## Meehl orders formation of a new grand jury

TWIN FALLS — Fifth District Judge Daniel Meehl has ordered the formation of a grand jury to investigate drug-related crimes in Twin Falls County starting Sept. 21.

The order signed Aug. 4 granted County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter's request for a grand jury. In the request, Baxter stated that "the public interest requires the formation of a grand jury in the county of Twin Falls to inquire into circumstances and events concerning the illegal distribution and possession of controlled substances in Twin Falls County."

The names of 24 grand jury candidates were drawn Wednesday, said Kathleen Noh, Twin Falls County Commissioner.

The first grand jury in Twin Falls County history

met in June. That grand jury handed down 21 drug-related indictments June 10.

Baxter argued at that time the grand jury system saved her office time and money because of the large number of similar cases that would not have to go through preliminary hearings.

But those indictments were challenged by Twin Falls Public Defender Mike Wood and others, who said the jury-selection procedure used by the county was improper.

Meehl and Fifth District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt, who handled the cases, overthrew the indictments July 21, saying the jury-selection procedure used by the county for the grand jury was in "substantial non-compliance" with Idaho law.

Immediately following the ruling, Baxter vowed to take the cases through another grand jury as soon as new jury-selection procedures were in place and a grand jury panel could be drawn. However, the order forming the second grand jury does not state that it will hear the same cases as the first grand jury.

Baxter used the same economic argument in her Aug. 3 request as in the formation of the first grand jury.

"The state requests the grand jury be impeached in the interest of judicial economy, because of the complexity of the matters of inquiry, and the sensitive nature of such investigation," she said.

In addition to ordering the formation of a grand jury, Meehl signed a judicial order Wednesday protecting a

manual used by Baxter and her deputies, written partly by the Ada County Prosecutor's office, containing tactical and legal advice concerning grand juries.

Meehl's decision came less than three hours after *The Times-News* formally requested in a letter to inspect and copy the manual.

In that letter, *Times-News* Managing Editor Stephen Hargten requested the manual under the Idaho Public Writings law, which states in part: "Every citizen has a right to inspect and take a copy of any public writing of this state, except as expressly provided by statute."

"I am requesting this public record because it appears to relate substantively to a recent proposal from your office to begin the ongoing use of grand juries in Twin Falls County for the prosecution of felony cases," Hargten said in his letter.

"As you may be aware, the Idaho Supreme Court has

## New owners clean home, save licenses

TWIN FALLS — A three-week clean-up by new managers at the Evergreen Manor nursing home back within health care standards and saved the operating licenses of the 184-bed facility.

After a two-day inspection, federal and state examiners cleared the Twin Falls nursing home of defects in patient care that had brought it to the brink of decertification, Keith Holloway, head of family-run Western Health Care Corp. of Boise, announced Thursday.

Jean Schoonover, chief of nursing home inspections for the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare, said Evergreen Manor will retain its state license and its certification for treating Federal Medicare and Medicaid patients.

"Apparently they have worked diligently to bring that (home) back into compliance," she said.

Holloway and his wife Delta, who took over Evergreen Manor's management on July 18, reversed a list of defects serious enough to close the facility. An earlier inspection — conducted while the home was under the operation of Miles Taggart of Brem, Utah — had found violations of patient hygiene and privacy, required recordkeeping, food preparation, physician orders in administering drugs and staff training, among others.

The facility's state license formally expired on Aug. 5, but was extended by an administrative appeal. The federal approval for Medicare and Medicaid programs would have elapsed on Saturday, Holloway said.

However, this week's reinspection relieved both certifications. The nursing home had trimmed the sub-standard areas to one from six, including the license-threatening "condition" of poor nursing services.

Evergreen Manor still must improve its rehabilitation programs, Holloway said.

In the past three weeks, the home has hired 30 new nurses and nursing assistants, and another eight are to join the staff in the next two weeks, he said. The new hires will increase the staff to about 115, he said.

Morale among employees also has improved, affecting the quality of care given to the home's 144 patients, many of whom are elderly or disabled, Schoonover said.

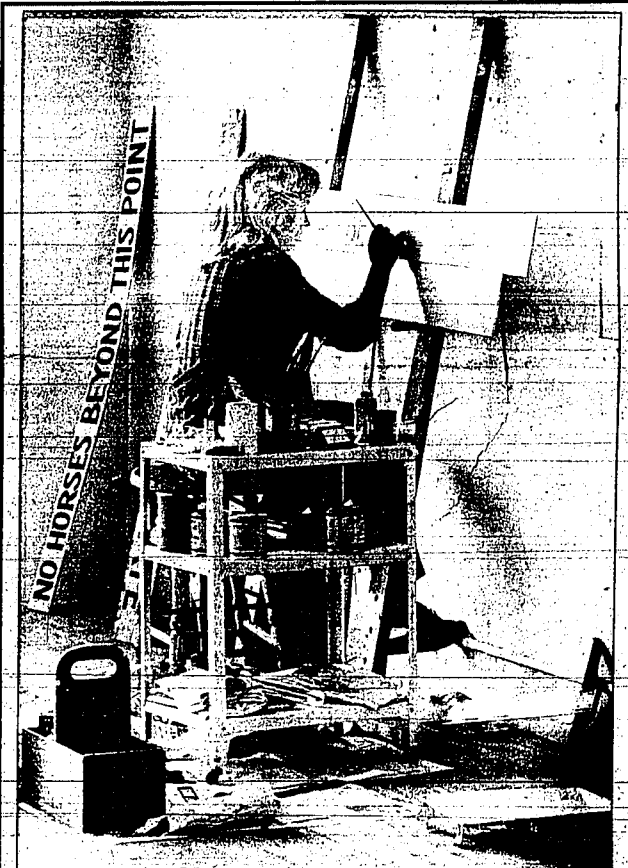
Holloway threw a pizza party for employees Thursday to celebrate the home's recovery. They worked their hearts out to make this go, he told reporters.

When Holloway took over, he swept in and terminated both the current manager and nursing supervisor.

He said Thursday that Joyce Ellis, longtime administrator of Hurrall's Nursing Home in Buhl, will become Evergreen Manor's on-site administrator on Sept. 1.

The management also is searching for a new nursing supervisor. Delta Holloway, who is a registered nurse, now is running the nursing staff personally.

## Reagan shifts his emphasis to Bork clash

NORTH PLATTE, Neb. — President Reagan, seeking to put "the Iran-Contra mess" behind him, carried his fight to win Senate confirmation of Supreme Court nominee Robert Bork to the nation's heartland Thursday.

"No other issue could be more pressing" than getting the federal appeals court judge seated before the court convenes on Oct. 5, Reagan said in a speech to Nebraska civic and community leaders at a ranch near this Western Nebraska rail center.

American voters want to see a full complement of nine justices on the bench when the Supreme Court reconvenes," Reagan said.

The president flew from Nebraska to California for a 26-day stay in Los Angeles and at his own ranch, north of Santa Barbara.

Reagan's helicopter left Point Mugu Naval Air Station shortly after 3 p.m. PDT and as it approached the ranch, it was involved in a near-collision with an unidentified airplane, presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said.

Fitzwater said the pilot of the presidential helicopter, Marine One, reported that the plane flew within 250 feet of the chopper and about 150 feet below it.

Fitzwater said the pilot of the small airplane was taken into custody as he landed at John Wayne Airport in Orange County, about 50 to 60 miles south of here, after being chased by another government helicopter.

The spokesman said the president and the other occupants of the helicopter, including White House Chief of Staff Howard H. Baker Jr., and National Security Adviser Frank C. Carlucci, did not see the plane.

Reagan and his wife, Nancy, will return to Washington on Sept. 6.

Meanwhile, White House chief of staff Howard Baker said Reagan had not yet made up his mind on asking Congress for renewed aid to the Nicaraguan Contra guerrillas, and would base a decision at the end of the fiscal year on Sept. 30 on "such things as whether substantial progress is being made" toward implementation of a new plan that calls for the Sandinista government to institute democracy and put a cease-fire in place.

"I can't tell you what the president will do," the chief of staff said. "He can make a decision unilaterally whether to submit a request at that moment."

Reagan, in a televised speech Wednesday night that was billed as his long-promised reaction to the congressional Iran-Contra hearings, said that increased cooperation with Congress "may be the eventual blessing in disguise to come out of the Iran-Contra mess."

He also pledged in his televised speech to concentrate now on his remaining agenda, including confirmation of Bork, support for rebels fighting the Sandinistas and the package of measures he refers to as his "economic bill of rights."

## Portion of anchorage closed by mine threat

MANAMA, Bahrain — Officials closed part of a busy anchorage just south of the Persian Gulf where six mines were found, but declared it safe again after nightfall Thursday. Crews of four nations searched for more mines.

Saudi police said in a delayed report that a Saudi Arabian coast guard vessel hit a mine at the northern end of the gulf Wednesday and two crewmen were slightly injured.

The anchorage off Fujairah was a safe haven from the 7-year-old war between Iran and Iraq until the U.S.-operated super-tanker, *Texaco*, Caribbean struck a mine three days ago in the 35-square-mile area that closed to traffic earlier Thursday.

Six more have been found since the tanker was damaged Monday. They are the "spiked-globe" type

that explode on contact, and several shipping executives said they believe the mines were free-floating rather than tethered.

Col. Saad Samsoun, the Fujairah police chief, said Thursday night that a search of the coastal area found it free of mines, and "full safety" for international navigation had been ensured.

Maritime executives Fujairah said the radio had stopped broadcasting hourly warnings that began after the prohibition was announced.

Iran has been accused of laying the mines but claims the United States is to blame and has offered to help in the search.

A dispatch from Iran's official news agency quoted a naval commander as saying his ships would start minesweeping operations Friday, in international waters not

## Salvagers of Titanic plan TV safe opening

PARIS — Treasure hunters have found one of the Titanic's strongboxes, "researchers" said Thursday, and they'll open it on live television in October to see if it holds any of the diamonds rumored to have been aboard the shipwrecked luxury liner.

The strongbox was discovered Wednesday on the ocean floor 2 1/2 miles below the surface at the Titanic site, 360 miles southwest of Newfoundland, said spokesman Daniel Pugeat.

He said it was locked and refused to speculate on its contents.

Pugeat said that after so many years of speculation, he found it hard to believe the treasure finally was to be retrieved.

Legend has surrounded the

treasure which may have gone down with the 1,513 passengers and crew who drowned when the Titanic hit an iceberg and sank April 15, 1912.

The big prize was rumored to be a strongbox containing diamonds being transported to the United States by DeBeers.

Such rumors have been debunked by Titanic experts who say that the diamonds are a fantasy and that any treasure that might have been aboard was taken out of the safes in the hours before the ship sank beneath the waves.

The safe will be brought to the surface "one or two days from now" and placed in a special observation crate for transport to a laboratory in Paris operated by

## Consultant: Congress avoided policy issues

WASHINGTON — Michael Ledeen, a key figure in launching the sale of U.S.-made weapons to Iran, says Congress shunned his offer to testify publicly because lawmakers were reluctant to tackle complicated policy issues, some of which involve Israel.

"They really didn't want to open up all these other questions," Ledeen said in an interview shortly after the congressional committee concluded three months of public testimony on Aug. 3.

Ledeen, a former consultant to the National Security Council, said he had hoped to testify in public before the congressional Iran-Contra committee. If he had, he said he would have:

- Denied insinuations that he benefited financially from the weapons sales.

Explained how he followed orders from his superiors in his 1985 contacts with Israeli officials. Those contacts led to the first shipment of U.S.-made TOW missiles from Israeli stockpiles to Iran in August 1985.

- Elaborated on why he thinks the program turned into a debacle, resulting in the absence of any coherent U.S. policy toward Iran.

Spokesmen for the Iran-Contra committee said the panel skipped Ledeen's public testimony because they didn't think he could add new information.

But a congressional aide, speaking on condition he not be identified, said it was premature to say the investigation into Ledeen's role and his financial status is finished. "We're still looking at him," the aide said.

The national utility, Electricite de France, Puget said.

It will be taken to Monte Carlo, Monaco, to be opened during the Oct. 28 broadcast, "Return to the Titanic Live."

Saying that was scheduled to begin Thursday was postponed because of high winds, he said.

The mini-submarine being used to scoop up Titanic artifacts is owned by the Exploration Institute for Research and Exploitation of the Sea, a partner in a 1985 Franco-American expedition that located

the Titanic.

The American partner, the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute in Massachusetts, mounted a second expedition last summer, led by Robert Ballard, to map and photograph the site. The French Institute did not have Ballard's maps and had to repeat the search.

The journal Oceanus, a science magazine published by the Woods Hole Institute, carried an edited version of Ballard's radio report from July 19, 1986, in which he described seeing several strongboxes.

Ballard reported, "We did find

the ship's safe. They were rather spectacular. The one we went up to had a big handle that looked like it was either bronze or gold.

"It had a dial and a beautiful British crest. It was polished clean. We went over with the manipulator mini-submarine's mechanical arm and grabbed hold of the big handle, but the safe would not open. We then took pictures of it and moved on."

Puget had no details on the appearance of the safe found by his expedition, and said they were still seeking the other strongboxes.

specified, but would not work in the Fujairah area without permission.

The Saudi coast guard vessel hit the mine 10-20 miles off Khafji, more than 500 miles northwest of the Fujairah anchorage, said a police officer reached by telephone in the village. He insisted on anonymity and would not give further information.

Kuwait's Al-Ahmedi oil terminal, loading point for U.S.-escorted Kuwait tankers, is about 60 miles northwest of the site. The spotting of one, an apparent reason for the 24-hour delay of a Kuwait-

bound convoy earlier this week.

A shipping source said Saudi Arabia said at the time that the mine was near shore and not a threat to shipping.

Shipping sources said the United Arab Emirates declared a "danger zone" in the affected part of its anchorage 30 miles north of the Gulf. Tankers transship oil and ships take on supplies. It also is used to assemble the northbound convoys of U.S. warships and Kuwait tankers flying American flags.

The American oil companies Mobil and Chevron told their tankers to avoid the anchorage, where 50 or more ships often can be found

at once, and to stay at least 25 miles from shore. The closed area extended seven miles off the coast of Fujairah, one of seven sheikdoms that make up the Emirates, and five along it.

Executives of shipping companies said the average number of ships near the Strait of Hormuz, the southern entrance to the Persian Gulf, was down more than half to about 20 since the mine scare began.

Foreign officials said the USS Guadalcanal, a helicopter carrier equipped with eight minesweeping Sea Stallions, would not arrive in the region for another week.

sitions from Ledeem more than once, and those depositions will be released once classified material has been reviewed by Stan Hirsch, a spokesman for the Senate panel said. Ledeem is also expected to give another deposition behind closed doors.

The 46-year-old Ledeem, who operates a consulting business out of his home, says he has never been publicly translated into a clean slate for him. "I have behaved properly and ethically," he said.

Ledeem is particularly irate about suggestions — contained in the Tower commission report — that

he, along with Iranian and Israeli middlemen, made money from the weapons transactions. He said fairness dictated that he be allowed to respond to the allegations in public.

"Nobody can find a penny," he said, noting that he has turned over all his financial records to Lawrence Walsh, the independent counsel in the Iran-Contra case. "I'm offering a 50 percent commission to anybody who can find that money because we can use it," he said.

Ledeem said he has not sought immunity from prosecution because he did nothing improper.

He said he believes he wasn't

called to Capitol Hill because lawmakers wanted to end the hearings and were reluctant to delve into the Byzantine world of U.S.-Middle East politics.

"Had they called me they would have had to deal with a whole related set of complicated policy questions, some of which involve Israel," he said. "I would have greatly complicated the analysis of the whole matter."

Even though Israel had its own reasons for making contacts in Iran, Jerusalem had "no leverage" over the United States and couldn't force Washington into doing something it didn't want to do, Ledeem said.

held ... that all public records and public writings of this state and its counties are open to public inspection unless a specific statutory exemption allows access to be restricted."

Hartgen wrote, "Neither I nor our counsel can find any such exemption for policy and procedure of public officials or public officers or public officials."

Baxter argued at an in-chamber hearing with Mechl on Wednesday that Idaho Rules of Criminal Procedure regulating disclosure of evidence protected the document, and since a grand jury is being convened disclosure of the document would violate those provisions.

Those rules protect the disclosure of "legal research or records, correspondence, reports, memoranda to the extent that they contain the opinions, theories or conclusions of the prosecuting attorney or of members of his legal staff."

Mechl said in an interview Thursday his order was intended to keep the matter in a "status quo."

"I am certainly willing to reconsider that order if you or any other member of the public wishes to argue it," Mechl told *The Times-News*. "The order is not etched in stone. If someone comes into court and contended it was public, I would reconsider."

Baxter argued in her request to protect the manual because:

"The manual is the 'work product' of attorneys. It contains legal research, records, and opinions, theories and conclusions of the prosecuting attorney and her legal staff."

"A grand jury has been summoned to sit on 12. It contains a manual is necessary for prosecution during that grand jury."

"Her office does not have a 'clean' copy of the manual or a sample manual it could release. The document is in a file folder marked on and added to a working trial manual and it would be impossible to produce a 'clean' copy and it would be extremely burdensome to disassemble the trial notebook to produce only the 'Ada County' manual."

"Disclosing the manual would violate the secrecy provisions surrounding grand jury proceedings."

Hartgen argued in his letter: "Your office has stated that you believe the manual would disclose legal tactics which might then be adversely used by defense attorneys in defending their clients. We find this argument unfortunate, as it ap-

pears to presume the state is entitled to grant special private benefit in the prosecution of cases.

"Such a position, we believe, is contrary to both the spirit and letter of American constitutional law. In our opinion, the public interest is not served by the use of secret manuals by prosecutors to which citizens are denied access," Hartgen wrote.

"For the prosecutor to rush into court following receipt of a letter yesterday afternoon appears to be an action to deny public access to a document that appears clearly to be a public record," Hartgen said in an interview Thursday. County. At that time Baxter said the indictments did not necessarily represent a major drug crackdown and did not involve a drug ring operation.

In Idaho, prosecutors can use two vehicles of charging a person with a felony.

The most common procedure, and one used exclusively in Twin Falls County until this spring, is initiated by the filing of a complaint based either on a police investigation or citizen's accusation.

The defendant then enters a multi-step procedure to determine if the charges against him are valid.

After examining the complaint, the court may issue a summons or arrest warrant. At a preliminary hearing before the court and told of his rights and the charges brought against him. If he cannot afford a lawyer, the court will appoint one.

The defendant can then request a preliminary hearing. At a preliminary hearing, the prosecutor must prove to the presiding magistrate judge that there is probable cause a crime was committed and that the defendant committed it. The defendant can cross-examine witnesses and challenge evidence.

If the prosecutor succeeds, the magistrate binds the defendant over to district court for trial. If the prosecutor fails, the case is dismissed.

At this point, the defendant may enter a plea.

By contrast, in a grand jury procedure, no preliminary hearings are held and the defendant does not have the option to ask for a preliminary hearing.

The 12 grand jury members meet in secret and if 12 of the members vote to indict, the defendant is immediately bound over to district court for trial.

The only people allowed in a grand jury room are the jury members, the prosecutor and the witnesses they decide to call.

A *Times-News* examination found that \$5,000 of district court money was spent to draw this spring's grand jury, fight the indictments in court (including both defense and prosecution costs) and draw the new grand jury names.

In addition, Hurlbutt has asked for \$10,000 to cover grand jury costs this coming year and Wood has asked for \$30,000 for another deputy and secretarial assistance to defend grand jury indictments. Both requests were granted in the county's preliminary budget.

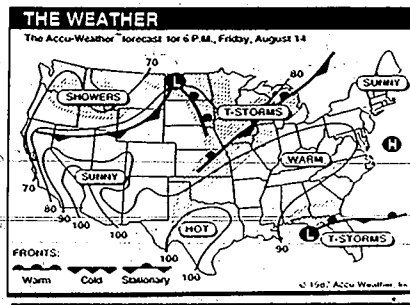
## It should be cool today; rain possible

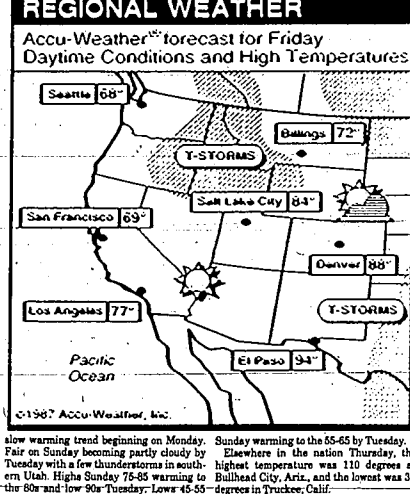

The Holloways, who have a 20-year lease agreement for Evergreen Manor, also are pumping money into capital improvements and program changes. Holloway said the plans to be completed cost \$250,000 by the end of the year on new equipment and furnishings.

For instance, new mattresses are necessary to help avoid bed sores, and the facility's dining room must be refurbished with new tables because current ones are too high for some patients.

Instead of operating all programs in-house, Holloway said he will draw on community resources in some areas. The care centers, alcohol and drug abuse program, which cost \$9,000 a month in salaries, and its home health care program, are being eliminated because they are duplicated by other agencies or businesses, Holloway said.

The new management plans to consult with medical staffs at local hospitals on the types of extended care needed in the community, he said.

This week's state-federal inspection was the 10th in 18 months. Last year, Evergreen Manor lost its federal approval for a six days because it did not meet standards.

If the home had not met standards in inspection, it would not have been able to accept new Medicare or Medicaid patients. In 30 days, existing patients on the federal programs also would have had to move out or pay their own bills, Schaeffer said.

Although now given a relatively clear bill of health, Evergreen Manor will remain under loose state scrutiny. Normally, nursing homes are inspected once a year.

"Undoubtedly, we will not wait a year to be back again, because of the history of problems," Schooner said.

Craig would ax tribe rights

BOISE (AP) — Rep. Larry Craig said he will ask Congress to revoke ancestral Indian fishing rights if salmon runs are endangered by tribal fishing.

"I am one that will not stand idly by and allow Native Americans to destroy this resource," the Idaho Republican said Wednesday.

"There needs to be a balance. We have spent a tremendous amount of time and effort reclaiming these runs. They are there for all of the public to enjoy, not just the Native American in this country."

The Shoshone-Bannock Indian tribes in eastern Idaho have announced plans to spear 100 hatchery summer chinook along the South Fork of the Salmon River this weekend during a religious ceremony. Fishing there has been banned by the Idaho Department of Fish and Game since 1964, and, until this year, Idaho tribes voluntarily agreed not to fish the stream.

Fish and Game Director Jerry Conley has said the Shoshone-Bannocks' action could encourage other tribes to follow suit on the Salmon and threaten attempts to bring back the fishery there.

ISU tests superconduction

POCATELLO (AP) — A Wendell high school teacher has tested a process for making a superconducting material effective at high temperatures.

David Ahley participated in a physics workshop at Idaho State University this summer. As a result of his work, he was awarded a grant to continue work with Dr. Frank Harmon, ISU physics department chairman.

Ahley said his summer work will assist him in making students more aware of superconductivity concepts in his physics and chemistry classes at Wendell.

Superconductivity is the ability of some materials to conduct electricity without electrical resistance. Applications could aid in the development of smaller and faster computers and high-speed trains that float on a magnetic grid, ISU said.

But until recently, superconduction occurred only when the conducting material was chilled with expensive liquid helium to about 460 degrees below zero degrees Fahrenheit.

Budget amendment gaining

BOISE (AP) — Congressman Larry Craig has enough votes to get his proposed constitutional amendment for a balanced budget out of a House committee and onto the floor for a vote.

But the Idaho Republican said he still is up to 36-40 votes away from the two-thirds majority needed to pass the measure.

"Once the issue gets to the floor, properly framed, it will be most difficult for even those 36 to vote against it," the Idaho Republican said.

The amendment would require Congress to balance the federal budget within a specified period of time.

Craig hopes for a final floor vote sometime this year, possibly in early November.

On Aug. 6, Craig said his measure had been co-sponsored by 236 House members, more than half the House membership.

Sunshine Mining cuts loss

BOISE (AP) — Crediting better prices for silver and oil, Sunshine Mining Co. reports its losses in the second quarter and first half of this year have narrowed significantly from the corresponding periods of 1986.

The Dallas-based company has announced a net loss of \$9.61 million for the quarter that ended June 30, an improvement from the \$26.03 million loss in last year's second quarter.

Operating revenues during the quarter totaled \$38.19 million, up from \$30.64 million in the same quarter of 1986.

For the first half of this year, Sunshine said, it lost \$18.83 million, less than half of the \$44.07 million loss during the first six months of 1986.

Six-month operating revenues totaled \$71.10 million, nearly level with \$71.94 million last year.

Schwinden accepts proposal

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — Montana's official proposal to land the \$4.5 billion federal super collider project was accepted Thursday by Gov. Ted Schwinden, who praised it as a "world-class" effort that will make the state a strong contender.

The task force, which spent about three months coordinating the preparation of Montana's application, approved the document on a unanimous vote. Thirty copies of the eight-volume application will be delivered to the Department of Energy in Washington, D.C., on Sept. 1 — one day before the deadline.

Montana's proposed site for the 53-mile oval, underground, track in the Concho Basin, 16 miles northwest of Billings. The tunnel would circle the town of Broadview.

EPA: Defiance bad precedent

BOZEMAN, Mont. (AP) — A Montana scientist's decision to deliberately release genetically altered bacteria without federal approval carried little weight to the environment, but could set a dangerous precedent if allowed to go unpunished, the Environmental Protection Agency said Thursday.

Amy Rispin, a senior microbial investigator at the EPA in Washington, said that while the release by Montana State University professor Gary Strobel presents "negligible risk" itself, other scientists could unleash more deadly bugs on the world.

Merger throws IPC takeover into limbo

IDAHOO FALLS (AP) — A merger between Utah Power and Light and PacifiCorp makes unfeasible a proposal by Idaho Power Co. to take over UP&L's eastern Idaho customers, UP&L president Frank Davis said.

Davis said at a news conference in Idaho Falls Thursday that the merger announced Wednesday night by Idaho Power Co. and the parent company of Pacific Power and Light puts Idaho Power's proposed service territory takeover in limbo.

However, Idaho Power officials said they still are interested in negotiating with UP&L.

But the merger was met with reserve from some Idaho lawmakers who headed a drive last winter to keep the eastern part of the state into Idaho Power's service territory.

because UP&L's rates were so much higher.

However, under the merger, officials say eastern Idaho customers will see rate reductions of 5 to 10 percent over the next several years.

Rep. Stan Hawkins, R-Ucon, said customers will feel the pressure of high monthly power bills, despite the rate reduction.

"I continue to hear Idaho Power say it's possible," he said. "We need to get the two companies together rather than having one company on one side of the fence and one on the other and the Legislature in the middle. It's time to talk about it and get the information on the table."

Commissioner Ralph Nelson of the Idaho Public Utilities Commission said that lower rates may not take the pressure off the legislative drive, I don't know."

Hawkins, Rep. Golden Linford, R-Rexburg, and Senate Majority Leader Mark Ricks, R-Rexburg, headed a drive last winter aimed at encouraging Idaho Power to negotiate the takeover of UP&L's eastern Idaho customers.

Legislators withdrew a proposed resolution that would have encouraged an advisory vote of UP&L's customers to see which service they prefer on the condition that UP&L officials would negotiate in good faith with Idaho Power on a takeover of the service area.

So far, Linford, Hawkins and Ricks said, UP&L has not lived up to its promise.

"In fact, we've been told by Idaho Power officials that Utah Power has ignored repeated requests," Hawkins said.

Ricks said it appears UP&L has

made a successful end run around the legislators. He said he was not optimistic about the chances of Idaho Power taking over the eastern Idaho service area.

"I got the impression that Idaho Power is clear out of the picture," Ricks said.

Hawkins said several eastern Idaho legislators signed a letter to PUC President Perry Swisher asking the PUC to make sure UP&L follows through with its commitment to negotiate with Idaho Power.

Hawkins said the legislators would be satisfied if the new rates were comparable with Idaho Power's.

"We don't give a hoot whether Idaho Power or Utah Power serves the area," he said. "Our concern is ending the disparity in rates."

Craig apologizes for inaccurate hunt survey reply

MOSCOW (AP) — Congressman Larry Craig is offering an apology for saying he had been hunting in Idaho last fall when he has actually not hunted in the state for the last couple of years.

Craig was asked earlier this month about his hunting activities as part of a poll of top state political leaders, and he replied that he had been pheasant hunting just last fall near his family's ranch in Midvale.

But a check of state Fish and Game records by the Moscow Idahoonian, which conducted the

poll, showed Craig had not purchased a state hunting license last year.

"I was up to the ranch a lot last fall because we've been having these financial difficulties and I was busy with that and the campaign," Craig said. "So everything was kind of a blur."

"When you asked the question, I automatically reacted, and I reacted inaccurately," he said. "I owe you an apology if I misled you, which it clearly sounds like I did."

A member of the National Rifle Association's board of directors, the four-term Republican lawmaker has been involved in the uproar over Gov. Cecil Andrus's broadside in which he called NRA leaders the "gun nuts of the world" following the NRA's support of his 1986 gubernatorial election opponent.

At times, the simmering dispute has deteriorated into back-and-forth challenges of who actually supported hunters and hunting in Idaho.

The informal newspaper poll

showed Andrus the most frequent hunter with the other members of the congressional delegation getting in only a limited number of outings last year.

After the records check showed Craig had not obtained a license, the congressman said he checked his activities with his mother, who keeps a diary of ranch operations.

"She said, 'No, you haven't gone hunting up here for the last couple of years,' Craig said. "So I wasn't poaching, either."

Banker optimistic about Idaho's fiscal future

BOISE (AP) — While increases in unemployment and inflation in Idaho may sound foreboding, they actually signal an upturn in the state's fortunes, said Kelley Matthews, chief economist for the First Security Corp.

Matthews was in Boise Wednesday to address the Building Owners and Managers Association of the Treasure Valley. First Security

Corp. is the Salt Lake City-based parent company of First Security Bank of Idaho.

The unemployment rate has risen to 5.3 percent and the state's inflation rate is expected to reach between 4% and 5 percent next year.

"I think the report from the (state) Labor Department this last month is very optimistic," Matthews said. "The labor force jumped

faster than total employment, but that's a much more healthy circumstance, in my opinion, than what we're seeing in Idaho, because the labor force is declining."

The Idaho Department of Labor said that 6,000 more Idahoans were working last month than in June and the overall work force posted its first expansion since January.

Matthews supported a 5 1/2 or 6 percent unemployment rate in Idaho, if the labor force and total employment were growing rather than contracting.

Meanwhile, the falling value of the dollar has led to a mild reau-

gence of inflation and better prices for many commodities that are mined or harvested in Idaho.

"I think we have a much more healthy economic environment (in Idaho and other Intermountain West states) with a 4 1/2 percent rate of inflation at the consumer level and a significant improvement in all other prices, in lumber prices (and for other commodities)," Matthews said.

Higher inflation has pushed interest rates over the 10 percent psychological benchmark, he said. But, to return to lower rates, the economy either would have to weaken considerably or the bottom would have to fall out of commodity prices.

Reagan will consider freeing Rep. Hansen

BOISE (AP) — President Reagan will consider freeing former Rep. George Hansen before he completes his federal prison sentence, according to a White House letter.

The letter from White House chief of staff Howard Baker to Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C. outlines the president's interest and says the matter will be presented to Reagan, Helms said Wednesday.

"The President is well aware of Congressman Hansen's situation," Baker wrote Aug. 4. "The President asked that we take a fresh look at the situation. Therefore, we have asked the Department of Justice to do just that. When we have received the Attorney General's official and final input, the entire matter will be presented to the President."

On Aug. 7, the Justice Department notified Hansen's lawyer Frank Campbell that a commutation petition would be processed quickly.

Helms said he has spoken with Reagan at least three times about Hansen.

"I suggested that he pardon him," Helms said. "I would hope he would at least commute the sentence. I feel that George has been punished

enough."

Hansen is in federal prison at Petersburg, Va., near the end of an 11-month term for failing to disclose profits from the sale of silver contracts and \$334,000 in loans.

White House pressure was responsible for the Justice Department's decision to expedite consideration of a commutation, Hansen aide John Scorey said.

The case is being considered by U.S. Pardon Attorney David Stephenson.

Campbell was unable to say how soon Hansen's sentence could be commuted. "It may be he saves two or three weeks, but every day counts for a man who's been deprived of his liberty."

Hansen supporters have besieged the White House with calls for his release, claiming that others, including Attorney General Edwin Meese, have committed the same offense without punishment.

Hansen's wife, Connie, said she was optimistic that her husband would be freed before his Sept. 23 release date.

Tribes to cut salmon take for ceremony

FORT HALL (AP) — The Shoshone-Bannock Tribal Council on Thursday decided to take half the number of summer chinook salmon than originally planned for religious ceremonies this weekend on the South Fork of the Salmon River.

"It's a compromise," Gov. Cecil Andrus said. "I was hoping we could stop it, but they have made their position."

The tribes plan to take 100 salmon from the South Fork at Goat Creek has drawn criticism from sportsmen and the Fish and Game Department.

Andrus asked the tribes to reconsider, and, "Based on my request, they have cut that harvest in half to 50 and they have a number of fishermen," the governor said.

"That's the best I can do," Andrus said. "But I can tell you, next year will be different."

Andrus said that he was assured by tribal council chairman Marvin Osborne that the tribes "have no desire to jeopardize the salmon run." Fish and game officials urged the tribes to forego the religious fishing ceremony until the runs increased.

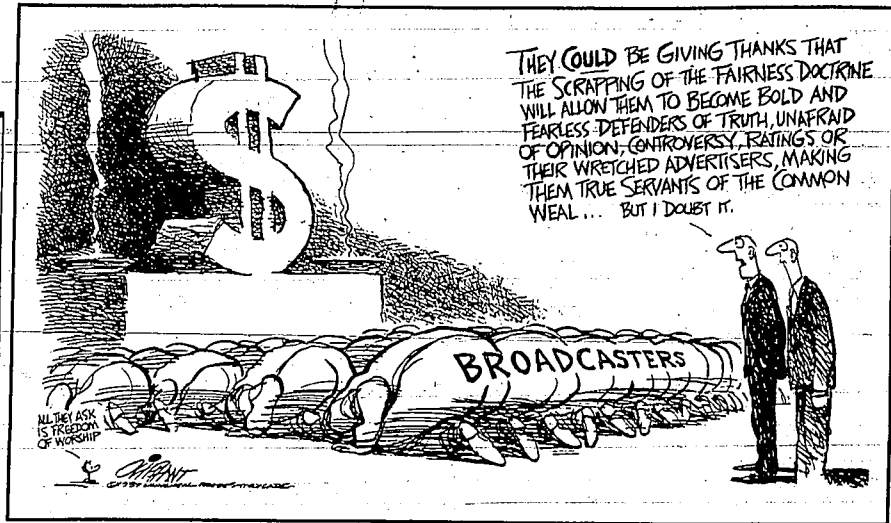
But all of George's rantings cannot change the facts of his case.

### MVRMC should drop talk of ventures

During this past legislative session, I was repeatedly approached by Twin Falls County residents that were concerned about the status of MVRMC. They were desirous of repealing the 1986 Hospital Reorganization Law.

The fact that the board of trustees had been unresponsive to the desires of Twin Falls County in the past, brought new concerns that they would ignore the recent advisory vote of the people, and pursue their own agenda.

They wanted no further expansion, and no further debt.

As a result of these concerns, I drafted a bill to repeal the reorganization law of 1986. But before introducing the bill into the House Health and Welfare Committee, I visited with our county commissioners. They were both open and cooperative.

While they supported the decision of the advisory vote, they feared repeal would create a hurdle to overcome should the voters change their minds down the road.

After listening to their concerns, I decided to hold the bill as long as the commissioners abided by the advisory vote.

Our commissioners have held true to their commitment to Twin Falls County voters — as was indicated by their letter to the Hospital Board.

I think that maybe it's now time for the board of trustees to respond to the desires of the major-

ity of Twin Falls residents and drop further talk of joint ventures and expansions.

For some reason, the board of trustees continues to pursue a course for MVRMC beyond the scope intended for the institution. Perhaps a reminder is needed — MVRMC is a county hospital — built to service the needs of county residents. It is not a private business venture.

One gets the feeling that local needs and concerns are taking a back seat to aggressive outside expansion plans.

Maybe it's time to review the supervisory structure of the MVRMC Board of Trustees and whether goals expressed by that board are in line with the needs of Twin Falls County.

If the Hospital Board considers the legitimate concerns of Twin Falls County residents as "shackles," then maybe things are more out of control at MVRMC than we, as taxpayers, would like to believe.

Failure to display a more responsible attitude can only assure the introduction and passage of a bill to repeal the hospital reorganization law in the next session of the legislature.

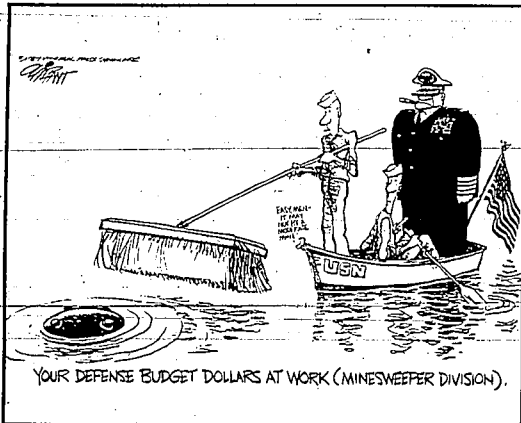
#### Hardy deserves a statue

# Several cat food brands harmful

## Taurine levels cited as problem

NEW YORK (AP) — Some commercial cat foods caused a severe heart ailment in cats by failing to provide enough of a critical nutrient, a study says.

Cats suffering from the ailment were found to have inadequate amounts of the essential nutrient taurine in their bloodstreams. When the cats were given more taurine, the ailment was corrected, said Paul Pion, a veterinarian at the University of California in Davis.

The foods that had been found to produce low taurine levels in Pion's study were Hill's C-D, Hill's Science Diet, Maintenance, Hill's H-D, Purina Cat Chow, 9 Lives Beef and Liver, Blue Mountain Kitty O's and Carnation Fancy Feast Beef and Liver, according to the Science magazine report.

"What we have found applies directly only to cats," he said. "When there's a human component, we don't know yet. We have people who are looking at that. A report of the findings will appear Friday in Science magazine."

Pion, the lead author of the study, said most products found to cause low taurine in cats have been now supplemented with taurine.

"There's no blame here, and there's no way anybody could have

known taurine deficiency caused this disease," Pion said. Taurine is found in fish and meat, he said.

The research began six months ago, Pion said, and by March pet food makers had already heard of the findings and had begun supplementing their products.

Pion said that he believes the formula for Blue Mountain Kitty O's has been changed and all the other products have been supplemented with taurine.

# Democrats holding up Bork court nomination, Dole says

Democrats are holding hostage the Supreme Court nomination of Robert H. Bork, Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole said Thursday, while President Reagan called Bork's confirmation his most pressing issue.

Dole attacked the Democratic timetable for the nomination in a speech to the Fraternal Order of Police convention in Mobile, Ala.

He said the Bork nomination was being held hostage by Democrats and accused them of unnecessarily delaying the start of confirmation hearings until Sept. 15 and planning further delays when the issue reaches the full Senate.

Dole was especially critical of Sen. Joseph R. Biden Jr., the Senate Judiciary Committee chairman, saying Biden will have spent 70 days preparing for the hearings by the time they

begin.

"Over the last 25 years, the average time consumed in bringing such a nomination to a hearing has been 18 days," Dole said. "The longest previous delay has been 42 days. It's all part and parcel of the political chess game being played. Unfortunately, Robert Bork is the pawn and justice is stalemated."

Meanwhile, Biden said Reagan's stumping for Bork in North Platte, Neb., combined with the president's appeal for the nominee in his In-Contrast speech Wednesday, probably boosts the appellate judge's chances for confirmation.

But Biden, a Bork opponent, said in Logan, Iowa, that Reagan probably did not sway uncommitted senators who hold the key to the outcome.

Reagan told civic and community leaders in North Platte that "quick action is vital because the 'the

American people want to see a full complement of nine justices on the bench when the Supreme Court reconvenes" Oct. 5.

"You know, when he retired, Justice (Lewis) Powell said that it wasn't fair to the Supreme Court, or the parties with cases before it, for the court to operate at less than full strength," the president said, referring to the man Bork would replace.

"Well, since last June, that's just what happened. The approval process for Judge Bork's nomination is already the longest in 25 years," Reagan said.

Senate Republicans have complained that the waiting period between the time of Bork's nomination and the beginning of the Senate Judiciary Committee hearings is the longest since 1962. However, the court operated with only eight justices for more than a year during the Nixon administration.

# CDC suggests routine AIDS tests

ATLANTA (AP) — Federal health officials Thursday recommended routine AIDS testing for the sex partners of AIDS virus carriers, people with other sexually transmitted diseases and users of injectable narcotics, among other groups.

The U.S. Public Health Service's official AIDS testing recommendations, issued after months of public debate, stressed that individuals in these categories had the right to refuse the tests.

The recommendations came on the same day federal health officials acknowledged the number of reported cases will be increased with a new clinical definition for AIDS.

The PHSS recommended that while "individuals have the right to decline," health professionals should begin "routine (AIDS) counseling and testing" for:

- Patients with sexually transmitted diseases.
- Drug users who injected their narcotics.
- Women of childbearing-age at risk of AIDS infection, chiefly through drug abuse or sexual contact.
- Patients infected with tuberculosis, which can be compounded by an AIDS infection.
- Sex partners of infected people.
- And those sharing drug needles with infected people.

The national Centers for Disease Control said the goal of the testing is "to reduce further spread of infection," with priority on "persons who are most likely to be infected or who practice high-risk behaviors."

AIDS, reported most often among homosexual men and abusers of injectable drugs, is most frequently transmitted through sex or contaminated drug needles. It also can be

transmitted from mother to fetus.

The PHSS also recommended the availability of AIDS testing for anyone who believes himself at risk for AIDS, and testing of male and female prostitutes by local and state jurisdictions.

Further, the agency called for prison systems to study means of testing their inmates — federal inmates are already under a testing program — and for state and local officials to decide about routine, or even mandatory, AIDS tests for engaged couples, taking into account the prevalence of HIV (AIDS virus) infection in the area.

The federal government's recommendations do not include several controversial proposals floated at a public meeting in February — mandatory testing for hospital patients, engaged couples and other groups.

# Restrictions on Los Angeles airspace needed to insure safety — FAA

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Emergency restrictions on the airspace around Los Angeles International Airport are vital to preventing collisions in the sky, a federal official said Thursday as similar rules were considered for 22 airports nationwide.

The rules, prompted by a near collision between a small plane and an American Airlines Boeing 737 near Los Angeles this week, drastically narrow the options for pilots of small planes around Los Angeles International, which is among the busiest airports in the country.

They are intended to reduce the dangerous mix of fast-moving, slow-maneuvering airliners and small planes, and to ensure the small planes allowed in the area are in touch with air traffic controllers.

"It's a matter of FAA responsibility to ensure the safety of the flying public, whether it be airline passenger or pilot of a small airplane," Jim Holweger, air traffic manager of the FAA's Western-Pacific region, said Thursday.

He was responding to criticism by a private pilots' group that the plan will force pilots of small planes to make long detours without significantly enhancing air safety.

The emergency restrictions, which take effect Wednesday, raise the ceiling of the so-called Terminal Control Area around Los Angeles International Airport from 7,000 to 12,500 feet.

"That means aircraft within the zone will be required to have altitude reporting transponders, which allow radar controllers to identify a craft's altitude and location. Many small aircraft do not have transponders."

The rules also eliminate a free-passage corridor for light planes passing directly over the airport.

At least five near-collisions have been reported since Sunday throughout the United States, and FAA Administrator T. Allan McArthur said the agency was considering increasing the scope of terminal control areas over the 22 other cities that already have them.

Those cities are Atlanta; Boston; Chicago; Dallas; Miami; New York; San Francisco; Washington, D.C.; Cleveland; Denver; Detroit;

Honolulu; Houston; Kansas City, Mo.; Las Vegas, Nev.; Minneapolis; New Orleans; Philadelphia; Pittsburgh; Seattle; St. Louis and San Diego.

The FAA expects controllers' workload to increase as pilots of properly equipped small planes who don't want to detour around the Los Angeles area ask for direction, and the increased demand could cause some delays.

"We would anticipate that the delays would impact mostly upon general aviation," Holweger said. "If there were delays to the airlines, it would be very minimal."

Media attention has focused on near-misses in the Southern California skies since the fatal collision of an Aeromexico airliner and a small plane near Los Angeles Aug. 31.

Between Aug. 1 last year and the same time this year, there were 81 near-collisions in the area, up from 14 the previous year.

Holweger attributed the increase to rapid growth in the number of flights in the area. He said air traffic in the area increased almost 20 percent in the first half of the year, more than four times faster than at any other airport in the country.

# Blue whales spotted anew

BOSTON (AP) — The hunt is on for a blue whale, the largest animal that ever lived. One was spotted this week off New England for the fourth time since October, the first such sightings in these parts since 1936.

Last October, passengers on a whale-watching boat saw a blue whale a few miles off Provincetown. In May there were two more blue whale sightings east of Nantucket.

Before then the most recent spotting occurred in 1936. Newspaper accounts that year reported a dead blue whale washed up on the beach at West Dennis on Cape Cod.

Blue whales travel in solitude or in pairs and have no teeth. The staple of their diet is krill, a tiny shrimp.

# Democrats get big 'break' from McDonald's heiress

WASHINGTON (AP) — Joan B. Kroc, widow of the McDonald's fast-food magnate, is telling Democrats "you deserve a break today." She announced Thursday she has given them \$1 million, the biggest single contribution in party history.

Mrs. Kroc, a registered independent and an advocate of nuclear disarmament, said the contribution was motivated by concern about the direction the nation has taken during the Reagan administration.

She said she is looking to the Democrats "for the positive, principled leadership we must have to restore America to its proper place as the foremost champion of peace and justice in the world."

"For the last six years... I have grown increasingly concerned that we may be losing sight of our goals as a nation. In the name of 'national security,' we have accelerated the buildup of weapons. We have diverted our beautiful resources from improving our lives and our environment to an unwarranted and excessive increase of our military weapons," she said.

She said she was also concerned "over the use of military force as the first priority in carrying out U.S. policy abroad."

In an interview from California, Mrs. Kroc said "the gift speaks for itself," as a reflection of her feelings about the national political

presidential candidates... and in the party-building efforts being conducted at the Democratic National Committee to prepare for a successful November 1988.

"This is the largest contribution in the 139-year history of the Democratic National Committee," said DNC spokesman Terry Michael.

He said it came about when Kirk telephoned Mrs. Kroc, who lives in La Jolla, Calif., near San Diego, to seek her support for the party.

"I said to Paul, 'Well, of course, I'd like to help... I said put me down for a million dollars,'" she said.

"I hope we can get some other well-heeled Democrats" to help out as well, she said, adding that she intends to try to influence her associates to give to the party.

Since there is a \$2,000 election law limit on the amount an individual can give toward federal campaigns, the money will go into the Democrats' accounts that are oriented to state elections, the DNC said.

It will fund activities such as state "party building," and computerized voter files for the state party organizations, Michael said.

Mrs. Kroc inherited the McDonald's fortune from her husband Ray Kroc, founder of the fast-food empire, who died in 1984.

He was a major contributor to Republicans, notably former President Nixon.

# IRS presents new forms for home mortgage interest, IRAs

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Internal Revenue Service on Thursday displayed fresh evidence that the new tax law will complicate return filing for millions of Americans.

The agency released: "A new form, numbered 8598, for 13 million or more taxpayers — including many who are taking out home-equity loans — will have to file early next year to determine how much of their home mortgage interest is deductible. Most of them will get away with completing only eight lines on the form, but this will require them to know how much they paid for their home and the average balance of the mortgage in 1987."

This form is necessary because the new law generally does not allow a full mortgage interest deduction if the mortgage exceeds the cost of the home plus improvements.

"This easy-sounding provision has turned out to be a very difficult one for us to administer," Arthur Altman, chairman of the IRS tax forms committee, told reporters.

A four-page set of instructions and another new form, 8596, for determining how much, if any, of Individual Retirement Account contributions made in 1987 is deductible. This could affect any worker covered by a company pension plan who

earns more than \$25,000 (single) or \$40,000 (joint return).

Four pages of instructions and a single-page form, 8582, for calculating the amount of losses from passive activities — investments in which the taxpayer does not take an active role — that may be deducted.

A completely re-revised Form 2106, on which employee business expenses are reported.

"We have to provide new forms to comply with the law," explained Altman. "They basically reflect what Congress did to the tax law" in 1986.

The IRS earlier this year released revised versions of the basic individual tax forms: the 1040, 1040A and 1040EZ.

The new law, which sharply reduces tax rates while eliminating or reducing several deductions, will require about 40 new tax forms — but most affect only businesses — and revisions of almost every other form.

Altman estimated that 13 million or more Americans will have to fill out all or part of the new Form 8598 because they took out second mortgages on their homes this year.

About 4 million will have to go beyond the first eight lines because a part of their mortgage interest is not deductible or if a part of the \$40,000 or less, and any worker not covered by a company pension plan.

# U.S. says Soviets violated treaty

WASHINGTON (AP) — Radioactive debris from a Soviet nuclear test last month wafted across the country's border, violating the 1963 Limited Test Ban Treaty but causing no health hazard, the State Department spokesman Charles E. Redman said on Tuesday.

Redman said there were reports of higher radioactive readings in northern Sweden, which is southwest of the test site.

"It does not pose calculable health, safety or environmental risk," the spokesman said.

Under the 1963 U.S.-Soviet testing treaty, signed at a time of growing concern about nuclear fallout from

nuclear tests, atmospheric explosions were banned and the countries promised to "prevent cross-border leakage of radioactive material from the underground tests."

"We have conveyed to the Soviet Union our concern regarding this failure to comply with its treaty obligations," Redman said.

It was the second time since the current series of Soviet tests began in February that the United States has complained about radioactive leaks. One of the first tests in the series also resulted in the cross-border spread of nuclear material, the department said on March 11. No health hazard was posed by that leakage, according to the announcement.

The Soviet Union began the testing after ending a 19-month moratorium that it had asked the United States to join. The Reagan

administration declined the offer on grounds that it needed to test weapons to ensure the credibility of U.S. nuclear deterrence.

Instead, the administration proposed that experts from both countries be allowed to observe each sides' tests, an offer the Soviets declined.

The United States carried out its own underground nuclear test Thursday morning at its weapons-testing site in Nevada.

The Soviets have accused the United States of permitting leaks of radioactivity at the Nevada site, but Redman said there have been no ventings of nuclear material in U.S. tests for more than a decade. There have been two incidents of "local seepage" confined to the test site, but U.S. radioactive material has never been carried across borders, Redman said.

# Home sales in 20 states beat interest rate surge

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sales of existing homes overcame a big jolt from rising mortgage rates during the spring to post double-digit increases in 20 states while New York displaced Boston as the metropolitan area with the highest-priced housing in the nation, a real estate trade group said Thursday.

The National Association of Realtors said sales of existing single-family homes climbed 5.6 percent to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 3.99 million units in the

April-June quarter compared with the same period a year ago.

However, this increase masked wide discrepancies among different regions.

Twenty states enjoyed sales advances of 10 percent or better, led by a 53.5 percent surge in sales in Hawaii, the second consecutive quarter that this state has outpaced the rest of the country.

Other states with big sales gains were Georgia, up 40 percent; Maine, 31.4 percent; Massachusetts, 29.8

percent, and Florida, with an increase of 20.8 percent.

But 15 states and the District of Columbia saw sales fall in the spring quarter, led by a 41.7 percent plunge in South Dakota and a 30.3 percent sales decline in Minnesota.

The weakness was blamed on various factors including continued sluggish economies in some farm and energy states, and the impact of a sharp spike in mortgage rates, which climbed by almost 2 percentage points during an eight-week period this spring.

# Strikes cause layoffs as employers ask workers to return

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Walkouts that have crippled major industries are causing layoffs throughout the export-oriented economy and employers made a plea to strikers Thursday, promising a better deal if they return to work.

No total was available of the number of workers idled, but hundreds of thousands were believed to be affected.

Strikes, sit-ins and other labor actions began early in July after President Chun Doo-hwan agreed to opposition demands for democratic

reforms, including direct presidential elections and fewer restrictions on unions.

Defense Minister Chung Ho-ying promised Thursday that the military would support reforms and remain neutral in politics. Both Chun and his hand-picked successor, Roh Tae-woo, are former generals.

The Korea Employers' Federation, an organization of top management, urged strikers to consider the survival of their companies. It issued a message to "10 million workers" promising to "do our best to in-

crease workers' rights and interests, such as better working conditions."

Labor and management should beware an "unhappy outcome of the prolonged labor unrest," the message said.

Losses from strikes so far could cost the economy \$247 million, it said.

Higher pay, better working conditions and the right to organize and conduct union activities free of government control are the main goals of tens of thousands of workers now on strike.

Authoritarian governments have kept a tight rein on unions since South Korea's "economic miracle" began in the 1970s, virtually banning strikes. Pay has been kept low to make the country's products cheaper on world markets.

South Korean workers put in the world's longest week last year — 54.4 hours — but earned an average of only \$370 a month, according to a government union federation. Productivity has nearly doubled since 1980, but pay has risen only 40 percent.

Roh expressed confidence Thursday that labor turmoil can be resolved. He is president of the government party and its candidate to succeed Chun.

He said a "balanced approach" was the best course for the government. In the past few days, officials have threatened if labor unrest continues.

In remarks to reporters, Roh said the strikes arose from an "accumulation of grievances, and labor thinks it should have more of a fair share."

Strikes began at large manufacturing companies after Chun agreed June 30, after weeks of often-violent protest, to the opposition demands for reform. They soon spread to nearly all other industries, including services and mining.

Labor Ministry officials said strikes were being conducted at 240 plants Wednesday; 53 new ones had begun and 29 were settled.

Newspapers said 1,200 smaller suppliers — heavily dependent on larger ones also were affected.

Gio will have to wait a bit, of course. Penn has to finish a movie in Europe and a 60-day California jail sentence for reckless driving and violating probation by punching a movie extra who tried to take his picture.

The probation stemmed from a case in which he slugged a man Penn thought tried to kiss his wife.

## Bruce back: New disc set for release this fall

**NEWARK, N.J.** — Attention, rock fans. The drought is over. The Boss has finished a new album, and Columbia executives say it'll hit the record stores early this fall.

The album is "Tunnel of Love," and it will contain Bruce Springsteen's first new songs since "Born in the USA," released in June 1984.

Contrary to rumor, Bruce's ninth album is not a solo work, but was put together with The E Street Band, said the Columbia executives in New York City who spoke on condition of anonymity Wednesday night.

In November 1986, the rocker released "Bruce Springsteen & The E Street Band Live 1975-1985," a five-record concert collection.

Springsteen has no immediate plans for a concert tour to promote "Tunnel of Love," the Columbia executives said.

## Lunch, but no snack for Pope on Motown visit

**DETROIT** — It was first come, first served, and Pope John Paul II is out of luck.

Archbishop Edmund Szoka asked the Gourmet House of St. Clair Shores to provide a snack for the pope when he arrives in Detroit on the evening of Sept. 18.

But the restaurant already was committed to serving 400 guests for

the wedding of Chrysler Corp. Chairman Lee Iacocca's daughter, Lia, said manager William Brenner.

The pope's lunch may make up for lack of a snack. It will include an antipasto of shrimp, liver pate, cavendish and marinated artichoke hearts; cold crab meat; lemon sorbet; and roast loin of veal with stir-fried mixed vegetables, rice pilaf and a tossed mixed green salad.

The Vatican requests no spicy food or cold or lead drinks be served to the pope.

## Peck's Mercedes found after crash ends chase

**LOS ANGELES** — Gregory Peck's stolen Mercedes-Benz was recovered Thursday after a brief chase that ended with the actor's car crashing into parked vehicles.

The driver, Lasalle McDaniel, 32, was booked for investigation of grand theft auto, said police Sgt. Steve Laroche. A passenger, Johnny Wilbert, 33, was booked for investigation of joyriding.

About four blocks away, the driver apparently lost control and crashed into two parked cars, Laroche said.

# Hollywood negotiates around busy Hampton summer season

**WESTHAMPTON BEACH, N.Y. (AP)** — In the affluent Hamptons, even movie makers have to negotiate not to steal the show from folks who want to enjoy summer's peace.

Indeed, the arrival this week of Burt Lancaster for the filming of a major movie followed months of negotiation by officials who wanted to ensure that the show would not disrupt the heart of the summer tourist season.

"It is a difficult situation," said Westhampton Beach Mayor Arma E. Andon, who will be host for nearly all the filming in his village.

"Normally, we would have just said, 'Sorry, you can't do it,'" he said of the shooting of "Rocket Gibraltar."

But he said most of the movie will be done at an estate, so traffic and other crowded summer activity will not be disrupted much.

"So far so good," the mayor said. "I'm keeping my fingers crossed."

Shooting was scheduled on Main Street on Thursday, but Ms. Andon expressed optimism it would go off without a hitch.

"This is a fairly sophisticated group here," she said. "They're not the kind to stop their cars to look at movie stars."

The Hamptons are located about 60 miles east of New York City and

populated by a rarefied crowd that includes singer Billy Joel, woman's rights activist Betty Friedan, and television anchorman Dan Rather, who has a summer home.

Property values are quite high, with beach-front mansions renting for as much as \$100,000 a month.

The Lancaster movie is one of three major movies being shot predominantly in the Hamptons this year, said Chris Cook, program

coordinator for the Suffolk County Ocean Picture TV Bureau.

Other movies are "Masquerade," starring Rob Lowe, and "Still Life," starring Mariel Hemingway.

"It's probably the best year ever," Cook said of the three movies, two television pilots, various soap operas, about 100 commercials and a television film that will pour between \$12 million and \$15 million into the local economy.

The shooting of between 50 and 60 major films since 1915 has prompted some people to nickname the Hamptons "Hollywood East" or "Beverly Hills East," he said.

"It's probably the best year ever,"

But the filmmaking is just a trickle compared to New York, where 25 to 30 movies are filmed each year in their entirety, according to Pat Scott, director of the Mayor's Office of Film Theater and Broadcasting.

## Local boy does good, takes class on cruise

**PUNXSUTAWNEY, Pa. (AP)** — A local boy who made good wanted to do a little something for his high school classmates at their 25th-year reunion this weekend. So he's taking them to the Bahamas.

Delbert Dunmire, former bank robber and currently a Kansas City, Mo., millionaire, has invited members of Punxsutawney High School's Class of '62 to join him on a four-day cruise. For free. For real. And they can bring guests.

"I've softening I always wanted to do something I dreamed of," Dunmire, 53, said earlier this week from his Missouri home. "It goes way back to my origins, saying if I never make it [big] I'll come back and do something for my hometown."

"He's like a kid in a candy store," his wife, Debbie, 30, said, laughing. "He's having a wonderful time planning this."

His classmates, all in their early 50s, and their spouses are just as thrilled.

"It's like you've been on TV and won this big prize. It's unbelievable. It really is," said Mary Ann Ferko, whose husband, Bill, is a member of what's jokingly referred to around town as "the right class."

"People at the office, friends, nobody can quite believe it. They're asking, 'Who is this character and what's he doing?'" said Class President Carl VanDyke, a St. Louis, Mo., businessman who's going on the cruise with his wife, Debbie.

For months, it's been the main topic of conversation in this western Pennsylvania town of about 8,000 people, best known for its famous weather-predicting groundhog, Punxsutawney Phil.

Dunmire has hired eight buses to take the class from Punxsutawney to Pittsburgh early Friday morning, a procession he plans to lead in his red Rolls-Royce. The group will board a chartered jet and fly to Miami, then be whisked to the ship and set sail for Nassau. They return home Monday.

In addition to 192 classmates and their guests, Dunmire is taking along executives of Growth Industries Inc., an airplane parts manufacturing company he founded 20 years ago.

Dunmire will pay for everything except for drinks, from land excursions to entertainment to tips. He expects the entire tab for the group of approximately 420 people to run more than \$120,000.

Dunmire, remembered by his classmates as "just one of the gang," made a similar offer five years ago for the class' 30th-year reunion, but he was turned down because a banquet hall already had been booked.

The son of a railroad laborer, Dunmire grew up in the nearby village of Cloe and went off to college to study medicine but dropped out after a few years and joined the Air Force.

**Latin rulers: Advisers out**

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — President Daniel Ortega returned home Thursday after winning support from Cuban President Fidel Castro for an end to the presence of all foreign military advisers in Central America.

The state-run Voice of Nicaragua radio said Ortega returned to Managua after a brief stop to Havana to confer with Castro. Cuba has been Nicaragua's staunchest ally since a revolution ousted rightist dictator Anastasio Somoza and brought them to power in July 1979.

Earlier, the official Cuban news agency Prensa Latina reported from Havana that the two presidents began discussing the new central American peace pact shortly after Ortega's arrival Wednesday night in the Caribbean island nation.

The peace plan was signed Aug. 7 in Guatemala City by Ortega and the presidents of El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Costa Rica.

As part of their talks, Ortega and Castro discussed the role of foreign military personnel in Central America, Prensa Latina reported.

**Soviet police seek editors**

MOSCOW (AP) — Two police officers unsuccessfully sought to detain the editors of an unofficial political journal Thursday, hours after they released their second edition, the chief editor said.

Sergei Grigoryants said in an interview that two officers came to the door of the apartment in southwest Moscow where the editors were putting together the second edition of the journal, which is called Glasnost.

The publication's 178 typewritten carbon-copied pages featured a piece by Grigoryants on the KGB and several articles about the Crimean Tatars who held street demonstrations in Moscow last month for return of their homeland.

Grigoryants, a 46-year-old former political prisoner, said the officers demanded to see his identification documents, and said they were going to take him and four other editors to the local police station.

However, he said they refused to let the officers enter the apartment because its occupant was at work. He said he was unsure whether the police would return later.

Grigoryants identified the other editors inside the apartment as Andrei Shilkov, Dmitri Eisner, Sergei Ivanov and Ashia Lashiver.

**Court is split on spy book**

LONDON (AP) — The banned-in-Britain book "Spycatcher" deeply split the country's highest court, with two judges warning against the dangers of censorship and dictatorship, and three expressing the need to protect security secrets and the powers of the courts.

The contrasting opinions of the Law Lords, who voted 3-2 on July 30 to maintain the ban on "Spycatcher," were published Thursday.

The book, written by former British intelligence agent Peter Wright, has been published in the United States. It is legal to carry the book into Britain, and many copies have been brought in by Britons returning from the United States.

But Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher's government has sought and so far won court backing for a ban against publishing "Spycatcher" or any of Wright's allegations about misdeeds in the security services. The government also is fighting in Australia, New Zealand and Hong Kong to quash the book.

Each of the five Law Lords of the House of Lords released his opinion on the issue, and those in the slim majority mixed some sharp criticism of the press in with their belief in protecting security secrets.

"The book's secrets" are indeed out of the bag, but from that it does not follow that the function of the (banning) injunction is spent," wrote Lord Ackner.

**Tass: U.S. rocket downs Soviet plane**

MOSCOW (AP) — Afghan rebels using a U.S.-made Stinger missile shot down a Soviet-built transport plane today, killing 12 people aboard, Tass reported from Afghanistan.

The Soviet news agency, quoting Afghanistan's Bakhtar information agency, said the Afghan Antonov-26 was hit over the Dera-Mangal region as it flew between Kabul, the capital, and the city of Khost near the Pakistani border.

Tass said all seven passengers — including two children — and five crewmembers were killed. It did not say whether there were any survivors.

Tass also did not explain how Afghan authorities knew the plane had been shot down with a Stinger, a heat seeking weapon.

The Reagan administration, Pakistan and China are among supporters of the Moslem fundamentalist rebels fighting the Afghan communist regime.

Tass referred to the aircraft as a "transport plane," and did not say if any of the dead were soldiers. It said the plane was also carrying cargo for residents of the Khost area.

The Moscow-backed Kabul government often uses An-26s bearing military markings for transport of civilian passengers and supplies.

Both the Afghan and Soviet governments have condemned the supply of U.S.-made Stingers to the insurgents, accusing the United States and other Western countries of interference in Afghanistan's internal affairs.

An estimated 115,000 Soviet troops are deployed in Afghanistan to combat the widespread anti-government insurgency.

**Police use tear gas to evict mine strikers**

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Police on Thursday fired tear gas and rubber bullets to evict about 300 striking workers staging a sit-in at a gold dump reclamation facility, police and company officials said.

The eviction was one of the toughest police actions since the National Union of Mineworkers launched South Africa's largest ever legal strike on Sunday.

Police also arrested 23 strikers at Anglo American Corp.'s ERGO plant, east of Johannesburg, said police spokesman H.C. Lourens. He said one striker was slightly injured.

Strikers at the ERGO plant had voted to join the black mineworkers' strike on Wednesday. At the sit-in Thursday they said they planned to remain at the facility, which has no sleeping quarters, for up to two weeks.

Anglo American said the strikers sabotaged machinery and released five tons of sulphuric acid. The company obtained a court eviction order Thursday.

The union had no immediate comment on the incident. No other details were immediately available.

Earlier Thursday, the union disputed a claim by mine owners that the strike was weakening, saying 10,000 additional workers have joined the walkout.

Union general secretary Cyril Ramaphosa told a news conference the walkouts took place over the past two days at 10 gold, coal and antimony mines and processing plants.

Ramaphosa declined to say how many workers were now on strike, but the union earlier put the figure at 342,000.

Meanwhile, the Chamber of Mines, which represents the six major mining houses, said Thursday the number of strikers had dropped from about 230,000 to less than 200,000.

**Soviets want inspections to ground space weapons**

GENEVA (AP) — The Soviet Union today proposed establishment without delay of a system to ensure that weapons are not sent into space, including posting permanent international inspectors at launch sites.

Yuri Nazarkin, chief Soviet delegate to the 40-nation Conference on Disarmament, said such measures "should be started right away" without waiting for nations to conclude an agreement banning space weapons.

He said his remarks were aimed at clarifying a Soviet proposal originally put forth in March that was "less specific and did not give a time frame for developing an inspection system."

Nazarkin said the suggested verification system would "envisage the permanent presence of inspection groups at all sites for launching space objects."

The goal would be to ensure that objects launched into space "are not weapons or are not equipped with weapons," said Nazarkin. He said parties to such an agreement would agree on a list of systems and devices to be banned in space.

The proposal would cover weapons designed for stationing in space — not ballistic missiles, which enter and leave space during flight, Nazarkin said.

He said that if a future international agreement banned weapons in space, the Soviet Union would be willing to extend inspections to storage facilities, industrial plants, laboratories, testing centers and other sites.

The United States refuses to restrict Star Wars research and says the Soviets are conducting similar work.

# Specialist: Consolidate emergency services

SUN VALLEY — Peaceful coexistence between emergency medical services and their regulators is possible, at least in the eyes of a New England emergency specialist.

"There are new standards being developed for emergency medical services — we needn't be afraid of them," said Dr. Alaisdar Conn.

Mixing compelling statistics with candid judgments, Conn presented a case for consolidating and improving emergency care. He argued that regional care combines the certainty of where to bring a patient with specialists providing the treatment more often.

He addressed a friendly jury of about 400 emergency room doctors, nurses and mobile emergency medical technicians at the 1987 Sun Valley Emergency Medical Conference.

But his case will also have to be made in Twin Falls and Jerome counties, where hospitals are considering linking ambulance services.

Magic Valley Regional Medical Center and St. Benedict's Family Medical Center may consolidate their ambulance services to cut \$135,000 in collective annual losses.

Without voluntary cooperation, Conn said outside forces from licensing and insurance may begin dictating consolidation because of savings in health care and even litigation.

Conn is professor of surgery and director of Boston's New England Lifeflight, a helicopter ambulance service.

He is also vice-chairman of an EMS committee of the American Society of Testing and Materials, ASTM, a 31,000-member non-profit organization, sets voluntary standards for things such as emergency services.

Since experts develop standards through ASTM, legislatures often later adopt into law, Conn said.

The majority of his talk focused on warming up the field specialists to the idea of defining and improving standards for grading their emergency medical service. But he applied these early report cards to argue for regionalized health care.

EMS in two equal-sized counties California were studied because one county designated a single hospital for serious cases

and the other county had five choices for its field specialists.

The study found that one-third of deaths studied — were — preventable — in Orange County, which offered the choices, Conn said. San Francisco County, in contrast, had only one preventable death, he said.

That discrepancy formed part of the basis for a \$50 million lawsuit, settled for \$600,000, against EMS in Orange County because of delayed treatment for a stabbing victim, Conn said.

"That's how the long arm of litigation is reaching into EMS programs," Conn said.

But doctors from MVRMC and St. Benedict's are already sitting down to iron out those protocols in anticipation of consolidating ambulance services.

Orange County was studied again after designating a regional center. The number of salvageable deaths dropped from 34 percent to 16 percent, Conn said.

Also important is field contact with doctors as an ambulance races toward the hospital.

Conn cited a Mobile, Ala., study of 100 child fatalities where 53 cases were handled incorrectly.

These communications are also hampered by Magic Valley because MVRMC staffs the only 24-hour emergency room doctor.

### Commercial rezone gains P&Z approval

TWIN FALLS — The commercialism of Blue Lakes Boulevard North is creeping down Elm Street a little more.

The Twin Falls City Planning and Zoning Commission recommended for approval on Tuesday a request by Meldco Inc., a Bozeman, Mont. company, to rezone about 10 acres in the 1500 block of Elm Street North from residential to commercial.

The City Council will make the final decision on the request.

The zoning commission approved the request, but recommended one lot be zoned commercial planned-unit development to protect residents on Lawndale Drive.

Meldco wanted the change in order to build a business park on the property, now owned by Ace Hansen.

Last month, Meldco sought a similar change for an adjacent lot fronting Elm Street North.

Meldco co-owner Dave Harvey said the company wanted to expand the project to take advantage of an access off of Cheney Drive and Blue Lakes Boulevard. Part of the plan includes a mini-storage units.

Two neighbors opposed the request, but the commercialism in their back yards.

Commission member Greg Rud-dell suggested placing a PUD designation on the lot nearest Lawndale Drive. With a PUD, the city can control what is built there and even require such structures as berms or landscaping to "soften the impact." Neighbors would also have input.

Commission member Greg Lanning agreed with the suggestion, saying the property is destined for commercialism. He told the neighbors not to expect someone to build a house there.

"It's just not going to happen," he said.

Most of the meeting was spent on a request by Albert A. Lewis and Roger Wagner to rezone from agricultural to commercial property located on 3200 East Road, 1/4 mile north of Kimberly Road. The 124-foot by 294-foot parcel lies within the city area of impact.

Lewis also asked for a non-conforming permit to expand his towing and mechanic business by about 1,200 square feet. Lewis admitted he started construction on the addition without a building permit.

### Contra slides take Cuba angle

Symms-sponsored show draws few

TWIN FALLS — An Oliver North-touted slide show on Nicaragua failed to ignite much intensity on the issue Thursday, and also failed to attract a large crowd.

Only about two dozen Republicans and Optimists attended a slide show by Sam Routson, administrative assistant for Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho.

After the 45-minute presentation, few residents expressed strong support.

"I've always been an anti-Sandinista, and now I'm even more so," said Chuck Plumb. "I thought this was very informative, but I would be more interested in learning more about the Contra organization itself."

Other members, who asked not to be quoted, said they had no strong opinions either way on the issue.

Routson's presentation on the "Cubanization" of Nicaragua opened with a slide of Cuban President Fidel Castro standing next to Nicaraguan President Daniel

Ortega.

"The big question is why should the United States be concerned about what is taking place in Nicaragua," said Routson. "Because it's our back door, and it's of strategic significance to the United States."

Although Tom Lowery, Symms' press aide, said last week that some of the slides were Lt. Col. Oliver North's, Routson said Thursday the slides were not North's slides. However, he said a number of the slides showing graphs and statistics were from the U.S. Department of Defense and the State Department and "North also used them."

The majority of slides depicting quotes, charts and graphs depicting the buildup of Soviet and Cuban troops and weapons in the region, and pictures showing caches of Soviet-made weapons.

Few slides showed Contra rebels engaged in combat. Few slides even showed the Contra rebels.

Routson, who has toured Central America nine times, said the controversial U.S. policy towards

Nicaragua was a policy of simply trying to insure a stable government, conduct free elections, see that the Sandinistas cease aggression against its neighbors, and reverse the militarization of the country.

Routson said the U.S. also wants the Sandinistas to eject the 7,000-8,000 foreign military personnel, including personnel from Cuba, Soviet Union, Bulgaria and other communist bloc countries.

### Officials committed to keep mine open

CHALLIS (AP) — Cyprus Minerals has reaffirmed its commitment to maintaining operations, albeit at a reduced level, at its Thompson Creek molybdenum mine in eastern Idaho despite what corporate officials concede are persistent but "unfounded" rumors to the contrary.

"Our goal is to keep the mine open," said Chairman Richard Haganman. "Discussions to close the Thompson Creek mine have not taken place and any rumors to that effect are unfounded."

Still, recently announced layoffs at the mine coupled with a report in the industry publication Metals Week speculating that closure of the mine was only a matter of time has prompted many workers still on the job to begin looking for new employment, officials said.

Cyprus Minerals, along with America's only other major molybdenum producer, has been hard hit by cheap imports from Chile and expanding copper mining that produces molybdenum as a byproduct.

Metals Week and others have engaged in rife speculation about the mine's future, Haganman said, "but

none of it has been attributed to anyone in this company.

"In a market such as the moly market, that's so volatile, you're never far from talking a shutdown," he said. "Given the current and ongoing market conditions, no one in their right mind would preclude that from happening, but at this point they're continuing rumors."

Since announcing layoffs, Cyprus has decided to continue its original production plan for 7.5 million pounds at Thompson Creek, which means laid off employees would have the option of working three weeks on an import duty beyond the original Sept. 1 target.

Idaho officials have also said that U.S. Trade Representative Clayton Yeutter has agreed to expedite action on the Colorado-based company's request for reimbursement of an import duty on molybdenum. Sen. James McClure said he expected a decision within two months, and he predicted Yeutter would agree with the company that the Chilean molybdenum should be subject to tariff.

### UP repairing main southern Idaho railroad track

TWIN FALLS — The Union Pacific Railroad is bracing its main track through southern Idaho this summer with more than 125,000 new ties and a mountain of crushed rock.

A 65-worker crew, which is backed by a tie-splitting saw and other trackborne machinery, is replacing worn railbed on 243 miles of the UP's main line between Weiser and Minidoka.

The crew currently is working its way east from the Mountain Home area with completion scheduled in mid-September, said railroad spokesman Dick Trencher.

The \$7.4 million project is part of a periodic smoothing of the rail route. It includes renovation of ties, rock ballast, switches, road crossings and surface lining, Trencher said.

"You have to continually renew your railroad just like you do the highway," he said.

In March, the Union Pacific replaced 11 miles of steel rail at a cost of \$2.8 million. None of the rail repair was in the Magic Valley.

The main track runs through Mountain Home, Glenns Ferry, Shoshone and Minidoka. The project will not completely replace the track, but will reinforce weak or bumpy areas to give trains a smooth ride.

The crew digs out the ties from beneath the

rails and a machine cuts the eight-foot ties into three pieces, Trencher said. Workers repack the base with crushed rock and level the track. The repairs will use close to 40,000 cubic yards of crushed rock.

Private contractors pay to remove the ties from rights-of-way. The companies generally sell the wooden ties to the public for uses such as landscaping.

Another major maintenance crew has been working in the eastern part of the state.

The Union Pacific plans to spend about \$250 million this year to refurbish about 1,380 miles of track in 20 states.

## Land swap plan draws fire

**NORTH LAS VEGAS (AP)** — A proposed land swap that would allow Aerojet General to build a rocket manufacturing plant in economically depressed areas of the state drew mixed reviews from government leaders and environmentalists Thursday.  
 Gov. Richard Bryan halted the exchange of land, saying Aerojet General "meets the rigid criteria that have been established" for new industries locating in Nevada.  
 Members of the environmentalist Sierra Club disagreed, saying the proposed facility would endanger wildlife in the area.  
 The complicated land swap calls for Aerojet General to receive 51,610 acres of Bureau of Land Management land in Clark, Lincoln and Mineral counties.  
 In exchange for the BLM land in Nevada, Aerojet General would give about 4,800 acres of land it owns east of the Florida Everglades to the Interior Department.  
 The rocket facility would employ about 600 people plus another 1,400 support personnel.  
 Nevada environmentalists have objected to the land swap, saying it was being rushed through Congress without any public comment. The plan died in Congress last session.  
 Sen. Harry Reid, D-Nev., conducted the hearing for the Senate Subcommittee on Interior Appropriations told Thursday's hearing that the plan has the strong support of his office and the state Legislature. He said the project was important to Lincoln County, with a population of 4,000 people, and Mineral County, population 6,000, because the young people of those

economically depressed areas were leaving to seek job opportunities elsewhere.  
 The swap includes 42,700 acres of land for a defense plant in the Capote Valley, 69 miles northeast of Las Vegas.  
 Another 9,910 acres would be in Garfield Flat, 15 miles southeast of Hawthorne. The land would surround a 1,100-acre munitions-testing range owned by Aerojet General since 1963.  
 The governor said Aerojet was the type of company the state was courting and the project would mean "the enhancement of the economy in rural Nevada."  
 Bryan said the company had cooperated with state agencies in assessing and addressing regulatory requirements to protect water supplies and the environment, including air and water quality, wildlife and unique animal species.

# Every county to get money to launch centennial events

**BOISE (AP)** — The Idaho Centennial Commission plans to put up \$500,000, including at least \$500 for every county, to help launch local observances of Idaho's 1990 centennial.  
 Idaho's Indian tribes also have announced they will be joining in the centennial observance, with tentative plans for an unreplicated five-city tour from Boise in 1989 or 1990. And the Lasting Legacy Committee of the commission has launched studies on the possibility of creating a new centennial state park.  
 At a recent Rexburg meeting, the commission approved earmarking 15 percent of the money raised through its chief fund-raising activity, the sale of centennial license plates, for local observances. The commission also is raising money through the sale of commemorative silver coins.  
 State budget director Martin Peterson, vice chairman of the centennial commission, said at the end of the fiscal year, each county will receive \$3.75 for each set of cen-

tennial license plates sold in the county, plus \$1.50 for renewals.  
 The minimum will be \$500 per county, no matter how many plates are sold, he said. But in the population centers, the amount will be much more. Ada County had sold 7,141 sets of plates through the end of June, he said, and will get at least \$279 from that source.  
 For the first six months of centennial license plate sales, sparsely populated Camas County sold the least, 33 sets, followed by Clark, Lewis, and Lincoln, 53.  
 Besides Ada County's total, Banrock County was second with 2,645 sets of plates, followed by Kootenai, 2,018; Canyon, 1,964; and Bonneville, 1,942.  
 All funds must be used exclusively for activities associated with the centennial observance. Funds must be used within the county by a centennial committee which has received written endorsement of county commissioners, and the mayors of cities representing at least 50 percent of the county's population in In-

 Rouse also gave a brief history of the country, including the rise of the Marxists in Nicaragua.  
 Asked about President Reagan's proposed peace plan for the area, Rouse simply said the president's plan "has been on the table since 1981."  
 Earlier this week, Symms blasted the peace plan as "simply window dressing and an unequivocal sell-out of the Nicaraguan freedom fighters."  
 "The proposal calls for negotiations and a proposed cease-fire for 60 days. During talks for democratic reform in Nicaragua, Contras would receive no further aid. If talks fail, aid would resume."  
 "Quite frankly, because some individuals are naive and misled," Rouse said. "They don't have to endure bloc committee meetings and justify their actions to a committee in hopes of getting a piece of meat."  
 Rouse said Americans touring Nicaragua are taken to health clinics and schools run by the Sandinistas, "and that's a facade."  
 He was also asked why America should support the Contras, who seem to be just a different bunch of scoundrels?  
 Rouse said none of the charges against the Contras, including drug smuggling and rights abuses, have been substantiated. He called the charges a "propaganda" campaign by anti-Contra supporters. However, without saying who was behind it, Rouse did admit drug smuggling was going on — "no one denies that the Contras are doing

it."  
 On a personal note, Rouse staunchly denied he had ever taken a cause-paid trip to Central America, as was previously reported by the Times-News.  
 "I have gone on trips sponsored by the Freedom Leadership Foundation, which was precluded through the Senate Ethics Committee," he said.  
 Rouse at first refused to say who the Freedom Leadership Foundation was, but later said the organization was a conservative group. But after being pressed on the issue, Rouse said the Freedom Leadership Foundation is connected through its board of directors to Causa, a political party of the United Church of Christ. Rev. Sun Myung Moon.

 The Holloways, who have a 20-year lease agreement for Evergreen Manor, also are pumping money into capital improvements and program changes. Holloway said he plans to spend an estimated \$250,000 by the end of the year on new equipment and furnishings.  
 For instance, new mattresses are necessary to help avoid bed sores, and the facility's dining room must be refurbished with new tables because current ones are too high for some patients.  
 Instead of operating all programs in-house, Holloway said he will draw on community resources in some areas. The care center's alcohol and drug abuse program, which cost \$9,000 a month in salaries, and its home health care program, are being eliminated because they are duplicated — either agencies or business — Holloway said.  
 The new management plans to consult with medical staffs at local hospitals on the types of extended care needed in the community, he said.  
 This week's state-federal inspection has been the 10th in 16 months. Last week's Evergreen Manor lost its federal approval for a six days because it did not meet standards.  
 If the home had not met standards this inspection, it would not have been able to accept new Medicare or Medicaid patients. In 30 days, existing patients on the federal programs also would have had to move out or pay their own bills, Schooner said.  
 Although the facility has a relatively clear bill of health, Evergreen Manor will remain under loose state scrutiny. Normally, nursing homes are inspected once a year.  
 "Undoubtedly, we will not wait a year to go back again, because of the history of problems," Schooner said.

# Hi-Fi killer makes clemency appeal to Utah pardons board

**POINT OF THE MOUNTAIN, Utah (AP) —** Condemned "Hi-Fi" killer Pierre Dale Selby, expressing sorrow and contrition for crimes he committed for the first time, appealed for clemency Thursday as a man "turned to God."

In more than three hours of dramatic testimony, Selby asked the State Board of Pardons to commute his Aug. 28 death date to life in prison, saying Utah's first execution in a decade would serve no purpose.

"I've often thought that if my death would restore the victims' lives, I'd probably say let's go on," he said. "I don't think it will serve any purpose to anyone. It would just be another death."

"All I can really do at this point is say to the victims' families, I'm really and truly sorry that this crime took place and that I was a party to it."

Selby, 34, who tortured and shot five people during a 1974 robbery at the Ogden Hi-Fi Shop that left

three dead, acknowledged the notoriety of the murders, wept while recounting a beating he received as a youth and said he was high on beer, Valium and marijuana when he forced his victims to drink Drano.

"I understand this case is not a very popular case—it is a very violent case. I am not proud of it, but as it is as it stands," he said in the West Indies accent of his birth. "I'm not sure I can explain it. For myself, I have not been able to determine an answer."

Selby's first public statements on the crimes came during his last scheduled avenue of appeal. The three-member Board of Pardons, empowered by statute to commute death sentences, expected to hear five hours of testimony from each side Thursday and Friday before deciding Selby's appeal, Aug. 20.

"It is my belief that 34 years in prison can make a difference for better or for worse, in my case for the better," said Selby. "There is some-

thing there — something worth saving."

As he spoke, the two survivors, Orren Walker and Cortney Naibitt, watched intently. Shortly after a reference to Selby's shooting of his mother, Carol, Naibitt briefly left the room assisted by his wife and a security guard.

During a break, Naibitt said Selby's testimony "didn't sound right."

"He showed about as much emotion in there as he did that night," Naibitt said. "I think they ought to kill him."

William Andrews, 32, of Jonesboro, La., also was sentenced to die for the Hi-Fi murders, but his appeals are running about six months behind Selby's.

Selby, born in Tobago but raised in Trinidad and Brooklyn, N.Y., is scheduled to die at Utah State Prison shortly after 1 a.m. on Aug. 28. His would be the first execution in Utah since Gary Gilmore was shot by a firing squad in 1977, ending a 10-year national moratorium

on capital punishment. By law Selby could have chosen the firing squad, but instead would be the first in the state to die by lethal injection.

In a deliberate narrative, Selby described the night of April 22, 1974, in the basement of the store at 300 E. 10th. After the victims were bound, Selby said he found a can of liquid Drano in a bathroom.

Selby said he told Andrews, "If we give them this to drink, they won't talk, say what they saw. I think we just finally just poured it out and gave it to them."

He described the noises the victims made as "the sound of pain, really."

"It was overly depressing. It was sad, but it was more than sad. I think doom when I heard that sound."

Selby said that as he was turning the five over on their backs, Carol Naibitt "called me a name and I just shot her right there. She called

me a goddess nigger and I just shot her right there."

Raw ringing and heart pounding, "I just started shooting" the others in the head. He acknowledged having tried to strangle Walker after shooting him and having kicked a ball-pont into his ear.

He contradicted Walker's trial testimony—that Selby had raped Michelle Anstley, 19, before shooting her. He said that when he drank beer it made him impotent.

Asked by his attorney, Gil Athay, if he had tried to rape Anstley, he replied, "I have to say I think I did, but I can't remember any such thing. I can't vouch for it but I assume I did."

Raised in a strict Seventh-day Adventist home with a brother and six sisters, Selby said he often was beaten by his parents for the smallest infractions. Once, at age 13, he and friends bought beer with money given him for a church offering. He said he awoke tied to his bed and

his father flailing him with a cord from an iron.

Selby's narrative broke off at that point as he placed his face in a hand and wept. Athay gave him a handkerchief and he continued, saying he could not stand or sit for a week following the beating.

Selby said moving to Brooklyn at age 17—and then to Bedford-Stuyvesant was a shock. He said that although black himself, he did not fit in with American blacks and didn't like how they stood around on street corners and drank wine.

When first sent to death row, Selby said he was bitter about his "circus" trial, but turned to psychology and then to the Bible.

"I thought when I first came here Dale Pierre was about as bad as you could get. After I started to turn around, I did everything I could to make the impact of that change worthwhile," he said.

He reads a book a week and has taught himself to play the guitar and program computers. But he said his main effort has been to understand himself.

He said his readings in the Bible brought him back to the Seventh-day Adventist faith of his youth.

"Come like this, you can't recover from them. The deed that's done is final. Carrying around guilt... it's a sin, really," Selby said. "If you believe like I do, you believe that's why Christ died, to give repentance to sinners."

# Fed check doesn't support cover-up allegations

**SEATTLE (AP) —** A federal investigation failed to find evidence of a cover-up of a 1976 report that could have scuttled any plans to store the nation's highly radioactive wastes at the Hanford nuclear reservation, a U.S. Department of Energy spokesman contended Thursday.

The report concerning the movement of underground water at Hanford, and follow-up tests 10 years later confirmed findings in one version of the document that radioactive iodine 129 was moving from the surface to aquifers deep underground between 1962 and 1974.

Such movement could help disqualify Hanford as a storage site for the nuclear wastes, for fear groundwater could be contaminated.

The U.S. Department of Energy's Inspector General's office said in a nine-page abstract report, obtained Wednesday by the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, that it found three versions of the report.

The newspaper said the abstract report was inconclusive in finding whether the report had been suppressed.

However, Mike Talbot, an Energy Department spokesman at

Richard, said abstracts of Inspector General investigations normally do not draw conclusions on facts they present.

An April 1, 1987 memorandum from Inspector General John G. Layton in Washington to Mike Lawrence, Hanford operations manager, concluded the investigation had found no evidence of a cover-up of iodine 129 information, Talbot said.

"The investigation did not produce information that would substantiate claims that 'above background levels' of iodine 129 were

found at the Hanford nuclear reservation" and surrounding farms, Layton wrote the memo.

Battelle Northwest Laboratories radiologist Fred Brauer, the main author of the 1976 report, said Wednesday through Battelle spokesman Terry Brown that he didn't believe his report had been intentionally suppressed.

Brauer said it took 18 months to get approval to publish the report, and by that time he felt its value was diminished and he stuck it in his safe, said Brown.

Brown also said Brauer didn't

realize the report could affect plans for the waste repository. His report had recommended follow-up tests, but none were performed for a decade.

But Talbot said Layton's memo found a number of reports, dating back to 1972, "that demonstrated an expanded interest and monitoring by the Department of Energy" of iodine 129 movement.

Since the 1976 report became public this year, members of Congress and state officials have said it could provide a crucial argument against a Hanford repository. Hanford is one of three finalist Western sites being considered for the dump.

State officials say if contaminants can get into the aquifers 1,600 feet below the surface, they could come up from the proposed 3,200-foot-deep dump site.

# Vegas feels motion of underground nuke test

**LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) —** A major underground nuclear weapons test with an explosive punch nearly 12 times the Hiroshima bomb — detonated Thursday morning, causing some ground motion in this gaming resort 75 miles from ground zero.

The blast caused a control building 9 1/2 miles from ground zero to sway.

Marvin Crawford, a security guard at the Dunes Hotel on the Las Vegas Strip, said chandeliers

swayed in the casino seconds after the detonation. He said guards were watching to see if they could detect ground motion at the time of the 7 a.m. PDT blast.

An operator at the Las Vegas Hilton, the world's largest hotel, said half a dozen guests called hotel operators, asking about the motion. The operator, who declined to give her name, said the guests seemed more inquisitive than alarmed.

Teresa Rogers, a newswoman at KNPR radio on the city's east side,

said she looked up at a hanging clock and noticed it swaying just a few seconds after the blast. She said electric cables began swaying, her microphone was bouncing slightly and a glass jar on a table was moving.

Energy Department spokesman Barbara Yoerg, who was at the control point on the Nevada Test Site, said the building swayed noticeably.

"It felt like I was sitting in a rocking chair," she said in a telephone report from the site seconds after

the blast. "My chair was rocking back and forth. It lasted for about nine seconds."

The blast, registered 5.7 on the Richter scale at the National Earthquake Information Center in Golden, Colo., according to spokesman John Minshel. The reading is among the higher recorded for such tests.

Ms. Yoerg said there was still activity on a seismograph at the test site several minutes after the test.

She said the underground test was considered a success because it was contained within the earth.

It was the 11th announced test at the Nevada site this year.

The Soviet Union announced the 15th test in that country's current series Wednesday.

Ms. Yoerg said 27 people demonstrating for continued testing were at the gates of the desert site this morning.

# Shuttle booster joint set for testing

**BRIGHAM CITY, Utah (AP) —** The second in a series of test firings of the redesigned space shuttle's booster rocket nozzle joint will be conducted on Monday, Morton Thiokol Inc. says.

The experiment will take place 1 p.m. Monday at the Wasatch Operations' Nozzle Joint Environment Simulator near here and specifically will evaluate the nozzle-to-casing joint, said Morton Thiokol spokesman Rocky Raab.

Emery Mining said it also planned on Monday to announce a firm time for the first full-scale test of the redesigned booster. Morton Thiokol officials had tentatively set the test for Aug. 27 or 28.

On Aug. 4, the aerospace company which has a NASA contract to make the booster rockets — including those on the shuttle Challenger, which exploded Jan. 28, 1986, killing its seven-member crew — conducted the first in a series of 10 simulations considered a preliminary step to the full-scale experiment.

In that test, engineers fired nearly 400 pounds of solid propellant to simulate launch conditions in the redesigned joint, which includes new insulation materials and a "capture feature" aimed at preventing the escape of superhot gases, said Raab.

The capture feature in the new design consists of a metal lip that rests between the insulation and O-rings at the joints which link the booster's four segments. The lip is designed to prevent the joint from bulging under the pressure of burning gases during launch.

The insulation in the new design meets at the joint and is bonded with an adhesive. In the old joint configuration, the insulation did not meet. The new design also includes a third O-ring in the joint.

Leaking gases from a booster joint has been blamed for the explosion of the Challenger.

# Compressor blamed for mine disaster

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP) —** A faulty air compressor has been identified as the source of the 1984 Wilberg Mine fire which claimed the lives of 27 Utah coal miners, the federal Mine Safety and Health Administration says.

In a 92-page report that culminated a 2 1/2-year-long investigation into the central Utah mine's operations prior to and after fire broke out Dec. 19, 1984, MSHA investigators supported conclusions reached in preliminary findings earlier this year, said agency spokeswoman Katharine Snyder.

Along with its final findings, MSHA on Thursday announced that it had issued seven additional citations — for safety violations — to Utah Power & Light Co., the Wilberg's owner, and Emery Mining Corp., the former operators of the mine near Orangeville, Utah.

In March, MSHA had issued 34 citations related to the disaster. However, the new citations concerned violations not related to the fire, Snyder said.

"While the final report closes out MSHA's investigation into the cause of the fire and resulting fatalities, the agency continues to investigate possible criminal violations of mine-safety standards," she said.

UP&L spokesman John Ward said the privately held utility likely would challenge the new citations, as it already has the earlier ones. He said UP&L officials do not think it is proper to cite the company for problems they feel should be laid at the feet of Emery Mining.

## Market briefly runs above 2,700 level

**NEW YORK** — The stock market climbed to new highs Thursday, being backed from Wednesday's opening of profit-taking to make a brief run past the 2,700 level in the Dow Jones industrial average.

Dow Jones' average of 30 blue chips, off 11.16 of Wednesday, rose 22.17 to 2,691.49.

Volume on the New York Stock Exchange came to 217.07 million shares, down just a bit from 235.70 million Wednesday.

After surging ahead to record levels on Monday and Tuesday, stock prices backed off a bit in Wednesday's session.

Analysts said traders' urge to cash in some of their gains had increased. But they also noted that the resulting pullback was only mild and sporadic.

Brokers said there still appeared to be plenty of demand for stocks from investors scrambling to join in the bull market that began five

years ago this week.

The Dow Jones industrial average pushed briefly past 2,700 early in the afternoon, but then slipped back below that point.

In the economic news, the Commerce Department reported that retail sales rose 0.8 percent in July, on top of an upward-revised increase of 1.4 percent the month before. That helped reinforce Wall Street's generally positive view of the progress of the economy.

The department said part of the

large change in the June data stemmed from an increase in car sales figured among the auto stocks. General Motors gained 1% to 91 1/2; Chrysler 1% to 44 1/2, and Ford Motor 3% to 109 1/2.

U.S. car manufacturers separately posted improved sales results for early August.

In the general-rebound retailing group, Sears Roebuck added 3% to 58 1/2; J.C. Penney 1% to 65 1/2, and K mart to 47 1/2.

## Retail sales up .8 percent

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Retail sales rose 0.8 percent in July, following an even stronger June increase, as consumers flocked back into auto showrooms and department and furniture stores, the government reported Thursday.

The Commerce Department said retail establishments sold \$127.6 billion worth of goods in July, a rise of \$954 million from the June level, when sales had shot up an even faster 1.4 percent.

While half of the July gain and two-thirds of the June increase came from a rebound in auto sales, many analysts said the back-to-back increases were still impressive following several months of lackluster performance.

A separate report by the National Association of Realtors showed that sales of existing homes in the April-June quarter posted a 5.6 percent increase over the same period a year ago. But sales fell in 15 states and the District of Columbia with the declines attributed in part to the big jump in mortgage rates during the spring.

The 1.4 percent increase in retail sales in June, the biggest gain since February, represented a large upward revision from the govern-

ment's initial estimate a month ago that sales had risen only 0.4 percent that month.

Auto sales rose 1.9 percent in July following a 4.5 percent June increase, but analysts said these gains only partially offset earlier sluggishness. They said inventories of unsold 1987 models remain high and will mean further production cutbacks in August.

Excluding autos, retail sales rose a 0.4 percent in July and 0.5 percent in June, with both gains the highest since a 2.6 percent rise in February.

## Joyner ties world long jump mark

**INDIANAPOLIS (AP)** — Jackie Joyner-Kersey soared to a share of the world record in the long jump Thursday night at the Pan American Games as the United States pulled away in the medals race.

Joyner-Kersey, the world record holder in the heptathlon, leaped 24 feet, 5/8 inches, tying the mark of Heike Drechsler of East Germany.

Meanwhile, Cuba, which was a strong runner-up to the U.S. heading into the fifth day of competition, won only two medals through 14 events Thursday. The United States,

which held a 69-medal lead through four days, won 20 medals, half of them gold, giving the Americans 87 more medals than the Cubans.

Joyner-Kersey, of East St. Louis, Ill., beat her U.S. record of 23-9 by one-half inch on her third try. Then, on her final effort, the silver medalist in the 1984 Olympic heptathlon sailed to the longest jump of her career.

**TRACK AND FIELD**  
Mike Gonzales, of Redondo Beach, Calif., surged from 227 points behind leader Keith Robinson of Provo, Utah, to win the decathlon. He cleared 16 feet, three-quarters inch in the pole vault, while Robinson, bothered by a groin injury, managed only 13-9/4.

Then, in sapping heat and humidity — 87-degree temperatures, with 68 percent humidity — Gonzales won his fourth event of the 10-stage decathlon with a throw of 212-1/2 in the javelin. That put him 35 points ahead of Robinson.

All Gonzales needed in the 1,500 was to beat Robinson out. "I was just going on with Keith, trying to run his pace," Gonzales said of the final event, in which he was fifth in 4:59.94, more than seven seconds ahead of Robinson.

The winning score of 7,649 points was the lowest in the Pan Am Games since 1971.

"I knew it would be a bad score, my best and worst this year," said Gonzales, who also won the discus and shot put.

Ecuador's Fidel Solorzano, the first-day leader, withdrew with an ankle injury suffered during a practice jump in the pole vault.

**SWIMMING**  
The United States won three of four individual races and a men's relay.

Jeff Kubiak of Davis, Calif., — sporting torn and painful patellar tendon and blue — set a games record in the 200 breaststroke in 2:17.62.

"We came down to the pool and saw some of the girls doing their somersaults," Kubiak said. "I thought I would do it for the team."

Janel Jorgensen of Richfield, Conn., won the women's 100 butterfly in 1:01.28. Paul Robinson of Richardson, Texas, won the 400-meter freestyle in 3:54.44.

Robinson won another gold, teaming with Jim Born of Gambier, Ohio, Scott McCadem of Waterloo, Iowa, and Todd Dudley of Raleigh, N.C. for another meet mark in the men's 400 freestyle relay, 3:19.97. Can. da's Keltie Duggan prevented a U.S. sweep by winning the women's 100-breaststroke.

**SOFTBALL**  
U.S. women's softball pitchers continued their mastery as Michele Granger, who pitched a no-hitter on Sunday, had a one-hitter in a 6-0 victory over Belize. The one hit, a chopper up the middle, deflected off Granger's glove.

In four games, the U.S. women have allowed no runs, two hits, four walks and have struck out 48 batters, including 14 by Granger against Belize.

"Granger said she can pitch a lot better."

"It was not at all a good control game for me," the 17-year-old left-hander from Placentia, Calif., said after walking three. "I guess you can't have great control every day. I got a little perturbed at myself with those three walks."

The U.S. men upped their record to 5-0 with a 10-4 rout of Colombia. Dale Clark of Lebanon, Pa., led a 15-hit attack with three hits and five runs batted in.

**SHOOTING**  
Mike English of Colorado Springs, Colo., won the running game target gold medal with 683 points, seven more than Todd Benaley of Lordsburg, N.M.

**VOLLEYBALL**  
The American women won their first match in steamy Hinkle Fieldhouse at Butler University, which is not air conditioned. After losing the first game to Canada 11-15, they took the next three games 15-12, 15-11, 15-8. The Olympic and world champion U.S. men, who lost their opener to Brazil, faced the Dominican Republic.

**CYCLING**  
David Brinton of North Hollywood, Calif., qualified for the finals of individual pursuit, to be run Thursday night. Brinton faced Argentina's Gabriel Curuchet by beating Eduardo Alonso of Cuba.

**DRUG TESTING**  
Canadian swimmer Sally Gilbert failed her drug test because she used an antihistamine to treat a cold. But Gilbert, a member of the bronze-medal 200-meter freestyle relay team, was allowed to continue competing and was fourth in the 100 butterfly Thursday.

Canadian Coach Tom Johnson was livid that team doctors allowed Gilbert to use the medicine. "It's incredible that kind of mistake can be made, it shattered her," Johnson said. "Somebody's going to hang 'em and it isn't going to be the kid."

## Lietzke chips in twice to advance in PGA tournament

**CASTLE ROCK, Colo. (AP)** — Bruce Lietzke chipped in on each of the last two holes and led the advance through Thursday's second portion of first-round play in the unique International golf tournament.

Play was held up at 3:15 p.m., MDT, by the approach of a thunderstorm. About a quarter of the field still was on the course when play was halted.

Lietzke chipped in from 40 feet for an eagle-3 on the 17th hole at the Castle Rock Golf Club and holed another chip, this from about 25 feet, for par on the 18th to complete a round of 6-under-par 66.

Scoring in this tournament, however, is based on a modified Stableford system in which points are awarded or subtracted depending on a player's performance on each hole.

Five points are awarded for an eagle, two for a birdie, zero for par,

minus-1 for bogey and minus-3 for double bogey or higher.

Lietzke's effort converted to a score of 14 points, the best of the day. It was worth \$10,000 from the "day" money that is being awarded for the first time this year.

"The day money definitely kept our attention out there," Lietzke said. "I remember last year, I had an 8-footer for eagle on the 17th, and I already had enough points to qualify, so I didn't really care whether I made the putt or not. This time, I was grinding on it."

Second-round play will be held Friday with 78 men — including 39 who advanced Wednesday — competing for 54 places in the third round. Jack Nicklaus, Greg Norman and Tom Watson were among those who advanced Wednesday. The field will be reduced again, to 18 players, for Sunday's final round of the tournament that offers \$1 million with \$180,000 to the winner.

## Alaska fears Olympic bid has been killed

Alaska's chances of hosting the 1994 Winter Olympics were dealt a "major body blow" when the State Department denied a visa to let a Chilean athlete compete in the Pan American Games at Indianapolis, a top Olympic official said Thursday.

Richard Pound, vice president of the International Olympic Committee, said IOC members in Latin America will remember the visa denial when they vote on a site for the 1994 Games.

"They may hold it against Anchorage just because it's part of the United States," Pound said in a telephone interview from Montreal. Anchorage is one of six cities bidding for the Winter 1994 Games, which will be awarded next summer.

Olympic boosters in Anchorage sought to play down the potential damage caused by the visa controversy.

"I think it's too early to tell whether it damages Anchorage's

bid," said Rick Nerland, executive vice president of the Anchorage Organizing Committee.

The IOC and the U.S. Olympic Committee are upset with the U.S. government for refusing to grant a visa to Francisco Zuniga, a member of the Chilean shooting team. The State Department contends that Zuniga was involved with the murders of several anti-government protesters while working for the Chilean intelligence service.

"The USOC says Zuniga should have been allowed to compete in Indianapolis because he had received accreditation from the Chilean Olympic Committee, authorizing him to compete at the Pan Am Games."

"As part of the Olympic family, they (USOC officials) have to ensure that our government adheres to the rules of international competition — specifically the Olympic charter regarding entry of athletes," Nerland said.

Williams, 22, was Atlanta's sixth-round draft choice in 1986. Rookie Cleveland fullback Tim Manoa is learning that professional football is a lot more complicated than the college game.

"Coming out of college, this is a triple the complication of the offense there," Manoa said at the Browns' training camp in Mentor, Ohio. "There are so many things you have to know."

The 6-foot-1, 227-pound Manoa caught a blocking back for D.J. Dozier at Penn State. Dozier was chosen by Minnesota in the first round of the NFL draft, while Manoa was taken in the third round.

Dallas Coach Tom Landry, in a change of mind, said Tony Dorsett would start at running back in Saturday night's preseason game against the San Diego Chargers.

Landry said David Lavette would likely start, but changed his mind and said Dorsett would start "just to get him a feel" of game action.

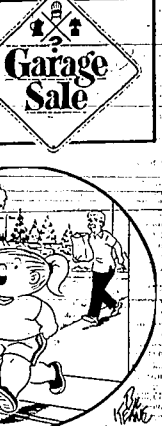

THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

"Nothing is impossible for the man who doesn't have to do it himself." - A.H. Weiler.

How do you play today's trump suit to avoid losing three tricks? Hint: The odds favoring a 3-3 break are about 36 percent; those favoring a 4-2 break are close to 50 percent.

If South cashes the ace and then leads the jack, the play might seem normal but it's a big loser. East wins his queen and later, West gets two more winners with his K-9 over South's 10.

The key point in trumps is to realize that a low trump should remain intact for the ace. If trumps are 3-3, any play of trumps will succeed. If they are a more likely 4-2, South should hope for a doubleton honor in either hand.

In today's case, East wins the second trump with his queen but South's J-10 of trumps remain intact to hold West to only one trump trick. South discards a low spade on dummy's high diamond and the defenders get only three tricks.

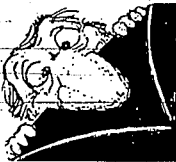

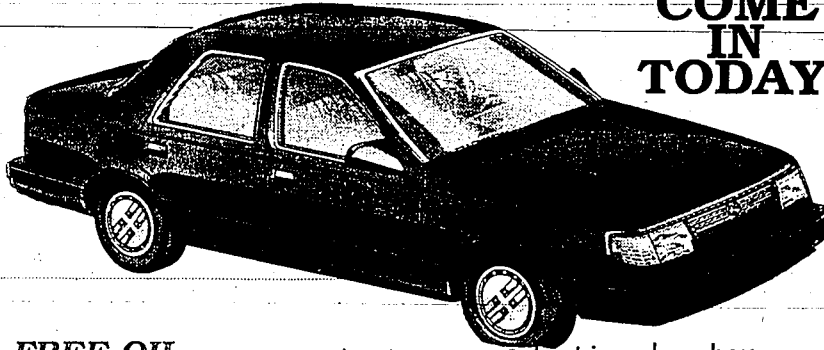

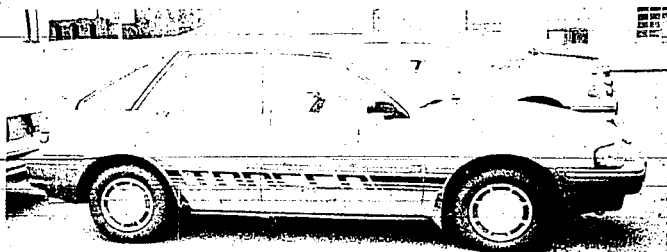

## Watercolors: Subtlety takes myriad of forms

Traveling IWS exhibit spotlights best in state

TWIN FALLS — Heat waves rise from the downtown sidewalks in silent wisps, yet inside the first thing to catch the eye is a painting of an icy blue, snow-covered hillside partially shrouded in heavy grey clouds. A mid-winter sun that offers light but no warmth, shines white just above the horizon.

Entitled "Breakthrough," the painting is on display at the Canyonside Gallery in Twin Falls. It was created by watercolorist Roy Mason of Butte, who won second prize at the Idaho Watercolor Society's eighth annual exhibition held in Boise last month.

"Roy Mason is one of the finest artists in the state," says Roy Hicks, gallery owner. Mason's award qualified "Breakthrough" to be included in a state-wide traveling exhibit representing works by Idaho watercolorists. The exhibit arrived in Twin Falls on Saturday and will remain on view at the Canyonside Gallery through the first week of September.

With a statewide exhibit now in its eighth year, the Idaho Watercolor Society has more than 200 active members, with 18 living in the Magic Valley. "Watercolor is a popular medium in this state primarily

because it is affordable," says Hicks. But, he says, it is not an easy skill to master.

Aside from acquiring the technical expertise to handle the media, a watercolorist must be able to control what is sometimes uncontrollable. For example, Hicks says, a common watercolor technique is to use a wet wash and then to try to create something out of the resulting design. But a more experienced watercolorist oftentimes begins with a design in mind and then makes the most of "controlled accidents."

Hicks points to "Snow Leaves" by Joyce Green of Meridian, as an illustration of a "controlled accident" resulting in beautiful graphics. "The brown-toned painting allows the viewer an intimate look at dried, snow-covered leaves. The scene is barren yet beautiful.

While one often associates watercolors with sweeping pastel-colored landscapes, Hicks says watercolor portraits and still life can be so difficult to do well. Nancy Seamons Crookston, of Pocatello, received first place honors with her group portrait entitled "Old Time Fiddlers." It is a realistic painting showing a trio of senior citizens outfitted in cowboy hats and denim

vests and one can almost hear Crookston's "Fiddlers" toes-tapping as they play.

"The strength of a watercolor is the illusion that it creates," says Hicks. And for that reason, one of his favorite pieces in the show is another Crookston painting entitled "On The Beach," which also received an honorable mention in the Boise show. Crookston's blue and mustard-toned beach scene features three young women strolling along the shore. Although their dress is modern, the women carry unopened parasols. The mood is Victorian. The style is reminiscent of the nineteenth century impressionists.

The painting in this traveling show represents the best of 183 works submitted by Idaho artists for judging by Christopher Schink, a well-known watercolorist from Palo Alto, Calif.

Local artists whose works were also included in the Boise exhibit are: Gibson of Ketchikan; June Carry of Butley and Joan Sargent of Murtaugh.

Schink then selected 20 paintings from collection to tour galleries throughout the state from July until November. These watercolors are on display at the Canyonside Gallery, Monday through Saturday 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

## For Elvis fans, it's 'long live The King' ... all the way to Memphis

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Now they are arriving from all over the world by bus, car, jet and RV, a look of awe in their eyes and a flush of illicit excitement in their powdered cheeks.

A caravan of 22 buses, chartered by British aficionados, has just returned from a trip to the Tupelo, Miss., birthplace and the occupants are immersed in Elvis Presley's life, booking up the Sun Studios tour, in 20-minute shifts, for a whole day. (One English fan, declaring his musical allegiance, has tied his long hair up in a Mega and Bara bandanna.)

The arrival of mega-fan Janelle McCombs, the Tupelo collector whose memorabilia fill an entire McDonald's, has been delayed a day by the journey to Mississippi of a group of fan clubs from Japan and Scandinavia.

This is not a young person's pilgrimage; except for the young children in tow and a handful of frosted-bread teen-agers filling in as rush-week tour guides, Elvis' army is a veteran crew of over-40s. Most of these — and Graceland and city hotel officials now say they expect 100,000 tourists by the end of the week — are one-time sojourners in paradise, who hope to turn the anniversary of Elvis Presley's death on Aug. 16, 1977, into a reassuring reunion of a family of the soul.

But the hardest-core fans here are observing a ritual, making a journey to whisper at Elvis' grave. They scrawl loving graffiti on the "waiting wall" in front of Graceland mansion, and then buy tickets to commercialized waxes, where collectibles have replaced consumables.

"I have so much stuff I'm going to have to move," says 72-year-old widow Martha Hahn, who has traveled from Chicago to Memphis every August since Presley died. "I never part with a card; I have two of every record he ever made. I have every book, every calendar, a bust" — she marks its height at her waist — "a doll dressed in black leather, a radio... I can't think of it all."

Hahn, whose flowered blouse is rim-to-rim-Elvis-buttons, fell fast and hard for Elvis 30 years ago. "He was just a down-to-earth person, plus he was the sexiest thing I had ever seen," she says. "No one could project sex the way he could — and of course, years ago, a lot of people didn't approve of that at all. I got a lot of lectures about that (from my family). But that didn't stop me!"

"I know he's dead, but I don't feel like he is," Hahn says. "Every time I walk into the mansion, I can feel his presence... It's a good feeling. No one's ever meant that much to me outside my husband," Hahn says with a smile, and if forced to choose between Elvis and her husband, "I'd have a problem, that's all I'll say."

Even now, Jean Robinson of Cincinnati lives as intimately with Elvis as with her husband Esker. An Elvis adorer since his first television appearance in January 1956, Jean Robinson has worn her heart on her sleeve every day since 1971. "I wouldn't buy anything but an Elvis shirt, I wouldn't wear anything but an Elvis shirt," Robinson says flatly. In the same tone of voice, she announces, "I don't buy any other kind of music, and I don't play any other kind."

Robinson estimates she has about 60 shirts at the moment, many of

same guy. There was no act... That's what I loved about him. "What frightened me was what fame did in terms of shutting him down. He became a prisoner of his own success. It has made me quite conscious of my own being in this business. I want to safeguard so I can be a person who can go out and party and can hang out and be a part of life. I don't want to let this world fame destroy me."

# Country music jamboree set at springs

**TWIN FALLS** — The Magic Valley Country Music Association will host an oldtime country jamboree this weekend at the Magic Hot Springs resort.

The musicians' group, formed in 1961, boasts more than 20 members from age 14 to 70. Longtime member Cliff Haak, a mandolin player who regularly entertains at Senior Citizen Centers in Buhl and Twin Falls, says he joined the group in order to meet "others" who played "string instruments." He says that people didn't know how to go about getting together when he joined years ago, adding that there wasn't much bar life.

In addition to a shared love for country music, the group shared the

The resort's new owner, John Brantzen is attempting to restore the baths and cabins with the help of caretaker John Horton. They plan to open a library and small museum at the site to hold memorabilia about the resort's past.

Magic Valley Country Music Association chose to do a benefit music festival at Magic Hot Springs because members say that as a historical site, it deserves preservation.

"We want to help restore the landmark and have it get together," says Haak.

This weekend at Magic, Country Music musicians will play both

Saturday and Sunday beginning in the early afternoon and continuing through the evening. There will be a potluck supper on Saturday at 6 p.m. Those attending are invited to bring their favorite dish and meat to put on the coals. The cost is \$5.00/day for adults, \$2.50/day for children and senior citizens, or \$15.00/day for a family. The price of admission includes country music entertainment, overnight camping, and hot baths. All country music musicians are invited to sit in with the bands. 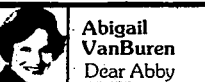
**DEAR ABBY:** You've had so much in your column lately about gifts, I want to tell you what happened to me.

'Snow White' at 50: Still fairest of them all
In anniversary re-release, it's easy to see why Disney's first full-length animated feature remains his best

Before the ceaseless, all-seeing home tube microwaved kids into instant cry potatoes, American youngsters shared one blinding moment of artistic illumination: their first movie.

Almost everyone who grew up in the first 50 years of the century can recall, vividly or dimly, his or her induction into the great, dark, shining world of our first cartoon heroines, villains and villainesses, and comics of every shape and size — all larger, lovelier, scarier and funnier than life.

For the luckiest children of those long-ago, innocent times, the rite of initiation was guided by a man whose legends live on. Walt Disney. Whether the first picture was "Dumbo" or "Pinocchio" or "Fantasia" or "Bambi," that cinematic baptism was breathtakingly magical and it remains eternally cherished, shimmering in the ether of the mind. But surely the most thrilling of all first-movie experiences must be "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," which is celebrating its 50th anniversary with a re-release at theaters throughout the world.

Watching the hundreds of thousands of animated drawings in Technicolor and listening to the rich, emotional score and romantic, delightful songs dazzled even seasoned and discerning movie critics when "Snow White" debuted as the first full-length animated feature in the Christmas season of 1937.

Writing in The New Republic at the start of 1938, Otis Ferguson, probably the most admired film critic of the day, opened his review by citing "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" as "among the genuine artistic achievements of this country." The year had just begun, but Ferguson ended his re-



view of the animated epic once dismissed as "Disney's folly" by declaring it "the best and most important motion picture of 1938."

From the first lovely, pristine image of the princess, pale of complexion yet with hair blacker than a raven, singing sweetly beside her ancient, lonely well, to the hag-like old crone's terrifying fall from a gale-swept precipice, "Snow White" played on young emotions and inchoate ideas of art with unflinching understanding and skill. When the mirror gave the beautiful but cold-as-death queen the fatal answer to who was fairest in the land, the sight of the talking, burning face in the mirror induced a frisson of excitement. When Snow White was escorted deep into the forest by the hulking, handsome, bearded huntsman at the murderous orders of the jealous stepmother-queen, the tension became unbearable. And when the trees in the night forest swayed and plucked at the lost and desperate little princess with their long, sharp-wooden fingers, the on-the-edge-of-the-seat scariness was excruciatingly pleasurable.

What a relief it was to see those plump, understanding "Disney" woodlands and gentle, large-eyed woodland animals when they came upon the fallen Snow White and whittled her through now-fairly glad to the picture-book cottage, with its high, milky, all-most human faces, topped by soft thatch roofs. Then, of course, there was more suspense — although not as painful as the walk

into the forest with the bearded man with a long knife. Having come through a nightmarish race through the dark woods, now Snow White placed fate by taking a nap in a tomb where she had not yet been made an official guest. And if you are familiar with the march of "The Three Bears," but are not well-informed about the Brothers Grimm plot for Snow White, watching this obviously vulnerable girl go to sleep in a strange place can be a little unsettling; especially after all this particular princess has already endured.

But, of course, Disney had declared that it was not-to-worry time, at least for a while. Let little Snow White settle in with all those funny, dear little men with personality foibles for names. Let her scour their male-messy house with her sorcerer animal trainer's touch (although isn't letting rodents dry plates with their tails a trifle unsanitary?). Let the good times roll with tunes such as "Heigh-Ho" and "Whistle While You Work," and the great dwarf hoodown "Silly Song" accompanied by a pipe organ as intricately carved as a gothic cathedral.

Through all of this, there is time to choose one's favorite little man. Doc's disembowelled sentences are pretty droll, but you really have to admire Grumpy's aloof, scornful stance at all the oooh-and-goohing over the girl with the red bow in her hair. This is one dwarf who really knows how to handle women.

But, of course, back at the castle — with its dark, graceful spires and — subtannan black-magic labs and sinuous rivers — the mirror is making trouble again with its fortune teller's rhyme and that flame-like face. Suddenly, the queen becomes the old crack-voiced crone. The word "witch" does not come up, but the black-cloaked hag is always known as the witch, because when she turns

to the camera for a close-up after her transformation, she possesses the ultimate of witch's features: long, curved pickle nose; huge, mean staring eyes; lots of warts and wrinkles; hardly any teeth in her black, scowling mouth.

As Richard Schickel points out in his dissecting and debunking of the myth of Uncle Walt in "The Disney Version," "Snow White" was a group creation inspired by the special, glorious feeling of "being young in a young field." Crammed into a "jerry-built beehive," as someone called the Disney factory on Hyperion Avenue in Hollywood, 760 animators, assistant animators, breakdown men, in-betweeners, ink-and-paint girls, sequence directors, story adapters, art directors, musicians and voice talents brought forth something that the colors with some invaluable assistance from models such as dancer Marjorie Belcher (later Margo Champion), who mimed Snow White's movements, and comic Eddie Belcher, who counted the faces for Dopey. Led by Walt himself, who was only 36 when "Snow White" made history, the men and women of Disney lifted film animation to a new prominence in the world — an importance in the film business never equaled since the heady days before Disney grew away from his unionized workers.

The joys and pride in their mission felt by the Disney workers, and the unique inspiration provided by a chief who could act out an entire full-length movie yet make shrewd artistic choices about softening the colors with backgrounds, generated a force that set a new, unsurpassable standard for family entertainment. Not even half a century of technological advances — including computer graphics — has come up with a more exciting and persuasive combination of comedy and romance, music and color, tragedy and terror.

James Bond movie makes box office killing

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — James Bond has a license to make a killing at the box office, with "The Living Daylights" earning \$7.7 million for Agent 007's second week in the top spot.

There were four debut movies this week in the Top 10, with "Stakeout" and "Masters of the Universe" faring well. "Back To The Beach" and "Who's That Girl?" less impressive. The new Bond movie stars Timothy Dalton in his first outing as the British superagent. "Daylights" per-screen take slipped about 30 percent from its first weekend out as

Powerful outrage fills 'Full Metal Jacket'

TWIN FALLS — The following are capsule reviews of movies playing in theaters locally. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by the Los Angeles Times reviewers.

FULL METAL JACKET (R). In this film, director Stanley Kubrick brings his rigorous artist's eye to Vietnam to create a powerful and centered statement of outrage. Although its two sections — observing the anti-scientific madness of Peleliu Island and the two-mortal-chance in Vietnam proper — are not perfectly balanced, it is a muscular return to form for the man who made "Dr. Strangelove" and "A Clockwork Orange." And in a superb cast of mostly unknowns, Vincent D'Onofrio and ex-Marine drill instructor Lee Ermey are exceptional. ADVENTURES IN BABY-SITTING (PG-13). A fairly amusing, likeable directorial debut by screenwriter Chris Columbus ("Gremlins," "Young Sherlock Holmes"), whose movie charts the wild, down-and-dirty night of a jilted suburbanite high school baby-sitter and her randy but naive date get and visitors. They all end up in the raunchier streets of Chicago, with gangsters on their heels and cliffhangers on the glass-slab skyscraper. The script is the usual, whip-paced, stereotyped, illogical tangle — a little bit Hughes and a little "After Hours" — but the youthful cast has a lot of personality, freshness and sympathy. And in one blues club scene, defying your qualms, they bring the house down.

DRAGNET (PG-13). It is a shame that decisions were made to interrupt this fond recollection of the old show with slam-bang car-crashes, silly pagan rituals and other Big Movie, high-tech, show-biz. Because there are patches of bright dialogue in the script, by Dan Aykroyd, Alan Zweibel and the movie's director, Tom Mankiewicz. And Aykroyd and Tom Hanka play off each other to great effect. It makes the film seem absolutely schizophrenic.

SUMMER SCHOOL (PG-13). Bouncy but perceptive comedy about an easygoing high school gym teacher (Mark Harmon) waylaid into teaching a remedial English class to a bunch of kids as aimless as he is. Directed by Carl Reiner, the film is full of high spirits, yet has an unexpected undercurrent of seriousness. With Kirstie Alley, Robin Thomas.

SUPERMAN IV: THE QUEST FOR PEACE. The Man of Steel (Christopher Reeve) returns to do battle with the nefarious genius Lex Luthor (Gene Hackman) once

is an Elvis fan "now, but he wasn't when we got married," only celebrates with Elvis.

"We have holidays with Elvis, birthdays with Elvis. I made him a bunny rabbit (cake)-for-Easter, a heart for Valentine's, a lipreacher for St. Patrick's Day."

Robinson might be considered an Elvis addict — she saw him in concert dozens of times between 1966 and 1977, including his last two shows in Cincinnati and Indianapolis, and still has tickets for three shows in the tour he was preparing when he died — but she blends in easily with other fans who pass in and out of his informal "socials," trading "souvenirs" and sentiment.

"That's the way it should be," says a Colorado fan who has overheard Robinson talking about baking Elvis cakes. "The Mile-High fan club had this beautiful cake before they left for Memphis, but they couldn't cut it — nobody could bear it."

Of course, such eager consumers attract eager procurers. Collector Fred Whobrey, an acknowledged master of the marketable memento, has set up an impressive folding-table shop for the Fan Festival at the Elvis Presley Boulevard Howard Johnson's with only a fraction of his stock.

Whobrey says his private collection holds more than 3,000 items "dating back to 1955 when I was 15 — I got started early." His most profitable sale was of a radio promotional record for the March of Dimes made in 1957.

"It came with a script; the deejay read the script, and then (Elvis) answered him back," Whobrey says with a smile. "They were supposed to be destroyed." Whobrey got \$4,000 for that.

His most valuable relic is an olive satin shirt with brass studs and puffed sleeves that Elvis wore for one of his later Las Vegas shows. Estimated value \$5,000, but "it's not for sale," Whobrey insists.

These fans are out to take Elvis home with them, but there are hundreds of others, from 'n town and out, who buy mementos for Elvis.

"And even the stupid movies like 'In Las Vegas' have still got a vibe. Isn't it crazy? Nobody else but Elvis could have pulled something like that off."

"I must say he is not a figure I reckoned with much. I knew boys who were very affected by (his death) and because they were affected by it I was affected by it, but I wasn't affected by him directly. "Mostly I was struck by how much different — physically — he seemed from what he was when he started out and what he was like at the end. It seemed like it was a shame but I never went any deeper than that. There wasn't an emotional connection for me."

—Roger Waters, founder of Pink Floyd and now solo artist. His latest album is "Radio K.A.O.S."

"I thought, particularly the early records, were wonderful."

"But (in Presley) I also saw a man who was incapable of handling his own success, which is by no means a strange phenomenon. It reminds me of the Carl Jung quote where

Jung talks about a friend of his and he more or less said he was sad to hear that his friend had suffered an enormous success, because an enormous success more often than not is a destructive influence on your life. You don't learn very much from success.

"I don't think (Presley's) death was particularly a lesson for others. I think people go, 'Well, the guy couldn't handle it and he started taking drugs, and drinking and doing all those things people do when faced with a stressful situation and when they don't have the courage to face up to it.' — So personally, I don't think his death is very important.

"He was obviously completely out of control for many years. All those awful films he made and all those rerecorded. He was clearly seduced by his own idology and he ceased to make much sense. He was a victim of his own legend. It happens to a lot of people in the music industry. They believe in their duty that is thrust upon them by their adoring fans. If you can't hang on to the fact that you're just an ordinary person like everyone else, then you're in big trouble."

arrives in a tuxedo rather than in cut-offs and a workshirt. Gertchen's advice is to "hold the wine up to a white surface and look at the physical characteristics of it." Look at the color, see if the wine is cloudy or if it has particles in it or if it is thin on the edge. These visual cues help determine the quality of the wine.

Second, the smell or "nose of the wine" must be examined. Wine ex-

ports sniff; for two distinct characteristics: aroma and bouquet. The aroma, Gertchen says, "is the smell of the grape, the fruit itself." The bouquet is what people argue over as it refers to more subtle smells nestled in the wine. Hundreds of adjectives are commonly used to describe both desirable and undesirable wine characteristics. Wines have bouquets ranging from petroleum to strawberries. A good riesling, for instance, has a bouquet

of apricots and honey.

Third, and most critical in the wine judging process, comes the taste of the wine, or, as Gertchen puts it, "what your tongue can tell you." To begin, take a sip. Then purse your lips, draw in some air, swirl the wine around and swallow it," he says. Ask your tongue about the amount of acidity and sugar in the wine and the harmony between them. "When you drink wine, look for the harmony of the wine, the mix of tastes," says Gertchen. Finally, ask how the wine "finishes." Does the taste finish quickly or linger in your mouth? Does the wine leave an aftertaste or finish in an harmonious manner?

Gertchen also says that the mechanics of wine tasting can be as important as senses described above. "It's literally impossible," he says, "to taste all the wines. Your palate gets fatigued, your tongue gets too beat up and you can get drunk."

To avoid the knock-out, Gertchen says that it is permissible to spit out the wine after you've tasted it around in your mouth. It is also a good idea to eat something small in between tastes to restore your palate and to "keep you from getting loaded."

An additional way to avoid palate fatigue is to taste wines in a prescribed order, saving the tongue bashing wines for last. Gertchen recommends tasting wines in this order: 1) champagnes, 2) sauvignon blancs, 3) chardonnays, 4) rieslings, 5) roses, 6) pinot noirs, 7) cabernet sauvignons, 8) heavy reds, 9) dessert wines.

Gertchen also recommends keeping a pen and paper handy to score the different wines or, at least, to remember the ones you liked. "Most people don't remember the wine they had three nights ago," he says. And if you don't remember, it's back to trial and error, again.

# Beck uses southern roots to play Texas cop on 'Houston Knights'

When Michael Beck was first invited to star in "Houston Knights," he turned down the opportunity. Ironically, it was a role for which he felt he was too well suited.

The CBS series, which airs Tuesdays, would feature him as Levon Lundy, a purebred Texan with unabashed pride in the Lone Star lifestyle. But Beck, an Arkansas native, had already played Texans in the miniseries "Celebrity" (1984) and the CBS movie "Gone to Texas" — Sam Houston and the Texas Revolution (1986) and was wary of being typecast.

Beck reconsidered, though. "I'm glad I took the role," he says now. "Coming from that part of the country, I understand what Lundy is like."

The series, set in Houston, pairs undercover policemen who have radically different styles and attitudes. Lundy's partner is Joey La Flamma (Michael Pare), a big-city police officer who has been transferred from his native Chicago.

"There are certain similarities between me and Lundy," Beck admits. "He grew up on a ranch; I grew up on a farm. He played college football; I played college football."

It was while attending college on a football scholarship that Beck began to act in school plays. He began acting in earnest after graduation, when he moved to London, to study and perform — and to drop his Southern accent.

Now, he uses that accent on "Houston Knights." "People who watch the show think I really talk that way," he says. "They meet me and they say, 'You don't sound like him?' Of course I don't — it's a role I'm playing."

So far, the heart of the show has been the conflict between Lundy and La Flamma, who seem to detest each other. But Beck says that upcoming episodes will soften their relationship.

"There was a general feeling that the relationship was too abrasive and that eventually it would become wearying on the viewers," he says. "There'll be more moments of vulnerability. Instead of being nasty we'll be just sarcastic."

"It's a subtle change, though," he adds. "The characters will never become buddies. We'll still be at

each other's throats."

Despite its title, the series is filmed mainly in Hollywood, with the cast and crew traveling to Houston every three weeks to film exteriors and location sequences.

"For some scenes, it just doesn't make any difference where you are," Beck says. "Say you're filming the exterior of a mansion. Well, a mansion is a mansion. A mansion in

Pasadena looks just like a mansion in Houston."

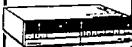

**Q.** We enjoyed Gwen Verdon's performance as a beautician buddy of Kim Basinger in the new movie comedy "Nadine." According to a newspaper blurb, Gwen's a native Californian whose father worked as an electrician at MGM Studios, yet she began her career in a lead role in the Broadway musical "Can Can." Why didn't she take an early stab at the movies? — J.R.

**A.** She did. Those "facts" in that item were culled from a studio biography loaded with such errors. Truth is, before making it big on Broadway, Gwen knocked around Hollywood for years as a chorus girl and in various bit parts. She became a protegee of Danny Kaye, and briefly appeared in his movie "On the Riviera," with little recognition, as well as in such movies as "David and Bathsheba," "The Merry Widow," "Mississippi Gambler," "Meet Me After the Show" and "The Farmer Takes a Wife" (the last two with Betty Grable). Gwen's Broadway debut, by the way, was not in "Can Can," but in the earlier "Alive and Kicking," a revue. It was only much later in her career that she went back to Hollywood to star in movies like "Damn Yankees" and the recent "Cocoon."

**Q.** I've just seen the new James Bond film, "The Living Daylights," and I think that even after 25 years and 15 movies 007 isn't getting older, he's getting better. But I'd still love to know how they do some of those spectacular stunts? — B.W.

**A.** Glad you asked that. Coincidentally with the release of "The Living Daylights," starring Timothy Dalton in his debut as the world's most visible secret agent, there's a fascinating book just out by Bob Simmons, "Nobody Does It Better" (named after the theme song of a previous 007 epic), that gives all the

inside dope on Simmons' adventures arranging and performing as stuntman, stand-in and stunt coordinator on all the Bond pics from "Dr. No" to "A View to a Kill."

**Q.** John Gielgud, the distinguished British actor, at times comes through as a bit aloof in his screen portrayals. Is he the same away from the camera? — D.W.

**A.** The 83-year-old Sir John Gielgud is known to fellow actors as one of the most civilized and thoughtful stars around, and this anecdote should allay any doubts about his kindness. Some years ago, while emoting in a Broadway drama, Gielgud noticed a member of the backstage crew accidentally wander into view on the stage set. Realizing his gaffe, the poor chap stood there, dumbfounded, staring at the star and the audience in terror. When several theatergoers began to utter, Gielgud quickly took command of the situation by giving a courteous little bow toward the stagehand, waiting till the fellow regained his composure and hurried off stage. Only then did the great actor return to his scene. Many a lesser actor might have raised an eyebrow, gotten a laugh, and later chewed out the stagehand after the performance; the gentlemanly Gielgud uttered nary a word.

**A.** News travels fast. Paula Ciccone, who looks a lot like her beautiful sister, has signed with a modeling agency so we'll probably all be seeing her soon.

# 'Night Heat' goes to Prime-Time

NEW YORK — The late night series "Night Heat" has yet to see the light of day, but beginning this week CBS gives it a six-week run a little earlier in the evening, along with its late-night colleague, "Adderly."

"Night Heat," a film-noir cop show set on the dusk-to-dawn shift, was the first of CBS' original late night series. It started in January 1985.

Appearing Tuesdays, "Night Heat" airs at 9 p.m. "Adderly," a tongue-in-cheek spy thriller, will run six weeks at 9 p.m. Fridays.

Larry Jacobsen, executive producer of "Night Heat," appreciates the opportunity to visit prime time, but wouldn't want to live there.

"When we started out the thing, it was almost a 'Naked City'-type show brought up to date," Jacobsen said. "If we had gone the prime-time route, it never would have gone on the air. That kind of thing doesn't work in prime time. It isn't slick enough."

Jacobsen says prime-time viewers will sample his show in all its late, gritty glory. He said the producers even rejected the idea of shooting the prime-time episodes on slicker-35mm film instead of the 16mm they usually use to give the show a "semi-documentary" look.

There will be a couple of "name" guest stars, however, like Jason Miller and David Carradine.

CBS "didn't want us to change the show. They said if it didn't work the way it was, we wouldn't want to put it in prime time," Jacobsen said.

"Everybody said, maybe it'll work well, maybe it'll go in prime time. I would just as soon leave it where it is."

Jacobsen is co-executive producer of the show with Sonny Grosso, an ex-New York cop best known as Eddie Egan's partner in the real-life "French Connection" bust.

"Night Heat" is shot in Toronto on a modest budget — barely more than \$500,000 an episode. Jacobsen said it would likely cost more than \$1 million an episode if produced in the United States.

The show is shot almost entirely at night partly for budgetary reasons — it's easier to close a city street, for instance, when there's no traffic — but also because that's the feel the producers want.

"Since it was on late night, we wanted to make it look almost like it was happening while you were watching it," Jacobsen said. Plus the later hour allows them to get away with slightly more adult dialogue and stories.

"There's very little pressure," he said. "The language, you're allowed a little tougher language in late night, you can go a little further into issues and stuff."

The show stars Scott Hylands as detective Kevin O'Brien, kind of an Irish Frank Furillo. Jeff Wincott

plays O'Brien's younger partner, Frank Giambone. Allan Royal plays crime reporter Tom Kirkwood, the narrator. From Kirkwood's fictional newspaper column "Night Heat" comes the show's title.

The actors are Canadian, although they were working in the United States when they were cast.

Jacobsen notes proudly that "Night Heat" has never had a car chase in 66 episodes — again, partially a function of the low budget, but also because the style of the show is embodied in crisp, spare dialogue, not overdirected action sequences.

## Young has way with the animals

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Alan Young can't seem to get away from animals, whether it's a talking horse named "Mr. Ed" or a cantankerous quacker named "Scrooge McDuck."

"I've been involved with lions and mice and horses and a duck, and they all talked," he said.

It started in the early 1950s when Young was a hot young actor newly arrived from Canada and New York with a hit TV show. Billionaire Howard Hughes saw him one night and signed him for "Androcles and the Lion."

George Bernard Shaw's fable didn't do well at the box office when it was released as a comedy. Hughes recalled it, filmed new scenes for two weeks and re-released it as a drama.

"He put in girls with gauze and a real lion, and it became a blood and guts film," said Young.

"Mr. Ed," the comedy that ran on CBS from 1961 to 1965, was his most famous association with an animal. He played Wilbur Post, a young architect who owned a horse whose talent for talking, and a loose lip, kept Wilbur in hot water.

Someone else supplied Mr. Ed's voice. Then Young found his own voice.

"A friend of mine was doing 'The Flintstones,'" he said. "I was writing some children's stories at the time, and he asked me to come down and do some things. I wrote some humorous Bible stories, and we put them on audio cassettes. We tied up with some puppeteers, and religious groups could put them on."

By that time he was in the voice business and worked on such movies as "Black Beauty" and "Through the Looking Glass."

He recently completed 65 episodes as the voice of "Scrooge McDuck" for Walt Disney Studios' new animated series "DUCKTALES." It will be syndicated this fall.

—He's also done voices for "The Smurfs," "Mickey's Christmas Carol," "The Great Mouse Detective," "Mr. T," "The Chipmunks" and many others. In recent years, he's made acting appearances on "The Love Boat" and "Murder, She Wrote."

Many of the stories for "DUCKTALES" came from the "Scrooge McDuck" comic books, said Young, who was presented a three-volume collection by a fan when he was in San Francisco recently to do a commercial.

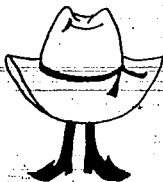

# Thomerson and Mike are top dogs in 'Down and Out in Beverly Hills'

NEW YORK — If Jerry, the Zen-spouting bum from "Down and Out in Beverly Hills," were cast in an lily situation comedy on a new network, he'd take the same go-with-the-flow attitude Tim Thomerson does.

"You know, it's all a crap shoot. It's Hollywood and it's another half-hour situation comedy," Thomerson said. "You can't take it real serious."

In Fox's sitcom version of the hit movie, Thomerson has the Nick Nolte role of Jerry. He was in New York recently for a guest appearance on "Late Night with David Letterman."

Thomerson, a stand-up comic and character actor, comes by the laid-back, surfer-dude style naturally. He's a '60s refugee and "Navy brat" from San Diego who got his first acting experience in Army training films. Eventually he worked his way to performing standup comedy in places like Gil Hodges' Grand-Slam Room, a Brooklyn bowling alley.

Now he's a veteran of series television from numerous guest-starring stints and a part in the ensemble cast of ABC's critically praised but short-lived law-firm comedy "The Associates."

"Down and Out" will appear on Saturdays in the fall, completing Fox's schedule for that evening.

Thomerson was being especially philosophical due to the difficulties of cast changes and shaky direction that delayed the debut of the show. The producers are using a later, smoother episode for the premiere.

"It's difficult to come up with good stuff every week," Thomerson said. "But I think you can come with good stuff about people studies — you know, what people do and what they go through in life — and still make it funny with some little pathos to pull it off."

The plot line is a staple of comedy, the stranger in a strange land. The show is strictly tired, garden-variety sitcom fare. The characters have potential, but the writing needs sprucing up. The second episode is lame.

As in the movie, Jerry is taken in by the Whitemans, a wealthy Beverly Hills couple, after he tries to commit suicide by leaping into their swimming pool. This is accomplished

over the credits so Jerry can get on with wandering around the mansion commenting on everybody's psycho-social problems, like a benevolent "ALF."

The TV show, like the movie, gives credit to the Rene Fauchois play "Boudou Sauve Des Eaux" ("Boudou Saved From Drowning"), and a French film, "Breathless," inspires the first episode.

Michael Shaner gets a meaty guest-starring role as Turk Black, a nervous hood with Elvis-impersonator tendencies, brought home from Reno by daughter Jenny (Eileen Seeley) in a warped bid for attention.

Turk comments on dinner: "My mom used to make something like this — until she lost the use of her arms."

Hector Elizondo, a well-known character actor, and Anita Morris, a Tony winner for "Nine," play the Whitemans, roles played in the movie by Richard Dreyfuss and Bette Midler.

Evan Richards reprises his role from the movie as the Whitemans overprivileged, and disturbed teen-

age son, Max.

The producers also got Mike the Dog to re-create his movie role as Matisse for the TV version.

Mike, a black and white border collie-mix, is the supposedly neurotic pooch who is really smarter than everybody else in the wacky household. He easily steals the lightweight sitcom from the humans, handling any material with aplomb, even when playing straight man, er, dog.

In the first episode, Max is trying to sneak out of the house, but Mike won't let him.

Max: "You remember when I took that thorn out of your paw?"

Mike: "Ruff! Ruff!"

Max: "OK, I put it there."

"Mike the Dog is unbelievable," Thomerson said. "This animal actually deals in concepts. He can really put two and three things together."

Thomerson is first runner-up to Mike as scene stealer — and Thomerson gets better lines. He wanders into a room just after Max and Jenny have been having an argument — "Ooh, bad vibes. Sort of like an 'Ishtar' investors meeting."

# Ad agency sees only three fall hits

LOS ANGELES — The three major television networks are throwing 22 new series at viewers this fall, but a leading advertising agency predicts only three will be hits.

Two NBC comedies, "My Two Dads" and "A Different World," and ABC's "Hooperman" were top-rated in the survey by Saatchi & Saatchi DFS-Compton of New York. The agency, the nation's third largest, ranked the shows on a scale of 1 to 10 in analyzing the new season for clients who want to buy commercial time.

Three other shows, ABC's "Slap Maxwell," CBS' "Frank's Place" and NBC's "Private Eye," were given a "very good" shot at staying on the air.

Two fantasy-adventure shows, ABC's "Once a Hero" and CBS' "Beauty and the Beast," were listed as long shots with little chance for success.

The ad agency said it was clear that the 1987-88 season would be a transitional one for the networks.

Although comedy will continue as the dominant programming form, the shows will feature more male leading characters and more non-traditional family units. Dramas, especially police-detective shows, have increased, while the number of hours for movies has gone down. In addition, ABC has Dolly Parton in the first network variety show since 1982. The wild card in this season's shuffle is the push-button Peoplemeter being introduced by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

The networks have resisted the Peoplemeter, which allows members of a Nielsen family to individually record their viewing. The meter is

linked to a computer, eliminating the need for passive set meters and diaries.

Results from the Peoplemeter generally indicate lower ratings for the networks and tend to favor programs for younger, more urban and male audiences. The networks have argued that older and less sophisticated viewers would tend not to use the meters.

The S&S DFSC ratings were based on such factors as quality, audience appeal, time slot, and competition. The agency report was prepared by Betsy Frank and Debbie Myers.

The three shows forecast as hits are:

— "My Two Dads," an NBC comedy about a 12-year-old orphan girl placed in custody of two young men her mother had known in college. Stars Paul Reiser, Greg Evigan and Stacie Keenan. Slotted behind "Family Ties" at 8:30 p.m. Sunday.

— "A Different World," NBC, a spinoff from "The Cosby Show" that takes Lisa Bonet to college. It follows Cosby at 8:30 p.m. Thursday.

— "Hooperman," ABC, brings "Three's Company" star John Ritter back as a San Francisco police officer who inherits an apartment house in a comedy-drama created by Steven Bochco and Terry Louise Fisher of "L.A. Law." Its Wednesday competition are CBS' "Magnum, P.I." and a new NBC drama, "A Year in the Life."

Three shows rated "very good" with an 8 were:

— "Slap Maxwell," ABC, a comedy about a short-tempered, arrogant and opinionated sports writer, which reunites Dabney Coleman and writer-producer Jay Tarses of "Buffalo Bill." Follows "Hooperman" on Wednesday.

— "Frank's Place," CBS, Tim

Reid is a rather stiff professor from Massachusetts who inherits a Creole restaurant in New Orleans. Hugh Wilson ("WKRP in Cincinnati") is the creator. Opens Saturday night for CBS.

— "Private Eye," a 1950s detective drama from the creator of "Miami Vice," Tony Yerkovich. Michael Woods is the private eye and Josh Brodin is his rock 'n' roll partner. Up against ABC's "20-20" and CBS' "Falcon Crest" at 10 p.m. Friday.

The agency predicts ABC will inch ahead of CBS and move into second place behind frontrunner NBC.

Two series that rate only a 1 are ABC's "Once a Hero," a fantasy in which a comic book superhero and his private eye sidekick move into the real world and lose all their super powers, and CBS' "Beauty and the Beast," in which a man-beast who lives beneath New York City forms an attachment to a beautiful lawyer and becomes her protector.

One of the most unlikely shows on the schedule is CBS' "Tour of Duty," a drama that in the manner of the Oscar-winning film "Platoon" follows a group of Army recruits to Vietnam in 1967. It's a grunt's-eye view of the war and the pilot was superbly done. Nevertheless, it's up against "The Cosby Show" and the agency rates it as a "long shot" with a 2.

The new season also sees the return of some old faces. Besides Ritter and Reid, William Conrad (CBS' "Jake and the Fatman"), Dale Robertson (NBC's "J.J. Starbuck") and Dennis Weaver (ABC's "Buck James") will be back.

Some new faces to television are Ann Jackson in CBS' "Everything's a Relative," Jerry Orbach in CBS' "The Law and Harry McGraw" (a spinoff from "Murder, She Wrote"), Paul Sorvino in CBS' "Oldest Rookie," Richard Kiley in NBC's "A Year in the Life" and Dolly Parton in ABC's "The Dolly Show."

## Fairness ruling to affect TV stations

LOS ANGELES (L.A. Times) — The Federal Communications Commission's decision last week to abolish radio and television's 38-year-old fairness doctrine has not necessarily killed the controversial rule.

Rather, the Ronald Reagan-appointed panel's 4-0 vote appears to have thrown a gauntlet at the steps of a Democrat-controlled Congress that wants to make the fairness doctrine the law of the land.

Before last Tuesday's FCC vote, Congress had, figuratively, warned the regulatory agency to keep its hands off the policy that required radio and TV stations to cover con-

troversial issues of public importance and to provide reasonable opportunities for all sides to air their views.

Instead, the FCC took its cue from U.S. Supreme Court nominee Robert H. Bork, who 11 months ago wrote a 2-1 decision for the U.S. Court of Appeals declaring that the fairness doctrine was not law and could be abolished by the commission without congressional action. The case was brought by a Syracuse, N.Y., TV station that, the FCC said, had violated the fairness doctrine by not balancing paid pro-nuclear power advertisements with anti-nuclear messages.
