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## Cubans weigh release plan, free hostage

ATLANTA — Cuban inmates at Atlanta's riot-torn federal prison Thursday weighed a proposal to release more than half their 94 hostages, while prisoners in Louisiana freed one of 28 captives, officials said.

"Based on what we hear, things are looking up," FBI agent Wayne Davis said in Atlanta about the crisis there, while cautioning that it could "go downhill very quickly."

Three inmate leaders in Atlanta carried the hostage-release request to the other prisoners after a meeting in the penitentiary with an FBI negotiator and three prominent Cuban exiles, Davis said.

"We're hopeful and we will proceed from here," Davis said. Authorities did not disclose who proposed the figure of 50.

In Oakdale, La., J.D. Williams, regional deputy commissioner of the Dallas office of the Bureau of Prisons, disclosed in a videotape released to pool reporters that inmates freed William Hoffpauir on Thursday evening.

Williams did not say why the hostage was released.

"He seemed to be in excellent spirits and we're still concerned about the other 27," Williams said. "Hopefully, they'll be released in as good shape."

Federal officials said inmate leaders in Oakdale and Atlanta appeared to be making progress toward agreeing on their leaders and refining their demands.

Selection of the three inmate leaders in Atlanta was one of several signs Thursday that factionalism had declined among the approxi-

mately 1,400 Cubans at the penitentiary, said Weldon Kennedy, FBI agent in charge in Atlanta.

In Louisiana, government negotiators Wednesday night sent counterproposals to Cuban inmates, raising hopes of an end to the crisis, said Sen. John Breaux, D-La. He refused to give details. The inmates earlier had made seven demands.

"The fact that we're narrowing it down and going over it line by line and they're doing the same thing is encouraging from our position," Breaux said.

Wives of some of the Atlanta prisoners said they wanted one of the Cuban exiles involved in the talks, Armando Valladeres Perez, to negotiate via telephone linkup for both the inmates here and in Oakdale, La.

Esperanza Vizoso said the inmates "want one of their own."

The other exile visitors besides Valladeres, a 22-year political prisoner in Cuba, were Roberto Martin Perez Rodriguez, who was released from a Cuban jail in May after 28 years behind bars, and Jorge Mas Canosa, president of the Cuban-American Foundation in Washington and chairman of the advisory board of Radio Marti, an U.S. government-backed station broadcasting into Cuba.

Bureau-of-Prisons spokeswoman Maryellen Thoms said both former political prisoners are well known and respected in the Cuban community.

Also Thursday, 39 more Cuban inmates and one American prisoner asked to leave the penitentiary here and were transferred elsewhere in the federal prison system, said U.S. Justice Department spokesman Tom Stewart.

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## For some, drumsticks do little to ease pain

ATLANTA — Jackie Carreras stood in the rain Thursday, nibbling on a drumstick and staring at the thick, gray walls of Atlanta's federal penitentiary.

"My husband has told me more than once he'd rather die than go back to Cuba," Mrs. Carreras said softly. "I just hope he doesn't have to."

Her husband, Alberto Carreras, was one of some 1,400 Cuban prisoners involved in the prison uprising that had seen 94 hostages taken since Monday morning.

"Believe me, Alberto's a good man," said Mrs. Carreras who, with three of her four children, followed her husband to Atlanta after he was picked up by immigration officials in Seattle.

She glanced at the half-eaten drumstick in her hand and said, "This turkey doesn't sit too well on my stomach. I haven't had much of an appetite since Monday."

She and about two dozen other Cuban prisoners' wives in Atlanta

reside near the prison, living in a sort of limbo.

Asked what she had to be thankful for on Thanksgiving, Mrs. Carreras thought for a moment and said: "I guess I'm just thankful Alberto ain't dead."

She then took the hand of her 8-year-old daughter and walked slowly up the street, nearly bumping into Carol Dixon and her daughter.

Mrs. Dixon, the wife of one of the 94 hostages, was standing on the sidewalk disdainfully watching reporters swarming about a Salvation Army tent. The reporters were attracted by the sight of several children, sons and daughters of inmates, eating a free turkey dinner.

"I'm out here because somebody needs to speak up in behalf of the hostages," Mrs. Dixon said angrily. She shook her head and started to walk away but was stopped by a reporter's question.

"What do I have to be thankful for today?" she echoed. "Well, I guess I'm just thankful my husband's still alive. If he is."

## Americans open hearts, share bounty

Americans opened their homes and hearts on Thanksgiving Day to share their bounty with the needy or lonely, and with the anxious who awaited word of loved ones held hostage in this country and overseas.

Children of all ages rustled up an appetitive and greeted the holiday season with Thanksgiving Day parades. An estimated 2.1 million people lined the streets of New York while nearly 80 million others sat in front of their televisions for the biggest march, Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade.

"Hi, Snoopy, I saw you," 3-year-old Nyndra Looper squealed repeatedly as the helium-filled cartoon dog made its way down Broadway.

Heading the 13 marching bands, 20 floats

and clowns galore were celebrities like Phyllis Diller, the "Cosby Show" and Emmanuel Lewis. Celebrities of a "higher" order included balloons of Spiderman, Garfield and Baby Shamu, a 62-by-38-foot-killer whale.

In Philadelphia, Miss America, Kaye Lani Rae Rafko joined the arrival of Santa Claus in the 68th annual parade, the nation's oldest. In Detroit, "Alf," the furry extraterrestrial television star, was an honorary grand marshal.

While most Americans, including President Reagan and his wife at their California ranch, sat down to quiet family dinners, relatives of

prisoners and hostages caught in a revolt by Cubans endured a fretful day.

In Atlanta, tents were pitched outside the stone prison, where 100 people were hostages of Cuban inmates fearing deportation. Salvation Army worker Martha Motherhead said 300 dinners would be served outside.

A Catholic church in Oakdale, La.; set up cots for relatives of the 28 hostages there, and scheduled a Mass, an ecumenical service and a dinner of turkey, ham and Louisiana "dirty rice."

"There's just not a lot you can say to these families," said the Rev. John Poirio, Sacred Heart pastor. "We just want to be there with them. The presence is more than any words you can say."

## Grain export program hurting Idaho farmers

WASHINGTON — A growing federal program to help U.S. grain exporters expand their markets abroad is harming Idaho agricultural opportunities, state and trade association officials say.

These officials greeted with skepticism last week's announcement by the U.S. Department of Agriculture that China would be eligible to buy one million metric tons of wheat this year under the Export Enhancement Program (EEP). They are

angry because the USDA is trying to market a variety of wheat which is chiefly produced in the Plains states, not in Idaho, through the EEP.

However, a smaller deal to sell Bulgaria 150,000 tons of barley under the EEP was praised by the Idaho officials.

The Export Enhancement Program, begun in 1985, is designed to subsidize a variety of farm commodity exports targeted for countries where U.S. exporters have lost market shares to substi-

tuted exports from the European Economic Community.

USDA officials have encouraged importing countries to buy red wheat rather than the costlier Idaho white variety in an effort to cut government subsidy costs for the program.

But Idaho, through the state Wheat Commission and the foreign offices of the U.S. Wheat Associates, have responded by developing a marketing program designed to take their case for white wheat exports directly to foreign buyers.

Mark Sampson, an official with

the Idaho Wheat Commission, doubts that much of the wheat destined for China will be Idaho-grown.

"Idaho is the number two wheat producer in the country but is getting only six percent of the EEP wheat exports," Sampson contends.

"Idaho wheat growers have been shafted under EEP," said Tim McGrew, director of the Idaho Grain Growers Association. But, he said, "the impact of the EEP on our barley has been unbelievable. Over two-thirds of our barley exports have gone through EEP."

## Some times, there's no time at all

WASHINGTON — There's no time like the present, unless it's 12 a.m. or 12 p.m., when some experts say there's no time at all.

Those two hours are the trickiest times on the clock. No one, not even Uncle Sam, seems certain whether 12 a.m. means midday or midnight — or if 12 p.m. is lunchtime or bedtime.

At the Government Printing Office, the nation's publisher, 12 p.m. is acknowledged to mean noon, at least most of the time.

Railroads avoid the issue by using schedule times like 12:01 a.m. or 11:59 p.m. Blinking bank clocks generally let passers-by figure out for themselves what "12:00" means.

And according to the nation's official timekeeper, the Naval Observatory here,

there is no 12 a.m. or 12 p.m., only "noon" and "midnight."

"Technically, there is no such thing as 12 a.m. or 12 p.m.," Joanne Petrie, a Department of Transportation lawyer who oversees matters of time zones and standard time, said in a recent interview.

Faced with the timeless question earlier this year, judges in New Jersey threw out a \$15 parking ticket given a man who parked at 12 meter posted with the hours "8 a.m. to 12 p.m."

Arriving at the Willwood, N.J., meter at 1:30 p.m., the driver assumed he could park free any time after noon.

But he was fined by a judge who ruled that, while the meter read "12 p.m.," town officials actually wanted paid parking from morning until midnight.

The state's second-highest court disagreed, saying bewildered motorists had to be given the benefit of the doubt from the wording on the meter.

"It is inherently ambiguous," said Dr. Geront Winkler, director of the Naval Observatory's Time Service Division.

But even the observatory, which relies on sophisticated chronometers to keep exact time, can't seem to straighten out the matter to everyone's satisfaction. "We have calls all the time," said Winkler.

He explained that the abbreviations "a.m." and "p.m." by definition are not suited to differentiated midday from midnight. They refer to "ante meridiem" and "post meridiem," or the times before and after the sun passes directly overhead.

## Soviet might extend length of stay in U.S.

MOSCOW — Mikhail S. Gorbachev will stay an extra day or two in Washington if success is at hand on an accord to cut strategic nuclear missiles, a senior Soviet adviser on U.S. affairs said Thursday.

The Soviet leader plans to arrive in the U.S. capital on Dec. 7 for a three-day summit with President Reagan. They will use their third meeting to sign a treaty eliminating both nations' medium and short-range missiles, and to talk about future reductions in long-range weaponry.

At its weekly meeting Thursday,

the ruling Politburo endorsed the intermediate-range missile accord and praised the results of meetings earlier this week in Geneva between Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze and Secretary of State George P. Shultz.

At a Foreign Ministry news conference, Georgi A. Arbatov and other senior officials expressed the hope that Reagan and Gorbachev will make long strides toward a strategic arms reduction agreement.

Asked why Gorbachev was making such a short visit to the United States, Arbatov replied: "Comrade Gorbachev is not able to engage in tourist programs."

# Central Rockies, Northeast turn white

Snow fell across northern New England, upstate New York and the central Rockies on Thursday, while most other areas of the nation had a cloudy and wet Thanksgiving. A snowfall totals ranged from 15 inches in parts of New Hampshire to 14 inches in Vermont and upstate

New York and 16 inches in parts of Maine.

A winter storm warning was posted for parts of Maine and New Hampshire, while gale warnings were issued for the coastal areas of those states. The snow knocked out power in areas of northern New England, postponing turkey dinners for some utility company workers.

A storm also dropped snow on the southern and central Rocky Mountain region, with heavy accumulation in some of the higher elevations of Colorado and New Mexico. The Wolf Creek ski resort in southern Colorado received 11 inches of snow by noon Thursday, but ski resorts in the central and north-

ern Colorado Rockies reported only an inch or less. The Colorado State Patrol blamed the storm for two highway deaths.

The weather service issued heavy snow warnings and winter storm warnings for many parts of Colorado while winter storm warnings and snow advisories were issued in northern New Mexico.

Snow advisories continued for parts of Wyoming and Utah. Snow warnings also were issued in portions of Oklahoma. A winter storm warning was posted for southwest Kansas.

Much of the rest of the nation east of the Rockies had a cloudy and drizzly Thanksgiving. Showers fell from southern New England to the central and eastern Gulf Coast states.

Cloudy skies or drizzle also extended across the central part of the nation.

## Collision near Carey still under investigation

CAREY — Two vehicles collided head-on Wednesday evening eight miles south of Carey along U.S. 93. The total number of passengers and people injured in the vehicles, who were transported to Blaine County Medical Center, was unknown Thursday, the Idaho State Police reported. The accident was still under investigation and no citations have been issued.

Preliminary investigations showed a northbound 1981 Pontiac two-door driven by Opal Sharp, 66, of Layton, Utah, collided head-on with a southbound 1974 pickup truck driven by Gerald Johnson, 44, of Arco.

Sharp was listed in fair condition at BCMC Thursday and Johnson

was apparently not admitted to the hospital.

ISP reported fog reduced visibility to 500 feet when the accident was reported at 6:35 p.m. Wednesday. Sharp's vehicle apparently veered left of the center of the road when turning through a curve and the two vehicles collided, according to the ISP.

Carl Reasner, director of the Union Rescue Mission in Nashville, Tenn., is not enough. People need "more than a turkey leg," said Reasner, who expected to feed 900 people Thursday. "What's going to happen next week?"

The four-day Thanksgiving holiday also meant busy roads, and the National Safety Council said as many as 460 people may be killed in traffic accidents.

Yankie ingenuity was a necessary dinner ingredient in parts of Vermont, where a storm dumped up to 14 inches of snow and halted power to about 2,000 homes.

Maude Lund, the town clerk in Granby, a town of 70 people in Vermont's northeastern corner, has a nose over, but prepared pumpkin, apple and raspberry pies by candlelight. "I could see fine," she said.

Of course, there was another way to look at the storm.

"I'm going to get my cross-country skis out and give it a whirl," said Joan Craig of Charleston, Vt. "The trees are all white and laden with snow. It's absolutely beautiful as far as that goes."

Continued from Page A1 In Huntington Beach, Calif., former Beirut hostage David Jacobsen said he "could not escape from thoughts of the eight American still captive in Lebanon," just as his friends in Lebanon could not be home to have a joyous reunion with their families," he said.

For those without food or shelter, a day to celebrate plenty was briefly made less painful by others' recognition of their plight. At scores of churches, shelters, restaurants and other institutions "across the country, tables were spread with turkey and all the trimmings to the pumpkin pie free for the asking.

On the lawn of the U.S. Capitol, editors and cartoonists including Pat Olyphant and Jules Feiffer were set to serve dinner to more than 2,000 homeless people. The annual dinner was organized by the Community for Creative Non-violence.

The group's leader, Mitch Snyder, and other members went without. They have been on a hunger strike since Nov. 9 to protest a fence around a subway station to keep homeless people from sleeping at

the entrance. It is Snyder's fourth hunger strike to persuade officials to help the homeless.

In Salt Lake City, generosity exceeded capacity. "We've had a surplus of people wanting to come in and serve, in fact we've had a turn out director," said the Rev. Ed Carnell, lot of the Rescue Mission.

At the Sconeuter restaurant downtown, homeless people are asked to move on most of the year, but on Thursday, the food was free. "We haven't been able to let them hang out in the restaurant," said owner Randy Barton. "This is a way to make it up. It's a goodwill gesture."

While none approached the world record 30,000 people who gathered for the feast held by the King of Poland in 1730, guest lists ran to gargantuan for many free Thanksgiving dinners.

Grant Cushinberry, who runs a trash hauling business in Topeka, Kan., estimated 7,000 people. The dinner, expected to cost \$20,000, is made possible by donations. But one free feast, said the Rev.

## Rupert man faces charges

RUPERT — A young Rupert man was arrested Tuesday night on charges of assault with a deadly weapon following an altercation in a local game room.

Rupert police said James-Eric Rodriguez, 18, was arrested after another man, Todd Winmill, 22, also of Rupert, suffered a knife wound in his hand.

Police were called to Big Daddy's Game room in downtown Rupert shortly after 6 p.m. Tuesday.

Officers said Winmill and Rodriguez had apparently had an argument about a game of pool they were playing. The report alleges that Rodriguez produced a knife.

Winmill put up his hand to shield himself and suffered a hand cut. He was released from the hospital after emergency room treatment.

Bond was originally set at \$10,000 and reduced to \$2,500 at the arraignment Wednesday. Rodriguez was granted the services of a public defender and a preliminary hearing will be set.

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## Gooding woman dies in accident

BOISE (AP) — A Gooding woman was killed in a one-car rollover on Interstate 84 early Thanksgiving morning.

Julie Anne Dockstadter, 27, apparently fell asleep and lost control of the vehicle, which rolled off the freeway about a mile east of the Broadway exit in Boise, Idaho State Police dispatcher Jeff Kieber said.

Dockstadter was traveling east and was not wearing her seatbelt when the accident occurred about 4 a.m. She died of multiple traumatic injuries six hours later at St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center. Authorities said alcohol was a contributing factor in the accident.

Under the EEP program, the Commodity Credit Corp. subsidizes sales by allowing exporters to bid for bonus quantities of goods from CCC stocks to add to their shipments. The CCC stockpiles surplus wheat and other agricultural products to prop up farm prices. The CCC subsidies allow U.S. farmers to meet European competition in markets such as China and Bulgaria.

Over the past two years, more than 29.3 million metric tons of wheat have been exported under EEP, with about 65 percent going to the Soviet Union, Egypt, Morocco and China. The Soviets alone purchased half that amount. EEP subsidies have cost taxpayers \$1.7 billion.

Kelly Olsen, an export expert with the Idaho Department of Agriculture, said studies by various groups in Idaho show that about 94 percent of EEP sales have been for the soft and hard red varieties of wheat which are grown mainly out of state.

Eighty-five percent of Idaho's wheat is of the white variety, which costs more than the red variety, but is considered superior for flour, bread and pasta.

Olsen said that state officials have raised their concerns repeatedly with EEP administrators at the USDA, but USDA marketing specialists contend that it is reasonable for EEP sales to come from cheap red wheat stocks to save on subsidy costs.

McGreavy scoffed at USDA's argument, claiming the goal of the EEP is to encourage exports, "not to displace our markets."

For example, Egypt, a traditional white wheat market, has been encouraged to buy soft red wheat under the EEP for its bread.

In 1984-85, before EEP started, Egypt took 45 million bushels of white wheat from the Pacific Northwest, a quarter of which came from Idaho, Sampson said. But in 1986-87, after EEP started, Egypt took only 7 million bushels of white out of 54 million bushels they imported under EEP.

Sampson said Idaho growers have lost several other Middle East markets because of the EEP, notably Algeria and Yemen. He said lobbying was taking place in Cairo and Beijing to encourage these countries to insist on white-wheat EEP imports.

The efforts appear to have paid off. In September, Egypt agreed to purchase 12 million bushels of white wheat under the EEP. The announcement which caused wheat prices to jump 12 cents a bushel at the Portland, Ore., regional commodity market.

"This will cost USDA about \$350,000 more for the EEP subsidy," Sampson observed. "But that's more than offset by the higher farm income."

But Sampson is not optimistic about lobbying the Chinese to take white wheat in the upcoming export deal. He said U.S. Wheat Associates representatives met with Chinese officials last week in Beijing, and stressed the cost advantage to China of shipping from Northwest ports.

"But typical of the Chinese, they just said they would investigate the matter," Sampson sighed. He added that he expected a formal Chinese tender offer for the EEP deal within the next week or two.

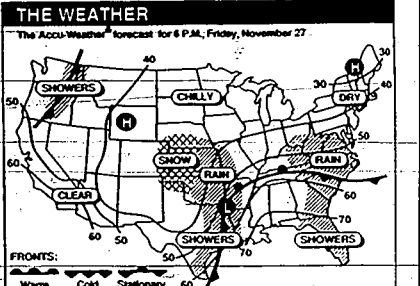

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# Boise couple asks for \$1.2 million after Continental crash

**BOISE (AP)** — A Boise couple who walked away from last week's Continental Airlines crash in Denver filed a \$1.2 million lawsuit Wednesday in connection with the accident that killed 28 people.

Kreg Thomsen, 26, and his wife, Toni, 27, each ask \$100,000 in damages and \$500,000 each in punitive damages from defendant Continental Airlines Inc. and its parent

company, Texas Air Corp.

The Thomsons were on the Balacon DC-9 with their 6-week-old daughter, Brooke, who is not a plaintiff. All three were treated and released from a Denver hospital after the Nov. 15 crash. They were among about 20 people who walked away from the crash. There were 54 survivors.

A five-page complaint was filed

Wednesday afternoon in U.S. District Court in Boise by Don Lajek, a Boise attorney.

Continental Airlines spokesman Jim Brigrance in Houston said Wednesday night he had no comment on the lawsuit. Toni Thomsen also declined comment.

The Thomsons' suit alleges snow and ice on the plane, which attempted takeoff during a

snowstorm, made "the aircraft non-airworthy and incapable of sustained flight."

Attempting takeoff in such conditions was negligent and a violation of Federal Aviation Administration rules, the suit contends.

The crew knew or should have known that a buildup of snow and ice on wings and other surfaces of the plane was inherently dangerous, according to the suit.

"Following the short flight of Flight 1713," the suit said, "the plaintiffs were lacerated, bruised, and frightened beyond anything previously experienced by either of them."

Kreg Thomsen had cuts on his

face, hand and leg. Toni Thomsen suffered bruises and a blow to her head that caused sustained vertigo, the suit said.

Both had "extreme fright and concern" for themselves, one another and their daughter, held by Kreg Thomsen.

## Ex-employees allege FAA ignored deadly pattern of safety violations

**LOS ANGELES (AP)** — A pattern of safety violations contributed to the fatal crash of a Continental Airlines DC-9 in Denver this month, ex-Continental flight crew members said Wednesday, but the airline disputed the allegation.

The ex-Continental employees, pilot Len Nahmi and flight engineer Ray Brown, also accused top Federal Aviation Administration officials of condoning Continental's air safety violations and of covering up critical findings by altering FAA memorandums and inspection reports in 1984 and 1985.

"These actions were not possible without advance planning by both sides," Nahmi said, referring to Continental and FAA officials.

"Alteration of documents in an official investigation is a felony," Nahmi said. "When done by more than one individual, it's also a federal criminal conspiracy."

A Continental spokesman and FAA officials vehemently denied any conspiracy, saying the FBI had conducted a 22-month investigation into the charges and ended its probe last December without filing charges.

Nahmi leveled his accusations in a lengthy statement during a news conference called at the Los Angeles Press Club.

Continental officials and pilots, who apparently had learned of the news conference in advance, took the stage immediately afterward to respond.

Nahmi and Brown, a Continental spokesman who flew from the airline's Houston headquarters to answer the allegations, denounced Nahmi's statement as "only the

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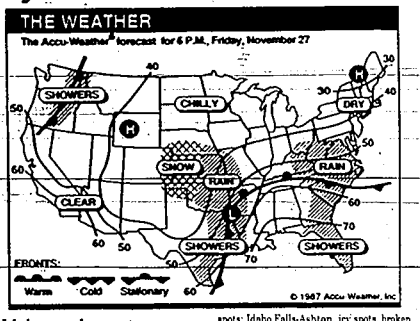

**BOISE (AP)** — Continental Airlines has changed the number of a Denver-Boise flight because of a crash that killed 28 people last week.

Lisa Marshall, a spokeswoman for the airline in Denver, said the number has changed from 1713 to 1723.

"The number officially changed Saturday but another number was used on flights last Wednesday

through Friday. The 12:25 p.m. departure from Denver flew as 1713 on the two days following the crash, Marshall said.

"There are two reasons why we do it," Marshall said. "It's traditional in the industry to do that (after a crash). No. 2, it helps to ease the memories and pain."

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District says tax increases inadequate

**MERIDIAN (AP)** — The Meridian School District wants the state to accelerate the timetable for allowable tax hikes because it claims it can't deal with population increases and classroom crowding without more money.

The issue was discussed at a meeting at Lake Hazel Middle School attended by about 100 district residents, seven state legislators, teachers, administrators and school board members.

School officials told the group Tuesday that the 1 Percent Initiative put an unreasonable cap on the amount districts can raise their taxes each year.

That hurts districts like Meridian, which are saddled with a low property tax base of subdivisions and farms and a growing school population, they said.

"When you're \$500 per pupil under the state average expenditure... you simply can't meet Idaho's minimum educational standards," he said.

## Right-wing ideology has led to chaos in Reagan twilight

During the past ten years of our nation's political life, almost every activity has been described with a label or a slogan. It appears that instead of thinking problems through, we have jumped at solutions described by three word slogans or very simple labels.

Our financial life is "Reaganomics," which simply means that for eight years instead of the discredited "tax and spend" method of national financing, the Reagan administration has switched to "borrow and spend."

"Support a strong defense" has been translated actually into spending two trillion dollars in seven years to buy every weapons system every general or admiral ever dreamed of wanting.

The "expanding economy" appears in almost every speech. It's translation is to buy prosperity in the geographical areas where defense spending reigns supreme. To reach the goal of an "expanding economy," we have increased the national debt in seven years more than all of the borrowing by the nation over its entire history including the revolutionary war.

Also, every person participating in government must carry a label. Any supporter of the Reagan program is a "conservative" and that's good. Everyone disagreeing with the Reagan administration is labeled a "liberal" and that's bad. Other labels that have definitely surfaced in the last several weeks have been "right wing ideologue" or "hundred percent conservative." These labels didn't mean much until the judicial crisis erupted. Justice Powell very quietly decided to retire last June and "the Ideologues" have taken over the White House function of filing that opening.

Invasion of the White House staff by the right wing ideologues has caused a three-

ring circus of strife and name calling to develop. It makes one wonder whether the White House staff will survive this onslaught from the right.

President Reagan announced that the replacement of Justice Powell must be a "blue ribbon conservative." The "ideologues" chose, as we all know, Judge Bork. His many harsh statements made him the one judge acceptable to all "right wing ideologues," but those many harsh statements made him unacceptable to the majority of the people.

Traditionally and by reflex the American people have always chosen moderates and not radicals for their government. Judge Bork's failure to be passed by the Senate has certainly magnified the display of identifying people by labels.

Judge Ginsburg was then identified as a real and true follower of Judge Bork's thinking and thus an acceptable "hundred percent conservative." It does appear that nobody has any idea of what Judge Ginsburg's thought process really was.

He wrote very little, is not a conservative religious person in that he apparently does not practice his Jewish faith; has been married and divorced and married again and in both occasions his wives have not used his name as the family name. Thus it appears the wives deserve a label as "feminists." None of these attributes are normally acceptable to the "right wing ideologue" but because Judge Ginsburg was labeled as one, he was all right.

In the past we had the term "egghead" which described those who considered them-

selves intellectuals or scholars and they were almost always liberals.

Strangely enough, Judge Anthony Kennedy of the Ninth Circuit who is now the nominee is considered by almost everyone a true legal scholar. As a result he is not labeled as a "liberal" he is considered as only "80 percent conservative" by Senators Hatch and Helms and others of that ilk.

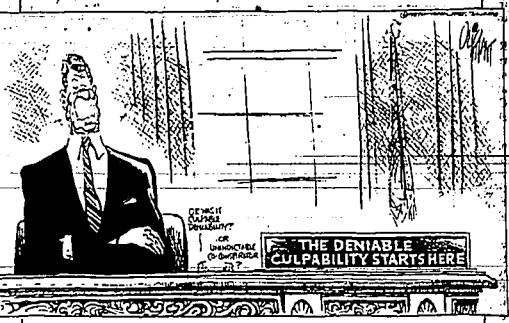
The most damaging label attached to him is the fact that he was preferred by the Chief of Staff Howard Baker who carries the most disastrous label of all which is "moderate."

In the meeting at which Judge Ginsburg was selected as the next nominee the reports were that Attorney General Meese, after returning from four hours before the grand jury where he is being investigated for corruption, demanded that the nominee be "a real conservative" who would help restore "law and order" on the streets.

Thus the unknown Judge Ginsburg because of his label became the nominee and lo and behold, he had smoked pot. That, of course, totally unacceptable to the "right wing ideologues" and he was dumped.

Then surprisingly our neighbor, Senator Orrin Hatch, who revels in being described as a "right wing ideologue" entered the picture in support of Judge Ginsburg. He commended the label given by calling Howard Baker and his friends on the White House staff "gutless wonders" who were undermining the conservative cause.

We often hear that Rome was destroyed by its excesses in lifestyle but we are all aware Brutus stabbed Caesar and the real excess that destroyed Rome was everyone knifing everyone else in the back or in the front as the case may be. Hatch and Helms are good with the knife but excel with the



cave man's club. Hemlock might be next.

Another label frequently used in the description of President Reagan's governing style is "hands off." Certainly this public display of disarray in the White House staff clearly describes the hands off approach to government. It really means that no one is the boss.

No boss really means that the "ideologues" rule. Meese, Helms and Hatch demand total obedience or not only will the liberal and moderate be destroyed but the disobedient conservative as well.

Obviously the last year of the Reagan administration is not just that of a "lame

duck" president. The winding down of the presidential term does not normally result, in total chaos.

The chaos that does exist is actually the translation of the label "right wing ideologue."

Most people, not in that self-limiting group, conservative, modern, and liberal alike seriously request that President Reagan becomes the boss.

### Signal coming to corner

Letters for Friday edit  
Re: Intersection of Falls Avenue and Washington Street North

The city would like to respond to the letter to the editor that was printed Nov. 23 regarding the intersection of Falls and Washington.

Construction of a fully-activated traffic signal is scheduled for late spring or early summer of 1988. This project was originally planned for the summer of 1987.

Difficulty in acquiring the necessary right-of-way for signal construction and installation of curb and gutter delayed the project until the 1988 construction season.

Prior to the construction season of 1988, the city hopes to have acquired the right-of-way. Prior to the installation of any type of traffic control device such as a T-way stop or traffic signal an engineering study along with a traffic signal warrant study is completed to determine the need for a signal.

The installation of the signal warrants as outlined in the "Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices" are reviewed to determine the warrant for a signal. The "MUTCD" list 11 warrants to be used in evaluation for a signal. Three of the 11 warrants were found to be satisfied at this time. City council acted on the recommendation of the signal warrant study and set aside the \$100,000 that would be needed to install the signal.

Part of the warrant study requires the accident reports on file with the police department be reviewed for the last 12 months. In reviewing these reports all accidents which may be corrected by the installation of a signal are analyzed.

In 1986 there were a total of 13 reported accidents at this intersection with 68 percent or approximately nine accidents that may be correctable.

In checking the accident reports for 1987, there have been 14 reported accidents as of

Unfortunately, in our American political system, many people who seek and are elected to public office do not possess a high degree of experience or managerial ability and it is usually the taxpayer who ultimately pays for their education and mistakes.

Another well-supported point in your editorial is that the law enforcement growth industry like any other government bureaucracy will, if not restrained, consume an ever-increasing amount of public resources with questionable or negative results or benefit.

Everyone recognizes the need for adequate law enforcement officers to protect the individual, investigate crime, and prosecute anyone who violates the rights of others.

But a free society cannot afford to allow these agencies to expand to the point of creating or participating in crime for the sake of perpetuating or expanding their own growth as they are doing today.

Another editorial point worthy of discussion is the cost vs. benefit analysis or the best use of available and limited resources. Some actions such as those related to drugs, prostitution and gambling are offensive to some segments of society but are in reality moral or social issues which have plagued society since creation and no amount of taxpayer money or police actions are likely to have any long range effect on human beings.

Use of the criminal justice system to deal with social problems diverts valuable and limited resources from legitimate law enforcement functions of protecting life and property and investigating current crime and encourages police to create and participate in crime to induce the participation of selected individuals for the purpose of prosecution.

In the situations that formed the basis for your editorial, tax dollars were spent to pay informants, purchase drugs, pay witnesses (and their expenses) and pay the expenses of extra law enforcement and investigative costs.

As recent Times-News articles and editorials have pointed out, the taxpayers of Twin

Falls have paid out thousands and more likely hundreds of thousands of dollars to indict a handful of drug users.

Not even one small-scale supplier was among them. If those small-time users were indicted are found, returned, tried and convicted, the taxpayers of Magic Valley will have paid hundreds of thousands or close to a million dollars.

If only ten were convicted and sentenced to prison the taxpayers of Idaho would spend another \$250,000 or more per year for prison support and welfare payments to the prisoner's family and dependents.

The one million dollars spent could go a long way toward education programs, rehabilitation programs, treatment programs, self-help programs or any number of social or community programs.

One million dollars and other law enforcement and judicial resources could be more wisely and effectively utilized to improve the present existing crime situation in Twin Falls.

A previous article in the Times-News (May 26) reported the substantial increase in major crimes in 1986 over the previous years. Vehicle burglaries increased approxi-

mately 45 percent, home burglaries increased approximately 36 percent, business burglaries increased approximately 36 percent, arson increased 45 percent, robbery 64 percent, etc.

There were a total of 898 burglaries reported in 1986 (898 plus victims) and police solved a total of 179 or around 20 percent. Eighty percent or 719 remained unsolved while police spent hundreds of thousands of dollars and resources to indict a handful of small time drug users, half of which have fled the area.

Your responsible articles and opinions can present the facts and analogy but whether the residents and taxpayers of Twin Falls County have the will to elect qualified leaders and public officials and hold them responsible for their actions remains to be seen.

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# Reagan has used pardoning power more than 900 times

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ronald Reagan has used his power as governor and president to pardon the crimes of more than 900 people from country singers, movie stars and to the former No. 2 man at the FBI. Some friends are advising Reagan to do the same for the central figures in the Iran-Contra affair, former national security aides John M. Poindexter and Lt. Col. Oliver North, even before any charges are brought.

The suggestion invokes memories of Watergate and President Ford's pardon of former President Nixon, which triggered a political backlash that many analysts believe led to Ford's defeat in the following 1976 election.

Regardless of their views on whether Reagan should do it, constitutional scholars and political analysts agree that as president Reagan has unquestioned authority in the Constitution to grant pardons to North, Poindexter, former national security adviser Robert C. McFarlane, or others in the affair. That no indictments have been

filed and that Independent Counsel Lawrence E. Walsh is still investigating makes no difference in the law, although it may make a big difference politically, experts said.

"He has every constitutional right to do it. The question really is the legitimacy of it — whether it will have the support of the people," said Thomas E. Mann, director of governmental studies at the Brookings Institution, a liberal think tank.

The power to grant reprieves and pardons is granted to the president in the U.S. Constitution and is a virtually unlimited authority covering offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

Many states give governors the power to pardon violators of state laws. It is a power older than the country, with its English common law, said C. Thomas Dienes, law professor at George Washington University.

"It is a broad, sweeping power because it is unchecked," Dienes said. A president doesn't have to list the specific crime being pardoned.

Since there is uncertainty about which laws Walsh may charge were violated, the president could "pardon anything Ollie North did while serving in his National Security Council office that would constitute an offense against the United States," Dienes said.

Reagan has granted pardons to 223 people since becoming president, according to the Justice Department. As governor of California from 1967 to 1975, Reagan issued 597 pardons, including one in 1972 to Haggard.

He had spent three years in California's San Quentin State Prison

on burglary and escape convictions, won parole in 1960, and had become a country star for such songs as "Okie from Muskogee," and "The Fightin' Side of Me," anthems of opposition to the anti-war, hippie movements of the late 1960s.

Most of Reagan's pardons, however, involved long-ago crimes by little-known people.

They cover a wide variety of felonies. Most of the presidential pardons went through the Justice Department's normal bureaucratic process, which allows one to apply for a pardon only after waiting at least five years after serving all

criminal sentence.

A pardon does not expunge the criminal record, but some states as a result may restore the rights to vote, practice law or own a gun.

But the president can pardon on his own, without being asked, and wipe out pending sentences.

Reagan did just that two months after entering the White House.

In March 1981, Reagan signed pardons for W. Mark Felt, once chief deputy to FBI Director J.

Edgar Hoover, and Edward S. Miller, longtime head of the bureau's intelligence division. They had been convicted the previous November for authorizing illegal break-ins during a probe of the Weather Underground anti-war radicals in the early 1970s.

Bruce Fein, a former associate deputy attorney general in the Reagan administration, said he believes Reagan is considering granting pardons.

## Behind the uprisings Here are answers to Cuban queries

WASHINGTON (AP) — The uprisings among Cuban prisoners in federal facilities in Atlanta and Oakland, La., are the culmination of a seven-year odyssey that began with the exodus of thousands of criminals and mentally ill people from Cuba.

Here are the answers to some questions being asked about the prisoners and their scheduled deportation from the United States.

Q. Who are these Cubans to be deported? How many might be deported?

A. The United States and Cuba reached an agreement last week under which Cuba consented to take back more than 2,500 Cuban inmates. The Reagan administration hopes eventually to send back all 7,636 Cubans currently imprisoned but that would require further negotiations with Cuban authorities.

Q. Why did Castro agree to take them back?

A. Cuban officials say that Americans friendly to Cuba encouraged the government to resolve this issue in the interests of improving relations. The Reagan administration believes that Cuba was willing to take them back because the agreement signed last week will permit the immigration of 20,000 Cubans to the United States annually. At a time of economic hardship in Cuba, this means fewer people to feed, house, educate and employ, officials say.

Q. For what crimes are they serving time? How many are mentally ill and where are they? Where are the rest of the 125,000 Mariel refugees?

A. Of the imprisoned Cubans, 210 have been detained continuously since their arrival for serious, non-political crimes committed in Cuba. The remainder are being held for a wide range of offenses. An estimated 600 are mentally ill and receive treatment at a variety of facilities. Of the remaining Mariel refugees, about 95,000 are seeking permanent residence status and the whereabouts of about 20,000 are not known.

Q. What legal rights do the imprisoned Cubans have?

A. They can expect no protection from the U.S. Constitution or the courts. The administration is upheld by the courts, is that Mariel Cubans can be imprisoned continuously until deportation.

Q. When would the deportations begin?

A. No date for deportation of the imprisoned Cubans has been announced but a timetable of 100 a month has been set. That means all 2,500 should be repatriated in 25 months.

Q. What do the Cubans' advocates say about the government's treatment of them?


A. Some civil libertarians say it is an outrage for Cubans to be turned over to federal detention centers after completion of sentences for crimes committed in the United States. The 1948 International Declaration of Human Rights holds that it is illegal to incarcerate a person without charge or trial.

Q. How many of these "Marielitos" are in U.S. jails?

A. There are 3,830 Cubans imprisoned in state, local and federal facilities for crimes they committed in the United States. Another 3,806 are being detained by federal authorities pending deportation even though they have completed their sentences for crimes committed since their arrival. Most of these are being held at the centers in Georgia and Louisiana where the disturbances have taken place.

# Study finds standardized test scores too good to be true

NEW YORK (AP) — Standardized achievement tests paint a deceptively rosy picture of how well elementary school children are progressing, says a new survey which found all 50 states reporting "above-average" scores.

The survey, conducted by mail and telephone in August by a 700-member West Virginia watchdog group called "Friends for Education, Inc.," found that "no state is below average at elementary level on any of the six major nationally-normed, commercially-available tests."

Scores cited in the report were sent back twice to state education departments for verification, according to Dr. John Jacob Cannell, a Daniels, W.Va., physician who founded Friends for Education, wrote the report and paid for the research — with \$11,000 of his own money.

A draft copy of the 26-page report argued that the seemingly excellent test scores in every state, especially in the South, "give children, parents, school systems, legislatures, and the press misleading reports on achievement levels."

Among the findings:  
 • In the 18 states where local districts choose and administer tests, cities such as New York, Boston, Hartford, Conn., Trenton, N.J., St. Louis, East St. Louis, Ill., Kansas City, and Grand Rapids, Mich., reported above-average scores.  
 • Each of the 32 states which test children statewide reported above-average scores, including Southern states which rank low by most mea-

sures of school performance.

In South Carolina, which ranks 47th in graduation rates and 50th in college entrance exam results, 92.5 percent of fourth graders

scored above average on the Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills (CTBS), according to the survey. More than 88 percent of Georgia's second-graders scored above average on the Iowa Test of Basic Skills, another commercial standardized test. And 79.6 percent of Kentucky's third-graders, and 86 percent of Tennessee's second-graders scored

above average in the most recent testings.

But education officials often neglect to explain that 1987 students are not being ranked against their contemporaries, but against a norm based on a select group of students who took the test as much as eight years ago.

Thus when compared with their contemporaries, West Virginia third-graders had the lowest CTBS math scores of any third-graders tested statewide in other states,

even though they scored at the seemingly "above-average" 54th percentile.

The apparently superior performance of today's students compared with youngsters who were tested eight years ago might seem to be good news. But it could merely indicate that teachers and school districts are "teaching to the test," that is, tailoring the curriculum just to boost test scores, said the report.

The tests included in the survey were the Iowa Test produced by Riverside Publishing Co.; the Stan-

ford Achievement Test and Metropolitan Achievement Test by Harcourt Brace Jovanovich; the CTBS and California Achievement Test by CTB/McGraw-Hill, and the Science Research Associates test by IBM.

The report criticized those publishers for failing to update test norms annually, rather than every eight years or so.

Telephone calls to Harcourt Brace Jovanovich were not returned. But other publishers contacted responded that establishing new, up-to-date norms is expensive

and requires hundreds of thousands of students to take hours of additional tests.

Nonetheless, Alfred E. Brennan, director of the test division at Riverside Publishing Co., said — that norms on the Iowa Test will be updated each year beginning this year because of the concerns raised by Cannell and others.

## Fire in home traps, kills 6 children

SEAT PLEASANT, Md. (AP) — Fire swept through a frame house on Thanksgiving Day, killing six children who were trapped in the upstairs bedrooms and injuring six adults, authorities said.

"All I saw was fire coming out of every window," said Gloria Roberts, a neighbor. "People were screaming, jumping out of windows. I couldn't believe what I saw. It was awful."

Neighbors said the house — a white, two-story bungalow in a modest area near Washington — was inhabited by James Williams, 57; his wife, Annie, 47; a son, Joshua, 10; two daughters, Sandra, 23, and Tracy, 26, and their seven children.

Those who died were Joshua, Tracy's three children, who were between the ages of 1 and 5, and Sandra's twin 9-month-old boys, neighbors said. Two of Sandra's children, ages 3 and 4, escaped. Prince George's County authorities did not immediately release the names of the dead.

Ward Caddington, the deputy fire chief for Prince George's County, said 14 people were in the house when fire broke out, apparently on the first floor. Besides the Williams family, there were two visitors, neighbors said.

## Military witches request recognition

DARMSTADT, West Germany (AP) — Witches in the U.S. military are banding together in a "Pagan Fellowship" to explain their beliefs and seek dog-tag recognition of their religious preference and time off for holidays.

"Military witches in Europe are trying to take care of the system or their recognition through proper channels," reported Stars and Stripes, the U.S. military's unofficial daily newspaper. "They are hoping to change the image they feel burdened with and become more widely accepted."

The paper said there were an unknown number of "Wiccan" religion followers among U.S. forces in Europe.

Wiccans, like other pagans, believe in multiple deities as well as the oneness of all with nature, according to Stars and Stripes.

The newspaper interviewed a founder of the Farwander Military Pagan Fellowship, self-proclaimed with Sgt. Lorie A. Johnson.

Ma. Johnson, a communications specialist with the 601st Tactical Control Wing, at Sem-

bach Air Base in West Germany, told the newspaper that the group's goal is to "let military pagans know they're not alone."

The paper, which did not give Ma. Johnson's hometown, said she and others who share her beliefs "are asking that they be given the same consideration as others."

"They want time off for their religious holidays. They want dog tags that state their religious preference as pagan or 'Wicca.' And they want understanding of their beliefs 'by military chaplains.'"

Contrary to what many people think, witches are not in league with evil spirits, the newspaper quoted Ma. Johnson as saying: "We don't make any kind of pacts with any outside forces good or bad."

"People are misinformed about what witches are because during the Middle Ages the church couldn't adapt to us, so it created a myth about us," self-proclaimed practicing Wiccan, Sgt. LaVern Benz, was quoted as saying.

## Spunky transplant baby may beat odds

PITTSBURGH (AP) — A 3-year-old Tabatha Foster struggles to survive one month with five transplanted organs, a milestone never before reached, her family and doctors are fretting over her latest complications.

"Still, they say, if anyone can pull through, spunky Tabatha can."

"She's a fighter," her father, Roy Foster, 36, said earlier this week after another long day at Tabatha's hospital bedside.

For Foster and his wife, Sandra, factory workers from Madisonville, Ky., it's a nerve-racking, day-to-day fight.

"I don't know what tomorrow's going to bring," Foster said. "I don't know if the worst is over or if the worst is yet to come."

But, he said, "each day she has a better chance of making it. I don't have any doubts she won't."

Until being placed back on a respirator Tuesday because of concerns over her new liver, Tabatha delighted in scaring doctors and nurses with a sudden "Boo!" and enjoyed singing "Itsy-Bitsy Spider" and "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star

with her mother.

She began breathing on her own again Wednesday night, and was alert and talkative Thursday.

"She has a really, really, unique personality," said Lynn McMahon, a spokeswoman at Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh. "Before the surgery ... she was able to entertain her visitors and really be a jokester. That's one of the reasons why we've seen staff members and her surgeons become so attached with her."

The 35-pound, pigtailed toddler received a liver, pancreas, small intestine and parts of a stomach and colon four weeks ago this weekend.

"In a general way with all transplants, if you can get them through the first month and they

are all right, your chances really become very, very good," said transplant pioneer Thomas E. Starzl, who headed the team that operated on Tabatha.

With Tabatha, though, "We have to wait and see. It's too early to call," Starzl said.

Starzl is considering a multivisceral transplant for an unidentified, middle-aged man. But, he said, "We want to see further before we do anything."

On Monday, she mysteriously lapsed into unconsciousness for about three hours. On Tuesday, doctors put her back on a respirator and began administering a potent anti-rejection drug known as OKT3 after determining her new liver was not functioning properly.

Tabatha remained in critical but stable condition Thursday and quietly celebrated Thanksgiving with her parents.

## Man killed as tire explodes

CHALMETTE, La. (AP) — A man was killed when his spare tire exploded while he was filling it with air, St. Bernard Parish sheriff's deputies said.

James Henagan, 37, was fatally injured Wednesday afternoon at a gas station in this town just east of New Orleans.

Deputies said Henagan pulled his car into the station and was filling the spare tire with air when it exploded. A paramedic said Henagan was thrown back and suffered facial and apparent chest injuries.

A station employee called the sheriff's office and paramedics were on the scene within minutes, deputies said. When they arrived Henagan's breathing and pulse were weak and fading, they said.

Henagan was taken to a nearby hospital, but his condition deteriorated rapidly and he was pronounced dead an hour after the accident, deputies said.

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



# Reagan bitter over Iran-Contra report but charging ahead

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) — White House chief of staff Howard H. Baker Jr. described President Reagan Thursday as embittered by an Iran-Contra report "he didn't like a bit."

But Baker said the Iran-Contra affair did not immobilize the president and contended Reagan is "atill the strong and vigorous president he was when he was elected."

Baker also said Reagan essentially is "a happy man," buoyed by completion of a medium-range missile treaty and by the successful recovery of his wife, Nancy, from breast cancer surgery.

Baker's assessment of Reagan's mood and

his political strength, made in an interview with Cable News Network, were the most detailed to date. They came one year and one day after Reagan announced the departure of top aides John M. Poindexter and Oliver L. North.

Reagan and his wife meanwhile enjoyed a quiet Thanksgiving at their mountaintop ranch north of Santa Barbara.

The Iran-Contra report, released Nov. 18, concluded among other things that in the clandestine sale of U.S. arms to Iran and the subsequent diversion of proceeds to the Nicaraguan rebels, Reagan allowed foreign policy-making to be overtaken by a "cabal of

zealots" who had a disdain for the law. The report, however, did not refute Reagan's oft-stated contention that he had no knowledge of the diversion, which was disclosed to the nation on Nov. 25, 1986, by Attorney General Edwin Meese III.

Reagan has said little about the Iran-Contra report, except to quip last week that investigators had "lobbed and brought a mouse."

Asked to describe the president's attitude toward the findings, Baker said, "Well, his private reaction is private."

But he added: "I can tell you that he really, really did not like it, and really,

really feels personally put upon by many of the implications and many of the assertions in the report."

But Baker said the Iran-Contra affair "did not immobilize him. It did not destroy him by any means, ... and he's still the strong and vigorous president he was when he was elected."

Asked whether Reagan would ever pardon North and Poindexter, the chief of staff replied, "I have no idea, no comment, no instructions, and no insight."

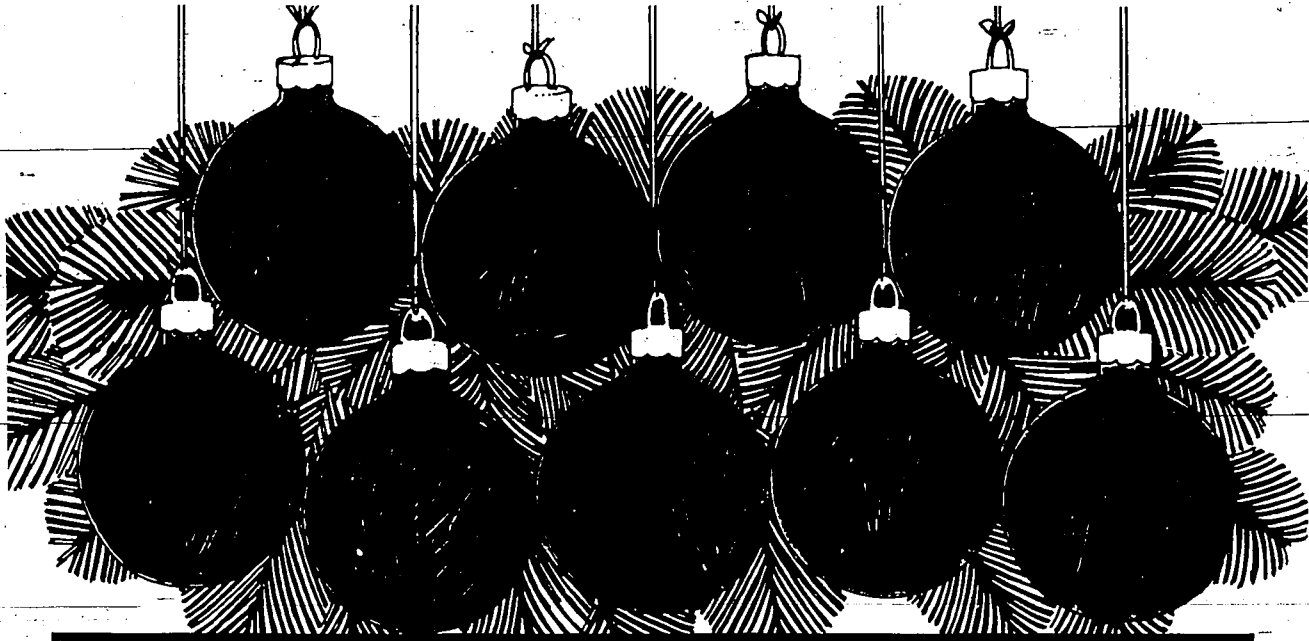
Baker said Reagan has come far since the release early this year of a highly critical Iran-Contra report by a presidential com-

mission headed by former Texas Sen. John Tower.

"When I came on board in March," Baker said, "you know, the real question was, 'Is this man going to survive? Is this the end of the Reagan administration, if not impeachment, at least immobilization?'"

"And now here we are near the end of the year, and he's going full throttle," Baker said. "He's got controversy going in every political realm, just about, and he's very much in charge."

"So the bottom line is that it (the Iran-Contra report) was personally hurtful to him. He didn't like it a bit."



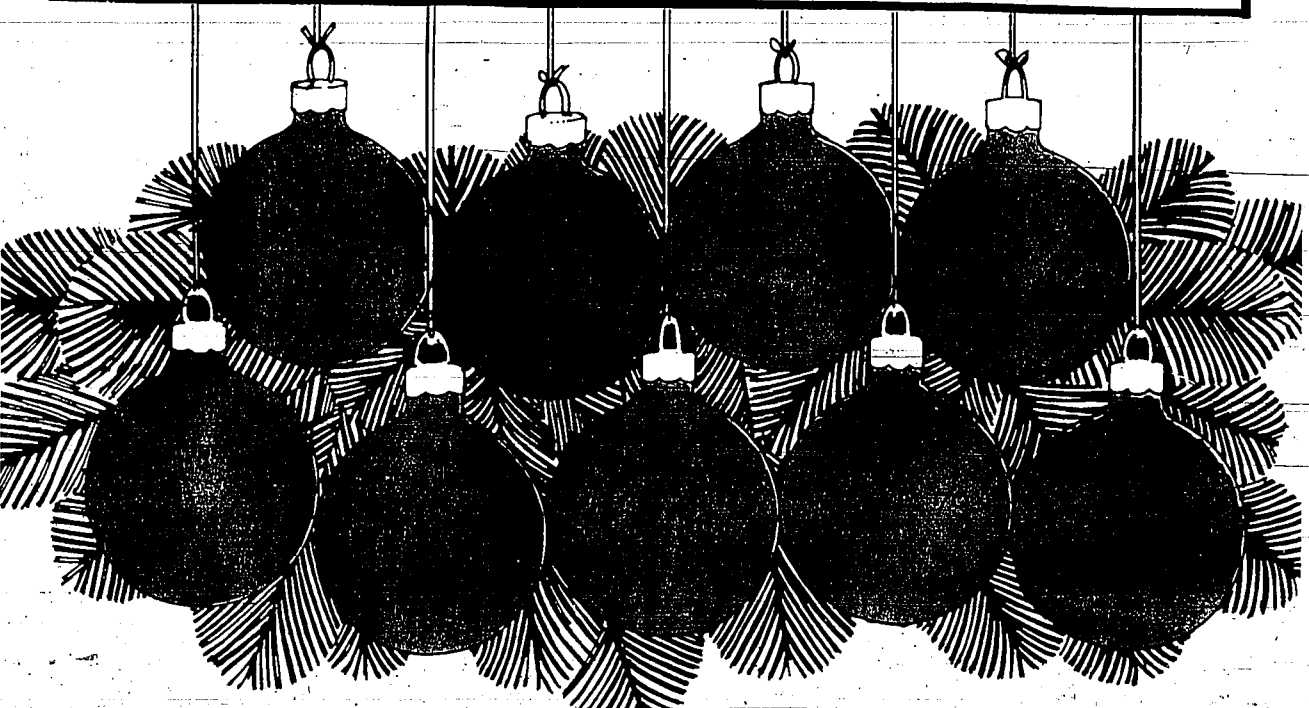

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## Charboneau brief to focus on old errors

JEROME — The mounds of paper required for the death-sentence appeal of Jerome resident and former rodeo performer Jaimi Charboneau should be ready by Dec. 10, according to his attorney.

"We're laboriously trying to put the brief together," said attorney Greg Fuller Tuesday. Fuller said he has three lawyers working on different portions of the brief.

Charboneau was convicted of the July 1, 1984, murder of his ex-wife, Marilyn Arbaugh, on May 2, 1986.

Fifth District Judge Phillip Becker sentenced Charboneau to death Jan. 29, 1986.

Fuller says the writing of the appeal brief, which has to be less than 200 pages, will focus on peculiar and procedural errors, including controversy over the clairvoyance defense of one of Charboneau's attorneys, Golden Bennett.

Fuller has already asked for a new trial in 5th District Court, saying Bennett developed his defense of Charboneau by using a psychic.

According to testimony in a hearing in 5th District Court over Fuller's earlier motions, Charboneau changed his version of the murder and said Arbaugh's daughter, Tiffany, fired the fatal shot at her mother.

Bennett vehemently denied allegations that he developed his defense of Charboneau based on a seance that Bennett's niece held in California.

In that seance, the niece claimed

to have contacted Arbaugh's spirit, and that the spirit "forgave her daughter for firing the final shots." The seance was confirmed by Bennett's investigator, James Conkley.

Charboneau has been through four lawyers during the course of his defense. Rmody Stoker, a Twin Falls attorney who contracted with Jerome County to be public defender, was originally appointed to the case.

Charboneau's mother hired Bennett to represent Charboneau shortly before the trial, but Charboneau fired Bennett and Stoker returned to the case and took it through the May 1985 trial in Boise.

Twin Falls attorney James May took over after the trial.

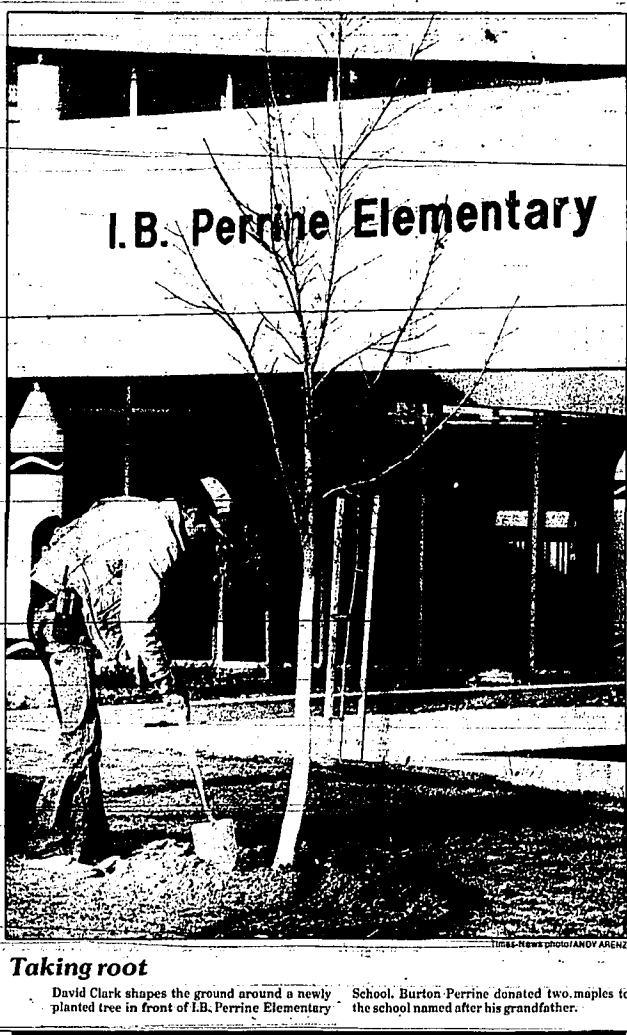
Fuller was reappointed after May was appointed as 5th District judge in Blaine County.

Fuller says the task of writing the appeal brief is complicated by the vacancy of one of the five seats on the Idaho Supreme Court, a seat that has since considered a "saving vote" on capital punishment issues.

Justice Charles R. Donaldson died Oct. 9, and the Idaho Judicial Council is considering a list of 14 applicants for his position on the court, which Donaldson filled with a middle-of-the-road philosophy.

"We will have a new justice now, we do have that added situation that we have to consider," Fuller said. "I think this appointment is one of the most important appointments to the Supreme Court."

"It makes the emphasis on the arguments and briefs shift a little."

## PE instructor asks for letter grades

WENDELL — Physical education classes in Wendell are graded with marks of pass or fail, a system PE teacher Yogi Behrens says is wrongfully making physical education take a back seat to academic subjects.

But school officials say a significant change needs to be made in the PE grading system in Wendell to make it acceptable to everyone.

Behrens, a PE teacher and coach in Wendell for 26 years, spoke to the Wendell School Board at its November meeting to ask for a letter-grade grading system for his subject.

About every two years for the last 10 years, the system has changed back and forth between letter grades and pass-fail grades, said Behrens. The most recent change was made earlier this year without consulting the PE teachers, he said.

"It changes according to who it's going to benefit," said Behrens.

The teacher charged that when a straight-A student needs an A in PE but cannot get it, the grading system is changed to pass-fail and is not included in the student's grade-point average.

Trustee Jack Hirai said Behrens, by his own admission, gives fewer A grades than the girls' PE teacher, thus giving female students an ad-

vantage in their GPA's.

Behrens said his grades are based 20 percent on participation, 20 percent on attitude and 60 percent on written and skill tests. A curve grading system is not used and there are no "automatic A's" for anyone, he said.

The state requires PE and yet Wendell schools do not include this grade in the GPA, Behrens said. Also, the teacher said, school board policy requires letter grades for all subjects except those taught by aides.

School Superintendent George Crawford said the school is not opposed to letter grades in PE, but is concerned at "how we arrive at those grades."

Behrens said parents will not go to him to discuss the grades. Instead, they complain to school administrators, he said.

Trustee Elaine Daniels said some parents have said Behrens' grading system is not fair and, also, do not feel they can effectively discuss the matter with the teacher.

Teacher Gay Petersen said she and the other teachers of academic subjects grade as they see fit, and the PE teachers also should have that right. Also, Petersen said, PE classes in college count on the college GPA.

Behrens said he has eight years of college and a master's degree in PE.

## Bureau briefs area officials on emergency flooding plan

**BURLEY** — If the American Falls dam failed it would cause catastrophic flooding along the Snake River from American Falls to Weiser, says the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation.

The bureau says the likelihood of such a failure at American Falls or Minidoka Dam is small. But as part of a nationwide emergency preparedness effort, the bureau is briefing local, state and federal officials with information to warn and evacuate residents from the floodplain.

Officials in Rupert and Twin Falls were briefed last week, according to a press release.

An "American Falls" failure would affect 15 communities in Idaho and three in Oregon, says the bureau. It would cause the failure of downstream dams at Minidoka, Milner, Idaho Power's dams at Upper and Lower Salmon Falls, Bliss, C.J. Strike and Swan Falls. The result would be a disruption in the southern Idaho electrical power grid, the bureau says.

Numerous state and federal highways would be damaged substantially. The Union Pacific Railroad would be damaged below American Falls near Glens Ferry and from Nyssa, Ore. to Brownlee Reservoir. The Burley Airport would be damaged.

Major impacts from the failure of the Minidoka Dam would include flooding of the Burley Airport, Interstate 84, U.S. 30 and state Route 25 and 27, as well as damage to the Union Pacific Railroad near Burley. Minidoka's failure would cause flooding 36 miles downstream to Milner dam.

Both American Falls and Minidoka are operated and maintained by the bureau. American Falls, a concrete gravity structure, was rebuilt in 1978 and has a capacity of 17 million acre feet. Minidoka is an earth and rockfill structure built in 1906 and modified in 1913. The dam holds 210,000 acre feet. An acre-foot is an acre of water one foot deep.

Local authorities from downstream and adjacent to the reservoir counties and communities from Blingham and Power Counties to Twin Falls and Gooding Counties participated in the meetings. Also attending were representatives from the Idaho Department of Disaster Services, Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation and the Twin Falls Canal Co.

## Town's holiday tradition continues

Christmas lighting and holiday music will be featured at dusk (6 p.m.) each of the four Sundays.

The first event is "Christmas, Family Style" and begins with a scripture reading and the lighting of the first Advent candle in the large wreath built by Dick Brizee. A stained glass window built by Donna Brizee will be placed in the bandshell. The Rev. John R. Dewey of the Valley Christian Church will read the scripture for the Sunday night event. There will also be a Christmas music program by the Roger Vincent family of Filer.

Another highlight Sunday will be the lighting of the Tree of White Lights which serves as a memorial tree honoring lost loved ones of area families. Memorial contributions to the Christmas in City Park Fund may be made to add the name of a loved one to the memorial tree. The names of those honored will be displayed on a memorial board at the tree. Contributions should be made to the "Christmas in City Park," Twin Falls Bank and Trust, in care of Curtis T. Eaton. The name of the one to be honored should be printed and enclosed with the donation.

The contributions are used to defray the cost of the annual ceremony and programs.

The next program is "Christmas Basque Style" to be held on Dec. 6. It will include scripture reading by Rev. Arthur Crosmer of the Immanuel Lutheran Church. Lighting of the second Advent candle will follow with music and dancing by the Euskadi Dancers, Mary Kharguen as director.

Subsequent programs include "Christmas Country Western Style" on Dec. 13, featuring the lighting of the third Advent candle and music by Muzzie Braun and the Little Braun Brothers, and the final event Dec. 20, "The First Christmas Revived." The final program and lighting of the fourth Advent candle will also feature Christmas songs as the Nativity Scene is brought to life.

Each of the four events will begin at 6 p.m. Other church pastors who are assisting include Rev. Fred Brodin, Christian Center, on Dec. 13, and Rev. Howard Kunkle, Episcopal Church of the Ascension, on Dec. 20. Each program will last about 30 minutes, and the public is urged to come to the park for the entertainment and special Christmas season observances. Ruth Turner is in charge of the programs and refreshments will be available near the bandshell where the public gathers.

## Grant triggers fair housing support

TWIN FALLS — Civil rights and storm-sewer improvements seem to have nothing in common. But not in the city of Twin Falls.

Before the city received \$500,000 through a federally funded community-development block grant for sewer improvements, it had to restate its support of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 as it relates to fair housing, said City Development Director Lamar Orton.

The city will also be seeking a \$400,000 grant to repair the roof of the former Kellwood building, south of Twin Falls. The grant was part of an enticement to attract the Trust Co. of Boise to open a new window-manufacturing operation in Twin Falls.

Because fair housing is a condition of the block grants, the city published in the local notices earlier this month a 1978 city resolution that states the city concurs and will comply with the federal fair housing law, which prohibits discrimination in housing sales or rentals.

The resolution stated also that the city will use fair housing practices in its programs, but the city doesn't have any programs tied to housing, Orton said.

Although the City Council makes appointments to the Twin Falls Housing Authority Board of Directors, the authority is independent of the city, Orton said. The authority provides housing to low-income individuals.

The city will refer people who have complaints about discrimination in housing to HUD for investigation, Orton said. So far there have been no complaints.

The city's restatement of its support of fair housing was one of the strings attached to the block grants, which originate from U.S. Housing and Urban Development and distributed by the state Department of Commerce, Orton said.

Instead of giving someone a gift with permission to "take it back and exchange it if it's not what you want," save yourself (and them) time and effort by giving gift certificates in the first place.

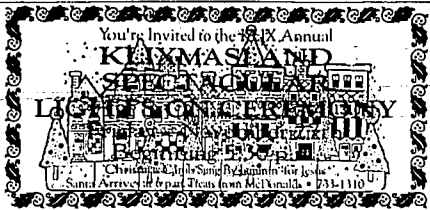

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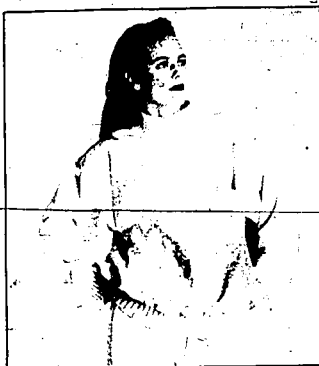
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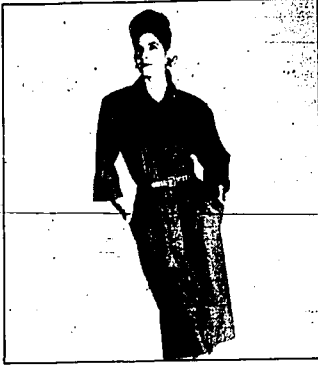
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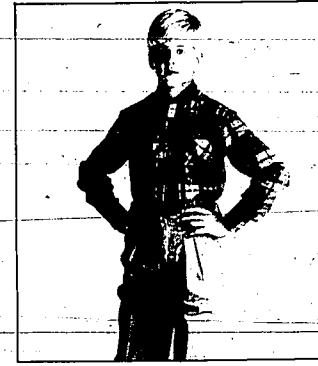
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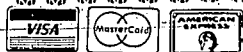
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# Eagles face tough lineup of California JC powers in Ventura

VENTURA, Calif. — The College of Southern Idaho's men's basketball team will get its stiffest test of the young season here this weekend as part of the field of the eight-team Ventura Invitational Basketball Tournament.

The field includes defending California junior college champion Ventura Community College and Compton Community College, which finished third in the state juncu tourney last year. Neither has been beaten yet this season.

"The bracketing is set up so that if Ventura and Southern Idaho win the first two nights, they'll meet in the finals," said Woody Wilk, the

sports information director at Fresno City College, CSI's first-round opponent tonight. "This has traditionally been pretty much an all-California tournament, usually with the best junior college teams

in Southern California and a couple of the better teams from Northern California. But I think they've tried to upgrade it this year by inviting you folks and Cochise (Community College of Douglas, Ariz.)."

The Eagles are scheduled to open up against the Fresno City College Rams tonight at 10 p.m. MST tonight in the last game of the first round of the tournament. ### Andy's back

#### Ex-TFHS star Toolson steps into starting role at BYU

PROVO, Utah — The city of Conception in the southern part of the South American country of Chile is known for red-hot soccer and bitter-cold Agustinos, but not for basketball.

So how did Twin Falls' Andy Toolson, who raised great expectations during a stellar 1984-85 season on Brigham Young University's basketball team, keep his hand in the game during his two-year stay as a Mormon missionary?

"Well, the facilities for basketball were pretty primitive, as you can probably imagine," says the 6-foot, 5-inch sophomore guard, who will be in the starting lineup tonight when the Cougars open their season in the Marriott Center against Montana State. "But I ran every day and I played a lot of soccer."

"If Andy gets in shape, he could help our ballclub this year," says BYU head coach Ladell Andersen, who recruited Toolson out of Twin Falls High school in 1984. "It normally takes about a year for any returned missionary to get back into condition, but I think Andy will be the exception."

From the Bruins to the Cougars, Toolson always has been exceptional on the basketball court, but the 21-year pre-dentistry major admits that it's a strange feeling to step back into such familiar surroundings after a two-year absence.

"Jeff Chatman (BYU's 6-6 senior forward) was the only player who was here in 1985 who's still here," says Toolson. "We have a good group of players this year, but it's different. It's taken some getting used to."

Toolson returned from Chile in

May and immediately set to work on conditioning, a task he says isn't finished.

"Conditioning is still something I work on and still something I need to improve," he says. "Conditioning and defense, I'd say, are probably the areas that I need the most work."

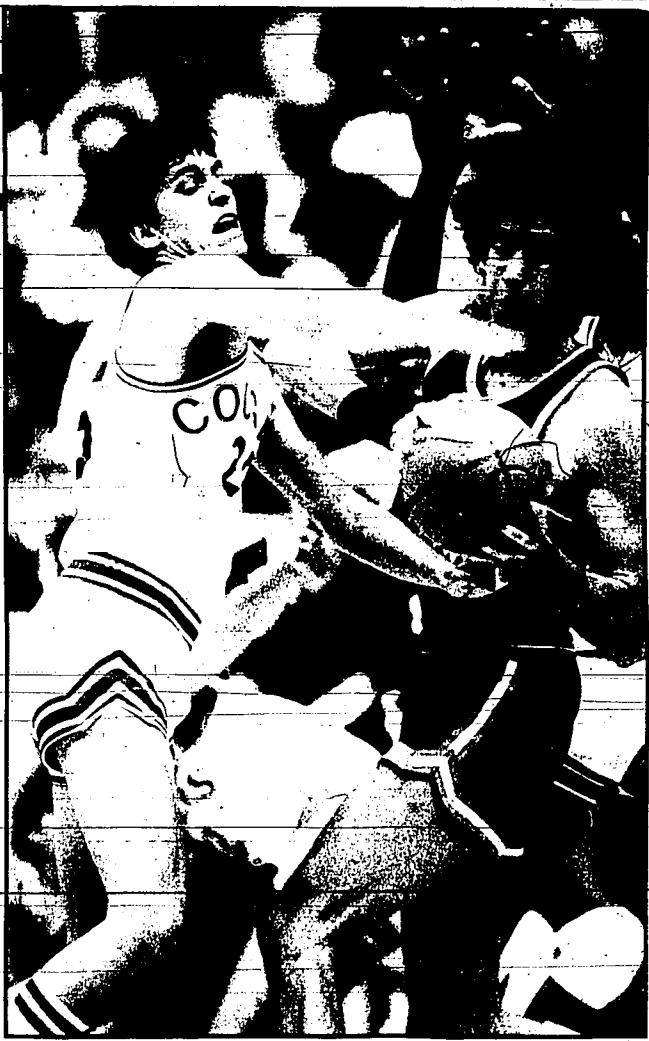
Toolson, says Andersen, hasn't lost his moves to the hoop and his jump shot, a combination which made him deadly in high school and a part-time starter as a BYU freshman.

"He is a great long-range and short-range shooter and a good rebounder," says Andersen. "He and Jeff Chatman started out as freshmen together and ended up contributing heavily to a very average team. Andy is a unique player in that he can play several positions, and we may use him that way this year."

Toolson returns to a Cougar team whose strength is in the forefront with Chatman and junior forward Michael Smith, who averaged 20 points last season and is on several pre-season All-American lists.

"We've got better talent here this year than when I was a freshman and more depth in certain positions," says Toolson. "We don't have a lot of returning starters, though."

Toolson, who will start in the backcourt tonight along with sophomore Marty Haws, expects the current edition of the Cougars to run more than the team on which he played three seasons ago, an offense that will place him in a number of different situations.

"I'm sure I'll be called upon to score and to take the shots when they're there, but that's what I did when I was a freshman," he says. "We have a lot of good shooters on this team and a lot of players who can score."

Toolson, who had played a lot in a reserve role early in the 1984-85 season, ended up starting the last seven games because of a knee injury to junior Steve Sinek. He finished as the third-leading scorer on the team that season, averaging 8.5 points a game. He had 23 points and had nine rebounds in a triple-overtime loss to Texas-El Paso — a performance which was the first of seven consecutive double-figure scoring games to end the season — and he tied a game against Utah State with a 24-foot jump shot that sent the contest into overtime.

This season, Toolson says he'd like to "shoot 90 percent from the free throw line, 50 percent from the field and continue to improve as a rebounder."

"I'm pretty excited about the season because we have some good players in the program," he says. "I think we're going to be a better defensive team and we're definitely going to be a good offensive team. We're having a lot of fun together."

"We'll be a good shooting team and a better-than-average rebounding team," predicts Andersen. "We'll need to be those things to offset our lack of quickness and to offset the opponents' quickness we'll be facing right after night. We'll make fewer errors and should be better conditioned."

Andersen says Toolson will be one of four guards who will play a lot for the Cougars this season.

Idaho's three NCAA Division I basketball teams will get their seasons started tonight in tournaments in Boise and Spokane, Wash.

Boise State will meet Lewis-Clark State and Idaho State will face the College of Idaho in the first round of the Real Dairy Classic tonight in the BSU Pavilion in Boise, while the University of Idaho will square off against Gonzaga in the opening contest of the Rosäuter/Alpo Inland Northwest Classic in the Spokane Coliseum.

The defending Big Sky Conference champion Bengals will take the court first against the Coyotes at 6:30 p.m., while the Broncos will face the Warriors at 8:30. The Idaho-Gonzaga game is scheduled for 8 p.m. MST, and will be followed by the other first-round game between Washington State and Eastern Washington.

The championships of both tournaments will be settled Saturday night, although under the Ken Ribal Dairy Classic format BSU

will face ISU Saturday night regardless of who wins the opening-round games.

The Bengals have three starters returning from last year's ballclub, which finished 15-16 and went to the NCAA tournament, but they do not include swingman Donn Holston, who graduated along with his 19-point average. ### Texas A&M beats Texas for SWC crown

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — Texas A&M shakked one star and created a new one Thursday night en route to a 20-13 victory over Texas that gave the 15th-ranked Aggies their third straight Southwest Conference football title and the host berth in the Cotton Bowl.

The new star was freshman quarterback Bucky Richardson, who was summoned with 9:03 to play when starter Craig Stump suffered a bruised knee. Richardson kept the crucial drive going and scored the

game-winning touchdown with 4:33 left to play.

Richardson got a chance to be a star because the Aggie defense, deprived of Chet Brooks after the star safety broke his leg in the second quarter, shut down Longhorn running back Eric Metcalf. Metcalf, the nation's No. 2 all-purpose runner, ran for 82 yards in 12 carries in the first half, but was held to minus-1 on six carries after intermission.

"We knew A&M had a good defense, and they proved it," Met-

calf said. "They blitzed a lot and caught us off guard some. But we still felt like we could do some things. It really hurt when we had to go for field goals instead of getting in for touchdowns."

Richardson "made the things happen on the option. He's a very strong runner," Texas A&M Coach Jackie Sherrill said. "And I told Keith Woodside after Monday night's practice, if he played as he practiced, we'd win. He goes out of Kyle Field with a great game."

Woodside's 90-yard touchdown

run in the second quarter kept the Aggies in the game.

Texas Coach David McWilliams said his team had no reason to be ashamed.

"They didn't leave anything on the field," McWilliams said. "I'm very proud to be head coach of this football team."

McWilliams said his defense may have over-pursued on Richardson's game-winning run.

"It seemed we had a lot of white jerseys flying to the outside, and

### Nelson's OT sprint lifts Vikings over Dallas

IRVING, Texas (AP) — The Minnesota Vikings were just trying to get into field-goal position. Darrin Nelson had other ideas.

Nelson broke three tackles and ran 24 yards for a touchdown in overtime on Thanksgiving Day to hand the Vikings a wild 44-38 victory that severely damaged the Dallas Cowboys' NFL playoff hopes.

"We were talking on the sidelines how we were running that play to give us field goal position, then I looked up and saw Darrin crossing the goal," Vikings Coach Jerry Burns said. "It was a nice surprise. Darrin had one great day."

Nelson, who ran 52 yards for a touchdown in the third period, said the game-winning score was just as

plain vanilla play.

"It's the most basic play we have," he said. "I just read the tackles block, and in this case our linemen beat their linemen."

"In a game like this, it was strange for it to end on a basic running play."

An emotionally drained Dallas Coach Tom Landry said, "I'm very disappointed. I thought we were going to win it."

"Our playoff chances don't look good at all now at 5-6" in the NFC East, Landry said. "It's a longshot for us."

"Dunmy made the plays for us but he just didn't execute in overtime."

Landry said. "I'm not sure why he threw that pass that was intercepted. There wasn't a receiver over there."

He said the Cowboys "just couldn't control the skill people, Anthony Carter and Nelson. They just killed us." Carter caught eight passes for 184 yards and two touchdowns while Nelson ran 16 times for 118 yards.

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# Indiana can't repeat NCAA title, says Knight

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. — Give Bob Knight five guys and a ball and he'll win the thing, goes. Give him three guys back from a national championship team and he'll be downright dangerous.

For the third time Knight will be defending the NCAA basketball crown. For the first time his championship team hasn't been decimated by graduation or injury.

## College basketball

The Hoosiers, No. 6 in The Associated Press preseason poll, have one major detractor — Coach Knight.

"No," says Knight when asked if his team will give him a second consecutive NCAA title and his fourth

overall.

"We don't even know for sure who is going to play there and how we're going to use them."

But that's an old song from Knight. Right down to last year's winning basket, he denied that his team was capable of capturing the national championship.

When Indiana defeated Syracuse 74-73 at New Orleans, Knight joined UCLA's John Wooden and Kentucky's Adolph Rupp as the only coaches who have won the NCAA title more than twice.

Knight has a solid nucleus, including three starters from last year's 30-4 team.

Top among the returnees is guard Keith Smart, voted the outstanding player in the Final Four after scoring 17 of his 21 points in the second half of the championship game — including the winning basket with four seconds to play.

The 6-foot-11 senior, a junior college transfer last season, could be asked to be up on his last season's 11.2 points average.

"We're still waiting to see exactly what we're going to do with Smart," says Knight. "I don't know if we're going to be able to play him as a primary scorer or not. I have some reservations about that after three weeks of practice."

"I'm not sure if Smart can make the adjustment to pick up the slack from the loss of (Steve) Alford. It's one of the big questions we face as we go into the season."

Center Dean Garrett and forward Rick Callaway are the other returning starters. The 6-10 Garrett, another junior college transfer, averaged 11.4 points, 8.5 rebounds and 2.7 blocks per game. Callaway, a 6-6 junior, contributed 12.6 points and 4.3 rebounds.

Alford, the two-time All-American

and the school's career scoring leader, and forward Daryl Thomas are the two missing starters. Alford averaged 22 points and shot 53 percent from 2-point range. Thomas averaged 16.7 points and 5.7 rebounds, shooting 53 from the field.

"This is a time of the year that I always enjoy, taking the players and molding them into the type of unit that can win the Big Ten championship," said Knight. "That remains our first goal. Everything after that is gravy."

It'll be a tough goal this season. The Big Ten has four teams in the top 11 in the preseason poll.

Knight, 366-119 in 16 years at Indiana and 468-169 overall, anticipates that his team won't have any trouble concentrating on its goals.

"We've got kids that know we just didn't lay waste to everybody in the NCAA tournament and we lost a couple of players that were awfully

important to that team's season," Knight said.

Knight failed to win the conference championship after his two previous national titles. His 1975-76 championship squad had its top six players move into the NBA after finishing 29-0. The Hoosiers were 16-11 and sixth in the conference the following season.

The 1981-82 team that won the national title with a 26-9 mark lost Ray Tolbert to graduation, Isiah Thomas to the NBA via hardship and Landon Turner to an auto accident that left him paralyzed. That team finished 19-10 and placed second in the conference.

"You always have a problem in getting kids to concentrate from day-to-day as effectively as you want and I don't think it's necessarily a result of anything that happened the year before," Knight said.

## Kings end 6-game slump against Nets

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Franklin Edwards is still not quite sure what his role will be with the Sacramento Kings. But Coach Bill Russell is happy to have the veteran guard back in the lineup.

Edwards had 19 points and nine assists Thursday night as the Kings ended a six-game NBA losing streak with a 110-102 victory over the New Jersey Nets.

Franklin Edwards really did a good job," Russell said. "I think he was the difference in the game tonight."

Edwards, playing in only his second game of the season after coming off an injury, played 41 minutes but said he's still not in top form.

"I'm still not where I want to be," Edwards said. "My passes were a little off and I'm still not really sure of my place on the court. I'll come back in time. I just have to be patient and keep working hard."

Reggie Theus led the Kings, now 3-7, with 25 points, while reserve center Joe Kleine had 16, including 10 in the second period, and Ed Pinckney, another reserve, had 15.

In all, the Kings' bench outscored the Nets reserves 37-17, and New Jersey Coach Dave Wohl said that made the difference.

"The Kings' bench came in and really got themselves out of trouble specifically Kleine," Wohl said. "He's learning to use his size, especially on the boards."

But Wohl said he saw some positive signs for his struggling club, Nov. 27.

"I was pleased with the hustle we had in the final minutes or so," Wohl said. "It was a good effort. We forced several turnovers and managed to get a few good steals but unfortunately we were unable to convert."

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Dawkins was obtained in a three-way October trade involving the Jazz, the Cleveland Cavaliers and the Nets. Thursday's deal returns Dawkins, a 12-year NBA veteran, to New Jersey. Dave Alford, Jazz vice president for public relations,

Dawkins missed the first five games of the season following the suicide of his estranged wife in Trenton, N.J., on Nov. 1. Since then, he played just 26 minutes in four games for the Jazz, scoring six points and snagging five rebounds.

However, Alford said Coach Frank Layden was "pleased with



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Earlier, Jazz President Dave Checketts had said that Dawkins had been given two weeks to get into shape and adjust to Salt Lake City's higher altitude when he returned to Utah following his wife's death.

"I told him we wanted to see a real effort on his part," Checketts said. "Then, we'd decide where to go from there. He seems to have done that. He's worked hard."

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Kenney, making his first start in three games, fired the Kansas City offense with two touchdown passes as the Chiefs snapped a nine-game losing streak with a 27-20 victory over the Detroit Lions Thursday.

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The Chiefs offense, which had gone without a touchdown for 13 consecutive quarters, came to life when Kenney, who completed 18 of 26 passes for 246 yards with one interception. It was only the third time this season the Chiefs had passed for more than 200 yards.

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Herman Heard, who rushed for a career-high 87 yards on 14 carries, scored on a 2-yard run for the Chiefs, and Nick Lowery kicked field goals of 52 and 54 yards. Lowery, the first NFL player to kick two field goals over 50 yards in a game, has done it twice.

"It's kind of funny," Lowery said. "We practiced some 50-yards, and of which came short, in the wet and the cold of KC two days ago and I was pretty frustrated, but I also knew it was going to be different in decent conditions and that's exactly what happened."

Karl Bernard, starting in place of injured Garry Games, turned in the best game by a Detroit running back this season, gaining 99 yards on 20 carries, including an 11-yard scoring run in the second quarter that narrowed the Chiefs' margin to 14-7.

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## Soviet athletes use steroids, says paper

MOSCOW (AP) — A national newspaper has acknowledged that some top Soviet athletes have used anabolic steroids and warned of dire health consequences from doping.

The article in a recent issue of *Soviet Sports* focused on drug problems among athletes in the Siberian city of Novosibirsk. Although it gave little indication of how widespread the problem is, the article was a rare disclosure of drug violations by sportsmen.

The newspaper named two swimmers who admitted using steroids and cited the cases of other unidentified athletes whose health was damaged by routine injections of muscle-building drugs.

Soviet sports regulations prohibit the use of steroids and other drugs, and officials have characterized doping as a problem among Western athletes.

The newspaper account cited the case of Igor Papshev, two-time Olympic swimming champion. Papshev admitted using steroids for three years, beginning at age 19, at the encouragement of his coach, Oleg V. Soloviev.

Papshev told officials that

Soloviev invited him to his country house and offered the steroids as an impetus to help him set a record. The article said he took regular injections, administered by the sports center's medical staff. Papshev said he was sometimes injected by the coach on Sundays when the medicine cabinet was locked, the article said.

The newspaper said Papshev's public admission of drug use drew criticism from his colleagues.

"He was forsaken by his friends on the team. The leading officials of the sports center skeptically grinned and suggested to him that he take back his words because they were unfounded and defamed the coach," the newspaper said.

Papshev quit the team and trains independently, the article said. Soloviev was reprimanded and stripped of his title.

Soviet Sports said the Papshev incident was hushed up until a second scandal emerged involving another pupil of Soloviev's.

Olya Trankovka was in Moscow on her way to compete in a championship in West Germany when a medical test revealed the presence of steroids, the newspaper said. Her

trip was canceled and she was kicked off the team. Ms. Trankovka now works as a cleaning woman at the club's swimming pool and trains on her own, *Soviet Sports* said.

Soviet sports officials say athletes to be amateurs, but many of the top competitors are assigned jobs within their clubs so they can devote themselves to full-time training.

Valentina V. Kozmenko, a senior doctor at the Novosibirsk Sports Medicine Center, told the newspaper of several cases in which prominent athletes have suffered from sterility or impotence because of drugs designed to enhance their sports performance.

She said one former track star, who she did not identify, was recuperating at the medical center and had gained so much weight from steroids that she had to enter doors sideways.

The newspaper expressed support for the doctor's suggestion that all athletes be required to sign statements declaring that they will use drugs to improve their performance.

## Soviet athletes use steroids, says paper

MOSCOW (AP) — A national newspaper has acknowledged that some top Soviet athletes have used anabolic steroids and warned of dire health consequences from doping.

The article in a recent issue of *Soviet Sports* focused on drug problems among athletes in the Siberian city of Novosibirsk. Although it gave little indication of how widespread the problem is, the article was a rare disclosure of drug violations by sportsmen.

The newspaper named two swimmers who admitted using steroids and cited the cases of other, unidentified athletes whose health was damaged by routine injections of muscle-building drugs.

Soviet sports regulations prohibit the use of steroids and other drugs, and officials have characterized doping as a problem among Western athletes.

The newspaper also cited the case of Igor Papshevy, a two-time national swimming champion. Papshevy admitted using steroids for three years, beginning at age 19, at the encouragement of his coach, Oleg V. Soloviev.

Papshevy told officials that

Soloviev invited him to his country house and offered the steroids as an impetus to help him set a record. The article said he took regular injections, administered by the sports center's medical staff. Papshevy said he was sometimes injected by the coach on Sundays when the medicine cabinet was locked, the article said.

The newspaper said Papshevy's public admission of drug use drew criticism from his colleagues.

"He was shocked by his friends on the team. The leading officials of the sport club skeptically grinned and suggested to Igor that he take back his words because they were unfounded and defamed the coach," the newspaper said.

Papshevy quit the team and trains independently, the article said. Soloviev was reprimanded and stripped of his title.

Soviet Sports said the Papshevy incident was hushed up until a second scandal emerged involving another pupil of Soloviev's.

Oliga Travnikova was in Moscow on her way to compete in a championship in West Germany when a medical test revealed the presence of steroids, the newspaper said. Her

trip was canceled and she was kicked off the team. Ms. Travnikova now works as a cleaning woman at the club's swimming pool and trains on her own, Soviet Sports said.

Soviet sports officials say athletes to be amateurs, but many of the top competitors are assigned jobs within their clubs so they can devote themselves to full-time training.

Valentina V. Kuzmenko, a senior doctor at the Novosibirsk Sports Medicine Center, told the newspaper of several cases in which prominent athletes have suffered from sterility or impotence because of drugs designed to enhance their sports performance.

She said one former track star, who she did not identify, was recuperating at the medical center and had gained so much weight from steroids that she had to enter doors sideways.

The newspaper expressed support for the doctor's suggestion that all athletes be required to sign statements declaring that they will not use drugs to improve their performance.

Trouble is, when it comes to direct competition with the nation's best, only the Rebels have done much to earn recognition or, for that matter, respect.

Jerry Pimm, the coach at the University of California, Santa Barbara, thinks that will change this season.

NEVADA LAS VEGAS  
1986-87 records: 37-2 overall, 18-0 in PCAA.

PCAA finish: First.  
A Tarkanian lead has never had a "fresh" season, and this one won't be the first. But the Rebels will be hard-pressed to go undefeated in the conference again.

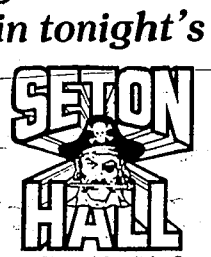

"I feel that we are capable of achieving 'the same feat,' said Carlesimo, whose Pirates opened their Big Apple year with impressive victories over George Mason and Middle Tennessee State.

"We have something this season that we lacked last year — leadership," he said, crediting Seton Hall's three seniors, forwards Mark Bryant and Martin Salley and guard James Major.

"I wanted it's not just our work ethic has been outstanding from the first day of practice. We've played more defense in three games than we've played in the last three years.

Bryant missed the James Madison game because of a suspension imposed after he made contact with a player agent, an infraction reported by Seton Hall against Middle Tennessee, he came off the bench and scored 12 points in 14 minutes. Salley is averaging 15 points, one more than Major. Team leader Darryl Walker, a 6-foot-8 junior, has a 19.6 average.

"What we've accomplished so far is a signal to me that the program is ready to step out and be recognized," said Carlesimo, who has had only one winning season — last year's 15-14 mark — in six years as Seton Hall coach.

New Mexico, which beat Weber State and then upset UCLA, both at home, is coming off a 25-10 season. The 25 victories were the most in

Coach Gary Colson has seven returnees including 6-7 Hunter Greene, the leading scorer in the Western Athletic Conference last year with a 21.1 average. He leads the team in scoring and rebounding and also is top in steals.

"We didn't play too well to get here," explained Colson, who took over the Lobos eight years ago after the program was shrouded by recruiting scandals. "Maybe now we can settle down."

Norm Sloan of Florida, whose Gators are 14th in the AP poll and ranked to battle Kentucky for the Southeastern Conference championship, calls his team 'the best since I've been back.'

Sloan coached at Florida from 1960-66 before leaving for North Carolina State where he spent 14 years. He returned to Florida in 1980.

Dwayne Schintzius, Florida's 7-2 center, is averaging 16 points. Livingston Chatman, a 6-7 forward, is shooting 42 percent with a 22-point average. Returning to the lineup Friday for the first time this season after being suspended by Sloan is 6-5 guard Vernon Maxwell, who averaged 21.7 last year.

Iowa State is led by 6-5 senior forward Jeff Grayer, who cracked the 1,000 point career scoring mark as a sophomore.

# Toolson, BYU open tonight vs. MSU

PROVO, Utah (AP) — When Brigham Young University opens its season as host to Montana State Friday night, it will be a seasoned, confident squad of Cougars that takes to the floor in the Marriott Center.

The Bobcats are no passys for BYU, however. MSU is favored along with Boise State to contend for the Big Sky Conference title this season.

Last season, MSU, 21-8, won the conference regular season championship and made its first National Invitation Tournament appearance ever.

At nearly 6-foot-10, forward Michael Smith is back from a 1986-87 first team All-WAC season in which he led the team with averages of 20.1 points and 8.5 rebounds a game.

Smith thinks he will be even better this year. "I feel a lot stronger, better conditioned," he said.

That should give BYU foes even bigger headaches than last year when Smith regularly launched 3-point shots. When he ended up leading the WAC in 3-point percentage, opponents began to wonder how to stop him. They'll have the chance to find the answer again this season.

Jeff Chatman, a 6-foot-9 forward, led the Cougars last year with 40 blocked shots while averaging 16.9 points a game on the other end of the floor. The senior says he has developed a drive to go with his turnaround jumper this season.

Jim Usevitch, a 6-9 senior, will be the Cougars' mainstay as center this year.

Brian Taylor, Twin Falls, Andy Toolson, Nathan Call, and Astle are other standouts expected to battle for guard slots.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Bill Curry, who has spent most of his life in football, says he will have a new experience when his Alabama team meets Auburn in a Southeastern Conference game Friday.

"The crowd will be split 50-50 and I've never been a part of anything like that," the Alabama coach said.

Each school gets an equal share of tickets for the game, but this is the last year for that. They alternate as the home team and the universities recently reached an agreement which says the visiting school will receive only 10,000 tickets for future games.

This game, Curry said, "is going to be great. Somebody will be making noise all the time. I hate to see that end but understand why."

Auburn's fans will be pulling for a victory that would give the Tigers the SEC crown and a spot in the Sugar Bowl against undefeated Syracuse.

Alabama's fans want a victory that would give the Crimson Tide an equal share of the conference title with Louisiana State, defeated by Alabama three weeks ago. That would leave it up to the Sugar Bowl to invite either LSU or Alabama.

Among the three, the two teams left of the Sugar will go to the Gator and Hall of Fame bowls.

The game between No. 7 Auburn, 8-1-1 and 4-0-1 in the conference, and No. 18 Alabama, 7-3 and 4-1, will match strength against strength on the ground.

Alabama relies on Bobby Humphrey, the SEC's leading all-purpose runner, while Auburn's defense has given up only 124.4 yards running per game.

Although Auburn won 21-17 last year, Humphrey gained 204 yards against the Tigers as a sophomore.

"Offensively, you've got to start with Humphrey," Auburn Coach Pat Dye said in talking defensive strategy. "He is the best running back in America... He's got speed, he's got great vision and balance. He's so strong and yet he doesn't weigh more than 190, 195 pounds. He just keeps breaking tackles."

"It really presents a challenge to open some holes so we can run," said Alabama's freshman center, Roger Shultz.

"I believe this is probably the best of the Auburn defenses that I've seen," Curry said, "and that's saying a lot."

Alabama's defense is faced with stopping the passing of Jeff Burger and what Curry calls an underrated running game—Burger, with talented receivers such as Lawyer Tillman and Duke Donaldson, has passed for 1,938 yards and 13 touchdowns.

Auburn has no runner in the tradition of B Jackson and Brent Fullwood but, said Curry, "there's nothing wrong with their running game... Pat Dye is never going to have a team that can't run."

# Tennis ace Borg down to last \$8 million

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — Bjorn Borg collected an estimated \$75 million in prizes and endorsements during his tennis career, but his personal fortune according to tax records now amounts to less than \$8 million.

The money was not squandered, however. Far from it.

Borg, through the use of tax shelters, has managed to keep much of his wealth from appearing on his income tax return. For example, he established a real estate company in Sweden that has bought property for \$14.1 million.

He may also have purchased a foreign pension fund as tax shelter. A spokesman for the Swedish International Revenue Service said foreign pensions funds are not taxable in Sweden.

Figures from the first income tax return Borg has filed in Sweden in 11 years show that in 1986 he had taxable income of \$184,000 and declared assets of nearly \$8 million.

Now a successful 31-year-old businessman, Borg moved back to his native country two years ago after residing in Monte Carlo since the mid 1970s. He moved to the tax haven to avoid the Swedish taxes, the highest in the world.

Certain tax figures for individuals, which are public in Sweden, will not be officially published until early next year, a Swedish IRS spokesman said.

But a Swedish television special on Borg said his fortune was listed on tax records as \$7,920,000, considerably less than he earned during a

10-year pro career that started at age 16 in 1973. Still, that figure would make him the 44th richest person in Sweden.

Borg, who won five straight Wimbledon singles titles 1976-80 and also captured six French Open crowns before retiring in 1983, is believed to be worth much more.

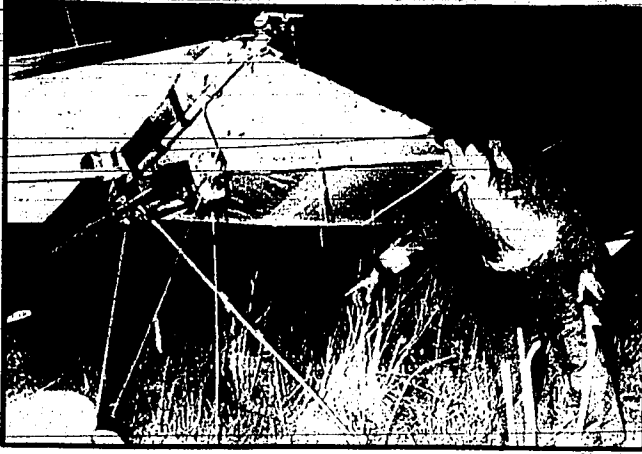
Borg's financial advisor would not comment on Borg's tax shelters.

"I'm a bad advisor if I've not mentioned said Bjorn Borg," there's a president of Projektshuset Kienten, a company that handles Borg's tax planning.

Borg still has about ten world wide endorsement contracts. He is a board member of several companies and promotes his own line of men's fashion and perfume.

"If Bjorn does business as a tennis ambassador, he signed a four-year contract with the Swedish Tourist Board in 1986.

Last September, Borg was an official member of a Swedish delegation led by prime minister Ingvar Carlsson, who visited President Reagan in Washington.

## Shamir claims Syria behind border attack by hang glider

KIRYAT SHMONA, Israel (AP) — Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir on Thursday blamed Syria for the attack by a hang-glider guerrilla who killed six Israeli soldiers.

He also summoned top Cabinet leaders to an emergency meeting to consider Israel's response.

"Together with our army we will remove all threats. Nothing will endanger the security in this part of our country," Shamir told residents of a communal farm near the scene of the attack in northern Israel.

In the bloodiest infiltration from Lebanon in nearly a decade, a guerrilla flying a red-and-white motorized hang glider crossed one of the world's most heavily monitored borders under the cover of darkness.

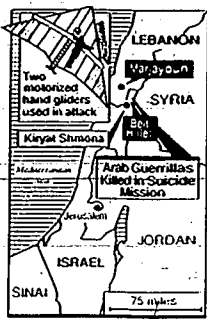
The guerrilla, firing automatic rifles and hurling hand grenades, ambushed an army jeep and then attacked a military outpost, killing six soldiers and wounding seven others before he was killed himself.

A second guerrilla landed another hang glider in south Lebanon and was found by Israeli troops who were searching the area Thursday morning. He was shot and killed in a gun battle, the army said.

The Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine-General Command, a Syrian-based splinter group of the Palestine Liberation Organization, issued a communique in Damascus claiming responsibility for the attack. The statement praised the guerrillas for waging a "heroic battle."

Shamir told northern Israeli settlers: "It's clear that those who have claimed responsibility could not do this without the sponsorship of and help from Syria."

No details were released from Shamir's closed-door meeting with the 10-member decision-making inner Cabinet and the leader of the right-wing Likud bloc refused to answer questions about how Israel



might respond.

The usual response is a bombing raid on Palestinian bases in Lebanon. Israel has carried out 22 such air raids this year, killing more than 100 people.

PLO chief Yasser Arafat ordered all Palestinian forces in Lebanon to be on full alert in case of possible Israeli reprisal attacks, according to a PLO announcement.

Wednesday night's attack occurred after a guerrilla landed his motorized hang glider inside Israel near the communal farm of Beit Hillel, said an army officer who briefed reporters in nearby Kiryat Shmona, 100 miles north of Jerusalem.

Israeli forces in south Lebanon spotted the glider and alerted army units in northern Israel but something went wrong, said Defense Minister Yitzhak Rabin, who visited the area of the attack Thursday.

"Steps were taken, but they

proved to be insufficient," Rabin said on Israeli Army radio. He promised an investigation.

The guerrilla, about 20 years old and wearing an olive-colored uniform, killed a soldier driving an army pickup truck and wounded the woman soldier sitting next to him.

"We were driving slowly, laughing and chatting all the way and it was great fun," the wounded soldier, Tami Arbel, said on Israeli Army radio. "Suddenly, shots were fired at us. I bent down and the bullets whistled over my head."

The guerrilla then entered an army outpost and began firing shots and hurling hand grenades at a row of army tents.

Four of the killed soldiers were playing cards in a tent. The others were packing up their gear in response to an alert from Israeli forces who had spotted the gliders.

The attacker was finally shot in the head in one-on-one combat with a soldier who was wounded.

Chief of Staff Gen. Dan Shomron said the guerrilla entered through a main gate.

"For some reason, this terrorist was not killed before he entered the camp," Shomron said on Israeli Television. "As far as I understand, he (the camp guard) did not react properly, but these issues are still being investigated."

Rabin also noted that "both gliders, each carrying a single terrorist, could not go back (to Lebanon). That is to say those who left to carry out the attack knew they would not return."

The attack was the first time a hang glider had been used in an infiltration attempt since March 7, 1981. In that incident, the guerrilla was captured near the town of Afula before he was able to launch a raid.

## Nina kills 270 in Philippines, leaves thousands homeless

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Powerful typhoon Nina killed 270 people, left thousands homeless and tossed ships ashore as it whipped across the Philippines Thursday before heading out to sea.

Government television reported the storm's 127 mph winds damaged or destroyed 14,000 homes, and that at least that many people had been rendered homeless.

Nina struck the Philippines late Wednesday night at the tip of Sorsogon province, 250 miles southeast of Manila.

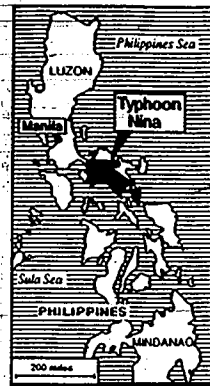
Gigantic waves flooded the ferry port of Matnog and killed about 200 people when the typhoon blasted ashore, the civil defense said.

After battering Sorsogon, Nina roared across southern Luzon and smaller islands to the south, uprooting trees, power and telephone poles, and sweeping away thousands of shanties before heading into the South China Sea.

Television reports said that in all, as many as 100,000 people had been "affected" by the storm, a term that can mean anything from being killed to having lost livestock.

Three ships plying the waters near the southern islands were swept onto land during the storm. Coast guard spokesman Lt. Cmdr. Rene Luspao said all 20 crewmen of the 1,000-ton vessel were safe, but some crewmen from the vessels Central Luzon and the Seven Log Master were missing.

The civil defense office gave a preliminary toll of 243 people dead, most in Sorsogon. Other govern-



ment agencies said 11 more were killed in neighboring Albay province, five in Masbate province, one in Marinduque, and 11 in four provinces of southern Luzon.

They said final figures were not expected for several days because the storm severed communications with the remote provinces that were hardest hit.

In Sorsogon, Roman Catholic radio station DZGN initially reported 1,600 people were killed

when tidal waves swept across coastal communities. Station manager Rev. Gerald de Mesa later told The Associated Press the figure was erroneous because it included people who were missing temporarily.

Late Thursday night, weather officials said the storm was about 280 miles southwest of Manila, moving west-northwest at 16 mph. They said it had been weakened by its overland journey and now packed top winds of 74 mph.

Nicholas Bayalo of the Philippine Red Cross said Nina was much more destructive than the typhoon that hit the same areas in August.

On Thursday, the center of the storm passed about 60 miles south of Manila, but swept the capital of some 8 million people with winds gusting to 60 mph, and heavy rains flooded many streets. Civil defense officials said more than 100 homes here were badly damaged, and flooding forced more than 800 people to seek shelter.

Manila schools and many businesses closed. Blackouts halted trading on the city's two stock exchanges, knocked out the government's Philippines News Agency and forced an international conference on the disease AIDS to suspend sessions.

Philippine Airlines canceled 20 domestic flights and those bound for Hong Kong, Tokyo and Taipei. It announced delays in flights from Manila to Honolulu, Chicago and Dubai, while those coming from Tokyo, Singapore and Riyadh were rescheduled for late arrivals.

## Tiber swells, as rain soaks Rome

ROME (AP) — Torrents of rain and hail pounded Rome on Thursday, submerging major roads, temporarily shutting down the airport, swelling the Tiber river to alarming levels and trapping children in a flooded schoolhouse.

Rome's weather observatory registered an exceptional one-day rainfall of more than 2 inches, for a total of 4.3 inches in four days.

The Rome fire department said it received close to 2,000 calls for help. It sent 400 firefighters and 100 vehicles to rescue citizens in trouble, including 100 elementary school children stranded in a flooded schoolhouse and a 17-year-old boy

injured by lightning.

Lightning also struck the tracks of a railroad line near Rome, halting commuter service.

At Rome's Leonardo da Vinci Airport, hail on the runways forced the cancellation of all flights for two hours Thursday.

The hard-driving rain, mixed with hail, left many central parts of Rome under water, paralyzing traffic, falling power lines and causing the walls of some homes to collapse.

Civil defense officials said they were particularly concerned about the rising water level of the Tiber River, which swelled to over 36 feet,

just 8 feet below what is considered to be the danger level.

In Florence, where the rain-swollen Arno River had risen to more than 8.5 feet above its average level, museum workers on Wednesday moved art treasures to upper stories.

As much as 3.2 feet of snow covered some areas of the northern Dolomite Alps, closing many mountain passes into Austria and Switzerland.

The Brenner pass into Austria, which was blocked by a 4.3 mile line of vehicles on Wednesday, reopened Thursday.

## Hooky-playing Communist officials are fired

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP) — Five local Communist Party leaders were fired for hunting when they apparently should have been at their desks working on how to boost lagging industrial production, the party newspaper said Thursday.

One of the five Dolj county party leaders was seriously wounded in an accident during last weekend's hunt, which was organized by the county's party first secretary; the official party daily Scinteia reported.

The unusual report said Marius

Cojocari, a secretary in charge of organizational problems, was shot and rushed to hospital in "grave condition." It gave no other details.

On Monday, a joint meeting of the Dolj party committee and the Craiova municipal committee discussed the "grave violations of party discipline" that led to the hunt, Scinteia said.

Craiova, the capital of the southwestern county, is a powerful industrial center known for its electric locomotive and passenger car

factories.

Scinteia said the Dolj party plenum "took a resolute attitude and condemned the misdeeds of some members, who instead of acting in the spirit of the party demands for removing (economic) arrears, have shown a condemnable... attitude by organizing the hunting party at the initiative of the first secretary, Gheorghe Matei."

Matei was among the four fired officials, who the plenum also said should be expelled from the party.

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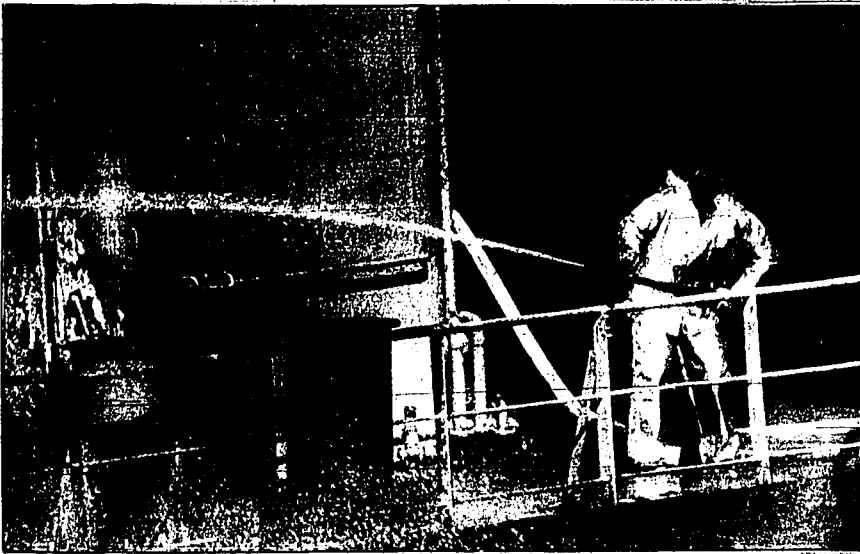

Security is increased for Korean candidates

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Police on Thursday stepped up protection for the leading presidential candidates and security checks at ports of entry, saying they believed terrorists might be planning kidnappings or bombings. It is highly possible that North Korean saboteurs or other international terrorists might try to infiltrate into the country, capitalizing on social instability caused by the overheated election campaigns. National Police Director Kwon Bock-kyung said. Also Thursday, students demanding government presidential candidate Roh Tae-woon withdraw from the race clashed with police at four universities. At one, eight policemen were injured. Kwon said he had ordered the country's 120,000-member police force on the highest state of alert. He said he had also had security increased around key public installations. The alert was triggered, in part, by the arrest Saturday in Tokyo of Osamu Maruoka, the alleged No. 2 man of the Japanese Red Army terrorist group. Authorities said Maruoka, 37, was booked to fly to Seoul Dec. 7 and they believed he had planned political kidnappings or bombings in South Korea before the Dec. 16 election. Police officials in Seoul said Maruoka had not booked a return flight. The Red Army, an ultra-leftist group formed in 1969 to push for "simultaneous world revolution," was known to have been involved in a number of international terrorist attacks in the 1970s. Roh on Thursday reiterated his claim that if an opposition candidate wins the presidency in South Korea's first direct elections in 16 years, national security and next year's Seoul Olympics will be endangered. The Olympic Games will be washed away, the morale of the people will fall to the ground and the nation's development will be pushed back several years, he said. Roh, a former army general, said he is best qualified to safeguard South Korea from growing military threats from North Korea. Government officials have claimed North Korea would send saboteurs to disrupt the elections and next year's Olympics.

Cruiser set to fire on Iraqi warplanes

ABOARD USS RICHMOND K. TURNER IN THE PERSIAN GULF (AP) — This U.S. battle cruiser gave within a hairbreadth of firing its missiles at three Iraqi warplanes in the northern Persian Gulf on Thursday after the planes approached in what officers believed was a threatening maneuver. They were flying in a ship attack profile, said Capt. John D. Luke, commanding officer of the Turner. They were flying low so that they would not be seen on radars, they were going fast and they were coming toward us. Officers aboard the cruiser, which has been on patrol in the northern Gulf during the past few days, say they average two to three alerts per day because of Iraqi activities. On May 17, an Iraqi fighter-bomber hit the frigate USS Stark with two missiles, killing 37 American seamen. Iraq apologized for what it said was a mistaken attack. Luke said incidents as serious as Thursday's have occurred five or six times previously, and this one came as a surprise to the crew because of the ship's long-range anti-aircraft missiles. "We didn't have much more to go until we fired," he told members of a Pentagon news pool who were aboard the ship.

Iranian frigate sets ablaze Romanian tanker in strait

BAGHDAD, Iraq — An Iranian frigate Thursday pursued and set ablaze a Romanian vessel in the Strait of Hormuz in the second incident of its kind in three days, shipping sources reported. There were no casualties aboard the 85,000-ton tanker Dacia and the crew brought the fire under control, the sources said. The ship, believed to be carrying Kuwaiti petroleum, left the strait under its own power. The Romanian cargo ship Fandana was set ablaze by an Iranian frigate in the same area Tuesday, and three of its crew were seriously injured. Thursday's attack occurred just after the U.S. amphibious assault ship Okinawa, the frigate McClusky and destroyer Chandler had crossed paths with the frigate and its Romanian prey.

Radio operators said the U.S. vessels, entering the Persian Gulf for the first time, had questioned the Iranian frigate on its intentions. The latter was quoted as having said that it was just checking the identity and cargo of the tanker. The re-flagged Kuwaiti tankers Townsend, Gas Prince and Gas Queen, meanwhile, were near the Strait of Hormuz under U.S. escort. They were well away from the strait when the attack occurred. Radio operators and helicopter-borne news teams said that the Dacia had been the target of the Iranian attack despite reported denial by its Romanian owners, who insisted that the ship was in fact at port in Romania. The captain of the ship was heard clearly over the radio identifying his vessel as Romanian and requesting assistance.

But say how close to the American ships the Iraqi planes had come but said, if you had been on deck you might have been able to see them. Another alert occurred about an hour later, and again the missiles went into position for possible launch, but there was no order to fire. The flight pattern was a familiar one for Iraq planes — that carry out almost daily air raids against shipping targets along the coast of Iran. The jets fly south, turn east across the gulf and fire their Exocet missiles at oil tankers on the way back north. The alert did not seriously disrupt the Thanksgiving meal, which included about 30 turkeys and 80 pounds of turkey tail, with all the customary trimmings: dressing, mashed potatoes, cranberry sauce, sweet potato pie, pecan cream, and cake made in the shape of a turkey. The scene was repeated aboard the other 10 ships of the navy's Middle East Force, including the missile frigate Elrod, escorting the 19th convoy of U.S. flagged Kuwaiti tankers toward the Strait of Hormuz, and 18 other warships outside in the Gulf of Oman and the Arabian Sea. The "Battlecruiser Chorus," eight crew members who only recently began singing together, sang several hymns at the service and made their debut before national network television cameras, broadcast as a network news team was present as part of the media pool. With the crew dressed in crisp blue navy dunnages and the officers in whites, Capt. Luke gave out awards to several members of the crew for top performance and said they could be thankful for "our beautiful country, families and friends, our good health and safety in the dangerous environment of the Persian Gulf and aboard this ship."

Pollution killing Swiss forests

BERN, Switzerland (AP) — Pollution is poisoning Swiss forests, with the proportion of damaged trees rising from 50 percent to 56 percent in the past year, an annual government study said Thursday. It said one-third of all Swiss trees have deteriorated since the reports were begun in 1985 in response to public concern that pollution was killing the nation's forests. The studies are based on a representative survey of 8,000 trees. Damage from causes such as insects, fungus, snow or storms is excluded from the report's conclusions. Mountainous regions continued to be heavily affected, with 60 percent of all trees damaged. Northern and western Switzerland showed increased damage while slight improvements were registered in the south. Leafy trees accounted for most of the overall rise, the report said. Among these, roughly two-thirds of all oaks and beech trees were sick. Most affected among evergreens were pines, 70 percent of which showed damage compared to 66 percent a year earlier.

Possible Saudi spy held in wake of Mecca riots

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Iranian officials have detained an alleged Saudi spy for his involvement in riots in Islam's holy city of Mecca that killed hundreds of Iranian pilgrims. Tehran's official news agency reported Thursday. The announcement came as a congress of Muslim scholars from 36 nations met in Tehran to discuss an Iranian proposal that would strip Saudi Arabia of its right to administer Islamic holy shrines in Saudi Arabia. Hashemi-Rafsanjani, Iran's Parliament speaker, told the congress his country was willing to fight for Mecca's "liberation" from the custodianship of the kingdom. There was no immediate comment from Saudi Arabia on the Iranian reports. Iran and oil-rich Saudi Arabia have been at odds since the riots in Mecca on July 31 that killed 275 Iranian pilgrims and the subsequent ransacking of the Saudi Embassy in Tehran by mobs. A Saudi diplomat later died of injuries in the attack. The Islamic Republic News Agency, monitored in Nicosia, said the alleged spy was arrested by Information Ministry officials upon his arrival in Iran.

The name and nationality of the detained person as well as the date and place of his arrest were not disclosed by the ministry. It said more information would be made public after an investigation, IRNA reported. IRNA said the "spy" had been summoned to Saudi Arabia during the Hajj, or annual Islamic pilgrimage to Mecca. It claimed he confessed that he had personally received orders from Saudi rulers and security officials, including Interior Minister Prince Nayef bin Abdel-Aziz, to act against Iran as well as Iranian pilgrims.

IRNA said the "spy" told investigators the massacre was planned and that Saudi King Fahd gave orders to open fire. The agency provided no direct quotes in its report. Hundreds of pilgrims were killed in Mecca during the peak of the pilgrimage season in July. The Saudis said 402 people, including 275 Iranians, died in a stampede after clashes with Saudi riot police following wild political demonstrations by the Iranians. But Tehran has said Saudi police actually caused most of the casualties by shooting into the crowd.

Partial pullout from Cambodia turns festive

BATTAMBANG (Cambodia) (AP) — Thousands of Vietnamese soldiers headed away from the border in a festive ceremony as Vietnam on Thursday began what it called a partial troop pullout from the battlefields of Cambodia. A light drizzle fell on thousands of Cambodians and a marching band that gathered in the northwestern provincial capital of Battambang to cheer the soldiers. About 200 trucks, jeeps and buses carried 4,000 to 5,000 soldiers as they began the journey to the Vietnamese border. Hanoi says the pullout over the next few days will involve about 20,000 troops, the largest of the six annual withdrawals it claims to have made since 1982. Countries opposing the Vietnamese military presence in Cambodia have dismissed the actions as mere troop rotations. Vietnam, whose estimated 140,000 troops are battling 50,000 guerrillas in Cambodia, has pledged a total withdrawal by 1990. It says it will turn the war over to the forces of the pro-Hanoi government in Cambodia if there is a negotiated settlement of the war by then. Cambodian Lt. Gen. Hul Savon, commander of Region 4 in northwest Cambodia, told the crowd that the pullout from Battambang involved "Divisional Group 94," made up of one division and two infantry brigades. He said that since the war began in January 1979, these soldiers had killed 8,705 guerrillas and wounded 769 in 4,867 operations. Some of the returning soldiers said they had not been home since 1979. Battambang has been one of the areas most heavily infiltrated by guerrillas operating from bases along the Thai-Cambodian border. The guerrillas belong to a three-party coalition comprising forces loyal to Prince Norodom Sihanouk, a nationalist; Son Sann, a pro-Western activist; and the communist Khmer Rouge. In 1979, the Vietnamese invaded the country, transporting the current regime into Cambodia in the baggage car of a troop train.

"An idle reason lessens the weight of the good ones you gave before." - Jonathan Swift.

South had his excuses ready after he had managed to throw away today's game. Study how the play went to see if you are sympathetic to South's case.

South ruffed the second club and banded down his trump king to knock out West's ace. West shifted to a low diamond and it was over quickly.

"I make the game whenever trumps are 3-2," South exclaimed. "I don't mind matter who has the ace; all I needed was a 3-2 break. That's another 68 percent chance that went against me."

South was right about his 3-2 chances but he overlooked an added free chance when trumps are 4-1 (provided that there is no upercut).

Instead of leading a high trump at trick three, South should have led the low trump. Had trumps been 3-2, this play would have worked just as well.

The added chance occurs when trumps are 4-1 and the ace is singleton. In that case a defender's ace captures a small trump, and South's king and queen limit the loss to only two trump tricks.

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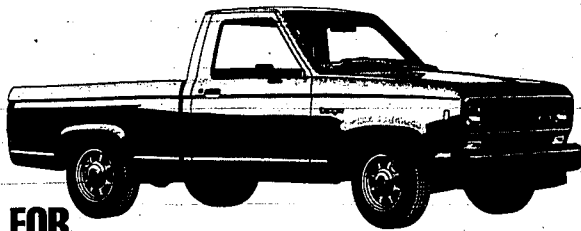

## Her eye's on a local album

TWIN FALLS — Singer Suzanne Croner is looking for 20 Idaho musicians to come out of their showers and collaborate on an album.

Croner, 27, who hails from Fairfield, has recorded and produced three original albums herself. After traveling throughout the Pacific Northwest these past few years, she recently moved back to Twin Falls.

**'I want it to be kind of like the recordings that were made in the early sixties. Joan Baez just sang with a guitar. Peter, Paul and Mary had two guitars and a bass. Mainly, I want the songs.'**

Now planning her fourth album, Croner says she wants to involve thus-far unrecorded artists in a collection of original folk, country and bluegrass music.

The recording will be done on Croner's own equipment and instrumentation will not be real fancy, she says.

Experience has taught Croner that making Nashville contacts is hard, but it has not lessened her determination to record her original songs which are based on personal experiences, true stories and include basic love songs.

As a child, Croner taught herself to play the guitar and write songs. "When you're snowed-in in Fairfield and you don't ski, you've got to do something. So that's what I did," she says.

Croner wrote her first song when she was 9 years old — "probably a goofy love song," she says.

Debbie Dunning, her business manager, describes Croner's music as "easy to listen to, enjoyable and relaxing, and a comfortable blend."

Croner's favorite song is "when I was in love with Jimmy Dean," which is about "a waitress that works in a dump little cafe and still fantasizes about Jimmy Dean," she says.

Although Croner has sung professionally for several years, she didn't begin recording her own songs until a few years ago. Then, as the mother of two small

children and with extra time at home, she turned to recording her own music.

Croner says she is amazed and excited at the response to her proposed recording.

She hopes to begin production of the Idaho artist album, which is tentatively titled "A Time and

Place in the Magic Valley," after the new year.

She is asking artists to send cassette tapes of their original songs to her before the end of the year at: Up the Crick Recordings, Box 310, Fairfield 83327; or, for information call Croner or Dunning in Twin Falls at 736-0029.

Croner says artists do not need to worry about submitting perfect recordings for her initial screening.

There will be no cost to artists who participate, although profits will be worked out accordingly to compensate Croner for her expenses.

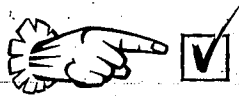

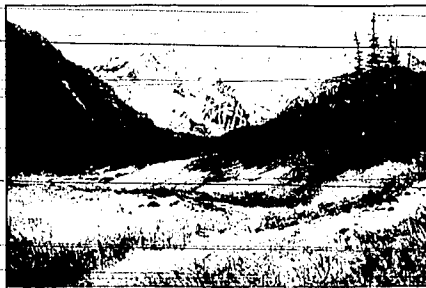

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# Comedy-fantasy 'Teen Wolf Too' deserves a silver bullet

**HOLLYWOOD** — Bursting with lycanthropy and lame jokes, "Teen Wolf Too" follows in the tracks of its predecessor, the 1985 hit with Michael J. Fox, to give us another howlingly bad comedy-fantasy: a dog in wolf's clothing.

The original "Teen Wolf," which had the luck to be released around the same time as Fox's "Back to the

Future" was a monstrous hit, but a pretty feeble movie. It was an obvious and crass mingling of B-movie werewolf legendry with addle-brained modern teen-age humor — the kind usually manufactured by concealing adults.

In it, the winsome were-Fox discovered, to his chagrin, that he belonged to a family of werewolves. Rather mysteriously, he also learned that werewolves play basketball like Michael Jordan, know-

edge that might have eased the torment of poor Lon Chaney Jr. in the original "Wolf Man."

The sequel seems to have been written for Fox (of "Family Ties"), and then quickly altered to accommodate Jason Bateman (of "Valerie's Family," and the brother of the same Bateman of "Family Ties"), playing the teen wolf's cousin, Todd Howard. Todd, a shy, sensitive soul interested only in music and biology, suddenly suc-

cumbs to the family curse: turning into a fang-slaver, finger-popping, goombah-goombah campus wolf and mainstay of the school's boxing squad. (This vulpine fame goes to his head. He dumps his sweet, scholarly girlfriend, Nikki (Eddie Chandler), and begins ignoring his studies, consorting with campus sluts, dumping on his buddies, buzzing bicyclists, coveting at frat parties, and, in general, acting like a cur.

Need we say more? Need we watch more? Anyone who cannot figure out the rest deserves to be turned into a were-dog. "Teen Wolf Too" embellishes its innos, evokes cutter-plots with remote direction, witless dialogue and charmless characters; including John Astin as a fiendish dean, James Hampton as a hairy uncle, Paul Sand as an inept boxing coach, Kim Darby as a teacher with a wolf-tail, and a variety of near-mute starlets as campus-

sluts. Then it climaxes with a Bingo Night imitation of "Rocky," complete with sweat, cliches and disco. The pacing is near-cataleptic and the movie's intended comic high-light is a frog-fight-in-the-biology lab. Isn't that just what you are dying to see and hear? Bad dialogue, lugubriously paced; awful jokes about werewolves, and guffawing actors curiously hurling around a lot of little frogs? "Teen Wolf Too"

# 'Cinderella' is re-released for holidays

The following are capsule reviews of movies playing locally in the Magic Valley. The ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**CINDERELLA (1950) (G).** A Thanksgiving season re-release of the Walt Disney film about the down-and-out girl who has a serious midnight curfew.

**BABY BOOM (PG-13).** Charles Shyer and Nancy Meyers (of "Irreconcilable Differences") thrust a baby upon workaholic Manhattan career woman Diane Keaton, who is terrific and never prettier, with results that are hilarious and touching in this sparkling comedy that is as topical as yuppiedom but honors the great 30s tradition of sophisticated screwball comedy. With Sam Shepard and Harold Ramis.

**FATAL ATTRACTION (R).** For

much of its length, this movie wavers between giving us an absorbing battle of the sexes — a true psychological shocker about a scorned woman systematically persecuting the married man who ditched her, after a clandestine fling — and one more formula revenge saga. At the end, sadly, the formulas win: Glenn Close's subtly detailed, terrifyingly passionate obsessive turns the movie into bloody predictability. Before then, Close and Michael Douglas — and director Adrian Lyne — wind the tension up tight; there is real heat under Lyne's usual gloss. The scariest moments here come not from violence but from flickering moments of everyday pathology pushed to the limit.

**LIKE FATHER, LIKE SON (PG-13).** Warm, imaginative comedy that has a brilliant heart surgeon (Dudley Moore) accidentally exchanging brains with his happy-go-

lucky teen-age son (Kirk Cameron). With Sean Astin, Catherine Hicks and Patrick O'Neal.

**THE PRINCESS BRIDE (PG).** In author William Goldman's heroic fantasy pastiche, everything is gloriously magnified and satirically undercut. It is derring-do tempered with wisecracks, with a plot full of heart-stoppingly beautiful heroines, heart-crushingly cruel villains, duels on cliff tops over raging seas, Jewish wizards and a daring threesome who might be mistaken for the Musketeers. Director Rob Reiner has less feel for spectacle and action than for humor and character, but those sustains the picture. And in Mandy Patinkin's Inggo — a mixture of Athos, Scaramouche and Yojimbo — the movie has a great, archetypal action hero: Erroll Flynn filtered through De Niro and Robin Williams.

# Videos offer a feast of family fare

**HOLLYWOOD** — The Thanksgiving weekend, one of the big family weekends of the year, is a bonanza for the home video rental market because so many people stay home and watch movies. They will have a bunch of new ones from which to choose.

"Ishtar," the heavily hyped, super-expensive comedy directed by Warren Beatty and Dustin Hoffman, should be the most popular new rental of the holiday weekend.

Warner Video's "Superman IV: The Quest for Peace" — a good family movie — is also debuting next week and is expected to do strong rental-business. More family fare: Nelson Entertainment's "Burke and Wills," the Australian adventure, and Warner Video's off-beat "Raboy."

But make sure the kiddies are not around when you are screening Vestron's "Personal Services,"

about a British madam, and Academy's "Streetfight," a raunchy mixture of animation and live action.

Other releases next week: "Gardens of Stone," directed by Francis Coppola, "Born of Fire" and "Delta Force Commando," starring Fred Williamson.

For the week of Dec. 6: "Roxanne," "The Secret of My Success," "Summer School," "House II," "The Wolf at the Door," "Eat the Peach," "The Gate" and "Masters of the Universe."

"Predator," the Arnold Schwarzenegger adventure that preceded "The Running Man," is due out on CBS Fox Jan. 21.

New releases include Touchstone's "Outrageous Fortune," directed by Arthur Hiller, is the kind of action comedy that usually stars two guys. But this one features Bette Midler and Shelley Long, two opposites — a wise-cracking vulgarian (Midler) and a dainty, upright, upper-crust fake (Long). But in buddy movies, opposites attract.

When they discover they have been two-timed — by the same smoothie (Peter Coyote), they join forces to track him down, involving them in an elaborate cross-country spy adventure.

Nelson Entertainment's "The White Blower," a downbeat, cerebral spy thriller about treachery, deceit and coverups in the British intelligence service; is reminiscent of a John Le Carre tale. It takes a while to get going and when it does it is more baffling than engrossing. When the son of office-equipment salesman (Michael Caine) has an accident, his father investigates. It turns out that the son, a disillusioned intelligence service linguist, is a pawn in an intricate, high-level plot that, when the movie's over, you still may not be able to figure out. Simon Langton, who directed the TV movie of Carre's "Smiley,"

## It's one banner year for kids' gifts

BOSTON (AP) — Parents searching for holiday presents for their children have a banner year to choose from toys, books, videos and other gifts, the editor of a parents' magazine said last Friday in releasing its annual awards for children's media.

"It really is the best time in the history of the world to be a baby," said Diana Green, editor of Parents' Choice.

The non-profit publication that reaches 1.5 million parents, children and critics to rank the best children's products and came up with a list ranging from books like "The Cremation of Sam McGee," "Fat Chance, Claude," and "There's a Boy in the Girls' Bathroom," to rock albums "Break Every Rule" by Tina Turner and "The Joshua Tree" by U2.

"What we're trying to do is recommend material that will work for kids of all kinds of backgrounds and skills and ages," said Green.

Also given 1987 Children's Media Awards were a computer program that uses Kermit the frog and other Sesame Street characters to teach tots about bits and bytes and the picture book "Why The Chicken Crossed the Road."

The organization also honored what it considered the best of children's movies and television, choosing a KING-TV Seattle program discussing teen-age sex as the winner for local programming. The same program was honored Friday by the Planned Parenthood Foundation of America.

"Local TV programs seem to be springing up with a thrust of real social concern," Green said from the Parents' Choice office in suburban

Newton. The Parents' Choice edition listing the awards will be mailed to subscribers Monday, she said.

Picture books are in among the favorites of young couples who "are parenting with a vengeance right now," Green said.

"I think the most important thing to say is that parents, from what we have seen for the nine years we have been doing this, really want to be involved in their children's learning but they just don't know how to go about it."

"I think that we live in a very busy world and right now we've got to get stuff to the kids that excites the imagination of the child but also squares off with the reality of the parents," she said. "We believe you don't have to spend a lot of money to do that."

For preschoolers, Parents' Choice recommended Muppetville, the com-

puter program featuring the Sesame Street characters. Educational recordings are growing in popularity, Green said, and a critic-tapped by Parents' Choice to rate the best picked "Grandma's Patchwork Quilt," a collection of folk songs sung by Jonathan Edwards and "Waterlily Down," the popular tale of a group of rabbits who leave their warren to venture into the world.

"There are more recordings, a big revived interest in the oral tradition," said Green, who said the list should not be considered to be for kids only.

"I would be very shocked if there aren't a number of adults who wouldn't like this stuff too," she said.

People," knows his way around British spy thrillers. The cast, particularly Caine and Sir John Gielgud, is exemplary.

Sure, Lorimar's "The Chipmunk Adventure" is for the kiddies, but it is one of the rare cartoon features that is hip enough for adults. The squeaky-voiced heroes — Alvin, Simon and Theodore and the spunky Chipettes — are duped, by crafty smugglers, into a transcontinental balloon race where they encounter all sorts of hair-raising adventures. The cleverest is their escape from savages who get caught up in singing and dancing to the Sam the Sham hit, "Wooly Bully." However, some of the other songs may be too cutesy for the older crowd. Also, if you are older than 8, all that squeaking may drive you a bit crazy after a while.

In Media's "American Ninja 2: The Confrontation" a power-mad drug lord forces a genetic engineer to create the super Ninjas, the ultimate fighting machines, to man the security forces that protects his

empire. But his plan is foiled by two Army rangers (Michael Dudikoff and Steve James) who spend most of the movie stomping bad guys in martial-arts battles in which they are woefully outmanned. The acting is awful, but that is a trademark of these movies. For martial arts fans, the non-stop choreographed mayhem is the big turn-on.

Virgin Vision's "Deadline," starring Christopher Walken, was pummeled by critics, who took exception to its confused approach to the war in Beirut. Set in 1983, it is about an arrogant TV journalist (Walken) who is tricked into doing an interview with a PLO leader who turns out to be an impostor. In his effort to salvage his reputation, he gets caught up in the factionalist warfare. Strangely, leaders of the Israeli forces are presented as scholarly. The only part of this movie, which was shot in Israel, that has a strong impact is the ending — the massacre at the Palestinian refugee camp.

Old movies on video include Director Howard Hawks' "Ball of Fire"

(Nelson Entertainment, 1941, \$19.95) is another movie about the attraction of opposites. Gary Cooper plays a stodgy professor who gets mixed up with a tawdry saloon singer (Barbara Stanwyck) while researching slang. He lives with some other prissy professors who are writing an encyclopedia. The saloon singer, hiding out from the cops, moves in with these kooky academics. Her interplay with these oddballs is the heart of the movie, which is a comic gem until the silly, slapstick ending.

# James portrays spoiled rich girl in Hallmark's 'The Secret Garden'

Texas-born Gennie James got into the movies on a whim. "My dad saw an article in the paper," says James, who is now 10. "It was an open audition for Places in the Heart." It was in Houston, so we just said, 'Well, what the heck? Let's just go see what it's like.'"

James landed the role of Sally Field's daughter, and suddenly she had a career. Since then, she appeared in more than a half-dozen TV movies and featured films, including the acclaimed TV movie "Alex: The Life of a Child." On Monday, Nov. 30, she will be starring in the "Hallmark Hall of Fame" presentation of "The Secret Garden," based on Frances Hodgson Burnett's 1911 classic children's book about two self-centered children who humanize each other — with an assist from a mysterious walled-off garden.

But James hasn't done anything drastic, like move to Hollywood. She still lives in the same town, Navasota, Texas (about 75 miles northwest of Houston), and she still attends public school. "I enjoy pub-

lic school more than private school," she says. "I think private school is just too enclosed."

"The Secret Garden" may be a children's classic, but James feels that the TV production, which features such noted adult actors as Derek Jacobi, Sir Michael Hordern and Billie Whitelaw, ought to appeal to adults as well. "Children will enjoy it because it's got children in it, and it's about children helping children," she says. "But adults are going to like it because it's so touching."

It's the story of Mary Lennox (played by James), an English girl who was born in India, where she was ignored by her parents and shamelessly indulged by their servants. A more disagreeable little tyrant would be hard to imagine, but her life takes a dramatic turn after her parents die. She is sent to her uncle's home in Yorkshire, England, and becomes enthralled with a walled-off garden that her uncle locked up 10 years ago. She also discovered another secret in the house, a sickly cousin (played by Jadrien Steele), who holds his poor health — and the threat of throwing

a life-threatening tantrum — over the servants like a whip.

James, who has a strong Texas accent, had to use an English accent for the movie, but she admits that it was sometimes hard to keep certain Texas expressions from slipping through. "When I've got an open line — you know, where I can make up the words to it? — well, the word 'fixin' slips out. It's a word we use down there for 'about.'"

When she's not making movies, James likes to swim, ride her bicycle and go horseback riding. "I also like to play dress up, and I love playing with my Barbies," she says. "I sometimes play school, things like that. A lot of the things I do, I like to pretend a lot."

It's the pretending that got her into movies in the first place.

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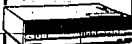

# Stone stars as the unpredictable Dr. Horton on "Days of Our Lives"

Is Dr. Bill Horton, of "Days of Our Lives," a nice guy or a mean one? Off the air for nine years, Horton returned to his family and his scalpel last August, displaying a quick temper and a dexterous hand at open heart surgery.

The old Dr. Bill, married to Dr. Laura (Rosemary Forsyth) the psychologist and father of Mike and Jennifer, had his volatile moments. And he happened to be played by the best actor on "Days," Ed Mallory. When Mallory left, nobody could fit into his shoes.

With a new generation of fans, Mallory remains a blur even to the faithful. Dr. Bill can return and be his own man. When Christopher Stone took over the job in August, he figured Horton was a real bastard. Now Stone isn't so sure.

"Bill has these flareups, he gets exasperated, but he's trying to do the right things for his family," says Stone. "He may go at it the wrong way, but he's trying. A well-meaning, difficult man."

That's called maturing. A character who's neither black nor white. A mixture, just like most of us. Best of all, fans don't mind not knowing exactly how Dr. Bill will react.

With actress-wife Dee Wallace Stone busy on prime time, Christopher continues his 20-year string of steady jobs. "I still can't believe I've been an actor that long," says Stone. "I still feel like a kid. That's the pleasure in the job. You never have to grow up."

Two decades ago, Christopher Stone, 18, was driving an M.G.M. Studios tour bus. The more he watched actors, the easier the job looked. But Stone was a ball player, a good hitter, a crack first baseman waiting for a tryout with the California Angels. Scouted by the Boston Red Sox, the kid from New Hampshire went west because he knew what a cold spring in Boston does to a hitter's arms, sending stinging jolts up to the shoulders when the bat connects with a fastball.

Stone never worked out with the Angels, going to acting school instead. In six months he had a local play and a two-year develop-

ment contract at Screen Gems. "Dec can't get over my luck," says Christopher. "After acting school, she went four years without a job."

Does Stone ever regret missing his shot at the big leagues? "I go to ball games here and think I could play with these guys," the actor admits. "I could hit. At a celebrity hardball game, I worked long and hard—in—the—batting—cage beforehand. I was determined not to make a fool of myself. At bat I connected and watched the ball go deep into center field. Broadcaster Jim Hill, an athlete, caught it high against the wall. In a videotape I have of the game, the crowd stands up as I took that shot. It would have been a double if anybody other than Hill had been there."

Stone still has that coordination, though it doesn't count in soap surgery. But remaining a kid does.

# Bochco signs to create new ABC series

# CBS axes shows

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Steven Bochco, the eight-time Emmy-winning co-creator of "Hill Street Blues," "L.A. Law" and "Hooperman," will create and produce 10 new television series in an exclusive agreement with ABC, it was announced Monday.

The agreement goes into effect July 1 and gives Bochco the sort of freedom that producer Aaron Spelling formerly had with the network.

Bochco denied reports he would leave "L.A. Law."

"No, that's not true," he said in a telephone interview. "I have been in negotiation with ABC for an overall production deal, but I'm staying with 'L.A. Law.'"

The agreement with ABC calls for Bochco to create, develop and produce exclusively 10 series over six years and for an additional three years on a non-exclusive basis.

The contract calls for Bochco's company to produce the shows and for him to maintain an involvement with each series.

"This agreement is a source of great satisfaction at ABC," said Brandon Stoddard, president of ABC Entertainment, who made the announcement.

Bochco said in a statement, "I look forward with great excitement to a long and productive association with Capital Cities-ABC Entertainment and in particular with Brandon Stoddard."

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS has canceled its first series, the low-rated "Leg Work" and "Everything's Relative," and has taken "My Sister Sam" off the air, though it will remain in production.

All three shows are on Saturday and will be replaced temporarily with a movie. They had their last broadcasts in the time period Nov. 7.

"Leg Work" and "Everything's Relative" were new this season. "My Sister Sam" premiered last season and did well in the ratings until it was moved from Monday night to Saturday this season. CBS said the show would return to the schedule later this season.

# Salt Lake City radio station KZZI finds controversy with aryan show

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah — Freedom of speech and freedom of hate and prejudice are colliding on the airwaves here.

Consider this: "Aryan Nations Hour" — a weekly stage for white supremacists — debuts Dec. 5 on tiny KZZI-AM (1510) on your radio dial. The Saturday morning call-in program will be closely aligned with Aryan Nations, a neo-Nazi group that has its headquarters in Hayden Lake, Idaho, and that has announced plans to open an office in Salt Lake City or Ogden, where the bulk of the state's black population lives.

Richard Butler, now under indictment by the federal government for sedition, is the leader of Aryan Nations, which is founded on a "Christian Identity" doctrine holding that Jews are satanic and blacks and other minorities are subhuman.

This is not a story of neo-Nazi storming, or even creeping, into Utah via the airwaves or other means. Despite recent disclosures of white-power extremists in the Utah State Militia, there is no evidence of Butler's group making visible gains in the state, knowledgeable sources say. And KZZI, with its relatively weak signal and daytime-only broadcasts, is no ticket to mass exposure.

What the KZZI case does is pose questions about the concept of freedom of the airwaves by showing how easy it is, under the umbrella of the First Amendment, to broadcast poisonous racist propaganda that is not unlawful but that potentially could incite violence.

After all, "Aryan Nations Hour" is arriving shortly after two neo-Nazis were convicted in Denver of violating the civil rights of Jewish radio talk-show host Alan Berg by murdering him.

KZZI is a talk-radio smorgasbord whose call-in shows range from an hour hosted by a psychic to one hosted by the polygamy preaching prophet of the eighth dispensation. The execution is rudimentary, the diversity admirable.

Yet how does a racist "Aryan Nations Hour" get on the air? And what dangerous and inflammatory messages does it convey to those listeners who share or could be swayed by its philosophy?

When it comes to "Aryan Nations Hour" getting air time, credit KZZI co-owner and general manager Richard Hinton, 39, who openly denounces white supremacists while selling them a forum. Attribute the show's existence to Hinton's acknowledged dedication — "I'm a businessman" — to making a buck at almost any cost.

Many of the programs on KZZI are brokered — the time purchased by the persons producing them, who also can sell their own advertising. "Aryan Nations Hour" host Dwight McCarthy's rate is \$100 per hour for the privilege of airing a weekly program on KZZI. That is \$5,200 prepaid for a year — a small fortune to Hinton's struggling station.

The 37-year-old McCarthy's new talk program succeeds "Counter-Marxist Hour," a fringe rightist show — but not racist, by all accounts — that he has been buying and hosting on KZZI since July. The new show will have the same time slot and host, but a different title and message.

Media furor over the new program has already begun, putting formerly obscure KZZI on the map and heaping publicity on Hinton, McCarthy and now also Neil Davis, who has been a salaried KZZI talk-show host and advertising salesman. A Jew, Davis is outspokenly at odds with McCarthy and Hinton over "Aryan Nations Hour."

McCarthy "preaches (that) Hitler was a great man, the Holocaust was a hoax, racism is good and the satanic Mongoloid Jews must be separated out of the Aryan nation republic," said Davis, a gray-bearded, balding man who has spent more than half of his 50 years working in radio. "I don't want this message on the air. It plants the seeds of potential violence. It steps on the graves of people who were killed."

Agreeing is the Simon Wiesenthal Center in Los Angeles, which has written members of Congress about KZZI, speculating that broadcast deregulation "has opened its door too wide for the bigots and racists."

Those bigots and racists — not four-letter words — are the true broadcast obscenities.

Davis said he felt used by McCarthy because he was the one who introduced McCarthy to talk radio, first by having him as a guest on the station where Davis previously worked and then by suggesting that he contact Hinton about buying time for his own show. "Dwight always talked about counter-Marxism, but never racism," Davis said about McCarthy.

Ironically, it appears now that McCarthy will outlast Davis on KZZI. Last week, Hinton ousted Davis from his thrice-weekly afternoon drive-time slot and offered him less exposure — a weekly hour on Sunday and another on Saturday following "Aryan Nations Hour," the very show Davis opposes.
