Summit brings progress, no breakthroughs

WASHINGTON — President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev concluded three days of summit talks Thursday reporting progress but no agreement to curb long-range strategic weapons and no deal on the withdrawal of Soviet troops from Afghanistan.

Reagan said there was "dramatic progress" on arms control. Gorbachev said there was "some headway" toward an agreement and pledged to "work hard" to have it ready for signing in Moscow next spring.

Both leaders put a positive spin on a summit that produced no breakthrough but Gorbachev also attacked the president's

stand on nuclear testing and chemical weapons and took a hard line on would-be Jewish emigrants.

But the two sides committed themselves to another summit, sometime in the first half of next year, in Moscow, and pronounced this one a success.

Reagan said, "this summit has lit the sky with hope for all people of good will" and Gorbachev said, "I think we trust each other more."

In an apparent concession, a U.S. official said Gorbachev had dropped his insistence for restrictions on Star Wars testing as a condition for cuts in strategic arsenals. Gorbachev, at a marathon news conference, skirted the question that snagged the Iceland summit last year.

Asked if the summit had done anything to slow the arms race in space, Gorbachev said, "I don't think so."

But he held out the hope they could sign a treaty in Moscow next year to reduce long-range nuclear weapons by half. The Soviet leader said, "Differences still exist and on some points these differences are very serious indeed." However, "We do not regard them as insurmountable."

Seventy-six hours after his arrival on American soil, Gorbachev was given an elaborate sendoff at rain-drenched Andrews Air Force Base near Washington. He got a trumpet fanfare and a 21-gun salute.

Ending his first-ever visit to the United States, Gorbachev was bound for East Berlin for talks with Warsaw Pact allies.

As Gorbachev's jetliner climbed into the sky, Reagan addressed the nation from the Oval Office, saying they had made "dramatic movement" on arms control and vowing to press ahead with his Star Wars program.

The summit was crowned by the signing Tuesday of a treaty to eliminate intermediate-range nuclear missiles, the first agreement ever to eliminate an entire category of nuclear arms.

The two leaders issued strikingly similar summations of their talks, standing under umbrellas in the rain outside the White House.

"This summit has been a clear success," said Reagan. Gorbachev said, "A good deal has been accomplished."

The leaders agreed to hold another summit—their fourth—in Moscow in 1988 in the first half of the year, White House spokesman Martin Flitwater said.

Details on their discussions were just beginning to emerge.

One U.S. official, insisting on anonymity in remarks to hundreds of reporters, said the United States preserved the right for broad testing of the Star Wars program, even though Congress has imposed some restrictions on the missile defense system.

In exchange, the United States agreed to adhere to the 1972 Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty for a period of time yet to be negotiated, the official said. However, the official said it would not constrain the program.

Reagan to push for SDI

WASHINGTON — President Reagan said Thursday he and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev made "dramatic movement" in arms control at their summit, but vowed that he will continue to push for a space-based missile defense program.

In a televised speech prepared for delivery to the nation, Reagan also said he and Gorbachev made "some very limited movement" on human rights and that he "spoke very candidly" to the Soviet leader in pressing the case for Soviet withdrawal from Afghanistan.

At a departure ceremony on the South Lawn of the White House earlier, Reagan pronounced the summit "a clear success" and wished Gorbachev "Godspeed."

Gorbachev, who left Thursday night for East Berlin after three days of superpower talks, spoke in less sweeping terms, saying, "Our visit to Washington has, on the whole, justified our hopes."

"This summit has been a clear success," the president said as he stood with the Soviet leader and their wives in a rainfall that began about 15 minutes before the departure ceremony and increased steadily.

Reagan said the just-concluded summit had put Soviet-American relations "on a far more candid and far more realistic footing."

"It also means that while there is movement, indeed, dramatic movement, in the arms-reduction area, much remains to be done in that area as well as these other critical areas I have mentioned," he said.

Congress gives positive appraisal of summit

WASHINGTON — A bipartisan cross-section of Congress gave the Reagan-Gorbachev summit a positive appraisal as it ended Thursday, welcoming arms-control advances but expressing disappointment that other issues were left unresolved.

"I don't really think there's euphoria over the summit," said Senator Majority Whip Alan Cranston, D-Calif.

"But there is a feeling of hope, of

some significant progress," he said. "The expectation is that this leads the way to further steps that will be more significant" than the past years. This is a thaw, but there's still ice between us."

Sen. Claiborne Pell, D-R.I., chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, called the summit "a good step, a positive step. I hope it will lead to better relations between us."

Sen. Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz.,

agreed, but added, "even with all the hype and publicity, I think we need to look at it in perspective. There's been a cold war going on for years. This is a thaw, but there's still ice between us."

Several other senators voiced similar views, including Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., chairman of the Armed Services Committee.

"It was a good summit, but we shouldn't be lulled," said Nunn.

"We heard good words, but we've yet to see the deeds. I think we

Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, one of the chamber's most conservative members, said, "Gorbachev's been here and he's gone and I'm glad he's gone. I think we have the opportunity for better relations, but I want to see some real substance and not all this flowery rhetoric we've heard."

Trade deficit eclipses dire predictions

WASHINGTON — The nation's merchandise trade deficit ballooned to a record \$17.6 billion in October, the Department of Commerce reported Thursday.

Easily surpassing July's \$16.5 billion deficit, previously the highest ever, last month's imbalance marked a huge 25-percent increase over September and was nearly \$2 billion above the most dire prediction of market analysts.

The report immediately sent the dollar to new lows against the Japanese yen and the West German mark and provoked frantic interventions by major central banks, including the Federal Reserve, while financial markets around the world suffered another day of steep plunges and partial recoveries. The Dow Jones, after a day of wild swings, closed down 47.08 points.

Council to interview high court hopefuls

BOISE — With a background of related developments, the Idaho Judicial Council next Tuesday will interview all 14 people who have applied for a vacancy on the Idaho Supreme Court.

Leaders in the legal profession say the campaigning has been probably the most intense politicking ever seen in the state for a nonpartisan judicial position.

The Judicial Council will nominate two to four candidates to Gov. Cecil Andrus, who says he will make the appointment as quickly as possible to replace the late Charles Donaldson.

Donaldson, a veteran of nearly 39 years on the five-member court, died of a heart attack Oct. 9.

Complicating the process is the fact that Chief Justice Alan Shepard suffered a heart attack Dec. 2 and is in a Boise hospital.

His doctor said Shepard could be released this weekend; Shepard is chairman of the Judicial Council. Boise lawyer Robert Hamlin, executive director for the Judicial Council, said Shepard may participate in the candidate interviews on Tuesday by speaker phone, if his health permits.

If not, the sessions will be conducted by the council's vice chairman, Sue Reens of Boise, Hamlin said.

On Monday, the Judicial Council also will interview three candidates to succeed 3rd District Judge Edward Lodge, who is becoming a federal bankruptcy judge. The candidates, Canyon County Prosecutor Richard Harris, Magistrate Steve Drescher and attorney Gerald Weston, all of Caldwell, will be interviewed Monday afternoon.

All the interviews will be held at the Supreme Court building in Boise, and will be open to the public, Hamlin said.

Computer fouls up Symms' prospecting

TWIN FALLS — These darn computers — they can make a senator look silly without even trying, as Idaho's Sen. Steve Symms learned Thursday.

Symms lent his name on a fundraising letter on behalf of Nevada Sen. Chie Hecht, a Republican running for re-election in 1988.

But Symms' efforts went awry after the letter was sent to the German-American National PAC, an anti-Semitic group that donated \$1,000 to Symms last year only to have Symms donate the money to Jewish groups.

"Does someone in Symms' office want to lay a trap for Hecht?" questioned Hans Schmidt, head of GAN-PAC, in a letter to The Times-News. "Imagine what happens if GAN-PAC accepts Symms' challenge and mails a check to Hecht's office so late before the election that no proper review of the donation is possible, as we did with the money for Hecht. Wouldn't that look odd for a Jewish candidate?"

Spokesmen for both Symms

and Hecht said the letter addressed to GAN-PAC was a computer error.

"We mailed to every PAC contributor in a so-called letter," said Glen Mauldin, Hecht's administrative assistant. "If they were on the list, they got the mail."

Phil Reberger, with Symms office in Boise, said the information on GAN-PAC was shared with party officials, but until the code was changed, those chances occur."

After the \$1,000 contribution from GAN-PAC to Symms and the group's anti-Semitic ties were made public in an April article in Mother Jones magazine, Symms donated the money to the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Council and Phyllis Bryth Anti-Defamation League.

Schmidt protested to the Federal Election Commission, demanding the return of its \$1,000 campaign contribution.

"Campaign contributions can only be used within well defined parameters, and we're certain that the support of religiously motivated museums is not one of

Andrus: Court will intervene if wilderness issue not resolved

BOISE (AP) — Confident that a wilderness agreement will be struck with Republican Sen. James McClure, Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus is warning that if the compromise is undermined the courts will step in to resolve the controversy.

Speaking to the board of directors of the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry on Thursday, Andrus again cautioned the business leaders against immediately criticizing any deal based solely on the amount of acreage would protect from development.

"There is going to be a wilderness bill, ... the public is demanding this," he said. "And the sooner we get it resolved, the better off we'll all be."

But West, Andrus announced that he and McClure have agreed that no wilderness bill could win congressional approval unless it included a so-called "soft-release" provision that would minimize development on millions of acres even though they are not formally set aside as wilderness.

declaring that any bill would be killed if it contained "soft-release."

"My experience tells me, Andrus said, that what's going to happen if we mess-around too long is a federal judge is going to tell me how many acres and where just like a federal judge told me how many beds in the prison."

Andrus and McClure are nearing the end of their negotiations on a proposal to resolve the status of some 8 million acres of forest land under wilderness consideration for over four years. Until management of that land is agreed on, it will remain closed to development.

Andrus offers to compromise on tax issues

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus is holding out the possibility of compromise this winter to the state's top business leaders, who vigorously opposed his original plan to underwrite new state spending by repealing the investment tax credit.

One of the major differences will be the way the governor eventually decides to finance the new state budget he submits to lawmakers next month.

The tax structure is not changed in some way. A year ago, repeal of the \$15.7 million investment tax credit was the centerpiece of the governor's budget-financing scheme. But while Andrus won approval of his ambitious spending plan, he lost the tax credit fight and had to accept hikes in corporate and individual income taxes to pay the bill.

Conditions upgraded on survivors

DENVER (AP) — Three of the most seriously injured survivors of the Nov. 15 crash of Continental Airlines Flight 1713 at Denver's Stapleton International Airport have been upgraded from critical condition at University Hospital.

The crash claimed 28 lives but 64 people survived when the DC-9 nosed over and crashed into the ground just seconds after taking off.

Five of the 64 remain hospitalized.

Christopher Davis, 17, of Kuna, Idaho, and Geraldine Miller, 69, of Twin Falls, Idaho, suffered severe head injuries in the crash.

Davis regained consciousness Dec. 3, and his condition was upgraded on Wednesday to fair, a hospital spokeswoman said.

Miller, who emerged from semi-consciousness about 10 days ago, also was reported in fair condition this week.

The condition of a third survivor at University Hospital — Ann Nash, 29, of Jacksonville, Fla. — was upgraded from critical to serious condition Monday. Extensive injuries included a serious head wound and Nasrallah was unconscious until about a week ago, the hospital said.

In addition to those three, Karen Johnson, 31, of Boise, Idaho, remained in critical but stable condition at Fitzsimons Army Medical Center, and Kenneth Watson, 45, of Nampa, Idaho, was in serious condition at Swedish Medical Center in Englewood.

Angie Tucek, 17, of Molba, Idaho, was released on Monday to St. Anthony Hospital Central in Denver, following treatment for a head injury and severe burns, the hospital said.

Cris Coughlin, 40, of Boise, was discharged from Denver General Hospital over the weekend.

State plans to approve jail contract

BOISE (AP) — If the weather cooperates, the first dirt may be moved on Tuesday toward construction of a new maximum security state prison south of here.

G. Anne Barker, director of public works, said Thursday the state expects to sign a contract on Monday with Morrison-Knudsen Co. and preliminary site work will start the next day.

The Idaho prison system is seriously overcrowded. The state is launching a \$29 million effort to relieve that overcrowding. M-K will handle an \$8 million expansion of prison facilities at Orofino, and build a new 263-bed maximum security prison adjacent to the main prison south of Boise.

Ma Barker told the Permanent Building Fund Council that if all goes according to schedule, the Orofino unit will be ready for occupancy in April of 1989 and the new maximum security prison will be ready to accept inmates in June of that year.

Breath analyzers unreliable

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — Thousands of people may have been convicted of drunken driving based on faulty breath-analyzer tests, a state official says, but prosecutors Thursday minimized the possibility of mass reversals.

"The simple truth is that the machines have become the judge, and the judge is not reliable," state Auditor General Don Bailey said. "It has been letting guilty people go. It has been convicting the innocent."

Alcohol solutions provided to both the state police and an unknown number of local police departments over the past five years to calibrate the machines were flawed and produced inaccurate results in breath tests, Bailey said Wednesday.

As a result, people have been unfairly convicted, Bailey said, although he was unable to provide a number.

Ceremony marks captivity

WASHINGTON (AP) — Terry Anderson's family and friends marked his 1,000th day as a captive in Lebanon Thursday in a ceremony on Capitol Hill that combined prayers and pleas for his release.

The latter milestone for Anderson, the longest-held of the 21 foreign hostages in Lebanon, fell on United Nations' International Human Rights Day.

"I know that Terry must know we are all out there, caring, working for his freedom," said Peggy Say, Anderson's sister, at the four-hour ceremony in an ornate, wood-paneled room in the Capitol.

Relatives of the hostages, members of Congress, State Department officials, personnel from the embassies of Algeria, Ireland and Lebanon and journalists were in attendance.

Phyllis Kaminsky, director of the U.N. information office, read a message from Javier Perez de Cuellar, the U.N. general secretary, condemning the taking of hostages.

The event was co-sponsored by No Greater Love, a humanitarian organization that works to support families directly affected by war and terrorism, and the Journalists Committee to Free Terry Anderson, a group formed to work for Anderson's release.

PTL tax bill \$82 million

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — The U.S. Internal Revenue Service claimed Thursday that the PTL ministry owed as much as \$82 million in taxes, more than the estimated \$60 million total debt of the television ministry.

In papers filed in U.S. Bankruptcy Court, the IRS also issued an objection to the ministry's bankruptcy reorganization plan, saying it did not adequately take into account the tax claim.

In October, the ministry estimated its debt at \$61.8 million, including an estimated \$5 million due the IRS.

The ministry filed for reorganization in June after founder Jim Bakker resigned amid a sex scandal. The ministry is believed to have about \$170 million in assets.

Thursday was the final day for filing claims against PTL. A deputy clerk of court who asked not to be identified said thousands of claims had been filed by television stations, lifetime partners and other unsecured creditors.

Senators give nod to plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Thursday night gave preliminary approval to a \$62.1 billion, two-year deficit-reduction plan, part of a package that would cut federal spending \$2.25 for every dollar of tax increase.

The bigger part of the package was adopted by voice vote. But final approval awaited disposition of a dispute over an unrelated amendment to reactivate the fairness doctrine, which would require broadcasters to air all sides of controversial issues.

Senate leaders pushed for final passage later in the night of the larger piece of the deficit package.

That portion, which includes a \$23 billion tax increase, produces most of the deficit reduction under an agreement whose broad outlines were reached last month by President Reagan and congressional leaders of both parties. The other part of the package, also facing consideration this week, is wrapped into a giant government spending bill of more than \$600 billion.

By 7:15 p.m., the Senate rejected a substitute for the larger part of the package. The amendment, sponsored chiefly by Sen. Nancy Landon Kassebaum, R-Kan., would have frozen broad areas of government spending and individual income-tax rates for one year at 1987 levels.

Warning of deal said useful

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two federal officials said Thursday it would have been useful to get advance warning of the deportation agreement with Cuba that triggered prison uprisings in Atlanta and Oakland, La.

However, Associate Attorney General Stephen Pratt and federal prison director Michael Quinlan refused to fault the State Department for giving the Justice Department just a four-hour notice of the immigration pact that will result in a return to Cuba for some of the detainees held in this country.

At a news conference, Pratt said the Justice Department didn't attempt to persuade the State Department to delay publicly announcing the renewal of the 1984 immigration agreement regarding the Mariel Cubans in order to give the Justice Department more time to calm the detainees' fears about it.

Benefit estimates coming

WASHINGTON (AP) — The commissioner of Social Security said Thursday that her agency will be able next year to provide American workers at any age with estimates of their retirement benefits and how much their families will receive if they die or become disabled.

Dorcas P. Hardy said she is scrapping the merely worded statements of benefits that told people only how much their total earnings were in previous years.

Currently, workers can get estimates of their retirement benefits only if they are 60 or older.

Hardy's new "Personal Earnings and Benefit Statement" will be available to workers of any age, and will include estimates in current dollars of how much they will get if they retire at ages 62, 65 or 70.

The new form, written in plain English, will be available by this spring or summer, Hardy told reporters.

Warning note found in plane wreckage

PALO ROBLES, Calif. — A chilling note of impending doom "probably" had been written by a disgruntled flight attendant moments before he opened fire inside Pacific Southwest Airlines Flight 1771 — war discovered Thursday amid the aircraft wreckage.

Investigators assume that the note, written by hands on an air sickness bag, was slipped amid flight attendant Raymond F. Thomson, the USAir official who recently had fired Burke from his job as a ticket agent in Los Angeles. "Hi Ray," the message began. "I think it's sort of ironical that we end up like this. I asked for some leniency for my family."

Remember?
Well, I got none and you'll get none."

Investigators believe that Burke opened fire on Thomson with a .44 Magnum pistol he had smuggled on board, and that he then burst into the cockpit and, probably by shooting the crew, caused the aircraft to plunge into coastal mountains near Paso Robles in Central California. All 49 people on board the four-engine jetliner died.

CBS News, quoting unnamed sources, reported Thursday that cockpit recording tapes contain the voice of a flight attendant telling

the crew, "We've got a problem here."

Another voice then responded, "I'm the problem."

Sources said it is not yet clear from the tape whether shots were fired inside the cockpit, although the recording does have the sound of a commotion on the flight deck before the aircraft screamed toward the ground.

Richard T. Bretzing, special agent in charge of the FBI's Los Angeles office, confirmed for the first time Thursday to reporters here that Burke was suspected of having brought down the jetliner. PSA contacted the FBI about Burke's possible culpability two hours after the crash Monday evening.

Bretzing said that ballistics checks had confirmed that the pistol found Wednesday at the crash site was one that had been loaned to Burke last month by a friend in Northern California.

He also said that a small part of Burke's body had been located among the wreckage, and that it had been identified through a fingerprint match-up.

Further, Bretzing said that, in addition to cockpit tapes and the gun, other evidence has confirmed that shots were fired "aboard the craft before it descended in a dive from

22,000 feet. He would not elaborate. Court documents released Thursday showed that an FBI search of Burke's Long Beach, Calif., condominium had yielded a last will and testament, made out by the suspect just five days before the crash.

Agents also seized insurance documents, including a form to designate beneficiaries of his policy that was dated Nov. 30 — eight days before the crash and a little more than a week after he had been fired from USAir, allegedly for stealing in-flight cocktail receipts.

An affidavit filed by the FBI in support of a search warrant for the Burke residence also appeared to resolve one lingering riddle in the case — how the recently dismissed USAir employee managed to skirt an airport security check before he

boarded Flight 1771.

According to the document, a PSA official had informed an FBI investigator that David Burke had been allowed to bypass security screening as a familiar airline employee and therefore was not screened for weapons or destructive devices.

Giant iceberg drifting along

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Rhode Island-sized iceberg continues to drift near the coast of Antarctica but two smaller ones may pose a greater threat to shipping, a government scientist said Thursday.

The largest iceberg, about 25 miles wide and 98 miles long, broke free from the Antarctic ice shelf in the Ross Sea and was first reported by scientists in early November and has progressed about 48 miles from the coast.

It is moving northward and rotating in a counterclockwise direction, Glen Rutledge of the Navy-NOAA Joint Ice Center said in a telephone interview.

There are some submarine rises on the sea floor in the path of this

huge iceberg, and there is a chance that it will run aground on them and break up, said the scientist affiliated with the joint Navy-National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration office.

At any rate, he said, at the current rate of movement it is unlikely to reach open ocean before this time next year.

The iceberg is easy to see and avoid, but could spawn growlers — small icebergs that break off — which might interfere with vessels traveling to the McMurdo Station scientific base, Rutledge said.

More of a hazard, he said, are a pair of icebergs in the Weddell Sea that have already moved far enough north to pose a threat to shipping.

Big losses close AIDS hospital

HOUSTON (AP) — An empty white building beside a busy freeway is all that remains of the nation's first private hospital for AIDS patients, which closes Friday after losing \$8 million in its 14 months of operation.

Hailed at its opening in September 1986 as a marketplace solution to a growing health problem, the Institute for Immunological Disorders buckled under the load of caring for indigent patients needing expensive treatment.

There will be little or no ceremony when the hospital closes, said Anna Wheeler, spokeswoman for American Medical International Inc., the institute's parent. All patients have been transferred to other facilities, and employees spent most of last week closing out the institute's affairs.

In its first few months, the institute handled about 1,000 patient visits a month, medical director Dr. Peter Mansell said. The hospital had 180 beds, but most people were treated as outpatients, and federal

funds were used to test experimental therapies, he said.

By March, the amount of care the institute gave to the indigent far outstripped the \$250,000 set aside for that purpose in its first year.

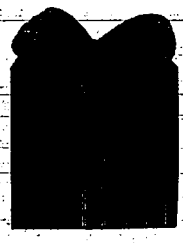
The facility then stopped accepting new indigent patients and laid off 26 of its 175 workers. In August, AMI announced it was phasing out the institute.

Most of the hospital's losses stemmed from caring for the poor, Mr. Wheeler said.

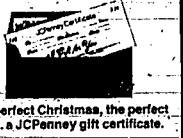
Annual treatment costs for one AIDS patient can total \$40,000.

Many AIDS victims apparently visited private doctors until medical insurance was exhausted, and then went to the institute to continue treatment as indigents, Mansell said.

They hope the closing will highlight the need for more public involvement in treating people with acquired immune deficiency syndrome, which will be hard for private insurance to handle, he said.

Constables revolt

JOHANNESBURG — Scores of black constables revolted against their white commander Thursday, tried to run him down and fought a gun battle with a riot squad that chased them, authorities said.

Seven constables and one member of the national police riot squad were wounded in the clash at Sebokeng, a black township 35 miles south of Johannesburg, police reported.

Nineteen of the 60 rebel constables were arrested and were being investigated for mutiny, attempted murder and malicious damage to property, the police said.

They did not reveal how many officers were in the riot squad or whether any of them were black.

Police headquarters said the constables muffled after being ordered to conduct a routine inspection of their vehicles, but the specific reasons for their actions had not been determined.

Lt. Col. J.M. Labuschagne, a police spokesman, said an investigation was being conducted.

The constables belong to the police force of Lekoa, a grouping of six black townships. It includes Sebokeng and Sharpville, scenes of much anti-apartheid unrest, which has included attacks on black policemen seen as tools of the white authorities.

Virtually 100 percent of township policemen are black, except for the personnel of some command posts. The national police force is about 60 percent white.

Radicals attack Roh

SEOUL — South Korea (AP) — Thousands of radicals hurled rocks, firebombs and tear gas at government candidate Roh Tae-woo on Thursday in one of the most violent outbursts of the presidential campaign.

Roh was not hurt in the attacks, which began when security guards overpowered a youth with a kitchen knife.

Authorities said at least 74 people were injured in the incident in Kusan and in related violence in Chonju. Both are in the northern Cholla region, a political base of opposition candidate Kim Dae-jung.

Roh, a former army general, is vying with the two main opposition leaders — Kim Dae-jung and Kim

Young-sam — and several other candidates in Wednesday's election. It will be South Korea's first direct presidential balloting in 16 years.

National police chief Kwon Bock-kyong ordered an investigation of the violence, which he said was premeditated, and he added that all those involved would be arrested. He dispatched a 20-member special police investigation team.

Roh expressed "deep regret" over the attacks, telling reporters: "I am determined to eradicate violence at any cost."

In Kusan, 138 miles south of Seoul, a youth armed with a kitchen knife was tried to approach Roh, who was getting into an open car for a parade.

Arias hopes prize can aid peace cause

OSLO, Norway (AP) — Costa Rican President Oscar Arias accepted the 1987 Nobel Peace prize Thursday, saying he hoped it would boost the chances of success for the Central American peace plan for which it was awarded.

Arias called on the superpowers to let Central Americans resolve their own problems. "In the name of God, at least they should leave us in peace," he said.

At a white-tie ceremony in Stockholm, Sweden, meanwhile, King Carl XVI Gusaf handed the Nobel prize in literature to exiled Soviet poet Joseph Brodsky and gave seven other laureates their awards for economics, physics, medicine and chemistry.

Breathing from ceremony, the king strode across the blue-carpeted stage to hand the medal and certificate of award to Charles J. Pedersen, an 83-year-old retired American chemist. Pedersen, one of the oldest laureates in the 88-year history of the prize, took a few halting steps from his chair to accept the prize.

Arias, 46, receiving his award at a less formal ceremony at Oslo University, said the prestige of the Nobel prize should enhance the prospects for the Guatemala accord, which was signed Aug. 7 by himself and the presidents of Nicaragua, El Salvador, Honduras and Guatemala.

2,500 homeless

RANGOON, Burma (AP) — A wind-swept fire raged through a suburb, killing a 6-year-old boy and leaving 2,500 people homeless, it was reported Thursday.

A primary school was among the 180 buildings and shanties destroyed Wednesday in the two-hour blaze, which started in a kitchen.

Damage in the Hlaing area north of the capital was estimated at about \$100,000, the Working People's Daily reported.

Iraq claims its planes have attacked another tanker in gulf

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Iraq said its warplanes attacked a ship off Iran on Thursday, and Lloyd's Shipping Intelligence Unit confirmed an earlier Iraqi raid on an Iranian tanker in the Persian Gulf.

The official Iraqi News Agency quoted a military spokesman as saying the Iraqi air force also flew 75 combat missions on Iranian troop gatherings and economic targets. It did not elaborate.

The agency said warplanes scored an "accurate and effective" hit on a "big naval target," which usually means a tanker, at 10:30 a.m.

The reported air strike was the second Iraqi raid on ships off Iran's coast in 12 hours. There was no immediate independent confirmation of it.

But the London-based Lloyd's confirmed that the 218,497-ton tanker Susangird, owned by the National Iranian Tanker Co., was hit by missiles fired by Iraqi jets Wednesday night.

Iraqi planes attacked the Susangird as it was sailing south with a full load of oil from Iran's Kharg Island terminal at the northern tip of the Persian Gulf.

Magic Valley Chorale, Orchestra present Christmas concert

Holidays enhanced by performance

TWIN FALLS — Magic Valley Chorale members are again singing a holiday tune.

The Chorale, together with the Magic Valley Chamber Orchestra, will present their 15th Anniversary Christmas Concert this Sunday at 3 p.m. in the College of Southern Idaho's Fine Arts Auditorium. It will be the 29th local performance the singers have given since the first Magic Valley Chorale Christmas concert was presented in 1972.

The concert will feature a variety of seasonal music, including Bach's cantata, "God, the

Lord, is Sun and Shield" and Handel's "Awake the Lark Trumpet's Sound." Music written by Robert Shaw, Randall Thompson, Eugene Butler and Hans Leo Hassler will also be sung.

"We do quite a variety. We do some bright, bouncy ones, and then we do 'Many Moods of Christmas, suite one,'" says Gerry Brown, Chorale spokesman, referring to a medley of familiar Christmas tunes.

Brown calls the anniversary concert "a community effort" because participants in the singing group come from all over the Magic Valley. Members of the Altrusa Club, a local public service organization, serve as ushers and man the ticket booth.

"We have four soloists and it kind of represents the whole idea of Magic Valley. One of them is from Twin Falls, one is from Jerome, one is from Rupert, and, believe it or not, the other is from Ketchum. Twin Falls tapped into the Ketchum/Sun Valley area for a change."

Brown says the group, which gives annual Christmas and Spring concerts, was originally organized by members of church choirs who wanted to promote chorale singing in the Magic Valley. He says the Chorale is aligned with, but "does not belong to" the College of Southern Idaho.

"It's a medium whereby the students that are taking music courses get extra credit if

they participate in the Chorale's rehearsals and concerts. It kind of serves as a showcase for them while they're getting their feet wet making public appearances," he says.

A nine member board of directors selects and pays the Chorale's director. And for the past 10 years, Carson Wong, a music teacher at CSI, has filled this role.

"We feel real fortunate to have Carson because he's local and he's interested and he's very good," says Brown. "He's paid by the Chorale, per concert. But, I'll tell you, when you figure out the number of hours they put in redoing the scores and all that, it's probably

"It's the same sort of feeling somebody must get when they break a world record—I mean, we break them every day. Because you only get better. You can't afford to get worse," he said, relaxing in his hotel room before a recent performance with the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra.

Dressed in a baggy, black and white sweater, black slacks and black Reeboks, the 5-foot-4 musician leaned forward as he mused about James Galway... my very favorite student" and "my next best friend, which is my talent."

Nutcracker tradition continues at CSI

TWIN FALLS — Peter Tchaikovsky, composer of the music for "The Nutcracker," a ballet that has become beloved the world over, never knew or guessed at the great success of the masterpiece he had created.

The ballet has become an annual highlight of Magic Valley's activities and this year's performance is set for 7:30 p.m. Dec. 17 in the College of Southern Idaho Fine Arts Center. The event is being sponsored by the Twin Falls Bank and Trust Co. and the CSI Continuing Education Department.

The American Festival Ballet company will also perform the popular Christmas show in Halley on Dec. 22 in the Wood River High School auditorium.

"The Nutcracker" was

Tchaikovsky's last great work and he undertook it with little enthusiasm. The work was commissioned in 1891 by the Maryinsky Theatre of St. Petersburg. The ballet was to be based on a fantasy children's tale by the legendary writer, E.T.A. Hoffman titled, "The Nutcracker and the Mouse King."

Tchaikovsky, who was working from a French translation of the story and was having difficulty collaborating with the famous choreographer, Marius Petipa, became dissatisfied with the progress of the score. Completion of the ballet was further delayed when

When the full production of "The Nutcracker" was finally premiered on Dec. 17, 1892, in the presence of the Imperial Court in St.

Petersburg, it was warmly received by some. Others were not as enthusiastic. Some members of the court objected to use of children in the ballet, one of the features that has contributed to the production's great popularity in America.

Tchaikovsky died never knowing his ballet was to become a classic holiday tradition throughout the world, attracting large crowds each December and starting many young students on their career in dance. The American Festival Ballet has given more than 100 performances of this great work, each year changing some features such as the dancers, costumes, sets or choreography to keep the production fresh and alive.

This season the ballet will feature a new Act I party scene set by Phil

Atkinson of Boise, who recently designed the much acclaimed sets for American Festival Ballet's production of "Snow White."

"The mice and soldier-humorous battle scene, added to the production last season, will again be performed. This scene was choreographed by AFB ballet mistress, Maria Hanson. Maruis Zirra, artistic director of American Festival Ballet is directing the production.

New dancers in lead roles include Beth Morgan as Clara, Nadya Zybina as the Sugarplum Fairy and Luis Astorga as the cavalier. Morgan had danced at the Virginia Conservatory of the Arts and the Tidewater Ballet and has studied on scholarship at the Jeffrey Ballet School in New York City.

works out to about 10 cents an hour." Brown says the size of the group, which fluctuates between 85 and 100 singers, and varies between the winter and spring concerts because many of the members farm or ranch and are busy in the spring. The group will recruit students or run-ands in local newspapers to bolster their nucleus when singing music that requires many voices.

He says the Chorale is not a "holly-toley" organization, but is open to anyone with a desire to sing and the dedication to attend the 12 to 15 rehearsals needed to prepare for a concert. High school through senior citizen-aged singers are invited to participate. "What we're trying to do is have it a notch above high school music, but if they're fairly mature and their voices are fairly mature" and

they can read music, boy, we're going to grab them. And as long as they want to stay with us and have the voice, there's no age limit," says Brown. "Basically, it's open to anyone in the Magic Valley who loves to sing. We like them to be able to read music, but it isn't absolutely necessary. We can help them along pretty well. The main thing is, they don't have to be professionals. They just have to be professionals." Brown says the Chorale operates under a patron sponsor program. Sponsors give the board members the budget comes from direct ticket sales at concerts and a \$5 registration fee each member pays per concert to cover the cost of music that wanders off. Money left over after expenses have been paid is donated by the nonprofit organization to various musical causes.

"We plan that money back into public service needs, but we try to keep it within reach of improvements at the college," says Brown. He says that improvements in the college music department help the Chorale give better concerts. The group has donated money to CSI to buy new concert risers and music posture chairs. "They also have given scholarships to promising young music students attending the junior college." Featured soloists for the Christmas performance will be Leslie Mauldin-Skiles, a soprano from Jerome; Camille Cox, soprano from Twin Falls; Margaret Fogwell, alto from Ketchum; and Robert Newman, baritone from Rupert. Confidence in American art drops

NEW YORK - Confidence in the market for American art has been shaken at a Christie's auction. Though the prestigious Park Avenue institution raked up \$15.4 million in sales of American paintings, drawings and sculpture last Friday, much of the work by George O'Keefe expected to bring more than \$1 million - failed to find a buyer and the sale as a whole fell short of its estimated total of \$17 million to \$24 million.

Sotbehy's \$37 million auction of American art last week had indicated strength in a market that depends almost entirely on American buyers. That sale set records for about 40 artists, including O'Keefe, and doubled the previous record for a sale of American art.

But by noon the next day, some observers at Christie's were grumbling that the sale had indicated which featured an unusually thin group of 69 works consigned from the Andrew Crispo Gallery and 11 O'Keefes, including 10 from her sister's collection - was an aberration.

"Forget what happened yesterday. These are rough times," said one woman, referring to the decline of the stock market. "The top of the (art) market is strong, and the bottom is strong, but the middle is soft," said Robin Riley, a Christie's spokeswoman. "We have been saying that all along, but the situation seems more grave now."

When Christie's daylong sale ended, it resulted in a disappointing 26 percent of the 400 lots failed to sell (compared to 15 percent at the earlier Sotbehy's sale), three works fetched more than \$1 million each and many lower-priced pieces outstripped expectations. "The sale's stunning success was Elie Nadelman's 'Tango,' a charming wood sculpture of a dancing couple that sold for \$2.86 million (in-

cluding the 10 percent buyer's commission) to Perry-Hill Galleries. The work by the Polish-born artist who moved to the United States in 1914 under the patronage of Helena Rubenstein set auction records for Nadelman and for an American sculptor.

Another - Nadelman, "Chef d'Orchestre," depicting a dapper conductor, brought \$1.43 million from Hirsch & Adler Galleries. But while these two prime pieces exceeded their pre-sale estimates, three other Nadelmans (a bronze head, a marble head and a bronze group of five works) was given to the School of American Ballet by its founding director, Lincoln Kirstein, and put up for sale to raise money for new documentaries, studies and offices for the school.

The unsold O'Keefe, a 1943 oil called "Pewee With Shadow and Moon" also went on the block as a benefit. The painting was a gift from the artist to architect Frank Lloyd Wright in 1945. Proceeds from its sale were meant to increase endowment funds for the preservation of two Wright homes: Taliesin in Spring Green, Wis., and Taliesin West in Scottsdale, Ariz.

Bidding on "Pewee" started at \$500,000 and promptly rose to \$800,000 but stopped there, apparently short of the reserve. Since 1948 O'Keefes had sold for as much as \$1.98 million the preceding day, the failure of "Pewee" was a surprise.

Christie's Riley speculated that Sotbehy's group of seasonal flower paintings owned by the artist's sister appealed to a different audience than the "more cerebral" abstraction of sun-bleached bones in a desert landscape. Despite such disappointments, some other properties performed splendidly. Mary Cassatt's "Mother Bertha Holding Her Nude Baby" sold for \$1.05 million, setting a record for a pastel by the American Impressionist.

A Winslow Homer watercolor,

"The Flock of Sheep, Houghton Farm," hit the high end of its estimate when it sold for \$660,000 to Berry-Hill Galleries. An unidentified Japanese dealer paid \$618,000 for a still life by Japanese-born Yasuo Kuniyoshi, setting a record for the artist and tripling the work's low pre-sale estimate. John Singleton Copley's "Portrait of Robert Hooper" brought \$330,000 instead of the estimated \$190,000 to \$150,000. "Summer Reading," a painting by Impressionist Frederick Carl Frieseke, also sailed past its predicted price. Expected to sell in the range of \$125,000 to \$175,000, it brought \$264,000 from a New York dealer.

Conservatory, where he and other students studied along after famed French flutist Jean-Pierre Rampal. After working in various orchestral positions in England, Galway was named principal flutist of the London Symphony Orchestra and later of the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra. He became first flutist with the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra in 1963.

Eager for independence, he set out on his own in 1975. He recorded four albums and performed more than 120 concerts during his first year as a soloist.

"Everybody always asks if he's like he is on the stage," said Jeanne Galway, 30, his third wife. "He's always in a good mood. Always. He never gets angry."

He's also not judgmental; at least not too terribly so, according to Mrs. Galway, a New York-born flutist and her husband's "sparring partner."

When she practices at their home in Lucerne, Switzerland, for instance, "sometimes hell yell things upatats-like, 'Lift-up-your-chin,'" she said. "I tell him to go back to his computers. After three years of marriage, you can do this."

"Where I lived, of course, everybody was Protestant," he said. "But it didn't make any difference to us because we were not in the business of making war against Catholics. I just wanted to get a job in a factory, like every other normal kid-in my working class."

However, his passion for the flute grew with each passing day. "I was like a drug you know? A lot of kids played football. I just played the flute all day," he recalled.

Galway's chance to shine came in the 1950s when, at age 16, he won a scholarship to study at the Royal College of Music at London. He went on to London's Guildhall School of Music and the Paris

New comics take aim at adult reading skills

CHICAGO (AP) - At first glance the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles wouldn't seem to be much of an advertisement for literacy.

But the Literacy Volunteers of Chicago have recruited them, along with a number of other modern comic book superheroes, in the battle against adult illiteracy.

With the volunteer assistance of 60 comic book artists and writers, LVC has "rehabbed" two comic books, "Word Warriors" and "Quest for Lost Dreams," which are being distributed this week to comic dealers throughout the United States and Canada.

The aim of the comic books is twofold - to earn money for the adult literacy program; and to serve as teaching aids for adults with limited reading skills.

"There's simply isn't a lot of money available for teaching adults to read," LVC director George Hagenauer said in a telephone interview Wednesday.

"The current federal adult education allocation amounts to only \$2.36 per adult in need, so the use of \$1.50 or \$2 comic books will be a big help in funding it, and we can use them as texts with our students, too."

"With some delays in the

printing, it took us 15 months, but we got out 25,000 copies of each comic book," Hagenauer said. "All the art and stories were donated, and so was the paper, so we only had a small-part of the printing costs to pay."

The comics were the brainchild of Brian Augustyn, a former Chicago resident who is an editor with DC Comics, the publishers of Superman comic books, Hagenauer said.

"Brian pointed out that for many of us, our first - and some of our fondest - memories of reading involved comics," Hagenauer said. "He also realized that more than half the comics sold these days are sold to adults, so we decided on an adult format."

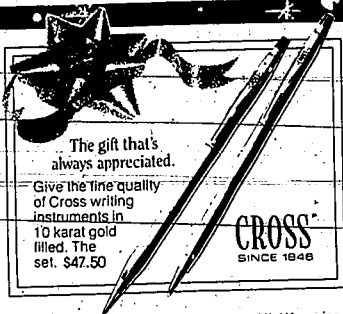

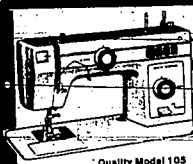

Unlikely pair is crux of new Martin film

HOLLYWOOD — "Planes, Trains and Automobiles," which is enough to keep everyone home for the holidays, traces the peculiar geographic odyssey of a pair of businessmen — the dapper Neal Page (Steve Martin) and the uncool Del Griffith (John Candy) — trying to get home to Chicago from New York for Thanksgiving. As it turns out, the trip is only slightly less perilous than Robert Falcon Scott's in the Antarctic.

Writer-director John Hughes has made his film a catalog of worst travel experiences, beginning in New York, where commuters are virtually hijacking taxis, and continuing through the men's flight, which is diverted far, far away from its landing at socked-in O'Hare International — to Wichita, Kan., to be exact. From there, storm-tossed and nearly out of fuel, they try everything except Flicke Flyers in the trough homeward.

The movie's humor comes from Martin, fastidious as a Siamese cat, trying to get away from certain salesman Candy, who is actually the more resourceful traveler. In Martin's book, there is no salt of the earth; there is only the earth-shaking assault on his sensibilities by this crude, boisterous, overly friendly behemoth. In Candy's book, hey, misery loves company, eh?

The film is schizoid: It is best when Hughes turns the screen over to these two masters of physical humor. Candy, driving down a freeway at night, tripping out to Ray Charles' "Doin' the Mess Around," playing every instrument in the band on the car's dashboard as he burns up the freeway — only too literally. Or the elegant Martin, his slim body contorted into a waltz dance of rage after his invoice at a car rental agency has backfired.

leaving him car-less.

Fortunately, there is a lot of physical stuff. "Planes, Trains and Automobiles" that turns on a combination of the intensely irritating musical score, credited to Irwin Newborn, which underlines every visual moment as though they thought we would miss something.

There are also many scenes in which everyone living outside a major metropolitan area is portrayed as black-jawed, overweight or a mouth-breather, probably in a bad mood and given to miniature marshmallow salads. It is a pretty hateful point of view, but it is a Hughes article of faith and a lot of people laugh right along with him. (The film's R rating is for one extended scene of obscene language, of the "Scarface" variety).

But there are also great patches based on the humor of abuse, which either sits well with you or leaves you detached and even mildly offended. Martin is given these scenes; moments when the strain of putting up with Candy is too great and he tells this great boob every one of his failings.

Candy is not impervious to wounds; his response is to admit that he may talk too much, and with too little point, but that as a man he is "the real article" — what you see is what you get. It is delivered with dignity enough to crush anyone, and it makes Martin abashed. But it has the effect of making us wary about Martin. His character seems spiteful and elitist, and not enough is done to lay the groundwork for the complete change of heart that is needed before the film's mushy conclusion.

In the biography and autobiography category, the nominees are "An American Childhood" by Annie Dillard; "Timebends: A Life," by Arthur Miller; "Chaucer: His Life, His Works, His World," by Donald R. Howard; "Don't Preach on Me: The Selected Letters of S.J. Perelman," edited by Prudence Crowther; and "Private Domain," by Paul Taylor.

The poetry nominees are C.K. Williams' "Fish and Blood"; May Swenson's "In Other Words"; Alan Shapiro's "Happy Hour"; Donald Justice's "The Sunset Maker"; and John Ashbery's "April Galleries."

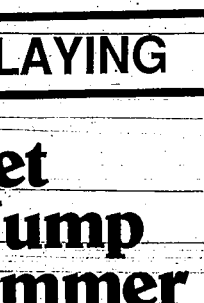

State juvenile officers may be underqualified

Study shows problems in youth probations

TWIN FALLS — A recent study initiated with a grant from the Idaho Youth Commission indicates that the state's juvenile probation officers may be both underqualified and overworked.

Sam Giles, chairman of the Region V Council for Children and Youth, said Tuesday that he and associate Jeanie Heinzen have completed the initial stages of a statewide study addressing Idaho's juvenile probation officers. Giles and Heinzen received a \$3,000 grant from the Commission to compile the study.

According to Giles, who is himself a juvenile probation officer in Blaine County, he and Heinzen sent out questionnaires to 60 of the state's juvenile probation officers in September. He said they have since received 45 responses, from which they have tabulated their preliminary figures.

Giles reported those findings to the Region V Council at its meeting Tuesday afternoon in Twin Falls. The specific purpose of the study is "to determine a

profile of the juvenile probation officer in Idaho," Giles said. "We want to see who that person is now, and determine what steps we might want to take in the future to change that profile."

One change suggested by the officers themselves was

the imposition of certification requirements for people in their profession. Giles said no such standard now exists, and of the survey's 45 respondents only 11 have some type of certification.

"There are no standards for being a juvenile proba-

tion officer in Idaho," Giles said. "You probably don't even have to have a high school education. It all just depends upon whether a county wants to hire you."

Eighty-four percent of the survey's respondents advocated certification requirements.

Giles added that only 20 of the 45 respondents have a college degree. That differs markedly from other northwestern states, where a juvenile probation officer is required either to have such a degree or its equivalent in work experience and training.

Larry Oglesby, director of the Marion County Family Court in Salem, Ore., said Thursday that his juvenile probation officers must meet minimum standards which are set at the county level.

"For the entry-level positions, they must have a four-year degree with the major course work in corrections, or the rough equivalent (in other work experience)," he said.

Richard Meeker, chief probation officer of the First Judicial District in Helena, Mont., said Thursday that Montana has the same qualifications written into its

Michael relates drug-laced history

TWIN FALLS — At first glance, Michael — short-haired, friendly and articulate — invokes the imagery laced throughout Bob Dylan's song, "Clean Cut Kid": marching band, baseball team, probably a Wonderbread.

But Michael, a junior attending a Magic Valley high school, has a long

history of substance abuse — a history peppered with pot, crack and acid.

At a meeting of the Region V Council for Children and Youth Tuesday, Michael described his experiences to council members in hopes of helping them address such problems in the future.

Michael moved to the Magic Valley earlier this year. He grew up in Los Angeles, where he started tak-

ing drugs while in fourth grade.

"It's just the environment," Michael said. "Everyone else is doing it, so you try it. And if you like it, you're going to do it again.

"It's just like a candy bar, except that it costs a little more."

After his early start, Michael made a steady climb up the ladder of serious drugs. He said that when eighth grade rolled around, his

New markers designate Oregon Trail in county

TWIN FALLS — The first signs designating the route of the Oregon Trail in Twin Falls County were set in place Thursday morning on the historical Stricker Ranch site southwest of Kimberly.

Howard Moon, chairman of the Oregon Trail markers committee of the Twin Falls County Historical Preservation Commission, said signs showing where both the Oregon Trail and Kelton Road crossed the Stricker property were installed Thursday near the small log building that once served as a stage stop for travelers on the two main western routes.

There will be a total of 64 signs in Twin Falls County which Moon said will be located beside highway and county road intersections with the trails.

The Oregon Trail entered Twin Falls County near Milner and cut west to the Hagerman area. The Kelton Road entered Idaho from Utah near Strevel and traveled northwest through Cassia County and into Twin Falls County just east of Rock Creek.

"Of course we will not be able to put signs on private property where fields and homes are now located, but when we have completed the signing,

people will be able to see the route the trails cut through the county," Moon said.

Two signs were placed near the old stage building, another in front of the newly restored Stricker home and a fourth was placed, during a heavy rain, at a point where evidence of the trail is visible across a pasture and the county road that leads to the Stricker Ranch.

The signs are narrow white plastic markers with "Oregon Trail" or "Kelton Road" inscribed at the top. They are driven into the ground and are flexible to prevent being broken or bent.

"We have remnants and historical structures of the Oregon Trail in our county that are nationally recognized and it has always been our goal to mark them to show our people and tourists the actual trail route," Moon said.

Moon said the project has been something local historians have been attempting to do for years.

Marking of the trail is made possible by a \$1,600 grant given to the state by the National Park Service and allocated to the county Historical Preservation Commission by Gov. Cecil Andrus. A matching \$1,400 will be provided locally through volunteer labor and donations.

Exporting herbs is profitable

Diverse crops add to farm income

TWIN FALLS — One farmer's noxious weed is another farmer's cash crop.

Many of the problem plants Magic Valley farmers spend time and money purging from their fields can be raised and sold at considerable profit, according to an agricultural marketing consultant who came to Twin Falls to discuss such possibilities.

There are over 600 native plants of commercial value in Idaho, said Richard A. Miller, "just because the cattle won't eat 'em, doesn't mean they're not important."

"There is big money in small-scale farming using existing farm machinery, but potatoes and beans aren't part of the formula," Miller said.

Rather, marigold, thistle and lemon basil centered his discussion at a day-long economic development and diversification conference at the College of Southern Idaho Wednesday.

Exporting herbs is profitable, he said, explaining there are four major markets for them — foods, drugs, cosmetics, and florals.

Angelica, for example, an herb in the carrot family, should be grown here. It is used by the drug industry to make female hormones.

Comfrey, a coarse, hairy-leaved plant, has been discovered to be use-

ful in animal feed. It contains amino acids missing in alfalfa, and when mixed with it, increases the protein content in the meat and reduces disease in the animals.

Cedar leaf tips, hemlock, larch and blue spruce are in big demand for making potpourri.

"You wouldn't believe how many blue hairs are buying that stuff," Miller said. "It's becoming a major market."

Miller is not the slippery, fly-by-night rainmaker he might first appear. His clients include the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and several large agribusinesses.

"I'm a world marketing expert," Miller modestly admitted. "But I'm learning farming. My farm manager has got me on a tractor getting hemorrhoids so I'm learning that part, too."

All of the crops he has tested in Idaho, Oregon, and Washington are netting the farmers who now grow them a minimum of \$2,000 an acre. In Washington, baby's breath is yielding \$4,000 an acre in raw form without any drying or processing involved.

Numerous products currently supplied by foreign markets could also be the domain of local growers, Miller said. Idaho is currently cultivating wild flower seeds for Dutch companies that then ship the mature cut flowers back to the United States at a large profit.

Despite recent storms, area drought lingers

TWIN FALLS — Despite recent precipitation, the drought continues in southern Idaho and it is critical the area receive normal snowpack this winter, says a National Weather Service hydrologist.

Snowpack is below normal now but Ketchum has received half the normal amount of snow for December and the month is not half over, says Scott Kiser, NWS hydrologist in Boise.

Kiser and other weather experts spoke at a winter weather seminar Thursday at NWS offices in Kimberly.

Kiser says it is too early to tell whether the region will have adequate snowpack.

"What really makes the snowpack critical is we have used what water we had. It's gone," says Kiser.

This is reflected in the water levels of reservoirs serving southern Idaho as of Dec. 1.

"Here is a rundown on the percentage full of each reservoir:

- Oakley, 7 percent
- Salmon Falls, 17 percent
- Magic, 3 percent
- American Falls, 34 percent
- Pallsades, 43 percent

Kiser says northern Idaho is worse off than southern Idaho with Lewiston's rainfall only 20 percent of normal. Ketchum and Twin Falls precipitation is slightly below normal.

"The amount of snowpack is the critical factor in a drought, he says. If the reservoirs have a water bulge from the winter, it can help a great deal.

Kiser offers no prediction whether the drought would continue in 1988. But he says in only two-out-of-the-ten driest years on record did Idaho fail to have normal precipitation following a dry year.

In other matters Butch Harper of the U.S. Forest Service in Ketchum says the nature of recent precipitation makes the Ketchum area prone to avalanches.

"There is a lot of light density snow with heavy wet snow on top. The bottom layer does not have enough strength to support the top, he says.

Leadership program discusses school funding, operations

TWIN FALLS — The lesson for the day was schools. How they are funded and how they are operated.

The students were participants in a Thursday session of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce Leadership Program at O'Leary Junior High School.

School funding is not just a matter of collecting state income tax and sending it down the pipe to school districts. There is a complex formula for sharing the wealth, as explained by Deputy State Superintendent August Hein.

School operations are funded by locally-generated property taxes and state income, distributed through a formula based on enrollment and average daily attendance, among other things, he said. Payment to the districts is calculated on a "unit," based on student numbers.

The combination of local and state funding should bring districts up to the same basic level of funding, although some districts may exceed the level with additional tax levies, he said.

Districts vary in the amount they levy to generate local taxes. At the high end is the school district in Mos-

cow "with a very high supplemental levy," Hein said.

"Their teachers are paid considerably more than Twin Falls," he said. Moscow has to pay higher to compete with teacher salaries paid in nearby Pullman, Wash. where there is strong support for education.

School districts anticipate annually an amount they will receive from local property tax collection. About 90 percent on up of the tax bill due is collected, Hein said.

"In time," which is over a two to three-year period, a district will receive all the taxes for which they levied.

"In a year where they have delinquencies (in tax payments), the districts bite the bullet," he said.

The funding system is devised to provide funding equalization among school districts, he said.

When someone asked how the effectiveness of schools is measured, Hein replied that students are tested regularly.

The state education office doesn't release the test information on all the districts because it doesn't want the scores used to compare school districts, he said. "The scores are used to measure how the whole state is doing."

However, the test scores are pub-

lic information and you have public access in the school districts," Hein said.

He also said the scores were averages, which don't tell the whole story.

What the Twin Falls School District did with the money was the subject of a presentation by Dr. Keith Tolzin, assistant superintendent.

"We are considered to be one of the poor districts," Tolzin said. Starting salary for teachers in the district is about \$14,400 a year, while Blaine County pays over \$17,000.

Tolzin discussed the size — about

6,600 students — and scope — nine schools of the district.

The dropout rate in the district was about 10 percent, lower than the national and Idaho rate of 20 percent, he reported.

Compared to 40 years ago, the district is facing a whole new crop of problems and challenges, such as drug abuse, teenage pregnancies and "at-risk" children, Tolzin said.

"The district has already formed a substance abuse council," he said. The district approach to student drug is positive instead of "kicking them out of school."

 "I started to slip. By the time I was in tenth grade, I started getting into serious drugs — cocaine, crack and acid — and I decided not to go to school anymore," he said.
 Michael dropped out and started selling drugs. Eventually, in March of this year, he was placed in a three-week rehabilitation program in Long Beach.
 Michael said he didn't initially benefit from the program because his energies were spent resisting the various rehabilitation measures.
 "After about two-and-a-half weeks, I started going with the program," Michael said. "After that, things started to get pretty good."
 He added, "I didn't think I had a drug problem. Most people don't think they have a drug problem until they start talking to you (rehabilitation counselors)."

Michael drew a rather exotic picture of life as a student growing up in Los Angeles. He said his high school had approximately 1,000 students, about 100 of whom sold drugs.
 "The most successful dealers drove used BMWs and had beepers on their belts to alert them of incoming sales requests," he said.
 "That's the only reason why people go into it," Michael said. "They see how much money the other people are making."
 When asked by a council member how parents can prevent their children from abusing drugs, Michael replied, "You have to talk to them before they get into it. If they're younger, then you can scare them."
 Michael warned, however, that scare tactics may instead backfire if parents wait too long to discuss drug use with their children. In Los Angeles, many children start taking drugs in sixth grade and may thereafter be immune to such an approach, he said.
 Michael also briefly touched upon the elements which make for a successful rehabilitation program. He said a program must go beyond simply breaking an addiction; instead, it must offer extra steps of demonstrating positive alternatives to drug use.
 "You have to show the kids that they can have fun without getting high," he said.
 As for his brief stint in the Magic Valley, Michael said the great percentage of drug abuse in his high school is confined to alcohol. Some students do smoke marijuana, but he said the greatest problem is the standard "drinking and driving."
 "You can't really say, 'Don't drink,'" Michael said. "But at least you can make them realize that if you drink, don't drive."

 "They're doing it with your seeds," Miller chided his audience. "It's crazy."
 There are approximately 12,000 acres of dill being grown in Idaho, and lesser amounts of spearmint, peppermint, caraway and other herbs. But the vast majority of those herbs are imported to the United States from Bulgaria, Miller said, and it could be coming from Idaho.
 Aspen leaf, willow bark, and straw-leaves leaves used in making aprin are mostly being harvested. These too could be imported here.

Start growing these crops, Miller said, "and soon you'll be selling your own seeds."
 New markets for old crops can also be profitable however. Miller is looking into marketing a mix of sorghum and barley to make Indian food.
 Miller did not limit his discussion merely to what to grow. He laid out a plan for getting started. First the college or the area Ag Extension Service should do a complete inventory of the natural resources available, including the noxious weeds. He also recommended two books:

"Weeds of Idaho," put out by Ag Extension, and "Herbs," a how-to-marketing books — Miller wrote himself.
 "Everything is marketable," he insisted.
 Second, a comparative study of crops grown around the world in climates similar to the Magic Valley should be made. A librarian could do that in about five days, he said.
 Then test acres should be planted. Miller guaranteed he can get USDA grants for those projects. And he can help market crops that prove feasible.
 "I think you could do amazing things here," he said. "Four hundred farms could be testing 400 different experimental crops."
 Miller said he would be happy to help anyone with as few as two acres get started. He can be reached through Rick Ritter, director of Project Enterprise, a quasi-government agency in Boise.

 state statutes.
 The lack of such formal training in Idaho can and has posed difficulties, Giles said.
 "As an example, a couple of people in our region don't show the (probation) reports to the parents, to the family," he said. "Instead, it just goes directly to the judge."
 "I believe that's unethical, because you're not showing the report to the people who it concerns, but that's probably just due to a lack of training," he said.
 Giles added that training is also required for other tasks confronting a juvenile probation officer, such as performing evaluations on such matters as substance abuse and sexual abuse.
 The questionnaire also touched on numerous other subjects, including salary figures and the amount of stress involved.

According to Giles, 66 percent of the respondents described their job as being "very stressful." The average caseload maintained by each respondent was 32, he said.
 Furthermore, 11 percent of the respondents said they held additional jobs to supplement their income.
 The officers' annual pay ranges from \$2,000 to \$38,000, Giles said, adding that the average salary is \$1,700 a month. Giles placed a footnote by those figures, however, describing them as "skewed" because they incorporate the \$58,000 salary made by Jim Tallmon of Ada County.
 Giles said Tallmon is the administrator in charge of the probation officers and detention facilities in Boise, and is therefore not representative of the probation officers generally. He said he plans to remove Tallmon's salary from the tabulations to arrive at more accurate results.
 The survey also showed that three of the respondents carry a weapon and that five are deputized officers.
 Giles said Tony Walsh, a professor of criminology at Boise State University, is planning to help with the study's data analysis.

High court says evidence gained from bloodhounds valid

BOISE (AP) — In a unanimous, precedent-setting decision, the Idaho Supreme Court says evidence obtained through the use of bloodhounds may be used in criminal cases.

But the court said Thursday strict guidelines must be used to lay proper foundation for the evidence. It may not be used alone to convict a criminal but can be used only for corroboration, the court ruled.

The Supreme Court voted 4-0 to uphold the burglary conviction of Nick Streep in a Jefferson County case. Justice Charles Davidson, who died of a heart attack Oct. 9, participated in oral arguments in

the case but did not take part in the final decision before his death. Streep was convicted of breaking into a Kura-Seed mill two years ago. Police testified the "Rebel" bloodhounds in a recent trial separately led officers to Streep's house, where a crowbar and flashlight were found and the man was arrested.

Streep's appeal argued that there was no "probable cause" to lead officers to his residence and evidence obtained through the use of tracking dogs should not be allowed.

Justice Stephen Blatline, who wrote the decision, noted that in 30

states, the use of such evidence is allowed, if the proper foundation is laid. In five states, it cannot be used under any circumstance. In two states, the issue has been raised but not decided, and in the other 13 states, including Idaho, the issue never has been raised before.

Streep's appeal argued that his constitutional rights were violated, because the dogs could not be cross-examined.

"This argument, however, is based on the fallacious premise that the dog is the witness, where in actuality, it is the dog's handler, who testifies, explaining the bloodhound's conduct to the jury,"

Blatline wrote. As it did in a case involving the use of testimony from a witness who had been hypnotized, the court laid down guidelines for a judge to consider before deciding whether to admit evidence produced by a bloodhound.

The prosecution must show the dog possesses "an acute power of scent determination," the dog was trained to track humans and could do so with a high degree of accuracy; the handler is qualified and experienced; the trail had not become stale or contaminated beyond the dog's ability to follow and the dog was placed on trail at a loca-

tion where the alleged participant in crime was known to have been.

Blatline noted that "Rebel" was trained to track only humans; had been used in about 60 cases and had a success rate of 80 percent. "Bonnie" had been used in over 100 cases with a success rate of 76 percent.

In another decision released Thursday, the Idaho Court of Appeals ordered new court proceedings in a petition for post-conviction relief filed by Lee Maurer Hays. He was sentenced to life imprisonment after pleading guilty to four counts of lewd and lascivious conduct.

Board members develop 'pre-legislative jitters'

Clash looms over who controls rules

BOISE (AP) — Members of the state Health and Welfare Board are launching out at Idaho lawmakers in what one called "pre-legislative jitters" over the expected campaign to firmly restore legislative control over administrative rules and regulations.

The pattern of the Legislature for the last 10 years has been to erode the power of the board, and I don't think they know what they're doing," said Dr. Fred Marienau of Sae point, the most outspoken of the board members on the issue.

"My confidence in the Legislature is such that they don't do any better on this (administrative rules) than on anything else they do," Marienau said Thursday, charging that lawmakers wait until the final days of a session to pass scores of bills "none of which they understand."

At the heart of Marienau's

comments, which were endorsed by other members through the use of a recent state Supreme Court ruling followed by an attorney general's opinion, which indicates that the current system for allowing legislative veto of administrative rules is unconstitutional.

Some legislative leaders have already said unquestionable restoration of that power will be a major issue in the session that starts next month, and Deputy Attorney General Michael D'Angelo told the board he believed "the Legislature is looking for a way to get around that particular issue of separation of powers."

The board, whose administrative actions particularly on environmental matters have been the main target of legislative review, took no action to formalize a position on the question. But member Russell

Webb of Idaho Falls said the board should feel comfortable taking a firm stand in support of the current system allowing it and other executive-branch boards to issue regulations implementing the policies of laws passed by the Legislature.

"There's public input, there's hearings," Webb said. "It's not just something worked out in a back room. ... This is a good process."

Marienau was even firmer in his stand, contending the Legislature had neither the time nor the expertise to fashion the kinds of complex regulations many laws require.

Lawmakers, especially the more conservative ones, have campaigned for years to gain power over what they have labeled as unstrained bureaucratic decisions that all too often negatively affect the lives of their constituents.

But Marienau, citing the three-

year odyssey the state went through to resolve problems created when lawmakers took control of just one water-quality issue several years ago, said the concern being expressed by some legislators does not reflect the majority feeling.

"They're responding to just two or three of their friends," he said. "They're not talking about 3,000 voters in their districts. ... I wonder if this concern that some of the legislators have about these rules, if the rest of the legislators are concerned about that. Is it just some of the leaders who fear their power will be eroded?"

Donovan appeared to be agreeing recent statements by members of a special legislative committee redrafting juvenile delinquency laws that their proposals have overwhelming support. He said no one in the Health and Welfare Department, which oversees juvenile programs, has been contacted about the proposal.

"We get in a situation where people hear what they want to hear and pick the people they want to hear it from ... and then portray that as the all-encompassing opinion of the people of the state of Idaho."

Stallings wants Pocatello hearing, longer SIS project comment time

POCATELLO (AP) — Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, has urged the U.S. Department of Energy to schedule a Pocatello hearing on the Special Isotope Separation project, and to double the public comment period to 90 days.

Stallings met on Wednesday with Donald Ote, the department's Idaho operations manager, to ask that a Pocatello hearing on the SIS be added to a schedule that already included hearings in Idaho Falls, Twin Falls and Boise.

"A hearing is necessary to ensure that citizens who live in the area have an opportunity to express their feelings," Stallings said in a letter to Ote released by the Rexburg congressman's office on Thursday.

"He also told Ote he wanted to reaffirm my support for a 90-day public comment period. This extension would allow all interested Idahoans sufficient time to review and comment on the draft environmental impact statement."

A spokeswoman for the congress-

man said Ote "seemed receptive" to the idea of scheduling a Pocatello hearing on the \$852 million project, which would use lasers to refine fuel-grade plutonium-for-use-in-nuclear weapons.

The SIS would be constructed at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory. Environmental and peace groups oppose the plan, and have led a movement to get a Pocatello hearing added to the schedule.

Stallings' spokeswoman emphasized that while the congressman is working for an added hearing on the SIS, he still strongly supports the project.

Clayton Nichols, SIS project manager, said Thursday that he had not been in contact with Ote since his meeting with Stallings and that he did not know if DOE has changed its position against a Pocatello hearing.

"Our basic position was that we'll listen to input from the public and elected representatives, and we try to be responsive and weigh all the

various considerations; and such," Nichols said. "Hopefully, we'll reach a decision on that fairly soon."

Nichols said DOE officials are still hoping to release their draft environmental impact statement on the SIS in late December or early January. The public hearings would be set for late January or early February, with a 45-day period set for public comment on the EIS.

Crews clear derailment

MINIDOKA — An 11-car derailment in the railroad yards at Minidoka was largely cleared away Thursday as Union Pacific inspectors began preparing damage estimates.

Minidoka County Sheriff Ray Jarvis said the 30,000 gallon tank car carrying anhydrous ammonia tipped over but did not spill any of its contents. The ammonia, a fertilizer product, was drained from the tank car and put into trucks for transport to its destination, Jarvis said.

There was no hazardous material problem, and the only spill at the site was the fluid from two transformers that fell when the pole they were mounted on broke when it was struck by the tank car, the sheriff explained.

Dike Monson, Idaho Power maintenance officer in Twin Falls, said the two small transformers on the pole contained a mineral oil substance which is used for insulation and cooling purposes.

New trade report sets stocks back

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market suffered a broad setback Thursday, reversing its recent advance in the face of another unpleasant surprise concerning the nation's trade deficit.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial, down about 50 points in early trading and up about 10 at 10:05 a.m., closed with a loss of 47, 1,855.44.

The average had risen 135.78 points in the week's first three trading days. Declining issues outnumbered advances by more than 2 to 1 among New York Stock Exchange-listed issues.

Big Board volume totaled 188.96 million shares, against 231.43 million in the previous session.

Before the market opened, the Commerce Department reported that the U.S. trade deficit swelled to \$17.63 billion in October.

Advance estimates on Wall Street had been for only a modest increase in the deficit from September, when imports exceeded exports by \$14.05 billion.

Concern over world trade imbalances has been cited as a primary force behind the stock market's steep decline since last summer.

Still, analysts said the market didn't seem to take the latest report as seriously as the degree of gloom that it showed on previous occasions this year when the deficit figures came in higher than expected.

As measured by Wilshire Associates' index of more than 5,000 actively traded stocks, the market lost

\$38.43 billion, or 1.66 percent, in value.

The NYSE's composite index of all 1,413 listed common stocks dropped 2.49 to 131.07.

Nationwide turnover in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 215.6 million shares.

Standard & Poor's index of 400 industrial and financial stocks was down 5.32 to 233.57.

The NASDAQ composite index for the over-the-counter market dropped 1.74 to 300.81. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index closed at 241.04, down

Point-plus losers among the blue chips included International Business Machines, down 3 1/4 at 141; American Telephone & Telegraph, down 1 1/4 at 27 1/4; General Electric, down 1 1/4 at 42 3/4; Eastman Kodak, down 1 1/4 at 46 1/4; and Ford Motor, down 2 1/4 at 59 1/4.

Point-plus metals stocks chalked up some of the day's best gains as the price of gold for December delivery climbed \$7.80 to \$492.30, an ounce on the Commodity Exchange in New York.

ASA Ltd. rose 2 1/4 to 52 1/4; Battle Mountain 3 1/4 to 20 1/4; Hecla Mining 1 1/4 to 15 3/4; and Sunshine Mining 1 1/4 to 4 1/4.

TW Services jumped 2 1/4 to 15. An investor group led by Ronald Perleman sought regulatory clearance to increase its holdings of TW stock and said it might consider a move to gain control of the company.

TWIN FALLS - Winning the K and T Steel Tournament has never been an easy chore for College of Southern Idaho.

At one time the Eagles lost three straight years and over the last 10 years of its existence was no better than even.

That's the kind of history CSI Coach Fred Trenkle worries about as he and his Eagles prepare for tonight's opener against the BYU jayvees.



That clash will be preceded by a 7 p.m. meeting between Central Florida and Central Wyoming. The CSI-BYU game should start about 9 p.m.

The competition isn't a pure tournament situation in that the second-night pairings of BYU-Central Wyoming and CSI-Central Florida will be honored regardless of the opening night's results.

When the K and T is over, CSI faces one last pre-holiday trip to Ogden to meet the Weber State jayvees who are impressed by ripping Colorado Northwestern 99-80 Tuesday night.

BYU will bring one of the tallest teams even in the CSI gymnasium with three men - Mark Cassen, Dan Wolf and Gary Trost, all listed at 6-9. Vince Bryan is 6-7 and the young Coygars have Chris Lynch, Mike Herring and Mark Tuttle all at 6-5. The guards will come from 6-7 senior Mike Benson, 6-1 frosh Brent Jacobson or Matt McClary.

"This is kind of one of those good news, bad news situations again," said Trenkle. "The good news is this will be their first game. The bad news is, I remember going down there last year for about their 16th game and just getting away with the victory."

"I've been told that this BYU jayvee bunch had the potential to be the best in a long time. I think they have six scholarship players on the roster and they also recruit quality players," he said.

TWIN FALLS - It apparently doesn't get any easier for the young Twin Falls Bruins as they grid for their second weekend in Gem State Conference competition.

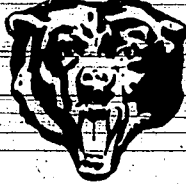

Top skiers' amateur status restored by Olympic committee

LAUSANNE, Switzerland (AP) - Two of the biggest names in Alpine skiing were given the final approval Thursday to compete in next year's Olympics, while a panel was set up to study possible penalties against countries that boycott the Games.

Skiers Ingemar Stenmark and Marc Girardelli were among 10 athletes cleared to compete by the International Olympic Committee's executive board. The IOC said the cases of eight other athletes were pending until further documents were received.

Opening a two-day meeting at the IOC's headquarters, the board also said 35 far IOC nations had accepted invitations to send teams to Seoul for the Summer Games. No responses have been received from

East bloc countries, it added.

After hearing from the head of the IOC's eligibility commission, Willi Daume of West Germany, the board agreed to allow the 17 athletes to regain eligibility for the upcoming Winter and Summer Games.

Stenmark, the winningest Alpine skier of all time, was reinstated for Sweden after being barred from the last Winter Games following his declaration as a professional.

The other cases all involved athletes who had switched countries after previously competing under other flags. Girardelli had been a member of the Austrian ski team but has skied for Luxembourg for several seasons.

Left undecided, however, was the

case of Naim Suleymanoglu, a former world-champion weightlifter in the 150-pound class, who defected from Bulgaria to Turkey last year.

The pending list also included one American, luger Miroslav Zajonc.

Notation could be taken on these other cases until further documents were received, the IOC spokeswoman, Michele Verdier, said.

On Turkey's request for eligibility for Suleymanoglu, Verdier said, no action would be taken until Bulgarian Olympic officials replied to requests for information.

Others on the approved eligibility list were yachting competitors Leslie Jean Egnot and Jennifer Marie Egnot of New Zealand, and Roy

Heinen of the Netherlands; table tennis players Wang Xiao Ming of France, and Olga Nemes and Zsolt Georg Bohm of West Germany; fencer Stephane Michel Ganneff of the Netherlands; and gymnast Nicoletta Dessena of Switzerland.

The pending list included Zajonc; Suleymanoglu; ice hockey player Vern Mott of Norway; bobsledder David Tomatis of Monaco; wrestler Ralf Viditz of West Germany; swimmer Robert Clavin of the Netherlands; and table tennis player Ding Yi of Austria.

The working group on boycott penalties will focus on nations that accept invitations to compete in the Games and then announce they are staying away.

Invitations to the Seoul Games were sent to all 167 IOC member nations Sept. 17, one year before the opening ceremonies are scheduled. National Olympic committees have until Jan. 17 to respond.

Sources, speaking on the condition of anonymity, said the group's report probably would be ready for the board when it meets in Calgary prior to the Winter Games next February.

The Olympic Charter, the IOC's bylaws, does not provide any penalties for boycotting countries.

Labor board finds NFL players guilty of picket line violence

WASHINGTON (AP) - The nation's top labor law enforcer on Thursday approved a federal complaint charging that NFL players union illegally used violence and threats of violence during its 24-day strike.

After a two-month investigation, Rosemary M. Collyer, general counsel of the National Labor Relations Board, authorized the complaint alleging that the players association was responsible for "picket line misconduct" in six cities.

"The evidence was sufficient to establish that misconduct, including threats and other hostile acts, occurred," Collyer said.

Among them, she said, were instances in which striking players or members of other unions supporting them waved shotguns, threw eggs, spit on fans and tried to block both fans and strikebreakers from entering stadiums.



Any union that establishes a picket line is accountable for violence that occurs on it, Collyer said. "She also said the NFLPA took no 'meaningful steps' immediately to halt the misconduct.

The cities where the alleged labor law violations occurred were listed in the complaint as Kansas City, Houston, Cincinnati, Denver, Washington and Philadelphia.

Collyer said there was insufficient evidence to conclude there were threats or coercion in connection with alleged picket-line incidents in Miami, Los Angeles and Indianapolis.

Dave Parker, an NLRB spokesman, said the agency will likely issue the complaint next week, unless the players association settles it before then with the NFL Management Council, which is the club owners' labor relations arm, and the National Right to Work Defense Fund.

The council and the right to work group sought the complaint when the union launched its ill-fated strike earlier in September.

Parker said the complaint includes a cease-and-desist order directing the union to quit trying to stop the replacement players from working. No monetary penalties or damages are sought, he said.

Noting that the strike ended in mid-October, both sides said they expected the charges to be settled before the formal complaint is filed.

"All we're asking is that the NFLPA make an official statement withdrawing threats made against replacement players and fire attending games," said Marty Kaufmann, a spokesman for the right to work group.

Tim English, an attorney for the union, said such a statement is the usual remedy.

"We're confident that the case will be settled before there is any litigation," English said. "Each one of the incidents involved were relatively minor and they all occurred in the first few days of picketing or the first time there were games at the stadiums. The public record will show that we got them under control early and that they did not continue."

Last week, Collyer's office also approved issuing a complaint that could require the owners to pay more than \$20 million in wages and incentives to the striking players.

The union representatives wages and incentives the players lost when they were barred by the owners from playing the Oct. 18-19 week after ending their strike.

That complaint has not been issued by the agency yet, although NLRB officials said they expect it any day now.

Among the alleged incidents in the complaint approved Thursday were:

Houston - Picketets forcibly blocked an entrance to the Oilers facility and a videotape showed individuals throwing eggs.

Cincinnati - Two striking players put scratches on two cars entering the Bengals practice facility.

Denver - About 180 people, including the team's player representative, other striking players and members of the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers Union physically blocked individuals entering and leaving the Broncos' ticket office.

Washington - Various striking players blocked a bus carrying strikebreakers from entering Red

Philadelphia - A videotape showed two striking Eagles players used a truck to block a bus carrying replacement players from entering a hotel where they were housed; incidents of egg throwing, shouting and spitting on fans arising from an Oct. 4 game during a three-hour demonstration outside Veterans Stadium that included 8,000 pickets, including NFLPA members.

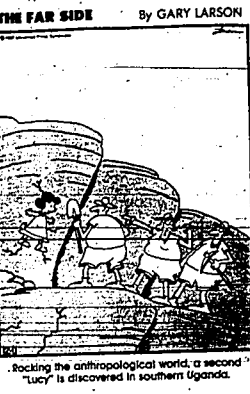

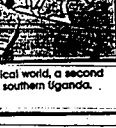

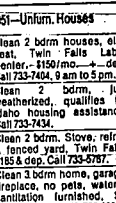

Henson muppet creations gather for special Christmas adventures

The boardroom is long and dignified, filled with an imposing oak table, high-backed chairs, Persian rugs. An oil portrait hangs at one end of the room surrounded by a heavy gold frame. Who is it? Chairman of the board? CEO? President of the company? No, it's... Kermit the Frog!

This is the "Muppet Mansion" in New York City, home of the Muppets, Fraggles and other famed creations of a bemused Jim Henson, who sits among English tea sets, Fozzie Bear telephones, antique lamps and Big Bird coffee mugs.

Henson talks animatedly about his creatures and their upcoming Christmas special — "A Muppet Family Christmas," airing Wednesday, Dec. 16 on ABC. "It's the first time that all the gang will be together," he says fondly. The voice rings ever so faintly of Kermit, the creature that Henson invented decades ago and has given voice to ever since. "Many of the creatures were together for the 30th anniversary show, but this is everyone — Muppet Babies, Fraggles, the works. I liked the idea that I could get everyone together."

Henson retains a balanced mixture of levity and seriousness. His work includes "The Muppet Show" (1976-81), a popular syndicated show consisting of frenetic skits

that boasted big-name guest stars like Steve Martin; a series of Muppet movies; the theatrical release "Labyrinth" (1986), the critically acclaimed "Storyteller" series for NBC, and the creation of original characters like Ernie and Bert on "Sesame Street." "I'm still closest to the original Muppet characters," Henson admits. "I love Ernie and Bert."

It was no problem creating a story that would get the entire Henson crew together for the Christmas special: They decide to visit Fozzie Bear's mother for Christmas, despite the fact that her plans don't include a houseful of Muppets. Will the Christmas spirit prevail? Will the Cookie Monster hit it off with Boozer Fraggle? Well, here's a sneak preview: The Swedish Chef comes quite close to popping Big Bird in the oven for Christmas dinner. The Muppet Babies turn up in old home movies. Kermit wanders down a Fraggie hole. Miss Piggy fights her way through a blizzard. And Henson himself even turns up in a — shh! — surprise visit.


Many of Henson's creations have a slightly dark and magic edge. And that is what separates characters like Oscar the Grouch ("Garbage is my life") from traditional sugar-coated children's fare. The Muppets exhibit virtues like good sportsmanship and cooperation, but they don't hesitate to make fun of each other, engage in word-play and puns, and act in a frantic manner.

"We do material that we enjoy ourselves," Henson says. "We all have a child in us. And that quality of sugar-coating is not true — it creates a narrow, shallow image."

Henson's current position as muppetmeister evolved slowly. "Early on, I thought I wanted to direct movies.

Bogged down in beautiful kid stories, "Y & R" gets its act together by relying on the show's grownups.

This time, it's Jeanne's Mrs. Chancellor about to feed on another male, con man Rex (Quinn Redeker).

Since the soap began, the men in Kay's life could fill the animal pit of Rome's Coliseum. There are no stayers when you take on the imperious Mrs. C.

It's different with women. As played by Brenda Dickson, Jill Abbott thrives on scuffles with Kay. 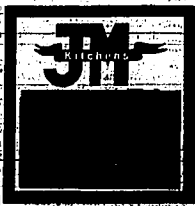



"Hallmark Hall of Fame" presents touching tale of family and values

NEW YORK (AP) — Viewers are about to be besieged by family-oriented television movies for the holidays, but the TV movie event of the month has nothing to do with Christmas and is a fine reason to gather the family together around the set.

It's the "Hallmark Hall of Fame" presentation of "Foxfire," starring the esteemed stage actors, husband and wife Hume Cronyn and Jessica Tandy, and it's on this Sunday on CBS.

Based on the play by the same name by Susan Cooper and Cronyn — they also collaborated on the play, and Emmy-winning TV movie "The Dollmaker" starring Jane Fonda — "Foxfire" is the story of a couple who have scratched out a living on a piece of farmland in the beautiful Blue Ridge Mountains, now crawling with vacationers and land developers.

Cronyn plays stubborn, Bible-quoting Hector Nations. He has a right to be crotchety. He's been dead for five years. His wife, Annie (Tandy), has conjured up his image to keep her company now that her children are gone.

Of the five, two died and the other three drifted away. She only maintains regular contact with one of them, Dillard, a moderately successful country-western singer in the throes of divorce and with two young children. He is played, with unusual reality by John Denver.

Dillard comes home for a concert and stops off to plead again with his aged mother that she give up the farm and move to Florida with him. He bumps consciousnesses with Holly, a hometown girl who stayed to teach school instead of taking the usual route to Atlanta that most of the young 'uns have.

After setting up what looks like a predictable tale, the story reaffirms the deepest of values of life and family in an unexpected way.

"Foxfire" comes from the name of a glow-in-the-dark kind of lichen that grows on dead trees in the Appalachian forests, and also the

name of a magazine in which young people record the remembrances and folkways of their Appalachian elders. A story in the magazine inspired Cronyn and Cooper to write the play, which had a successful run on Broadway.

The story of Annie and Hector's lives on the mountain is told in flashbacks, but with the actors remaining in their current incarnation, no younger stunts or makeup jobs.

The movie was directed by Jud Taylor, who was nominated for an Emmy in 1977 for "Tail-Gunner Joe," a TV movie based on the life of Sen. Joseph McCarthy. His direction of "Foxfire" is sometimes reminiscent of Peter Weir's "Witness."

There are some delightful moments in "Foxfire" like when the real estate man, played by Gary Grubbe, comes up the hill to the farm to try to talk Annie into selling

out. Oblivious to his shock, she slaps a huge hog-head onto the table, then sweetly asks him to help her gouge the eyes out of it.

Holly drives Annie to the nearby town to catch Dillard and his band, a nice bit of concert footage with Denver and a hot country combo complete with fiddler. Members of the audience even get up and clog dance in the aisles. But Holly is turned off by Dillard's corn-pone act only hours after he ridiculed her for not getting the heck out of the hills. "I guess I'm just a hillbilly boy at heart," he shouts to the whooping audience. Holly looks to the side and mutters, "Oh, please."

Later, in one of her conversations with the ghost of Hector, Annie ponders whether to stay or go with her son. "It's all easy for you now," she tells her dead husband.

"Well," he says, "there's nothing like daylight between the ribs to clear a man's mind."

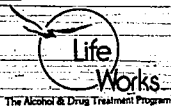

Warner sheds his 'Theo' persona to portray homeless kid on NBC

NEW YORK — When Malcolm-Jamal Warner started acting, he had trouble landing roles because he didn't look "street" enough for most of the movie and television roles available to black teen-age boys.

Then came "The Cosby Show" and stardom for Warner as son Theo Huxtable.

In "The Father Clements Story," Sunday on NBC, Warner hopes to break out of the clean-cut Theo image a bit with his role as Joey, the homeless street kid adopted by Father George Clements, a black Roman Catholic priest who wanted to set an example for his parishioners and encourage them to also adopt the homeless black children in their midst.

"I'm trying to break the stereotypical role now of the Theo-type character, because in my post-'Cosby' life, as I call it, I don't want to be known as just the kind of guy who can play a Theo Huxtable-type character," Warner said in a telephone interview from his home in Brooklyn. "I want to be known as being able to do more things, being able to stretch. For me that was the most important thing."

Louie Gossett Jr. plays Clements. Warner responded with typical teen-age enthusiasm when asked what it was like working with the Oscar-winning actor — "It was cool."

Joey was 13 when Clements adopted him, but Warner, 17, plays him older. The movie was shot on location in Chicago, where Warner met the real Joey Clements. What was it like hanging around with the character he plays in the movie? "It was cool."

"When I was hanging out with Joey Clements in Chicago, I made it a point not to try to emulate him," Warner said. "I wanted basically to create my own character. I didn't want him to think I was hanging out with him solely to use him as research."

"And I also went back to acting classes for a couple of weeks before I went out to Chicago, because it

had been a while since I had done something serious and I wanted to just dip my feet in it."

It's hard to imagine a kid Warner's age with so much success sounding so well-grounded. "I always think," he says, "tomorrow it can all be over with."

"Fine, I'm on 'The Cosby Show,'" he said. "Fine, right now it seems I have a successful career, but this isn't success yet because I'm on a series now, but what happens five, seven years down the line, that's the time when you sit down and even contemplate measuring success."

He already has an interest in directing and hopes to emulate the career of Ron Howard, who started as a child actor on "The Andy Griffith Show" and became a successful director of such movies as "Splash" and "Cocoon."



"Directing just seemed to appeal to me more than anything" right now," Warner said. "Because I know acting may be there. It may not, after 'The Cosby Show.' Even if it is, I still want to get into directing."

Warner makes anti-drug speeches at schools and helps raise money for good causes like children's hospitals. But he takes his image as a teen role model in stride, too.

"I didn't go into acting because I wanted to be a role model," he said. "The role-model job inevitably came along with the success of the show. I'm not really bothered by it that much, because I don't have to go out of my way to live my life a certain way that's consistent with the role model. I just live my life the way I do."

'The Oldest Rookie' lets Sorvino snugly fit into his cop character

LOS ANGELES — Paul Sorvino, the overweight TV detective, is stepping gingerly across a horse exercise yard looking for a horseshoe.

He and his partner, Tony, played by D.W. Moffett, are filming an episode of CBS' "The Oldest Rookie" at the Griffith Park Equestrian Center.

"The victim was killed in a horse stall and we're trying to figure out what the weapon was," says Sorvino, who stars as Ike Porter, a former desk-bound deputy chief who wanted to get back on the street.

"We're beginning to think it's a horseshoe, so we start looking around to see where the murderer might have thrown it to get rid of it."

The episode concerns Ike and Tony's pursuit of a murder suspect who has been set free on a technicality. The rookie partners are being supervised on the case by two veteran female detectives, one of whom is kidnapped by the killer.

"It's us overcoming our own inexperience and saving one of the ladies," says Sorvino, who jokingly calls the episode "Ike and Tony Meet Cagney and Lacey," referring to the popular CBS series about two female detectives.

Sorvino's new Wednesday night series keeps the 48-year-old actor on the run, since most of it is filmed on location. It's his third TV series, the second with a police theme.

On a break following the yard scene, Sorvino says he wasn't looking to do another series because "quality control is impossible. The grinding schedule vitiates the good work, and good work is very important to me."

But Sorvino says he decided to do "The Oldest Rookie" because he identifies with his character Ike.

"Most men my age are doing things they don't want to do," he said. "After 26 years of being a polished executive he (Ike) feels he's missed youthful opportunities for adventure. My character is seeking the hero in himself."

The 257-pound Sorvino admits that the stunts and physical demands of the show are tough, but says he's getting by.

"I'm not doing too badly," he says.

"It requires me to stay in good physical condition, although Ike's had a few too many dinners. He can run and jump. People I play tennis with say if only I'd started earlier. That's a fantasy of mine."

Sorvino believes "The Oldest Rookie" has strong stories that appeal to both younger and middle-age men. "The character's what grabbed me," he says. "The concept's sound, but the character's irresistible."

Prior to accepting the series, Sorvino was working at his theater in Teaneck, N.J. He is artistic director at nearby Fairleigh Dickinson University. He directed four recent plays, including "All the Kings Men," in which he played Willie Stark, and "The Diary of Anne Frank," starring his daughter Amanda. His daughter Mira was in another play.

"I'd like to go back and do Willie Stark again and get it really right," he says. "I didn't have enough time to prepare right. I don't have much time between my opera singing and writing and the rest of it."

Sorvino has studied opera the past 3½ years. He sang professionally in Seattle six years ago.

"I'm about to start my singing again," he says. "I've had a number of opportunities, but I don't want to talk about it until I can prove it. But the operatic world knows of me, my voice, and my ambition and is

waiting to see if I can do it. I'm waiting to see, too."

He has written one book, on asthma, and is now preparing to write one called "Everything To Lose."

"I realize I'm talking about it the way Truman Capote used to talk about 'Answered Prayers,'" he says. "If I do it, it will be an answered prayer. It will be about the psychological aspects of losing weight. This is about training the mind. But first I have to lose weight myself."

Sorvino, who stands 6-foot-3, wants to get down to about 200 pounds. He has been up to 270 pounds. "But I've never just been hanging around and eating," he says. "I've always worked out, played tennis, done exercises and lifted weights. I can play 2½ hours of singles. I can go 14 hours a day on this show running and jumping. I'm not in bad shape, just overweight."

Sorvino was born in Brooklyn, lived in California and Oklahoma, then returned to Brooklyn when his mother and father separated. He grew up wanting to be an actor and a singer. He got his first job at 16 at a nightclub in the "Italian Catekills," singing eight songs a night for \$25 a week and room and board. Later, at a Jewish resort, he got \$50 a week as master of ceremonies and social director.

New apartheid series on PBS' "Frontline"

WASHINGTON (Wash. Post) — The PBS series "Frontline" announced Thursday a five-part, five-hour special series on "The History of Apartheid in South Africa," which begins with a two-hour special on Monday, Dec. 14, with two hours the next night and a one-hour conclusion Wednesday, Dec. 16.

The last hour will be devoted to a rare film of the meeting between South African government representatives and the outlawed African National Congress that was held earlier this year.

The program traces the 400-year history of apartheid in South Africa.

The Senate Judiciary Committee approved a bill that would allow members of the TV industry, including the networks, to work together to curb violence on the tube that may affect young viewers.

Sponsored by Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., the Television Violence Act would exempt members of the TV industry from antitrust laws for 36 months so they can "discuss, develop and implement their own

voluntary standards on TV violence." In the past, the TV industry has claimed that uncertainty about its liability under antitrust statutes prevents it from taking joint action. Hearings earlier this year before the Senate antitrust subcommittee heard evidence that excessive TV violence can incite overly aggressive behavior in children and harm their mental health.

Simon's office predicted action by the Senate in early January.

Hold the sleight "The All-Star Party for Joan Collins" on CBS Dec. 2 drew a 10.4 national Nielsen rating and a 17 percent audience share (each rating point represents 886,000 TV homes).

"Entertainment Tonight's" Mary Hart will fill in for vacationing Joan Lunden as coanchor of "Good Morning America" the week of Dec. 21. GMA correspondent Steve Fox will fill in for vacationing Charles Gibson the week of the 14th.

Speaking, as we are, however indirectly, of the morning network

race, the "Today" show's visit to Our Boys and Girls Overseas Thanksgiving Week may have had something to do with it, but for the second week in a row the NBC program finished on top with a 4.6 Nielsen rating and a 22 share.

ABC's "Good Morning America" was second at 4.0-18, while the final week of "The Morning Program" on CBS registered a 2.0-10.

According to the very shaky staff of the Airwaves Research Department (the coal truck will be here Monday, chaps. Honest.) "The Morning Program" averaged a 2.3-11 during the 46 weeks of its existence.

Marlene Sanders is the new host of the PBS series "Currents." The longtime CBS correspondent, one of the victims of the network's cost-cutting purges, is a 32-year veteran of broadcasting. She has just finished a book about women in the early days of TV called "Waiting for Prime Time: The Women of TV News."

Nielsen Ratings

"Cosby Show" back in heavy news week

NEW YORK (AP) — "The Cosby Show" rebounded into first place, albeit tied with its spinoff, "A Different World," and NBC was first in the ratings despite a lot of prime-time news pre-emptions last week.

Two of the prime-time news shows — the one-hour "A Conversation with Mikhail S. Gorbachev" on Monday and the half-hour, four-network interview with President Reagan on Thursday — weren't included in the ratings because they weren't sponsored.

The two-hour "America's Future — A Presidential Debate" on Tuesday was sponsored and ranked 58th out of 70 programs.

CBS and ABC also had prime-time, sponsored news specials last week that counted in the ratings. CBS' "Children of Apartheid" with Walter Cronkite on Saturday had a rating of 5.2 and was the second lowest rated show of the week.

ABC's "The Jennings-Koppel Report" on Sunday, on the summit between Reagan and Soviet leader

Gorbachev, had a rating of 6.4 and ranked 67th, just below "West 57th," CBS' Saturday night newsmagazine, with a 6.9.

The good news for ABC was the performance of "20-20," which beat "Falcon Crest" on Friday and won the time period. The show was moved this season from Thursday where it had been doing well in the ratings.

All three NBC news specials prominently featured anchor Tom Brokaw, and "NBC Nightly News" rose to a tie for second with ABC's "World News Tonight," with a rating of 11.0 and a 19 share. "Nightly" had been in third. "CBS Evening News" stretched its win streak to all 11 weeks of the season so far with a rating of 11.2 and a 21 share.

The rating is a percentage of the nation's 88.6 million households with televisions. The share is a percentage of the audience that is viewing during a particular time period.

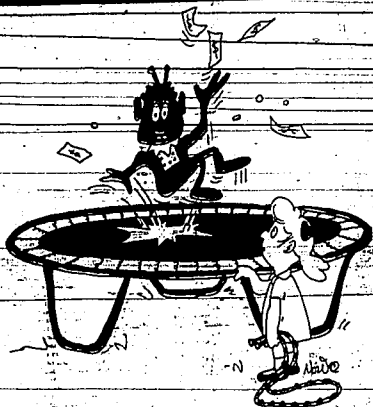
NBC won the week ending Dec. 6 with an average, prime-time rating

of 15.3. CBS was second with 13.0, and ABC third with 12.8. NBC is leading on the season with a 16.4. CBS and ABC remained tied for the season for the second week in a row with 13.7 each.

The Reagan interview was carried in prime time by ABC and NBC, at 8 p.m. EST Thursday, pushing NBC's high-rated lineup back a half hour. CBS delayed the interview until after prime time. Nevertheless, "Cosby" and "A Different World" led for No. 1 with a rating of 4.9 and a 38 share.

The rest of the top 10 were "Golden Girls," NBC, "Cheers," NBC, "Growing Pains," ABC, "Night Court," NBC, "60 Minutes," CBS, "Who's the Boss?" ABC, "Moonlighting," ABC and "Monday Night Football," ABC.

The lowest-rated shows of the week were: "Ohara," "Plaza Suite," "Sledge Hammer!" "Oldest Rookie," "Sable," "West 57th," "The Jennings-Koppel Report," "Houston Knights," "Children of Apartheid" and "Twilight Zone."
