WASHINGTON — Secretary of State George P. Shultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze wrapped up their talks Thursday with an agreement in principle to ban intermediate-range nuclear missiles, a U.S. official said.

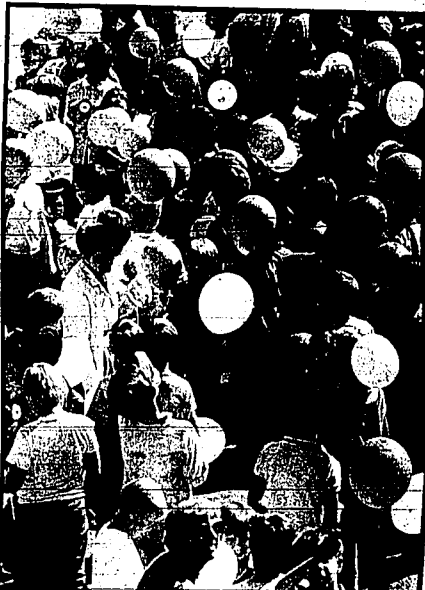

Desire to aid Contras behind sales

WASHINGTON (AP) — A draft report of the congressional Iran-Contra committees concludes that the desire of some administration officials to raise money for the Nicaraguan Contras, according to a New York Times, quoting panel members, reported in Friday's editions that the report states that President Reagan's main motivation for approving the arms sales was a desire to free American hostages in the Middle East.

But the members, most of whom were not identified, said the draft indicated that the president was manipulated into letting the sales continue by officials whose primary goal was to use profits to support the Contras after Congress cut off military assistance.

Those officials were identified as John M. Poindexter, the former national security adviser, his aide Lt. Col. Oliver North and William Casey, then the CIA director.

The senators and representatives discussing the report have either seen the first draft of the committee's final report prepared by the staff or have discussed the report with colleagues and staff assistants familiar with it, the Times said. The committees found no evidence that the president knew procedures from the arms sales were used to support the rebel forces in Nicaragua, and the testimony suggested that the president was ignorant of many other aspects of the affair.

Senate rejects Contra aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate late Thursday turned back an effort to send \$310 million in new aid to the Nicaraguan guerrillas.

Helms' move came even before Reagan has formally asked Congress to approve a new package of \$270 million worth of aid to the guerrillas fighting to overthrow Nicaragua's leftist Sandinista government.

The Senate voted 61-31 to table, and thus kill, the aid package, although it will be reviewed later after President Reagan formally submits it to Congress.

Boisean asks House committee to probe loans to Stallings

BOISE (AP) — A Boise man has sent a formal request to the chairman of a U.S. House of Representatives committee, asking it to investigate into two loans made by Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, from his campaign funds.

Corey Lane, a Boise employee of President Reagan's lobbying organization, sent a letter dated Monday to Rep. Julian Dixon, D-Calif., chairman of Democrats on the Standards of Official Conduct committee. Lane said Stallings had acknowledged a loan of \$4,800 from the committee so he could purchase a car to be used partly on official business in Idaho, and a \$1,000 loan to administrative assistant Gary Catron.

Stallings, in a letter to the Post-Register in Idaho Falls, which carried a previous story on the loans, said he was satisfied after talking to the Federal Election Commission beforehand that the loans were proper. "I still have every reason to believe that is the case. In retrospect, I would have done better to request confirmation in writing from the FEC," Stallings said.

An aide said Stallings declined to comment on Lane's latest action on Thursday. "It is my understanding that it is against House rules for a member to solicit campaign funds for personal use," Lane said in the letter to Dixon.

"It is apparent to me, based on Mr. Stallings' own remarks in the press, that these two loans were for personal use," he said. The National Republican Congressional Committee, which has campaigned against Stallings, said earlier it felt Stallings had breached House campaign spending regulations. But Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, and a member of the ethics panel, said he was not certain whether loans of that type were a violation of House rules. He said unless someone were willing to file a specific charge, it was likely the ethics panel would not do anything about it.

Stallings, in his second term as Idaho's 2nd District congressman, defeated former congressman George Hansen in 1984 by 170 votes. Hansen at the time was facing a prison sentence as the first elected official ever prosecuted under the Ethics in Government Act. Hansen was charged with failing to disclose about \$330,000 worth of personal loans and commodities profits. Stallings said in the letter that he planned to fully review the transactions to make certain they are legal. "Obviously, as the care in checking with the FEC demonstrates, I have had from the beginning every intention of assuring that these loans satisfied completely all legal

standards," he said. "In any event, because even the mere raising of these questions concerns me, I will not authorize any additional loans of whatever kind from my campaign committee," he said. Stallings said he made full public disclosure of the \$1,000 loan to Catron. "I emphasize that there was full public disclosure — the borrower, the amount, the interest rate and the date of repayment were all clearly identified," he said. Stallings said the second loan was made to him to pay for a car that has been kept in Idaho and used for transportation within the district.

Summer doldrums blamed Idaho Co. short of \$2 million goal

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Co. set up to come to the aid of Idaho businesses and help them thrive, is 40 percent short of its goal to raise \$2 million by Nov. 1, a member of the company's board of directors said.

"I think as much as anything (it's) the summer doldrums," said Dale Blickenstaff, vice chairman of Moore Financial Group. "It's hard to get people's attention when they're ready to take a two-week vacation."

The for-profit firm, founded last year by Idaho Power Co. President Robert O'Connor, is trying to raise the money through stock sales. So far, it has sold shares worth about \$1.2 million to raise the amount set by the federal Securities and Exchange Commission.

The Idaho Co., which met in Boise to map its strategy during the remaining six weeks, wants to use the money to get new businesses off the ground and help existing businesses expand. It has vowed to return any pledged money if it does not meet its goal.

Blickenstaff said the company has not detected any resistance by investors to the stock offering, but said sales have not been heavy.

"I suspect there's a little more apathy than we thought," he said. "We probably overstated the fact that people were going to come rushing in and buying. We've found out that we're going to have to sell."

Blickenstaff and Ted Ellis, president of Idaho Bank and Trust Co., both said The Idaho Co. still expects to reach the goal and has not thought about disbanding the company.

"Our best option is to sell the shares," Blickenstaff said.

O'Connor has said the company would have about \$600,000 a year for operations. It then would focus its efforts at smaller businesses and would work with state agencies and other development groups to foster economic expansion.

The stock is being offered for \$10 with a 10-share minimum. Proceeds are being held in escrow and will be returned to investors if at least 130,000 shares are not sold, O'Connor said.

Sales so far have been made mostly to corporations, Ellis said.

"Now because it's slowed down to this point, the tough part is to get a lot of individuals involved, as well as more corporate accounts within the state," he said.

Speeches, tree-planting rites highlight state observance

In the major state observance at Boise, Idaho State Bar Association President W. Marcus Nye urged people not to consider the Constitution as a forgotten document to be mentioned only in history books.

"The Constitution touches people at every step...The Constitution makes our quality of life possible every day," he said.

The state's attorneys presented a glass statue of Lady Justice to Gov. Cecil Andrus, to go on display at the Statehouse.

Andrus called the Constitution "the greatest and most enduring document ever produced by the mind of man."

The governor said the Constitution has produced a brilliant structure of government, because it was produced by men of remarkable minds.

"We are richly blessed to have such an enduring system of government," he said.

One of Andrus' predecessors as chief executive, Robert E. Smylie, noted that the Constitution did not come easy for the delegates.

"They were politicians, but they also were pragmatists. They understood that which could be as at least as important as what they thought should be," Smylie said.

"There was much disagreement,

but in the end, there was no disunity," Smylie said.

State Sen. Michael Crapo, R-Idaho Falls, said there was "mounting chaos" in government in the years after independence because of a weak central government.

Despite the needs to mesh the needs of small states with the large states, delegates finally agreed to a strong central government, he said.

He quoted George Washington: "It appears to me, then, little short of a miracle."

Chief Justice Allan Shepard called the Constitution "a great legacy which was passed down to us." He said eventually, the state's leaders will be gone, and it will be up to today's young people to "preserve, protect and uphold the great Constitution of ours."

Later in the day, another ceremony was planned at Gowen Field in Boise, including flyovers by Idaho Air Guard jets.

At the Federal Building in Boise,

Idaho's federal judges donated a white pine tree to be planted on the grounds. The featured speaker was to be J. Blaine Anderson, 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

In a Gem County ceremony, three Emmett High School students were to be honored for their participation in the bicentennial observance.

Education board wants 12% boost in general tax support

BOISE (AP) — The state Board of Education has unanimously adopted a 1989 budget blueprint calling for a 12 percent boost in general tax support.

That includes an increase for the four state colleges slightly higher than the \$11 million lawmakers generally doled out last winter.

"This budget is establishing a direction," Board member Charles Grant of Rexburg said Thursday. "Last year's budget funding and allocation allowed a positive environment in education" that should continue.

The proposed budget of the University of Idaho, Idaho State, Boise State and Lewis-Clark State College totaled \$113.6 million from general tax receipts. That compared to the schools' request for over \$122 million and their current appropriation of \$101.7 million.

In addition, the board called for another \$53.8 million from general tax receipts to cover operations of

the rest of the educational system except for the public schools. That compares to \$47.8 million allocated this year.

The bulk of the increase went to Agricultural Research and Extension and the two junior colleges. The board backed a \$1.4 million increase for agricultural research, earmarking about \$500,000 for economic development programs in agriculture and forestry, and it proposed a \$1 million increase in support for the junior colleges in Twin Falls and Coeur d'Alene.

The proposal for state support of public schools, which consumes about half of every tax dollar collected, is scheduled to be made next month. For this year, lawmakers approved a record \$343 million.

The board also adopted a \$38.1 million capital improvement budget, 80 percent of it earmarked for new construction. The biggest projects are a \$10.8 million library renovation and a \$3 million renovation of Renfrew Hall at the University of Idaho, a new \$3.8 million library at Lewis-Clark, a \$2.3 million renovation at the Idaho State pharmacy school and a \$2.2 million building acquisition at Boise State.

That request will be evaluated by the Permanent Building Fund Advisory Board along with requests for \$32 million in capital spending from other state agencies. This year, lawmakers allocated only \$12.3 million for capital improvements.

None of the board's action on that spending plans for the year that begins next July included calculations for general employee pay raises. If granted by lawmakers this

winter, raises would increase the budget plan by millions of dollars. The general pay hike approved this year added some \$2.9 million to the financial commitment of the four colleges alone.

"We have one bigger step yet to take, and that's the Legislature," Board Chairman Robert Fielder of New Meadows said. "Last year, we fared very well. I hope we fare as well this year."

While the Legislature exceeded Gov. Cecil Andrus' recommendations for education support last winter and raised over \$100 million in new taxes to finance it, legislative leaders have already said the same kind of largesse should not be expected in the 1988 election-year session.

The board, in adopting the recommendation of its Finance Committee, cut over 70 percent of the colleges' requests for special faculty salary raises, new programs, improvements to resolve accreditation programs and support to cover past budget deficiencies. It earmarked \$3.4 million for all those purposes after the schools had asked for \$12.5 million.

"The total askings were more than we felt it would be proper or reasonable to go to the governor's office with," Finance Chairman George Alvarez said.

Boise State University President John Keiser voiced the lone objection to the spending blueprint, complaining that the cutsback severely restricted the ability of the schools to cope with salary inequity and other pressing problems.

Weather aids fire crews

Fire bosses dispatched a corps of 400 firefighters to the eastern and northern flanks of the 4,600-acre Cove Creek Fire just north of the Salmon River Thursday, hoping to officially declare that stubborn blaze contained before day's end.

Although weather over the Nez Perce National Forest was improving, temperatures still hit highs Thursday in only the mid-60s and humidity remained above 30 percent to help keep flames down.

The fire was completely ringed with break line, but fire bosses were declining to declare it contained until that line was fully reinforced and effective backfires have been burned on the eastern flank.

The drier weather also convinced them to bolster a bulldozed fire line on the northern flank to make sure the fire would be contained at that point if flames jumped back to life, spokeswoman Mary Zabinski said.

The fire, the last being actively fought in Idaho, was sparked when the 4,800-acre Mann-Creek Fire in the Payette National Forest jumped the Salmon River last weekend.

Pope brings message of unlimited love to victims of AIDS

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Pope John Paul II arrived Thursday in this city hit hard by the AIDS crisis, bringing a message of love to victims of the disease who have felt the sting of the church's disapproval.

"God loves you all without distinction, without limit," the pope said in remarks prepared for delivery to 62 AIDS victims gathered at Mission Dolores.

"He loves those of you who are sick; those who are suffering from AIDS and from AIDS-related complex. He loves the relatives and friends of the sick and those who care for them. He loves us all with an unconditional and everlasting love."

John Paul came to San Francisco after a 6 1/2-hour visit to Monterey, where he asked growers to respect the "just claims" of migrant farmworkers, thousands of whom took an unpaid day off to join in an outdoor Mass.

"At every level of the agricultural process, the dignity, rights and well-being of people must be the central issue," the pope told an estimated 72,000 people at Laguna Seca Raceway.

Among the AIDS patients at the mission were a 5-year-old boy, a priest, former drug abusers, and gay men unrepentant about their homosexuality.

"Because so many of these people have suffered great pain not only from their disease, but because they are gay in a church that doesn't recognize that as moral, they came seeking a sign of caring," said Sheila Madden, a counselor at nearby Most Holy Redeemer Church and coordinator of the meeting.

"They all wanted the blessing of the pope before they die," she said. "There was no feeling that this was a time for dissent, for any sign of anger."

The AIDS patients were accompanied by mothers and fathers, lovers and friends, ex-wives and "caregivers" — the 96 volunteers who do everything from cooking to changing sheets for those too weak to help themselves.

The pope told the patients that God loves them "with an unconditional and everlasting love."

Although the church condemns

homosexual conduct, the pope alluded to its promise of forgiveness.

"The greatest proof of God's love is shown in the fact that he loves us ... with our weaknesses and our needs," the pope said.

"St. Paul explains that Christ came to forgive sin and that his love is greater than any sin, stronger than all my personal sins or those of anyone else," he added.

Although the meeting was heralded as an attempt to heal the pain of gay people suffering from AIDS, the regional director of a national gay Catholic group, which obtained an advance copy of the pope's remarks, was disappointed.

"His message to us is, God loves you, even if you have AIDS. That's it," said Tom Carroll of the organization Dignity. "He mentions AIDS only once."

Dignity, which asserts that homosexuals can be Catholics in good standing without being celibate, has been banned from holding Masses in a dozen dioceses around the country.

At the afternoon Mass at the automobile and motorcycle racetrack set in rolling hills, the pope referred to

the financial crisis which has introduced "thousands of American farmers ... to poverty and indebtedness."

"Many have lost their homes and their way of life," he told the audience, drawn from the lush growing fields of the Monterey Peninsula.

The altar, in the shape of a cross, was on an island in a pond in the middle of the 1.9 mile track and the celebrants were seated on the ground on three hills along one side.

Many who came to hear John Paul were Hispanic farm workers whose employees gave them the day off without pay. The diocese of Monterey contains 121 farmworker camps, as well as seven of California's 21 early missions.

"I appeal to landowners, growers and others in positions of power to respect the just claims of their brothers and sisters who work the land," he said. "These claims include the right to share in decisions concerning their services and the right to free association with a view to social, cultural and economic advancement."

John Paul referred to the new immigration law that enables illegal immigrants to become citizens.

"Many of these people have worked here with the same dream that your ancestors had when they first came," he said. "I ask you to welcome these new citizens into your society and to respect the

human dignity of every man, woman and child."

Later the pope visited the Carmel Mission where the 18th-century Franciscan missionary Junipero Serra, a candidate for sainthood, is buried. The visit sparked a peaceful protest from a group of American Indians who say that Indians were brutalized under the Catholic missionary system.

The Vatican has angered the gay community with its condemnation of homosexual acts as "an intrinsic moral evil," and the chief Vatican spokesman, Archbishop John Foley, drew heavy criticism when he called AIDS a "natural sanction" against immoral behavior.

American soldier wounded in incident in East Germany

WASHINGTON (AP) — A U.S. soldier was wounded Thursday in East Germany when his two-man liaison team encountered a group of Soviet soldiers and was fired on by at least one of them, the Pentagon said Thursday.

The incident is the first reported shooting by forces of any of the four powers with military liaison teams in East and West Germany since Maj. Arthur D. Nicholson was killed by a Soviet soldier in East Germany on March 24, 1985.

The Pentagon said the unidentified soldier was treated at a West Berlin hospital for a wound in the arm and was released shortly afterwards.

According to Lt. Alice Frucha, a Pentagon spokeswoman, the two U.S. soldiers were detained for about 20 minutes before being allowed to leave. The American soldier was wounded by a rifle bullet fragment after the Soviet soldier, one of a group of five, fired a burst at the

Americans' vehicle, the Pentagon said.

The Pentagon said it did not know the ranks of the soldiers involved.

The incident happened at about 7:15 a.m.

MDT Thursday outside Potsdam, East Germany, some 10 miles northwest of the small town of Neuruppin.

The soldier opened fire as the two Americans attempted to leave the area, the Pentagon said, adding that the vehicle was hit seven times. The vehicle was described as a Jeep-like all-purpose vehicle of German make but clearly marked as belonging to the liaison.

The Pentagon said that the two men were definitely not in a restricted area and there was no justification for anyone to shoot.

The Pentagon declined, however, to say why the men were traveling through that section of East Germany.

"The U.S. has protested this life-threatening, inexcusable action," the Pentagon said in a statement.

"The United States Military Liaison Mission operates under a 1947 agreement between the commanders of the U.S. and Soviet forces in Germany, and any use of force is totally unjustified," the Pentagon said.

"The United States expects a full explanation of the reasons for this incident," the Pentagon said. "We are in touch with the Soviets on this matter and are considering what further action may be required."

"We wish to emphasize as we did when (Maj.) Nicholson was killed, their action is inexcusable," the statement said.

Nicholson was one of 14 men assigned to the liaison group, the numbers of which are fixed by the agreement.

Soviet officers are assigned to a similar mission inside West Germany. The missions were created after World War II by all four occupying powers — the United States, Soviet Union, Britain and France — to foster cooperation.

Over the years, however, they have evolved to what amounts to sanctioned military intelligence offices.

Accused hijack leader appears in U.S. court

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Lebanese man accused of masterminding the 1986 hijacking of a Jordanian airliner was tured aboard a U.S. plane in FBI agents in the Mediterranean Sea, arrested and returned to the United States on Thursday, the Justice Department announced.

Amid extremely tight security, Fawaz Younis, a Shiite Moslem, appeared before a U.S. magistrate in Washington on charges of hostage-taking, conspiracy and destruction of an aircraft, which could result in a term of life imprisonment if he is convicted.

Younis pleaded innocent to the June 11, 1985 hijacking of the jetliner at Beirut, on which two U.S. citizens and two U.S. nationals were traveling. Younis was ordered held without bail and was taken to an undisclosed location.

In arguing for no bail, Assistant U.S. Attorney J. Ramsey Johnson noted that Younis is charged with "holding hostages under circumstances which were both violent and very dangerous."

Younis, a bearded man in his late 20s who wore black pants and a black shirt, sat impassively while a State Department translator gave him an Arabic version of the proceedings. Another bail hearing was scheduled for Tuesday.

Younis is a "full-time employee of the Amal militia and works for Nabih Berri," a senior Justice Department official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said at a press briefing. Berri is Lebanon's justice minister and is also leader of the Amal militia, a group of Shiite Moslems allied with Syria.

The Younis case marks the first overseas arrest by U.S. law enforcement officials of a suspected terrorist being sought under U.S. laws. Attorney General Edwin Meese III told a news conference.

"This operation illustrates the intention and ability of the United States to invoke the rule of law in fighting terrorist lawlessness," Meese said. "It is the first such operation, but it will most certainly not be the last."

Younis was spotted and kept under surveillance over the past several weeks during an investigation about which President Reagan was kept abreast, said the officials.

Younis went aboard the small boat voluntarily, was transported into international waters and arrested Sunday by the FBI agents,

said senior Justice Department officials, who refused to describe how they lured him aboard.

He was transferred to the U.S. aircraft carrier Saratoga and then flown to Andrews Air Force Base outside Washington without touching down in a foreign country, said FBI, Justice Department and Defense department officials.

One administration source, while refusing to say precisely where the FBI agents caught the suspect, said the man was transferred to the Saratoga in the north central Mediterranean near the island of Corsica.

Speaker upbeat on peace outlook

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Speaker Jim Wright said Thursday that conversations with Central American leaders in the past week have led him to hope there may be a cease-fire in the region even before the Nov. 7 deadline established in a five-nation peace plan.

He also said there is broad agreement in the House to go along with a plan to continue "humanitarian" aid to Nicaragua's Contra rebels for at least 40 days past the Oct. 1 expiration date of the current aid allocation.

"There are powerful individuals and forces in Central America who are trying to work out a modus for putting a cease-fire into effect even before Nov. 7," Wright, D-Texas, told a reporter.

"I find on all sides in Central America a deep desire for peace and reconciliation," he said, adding that peace is achievable so long as the process enables "all parties to preserve their dignity."

Wright declined to identify the two leaders of Central American countries with whom he had spoken in recent days, saying he did not want to jeopardize their efforts to achieve an early cease-fire. And he said he did not know how likely they are to be successful.

"I'm going to be content and joyous if it happens by Nov. 7th, or even Nov. 8th," he said.

He said he expected most Democrats to support his deal with House Republican Leader Robert Michel of Illinois to provide some \$3.5 million to buy food, medicine and medical supplies for the Contras through Nov. 10, a rate he said was in line with the current aid formula.

But Michel acknowledged that both he and Wright were meeting resistance to the deal, from Republicans who want a higher figure and Democrats who want less. And it remained to be seen how the provision would be greeted in the Senate, where leaders were not closely involved in putting together the agreement.

House Democratic leaders said they went along with Michel's proposal after cutting it from the \$8 million originally sought and limiting it to humanitarian aid — in part to avoid possible criticism that they had cut off food and medicine to the rebels fighting Nicaragua's leftist Sandinista government.

The money was to be folded into a bill approved Thursday by the House Appropriations Committee.

Ford, union agree on contract terms

DEARBORN, Mich. (AP) — Ford Motor Co. and the United Auto Workers agreed Thursday on a precedent-setting contract guaranteeing the jobs of most of Ford's 104,000 UAW workers in return for the support of union leaders for more flexible work rules.

The contract, which must be approved by union members, also would boost wages, pensions and other benefits.

Under the tentative settlement, Ford would set guaranteed job numbers for plants and could lay off workers on a temporary basis only if an economic downturn combined with a slump in Ford sales.

The job protection package would be the first of its kind in the U.S. auto industry. Previous contracts protected incomes rather than their jobs.

"We have a good agreement. Truly, we broke a lot of new ground on job security. The agreement fully meets the needs of Ford workers and UAW workers elsewhere," said Stephen Yokich, a UAW vice president who announced the settlement in the absence of UAW President Owen Bieber, who was hospitalized for a stomach ailment. Bieber was released from the hospital later Thursday afternoon.

The union next turns its attention to General Motors Corp., whose contract was extended Aug. 31 when the union decided it would settle with Ford first. Analysts have said they expect the UAW to meet stiffer resistance from GM over job security.

Peter Pestillo, the Ford vice president who oversees company negotiators, said the agreement proves we can work together.

Pestillo had said when negotiations began that both sides could attain their goals.

Job security was the union's top demand, while Ford sought to retain flexibility to make business decisions and increase the efficiency and quality of production.

Under the contract, the national union leadership would be required to urge its locals to accept plant-level contracts reducing the number of job classifications and loosening work rules. Job classifications limit the types of jobs a worker can do, while work rules regulate how and when specific tasks are done.

The agreement, reached 2½ days after Bieber granted Ford an extension of its contract beyond its expiration at 11:59 p.m. Monday, must be approved by the union's 23-member executive board and its 200-worker Ford bargaining council and then ratified by the rank-and-file members. Yokich said voting would begin within 10 days.

Under the contract, Ford would be required to recall laid-off workers in proportion to the amount its production increased after a slump. It also would have to pay a financial penalty into a worker retraining fund for each hour of overtime a UAW employee worked.

The number of guaranteed jobs could be reduced by one job for each two workers who left the payroll through attrition.

The contract also would boost base wages by 3 percent in the first year of the contract and pay 3 percent lump-sum bonuses in the second and third years. Unlike percentage increases, lump-sum payments are one-time increases that are not included in base wage levels.

Senate votes to 'Star Wars' test limit

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate voted Thursday to restrict tests of President Reagan's "Star Wars" anti-missile defense system and a key senator said that if Reagan carries out a threat to veto the measure, Congress will likely cut spending on the program more deeply.

The 58-38 vote in the Democratic-run Senate went generally along party lines and ended a four-month partisan fight that had blocked the Senate from acting on a bill authorizing defense spending for the fiscal year starting Oct. 1.

Reagan had threatened to veto the Pentagon bill if the Star Wars restriction was attached, but Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., chief author of the restriction, said a veto could mean even more reductions for the Strategic Defense Initiative, as Star Wars is formally known.

"If he vetoes this, my own vote would be to give them less SDI money," Nunn said after the vote. "I'm not playing games here."

Nunn is chairman of the Armed Services Committee and one of the Senate's strongest supporters of SDI spending.

Reagan's law. Republican senators, James McClure and Steve Symms, were among Republicans voting against the proposal.

In another decision Thursday as it worked on the defense bill, the Senate gave voice-vote approval to an amendment limiting the amount of SDI work that U.S. allies will be permitted to do. But later, on a 61-32 vote, modified the amendment to exempt countries that agree to pay an unspecified "substantial portion" of the total cost of the specific contract.

Under the Nunn amendment, the administration would require new congressional approval to go ahead with SDI tests that would violate the existing interpretation of the 1972 Anti-Ballistic Missile treaty. The companion House measure contains a similar amendment, although that version is worded somewhat differently.

Reagan has asserted that the executive branch can unilaterally move to a "broad" view of the ABM pact, an interpretation that would allow

more wide-ranging SDI tests. Nunn and other Democrats dispute that contention. The United States still complies with the existing, "narrow" view of the ABM pact.

The Senate version of the Pentagon bill totals \$302 billion, including \$4.5 billion for Star Wars. By contrast, a companion bill passed by the House last May proposes only \$3.1 billion for Star Wars, which has a current budget of \$3.65 billion. Reagan had sought \$5.7 billion.

The measure that eventually clears the Senate, probably in several weeks, will have to reconciled with the \$288 billion House-passed version before it goes to the president.

In the fight over Nunn's SDI amendment, Republicans renewed their argument Thursday that the measure would hurt U.S.-Soviet arms control talks and would infringe on the constitutional authority of the White House. "It is an intrusion upon the treaty-making powers of the president," said Sen. Pete Wilson, R-Calif.

Advisory panel blasts armed forces sexism

WASHINGTON (AP) — Navy and Marine Corps women stationed in the Pacific are being sexually harassed and abused by their male colleagues, and the military services may be placing improper restrictions on the jobs they can fill, a Pentagon advisory panel charged in a report released Thursday.

Women serving aboard ships in the Pacific and assigned to bases in the Philippines and Japan are being forced into sexual relationships and are frequently humiliated and "denigrated as human beings," the panel said.

It said the servicewomen confront a chain-of-command that fails to respond to their complaints and are forced into living situations that at times contribute "to conditions in which extremist behavior, lesbianism, is fostered...."

In one instance, the captain of a Navy ship on which women were serving was allegedly overheard offering to "sell" female sailors to Koreans. In the Philippines, the report said, "we heard of a growing number of women who opt to become pregnant to ease the loneliness of their situations."

Moreover, it said, both the Navy and Marine Corps appear to have

adopted more restrictive approaches than are required by law in classifying combat-related jobs that are off-limits to women.

Females end up being denied promotion opportunities because of such restrictions, and the policies contribute to "demoralization" by suggesting "a lack of confidence in their abilities and a lack of faith in their commitment," the study contended.

The nine-page report was delivered to Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger late last month by the Defense Advisory Committee on Women in the Services, which sent seven of its members on a two-week fact-finding tour of the Pacific and Far East.

In response, Weinberger ordered the immediate creation of a task force to develop a plan for stamping out such discrimination throughout the four services.

Women comprise about 10 percent of the nation's 2.1 million active-duty military personnel. The study convinced Weinberger his previous policy pronouncements and strictures against sexual harassment have been inadequate, Dr. David J. Armor, acting assistant secretary of defense for personnel, told reporters Thursday.

Ambulance recall lags badly

WASHINGTON (AP) — The recall of 22,000 Ford ambulances because they may catch fire is months behind schedule and vehicles thought to have been fixed are being called back again to install additional safeguards, officials said Thursday.

Some owners said even though the recall was announced by Ford Motor Co. on July 17, they have been unable to get their ambulances scheduled for service before next year, as late as March in some cases.

When they announced the recall, Ford officials said they expected most of the ambulances would be fixed by mid-September. Officials acknowledged Thursday that the repairs have been found to be more complex than expected and that now there is no clear estimate of when work on all the vehicles will be completed.

The problems involve gasoline tank overflows, causing fuel to squirt out when the cap is removed. The problem led to more than 230 complaints to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, including 24 fires and five injuries.

Ford provides the chassis for about 90 percent of the ambulances in the country.

Charles White, Ford's chief engineer involved in the recall, said in a telephone interview from Detroit that the program ran into some unforeseen problems and is behind schedule.

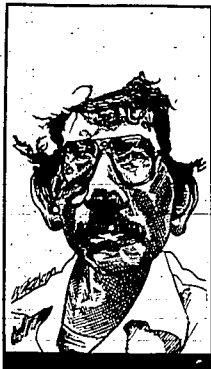

Ortega opens ministers' meet with demand Contra aid end

Plans Moscow visit

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — President Daniel Ortega on Thursday called on the U.S. Congress to "once and for all" stop aiding Contra rebels that "continue to bleed our people."

Ortega made his comments on the opening day of a Central American peace meeting and a day after congressional leaders agreed in principle to give the rebels an additional \$3.5 million in humanitarian aid.

"Let's be clear that whatever financing, no matter how small, to the mercenary forces ... doesn't contribute to the peace effort we are making in Central America," Ortega told reporters after welcoming foreign ministers from El Salvador, Guatemala, Costa Rica and Honduras.

The added Contra funding, which still has to be voted upon, would provide money from Oct. 1, when this year's allotment of \$100 million runs out, until Nov. 7, when concrete measures for a regional peace plan are supposed to take effect.

The Contras for the past year have been receiving aid at a rate of

about \$8.3 million a month, of which about 30 percent has been designated for humanitarian use and 70 percent for weapons.

The Reagan administration claims the peace initiative signed Aug. 7 by five Central American presidents, including Ortega, is "fatally flawed." President Reagan says he will seek from Congress \$270 million in military and humanitarian aid for the Contras. He has said he does not believe the Sandinistas will live up to its commitments under the peace plan unless pressured to do so.

Ortega also confirmed he would travel to the Soviet Union for the 70th anniversary of the Russian Revolution on Nov. 7. In 1985, Congress reversed itself and granted Contra aid after Ortega traveled to the Soviet Union, which provides economic and military aid to the Sandinista government.

Foreign Minister Miguel D'Eacoto of Nicaragua opened the two-day meeting of the ministers saying the region since August has a "new spirit, a new mentality"

The plan calls for cease-fires for the war in El Salvador and Nicaragua, as well as amnesty for the combatants by Nov. 7. It also demands democratic reforms and ends tactical and strategic support for insurgencies.

Critics of the plan claim it is too loosely worded and doesn't deal with ways to maintain peace.

The foreign ministers were to work out details "to regulate, promote and make feasible compliance" with the agreement. The first meeting, held last month in El Salvador, ended without any measures of substance.

Foreign Minister Carlos Lopez Contreras of Honduras never showed for the El Salvador meeting. Guatemala's Alfonso Cabrera left early on the first day.

Lopez Contreras on Thursday said Honduras had no plans to set up a National Reconciliation Commission, as outlined for each country in the Guatemala plan.

The reconciliation commissions were to be made up of representatives in each of the five nations to

verify compliance of the agreements. This would mean Honduras would have to give up all territorial support for the Contras fighting the Nicaraguan government.

Most of the up to 18,000 Contras reportedly have left the base camps in Honduras this year and have been fighting in the Nicaraguan countryside.

Luis Guillermo Solis, chief of staff for the Costa Rican foreign ministry, expressed optimism that progress would be made.

Costa Rica has been aiding efforts for peace talks between leftist guerrillas and the U.S.-supported Salvadoran government. Diplomats on Thursday predicted talks soon would be held to end the nearly 8-year-old war, but they also forecast they would end without success, as two efforts did in 1984.

The Nicaraguans have the most to do if the plan is to be successful. A state of siege since 1982 has barred many democratic freedoms. Plus, amnesty has become a touchy issue.

The Sandinistas maintain they

are bound to fulfill the plan.

Also meeting Thursday and Friday in Managua was the International Verification and Follow-Up Commission. It is made up of representatives from each of the five Central American nations, the United Nations, the Organization of American States, the so-called Contadora states of Mexico, Colombia, Venezuela and Panama, and the Support Group countries of Argentina, Brazil, Peru and Uruguay.

Bennett blasts Sandinistas as tyrants

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — U.S. Secretary of Education William J. Bennett journeyed to this Central American nation Thursday to rebuke the Sandinista government as a tyranny and to compare the Contra rebels to the patriots who produced the American Constitution.

"Bennett, one of the most outspoken conservatives in President Reagan's Cabinet, was scheduled to deliver his speech at a ceremony at the U.S. Embassy marking the bicentennial of the Constitution."

"His office in Washington released the text in advance."

In the speech, Bennett said the U.

S. Constitution remains "a challenge and rebuke to tyrannies and despotisms everywhere ... to every movement and every ideology that smotherers liberty and denies it life."

"Here in Nicaragua today, freedom is at issue," said Bennett, a former philosophy professor and student of the Constitution. "Now, as then, tyranny and liberty are the alternatives. Now, as then, brave men and women fight to secure the blessings of liberty."

"The drama that took place 200 years ago at Trenton and Yorktown and Valley Forge, the drama that culminated at Independence Hall in Philadelphia is again taking place

today, around the world and especially here in Nicaragua," he said. "It is the eternal struggle between tyranny and freedom."

"Liberty means self-government. It means democracy," he said. "But it cannot mean that elections should be postponed until the 'false consciousness' of the citizenry can be 'cured.' It cannot mean that a single party should control all voting stations, voter registration and ballot counting. And it cannot mean that elections are mocked by rulers as 'raffles' or 'nuisances.'"

"A second requirement of liberty is freedom of speech and of the

press," he said. "The government must tolerate newspapers independent of its control. It means that public criticism of the ruling party is permitted without threat of arrest or assault."

"This is what freedom of speech meant in Philadelphia in 1787; this is what it must mean in Managua, today."

Aquino drops her closest adviser in apparent bid to placate military

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — President Corason Aquino said Thursday she had dropped her closest and most controversial adviser, Executive Secretary Joker Arroyo, from her Cabinet.

Leaders of last month's failed coup attempt had demanded Arroyo's dismissal, saying he was inefficient and pro-Communist.

Armed forces chief Gen. Fidel Ramos said authorities were investigating possible foreign involvement in the bloody Aug. 28 military mutiny.

The mutiny was the most serious challenge to Mrs. Aquino since she was swept to power in February 1986 in a military-civilian uprising that deposed President Ferdinand Marcos.

Mrs. Aquino said on national television that Arroyo agreed Wednesday night to leave the government in hopes his departure "would bring peace and quiet" to her administration.

Mrs. Aquino said speechwriter Teodoro Locsin also had stepped down as special legal counsel, a Cabinet post, but would remain as a government consultant.

On Wednesday, Mrs. Aquino accepted the resignations of Vice President Salvador Laurel as foreign affairs secretary and Finance Secretary Jaime Ongpin. She also replaced the heads of the customs and immigration departments.

Mrs. Aquino's 25-member Cabinet and other senior officials resigned Sept. 9 so she could reorganize her administration in an effort to restore stability.

Arroyo, 61, former human rights lawyer, and Ongpin had the highest profiles among Cabinet members. The Aug. 28 mutineers had demanded their ouster.

Arroyo, who denies he is pro-Communist, appeared before Congress Sept. 8 and accused Laurel of fomenting dissent in the military. It was too early to tell if the departure of Arroyo and Ongpin would pacify the restive military or the other critics of the Aquino administration.

Mutiny leader Col. Gregorio Honasan, in interviews this week, demanded that Natural Resources Secretary Fulgencio Factoran be fired as well.

But presidential spokesman Teodoro Benigno told reporters

Thursday he believed the Cabinet revamp was complete.

Mrs. Aquino named Catalino Macaraig, Arroyo's deputy, as her new executive secretary. Macaraig, 60, was a deputy justice minister under Marcos and was vice president of a mining company before joining the administration.





Speaker upbeat on peace outlook

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Speaker Jim Wright said Thursday that conversations with Central American leaders in the past week have led him to hope there may be a cease-fire in the region even before the Nov. 7 deadline established in a five-nation peace plan.

He also said there is broad agreement in the House to go along with a plan to continue "humanitarian" aid to Nicaragua's Contras rebels for at least 40 days past the Oct. 1 expiration date of the current aid allocation.

"There are powerful individuals and forces in Central America who are trying to work out a modus vivendi to put a cease-fire into effect even before Nov. 7," Wright, D-Texas, told a reporter.

"I find on all sides in Central America a deep desire for peace and reconciliation," he said, adding that peace is achievable so long as the process enables "all parties to preserve their dignity." Wright declined to identify the two leaders of Central American countries with whom he had spoken in recent days, saying he did not want to jeopardize their efforts to achieve an early cease-fire. And he said he did not know how likely they are to be successful.

"I'm going to be content and joyous if it happens by Nov. 7th, or even Nov. 8th," he said.

He said he expected most Democrats to support his deal with House Republican Leader Robert Michel of Illinois to provide some \$3.6 million to buy food, uniforms and medical supplies for the Contras through Nov. 10, a rate he said was in line with the current aid formula.

But Michel acknowledged that both he and Wright were meeting resistance to the deal, from Republicans who want a higher figure and Democrats who want less. And it remained to be seen how the "provision" would be greeted in the Senate, where leaders were not closely involved in putting together the agreement.

House Democratic leaders said they went along with Michel's proposal — after cutting it from the \$8 billion originally sought and limiting it to humanitarian aid — in part to avoid possible criticism that they had cut off food and medicine to the rebels fighting Nicaragua's leftist Sandinista government.

The money was to be folded into a bill approved Thursday by the House Appropriations Committee.

Senate votes to 'Star Wars' test limit

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate voted Thursday to restrict tests of President Reagan's "Star Wars" anti-missile defense system and a key senator said that if Reagan carries out a threat to veto the measure, Congress will likely cut spending on the program more deeply.

The 68-38 vote in the Democratic-run Senate went generally along party lines and ended a four-month partisan fight that had blocked the Senate from acting on a bill authorizing defense spending for the fiscal year starting Oct. 1.

Reagan had threatened to veto the Pentagon bill if the Star Wars restriction was attached, but Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., chief author of the restriction, said a veto could mean even more reductions for the Strategic Defense Initiative, as "Star Wars is formally known."

"I've voted this, my own vote would be to give them less SDI money," Nunn said after the vote. "I'm not playing games here."

Nunn is chairman of the Armed Services Committee and one of the Senate's strongest supporters of SDI spending.

Idaho's two Republican senators, James McClure and Steve Symms, were among Republicans voting against the proposal.

In another decision Thursday as it worked on the defense bill, the Senate gave voice-vote approval to an amendment limiting the amount of SDI work that U.S. allies will be permitted to do. But later, on a 61-32 vote, modified the amendment to exempt countries that agree to pay an unspecified "substantial portion" of the total cost of the specific contract.

Under the Nunn amendment, the administration would require new congressional approval to go ahead with SDI tests that would violate the existing interpretation of the 1972 Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty. The companion House measure contains a similar amendment, although that version is worded somewhat differently.

Reagan has asserted that the executive branch can unilaterally move to a "broad" view of the ABM pact, an interpretation that would allow

more wide-ranging SDI tests. Nunn and other Democrats dispute that contention. The United States still complies with the existing, "narrow" view of the ABM pact.

The Senate version of the Pentagon bill totals \$302 billion, including \$4.5 billion for Star Wars. By contrast, a companion bill passed by the House last May proposes only \$3.1 billion for Star Wars, which has a current budget of \$3.65 billion. Reagan had sought \$5.7 billion.

The measure that eventually clears the Senate, probably in several weeks, will have to be reconciled with the \$288 billion House-passed version before it goes to the president.

Ford, union agree on contract terms

DEARBORN, Mich. (AP) — Ford Motor Co. and the United Auto Workers agreed Thursday on a precedent-setting contract guaranteeing the jobs of most of Ford's 104,000 UAW workers in return for the support of union leaders for more flexible work rules.

The contract, which must be approved by union members, also would boost wages, pensions and other benefits.

Under the tentative settlement, Ford would set guaranteed job numbers for plants and could lay off workers on a temporary basis only if an economic downturn combined with a slump in Ford sales.

The job protection package would be the first of its kind in the U.S. auto industry. Previous contracts protected incomes rather than their jobs.

"We have a good agreement. Truly, we broke a lot of new ground on job security. The agreement fully meets the needs of Ford workers and UAW workers elsewhere," said Stephen Yokich, a UAW vice president who announced the settlement in the absence of UAW President Owen Bieber, who was hospitalized for a stomach ailment. Bieber was released from the hospital later Thursday afternoon.

The union next turns its attention to General Motors Corp., whose contract was extended Aug. 31 when the union decided it would settle with Ford first. Analysts have said they expect the UAW to meet stiffer resistance from GM over job security.

Peter Pestillo, the Ford vice president who oversaw company negotiations, said "the agreement proves we can work together."

Pestillo had said when negotiations began that both sides could attain their goals.

Job security was the union's top demand, while Ford sought to retain flexibility to make business decisions and increase the efficiency and quality of production.

Under the contract, the national union leadership would be required to urge its locals to accept plant-level contracts reducing the number of job classifications and loosening work rules. Job classifications limit the types of jobs a worker can do, while work rules regulate how and when specific tasks are done.

The agreement, reached 2 1/2 days after Bieber granted Ford an extension of its contract beyond its expiration at 11:59 p.m. Monday, must be approved by the union's 23-member executive board and its 200-worker Ford bargaining council and then ratified by the rank-and-file members. Yokich said voting would begin within 10 days.

Under the contract, Ford would be required to retrain laid-off workers in proportion to the amount its production increased after a slump. It also would have to pay a financial penalty into a worker retraining fund for each hour of overtime a UAW employee worked.

The number of guaranteed jobs could be reduced by one job for each two workers who left the payroll through attrition.

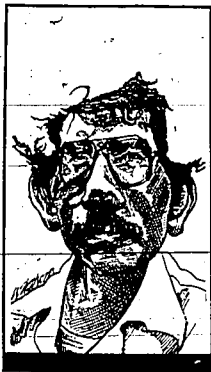

Ortega opens ministers' meet with demand Contra aid end



DANIEL ORTEGA
Plans Moscow visit

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — President Daniel Ortega on Thursday called on the U.S. Congress to "once and for all" stop aiding Contra rebels that "continue to bleed our people."

Ortega made his comments on the opening day of a Central American peace meeting and a day after congressional leaders agreed in principle to give the rebels an additional \$3.5 billion in humanitarian aid.

"Let's be clear that whatever financing, no matter how small, to the mercenary forces ... doesn't contribute to the peace effort we are making in Central America," Ortega told reporters after welcoming foreign ministers from El Salvador, Guatemala, Costa Rica, and Honduras.

The added Contra funding, which still has to be voted upon, would provide money from Oct. 1, when this year's allotment of \$100 million runs out, until Nov. 7, when concrete measures for a regional peace plan are supposed to take effect.

The Contras for the past year have been receiving aid at a rate of

about \$8.3 million a month, of which about 90 percent has been designated for humanitarian use and 70 percent for weapons.

The Reagan administration claims the peace initiative signed Aug. 7 by five Central American presidents, including Ortega, is "fatally flawed." President Reagan says he will seek from Congress \$270 million in military and humanitarian aid for the Contras. He has said he does not believe the Sandinistas will live up to its commitments under the peace plan unless pressured to do so.

Ortega also confirmed he would travel to the Soviet Union for the 70th anniversary of the Russian Revolution on Nov. 7. In 1985, Congress reversed itself and granted Contra aid after Ortega traveled to the Soviet Union, which provides economic and military aid to the Sandinista government.

Foreign Minister Miguel D'Escoto of Nicaragua opened the two-day meeting of the ministers saying the region since August has a "new spirit, a new mentality

The plan calls for cease-fires for the wars in El Salvador and Nicaragua, as well as amnesty for the combatants by Nov. 7. It also demands democratic reforms and ends tactical and strategic support for insurgents.

Critics of the plan claim it is too loosely worded and doesn't deal with ways to maintain peace.

The foreign ministers were to work out details "to regulate, promote and make feasible compliance" with the agreement. The first meeting, held last month in El Salvador, ended without any measures of substance.

Foreign Minister Carlos Lopez Contreras of Honduras never showed for the El Salvador meeting. Guatemala's Alfonso Cabrera left early on the first day.

Lopez Contreras on Thursday said Honduras had no plans to set up a National Reconciliation Commission, as outlined for each country in the Guatemala plan.

The reconciliation commissions were to be made up of representatives in each of the five nations to

verify compliance of the agreements. This would mean Honduras would have to give up all territorial support for the Contras fighting the Nicaraguan government.

Most of the up to 18,000 Contras reportedly have left the base camps in Honduras this year and have been fighting in the Nicaraguan countryside.

Luis Guillermo Solis, chief of staff for the Costa Rican foreign ministry, expressed optimism that progress would be made.

Costa Rica has been aiding efforts for peace talks between leftist guerrillas and the U.S.-supported-Salvadoran government. Diplomats on Thursday predicted talks soon would be held to end the nearly 8-year-old war, but they also forecast they would end without success, as two efforts did in 1984.

The Nicaraguans have the most to do if the plan is to be successful. A state of siege since 1982 has barred many democratic freedoms. Plus, amnesty has become a touchy issue.

The Sandinistas maintain they

are bound to fulfill the plan.

Also meeting Thursday and Friday in Managua was the International Verification and Follow-Up Commission. It is made up of representatives from each of the five Central American nations, the United Nations, the Organization of American States, the so-called Contadora nations of Mexico, Colombia, Venezuela and Panama, and the Support Group countries of Argentina, Brazil, Peru and Uruguay.

Bennett blasts Sandinistas as tyrants

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — U.S. Secretary of Education William J. Bennett journeyed to this Central American nation Thursday to rebuke the Sandinista government as a tyranny and to compare the Contra rebels to the patriots who produced the American Constitution.

"Bennett, one of the most outspoken conservatives in President Reagan's Cabinet, was scheduled to deliver his speech at a ceremony at the U.S. Embassy marking the bicentennial of the Constitution.

"His office in Washington released the text in advance.

"In the speech, Bennett said the U.

S. Constitution remains "a challenge and rebuke to tyrannies and despotisms everywhere ... to every movement and every ideology that smother liberty and denies it life."

"Here in Nicaragua today, freedom is at issue," said Bennett, a former philosophy professor and student of the Constitution. "Now, as then, tyranny and liberty are the alternatives. Now, as then, brave men and women fight to secure the blessings of liberty."

"The drama that took place 200 years ago at Trenton and Yorktown and Valley Forge, the drama that culminated at Independence Hall in Philadelphia is again taking place

today, around the world and especially here in Nicaragua," he said. "It is the eternal struggle between tyranny and freedom."

"Liberty means self-government. It means democracy," he said. "But it cannot mean that elections should be postponed until the 'false consciousness' of the citizenry can be 'cured.' It cannot mean that a single party should control all voting stations, voter registration and ballot counting. And it cannot mean that elections are mocked by rulers as 'raffles' or 'nuisances.'"

"A second requirement of liberty is freedom of speech and of the

press," he said. "The government must tolerate newspapers independent of its control. It means that public criticism of the ruling party is permitted without threat of arrest or assault."

"This is what freedom of speech meant in Philadelphia in 1787; this is what it must mean in Managua, today."

Aquino drops her closest adviser in apparent bid to placate military

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — President Corason Aquino said Thursday she had dropped her closest and most controversial adviser, Executive Secretary Joker Arroyo, from her Cabinet.

Leaders of last month's failed coup attempt had demanded Arroyo's dismissal, saying he was inefficient and pro-Communist.

Armed forces chief Gen. Fidel Ramos said authorities were investigating possible foreign involvement in the bloody Aug. 28 military mutiny.

"The mutiny was the most serious challenge to Mrs. Aquino since she was swept to power in February 1986 in a military-civilian uprising that deposed President Ferdinand Marcos.

"Mrs. Aquino said on national television that Arroyo agreed Wednesday night to leave the government in hopes his departure "would bring peace and quiet" to her administration.

Mrs. Aquino said speechwriter Teodoro Locsin also had stepped down as special legal counsel, a Cabinet post, but would remain as a government consultant.

On Wednesday, Mrs. Aquino accepted the resignations of Vice President Salvador Laurel as foreign affairs secretary and Finance Secretary Jaime Ongpin. She also replaced the heads of the customs and immigration departments.

Mrs. Aquino's 25-member Cabinet and other senior officials resigned Sept. 9 so she could reorganize her administration in an effort to restore stability.

Arroyo, 61, a former human rights lawyer, and Ongpin had the highest profiles among Cabinet members. The Aug. 28 mutineers had demanded their ouster.

Arroyo, who denies he is pro-Communist, appeared before Congress Sept. 8 and accused Laurel of fomenting dissent in the military. It was too early to tell if the departure of Arroyo and Ongpin would pacify the restive military or the other critics of the Aquino administration.

Mutiny leader Col. Gregorio Honasan, in interviews this week, demanded that Natural Resources Secretary Fulgencio Factoran be fired as well.

But presidential spokesman Teodoro Benigno told reporters

Thursday he believed the Cabinet revamp was complete.

Mrs. Aquino named Catalino Macaraig, Arroyo's deputy, as her new executive secretary. Macaraig, 60, was a deputy justice minister under Marcos and was vice president of a mining company before joining the administration.

The United States, which has big military bases in the Philippines, has denied any role.

A leftist labor union Tuesday released what it said was a U.S. Central Intelligence Agency report that criticized Mrs. Aquino's handling of the Communist insurgency.

Ramos said U.S. Ambassador Nicholas Platt denied the report's authenticity. The armed forces commander estimated that "only 3 or 4 percent of our 160,000 officers" were involved in the mutiny or waiting for another opportunity to topple the government.

Earlier Thursday, U.S. Assistant Secretary of State Gaston Sigur met with Mrs. Aquino. Officials said they discussed ways the United States could help the Philippine economy, jolted by the coup attempt.

James Earl Ray wants to cancel book contract

WINCHESTER, Tenn. (AP) — James Earl Ray, convicted assassin of civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr., has asked court officials to

cancel a contract to publish his autobiography.

In a six-page letter Sept. 10 to Tinklin County Chancery Court, Ray said he wants to break a November 1986 agreement with tax activist Frederick T. Saussey's St. Andrews Press, which was to publish "Tennessee Waltz."

Ray claims Saussey edited inaccuracies into the manuscript, abused a power of attorney granted to him by Ray and misrepresented a plan to use the proceeds for investigative reporting about American political prisoners.

Marlo Thomas removed for pro-abortion view

EDGEWOOD, Ky. (AP) — Actress Marlo Thomas was to have talked about her career, her father Danny and her views on balancing work and marriage at a charity appearance for a hospital.

Then local officials found out about her pro-choice views on abortion.

Jackie Hirt, public relations director for St. Elizabeth Medical

Center, said Wednesday the hospital dropped Ms. Thomas from its Sept. 30 program after it received 12 to 15 calls objecting to Ms. Thomas.

"We were concerned that what had been intended to be an educational event for the women of northern Kentucky ... could instead become a forum for or against the pro-life position," said Ms. Hirt, who added that the hospital was against abortion.

Rock group Boston puts money into hospices

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The rock group Boston is donating money to hospices along every stop in a 15-city tour in memory of the father of the band's manager, Jeff Dorenfeld. His father died in a California hospice last year.

Boston, who appeared here last weekend, presented a \$10,000 check to the South Hills Family Hospice after a performance Saturday. The hospice provides skilled care and support systems for terminally ill patients in their homes.

Tiffany's celebrates 150 sterling years

NEW YORK (AP) — When Charles Lewis Tiffany opened his fancy dry-goods store in Manhattan on Sept. 18, 1837, the future did not look bright. Sales for the first day totaled \$4.98; the first week's profits, \$33.64.

"Things have definitely changed. Goggles are the dog whips, tongue-scrappers and papier-mache. In their place stand cavernous floors filled with glittering gems and collections of fine silver and crystal.

Sales have picked up, too; Tiffany & Co. reported selling \$182.5 million in goods in fiscal 1986.

The company is celebrating its sesquicentennial with four months of museum exhibitions and black-tie galas in New York, Boston, Houston, London, Beverly Hills, Calif., Chicago, San Francisco and Dallas. Tiffany's has branches in these cities and Atlanta. A store will open in Munich, West Germany, next month.

Though internationally known today, the original Tiffany's was a 15-foot-wide cubbyhole across from City Hall in Lower Manhattan and "went unnoticed by competitors as well as by most shoppers" when it opened, according to "The Tiffany Touch," a book on the store's

history. "And while today the name Tiffany is synonymous with taste, it wasn't always that way.

Tiffany once exhibited the skinned and tanned hide of a P.T. Barnum elephant, publicly hanged for killing a circus employee, in his front window under an ad inviting customers to have luggage made from the notorious pachyderm.

Tiffany's business acumen and keen sense of publicity turned the store into a profitmaker in four short years, and his reputation has grown a thousandfold since. It was acquired by Avon Products in 1979 and resold to a private investors group in October 1984.

Over the years, Tiffany's tony customers have included presidents Lincoln and Johnson and nearly every crowned head of state, including Queen Victoria, the Shah of Persia and the Czar of Russia.

While president Lincoln bought his wife, Mary, a string of seed pearls and matching earrings for \$2,600, and Johnson commissioned Tiffany's to provide a new set of china for the White House.

Tiffany's has long been the preferred jeweler, china maker and silver supplier of wealthy socialites

and a favorite of celebrities from Dinah Shore to Jim Brady and Lily Langtree to Elizabeth Taylor and Carol Channing.

But the magic of Tiffany's lies in its ability to make the ordinary person feel extraordinary.

"So many people believe that Tiffany's is intimidating and we have

to be extra-friendly and warm and hospitable" to dispel that idea, said William R. Chaney, Tiffany's chairman and chief executive.

Carnegie Hero Fund rewards 21 heroes

PITTSBURGH (AP) — When Martin Jones and his brother, Mark, came upon a burning car on a highway near Baltimore, they knew they had to work quickly to save a boy trapped inside.

"It was the only thing to do," Jones, 22, said Thursday. "The kid was conscious and looking at us and asking us for help. What else could we do?"

The two brothers, both of Bel Air, Md., rescued Sean P. Little, 15, from the car on Interstate-95 on Dec. 10, 1986, placing them among 20 Americans and one Canadian honored for heroism Thursday by the Carnegie Hero Fund Commission.

Three of the 21 heroes died in the performance of their deeds. The latest heroes are among 76 honored by the commission this year and 7, 145 honored since it was founded by industrialist Andrew Carnegie in 1904.

Each hero or the hero's survivors receives \$2,500 and a medal.

Jones, a carpenter, said he and his 27-year-old brother "ran up to the car and I went for a fire extinguisher."

"He couldn't get the kid out by himself. He backed away because of the heat, but then I tapped him on the shoulder and we both went in together. It all happened very fast. We figure maybe it took 15 or 20 seconds," he said.

The commission said the Joneses pulled the boy to safety moments before the car exploded. Both men suffered minor burns to their faces and hands.

—The late Gerald K. Yanaba, 34, of Berkeley, Calif., who died unsuccessfully trying to save a woman from drowning in the Pacific Ocean on Nov. 22, 1986.

—The late B. Michael Thompson, 18, of Sydney, Nova Scotia, who died trying to save three men from drowning in the Atlantic Ocean at Kennington Cove on Aug. 21, 1986. The three men were saved by others.

—The late Robert E. Dean, 30, of Forestville, N.Y., who died saving a 9-year-old boy from drowning in the Pacific Ocean on March 11, 1986.

—Ronald L. Sancho, 20, of Avondale, La., who saved a truck driver from suffocating from hydrochloric acid fumes following an accident in Baton Rouge, La., on April 11, 1986.

—Lewis E. Kerst III, 31, of Imperial Beach, Calif., who saved two children from a burning house in Livermore, Calif., on Oct. 25, 1986.

—Thomas D. Finn, 30, of Birmingham, Ala., who saved a 16-year-old boy from drowning in the Caney Fork River in Tennessee on May 3.

—Michael Bell, 39, of Salem, Ore., who was saved a 3-year-old girl from a burning house in Portland, Ore., on Feb. 8.

—Parker K. Wiemers, 18, of Marfa, Texas, who saved an 82-year-old man from being struck by a runaway airplane on Dec. 22, 1984.

—Lloyd Adams, 74, of Elmira, N.Y., who rescued a 38-year-old man from a burning house on Aug. 29, 1986.

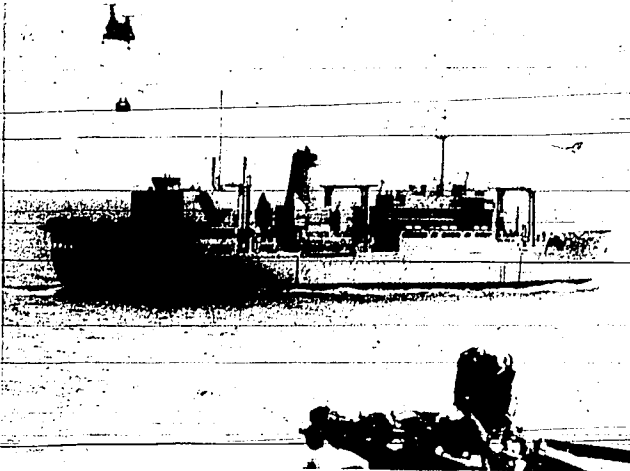

Iran, Iraq trade claims of success in gulf war engagements

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — Iraq said its forces repulsed an Iranian attack in an 18-hour battle Thursday, and Iran said it bombed Iraqi cities in reprisal for Iraqi air strikes on tankers, oil centers and factories.

Iran and Iraq, who have been at war for seven years, observed an unofficial truce during U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar's four-day peace mission to the gulf. On Wednesday, after Perez de Cuellar left the region, Iraq broke the lull with air strikes that continued into Thursday.

The official Iraqi News Agency, monitored in Cyprus, said Iran launched an assault just before midnight Wednesday in the central sector of the 730-mile-long war front. Iraq said the fighting ended about sundown Thursday.

The agency, quoting a military communique, said "the bulk of the Iranian force was destroyed," beaten back by intense artillery and tank fire by Iraq's 2nd Army Corps and strafing runs by helicopter gunships.

Iran's official Islamic Republic News Agency, also monitored in Nicosia, made no mention of an assault.

Iraq said its air force flew 96 combat missions Thursday against "economic installations" and mil-

itary positions, while helicopter gunships mounted another 147 sorties, the highest gunship total in several weeks.

Iran claimed a Soviet-built Iraqi MiG-23 was shot down in central Iran Thursday. But Iraq claimed all its jets returned safely.

Several hours after Iran warned it would carry out reprisal shelling, Tehran radio reported "intense Iranian artillery fire" on military, oil and industrial targets in Iraq.

There was no immediate comment by Baghdad and no independent confirmation of the reported ground fighting. Observers are rarely allowed into the war zone by either side.

Earlier, Iraq said its jets hit a "large maritime target," which usually means a tanker, about dawn Thursday and bombed oil installations and two war production plants in four Iranian cities.

IRAN, the Iranian news agency, said "some factory workers" were killed or wounded.

The ship attack, the second claimed by Iraq in 24 hours, came a few hours after a reflagged Kuwaiti tanker escorted by a U.S. warship arrived safely in Kuwait.

Witnesses said the 46,723-ton Gas Prince docked at the Mina al-Ahmedi terminal under cover of darkness. It is one of 11 Kuwaiti

tankers flying the Stars and Stripes and being escorted through the gulf by U.S. warships as protection against attacks by Iran. Iran accuses Kuwait of supporting Iraq.

There were reports of large explosions late Wednesday near Iran's Farsi Island in the northern gulf. Iran's Revolutionary Guards have used the island as a base for armed speedboat attacks on neutral ships.

U.S. military sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Iraqi F-1 Mirage warplanes had been active in the area but said they had no information about the reported explosions.

Tehran radio announced the start of amphibious maneuvers off Iran's southeastern coast in the Gulf of Oman, south of the entrance to the Persian Gulf.

Iran has said the operation is intended to counter a growing international naval presence in the waters outside the Persian Gulf.

An armada of U.S. and West European warships is massing in the Gulf of Oman for a multinational mine-sweeping operation.

Perez de Cuellar has declined to publicly discuss the results of his peace mission, during which he had hoped to get definitive responses from Iran and Iraq to a U.N. Security Council cease-fire resolution passed July 20.

Castle offer has strings

HAMMINKELN, West Germany (AP) — Want a 700-year-old romantic castle that comes with more than six acres of land? No money? It's all for free. Plus a cash gift of \$600,000 and no ghosts to haunt you.

There are, however, some strings attached to the offer by the community of Hamminkeln, 60 miles north of Bonn, the West German capital.

"There are two conditions: that the new owner pledges not to use the castle for commercial purposes and to himself foot the bill for maintenance costs," Hamminkeln treasurer Heinz-Dieter Melzer said Thursday.

Maintenance costs for Ringenberg Castle, a few miles from the Rhine River, are estimated at \$110,000 a year.

Thailand blocks balloon release by MIA kin, allows message float

NAKHON PHANOM, Thailand (AP) — Thai authorities on Wednesday blocked relatives of missing American soldiers from launching 2,500 message-laden balloons into Laos but allowed them to float the messages down the Mekong River.

The messages offered \$2.4 million in reward money to anyone who rescued American servicemen the group believes have been held prisoner since the Indochina war.

The Thai Foreign Ministry said the balloon launch would have amounted to using Thai soil "to conduct psychological warfare against Laos."

Six members of the American group lost relatives during the long war in which about 2,400 servicemen are still listed as missing in action. Of these 544 were lost in Laos.

Robin Owen — Bell — of Fuquay-Varina, N.C., whose father's plane was shot down in Laos in 1968,

broke down in sobs when a dozen policemen prevented the group from launching their balloons.

The group was escorted to the provincial police headquarters and shown a brief letter from the Interior Ministry forbidding the launch.

After talks between the two sides, authorities allowed the river launch.

"The balloons have a better chance of making it across the river. With the plastic they won't be so lucky. They'll likely sink," the provincial police chief, Col. Hemaraj Dharithia, said.

Three members of the group threw plastic bags containing the reward offers into the Mekong while the others applauded and cheered them on. Then all joined in, wading into the river and pushing the water forward with sticks or their hands to get the bags moving towards the current.

The packages, hugging the Thai shore, floated out of sight as darkness fell.

"This river goes for 700 miles to the ocean. It passes through Laos, Cambodia and Vietnam, the very countries where our men are being held," said Elizabeth Stewart, a Washington, D.C., attorney whose father's plane was shot down in Indochina 21 years ago. "We have found our vehicle — the Mekong."

The reward offer is written in Vietnamese and Laotian and also includes a cartoon of an Indochina peasant secreting an American out of his homeland and getting a bar of gold in return.

Bill Hendon, a former Republican congressman from North Carolina, said the small packages were heading downstream along a route where he claimed a number of Americans had been sighted.

Thailand and Laos have had generally poor relations since the 1975 communist victory in Laos.

Appeal on road accepted

BOISE — The Idaho Supreme Court has been urged to agree with a district judge that a road through the famed Robinson Bar Ranch on the Salmon River is not public and its owner has the right to bar people from using it.

The court took under advisement on Thursday an appeal in a long-running case filed by neighbors to force the ranch's owner, pop singer-songwriter Carole King Sorensen, to open it to public use.

Seventh District Judge Arnold Beebe ruled earlier that since Custer County abandoned the road in 1939, it no longer was a public road.

Despite Beebe's ruling, two neighboring couples are carrying the battle to the Supreme Court.

The Robinson Bar Ranch is on the Salmon River between Stanley and Challis. Witnesses testified in an earlier hearing that even before statehood, stagecoach travelers used the ranch road as the main road through the region.

A better paved road eventually was built, Idaho 75.

Those arguing in favor of opening the road claim it has been used for many years by fishermen and others seeking access to nearby public lands in the Challis National Forest.

Mrs. Sorensen and her husband, Rick, purchased the road in 1981 and put a locked gate across it, prompting state and federal court lawsuits which generally have gone in favor of the Sorensens.

Attorney Carl Burke, representing one of the neighbors, argued that all previous owners of the road believed it to be public, up until the time Bruce Lafavour sold the ranch for \$1 million to Mrs. Sorensen in 1981. "They didn't think it was private," he said.

Burke said the Forest Service maintained the road. "There is no doubt in my mind that if you read the record carefully, the Forest Service intended it was a public road," he said.

Douglas Nelson, representing other neighbors, maintained the only way a road allowing access to public lands may be abandoned is by an act of Congress.

Insurance rates doubling for health department

TWIN FALLS — The South Central District Health Department's insurance rates are more than doubling and the increase will consume a large chunk of added revenues from counties, said the district director.

Director Gerald Hurst told the district board Wednesday at its bi-monthly meeting that general liability insurance is rising 101 percent this year and workmen's compensation insurance is going up 145 percent.

In other business, flu shots are scheduled to begin Nov. 1. Also, the board accepted a bid to put in a second glass door to better insulate its waiting room and decided not to voice opposition to what it considers a weak seat-belt law.

Liability will rise, under this increase from the state insurance fund, from \$5,047 annually to \$10,147, and workmen's compensation shoots from \$6,287 to \$12,926, he said. That compares to the 5 percent increase the

district's eight counties approved in July, totaling \$26,500.

"That uses up half of the 5 percent increase from our counties," Hurst said.

The increase is large because health departments were reevaluated and found to be paying too little, Hurst said, so next year's bill may not rise as fast. He added that "there is really no choice" because state insurance is still half as expensive as commercial programs.

Physical Health Director Cheryl Junntunen said flu shots will be administered later this year because patients found six-month coverage lacking in the spring when many people are stricken with the flu.

"The biggest outbreaks have been in March and April and people have been left without protection," Junntunen said. Flu usually doesn't usually begin causing illness in this area until mid-December, she said.

Vaccine clinics will be held after Nov. 1, specifically between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. on Nov. 6. The shots cost \$4.50 each, although that fee may be waived for those unable to afford it.

The elderly and people with chronic health problems, or people living with those high-risk groups, are recommended to get the vaccine.

The board unanimously accepted a \$875 bid from Snake River Glass to put in a second double door to keep drafts from single doors during the winter and keep the air conditioning from freezing up during the summer.

"Thank you and our clients' children thank you," Hurst said to the board after the vote.

Hurst said at \$18 a month in heating and air conditioning savings the door would pay for itself in four years.

The board had also asked Hurst to draft a letter voicing opposition to the new law in effect about one year requiring passengers in the front seats of cars to buckle seatbelts.

Hurst asked further direction from the board after reviewing that the law exempts "implements of husbandry."

He said he found husbandry defined as care of household, so that anybody challenging the law could simply say they were using the car to care for their household.

In more concrete terms, statewide health district studies found about one in four people were using their seatbelts last May, while only 15 percent were buckling up before the law.

But only 3 percent more Magic Valley drivers are buckling up after the law, from 12 percent to 15 percent.

Still, health district board members sounded resigned to accepting what they feel is too weak a law.

"We don't really have a seatbelt law," said Board Member Dr. Charles Parker. But he added, "I think we're banging our heads against a wall trying to change it."

He echoed others in saying that legislators might do away with the law altogether rather than stopping at changing it.

Board Member Sue Coe also said that a law may not away as many hands as understanding why buckling up is important. She recalled a state trooper saying during a safety program that he had never unbuckled a dead person.

"That really impressed me," Coe said.

CSI hires consultant to sharpen marketing

TWIN FALLS — While sitting in a local restaurant for dinner the other night, Dennis Johnson was impressed by the enthusiasm a waitress showed for the College of Southern Idaho.

The Chicago consultant, who specializes in marketing community colleges, said the woman recognized CSI President Gerald Meyerhoefer at the table and told him about receiving her high school equivalency degree at the school.

"This is the personalization of people who have done so well," Johnson said of the woman who said she may now become a nurse. "She's going to succeed."

As students are beginning college later in life, often abandoning careers in agriculture or elsewhere, Johnson said colleges must market themselves to "that recycling of lives."

CSI flew Johnson in for two days of whirlwind workshops with the school's entire staff and administration.

While the school's buildings are in fine shape and new economic programs such as in international trade and a small business center are expected to improve business in the area, Meyerhoefer characterized CSI's marketing as still in its "infant stage."

"Marketing is an area that is fairly new to educational institu-

tions and at this institution," Meyerhoefer said. This was the first time CSI has dealt with a marketing consultant, he said, and Johnson was paid about \$2,000 for the trip covering both academic and vocational programs.

Meyerhoefer said Johnson's suggestions featured unifying CSI's brochures and advertising so that they carry a schoolwide theme and focus on an successful former CSI students. Currently, brochures and catalogs are printed by individual departments, making them disjointed, he said.

"People around here have to know this is a first-class two-year institution," Johnson said.

Driving past Idaho's bucolic fields on the way to CSI, Johnson said he could still remember the sore back as a child from chores raising cattle and pigs in Iowa.

But with the loss of agricultural jobs, he expects people in southern Idaho to turn toward retraining and the economic development CSI could provide.

"The economic development of this area is going to be contingent on literacy and recycling people who worked from that farm background — that recycling of lives," Johnson said.

He added that the average starting age for students is rising from 18 years old as jobs fade in agricultural businesses. "The non-traditional learner is going to become the tradition," he said.

Group cheers Rock Creek cleanup

TWIN FALLS — In this age of governmental regulations and environmental catastrophes, it is not too often that people can celebrate the cleanup story accomplished without official pronouncing.

People associated with the Rock Creek Rural Clean Water Program Thursday commemorated their good work and unveiled a painting to mark the occasion.

Rock Creek starts in the South Hills in Cassia County and winds its way past the Amalgamated Sugar Factory and Rock Creek Park to empty into the Snake River.

Rock Creek was once described by the federal government as one of the most polluted stream segments in the Pacific Northwest.

But Thursday Artist Gary Stone told the gathering at Rock Creek Park, "You can go to the head of the park and the bottom and come out with your limit of beautiful trout. It's only possible with cooperation," he said.

him as a full-time fisherman who paints on the side.

Saving soil appealed more to farmers than cleaning up Rock Creek. But some said they were interested in improving Rock Creek. They remembered fishing there as children," said Roy Jesser, chair-

man of Rock Creek Rural Clean Water Board.

Jesser praised various government agencies for their cooperation in the project. In six years the project has reduced the amount of sediment dropped into the Snake by two-thirds.

Restriction illegal since '60s Lawyer revokes racist covenant

BOISE (AP) — After nine months, a Boise lawyer succeeded Wednesday in revoking a covenant on a Boise subdivision property — ownership contract limiting ownership to whites.

After the action was made public, the Idaho Human Rights Commission and the Real Estate Commission both said Thursday the covenant was illegal anyway, and has been since the 1960s when state and federal fair housing laws went on the books.

Attorney Allen R. Derr noticed the 37-year-old covenant for the 29-lot Boise Heights Subdivision overlooking the North End when he bought a home there last year.

"I was livid ... when I saw the restrictions," Derr said.

The covenant recorded in 1950 said: "No part of the real property or any building site or structure shall at any time be sold, conveyed, rented or leased to any person or persons not of the White or Caucasian Race. No person other than one of the White or Caucasian Race shall be permitted to occupy any property in said development except a domestic employee."

Covenants are prepared by owners and developers before selling lots. This covenant was created in a deed from Boise Hills Corp.

Derr, who argued a 1971 landmark case in the U.S. Supreme Court that extended equal protection to women, began working to reverse the covenant late last year.

During the past nine months, he collected the 30 signatures needed to reverse the restriction

and got them notarized.

On Wednesday, Derr said the restriction was revoked and the deed was documented with the Ada County recorder.

"Only one owner was at all reluctant to sign," he said. "Another asked what my motive was."

One couple, in the process of adopting two children from Guatemala, learned of the covenant when he wrote them asking for signatures.

"They were afraid they would have to move or give up the adoption if we couldn't get rid of the restriction," Derr said. "The newest neighbor, a native of India, laughed when he saw the restriction. 'Is this the 20th century?'" he asked.

Mike Gray, executive director of the Real Estate Commission, said restrictive covenants based on race were outlawed in the 1960s in state and federal laws.

Marilyn Shuler, director of the Human Rights Commission, said Derr and the landowners should be congratulated for removing "archaic and offensive" language from the covenants.

"Covenants such as this were common in the state years ago, and may still appear in the covenants of other subdivisions. It is important to emphasize that such language is null and void and has been for years," she said.

The Human Rights Commission enforces the state law banning discrimination in housing based on race, color, religion, national origin or sex. The Real Estate Commission regulates the licensed practice of real estate.

Snowmobilers push wilderness plan

BOISE (AP) — The time has come for Gov. Cecil Andrus and U.S. Sen. Jim McClure to hear the concerns of the majority of Idaho residents in the state's wilderness debate, an official of the Idaho Snowmobilers' Association said Wednesday.

Dick Trudeau, a board member of the 450-member group, said the snowmobilers and several other groups favor a wilderness bill that would protect more land than timber industry proposals, but not as

much as conservationists propose.

"So far, the wilderness debate seems to be related to the timber people and the preservationists and what land they want converted to their personal interests," Trudeau said.

"I think there's a lot of ground in between. There's probably 95 percent of us in the state who are somewhere in between."

At stake is the fate of about 9 million acres of roadless national forest land which Andrus and McClure

hope to jointly resolve this fall.

The Idaho Wildlands Defense Coalition supports about 3.9 million acres of additional wilderness. The timber industry has said it will not support a bill with out concessions — such as release of the non-wilderness land for logging.

About 4 million of the 20 million acres of the national forest land in Idaho already is designated as wilderness, including the Sawtooth, the Frank Church River of No Return and Selway-Bitterroot areas.

Andrus and McClure hope to forge a bill that will include acreage figures and identify particular areas of concern.

If so-called hard release language is adopted in the bill, the U.S. Forest Service would be able to release for timber harvest and other uses the acres not designated for wilderness for the first time since the early 1970s.

Trudeau said the Snowmobile Association is joining with livestock interests and off-road vehicle groups to put forth a unified proposal to Andrus, McClure and the rest of Idaho's congressional delegation.

Members are most concerned about losing areas traditionally used by snowmobilers and off-road vehicles, he said.

Utilities file applications for merger

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Utah Power & Light Co. and PacifiCorp filed applications Thursday with public utility regulators in seven states seeking approval of the two companies' proposed merger.

Under the merger announced Aug. 12, UP&L and Pacific Power & Light Co., the largest utility in the Pacific Northwest, would continue to operate as separate units of a newly-formed company that would retain the PacifiCorp name.

Company officials said the merger would create a corporation that would be larger and financially stronger than either company operating separately and would make better use of the two entities' diverse power resources and facilities.

Thursday's filing was the first step in an approval process expected to take several months. Detailed testimony to support the companies' applications will be filed in about a week, UP&L officials said in a news release.

The application was filed with the Utah Public Service Commission and regulatory bodies in Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho, Wy-

oming and Montana. UP&L spokesman John Ward said.

If the merger is approved, PacifiCorp will provide electric service to more than 1.1 million customers in those states.

UP&L officials have said electricity rates in the Utah company's service area would drop 5 percent to 10 percent the first four years after the merger and then would become stabilized.

The application asks the three-member commission to approve the merger and terms of the agreement, including the issuing by PacifiCorp of common and preferred stocks upon conversion of the outstanding shares of PP&L and UP&L, the assumption by PacifiCorp of all outstanding debt obligations of the two divisions; and the adoption by PacifiCorp of all tariff schedules and service contracts of UP&L now on file with the commission.

Under the merger, Pacific Power & Light, based in Portland, Ore., will continue to do business under that name, serving more than 670,000 customers in California, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Washington and Wyoming.

Mormon Tabernacle organist dead at 86

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Alexander Schreiner, Mormon Tabernacle organist for more than 53 years, died Tuesday at a local health care center of causes incident to age. He was 86.

Schreiner began playing recitals at the Salt Lake Tabernacle in 1921 and received his official appointment there in April 1924. He retired in 1977. His 53 years was the longest tenure of any organist who has played the famous organ on Temple Square.

We are saddened by the passing of Alexander Schreiner, who served the church as tabernacle organist for more than half his long life," Mormon Church President Ezra Taft Benson and his counselors Gordon B. Hinckley and Thomas S. Monson said in a statement released Wednesday.

"We express our sympathy to his family members and know they will be comforted in the knowledge that his long and productive life has left behind a legacy which will continue to life and bless those who love beautiful music," the church officials said.

Schreiner took part in the weekly radio and television broadcasts with the Mormon Tabernacle Choir when they were first aired in 1929 and continued until his retirement.

Schreiner, a native of Nuremberg, Germany, started playing the piano at age 5. He began serving as organist in his branch ward of The Church of Jesus Christ

of Latter-day Saints when he was 8. His family came to the United States in 1912, and he became a citizen in 1920. He studied with John J. McClellan, Tabernacle organist, and with Charles Marie Widor and Louis Vierne at Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris.

He composed many works for organ, including seven volumes of organ pieces and his works were widely used by church organists around the world.

In addition to Tabernacle Choir broadcasts, daily organ recitals and his own radio program, his performing career included annual concert tours throughout the United States, Canada, Europe and Africa.

Schreiner also made recordings and appeared numerous times with the Utah Symphony. He served as organist and lecturer for nine years at the University of California at Los Angeles and had lengthy service on LDS Church music committees.

He was awarded a doctorate in 1954 by the University of Utah. He also received four honorary doctorates and other awards, including a decoration from the West German government for achieving excellence in his field. He held the prestigious FAO certificate of the American Guild of Organists.

He was an expert on the physics of sound and contributed significantly in this area when the new Tabernacle organ was installed in 1948.

Audit puts ex-director in clear

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — An independent audit of the Greater Idaho Falls Chamber of Commerce has cleared former Executive Director Del Brewster of any wrongdoing but underscored previous beliefs of inflated membership figures and understated liabilities.

"There's not a lot of new information," said Chamber President Joe Call. "But it helped us quantify things we had a gut feeling about."

The audit, conducted by volunteers working with contractors at the Idaho-National-Engineering Laboratory, was requested by the chamber three months ago to determine the source of a \$43,000 deficit that had been building for two years.

"I knew that the conclusions of this would not show anything other than what I stated before — that their problems had existed with the deficit in the airshow, the billing procedure change and some back taxes," said Brewster, who has headed the Van Nuys Chamber of Commerce in Southern California since April. "Therefore, the chamber now can put that in the past and get on with the business at hand — building their organization."

According to Call, however, the audit did show that the chamber had no realistic basis on which to project membership dues revenues at \$95,000 a year. That budget projection for the spending year that ends this month was overstated by \$35,000.

The audit showed membership at only 400 businesses when Brewster left last spring, Call said, despite the claim of the former director to have built the membership to nearly 700 by the time he left.

Quake shakes Utah desert

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A small earthquake shook Utah's west desert early Thursday, but because of the remote area no one reported feeling it, the University of Utah Seismograph Stations said.

The quake's epicenter was located midway between the Newfoundland Mountains and the western shore of the Great Salt Lake, about 70 miles west of Salt Lake City, said Ethan Brown, senior staff seismologist.

The tremor had a magnitude of 3.9 on the Richter scale and occurred at 1:32 a.m.

Brown said he was not sure if the quake was in the same area as the Great Salt Lake pumping station at Hogup Ridge, which houses three giant pumps designed to channel excess lake waters into an evaporation pond in the west desert.

"It's possible that maybe if there is a plant operator out there, he felt

it, but we didn't get any reports of that yet," Brown said.

He said a quake of only 3.9 would not damage the pumps even if it did occur in the same area.

The west desert area has been intermittently active for years, Brown said. An earthquake of magnitude 4 rumbled in the same area on Feb. 16, 1967.

Negotiators try one more time to avert strike

NEW YORK (AP) — The chief negotiators in the stalled NFL labor talks agreed to meet again Friday to try to avert a seemingly inevitable players strike next week.

The meeting between management's Jack Donlan and the union's Gene Upshaw, at an undisclosed site, will not be a formal negotiating session.



John Jones, a spokesman for the NFL Management Council, said Thursday the purpose of the meeting is to "explore any and all avenues that may lead to averting a strike on the 22nd of September."

Upshaw, however, said Thursday night there has to be intensive bargaining of the entire issue.

"I've learned from a source close to management that in our head-to-head meeting tomorrow owners and Management Council people are willing to talk about pensions and roster sizes," Upshaw said, declining to identify the source. "That's not going to cut it. We need a settlement and not another stall tactic on the part of management. The issues have been out there for a long time. We are not about to agree to any piecemeal bargaining."

No new bargaining talks are

scheduled and players remain set to walk out on Tuesday, the day after the New England-New York Jets game closes out the second week of the season.

Jim Conway, the Management Council's assistant executive director, said Donlan hopes to point out areas where the owners might be willing to move in hopes of avoiding a strike.

"I think there are a fair number of items on which we're willing to move," Conway said. "We want to give Gene a very, very clear indication of where we think there's more movement possible."

CSI alters seating plan for basketball

Giants' lead in NL West balloons to 8 games

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Rick Reuschel, who was pitching for a last-place team four weeks ago, has been promised a start on Oct. 6, when baseball's post-season play begins.

"It's an honor. I'm just happy to be here and part of this. I've been excited since I've been here," Reuschel said Thursday after his two-hit, 4-0 shutout of the Houston Astros moved the Giants a step closer to the NL West title.

The victory gave the Giants a season-high eight-game lead over the second-place Cincinnati Reds in the National League West.

Manager Roger Craig said Reuschel definitely will start for the Giants in the opening game of the National League Championship Series and will be followed by Dave Dravecky. Both pitchers were acquired by the Giants in summer trades from last-place teams — Reuschel — from Pittsburgh and Dravecky from San Diego.

"They've gotten great pitching out of the veterans, Reuschel and Dravecky. That's made the big difference," said Hal Lanier, manager of the defending division champions.

Dravecky beat the Astros with a four-hitter on Wednesday, and Reuschel's third two-hitter of the season gave the Giants a six-game winning streak. In the six games, Reuschel now has the league's best earned run average, 2.64, and with the Giants he's 5-1 with a 2.18 ERA. The 38-year-old pitcher also leads the league in shutouts, with four, and in complete games, with 12.

"He's been amazing, hasn't he?" Craig said. "His going into Cy Young award territory."

Reuschel called his pitching against the Astros "just a continuation of what I've been doing all year."

Big Sky coaches seek improvement in second week's play

All of the Big Sky Conference football teams have played at least one game now, and almost every coach uses the words "must improve" in talking about this weekend's games.

New Big Sky member Eastern Washington is faced with the need to make the quickest improvement. The Eagles already have one Big Sky loss to Nevada-Reno, and if the team loses this weekend to Idaho State, it will make an early departure from the Big Sky championship race.

Idaho State, which showed a lot of offense but little defense in its opening-season 62-51 loss to Texas A&I, is at Eastern Washington to open its Big Sky season and Montana is at Northern Arizona in the league opener for both teams.

In nonconference games, Portland State attempts to make it two straight over Big Sky teams, hosting Idaho; Montana State is at Northern Iowa; Cal-Davis is at Nevada-Reno; and Southern Utah State is at Weber State. Boise State is idle.

"I think we are making the progress I thought we would," said ISU Coach Jim Koetter. "We had some small injuries that slowed us down

a little bit, but overall, we are making good progress."

Koetter said he believes his Bengals have good talent on both offense and defense. "Defensively, we just have to play together. Our secondary played well. We just got beat up front a lot."

Montana State's Earle Solomonson had similar comments.

"We saw some dramatic improvement from the first game to the second game and that's what we always look for. This week, we have to make strides in containing Northern Iowa's special teams," he said.

Solomonson said Northern Iowa is big and quick. "We're going from one tremendous backfield (Sam Houston State) to another," he said.

Montana was surprised in its home opener last week by Division II Portland State and Coach Don Read said he's looking for improvement this weekend against NAU.

"Our execution and consistency needs to improve for us to be a winning football team. We lacked the big play last week, and somewhere, we need to find the big play," he said.

Read said NAU has talented offense and good players at the skill positions.

Nevada-Reno will be playing for the 49th time against Cal-Davis in its oldest rivalry. The schools are separated only by the Sierra Mountains but are just starting a four-year series of games after a six-year layoff.

Leno Coach Chris Ault said people shouldn't be fooled by the fact Cal-Davis is a Division II school.

"They could come into the Big Sky right now and be one of the top four teams. It's a great tradition game and we're excited about it," said Ault, whose team was ranked No. 1 in the latest NCAA Division I-

AA poll.

Both teams have won 19 straight regular season games. Two years ago, Weber State feasted on Southern Utah, 62-20. There are indications it might be closer this year. Weber beat Western State of Colorado 40-10; Southern Utah beat the same team 41-10 this year.

Southern Utah Coach Jack Bishop says comparative scores are fine, but Weber is a much stronger team.

"We aren't about to believe the myth that comparative scores against common opponents is a good measure of the strength of the two teams," he said, noting that Big Sky said Gilbertson is "Beating Montana Sky teams have 85 football scholars to his 15."

"I think we'll be in a position of awfully well off playing to win a game and Weber State will be... playing to prevent a loss," he said.

And of course, Bishop said his small Utah school always wants to beat a bigger in-state rival.

"It's a big game for us because Southern Utah is the only team we're playing this weekend," said Weber's Mike Price. "This is Southern Utah's chance. They're much improved," he said.

"We just want to win. If we win by one point, that's fine for us," he said.

Idaho's Keith Gilbertson is in the same position, playing a Division II team a week after being defeated by I-A Central Michigan.

"Anybody who didn't think they were going to have a chance," he said. "I think the shocked everybody in the Big Sky by going into Missoula and beating Montana,

ABC, which televises Monday Night Football, is expected to fill the slot with movies, as it did during the 1982 players strike.

"Obviously, we hope there will be no strike," NBC spokesman Kevin Monahan said. "The NFL has indicated that they will be providing games between non-union players,

but we have a lot of questions about that — including what players would be used and whether the games would count in the standings.

"Right now, we're not saying whether we would show them or not. We're saying maybe."

CBS spokesman Mark Carlson said there "are a whole lot of things under consideration," including the televising of games that are played.

"We probably are obligated to do games if they (the NFL) can play them," Carlson said Wednesday.

The current network contract with the NFL has provisions for rebates to the networks if there is a strike.

Monahan said NBC would run its NFL Live pre-game show as scheduled throughout a strike. After that, he said, it would probably run a sports anthology show on the first strike Sunday.

Monahan said NBC would not release any more of its contingency programming because the network feels "that by announcing our plans for strike programming, we'd be impinging on the strike talks."

He also denied that NBC was planning to show College Football Association games or Canadian Football League games. NBC aired CFL games for the first few weeks of the 1982 players strike.

Carlson said among the possibilities being explored by CBS, in the event no NFL games are played are College Football Association games, which would be moved from Saturday to Sunday.

In order to do that, the colleges would have to agree to such a move.

CBS holds television rights to CFA games which are generally shown Saturday afternoons.

Carlson also confirmed that CBS was considering an offer from the Professional Golfers Association to show its television finals on a rights-free basis. There are no PGA events scheduled for commercial network television for the remainder of 1987.

"That's just one of many things," Carlson said. "Auto races, boxing, triathlons, those kinds of things during the last strike."

ABC drew its fifth-highest Monday Night Football rating ever for its season-opener between the New York Giants and Chicago Bears. The telecast drew a 21.8 rating and a 38 share, marking the best opening-night showing since 1983, when the Dallas-Washington game drew a 21.9 and 39 share. The Bears won the meeting of the last two Super Bowl champions 34-19.

The International Basketball Association, a league for players 6-foot-4 and under, will get its first television exposure this weekend when ESPN shows three games from the IBA's tour of South Korea and the Philippines.

ESPN will show a game from Seoul, South Korea, on Sept. 19, then will air two of four contests in a round-robin tournament with the three top teams in the Philippines on Sept. 26 and Oct. 9. All games will be aired at midnight, EDT.

The IBA is scheduled to begin its first season next May.

Erickson and WSU to invade Michigan

ANN-ARBOR, Mich. — (AP) —

When is playing Michigan's football team easier than playing Wyoming?

It is when you're Washington State coach Dennis Erickson.

Compared to last week's game with Wyoming, preparing for Saturday's contest against the Wolverines at Michigan Stadium has been a snap for Erickson.

While getting ready for Michigan, Erickson hasn't had to answer the seemingly endless questions about coaching against a Wyoming team he left last winter for Washington State. He hasn't had to deal with the emotional impact of facing the players he once recruited and coached.

His only concern this week has been games plans. X's and O's and the 19th-ranked Wolverines.

"It was a very tough week and not one I'd like to go through very many times," said Erickson, whose 2-0 Cougars beat Wyoming, 43-28. "I still have strong feelings about those players, regardless of how they feel and how I left and all that stuff. It was a very difficult game."

"I'm gonna tell you what, that was the most miserable week of my life," Erickson said. "I hope it never happens to anyone else."

Without that distraction, Erickson has been able to concentrate on a non-league game that he views as important to the Cougar program.

Erickson has Washington State off to its first 2-0 start since 1981, but opponents like Fresno State and Wyoming aren't in the same class with Michigan.

"The thing that we want to do, and I've told our players, is gain some respectability in this program," Erickson said. "Winning those first two games is part of it, then to go back to the Big Ten and play well and win would really help this program gain some respectability."

Michigan coach Bob Schembechler also had a pretty miserable week, but for a different reason. The Wolverines committed seven turnovers and lost, 26-7, to Notre Dame for the first loss in a home opener in Schembechler's 19 years as head coach.

"I don't know of anybody on our schedule we can beat with seven turnovers," Schembechler said. Schembechler said he will stick with junior Demetrius Brown as his starting quarterback against the Cougars. Brown was intercepted three times and completed four of 15 passes for 54 yards. Backup Michael Taylor was picked off once and fumbled, while hitting four of eight passes for 72 yards. Taylor may see action off the bench, Schembechler said.

Rodriguez, with 1987 earnings of \$432,701, leads second-place Bruce Crampton by about \$95,000 on the season money list.

"The past year Chi Chi and I have played the best golf," Crampton said. "You could also include Gary Player, but for tax rea-

sons Gary doesn't come here from South Africa to play that much."

Rodriguez has won seven times this year, and is closing in on Peter Thomson's Senior PGA Tour record of nine victories in 1985.

"I'm a better player now than I was in my entire life," Rodriguez said.

Rodriguez was stung by a bee on his left hand Wednesday, but said it should not hamper his performance this weekend.

The only golfer in the top 25 on the season earnings list who is not in the field is No. 22-Tommy Aaron.

Dale Douglas, a four-time winner last year, his first on the tour, still is seeking his first victory of 1987.

Jackson's 'Bad' timing good move for ratings

HOLLYWOOD — By common assent, Michael Jackson's "Bad" follows in the 38.5-million-selling "Thriller" LP was — and is — the No. 1 selling record album in America. It has been virtually from the day it hit the record stores Aug. 31.

So why is it nowhere to be seen on the official Billboard magazine Top 100-selling albums chart this week? Pop fans must be wondering: Why the "chart gap"?

It is a long story, according to

Billboard's associate publisher and veteran chartmaster Tom Noonan. It is a tale full of detailed data-reporting techniques, timing and marketing strategies.

But, mainly, it is a case study in shrewd maneuvering by Epic Records to ensure that "Bad" will debut as the No. 1 album in America when it finally does appear on the charts next week.

"Because they released it the week before Labor Day, there's no way we could get accurate reports because of our system," Noonan said. "It appears to be bad timing when it finally does appear on the charts next week."

Portrait artist Dan Barsness thrills in finding, capturing that 'good' face

FILER — Dan Barsness, the tall, soft-spoken, black-haired artist whose work won Best of Show for the third time this year at the Twin Falls County Fair, says he wants to be known as more than just a portrait painter.

"If I have any special ability, it would be in portraits at this time," says Barsness, whose 20x30-inch pastel portrait of his wife, Carol, took top honors in the annual fair competition. "Probably if you categorized me, I would be a portrait artist. But even if I do primarily figure and portrait work, I want to work into different things."

Barsness' winning portrait, entitled "The Stranger at the Party," depicts a woman in a hot pink hat and dress sitting on an upholstered chair.

"That's about the fifth portrait I've done for my wife and I think it's the best one. Some of the others I wouldn't even want to show you," he says, smiling.

Barsness' pastel portrait of a Mexican fisherman, entitled "Telapa Fisherman," took Best of Show last year. In 1984, his oil painting, "Floral Composition," received the

highest honor.

"It's fun, and of course I really enjoy winning an award," he says of the fair's annual art show. "But a national show is a lot stiffer competition and if you win something there, it means a lot more. But I enjoy winning anything, anytime."

Barsness is no stranger to national competition. The 37-year-old Filer artist recently won third place in the West Coast Pastel Society show for the same portrait of his wife that won Best of Show at the Twin Falls County Fair this year.

In other competitions, he's won a second place in the Centennial Fine Arts Exhibition in Illinois, an honorable mention at the Festival of the American West in Logan, Utah, and a third place and Merit of Honor at the Salmon River juried show in Idaho.

"A lot of people don't realize that you spend more to enter a juried show sometimes than it's worth," says Barsness. For instance, he tells of one show he entered in California. "By the time I had insurance and shipping and everything, I might have spent \$150. And then you take a chance of having your painting damaged or the glass broken if you've got a pastel. It's something that you've got to weigh, whether it's

worth it to enter a show or not."

Barsness says, however, that the benefits of entering shows become clear when you're presenting a biography to an art gallery interested in your work.

"It gives you some credibility, at least in some people's opinion," he says. "They've judged your work as worth something."

Barsness, who grew up in Buhl, began taking private art lessons as a teenager. "I had an interest in drawing little animals when I was small. In high school they didn't have a real art class as such, so I had private lessons when I was right out of school from a lady in Twin Falls named Novella Lazaros. She was a very excellent teacher and I learned a lot from her," he says.

He also studied art for two years at the College of Southern Idaho, then took a year at Boise State.

Since then, Barsness has studied with prominent painters such as Sergei Bongart, a Russian painter, and Daniel Greene, a portrait artist from New York. His home is filled with paintings, both of his own and by other artists.

Six paintings grace his living room walls. A small, oil nude hangs over the tub in the master bedroom.

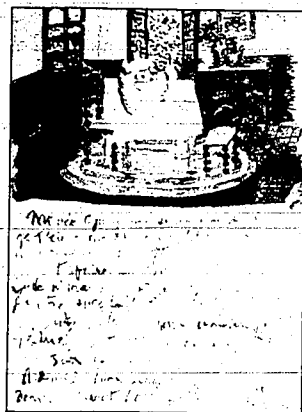

Picasso's secret affair unearthed by art historian

NEW YORK — Pablo Picasso devoted a series of sketches and paintings to a secret lover with whom he was having an affair while his avowed lover was dying from tuberculosis, according to a published report.

House & Garden, in an article released Wednesday, said Picasso had the affair in 1915-16 with Gaby Lespinasse, a Parisian woman who eventually rejected him and married American engraver and poet Herbert Lespinasse.

The article was written by John Richardson, an art historian and friend of Picasso's from 1949 to the early 1960s who is writing a four-volume biography of the painter.

The magazine received permission to publish the art works

given to Miss Lespinasse during the affair. The collection, owned by William McCarty Cooper, will be exhibited for the first time in November at the Kunstmuseum in Basel, Switzerland.

On the frame of a drawing dated Feb. 22, 1916, was a scrap of paper inscribed, "I have asked the good God for your hand," according to Richardson. Richardson said Picasso had "hitherto shown no interest in marriage" and always denied a bolt in God. Richardson said it was "a denial that this heartfelt little prayer once and for all contradicts."

In a blue watercolor, titled "The Provencal Dining Room," Picasso wrote in French:

"Gaby my love my angel I love you my darling and I think only of you ... To take your mind

off things look at the little dining room ... you know how much I love you ... 'Til tomorrow my love it is very late at night with all my heart Picasso."

Other handwritten inscriptions were erased by Miss Lespinasse before they were sold in the late 1950s, leading Richardson to conclude they were erotic.

"In several cases, the last words — do tout mon coeur (with all my heart) — and the artist's signature are all that remain," Richardson said.

The affair ... with Miss Lespinasse, who used her future husband's name before marrying him, was kept secret even from Picasso's close friends, Gertrude Stein and Alice B. Toklas.

Continued from Page D1 for the chart, but good timing for Epic because when it does debut on our charts, it's sure to be high."
Debuting at the No. 1 spot is not unprecedented, but rare. Elton John has done it twice, Bruce Springsteen did it once and Whitney Houston did it as recently as three months ago. But Jackson's previous albums — including the all-time best-seller "Thriller" — did not debut at No. 1. Like most top-selling albums, it took a few weeks for Jackson's previous albums to reach Billboard's Top 10.
One of the entertainment industry's long-standing maxims is that success breeds success. And what can be more successful than an album — starting at the top of the charts?
Jackson has made no secret of his competitiveness, as evidenced, for instance, by a much-publicized obsession with being mentioned as often as possible in the "Guinness Book of World Records." When he announced a \$15 million endorsement contract with Pepsi-Cola 18 months ago, he invited a Guinness official to the press conference to tell reporters that he had set another record: most money ever paid a celebrity in a product-endorsement contract.
By effectively delaying the official "Bad" Billboard debut a full week beyond the album's release, Jackson has made sure that he becomes among the few to enter the charts at No. 1. That game plan is not unprecedented — indeed, Arista Records released Whitney Houston's second album just before the July Fourth holiday to take advantage of the Billboard chart pay.
Billboard's policy of holding up the charts during holiday weekends took some playful ribbing from an industry competitor, Hills magazine.

"Rumors at press time have Billboard not debuting the Michael Jackson album on their chart," Hills reported in this week's issue. The magazine, which publishes its own record chart, went on to say: "Our reports show 'Bad' moving better than 2-1 over the nearest competitor. They (Billboard) must be short on their weekly reports from Bulgaria and Missk."
"It wasn't even close," said Hills editor-in-chief Lenney Beer. "Our reports showed that 'Bad' sold 295,000 to 105,000 for 'La Bamba'." The Los Lobos-dominated sound track for the movie based on the life of 1950s rock star Ritchie Valens remained No. 1 in Billboard this week, but it was displaced on this week's Hills chart.

"It wasn't any decision we made," Beer said. "It was just that the reports (of retail sales) showed clearly that it was No. 1."
Most trade publication record charts are based on weekly reports of sales or retail activity, normally called into the publication at the beginning of each week. In Billboard's case, 80 percent of the retail sales reports are made on Mondays.
But when a Monday falls on a holiday, as it did over the Labor Day weekend, the retail sales reports at Billboard are delivered Friday, Noonan said. Cashbox magazine, which handles its album sales reports the same way, also failed to show the Jackson album on its charts this week.
"Epic did a real good job of shipping it on a holiday weekend," said Spencer Berland, Cashbox vice president.
Because "Bad" was shipped to wholesalers and distributors Monday, Aug. 31, and many retailers did not get it until Thursday, Sept. 3,

Billboard was unable to get complete and accurate sales figures when its chart researchers made their weekly checks Friday, Sept. 4, according to Noonan.
He said that 29 so-called "rack jobbers" who service many of the nation's department and discount stores, and another dozen or more major distributors did not have accurate sales figures to report Sept. 4. This delay meant that Billboard heard from fewer than 70 percent of its reporting outlets in time for this week's charts.
Hills, which deals directly with individual retail outlets, can deliver statistics quicker and, according to Beer, more accurately than either of its two competitors. That, he says, is why the magazine was able to

report that "Bad" is No. 1 this week. While the album is nowhere on the Billboard chart, there is a disclaimer on Page 3 of the Sept. 19 issue — which explains — Billboard's position. Noonan said that the article is an attempt to "be honest with our readers" by describing how and why the exhaustive and time-consuming chart methodology that Billboard uses cannot be compromised through guesswork. In order to maintain a high degree of accuracy and integrity, the sale reports on "Bad" were delayed one week, according to the article.
"But you'd have to be an idiot to not know it was out in the stores. That's why we ran the article," Noonan said.

ICA debuts grants for sudden needs

BOISE — Professional artists can now get immediate financial assistance of up to \$600 through a pilot program offered by the Idaho Commission on the Arts.
According to Anna Marie Boles, ICA arts programs manager, the Sudden Opportunity Assistance Program will give professional independent artists immediate financial assistance to take advantage of opportunities to advance their work and careers. A total of \$3,600 has been allotted, of which \$600 is available for distribution for each of six grants deadlines.
Those deadlines are Oct. 16 and Nov. 13, 1987, and Jan. 15, March 18, May 20 and July 22, 1988.
"Funds through the Sudden Opportunity Program will be made available to practicing professional artists in Idaho who encounter sud-

den needs or opportunities that are available for a limited time and that will enhance their work or career," Boles said.
Examples she cited include material for completion of work scheduled for a gallery show, rental of equipment for a suddenly available performance opportunity, materials for a folk arts project or study with a mentor who is available for a limited time.
Applicants must be independent professional artists, at least 18 years of age, and a resident of Idaho for two or more consecutive years.
This is a competitive grant program," Boles said. "No all applications will be considered based on three review criteria: Quality of work/professionalism, merit of the proposed sudden opportunity and financial feasibility."

Continued from Page D1 he never because Picasso was supposed to be deeply upset about his lover Eva Gouel, who was dying of tuberculosis, or because Miss Lespinasse was "involved" with Lespinasse.
Miss Lespinasse was born Gabrielle Depierre in Paris in 1888 and was 27 when she met Picasso, who was seven years older.
Richardson said it was clear Picasso, who later married twice and had many mistresses, was enamored by Miss Lespinasse but that she rejected him. She died about 1970.
Richardson, former head of Christie's USA, said he was unable to track Miss Lespinasse down before she died but did ask Picasso about the portraits. "He was clearly delighted at seeing them but irritated at being reminded of an episode he had chosen to forget," Richardson said.

'Hamburger Hill' stocks standard military fare

TWIN FALLS — The following are capsule reviews of movies playing in the theaters locally. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

HAMBURGER HILL (R). Standard-issue patriotic Vietnam War movie centering on one the war's bloodiest battles and marred by a heavy dose of rabble-rousing preachiness. A little subtlety would have greatly enhanced the film's potential for tragic irony. Featuring 14 newcomers, the most prominent of which are Courtney Vance and Dylan McDermott.

THE BIG EASY (R). This film has several methods of establishing its authority over your attention: one is the palpable electricity between Dennis Quaid (as the faintly corrupt, mopey-alkin' New Orleans police lieutenant) and Ellen Barkin (as the post-streitlaced, mid-'80s-uptight assistant district attorney investigating police corruption). Another is the feeling of New Orleans that goes beyond the familiar iron filigree and the "Nawlins" lilt of the voice. Add to these some delectable supporting bits (most particularly by the late Charles Ludlam as the lieutenant's attorney), and stir with knee-bending sexuality.

LA BAMBA (PG-13). Although this film of the tragically brief lief on-Latino-rocker-Ritchie Valens has its strengths, especially the fine turn by the unknown Lou Diamond Phillips; the wonder is that the movie isn't full of raw energy, that it's for the most part polite melodrama. There is the music, however, great dollops of '60s songs, and it lifts the movie when the dialogue and the earnest-but-uninspired direction (by Luis Valdez) keeps it earthbound. Stars Lou Diamond Phillips, Essi Morales, Danielle von Zerneck and Elizabeth Pena. Written and directed by Luis Valdez.

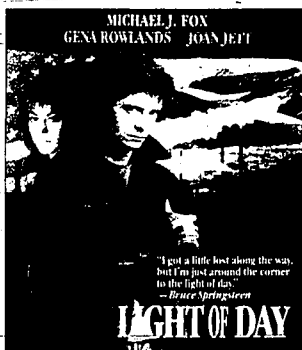
STAKEOUT (R). The Mondrian-esque high-concept outline of the plot — a detective falls in love with the woman he has under surveillance — also indicates the by-the-numbers regularity of the screenwriting (by Jim Kouf) and direction (John Badham) of this toast to superficial film making. What a pity that such a description omits the impeccable comic timing of Richard Dreyfuss and the high-gloss beauty with which cinematographer John Seale has invested this movie.

SUMMER SCHOOL (PG-13). Bouncy but perceptive comedy about an easygoing high school gym teacher (Mark Harmon) assigned into teaching a remedial English class to a bunch of kids as aimless as he is. Directed by Carl Reiner, the film is full of high spirits, yet has an unexpected undercurrent of seriousness. With Kirstie Alley, Robin Thomas.

NO WAY OUT (R). Abetted by director Roger Donaldson's main strengths — bedrock believability, solid, self-effacing technique and the bristling tension of his sexual relationships — this cracklingly fine thriller plumbs the depths of deception in the federal government. The action is whizzing fast but the performances are lovingly fleshed out. The greatest prize is Kevin Costner as the youngish Navy officer around whom the baroque plot unwinds; he is fiercely good, intelligent and appreciatively sensual.

WHO'S THAT GIRL (PG). This Madonna vehicle scrambles up a lot of plot twists from "Bringing Up Baby" and "After Hours" while reducing its star to some weird hybrid: a blonde cardboard rebel who waltzes a hapless lawyer and a pet Jaguar while doing Pee-wee Herman sweetie-jobs, hops around in gun-crazy havoc and talking in a Philly screech that sounds like Judy Holiday crossed with Loo Gorcery.

My point — I almost decided not to approach the doctors because I assumed that if they thought my loved one could be a possible donor, they would approach me. I was wrong.

In our loss, there is such a comfort knowing that others have benefited, and may have a second chance at life. If you print this, please, no name and no city.

DEAR ANONYMOUS: Your letter could not have come at a more appropriate time. Just 10 years ago, the following appeared in my column for the first time:

"At a certain moment a doctor will determine that my brain has ceased to function and that, for all intents and purposes, my life has stopped.

"When that happens, do not attempt to install artificial life into my body by the use of a machine. And don't call this my 'deathbed.' Call it my 'bed of life,' and let my body be taken from it to help others lead fuller lives.

"Give my sight to a man who has never seen a sunrise, a baby's face or love in the eyes of a woman.
"Give my heart to a person whose

ter bath.
"I ask myself, 'Why do I buy a painting?' We have paintings all around us on every wall because when I take them down, the house looks completely bare. I can't believe the difference they make. They really do make a difference in your life. A good painting — you don't get tired of it.

"I did have one compliment from a guy who has some of my paintings. He'd bought a couple of them and he told me later that he'd 'looked off his money.' In 'other words, he said he'd got his money back in looking — it made me feel pretty good."

Many of the subjects and scenes in Barness' recent work have been from Mexico, where he takes several business trips a year. He runs a frame business out of his home and makes frequent trips south of the border to purchase frame bulk.

He says he's found the people and culture of Mexico to be an inspiration.

"The people are friendly and the colors are bright," says Barness. "I can walk around a corner and see a painting. They're just everywhere you look. It's a feeling."

He says he's picked up enough Spanish to ask a person if he or she will pose for a photograph so he can paint them when he gets back home.

"Then when they say, 'Por que (Why)?', I don't know what to say," he says. "Actually, I've learned enough to tell them 'Because you have a good face' or 'You have a pretty face.' But I know very little Spanish."

Besides "Yelapa Fisherman," which won Best of Show at the fair last year, a portrait named "The Mexican Blanket Seller" took first in portraits this year. "Sidewalk Romance," a street scene of a young Hispanic couple, was given an honorable mention.

"Oxbow Basket Weavers," a 27x35-inch pastel on masonite, is one of several paintings hanging in the Trails West Gallery in Ketchum.

"I think my best portraits have not been commissioned portraits, but they've been portraits of, for instance, an old man named Charlie Wyal that has modeled for paintings. There's a look in the face, or a character in the face, that really intrigues you and you want to capture that. So you're doing it more as a feeling rather than just to get an exact likeness. Like the Mexican blanket seller. There was a look that man had — I can't even explain it — but he looked proud and humble at the same time.

Barness says he's constantly trying to improve on his last painting. "I would say this would be my goal: to be an enrichment to the lives of people who have my paintings in their homes," he says. "Have I gotten to that point? Maybe on a couple of them. But on the whole, I'm not satisfied."

"Bongart," now, he can do anything. In landscape he was equally good as in still life and portrait. He once said something to me. He said, 'When your work gets good enough, people's mouths drop open when they look at it.'
"That's something to shoot for, I guess."

Grants available for teachers to develop arts in classroom

BOISE — The Idaho Commission on the Arts has announced it will award teacher incentive grants totaling \$3,000 during the 1987-88 school year. Applications must be postmarked no later than Oct. 30.

According to Anna Marie Boles, AIE coordinator at the arts commission, the program is designed to encourage the development and implementation of curricula and/or classroom units of study that present or use the arts as a basic part and work toward sequential learning in the arts.

Boles said teachers may apply for grants funds up to \$300 each, and must have at least half of the amount requested in matching funds. "In other words," Boles said,

"if a teacher applies for a grant of \$300, he or she must have \$150 in cash to match."

"The program offers financial assistance to professional K-12 teachers to develop and implement arts education curriculum ideas and will assist in the dissemination through the state of any units of study that are developed.

"Generally," she said, "this program emphasizes the equal partnership of artists and art organizations in providing quality arts education. NBC introduces 'Sunday Today' to attract early bird newshounds

By PAUL ELIE

Traditionally, Sunday morning has been a time to leave the TV off and read the papers instead. NBC hopes to change that with "Sunday Today," a new version of the "Today" show that premieres on Sunday, Sept. 20, and airs from 8 to 9:30 a.m. (ET).

"We hope to find an audience that wants to watch something other than cartoons or Jimmy Swaggart," says Boyd-Matson, who will co-host the show with Maria Shriver. "People who want to catch up on the news as well as be entertained, and don't feel like waiting around for Charles Kuralt (the host of 'CBS News Sunday Morning')." The format of the program, Matson notes, is similar to that of a Sunday newspaper. "On Sunday, people glance at the headlines and then go to their favorite section," he says. "We'll do the same thing."

The "sections" include sports and weather highlights, a cooking feature, a roundtable of newspaper editors discussing the week's events and a roundup of arts and entertainment from around the country. A feature

called "Fast Forward" will look at the events of the week ahead. "We'll try to be the first day of the week, not the last," Matson said.

As a "Today" correspondent, Matson has frequently filled in for anchor Bryant Gumbel, while "Sunday Today" will rely on the same format as the parent program, he says that there will be a few differences.

"Our treatment of stories will be more relaxed," he explains. "With 'Today,' many people just watch part of the show and then go to work. Or they'll be going from the bedroom to the kitchen to the bedroom again, never sitting down to watch but always hearing the sound. With this show, we're hoping that people will sit down and watch for the full 90 minutes."

Matson and Shriver will be presented as equals. On "Today," Gumbel is the anchor, while Jane Pauley's official title is co-anchor.

"On 'Today,' you see the anchors at the start of the program, and then you don't see them together again until the end," Mat-

son says. "We'll try to divide assignments equally, and we'll try to appear more as a group."

Lately, though, the two anchors have kept busy with their own projects. Last month, Shriver hosted "God Is Not Elected," a special focusing on Pope John Paul II's visit to the United States. Matson, meanwhile, traveled to China and Mongolia, where he filmed segments for "The Changing China," a series of reports that will air on NBC News shows beginning Sept. 25.

Matson's reports on train travel in China and modernization in Mongolia will air on "Today" during the week of Sept. 28. And next Sunday, Sept. 27, his report on advertising in China will air on "Sunday Today."

NBC's Sunday lineup started late because of a 16-minute overrun by an afternoon NFL football game.

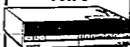



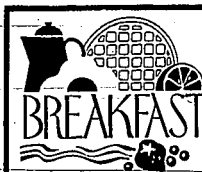

NBC strikers set to picket pageant

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — Striking NBC newswriters and technicians will picket the Miss America Pageant on Saturday and the activities preceding the event, a union official said Sunday.

"We intend to come down in force," said Arthur Kent, president of Local 11 of the National Association of Broadcast Employees and Technicians.

He said NBC had televised the pageant for 26 years.

"This is the first time that NABET technicians won't be working the pageant, and we want the whole country to know about it," he said. "The professionals will be outside picketing, while the scabs are inside doing the work."

About 2,800 NABET members

struck NBC about 10 weeks ago over job security. The contract expired March 31, and the most recent talks fell apart Friday after eight days of federal mediation.

NABET strikers will be joined by hotel and restaurant workers striking the Elsinore's Atlantis Casino Hotel over a wage dispute.

NBC spokeswoman McClain Ramsey said the NABET picketing should not disrupt pageant coverage.

"They picketed many other

events, and it's had no effect on them. We've had no trouble getting people and equipment past their pickets," she said.

Albert Marks, head of the pageant, said officials "will take all the steps necessary" to ensure the pickets don't interfere with the event. The Press of Atlantic City reported Sunday.

"The Miss America Pageant is a not a party to the dispute between NABET and (NBC). We are a disinterested third party," Marks said.

People Meters method shows fewer viewing

HOLLYWOOD — As the networks had feared, the first ratings from A.C. Nielsen's controversial new People Meters showed fewer people watching television this week than had been indicated by the previous system of monitoring the nation's viewing habits.

But research officials at the three networks say they do not expect that the early People Meter ratings will have much immediate effect on their advertisers.

The new system, which is replacing the Nielsen company's traditional National Television Index ratings, went into effect Monday. It showed 1.3 million fewer households watching the

tube that night than the old system, which is still in place until Sept. 14.

With the exception of ABC's "Monday Night Football" broadcast, the People Meter ratings released for Monday's prime-time programs — most of which were summer reruns — were consistently lower than the National Television Index ratings. The largest drop was for CBS' "Newhart," which was off in the People-Meter ratings by 17 percent.

"Monday Night Football" registered 9 percent higher on the People Meter, but NBC's "A Year in the Life" was 1 percent lower, CBS' "Designing Women" and NBC's "ALF" were 9 percent lower and CBS' "Kate & Allie" was 11 percent lower.

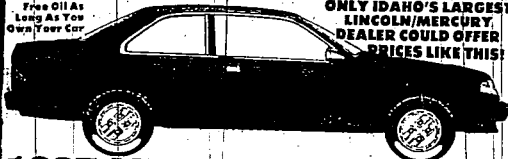
