Nevada may get N-dump

Senate's action narrows choices for waste storage

WASHINGTON — The Senate approved 63-30 on Thursday a major overhaul of the nation's high-level nuclear waste program, virtually tabbing Nevada as the most likely host for a permanent repository.

At the same time, the move scuttled plans to build an identical facility in the upper Midwest or the East.

The new plan, drafted by Sens. Bennett Johnston, D-La., and James McClure, R-Idaho, includes a \$100 million annual federal payment to the repository state, and \$50 million per year to the state in which an interim cooling and packaging facility, known as MRS-1, is built.

Though the legislation, an amendment to a \$16-billion energy and water development bill, does not specify Nevada's Yucca Mountain as the first choice for a permanent site for spent nuclear fuels and other high-level wastes, it clearly points that way.

Under current law, Yucca Mountain, as well as sites at the Hanford nuclear reservation in Washington state and Deaf Smith County, Texas, are candidates for exploratory work — including the drilling of deep shafts — costing nearly \$5 billion.

Johnston's measure calls for that exploration to be done in sequential, rather than simultaneous, order, in hopes that the first site to undergo major testing will prove suitable for the repository — and that work at the other two can be canceled at a savings of \$2 billion.

Technically, it would be left to the Energy Department to decide by Jan. 1, 1989, which site should be explored first, but the legislation is shaped in a manner that clearly tilts toward the Yucca Mountain site. "This bill will save the (utility) ratepayers \$3 billion," said Johnston. "It's that simple."

Most of the high-level nuclear waste program, estimated to cost upwards of \$40 billion when the repository and the MRS — for monitored retrievable storage — are completed around the turn of the century, is financed through assessments against the 108 commercial nuclear plants.

Meanwhile, current requirements that a second nuclear repository be built east of the Mississippi would virtually be scrapped under Johnston's plan, a feature that angered Western lawmakers delighted those from Maine and other

The figures for September bring smiles

WASHINGTON — The nation's trade deficit eased to \$14.1 billion in September, the government reported Thursday in statistics that suggested the U.S. import-export picture was brightening even before the stock market crash.

The report, marking the lowest trade shortfall in four months, touched off a rally in the financial markets.

The Commerce Department said the merchandise trade deficit, the gap between imports and exports, decreased by a strong \$1.6 billion in September from the \$15.7 billion level of August.

The Dow Jones industrial average closed up 61.01 points while the dollar, which had sunk to new 40-year lows earlier in the week, also rallied in New York, rising nearly 1 yen in value to 135.83 yen. It also was sharply higher against European currencies.

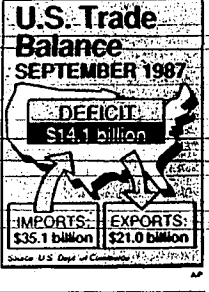
Although much of the trade improvement came from a decline in oil imports, imports of manufactured goods also fell while exports of U.S. made products rose sharply.

Economists took this as a sign that the long-awaited turnaround in trade accounts from a declining dollar may have finally begun, and that it started weeks before the Oct. 19 stock market collapse.

A lower-valued dollar makes imports more expensive and U.S. goods more competitive abroad. However, in the past the decline in the dollar against other major currencies — more than 40 percent since mid-1985 — had shown little direct impact on the monthly trade figures.

"Two and a half years after the dollar peaked, we are finally seeing an effect on both imports and exports," said Robert Woodcut, chief economist for Alphametrix, a Philadelphia forecasting service.

Last month's disappointing re-

port on the August trade deficit, which showed a smaller-than-anticipated improvement from the \$16.5 billion shortfall in July, has been widely cited as one of the factors that helped trigger the stock market collapse.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said the new figures were "especially encouraging" because they included a gain in the export of manufactured goods. "The numbers should be received well," he said.

The trade report, the best since a \$14.0 billion deficit in May, showed an improvement with all of the nation's major trading partners except Canada.

Imports declined to \$35.1 billion from \$35.9 billion in August, while exports rose over the same period from \$20.2 billion to \$21 billion.

Imports of petroleum products dropped to \$3.9 billion from \$4.7 billion in August. Oil prices are not directly affected by changes in the

Andrus says Idaho will move to bar log exports

BOISE — Sawmill operators, union workers and public officials all say they support pending congressional legislation allowing states to ban the export of unprocessed logs.

But Gov. Cecil Andrus, armed with an outside legal opinion, says he won't wait for Congress to act. He said the state of Idaho can take steps to keep unprocessed logs for in-state sawmills.

"We have no desire to become the operators of a tree farm that exists

simply to supply raw materials to foreign countries," Andrus said Thursday.

He was among witnesses appearing before a House Foreign Affairs subcommittee hearing. It's considering a bill which would reverse a 1984 U.S. Supreme Court decision and allow states to ban the export of unprocessed logs.

Andrus and the other witnesses said the issue is jobs. Every truckload of unprocessed logs exported from Idaho means the loss of jobs at Idaho sawmills, the governor said.

Attorney General Jim Jones said

it was a states' rights issue, and state "should be allowed to make their own decision whether to allow the export of logs. He also urged an amendment to allow states to also bar the export of unprocessed logs to other states.

But Bob Hitchcock, president of Evergreen Forest Products, Inc., which operates a sawmill at Tamarack, said no matter why the legislation is passed, it means jobs in Idaho.

"The bottom line does not change," he said. "We need this bill as a first step to letting our states con-

sider and react to the need to assure adequate materials sources to keep our mills open."

Hitchcock said abstract discussions of states' rights don't reflect the jobs and "the economic vitality of small communities which depend on the correct and swift handling of this issue."

Rep. Don Bonker, D-Wash., acted as chairman of the session; also attended by subcommittee members Richard Stallings and Larry Craig of Idaho.

Bonker said there would be no question where he stands on the

bill, because he was first elected to Congress on his opposition to export of Pacific Northwest logs.

"Everybody agrees the Pacific Northwest is better off and receives more economic benefits if we export finished products, not raw sawlogs," Bonker said.

Stallings said a recent study indicated for each 20 truckloads of logs which are exported rather than processed in Idaho, one sawmill job is lost. "If 50 million board-feet are exported, then we have lost" an amount of timber capable of sup-

Deficit-cut negotiations strike series of snags

WASHINGTON — Only a day after declaring themselves on the verge of a major deficit-reduction agreement, White House and congressional negotiators hit a series of snags Thursday as they haggled over a final few billion dollars.

"Yesterday, it looked like we were going to take the pen out and sign an agreement," said Rep. Silvio O. Conte of Massachusetts, one of the Republican negotiators. "Every thing's gone up in smoke again."

The talks adjourned until today amid what one Democratic negotiator termed "frustration and fear of failure." No one predicted an agreement before next week at the earliest.

Unless they can come up with at least \$23 billion in deficit reductions by next Friday, the Gramm-Rudman law could take the decision-making out of their hands by imposing painful spending cuts in most federal spending programs

except Social Security and a few other benefit programs.

"That could cause another major upheaval on Wall Street, where nervous investors are looking for a sign that Washington has regained control of a budget deficit that is projected, in the absence of the across-the-board cuts or some other budget-cutting package, to hit almost \$180 billion this year."

Negotiators said they were only about \$1 billion apart in the critical areas of tax increases, defense spending cuts and reductions in domestic programs. Small as these amounts may be in a trillion-dollar federal budget, each side says it has already stretched to the breaking point in trying to accommodate the other.

Thursday's session began in what House Majority Leader Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., described as "a sense of euphoria that we were going to write the final postscript to the agreement."

Kennedy's former foe now backer

WASHINGTON — Supreme Court nominee Anthony M. Kennedy won words of support from former opponent Jesse Helms Thursday in a day of White House peacemaking sessions free of the bitterness that followed a President Reagan's previous two nominations.

"I think he'll make a fine member of the Supreme Court," Helms, R-N.C., an outspoken member of the Senate's conservative wing, told reporters after meeting separately with Reagan and with the federal appellate judge. However, a spokeswoman said Helms wouldn't make a decision until after confirmation hearings.

Ortega ready to announce proposal for cease-fire today

WASHINGTON — Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega, after talks with House Speaker Jim Wright, said Thursday he has come up with a "concrete proposal" for achieving a cease-fire with the Contra rebels.

Ortega, here for his first day in the Organization of American States, told reporters he will announce his plan today. Ortega is scheduled to meet today with Nicaraguan Cardinal Miguel Obando y Bravo and Wright, D-Texas, at the Vatican's diplomatic offices in Washington.

Obando has been designated the intermediary in upcoming cease-fire talks between the Sandinista government and the Contras, and was expected to formally accept that role at the Friday meeting.

"We want the proposal to be realistic and effective. We want the cease-fire to be a reality," Ortega said.

Congressional sources said last week that Wright had declined an offer to serve as a cease-fire intermediary between the Sandinistas and the Contras because he did not have the time and felt that such a role was inappropriate for someone outside of Central America.

But meetings Wednesday and Thursday between Wright, D-Texas, and Ortega left the impression that the speaker may have agreed to play a role. Last week, Wright said he might be willing to send a congressional delegation to Nicaragua to verify the cease-fire.

After seeing Ortega, Wright met with Secretary of State George Shultz to discuss Central America and other issues, and then met with members of the directorate of the Nicaraguan Resistance, the Contra-political arm.

"I'm encouraging both sides to be forthcoming," Wright said as he entered the session with the Contra leaders. "I hope it's headed in the direction of getting a cease-fire."

Wright has been an influential figure on the Central American issue and the signs of cooperation between him and Ortega contrasted sharply with Reagan administration efforts to shun diplomatic contacts with the Sandinistas.

After a meeting between Ortega and key senators last Thursday, Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., criticized Wright for taking too strong a foreign-policy role. McCain said Ortega had described Wright as a negotiator between the Sandinistas and the Contras, a role the senator said should be left to Cardinal Obando.

"I understand that the speaker appears to have taken on the role of mediator with the Sandinista government," McCain told reporters. "I think it's at best unwise and at worst unconstitutional."

Clear, cold in wake of East's storm

Clear and cold weather prevailed east of the Mississippi on Thursday as the wake of a coastal storm that dumped snow from Washington to Boston and Maine before easing out over the Atlantic Ocean.

Record cold was reported in the southeastern United States, with readings in the 50s as far south as Florida. Early afternoon readings were in the 60s in the northern United States, in the 40s near the Great Lakes.

The storm, blamed for at least 20 deaths, left the Washington, D.C.,

area buried under as much as 15 inches of snow, according to the National Weather Service. Seven inches fell in Boston, the worst early season storm ever there. More than nine inches hit Providence, R.I., setting a November record.

It was still cloudy Thursday afternoon over New England and much of New York, with strong northeast-easterly winds along the coast, a storm warning in effect for the coast of Maine and a gale warning along the Virginia, Maryland and Delaware coasts.

A storm approaching the Pacific Northwest was spreading showers

into drought-stricken Washington and Oregon, and gale warnings were in effect along the coast there. Cloudy skies extended across the northern half of the Rocky Mountains, the lower Missouri Valley, Minnesota and North Dakota, and a few showers were reported over Texas.

Record low set or tied Thursday included 19 degrees in San Angelo, Texas; 90 in Richmond, Va.; and Knoxville, Tenn.; 71 in Virginia, Ala.; 23 in Augusta, Ga.; 25 in Huntsville, Ala.; 27 in Macon, Ga.; and 33 in Jacksonville, Fla.

Value of the dollar because oil is sold in international markets for dollars.

But imports of manufactured goods, which are sensitive to dollar fluctuations, are down \$2.6 billion. Exports of U.S.-manufactured goods, meanwhile, were up \$1.1 billion to \$14.8 billion.

Analysts cautioned against reading too much into a single month's

figures. And for the first nine months of 1987, the trade deficit was still amassing at an annual rate of \$166.9 billion, larger than the record \$166.2 billion deficit in 1986.

"These are solid but un spectacular trade numbers," said Jerry Jasnowski, chief economist for the National Association of Manufacturers.

"On a scale of one to 10, this report is about a six or seven in terms

of improvement. I think there is better news to come," Jasnowski said.

Economists had suggested in advance of Thursday's report that a September deficit figure of \$15 billion or less would be well received in financial markets.

The U.S. deficit with Japan decreased to \$4.6 billion from \$4.9 billion in August. The trade shortfall with Western Europe also fell, to \$1.7 billion from \$2.6 billion.

candidate states in the East and upper Midwest.

Several Western senators, including Brock Adams, D-Wash., and Harry Reid, D-Nev., had attempted to filibuster the package, but the Senate voted Tuesday to cut off the bitter debate.

Some senators, like Assistant Republican Leader Alan Simpson of Wyoming, were angry that Johnston had sidestepped the Senate Environment Committee, which ordinarily shares jurisdiction over nuclear energy matters with Johnston's Energy Committee.

The Louisiana senator did so by attaching the program to the energy and water appropriations bill, an unorthodox move that sidestepped not only the environment

committee but also the Senate Energy Committee, which would have to act on the issue over the last five years.

But Johnston complained, "We're already spending half a billion dollars a year on studies. It's time to get on with the program."

The interim MRS facility, itself costing \$3 billion or more, would be built by the late 1990s. The Energy Department already has tabled Oak Ridge, Tenn., as the location for that plant, where wastes would be cooled for 5-10 years before forwarding to the permanent repository.

The Tennessee delegation has opposed the MRS future, but Sen. James Sasser, D-Tenn., supported Johnston's plan after winning a modification that calls for a "scientific basis." But he said the legislation was full of "code words" to guarantee the Nevada site will be picked, and "It's going to be a real floppa."

But Sen. Daniel Evans, R-Wash., noted that 43,000 metric tons of spent reactor fuel and other high-level waste already awaits burial,

Late last month, after the Senate voted down Reagan nominee Robert H. Bork, Kennedy was considered the front-runner for the court vacancy until Helms said there was no way he would support a Kennedy nomination and other conservatives also indicated displeasure. Reagan then nominated Douglas H. Ginsburg, who withdrew last week and after admitting past marijuana use.

The president also met with Democrat Joseph R. Biden Jr., chairman of the Judiciary Committee, as Kennedy made courtesy calls on senators, many of whom have reacted favorably but cautiously to the nomination.

Biden, D-Del., said Reagan asked that "senate hearings begin as soon as possible." Describing the talks at a news conference, Biden said, "I know of no one who wants to move this slowly." And he pronounced Kennedy's prospects as "good, based on what we've read and heard so far."

Biden, whose committee will consider Kennedy's nomination before the matter goes to the full Senate, said he promised he would meet with leaders of both parties and with Reagan's chief of staff, Howard H. Baker Jr., "to see if we can come up with a date" to begin hearings.

Helms said his meeting with Kennedy "went just fine. He's a very impressive gentleman. I was pleased with what I heard."

Reagan said Wednesday he intended to nominate Kennedy, 61, of Sacramento, Calif.

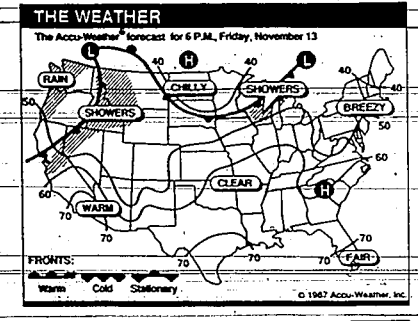

By mid-afternoon Thursday, skies were mostly cloudy statewide. Light rain was reported at Boise. Temperatures were in the 40s to low 50s.

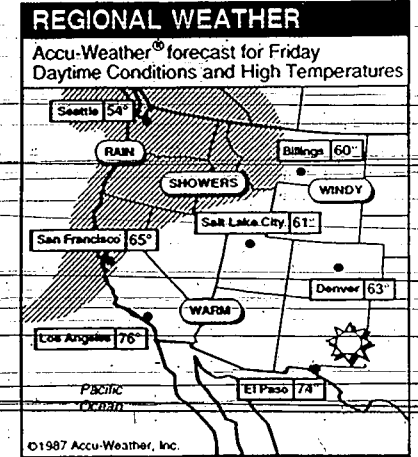
The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 59 degrees at Hagerman. Dixie reported the coldest at 22 degrees.

porting 460-500 jobs," Stallings said.

Hitchcock has first-hand experience of that. His company tried to bid on a state timber sale a few miles away, and was willing to pay \$467,950. Idaho Trading Co., which announced plans to export the timber to Japan, won the sale with a bid of \$755,831.

He said the impact of such bidding is to elevate log prices to Idaho levels, up \$50 to \$100 per thousand board-feet.

Andrus said Idaho will offer 180 to 200 million board-feet next year, which 30 to 40 million board-feet may be of export quality.

"In other words, about 20 to 30 percent of our total state timber harvest may be exported," the governor said.

whether Idaho could bar log exports, Jones maintained the only way that could happen would be through congressional action.

Andrus urged Jones and other Land Board members to explore other options to see if there was any other way.

An opinion passed out by the governor was from the Boise office of Lindsay, Hart, Neil and Weigler. Research was supervised by Roy Elyson of the Boise office.

It said Idaho could indirectly restrict log exports through legislation reserving or setting aside all or a percentage of the timber harvested from state-owned lands - for companies which will process it in-state, or will sell it for in-state processing.

"This legislation places no requirements on the actual processing of the timber purchased but rather restricts the pool of potential bidders to processors of timber to non-exporters," the opinion said.

The opinion said it is "probable" that a state could use that process. Included was a copy of legislation proposed, but not introduced in the 1987 Oregon Legislature, setting aside 90 percent of Oregon's state-produced timber for sale to non-exporters.

"Although states, as regulators, may not prohibit buyers of timber from state lands from exporting that timber for processing, states, as market participants, may choose with whom they will contract."

"Although the market participant doctrine is not yet clearly delineated, it is probable that set-aside legislation would be upheld," the opinion said.

Craig urged quick action on the congressional bill. He said state sawmills have "been left in limbo" by the court decision keeping states from exporting logs.

He said Idaho sawmills cannot compete if they must pay \$100 to \$150 per thousand board-feet above their break-even point for logs.

Joe Hinson, executive vice president of the Intermountain Forest Industries Association, Coeur d'Alene, said manufacturers and industrial timber growers in the Pacific Northwest support the bill.

He and other witnesses said the legislation, if it clears Congress, would simply authorize to ban log exports if they so choose.

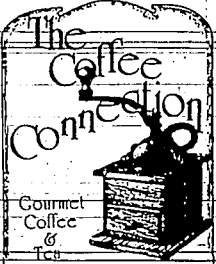
Hinson said the timber industry is having a hard time getting enough logs from public lands as it is, and exporting logs makes the problem even worse.

Andrus announced that he obtained an outside legal opinion from a major Pacific Northwest law firm, that the state could take several actions to keep unprocessed logs in the state.

Explosives trial continued

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The explosives trial of two men connected with the Aryan Nations white-supremacist movement has been postponed until next year, the Kootenai County prosecutor's office said Thursday.

Judge James Judd granted a motion by Chuck Lempeis, Kootenai County public defender, to continue the trial of former Aryan Nations security chief David Dorr and Edward Hawley to March 7, 1988. The trial had been scheduled to begin Dec. 1, Dorr, 38, and Hawley, 23, are accused of placing or detonating explosives in Coeur d'Alene in September 1986. If convicted, they face maximum five-year prison terms and \$5,000 fines for each count.

A motion for a change of venue will be heard Nov. 20, Lempeis said.

Plan for center moves ahead

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Officials from nine eastern Idaho counties plan to buy an abandoned building in downtown Idaho Falls next week for ultimate conversion into a minimum-security juvenile detention center.

The counties expect to pay \$60,000 for the old Department of Employment building for conversion to the needed detention facility next year, Bonneville County Commissioner Cliff Long said.

Renovation of the building, currently owned by the District 7 Health Department, was estimated to cost \$200,000, and bids for the work should be let early next year, Long said.

The completed facility will hold eight juveniles and be run by 12 employees at an annual operating cost of about \$196,000.

Collision kills Idaho man

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — An Idaho Falls man has been killed in a two-vehicle collision on Interstate-16 in Idaho Falls, authorities reported.

The victim was identified as Ronald Leroy Allen, 58. The Idaho State Police said Allen was killed by a pickup truck in a head-on collision on Interstate-16 on Thursday when the car he was driving was hit from behind by a pickup truck in the south-bound lanes of the interstate.

The driver of the pickup, Wilson Christopher Blake, 26, of Idaho Falls, suffered on a minor cut on his back.

Simplet contract extended

POCATELLO (AP) — A one-week extension of the contract for 365 workers at the J.R. Simplet phosphate fertilizer plant in southeastern Idaho has been agreed to while union members consider a new two-year contract proposal.

But while provisions that led to defeat of the company's last offer have been deleted, leaders of the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers Union said they would still recommend rejection of the new proposal, this time on grounds that it requires concessions of workers when management personnel are seeing better increases.

"We're going to make a recommendation to the

rank and file to reject the offer," said Steve Gentry, union negotiator and committee spokesman. "The company is asking for some concessions from just the union members while at the same time increasing the salary and benefits of the management."

A vote on the proposal, worked out in detail with the help of a federal mediator, was scheduled for late next week after union negotiators meet with members on Tuesday and Wednesday.

Tribal plan may be blocked

LEWISTON (AP) — Legislation pending in Congress may thwart Nez Perce Tribe plans to buy timber land with revenues from tax-exempt bonds, tribal officials say.

The tribe wants to buy almost 16,000 acres of timbered land in Nez Perce County and finance the purchase with a \$5.6 million bond issue, tax-exempt under current laws.

But a proposed amendment in the U.S. House would partially withdraw the tax exemption granted to interest earned on bonds issued by tribal Indian governments. The amendment being proposed by Rep. Samuel Gibbons, D-Fla., would limit the tax-free status to bonds that are issued for essential government functions.

Under current law, tribal governments may issue tax-exempt bonds for "essential government activities" and for law-restitution enterprises.

If passed, the law would be retroactive to Oct. 13.

Bird hunters nab 3 escapees

COTTONWOOD (AP) — Three inmates who escaped from a minimum-security prison were corralled by a trio of gun-toting game bird hunters, correction officials said.

Three men escaped from North Idaho Correctional Institution near here Monday night, but were caught Tuesday by Ken Long, Fred Roberts and Roman Schumaker, who were on a hunting trip, said Warden Ron McKinley.

Ryan Ellis, 22, Vic Rainey, 19, and Robert Agrifoglio, 20, were captured in Graves Creek Canyon, 11 miles south of Cottonwood near a bridge that crosses the Salmon River.

The three were taken to the Idaho County Jail, where they were awaiting arraignment on felony escape charges, Sgt. Richard Bishop of the North Idaho prison said Wednesday.

Idahoans join oil firm suit

BOISE (AP) — A group of limited partners in OKC Limited Partnership, including J.R. Simplet, has filed an \$80 million lawsuit against the general partners of the Texas oil company.

The limited partners also started an action to remove Cloys-K-Box and CKB & Associates as general partners in OKC.

The lawsuit, filed Monday in federal court in Dallas, alleges violations of federal securities and common law, breaches of fiduciary duty, and breaches of the limited partnership agreement.

The suit asks for, among other relief, \$20 million in actual damages and \$60 million in punitive damages.

BSU starts AIDS education effort

BOISE (AP) — Boise State University, attempting to fulfill its role as a resource for the urban campus, is launching a detailed education campaign aimed at dispelling the myths about fatal acquired immune deficiency syndrome — AIDS.

"At a time when we do not have adequate therapy, when we do not have a vaccine, our best approach is education," microbiology professor Russell Centanni, education director of the Idaho AIDS Foundation, said Thursday in unveiling the campaign.

The initiative, initially aimed at the universities, has a number of employees who have already contacted the school about taking advantage of the information.

"The hysteria over AIDS is coming from a lack of education," Centanni said. "We felt our role should be in the area of education."

At the heart of the campaign is a 12-page pamphlet describing the disease, how it is transmitted and the rights of students and employees who have contracted it along with two videotapes that discuss all aspects of the disease — one in layman's terms and the other in more technical terms.

"It's not a matter of if we'll get a case of AIDS on campus, but when," Centanni said. "What we're doing is trying to prepare ourselves for that."

With no legal authority to mandate testing for AIDS, the university makes clear in its pamphlet that students and employees are not required to undergo AIDS screening and that if they disclose to the school that they have the disease or the virus linked to that information will be kept strictly confidential.

Idaho has recorded 16 cases of AIDS, the pamphlet emphasizes that AIDS cannot be contracted through casual contact and therefore is no reason to restrict employment or student eligibility at the school.

As other officials have attempted to during the continuing campaign to raise American awareness of school.

Idahoan says Kennedy will pass probe

BOISE (AP) — An investigation into the background of appeals court Judge Anthony Kennedy is unlikely to uncover controversy and stir public outrage, an American Bar Association official said.

"The Kennedy name has been floating around for a long time," said Eugene Thomas, a Boise attorney and immediate past president of the ABA. "When you've been around for a long time, it's pretty hard to have a lot of deep, dark secrets."

President Reagan announced his nomination of Kennedy, a 9th Circuit Court of Appeals Judge, on Wednesday. The announcement followed the failure of two Supreme Court nominees, Robert Bork, who was under fire for his conservative philosophies, and Douglas Ginsberg, who admitted he had smoked marijuana.

Thomas said Reagan was more cautious in his nomination of Kennedy.

He said the ABA and the Federal Bureau of Investigation would investigate the background of Kennedy. The ABA evaluation should be complete in about four to five weeks because information on Kennedy's background is plentiful, Thomas said.

Kennedy, who attended Stanford University and Harvard Law School, has a dozen years of experience on the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals.

Americans dislike political extremes

Think of the grief the Reagan administration might have spared itself if the president had nominated Judge Arthur M. Kennedy of Sacramento to the Supreme Court in the first place. In spite of early reservations of extreme right-wingers such as Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., Kennedy appears to meet the president's test of a conservative jurist who believes in judicial restraint and strict interpretation of the Constitution.

Given the recent experience of two failed court nominations, there is not likely to be a rush to judgment on Kennedy of the U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals. The immediate reaction from key senators of both parties was that Kennedy's record is impressive, but that they will examine his opinions and background carefully before ratifying his nomination.

Kennedy himself made an important gesture toward the Senate at the White House press briefing room Wednesday when he recognized that house's constitutional role in the process: "I'm looking forward to this scrutiny that the Senate should give any nominee in the discharge of its constitutional duty." The 12-year veteran of the appeals court, an appointee of Gerald R. Ford, also impressed onlookers as reasonable, personable, self-assured and good-humored. All of those characteristics should work to his advantage during what is certain to be a careful and rigorous confirmation process. Kennedy already has demonstrated his patience by surviving two trips to Washington and one false alarm before his nomination finally was made.

Kennedy's liberal colleagues speak highly of him, of his legal reasoning and his personal integrity and honesty. But conservatives should not be distrustful of Kennedy just because he is lauded by liberals. They certainly do not always agree with Kennedy's decisions, but they respect the process by which he reaches them. This is an important attribute on the Supreme Court, where respect of one's peers and the ability to persuade can influence decisions.

The conservatives' problem, and the president's, has been a desire to find a swing-vote jurist who could put the stamp of the Reagan Revolution firmly on the court's work for decades to come. The dilemma for them is that it is impossible to have an ideologue who passes all the conservative litmus tests, such as abortion and school prayer, and still meet their perceived criteria for being a strict constructionist who exercises what they call judicial restraint.

Americans have demonstrated time and again, through elections and opinion polls, that they will tolerate moderate swings of the political pendulum one way or the other, but that they are not comfortable with political extremism.

Peer pressures can overwhelm individual judgment

WASHINGTON — The collapse of Douglas Ginsburg's Supreme Court nomination is being widely depicted as the consequence of an accidental, regrettable, somewhat immature hang-up that our society has about drugs. My colleague Bob Kaiser perceives a collision of cultures: the reality of widespread drug usage versus our puritan, anti-technocritical moralism. Another colleague, Henry Allen, describing marijuana as fashionable and benign, detects in Nancy Reagan's just-say-no appeal "the tone of a Maoist commissar advocating the extermination of flies." A Newsweek poll reports only 26 percent of Americans think Ginsburg should have been disqualified for smoking the stuff.

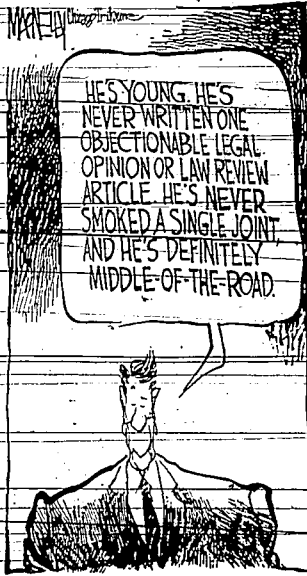

nounce something interesting, if not exactly novel, about ourselves, and I appreciate the cultural and political insight reflected in them. But I am also aware of a whole other area of concern that does not seem to have been reflected in the public discussion so far at all.
It is what I, being a parent of children who have passed through high school into or beyond college, feel is the essential consideration with which this discussion must finally come to terms. It is: kids and drugs.
There is a part of me that is ready to see drugs, especially marijuana, as a "cultural" phenomenon and

that someone up from me a display of worldliness and sophisticated toleration for different life styles.
But there is another part of me that tenses at the difficult choices that the drug scene forces upon young people and that rises in anger and distrust at any casual dismissal of drugs as simply a cultural or generational fad.
To brave that the people who talk about drugs in this way tend to exclude entirely their darker side: the lives they waste, the crime they spawn, the suffering they inflict. Instead, they convey, usually without examining what they are doing, that there are two drug worlds. One of these worlds is safe, clean, pleasurable, sociable, condoned, titillating and unrelated to a world of limits. The other is, well, often as

not the other drug world's simply not on their screen; they do not think about it and they accept no responsibility for it.
It is being widely observed now that the dangers of marijuana, and the certitude with which these dangers are exaggerated, and that it is not automatic or even likely that a young person's use of marijuana leads to use of more dangerous substances. But so often these cautions, reasonable enough in themselves, come unaccompanied by the admission that marijuana does carry some risks, as a substance and as a gateway to other substances.
I am aware that some people, addressing their children on this issue, go the instill-the-fear-of-God

route and others take to the path of documentation and argument. In either event, the whole effort is undermined by attitudes of easy tolerance for an activity that remains, after all, medically questionable and illegal. And nothing contributes more to an attitude of easy tolerance than the demonstration that violations—violations of drug laws, health standards, moral codes—are accepted, painless, free of cost.
It would have been unforfeitable if a Supreme Court nominee, no kid but someone who was still smoking as a law professor in his thirties, had not been forced to withdraw. Let us not be diverted by sympathy for Ginsburg's lost opportunity or by the extra burden the example of his misfortune puts on the career prospects of other achievers. For him to have avoided paying a price

would have undermined the crucial moral message that all parents try to transmit to their children: your acts have consequences.
Nancy Reagan declares that "each of us has a responsibility to be intolerant of drug use anywhere, anytime by anybody. Every one of us has an obligation to force the drug issue to the point it may make others uncomfortable and perhaps unpopular." Henry Allen knows the enemy within: Nancy Reagan; the enemy is not simply drugs but a climate in which social and peer pressure overwhelm individual judgment. She takes a stand that draws the hiss of the hip, and I salute her for it.

Reporting on Ginsburg not gossip

Like most people, reporters and editors operate on a couple of levels. On the one hand, they have their individual tastes, intelligence and common sense. On the other, there are the demands of journalism which, like an angry god, have to be satisfied. The two are often in conflict when it comes to handling a news story.
Nina Totenberg, the reporter who broke the story about Judge Douglas H. Ginsburg's marijuana smoking, is fortunate in that she works for National Public Radio, which does not put a premium on knee-jerk journalism. A distinguishing feature of its news program, "All Things Considered," is that reporters have the luxury of giving reality its due. Nuances can be acknowledged and a more rounded and accurate perspective has a chance to emerge.
That is why, when she found out that Ginsburg had smoked pot while teaching law at Harvard University, she did not dash to a microphone with the news. "I didn't think of it as something I wanted to

lead with but would put it in the story somewhere further down," she said in an interview. "I didn't see it as a screaming headline. I wasn't going to ignore it, but I seemed to me it could be part of the description of the man without focusing on it as the only piece of information about him."
That is not the kind of thinking that would have endeared her to editor Walter Burns of The Front Page. But then if she were working for a Walter Burns she no doubt would accommodate herself to his kind of journalism. That, too, is part of the news business, and there is nothing wrong with it.
Totenberg, 43, who has been covering Washington for NPR since 1974, said she had gotten an indication of Ginsburg's marijuana puffing the very day he was nominated.

She would not say precisely how she found out. "It was not a tip, per se," she said, "but it was not something I went looking for; either. You could say I discovered it quite inadvertently, while probing for information about him."
She said she had the story confirmed and could have gone with it two days later, but since she still had more reporting to do on Ginsburg — and no other reporter had the information — she held off.
It wasn't until she called the Department of Justice for comment about Ginsburg's pot smoking that the story began to come out. "That's what popped the lid off," she said. Department spokesmen were extremely uptight. "They wanted to know how much I knew, and it became clear that I knew quite a bit."
They asked specific questions — how many times had Ginsburg smoked it, how many people had witnessed it, and so on. When it was obvious that a political tornado was taking shape, she gave some of her information to a newspaper reporter. That way, another news or-

ganization would have the story and could share the heat if an angry right-wing attack developed. The story would still be her exclusive, since her radio account would beat the print version by a day.
By last Thursday the capital was reeling with the rumor. Reporters who worked for Walter-Burns-style outlets were hounding NPR for information. To protect her exclusive, she went on the air with it that evening. In an effort to preempt her exclusive, Ginsburg issued a statement admitting that he had smoked marijuana (and was praised by his former boss, Attorney General Edwin Meese, for his forthright answer: "There is no limit to these people's hypocrisy...")
As for those who equate her story with journalistic gossip-mongering, Totenberg has a simple reply: "I'm not in the business of suppressing information or evaluating it. I just get it and put it out." "Would any reporter have done otherwise?"

Intolerance of drug abuse increases

Reaction to Judge Douglas H. Ginsburg's use of marijuana while a professor of law reflects the profound antagonism to drug use, including marijuana, that has been growing for almost 10 years.
His experience has confirmed in the political sphere what the tragic deaths of prominent athletes two years ago confirmed for sports: Toleration of drug use is rapidly declining.
Interestingly, the late-time Ginsburg is said to have used the drug, 1979, was near the peak of marijuana favor in the United States. At the time, President Carter was proposing decriminalization of marijuana, and the number of high school seniors who felt that regular marijuana use was dangerous had fallen to the all-time low of 35 percent. Now that figure has doubled and it is a minority who think that regular marijuana use is not dangerous. To take another example of the trend, in 1980 only 43 percent of Americans favored criminal penalties for the possession of small amounts of marijuana; by 1986 the percentage had increased to 67 percent.
This trend continues a pattern Americans followed after a previous peak of drug toleration earlier this century. In our encounter with

mood-altering substances, the initial reaction is a rapid escalation of claims and enthusiasm for the effects of drugs on our minds and bodies. Drugs appear to aid us in achieving our maximum, whether in physical labor, alert thinking, philosophical insight, sheer willpower or contentment with ourselves. Without drugs, the assumption runs, we cannot quite attain our potential. During these periods of positive attitude toward drugs, it is significant that we ignore and short-sighted in the face of the advantages that drugs promise.
Fear of drugs begins to rise as the effects of drug use begin to accumulate. Tragic instances of the bad effects of drugs grow more frequent. At first, "bad trips" are seen as exceptions to the general rule of the benefits of drugs. In the downturn of drug favor, social pressure shifts from having to justify abstinence to requiring an apology for drug consumption. Intolerance replaces toleration, and just as we frequently heard campaigns to "turn on" in the 1960s, we now wit-

ness campaigns to abstain totally from drugs — from tobacco and alcohol, as well as cocaine, marijuana and so on. No recreational drug use can be justified because all damage the mind and body, reducing the user's potential.
So the rise and fall of drug toleration appears to have a symmetry. Just as opponents to drug use were offended in the 1970s by the unrealistic praise given to drugs, so those who continue to see recreational drug use as harmless are shocked at the blanket denunciation of any drug use, which is more commonly heard now. If the past is a guide, the intolerance of drug use will diminish and may have the nation at a relatively low level of drug consumption for several decades, as happened from the 1930s until the early 1960s.
Therefore, when the Reagan administration and Mrs. Reagan in particular encourage intolerance toward drug use, they are advocating one of the most powerful influences to reduce drug consumption in the United States. The impact of intolerance, however, like that of a strong medication, is hard to confine to a discrete target area. Judge Ginsburg is an early political casualty, although he is not the first. Recall the challenge to take a

drug test made to Julian Bond by his eventually successful congressional opponent, or the problems that anti-drug use caused the ultimately lost re-election campaign of Gov. William Scranton III in Pennsylvania.
Those intolerant of drug use see no acceptable reason for using drugs, therefore no need to debate or make difficult decisions on which drugs to use and how much. For these citizens, the conflict between excusing Judge Ginsburg's occasional use some years ago and supporting him as the president's Supreme Court nominee created just too much psychic pain.
The fate of this man who came so close to the pinnacle of achievement in his profession is a cautionary tale that no politician will ignore. The message is clear: Drug use in the past will not be judged by the attitudes that prevailed at that time. Politicians may find their casual use of drugs in the 1970s to be as popular as having joined a Soviet friendship society in World War II was in the 1950s.

Summit sessions to start on Dec. 8

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev plan three days of working meetings, beginning Dec. 8, with dinners in each other's honor during their super-power summit, the White House said Thursday.

Gorbachev, making his first visit to the United States, will arrive in Washington late in the day on Dec. 7, a Monday, and depart on Dec. 10, a Thursday.

Announcing a preliminary schedule for the summit, presidential spokesman Martin Fitzwater said, "The Soviet team indicated some amusement at the stories of an extended stay and did not give any indication that it would be the case."

Several newspapers, in reports from Moscow, said Gorbachev was seriously considering staying longer and that his wife, Raisa, was encouraging him to extend his visit. She will accompany him to Washington.

Fitzwater said it was not clear whether Reagan would go to the Andrews Air Force Base in suburban Maryland to greet Gorbachev on Dec. 7. The formal welcoming ceremony might be delayed until the next day.

"Generally speaking, there will be working sessions each day, beginning Tuesday, Dec. 8," Fitzwater said. He said it was envisioned that all the meetings would take place at the White House.

night at the White House, followed by a reciprocal dinner given by Gorbachev for Reagan the next night.

"We would expect the official part of the meetings to end on Thursday, Dec. 10, and the general secretary, at this point, plans to depart on that day," Fitzwater said.

He said Gorbachev wants to hold a press conference before leaving but that the time and location have not been determined.

Fitzwater said it was not known when the two leaders would sign the treaty to ban intermediate-range nuclear missiles, the centerpiece of the summit and the first arms accord of Reagan's presidency.

During their talks, the two leaders also are expected to discuss other arms issues, such as reductions in strategic nuclear weapons, Soviet objections to the Star Wars missile defense plan and the Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty of 1972.

Fitzwater said he had no information about the separate schedule for Mrs. Gorbachev.

With less than a month before the meeting, White House planners still are looking for a press briefing center and work rooms for the thousands of journalists expected to cover the summit.

White House officials said all of the city's major hotel ballrooms are booked, and that the convention center has been reserved for an annual auto show.

Look-alike missiles latest treaty snag

WASHINGTON (AP) — With the summit deadline approaching, American and Soviet negotiators have hit another bump in the road. The latest dispute is over two Russian missiles that look alike.

In fact, U.S. officials said Thursday, the SS-25 intermediate-range rockets in its first stage looks exactly like the SS-20 missile to be scrapped under the treaty.

Here, at the State Department, spokesman Charles E. Redman was ready with a response that blamed the Soviets for the apparent snag.

He said the issue arose only after the Soviets belatedly provided the inspectors at SS-25 installations to make sure the rockets were not secretly replacing the 441 mobile SS-20s to be dismantled over three years.

The Soviets have hotly responded that the intercontinental ballistic missiles are not part of the prospective treaty. Gennady Gerasimov, the

spokesman for the Soviet foreign ministry, called it an unacceptable last-minute proposal.

He was quoted Thursday in Pravda, the Communist party newspaper, as acknowledging new difficulties in the way of a treaty and blaming a "last-minute, final curtain proposal from the United States."

He said the issue arose only after the Soviets belatedly provided the inspectors at SS-25 installations to make sure the rockets were not secretly replacing the 441 mobile SS-20s to be dismantled over three years.

Negotiators in Geneva had been struggling for months over verification measures — ways to guard against cheating once the treaty is signed.

Reagan, in reports to Congress,

has accused the Soviets of several violations, and explained his vehement opposition to all past major nuclear arms control accords as based on inadequate monitoring procedures.

Already, about 20 conservative senators are lining up to oppose the treaty to ban intermediate-range ballistic missiles on similar grounds. It would take 34 negative votes to block Senate ratification.

Historically, the Soviets have resisted having foreign inspectors on

their territory, poking into their military affairs. But they have agreed to permit U.S. monitors at SS-20 sites. In return, Soviet monitors would come to American missile plants here.

Moreover, in a major breakthrough, the United States recently agreed to permit Soviet inspectors at the bases in West Germany, Britain, Italy and Belgium where the U.S. medium-range missiles are deployed.

Carlucci holds the line

WASHINGTON (AP) — Frank C. Carlucci told his Senate confirmation hearing Thursday that "I bring no agenda other than the president" to the office of secretary of defense during the last 14 months of President Reagan's term.


At confirmation hearings, Carlucci, currently Reagan's national security adviser, also sounded a conciliatory note to the Senate Armed Services Committee, promising to work "in close collaboration with the Congress" to solve defense budget problems.

Carlucci was cautious in his statements and answers to a variety of questions, defending administration policies and breaking little new ground. He generally declined to be specific in his answers, repeatedly telling senators that he wasn't yet familiar with details about a variety of Pentagon issues.

Carlucci was lavishly praised during the hearing and quick Senate approval was pledged by senators of both parties. Reagan nominated him last week to replace Caspar Weinberger, who is retiring after nearly seven years as defense secretary. Weinberger will remain in office until Carlucci is confirmed.

Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., chairman of the panel, said he expects the committee to approve Carlucci's nomination today. That vote would send it to the floor of the Democratic-controlled chamber for a vote next week.

Much of the questioning involved congressional efforts to reduce Pentagon spending as part of the overall deficit reduction effort. Nunn said one of the biggest problems is "the need to bring the defense budget into sync with fiscal reality."



Underground train collision hurts 110

BOSTON (AP) — Two commuter trains crashed at an underground station during morning rush hour Thursday, injuring at least 110 people and forcing hundreds of others to grope through a dark and smoky tunnel to safety, authorities said.

Officials of the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority, which owns the "Amtrak"-operated commuter lines, said a seven-car train struck the rear of another seven-car train that was letting off passengers at a station in the Back Bay section shortly after 8 a.m.

"Everyone started falling and everything went black," said one passenger, Geri Hanson of Canton.

"People were ankle-to-ankle, like dominoes," said James Blanchard, 21, of Attleboro, who was standing in the second train at the time. His first recollections were of people screaming and a doctor giving emergency treatment to a woman who was tossed between the cars.

Six people were seriously hurt. Rescue efforts were hampered by the city's first major snowfall, which blew about a foot of wet snow into the city. Rescue officials said it took about 90 minutes to bring out the passengers in both cars.

Boston Fire Commissioner Leo Stapleton said most of the injured passengers were aboard the first of the trains. Both carried about 500 people and originated in Attleboro, near the Rhode Island border.

Charles Passanisi, 25, who was in the second train, said it slowed down just before the crash.

"As soon as we realized what happened, we all got out quickly," said Passanisi, of Boston's Hyde Park section.

"It was dark because we were in the tunnel. The only lights were the ones along the side of the tunnel," said Passanisi.

Passanisi said the passengers in his car were led onto the catwalk and through the train that had been hit. Others were led through the tunnel.

"We were standing on the street in about 10 minutes after the crash," he said.

Transit authority spokesman Vicente Carbona said 110 people sought treatment and as many as 75 of them went to hospitals.

Carbona said the train that had stopped had let out about 400 of its passengers when it was hit. The train had been running about 40 minutes after the start of the morning rush and it was possible the engineer of the second train had not expected to see it ahead, he said.

Turbulence injures 30 on airliner

MIAMI (AP) — A Venezuela-bound Pan Am flight buffeted by severe turbulence that injured 30 people resumed Thursday with all but four of the passengers aboard.

The A-310 Airbus was over the Atlantic on Wednesday when it suddenly dipped and lurched, tossing many of the 127 passengers and nine crew members around the cabin like rag dolls.

"It was clear air turbulence," Pan Am spokeswoman Pamela Hanlon said Thursday. The flight was cruising at 33,000 feet and there was absolutely no warning.

The plane, en route from New York to Caracas, Venezuela, and then Trinidad, made an unscheduled landing at Miami International Airport where paramedics treated the injured and routed them to hospitals. Injuries ranged from cuts to broken bones.

Two people remained hospitalized Thursday, said Baptist Hospital spokeswoman Adrienne Sylvester.

She identified them as Henry Hazzard, 60, of Roosevelt, N.Y., who had cardiac problems; and Erch Gonda, 46, of Dusseldorf, West Germany, who suffered bumps and bruises. Both were in satisfactory condition and were expected to be released shortly, she said.

Judge overturns Mandel conviction

BALTIMORE (AP) — Former Gov. Marvin Mandel's 1977 conviction on charges of racketeering and mail fraud was overturned Thursday by a federal judge who cited a recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling against the use of mail fraud laws to prosecute certain cases.

Mandel was in federal prison after being convicted of helping five political associates get extra voting days for the Marlboro Race Track, which they secretly owned, while he was governor of Maryland.

The 24-count indictment alleged the associates lavished Mandel with money, clothes, jewelry and financial help in his divorce settlement with his first wife, Barbara.

U.S. District Judge Frederic N. Smulkin, in a 33-page opinion, threw out all convictions against the six defendants and ordered the government to return their fines within 90 days.

Army says 2 men listed on Vietnam 'wall' alive

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two of the soldiers whose names are etched in granite with the list of dead on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial are still alive, the Army said Thursday, and it is checking to see if a similar error was made in a third case.

Lt. Col. Keith Schneider, an Army spokesman, said the service concluded that "a coding error somewhere down the line" caused military records to incorrectly list the date two Army members were injured as the dates they died.

The error was perpetuated when the names of some 68,000 Americans killed in the Vietnam War were provided by the Defense Department for listing on the face of the memorial when it was built in 1982.

The cases of former soldiers Robert Bedker and Willard D. Craig were discovered in 1985, Schneider said. Both are from Virginia, with no hometown listed on military records, he said.

A third case arose this week in preparations for Veterans Day observances Wednesday. Darrell E. Lausch, 41, of Baroda, Mich., said he learned his name was on the memorial when he saw a list of men from Michigan killed in the war that appeared in the Detroit News last Sunday.

"It don't bother me," Lausch said

in a telephone interview. "Naturally, I think a little about it. If they want to leave it (on the memorial), it don't matter."

Lausch, a grain farmer and asphalt plant worker, was wounded twice while in Vietnam. It was on the date of the first wound, Nov. 19, 1968, that Army records listed him as killed in action.

He suffered a shrapnel wound in the leg from a hand grenade, but returned to combat after a few days. He was later shot in the arm, was hospitalized and returned to combat again before leaving Vietnam after a one-year tour, he said.

Schneider said the Army would check through old files to make sure there was no confusion with another soldier. The Lausch listed on the wall had a different spelling of the first name, "Darrell," but records showed him from Michigan with no birthdate or hometown listed.

Earl Kittleman, spokesman for the National Park Service, which maintains the memorial, said the names of Bedker and Craig were being removed from next edition of the official directory of Vietnam War dead. He said Lausch would be removed, too, if the error is confirmed by the Army.

But he said the names on the wall, etched in granite, can't be removed.

Iraq says another tanker hit; Tehran scorns cease-fire call

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — Iraq claimed its warplanes hit another tanker in the Persian Gulf on Thursday and Iran responded to Arab leaders' calls for a cease-fire by vowing the war would continue until the aggressor Iraq is defeated.

Iran's prime minister, Hussein Muusavi, denounced an Arab League summit in Jordan as a "defeat for the Arabs, because its decisions were dictated by the United States."

Iran also announced its gunboats intercepted and searched eight unidentified "foreign" cargo ships in the Strait of Hormuz on Wednesday and Thursday but let them go after no Iraqi-bound cargo was found aboard.

Tehran's military communique said "a foreign warship was also recognized by the Iranian navy," but it reported no incident and gave no details.

Another convoy of U.S.-flagged tankers and American warships, the largest since escort operations began in July, moved up the gulf in rough seas.

The Greek owners of a super-tanker under charter to Iran confirmed that Iraqi planes damaged the vessel Wednesday night, and Iraq said it attacked another tanker in Iranian waters early Thursday.

That would be Iraq's sixth attack on a tanker in four days, but only the raid on the Greek ship was confirmed independently.

Iraq has attacked tankers and oil installations for years in an attempt to destroy the exports "with which Iran finances its war effort."

War communiques from Iraq said its fighter-bombers raided two large naval targets, meaning oil tankers, off Iran Wednesday night and before dawn Thursday.

Chartered supertankers carry crude oil from Iran's main export terminal at Kharg Island to make-shift terminals 450 miles down the gulf that are harder for Iraq's air force to reach.

The 264,081-ton Fortuneship L was damaged in the Wednesday night raid, according to the owners, Corcos Hellenic Shipping Enterprises of Piraeus, Greece.

Non-accusatory reports among the crew of 25 Greeks and Pakistanis, and the company said a fire was brought under control. The ship was being towed to an Iranian port for unloading and repairs.

The Fortuneship L was one of several tankers reported attacked in an Iraqi air blitz in August, but its owners later denied it was hit.

Seventeen ships were raided by Iraq or Iran in that three-day period.

Iran retaliates for Iraqi raids with attacks on neutral shipping.

In the most recent of those attacks, two speedboats raided a Japanese-owned chemical tanker in the southern gulf Wednesday. The 12,964-ton Liquid Bulk Explorer continued on its route to the Strait of Hormuz, the narrow exit from the waterway, with minor damage and no casualties.

On Thursday, Iran's official Islamic Republic News Agency quoted the Foreign Ministry as saying

Arab support for Iraq, expressed during the Arab League summit in Amman, Jordan, was "in line with the aggressive policies of the U.S.A. and Iran will give a suitable response to the threats of the American government and its dependents in the region."

It quoted Muusavi as saying the four-day summit was a "defeat for the Arabs because its decisions were dictated by the United States."

Muusavi said the "Iraqi-imposed war will be continued until the complete suppression of the aggressor."

The Iraqis insist that Iran be declared the aggressor in the war, and have made that a condition of accepting a cease-fire resolution passed unanimously July 20 by the U.N. Security Council. Iraq invaded in September 1980 after several border skirmishes.

Ten ships started up the gulf in the 17th convoy, stretched out for five miles.

At least two dropped out near Bahrain, the halfway point on the 550-mile journey to Kuwait at the head of the Persian Gulf.

Witnesses identified them as the missile frigate Gallery, one of U.S. Navy ships in escort, and the Bahraini-flagged cargo vessel Bin Aboudin, which was carrying a shipment of U.S.-supplied arms for the island emirate's military forces.

Two other Kuwaiti products tankers, the Surf City and Chesapeake City, were loaded and waiting at Kuwait for the return voyage.

Kim warns of Korea vote fraud

SEOUL, South Korea — Populist candidate Kim Dae Jung raised a warning flag on election fraud Thursday in accepting the presidential nomination of his new political party.

His ruling party opponent, Roh Tan Woo, can win "only by fraud," Kim charged, declaring, "I am convinced our people will never condone such a result."

The 63-year-old, longtime opposition leader said that his breakthrough Party for Peace and Democracy "must stand in the forefront and demand fair elections."

Both Kim and his opposition rival, Kim Young Sam, have elevated the specter of fraud to a "priority issue" in the campaign for the Dec. 16 balloting, South Korea's first direct presidential election since 1971.

The new party was formed specifically to support Kim's candidacy and was inaugurated Thursday in the same ceremonies that delivered his nomination. The majority of its members, including Kim, broke away from Kim Young Sam's Reunification Democratic Party late last month after the two rivals failed, despite repeated pledges, to agree on a single opposition candidate to face Roh.

Kim promised his party would set up a "pure civilian government" that he said would represent blue- and white-collar workers, farmers, students and dissidents who have opposed a succession of military-dominated regimes in South Korea.

He charged that he was cheated of victory in 1971, when he lost the presidential election to the late Park Chung Hee, and called again for appointment of a neutral Cabinet to assure a "fair" vote in December. "This is the only way," Kim insisted, declaring that it is also the only way to guarantee for Chun Doo Hwan a peaceful exit from the political arena.

Palme case reward rises

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — The government Thursday raised the reward for information on the killer of Prime Minister Olof Palme to 50 million kronor, or about \$8.25 million.

It was the second dramatic increase in the reward since Palme's slaying in February 1986. The initial reward offered was about \$83,000 dollars.

Police have received about 14,000 tips and leads in the case. The flow increased after the reward was raised last February to about \$830,000.

Palme had been prime minister for 11 years when he was shot on a downtown Stockholm street.

The government said the reward would be given for "decisive information" about the case. It didn't specify that the information would have to lead to Palme's killer.

Autumn storms in Tibet claim 18 lives

BEIJING (AP) — Autumn southwest Tibet near the border with Nepal. Heavy snows this early and 8,000 head of livestock in Tibet, in the past are rare.

More than 200 foreign travelers along the road from Lhasa, Tibet's capital, to Katmandu, Nepal, were trapped by an Oct. 19-21 storm. About 160 spent six nights in buses snowbound at a 17,000-foot-high pass. All eventually were rescued.

It said that since mid-October, Xinhuasaid the snows have snowstorms hit eight counties in caused houses to collapse.

Youths, police clash in Bangladesh

DHAKA, Bangladesh (AP) — Youths hurling rocks and home-made bombs clashed with police firing guns and tear gas Thursday during nationwide demonstrations against President Hussain Muhammad Ershad.

Three civilians and an officer were reported killed.

Dhaka's shops remained shuttered in observance of a general strike called by Ershad's opponents.

A policeman was killed and a fellow officer seriously injured by a bomb thrown at a truck carrying police officers near the state-run television station, the Home Ministry said in a statement.

Earlier, a Bangladeshi photographer and a policeman at the scene said two policemen were killed.

In Rajbari, 50 miles west of Dhaka, three people were killed when police opened fire on demonstrators, reporters at the scene said.

Police fired tear gas in at least four places in Dhaka when bands of

youths threw stones, set off firecrackers and set fire to stores of automobiles.

The scattered violence locked the organization evident on Tuesday, the first day of the so-called "Dhaka Siege," called by the political opposition in an effort to force Ershad to resign.

Opposition leaders Khaleda Zin and Sheikh Hasina remained under house arrest. The two women led

protest marches in the center of the capital on Tuesday.

The government maintains three people were shot to death by police firing in self-defense Tuesday, but Hasina and other opposition leaders put the day's death toll at 12.

Mrs. Zia, whose husband, President Ziaur Rahman, was assassinated in 1981, and Hasina, whose father, President Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, was assassinated in 1975.

JAMBA, Angola (AP) — Rebel leader Jonas Savimbi said Thursday his forces had won their most important victory in 12 years of civil war, crushing a Soviet- and Cuban-backed offensive with decisive help from U.S.-supplied weaponry.

Savimbi said the rebels killed or wounded more than 7,000 of the Marxist government's 18,000-man assault force without requiring aid from South African ground troops.

He told foreign journalists he was "very surprised" by South Africa's announcement this week that its combat forces had intervened in support of the rebels.

Defense Minister Magnus Malan of South Africa said Thursday that if South Africa had not fought on behalf of Savimbi's National Union for the Total Independence of Angola, the rebels could have been defeated.

The remarks by Malan and the

army chief, Gen. Jannie Geldenhuys, represent the first admission in a decade that South Africa was providing more than supply and transport help to the guerrillas.

The South African army announced that four white soldiers were killed Monday in combat in Angola. The army declined comment on a report from military sources in South-West Africa that a South African-commanded battal-

ion of black Angolans had suffered heavy casualties.

Angola said Wednesday that 230 South African troops have been killed in recent fighting. It has acknowledged that several hundred of its own troops also have been killed, but has not conceded that its offensive has failed.

UNITA commanders said 1,084 Angolan soldiers, 27 Soviets and 21 Cubans had died and more than 6,000 were wounded since the offen-

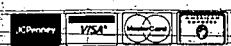
sive began in July, compared to rebel casualties of 155 killed and 662 wounded.

It was the largest in a series of annual government attacks on UNITA's strongholds in the southeastern third of Angola.

UNITA and the government's Popular Movement for the Liberation of Angola (MPLA) both fought guerrilla wars against Portuguese control.

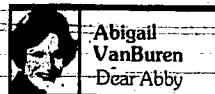

While I was shopping in one part of the store, my wife took the four children to another area of the store. When I went to join her, I found the children alone in the toy section.

She had left them there while she went to the catalog department, which was in another section of the building — out of sight and sound of the toy area.

I was very upset and don't feel that they should be left alone yet. She says that they can take care of themselves.

Abby, the two younger ones are a handful for us, and I can't see how they can be controlled by an 8-year-old. Kidnapping, although very unlikely, is a fear of mine.

Also they could get hurt, or damage something. "Am I wrong?" Also at what age can the oldest be left alone at home to baby-sit the others?

DEAR FATHER: "Overprotective"? Not in my book. Three children, 7 and under should not be left in the care of an 8-year-old.

Furthermore, children under 12 should not be left unsupervised in a toy department or any other department, for that matter. Unattended children have been known to "disappear" from shopping malls and other public places.

The age at which a child is competent to look after younger siblings would depend on the level of maturity of the child. In my view, the average 8-year-old lacks four or five years to qualify.

Future federal funding is at stake

Federal highway aid is critical to Idaho's roads. Idaho receives \$39 million a year in federal funds for non-interstate highways and bridges and \$25 million a year for interstate completion. Test flights set to demonstrate noise levels

HAILEY — A series of flights has been scheduled to demonstrate the flight approach path and noise levels created when Horizon Airline planes land from the north aided by a recently installed microwave landing system.

The demonstration was planned after Hailey residents complained about noise and safety problems they believe the new landing system will cause. Their complaints have also led to consideration of a change in the composition of the Blaine County Airport Commission to give Hailey representatives a voting majority. Test flights will be held Sunday with Horizon's Dash 8s landing from the north at Friedman Memorial Airport at 8:40 a.m., 11:25 a.m., 3:05 p.m. and 6:45 p.m.

In addition to giving residents a chance to witness firsthand the approach, a noise abatement expert from Cauffman Associates of Kansas City will be in town to measure the decibel output of the Dash 8 as it approaches Friedman. Such a test of the Dash 8 has not been conducted previously.

Paschal Drake, the airport manager and Hailey mayor, has been working to coordinate the demonstration flight after the Blaine County Airport Commission requested he do so during its Oct. 4 meeting. At that meeting, airport and county Commissioner Robert Gardner said he thought a test flight including a landing approach and a missed approach would clear up a lot of the misinformation the public had about the MLS.

The MLS was installed this summer and will be used by Horizon's Dash 8 aircraft only. Use of the MLS re-

quires aircraft land from the north over the major residential section of town as well as two schools, the hospital and the firm stations.

A series of training flights this summer between the hours of 3 a.m. and 4 a.m. drew protest from Hailey residents, prompting a town meeting with Horizon and FAA officials and the airport commission in September. Issues such as late-night flights and the safety factor of northern landings were the primary concerns.

The airport commission also requested a public hearing to determine a curfew for the airport. The hearing was to be held one week after the demonstration flight, but as of Tuesday, Drake said a hearing would not be held until late November or early December.

At the October meeting, airport commissioner and Sun Valley Mayor Ruth Leider made the motion to im-

plement a curfew between the hours of 11 p.m. and 6 a.m.

Drake said if weather creates a situation where the minimum decision height is too low (pilots must be able to see the runway at a point 2,500 feet above the ground 4.2 miles out), Horizon will reschedule two flights for Monday. Horizon chose Sunday to perform the demonstration flights because more people would be at home on a weekend than during a weekday, Drake said.

The Hailey City Council voted Monday night to begin negotiations with the Blaine County Board of Commissioners to reconstitute the airport commission. The commission now has seven representatives: two from Hailey City Council, two from Blaine County, and one each from the cities of Bellevue, Ketchum and Sun

January date set for waste suit trial

TWIN FALLS — The city of Twin Falls will get its day in court — but it will have to wait more than a year.

It will be worth the wait because if successful, the city could make more than \$1 million from its litigation against Envirotech Systems Inc. of California over the city's wastewater-treatment plant.

The city and Envirotech will go to trial beginning Jan. 9, 1989 in U.S. District Court in Boise on the question of damages only, said John Hohnhorst from the law firm of Heworth, Nungesser, Felton and Lezami. The firm represents the city.

In a December 1986 ruling, a U.S. 9th Circuit Court remanded the case back to the federal district court for a hearing on damages that resulted from the equipment the city purchased from Envirotech for its plant.

Attorney John Heworth said previously that the potential damages could hit more than \$1 million, including the amount the city spent hauling sludge from the once-troubled plant.

The circuit court also upheld the \$1.2 million judgment against Envirotech delivered by a federal jury from the initial trial in the case in 1984. The judgment is one of the largest in the state.

Hohnhorst said the trial is expected to take one month, which is considerably less than the more than three months it took to try the case three years ago. The second jury in the case will not have to determine who is responsible.

The only issue is how much to pay the city, Hohnhorst said. "Envirotech didn't come out well at all."

The reason for the year-long delay in getting the case back in court is due to the busy schedule of the two federal judges serving the state, Hohnhorst said. It would

have been easier to find time for a two to three-day trial, but the city required a block of four weeks.

If the jury reaches a decision in the second trial in February, 1989, it will be almost five years to the day after a jury decided in the city's favor in the first trial, he said.

"It tells you that it takes five years to appeal and retry a case," Hohnhorst said.

Before the trial, the federal district court will probably rule on three pending motions related to costs and attorney fees from previous actions in the case, which could mean more than \$100,000 for the city, he said.

Envirotech lawyer, Rob Anderson of Boise, was taking depositions and not available for comment Thursday.

Lawyers representing the city and Envirotech met in September to discuss pre-trial actions and talk settlement, but nothing was resolved.

The case was initiated in September 1976, when the federal government filed an action against the city over its failure to meet environmental standards at the plant.

In March 1978 the city filed an action against Envirotech, engineers, manufacturers and other companies responsible for the construction of a secondary plant between 1974-76. Envirotech manufactured pollution-control equipment.

After the case went to trial in 1984, the other parties paid the judgments against them. Only Envirotech appealed.

The city had also appealed to the circuit court seeking more consequential damages.

The complex litigation may not end after the trial in 1989. There could be appeals of the jury decision and requests for costs and fees related to the second trial.

"We haven't even begun to think about these," Hohnhorst said.

In its 1987-88 budget, officials estimated the city would receive \$9.9 million from the lawsuit.

Eastern company buys KEZJ station

TWIN FALLS — The two founders of a new company have bought a Twin Falls station with a FM music format and they are looking for more stations.

B and B Broadcasting of Stanford, Conn., is paying \$970,000 for KEZJ-FM and KEZJ-AM, said B and B President George Broadbin. The sale is subject to FCC approval, which Broadbin says could take 60 days.

"We looked at a lot of stations, from Florida all the way to Oregon," Broadbin said. "We like the location of it and we feel that a lot of other areas of the country just didn't have the same kind of format."

The stations were owned by KSRV Inc., which is based in Twin Falls and owned by Dave Capps. KEZJ-AM used to be KEEP-AM, but it switched its "Golden Oldies" format — rock 'n' roll hits from the '50s, '60s and '70s — to country music in August.

Broadbin and Bob Barron of Denver own B and B Broadcasting and for now Broadbin says they don't expect to make any changes at the station.

"We like the country-western format," Broadbin said. "When we first came in there, we're not going to be changing it, but it doesn't mean if we get there and the community wants something different, we won't listen."

The decision to buy KEZJ came after a search from Florida to Oregon, Broadbin said.

The two broadcasters say they were looking for a fairly stable economy, and Broadbin said he felt the agricultural economy in Twin Falls combined with the recent decision by Twin Falls to locate a window-manufacturing plant in Twin Falls indicated the valley's economy fit that bill.

"That was one of the deciding factors," Broadbin said. "We also think the station is a very viable product."

That product included excellent management, Broadbin said, and he said B and B doesn't expect to make any personnel changes.

KEZJ General Manager Terry Tario said the new owners appear to be serious about the business.

"These guys are real young and real serious and have a lot of money," Tario said. "They will keep everything the same. They will come in and assume ownership, but won't assume management."

The station has been doing extremely well, so we were able to sell station for a very favorable price," Capps said. "It would seem to be a perfect fit between buyers and seller to do what we had been doing and what they want to do in the future."

Capps has been operating KEZJ since 1973, and KSRV Inc. has owned the station since 1969.

Skywest adds 30-seat craft to fleet serving Twin Falls

TWIN FALLS — A 30-seat aircraft with "all the amenities" will be added to the Skywest Airline fleet serving Twin Falls.

A jet-propeller EMB-120, nicknamed the Brasilia because it was manufactured in Brazil, will start its one-day run Dec. 15, said Skywest Marketing Director Donna Jardine.

The pending arrival of Brasilia was announced Tuesday at a meeting of the board of the Twin Falls-Sun Valley Regional Airport.

"Brasilia is the next generation, if you will. It has all the amenities of a larger plane," Jardine said. The aircraft has overhead storage, a flight attendant, lavatory, taller seats and more leg room.

Skywest headquarters in St. George, Utah, now offers five flights a day out of Twin Falls. Passengers are transported in a 19-seat twin-engine pressurized Metroliners.

"The Brasilia will take the place of one of the Metroliners in serving, Jardine said. It will depart Salt Lake City at 12:20 p.m. and arrive in Twin Falls at 1:10 p.m. Fifteen minutes later it will depart Twin Falls and arrive in Salt Lake City at 2:15 p.m. to connect with a Delta Airline's bank of flights out of the Utah airport, she said. Delta and Skywest have a marketing agreement.

The bottom line for the traveler is that a ride on the new silver plane will cost no more than other flights to Salt Lake City, she said.

The new aircraft will be introduced in conjunction with a new Skywest service between Salt Lake City

and Palm Springs, Calif., Jardine said. With the new service and aircraft, there was enough time to pick up Twin Falls.

"Another factor in bringing the Brasilia to Twin Falls was the airport board's campaign to encourage travelers to fly out of Twin Falls, she said.

"We figured it's a way to support that program as well," Jardine said.

The business Skywest does in Twin Falls supported the addition of the new aircraft.

Preliminary reports for October show a 28 percent increase in bookings since June, Jardine said. She credits the airport "Fly Smart" campaign.

"It's been a continual increase," added Jardine. Skywest has purchased five Brasilia aircraft and has an option for 29 more, Jardine said. It was selected because its economic factors were similar to those of the Metroliners, she said. The new aircraft is fast, with a cruising speed of more than 300 miles per hour.

The new aircraft is meant to supplement the Skywest fleet, she said. The Metroliners will be used on shorter flights and the Brasilia on longer routes or where more capacity is required.

Dr. Greg Kadlec, the board member that spearheaded the "Fly Smart" campaign, was pleased about the airline's announcement.

"Things are looking up," he said.

The board and Skywest will cooperate on a promotion scheduled the first of the year, Kadlec said.

The airport board and Horizon Airlines, which also serves Twin Falls, hold almost six-week campaign to encourage people to depart from Twin Falls instead of driving in Salt Lake City or Boise to catch a plane.

Murder suspect charged

TWIN FALLS — Roy W. Haffner, 47, was arraigned Thursday afternoon on a first degree murder charge and immediately returned to the county jail without bond.

He is charged with the stabbing death of Jesus Hernandez Tuesday at the Haffner residence.

Haffner requested county paid legal service and public defender Michael Wood was appointed by the court. Wood asked for a preliminary hearing and requested a bond of \$25,000 be set.

Magistrate Mel Edwards denied bond but said the preliminary hearing will be set within the customary 14 days. Chief Deputy Prosecutor Rockne Lammers asked that the court not set bond because of the seriousness of the crime.

Haffner, who sat through the arraignment in handcuffs holding his arms behind him, told the court he understood the first degree murder charge against him. He also indicated that he understood he faces a maximum death sentence.

The complaint charging first degree murder stated that Haffner stabbed Hernandez with a knife, sending a 9-inch blade through the heart, the diaphragm and into the liver. Hernandez, 60, of Twin Falls, died minutes later at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center.

Information in the case file shows Haffner came to Twin Falls about four to five years ago from California, and that he had served three years and five months in a California prison for armed robbery.

Court information also shows that Haffner telephoned Twin Falls police about 3:07 p.m., saying there was someone in his home he wanted removed. Records show that when police asked the name of the individual Haffner voiced a threat to kill the individual.

Police reported hearing scuffling when they arrived at the address and on entering were told by Haffner that the individual he wanted removed was on the floor in the kitchen.

A psychiatrist who interviewed Haffner Tuesday, following the death, stated that he was aware that there was a strong smell of alcohol on the suspect at that time.

Marie Craig, formerly of Laramie, Wyo., said if Zillah told the jury she loved her mother, "I would have to say it was a lie."

Zillah had testified last week her lover, the late Order leader Robert

Mathews, told her of a plot by his white supremacist group to kill Berg and that he planned to send her mother, Jean Craig, to Denver to trail Berg.

Zillah had told the jury she loved her mother. But Marie-Craig said her granddaughter "very often expressed hatred for her mother" as she was growing up. She also testified that Zillah suffered depression, once threatened to kill herself, and was placed in a state hospital when she was 17.

On trial, in addition to Craig, are David Lane, Richard Scutari and Bruce Pierce.

Stocks score strong advances after good news on trade front

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market ran up a strong gain Thursday, getting its inspiration from better-than-expected news on the nation's international trade position.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials jumped 61.01, or 3.21 percent, to 1,960.21, for its seventh largest point gain on record.

Advancing issues outnumbered declines by about 7 to 2 on the New York Stock Exchange, with 1,312 up, 371 down and 317 unchanged.

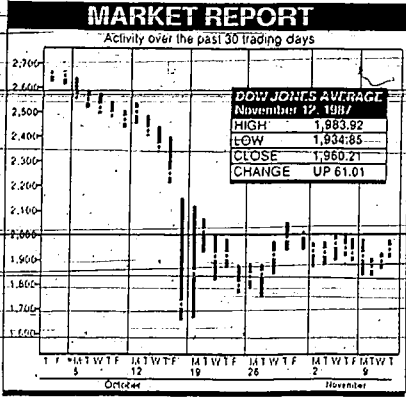
Big Board volume totaled 206.28 million shares, against 147.85 million in the previous session.

Before the market opened the Commerce Department reported that the nation's trade deficit narrowed in September, with imports exceeding exports by \$1.08 billion.

Analysts said investors were relieved to have a pleasant surprise for once in the international trade news, after three consecutive months of disappointments that dealt stocks a severe setback.

The heaviest concentration of buying came at the opening, with the Dow climbing more than 60 points as the first trades of the day took place in the stocks that make up the average.

For the rest of the session, the



Dow bounced around in a narrow range. Brokers said many participants turned their attention to the continuing negotiations in Washington toward a federal budget plan.

Among actively traded blue chips, International Business Machines gained 3 to 122.94; General Electric 2 1/4 to 46.94; American Express 1 1/4 to 26.74,

and American Telephone & Telegraph 1 to 29.76.

Ford Motor picked up 2 3/4 to 74.75. The company announced a new stock buyback program running to as much as \$2 billion.

Japanese stocks were broadly higher after the Tokyo market rallied, reversing a four-session decline.

New corporate health rules could hit U.S. business hard

WASHINGTON (AP) — A study said Thursday that anticipated new accounting regulations could have a major impact on big business — reducing stock market prices, affecting corporate takeover decisions and altering benefits to retired

employees.

The study, conducted by Milliman & Robertson, a consulting actuarial firm, analyzed the possible impact of expected regulations by the Financial Accounting Standards Board requiring U.S. companies to deduct the projected cost of health care for retired employees from corporate profits.

"The wide-ranging effects would come about because most companies have had no money aside and have very little idea of the huge costs they face in providing health insurance to retired employees," said officials of the non-profit Employee-Benefit-Research-Institute.

The total impact on all corporations has been estimated between \$100 billion and \$2 trillion.

"It's a bit of a bombshell sitting there that could have a very significant impact on corporate values," said Dallas Salisbury, president of the institute which studies issues related to Medicare, Social Security and other employee benefits.

"Very, very few companies that promise these benefits have really looked beyond the tips of their noses on liabilities inherent in the promise," Salisbury said in an interview.

The 226-page study, "Measuring and Funding Corporate Liabilities

for Retiree Health Benefits," estimates that the average accrued cost for companies which provide such a benefit will be \$2,000 annually per current employee.

"Companies would not be obligated to set this money aside but it would be listed as a liability against profits,"

Based on profits reported by the Fortune 600 companies, subtracting this figure would reduce profits by 14 percent for companies at the top of the list and wipe out profits of some companies. The study estimates average losses in paper profits of 30 percent to 60 percent.

Large corporations that have post-retirement health plans would decline sharply in value, while those that have no such obligation would gain an advantage in corporate mergers, he said.

William A. Reimert, a consulting analyst with Milliman & Robertson, said there would be pressure on companies to alter their health plans, particularly for future employees.

Reimert said the regulations might lead some companies to provide full benefits only to employees who have been with the company for 25 or 30 years, or they might offer only minimum coverage, with retirees given the option of paying for additional benefits.

Congress is also considering sev-

eral measures that might affect the cost of corporate health plans, including expansion of mandatory health care benefits to the elderly.

"Rules by the standards board, which is the self-regulating agency of the accounting industry, required

for the first time this year that companies accrue pension expenses. But the impact has been minimal because pension programs are usually funded separately.

Some companies are considering similar funds for post-retirement health insurance, but new tax regulations limit the amount companies

"If Congress agrees that these are important benefits, then companies should be encouraged to accumulate funds to pay for these benefits while they are financially healthy," said Reimert.

"Alternatively, if retiree medical benefits are not considered important enough to justify such a tax expenditure, companies should be permitted to restructure their programs in an orderly manner to a long-term affordable level."

The institute estimates that 76 percent of health plan participants in medium and large corporations have coverage that continues after early retirement, with 90 percent of those covered after age 65.

Know how to shift income, deductions

Knowing which income and deductions can be shifted from one year to another is crucial to your year-end tax planning. But it's just as important to know how to shift them.

This is especially true when your receipts or expenses are paid by checks, either coming in or going out. Your aim is to be sure they are handled in the proper year so you can plan accordingly.

First, examine the rules on year-end checks when you are on the receiving end.

The rule of thumb is that any income unaffordably available to you is taxable the moment it becomes available, whether or not the cash is actually in your hands. To illustrate:

If you receive a check in December, but don't cash it until January, its income in the year you receive it — even if you get the check after banking hours on the last business day of that year. Or, say that instead of picking up your salary check, your company deposits it in your bank on the last business day of the year. Your check is credited to your account on Jan. 2.

Result: It's still income in the prior year because you could have had the check given to you in that year.

In another case, let's suppose XYZ Inc., a publicly-held company, mails out its dividend checks on December 29. You receive your check early in January. Result: The

dividend is taxed to you when it is received — in January.

Now, take the receipt rule, turn it around, and you have the rule when you're on the paying end.

If you deliver a check for a deductible item this year, it's deductible this year. That's the case even if it's delivered on the last minute of December 31. The same rule applies if you mail a check. Putting the check in the mail is treated the same as hand delivering it.

Q: Suppose I mail a check in December that's dated for next year. Can I claim a 1987 deduction?

A: No. A post-dated check is not deductible by the payer (or included in the income of the payee) until the date written on it, even if it's mailed or hand delivered sooner.

Keep this in mind: A check made out to a payee won't by itself be accepted as evidence of an expense deduction. You will need a letterized bill, or a receipted bill, plus the check.

Instead of paying your medical

bills or making your charitable contributions by check, you may prefer to use a credit card.

Favorable tax treatment: You can deduct the expense in the year it is charged. Thus, if you charge a medical bill on your bank credit card in 1987, you can deduct the expense on your 1987 tax return — even though you don't make the payment to the bank until 1988.

More timely information on timing and taxes. Say you and your spouse file a joint tax return. You expect to have about \$3,700 in deductible expenses in 1987 and the same amount in 1988. Without any shifting of deductions, you would be entitled to the \$3,700 standard deduction in 1987 and the larger \$5,000 standard deduction in 1988. Total over the two years: \$8,700. But suppose you are able to pull, say, \$1,000 of deductible 1988 expenses into 1987.

By shifting those expenses, your deductible expenses for 1987 come to \$4,700. \$1,000

you itemize this year and take the standard deduction in 1988 — for total deductions of \$9,700 over the two-year period. At high bracketing, you have deducted an additional \$940.

Note: The standard deduction of \$5,000 for marrieds filing jointly (\$3,700 for singles) took effect in 1987 for taxpayers who are age 65 or over, or who are blind. What's more, starting with 1987, taxpayers are no longer entitled to an extra personal exemption deduction.

Instead, they receive a larger standard deduction. The additional deduction is \$600 per spouse for married taxpayers and \$750 for singles. Thus, an couple over age 65 is eligible for a \$6,000 standard deduction in both 1987 and 1988. This means they need to surpass that threshold before shifting deductions will have a tax-saving impact.

Brown, Green or White? Heisman's up for grabs

Pick a color.

• Brown, as in Tim, wide receiver, running back, kick returner, Notre Dame.

• Green, as in Gaston, running back, UCLA.

• White, as in Lorenzo, running back, Michigan State.

Pick a letter.

"H" for Heisman, as in Bobby Humphrey, running back, Alabama.

As in Craig "Ironhead" Heyward, running back, Pitt.

The surnames of five of the 51 Heisman Trophy winners begin with the letter "H": Tom Harmon of Michigan in 1940, Les Horvath of Ohio State in 1944 and three Notre Dame players: Leon Hart in 1949, Paul Hornung in 1956 and John Huarte in 1964.

Huarte was the last of Notre Dame's record six Heisman winners and No. 7 count became a reality when the 1987 voting is announced on Dec. 5.

"Unless the votes are counted in Central America, Tim Brown wins it," said Ben Cook, an ESPN commentator, former sportsman for ABC and one-time publicity information director at the University of Pittsburgh.

At the start of the season, Brown was considered the favorite over Florida quarterback Kevin Bell and tailback Green of UCLA. Jamie Morris of Michigan, Thurman Thomas of Oklahoma State and Lorenzo White of Michigan State Tailback-defensive back Gordie

Lockbaum of Division I-AA, Holy Cross, a two-way performer, was a sentimental favorite.

You won't find Brown among the nation's leaders in receiving (28 catches for 615 yards and three touchdowns); rushing (127-26, one TD) or kickoff returns (17-351, no touchdowns). But he did rank 10th in punt returns, 12th in yardage per average, and three touchdowns, one short of the major-college single-season record, and opponents consistently try to kick away from him.

All his statistics, going into this weekend's games, added up to a No. 2 ranking in all-purpose yardage with 128.6 per game.

McMahon says his right arm just ain't what it used to be

The hottest arm in the National Football League probably should not be described as withered and lifeless.

BOSTON (AP) — Last season, Gordie Lockbaum finished fifth in the Heisman Trophy voting, a significant achievement for a Division I-AA player.

His ability to play both on offense and defense for Holy Cross obviously won him a lot of admiration and more than a few votes.

"It's tough to say," Lockbaum said of his chances this year, when he has been playing a diminished role.

"I'm hanging in there in the sense that really nobody has jumped out and taken my job," he said. "I have chances. I may be hurt by my role on the team."

A senior this season, he is averaging 65.8 plays on offense and 14.2 on defense.

"He is third on the team with 327 rushing yards and second with 53 receptions. He leads Holy Cross in punt returns and kickoff returns, has punted once for 36 yards and threw his first college completion, a 10-yard touchdown, last Saturday against Harvard."

The Packers are coming off a 28-24 loss to Chicago last Sunday in Green Bay. The Bears won on a 52-yard field goal by Kevin Butler with four seconds left.

In addition, Gregg knows how difficult it will be for Green Bay to beat Seattle in the Kingdom. In five seasons under Knox, the Seahawks have won 75 percent of their regular-season Kingdom games going 27-9.

"As I see them, they're a good, well-rounded football team," Gregg said. "I'd say the talent level on that team is the highest I've seen."

He said the Seahawks compared very favorably with the Bears, whom the Packers play twice every season. The Packers and the Bears are in the NFC Central.

"I'd say it would be a very interesting ball game," he said.

Green Bay will be making its first-over regular-season appearance in the Kingdom although the Packers did lose an exhibition game in Seattle in 1983, 38-21.

The Packers and the Seahawks have met four times previously, with Green Bay holding a 3-1

advantage.

On defense, he has 16 tackles, including two sacks, and one fumble recovery. He plays on special teams.

His 17 touchdowns rank him third in the nation in Division I-AA with 11.3 points per game. He is fourth with an average of 174.4 all-purpose yards and 14.1 in catches per game.

Coach Mark Duffner said, "He's our best tackler. He can catch like a rascal. He's got balance. He's got moves. He's got everything."

His last opportunities to improve his statistics will be in the final home game Saturday against William & Mary and his last college game the following Thursday night at Villanova. Holy Cross should be heavy favorites in both.

Duffner had no intention of keeping Lockbaum on the sidelines when the season began.

"If anything, we had made a conscious decision to increase his role," Duffner said. "We won 10 games using him that way last year, so we figured let's try to improve by using more of it."

"But we've just been able to get out in front of teams at halftime and we haven't needed him as much on defense in the second half."

Quarterback Jeff Wiley, who has thrown 30 touchdowns passes this year, said the Crusaders were aware their offense would have to be more diversified.

"We know coming into the year, and only in the season a lot of teams were paying more special attention to Gordie," he said. "They soon found out they weren't able to do that."

"We've been trying to get him the ball in different ways with short passes rather than pitches or handoffs," Duffner said. "He may have a better opportunity to make a bigger play with not as many people in pursuit."

Early last season, Lockbaum said, some teammates might have had feelings about his publicity.

"This year," he said, he's still doing about 10 interviews a week, but "players are bringing in articles for me from their hometown papers."

Lockbaum thinks he will be drafted by an NFL team and be able to play safety, on special teams and as a running back on third-down situations.

Phoenix bids millions to woo Cardinals west

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — The cities of Tempe and Phoenix, along with Arizona State University, have offered St. Louis Cardinals owner Bill Bidwill a \$10 million package in an attempt to lure the NFL team to Arizona, officials say.

Burton Barr, a former state House of Representatives speaker who represents Phoenix in the negotiations, said the offer could be worth even more, depending on attendance and a formula for dividing the revenue from proposed luxury skyboxes.

The negotiating team contacted other cities Wednesday to see whether they would support the move, Barr said.

Jim O'Connell, Arizona State executive director of public events, said the university has been told that Bidwill would not move his team for less than \$7 million.

Bidwill also has investigated Jacksonville, Fla., which reportedly is offering guaranteed solutions in an 80,000-seat stadium for 10 years, Memphis, Tenn.,

and Baltimore.

O'Connell said officials showed Bidwill preliminary figures that indicated \$10 million could be generated from ticket sales, lease, parking and concessions next season.

The figure was based on an average attendance of 50,000 at the regular season and one exhibition game at Arizona State's 70,000-seat Sun Devil Stadium, he said.

Under the plan, the Cardinals would get about 90 percent of ticket revenue based on a \$20 ticket, and all of the proceeds from 5,000-loge seats at about \$500 per seat per season.

The university and the team would split parking and concession money, O'Connell said. He also said the university would make at least \$2 million from the arrangement.

The possible construction of 60 skyboxes, the availability of Arizona State's list of 60,000 season-ticket holders and a training facility at Tempe also are on the bargaining table, Brent Brown, Arizona State's negotiator, said.

Coliseum ghosts still plague resident team with quarterback controversies

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A ghost emerges yearly from a Los Angeles Coliseum to torment the local pro football quarterbacks, coaches and fans.

A spell is cast in which nobody will be the big one and a talented passer leaves town.

The past is filled with names that revive memories of battles for jobs and choices that were made. Among them: Waterfield, Van Brocklin, Gabriel-Munson, Harris-Jaworski, Harris-Haden, Haden-Namath, Ferganoso.

This year, it's Wilson-Hilger. Evans-Plunkett, the four quarterbacks of the Los Angeles Raiders.

"For decades," the Los Angeles Rams, followed into the Coliseum by the Raiders in 1982, have been consistent winners who could not win the big one. Coaches and fans doubt the Rams' question: Which of our talented quarterback can win it all for us?

Inevitably, the loser left for Philadelphia, where Norm Van Brocklin won an NFL title and both Roman Gabriel and Ron Jaworski had extended careers, throwing lots of touchdown passes for losing

teams.

When the Raiders inherited the Coliseum and the ghost, the script didn't adapt well to a team with just one superb quarterback, Jim Plunkett, who led them to Super Bowl triumphs in 1981 for Oakland and 1984 for Los Angeles.

But Plunkett's age and injuries and the arrival of Marc Wilson revived kind of "almost" seasons that were the Rams' specialty for 30 years. Promising talents in 1984 and 1985 self-destructed in first round playoff losses to Seattle 13-7 and New York 27-20.

This year, three victories have been followed by five straight losses, and the Raiders' trail division leader San Diego by four games with seven to play. "It's not late," Managing General Partner Al Davis said after the Raiders' latest loss, a 31-20 setback at Minnesota. In the second half of that game, he sent word to Coach Tom Flores to change quarterbacks.

Wilson went in for Rusty Hilger, who had thrown three interceptions, Wilson was a couple

of inches better than Hilger, being intercepted just once, while being sacked by the Vikings three times as a Raider rally fell short.

Now, the Raiders have decided to give Wilson, an annual disappointment in the last year of a \$1 million contract, the starting role in Sunday night's game, on the road, against AFC West Division leader San Diego.

"Rusty has been pressing a little bit," Flores said. "We feel right now ... it's best to go with more experience."

Hilger is undaunted. "If you fall off a horse you get right back on. We're in a position now where we've got a horse with a couple of broken legs," he said.

Wilson, not looking beyond Sunday night's game, said: "I've had some good games against San Diego in the past. A year ago he was AFC player of the week for his 314 yards and two touchdowns in a win over San Diego that ended a three-game Raider losing streak."

Some see humor in the situation. When informed that Wilson had been named Sunday's starter,

Raider linebacker Matt Miller re-emerged as a backup in the lap, covered his face with it, and broke into apparent, repeated laughs.

Composing himself, Miller said: "I don't want to say anything bad about Rusty. He's out there trying just as hard as everyone else, doing the best he can. But he's got limited experience. Marc's been there before. That will pick us up. I'm flustered that you do it now when sometimes you think it should have been done earlier, but it's not your decision to make."

But what about Vince Evans and Plunkett?

Evans was the Raiders' quarterback during the strike. Plunkett, who turns 40 next month, has been on the inactive list all season after undergoing arthroscopic surgery on his throwing shoulder during the off-season.

Plunkett reportedly is ready to play, and Flores said he has been getting more work in practice recently. Either Plunkett or Evans could be activated to be eligible to play at San Diego, but neither move is likely.

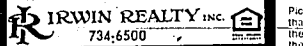

It's about sharing her expression

TWIN FALLS — Paula Stern expresses herself artfully through words as well as through music.

Stern, guest violin soloist for the Magic Valley Symphony concert Saturday night, finds her music a very personal, beautiful and harmonious way to express herself.

"It is a source of expression that is at the same time very personal and all encompassing of all the (symphony) musicians...so at once it's very, very personal but yet shared among all the musicians playing together," said Stern after an evening rehearsal held earlier this week.

Stern's vehicle of expression is the violin which she has played since she was 7 years old.

"I do feel that the violin is one of the most expressive instruments. And that is part of my attraction to the instrument," she said.

Watching the slim and graceful Stern re-

hearse with the symphony gives one the impression that Stern has become part of the instrument.

In fact, to Stern the violin is like an extension of her body and the warm-up period before a performance not only gets fingers moving, but also is a way of "inviting your instrument to become a part of you."

Stern is presently the concertmaster of the Boise Philharmonic and performs extensively with the Boise Philharmonic String Quartet. She will help inaugurate the Magic Valley Symphony's season on Saturday playing Violin Concerto in C Major by Dimitri Kabalevsky with the 60-piece orchestra under the direction of Carson Wong.

Also included in the program, scheduled to begin at 8 p.m. in the Fine Arts Auditorium at the College of Southern Idaho, are Brahms' Academic Festival Overture and Schubert's Symphony No. 7. Tickets are \$5 for adults and \$3 for students and are available at Ann's Hallmark Warner Music and Music Center.

Soloist-Stern has been intolud in music all her life. She received a degree in music therapy from Michigan State and a degree in music performance from Washington State.

50 years later,

The world is still rhapsodic for Gershwin

In February 1937, George Gershwin, then at the height of his popularity, blacked out momentarily while playing his Piano Concerto in F at a concert in Los Angeles.

Less than six months later, following an increasingly debilitating series of headaches and dizzy spells that eluded diagnosis until almost the very end, George Gershwin died of a brain tumor. He was 38.

Though he had no foreboding of his early death, he was known, somewhat perversely, to have asked his friends from time to time whether they thought his music would live, whether he had written anything of lasting importance.

Whatever answer they gave him, however affirmative or flattering, probably would have underestimated the importance of his music as the voice of American music, bestowed on him more or less informally in the '30s, has hardened into an indisputable truth in the 50 years since his death.

Consider the range of observances trotted out for this anniversary year:

An August PBS television special, "George Gershwin Remembered," tracing in detail his life and career.

Elaborately researched productions of his two political musical comedies, "Of Thee I Sing" and "Let 'Em Eat Cake," at the Brooklyn Academy of Music last spring.

A major, new biography, "Gershwin" (Doubleday, \$21.95), by Gershwin biographer Edward Jablonski.

A blizzard of recordings featuring both the popular and the serious works, including some that resurrect previously lost material.

But Gershwin in 1987 is not merely a distant historical object. Indeed, his melodies are so much a part of modern musical currency that his not being alive sometimes seems almost a minor footnote to a still-flourishing career.

Just a few months ago, playwright Neil Simon announced plans to write a new musical around the tunes of Gershwin and his brother Ira (Simon went on to say that when the new, as yet untitled, show appears on the theater marquee, the Gershwins will get top billing).

A few seasons ago, Gershwin songs were incorporated into the show "My One and Only," which ran for more performances in New York than most of the composer's shows did in their original run, and later successfully toured the globe.

Woody Allen used Gershwin's music exclusively for his film "Manhattan." And just this weekend, director Ridley Scott unveiled his new film, "Someone to Watch Over Me," which makes central use — in three different versions, no less — of one of Gershwin's most abiding tunes.

What is it about the man, born in Manhattan in New York in 1898, that continues to fascinate and attract us in a way clearly different from other composers?


There are, of course, the show tunes: "Embraceable You," "Love Walked In," "They Can't Take That Away From Me," "A Foggy Day" and dozens of others, standards all.

But in terms of more substantive music, as these are, it is hard to make a case that Gershwin's theater songs are somehow surpassingly better or more original than those of his finest Broadway colleagues. The show tunes of Jerome Kern, Irving Berlin and Richard Rodgers cannot be written off as inferior to Gershwin's, however much Gershwin partisans may wish to ascribe some extra measure of sophistication or style to his tunes.

No, the thing that clearly sets Gershwin apart is that he tried to break down the almost mythical barrier between the popular music of Broadway and the artistry from the cultivated music of the

Film Bureau aims to get Idaho a bite of the \$18-billion pie

BOISE — On Aug. 29, a major production descended on the town of Richfield.

Like a small army base, the town had been carefully prepared by set designers in cooperation with Richfield locals. Lemmon Hardware and Paulson Garage had been transformed and cars and trucks from the late 1950s and early 1960s lined

Main Street. The vintage vehicles had been recruited along with their drivers to play a part in the filming of "Hemingway," a miniseries to be aired in April, 1988.

While the crew set up camera dollies and sunlight reflectors, Richfield locals set up lawn chairs in the gas station parking lot adjacent to the film set. By the end of the next week, the town would look the same as it had before the art director had ever even heard of Richfield, but

The film industry is an \$18 billion business. Marilyn Monroe's "Bus Stop," Clint Eastwood's "Pale Rider," numerous commercials, and, most recently, "Hemingway," among others, have allowed Idaho an occasional bite of the industry's pie.

In a first-time effort to claim more consistent attention from the big business of filmmaking, Idaho's Department of Commerce sponsored a workshop this week for members of the film community and allied services. "Sell Idaho" was the main focus of Monday's workshop which affirmed the state's commitment to film promotion as a means for economic development.

In the past, Idaho lacked the money to enter the rigorous competition so prevalent in the film industry. Times are changing. The Department of Commerce directed \$80,000 of its \$1.8 billion budget to a newly created Film Bureau. Promoter entices them, Idaho nabs them

KETCHUM — It's a clean, non-polluting industry which boosts Idaho's image nationally. No marks or scars are left in its production wake. But dollars are left — many, many dollars.

It's the film industry. Professionals promoting filmmaking in Idaho held a convention in Boise last Monday. Lynn Bishop, president and owner of Idaho Film Services in Ketchum, discussed issues as a representative on the film industry

panel. With four successful years of servicing both in-state and out-of-state production companies through IFS, Bishop boasts Idaho's many selling points.

Idaho offers a newness to filmmakers and advertisers in its vast array of undiscovered vistas. "Advertising is about seeing things in a new light, in doing something that hasn't been done before," Bishop says.

IFS entices prospective advertisers and filmmakers with their 500 location profiles featuring pan-

oramic views of cool mountain lakes, dusty ghost towns, sprawling ranches and outrageous lava formations. "I introduce people to Idaho, and they are surprised at what they find," Bishop says, adding, "Every time I show them spots of Stanley, they buy it."

In August 1986, an 18-person crew shot six Genesee-Beer commercials in the Stanley and Sun Valley areas. They raved about the rugged Sawtooth peaks framing Redfish Lake, and complimented the Forest Service and Fish and Game Department for their cooperation.

Advertisements set in Idaho boost the state's economy directly and indirectly. Besides the influx of production dollars, the state receives free advertising by association. Consumers begin to associate that "great outdoor feeling" not only with the product, in this case Genesee Beer, but also with the place — Idaho.

In addition to a fresh air fame, Bishop promotes other important aspects of Idaho. Hemingway lived in Ketchum, loved Idaho's wilderness and wrote about its serenity. This August, IFS hosted the German-

American crew for "Hemingway," a seven-hour television miniseries starring Stacy Keach as Ernest Hemingway, scheduled to be aired in April 1988.

During its five days of shooting in six different Idaho locations extending between Richfield and the Salmon River headwaters along Highway 75, the "Hemingway" production invested \$200,000 into Idaho.

concert hall.

The vehicle he used for poking the first serious hole in that wall was the jaunty, 10-minute piece for piano and small ensemble, "Rhapsody in Blue."

It would be hard to think of an event in American musical history that has aroused a greater number of solemn pronouncements than the famous 1924 "Experiment in Modern Music" concert at Aeolian Hall in New York, organized by band leader Paul Whiteman, at which the "Rhapsody" was first heard.

Over the years, as age and familiarity have stripped the piece of its initial chicness, critics, while generally affirming its charm, have taken pains to point out the "Rhapsody's" structural weaknesses, its simplistic design. "A series of 32-bar tunes, mostly strung together," to quote one smugly typical specimen. Close at their heels, hip musicologists are quick to add that despite its purported jazz roots, the piece has little to do with real jazz, but rather, derives from the bastardized variant that was Whiteman's stock in trade.

Meanwhile, however, audiences, showing their customary deference to critics, have grown ever fonder and more attached to the piece, especially as performed in the grandiose large orchestra version, typically served up on symphony "Pops" programs (Both that and the original small jazz-band version were orchestrated by Whiteman's arranger, Ferde Grofe).

Today, for all its ostensible defects and period-piece quaintness, the "Rhapsody" together, to quote one, the most well-known, the most often performed, the most recorded and the most widely loved piece of concert music produced by an American.

What does this tell us? In a way, the history of the "Rhapsody" encapsulates the story of America's odd, ambivalent relationship to the whole idea of classical music.

As music historians love to point out, Americans have always been reluctant to place a high value on their own music, considering it for various reasons to be inherently inferior to the work of the immortal European masters. Even with singers and conductors, the United States has reflexively and rather pathetically chased after imported talents while deriding domestic ones.

Gershwin, with his youthful self-confidence, thus became a kind of national symbol for the legitimacy of home-grown music, and the "Rhapsody" was merely the first of his trophies. The Concerto in F appeared the next year, followed by

The 50th anniversary of Gershwin's death has brought forth (or will shortly bring forth) dozens of new recordings. Here is a sampling of some of the more noteworthy ones:

"Gershwin Overtures" (EMI-Angel). Original orchestrations, some of them recorded for the first time, of the overtures to such shows as "Girl Crazy," "Oh, Kay!," "Primrose" and others. John McLaughlin conducts the New Princess Theater Orchestra.

"The I Sing" and "Let Cake" (CBS Masterworks). The cast albums from last season's Brooklyn Academy performances, featuring Larry Kert, Maureen McGovern and Jack Gilford. Michael Tilson Thomas conducts the Orchestra of St. Luke's. Due to be released in mid-to late October.

"Concerto in F, Three Preludes for Piano" (Pro Arto). The twist here is that the concerto is performed in the jazz-band scoring Ferde Grofe distilled from Gershwin's own full-orchestra original. Gunther Schuller conducts the Orchestra of St. Luke's.

"Kirt Sings Gershwin" (EMI-Angel). A nice surprise: a recording of the young and precocious soprano, Kirt O'Connell, singing Gershwin's songs during rehearsal this week.

Some little-known facts about "Gone With the Wind"

While the video cassette recorder has enabled us to enjoy classic films in the comfort of our own living room couch, there are some movies that need to be seen as their makers intended — on the big screen.

"Gone With the Wind" is certainly one of those films.

The movie that depicts the rise and fall of the old South comes to the Magic Valley next week. Presented by The Times-News and Interstate Amusement Inc., "Gone With the Wind" will be shown in Twin Falls on Wednesday night at 8 p.m. and in Jerome on Thursday at 8 p.m.

While there are many myths surrounding the film and its makers, what follows are some known facts published recently by the makers of the "Gone With the Wind" video and by Ronald Haver, in his book entitled "Gone With the Wind."

Although David O. Selznick purchased the movie rights to Margaret Mitchell's novel in 1936, he was unable to begin shooting until 1939. When shooting finally did begin, the production was beset with difficulties. There were countless problems and after only three weeks of shooting, Selznick replaced director George Cukor with Victor Fleming.

Two months later, Fleming went home and refused to work. Selznick then hired Sam Wood to direct. When Fleming returned to the film, the two men split directorial duties.

Among the 60 women who tested for the role of Scarlett were Lucille Ball, Talullah Bankhead, Paulette Godard, Carole Lombard, Lana Turner and Catherine Carr, later the mother of Patty Hearst.

But Selznick was determined "to give the American public a new girl, if possible" and she spent close to \$50,000 testing little-known actresses. While Selznick spent nearly two years searching for his Scarlett, he knew early on that Clark Gable was his Rhett.

In addition to agreeing to pay Gable \$4,500 a week and a bonus of \$16,656, Selznick helped Gable arrange for a divorce so that he could marry Carole Lombard.

In the program that was published at the time of the film's world premiere, Gable wrote: "I never asked to play Rhett. I was one of the last to read the book. The first few times I heard the name Rhett Butler, it was with growing irritation. When it got to the point where Spencer Tracy was greeting me with 'Hello, Rhett,' I read the book."

With Scarlett as his first, the shooting began in the middle of the movie — the scene of Atlanta burning to the ground.

On a Saturday afternoon, with the temperature dropping to 30 degrees, the Technicolor cameras were poised to film the burning of a studio backlot. At 6:50 Selznick arrived to oversee the scene, which for obvious reasons, would be shot only once. While directors and technical crews pressed for Selznick to begin, he said he wanted to wait for his brother Myron to arrive.

At first sight of Myron's car, Selznick gave the signal for the holocaust to begin. Atlanta was already in flames when Myron greeted his brother and introduced his young guests.

"Here's your Scarlett," he said as he introduced Vivian Leigh.

Women composers are left flat by conductors

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. (AP) — German composer Clara Schumann surreptitiously used the name of her famous husband, Robert, to get her works performed before 19th century audiences that thought women lacked the intellect to write music.

Most of Fanny Mendelssohn's compositions were published under the name of her composer brother, Felix, for the same reason.

Although many attitudes have changed since then, female composers still receive a cool reception from the male-dominated music industry.

"I think discrimination against women composers still exists because the prestigious conducting positions are still held by men," said Dr. Marilyn Thomas, associate professor of theory and composition at Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh. "I think it's a problem especially for older women composers."

Thomas, who was in Morgantown for the premier of one of her compositions, "Trio," said women have gained many of the same educational and professional oppor-

tunities as men in the two decades since she began her musical career. However, social differences still exist, and that can mean a woman's work will be overlooked, according to the composer.

"The way most music gets performed on an orchestral level is political," she said. "There is not of friendship in the business — kind of a good old boy network. I guess what we are really talking about is how a woman reaches the level of Bach. Can a woman today really have the opportunity to reach the level of Beethoven? I say yes."

"I think the only problem remaining is a social one." Thomas was one of several female composers and musicians who participated in a recent workshop at West Virginia University. Titled "Turning the Page: Women and Music," the conference participants explored the status of women in the music industry and discussed ways to improve it.

Besides Shumann and Mendelssohn, there have been other female composers of note, including Amy Beach, a 19th century American composer; the late Mary

Lou Williams, a pianist who composed jazz; and Ellen T. Zwilich, a 1983 Pulitzer Prize winner.

However, historians have generally only discussed music in terms of the contributions of men, said Janis Rozema-Peri, co-chairwoman of the workshop. "If you were a woman and you didn't have a famous brother, husband or father you weren't allowed to have any connection with the music world."

"That attitude hasn't completely died, Thomas said. "At the time I studied music theory in the early 1960s it was considered odd for a woman to be a composer," she said. "I once applied for a position where I was basically an organist, but also would have directed the church choir."

"They told me they needed a man because they didn't think a woman could handle the choir."

Thomas said female composers will continue to be stymied until more of their colleagues take up the conductor's baton.

"I think what needs to happen is we need to have more women conductors," she said. "We need to raise the concept that we need a powerful force in front of a sym-

phony orchestra."

Peri, who is an associate professor of music and voice at WVU, said many of her students have difficulty naming a female composer.

"My mother is a composer, and I've seen in no uncertain terms the discrimination of women in music and the hurdles they have to overcome," said Peri, whose mother Zenobia Powell Perry, is a former faculty member of Central State University in Wilberforce, Ohio.

"It's possible for students of music to never encounter a work by a woman composer in their studies," Peri said. "It's important that we make some changes in the body of knowledge which too often excludes women."

Jazz pianist Rose "Chee Chee" Murphy, known for her unique, rhythmic style, said female singers and musicians have had an easier time making it in the industry. Murphy got her start playing jazz standards in 1935 in a smoky Cleveland nightclub for \$14 a night.

"I've never experience prejudice because I'm a woman," she said. "I've always played with men. I've always been the only girl."

Vincent van Gogh's 'Iris' sold for record price

NEW YORK (AP) — Vincent van Gogh's "Iris," the famous depiction of a flower garden at an asylum, was sold for a record \$53.9 million Wednesday for a record \$53.9 million.

The identity of the buyer, who bid by telephone, was not immediately disclosed.

The previous record for a painting was set by another van Gogh masterpiece, "Sunflowers," which sold for \$39.9 million earlier this year to a Japanese insurance

company. "The whole world is looking very closely at the sale of this painting," John L. Marion, chairman of Sotheby's North America, where the "Iris" auction sale was held, had said earlier. "Some see it as an indicator of what the art market is doing."

Some of the approximately 1,000 people attending the auction applauded when the price topped \$40 million.

Marion had said stock market woes would not affect the sale be-

cause other auctions since the Oct. 19 collapse had gone well, including a Nov. 4-5 sale in which Sotheby's recorded the second-highest sale for contemporary art at \$23.4 million.

He had said before the auction that the price paid for "Iris" would be dictated by the sale of "Sunflowers" and the \$20.2 million sale in June of van Gogh's "The Bridge at Trinquetaille." "Iris" is among 95 works of art being auctioned in Sotheby's fall sale of impressionist and modern art. The works include an early Picasso oil painting, "Boulevard de Clichy," expected to bring \$2 million to \$3 million; Claude Monet's "Arbres, Vue du Parc de Fontainebleau," which had an estimated price of \$1 million; and Paul Cezanne's "Arbres au Maitre au Bord de l'Eau," expected to bring at least \$2 million.

"Iris," a 28-by-32-inch oil on canvas, depicts a patch of purple irises and one white bloom in a sea of green stems. It is a study of a flower garden at the Groot-Beyren asylum, which van Gogh entered voluntarily in 1889 for treatment of his mental illness. He lived there until his suicide in 1890 at the age of 37. He sold few if any paintings

during his lifetime.

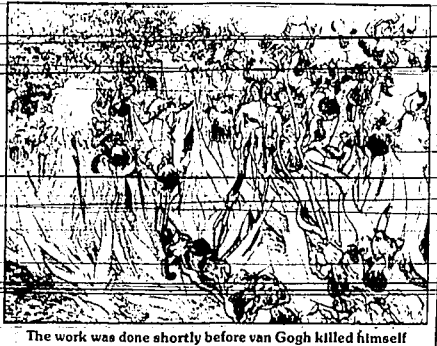
"Iris" had been owned by John Whitney Payson, an art consultant from Maine, whose mother, philanthropist Joan Whitney Payson, acquired it for \$80,000 in 1947, and hung it over the fireplace in her living room.

After her death in 1975, the painting was displayed at Westbrook College in suburban Portland, Maine, in a gallery Payson built in his mother's memory.

Payson said he decided to sell the painting after the "Sunflower" auction because he felt he could not guarantee the safety of a painting potentially worth \$40 million or more. He also cited high insurance costs as a reason for selling the work.

Payson has pledged a portion of the proceeds toward establishing an endowment to support the work of artists and to secure the future of the gallery.

Hours before the auction, a number of art lovers were at Sotheby's for a last-minute viewing. "It's a beautiful painting but hard to believe how much it will be selling for," said one woman from New Jersey.

'Baby Boom' is a modernized fairytale

Her biological clock is on snooze alarm when fate lowers the "Baby Boom" on Diane Keaton. America's 31-year-old career-gals, millions of them, want to be mommies and CEOs, a conflict that is at the crux of this aahh inspiring comedy about a power-luncher who becomes a "substitute" as a sweetly manipulative, it's bound to reassure those birth-death worrywarts.

Keaton, softly lit to look somewhere between 32 and 45, updates Annie Hall as a brisk corporate queenpin who inherits her late cousin's 13-month-old in this diaper dilemma. Here, her aita fit and she doesn't ditch the dots. Ironically, her story is "I vs. Kramer" for females, with Keaton's management consultant as incompetent a nurturer as Dustin Hoffman's divorced ad man. Like Hoffman, Keaton "comes of age" when she gives up her corner office for the crib. Selfishness becomes selflessness as the parent emerges, and the rat race gives over to alloibies. There's no playroom at the top.

J.C. (Keaton) is happily lapping the fast track when the cousin dies and leaves her with Elizabeth, a beaming baby (Kristina and Michelle Kennedy, twins who can coo on cue). J.C. is living with an odi-

ous investment banker played by Harold Ramis, who moves out soon after baby arrives, putting an end to such DINKish diversions as matching bedside speakerphones and the four-minute orgasm.

Neither has the lightest notion how to put a Huggie on a yuppie-puppy, and the best of the comedy comes before the banker breaks it off and the couple grapple with bringing up baby, a la "Three Men and a Cradle."

J.C., lugging baby like an unwieldy briefcase, shops for diapers. They are sized by weight, so she plunks Elizabeth, lovably deadpan, onto a produce scale. Later, she spritzes the toddler with Fantastik to clean off a mess of pasta. The twin actresses submit sweetly to the juggling, as cute as an apronful of kittens.

Yet J.C. puts Elizabeth up for adoption, renegeing when she meets the potential parents, an American Gothic couple from Minnesota. Heaven forbid that a yuppie baby should grow up among simple country folk. "Suddenly I saw her in a handsome, married cop (Tom Berenger) who falls for the murder witness (Mimi Rogers) he's assigned to protect, romance outlasts suspense; the villain is a dutiful psychotic sacrificing himself to the service of the plot. Scott's attempt to collide the blue-collar and chi-chi worlds of the lovers weakens after a brilliant double opening, and his story lacks surprise and depth."

The boardroom grays of the city give way to the autumnal shades of Vermont, where "J.C." buys a farmhouse. Now the pithy comedy

of manners becomes a less inspired variation on the "Newhart" show, as J.C. has problems with her plumbing and meets the quaint locals; inevitably she puts her skills back-to-work, converting an appliance recipe into a gourmet baby-food business worth \$3 million. She seems a little aloof to a graduate of Harvard and Yale, but eventually the old light bulb flickers on.

It's a fairy tale, complete with a prince, who changes her tire and bends her over the fender in a rock-ledge smooth. Sam, Shepard, snaggletoothed-and-hayseed handsome as the town veterinarian, is her rescuer. The endearing relationship with Elizabeth sadly fades as we focus on J.C.'s romance. She does and throws tantrums—the usual stuff of love—but inevitably succumbs to the Doc's banal courtship. And what do you know, just like the Michelob drinkers of the world, she finds, "You can have

it all." Your own business, a baby and a beau.

It's an irresistibly upbeat but manipulative message from director Charles Shyer and producer Nancy Meyers, who co-wrote "Baby Boom." No strangers to family-oriented comedies, the couple also teamed up for "Irreconcilable Differences." Obviously, Shyer and Meyers, parents themselves, are out to save the endangered nuclear family.

Giving up child-rearing and appliance-making are "sacrifices no-body should have to make," grandstands J.C. in the climactic speech—where the moviemakers hammer-home their point: You needn't go through life with an empty stroller. But on another level, they seem to be urging women to get out of the mainstream work force and start up cozy little cottage industries. It's a nonsensical notion but then "Baby Boom" is an '80s fable based on a beard philosophy.

Elegant bible-babble serves up 1 moment

The following are capsule reviews of movies playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

PRINCE OF DARKNESS (R). Some graduate students are summoned by their wild-eyed professor (Victor Wong) and a delirious priest (Donald Pleasence) to an abandoned church, where they are asked to rescue the world from the devil, trapped in what looks like a green lava lamp—and his minions, which include a gang of homeless zombie derelicts. This absurd premise jumbles up "Night of the Living Dead," "The Omen" and director John Carpenter's best film, "The Thing," to no laudable purpose, garbage and glop interspersed with antic antic bible-babble. But Carpenter directs it very elegantly, and there is one paralyzing shock moment at the end.

DIRTY DANCING (PG-13). Smart and funny, touching and unabashedly sensual, this musical love story set in the Catskills in the early '60s is the sweet sleeper of a hot season. Because director Emile Ardolino comes from the "disco" in "dance films" (including "He Makes Me Feel Like Dancing"), he does not insult us with the impossible, the too-early achieved. Instead, the dancing is smart and sympathetic and, as a musical, "Dirty Dancing" is one of the most significant funniest dramas since "Saturday Night Fever," and more involving.

FATAL ATTRACTION (R). For much of its length, this movie weaves between giving us an absorbing battle of the sexes—a true psychological shocker about a scorned woman—systematically persecuting the married man who ditched her, after a clandestine fling—and one more formula revenge saga. At the end, sadly, the formula wins. Glenn Close subtly depicts a terrifying, passionate obsessive turn the movie into bloody predictability. Before then, Close—and Michael Douglas—and director Adrian Lyne—wind-the-tension-up-tight; there is real heat under Lyne's usual gloss. The scariest moments here come when the tension breaks, but from flickering moments of everyday pathology pushed to the limit.

LIKE FATHER, LIKE SON (PG-13). Warm, imaginative comedy that has a brilliant heart surgeon (Dudley Moore) accidentally exchanging brains with his happy-go-lucky teen-age son (Kirk Cameron). With Sean Astin, Catherine Hicks and Patrick O'Neal.

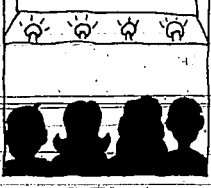
NEAR DARK (R). There is a scary poetic charge to this love-on-the-run Southwest vampire epic; it is much better than "The Lost Boys." An Oklahoma kid becomes entranced with a thin, mysterious blonde. When she follows her, she drinks his blood and dies. He, to her mechanical "family" and plunges him into a landscape of endless night; if sunlight touches them, their skin will burn. The sadistic humor and bloodletting—which mostly limits the movie to horror audiences—here collides with an intense romanticism, and the film, with haunting imagery; a lunar desert landscape and Peckinpah violence and Tournais supernaturalism.

SOMEONE TO WATCH OVER ME (R). Ridley Scott again proves himself a dazzling visual stylist. He and his collaborators fashion a

Gershwinque New York of swooning urban beauty and violent jazzy undercurrents; they almost leave you drunk on glamour. But in this romantic thriller about a handsome, married cop (Tom Berenger) who falls for the murder witness (Mimi Rogers) he's assigned to protect, romance outlasts suspense; the villain is a dutiful psychotic sacrificing himself to the service of the plot. Scott's attempt to collide the blue-collar and chi-chi worlds of the lovers weakens after a brilliant double opening, and his story lacks surprise and depth.

SURRENDER (PG). Shrewd, lively but occasionally crass and contrived romantic comedy starring Sally Field as a struggling artist and Michael Caine as a successful writer, well-burned by women who skimish amusingly as they try to square away love and money. Writer-director Jerry Belson is so honest about relationships it is a shame he did not aim higher, ditching some of the sillier moments. With Steve Guttenberg, terrific as Field's rich, self-absorbed lover.

Bergen portrays original madam Sydney Barrows in CBS TV movie

In 1984, a scandal involving sex, power, old money, new money, beautiful women and a high-class "escort service" was catapulted onto the front pages. Sydney Biddle Barrows, a socialite descended from one of the original Mayflower pilgrims, was arrested for running the Cachet escort service, a thinly disguised call-girl operation in New York City. The scandal caught the fancy of the press, which dubbed Barrows "The Mayflower Madam." It wasn't just the players involved that received attention, but Barrows' denial of any real wrongdoing, and her eventual release with a mere "kiss on the wrist," as her attorneys deemed it — a \$7,000 fine, with no jail term.

The story of Barrows' participation in the business and her eventual downfall seem to scream "TV

movie." So it comes as no surprise that her story will be chronicled in CBS's "Mayflower Madam," starring Candice Bergen. It airs Sunday.

Bergen, who actively sought the role when she heard of the project, admits that the reason her interest was piqued had little to do with the final version of the story. "It turned out to be very different than I had envisioned it," she says. "The approach—the network took was very intelligent and enlightened. But what attracted me was far less substantial. I was attracted to the irony, the humor, the idea of this preppy, button-down, Bass-Wee-Jun madam. That was something we'd never seen before."

The final product was far more restricted than Bergen had hoped. "The network didn't want the story glamorized or turned into a recruiting film," she explains. "There were so many legal-and-moral restrictions placed on us that I really think there's another story there — one that's tougher, more ironic, blacker."

For one thing, the depiction of what happened to Barrows and her

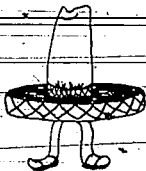
employees was substantially changed. The movie shows the girls' lives ruined and Barrows alone and forlorn at the end. That's not true," Bergen emphasizes. "The whole case was probably the best thing that ever happened to Sydney: It turned her into a folk hero overnight."

She is pleased, however, that the movie attacks the double standard by which female prostitutes are prosecuted while the male customers go free. "It takes a very feminist point of view, which is surprising," she says.

"When I heard about the case, I was a little shocked, a little surprised," admits Bergen. "But prostitution never struck me as one of the more important social issues. I spend a lot of time in Europe, where it's legal, and Sydney makes a very convincing case for legalizing it here."
