements on the originals, work so well in the film.

ABC's "Liberty Weekend — Closing Ceremonies."

Six nominations each went to NBC's "Unnatural Causes," "LBJ: The Early Years" and "Night Court," ABC's "Happy Birthday, Hollywood" and CBS' "Carnegie Hall: The Grand Reopening."

The winners will be revealed by the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences in ceremonies originating from the Pasadena Civic Auditorium on Sunday, Sept. 20. The awards will be telecast for the first time on the Fox Broadcasting Company's new national programming network. Fox won the Emmy telecast for three years with a bid of \$1.25 million a year.

"L.A. Law" was nominated as best drama series and won eight nominations in the acting categories. It also received two directing nominations and two for writing, including one for creators Bocheo and Terry Louise Fisher. Bocheo was the co-creator and executive producer of "Hill Street Blues" when it became the most honored drama series in television history with 26 Emmys. It was nominated for three more this year.

Corbin Bernsen, who plays the devoted divorce lawyer, was nominated as best lead actor in a drama series. His mother, Jeanne Cooper, who played his television mother, was named for best guest actress. Jill Eikenberry was nominated as best lead actress and her husband, Michael Tucker, was named in the best supporting actor category.

William Daniels and Bonnie Bartlett, married in real life as on television, were nominated for their roles on "St. Elsewhere." Daniels was selected as best actor in a drama series and she for best supporting actress. Both won Emmys last year.

Other "L.A. Law" acting nominations: Susan Dey as best lead actress, Jimmy Smits and Susan Rutan for supporting roles, and Alfre Woodard as best guest actress. Woodard also was nominated as best actress in a miniseries or special for NBC's "Unnatural Causes."

"Adderly" moves to prime time—Page 2

V.H. Rekert tries out prime time as the indomitable spy Adderly

By TONI REINHOLD

He's a super spy who performs his job with as much class and savvy as James Bond, but without the aid of those superabundant gadgets. And he has brought his own brand of warmth and integrity to the job. He's V.H. Adderly, and he has won the hearts of CBS's late-night audience. Beginning Aug. 7, and continuing for the following five weeks, he will try to do the same thing in prime time when "Adderly" jumps to Friday nights at 10 (ET) for a limited run.

One of the major reasons for the show's popularity is Winston Rekert, who plays Adderly, a spy who has the use of only one hand. The injury came as a result of a run-in with some nasty enemy agents when he was at the pinnacle of his career. He has since been relegated to Miscellaneous Affairs, a department in which his superiors figure he won't run into much danger. But they haven't figured on his clever charades and indomitable spirit.

Having only one usable hand hasn't kept Adderly out of the thick of things, but it has meant a lot of extra work for Rekert, a native of Vancouver, British Columbia, who has been acting since 1956.

"When I was developing the character, I went to see doctors to find out what exactly would be wrong with my hand," he explains. "Then I talked to people who don't have the use of one hand to find out how they live and work. Adderly doesn't see it as a handicap. Adderly's whole thing is, 'You may treat me differently but I can still do what I have to do. You just won't let me.'"

"I've had to learn to do things with only one hand and make certain adjustments — little things, like carrying all my change and keys in one side of my pants or jacket," he says. "I don't wear shoes with laces anymore, and I've discovered that tying my tie with one hand can be quite an experience. There are other things you don't think about until they arise, and then you say, 'Oh God, how am I going to do this with one hand?'"

"But it's much more exciting and challenging than doing something normally," adds Rekert. "Adderly feels he can do anything that anybody with two hands can do, and he wouldn't let on is something is a problem. He tries to do everything as smoothly as possible, without making a big deal out of it. So when the director says, 'In this scene, I

want you to pick up that file, tie your tie, read the newspaper and play jacks,' I say, 'Oh God...' Then I do it."

"I work on some things over the weekends. I just finished practicing for an upcoming scene in which I have to assemble a machine gun in eight seconds with one hand while the bad guys are running at me. I spent a weekend putting the gun together and taking it apart with one hand. My son thought it was fabulous."

Rekert and his wife, Pat, a photographer, have two sons, 4-year-old Dylan and 1-year-old Carson. And when he has free time, there's nothing Rekert would rather do than spend it with his family.

"The important things to me are my family, my friends, being loyal to my friends and being honest," says Rekert.



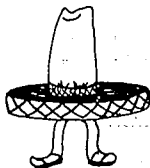

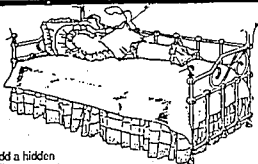

Peter Scolari recalls past

NEW YORK (AP) — Peter Scolari and Tom Hanks had a surprise reunion when they crossed paths at a publicist's office recently.

There was some fast catching up and a promise to get together later. Then the two actors went off to respective interviews.

Scolari, sitting down with a reporter a few minutes later, said the two formed a powerful bond as rookie co-stars of the ABC sitcom "Bosom Buddies" in the early 1980s. They were near tears, having not seen each other for six months, he said.

"Tom and I had a real genuine, personal friendship that I think we took for granted," he said. "We feel like what we did on that show was based on secrets that he and I shared as friends, things we were going through at that time in our lives in the television industry — but as people, not as these slick professionals — and I'll never forget it."

"So that's what the bond was and remains. So, yeah, we were just fighting back tears, believe it or not, seeing each other."

After "Bosom Buddies" was canceled — it had a brief summer run on NBC — Hanks went on to movie stardom in "Splash." He was in town plugging his new movie, "Dragnet."

Scolari, an accomplished stage actor, tried an ABC sitcom of his own, "And Baby Makes Five," that lasted only a month. He did small television roles and honed his juggling and acrobatic talents on "Circus of the Stars," a network special he calls "Circus of the Unemployed Actors."

In 1984, he was added to the cast of the CBS sitcom "Newhart," playing preppy Michael Harris, worshipful boyfriend of overprivileged Stephanie Vanderkellen, played by Julia Duffy.

With the addition of Scolari, the cast jelled after two seasons of juggling supporting characters, and "Newhart" is now one of CBS' most successful series.

Scolari has blended well into the "Newhart" family. He expects to stay with the show as long as star Bob Newhart wants to keep doing it. After that, Scolari has a deal with MTM Productions for his own TV series.

Despite his stated satisfaction with his career, in talk show appearances Scolari has made wry references to his relatively low-profile supporting role on television versus Hanks' huge box-office success.

Stock called back to "Spenser"

LOS ANGELES — In a case of art imitating art, Barbara Stock is returning to ABC's "Spenser: For Hire" as Susan Silverman.

In the "Spenser" novels, written by Robert B. Parker, Susan moved to San Francisco, developed a new love interest and had to be rescued in "A Catskill Eagle." At the end of the first year of the TV series, it was decided to move Spenser in a new direction, with a new woman, and Stock was dropped.

In the second season, Carolyn McCormick played the new woman, Assistant District Attorney Rita Fiore, but the two never progressed beyond a few melting kisses.

After the season ended, Robert Urich, who plays Spenser, campaigned to bring Susan back, and Warner Bros. Television recently announced McCormick would leave the show.

Parker, who has been a consultant to the series, wrote the script that returns Susan to the show.

"I think Robert's feeling about the show is that it should be more about Spenser and Hawk and Susan and less about the guest stars," Stock said. Hawk (Avery Brooks) is Spenser's mysterious friend, who often works on the shady side of the law.

In her year away from the series, Stock made a movie with Scott Glenn, "Verne Miller," in which she plays a sultry singer in a Prohibition speakeasy.

Stock sings two songs in the movie, which she co-wrote, and she is helping to write the theme song. The film, based on the life of one of Al Capone's henchmen, is due in theaters this fall.

While preparing to leave for Boston, where "Spenser" is filmed, Stock talked about her career while keeping an eye on a big, awkward golden retriever named Beaugard.

"If he gets housebroken, I'll take him to Boston," she said. Otherwise, Beaugard will stay with Bill Dunn, who was executive producer of "Verne Miller" and now is the man in the actress's life.

Stock, who broke into television as a talk show host in Indianapolis, had done guest roles in about 20 series, from "Moonlighting" to "Murder, She Wrote." And she starred on Broadway with Raul Julia in the Tony Award-winning musical "Nine" before landing her first series role on "Spenser."

That lasted a year.

"After the first year, a new pro-



ducer (Juanita Bartlett) came in and she wanted to write out my character," said Stock. "I never met her and I don't know why. But she did what she thought was best for the show. The feeling at the time was that the relationship Spenser and Susan had in the books was difficult to translate to television.

"It's difficult to show an ongoing relationship and make it exciting and meaningful. That's what we want to bring to the screen this season."

Susan made her first, brief appearance in the second of Parker's 14 "Spenser" novels. She was originally a high school guidance counselor, but went back to school and became a psychologist — and the No. 1 woman in the detective's life.

The character is said to be loosely based on Parker's wife, Joan. Stock said she has talked to Parker about

the character, but hasn't learned much from him. It all comes from the books.

"I try to play Susan as close to the books as possible," Stock said. "She's witty, intelligent and has an edge to her. She's sort of queen of the wisecracks. She doesn't necessarily understand why Spenser does what he does, but she loves him for it. He's a man with a strong code of honor."

Stock said she sees their relationship as close to that of William Powell and Myrna Loy in "The Thin Man" movies.

"They were very witty and were a married couple who kept it interesting," she said. "I was disappointed at being written out of the show because there are so few good strong relationships on television. It was too bad they couldn't make it work."

Television judge serious about job

NEW YORK (AP) — Judge Joseph A. Wapner, whose television courtroom is seen by millions daily, says he has to take his role on "The People's Court" more seriously than if he were in a courtroom out of the spotlight.

"It puts a tremendous burden on me to try to exemplify what a good judge should be like and to try to enunciate what I consider the law to be," Wapner said in an interview published in the upcoming Parade magazine.

"You can't let sympathy invade your judgment," he said. "In most

cases, I'm stricter about the law than I might be otherwise. I want to be sure the public has a perception of someone who's fair and reasonable and understanding, and who follows the law."

Wapner also said he keeps strict order in his courtroom.

"I won't allow any monkey business," he said. "This is a court, and I'm trying a case. If somebody comes in chewing gum, Busty, my bailiff, goes over with a piece of paper and makes him take it out; if somebody is wearing a hat, he makes him take it off."

Samms makes mysterious return from space to appear in 'Dynasty'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Emma Samms, last seen on television being whisked off in space in "The Colbys," swears that the other night she saw a light in the sky and, thinking it might be a UFO, went outside to investigate.

No, it wasn't a UFO, which probably was a relief to the producers of ABC's "Dynasty." Samms is returning to the hit prime-time soap opera as Fallon Carrington Colby and no more complications are needed.

The question everyone is asking is how will she get back to Earth and from one series to the other.

"The Colbys," spun off from "Dynasty" two years ago, ended for the season in the spring with a cliffhanger in which Fallon was taken away on a UFO. But ABC pulled the plug on the show, leaving Fallon out in space until it was decided that she and her husband, Jeff Colby (John James), would go back to "Dynasty."

"I have no idea how she's going to get back," Samms says. "I'm dying to know myself."

Samms says whatever the device is, it will not be a dream, which explained the return of Patrick Duffy to "Dallas" after his character had been killed. Her idea is to have Fallon stagger in from the desert and gasp, "You'll never believe what happened to me."

"And Jeff doesn't believe her and she gets shipped off again to see her psychiatrist. I think it works and you don't know whether it was real or not."

Fallon, the daughter of Blake Carrington (John Forsythe) and his former wife, Alexis Carrington Colby (Joan Collins), made her first appearance on "Dynasty" when the show made its bow in 1981. At that time Fallon was played by Pamela Sue Martin. Martin left the series at the end of the 1983-84 season and Fallon died in a plane crash.

Then she was resurrected at the end of the 1984-85 season. Turns out she didn't die in the plane crash, but her looks were altered. She now looked just like Emma Samms. It was all part of a bigger plot to spin off "The Colbys" from "Dynasty." It was felt that Jeff and Fallon would be just the link that was needed between the two shows.

Fallon also underwent a personality transplant. "When I started playing her she was going through her amnesia stage," Samms says. "She was vulnerable. She didn't know she had once been a little bitch. I

thought that once she got her memory back she would go back to being devious. But they decided to keep her nice.

"The great thing is that although she's nicer she still has the fire from the old days. You can play both sides. When she loses her temper, look out."

It's not the first time Samms has altered a character. After the departure of Genie Francis from ABC's "General Hospital," following the big "Luke and Laura" romance and wedding, Samms joined the show in 1982 as Holly Sutton Scorpio. She was originally to be Luke's new love interest.

"She started off as not a nice person," Samms says. "I managed to change her to a more sympathetic character. The great thing about television is that the writers look at what you're doing and what you do best. They also listen to the public when they write in and say what they like and don't like. So a character can change."

At one point, Samms was playing both Holly and Fallon. While doing a scene for "Dynasty" she fell off a horse and ruptured a spinal disc. She was laid up for six weeks.

"I had to catch up on both shows," she says. "One day on 'General Hospital' I had to do 89 pages, which is twice what we usually do in one day. Fortunately, I'd been on the show for three years and learned to memorize pages quickly."

What happened to Holly Scorpio? She moved to Australia and before you knew it was killed in a plane crash. She'll stay dead until they
