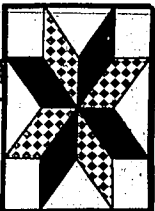

Selby fasts as high court denies final appeal

POINT OF THE MOUNTAIN, Utah (AP) — Condemned "Hi-Fi" killer Pierre Dale Selby fasted, sang hymns and prayerfully read the Bible Thursday as the U.S. Supreme Court denied a last appeal for a stay of his scheduled execution Friday morning.

Prison would be Utah's first since Gary Gilmore faced a firing squad in January 1977, ending a 10-year national moratorium on the death penalty. It also would be the first in 27 years outside the South in which the condemned exhausted all appeals.

WASHINGTON — The number of U.S. cities with too much ozone-polluting their air dropped to 62 in 1984-86, but the holdouts included such places as Los Angeles that have no chance of meeting federal standards by the end of the year, the government said Thursday.

when 76 cities violated the ozone standard and 81 violated the carbon monoxide standard, Rice said.

The EPA also said 65 cities violated the limits on carbon monoxide during 1984-86.

U.S., Soviets could reach long-range weapons agreement

WASHINGTON — U.S. and Soviet arms control negotiators could go far beyond an expected ban on intermediate-range missiles and agree to cut in half the arsenals of long-range strategic nuclear weapons before the end of this year, the chief U.S. delegate to the Geneva talks said Thursday.

"We want the strategic 50 percent reductions... also to be decided

and agreed upon during the Reagan administration," Max Kampelman said. "We could do it by the end of the year, in my opinion."

Although Kampelman hedged his prediction by saying that an agreement could be reached only if the Soviets assign more negotiators to the talks to permit an increased pace of bargaining, his comments were far from optimistic for a senior administration official concerning the deadlocked Strategic Arms

Reduction talks.

"We're close enough now that if the Soviets will join in the effort, and that means beefing up their team (in Geneva) as well... we can get that (START agreement) done by the end of the year," Kampelman said in an interview with broadcaster John McLaughlin taped Thursday to be aired Sunday on his "One on One" program.

Kampelman sought to revive public interest in the START negotia-

tions one day after West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl removed a major obstacle to an intermediate nuclear force agreement by offering to eliminate Bonn's 72 aging Pershing I-A missiles on the United States and the Soviet Union implement an agreement banning all other INF weapons.

Kampelman said there was no formal linkage between the INF and START proposals. He said INF could stand on its own, though the

administration believed that it would be better to follow it with a strategic weapons agreement.

A Soviet spokesman praised Kohl's action Thursday, joining President Reagan in endorsing the plan. That appears to seal the compromise and clears the way for completion of the INF talks, possibly by Secretary of State George P. Shultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze next in Washington Sept. 15 in a session

that could lay the groundwork for a summit conference between Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

The Soviets have demanded an end to the "Star Wars" program, a step that the United States has adamantly refused to take to achieve a space weapons pact. And Moscow has stated that it would not agree to a START treaty unless a space weapons agreement had already been reached.

Selby, Brooklyn, N.Y., was moved from death row to the holding cell only yards from the execution chamber after he spoke with relatives by telephone Wednesday night. Benavidez said Selby's fast began Thursday morning, although he slipped liquids throughout the day.

Selby's 12-year battle to escape the death penalty for what many consider was Utah's most notorious crime ended in a flurry of appeals Thursday that, like their predecessors, were all denied.

At 4:20 p.m., a panel of three judges of the 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals meeting in Salt Lake City refused to block the execution, rejecting claims by Selby's attorneys that he had been denied due process at his competency hearing before the state Board of Pardons Aug. 13-14.

Three hours later, the same three appellate judges denied a pair of de-

fense petitions for a rehearing, one of them after the full court, which is based in Denver.

U.S. District Court clerk Norman Fox said the unanimous denial came after briefs were transmitted by telex to Denver for review by four of the court's other judges, who then participated in a 7 p.m. conference call with their three colleagues in Utah.

Defense attorney Ron Yenigich said "we thought we'd get a stay" in the 10th Circuit.

"Under existing Supreme Court authority or any reasonable extensions thereof, no substantial grounds on which relief might be granted exist in this case," said Judge Monroe McKay, speaking for the panel, which deliberated 35 minutes after the initial afternoon appeal.

The appellate court's decision followed an hour of oral arguments which roughly duplicated points made Thursday morning before U.S. District Judge David Sam, who likewise rejected Selby's petition, filed Wednesday, after 2½ hours of

arguments and 75 minutes of deliberation.

In their appeals, defense attorneys sought a stay of execution and a certificate of probable cause that would force an evidentiary hearing into the constitutionality of Selby's commutation hearing.

They argued the competency board should have allowed them to cross-examine witnesses, offer rebuttal and have full access to prosecution files. They also contended the board, by limiting each side to five hours, had failed to permit the full review mandated by state law.

The written appeal to Sam also claimed that the board was influenced by Gov. Norm Bangert's statement that he would be disappointed if Selby's sentence were commuted to life.

"The petitioner has been afforded every conceivable opportunity for judicial review of his conviction and sentence," said Sam. He said defense arguments did not apply because the three-member pardons board was not subject to judicial review.

Those added to the list were Cleveland; Duluth, Minn.; Houston;

Lincoln, Neb.; Springfield, Mo.; Wichita, Kan., and Modesto, Calif.

Ozone is a form of oxygen that comes from chemical reactions in sunlight between nitrogen oxides, the combustion fossil fuels and chemicals such as unburned gasoline and certain solvents.

A layer of ozone 15 miles to 25 miles high protects the earth from harmful ultra-violet rays, but ground-level ozone is a key element in smog and cannot be added to the protective layer.

Congress has not said what will happen to cities that fail to meet the standards by the Dec. 31 deadline, Rice said. However, the EPA already has begun enforcement actions against cities that either have failed to develop an approved plan to reduce the pollution or that have failed to carry out previously approved plans.

Such sanctions include bans on construction of major new sources of pollution and cuts in federal grants.

So far, EPA Administrator Lee Thomas has proposed construction bans for 14 cities and cutoff of highway and clean air funds for Cleveland.

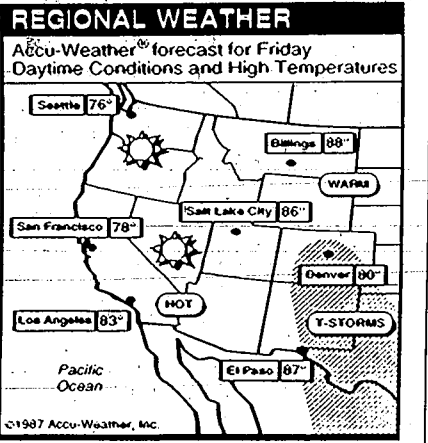
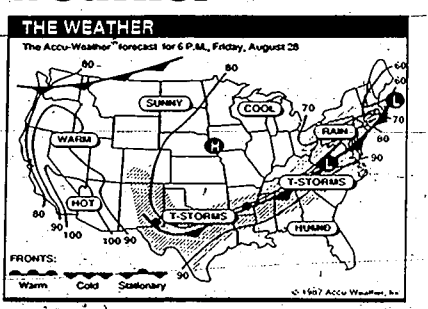

percent, that's a pretty good indication the School Board is willing to work and be as fair as they possibly can to teachers," Espil said.

Stimpson said, while he was pleased with the 10.3 percent raise, he isn't sure about changes made in contract and negotiating-agreement wording.

The changes altered how the district will determine when talks have stalled and when to extend the old contract if talks didn't produce an agreement, Stimpson said.

He said teachers are concerned about those wording changes and taking a "wait and see attitude."

But Johnson said the board was merely trying to gain flexibility in future negotiations.

"I don't think we've gained an advantage as far as the contract, but it gives the board more flexibility," Johnson said.

The settlement marks a peaceful end to a year marked with disputes over teacher policies at the district.

Teachers announced a vote of "no confidence" in Superintendent Richard Smith late last year after a dip in enrollment.

Smith's resignation during that battle.

He refused to resign and Johnson said his financial leadership, part of which is the building of a \$170,000 contingency fund and not relying on supplemental override levies, is one reason the board was able to give teachers a raise this year.

Contras want aid held in escrow

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Leaders of the Nicaraguan Contras pressed to President Reagan on Thursday that further military aid to their movement be held in escrow pending the outcome of peace-making initiatives.

Following a meeting with Reagan and the president's top aides, including Secretary of State George P. Shultz, Alfredo Aguilar announced that the Contras were willing to have "lethal" aid hang in limbo until at least Nov. 7, the cease-fire deadline envisioned in the Guatemala City peace plan.

Cesar said that the Contras asked that the U.S. government "go ahead and approve new aid for the Nicaraguan Resistance after the

30th of September."

"The aid will contain a humanitarian part that will be disbursed immediately and cautiously without interruption, and a lethal part that will remain in escrow" unless President Daniel Ortega's government "does not comply with the peace plan objective" by Nov. 7.

Cesar said the peace plan is "exactly what we prefer," and said the response of U.S. officials was "favorable, but without a final decision."

Chief presidential spokesman Martin Fitzwater, standing on the dais with the Contra figures, said, "We find the resistance proposal to be a constructive, forthcoming approach that we can — generally support.

However, we will need to consider the technical aspects of the proposal before making a final decision."

Fitzwater said no funding figures were discussed in the private meeting that Reagan, Shultz and others had with the Contra leaders.

"It is our belief we are making all the good-faith efforts to give a chance to diplomacy," Cesar said.

At the outset of that meeting, Reagan told the Contra leaders "we have to thank you for" — and said he would "see to it that you have adequate funding" until a cease-fire is achieved.

Poindexter seeks retirement from Navy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rear Adm. John P. Poindexter, the former national security adviser who resigned in the wake of the Iran-Contra affair, has submitted a request to retire from the Navy this fall, Pentagon sources said Thursday.

And in what could prove a controversial move, Poindexter has asked that he be retired with the rank he held while working at the White House — vice admiral — instead of the rank he holds now.

Such a request ultimately would have to be approved by President Reagan and then confirmed by the Senate.

The sources, who agreed to discuss the matter only if not identified, said the difference in the pension for a three-star admiral compared to a two-star admiral with Poindexter's length of service is only about \$250 a year.

Poindexter made the request "as a matter of principle," believing he is entitled to the extra star in retirement because of his service in a lesser job at the White House, one official said.

Normally, a military officer cannot retire at a higher rank unless he held that rank for at least three years. It is not unusual, however, for retired admirals to have that rule waived at the discretion of the president and the Senate.

In Poindexter's case, such approval is not likely to be automatic. During the recently completed congressional hearings on the Iran-Contra scandal, Poindexter testified he purposely kept President Reagan in the dark about the diversion of profits from Iranian arms sales to the U.S.-backed Nicaraguan Contra guerrillas.

The 51-year-old Poindexter, a

1968 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy, is currently serving as a special assistant to the chief of naval operations for long-range planning. He assumed that post after resigning as the president's national security advisor last November and returning to the Navy.

The sources said Poindexter had submitted his retirement request to the Navy on Wednesday, specifying a desire to step down effective Oct. 1.

Efforts to contact Poindexter to discuss his decision were not immediately successful.

Poindexter and his former aide, Lt. Col. Oliver North, are both said to be the object of a special investigation by an independent counsel named to probe the Iran-Contra affair. North, who was fired from his National Security Council job, continues on active duty with the Marine Corps.

Proxmire shuns sixth term Senate bid



WILLIAM PROXMIRE Won't defend seat in 1988

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — Sen. William Proxmire, who built a national reputation as a fiscal watchdog during three decades in the U.S. Senate, announced Thursday he will not seek a sixth term in 1988.

"I'd be almost 80 years old when I retired in 1994, or whenever it is," said the 71-year-old Democrat. "That's too old."

The announcement came 30 years to the day after he first won his Senate seat. It stunned many politicians and triggered speculation of wide-open Democratic and Republican primaries for the seat held by "Pro" a landslide victor in recent elections.

Proxmire, whose monthly "Golden Fleece Awards" spotlighted government waste, said he never realized his major goal of bringing "sanity to our fiscal spending."

"The budget was \$39 billion when I went to the Senate and it's now \$1

trillion, 12 1/2 times greater than it was in 1957," he said.

But Proxmire, chairman of the Senate Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs Committee, said he thoroughly enjoyed his Senate career, where he set a record by answering every roll call since 1966.

Only two senators, John Stennis, D-Miss., and Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., have longer tenure in the Senate than Proxmire.

Proxmire was known for running re-election campaigns on a shoestring, and for tireless campaigning which included almost weekly visits to Wisconsin to meet with constituents.

He once estimated he shook hands with 200,000 people a year.

"I ran twice for re-election (1976 and 1982) without accepting contributions," said Proxmire. He said he spent \$177.75 in 1982, most

of it for postage and stationery to return contributions.

"I really think that about two-thirds of the (Senate) incumbents could run for re-election without spending a nickel," Proxmire said.

"Incumbents have a terrific advantage, including staff," he said. "It would cost you a million bucks to replace that staff."

Proxmire entered the Senate after a special election victory over former Gov. Walter J. Kohler Jr. for the vacancy created by the death of Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R-Wis., whose anti-Communist efforts had made him a national figure.

"The odds against me were 15-1," said Proxmire, who had lost three races for governor.

Republican Gov. Tommy G. Thompson and U.S. Sen. Robert Kastner, R-Wis., joined Democratic leaders in praising Proxmire.

FAA calls for much closer scrutiny to improve performance of pilots

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The Federal Aviation Administration called Thursday for a "hard look" at ways to improve cockpit discipline in the wake of a rash of flight crew mistakes and evidence that pilot errors caused a crash that killed 156 people in Detroit.

About 250 chief pilots from the nation's airlines and other officials gathered in an unusual meeting called by the FAA to discuss ways to develop better safeguards against pilot mistakes.

The session comes less than two weeks after the crash near Detroit of Northwest Airlines Flight 255.

Evidence from that accident is pointing increasingly toward an apparent failure by the veteran Northwest pilots to set the wing flaps for takeoff, keeping the jetliner from gaining adequate lift.

The Detroit crash and several other incidents this summer that nearly resulted in tragedies have put renewed focus on pilot performance, prompting the FAA to call Thursday's meeting.

FAA officials as well as the industry expressed doubt, however, that the session is likely to result in any immediate changes in pilot training or operating procedures.

"The most I would expect is creation of an industry wide group to take a closer look at the issue," said one official, who spoke on the condition that he not be identified by name.

Even before the meeting began, however, the Air Line Pilots Association questioned why there has not been a greater commitment from the federal government to improve pilot training and cockpit management.

The pilots union said there was widespread agreement between the industry and the FAA three years ago for a \$9.4 million, three-year program aimed at looking for ways to solve human problems in the cockpit.

That program was laid out after a series of workshops conducted by the FAA on so-called "human factors" problems involving flight

crew, the union said.

But to date, noted ALPA president Henry Duffy, less than \$1 million of that money has been provided and the program has never gotten off the ground.

Concern about pilot errors has been expressed for years. Experts say about 40 percent of airline accidents are linked at least partly to flight crew mistakes.

But the Detroit crash and several other incidents this summer has refocused interest about the way pilots are conducting themselves in the cockpit.

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Nunn won't run in presidential race

ATLANTA (AP) — Sen. Sam Nunn of Georgia dashed the hopes of conservative Democrats on Thursday with his announcement that he would not run for president in 1988, although he said "I felt like the chances of winning were really there."

Nunn, chairman of the Armed Services Committee, said his Senate and family responsibilities came first. His decision ended a year of speculation and disappointed Democrats who wanted a candidate who could attract crucial votes in the conservative South.

Says Senate takes priority amidst active campaigning, with the possibility of others entering the process.

"Now that he has decided not to run, I can say candidly that there are an awful lot of people around the country and in my native South and in Georgia who told me that in the event he doesn't run, they're going to look favorably upon my candidacy," Gore said.

Thus far, Nunn said, no candidate has emerged "with the expression of the kind of philosophy and the kind of values that the people of the South are looking for."

"That doesn't mean that could not happen, but I believe the Democratic Party in the South is a profile of the general election type of voter that we will have in 1988," Nunn told a news conference.

Earlier, Nunn, 48, had sent a five-paragraph letter to supporters that told of his decision.

"I know myself pretty well, and I have concluded that if I attempted to run for president, and also carry out my Senate duties, I would wind up doing neither well," the letter said.

"With a son in high school and a daughter in college, I am also concerned about the impact of a presidential campaign on my family."

The three-term senator, his party's leading expert on defense matters, had postponed his presidential decision last February, citing his duties on the Armed Services panel and his assignment to the Iran-Contra select committee.

In his letter, Nunn did not discuss his future political plans or say which candidate he will support for the party's nomination. He wrote supporters that "the Democratic Party has an impressive slate of can-

Gorbachev could emerge net winner in arms control treaty

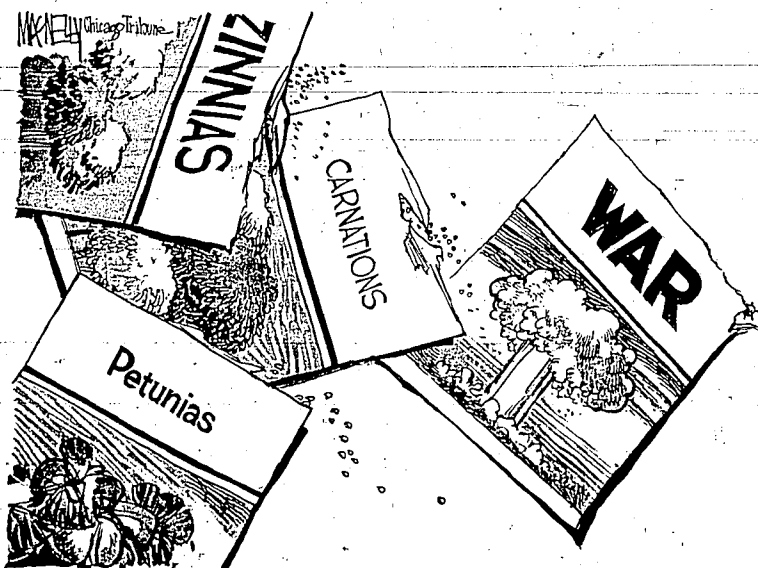
Ronald Reagan is confounding his left-wing critics and infuriating his allies on the right. Unless something now goes terribly awry, he will soon conclude his first arms-control treaty with the Soviet Union.

Michael S. Gorbachev, leader of the "evil empire," will appear in Washington for a summit and signing ceremony that will trigger the first-ever agreed destruction of a whole class of nuclear weapons — the so-called Euro-missiles. Yet unless Reagan is both prudent and wise, he will score a triumph at home but Gorbachev will emerge as the net winner abroad.

This week, U.S.-Soviet negotiations on intermediate-range nuclear forces in Europe have gone from expectations to end game. Concessions by Washington and Bonn, the latter clogging at U.S. behest, have removed the last two apparent obstacles to agreement. Before the ink is dry and the seals are affixed, it is risky to say that all is over and done with. If the Soviets raise new objections they will tarnish their newly burnished peacemaker image in Western Europe.

Under White House pressure to conclude an agreement, the Pentagon has forced finally to admit something that the arm-control community has argued for years — that the United States already has a considerable capacity to verify Soviet compliance with agreements. Faced with Gorbachev's willingness to accept intrusive on-site inspection in both countries, it was U.S. intelligence agencies and not the KGB that balked. It became apparent that the Soviets have more to learn from inspecting U.S. military installations and high-tech factories than we do from inspecting theirs. Meanwhile, the government of West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl decided that it could not afford to stand between the United States



and an arms agreement. Late in the game the Soviets had raised a new and secure issue: West Germany's ownership of 72 aging Pershing 1-A ballistic missiles, topped with U.S. nuclear warheads. "These must go," the Soviets demanded. They sought to cause mischief between a U.S. government anxious for agreement and a West German government still reeling from a year of East-West diplomacy in which the terms and degree of the U.S. commitment

to European security have been cast in doubt. From Kohl's perspective, the destruction of both long- and shorter-range INF missiles would leave only short-range battlefield weapons. These, in a phrase that has tolling political piffet in the Federal Republic, would "kill only Germans" — in either East or West. Keeping the Pershing 1-A's would provide some ballistic-missile reach beyond East Germany's eastern

border. They would also stand as a mute plea to Washington to give pledges of its steadfastness. Now, on the destruction of U.S. and Soviet weapons, the German missiles will go, too. The Soviets have always understood that the object of the Euro-missile negotiations has been to affect Western European opinion and to determine relative U.S. and Soviet influence there. With the signing of a Euro-missile treaty, Gorbachev

will gain the lion's share of credit on the Continent. In terms of promoting European security, the Soviet Union is seen as the prodigal son while the Americans are the children who remained loyal — and who resent the affection lavished on the prodigal. Public euphoria over the fact of any U.S.-Soviet arms-control agreement — the details hardly matter — will not last long, however. Then the United States must prove its

mettle in outmaneuvering the Soviets. Even though many U.S. nuclear weapons will remain on the Continent, Moscow will press its line that the Euro-missile agreement means the progressive denuclearization of Western Europe and the weakening of U.S. security guarantees.

In his speech on Wednesday, Reagan blended a tone of cordiality toward the Soviet Union with proposals on human freedoms that would in essence require a dismantling of the Soviet system and the trampling of its power. With the prospect of a Gorbachev visit, uttering a soft word was the neighborly thing to do. Expressing hope on strategic issues was also a matter of calling a treaty to a Senate in which the president can count more on his political enemies than on his allies.

Paradoxically, to offset Gorbachev's gains in Western Europe, Reagan must be more active, tougher in deed even while he is conciliatory in word. In the face of West German misgivings, he must elevate the importance of the U.S.-European relationship from the nadir that it has reached in this administration. He must cut off and reaffirm U.S. commitments to European security. He must put Gorbachev on the defensive by pressing for reductions in the Soviets' most fearsome advantage in Europe — their conventional military power. Reagan must become more fertile than Gorbachev in making attractive and realistic proposals to reduce tensions further.

The change in atmosphere that attends agreement between great nations can lead to a new era in relations. Strangely, that can happen now only if Ronald Reagan, a mellowed cold warrior, proves tough and wily enough to cope with his young Soviet counterpart.

Anti-trust law application reflects market conditions today

WASHINGTON — Is the Reagan administration to blame for the wave of corporate mergers and takeovers that has hit the American economy in recent years?

From a number of quarters, that seems to be the charge. The association of State Attorneys General protests that "nothing goes" in the Reagan Justice Department. Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, repeats the allegation in hearings on merger enforcement: Ralph Nader indicts the Justice Department's Antitrust Division for going out of business without telling anyone. And academic critics allege that "megamergers and corporate gigantism" are undermining the United States in international markets and even causing our trade deficit.

If these charges are part of a counterattack on current antitrust policy, they are badly misplaced. Misplaced because, for the first time in nearly half a century, courts and government agencies are applying antitrust laws in ways that accurately reflect contemporary economic and market conditions.

In fact, the administration is simply continuing the quiet evolution in antitrust policy of the past two decades. The approval of mergers in the past few years is as much

the result of long-term trends in antitrust interpretation as it is the result of the Reagan administration's distinctive approach to antitrust.

Today's merger policy must be seen first in light of the changed markets in which American industries compete, particularly the increasingly international nature of those markets. Second, it must be seen in light of more-detailed examination of the likely competitive effects of merged firms.

Under this new learning, the key is "efficiency" — how will this merger affect the efficient working of this particular market? The touchstone for evaluating a merger is no longer the traditional, populist-oriented test: absolute size and aggregate concentration. Bigness by itself is not bad. In a worldwide market, a domestic player's size is not as critical as its operating efficiency.

"Efficiency" is neither a buzzword nor the corporate mantra of the 1980s. Efficiency means making what consumers want (al-

locative efficiency) using the least amount of resources (productive efficiency).

The efficiency approach stands in contrast to the populist preoccupation with the dangers of massed corporate power — with its alleged detrimental impact on prices, jobs and standards of living — which controlled judicial and governmental thinking on antitrust for much of this century.

As late as the 1960s, the Supreme Court found illegal a merger between two grocery chains with a combined 7.6 percent of retail sales in the Los Angeles market. A few years earlier, the court barred the merger of Brown Shoe, primarily a manufacturer, with Kinney Shoes, a retailer, for fear that the resulting enterprise would be too big — and too efficient — though it involved less than one-half of 1 percent of all retail stores selling shoes.

The costs of such a narrow (and often inconsistent) merger policy were not immediately evident. America had entered the 1960s as the undisputed world leader in industrial production. It could tolerate a merger policy that frustrated more efficient use of industrial resources.

But the growing internationalization of world markets eliminated the competitive cocoon. Confronted with more efficient over-

seas producers, American producers found themselves hampered by rules that often made it difficult to change business structures.

The new economic learning challenged the populist orthodoxy arguing that concentration was more likely to produce economic efficiency than an industry cartel. In fact, it appears unlikely that global market power — and abundant jobs and comfortable standards of living — can be sustained except by efficient production.

Gradually, the new methodology worked its way into antitrust decisions and enforcement policy. In 1974, for example, the Supreme Court reversed course in a case involving General Dynamics, ruling that a merger was not illegal merely because of high concentration levels.

By 1982, the Antitrust Division's position was that its "enforcement efforts are targeted at behavior that has the demonstrable effect of restricting competition and thereby limiting economic efficiency and consumer welfare."

The most recent Merger Guidelines (1984) intensify the Antitrust Division's commitment to the efficiency approach. Today's antitrust enforcers are looking for hard evidence of anti-competitive effects

rather than unsubstantiated hypotheses, an approach that inevitably means fewer antitrust challenges, especially in the merger area.

Nevertheless, in 1986 and 1988 alone, the federal antitrust agencies challenged 33 proposed acquisitions — hardly a lackluster record of "anything goes."

The overall reduction in the number of antitrust merger cases reflects a careful look of cases — those with cartel earmarks (e.g. price fixing, bid rigging) — rather than government malingering. The revised 1984 guidelines have successfully informed business of current merger policy and how its standards are applied. Armed with this information, businesses and their lawyers can avoid accusations that will not pass enforcement scrutiny.

This is not to say that business decisions should be given free rein. Nor is that what current merger policy does. It factors in the hard realities of our current global market, factors that are irrelevant to the traditional populist approach.

Antitrust enforcement isn't dead; it's geared for the times.

The manure haulers come in with ten wheelers and two large loaders and haul the manure to a local farmer who spreads it on his land to assure a higher yielding crop the following season.

When the trucks pull into your corral the manure sticks to their tires and as they pull onto the road it naturally falls off.

After several days they have finished, and we scrape all the excess off the road and things get back to normal. But, meanwhile, everyone who uses this road goes into panic.

This is a farming community, this is the major resource keeping our economy alive. Should we start fining everyone who is trying to earn a living? What about the mud on the road when the beets are harvested in the fall? What about the water that is in the road when the farmer uses his sprinkler?

Andrus, Jones disagree on state timber sales restrictions

BOISE (AP) — Republican Attorney General Jim Jones and Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus are sparring again.

But it is over Jones' legal opinion the attorney general suggests puts pressure on the governor to constrain any wilderness plan he negotiates.

"Once again, and you've seen it in the past and you'll see it in the future, I disagree with the attorney general," Andrus said Thursday after reviewing Jones' opinion that undercut the governor's plan to reject any bids to ship raw timber from state lands to foreign nations.

Earlier this month, Andrus declared he would push the state Land Board to turn down any such contracts, contending they undercut the timber industry jobs in the state. The target of his wrath was a contract under which raw Idaho logs were being shipped through an agent in the state to Japan for processing.

Andrus secured support for including in future state timber sale bid proposals a provision giving the board authority to reject any or all offers in hopes of preserving as much state-land timber for Idaho mills as possible.

But Jones, who was not present at the Aug. 11 meeting of the board, said Thursday his legal research indicated such restrictions were legal only if they did not discriminate against a buyer because he was from outside Idaho.

He specifically cited a U.S. Supreme Court decision voiding a similar provision in Alaska on grounds that it violated the constitutional interstate commerce provisions.

"The hope of restricting Idaho timber to Idaho mills is just not going to happen," Jones said. "It puts more pressure on the governor. ... He's going to have to do just that

much, better job in negotiating for an adequate supply of timber for Idaho mills in the upcoming wilderness negotiations."

Andrus, however, quickly took issue with that assumption and blasted Jones for having no commitment to preserving Idaho's timber industry jobs by protecting their resource supplies.

"Too many times an attorney spends his time telling us why we can't do something than telling us how we can," Andrus said, contending Jones was relying "more on political rhetoric than legal research."

The exchange comes as the debate intensifies over just how much additional Idaho land should be designated wilderness and preserved from "development," including logging. Over 4 million acres of Idaho land is already protected as wilderness.

Some 9 million additional acres are currently under wilderness review, and Andrus has been touring some of the areas in preparation for negotiations on a wilderness plan with Republican Sen. James McClure. The two hope to reach some agreement this fall that will release the bulk of the 9 million acres to multiple use, including logging.

Jones said that with no legal means of reserving state land logs for Idaho mills, it was increasingly important for sufficient supplies of logs to be available from federal lands.

"What I'm suggesting is there's another factor the governor and

Sen. McClure must take into account," he said.

But Andrus countered that without some kind of requirement that logs in Idaho, whether from state or federal land, be processed in the state, it will not make any difference how much land is opened to logging.

"If you don't stem the flow to a foreign country, it doesn't matter where the timber is," Andrus said.

He cited the need for legislation pending in Congress that would give the state's the right to impose the in-state processing restriction on timber sales. That was the one avenue Jones said would provide a legitimate means of funneling Idaho logs to Idaho mills.

But even with that law, Jones' opinion suggested, there still could be problems in rejected a high bid from an out-of-state company because of Idaho requirements that the Land Board maximize returns on all state resources.

Family, detective persistent

Evidence shows possibility of foul play

AMERICAN FALLS (AP) — Relentless family members and a transplanted New York detective have uncovered evidence indicating the 1984 death of an American Falls man might not have been an accident, or even a suicide as first recorded.

The body of Rodney Schritter, 21, was found Feb. 11, 1984, in his mobile home in American Falls. He died of a gunshot wound to the head.

Power County Coroner Bud Kelly initially ruled the death a suicide. He changed that to accidental death when he discovered an extremely high alcohol content in Schritter's blood.

But his parents, Melvin and Roberta Schritter, and older brother Brian launched their own investigation after the shooting because they were convinced the young man had not killed himself.

"When we didn't see Rodney for a couple of days, we asked the police to let us in his trailer," Brian Schritter said. "It was just two days before my wedding. He would not have done that to me. Besides, he was not unhappy about anything. We were close and I would have known if he had a problem."

The family felt the investigation into the shooting was being conducted under the preconception

that Rodney's wounds were self-inflicted. They were dissatisfied with the way it was handled.

"The police just did not investigate anything at first because they did it was suicide," Brian said. "We found out the day before Rodney was buried that they hadn't even done an autopsy. We had one done in Pocatello."

Kelly confirmed that the autopsy was done at the family's request.

"When this first started out, everything pointed to suicide," he said. "New evidence has been uncovered since then that points to homicide, but I didn't have that information when I made the ruling. The pathologist (Dr. Charles Garrison) said he thought it was suicide, too."

American Falls police always suspected foul play, said Lt. Jerry Hubbs.

"We went into the case with the assumption it was homicide," Hubbs said. "There were things designed to make it look like suicide, but there were certain discrepancies. We had all the officers in the department working on it and we consulted with experts as much as we could."

Meanwhile, Schritter's family searched his trailer and, found evidence that indicated he

could not have killed himself. The Schritters took the information to various law enforcement agencies and eventually got the attention of Chris DeWald.

DeWald had just arrived in American Falls from New York City and had been an officer on the city force for about month when Schritter died. He took over the investigation when he became chief of detectives for the Power County Sheriff's Department in April 1986.

Since then, he has worked tirelessly on the case, gathering witnesses and evidence to offer in the ongoing magistrate's inquiry into the shooting. The evidence has convinced Assistant County Prosecutor Henry Boomer that Schritter did not take his own life.

DeWald also is convinced. Although he came into the investigation long after the incident, he has been able to uncover some evidence to support his belief.

"From pictures at the crime scene, it has been determined the body was moved," the detective said.

For one thing, patterns of dried blood did not correspond with the position of the body.

Air guard crew nabs award

BOISE (AP) — A pilot and navigator from the Idaho Air National Guard have been named the best overall reconnaissance aircrew in the U.S. Air Force for the past year, their commanding officer said.

Maj. Patrick M. O'Rourke of Boise and Capt. Jay T. Stevenson of Meridian will receive the prestigious O'Malley Award at the Air Force Association's national convention in Washington, D.C., Sept. 14-17.

Col. Ralph T. ... who leads the Idaho Air National Guard's 124th Tactical Reconnaissance Group at Gowen Field, said O'Rourke and Stevenson were selected for

their flying skill in the RF-4C Phantom II jet, and for their contributions to the guard's reconnaissance training program.

They were named top aircrew at RAM '86, an aerial reconnaissance competition sponsored by the Air Force. O'Rourke and Stevenson scored both active duty and reserve flyers from the Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps and Royal Australian Air Force.

The O'Malley Award is named for Gen. Jerome O'Malley, a past commander of the Air Force's Tactical Air Command.

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Aquino appeals for calm in wake of attack by mutineers

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Militant troops attacked the presidential palace compound early Friday in an apparent attempt to overthrow the 18-month-old government of President Corazon Aquino.

She was safe and appealed for calm.

The attack, in which at least six people were killed and 57 wounded, occurred a day after militant leftist unionists began the biggest strike of Mrs. Aquino's administration. It was not immediately clear whether the two events were related.

Gen. Fidel Ramos, the chief of staff, said about 300 men attacked about 1 a.m. and there were "propaganda" reports that the mutineers supported him and Sen. Juan Ponce Enrile. Ramos said he remains loyal to Mrs. Aquino.

Enrile could not be reached for comment. He and Ramos helped lead the civilian and military revolt that drove former President Ferdinand Marcos into exile and brought Mrs. Aquino to power, but she fired him as defense minister

Manila police arrest 71 on 2nd day of protest strike

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Police chased away protesters Thursday and arrested 71 people, including a top labor leader, on the second day of the most disruptive strike of President Corazon Aquino's administration.

Transportation in the capital remained impaired and some shops and businesses stayed shut, but the nationwide strike called to protest fuel price increases was less severe than on Wednesday.

"The worst is over. Things are returning to normal," said presidential spokesman Teodoro Benigno. Labor leaders, however, vowed to continue and expand the strike.

Brig. Gen. Alfredo Lim, Manila's police chief, said officers arrested Medardo Roda, chairman

of United Association of Transport Workers Nationwide, Thursday morning for "inciting to sedition."

Roda's union of passenger jeep drivers is aligned with the May 1st Movement, which called the strike to force Mrs. Aquino to scrap the Aug. 14 price increases on gasoline, kerosene and liquefied gas.

The government said the increases were needed because world oil prices had risen and its fund for subsidizing domestic oil companies was depleted. Mrs. Aquino cut the increases by about half Tuesday in a bid to prevent the strike, but the unions said that was not enough.

Police also arrested 28 people who marched

to the movement's offices to protest the cracking and 42 others around Manila, most for urging drivers to continue the strike. They faced charges ranging from "grave coercion" to "public disturbance."

Other union leaders, including movement chairman Crispin Beltran, went into hiding to avoid arrest.

Lim said he ordered the arrests.

"It's about time we enforced the law and maintain peace and order," Lim said. "This is the aftereffect of their declaration of a nationwide strike, where acts of violence were committed causing injuries to people and damage to property."

A check of five hospitals showed that four people were dead and 57 wounded. Manila Mayor Mel Lopez appealed for doctors and nurses to report to hospitals to treat wounded, and said blood was urgently needed.

James Hutton, another AP correspondent, said mutineers and

tors and nurses to report to hospitals to care for the wounded.

"I want to tell you, all my countrymen, that I am safe and the Presidential Security Group is here and prepared," Mrs. Aquino said over the private radio station DZRH. "I want to tell our people that first of all, I am all right and Gen. Ramos is on top of the situation and is in constant touch with me."

Mrs. Aquino's government has weathered several coup attempts and conspiracies since Marcos fled Feb. 26, 1986. She said she would summon the Cabinet for a special meeting Friday and cancel a planned trip to central Luzon, the archipelago's main island.

She said it was too early to tell who was responsible for the attack, but the soldiers apparently were from Fort Magdaway, the military's largest training base in Nueva Ecija province north of the capital. The army has been linked to previous coup conspiracies against the

government.

Iran vows to continue to victory

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Iran dismissed a threat by Arab countries to break relations unless it accepts a cease-fire and said it will press the 7-year-old war with Iraq to "final victory."

Sandstorms swept the Persian Gulf for a fourth day, reducing visibility and making it impossible to determine whether a convoy of refueled Kuwaiti tankers and U.S. Navy ships was moving toward the emirate.

Various reports have said a convoy was off the coast of Saudi Arabia or had completed the trip. Sources at the emirate's state-run Kuwait Oil Tanker Co. denied the reports and there was no word from Washington.

The war, which has claimed more than 1 million casualties, continues along the 730-mile border between Iran and Iraq. A communique from Tehran said Iranian artillery destroyed an Iraqi missile battery, communications center and gun emplacements in the mountains north of the border, causing civilian casualties in the central sector.

Iraq claimed Iranian gunners shelled its southern provincial capital of Basra and Qalabat Dizeh in the north, causing civilian casualties.

At a special meeting in Tunis, the Arab League issued an ultimatum to Iran on Tuesday to accept a U.N. cease-fire resolution by Sept. 20 or risk a break in diplomatic relations by Arab countries.

Tehran radio quoted a Foreign Ministry spokesman Thursday as saying Iran will "not be diverted from achieving victory." It said the official called the Arab League meeting "a failure" in what Iran describes as a U.S.-led effort to isolate it.

Another broadcast denounced Britain and France for sending warships to the gulf and said both countries "should prepare an answer for their devious policies."

In Rome, Defense Minister Valerio Zanone said Italy would send mine sweepers to the gulf if there is no cease-fire "in a matter of days or weeks."

U.S. delegates at the United Nations are consulting members of the 15-nation Security Council about imposing sanctions on Iran, including an arms embargo, if it does not accept a cease-fire.

Iran refuses to recognize any cease-fire resolution or proposal that does not name Iraq as the aggressor. Iraq invaded Iran in September 1980 after a series of border skirmishes, but has sought a negotiated peace for years.

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S. Korea vows to crush leftist agitators who incite strikes

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — The government vowed Thursday to crush leftist who incite strikers to political violence and said a Justice Ministry team was arresting agitators disguised as workers.

Strikers and riot police fought in the southern port city of Masan and at Incheon, the port west of Seoul. Hundreds of strikes around the country continued to impair auto production, shipbuilding, electronics, mining, transportation and many other industries.

The main opposition alliance called for anti-government rallies today to mourn the death of a shipyard worker who became the first fa-

ctivity of more than a month of labor unrest when he was hit by a tear gas shell.

Prime Minister Kim Chung-yul said leftist elements are trying to create a socialist society by fomenting turmoil or revolution that would destroy the existing political and social order.

It was the first major government policy statement on the strikes for higher pay, better working conditions and free unions that have swept the country since early July and crippled the export-based economy.

"The government is firmly determined to root out impure leftist for-

ces from our society with all the law-enforcing power we can mobilize from now on to maintain law and order," Kim said in a televised speech.

Justice Minister Chung Ha-chang said police and government

prosecutors had formed a special team to stamp out leftist agitation. He said more than 60 people had been arrested since Aug. 20, including leftist agitators disguised as workers.

Police announced 12 of the ar-

rests Thursday. They said most of those detained were former student activists and more would be rounded up.

Students traditionally are in the vanguard of South Korean protest.

They led weeks of anti-government agitation that caused President Chun Doo-hwan to agree June 30 to opposition demands for such democratic reforms as direct presidential elections and less government control of unions.

More opportunities for disabled sought

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — Halfway through the U.N.'s "Decade of Disabled Persons," experts are calling for more efforts to fight discrimination and find opportunities for the world's estimated 500 million handicapped.

"Countries are beginning to at last put disability on the list of priorities and spend what little funds they have on it," said Harold W. Snider, a Washington, D.C., expert on technical aids for the handicapped. "Disabled people are beginning to come out of the closet."

Snider was one of 76 observers at a week-long United Nations Conference on Disabled Persons that ended here Sunday.

The participants, many of them blind, deaf or wheelchair-bound, called for a U.N. convention on discrimination against handicapped people.

"The tradition of a lot of cultures to hide their disabled people and not to do anything about disability has slowly but surely begun to change in a number of countries," Snider said in an interview.

Experts singled out Africa as an area where progress has been made in the 1980s.

Since it started work in 1984, the African Rehabilitation Institute, based in Harare, Zimbabwe, has helped 6,000 disabled people find employment, said its director, B.M. Zorovic. The institute has set up projects in Brazzaville, Congo, and is opening one in Cairo, Egypt, next January.

Zorovic said the institute is training people to provide basic rehabili-

tation services in local communities.

Reports and speeches at the meeting, held outside Stockholm in a school overlooking the Baltic Sea, were printed in Braille and accompanied by sign language.

The president of Disabled Persons International, Henry Enns of Canada, told other delegates that during a trip through 10 African countries he found some cities there more accessible to him than some cities in Western Europe. Enns is confined to a wheelchair.

He criticized the U.N. for designating the 1983-93 decade without funding, but said the program gives a "totally new official view of people with handicaps. For the first time the U.N. is talking about disabled people as worthy citizens with the same rights as everybody else."

The final document at the conference called for a public information campaign on disabled people, self-representation of disabled people in society and a secretariat to coordinate efforts and information during the rest of the U.N. decade.

Swedish Minister for Family Affairs Bengt Lindqvist, who is blind and deaf, said the program called on other countries to follow Sweden's example of pledging funds to international efforts on behalf of disabled people. Sweden recently gave \$20 million to international efforts for the disabled.

Snider provided the conference with a computer that translates written texts into Braille.

Iranian source claims Waite alive in Lebanon

LONDON (AP) — An authoritative Iranian source says Church of England envoy Terry Waite is alive and well in captivity in Lebanon seven months after pro-Iranian guerrillas kidnapped him, a British Broadcasting Corp. reporter said Thursday.

"Both his captors and the Iranians are anxious to ensure that nothing happens to him," said BBC diplomatic correspondent Terry Simpson in Iran.

Simpson did not identify his source, but said his information came from "high up in the Iranian structure, from a person who has access to the full facts about Terry Waite's kidnapping and imprisonment."

Simpson did not say whether he obtained news of 24 other foreigners missing and believed kidnapped in Lebanon, including eight Americans. He said Waite is held in south Beirut and is sometimes moved to the eastern Bekaa Valley to make sure that Syrian occupation troops do not let him go.

Waite, 48, is personal envoy of Archbishop of Canterbury Robert Runcie, spiritual leader of the Church of England. He was on his fifth mission to seek the release of hostages when he disappeared Jan. 20 in Beirut.

Waite said the family had always felt his brother was alive.

Nobel-winning chemist Wittig dies

HEIDELBERG, West Germany (AP) — Nobel Prize-winning chemist Georg Wittig has died at age 90, a Heidelberg University spokesman said Thursday.

The cause of his death Wednesday evening was not given in a statement released to the news media.

Wittig, who was a former professor at Heidelberg University and directed a chemical institute there, became world famous for his discovery

of the process of regulating regrouping of atoms in a molecule.

He won the Nobel Prize in 1979 with American chemist Herbert Brown for discovering a "Wittig-Synthesis," a process of producing chemical compounds called olefins.

Wittig belonged to scientific academies in West Germany and abroad, including the Bavarian Academy of Sciences in Munich, and had an honorary membership at the New York Academy of Science.

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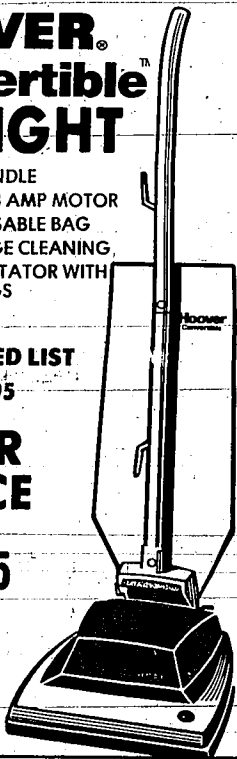
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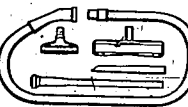
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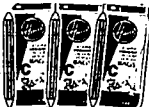
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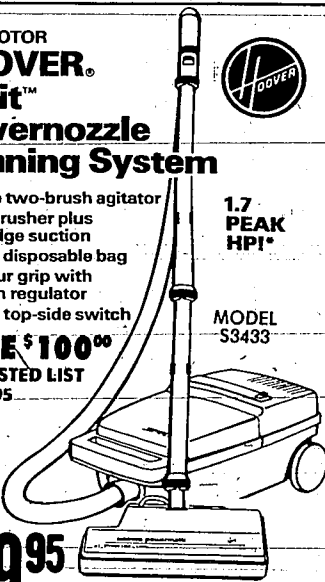
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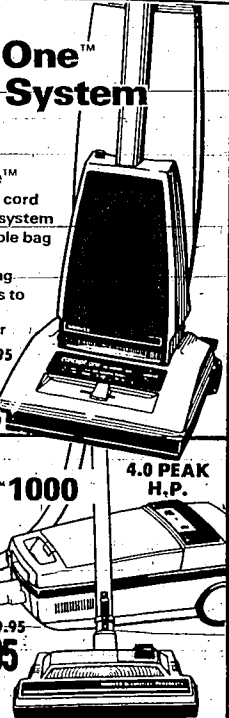
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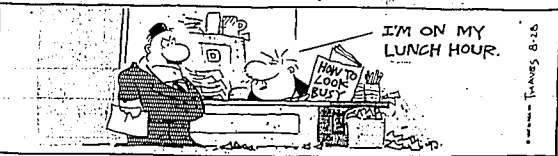
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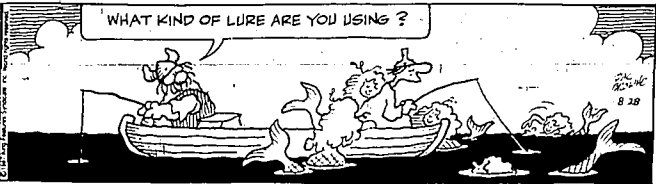

Health fraud rakes in \$25 billion a year

Look 10 years younger in just one week with an isometric toner to firm up neck, jawline and thighs. Thousands have done it and you can too!

•Increase your chances of conceiving a boygirl with Gender Choice, a brand-new remarkable product. Cost: \$50 per kit; pink box for a girl, blue for a boy.

•Stimulate your immune system with daily applications of a unique gel made from apricot pits. Shocking? Here's the real shocker: We spend an estimated \$26 billion a year on fraudulent medical therapies in the U.S. Many medical experts believe the actual amount is much higher.

Health is booming business. Record numbers of you across the country are being lured. It's no wonder. Claims are enticing. "Scientific" data are persuasive. Alternatives are offered. And no one, particularly NOT the government — is warning you of the dangers.

"We don't have the resources to take regulatory action against every phony cosmetic cream and sauna wrap," Edward McDonnell, director of the New England District of the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), notes.

But over the past year, the FDA has beefed up its anti-fraud campaign. Working with the Na-

tional Association of Consumer Administrators (NACCA), it has established an Information Exchange Network linking the FDA, Federal Trade Commission (FTC), United States Postal Service (USPS) and other agencies. The purpose: To share information on suspected fraudulent health products. Along with the Council of Better Business Bureaus, the FDA also has been trying to educate you, the general public, about this alarming, growing problem.

Why are sales skyrocketing now for health fraud entrepreneurs? Health care costs continue to spiral to record-breaking, so quick-fix, relatively inexpensive "medical cures" are particularly appealing. Also, the swindlers capitalize on the recent trend toward alternative health-care delivery systems. But the "alternatives" they offer are worthless and often dangerous.

•Sophisticated high-tech marketing campaigns lie at the heart of these schemes and play on our psy-

chological weaknesses. Using well-respected newspapers and magazines to advertise their worthless wares, as well as toll-free 800 numbers to add legitimacy to their sales pitches, they suck you in.

In the last 25 years, major medical advances have been made in this country. Expectations of the general public have gone up dramatically. Often it is difficult to distinguish between the brilliant innovation and ridiculous gimmick. As health trends come and go, these quacks crop up — recommending everything from megavitamins to live cell analysis to remedy any condition.

AIDS clearly has provided a tempting field for these crooks. Many of the "cancer-cure" gurus are playing upon the fears and desperation of the general public with phony therapies targeted to AIDS victims. "European" treatments and references to the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) "dragging its feet" are typical, extremely appealing pitches. In 1986, the FDA issued alerts against dangerous quack remedies such as "Immuno-Augmentative Therapy Agents" and various unorthodox "treatments" promoted by a West German physician.

The economic impact of this fraud is devastating and hits you from all sides. For starters, health insurers

are beefing up investigations due to quackery. Phony claims made by charlatans billing insurance companies for legitimate-sounding treatments are widespread. You will pay in higher premiums for the fraud not caught.

"If we start paying for all the snake-oil salesmen in this field, our health care bill rises \$40 to \$50 billion," Dr. John H. Renner told my research associate Beth Kolbner. Reports Renner, who is director of medical development at St. Mary's Hospital in Kansas City, Mo., and a board member of the National Council Against Health Fraud, we spend the following on health fraud: \$1 billion on books and the like; \$3 billion on arthritis; \$3 billion on cancer; \$2 billion on diagnostic tests; \$1 billion on phony diploma mills; \$5 billion on special diets, foods and remedies; and \$2 billion on aging and sexual potency treatments — just to name a few.

Some of these scams are economic cheats, but harmless. Many, however, are dangerous both to themselves and in the fact that they delay you from seeking a more effective therapy when one exists.

Wasting your money won't kill you. Wasting your life will.

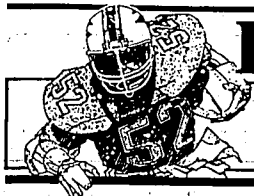

Boise State: Great expectations attend debut of Hall

BOISE — The Skip Hall Era will begin officially at Boise State University next week with a combination of great expectations and great trepidation.

Bronco fans have high hopes because Hall, hired last December after Lyle Setencich resigned following the Bronco's first losing football season ever, was the recruiting coordinator at the University of Washington brought to Boise 22 freshmen, including some blue-chippers.

But there's also caution born of Bronco fans' hopes being dashed once too often. Boise State hasn't won a conference championship for seven years and hasn't been to the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs since 1981.

"Our program is patterned after Washington and Penn State," says Hall. "We have set our sights high; we've recruited a lot of borderline Pac-10 athletes. But we haven't taken a snap, made a tackle or won a game yet."

In fact, whether the Bronco win or lose will depend mostly on athletes Setencich recruited. Hall brought in just four junior colleges transfers, only one of whom is projected to start when the Bronco take on Delaware State here Sept. 5.

"There are some good players in the program and we're excited about the players we brought in," says Hall. "We're going to play the best players. We're not going to get frozen into using anybody just because he's been in the program. If we need the freshman, we'll use 'em."

Unless it's Bart Hull, the highly regarded running back from Vancouver, B.C., those frosh aren't likely to see action on the offense. The Bronco returns eight starters, including first-team all-Big Sky guard Tom DeWitz, first-team all-conference kick returner Chris Truitt, and second-team all-league tailback Chris Jackson, who rushed for 650 yards in five games last year.

"We'll have people playing on offense who've been there and know what it takes to win," says Hall. "The big question mark is what we do up front. That's where games are won or lost."

With Jackson and a philosophy that calls for offensive balance, the Bronco's strength will definitely be their running game.

"My philosophy is that pure passing teams don't win championships," says Hall. "Teams that can pass effectively do. At Washington, I coached against two of the most prolific passing quarterbacks of all time, Jack Thompson at Washington State and John Elway at Stanford, and neither of those teams won championships."

If Jackson, a 6-foot, 10-inch, 178-pound senior who began his collegiate career with the University of Houston, stays healthy — he went down in the first game of last season with a knee injury — he will give the Bronco's a big edge offensively whether they run or throw.

"Chris to me is going to give us the ability to do a lot of things," says Hall. "He keeps the defense back on its heels."

Joining Jackson in the backfield will be Cliff Sexton, a 6-2, 200-pound senior who rushed for 375 yards last year.

Master of the game

Erickson's influence lingers on in Big Sky

PULLMAN, Wash. — Passing put Dennis Erickson through college, and has since put a paycheck in his pocket and a winning record in the books.

Erickson, entering his first season as head coach at Washington State University after a year at Wyoming, is still the model for the way offense is played in the Big Sky Conference, which he helped turn from a Division I-AA backwater into one of the premier passing leagues in nation.

At the Pac-10 level, it's easy for Erickson to find a herd of big linemen to protect his quarterbacks. But there wasn't a herd of offensive linemen when Erickson was the offensive coordinator at San Jose State University several years ago, and that helped him frame his philosophy.

Quarterback Ed Luther, who later played in the NFL, was there, and wide receivers were easy to recruit. "I mean there were millions of them around there who could catch and run," Erickson says.

For some reason, it was hard getting linemen. "We really felt we couldn't physically up front sit in there and run the ball," he says. That experience, coupled with the need to quickly turn around the program at Idaho in his first head coaching job, got Erickson's system under way.

"You can become very competitive, quicker and more consistently, by throwing the ball," he says. "That's just my philosophy of it."

To get the offensive front too deep to just be able to come and knock the crap out of somebody every week is very difficult to do," adds Erickson.

Erickson wasn't the first to successfully bring a passing offense to the Big Sky; that honor belongs to Dave Krugthorpe, currently the head coach at Pac-10 rival Oregon State, who took over an O-11 Idaho State program in 1980 and won a national championship a year later. But Krugthorpe's model was the offensive system of Brigham Young University, where he served LaVell Edwards as offensive line coach for a decade.

Erickson's system of offense was different, derived from the ideas of the late Paul W. "Bear" Bryant, a conference coach, Jack Elway and Jim Sweeney.

Erickson played quarterback at Montana State for Sweeney, and was later Sweeney's offensive coordinator at Fresno State before working for Elway, now the head coach at Stanford, at San Jose State.

"Really, our offense started at San Jose State, and when we went to Idaho, we kind of put it together ourselves more than anything," he said. "We've been very innovative in what we're doing."

"When you look at what we do offensively, there are probably only two teams in the country that are doing it, and that's us and Idaho," the 40-year-old coach said.

Still, Erickson's influence is widespread in the Big Sky. Dave Arnold, now one of Erickson's assistant coaches at WSU, used elements of it in leading Montana State to a I-AA championship in

1984 and some of Erickson's offensive schemes can be found in the pass-based offenses of Montana, Weber State, Northern Arizona and — even Idaho State.

Erickson's offense is based on the quarterback dropping just one to three steps, although there are some five-to-seven-step drops. It uses multiple formations and lots of motion. Some of the main routes are the slant and seam routes, keyed by the receivers reading linebacker drops.

Starting Washington State quarterback Timm Rosenbach is 6 feet 2 inches, 211 pounds and mobile. "That gives you that second chance, which I think nowadays a quarterback needs so much better," Erickson says.

At Idaho, Erickson's quarterbacks, running backs and receivers didn't match that size. Ken Hobart, Scott Linehan and Rick Sloan, all of whom led Idaho

into the I-AA playoffs, had been passed up by other schools because they weren't big enough or fast enough. Erickson's two most successful receivers, Eric Yarber and Ron Whittenburg, were both 5-8.

"Speed and quickness to me is much more of a factor than size. I'd rather play with all 5-8 guys who can run and are quick than 6-3 guys."

Often three wide receivers line up to one side in the "trips" formation, and the lone running back goes in motion.

The numbers the offense can generate are impressive. With two quarterbacks throwing for more than 1,200 yards apiece, Wyoming averaged 293.6 yards passing per game last year, second in the nation. After Erickson scrapped Idaho's veer offense, quarterback Hobart threw for 3,068 yards in 1982 and 3,618 in 1983 to finish with 9,300 passing yards in four seasons.

By comparison, Erickson's three-year career passing total at MSU was 3,181 yards.

There can be anywhere from 30 to 60 passes per game, but the running backs, who must also catch and pass block, don't starve.

"There's a real myth that we throw the ball every time," Erickson said. "We may throw it some years a little bit more, some years we may run it a little more. You talk about balance, we're probably as balanced as anyone in the country as far as the number of running plays and the number of passing plays."

"The thing I really believe about throwing the ball is you can't just throw it," Erickson added. "You better know what you're doing with the offense. The key is going from A to B, or B to C if they do something to you defensively. And if you can't do that with the offense you run, then you're not going to be successful."

Idaho St.: Bengals want to host final

POCAHELLO — There's a big party coming to town at the end of this football season, and the Idaho State University Bengals hope to be a part of it.

The NCAA Division I-AA national championship game will be played in the ISU Mini-dome in December, but fifth-year ISU Coach Jim Koetter says the Bengals have a lot of work to do in order to have a chance to be part of it.

"It's a community project (and) there is a lot of enthusiasm now," said Koetter, whose Bengals fell to 2-9 overall and 108 in conference last year. "Sure, we would love to play in that game. Then it would really be exciting."

Koetter opened fall drills with one goal: "to get everyone playing at the level we need to play at to be competitive" in the Big Sky Conference.

"Then I think the wins will take care of themselves," he said.

One of the biggest questions is the health of quarterback Gino Mariani, who played with a sore shoulder much of last season and was unable to throw deep.

Mariani was put on a rehabilitation program during the off-season and Koetter said he has regained most of his throwing motion and can throw deep.

"I think he has all the qualities to make the comeback and get the job done," Koetter said. Even so, the 6-foot, 3-inch, 195-pound quarterback is being challenged by redshirt freshman Jason Whitmer and Koetter said the race for the starting job would be close this fall.

No matter who is selected quarterback, he will have to expect-ant receivers — senior split end Shawn Beals, a two-year starter, and two experienced flankers, red-shirt sophomore flanker Eric Van Orden and sophomore Todd Jones of Twin Falls.

Koetter also is looking for a runner to replace all-star Merrill Hoge, who gained 1,872 all-purpose yards as a senior last year. Butch Caston, a 6-11, 190-pound senior, is expected to replace Hoge at tailback and Koetter said Caston can score every time he handles the ball.

"The big question with Butch Caston is whether he can take the pounding play after play," Koetter said.

Koetter said he plans to put more of the rushing load on Twin Falls' Corky Federico, a 5-9, 210-pound senior who has started two years. Federico averaged 5.5 yards per carry last year before being sidelined with a knee injury.

"Corky has been used primarily as a blocker the last two seasons, but he's an outstanding runner in his own right," said Koetter. "We'd like to shift more of the running load to Corky, but to do that the tailback has to be a good blocker and Caston is not at outstanding blocker."

Another question is ISU's offensive line, which has three sophomores.

"The question is how well our offensive line progresses," said Koetter. "We have two returning starters, but neither played all last year. The others, physically they can handle it, but they still are inexperienced."

Idaho: Vandal offense hums along, but how about defense?

MOSCOW — So well-oiled is the offensive football machine at the University of Idaho that not even the coming of a freshman quarterback has caused so much as a sputter.

Second-year Coach Keith Gilbertson, who took Idaho to the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs and an 8-4 record in his first year as head coach, is confident that redshirt frosh quarterback John Freigh can move his ballbub in the neighborhood of 4,584 yards, which the graduated Scott Linehan achieved

last year. The thing troubling Gilbertson is whether the middle of his defense, left open by the graduation of three-time all-Big Sky Conference linebacker Tom Hennessey, his running mate Mike Cox and changes in his two tackles, will make it possible for opposing teams to do the same.

"I'm really comfortable with the periphery of our defense," says Gilbertson. "What concerns me is the middle. Those guys have to be able to put pressure on the pocket and control the running game or we're going to be in for a real long season."

Although Hennessey and Cox were the No. 1 and No. 2 tacklers, respectively, on the team last year, Idaho wasn't exactly a world-beating team against the run, giving up 397 yards on the ground to Central Michigan and 277 and 295 in losses Nevada-Seno. Part of the problem was instability at the defensive tackle positions, where five different people played last year.

"I really like the kids we have playing those positions, but they're untested," says Gilbertson. "Whether (Craig) Dowdy, (Steve) Crown, (Jim) Routos and (Charlie) Porter can handle those tackle positions is going to have a big impact

on our football team."

Gilbertson has replaced Hennessey and Cox with twin brothers Jerry and Jim Medved, 6-0, 205-pound juniors renowned for their aggressiveness.

"We call them the Maniacal Medveds," says Gilbertson. "I can't tell them apart but they're something to see on the field. They'll get after you."

Dowdy, a 6-2, 254-pound senior who missed most of last season with a knee injury, and 6-2, 256-pound redshirt freshman Jim Routos are listed as starters at tackle, replacing second-team all-league performer Kent Smith, who moved to

end. Behind Routos is Porter, a 6-4, 270-pound sophomore, and backing up Dowdy is Crown, a 6-3, 257-pound redshirt freshman from Filer who won raves from Gilbertson in spring ball.

"He's going to be a good player," says Gilbertson. "I thought he would be when I recruited him and he hasn't disappointed me."

The rest of the defense looks solid, with returning starters in six positions, led by Smith and all four defensive backs.

Offensively, Gilbertson's confidence in born of the fact that Idaho has all five offensive linemen and

The only senior on the line is 6-3, 285-pound tackle Bret Hansen, who missed part of last season with a shoulder injury. Junior center Joe Henderson, the only other upperclassman on the line, hurt his knee last year and missed spring drills, but Koetter said he apparently has healed.

Sophomore Dan Milender, 6-7, 260, is expected to start at right tackle. The Bengals also have two 6-4 sophomores at guard — 260-pound John Leary and 240-pound senior Owen Owens, who redshirted last year. Owens will be backed up by senior Ruper's John Hansen, a 6-0, 244-pound sophomore who won a scholarship this spring after returning from an LDS mission. He began his ISU career two years ago as a defensive lineman.

"There is better quickness in this group that we had on the offensive

line a year ago," Koetter says. "We had two 300-pound tackles last year. Our tackles are not as big this year, but they're quicker."

Koetter had three senior tight ends last year and went to junior colleges for replacements. Joe Haber, 6-3, 232, won the job after spring drills, but he injured his hand in an automobile accident this summer and 6-4, 236-pound junior college transfer Pat Keating may get the job early in the season.

Haber and Keating were among 15 junior college transfers signed during the off-season. Ten of them were recruited to shore up the Bengal defense, which gave up a Big Sky high 489 yards per game and 58 touchdowns last season.

"There's no question we were a very, very poor defensive team a year ago," Koetter said. "If we're going to improve as a football team, we're going to have to improve on

the defensive side of the ball."

Injuries were a big factor in ISU's fortunes. In one game against Boise State, the Bengals lost three linebackers. This year, Koetter decided to recruit for depth and speed on his defense.

One player Koetter is particularly high on is Los Angeles Community College transfer Arthur White, a 6-0, 220-pound drop outsidelinebacker, similar to a strong safety.

"He can be an impact player," Koetter said of White, who can run 40 yards in 4.6 seconds.

At the inside linebackers, the Bengals will have seniors Clats Edmunson, 6-2, 225, and Mile Colley, 5-10, 202, both of whom have three years varsity experience.

The defensive ends will feature sophomores Paul Talleo, 6-1, 225, and Bob Bunting, 6-4, 250. Senior Jerry Oates, 6-2, 242, is scheduled to start at right tackle and Paul

Schwenke from Snow College in Orem, Utah, 6-3, 272, is expected to start at left tackle.

Schwenke will be backed up by Gooding's Bob Boone, a 5-1, 246-pound senior who saw a lot of playing time last year.

"Bob Boone had an infection just before he came in last fall and dropped to about 220 by the time the season started," says Koetter. "He's gained about 25 pounds so he's better able to take on big offensive linemen one-on-one."

Ron Davis, a player Koetter says is the best defensive back returning to the program, will start at left corner and Tony Roland, a transfer from Cerritos Community College in California, will start at right corner.

Kirk Gerling and Mike Marks, sophomores with one year of varsity experience each, will start at strong and free safety.

"Our attitude is good and we're fairly confident we can get better," Koetter said.

Koetter said if the Bengals improve their mental toughness and reverse their turnover ratio from minus 14 to the plus side, they'll be competitive in a conference.

"We thought the last few years that if you could win the Big Sky championship, you could have a shot at the national title," Koetter said. Three conference teams since

1980 have won the national championship, including Boise State in 1980, Idaho State in 1981 and Montana State in 1984.

Montana State won the title following a 1-10 season, giving the Bengals hope they, too, can rebound this year.

"That's a very real situation and something we will talk about," Koetter said. "We've already mentioned that."

yards last season; Ty Ogata, a 6-0, 217-pound senior who has been nagged by injuries throughout his career. Junior center Joe Henderson, a 5-11, 200-pound freshman redshirt with 4.6-second speed in the 40-yard dash.

The opening-day quarterback will be Vince Alcalde, a 6-0, 185-pound senior who started last season for the Broncos and went down with a knee injury in the first game. Keith Jarrett, who started most of the season last year at BSU as a redshirt freshman, quit the program earlier this summer after he was demoted to the No. 3 spot on the depth chart. Backing up Alcalde is Duane Halliday, a 6-2, 184-pound redshirt freshman.

"Alcalde got off to a rough start last year and lost confidence," says Hall. "He had a good attitude this spring, has a strong arm and can run with the ball."

Hall lost his No. 2 returning receiver, sophomore Corby Beard, who transferred to Cal Poly San Luis Obispo to play for Stetech, now head coach at the Division II school. That leaves senior Eric Andrade, second-team all-Big Sky last year, at one spot and either sophomore Youngblood or senior Steve Hale at the other. The tight end is Jeff Lindsley, a 6-3, 222-pound junior who played in eight games last season after injuries sidelined opening-day starter Jon Co.

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last year. Their backups are red-shirt freshmen.

Defensively, the good news starts and ends with Peter Kwiatkowski, BSU's 6-3, 236-pound first-team all-conference end who was voted the preseason conference player of the year. The only other returning starter is senior cornerback Ralph Gooding, although return specialist Pruitt is scheduled to start at the other corner, where he was a reserve last year.

The most promising of the newcomers is defensive end Larry Hines, a 6-4, 225-pound fall transfer from San Mateo Calif. Community College who was headed for a Division I-A school before injuring his knee last season. He is projected to start at the spot that Twin Falls' Lance Sellers, a first-team all-Big Sky selection and sixth-round draft choice by the Miami Dolphins, occupied last year.

Of the other projected starters, only senior tackle Jeff Hunt (6-4, 260), senior outside linebacker Mark Williams (6-2, 187) and sophomore inside linebacker Joe McCarthy (6-1, 220) had significant playing experience in a backup capacity last year. Twin Falls' Bob McLaughlin, a 6-0, 228-pound sophomore who redshirted last season after transferring from Western Montana College, is listed second on the BSU depth chart at noseguard. Buhl's Tracy Atkinson, a freshman who walked on this spring at BSU, is listed third at one of the outside linebacker positions.

"It's going to take some time to build a defense that's going to win in the Big Sky," says Hall. "If our offense puts our defense in bad situations too many times, it could be a long season."

The kicking game is also uncertain for BSU, which graduated the consistent placekicker Roberto Moran. P.K. Wiggins, a senior who handled kickoffs last year after transferring from California State San Antonio College, will take over the placements. Tom Schimmer, who finished seventh in the Big Sky in punting last season with a 39.5-yard-average, returns for his junior season.

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DeWitz, a 6-3, 257-pound senior who was second-team I-AA All-America last year, missed spring practice after having knee surgery, as did his counterpart, senior Dan Murphy, who has good speed and will have to be healthy for Jackson to be effective; the Broncos have little depth at the position.

Kim Hilliard, a 6-5, 245-pound junior, is back at one tackle position, but the other tackle and center, junior Eric Croll (6-4, 240) and senior Dave VanKoughnet (6-4, 240) saw very little playing time

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Jerome routs Bruins, 42-14, to end streak

TWIN FALLS — Well, there's finally an answer to that annual question: when was the last time Jerome beat Twin Falls in football?

The correct answer is: "Thursday night at Bruin Stadium in the season opener, which means, and by a substantial 42-14 to boot."

The Tigers, playing inspired and error-free football through the first half, simply blunted Twin Falls' offense with a rare 4-3 defense named up by Coach Joe Mattie Wednesday night. They turned some horrendous Bruin lung-snapping into three touchdowns and generally feasted on Twin Falls mistakes.

Meanwhile, Twin Falls' defense couldn't find the will of 'er wisp out of the Jerome backfield, Jay Ostler, and junior quarterback Lon Ruhler had a shiny night.

But in the final analysis, hand a lot of credit to the outweighed Jerome line because, as Twin Falls Coach Jon Jund summed up afterward, "they kicked our fanies in the trenches badly."

For a flickering moment it seemed that despite the quick burst out of the gate by Jerome, the Bruins might make a game of it. But back-to-back boners swung things quickly back into Jerome's favor and the prospect for a long night was definite.

That game just after Twin Falls, giving up two quick early scores came back with a 55-yard bomb and then stopped Jerome for the first time. On a third down play, Bruin quarterback Joel Jund placed the ball perfectly on a slider that put Bruin's chest 33 yards away at the Jerome three-yard line. Brunow barely slowed the ball down as it bounced into the turf.

On the next scrimmage, punter

J.T. Eller went to one knee fielding a bouncing center snap, turning the ball over to Jerome at the Bruin 49. That led to a touchdown a few minutes later, changed a possible 14-14 game into a 21-7 Jerome lead and closed speculation for the night.

Although Mattie had verbally worried about his defense before the game, when it came to crunch time, that's where he went. Twin Falls won the flip but deferred the decision to halftime. Jerome then opted to put its defense on the field first.

Mattie said he had a couple of reasons for that decision. First, he'd lost two starting linemen to injury during the week and didn't want that tested right away.

"It's always scary coming here for a football game," Mattie said. "But I think tonight our kids came together as a football team."

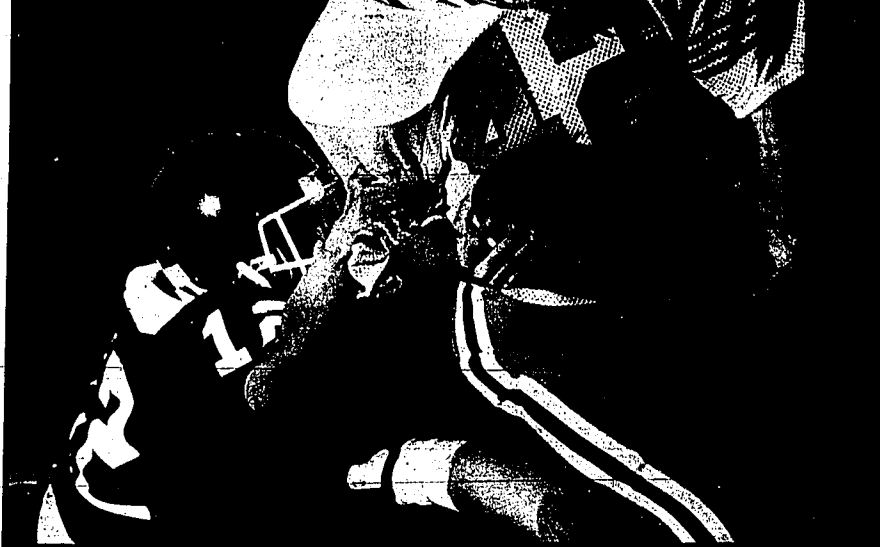

Under pressure from NCAA, NFL postpones draft

NEW YORK — The NFL, amid intense pressure from college coaches and athletic directors, held off the draft of Cris Carter and Charles Gladman for a week Thursday to give the NCAA a chance to reinstate the two players' college eligibility.

Commissioner Pete Rozelle, after meeting with college athletic directors, cited as the reason for the postponement of Friday's highly controversial first reinstatement Wednesday of another "Pitt" player, defensive back Teryl Austin. Like Carter, an All-American wide receiver from Ohio State, Austin had accepted payments from agents Norby Walters and Lloyd Bloom.

Ohio State Athletic Director Rick Bay, who was present at the meeting with Rozelle, said he would be inclined to reverse his previous position and make the appeal.

Carter said at a news conference in Indianapolis that playing for Ohio State would be his first choice.

"I'd love to go back but it's just not as easy as that," he said, "unaware at the time of his statement of the new developments in the case."

Later Thursday, in a telephone interview with WTVN-TV of Columbus, Ohio, Bay appeared to back off from his earlier statement. Asked if he expected Carter to play



for Ohio State again, Bay said he would "leave it up to the door" but "I don't see that as a probability at all."

Austin's reinstatement, which includes a suspension for the first two Pitt games this season, is contingent upon his repaying \$2,500 in loans he received from the agents and severing any agreement with them.

Gladman, however, has never acknowledged taking money from agents. He was ruled ineligible for refusing to cooperate with an investigation into Walters and Bloom.

"I think everyone felt that the NCAA would not restore the eligibility of the other Pittsburgh player," said Bay, who like other college coaches and administrators was highly critical of the NFL's decision to allow Carter and Gladman to be drafted.

"Now they've taken the position

that they will restore the eligibility with some penalty, two games, if the player in question can repay the money and get a release from the agent with whom he signed the contract. Given that set of circumstances, which is totally different than what we understood, it is now incumbent upon Pittsburgh and Ohio State to go back and reexamine the cases with the other players."

Low Cryer, commissioner of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association and chairman of the NCAA Division I Eligibility Committee, said the Carter and Gladman cases, if appealed, would be decided on an individual basis.

"I have no idea where Cris Carter stands," Cryer, contacted at the Irvine, Calif., home, said. "Because Mr. Austin got his eligibility back doesn't mean everyone else will. It's up to Ohio State to make the appeal."

"What the results of the appeal will be, if they appeal at all, I don't know," Cryer said. "Every case is different."

Cryer said his committee would step in "if they (Ohio State officials) follow the procedures necessary... the things they have to do through the NCAA office."

Earle Bruce, Carter's coach at Ohio State, told the Columbus Dispatch that he expects to meet with the player on Friday.

"There is the Earle Bruce that al-



ways is preaching rules, abiding by the rules, always trying to do things the right way." Bruce told the newspaper. "Then there is the Earle Bruce — well, I'm human. I see a guy with incredible talent, an All-American who could help our football team."

"Now the NCAA has gone and changed the rules. So now I have to ask myself, 'Are you bigger than the NCAA?'"

"To be honest, I still can't believe this is happening. I'm always telling my wife not to watch the soap opera, and here I am living one. I'm smack dab in the middle of one."

The announcement by the NFL followed a meeting between Rozelle and representatives of the National Association of Directors of Collegiate Athletics, who have been highly critical of the draft. The athletic directors feel that by drafting players who had violated college

rules, the NFL was rewarding wrongdoing.

The decision to hold the draft was made by the league a week ago in the face of Carter's threat that he would sue if not given a chance to be picked by an NFL team. The league said it was made "reluctantly" because it did not think it could deny the players a right to earn a living.

Rozelle acknowledged the reluctance after Thursday's meeting.

"It is a very difficult situation to try and do what's right and at the same time avoid pitfalls elsewhere," he said. Asked if he thought the league should amend the draft system to admit underclassmen, he replied:

"I can only say that there is no club in the National Football League that wants that to come about."

Both Bay and Ed Bozok of Pitt were at the meeting along with Michael Cleary, the group's executive director; Carl Miller of Pacific, its president; Carl Ulrich of Army; Harry Schiller, commissioner of the Southeastern Conference; and Phil Hochberg, the group's counsel.

The statement from the NFL cited Austin's reinstatement at Pitt. "Carter and Gladman and their institutions, Ohio State and Pitt now have the opportunity to pursue similar appeals for reinstatement to the NCAA," it said.

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Kent ready to take appeal to U.S. high court

TWIN FALLS — Arlo Kent says he is ready to go all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court to appeal the dismissal of his lawsuit against two Twin Falls County officials over the May 12 jail-bond election.

He has already appealed to the Idaho Supreme Court and has filed a notice of claim with the county, which potentially held up even further the sale of the bonds to pay for a new jail.

But the county may not wait forever to construct a new jail.

Twin Falls County Commissioner Judy Felton said on Thursday that the board of commissioners and its attorneys have discussed a "projected" sale of the bonds.

"But we can't make any kind of announcement yet," she said.

Kent's lawsuit, which raised questions about bond election procedures and its validity, has already delayed the sale of the bonds. County officials had planned to have them sold in mid-July, but the lawsuit and

the appeal put the sale on hold.

Kent, a mechanic who ran unsuccessfully for the state legislature, filed a lawsuit on May 26 in 6th District Court against Clerk Dick Pence and Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter. He alleged that Pence didn't register voters for the bond election.

Upon advice of bond counsel, the county required voters sign an statement attesting to age and residency requirements for the bond election. In the election, a large majority of voters favored the sale of \$3.8 million in bonds to pay for the construction of a

new Twin Falls County Jail.

Kent accused Baxter of not prosecuting Pence for an alleged election violation in November, which he claimed resulted in the improper procedures during the jail-bond election.

Kent claimed he was entitled to \$53,000 for alleged damages to his property for the levy for the jail-bond debt. He did not ask for a new bond election in the lawsuit.

Kent's claim against Baxter was dismissed in mid-July by 5th District Judge Daniel Meehl, who ruled she had prosecu-

torial immunity. The judge also ruled that the claims against Baxter and Pence be dismissed because Kent failed to file a tort claim, or claim of personal injury, with the court before filing the lawsuit with the court.

Kent filed three weeks ago a motion asking the Idaho Supreme Court to hear the case. The motion route to the justices will expedite the case because it's one of "public interest" and will also be in his interest because it would save him filing fees, he said.

Involuntary commitments considered

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls County and Canyon View Hospital officials began setting riggings Thursday for further cooperation on involuntary mental commitments.

Officials are charting patient indigency for better navigation through a complex legal sea. And a not may be extended to commit, through donated services, those patients falling into neither category — at no greater cost to the county.

Canyon View Administrator Ken Deibert met with County Commissioner Judy Felton, Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter and Deputy Prosecutor Scott James, who handles most of the commitments for the office.

The four began sorting out a recent attorney general's "legal guideline" that Deibert requested, which affirmed Baxter's policy for handling commitments.

Baxter's office handles all commitments for mentally ill people in police custody — usually considered in "imminent danger" of hurting themselves or others. Likewise, the prosecutor handles all other cases when the county commissioner's rule that the patient is indigent.

But the definition and scope of indigency is unclear.

"The person who is not in imminent danger is the one who falls between the cracks," Deibert said.

People responsible for paying for commitments

are different than those responsible for regular medical indigency. A commitment candidate, his spouse or adult children must each be investigated for indigency, but for plain medical indigency a patient's parents, for example, may also be responsible.

The scope of that indigency investigation is one point Baxter will discuss with the full board of Commissioners in a meeting "early next week."

Further, Deibert faces potential lawsuits by releasing patients, if they are found not indigent and cannot pay for necessary medical help.

"The legal exposure to my doctors, staff and company is horrendous, if we cannot get the legal means to hold the person and treat him," Deibert said.

But a compromise may be available.

Baxter ordered a stop to commitments for non-indigents nearly three years ago to save the county money — an estimated \$600 to \$1,000 for each of the six to 10 annual cases affected. Deibert requested the attorney general's opinion because Baxter's predecessor handled these discretionary commitments.

Baxter noted that since her staff is on salary, they could devote time to these cases without costing the county more. Her reluctance to handle the cases stems from the medical costs, for which the county is billed.

Costs arise from two "designated examiners," doctors qualified to determine mental incompetence, who must each independently recommend commitment.

So Deibert said he would ask doctors whether they would waive \$40-an-hour for examinations and \$100-an-hour to testify in these cases.

There needs to be reasonableness on everyone's part," Deibert said.

"I agree," Baxter said.

That is a solution for non-indigent cases where family, friends or neighbors are unwilling to pay for commitment. But it also apparently closes a hole in the net assuring commitments for all requiring it.

Deibert, Baxter and Felton fretted about availability of financial and medical records to determine indigency and the necessity of commitment. The struggle to ascertain indigency occurs within legal deadlines of hours instead of weeks.

Troubles occur because patients may be incompetent to release records and the prosecutor hasn't yet filed a case to seize records.

Patients' credibility is dubious when they sign to release records while others seek to commit them, "which is a real Catch-22 for all of us," Deibert said.

And Baxter echoed, "We need the information, they (commissioners) need it, we can't subpoena records because there is not a case filed yet — it's a big problem."

But if Baxter handles all police custody cases and all indigents, and Deibert persuades doctors to float the occasional fees for non-indigents — that apparently would cover all the bases.

These participants planned to get together again Sept. 15 to review progress in this area.

Symms joining Dole on Central American trip

TWIN FALLS — Idaho Sen. Steve Symms will join Minority Leader Bob Dole and two other Senate Republicans in a two-day tour of Central America to see if there is any real basis for a negotiated peace settlement in Nicaragua, a Dole spokesman said on Thursday.

"Basically, they want to see what Ortega has in mind," said Walt Riker, a spokesman for Sen. Dole.

Dole appointed Symms, Sen. John McCain of Arizona and Sen. Thad Cochran of Mississippi as part of the Central American Observation Team. Democrats will be sending their own members down later as part of a bipartisan effort, Riker said.

Dole will be leading the team, which leaves Sunday, in a tour of Nicaragua, El Salvador, Honduras, Costa Rica and possibly Panama.

A meeting is scheduled on Monday with Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega, although the group had not received final confirmation, Riker said.

Senators also will be meeting with Costa Rican President Oscar Arias and Honduran President Jose Azcona.

Riker said the senators will "use the eyes and ears of the Senate."

"Their general task will be to oversee the peace initiatives in Central America and report back to the Senate," he said.

Symms joined Dole earlier this month in blasting the proposed Nicaraguan peace plan.

"It sends a message to women in Idaho, and it shows we have a hard-working group of women," she said.

The assistant minority leader job is currently being held by Sen. Bruce Sweeney of Lewiston. But Sweeney is considered a "shoe in" to take over for outgoing Minority Leader Kermit Kiebert, who last week was named to head the Transportation Department by Gov. Cecil Andrus.

Although McLaughlin reportedly has a slight edge, Senate watchers say it is shaping up to be an interesting race.

"I'm enjoying thinking about it," said McLaughlin, who's serving her third term. "People have been urging me to go for it, but I'm going to have to do some soul-searching."

A drawback for McLaughlin is that she would have to give up her seat on the powerful Joint Finance and Appropriations Committee. If elected as assistant minority leader.

Reed and Bray both said they were definitely seeking the job.

"I think it will be a low-key race," Reed, a two-term senator, said. "We all admire each other, and I think it will depend on who is

best for the caucus."

Bray said she was asked to run because of her position in Boise.

"It was felt we didn't have someone to make official comments when necessary and we needed someone close to Boise," Bray said.

In addition to acting as one of the official spokesmen for Senate Democrats, the job also includes helping to shape policy, recruiting Democrats for the 1988 election and aiding in fund raising.

Bray said the job would be a continuation of her work on the Senate Campaign Committee.

But if McLaughlin wins, Bray also is in a position to move to JFAC.

"Either way, it's a win-win situation," she said.

Reed said the Democrats have to be more forceful in presenting their positions on issues.

"We need to be seen as not always 'me-judging' to Republicans," Reed said.

Reed said her talents in team-building and communication lend themselves to the job.

"It would be nice to be in on the action," she said.

IPC profits down Result of dry summer

TWIN FALLS — This year's dry summer, coupled with slack sales of electricity to other utilities, is causing Idaho Power Co. to dip into its financial surpluses for the first time in recent history.

The Boise-based company still has been booking profits this year, although they are somewhat diminished from big-water years.

But those profits — along with several millions in stockpiled earnings — also have been going immediately to stockholders in dividend payments. Idaho Power's board of directors has pledged to sustain current levels of dividends through the year, said President Robert J. O'Connor this week in Twin Falls.

During the first half of 1987, Idaho Power banked \$24.6 million in income after paying off its operating expenses. But the utility had to state up \$32.7 million for its 37,956 preferred and common stockholders.

It reached into its surpluses for about \$8.1 million, the first time that type of withdrawal has taken place in more than a decade, according to corporate figures. Idaho Power did not have to tap its reserves even in 1977, when it was the last very dry year.

The dip hasn't made much of a dent in Idaho Power's stockpile of surpluses. As of the end of 1986, it had \$256.5 million worth of retained earnings to draw on.

"We're not in the situation where our retained earnings are going to be restricted in such a way that we wouldn't be able to pay the dividends," said Dan Bowers, vice president and treasurer.

And the utility is prepared to dig into its pocket again in the third and fourth quarter, if necessary. Unless water conditions change or the surplus electricity market gets juicy again, Idaho Power expects to continue tapping its reserves through this year, Bowers said.

Idaho Power is making less money this year than it has in the past for two reasons: lack of water generating power at its hydroelectric dams and a major decrease in sales of excess electricity to other utilities in high-use areas of the Sunbelt and California.

In the first two quarters of the year, total revenues were down \$19.8 million to \$195.5 million. Profits slid 38.8 percent to \$24.7 million, partially because of higher costs for running coal plants to generate power.

Total energy sales were down 19 percent through July, the company announced this week.

Although generally a problem, the dry weather did help Idaho Power to a minor extent. Sales of irrigation power were up 11.6 percent as farmers tried to keep their crops wet. Industrial customers also took about 7 percent more power, the company said.

But residential sales, the biggest single component of revenues, also were down.

Officers hope boy safe in California

BURLEY — Although Cassia County sheriff's officers are still searching locally for a 4-year-old boy who was reported missing Tuesday evening, they are hoping to find him safe in California.

Cassia County authorities told Tuesday that a friend from Salt Lake City said she brought the child from California and left him at the mother's Burley home while Aguilera was at work. When the mother was unable to find the little boy, she went to the law enforcement officers for help.

Cassia County detective Dave Tracy said the friend, Rita Valdez, had returned to Salt Lake City and the child's mother traveled there Thursday to locate and question the woman.

"We told her to contact us immediately if she located the friend and obtained information about the child," Tracy said Thursday. "So far we have not heard from her."

Tracy said the boy, Joaquin Aguilera, was staying with a family friend in Los Angeles. The mother provided officers with the name of the man and a telephone number

where she said he was working and could be paged. Tracy said the number was that of a telephone company and the people there were unfamiliar with the name. But they said the man might have worked for a sub-contracting firm at some point, but they had no way of knowing.

Tracy said the mother is working in the fields and was not home when the friend said she left the little boy there. There were no clothes or luggage left and residents in the neighborhood had not seen a small boy around the Aguilera home at any time Tuesday.

Officers say they can find no evidence that the child was ever in Burley. They believe that for some reason the friend did not bring the child from California to Burley as she told the mother.

However, Tracy said, officers must assume the child is missing and are continuing to search and investigate the matter. They are also asking that residents report any such youngster they may have seen since Tuesday afternoon. The Aguilera home is located at 800 Miller St.

EPA cites scientist for tree test

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Environmental Protection Agency on Thursday reprimanded a Montana scientist for not getting permission before injecting elm trees with genetically altered bacteria.

The agency sent Dr. Gary Strobel of Montana State University's plant pathology department a letter warning him not to do that again and saying he needs a companion if he applies for EPA approval of an experiment in the next year.

"I don't think that there is anything else we could do with Dr. Strobel," Dr. John A. Moore, assistant EPA administrator for pesticides and toxic substances, told a news conference. "I think in some respects one might say they are mild sanctions."

Strobel told the university's biosafety panel earlier this month that he had injected the genetically altered bacteria into 14 elm trees on the Bozeman, Mont., campus without approval. The experiment was to determine whether the bacteria would produce enough of an antibiotic to kill the Dutch elm disease fungus.

Didn't get okay for experiment

He had said his action was a form of "civil disobedience" against regulations he considers to be too restrictive. Strobel could not be reached immediately for comment on the EPA's action.

Moore said a faculty member at Montana State tipped the EPA that the experiment was being run without permission and Strobel acknowledged that in a telephone conversation with agency employees. Moore did not identify the tipster.

Strobel had applied for agency approval after the experiment had started, Moore said. The EPA returned Strobel's application and additional information, saying "there is little to be gained by our processing an application for an experiment that has already been initiated."

"The agency does not have the legal authority to do more than send a warning letter to a first-offense violator," Moore said. A second offense could bring a fine of \$1,000 and possible criminal prosecution, he said, adding that he did not know what criminal penalties could be imposed.

Moore said Strobel committed an "error of judgment" but said the light penalty he received should not encourage others to "charge off and do the same thing."

"I don't condone for one iota what he did," Moore said. "But on the other hand, let's keep it in perspective."

Actions such as Strobel's could jeopardize federal grants received by Montana State University, and Moore said he expected peer pressure would help keep other scientists playing by the rules.

Moore said the agency did not believe that the bacteria being used by Strobel in the experiment were dangerous or that the research posed any great risk.

If someone else were to submit a proposal to the agency to conduct a similar experiment, it could be approved well within the 90-day limit for acting on such requests, Moore said. The university is considering a recommendation that the trees Strobel injected will be cut down and burned.

Aryan Nations' Jones takes out legal ad in newspaper

TWIN FALLS — Aryan Nations member Wayne E. Jones of Twin Falls has published a legal advertisement in The Times-News, telling the public that his recent court appearance was illegally ordered and conducted.

Jones was charged by the Idaho Tax Commission with failure to file a tax return for 1986. When he failed to appear for court, a contempt of court warrant was issued and he was brought before the 5th District Court. He was ordered to serve five days in jail for contempt with an additional day for each day he did not file the return.

Jones filed the return and said at

the time that he did so in order to get out of jail.

His legal notice claims the proceedings were not held according to proper law. Jones claims that as a "private foreign citizen" he is excluded from the tax law definition of a "person."

His legal notice, calls Idaho Tax Commission members "rebels" and accuses the entire state of Idaho is in the hands of rebels who have overthrown the lawful government of the state.

He also charges the acts by the tax commission and courts have violated his religious rights and states there is no law saying a private citizen or his property can be taxed.

arguing a peace plan put forth by President Reagan and House Speaker Jim Wright of Texas. That plan called for a cease-fire and negotiations in Central America within 60 days.

As part of that plan, Reagan agreed not to lobby for Contra aid for two weeks and not to submit a formal request for more money for the Contras until Sept. 30.

In a speech in St. Louis on Aug. 12, Dole called on Reagan to submit a Contra aid request, which Congress would vote on in September. If a cease-fire begins in Nicaragua, the United States would suspend military aid but continue with non-military aid, he said.

Dole also proposed that the U.S. negotiate directly with Nicaragua, something the Reagan administration has refused to do for four years. But Dole said any such talks should be limited to the subject of Soviet and Cuban military aid to Nicaragua.

"Dole is very concerned there hasn't been any talk of the Soviet Union's presence in Central

America and what the future holds for the Soviets," Riker said. "He's not saying that the Contras aren't cut off at the knees and left twisting in the wind."

In addition to the Reagan proposal, the presidents of five Central American countries signed an agreement on Aug. 7 calling for democracy and an end to all internal wars in the region.

The plan closely resembled a version by Costa Rican President Arias.

There are a lot of initiatives in the wind — a lot of initiatives in Central America have one, President Reagan has another — the question is what is in the best interest of the United States," Riker said.

dropped almost 6 percent.

Lower water flows through Idaho Power's dams and the utility in both the supply and price of its electricity. Hydroelectric dams generate the company's cheapest power.

"We have less, low-cost electricity to sell because of the low hydroelectric flows," said Idaho Power spokesman Larry Taylor. "We still have energy to sell, but it's higher cost because it's coal-fired." Idaho Power backs up its hydroelectric dams with gas, oil, and three coal-fired plants.

The higher average cost of electricity for what is called "off-system sales" has priced Idaho Power out of some markets.

So far this year, those sales have slipped 71.3 percent, Idaho Power said this week. But there are other factors as well, and some may be longlasting, Taylor said.

He said he will also file this week in 6th District Court a notice of appeal to the Idaho Supreme Court, Kent said.

In the event his motion is still not granted, he has his notice of appeal to get the case before the justices.

He will have to pay filing fees for the notice, but if he is successful in his motion, he may recover the costs, he said.

Kent said he will be appealing the dismissal of the lawsuit, as well as a court decision ordering him to pay the defendants more than \$13,000 in legal fees.

"There is one way to find out if a man is honest - ask him. If he says, 'Yes,' you know he is crooked."

One way to pursue an accurate defense is to analyze what declarer is up to and then take appropriate measures. However, if you're playing against a cagey declarer, you cannot always count on what he seems to be doing.

South won dummy's spade queen to tell West that there was no future in that suit, then played a club from dummy and inserted his 10.

West won his jack and concluded that South's weakspot was in hearts - after all, there was little hope in spades and diamonds, and South himself had attacked clubs.

West switched to a low heart and it was over quickly. The defense established a heart winner for South, something that South could never have done if left to his own devices.

Did West commit a blunder by switching to hearts? One couldn't call it a blunder, since that play might have been a winning one. The only reasonable answer to West's problem is for West to know his opponents. Against an expert South, it's dangerous for West to believe everything he sees. Against an inexperienced South, West can shift to hearts, knowing it's the best chance.

Charts smile on band's unique sound A Day with the Dead

Sometimes the lights
are shining on me
Other times I can barely see.
Lately it seems to me
What a long, strange trip it's been...

"Truckin"
PARK WEST, Utah — Written nearly two decades ago, those lyrics by the Grateful Dead, have become an ironically accurate account of the band's experience on the American music scene.

After its heyday in the late 1960s and early '70s, the group from northern California had skirted widespread popularity until the release of the LP "In the Dark" earlier this year.

In fact, the Dead, who first gained prominence playing in San Francisco's Haight-Ashbury district during the Summer of Love in 1967, didn't make the Top 40 until their new single "Touch of Grey" started climbing the charts this summer.

What's more, for the week ending Aug. 28, Billboard magazine listed "In the Dark" at No. 7 among the country's best-selling albums — after just five weeks on the charts.

But mainstream success has never much concerned the Grateful Dead, nor their faithful band of fans, known as Dead Heads, many of whom follow the group from coast to coast.

While the rest of America was surviving subsequent bouts with the Bee Gees, Rick Springfield and Cyndi Lauper, the Dead continued to churn out their unique brand of music. It's a sound that draws thousands year-round to concerts, like the one held last week at this Utah ski resort just southeast of Salt Lake City.

The contrasts between mainstream rock and the Dead are countless. While makeup and

gaudy outfits seem requisite for many concert bands today, Dead vocalist/guitarist Bob Weir played Park West in a black T-shirt, cut-off shorts and running shoes.

Other bands make it illegal for fans to record concerts; the Dead offer a special platform for anyone to set up equipment and record each show.

To experience a Dead concert is to take a step back 20 years. The record-setting Park West crowd of 14,100 covered this mountain like a blanket of tie-dyed clothing, beads and sandals.

To listen to a live Dead show is to revel for more than three hours as the crowd refuses to stop dancing and never misses a lyric as it sings along with the six-member band's two vocalists/guitarists, Weir and Jerry Garcia.

Yet the music is only the grand finale of a Dead appearance. In the hours before the concert, the tiered parking lot of Park West was converted into a multi-layered bazaar, with Dead Head vendors, known as Road Trippers, selling everything from jewelry and tie-dyed clothes to vegetable egg rolls and "Rasta pasta."

Even the latest consumer fad was evident: Several vendors were selling car-window shades — but rather than a simple print of sun glasses, these were covered with skeletons and roses, two of the band's trademarks.

Wandering through the makeshift market also was a bit like entering a pharmacy. It was difficult to walk 50 yards without being offered some variety of hallucinogenic mushroom or "dozes," Deadpeak for LSD.

"Indeed, Nancy Reagan and her 'Just Say No' campaign wouldn't fly here. One of the many T-shirts for sale carried a melting caricature of her husband above the words "Dose Reagan."

But to focus on the drug element at a Dead concert is to cater to a hackneyed image of Dead Heads, who are an eclectic bunch, not a kooky group of dead beats.

Many Dead fans are sensitive to the accusation that they're all on drugs. In fact, there is even a collection of fans who have formed what might be called the Alcoholics Anonymous of Dead Heads. Called Wharf Rats, they meet at each concert site for mutual support.

"This group gets a bad rap in the press," says Dave Littlefield, a big fan of the band who, with his full beard, looks like a young Garcia. "It's always drugs, drugs, drugs. That's part of it, but not all of it."

Littlefield, who saw his first Dead show at the Salt Palace in 1973, is effective at dispelling Dead Head clichés.

He's a lawyer in Salt Lake, for one thing; to satisfy his Dead appetite he tries to arrange his business obligations so they coincide with the band's appearances. He's seen 16 shows just this year.

Oftentimes he takes his wife and four kids. His 9-year-old daughter knows the words to many of the band's songs.

What keeps him coming back? "It's the family. It's the peace. It's the band. It's everything," says Littlefield, who celebrated his 39th birthday at the Dead concert in Telluride, Colo., earlier this month.

Littlefield used to not tell anyone he was sneaking around to see the Dead. "Then," he says, "I realized half the people here are doing the same thing."

Trying to explain the special attraction of the band, Littlefield says, "All Grateful Dead music has a dreamlike quality that is hard to describe in words."

"When the band is hot," he adds, "it's magical."

Sales campaigns hit concert hall crowd

LOS ANGELES — It wasn't so long ago that the only pitch heard in most concert halls was the musical kind.

But in recent years music lovers have been increasingly subjected to the sales pitch: for souvenir T-shirts, sweat shirts, books, records, label buttons, post cards, designer jewelry, crystal wine glasses and other mementos of the evening's performance.

Product merchandising, which has long been a gold mine of revenue for "Star Wars" movies, Saturday morning cartoons, amusement parks, sports franchises and rock 'n' roll bands, is also catching on big in the refined and sophisticated world of opera, ballet and symphony music.

Taking a cue from the rock 'n' roll world, where sales of merchandise at concerts sometimes generate more net profit than paid admissions, performing arts groups and administrators are finding product merchandising to be one hedge against rising costs, new tax laws that may threaten charitable donations and dwindling government funding.

And merchandising can pay off not just at the cash register, but also in self-promotion and in public relations.

"I'm surprised that more groups aren't doing it," said Paul Gruber, director of business development for the Metropolitan Opera Guild.

Though he did not break down figures, Gruber said that the guild's on-site product sales, book publishing, original record pressings and a mail-order catalogue business represent a significant part of the \$3 million the guild contributes to the Met's \$66 million annual budget.

"It's the new horizon of revenue for us," said Craig Palmer, director of marketing and media relations for San Francisco Ballet. "We have pretty much maximized our traditional sources for funds, including ticket sales and donations. So in the last year or two we've begun to give (merchandising) higher priority in our operation."

rector of New York City Ballet, said that company will raise about \$200,000 of its \$22 million budget this year from sales of a plethora of dance-related items — from autographed pictures of principal dancers to a line of custom jewelry — both when the company is in residence at the New York State Theater and traveling the country on tour.

Raymond said earned income from ticket sales made up about 75 percent of the company's budget in 1980, but that figure has dropped to 63 percent this year.

"Where do you get (the balance) from? You can raise ticket prices, but we want to keep ticket prices down," Raymond said. "The number of performances we do is going up faster than earned income and that gap is widening. You can either get it from the government, which has flattened out, or from individuals and corporations," he said.

The decline in federal funding is only part of the bleak overall financial picture for arts groups. According to the American Arts Alliance, two-thirds of all professional symphony orchestras in the United States ended their 1986 seasons with deficits, double the amount of groups operating in the red just five years earlier.

So for many organizations, merchandising is at least one small bright spot in the constant scramble to balance their books.

Lately, however, performing arts groups that operate as non-profit tax-exempt entities, have become increasingly worried that the federal government is throwing them yet another curve. In June, a congressional subcommittee spent five days in hearings to review the whole non-profit issue and the tax on unrelated business income, or UBI.

"The UBI tax hasn't been reviewed comprehensively since its enactment in 1950," said Beth Vance, staff director for the oversight subcommittee of the House Ways and Means committee that conducted the hearings.

"The oversight subcommittee is looking at the tax to see if it is effective, if it is inappropriately structured, if it is being complied with and if government agencies re-

Mountain Mamas' work tops quilt fest

STANLEY — Since the Mountain Mammas at it again. Since November 1986 they have been working without fanfare. Now they are finished and ready for show.

Their latest production is a quilt, not a mountain ballad or rock song which a name like The Sawtooth Mountain Mamas would readily evoke. For the Mountain Mamas are a group of civic-minded women of Stanley who are raffling off the labor of their hand-made creation as part of Stanley's three-day Quilt Festival beginning Sept. 5.

"There were about 15 of us working on the quilt throughout the winter in our homes. It was only during the last months that we got together for the fun part — the quilting," said Lynn Karvaseck, president of the Mountain Mamas who looks more like a college student body president than the leader of a group called the Sawtooth Mountain Mamas or Mountain Mamas for short.

"You don't even need to have children to join our group," said Lauri Godwa, another civic-minded Mountain Mama who happens to be a Stanley mother, but who has the slim fit looking long blonde hair of a typical California beach girl.

Quilting may be America's oldest folk art, but any thought that Stanley's Third Annual Quilt Festival is for the old and decrepit is quickly cast aside by these young Mountain Mamas. Now experienced quilters in the United States, quilting — its past and present forms — will be on display at the festival to be held Sept. 5, 6, and 7 at the Stanley Community Building. There will be quilting workshops, a slide lecture and a display of about 20 nationally acclaimed quilts.

One exhibition quilt, a Statue of Liberty design, will be on display from Washington, D.C. Others come from San Francisco and the quilting names of well-known quilters such

as Joyce Stewart and Judy Mathison. Admission to the festival display area is \$2.50.

There will also be two 6-hour workshops conducted by Mathison, a nationally recognized quilter who has been teaching for more than 10 years.

"Anyone from beginner to expert may enroll in the workshops where each student will execute a small wall hanging. The beginner may not finish the hanging but they will be well on their way," says quilter Kathy Cole who operates, with two other Stanley quilters, the Sawtooth Quilt Designs enterprise.

On Sept. 5, the workshop titled "Looking Through Your Art Window" will guide students in the Art Window traditional quilt design which gives the illusion of seeing a scene through lattice or panes of a window.

On Sept. 6, Mathison will head a workshop titled "Pieced Puzzles" where students create block designs for three dimensional shapes for quilting.

Each workshop is \$35 and goes from 9 a.m. to noon plus 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. Enrollment is limited to 25 in each class. For either workshop send the fee plus a stamped self-addressed envelope to: Sawtooth Quilt Designs, P.O. Box 62, Stanley, 89776. List of materials to bring to class will be sent by return mail.

The workshop fee also entitles students to a slide lecture by Mathison on Sunday, Sept. 6 at 7 p.m. Titled "Contemporary Variations on Traditional Designs," it explains how old traditional quilt patterns are being incorporated by contemporary quiltmakers.

The festival includes a Quilt Block Contest with deadline for entry Sept. 1. For a \$2.50 entry fee, each contestant is sent a piece of the main fabric which they combine with other fabrics of their choice to produce a block 11 inches by 15 inches. All blocks will be on display during the three days and all visitors may vote on their favorite. The top vote-gaining 20 blocks will then

be sewn into a quilt and the name of one of the 20 favorite contestants drawn to receive the completed quilt at the festival the next year.

For the main fabric piece and entry rules call Kathy Cole at 774-6947.

Even if festival-goers never have any intentions of picking up a needle this modern quilting may be for them. Old cherished quilts that may have been handed down within a family for years, may be brought to the festival for documentation. The Boise Basin Quilters Assoc. The Boise Basin Quilters Assoc. will have a booth during the three-day Labor Day weekend to take down information such as the maker's name and date made, plus take measurements and photograph family quilts.

The photograph may be used as part of Idaho's Centennial in 1990, in a book of old quilts now being compiled. Thus, anyone owning a quilt has a chance to add a piece of their family and culture to Idaho's history books. For as the pioneer women of Idaho stitched bits and pieces of their frontier life into patterns, their lifestyle became preserved for generations as authentically as a painting or piece of writing.

have no legislative agenda. We are really just trying to get information into a public hearing to analyze what we have and whether something should be done or not."

For longtime fans such as Littlefield, the Dead's new-found commercial success is a mixed blessing.

"I feel two ways about it — good and bad," he says. "But everybody should have a chance to hear the music."

Laurie Johnson, a four-year Dead Head veteran at age 23, "thinks the popularity is 'just a phase.'"

"I don't like touring on MTV and seeing them there," she says.

Johnson is a Road Tripper who sells elaborate necklaces made out of beads. Her first Dead show was in Madison, Wis., in 1981, two years before she started following them.

She's seen 85 concerts in all, "not many," she says. "I'm just a kid. I know people who have seen 500 shows."

Having grown up in Wilmette, Ill., a wealthy northern suburb of Chicago, Johnson quit school her junior year of high school and moved to Madison.

"I love being poor," she says. "I know what it's like to have a lot of money. You can't find happiness in money."

Johnson eased her parents into the idea that she was a Dead Head by saying she was visiting friends when actually she was touring. Once they found out what she was doing, they responded with the predictable cries of "Do something with your life!"

But progress has been made. Earlier this summer, Johnson's father asked her to buy four extra tickets for a show at Alpine Valley, Wis. He wanted to go and bring his wife and Johnson's little brother and sister.

"So they've come a long way," Johnson says with a smile. "At this point, they approve of what I'm doing because I'm happy."

Answering an oft-repeated question, Johnson says she became a Dead Head because "It's such a great feeling. Each concert is like coming home."

"We're like a big traveling community," she says later. "It's like modern-day hippies."

If that's what Dead Heads are, meet part-time gypsy Mike Urosee, a student at the University of Illinois at Chicago who has been "really into it the past two years."

Urosee relaxes before the concert on the hood of a car, dressed in a tie-dyed shirt, black sweat pants and wearing round-framed glasses.

"I like the spread of it," he says of the Dead's now popularity, "as long as it's used for good...not commercialization."

His reasons for following the band are simple. "There's a lot of good people, a good time, and good music," says Urosee, who will be returning to UIC this fall, but plans to transfer to the University of California at Berkeley.

"I study anthropology, so this works in well," he adds, smiling.

Urosee isn't the only one who enjoys studying the people at Dead concerts as much as he likes the concerts themselves. Jody Abraham, a 21-year-old from Oakland, Calif., also is an anthropology student and a Dead fan.

"I like to watch the changes people go through when they take acid," Abraham says. "I'm somewhat of a student of human nature."

"I see a lot of people losing their minds," he says. "There's really nothing you can do when someone trips out. They just have to ride it out themselves."

A Road Tripper for about a year, Abraham sells everything from clothing made in Guatemala to pipes carved out of stone.

He explains the unique system of capitalism among Dead vendors.

"You have to agree on prices, so you don't undercut another vendor," he says. "And we don't set up close to each other."

Several Volkswagen buses down from Abraham's stand sits Julie Holman, a good-looking woman of 28 who looks closer to 20. Dressed in tie-dyed pants and shirt that are two shades of blue, Holman watches over her wares, earrings made out of beads and shells.

She also watches over her 2½-year-old son, Eric. "I think it's great for him," she says, stressing that she never takes him to indoor shows because those are too loud.

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Many Dead fans tend to be politically left of center

"There's a little section at each concert for all the kids...Everyone protects them."

If you ask Eric what the tie-dyed outfit he's wearing is for, he'll say, "A Dead show."

Holman, who's from Salt Lake, first saw the band in Oakland on New Year's 1979. Why does she continue to follow them?

"I just like Jerry's guitar; I think he's the sweetest guitar player ever," she says.

Recalling Garcia's struggle with drugs which he only recently recovered from Holman says, "After

Judging from the Dead's three powerful hours of music later that evening, Holman has nothing to worry about.

With the much-touted bond between the band and its fans as strong as ever, the Grateful Dead's long, strange trip seems to have just begun.

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'No Way Out': eerily, movie mirrors reality

HOLLYWOOD — It is hard to imagine better luck in the film world than the timing of the crackling thriller "No Way Out." Its story? A cover-up within the Pentagon by the secretary of defense who conducts his own secret investigation — stone-walling the FBI and CIA — and chooses a handsome decorated military hero to be its point man and possibly its fall guy.

Only "Three Mile Island" and "The China Syndrome" have come this close to actual events before, and "No Way Out" seems more eerily congruent: more sinister and real. One of the hallmarks of director Roger Donaldson is bedrock believability, done with self-effacing technique. In scenes behind closed doors, he is almost predictably political: reactions we get a rare sense that this is exactly what the cops say and just how they say it when the civilians are safely out of earshot.

Donaldson's use of cinematic realism is demonstrated eloquently in his New Zealand-made "Sunset Palace" — in the bustling tensions of sexual relationships, his players on that battlefield are gorgeous: Kevin Costner, Sean Young, and Gene Hackman. Young is the vital character, although she is the mistress of the deeply proprietary secretary of defense (Hackman).

she embarks on a steamy love affair with naval hero Costner, based on hot-mutual attraction (These unbridled love scenes and attendant nudity and language give the film its R rating). Only afterward does the director that Costner's new boss at the Pentagon is the secretary of defense.

Precisely. Hackman commits her murder, Shaken and agitated, he is quite prepared to go to the police, however his right-hand-and-hatchet-man will station himself with special police backing of it. Hackman's Yurti declares that the witness is the almost-mythical Yuri, a supposedly deeply planted Soviet spy who is to Washington that the Loch Ness monster is to Scotland.

Yurti must be found, and fast, in the interests of atomic security. A stricken Costner, nursing heartbreak of his own, is near the top of the department's investigating team. But he knows absolutely that the Yuri story is a fake, because it was Costner himself who watched (unrecognized) as Hackman left the crime scene. Now, the story's great ironic gimmick: Costner must guide the most complicated bloodhounds to his own demise.

In Donaldson's hands, the action is kept whizzing breathlessly — fast enough that you skim over oc-

casional credibility gaps. By underlining the drama, not the melodrama of his story, Hackman, in a beautiful performance, becomes a conscience-wracked man-of-deep rather than an omnipotent monster. The Italian-turned-love story between Young and Costner is equally fascinating. Each of the smaller roles have been painstakingly cast, particularly Paton's smarmy zealot and George Dzundza, as Costner's computer-wiz close friend.

In the old pulp days of movie advertising, they would have blared that "No Way Out" was "Born from today's headlines!" In our only slightly less lurid times, we can appreciate it as extraordinary shrewdness, bordering on the present, on the part of the film's producers, Laura Ziskin, and Robert Garland, and its executive producer Mace Neufeld, all of whom have clearly had a bead on Washington politics long before America was having the Iran-Contra hearings with its breakfast-corn flakes.

Garland has a double share of credit, because it is also his superior screenplay and story, adapted from Kenneth Fearing's slim novel "The Big Clock." The book has been the basis for one nicely taut movie before, a 1947 version starring Ray Millon, Maureen O'Sullivan, and Charles Laughton, which clung closely to the novel.

Hollywood riding on record totals; extraordinary fall season expected

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — As the year's movie box office receipts build toward record totals, the nation's theaters are looking forward to a fall season, with an extraordinary number of releases, including returns to the screen by Barbra Streisand and Steven Spielberg.

Autumn is traditionally the lull between the bonanzas of summer and Christmas, notes industry analyst Arthur Murphy of Daily Variety.


"But even with a so-so season, 1987 is likely to go over \$4 billion for a new record. It's like Peto Rose getting hits: Every dollar is a new record," Murphy said.

Murphy's statistics show the box office takes so far this year at \$2.43 billion, as opposed to \$2.189 a year ago. The 1986 gross was greatly helped by strong fall movies, especially the summer holdover, "Crocodile Dundee." This summer has produced few films that seem capable of surviving the hot weather, but heavy reinforcements are coming up.

A local consulting firm, Exhibitor

Relations, has counted 104 movies for release in September, October and November while 64 appeared in the same months last year. Of course, autumn is a time when the major companies get rid of their dogs, and independents scramble for a share of the less competitive market. But the post-Labor Day period is also when studios release attractions geared for the Academy Awards.

Barbra Streisand will be appearing for the first time since her 1985 "Yentl." She is starring in "Nuts," based on the off-Broadway play about a woman seeking to prove her sanity.



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'Dragnet' has possibilities, but ultimately it's schizophrenic

DRAGNET (PG-13). It is a shame that decisions were made to interrupt this fond recollection of the old show with slam-bang car chases, silly organ rituals and other Big Movie-isms. A double shame, because there are patches of bright dialogue in the script by Dan Aykroyd, Alan Zweibel and the movie's director, Tom Mankiewicz. And Aykroyd and Hank put off each other to great effect. It makes the film seem absolutely schizophrenic.

movie isn't full of raw energy, that it's for the most part polite melodrama. There is the music, however, great dollops of '60s songs, and it lifts the movie when the dialogue and the earnest-but-uninspired direction (by Luis Valdez) keeps it earthbound. THE LIVING DAYLIGHTS (PG). Yes, the new Bond — Timothy Dalton — is splendid, and everything from his first to his last: hunting cars, parachutes, ski troops, paratroops, troops of toy soldiers, troops of Afghan freedom fighters, missives, missiles, heroin and heroines. Is it possible that, with this Bond chapter, the 16th, audiences have outgrown the gimmes? It seems that way.

SNOW-WHITE-AND-THE-SEVEN DWARFS (G). Fifty years after its premiere, Walt Disney's first feature still ranks as a masterpiece of both animation and film making. "Snow White" contains some of the darkest terrors, most touching sorrows and funniest comedy ever done in animation. The Disney imagery has become so much a part of American popular culture that it is difficult to imagine any other version of these characters. Although some of the later Disney features are technically superior to "Snow White," none has a greater emotional appeal. A film for all ages and time.

FULL METAL JACKET (R). In this film, director Stanley Kubrick brings his rigorous artist's eye to Vietnam to create a powerful and centered statement of outrage. Although its two sections — observing the antiseptic madness of Parris Island and the too-mortal chaos of Vietnam proper — are not perfectly balanced, it is a muscular return to form for the man who made "Dr. Strangelove" and "A Clockwork Orange." And in a superb cast of unknowns, Vincent D'Onofrio and ex-Marine drill instructor Leo Ermye are exceptional.

THE LOST BOYS (R). There is always room for some good, fancy trash and this movie about a gang of punk vampires terrorizing the new kids in town — seems capable of providing some. It begins amazingly, with ominous decor and sizzling music. Then the characters open their mouths. Something that might be dialogue comes out. Something that might be blood gushes in. Before long, we're trapped in what seems like an Adams Family version of a TV teen drug problem drama (blood is quick to drain liquor), which degenerates into another gore-drenched all-American family vs. the scuzzbags

THE UNTOUCHABLES (R). "The Untouchables" has a great look, two big action set-pieces and a pair of performances by old-pro smoothies Sean Connery and Robert De Niro, which might be reward enough for moviegoers tired of the jangling assault of current movies. But what one never gets from "The Untouchables," although its technical side is exemplary, is the sense of cumulative coziness that must have overcome Eliot Ness (Kevin Costner); instead, director Brian De Palma's straight-arrow hero has a private life so stuffily dull you suspect De Palma and screenwriter David Mamet of all satire and brace yourself for the kicker that never comes.

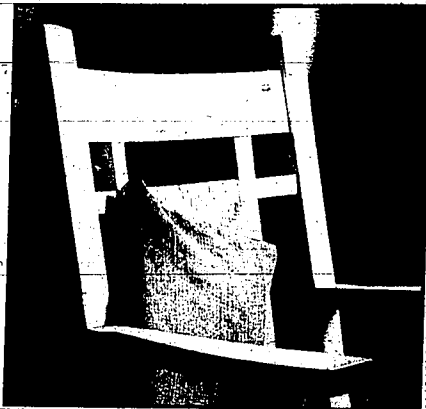
CSI's Herrett Museum will also host a traveling exhibit entitled "Remnants of the Past: Idaho's Fragile Heritage," from September 3-14.

Centennial panel hunting for best examples of Indian art

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Centennial Commission may be launching a national and even world search for outstanding examples of Indian art from the state.

A book on Indian art is among publications planned by the commission as part of Idaho's anniversary observance, said Arthur Hart, former director of the state Historical Society.

He is in charge of publications for the centennial, and appeared before the Native American Committee of the commission to ask for help in locating major Indian artwork.

Idaho's five Indian tribes have sent delegates to the committee meetings. Hart asked each of them to provide a volunteer consultant to help him determine which pieces of Indian art might be suitable for publication.

He mentioned such items as beadwork, basketry, sculptures and paintings.

Hart also said he will need help in determining Indian items which are not suitable for public display or publishing, because they are religious items or for other reasons.

Idaho Indian artwork is on display in some of the nation's major museums, including many in the East, Hart said.

The Lewis and Clark Expedition at the start of the 19th century returned with much Idaho Indian

artwork, he said, including some that dated back into the 18th century.

Some of that artwork also has found its way to Europe, and the search for Idaho Indian art may have to extend that far.

Rep. Jeanne Givens, D-Coeur d'Alene, a member of the Coeur d'Alene Tribe and chairman of the Native American Committee, said the committee has been given \$66,000 to sponsor Indian events for the centennial. She said members will have to decide the best use of the money.

Hart said the estimated cost of the Indian art book, \$37,600, will come from centennial funds and not from the amount allocated to the Native American Committee.

The centennial officials also plan to sponsor an updated Indian history book for use in Idaho's fourth and fifth grade classes and in working on "The People of Idaho," a 12 to 16-chapter book on the people of Idaho, with emphasis on the various ethnic and national groups.

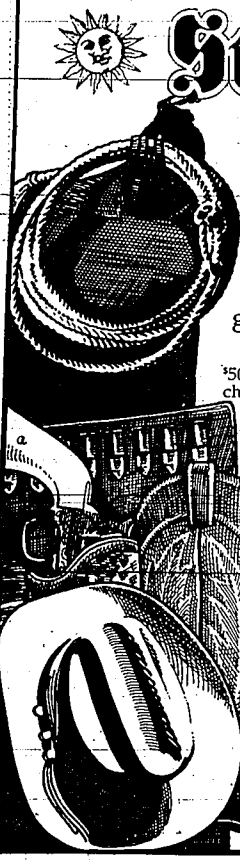

"The humor comes more from the situations than the individual jokes," she continued. "If we can keep doing what we do best and develop the characters (which also include Jenny O'Hara as Sam's assistant), we'll be in good luck."






tant and Joel Brooks as her agent), we have a good shot, no matter when we're on."

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Hackman pursues another art

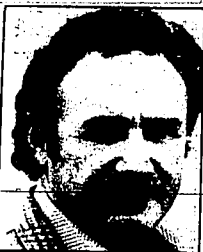

Q: What's happening with gorgeous Bo Derek? We haven't heard much about her lately. — T.S.

A: That's probably because Bo and husband, John, haven't been doing much of late. I spotted the couple this spring at the Cannes film festival, trying to drum up movie projects. It hasn't been all that easy.

After a few film flops, notably "Boleero" with Bo riding horseback nude, producers are wary. Bo tells me she'd like to make two or three films over the next year to fill "a need". In her life. Q: Though I got a kick out of Richard Dreyfuss's performance as a love-sick undercover cop in "Stakeout," it was surprising to see him play a role so unlike the others he's had. Is this deliberate? — L.G.

"I never have done anything on any of the others," she laughed.

Scorsese got one of his big breaks there with his movie "Mean Streets."

Delayed because of the Iran-Contra Hearings, "General Hospital" finally goes to South Dakota's Mt. Rushmore next week for what wild caper involving bomb and a Dusty-Terry concert.

"Back in June we shot 80 scenes in two days," notes Tiffany's Sharon Wyatt. "We couldn't get near the monuments, which are wonderful. They're just in the background. A symbol of peace."

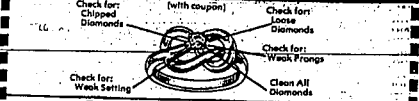

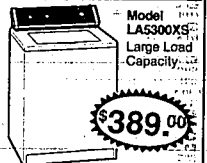

Duncan to be new "Valerie"

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Actress Sandy Duncan will take over the lead in the TV series "Valerie," replacing Valerie Harper after her salary agreement with producer Lorimar-Teletelvisions fell apart, the studio said Wednesday.

"She's off the show," Lorimar spokesman Barry Stagg said of Miss Harper. "We thought we had resolved our differences, but we were unable to work things out."

Also gone from the NBC-TV show is Miss Harper's husband, co-executive producer Tony Cacciotti, Stagg said.

A telephone call to a number given as a contact for Miss Harper was answered by a woman who said it was a wrong number. Miss Harper has refused comment during the dispute with Lorimar.

Miss Harper refused to show up for work July 27, demanding a higher salary, according to Lorimar. At least one show was shot with her character, the wife of an airline pilot, away from home on a visit.

On Aug. 4, Lorimar announced that Miss Harper had returned to work along with Cacciotti after reaching an agreement with the production company. Stagg earlier had characterized her pay as one of the highest in television. That would indicate that it was in excess of \$100,000 a week.

The revised show will feature Miss Duncan portraying Sandy Hogan, the sister of pilot Mike Hogan, who moves into the Hogan household to take over the care of her three nephews. The other characters will remain the same, with Mike Hogan played by Josh Taylor and the boys by Jason Bateman, Danny Ponce, and Jeremy Licht.

Lorimar has said that even if Miss Harper were replaced, it would not change the name of the "Valerie" show.

Shooting will resume Aug. 31, said Stagg, after "taking a two-week hiatus to rewrite and rework," he said.

Stagg refused to comment on whether any negotiations were still possible with Miss Harper, and refused to say how Lorimar's decision to replace her might affect any legal action against her.

Lorimar had filed a Los Angeles Superior Court suit seeking an injunction to enjoin Miss Harper from working anywhere else during the remaining four years of her six-year contract.

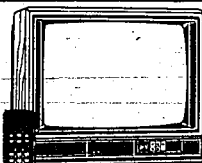

Ruttan plays perfect foil to Corbin's Arnie

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Susan Ruttan figures that she and Corbin Bernsen have a perfect symbiotic relationship on NBC's "L.A. Law." Ruttan and Bernsen, both of whom have been nominated for Emmys, star as secretary Roxanne Holman and attorney Arnie Becker. She believes her scenes with Arnie make him appear more decent. "He can still be a rat in some situations," she said. "But with Roxanne, he is more human. I think he really does care about her. He just doesn't know how to express it, that's a common problem. "You have someone who wants to mother and nurture and someone who wants to be mothered," she said. "But the problem is that you often become a victim. She's in love with Arnie. In the beginning it was mutual. "But Roxanne is now trying to take more control of her life. I hope at she's able to continue in her generation. I would like to see another side of her. She's so nice, even when she's standing up to Arnie. I'd like to see her get angry. Maybe she irritates it too far and becomes obnoxious."

Ruttan, with a soft voice and hair the color of burnished copper, was interviewed the day before she was

nominated as best supporting actress in a drama series. The highly acclaimed show earned 20 nominations, including eight in acting categories.

She grew up in Oregon, the daughter of a lumberjack who followed logging jobs across the state. "My father's 63 years old and he still goes out and tops trees," she said. "We are Norwegian, and you know Scandinavians are pretty glum people."

Her introduction to show business came as a child, when the family would turn on "The Lawrence Welk Show." Her grandmother would play the piano and she would dance and sing along with the performers on the screen.

"I didn't grow up wanting to be an actress," she recalled. "I didn't even know what an actress was. I saw TV, but I didn't know it was a job. I wanted to be on 'The Lawrence Welk Show.' He's still alive. Maybe he could do a special and ask me to be on it."

"I used to dream about that. When I was 2, I used to pack up to leave home. That's why I don't go home as much as I should. I'm afraid I couldn't leave again. But I would like to build a log cabin there. I'd like to build it all by myself."

She studied English at the University of Oregon, but married and moved to Santa Rosa, Calif. Her husband was killed in a motorcycle accident three years later and she began looking for a new direction.

"Acting was a planned accident," she said. "Someone else's plan, my accident. I always loved dressing up, and growing up hasn't put a stop to it. When I went back to school, a friend suggested acting classes. I auditioned for a school play a month later. I was standing on stage and said, 'OK, this is where I'm supposed to be.' I never felt more comfortable or at home in my life."

When she came to Los Angeles, Ruttan first worked in casting at Universal Studios. Before long, she took the plunge and landed a role with three lines on "The Misadventures of Sheriff Lobo." More episodic roles followed, plus theatrical and television movies. Her only other series was "Empire," a comedy that ran briefly on CBS. In that she also played a secretary.

Ruttan was cast for the "L.A. Law" pilot but not for the series. "The original description of her was that she was divorced and had two children," she said. "But she must keep them well hidden."

"Cheers" changes flavor for sixth season

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The departure of Shelley Long has the veteran gang at "Cheers" acting like a bunch of nervous newcomers on the eve of the hit comedy's sixth season. NBC hopes to give the series new life by introducing a fresh element to the romantic chemistry that has kept "Cheers" bubbling for five years — Kirstie Alley, a tough, dark-haired antidote to Long's ditzy, intellectual blonde.

Long left the show at the end of last season when her contract was up to pursue a blossoming movie career. Alley is a newcomer whose most notable credit is her role in the miniseries "North and South."

In the new season of "Cheers," the womanizing Sam Malone, played by Ted Danson, is forced to sell his Boston bar to a corporation. Alley is sent in to run the place and becomes his boss. Diane, the waitress played by Long, was written out by having her leave Sam at the altar and go off to write a novel.

Alley and Danson appeared at a news conference with producer James Burrows recently to try to convince TV critics that the show is

embarking on a whole new run. Burrows said, in fact, that Long's character had taken on a life of its own and carried the show far afield from its original concept as a "Tracy-Hopburn" romantic comedy. "The woman was supposed to be an executive, a business executive. That was, like, the original conception of the show," Burrows said.

"And then, through evolution, it became more of a pretentious, college-student relationship with Sam. So, in a way, it's going back to the original roots of 'Cheers,' which was this professional woman and this ex-professional ballplayer."

Burrows also made it sound like the show would be better without Long, though he insisted that was not what he meant. But had Sam and Diane's marriage gone through — it was pending while Long pondered whether to stay or go — the show would have no longer been about a bar, but about a marriage, he said.

Danson noted, tongue-in-cheek, that the average life of a relationship in Hollywood is five years, so it was an appropriate time for Diane

to leave. In Alley and Danson, Burrows said, "we feel we have two people who are going to be on stage together who we feel have a lot of chemistry together — and who have taken a lot of chemistry."

Ullman showcases her versatility

LOS ANGELES — It was a momentary downer in what has so far been an upbeat experience in American television for Tracey Ullman.

Something hadn't gone quite as it was rehearsed in the filming of her comedy show for Fox Broadcasting. There was a lull between take and retake, and Ullman seemed especially vexed by the snag.

The stand-up comedian who keeps the studio audience occupied during such moments noticed that Ullman seems disturbed. "I think Tracey could use a little cheering up," he said.

And then, on cue, 300 people cried out in unison, "We love you, Tracey!" Ullman looked up from the huddle of actors and production staff on stage, smiled, waved and quickly went back to the sometimes grim business of series television.

For Ullman, the talented British import, this warm evening in California marked the start of her second season on American television.

The filming of the first show was a less-than-auspicious second start that left some members of the crew grumbling that, well, it wasn't bad for the first day back at work. And it left Ullman talking about something she knows extremely well.

"It was our first show," she said backstage. "The energy is the important thing. We've got to keep the energy up."

The second season's first show was constructed in the same way that the growing number of Ullman fans have become accustomed to: Three skits to be squeezed into her half-hour comedy show.

The evening's episodes displayed the diversity that has become the hallmark of Ullman's seemingly rubbery stage persona: One minute she was a golf pro in an ash-blond wig, consulting a psychiatrist about her fear of flying; then a woman in black wig and clothing, sending her husband up the wall and out the door with her indecision over color choices for the kitchen; and finally a postal worker suffering quiet envy when her best and sexier friend finds true love (for the moment, anyway).

What manner of television is this? Is it a companion piece to Benny Hill? Hardly. Is it a throwback to the skitish days of Carol



Burnett? Sort of.

But what it is mostly is a display of the remarkably diverse talent that is Ullman's. That talent has been on display for some time in Great Britain, where she has made her mark as a comedian, television series star and pop singer.

Now she comes to American television with a commitment to do something seldom seen on this side of the Atlantic, relying largely on her gift for character portrayal.

While Ullman's show cannot lay claim to a mass following by television standards, it gives the Fox Broadcasting organization one of the freshest programs on television. (Nationally, the show's highest rating has been just under 5.

The show has been nominated for five Emmys, including best variety, music or comedy program, and Ullman's sidekick, Julie Kavner, has a nomination for individual performance in such a program.

Ullman reflexively conveys credit for the show's success indeed its existence to executive producer James Brooks.

"He has great faith in me," she said. "I met him and we became good friends. He's my mentor. He's the star of the show because of the clout he has here" in Hollywood.

Ullman once had a prime-time series in Britain "and I'd toyed around with various ideas here. But the ideas fell into cliché I'd be the British nanny who comes to New York and solves the problems of this nice American family."

"Variety hadn't been done for sometime. We wanted to do a show that would allow me to do the things I like to do and can do."

That covers a lot of territory. Or, as Brooks observed, you cannot see her talent and not want to showcase it.

Or describe it: "I think, literally, you can use the word unique and mean it," he said. "We're so obsessed with comparisons. The only one I could even think of comparing her to is Peter Sellers — he's the only one you can mention. He could do a variety of Americans. And then you have to add that Tracey sings and dances."

Ullman was born near London to a British mother and a Polish father. He died when she was 6. Her mother recognized Ullman's talent early and encouraged her to perform. By the time she was 12 she'd won a scholarship to a stage school and at 16 she made her professional debut, dancing in a production of "Olig" in Berlin.

Power of the Medium — Three Casestudies

HOLLYWOOD — TV has become society's electronic turnstile, a gangplank, a passage, the start of something big.

That something may be access or entree, the means to instantly communicate with thousands, sometimes millions of viewers. The red light comes on, and you are immediately reaching the world.

Or the payoff may be personal fame, wherein the messenger becomes the message.

The terrorist kidnapping of now-free journalist Charles Glass and the exploding celebrity of Iran-Contra figure Fawn Hall apply.

So does Wednesday's bizarre and frightening incident on KNBC-TV in Los Angeles that received national coverage. It also reflects anew the mutually exploitative relationship — one that is sometimes unavoidable — linking news-media and newsmakers.

KNBC consumer specialist David Horowitz was just getting into his report at 4:42 p.m. PDT Wednesday when a man — later identified as Gary Stollman — appeared behind him holding what seemed to be a handgun and ordered him to read a long, rambling statement on the air or be shot. With outward cool, Horowitz complied as co-anchors John Beard and Kirstie Wilde sat frozen a few feet from Horowitz and Stollman and news director Tom Capra in another room ordered the program to go black.

Stollman was on the air live for only 28 seconds, KNBC said later. For the next seven minutes, KNBC broadcast an NBC logo and program promos while Horowitz read the statement, with Stollman apparently believing the newscast was still on the air.

When Horowitz had finished, Stollman put down his weapon, which turned out to be a toy replica, and was taken into custody. Then the newscast resumed, with Beard and Wilde explaining what had happened.

By evening's end, in fact, more than one thing had happened.

First, there was the tense, nightmarish incident itself (Wilde could be heard gasping upon seeing Stollman's plastic, 45-caliber pistol replica). Next came exhaustive coverage of the incident that night on KNBC and other Los Angeles sta-

tions (and in Thursday's newspapers, moreover), with more to come.

Who came out a winner? In a curious, yet predictable way, everyone.

Although he was cut off the air, Stollman did achieve some of what he wanted. At least a portion of his unclear and befuddling statement — which alluded in part to his father, former KNBC pharmaceutical reporter Max Stollman; the CIA and a plot to overthrow the government — was aired and reported in newspapers as part of the coverage.

And along with a scare, KNBC got a terrific story, albeit not one it sought, or handled improperly or self-servingly. But terrific, nevertheless.

The symbiosis connecting news medium and newsmaker automatically became operative. No matter how mentally disturbed he may have been, Stollman had a message. The desperate way he chose to deliver that message became a news story. And the media are in the business of reporting news stories.

KNBC naturally its later newscasts with the story. Its coverage was exemplary and unsensational. Horowitz was interviewed. Beard and Wilde were interviewed.

The story was also prominently featured on other TV stations, and then came Thursday's front-page newspaper stories and pictures and Friday's coverage of the coverage.

As it turned out, Stollman got quite a lot for his trouble.

"We took him off the air, because we cannot allow people like this to take television stations hostage," Capra said afterward. In effect, though; Stollman did indeed take KNBC hostage, and the other media as well, by becoming a news story they could not ignore.

As recent history shows, there are other ways to do it without walking into a TV studio and brandishing a weapon.

Glass, the reporter on leave from ABC, was on TV Wednesday, too, being interviewed in London about his flight from Moslem fundamentalist kidnapers in Lebanon after more than two months' captivity.

While a hostage, Glass made a videotaped confession that he had worked with the CIA, a statement that he read — trying in the process to drop hints that he was under duress — with a revolver aimed at his head.

The statement got wide TV exposure in the United States, and Glass now thinks that was a mistake. Such tapes — which seem to be an inevitable propaganda spin-off in hostage cases — serve "the captors, not the captive," he said.

"Glass' remarks 'hit me like a bolt,'" said CNN reporter Jeremy Levin, who spent 11 months as a hostage in Lebanon. Levin said on CNN that he was not sure he agreed with Glass' views about broadcasting hostage tapes and that he'd have to think about it.

In any event, they will continue to be broadcast, you can be sure of that. This is yet another case of terrorists holding the media hostage along with their captives and manipulating TV from across the seas.

Any information about unseen, unheard-from hostages — whether its purpose is propaganda or distortion — is almost always news. Hence, TV continues to be the terrorist's currency and entree to global millions.

TV is nothing if not eclectic, so super-agent Norman Brokaw of the famed William Morris agency got his shot on TV Wednesday, too.

The agency's newest client is none other than Hall, former secretary to Lt. Col. Oliver L. North, former witness in the Iran-Contra hearings and — according to Brokaw — future star.

He said he sees a book ahead for Hall, and then a movie based on the book, followed by a "career in broadcasting because she showed she has the ability to hold an audience."

Brokaw had the evidence — booming ratings for the hearings on CNN when Hall appeared.

Credit Hall with loyalty, great looks and great shrodding, and she may also be a crackerjack secretary. But a book and movie about

her? Vanna talks, so Fawn types?

Hall seemed the reluctant witness at the hearings, frequently dour and defensive, perhaps not cognizant of the payoff ahead. Look how this has mushroomed. We used to wonder who would play Fawn —

Kim Basinger? — in Ollie's story.

Now it is the reverse. All because she can hold a TV audience.

The scenario is set. After the book and movie will come the inevitable exercise cassette, followed by that broadcasting career Brokaw predicted.

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
