## Cubans agree to terms ending siege

ATLANTA — Cuban inmates holding 89 hostages at the U.S. Penitentiary voted Thursday to accept an agreement with the federal government that could free the captives and end the 11-day siege, a federal official said.

He flew by helicopter into the prison compound and stopped briefly at the Bureau of Prison's regional headquarters before entering the penitentiary at 8:52 p.m. MST, Justice Department spokesman

Patrick Korten had said officials were waiting word on when the pact could be signed, which could end one of the longest prison sieges in U.S. history.

The standoff here and one that ended Sunday in Louisiana had threatened to unravel an agreement between the United States and Cuba to deport some of those imprisoned after arriving in the March 1983 of 1980.

But Korten did not say the signing was awaiting Roman. The inmates, he said, want somebody to come in from out of town, in an apparent reference to the bishop. Korten said Roman would be allowed at the signing ceremony only if both sides agreed.

Outside the prison, Janet Lugo, wife of one of the detainees, stood on a street corner blowing kisses at her husband, Fernando.

"I feel great. I hope this goes through," she said. "I'm just glad that this is not going to end in bloodshed."

Several hundred marchers carried candles and sang "We Shall Overcome" as they walked to the prison from a nearby church.

"Without your prayers, there would have been no solution to what has been a long period of misunderstanding," the detainees shouted from the roof. "We thank you from the bottom of our hearts. Someday, we will give back something good to those who helped us."

Federal officials suggested the agreement be signed in the area of the prison where negotiations were conducted, said Thomas Stewart, another Justice Department spokesman.

He said a doctor would make a quick examination of the inmates, and Cuban detainees would be transferred to other prisons beginning today.

The two-page proposal had the approval of U.S. Attorney General Edwin Meese III, and was initiated by all six inmates' representatives in a meeting with federal negotiators, said Korten.

After it was put before the inmates, 150 detainees took to the roof, cheering and singing.

Korten said he was told the inmate vote was not unanimous, but that inmate leaders had promised to enforce the majority sentiment.

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## Reagan sees more treaties cutting arms

WASHINGTON — President Reagan charged Thursday that conservatives who oppose the medium-range missile treaty have accepted that war is inevitable between the superpowers, and he predicted there will be a summit next year in Moscow to make another giant step forward in the elimination of nuclear weapons.

In an Oval Office interview with network television anchors, Reagan sharply criticized conservatives who are voicing objections to the proposed intermediate-range nuclear forces (INF) treaty, saying that they are "ignorant of the advances that have been made in verification."

"Now, I think that some of the people who are objecting to the treaty and just refusing even to accede to the idea of ever getting any understanding, whether they realize it or not, those people basically down in their deepest thoughts have accepted that war is inevitable and that there must come to be a war between the superpowers," he said.

"Well, I think as long as you've got a chance to strive for peace, you strive for peace," Reagan added. "But you don't have peace and surrender. And there's no way that we're going to surrender."

In contrast to his criticism of the Soviets earlier this week, including

new charges of treaty violations, Reagan offered unusually conciliatory remarks about Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev, who arrives Monday for a summit at which the missile treaty is to be signed.

Reagan was asked whether he thinks that Gorbachev was being truthful when he said in the NBC television interview broadcast this week that the Soviets were invited into Afghanistan. "I have to believe that he believes their own propaganda," Reagan said. "He grew up with this and hearing this."

The president was then asked, "You believe that he believes that he has 115,000 troops in Afghanistan, committing genocide almost daily, simply because they were invited in there?"

"Well, you must remember that there were other leaders under which this happened," Reagan responded. "He inherited that."

Reagan said the other leaders had created a "puppet government" in Afghanistan. "Now, whether he knows that, to what extent they did that, I don't know," Reagan said.

Reagan said he is "quite sure" that Gorbachev thinks that whatever Afghan government follows after a Soviet pullout would be "similar to the Eastern bloc nations."

He said "our job is to make him see" that beyond a military withdrawal, the Soviets must accept that Afghans should choose

## House votes to keep clean air on agenda

WASHINGTON — The House overwhelmingly rejected on Thursday an industry-backed drive to take the tough, controversial issues of air pollution and acid-rain control off the congressional agenda until at least 1989.

In what members called the environmental vote of 1987, majorities in both political parties combined for a 257-162 defeat of an amendment that would have extended the Clean Air Act's compliance deadlines until Aug. 1, 1989.

Instead, by voice vote the chamber approved an extension of the law's Dec. 31, 1987, deadline for curbing ozone and carbon monoxide pollution until next Aug. 31, giving Congress eight months to work on revising the law.

The eight-month extension would prevent the Environmental Protection Agency from imposing sanctions during this period against any of the 60-or-more metropolitan areas and cities that EPA says will miss the Dec. 31 compliance deadline.

Both Idaho Congressmen — Dem-

ocrat Richard Stallings and Republican Larry Craig — voted for the extension of the compliance deadlines. They were among 90 Democrats and 72 Republicans voting for the measure, while 158 Democrats and 92 Republicans voted against it.

The Clean Air Act allows EPA to penalize areas that fail to attain the law's health standards on pollutants. Sanctions include cutoff of federal aid, for highways, and sewers and a ban on construction of facilities that would add to air pollution.

EPA Administrator Lee Thomas has said he is considering construction bans against 12 to 14 cities that EPA says have made little or no effort to comply with clean air requirements set by Congress in 1977.

The short-term extension amendment pushed by Reps. Silvio Conte, R-Mass., and Henry Waxman, D-Calif., would prevent imposition of any sanctions before next September. The Senate has not addressed this issue, but leaders of the Senate Environment Committee favor an extension of no more than eight months.

## State board gives nod to AIDS policy

GOODING — Under a proposed State Board of Education policy, institutions of higher learning will add AIDS to its unofficial curriculum.

The board gave preliminary approval on Thursday to a statewide AIDS policy for higher-education institutions. But colleges and universities already have AIDS on their agendas.

Idaho State University has held two major presentations this year for faculty and students on the Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome, said President Richard

Bowen. AIDS education is a "constant thing," he said. Boise State University recently produced a pamphlet and video tape about AIDS.

The state board placed its policy on first reading at its meeting at the Idaho State School for the Deaf and Blind in Gooding Thursday. The policy is expected to be given final approval at the board meeting in January.

Robin Dodson, a board staff member, and Deputy Attorney General Paul Powell drafted the AIDS policy at the direction of the board.

The board is very concerned with AIDS and what it means to

Idaho," Dodson said. "We are looking at a very real problem."

The primary reason for the proposed policy is to protect the rights of those — be they students or staff — infected with AIDS or who have tested positive for the AIDS-Related Complex or Human Immunodeficiency Virus antibody, which indicates an exposure to AIDS, according to the document.

Those people infected with AIDS can't be excluded from the campus, either in educational or employment capacities, unless there are medical reasons for restrictions necessary for the welfare of the individual or campus community, the policy states.

Infected individuals will be expected to inform campus health officials, although confidentially, about their condition. The situation can respond appropriately to the individuals' health and education needs.

Institutions will be expected to follow already established health guidelines related to AIDS, such as the recommended use of rubber gloves in the handling of blood.

By fall of 1989, higher-education institutions must have written AIDS policies, the state board policy states. Institutional AIDS policies must be submitted to the board for review.

## Western Union's shaky finances speeds action on sale of plant

TWIN FALLS — Western Union Corp.'s uncertain financial status has spurred Twin Falls city and business officials to close a deal with the company Tuesday to buy the plant.

The Upper-Sagehen, N.J.-based company owns the old Kallstrom building, where Boise's Trus Joist is moving its manufacturing plant. So Twin Falls officials are trying to buy the \$225,000 building early, before staggering debt leads Western Union into bankruptcy.

Twin Falls officials, echoed by the lawyer representing Western Union, said the company's financial problems should not affect the building sale. Speeding the closure is more a precaution, they said, to ensure the plant's arrival early in 1988 is not delayed by a freeze of company funds while it works out its debt.

"We're moving under the assumption they are in trouble," said Lee Wagner, president of the Greater Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce. "If we're

right, we want to get this done as quickly as possible."

The chamber plans to buy the building for Trus Joist in a complex financial deal financed by the city of Twin Falls, GIC and business leaders worked to bring Trus Joist to town because of 400 anticipated jobs during the next three years.

While acknowledging Western Union's difficulties, Mayor Doug Vollmer said he expects to close the sale with chamber, Western Union and Trus Joist representatives gathered Tuesday.

And not a moment too soon. Business reports show Western Union is floundering financially and threatening bankruptcy, as it faces job bank credit payments and missed an installment Service payment. The company has already returned three shareholders meetings — one most recently on Nov. 17 — in an attempt to restive its staggering debt and a fourth meeting is scheduled next Thursday.

The Wall Street Journal reported after the third shareholders session that Trus Joist refused to extend a See SALE on Page A2

## Idaho's chief justice 'critical' after apparent heart attack

BOISE — Allan Shepard, a 19-year veteran and chief justice of the Idaho Supreme Court, was in critical but stable condition in a Boise hospital Thursday night after suffering an apparent heart attack.

Shepard, 64, was undergoing tests to evaluate the condition of his heart late Thursday in the coronary care unit of St. Luke's Regional Medical Center, said hospital spokesman Rita Ryan.

She said Shepard was admitted to the hospital late Wednesday night. A nursing supervisor late Thursday said he was out of any immediate danger.

Shepard has had a history of heart problems, but indicated in an interview with The Associated Press last winter that he had no intention of retiring from the court.

"There's nothing I particularly want to do other than work, and I enjoy it," he said. "I fear a retirement that would involve sitting around with nothing to do. In my experience, people who do that tend to dry up and blow away."

Just hours before entering the hospital, Shepard presided over an appeal hearing that stretched out nearly three hours. Idaho Power Co. appealed a Public Utilities Commission ruling denying the utility all but \$3 million of a requested \$66 million rate increase.

Shepard joined the Idaho Supreme Court in 1969, the same year as the late Charles Donaldson. Donaldson died of a heart attack Oct. 9, and no replacement has been named on the five-member court.

their own government "and not simply accept the present stooges for the communist world."

Reagan spoke favorably of Gorbachev several times in the interview. He said the Soviet leader "sincerely believes" in Soviet philosophy "and also believes a lot of the propaganda about the western world and about our country — that it isn't just spouting off about short-comings here in this country, he really believes them."

Gorbachev, he said, "has never made" the statement that he seeks a "one-world communist state" and "is willing to say that he's prepared to live with other philosophies in other countries." Gorbachev, he said, is the first Soviet leader "that has ever expressed a willingness to eliminate weapons they already have."

The president, who has often insisted that arms-control agreements be linked with Soviet behavior on such issues as human rights and regional conflicts, took a different tack. "You shouldn't link these various programs," he said when

asked about whether arms-control agreements would be tied to progress on human rights. Rather, Reagan said, he will push "just as hard" for improvement on the other issues.

Also, Reagan praised George Bush as "the finest vice president in my memory in this country" but again said he will not endorse a Republican presidential candidate until a nominee is selected. While Bush has said he was left out of key meetings in the Iran-Contra affair, Reagan said "he has participated in all the major operations" of the presidency. "He's a major part."

have applied for the job on Dec. 14 and will nominate two to four persons for consideration by Gov. Cecil D. Andrus.

There was no immediate official reaction to Shepard's hospitalization. He has been on the conservative side of many key court decisions, including its upholding of the state's death penalty law.

Attorney General Jim Jones has expressed concern since the death of Donaldson, who often represented a swing vote on the court, that the conservative vote on death-order issues such as the death

penalty might be stifled by a more liberal appointment.

Under orders of the Idaho Supreme Court, Justice Robert Bakes became acting chief justice for two appeals hearings which went before the Supreme Court on Thursday. Bakes is the senior member among the active members of the court in Shepard's absence.

Retired justice Henry McQuade sat on one of the appeals, and Roger Swanstrom, a member of Idaho Court of Appeals, sat on the other. In addition, retired justice Joseph McFadden filled the vacancy on the court created by Donaldson's death.

The policy also dictates that higher-education institutions do what they do best — educate. And in this case, educate the campus and community about AIDS.

Dodson said Idaho institutions can make a big impact with AIDS education. The policy calls for a cooperative effort of the institutions to formulate a statewide plan for AIDS education to dispel "ignorance" about the disease.

But Idaho universities and colleges have already been talking to students and staff about AIDS. ISU adopted a statement on AIDS two years ago. Bowen said BSU President John Keiser said the proposed state board policy is consistent with guidelines adopted by his institution.

He believes there is an increased awareness about AIDS among students and faculty. State statistics show that AIDS transmission has occurred mostly through blood transfusions, not from sexual activities, he added.

Bowen said there is a moral attachment to the disease. If ISU takes the position that abstinence from sex is the only protection from AIDS, there is a moral implication. But if students are told to practice safe sex, there is a different implication.

Dodson said that Lewis and Clark State College and the University of Idaho are in varying stages of developing their own policies.

Powell said the proposed board policy was kept general so as not to thwart the individual AIDS policies of different institutions.

State Board Chairman Roberta Fields asked about whether the policy should extend to public schools.

Powell replied that inclusion of the public schools was carefully considered. But it was decided to keep them separate because of the issue of local autonomy of school boards, she said. In addition, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans advised school boards two years ago to consider their own AIDS policies because of

the Western Union beyond current debt of \$227 million.

Standard and Poor's MarketScope, provided to The Times-News by Edward D. Jones Co., reported Western Union defaulted on bank credit agreement Nov. 17. With only \$143 million in assets and about \$63 million in its pockets, Western Union faces more than \$1 billion in current liabilities and nearly \$78 million in long-term debt, according to Standard and Poor's.

If Western Union can't complete its restructuring plan, it has said it will seek Chapter 11 bankruptcy. Western Union needs, among other things, 60-percent approval from its shareholders to restructure, while only 18 percent approved in November, the Wall Street Journal reported.

Western Union's stock price stood at a five-year low on Thursday, as it sagged down from a \$47.87 peak in 1983, according to Standard and Poor's.

So Twin Falls officials decided to move more quickly, trying to seal their deal Tuesday, and possibly avoid repercussions from the company's shareholders meeting.

Wagner said the sale was slated before Dec. 20, and was expected by the 17th or 18th. So moving the sale up to Dec. 8 wasn't that unusual, he said.

"Now it's just a matter of signing it over and giving them a check," Wagner said.

"What we're afraid of is they've got a stockholder meeting and they may put it into receivership," he added, fearing that status could freeze all company funds for a year or more.

City Manager Tom Courtney already planned that city Industrial Revenue Bonds would be issued Monday or Tuesday to the chamber, which will then sell them to the city as an investment and pay the city back for the debt.

The Western Union spokesman familiar with the Kellwood building sale was on vacation this week and unavailable for comment.

But Twin Falls lawyer William Hollister, who represents Western Union, said the company is happy to close the sale early and get its money. He said so long as necessary correspondence arrives by Tuesday, the closing will occur.

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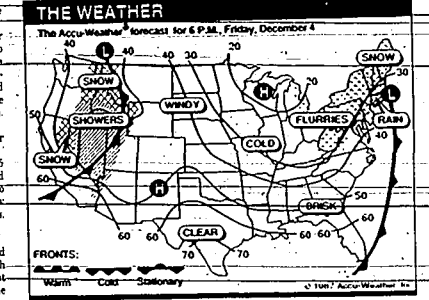
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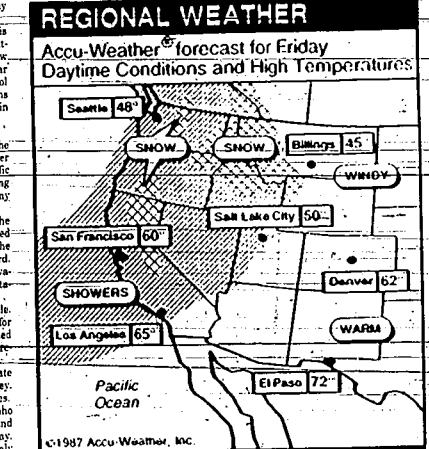

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# Farm Bureau opposes any tinkering with state tax structure

**BOISE (AP)** — With the state's long-depressed agricultural economy just beginning to feel some revitalization, Idaho's largest farm organization has gone on record against any tinkering with the state's current tax structure to increase revenues.

The Idaho Farm Bureau Federation, wrapping up its 48th annual convention in Boise on Thursday, backed the stand of Republican legislative leaders against any tax increases to meet mounting spending demands on the state budget for the year beginning next July.

"We will resist expenditures by the 1988 Legislature which would require additional tax increases,"

the Farm Bureau's House of Delegates declared. "We believe the 1988-1989 budget should be funded by revenue generated from the current tax structure."

Reinforcing that stand, the Farm Bureau delegates stood firmly against any attempt to end the state investment tax credit, a \$15 million tax break that Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus unsuccessfully sought to repeal last year on grounds that it provided help to only a fraction of the businesses in the state and had done nothing to revive the economy.

The credit could be a target for additional revenue that will almost inevitably be needed to reach agreement on a new budget, but the

Farm Bureau voted not only to retain the credit but also to seek a more favorable climate for business expansion.

The one departure from its "hold-the-line" stand was support for an increase in the state fuel tax, but even there the Farm Bureau backed only half the increase transportation officials say is needed to further deterioration of Idaho's flailing highway network.

A year ago, Andrus coaxed lawmakers into approving a tax-hike package worth more than \$100 million to erase an old deficit and underwrite an ambitious \$657-million budget with huge spending increases for education and economic development.

The governor is still working on his budget proposal for this winter's legislative session, but he has said the spending effort on behalf of schools must continue. Republican lawmakers facing an election next fall have disagreed, maintaining the new state budget must hold the line on spending.

But based on preliminary estimates, analysts have indicated the present tax structure will not generate enough revenue even to finance a freeze in spending, leaving lawmakers facing tough choices between a tax hike of some kind or a dramatic retreat from at least some spending commitments.

Farm Bureau convention delegates maintained that the full ef-

fects of last year's tax package have yet to be felt throughout the state economy, and because many state agencies have already begun campaigning for another round of budget increases, "we feel it is necessary to send a clear message to the Legislature that there should be no tax increase."

Agency spending requests submitted to the governor for his review in formulating the new budget blueprint totaled nearly \$100 million more than is being spent this year.

In easing its stand on the issue of fuel taxes, the Farm Bureau backed a 2-cent increase in the current 14 1/2-cent-a-gallon tax and sided with local governments that want half of the revenues from any

increase. They now get about a third.

The Transportation Department has said a 4-cent increase is needed just to restore necessary maintenance programs and obtain Idaho's share of federal road funds, and Transportation Director Kermit Kiebert said a nickel hike is not out of the question.

But the delegates said they believed the 2-cent increase would be adequate.

At the same time, however, the Farm Bureau went on record for construction of a new highway linking Lewiston with southwestern Idaho.

# Idaho city officials, shippers assail Union Pacific agency closure plan

**POCATELLO (AP)** — Local officials and shippers continued their fight Thursday at the Union Pacific Railroad proposal to close down its freight agencies and customer service centers in Idaho and centralize service in St. Louis, ignoring the railroad's claim that service will actually improve as a result.

Idaho Falls Mayor Tom Campbell testified before the Public Utilities Commission on behalf of the city's shippers, expressed disbelief that conditions would improve for railroad freight customers when they deal with rail personnel thousands of miles away in Missouri instead of with agents in their own towns.

Swisher, conceding the need for Union Pacific to prosper, said that all too often in the past railroads have eliminated entire categories of shippers in the name of improved service and efficiency.

"During the hearing, Commissioner Dean Miller told Union Pacific officials that the tenor of shipper responses to an state survey indicated the railroad had 'a substantial customer relations problem.'"

And Commission President Perry

tracks in Idaho this year and will invest another \$15 million in 1988.

But in extending the trial closures, the Public Utilities Commission said Union Pacific had yet to demonstrate it could adequately serve the needs of Idaho shippers by closing one-man agencies and consolidating their functions elsewhere.

Describing shippers as "angry, frightened people," Campbell accused Union Pacific of being naive for asserting it can provide the same amount of service by abolishing local agencies.

The railroad said its plan to close its last 13 local offices and four regional service centers in Idaho and transfer freight functions to the \$40 million national center in the Midwest would eliminate about three dozen jobs in Idaho. Other officials have put the loss as high as 100.

Railroad attorney Steven Goodsell argued that the centralization move will enhance uniformity and efficiency.

"Every single state in our 22-state operating territory, with the exception of Idaho, is utilizing the National Customer Service Center in St. Louis," Goodsell said.

Goodsell hammered away at Campbell and other critics of the Union Pacific proposal, but his grilling was met with Campbell's comment, "The same type of treatment you're giving me in cross-examination is the same thing shippers are worried about."

Union Pacific General Manager E.C. "Ed" May, a former Idaho Division superintendent, claimed the use of the St. Louis center has allowed the railroad to post record loadings for the past year while cutting expenses. At the same time, he pointed out that Union Pacific spent \$24 million to improve its

There was no immediate explanation of the move from the tribes.

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

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### Ultra-light brigade defies the veterans

The truth fairy perched on John Edward Porter's shoulder as the congressman spoke to the House two weeks ago.

"Mr. Speaker," the Illinois Republican remarked, "as the vote rolled up the other day in support of a Cabinet-level position for veterans, I heard from everyone around me on the floor what a terrible idea it was. Yet practically every member voted for it. Why?"

Porter, one of an ultralight brigade of 17 who had the guts to vote no against the herd of 399 who bellowed-aye, answered his own question. "At a time when deficits have reached crisis proportions, and courage to make the tough decisions is needed more than ever before, the Congress, Mr. Speaker, is obviously still gripped in the craven fear of special interests."

Of course the interests are all worthy, he said, and "Congress has done a magnificent job" of responding to them, "but we have lost the bottom line. Business as usual has brought us to where we are," the congressman lamented.

He is right, of course. Rarely do you find it so unsparringly said.

The lonely few who resisted this bill were an odd match of liberal Democrats and conservative Republicans — Mo Udall and William Danenmeyer side by side.

Each had his own reasons, but many had the sense, as one of them put it, that the House was voting "to institutionalize a constituency that feels it has a right to draw on the Treasury," was setting itself up, even more than it is set up now, to be the object of "organized, systematic advocacy."

No one disputes that the country has a special obligation to those who are sent to fight for it. The wounded and their families and the survivors of the dead must all be cared for. The majority who return unhurt must also be made whole.

But at some point the government has no greater obligation to this latter group than to citizens generally. That is what the veterans' programs do not recognize; that is partly why they are so fat.

Elevating the Veterans Administration to a department will only make them fatter, by adding to the long ton of clout behind them. The vote in the House is a measure of how great that clout already is.

It comes down to whether the Senate will also bow and scrape, or can summon the courage to vote no. "It's time to end business as usual on Capitol Hill," Porter said the other day. Who can fail to understand that?

## Busy time in U.S.-Soviet relations here

There is something missing in the political atmosphere surrounding the forthcoming Washington summit meeting between President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

Neither in this country nor in the Soviet Union is there any talk now of a new detente. While the absence of euphoria seems fully warranted, political circumstances in both countries point to the likelihood of somewhat improved U.S.-Soviet relations after the intermediate-range nuclear force, or INF, agreement is concluded at the summit.

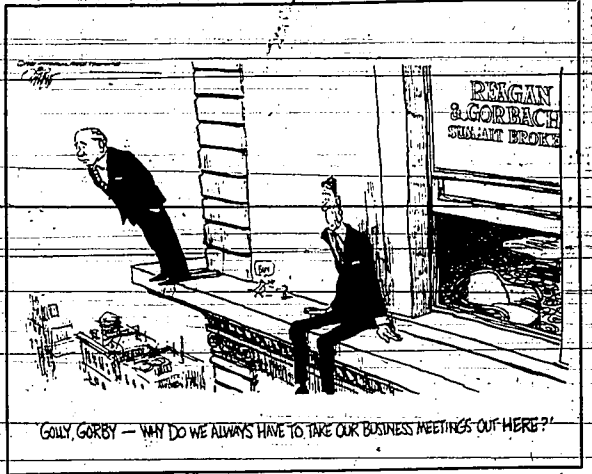
Reagan is in a hurry. If he is to go down in history as having successfully negotiated with Moscow from a position of strength, he needs additional agreements before the election season begins next summer. To demonstrate the validity of his military buildup, he will press for a new deal reducing strategic arms by 50 percent. He will also try to reach an understanding with Gorbachev about the neutralization of Afghanistan and about a substantial increase in the flow of Soviet emigrants.

Gorbachev is also in a hurry. His much-publicized perestroika — the radical restructuring of the Soviet economy — has not yet paid off. At the abrupt dismissal of his strongest supporter, Boris Yeltsin, has shown the policy of glasnost or openness, has not gone — and perhaps cannot go — as far as he would like it to go. What he needs, then, is some success in the realm of foreign policy. His headline is the critical party conference that is scheduled for next June.

Accordingly, expect a busy season in U.S.-Soviet relations in the first half of 1988. Reagan is fighting for his place in history; Gorbachev is fighting for his primacy in the Kremlin.

What, specifically, 1988 will bring depends on what happens at the summit meeting and in its immediate aftermath. Generally speaking, there are three possibilities: a) The most likely is that the INF accord will be signed and ratified by the Senate. Most Democrats, who have always favored arms control, will support it. Most Republicans, though they will voice reservations, will ultimately support it as well. For one thing, they will find it politically too difficult to oppose their president. Moreover, if the economy turns sour as the elections approach, Republicans will have to claim that the "policy of peace" and forget about the "prosperity" angle.

To strengthen that impression, the president will also press at the summit for a "framework" on the reduction of strategic arms. Watch for subtle signs of compromise on both sides. That



the accord, to be signed early next summer, will call for a 50 percent reduction in strategic weapons is a foregone conclusion. The compromise to look for then might consist of Moscow moving closer to the American position on the development and testing of the Strategic Defense Initiative, while Washington would move closer to the Soviet position on the long-term extension of the 1972 anti-ballistic-missile treaty.

The second and less likely scenario is that an INF agreement is signed, but not much else is done or said at the summit meeting. In that case, the chances for a new era of accommodation will surely diminish. If the Senate should then delay ratification of the treaty, the chances for a strategic-arms accord in this decade or any improvement in relations will disappear altogether.

The most desirable but least likely scenario is that Reagan and Gorbachev would begin to reach beyond arms control to settle outstanding political issues. Moscow's interest in genuine accommodation would be signified by the withdrawal of Soviet forces from Afghanistan, the removal of the rusty Iron Curtain and the Berlin Wall from the heart of Europe, and by provisions ensuring the free flow of people from the

Soviet Union. Washington's interest in entering an era of constructive relations would be signified by the elimination of existing barriers to the expansion of trade between the two countries.

Despite Gorbachev's skillful use of public diplomacy, such a turn of events is still highly unlikely. True, the Soviet leader has called Afghanistan a "bleeding wound," defined Moscow's relations with Eastern Europe in more tentative terms than his predecessors and hinted at new approaches to emigration. But deeds have not yet matched his words.

Thus, what will almost certainly remain on the U.S. Soviet agenda is the resolution of difficult and elusive political issues, the most serious of which is still Soviet expansionism. The prospective reduction of nuclear weapons is a necessary but insufficient step toward genuine detente.

It is well to remember that political issues, not arms buildups, caused the Cold War and that only the resolution of such political issues, not arms reduction alone, can end it.

## Gorbachev interview an image-polisher

NBC had billed its interview with Mikhail S. Gorbachev as a chance to see "Tom Brokaw go 'One on One With Gorbachev,'" thereby usurping President Reagan's prerogative as the only American entitled to arm wrestle with the Soviet leader.

The sort of thing is generally dismissed as mere hype, but it should be pointed out that hype is not an altogether innocent indulgence. It cheapens news and demeans events by building false expectations and making serious subjects seem inconsequential.

It also cheapens the purveyor of news. NBC did itself a disservice, and Brokaw as well, by pitching the interview more as a "show" than an opportunity for Americans to take the measure of a leader who, like it or not, is playing such an important part in their lives.

The disservice to Brokaw was more ironic in that if we really expected something like a contest between the journalist and the Soviet leader, we were bound to be disappointed. First of all, Brokaw telegraphed instantly that he was in a deferential, not an adversarial, mood; secondly, it is doubtful whether any journalist could outwit or out-muscle a veteran of Kremlin power struggles such as Gorbachev. Someone like Tom Snyder might have made a brawl of it, which would make for livelier television, but he probably would not have gotten any more from

Gorbachev than the Soviet leader was prepared to give Brokaw.

Both Gorbachev and NBC had gone to their summits largely for image-polishing purposes. How the television journalist conducted himself — and the mere fact that he had been granted the interview — seemed to be as vital to the network as anything that might be elicited in the way of information for the benefit of the world's people. For Gorbachev, it was a rare opportunity to convince the American public that he did not have horns, and to deliver self-serving and contradictory positions without much fear of challenge.

For example, he spoke about democracy and the democratic process as though he were on intimate terms with it in his country. He also stood up for the rights of people to make their own choice of governments without interference. Brokaw apparently was too polite to bring up Hungary or Poland. He did, however, at least bring an admission from Gorbachev that the one-party system in Russia was "in no danger of collapse."

If the interview itself, with its self-congratulatory overtones, was a disappointment, the coverage of it in the next day's papers was puzzling. It is too easy to second-guess journalists about their news judgment, but it is rare when you get so many different views as to what was and was not important in a news event.

No two papers agreed completely, but most agreed that Gorbachev's acknowledgment that the Soviets, too, were doing research on Star Wars was relatively new and significant. The Reagan administration has been saying that for years but not many have believed it.

Radio reports on the day the interview was aired led by the Star Wars angle, as did Newsday and The New York Daily News the next day. The Washington Post included the information parenthetically in its lead paragraph, but neither the Wall Street Journal nor The New York Times even alluded to it in their news stories — Times Washington bureau chief Craig Whitney said the information was "not all that new but perhaps should have been mentioned in the story."

USA Today, in its lightweight fashion, went with the TV angle and the New York Post led with Raisa Gorbachev. It seems that hype, which is a euphemism for bull, already has begun to surround the meeting of the world's two most powerful leaders.

## Lines between sick, bad acts unclear

BOSTON — I don't know when the town drunk was officially transformed into a victim of alcoholism.

It is still only 30 years since the American Medical Association first declared that chronic drunkenness wasn't a sin. It was, rather, a disease.

Now, according to polls, some 87 percent of us accept alcoholism as a sickness. But our attitudes toward the "sins" of alcohol are not as clear as this figure suggests.

We may no longer want to condemn alcoholics for their addiction. On the other hand, we don't want to excuse them from responsibility for their behavior.

This ambivalence about the semantics and social policy of alcoholism is now coming before the Supreme Court. Next week, the high court will hear the cases of two men, both veterans, both recovered alcoholics, both suing the Veterans Administration.

The two men missed the VA deadline for college benefits. They were drunk during their eligible years. They complain that under the VA guidelines, disabled veterans would have had longer to apply for these benefits. But calls alcoholism "willful misconduct." So these two have accused the VA of illegally discriminating against them on the basis of their handicap: alcoholism.

...of benefits, a special ramp into life? Must we then agree that alcoholism is a legitimate excuse for misbehavior, even for a crime?

In a curiously parallel case, the President's friend, Richard Deaver, is using alcoholism as a defense against charges of perjury. He would like to know what he was saying. The disease, not the man, done it.

These lines between sick behavior and bad behavior are not always clear. Leonard Glantz of Boston University's School of Public Health offers another example: "If you have a brain tumor and attack me because of this tumor, is it fair to send you to jail? Most people would say yes. But if you ran me down with a car because you were in the throes of alcoholic delusion, should you go to jail? Most people would say yes."

Our ambivalence toward alcoholism may be entirely appropriate, even accurate. We are often comfortable labeling alcoholism as a disease. There is medical evidence to match the terminology: We know alcohol can be addictive. We read that people can inherit a susceptibility to alcoholism. There may be a genetic link. The semantics also fit our current social-policy desires. If alcoholics are "sick" instead of bad, they need, instead, deserve, help. This atti-

tude has stigmatized the addiction, and put into place a vast array of programs on alcohol abuse.

At the same time, we know that alcoholism has an element of choice. You can't just say no to cancer. But you can say no to a drink. The cure is not in the hands of a surgeon. It is in the hands of the "victim." Indeed, part of the cure is getting people to take responsibility for their actions.

Ultimately, says Glantz, "we still must make choices about how people are handled." Choices for the whole of society, not just a "sick" individual. Most of those choices are made in the courts, not the medical lab. Today, even in a sobriety — someone who has no regard for the life of others — is not considered mentally ill, for the purposes of criminal prosecution.

We can label alcoholism a disease to help those who are in need. But we shouldn't accept it as a defense, when the alcoholic's behavior threatens the rest of the community.

If Michael Deaver had backed out on the highway and slammed into another car, we would not have forgiven his behavior on account of drunkenness. No, should we forgive perjury on these grounds.

As for the veterans demanding their handicapped rights, I don't think we should extend benefits to alcoholics that are denied to the sober. Remember that these two veterans have recovered from their disease. They didn't do it by making excuses.

# 'Apathy' in Congress placing supercollider in deep trouble

DENVER — Plans to build the world's largest atom smasher are in serious trouble because of "apathy" in Congress, Secretary of Energy John H. Hargan and a leading Republican congressional supporter of the project told a major symposium on the proposed facility here Thursday.

"The project is in jeopardy," Herrington warned several hundred scientists attending the conference, sponsored by the American Physical Society.

Herrington's grim assessment was seconded later in the day by Sen. Peter V. Domenici, R-N.M., a member of the Senate's Committee on Energy and

Natural Resources, who has been a strong supporter of the project.

"I can't leave you with a great deal of hope," Domenici told the conference via a satellite hookup from Washington.

Leaving many of the physicists stunned, Domenici said the project has very little chance getting funding in the next year or so. "I don't see \$500 million or \$800 million next year."

However, the pessimism expressed by Domenici and Herrington on the five-day-of-the-conference, which has brought together many of the top names in physics, including several Nobel laureates, was in sharp contrast to the opinion of former presidential science adviser George Keyworth.

# \$587-billion spending bill passes

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House approved a massive \$587-billion spending bill Thursday that would push Congress to meet its deficit reduction goals but also risk a presidential veto because of a rash of attached controversies.

"This is the first step that I believe must be taken to move against the deficit and begin a coordinated effort by the two political parties," said House Majority Leader Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash.

But House Republican leader Bob Michel, R-Ill., said beneath the rhetoric was a package laden with special-interest spending, a blunder created by Democrats acting as a legislative Dr. Frankenstein.

"This is government by appetite and I'd respectfully suggest the Democratic leadership put itself on a legislative diet," he said. "Despite opposition from most Republicans, the bill was approved

248-170 and sent to the Senate. A GOP attempt to send the package back to committee was also beaten by Democrats on a 220-198 party-line vote.

The spending bill would cover virtually all government operations in fiscal 1998, which began Oct. 1. Military and domestic spending, which is normally "procedured" by government, was also included. "The bill was wrapped into a single package."

# No new pain in proposed tax increase

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Finance Committee gave final approval Thursday to a \$20-billion, \$23-billion deficit-reduction tax increase that spares the typical taxpayer any new pain.

Except for a three-year extension of the expiring 3 percent tax on telephone service, the burden of the bill would fall almost entirely on upper-income individuals and corporations. A handful of workers would find some of their pay subject for the first time to Social Security taxes.

The bill, said Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III, "is in keeping with the letter and spirit of the budget agreement" that President Reagan and congressional leaders worked out last month. Baker expressed reservations about a couple items in the bill.

"I think it will pass" in the Senate next week, said Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, chairman of the committee. "It's the responsible thing to do."

Here are some of the tax provisions and (in round figures) the money they would raise over two years:

- Extend the tax on local and long-distance telephone service through 1999. \$2.2 billion.
- Require employers to pay Social Security taxes on all cash tips to employees by customers. \$465 million.
- Extend Social Security taxes to drill pay earned by inactive-duty military reservists, some farm employees and workers employed by their spouses. Premiums on the employer-financed, group-term life insurance policies there. \$50,000 would raise the same tax \$461 million.
- Deny the child-care credit, which benefits parents who have to pay for child care so they can work, for expenses of overnight camp. \$117 million.
- Freeze the maximum estate-tax rate at 55 percent; otherwise, it would drop to 50 percent next year. This rate generally affects only estates of over \$2.5 million. The administration opposes this provision. \$200 million.
- Require individuals to pay 80 percent of their 1987 income tax in advance through withholding or quarterly payments, delaying a 90 percent requirement until next year. This apparently is the only provision in the bill that would not cut the deficit. It is attached to a provision requiring corporations to pay more of their liabilities earlier, which would raise \$2.4 billion.

# Joint effort to explore Mars backed


WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of the House Science, Space and Technology Committee and the top Soviet space scientist agreed Thursday to pursue a joint U.S.-Soviet manned mission to Mars aimed at making the superpowers friends, not foes in space.

Rep. Robert Roe, D-N.J., who heads the panel, said he believes a common effort to explore Earth's neighbor could shift the international focus on space from Star Wars to a mutual star trek.

After meeting with Raold Sagdeyev, who heads the Soviet Space Research Institute, the New Jersey lawmaker called the goal "definitely forward and benefits to mankind in space are 10,000 times better than the destruction of mankind in space," said Roe.

Sagdeyev agreed, saying the exploration of Mars, some 49 million miles away, is "probably" the most challenging project of this century.

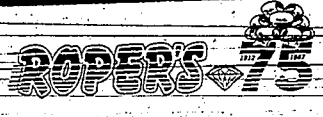

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate committee on Thursday rejected plans from the Reagan administration and voted to ban the sale of Stinger anti-aircraft missiles to Bahrain, a key U.S. ally in the Persian Gulf.

The 16-11 decision by the Appropriations Committee came after Defense Secretary Frank Carlucci and Adm. William Crowe, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, appealed to the panel to overturn the ban that had been imposed by a subcommittee.

Carlucci and Crowe met with the committee behind closed doors for more than an hour, urging that the sale be permitted as a way of rewarding Bahrain. The nation permits U.S. Navy ships to use its main harbor as the chief base for American warships patrolling the oil-rich waterway.

Both Carlucci and Crowe refused to talk as they left Capitol Hill, although afterward, Sen. Daniel Inouye, D-Hawaii, said they talked about the strategic importance of Bahrain and its support of the United States.

Inouye later lost, 16-11, when he offered a proposal that would have exempted Bahrain from the ban on sales to Stinger missiles to Persian Gulf nations.

The decision came as the panel worked through a bill that includes \$12.2 billion in foreign aid and \$290 billion for defense spending for the current fiscal year.

The bill will go to the Senate floor next week, where more attempts are likely to be made to cut the Stinger ban, according to Sen. Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz.

## House votes to cut off all aid to Haiti

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House voted without dissent Thursday to cut off all U.S. aid to the government of Haiti until a civilian electoral commission is reinstated and the impoverished nation is put back on the road toward free elections.

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## OMB, postal chiefs query budget plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Postal officials have joined the head of the Office of Management and Budget in questioning a plan to help cut the federal budget deficit by shifting some workers' retirement costs for the Postal Service.

In question is who will pay for cost-of-living increases for retired postal workers receiving civil service retirement benefits.

The Postal Service is now a semi-private corporation, but the cost-of-living benefits have been paid by the federal treasury, as most of the retirement benefits were earned by workers when it was a federal agency.

In the effort to cut the federal budget, congressional negotiators suggested shifting that burden to the Postal Service, a move which could amount to \$1.9 billion over two years.

The U.S. Postal Service is reviewing and is discussing the proposal with congressional and other key government leaders.

The U.S. Postal Service is concerned that the proposed change would significantly increase the need for money at a time when we are already involved in litigating a major rate case. Therefore, we think that the proposal is inappropriate at this time, the agency said Thursday in a statement from Postmaster General Preston R. Tisch.

Federal Budget Director James C. Miller was quoted Wednesday as also opposed to the plan, although he is reportedly willing to seek savings of some sort from the Postal Service.

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# Airliner incident stirs sabotage fears

SEOUL, South Korea — The suspected bombing of a South Korean airliner has stirred new fears that communist North Korea may attempt to sabotage the 1988 Seoul Olympics. South Korean leaders have charged their archival was behind the disappearance of the Korean Air plane and threatened to end all talks with the north on ensuring the success of the Seoul games.

"It is a plain fact that North Korea has inten-

ified its provocative moves," President Chun Doo-hwan told a special cabinet meeting on the lost plane.

Officials in Seoul say the disappearance of the KAL Boeing 707 on Nov. 29 somewhere near Burma had all the hallmarks of a North Korean attack.

"They believe a bomb hidden on the plane tore it apart in midair with the loss of all 116 people

on board and point to a long string of North Korean attacks on the south since the end of the Korean War.

The two Koreas, divided since 1945, technically are still at war since a peace treaty was never signed at the end of the Korean War in 1953 in which millions were killed and wounded. North Korea has said it is determined to "liberate" the south.

"The North Korean regime does not spare any efforts, however cruel they might be, to accomplish its goals," the Joong-ang Ilbo said in a Dec. 2 editorial.

# Iranian supertanker hit

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — Iraqi warplanes attacked an Iranian supertanker in the Persian Gulf in their third air raid on vessels off Iran in less than a week, shipping officials said Thursday.

Tehran's official Islamic Republic News Agency, monitored in Cyprus, said Iranian ground batteries shot down a French-built Iraqi Mirage warplane over the northern sector of the border.

But an Iraqi military communiqué made no mention of any activity by the air force on Thursday.

The latest claim was made as Iran continued to prepare for a new ground offensive against Iraq.

IRNA said Iranian Prime Minister Hussein Muwavi supervised maneuvers staged by 1 million fighters in Tabriz, in northwestern Iran.

By the official media's count, more than 4 million Iranians have taken part in exercises across the

country in the past three weeks, since Tehran rulers began warning a new gulf war offensive would be launched.

The London-based Lloyds Shipping Intelligence Unit and salvage officers in the gulf said the 259,347-ton, Cyprus-flag Anax was hit Wednesday 150 miles south of the vital Kharg Island oil loading terminal.

Iraq had announced that its warplanes struck a "large-maritime target," a usual reference for a tanker, off the Iranian coast Wednesday. But the official Iraqi News Agency, also monitored in Cyprus, did not identify the target or disclose the exact location of the attack.

It was the third Iraqi strike on Iranian-related shipping since last Friday, when Iraqi warplanes struck the Panamanian-flag tanker Stilkon.

## Center would mix research with economy

**GOODING** — A study committee suggests that both education and industry could benefit with the creation of some sort of center to help translate government-financed research into marketable products to aid economic growth.

The Idaho Board of Education, holding a one-day meeting here Thursday, heard of one possibility, better utilization of Idaho's large agricultural crop.

Dennis Keiser, a member of government-industry study team looking into the relationship between college research and economic development, suggested creation of an Idaho Innovation Technology Center at Idaho Falls, in cooperation with the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Keiser, manager of science and technology for EG&G Idaho, a prime contractor at the eastern

Idaho nuclear research center, told board members there is \$800 million worth of research and development money going into Idaho-Federal grants are going to universities and private industry, he said.

Of the \$800 million, \$600 million

is spent at INEL, Keiser said.

"On a per-capita basis, Idaho is by far the richest state in the nation, as far as research and development is concerned," he said.

He told board members a research center would be a place

where the resources of INEL could be pooled with those of the universities and private industry for mutual use.

Keiser did not recommend a location, but suggested it could be at the University of Idaho's Center

for Higher Education. By using existing resources, it could be in operation before long.

Keiser did not say how much the facility would cost or who would pay for it.

A panel headed by Idaho Mining

Association President Jack Peterson was made up of industry and state government delegates. Its goal was to look into the relationship between economic development and academic research and determine how academic research could promote economic development.

Keiser said much research at INEL is of potential value to industry; what is needed is technology transfer to get it into the private sector.

Keiser said INEL research is close to finding a way to convert sugar beets to fructose instead of the less valuable sucrose, which is the end product now. He said if a technology center was available, that sort of research could get to the marketplace.

"If we were successful as we think we can be, it could well revolutionize the processing of sugar," said Keiser.

## BSU radio to transmit into Twin Falls

**GOODING** — Boise State University received permission from the State Board of Education on Thursday to bring its radio signal to Twin Falls and send another one to Challis, Stanley and Salmon.

The board approved BSU's request to file an application with the Federal Communication Commission to establish a repeater station for KBSU Radio in Twin Falls to relay the station's FM signal to the area.

According to a staff report, the application was

in response to requests by Twin Falls residents and community leaders.

KBSU/BSU also sought the board's permission to request approval for a translator station to serve Stanley, Challis and Salmon.

Rayborn Barton, the board's chief academic officer, said the KBSU requests had been approved by the new Telecommunications Council, charged with implementing a policy on how to deliver courses and workshops through telecommunications.

There had been a concern among council members over the KBSU request to serve Twin Falls because of information that Ricks College, a private institution out of Rexburg, was interested in

sending its public radio signal into Twin Falls through an effort with Idaho State University, Barton said.

Upon further study, it was determined there was no conflict with the KBSU and Ricks proposals, Barton said.

But the state board members didn't unanimously approve the KBSU request, citing potential for territorial conflicts among other institutions seeking a voice on the airwaves.

Trustee Charles Grant of Rexburg advised caution.

"The board ought to back off and see what we're creating," he said.

## Pedersen elected county chairman

**TWIN FALLS** — Short, sweet and swift, Twin Falls Democrats met and elected two new leaders Tuesday, and briefly discussed the status of the party.

As predicted, Twin Falls attorney Ken Pedersen was elected unanimously as county chairman, replacing Joe Gulick, who resigned last week citing business and family concerns.

"I'm just unable to do it right now," he said.

Pedersen, 39, made a brief acceptance speech to the 14 other Democrats present, and exhorted the party to keep pushing.

"The little guy in this county needs to be represented," Pedersen said. "Absolute power corrupts absolutely, and when you let one party run the show, you get a run-away system. We can't let down our role."

Lancaster said Democrats need "someone in charge who can get things done."

There are Democrats here in Twin Falls County, they're just not had real good choices in the past," Lancaster said.

"It will be our challenge to get some candidates," he said.

Pedersen said since 1988 is a presidential election year, more people will be paying attention to politics, and "it will be a year of opportunity for us, and we plan to take advantage of it."

"We think there are some legislative seats in this area the Republicans hold that are vulnerable, and we think we can come up with some credible, viable candidates," he said.

He declined to identify specific seats.

In an effort to heal wounds, Pedersen also praised Gulick for his work. Gulick, elected last year as chairman, was not present.

"Joe served well and was a hard worker," Pedersen said. "I'm very sorry he doesn't want to continue in a leadership role. We owe him a debt for his hard work."

McMurrin, who resigned earlier, but remained on until new leaders were found, said he was pleased with the election.

"I support Tom Lancaster. I think he's a good human being who's interested in the community," McMurrin said. "I'm real pleased with his election. He's always been good worker."

McMurrin said he will remain active in politics in community.

## Noxious weed kills herd

**BLOSS** — The deaths of 16 sheep on a ranch near Bloss last week have been attributed to the livestock poisoning weed, halogent.

The sheep, owned by Peter Janas, were northeast of Bloss when they began dying, Janas said they were being driven to the ranch from alfalfa pasture on Camas Prairie when they ate the poisonous weed.

"We knew it was there and we have driven sheep in that area for six years without any trouble," Janas said.

"He said the drought conditions may have had something to do with the sheep, but since competing vegetation that keeps halogent in check had died off

"In addition to the animals that died, another 14 or so were treated for severe effects of the poisoning," said John Odings, who manages the sheep operation. Janas said the treatment probably had nothing to do with the survival since the animals at that age are tough enough to make them sick.

He said about all that can be when the animals eat the weed is to bury them.

He estimated his loss of \$6,000, saying while that is a severe loss for an overnight situation, he can count on a loss of about 15 percent of his herd a year, from old age, illness or predators. He said the weed that killed the sheep is growing on public land.

He said it could be eliminated by certain management procedures in heavily grazed areas.

Dr. Darryl Yeager, Wendell veterinarian, inspected the sheep that died or became ill. After his initial examination, he said he could find no indicator on them that they had eaten halogent or any other poisonous plants. But a later examination revealed evidence of halogent, he said.

John Faulkner of Gooding, who also grazes sheep in that area and serves on the Idaho Sheep Commission, said he, too, is aware of the halogent growing near the Janas ranch. He said only Janas and he keep sheep in the area north of Bloss.

"The more the poisonous weed is growing as much as possible, and makes certain his animals have been well fed ahead of time so they won't be inclined to eat the halogent."

Bob Cordell, area manager for the Shoshone Bureau of Land Management District, said there are small patches of halogent in many areas of the district. But usually after the first good freeze the weed is not strong enough to kill livestock.

"We have received more than 50 letters from interested people sharing their concerns and suggestions for what they would like to see in this plan," Phillips said. "Forest Service skiff lift engineers will review the design and construction plans as soon as they are submitted by Sun Valley Co."

The proposed Look-Out Express lift will originate at the bottom of the mountain and unload at the top, creating a slope length of over 9,000 feet with a vertical rise of nearly 3,100 feet. With a capacity for 1,500 skiers an hour, it will replace two lifts built in 1965.

"The Christmas express lift, replacing lifts built in 1957 and 1971, will run from the Roundhouse Restaurant to the top with a 4,100-foot slope length and a rise of just over 1,300 feet. It will handle 2,400 skiers an hour."

The new Grey Hawk chairlift will have a 4,350-foot slope length and a vertical rise of nearly 1,600 feet. It will also handle up to 2,400 skiers an hour.

The Sawtooth National Forest has endorsed the project, citing the fact that the modernization is encompassed in the resort's master development plan. But Ketchum District Ranger John Phipps said there will still be an opportunity for public comments on the proposition as the environmental assessment is put together.

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## Resort plans an upgrade

**SUN VALLEY** — A multimillion-dollar modernization of its facilities that will significantly increase access while reducing lift time on Sun Valley's Bald Mountain has been announced by the Sun Valley Co.

General Manager Wally Huffman said Thursday the resort has received conceptual approval for construction of the first detachable chairlift in the Northern Rocky

Mountain region. The three high-speed lifts and run improvements they will require will cost between \$5.5 million and \$6 million and should be ready by the 1988 skiing season, Huffman said.

Two of the lifts will replace chairlifts that have been in use for between 15 and 30 years and the third will open direct access to the Upper Grey Hawk ski run.

"These state-of-the-art skiers move travel at about twice the speed of conventional chairlifts," Huffman said. "The detachable-type chairs are released from the high-speed cable during the loading and unloading process, enabling children, low-intermediate skiers and foot passengers to board and unload with ease."

"This new convenience also will allow for future summer access to mountain restaurants and summer recreation on Bald Mountain," he said.

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## LSD caution letter probably a hoax

**RUPERT** — A letter being circulated in the Burley-Rupert area warning of children's stickers laced with LSD is both apocryphal and probably fallacious, according to area officials.

The letter, which admonishes parents to look out for variously named stickers, stamps and tattoos soaked with LSD, claims to be a "Notice from Minidoka Memorial Hospital." But according to Ed Richardson, the hospital's administrator, the hospital has had no involvement with either the writing of the letter or its circulation.

"It was brought to our attention a couple of weeks ago, and we tried to trace down how our name got on it," Richardson said Thursday. "We never could pinpoint it down."

According to Richardson, the letter has fueled considerable concern among many of its recipients.

"It's been all over the place," he said. "People are extremely disturbed by it."

Richardson said the hospital has received a lot of calls from concerned individuals asking for an explanation of the letter's contents. The letter has been targeted at parents of school children, he said, although the specific manner in which it has been circulated is unknown.

The letter has also been spread in some areas outside of Minidoka and Cassia counties. Karl Dalton, a resident of Gooding, said Thursday that she first became concerned about the letter after having seen it posted in a grocery store in Gooding.

"I scared you," Dalton said. "You got the feeling from the letterhead that it (circulation of the LSD-coated stickers) was in Cassia County and moving this way."

Dalton said her concern led her to contact the Minidoka Memorial Hospital, at which point she learned of the letter's lack of authenticity.

"After I found out it was just a scare tactic, I got kind of mad," she said. "I thought that whoever was sending this out just might give someone who is interested in the field a scare."

Not only is the letter's source uncertain, but, according to Richardson, its purported findings are also of questionable value. The letter warns of the distribution of several stickers, packaged in diverse manners, whose LSD coating may be absorbed either by licking it or by pressing it

## Phone upgrade spreads to small towns

**EDEN** — Telephones will go dead briefly tonight in eastern Jerome County as Eden and Hazelton become the first of many small Magic Valley towns served by Mountain Bell to switch to more sophisticated telephone technology.

About midnight Mountain Bell plans to change service from an electromechanical central system to a more modern digital office that receives electronic services from the Mountain Bell office in Twin Falls. Mountain Bell officials call it a "host-remote" system.

For customers, it means that listeners will hear slightly clearer voices coming through their receivers and, shortly, will be able to receive the special services offered to customers in Twin

Falls. Scheduled to be made available a short time after the change are call forwarding, speed dialing, call waiting and three-way calling, says Terry Eldredge, area manager of marketing and business sales.

Customers hooked into the Twin Falls system will also have access to long distance carriers other than AT&T by dialing 1, instead of the code they must now use.

The change will also mean that customers will now have to dial all seven digits to place a local call instead of dialing just four numbers, Eldredge said.

The change in the Eden-Hazelton switching center will be made at midnight and customers will be without service for about five minutes early Saturday morning.

Kimberly and Hansen telephones are scheduled to be switched in one week, and those customers will also be briefly without service. Since the 1,900 Kimberly-Hansen are more than double the number served in eastern Jerome County, they may be without service for a few minutes longer, Eldredge says.

Mountain Bell plans to switch 52 southern Idaho offices to digital equipment as part of a modernization project that will not be completed until 1991. Twin Falls received host equipment for the project 10 months ago.

Towns that will be added to the system include Shoshone, Buhl, Castledo, Wendell, Gooding, Murtaugh, Hagerman, Bliss, Dietrich and Stanley.

# Hearing is delayed for evaluation

TWIN FALLS — The preliminary hearing for Twin Falls resident Roy W. Haffner, who is charged with first degree murder, has been delayed until Jan. 15.

15th District Magistrate Judge Charles P. Brumbaugh granted Public Defender Michael J. Wood's request Wednesday for the delay so the 47-year-old Haffner could undergo psychiatric evaluation before the hearing.

Under the order, Dr. Adrian Doan will conduct the examination to determine Haffner's mental

condition, including his ability to understand the proceedings against him, assist in his defense and state an opinion on whether Haffner had the mental capacity to form a state of mind that was malicious, willful, deliberate — and premeditated — on Nov. 10.

Police arrested Haffner Nov. 10 after they found Jesus Hernandez in Haffner's house at 449 5th Ave. W. with a knife in his chest. Hernandez was taken to Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, where he died.

The Twin Falls County prosecutor's office filed a complaint charging Haffner with first-degree murder Nov. 12.

That complaint against Haffner alleges Haffner stabbed the 60-year-old Hernandez with a nine-inch knife through the heart, diaphragm and into the liver.

Court records say Haffner telephoned the Twin Falls police at 3:07 p.m., saying he wanted a person removed from his home.

Those records also say Haffner threatened to kill the person during that conversation with police.

When police arrived, Haffner told them the person he wanted removed was on the floor in the kitchen.

# Proper highway funding is urged

BOISE (AP) — Although he isn't calling for any specific amount, Gov. Cecil Andrus says he is committed to seeing that Idaho's highway system is properly funded.

"We must make a concerted, determined effort to improve the highway system. And we will need your help," Andrus said Thursday, in a speech prepared for the Associated General Contractors meeting here.

Andrus discussed gasoline taxes and indicated he will support efforts to increase the state gas tax in the next legislative session.

"You'll remember that last year we had proposals in the Legislature to increase the gas tax. There was considerable support for that, but what can only be called a turf battle erupted over how to distribute the new money and the entire effort fell apart," the governor said.

"We cannot allow that to happen again," he said.

Idaho's state gas tax is 14.5 cents per gallon. Separate bills increasing the tax by 2 and 3 cents per gallon passed the House and Senate, but the two chambers never could agree last session and all the legislation died.

Andrus said every cent added to the state gas tax raises \$5.3 million for highway construction, including \$3.2 million to the Department of Transportation. Every new state dollar for construction creates \$9 in federal funds.

The governor said federal studies show that for each \$1 million spent on construction, 63 jobs are created in a typical eight-month construction season.

"Again, not a bad ratio," he said. "A million dollars equals 63 good jobs for Idahoans."

"It is clear to me that investments pay off," Andrus said. "We have successfully invested in our Commerce Department and that is paying off."

"We have made an investment, and must continue to make investments in our educational system, and that is paying off."

"We must invest in our transportation infrastructure and that, too, will pay off in big dividends," he said.

# Transmitter is developed for Air Force

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A mobile communication center transmitting information between U.S. Air Force base stations and tactical forces throughout the world has been developed by the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

EG&G Idaho, a primary contractor at the Department of Energy facility, designed and built the equipment called the Contingency Support System for the Air Force's Tactical Air Command. The \$4 million project created a video, audio and air communication system, complete with satellite terminal, that fits in a one-ton truck and trailer.

The entire rig can be loaded on a cargo plane and flown anywhere in the world, EG&G officials said. It can be unloaded in minutes, camouflaged and made operational almost immediately.

The system has two computers with color-printers and video screens for transmission of images, voices and words or numbers.

An operator uses a hand-held still video camera to take pictures that are transferred to a disc. The disc is inserted into a player and within 20 seconds a viewer at a base camp thousands of miles away can see the images.

The viewer can alter the photo to meet specific needs, changing it from color to black and white or negative form, adjusting contrast, sharpening the image and switching it to a line drawing. A high-resolution hard copy print can also be made.

The communication system uses fiber optic cables that do not leak transmissions like other cables, making it difficult for an enemy to intercept any message.

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# For police, weighing the unknowns meant checking action

**NOISE** — William Hoover is in fair condition at Bell Lake City Hospital and will probably be returned to Ada County Monday, Ada County Undersheriff Dee Pfeiffer said Thursday.

Upon his return to Ada County, Hoover is expected to face charges on three counts of first-degree murder in connection with the slaying of his wife and two daughters, and of the use of a firearm in the commission of a felony.

He is recovering from apparent self-inflicted wrist wounds.

Hoover, 50, a former Harrison Elementary School principal, is charged with the Monday shootings of his wife June Stover, 50, and the couple's daughters, Korinne, 13, and Kristina, 16, in their Boise home.

A joint funeral service for the Hoovers will be held this morning at the Jersey 2nd Ward LDS Chapel at 11 a.m.

Hoover was taken into custody Monday and transferred to Bell Lake City Hospital for treatment two hours after Ada County deputies received a call of distress from the Stover home.

Monday morning, three minutes after a frightened teenager called police for help, Senior Deputy Larry Green arrived at her dimly lit West Boise home.

But the girl had already been hit by a fatal shotgun blast, and her mother had been gunned down in a bedroom.

County dispatchers could now only hear someone breathing through the unattended telephone.

Green circled the house on foot and within three minutes was

observed by Officer Janet Munch. The officer observed the house from the street, then eased toward the brown-colored duplex.

Munch broke the morning stillness by banging on the south entrance of the duplex. There was no answer, but the officer could hear some movement," Pfeiffer said.

"They didn't hear any voices, which either means people are not talking or they were dead."

At 7:05 a.m. the officers' questions were answered. They shattered a sliding glass door on the home's north entrance to gain entry and found three people shotgunned to death.

Officers found June Stover dead in her bedroom and the two daughters bathed in blood on the kitchen floor.

An autopsy conducted Tuesday determined Mrs. Stover had died at 6

a.m. and her daughters had died 15 minutes later.

William Hoover was found on top of one of his daughters. Part of his semi-conscious body was also covered with blood coming from his wrist, which he had used to slash.

A shotgun was found nearby.

On Wednesday, Pfeiffer said the seven officers were forced to weigh the unknowns against the unknowns before entering the Stover's home in the pre-dawn hours Monday.

"For them to crash in the front door was a reckless thing to do," he said. "It potentially could have cost their lives."

"You respond to a situation armed with the facts as you know them, not as you will eventually know them."

While some officers secured a perimeter around the three-bedroom house, others crouched near doorways and windows, trying to peek inside or listen for information.

The storming of the house came over after sounds in the house had subsided.

"The officers could hear someone breathing and moving around the house," he said. "As time progressed, there was little movement and finally, no movement."

After that, officers could raise close enough to windows on area to see blood spattered on furniture, door knobs, and walls.

At 7:05 a.m., sounds and movement in the house ceased. Three officers bashed the sliding door away and approached the north side of the house, other officers covered them from the south side.

Police then found the bodies in the kitchen and bedroom.

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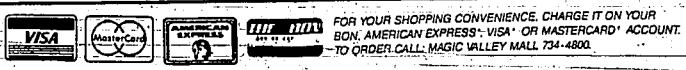

# Racists get long pen time

DENVER (AP) — A federal judge Thursday ordered two white supremacists to serve 150 years in prison for the shooting death of radio host Alan Berg.

The sentences are to run consecutively with their earlier sentences on federal racketeering counts. Judge Richard P. Matsch sentenced David Lane, 48, and Bruce Pierce, 37, saying they will have to serve at least 60 years of the terms before they are eligible for parole, because "a life sentence would not be sufficient in this case."

They and two others stood trial on civil rights violations charges for the death of Berg, a Jewish radio show host in Denver who used his show to insult white supremacists and their beliefs.

Berg was gunned down in front of his Denver residence in June 1984. Jean Craig, 54, and Richard Scutari, 40, were acquitted on the charges in the trial.

All four had been indicted on charges of interfering with a federally protected right, resulting in a death.

All already were serving federal sentences for racketeering resulting from a 1985 trial in Seattle where members of the white supremacist sect The Order were put on trial on allegations of waging an Aryan war against Jews and the government through bank robbery, counterfeiting and other crimes. Berg's death was listed among the causes for those racketeering counts, too.

Pierce was sentenced to 100 years then, while Lane and Craig got 40-year terms and Scutari got 60 years.

Matsch ruled today that the defendants must be incarcerated "in the public interest and for the public protection."

Both Lane and Pierce made statements at the sentencing hearing.

Pierce decried what he said were the "devious methods" used by the prosecution in the case and he criticized the justice system, which he said promotes racial mixing.

"The more you try to destroy us, the more people will respond," he said.

Lane said the trial was "predicated on perjury."

There is no federal murder charge and state prosecutors didn't file a state murder charge because they said they lacked the evidence necessary to support it.

# Critics lash plan to lift shutoff ban

POCATELLO (AP) — Critics of a Public Utilities Commission proposal to lift the six-year-old ban on winter utility shutoffs are arguing that the prospects the proposal has for endangering human life far outweigh the probable abuses that may be costing utilities a few million dollars each year.

"We're not dealing with poor people, we're dealing with poor attitudes," Tom Hale, executive director of the Idaho Neighbors Network, told the commission at the first of three hearings on the proposition.

After the Pocatello hearing this week, the commission will move to Caldwell next Monday, Lewiston on Wednesday and Coeur d'Alene next Thursday.

Striving to reduce abuses and encourage good customer-payment habits, the commission has proposed lifting the ban on shutoffs during December, January and February.

President Perry Swisher said that while the ban was originally intended to provide a safety net that would keep people from freezing to death in the winter, it has evolved into a system that allows some customers to obtain power or gas without paying for it.

Idaho utilities reported that they were unable to collect almost \$3 million from their customers last year.

# Repairs to Simplot Co. plant roof to cost \$1.4 million

CALDWELL (AP) — The roof collapse last week that forced shutdown of the Simplot Co. potato processing plant in Canyon County will cost \$1.4 million to repair, according to corporate spokesman Fred Zerza.

But Zerza said Thursday that the renovation work will still be completed by mid-January as previously projected.

The failure of an 80-foot roof beam has been identified as the primary cause of the cave-in. But engineers were still trying to determine why the beam failed. No one was injured when the roof gave way last Wednesday.

Zerza said processing equipment has been moved from the area and demolition of the damaged roof was already under way.

# NNC backs N. Idaho anti-racist group

NANPA (AP) — Northwest Nazarene College's faculty has given its support to a Coeur d'Alene group fighting racism.

NNC faculty unanimously adopted a resolution supporting the Northwest Coalition Against Malignant Hatred Inc.

More than 160 groups are mem-

bers of the coalition that was formed in April in response to Aryan Nations activities.

Stephen Shaw, an NNC political science professor who presented the resolution, said the resolution is more symbolic than substantive but puts the college on record as supporting the coalition.

# Solid perimeter shooters please T.F.'s Astorquia

**TWIN FALLS** — It's been awhile since the Twin Falls Bruins have had a lot of success in boys' basketball, and while the year of championships may not be here yet, Coach John Astorquia believes the rebound is on.

The surprising thing about the Bruins since popping up in state tournaments a few times earlier, is they haven't been much of a scoring team.

The town that used to produce one of the top-scoring guards in Idaho just about every year, ground down to minimum point production. It was not a pretty sight.

"I believe," says Astorquia concerning that situation, "that we have the best four perimeter shooters I've ever had on one team here and I think our inside scoring will

be the best it's been since that state runner-up year (1983).

But the reason Astorquia can't get out on a high and quick, very high finish is that youth and inexperience leave such things as rebounding and defense as major questionmarks. And offensively, his Bruins have to learn to play together.

The Bruins are not a big team but their possess solid overall height. The tallest is perimeter returning starter Loren Waldapfel, a 6-foot, 8-inch senior, whom Astorquia believes is easily the more-improved player on the team.

"I think Loren will have a senior year, very comparable to Craig Langley," said Astorquia of the former 6-8 Bruin who currently is on scholarship at University of Alaska-Anchorage. "And he helped take us to state (in 1985)."

Waldapfel is one of just three seniors on the roster, being joined by



classmates John Hayes, 6-3 who played on the junior team last year, and 6-2 Joel Jund, who started a couple of games and played quite a bit later in the year.

Swede Trenkle, 6-2, returns for a second starting year, although he's only a junior. Others moving up from the sophomore team are 6-3 Jeremy Willey, 6-3 Jody Brunant and 6-1 J.T. Eller.

Jason Astorquia, 6-1, will represent the sophomore class this time around.

Eller, Astorquia, Jund and Trenkle are the four perimeter shooters the coach referred to.

The others will largely be found inside. Astorquia describes Bryant as "probably the best athlete in the school. He jumps well, he competes well and he can score inside."

Astorquia said the team does not have overpowering quickness but it can run the floor fairly well.

A major key for the young team will be its ability to withstand the early rigors of the season.

"We have a tough early schedule (Burley-Wednesday night, Minico last night). We have one advantage in that we play some good conference teams on home court but then we're on the road," the coach said. "How quickly we can come together will be a major factor in our final success."

Astorquia said he believes this could be a respectable defensive team because of the lack of quickness to offset by longer arms. "We want to be a man-to-man team, and that's what we're working on now. But I think that later we will become more of a multiple defensive team," he said.

"In rebounding I think we will be better than the last two years, not because we are bigger, but because I think we can be quicker to the boards."

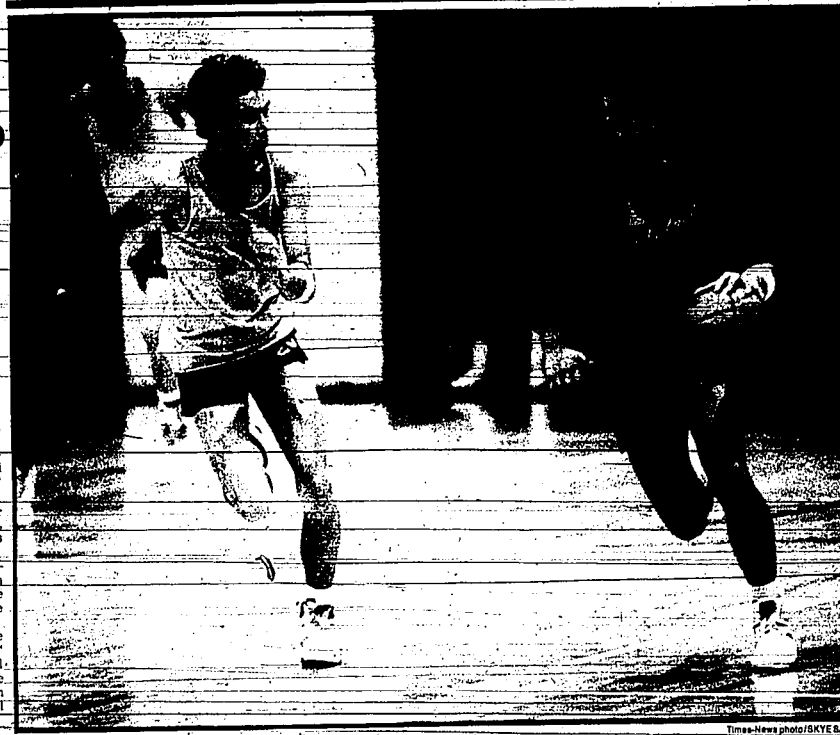
And then the Spartans have two senior guards with varsity experience in James Christensen, 5-11, and 5-9 Kent Schow.

Dexter expects help off the sophomore team from 5-8 point guard Pete Dexter and 6-1 "wild card" Eric Miller who can play anywhere.

# Love it or hate it, three-point goal in prep basketball is here to stay

In Palmer, Iowa, they're nuts about shooting a basketball from downtown. This season, the rest of the nation's schools will find the joy and sorrow of playing with a 3-point shot.

"It's a little crazy. We've used it," said Palmer Coach Alden Skinner, whose team averaged nearly 30 3-pointers a game last season, and made more than half of them.

But you can't argue with success. Palmer has won the past two small school Iowa state championships and had a 52-game winning streak entering this season.

The 3-point shot has been an option for two years. Some states have been experimenting with it for up to five years.

Iowa was one of nine states to use the 3-point shot in the 1986-87 season. So did North and South Dakota, Idaho, Wyoming, Alaska,

Montana, Connecticut and Utah.

Last spring, the rule was expanded nationwide for boys and girls by the basketball rules committee of the National Federation of High School Athletic Associations in Kansas City, Mo. It's the same 19-foot, 9-inch distance used in college basketball.

Palmer, where 20 of the 22 boys in school went out for basketball this year, averaged 19.8 shots from 3-point range.

## Productivity improvement indicates a lean economy

WASHINGTON (AP) — American businesses increased their productivity at an annual rate of 3.6 percent over the summer, the government said Thursday, indicating to analysts a lean economy that will make any post-stock market crash recession a mild one.

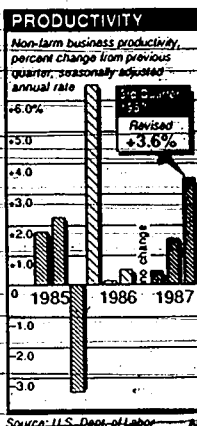
The third-quarter efficiency improvement, the largest since the first three months of 1986, was a full percentage point greater than the 2.6 percent gain originally reported in preliminary figures last month.

The Labor Department said the revision upward reflects a much healthier increase in the private output of goods and services component of the gross national product.

Output rose at an annual rate of 4.5 percent from July through September instead of the 4 percent reported earlier, the department said, with only a 1.8 percent increase in the number of hours worked.

Including hourly wage gains averaging 4 percent annually, businesses held labor cost increases for each unit of output to just 0.2 percent, also the lowest since the first quarter of 1986, the Labor Department said.

With inflation running at 4.8 percent the first 10 months of the year,

department said. While productivity and output were stronger among U.S. businesses as a whole, the summer business was smaller than previously reported for the manufacturing sector, which accounts for about one-fourth of the nation's economic activity.

Third-quarter output of goods in manufacturing rose 7.4 percent from the April-June period, a seasonally adjusted annual rate, instead of the 8.2 percent previously reported.

As a result, the Labor Department said, the efficiency gains in manufacturing were 3.8 percent instead of 4.5 percent, as previously reported.

The 7.4 percent increase in manufacturing output was accomplished with only a 3.5-percent rise in the number of hours worked. Labor costs associated with factory goods continued to decline, by 2.3 percent in the third quarter, as employers restricted manufacturing wage gains to only 1.4 percent annually.

For factory workers, the small pay increases translate into a 2.8 percent loss in buying power for each hour of their labor over the past year.

## Dow sinks to lowest in weeks

NEW YORK (AP) — A wave of selling swept over Wall Street despite a forecast of a rate cut for a lower interest rate. Thursday, sending the Dow Jones industrial average plunging to its lowest level since the crash of Oct. 19.

Traders said the market already was expecting the Fed and investors focused more on negative economic factors like Thursday's disappointing November sales reports from the nation's largest general retailers.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, which gained nearly 16 points in the previous two sessions, tumbled 72.44 to 1,776.53, a 3.82 percent decline and the ninth biggest point loss.

The drop left the blue-chip measure at its lowest point since it plunged more than 500 points to 1,738.41 on Black Monday.

As measured by Wilshire Associates 500 Equity Index, stocks lost \$70.66 billion in value.

## Retailing soft for November

November was another disappointing month for the nation's largest general retailers as consumers continued to spend cautiously, according to sales reports released Thursday.

A variety of factors contributed to the softness in sales, said Monroe H. Greenstein, an analyst with the investment firm Bear Stearns & Co. Inc.

"The crack in the stock market sapped confidence, while still relatively high, has slipped, Greenstein said.

Many consumers shopping for clothes had what Greenstein called "sticker shock," a negative reaction to higher prices, especially on imported clothing.

The major sales continued a trend that began early in the year. So far, 1987 has turned out to be a disappointment for many retailers as consumers, worried about their high debt levels and the economy, have cut back their spending.

Analysts said they remained cautious about the Christmas season, during which retailers earn up to half of their annual profits.

However, Greenstein said a pickup in sales at the end of November "gave me encouragement" that retailers would have a satisfactory holiday season.

The nation's largest retailer, Sears Roebuck and Co., said its sales rose 0.7 percent in November from the same month in 1986. Sears said its sales for the first 45 weeks of the year were up 3.1 percent from the same period a year earlier.

J.C. Penney Co. Inc. reported a 4.3 percent sales increase in November and a 5.1 percent rise so far this year.

K mart Corp. said its sales rose 6.6 percent last month and 7.7 percent so far this year. Comparable store sales, those for stores open at least a year, rose 4.5 percent last month and 5.9 percent for the year-to-date period.

Wal-Mart Stores Inc., the fast-growing discount chain, said sales from its more than 1,200 outlets jumped 26 percent last month and

35 percent for the year-to-date period. Comparable store sales rose 4 percent last month and 11 percent for the first 10 months of the year.

Greenstein — Department Stores Inc., which owns mass merchandise and upscale department stores, said its sales rose 1.1 percent last month and 6.3 percent so far this year.

Carter Hawley Hale Stores Inc. reported sales at its five department store divisions rose 0.7 percent last month and 4 percent over the year-to-date period.

The apparel retailer Limited Inc. said its sales rose 2 percent during November and 16 percent for the 10 months ended Nov. 28. Its comparable store sales fell 6 percent last month, but were up 4 percent for the year-to-date period.

The figures reported today are for general retailers and apparel stores, and do not include sales of retailers such as supermarkets and auto dealerships.

## A big question about home equity lines

Curious about home equity credit lines? If the answer is yes, you are not alone.

Lenders are actively marketing them. Consumer groups are vigorously criticizing them. And Congressional committees are seriously debating their merits.

The reason: Many of you are discovering there's no place like home — particularly if you own one and are looking for quick cash. Home equity lines (HELs) allow you to use the equity in your home to secure an open-end loan, meaning a line of credit you can tap when needed.

With a traditional second mortgage, you get the loan in one lump sum; with an HEL a homeowner is given a revolving credit line that may be drawn upon by simply writing a check, or in some instances, by using a credit card.

This flexibility is both tempting and dangerous. If you get in too deep, you risk losing your home. It's that simple. And it's that easy to do.

This is why, some critics told my research associate Beth Koblener, HELs symbolize how we as individuals (not to mention as a nation) have been quickening our way deeper into debt. It should come as no surprise, they argue, that HELs are so popular — enabling someone to turn a three-bedroom ranch or split-level into a giant credit card.

But if you are convinced that a HEL is right for you, what should you do?

First, Beginning next week, Dec. 9, all adjustable-rate mortgage loans, including home equity credit lines, must have lifetime interest rate ceilings. This little-publicized amendment to the Competitive

Equality Banking Act of 1987 was passed by Congress last August.

The significance of this new law is dramatic when you consider that a recent Consumer Bankers Association "Home Equity Lending Survey for 1987" of 1,376 financial institutions revealed that only 34 percent offered a lifetime cap on HELs.

By requiring the lender to tell you, the borrower, just how high your interest payments can go during the life of your loan, you are better equipped to judge if you can meet your payments in a "worst case scenario."

This requirement is just the tip of the iceberg. Rep. David Price, D-N.C., and Rep. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., each has introduced his own bill to require earlier disclosure of terms and conditions of HELs.

Among the key issues:

- Improved rules for disclosure. As it stands now, lenders are not required to disclose the terms of the HEL when you apply. It's only before the closing that you must be given the terms. Because of this, the Federal Reserve is in the process of considering broader disclosure rules.

"In order for consumers to shop around for HELs, the terms should be disclosed at the time you get application materials," says Michelle Meier, counsel for government affairs with Consumers Union.

(2) Limiting the right of lenders

to change terms of the agreement. Alan Fox of the Consumer Federation of America notes: "Lenders can change any of the terms of the loan at any time — from hiking monthly payments to imposing an annual fee." Having a rate cap won't necessarily mean anything if the lender can change the terms at any time, adds Meier.

Until further legislation is passed, and it won't be this year, you must be alert. If you decide that you want an HEL, consider:

- What is the cap on your HEL? And is there a floor (or limit on how low your interest rate can drop)?
- What are the additional fees and/or front extra costs? Few lenders charge points; but closing costs can be hefty and can vary tremendously. Closing costs can include appraisals, legal fees, title searches and recording costs. Some

lenders wait certain fees.

Are there any annual fees? What is the repayment schedule? Most are extremely lenient, which may sound great, but constitutes a potential financial nightmare. Are you only paying off interest and not principal? (This is common.) Will you end up with a huge balloon payment in a few years?

Are you reading the fine print? There may not even be any fine print. Don't go by advertisements; many can be misleading. The biggest and by far most important question to ask yourself: Are you about to invest the equity in your home for unnecessary spending? Will it be an emergency? Will you lose your home?

## Hutton's acquisition brings forth new giant

**NEW YORK (AP)**—Shearson Lehman Brothers Holdings Inc. announced Thursday that it was acquiring E.F. Hutton Group Inc. for nearly \$1 billion, spurring the birth of another giant in an industry that experts say will be dominated in coming years by fewer, more powerful firms.

While many smaller investment houses will continue making money, the landscape increasingly will be dominated by huge players jostling for supremacy on the global playing field, analysts contend.

The availability of Hutton gave Shearson a golden chance to make a dramatic expansion in a swift, cost-efficient stroke, gaining human and capital resources it believes will make it a leader in the evolving global financial markets.

"I think our view is that our industry is more and more becoming an oligopoly and that only the larger, better-capitalized firms are going to prosper," said Peter A. Cohen, Shearson's chairman.

"We are a very high-fixed-cost business, and the more that we can spread our overhead the better we're going to do," Cohen said.

He added that the better face of very stiff competition from some foreign organizations.

Haunted by past scandals and faced with increasing worries about its ability to remain competitive in the wake of the October stock market crash, Hutton announced last month that it would seek a buyer or investors willing to make a major cash infusion.

On Thursday, Hutton and Shearson announced a merger agreement reached late Wednesday, nine days after Hutton put itself up for sale and notified Shearson it was willing to discuss an acquisition.

Shearson said it would make a cash tender offer for 28.1 million shares of Hutton common stock at \$29.25 per share and then exchange \$139.8 million in debt securities for the remaining 4.8 million shares of Hutton stock, giving the package a value of \$961.7 million.

Hutton rose 50 cents a share to \$27.875 on the New York Stock Exchange. Shearson shares, 61 percent of which are owned by American Express Co., rose 1 1/2 cents to \$15.12 1/2.

Shearson, which built itself into the nation's second-largest investment firm largely through acquisitions, will rank in several respects as the biggest, with total capital of \$3.7 billion, 12,000 brokers at more than 600 offices and about 2.9 million clients.

Shearson is gaining Hutton's highly regarded retail brokerage system, billions-of-additional dollars in asset management funds, plus operating economies of scale that Shearson said would save the combined companies about \$400 million in costs.

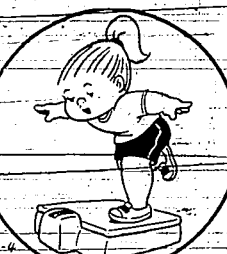

The percentage tables give South about a 2-1 chance to make today's game. Nevertheless, a prudent declarer looks for a way to better the odds.

The spade lead was ducked in dummy, and East won his king and returned the ace. South won the spade queen and led a heart toward dummy's queen, establishing what appeared to be trick number nine. East won and cleared the spades, and South was ready to run his nine winners. He cashed dummy's club ace, led a low one to his queen and gasped in horror at West's discard. South could return to dummy-to-lose dummy's club-10, but he could hot bring in the club suit. The result was down two because of pure carelessness.

The hand is easy-if South leads dummy's club-10 after cashing the ace of clubs. He has no intention of finessing, of course. His intent is to unblock the suit to cater to a 4-1 split.

South wins the club 10 with his queen to expose the break, and a heart to dummy provides the entry for the marked club finesse.

While it's 2-1 in favor of a 3-2 club break, it costs nothing to cater to a possible 4-1 break.

## Secrets of Santa are revealed at last

**KIMBERLY** — Many years ago, it was 1897, to be exact, 8-year-old Virginia O'Hanlon sent a letter to the editor of *The Baltimore Sun* asking if there really is a Santa Claus.

His reply: "Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus." That wise old editor has been often quoted, but he still left a lot of questions unanswered. Why does Santa live in the North Pole? How does this portly man insist on wearing bold red suits? How can he fit down a narrow chimney? And for that matter, how does he get into a house that doesn't even have a chimney?

Some of these secrets are revealed in a new children's book written by Beverly Stone.

Stone, a Twin Falls native and grandmother of five, says her family has been privy to Santa's secrets for many years. But last year, the jolly man in red asked her to write his biography in order to remind the rest of us of the true spirit of Christmas. The book has become a family project with Stone's husband, Gary, contributing illustrations and her mother, Martha Ellinger, making hand-colored book jackets for 500 first edition copies.

Titled "The Secret of Santa Claus," Stone's book takes the reader back to the time when Santa was still a cherubic boy. On a visit to the Snow Country (somewhere near the North Pole), young Nicholas was separated from his parents. He was taken in by the "Ices" — a friendly family who resemble snowflakes, but who are actually

covered with white fur.

The story goes on to tell how Santa introduced Christmas to the Ices and how they, in turn, introduced Santa to elves called "Snowies" and other magical things. The story also recounts how Santa, as a young man, returned to his hometown and met his long lost brothers — all Santa look-alikes who laugh with a distinctive ho, ho, ho. (Hint: the look-alikes explain why we see so many Santas appearing in shopping malls and parades today.)

Stone, a self-professed Idahoophile, is proud of the fact that the book is being produced entirely in the Magic Valley. While she has shared the story with a number of families and hundreds of Idaho schoolchildren, the book will be introduced in area stores this weekend: On Saturday, the Stones will be autographing copies and distributing character drawings at Judi's Bookstore in downtown Twin Falls from 1 to 3 p.m.

With its hefty \$75 price tag, Stone says she has been surprised at the positive response the book has received. The red leather-bound books are limited edition collector's copies. She says a less expensive "children's edition" will be widely distributed next year.

"We wanted to introduce it as a present to the Magic Valley first," she says.

The Stones have footed the production bills so far, but they have been approached by a Los Angeles-based manufacturer about reproducing the miniature characters inspired by "The Secret of Santa Claus." The couple has also talked to Worlds of Wonder, the toy manufacturer that produced "Teddy Ruxpin," as well as representatives from Disney Studios.

Bey Stone becomes animated, giggling whenever she tells about her favorite character. — "Flower Blue," one of Santa's elf helpers who comes from a place called Magic Valley. "The characters are becoming real to me," she says.

Gary Stone also chimes in with a laugh, explaining that just as Flower Blue looks out for Santa Claus in the story, the snow-elf also looks out for them. He adds, "Anytime anything goes right, we say, 'That must be Flower Blue.'"

The Stones were recently invited to read "The Secret of Santa Claus" to 300 schoolchildren in McCall. With Gary drawing the characters as fast as his wife could read, the tale of Santa Claus and his Flower Blue was a hit with the students.

"The book was written for children ages 6-12, but the story, and especially Flower Blue, has been popular with younger kids," Bey says.

The blue-eyed elf will figure as a central character in another Stone book scheduled to be finished this spring. "It's going to deal with the legend of the Snowy Elves in Magic Valley," Stone says. Like "The Secret of Santa Claus," the second book will also feature Gary Stone's original illustrations.

And by Christmas next year, Bey says she plans to release the story of Santa's romance with Martha Claus. The outline is already finished and she says the story is in her head just waiting to be written.

The Stone's real dream, however, is that Flower Blue and the other Magic Valley-based characters will become so popular that the area will draw tourists. They even have a dream of some day building an artisanian village on a parcel of land they own in the Snake River canyon.

"That's our dream, someday," says Bey. They admit that they know nothing about publishing or the toy business, but the Stones nevertheless possess the same refreshing innocence as 8-year-old Virginia O'Hanlon. And, in the fairy tale business, that innocence may just prove to be the right formula for success.

## McManus takes his fun seriously

**TWIN FALLS** — Ready for a little winter reading? Be careful. It's heavier than the summer stuff you probably just returned to the library.

Official summer reading should take place only between the months of May and September, says Patrick McManus, humorist and author of the best-sellers "The Grasshopper Trap," "Never Sniff A Gift Fish" and "They Shoot Canoes, Don't They?" Warm weather recreational reading, he says, features novels with cardboard characters, man-eating sharks, and illicit sex and murder.

Winter reading, on the other hand, gives the reader more intellectual latitude.

"Winter reading is all ideas," decries the gray-haired author who autographed copies of his latest book, "Rubber Legs and White Tail Hair," at Judi's Bookstore in Twin Falls last weekend. "Heavy stuff. Hard stuff. Dull stuff." Well, sure.

Heavy, dull stuff like the McManus books

and calendars which sold like hotcakes to a store full of avid fans who spent a winter afternoon waiting patiently in line in order to get the man's autograph.

"Hi. This is for Jacob and he loves your books."

"Hi. Do you do any speaking engagements?"

"Hi. Would you sign all of these 'To Rick'?"

"Hi. To Kelly. He's going into the Navy."

Judi Baxter, owner of Judi's Bookstore, ordered 300 copies of McManus' newest book and 200 copies of his backlisted titles to meet the anticipated demand for McManus material this winter.

She says it's the fourth time her store has hosted an autograph party for the literary outdoorsman, and that the enthusiastic response of local fans is typical.

"His books are entertaining," says Baxter. "And funny."

That must be why Magic Valley residents are spending \$14.95 on a 198-page paperback edition of a collection of stories and essays about stuff like hunting and fishing and guns and poor boys growing up in Idaho.

"I think all of the people around here identify with the situations and a lot of the characters. Everyone has their own Rancid Crabtree and their own Retch Sweeney," says McManus, referring to two recurring characters in his series of books.

"They're all real people. The characters have kind of taken over. They've become their own individuals over the years."

McManus says most of the people his characters are based on know who they are and follow his stories. The character of Rancid Crabtree is based on an old woodsman McManus knew as a teenager. He is still alive and living in Montana.

"But he doesn't know anything about it," says McManus. "He's pretty old now. And he was not a great reader in his time."

McManus, who was raised in Sandpoint, Idaho, says his stories are based on real experiences and were originally written for other publications. He currently works out of his home in Spokane as an editor for Outdoor Life magazine. His articles have appeared in publications.

## 'Messiah' still in the spirit of Handel

**BURLEY** — More than two centuries after his death, composer George Frideric Handel is still feeding the hungry. His most famous work, "The Messiah," was first performed in Dublin, Ireland, April 13, 1742, in a charity performance. All proceeds were designated for prison inmates and their families and for hospital relief.

All subsequent performances in Handel's lifetime raised money for Handel's foundling home and for his numerous charities.

An 18th century writer, Dr. Charles Burney, noted that this sacred oratorio "has fed the hungry, clothed the naked, fostered the orphan, more than any single musical production."

Carrying on the tradition, the Christian Choral Society is performing "The Messiah" Dec. 12, and 13, with all donations going to feed the hungry in the Mini-Cassia area. Sponsored by the Mini-Cassia Ministerial Association, the choral society has requested that all donations help in the association's aid to needy families program.

Performances are scheduled for 7:30 p.m. each evening, with the Dec. 11 program scheduled for the Burley United Methodist Church on Overland Ave. Performances on Dec. 12 and 13 will be at the First Christian Church of Rupert, on 8th St. next to the Minidoka Memorial Hospital. Tickets are not necessary. A free-will donation will be accepted at the door.

For 245 years, "The Messiah," has been considered Handel's mightiest, most melodic and most loved composition. At a performance

in 1759, honoring Handel's 74th birthday, he responded to enthusiastic applause with these words: "Not from me, but from Heaven; comes all."

Expressed shortly before Handel's death, this seems to sum up his feeling about his musical masterpiece. He considered the music a gift from above, a gift that had come through him, but from a higher power. And because it was a gift, Handel felt it was imperative to pass along the work as a gift to others in the form of concerts given for charity.

"The Messiah" has been performed by groups of all sizes, from huge symphony orchestras and massed choirs of hundreds of voices to a few singers accompanied by a piano. According to Mary Lou Ottman, chairman of the Choral Society board of directors, more than 50 musi-

# Howard teams up for Lucas fantasy

**SAN RAFAEL, Calif.** — George Lucas did not tell.

But Ron Howard is much too nice to clam up completely about "Willow," the fantasy epic he is directing for the secretive producer.

"It has lots of sword fights, chases, action, all that stuff," Howard ventures, clearly apprehensive even though Lucas is far away from the set.

"No warning whatsoever," says Lucas, "to the director, a boyish 33, pushes on."

"The movie does take place in 'pre-history,'" Howard explains. "But not in any strictly historical sense."

Remarkably, it has a gaggle of 9-inch-high "brownies," not to mention a 3-foot, 4-inch hero named Willow. But it is decidedly not "full of puppets, like 'Labyrinth,'" he warns, tingling nervously at the brim of his cap.

"The story, moreover, is 'human,' 'moral' and 'funny.' As if, says Howard, "John Ford had directed 'The Wizard of Oz.'"

"Willow" may be the biggest risk to date in Howard's hitherto cheery career as a film maker.

Lucasfilm Ltd., which is producing the movie, and MGM-UA Communications Co., which will distribute it in May, declined to disclose the film's budget. But "Willow," laden with special effects, clearly promises to be big, expensive and wholly unlike "Coocoon," "Splash" or any of the five largely comedic and largely successful films that Howard, a former child television star, has directed so far.

Under the best of circumstances, Hollywood tends to consider fantasy films a tough gamble. That is partly because they require outsized shooting budgets and partly because they seldom rely on the drawing power of big-name actors. The most prominent star in "Willow," for instance, is Val Kilmer, who played Iceman in Paramount's "Top Gun."

"Labyrinth," a notorious recent failure that was co-produced by Lucas and Muppet-master Jim Henson, cost a reported \$30 million but took in only about \$12 million.

cians will be taking part in the Mini-Cassia performances.

The performing group, which includes singers from 14 area churches, has practiced weekly since early October, drawing choir members from as far away as Pocatello, Nevada, Oakley, and Albion.

Scott Bedke, who drives 200 miles round-trip from his ranch in Nevada to perform with the group, says, "I've always wanted to learn 'The Messiah,' and this seemed like a great opportunity. I enjoy singing with the group — it's well-worth the trip."

Beth Reed, an Albion housewife who makes the weekly trips in a carpool of musicians, echoes his

sentiments. "The beautiful harmonies and the chance to hear all those voices together is fantastic! I love it," she says.

Each musician has individual reasons for wanting to sing "The Messiah," but music critics point to the spine-tingling choruses as the primary reason for the oratorio's long-standing popularity.

A Handel biographer, Dr. Robert Douglas, wrote that while Handel kept the music within modest limits of four-part harmony, its word-painting and symbolism "seem to be spiritually inspired."

"The Messiah" has helped professionally trained church musicians over the years to introduce other masterworks into their church repertoire, and is now used in high

schools and colleges to train vocal students.

Darlene Parkins-Whison, a music major at Idaho State University, says that what draws her to make the weekly trip from Pocatello for rehearsals. "Singing with the group gives me the opportunity to stretch my vocal experience with Handel's extraordinary music," she says.

Ottman says the Christian Choral Society, which performs a cantata each Christmas season, chose Handel's famous work this year to celebrate the group's tenth anniversary of singing together.

"The choral society is a dream come true" for Ottman, who says, "My dream 10 years ago was to get more participation between area churches." She envisioned 10 musicians from a number of churches singing together in a large, combined choir.

"It would give the small churches with only a few singers a chance to

do something they felt good about. It would also help churches get acquainted and work together," she says.

Ottman, who has served as choir director at First Christian Church in Rupert since 1972, says even fall-ate churches struggle with music. But, she says, "This gives us a chance to really feel some fulfillment musically — to do something really worthwhile."

McManus' career — as a humor writer evolved slowly, in between schooling and stints as a newspaper and television journalist.

"From the time I was in college I did free-lance writing," says the Idaho native. "About 1967, I started writing humor, and eventually the humor took over. I hadn't planned on being a humor writer. "How to do it" for McManus has resulted in hundreds of articles to his credit, six books and some nice reviews. The New York Times Book Review says "everybody should read Patrick McManus." A critic for The Atlantic calls him "a treasure."

McManus says he receives hundreds of fan letters over the course of a year, most of it mailed to an address published at the end of his column in Outdoor Life magazine.

way, in that somebody has a terrible disease," says McManus. "Or a person is in the hospital and they're reading these books and the daughter or son will write and tell me about how much their father or mother enjoyed the books while they were ill in the hospital. Often the person has died, so there's kind of an emotional level."

We also notice we've very intense kinds of feelings about the books from people who have hit bottom and are having a difficult time of it. We get lots of letters saying that the book has really helped cheer them up. We always appreciate that."

Though McManus and his wife, Darleen, live in Spokane, they still have a "lakefront home near Sandpoint, 70 miles from Spokane in the Idaho panhandle."

"Does his wife ever go out fishing with him?"

"No, she hates it (laughs). Camping?"

"She used to (chuckle). She's getting so she likes to go out in the boat a little bit while I fish."

"We still consider Idaho one of our two homes, and we're back and forth," says McManus, the father of four grown daughters and grandfather of five.

"We have a home in Spokane because I have to do a lot of traveling and it's easier to travel out of Spokane. Our place in Idaho is quite remote. But we tend to think of that as our second home. I consider myself an Idahoan."

"We get a lot of letters from kids. We get way more letters than I can answer, but I try to answer all the ones we get from kids around the country. Lots of them are writing papers — they have to write an English paper on a 'writer,' so they write to me to see if they can get me to write it for them."

Other fan mail comes from people who are grateful to have something funny to read at a low point in their lives.

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# Households with cable top 50 percent mark

**NEW YORK (AP)** — The number of U.S. television households with cable has topped 50 percent for the first time, according to estimates by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

In its own announcement, the pay-cable service HBO announced that it has topped 20 million subscribers — 15.5 million to HBO and 4.6 million to its sister service, Cinemax.

The Associated Press NEW YORK - Joseph W. Polisi feels a sense of mission about his job. "I see the role of the artist in our society as a very important one, as well as a misunderstood one," he said.

Polisi, president of the Juilliard School of Music in New York City, said that "because of the way our society functions, our emphasis is on economic gains. We tend to forget or don't think about the importance of serious art in our society as a civilizing element."

Polisi feels that a potential music student, who wishes to have a life as a performing artist, should enter a program that is very demanding and stringent, one that reflects the profession.

commitment toward its students to assure them some sort of life in the arts after graduation. A performance degree comes with that expectation, he said.

"So one of my feelings of mission involves working with these extraordinary young people, making them understand that they are the leaders of the future in the arts in the world and that they have an important role as leaders in the arts. They are not entertainers, but individuals who are able to make the general population - understanding their humanity is all about."

Polisi, 39, who is Juilliard's sixth president, affirms that the 82-year-old institution has maintained its reputation of being the leading music school in the country. The standards for admission have now become even more stringent than in past years, he said, during an interview in his spacious office at Lincoln Center.

"We've lowered the enrollment slightly and we're consciously controlling the number of students," he said. "It represents the standards of the profession. This is a serious place, a professional school. There are thousands of applicants for the year."

Another Juilliard myth the president wants to dispel is the misconception that most of its graduates become famous artists. "Juilliard never was created, never did exist since 1905 just to train soloists," he said.

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# Film's complexity matches the legend of the Mahatma

**Editor's note:** The classic film series sponsored by The Times-News and Interstate Amusement, Inc. concludes next week with "Gandhi." The 1982 motion picture received eight Oscars including Best Picture, Actor, Director and Screenplay.

"Gandhi" will be presented in Twin Falls on Wednesday and in Jerome on Thursday. Showtime is 8 p.m.

"Generations to come will scarce believe that such a one as this ever in flesh and blood walked upon this earth."

So wrote Professor Albert Einstein of Mahatma Gandhi, a small, nut-brown man from India whose unrelenting efforts on behalf of his people won him the designation of Mahatma or "Great Soul."

His story, that one of the 20th century's towering figures, is told in Richard Attenborough's film, "Gandhi." It starts with the following words: "No man's life can be encompassed in one telling. There is no way to give each year its allotted weight, to include each event, each person who helped to shape a lifetime. What can be done is to be faithful in spirit to the record and try to find one's way to the heart of the man."

The film traces 56 of the 79 years which made up Gandhi's life, showing his transformation from a passionate, vain and inarticulate young Indian lawyer into one of the world's great spokesmen for peace and moral courage who became the beloved spiritual and political leader of India's tumultuous, blood-drenched sub-continent. His name is synonymous with the power of non-violent protest which won his country its freedom and continues to inspire millions to this day.

In the early 1890s Mahatma J. Gandhi returned to law in South Africa. Within a matter of days, as the young advocate travels to Pretoria, where he is to conduct the case that has brought him from India, he is made brutally aware of color prejudice and his compatriots' lack of civil rights. Although still only in his early 20s, Gandhi resolves to change both attitudes and laws and successfully evolves a means of doing so without resorting to violence.

Highlights of Richard Attenborough's motion picture include such events as the 1919 massacre at Amritsar, where British General Dyer ordered his troops to open fire on 16,000 men, women and children attending a peaceful meeting, killing 379 and wounding 1,137 more, and triggering the events which would eventually lead to India's independence.

Also included in the story are intimate scenes set in Gandhi's ashram — forerunner of the self-sufficient communes which sprang up in many countries in the 1960s, and rioting at Chauri Chaura, where 21 policemen were hacked to death by pro-Gandhian demonstrators, as a result of which the Mahatma embarked on a total fast as a self-inflicted penance and temporarily called a halt to the Home Rule movement.

The dramatic march to Dandi, where the Mahatma symbolically defied the might of the British Raj by the simple yet strikingly effective expedient of exhorting his followers to gather untaxed salt, is also part of John Birtley's original screenplay, as is the terrible inter-religious bloodbath that followed the arbitrary partition of the subcontinent into Hindu India and Muslim Pakistan.

However, although the motion picture contains numerous sequences which convey the exotic vastness of India and her people, essentially it relates the story of one man who tells us that poverty is the worst form of violence and the biggest violence we must confront are those representing hatred and divide in our own hearts.

Ben Kingsley, who portrays the Mahatma, does so with simplicity, warmth and humor. Scenes of spectacle and the horrific bloodshed that marked Gandhi's historical epoch are counterpointed by many intimate moments in his life. We see him, all fingers and thumbs, learning to spin cotton in middle age. We experience the strains that high ideals impose on his marriage. We view him, at one moment, as a statesman parleying with the Viceroy and shortly afterwards cutting short a conference with the future leaders of India and Pakistan to tend a child's sick bed.

Filmed almost entirely in India, "Gandhi" may well be the most complex motion picture ever made. Although the \$22-million production received official Indian government cooperation, the monumental scale of the enterprise created unique political, logistical and financial problems.

Attenborough quickly discovered that, although revered by the mass of India's 700-million population, Mahatma Gandhi is also a highly controversial figure. Depicting his "life on the screen" provoked angry sniping from the parliamentary opposition, various areas of the media and from Gandhian scholars and adherents alike. One such lady insisted that the Mahatma could only be shown as a moving speck of light. "I am not making a film about bloody Tinker Bell," Attenborough responded swiftly.

## 'Three bachelors and a Baby' wins at box office

**HOLLYWOOD (AP)** — "Three Men and a Cradle," a movie about an infant girl who wins the hearts of three dedicated bachelors, won at the national box office over the Thanksgiving weekend, grossing almost \$14 million.

Movieweek shifted into a holiday mood, with the lighthearted "Three Men" followed by "Cinderella" with \$7.2 million and the Steve Martin-John Candy comedy about travel and mishaps, "Planes, Trains and Automobiles," which earned \$7 million in its debut week.

"Three Men and a Cradle," stars Tom Selleck, Steve Guttenberg and Ted Danson as three bachelors who get the responsibility of caring for a tiny girl, the result of a dalliance by Danson's character.

The movie, directed by Leonard Nimoy, is a remake of Coline Serreau's "Three Men and a Cradle." For the long weekend, Buena Vista, a Walt Disney division, reported the movie's five-day gross, but gave its \$10,322 per-screen average for the three-day period, solidly placing the movie in first place, said John Krier, a spokesman for Exhibitor Relations Co. Other top take and grosses were for three days.

"Planes, Trains and Automobiles,"

from Paramount, features Martin Sheen as a businessman trying to get home to Chicago from New York for the Thanksgiving holiday, with curmudgeonly salesman Candy trying to help. Paramount's "Fatal Attraction" earned \$6.6 million over the weekend for fourth place, and has now earned \$110 million.

Arnold Schwarzenegger's "Running Man" began to slow, dropping from first to fifth place in its third week of release. The futuristic sci-fi action movie from Tri-Star earned \$5.3 million.

In sixth place was the Richard Dreyfuss-Barbra Streisand courtroom drama "Nuts," earning \$4.2 million at 536 screens.

"Flowers in the Attic," a horror film about a crazed "old lady" who licks up the grandkids, dropped from third to seventh, earning \$2.9 million in its second week.

Rounding out the "Top 10" were "Dirty Dancing," with \$1.7 million; "Baby Boom" with \$1.5 million; and "Hello Again," from Buena Vista, with \$1.4 million.

Buena Vista has three of this week's Top 10 movies, followed by Paramount with two.

The box office gross is determined by the amount of tickets a movie

sells during the weekend, always a much stronger sales period than the rest of the week. Studios use the weekend box office to determine how well a movie is doing.

# Stockbroker runs for cover in slick, but empty, 'Hiding Out'

**HOLLYWOOD** — When we first see Jon Cryer as Boston stockbroker Andrew Morenaki in "Hiding Out," he is almost unrecognizable buried under pricey sunglasses, stylish long hair and trim beard. Later, when he is on the lam — a government witness chased by murderous Mafia — one gets a shock of deerskin. Morenaki cuts his beard, trims his hair, sweeps it back, dyes the sides blond — and presto! It is like Humphrey Bogart emerging from the surgeon's bandages in "Dark Passage." We see a pumpkin grin, a shy slump; Jon Cryer turns into Jon Cryer.

rather cleverly. Director Bob Giraldi makes rock videos and TV commercials. He did Michael Jackson's "Beat It" video and the Miller Lite commercials. He knows how to pace, stage and cut for maximum effect. The movie zips along, saturated in all-pro slickness.

Then, with a resounding crash! Screenwriters Joe Menosky and Jeff Rothberg drop their hook. Their fish-out-of-water-chase-thriller becomes a teen-age sex comedy — with a "Peggy Sue" wish-fulfillment twist. Morenaki, disguised as a kid, goes through adolescence again — puppy love, dating, school politics — while hired killers ruthlessly stalk him. This is more High Concept than any movie can handle.

Incongruities pile up fast. Morenaki flees to his aunt's home in Delaware, then conceals his presence from her. Instead, he confides all to his teen-age cousin, Patrick — played by Keith Coogan as a bawling loudmouth — and hides a while under the dirty clothes in Patrick's room.

Later, after registering as a student named Maxwell Hauser, he takes up residence in the local high school, sleeping in crannies. By day, a remark in English class makes him so popular that the local rap group decides to run him for class president. Andrew declines the offer, then sabotages things by tearing up his own posters. In the midst of this curious campaign, he also romances his opponent's girlfriend.

Even more amazing than Andrew's antics is the myopia of his Aunt Lucy (played by Cryer's mother, Gretchen), who fails to recognize him in teen disguise. Has this woman never seen her nephew shaven? Has he always worn a beard and a stockbroker's outfit?

In "Hiding Out," the jokes, paced at a gallop by Giraldi, are unfunny. They lapse into clichés like drowning men grabbing at sticks. The two halves of "Hiding Out" — thriller and teen sex comedy — never meld, working against each other rather than together. The ending suggests a prom night "Parallax View" and the topical gags are at the expense of Nixon rather than Reagan.

Through it all, Cryer maintains a spry stance. He is one actor who can be winsome without getting sticky, and he probably deserves a distinction for surviving lines like "I have my original feet," in response to Anabeth Gish's declaration that her parent's car has its original innards.

Some of the supporting cast — John Walker and John Spencer as FBI agents, Anne — Pitonak —

Morenaki's grandmother — are very good. Dan Leigh's production design has amusing detail. Daniel Pearl's photography is peppy — and shiny. And Giraldi shows so much surface skill, he seems sure to make good slick movies some day. "Hiding Out" never escapes its absurd hook, this mechanical collision of genres. After all, if someone really needs to hide out, isn't the best plan to simply hide out?

## 'Less Than Zero' is less the soul

The following are capsule reviews of movies playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**LESS THAN ZERO (R).** The title comes from an Elvis Costello song, but there is not a note of it on the sound track. Best Eastern Ellis novel-of-afflictions-rich-Los-Angeles-teen-agers — a bearded, jaded, hedonist — has been turned into an antic anticaine parable mixed with a sentimental romance; twisted inside out and strangled with evasions designed to placate the people who would have hated the movie anyway. So, in Marek Kantevski's film, we get a beautifully shot tour of "hip" Los Angeles with a triangle of high-school-chums — rudely awakened as one of them (Robert Downey Jr.) is forced into a hysterical nightmare of drugs and homosexuality. The book's nightmare was lower-key, far more frightening.

**BABY BOOM (PG-13).** Charles Sheen and Nancy Meyers (of "Irreconcilable Differences") thrust a baby upon workaholic Manhattan career woman Diane Keaton, who is terrific and never prettier, with results that are hilarious and touching in this sparkling comedy that is as topical as yuppie-drama-but-honors the great '30s tradition of sophisticated screwball comedy. With Sam Shepard and Harold Ramis.

**CINDERELLA (G).** The animated version of Perrault's classic fairy tale contains some of the most enchanting magical moments the Disney artists ever created, and some of the most of the most of high-school-chums — rudely awakened as one of them (Robert Downey Jr.) is forced into a hysterical nightmare of drugs and homosexuality. The book's nightmare was lower-key, far more frightening.

**FATAL ATTRACTION (R).** For much of its length, this movie wavers between giving us an absorbing battle of the sexes — a true psychological shocker about a scorned woman systematically persecuting the married man who ditched her, after a standstill fling — and one more formula revenge saga. At the end, sadly, the formulas win: Glenn Close's subtly detailed, terrifyingly passionate obsessive turns the movie into bloody predictability. Before then, Close — and Michael Douglas — and director Adrian Lyne — wind the tension up tightly, there is real heat under Lyne's glossy glass. The scariest moments here come not from violence but from flickering moments of everyday pathology pushed to the limit.

**THE PRINCESS BRIDE (G).** In author William Goldman's horrid-fantasy pastiche, everything is gloriously magnified and satirically

undercut. It is derring-do tempered with wisecracks, with a plot full of heart-stoppingly beautiful heroines, heart-crushingly cruel villains, duels on cliff tops over raging seas, Jewish wizards and a daring threesome who might be mistaken for the Musketeers. Director Rob Reiner has less feel for spectacle and action than for humor and character, but these sustain the picture. And in Mandy Patinkin's ingo — a mixture of Athos, Scaramouche and Yulimbo — the movie has a great, archetypal action hero: Erroll Flynn filtered through De Niro and Robin Williams.

**THE RUNNING MAN (R).** This sci-fi thriller mixes predictable high-tech action with galvanically mean satire. In a futuristic dystopian America, the state's enemies (including Arnold Schwarzenegger) are tracked by cartoonish assassins before live audiences in an out-

gouge game show hosted by Richard Dawson — who gives a funny roaring, vicious caricature of TV varietyism.

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# NBC's 'Downpayment on Murder' portrays marriage gone haywire

The interview is about to commence when Connie Sellecca, looking elegant in a black suit, hears the sound of running water and excuses herself to jiggle the toilet handle in her suite at New York's Waldorf Astoria.

"Now that," she announces when she returns, "would never happen at my hotel."

It certainly wouldn't. Her hostelry is the impeccably managed St. Gregory of ABC's long-running "Hotel," which now airs on Saturdays. And Sellecca's popularity as Christine Francis, the St. Gregory's general manager, has enabled her to branch out into other projects. It is one of those projects that she is in New York to publicize — the NBC movie "Downpayment on Murder," which will air Sunday, Dec. 6. In it, Sellecca, 32, plays a young mother who discovers that her estranged husband (played by Ben Gazzara) has hired a hit man to kill her.

Both Sellecca and the movie's producer, Carole Bloom, describe the movie, which is based on a true story (although the names have been changed and the location disguised), as the flip-side of "The Burning Bed," a TV movie in which Farrah Fawcett played an abused wife who saw no way out.

"I've always been attracted to true stories," says Sellecca. "And I was attracted by the fact that this woman does something about her situation. The message here is that you're not helpless. This woman found a way to get help."

When the movie opens, Karen Cardell (Sellecca) has been married for 10 years, eight of them relatively happy ones. But as her husband suffers several business reverses, he begins to take his frustrations out on his wife. She sticks with him for a while, but when his behavior turns abusive, she leaves with their two children. That's when he starts looking for a hit man.

One intense scene, in which her husband rapes her, took a real toll on Sellecca. "I ended up, black and blue," she says. "As a matter of fact,

in the scene in the bedroom where the two cops come, you see the bruise on my arm. That was not makeup. I was just one black-and-blue mark."

This may be the last year of "Hotel," so Sellecca's future plans are up in the air. She probably won't jump right into another series. "It doesn't leave much time

for a personal life, especially when you're trying to raise a child," says Sellecca, who has a 6-year-old son, Gib, by her former husband Gil Gerard. "It's really push and pull. You live according to the call sheet. There'll probably be a break before I'm doing a series again."




But Sellecca isn't looking forward to an extended period of unemployment either. "Being out of work would be frightening," she says. "I think that's every actor's fear at the end of a job: 'I'll never work again.'"

The next time around, though, she'll be looking for a role that's a bit of a departure from the super-likable Christine.

"Sometimes I think she's just a little too perfect," says Sellecca. "She's everybody's friend. She knows the answer to everything. We joke about it on the set. Nathan Cook who plays Bill Griffin the security guy, sometimes he'll watch rehearsal and say, 'Christine, butt out! This is none of your business!'"

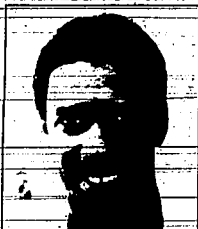

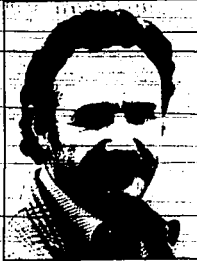

# Lynn Herring balances her act in new CBS' "Circus of the Stars"

Although actors come and go, "General Hospital" is back on top after a poor summer.

Gloria Monty's successor, Wes Kenney, is flexible enough to take story gambles, winning here, losing there, but searching. Twenty-five years old next April, "General Hospital" remains a market leader in story trends and styles.

Even bad Lucy Coe is winning, finally roping Doctor Tony; then entering society this week by promoting the Tania Jones Daycare Center. The urge to slap Lucy's face remains, but Lucy deserves her moment of conquest.

Lucy haters should catch the "Circus of the Stars," December 15th on CBS, when actress Lynn Herring performs a high-wire balancing act. Having practiced daily for three months, she pulls off the stunt with a flourish. In practice one afternoon, Lynn moved too quickly, attempting to sit on a chair while being carried on shoulder bars by two high-wire attendants. Lynn missed the chair, her balancing pole struck a shoulder bar, and all three took a dive into the safety net. Lynn landed on her back. Luckily, the trio were practicing just ten feet off the ground.

"That high-wire act does wonders for your concentration," says Lynn.

After that three-month crash course, Herring doesn't bobble words, or cues. "There are days when nothing works," she says. "A few begin missing and it becomes catching. The same with giggles. The old chain reaction. I can't tell you exactly why, but it happens."

Married to actor Wayne Northrop, who moved from the daytime soap "Days of Our Lives" to the prime time soap "Dynasty," Lynn leads the good and rare California life in Topanga Canyon with horses, dogs and cats. Lynn and Wayne ride daily. Horses are just outside the bedroom window.

Born in Oklahoma, raised in Louisiana and Nebraska, Lynn has always owned a horse. Now she has strong shoulder and back muscles from the high-wire act, so pitching hay daily is easier.

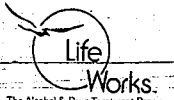

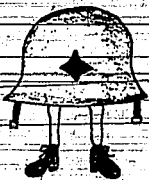
