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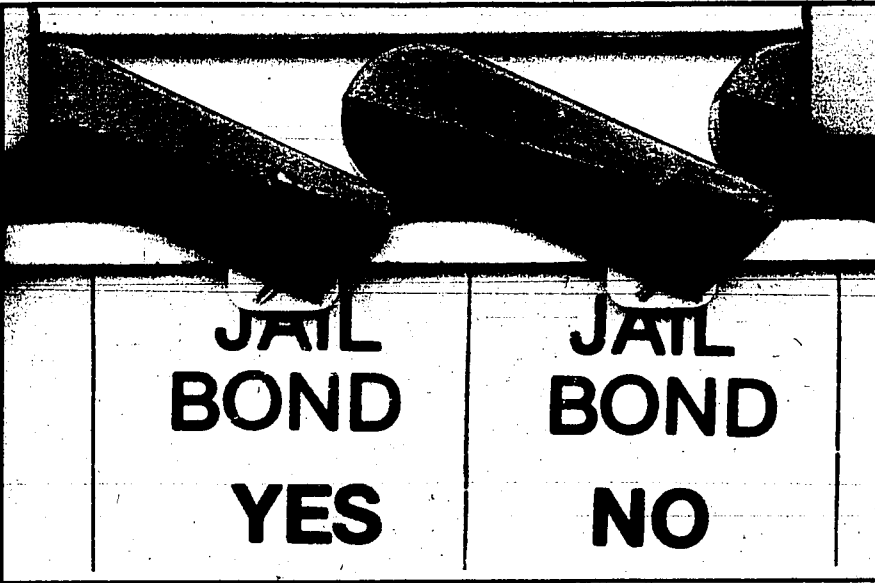

Funds set for new voting machines

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls County Board of Commissioners propose setting aside \$50,000 toward the purchase of new voting machines because they think voters don't trust the old ones.

"Individually, we have confidence in them. But we feel the public doesn't," Board Chairman Judy Felton said.

Commissioner Marvin Hempleman added, "I think it's a piece of machinery nobody trusts. I trust it. It's accurate."

Commissioner Jim Fraley said, "A lot of people don't think they work. They really work well. But they are getting pretty old."

"For years, the Secretary of State's Office has been suggesting" the county replace its lever voting machines, Hempleman said.

"They (the Secretary of State's Office) have not told us to get rid of them. But we have suggested that maybe we get something less controversial," he added. "The state has never really putted us on the head for them."

Deputy Secretary of State Ben Yursa said he had never talked to

the commissioners about replacing the machines, which were purchased in 1970.

He is concerned, however, about the age of the machines and commends the commissioners for "thinking ahead."

"From our viewpoint, any upgrade of a system would be welcome, not so much in Twin Falls County, but in any county where machines have aged," Yursa said. "They (the lever machines) are frankly a dying breed."

Election officer and County Clerk Dick Pence's only comment about the proposed change in voting ma-

chines, was that it was the commissioners' right to purchase new machines.

"I assume they (new machines) would be all right," he said.

Twin Falls County is the only one among the state's 44 counties to use the lever voting machines. Yursa said 18 counties use punch cards to record votes, which are counted on a computer or counting machines, and 26 counties use paper ballots counted by hand.

"The lever machine has proven to be efficient. The problem is they start getting obsolete and wear out" See VOTE on Page A2

Iran admits sowing mines along coasts

MANAMA, Bahrain — Iran on Thursday night admitted to sowing mines "to defend our coastlines" in the Persian Gulf, where a third convoy of refueled Kuwaiti tankers and U.S. warships was halted temporarily by wind-whipped sand.

Iran, in a Tehran Radio dispatch monitored in London, said it had been justified in placing the mines by the stepped-up U.S. military presence in the region.

It was the first time Iran acknowledged planting the mines that the Pentagon says have damaged commercial shipping from the gulf's northern reaches near Kuwait to an anchorage outside its mouth.

Iran is capable of clearing of the mines, but cannot agree to the presence of foreign fleets in the region, Tehran Radio quoted Kamal Kharrazi, the supervisor of Iran's warship publicity headquarters, as saying.

Iran is using mines to defend its coastlines, not to threaten the security of shipping in the gulf, the radio said Kharrazi told a news conference Thursday night.

"Given the present situation, the fundamental question today is why the United States does not leave the region," he was quoted as saying in the broadcast.

On Wednesday, Iranian commandos firing from a motorized dinghy

attacked the Bribri, a Yugoslav freighter, shipping sources said. No injuries were reported.

Shipping sources said Iranians challenged the Bribri, opened fire, then boarded and searched the vessel before allowing it to proceed. The ship later docked at Abu Dhabi with a small hole in its metal hull, they said.

Kharrazi said such actions as the mining of United Arab Emirates coastal waters and this week's Iranian commando attacks on the Yugoslav ship were "in line with justifications provided by the United States for its presence in the region," Tehran Radio reported.

An American-operated supertanker carrying Iranian oil was damaged by a mine Aug. 11 in an anchorage just outside the gulf and off the United Arab Emirates port of Fujairah in the Gulf of Oman.

"We are stressing that Iran is making efforts to use its fleet and clear mines in international waters and that by using mines Iran is not refusing security to shipping in the gulf. Rather, we are trying to use our maritime capabilities to defend our coastlines," Kharrazi was quoted as saying.

Earlier Thursday, Iran declared the Gulf of Oman and the Strait of Hormuz, which separates it from the Persian Gulf, free of mines. Tehran said the Iranian navy had de-

U.S. rejects Iranian hostage release deal

WASHINGTON — The State Department Thursday rejected a deal proffered by the speaker of Iran's parliament for the release of eight American hostages in Lebanon while a senior U.S. official said there was "nothing new" in the offer.

"It looks like an effort to downplay Iran's role in terrorism," the official told The Associated Press. He called Speaker Hashemi Rafsanjani's claim that Iran does not practice terrorism against innocent people "nonsense" and "sort of outrageous."

Rafsanjani said in an interview on NBC's "Today" show that foreign hostages held in Lebanon might be released if the United States exerts pressure on Israel and Kuwait to release Shiite Moslem prisoners.

He said Iran did not condone hostage-taking and would like to help arrange a swap that would free the eight Americans.

State Department spokesman Phyllis Oakley said "our response to Mr. Rafsanjani is 'no deals. No pressure on Israel to release prisoners. No pressure on Kuwait to release prisoners.'"

She said U.S. policy rules out making concessions to terrorists or asking other countries to do so. "Making concessions only encourages additional acts of terrorism," Mrs. Oakley said.

But the spokeswoman seized on Rafsanjani's remarks as evidence Iran has "a grain of sincerity" over the hostages' captors.

"Iran should use this influence to secure the immediate and unconditional release of the hostages held in Lebanon, all of whom are innocent victims of terrorism," she said. "U.S. terrorism experts were already convinced the eight Americans and a ninth, Charles Glick, who gained his freedom on Tuesday, were held by pro-Iranian elements in Beirut under Tehran's influence."

But Mrs. Oakley said "I don't think you should read the term 'influence' to mean 'control.' We are not talking about that."

Later, a senior U.S. official told The Associated Press that "it is our intelligence view" that elements of the "Fedayeen" Hezbollah group hold the eight Americans and probably most of the 15 other Western captives.

"You have a consensus view in the administration that Iran has substantial influence over these people," the official said.

However, he said, Rafsanjani's offer was not new or a sign of Iranian moderation. "On the contrary," the official said. "By reiterating the same old demands that 'the only way to use his influence is for us to do things we are not going to do, it suggests the same old thing.'"

Jet lag or amnesia the choice

CHICAGO — Long-distance air travelers who use a new drug and a drink to bring on a nap may avoid jet lag but wind-up with transient amnesia, an episode of memory loss and confusion lasting several hours, researchers say.

"We can't say to what degree the three components — the drug, drinking and travel — interact," said Harold Morris III, a neurologist and co-author of the report.

"But what this suggests is that if you're planning to go to Europe and they offer free champagne on the flight, and you're taking a drug for jet lag, don't plan on negotiating a peace treaty or conducting any other important business."

The drug, triazolam, is a form of benzodiazepine, a class of hypnotic agents prescribed by doctors to help induce sleep in people battling insomnia.

Morris said air travelers increasingly have been using the drug to get to sleep quickly on long-distance flights "and get a jump on the next day's business."

What resulted instead in three cases reported in

Friday's Journal of the American Medical Association were episodes of transient global amnesia.

Each case involved a neurologist traveling from New York to Europe to attend a scientific meeting, said Morris, who reported the cases with Dr. Melinda Ester, a colleague at The Cleveland Clinic.

None of the three had consumed enough alcohol to be intoxicated, he said.

"In each, people accompanying the amnesiacs noticed nothing abnormal," Morris said in a telephone interview Thursday. "In fact, it was remarkable because they carried out some very complicated dealings — changing currency, finding their way around foreign cities and the like."

"As it turned out, though, they couldn't recall the activities the next day, as though the memory were a tape recorder and someone cut that segment of tape right out," he said.

"These were unusually well-observed instances because the people happened to be in the company of other neuroscientists," Morris said.

Use of benzodiazepine has been known to cause brief episodes of amnesia, but usually in older people, he said.

Witness says flaps set right

ROMULUS, Mich. — A co-pilot who saw the takeoff of Northwest Airlines Flight 255 said the wing flaps were extended for takeoff, contradicting earlier reports they were in the wrong position before a crash that killed up to 158 people, officials said Thursday.

Officials here said that preliminary findings from flight recorder data indicated that the flaps were not in the proper position.

The witness, a co-pilot of another Northwest flight, was one of four pilots who saw the takeoff of the McDonnell-Douglas MD-80 that crashed Sunday shortly after takeoff from Detroit Metropolitan Airport, said John Lauber, a National Transportation Safety Board member.

"He (the co-pilot) noticed that the flaps and slats were down. They were in the extended position. This is his report of what he saw," Lauber said, noting that all four pilots saw the takeoff.

"The other three pilots did not notice anything that looked unusual, which would include flaps set for the wrong position, Lauber said at a news conference.

Lauber cautioned that investigators were still uncertain whether the flaps and slats, which are critical to the lift of the aircraft, were in their correct positions for takeoff.

Earlier Thursday, Lauber said the crew of the aircraft would have aborted their takeoff had a critical warning system alerted them that the aircraft's flaps were in the wrong position.

Coastal regions' growth leave heartland behind

WASHINGTON — Reversing a 50-year trend, regions of the United States have been growing apart economically in this decade as income growth in booming coastal states outstripped the rest of the country, the government said Thursday.

The Commerce Department said that from 1928 until 1978 the differences in individual incomes in different geographic areas had been narrowing. However, since 1978, these differences have widened dramatically, it said.

"States dependent on farming, energy production and traditional smokestack industries have lagged behind the income growth in areas such as New England — and

California, which are enjoying fast growth in service and high-technology industries."

The new report supports findings of a study last year by the Democratic staff of the Joint Economic Committee of Congress. Titled "The Bi-Coastal Economy," that report said the nation was being divided between healthy economies on both coasts and a problem-plagued heartland.

The JEC study said economic growth during the Reagan administration had been concentrated in California and 16 states lining the Atlantic Coast. By contrast, many of the other states had been held back by their dependence on agriculture, oil and declining smokestack industries.

The new study by the Commerce Department's Bureau of Economic Analysis generally agreed with those findings.

"We are seeing a falloff in the industrial, agricultural and mineral heartland of the country while services, defense and high-tech industries have prospered," said Rudolph DiPass, a Commerce Department analyst who prepared the new report.

In 1979, the nationwide average income for every man, woman and child was \$9,068. Only one region of the country was more than 5 percent below the national average. The Southeast, traditionally the poorest section of the nation, had a per capita income of \$7,678 that

year, 16 percent below the national average.

"By 1986, the differences had widened. Three regions, the Southeast, Rocky Mountains and Southwest, had per capita incomes 10 percent or more below the national average."

"The Great Lakes states of Illinois, Michigan, Ohio, Wisconsin and Indiana, a region with a heavy concentration of smokestack industries, fell below the national income average for the first time in record."

In 1979, the region with the highest income was the Far West, with a per capita of \$10,321, 14 percent above the national average, followed by the Mid-Atlantic states, where incomes were 6 percent

above the national average, and New England and the Great Lakes, tied with incomes 4 percent above the national average.

In 1979, the Plains states had incomes 1 percent below the national average followed by the Rocky Mountain states, with incomes 4 percent below and the Southwest, with incomes 5 percent below the national average, and the Southeast, 15 percent lower than the national average.

The differences in incomes between the wealthiest and the poorest sections of the country in 1979 were the smallest they had been since the government began keeping income statistics in 1929.

In 1929, the Mid-Atlantic region

Shultz opposed aid bid to S. Africa

WASHINGTON (AP) — A State Department spokesman said Thursday that Secretary of State George P. Shultz opposed the idea of encouraging South African aid to the organization known as the Contras.

However, the spokesman, Phyllis Oakley, stopped short of contradicting a CIA cable asserting Shultz approval of an unspecified South African "initiative."

She said, in a classified chronology released last month by the congressional committees investigating the Iran-Contra affair "clearly

shows the secretary's opposition in April of 1984 to the idea of going to other countries for assistance to the Contras."

Mrs. Oakley's comments were designed to clear up what she termed "any misunderstanding that may have been created" by a New York Times report that planning for South African aid to the Contras was said to have been approved by administration officials including Shultz.

"This report is false," Mrs. Oakley said.

Meanwhile, in Santa Barbara, Calif., where President Reagan is vacationing, White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater was asked whether Reagan had been aware of any efforts to solicit money from South Africa.

"I don't know," he replied. "I saw that story, but we don't know anything about it."

Asked whether Reagan believes it would be appropriate for South Africa to help finance the Contras, Fitzwater said, "I don't have any idea."

like anything else," he said. "Confidence in a system is certainly crucial for local officials."

Yeursa added that the lever machines do provide quick results compared to other counting methods using computers to count the votes.

Former County Commissioner Bill Chancy said the county paid \$182,000 in 1970 for 95 voting machines.

"That was the best buy at the time," he said.

Over the years, more machines were purchased. Now the county has over 100 voting machines.

In the proposed 1988 county budget, the commissioners have sought an allotment of \$60,000 in the capital-outlay budget for new machines, Hempleman said. Felton said the cost of new machines is prohibitive at this time, but they are not rejecting any reasonable proposals. She found new systems to cost upwards of \$100,000.

Representatives from the Business Records Corp., with offices in California and Ohio, contacted Twin Falls County about a new optical voting system, Yeursa said. But the system has yet to be certified by the state as required by law.

Ironically, past complaints about county elections don't focus on the machine voting system, Yeursa said. The people running them do.

Last fall Pence was asked by the Secretary of State to stop opening absentee ballots before election day. Pence said he had allowed the opening of the ballots in order to record absentee votes. Opening the ballots on election day would have taken up a lot of time.

Earlier this month Pence received directives from the Secretary of State to accept the practice of open absentee ballots, Yeursa said.

"Pence welcomed them," Yeursa said.

During a recount of votes several years ago, the Secretary of State's Office found problems with voting machines in Bonneville, Blainock and Bingham Counties. The problems were discussed with county officials and by the next elections, they made changes, he said.

"The decision was theirs," Yeursa said.

His office prides itself on keeping in contact with county clerks and discussing problems reported to them by disgruntled voters, he said. And, there are many complaints from all over the state during elections. In fact if his office didn't receive any, he'd think something was wrong, he said.

While lever voting machines are on their way out, Yeursa said the new wave is a totally electronic system where votes are recorded right into the machines that will count them. The Secretary of State is not totally comfortable with the new trend because of lack of physical cards or records. He also questions whether the Idaho law would allow such systems.

Yeursa warned, "a new system will not remove all the complaints. Public perception is a battle anytime you switch system. Even when you switch you still get complaints."

Chancy still had confidence in the machine he helped buy years ago and didn't think they should be replaced.

"They are doing the job. It's just another way to spend money."

Cassia County was one of the first counties to use punch-card for voting more than 10 years ago, Clark Frank Kearns said.

"Everybody seems to be pleased, with them. At least they have not been vocal about it," he said.

Divers retrieve Titanic's treasure

PARIS (AP) — Divers used their minibus off mechanical arms to retrieve a value that had concealed its treasure of jewels, coins and currency on the ocean floor since the Titanic sank in 1912, a salvage expedition said Thursday.

Since the operation began July 23, divers also have brought up a small safe believed to be the assistant purser's strongbox, 160 dishes, bottles, silver, pieces of furniture, a propeller and three art objects that include a chandelier, according to the first inventory released by the French Institute for Research and Exploitation of the Sea.

Weather permitting, salvaging is to continue until Sept. 10.

Marine salvage experts said it was nearly impossible to say how much the finds are worth, and expedition organizers have said nothing will be sold.

"Trying to determine the value of these artifacts can be a very deep and muddy puddle indeed," said Tom Rose, a marine expert in London.

No name was on the valise, but its style resembles that of physicians' bags of the day, said Robert Chappaz, the expedition spokesman.

He said in a statement released in Paris before dawn Thursday that the valise was not in good condition but its discovery indicated some organic objects remained intact.

It was found by chance during a routine survey of the stern section. The great White Star liner, which was called unsinkable, settled at the site after striking an iceberg and sinking on its maiden voyage from Southampton to New York on the night of April 14-15, 1912.

The 1,513 people who went down with the giant ship included some of

the world's richest and most notable. Survivors and relatives of victims have argued that the wreck should be left alone as a memorial to the disaster.

Chappaz said the valise was opened and given a brief examination that revealed the valuables and currency. He did not say if the examination was conducted inside the minibus or later outside it.

No details about the jewelry were given in the statement. Chappaz said a full description of the valise's contents would be given after they were transferred at the end of the month to a preservation laboratory in Paris run by the national utility, Electricite de France.

None of the artifacts retrieved will be sold to private individuals, he said, but did not indicate whether the expedition would try to sell the objects to institutions, such as museums.

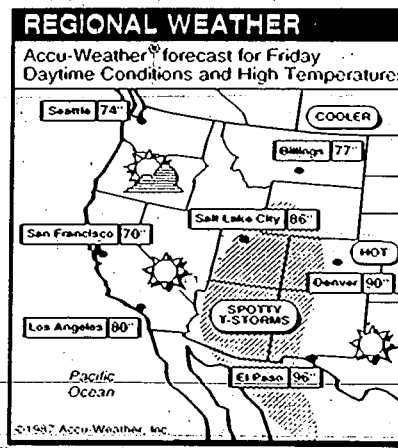
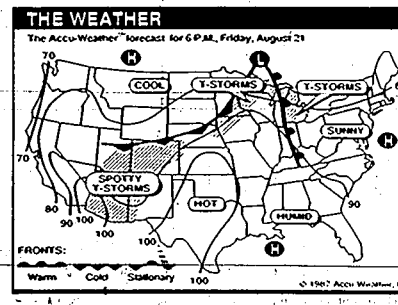
The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 92 degrees at both Payette and Salmon, while Stanley once again reported the coldest at 31 degrees.

New Jersey, New York, Maryland, Delaware, Pennsylvania and the District of Columbia had the highest per capita income, 38 percent above the national average, while the Southeast was the poorest region with incomes 47 percent below the national average.

In 1986, New England took over as the wealthiest region, with incomes 17 percent above the national average, which rose last year to \$14,841. New England was followed by the Mid-Atlantic region, with incomes 13 percent above the national average, and the Far West, whose incomes were 12 percent higher.

In addition to the Great Lakes, where incomes were 1 percent below the national average, other regions lagging behind the rest of the country last year were the Plains states, with incomes 4 percent below, the Rocky Mountains and the Southwest, with incomes 10 percent below the national average, and the Southeast, with incomes 13 percent below the national average.

The data for 1986 were based on revisions to state-by-state statistics first released in April. The revisions put the income for every man, woman and child at \$14,641, an increase of 5.3 percent from 1985. Compared to the national average of \$14,600, enjoyed the highest per capita income of any state in the nation last year.

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Pardon board to announce decision on Selby execution

POINT OF THE MOUNTAIN, Utah (AP) — The Hi-Fi killer Pierre Dale Selby waited in his death-row cell Thursday as members of the Board of Pardons spent the day writing their decision on whether to spare his life.

Paul Sheffield, the board's executive director, said the board had reached the decision to be announced to Selby today, one week after he pleaded for clemency with a claim that he had found God and would not kill again.

Selby, 34, Brooklyn, N.Y., is scheduled to die Aug. 28 for the torture-murders of three people and maiming of two others during the

1974 robbery of the Ogden Hi-Fi Shop.

The three board members, chairman Victoria Palacios, Gary Webster and Paul Boyden met Saturday and Sunday, and continued their debate during the week before reaching a conclusion, Sheffield said.

"The weight of the decision they are making is of such magnitude, it's a very heavy responsibility and their mood has reflected that. It's been very somber," Sheffield said.

During the hearing, each board member probably will make some comment explaining their

reasoning, and Selby will be given an opportunity to speak, Sheffield said.

He said the board would issue a majority opinion. Individual board members have the prerogative of preparing separate opinions in dissent or to explain their reasoning.

Should the board deny Selby's petition, only extraordinary intervention could prevent his death by lethal injection. Otherwise, Selby would become the first person in Utah to be executed since a firing squad shot Gary Gilmore in 1977.

The board is Selby's last regular avenue of appeal in a legal process that has spanned 13 years and

eight levels of state and federal judicial review.

William Andrews, 32, Jonesboro, La., also convicted of murder in the Hi-Fi case, is about six months behind Selby with his appeals.

A native of Trinidad and Tobago, Selby told the board during a two-day hearing last week that he regretted his crimes and wished to devote his remaining days to performing good works.

In more than three hours of testimony, Selby described a harsh upbringing on his native islands and his first encounters with racism after his family immigrated to America when he was 17.

He said religion and the study of psychology had enabled him to throw off the anger and hatred that drove him to commit one of the most heinous crimes in Utah history.

Selby said he was high on beer, valium and marijuana when he shot the bound victim after one of them, Gerald Neibitt, hurled a racial epithet. However, one of the survivors, Orren Walker, said Selby was sober, seemed to be enjoying himself and that Neibitt couldn't have spoken because her mouth was taped.

A member of the Central Seventh-day Adventist Church in

Salt Lake City, which Selby joined in 1980, described him as a "charismatic friend and Christian brother," and a psychologist testified that years of study had given Selby the moral character he lacked as a young man.

But state attorneys said Selby had never, before mentioned using drugs or drinking alcohol on the day of the robbery. Gary Kinder, author of the book "Victim," said that in interviews and correspondence that spanned several years, Selby always maintained he did not use drugs and thought ill of those who did.

For alleged breach of expedition contracts, the Warrens ask \$100,000 from each of the men.

The Warrens also have filed a motion in U.S. District Court in Boise, seeking dismissal of a lawsuit against them and John Wilcox, president of Wild Country Productions Inc.

The lawsuit was filed by Shippee's widow, Margit, who seeks compensatory damages of more than \$1 million.

The Warrens' motion, filed Aug. 14, alleges there weren't enough contacts with Shippee in Idaho to justify trying the case there.

Mrs. Shippee's attorney, Keith J. Halleland, disagrees: "We say they recruited him in Idaho and sent him letters about the expedition" that persuaded him to join it.

BOISE (AP) — Many members of the Idaho Republican Party are expected in Boise Aug. 28 for a GOP dinner and celebrity auction, and state Chairman Blake Hall says he will use the occasion to conduct another straw poll on presidential candidates.

An earlier GOP poll showed Robert Dole with a small lead over other contenders for the party's presidential nomination next year, closely followed by Paul Lewalt, George Bush, Howard Baker and Jack Kemp.

"The survey was so close among the top five contenders," said Hall. "It seems very proper to conduct another poll," he said.

"A Grand Old Party" is the theme of the fund-raising event Aug. 28.

Dallas still faces charge

BOISE (AP) — A defense motion to dismiss an escape charge against convicted killer Claude Dan has been denied by 4th District Judge George Carey.

Defense attorney Lance Churchill said he filed the motion after prison officials — some of whom will be testifying at Dallas trial — searched his client's legal file at the Idaho State Penitentiary law library on July 31.

Dallas, convicted of voluntary manslaughter in the 1981 killings of Ida Fish and Gena officers Conley Elms and Bill Pogue, escaped from the facility on Easter Sunday 1986 and was recaptured this year in California. A trial on the escape charge is scheduled Aug. 31.

The Wednesday hearing was held at the Ada County Law Enforcement Building under tight security.

Dean Schwartzmiller, administrative law clerk at the prison, testified that Dallas' legal file, which was locked in his desk drawer, had been removed and papers shuffled.

"I was specifically ordered to hand over my keys and go back to my unit," Schwartzmiller said.

Parole only counts for 1

BOISE (AP) — An Idaho prison inmate may be paroled from one sentence while continuing to serve another sentence, an attorney general's opinion says.

The opinion, released Thursday, was prepared for Olivia Craven, executive director of the Commission on Pardons and Parole.

If an inmate is paroled on one sentence and starts serving a second sentence, that would give the inmate dual status, the opinion said. The inmate then would be a parolee on the first sentence and a regular inmate on the second or subsequent sentences.

The opinion applies only to sentences imposed for crimes committed before Feb. 1, the effective date of a new Idaho criminal sentencing law.

The opinion noted a 1985 Idaho Supreme Court ruling "making it clear that an inmate sentenced to an indeterminate life term also may be ordered to serve extra time for using a firearm in the commission of a felony."

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

What a difference a decade makes. In 1976, a proposal to protect the City of Rocks was met with widespread opposition as a too-restrictive intrusion by the federal government.

But there has been a welcome shift on this issue. It is no longer acceptable to treat historical or geological resources as old graffiti on rocks, a few faded wagon tracks or a muddy pile of old bones.

At least one reason is economic. In an earlier time, when Idaho's agricultural and natural resource base was stronger, Idahoans tended to take things like scenic beauty, historical features and geology for granted.

Now, there is a recognition that these resources are worth hard dollars and that Idaho needs to develop them much more fully.

A Fossil Beds Monument at Hagerman could draw thousands of travellers off the Interstate highway and spread the valley's fame extensively, just as the John Day Fossil Beds has benefited central Oregon.

An Oregon Trail interpretive center at City of Rocks would also draw wide attention to this important site in Western migration.

We applaud the new awareness of the value of scenic, geologic and historic resources.

Drive through almost any other nearby state and you will find many examples of protection and promotion for regional attractions and, not incidentally, helping local economies.

Idaho has long been remiss in this area. It is none too soon for us to change.

Freedom to choose based on free access to information

Americans have a tremendous capacity for disagreeing with one another, and often the clamor of differing voices grows deafening. But on one point we all tend to agree: the First Amendment to the Constitution protects the open exchange of information from governmental interference.

In the past, the courts have realized this, and have granted corporations many of the First Amendment privileges which private citizens enjoy, encouraging them to speak freely on a wide range of questions which place neither endorsed a particular brand of cigarette, nor mentioned brand names, nor encouraged buying.

But it did raise some significant questions about the debate over health consequences of smoking - questions which some, holding opposing views, would as

disturbing, threats to free speech.

If passed, congressional legislation introduced in June of 1986 would ban all cigarette advertising, including newspaper and magazine advertisements, athletic sponsorships, billboards, posters, even such peripheral advertising as match-books and t-shirts.

Unlike the FTC complaint against R.J. Reynolds, the proposed legislation is unconcerned with factual truth in advertising, is unconcerned, in fact, with making any distinction between commercial speech and corporate opinion. Not content with an item-by-item review of commercial speech, not content with the restrictions already in place which limit what can be said in the marketplace, government representatives now feel compelled to muzzle an entire industry.

The danger of the FTC's actions resides in its unnecessary and intrusive limiting of free speech. For in this case government has wielded its power in order to stifle an opposing view.

Fortunately, this attitude was not shared by administrative judge Montgomery K. Hyun, who rejected the FTC's complaint in a court of review. In doing so, Judge Hyun drew critical distinctions between commercial speech - advertising - and corporate opinion, placing the matter in perspective by noting that the Reynolds editorial did not discuss prices, indicate brand names, nor encourage buying.

While his decision affirms that corporate speech is a free participant in the unrestricted flow of ideas, it does not guarantee immunity from other, equally

have grown all the more certain. Policies of this sort don't tend to reverse themselves; they tend instead to grow more powerful, more expansive, more encompassing.

Already there is talk of similar legislation at the alcoholic beverage industry. Will the government, concerned about the health risks associated with driving cars (a practice that kills thousands each year), next seek restrictions on the way cars are driven in television commercials?

Will high-speed chases be drummed from TV programming, lest they encourage reckless driving? Will concern over environmental pollution lead to a black-out of aerosol hairspray ads? Acting in the interest of those few whose bodies react adversely to caffeine, will the government banish Mrs. Olson from the kitchen?

Many, many products available on the open market pose a health risk to users, and protection for consumers, whenever possible, is an admirable pursuit.

But it is only when the buying public is well-informed, and acting consciously on a full, unbiased body of information that the individual consumer can truly be protected.

And it is only a well-informed public that can so soundly and truly free. Some time ago, Supreme Court Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes pointed out that "the best test of truth

is the power of the thought to get itself accepted in the competition of the marketplace." By educating consumers with wisdom and discernment enough to weigh their options and make informed choices, Justice Holmes granted them a degree of freedom which members of Congress now seek to revoke.

In doing so, he upheld the key principle underlying the right to free speech. Freedom to pick and choose, after all, it predicated on one's access to the open exchange of information, which in turn is predicated on the right to speak freely.

If restrictive measures such as the ban on tobacco advertising were to prevail, even new information about cigarettes, information beneficial to consumers, about new products, recent studies, further discoveries - all would be restricted from dissemination by corporate interests. In its place would remain a single voice, dominant and overbearing, the voice of the government.

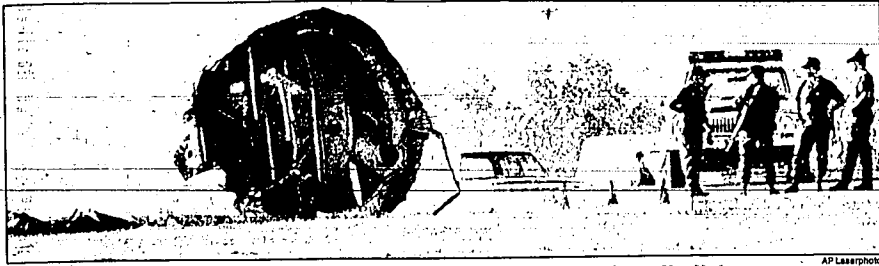

NEW WINDSOR N.Y. (AP) — A cargo jet landing at Stewart International Airport crashed into another freight plane taxiing on the same runway Thursday, knocking off its tail and injuring two crew members.

A small fire followed the collision in which the tail of an Airborne Express DC-9 was severed and the engine of the Emery Cargo DC-8 badly damaged, said airport Manager Dale Huber.

The airport was closed pending cleanup of debris and an investigation.

tion by National Transportation Safety Board officials who arrived on the scene late Thursday morning, an airport official said.

The accident occurred about 6 a.m. when the wing of the DC-8, which was landing, apparently struck and severed the tail of the DC-9, which was taxiing on the runway after it had landed, said Rita Carey, a spokeswoman for Airborne, based in Wilmington, Ohio.

A small fire started in the brakes and tires of the Emery craft, but air-

port personnel quickly extinguished it, she said. No fire occurred on the Airborne plane, and its cargo and fuselage were undamaged, she said.

The two Airborne crew members were apparently unhurt, while the two Emery crew members were treated at a hospital and released, Carey said.

Stewart airport has two runways and usually serves cargo, corporate and pleasure aircraft.

Huber said he did not know the speed of the Emery plane when it struck, the other craft, which was

spun around by the collision.

The Airborne jet had arrived in New Windsor from Wilmington a few minutes before and was taxiing toward a hangar, according to Airborne spokeswoman Diane Wilson.

It was bound for Bradley airport in Hartford, Conn., she said.

Fred Polono, executive vice president of Rosenbalm Aviation, the Michigan firm that operates the Emery craft, said he knew little about the incident.

"I don't have any information on that,"

Laos renews pledge to give MIA info

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Laotian government has reaffirmed a pledge to provide information on three Americans seen in captivity in Laos during the Indochina War, the State Department said Thursday.

Department spokesman Phyllis Oakley said that during talks last week in Vientiane, the Laotian government reiterated to a U.S. delegation previous commitments to help account for the three missing Americans.

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Court rejects North's challenge to counsel

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal appeals court on Thursday rejected Lt. Col. Oliver North's argument that the independent counsel investigating the Iran-Contra affair is operating under an invalid Justice Department regulation.

The U.S. Court of Appeals said that independent counsel Lawrence E. Walsh and his associate counsel derive "the necessary legal authority from the attorney general's regulation of March 5, 1987, regardless of whether they also have this authority pursuant to their appointments under the Ethics Act."

The 31-page opinion, released late Thursday afternoon, was written by Judges Ruth Bader Ginsburg and Douglas Ginsburg.

North's attorney, Barry Simon, had argued that Walsh had not properly exercised his March 5 appointment by Attorney General Edwin Meese III. That appointment was made to counter an earlier constitutional attack by North on Walsh's appointment in December under the independent counsel provision of the Ethics in Government Act.

Simon had argued that Walsh is conducting an invalid grand jury investigation by failing to administer Justice Department oaths to his associate counsels. He said said the laws must be enforced by "someone

who is appointed by the president with the advice and consent of the Senate and removable at will by the president."

"The independent counsel is not in any way acting as an agent of the executive branch and is not in any way acting under the regulations," Simon had told the three-judge panel.

Paul Friedman, an associate independent counsel who argued the case, said the Justice Department regulation creating Walsh's office gave Walsh the authority to hire and commission assistant prosecutors to appear before grand juries. He also argued that the associate counsels took valid oaths when they were appointed under the independent counsel law.

Friedman argued that even though the attorney general could theoretically revoke the regulation and fire Walsh, the independent counsel's office still is independent of the Justice Department.

North, a former National Security Council aide, was fired from his job after the diversion of funds from Iranian arms sales to the Nicaraguan Contra rebels was made public. He has said his actions, including guiding the sales of U.S. arms to Iran, were approved by his superiors.

Covert actions target

WASHINGTON (AP) — The American Civil Liberties Union urged Congress Thursday to either abolish covert operations as a menace to democratic values or at least legislate strict rules for their conduct, including criminal penalties if the rules are violated.

Morton Halperin, director of the ACLU's Washington office, commented as the organization released a study reviewing the history of covert operations and attempts to control them — a timely subject in light of the disclosures of the Iran-Contra affair.

Halperin told a news conference

that the ACLU will draft suggested legislation and submit it to appropriate congressional committees.

He said it is unlikely the current Congress actually will forbid future covert operations but he believes there is a good chance that comprehensive, relatively "airtight" laws will be written on the subject.

The problem, he said, will be to enact legislation as free as possible of loopholes.

Some members of the congressional Iran-Contra investigating committees have said that people — not inadequate laws — were to blame for current abuses.



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Ex-mob boss losing federal protection

WASHINGTON — Aladena "Jimmy the Weasel" Fratianno, the former mob boss who made a million-dollar career out of testifying for the government, is on his own after nearly 10 years in a witness protection program, the Justice Department said Thursday.

"I think it puts his life in great jeopardy," said Fratianno's lawyer, Dennis D. McDonald.

Fratianno, onetime acting boss of the Los Angeles crime syndicate, was being dropped Friday from the federal program that for a decade provided him with a stipend, a new identity and government protection in exchange for his testimony against other organized crime figures, said Justice Department spokesman John Russell.

When asked why Fratianno, 73, was being dropped from the program now, Russell replied: "Eventually everybody is terminated and it was determined that his time has come."

Fratianno did not have round-the-clock protection by U.S. mar-

shals at his home, but he did receive a 24-hour guard when he was brought into a "danger area" to testify, Russell said.

The chief effect of the govern-

ment's decision to drop him from the program is that Fratianno no longer will be supported at public expense, Russell said.

"We'll still provide security if there's a threat on his life and we'll relocate his residence if needed," Russell said, adding that Fratianno no longer needed the government's money.

"He's eligible for Social Security and has income from two books," Russell said.

McDonald, who spoke by telephone from his Hayward, Calif., office, said government attorneys used Fratianno for years as a witness and then "simply dump him on the street and say thanks and goodbye."

The government has spent more than \$1 million to cover Fratianno's housing, utilities, health and insurance, automobile insurance and real estate taxes during the 10 years he has been in the program, Russell said.

"That figure is ridiculous," McDonald said, adding that his cli-

ent has been paid about \$600 per month.

Michael J. Zuckerman, the author of a book in which Fratianno criticizes the witness protection program, said the government may be pushing Fratianno out of the program in retaliation.

Fratianno is to receive one-third of the profits from the book, published this summer, which is titled, "Vengeance is Mine."

Russell said the government has been considering dropping Fratianno from the program since 1983 and the publication of the book had no relation to the decision.

Zuckerman said the government in 1985 acknowledged paying about \$600,000 to cover Fratianno's expenses since he entered the witness protection program. Fratianno and his wife, who sometimes had to live apart, received a total of \$1,300 to \$1,400 per month, and the government picked up the tab on other items, including some mortgage payments on a \$190,000 house, Zuckerman said.

Navy identifies crash victim's body

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon said Thursday the body of one of three men missing from a July 30 helicopter accident in the Persian Gulf had been recovered and identified as Navy Radioman 2nd Class Albert B. Dupari.

The body was located in the gulf's waters on Tuesday along with some debris from the helicopter, the Pen-

tagon said. The body was sent to Bahrain, where it was identified. The Pentagon said it did not have Dupari's age, but said his home of record was listed as St. Croix in the U.S. Virgin Islands.

Dupari had previously been identified as a passenger on the helicopter, assigned to duty with the Navy's Middle East Force.

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Reagan, Contra chiefs to confer on Aug. 27

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) — President Reagan has invited the leadership of Nicaragua's Contra rebels to Los Angeles to give "his personal assurances" of commitment to their cause, the White House said Thursday.

Spokesman Martin Fitzwater, confirming a disclosure Wednesday by Contra official Alfredo Cesar, said Reagan will meet with the entire six-member directorate of the Nicaraguan opposition on Aug. 27.

Fitzwater, briefing reporters as Reagan vacationed at his nearby mountaintop ranch, said the meeting was arranged in part, but not solely, because of the Contras' complaints that they had been poorly consulted by the White House in connection with recent Central American peace initiatives.

He said there was some urgency to the session, which likely will be held in Reagan's hotel suite in Los Angeles, because "a lot of things have happened in the last two weeks."

Contra figures have voiced concern about the administration's commitment to their cause and about statements by the administration that have sent conflicting signals about its intentions.

Fitzwater also said he saw nothing improper in Reagan holding a high-profile, although private, meeting with Contra leaders. The peace plan submitted jointly by Reagan and House Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas, contemplated a low administration profile on the question of seeking further military assistance for the rebels.

The Reagan-Wright plan set a Sept. 30 deadline, the end of the current budget year, for the leftist Sandinista regime in Managua to demonstrate a willingness to institute the kinds of reforms that could lead to a cease-fire.

But Reagan himself, and several of his top aides, have said that the administration will not desert the Contras, and the president indicated in his weekly radio address last Saturday that support for the Contras must continue until a peace plan and democratization have been implemented.

"I would say that they're going there to discuss the status-of-the-peace plans," Fitzwater said of the Contra directors.

One purpose of the meeting, Fitzwater said, "is to update them on the progress of the various peace initiatives."



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Deadly shooting spree leaves British town in deep shock

HUNGERFORD, England (AP) — Michael Ryan, who shot 29 people in an afternoon of death, fire and wailing sirens that made a hell of this quiet market town, sounded "cold and reasonable" in his last moments, police said Thursday.

The 27-year-old gun collector shot himself to death minutes after speaking to officers who surrounded him at a school where he took refuge. He left behind 14 other dead, including his mother, and 16 wounded.

Of the 14 still hospitalized, 12 were reported in satisfactory condition. Myrtle Gibbs, 63, was reported doing "very poorly" and 34-year-old Ian Playle was in critical condition.

Ryan's apparently motiveless rampage Wednesday in Hungerford, 60 miles west of London, raised concern about whether the nation's tough gun laws are strong enough.

Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher flew to nearby Swindon to visit the wounded at Princess Margaret Hospital.

"It's an evil crime," she said. "This is something unknown to this country. It is unique. It just came out of a summer's day like this. Even came like any other dawn and by evening it just didn't seem the same day. It was just another world."

The massacre was the worst in modern British history. As is so of-

ten true in similar cases elsewhere, the killer was not a person anyone expected to do such a thing.

People know each other in Hungerford. As they grieve for their dead and comfort their neighbors the townspeople try, and fail, to understand why it happened.

"I don't think a lot of people, even myself, have come to grips with it," said the Rev. David Salt after a special service Thursday. "You can't believe it. It is going to scare a lot of people, but I think the strength of a community is that you share both joys and sorrows."

Police issued a statement saying: "It is a complete mystery. We genuinely do not know why he did it."

Chief constable Colin Smith of

the Thames Valley police told a news conference that, when finally cornered, Ryan seemed "lucid and reasonable" in talking with police.

"He expressed concern that he had shot his mother," Smith said. "He expressed the view that it was strange he could shoot other people but he could not shoot himself." Soon afterward, however, he fired that last shot.

Ryan lived quietly with his widowed mother in this town of 8,000 people. He worked only occasionally, as a construction laborer.

Neighbors described him as friendly, polite, a bit of a loner.

"Because he was quiet, nobody really took much notice of him,"

said Tim Scarlett, who had been a schoolmate but not a friend. "He never was really involved with the local lads. He kept himself to himself."

Just before noon on Wednesday, he shot 23-year-old Susan Godfrey in a park outside the town, leaving two small children to wander until 4-year-old Hannah told a passer-by: "Mummy has been shot."

After leaving the park, Ryan sniped at a gas station cashier who was protected by bulletproof glass. Then he entered the town, shot his 60-year-old mother, Dorothy, and their dog to death and set fire to the house.

He made his his way around Hungerford with a semi-automatic AK-

47 assault rifle, walking in plain sight and shooting, apparently indiscriminately, at whomever he saw.

Ryan killed policeman Roger Breerton, who had pursued him; Kenneth Clements, walking on the town common, and his own neighbor, 84-year-old Avdur Khan.

He shot five people to death at the wheels of their cars, including a delivery man and Marcus Barnard, a taxi driver going home to his wife and new baby. He killed a shopkeeper in his home, a young man walking his dog, an elderly couple and another old man.

Within 10 minutes at about 1 p.m., Ryan killed 13 people in his progress through the town, police said.

USSR expels Japanese diplomat, businessman; Tokyo reciprocates

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviets said Thursday they were expelling a Japanese diplomat and a businessman for alleged espionage, and Tokyo ordered out a Soviet for refusing to answer questions about the purchase of stolen documents.

It was the first Soviet expulsion of a Japanese diplomat since World War II and appeared to signal a sharp escalation in a dispute over Tokyo's allegations that Soviet officials in Japan illegally bought classified American documents.

Announcing the expulsions, the Soviet Union criticized Japan for launching and intensifying a propaganda campaign hostile to the country. Japanese officials denied that the expulsions would deeply damage Soviet-Japanese relations.

The Soviets accused Japanese diplomat Nobuhiro Takeshima of espionage during a visit to a Black Sea holiday resort, while Tokyo said the Soviet official Yuri G. Pokrovsky, may have handed over nearly \$69,

000 for stolen documents during clandestine meetings on railway platforms.

Soji Takao Otani was the Japanese businessman expelled.

Relations between the two countries plummeted this summer when the U.S. Senate voted to ban for two years the import of products built by Japan's Toshiba Corp. because of allegations that a Toshiba subsidiary illegally sold Moscow equipment which helped the Soviets build harder-to-detect submarines.

Two Toshiba machine executives were arrested and both the president and the chairman of Toshiba resigned because of the illegal sales.

In a separate case, Japan recently stepped up efforts to question Soviets suspected of involvement in a spy ring that bought or stole U.S. and Japanese defense and technological secrets, including U.S. data on a new Boeing E3C Hawkeye fighter jet.

Three Soviets sought for questioning were recalled abruptly from

Tokyo this year rather than face interrogation, according to a Japanese official in Moscow who spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity.

The Soviet order expelled Thursday was summoned on July 20 for police questioning in connection with the case but refused to respond; Japan's Foreign Ministry said.

Pokrovsky, a Soviet vice trade representative in Tokyo, was wanted for questioning about purported Soviet purchases of information stolen from an aircraft instrument maker, the ministry said.

Japanese officials indicated that Pokrovsky bought the stolen documents for \$68,900 during secret meetings on railway platforms and in restaurants with a top official in the Tokyo Aircraft Instrument Co.

The Foreign Ministry stressed the decision to expel the Soviet was not made in retaliation for Moscow's ordered expulsions.

Union spokesman Marcel Golding said the workers viewed Anglo's ultimatum as a ploy "to force them to accept terms and conditions which they find unacceptable." He said the miners would leave in the coming days.

Mine owners shut down South African shaft

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Mine owners closed one gold mine shaft Thursday and threatened action against strikers at three additional sites in their strongest response yet to an 11-day walkout by black miners.

Anglo American Corp., the nation's biggest gold producer, said Thursday it had begun closing the No. 6 shaft at its Vaal Reef gold mine.

Between 2,000 and 3,000 members of the National Union of Mineworkers on Wednesday refused an ultimatum to return to work, sacrificing their jobs rather than break the union's strike, which began Aug. 9.

Anglo said the workers at the low-profit shaft in western Transvaal province "elected not to return to work, have resigned and are going home."

But Cyril Ramaphosa, the union's general secretary, said, "We have not accepted that our members have been lawfully dismissed."

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Yellow ribbon wreaths were placed outside Edmond, Okla., Post Office Friday.

Postal workers cut day short to mark shooting anniversary

EDMOND, Okla. (AP) — Postal workers wearing yellow ribbons and sashes observed a moment of silence and went home early Thursday, the first anniversary of the day a part-time employee pulled two guns from a mail bag and killed 14 co-workers.

"We're trying to give everyone a short day today," said Bob Hunt, the acting postmaster since March. "We stopped and observed a moment of silence at 6:17 a.m. It was very heart-warming. It just made shivers go up and down your spine."

It was shortly after 7 a.m. on Aug. 20, 1986, that Patrick Henry Sherrill, a part-time mail carrier who had been reprimanded by his supervisors the day before, began shooting other workers, killing 14 and wounding six before he killed himself.

Michael Bigler, who was shot in the back but survived by playing dead, said the anniversary is a time for him to be thankful.

"Scream your loudest, cry and moan and groan your loudest and multiply that by seven or eight people, and those screams are what I heard," he said.

"I've asked God to take those screams out of my head since that massacre and he has," Bigler said.

Thursday, two floral sprays flanked the flagpole out front of the Edmond Post Office. A yellow ribbon

was tied around the flag pole, and similar yellow ribbons decorated a few mailboxes in this city of 36,000 about 10 miles north of Oklahoma City.

About a half-dozen potted plants stood in non-public areas where Sherrill had stalked his screaming victims. Male employees wore yellow ribbons, counterparts to the women workers' sashes.

A police car stood at the post office's rear entrance. A uniformed policeman was on duty inside, along with an undetermined number of postal security officers.

"It's just a precaution and it makes the employees feel a little better, too," said police Lt. Mike Wooldridge.

Hunt said postal officials and conferred with employees to see how they wanted to observe the day. The consensus was for a short work day leading up to a city memorial service scheduled Thursday evening. Hunt said, however, that it would be impossible to give everybody a short day.

Shortly after dawn, the postal clerks finished their work and were told they could go home.

"We're encouraging our carriers to finish their routes and as soon as we can we're going to let them go home," Hunt added. "We tried to do some of the things we normally would do today earlier in the week so we wouldn't have to do the rou-

tine duties today."

Customers by ones and twos came into the Post Office to transact business, but one woman pulled her car into the parking area, got out and snapped a picture of the floral tributes.

"We're not doing anything really out of the normal," said John J. Barmann, who just transferred from St. Joseph, Mo., as the new Edmond postmaster.

But, said Hunt, the day was a personal day for the postal workers.

"They really wanted to be together," he said. "The employees pretty well stay together in a group. They were very supportive of each other. There was conversation. The normal things that go on in the work place were all here today. It wasn't quiet and somber like you might think."

Song opens exchange visit

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ten Soviet teen-agers locked arms with their young American hosts and sang "We Shall Overcome" Thursday as they embarked on an exchange visit in memory of Samantha Smith, the small-town girl from Maine who opened a new era in U.S.-Soviet relations.

The Soviet youngsters, aged 15 and 16 and all from Leningrad, told reporters they were eager to sample American food, rock music, baseball, movies and games during their 11-day tour of Washington, Boston and Maine.

"Children are the best ambassadors of peace," said group leader Zinaida Dragunkina, a chaperone representing the Soviet Committee on Youth Organizations.

"If our visit will be a very little step toward improving relations between our two countries, we will be very happy and glad," she told reporters at St. Albans School near the Washington Cathedral, where the youngsters spent their first night in the United States.

The teen-agers arrived late Wednesday aboard a commercial flight from Moscow via New York, and caught the second half of the touring hit musical "Cats." Then they took a late-night bus tour past the White House and other Washington landmarks.

The Soviet youngsters are guests of the non-profit Samantha Smith Foundation, formed in 1985 to promote international understanding. Its president is Jane G. Smith,

Samantha's mother, who said a second pair of exchange visits between U.S. and Soviet teen-agers is in the works.

It was Samantha, then a fifth-grader from rural Manchester, Maine, who made headlines when she wrote Soviet leader Yuri Andropov a letter in December 1982 asking, "Why do you want to conquer the whole world, or at least our country?"

Andropov replied in April 1983 that the Soviets want peace, not war, and pledged that his country would never be the first to use nuclear weapons.

At Andropov's invitation, Samantha visited the Soviet Union with her parents that summer.



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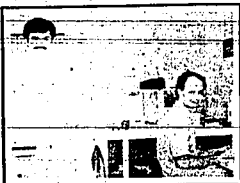


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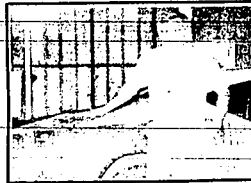
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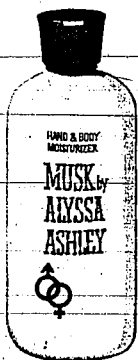
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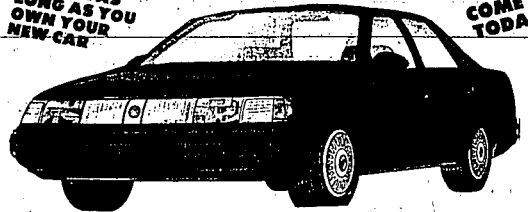
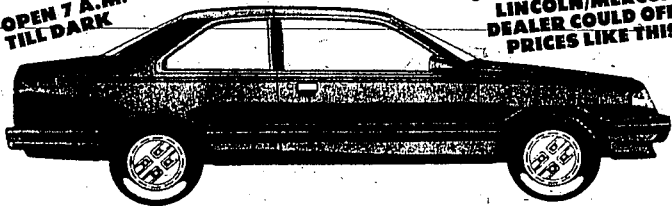
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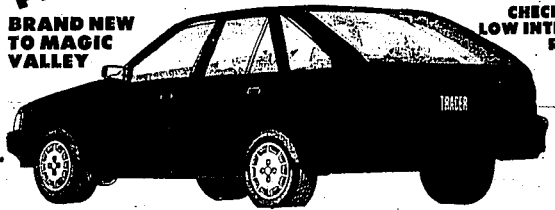
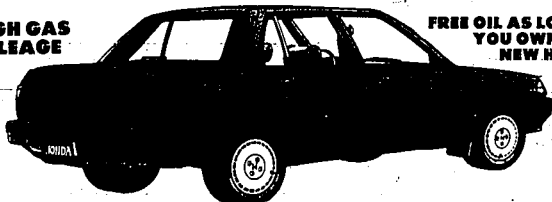
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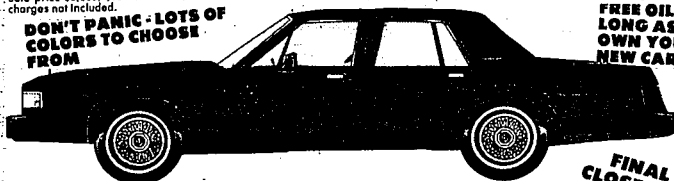

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IPC objects to water determination efforts

TWIN FALLS — Idaho Power Co. is objecting to the scope of the state's efforts to determine all the water rights in the Snake River basin, according to court papers filed here.

IPC, which advanced the idea of determining all the water rights, also says the way the adjudication is set up will bar the 5th District Court from getting jurisdiction over federal water rights.

This and other issues will have to be determined by Judge Daniel Hurlbutt Jr. at a hearing in Twin

Falls that starts September 8.

One of the specifics the court is to decide is whether to adjudicate the Clearwater River drainage and other drainages north of the Salmon River. The boundaries in the map the state filed with the court show the northern limit is less than 100 miles above the Salmon.

IPC addressed the boundary issue in its recent filings by requesting the court take notice of three points:

- The Snake River leaves Idaho at or near Lewiston;
- The Clearwater River system is tributary of the Snake in Idaho above Lewiston;

Drainage of the Clearwater is in Idaho.

IPC says under the present terms of adjudication the court cannot consider federal water rights, a necessary part of the picture.

Tom Nelson, IPC's attorney, has previously questioned whether the sorting out of water rights by the state is a general adjudication. Nelson could not be reached for comment Thursday.

The hearing next month starts what is expected to be a 10-year process of determining all the water rights of the Snake and its tributaries. State officials say this is the largest adjudication in the

West.

Adjudication is required by the Swan Falls water rights agreement between the state and IPC.

Part of what prompted the agreement was an Idaho Supreme Court decision on March 31, 1983 over water rights in the Snake River.

The decision in IPC's favor could have blocked all future upstream farm development. But the state and IPC negotiated the agreement ensuring water for future farm development but also limiting it.

The agreement is seen by IPC as a way of protecting its stockholders. It is an insurance policy that there will be enough water in the river to

turn IPC's hydro turbines. The impact of new water rights on hydro has to be considered under the agreement.

Nelson, the IPC attorney, says the utility's interest in the agreement is to see that the adjudication is done properly. IPC is at the end of the ditch and is better off to file the claim, he says.

Once the hearing is completed, a commencement order can be entered and DWR will serve notice on those who have water rights to file them with the district court. People who have previously filed water rights will have to file them again,

according to DWR.

The commencement order will come within a hour or two of the hearing. Hurlbutt said. And the commencement order can be appealed to the state Supreme Court.

The notification process will take two years and once someone is notified, the person will have 90 days to file a claim, DWR says.

The aim of adjudication is to give the state an idea of the base of water rights, according to the attorney general's office. This way future water rights decisions spelled out in the agreement can be made more intelligently.

Vehicle arson — Finer points explained

TWIN FALLS — The finer points of investigating vehicle arson were explained Thursday afternoon to 18 select Idaho Law Enforcement officers attending a week-long homicide school in Twin Falls.

The program, under the direction of Ron Strolberg, training specialist for the Police Officers Standards and Training academy in Boise, offered 60 hours of training in various

homicide situations. Instructors for the course were Jerry Chinam and Joe Ryznarzka, both from the California Department of Justice.

Ryznarzka told officers at the Thursday session that vehicle arson cases usually involve insurance fraud, regular arson or arson designed to cover a murder or other crime.

A fire started in an old car at the Twin Falls police pistol range north-east of Twin Falls illustrated his statements that a fire inside of a

closed vehicle will usually die of its own accord after consuming all of the oxygen. He said such a fire will actually help investigators by outlining fingerprints and other evidence by the smoke accumulations. Evidence on the floor of the car, including blood, will be the best preserved, he said.

Officers in the class were able to dust fingerprints and collect other evidence planted by the instructors after the torched vehicle cooled.

The same vehicle served as a tar-

get to show that shots fired at angles other than straight into the glass will usually ricochet from the safety glass of a windshield.

Strolberg said the class was limited to 18 officers selected from 42 applicants. Those attending receive credit for accreditation. Several other mock crime scenes were set up during the week for practicing investigations. Those selected to attend came from as far as Moscow and Coeur d'Alene with several from Magic Valley agencies.

Andrus: Field work is done, time to begin proposal draft

BOISE (AP) — With the field work done, Gov. Cecil Andrus says he plans to get down to serious work on drawing up a new Idaho wilderness proposal.

Andrus and Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, joined a plane load of Forest Service officials Thursday in an aerial inspection flight over central Idaho mountain areas.

They went over Idaho areas which might be recommended to Congress for permanent protection as wilderness, or released for other uses. Andrus said it was the last of his "fact finding" trips to the areas under discussion.

He said he hoped to make substantial progress on his wilderness recommendation by Labor Day.

Andrus said "release language" is as important as the wilderness areas themselves. He said he will start negotiating on the language to determine the status of areas which are not determined suitable for wilderness, and which could be released for other uses.

Timber industry spokesman and others have been pressing for release language that will make it harder for environmentalists to block proposed timber sales and other development of the released areas.

"Release language is every bit as controversial as the boundaries themselves," said Andrus.

It was the last flight planned by Andrus and Stallings together, although Stallings said he had one more inspection trip planned.

But he made it clear that it will be Andrus leading the way regarding an Idaho wilderness bill which eventually will decide how much of the state's nine million acres goes into wilderness and how much is released from a roadless state.

"The governor will be taking the lead. He is a statewide official, and he can do more of this than I can," Stallings said.

He said he has been working on wilderness areas in the 2nd Congressional District, but it will be up to Andrus to negotiate with Republican Sen. James McClure and the other members of the state's congressional delegation on the overall wilderness bill.

About a dozen Forest Service officials joined Andrus, Stallings and Stallings' wife, Rana, on the flight. Heading the group was Stan Tixier, regional forester for the Forest Service at Ogden. The trip was taken in a twin-engine Otter, an airplane with an overhead wing and slow speed, which makes it ideal for sightseeing.

After 12 years, MIA cause back in spotlight

TWIN FALLS — Nothing but the truth will alleviate the pain for Mark Stephenson.

"I want to know if my father is alive, or dead, by whatever means there is," Stephenson told a small group of Vietnam War veterans Wednesday night. "I want to know who's there, and whether we can get them out."

In 1975, U.S. troops were withdrawn from South Vietnam, ending the longest war in U.S. history. But for the families of 2,500 servicemen listed as missing in action, the pain of uncertainty continued.

Now, after 12 years of waiting and two years of sporadic negotiations with the Vietnamese government, there is a renewed sense of urgency, said Stephenson, a Boise resident and bank examiner for the state of Idaho who was recently elected to the National League of Families of American Prisoners and Missing in Southeast Asia.

"We have one year to go before Reagan leaves office, and after he leaves, it will probably all fall apart," Stephenson said.

Gains have been made. In July 1984, the Hanoi government agreed to talks with U.S. officials on the possible whereabouts of the 2,490 Americans listed as missing. A year later, the North Vietnamese turned over to an American team 26 numbered crates with the remains of 26 U.S. servicemen. Another 61 servicemen have been accounted for, but that still leaves 2,413 missing.

In a room at the Salvation Army in Twin Falls, Stephenson Wednes-

day told less than a dozen members of the "Vietnam Veterans of America, Chapter 222, the only organized chapter in Idaho, there are both encouraging and distressing signs.

"At the first of this month, the Vietnamese met with Gen. John Vessey, former head of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and another two meetings are scheduled at the end of August.

Ten months ago, the Vietnamese admitted there were MIAs being held in areas out of their control, such as Laos and Cambodia. Stephenson called that admission "unprecedented."

"I feel very positive," Stephenson said. "Ten years ago, they wouldn't talk to us."

From Idaho, 12 men went off to war in Southeast Asia and were never heard from again, such as John Powers of Mackay and Jon Sparks of Carey who are still officially listed as MIAs.

Until recently, public awareness over the MIA issue waned with each passing year.

But with the release of movies such as "Platoon," "Gardens of Stone," and "Full Metal Jacket," there is a renewed public interest, which Stephenson said was at an all-time high. "And groups such as National League of Families are trying to channel that interest into political support and pressure for negotiations.

Not all of the interest has been positive, however, Stephenson said. He ticked off a list of issues against the families of those still missing, and said tens of thousands of dollars have been paid to mercenaries claiming they could bring

McClure: Water rights not a court issue

BURLEY — Sen. James McClure highlighted his concern about the issue of federal reserved water rights during hearings on the City of Rocks on Wednesday.

McClure says he wants Congress to determine what those rights are rather than leaving it to the courts. He said he would like to see the issue clarified in the City of Rocks national reserve proposal and the upcoming push to get a wilderness bill for Idaho, says the Republican senator.

Federal reserved water rights have to be specified if the West's system of appropriating water is to be maintained, he says.

The issue has been raised in the federal

courts and in other forums such as a recent Washington, D.C. seminar on wilderness and water rights sponsored by the Public Lands Group which advocates multiple use for federal lands.

State and private water rights must not be usurped by the federal government, Washington State rancher Mary Burke told legislators. Her remarks were in a press release issued by the National Cattlemen's Association, the Public Lands Council and the National Wool Growers Association.

A federal court case in Colorado said there was a federal reserved water right in Colorado's Holycross Wilderness Area. This has upset the cities of Colorado Springs and Aurora that have a water structure in a wilderness area, says Harold Miskel, director of development re-

source and planning, City of Colorado Springs.

The Idaho Conservation League, a statewide conservation organization, doesn't think federal reserved water rights is an issue here because there are no water structures in proposed wilderness areas, says Pat Ford, ICL public lands coordinator. Ford says wilderness areas actually help downstream users by ensuring an adequate and even flow of water.

McClure says if federal reserved water rights are not an issue in Idaho wilderness that should be stated in a wilderness bill.

But he says in some cases the federal government will need to say how much water is involved in a reserved water right.

McClure says any Congressional action on federal reserved water rights should be compatible with state water laws.

Bar association forms ethics review committee

TWIN FALLS — In a move to reduce rumors of direct solicitation of clients and other unethical actions by lawyers, the 5th Judicial District Bar Association has formed an ethics committee.

The committee will receive and evaluate complaints from the public and pass the complaints to the Idaho State Bar and Idaho Supreme Court. Those two organizations are responsible for the licensing, regulation and disciplining of lawyers in the state.

"Our concern is that a person may have a complaint but now know where to take it," said Tom High, president of the Fifth Judicial District Bar Association. He said several complaints have been received lately about lawyers directly soliciting clients.

"There have been more rumors," High said. "There is more competition, and sometimes in our profession as any other, some people may take the low road."

High said the U.S. Supreme Court in 1977 ruled lawyers have the right to advertise the

types of services a lawyer is willing to provide and the charge for those services.

"With that decision, we have seen an explosion in television, radio, newspaper and yellow page advertisements which, given the court's ruling, are perfectly appropriate," High said. "This does not mean potential clients are fair game for direct solicitation by lawyers."

The Idaho 5th Judicial District Bar Association includes 220 practicing lawyers in Twin Falls, Jerome, Cassia, Minidoka, Blaine, Gooding, Lincoln and Camas counties.

High said he does not think the district has a worse ethics problem than other areas, but this move should give the public a place to go with complaints and help maintain a high credibility for lawyers.

"Sometimes where there is smoke, there could be fire, but somebody could also be blowing smoke," he said. "We do not have proof on anything, but just the fact rumors are going around reflects poorly on the profession."

High said the classic horror story of a hungry lawyer is portrayed in the movie "The Verdict" where Paul Newman attends a funeral to pass

out business cards to members of the family of an accident victim.

"It really reflects poorly on attorneys to have someone showing up at a funeral home and passing out cards," High said. "I would hope the reaction would be the same as mine: disgust. But the problem is that lawyer's behavior is generalized to all attorneys."

He said the public trusts attorneys less now than in the past and is likely to consult attorneys when facing a problem. "And that offends me, because we have a fairly ethical profession and a fairly ethical district."

"Our membership wants to be on record not only as condemning such conduct, but we want to identify and report anyone who engages in such tactics," High said.

The members of the new committee are John Bradley of Burley, Bruce Collier of Ketchum, Jim Messory of Jerome, Brian Harper of Twin Falls and Jeff Roll of Twin Falls.

Complaints or comments concerning lawyer ethics may also be addressed to High, Gary Sloette of Twin Falls or John Hohnhorst of Twin Falls.

Injured deputy in stable condition

HAILEY — A Twin Falls County deputy sheriff injured in a traffic accident was listed as fair and in stable condition at the Blaine County Medical Center Wednesday.

John Baraness, 27, deputy sheriff assigned to the west end area of Twin Falls County, was injured Sunday night when his small pickup truck went out of control and rolled on State Highway 77 about 10:15 p.m.

Baraness and his passenger, Scott Dixon, 24, of Buhl, remained in the vehicle and both were taken to the Blaine County hospital where Dixon was treated and released. Baraness suffered a crushed ankle, broken arm and ribs and facial injuries. He underwent surgery Wednesday to repair the injured ankle.

No charges have been filed, Blaine County officers said.

Rollover kills Mexican farm worker

BUHL — A one-car rollover, two and one-half miles west of Buhl on the Deep Creek Road, Wednesday night claimed the life of a farm worker from Mexico.

Sheriff James Munn said the victim, Ramon Vargas, 22, currently residing in Wendell, was killed about 10:10 p.m. Wednesday when the car he was driving left the roadway and rolled.

Investigating officers said Vargas was traveling west near the intersection of county roads #100 North and 1200 East. The vehicle went off the roadway and into a borrowpit, through a fence, traveled 178 feet, crossed back through the fence and some sprinkler pipe, left the road again and flipped over, coming to rest on its top.

A passenger and brother of the driver, Inotod Vargas, 25, of Buhl, escaped injury. Deputy Twin Falls County Coroner Jim Milden said the driver was ejected and died when the car rolled on top of him. Milden said Vargas died of massive head and internal injuries and was pronounced dead at the scene.

Milden said neither man was wearing a seat belt and alcohol was involved in the accident. He said the driver had no driving permit and no insurance. Both men, he said, were in the country illegally but have relatives in the Buhl area. The victim has a wife in Mexico, but no children, Milden said. The body was taken to Hopkins-Buhl funeral chapel.

Stephensen said, "If it doesn't do any harm, I guess it's fine." Stephensen has no illusions about his mission in life. It is a humanitarian effort. "People keep asking why you're here, I tell them, 'I'm here to help you get your life back.'"

His father was an Air Force pilot flying a pre-strike mission for a B-52 bomber. He was supposed to be over the target at 11:45 p.m. He knew he was being tracked by missile radar, it showed on his screen. And he and his navigator started looking for the missile's flare, said Stephensen, as he bobbed his head from side to side. "It was tricky black, they couldn't see anything," he said. "His co-pilot ejected, but he doesn't know if my father did."

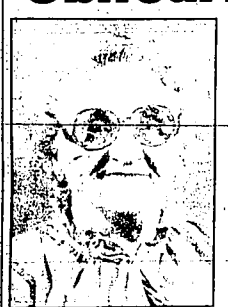

Stock market regains losses from early week

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market swept ahead with renewed force Thursday, recovering all of losses it sustained earlier in the week and setting new highs.

The Dow-Jones average of 30 industrial climbed 49.97 points to 2,706.79, surpassing the previous record close of 2,700.87 reached on Monday.

Volume on the New York Stock Exchange came to 196.67 million

shares, up from 180.88 million in the previous session.

The market's sharp decline on Tuesday and early Wednesday stirred talk that stocks might at last have started a period of retrenchment. But a sudden rally in the last hour of trading Wednesday brought buying enthusiasm back to life.

Analysts said that demonstrated that investors still had a good deal of idle money they were eager to invest in the market on any sign of momentary price weakness.

Traders also were encouraged Thursday by low interest rates declining in the credit markets.

Wall Street's optimism may be tested Friday, however, when the government issues its monthly report on the consumer price index.

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NCAA may test support for football playoffs

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — An NCAA committee recommended Thursday that member schools vote in January on whether they want a football playoff to determine the national champion.

A special subcommittee which has studied the issue for several years said it would recommend to the NCAA Council that a resolution be put on the agenda of the NCAA meeting in January, said DeLous Dodds, athletic director at Texas and chairman of the subcommittee.

If approved, the Council would draft specifics of the playoff for a vote at the 1989 NCAA convention. The playoff then could be played for the first time in January 1990.

The subcommittee recommended that it be a one-game playoff between two teams chosen by a foot-

ball committee. "We have recommended to the NCAA Council that a resolution be put forward at the 1988 convention asking member institutions about an NCAA championship game," Dodds said at a news conference. "One game, two teams."

Dodds said he would not predict if the NCAA Council would put the resolution on the agenda. He said the issue would be taken up by the Council in October.

"I find the Council to be very independent," he said. "I think they might talk about it, I think they might discuss it. They have the ability to test the water and see what it is."

Dodds stressed that the subcommittee's vision of the playoff, which would have it played the Sunday be-

fore the Super Bowl in a domed stadium or a stadium seating more than 70,000 people in a warm-weather site, could be changed later.

The subcommittee settled on a one-game playoff in part for academic reasons — so that athletes would not miss much school — and in part to protect the bowl games, Dodds said.

"We want to try not to impact the bowl," Dodds said. "The bowls have been very good to college football. The bowls put \$46 million into college football last year. The committee would like to see the bowl structure intact."

Interest has been building for a football playoff, Dodds said. He said a survey of CFA, Pac-10 and Big Eight schools in which coaches and

athletic directors responded anonymously found 65 percent in favor of putting the idea to a vote and 55 percent in favor of having the playoff, he said.

"These are personal and professional points of view," Dodds said, "and not institutional points of view."

"We've talked about it long enough that we've got to get it out and give the membership a chance to vote on it."

Sentiment among coaches and administrators has historically been weighted heavily against a playoff. Schools attending a 1982 special meeting voted in a show of hands to not even do a feasibility study.

A playoff plan was on the agenda of the 1978 NCAA convention, but was withdrawn without a vote

being taken. Dodds said momentum has been building for the playoff, even with out considering the highly successful game last January between No. 1 Miami and No. 2 Penn State in the "Cotton Bowl."

Dodds said he anticipated opponents of a playoff would cite a negative effect on academics. He said supporters would cite financial considerations, estimating the NCAA would take \$33 million for the NCAA that could be distributed to member schools.

Dodds acknowledged that selection of the two schools to play a one-game championship could be highly controversial.

He said the committee selecting the teams would take into consideration the winners of bowl games, statistical ratings of teams, national polls and the opinions of regional committees made up of coaches and athletic directors.

"I've watched that NCAA basketball selection for many years and there always is a problem with the 49th team or the 65th team," he said. "And I'm sure if Texas is the third team (in a football playoff) I'll be upset. There will always be a catalyst for the third team."

Dodds said it was likely a playoff, if approved, would be opened for bids from the television networks. He said that television contracts could be with the CFA and the PAC-10 and Big Eight both expire in 1990, and that a 1990 playoff game might be a catalyst for bringing both groups together.

Settles, one of nine running backs seeking five positions, has been impressive in early workouts: He ran the ball four times for 13 yards and caught two passes for another 13 yards in Atlanta's 19-14 victory over Buffalo in the preseason opener last weekend.

Veteran Gerald Riggs, who ran for 1,827 yards last season, and No. 1 draft choice Kenny Flowers of Clemson are all the Falcons' backs for now. Settles and No. 12 draft choice Larry Emery of Wisconsin are expected to get more playing time Saturday, when the Falcons play the Kansas City Chiefs in an exhibition.

"We've got to continue to make an impression on us. So far, they have," Coach Marion Campbell said of Settles and Emery.

Settles said there is a big difference between college and the pros. He has had to learn how to block again.

"At Appalachian I did mostly running. I didn't have to worry about that," he said.

As for the competition at running back, Settles said all the Falcons' backs are talented and smart.

"They know their assignments. It just depends on who the coach wants to keep," he said.

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Those enacting new NFL pass-rushing rule didn't make many points with Butz

CARLISLE, Pa. — The subject of the numerous injuries suffered last season by NFL quarterbacks came up this week at Dickinson College. Some people, especially league owners and officials, were so concerned this offseason about protecting the quarterbacks that they voted for a new rule interpretation that penalizes pass rushers who take more than one step before hitting the quarterback after he has released the ball. Last year, they are said to have taken two steps.

Those who made this change obviously didn't consult Dave Butz. "Too bad," the Washington Redskins defensive tackle bellowed when asked this week about quarterback injuries. "Too bad. There are a lot of other people hurt, too. The only reason why it's a big deal is quarterbacks are starters and there's only one of them on the field."

When things get slow at training camp, there's nothing like a good rules controversy to get everyone riled up. Every year, the NFL modifies its rules and regulations. Many of the changes are barely noticeable. Others, like last year's decision to go to the instant replay, make headlines all season. The so-called "one-step rule," an interpretation of the rule protecting the passer, falls somewhere in between. But, because it involves the quarterback, a potential sacker and

a judgment call from an official, it is expected to become quite controversial.

Coach Joe Gibbs said he likes the new rule interpretation. But at least two of Gibbs' defensive linemen — Butz and end Charles Mann — don't care for the change and quarterback Jay Schroeder doesn't think it's going to work at all that well.

"I may see more flags, but there's still going to be some quarterbacks getting injured," Schroeder said. "You can't stop a guy's momentum. If they're coming at you, they're not going to stop. It takes a snap shot. What this is saying is you can't do that."

Other rules have been changed or modified for the 1987 season. Perhaps the most visible will be the rule that eliminates re-kicks on kickoffs out of bounds, with the exception of the first one. If a regular kickoff sails out of bounds between the goal lines without being touched by the receiving team, the ball is marked 30 yards from the spot of the kickoff (the 35-yard line) or at the spot where whichever receiving team chooses.

"You'll still see some corner kicking but the kickers won't be flirting with the edge of the field like they used to," said kicker Steve Cox.

So there will be more kickoffs going to the main return man, which means there will be more kick-off returns. It also speeds up the game by eliminating a penalty.

In another change, offensive linemen who previously could not extend their arms while blocking downfield now can do that. "Everybody was doing it anyway," said guard R.C. Thielemann. One rule that is simply getting a trial run, to be voted on after a three-week pre-season experiment, is the 40-second clock, designed to speed up play by giving the offense 40 seconds to snap the ball once the previous play ends. Before, an offense got 30 seconds once the ball was spotted. It's safe to say Gibbs despises this idea.

"It's the 40-second disaster," Gibbs said after the Redskins' 23-17 victory Friday night over Pittsburgh. "It's just awful. You're rushed, you're hurried."

"It's going to cut down on everything we do," Schroeder said. "It's going to be tough on us because we've got guys running all over the field, shifting all over the place, running in motion and running down the field. To get them back in 40 seconds I think is going to be tough on us. We got a lot of plays off with one second or less than one second to go. That was frustrating. I thought I was really pushing myself."

One result might be that after long incompletions, second-string receivers will have to come in.

To become a rule, the 40-second clock requires the approval of three-fourths of the 28 club owners.

"It would cause you to change a lot of things, make major changes," Gibbs said. "Hopefully, saner minds will prevail."

Starling regarded as major challenger

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — Marlon Starling's experience and a hard-to-figure style will enable the top-ranked contender to beat World Boxing Association welterweight champion Mark Breland, veteran trainer Angelo Dundee said Thursday.

"I think Marlon Starling is going to be the toughest fight, and I don't think he's going to be able to overcome Marlon Starling," said Dundee, who spoke by phone during a telephone hook-up at a news conference to promote Saturday's fight.

"Marlon Starling, to me, is a heck of a fighter. Marlon Starling is the best welterweight out there," Dundee said. "I think he's just a little touch for Breland."

Dundee, who said he had no involvement in the fight, predicted a knockout by Starling late in the scheduled 15-round bout — the first world title fight in South Carolina.

Both Breland and Starling played down the possibility of a knockout.

"I didn't hear what Angelo said," Breland said. "It makes me no dif-

ference what he said. Once you get in the ring, it's all over with. You get in there and fight."

"If his predictions were right every time," Breland said, "he'd be betting on horses and everything else."

Starling, wearing a white shirt that said "No. 1 in the World," said he was tired of all the talk and wanted to get in the ring.

"I believe I'm the best welterweight in the world, and I think come Saturday you'll see it," Starling said. "I thank Angelo for what he believes. But when the bell rings, it's going to be Marlon Starling and Mark Breland."

"We've been talking all week, we've been talking about Breland's reach and his experience," he said. "Everything's out the door when the bell rings. The champion doesn't get in the ring. The champion comes out. Believe me, I'll come out as the champion of the world."

The fight will be at the Township Auditorium, which seats about 3,000 for boxing, and will be televised

live by ABC-TV. The Columbia area will be blacked out.

Breland has an 18-0 record as a professional, including 12 knockouts. The fight is the first defense for the 24-year-old champion since he beat Harold Volbrecht on Feb. 6 to win the title.

Breland will be fighting in Columbia for the second time, having knocked out high school rival in the first round in Oct. 22.

Breland was born and raised in New York but considers Columbia his home about 60 miles south of the city in Denmark.

Starling, 28, of Hartford, Conn., is 41-4, with 25 knockouts, and is ranked as the No. 1 contender at the 147-pound class by all three boxing organizations.

"I think Breland's bitten off a little more than he can chew," Dundee said. "I think he's going to get bit by Marlon Starling."

Dundee said Starling not only has too much experience for Breland, Starling has more knockouts than

There are other drugs, Voy said, that may be used to quack the use of performance enhancing substances, and they should be added to the list as they are discovered.

"But I don't think there are a bunch of them."

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Cover drugs common in Pan-am

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — The U.S. Olympic Committee's medical chief said Thursday there were several athletes using a drug to hide steroids, not just two or three as Pan Am officials said.

Dr. Robert Voy said the athletes were from more than one country.

"I kept seeing this statement that there were two and I knew differently," he said during a telephone interview. "When I asked the lab people they just said several."

Voy said he did not know the specific number involved.

Vives' attorney, Rick Miller, said

The evidence that has been presented to the court thus far would not warrant further prosecution," Ryan ruled, adding that the potential for further damage to Vives' reputation was too great to let the matter continue in limbo.

East's opening bid tells South that today's heart finesse is bound to fail. How does South avoid taking the losing finesse?

South ducks the club lead in dummy and loses to East's queen. Back comes a club to dummy's ace, and South must face the prospects of losing three more tricks to diamonds—and the ill-fated heart finesse. Is there any way out of the trap?

The best hope for the game lies with forcing East into an embarrassing lead. And to do that, South must have at least one trump in dummy. If he's lucky enough to find East with only two trumps and two diamonds (honors), careful timing will land the game.

After winning dummy's club ace, South draws one-two trumps and leads the ace of another diamond. East wins and is stuck. A club lead offers a ruff and discard, and a heart lead eliminates the losing finesse.

Can East escape the trap by dropping a diamond king under the ace? This allows West to overtake on the second diamond lead to shift to hearts, but the game still makes. Instead of two diamond losers, South escapes with only one and the defenders are held to only three tricks.

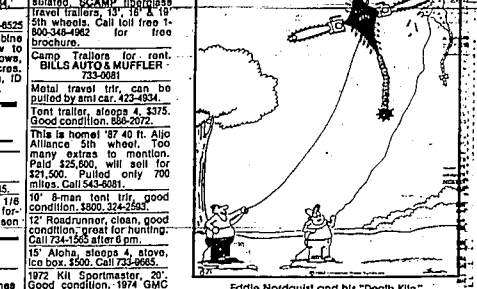

Hemingway review draws fascinating, if unfair, picture

Second Sight — A review of "Hemingway," by Kenneth S. Lynn.

A current literary pastime is the retroactive psychoanalysis of the famous, due, in part, to the increasing psychological sophistication of the reading public and also to the wide sales of such studies.

Intriguing analysis

Now Kenneth Lynn, erudite and prolific professor of history at Johns Hopkins University, has turned his interpretive sights on one of the twentieth century's larger-than-life mythic characters. Ernest Hemingway — the biography is a fascinating addition to the large number of books on Hemingway as a writer and a man. "Hemingway" may also be destructive to many components of the myth that surrounded one of America's most colorful authors and also unfair to the man himself. For who can really know the private thoughts and turbulent forces that shaped the man and ultimately led to the act of suicide that ended Hemingway's life in his Ketchum home July 2, 1961? In the end, it's all speculation.

Kenneth Lynn thinks he has one of the strongest clues to that mystery and many others surrounding this massive figure. And much of it can be laid at the strong maternal knees of Grace Hall Hemingway, Ernest's mother. For not only did Grace dress her son in frilly girl's clothes for a longer time than might have been seemly even at the start of the twentieth century (Hemingway was born in 1899), but she encouraged Marcelline, Hemingway's older sister, and her sibling to be like twins, even to keeping Marcelline back a grade so she could be in Ernest's class.

The result, according to the author, was sexual confusion and a fascination with male/female duality and androgyny that permeated the symbolism of many of his works and certainly dominated the artistic imagery of "Garden of Eden," Hemingway's last work-in-progress. (The book was posthumously edited and published in 1986.) Another by-product of his early life was "a lasting displeasure with his mother and a conviction that her bullying was a strong force in his father's suicide.

Lynn avers that much of the macho mystique Hemingway exhibited — in his own life and in his heroes, always closely intertwined, can be attributed to the scars left by his early confusion of sexual roles and by maternal domination.

He also theorized that Hemingway experienced a lifelong struggle with an attraction to death, leading to his suicide. Rather than seeing the suicide as a shocking act of cowardice, Lynn says it is amazing it didn't happen sooner,

given the circumstances. In confirmation, he quotes Norman Mailer: "It is not likely that Hemingway was a brave man who sought danger for the sake of the sensations it provided him. What is more likely the truth of his own odyssey is that he struggled with his own desire and the weight of anxiety with him which would have suffocated any man smaller than himself."

Lynn has combined thorough biographical research with acute literary examination in order to explore the implications of his premise.

His biographical sources are extensive: Lynn has delved into other biographies, letters, interviews, and a vast amount of supporting material. Often the reader gains fresh insights from this thoroughness, as in Lynn's account of the years of decline; the list of physical ailments which besieged Hemingway is — stupendous and horrifying.

He has also looked with perception at the literary works themselves. Sometimes this re-examination is highly rewarding and entertaining, akin to working a jigsaw puzzle. "A hat" we say, "Now I see how this all fits." Sometimes, however, the second-guessing is ludicrous, as in the author's repeated emphasis on some deep meaning behind the choice of very short hair for Marie, the Spanish love interest in "For Whom the Bell Tolls." To Lynn it is but another of Hemingway's transcendental fantasies. But then Lynn consistently finds an excess of interest in "hairstyle" in Hemingway's writings. Even in his personal life, his attraction to the woman with the boyish good looks of Pauline Pfeiffer, his second wife (who was an incarnation of the Vogue-inspired ideal twenties beauty) is, according to Lynn, just another sign of the writer's obsession with transsexuals. Lynn finds the symbolism everywhere. For example, in "The Snows of Kilimanjaro," Hemingway has the protagonist recall an early war memory, the sight of dead Creek soldiers in Anatolia, whose image is especially shocking because they are wearing skirts. Lynn posits that this detail was important not merely because Hemingway had had a first hand war memory with a self of dead women with short hair in the field outside of Milan, but that instead, "perhaps it was the conjunction of death and crossed sex that made the description as vivid to Hemingway."

Creator goes beyond cutting edge

KETCHUM — Debbie Edgers, 36, drives in an old black VW Bug that looks like it might be on its last wheel. She wears jeans and a tie-dyed t-shirt. When she laughs, you laugh with her, carried along by its contagiousness. Two weeks ago Edgers won best artist at the Sun Valley Arts and Crafts Fair.

Debbie Edgers paints, but hardly in the usual sense. She paints napkins and pillow cases and t-shirts and canvas lounge chairs with images of palm trees and snakes. She especially likes the snakes. "I used to play with snakes when I was a kid."

Voila, snake-painted napkins. Edgers says that everything she makes is something that she'd like to have — and insists that she's not looking at a certain market to try to sell something.

Everything she makes is also active, usable, wearable — art that doesn't just hang on the wall or sit in the corner. Edgers likes the idea that people who might not buy art can buy a napkin she painted and then use it.

But the main body of her artwork is sculpture. In her studio, among the snake napkins and painted shirts, plaster gauze sculptures of lizards, dogs and a giant porcupine head color the room in fantastic shades of orange and green.

In 1986 Edgers received a master's degree from the Museum School in Boston, a school affiliated with Tufts University. "That was so intense and serious," she says. "It taught you to be on the cutting edge of art. There's not a lot of humor in serious art; it's basically unhappy

and anger." After graduate school, Edgers began teaching children and her art perspective drastically changed. "Teaching the kids was definitely a turnaround," she says. "I saw what the children were doing. It was so free and effortless and exciting. I thought 'why can't I let loose, why can't I do that.' Children start to do preconceived ideas of what they have to do. If they want to paint a tree purple, they paint it purple."

Everything she makes is also active, usable, wearable — art that doesn't just hang on the wall or sit in the corner.

Since she started teaching the kids, Edgers has diversified, or as she puts it "exploded," into different mediums — sculptures, napkins, shirts, chairs. "One of the reasons I've exploded into all these different mediums is because for 17 years all I did was paint from real life and photographs. Now I don't especially care what I paint on."

The children she taught prompted a harmonic divergence of sorts, an expansion of artistic possibilities, resulting in snake-painted napkins, sculptures of dogs and orange porcupine heads. The humor inherent in her art is much different, she says, than so-called serious art. But, for her, the humor is necessary. "It's refreshing to stay on a level that keeps

some joy and humor in my art," she says. Indeed, the fun in Edgers' art bubbles up like carbonation. While the sculptured animals are, she says, the most important part of her work; they are also the most fun. Red-tongued, black and white spotted dogs with perked ears seem to wag their tails when you look away. You feel like petting them. Other dogs dance while multi-colored lizards and snakes peer out from the corners of her studio.

These sculptures, some on display at the Anne Reed Gallery in Ketchum, are built with plaster gauze, painted with acrylic and finished with a spray of varnish. Although it sounds quick, it's actually a long, involved process.

But not only are the animals fun themselves, Edgers has fun making them. "The animals that I love are the animals that I create," she says.

And she's not the only one who loves the animals she creates. "I was carrying one of my lizards and this woman grabbed it out of my hands. She just wanted to hold it," Edgers says.

Other people, she says, actually contribute to the work by naming the animals or inventing stories about them. A couple in Seattle was given two of Edgers' dogs — a male and a female — as a gift. The male dog had his leg lifted so they named the dogs Pokey and Mrs. Pokey after a dog they knew who urinated in the house all the time. "U-oh," they'd say, "Pokey piddled."

Edgers is now showing a sculptured dog with a bird on its back in the gallery. "It's like a fairy tale," Edgers says, "the dog and the bird that are friends." Except in this fairy tale, it's up to the person who buys the piece to finish the story.

'Hemingway' to be filmed in area

Social messages called for in children's TV

LOS ANGELES — Dr. Gordon Berry says there should be more to children's television than cuddly bears.

"We should force children to reach for ideas as we entertain them," said Berry, an educational psychologist who spends a lot of time looking at children's shows

and considering their effect on youngsters.

"They don't show us hard-hitting content as well as cuddly bears. Children are not little adults, but we do need to challenge them more."

He is a professor in the Graduate School of Education at UCLA, where he teaches courses in educational psychology. In addition, he is a longtime consultant to the production company Filmland and to CBS. He works

with filmmakers on the impact certain scenes might have on children and on insuring that shows have a pro-social content.

"I don't think we have enough diversity in the types of programs that are available," he said. "Children, like adults, need a range of program offerings. They need live-action shows as well as animation. That's why I'm happy to see a live-action show like Pee-wee Herman's."

Berry first became a consultant on "Fat Albert and the Cosby Kids." He has also worked with such programs as "Secret of Isis," "The US of Archie," "Captain Kangaroo," and "Shazam."

"Fat Albert" was a show that did not deal with the cognitive side, such as "Sesame Street," but with the affective side," Berry said. "It was a program that dealt with feelings, the importance of obeying

Exhibition brings Great Rift to CSI

Artists capture texture, sound

The work has been hand-lettered by Deb Tate on hand-pulled flax paper.

The paper works by Obermayr were laid out in the studio and then transported on cotton sheeting to the specific sites and coupled directly onto the rocks.

After an appropriate drying time, they were brought back to the studio and prepared for mounting and assembling.

Dr. Ferencz has been on the ISU faculty for six years in the music department.

He received his doctorate in composition from Kent State. Dr. Goldbeck teaches creative writing in the English Department and has published her work extensively. She was graduated from the University of Arizona.

 ...the importance of going to school.

Berry does not write any of the shows, but reviews the scripts and frequently makes suggestions.

"I think probably a major contribution I made was to identify some of the pro-social messages that young people should be exposed to, he said. Readers who prefer their heroes untarnished may find this book offensive. Readers who enjoy literary analysis will find it rich in fresh interpretation. If one acknowledges the wide spectrum of human impulses into a framework to fit one's central thesis, while Lynn exercises great care in avoiding both hazards, and indeed, consistently tries to find a balance between positive and negative in his assessment, this study should probably be read along with another biography such as the fine comprehensive work of Carlos Baker.

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'Monster Squad' is for the kid in all of us

HOLLYWOOD — "The Monster Squad" is such fun, it makes viewers wish they were kids again. Although childhood innocence may be gone, there is compensation in being able to appreciate the artistry with which director Fred Dekker and co-writer Stuart Black (who also wrote "Lethal Weapon") have brought to this horror-comedy-adventure aimed at youngsters.

It seems that once every 100 years there is a chance to tilt the balance between good and evil, provided you can get your hands on the ancient amulet, a glowing jewel which controls that balance. Wouldn't you know that the amulet has ended up in a derelict mansion on the edge of a typical American town? Anyway, Dracula (Duncan Regehr) is so determined to get his hands on it that he has rounded up some old pals — Frankenstein's Monster (Tom Noonan), Wolfman (Carl Thibault), Gill-Man (Tom Woodruff, Jr.) and the Mummy (Michael MacKay) — to help him out.

What Dracula has not reckoned with is the Monster Squad, a group of adolescent boys who have formed a fan club in celebration of their favorite monsters. Not surprisingly, when Dracula starts brewing trouble, it falls to the boys to ward off evil, because of course their parents do not believe in "monsters." "The Monster Squad" honors the imagination of children.

The squad's natural leader is Sean (Andre Gower); his pals are played by little Michael Faustino, feisty Robby Kiger and hefty but gungie Brent Chambers. Sean is the only one in the group who has discovered girls — is handsome Ryan Lambert, who drifts into the squad when he rescues Chaiem from some schoolyard bullies.

These are great kids, likably real and not maddeningly precocious in the hard-dying tradition of movie brats. Tagging along but not really welcome (until they really need her, naturally) is Sean's little sister Phoebe (Ashley Banks), who, befriends Frankenstein's Monster, who this time around would not hurt a fly.

Although "The Monster Squad" has for economy been shot largely on sound stages and back lots, there has been no stinting on special effects. Visual effects producer Richard Edlund, winner of four Oscars for the "Star Wars" trilogy and "Raiders of the Lost Ark," has come up with such dainties as a vortex that sucks people into another dimension. Monster makeup effects supervisor Stan Winston (another Oscar winner with "Aliens" and "The Terminator" among his credits) is another strong contributor. His monsters honor the originals yet seem more individual and more expressive than is usual.

Kubrick's Vietnam is powerful yet mad

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

FULL METAL JACKET (R). In this film, director Stanley Kubrick brings his rigorous artistic eye to Vietnam to create a powerful and centered statement of outrage. Although its two sections — observing the antiseptic madness of Parris Island and the too-mortal chaos in Vietnam proper — are not perfectly balanced, it is a muscular return to form for the man who made "Dr. Strangelove" and "A Clockwork Orange." And in a superb cast of mostly unknowns, Vincent D'Onofrio and ex-Marine drill instructor Leo Erenny are exceptional.

LA BAMBIA (PG-13). Although this film of the tragically brief life of Latino rocker Ritchie Valens has its strengths, especially the fine turn by the unknown Lou Diamond Phillips, the wonder is that the movie isn't full of raw energy, that it's for the most part polite melodrama. There is the music, however, great dollops of '50s songs, and it lifts the movie when the dia-

logue and the earnest-but-uninspired direction (by Luis Valdez) keeps it earthbound.

THE LIVING DAYLIGHTS (PG). Yes, the new Bond — Timothy Dalton — is splendid, and everything

Bondish is back in force: hurtling cars, parachutes, ski troops, paratroops, troops of soldiers, troops of Afghan heroin fighters, missives, missiles, freedom and heroines.

THE LOST BOYS (R) — There is

always room for some good, fancy trash and this movie — about a gang of punk vampires terrorizing the new kids in town — seems capable of providing some. It begins amazingly, with ominous decor and sizzling music.

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Disney favorites top kid video sales

Cartoon and feature releases for the children are snagging a larger and larger share of home-video sales each season. In a recent Billboard magazine sales list, kidvids held six of the top 20 spots.

The most animated seller of them all has been Disney's "Sleeping Beauty," released last October as part of a Christmas package.

It was the top-selling video of the year and has held a spot in the top 10 — at times No. 1 — ever since. During last year's Christmas promotion, Disney sold 4.9 million cassettes, including more than 1 million copies of "Sleeping Beauty."

Many major video producers are running summer specials, hoping to clear the shelves for the fall's Christmas releases. One of this summer's leaders is "The Care Bears Family Treasure Chest" by Lorimar Home Video. This feature-length production has four new adventures of the lovable family ("The Cloud of Unseeing," "Lost at Sea," "Grana Bears Thanking Surprise" and "Robot Bear") and would normally list at \$89.95.

Lorimar released this 75-minute cassette this summer at \$59.95 and then cut prices on its two previous Care Bear releases and several other Kideo Video feature-length titles from \$89.95 to \$39.95.

Most other major suppliers

have marked their \$19.95-to-\$39.95 favorites down to under \$15.

Vestron now ("for a limited time only") has 15 of its most popular titles at \$14.98.

The list includes two Babars, two Little Ponies, a Smurfs, and three "Reading Rainbows," the acclaimed PBS series hosted by LeVar Burton that encourages children to read for enjoyment.

Vestron also has two one-hour videos due for September release at \$29.98. "The Little Prince: Back to Earth" and "Daddy Long Legs." Two fully animated tales, "On the Wings of Love" and "Rob the Rainbow," feature the Little Prince, created by master storyteller Antoine de Saint-Exupery. "Daddy Long Legs" is a fully animated adaptation of the Jean Webster classic.

Who hasn't enjoyed the Muppet? Ten of Jim Henson's popular videos are included in a "Best-of-the-Muppets" special at \$14.98 apiece.

Disney has mopped up with its May release of eight new \$14.95 tapes, with the "High-Ho" sing-along, "Here's Mickey" and "Winnie the Pooh and a Day for Eeyore" leading the assault.

The Pooh tapes have been doing surprisingly well. A British group illustrated the first one and Disney did the last three since purchasing the estate of author A. A. Milne, and the right to create additional Pooh releases.

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Sassy show "Designing Women" showcases Dixie Carter's talent

During the first season of "Designing Women," there was little to suggest that the show would eventually find itself in the ratings top 10, as it frequently has this summer. The series premiered on Mondays in September to critical praise and good ratings. But CBS inexplicably moved it to a tough new Thursday-night time slot, and when it failed to make any headway against "Night Court," the network yanked the show off the air. Viewers protested, and most of CBS's other new shows flopped, so the network returned it, first to Sundays, where it also failed to make any headway, and finally back to its original Monday-night niche.

It's not surprising, then, that series stars Dixie Carter, Delta

Burke, Jean Smart and Annie Potts are hoping that the upcoming season brings fewer surprises.

"Marcy, I hope so," says Carter, who plays Julia Sugarbaker, the oldest and steadiest of four women who run an interior-design business in Atlanta. "I think the audience is finally getting used to us."

Early on, the series' writing earned it a reputation as the sassiest show on television. "Part of the appeal of the show is a sort of curiosity," Carter explains. "What on earth will Suzanne say next? or 'How dare they!' It piques the interest of the audience."

Another distinctive aspect of the series is the Southern accents of its stars. All the stars but Smart are native Southerners, and creator Linda Bloodworth-Thomason has said that she set out to portray the New South.

But Carter, who was born in Tennessee, says that Southern roots are all she shares with her character. "Julie is very unlike me," she says. "She's more combative than I am. She doesn't mind a confrontation; I do."

"You have to bring part of your-

self of the character, though," she says. "Doing the show every week, you're playing her too often not to."

Carter pursued careers as an opera singer, a stage actress and a full-time mother before a role in the daytime soap "The Edge of Night" turned her into a TV actress. A starring role on the CBS sitcom "Filthy Rich" introduced her to Bloodworth-Thomason, who then created the "Designing Women" role with her in mind. "TV just sort of presented itself to me, sort of came and got me," says Carter, who is married to actor Hal Holbrook.

Lately, her avocation has been cabaret singing. But viewers won't hear Julie Sugarbaker warbling. "I don't think a singer can be presented — how should I say? — advantageously on a sitcom," Carter says. "So in the next few months I'll do my acting around the show. I'm very happy when I'm doing it. I'll do it whenever I can."



"Tour of Duty" has plenty action with emphasis on relationships

LOS ANGELES — The conflict they called "The Living Room War" is coming back to television in a new series that takes a grunt's eye view of the Vietnam War.

"Tour of Duty" on CBS, like the Academy Award-winning film "Platoon" and "Full Metal Jacket," arrives with the assumption that the nation is at last ready to accept entertainment dealing with the controversial war.

"Our show's set in 1967 when the camaraderie of the troops was at a peak and there wasn't an overwhelming feeling by the GIs that the whole country was against their efforts," says Terence Knox, who stars as Sgt. Zeke Anderson.

"So it's possible to do a series in a steadfastly unpolitical manner. The thing that's been said by all the veterans is they didn't give two whips about the politics when they were in Nam. They thought only of taking care of one another and keeping each other alive."

"You see the protester in the pilot. He said the war was wrong. Anderson told him, 'Yeah, but the important part is staying alive.' A lot of veterans turned against the war later, but when they were getting shot at no one had the luxury of thinking about politics."

Knox, whose character is on his third tour in Vietnam, says "Tour of Duty" essentially is "an action-adventure series with a heavy emphasis on relationships."

The last time television looked at war in a series was on "M-A-S-H," a comedy about a front-line medical unit in the Korean War. But the show began in 1972, the year before the United States pulled out of Vietnam, and really, was a metaphor for Vietnam. "Combat," in the 1960s, followed a World War II Army platoon.

"Tour of Duty" will be filmed on location at Schofield Barracks in Hawaii, where there is a large population of Vietnamese to call on for the shows.

"Sgt. James Stephens at Schofield is working with us on the show," says Knox. "He's served two tours in Vietnam and gives us an air of authenticity. As actors, we're

soft-footed, and trying to earn some respect. It's great to have some veterans showing us what to do. The soldiers around Schofield tend to sneer at us.

"Authenticity takes first seat with us. You can make a few errors in a hospital show or police show. I was on 'St. Elsewhere' and it was as true as you can get, but there were still a few errors. Something as sensitive as Vietnam you don't want to make errors."

Knox says he believes the series will have an opportunity to do "some great stories" without resorting to "sensational tricks."

The one-hour show is up against "The Cosby Show" on NBC and its new spin-off, "A Different World." ABC has two low-rated comedies in that time slot.

Even within CBS there is some opposition to the show. Still, CBS was faced with a similar situation in 1972. NBC's "Flip Wilson Show" on Thursday was considered unbeatable. CBS fielded a honey-lit drama called "The Waltons" and everyone waited for the laughter.

In that case, the Christians ate the lion. Wilson was off the air in two

years and "The Waltons" was in the Top 10.

This is the third series for Knox, who was an original member of the cast of NBC's "St. Elsewhere." His character, Dr. Peter White, turned bad and was killed off. He was also killed in the CBS miniseries "Murder Ordained" and in the TV movie "City Killer."

He also starred briefly with Beth Armstrong in the NBC comedy "All Is Forgiven."

Knox grew up in Washington state and studied at Washington State University. He also studied acting at Portland State University in Oregon.

"I was a fire lookout on the Smith River near Coos Bay," he says. "I'd spend about three weeks there in the woods with just me and dirty magazines. I was with the State Forestry Service and we cut and burned and made fire trails."

"That was during my Ken Kesey period, when I was trying to be a writer. In a year and a half I wrote one short story. It was after that that I decided to go into acting."

"Cagney & Lacey" mix high action with social message next season

In the real world of police work, you'll never meet a pair of cops like Christine Cagney and Mary Beth Lacey. They're larger than life — smart, tough, brave and too cerebral to match the public image of a police officer.

In a society reeling with crime, this duo handles no petty cases. Only the big, dramatic stuff that makes headlines — and jolting, punch-'em-in-the-belly TV.

Last year, Martin Kove, the actor who plays macho Detective Isbecki, was ungracious enough to call Cagney and Lacey "female chauvinists."

In his view, they made all the men "look like wimps." Obviously, it did not cross Kove's mind that this might be the very quality that delights the "Cagney & Lacey" audience, which happens to be mainly female.

Despite the rough, tough, nasty nature of their business, Cagney and Lacey have established themselves as compassionate women. They hate injustice; they are fiercely protective of the little guy. And because they are on a permanent crusade for a better world, Cagney and Lacey spare us the violence and mayhem that are the nerve and sinew of TV's crime shows.

Rarely do we see a car chase, a bloody knife fight or a massive shoot-up in a back alley. Oh, yes, Christine once had to shoot a man in self-defense, but she hated herself afterward.

In the daring and highly original characters of Cagney and Lacey, you have the show's life force. You also have the reason it will be returning to CBS for a sixth season (Monday nights).

In a medium clotted with assembly-line action-adventure shows, "Cagney & Lacey" has found a new formula for longevity: intense conflict — with lots of social significance. These cool, pistol-toting dames with the razor tongues really care about people, about causes.

The show's longevity is the more remarkable considering its troubled history. "Cagney & Lacey" has survived abysmal ratings (in its early years), two cancellation notices, major cast changes and organized pressure from right-wing groups.

Now producer Barney Rosenzweig is riding the crest. The show he "shopped around" for five years before CBS finally picked it had an average weekly rating of 15.1 in its fifth season against Oscars, Emmys and Monday-night football.

That translates into more than 13 million viewers and the kind of demographics that make a network executive purr. Over the summer, the show has been running in the Top 20. A nominee for Emmys every year since its inception, and an Emmy winner for the past two years, "Cagney & Lacey" received seven Emmy nominations for the season just ended.

With 63 percent of the audience female, the question arises,

What sort of female? Answer: college-educated, over 35, with average incomes of \$40,000 a year. These are viewers with money to spend on the sponsors' products. Teen-agers and children are said to

comprise only 8 percent of the audience.

Why is this tale of two policewomen such a wild success? The reasons are many, all pointing an object lesson for neophytes.

First, the steady, solid and endearing performances, week after week, by Sharon Gless as Cagney and Tyne Daly as Lacey. Second, the shrewd, superbly crafted scripts, about half of them written each season by women.

One of the chief writers had been Terry Louise Fisher, former deputy district attorney of Los Angeles County (1971 to 1974) and a sometime novelist, who is now with "L.A. Law."

In its early years "Cagney & Lacey" was filmed in Manhattan, which provided an added dimension of reality. Now it's the typical Hollywood set, with only the exteriors filmed in New York.

ABC takes gamble Parton boosts ratings with its new variety show

MARINA DEL REY, Calif. — Talk to Dolly Parton, and it's easy to see how she convinced network executives to fork over millions to give her a weekly variety show with a two-year guarantee.

The country songstress and movie star has more confidence in her newly pared-down, 95-pound body than Madison Square Garden contains on pro wrestling night.

"I decided to do the show because I felt that I could do it well," Parton said, perched on a stool at a news conference in a yacht club. "Everybody around me has been a lot more frightened than me. I have a lot of confidence that I can do it."

Her show, "Dolly," debuting this fall on Sunday night, will be a linchpin in the ABC schedule. ABC finished third last season and has a lot riding on the upcoming television year.

Add to that the fact that network variety shows have been abandoned in recent years since cable took much of the duty of entertaining the viewing public via music and comedy, and the Parton show looks like a pretty expensive gamble.

But country singer Barbara Mandrell had a successful variety series for two years on NBC until she quit, overcome by the hectic pace. And we are talking Dolly Parton here, megastar in many an American social stratum, an entertainer who talks often and sincerely of "the people."

Parton's production company owns the show. The two years ABC promises to keep her on the air, she says, is enough time to "get it right." And she has signed up Don Mischler, a successful producer of variety specials like the Grammy Awards.

"I just don't believe that it's true that variety television is dead," Parton said. "I think people would like to see music and comedy and fun things again on TV."

Her show will be taped at the ABC studios in Los Angeles, but she will go on location — to a women's prison, to the reversed-sex ogling club Chippendale's, and on dream "dates" with desirable men, like Tom Selleck, perhaps. "As they say, it's a dirty job but somebody's got to do it," Parton said. Other regular



segments will include "Vanity Fair," with Dolly as a beautician talking on semiserious subjects with the gals, and "Dew Drop Inn," a comic interlude set in a country-western bar.

Her guests are slated to include Lily Tomlin and Jane Fonda, Parton's co-stars in the hit movie "9 to 5," and she has already booked Pee Wee Herman, Tom Petty and Little Richard. She said her "wish list" includes Mikhail Baryshnikov, Liza Minnelli, Frank Sinatra and Bob Dylan.

"We're really going to do basically what everybody's done, but hopefully it'll be a little different because it'll be me," she said.

"The realer I can stay — even though I look phony — I think that will be one of the keys to the success of the show."

One of the most interesting guests might turn out to be the real Dolly Parton, sans big, blonde wigs and skin-tight spangles.

"Hopefully, with the show, I'll be

able to have a lot of different looks, too," she said. "I'll be able to look more elegant at times. I'll be able to look softer at times, and I'll be able to dress down at times, depending on the character. And you know, it'll actually be a chance for people to see me looking different ways and natural."

There's a lot less Dolly than there used to be — try size zero jeans. It took her four years on every diet that came along — including one she had never heard of billed as "the Dolly Parton diet" — but she eventually lost more than 40 pounds, she said. She finds her current 95 pounds — just fine — for her height, 5 foot 1.

"A lot of people think I'm too skinny now, but I think a lot of it is because they've seen me so fat for so long," Parton said.

"A lot of people just didn't know I was such a little, bitty person until I lost all that lard. ... I'm just a little, bitty person with a great, big mouth."

Stupid tricks on Letterman

NEW YORK (AP) — They chug-a-lug beer, spin around in clothes dryers, dive head-first onto the floor, play tunes on unusual parts of the body, inadvertently set off fire alarms and occasionally throw up.

"I could send out a flyer that says, 'We don't care what you can stick up your nose, we aren't interested,'" said Susan Hall Sheehan, the hard-nosed but good-natured and apparently iron-stomached woman who auditions Stupid Human-Tricks for "Late Night with David Letterman."

Sheehan took over the job from Chris Elliott when he graduated to staff writer. She said he used to place ads in such outlets as college newspapers that opened with the question, "Can you do something odd?"

"We decided the word 'odd' was a mistake. Between that and 'For more information, call Susan,' I got a lot of obscene phone calls," Sheehan said in an interview in her cubicle beneath a wall of photos of Stupid Pet Trick alumni, whom she also auditioned.

If human tricks have merit and pose no immediate threat to her safety, Sheehan conducts first-phase auditions in person for those who can get to New York. Hopefuls in other parts of the country can send videotapes. If Sheehan approves of the trick, the show's producer, Barry Sanford, sees it.

Unusual aptitudes that might dazzle the average beer-bust crowd do not necessarily make it on network TV.

"A lot of people can play the 'William Tell Overture' on different parts of their body," Sheehan said. "Or the Maxwell House theme on their face."

Tying cherry stems is no good — "It's all done in the mouth." A Wall Street analyst could shoot a rubber band and get it to roll back toward him, but the trick was "too small" to show up well on camera.

"We had a schoolteacher from Massachusetts who could dive off a desk headfirst into a styrofoam cup of water that had a little newspaper wreath of fire around it," she said, with admiration. "It looked great in slow motion."

Just a dash of panache can turn a mundane trick like spinning in a clothes dryer into *bonito* late-night entertainment.

"We had a lot of calls of guys who could ride around in a dryer, but it wasn't enough," Sheehan said.

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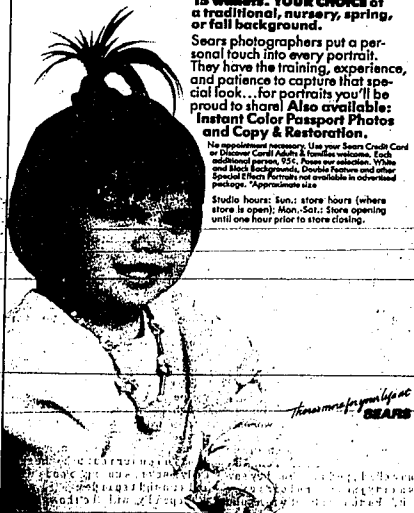
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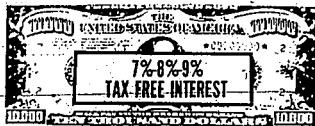
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
