Blaze may burn over Labor Day

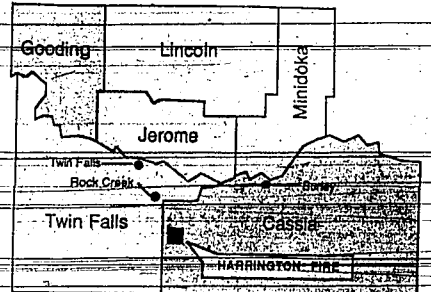
SOUTH HILLS — The Harrington Fork fire has consumed nearly 10,000 acres of Sawtooth Forest land, was still burning out of control late Thursday and probably will continue burning through Labor Day weekend.

Sawtooth National Forest has called in 350 firefighters to battle the blaze, including a team of specialists from southern Utah, who will manage fire fighting efforts from Bostetter Campground.

One of those firefighters was hospitalized early Thursday morning when he was injured by a falling rock about 2 a.m.

Emil Stockton, 31, of Vernal, Utah, underwent surgery at Magic Valley Regional Hospital, suffering from a fracture and internal injuries. He was in intensive care Thursday night in serious but stable condition.

A second firefighter, Todd Walker, of the Ashley National For-

at in Utah, was treated for a minor leg injury and released. Forest officials said he was back on the fire lines Thursday night. Walker was injured by the same falling rocks as injured Stockton.

The fire is the biggest this year in the Sawtooth National Forest, the second largest now burning in Idaho and the largest being fought.

The Forest Service is letting the largest fire, the 17,500-acre Deadwood Summit fire in the Frank

Church-River of No Return Wilderness, burn naturally because of its estimated \$2 million to \$3 million cost of suppression.

Art Selin, Sawtooth National Forest information officer, said firefighters were concentrating on protecting buildings threatened by the fire, keeping the fire out of the Rock Creek canyon and preserving commercial timber stands.

The fire is having less now, and

Heat, wind fanning plague of fires across West; California worst hit

Scorching summer temperatures and steady winds fanned a plague of fire across parts of seven Western states Thursday, consuming hundreds of thousands of acres of brush and timber and threatening California's towering sequoias.

Jack Wilson, director of the Boise Interagency Fire Control Center, called the situation "extremely critical, primarily in California and southwest Oregon."

"In the national park situation, we're very fearful that they might get into the giant sequoias, which are an irreplaceable resource," he said.

California, Oregon and Idaho

bore the brunt of the fires. By late Thursday:

• 12,975 firefighters were battling some 1,300 fires which had burned more than 334,000 acres in California.

• 3,900 people-fought fires totaling 52,000 acres in Oregon.

• 600 firefighters contended with nearly 25,000 acres of range and forest fires in Idaho.

• Three fires covered 3,885 acres statewide, the largest a 3,200-acre blaze 60 miles northeast of Phoenix.

• Two fires totaling 435 acres were contained in Washington.

• A 540-acre brushfire was contained in central Montana but 175-acre forest fire was still out of control near Townsend.

• A 90- to 100-acre fire continued to burn near Polecat Creek in Yellowstone National Park in Wyoming.

The fires were started by thousands of lightning strikes spawned by late-summer thunderstorms.

"It continues to be a critical situation," said LaVon Perez of the U.S. Forest Service in California.

"The forecasters say we're not going to get as many lightning strikes today as yesterday," he said "that yesterday, too, and we had more than 1,400 additional strikes — and we are expecting winds of 20 to 35 mph, and they tell us it will not begin to cool until the weekend."

An estimated 8,000 persons were

Pilot clings to plane's stairs to endure mishap

PORTLAND, Maine — A pilot who clung to the rear stairs of a small plane after a door opened in flight says he was "thrilled to see the sunrise" after landing safely, but declined to say any more Thursday about the freakish accident.

"There was no mechanical fault with the door," and the plane was returned to service, Steven Mason, sales manager of Eastern Express, told a news conference Thursday. He said the company was investigating the possibility that it had not been properly closed.

Henry Dempsey, 46, of Cape Elizabeth, the pilot who lay on the stairs, suffered only scratches on his hand in the bizarre accident in which his hands had to be "pried off" the plane's stair railings.

Dempsey declined all interviews, but said through the company he was "thrilled to see the sunrise" and "was still stunned" by the "harrowing experience."

Dempsey was piloting a 16-seat Beechcraft 99 turboprop with no passengers aboard, from Lewiston, Maine, to Boston early Wednesday evening when he heard a rattle in the back of the plane. The twin-engine commuter plane was being flown to Boston to be used for a flight from there, Mason said.

As he walked back to check on the noise, the aircraft hit some turbulence and he leaned against the stairway door. The door, which is hinged at the bottom, fell open and Dempsey was partially sucked out of the plane. He grabbed the railings and lay up against the stairs as the plane traveled at 190 mph at 4,000 feet.

Jury finds Hine guilty on theft charges

TWIN FALLS — A former Twin Falls County Sheriff's Department records clerk was found guilty late Thursday afternoon on three counts of grand theft involving \$562 in county money.

Charlene Hine, 43, who worked for the sheriff's office for more than eight years, was convicted by a 12-member jury of all three counts of grand theft following an investigation of shortages in the prisoner work-release fund.

The verdict, read just after 4 p.m. after two and one-half hours of deliberation, covered the 1984 thefts of \$168 in prisoner work-release payments on Nov. 24, \$180 on Dec. 4, and \$204 on Dec. 19.

The trial began Monday in 8th District Court before Judge George Granata, chief of Bayley and concluded Thursday with final arguments and jury instructions.

Hine, who also worked for a num-

bers of years in the Twin Falls County Prosecutor's Office, showed no emotion as the guilty verdicts

were read. However, she wept and hugged friends after the court closed.

"She was released on her own recognizance by Judge Granata, who ordered a 90-day pre-sentence investigation. Granata said he will set a sentencing date when the investigation is completed. Grand theft carries a sentence of one to 14 years in prison and/or a \$5,000 fine that could apply to each count.

Defense Attorney Keith Rork of Halley, who appeared stunned by the verdict, said "Naturally, I am disappointed but this is not a good time to talk about it."

He had no comment on possible appeals.

Chief Deputy Prosecutor Rockne Lammers, who represented the state through the trial, said he felt the facts of the case were reflected in the guilty verdict.

"This has been a long and emotional ordeal for everyone involved," Lammers said, at the conclusion of the case.

"A lot of hard work and long hours have gone into the prosecution and investigation of the case by our (the prosecutor's) office and the Twin Falls County Sheriff's staff.

My thanks also go to them and to the jurors for their diligence and attentiveness during the trial," Lammers said.

Sheriff Jim Munn, who had made no secret of the stress he had been under in seeing his former trusted clerk taken to court for felony charges, said he felt the jury had weighed the facts and returned a verdict consistent with those facts.

"I have a lot of confidence in my people. They were all telling the truth," the sheriff said.

He added that since the investigation, there has been some streamlining in the handling of prisoner-release funds, formerly handled by Hine, jailers and dispatchers on occasion. The jail administrator now receives the funds, issues the receipt and the receipt

'Mountain man' Dallas gives first details of 343 days on run

BOISE (AP) — Convicted game warden killer Claude Dallas, whose escape from the main Idaho prison last year touched off a nationwide manhunt, for the first time on Thursday offered details of his 343 days on the run.

Although described by some as a mountain man born a century too late, the former wilderness trapper said he tried to stay in populous areas where he would not stand out. Many of the lawmen hunting him believed he was holed up in the

backcountry.

"I felt if I was going to have some safety, I had to be in an area with a lot of population," Dallas said.

The escape was one that took him to Mexico for plastic surgery and Eugene, Ore., for contact lenses before he was finally recaptured by federal agents in Riverside, Calif., last March 8.

But he refused to identify any of the people who helped him evade au-

thorities after he got outside the state of Idaho.

"They're extremely loyal friends of mine," Dallas said. "They're family people. I have no intention of betraying them."

Defending himself in court against the formal escape charge, Dallas, 37, said he cut his way through the prison's perimeter fences on March 30, 1986, not only because he believed guards were about to kill him but so he could find work and raise money to finance legal attacks on the prison administration and the policies he

claimed were threatening his life.

"That's what I had hoped to do was put the money together so I could come back and fight these people... so my life wouldn't be threatened," Dallas said. "I felt I needed at least \$15,000. I also felt realistically that was an amount I could put together in a year or even less."

But the manhunt and the quick addition of Dallas to the FBI's Ten Most Wanted list, thwarted that plan.

Dallas said he had no help in the counter-attacking official theories that a woman who visited him at

the prison on that Easter Sunday night aided in his escape. He also said he was never anywhere near Paradise Valley Junction in northern Nevada, where authorities focused their initial search after they said bloodhounds picked up his scent.

Dallas said he escaped from the prison about 8 p.m., two hours before guards discovered he was missing, and then "fled on foot into the desert."

"It takes several days to walk out of the state of Idaho," he said. "I was about 11 days before I reached

my destination."

He did not say where that initial destination was, only that he made his first contact there. From there he went to San Francisco.

"I was able to, at one point, obtain transportation, housing, I had an apartment, a job to get back on my feet," he said, "and I had to leave because I saw a news flash that I was believed to be in that area."

"When I fled the Bay Area, I went to the state of Nevada," he said. "When I reached a safe place in

Another tanker convoy goes south West

MANAMA, Bahrain — Another convoy of U.S. warships and Kuwait-tankers steamed south Thursday through the Persian Gulf, where two supply ship crewmen became the first fatalities of repeated tanker attacks by Iran and Iraq.

Iraq said its warplanes raided a tanker, and shipping sources said Iranian speedboat-borne fighters attacked a Japanese-tanker and an

Italian motorship.

Fire from Iraqi warplanes or Iranian speedboats have hit at least 20 ships registered in nine different nations since Saturday, said a Gulf-based shipping source. They say the number of attacks has averaged one a month in 1986.

Britain reflagged its first Kuwaiti tanker Thursday off Khor Fakkan port on the Gulf of Oman, said shipping sources in the United Arab Emirates.

The United States has given its flag to 11 Kuwaiti vessels so the U.S. Navy can protect them from attacks by Iran, which regards Kuwait as an ally of Iraq.

The convoy of three U.S.-registered Kuwaiti tankers and Navy escorts leaving Kuwait on Thursday were the seventh one-way convoy since the reflagging operation began July 20.

Shipping sources said they passed Iranian-held Farsi Island,

evacuated from nearly a dozen rural communities in California.

More than half of them in Tuolumne County near the northern entrance to Yosemite National Park.

The Tuolumne County fires, which so far have blackened 90,500 acres, are now burning through heavy timber, which Director Gerald Partain of the California Department of Forestry said meant they would take much longer to bring under control and would probably spread farther and faster than most of the other major fires.

In addition to Tuolumne County, other critical fires Thursday were in Stanislaus County, where 64,000 acres have been blackened about 45 miles east of Crescent City; in Trinity County, where 30,000 acres have been blackened near Hayfork; and in Mendocino County, where 17 fires have merged into a single blaze stretching over 40,000 acres north of Ukiah and spread eastward to Lake County.

with low temperatures and this inversion, it's encouraging," Selin said. "We didn't have enough manpower to be effective in the initial stages today."

He said firefighters were trying to work a fire line in from Rock Creek canyon. If the fire flows down, he said, firefighters hope to pinch it off at its head.

"We had some crews working on flanks, but there just wasn't a good deal of manpower on a safe place to put them in except the flanks where they were," Selin said.

"We don't expect containment for several days," Selin said. "Assuming things don't radically change for the better, probably Labor Day weekend will not be a good weekend for folks to visit that part of South Hills bordered by Oakley Road to Rock Creek and Rock Creek road."

The man-caused fire started about 12:45 p.m. Wednesday at Harrington Park Campground, along the Rock Creek road.

By late Wednesday, the fire had swept east over the canyon rim, fanned out and burned 3,500 acres. It also burned down into Rock Creek canyon and along the road for about a mile Wednesday. Fire

crews have established a fire line there and were mopping up smoldering trees Thursday.

The fire was still burning mostly in the Dry Fork drainage Thursday, although a finger of flame was leaping its way down into Rock Creek near Steer Basin.

"This is the hottest spot on this line," said Barry Johnson, division supervisor on the fire. "The wind has been pretty squally. The wind is the biggest hazard we have right now, it keeps fanning the flames."

Winds gusting to 50 mph Wednesday night, but were expected to slow to four to six mph Thursday night.

Sheriff's deputies from Twin Falls and Cassia counties had closed off the Rock Creek road Thursday and were expected to keep it closed today. In addition, the Forest Service is advising people to keep away from the Bonstetter Campground area because of fire traffic.

Selin said the fire crews were still organizing their plan of attack late Thursday and outside of some work on the flanks, little work on controlling the fire had been completed. The fire is burning primarily sagebrush, grass and aspen.

and auditor certificates are kept together.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Harold Jensen, whose investigation of the case was criticized in the defense's closing arguments, said his faith was restored in the system by Thursday's jury verdict.

"I am glad the jury could separate the truth from the fiction," Jensen said.

Both attorneys in the case brought their efforts to close Thursday morning with dramatic presentations of what they felt were the finer points of the evidence.

Rork told the jurors the sheriff's office had conducted a shoddy and improper investigation and should not have investigated its own department. He criticized the work of chief investigator Jensen, pointing out that Jensen gave conflicting testimony at various times during the trial.

But Lammers pointed to this as evidence of "an honest man," saying it is hard for anyone to recall exact times and conversations after nine months. Had the officer been lying, he said, there would have been planned testimony on these matters.

Lammers placed the strength of his case on who among the witnesses was telling the truth and who was not. He asked the 10 women and 2 men on the jury to consider carefully if the nine witnesses for the prosecution were lying or if only the defendant was truthful.

Sheriff Munn, and deputies Jen-

sen and Joe Maxson all testified, hearing Hine say specifically that she took the money.

Rork told the jurors that Munn is not a dishonest man and would not intentionally lie. But, he said, Munn was upset to find that his much trusted employee might have taken money. He noted that Hine testified that Munn was near crying or crying when he confronted her with the issue.

He said under those conditions the words Hine actually said came through instead as "I took the money," and that she would pay it back. The defense had argued that Hine really told the sheriff that she knew where some of the missing money was located.

Lammers had agreed the sheriff was greatly saddened by facts indicating Hine had taken money from his department. He asked the jurors if this same man would lie on the stand and say Hine had told him she took the money.

Rork asked the jurors to put themselves in the place of his client and to consider carefully what the past nine months have been like for her, and what the future may mean.

He asked for an innocent verdict based on testimony from Hine contending that she had told officers only that she failed to collect all of the work-release money the prison would have paid, not that she stole it after it was collected.

Lammers called on the jurors to think hard about Sheriff James Munn's testimony that the defendant had said to him, "Jim, I took

the money." He reminded them that Munn had said this same phrase numerous times under examination and cross examination.

"Innocent people do not confess or admit to the crime," Lammers told the jurors. "You have to ask yourselves: Did Sheriff Munn lie? Did Chief Deputy Jensen lie and did Deputy Cpl. Maxson, who knew nothing (in advance) about the investigation, lie or even become confused or forgetful when they testified that Charlene told them, 'I took the money?'"

"Why would all of these people attempt to frame Charlene Hine — their sheriff's trusted employee?" he asked. "It would have been easier to frame a newer, less-favored employee."

Nevada, I was on foot. I had to start all over again. This was in June 1966."

He re-established himself as an untraced member of the gang in Nevada, and after raising about \$3,000 over the next four months, Dallas moved on to Mexico.

"What I realized then was that to get back in the work force, due to the publicity I had, I had to change my appearance," he said. "What I'm talking about is cosmetic surgery. I was in Mexico for four months to have this done."

Dallas, whose eyes today look different than in his wanted poster, went to Mexico for the operation, he

said, because he was afraid having it done in the United States would result in his arrest.

"I could have stayed there," he said, but "I came back to the United States to go on with my plan, to fight this."

Around Feb. 9 this year, Dallas said he traveled to Eugene, Ore., in hopes of finding work and re-establishing himself again.

"I didn't like the feel after I was there for a while," he said, and he headed for Southern California two weeks later.

"I was in the LA area three or four days before I was ultimately arrested in Riverside," he said. He was carrying a bag of groceries, "sandwich butter" including a jar of chunky peanut butter, when agents surrounded him.

After escaping, Dallas never set foot back in Idaho until he was brought back from California to face trial on the escape charge, he said.

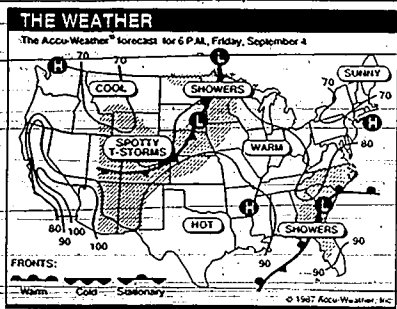

9 fires out of control in Idaho as feds devote all resources

Nine fires burned out of control in Idaho Thursday afternoon, with fire officials hard-pressed to get enough firefighters and other resources to battle them because of higher-priority fires elsewhere.

At a briefing at the Boise Interagency Fire Center in Boise, federal officials said virtually all the federal firefighting resources in the United States are committed to battling an estimated 1,000 to 1,500 forest and range fires in Western states. Most have been touched off in the last few days by dry lightning storms.

Defense rests its case in escape trial

Dallas feared being killed by guards

BOISE (AP) — Claude Lafayette Dallas, fighting an escape charge that could add five years to his 30-year sentence for killing two game wardens, testified Thursday that he believed prison guards would use a rumored impending riot as an excuse to kill him and avenge the two officers' deaths.

"I was and have been very much afraid of being caught in a riot because I feared if a riot took place I wouldn't survive," Dallas told jurors just before the defense rested its case.

"My feeling was the only way to get out of this was to get into a riot situation," he said, speaking in even, steady tones. "For me, in 1988, there wasn't anywhere else I could turn for relief."

And for the first time, Dallas provided details about his escape and the 343-day odyssey on the run from authorities that took him to Mexico for plastic surgery and Eugene, Ore., for contact lenses before his capture last March.

Prosecutor Jim Carlson said he would present some rebuttal testimony when the trial resumed Friday, and the case was expected to go to the jury before the end of the day.

In addition to fleeing threats to take his life, Dallas said he escaped so he could find work and raise \$15,000 so he could return and finance a legal battle against the prison administration and its policies he claimed were a threat to his survival.

Dallas said he was told by former Warden Darrol Gardner that his picture had been given to every tower guard and he would be killed if he made an unusual move.

"There was a persistent rumor," Dallas added, "that guards on the firing range were using my picture as a target."

Defense attorney Leston Churchill, relying on the testimony of Dallas, former and current inmates and some prison officials, contended those kinds of threats coupled with insistent rumors that the prison was about to erupt in a major riot that would give guards a chance to use their guns justified Dallas' decision to break out of the main Idaho prison south of Boise last year.

But prior to Dallas' testimony, 4th District Judge George Carey warned Churchill that for the defense to be successful he would have to produce evidence of a specific, imminent threat to Dallas' life. Dallas offered no instances of threats previously mentioned by other witnesses.

"It's aggravating that we're getting into trying the prison instead of the escape charge, but the defendant is entitled to his defense," Carey said while the jury was out of the courtroom. But, the judge added, "Vague threats of future danger are not the type of threats that justify an escape."

Carlson, who wrapped up the state's case on escape in less than 30 minutes on Wednesday, hammered away repeatedly at the lack of any threat against Dallas that involved a specific assault, time or place.

35-day old Deadwood Summit blaze 29 miles east of Cascade, covers another 17,500 acres, making the state total nearly 25,000 acres.

The Deadwood fire is being allowed to burn because of the high cost of fighting it. The national effort is not cheap, either. Dunlop and other Agriculture and Forest Service officials said as of Thursday afternoon there were 18,000 to 20,000 firefighters at work, with a cost of \$3 million to \$5 million per day.

It may take a change in weather to control the fires, they said, especially in heavily wooded areas of central California. "They will be fighting some of them until the snow flies," said George Leonard, associate chief of the U.S. Forest Service.

For at least the next six days, there are no predictions for an end to the thunderstorms and wind that have triggered the fires. "This is perhaps the worst fire situation we have ever had at one time," said Dunlop.

In Idaho's Nezperce National Forest, 19 fires continued to burn. Spokean Mary Zabinaki said fire teams were attempting to suppress 11 of them, with another eight in re-

mate areas being allowed to burn. The largest is the 400-acre fire. Fire crews were trying to confine it to a wilderness area.

The Dixon fire in the Hells Canyon Recreation Area was mapped at 90 acres, with 120 firefighters working on it.

About 15 miles southwest, officials said several small fires burned together and the complex will be called the Indian fire. It was about 100 acres. About 60 firefighters were working that blaze, but the number is expected to reach 160 tomorrow.

North of Stanley, eight small fires in high-mountain areas were contained Thursday. Another fire of 115 acres still was out of control north of Stanley near Hindman Lake.

Challis National Forest spokesman Jim James said 210 firefighters were on the lines at one time, but some of the crews were released by mid-day Thursday.

The Payette National Forest reported 18 fires, including two new ones spotted Thursday. Information officer Dave Olson said another five fires were being allowed to burn, all in the Frank Church River of No Return Wilderness.

Churchill asked to call a psychologist experienced in dealing with inmates to testify about Dallas' state of mind, suggesting that circumstances in this case required special interpretation of the requirement for a specific, imminent threat.

Carey barred that testimony. Dallas, 37, has already been penalized administratively for the escape, losing "a year's worth of credit against his original voluntary manslaughter sentences."

He had been in the main prison for just over three years for the slaying of Fish and Game officers Conley Elms and Bill Pogue when he escaped into the high desert on Easter Sunday night in 1986.

Put on the FBI's Ten Most Wanted list within six weeks, Dallas was on the run for nearly a full year before he was recaptured last March 8 in southern California. It was the second time he had eluded authorities, having avoided capture for nearly 16 months after the January 1981 killings.

A parade of current and former inmates along with two former prison employees testified earlier that they believed a riot was imminent in 1986 and a number of prison guards had indicated they would make Dallas their first target when gunfire began.

"The only reason there wasn't one (a riot) was because we understood that's what the administration wanted and we didn't want to fall into their hands," inmate Patrick Hall testified.

Echoing testimony from other inmates, Hall said in conversations with Dallas just weeks before the escape, Dallas was very concerned about the administration zeroing him out as a target in the trouble we would have with the riots, ... that he'd be the first one they'd kill.

A former prison employee and a former inmate who lived on the same cell tier with Dallas both told jurors they heard prison guards say they would kill Dallas if given the opportunity like one that could arise during a riot.

One of the guards was never identified and the other, Watch Commander Wayne Nimmo, denied having made such statements.

Group says timber industry forces blocking water protection accord

BOISE (AP) — Because of political pressures, mainly from the timber industry, it appears the state of Idaho will not be able to agree on new standards to protect lake and stream quality, a conservation group said Thursday.

So the Wilderness Society said it is sending a 60-day notice to the federal Environmental Protection Agency that it will sue if EPA does not adopt water quality standards for Idaho.

"If EPA doesn't act within 60 days, the Wilderness Society and other organizations will sue to force action," said Tom Robinson, regional director.

"There are a lot of people in the state who would like to adopt standards to protect water quality. But they are under tremendous pressure from the industry," said Robinson.

The state's been working two years on nonpoint source pollution standards under the federal Clean Water Act. That covers water pollution from such activities as farming, mining, logging and cattle grazing.

Former Gov. John Evans appointed a task force of several state agencies, conservation groups and private industry to work on the standards.

But last week a spokesman for the Idaho timber industry announced the agreements reached at that point were unacceptable.

Robinson and Tim Crawford, Idaho Conservation League, and Ron Mitchell, Idaho Sportsmen's Coalition, said that action makes it unlikely state agreement can be reached.

"We are being forced to take action to protect the Clean Water Act," said Robinson.

The suit charges that the EPA has allowed the state to go beyond deadlines mandated by the law to set anti-degradation standards. The EPA disapproved the state's water quality standards.

The federal agency disapproved state rules more than two years ago. The reasons given were that the state either had to adopt acceptable rules, or the EPA would do it.

Instead, Crawford said "one obstructive activity after another" from the timber industry has prevented anything from happening.

As a result, he said, there has been serious deterioration of stream quality in the state.

Ironically, he said, the timber industry has stated strongly that it does not want EPA adopting water quality standards for Idaho, but may be forcing that to happen by blocking every state effort to agree on the rules.

"It has been two years since Idaho's water quality standards for non-point pollution were reviewed and disapproved by EPA," said Robinson. "The EPA has bent over backward to give the state additional time in order to formulate ad-

ditional standards.

"The past two years can be characterized by state foot-dragging, legislative interference and timber industry obstructionism," said Robinson.

Warren McFall, EPA Idaho water section chief, said the agency has the authority to put federal regulations in place in the absence of adequate state regulations. He said he did not know how they will react to the suit.

"We have considered it from time to time but were reluctant as long as the state has been working on it," he said. "It was our belief that working with the state and the team we could work this out."

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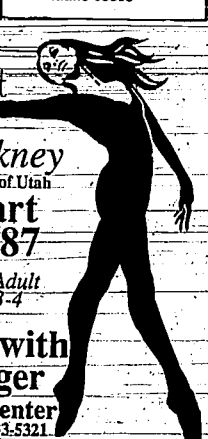
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Intermountain Gas asks for rate hike

BOISE (AP) — Intermountain Gas Co. has asked Idaho utility regulators to approve a 3.97 percent, \$3.8 million annual rate increase to match a hike in the price it pays its supplier for natural gas.

The increase would be effective Oct. 1 if approved by the state Public Utilities Commission. It would mean an increase of just over \$1 in the average residential customer's monthly bill.

"Even with this proposed change, overall, our residential customers will be paying approximately 26 percent less than they did five years ago and approximately 6 percent less than a year ago," Intermountain said in announcing the request Wednesday.

Commercial customers would see an average rate increase of 6.46 percent, and industrial customers a hike of 6.45 percent, Glynns said.

Idahoans were right when they approved Right-to-Work

Labor Day is an appropriate occasion for the epitaph to voter approval last year of Idaho's Right-to-Work law.

What has happened since a record turnout of voters made clear they want the law kept on the books? Better yet, in light of hysterical predictions by the law's opponents, what hasn't happened?

In 1984, the last full year before right-to-work enactment, average annual pay in Idaho was \$16,793. In 1988, the first full year after the law, pay increased to \$18,000. Likewise, per capita income in 1984 was \$10,092; in 1988, eleven percent higher at \$11,223. Remember the endless union ads predicting "lower" wages?

Non-agricultural jobs in Idaho in 1984 totaled 325,500; by 1988, nine thousand new jobs brought the total to 334,500. Even bet-

ter news followed. This year, the total number of Idahoans holding a job hit a seven-year high, while June unemployment was the lowest in eight years. Remember the AFL-CIO's dire warning of "fewer" jobs?

What about claims that right-to-work would outlaw unions, collective bargaining, and strikes? Union headquarters still stand, collective bargaining goes on, and if strikes have been outlawed, somebody forgot to tell Moscow teachers.

Write yet, remember the claim that our jails would fill with citizens who unknowingly broke the law? Arrests to date: zero. No doubt union officials will continue to

blame the law for everything from common colds to bad weather.

Predictably and illogically, they blamed our right-to-work law when Dupperware announced intentions to move its Jerome plant to another state which has no right-to-work.

In fact, Idaho's economy is pulling out of long recession with increasing signs of improvement. Right-to-work will aid that recovery as an important industrial incentive.

Both Idaho Commerce director Jim Hawkins, and the vice-president of an industrial relocation firm hired by the Boise Chamber of Commerce, publicly confirmed this year that the law is an incentive to new job sites in Idaho.

While the exact extent of its benefit to our economy is debatable, there is irrefutable proof of the single most important thing

right-to-work has indeed accomplished since its enactment.

Now, every Idahoan is free to choose whether to join a union, since the previously widespread requirement that a worker be forced to join and pay dues to the union has been outlawed. "Pay up or you're fired" is now illegal; and right to work.

Having lost the power to compel support from workers under threat of being fired, union officials must now work to earn voluntary support.

"Business agents have to learn something about contacting the worker and asking him to join, which they haven't had a great amount of experience in," Idaho AFL-CIO chief Jim-Korns said last month.

It's that freedom guaranteed by right-to-work that puts power in the hands of the

individual. As Idahoans experience that freedom, without the sky falling as the AFL-CIO's "Chicken Little" campaign predicted, popular support for the law will grow even beyond the overwhelming majority who voted to uphold it.

In fact, no right-to-work law upheld by voters of this people has ever been repealed. In Labor Days to come, no state-wide politician of either party will dare oppose it.

Freedom is never free, and the long fight for this freedom wasn't easy. Now won, it's a freedom we Idahoans will never give up. The epitaph reads: "The people, as always, were right."

I'm responding to an Aug. 23, 1987, article, "Steelhead: whipping fish, price to match." I'm a hydraulic engineer with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in Walla Walla, Wash. Besides conducting the hydraulic analysis for the Magic Valley Hatchery spring collection system, I was also lead engineer coordinating technical aspects of the design. The following comments are my own and not the Corps of Engineers.

I graduated from Castleford High School in 1973, and from Idaho State University in 1978. Besides having an obvious interest in the Corps' work, I have a love for the Magic Valley area and for the people that live there.

Your article presents a distorted view of several items related to the hatchery and to the Corps. My involvement in the technical design of the final spring collection system has given me an understanding of many of the topics discussed in your report.

The following are key points that I would like to emphasize:

1. Your \$710 per fish is misleading. Using your logic, neglecting discount rates, and assuming a 100-year project life, fish produced after the first year would be free for the next 99 years.

6. The degree of impact of the more efficient collection system on the ponds in the vicinity is debatable.

I believe the Corps used a state-of-the-art and innovative design to construct a well engineered, cost effective fish hatchery. I'm proud of these new facilities and in the professional and integrity of the Corps people involved in this project.

2. Northwest fishery agencies in their economic studies (if you choose to believe them) for economic benefits to each adult steelhead spawner at about \$244 or more. (The Corps, in their own studies, uses much lower values.) These values account for monetary benefits (related to commercial, sport/recreational, and Indian fisheries) that are gained from the approximately 2,000 smolts produced from the one returned spawner. Furthermore, the Magic Valley economy gains additional economic benefits related to the hatchery's construction and operation.

3. Congress, in its infinite wisdom, decreed that the fish are worth whatever the expense to furnish them; and in Public Law 95-284, ordered the Corps to provide these hatcheries.

The Northwest River Planning Council, fishery agencies, and Indian tribes have stated that fish numbers should be restored to levels that existed before white man came to the area, no matter what the cost.

4. Because the Idaho Department of Fish and Game (IDFG) will operate the facilities, the Corps was required to satisfy the desires of the IDFG which has much higher design requirements than private hatcheries. Private hatcheries could not use these standards and remain economically competitive.

5. The Corps relied on an outside, private appraiser in evaluating the worth of the land and water.

Arcadia's assessment of risks over AIDS won't be the last

BOSTON - After the fear had ignited a fire, after the Rays were burned out of their hometown, the people of Arcadia, Fla., started poking around the embers of their town's reputation. They were trying to see what could be saved.

The Citizens Against AIDS in Schools, the group that had opposed the admission of the three Ray boys, all hemophiliacs, all infected with the virus, began collecting clothes and books for the children at the local church called on by parishioners to "look into their own hearts."

A school teacher, the mayor's wife, who had sent her own 10-year-old to private school tried to explain herself to a reporter. "There isn't anyone who doesn't feel sympathy for the Ray children," said Sue Ellen

Smith. "But there are too many unanswered questions about this disease and if you are intelligent and listen and read about AIDS you get scared when it involves your own children because you realize all the assurances are not based on solid evidence."

It was easy to dismiss the people of Arcadia as ignorant, to moralize about a whole town, to see the story through the violent

prism of the proletariat. But in fact, Sue Ellen Smith did what most people do. She tried to assess risks.

I don't agree with Mrs. Smith's assessment or action. Nor do those parents who sent their children to school with the Ray boys. Nor do the parents in that other Arcadia, in Indiana, where Ryan White, a 15-year-old with AIDS started high school without incident. But to understand the desire for absolute safety, and the distrust of experts.

In the face of a disease like AIDS, we all become risk assessors. We want guarantees, and all we can get is odds.

No responsible scientist says today that it's impossible to transmit the AIDS virus in school: If one of the Rays bled; if a class-

mate with open sores touched that blood; he could conceivably contract the virus. Three health workers came down with AIDS in similar ways.

And what of this summer's nightmarish scenario: the questionable transmission of AIDS through insects?

Such risks are remote, perhaps infinitesimal, but they exist.

How are we to think about them?

Sue Ellen Smith's son incurs a much greater risk riding in a car to his new private school than from going to class with the Rays. The risk from these three boys, none of whom have active AIDS or behavior problems is almost non-existent. The uncomfortable "almost" is what we have to live with.

"If this were a disease that parrots carried and this year three parrots were found to have the virus, I wouldn't hesitate to have the birds removed no matter how small the risk," says Harvey Fineberg, dean of Harvard's School of Public Health. "The problem is that you're dealing with other lives. You can't balance a clear and present harm done to three youngsters against infinitesimal risk."

That is what happened in Arcadia. The risk of infection became the reality of community violence and disruption. Here is another entry into the arena of our risk anxiety. Not the last. Not by a long shot.

Navy blasted after mutilation

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Three congressmen harshly criticized the Navy on Thursday and demanded to know why a munitions train ran over an activist protesting U.S. arms shipments to Central America.

S. Brian Willson, who lost both legs when he knelt in front of the train on Tuesday, received a telephone call Wednesday from Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega, according to protest organizers.

Ortega assured Willson his "act of solidarity" would not be in vain, and the Nicaraguan leader's wife planned to visit him in the hospital, Willson's friends and wife said.

Meanwhile, a group of protesters who blockaded a munitions truck next to the base for 46 minutes were arrested Thursday, said Barry Latham-Ponneck, a protest spokesman.

Five of the protesters, including Duncan Murphy, who was on the trucks when Willson was struck, were taken to Martinez jail, said Latham-Ponneck. The other protesters was a minor and probably was taken to juvenile hall, he said. They were expected to be cited and released.

On Wednesday night, some 400 people gathered at the incident site, a ROTC building at the University of California, Berkeley. The protesters broke windows and spray-painted anti-military slogans inside.

Stephanie Troyan, spokeswoman for the Mount Diablo Peace Center in Concord, said

Thursday the Berkeley demonstration was not planned by the coalition of groups protesting at the Concord Naval Weapons Station, where Willson was hurt.

However, she said, "Their outrage certainly is a classic expression about being upset about U.S. policy."

The weapons station protesters blockaded a munitions truck next to the base on Thursday, but there were no arrests, said Sydney Vilen, spokeswoman for the demonstrators.

Rep. Ron Dellums asked the Secretary of the Navy to conduct a full investigation of what he called "the Navy's reckless action." The Oakland Democrat said he was "upset and angry because there is absolutely no excuse for what happened."

After meeting with the commander of the Concord Naval Weapons Station, Rep. George Miller, whose district includes the base, accused him of "major errors in judgment and major errors in concern for the protesters."

Rep. Barbara Boxer said she has scheduled a meeting with base commander Capt. Lonnie Cagle "to get some answers face to face."

"My gut tells me this could have been avoided," said the San Francisco Democrat. "Mr. Willson was willing to give his life for his country, but I don't think he expected this kind of violence."

Reagan names privatization committee

SANTA BARRERA, Calif. (AP) — President Reagan on Thursday named a 12-member commission to find ways to divest the government of programs and functions that Reagan believes can be provided more efficiently by private citizens, businesses and organizations.

He selected David Linowes, a University of Illinois political economist, to spearhead the effort, which is a part of the campaign for an economic "bill of rights" that Reagan has been pushing in recent weeks.

Among others named to the president's bipartisan Commission on Privatization were former Defense Secretary Melvin Laird, James T.

McIntyre, who headed the Office of Management and Budget for three years during the Carter administration; and Walter Wright, former chairman of the Commission on Fair Market Value Policy for Federal Coal Leasing, refused to cite specific moves toward privatization that he would advocate.

Linowes said in a statement that the commission "will help fulfill the commitment I made in my Economic Bill of Rights to end unfair government competition and return government programs and assets to the American people."

In a fact sheet, the White House described the sale of the government's interest in the Conrail freight railroad for \$1.9 billion as "the most successful" example of

the move toward divestiture. "There are many activities that are not the proper function of the federal government, and that should simply be left to the private sector," Reagan's statement said. "The American people know that in many cases, the government is less efficient than private enterprise in providing certain services."

Briefing reporters, Linowes, who formerly served as chairman of the Commission on Fair Market Value Policy for Federal Coal Leasing, refused to cite specific moves toward privatization that he would advocate.

"We're going to examine all areas of government," said Linowes, whose panel has six months to deliver its report to the president. "I come here objectively and independently. ... We will balance all relevance, credible points of view."

Linowes did say that moving toward private operation of the federal prison system might be one possibility, saying that "our prisons are not working."

He said the recidivism rate for people in the system is close to 80 percent, and "we cannot tolerate that."

Among other elements of his "bill-

of rights" plan, Reagan would like to see the Constitution amended to require balanced federal budgets. As part of that, he proposed requiring a "super-majority" vote in both the House and the Senate instead of a simple majority before a tax bill could be passed.

Federal programs to be judged on family impact

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan signed an executive order Thursday requiring that federal policies be judged in terms of their potential impact on families.

— "If we would have had this in place a number of years ago, we could have stopped the unintended consequences of some of these well-meaning efforts to help poor families," Gary Bauer, the president's assistant for policy development, said in an interview here.

The order, signed by Reagan in California, was the latest in a series of steps intended to help promote the agenda of conservatives.

Before leaving Washington for his summer vacation, Reagan announced plans to ban the use of federal funds for abortion counseling and referral. Reagan also announced formation of an inter-agency task force to sell adoption as an alternative for pregnant women who may be considering abortion.

The new executive order empowers Bauer's office to assess how proposed policies would "strengthen or erode the stability of the family and, particularly, the marital commitment."

Committee bashes Bork for 'activism'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee released an analysis Thursday that attacked virtually every aspect of Robert H. Bork's record, and contended the Supreme Court nominee "is not the apostle of judicial restraint" portrayed in a recent White House report.

The study released by Chairman Joseph R. Biden Jr. said Bork engaged in "judicial activism" when it suited him. And it attacked his positions on subjects including civil rights, privacy, antitrust, censorship, free speech, religion in the schools and the Supreme Court decision permitting abortion.

The report, was written by two committee consultants, a Washington attorney and a Duke University law professor, and reviewed by four prominent lawyers.

The new research was billed as a response to a White House report last July that said in areas such as the First Amendment, privacy and civil rights, "Judge Bork has demonstrated an open mind as his views have evolved and matured over the years, sometimes changing significantly over time."

The analysis accused the White House report of inaccurately trying to link Bork's brand of conservatism with that of the justice he would replace on the court, now-retired

Lewis F. Powell, Jr. Powell was a swing vote on the court.

The new study said this was a "transparent effort" to make the two men appear as ideological equivalents when "such depiction has no basis in fact."

— "In accusing Bork of 'judicial activism,' a term usually reserved for liberal judges," the study quoted comments of judges on the ideologically-split U.S. Court of Appeals in Washington. Bork has served on the court since 1982.

Some of the judges said in one written opinion that Bork was attempting to "wipe away selected Supreme Court decisions in the name

of judicial restraint" and was conducting "a general spring cleaning of constitutional law."

In another instance, five members of the court described Berk's criteria for reviews by the full appellate court as "self-serving and result-oriented" and as doing "substantial violence to the collegiality that is indispensable to judicial decision-making."

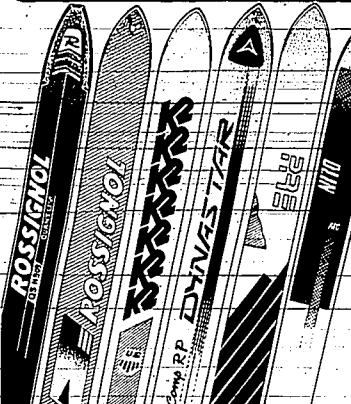

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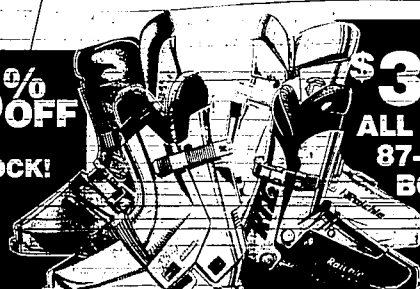

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Experts not sure of impact of higher interstate speeds

NEW YORK (AP) — Traffic fatalities doubled in New Mexico after it became the first state to increase its speed limit on rural highways to 65 mph, but whether the 10 mph increase is responsible for more deaths is not yet known, highway traffic experts say.

In Illinois, fatalities decreased on rural highways since the higher speed limit went into effect.

"We're not about to say that that is meaningful in any way, any more than we're willing to say that New Mexico has twice as many fatalities as last year because they were the first to go to 65," said Al Laursdorf, a highway safety specialist with the Chicago-based National Safety Council.

"We don't have anything to back up those statements," he said. "We don't know if 65 is working from a safety standpoint or if fatalities are in fact gone up."

After strong insurance industry opposition, Congress earlier this year allowed an increase of the nationwide speed limit from 55 mph to 65 mph on rural stretches of interstate-highway. At least 25 states have enacted the higher speed limit.

A survey of New Mexico motorists shortly after the increase showed nearly half the drivers exceeded the higher limit, according to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety.

The New Mexico Public Safety Department reported Monday that 68 people were killed on interstates in rural areas between April and mid-July, compared with 26 deaths during the same period in 1986.

In Illinois, where the speed limit in many areas was raised to 60 mph, deaths on rural interstates between May and July, compared with 26 during the same period a year ago.

"But this is a three month total and you really can't take a lot from three months," said Trooper Dave Sanders of the Illinois State Police. "Our position essentially is, we've

only had the law a few months. We have to wait and see."

Wyoming also saw a decrease in deaths since the new speed limit was imposed, and state Highway Patrol Capt. Bob Oakes said the higher speeds may actually be contributing to the decrease.

Oakes said too many people violated the 65 mph limit and were forced to pass slower cars more frequently than under the new limit.

Less passing means fewer accidents, he said.

Fourteen people were killed on Wyoming interstates from May 22 to Aug. 21, compared with 18 people killed during the same period last

year. And in Indiana, 17 people were killed on rural interstates since the law took effect June 1, and increase of two over the same period last year.

"There's no way, statistically, that can be significant," Lt. Ken Hollingsworth said.

The National Safety Council, a private, non-profit organization, and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration are studying the effects of the higher speed limits on safety. Such studies won't have enough information to draw conclusions until at least next spring, Laursdorf said.

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Woman's silent appeal brings police to motel, rescue

LEWISTON, N.Y. (AP) — A woman who silently mouthed "Help me" to two strangers in a motel office got help from police, who arrested her former boyfriend on a weapons charge.

Kevin Kuchta, WJL-AM station manager, and Jim Driscoll, a broadcast engineer, said they called police to the Buena Vista Motel on Wednesday after a woman signaled she needed help.

"I looked at her... and she looked at me and mouthed the words 'Help me, Help me,'" said Driscoll. "I turned away, then turned back and looked at her again. She had a look on her face. It was something — I could tell by her eyes."

Kuchta said the woman gave him a "Get me out of here" kind of look. He telephoned police, and Sgt. Ronald Winkley arrived within minutes.

"I knocked on the door of their room and the man indicated everything was all right," said Winkley. "But it was obvious that everything wasn't all right with the woman."

The woman, whom police did not identify, told Winkley she had been abducted at gunpoint by Joseph Capaldo, 29, at a Rochester unemployment office.

Police found a .38-caliber revolver in Capaldo's car, Winkley said.

Attorney requests 8 years for pilot

MOSCOW (AP) — The prosecutor accused Mathias Rust of taking an ego trip when he hedge-hopped his small plane to Red Square, and demanded Thursday that the West German teenager be sentenced to eight years in a labor camp.

Vladimir Andreyev said the 19-year-old pilot's goal in his daring flight to the Kremlin on May 28 was "cheap popularity" rather than a discussion with Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev about peace and disarmament.

He asked Judge Robert Tikhomirov to give Rust eight years for violating international flight rules; two for violating the Soviet border and four years for hooliganism. The terms would be served concurrently.

Rust acknowledged his guilt on the first two charges but has contested the charge of hooliganism.

The trial began Wednesday and a verdict is expected Friday after Rust and his Soviet lawyer, Vsevolod D. Yakovlev, have an opportunity to address the judge and his two lay assistants.

Rust, who was poised and spoke calmly during more than five hours of testimony Wednesday, blushed on Thursday under questioning from the judge and prosecutor.

Andreyev used the testimony of eight witnesses and an aviation expert to cast doubt on Rust's claim

that he was on a peace mission when he took off from Finland and flew across more than 500 miles of Soviet territory to Moscow.

"I think this trial showed his real face," he said, looking at the defendant from across the courtroom. "He didn't want to consider the public order that exists. He deliberately committed this crime, and he's a hooligan."

"He perhaps thought, 'I am Rust and I want to land where I want to land,'" which was evidence of Rust's "hooliganism and devilry," Andreyev said.

The prosecutor asked the court to determine the punishment of Rust as deprivation of freedom in a corrective colony of reinforced regime for eight years. He said the request included consideration of the defendant's age.

Rust's flight in a single-engine Cessna, created headlines around the world and made him a folk hero in West Germany. It embarrassed the Kremlin and caused a military shakeup, including dismissal of air defense forces commander and the forced resignation of Defense Minister Sergei L. Sokolov.

Prosecution witnesses told the court Rust frightened many people on Red Square when he set the plane down, and few people knew he considered his flight a peace mission.

Philippine rebels kill 46 since mutiny

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Communist rebels vowing to exploit the turmoil stirred by last week's failed coup attempt have killed 46 people since the military mutiny the military said Thursday.

Moslem rebels declared support for soldiers who tried to overthrow President Corason Aquino last Friday.

Brig. Gen. Alexander Aguirre, Manila area commander, warned of possible terror attacks by the mutineers and told leftists not to go ahead with a planned rally Friday.

The military said the mutiny leader, Col. Gregorio "Gringo" Honasan, remained at night with an estimated 800 to 500 followers in

provinces near the capital.

Mrs. Aquino ordered congressional leaders to support Chief of Staff Gen. Fidel Ramos, who has put down a half-dozen attempts against her government. The latest was the seizure of Manila's look-power in February 1986 in a military-civilian revolt that toppled President Ferdinand Marcos.

Leaders of Friday's mutiny have said their motives included dissatisfaction over the continuing Communist insurgency and Mrs. Aquino's peace overtures to Moslem rebels.

A statement by the central committee of the Communist Party of the Philippines urged "rebels" to "take full advantage of the contra-

ditions within reactionary ranks to hasten the strengthening of revolutionary forces and weaken reaction as a whole."

The Philippine constabulary said the 46 people killed nationwide in Communist attacks since the coup included 21 soldiers killed Wednesday in an ambush 40 miles east of the capital.

Five soldiers were wounded, but there were no reports of guerrilla casualties.

Six more police and four rebels were killed when Communist New Peoples Army guerrillas raided the town hall in Gonzaga, 200 miles north of Manila.

In Pampanga province just north

of Manila, suspected guerrillas shot dead three policemen Tuesday as they were traveling to testify in a court case. The gunmen escaped.

The 10 other deaths were reported after Communist raids in the provinces of Isabela and Negros Occidental.

In a statement issued in Islamabad, Pakistan, the Moro National Liberation front hailed Friday's uprising by the "nationalist arm" of the military and expressed support to "defeat a common enemy ... the Philippine government."

"In the name of peace, justice and freedom, we ... express our tactical alliance with all the oppressed groups throughout the country," said Habib Hashim, spokesman for the major Moslem rebel group.

Striking workers occupy big Korean shipyard

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — About 13,000 striking workers occupied the nation's largest shipyard Thursday, and some torched cars, destroyed office equipment and attacked a tourist hotel.

Hundreds of other strikes continued around the country after one striking shipyard worker became the second fatality of two months of labor turmoil.

Striking taxi drivers who reached a pay raise agreement in Seoul returned to work late Thursday, but a strike leader was reported in serious condition after getting hit by a car in a dispute with

management. Daewoo, the nation's No. 2 automaker, remained shut down for the ninth day.

President Chun Doo-hwan said he was confident the country could overcome the labor unrest, which he called "a one-time fever for a tepid forward." Prime Minister Kim Chung-ryul talked with top labor enforcement officials, but no drastic government action appeared imminent.

The strikes began in early July after Chun bowed to weeks of violent protests and agreed to democratic reforms, including greater labor freedom. Under past authori-

tarian governments, wages were strictly controlled and labor activity was virtually outlawed.

Official figures by the Labor Ministry showed strikes were under way Thursday at 797 worksites, 65 percent of them identified as bus and taxi companies. New protests erupted at 112 workplaces but disappeared under a 66 companies on Thursday, the ministry said.

About 13,000 workers at Hyundai Heavy Industries Co. occupied the shipyard in the southern city of Ulsan after an overnight vigil at a nearby stadium to press their demands for pay raises and other

benefits.

Strikers destroyed windows, typewriters, photo copy machines and other furniture in the shipyard's main office. They set two cars and a bus on fire and blocked a six-lane highway outside.

"Raise our pay! the workers chanted."

All but 200 left the shipyard by nightfall and no injuries or arrests were reported, officials said.

About 500 workers attacked the Diamond Hotel, a tourist hotel right across the street from the shipyard's main gate but were repelled by tear gas-firing riot police.

Burundian troops overthrow absent president

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — Burundian soldiers overthrew absent President Jean-Baptiste Bagaza on Thursday and set up a ruling junta under an army major, according to the official radio of the small East African nation.

Bagaza, a socialist with ties to Moscow, was in Quebec, Canada, attending a summit meeting of leaders of French-speaking nations.

"Bagaza is relieved of his duties as head of state, party and army," the radio, monitored in neighboring Kenya, said in a communique from the army supreme office.

There were no immediate reports of damage or injury from the coup in this tiny former Belgian colony of 5 million people, wedged between Tanzania and Zaire.

The radio said the army set up a "Military Committee for National Redemption" under the leadership of Maj. Pierre Buyoya.

Bagaza, who took power in a bloodless coup in 1976, had been facing political problems. He was at odds with the Roman Catholic Church in this predominantly Catholic country.

Lucien Bouchard, Canada's ambassador to France and an organizer of the summit, said Bagaza had left Quebec after word of the coup began circulating. He said he did not know if Bagaza had left Canada.

It was not possible to get independent verification of the radio announcement, made at 5:40 p.m. local time (11:40 a.m. MDT) in Kirundi, one of the official languages of Burundi.

Radio Burundi's communique said the coup's borders and airports were closed and urged people to remain calm and maintain peace and security inside the country.

After the announcement the station broadcast martial music which stopped abruptly at 6:30 p.m. local time (12:30 MDT), when Radio Burundi usually broadcasts a news bulletin in the Swahili language. There were no further transmissions on the frequency.

Telephone operators in Nairobi, the Kenyan capital, were unable to get through to Burundi and said the lines may have been blocked in Bujuumbura, the Burundian capital.

Bagaza, 41, was receiving technical and financial aid from the Soviet Union and China and was strengthening ties with Libya.

Cards dealt in Niagara Springs controversy

TWIN FALLS — The Niagara Springs controversy became a poker game Thursday, and it was clear who held the best cards.

Bob Burka and Edward Shokal, two protesters who appear now to have time on their side, along with the Idaho-Parks-and-Recreation Department.

Pushing for a compromise are

Idaho Power Company and Rim View Trout Company, which are trying to avoid going to court and possibly losing their water rights.

But Burka and Shokal balked at rushing to reach an agreement.

Burka and Shokal, plus two representatives from Hagerman Citizens Alert joined representatives from Idaho Power, Rim View Trout Company, Parks Department and Idaho Fish and Game to discuss differences. Also attending was

state Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, who tried to help set up a meeting between the groups.

At stake is more than just water for recreation at a nearby park.

Idaho Power's attorney Bob Stahman said Idaho Power must meet its obligations to raise 400,000 pounds of steelhead in exchange for building the Hell's Canyon Dam in the mid-1960s.

A failure to increase steelhead production, Stahman said, could

jeopardize Idaho Power's federal energy license.

"Hell's Canyon is the backbone of Idaho Power and its rates," Stahman said. "We're not about to jeopardize that license."

Although a recent Department of Water Resources Decision appears to strengthen Idaho Power's water rights at Niagara Springs, Stahman said if the case ends up in court, "nobody knows what would happen."

To prevent a court case, Idaho Power Thursday presented a compromise solution — setting a minimum stream flow of 80 cubic feet per second flow at the clear springs creek near Buhl.

Under the plan, a minimum of 16 cfs of water would spill over the falls all year. Another 65 cfs of water would come from Idaho Power's effluent pipe below Buhl falls. The discharge would come solely from Idaho Power's steelhead

hatchery. None would come from Rim View Trout Company's east door hatchery, which has applied to reuse part of Idaho Power's water.

Both concrete headgates that were built this year to capture the whole flow will remain in place, but Idaho Power's attorney Bob Stahman said something "would be done to make it look better."

But the proposal received a cool response from Burka and Shokal.

County seeking legal fee

Tries to dump Kent challenge

TWIN FALLS — On different fronts, Twin Falls County officials are attempting to collect \$13,722 in attorney fees from Arlo Kent and get his challenge of the jail bond election thrown out of court.

"We want to collect our attorney fees," said Twin Falls County Commissioner Chairman Judy Felton on Thursday.

Kent replied, "If you don't have it (the money), you don't have it. The only thing I have is my property and if they want it, they'll have to pull the weeds."

Boise attorney Paul Penland, who represents the two county officials Kent unsuccessfully sued, has prepared a request asking 5th District Court to execute a judgment against Kent, Felton said. Kent was ordered on July 27 to repay Clerk Dick Pence and Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter for the costs of defending his lawsuit over the May 12 jail bond election.

Fifth District Judge Daniel Meehl issued the judgment about two weeks after he dismissed Kent's lawsuit, which he called "frivolous."

Court records show the county's "writ of execution" of judgment was filed Aug. 31, but had not yet been handed over to the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office for delivery to Kent. Judgments may be fulfilled by liens against property.

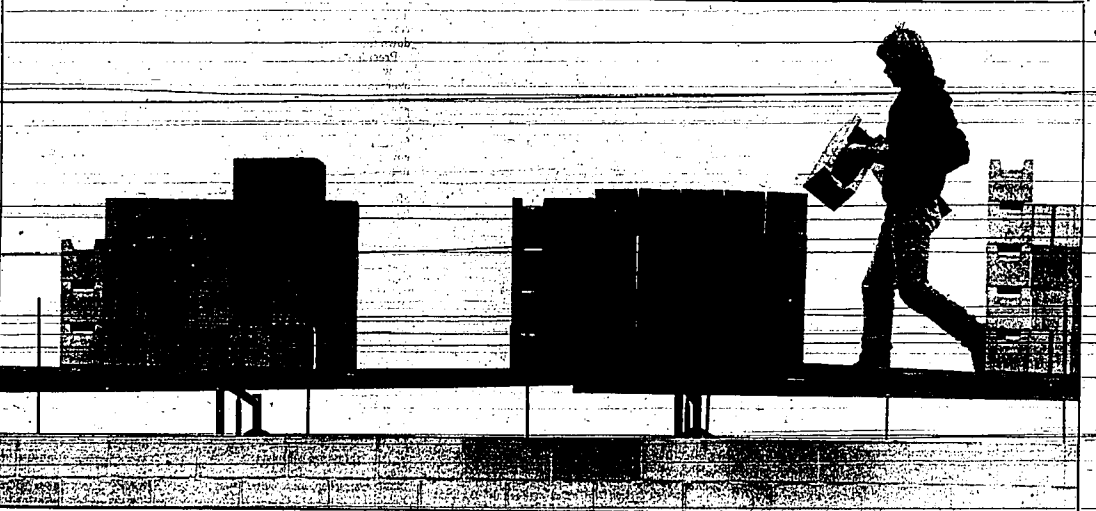
If the attorney fees and costs are collected from Kent, a mechanic and one-time legislative candidate, the money will not go to Pence and Baxter. Instead, any reimbursement goes to the county's insurer, The Idaho Counties Risk Management Program, which hired Penland to represent the two officials.

Penland couldn't be reached for comment on Thursday.

In another court, Penland has filed a request on Wednesday to the Idaho Supreme Court to dismiss Kent's appeal of the attorney fees order and the order dismissing his lawsuit. In the request, Penland claimed Kent's notice of appeal wasn't filed within the required time limits.

Kent, who is representing himself, has until Sept. 9 to respond in writing to the motion, according to an order signed Wednesday by Justice Allan Shepard.

2 companies laying groundwork for potato plants

TWIN FALLS — While harvesters start moving through Magic Valley fields to dig the 1987 potato crop, business groups in Jerome and Gooding are laying the groundwork for new processing plants to shape next year's spuds into French fries.

Western Idaho Potato Processing Co. soon will set a roof on the skeleton of its frozen potato factory south of Jerome, which has been under construction for several months.

Meanwhile, newly formed Idaho

Russet Inc. has purchased a Gooding-area plant, which was vacated by Blincoe Magic Valley Packing Co. four years ago for another French fry manufacturing operation.

Idaho Russet President Ruth Etcheverry said the company is moving ahead with plans to renovate the slaughterhouse and its refrigeration equipment for potato processing.

"We've got to find a marketplace out there, and that's what we're working on," he said.

Together, the two factories could employ more than 300 workers by

this time next year, an important injection of jobs into the local economy.

"We're sure enthusiastic about it," said Marvin Brown, chairman of the Gooding Industrial Corp., "We're ready for some action after having it (the former Blincoe plant) shut down from fall of '83."

Both plants are being opened in the Magic Valley because of ready supply of spuds from area farmers.

"You can't beat the Idaho potato for processing," said Western Idaho Potato Chairman Charlie Marshall on Thursday. His Jerome family controls the company, which has other

outside investors.

The Jerome plant will form an estimated 1.25 million hundred-weight of potatoes into frozen products each year. The factory will manufacture between 50 and 60 million pounds of French fries and other pre-formed specialty products when in full operation.

Jerome County records estimate the value of the building construction at \$738,367. Marshall said the total project cost would exceed \$1 million, but said he did not yet have a reliable cost figure.

With 125 workers, the Jerome plant will be larger than the com-

pany's only other factory at Nampa. It will rely in part on a closed company plant in Zillah, Wash.

Western Idaho Potato will move manufacturing equipment from the abandoned site to Jerome; Marshall said.

Idaho Russet will renovate the former Blincoe meatpacking site four miles east of Gooding for potato production. Idaho Russet recently bought the plant and 80 surrounding acres from local Stockmen's Meat Packing Co., which had developed it two decades ago. Price was not disclosed.

Though agreement not yet final

DWR holding to moratorium on new water rights

TWIN FALLS — Thinking of applying for geothermal water rights in Twin Falls County? Take a number and wait five years.

Even though all participants in a College of Southern Idaho lawsuit have not reached agreement, the Department of Water Resources is sticking to a moratorium on new water rights as outlined in the disputed agreement.

Former DWR Director Kenneth Dunn imposed the moratorium July 24 after signing an agreement with current water permit holders and

applicants. Dunn's order also claims to limit development of current hot water rights.

The moratorium is part of an agreement between the College of Southern Idaho and a dozen defendants in the school's 29-month-old lawsuit to ensure its access to hot well water.

Despite the fact several defendants have refused to sign the out-of-court agreement, DWR plans to honor its share of the agreement with the moratorium.

Thursday announced the moratorium against granting new permits. The ad also stated: "Development

authorized under existing permits to divert thermal ground water in the designated area shall cease except as provided in the agreement dated July 22, 1987."

This would effectively limit development of current rights despite the absence of full ratification of the agreement, according to a DWR official assigned to the case and CSI's lawyer, John Rosholt, who wrote the agreement.

"I'm sure that's exactly what that means," Rosholt said.

If the moratorium is effective, Rosholt said CSI could drop its suit, which was his goal through the agreement. He said discussions will

be held during the next three weeks to decide how to proceed.

He said two more defendants have signed the agreement, a third is expected, and he is "hopeful" Twin Falls School District will sign.

The agreement sets limits on amounts of water CSI and the other dozen defendants may divert. Each participant agrees to cut its rights to water in an effort to share the limited water available.

The common aquifer yields about 12 cubic feet per second of hot water among current well owners at a given pressure.

With Dunn's retirement Aug. 1, Rosholt and Dunn each estimated it

would take six months to familiarize a new director with the CSI suit.

Fire chiefs not opposed to protection district

TWIN FALLS — Rural fire chiefs say they don't oppose the formation of a fire protection district within the Twin Falls City Area of Impact.

Whether such a district would affect their volunteer departments is another matter.

Fire-Flor Chief Buddy Compher said there will be an impact, but he doesn't know how much.

Kimberly Fire Chief Greg Vawser said he had "no problem" with a district, but is concerned about an impact.

Compher added, "If they want the first mile and the public's happy and they can do a good job and save lives and property, then I am all for it. If I was a farmer, I wouldn't change (to a fire district). I know what our department is. We have been handling rural fires for years."

A group of rural residents is already starting the procedure to form a fire district, which would provide for the collection of taxes to pay for fire protection. The committee formed last week after a meeting sponsored by the city of Twin Falls.

City officials said they were willing to contract with a district to provide fire protection services through the city fire department.

The Twin Falls County Mutual Fire Insurance Company maintains and equips volunteer fire departments to protect the rural areas of the county, said Rich McNew, company secretary.

boundaries. The first order of business for the committee is to gather a legal description of the property within the proposed district boundaries, Pressey said.

The proposed boundary suggested by Twin Falls City officials was the Area of Impact, which extends about one mile beyond the city limits. The Twin Falls-Sun Valley Regional Airport, which is farther than one mile, is also part of the impact area.

This is a 1:30 p.m. Saturday matchup between the defending state champion Tigers, ranked first among eight-man teams in the Associated Press poll, and second-ranked Council. Richfield opened its season a week ago by beating Hagerman 20-9 in a game played under 11-man rules. This game, scheduled for the practice field at Capital High School in Boise, will be Council's opener.

Key matchup: Council's quarterback Jamie Frye and running back Greg Woods, both strong runners, against the Tigers' defense, which is inexperienced at spots, particularly at end.

Gooding (1-0) at Jerome (1-0)

This 8 p.m. matchup in Jerome has the makings of a classic, like the last three meetings between these two teams, none of which has been won by more than 8 points. Jerome, the state A-2 champion, is coming off a big 42-14 victory over Twin Falls, while Gooding whipped Wood River 49-0 in its opener. The Tigers are expected to fall from the top spot in the A-2 Associated Press preseason poll to No. 2 after beating Twin Falls. Gooding holds the same position in this current A-2 survey.

Key matchup: Gooding's wing T offense and its running game against the Jerome defense. The Senators rolled up 442 yards rushing alone against the Wolverines, 159 of those by senior Shane Bauges. But Jerome, which returned just four starters on defense this year, limited the Bruins to 153 yards total offense last week, including minus-10 rushing.

Filer (1-0) at Buhl (1-0)

Buhl gained a lot of respect with a season-opening victory over Middleton last week, moving the Indians in the No. 5 spot in this week's Associated Press Class A-2 poll. Filer also opened with a big win, 34-12 over Castletown. The Wildcats will be looking to break a three-game losing streak tonight in this 8 p.m. matchup at Buhl's Bowers Field.

Key matchup: Buhl's formidable offensive line against Filer's young defensive line, the former averages 210 pounds. The latter has just one incumbent in 215-pound defensive end Rick Linehan.

Oakley (1-0) at Valley (1-0)

Are the Vikings for real? After four frustrating losing seasons, Valley opened last weekend with a 28-7 victory over Murtaugh. Tonight at 7:30 in Eden, they'll have a stern test against an Oakley team that shut out Declo in its season opener. Declo came back Thursday night to blank defending state A-4 champion Raft River.

Key matchup: J.J. Gee vs. the Valley School District. Specially, the key to beating the Hornets is stopping their 185-pound senior fullback, who rushed for 1,500 yards last season and 48 last week against Declo. Senior linebacker Johnny Rarick will doubtless have a lot to say about how successful the Vikings are tonight.

Negotiations between NFL, union adjourn

NEW YORK — The NFL labor talks stalled Thursday because of an impasse over protection for player representatives, although both sides agreed they would continue to work on avoiding the second player strike in the last five years.

After meeting for 4½ hours on Wednesday in Washington, the two chief negotiators — Gene Upshaw for the NFL Players Association, Jack Donlan for the league's Management Council — spoke by telephone for 1½ hours on Thursday.

John Jones, a spokesman for the Management Council, said Donlan returned to New York after Upshaw told him he didn't want to continue negotiations without discussing "pay protection for player reps."

"From this time on," Jones said, "the Management Council will put its time and effort to prepare a proposal for settlement."

Upshaw meanwhile characterized the talks as "on hold."

The contract between the union and the league expired on Monday, although the union cannot strike until Sept. 15 because it didn't give its 60-day strike notice to the league and the National Labor Relations Board until July 15.

On the day the contract expired, the union's executive committee set a strike date, reported to be either the second or fourth week of the regular season. It will be voted on next Tuesday by the player representatives for the 28 teams.

The NFL season begins Sept. 13. Five years ago, the last time the contract was negotiated, the players struck after the second week of the season and stayed out for 67 days, eliminating seven games of the 16-game regular season schedule.

Although the union's demand for unrestricted free agency is expected to be the stickiest issue in the talks, the player-rep. protection issue moved to the forefront Tuesday. That's when Brian Holloway of the New England Patriots, a three-time Pro Bowl offensive tackle who had represented the union on national television Monday night, was told by Coach Raymond Berry to either

NL hands Hatcher 10 days' vacation over corked bat

HOUSTON — National League President Bart Giamatti, continuing a crackdown against scuffed baseballs, and tampered bats, handed a 10-day suspension Thursday to Houston's Billy Hatcher for using a corked bat.

Hatcher was not available for comment, but General Manager Dick Wagner said Hatcher had told him he would not appeal the suspension, which started Thursday.

Astron Manager Hal Lanier was fined an undisclosed sum because Giamatti holds that a manager is responsible for illegal bats used by his players.

Hatcher was ejected from Tuesday's game against the Chicago Cubs after his bat splintered, revealing it had been injected with cork.

"I knew there probably would be

a 10-day suspension for Billy, but I don't agree with the fine," Lanier said Thursday. "I don't think it's a manager's job to check the inventory of the bats."

Pitchers Kevin Gross of the Philadelphia Phillies and Joe Niekro of the American League's Minnesota Twins were suspended for 10 days each after sandpaper was discovered in their possession during a game.

Their managers, Leo Ellis and Tom Kelly, escaped fines because a directive by Commissioner Peter Ueberroth, and also Giamatti, specified bats and made no mention of doctored baseballs.

He claims he (Giamatti) had a letter sent out about the bats. He said he didn't mention sandpaper, baseballs," Houston owner John McMullen said.

McMullen said the corked bat incident was "embarrassing."

"It's clearly a violation of the rules," McMullen said.

In Big Sky, all roads leading back to Reno

With the loss of six first-team All-Big Sky Conference players from a year ago, including the offensive and defensive players of year, Nevada-Reno football coach Chris Ault would seem to have some rebuilding to do in 1987.

So why are most predicting another conference title for the Wolf Pack? And why has Don Henrich's College Football '87 magazine ranked UNR No. 1 in its preseason predictions for the NCAA Division I-AA?

The optimism at UNR begins with running game.

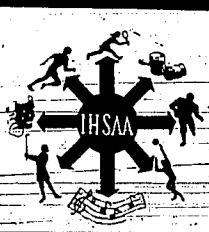
UNR returns what should be the Big Sky's most devastating one-two offensive punch in running back Lucius Floyd and fullback Charver Foger, a tandem that Ault says is the best he's had in his 11 years at Reno.



Floyd, a 6-0, 190-pound senior speedster, led the Big Sky in rushing during 1986, racking up 1,068 yards, including a school-record 305 yards against Montana State.

Foger, a 5-11, 205-pound junior, had an off-season in 1986, slumping from 1,241 yards in his freshman season to 327 last year.

But Ault expects Foger to return to form in 1987. "Charver came in at 217 (pounds) • See BIG SKY on Page C3

last season," said Ault. "The first four or five games, he wasn't ready to play football. I guarantee you won't be over 200 this year, or he'll be on the sidelines with me."

The Pack also returns three of five starters from last year's offensive line that played a key role in a season that saw UNR win the conference with a 10-0 mark and reach the Division I-AA semifinals before finally losing to eventual national champion Georgia Southern. The Pack finished the season at 13-1.

The only real question mark on offense will be who replaces quarterback Eric Beavers, the Big Sky's Offensive Player of the Year in 1986.

Jim Zacher, a 6-11, 176-pound junior, emerged as the spring practice as the front-runner. Zacher will have plenty of competition.

Still in contention for the starting job are junior Craig Kennedy (6-1, 165) and sophomore Andy Genasci (6-2, 160).

"Our first game were today, yes (Zacher) would be the starter," said Ault. "But it'll still be a footrace. Zacher is a little quicker than Beavers but throws the same type of ball. He's not going to break any windshields."

Kennedy has the gun. Genasci is ahead in knowledge of the offense, and the two are off to an offense is (calling) a huddle.

Although UNR led wide receiver Bryan Calder and tight end Scott Threde to graduation, whoever gets the nod at quarterback will have several speedy receivers to pick from, including Tony Logan, who had 41 receptions in 1986, and Donte Davis, a talented if inexperienced receiver.

And the Nevada-Reno offense will carry a little insurance into the 1987 campaign: senior All-Big Sky placekicker Marty Zendejas.

Zendejas enters the season needing only six points to break the I-AA scoring record and 16 field goals to break his brother Tony's I-AA record of 70 career three-pointers.

UNR's defense will be talented and experienced despite the losses of linebacker Henry Rolling, Big Sky Defensive Player of the Year, and all-conference cornerback Joe Peterson.

While first-team All-Big Sky guard Bill Bingham (6-7, 295) returns, there are concerns about depth on the defensive line. Tackles Scott Martin and Lindon Lilly were not invited back after testing positive for steroids, and tackle Dean Hodges is having academic problems that could put him on the sidelines.

But there is plenty of depth at linebacker and experience in the defensive secondary.

The schedule could be a problem if UNR is to match its 11-0 regular season record of 1986.

UNR must travel to Idaho and Nevada to play the top teams given the best chance of winning the title on the field.

But Nevada-Reno enters the 1987 campaign having won 26 out of its last 26 regular-season games and, barring injuries, there is no end in sight to UNR's dominance.

"It's right now Reno is the team to beat," said Idaho's Keith Gilbertson. Asked to explain his choice, Gilbertson snapped, "Because Reno's the damn team to beat every year."

Idaho

It's one of those autumns at the University of Idaho — time for a new quarterback.

First it was Ken Hohart, then Rick Sloan and Scott Linehan. Now, some 16,728 aerial yards since the Vandals went to a short passing game in 1982, it'll be John Fries's turn to run the offense.

Fries, a sophomore from Cour d'Alene, lacks experience after backing up Linehan as a red-shirt freshman. He played in three games, completing 10 of 26 passes for for 105 yards and one interception.

But Fries, a 6-4, 203-pounder, is at least 2 inches taller than his predecessors.

"I think his size is a great benefit, especially in our style of play," said Gilbertson. "We're evolving every year to a little less mobile type of quarterback into a stand-in there, and throw-the-ball type."

"If he has to scramble, then our offensive line is doing a lousy job of blocking," Gilbertson added. "Our offensive line has to keep people off him. In our offense that's not usually a problem. We've developed a style of play where we get the ball off in a hurry and don't get sacked a lot. It's safe, so to speak."

The Vandals open at home Saturday night against Division II Mankato State. Their Big Sky opener is Sept. 26 at Northern Arizona.

Linehan threw for 2,954 yards and 22 TDs with 12 interceptions last year as Idaho finished 8-4. The Vandals finished third in the Big Sky, but made the I-AA playoffs for the third time, losing to Big Sky champion Nevada-Reno.

Fries has a good arm, good knowledge of the offense and a bright future," says Gilbertson.

He will be surrounded by a line that includes four returning starters. "It will be to John's advantage to break in with veteran kids," says Gilbertson.

"Returning starters are junior tackle Greg Hale, sophomore

guards Troy Wright and Todd New, and junior center Mark Schlereth. Projected starting center Steve Unger, a sophomore, lost his starting job last year when Schlereth moved over from the defensive line. But Schlereth moved to guard during spring drills.

The Vandals are loaded with wide receivers, but last year's leading ballhawk, Neosia Morris, will be out until possibly after the season opener.

He underwent surgery Aug. 13 for a broken foot.

The 5-10, 180-pound player was named second-team All-Big Sky after catching 59 passes for 719 yards and three touchdowns.

Also back is senior Eric Jorgensen, who caught 31 balls for 106 yards and three TDs. Other wideouts are John Jole like Morris, a transfer from Los Angeles Valley CC, and sophomore Lee Allen. Allen will finally see action after redshirting at Eastern Washington two years ago and sitting out last year at UI under NCAA transfer rules.

Wideout Brent Bengen, who had 56 receptions for 896 yards and nine touchdowns, graduated.

Craig Robinson and Chris Slater, who both started part of last year, are back at tight end. Robinson missed the last part of 1986 with a broken ankle.

Junior fullback Todd Hoines, a two-year starter who gained 227 yards last year, anchors the backfield.

On defense, the Vandals lost their top four tacklers in inside linebackers Tom Hennessey and Mike Cox, free safety Mark Tynd and end Nolan Harper.

Still, Gilbertson says he likes who the Vandals have on the line and at linebacker.

Sophomore Kord Smith has been moved from defensive tackle to end, and the starting tackles will be senior Craig Dowdy and freshman Jim Kutlos.

Replacing Hennessey (180 tackles, five interceptions) and Cox (106 tackles, three pickoffs) will be "The Maniacal Medveds," junior twins Jerry and Jim Medved from Tacoma, Wash. Jerry started most of the season at outside backer and had 64 tackles last year. Jim backed up on the inside.

Northern Arizona

Northern Arizona University football Coach Larry Kemtera, whose club proved the critics wrong last season, says his Lumberjacks are no longer underdogs in the Big Sky and that could pose a problem.

"In the first two years I was here, the preseason poll always picked us for the cellar. I think the last 30 years, they've had us picked last," Kemtera said. "So this year I go up there to Sun Valley for the league meeting and they tell me, 'Larry, you're second.'"

"I tell them, 'Hey, you can't lose as many players as we did and be second.' You got it going down there. In fact, you might even win it all this year. I said, 'Hey, you people are crazy.' But that's what happens when you start winning. People expect you to go on and win it all now."

Northern Arizona, which went 3-8 overall and 1-6 in the Big Sky last season, posted a 7-4 overall record last year and wound up runner-up to Nevada-Reno in the league standings at 6-2.

The finish was the school's best since winning the conference title in 1978 and snapped a string of six straight losing seasons.

Still, Kemtera dreams of what could have been as two fourth-quarter turnovers allowed Nevada-Reno to rally for a 27-17 win at home in the Nov. 15 season-finale for the Big Sky title.

"We were six minutes away from winning the conference championship," he said. "But we still got to finish second after getting picked to finish last. We came a long way last year and hopefully we can continue that same type of play and not be like a bouncing ball."

"We want to keep the prestige up

and keep a winning attitude. I think that is what NAU has lacked in the past. I think we've turned things around and we've got things on the right track. Hopefully, what we installed will keep on going."

Kemtera said the Lumberjacks' strength this season will be on offense with eight of 11 starters returning including sophomore quarterback Greg Wyatt, the league's Newcomer of the Year in 1986.

Boise State

Boise State's fortunes this fall in the Big Sky football race may depend on how fast a lot of newcomers improve.

With a new head coach, former Washington assistant Skip Hall, a questionable offense and a graduation-depleted defense, the Broncos don't figure to be in the championship chase this season.

But Hall has brought in a lot of newcomers, including more than 40 freshmen, and the Broncos could turn into a contender if everything falls together late in the season.

Coach Lyle Stenschil left after a 6-5 season last year, Boise State's first losing season as a four-year school, and a 24-20 mark for four years.

It's Hall's first assignment as a head coach, but he spent 12 years at Washington under Don James. He recruited heavily in Washington, bringing a lot of freshmen from that state.

The newcomers are huge. At a recent news conference, Hall said his freshmen offensive linemen recruit averages 6-4, 275 pounds, big by Big Sky standards.

But Boise State graduated most of its top-ranked defense, with tackle Peter Kwiatkowski, 6-3, 246; the only returning starter.

Senior Rick Gora, junior Larry Hines and sophomore Robert Morris appear to be battling for the other defensive end spot. Senior Jeff Hunt, 6-4, 260-pounds, could start at one tackle spot and 261-pound sophomore Pat Moore could start at nose guard.

Starting at linebacker will be sophomore Jerry Ennis and senior Mark Williams. The inside backers could be junior Shawn Ellis and sophomore Joe McCarthy.

Speedy Chris Truitt, who specialized in return last season, loomed as the potential cornerback across from Gooding, with Randall Hudspeth the apparent starter at free safety.

The offense also is unproven, and Hall has been talking in preseason about trying to run a ball-control offense, similar to that used at Washington, rather than the wide-open, passing game popular in the Big Sky.

"Pure passing teams don't win championships, but good passing teams do," Hall said.

Senior Vinco Alcaide and redshirt freshman Duane Halliday both looked good in the spring game, and Hall says both are in contention for the starting quarterback job. Alcaide did not do well in his playing time last season, and Halliday hasn't played a varsity down yet.

Keith Jarrett, left school after missing a year of practice in a dispute with Hall.

Chris Jackson, a senior tailback, figures to handle the bulk of Boise State's running game, although Hall acknowledges that if he gets injured, the Broncos could be in trouble. Jackson averaged more than 100 yards per game last season, but only played in five games because of injuries.

If Jackson is hurt, Hall says he may have to turn to freshman tailback Cliff Sexton, who started at tailback some of the time last season; apparently will be the starting fullback.

Boise State returns its top receiver, senior Eric Andrade, who had 41 catches last season. Jon Youngblood, who originally signed with Idaho but later returned to his home town to play at Boise State,

could be a factor at split end along with speedy senior Steve Hale.

The schedule appears to be in Boise State's favor. The Broncos open Saturday night home against Delaware State, and play six of their first eight games at home.

What figures to be the three toughest Big Sky games, against preseason favorite Nevada-Reno, Northern Arizona and Idaho, are the last three games of the season.

"Which gives Hall's newcomers a long time to get ready."

Montana State

Earle Solomonson is a "young coach whose status is on the rise but who prefers to keep his feet, and the football, on the ground."

Solomonson, new head coach at Montana State, led North Dakota State to NCAA Division II national titles the past two years.

He succeeded Dave Arnold, whose Bobcats won the I-AA national championship in 1984, but whose four-year record at MSU was only 18-29, including a 3-8 mark last season, 2-6 in the Big Sky.

In his first two years as a college head coach, Solomonson, 39, had a 24-2-1 record at North Dakota State, including a 13-0 season last year. The Bison also won another national title during the six years Solomonson was an assistant coach at the school.

Under Arnold, the Bobcats had a strong passing attack but an almost non-existent ground game. Last season they threw for 3,049 yards but had only 555 net yards rushing — just 50 per game.

North Dakota State, on the other hand, averaged 350 yards per game rushing and 125 passing last season while scoring an average of 42 points and holding opponents to less than 7 per game.

Solomonson also brought to Bozeman North Dakota State assistants who are familiar with his program.

"Without a doubt, that will help, he said.

Last year, the Bobcats' biggest offensive threat was quarterback Kelly Bradley, who has graduated.

Solomonson hopes that the loss of Bradley will be offset by the running game. "While Bradley holds nearly every career passing and total offense record, he probably wouldn't fit into Solomonson's offense."

"We will be a run-oriented, option team," he said. "Going into fall drills, the top candidate at quarterback had been junior Shaun Shahan, who has eight of 12 passes for 234 yards and five touchdowns in limited action last season."

But in a late August scrimmage, Shahan suffered a shoulder separation that required surgery.

"That appears to leave the job to senior Kelly Sherwin, who played in nine games in 1986 but completed only 17 of 62 passes for 294 yards and three TDs."

Sherwin suffered bruised ribs during early fall drills but was expected to begin practicing again this week.

Also in the quarterback picture

are freshman redshirt-Rob Stolts and another freshman, John Tetrault.

Fifteen of the 32 lettersman returning will be on offense, but only four of those players were starters in 1986.

Eastern Washington

Now that Eastern Washington University is in the Big Sky, it'll only have to wait two weeks to begin running with the Pack.

The Eagles, for several seasons a I-AA independent, began their inaugural foray into the Big Sky when the defending conference champion and perennial powerhouse Nevada-Reno visits Sept. 12.

"I feel good about it," says nine-year EWU coach Dick Zornes. "They've got to play them sometime, and we want to find out where we're at early so we can make adjustments and that'll be the test. There's no question Reno is as good as anybody on the Division I-AA circuit, and as good as a lot of Division I schools around here."

The conference membership will mean "not being in such a nebulous situation," said Zornes, who's 55-25-1 at his alma mater.

"It's nice to know we'll get those guys home and home," he added. "Reno has never been here, Boise State was here once out of four times and Idaho State was here once out of five."

"We've been a road show all the time, so this will be a plus for us. We're trying to build some following, and now we can say, 'Hey, some of those good teams are coming in here to play.'"

The Eagles, coming off a 6-6 season, open at home Saturday against Division II Anguiana (S.D.) State. Following Nevada-Reno, Idaho State visits Sept. 19.

Eastern plays its home games in Spokane's Joe Albi Stadium.

With the graduation of 17 fifth-year seniors, Zornes welcomed back a much younger team. But that doesn't mean a more spirited, competitive squad, he said.

"We're a markedly younger team, and there are a lot more open spots and more chances for individuals to play," Zornes said. "A guy who may be No. 1 may have much more experience than the No. 2 guy. Last year that No. 1 guy was probably a

three-year starter."

Add Zornes, "At this point, we're not the football team that we've been for the last four or five years. We have good, talented people, but don't have a lot of experience."

Weber State

Weber State football coach Mike Price wants to improve his defense and he's turning to the offense for help.

"We're going to emphasize the running game... to run the clock," Price said.

The Wildcats, 3-8 last year, scored more than 30 points per game, but the defense gave up nearly 32 points. Price has decided to ignore down the passing game and keep the ball on the ground, allowing the clock to keep ticking between plays.

The plan is unique in the pass-happy Big Sky, but it may work.

The Wildcats will have two first-footed runners in their backfield — senior Sean Sanders, who gained 945 yards on 196 carries, and junior college transfer Pines Unga, who gained 1,462 yards and scored 22 touchdowns for 11-1 at Dixie College.

Price said Unga, who has one year of eligibility remaining, should help out immediately if he can adapt to the Wildcats' system. He can bench press 405 pounds and can run the 40-yard dash in 4.8 seconds.

"Price might be great," Price said. "In addition to Unga and Sanders, the Wildcats have redshirt junior Willie McDonald at fullback. Price said McDonald, who started as a sophomore in 1985 but injured his knee in the fifth game of the season, is a definite pro prospect."

"We feel like we should run the ball with authority... and that should take some of the pressure off our quarterback," Price said.

The quarterback is the only position on the team with no varsity experience, but Price said 6-4 junior Jeff Carlson will be as good as any quarterback in the league.

The offensive line should have no trouble opening holes for the runners, or protecting Carlson when he drops back to pass. All five probable starters are seniors and all have started for Weber State in Big Sky on Page C4

Idaho State
Residents of Pocatello want to see Idaho State play in the NCAA Division I-AA national championship game here this fall, but Coach Jim Koetter says the Bengals have a lot of work to do first.

"It's a community project (and) there is a lot of enthusiasm now," Koetter said, of the game scheduled for the ISU Mindome in December. "Sure, we would love to play in that game. Then it would really be exciting."

Koetter opened fall drills with one goal: "to get everyone playing at the level we need to play at to be competitive" in the Big Sky Conference.

"Then I think the wins will take care of themselves," he said.

One of the biggest questions is the health of quarterback Gino Mariani, who played with a sore shoulder much of last season and was unable to throw.

Mariani was put on a rehabilitation program during the off-season and Koetter said he has regained most of his throwing motion and can throw deep.

"I think he has all the qualities to make the comeback and get the job done," Koetter said. Even so, the 3, 195-pound quarterback is being challenged by redshirt freshman Jason Whitmer and Koetter said the race for the starting job would be close this fall.

No matter who is selected, Koetter said, he will throw to experienced receivers — senior split end Shawn Beals, a two-year starter, and redshirt sophomore flanker Eric Van Orden.

Van Orden left to go on a Mormon Church mission two years ago, but he returned early and missed only one season.

"The big question with Butch Caston is whether he can take the pounding play after play," Koetter said.

Koetter said he plans to put more of the rushing load on Corky Federico, a 5-9, 210-pound senior who has started two years. Federico averaged 6.5 yards per carry last year and is an outstanding blocker.

South wisely refused to finesse dummy's club queen. At trick one, and he was right. Had he done so, East would have won his king and fired back a club to establish West's suit. The defenders would then have scored six winners for an easy down two.

Instead, South rose with dummy's club ace, hoping to block the suit. Unfortunately for South, he chose this play against the wrong East. This East actually threw his club king under dummy's ace and when a diamond was led, he hopped up with his ace to lead a club. Declarer found a better play in clubs than finessing dummy's queen, but was two down anyway.

The best play for the game is to duck the first trick completely. If East unblocks his king by overtaking the club, he can't take any returns in clubs but he will have a club to lead when he wins his diamond ace.

And if East saves his king, South's play of the club ace on next club lead will produce 10 tricks.

Hemingway to rise again in TV mini-series

Keach brings Papa back to Idaho

SUN VALLEY — Last week the leaves started turning yellow on the cottonwoods so it seemed appropriate that Ernest Hemingway would come back to this famed resort town for a few days. In fact, for the last days of August and early this week, Hemingway took over his old haunt, the Ram Bar.

It was not a ghost. The entire Ram Bar was used as production headquarters for "Hemingway," a 6-hour mini-series on the life of the Noble and Pulitzer Prize winning author who spent his last years in Ketchum, Idaho. The series, starring Stacy Keach as Ernest Hemingway, will be aired in April.

Production crews with phones, desks, schedules and bulletin boards operated out of the favorite wintertime après-ski bar, as Daniel Wilson Productions of New York in conjunction with Alcor Films of Munich, Germany, worked through the final filming logistics. Scenes were shot earlier this year in Paris, Spain, Venice, the Swiss and Austrian Alps, and Africa where the author set new frontiers in "lifestyles" as much as he set in his writing style.

In the center of the Ram Bar production headquarters, chalked on a large blackboard someone had written: "Willkommen zum Sun Valley." Most of the film crew has come from the German film company. Their language seemed

right at home in the bar where former Austrian ski instructors imported in the early days of Sun Valley, once favored with learn-to-ski guests in the same language.

Linda Marmelstein of Daniel Wilson Productions, Inc. is co-producer of the mini-series along with Bernhard Zinkel of Alcor Films.

"We are only filming the last years of Hemingway's life here when he was in his 60s," said Marmelstein explaining that time limitations do not permit the depiction of the famed author's intermittent visits to Sun Valley from 1939 until 1969 — when he settled here permanently. At that time he and his fourth wife, Mary (played by Pamela Reed), purchased a house beside Warm Springs north of Ketchum.

"It was at this house on July 2, 1961 that Hemingway took his own life with a shotgun in the little hall room where he typed (sometimes standing up) some of his last works: 'The Garden of Eden' published in 1956; 25 years after his death, was written at the house which is one of the locales of the film.

The Hemingway mini-series for TV has been "in project development" for four years explained Marmelstein who herself took four trips to the Sun Valley area to scout locations.

As a film producer and ever mindful of camera requirements, she liked the fall backdrop best. "Just like the Hemingway memorial says," said the tall dark-haired producer from New York. She was referring

to the Hemingway Memorial by Trill Creek Road. A bronze bust of the author in the woods overlooking Trill Creek has a plaque which reads:

"Best of all he loved the fall
The leaves yellow on the cottonwoods
Leaves floating on the trout streams
And above the hills
The high blue windless sky
Now he will be a part of them forever."

The words are Hemingway's, written in 1936 as an eulogy for his hunting buddy, Gene Van Guilder of Ketchum.

While Stacy Keach bears an uncanny resemblance to the American author, Marmelstein insists he "did not grow a beard to depict the older Hemingway." She explained that Keach arrived direct from Michigan where he was filmed playing Hemingway at 20 years old. "The next day he was portraying Hemingway as a 60-year-old, so it would have been impossible to grow a beard."

The TV mini-series was the idea of Daniel Wilson who was taken by the far-out life-style of the author and wanted to capture its essence for TV audiences.

Besides the Hemingway home in Ketchum and the Ketchum Cemetery where the author is buried, the town of Richfield was used for filming.

"We needed a small town," said Marmelstein explaining they wanted to depict just how far from

the mainstream of the rich and famous Hemingway's life-style took him. One reason Ketchum was not used was because during the scheduled filming time, the town's streets would have banners spread across them advertising the Labor Day Weekend Wagon Days Parade.

Extras for the film were secured through Idaho Film Services of Sun Valley.

Sun Valley's Lupine Room, which normally is used for conference sessions by organizations, was turned into a wardrobe office and extras assembled there each morning to acquire their costumes for the day.

The TV program, "Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous" also used Stacy Keach's visit to Sun Valley as an opportunity to film him enjoying the resort's amenities between production schedules.

While the scene will not be a part of the mini-series, "Lifestyles" taped a de luxe enactment of Keach with an "old Royal" manual typewriter as in Room 206 of the Sun Valley Lodge. It was in that room that Ernest Hemingway wrote much of "For Whom the Bell Tolls" in 1939.

Except for the view from the balcony of the new 1980s ski runs cut through Baldy Mountain, anyone would have thought that the famous author was typing again, those short tight sentences, those unusual periodic phrases, and those long descriptive paragraphs so full of visual imagery that mark him as an author who went beyond ordinary limits.

Locals get shot as extras in 'Hemingway' production

KETCHUM — Being an extra in a film isn't exactly like being a movie star, but extras do play the critical role of making particular scenes realistic by simply riding a subway, buying a newspaper or even walking across the street in front of the camera.

The Hemingway mini-series is no exception and while not quite stars, many locals participated as extras in the recent shooting.

One Hailey resident, Lisa McGrew, 12, became an extra in the TV mini-series more or less by accident. "A school friend asked McGrew if she'd like to be in the movie. Sound glamorous?"

On Wednesday, McGrew played the part of a tourist visiting Idaho with her family during the Hemingway era. Her scene consisted of riding in the backseat of a car past the camera. "It was fun," she says.

While driving up Highway 76 toward the day's shooting location, McGrew had a little time to think about potential stardom. She wasn't really nervous, just "a little nervous driving up there," she says.

Still, the experience was "fun" for the Wood River Junior High School student, and the \$75 she was paid for the day made it even better. "I'm going to save the money for something special," she says. "Or maybe put it in the bank."

Bob Lawrence of Twin Falls wasn't really looking for a part for himself, he thought the producers might want to make use of his car — a 1966 DeSoto and a 1957 Chrysler. But when the film crew met the 63-year-old bearded man, they wanted to cast him as an extra as well.

"They were quite impressed with the fact that I looked so much like Hemingway," he says. This was not news to Lawrence though. He says he was once sitting at a bar in Ketchum when Mary Hemingway came in. She was so disturbed by Lawrence's likeness to her late husband that she later told a friend "she thought she'd seen a ghost."

Lawrence owns his own business and so was able to get away for the two long days it took to shoot his scenes. He was told he couldn't have a speaking part in the mini-series because he looked too much like the American author. But that didn't stop him from making friends with another Hemingway look-alike — Stacy Keach.

"He was wonderful," says Lawrence. "He was so down to earth. Not a prima donna. We spent some time swapping fishing stories."

The film crew finished shooting in Idaho yesterday, and will move on to Ogden, Utah. They leave behind a few local folks who have enjoyed Hollywood stardom — if only for a day.

Sothorn speaks of work on latest film, 'Whales of August'

SUN VALLEY — It's a fine September day, with just a hint of fall in the air as Ann Sothorn sits

relaxed in her favorite chair in the living room of her home overlooking the River Run side of Bald Mountain.

1987 has not been the best year for Sothorn, with three tragic

deaths in her family and major surgery she underwent last spring, but she still has the tenacity for life and was eager to talk of her latest film, "Whales of August," which will be released this Christmas.

"Everything about me was so different, but I've always loved characterization and character parts — that's always what I wanted to do."

Longtime Sun Valley resident and screen star, Sothorn has joined forces with four of the legendary figures in Hollywood to bring to life a movie which one critic of the 40th Cannes Film Festival called the "only genuine cinematic masterpiece."

"The Whales of August" stars two of the screen's premier and pioneering artists — Lillian Gish, 94 and Bette Davis, 79, — along with Vincent Price, 78, Harry Carey, Jr., 68 and Sothorn, 76 (who claims to be 68 and holding).

With Gish and Davis lending the cast as two sisters threatened by change, and Sothorn, Price and Carey in royal support, almost every film genre is represented by these major talents — from the silent cinema to dramas and melodramas, from musicals and comedies to westerns, horror films and science fiction.

As Sothorn sat casually, dressed in a soft blue housedress amidst an array of memorabilia in her living room, her blond hair, smooth skin and sparkling eyes belied the fact that she is nearing her 80th birthday. Her slow walk and use of a cane are the only clues to her aging.

In the film, Sothorn plays Tiha, a curly topped redhead without a stitch of make-up who speaks with a strong Down-East Maine accent.

"Whales of August" took eight weeks to produce last September and October and the weather on the Maine coast was chilly at times. To compensate, Sothorn wore two layers of underwear beneath her outfit, making her appear heavier than normal. She says she has since lost a lot of weight, but adds the look was right for the character.

"I was startled at first from the way I looked," Sothorn said.

Quaid's policeman makes 'Big Easy'

HOLLYWOOD — There is a purring, laid-back quality to Dennis Quaid's police lieutenant, Remy McSwain, in "The Big Easy" that is ease itself. This is a man who takes charge with a deprecating, triangular grin that flusters women and allies right over New Orleans' wise guys.

That he takes bribes as well goes hand in hand with his city's traditions, where corruption is rooted as deeply as the magnolia trees. "Use the way things are done down here."

To Eastern-born Assistant District Attorney-Anne Osborne (Ellen Barkin), who is investigating police corruption in the city, these magnolia trees do not smell quite so sweet; they have what Tennessee Williams once called an odor of mendacity.

And as screenwriter Daniel Petrie Jr. sets up the conflict, and director Jim McBride fleshes it out with devastating, sexy assurance. With a bloody gangland drug war as backdrop, they pit the straight and narrow against the big easy.

If it were only that simple, but one of the film's many strong

qualities is to show how easily the lines get blurred. McSwain is the son of a cop who was on the take all his life. Part of his ease is a kickback from the purporting Widows and Orphans Fund, routinely slipped onto his desk, pays his brother's (Tom O'Brien) college costs. Another part cushions his handsome, widowed mother's (Grace Zabrialke) existence, at least until she marries McSwain's superior officer (Ned Beatty). And from the look of it, a considerable part contributes to McSwain's own personal flash. No body is living extravagantly, only living a little better. "A good life for doing a dirty job." Where's the harm?

Everywhere. The film makers suggest there is no such thing as a little money, corruption. Our outrage should be preserved, when it is directed at our Mafia kingpin (that great icon Marc Lawrence) or the expansive Beatty or, by extension, anyone in political life.

The crusading angel and the devilish wrongdoer are hardly new figures on the American screen. Director McBride's method of shaking things up a little—the thrack between the eyes that guarantees our attention, is the electric charge of attraction between the silky experienced cop and the definitively cau-

tious lawyer, a lady who outlines her conversations on a yellow legal pad before she picks up a phone.

(Authoritative, knee-weakening sexuality—is definitely one—of McBride's trademarks; it is a setback that more people remember the Richard Gere-Valerie Kaprisky encounters in McBride's "Breathless" than its updated Angst.)

There is something authoritative, too, to the feeling of the city that goes beyond familiar iron filigree and "lilt-in-the-voice." There is its sound, by musicians like the Neville Brothers and Prof. Longhair, zydeco by Beauzouff. And Affonso Beato's camera captures the city at its most affecting, with its enormous accessibility to life; at impromptu front-yard barbecues where everybody dances, kids-to-grandparents, and where McSwain even plays guitar and sings. Seldom has corruption had such a folksy face.

Eventually the film's suspense underpinnings take over its personal story, yet that tension Quaid and Barkin generate still holds. Solidly fine as actors they are also a great pair, like two golden athletes. Quaid is freer, even more humorous than his lovely work in "In-nepapace" — and with more room to do it. And with her wonderful full mouth and blessedly untamped-

with nose, there is no sense of prisonness to Barkin's voice of conscience. It may be years before this scene of lovelinking fades from memory either. That, and language, are the reasons for the film's R rating. McBride has also cast to the fullest; eccentric advantage. This marks the last screen performance of the late Charles Ludlam, that great parodist and man of the theater, as McSwain's eccentric lawyer. As another cop, Lisa Jane Persky is so good you wish her character came to something more. And Beatty (and increasingly, Grace Zabrialke as McSwain's mother) is incapable of a bad performance.

'Full Metal Jacket' focused outrage

The following are capsule reviews of movies playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

FULL METAL JACKET (R). In this film, director Stanley Kubrick brings his rigorous artist's eye to Vietnam to create a powerful and centered statement of outrage. Although its two sections — observing the antiseptic madness of Parris Island and the too-mortal chaos in Vietnam proper — are not perfectly balanced, it is a muscular return to form for the filmmaker who made "Dr. Strangelove" and "A Clockwork Orange." And in a superb cast of mostly unknowns, Vincent D'Onofrio and ex-Marine drill instructor Lee Ermey are exceptional.

quicker than liquor), which degenerates into another gore-drenched American family vs. the scoundogs scene. Or over the top. When the tank starts exploding at the climax, you know you've had enough.

MASTERS OF THE UNIVERSE (PG). A sword-and-sorcery epic based on the famous toy line and syndicated TV cartoon series; in this case, it might have worked better with the cartoon characters in the leads. Or over the top. Delph Lundgren, as the redoubtable "He-Man," gives us a nearly incomprehensible, polyethylene performance, and the plot has the legions of Eternia invading Colby, Calif.: a town so blasé that nobody shows up for the intergalactic war on Main Street.

NADINE (PG). This little sweet nothing from writer-director Robert Benton — concerning a recently divorced couple who (sort of) get back together again — benefits so much from the chemistry between its two stars, Kim Basinger and Jeff Bridges, that one may not mind its thinness. Benton's loving look at yet another offbeat, tenacious Texas woman — Bonnie Parker and the sisters of "Places in the Heart" — is pretty much the light bear of movies, but enough happens to you that you may not mind so very much.

NO WAY OUT (R). Abetted by director Roger Donaldson's main strengths — bedrock believability, self-effacing technique, and the bristling tension of his sexual relationships — this cracklingly fine thriller plumbs the depths of deception in the federal government. The action is whizzingly fast but the performances are lovingly fleshed-out. The greatest prize is Kevin Costner as the youngish New York officer around whom the baroque plot unwinds; he is a fiercely good, intelligent and appreciatively sensual.

SNOW WHITE AND THE SEVEN DWARFS (G). Fifty years after its premiere, Walt Disney's first feature still ranks as a masterpiece of both animation and film making. "Snow White" contains some of the darkest terrors, most touching sorrows and funniest comedy ever done in animation. The Disney imagery has become so much a part of American popular culture that it is difficult to imagine any other version of these characters. Although some of the later Disney features are technically superior to

LA BAMBIA (PG-13). Although this film of the tragically brief life of Latino rocker Ritchie Valens has its strengths, especially the fine turn by the unknown Lou Diamond Phillips, the wonder is that the movie isn't full of raw nerve. It's it's for the most part polite melodrama. There is — the music, however, great dollops of '60s songs, and it lifts the movie when the dialogue — and the earnest-but-uninspired direction (by Luis Valdez) keeps it earthbound. THE LIVING DAYLIGHTS (PG). Idaho centennial panel seeks qualified authors

Qualified authors are sought for publications endorsed as centennial projects by the Idaho Centennial Commission. The books are to be published between now and 1990. Our approach has been to look at what books are needed in Idaho, especially in schools and libraries, says Dr. Arthur Hart, chairman of the publications committee. More than a dozen authors already have been contracted to write chapters for a book tentatively titled "The Peoples of Idaho," a multi-cultural overview of contributions made by ethnic and national groups in Idaho's history. "We're looking for about three or four more writers for The Peoples of Idaho," Hart says. Other publications currently in

the planning stages include a book on Idaho Indian Art, a collection of pioneer photographs, a survey of Idaho's architectural heritage, a new fourth grade Idaho history text, a biographical index of Idaho artists, a volume on Idaho place names, a history of the state constitution, a history of Idaho's education system, and an Idaho songbook. Although highest priority will be given to books that are statewide in interest, the Publications Committee has reserved part of its budget for assistance in publishing some local histories, Hart says. ...the impression that their youthful lives were full of happy, unhurried days. Sothem's real-life daughter, Tisha Sterling, who also resides in Sun Valley, plays the role of Sothem's young character. From here, the film brings the audience up-to-date with the elderly sisters locked in a mutual dependency which suddenly threatens to unravel. The last days of summer are spent "looking for the whales" which appear to be long gone, symbolizing an aspiration of life that has also disappeared.

Sothem plays the flirtatious lifelong best friend and neighbor of Grah, while Price is a charming gentleman with roots in Charist Russia. Carey plays the role of a crusty Maine handyman who must also face time's inevitabilities. As the subtle interplay of characterization evolves in the film, the audience can enjoy the humor, get a feel for the deep emotional conflicts which surface, and leave with a finer sense of the issues everyone confronts as death grows ever nearer.

As audience reaction is judged closely during a preview showing such as this, Sothem said the Sun Valley audience of 200 found a bit more humor in the film than previ-

ous audiences had. A good supply of tissues would be in order for those of you who, like this reporter, are prone to getting teary-eyed at displays of intense human feelings. Above all, Mike Kaplan, the film's producer, says "Whales of August" is "an affirmative and honest story about elderly people in which their feelings and concerns weren't overshadowed by younger-generation characters. The audience would enter a brand new senior world that would become universal."

This is the first film for Sothem in 10 years after recovering from an accident in 1974 when a fake ceiling collapsed on her, breaking her back and leaving her unable to move her legs. After three years, she slowly regained her mobility and today she walks with the use of a cane.

Sothem finds this limitation an aggravation, but something she must deal with daily. "I find it very demeaning to have to use a cane," she sighs. "I've always been so independent, and I've always been an athlete and a dancer."


Sothem easily admits her limitations are hard to accept at times, but quickly adds you have to be a survivor. During her movie and television career, Sothem has proven her ver-

atility in more than 60 films and 178 episodes of her own television shows — "Private Secretary" and "The Ann Sothem Show." Her television shows are currently being rerun on the Nickelodeon Cable Network. Under her real name, Harriet Lake, Sothem made her film debut in an early Warner's sound musical, "The Show of Shows." She then headed for Broadway where she quickly rose from small parts to leads and returned to Hollywood in 1933.

After signing a contract with Columbia Pictures, Harriet Cohn Sun Valley in 1948 to learn to ski, and she was soon playing light-hearted heroines in a string of pic-

tures at Columbia and RKO. In the '40s, she took the role intended for Jean Harlow and played the scatterbrained blonde "Mairie" in 10 movie epics. Sothem has also appeared in musicals such as "Panama Hattie" and "Lady Be Good" in which she introduced the Oscar-winning song, "The Last Time I Saw Paris." She continued to return to the theater, playing in "The Glass Menagerie," "Mame," "Gypsy," and "Everybody Loves Opa!"

It was during the busy days of her acting career when she first visited Sun Valley in 1948 to learn to ski. Over the years she spent the winter months and one month each summer in Sun Valley.

It might be extended families or MTV cops, but each fall, a definite pattern emerges among the new network TV shows. This season, there's a twist on the "Cosby" mode of family shows, and the detective genre is back in full force.

The Cosby Show's Denis Huxtable (Lisa Bonet) deals with college life in her own spin-off "A Different World." Phyllis Stickney, Marisa Tomei and Dawnn Lewis co-star. In other "family" shows, NBC is offering "My Two Dads" (Sundays), in which two old friends and rivals are awarded custody of their late girlfriend's child. An ABC comedy, "I Married Dora" (Fridays), revolves around a widower who marries his illegal alien housekeeper. he's seldom at a loss for words. Annette, on the other hand, appears to be somewhat shy and relies on Frankie to take command and set the scene. She comes through as a content and gracious suburban matron.

Q. — Isn't it true that actor Michael York, who's practically made a career out of looking lean and trim, has let himself go by gaining a lot of unsightly poundage? — A.J.

A. — York remains the trim actor he's always been. I can personally vouch for that since I chatted with him during the Cannes Film Festival last spring. He looked, in fact, even leaner than he looks on screen. You'll get a chance to verify my opinion when Michael appears this fall as Donna Mills's love interest on TV's "Knots Landing." Let's hope for York's sake that the part is a fat one.

Q. — Is it really true that Andy Williams, the singer who looks and sounds so young, recently became a grandfather? — A.R.

A. — Tennis fan Williams, 60, was attending the Wimbledon matches in England this summer when he got the good news. Andy's daughter, Noelle, made him a grandpa as she and her husband welcomed their son, Andrew Deane Johnston.

Q. — Isn't Dennis Day, that classic Hollywood Irish tenor, terminally afflicted with Lou Gehrig's disease? — G.S.

A. — Day, 70, tells me that he's suffering from a motoneuron ailment which, he says, is "like Lou Gehrig's disease — only not that bad." Dennis has been complaining of problems with one leg and with his sense of balance for more than a year. He's cancelled out professional engagements — yes, he still sings in that wonderful lyric Irish tenor. I wish him a speedy recovery.

Rosemary Prinz back on stage

Rosemary Prinz was the first bona fide daytime TV star when she played Penny Hughes in "As the World Turns." Up until she came on the scene, there were soap stars but not the kind that Rosemary evolved into. Most of the soap actors were known as the characters they played but Rosemary actually broke that mold and was always Rosemary Prinz who played Penny Hughes in "As the World Turns."

It seems odd in retrospect that Rosemary became so identified with soap operas. She never intended to spend as many years as she did in front of the daytime TV cameras. Her first love was and is the stage. Ever since she was a little girl, she announced to the world that she was going to be a stage actress.

At age 16, Rosemary was cast in a stock production of "Dear Ruth" and director Morton DaCosta suggested she'd be perfect for the leading role in the touring company of "Kiss and Tell." That's how it began and since that time, Rosemary has appeared in hundreds of plays on Broadway, in regional theaters and on the road.

"Even while I was playing Penny in 'World,' I appeared in more than 50 plays. I never really left the theater. Some people thought I was crazy doing both the soap and theater but I never gave it a second thought. I love the theater and that's why I became an actress."

Currently, Rosemary is appearing off-Broadway in a truly wonderful play titled "Steel Magnolias" and she is giving one of the best performances of this theatrical season. She plays a Southern lady named M'Lynn who congregates with other women in a small town beauty parlor where they discuss their troubles and triumphs. The play has been very well received and many theatergoers are surprised to note that the fine actress playing M'Lynn is the same actress who they saw playing Penny for so many years in "As the World Turns."

Rosemary admits that some of the audience make the connection after reading the Playbill bio which gives her soap credits, as well as her extensive theater background. However, except for a few recent returns to "As the World Turns" for special occasions, Rosemary hasn't been on daytime TV in years. Her last foray into soaps was the pre-

miere of "All My Children."

"When Agnes Nixon was launching 'All My Children,' she called me and asked me to be in the show for six months, just enough time to get it off the ground," said Rosemary. "She said I could have anything and I asked for billing above the title because until that time, no actor or actress had ever received star-billing in a soap. They gave it to me and I did it for six months and then I felt that I had done it all in soaps."

Rosemary chose to spend her acting days on the stage and she has done just that. Her repertoire includes some of the greatest roles ever written for the theater. She has appeared in "Long Day's Journey Into Night," "The Glass Menagerie," "Mame," "Death of a Salesman," "A Little Night Music," "The Importance of Being Earnest," and "Gypsy." Her eclectic stage roles have been in plays that run with gamut from Neil Simon to William Shakespeare to same Shepherd, with just about every other playwright of note in between.

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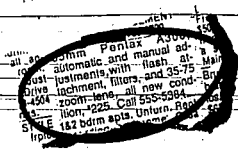

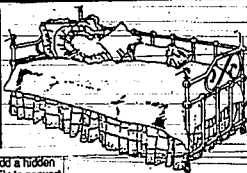

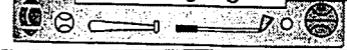

Somers becomes smart blonde

LOS ANGELES — Suzanne Somers is back on series television after an absence of six years and, guess what? This time, she ain't playing dumb.

Somers, the quintessential dumb blonde on ABC's "Three's Company" until she departed in a salary dispute in 1981, stars in a new, first-run syndicated comedy series called "She's the Sheriff," debuting this fall.

"I'm smart this year," Somers says. "I play a woman sheriff named Hildy Granger. She's appointed to the job when her husband, who had been sheriff, dies suddenly."

Ironically, Somers replaced Ffcilla Barnes in the role before filming began. Barnes was the actress who replaced Somers when she left "Three's Company." Barnes ultimately couldn't reach a contract agreement with the producers.

It's the first regular television role for Somers since "Three's Company," although she made several pilots that didn't work out. Other than a few specials, a role in the miniseries "Hollywood Wives" and a few other appearances, she has spent most of her time on her nightclub act.

"For the last six years when we talked to the networks the phrase they all used was that they wanted a reality-based comedy with a woman of the '80s," she said. "I was never sure what that was. I enjoyed playing the dumb blonde, and people responded to it so much. So I figured why not stick with it."

"But now I'm really enjoying this contemporary woman. For the first time I'm the same person in the middle with the crazies all around me. Previously, I was one of the crazies. I'm the voice of authority and those around me are out to lunch. I'm strong and I'm in a job usually held by a man. The deputies are opposed and I have to prove myself. Now I know what a woman of the '80s is."

Her chief nemesis as sheriff is Deputy Max Rubin, played by George Wyner. He feels he should have the job and is out to sabotage Hildy. Pat Carroll plays Hildy's mother, Talliesin Jaffe and Nicky Rose play her children.

The new show will also offer Somers a chance to do physical comedy. On "Three's Company," the

prattfalls were adroitly handled by John Ritter.

"The audience tests show that the public likes it best when George Wyner and I go at it head-to-head," she said. "He's really the bad guy in the show, because he's always trying to get me in trouble. He will drive me so crazy that I go berserk. I love doing the physical things. I really learned a lot watching John Ritter."

The show, from Lorimar-Teletellectures, has been widely sold across the country. It will be being touted in the "prime time begins at 7:30 p.m." campaign by NBC-owned stations who will put syndicated programming in that time slot before actual network prime time begins at 8 p.m. Eastern.

"I was guaranteed 22 weeks on the air," Somers said. "I said, 'Could you repeat that, please?' I kept waiting for the other shoe to drop, but it never did."

The networks rarely commit for more than 13 episodes. Most often, they will guarantee only about half that.

Somers' troubles on "Three's Company" began when her husband and manager, Alan Hamel, demanded a huge increase in her salary. The producers instead sent her character packing and she was on the show only as a brief "telephone call." The next year she was written out completely.

In retrospect, Somers said, "The way I left I would have done differently. Your business should not be public. A lot of egos got out of whack, including my own. But

losing the power of a network show made me appreciate what I had. I was forced to go out and pursue a career in public appearances. If I'd had the safety of television I would not have pursued it as vigorously."

As her television career waned, her nightclub career took off. She is a headliner at the Las Vegas Hilton, and in 1986 critics named her "Las Vegas Entertainer of the Year."

"Now that I'm coming back to television I'm ready for the bullets at my feet," she said. "I've been in nightclubs, which was tough to get off the ground, but I wasn't torn apart by the critics the way I was in television. I'm ready for it."

Fox executives push the Fox trot

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A political candidate might feel at home barnstorming across the country, but Fox Broadcasting Co. president Jamie Kellner admits it leaves him exhausted.

At the end of the first week of the "Great Fox Tune-In Tour," Kellner flew back to Los Angeles and slept most of the weekend. He visited Philadelphia and New Orleans, while colleagues went to San Antonio and Oklahoma City.

Nevertheless, he was anxious to get out again and sell Fox and its new lineup of Saturday and Sunday night shows to the public. Initially, they are screening "21 Jump Street" and "Werewolf" and getting reactions.

"We're going to the cities between New York and Los Angeles," he said. "We're going to the heartland. There the people are friendly and very sweet. They take time out to talk to you and to hear what you have to say."

"People watch a lot of television and they're very sophisticated about what they like and what they don't like. No one is in the middle on anything."

The "Tune-In Tour," which includes stars from the Fox shows, is unprecedented in the history of network broadcasting. Technically, Fox calls itself a national programming service, but that's as close to being a network as you can get.

Individual shows have taken to the hustling to drum up support, but never a network.

"It's incredibly time consuming," said Kellner. "It's a real grind, but I think we've learned a lot from it and I think the people we've come in contact with know more about us and had a good time."

"The shows that we've done that are the most different are the ones people like the most. The closer they are to what the networks are already doing, the more people are indifferent. But if a show is unique, they rave about it."

"We're a young company," he added. "We're in a position where we can be wrong and make mistakes. Now is the time for us to

learn and correct our mistakes."

Fox has nowhere to go but up. Its Saturday and Sunday prime-time lineup of nine shows are at rock bottom in the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings. Its talk show, "The Late Show," has dented Johnny Carson's dominance of the field.

Fox's initial research showed that many people were not aware of the company, an ignorance the tour is intended to correct. Kellner said by the time they complete the tour nearly 100,000 people will have seen at least one show and participated in a survey.

Chuck Connors of Fox's "Werewolf" and Jonathan Depp of "21 Jump Street" have been on the road, too.

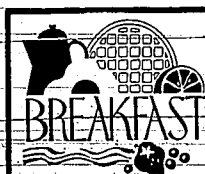

High School diploma can be earned by TV

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Educational television is offering more than enlightenment these days. It's also a way for high-school dropouts to earn their diplomas.

Kentucky Educational Television, in conjunction with the Mississippi Authority for Educational Television, has produced a 43-part program airing nationally called "GED on TV," to help adults pass the high school equivalency exam, the General Educational Development test.

Cook's mogul Wally "Famous" Amos, who earned his GED while in the Air Force, serves as national spokesman and is host of five segments on reading. Others appearing in the programs are astronauts Sally Ride and Story Musgrave and Nobel Prize-winning physicist Sheldon Glashow.

Approximately 72 million Americans do not have high-school degrees, and that figure is growing

by an estimated 1 million a year, according to the American Council on Education.

"Right now we're losing more through dropouts than (are) taking the GED," said Sid Webb, president of KET Enterprise. "It's a losing battle."

About 25 percent who enter school do not graduate, and only 8 percent of the dropouts come back each year to earn a GED diploma.

"We know in Kentucky that the number (of GED graduates) is up 28 percent, and we know that's directly attributable to the programs on KET," he said. "We know that if they're used with a reasonable amount of promotion, it will make a difference."

The series has been carried on the Public Broadcasting System since October, with 137 licensees representing 251 broadcast outlets in 45 states airing the 30-minute programs that cover reading, writing

and mathematics.

It took nearly four years and \$2 million to produce "GED on TV." Kentucky produced the reading and math sections, at nearly \$1.5 million, and Mississippi handled the writing segment.

The programs focus on learning skills instead of trying to cover all the information a student gets in high school. Three textbooks guide the TV student through the 22 hours of study.

The course is designed to give students skills to analyze and understand literature, social studies and science; solve everyday problems in basic math and write clearly and effectively.

"One reason the programs work so well is because a person can go at his own pace in adult learning centers," Webb said. "With adults, the time available to study is very erratic. Some don't like the regimen of classes."

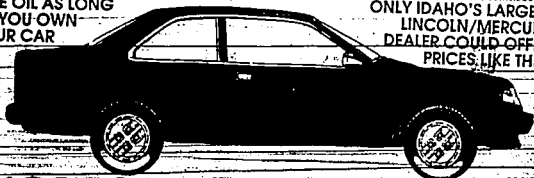
