## Americans fired on U.S. choppers sink 3 Iranian patrol boats

WASHINGTON — U.S. helicopter gunships sank three Iranian patrol boats in the Persian Gulf on Thursday after an American observation helicopter was fired upon without provocation, the Pentagon said.

It was the second American military engagement in the region since the United States attacked an Iranian ship laying mines on Sept. 21, and the first to involve a direct attack on U.S. forces by Iran.

Officials said no Americans were hurt in the confrontation.

At least six Iranian crewmen survived Thursday's assault and were picked up from the gulf's waters by a U.S. patrol boat, said Pentagon spokesman Fred Hoffman.

Two of the "Ak" later died, however, and another was said to have serious injuries. Hoffman added a search for other survivors was continuing.

The incident renewed calls in the Senate to invoke the War Powers Act, which limits a president's authority to send troops to areas of "imminent danger."

"We all look like fools, fools that are disregarding the law," said Sen. Lowell Weicker, R-Conn., in a speech on the Senate floor.

Hoffman said Thursday the administration still saw no need to invoke the act. Fitzwater said the administration would review the incident in terms of the act "but there are no preliminary judgments to make other than we will comply with the spirit of the resolution by giving full and detailed consultations to the Congress."

Asked if the Iranians picked up from the water would be returned home, Fitzwater noted that the United States repatriated Iranians who were captured from the mine-laying boat but refused to speculate further.

Hoffman said the incident occurred 3:50 p.m. local time, or 12:50 p.m. MDT. He said the American helicopters were flying in international airspace and mounted the attack "within the rules of engagement in self-defense."

Pentagon sources said there were two gunships involved in the attack, both of them Army Special Operations helicopters known as MH-6s. The same type helicopter was used in last month's attack on an Iranian ship.

Late Thursday, the Pentagon disclosed that the helicopters were fired upon.

President Reagan was informed of the incident by Lt. Gen. Colin L. Powell of the National Security Council staff. Powell went to the Oval Office at 1:30 p.m. MDT to brief Reagan, said presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater. He said the president would be updated on developments as warranted.

"It appears it was an isolated incident," Fitzwater said. "We did not provoke the incident in any way. Our helicopters acted in self-defense because they were fired upon."

## Ortega diatribe leads to American walkout

UNITED NATIONS — Nicaragua's leader accused President Reagan on Thursday of defying the peace agreement made by Central American nations, and repeated his demand for direct talks with Washington.

The six-member U.S. delegation left the General Assembly hall early in a harshly critical speech during which President Daniel Ortega said, to hearty applause: "Let President Reagan recall that 'Rambo' exists only in the movies."

Ortega repeatedly attacked Reagan for asking Congress to vote more aid for rebels fighting Nicaragua's leftist Sandinista government, claiming the request was "dead against" a peace accord signed by the five Central American presidents Aug. 7.

Reagan said in a speech Wednesday to the Organization of American States that he was asking for \$270 million in new aid to the U.S.-backed rebels, known as Contras, to make sure the Sandinistas honor the peace plan.

Democratic congressional leaders say his chances of getting the money are slim. A \$100 million aid package ran out Oct. 1.

"In the speech he made yesterday at the O.A.S., President Reagan once again showed disrespect for the Central American presidents and the agreement," Ortega said.

The peace accord signed by the presidents of Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Honduras, Guatemala and El Salvador was endorsed by the United Nations on Wednesday. It calls for an end to foreign support for rebel forces in Central America, and measures to achieve greater democracy in the region.

Among Ortega's caustic comments about Reagan was: "I'm sure he hasn't even read the agreement."

He accused the United States of installing the Somoza family dynasty the Sandinistas overthrew in July 1979.

## Negotiators reach agreement

# No income loss to farmers

BURLEY — An all-out negotiating session Wednesday and Thursday has produced an agreement in principle between sugar beet growers and Amalgamated Sugar Co., the company that provides much of their income.

While prices have not been finalized, both sides told the 130 farmers gathered at a meeting sponsored by the Idaho Sugar Beet Growers Association Thursday that overall prices won't go down.

"We're talking about a revenue-neutral contract. We're not talking about taking money out of your pocket to put in theirs," said grower negotiator John Bushnell.

"The kind of numbers you've read

about in the paper and heard from your representatives no longer has any validity because of the status of the negotiations," he said.

"You can leave here tonight, and not be concerned about 1, 'Am I going to be able to grow beets next year?' or 2, 'Should I be worried about the price I am going to get for a ton of beets?'" Bushnell said. "You don't have to worry about that."

Bushnell did not give any specifics on the contract negotiations except to explain a new incentive program designed to grow beets in a way that allows the company to extract a higher percentage of sugar from its beets. Bushnell said this was only an agreement in principle, details still have yet to be worked out.

He spent a majority of his time talking about a new processing philosophy for sugar beets that would allow Amalgamated to get more sugar from the beets. If implemented, the program would lower the concentration of potassium and sodium that inhibit the extraction of sugar from the beets.

If the program works, farmers should be able to sustain the loss of sugar legislation better, he said.

The federal government subsidizes sugar production through a long program of guaranteed prices. It also imposes quotas on imported sugar to keep domestic prices up, but the Reagan administration has targeted the sugar program for extinction.

At stake in negotiations between growers and Amalgamated is the

price of a crop that pumps about \$60 million into Idaho farmer's pockets and about \$200 million into the state's economy, according to estimates by Allan Lipman, president of Amalgamated.

Sugar beets provide a stable source of income for many farmers in the "agriculturally depressed" Magic Valley, said Tom Garrard, president of the Cassia County Sugar Beet Growers Association.

An early proposal from Amalgamated would have cut payments to its Idaho and eastern Oregon growers by \$8 million. The sugar Beet Growers Association responded by hiring Bushnell, its first ever professional negotiator to hammer out the agreement with Amalgamated.

The latest negotiating session lasted until 11 p.m. Wednesday and then through most of Thursday.

## 7 Twin Falls youths face drug charges

TWIN FALLS — Seven students from Twin Falls High School and O'Leary Junior High School have been accused of drug-related activities near the schools and another 18 are in for some special attention for smoking cigarettes in the same areas.

Public Safety Director Tim Qualls revealed Thursday that a three-week long photographic surveillance at the two schools resulted in the apprehension and booking of seven students. And police have notified parents and school officials that another 18 junior high school boys and girls were found smoking

regular cigarettes in the same area as two alleged marijuana offenders.

Qualls said three weeks of surveillance preceded the initial move at the Twin Falls High School last week in which five youngsters ages 15 and 16 were apprehended and will be petitioned into court on charges of possession of marijuana or possession of paraphernalia.

Thursday morning of this week two junior high school boys were apprehended near O'Leary. Qualls said, and they also will be taken into court on charges of possession of marijuana or possession of drug paraphernalia, which Qualls identified as home-made pipes.

Qualls said instances involving students from both schools were

brought to the department's attention by residents living near the schools.

A resident contacted the department three weeks ago to report suspicious activities at the high school, Qualls said, and officers then set up a surveillance that included photographing individuals and activities.

"We started a surveillance and photographic watch for the period of three weeks. On the third week, we picked up the two 17-year-olds and three 15-year-olds who were observed at the high school smoking marijuana and using home-made equipment," Qualls said.

Last week, residents near the O'Leary school, also, contacted police, Qualls said. They reported

seeing students smoking what they believed was marijuana on property adjacent to school property.

The incidents were alleged to have occurred on a narrow piece of property between the senior citizens' center near the junior-high school and a row of bushes on the same property.

Thursday morning officers moved in before school opened and set up a watch and photo surveillance.

Qualls said of the 20 youngsters found in the small area, one 14-year-old boy is being charged with possession of marijuana and one 15-year-old boy faces court action for alleged possession of paraphernalia.

The remaining 18 under-age

## More senators declare their opposition to Bork

WASHINGTON — Robert H. Bork's Supreme Court nomination was dealt an almost certain fatal blow Thursday as opposition spread to a majority of the Senate.

But President Reagan said he wouldn't surrender "in the face of a lynch mob."

Reagan officials, giving what seemed to be conflicting signals, insisted the fight would continue to the Senate floor, no matter how bleak the outlook, but also said it was up to Bork to decide whether to withdraw.

The president himself said of Bork: "He has a decision to

make. I have made mine. I will support him all the way."

Bork went at midday to the Justice Department to meet with Attorney General Edwin Meese III, raising speculation that the nomination might soon be withdrawn. Department officials added to the speculation by saying Meese had arranged a meeting with Reagan to talk over Bork's fate.

However, presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said later that there would be no such meeting, that Meese had reported there was no change in the status of the nomination and that "our strategy is to continue

## Falwell, board resign as PTL leaders

FORT MILL, S.C. — PTL Chairman Jerry Falwell and his 10-member board resigned Thursday, and Falwell said he feared defrocked leader Jim Bakker could return and make the ministry "the greatest scab and cancer on the face of Christianity in 2,000 years."

The resignations were prompted by a court ruling Wednesday that allowed PTL's creditors and contributors to file a competing plan for reorganizing the ministry, which is plagued by more than \$60 million in debt.

Bakker, in a news conference at his mountain-top retreat near Gatlinburg, Tenn., said he would return to the ministry if invited to do so by its creditors. Bakker said he thought Falwell was resigning to avoid testifying under oath in bankruptcy court.

Falwell, who has his own ministry based in Lynchburg, Va., said PTL's main television program, the "PTL Club," will remain on the air at least three weeks, but the payroll at the "Heritage USA" theme park will not be paid Friday.

"I hope the successor will pay them," he said. Falwell asked PTL's 1,200 workers to stay on, although it was not immediately clear who would take control.

Falwell said members of the PTL's board were willing to fight Bakker, but unwilling to fight the courts. And he predicted Thursday that within six months, "barring a miracle of God," Bakker would resume control of the evangelical empire he turned over to Falwell in

March amid a sex-and-money scandal.

Harry Hargrave, who resigned as chief operating officer, said PTL employees who earn the least will be paid first.

Bakker called the resignations a "wholesale walkout" and said he believed Falwell was stepping aside because he didn't want to face Bakker attorney Melvin Belli in bankruptcy court.

"If they tell the truth they they will have to reveal that they plotted to steal PTL," said Bakker.

Asked if Bakker has won the fight over the ministry, Falwell said, "No. The Christian family has lost the war."

Falwell said the bankruptcy judge's decision to allow competing reorganization plans to be filed within a week dashed a ministry plan to borrow \$5. million to \$10 million from a Wall Street investor.

# Brazilian radiation accident worst on Western records

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — A U.S. doctor says the World Health Organization has classified a recent radiation accident in Brazil as the worst ever in the Western world.

Dr. Gerald Hanson, in Brazil to help in the treatment of radiation poisoning victims who rubbed glittering cesium-137 on their bodies and even ate some of the phosphorus powder, told Globo TV network, the nation's largest, that only the Chernobyl nuclear accident in 1986 was worse.

The United States, the Soviet Union, East Germany and Argentina responded to an appeal this week — made through the International Atomic Energy Association in Vienna, Austria for help in treating 10 patients hospitalized in Rio in critical condition.

The 10 were flown to Rio last week after coming into direct contact with the radioactive isotope used in the treatment of cancer patients. They were hospitalized with hair loss, lesions in the mouth and throat, and a sharp decline in

white blood cells. Five were not expected to live, while the other five had only a 50 percent chance of living, specialists said.

Among those not expected to live was a 6-year-old, Leide-Das-Neves Ferreira, who rubbed the radioactive material over her body and even tasted the substance.

Six patients were hospitalized in slightly better condition in Goiânia, the central Brazilian city 850 miles northwest of Rio, where the accident occurred last week.

The victims were poisoned by the cesium, found by a scavenger encased in lead in the ruins of a partly demolished hospital. He sold the 250-pound capsule to a junkyard as scrap.

The junkyard owner broke open the lead casing around the cesium and removed the powder, which was admitted as "beautiful" by friends and neighbors, taken into homes, flushed down toilets and carried around in pockets.

Once the "contamination" was found, 30 families were moved from

the area, their houses closed for radiation checks and an isolation post set up in a local soccer stadium to check people for radiation poisoning.

Helicopters circled the neighborhood and found high levels of radioactivity.

Nuclear specialists prepared to remove contaminated objects from the homes near the junkyard. Residents said they have been ostracized by friends and relatives in the city of 800,000 people.

"Everybody thinks we are a band of lepers," said Maria Dos Santos, whose family has been left homeless by the incident.

The federal police are investigating to determine legal responsibility for the contamination.

"There is no doubt there was negligence," said Health Secretary Antonio Falera of Goias state, a farming region of which Goiânia is the capital. "The owner of the hospital should have told the National Nuclear Energy Commission the inclusion had been deactivated and that was not done."

youngsters were smoking regular cigarettes.

Qualls said there were small amounts of marijuana and residue confiscated at the scene, but no large quantities.

He said cards will be prepared on 16 boys and two girls from the junior high school who were found smoking cigarettes in the area near school grounds. The cards containing information on the smoking will be given to the school detective for continued contacts. He added that all parents and school officials are being notified.

"I have advised school officials of the incidents and it is our hope that the parents and school officials will work together to help the students correct their problems," Qualls said.

"We are also concerned with non-students who have been seen on or around the school campus," Qualls said.

"At one point our own school officer was doing such a good job that he chased away a suspect from the high school that we were watching as a possible source of the marijuana," Qualls said.

Qualls said that one individual has been identified as possibly providing the marijuana to students and the investigation is continuing.

He added that officers had kept their surveillance activities a secret even from other staff members.

Norman Duke Wiseman, principal of the school, said since the alleged activities did not occur on school property and oc-

curred before school hours, school officials are not involved on the legal level.

However, he said the school is very concerned and always has been concerned with any student drug use.

"We are not turning our backs. In fact, we are just starting the Project Impact program that we feel offers the best solution to the problem that we have yet found," Wiseman said Thursday afternoon.

He said a four-day training session for teachers, parents and community representatives has just been completed and these people will begin guiding the Project Impact through the entire school system. He said it is an educational program aimed at helping drug-involved students and preventing further student involvement.

The program, he said, attacks the problem from four specific levels: prevention through education, identification of the problem, concern and support.

He called it an all-new approach to the problem and said it involves the entire student bodies of the schools.

Wiseman said the fact that a few students were identified with the marijuana smoking incidents this week is not really surprising.

"This certainly is not new. It has been going on in the schools since I came to Twin Falls in 1967," he said.

He said the problem is not overwhelming and, as a whole, O'Leary and other district student bodies

are made up of good students. He said it is a very small percentage who become involved in marijuana, as in these recent cases, and other drugs.

Last year, he said, school officials also saw a small amount of "hard" marijuana and more addictive substance. Last year, he said, his school expelled three students for drug offenses, but he added this is not the best solution. It was the only way the school could get the students into court.

School board member, Gary Fay said the school board has policies for handling such issues as illegal drugs and is doing all it can to eliminate the problem.

He echoed Wiseman's sentiments that the new Project Impact program will go a long way in meeting this goal. He said parents and school officials are concerned about the matter and are working together to correct it. With 6,700 students in the district, Fay said, it is difficult to watch them all. But he said the percentage of students involved in drugs is very small.

High School Principal Frank Charlton and Superintendent Carl Snow were not available for comment Thursday afternoon.

Last month, Qualls told the Twin Falls City Council that he was concerned about "incidents" at the O'Leary school involving gangs of students. He did not indicate drug problems at that time. School officials denied that problems with gangs had surfaced this school year.

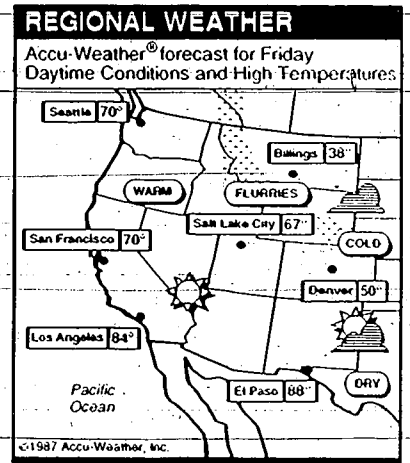
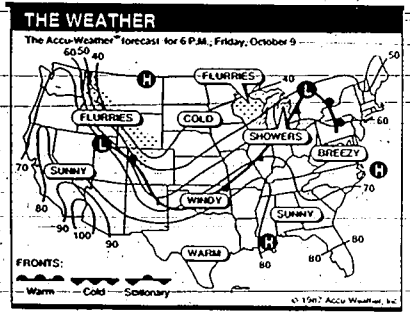

closed that a second, unrelated incident had occurred in the southern Persian Gulf. The Pentagon said in a statement a U.S. helicopter flying from frigate Ford "reported shots fired from an Iranian oil rig... about 120 miles east of Bahrain."

"The helicopter cleared the area without further incident. It could not be determined whether or not the shots were fired at the helicopter. Accordingly, the U.S. helicopter did not respond by firing."

Hoffman said the sinking of the Iranian vessels Thursday began when a lone U.S. observation helicopter approached three and possibly four Iranian patrol boats in the northern gulf, about 15 miles southwest of the Iranian-controlled island of Farsi.

Hoffman said he did not believe there was any radio communication between the Iranian boats and the helicopter. The firing on the U.S. observation helicopter "came without warning," he said.

"The firing on a U.S. helicopter was clearly a hostile act," Hoffman said. "The helicopter crews fired in self-defense."

observation helicopter then called for help.

The spokesman said "heavily armed helicopter gunships were flying nearby to protect the observation aircraft and immediately attacked the Iranian boats."

Hoffman said the Pentagon believes there were four Iranian boats involved, but one appeared to have escaped. The other three were hit and sunk.

One of them was a Swedish-built Boghammer patrol boat, about 42 feet long, while the other two were smaller boats, he said. The spokesman said he had no idea how many Iranians were aboard the vessels.

Hoffman said he did not believe there was any radio communication between the Iranian boats and the helicopter. The firing on the U.S. observation helicopter "came without warning," he said.

"The firing on a U.S. helicopter was clearly a hostile act," Hoffman said. "The helicopter crews fired in self-defense."

He refused to say from which U.S. warships the helicopters were flying, although he acknowledged the guided-missile frigate Thatcher was in the area. The Pentagon later said the amphibious landing ship USS Raleigh was also in the area and that the survivors had been taken to that ship for medical treatment.

The Pentagon sources indicated, however, that some of the U.S. helicopters might have been operating from a large barge leased by the Navy and moored in the northern gulf to support mine-sweeping operations.

Earlier this week, U.S. intelligence agencies had alerted American military forces to a build-up in the number of Iranian gunboats around Kharg Island, which is also located in the northern gulf.

Hoffman acknowledged the Iranians were maintaining a "substantial presence" of small gunboats in the northern gulf, but declined to elaborate.

"During decades of Somoza rule, he said, 'the United States was not concerned about freedom' in Nicaragua. At that time, the United States didn't care about the human rights of Nicaraguans. In those days, the United States didn't care about the lack of justice."

When Ambassador Vernon A. Walters led the U.S. delegation out of the chamber, Ortega declared: "Some people find their ears hurt when the truth is spoken and they are incapable of listening." Again, there was a round of applause.

Walters told reporters he found it

"intolerable to see the platform of the United Nations used to hurl invective, falsehoods and defamations against my country and my president."

He called Ortega's government a "totalitarian dictatorship" and accused him of "falsifying history."

"The Nicaraguan president" spoke from notes, not a prepared text. Much of what he said concerned Reagan's speech to the Organization of American States, in which he urged the Sandinistas to negotiate a cease-fire with the Contras, expel all Cuban and Soviet forces, establish "full democracy" and restore

freedom of the press.

At a news conference after his speech, Ortega said Lo Prensa, which is Nicaragua's only opposition newspaper and has been allowed to resume publishing, might be closed again if it supports Reagan's request for more Contra aid. It was shut down last year for criticizing the government.

In his speech to the General Assembly, Ortega "rejected talks with the rebels as he has in the past."

"What's the point of talking to the leadership of the Contras?" he asked. "It's pointless because the promoter of this entire policy is the United States government."

He repeated his longstanding demand for direct negotiations with the United States, which Washington has rejected.

Ortega suggested the talks begin in early December, about a month after the Nov. 7 deadline for meeting terms of the Central American peace plan.

to make our case and change minds."

At the end of the working day, Fitzwater reported that Reagan had not met with any senators on the Bork nomination during the day and had not made any telephone calls on the subject.

He said that as far as the White House knew, Bork was still in the race.

"Judge Bork has given us no indication other than that he wants to proceed with the floor vote," Fitzwater said. "Obviously he can make any decision he wants but we're proceeding under the assumption that he's heading for a vote."

"We're going to let him decide," said Tom Korologos, a lobbyist

brought in by the White House to help Bork.

Terry Eastland, a Justice Department spokesman at the White House, obviously wants to stay in the fight for the nomination as of today and the attorney general is not trying to persuade him one way or the other."

Meanwhile, Democratic Sen. George Mitchell of Maine — himself a former federal judge — declared that he would vote for Bork.

The Equitable floor that he would oppose Bork's nomination if the White House pursues it to a final vote. "According to an Associated Press tabulation, based on floor speeches, written statements and a telephone survey, Mitchell was the 61st senator in the 100-member chamber to declare he would reject confirmation."

The number of announced opponents later reached 63.

## Silver prices to soar high

**BOISE (AP)** — Silver prices, which jumped 40 percent since last year, could soar as high as \$11 an ounce within a few years, the president of Coeur d'Alene Mines Corp. said.

But as many as 3,700 mining jobs lost in northern Idaho's Silver Valley since 1980 may be gone forever, victims of more than two years of depressed silver prices and efforts by Idaho silver companies to cut costs, said Dennis Wheeler, who also is chief executive officer of the Coeur d'Alene-based precious metals company.

Silver, which was about \$5.50 per ounce a year ago, closed at \$7.64 on Wednesday on the New York Commodity Exchange.

The upsurge is setting the stage for further rises, as much as \$8.60 an ounce by the end of 1988 and \$11 later, Wheeler said.

## US West wants expansion

**BOISE (AP)** — Despite a federal court ruling that has at least temporarily blocked plans for a multimillion-dollar research facility anywhere in the West, US West Inc. will eventually expand its operations in Idaho, state Commerce Director James Hawkins is predicting.

"US West will be in this state in the future in some additional capacity," Hawkins told the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry as its annual meeting opened Thursday.

"I'm confident that will happen," Hawkins said.

All 14 western states served by US West, including Idaho, had been designated for 1,500 jobs the \$50 million research and development center proposed by the company would generate for their economies.

## Search on for license art

**PORTLAND (AP)** — Oregonians have plenty of artistic license, or licenses. The state has received more than 2,000 of them so far in the contest to replace Oregon's lackluster gold and blue plates.

Many entries feature traditional symbols of the Beaver state, including trees, mountains, lakes, fish and "of course," beavers.

Some, mustering a bit more creativity, have even included slogans or phrases intended to capture the essence of Oregon in as few words as possible. Examples submitted so far include "naturally inviting" and "a state of mine."

The contest is open until Oct. 31, by which time contest coordinator Holly Blanchard of the Oregon Transportation Department expects another 2,000 entries to arrive.

## Utah blazes under control

**KAMAS, Utah (AP)** — Firefighter expected to bring under control a 60-acre blaze in the Wasatch-Cache National Forest by Friday night after having completed fire lines on Thursday, authorities said.

Forest Service spokesman Dick Pine said containment was set at 6 p.m. MDT Thursday, while control was projected for 6 p.m. MDT Friday.

The fire, earlier estimated at 100 acres, was battled by 116 firefighters using a helicopter, six engines, two bulldozers and some Utah National Guard trucks, he said.

The firefighting team included personnel from the Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, Bureau of Indian Affairs and the state.

## Air patrol nabs dealers

**SPOKANE (AP)** — The Washington State Patrol's aircraft, used to catch unsuspecting speeders, helped snare four suspected drug dealers on the highway.

About \$30,000 worth of what was believed to be methamphetamine was seized in the Spokane Valley apprehension Wednesday, investigators said Thursday.

Authorities said those arrested, described as "biker types," were apparently using two vehicles to move a clandestine laboratory to produce the drug, commonly referred to as "speed."

Drivers of the two cars were using hand-held CB radios and a radar detector in an apparent attempt to elude a speeding arrest, investigators said.

## Employees claim defaults

**IDAHO FALLS (AP)** — More than 350 past and present employees of Eastern Idaho Regional Medical Center have filed suit against the hospital, claiming that it and its former retirement plan administrator reneged on financial promises.

The class-action suit, filed on behalf of 372 people on Thursday, names EIRMC, formerly known as Idaho Falls Consolidated Hospitals, Hospital Corp. of America and Deseret Mutual Benefit Association as defendants.

It alleges that the hospital told employees in June 1986 that they could obtain the money they had paid into the Deseret retirement fund when the hospital canceled that plan and picked up a new one.

The Deseret plan belongs to InterMountain Health Care, which owned controlling interest in the hospital before Dec. 22, 1986.

## Highway gunman takes aim at unmarked, off-duty officer

**FARMINGTON, Utah (AP)** — A Salt Lake man charged with pointing a gun at another motorist on a freeway found out later that the driver was an off-duty police officer in an unmarked car, authorities said Thursday.

Steven R. Lish, 27, was arrested Wednesday and charged with brandishing a firearm, Class A misdemeanor, and possession of a firearm by a restricted person, a third-degree felony, said 8th Circuit Court clerk Genevieve Green.

Lish was freed Thursday on \$3,012 bond.

Bountiful Police Detective Grant Hodson was northbound on Interstate 16 near the Lagoon exit when he pulled a Ford Bronco, then pulled back into the center lane in front of it, said Bountiful Police Sgt. Ira Beal.

He looked in his rearview mirror and saw a passenger in the Bronco pull out a long-barreled revolver and point it at the back window of his police car, Beal said.

Hudson radioed for assistance, and law enforcement officers from several agencies responded, pulling over the vehicle in Layton.

"I don't think the guy had any idea that he was picking on a police officer," said Beal. "He just picked on the wrong guy."

The Bronco was being driven by the passenger's wife.

# Trial ordered to make WPPSS decision

**OLYMPIA (AP)** — The state Supreme Court has ordered a trial to decide whether fraud or state securities-law violations occurred in the Washington Public Power Supply System's \$2.25 billion bond default on two defunct nuclear power plants.

The 6-3 opinion Thursday partially overturns the complete dismissal by King County Superior Court of both individual and institutional bondholder suits. The suits were against WPPSS, the public utilities and electric cooperatives that participated in the two plants, and bond sellers and professional advisers of the system.

Among the court's rulings in the lengthy decision were:

- State security fraud laws apply to bonds that were sold to build WPPSS plants Nos. 4 and 5, which were canceled because of financing difficulties and overestimated demands for electricity in the region.

- Intervening institutional investors are entitled to trial against professional advisers and contractors to WPPSS, on grounds of common-law fraud and misrepresentation.

- Retroactive changes in state securities laws that protect the state and WPPSS officials, but not bond counsel and underwriters, may stand.

- All other major claims by the bondholders and others are rejected.

The court's action allowing retroactive application of the securities-law changes will make it harder for bondholders to prove their cases against the public agencies in court.

All but three of WPPSS's 23 utility members had agreed to the financing plan for the two plants, agreeing to pay for their shares of the projects whether they produced power or not.

Others joining in the projects were seven cities and four people's utility districts in Oregon, five Idaho cities, and 43 rural electric cooperatives in Washington, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon and Wyoming.

Revenue bonds on the projects were sold starting in 1977, and when default was triggered in 1982 by the WPPSS board's decision to terminate the two partially built plants, the total face value of outstanding bonds had reached about

\$2.25 billion. In 1984 and 1985, the court ruled in pro-decedent cases brought by bond trustees that the utility agreements with WPPSS were unenforceable.

The current suit was started in 1984 by individual bondholders who were denied intervenor status in the original cases, and was subsequently joined by institutional bondholders, American Express and United States Trust Co. of New York.

Besides WPPSS and the utilities, defendants include professionals who advised WPPSS and prepared the bond sales. They include accountants Ernst and Whinney, investment advisers Blyth, Eastman, Paine, Webber, Inc., and its officers.

Engineers R.W. Beck Associates, United Engineers and Constructors, Ebasco Services Inc., and bond attorneys.

The Supreme Court, in its majority opinion by Justice Robert F. Brachtenbach, said the lower court used improper standards when it rejected application of state securities fraud laws to the case.

It also rejected contentions by the utilities that the bond underwriters, but not the utilities, could be held liable under the securities laws.

# U of I law professor challenges state law

**MOSCOW (AP)** — A University of Idaho law professor challenging the constitutionality of Idaho's 1986 school board trustee recall law plans to appeal the decision of a Latah County School Board member.

Magistrate William Hamlett, in the first court action under the 16-month-old law, rejected the recall petition filed by Dale Goble to oust board member John Bennett on grounds that it failed to comply with various provisions of the law specifically dealing with school board recalls.

But Goble has claimed that the law is unconstitutional because it attempts to turn what should be a strictly political issue of ousting an elected official into a quasi-judicial function.

"Recall is a political matter," Goble said. "It can be for no reason or any reason."

He said he will press his challenge to the law although "how and to whom I've got to figure out."

Bennett was among three Moscow School Board members targeted for recall during the district's recent teachers' strike. The drives against the other two, including Board Chairman Suzanne Scripser, were dropped, but Goble maintained his petition because of his objection to the law itself.

# Teachers told to use gloves to avoid AIDS

**LEWISTON (AP)** — Lewiston school teachers will be donning gloves to deal with injured children under new guidelines issued by the school district to cope with the threat of acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

Teachers also have been instructed to wash their hands with hydrogen peroxide or alcohol if they have lesions and come into contact with any body fluids, such as blood from injured children.

C. Montgomery Hibbard, director of special services for the Lewiston School District, said plastic gloves are being issued to teachers and other school staff as they come in

for training on how to deal with body fluids that could carry the AIDS virus.

Staff members also are being taught to thoroughly disinfect floors and countertops if any body fluids are spilled, Hibbard said. The prevention measures are part of a plan initiated by the district last month.

The intent is to have a policy and procedures in place before we have a student or faculty member infected with AIDS," Hibbard said.

A draft of the proposed policy is expected to be ready soon for consideration by the Lewiston School Board.

# Morton Thiokol conducts third redesign test

**BRIGHAM CITY, Utah (AP)** — The third in a series of tests of the nozzle-to-case joint on the redesigned space shuttle booster was declared a success Thursday by Morton Thiokol officials.

The objective of the two-minute test firing in a simulator was to determine if a deliberate flow in the joint connecting the nozzle to the body of the rocket would permit hot gases to burn through a new O-ring.

"There was clearly no evidence of blow-by," said Alan J. McDonald, director of the company's shuttle motor redesign team. "We had another good success."

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The redesigned nozzle joint at the aft end of the rocket Thursday included 100 additional radial bolts — 200 in all — adhesively bonded insulation and a third Viton O-ring, designed to augment the primary and secondary rings and to keep ad-

hesive from seeping past the insulation. That treated "a nice, long period to analyze the stresses" within the simulator, he said.

As the gases finally were released, twin plumes of black smoke arose from the Nozzle Joint Environment Simulator for about two minutes, when carbon dioxide was sprayed to cool the simulator.

McDonald said it would take about a week for engineers to analyze the more than 200 instrument readings related to the test and to disassemble the joint.

# High school stops frosh initiation

**HAMILTON (AP)** — The traditional practice of "initiating" freshmen at Hamilton High School will be stopped — at least officially — after some parents complained the pranks had become too humiliating, the school's principal said Thursday.

"I just think we're going to eliminate it for the future years," Principal Henry Badt told The Associated Press.

"The big problem is that no one should be afraid to come to school," he said. "We had some freshmen who stayed home (after the first day of initiation) because they were afraid to go to school."

Badt's comments came two days after a brief student protest that was loosely organized after school officials said they were going to stop initiation practices.

Observers said anywhere from 50 to 100 students staged a brief walk-out between classes Tuesday, but Badt said only about 25 students stayed out of class for any length of time. The school has about 460 students.

Badt said several parents had called him after their children were subjected Monday to initiation rites such as getting dumped in garbage cans, covered with molasses, or getting "swirleds" — their heads soaked in toilets.

"It starts out as a mild activity," the principal said. "But what happens is that each year, the last year has to be topped."

Other students said they were concerned that if an official ban occurred, the initiation practices would continue elsewhere, perhaps in even harsher terms.

Badt acknowledged that extracurricular initiation rites may occur, but said there's not much he or the school can do about it.

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# Teaching foreign language is the key

One of the main concerns of Congress and the American people these days is that life is getting better in Japan faster than it is in the United States.

Many in management circles place the blame on the American worker. That is, the Japanese labor force is more capable and harder-working than its American counterpart; auto workers in Nagoya are more productive than auto workers in Detroit.

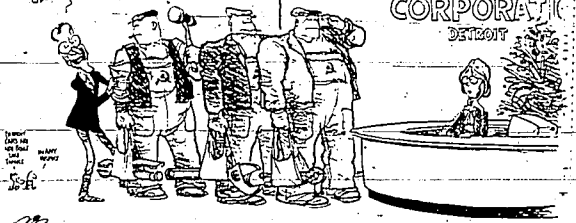
While there may be some validity to this line of reasoning, the problem really has little to do with American workers and hard hard they work. Instead, the comparative decline in the quality of American life is primarily a result of the ethnocentricity of our educational and scientific communities.

How can this be? Last spring, at the behest of Congress, a group of industry and academic leaders convened to discuss the causes of our burgeoning trade deficit. Among other things, the symposium concluded that a key part of the problem was the rapid diffusion of innovations in foreign countries. It used to be that when an American company had a new idea, it took a long time for foreign competitors to imitate the innovation. American companies thereby enjoyed a substantial competitive edge in the world market.

People in other countries do produce new ideas. Our competitive disadvantage results not from our inability to copy theirs. Japanese scientists have access to Japanese ideas and American ideas, while American scientists have access only to American ideas. This is true in all scientific and educational fields. And it's an American problem — not a Japanese, German or Korean problem.

Two examples will make the point. Last spring a Business Week cover story reported a key breakthrough in superconductors made by K.

Alex Muller, a physicist from IBM's Zurich research laboratories. Americans are now about a year behind other scientists because, according to the magazine, Muller published his paper in a German journal not widely read in the United States. And some Americans who did read it doubted the findings — and now regret their skepticism.

Similarly, marketing scholars in this country ignore foreign journals in their field. A recent international marketing journal noted that American surveys are "limited to articles and papers published in journals and conference proceedings that are reasonably accessible to both academicians and practitioners. Thus, although journals like the *Revue Française de Marketing* contain relevant articles, they were considered too inaccessible for inclusion."

"Too inaccessible!" This is sad commentary indeed on American marketing science, my own field.

Much of this problem is due to relaxed foreign-language requirements at all levels in our education system. Fewer than half the U.S. colleges and universities now require foreign-language study for a bachelor's degree, down from nearly 90 percent in 1966. So American scientists can talk to IBM computers and read printouts, but they can't talk to French colleagues or read Ger-

man scientific papers. Ever worse than our lack of capability is our lack of desire. We don't think that it's important to keep up with innovations in other countries. Indeed, we really do believe that American scientists have a monopoly on new ideas.

Rather than spending government resources protecting our ideas, our dollars and energies would be better spent learning foreign languages and thereby trading ideas with our neighbors. Creativity results only from a free flow of ideas. We're paying the price of this scientific ethnocentricity. Research and development expenditures in this country have declined to dangerous levels because those expenditures of late haven't been good investments. In 1987, for the first time in a decade, growth in research and development expenditures will be lower than growth of the economy.

So in the United States, even if people work harder, life still won't get better unless we begin to pay attention to scientific developments in other countries. And we can do that only if we reinstitute foreign-language requirements at all levels of our education system.

Some are, perhaps, in it for more selfish motives, for what government can do for them. And some are probably just civic-minded citizens who want to make a contribution to the communities in which they have lived and worked.

Off-year elections are sometimes sleepy affairs with little public interest. Unless a local issue stirs the voting population, the turnout is traditionally low.

But in terms of impact, local government can have enormous effect. Look, for example, at the economic development results achieved by some active Twin Falls local leaders this fall.

But local government can also be intensely frustrating. Often, public apathy is high, unless the zoning dispute involves a person's own neighborhood. The hours are often long, the pay small or nonexistent. Public and press scrutiny can, on occasion, be intense. It is little wonder some officials don't stay for very long.

This month, across the valley, we voters will go to the polls to elect our local government leaders.

We, as the citizens who will vote for or against them, should spend as much time as we can becoming familiar with the candidates and with what they would do if elected.

If there is a civic responsibility for officials to do their best, it is ours to become informed and to vote for those who would promote the overall good of the community.

## Less choice? Wash that thought away

BOSTON — The woman is standing in the drugstore suffering from acute consumeritis.

The attack has been brought on by the excess of choices on the shelf before her. Her chief symptom is mental paralysis, the total inability to make a decision.

The woman did not expect that a simple trip to the drugstore would bring such a disease. But this is not your old type drugstore with soda fountain and ark. This is the mega-drug store with acres of offerings for things to put in and on the human body. Each part of the anatomy — from the toe and its corne to the fingernail and its polish — has been allotted its own half-acre.

At the moment of acute consumeritis, the woman in question is in the space devoted to the head. She came here on a quest for a refill of shampoo. But when her usual brand was no longer available, she was tossed wildly into the chaos of the modern day world of shampoos.

What did she want after all? Which of the three-dozen options lined up before her would make the dead follicles that grow out of her busy head come alive? A moisturizing formula? A body-building protein? A mysterious chemical soup of Elastin? Collagen? Keratin? Elastin?

She was compelled by the labels to ask herself some penetrating questions. Was she the sort of person who needed her PH Balanced? Or would she prefer her PH a bit off kilter? Should she put essential fatty acids in her scalp? Or were they bad for the cholesterol? Did she want a shampoo with a pectin extract? Or isn't that what she uses to make jelly?

To her shock, this woman who earns her living making decisions, who knows and says what she thinks of Baby M, Robert Bork and the meaning of life, was having a shampoo identity crisis. Holding two products aloft, she finally turned in a panic to a perfect stranger next to her and asked: "Tell me, is my hair Normal or Dry?"

With that our subject broke. After a few brief catatonic moments, she turned from the startled stranger, and sped back through the mega-drugstore. She passed the half-mile devoted to teeth without once considering whether she wanted tartar control in her toothpaste or cinnamon flavor in her dental floss. She nearly vaulted over the checkout counter.

Home again in the quiet of her shower, pouring her daughter's leftovers over her scalp, it occurred to her that she had learned a good deal about the pitfalls of the modern consumer world. The proliferation of personal products had turned shopping into a decision-making marathon. The competing claims of manufacturers, the specialties and subspecialties, had produced an information glut. Informed consumers are now expected to com-

pare the claims and ingredients, not to mention the pricing, of hundreds of everyday products. More to the point, they are propelled into examining their bodies in ever more minute detail. Does my skin need intensive care or none? Do I have plaque on my teeth or not? Ridge on my nails? Split ends on my hair? Am I normal or dry?

It's bad enough that the drift of all this is toward an elaborate self-absorption. We are also led to believe that picking one bottle or another is an important, meaningful decision. Maybe as citizens we don't have much control over our lives, but surely as consumers we do. Buying is the way we push the lever in the economic voting booth. Why, we can choose between Elastin or Keratin.

One thing is clear to the woman lathering the body-building protein in her scalp. What the advertisers call brand loyalty is a low-level consumer protest movement. It's our way of refusing through the route of decision-making, avoiding the barrage of useless information. It's a defense against the need to waste energy differentiating between things that barely differ.

Could it be that the Great American Consumer Society has topped out, subdivided, proliferated into an overwhelming shopping aisle? Could it be that what the American consumer really wants these days is less choice? Heresy. The woman will wash that treasonous thought right out of her normal-to-dry hair.

## Under current law, dangerous pesticides still on market

The good news is that federal agencies are finally amassing basic data on the health effects of some widely used pesticides.

The bad news is that the current federal pesticide law virtually guarantees that several of the most dangerous pesticides will remain on the market.

According to a recent grocery retailer's survey, 96 percent of Americans believe that pesticide residues in foods are a hazard. Such suspicions were confirmed this spring by the prestigious National Academy of Sciences, which reported that can-

cer-causing pesticides are used extensively on even basic foods like tomatoes, apples and potatoes.

The NAS study shows that lifetime cancer risks from dietary exposure to only 28 pesticides could be as high as 6.8 cancer cases in 1,000 exposed people. The academy noted that for many of the carcinogenic pesticides, substitutes are available that do not cause cancer.

One might have expected a swift response from the federal agency charged with regulating pesticides, the Environmental Protection Agency. But that has not happened. Not one of the 28 carcinogenic pesticides has been eliminated from the American food supply. The culprit is the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act, which perversely hinders the immediate removal of any pesticide — no matter how dangerous — that is now on the market and in your groceries.

Included in the pesticide law are two obscure provisions that exist for no reason

other than to compensate producers of the most hazardous pesticides for regulatory action. These provisions, which are slowly gaining notoriety on Capitol Hill, are referred to as "indemnification" and "disposal." The indemnification provision says that if EPA finds a pesticide too risky to be used or sold, EPA has to pay the pesticide maker the retail value of all existing stocks. The disposal provision requires that EPA accept banned pesticides for storage and disposal at the expense of the taxpayers.

No other law promises federal funds to companies that manufacture extraordinarily dangerous products. Even such politically weighty industries as automobile and pharmaceutical manufacturers must absorb the costs of their mistakes and recall defective products with no governmental assistance.

Pesticide indemnification and disposal obligations prevent incentives for companies to develop safer pesticides or to withdraw agricultural chemicals as soon as hazards are identified. Indeed, the provisions might motivate unscrupulous pesticide makers to step up production when incriminating health data emerge in order to further disburse EPA's suspension of their products. Even worse, these requirements effectively eviscerate EPA's power to halt the use and sale of pesticides that are found to pose grave risks.

The EPA estimated indemnity costs of \$101.6 million for alachlor, a widely used corn and soybean herbicide that the NAS report identified as posing a significant carcinogenic risk; for benfonyl, a carcinogenic fungicide used extensively on fruit, the cost could run to \$78 million. EPA expects disposal of banned pesticides to be at least as expensive as indemnification.

Unless the federal pesticide law is reformed, EPA's pesticide budget will be strained beyond the breaking point, and objective judgments concerning regulatory matters will be jeopardized. With hundreds of old pesticides in desperate need of assessment for their potential to cause cancer, birth defects, neurological disorders, and other disastrous effects, EPA simply cannot afford an insurance program for pesticide makers.

If the skimpy pesticide budget is handed over to pesticide companies that make bad products instead of being spent to improve the regulation of pesticides, Americans will continue to consume pesticides in their food and water.

There are some solutions, but they are not of the glamorous variety that appeal to most politicians. Congress needs to eliminate the pesticide law's indemnification and disposal requirements. Congress should provide EPA with an effective pesticide-recall authority and sufficient resources to carry out its other charges under the law. No congressional action deserves to be called pesticide reform absent these crucial amendments.

# Immigration law shows strong results

WASHINGTON (AP) - The new federal immigration law is showing "strong, clear results" after less than a year, with the number of illegal aliens apprehended at the border down 30 percent and more than 800,000 people seeking amnesty under the new regulations, Immigration and Naturalization Service Director Alan C. Nelson said Thursday.

Nelson, speaking during a press briefing, also announced a major change in the agency's amnesty program that could extend protection to an additional 100,000 aliens. It would apply to some aliens who were living here illegally, left the country during the law's specified eligibility period, and then returned.

"What we've seen from the first 11 months of the new program is that people know about this law, and that knowledge about it is growing," Nelson said. "In a very short time, we've found that overall compliance across the country has been quite good."

Under the new immigration law, which was approved last November, aliens can apply for legal residence as part of a 12-month amnesty pro-

gram that ends May 4, 1988. The government is required to grant residence to those who can document that they have lived continuously in the United States since Jan. 1, 1982.

The law also cracks down on employers who knowingly hire illegal aliens. In the past few months, Nelson said, federal officials have filed more than 100 warning citations against employers who employed aliens, and are reading "a considerable number" of fines on businesses that employed them after receiving official warnings.

Last week, the INS announced the first two such fines under the new law, a \$6,000 penalty against an El Cajon, Calif., waterbed company and a \$16,500 fine against an Arlington, Va., hotel. The Virginia firm received the stiffer penalty, Nelson said, because it had violated more provisions of the immigration law than the California company.

Given the "strong warning" sent out by the new law, the 30 percent decline in border apprehensions shows that aliens now realize that they will have a difficult time finding work in the United States.

Other Republican leaders, gathered in Atlanta Thursday for a conference on the Super Tuesday primaries, said the revelations could hurt, though the sentiment was not unanimous. "We can't criticize Biden and praise Robertson at the same time," said Jean Sullivan, Republican National Committee woman for Alabama.

Robertson got a much more sympathetic response from among about 300 supporters who heard him give a campaign speech here.

# Press coverage includes family history

PHILADELPHIA - Republican presidential candidate Marion G. "Pat" Robertson said Thursday his "outrageous" and "reprehensible" for the media to make news out of the fact that he conceived his first child out of wedlock 33 years ago, then fudged on his anniversary date to "protect his family." He said, however, he expected the revelation to help his candidacy.

"I think that to intrude into a man's family life and to try and hurt a person's wife and children is outrageous," Robertson told reporters after a campaign appearance here.

He added: "I think the American people want to know that they will have a president who hurts like

they do, who understands their problems, and one who is person that is very much human, but who also understands forgiveness."

Robertson publicly disclosed his real wedding date - Aug. 27, 1954 - for the first time last week to a reporter for The Wall Street Journal who was writing a profile of him. The Washington Post reported Wednesday that before that disclosure - and as recently as this summer in an interview with a Post reporter - Robertson has always maintained that he was married on March 22, 1954.

Robertson said the out-of-wedlock conception occurred before "Jesus Christ came into my life 31 years ago. ... I have never, never indicated that in the early part of my life, I didn't sow some wild oats. I sowed plenty of them."

He also denied that he has ever misstated or embellished other facts of his life, as reported in The Washington Post and other newspapers. "My life has been filled with enough honors and distinctions that I have plaques covering an entire wall. I don't need to embellish anything ... and I have never done that."

The Washington Post has reported that in the past few months, years, Robertson has claimed to be a board member of the United Virginia Bank when he in fact only serves on a community advisory board; that he claimed to have done graduate study at the University of London when in fact he took a summer arts course there; that he has claimed to have served "in combat"

# State department cuts biggest round of jobs

WASHINGTON (AP) - The State Department, struggling to cope with severe budget restrictions, is preparing the biggest round of job cuts in the department's modern history. About 1,270 jobs, or about 8 percent of its 15,800 Foreign Service and Civil Service positions, will be eliminated.

Senior department officials said Thursday that the proposed cuts probably will require the department to ask Congress for legislation permitting early retirement incentives and a follow-up reduction in force (RIF) since neither is permitted by the Foreign Service Act of 1980.

The officials also said that they and other senior officials believe the cuts will have what one called a "devastating effect" on morale and will severely impede the department's performance.

The sources charged that the cuts had been planned in secrecy without consulting the various bureaus of the department and, as a result, reflect what one called "a numbers-crunching approach that concentrates on eliminating people rather than expenditures for things such as buildings and equipment that could have been deferred. ..."

In particular, the sources said, many senior officials think that the department should have sought to save money by postponing plans for construction of a new campus in suburban Virginia for the Foreign Service Institute, various embassy-building projects overseas and extension of its computer operations.

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# Lab worker infected by AIDS

WASHINGTON (AP) - A second laboratory worker has become infected with the AIDS virus after handling highly concentrated solutions of the agent, National Institutes of Health officials disclosed Thursday.

NIH authorities said the unidentified worker apparently became infected when his or her hand was cut accidentally during the process of concentrating the virus.

Dr. Robert McKinney, director of the NIH's division of safety, said in an interview that the worker was contaminated late in 1985 and the infection was first detected in May, 1986.

Although two subsequent tests have confirmed AIDS antibodies in the worker's blood, McKinney said there are no indications the person yet has developed symptoms of ac-

quired immune deficiency syndrome.

The worker, who is employed by a federal contractor in the Washington area, was handling the virus concentrates used for research and making AIDS diagnostic tests.

# Super-secret 'stealth' bomber may see faults

WASHINGTON - The unusually tight development and testing schedule being followed for the super-secret "stealth" bomber could saddle the plane with debilitating technical problems once it is deployed, a team of Rand Corp. analysts has warned Secretary of Defense Caspar W. Weinberger.

The Air Force has so little time to make major decisions about the advanced bomber, the Rand study suggests, that any delays in the development and test phases could leave the United States without a dependable manned penetrating bomber for a critical period in the 1990s after Soviet defenses become capable of stopping the B-1B bomber.

Prototypes of the stealth are now being tested, and the Air Force's ambitious timetable calls for the first bombers to be added to the force in the early 1990s. Air Force officials have said the B-1B will be unable to breach Soviet defenses beyond the mid-1990s.

That leaves little room for slippage in the stealth's timetable,

Rand specialists suggested in a closed briefing for Weinberger this week. To avoid a strategic bomber gap, they said, the Air Force could be forced to compromise the stealth's quality and reliability.

Sources familiar with the study by Rand, a Santa Monica, Calif.-based think tank, said it worried that the result could be a futuristic bomber plagued by the kinds of equipment snafus that have bedeviled the B-1B bomber.

The Strategic Air Command on Tuesday grounded all of its 66 B-1B bombers to inspect the emergency oxygen system in the wake of a Sept. 28 crash of one of the aircraft. By Thursday, the Air Force says, 18 of the planes were operational again.

It was the second time the Air Force has grounded at least part of its fleet of B-1B bombers since the first of them came into the force a year ago. About a year ago, some of the aircraft were grounded because of fuel leaks.

"Too much concurrency increases risk," conceded Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Larry Welch in congressional testimony earlier this year.

# Lawyer must submit names of project whistleblowers

WASHINGTON (AP) - An attorney representing 56 anonymous whistleblowers charging misdeeds at the South Texas Nuclear Project says she will go to jail rather than divulge the names of her clients to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

Allegations include safety and criminal misconduct and range from poor workmanship to organized fraud on the part of the government and contractors.

Billie P. Garde, an attorney for the Government Accountability Project, has been ordered by the NRC through a subpoena to turn over all names and allegations brought to her by the whistleblowers regarding the uncompleted nuclear plant near Bay City, Texas.

Ms. Garde, however, doesn't trust the federal agency to carry out an impartial investigation of the more than 650 individual charges.

"The NRC individuals who look at these allegations must not be the same people who originally ignored the problems and went down and rubberstamped South Texas in the first place," said Ms. Garde, pointing specifically to NRC Executive Director Frank Stello and the officials overseeing the southwestern United States for NRC.

## Burnley the choice for transport post

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan Friday nominated James H. Burnley IV, a federal transportation official who has clashed with senators about aviation safety, to succeed Elizabeth Dole as secretary of transportation.

Reagan praised Burnley's "longstanding interest in and grasp of public policy."

In a speech to Transportation Department employees gathered in the Rose Garden, Reagan also announced that he is nominating Mimi Dawson, a former congressional staff member who has been a member of the Federal Communications Commission since 1981, to succeed Burnley as deputy secretary of transportation.

Both nominations must be approved by the Senate.

In announcing his nomination of Burnley, a former North Carolina trial lawyer who came to Washington in 1981 as director of VISTA and later served as an associate deputy attorney general, Reagan said:

"Jim has had a longtime interest in and solid grasp of public policy. Add to his grasp of public policy his personal integrity and easy manner and you can understand how he earned his reputation as both a sound policy maker and excellent administrator."

## INS relaxes rules on alien amnesty

WASHINGTON (AP) — Immigration officials announced Thursday they are relaxing regulations to allow 100,000 or more illegal aliens who re-entered the United States on fraudulently obtained visas to qualify for amnesty.

The relaxation came as the Immigration and Naturalization Service disclosed a 30 percent decline in the number of apprehensions of illegal aliens along the nation's borders, which INS officials regard as a sign that the sweeping immigration law enacted a year ago is succeeding.

"The law is beginning to work ...

to discourage illegal immigration by turning off the magnet of jobs that attracts people to this country," INS Commissioner Alan Nelson told a news conference.

The new rule change allows people who left the United States after living here illegally and then used fraudulent documents to re-enter the country to be included in the amnesty program.

At least 100,000 people will be affected by the modification and hundreds of applications for legalization have been held up until the INS made the policy change, Nelson

said that in one instance, the wife in a Mexican family living in Los Angeles since 1977 returned to Mexico for a family emergency and obtained a visitor's visa to re-enter the United States after Jan. 1, 1982.

Under the immigration law, illegal aliens must have been in the United States since Jan. 1, 1982 to be eligible for the amnesty program, which is expected to affect 2 million people. Some 800,000 applications have been received to date.

In another instance a young man from Africa came here in 1973 as a student and worked illegally after completing his studies, said Nelson. The man was sent out of the United States on business and obtained a visitor's visa to return to the United States. Under the relaxed rule, he will now be eligible for legalized status.

Nelson said the revision could be especially beneficial to people from Europe, Asia, Africa and elsewhere who may have overstayed an initial visa and then left the country for an

emergency and acquired another visa to return.

The rules change requires applicants for legalization to pay a fee of \$35.

Nelson also told the news conference that apprehensions of illegal aliens for the 12 months ended Sept. 30 totaled 1.1 million, a decline of 30 percent from the preceding year.

"We attribute the decrease to the fact that fewer people attempted illegal entry because they believed they could not find employment due to the employer sanctions provision of the Immigration Reform and Control Act," he said.

The 1986 immigration law makes it illegal for U.S. employers to knowingly hire illegal aliens and requires them to ascertain the citizenship of new employees. Some 100 citations have been issued to employers for violations of the law and several of the employers were fined last week.

## Reagan, Senate agree on Saudi arms sale

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan reached agreement Thursday with Senate leaders on a \$1 billion sale of weapons to Saudi Arabia after Maverick air-to-ground missiles were eliminated from the arms package.

"This will not upset the military balance in the Middle East, it is not a threat to Israel, and it helps a friend," said Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., following meetings with administration officials.

The inclusion of 1,600 Maverick missiles in the arms package, as originally planned, had caused deadlock over the sale because of fears

that the missiles could pose a threat to Israel.

Their elimination from the package leaves in the deal a dozen F-15 fighter aircraft, which will be shipped only as needed to replace current Saudi inventory; \$300 million in "electronic upgrades" for planes now in the Saudi air force; and upgrades for currently held M-60 tanks and artillery vehicles.

The administration plans to formally request the weapons soon, said Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, who added: "We are pleased that there will not be a confrontation between Congress and the president over the sale."

The agreement announced by the senators also specified that the administration will not seek to sell \$7 million worth of Stinger shoulder-fired ground-to-air missiles to Bahrain. Members of Congress feared the weapons could fall into the hands of terrorists.

"This may not satisfy everyone," Dole said, noting 68 senators had objected to the original sale proposal. "But I think it probably is going to be approved."

It was not immediately clear whether the agreement also was acceptable to House leaders. "I would presume the White House is making the rounds and trying to put together a package," said one House Democratic leadership aide.

"That removes one of the principal objections," said another House official familiar with the issue.

## Move embassy, Senate tells USSR

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate, upset at both the Soviet Union and the State Department, voted Thursday to order the Soviets to move out of their new Washington embassy and rebuild it in an area where it can't be used as a base for espionage.

"The Soviets conned us" in 1972 when the two superpowers agreed to construct new embassies in each other's capital city, said Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C.

The Democratic-controlled chamber gave voice to a proposal by Sen. Steven Symms, R-Idaho, which would order that the new Soviet Embassy here be rebuilt in another location.

The action came as the Senate

plowed through a bill authorizing a \$3.6 billion budget for the State Department in the fiscal year that began Oct. 1.

As it worked through the bill, the Senate also voted approval, by voice vote, of a resolution renewing its support for U.S.-backed efforts to end the Iran-Iraq war.

Instead of the current site, the Soviets would be given a new spot in Washington for an embassy, but the location couldn't be more than 90 feet above sea level to reduce the opportunity to intercept communications by government agencies.

The current embassy, in an area of the city known as Mount Airy, is about 350 feet above sea level, located on one of the highest spots of

land in the capital.

It was the second time in three weeks that the Senate had approved such an amendment. On Sept. 24, the Senate voted 70-24 to attach the same amendment to a defense authorization bill. But that measure faces a likely veto by President Reagan because of other provisions, Helms noted.

"The defense bill is going absolutely nowhere; the president is going to veto it," Helms said. "There are some hopes that we're going to enact this into law."

Symms' amendment noted that the new U.S. Embassy building in Moscow has been found to be riddled with Soviet listening devices.

## U.S. doing better with defectors

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. intelligence has improved its handling of Soviet-bloc defectors but a "vacuum" remains for dealing with less urgent cases, the heads of the two main U.S. spy agencies told Congress on Thursday.

The CIA got a black eye in November 1985 when KGB officer Vitaly Yurchenko "re-defected" back to Moscow, CIA Director William Webster conceded. But since then, he said, "there has been a substantial increase in the number of intelligence officers assigned to this work and a shift in emphasis."

"And I can assure you that I will

be watching this carefully, because the defectors that we can recruit can be a substantial assistance to the United States," Webster told the Senate Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations in his first public testimony since being confirmed in his job last May 19.

Li. Gen. William Odum, director of the secretive National Security Agency, said that "the Yurchenko case was special and damaging."

Both Webster and Odum agreed with a committee staff report that "a vacuum exists in current government programs for the systematic identification and productive inte-

gration of a significant group of defectors into U.S. public life."

Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., the committee chairman, said that "society is not fully and productively integrating these individuals into the mainstream of American life. Nor, as a result, are we fully utilizing their talents and analytical skills."

"Unlike other countries, the communist bloc closely guards even some of the most innocuous facts and figures behind an all-encompassing veil of state security apparatus," said Nunn. "Defectors offer us a tool to pierce that veil."

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**U.S. soldiers arrested**

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) — Ten Americans, nine of them soldiers, and five Panamanian civilians were arrested for disorderly conduct, police and a pro-government newspaper said Thursday.

Col. Leonidas Macias, the Panamanian police chief, confirmed in an interview with The Associated Press that the arrests took place Wednesday night. He said the nine soldiers were turned over to U.S. authorities early Thursday but refused to give further details.

Neither the newspaper nor police gave details on when and how the men were arrested. But witnesses said opponents of the military-dominated government tried to organize a demonstration Wednesday night after President Eric Arturo Delvalle addressed the nation on television.

Delvalle warned in the speech that he won't tolerate further anti-government demonstrations, which have been occurring in the capital off-and-on since early June.

**Canada enters in strike**

TORONTO (AP) — Prime Minister Brian Mulroney's Conservative government intervened Thursday with emergency legislation to halt a 9-day-old national postal strike over the sale of post office franchises to private business.

As rotating walkouts hit major sorting centers in Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba, Labor Minister Pierre Cadieux introduced legislation in Parliament in Ottawa to force the striking mail sorters and counter clerks back to work.

With a comfortable Conservative majority in Parliament, the bill was expected to pass within days.

The intervention came after the latest round of talks between the 23,000-member Canadian Union of Postal Workers and state-owned Canada Post Corp. broke down on Wednesday.

The union is fighting corporation plans to cut costs by offering postal franchises to drug stores and other outlets. The union contends this would convert up to 4,200 union jobs paying \$10.34 an hour into low-paying, non-union jobs.

**W. Germany enters gulf**

BONN, West Germany — West Germany, under U.S. pressure to support the Western allies' naval presence in the Persian Gulf, announced Thursday that it will send three warships to the Mediterranean Sea to take over duties of NATO members' ships that have been diverted to the Middle East.

The arrival of West Germany's task force, scheduled for Oct. 14, will mark the first time since the country was founded after World War II that its warships are assigned to help patrol the Mediterranean.

The decision, announced by the Defense Ministry, represents a compromise between Bonn's reluctance to become entangled in the gulf and U.S. efforts to obtain the maximum possible allied support for its policy there, West German and U.S. officials said.

**Candidate seeks return of army control**

SEOUL, South Korea — Roh Tae Woo, the ruling Democratic Justice Party's candidate for president said Thursday that in the 1990s South Korea will seek to regain control of its armed forces, which are now commanded by an American general.

Last month in Washington, Roh had mentioned the command issue as a "problem for the future," but his remark Thursday was his first reference to it in connection with his campaign. Growing nationalist sentiment among younger

Koreans, including military officers and students, has added the issue to the list of grievances that Koreans have against the United States. U.S. command of Korean troops dates back to the Korean War, in 1950-53, when the United States headed a United Nations command that included Korean and other non-American troops fighting an invading force from North Korea and China. It continued when South Korea refused to sign an armistice, leaving the United States as the only guarantor of the peace.

Roh said nothing about what South Korea would do to maintain the armistice in the event that Washington gives up control of South Korea's forces. "It is quite natural for the nation to be given back the right to control its military forces when it is equipped with sufficient military power to defend itself," he said.

That time will come, he said, in the 1990s, when South Korea's military capability reaches a level of about 80 percent of the north's. He estimated that the south's capabil-

ity is now 62 percent of the north's.

According to U.S. officials, there already have been informal talks about relinquishing control of Korean troops, but they have refrained from publicly stating a clear policy on the question.

Roh, calling for a presidential election campaign based on policy debates rather than "slander, as in the past," said that he will work to bring about the reinstatement of civil servants who were purged in 1980 by President Chun Doo Hwan.

**Indian troops work to curb Tamil rebel violence**

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka (AP) — Tamil militants Thursday killed at least 22 people, most of them ethnic Sinhalese, as Indian peacekeeping troops fanned out to quell violence in Tamil-dominated provinces, officials said.

The death toll in rebel attacks rose to at least 188 in the past two

days in the bloodiest carnage since a peace accord guaranteed by India was signed in July to end the Tamil separatist war.

The chief of the Indian army staff, Gen. Krishnaswami Sunderji, rushed to the northern Jaffna Peninsula from New Delhi to review the situation. He also planned to tour

the east to oversee operations of the peacekeeping troops.

Indian Defense Minister K.C. Pant planned to arrive Friday to discuss the latest spiral of violence with President Junius R. Jayawardene.

Tamils, who are mainly Hindu, comprise 18 percent of Sri Lanka's

16 million people, most of whom are Buddhist-Sinhalese. Tamils allege they have been discriminated against in jobs, education and use of their language.

Tamil militants have been fighting for a separate state in the north and east, where Tamils predominate.

**Free monkey not in danger**

MOSCOW (AP) — The orbiting monkey that freed his left paw and went ape can't do any damage on the spaceship he shares with another monkey, white rats and insects, a Soviet scientist said Thursday.

Rostislav A. Ruzin, a spokesman for the Soviet biomedical institute involved in the experiments aboard the flight, said mischievous Yerusha was "probing with great curiosity" whatever he could reach, but was isolated in a sealed chamber and could not reach the other ones.

**Device increases gas mileage by 22% to 40%**

On July 14th, the government awarded National Fuel Saver Corp. \$22,000 for developing a simple automotive accessory that increases gas mileage by 22 percent.

Called the Platinum GasSaver, it injects microscopic quantities of platinum into the airstream entering the engine.

The injector itself takes only minutes to install while the platinum entering the engine increases the percentage of each gallon burning in the engine from the normal 68 percent to 90 percent.

Normally, that 22 percent would only burn when it came in contact with the platinum-coated surfaces of the catalytic converter. But with the GasSaver introducing the platinum into the engine, platinum catalysis can now burn that fuel in the engine where the release of that heat and energy is harnessed in drive the vehicle.

With 22 percent more of each gallon burning in the engine, 22 percent fewer gallons are required.

The process works on both leaded and unleaded gasoline,

and meets EPA and California standards.

## Surrogate mother sets down her side of story

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Surrogate mother Mary Beth Whitehead will tell her side of the landmark Baby M custody case in a book to be published in the spring, according to a

published report.

Adjoon Wesley Publishing of Reading, Mass., expects to complete the contracts with Mrs. Whitehead and her lawyers next week, Martha Moutrey, a senior editor for the publisher, told The Record of Hackensack on Wednesday.

The newspaper quoted sources close to Mrs. Whitehead as saying she will receive an advance of \$90,000 to \$100,000.

A spokeswoman for Addison-Wesley, Diane Hovenseian, said the publisher is scheduled to release the book next spring.

The book's tentative title is "Sara: A Mother's Story" — a reference to the name Mrs. Whitehead gave the baby at its birth 18 months ago. Mrs. Whitehead's pregnancy was part of a surrogate parenting

contract with William and Elizabeth Stern.

In March, Superior Court Judge Hrey R. Sorkow awarded permanent custody of the baby to the Sterns and severed Mrs. Whitehead's parental rights.

Mrs. Whitehead, who was artificially inseminated with Stern's sperm, has appealed Sorkow's decision to the New Jersey Supreme Court.

## Enquirer's suit heads for federal court trial

MIAMI (AP) — A federal judge will hear a suit filed by the National Enquirer against the owners of a British newspaper for publishing photographs of the Joan Collins-Peter Holm wedding.

The News of the World, owned by News Group Ltd., published shots of the couple's private wedding in Las Vegas four days after the ceremony in its 5 million-copy edition of Nov. 10, 1985.

The National Enquirer, based in Lantana, filed suit, saying it had paid \$160,000 for rights to the photos and had not given News of the World permission to publish them in England.

U.S. District Judge Sidney M. Aronovitz Wednesday denied a dismissal motion by News Group.

## Airliner makes special detour to drop couple

LONDON (AP) — Prince Andrew and his wife Sarah got special treatment on their way home from Mau-

ritius when a jetliner carrying them from the island in the Indian Ocean made a 2½-hour detour Thursday and took them to London.

The Air Mauritius Boeing 747 flew from Mauritius to Munich and was supposed to continue to Paris. But it stopped at Heathrow Airport in London instead to drop off the royal couple and accompanying reporters.

Andrew and Sarah, the Duke and Duchess of York, had been vacationing in Mauritius for two weeks.

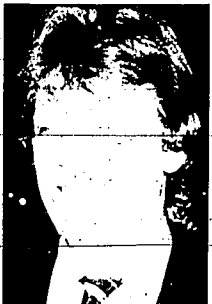

## At Lincoln Tunnel Billboard displays virtues of Wyoming

WEEHAWKEN, N.J. (AP) — Wyoming Gov. Mike Sullivan became a bit homesick last year during a 45-minute traffic jam at the Lincoln Tunnel, and he wants other weary motorists to long for the wide-open spaces.

So a billboard carrying a pastoral camping scene featuring a lake and snow-capped mountains beckons survivors of the urban jungle to "Find Yourself In Wyoming."

Sullivan came up with the billboard idea 1½ years ago when caught in a traffic jam while heading from New Jersey to New York to watch the University of Wyoming basketball team play in the National Invitation Tournament.

"He was stuck for 45 minutes and he got to looking around and wondered, 'Wouldn't this be a great place to advertise the virtues of Wyoming?'" Sullivan's press secretary, Dennis Curran, said recently. "In Wyoming, they could be fishing — or at least get to work on time."

Sullivan, an attorney who was elected governor last November, forgot about his idea until July, when he recalled it as an anecdote during an interview with Gannett Co. Inc. Chairman Allen Neuharth.

A company subsidiary, the Gannett Outdoor Group, owns the billboard on the New Jersey side of the tunnel and convinced Hiram Walker Inc., the liquor manufacturer and importer, to give it up for a month.

Sullivan's message went on display Sept. 30 in a month-long promo-

tion of the Cowboy State.

The billboard features a panoramic scene of Green River Lake and Squeetop Mountain north of Pinedale, Wyo.

"Wyoming has a lot of virtues," Curran said. "We're a wide-open, mountainous, rugged, outdoor state. We don't have the hassles that people in urban areas have."

"We complain at 5 p.m. when people get off work and there's a traffic jam for five minutes."

The Gannett Outdoor Group is paying half the \$15,000 cost to display the billboard for 30 days, said company spokeswoman Pat Wheeler.

Wyoming's Travel Commission had been prepared to pick up the tab for the remaining \$7,500, said Curran, but Mountain Bell stepped in and offered to pay the bill after learning of the promotion from Sullivan.

Ms. Wheeler said the billboard's prime location allows it to be seen by up to 100,000 people a day.

Curran does not know whether Wyoming tourist officials will be able to measure the success of the state's invitation, but said Sullivan is "just thrilled that it's up there."

"Wyoming gets to keep the billboard when it comes down, so officials might decide to post it elsewhere in the nation, he said.

"We're not sure whether it will bring people to the state, but at least we'll know thousands of people from the New York area that they won't have to worry about traffic jams in Wyoming."

## Animal control officers see their job as a labor of love

**DEAR ABBY:** A few years ago, you had a letter in your column that began: "I am your animal control officer."

Please run it again with your answer. It would be a timely reminder about the proper love and care of animals entrusted to our care.

**DEAR MILTON:** That letter went up on the bulletin boards of many schools. Thanks for asking. Here it is:

**— DEAR ABBY:** I am your animal control officer. I am not the dreaded "dogcatcher" or the "murderer" you call me.

It is not I who allows your pet to roam the streets, to contract diseases from other free-roaming animals, to be hit by passing motorists or poisoned by rotting garbage. I am the one who must look into those sick, pain-glazed eyes, try to remove the animal without causing it further pain, and then humbly "put it to sleep" to put an end to its suffering.

It is not I who allows your pets to breed, then dumps the unwanted puppies and kittens on roadways and in shelters. I'm the one who must find the tiny animals before they die of starvation, exposure or disease, and as an act of mercy, exterminate them. It hurts me to be forced to kill hundreds of thousands of animals each year, but because of your irresponsibility, I have no choice.

It is not I who abandons unwanted animals on farm roads, telling myself some friendly farmer will surely take them in and give them a good home. But I am the one who must pick up the frightened animal who waits in vain for its beloved master, wondering why it has been abandoned.

I am the one who must help that friendly farmer trap, tranquilize or kill that animal because it has begun to roam in packs with other abandoned hungry animals, killing livestock, fowl and game.

I am not the one who breeds and fights dogs in the name of "sport." But I'm the one who fights the breeders and participants, and must pick up the dead and dying animals that have been left behind.

It is not I who keeps a pet confined in an area too small — without food, water, shelter or exercise. But I must deal with the irresponsible owner who does.

It is not I who refuses to spend the time and money to keep up regular inoculations that all pets require. But I am the one who must pick up the sick animal that is dying of a preventable disease.

So remember, the next time your child is bitten by a stray dog, your trash is dumped and scattered, your pet is lost, stolen, poisoned or hit by a car, it is the animal control officer you call — not the "dogcatcher."

The next time your pet is picked up, or you are cited for neglecting or abusing it, remember, I am only trying to get you to fulfill your responsibility to your pet, your neighbor and yourself.

Do not scorn me. Respect me, for I am the product of your responsibility. I love animals, and I care.

**DEAR OFFICER:** Thank you for a powerful message that needs to be repeated often.

No pet should be allowed to breed indiscriminately. Please, please have your pet spayed or neutered. And if you have a dollar or two to spare, please send it to your local SPCA. We can feed and care for all those kittens and puppies a little longer — instead of exterminating them immediately for lack of funds. I love animals, and I care, too.

## Demo event profits limited

TWIN FALLS — The Tom T. Hall concert and fundraiser for Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, failed to raise much money for the 2nd District congressman, a staff member said Thursday.

"It wasn't what we wanted as a fundraiser," said Sally Gasser, a Stallings aide who managed his 1986 campaign. "It didn't make much of a profit."

Last Saturday's concert attracted about 500 people, who paid \$15 apiece to see the country western singer.

But the event cost organizers \$7,600 to bring Hall in, meaning the fundraiser has barely broken even.

"Stallings' workers said they were still collecting money on Thursday from last Saturday's concert.

The concert was supposed to be a joint fundraiser between Stallings and five county Democratic chairmen.

Twin Falls County Chairman Joe Gulick said even though the concert failed to generate much money, "we gained in other areas."

"We picked up a few more volunteers as a result, and we picked up a couple of possible candidates for 1988," he said. He declined to give any names of potential candidates.

Gasser said Stallings has had about six or seven fundraising events this year, and "we're about where we expected to be."

"So far, we feel very good about the response and what's coming in, especially compared with other candidates," she said.

Reports filed with the Federal Election Commission on June 30 show Stallings had raised \$88,669 for the first six months of this year. Disbursements were \$30,872, and cash on hand was listed as \$32,570.

Gasser estimated that another \$25,000 has come into the campaign since June.

Stallings has raised more than Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, who reported raising \$36,090 as of June 30. FEC records showed he paid out \$33,934 on expenses and had a balance of \$15,896.

Idaho's two Republican senators managed to raise far bigger sums for their campaign coffers. Sen. Steve Symms received \$95,000 and spent \$92,963 for the first six months of this year, FEC records show. His campaign has \$147,023 in cash on hand.

Sen. Jim McClure, up for election in 1990, reported raising \$18,536 and spent \$41,567. His campaign fund balance stands at \$234,812.

Another Stallings fundraiser is planned in Rexburg this month, but on a smaller scale than the Hall concert, Gasser said.

"I think we do better when he has a chance to meet people on a one-on-one basis," she said. "His style is best when he meets with smaller groups and has a chance to visit with people."

Some Stallings aides have said they hope next year will be a bellwether fundraising year for the congressman because there won't be three major races to divide voters' attentions.

## Court security concerns create 2 deputy posts

TWIN FALLS — Protection of court personnel, records and the public during magistrate and district court sessions in Idaho's courthouses has become a major concern for sheriffs and court officials.

"An opinion from the attorney general's office has pointed out that the sheriff in each county is responsible under state law for such security and, in response, counties are beefing up their protection plans."

A special court security committee in Twin Falls County began efforts Wednesday to hire two certified law enforcement officers to handle full-time court security and bailiff duties in the county's district and magistrate courts.

Judge Daniel Hurlbut of Twin Falls, administrative judge for the 5th Judicial District, said the

committee held its final planning meeting Wednesday and agreed to advertise immediately for the officers to fill two positions.

Sheriff James Munn said his new budget, which went into effect this week, provides salaries for the two additional deputies who will handle court security and can be available for other regular law enforcement responsibilities on his staff as time permits.

Hurlbut said the courts in Twin Falls will also retain the one bailiff, Bill Foster, who has worked in that position for the past three years. He will continue to handle the routine bailiff duties of assisting the jurors and court officials.

"This leaves the law enforcement officers available at all times for security purposes. Because of some incidents in courts around the state and the fact that state law makes the sheriffs responsible for court security," he said. See COURT on Page B2

## Three bound over for trial

# Suspects in tower bombing waive preliminary hearings

RUPERT — Three men arrested and charged with bombing a city water tower in Rupert have been bound over to 5th District Court in Minidoka County.

Two of the men waived preliminary hearings — a pretrial hearing where the prosecutor must prove there is probable cause both that the crime was committed and that the defendant committed it — but a third defendant got two of three counts dismissed and his bail reduced.

All three hearings were scheduled for 2 p.m. Thursday. Minidoka County Prosecutor Charles Creason agreed to dismiss two felony counts against Daniel Ward, 18, of Rupert, after talking with Ward's attorneys for nearly a half hour just before Ward's preliminary hearing was scheduled to start.

Ward was represented by court-appointed attorney Henry W. Manning and Stephen J. Blaser of Blackfoot. Creason asked, and 5th District Magistrate John Varin agreed, to dismiss charges of mali-

cious injury to property and exploding a building. Both crimes carry maximum sentences of 5 years.

"As part of the agreement, Ward waived his preliminary hearing on a third felony charge, bombing of a building or works, which carries a maximum 20-year sentence. That means Ward will have to enter a plea on the charge and possibly face trial in district court.

In addition, Varin reduced Ward's bail to \$5,000, which Ward has posted. Two other defendants, Larry Langley, 32, and Scott Kidder, 29, waived their rights to preliminary hearings and have been bound over to district court on charges of malicious injury to property, exploding a building, and bombing of a building or works. The charges carry a maximum sentence of 30 years.

Langley and Kidder remain in Minidoka County Jail in lieu of \$50,000 bonds.

Varin was appointed by 5th District Judge and trial court administrator Daniel Hurlbut Thursday after Blaser asked that 5th District Magistrate Donald Workman be disqualified from the case.

Ward's father, Don, said after the hearing that his son was innocent, a claim he has made previously. The younger Ward said that the prosecutor is accusing him of making the bomb that exploded Sept. 19.

The explosion blew a three-foot section out of one leg of a downtown water tower in Rupert, causing an estimated \$10,000 in damages to the tower and a nearby pump station.

In addition, several windows in downtown businesses were broken. The city called on its police, the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement, and the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms. An investigation report from the bureau hasn't been sent to the city yet.

The Rupert City Council has also solicited the help of residents, voting Sept. 21 to offer a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the conviction of whoever bombed the tower.

Meanwhile, the city has erected an eight-foot high chain link fence with coiled barb wire around the tower and pump building. The city repaired the tower two days after the bombing.

# Singer's charges against SNRA official rejected

CHALLIS — Despite an attorney general's investigation indicating support for a perjury prosecution, Custer County Prosecutor Michael Lee has rejected filing criminal charges against former Sawtooth National Recreation Area Superintendent Allen Ashton.

But singer-songwriter Carole King Sorensen, who two years ago accused Ashton of lying under oath during the court battle over public use of a road across her property, says the case is not dead.

Because of potential conflicts of interest previously acknowledged by the county, Ms. Sorensen said Lee "doesn't have the right to make the decision," and she wants the entire case turned over to a special prosecutor.

Lee, who ruled out prosecution after evaluating the case as weak, said he will make a decision on whether a special prosecutor should take over the matter quickly.

"The two prosecutors before me buried this thing, and I'm not going to do that," Lee said. "They deserve more than that. They deserve an answer, whether it's one they like or not."

The allegations of perjury against Ashton, who was transferred to Nevada earlier this year, arose prior to the ruling by 7th District Judge Arnold Beebe that Ms. Sorensen and her husband Rick had a legal right to lock the gates on the road where it entered their property. Other landowners in the area have appealed that decision to the state Supreme Court.

Because of its relationship with the Forest Service and its adverse position with the Sorensens, the county turned the perjury complaint over to the attorney general's office.

Chief Investigator Russ Reneau advised Deputy Attorney General Peter Erbland that his inquiry showed evidence in three of eight perjury allegations "seems to support the theory that Mr. Ashton testified falsely. It is recommended that a special prosecutor evaluate these allegations for criminal prosecution."

But since the attorney general was not formally petitioned by the county to prosecute the case, the matter was returned to Custer County last July.

Erbland said the state would not

have prosecuted the case if it had been asked, to because the testimony in question apparently did not affect the ruling on the underlying dispute over the road access.

"Judge Beebe stated that he did not base his decision on Ashton's testimony," Erbland said. "The decision in the case turned on whether the public had made continual use of the road and on the county's abandonment of the road."

Lee notified the Sorensens by letter that he decided not to prosecute the complaint against Ashton, citing the difficulty of proving perjury, doubts regarding the testimony's effect on the trial's outcome and reluctance to try a case with a poor chance of gaining a conviction.

"The case would probably proceed

through preliminary examination, but I question the ability to get it to a jury," he said. "I don't think it's a very good case. Perjury is extremely difficult to prove. I need two sworn statements that are diametrically opposed and I don't have that."

But the Sorensens say the issue of public access to the recreation area was crucial to the case, claiming Ashton's testimony has fueled a lingering impression that they are blocking access.

"There were a number of mistakes in fact in Beebe's decision because he got so much misinformation in the course of the trial," Sorensen said, specifically citing the determination that the Forest Service has an easement through the ranch via an road.

# Hagerman seeks 'resident' police officer

HAGERMAN — City officials in Hagerman say they are "checking around" to hire a full-time city police officer.

The city's one-year, \$18,000 contract for police service from the Gooding County Sheriff's Department ended Oct. 1.

Mayor Merle Owsley said the contract called for an officer to live in Hagerman but that condition was not met.

"The way it is, we call and by the time they get here it's all over with," Owsley said. "They come through on patrols, but there's nobody constant."

Most of the city's problems, he said, are nuisance violations, such as unleashed dogs, unleashed cars left on the streets, "kids" driving fast around town at night, trucks speeding on the highway through

Hagerman, watermelon-throwing and "little things like that."

With its own officer, Owsley said, the city would always have someone at the school during busy traffic times and a resident would be on call 24 hours a day. The cost would be the same or a little less than what the city has been paying the sheriff's department, he predicted.

At the Hagerman City Council meeting Tuesday, Mike Flores of Caldwell read his resume and applied to be an officer in Hagerman.

Council member Audrey Hoffman, the city's police commissioner, said three men have responded to a letter of inquiry the city sent to the Police Officer Standard Training Academy in Boise.

She said insurance expenses, salary figures and vehicle costs are being checked out and added up to determine if the city should hire its own officer or pay for the sheriff's patrol.

"We're kind of weighing the odds," said Hoffman.

Gooding County Sheriff Robert Aja on Wednesday admitted his department of seven men is "stretched thin" because of a limited county budget. But, he said, the people of Hagerman have had more police protection than they realize.

"They've got officers down there all the time, or available all the time," Aja said. "I spent the night there last night. There's nothing that's been occurring in Hagerman that we haven't taken care of."

If the need arises, he added, the sheriff's department could send half a dozen officers to the scene.

Aja predicted Hagerman will be paying more for less coverage if it hires its own officer.

"It's a proven fact that you need five people to operate a 24-hour shift on a year-round basis," he said.

Aja said he is hiring a new officer, Curt Kaneaster, who will soon be

moving to Hagerman.

But even so, the sheriff said, \$18,000 will not provide 24-hour service in Hagerman.

"They can't do it and we can't do it," he said.

Owsley said the city had its own officer about five or six years ago before hiring deputy services.

Now, the mayor said, he and the council want to "be prepared for all possibilities" by studying the police situation before making a decision.

Aja said if Hagerman chooses to not renew its contract, he and his deputies will continue to investigate felonies there and patrol county roads around Hagerman, but the regular city patrol will end.

In other council business, monthly water and sewer rates were each increased \$1 per month per user. The additional income will be put into a special savings account to pay for equipment maintenance on the water and sewer systems.

Rubalcaba told officers there were several other persons in the vehicle and that he was not driving. He said the others ran from the scene.

The accident occurred about 7 p.m. Wednesday, seven miles north and two miles west of Oakley on a gravel county road.

Crystal said investigation has determined that the vehicle, traveling at an estimated 64 miles per hour, went out of control on the straight roadway and then rolled three times. Salinas was thrown from the vehicle and died at the scene of massive head injuries, the sheriff said.

### Fire forces bus evacuation

# Utah governor fails to reveal restrictions on lake pumping

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)** — Gov. Norm Bangert failed to tell the Legislature in 1986 that the Air Force had forced the state to sign a restrictive permit before Utah's \$80 million Great Salt Lake pumping project could begin, angry lawmakers say.

Legislators say they were never told about the restrictions, and some say had they been, they may not have voted for the governor's controversial project.

"I've never heard of any permit," said House Majority Leader Nolan Karas.

His Republican colleague in the Senate, Kay Cornaby, added: "That's news to me."

Salt Lake Democratic Rep. Blaze Wharton said many legislators believe that it would eventually get the lake down to 4,200 feet above sea level. The lake, now at 4,209.5,

peaked at 4,211.85 feet above sea level this past spring.

"I imagine if we'd known that 4,208 was going to be the breaking point, we'd have taken a serious look at some of the alternatives and maybe we wouldn't have gone for pumping," he said.

And Rep. G. LaMont Richards, R-Salt Lake, chastized the governor for making "such an agreement without our knowledge." It was Richards who unsuccessfully campaigned for diking the Great Salt Lake rather than pumping.

Legislators also learned of the state Division of Water Resources, said the Air Force required the permit because of problems created by pumping water onto its West Desert Bombing Range.

"The permit we have from the Air Force says we have to stop pumping at 4,208 (feet above sea level)," Anderson said.

But in May 1986 when the Legislature voted to fund the project, lawmakers said they weren't told about the Air Force's concerns or that negotiations for a permit were even underway.

"No, that never happened. As far as I know it never happened in committee and it never happened on the Senate floor," said Sen. Darrell Renstrom, an Ogden Democrat.

Francino Gianni, Bangert's press secretary, said news of the permit wasn't intentionally withheld, but she acknowledges it is possible legislators were never informed of it.

Legislators were told the pumps would stop at elevation of 4,208 feet as a matter of choice, Gianni added. She said that the pumping project canal, which allows water to flow to the pumphouse, was designed to work only to the 4,208-foot level.

# Spokane, Salt Lake City firms vie for radioactive New Jersey dirt

**SPOKANE, Wash. (AP)** — A mining firm has asked permission to fill an idle uranium tailings pond with slightly radioactive New Jersey dirt, a proposal that state's Department of Environmental Protection says it is seriously considering.

The soil, excavated from beneath homes in two New Jersey suburbs beginning in 1985, is stored in 55-gallon steel drums. Officials believe the dirt was contaminated by a now-closed watch-dial-factory that used radioactive rock to make luminous paint.

Dawn Mining Co. has proposed that the dirt be dumped at its idle uranium mill tailings pond about 40 miles northwest of Spokane. S.K. Hart Engineering Co. of Salt Lake

City has proposed that the dirt be buried in the Utah desert.

"At this time, they are the two most interesting possibilities," Jim Staples, a New Jersey DEP spokesman, said Wednesday. "Which one comes through with the best offer" will get the dirt, he said. Staples said neither proposal has been completed.

New Jersey is already paying \$3.97 million to ship 500,000 barrels of the dirt to the Hanford nuclear reservation in south-central

Washington. The remaining 10,000 barrels, in addition to dirt not yet in containers, will probably go elsewhere.

The dirt isn't radioactive enough to be considered low-level radioac-

tive waste, so it's mixed with highly contaminated soil at Oak Ridge, Tenn., before being shipped to Hanford.

Dawn Mining is asking that the remaining barrels of dirt be dumped in a tailings pond a half mile from Tehimakin Creek, which flows into the Spokane River. The Spokane Indian Reservation is across the creek and the tribe wants to build a fish hatchery downstream from the site.

A written proposal by Dawn Mining does not specifically mention the New Jersey soil, but asks for permission to dump "select material."

# Panel rejects funding cut for weed fight

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — An Office of Management and Budget recommendation to cut 40 percent of the federal allocation for fighting noxious weeds has been rejected by the Senate Appropriations Committee.

OMB proposed a \$1 million cut in funds targeted for fighting noxious weeds over the next year on Bureau of Land Management and Forest Service range and forest land. But the Senate committee agreed with a bill from Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, to retain the funding for fiscal 1988.

"Noxious weeds choke out range grasses on public lands and often cross onto private lands and destroy cash crops," McClure said Thursday. "To me, that translates into a loss of farm jobs and agricultural income."

Officials estimate that the number of Forest Service acres infested with noxious weeds is growing by about 7 percent a year. The latest Forest Service inventory of its 20.5 million acres in Idaho put the extent of the infestation at 700,000 acres.

# ISU researchers sustain pain relief

**POCATELLO (AP)** — A new process to allow the sustained release of ibuprofen, an anti-inflammatory drug that can be used instead of aspirin, has been developed by Idaho State University researchers.

"The purpose of the research was to sustain the action of ibuprofen," said Dr. M. Serpil Kisialioglu, an ISU associate professor of pharmaceutical sciences.

"Ibuprofen has a short plasma life so if we sustain the action we can, for example, take one tablet a day instead of three tablets," Kisialioglu said.

A paper on the research was presented at the 47th International Congress of Pharma-

ceutical Sciences of the Federation-Internationale Pharmaceutique held in Amsterdam.

"Our approach was to sustain the release of ibuprofen using copolyesters with enteric-coating polymers. Eudragit are a group of acrylic and methacrylate polymers and copolymers which mainly remain intact in the stomach and dissolve and release the drugs in the intestinal environment," she said.

Kisialioglu said there are sustained release ibuprofen products on the market but this research presents a new method.

Dr. Kisialioglu came to ISU in the fall of 1984 after teaching for 10 years at Hacettepe University

Continued from Page B1 in the various counties responsible for court security measures, sheriffs throughout the state are facing expanded costs and man-hours. Some are having problems shuffling their staff members around to include court duty.

Jerome County Sheriff Elza Hall said Wednesday that a number of Idaho sheriffs have received no additional funding for court coverage and are hard pressed to tie up their present personnel during lengthy court trials and hearings.

Hall, who was in Idaho Falls Wednesday attending a state sheriffs' meeting, was named to the group's state association committee to work out a solution between court judges and sheriffs.

"We will be mailing out questionnaires as part of a survey of judges and sheriffs in the state to determine what you want to handle it," Hall said. "We will be conducting an interview. We may then draw up a proposal that we will want to take to the Legislature for creation of a system that we can use in all of the counties."

Hall said some of the sheriffs have no funds and are concerned about meeting their regular law enforcement responsibilities at the same time.

In Jerome County, he said, he has worked out an agreement with Magistrate Judge Roger Burdick to use the court probate officer as bailiff and to have deputies on duty for security as needed. Hall said district court meets only one day each week in Jerome County except in the case of lengthy trials.

Hall said District Judge Phillip Becker requested and received \$500 from the Jerome County Commissioners for additional bailiff funds

in the sheriff's budget.

"If the need exceeds this amount, Hall said, then the judge has the authority to reopen my budget and have the county commissioners increase it by whatever is needed."

Judge Hurlbutt said in Twin Falls the addition of two deputies assigned primarily to court security will mean 100 percent security coverage on the courts, court employees and the public using the courts and court offices.

"About two years ago," Hurlbutt said, "we brought a man into court who had smuggled a razor blade into the courtroom in his mouth. He slashed his wrists in the courtroom and had to be subdued. This is one incident that demonstrates the importance of full time court security."

Hurlbutt said there are other considerations, including times when individuals have obtained work for the county which gave them access to their own court files

pr those of friends. They then could remove or destroy the files.

Under the new security system in Twin Falls there will be qualified officers covering courts and records on a full time basis both during and after business hours, Hurlbutt explained.

Applicants for the two Twin Falls positions are expected to have a POST (Police Officers Standards and Training) certificate and four years of law enforcement experience. The pay, Hurlbutt said, will be at the same level as that of any other starting deputy's wage based at the same level of training and experience.

On Tuesday sheriffs from 19 Idaho counties met in Idaho Falls to wrestle with the issue of court security and bailiff duties. Hall said since there was not a quorum, no action was taken as a result of the meeting and his committee is reviewing the information.

## Stocks fall as interest worries persist

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Worries over the dollar and rising interest rates helped drive stock prices broadly lower Thursday in a market still struggling to recover from the jolt of Tuesday's record-breaking sell-off.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials fell 34.44 points to 2,516.64, bringing its loss since the start of the week to 124.35 points.

Volume on the New York Stock Exchange came to 199.70 million shares, against 186.25 million in the previous session.

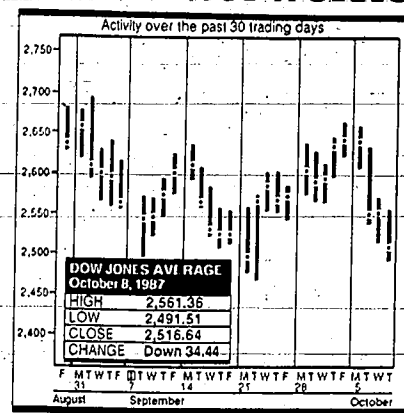
After falling 91.55 points on Tuesday, the Dow Jones industrial average edged up 2.45 in Wednesday's trading.

Analysts said that small and tentative recovery wasn't enough to convince investors that it was safe to jump into the market again.

Following the move by major banks across the nation Wednesday to raise their prime lending rates from 8 3/4 to 9 3/4 percent, marking the fifth increase this year, upward pressure persisted Thursday on open-market interest rates.

Rates on short-term Treasury bills climbed 20 to 30 basis points, or hundredths of a percentage point.

Prices of government bonds fell \$5 to \$10 for each \$1,000 in face value, as yields on those long-term securities edged closer to 10 percent.

About the only positive development for stock prices late in the session, when they rallied a bit after the Dow Jones industrial average briefly dipped below 2,500.

This is regarded as a significant 'support level' that has marked the low point of several market declines in recent weeks.

Among actively traded blue chips, General Electric dropped 1 1/2 to 60 1/4; General Motors 2 to 76 1/4; and International Business Machines 1 1/4 to 151 1/4.

Ford Motor was down 7/8 at 94 1/2 even though the company announced plans for a 2-for-1 stock split and a dividend increase.

The Limited fell 2 3/4 to 29 3/4 and the Gap lost 2 1/4 to 32 1/4. Many analysts lately have turned negative in their appraisal of the outlook for such specialty apparel retailers.

Japanese stocks provided one of the few pockets of strength in the market. Honda Motor, up 4% at 126; Hitachi, up 2% at 108 1/2.

## Balancing act is up to Greenspan now

**NEW YORK** — Whether to raise interest rates and so attract foreign investors, or try to keep rates low, the better to help American manufacturers, and in so doing reduce the trade deficit, that's the question.

It is a question that allows for no either-or decision, and to which there is no clear-cut answer or response satisfying to all parties, domestic and foreign. Whatever is the response, it involves a delicate balancing act.

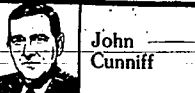
The problem now lies in the lap of Alan Greenspan, the new chairman of the Federal Reserve, the U.S. central bank that seeks to raise or decrease the supply of money by raising or lowering the price it charges commercial banks.

On Sept. 4, the Fed raised the discount rate, the rate at which it lends to member banks, thus supporting the price of the dollar and reassuring foreign investors in U.S. stocks, bonds, real estate and other investments.

That reassurance was needed, because investments in other nations were becoming equally attractive to foreigners, since every decline in the dollar lessened the value of their dollar-denominated holdings.

In raising the discount rates, the Fed understood that it would, at least to some small degree, reduce the trade advantage of U.S. exporters, whose goods become relatively less expensive abroad as the dollar falls.

But did it have a choice? Had it not acted, the dollar might

has continued falling, bringing with it the investment value that foreigners had in the United States. The United States needs foreigners. Among other things, it needs them to finance its deficits.

Those deficits, of course, are a consequence of U.S. interests buying a lot of foreign goods — imports — while selling far less to them. In short, dollars have been accumulating overseas, and they are needed back home as investments.

Those investments must be made attractive. Higher yields help. In raising its discount rate, the Fed accepted a calculated risk to

the domestic economy, since higher interest rates could cut into profits, raise home mortgage rates, reduce consumer spending and even threaten a recession.

Responding to a cut in their margins as a result of the higher discount rate, commercial banks responded Wednesday by raising the prime lending rate to top-rated customers. And when top-rated customers, such as large companies, are forced to pay more for money, you may be sure that consumers will, too.

While the Fed, in theory, reaches its decisions without regard to politics, some analysts of perhaps a cynical bent insist that something else is involved. That something, they say, is the U.S. presidency.

Recognizing that next year is an election year, they reason that Pres-

ident Reagan will seek to leave office on a wave of economic prosperity. Thus, they contend, a cooperative Fed will serve foreign investors now and domestic concerns later.

Of first priority, according to them, is a dollar stable enough to attract foreign money. Next is the goal of restraining inflationary forces that might be arising. And third is the aim of setting the stage for an easier monetary policy in 1988, one that will seek to recharge the economy in time for the elections.

If that is the case, the Fed's job is even more ticklish, more sensitive and more thankless than it has ever envisioned to be.

## Minnesota grabs 2-0 edge on Detroit in AL playoffs

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Before the American League playoffs began, there was talk of a sweep. There still is, but with a different team.

The underdog Minnesota Twins got two-run hits from Dan Gladden and "light-hitting" Tim Laidner Thursday night to beat Detroit 6-3.

The Twins, who were 0-6 in playoff games before Wednesday night's 8-5 victory, took a 2-0 lead in games in the best-of-seven series, which moves to Detroit for Game 3 Saturday. Detroit will send Walt Terrell, 17-10, against Twins rookie Lee Straker, 8-10.

"The ball is in our court now," said winning pitcher Bert Blyleven, who got 1-3 innings of relief before Juan Berenguer. "The adrenaline is flowing. I feel we can win it in Detroit."

Four of Berenguer's outs were strikeouts, including three straight in the ninth inning.

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

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE

BOBBY WOLFF

"So many worlds, so much to do,  
So little done, such things to be."  
— Alfred, Lord Tennyson.

My statistician tells me that seven out of 10 defenders will manhandle today's East cards. Put yourself in the East chair and see if you can avoid the trap.

West leads his fourth-best spade, and East's jack and queen are allowed to win the first two tricks. What happens if East returns a third spade?

South has to win the ace, thus establishing West's suit, but South is not in any danger. When East wins his club king, he cannot reach his partner's spades and South scores an easy 10 tricks.

How should East defend? Before he can make an intelligent decision, he must determine where the high cards are. He can see 14 HCP in dummy and 11 HCP in his own hand. South promised 11 or 12 HCP by his invitational jump, which leaves a maximum of four HCP for West. Three of these are in spades; therefore, West can have, at most, the diamond jack. And even if he doesn't, the diamond 10 should do.

At trick three, East should lead a low diamond. South plays the nine (correct) to West's 10 and the game goes down. A diamond return assures a second diamond winner, since East's club entry is still at large, and it's down one instead of a comfortable overtrick.

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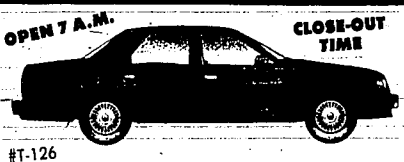

## Springsteen album hones honesty's edge

HOLLYWOOD — Bruce Springsteen's "Tunnel of Love" album is a testimony to the human spirit that embraces man's craving for the inspiration and support of true love but acknowledges the darkest fears that such love may, in fact, be only an elusive, heart-shattering dream.

The album, which was released Monday by Columbia Records, is a remarkable combination of the unbending romanticism of "Jersey Girl" — the sweet, endearing Tom Waits ballad that Springsteen used to end last year's live album — and the stark, almost cold-sweat anxiety of his earlier "Nebraska" LP.

In one of the collection's most affecting songs, "All That Heaven Will Allow," Springsteen echoes the intoxicating moment in "Jersey Girl" when you feel so totally in love that nothing can threaten your happiness. Building upon that wholly optimistic image, Springsteen rejects, in passing, rock's early, youthful live-fast-and-die-young thesis.

Most of these 12 new songs examine the complexities of the love outlined in "Jersey Girl," "Heaven Will Allow" and so much else in the storehouse of pop music. Several of the songs touch on dark, troubled, disabling emotions, but they do not follow the predictable pattern of simply wondering if things will work out ... or, more pointedly, if she'll always be true.

The main questions deal with living up to your own responsibilities. The horror is that, after finding your dream, you may destroy it.

"Spare Parts," which follows "Heaven," shows how quickly the initial infatuation can fall apart. A young woman becomes pregnant and the man runs away rather than follow through with wedding plans. "Cautious Man" is the story of someone unraveled by his own insecurities, leaving him — in the words of another song — a man who "doubts what he's sure of."

"Walk Like a Man" is the album's most idealistic song, one which asks for the strength to fulfill your vows. At the altar on his wedding day, a groom remembers how his mother used to take him as a child to the neighborhood church every time the wedding bells rang to watch the happy young couples. The groom's image of those days: wondering if they would ever look that happy again.

"Two Faces" also deals with inner-struggle, while "Brilliant Disguise," the first single from the album, is the most provocative look at responsibility. Its initial verses are conventional: The guy in the song wonders if the woman is true. The second half of the song offers a twist: a look at one's own impulses that — as harrowing as anything in "Nebraska" — asks fundamental questions about integrity and will.

## Bayeux Tapestry tells history of a broken promise

BAYEUX, France — More than 400,000 people a year come to the museum in this small Norman town to see its single, splendid object: a tapestry that teaches the importance of a promise.

The 900-year-old Bayeux Tapestry is an accurate, colorful chronicle of medieval France and an enduring work of art. It is not, however, a tapestry.

It is an embroidery, 230 feet long and 20 inches high, stitched in eight colors on oyster-colored linen cloth in an unknown English workshop about 1080, two decades after the events it describes.

The figures that dance across the fabric tell in detail the story of the conquest of England. But the story of the conquest occupies little more than half its length, with the rest devoted to the promise.

The first part tells of the trip to France by Harold, Earl of Wessex, of his imprisonment and rescue by William the Bastard, to whom he promised loyalty and aid in gaining the English crown. But when the old En-

## Ricky Skaggs works hard for his songs

JACKPOT, Nev. — If Ricky Skaggs wins the Country Music Association's Male Vocalist of the Year award next Monday night, no one can say he didn't earn it.

The talented guitar picker has been on tour most of the summer, and the few days at home in Nashville were spent working on a new album to be released in January.

In order to make his date in Jackpot last week, Skaggs flew from Tennessee to Salt Lake City where one of his customized buses was ready to carry the singer to Cactus Pete's Resort Casino, arriving at 5 p.m.

On stage just three hours later before a capacity crowd, the country music 1985 Entertainer of the Year showed plenty of heart and energy.

Dressed in a denim jacket with the collar up, unfaded jeans and blue suede boots, Skaggs and the seven hot musicians in his band broke the ice with the classic "San Antonio Rose" played in a lively bluegrass style. This and a few more opening upbeat songs brought hearty cheering from the audience.

"We really appreciate that," Skaggs said, joking that "...Most of the time people treat us like a red-headed stepchild."

From gentle love songs to super-speed bluegrass tunes, new songs were alternated with some of Skaggs' 11 number one country hits.

"If you don't like these songs, throw them back and we'll deal them out again tomorrow night in Cortez, Colo.," he said.

As his two fiddle players switched to banjos and

guitars, Skaggs also changed with ease from electric guitar (named "Big Ed") to mandolin to fiddle.

Stopping for a quiet moment to fine-tune his acoustic guitar, Skaggs took some time to get it right, smiling and — in between strings — saying, "I know this is against everything the Kenny Rogers Book of Entertainment teaches us. Must be the humidity — my guitar's used to having some."

Harmony singer Curtis Young, wearing jeans, an oversized red shirt and a diamond bracelet, added a lower, full tone to complement Skaggs' tenor voice. The bass player's deep vocals joined in a few four-part harmony refrains.

Skaggs introduced his best new song, saying it was penned by the very successful songwriter Paul Overstreet, but, this time, Randy Travis and Michael Murphy "didn't beat me to it."

"It's the newest craze in town, there's an old kind of love goin' 'round," Skaggs sang.

After a roaring encore applause, the 6-foot tall, slender, blue-eyed singer returned with a moving solo of "thanks" for mom and dad.

"This will bring tears to a grindstone," he promised. "It was a long time before I could ever sing this song without choking up."

He went on to sing a poignant song about how his parents gave him love and discipline in the right amounts, changed his diapers, held his hand and sent him news of home while he was in Vietnam.

Afterward, and still with plenty of energy, Skaggs and his band picked and twin-fiddled a rousing version of "Hivay 40 Blues" to wind up the show.

Meeting the press after his dinner show, Skaggs, 33, talked with affection about his three children, and how his little daughter had overcome public shy-

ness and turned into a 3-year-old chatterbox.

Yes, Skaggs said, he would like to see his children follow his footsteps.

"Singers and entertainers — anyone in the public eye — if they have a good attitude about what it takes to get out of this life and into the next life, can be a good influence," he said.

Skaggs himself is generally known to be religious and clean living, with a long list of gospel songs up his sleeve.

While sitting in Cactus Pete's coffee shop, his bus driver noted that the entertainer will gladly buy meals for the band members, but if they want alcoholic beverages they have to buy their own.

After many years of singing harmony and playing instrumental solos for other famous singers, Skaggs is making the most of his own stardom. As zealous fans lined up for autographs, handshakes and hugs, Skaggs was friendly and sincere, visiting with everyone and referring to himself as "just a hillbilly boy."

The singer and his wife, Sharon White, are nominated for Country Duet of the Year. Skaggs said husband and wife duet teams are "really a part of country music," but he and Sharon, who is a member of the musical group "The Whites," are the only married couple with separate careers still singing duets together.

This week, Skaggs and his band and stage crew, in their two grand Silver Eagle buses, another crew bus and an 18-wheeler truck for heavy stage equipment are traveling to Colorado, Arizona, California and Las Vegas, Nev., for a steady string of one-night performances.

Then it's back to Nashville and the Grand Ole Opry for Country Music Awards night.

Continued from Page D1: glish king dies. Harold takes the crown himself, breaking the promise he made before God, an offense serious enough to justify the Norman invasion.  
 The stitching tells a story with the accuracy and detail of a medieval book. Influential figures of the day are depicted on the linen standing beside hordes of common soldiers and farmers in their fields.  
 On the tapestry are workmen preparing ships, infantry, cavalry and archers on attack at the great Battle of Hastings in 1066, and the death of King Harold.  
 Visitors to the William the Conqueror museum enter the exhibit space to the sound of pounding hooves, the soundtrack to a slide show introducing the Middle Ages. A long piece of mounted-burlap snakes through the next spacious room, explaining in English and French single events and images reproduced from the tapestry.  
 Finally, visitors reach the actual work in a darkened room, softly lit and mounted behind glass.  
 "Look at those millions of stitches, mummy," says a little girl from London on a holiday with her parents. "It must have taken them ages to do that."  
 Her parents pick her up to get a better look in the case. A group of

three French matrons stand for long minutes before one scene, discussing the style of a warrior's protective mail.  
 Among this year's visitors were Britain's Prince Charles and Princess Diana, who toured the tapestry for the 900th anniversary of the death of William the Conqueror.  
 More than one-third of the annual visitors to the tapestry come from the United States or England, but the day before the royal visit, practically everyone was outspokenly British.  
 "A great piece of English craftsmanship," one British tourist wrote in the museum's guestbook. "When are you planning to return it?"  
 "Never," a French tourist replied on the next line. "The tapestry is forever ours."

# 'The Big Town': Complex '50s look at heart of Chicago

HOLLYWOOD — "The Big Town" is so entertaining, so true to its period that it is easy to peg it as another '60s nostalgia piece when it actually possesses the kind of complexity usually associated with less commercial, less starchy productions. It is very much in the spirit that former Columbia Pictures Chairman David Puttnam said he wanted to bring to Hollywood.

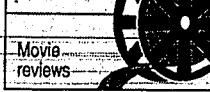
The film also marks a terrific screen coming-of-age for Matt Dillon, who for the first time seems more man than boy, and it is a true director's showcase for Ben Bolt, son of veteran screenwriter playwright Robert Bolt. No clement, however, is more impressive than Robert Roy Pool's superlative script, adapted from Clark Howard's novel "The Arm."

It is Dillon's J.C. Cullen, a young man from Rockport, Ind., who has got "the arm," a knack for the craft, a skill that he has honed under the paternal tutelage of a cop shooter and auto mechanic (Don Francks), who pronounces him ready to try his luck in Chicago. He puts J.C. in touch with a woman named Ferguson (Lee Grant) and her blind, embittered husband (Bruce Dern), bar operators who also back gamblers for the lion's share of the take. That is OK with J.C., easily dazzled by the bright lights of Chicago in 1957 (Except for some establishing shots of Chicago, "The Big Town" was filmed in Toronto).

Photographed with a keen sense of mood by Raif D. Brada, "The Big Town" first of all brings alive the tremendous, intoxicating vitality of inner city night life that in most metropolitan areas is either a thing of the past or but a dangerous shadow of its former self. It captures the sense of fun and adventure that is then possible to indulge in without thinking you were risking your life. So much that it is lively at night in these days is either ultra-exclusive, not to mention ultra-expensive, or it is for the very young. "The Big Town" brings back a more democratic era, a time when Times Square, for example, attracted people of all ages and walks of life in search of a good time.

Now, of course, anyone as handsome and cocky as J.C., even

though he is a good guy at heart, is going to get into some kind of trouble that will act as a rite of passage. He just cannot keep away from Dianne Lane's luscious Lorry Jones, Lynn Bari's look-alike and the headliner at the Gem Club, a striptease joint with a back room where the crap game is run by Lorry's brutal husband Cole (Tommy Lee Jones).

What is great about "The Big Town" is that it is so resolutely not just another shallow and sentimental tale of adolescent angst told within a seductive evocation of a seemingly more innocent era. J.C. finds himself confronted with the ambiguity of human nature, which is a fancy way of saying that he discovers that generally nobody turns out to be all good or all bad.

It is the unusually wide range of gradations within a whole gallery of people that gives "The Big Town" its substance and distinction: Ferguson is a tough dame but it is an act of will; Suzy Amis' Aggie really is a nice girl, which does not mean she's virtuous; Cole is vicious but not without a sense of humor; Tom Skerritt's seasoned gambler, a real charmer, has done terrible things yet displays a gallant concern for J.C.; David Marshall Grant, another young gambler in Ferguson's stable, seems just the folkieest, friendliest guy in the world, what with his hearty country-and-Western singer fiancée (Cherry Jones), but is in fact a terrible bigot; and Lorry, it turns out, is not at all what she appears to be.

There is a double-vision to "The Big Town" that puts it in a class by itself. We see all these people for ourselves and we also see them through the eyes of J.C., with his small-town, '57 sensibility and its simplistic morality.

It is hard to imagine anyone who was J.C.'s age in 1957 not being thoroughly captivated by "The Big Town" (MPAA-rated R for some non-exploitive sex and violence). You need not have turned 21 three decades ago to enjoy this film, but there is no denying that it helps.

# Dance ignites romance in 'Dirty Dancing'

TWIN FALLS — The following are capsule reviews of some of the films being locally shown at the Motion Picture Association of America. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**DIRTY DANCING** (PG-13). Smart and funny, touching and unabashedly sensual, this musical love story set in the Catskills in the early '60s is the sweet sleeper of a hot season. Because director Emile Ardolino comes from a background in dance films (including "The Making of a Male Dancer"), he does not insult us with the impossible, the too-easily achieved. Instead, the dancing is smart and sympathetic and, as a musical, "Dirty Dancing" is one of the most significant fusions of drama and dance since "Saturday Night Fever," and more involving.

**THE BIG TOWN** (R). Highly entertaining period piece, set in 1957 Chicago and starring Matt Dillon as a small-town cop shooter who tries his luck in the big city. What gives this wonderful film its substance and distinction are its occasionally well-drawn people, none of whom, Dillon discovers, are entirely good or bad. Terrific directorial debut for Ben Bolt; the excellent script was by Robert Roy Pool, who adapted Clark Howard's "The Arm." With Diane Lane, Tommy Lee Jones, Bruce Dern, Tom Skerritt, Lee Grant, Suzy Amis.

**BEVERLY HILLS COP II** (R). Fifteen minutes of this careening, screaming experience and you begin to know how a tenderized flank steak feels, even though to his credit — Eddie Murphy avoids the trappings of infallibility that the screenwriters would lumber him with. And when the trademark Murphy scatology is mixed with gratuitous nudity, the effect is not worldly fun but childish crudity.

**FATAL ATTRACTION** (R). For much of its length, this movie wavers between giving us an absorbing battle of the sexes — a true psychological shocker about a scorned woman systematically persecuting the married man who ditched her, a reefer-clandestine fling — and one more formula revenge saga. At the

end, sadly, the formulas win: Glenn Close's subtly detailed, terrifyingly passionate, obsessive turn in the movie into bloody predictability. Before then, Close and Michael Douglas — and director Adrian Lyne — wind the tension up tight; there is real heat under Lyne's usual gloss. The scariest moments here come not from violence but from flickering moments of everyday pathology pushed to the limit.

**LA BAMBA** (PG-13). Although this film of the tragically brief life of Latino rocker Ritchie Valens has its strengths, especially the fine turn by the unknown Lou Diamond Phillips, the wonder is that the movie isn't full of raw energy. That it's for the most part polite melodrama. There is the music, however, great dollops of '60s songs, and it lifts the movie when the dialogue — and the earnest-but-uninformed direction (by Luis Valdez) keeps it on hand. Stars Lou Diamond Phillips, Earl Morales, Danielle von Zerneck and Elizabeth Pena. Written and directed by Luis Valdez.

The mood in the remaining songs shift between trials ("One Step Up") emptiness ("When You're Alone") and renewal ("Valentine's Day"). There is no resolution in the album any more than there is a resolution in life. These songs merely remind us, in an uncommonly affecting way, about the precious yet precarious nature of love in these times. In some way, the theme is not so much true love but modern love.

With the profound shifts in attitudes toward such matters as divorce, one-parent homes and live-in relationships, there are no longer formal boundaries that force couples to stay together. This gives them the freedom to pursue the personal happiness that once seemed to be only an incidental part of raising a family. This freedom also invites impatience and selfishness, turning relationships into just another disposable commodity.

As much as any album in rock, "Tunnel of Love" focuses on modern love in a way that makes the dangers seem so agonizingly real that love's inspiration and support — when found — becomes all the more blessed.

One of the criticisms of Springsteen is that he relies on the same images, and these songs are filled with references to cars and the night. But there is an unmistakable maturity.

"Tunnel of Love" is exactly the right step for an artist, who for the second time in his career, has found himself battling accusations of selling out.

Most people who first learned of Springsteen through the Time and Newsweek magazine cover-stories in 1975 just could not believe any guitar-carrying unknown was good enough to deserve that much attention — and they were not about to take the time to actually listen to Springsteen's album, "Born to Run."

When Springsteen finally reached unquestioned superstardom a decade later with "Born in the U.S.A.," another wave of disbelief set in. The doubters this time included even some longtime fans who saw in Springsteen's move to outdoor stadiums a betrayal of what had once seemed like a private pact between fans and artist.

Just as Springsteen countered

the accusations a decade ago by making — uncompromising — albums ("Darkness on the Edge of Town") that aimed far more at fulfilling artistic desires than commercial expectations, "Tunnel of Love" is a dramatic renewal of faith.

The album hits home with the deep-rooted honesty and compelling vision that reminds longtime fans just what they have so long prized in Springsteen, and sends a message to the casual fans who tuned into the "Born in the U.S.A." side-show that this man is an artist —

There are no banners to wave this time, a "Born in the U.S.A.," just quiet, somber questions and honest, sometimes scary, answers. These are simple songs with simple arrangements (some just acoustic guitar and harmonica, others joined by only a single member of the E Street Band), but songs with uncommon insights.

The biggest challenge in pop music may be not in getting to the top, but deciding what to do once there. Springsteen made it to the top in "Born in the U.S.A." The triumph of "Tunnel of Love" is that he has found somewhere meaningful to go.

the people you have to work with. These guys know how to work. They had their lines memorized 10 days into rehearsals.

The Rainmaker's plot centers on Starbuck, a con man, who tries to make rain for the Currie family for a \$100 fee. It would ruin the plot to tell whether he makes rain or not, but it is not too much to say that his relationship with the family changes them all.

"The message of the show, is if you believe in yourself you can accomplish anything," says Mammen. And the young actors seem to have taken that message to heart. In addition to learning how to be on stage, they say the play is also teaching them a lot about life.

Gary Winterholler, who plays Starbuck, said his character, "is starting to get tired of living with his dreams. He wants something more tangible but he doesn't know how to get it."

# Randy Travis makes big strides since last year's music awards

Last year, a young country singer was brought in as a last-minute replacement for Ricky Skaggs and asked to read the names of the nominees for the 1986 Country Music Association Awards. He found himself reading his own name four times. "They wouldn't let me read the cards before I went out to read the nominations, so it was quite a shock to me," Randy Travis said shortly after it happened. He eventually walked off with the Horizon Award, for the most promising newcomer, and a few months later his career exploded.

This fall, he tops the list of nominees for "The 21st Annual Country Music Association Awards," which

will air Monday, Oct. 12 on CBS. His five nominations include Entertainer of the Year, Male Vocalist of the Year, Single of the Year ("Forever and Ever, Amen"), Album of the Year ("Always and Forever"), and Video of the Year ("Forever and Ever, Amen").

Travis describes this past year as, "Fast, very surprising, but a great year, too. I couldn't ask for any more." He has been working almost non-stop. "Shoot, I do good to remember where we are," he says. "We've been working so much that when we get to a town, often times I have to ask where we're at."

But success hasn't changed Travis much, if two interviews conducted a year apart are any indication. The man who has been profiled in Newsweek, Time, USA Today and People is as modest and unaffected as ever. The only noticeable difference between this year and last year is that he's considerably more talkative now.

Travis' voice has often been described as "ultra-country," and he firmly eschews crossover ambitions. "This type of music is what I plan to stay with," he says. "In fact, I don't

believe I could do anything else."

But the people who have been noticing Travis aren't all hard-core country fans. A few months ago, he appeared on that bastion of urban hip, "Late Night with David Letterman." "You know, I was a little bit worried," Travis admits.

"David is a very witty person, and I wouldn't wanna get into a battle of wits with him. And I didn't know whether he'd like me or the music I was doing. But David was really nice."

Travis has even been approached about making a movie. "Their scheduling and our schedules wouldn't match up, so we couldn't do that this year," he says. "But maybe at some point. I've never acted, for sure, but I wouldn't mind tryin' it."

What he really wants to make more time for, however, is writing songs. He has written or co-written a few songs on both his albums and would like to do more. "For the first eight months after we started working the road, I got so busy that I couldn't find time to write much," he says.

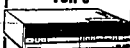
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# Jackson gets royal treatment

How come his story, which I recall as churning up so much media attention during the 1940s, hasn't ever been filmed before when the movie was so charming? — K.R.

**A:** A major Hollywood studio was set to produce a film about Ellsworth's escapades back when they pushed World War II off the front pages, starring the then young Eddie Albert. However, the project never got off the ground, possibly because Wisecarver's mother was embarrassed by the entire situation. The ex-Don Juan, now 57, muses, "It seems the whole country got all bent out of shape by my youthful exploits. Today, I doubt that the news would raise an eyebrow or provide even a—equib—in—the media, what with contemporary morality and values."

## LIBERACE REMEMBERED —

The manager of the flamboyant pianist and the president of Liberace's English fan club organized a memorial service in London in mid-September. More than 200 elderly women showed up to honor Liberace, but none of the big names who had been promised by the organizers were there. It was rather a strange service with a 31-year-old minister who admitted he was not a Liberace fan and the fan-club president insisting that there be no mention of AIDS, which was the

cause of Liberace's death. He explained that all anyone remembers about Rock Hudson was that he died of AIDS.

**Q:** We've heard that Woody Allen never allows visitors on his set and that Warren Beatty is much the same way. Are most directors that fanatical about directorial privacy? — K.O.

**A:** One certainly goes in the opposite direction: Tom ("Fright Night") Holland, who doesn't seem to mind who comes on the set — (are you listening, Woody and Warren?). Droppers-in on "Fatal Beauty," which he lensed all around the streets of LA starring Whoopi Goldberg and Sam Elliott; included James Brolin and Chaka Kahn, Christine Lahti, David Bowie, Rutger Hauer, LeVar Burton and Cheech Marin — who stayed on and wound up doing a cameo bit. Incidentally, a "Fright Night II" is in the works; via New Century/Vista, starring Roddy McDowell in his original role as Peter Vincent, Fearless Vampire Killer.

**Q:** I've decided to go into show business. What does it take to become a star today? — B.W.

**A:** According to top New York show business manager, Stanley Scotland, instrumental in the careers of Cab Calloway, Dinah Shore, Victor Borge and others, talent is always needed — but that's merely part of it. The other parts are made up of the right team: a clever personal manager to guide your career; a knowledgeable booking agent to get you jobs; a sharp business manager to handle your money; a smart lawyer to read the contracts properly; and, of course, a brilliant press agent to get you a good table at restaurants like the Russian Tea Room, Patsy's and 21, so that the movers-and-shakers who go there daily will sit up and notice when you make an entrance.

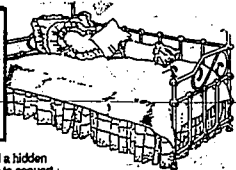

They buy "Star Trek" trivia books and all sorts of Trekaphanalia. They know everything about "Star Trek," from the background of its creator, Gene Roddenberry (born El Paso, Texas, Aug. 19, 1921; father, a cavalry officer stationed at Fort Bliss, Texas) to details of Roddenberry's first outline for the series (dated March 11, 1964).

I hope that is correct. One slip and the Trekkies will bite your head off faster than the Gorn. (The Gorn did bite, didn't they? Or was that the Mugatu? It could have been the Horta — you can certainly bite if you can burrow through stone. Or take the Morgs and Eymorgs — please!)

Enough of this name-dropping. Here is the word on "Star Trek: The Next Generation": duller than Droxine (Spock's girlfriend; you know, the daughter of Plasus, who oppressed the Troglodytes?).

It is debuting as a two-hour movie in syndication. Roddenberry (who majored in engineering at the University of California, Los Angeles, survived a plane crash and was once a policeman) is the executive producer.

At long last comes this new "Star Trek" series updating the remarkable TV phenomenon that evolved into a giant hit only after cancellation by NBC. It took time for the romance of exploration to take hold.

Here is the new scoop. It is the 24th century, almost a century after Kirk and Spock and Co. A newer, bigger, galaxy-class USS Enterprise that can separate in two parts is still boldly going where no one has

gone before, but with a different captain and crew peering at weird and threatening things through that enormous space window.

Now in charge is Capt. Jean-Luc Picard (Patrick Stewart), a stern, unsmiling man of great courage, wisdom and baldness. His first officer is the handsome Commander William Riker (Jonathan Frakes). Also on board are that know-it-all android Lt. Commander Data (Brent Spiner); blind Geordi La Forge (LeVar Burton), who gains sight through an apparatus resembling designer sunglasses; a female doctor and her son; and a mind-probing, half-human, Betazoid, among many others. Even more amazing is the existence on the command staff of a Klingon — one of those savage, warlike creatures that once terrorized the galaxy and gave Kirk and Spock so much trouble (I hope I have that right).

Well, the new crew members have got one heck of a challenging assignment. They are cruising along, minding their own business, boldly going you know where, when the nasty "Q" Being gets in their way.

To make an excruciatingly long story short, Picard and the Enterprise gang are put on trial for all the crimes of the human race (including TV yarns like this, probably). The crew must prove its worthiness to merit mercy from the "Q" Being, who turns out to be a real snot.

Trekkies probably want William Shatner, Leonard Nimoy and the rest of the original cast to continue forever, and they are a tough act to follow. However, there are lots of intriguing characters aboard the new Enterprise, including a vaguely familiar 137-year-old admiral who does not look a day older than 120.

The new cast is fine (Stewart is a very interesting actor) and the story, although not very deep, inspired or mind-melding, has a nice payoff. But getting there takes much too long.

The tone is somehow wrong. Hardware, not humans, gets the major emphasis, in fact, and the plot seems almost like an appendage to the ship. That is because you have seen it all before: An alien force threatens the Enterprise ... the crew is put through a test ... after a close call, there is success ... The adventure continues.

Although handsome, this is a slow, thudding two-hours badly in need of energizing, more watchable only than "Star Trek: The Motion Picture," first and worst of the four theatrical films.

Perhaps "The Next Generation" will be more appealing once the regular series starts and the evil Ferengis are on the scene to threaten the crew.

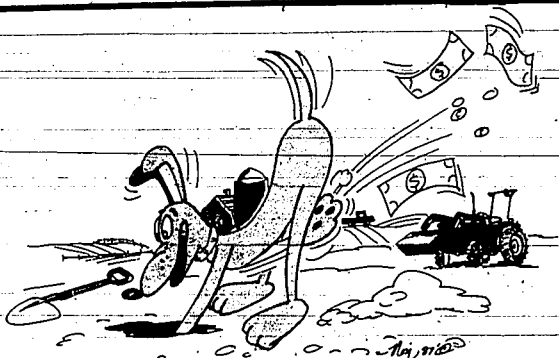

## Donation drop forces Falwell show off nearly 50 television stations

WASHINGTON (Wash. Post) — A major drop in donations has forced the Rev. Jerry Falwell to pull his "Old-Time Gospel Hour" program off nearly 50 TV stations. Falwell spokesman Mark DeMoss said Monday, Oct. 5, "there's an understandably negative feeling that is toward Christian television and all television ministries or most television ministries."

DeMoss called the donation drop "the unfortunate result of one tragedy," and said the program has received \$5.3 million less in donations from TV viewers over the past six months, since the PTL scandal broke. More of the 340 stations still airing the "Old-Time Gospel Hour" nationwide could be cut in coming days, DeMoss said, but ministry officials in Lynchburg, Va., hope to avoid layoffs. Falwell became chairman of the PTL ministry, based in Fort Mill, S.C., after evangelist Jim Bakker resigned, admitting to adultery more than six years before with a church secretary, Jessica Hahn. DeMoss said the drop in funding to the "Old-Time Gospel Hour" makes Falwell even more eager to bail out of the PTL, and he may do so before the end of the year if he can find someone to replace him. Falwell "knew from the beginning and said it would be unrealistic to think he could remain in that role forever without negatively affecting his Lynchburg ministry," DeMoss said. He added that the \$5.3 million loss was offset by funding increases

from other parts of Falwell's religious empire, including tuition increases at the 8,000-student Liberty University. He added that Falwell hopes the damage from the PTL scandal will be temporary.

Coincidentally, the House Ways and Means oversight subcommittee started holding hearings Tuesday morning, Oct. 6, which will air live on C-SPAN.

Chairman J.J. Pickle, D-Tex., is

looking into the tax-exempt status of all television ministries. Among the witnesses are Falwell; evangelist Oral Roberts; a representative of the National Association of Religious Broadcasters, the Internal Revenue Service and the Treasury Department.

## ABC, Nielsen settle dispute

LOS ANGELES (L.A. Times) — KABC-TV of Los Angeles and A.C. Nielsen Co. have settled, on undisclosed terms, a lawsuit that the ABC-owned station brought last June amid a controversy over the station's alleged attempts to improperly boost its audience ratings.

The suit "is settled, and we continue to do business with each other," said Larry Laskey, a Nielsen attorney in Chicago.

KABC sued the audience-ratings company for excluding some KABC ratings from its May ratings guide because of a KABC news documentary profiling the so-called Nielsen "families." The families are the viewers whom Nielsen studies to derive its ratings; Nielsen's rules bar broadcasts of such news segments during the months when ratings are compiled, on grounds they would attract these viewers' atten-

tion and cause ratings to soar.

John Severino, KABC's general manager, did not return several telephone calls seeking comment. The station has contended that the documentary did not break Nielsen rules, noting that Nielsen's chairman was interviewed for the segment.

The dropping of some KABC results shaved two points from the rating of KABC's late-night news show and cost the long-dominant station its unchallenged leadership in overall news ratings. KABC sought a court injunction to try to keep Nielsen from publishing the May ratings books, but that bid was rejected.

Laskey said KABC has continued to subscribe to Nielsen's audience ratings service. He denied speculation that Nielsen had paid KABC to end the dispute.

## Humana Inc. sues NBC over name

WASHINGTON (Wash. Post) — Humana Inc. wishes the creators of "St. Elsewhere" had looked elsewhere when they dreamed up the name of a fictional company to take over the television show's decrepit hospital.

The giant hospital chain has sued NBC-TV, which broadcasts the Emmy-award-winning show, for copyright infringement, trying to stop the network from using the name "Ecumena" for the company said to have bought St. Eligius hospital.

"We're not trying to stop the program, but we just feel the use of Ecumena is an infringement on the Humana trademark. ... It just simply sounds so much like Humana," said George Atkins, a Humana vice president. "As far as the program is concerned, I think most of the people here like the program. Our problem is not with the content of the show."

Late Wednesday, a federal district judge in Paducah, Ky., refused Humana's request to block the showing of Wednesday night's episode of the show after NBC agreed to run a disclaimer saying Ecumena is not a real company. However, Humana said it would continue to pursue the case, which was filed Tuesday in Louisville, Ky., where Humana is based, but heard in Paducah because the judge first assigned it turned out to be a Humana stockholder.

John Tinker, one of the show's writers at MTM Productions, said no imitation was intended. "We weren't thinking of them at all," he said. The Ecumena name came up as a play on the word "ecumenical," he said.

Nevertheless, there do seem to be some similarities between Ecumena and Humana. In the show, Ecumena is a for-profit hospital company, based in the Midwest, that modernizes St. Eligius and adds an artificial-heart program to the fictional Boston Hospital. In real life, Humana is a for-profit hospital company, based in Louisville, that specializes in taking over and modernizing poorly performing hospitals, and operates the nation's only permanent artificial-heart program in Louisville. Even the blue-and-white Ecumena and Humana logos are similar, according to Humana.

She said the network's censors hadn't felt the need to review "St. Elsewhere's" content for possible trademark infringement.


