Reagan rebuffs demand to pull forces

WASHINGTON — President Reagan on Thursday rebuffed congressional calls to limit U.S. forces in the Persian Gulf, defending the attack on an Iranian mine-laying vessel and saying he considers "this incident as closed."
The president sent a report on Monday's ship attack to Capitol Hill as lawmakers negotiated behind the scenes on legislation dealing with U.S. policy in the vital region and the War Powers Act.

"The actions taken by U.S. forces were conducted in the exercise of our right of self-defense ...," Reagan said in a letter to the House and Senate.
Critics are fearful that the president's policy of placing Kuwaiti oil tankers under the U.S. flag and escorting them with Navy warships will draw the United States into the Iran-Iraq war.
Reagan's report was the formal response to congressional calls for implementation of the War Powers Act. All week, the White House has argued that efforts to curb the U.S. role in the gulf were unwarranted and an infringement on the president's authority.
Reagan termed the latest incident as "limited defensive actions" taken in accordance with international law and his position of commander-in-chief. He also faulted the constitutionality of the War Powers Act.
Since Monday's attack, Democrats have considered pushing an amendment that would invoke the act, the 1973 law limiting a president's authority to commit U.S. military forces into situations of "imminent involvement in hostilities."

Under the law, the White House must send Congress a written report within 48 hours after the forces are committed. Within the following 60 days, the troops must be brought home unless Congress approves their presence.
By Thursday afternoon, the Democratic-backed proposal had gone through at least four drafts, ranging from mildly critical to a cut-

off of funds for any operations under certain circumstances.
The final Democratic proposal, which was introduced in the Senate late Thursday, would halt the reflagging or U.S. convoys within 90 days after the law takes effect unless Congress specifically votes for such actions.
Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., said, "This proposal is the right answer to a very difficult set of circumstances where there are no good answers."
Senate Majority Leader Robert

Byrd, D-W.Va., said, "This hasn't been cleared with anyone at the White House."
Sen. John Warner, R-Va., said Republicans and the White House had dropped efforts to work out a bipartisan proposal because "we concluded that nothing could be worked out that we could support." He said the Democratic measure would be "a warning shot across the bow" of every U.S. ship in the gulf.
But no vote was scheduled for the Persian Gulf move before today, at

Research ship sinking backs mine theory

MANAMA, Bahrain — Shipping experts said Thursday that a small research vessel exploded and sank in the northern Persian Gulf, supporting the U.S. Navy's contention that Iran has seeded the busy waterway with mines.
American and Kuwaiti officials meanwhile denied reports that one, and possibly two, U.S.-escorted convoys were steaming through the gulf.
Also Thursday, Iraq's official news agency said Iraqi warplanes flew 96 combat missions into Iran during the day and that Iran had shelled the port city of Basra, killing 12 civilians. Iran's official news agency denied the report.
In New York, Secretary of State George Shultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze agreed Thursday that unity is key to achieving a cease-fire in the war, but did not publicly mention whether they discussed a U.S. proposal for an embargo against Iran. The United States had asked for the meeting after the Soviets did not publicly endorse the embargo.
Kuwait told the United Nations General Assembly that the U.N. cease-fire plan might be the last chance to end the war between its neighbors.
Britain said there might be room for negotiation but that achieving peace would be a "long, tough task."
Lloyd's Shipping Intelligence Service in London, which monitors shipping around the world, said the 180-ton research survey vessel Marissa exploded and sank early Tuesday.
The sketchy Lloyd's report said there were three survivors and four "casualties," apparently meaning fatalities. Gulf-based shipping executives said the vessel sank without sending any distress signal.
On Monday, a British tanker was ambushed in the same area and U.S. helicopters attacked and disabled an Iranian landing craft caught laying mines 130 miles to the southeast.
American warships and helicopters spent a third day

Site for summit still not settled

MOSCOW — Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev and President Reagan will meet later this year, but the site of the meeting still has not been settled, a government spokesman said Thursday.
Foreign Ministry Spokesman Boris D. Pydyayev told reporters that last week's meetings in Washington between Secretary of State George Shultz and Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze did not decide the location.
After a meeting in New York on Thursday between Shultz and Shevardnadze, Shultz said they decided he will go to Moscow on Oct. 22-23 to set a date for the summit at which Reagan and Gorbachev will sign a pact eliminating the superpowers' shorter and medium-range nuclear missiles.
Reagan and Shultz had said the summit is to be held in the United States.
"The fact of the matter is that the issue was addressed in the course of the Washington talks, but the discussion was not completed," Pydyayev said. "So an exchange of views still has to be conducted to conclude this issue."
He declined to say whether Shultz and Shevardnadze had decided where to hold the summit, but he said the United States "is still being considered."

Dioxin found in paper goods but called no health hazard

WASHINGTON — Tiny amounts of dioxin, a potent cause of cancer in lab animals, are found in many paper products — such as coffee filters, napkins and tampons — bleached with chlorine, the Environmental Protection Agency announced Thursday.
But the agency said it believes there is no health hazard from using those products.
John T. Moore, assistant administrator for pesticides and toxic substances, told a news conference that the extra risk of cancer to humans, according to "archaic calculations," appeared to be around one in a million, which he called "negligible risk."
"I'm not going to change my lifestyle habits or purchasing patterns of products made from bleached paper," Moore said.
The American Paper Institute said in a statement by its president, Red Cavanaugh: "Consumers can continue to have the utmost confidence in the safety and integrity of all paper products." The statement pledged the industry to resolving the problem "in an open and forthright fashion."
Dioxins are formed as an inevitable byproduct of the manufacture of certain chemicals, notably pesticides, using chlorine. There are 210 dioxins and related chlorine-containing compounds, but most of the concern arises from one, called 2,3,7,8-TCDD.

This is the most powerful cause of cancer in laboratory animals ever tested, with minute amounts causing tumors at several sites. It has not been shown to cause cancer in humans, but the EPA classifies it as a probable cause of human cancer.
Environmentalists say it also cause birth defects, miscarriages and damage to the liver and immune system, but these conclusions are all hotly debated.

Senate rejects nuclear test moratorium

WASHINGTON — The Senate handed the White House a trio of victories Thursday as it rejected efforts to halt underground nuclear tests, delay the production of new chemical weapons and block a medium-range arms control agreement.
The decisions came as the chamber worked toward approval of a bill authorizing the Pentagon's budget for the fiscal year starting Oct. 1.
By a 62-35 margin, the Democratic-controlled chamber voted to table, and thus kill, a call for a two-year moratorium on tests of all but the smallest nuclear weapons. The moratorium is sought by advocates of a comprehensive ban on all testing and is part of a companion House bill.
Later, the chamber killed, by a 52-40 margin, a proposed one-year moratorium on the final-stage assembly of new chemical weapons and it then voted 49-48 rejection of a separate proposal calling for a halt in production of the "biggy" nerve gas bomb.
The nerve gas votes were the latest round in one of the longest-running fights over a weapons system during President Reagan's nearly seven years in office. Reagan has said the United States should begin producing chemical weapons for the first time since 1969.
The Senate then voted 62-28 to kill a proposal by Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., saying the chamber shouldn't ratify any U.S.-Soviet treaty eliminating medium-range nuclear weapons unless the pact is "unquestionably verifiable."

Deadline nearing for new W-4 forms

WASHINGTON — Less than a week before the deadline, millions of American workers have yet to file a new Form W-4 to adjust their tax withholding to conform with the overhauled federal tax code.
Under the law, enacted a year ago, workers must file a new W-4 with their employers before Oct. 1. Those who fail to comply could find their take-home pay sharply reduced.
The Internal Revenue Service, updating a survey completed by the Roper polling organization in late July, estimates that about 80 percent of workers have filed withholding forms this year. Since the agency was expecting about 94 million to file, that means about 18 million have not.
"It's late, but there is still time to adjust your paycheck," IRS spokesman Johnelle Hunter said Thursday. "It might be a good idea, even if you have filed a form earlier this year, to make the calculations again and, if necessary, file a new form to bring withholding in line with liability."
The new withholding forms are necessary because the 1986 tax overhaul made many changes in basic tax provisions that affect many people.
Under the new law:
• A single person who does not file a new W-4 by the deadline will be given no more than one withholding allowance, even if otherwise entitled to more because of deductions or dependents. An allowance on the withholding form is equal to the personal exemption on a tax return; it exempts \$1,900 a year, \$158.33 a month or \$36.64 a week from withholding.
• A married worker will be authorized no more than two allowances until a new W-4 is filed.
• Any employee may file either the four-page W-4 or the two-page W-4A. The IRS says the shorter version should be sufficient for all taxpayers except those with big amounts of non-wage income.
Single workers and one-earner couples who have only one job and do not itemize deductions probably need fill out only the first seven lines on the front of the W-4A plus the short withholding certificate.

ISU faculty considers ban on weapons-related research

POCATELLO (AP) — The Idaho State Faculty Senate is nearing consideration of a proposal that would ban weapons-related research on the Pocatello campus.

No classified military research is under way at the school, officials said, and some do not think the proposed ban would endanger the projects directed to the university from the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

INEL finances extensive projects un-

related to weaponry that include ecological, archeological and engineering research, and Graduate School Dean Edwin House said a weapons research ban would not affect those programs but "it could be perceived as saying something it doesn't say."

The issue surfaced last spring when the ISU Research Coordinating Council sent the proposal to the Faculty Senate for consideration. Action was delayed until this fall.

The council, however, was sharply divided on the issue, and House, the council president, said his vote alone could have killed the proposal. He backed it, however, because he felt the issue deserved a full debate.

But House emphasized that the policy did not go to the Senate with council endorsement. There was "significant and vociferous opposition," he said.

The Faculty Senate has the options of kill-

ing the proposition outright, sending it to the faculty for a vote or returning it to the council for revision.

A segment of ISU's faculty feels it is morally wrong to engage in research designed to harm humans, House said. But others believe they should have the freedom to engage in any research they choose.

Overall, House said he doubts most faculty members would want to restrict the ability to conduct research with Idaho Na-

tional Engineering Laboratory contractors.

"I seriously doubt that the university will enact any policy that will endanger that," he said.

College of Engineering Dean Varada Charvulani said ISU has not been actively applying for military research, but he likens a weapons research ban to censorship, saying it may pose tangible and intangible problems for ISU researchers.

Andrus holds stand Jones fires salvo over log exports

BOISE (AP) — Attorney General Jim Jones is accusing Gov. Cecil Andrus of grandstanding over the issue of exporting Idaho timber to other states for processing.

The governor could accomplish more by insisting on so-called "hard release" language in pending Idaho wilderness legislation, Jones said in a statement released Thursday.

That would free millions of acres of federal timber for development and ensure a steady supply of logs for Idaho sawmills, Jones said.

"If Governor Andrus were truly concerned about the plight of the Idaho timber industry, he would support release language in Idaho wilderness legislation that would permit reasonable timber and other activity on land not selected for wilderness legislation," Jones said.

A spokesman for Andrus declined to comment on Jones' allegation specifically, but said the governor was standing on statements made a couple of days ago on the same subject.

Andrus said he was not insisting on "hard release" language, because he was convinced the House would never approve it.

The governor said a Montana congressman tried to put "hard

release language into the Montana wilderness bill, but had to withdraw it because of congressional opposition.

About 9 million acres of roadless areas in Idaho are under study for possible permanent wilderness protection. Under "hard" release language, any area not designated as wilderness would be released for other use, such as logging.

Under "soft" release language, such areas would leave the areas under federal management.

Jones said "soft" release language would leave non-wilderness timber areas "under more stringent management controls and subject to costly and time-consuming legal challenges."

He said Andrus has made much of his effort to get the state Land Board (of which Jones is a member) to restrict or bar the export of unprocessed logs.

"The governor has it in his power to negotiate a reasonable acreage figure for wilderness and to insist on reasonable release language, both of which would accomplish his professed purpose."

"Apparently his demagoging on the timber export issue is a ploy to mask his lack of attentiveness to the Idaho timber industry in the wilderness negotiations," Jones said.

Aryan plan not new to Ogden area

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — Police Chief Joe Ritchie says the Rev. Richard Butler's plan to establish a regional office in the Ogden area for his Aryan Nations white supremacist group is old news to police.

Butler this week confirmed the plan to establish a Utah center after an office of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith said his organization was concerned Aryan Nations might move into Utah.

"It's nothing new. This will be the 10th or 11th such center," Butler said.

He said the group had been thinking about putting a center in Salt Lake City, "but some of our people have been through Ogden, liked the place and liked the people."

Butler, of Hayden Lake, Idaho, and nine others were indicted in

April in Fort Smith, Ark., on federal charges of sedition involving conspiracy to overthrow the government, and financing their activities by armed robbery and counterfeiting.

Ritchie said Wednesday he doubts Aryan Nations is mounting a serious new effort to expand its activities in the region.

"I just think this stuff is old because if it weren't, we'd be hearing something," Ritchie said.

Ritchie said police received reports a year ago that Butler's group was seeking property near Huntsville.

"The initial information came from a federally sponsored training class that had been taught out of state," Ritchie said. "The information that was disseminated was

that they would try to buy property in Northern Utah."

Ogden-area authorities took the information seriously but efforts to determine who might have been representing the group and where they may have been trying to buy property turned up nothing, he said.

Ritchie said the only activity in Ogden that may have been related to Butler's group occurred a little less than a year ago when two men repeatedly were accused of harassing black residents.

Ritchie said the harassment victims said the two men told them they were members of Aryan Nations but that there was no other evidence that they actually belonged to the group.

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Son chosen guardian facing theft charges

MOSCOW (AP) — The son of an ailing 72-year-old woman has been charged with grand theft in a scheme where she allegedly used his position as legal guardian and conservator for his mother to effectively deplete her assets.

Gerald Boag, 49, faces an Oct. 7 preliminary hearing on charges that he drained tens of thousands of dollars from the bank accounts of his mother, Violet Boag, 78, in a matter of just six months last year. He is free on \$500 bond.

Mrs. Boag, who suffers from Alzheimer's disease, had over \$113,000 in various accounts before her son was named guardian in mid-1986, authorities said. But today, "we can't find any accounts that have any money in them," Latah County Treasurer Shirley Payne said.

"She had enough money to live comfortably the rest of her life," Prosecutor Craig Mosman said, "and now she's broke."

According to court records, within months after Boag was appointed his mother's guardian, he spent more than \$40,000 from her accounts to buy half a dozen cars and trucks, a mobile home, two satellite dishes and five horses along with other unspecified purchases.

"The erosion of her assets has forced Mrs. Boag to apply for county assistance so she can remain at the

Latah Care Center, where she receives needed around-the-clock attention."

The alleged theft by her son was uncovered after her bills at the center went unpaid for a number of months earlier this year, and the center administrator asked Mosman to investigate.

Magistrate William Hamlett, who appointed Boag as his mother's guardian and conservator, conceded that the two dozen guardianship cases he has annually are handled "pretty loosely."

"The case often times is that the bills have to be paid, the stock has to be fed, money has to be taken out of the bank, and it's against human nature to believe a relative is going to do something inappropriate with that money," Hamlett said.

In most cases, he said, the family members are upset by the fact that their relative has become so ill someone must take over legal control of affairs.

"So you don't want to give them a big hassle in court, and you really depend on the attorney's representation," Hamlett said. "My biggest complaint with the process is attorneys who file the guardianship and then walk away from it."

The attorney who handled the Boag case has moved out of the county.

Toll-free calls win OK

BOISE (AP) — State utility regulators have ordered the elimination of toll charges on telephone calls between Nu Acres and Fruitland in Payette County despite claims from Mountain Bell Telephone that the move is anti-competitive.

The decision to allow toll-free calling between the two areas "recognizes that exchange boundaries have not been changed as the communities grew," the Public Utilities Commission said.

Mountain Bell, along with other companies serving the area was asked to respond to citizen petitions for the toll-free service last spring, and the utility contended toll-free calling was "inconsistent with the present economics and competitive nature of the telecommunications industry."

But the commission disagreed.

with the anti-competitive characterization, arguing that the decision highlights the demographic, cultural, social, economic and political considerations which define a relatively homogeneous area.

Although other programs providing discount long-distance rates could be used to handle those kinds of situations, the Nu Acres-Fruitland link logically called for toll-free service, the commission said.

In granting that service, however, the commission rejected similar treatment for long-distance service to the other communities of Payette, New Plymouth, Weiser and Ontario and Vale in Oregon, contending the actual telephone traffic among those communities did not warrant the free service.

Iranian-born teacher receives award

POCATELLO (AP) — An Iranian-born Pocatello High School teacher has received the 1987 President's Award for Excellence in mathematics.

Ahmad Dolkhani was named the Idaho recipient of the annual

award, created by President Reagan in 1983 to honor outstanding educators in each state.

Dolkhani, who has become a naturalized American citizen, has taught in the Pocatello School District for 24 years.

A suggested name for new cigarettes

BOSTON — When the folks at RJR Nabisco emerged from their bunkers last week to announce yet another breakthrough product, I felt a perverse rush of admiration. How do they keep doing it?

The health community has been slugging through the trenches of the war against smoking, chipping away at the number of addicts, backing them into a small, socially unacceptable corner, and out comes RJR with a secret offensive weapon. It's the industry's Battle of the Bulge: the "smokeless" cigarette.

The product that they are developing is not a cigarette that uses but does not burn tobacco. It's a cigarette that produces no ash and little sidestream smoke. In short, this product is supposedly "safer," although that word is never exhaled by a tobacco man. To say the word "safer" would imply that regular cigarettes were unsafe. They call it, instead, "the world's cleanest cigarette."

The announcement is a response to the success of the passive smoking movement, which has sent smokers into a social purdah. If these new pacifiers do save some beds from burning and some nonsmokers' lungs from deteriorating, it's all to the good. But I suspect that we're actually inhaling a lethal sidestream of false health promises to the smokers.

The history of tobacco's safety claims is hardly reassuring. The cigarette itself was marketed at the turn of the century as a healthy, "safer" alternative to chewing tobacco, which spread germs through spitting. In the 1930s, ads for Camels and Philip Morris boasted that their smoke was less irritating, i.e., "safer." In the 1950s, after the first major cancer scare, the industry developed filtered cigarettes with slogans like "just what the doctor ordered." It turned out that one of the things the doctor ordered was asbestos in the Kent micronite filter.

Today, manufacturers push the notion of low tar, in an attempt to convince people their brand is "safer." And to come full circle, young people are again ingesting tobacco like Skoal in the misguided belief that it's less dangerous than inhaling. All in all, the "safety" record of the tobacco industry now leads to some 350,000 deaths a year.

So what of this new unburnt offering of the public arena? Greg Connolly, director of the Massachusetts Office of Non-Smoking and Health, likes to call it "the little

Webber grill." We know that this grill produces carbon monoxide and picoline. We know that it contains charcoal, a small amount of tobacco and something mysteriously called a "flavor capsule." Essentially, you suck hot air through that capsule.

Is that safer? I mean, "cleaner"? The carbon monoxide and the nicotine are bad enough for the heart. But the real mystery is in the "flavor capsule."

The flavor in a cigarette comes from the tar in the tobacco. As you take the tar out, you have to substitute something. In a cigarette with as little tobacco as these, the flavor packet is a bundle of additives. But what they are, how dangerous, or how dangerous when burned with other additives is anybody's guess because tobacco is a uniquely unregulated product. It is exempt from control by the Food and Drug Administration, exempt from the Consumer Product Safety Agency.

"Can you imagine a food company marketing a new ice cream, saying 'this has no calories, no fat, but not telling you what's in it?'" asks Beth Whelan of the American Council on Science and Health. "They can put anything they want to in a cigarette."

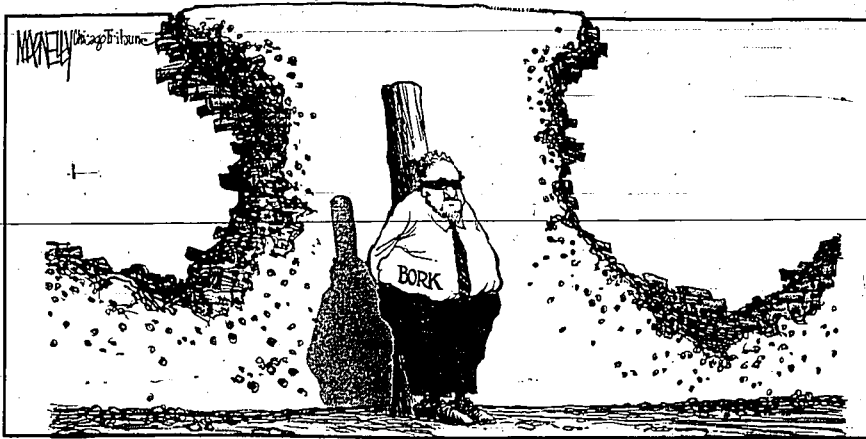
Scott Ballin of the American Heart Association adds, ironically: "If there were no tobacco in the product at all, the FDA would be required to regulate it." Indeed the FDA kept a tobacco-less cigarette called Flavor from the market.

There is a bill now before Congress that would give the government authority to regulate the additives if not the tobacco itself. A label listing the ingredients in a cigarette — "smoke or smokeless" — might be spookier than any warnings.

The average addicted smoker would give anything for a safe cigarette. The tobacco industry has given the addict a promise. Hang on for a while, we have one coming.

It is safe, or rather clean, let it be tested and regulated. If not, I would like to offer a name for the new smokeless cigarette. If this is the tobacco industry's last stand, let's call them Custers.

Unlike TV tales, drug war is for keeps

Despite all the hype about the "new" shows of the "new" fall season, there is a certain old familiarity that permeates television's annual rite of self-promotion.

But this year, I hope that television viewers will find a truly substantive difference in what we have to offer. If we have done what we set out to do 12 months ago, this season's programming should evidence an unmistakably new attitude toward the portrayal of drug and alcohol abuse.

The Academy of Television Arts and Sciences enlisted in the war against drugs last year because wherever there is the influence of drugs there is the influence of television. There are nearly as many TV sets in America as there are people. Kids typically view seven hours of programming a day. Drug abusers and, more important, potential abusers all watch television.

In drug counseling the word enablers is used to describe family members who make it possible for an addict to get deeper into drugs by refusing to acknowledge his problem, by lending him money to pay off his recurring debts, by believing his lies — in short, by looking the other way. In much the same way, television has been an "enabler" to the nation's drug problem. At no time has our industry actively encouraged drug abuse. But perhaps we've been guilty of doing the next worst thing: We have publicized and at times glamorized substance abuse as a life style.

Far too often TV's depiction of substance abuse has been casual or confused. Drinking has been routinely shown as a key to social acceptance; drunkenness has served as dependable source material whenever a cheap joke is needed. Narcotics have been recurring theme for numerous crime shows in which the "message" seems to be that the bad guys' mistake was not in getting involved with drugs but in getting caught.

There are those who see nothing wrong in this state of affairs. They argue that since we are in the entertainment business we should limit our-

selves to trying to entertain. But there is no such thing as pure entertainment. Everything that we put on the air carries explicit or implicit messages to viewers about human behavior and values. We provide a steady supply of heroes and villains who help fill the pantheon of role models in American culture. Our choices, and how we present them, often become an indelible part of that culture.

Another familiar argument is "Who are we to talk?" It is true that Hollywood has had its share of drug problems and that we are in no position to preach from a pulpit of purity. But there is no industry that does not suffer from chemical addiction among its employees; nationwide, about one in 10 workers are drug abusers. However, ours was the first industry in which drug abuse was publicly acknowledged as a problem. Ours should also be among the first to provide national leadership in combating it.

What, then, can we do?

For guidance, we should look at what has been accomplished regarding the depiction of tobacco use. It is virtually impossible to view a television program today in which a character lights up a cigarette. This is not the result of some edict from the government or the networks. The people who make TV shows simply realized that smoking was a bad thing and acted accordingly. Such influences are subtle, they are inexact, but they are real.

Dealing with the issue of substance abuse requires a similar sensitivity. We do not need every series to dutifully turn in a drug episode each

season, or every network to do one drug-themed movie-of-the-week. This would be too little and too much. What is needed is an ongoing awareness of the problem that will be reflected in everything that is broadcast. For example, in a crime story about a high-rolling drug pusher, we might show the destroyed, glamorous lives of their loved ones. In soap operas we might avoid the reflexive reaching for a drink every time a character has a crisis. In celebrity interview shows we might steer clear of stars who boast and joke about alcoholism and drug use.

Each and every one of us who works in television has a responsibility. I have told directors and actors that if they don't approve of the way drug or alcohol use is portrayed in a particular scene, they should insist on changes or refuse to do it. I have told station executives that if an episode of a series does not deal with this issue responsibly, they should refuse to air it and refuse to pay for it. If we all do our part, I am convinced that television can have a meaningful effect in the war against drugs.

But while the television industry brings tremendous strengths to this effort in its power to persuade, it also brings a serious weakness: its reliance on the whims of popularity as the sole criteria for success. I have heard that in some quarters substance abuse is already being dismissed as "last year's issue." This disturbs me deeply. For the war on drugs will be a protracted one. If we are to succeed, our efforts will not be measured in overnight ratings or seasonal accounts of winners and losers. Unlike the annual network-skirmishes, the drug war is played for keeps, and if it is lost there will be no winners.

To understand Unification Church, consult a follower

Dear Times-News editor, Friends of Religious Freedom and Bigots: I am a minister serving a group of closely-related denominations. About one year ago, I moved to Colorado. Most of my pastoral work since then has been through the mails. The main aspect of my work entailing face-to-face contacts is my work with the Colorado branch of the Interdenominational Conference for Clergy. The ICC is an exciting project of the International Religious Foundation, which is in turn one of the more successful auxiliaries of the Unification Church, founded in 1954 by the Rev. Sun Myung Moon of South Korea.

One of the topics addressed in the local ICC has been a declaration of faith on behalf of the Unification Church. Our concern doesn't have anything to do with our personal theological beliefs. logical beliefs of Rev. Moon and his followers is because we are disturbed at the widely held misconceptions about the man and his movement. I personally refute these myths to the work of persons both within and without the media who have a secret agenda, who desire to instill a civil religion of materialism and mediocrity in America. But there is also a good side to what these would-be destroyers of religion are trying to explain.

One of the difficulties telling people know the truth about Rev. Moon is that newspapers charge a healthy fee for advertising space. Most papers will not publish anything about Rev. Moon unless it is either 1. fanatically negative; or 2. paid for in hard cash. If you have any positive news about Rev. Moon, it will not get into your newspaper unless you write it yourself for the letters column, or you pay out the nose for "advertising space," even if it is legitimate news! Our financial

situation is part of the reason for our hesitation in launching a media campaign to publish the truth about Rev. Moon.

Iranian crewmen headed for Oman

WASHINGTON (AP) — The crewmen of an Iranian ship that was attacked and disabled by U.S. helicopters earlier this week were transferred Thursday to a Navy ship that headed for Oman, Pentagon officials said.

The officials, who requested anonymity, also said U.S. forces had "located six or seven mine-like objects" in the area where the Iranian ship was attacked, but had yet to complete their task of sweeping the area for underwater explosives.

The sources said the 26 crewmen of the "Iran Ajr," rescued early Tuesday morning from the gulf after they had abandoned their ship, were transferred from the LaSalle and the Guadalcanal to the Raleigh, an amphibious landing ship.

The Raleigh, with a warship escort, then headed for Oman, where the United States intends to release the 26 to representatives of the International Red Crescent Society, the Islamic equivalent of the Red Cross, the officials said.

Diplomatic sources in the gulf said Thursday the Iranian crewmen would be released on Saturday in Oman. The sources said Oman offered to serve as intermediary to cool tensions in the gulf, where Iran and Iraq have been fighting for seven years.

In recent months, Oman has developed close relations with Iran.

The diplomatic sources said the Iranians would be flown by U.S. helicopters to Seeb airport, where they would then board an Iranian air force plane for Tehran. The Pentagon sources said it remained unclear whether the Raleigh would dock in Oman or ferry the men to shore by helicopter.

Special helicopters used in gulf attack

WASHINGTON (AP) — For two days, Pentagon officials steadfastly refused to confirm reports that the U.S. helicopters that attacked an Iranian ship in the Persian Gulf were something other than Navy aircraft. Then Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger let the cat out of the bag.

Appearing on a TV program Tuesday night, Weinberger concluded an interview by saying, "I think that the Navy, and the Army and the helicopters, are to be enormously complimented and credited with very effective, very decisive, really brilliant action in a very difficult situation."

The compliment, in this case, was directed to the "Night Stalkers," a unit more formally known as Task Force 160, Based at Fort Campbell, Ky. Task Force 160 is a reinforced assault aviation battalion created to support the Army's Special Operations Forces.

"Two months ago, reports surfaced that Task Force 160 had been given a new role — support the Navy's Middle East Force in the Persian Gulf. Monday night after days of co-

vert surveillance, two specially configured Army helicopters known as MH-68 lifted off the frigate Jarrett and began stalking the Iran Ajr, a landing craft that American intelligence was convinced was being used to seed mines in the gulf.

Shortly before 11 p.m. local time, after using infrared sensors to confirm that mines were being dropped over the side, the two copters made good on Task Force 160's unofficial motto: "Death waits in the dark."

With one helicopter serving as a spotter and back-up, the second moved in and sprayed the Iran Ajr with cannon fire from its 7.62mm machine guns. The Iranians stopped dropping mines — for a time.

A half-hour later, however, the copter crews reported the Iranian vessel had resumed sowing mines. This time, as Rear Adm. Harold J. Bensen of the Middle East Force would later describe it, "we used additional force."

The copters moved in with a vengeance, opening up not only with their machine guns but also 2.75-inch rockets. In seconds, the ship was dead in the water. A fire had

erupted on the ship's fantail, and five Iranians were either dead or missing.

Twenty-six other survivors were later rescued from the water.

Before this week, Task Force 160 had been combat only once — during the 1983 U.S. invasion of the Caribbean island of Grenada. But the unit has spent the last six years trying to perfect the equipment and tactics needed to perform one of the most difficult jobs in all of aviation — flying a helicopter in the dead-of-night, at top speed, at tree-top level.

It is dangerous work. In 1983, 17 of the Army's 35 aviation fatalities involved men assigned to the 160th Aviation Battalion, the forerunner of Task Force 160. The Army attributed that high accident rate to the unit's work "in developing, testing and refining new techniques in the employment of night-vision goggles, cockpit enhancements and long-range navigation."

A year later, in October 1984, Task Force 160 was formally organized in its current form — about 900 men, with roughly 75 helicopters of at least three types, assigned to the Special Operations Forces.

The Army will now acknowledge the unit's existence, but it refuses to say much more.

According to Pentagon sources, however, it was Adm. William J. Crowe, the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, who decided the Army had something special in Task Force 160 that the Navy could use in the Persian Gulf.

Crowe, who once commanded the Middle East Force himself, was concerned that Iranian speedboats could approach an American ship at such high speed that they could mount an attack, the sources said Thursday.

The Navy's ships carried helicopters that could fly surveillance missions, but those aircraft were designed for anti-submarine operations and transport — not assault missions.

Crowe turned to the Army, and some copters assigned to Task Force 160 were ordered to the gulf to replace the Navy copters. The sources said the Army units spent some time this summer training with Navy ships off the East Coast to familiarize themselves with ship-board operations before deploying.

Court overturns Japanese internment convictions

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A federal appeals court on Thursday overturned the wartime conviction of a Japanese-American for resisting curfew and violating military internment order, saying the government had suppressed crucial evidence.

The ruling by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in the case of Gordon Hirabayashi follows similar decisions by lower federal courts in his case and another case, which both relied on the same disclosure — evidence that the imprisonment of 120,000 Japanese-Americans during World War II was done for racial rather than military reasons.

It was the first time a federal appeals court had ruled on the question.

Hirabayashi, a 23-year-old University of Washington senior at the time of his arrest in 1942, and now a 69-year-old retired sociology professor in Edmonton, Alberta, said the ruling was "very good news." However, he said he wanted the decision to be upheld by the Supreme Court.

Noting that Reagan administration officials had offered to drop the convictions but he refused his effort to get a court ruling, Hirabayashi said, "It would be disappointing to me if they suddenly lost their incentive" and did not appeal.

Justice Department spokesman John Russell declined comment on the ruling and said a decision on an appeal to the Supreme Court was weeks away.

Among other things, the department had argued that the case was moot because the convictions cause no current harm to Hirabayashi. Justice Dept. spokesman said, "A United States citizen who is convicted of a crime on account of race is lastingly aggrieved."

Hirabayashi spent a year in custody following his arrest and later convictions for violating a military order to report to a control center as the first step toward placement in a "tent camp" and, for violating curfew. The case is an "attempt to

prevent this sort of thing from happening again," Hirabayashi said.

"The Constitution has guaranteed my protection regardless of race, sex, religion and so on, but it doesn't guarantee that it's going to be applied. The citizens have to be vigilant to see that the Constitution is going to be applied in all cases."

The key document in the case, unearthed in 1982, was the original version of a 1942 report by the military commander on the West Coast,

Lt. Gen. John DeWitt.

In it, DeWitt used a racial stereotype to buttress his argument that all people of Japanese ancestry would have to be evacuated until the end of the war because it would be impossible to separate the loyal from the disloyal.

The report did not say the action was needed because the military emergency allowed no time to conduct which Japanese-Americans were loyal. But the official version

of the report argued that there was a military emergency, and that version was relied on by the Supreme Court in upholding the internment orders.

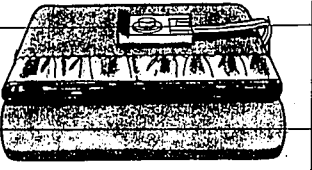
"The reasoning of the Supreme Court would probably have been profoundly and materially affected if the Justice Department had advised it of the suppression of evidence," Schroeder said in the opinion for a unanimous three-member appeals court panel.

Out of more than 110,000 Japanese-Americans held in camps during the war, only a handful — perhaps fewer than 50 — were purged with "violating curfew" or other military orders, said Donald Tamaki, one of a team of lawyers that has worked to overturn the cases. He said Hirabayashi was one of only three to make constitutional challenges, which were rejected by the Supreme Court in 1943 and 1944.

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AIDS book prepared by government

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal government is printing 45 million copies of a new brochure on AIDS and will start distributing the eight-page booklet next week, an administration official said Thursday.

The pamphlet will be distributed through state and local health departments, community-based organizations and large employers, said Campbell Gardett, a spokesman for the Department of Health and Human Services.

The booklet was originally prepared by the Centers for Disease Control for possible mailing to individual households.

Disclosure of the decision to begin distributing the booklet through local outlets came two days after the administration came under criticism from a House subcommittee for not heading a congressional directive for a national mailing.

Gardett said 25 million copies will be available for initial distribution Sept. 30 in conjunction with AIDS Awareness and Prevention Month in October.

Additionally, he said, 2 million copies will be ready by then for distribution to military personnel and their families at home and overseas.

The remainder of the 45-million printing will be available later, perhaps within a month.

Gardett said in an interview that distribution of the new brochure through local outlets "does not preclude the possibility of a mailer."

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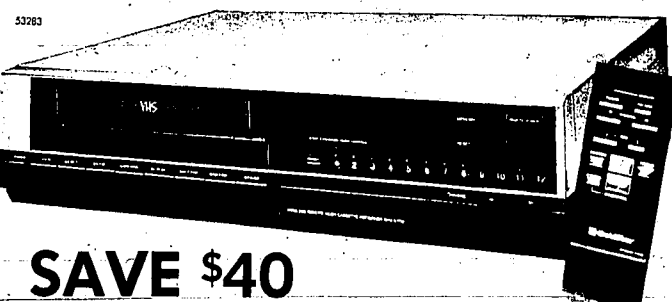
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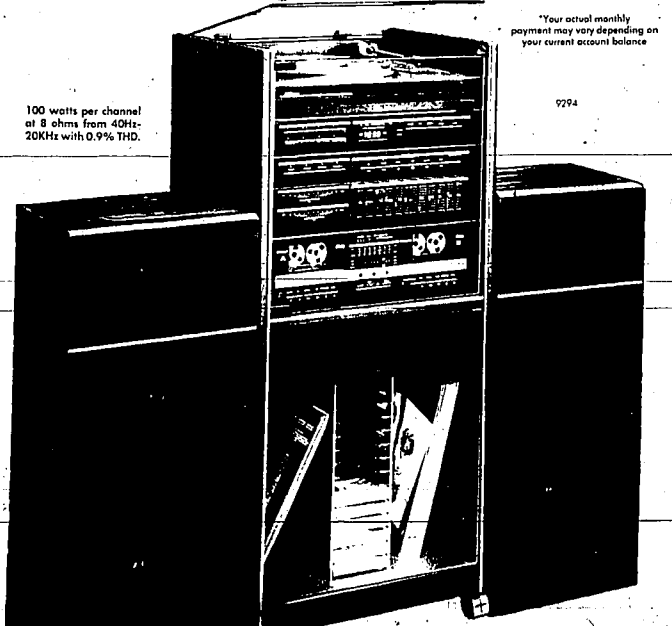
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Evangelist's relationship to Hahn sought by grand jury

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Evangelist John Wesley Fletcher said Thursday he did not force Jessica Hahn to have sex with him and does not know if PTL founder Jim Bakker forced himself on her during a 1980 meeting in a Florida motel room.

"Much of what has appeared in magazines and other media has based only half-truths," Fletcher said in a statement he read after testifying for three hours before a federal grand jury investigating the television ministry. "I told the whole truth, painful as it is."

"I did introduce Jessica Hahn to Jim Bakker, but I have no personal knowledge of what happened after I left," Fletcher said. "I forced no one to do anything." The statement didn't say whether he had sex with her and he refused to answer any questions about it.

Ms. Hahn, in an interview with Playboy magazine released this week, said Fletcher set up her meeting with Bakker and forced her to have sex with him after her sexual encounter with Bakker.

Bakker acknowledged the encounter with Ms. Hahn in March when he resigned from PTL and turned

the ministry over to Jerry Falwell. But Bakker said Miss Hahn seduced him.

Fletcher was asked on his way into the courthouse for a response to Miss Hahn's comments in Playboy that he was "a sick man" who at-

tacked her. Fletcher did not respond, but his attorney, John Norman, sought out the reporter who asked the question after Fletcher had testified.

"When Jessica said that about John Wesley — did she have her clothes on or off?" Norman asked, referring to Miss Hahn's seminude photographs in the magazine. "And lion dollars?"

Fletcher said in his statement he testified only because he was under court order to do so.

"At every turn, I have avoided public comment because of the great harm it causes to the body of Christ," Fletcher said. "Only because I was subpoenaed and required to, I have now given my sworn testimony to the grand jury."

He said he would not answer questions because his statements might impair the grand jury's investigation and because the Bible "warns us to avoid godless chatter which causes others to lose their faith."

"There is no doubt in my mind whatsoever that national attention paid to the PTL situation has and will cause souls to be lost," Fletcher said.

Veteran blames Agent Orange, shoots self, plunges into sea

DARTMOUTH, Mass. (AP) — Allen Scott threw a party for his friends, climbed into a boat the next day, shot himself in the head and tumbled into the sea with a weight tied to his body, friends said.

They said it was Scott's way: choosing to die on his terms rather than cancer's. "He explained his situation to me, and it went a long way toward me not talking him out of it," Scott's friend, James McGrath, said Thursday. "Allen told me he either was in a morphine fog or pretty close to intolerable pain."

"He was a theatrical person, and maybe that's part of it," McGrath said. "He dramatized his death, as a theatrical person would choose. I think it took a whole lot of courage."

A fishing boat found a body with a weight tied to it floating about one mile out of Dartmouth on

Thursday, 16 days after Scott was last seen, officials said. The Coast Guard recovered the body, which was shot once in the head. Police have not positively identified it as Scott's.

McGrath said he learned of his friend's plans only on the day he planned to carry them out. McGrath said he then contacted his attorney.

Scott, who learned he had stomach cancer more than three years ago, left behind a teen-age son and an ex-wife, McGrath said. He blamed his cancer on exposure to the defoliant Agent Orange while a Green Beret in Vietnam.

"When he was really sick, I told him I would take him up to the (Veterans Administration) hospital ... he didn't want to go," McGrath said. "He was really a little upset about Vietnam. He didn't want the government to pay for anything."

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State contract given negotiators' approval

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — Negotiators reached a tentative contract settlement Thursday in the largest strike by state employees in Oregon history.

The agreement came nine days after the Oregon Public Employees Union, the biggest union of state workers, called a strike in a contract dispute that focused mainly on wages. Announcement of the tentative pact came about 11 a.m., more than 15 hours after a bargaining session had begun.

The tentative settlement provides a raise of 2 percent retroactive to July and a 4 percent raise in January 1989. That is equivalent to the state's final offer, said Fred Miller, director of the state Executive Department.

The state's last offer had been for 3 percent raises in January 1988 and again in January 1989. The union had sought raises of 4 1/2 percent retroactive to July and another 4 1/2 percent in July 1988.

Alice Dale, executive director of the union, said the package was enhanced by fringe benefit improvements, including assurance that will pay no deductibles on their medical and dental plans.

"We feel when our members take a look at the package they'll be pleased by it," said Ms. Dale. The final package will cost the state \$8.4 million more than its last offer, she said.

In a prepared statement Thursday, Gov. Neil Goldschmidt

called the tentative settlement "both fair and equitable to the citizens of Oregon and to our employees."

The agreement is subject to approval by the union's 13,000 members, which could take as long as two weeks, union spokesman Bentley Gilbert said.

Since Sept. 16 the union had conducted a "rolling" strike that moved daily among agencies and institutions.

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Nuclear test blast rocks Las Vegas

MERCURY, Nev. (AP) — A nuclear weapons test rocked the desert and shook buildings 105 miles away in Las Vegas as peace protesters joined striking workers who had vowed to shut down the nation's testing program.

Energy Department officials said Thursday's test was successful because the radiation produced from the blast was contained in the ground.

The test, code-named Lockney, was detonated without incident, according to Energy Department spokeswoman Barbara Yoerg.

The test was announced as having an explosive force of up to 150,000 tons of TNT, nearly 12 times the force of the bomb dropped on Hiroshima.

Some 50 union pickets and a handful of anti-nuclear protesters who gathered on a road near the site's main gate site were unable to feel the blast, 45 air miles away. An anti-nuclear protester monitored the blast on a citizens' band radio.

The blast registered 5.6 on the Richter scale at the National Earthquake Information Center in Golden, Colo. The last announced test, Tahoko on Aug. 13, registered 5.7.

Lockney was the 12th announced shot at the test site this year. Not all tests are announced for security reasons.

The blast caused only a shudder at the test site control point, 28 1/2 miles from ground zero, according to Ms. Yoerg. It was felt more distinctly in Las Vegas, where managers of high-rise buildings had been warned not to have workers in precarious positions at the time of detonation.

West German flier requests pardon

MOSCOW (AP) — West German teen-ager Mathias Rust, sentenced to four years in a labor camp for flying his single-engine plane into Red Square, has appealed for a pardon, the official Tass news agency said Thursday.

Rust, whose unhindered May 28 flight across hundreds of miles of Soviet airspace prompted a shakeup in the Soviet military, is still being held in a Moscow jail, Tass said.

“Recently he made an appeal for pardon. The U.S.S.R. Supreme Court will send it to the Presidium of the U.S.S.R. Supreme Soviet,” Tass said.

The request will be “considered in an established procedure,” it said, but did not say when a decision would be reached.

Tass said Rust was in good health.

A Supreme Court panel convicted Rust, 19, on Sept. 4 of illegally crossing the Soviet border, violating international flight rules and mali-

icious hooliganism.

The maximum sentence for the offenses was 10 years in prison. Rust was sentenced to four years in a general regime labor colony, but Soviet authorities have not yet said where he will serve his term.

Western diplomats in Moscow have speculated that Soviet authorities would release Rust early to rid themselves of an embarrassing case.

West German media reported earlier that Rust's parents, who traveled from their hometown of Hamburg, West Germany, to Moscow for the three-day trial, had asked for a pardon for their son.

Rust claimed he made the flight from Helsinki, Finland, to champion world peace. The court found that his flight was an act of self-promotion.

As a result of the daring flight, the head of Soviet Air Defenses was fired and the defense minister, Marshal Sergei L. Sokolov, retired.

British agent's spybook sought

LONDON (AP) — The government will appeal an Australian court ruling allowing publication of the book “Spycatcher” by a former British counterintelligence agent, the prime minister's office announced Thursday.

The ruling by the New South Wales Appeals Court, issued earlier in the day in Sydney, Australia, would be appealed to the High Court of Australia, that country's highest court.

The book was written by Peter Wright, a former official in the MI5 counterintelligence agency. The British government has followed every legal avenue so far to block the book abroad, hoping to deny Wright and his publishers any profits from revealing secrets without authorization.

But “Spycatcher” was pub-

lished this summer in the United States, where U.S. constitutional guarantees of freedom of the press kept the British government from attempting to block publication.

The book quickly became a best seller, and thousands of copies are believed to have reached Britain through the mail or carried by travelers.

Opposition spokesmen urged Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher's government to drop its campaign.

“It is a waste of time and money,” said George Foulkes, foreign affairs spokesman of the Labor Party. “What is more, it is dragging the British government further into ridicule and contempt.”

Soviet minister to visit Cuba

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze will visit Cuba after this week's United Nations session in New York, Tass announced Thursday.

The official Soviet news agency said Shevardnadze will pay a “working visit” to Cuba in early October.

Leftists raid radio station

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Three armed men identifying themselves as members of a leftist guerrilla group raided a Santiago radio station early Thursday but failed to broadcast an anti-government message, the station's director said.

Javier Miranda, director of Radio Viva FM, said the three called themselves members of the Manuel Rodriguez Patriotic Front, which claimed responsibility for the unsuccessful attempt to kill President Augusto Pinochet a year ago.

He said they tied up a security guard and another employee at around 6.30 a.m. and demanded that a prepared text they brought be broadcast.

Soviet officials earlier said Shevardnadze would visit Uruguay, Brazil and Argentina. It was unclear why Cuba was not included then.

Shevardnadze's trip to Latin America could be a prelude to a later visit to the area by Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

Shevardnadze would be the highest-ranking Soviet official to visit the region since 1975.

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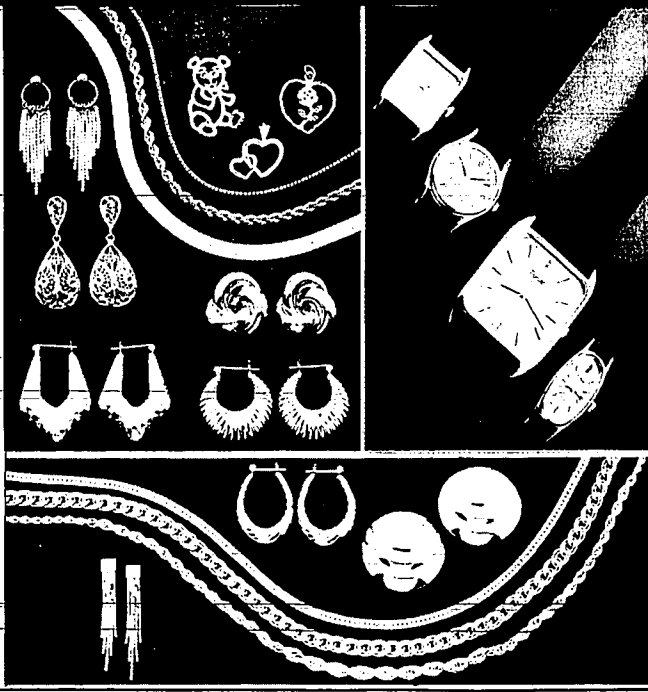

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Jan-Michael Vincent, star of the U.S. television series "Airwolf," was on a helicopter forced to land at Kruger National Park, it was reported Thursday.

Vincent, 42, is visiting South Africa with his wife, Joanne, on a promotional tour for the Checkers supermarket chain.

The Star newspaper, the country's biggest daily, quoted Vincent as saying upon his arrival Sunday, "I wanted to come to South Africa and they paid."

The Vincents were passengers in the helicopter flying to a game reserve Tuesday night, the South African Press Association reported. A secretary and public relations officer were also in the helicopter when bad weather, darkness and a dwindling fuel supply forced the pilot to

land near a lodge in Kruger, the largest game reserve in South Africa, "resulting in a few anxious moments," the news agency said.

The group then completed the trip to Sabi Sabi by road.

Emperor ill after surgery

TOKYO (AP) — Emperor Hirohito, 86, continued to recover steadily Thursday from an operation to bypass a blocked portion of his small intestine, an Imperial Household Agency official said.

"The emperor ... appears to be in excellent spirits," said agency spokeswoman Junko Konno.

In a 2½-hour operation Tuesday, doctors performed a bypass around an intestinal blockage that they said probably was caused an enlargement of his pancreas.

A tissue sample from the pancreas was taken for testing to determine if the emperor has cancer, and results test will be known within a week, doctors said.

Doctors said Hirohito has been fed intravenously since the operation, his first since he became emperor in 1926.

Since his birthday on April 29, the world's longest-reigning monarch had complained of nausea and a full sensation in his stomach.

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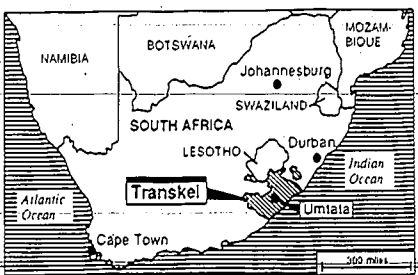

Transkei ministers resign after probe

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) - Six cabinet ministers in the black homeland of Transkei resigned Thursday because of an investigation into corruption that implicated the prime minister, Transkei officials said.

For several hours, South Africa's state radio reported that Transkei's military had seized control of the nominally-independent homeland and placed at least eight Cabinet ministers under house arrest. The South African Broadcasting Corp. later revised its report and said no coup had occurred.

The SABC said Prime Minister George Matanzima was outside the homeland Thursday receiving medical treatment in the city of Port Elizabeth.

Matanzima was accused last week of accepting a \$500,000 bribe. The SABC report said new corruption allegations had been lodged against Matanzima on Thursday and other reports indicated he would not be permitted to continue in office.

Transkei's president, Tuto Ndame, said a tribal chief had been given temporary command of the prime minister's office. Ndame's position is considered less powerful than that of the prime minister.

The SABC and the independent South African Press Association said Transkei soldiers set up road blocks throughout the homeland and searched all government vehicles.

South African Foreign Minister Roelof Botha, who was visiting the African nation of Malawi, issued a

statement saying Ndame said to him "that there has been no coup," that no one had been detained and that the government was continuing normally.

Transkei is one of four black homelands declared independent by the South African government. No other countries, however, recognize them as separate nations.

Botha said he had been kept informed of events in Transkei by the South African ambassador, and "nothing has happened to affect our bilateral relations."

The South African Press Association said Transkei security police had banned all political meetings in the homeland through next Wednesday. Leaders of the governing National Independence Party had planned to meet Monday, and a special session of Parliament was scheduled for Wednesday, reportedly to seek Matanzima's resignation.

The South African government has come under fire recently from critics who say the homeland system is rife with corruption and mismanagement. Those critics are subsidizing amounts of the large subsidies provided by South Africa. In 1986-87, South Africa provided more than 60 percent of Transkei's \$450 million revenues.

Last week, a white business consultant testified before an official Transkei inquiry commission that he had paid Matanzima a \$500,000 bribe on behalf of a construction company that was awarded a \$15 million contract for building 800 houses in Transkei.

Despite talks halt, treaty still possible

TORONTO (AP) - Canada's dream of creating a common market with the United States as a global symbol of free trade appeared over when talks collapsed this week. But 11 days before the final deadline, there were signs Thursday that a treaty is still possible.

"The ball is very much in the American court," Prime Minister Brian Mulroney told Parliament in Ottawa.

A day after chief Canadian envoy Simon Reisman walked out of the free-trade talks in Washington declining, "It's over," Mulroney said Thursday it would be inappropriate for him to contact President Reagan to bypass the negotiators.

But he held open the possibility that the talks could resume. "There is an urgent need for a response from the American side," he told questioners.

International Trade Minister Pat Carney said U.S. Trade Representative Clayton Koppert told her and telephone conversation that the Reagan administration will review its position after Reisman's withdrawal.

"I know the Americans love to negotiate right up to the wire," Carney said.

Business and union leaders said Reisman, a 69-year-old veteran negotiator, was using his final weapon to force concessions on Canada's key demand for a bilateral dispute settlement procedure, such as a binding tribunal, that would bypass U.S. anti-dumping laws.

The emotional, cigar-chomping Reisman denied he was playing games.

"They have not gone a reasonable distance to meet our bottom lines," he said after briefing Mulroney's cabinet. Those bottom lines include a refusal to abandon regional subsidies and a ban on foreign control of cultural industries.

Earlier, U.S. Treasury Secretary James Baker said on NBC-TV, "I don't think we've hit a dead end," and Reagan's press secretary, Martin Fitzwater, said any differences can still be overcome.

"We have said in the past we recognize the need for some kind of dispute-solving mechanism...but there is disagreement over its authority and power and the scope of its abilities to perform those functions," Fitzwater said.

Mulroney used a baseball analogy to explain Canada's insistence on an impartial tribunal. Referring to a weekend pennant-race series between the Toronto Blue Jays and Detroit Tigers, he said: "How would the Tigers like it if the Blue Jays named the officials? They wouldn't like it at all."

Canadians also complained of a lack of political will in Washington.

"The U.S. spends more time on Latin America and Nicaragua than it does on Canada," said Premier Grant Devine of Saskatchewan.

Mulroney has said his "neck is on the line" since he told the nation that a free-trade agreement would treat hundreds of thousands of new jobs.

Peace plan unharmed

UNITED NATIONS (AP) - Costa Rican President Oscar Arias said Thursday that congressional approval of \$3.5 million for Contra rebels won't jeopardize his peace plan for Central America.

The House of Representatives on Wednesday approved the money as non-military aid for the Nicaraguan rebels, to be delivered over 40 days. The measure will be considered in the Senate.

Arias' peace plan, signed Aug. 7 in Guatemala by Central American leaders, calls for suspension of outside aid to warring parties when the plan's general cease-fire in the region is to take effect Nov. 7.

Arias told a United Nations news conference: "The way we should read the approval of \$3.5 million for

humanitarian assistance should be that until Nov. 7 at least we will be given an opportunity to continue in complying with the Guatemala agreement, and that the door of the Congress will not be knocked upon anymore for military assistance."

He said the significance of the approval is that before Nov. 7 he vote will be taken on \$270 million in military aid to the Nicaraguan resistance requested by the Reagan administration.

Arias spoke Wednesday at the U.N. General Assembly and met President Reagan in Washington the day before.

The peace plan was signed by Costa Rica, Guatemala, Nicaragua, El Salvador and Honduras Salvador and Honduras.

Soviet Jew activist Brailovsky allowed to migrate

BEN GURION AIRPORT, Israel (AP) - Soviet Jewish activist Victor Brailovsky tearfully embraced his brother as he arrived in Israel on Thursday after a 15-year wait for an exit visa.

"I always believed I would get here, but now that I'm here I can hardly believe this is true," the 52-year-old bearded mathematician told reporters at Ben Gurion Airport near Tel Aviv.

Brailovsky, his wife, Irina, and their two children are the latest of a growing number of Jews who have received exit permits this year during a Soviet thaw in relations with Israel.

The Soviet authorities issued the Brailovskys a permit on Sept. 7, along with activist Yosef Begun, after repeatedly rejecting their visa applications since 1972.

Brailovsky, who edited a Jewish culture magazine called "Jews in the USSR," was arrested and jailed in 1980. He later spent 30 months in Siberian exile on charges of anti-Soviet slander and returned to Moscow in March 1984.

Michael Brailovsky, 42, who left Moscow 12 years ago, hugged his brother tightly as he greeted him inside the airport terminal Thursday night. Both had tears in their eyes.

Victor Brailovsky told a news conference he did not consider his emigration to be a sign of Soviet liberalization. "Although permission to leave for a few families is important, I cannot say there is a change in the actual policy," he said.

Mrs. Brailovsky, also a mathematician, referred to plans for a U.S.-Soviet summit this year and said, "we hope some improvement in emigration will come out of the meeting."

Their arrival came as most Israelis celebrated the Jewish New Year or Rosh Hashana holiday.



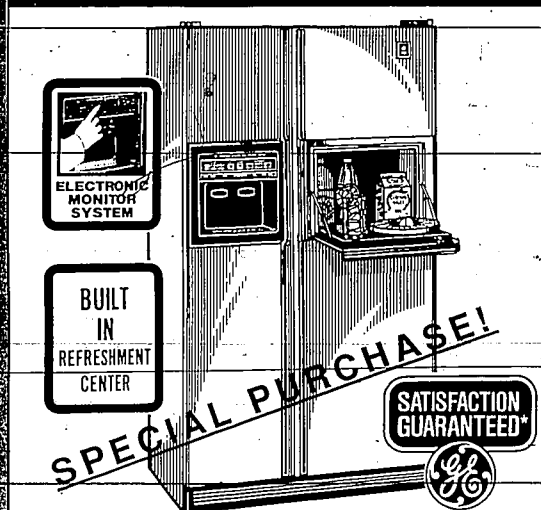
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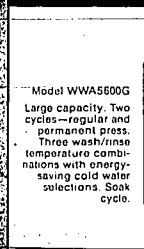
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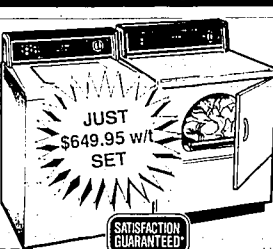
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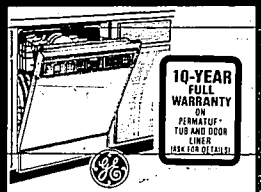
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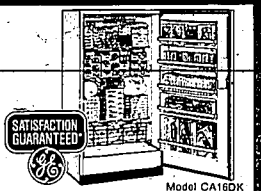


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Stivers to back Kemp; straw polls favor Dole

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls Republican Tom Stivers, the former two-term arch-conservative speaker of the Idaho House of Representatives, will head the Idaho campaign of GOP presidential contender Jack Kemp.

"He fits my political and philosophical mode better than any of the other candidates," Stivers said.

"I think he has more stature than the people of Idaho can support, than any of the others."

Kemp, the Republican congressman from Buffalo, N.Y., who is trailing the front-runners for next year's GOP presidential nomination, said Stivers' "longstanding commitment to the conservative cause and the Reagan Revolution will be an invaluable asset in organizing a successful coalition in Idaho."

Stivers said he believes Idaho's

GOP constituency can better relate to Kemp because he represents "strong, conservative Republicans, and in this state, they went strong for Reagan."

But two straw polls by the state GOP show Kemp trailing in Idaho, said Dave Pearson, state GOP executive director.

"Kemp is pretty well known out here," Pearson said. "Our polls show he's running a respectable third or fourth."

A straw poll in May found 19.42 percent supported Kansas Sen. Bob Dole; 15.60 percent supported Nevada Sen. Paul Laxalt; 15.44 percent supported Vice President George Bush; 14.68 percent supported former Tennessee Sen. Howard Baker, now chief of staff for President Reagan; and 11.62 percent supported Kemp.

Pearson said letters were sent to Idaho Republicans statewide, and 654 people responded.

In August, Pearson said another straw poll was taken after Laxalt withdrew from the race. This time, Dole led with 41 percent support, followed by a three-way tie between former Delaware Gov. Pete du Pont, Kemp and Bush who received 10.7 percent each. In third place were two people not running, Elizabeth Dole, former Transportation Department secretary, and Baker.

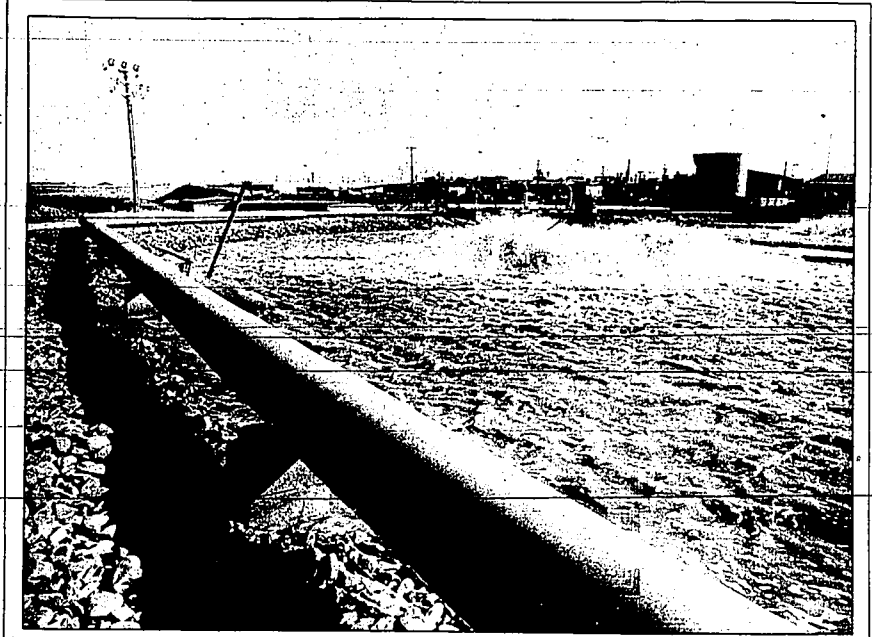
Pearson stressed the polls were unscientific.

Potato processors foresee problem in meeting EPA wastewater rules

TWIN FALLS — The Simplot and Ore-Ida plants in Burley and Heyburn have admitted they may not be able to meet permit requirements for wastewater discharge into the Snake River, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency said.

EPA hasn't decided what it should do about the potential problem. It came to the agency's attention when the companies volunteered the information during a meeting this summer.

"They wanted us to know well in advance they have a problem: If we have to shut the plant, 600 people would be out of work," said Warren McFall, chief EPA's Idaho water section recently.

The Simplot plant in Heyburn employs an average of 1,300 people and Ore-Ida plant west of Burley has an average workforce of 1,000 workers, say company spokesmen. Both are major em-

ployers in the area. Ore-Ida does not anticipate the plant being shut down because of the potential problem, says Jess Eblen, Ore-Ida environmental engineer.

"The ramifications are ominous for the regional economy and the Idaho economy, if we are not able to operate the plant," said Fred Zerza, Simplot spokesman.

Together the plants have an average daily discharge of 6.4 million gallons of treated potato processing wastewater, say spokesmen for Simplot and Ore-Ida. The plants make frozen potato products.

The companies voluntarily went to EPA in July saying they anticipated having trouble because of the low flow in the Snake River, say company spokesmen. The discharge permits issued by EPA have the strictest requirements during periods of low flow.

The problem could crop up in November when storage facilities along the river hold flow for next

year's irrigation needs, says Tim Litke of the state Division of Environment in Twin Falls. Water is low in the river anyway because of the drought, he said.

"We could do nothing and wait and see. Another option is to work out an agreement in advance that lays out a firmer course," said McFall of EPA.

The second course would require the plants to take certain steps in the event violations occur, he said. McFall did not say what the steps might be.

The National Pollution Discharge Elimination System permits were issued under the federal Clean Water Act on April 30, 1987. They expire in April 1992, says DOE.

Penalties for violating NPDES permits are stiff: Civil penalties are \$25,000 per day per violation and there are criminal penalties for negligence of \$2,500 to \$25,000 per day of violation and/or a maximum of one year in prison, said David Heinicke, a deputy EPA

counsel in Seattle.

There are hundreds of such permits up and down the river for everything from fish hatcheries to big food processing plants such as Simplot and Ore-Ida.

Asked why Simplot agreed to the permit if it didn't think it could meet the requirement, Simplot spokesman Zerza said, "we're talking about an unusual situation during low flows."

River flows have not been this low by the Heyburn plant since the 1977 drought, said Zerza.

This is the last time Simplot will face the low-flow problem, Zerza predicted. By mid-1988 an addition to the plant's wastewater treatment facility should be done, he said.

"The project is not on line to help us this time," Zerza said. The effluent at both plants is treated potato processing wastewater. EPA sets limits on the amount of discharge at certain flows because the oxygen in the

water is used up by the oxygen in the wastewater. • See DISCHARGE on Page B2

Pre-school child infected with AIDS

CHALLIS — A pre-school child in Challis has been identified as Idaho's latest victim of acquired immune deficiency syndrome, the first AIDS case reported in the eastern part of the state.

State epidemiologist Charles Brokopp said the child was infected with the deadly disease through a blood transfusion received in infancy to cope with complications after premature birth at a Utah hospital.

The case, reported by the child's physician as required by state law, was only Idaho's second confirmed AIDS case involving a child. It was the 13th AIDS case reported since Idaho became the last state in the nation to record an AIDS case in 1985.

Eight of the victims have died, including the other child, a 12-year-old Ketchum boy. The only child with the disease known to have attended public school in Idaho, he died last month at a San Francisco hospital from complications caused by the disease that he also contracted through a blood transfusion.

The identity of the Challis victim remained confidential outside the small rural community, where officials said initial shock at the news has generally turned to sympathy and concern for the family.

"Other than shock, my reaction was poor child, poor family — other innocent victim who got it through a blood transfusion," said Health District 7 epidemiologist Wanda Evans from the Idaho Falls

headquarters. A special community education program was quickly scheduled for next Wednesday.

"We're concerned and want to get up there as soon as possible and educate the community so there is not the response there was to those three boys in Florida," Mrs. Evans said, referring to the recent case where a family with three children infected with the AIDS virus was forced to leave town after arsonists burned their home.

"We don't want that to happen in Idaho. We're intelligent for that," she said. "There's no reason for people in Challis to panic. Those of us working in the health field are more at risk than those in the general community."

Local physician Sheldon Wendler said community response so far has been generally supportive. But while having treated a few cases of AIDS as a resident in Phoenix, Wendler was surprised to encounter the disease in Challis.

"After moving here, your kind of fall behind in a lot of what's happening and you end up thinking it won't happen here, but I guess that's the way it happens," he said.

Nationally, 600 of the 42,000 reported cases of AIDS involve children, Brokopp said. Most of them, 78 percent, were infected as a result of a parent having the virus, usually passed from mother to infant at birth.

But Brokopp said 17 percent of the children with AIDS were infected as a result of blood or blood-product transfusions.

Pilot medical problems ruled out by autopsy

HAILEY — An autopsy performed in Boise at the request of investigators has tentatively ruled out medical problems as a cause for the Monday night plane crash that killed three people just southeast of the Hailey airport.

Blaine County Coroner Russell Mikel said Thursday that an autopsy on the body of the pilot, Lynn Hoppe, 45, was performed in Boise Wednesday and revealed no signs of heart attack or other medical problems.

"This is a provisional ruling, however," Mikel said. "We will know more definitely after all of the laboratory tests are completed. At this time we are listing the cause of death as severe trauma, related to the crash."

He said the full pathology report should be available in about two weeks. Mikel said the two other victims, Mary Shore, 29, and Dan Sullivan, 25, news staff members

for KTUV in Boise, also died of crash injuries.

Federal investigators from the National Transportation Board have completed their work in gathering evidence and information but expect it will take up to a year for evaluation of that information and a report on what caused the crash.

The Cessna 210, owned by Don's Air Service in Boise and piloted by Hoppe, took off at 9:15 p.m. Monday from the Friedman Memorial Airport in Hailey to return the news team to Boise. It crashed and burst into flames about three minutes later, killing all three persons on board.

Witnesses told investigators that the craft turned to the east and flew into the mountain ridge instead of flying south and out of the valley as it should have done. Since investigators believe the landing gear of the plane was down, they say Hoppe may have been trying to return to the airport, but if so should have circled to the west.

Judge, commissioner eye budget differently

TWIN FALLS — What we may have here is a failure to communicate.

Fifth District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt Jr. said the Twin Falls County Board of Commissioners told him two weeks ago to go ahead and operate the courts as though they received full funding.

The judiciary had requested a budget of more than \$248,900 for the fiscal year that starts Oct. 1. But days before the overall county budget was adopted Sept. 14, the commissioners cut away more than \$78,000 from what the judges wanted for court operations. The commissioners said the projected revenues weren't sufficient to cover the proposed expenditures.

Commission Chairman Judy Felton said Wednesday that the county board told Hurlbutt it is committed to adequate funding

the courts. But the commissioners believe the amount budgeted, \$170,000, will be sufficient. The amount is about \$25,000 less than the present court budget.

Where do disagreements with Hurlbutt is his assumption that the budget published in the legal notices in August, which included the court budget request, is set in concrete. "I'd fly from Moscow, where she was attending a conference."

"The published budget is only tentative and can be reduced," she said.

Hurlbutt said the commissioners told him to proceed with what the courts had originally planned.

"If they tell me to run the courts as submitted, then I will do it. I take them at their word," said Hurlbutt, before leaving this week for a conference in Boise.

Felton said that if the courts do run out of funds during the fiscal year, more funds will be committed to adequate funding. • See BUDGET on Page B2

Kimberly district approves attendance standard

KIMBERLY — The Kimberly School Board has voted unanimously to maintain the school's strict 90 percent attendance rule for another year.

Under the rule, students in seventh and eighth grades who miss more than 18 days each year may be prevented from advancing to the next grade. Students in ninth through 12th grades do not receive credit for classes in which nine days

are missed in a semester.

The school board agreed to continue this requirement because it has helped to maintain high attendance records in the past year, benefiting both the students and the school's finances. School districts receive state funding based on enrollment and daily attendance of students.

In the 1984-85 school year, average student attendance was 93.6 percent. In the next school year, the first year of the 90 percent policy, attendance had jumped to 96.9

percent. Last year attendance also showed a slight gain, with students attending class 97.1 percent of the time.

There will continue to be waivers of this rule for students with hardships. Parents may apply to building principals for hardship excuses at the end of each semester. If the principal agrees with the proposal, the waiver is submitted to the superintendent who may grant or deny the request.

Currently, elementary school children are not included in the 90

percent rule. After some discussion regarding including these students in the rule, the board decided to try other incentive programs to encourage good attendance by younger children.

Enrollment is up again this year for the school district. Twenty-eight more students are enrolled this year than last year. There are fewer seniors this year and a greater number of third graders. Superintendent Richard Baucher said. "I predict 20-plus new students for the year." • See KIMBERLY on Page B2

Good budget news for Minidoka School District

RUPERT — The Minidoka County School District received good news for a change, from its auditors Monday.

For the first time in several years, the district's general fund balance is out of the hole. The balance showed a negative \$180,000 balance at the end of last year, but with a \$308,000 gain over the year, the school now has \$128,000 in the bank.

"That's a pretty substantial in-

crease and should be commended," said auditor Gary Price of the accounting firm Price and Streeter in Burley.

Last year, the board trimmed employees and cut extracurricular activities to put the district in the black.

"It is nice to get an audit that says we are in the black instead of in the red," said Gene Snapp, Minidoka superintendent.

In addition, District Clerk Audrey Newirth told the board the district should make it through September without going in the hole,

for "the first time since I've been here." This is Newirth's fourth year in the position.

The board also approved a \$171,000 emergency property tax levy to cover costs from increased enrollment. The district has 275 more students than last year. The jump is largely due to 179 new kindergarten students in the first year the program has been offered.

Newirth said Wednesday the board could have levied \$400,000 under state law, but budgeted for \$171,000 and stuck with that figure.

The board got to its scheduled business after waiting 45 minutes for Trustee Warren Snyder to join Chairman Bob Hartman and Trustee Russell Holland so they could have a quorum. They then adjourned to an executive session for one hour for a suspension hearing.

The board also:

- Told Snapp to purchase two or three computers for the administrative offices with the capability to keep the district's books. The board also granted Snapp's request to examine the possibility of replacing

Court reverses malpractice ruling

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court has reversed a district judge's decision to grant a new trial, after the judge concluded he had misinformed the jury about the applicable law.

The court ruled 3-2 on Wednesday to reinstate the original verdict, which went in favor of Dr. Stephen C. Green, Twin Falls, in a medical malpractice lawsuit.

After the jury returned its verdict, Oliver concluded he had misinformed the jury and granted a motion for a new trial.

Green appealed, and the Supreme Court reinstated the original verdict. It held that a court decision relied upon by Oliver in deciding to allow a new trial did not apply in this case.

In another decision announced Wednesday, the court ordered new proceedings in a disability claim filed by Patricia L. Vernon, an employee of Omark Industries, Lewiston.

The woman claimed lifting at work caused her to suffer disabling back injuries. The Industrial Commission concluded there was no competent and substantial evidence to support her claim.

The Supreme Court reversed the finding, and ordered the Industrial Commission to enter specific findings of fact or law to support its ruling.

Plane in accident; three may be hurt

TWIN FALLS — An airplane apparently overran the east end of the Twin Falls-Sun Valley Regional Airport shortly before midnight Thursday, causing a fire.

"Probably three have been injured, but we don't know any more than that," said Mary Burkowski, night house supervisor at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center in Twin Falls.

Bob Molyneux, who lives in the area of the airport, said he heard "a big thump" and saw flames at the east end of the runway.

A Federal Aviation Administration inspector, Bob Roundtree, was due to arrive on the scene at about 3:30 a.m., a county official said.

No further details on the incident were available at press time.

At trial, District Judge Arthur P. Oliver, since retired, instructed the jury that it should hold the doctor's treatment against a local standard of care, not a national standard of care.

Two outside experts testified that it was common to perform a test on the amniotic fluid surrounding a fetus in such cases, but not in Twin Falls, where the local practice went against such tests.

Shortly after the commissioners advised Hurlbutt, who is the trial court administrator for the 5th Judicial District, that they were going to cut the court budget, Hurlbutt issued an administrative order. The order put the commissioners on notice that the court will obligate the county to find enough funds to meet the budget request.

In the order, Hurlbutt acknowledged the reason for the reduction and the fact that the commissioners could not increase the budget after it was published to make way for a tax levy to supplement the courts.

The courts in Twin Falls County are mostly self-supportive through fines and fees.

Hurlbutt also wrote in the order that the budget proposal for the operation of the court was "necessary and reasonable."

By this order, the Twin Falls County Commission is on notice that this court shall obligate Twin Falls County for the necessary and reasonable court functions as reflected in the court budget request.

The commissioners agreed with the order, Felton said. Hurlbutt may be concerned that the budgeted amount will go dry.

"We haven't had a chance to talk with him," she said.

The commissioners and judiciary will probably meet again to discuss the budget, she said.

The judiciary had sought an increased court budget over this year to add a third law clerk for the magistrate judges and provide raises to the two other law clerks. About \$10,000 was proposed for expenses related to a grand jury proposed by Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter.

The increase also reflected the addition of a part-time jury commissioner and full-time jury clerk, hired after Hurlbutt and another judge ruled the county jury selection process was inadequate.

The additional personnel was necessary to ensure maximum court efficiency and would be sufficient for years to come, Hurlbutt said in a previous interview with The Times-News.

But days before adopting the budget, the commissioners ripped off \$78,981 from the proposed court budget when they realized that projected court revenues from fines and fees would only amount to \$170,000. They eliminated the third law clerk position and cut salaries

of the two law clerks. About \$48,000 was taken out of the operating budget, which included items such as supplies, equipment repair and the law library.

When the reductions were announced, the commissioners said there was leeway for the courts. Even with the cut to the "A" or salary budget of the courts, there was still \$66,000 more than this year.

In addition, there was \$55,000 unspent in the entire court budget with only one month to go in the present fiscal year, the commissioners pointed out.

There may be even more breathing room, Felton said Wednesday. The \$10,000 proposed and approved by the commissioners for grand jury expenses may not all be spent.

"I don't think she (Baxter) intends to go in a major way, with a grand jury," Felton said.

Once the commissioners put the funds into the budget, judiciary can spend any amount in the court budget, she added. And, the judges may go ahead and add the new clerk.

In order to accomplish what they had planned, the judiciary may shift around different line items within the "A" budget or within the "B" or operating budget. Items may even be made between the "A" and "B" budgets.

river can only process so much organic material at one time, says Litke of DOE. The river must have adequate oxygen to support aquatic life.

The discharge also contains ammonia. Ammonia can be toxic in some instances and in its reduced form, ammonia also makes demands on the river's oxygen, Litke said.

He said he would have to check records to determine if Simplot or Ore-Ida had any permit violations.

Zerza said Simplot exceeded limits for oxygen demand during the 1977 drought, also a period of low flow. However, he said the company determined that the oxygen levels in the river remained high. "We didn't degrade the river in terms of reduced dissolved oxygen,"

he said. Eblen, the Ore-Ida environmental engineer, says if a problem occurs, it will be during periods of low river flow during midwinter.

Asked how Ore-Ida anticipated having a possible problem, Eblen said, the company was aware of the limits, if there is a low-flow situation. The limited snowfall last year caught the company's attention, he said.

The permits at both plants have three steps based on the level of the river. The lower the flow, the less discharge allowed.

For instance, when the river is flowing at 500 to 1100 cubic feet per second, Simplot has a limit of 3,735 pounds of demand on oxygen per day. Zerza said. At 600 cfs flow, the limit is even lower, 2,000 per day, he said.

The river is flowing at about 6,

800 cubic feet per second, said the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation in Burley on Thursday.

Before the wastewater at both plants is discharged, it goes through a biological treatment process, the companies say.

Eblen of Ore-Ida says the plant will continue to process potatoes during period of low river flow.

Asked if the plant could process more potatoes during periods of high river flow, Eblen said it would probably take an action within the plant to minimize the possibility of violating the permit.

"There are limitations what you can do. Otherwise, you would have to totally shut the factory down," he said.

Zerza of Simplot says the basic question is what is the best way to deal with the situation.

Utah polygamist Evoniuk missing, California officers suspect murder

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — California detectives investigating the disappearance of polygamist Leo P. Evoniuk say he was killed or has pulled off an elaborate ruse faking his death.

Evoniuk was investigated by Utah authorities last year in connection with a letter threatening death to residents of two polygamist communities on the Utah-Arizona border. He disappeared later in California.

Investigators say they hesitate to declare Evoniuk dead partly because one of Evoniuk's former religious associates, Dan Jordan, once fooled the FBI into believing for years that he had been killed. Lloyd Gray, chief of detectives for the Santa Cruz County sheriff's office, said Monday that the investigation into the disappearance of Evoniuk has been suspended because all immediate leads have been checked and exhausted. But

he said he isn't totally convinced that Evoniuk is dead.

Police became involved when Evoniuk failed to return from a May 27 business meeting in a rural area near Santa Cruz. Foul play was suspected when spent cartridges, a large amount of blood and a partial denture were found at the site.

But Gray said detectives were never able to ascertain Evoniuk's blood type, so they were unable to confirm that the blood was his. Neither could they learn who had performed Evoniuk's dental work, so they could not link the denture to him.

"He is either deceased or is part of an elaborate scheme to make it appear that he is dead," Gray said in a telephone interview. "I know his family is in the process of having him declared dead, but that is a civil matter."

Gray said his department had been warned by other agencies, in-

cluding Utah officials who are more familiar with groups that have splintered from The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, that a similar leader faked death once before.

Dan Jordan and Evoniuk both were followers at one time of Ervil LeBaron. LeBaron died of natural causes in Utah State Prison after being convicted of masterminding the 1977 murder of rival polygamist leader Rulon Alford in Murray, Utah.

Jordan was believed by the FBI to have died in a gun fight in Mexico. He had been a suspect in the murder of LeBaron's brother Joel in Sonora, Mexico.

However, when the FBI raided LeBaron followers in connection with the Alford case, they found Jordan living with them, according to the book "Prophet of Blood," by Dale Van Atta and Ben Bradlee Jr.

Wallace set to celebrate centennial

WALLACE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus will take a train ride and a horse-drawn carriage ride here Saturday. It's part of Wallace's centennial observance.

Sponsors said Saturday's celebration will be similar to an 1887 event marking the first railroad line to Wallace.

Town founder Col. William Wallace said then, "We see with pride the steps of progress made to connect us with the outside world. We hear with delight the whistle of the locomotive that speaks to us a new era," he said.

The railroad isn't as important to the community now, but the centerpiece of the celebration will be dedication of the 1902 Northern Pacific Depot Railroad Museum.

The depot was in use for 78 years before being relocated in 1980 to make way for an Interstate 90

bypass. The depot was constructed of concrete and bricks made in China and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Businessman Harry Magnuson, who is president of the Northern Pacific Depot Foundation, is master of ceremonies.

Andrus and other officials will ride from Kellogg to Wallace in a train used by President Jimmy Carter in his 1976 presidential campaign.

Horse-drawn carriages, dating to 1887, will be used in a parade.

Also scheduled is the striking of a one-ounce silver round marked with a logo of the depot on the front, and a logo of Wallace on the back. It is to be presented to Joan Sellers, great-granddaughter of the community's founder.

Consumers to receive legal late fee

BOISE (AP) — Late charges may be legally imposed on most consumer credit transactions, an attorney general's opinion says.

But such charges are not to be listed under "finance charges" but must be stated separately as "other" charges, the opinion said Thursday.

State Finance Director Belton

Patty asked whether it is lawful for late charges to be imposed on open-end credit accounts, or interest-bearing consumer credit transactions.

If a consumer does not make a payment on time, technically the consumer is in default of a loan agreement, the opinion said. That allows the lender to collect a "late charge."

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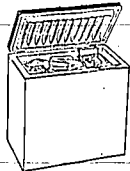
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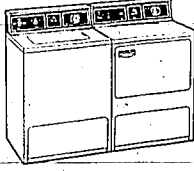
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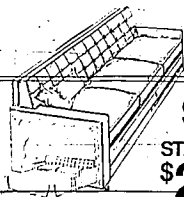
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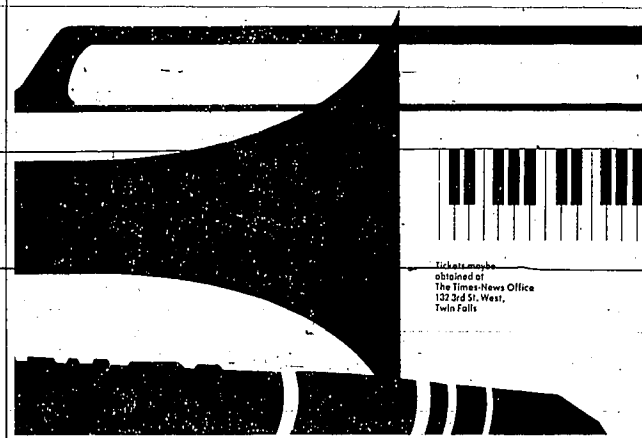

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Prep football weekend

NFL talks remain in stalemate

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Talks aimed at ending the NFL strike stalled Thursday with two key management negotiators heading home, the weekend's games wiped out and the two sides as far apart as ever on free agency.

The owners' chief negotiator, meantime, said that six to eight weeks of hard bargaining remained even if the free agency issue is resolved.

On Sept. 11 at the picket lines, confrontations continued as players at three camps tossed eggs, beer bottles and smashed windows of vans carrying substitutes to work. One player, Charles Martin, was arrested and charged with disorderly conduct.

Talks recessed Thursday evening and were scheduled to resume at 9:30 a.m. Friday.

"There's nothing further to talk about," Tex Schramm, president of the Dallas Cowboys, said before leaving town with Dan Rooney, the Pittsburgh Steelers' president.

"Neither side moved from their position," he said. "If this is the only issue that is prolonging the strike, then it could be a long one."

Union head Gene Upshaw said: "They told us, as far as free agency, that if it was 30 years they would not give one guy freedom. So we got problems."

The union wants unrestricted free-agency for players with more than four years' experience; the owners have only offered to reduce the compensation teams receive when players go elsewhere.

Jack Donlan, the owners' negotiator, also gave no indication that a quick end was near.

"I think I've been saying for about two weeks we've got from six to eight weeks of real hard bargaining on a lot of issues and I honestly believe that we could get there on those issues except for the issue of free agency," he said.

Donlan also said that while it might take as long as two months to find a new contract, the strike could be settled immediately if an agreement in principle is reached. "We've got to get to work," he said, "but that doesn't mean players can't be playing. I'd love to see them back."

Donlan and Upshaw continued to bargain into the night Thursday. "At this point we have not made any progress," Upshaw said after nearly eight hours of talks.

"Management has made the point that they will not compromise at all. They take all our issues and say they are union and not player issues."

According to Upshaw, Schramm told union negotiators: "The owners are the stewards of the game and the players are transients."

"That's like saying they are the ranchers and we are the cattle and they can always get more cattle," Upshaw said.

But he also said, "We are going to continue to bargain if it takes two hours, two days, two weeks. We want to reach an agreement."

Donlan, however, hinted it might be time to end the talks.

"There comes a time when both sides have to take a step back and evaluate where they are," he said.

Management sources said the departure of Schramm and Rooney might not necessarily keep the two sides from finding common ground on lesser issues that could expedite a settlement.

The walkout by Schramm and Rooney came at about 1:30 p.m., two hours after Commissioner Pete Rozelle announced that this week-end's games were off.

"The 14 National Football League games scheduled for Sunday and Monday Sept. 27 and 28 will not be played because of the players' strike," Rozelle said in a statement.

The league said it was unsure if the games would be canceled altogether or played at a later date, and the NFL's 28 teams continued with plans to use replacements for games beginning Oct. 4-5.

In 1982, when a 67-day strike wiped out seven of 16 games, one extra game was played at the end of the season.

Union president Marvin Powell of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers said he had hoped Schramm and Rooney wouldn't go.

"I wish they would stay to see this thing through to the end but you can't bargain with yourself," he said. "If they go, I just hope and pray another opportunity is afforded us very soon. Maybe not in this city but somewhere else."

Powell said that little had been done during the 8 1/2 hours of bargaining that ended close to 3 a.m. Thursday morning. He also said management was focusing on free agency while the union was trying to emphasize it was only one issue in the package.

"There were a few things said that really upset us but we know that's part of the negotiating process. It's still too early for any hopes to get up," he said.

Meanwhile, in Indianapolis, quarterback Gary Hogeboom defied the union, as he said he would, and arrived for work. Offensive tackle Bill Leach of the Saints did the same in New Orleans.

In Green Bay, Wis., Charles Martin, who was waived by the Packers earlier this week, was charged with disorderly conduct for allegedly throwing an egg at a non-striking player.

In Anaheim, Calif., one unidentified Los Angeles Rams player pushed his fist through a window of a van carrying replacements. Defensive end Doug Reed splattered the van with eggs and shouted, "Go home, strikebreakers."

"It's hard to be out there and see people take your job," said Rams linebacker Mel Owens.

"It was practically the same thing happened in Indianapolis, where striking Colts threw eggs at a bus."

In Sharon, Mass., Patriots nose tackle Tom Williams tossed a beer bottle that landed a few feet from a car carrying replacements.

Twin Falls (2-2) at Bonneville (2-2)

Twin Falls has never beaten Bonneville in Idaho Falls, and the Bruins will have to win tonight at 7:30 p.m. at Stinger Stadium to have a shot at making the Class A-1 Division I playoffs. This isn't the Bonneville of the past, however, with a veer offense triggered by a quick quarterback, big running backs and an outsize tight end of two. The Bees are throwing the ball 87 percent of the time and struggling on defense (293 yards per game).

Key matchup: Bonneville senior quarterback Eric Madson against statistically the best pass defense in the Gem State Conference (104 yards per game). Radio: KLIX-FM.

Rigby (0-3) at Minico (1-3)

This 1 p.m. Saturday game at Rupert is a must-win for the Spartans, who have lost three straight, including a 49-28 setback at the hands of Skyline two weeks ago that put Minico one down in its Class A-1 Division II playoff pod. Rigby is winless in three games this season, is in the middle of potato harvest and has five starters injured, but still ranks third in the Gem State Conference in rushing defense.

Key matchup: Minico quarterback Jack Bagley, responsible so far for 63 percent of the Spartans' offense, against a Rigby defensive line that will be gunning for him in the absence of Minico running back Jason Duncan, who is out with a separated shoulder.

Burley (1-3) at Buhl (4-0)

This 7:30 p.m. "South-Central Idaho" Conference at Bowers Field will be an emotional game for the Indians, ranked third in the latest Associated Press poll. Burley knocked off Buhl 10-7 in Burley last fall, and the Indians would love to repay the favor. The "Cats" are going have to find a way to stop the Buhl veer offense, which has gotten progressively better through the first four games.

Key matchup: Burley defensive ends Garin Granata and Trent Henry against Buhl offensive tackles Chad Montgomery and Travis Bybee. Granata and Henry are going to have to control the fleet Buhl running backs, and nobody has done that yet against Montgomery and Bybee. Radio: KLIX-AM (Twin Falls), KBAR-AM (Burley).

Key matchup: Simis, hampered by a hamstring pull, against the young Filer defensive line, which managed to generate a consistent pass rush against Castleford and Declo.

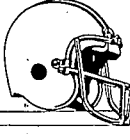
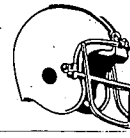
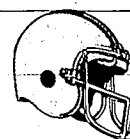
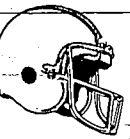
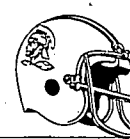
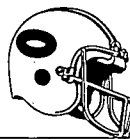
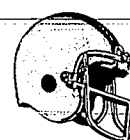
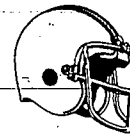
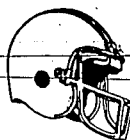

The bad blood was caused by what the Blue Jays perceived as a block by Lind's glove into center field in the opener of a big four-game series in the American League East.

BOSTON (AP) — Doyle Alexander, pitcher extraordinaire in recent days, is history in the Atlanta Braves' hall of mediocrity, and the Detroit Tigers consider themselves fortunate to have him.

Alexander, who was 5-10 with the Braves this year, was traded to Detroit Aug. 12 for a minor league player. He is 8-0 with the Tigers and a major reason why Detroit is battling the Toronto Blue Jays for the American League East title.

"Nobody is that good," Detroit Manager Sparky Anderson said Wednesday night after watching Alexander blanket the Boston Red Sox 4-0 with a two-hitter.

Leading pitcher Bruce Hurst, 15-12, loser of six of his last seven decisions, sounded like he wanted

tips from Alexander when he called the Detroit right-hander "a pitching clinic."

"He knows exactly where the ball is going," Anderson said. "You watch the hitters and he knows what they like. He also uses the ballpark to his advantage. ...He'll make them (batters) hit the right way, lefties to the left, righties to the right."

During his 17-year major league career, Alexander, 37, has pitched for several teams, including the Los Angeles Dodgers, Baltimore Orioles, New York Yankees, Texas Rangers, Toronto, Atlanta and now Detroit. During his travels, he has beaten all 26 major league teams.

Alexander is modest about his accomplishments with the Tigers.

"I don't throw anything special," he said. "I throw a fastball, a little sinker, a changeup, an occasional breaking ball."

"I'm just fortunate things have worked out my way."

With Detroit, Alexander has pitched 70 innings, allowing only 11 earned runs and two home runs. In nine starts, he has pitched three shutouts and combined with reliever Mike Henneman for two others. His earned run average is a sparkling 1.40.

"He's unbelievable, one of the most amazing pitchers I've ever seen," Detroit veteran Bill Madlock said.

"The batters don't know how he does it," Boston Manager John McNamara said.

Against the Red Sox Wednesday night, Alexander allowed only a pop fly single by Ellis Burks and a sharp single through the hole to right by Marty Barrett in the first inning. The only other Boston batsman was Spike Owen, who walked with two out in the second. The next 22 batters went down in order.

Alexander struck out three and walked only one in running his lifetime record in the month of September to 20-3, including 5-0 with the Tigers.

"Walter Johnson in his prime wasn't doing that," Anderson said.

"I wish I knew what happens in September," Alexander said. "I know, I'd do it all year."

Although Sunday's NFL game has been called off because of the players' strike, there will be live professional football on television this weekend.

Starting at midnight Friday, ESPN will telecast the championship game of Australian Rules Football from Melbourne.

"It's not the NFL, but it is professional football," ESPN spokesman Chris LaPlaca said. "These guys are professionals. They get paid."

The title game, called the Grand Final, features a rematch of last year's championship contest between the Carlton Blues and Hawthorn Hawks. Hawthorn won the 1986 game, 110-68.

"In Australian football, 68 points is actually low," LaPlaca said.

While NBC, CBS and ABC scramble to find programs to fill the NFL void, ESPN can afford to take a wait-and-see approach because its first regular-season NFL telecast isn't scheduled until Nov. 8.

"We're optimistic the strike will be settled by that time," LaPlaca said. "We're not even going to think about sea games. That's six weeks away."

Because it's an all-sports network, ESPN could easily plug the NFL gap with other live sports shows in its inventory. But the loss of the games would be a major set-

back for the cable network, which has been heavily promoting its NFL coverage.

"Things have been going so smoothly, and now everything is disrupted," LaPlaca said. "It is unsettling."

Striking players aren't the only ones upset by the prospect of sea games.

Ford and Chrysler say they won't advertise on NFL games played with free agents and non-striking veterans.

"We bought (advertising) time for the game and the Bears, not the Cooks Monsters," Chrysler spokesman B.P. Moon/Mullins said. "It's like buying a blue New Yorker and instead they ask you to take a green one and no stereo."

A 30-second spot on an NFL telecast can cost an advertiser up to \$200,000. The price is based on the anticipated size of the viewing audience, as determined by previous ratings.

NBC will replace its normal NFL coverage Sunday with baseball games featuring teams involved in tight pennant races.

Most of the country will see the American League East battle between the Detroit Tigers and the Oakland Athletics. The St. Louis Cardinals-Chicago Cubs game will be shown in parts of the Midwest.

Bell looms as American League's MVP

TORONTO (AP) — No one disputes George Bell's statistics. The numbers are impressive enough to make the Toronto Blue Jays' left fielder a leading candidate for the American League's Most Valuable Player Award.

It's his character that's in question.

Bell was the major league leader in runs batted in (132) and home runs (47) going into Thursday night's game against Detroit.

"It is my honest opinion that Bell has carried the Toronto ball club more than I have done for the Tigers," said Detroit shortstop Alan Trammell, considered Bell's chief rival for MVP honors.

Like most free swingers, Bell anxiously avoids walks. Unlike most free swingers, he hits for average and only occasionally strikes out. He was the top 10 among American League batters with a .312 average and had struck out 70 times in 570 at-bats.

"George Bell is a great hitter," said rookie Mark McGwire of the Oakland Athletics, who says Bell got the home-run title. "I love to watch George Bell hit."

Detroit Manager Sparky Anderson doesn't share that enthusiasm, at least not during the heat of a pennant race. He resolved before this weekend's four-game series between the teams to make his pitch-

ers issue walks — or at least unhittable pitches — to Bell.

"He may hurt me, but I don't want him to beat me," Anderson said. "I can live with whoever follows George Bell, but I ain't going to live with George Bell."

In past years, Anderson wouldn't have had to worry about Bell, at least in September. Last season, the Jays played for the title contenders to fourth-place finishers with a 13-18 September record.

Bell, who had hit .342 in August, including 10 doubles, four homers, 17 RBI and six strikeouts, dipped to .246 in September and October. During the slump, he had six doubles and four homers, drove in 13 runs and struck 19 times. From 1984 to 1986, Bell averaged .248 in September and October.

So far in September this year, Bell has 23 hits in 16 games for a .398 average, six homers, 19 RBI and four game-winning hits.

He already has set club records in hits scored (109), homers and RBI. He led the league in runs scored and slugging percentage (.628), and was seventh in hits with 176.

"When you have a guy like George Bell and he's having an MVP year, he's really taken us over the hump," centerfielder Lloyd Moseby said.

"George Bell carried us on his shoulders for a good part of this

summer," said right fielder Jesse Barfield, who hit a league-leading 40 homers last year.

Bobby Cox, who managed Toronto from 1982 to 1985, said a key ingredient to Bell's success is his lack of fear at the plate.

"He's got a lot of guts," Cox said.

"I've gone through too many things to let anyone put me out of baseball," Bell said in a magazine interview earlier in the season.

A stray pitch broke his jaw in 1982 and, hit by Bruce Kison in 1985, Bell charged the mound and delivered a karate kick at the Boston pitcher, Bill Buckner, then the Red Sox first baseman, called Bell "the dirtiest player in the league." The rap stuck.

Bell has argued with umpires, drop-kicked his helmet when replaced by pinch runners, and vociferously denounced Manager Jimmy Williams' occasional attempts to use him as a designated hitter.

But, said Barfield, Bell is mellowing.

Bill Wegman of Milwaukee fractured the tip of Bell's nose with a "rising fastball" three weeks ago. Bell fell to the ground, bled profusely, came back the next night and hit a home run. He didn't charge the mound.

Not well known is that Bell's a lively, often mischievous raconteur in the clubhouse and generous with

his time and money to charities.

Two weeks ago, Baltimore coach Frank Robinson offered Bell cash to autograph some baseballs. Bell agreed to give an hour of his time at a Baltimore promotion, asked Robinson to determine the amount he should charge, and donated the money to a charity of Robinson's choice.

Though he does not publicize his actions, Bell gives money to youth-oriented charities in his native Dominican Republic; where he's also built a home for his mother.

But the macho reputation lingers — as does Buckner's quote, largely because Bell is reticent about talking to the media about his personal affairs, or even his baseball accomplishments.

Much has been made of Bell's willingness only to do interviews for television broadcasters.

Bell said he does not want to complicate his game by causing trouble for himself in the newspapers. He's learned by experience. In 1985, he engaged umpires during the league championship series by suggesting they were prejudiced against a Canadian-based team and Dominican players.

During on-camera victory celebrations after the division clincher that year, he campaigned openly for team MVP honors.

Game sites becoming college problem

Disagreements over game sites, such as the one brewing between Auburn, which wants to play on campus, and Alabama, which wants to keep the annual regular-season windup in supposedly neutral Birmingham, are nothing new.

Auburn and Tennessee, which met at Knoxville Saturday, had a similar squabble during the early 1970s.

Auburn's home games against Tennessee had been played at Birmingham's 76,000-seat Legion Field since the series was renewed in 1956. The Tigers wanted to move the 1970 game to Auburn, where the stadium's seating capacity had been increased from 44,000 to 64,000 and now is 85,000.

Tennessee refused, citing contractual agreements and tradition and what it perceived as Auburn's lack of ability to handle a big crowd. Auburn insisted the home team should

have the right to play its games where it wanted.

Tennessee threatened to drop the series rather than play at Auburn but the Vols agreed to go there on a trial basis in 1974. The true home-and-home series began in 1980.

Now, Alabama doesn't want to play at Auburn. Unless you've been there, you might wonder why Auburn is known as the "Loveliest Village on the Plains."

Stock market moves down as interest rates climb higher

NEW YORK AP—The stock market took a downward turn Thursday, giving up much of its strong gain in the two previous sessions as the face of rising interest rates.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks fell 19.58 points to 2,558.42, its lowest level since May 15, 1986.

Volume on the New York Stock Exchange soared to 161.75 million shares from 125.92 million in the previous session. Activity was stimulated by the commencement of hostilities in the Persian Gulf.

One apparent drag on the market was a rise in open-market interest rates. Prices of Treasury government bonds, which move in the opposite direction from interest rates, fell about \$10 for each \$1,000 in face value.

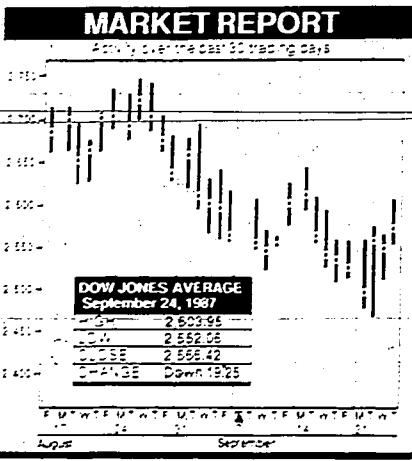
Some traders also were concerned that the market's upward tilt was expiring the end of the "retrograde" that hit in late last month.

Analysts said investors were looking ahead to a meeting that will be held in Washington of the World Bank's Group of Seven industrialized countries, and its possible implications for the dollar in foreign exchange.

"There are more and stronger movements than there were several months ago," said John Gorman, chief of the National Institute of Financial Analysts in the market.

"We are now far removed from the time when all financial assets were going up."

Leaders among the blue chips included Merck, down 4 1/2 at 59; General Electric, down 1 1/2 at 61; Coca-Cola, down 1/2 at 48 3/8; IBM, down 1/2 at 59 1/4; McDonald's, down 1/2 at 67 1/4; American Express, down 1/2 at 55 1/4.



But International Business Machines gained 1 1/2 to 155 1/2, among several computer and technology stocks that boosted the downturn.

Logan Equipment added 1/2 to 15 1/2; Computer Sciences 1/4 to 57 1/4; and Compaq Computer 1/4 to 65 1/4.

State's prime for venture capital

BOISE AP— Idaho is at a unique moment in its history, says Gov. Cecil Andrus.

"We are united in our desire to create a climate in this state where more businesses and more entrepreneurs who have that good idea can prosper," Andrus said Thursday, in a speech to the Venture Capital Conference here.

But he said good business ideas are not enough. It takes money, commonly called venture capital.

"Venture capitalists generally like to do business close to home, and the government should be a part of life that does the venture capital companies are in the population centers, not small states such as Idaho."

He said Idaho is making a renewed effort to land venture capital for the state. The Department of Commerce is compiling a list of about 1,000 venture capital companies, and how they can be contacted.

"It's a hard job to sell, tough businessmen on new ideas, Andrus said, but it can be done.

"Perhaps more than a lot of other people in this country, Idahoans are innovators. We always have been. You need not no farther than any one of our corporate headquarters in this town to see that in almost every case, our major businesses, our biggest employers began with one or two individuals with a good idea, a dream — but very little money," Andrus said.

Andrus said only one of 100 proposals to venture capitalists was appointed, but Idaho businessmen can improve that average through conferences such as the one which opened here Thursday.

"Armed with the proper kind of presentation, we can get more of our people in that exclusive 1 percent bracket, those who get the financing they need," the governor said.

Demand increases low fall air fares

NEW YORK AP— The first five days of autumn traditionally bring a reduction in air fares as summer vacations end and passenger traffic thins.

But this year, the major airlines seem to be trying in the face of competition by actually raising some fares, emboldened by remarkably strong passenger demand.

The momentum that we saw in the summer is continuing into the fall," said James V. Cammisia, a travel consultant who is the editor and publisher of Travel Industry International's New York-based newsletter.

"It's not that major airlines are upping fares, but some airlines are upping fares, but some airlines are upping fares, but some airlines are upping fares," Cammisia said.

Rising fuel costs also have contributed to higher fares, and the trend toward higher airfares is likely to continue in the near future, observers believe.

The trend is upward without question. It's only a question of how much and how quickly," said Edward Sussman, an industry analyst for investment firm PaineWebber Inc.

Demand for plane seats, while fueled partly by a buoyant economy, has actually been growing faster than the economy itself. That's largely because of airline deregulation, which has put more Americans in the air by stimulating competition and lowering fares, analysts suggest.

The U.S. airline industry was deregulated with great fanfare in 1978, freeing airlines to set their own schedules, destinations and fares. One of the goals was to stimulate competition and reduce the cost of flying.

Deregulation made habitual users of "people who" formerly shunned planes for other modes of transportation. And they were enticed by an explosion of cheap fares — like the popular "Massaver" tickets that must be purchased in advance — as the airlines waged war for a piece of the market.

But while fares are still generally cheaper than they were before deregulation, the days of super low fares may well be numbered. The speculative climate created by deregulation led to the absorption of many smaller airlines by major carriers, which are less likely to offer no-frills, cut-rate fares than their high-flying smaller competitors.

"There's more stability that's coming to the whole air fare structure," Cammisia said. "I think we're seeing the end of vicious discounting."

And while fares are generally going up, they're also getting more complicated.

As they've gotten accustomed to operating under deregulation, the airlines have become increasingly sophisticated in selling seats on the same flight at many different prices to maximize revenue.

Several weeks ago, the major carriers got caught up in a round of intricate changes, involving fare increases, lightening of advance-purchase requirements and cancellation penalties, and other revisions. Rather than match each other's changes fit-for-fat, as they normally do, the big airlines each brought out their own tailor-made programs. Fares also vary by day of the week, time of day and geographical market.

Australian conglomerate continues push into beer market

Bond Corp Holdings Ltd. the Australian conglomerate, continued its push into the American beer market Wednesday by agreeing to pay an estimated \$1.2 billion for G. Heileman Brewing Co., the nation's fourth-largest brewer.

The deal, which gives Bond such regional brands as Henry Weinhard's, Colts, Lone Star and Rammer, was reached after Heileman rejected a hostile \$1.05 billion offer earlier this month and after the Wisconsin Legislature passed special anti-takeover laws.

The acquisition of the LaCrosse, Wis.-based brewer is Bond's second move into the U.S. beer market in the last 18 months and immediately fueled speculation that the Australian company will use its new purchase to launch a new beer for the U.S. market, and possibly for international markets as well.

"They have the capacity now to try something innovative," said Emmanuel Goldman of Montgomery Securities, a San Francisco brokerage house. "It is clear that Bond has more on its mind than just Heileman's regional markets."

The deal also comes as an increasing number of Australian companies and such high-profile entrepreneurs as Robert Holmes a Court and Rupert Murdoch have been looking to the United States for places to expand their empires from Down Under.

Bond is not the only U.S. interest in Heileman. Last month the company bought a 50 percent stake in St. Joe Gold Co. for \$500 million from Fluor Corp. in Irvine, Calif. The conglomerate, which had profits of \$95.6 million on sales of \$1.62 billion last year, also has international interests in oil, shipping, air transport and television by virtue of a \$1 billion purchase

of the American's Cup for the United States in 1983 with skipper Alan Bond at the helm. A high school dropout who maintains offices on his Southern Cross yacht on the Mediterranean Sea and in Perth, Bond is said to have a personal fortune of nearly \$300 million and an extensive collection of Impressionist-era paintings.

The price Bond was willing to pay for Heileman shocked Wall Street and beer industry analysts largely because Heileman's share of beer sales in key markets, including its own state of Wisconsin and Wisconsin, has slipped in recent years.

"I'm amazed at the price," said Jerry Steinman, publisher of Beer Marketing Insights. "The question is what do they know that the rest of us don't?"

The hidden prize in Heileman's state analysis might be its unused 5.5 million gallon brewing capacity, production space that Bond could use to increase its presence in the U.S. and international beer markets.

With Heileman, Bond will be able to combine its Australian brewing and export operations of its Swan beer with Heileman's U.S. operations to become the fourth-largest brewer in the world. Bond already dominates about 45 percent of Australia's beer market and is a major exporter to Great Britain, Japan, Asia and the Middle East.

According to Thomas Pirko, publisher of Beverage, a beer industry newsletter in Los Angeles, the real effect of the Bond-Heileman deal is the price-taking impact it will have on future brewery takeovers. Pirko said he believes the major beneficiary of Wednesday's deal is Phillip Morris, owner of Miller Brewing Co., the nation's Number Two brewer whose takeover price and acquisition profile was substantially increased by the Bond-Heileman deal.

The merger calls for Bond to pay \$40.75 a share for Heileman's 26.6 million shares, compared to the \$35-a-share offer that Heileman earlier rejected. The total price of the deal will be about \$1.22 billion when convertible preferred shares are taken into account.

The agreement, which has been approved by Heileman's board of directors, also provides that Heileman will maintain operations in Wisconsin and corporate headquarters in La Crosse.

Domestic auto, truck sales plunge from levels of 1986

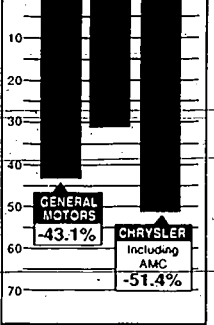
DETROIT (AP) - Sales of U.S.-made cars and trucks fell 36.2 percent in mid-September from the same period a year ago...

Automakers sold 83,278 domestic trucks, compared with 137,320 a year ago. Combined car and truck sales were 244,911 for the period...

Domestic car sales dropped 38.3 percent to 161,633 in the eight selling days from Sept. 11-20, from 294,641 in the nine selling days in the same period a year ago.

Car sales moved at a 6.8 million seasonally adjusted annual rate.

Domestic truck sales, one of the strongest parts of the market, fell 31.8 percent against a year ago.



Among domestic automakers, only Honda and Nissan emerged unscathed in comparison with a year ago.

General Motors Corp.'s car sales fell 43.1 percent, to 79,675 from 157,534 a year ago.

Ford Motor Co. car sales were off 31.8 percent, to 47,228 from 71,224 a year ago.

Chrysler Corp. sales fell 51.4 percent for cars to 21,710 from 50,246 a year ago.

For both years include sales of vehicles made by American Motors Corp., which Chrysler has recently

acquired.

Sales of Volkswagens U.S.-made cars fell 31.1 percent, to 1,281 from 2,092 a year ago.

Honda's domestic car sales rose 12.8 percent, to 6,553 in eight days from 5,760 in nine days a year ago.

Nissan's car sales rose 88.8 percent, to 6,313 from 1,996 a year ago.

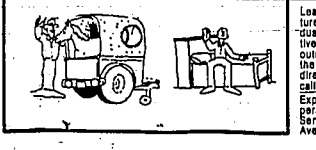

THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

"It is not enough to have a good mind; the main thing is to use it well."
 — Descartes.

Test yourself on opening leads. Cover all but the West hand and the bidding and see if you can find the killing opening lead against today's heart game.

In a vacuum, the "book" lead against four hearts is the diamond jack. Against that lead, South's problems are minimal—the loss a spade, a heart and a club, and the vulnerable game goes on the pads.

To find the killing lead, West must listen closely to the bidding and then try to visualize the actual distributions.

North's single spade raise and his raise of South's second suit promise at least four hearts and, most likely, only three spades. In high cards, North promised about eight or nine. South about 17 or 18. West is looking at J3 HCP himself, so that leaves little or nothing for East. Obviously West can expect to find no help from East in the way of high cards, so a diamond lead is a lost cause.

South's bidding indicates that he may have "five-spades-and-four-hearts. If he also holds the trump ace ...

And there's the answer. West should lead the ace and another spade. When West wins his trump king, a third spade lead provides a ruff and sends the game to an exciting one down.

Wood sculptors make menagerie in an old-time art

KETCHUM — There has never been a bit of doubt about what Glenn Carter wanted to be when he grew up. And there is no doubt that childhood has influenced the path this wood sculptor has decided to take.

It all happened the first time Carter stepped up on the carousel platform in Butte, Mont. He was fascinated by the brightly painted horses going round and round to the music of a Wurliizer organ. "It just locked in and I knew that I wanted to work with wood," Carter says.

Eventually, soapbox cars and Christmas displays gave way to cabinetmaking, teaching art and finally full time to the Ketchum Zoo, Carter's studio, where his creations come to life.

Along with his business partner, Robb Hink, Carter is realizing the childhood fantasies most of us have long since relinquished. And, together, they

have made the carousel pig their trademark.

About the time Carter was working on his first carousel horse, he was approached by a man whose wife loved pigs. He was commissioned subsequently to do one pig for a Christmas present. The rest, as they say, is history. This week, Neiman-Marcus will feature the Carter-Hink carousel pig in its famed Christmas catalog.

"It is probably one of the most exciting times of my life," Carter says. "It's childhood, it's fantasy, and it is wonderful."

To make the pig, Carter uses bass wood and a chainsaw. As many as 10 layers of wood are glued then rough-sawn, shaped with grinders, smoothed with sanders then brought to life with chisels and hand-carving tools.

Carter dotes over his current project with the paternal fondness of Gepetto for Pinocchio. And like the story, he believes they have a personality all their own. See CAROUSEL on Page D4

Salmon gathering: Cowboy poetry rides tall in saddle

SALMON — Toting tall hats and tall tales, more than 50 cowboys from all over Idaho, and parts of Montana and Wyoming too, shined their boots and polished their prose for the Cowboy Poetry Gathering in Salmon last weekend.

The event was sponsored by the Salmon Arts Council and the Idaho Commission on the Arts. Among the featured poets were Dave Chadwick, Bill Hirahi, Bob Schild, Bill Simpson and Coleen Sweeten. Featured musicians were Muzzie Braun and Mike Stanger. Together, they filled the weekend with their beefy bragging, scents of sage and broad, sweeping songs.

Nyle Henderson raised an eyebrow or two as well as lots of laughter and applause from the crowd of more than 400 during the Saturday evening performance. As master of ceremonies, Henderson led the special tribute to Owen Barton, who has come to be known as Idaho's hometown cowboy poet.

Barton has been featured at the three cowboy poetry gatherings in Elko, Nev., and has won a place in many listeners' hearts with his words. Growing up in Carey, and working the Diamond A Ranch in Rogerson for the last 47 years, has provided this cowboy with plenty of material.

The emcee, Henderson has also become a celebrated cowboy poet with appearances on the "Johnny Carson Show," the "Today" show, and features in Newsweek and People magazines. Breaking, raising, and shoeing horses on his home ranch in Hotchkiss, Colo., fuels his fiery lot of stories.

During his poetry reading Henderson carried on, hootin' and a-hollerin', buckin' his chair up, down and all around the stage to demonstrate bull-riding and other crazy cowboy contortions.

Giving away an old trainer's secret, Henderson whispered slyly to the crowd, "Remember now, ain't no horse in the whole world can buck you off... What if you never get on."

Of bull riding glory, Henderson says, "It's easy, you can do it — just keep one leg on each side, that's all there is to it!"

Proving that this cowboy knows the dos and don'ts of the cowboy life, Henderson says that like any job, there's things you do, and things, that no matter how much you want to do them, as a cowboy you just can't do. Washing the dishes, and sweeping the floor were two of the things this cowboy has had to resist all his life. A cowboy's got an image and as Henderson writes:

*I've been a cowboy all of my life
It's been hardest on my wife
She thinks I ought to cook every
once in a while
I just tell her, "That ain't my style.
Why if I'd do it once, it'd go
straight to her head.
Next thing you know I'd be mak-
ing the bed!"*

Other poets also captured the cow-



poke's stubborn notion of the woman's place at the range. Roberta Helen Green read one called "Mail Order Bride" —

*He wanted someone healthy
To wash his socks and warm his bed*

*In return he'd give her food
And a roof over her ugly head
He never gave the woman credit
To be cute or move with ease
All he thought of was submission
And she'd damn well better please...*

Pleasing is what a cowboy should expect from his bride, chimed the rhymes. What with all the sweat and toil, it wouldn't seem half so fun to get busted, broke and sore if there wasn't anybody to yank your boots off when all work is set to rest.

"From the Ladies Point of View," by Edith Stangle, a rancher from Bone and a mother of two other participants voiced another perspective, mimicking the ironic tone a rancher's words strike in his bride's ears:

*Now honey, you know
How much I appreciate you
Could you bring us some bourbon
For all the boys and me
It'll help us pass the time
While you're fixin' supper
And aren't you glad to be the wife
of a rancher
Living here in the West and to-
tally free!*

Besides the stomach, there's yet another way to a cowboy's heart, and that's the saddle. Yep, there's one thing dearer to the cowboy than his bride, and that sits on the other saddle side. Some may say that a dog is man's best friend, but after earfuls of poems I'd say it's the horse they tend.

Cowboys revere the horse they sit on and after pulling a family fence, they give credit where credit is due, recognizing their ol' horse as the one who pulled them through.

On the soft and sentimental side, David Gommel who rode horseback from New York to San Francisco back in 1922, wrote this eulogy to Billy, his horse which only made it to Wyoming before breaking his leg. Gommel's daughter, Marian Creek of Idaho Falls, read the poem. —

*Have you ever sat by the still re-
mains
Of a good and faithful friend
And wished that you, instead of
he,
Had journeyed to the end?*

Broadway theaters dim lights for Bob Fosse

NEW YORK — Broadway theaters decided to dim their lights Thursday for one minute before the start of evening performances in honor of Bob Fosse, the director and choreographer who made musicals sizzle.

It's a theatrical, glittery gesture that the 60-year-old Fosse, who died Wednesday of a heart attack, would have understood and enjoyed. A love of show business was at the heart of Fosse's hard work — from a dozen Broadway musicals to movies like "Cabaret" and "All That Jazz" and television specials.

Fosse, whose musical credits included "The Pajama Game," "Damn Yankees" and "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying," "Pippin" and "Dancin'," died doing what he did best — working on a show.

He collapsed on a sidewalk in Washington, D.C., on Wednesday night shortly before a revival of

was Gwen Verdon, Broadway's original Charity and Fosse's ex-wife.

The couple had rehearsed the Charity company Wednesday afternoon and planned to attend the opening. Fosse and Miss Verdon, who was his third wife, were walking to the theater from their hotel when the director was stricken.

Fosse was taken to George Washington University Hospital where he was pronounced dead at 7:23 p.m.

The cast was not told of Fosse's death until after the performance.

"It's devastating," said Cy Coleman, who wrote the music for "Sweet Charity" and was in Washington to see the show. "Bobby was just too alive to be dead... Everybody who has been in contact with Bobby will feel that he lives within all of us. I got something in my life that will stay with me until I go."

"I'm going to miss him terribly," said Ben Vereen, one of the original stars of "Pippin." "Bob Fosse is the best friend and mentor I ever had or will ever have. He was full of love,

talent and graciousness."

Nobody made a Broadway musical move like Fosse, and he won nine Tony awards doing it; the last in 1986 for his choreography for "Big Deal."

Fosse usually stopped the show with dance numbers that included a series of jazzy positions that later became known as Fosse trademarks — snapping fingers, thrust pelvises and jaunty angular movements of arms and legs.

They were noticeable in "The Pajama Game," the first show on Broadway that had dances by Fosse. In such numbers as "Steam Heat" and "Hernando's Hideaway," he had audiences cheering.

That same razzle-dazzle snaked through all of Fosse's shows, particularly when he began working with Miss Verdon in "Damn Yankees" in 1955. Their partnership continued through four more musicals, "New Girl in Town" (1967); "Redhead" (1969); "Sweet Charity" (1968), and

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'Born in East L.A.': School's in trouble, so is 'Principal'

First-class send-up of second-class life

BORN IN EAST L.A. (R). An ex-husband, crowd-pleaser from writer-director-star Cheech Marin, who casts himself as a third-generation American who nevertheless finds himself deported to Tijuana. Amidst the hilarity Marin makes his points about the second-class nature of U.S. citizenship for minorities and about the desperate plight of illegal aliens. With Daniel Stern, Kamala Lopez.

CAN'T BUY ME LOVE (PG-13). Another gimmick movie — excuse us, "high concept" — in which a high school nerd pays a gorgeous cheerleader to date him for a month, later discovering that she and the in-crowd are no bed of roses. Offensively shallow and undeveloped, reeking with self-pity, unfunny and cliched on every level, this feeble script does not really deserve the sometimes charming performances of its young leads, Patrick Dempsey and Amanda Peterson. The moral here — you cannot buy popularity — is something the movie-makers should take to heart themselves.

HAMBURGER HILL (R). Standard-issue patriotic Vietnam War movie centering on one of the war's bloodiest battles and marred by a heavy dose of rabble-rousing preachiness. A little subtlety would have greatly enhanced the film's potential for tragic irony. Featuring 14 newcomers, the most prominent of which are Courtney Vance and Dylan McDermott.

LA BAMB A (PG-13). Although this film of the tragically brief and Latino rocker Ritchie Valens has its strengths, especially the fine turn by the unknown Lou Diamond Phillips, the wonder is that the movie isn't full of raw energy, that it's for the most part polite melodrama. There is the music, however, great dollops of '60s songs, and it lifts the movie when the dialogue and the earnest-but-uninspired direction (by Luis Valdez) keeps it earthbound. Stars Lou Diamond Phillips, Esai Morales, Danielle von Zerneck and Elizabeth Pena. Written and directed by Luis Valdez.

NO WAY OUT (R). Abetted by director Roger Donaldson's main strengths — bedrock believability, solid self-effacing technique and the bristling tension of his sexual relationships — this cracklingly fine thriller plumbs the depths of deception in the federal government. The action is whizzingly fast but the performances are lovingly fleshed out. The greatest prize is Kevin Costner as the youngish Navy officer around whom the baroque plot unfolds, he is fiercely good, intelligent and appreciatively sensual.

STAKEOUT (R). The Mondrian-esque high-concept outline of the plot, a detective falling in love with the woman he has under surveillance — also indicates the by-the-numbers regularity of the screenwriting (by Jim Kouf) and direction (John Badham) of this toast to superficial film making. What a pity that such a description omits the impeccable comic timing of Richard Dreyfuss and the high-gloss beauty with which cinematog-

HOLLYWOOD — One sad thing about many current movies is how much good material they chew up and destroy. "The Principal" has one of the best subjects imaginable: tensions and conflicts in an inner-city problem high school. Yet, it does not release those tensions, or use the conflicts honestly. Nor does it give a convincing sense of the teachers or students.

Instead, it degenerates into one more cliché-ridden revenge movie. At the end when Jim Belushi character, principal Rick Latimer, is stalked through his deserted high school by knife-wielding gang mem-

bers — he might as well be Conan battling the barbarians.

Belushi's character is potentially interesting: an incandescent hothead, assigned to Brandel, the worst problem school in town — the one to which all the other problem students are expelled. Belushi has the skills and moxie to give Latimer depth, but the script draws him as a bully with a heart of gold.

Latimer's tactics are certainly bizarre, even for a hard-case school like Brandel. In between brawls and clubbings, we see Latimer's soft, gentle, professional side: dispensing fatherly advice — salted with comradely profanity — to intimidated smaller students, tutoring the school's prettiest unwed mothers and batting his eyes at the sexy history teacher, Hilary (Rae Dawn Chong). One of the students he encourages, Raymi ("La Bomba") Esai Morales) apparently

shows writing talent, and, after Latimer's praise, he runs right off of the movie, never to reappear. Perhaps he is off writing a screenplay.

Belushi has lost a little weight. There was a definite slob side to his two great performances last year — in "About Last Night" and "Salvador" — and, as Latimer, he does not have as much heft or sass.

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

Fosse's life and death paralleled the story of "All That Jazz," his 1979 autobiographical movie about a brilliant, chain-smoking director and choreographer obsessed with work and women. The hero, played by Roy Scheider, dies of a heart attack.

Fosse was born into show business on June 23, 1927. His father was a vaudeville entertainer and the son became a dancer in the nightclubs and burlesque houses of Chicago. Those jazzy honky-tonk influenced Fosse's free-heeling style.

In the late 1940s, he formed a dance act with his first wife, Mary Ann Niles. He later came to Broadway to dance in the chorus of several Broadway musicals and then to Hollywood where he appeared in

several film musicals including "Kiss Me Kate." It was then that he married his second wife, dancer Joan McCracken. Both marriages ended in divorce.

Fosse stayed away from Broadway for eight years after the success in 1978 of "Dancin'," a plotless musical that was all-dance. He returned with "Big Deal," a \$5 million bomb, his first commercial flop after 11 consecutive hits.

In an interview before the opening of "Big Deal," he admitted that working on Broadway had grown more difficult. "The stakes have gotten so high," he said. Still, he went ahead.

"There's something about trying to create something that gives people pleasure, something about camaraderie — maybe somebody will remember you," Fosse said. "Maybe someone will say, 'He was a good showman; he gave us good shows. You could always count on him for an evening's entertainment.'"

Fosse was the first person to win an Oscar, a Tony and an Emmy all in one year. In 1972 he accomplished that show business hat trick by picking up an Oscar for his direction of the film "Cabaret"; two Tonys for his direction and choreography of Broadway's "Pippin"; and three Emmys for producing, directing and choreographing a "Liza Minnelli television special," "Liza With a Z."

"Pippin" made a bit of show business history in another way—The show, which received mediocre reviews, was saved by a stylish tele-

Colin does some leg work and finds character she can play

When Margaret Colin went looking for a new TV series, she wasn't sure what kind of role she wanted to play — but she knew exactly what she didn't want.

"I wasn't interested in roles with a father figure," she says. "I shied away from roles with an older partner who straightens me out whenever I get in trouble. And I didn't want to do a man-of-the-week series. I wasn't interested in falling in love."

What she found was "Leg Work," a CBS detective series that premieres Saturday, Oct. 3. In it, Colin plays Claire McCarron, a private investigator living in New York City. Trained as a lawyer, McCarron has fled the yuppie life and its regular paychecks, but she is still hooked on the creature comforts — a Porche, a classy wardrobe and an expensive apartment on New York's Upper West Side.

"It's what I wanted — a series with a female lead, but not any of those things I mentioned. One that's filming on location, and in New York."

Colin, 30, first drew notice when she played Margo Hughes on the daytime soap opera "As the World Turns." After she left "As the World Turns," she landed the lead on the short-lived CBS comedy "Foley Square." It never found an audience, but it brought Colin raves. She was pegged as a rising star, and production companies began designing new projects with her in mind.

"Leg Work" was the best of them, she says. "It's very open-ended," Colin explains. "Claire isn't a cop, so she doesn't have all those police regulations to obey. Yet she's not a lawyer, so she doesn't have those rules either."

The show is one of only two current series being filmed on location in New York ("The Equalizer" is the other). Episodes have been filmed at New York settings ranging from Central Park to the Statue of Liberty. Colin, producer Frank Abatemarco and CBS are hoping that the Manhattan ambience will set the series apart.

nightlife — the bars, the parks, the traffic," Colin says. "But we also show those moments of real deep loneliness that the city produces."

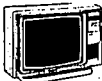

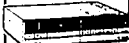
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Moore still may be real Bond

Kennedy turns disability into a positive on 'General Hospital'

It looks like Nancy Becker Kennedy, "General Hospital's" wheelchair-bound actress, is going to be around for a while.

Last June, quadriplegic Nancy came onto the "General Hospital" set to play physical therapist Martha McKee, brought in to help injured Bobbie Spencer Meyer get back on her feet. Martha was given two youngsters — daughter Melissa (Ami Dolenz) and young Skeeter (Jamie McEnnan).

Like Jim Stacy on "Cagney and Lacey" years ago, handicapped Nancy faced a short run. She could be written-out-at-any-time. But sprightly Nancy, who broke her neck 15 years ago diving off a pier in Antioch, Ill., charmed boss Wes Kenney and his staff. She perked up everybody, scooting about her electric wheelchair, and she looked good on camera.

If Wes Kenney is right, fans will become accustomed to Martha in a wheelchair, disciplining the kids and pepping up the hospital disabled. After all, Kenney directed Chris Templeton, the polio victim on "The Young and the Restless," the only handicapped semi-regular in the soap world.

A gusty lady surviving in Hollywood as a writer, Nancy is a friend of Chris's and got the word on the "General Hospital" plan from him. Nancy expected the usual TV character sketch reaching for the bleeding hearts, playing for pity or excessive admiration.

Under the Kenney plan, however, therapist Martha will be on long enough to be treated like any other character on the show. Meanwhile, Martha sees to it that the disabled get out of bed and start living. To heck with the handicap — that's Martha's pitch.

Hearing it, seeing it on TV, especially in the daytime, is a bonus Nancy Becker Kennedy never dreamed possible. She has the message and she's found the perfect medium: soap.

Thanks to a California disability program that enables Nancy to have an attendant, the woman works. She can type 51 words a minute (using sticks since her fingers have problems) and she's an ace

with a computer. Better yet, Nancy gets around town by herself in a van.

A quadriplegic character good for the long haul? "Why not?" is the thinking at "General Hospital."

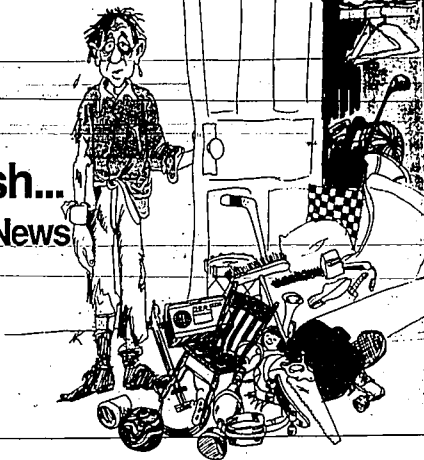

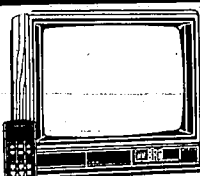

Army was dead set against cooperating with him in any way whatsoever. It forced him to shoot the provocative picture in the Philippines, where much American war equipment was already available. The movie turned out to be an enormous blockbuster hit, earning over \$100,000,000 — and is now being re-released. Less than a decade later, director Stanley Kubrick hired a U.S. Marine consultant as an actor for his "Full Metal Jacket," and Oscar winner Oliver Stone returned to the Philippines for his "Platoon." Coppola's "Apocalypse Now" is expected to be a hit all over again — not only because of the success of the latter two films but because of the public's acceptance of films made about the Vietnam War.

Q: What's with Marcello Mastroianni? Is he or is he not going to start speaking English in his movies? I understand he's wonderfully articulate — but refuses to speak English in his pics because he's self-conscious about his Italian accent. — H.R.

A: It's true that Marcello can speak English very well now — but he admits he's somewhat lazy about pronouncing his "p's" and "q's" so he avoids talking English in his flicks. However, he just completed a movie in Hungary called "Miss Arizona." The director, Paul Sandor, claims Mastroianni has learned enough English to speak his lines in that language rather than be dubbed. The movie is based on a true story about a show-business couple who return to Budapest after W.W.II. "It is definitely NOT a

comedy," say Sandor. Maybe that's just as well. The last time Mastroianni played one half of a showbiz duo, in "Ginger & Fred," the result was a multi-million dollar lawsuit from Ginger Rogers, still pending.

Q: We haven't seen much of Elizabeth Taylor lately. What's she been up to? — Y.L.

A: Right about now you'll be seeing and hearing, lots about Liz Taylor. Her crosscountry department store tour on behalf of a new line of perfume got underway Sept. 14 — and promotion is heavy TV and print media coverage of Liz both on tour and off is expected to be near saturation levels — some \$10 million is being spent. There'll even be a "60 Minutes" TV bit, I'm told. Elizabeth is expected to draw some 5,000 fans at each department store visit.

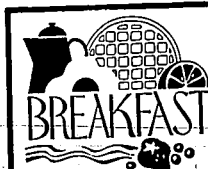

Puppets spoof newsmakers in 'D.C. Follies'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — What has four hands, three heads and a mouth guaranteed to poke fun at a person in the news? The life-size puppets on brothers Sid and Marty Kroff's "D.C. Follies."

"We'll tackle whatever's in the news," said Marty Kroff. "We can build a puppet in 36 hours. Whatever's happening and whoever's making news, that's what we'll spoof." The first show in the syndicated series will appear this weekend on 190 stations.

The obvious household names, from President Reagan to Pope John Paul II to Oliver North, will make frequent appearances on the show. It takes two people to manipulate each puppet, one for the hands and one for the head. A third person supplies the voice.

The setting is a fictional hangout across from the White House called "D.C. Follies," where Fred Willard is the real-life bartender and host of the show.

"We're starting out with 20 puppets," said Sid. "We also have Andy Rooney, Don King, Woody Allen, Oprah Winfrey, Tammy Bakker, Geraldo Rivera and Vanna White. We also have one of Dan Rather which appears on the TV set in the bar. He'll be constantly changing



ing clothes, hair style and the like."

Other puppets for early shows are former presidents Richard M. Nixon, Jimmy Carter and Gerald R. Ford, plus first lady Nancy Reagan, former national security adviser John Poindexter, British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, former pro football coach John Madden, Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev, Princess Diana, Michael Jackson, Jesse Jackson and actors Jack Nicholson and Sean Penn.

"We'll have a guest star each week," said Marty. "Martin Mull's on the first show. We're going to try to get some people in the news. We went after Ronald Reagan Jr. but he turned us down. He said he didn't want any family problems.

We're hoping to get (former) House Speaker Tip O'Neill."

It won't all be political. They'll also get into movies and sports and other areas.

"We're not going to be taking pot shots at these people," said Sid. "We'll deal mostly with their personalities."

To keep it fresh and up-to-date, each show will be taped three days before the air date. "We'll work on the scripts right up to the last moment," said Sid.

The Kroffs say that despite the emphasis on people in the news they believe the shows will hold up in the reruns.

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
