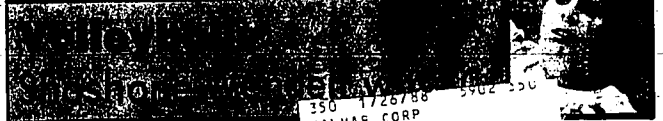

## Panel approves first \$1 billion for supercollider

WASHINGTON — A House committee voted Thursday to go ahead with the \$4.4 billion super collider atom smasher.

The super collider is being vigorously chased by 25 states who, along with municipal groups, submitted 36 proposals. New York state announced Thursday it was withdrawing one of those proposals in the lower Hudson Valley, leaving the state with two still in the competition.

The project is a 52-mile-around tunnel that will hurl proton beams into each other at 20 times the energies possible today. It carries with it 3,000 jobs and an operating budget of \$270 million a year.

The project is so popular that the House already has approved actual appropriations of funds for the fiscal year that began Oct. 1 — \$35 million for preconstruction activities, in advance of the authorization. The Senate has not acted on the companion appropriation.

Two hundred-sixty House members had sponsored a simple 11-line bill that would have authorized current spending and "such sums as may be necessary in fiscal year 1989 and subsequent fiscal years."

### Budget law's first impact step nearer

WASHINGTON — The Gramm-Rudman budget law will slash more than 10 percent from military programs and nearly 9 percent from domestic agencies next month unless President Reagan and Congress approve alternative ways to reduce the deficit, the Congressional Budget Office reported Thursday.

The \$23 billion in cuts, about half from military programs and the rest from non-defense spending, would take effect automatically on Nov. 20 under the newly revised law.

The report by the non-partisan CBO was the first step toward implementing the cutbacks. Although only a prelude to official White House estimates due next week, they brought into focus how individual programs would be hit by the across-the-board reductions.

Overall, the cut on domestic programs and welfare aid exempt under the law. However, millions of dollars would be cut from farm subsidies, law enforcement, education, health and most of what are considered the traditional functions of government.

Another member of the directorate, Pedro Joaquín Chamorro, read a statement saying the group would "send to Managua a delegation at the highest level to demand of the Sandinista front a direct dialogue with the resistance, to lead to an immediate cease-fire as contemplated in the peace agreement."

Chamorro said the leaders of the four other Central American countries that signed the accord had been briefed on the offer, and all "told us of their decision to support it."

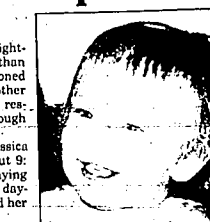

## Trapped toddler calls to mom as rescuers pick at hard rock

MIDLAND, Texas — A frightened toddler trapped for more than a day 22 feet down an abandoned backyard well talked to her mother and cried Thursday as anxious rescuers pounded their way through solid rock with jackhammers.

the well, but the later drilling was on a shaft that is 12 to 20 inches wide, one through which a rescuer could fit a hand.

"We are just trying frantically to get to the little girl through the rock," Midland police Sgt. Jeff Haile said. "The workers are starting to feel anxiety and it's combining with their fatigue."

"At some points, it's harder than granite," Haile said, quoting a federal Mine Safety and Health Administration official, Dave Lilly, from Carlsbad, N.M.

Workers had drilled a shaft, with a 3-foot diameter, 28 feet deep next to the well, then began working up toward the child. Progress was slowed by solid rock that kept breaking drill bits.

Doctors at first said the child could last as long as 36 hours, or until 9:30 p.m. Thursday, but Dr. Chip Klunick, emergency room doctor at Midland Memorial Hospital, said Thursday night she could survive longer.

Eighteen-month-old Jessica McClure fell into the well about 9:30 a.m. Wednesday while playing with other children at a private daycare center run by her aunt and her mother.

Midland Police Chief Richard Czech said Thursday night the rescuers had hit much harder rock than they had anticipated but that "I'm going to guess that maybe by 6 in the morning, if the good Lord's willing, we'll be done."

Floodlights were turned on as dusk fell Thursday. Dozens of friends and neighbors gathered to wait and pray with Jessica's mother, Chloé, 18, and Reba Gayle McClure, 17, Jessica is their only child.

Earlier Thursday, Midland police Cpl. Jim White said he listened to the child through a microphone that had been lowered to her.

"The only thing I heard her say is, 'Mommy.' The rest is just crying and moaning," he said.

Rescue workers used hand-held hydraulic drills inside a shaft sunk 64 inches away from the abandoned

"We don't have any best estimate" on when rescuers might reach Jessica, he said. "If you would early, I would have said we wouldn't be here today. The rock has been much harder. Nobody visualized that rock being that hard."

### Bork debate could begin soon

**WASHINGTON (AP)** - Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole said Thursday debate will probably begin at the start of next week on Robert H. Bork's Supreme Court nomination, possibly allowing a vote by Wednesday.

Republicans in the Senate have rebuffed Democrats' demands for a vote this week, arguing that at least three days would be needed to make the pro-Bork case. So far, 54 senators have said they oppose confirmation, all but ensuring defeat when the vote does come.

Senate Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., has been pressing Republicans without success for agreement on a voting time.

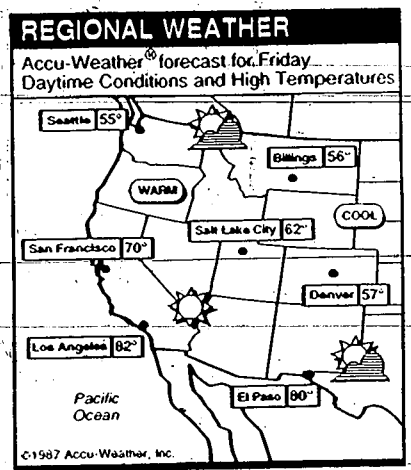
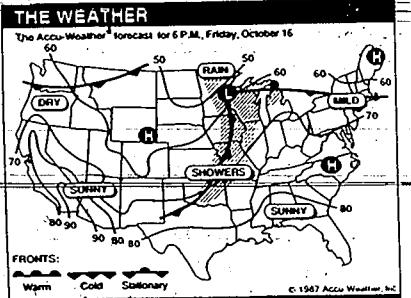

Democrats in Congress have been drafting a deficit-reduction package of spending cuts and tax increases. Democratic leaders have said they hoped Reagan would compromise on taxes because of the law's threat to his military budget.

# Robertson reports raising \$11 million for his '88 campaign

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former television evangelist Pat Robertson, in the first public disclosure of his surprising fund-raising strength, reported Thursday he has raised well over \$11 million from 120,000 contributors for his presidential campaign.

Robertson's \$11.7 million placed him second only to Vice President George Bush in the money sweepstakes; on the Democratic side, Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis outdistanced his rivals with \$8.1 million.

The six Republicans and five of the six Democrats in the 1988 race filed quarterly

financial reports with the Federal Election Commission on Thursday. Jesse Jackson's campaign did not file with the FEC but did release a general financial statement.

Virtually all of Robertson's money was spent before he formally entered the Republican presidential race on Oct. 1, said Robertson's campaign manager, R. Marc Nuttle. Most of the money went toward collecting 3.3 million signatures from people urging his candidacy, Nuttle said.

As of Sept. 30, the campaign had \$263,221 left in the bank, with \$637,141 in bills

paying surrogate deals.

McCurry said the campaign has borrowed heavily to invest large sums in the early, critical contests in New Hampshire and Iowa and raise Babbitt's national profile.

In the Republican field, Sen. Bob Dole of Kansas outpaced Bush in fund-raising for the quarter, bringing in just under \$4 million, which boosted his total receipts so far to nearly \$8 million.

# Weeping surrogate mothers want end to deals for babies

WASHINGTON (AP) — Weeping surrogate mothers, including "Baby M" mother Mary Beth Whitehead, pleaded with Congress on Thursday to outlaw parenting-for-pay deals that make women "valuable only from the neck down."

The women testified, along with another mother happy with her role as a surrogate, before a House committee considering the nation's first law on the relatively new, controversial practice.

Lawmakers' reaction was mixed. Rep. Henry Hyde, R-Ill., charged that paid surrogate contracts make children "as expendable as Kleenex."

Others wondered whether surrogacy offers infertile couples their only chance at children.

"We are human beings. We are not baby machines," said Mrs. Whitehead, whose highly publicized fight to keep her baby made her the nation's best-known surrogate mother.

A state judge this year stripped the 30-year-old New Jersey housewife of her rights to the baby she bore for a \$10,000 fee. Judge Harvey Sorkow upheld the contract in which Mrs. Whitehead originally agreed to give up the child, dubbed Baby M in court, to its natural father and his wife.

Making such contracts for pay would be a crime, punishable by fines and jail, under legislation proposed by Rep. Thomas Luken, D-Ohio. The bill also would outlaw so-called "baby brokers," who introduce surrogates to infertile couples, and ban any advertising to attract potential surrogate mothers.

Luken's bill would not affect non-

paying surrogate deals.

"It's the ultimate form of slavery," charged Jeremy Rifkin of the National Coalition to Ban Surrogacy. The group, which includes Mrs. Whitehead and other mothers, says surrogates are most often undereducated, lower-class women exploited for their wombs.

Surrogate Elizabeth Kane said, "From the neck down, we are valuable."

But Rep. Bob Whitaker, R-Kan., said some couples may be forced to turn to alternative ways of building a family. "Surrogacy may offer the last opportunity for a child," he said.

Whittaker said problems with surrogate arrangements could be overcome. Among solutions, he suggested giving surrogate mothers five days after childbirth to change their minds about giving up the infant.

Surrogate Lisa Walters of Wisconsin testified that she was happy with her role. A Montana couple, Joyce and Mark Stevens, said surrogacy provided them with their only child. Mrs. Walters and the Stevens spoke on behalf of Infertility Associates Inc., a Maryland surrogacy firm.

# Navy reports commend Stark crew for saving vessel, criticize officers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Iraqi missile attack on the USS Stark could have been prevented had the frigate's top officers properly done their jobs, but the crew reacted heroically after the attack to save the ship from a terrible fate, Navy reports concluded Thursday.

The May 17 attack in the Persian Gulf killed 37 sailors and touched off a still-unresolved fight between President Reagan and Congress over Reagan's policy of placing 11 Kuwaiti oil tankers under the American flag and escorting them with Navy ships.

The conclusions about the Stark attack were contained in a pair of reports provided to the House Armed Services seapower subcommittee.

One report was prepared by a commission appointed to assess the "survivability" of frigates such as the Stark. The second, by a panel chaired by Rear Adm. Grant A. Sharp, was an investigation into why the Stark failed to defend itself.

Despite the warnings and the fact that the Iraqi plane had been tracked for more than an hour by U.S. AWACS radar planes, the Stark's defensive weapons were never taken off standby status and some of the critical positions in the Combat Information Center or CIC, the ship's nerve center, weren't even manned, the report said.

In fact, it said, top officers on the Stark were so unworried about the Iraqi plane that they went ahead with a previously scheduled test of the ship's engines, the report said. That test ended only 12 minutes before the attack.

The report said the Stark's tactical action officer, Lt. Basil E. Moncrief, "failed to defend Stark as his duty required."

It said the ship's commander, Capt. Glenn R. Brindel, "failed to provide combat-oriented leadership, allowing Stark's anti-air warfare readiness to disintegrate to the point that his Combat Information Center team was unable to defend

the ship."

Brindel and Moncrief accepted responsibility for the Stark's failure to defend itself and were reprimanded. Brindel was permitted to retire at the lower rank of commander, while Moncrief resigned from the service without a pension.

The first ExecoC slammed into the Stark's left front side just below the bridge and went almost entirely through the ship without exploding, the panel on ship survivability said. The second missile hit 20 to 30 seconds later in the same spot and the warhead exploded.

The attack created "an immediate inferno" and raised the possibility of "mass detonation of the forward missile magazine," the panel said.

It said the fire was so hot that instead of spreading horizontally, it spread vertically by cooking equipment on the upper decks to the ignition point.

# Heaters start fire in home, kill 6 children

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Fire killed six children as they slept early Thursday in a crowded home where electric space heaters were being used because the gas had been shut off.

Their deaths brought to 18 the number of people who had died in "innocent" fires in three weeks.

The mother of five of the six children was away from home, hospitalized after giving birth to another child two days earlier. Neighbors who tried to rescue the children were driven back by heat and smoke.

Superman couldn't have gotten in there without "melting," fire Capt. James Groth said.

"I'm just devastated," said Alderman Michael McGee, who had blamed inner-city poverty for a Sept. 30 fire that killed 12 people, including 10 children, about one mile from the scene of Thursday's fire.

"It's got to be economic. There have to be jobs for these people so they don't have to live in these kinds of conditions," he said. "If they had had gas in all likelihood this wouldn't have happened. They were using space heaters. The wiring in these old houses just can't take this kind of load."

Gov. Tommy G. Thompson directed the Wisconsin Housing and Economic Development Authority "to take immediate and long-term steps to help prevent tragedies like this morning's fatal fire in Milwaukee."

The older I grow, the better I fly under those circumstances, and the less I like boarding a flight staffed by slightly mature teenyboppers. How can a bunch of kids keep a plane from falling out of the sky?

(I focus on the stewardesses rather than on the stewardesses for the simple reason that, chauvinist throwback that I am, I would

There should be a law against letting anyone of a tender age practice any of the protective professions. These days, doctors younger than my children tinker with my vital parts.

Lawyers still learning their ABCs stand between me and legal threats.

Police men are just kids.

That's why I like the older stewardesses. When some people fly, they like to anesthetize themselves with alcohol to make them forget that flying is impossible.

When I fly, I like to have a wrinkled old stewardess come over and hug my head and tell me everything is going to be all right.

Not even relief.

The Democrats' biggest problem is someone who's not even running for president. His name is Ronald Reagan. After seven years of vigorous repetition, his themes have seeped into America's unconscious and shaped the public debate. Are you for or against Reagan's bureaucracy? Do you favor economic growth or stagnation? Should we stand up to the Russians or be sitting ducks?

So long as these are understood as the choices for America, the Democrats are cornered. No matter how brilliant their rhetoric or how compelling their proposals, they're still trapped within Reagan's terms of debate. American politics often turns on the prevailing questions rather than the best solutions.

The Democrats' 1981 tax cut and subsequent military buildup, which have created record budget deficits and plunged America deeply into debt to the rest of the world — now totaling about \$360 billion. The budget crisis requires tax increases and spending cuts. This seems an unpropitious time for Democrats to offer new initiatives for how government can remedy the nation's ills — especially if they're also trying to appear fiscally responsible.

Finally, Democrats are hobbled by Reagan's extraordinary luck. We've well into the fifth year of an economic expansion that has created 15 billion new jobs and cut unemployment down to under 6 percent of the work force.

Most Americans neither know nor care that we're skating on thin ice. Our dependence on foreign capital makes us highly vulnerable to the whims of investors in Tokyo or

Bonn, who can push up American interest rates and plunge us into recession at a moment's notice. But so long as no cracks have yet appeared, the ice seems comfortably thick.

The Soviets, meanwhile, have got themselves a new leader who seems bent on restoring economic growth by, among other things, economizing on weapons. But to many Americans, Gorbachev's recent willingness to bargain over arms makes it appear that Reagan's hard line has finally paid off.

So what are the Democrats to do? Stop campaigning against Reagan. Democrats will never convince the American voter that they are more competent than Reagan is doing what Reagan has done best — shrink social programs and make corporations emphasize their integrity over all else, they invite the press to magnify every small slip-up — like a campaign director who rats on a opponent.

Instead, Democrats should try to change the terms of debate, and talk about what Democrats do best:

(a) Redistribute wealth from the Big Boys in the Back Rooms to the rest of us (what about a more progressive income tax and a higher tax on inherited wealth);

(b) Protect children, the aged, the environment, and everything else in our society that otherwise gets trampled upon or ignored;

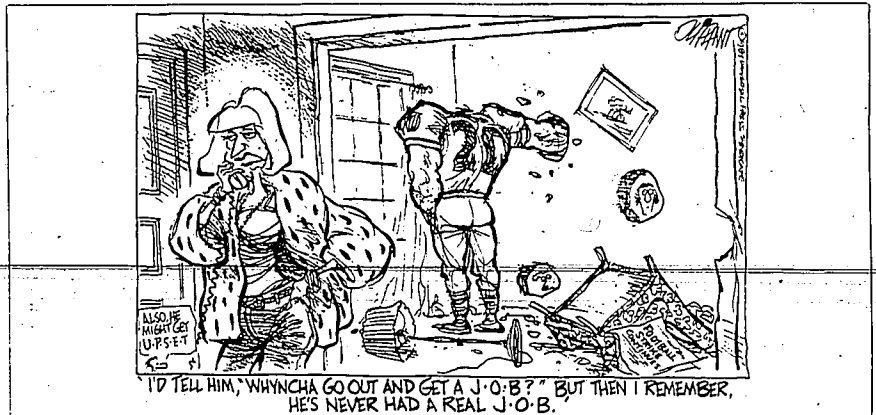
(c) Deliver things that average Americans need — like good day care for our preschoolers, good schools for our kids, health insurance for all of us, low-cost housing, and safe and reliable mass transportation;

(d) Refashion our workplaces to give us more job security and a greater financial stake in the fruits of our labors.

## Veterans' groups end service functions

Effective Thursday, the Disabled American Veterans, Twin Falls Stradley Chapter No. 5 and the Veterans of Foreign Wars Henry D. Lytle Post 2136 Twin Falls has discontinued all service officer functions.

This service had continued to escalate to the point that as nonprofit organizations, we can no longer participate.

In addition, the recent decision by the Twin Falls County Commissioners to hire a non-veteran as veterans service officer and placing that position under the arm of county welfare is an outrage to all veterans.

During recent years since 1984, the volunteer service officers from the local DAV and VFW have established a record of veterans benefits paid to Twin Falls County, fluctuating between \$3.81 and \$4 million.

These same volunteers have documented between 93 to 97 percent of the paperwork originating in Twin Falls County.

The kicker is: Twin Falls County service officer receives all the credit for this and without spending one cent for the service. Since the county service officer receives the credit, let her also have the responsibility of the loan involved.

Let the salaried non-veteran deal with Saturday and Sunday telephone calls, the late-night and early-morning emergencies to the V.A. Hospital in Boise, the widows and veterans who are housebound and unable to come to the office, the questions regarding Social Security, pensions, etc. that must be answered — sometimes in excess of 75 calls per day.

Of course this is not meant as a complaint, as our high-powered county commissioners are saving us taxpayers money. (If you believe that you still believe in the Tooth Fairy.)

The salary of the past county service officer

was \$7,300 per year. The "New" non-veteran, non-trained service officer receives \$14,400 per year. Also, from page two of the reorganization plan, it states "Job descriptions will be amended to reflect the changes in responsibilities. Salary adjustments will be made for the two individuals accepting the additional responsibilities."

So there is more to come. But don't complain — our commissioners say they are saving us money!

Recently in The Times-News was an article concerning the closing of a major industry and the impact on Magic-Valley. Estimated was a loss of \$9-\$10 million.

But we have here is a position being turned over to a non-trained, non-veteran with an annual benefit to Twin Falls County of nearly \$4 million dollars. With a trained veteran, that position should gross from \$5 to \$6 million. If I could not do that in a two-year period, I would hide under a rock.

Veterans, you have had your faces slapped. The tragic thing is some of you seem to like it. Others offer no opinion at all.

Here we are, some 8,000 veterans strong in Twin Falls County, add widows, wives and grown children and suddenly we are 20,000 strong. Certainly strong enough with enough clout to sway any county election if we organize and stick together.

Apparently our county commissioners think they have the power to make this decision to select whoever and whatever without so much as a consultation with the veterans organization.

This veteran is very concerned. I have traveled statewide to the functions of service organizations and believe me when I say that all eyes and ears are on Twin Falls County. We have 44 counties in this state and Twin Falls is the 9th to go under the umbrella of the welfare system.

I am a war veteran, U.S. Navy retired with 22 years service. I still get goose bumps when I hear the National Anthem and I still swell with pride when I see the American Flag displayed on 2nd Avenue travelling east in Twin Falls.

The veterans in Twin Falls County have been violated and that another of our guaranteed benefits has been cast aside. When county government can sit behind closed doors and affect the lives of 8,000 veterans, I believe it is time that we stand up and be counted.

I will continue to fight this unfair decision as long as I draw breath, even as was done last year in the state Legislature regarding funds for the remodel of the Veterans Nursing Home. Some of us will be there again in January 1988 to help strengthen the existing laws. Will you be there?

Closing remark: In the Magic-Valley we have a Veterans Commission consisting of members from four organizations including Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans, Vietnam Veterans of America and the American Legion.

When you have complaints, voice them through this commission so that an active file may be kept. Give your name, date and nature of complaint with regard to the "new county service officer."

# Shultz tour begins

No plan made for Mideast talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State George P. Shultz headed for the Middle East on Thursday without a U.S. formula to set up Arab-Israeli peace talks, but he said he hoped the parties would have some fresh ideas.

Shultz also cautioned Palestinian Arabs that while they have a right to be included in any negotiations they must be willing to accept Israel and to renounce violence.

"The Palestinians must be involved in the peace process if it is to mean anything," Shultz said. "There isn't any question about that."

But, he went on, "it's also true there isn't a role in the peace process for people whose tactics are violence, whose refusal to recognize that Israel is there as a state, and are ready to talk and try to make negotiations."

Shultz made it clear at a news conference before his departure for the Middle East that he had only limited expectations that Israel and the Arabs were ready to engage in negotiations.

"All in all, it's time to review the bidding with the parties," Shultz said. He made no mention of an international peace conference, which King Hussein of Jordan and Foreign Minister Shimon Peres of Is-

rael support, as a framework for peace talks.

Shultz said he has an alternative to offer.

"I do not go there with any particular new thing," Shultz said. "But I hope others will have something new to say."

Shultz has consistently taken the position that the United States should not seem to be more eager for talks than the parties themselves. However, he has been under pressure from the press to see if he can prod the two sides to the negotiating table.

Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir, on the other hand, is cool to the idea of an international peace that would give a participatory role to the Soviet Union.

"I am not going there to take part in internal Israeli politics in any way," Shultz said.

Shultz will be away nine days and hold talks in Moscow Oct. 22-23 on arms control and on setting a date for the next U.S.-Soviet summit meeting.

He said President Reagan and General Secretary Mikhail S. Gorbachev should defer their talks if a treaty to ban intermediate-range nuclear missiles is not ready for them to sign.

# Committee passes proposed tax hike

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Ways and Means Committee approved a \$12.3-billion deficit-reduction tax increase Thursday as Senate Democrats completed a similar version and President Reagan lambasted both efforts as fiscally irresponsible.

The House bill, approved on a party-line 23-13 vote over Republican opposition, would limit deductions for home-mortgage interest. The plan by Democrats on the Senate Finance Committee would raise Medicare taxes on 8 million upper-income Americans. And both would include several pet tax breaks favored by members of Congress.

These miscellaneous provisions include, for example, a heavily lobbied provision allowing free-lance authors to deduct research expenses before they receive income from a book or article. Another would permit contributors to college athletic funds a deduction for 80 percent of their gifts, even though they receive in return the right to purchase preferential stadium seating.

The Finance Committee added to its bill a provision, commonly known as "the taxpayers' bill of rights," aimed at reducing what some lawmakers consider abuses by the Internal Revenue Service. For example, it would permit taxpayers to collect damages for lawyers' fees

for cases in which the IRS acts recklessly, and allow the agency's ombudsman to issue orders for the IRS to immediately halt actions.

"If reason should fail, if Congress should actually pass a tax hike, my

answer will be simply this: veto," Reagan said in a statement issued at the White House. The emerging Democratic tax bill, he added, is "a breach of faith with the American people."

Reagan himself has called for about \$6 billion in revenue increases, including raising taxes on coal and requiring all state and local government employees to pay Medicare taxes.

# Arms control wrap up

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State George P. Shultz left for a 10-day trip to the Middle East and Moscow Thursday expressing confidence that he can "wrap up" the first U.S.-Soviet arms control agreement in eight years but conceding that he has no new formula to revive the Arab-Israeli peace process.

Talking at a press conference a few hours before his plane took off, Shultz said that he was disappointed that U.S. and Soviet negotiators in Geneva have been unable to complete work on a treaty banning medium- and shorter-range nuclear missiles but he said that the U.S. and Soviet negotiators, including Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze should be able to finish the job in two days of meetings.

# Hazardous warning program established

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House voted Thursday to establish a new \$25 million program for the government to individually warn hundreds of thousands of workers each year that they face a high risk of cancer and other disabling diseases from exposure to hazardous substances on the job.

Voicing 225-186 largely along party lines, Democrats pushed the "high-risk occupational disease notification" bill through the House despite a threatened veto from President Reagan and vehement objections from business groups fearing massive liability suits.

Republicans succeeded in attaching an amendment by Rep. William Dannemeyer, R-Calif., that would automatically include health-care

workers in the high-risk group because of their possible exposure to the AIDS virus.

Dannemeyer said his amendment would designate up to 4 million health care workers who would automatically be included in the "high-risk" group because they might have to deal with AIDS patients during their careers.

For all other workers, the bill would establish a nine-member panel of medical and scientific experts in the Department of Health and Human Services to determine which groups are most at risk.

The National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health would then be required to send individual notices to between 100,000 and 300,000 of them every year.

# Judge accused of sexually advancing on boys resigns

ANNISTON, Ala. (AP) — Family Court Judge James D. Sloan, facing possible ouster on charges that he made sexual advances on boys over a 26-year period, said today he is resigning from the bench.

"The decision was made after a lot of thought and consideration and prayer. It was made jointly with my wife," said Sloan.

The 43-year-old judge was scheduled for trial Oct. 26 before the State Court of the Judiciary on charges that he violated Alabama's canons of judicial ethics in a series of incidents with boys, including some in his judicial chambers.

The charges stemmed from the case brought against Sloan in Providence, R.I., where he was acquitted last June on charges that he raped and sodomized the 13-year-old grandson of a Mississippi judge in a motel before the judge's attending a judicial conference on how the courts handle child abuse.

After the acquittal, a series of allegations were made by other males who claimed Sloan had either sexually molested them or tried to do so. The allegations dated back to 1981.

Sloan denied the claims that he had sex with the youths.

# San Diego, Dallas top million list

WASHINGTON (AP) — San Diego and Dallas became population millionaires for the first time last year, besting the number of American cities with at least 1 million residents to eight, the Census Bureau estimated Thursday.

New York still tops the list of municipalities with a million or more Americans in the 1986 population estimates, while Los Angeles is next, and Chicago is third, followed in order by Houston, Philadelphia, Detroit, and the just-arrived San Diego and Dallas, the bureau reported.

Meanwhile, the list of cities with a population of at least 100,000 is up by six, to 182, the bureau estimated, compared with figures for 1984.

New York remains by far the nation's most populous city, with an estimated 7,282,700 people in 1986, up from 7,164,742 in 1984.

After New York, 1986 population

figures for the cities with at least 1 million residents, are Los Angeles, 3,259,300; up from 3,096,668 in 1984; Chicago, 3,009,630, up from 2,992,742; Houston, 1,728,910, up from 1,724,367; Philadelphia, 1,642,900, up from 1,646,713; Detroit, 1,058,220, down from 1,126,972 in 1984; San Diego, 1,016,190, up from 960,452; and Dallas, 1,003,620, up from 974,599.

**Tamil rebels renew attacks**

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka (AP) — Tamil rebels killed 35 soldiers and civilians in renewed attacks in eastern Sri Lanka on Thursday as Indian troops pressed their offensive against the Tamil northern stronghold of Jaffna.

Among those killed were 10 Sinhalese who were hacked to death. An estimated 1,000 Indian soldiers were air-lifted to the Jaffna peninsula to join 6,000 others in the drive, according to reports in New Delhi.

The rebels, led by the dominant Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam, were believed to have 2,500 men in Jaffna town, 186 miles north of the capital, Colombo.

**Nudel flies home to Israel**

MOSCOW (AP) — Jewish activist Ida Nudel, her 16-year fight to emigrate finally won, left the Soviet Union for Israel on Thursday aboard the private jet of U.S. industrialist Armand Hammer.

She hugged and kissed relatives in the VIP lounge of Moscow's Sheremetyevo Airport, then headed to the plane with Hammer and his staff for the 4½-hour flight to Tel Aviv.

She told reporters at the airport she thought the Kremlin was signaling a shift in its tight emigration policy by allowing her and other Jews to leave.

"Now I am very hopeful," said Ms. Nudel, 66. "It is some kind of new spirit I feel."

On Wednesday, Vladimir Slepak, who has waited more than 17 years, was told he may emigrate. In September, more than a dozen long-term refuseniks received permission to leave the country.

**Coup enacted on Ivory Coast**

ABIDJAN, Ivory Coast (AP) — A coup by his chief adviser ousted Capt. Thomas Sankara on Thursday as leader of Burkina Faso, the west African nation's national radio announced.

It said the coup led by Capt. Blaise Compaore was called The Popular Front of the 15th of October.

Compaore is a former minister of state and of justice. His support was crucial to the military coup of Aug. 4, 1983, that put Sankara in power in the former French colony.

A communiqué broadcast by the radio, monitored in Abidjan, said the frontiers would be closed until the situation was completely under control. It promised a return to democracy.

No hint was given of Sankara's whereabouts or fate. Agence France-Presse, the French news agency, said he was arrested.

**Korean price moves aid presidential hopes**

SEOUL, South Korea — The government took steps Thursday to bolster the presidential hopes of Roh Tae Woo, the candidate of the ruling Democratic Justice Party.

It raised the price it will pay farmers for rice, lowered the price of petroleum products, and stepped up a campaign against the radical left by arresting 11 leaders of an anti-government organization on charges dating back to last March.

Farmers will receive 14 percent more for the rice they produce this year and an increase of 10 percent for the barley they grow next year. It is the first double-digit price increase that the government has approved for rice since 1982. Last year the government raised the producer price by 6 percent.

The decision, which was announced Thursday, was reached after Roh promised farm leaders that the rice price would be fixed at a high level to keep farm income in line with the wages of urban workers, who have won pay raises averaging 22.6 percent this year.

The move against the left was also seen as an effort to help Roh, who is presenting himself as a candidate who stands for stability.

The government announced the arrest of 11 leaders of Minjung, the National Federation of Students Fighting for Nationhood and Democracy.



# Iraqi jets strike oil facilities

MANAMA, Bahrain — Iraqi planes attacked three Iranian oil installations in the Persian Gulf Thursday after a missile, presumed to be Iranian, exploded near Al-Ahmedi, Kuwait's busiest shipping and oil industry center.

The Bahrain-based Gulf News Agency, quoting an Iraqi communique, said the Iraqi aircraft set ablaze targets at the Agha Jari oilfields, the oil loading platform at Inam Hassan and oil installations at Gharq.

The raids came 12 hours after an early morning blast shook Al-Ahmedi and sent a huge cloud of smoke into the sky.

Kuwait said the explosion was due to an Iranian missile, which caused "very slight damage" to the Liberian-flagged supertanker Sangari. Kuwait denied reports that refining and export operations at Al-Ahmedi had been interrupted.

Kuwaiti Foreign Minister sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmed denounced "this new Iranian aggression" in urgent

messages to U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar, the Arab League, the Islamic conference Organization and the Gulf Cooperation Council.

Kuwait urged the U.N. Security Council to impose sanctions against Iran for its refusal to abide by the council's July 20 cease-fire resolution and its attempts to expand the war with Iraq to other Gulf countries.

Telgran radio broadcasts gave prominence to news of the missile attack on Al-Ahmedi but neither confirming nor denying Iran's responsibility.

Speculation that the missile was a Chinese-made Silkworm anti-ship projectile was discounted because the Silkworm has a maximum range of 60 miles and there has been firm indications that Iran can use the missiles.

Kuwait reported two months ago that the Iranians had fired four rockets on the area of Al-Ahmedi. It said one of them struck a residential area without causing casualties. But it has not given any hint on the type of projectiles involved.

# Duarte proposes Contra aid cutoff to aid peace process

WASHINGTON (AP) — Salvadoran President Jose Napoleon Duarte proposed Thursday that the United States give no more military aid to Nicaragua's Contra rebels until at least January to give a chance for a regional peace accord to succeed.

Duarte, stressing that he was not trying to interfere with internal U.S. policies, said such a cutoff of outside military aid to insurgent forces is "an indispensable element" in the quest for peace and is stated clearly in the accord signed by five Central American presidents on Aug. 7.

The request is sharply at odds

with the stated intentions of President Reagan to formally ask Congress for a \$270 million, 18-month continuation of Contra aid sometime between Nov. 7 — the target date for a regional cease-fire — and Thanksgiving, Nov. 26.

"We have said give us a chance, give us this opportunity," Duarte said in response to a question at a National Press Club appearance. "And the maximum time we ask is 150 days."

That time includes the 90 days for the signatory countries to achieve a cease-fire, grant amnesty to insurgents, restore civil liberties and bar the use of their territory as staging areas for rebels.

Sixty days later, in early January, the presidents of the five countries — El Salvador, Honduras, Nicaragua, Guatemala and Costa Rica — are to meet and receive a report from an international commission which will monitor compliance with the accord and report on its outcome.

"Then we know the truth whether our plan has succeeded or has failed," Duarte said. "This is absolutely clear. We are asking for this space ... This is what we stand by and this is what we are asking the world and the United States."

"What we have said here is, 'Don't give any aid to the people who are rebels during this space that we are asking.'"

The Reagan administration has argued that without continued aid, the Contras will disappear as a military or even a political force in Nicaragua and the leftist Sandinista government in Managua will lose incentive to carry out its end of the peace bargain.

In remarks during a visit to Capitol Hill earlier Thursday, Duarte said the peace accord obligates the Sandinistas to arrange a cease-fire with the Contras through direct talks.

"I have the obligation to talk to the Salvadorans whether they are guerrillas ... or whatever they are," Duarte told reporters after addressing an informal joint meeting of the House and Senate.

"And Nicaragua has the obligation to talk to the Nicaraguans, whether they are Contras, ... whether they're church or whatever," he added.

Duarte has been talking directly with Salvadoran insurgents in an effort to meet the Nov. 7 cease-fire deadline in the peace agreement.

But with the deadline three weeks away, the failure of the two sides in Nicaragua's conflict to come together is one of the main factors that could imperil the peace agreement. House Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas, said Thursday that the Reagan administration should do more to bring them together.

# UN chief starts second round of peace talks

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar launched a second round of peace talks Thursday with Iran and Iraq, armed with a new mandate to negotiate a cease-fire in their 7-year-old war.

The 15-nation Security Council approved the mandate without a vote during private consultations. Afterward, Perez de Cuellar said he had drafted a detailed blueprint for ending the war.

Asked at a news conference if he thought there now was a chance for significant progress in the rocky negotiations, he responded: "I expect so ... I expect to impress a sense of urgency in this second part of the negotiating process with the two parties."

Perez de Cuellar refused to disclose details of the plan, which he presented to Iranian ambassador

Said Rajate-Khorassani and Iraq's alternate U.N. delegate, Ali Sumaida. He said he would ask the two sides to respond in writing by the end of this month.

Sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the plan was about 10 pages long and asked Iran and Iraq a series of questions about how steps toward peace should be arranged.

The U.N. chief held the first round of negotiations in Tehran and Baghdad in mid-September. Perez de Cuellar said he had not yet proposed a specific date for a cease-fire, but he indicated he wants it to start by the end of the year.

"That is something which will be negotiated with the parties ... whether we start in October or November or December," he said.

The peace steps were spelled out in Security Council Resolution 598,

passed July 20, but the sequence was not specified.

The Security Council mandate marks the clearest indication to date that the council would not object to other elements of a peace plan starting on the same day as a cease-fire.

Perez de Cuellar proposed in an initial outline presented to the council last month that the peace process begin with a cease-fire on what he called a "D-Day." On the same day, he proposed, U.N. observers would be dispatched to monitor the truce. After "D-Day," both sides would withdraw their forces to internationally recognized borders.

Perez de Cuellar said that "on D-Day or another date to be agreed upon," an impartial body would start work on determining responsibility for the war.

The sources read to The Asso-

ciated Press the text of the document adopted Thursday. In it, Security Council members say they "commend" the secretary-general's timetable. The document also authorizes Perez de Cuellar to set up the "machinery that will be needed" to put the peace moves into place.

Iran accuses Iraq of starting the conflict. Iraq invaded western Iran in September 1980 after border skirmishes. Tehran has long insisted Iraq be branded the aggressor as a condition for ending the conflict.

Iran has said it would observe an informal cease-fire while the impartial body investigates who started the war, and would go along with a formal truce only after the panel's findings are released. Iran, which occupies Iraqi territory, has refused to commit itself to a troop withdrawal.

# Italian airliner crashes in foothills of Alps

COMO, Italy (AP) — An Italian airliner carrying 37 people on a flight from Milan to West Germany crashed in the foothills of the Italian Alps during a heavy rainstorm, authorities said.

There was no word from the crash site on whether there were any survivors.

Spokesmen for two fire departments conducting search efforts in the area near Lake Como in north-

ern Italy confirmed the plane had gone down, but said they could not pinpoint the crash site.

Air traffic controllers lost contact with Flight 469 of the state-run Alitalia subsidiary ATI about 7:30 p.m. (12:30 p.m. MDT), 16 minutes after it had taken off from Milan's Linate Airport for Cologne, West Germany, said airline spokesman Roberto Panico.

The plane was carrying 34 passen-

gers and three crewmembers, Panico said. He could not immediately identify the type of aircraft.

The Italian news agencies AGI and ANSA described the plane as an ATR 42, a double-engine-turbo-prop jet constructed for Alitalia jointly by the Italian Aeritalia firm and a French aerospace consortium. The agencies said search and rescue efforts were being hampered by the driving rains.

**Former pro wrestler may lose right foot**

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — Maurice "Mad Dog" Vachon, who

was a professional wrestler for more than three decades, is in serious condition after a traffic accident and may lose his right foot.

The 68-year-old Vachon was hit from behind last Friday while he was walking down the middle of an access road to Interstate 80 near his brother's home.

"I don't remember getting hit. I turned and saw the headlights and that's all I remember," said Vachon.

Vachon's left leg is broken and his right leg has a gash from just below the knee to his foot, he said in an interview Wednesday night from University Hospital in Iowa City, where he is listed in serious but stable condition.

Vachon said infection had set in and that the right foot might have to be amputated. He said a large portion of tissue in that leg is dead and there is damage to blood vessels.

The 6-foot-8-inch Vachon, who is from Canada, said he wrestled in the 1948 Olympic Games at 176 pounds and won a gold medal in the British Empire Games in 1950 in New Zealand. Since then, he had

been wrestling at 235 pounds on the professional tour before bowing out last year.

**Deng and delegation visiting California**

DOWNEY, Calif. (AP) — Chinese Premier Deng Xiaoping's oldest son, disabled after being thrown from a fourth-story university window by Red Guards in the 1960s, is midway through a three-week tour of U.S. rehabilitation centers.

Paralyzed from the waist down, Deng Pufang, now 43, went on the China Fund for the Handicapped, a national social welfare organization aimed at increasing public awareness of the needs and abilities of the disabled.

In Downey, Deng's nine-member delegation is scheduled to visit the spinal-injury care center of the Rancho Los Amigos rehabilitation center on Friday.

Deng's group will travel to San Francisco to visit computer centers for the disabled and a center for independent living that encourages alternatives to hospitalization.

## Put forth by takeover strategist Columbia voids offer of student prize

NEW YORK (AP) — Business school officials nationwide praised Columbia University for voiding a \$100,000 student prize offered by corporate takeover strategist and part-time teacher, Asher B. Edelman.

The decision made Tuesday by Columbia Business School Dean John C. Burton to scrap the prize, offered to anyone in Edelman's class who could find him a good company to buy, was sharply disputed by Edelman and some members of the class, titled "Corporate Raiding: The Art of War."

The "conflict" raised questions about what subjects should be taught in U.S. business schools and whether students who enter the highly competitive institutions have become infatuated with greed at the expense of other values.

"Bravo for Dean Burton, that's all I can say," said Richard R. West, dean of New York University's graduate business school. "That offer violates all of the normal canons of the academy. It's simply inconsistent with all the things that academics should hold sacred about the classroom."

West also said he was appalled at what he called the apparent inability of Edelman and some of the students to understand why the \$100,000 prize was improper. He and other deans said they wouldn't have allowed it either.

"It's crucial that schools do their best to teach students not to think about just making money," West said. "It may be that some students in our schools may want to sell their souls to the devil. But we should not have the devil standing at the front of the classroom."

Many business schools, including Columbia and NYU, offer students competitive grants of up to \$5,000 for devising business startup plans that become successful. It is usually understood, however, that the winners will repay the money into a school fund that can be used to award others.

School of Business at Southern Methodist University, said that if Edelman had offered the money to the Columbia school as a whole, it might have been considered acceptable.

Burton ordered the prize rescinded after talking with Edelman, but the investor first refused to renege on the \$100,000 finder's fee. He backed down when the school threatened to cancel his class.

## Town council renames park for late star

LAUDERHILL, Fla. (AP) — Children will soon scamper through Jackie Gleason Park in the late star's surrogate hometown, although some say it is not the best choice and the city council vote was close.

"Jackie Gleason never paid any mind to children in Lauderdale," Mayor David Klinevinsky said. "As a matter of fact, he never paid any mind to Lauderdale at all."

Any good Gleason did for Lauderdale was an accident, according to council member Howard Berger, another opponent.

However, the City Council voted 3-2 to name a new three-acre park after the star of "The Honeymooners."

Gleason brought publicity to the city by sponsoring a professional golf tournament during the 1970s, argued Council President John Mullin.

Residents had killed an earlier proposal to rename Inverrary Drive because they thought their postal service would be disrupted.

"The man brought Inverrary — which brought Lauderdale — into a great focus," Mullin said, rebuking detractors. "Gleason lived in Inverrary, a part of Lauderdale, for years."

"I think it's personal," said Mullin of the opposition. "I think it's entirely personal."

## 'Discomfort' sends Mormon leader to hospital

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Mormon Church President Ezra Taft Benson, experiencing "physical discomfort" possibly associated with his heart, was admitted to LDS Hospital Thursday, a church spokesman said.

Spokesman Don LeFevre said the 88-year-old leader of the 6.4 million-member Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints was in stable condition.

LeFevre said Benson was admitted about 7:30 a.m. MDT after complaining of discomfort, as he began

his day's activities. Church officials said doctors were performing a number of tests, but they would not offer further details.

However, LDS Hospital information personnel said that Benson, revered as the faith's "prophet, seer and revelator," was in room 733 — a room in the hospital's coronary intensive care unit.

Hospital authorities referred further questions to the church's offices.

At the Mormon leader's side was Mark Benson, his son, who indicated

he was optimistic about his father's chances for recovery.

"He's doing fine, he's looking good. His color's good, he's doing great," he said, but declined to provide further details.

The elder Benson, who served as U.S. agriculture secretary 1953-61 under President Eisenhower, became the 13th president of the Mormon Church on Nov. 10, 1985 following the death of his 90-year-old predecessor, Spencer W. Kimball. Mormon Church presidents serve for life.

Benson underwent three hours of minor surgery at LDS Hospital in November, 1986 to implant an electronic pacemaker to ensure normal heart rhythm. He had been hospitalized for observation in January of that year after fainting at his residence.

On Jan. 11, 1986, two months after assuming the presidency, Benson suffered a fainting spell while talking to his son, Reed, on the telephone, and was rushed to the hospital for tests and observation.

## Ranchers win damages

VALE, Ore. (AP) — A Malheur County Circuit Court jury has awarded \$650,000 in damages to five landowners who claimed negligence by the operators of the Owyhee Dam and reservoir resulted in flood damage on their land in 1984.

The jury originally awarded nearly \$1 million when it reached its verdict Wednesday, but lowered the amount because it found the landowners were partially at fault for failing to keep the channel below the dam clear of silt and debris.

R.D. McKinley, the lead plaintiff in the case, said he felt good about the verdict but expected it

to be appealed.

The flooding occurred after the operators of the dam increased the amount of water released to prevent the reservoir from overflowing following an unusually heavy runoff due to heavy rains, warm temperatures and melting snow.

The plaintiffs argued that the operators should have released water earlier in anticipation of a predicted record runoff. He also said the operators failed to use discharge valves either because they were not maintained properly or because they were to be used only for irrigation.

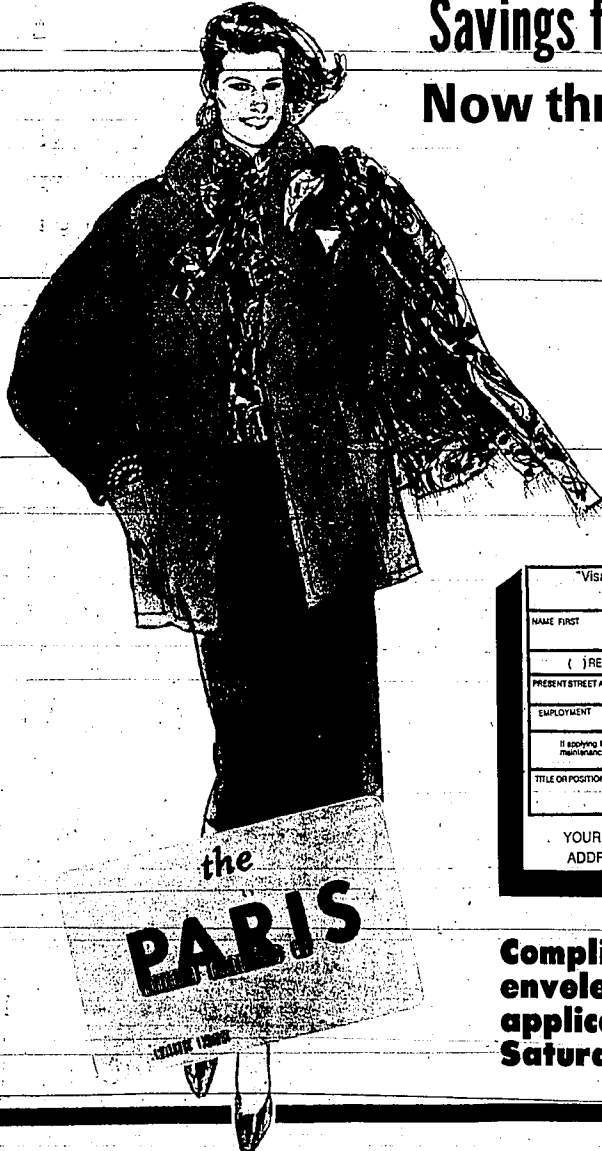

## More hungry are seeking aid, say agencies

### Increased summer demands point to even tougher winter

TWIN FALLS — Cvd Dillon faces the oncoming winter with bleak forecasts of more people expected to seek emergency food assistance.

Dillon oversees the food pantry at the South Central Community Action Agency, where 200 households

— twice as many as four years ago — now rely on emergency boxes of food, feeding each family member three meals a day for three days.

"We've been particularly alarmed at the numbers of people seeking help during the summer months — it's up and up and up," Dillon said. The numbers generate concern because people usually have seasonal

farming jobs and find it easier to get by in warmer months, she said.

"We're looking at a hard winter," Dillon predicted.

Since the families may only receive the boxes of dried and canned foods once every six months, SCAA increasingly refers people plagued by continuing food emergencies to the food bank at the Episcopal Church of the Ascension.

Coordinator Cindy Jardine said that through September, 89 families averaging four or five members each, received three-day boxes of food. The boxes contain Spam, tuna, macaroni and cheese, frozen

hamburger and eggs, and dried milk, Jardine said.

She said the Episcopal church in 1986 saw 105 families during its first nine months. But confusion and delays surrounding the state Department of Health and Welfare's new computer, EPICS, are blamed for that unusual gain, when 35 families visited the church during December alone.

Even so, 1987 marks a consistent increase over 1986, when 76 families turned to the church, Jardine said.

"Everything's escalating," she

said. "I just think that all around expenses are higher."

These observations came on the eve of a survey of Idaho's hunger and homelessness by the Idaho Hunger Action Council. IHAC's survey was released to coincide with today's World Food Day, which the United Nations established for combating these issues.

The survey found Idahoans hit hard by a sluggish economy, forced to rely on multiple sources of benefits to complement the buck-and-half a day for meals from Food Stamps.

Just as the SCAA clients are

overflowing to the Episcopal Church food bank, people are reacting the same way statewide.

The survey found that half the respondents used a food bank at one point four-and-a-half times during the past year. More than three-fourths received additional support from Food Stamps and one-fourth had a family member enrolled in the Women and Infant Children program.

"I think it has to do with the fact Idaho has never fully recovered economically," said Martha Patterson of the Idaho Hunger Action Council.

## Whooping cough hits 8; shots advised

TWIN FALLS — An outbreak of whooping cough in Twin Falls County has prompted health officials to advocate immunizations for the childhood malady.

There have been eight new cases of whooping cough reported in Magic Valley during the last two months, said Obeyle Becker, epidemiologist with the South Central District Health Department.

That total — seven cases in Twin Falls County and one case in Gooding County — is "more than the whole rest of the year," she said.

Only one case of pertussis, or whooping cough, was reported in Magic Valley before Aug. 15. Statewide, there were 41 cases of whooping cough reported by Sept. 26, which was up from 35 cases during all of 1986.

Symptoms usually arise within one to three weeks of exposure. They include a runny nose and a cough that develops into more serious heaves, when the "whooping" name is derived.

Striking small children in particular, Becker said unchecked whooping cough can lead to pneumonia and sometimes death. But antibiotics perform well against the disease, once it is diagnosed, she said.

Becker said parents should check with their family doctors or the district health department to see whether their children are fully immunized. She said area immunization levels are "atrocious."

Children should receive shots at two months, four months, six months, then six months to a year later, and then a last one before starting school, Becker said.

While shooting for 90-percent immunization rates, only 69 percent of 2-year-olds in Magic Valley received their full four shots, according to a state survey.

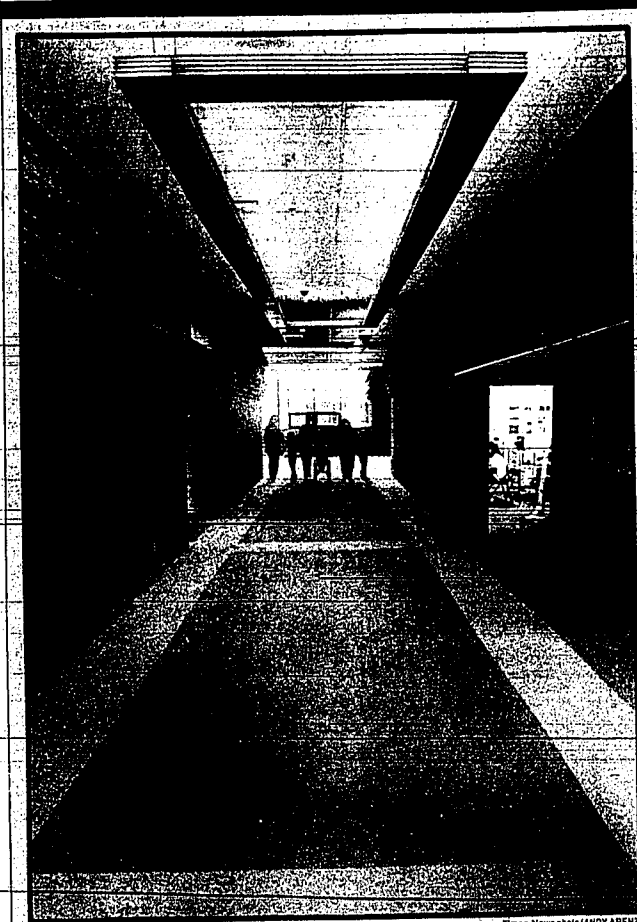
The 89 percent of Magic Valley 2-year-olds who have received only three shots may be partially immune, but carrying pertussis and infecting others, Becker said.

The epidemiologist said this outbreak may be the delayed result from media attention in 1982. Reports that year on the Donahue show and 60 Minutes warning about risks from the immunizations may have driven families away from the immunizations, she said.

Children suffering neurological problems, such as seizures, should not get the shots, Becker said. And doctors should screen the children to minimize reactions to the shots.

Becker said a child will suffer permanent brain damage from the shot only once in 310,000 immunizations.

The district health department holds immunization clinics every Wednesday in Twin Falls, and district offices throughout Magic Valley also hold them. The shots cost \$3.

## State school gets new look

GOODING — The Idaho State School for the Deaf and Blind will show off its \$9 million renovation project with an open house today.

Superintendent Jim Rainer says demolition of old buildings began in June of 1986 and new construction work has been continuous since April of 1986.

Small, modern cottages have replaced the old, three-level dormitories, giving students more privacy and a more home-style environment. Rainer says there are two students in each section, and two sections share a bathroom.

The cottages include kitchens, dining areas, living rooms and dens for study or television "to make it as close to a home atmosphere as possible," he says. All students go home to their families on weekends.

In the new educational complex, old buildings were remodeled, new buildings were constructed and everything was connected under one roof.

In the complex are administration offices, a cafeteria, a library, and an evaluation and diagnostic clinic. It also houses classrooms for pre-school, elementary, junior high, high school, vocational agriculture, physical education and recreation programs.

Apart from the complex, existing dormitories were remodeled to house the administration offices for the residential programs and the infirmary.

The state school for the hearing and visually impaired opened in Gooding in 1910, after operating in Boise from 1906 to 1908. It presently has 121 students from age 3 to 21 on campus and 27 teachers on campus. Off campus it has six regional programs with 451 students and 27 teachers statewide.

Rainer says all construction work has been completed except for some interior work still to be done.

A dedication ceremony will begin at 11 a.m. in the gymnasium today, followed by an open house of the new buildings until about 4 p.m. The public is invited.

## Twin Falls gets a 'go' on pool

TWIN FALLS — With a special-use permit in hand, Twin Falls city officials are proceeding with plans to build a new swimming pool.

No one appealed a Sept. 29 decision by the Twin Falls City Planning and Zoning Commission to issue a permit to the city to operate the pool in a residential zone, said City Development Director LaMar Orton.

Wednesday was the deadline for appealing the decision to the City Council.

The pool will be built on a lot located at Locust Street and Stadium Boulevard. The property is owned by the Twin Falls School District.

The zoning commission had added no restrictions to the permit.

Neighbors had asked the commission to adopt as restrictions

their list of suggestions for pool operations.

Commission members chose to leave the list as suggestions instead of stipulations in the permit because they said the city had already incorporated the neighbors' recommendations into their plan.

The neighbors had wanted the city to install a wooden fence along the southern boundary of the property and restrict use of the pool, parking lot and nearby park area.

City officials will now finalize an agreement to lease the property from the school district and use the geothermal water on the site, said City Manager Tom Courtney. An agreement has already been drafted by the city.

While discussions over the lease are proceeding, engineering work will be conducted at the site in preparation for release of bid specifications, he said.

## Idaho tourism

### Spend money on bigger campaign to promote state as a great getaway

TWIN FALLS — Idaho must spend more money to promote the state as a vacation getaway, said Idaho tourism officials and a private industry representative to the Idaho Travel Council Thursday.

"We need to invest more (in tourism promotion) — the more we invest, the more we get," said Chuck Webb, assistant manager of Sun Valley Co. and the Region IV representative to the Idaho Travel Council. "We've got all the ingredients" to be a prime destination for vacations, he said.

Those ingredients include the mountains and rivers of Idaho, making it a perfect package for vacations for urban dwellers who want to get away from the city, said Carl Wilgus, administrator for travel promotion in the Idaho Department of Commerce.

Webb and Wilgus spoke at a Magic Valley Leadership 1988 seminar at the KMVT-TV Community Room.

The seminar is sponsored by the Greater Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce and is part of a week-long series of events during Chamber Week.

Wilgus outlined the state's plan to promote Idaho as a destination for vacationers.

"Idaho is going to be a getaway to get into the mountains," Wilgus said. "Our intent is not to go into Los Angeles and promote the shopping in Idaho. The reason people come to Idaho is to get away."

But getting people away from their homes to come to Idaho instead of neighboring states isn't easy. Although the state funds tourism advertising with a 2 percent hotel/motel tax, it spends less than any of the six states surrounding

and competing with it, Webb said. And the race nationwide isn't close either, Webb said, because Idaho ranks 39th in the United States in travel-promotion spending.

The state of Idaho is trying to catch up in travel promotion efforts, Wilgus said, by targeting the western United States with promotional literature and advertising.

One of the first promotional campaigns is a television advertising program in Spokane, Wash., and Salt Lake City. Wilgus said the state will be spending \$60,000 to \$100,000 on the television campaign in Utah.

However, Wilgus isn't banking on television advertising alone. He said the state will be working with the travel industry to try to develop packages for bus tours, to promote special events like the McCall Winter Carnival, to draw fly fishermen to Idaho — Wilgus called fly fishing the "yuppie sport of the 1980s" — and to get campers to spend more time here.

The reward, Webb says, is the expansion of an industry that already brings \$1.8 billion into the state economy, although he says, "We haven't really scratched the surface yet."

And yet, the state must overcome two intertwined problems in drawing tourists, Webb said.

Those two problems are image and location. During his personal promotion of Sun Valley in other areas of the country, Webb said out-of-staters haven't known where Idaho is or that it is a potentially great vacation destination.

"When I talk to Idaho, their problem is relating to where it is on the map," Webb said. "They've heard of Sun Valley, but they don't know it's in Idaho and don't know where Idaho is."

## Victim of alleged rape, kidnapping, assault testifies in court

TWIN FALLS — The victim of an alleged rape and kidnapping last June took the stand in 5th District Court Thursday to tell a night she did not expect to survive — a night that by her account included an assault in her living room and a drive at knife point into the Nevada desert.

Marvin Hedges, 38, of Twin Falls, is on trial charged with burglary, robbery, kidnapping, aggravated battery and rape. The alleged incidents occurred the night of June 9 and early morning hours of June 10

of this year.

In her opening statements to the 12-member jury, Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Elliot Baxter said the victim would take the stand to describe "the most terrifying night of her life" when she firmly believed she was going to die.

Baxter said she would support with testimony and evidence a chain of events she outlined for the jury. She alleged that the defendant broke into the victim's home, raped her at knife point and then forced her, also at knife point, to drive to a rest area just north of Jackpot where he told her he intended to kill her.

In his opening address to the jury, Public Defender Michael Wood indicated Hedges would build his defense of Hedges on a stormy relationship prior to the alleged June 9 incidents and on testimony that the two were "joking and laughing together" when they stopped at a Jackpot service station in the early morning hours of June 10. He said Hedges would take the stand to describe "the most terrifying night of her life" when she firmly believed she was going to die.

Baxter said her witnesses would show that the victim had begged for her life and promised the defendant anything to keep from being killed in the deserted Nevada rest area.

She said the victim would testify that she did not try to escape at the service station where they stopped on the return trip, because she was alive, on her way home to her children and wanted to "take no chances on not getting there."

The victim did testify that she was afraid to take that chance by running from the car, although the defendant was in the service station office and restroom. She said he had told her if she tried anything stupid he would kill her and her two children.

Pastor Jim Sommer, the first state's witness, testified that he was approached by the defendant

following church services on the Saturday two days before June 9. He said the defendant told him he was having problems because of rejection by the victim and all that time said "I can't have her, no one else can either." Sommer is pastor of the Misionary Church in Filer.

The defendant and victim had previously been married, and Sommer said he had been asked by the defendant to help persuade his former wife to come back to him.

Questioned by the prosecutor, the victim said that on the night of June 9, she had put her children to bed and was also in bed in her Filer home

when she heard a noise in the house.

She said she reached for the telephone by the bed to call for help but it was dead. When she entered the kitchen to use the telephone there, she said she was confronted by the defendant, who she believed had entered her locked home through a window that had a broken lock.

She said he told her he had pulled the telephone wires loose and the telephone was dead. She told of events that followed including the defendant taking a kitchen knife from a drawer in that room, and

## Police say auto body deaths, area arrests, only coincidence

PASCO, Wash. (AP) — Federal officials said Thursday it was a coincidence that five men were fatally shot in an auto body shop shortly after three people were arrested a few blocks away by federal drug investigators.

Meanwhile, the lone survivor of the massacre was released from jail after police determined he will appear to testify at a trial, Franklin County Prosecutor Dennis DeFelic said.

Jesse Rocio, 20, of Pasco, had been held in the Franklin County Jail since being released from a hospital Wednesday while police determined

whether he might try to leave the area to avoid testifying, or whether his safety would be jeopardized.

"We're not going to hold Mr. Rocio," DeFelic said late Thursday afternoon. "He's lived in this area for awhile. He wants to be released and the police don't have any reason they can hold him any longer."

Meanwhile, police continued to investigate whether the massacre was the result of a dispute over illegal drugs. Federal officials discounted speculation that the shootings were related to the arrests by a drug task force.

"It's curious that it happened 25 minutes and four blocks from where the others were arrested," Assistant U.S. Attorney Frank Wilson said of Tuesday's shooting that left five men dead and one wounded.

"But as far as we can tell, there is no direct connection" between the arrests—and the shootings, Wilson said.

"We have no definite link to the arrests that occurred and the murders that occurred, except that they occurred at about the same time," said Wilson's boss, U.S. Attorney John Lamp in Spokane.

## West suffered over past year

WASHINGTON (AP) — The New England states have enjoyed the fastest income growth of any region in the country during the current economic expansion while the Rocky Mountains and Southwest fared the worst, the government reported Thursday.

The Commerce Department said Americans' personal incomes rose 38 percent from the July-September quarter of 1982, considered the bottom of the last recession, to the April-June quarter of this year.

However, the overall gain masked wide discrepancies among various regions.

New England residents, benefiting from boom conditions in the region's high-technology and service industries, enjoyed a 46.5 percent increase in incomes since the recovery began, followed by a equally healthy gain of 43.9 percent in the Far West.

In all, four regions of the country, along the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, had income gains above the national average while the states in between lagged behind.

Other top-performing regions were the Southeast, with an income gain of 42.2 percent, and the Mid-Atlantic, with an increase of 39.6 percent.

The weakest income growth came in the Rocky Mountain region, where incomes rose just 27.6 percent, and the Southwest, with a gain of 28.9 percent since the 1981-82 recession ended.

Commerce Department analyst Rudolph DePass said those regions have been hurt by declining energy prices in recent years, which forced heavy layoffs in oil and gas exploration and such related industries as oilfield equipment manufacturing.

The Plains states, with an income gain of 30.8 percent, and the Great Lakes, with an increase of 33.2 percent, also lagged behind the national average, reflecting depressed conditions in farming and manufacturing.

There were some exceptions to the regional growth patterns. Arizona, in the depressed Southwest, enjoyed the fastest income gain of any state in the country, an increase of 57.6 percent that was powered by large increases in service industries, construction and manufacturing.

Arizona was followed by Georgia, with an income gain of 54.4 percent; New Hampshire, up 53.8 percent; Florida, up 53.3 percent; North Carolina, up 49.7 percent, and Virginia, up 47.8 percent.

The weakest performance was in Wyoming, where incomes have actually declined 0.5 percent since the recovery began in late 1982. It was the only state to report a fall in incomes during this period.

Other states with weak income performance during the current recovery were Alaska, with an increase of 10.9 percent; Oklahoma, up 11.2 percent; Louisiana, up 11.3 percent, and Montana, up 18.6 percent.

All five states at the bottom of the income gains had economies heavily dependent on energy industries.

The new government figures supported findings of a study entitled "The Bi-Coastal Economy." The report, prepared last year by the Joint Economic Committee of Congress, said the nation was being divided between healthy economies on both coasts and problems with agriculture, energy and smoketack industries in the heartland.

## Benson hospitalized for discomfort

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Mormon Church President Ezra Taft Benson, experiencing "physical discomfort" possibly associated with his heart, was admitted to LDS Hospital Thursday, a church spokesman said.

Spokesman Don LeFevre said the 88-year-old leader of the 6.4 million-member Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints was in stable condition.

LeFevre said Benson was admitted about 7:30 a.m. MDT after complaining of discomfort as he began his day's activities. In a late after-

noon update on Benson's condition, LeFevre said tests continued throughout the day to determine the cause of the discomfort. Whether doctors had identified the malady was not immediately known, LeFevre said.

LDS Hospital information personnel said that Benson, revered as the faith's "prophet, seer and revelator," was in the hospital's coronary intensive care unit.

Hospital authorities referred further questions to the church's offices.

At the Mormon leader's side was

Mark Benson, his son, who indicated he was optimistic about his father's chances for recovery.

"He's doing fine, he's looking good. His color's good, he's doing great," he said, but declined to provide further details.

The elder Benson, who served as U.S. agriculture secretary 1953-61 under President Eisenhower, became the 13th president of the Mormon Church on Nov. 10, 1985 following the death of his 37-year-old predecessor, Spencer W. Kimball. Mormon Church presidents serve for life.

## Audit says secretaries paid wrong

BOISE (AP) — An audit report says the attorney general's office apparently didn't get very good legal advice when it decided it could pay overtime to secretaries who didn't work more than 40 hours in a week.

One of the legislative audits presented to the Legislature's Joint Finance, Appropriations Committee here on Thursday pointed out that the agency was violating state law by paying overtime under some circumstances to secretaries.

Typically that happened when a secretary worked overtime one day, but did not work 40 hours per week because of sick leave or annual leave in the same week.

Quoting state law to the state's legal agency, the audit said "overtime work" means time worked on holidays and time worked in excess of 40 hours per week. But "hours worked" means those hours actually spent on the job, not including holidays, vacation or sick leave, the audit said.

"Therefore, if the actual hours worked in a week are less than 40, any overtime due to other time off should be credited and paid at straight time," the report said.

Attorney General Jim Jones said he has ordered the necessary changes.



## Storm topples forest stand

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — Forest rangers have discovered a 50-acre swath of trees near the Monte Cristo area east of here that were apparently flattened and uprooted sometime in recent weeks by a storm.

The discovery was made about two weeks ago by workers from the U.S. Forest Service district office in Ogden who were flying over the area near Baldy Peak about four miles south of the Monte Cristo campground.

Spruce hundreds of feet tall and up to 3 feet in diameter were uprooted or snapped in half like toothpicks. Some of the trees were more than 200 years old, said forester Jay Snider.

## Judge rules road private

BOISE (AP) — A road in Bannock County along Indian Creek is not public, the Idaho Court of Appeals says.

The court on Thursday reversed a ruling by 6th District Judge George Higgins in favor of five nearby landowners who argued that the road should be open to the public. The decision was on a 2-1 vote, with justices Donald Burnett and Roger Swanson concurring and Justice Jesse Walters dissenting without an opinion.

Twins Elmer Stanger argued the road was private, and erected a barrier to public travel.

The Court of Appeals agreed with Stanger that the road did not meet all the tests of being declared public, because it was not maintained at county expense.

**DEAR SILVERMAN:** According to Dr. Mervyn Silverman, president of the American Foundation for AIDS Research: "Even if you were an antibody-positive, your sister's behavior is not in any way inappropriate but insensitive and unnecessary."

AIDS cannot be transmitted by sharing eating utensils, hugging, holding, swimming or any other form of casual contact. Study after study has repeatedly demonstrated this fact.

This has been confirmed by the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta.

**DEAR ABBY:** We've been married for three months. Among our wedding gifts was a silver pitcher. On the card was this poem:

"Wedding gifts usually go to the bride.  
"And you expect them to walk side by side,

**NEW YORK —** In a literary effort his publisher likened to "Walden Pond," former President Jimmy Carter has agreed to turn his thoughts and his word processor to the topic of fly fishing.

# NFL walkout evaporates into courts

**NEW YORK** — The 24-day NFL strike ended Thursday when the union capitulated and went to court instead of trying to fight the club owners at the bargaining table.

Teams began reporting back en masse even without a new contract agreement, but left after being told they had missed the deadline to play and get paid for this weekend's games, and again would be replaced by non-union players and their teammates who went in earlier.

By sundown, almost all the strikers were back — where they started the day — on the street.

player representatives from all 28 teams voted to end their strike. Many of the players agreed. "The thing was falling apart," said Ricky Hunley, player rep of the Denver Broncos. "It was like being in a war and losing your bullets. There was nothing left to fight with. The bottom was falling out of the situation."

But Doug Allen, the union's assistant executive director, said: "This is not a surrender, it's a cease fire while we proceed in another direction."

The other direction was pursuing the union's aims in a federal antitrust suit filed against the league in Minneapolis, one of the courses that Marvin Miller, retired head of the baseball players union, said he suggested when he was called by union

officials earlier this week. The same court threw out the NFL compensation system 12 years ago, and although it was later returned to the system in the 1977 contract, NFLPA staff counsel Buck Briggs said, "We got good law there."

"Every effort has been made to reach a fair and equitable collective bargaining agreement," Upshaw said. "The owners have refused to deal fairly with the players and have abused their monopoly powers to the extreme detriment of the players."

The suit asks that the court throw out the college draft as well as the league's system of free agent compensation and right of first refusal for teams threatened with losing players. It also asks that it

void all player contracts signed after Sept. 16, 1987, most of which are the contracts with the replacement players.

"We tried bargaining, now we'll let the courts decide," Upshaw said. The Management Council executive committee said in a statement it would have no comment until it had read the suit.

With a new national ranking, undefeated Weber State, 2-0, travels to Bozeman to play struggling Montana State, only 1-5 for the season. Nevada-Reno is at Idaho. Both teams already have a loss, and Saturday's loser probably can forget about a Big Sky title this year.

rankings this week, topped by Nevada-Reno at No. 11, Weber was ranked 13th and Boise State was rated 19th.

"We're happy with it, but that's just a sidelight," said Weber's Mike Price. "The important thing is that we take one game at a time and don't look ahead. We have to lock in on Montana State and lock out the distractions that might be taking place," he said.

Price said Weber, 4-1 for the season, is confident and has a tremendous attitude. "Winning really helps bring that about," he said. On a running back, Fine Unga, whose 220 yards last week was the best single-game effort in the Big Sky this season, Price said, "He's running the ball really well, breaking tackles and he's everything we thought he would be."

MSU's Earle Solomonson said he's aware Weber State has a strong team, but he's more concerned about his offense.

"Offensively, we've got to put the ball into the end zone. We know that in this conference, you have to score 30 points plus to be successful. So we have to put more than 13 points on the board if we are to win," he said.

So far this season, the Bobcats are last in scoring in the Big Sky, averaging 21.7 points per game

and have been outscored by an average of 20 points per game.

The Montana-Boise game will feature two teams which have looked great at times this season but not so hot in other games.

Boise State leads the Big Sky in total offense and scoring, but Coach Skip Hall says he's concerned about his defense.

"The thing we'll try to do differently is to try to get better execution, especially on defense," said Hall. "Montana is a big and strong team. Obviously, their size concerns us and we've got to get them out of their game. If we just allow them to utilize their big people and their passing, we're going to be in trouble."

"Boise comes into Missoula with a well-rounded football team, with a very mobile quarterback, talented running backs and their defense is very solid," said Montana's Don

Read.

"They are the one team that gave our defense a lot of problems last year, and I see nothing that makes them any different this season. They do a variety of things that cause problems on offense, defense and in the kicking game," said Read.

Idaho State's Jim Koetter said his quarterbacks suffered last weekend when Portland State used the blitz frequently in a game that wound up in a wild 24-2 tie. ISU used three different quarterbacks in as many plays that resulted in a touchdown and two-point conversion that produced the tie, first for ISU in 22 years.

"We will be 100 percent better prepared to handle the blitz this week. We had a lot of individual breakdowns, some people tried to leave their assignments and help someone else with theirs, and we

had chaos," said Koetter.

"We didn't handle the blitz well from the quarterback position. We could have made some five-yard passes go for touchdowns," Koetter said.

# Giants leave St. Louis with thoughts of their near miss

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The San Francisco Giants, 0-for-St. Louis in their final road trip of the year, Thursday left a town and a team that treated them rudely, and will soon find out how much they are wanted back home.



St. Louis Cardinals fans booed the Giants and taunted them in the National League playoffs. That was expected. They threw a cow bell and coins at MVP Jeffrey Leonard and dumped beer on his head when he was chased a foul ball. Even that was sort of expected.

But none of the Giants could quite believe that the Cardinals' pitchers, John Tudor in Game 6, and Danny Cox in Game 7, shut them out and sent them whimpering home in defeat after coming here with a 3-2 lead.

The Giants' players were shocked by the manner of their loss.

"We battled hard all season, and then for it to end like this, it's tough to take," said Chili Davis, who popped up for the final out of the season. "I really do think we're the better team, but the Cardinals are and they're the champions. Give them credit."

has nothing to hide from."

Davis said the Giants accomplished more than anyone expected this year, running away with the NL West and taking the Cardinals to seven games.

It was a year when the Giants started in first, overcame a spate of injuries to key players such as Leonard, and didn't succumb to another June swoon or fall fadeout.

"I guarantee this team is going to go a long way in the future," Davis said, "so one year is not going to keep this team down. We'll bounce back."

Davis, 0-for-4 in the final game and 3-for-19 in the playoffs, couldn't believe how easily Cox and Tudor handled the Giants.

"I just didn't think it was possible to shut us out one game, much less two," he said.

Alice Hamaker, who gave up four runs on five hits in two innings, including a three-run homer to light-hitting Jose Oquendo, said the Giants just took the first big step toward the World Series.

"We'll be better next year. I'll be better next year," said the lefthander who came back strong this year after five operations in four

years. "And we'll have good recollections about this season."

The proposition asks voters to authorize the land and construction "at no cost to the city." If the measure fails, Giants owner Bob Lurie says, the team will go elsewhere.

Lurie, who has lost an estimated \$20 million since he acquired the team in 1976 to prevent a move to Toronto, has said the Giants definitely won't renew their lease at wind-blown-Candlestick Park beyond its expiration in 1994. If the Giants lose Proposition W, though, Lurie may seek to get out of the lease much sooner, claiming the city violated certain terms of the agreement.

Pitcher Mike Krukow, a Giant since 1983 who suffered with Davis and several other Humm Babies through the torment of a 100-loss season two years ago, said the playoffs left him emotionally drained.

"It was the most fun I've ever had and the biggest disappointment I've ever had," said Krukow, who won the only game he pitched in the first playoff of his 11-year career.

"It's just an emotional thing right now," he said. "But we'll walk out of here with our heads up. And as long as we've got 'Giants' on our shirts we're going to be proud. This bunch

# Curry still tries to find comfortable niche with 'Bama fans

Bill Curry knew he might have a tough time in November when Alabama meets the LSU Tigers and the Auburn Tigers.

And although Curry, like all coaches, plays them one at a time, he probably didn't expect to be ambushed by the Memphis State Tigers.

As Curry began his first season as Alabama coach, the cognoscenti figured there were six games on the schedule which he would be hard-pressed to win — Penn State, Florida, Tennessee, LSU, Notre Dame and Auburn. The others were guaranteed victories, which only goes to show that not all guarantees are guaranteed.

Perhaps Alabamians are still savoring last month's 24-13 victory over defending national champion Penn State because the loss to unheralded Memphis State hardly

caused any waves in Crimson Tidedom.

The hiring of Curry last winter triggered all sorts of adverse reactions, including some death threats against Alama's president, Dr. Josh Thomas, who tried to appease "Bear's Boys" by writing a letter to all former players explaining why he went outside the Alabama "family" for a coach and asking for their continued support.

"There hasn't been one negative call from the alumni," a bigwig in the alumni office said the other day.

"When we play Tennessee (Saturday's opponent), we don't turn on our own."

As Curry prepares to do battle with Tennessee, he might be interested to know that there was some opposition to the hiring of one Paul Bryant in 1958 — he hadn't become a legend yet — and the Bear's first Bama team produced a mediocre 5-4-1 record.

"It's quite close," Jeff Coleman re-

calls of the athletic board vote to approve the hiring of Bryant, an Alabama alumna, away from Texas A&M. "It passed by maybe one vote."

"I voted for him because I felt the time was right for a change (J.B. 'Ears' Whitworth, Bryant's predecessor, was 4-24-2 in his three seasons).

"I'm the best fighter in the world," said the 21-year-old Tyson, who has scored 27 knockouts in posting a 31-0 record in a 35 months as a pro.

"He's made for me," said Biggs, who has a 16-0 record, with 10 knockouts.

Biggs sparred two rounds with Tyson when he was preparing for the Olympics. Tyson was beaten out by Henry Tillman for the heavyweight berth (201-pound limit) on the U.S. team.

The 26-year-old Biggs, at 6-foot-4 1/2, holds advantages of 5 1/2 inches in height and 9 inches in reach over Tyson. But the champion always gives away height and reach.

Biggs will have box Tyson, keeping him off balance with a powerful left jab and good lateral

movement. Whether he has the poise and stamina to do this when he is hurt or tired is a key to the fight. If the quick, power-punching Tyson gets Biggs into the pit and makes it a slug-fest match, the challenger should be in deep trouble.

Biggs officially weighed in Thursday at 228 1/2. Tyson weighed 216, which is his lightest weight as a champion, but not in his career.

The scheduled 15-round bout, promoted by Don King and Trump Plaza, will be held at Convention Hall. It will be televised by HBO at about 10:20 p.m. EDT.

In another fight on the card, Matthew Hilton of Montreal will make his first defense of the International Boxing Federation junior middleweight title against Jack Callahan of Hammond, Ind.

The 21-year-old Hilton, who has a 27-0 record, with 21 knockouts, won the 154-pound class title with a 15-round unanimous decision over Buster Drayton last June 27 at Montreal.

The 32-year-old Callahan, who didn't turn pro until he was 29, has a 24-0 record, with 12 knockouts.

Tyson, who grew up in Brooklyn, N.Y., was sent the Tryon School for Boys in upstate

New York, at age 13. There he came into contact with Cus D'Amato, the late boxing trainer-manager, who became his legal guardian.

Tyson turned pro March 6, 1985, and won 27 fights, 25 by knockout, in 30 months.

He won the World Boxing Council title in a second-round knockout of Trevor Berbick Nov. 22, 1986, and he won the World Boxing Association title with a 12-round unanimous decision over James "Bonerusher" Smith March 7, 1987.

After a sixth-round knockout of Pinklon Thomas May 30, Tyson won the IBF title with a 12-round unanimous decision over Tony Tucker Aug. 1.

Biggs said he used boxing recreationally as a youngster, but he got off it and went on to become a world amateur and Olympic champion.

Biggs said he started using cocaine again after the Olympics and that it was costing him as much as \$2,500 a week. He sought help and entered a drug rehabilitation center at Orange, Calif., Dec. 30, where he spent three weeks.

He had had one pro fight at the time.

White House tries to quell nervousness

## Interest rates continue to edge higher

NEW YORK (AP) — Interest rates edged higher Thursday as the White House tried to quell nervousness in the financial markets that might choke off the nation's economic growth.

The lenders who have sent interest rates soaring lately appeared unconvinced after Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III said inflation fears were "overblown" and predicted interest rates would fall.

High interest rates hurt the economy by raising the cost of all kinds of consumer and business borrowing. If the recent surge in rates continues — something many economists doubt — it could push the economy into recession.

"All of this uncertainty is absolutely awful for business planning," said Michael Niemira, an economist for PaineWebber Inc. in New York.

Chemical Bank of New York raised its prime lending rate half a percent to 9 1/2 percent. None of the other big New York banks followed suit immediately.

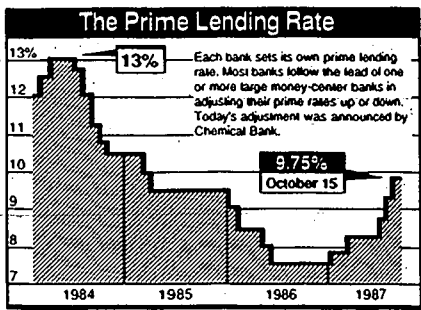
Another key interest rate edged higher after breaking into double digits on Wednesday for the first time in two years.

The yield on the 30-year Treasury bond climbed to 10.18 percent by 1:30 p.m. MDT from 10.16 percent late Wednesday.

Treasury-bond-yields are determined by the price that lenders bid for bonds — are willing to pay for the fixed-income investments. Low prices mean high yields.

The upset in the financial markets began Wednesday after the Commerce Department reported a higher-than-expected trade deficit in August. That raised fears about the sturdiness of the dollar and kicked off sharp declines on stocks and bonds.

Nervous investors fear that a sharp decline in the dollar in re-

Many economists fear that if interest rates stay at their new highs or go higher, they could slow down the economy's current healthier-than-average growth and possibly even trigger a recession next year.

Trading construction and sales of home furnishings and household goods have already begun slowing down. But other measures such as business investment remain robust.

"Rates would have to stay at these levels six or nine months before you would see a serious economic impact," said David Boston, president of Boston Research Associates in New York.

He estimated chances of a recession were "still well below 50 percent."

While many traders say interest rates are unnaturally high, few seem to be willing to put their money where their mouths are by buying bonds at their current low prices.

"People have been burned so

badly... when the uncertainties are very high it will be difficult for people to sum up on the courage they need," said Marshall Front, an economist at the Chicago investment and mutual-fund management firm of Stein Roe & Farnham.

American policy-makers are held hostage by their agreement to support the dollar at current levels. To do so, they have to keep interest rates here higher than overseas rates.

Some economists believe the United States should let the dollar find its natural level, even if that means a brief, sharp decline.

"If the (Federal Reserve) mistakenly tries to prevent the dollar from falling, it could cause a recession in mid-'88 or the end of '88," said Mickey Levy, chief economist of Fidelity Bank in Philadelphia.

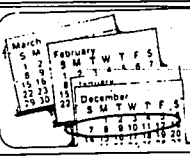

West's heart eight was ducked in dummy and East's queen won. Back came a low heart to drive out dummy's ace, and East could sit back, secure with the knowledge that he had established another heart winner. This was a costly exercise for East. South now had time to concede two club losers and the defense won only four tricks.

It would be a different matter if East had encouraged with his heart nine at trick one. South would still have enjoyed two heart stoppers, but that would not have been enough. West would win the first club lead to continue with another heart, establishing East's suit while East still held the club ace. This heart would translate into one down for South.

Had East held two sure entries outside the heart suit, winning the first trick would have worked out. With only one outside entry, it was imperative that West be left with a second heart to clear the suit.

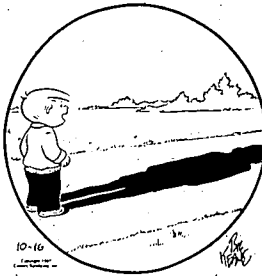

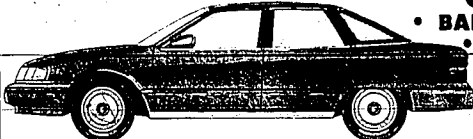

## Norman lifts arts in Idaho

Morrison Center fund-raiser  
also raises art consciousness

BOISE — When Fred Norman was 8 years old, his father counseled him, "We're only here for a short time. While we're here, we're on loan so we'd better do something right."

As chief fund-raiser and presently the executive director of the Morrison Center for the Performing Arts in Boise, the grown man has parlayed that advice into a \$25 million performing arts facility in the state of Idaho.

Why did he bother? Idaho has and continues to spend less for developing and sustaining the performing arts than any state in the union. Twin Falls, in fact, went without a proscenium theater from the time in 1866 when that portion of the old junior high school was locked up, until the completion of the College of Southern Idaho facility.

"You move to an area and find that you like it," says Norman, who moved to Idaho to teach at Boise State University. "When I lived in California and Arizona I was a director/actor with the idea of being a professional artist. Now my professionalism is in working with my community."

Professing a love for Idaho, Norman says, "We're a small state going through a difficult time economically and when that happens, the arts seem to be low on the totem pole. But, if you believe that the arts truly are the cathedral of the spirit, you stay with it and in time people will understand what the arts are about."

Norman spent 15 years building support for the Morrison Center. His motivation, he explains, has been to help provide young students an opportunity, at least once in their lifetime, to say they want to be an artist because they have seen great artists.

"I was a fanatic baseball fan even though in Pittsburgh, where I grew up, the Pirates, at that time, were horrible. I can remember sitting and watching baseball games and finding heroes. In my case they were in baseball and football but I think in the arts we also have the opportunity to find heroes."

"We tend to make art a trill subject. However, in the last analysis, art is as important as anything we do. It's the one thing that puts meaning in our lives and life in our meaning. Other than a religious conviction, art is the primary elevator of the human spirit."

Norman believes that regional art and theater is becoming the

showcase for arts in America and he thinks it's important to promote the arts indigenous to his home state.

"Idaho is a state with frontier spirit and I see the potential here," he says. "I see a state that is perhaps more progressive because of the honesty of its citizens. There is a naiveness that is refreshing. Certainly when you come to a small state you're not going to have as much monetarily and perhaps a conservative state is going to offer less for the arts. But I saw something that was good for my growing children and decided to stay and become Fred Norman the motivator; the believer."

Indeed, Norman has become known for his ability to deliver an inspirational speech and was invited to speak at this year's "Success Breakfast" sponsored by the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce.

"In Twin Falls, there is an interest in unifying art groups and the possibility of funding a downtown civic center. Considering the state's spending record for the arts and the fact that Magic Valley has several separate groups that seem to compete, is it a realistic possibility that unity can prevail?"

According to Norman, the answer is yes. He stresses, however, that there are requirements for successfully accomplishing such an ideal, the first being a highly motivated leader with unselfish motives.

"Personal gain, whether to an individual's ego or bank account, is out of the question if Twin Falls is to succeed in this area. The individual is to serve rather than be served."

Second on his list is to organize the leadership of the different

## The Bard on trial in D.C.

Shakespeare  
mystery survives

WASHINGTON — "Poetry-starved" might not be the first adjective that comes to mind to describe Washingtonians. But how else to account for the long, excited lines of people stretching across the doorstep and down the front path of a church the other day, at 8:45 in the morning, an hour and a quarter before a debate on Shakespeare was to begin?

True, it wasn't your average debate on Shakespeare. Three Supreme Court justices — William Brennan, Harry Blackmun and John Paul Stevens — had agreed to hear oral arguments on what is known to aficionados simply as "The Authorship Question," whether a man named William Shakespeare from Stratford-on-Avon actually wrote the plays and poems that have brought him immortal glory.

You might think such a purely literary matter impinged on the consciousness of a political town only because of the presence of three of Washington's own leading actors.

But the actual situation is more complicated. The Authorship Question is, if possible, considered even more of a fringe matter in the literary world than in the political. Professional Shakespearians, as you might call them, are pretty much unanimous in agreeing that, of course, Will Shakespeare wrote his works, and only elitist naive about the Elizabethan era would think any differently. (The backbone of the anti-Shakespeare argument is that only a nobleman could have (a) been well enough educated to write such wide-ranging plays and (b) expressed the kind of "conservative," "royalist" views that can be read into them.) The antics, most of them flutters and lawyers, retort that this unanimity just shows that a pro-Shakespeare cartel is protecting the premise on which rests a gigantic pyramid of paper scholarship of the hidden-meaning-in-Shakespeare's-laundry-bills type.

The Washington event, then, appealed equally to two usually separate worlds united in their skepticism; and in fact each other, stretching the possibilities of the fashionable academic word "interdisciplinary," passed some gifts across the barrier. The mastermind was local philanthropist

"This is a program where you pay the artists to come in and do four

contact hours a day with the students," says Fuller, who is helping coordinate the project. "We're having them do a workshop performance-type thing in most of the schools, except in the elementary schools where we're having them do assemblies. They'll be in Magic Valley elementary, junior high and high schools throughout the whole week."

Fuller says that two elementary schools in Twin Falls, Lincoln and Sawtooth, already have residency programs which are being funded by the Idaho Arts Council.

"They actually have an artist that comes and stays in the schools for two or three weeks," she says. "But the other schools in the area don't have any funding for bringing someone in. So we like to bring these artists in for as long as we can to give as much exposure as possible to the kids."

Fuller says this is the third time that actors from the Ashland Shakespeare Theater have been part of the Renaissance Academy's residency program. Last year they visited three schools. This year they're expected to perform in 15.

"Their program is one of excellence. They know their material and know how to gear it to any age group. They can teach teachers,

and entertain senior citizens or preschoolers. We feel they give the youth in the community a very excellent education, not only in Shakespeare, but also in more contemporary drama form. So we bring them back because we know we'll get our money's worth," says Fuller.

Cil Stengel, who has just finished her first season with the Oregon Shakespearean Festival, received her acting training at the Univer-

sity of Nebraska. She has worked professionally with the Nebraska Repertory Theater.

"I feel that acting is a challenge to get in touch with ourselves and express it there with others in an art form which is very immediate, exciting and alive," she says.

Jim Finnegan, a native of Chicago, did his undergraduate work at the University of Illinois.

# Woods, Dennehy: Bard

**HOLLYWOOD** — Some actor combinations bode well no matter what the material, and putting James Woods and Brian Dennehy together in "Best Seller" — as a corporate contract killer about to spill his guts and the policeman-writer about to catch them — practically guarantees an interesting movie.

Woods and Dennehy are excellent actors and a fascinating match; Dennehy's burly, smiling, casualness and rock-solid naturalism is a perfect complement to Woods' restless, mercenary, stripped-neat intensity.

In the movie, Woods plays Cleve, an amoral hit man and would-be ubermercenary, with one Achilles' heel: a need to be loved and admired. Dennehy's Dennis Meechum is Cleve's opposite number: a top-turned-writer in the Joseph Wambaugh mold, a fictional version of the writer who gave Woods three of his best roles ("The Choirboys," "The Onion Field" and "The Black Marble").

Furiously resentful at his dismissal by corporate king David Madlock (Paul Shenar), Cleve decides to sign open Madlock's dirtiest secrets. Meechum, fallen on hard times, desperate for another hit book, is both enticed and repulsed by the offer: the inside scoop on the murder-for-hire bloodshed that built Madlock's empire. And he is enticed and repulsed by Cleve himself — by his cocky, less-than-earnest, his posturing self-assurance, his glibly philosophical amorality and quasi-existential gun-crazy hipsterism. Cleve has the manners of a young executive who has learned to control all his vices. But he lives in shadows; Meechum is the integral man caught in the trap of celebrity.

Cleve, who keeps insisting cop and killer are two sides of the same coin, represents a dangerous temptation for Meechum — despite his apparent call to a holy crusade against corruption. He has also a deep need for

Meechum's respect. It is a slightly crazed story, full of shortcuts calculated coincidences and mad leaps in logic. The portrayal of a writer's travails in the world of publishing is not remotely convincing — though George Coe, conversely, gets in a good, nasty send-up of a crooked lawyer: all cold eyes, suave jabs and unflappable threat.

Because this movie is another of scriptwriter Larry Cohen's coolly mad morality plays, it sometimes seems to need Cohen's off-center directorial style to bring it off. Instead, director John Flynn, shooting almost exclusively on location with the "in" — fine — naturalistic cinematographer, Fred Murphy, gets something nearer the look of a pseudo-documentary cop thriller.

"Best Seller" has story incongruities that jump out like acetylene torch sparks, but its sense of morality is sharp and its undercurrent daring. Though the story seems insane, the actors ground it in psychological reality: Woods with sullen pouts, cold seductions and bursts of terrifyingly automatic violence; Dennehy with his watchful, steady-backed dependability.

They are top and psychopath, libido and conscience, wild child and paterfamilias, yoked together in head-butting tandem. These two actors make the interactions crackle, and they help turn "Best Seller" (MPAA rated: R for sex, language and violence) into the kind of thriller that used to be commonplace: a craftsmanlike, second-level job by solid pros who stretch the boundaries without transcending them, delivering the goods with warm dispatch, icy skill and lots of extra spin on the ball.

David Lloyd Kreeger, who is prominently affiliated with local arts institutions (the Corcoran, Arena Stage) and with American University, which served as host. Kreeger wedded these affiliations, his own fervent interest in the anti-Stratfordian position and, not least, his friendship from law school days with Justice Brennan to set up the debate and make it a media event. That legitimacy was one gift from official Washington to a literary fringe group. Others went in the reverse direction. Neither of the advocates arguing the case — James Boyle for Shakespeare, Richard Jazsi for an Elizabethan noble named Edward de Vere — is a literary; both are AU law professors. Asked by their dean in July to take part, they had picked sides quite casually and put in a few months of research without expecting either the public's interest or their own to reach so high a pitch. (As 10 a.m. neared, both of them were still slightly hysterical with excitement over their appearance several hours earlier on "Good Morning America.")

The anti-Stratfordians believe — and have published armloads of books and magazines arguing — that the man from Stratford was nothing but an illiterate huck or a theatrical investor who lent his name (some say for a bribe) to front for a lord. Why would a lord want to hide his authorship of the plays? Because writing commercial plays would have been seen as embarrassing for a nobleman. How do we know our man, then? Through various coded references, conspiracy theories and biographical parallels to the plays in the lives of various candidates, most strikingly de Vere, 17th earl of Oxford — a descendant of whom was on hand for the occasion, surrounded by dedicated anti-Stratfordians from several continents.

The passion of the anti-Stratfordians, their recurrence in every era and their often bizarre lines of argument make them easiest to confront as some sort of psycho-cultural phenomenon. Boyle, counsel for the man from Stratford, went a short way down this path in his concluding argument, pointing out that the Oxfordian argument — with its emphasis on parallels between the 17th earl's life and episodes in the plays — answers a need in many readers to "fix" the exact meanings of plays whose richness and depth actually

allow for innumerable levels and variations of interpretation.

When Boyle suggested shyly (he is a Scotsman) that this longing for "limited meanings" of texts may not be entirely unrelated to the hunger to establish the "original intent" of the framers of other major documents, all three justices condescended to grin at him.

They were kind, in general, and in obvious high good humor — as were the tiered ranks of their law clerks sitting off to one side of the stage, and the two advocates, and the dozens of journalists in the pews — all gleeful at the opportunity to spend time on this and call it work. The anti-Stratfordians had argued vociferously at first for the argumentative principle of "Occam's razor": the argument preferred should be the one that accounts for the greatest number of facts while requiring the least number of additional assumptions. By the conclusion of the oral arguments, sensing the approach of public humiliation, they were backing water, arguing that their case was "far too complicated" to be made in a forum like this one. (The movement's main book, Charlton Ogburn's "The Mysterious Shakespeare," runs 850 pages.)

But when the verdict came, it was gentle. Only Justice Brennan slapped them down, issuing a categorical opinion that the Stratfordian case was watertight. Justice Blackmun declined to give a definite ruling (the three read their opinions and comments separately, in the English way), begging off on lack of expertise, saying his mind was "tossing on the ocean" ("The Merchant of Venice") and that "I wish I were back studying English literature." Justice Stevens had evinced severity at moments in the cross-examination ("That is pure speculation," he rebuked Jazsi at one point), but he ruled that though the anti-Stratfordians had not met the burden of proof, "I don't think

the contrary view is wholly frivolous." He also offered what seemed sympathetic advice — as from a connoisseur of argumentation — on how best to do the Vere part — on how best to pursue their case. Reticians might pursue their case, retreating swiftly to modern techniques of spin control, the anti-Stratfordians declared victory into all the available TV cameras.

Though their gain was undeniable, which should have dismayed any serious Stratfordian, even the most orthodox seemed to radiate cheerfulness.

# Performing arts respond to AIDS

NEW YORK — James Bond doesn't bed his usual bevy of beauties in his latest adventures, contenting himself with one luscious lady. It isn't love that prompts this jolt of monogamy, but safe sex.

Tom Hanks has second thoughts about frolicking with a blond in the movie "Dragnet," once he discovers his box of condoms is empty.

AIDS is touching Hollywood, as it has every other arena of the arts and entertainment world. Filmmakers and other artists are becoming more responsible regarding onscreen sex and are trying to weave awareness of the illness into creative projects.

But while the deadly disease has served as an artistic theme in plays, songs and movies, it also stolen some of the creative world's brightest talents.

This year alone witnessed the AIDS-related deaths of director and choreographer Michael Bennett, theater innovator Charles Ludlam, the flamboyant showman Liberace, and Charles Ward, a principal dancer with the American Ballet Theatre.

"Almost every day we open a newspaper or hear on radio that someone else has died, and unfortunately so many of them are the greatest figures in the arts," said the actress Joanne Woodward in an interview.

"It's really a question of the best and the brightest, not that it's really important as when anyone dies. There are some young people just starting out in their careers who are diagnosed with AIDS and who could become the best and the brightest. But we'll never know."

Bennett was the Broadway gypsy who delighted the world

with the blazing dancing in "A Chorus Line." He was 44 when he died June 30, the same age as Ludlam, founder of the Ridiculous Theater Company, who died May 28.

"The worst part of the tragedy is their youth. They were in full flower and were just getting there."

John Glines, producer of "Torch Song Trilogy" and "As Is," a play

about AIDS, said in an interview. "George Abbott is 100. So Michael Bennett and Charles Ludlam had many highly creative years left. Thank God that we in the theater tend to live an insecure life and are better at improvising."

When William Hoffman wrote "As Is," nominated for a 1985 Tony award, he was responding to the

painful memory of a friend who had recently died from AIDS. The play examines the relationship between Richard, a homosexual novelist suffering from the disease, and Saul, his ex-lover.

"By concentrating on the arts, it implies that AIDS is only in the arts and not in any other profession," Hoffman said in an interview.

groups and he stressed that the community, the more essential that they all be unified.

"A leader has to bring these groups together into a common cause, one that is best for Twin Falls and the Magic Valley. Develop a wish list: Out of the ego-centers of each group, you determine what is the best for the whole; what will make a healthy community of the arts."

But, Norman stresses, that is easier to say than to do. Even in the best of circumstances, he says that motley people have to be convinced to support it, artistic people have to be rallied to enrich it with their abilities and talents, and there has to be installed with the realization that the arts are needed for the growth of citizens as well as their society.

"It takes," he adds, "that one group or person that truly says, 'I am the vanguard and I'm here to serve.'" He related a loss of \$4 million by one out-of-state group that couldn't resolve interorganizational differences. The donor simply pulled his support because he wasn't convinced of a singularity of purpose.

Assuming that leadership is in place and purpose is defined, Norman says the next thrust should be toward education and that the schools are the place to start.

"Take the artists into the schools so that art touches the children. They will carry it into their homes," he says.

Even with the Morrison Center, it was never the building and the mortar and the bricks. It was the

fact that the arts have soul and spirit. The place you perform is secondary to the performance. Inspire the community and then work on a location for the showcase."

Fund raising can be incredibly difficult. In Norman's case, there were times when he thought of how easy it would be just to quit. It was even life-threatening.

"I was on a radio show and a gentleman called to tell me that my efforts were eventually going to cost him money he couldn't afford and that if I didn't get off the subject of the Morrison Center he would blow out my brains. I was shocked that he would want to do that just because I support the arts."

On the other side of that coin, he related the story of one senior citizen who sent him \$9 in pennies but

Norman had to pay \$13 in additional postage to get the heavy envelope from the post office. He was quick to add that he gladly did it because he considered the donor's spirit to be significant.

"If one strong person in Twin Falls starts to raise the collective consciousness of the arts, a center can happen," he says. "But none of us can accuse, attack, or condemn those who are non-believers. If we do, it becomes defeatist. We begin to blame others for what is not happening."

"Win people by serving and showing people that if they reach within themselves they will find that the arts does something to enhance their sense of values."

"Be willing to take every defeat because eventually there will be a victory. In truth, we all share in victory. We do it together. Instead of win/lose situations, make them win/win. As simple as that is, it's the most difficult concept I find to get across to people."

# Original "Eight is Enough" brood gather for special family reunion

Dick Van Patten knows exactly when the idea for "Eight Is Enough: A Family Reunion" (airing Sunday, Oct. 18 on NBC) was born.

"Last Year, I ran into the director of 'Eight Is Enough' in front of the Stage Deli in New York City," remembers Van Patten, who played patriarch Tom Bradford during the series' four-year run. "While we were standing there, people on the street started coming up to us and telling us how much they like the show. We couldn't believe how popular it still was. It occurred to us that we should do a reunion."

The trials and tribulations of a newspaper columnist, his wife and their eight children was the original premise of the series. When actress Diana Hyland, who played Mrs. Bradford died from cancer after completing only four episodes, Betty Buckley was brought in as Abby, a teacher and eventual love interest for Van Patten. But when the original members of the series were gathered for the reunion, they found that Buckley had a commitment for another movie.

"She wanted to do (our) movie," claims Van Patten. "But we wanted to go ahead immediately because we were afraid there was going to be a director's strike."

Mary Frann, who plays Joanna Loudon on CBS's "Nowhart," was brought in to re-create the role of Abby Bradford. "There were a lot of names batted around, but everyone agreed on Mary," says Van Patten.

The process of rounding up the original cast members took more than a year. With the exception of Buckley, who starred in several Broadway productions, including "Cats," and Willie Aames, who appears in the syndicated show "Charles in Charge," the cast members have not been highly visible since the show went off the air in 1981.

But Van Patten, who appeared in the recent Mel Brooks movie "Spaceballs," says that 10 minutes after the cast started filming, it was like they had never stopped working together. The reunion movie cen-

ters around two subplots: A scandal sheet wants to purchase the newspaper where Tom Bradford works; and Tom is celebrating his 50th birthday, a device that gives all the children an excuse to gather together. Critics have politely pointed out that Tom Bradford celebrated his 50th birthday during the original run of the series, but that fact doesn't seem to worry Van Patten.

People will tune in because

they're curious," he says. "Tom is pretty much the same, but the other characters have changed. In fact, except for Nicholas (Adam Rich), everyone looks younger."




Does this movie perhaps signal a return to a series?

## Women with AIDS portrayed on Lifetime

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Women are a minority among AIDS sufferers, but the Lifetime Cablevision Network special about them, "Dying for Love," is a story of human emotions that know no limitations of sex and age.

Eight-year-old Chris' mother has AIDS. "Ma," he says, sitting on the side of her bed. "I wish I was in your stomach again."

"Why?" she asks.  
"So I could knock all those virus out of your stomach. Bang! Bang!" Chris says, punching the air with his little fists.

The one-hour special premieres Thursday on Lifetime, available on many cable systems. There are additional playdates through mid-November.

"Dying for Love" is further evidence that in the midst of the tragedy of AIDS, the disease is at least inspiring filmmakers to find new ways of portraying the human capacity for love, depth and understanding.

The executive producer of "Dying for Love" is Dave Bell, whose credits include the acclaimed CBS movie about Alzheimer's disease, "Do You Remember Love?" Shari Cookson produced and directed the documentary. Melissa Jo Feltier co-

produced and wrote it.

The documentary is composed of four vignettes about three women with AIDS and another exposed to the disease. It doesn't dwell on the social injustices against the women. These are simply mentioned alongside the tales of courage and compassion. The subtlety makes for an especially pointed statement.

Laurie is a bright, pretty, spunky woman who lives in a small western Pennsylvania town. Family members moved back from their new home in Maryland to help after her husband, a hemophiliac, contracted AIDS in a blood transfusion.

Laurie has been diagnosed with ARC, or AIDS-related complex, an illness that sometimes progresses to full-blown AIDS. At the time of the filming, she showed no symptoms.

The most plaintive moments in the documentary are when children talk about the disease. Nicole, Laurie's 6-year-old daughter by a previous marriage, explains matter-of-factly what happened to her stepfather: "How my daddy got the AIDS virus, he needed some blood and they didn't know it was the AIDS virus blood, and they gave it to him."

Laurie lost both Patrick and their

infant son, Dwight, to the disease. Her family was shunned by the community. Her mother recalls moving back just in time for Halloween trick-or-treaters: "I had all the lights on and I was standing by the front door, and I had tons of candy. And no one stopped. Not one person. They just walked on by."

Terah, a poor, young, black mother of three who lives in Maryland, had no family to turn to. She found a home with Carlene through Project Home, an AIDS outreach organization. Terah has AIDS, and her 2½-year-old son has ARC.

Elizabeth Ramos, the Boston woman whose son wants to punch out the virus, contracted AIDS from a boyfriend who was an intravenous drug abuser. Though she suffers from bouts of pneumonia that AIDS has allowed into her system, she speaks to civic groups and counsels teen-agers on abstinence and use of condoms.

The vignettes are introduced by a woman using the pseudonym Karen, who is photographed in shadow, wearing heavy makeup. Karen has AIDS. Though she wants people to understand her plight, she's too afraid of the stigma of AIDS to reveal her identity.

—"The Presidential Bowl." Special event. A computerized simulation of the Super Bowl with White House biggies calling the plays. Talk about action. Gerald Ford scores three touchdowns for the opposing team, all without a helmet; Richard Nixon sets a record for personal fouls, and Ronald Reagan goes for the bomb again and again.

—"That's Incredible II." Sports documentary. Think you've seen it all? Imagine this: A quarterback who wants to play football just because he likes the game! Retired sports figures who do not own restaurants, are not sportscasters and do not do commercials! Incredible!!!

—"Pray for Rain." Adventure. Oral Roberts gets the word from the Big Guy that if he does not see some good-faith bargaining pretty soon,

there is going to be heck to pay. Oral, unable to budge immutable football forces, summons up Noah's Ark instead.

—"The PFL Club." Religion. You gotta believe in the power of money. Now that they are free agents, Jim and Tammy have a new calling. They are singing the praises of professional football league players. "I've seen these poor souls shopping in K marts just like me," says Tammy. "You wouldn't believe how fast you can spend \$500,000."

—"NFL Yesterday." Special event. Experience the thrill of football games you missed the first time around. Imagine a season's worth of Super Bowls. No more annoying delays to see who's on top and who's not. Every week's a new season, and every winning team is a champion.

—"Jack Donlan and Gene Upshaw at the Movies." Commentary. Let's just say they have agreed to disagree. Jack Donlan wants to know what happened to movies like "Knute-Rockne, All-American." Thumbs down, replies Upshaw. His favorite is "North Dallas Forty." And that's the way it is.

—"Bananas." Comedy. It is comic substitution time as the NFL owners raid the nation's zoos and field a team full of lower primates. And surprise, nobody notices. Even better, the uniforms fit.

—"The All-New Let's Make a Deal." Game show. TV combines the thrill of one of its most popular game shows with the inanity of the average bargaining session (Or is it the other way around?). It is a never-ending game with players and team owners both joining in on the fun. Will the players take what's behind door No. 1 and play ball, or will they hold out for the season, take the money and run?

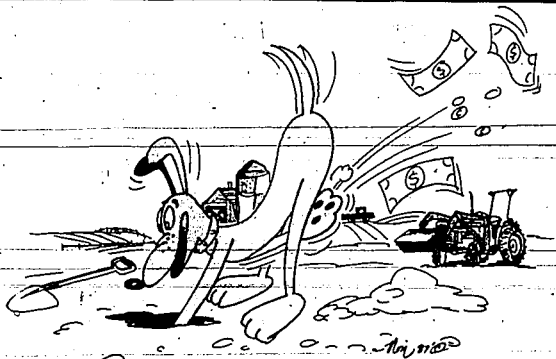

# Despite baseball pre-emptions NBC ekes out 37th win in a row

NEW YORK (AP) — There is little drama in the network race these days, what with NBC bluejeaning CBS and ABC in the ratings on a weekly basis, but NBC professed nervousness about last week's results.

Not to worry, however. Despite baseball-playoffs pre-empting its blockbuster comedies, NBC eked out its 37th win in a row. Three more weeks in the top spot, and NBC will break CBS' all-time rating streak of 39 weeks in a row in the 1963-1964 season.

That will happen, though, only if NBC successfully fords a week of World Series games on ABC.

According to the A.C. Nielsen Co., for the week ending Oct. 11, NBC had an average prime-time rating of 16.1 and a 27 share. CBS had a 15.1 and a 25 share, and ABC 13.4 and a 22 share.

"I'm pleased, because going into

the weekend, I had us winning by half a rating point, and I wasn't too sure about that half a rating point," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC vice president for research projects, when the ratings came out Tuesday.

The networks' season-to-date averages are: NBC, 16.6 rating and 28 share; CBS, 14.3 rating and 24 share; and ABC, 13.5 rating and 23 share.

The rating is a percentage of the nation's 88.6 million households with televisions. The share is a percentage of the audience that is viewing during a particular time period.

CBS was in a better position to take advantage of the baseball pre-emptions with more shows that appeal to women and older viewers. "Murder, She Wrote" was the No. 2-rated show. "Dallas" was also in the top 10.

"The Cosby Show" was not pre-empted and was the No. 1 show for

the third week of the 3-week-odd season. The other NBC Thursday-night comedies that are normally in the top 10 were pre-empted.

The rest of the top 10 were: ABC's "Growing Pains," "Who's the Boss?" and "Moonlighting," CBS' "Dallas" and "Newhart," CBS' Sunday movie, "After the Promise," the Thursday night American League championship game between the Minnesota Twins and Detroit Tigers on NBC, and ABC's "Head of the Class."

ABC's "The Charmings" rose to a 21 share on Thursday night without competition from "A Different World" on NBC. But on Wednesday, ABC's male-appeal shows "Hooperman" and "The Slap" Maxwell Story" were down slightly from the previous week, and "Max Headroom" couldn't rise above its 12 share of last week, even minus NBC's "Miami-Vice."

CBS' "The Law and Harry McGraw," however, did improve without competition from NBC's pre-empted "Crime Story." On Thursday, CBS' "Wiseguy" improved three share points over its lead-in, "Tour of Duty," meaning viewers are switching channels to watch "Wiseguy."

ABC's big gamble Sunday variety show "Dolly!" continued to drop, but drew a respectable 26 audience share.

The lowest-rated shows were: "Ohara," Friday-night pre-game show, "My Sister Sam," "Everything's Relative," Saturday-night pre-game show, "Sledge Hammer!" "Leg Work," "Carol, Carl, Whoopi and Robin" (rerun of a special).

## New comedians on HBO

NEW YORK (AP) — HBO's "Eleventh Annual Young Comedians Show," the cable showcase that helped the early careers of such comics as Robin Williams, Jay Leno, Steven Wright and Howie Mandel, this month offers four new comedians.

They aren't exactly complete unknowns. Two have been on either "The Tonight Show" or "Late Night with David Letterman" on NBC.

The host is John Larroquette of NBC's "Night Court," who takes the opportunity to plug himself and his Emmys. The show premieres Saturday, with additional play dates through October.

Among the four comedians, only Geoff Bolt has no television credits, and his act is the most intriguing.

But the standout as far as mainstream comedy is concerned is Margaret Smith, familiar to viewers of "Late Night." Smith is a small, pretty woman who delivers great lines with a Steven Wright deadpan — "I wore a neck brace for about a year. I wasn't in an accident or anything. I was just tired of holding my head up."

Smith's delivery adds to her comedy, but her jokes are funny on

their own.

Bolt's humor is in his nervous, preoccupied delivery of what start out as normal tales of family vacations and such, but are really descriptions of psychotic behavior.

At one point, he puts a puppet on his hand and begins a bad ventriloquist act. But the puppet is soon forgotten as Bolt gets off on one tangent after another, gesturing with the hand as if the puppet weren't there, but still talking in the puppet's squeaky voice, his monologue degenerating into a rage against childhood injustices and the wife who has left him.

Allan Havey, a denizen of comedy clubs, has one good bit about the high-speed 1980s lifestyle of yuppies amid microwaves and VCRs.

Rick Ducommun's act is occasionally funny, but mostly mean, sexist and violent, sort-of watered-down Sam Kinison.

Bobby Slayton is a throwback to Borscht-belt comedians, complete with ethnic jokes and gravelly voice. All he's missing is a cigar. In the course of his act he manages to make offensive — though often funny — references to women, Mexicans, Chinese, Jews.

## ABC cancels "Once a Hero"

HOLLYWOOD (L.A. Times) — Seventeen days into the fall television season, ABC moved Wednesday to shore up its sagging ratings by canceling its lowest-rated program, "Once a Hero," which in its three broadcasts combined had been seen by fewer than half the people who watch a single episode of NBC's top-rated "The Cosby Show."

"Once a Hero," a fantasy series about a comic-book hero come to life, attracted a paltry 10-percent of the viewing audience when it premiered Sept. 19 and did even worse its next two times out.

"I can't blame them," Dusty Kay, the program's creator and executive producer, said of ABC's decision. "They cannot justify numbers like that. We'd have had to double our numbers even to be considered a borderline show."

The first cancellation of the 1987-88 season came as all three major networks were grappling with prime-time ratings that collectively are about 9 percent lower than for the same period a year ago. Explanations for the decline vary from the introduction of a new audience-measurement system called a "people meter" to poor programming.

Replacing "Once a Hero" Satur-

days will be "Sable," an adventure series starring Lewis Van Bergen as a writer of children's stories who doubles as what the network describes as "a passionate man of action who risks his life helping others." Until it premieres Nov. 7, ABC will fill that time slot with specials.

"Once a Hero" had been handicapped even before it went on the air by the fact that some of ABC's affiliated stations declined to carry it, choosing instead to run syndicated shows. But Kay said that he thought a bigger factor in its failure to attract viewers was the misperception many people had that it was a super-hero show aimed primarily at children, when in fact it had what he called satirical, adult sensibilities.

"Once a Hero" was not the only show canceled Wednesday. Lorimar announced that it had pulled the plug on its revival of "Truth or Consequences," a syndicated game show that had suffered such low ratings since its debut Sept. 14 that some stations already had moved it to new time periods.

Meanwhile, some network officials were voicing concern Wednesday over the early returns for the new TV season, which show NBC, CBS and ABC all drawing lower ratings than last year.

## Hahn placed trust in Koppel

**HOLLYWOOD** (L.A. Times) — Jessica Hahn has been everywhere recently, on every channel, on every talk show. Can Dr. Ruth's show be far behind?

Ted Koppel's name pops up in Part 1 of Hahn's highly descriptive interview with Playboy magazine. Although she faults him for not being tougher with Jim and Tammy Bakker on "Nightline," Hahn praises Koppel for not pressuring her to appear on his program when revelations about her 1980 sexual liaison with Jim Bakker were scorching news.

She and Koppel "were talking all the time" and she confided in the "Nightline" host "more than I confided in anybody at that time," Hahn told Playboy.

Koppel advised Hahn to "make my own decision" about appearing on the program, she said. "He didn't press me once. Not once. He said: 'Jessica, I don't even know if it's good for you to come on tonight.' And he wasn't using reverse psychology or anything. He said: 'You know you're welcome; the ratings

would go through the ceiling. But think about it."

Hahn said Koppel helped her through a rough time. "It was a miracle I had him on the phone, it really was."

She never did appear on "Nightline," a media abstinence that she has more than compensated for in recent weeks.

"CBS Evening News" anchorman Dan Rather is having another identity crisis. Rather seems unsure who he wants to be on the air and has been trying out different ways to say good night.

It is not enough that his program has recaptured the top spot in the ratings from "NBC Nightly News," he also seems determined to capture his NBC rival's sign off as well. 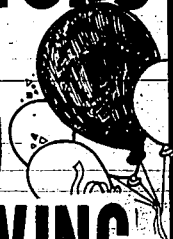
