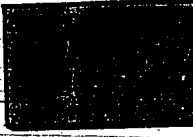

Andrus picks Johnson for seat on high court

BOISE — In an appointment considered by many to be one of the most important in years, Gov. Cecil Andrus on Thursday picked Idaho Education Association attorney Byron Johnson as the new Idaho Supreme Court justice.

Johnson, 50, a veteran Boise criminal defense attorney, will succeed the late Charles Donaldson, who died of a heart attack Oct. 9.

But Johnson vowed as soon as he takes the oath of office, he will shed the role of champion of teachers' rights and criminal defender.

"The day I take the oath, I will no longer be a defense attorney," Johnson told a news conference to announce the appointment.

"My only agenda is justice and the law. My standard will be craftsmanship and I promise to weigh and balance the facts and the law the best I can in a way I hope will carry out the great confidence placed in me," he said.

Johnson was selected from a list

of four candidates recommended by the Idaho Judicial Council. The council interviewed the 14 men and women who applied for the job before recommending Johnson along

Choice brings words of respect, disappointment, anger

TWIN FALLS — From respect to political condemnation, Gov. Cecil Andrus appears to have appointed a Idaho Supreme Court justice sure to be noticed.

Judges who have worked with Byron Johnson, a lawyer for the Idaho Education Association who will drop the mantle of teacher's advocate and criminal defense attorney to don the black robes of an Idaho Supreme Court justice, say

with Court of Appeals Judges Donald Burnett and Jesse Walters and Idaho Falls attorney Edward Pike.

Andrus said all four were highly qualified and "any one of whom would have been an excellent addition to the court."

But he indicated during questioning that he placed great emphasis

on the fact that Johnson is a practicing attorney.

"I felt we needed a fresh approach, a fresh perspective from someone fresh out of the arena," the governor said.

He said he considers the appointment perhaps the most important he will make.

"I'm confident this will be one of

the high points of the Andrus administration," he said.

Johnson is married to Ada County Magistrate Patricia Young.

He has four grown children. He practices law in Boise but lives in Idaho City.

Johnson said he spends about half his time working for the Idaho Education Association, "significant

time in criminal defense work and the rest of the time in estate and probate planning.

He has worked for teacher rights and other issues important to the IEA in recent years. IEA Executive Director Charles Lentz said the association will begin an immediate search for a new lawyer.

Johnson refused to commit himself on death penalty cases. Attorney General Jim Jones and others have argued that the new appointment could have a major impact on Idaho's capital cases, because the Supreme Court has been divided 3-2 on the issue.

Donaldson was considered the "swing vote" in upholding Idaho's system of allowing a judge, not a jury, to decide whether people convicted of first-degree murder should face the death penalty.

Johnson revealed that in 1980, at the request of the Idaho Supreme Court, he served on a committee rewriting Idaho's criminal sentencing

he is a fair, intelligent and hard-working lawyer.

But politicians from the Magic Valley, who campaigned hard to recapture what had been traditionally a Magic Valley seat on the five-member court, voiced reactions ranging from disappointment to outright anger.

Andrus appointed Johnson, a Boise lawyer, Thursday to a seat last vacant when Justice Charles Donaldson died Oct. 9. Donaldson had been the moderate swing vote

on what some observers call a bitterly divided court.

"It appears purely political to me," said Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo. Darrington, who is a member of the Senate Judiciary and Rules committee, said he was not only disappointed because of an apparent political nomination to the court but also because the Idaho Judicial Council didn't present a Magic Valley candidate to Andrus for consideration.

"I think he was the poorest of the four choices," Darrington said. "I

thought either of the appeals court judges would have been good choices."

Andrus passed up Jesse Walters, chief justice of the Idaho Court of Appeals; Donald Burnett, associate justice of the appeals court; and Edward W. Pike, an Idaho Falls attorney. The council selected its four candidates after interviews Tuesday with 14 applicants for the position.

However, a local judge who also applied for the seat, 5th District

Federal study lists area hospitals Mortality rates within standards

WASHINGTON — The administrator of the Elmore Medical Center Hospital District in Mountain Home has blasted a federal study showing the mortality rates of Medicare patients at the nation's hospitals as an "inconsistent and counterproductive" report.

The federal study, by the Health Care Financing Administration — part of the Department of Health and Human Services — was released Thursday as part of the federal government's effort to show how health care facilities are caring for the nation's most needy individuals.

Elmore showed a mortality rate of 11 percent, compared to what the agency said was an acceptable national average of eight to 10 percent.

But Jan G. Cox, the Medical Center's chief operating officer, said in a letter to the federal agency, "We find this effort by your Department inconsistent and counterproductive."

"The apparent emphasis of the current Administration is to hold the local medical community accountable for quality care while every effort is made in Washington to curtail our ability to provide it," Cox wrote in response to a draft copy of the report that was sent to the Medical Center this fall. "The preoccupation with cost to the program and the apparent conviction that everyone involved in providing care are dishonest, uncaring and fraudulent has created a very damaging mentality."

In releasing the information, hotly controversial among the nation's hospital administrators according to a survey of the response

letters enclosed in the seven-volume report, the federal agency cautioned that the data should not be used by hospital consumers to rank facilities.

Nine hospitals in the Magic Valley area were surveyed, and all proved to have Medicare mortality rates that were within the standards listed in the HHS report. The only hospital official among the nine to comment in writing to the agency and to have that comment reproduced in the study, was Elmore's Cox.

The other hospitals surveyed in the area included Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, Twin Falls Clinic Hospital, St. Benedict's Family Medical Center in Jerome; Moritz Community Hospital in Sun Valley; Blaine County Medical Center in Hailey; Cassia Memorial Hospital in Burnley and Gooding County Memorial Hospital in Gooding.

None of the hospitals in the state had a mortality rate in excess of the federal standards.

HCA administrator William L. Roper said the information in his report was not designed "to provide a national benchmark for measuring quality care. The most significant shortcoming of our model is that it isn't thoroughly consider a patient's condition at the time of hospital admission."

But Roper contends that "the perfect must not stand in the way of the good," and he called the report an important first step toward measuring quality of care. "We believe the models used in this work

State may subpoena water flow data

GOODING — At the end of a day-long rehearing on the Niagara Springs case before a handful of outsiders, tempers flared over Idaho Power Company's refusal to turn over water flow measurements from the site.

The company's refusal angered Department of Water Resources Director Keith Higginson, who said he will subpoena the records if necessary.

"Then I respectfully suggest you subpoena Fish & Game's records because they're the ones that take the measurements," said Idaho Power's attorney Bob Stahman.

"Are you telling me that Idaho Power has a water license and it doesn't know how much water was diverted and it has no other records than the ones provided?" Higginson shot back.

The exchange was one of a handful of heated moments during eight hours of otherwise long, tedious legal objections over testimony in the rehearing on the historic Niagara Springs decision issued by DWIR in July.

That decision, issued by former Director Ken Dunn, granted a minimum stream flow to Idaho Parks and Recreation Department that extended the stretch of the crystal clear creek in Gooding County, from

the gushing headwaters to the confluence of the Snake River.

But Dunn's decision was challenged by Rim View Trout Company owner Earl Hardy and Idaho Power Company, who said Dunn overstepped his authority.

Ironically, Idaho Power played a minor role during most of the eight-hour rehearing.

The bulk of the day was spent in a legal ping-pong match between Hardy's attorney, Sen. Bill Ringert, R-Boise, and Parks Department's attorney Kim Ray.

"I think it went really well. I was pleased with the evidence he al-

lowed in, and what he kept out," she said.

Ringert, following the hearing said it went "pretty much as expected."

"I don't recall any big surprises or rulings," he said.

But Ringert did express surprise during the hearing at water measurements taken by the U.S. Geological Survey on Hardy's diversion. The measurements were submitted by Parks Department.

The USGS records show Hardy was diverting up to 160 cfs in 1984, even though he holds licenses for only 180.3 cfs. Hardy has three applications

Traffic toll rises on 65-mph Interstate routes

WASHINGTON — Fatalities jumped by more than 50 percent on highways where the speed limit was increased to 65 miles per hour, according to a survey of accident statistics from 22 states.

Officials of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration cautioned that the findings, which cover only a three-month period, may be too small to draw definite long-term conclusions about the effects of the higher speed limits on highway safety.

But some traffic safety specialists suggested the figures represent "a strong indication" that the higher speeds will cause significant in-

creases in auto fatalities even on rural Interstate highways, which are considered among the safest roadways.

The 22 states were among the first of 38 states to increase their speed limits to 65 mph on rural Interstates last spring after Congress permitted the states to do so.

According to the figures made available by the NHTSA, 450 people were killed on rural Interstates during May through July of this year in the 22 states. Highways where the speed limit had not been increased had a 10 percent decline in traffic deaths.

A separate array of statistics from seven states where no speed limit changes were made

showed fatalities on rural Interstate highways increased only 10 percent.

In Idaho, the report showed 11 fatalities this year on Interstate routes where the speed limit was raised, an increase of 1 percent from 5 fatalities in 1986. On other highways where the speed limit remained at 65 mph, there were 26 fatalities, down 4 percent from 31 in 1986.

"It's probably a pretty strong indication that going up to 65 (mph) has a great effect on lives lost. But I don't think that should be any surprise. That's what we've estimated would happen," said Alvin Williams, a vice president and highway accident statistics specialist for the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety.

Fast expulsion likely for Soviet diplomat

WASHINGTON — A Soviet diplomat assigned to the United States mission in New York was expelled Thursday by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, administration officials said. Thursday night he will be expelled from the United States on grounds that he was engaged in espionage.

Administration sources identified the man as Mikhail Katkov, the second secretary of the Soviet mission.

The sources said Katkov was released after he showed his diplomatic identification and that the U.S. government is expected to expel him quickly. In cases like this, the sources said, the suspected spy generally is not arraigned in court.

Under usual procedure, the State Department would inform the Soviet Embassy of the incident and Katkov would be expelled from the United States in the next couple of days.

After President Reagan's summit here with Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev, was the first espionage incident involving the Soviets since Gen. Vladimir Zakharchov, another Soviet official assigned to the United States mission, was arrested Aug. 29, 1986.

are reasonable and appropriate for the intent of the publication... to assist hospital administrators and other health care professionals in assessing the strengths and weaknesses of an institution.

Boise said most hospitals will have different figures than HCFA for total patients served because HCFA counts only a patient's last hospital discharge. Most hospitals maintain statistics based on total number of admissions, and therefore may count one patient several times based on the number of hospital visits.

Public Citizen, a Washington-based research group associated with consumer activist Ralph

Nader, said in a prepared statement that any hospital with mortality rates in the upper 20 percent of the ranges "should be scrutinized."
HCFA is charged with assuring quality health care services for about 31 million elderly and disabled Americans covered by Medicare.

Only at the Twin Falls Clinic Hospital did patient mortality rates for any of the high and low risk categories exceed the federal benchmarks.

Overall, the hospital had an 11 percent mortality rate, compared to an acceptable rate of up to 15 percent; the clinic treated 672 Medicare patients in 1986. According to the report, 61 percent of the 23 patients who had severe acute heart disease died within 30 days of their final admission to the hospital — the largest percentage of deaths reported for any category. In this category, the hospital exceeded the acceptable expected range of deaths, which was listed at from 22 to 80 percent.

Marley Jackman, clinic administrator, said, "I'm not sure what it (the report) said or what it really means."
He said he hadn't yet seen a copy. Factors must be taken into consideration when viewing the results, such as size of the hospital and its number of Medicare patients, Jackman said. At the clinic, Medicare patients make up about 70 percent of the total number of patients. In addition, the clinic has seven internists and other specialists, resulting in it attracting more potentially-problem patients.

"If a small hospital has two patients and one dies that 50 percent," he said.
At Elmore, the data showed that 71 percent of the seven cancer patients died — a mark above the federal report to 65 percent set by the federal report.

The statistics for the other hospitals in the region showed:

• Magic Valley Regional Medical Center had an 11 percent mortality rate, compared to an acceptable range of up to 15 percent; Magic Valley treated 1,198 Medicare patients in 1986. According to the report, 29 percent of the 66 patients who had severe acute heart disease died within 30 days of their final admission to the hospital — the largest percentage of deaths reported for any category.

• St. Benedict's Family Medical Center had a 13 percent mortality rate, compared to an acceptable rate of up to 15 percent; the clinic treated 295 Medicare patients in 1986. According to the report, 47 percent of the 19 patients who had cancer died within 30 days of their final admission to the hospital — the largest percentage of deaths reported for any category. The acceptable range of deaths for this category was listed at up to 60 percent.

• Moritz Community Hospital had a four percent mortality rate, compared to an acceptable rate of up to 15 percent; the clinic treated 135 Medicare patients in 1986.

• Blaine County Medical Center had a 10 percent mortality rate, compared to an acceptable rate of up to 21 percent; the clinic treated 86 Medicare patients in 1986.

• Cassin Memorial Hospital had a 13 percent mortality rate, compared to an acceptable rate of up to 18 percent; the clinic treated 412 Medicare patients in 1986. Five of the 15 Medicaid patients, or 33 percent, who had strokes died — the largest percentage of deaths reported for any category at this hospital. The acceptable percentage of deaths in this category was listed at 35 percent.

• Gooding County Memorial Hospital had a nine percent mortality rate, compared to an acceptable rate of up to 19 percent; the clinic treated 166 Medicare patients in 1986.

Higginson often displayed frustration at the continuous objections and points of clarification what could be entered into the record.

At one point, the rehearing became so involved in a morass of legal entanglements over competing water applications that Higginson stopped the proceeding, lifted his hands toward heaven and said quietly, "Help."

Wendell former Bob Burks, who has fought to preserve the springs for further commercial fish hatchery development, also added an extra dimension of tension.

Burks, confused over what he could and could not introduce as new evidence, was continuously overruled by Higginson.

Burks tried to challenge the construction of a concrete headgate at the site, but he said destroyed the aesthetic beauty of the falls.

But Higginson said the concrete structures were not open for rehearing at this time.

Burks also repeatedly challenged testimony by Harry, but few of his questions were allowed as relevant.

Hardy testified if it will add \$1.5 million to the local economy, 35 new jobs and double his property taxes from the present \$7,600.

Hardy, who holds either licenses or approved permits for 1,625 cfs of water for fish propagation, said he will double his commercial trout hatchery to produce 3.6 million pounds of trout at the Niagara Springs facility.

Until now, the Boise businessman, president of four fish companies in the Hagerman Valley, refused to divulge specific figures on his business.

Hardy is arguing the expansion of his business is in the public interest. His testimony was countered by Parks-area manager Dennis Coyle, who said the 25-acre Pugmire Park at Niagara Springs attracted 76,000 people in 1986, despite no statewide or out-of-state advertising, no large signs pointing the way, and a treacherous road down to the site.

Coyle said without the water, the site would be "no different than a backyard."

"Our park at Malad Gorge has easier access and is right off a main highway, but it only had 25,000 people year," Coyle said. "Niagara Springs is 10 miles south of Wendell with facilities that are antiquated. The only difference is that Malad Gorge doesn't have springs gushing forth from the hillside."

In addition to Coyle's testimony, petitions containing 4,834 signatures and 150 personal letters "expressing the desire" to preserve Niagara Springs were presented by Edward Skolnik, who is fighting Burks's applications along with Burks and Marne Mercer with Hagerman Valley Citizens Alert.

He has defended five clients originally accused of first-degree murder. But in each case, the prosecutors did not seek the death penalty; so he has not had to face that issue.

Jones said later that considering the four nominations from the Judicial Council; Johnson's appointment was not surprising.

Johnson "has a good legal mind. We will wait and see what his track record is on particular issues."

Jones noted that Johnson has worked as a criminal defense attorney, and has worked for the American Civil Liberties Union, one of the strongest advocates for the rights of accused criminals.

"We'll give him a chance to get into some of these issues on the court," Jones said.

The attorney general said he urged Andrus and members of the Judicial Council to determine each candidate's views on the death penalty and other critical "law and order" issues.

"I'm assuming they explored those issues and found no difficulty in those areas. If not, the governor will be accountable if the decisions

surprising," said Roger Fairchild, R-Fruitland.

Fairchild said the "conventional wisdom" in Boise was that Pike and Andrus didn't get along. Johnson was too liberal, Walters was too Republican and Burnett would get the job.

"At first blush, this is a political appointment, but I would have to give the guy the benefit of the doubt, and I think we should let them rise to the occasion," Fairchild said.

Political or not, Johnson is stepping into a position with a lot of impact on law in Idaho, especially over the death penalty.

"This turnover is going to radically change law in Idaho," Fairchild said. "The court has been split 3-2 for a long time, and it's been a very contentious court," Fairchild said. "I don't know if people realize it, but the Supreme Court has more effect on the law than the Legislature does in many instances."

"I certainly hope there was no political intent by Andrus trying to get the teacher vote and picking somebody out of Boise," said Sen. Darrell McRobert, R-Twin Falls. "I don't have any problem with Johnson being what he was. The only problem was that a political motive was there, but I'm not suggesting it."

The chairman of the Senate Judiciary and Rules committee said he was surprised over Johnson's nomination.

Nevada gets nuclear dump

WASHINGTON (AP) — House and Senate negotiators agreed Thursday to legislation that designates Yucca Mountain, Nev., as the probable site for burying the nation's high-level nuclear wastes.

The nuclear waste measure, part of the giant budget reconciliation bill designed to implement the recent \$79 billion deficit-reduction agreement, would scuttle separate plans previously passed by the House and the Senate.

In Reno, Gov. Richard Bryan decried the deal as "a dark day for Nevada." He expressed disappointment that Congress "would preside over such a legislative travesty."

He said the plan "has never been the subject of a single public hearing."
In Washington, Sen. Harry Reid, D-Nev., said, "I feel betrayed, especially by the House of Representatives. They took public health and safety, put it in a box, shoved it to one side and brought out a new box that had in it base, raw power politics."

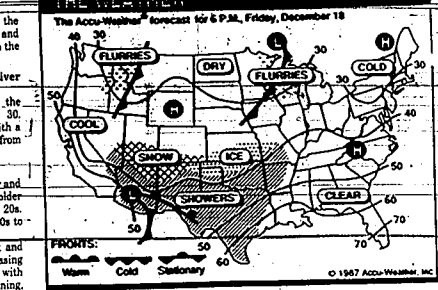
Summary

Court appointment smacks of politics

With no judicial experience and a background mostly in union activism, Boise attorney Byron Johnson wasn't on many people's short list to be nominated to the Idaho Supreme Court.

By picking Johnson — whose major experience is as an advocacy attorney for the teacher's union, the Idaho Education Association — Gov. Cecil Andrus has once again shown that his appointments are influenced by politics.

Another tempting conclusion is that Andrus has also opened the door to a nasty polarization of the court and the selection of its members.

We predict there will be a serious effort in the Republican-dominated Legislature to make Supreme Court appointments subject to approval by the Idaho Senate.

There is also a likelihood, we think, that Johnson will face an election challenge when his first term comes up.

That is not until 1992, for which Johnson is probably thankful today. The long lead time will give him plenty of opportunity to secure his position.

Johnson is an accomplished advocacy lawyer. People who know him well and who have watched him in court say he comes well prepared and that he is an assertive advocate for his clients.

For much of his career, Johnson has been closely tied to liberal organizations like the IEA, which contributed heavily to Andrus' campaign and worked hard on his behalf, and the American Civil Liberties Union.

Neither group is exactly representative of the thinking of many Idahoans.

But if he moves carefully, Johnson could make that advocacy background work for him. He could bring to the court a real appreciation of individual rights, which in Idaho have not always been well-respected — when balanced against other legal concepts. In that, individual Idahoans may find in him a genuine friend.

But there is more to the law than civil liberties. Johnson will soon come to see that union advocacy does not look the same from the bench or from Main Street as it does from the IEA boardroom or the Andrus campaign camp.

In short, he will have to show that he is not the justice for the criminal who is exploiting a loophole, or the public employee unionist, or for the Andrus administration, or for Boise and North Idaho Democrats.

He will have to show, by what he says and how he rules, that he appreciates the whole of Idaho, even those constituencies which may have, in the past, seemed like foreign lands to a liberal Boise lawyer.

If he is sensitive to those differences, he could fool the skeptics, of which there will be more than a few.

Time will tell if the new Justice Byron Johnson can make these transitions. He was not our first pick for the court, nor even 12th out of the 14 candidates.

But we will give him the benefit of the doubt.

Hart's return is a monument to Vanity

When last we saw Garry Hart, he was a victim of Lust, that most beguiling of the Seven Deadly Sins.

Now, in his dramatic return to entry into the presidential race, he returns as a monument to the folly of Vanity, in its sense both as emptiness and as self-regard.

In a brief address announcing his new candidacy, Hart said that as president he would be a national teacher. Well, he won't be president, but he still has something to teach us about a common human failing that politicians embody in tumescence proportions.

To begin with, Hart's case should cause us partly to supplement a dollop of the conventional wisdom about politicians, and partly to expand on it. The dollop that I have in mind is associated with the late Harold Lasswell, a political philosopher, and a brilliant understanding of how to solve on the public stage, if only symbolically, problems that they are unable to solve in their personal lives. That explanatory construct fits Hart rather nicely.

This self-destructive man, whose conflicts between ego and reason are the stuff of

Johnny Carson's jokes, wants to bring rationality to American politics, and indeed to American society generally. This creature of drives announces an "idea." This flagrant Lochner-like call for national "reform." He wants to do for us, in short, what he can't do for himself — reform: bring order out of chaos, let reason rule over instinct.

So far as it goes, then, Lasswell's theory helps us to understand the motivation for Hart's quite odd decision. (As so, no doubt, do crasser considerations having something to do with the availability of federal matching funds to help candidate Hart pay off his debt as well as finance his rehabilitation.) But the pre-psychoanalytic idea of Vanity also sheds light on Hart's motivation, and for one man glad to have this old vein bled on the campaign trail.

In his memoirs former Secretary of State

Dean Acheson says that after he left public life after the spotlight had so long been upon him had been snuffed out, he felt that the last undergone a kind of death. Life without the desire of renown was aversive. Perhaps Garry Hart felt the chill that public death, and so to the certain risk of ridicule had to clamber back into the cockpit of celebrity, that theater of Vanity. A public man lives by vanity. He craves for the world to notice him: And if the world notices, he craves for more.

Well, better that it mock than not notice at all. Better humiliation than oblivion. Last week, buried in the local news section of the New York Times, there was a little story about Garry Hart's lecture at New Jersey State — for a fee of \$10,000 — at a New Jersey college, and only a handful of students came to hear him speak.

They'd come now, you can bet on it, and in coming fill for a moment some of the emptiness of Garry Hart, and gratify his blinding self-regard.

GOP chortling but it may not last long

WASHINGTON — If America has a middle aisle, Americans would be rolling in it, their ribs squeaking from laughter.

The other aisle, after all, to be the only critics in the Democratic stew, which is like Irish stew in that almost anything tossed in just makes it more savory.

It is hilarious — unless you do not find amusing the trivialization of the world's oldest political party and most important political process. Chortling Republicans should remember that cynicism is an acid that can not be hermetically sealed on one side of the political divide. The political weapon generally is being devoured.

Gary Hart is back and standing tall because, he says, of his ideas, such as "strategic investment economies," which other candidates have imperceptibly neglected, and because "other national leaders" have not entered the race since May. But who is Hart to be so dismissive of the other six, three of whom (Jackson, Dukakis, Simon) have much more support than he has in this point in the 1984 contest. Four years ago he was at three percent, about where Gephardt and Gore are.

"Sometimes," said Hart in New Hampshire, "the best thing to do is what you feel you must do." Must. Like Martin Luther at the Diet of Worms. Hart says, "Ich kann nicht anders." He cannot do otherwise because of the lash of necessity — duty.

And what other ideas are emblazoned on his banner? "Smaller Aircraft Carriers." "Stand back so you do not get trampled in the stampede to enlist in what he calls his "cause." Hart has ideas, but so do the six — similar ideas. What nowadays distinguishes Hartism is general local vanity on the part of people like Hart who claim — as Hart put it in his gaudy speech

to the 1984 Democratic National Convention, that people who were young in the 1960s have a "unique bond of tragedy and triumph." Seriously folks, looked at from his vantage point — "from that cabin in Troublesome Gulch, Colorado — what is the downside to his decision? He is not giving up a Senate seat or anything else. He

wants a "forum" and the lecture circuit has been lukewarm. He may get some federal money, and may sully his reputation as a welder on his debts.

Having been restlessly moving around the country for 16 years, he must have suffered an excruciating case of cabin fever and decided to write a different end to the Garry Hart Story. And speaking of writing, perhaps he has writer's block. You may remember that he said he had a hankering to hole up in humble surroundings and write novels.

Anyway, Hart is running because, aside from the literary life, running is what he does. But, you say, he may be humiliated? How — by more stories about assignments? You have not been listening to him. The Democratic Party has found its Spiro Agnew.

Hart's newest new idea is to run against the press. But he is a deep, thoughtful soulful, intellectual more in sorrow than anger Agnew, indeed because the press is insufficiently interested in "the issues."

There is one last reason why he is running. He thinks he can be President. There already have been three front-runners in Iowa, so who can say that lightning will not strike? Put Hart in a debate with the other six and he will look impressive enough. He has the almost manic composure of a person completely obsessed by a quest.

Hart's support should be construed, as 2 percent an endorsement of smaller aircraft carriers and strategic investment economies, and 98 percent a vote for "anybody but any of the others," a collective repudiation of the six. The pressure will now mount for Mario Cuomo to say, I said, and meant, that the six are embryonic Lincoln, but Hart should not be the head of the party, therefore.

Hart could also injure the Democratic Party by helping Robert Dole. Dole has needed a strong Democratic front-runner to make his case for being more electable than George Bush. Suppose some polls show Hart beating Bush. Suppose Hart causes Cuomo to reconsider.

In a recent poll, Dole had a higher "favorable" rating among Democratic voters than any of the announced Democratic candidates. Although Dole is sometimes portrayed as the Dohertyman pincher of the GOP, Bush is more polarizing in his favor.

Unfavorable rating reverses when Democrats rather than Republicans are polled. However, Republicans laughing today may not laugh later. The contention Hart has caused does dramatize the "none of the above" mood that could produce a brokered convention in Atlanta. If the Democrats go marching out of Georgia behind Sen. Sam Nunn, they win.

Many questions unanswered after Cuban prison takeovers

Critical questions about Federal Bureau of Investigation practices remain unanswered in the wake of the commendable, patient negotiations that finally freed 122 hostages detained by Cuban detainees at two prisons. Though the hostages were released, millions of dollars in damage was done to the prisons. In addition, the riots forced the transfer of hundreds of inmates to other, already overcrowded, institutions.

It is equally evident that prison and INS officials were unaware of the depth of the detainees' feelings against returning to Cuba, and the extent to which they would go to avoid returning.

members to better what is in most prisons reduced weekend staffing. In any event, the detainees took over the center in a full-scale riot the next day.

Officials at the 65-year-old Atlanta prison must have been aware of the initial disturbance at Oakdale. Considering that theirs was a more hardened, larger group of detainees, their failure to heed the signal from Oakdale is perplexing.

Looking back, it's clear that detainees should have all been tested in this cell while the situation was assessed. But if that had been present just as the time, certainly serious could have been halted, large gatherings of inmates prevented, feeding done in small escorted groups, inmates and cells searched for weapons and more staff members deployed. Armed officers probably could have been placed on roofs and a tactical response team assembled.

While the failure to prepare at both facilities is difficult to understand, the failure to respond effectively when the riots began is even more troublesome. How were the institutions seized and so many hostages taken? The detainees had less time to make elaborate preparations to revolt than their guards had to prevent it. It seems unlikely that the factions among the inmates could implement a "no-missive-over-watches" strategy, but the guards should have had a well-drilled response plan for any contingency.

How, then, did the detainees effect a surprise? Surely there were officers on posts and patrol trained to spot trouble and equipped to call for immediate assistance to deal with it.

Why weren't the initial trouble spots isolated and contained? Who was making the vital decisions in the initial minutes of the riot? Was some needed permission to act lacking? One rioter was shot by a tower officer at Atlanta. Would decisive fire there, not necessarily to wound or kill but to separate and isolate riotous groups, have prevented a takeover?

Where did inmate weapons come from? Hostages told of machetes being used. Now prison inmates are adept at making weapons, but most often they are made from melted plastic (toothbrush handles are favored), sharpened bed springs and pieces of metal broken from lockers or kitchen from industrial operations. But machetes, dangerous tools and equipment suitable for fashioning weapons should be carefully controlled and stored safely.

It is important that the questions be answered honestly and promptly. Needed corrections should be made at once. After all, there are 48 other federal correctional facilities across the nation whose inmates studied the response at Oakdale and Atlanta. Hostage negotiations may not be successful the next time.

Mrs. Reagan wants some privacy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nancy Reagan said Thursday she agrees with Gery Hart that a politician has a right to a private life and that the intense scrutiny of candidates will "make it awfully hard for good people to get into politics."

In a wide-ranging and sometimes tearful interview in the first family's private quarters, Mrs. Reagan looked back at the troubles of 1987 and said, "It's not been a great year. It's been the lowest I think you can get."

Mrs. Reagan also expressed sorrow over the felony conviction of long-time friend Michael E. Deaver, and said she and President Reagan had been advised by counsel to suspend their personal relationship with Deaver as long as appeals were pending.

The first lady had a cancerous left breast removed in October and suffered the loss of her mother Edith Lucket Davis nine days later.

"I wish I'd had a little more time to recuperate before mother," Mrs. Reagan said, her voice crackling as

she wiped a tear from her cheek.

The first lady said she had thought of the title of the book "First You Cry" by Betty Rollins, who wrote of her own experience with breast cancer.

"I never had a chance to do that," Mrs. Reagan added.

Mrs. Reagan quickly changed the compass and spoke freely of the problems that have beset her husband the president during the past year, ranging from the entanglement of their daughter Patti Davis in the Iran-Contra affair.

"Asked how she has dealt with it all, she said, "Well, you just wish you could take that job out of your hand as every parent about the results of the agreement with Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev and said she'd told the Soviet leader that she would like to see Leningrad and the Hermitage art museum."

"I didn't get a Nyet," I don't think I got a "Da," either," Mrs. Reagan

said with a laugh.

Mrs. Reagan was asked about Hart's surprise re-entry into the Democratic presidential campaign this week, months after he withdrew, and instead questioning of his relationship with an AIDS model, and his contention that the public does not have a right to know everything about a politician's private life.

"There are things that I consider in my life to be private, that have nothing to do with the office, or Rome being president that I think are private," she responded.

"Does she agree with Hart? In a way, yes," Mrs. Reagan said.

She said there are certain things the public has a right to know.

But she said the focus on candidates private lives has gotten so intrusive now, "I think people are going to think two or three times (about public service), and that is too hard because we need good people," she said.

Congress cuts space budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — NASA's hopes of getting a good start on building a space station were dealt a blow by congressional budget cutters who allotted \$425 million for the current fiscal year instead of the \$767 million the space agency asked.

But the cut might have been worse and NASA issued a statement that the figure agreed to by House and Senate budget negotiators on Wednesday reflects "the strong commitment of the president and the Congress to proceed with the development of a space station."

The cut also met with philosophical reaction on Capitol Hill.

Democrats firmly reject any Contra military aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Democrats overwhelmingly rejected the delivery of military aid to Nicaraguan Contra rebels in a closed-door party caucus Thursday but left open the possibility for some form of non-lethal aid.

The 150-96-25 vote was designed to shore up the House's anti-Contra aid position in negotiations with the Senate over a massive catch-all spending bill: U.S. policy in Nicaragua is one of the most polarized and longstanding issues before Congress.

But in an afternoon meeting, the negotiators failed to take up the issue, apparently hoping it might be settled for them by President Reagan and congressional leaders.

"This isn't going to be resolved in this room," said Rep. David Obey, D-Wis. "It's going to have to be resolved by the big boys at the top."

But a spokesman for House Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas, said no such "Contra summit" had been scheduled and that the conferees would have to grapple with the problem themselves.

"Our problem, quite frankly, is finding the right formula that will contribute to the peace process and not detract from it, and one that we can pass," Wright told reporters.

LaRouche put pressure on supporters

BOSTON (AP) — Lyndon LaRouche saw himself as the only man smart enough to save the Western world, and his supporters committed fraud after buckling under intense pressure to finance his 1984 presidential bid, a federal prosecutor argued Thursday.

Assistant U.S. Attorney John Markham told jurors at the start of a trial expected to last up to six months that LaRouche's followers accepted much of what he told them, including his statements that other people were "slime" who "don't deserve their money."

Matthew Feinberg, who opened for the defense, said if any fraud was committed, it was by over-zealous supporters, acting individually. Another defense lawyer said the actions the government claims were part of a cover-up of the fraud were done at the direction of the CIA.

"This is not the paramilitary, monolithic, dictatorial organization of a Fred Piper that Mr. Markham would have you believe," Feinberg said.

LaRouche is charged with conspiracy to obstruct justice for allegedly ordering some supporters to destroy records and others to leave the country when the government began investigating reports of credit card and loan fraud.

Markham said LaRouche, who faces up to five years in prison and a \$250,000 fine if convicted, told his supporters "that only he has the intelligence to save the Western world."

Memo shows Bush for Iran arms sales

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President George Bush joined President Reagan in fully supporting a risky operation to sell arms to Iran in hopes of winning that nation's help in gaining the release of American hostages in Lebanon, according to a newly discovered White House memo.

The memo was made public Thursday by the Senate Iran-Contra committee, which said it represents "the first evidence (albeit hearsy) that the committee have found concerning the vice president's position on the Iran initiative."

A spokesman for Bush's presidential campaign, however, called the

characterization of the vice president's position "nothing new."

"The committee's action in releasing the memo revives questions in the midst of the presidential campaign about how closely Bush might have been involved in the Iran-Contra affair."

Both the Tower commission appointed by Reagan and the congressional investigative committees concluded earlier this year that Bush was not an important participant, and the affair has had no noticeable impact on his campaign for the Republican nomination.

The memo was written on Feb. 1, 1986 by Rear Adm. John Poindexter, then President Reagan's national security adviser.

to Robert McFarlane, his immediate predecessor. It characterizes the arms-for-hostages plan as "a risky operation."

In a joint statement, committee Chairman Daniel K. Inouye, D-Hawaii, and Vice Chairman Warren Rudman, R-N.H., said the memo confirms last summer's testimony by Secretary of State George P. Shultz and former Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger "that the president was fully aware of the risks in the Iran initiative but decided to proceed."

Poindexter used the memo to rebut the assertion of Iranian go-between Manucher Ghorbanifar that the hostages soon would be released.

"The hostages plan is still working and we'll be for the hostages to be released as of Feb. 1988," he said.

Poindexter noted that Shultz and Weinberger "still disagree on policy grounds, but are cooperating."

He asserted that Attorney General Edwin Meese III, the late CIA Director William Casey and then-White House chief of staff Donald Regan are "fully on board this risky operation."

Webster shakes up CIA

WASHINGTON (AP) — CIA Director William Webster said Thursday he has fired, demoted or reprimanded employees who acted improperly in the Iran-Contra affair and taken steps to strengthen the agency's review of covert activities.

"This has been a testing chapter in the history of the CIA," Webster said in a six-page statement released by his office.

Webster, appointed as director of the spy agency in March, said at least nine CIA employees had acted improperly in the Iran-Contra affair or in the investigations that followed revelations that the United States had shipped weapons to Iran in an abortive scheme to gain freedom for Americans held hostage in Lebanon.

"A number of people who engaged in activities determined to be improper have been disciplined," Webster said. Disciplinary actions ranged from demissions and demotions to letters of reprimand.

The Wall Street Journal, quoting unidentified intelligence sources said Thursday that Webster had fired the former CIA station chief in Costa Rica and the chief of a large CIA case at Aguacate, Honduras.

Specter approves

WASHINGTON (AP) — Supreme Court nominee Anthony M. Kennedy won endorsement Thursday from Republican Sen. Arlen Specter, a swing vote on judicial nominations who opposed President Reagan's first nominee for the court vacancy.

In an obvious comparison between Kennedy and defeated high court nominee Robert H. Bork, Specter said the 51-year-old Kennedy "does not wear an ideological strait jacket."

Hardliner Husak steps down as Czech Communist leader

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — Gustav Husak, who was given power by the Soviets after they crushed the liberal "Prague spring" of 1968, stepped down Thursday as one of those same reformers. A telegram from Mikhail S. Gorbachev indicated the new Czechoslovak leadership will be expected to follow the economic and social changes the Soviet leader is promoting at home.

He was replaced by Milos Jakes, 65, who oversaw the purge of nearly 600,000 Communist Party members after the Soviet-led invasion of August 1968 halted the liberalization begun by Alexander Dubcek, then party leader. The change was rumored in Prague for several days, and Jakes has been regarded as a potential successor to Husak. Jakes has overseen party economic policy since 1981. He is a con-

servative bureaucrat, but has approved some cautious reforms undertaken in the centrally planned economy this year. Gorbachev's telegram congratulated Jakes and declared, in part: "We are confident that the Central Committee under your leadership will ensure the fulfillment of wide-scale tasks facing the party in the field of the further development and renewal of socialism on Czechoslovak soil; the restructuring of the economic mechanism, the democra-

tion of the public and political life of the country." In its report of the leadership change, the official news agency CTK did not say why Husak chose to resign as party leader and retire from the Central Committee secretariat, which runs the party's day-to-day operations. It said the nearly 200 Central Committee member acted unanimously in accepting his resignation and electing Jakes. Husak retains the largely ceremonial office of president and membership in the 11-member Politburo that rules the party.

Jakes said in his first speech as party leader that the "last" party congress in March 1988, would be the basis of his policy, according to the CTK report.

However, he also emphasized the need for "uncompromising struggle" against corruption, which is said to have reached high into the party during the Husak years.

Unrest eases in Gaza Strip after 10 days

GAZA CITY, Occupied Gaza Strip (AP) — The Israeli army eased its grip on the Gaza Strip on Thursday as violence in the occupied territories tapered off following 10 days of rioting. Fourteen Arabs were shot and killed during the unrest, the worst in a decade. Israel called international criticism that is used as excessive force the strongest since its 1982 bombing of Beirut.

In some parts of Gaza, protesters burned tires, set up roadblocks, closed stores and stayed home from jobs in Israel to protest the violence. On the streets of Gaza City, army patrols were reinforced, but soldiers appeared to be carefully avoiding confrontation.


A 21-year-old Palestinian died of gunshot wounds suffered in a clash with soldiers on Wednesday, and troops clamped a curfew on a district in his hometown of Rafah to avoid further violence. Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir blamed Palestinians for the violence despite the international criticism.

"I don't think any Jew is responsible for the disturbances. Arabs, and only Arabs, are to be blamed for this unrest," Shamir said on Israel Radio.

In the occupied West Bank, a curfew was placed on the Balata refugee camp near Nablus after troops used tear gas to disperse hundreds of Palestinian protesters. The demonstration erupted after a delegation of Israeli leftists entered the camp to attend a mourning service for three Balata youths killed in clashes with soldiers on Dec. 11. Arab demonstrators clashed with Israeli soldiers in three other West Bank towns, the military said.

Carbide payment ordered

BHOPAL, India (AP) — Survivors wept and smeared red powder on each other's foreheads in happiness Thursday when a judge ordered Union Carbide Corp. to pay \$270 million in interim relief to victims of the 1984 gas leak that killed more than 2,800 people.

"Attempts at an overall settlement appear to have bogged down in the din of diverse, loud voices, leaving the poor gas victims, pathetically past even the third anniversary of the unprecedented disaster, to fight out the legal battle," said District Judge M.W. Deo.

The interim relief "shall naturally be without any prejudice to the rights and defenses of the parties to the suit and the counterclaim that may be finally adjudicated," he said.

The government has sued the Danbury, Conn.-based Union Carbide for \$3 billion in damages, and attempts to reach an out-of-court settlement have failed. In addition, the Indian government filed criminal charges.

Social activists working among the victims praised the decision as "the first victory of the gas victims." From its corporate headquarters in Connecticut, Union Carbide said the payment ordered by the court "amounts to awarding damages without a trial."

Anil Diwan, a Carbide attorney in Bhopal, added, "We will study the judgment before deciding further action."

Outside the courthouse, thousands of survivors staging a sit-in protest cheered, wept and hugged each other when the decision was announced. Some spread a red powder on each other's foreheads to express happiness and auspiciousness. Red is a holy color in Hindu mythology.

Irish smiling after settling treasure laws

DUBLIN, Ireland (AP) — One freezing February afternoon in 1980, businessman Michael Webb and his son were roaming a desolate Irish bog, trying out the metal detector the youngster had received for his 16th birthday.

They were about to go home empty-handed when the machine suddenly signaled—metal beneath their feet. Two hours later they had unearthed one of Ireland's richest finds of religious relics, and a court battle lasting nearly eight years was about to begin.

The tussle for the \$9 million treasure of gold, silver and bronze artifacts, called "remarkably enough, with Irish eyes smiling on all sides."

A ruling Wednesday by the Irish Supreme Court satisfied all parties concerned, left no one out of pocket, and laid the groundwork for an overdue revamping of Ireland's laws on treasure-troves.

As one of Europe's earliest centers of Christianity, Ireland is, as the Irish Times remarked, "a vast open-air museum of precious carvings, ancient gravestones and sacred sites."

Increasingly, these have become prey to plunderers armed with shovels and metal detectors.

Had the Webbs been less scrupulous, the find on the boggy island of Littleton in County Tipperary might not have been saved for the nation.

At first, the Webbs thought they had found discarded kitchen utensils. When they realized they were valuable, they handed them over to the National Museum in Dublin.

Experts identified a silver chalice inlaid with gold, a gilt bronze ladle, silver patten, the plate on which bread is served at the Eucharist—complete with its stand.

The relics were found near a fifth century ruined abbey called Derrynaflan. Experts estimated their value at \$5 million Irish pounds, or \$9 million.

Suspect hanged

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — A man was hanged for murdering two 18-year-old hitchhikers in 1986—the official news agency—CTK reported Thursday.

The terse report said Milos Kravicka, 36, a repeat offender from Dubi in north Bohemia, near the East German border, had been condemned to death last year. He also was accused of attempted rape of the two hitchhikers.

The death penalty is imposed in Czechoslovakia for particularly brutal or reprehensible acts.

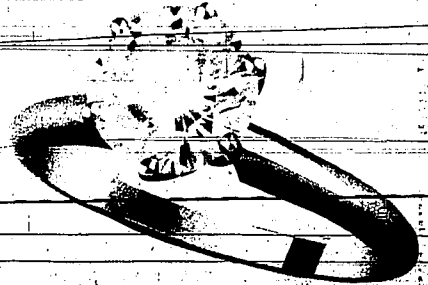

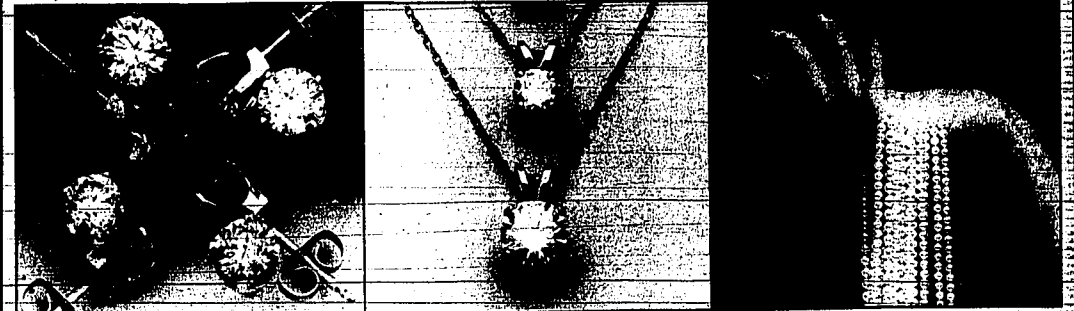

Legal path cleared for court fund borrowing

TWIN FALLS — A legal path was cleared Thursday for Twin Falls County to borrow money for its district court fund which slipped below the surface of self-sufficiency for the first time ever this month.

The County Board of Commissioners is expected to pass a resolution today to borrow a maximum of \$200,000 during the next five years, said Commissioner Marvin Hempleman, although it is uncertain how much of that amount will actually be used.

That action would ultimately require the fund to pay filing charges for paperwork, court costs and fines. But as the resolution was being drafted Thursday afternoon after county Prosecutor K. El-

len Baxter consulted with state Tax Commission officials for language of the resolution.

Included will be a declaration of an emergency to borrow the money and a definition of what is meant by the word "the machine" for borrowing, which is Hempleman's term.

Counties pay for support services for their district courts through funds. The services include personnel such as law clerks, judges and secretaries, and supplies. However, judges' salaries are paid by the state.

Until December in Twin Falls County, the fund was entirely self-supporting. But unbudgeted expenditures during October and November ran up an unexpected tab against the fund. Setting up a new jury commission cost \$4,500 in court-appointed attorney's fees, and a \$7,000 shortfall in carry-over from last year contributed, among other things, to debt surfacing only two months into the fiscal year.

Expenditures are running at a \$206,000

annual pace, while income ran at only about \$140,000. Attorneys fees and part of the jury commission costs were aberrations, however, and the annual debt may not reach \$60,000.

Belt-tightening continues.

Hempleman said 5th District Court agreed to abide by the \$170,000 budget; despite that figure being down more than \$25,000 from the previous year and down from nearly \$250,000 the court had requested.

Bill, whatever the debt total at the end of the fiscal year next Sept. 30, commissioners will have to tax to repay it. In addition, the county will have to begin budgeting taxes for future projected shortfalls.

As district court fund dives into the fray for tax dollars next year, other areas of county government will likely suffer.

County officials note that at the same time required services continue to increase, such as the district court fund that is arguably a state responsibility or the indigent budget, state-imposed limits on taxation force funding one program at the expense of another.

"The problem that we're facing after this winter is that to get district court funds, we'll have to dilute the rest of the budget" in 1988, said Hempleman.

Commissioners will simply pass the resolution today, without having to get approval from 6th District Court, as initially anticipated.

Hempleman said he doesn't need 5th District Court approval because the budget is not being changed — instead, an emergency method of funding is being declared.

Planning names Bausman alternate

Bausman oversees engineering, environmental and other departments at MVRMC and is risk manager — and safety committee chairman. He also managed the hospital's expansion in 1982.

He moved to Twin Falls in 1982 and holds a bachelor's degree in general studies with a minor in business.

Mark Beams, Jeff Gooding and Volek Traxler were unsuccessful applicants.

Beams, the only Twin Falls native considered, was an unsuccessful 1987 City Council candidate and is owner/manager of House of

Wheels. He said 13 years experience in flooring construction familiarized him with area contractors.

Gooding is a Boise State University alum and certified public accountant who has lived in Twin Falls for 10 years. He manages six apartments outside the city and was involved in construction firms for seven years.

Traxler holds a bachelor's degree in environmental science and master's degree in resource planning. She was assistant county zoning administrator in Greeley, Colo., for two-and-a-half years before moving to Twin Falls in 1982.

Each of the candidates was interviewed Tuesday by the planning and zoning commission. They recommended Bausman and the returning incumbents for approval by the full City Council.

If confirmed, Bausman would become an alternate during a complicated reorganization of sitting board members. All of the switches, including two nominations from the County Board of Commissioners for the city's area of interest, must still be ratified by the City Council.

Gary Custer, representing the area of impact, John Hohnhorst, and Greg Ruddle are each current members of the commission.

Quality is key to business success

Fair solicits big names for entertainment night

TWIN FALLS — An entertainment night is planned for Twin Falls County and Rodeo next year and big-name country-western bands are being invited, said Fair Manager Dan Peters.

Also, construction of the new Produce Building is on schedule and the fair board created new line items to pay off that construction and the proposed entertainment night.

Changing the budget to include the line items will be approved in district court.

The fair board, absent Jack Ramsey, unanimously approved Peters' suggestion to pioneer a \$25,000 entertainment night on Tuesday of Labor Day week, typically a slow night the first day of the fair. Rodeo nights would then follow as usual Wednesday through Saturday, Peters said.

Under the new budget, entertainment night would replace PM Programs and Action Attractions such as the rodeo band, which combined are now budgeted at \$3,500. Peters said reserved and general admission tickets for entertainment night budget are expected to cover the maximum \$25,000 program.

Nationally recognized bands that Peters is soliciting include the Dart Brothers, the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band and the Judds, although he said the limited funds may not be

enough to attract these bands.

The board also established an \$80,000 line item to pay for construction of the new Produce Building. Board Chairman Stan Snow said the money is already budgeted, but that it wasn't broken out into its own line item.

Poulsen Brothers Construction won the bidding at \$71,321. Peters said new estimates on the building's electrical work, negotiated with three contractors to about \$4,900, went to Lens Electric Inc.

Changes in building design, including a taller 12-foot door accommodating trailer storage and an additional 10-foot door on the east side, are expected to fall within the \$80,000 budget ceiling, Peters said.

He added that there are at least a half-dozen trailer owners willing to pay storage for their trailers, but are unable to fit through the Merchants' Building doors.

Updating construction at the site, Peters added that walls to the Produce Building are about two-thirds completed and work on the roof is expected to begin in 10 days if the weather holds. So far, Snow said \$12,872 has been spent on that construction.

The County Board of Commissioners will pass a formal resolution to change its budget to accommodate the entertainment and construction line items. The changes must then be ratified in 5th District Court.

TWIN FALLS — Driving around with a Buy American bumper sticker doesn't help make American products any better, Tom Peters said Thursday. He recommended a different slogan — "Shut up and import."

The renowned business guru told an eager crowd of over 400 people at the College of Southern Idaho that producing quality will make American companies competitive.

A company that makes a quality product, gives quality service, presents a quality appearance, and treats employees like valued partners can hardly go wrong, Peters explained, described, and belittled to his audience during the all-day, one-man seminar.

He presented a myriad of statistics and anecdotes to prove his theory. Peters has spent eight years writing and lecturing on how to succeed in business. His first book, "In Search of Excellence," is the only one on management ever to hit number one on the best seller lists.

He took pleasure in giving the corporate sacred cows, yet he said his advice is so simple and so obvious, it's boring.

"Quality works. Quality pays," Peters said. "If you're making something good, the world

wants it. That's all I have to say."

But he went on.

America has no heritage of quality to fall back on, he said. Americans like to think the United States became a great nation because its businesses did things better, faster and bigger. It's not true, Peters said.

"We got where we are because we were lucky. We had lots of land, cheap coal, cheap oil, cheap gas, and cheap immigrant labor."

Americans all think the bigger the company the better, he said, and quality has nothing to do with it.

"We love it if it's big, no matter how lousy it is."

But, he added, a small business isn't automatically customer oriented either.

"The only reason a small business deserves to live is that it's more responsive than a big business."

Trus Joist Corp., the wood products firm that will soon open a window-manufacturing plant in Twin Falls, was Peters' example of a customer-oriented company.

The firm sent out cards to all its customers with a 24-hour toll-free number on it. But that wasn't what impressed Peters. On the back of the card was printed the home phone numbers of all Trus Joist's top managers and engineers

across the country.

The Home numbers convinced its customers that it was serious about service, so the customers used the 800 number and didn't bother the managers at home.

"Now that's what I call putting your money where your mouth is," Peters said.

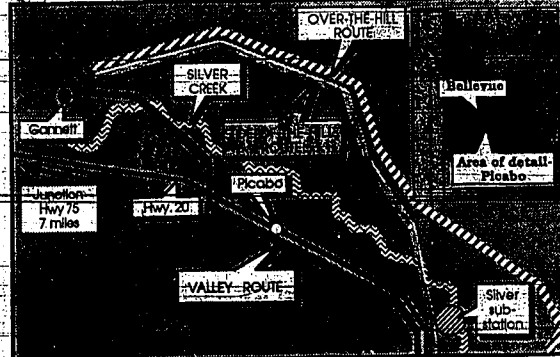
Treating employees well is just as important as treating customers that way, he emphasized. Workers who are consulted on problems and rewarded for performance will naturally increase a company's productivity and enhance its product or service quality.

He listed a number of "bold goals" that every company should adopt and strive for in the next 24 to 60 months:

- increase productivity from 100 percent to 200 percent
- improve quality by reducing defects by 95 percent
- reduce the time it takes to develop a product by 90 percent
- reduce order lead time by 95 percent
- reduce inventory by 90 percent
- reduce flow distance by 99 percent
- reduce layers of management by 75 percent
- consider doubling the sales force

Blaine commission recommends acceptable IPC line route

HAILEY — A modified version of the Toe-of-the-Hills route has been recommended to Idaho Power Co. as the acceptable route for a new transmission line through southern Blaine County.

After six months of deliberation, fact finding and testimony, the Blaine County Planning and Zoning Commission reached the decision late Thursday night at the conclusion of a second public hearing about the route alternatives.

The board now has 15 days to put together its findings of fact reports and stipulate any conditions which will be applied to the issuance of the conditional use permit Idaho Power is being granted.

IPC's conditional use permit application for the 138,000 volt transmission line requested the Valley route be followed from Picabo, west down Highway 20, crossing Silver Creek toward

Gannett and then following the former Union Pacific Railroad right-of-way from Gannett into the Hailey Substation.

The commission approved the application in part by granting permission to follow the path of the present distribution line from Gannett into Hailey. The commission did place a condition the distribution line be removed from along the highway and instead ran on the eastern-most side of the railroad right-of-way.

But county residents complained that the Valley route had scenic and safety drawbacks, and rather than approve the rest of that route, the commission requested IPC follow the Toe-of-the-Hills route. This route runs northwest from the proposed Silver Substation southeast of Picabo to the base of the foothills, then continues through the foothills northwest to connect with the existing lines north of Gannett.

The board previously approved this

route in 1982, but battles over the proposed route went to the Idaho Supreme Court which eventually ruled there had been a conflict of interest in earlier decisions on the route.

A slight modification will now take place with the line running along the western-most edge of Pat Millington's property, then to Bureau of Land Management ground to then intersect with the proposed line above property owned by David Manookin.

Two additional routes for consideration were introduced during Thursday's meeting.

Commission members Steve Pruitt and John McDonald developed a proposed route which would follow an Over-the-Hills route from Gannett into Hailey. An extension of the previous Over-the-Hills route, the two-mile wide corridor selected on the top of the hills east of the valley would cross primarily BLM land, avoiding a great deal of private property.

In support of this new over-the-hills route, McDonald said IPC had set its own precedent by previously building two lines in the area which went entirely through the hills — the Moonstone to Halley line and the line which goes into Elkhorn.

In the board's closing remarks before voting, Pruitt said the board should not just be trying to solve short-term problems, but look toward the economic and health considerations of future generations who live here. "We could be criticized for idealism," Pruitt said. "But that's what planning is all about."

A fifth route, the Toe-of-the-Hills to Halley, was proposed by resident

David Hafer. This route extended from the first Toe-of-the-Hills following the slope of the hillsides into Halley.

During the public hearing, former Sun Valley resort owner Bill Janas and Sun Valley Managing owner Mike Riedel spoke out in favor of protecting the recreational qualities of Silver Creek. Riedel said Silver Creek is a drawing card for summer tourism, with people coming worldwide to fish in its renowned waters.

Janas echoed his sentiments by advising the board to protect the Silver Creek area. "When you have something so unique as this area, you've got to take care of it," he said.

Health and safety concerns were

voiced by resident Rich Johnson who supplied the board with eight studies researching the possible link between cancer in humans and exposure to electromagnetic fields from power lines.

"While all the evidence on the matter is not yet in, Johnson said "it sure looks like there's a relationship between electromagnetic fields and cancer."

Considering this possibility, IPC attorney Pat Herrington said the company would be willing to place the transmission line on the north side of Highway 20 as it runs through Picabo, thus avoiding homes in that area. However, the Toe-of-the-Hills route avoids Picabo entirely.

Two residents of Halley's Curtis Subdivision expressed their concerns about having the transmission line come across or near their homes as it came out of the hills to the west of the subdivision. A petition by 17 homeowners in the subdivision was also presented for the record by County Planning Director Ed Nigbor.

Nigbor also presented for the public record three letters opposing the Valley route and one in support of the Toe-of-the-Hills route. Numerous other letters, the vast majority which opposed the Valley route, had been presented at prior meetings.

In the commissioners closing remarks, board member Leonard Harlig said the Over-the-Hills route would be the "best of all possible worlds," but added he was not comfortable with the subject. - Measuring the cost of poor quality. Problems areas tend to be about five percent of a business, but cost 40 percent of gross revenues.
- Rewarding executives, supervisors, workers, suppliers, everyone — on the basis of quality produced.
- Training everyone — from chairman to mailroom clerk — in problem analysis, group problem solving, how to listen, and interpersonal communications. The average

— Membership quality improvements are the key source of cost reduction.

The other half of the quality equation is its perception, Peters said. "Perception is the only reality, and it is never neutral."

Peters used his coffee addition to dramatize the point. He recently stayed at the celebrated Denver Sheraton High-Tech Center. All that chrome and marble and fake antique furniture didn't mean a thing to him, though, when he learned he couldn't get coffee at 4 a.m., when he likes to work.

"I don't need the 'stuff,' you understand," he said, "I have to have it."

That was "one tiny negative perception, but it was the crucial one for him. All the positive perceptions couldn't make up for it."

On the other hand, he fell in love with the Ford Taurus car because it was the first one he had ever seen with a built-in place for his coffee cup. "One tiny positive perception, but again, for him, it was decisive. 'The average person's expectations are ridiculously low,'" Peters said. "All you've got to do is one tiny positive thing and you're in the hall of fame forever."

Richardson won't run in '88

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Mel Richardson, the Idaho Falls Republican who failed to unseat 2nd District Democratic Rep. Richard Stallings last year, said he will not run for Congress again in 1988.

Richardson, who now operates a marketing consulting business, said money, business demands and medical problems with his son Lance and daughter Kristi led to his decision not to enter the race.

There are a lot of good candidates for Congress, but there can be only one father, Richardson said in an interview Wednesday. He made his announcement official on Thursday.

But Richardson said staying out of the congressional race does not mean he is leaving politics or that he would not run for some other office in 1988. He said the state Legislature was among the possibilities.

Governor called to jury duty

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Constitution says Gov. Cecil Andrus is to present his traditional State of the State message on Jan. 11, opening day of the 1988 Idaho Legislature.

But Andrus got a summons on Thursday requiring him to be elsewhere. The governor said he was summoned for Ada County jury duty required to report on Jan. 11.

The State of the State message is delivered to a joint Senate-House session and has been televised statewide in recent years. "I told the speaker of the House that I might be there, and I might not," Andrus said.

Commission closes gas access

SODA SPRINGS (AP) — The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission has closed one of two avenues which would give Nu-West Industries Inc. access to low-cost natural gas for its Soda Springs phosphate fertilizer operation.

In a Dec. 12 ruling, FERC denied a rehearing of its earlier decision nullifying a gas transport agreement worked out by Nu-West and Northwest Pipeline Corp.

The ruling would have allowed Nu-West to buy its natural gas at a competitive rate on the spot market from suppliers other than Northwest, a Salt Lake City company which currently is the only one authorized to ship gas through its pipeline.

Natural gas is used as a feedstock in the production of ammonia, used to make nitrogen fertilizers. Nu-West has indicated that if it could not get the lower-cost gas, the plant's newly resumed operations could be jeopardized and hundreds of jobs lost.

State urges appeal rejection

BOISE (AP) — The state of Idaho says a federal appeals court should reject the appeal of convicted slayer Thomas Eugene Creech, and allow his death sentence to be carried out.

Idaho Solicitor General Lynn Thomas this week filed a 59-page brief with the U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals, urging the court to reject Creech's attempt to overturn his 1983 conviction and death sentence.

Creech, 37, has been convicted of five first-degree murders, including three in Idaho. Currently he is under death sentence for the May 13, 1981, beating death of another Idaho State Prison inmate, David Dale Jensen. Creech admitted that he beat Jensen to death in an argument with a stocking filled with flashlight batteries.

Hospitals in state get high marks

BOISE (AP) — The vast majority of Idaho hospitals whose Medicaid patient care has come under federal scrutiny, according to the review with good marks, according to statistics released Thursday.

But despite the fact that all 46 Idaho hospitals had Medicaid mortality rates last year within ranges the federal Health Care Financing Administration said "should be expected," many administrators lashed out at the project, questioning its validity.

"Often in the Idaho hospitals, the statistical sample is so small that it has little meaning," said Bonnie Haines of the Idaho Hospital Association. "It's not very meaningful when you have only one or two patients in the sample."

In addition, some hospital administrators said the information provided by the government was inaccurate. Pocatello Regional Medical Center said it was assigned a patient by the survey who was never treated at the hospital under the federally financed Medicaid program.

The Idaho figures also covered 47 facilities even though only 45 hospitals were surveyed. Two hospitals were listed for both Council and St. Anthony communities that have only one hospital each.

"As a general comment," said Jan C. Cox, administrator of Community Hospital and Nursing Home in Bonners Ferry, "we find this effort by your department inconsistent and counterproductive. The apparent emphasis of the current administration is to hold the local medical community accountable for quality care while every effort is made in Washington to curtail our ability to provide it."

William Roper, head of the Health Care Financing Administration, acknowledged that one of the shortcomings of the statistical model used for the survey was that it did not consider the condition of patients at the time of admission.

The Health Research Group, part of Ralph Nader's Public Citizen, suggested consumers use the data as a starting point for questioning individual hospitals that appear to have unusually high mortality rates rather than using the raw figures as the sole yardstick for quality of care. "The name 'admission' was given by the government. A title

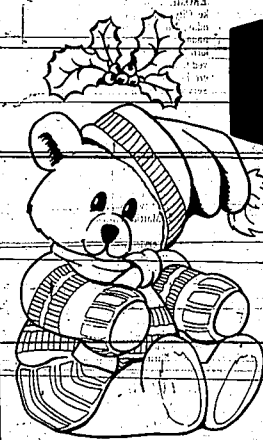

Day-care standards under fire

LEWISTON (AP) — Lewiston's fire marshal says proposed fire safety standards for Idaho day-care operations don't go far enough.

Under regulations to be implemented in March, a maximum of 12 children would be allowed for each adult in day care operations.

Fire Marshal Larry Skeen said it would be difficult for one adult to get a dozen children out of a day-care center in an emergency, such as a gas explosion.

He suggested that the life safety code, which would allow fewer children per adult depending on their ages, be the standard for day-care operations in Idaho.

Charles Borich, Lewiston building official, said Idaho should either stick with more stringent fire standards or boost the allowable adult-to-child ratio.

Borich and Skeen testified at a public hearing Wednesday at Lewis-Clark State College on day-care licensing rules and regulations proposed by the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare, North Central District Health Department and Idaho's fire marshal.

The day-care licensing law requires operations with 13 or more children to get a license every two years. These operations would be monitored for health and fire safety standards.

Man may sue for payment of medical bill

BOISE (AP) — A former bouncer hired to make sure a man did not drink alcohol for three days said he may seek payment of medical bills from his employer after he allegedly was dragged alongside his charge's car for a quarter mile.

Steve Kingsley, 29, was hired through the Idaho Department of Employment to watch over Conrad Cline, 36, of Boise.

The job required him to spend three days watching over Cline, who was charged with stop-drinking. He was hired by Cline's mother.

Kingsley said he followed Cline when he left in a truck. He said he ended up being dragged alongside the car as a man held onto him.

Kingsley said he has injuries to the back of his head, a sprained neck, a slash in his right hand and "road rash" over the right side of his body.

Cline has been arraigned on one count each of aggravated assault, resisting arrest and driving under the influence of alcohol. He denies Kingsley's story.

Kingsley says he was hit with a hammer and he was trying to protect himself.

Kingsley said he has consulted an attorney, saying he believes Cline's mother should pay his \$300 to \$500 in doctor's bills.

Cline's mother declined to comment.

Contractor advises home tests for radon

LOWMAN (AP) — A contractor for the U.S. Department of Energy is urging Lowman residents to sign consent forms to have their homes tested for the presence of radon gas. Jack Hoopes, spokesman for Jacobs Engineering Group Inc., said some Lowman homes were contaminated when uranium tailings from an old milling site were mistaken as sand and used to make concrete for foundations.

Radon is a colorless, radioactive gas formed by the decay of radium, an element found in uranium ore and has been found to cause cancer.

Mark Torf, a state health official, said radon accidents are not in immediate danger, but should get radon gas readings.

Hoopes said the old railroad sites at Banks and Boise, which were shipping points for uranium ore, also will need to be cleaned up. The Boise site, now the state Department of Parks and Recreation office, has uranium tailings underneath its paved parking lot.

"We'll have to rip that up and clean up that area," he said.

In an information meeting Tuesday night in Lowman, Hoopes outlined how Jacobs will clean up uranium mill tailings left scattered at

the milling site along Clear Creek, about a half mile north of Lowman.

The 37-acre site contains 10 piles — 191,000 tons — of uranium tailings. Uranium ore was mined in the Bear Valley area from 1955 to 1960, milled at the Clear Creek site, and trucked to Boise or Banks, where it was shipped by rail out of state.

Hoopes said he does not know how much the total cleanup project will cost, but Idaho's share is estimated to be about \$800,000. Federal funding for cleaning up all 24 uranium processing sites across the nation will end in 1993.

Coroner pleads innocent to DUI

LEWISTON (AP) — Nes Perce County Coroner Donald Appleford has pleaded innocent to a misdemeanor charge of drunken driving filed after his car slammed into a parked van in Lewiston.

Appleford, 62, of Lewiston, could face trial if no agreement is reached with prosecutors at a conference scheduled for Dec. 29, said a spokeswoman in the Lewiston city attorney's office.

The coroner was arrested by Lewiston police after his Dec. 8 accident. He refused to take a breath test and instead asked to be taken to St. Joseph Regional Medical Center for a blood test.

Hi-Fi case ruling due today

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A judge said he would rule by Friday afternoon whether to grant an evidentiary hearing on a petition by convicted "Hi-Fi Shop" killer William Andrews to have his death sentence overturned.

Third District Judge David S. Young was asked Thursday by Andrews' attorneys to hear evidence on Dec. 23 that the defendant's original trial lawyer was incompetent for not having sought a conviction on a lesser murder charge.

Andrews, 32, of Jonesboro, La., filed the petition Oct. 23, contending the 2nd District Court trial

judge, John F. Wahlquist, failed to properly instruct the 12-member jury that Andrews could have been convicted of second-degree murder.

Instead, jurors were left to believe their only options were to acquit Andrews or convict him of first-degree murder, defense attorneys argued, and that the Utah Supreme Court failed on appeal to recognize the trial court's alleged error.

Andrews and co-defendant Pierre Dale Selby were convicted of three counts of first-degree murder and two counts of aggravated robbery in the torturous murders of three people at the Ogden Hi-Fi Shop on April 22, 1974. Selby was executed by le-

thal injection last Aug. 28.

Andrews' third appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court, on other issues, is pending.

Young granted a defense request that Andrews not be manacled during the 70-minute hearing. As it was concluding, Andrews said, "Say, could I address this court?"

After a recess, Andrews' attorney, Tim Ford of Seattle, said that in a brief conference Andrews had told him he wanted to make it clear to Young that his trial attorney, John Guimer, had not raised with him the issue of a lesser-included offense that is central to his petition for a writ of habeas corpus.

U.S. ski fortunes slump on eve of '88 Games

VAL GARDENA, Italy — For a gold-medal winner in the 1984 Winter Olympic premier slalom event, Bill Johnson's performance here last weekend in the second downhill race of the World Cup season was nothing short of pathetic.

Slipping on an injured knee that kept him out for almost the entire season last winter, Johnson, now 27, coasted down the course a full 9.01 seconds behind the winner, Canadian Rob Boyd. In a field of 32 finishers, the onetime infant terror of downhill racing finished 81st, just ahead of a Liechtenstein entrant who skis for Mexico and an observer from mountainous Denmark.

"It felt good just getting down," said Johnson after the race on a tricky course on which, in 1986, he

wiped out and seriously damaged his knee. "At least I made it further than I did last year."

While the normally cocky and fractious Johnson's new-found humility spoke of a particular — and probably unique — case in U.S. Alpine skiing, it also underlined how far America's fortunes in international skiing have sunk since the Sarajevo Olympics four years ago when U.S. men and women — three gold and two silver medals — brought home a total of five medals — three gold and two silver.

In the 14 races held at the start of the 1987-88 World Cup season, American men and women have not done better than Edith Thys seventh in a super giant slalom at Seefeld, in Italy, last month and an

eight place by Felix McGrath in a giant slalom Sunday at Alta Badia here in the Dolomites.

The reasons for the Americans' weak start are not hard to find. Most of the best U.S. skiers are retired, and the young talent U.S. ski officials have recruited to replace them is inexperienced and untested.

Not only has Johnson not won a race since 1984 — even before his injury last year — but the two superstars of the 1984 U.S. Olympic team, twins Phil and Steve Mahre, who won a gold and silver, respectively, in the slalom, are no longer racing.

The picture among U.S. women, traditionally the stronger of the U.S. ski teams, is even more dismal. "Our girls right now," said Jim Tracy, a coach with the men's downhill team, "are a case of the walking-

wounded." Debbie Armstrong, who won the women's downhill gold medal at Sarajevo, is out because of a non-skiing injury. Her back she suffered in 1985. She has been replaced by Sara McKinney, the only U.S. woman to win the overall World Cup championship (1983) and a bronze medalist in the combined in the 1985 world championships, has been sidelined by a mild, boot-top fracture, although she is expected to be racing again before the Olympics begin.

And Eva Twardowska, bronze medalist in the giant slalom in the 1985 world championships, tore up her knee in a crash at Vail, Colo., recently and will be out for the season.

"As if that casually fell was not enough, on Saturday the women's team lost downhiller Tori Pillinger, a five-year team veteran, when she

crashed into the finish gate during a super-giant slalom at Luukerbad, Switzerland, and broke her thigh bone.

Several U.S. team coaches interviewed here admit U.S. team chances for the Calgary Olympics in February seem bleak.

Andy Mill, for almost a decade a mainstay of the U.S. team as a downhill specialist, but in his retirement now better known as tennis star Chris Evert's boyfriend, says simply of his successors' chances: "Let's face it: we don't have much this year."

Toe Nädig, the Swiss-born U.S. men's downhill coach, places the blame, in part, on the so-called "star system" of past teams in which, he claimed, all the attention of U.S. officials and coaches focused on the Mahres while the development of younger skiers was neglected.

This "system," he said, has changed, although three years of development work have been "lost." And, he says, it will take two or three years to build a strong team.

But Swiss-born men's coach Paul Capaul insists his team cannot be written off for Calgary, especially by McGrath, whom he considers "superb athlete," gains confidence before the Olympics by placing high in a few of the World Cup events next month.

"There is a lot of pressure on the team because everyone is saying it is bad," Capaul said. "We don't say we have to prove we are a legitimate team. We train as well as any nation in the world, work hard and sk hard. At some point, it is going to pay off for us."

Prospects for Olympics uncertain following Korea elections

LONDON (AP) — The International Olympic Committee is watching with special interest to see how the victory by the government-backed candidate in South Korea's presidential election will affect the 1998 Olympics in Seoul.

The committee declined comment Thursday on the election.

"It is up to the Koreans to decide for their future," Michel Verdier, the IOC spokesman, said. "We must now wait for future developments."

The Olympics in the South Korean capital became a key point in the campaign, which ended Wednesday.

Roh Tae-woo, who had been handicapped by President Chun Doo-hwan as his successor, was leading the race with all but a few votes counted Thursday. Opposition leaders were charging vote fraud and calling for demonstrations to block Roh taking power.

At a news conference in Seoul, Roh said he would keep trying to persuade communist North Korea to take part in the Games. The North has threatened to lead a socialist boycott unless its co-host demands are met.

The North Koreans said before the election that their demand would likely get a more favorable reaction from opposition candidates.

In a telephone interview from IOC headquarters in Lausanne, Switzerland, Verdier said the committee's next task would be to await word from the North on its latest proposal.

"That will not be until the end of the year or the very beginning of January," he said.

In Moscow, a Soviet Union official said no decision had been made on the nation's participation in the Games.

Gennadi I. Gerasimov, head of the Foreign Ministry Information Department, was asked at a government news briefing if the results of the South Korean election would affect Soviet participation.

Gerasimov declined to comment

and that a settlement would be very difficult to reach after the deadline for nations to respond to Olympic invitations.

Verdier said 110 of the 167 IOC's member nations have said they would go to Seoul. None of the responses have come from East bloc countries, he said.

"I don't think they will make any move until the Soviet Union decides its plans," the spokesman said. "I don't expect any news before the beginning of January."

Following four joint meetings between North and South Korea, the IOC last July offered the North the authority and a table tennis tournaments, women's volleyball, a men's cycling road race and some soccer preliminaries. The North said it wanted the entire soccer tournament plus some other events.

Tomba can make history in just his third World Cup season by winning in the specialties he likes most — a giant slalom and a slalom scheduled in the Yugoslav resort Saturday and Sunday.

"I am in top form, with a great morale. I can do it. But I would not be upset if I fail. Certainly I can't keep this pace for the entire season. I will have to slow down in January to save some condition for the Olympics in Calgary next February," Tomba said.

Tomba did not win a race last season. His best result was a second-place finish in a giant slalom in Val Bida.

Edwards: BYU may readmit expelled football star Molini

PROVO, Utah (AP) — Former Brigham Young tight end Trevor Molini, expelled last winter after being convicted of forging drug prescriptions, has a chance of playing for BYU again, said Coach LaVell Edwards.

Edwards' team doctors at the university will consider Molini's case next month.

"I don't know exactly what his status is as far as the university is concerned, but there is a chance of him coming back," said Edwards. "Some time in January, I expect the university will address the whole situation."

Molini was knocked unconscious by a boncer in the parking lot of a Reno bar last spring. Tuesday, he was awarded nearly \$1 million.

District Judge Jerry Whitehead granted the damages against Ken Shamrock, the boncer at the Premier Club.

Doctors initially told Molini his football career was over, but now, "they all say he can play," said Edwards. "We've got a lot of (medical) records that he sent up from his doctors. When we get back from the (All-American) bowl, our team doctors will evaluate the

situation."

"A lot of doctors have looked into it. I went to some neurosurgeons — and they all feel I can play. Molini said recently from his home in Sparks, Nev. "The only thing one of them was worried about was if my helmet knocked off and I got dead in the forehead, but that's really unlikely."

Molini said team doctors at the University of Nevada-Reno already have cleared him to play football there, where he is a part-time student, moment, Molini is a part-time student at UNR and a local community college.

Molini said he wants to play football again. "If I can't get into BYU again, then I'll try to enter the (National Football League) draft next spring," he said. "Or maybe I could try out as a free agent. I just need a doctor to give me clearance."

Molini expects to pass a sophomore on Monday at last season. He entered a drug rehabilitation center last winter because of addiction to the painkiller Percodan.

"I think I have things squared away," he said. "Living by (BYU's) standards won't be difficult for me now."

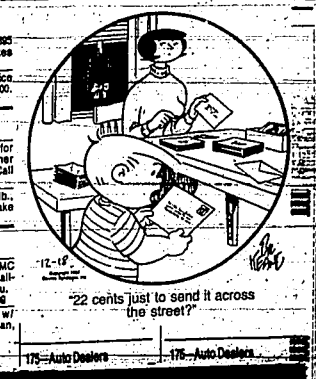

Teater's Knoll: Idaho's Frank Lloyd Wright home envisioned as spot of interest

BLISS — When Henry Whiting II moved to Ketchum in the late 1970s, he was both dismayed and excited by what he learned about the impact of his favorite architect, Frank Lloyd Wright, in the state.

Dismayed, because he found that despite Wright's national reputation as an architect, there was only one Wright structure in Idaho.

But Whiting was excited to learn that it was close, a studio house in tiny Bliss, within an easy drive of Ketchum.

Exploring the overgrown property that summer of 1977, Whiting's interest mounted. Like some enormous hawk in flight, he found the house projecting over a cliff high above the Snake River.

Yet, the home seemed unoccupied. It was surrounded by a chain-link fence topped with barbed wire. The curtains were drawn tight. Not exactly an inviting welcome.

Three years later, the young landscape architect inquired if the home might be for sale. A response that the price was a half million dollars cooled his enthusiasm for the moment.

But events have a way of coming around. In 1982, Whiting got a call from an area realtor, who told him the Frank Lloyd Wright house had recently come on the market.

Within a couple of months, he had made a bid at far less than the asking price, closed the sale and was the new owner of a Frank Lloyd Wright studio house in as remote a place as a Wright structure has ever been located.

Since then, a step at a time, Whiting has improved both the house and its visibility among Wright's many students and admirers.

This fall, for example, he gave a lecture on the house to students at the University of Idaho. Some 400 people attended.

In October, an article on the home appeared in Home Magazines, the first in an architectural magazine and virtually the only reference ever to the studio house beyond regional publications and newspapers.

Now, the visibility will undoubtedly take another leap with publication this fall of Whiting's book on the Wright house, called *Teater's Knoll: Frank Lloyd Wright's Idaho Legacy*. (Northwood Institute Press, Midland, Mich. 49840)

Book review

Written with former Idaho State and Boise State professor Robert G. Watter, Whiting's book is a detailed account of the house's concept, construction, decline and renewal. It's Wright's many admirers, it will provide the first look at what has been essentially an unknown structure.

Built in the late 1950s as a studio retreat for Idaho artist Archie Teater and his wife Patricia, the home is about 2,000-square-feet, small by standards of a Wright house. It is not nearly as big as the famous Wright homes which can be found throughout the suburban Chicago area, many of which date from the early 1900s.

But as a Wright design, the house shares traits with the better-known Wright efforts: an integration of the home design into its natural setting; a functionality and simplicity which came to be known as "form follows function" in architectural development, and a reliance on natural lighting and materials indigenous to the area.

In his early years, Wright developed what became known as "Prairie Style" architecture in which the building seemed to rise directly out of the landscape. The style featured low, single-story roofs; cantilevered overhangs; natural light through large windows on the south exposure and expansive patios and gardens.

Most were in the Midwest and Wright's reputation has thus been as one of America's first "native" architects. As in literature with Thoreau and in poetry with Whitman, Wright's work came to represent an important contribution to distinctively American architecture, which had shed its connection to a Europe then dominated by Romanesque and Victorian styles.

It might be said that the simple Western ranch house, of which there are relatively few remaining, represents a distinctive "Western" style of architecture in our part of the country. In its many applications, it is a form which allowed adaptation to the high mountain or rugged prairie environment.

Similarly, the Teater studio house reflects the close relationship of design to location.

It is laid out in a parallelogram form with one of the

points thrusting beyond the crag's edge, about 200 feet above the Snake River. Big Eddy and Grand Dad Rapids.

As with many Wright structures, the house's face is toward the natural world. The north side, which faces the road, is an unbroken wall of rock and wood.

The south side faces the river's wild and tumbling soul, and on the opposite bank, the steep bluffs of the lower Hagerman Valley.

The entrance to the home is across a gravel and red-concrete patio which seems to virtually compel the approacher to skirt the cliff's edge and thus force one into the natural world before the human.

There is nothing subtlety about the house and its setting. It is organic architecture in the extreme in which the design, the location and the building materials all suggest the remote, the rugged, the rough-hewn.

Much of the house is of Oakley Stone, set in varied-patterned walls according to Wright's specifications. The mason, Wright specified, was to use stones "of varying thicknesses, occasionally projecting 2-to-3 inches from wall surface."

In texture, the effect would be similar to that of Wright's most famous home, Falling Water in Pennsylvania.

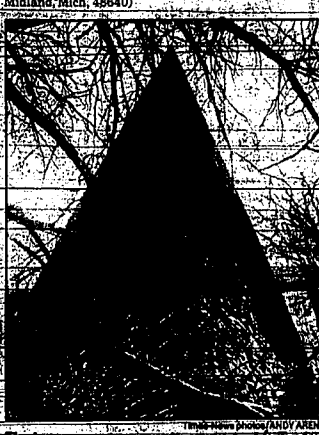
Despite its rugged quality, the Teater studio would never be mistaken for something like a log-cabin home. It has far too much poise for that.

Inside, the Oakley Stone walls give way on two sides of the parallelogram to an array of angled windows, perhaps 100 in all, pulling attention to a view of the river beyond.

Whiting found the home in much disrepair, and has made some changes to the original plan. Inside, for example, both the kitchen and bath were gloomy and dark; he added a patio door in one, a skylight for them both and upgraded the lighting considerably. Outside, he added a small cadenza building of his own design down the face of the cliff to be used as a workshop.

He acknowledges that some Wright purists would gasp at such changes, but he thinks the architect himself would have approved.

 "In short, functions change and so do the forms to serve them." Wright viewed his architecture as evolving, Whiting says.

When he purchased the house in 1982, Whiting says he found an enormous stash of records concerning its construction, including photographs of various stages, blueprint drawings and correspondence between the Testers, mostly Patricia and Frank Wright, engineers and contractors.

These documents formed the basis for the book's early chapters and provide a fascinating look at both the construction and the personalities of those involved.

Wright made his reputation painting Western scenes in Wyoming, Utah and "was, at heart," a Westerner. Patricia, whom he met in Jackson, Wyo., was far less charitable about life in the Hagerman Valley of the 1950s. She went through "countless" contractors, many of whom quit because she was so difficult to work with.

She had once lived in a Wright home in the Midwest and, as she wrote in her first letter to Wright, she had always wanted one of her own. She envisioned a house which would inspire.

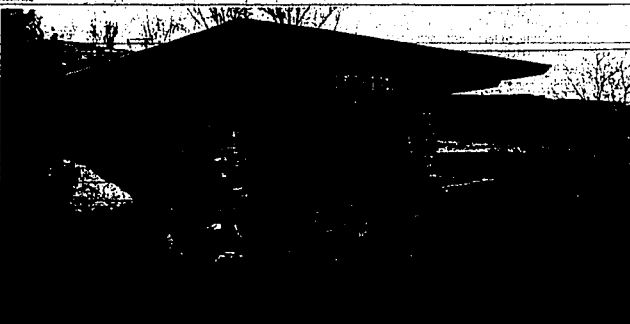
"Idaho is art poor," she wrote. "Our studio would draw visitors from the entire state and beyond. It would be a symbol. It would mean so much to those who never believed in anything beyond their daily grind."

"Fear still grips so many here," she said, in a comment which might be echoed today. "Fear of the cities, other ideas, of anything out of the range of a few hours driving... There is much money in the state, but no vision. Hence, nothing of beauty from stone, steel or wood."

Patricia wrote that the Testers envisioned a house which would be "a spot of interest to humanity" but the book outlines how their idea deteriorated into petty bickering with local businessmen and contractors. By the 1970s, the Testers had retreated to California and came to

Idaho only rarely. The house soon began to show the effects of disrepair.

It was with some trepidation that Whiting contacted some of the original contractors in 1983, to modernize the home.

Among them was Kent Hale of Oakley, the mason who had done much of the original rock work. Hale returned to work on the project and his work has given it much of its distinctive character today.

Whiting says his own intent is to

maintain and develop the house to be what the Testers envisioned, a "spot of interest to humanity."

He also hopes to revive interest in Wright's work, who he thinks was somewhat out of the mainstream of world architectural development in this century, perhaps because his work was "truly indigenous to America."

He has also taken steps to overcome the poor relationships Patricia left behind. The barbed wire is gone from the fence and he has taken an

interest in community issues such as the Tacoma Dam proposal, which would flood the Snake River canyon at Bliss.

In time, he says, he may open the home for occasional tours by groups interested in Wright's work and by students of landscape and architecture. *Testers' Knoll* will be an important point of introduction to that familiarity. It is available for \$32,500 at area bookstores, including Judi's in Twin Falls and Ex Libris in Sun Valley.

Artist lectures on glass blowing art

SUN VALLEY — Glass worker Dale Chihuly will be in Sun Valley to give a lecture Dec. 27, at 5 p.m. in the Southwest Room, adjacent to the Sun Valley Inn. He will be at the Sun Valley Center gallery Monday, Dec. 28, from 5 to 8 p.m., for the opening of his exhibit of new work being shown there.

Dale Chihuly has been called a "rule-breaking American original" who has pushed glassblowing far beyond craft into radically new artistic directions.

From the time that Chihuly blew his first piece of glass in his Seattle studio in 1965, his dedication to the medium has been absolute. He was the first American to study traditional glassblowing at the Venini Glass Factory in Venice. Four years

later, he founded the Pilchuck School in Stanwood, Wash., where he has taught young glass artists for 15 years.

Chihuly has been the recipient of many awards and honors in his 20-year career in glass. He has recently received honorary doctorates from the University of Puget Sound and RISD. In 1984, he shared the Washington State Governor's Art Award with Pilchuck and in 1985, he was honored with the Washington State Governor's Award of Commendation. Last year, he received the Governor's Award from Rhode Island for his contributions to the artistic life of that state.

Fame hasn't changed feisty actress Matlin's zest for life

LOS ANGELES — When Marlee Matlin won the Academy Award last March, her on-camera and backstage remarks proved to public and press that she is a vivacious, even feisty young woman with a zest for life.

Worldwide fame hasn't changed the deaf actress. Ask her if she is still going with her "Children of a Lesser God" co-star and sweetheart, William Hurt, she bristles and responds with flashing fingers.

"I could ask you about your wife. I'm a person who is very independent, and I can say that I'm a person who is very happy at this point."

Matlin is appearing this month in the first film since her victory as best actress of 1986 for "Lesser God." It's a Universal release, "Walker," a Central American adventure of the mid-1800s. She plays the wife of William Walker, a real-life American soldier of fortune who ruled Nicaragua for two years as president. Ed Harris appears as Walker.

In an interview at her agent's office, the 22-year-old actress described her role through the rapid-

fire interpreting of Jack Jason: "The woman is Ellen Walker, who was, I imagine, about 25 years old, perhaps older. She is based on a true character, a woman who is deaf but did speak, though somewhat vaguely. She was a woman

who was very brilliant, and she kept a lot to herself. She was not an open person, but she was not a vulnerable person, either. She was just very strong-willed.

"She is different from Sarah (in "Lesser God"). Sarah was a very angry person. She was very private — private with her thoughts and about her past. Ellen Matlin, on the other hand, shared her thoughts with William Walker. The two women are the same in that they are hearing-impaired."

"There are different kinds of hearing-impaired people, you know. There are just as many differences as between people who can hear."

In her first two films, Matlin has co-starred with two strong actors, Hurt and Harris. She reflected on working with them:

"They're two entirely different artists. They have different approaches to their styles. William Hurt as well as Ed Harris have backgrounds of acting training."

"I did not go to acting school. I work as an actress very spontaneously. I would like to go to acting school sometime, to learn different techniques, tricks of the trade, different mental states when it comes to acting."

Matlin was born in Morton Grove, Ill., the youngest of three children. At 18 months she was stricken with the "high fever" of measles, also known as baby measles, which destroyed most of her hearing.

Her parents resisted sending her to a school for deaf children; instead she took special programs in public schools. As a result, she spent much of her time with hearing children and has recalled that she grew up "very outgoing, gregarious and wild."

When she was 8 years old, she played Dorothy in "The Wizard of Oz" at Chicago's Center on Deafness. That led to other plays, but she quit acting in high school to repair her indifferent study habits. After graduating, she studied criminal justice at the William Rainey Harper College in Palatine, Ill. Her aim was to fight for the rights of the deaf.

That goal was interrupted after she played the role of Lydia in "Children of a Lesser God" at the Immediate Theater Company in Chicago. An agent spotted her, and she was invited to audition for the film version in Hollywood. To her surprise, she was tested for the role

of Sarah, not Lydia. A test with William Hurt and director Randa Haines won her the leading role.

She talked about the night she won the Oscar:

"It is something I'll never forget for the rest of my life. It was somewhat of a shock, because I recall at the age of 8 thinking about the Oscar and being onstage. It was a great feeling, because people had

the opportunity to see me as an individual and as an actress. It was one moment I could share with them."

At the Oscars, she commented that she felt she could play a wide range of roles. "Walker" helps prove that, she believes. Next she will star in a CBS movie, "Bridges to Silence," playing a deaf woman whose mother tries to gain custody of the woman's baby.

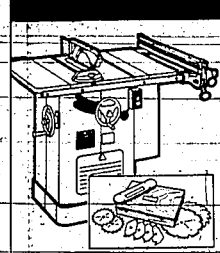

Conference forms musical link with childhood development

NEW YORK (AP) — Musical games and soft lullabies may do a lot more than occupy children's attention on the Christmas holidays.

Researchers and educators have found that children in cultures rich with music tend to develop learning and communication skills more quickly than other youngsters.

A conference at the University of Colorado at Denver earlier this year focused on the relationship between child and child development. Organizers called the gathering a first on the subject.

Topics discussed at the conference included studies of children from musical cultures; the relationship between music and language and the role of children's spontaneous singing and playing in their development.

John Blacking, professor of social anthropology at the Queen's University of Belfast, Northern Ireland, has studied children of the Venda people of South Africa. Music is part of the social structure and plays a major role in Venda society, he said, with children singing 5-tone and 6-tone songs with complicated rhythms at an early age.

"I'm talking about a society where music was pervasive, all through it, at all intervals — a society where music was fun," he said in an interview.

"One thing everybody agrees on is that these children were extremely bright, extremely fluent in languages. When children get musical opportunities, it helps their emotional development, language skills and other qualities."



Recordings put a first-class beat in Beethoven's birthday

If you have been thinking of getting yourself a present for Beethoven's 217th birthday, which was this Wednesday, there is no shortage of first-class recordings.

Currently high on my list of favorites are two recordings of his piano concertos, played on grand instruments, with Anthony Newman as fortepiano soloist and Stephen Simon conducting the Philharmonia Antiqua of London.

The series is now 60 percent complete, with concertos 1, 3 and 5 available on Newport Classic compact discs, and the performances sound as excellent, taking full advantage of the special flavor of old instruments in their original condition.

Two of the three recordings issued so far also take advantage of the special facilities of compact discs. The First and Fifth concertos, as announced in the program notes, are "analytically indexed"—that is, such musical-logical arcs as expositions, developments, recapitulations and codas are catalogued in the program notes and can be tracked throughout the composition via the readout panel of your CD player.

Thus, when the first theme of the "Emperor" Concerto segues smoothly into the second theme at 1:51 of the first movement, the numbers on the panel help interpret what the loudspeakers are telling you ears.

This is a superb idea, enhancing clarity of perception for serious-minded listeners without intruding on those who just want to hear the music. The idea was apparently developed after Concerto No. 3 had already been issued, but we can expect to see it on the other four concertos and hope to see it later in other works that deserve serious, analytical treatment.

Newman, better known as an organist, is also an excellent pianist. He reminds me of the late Glenn Gould in his combination of intense intelligence and dazzling technique, though his manner is less eccentric, his phrasing less angular and his choices of tempo less extreme. Simon is well known in Washington as the conductor of the Handel Festival Orchestra.

In the past decade, we have seen him grow as a conductor—not so much in technique and scholarly preparation, where he has always been first-class, but in stylistic flexibility and emotional nuance. Their

collaboration in this music is memorable.

The concertos all come with interesting fillers: Mozart's Fantasy in C minor, K. 475, with the Concerto No. 3 in C minor (NG-9007); the "Egmont" Overture with the "Emperor" Concerto (NG-8002); and the Choral Fantasy with the Concerto No. 1 (NC-6003). These discs are brief by current CD standards (45 minutes or less), but the performance and sound are excellent.

Also on old-instruments and (on the whole) beautifully played is the latest installment in the series of symphonies being recorded by Christopher Hogwood and the Academy of Ancient Music (Oiseau-Lyre 417 815-2).

The sound is robust in Symphonies No. 4 and 5, though the orchestra numbers fewer than 60 players, and the instruments are tuned lower than the current standard. Sometimes the tempo seems a bit fast, but never faster than the composer's own metronome markings. Hogwood has restudied the symphonies and he makes them sound fresh and new.

A choice between old instruments and modern ones, a small orchestra and a large one, has to be made ultimately on personal taste. There is

an undeniable excitement in the new Beethoven Ninth performed by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and chorus with four excellent soloists, and Sir Georg Solti on the podium (London 417 800-2); and it is all the more exciting because Solti approaches the music with a commendable restraint, tailoring his orchestra's almost terrifying power to an appropriate scale.

The Chicago Symphony not only outnumbers the Academy of Ancient Music; its players rank somewhat higher on the virtuosity scale. So do the members of the Cleveland Orchestra in a superb new "Pastorale" Symphony, conducted by Christoph von Dohnanyi and coupled with "Leonore" Overture No. 3 on Telarc CD-80145.

On the Hogwood record, a moment or two of imprecise technique is more than an hour of music-making is just as "authentic" as the use of gut strings or the observance of every repeat marked in the score and a couple that were accidentally omitted in the first edition. All of these records meet high standards.

On "Harmonia Mundi" (MCA-90619), Robert Taub, a brilliant young American pianist, has had the interesting idea of recording Beethoven's first and last piano sonatas together.

There is a sharp contrast between the self-assured exhibitionism of Op. 2 and the serenely won tranquility of Op. 11. But both are permeated by the work of the same man; and Taub's skilled performance emphasizes the continuities in that music as well as the contrasts.

The sonatas that come between these two are not exactly suffering neglect—British pianist Bernard

Roberts is midway through a complete recording for Nimbus Records. His fifth volume (NI 5054) contains the three sonatas of Op. 10 (Nos. 5, 6 and 7), while his Volume 6 (NI 5056) offers Sonatas No. 11 in B-flat, No. 15 in D and No. 20 in G.

There is a special interest, perhaps, in Op. 10, some of the last music the 28-year-old composer produced before becoming aware that he was losing his hearing.

Christmas videos brighten season

Gian Carlo Menotti's "Amahl and the Night Visitors" was the first opera composed specifically for television and it's a natural for home video. The original 1951 production was preserved on film; but Menotti has tried in vain to track down a copy of it in recent years.

An outstanding substitute, with the added advantage of color, was filmed for television in 1978 (partly on location in Israel) and is now available from Video Arts International (Beta-29032 or VHS-69032) with an international cast that includes Teresa Stratas and Giorgio Tozzi.

There is also a fine new audio-only version, based on the Covent Garden production, recorded under the composer's supervision and issued by MCA on a compact disc (MCAD-6218).

In the rapidly growing category of Christmas video material, these titles also deserve special mention: "Carols for Christmas (Pioneer LaserDisc PA-86-178). This is arguably the most beautiful of all Christmas carol records—not so much for the singing and the selection of material, which are merely very good, but for its visual dimension.

Each carol coming through the loudspeakers is accompanied on the video screen by thematically relevant images from the collections in the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Sources for the visuals range from Raphael, El Greco and Rubens to Victorian carols and posters.

The music is provided by a small chorus and brass ensemble, tastefully directed by Sir David Willcocks and filmed in the cathedral of Bury St. Edmunds, England. Specially worth noting are the solos by the remarkable boy treble, Aled Jones. LaserDisc, the survivor in the battle of video disc formats, gives superbly sharp video images as well as digital stereo sound.

—Messiah (Pioneer PA-86-174, two LaserDiscs). In its audio edition, this performance, conducted by Christopher Hogwood with the choir of Westminster Abbey and an orchestra on original instruments, has already become a best seller.

—The video edition, enhanced by the visual ambience of Westminster Abbey and some exquisite close-ups of the performers, is well worth seeing as well as hearing.

—The New Born King (Video Arts International, Beta 29034; VHS 69034). This festival of carols opens with a solemn, well-photographed procession in Westminster Cathedral (not to be confused with the Abbey) and includes Aled Jones among the soloists as well as baritone Benjamin Luxon and mezzo-soprano Brian Jones. Emily Williams is also on hand, not to sing but to give some thematically apt readings from Victorian novels.

—The enchanting "L'Entrée du Christ" of Hector Berlioz, a composition somewhere between opera and oratorio, captures the wonder of the Christmas story with a unique tenderness and awe.

Live performances are relatively

rare, though the Montgomery Chamber Orchestra will give two next weekend. An excellent recording, not yet available in video though it was originally produced for British television, has been issued on ASV CD DCD 482, two CDs with libretto. An outstanding English cast and the English Chamber Orchestra are conducted by Philip Ledger.

Those who enjoyed Benita Valente's recital here a few weeks ago will want to hear "Gloria! Gloria! (RCA 6659-2-RC), an excellent collection of Christmas songs in German, Latin, Italian and (mostly) all English, chosen with exquisite taste, well performed and neatly balancing the familiar with the unfamiliar.

On another RCA record, "Christmas with Mario Lanza," (6427-2-RG) the selections (recorded between 1950 and 1958) are mostly quite standard, though a few ("Guardian Angels" for example with a harp solo by Harpo Marx) are deservedly unfamiliar.

Baby steals the scene from 3 handsome yuppie bachelors

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. The ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

THREE MEN AND A BABY (PG) — What we have here is an Americanization of Coline Serreau's "Three Men and a Cradle." Serreau's movie was fairly frothy, and this one is frothier still. The people who made it carry over much of the original's weightless, sweet-tempered flavor. Any movie in which Steve Guttenberg plays the sensitive guy would seem to be in big, big trouble — it is like casting Fred MacMurray as a heartbroken poet. But director Leonard Nimoy has the knack for relationships the writers seem to lack. And Tom Selleck seems here to find his true movie métier: the relaxed bachelor camaraderie here almost echoes the tongue-in-cheek ambience on "Magnum P.I." Without the baby, of course, the three men would be lost on their own set.

CINDERELLA (G) The animated version of Perrault's classic fairy tale contains some of the most enchantingly magical moments the Disney artists ever created, and some of the most stolidly cardboard ones. The contrasts between the very realistic heroine, here somewhat cartoonish, and the fantasy world inhabited by the friendly mice and birds are somewhat jarring, but even the most jaded viewer will find a lump in his throat when the Fairy Godmother turns Cinderella's rags into a shimmering ballgown.

FATAL ATTRACTION (R) For much of its length, this movie waters between giving us an absorbing battle of the sexes — a true psychological shocker about a scorned woman systematically persecuting the married man who ditched her, after a clandestine fling — and one more formula revenge story. At the end, sadly, the formula wins. Glenn Close's subtly detailed, terrifyingly passionate obsessive turns the movie into bloody predictability. Before they close and Michael

Douglas — and director Adrian Lyne — wind the tension up tight, there is real heat under Lyne's usual glare. The scariest moments here come not from violence, but from flickering moments of everyday pathology pushed to the limit.

LEONARD PART 6 (PG) In this grim miteh-mash, top-heavy with production values but short on humor, Bill Cosby plays a superspy turned San Francisco restaurateur who comes out of retirement to foil a crazed ecologist (John Foster) who has a magic sphere capable of turning animals, even house pets, into killers. With Tom Courtenay, Moses Gunn, Victoria Rowell, Pat Colbert,

NUTS (R) Concerning the ageless social dilemmas of "Who decides someone else is nuts?" — producer/star Barbra Streisand has bitten off a huge chunk of social commentary, perhaps too large. Luckily for her, both she and co-star Richard Dreyfuss lavish great savage exchanges on each other (and the audience), and in the rip-roaring fight from them and the stellar supporting ensemble, much of the film's stridency is muffed and even enriched.

PLANES, TRAINS AND AUTOMOBILES (R) Writer-director John

Hughes has made his film a catalog of worst travel experiences, but the movie's humor comes from Steve Martin's fastidious and a Siamese cat, trying to get away from curtain-ring salesman John Candy, who is actually the more resourceful traveler. The film is schizoid. It is best when Hughes turns the screen over to these two masters of physical humor, who are sometimes priceless, but not often enough to save the great patches based on the humor of abuse, which either sit well with you or leaves you detached and even mildly offended.

'Overboard' panders to the poor

If there's an amnesia movie worse than "Overboard," it elips my mind.
Goldie Hawn and significant other Kurt Russell co-star in this inverted Cinderella story, a deeply banal farce that pooh-poos the idle rich (who won't see it) as it panders to the noble poor (who should save their money). It features one-dimensional characters, a good long look at Hawn's buttocks and lots of pathetic sex jokes.
The skimpily clad, elfin midlifer Hawn plays heiress Joanna Stayton, a perpetually bored, pampered, spoiled of a money bucket. She and her feignish husband (Edward Herrmann) have docked their yacht for emergency repairs — the remodeling of a closet. Little does she know she is about to find true happiness scrubbing floors.
Russell — whose performance is this movie's only

virtue — is Old Spice manly in his role as Dean, a kindly hammet-shaped carpenter who is tossed overboard with his tools when Joanna deems her closet unsatisfactory. She and her husband, put to sea, Joanna falls overboard and like many a soap opera diva, gets amnesia.
Dean tricks Joanna into believing she's his wife Annie and the mother of his four sons — country-style juvenile delinquents who turn out to be Campbell's Soup kids underneath it all. After a lot of cooking, cleaning and mending, the irritable heiress becomes the perfect wife and a peachy mom. And for just a few scenes, the caricatures become flesh and blood and the movie a lovely one.
Russell and Hawn play off their comfortable real-life chemistry — in these late scenes, but the filmmakers — director Garry Marshall of "Nothing in Common" and writer Leslie Dixon of "Outrageous Fortune" — cheapen them with "Porky's"-style dialogue.

'Christmas comes to Willow Creek' brings nostalgia and holiday cheer

The appeal of "Christmas Comes to Willow Creek," a CBS movie airing Sunday, Dec. 20, is that it's the first vehicle in which John Schneider and Tom Wopat have co-starred since the demise of "The Dukes of Hazzard" in 1985.

That series, in case you don't remember, starred the pair as Bo and Luke Duke, country cousins who tore up the backroads of Hazzard County in a souped-up Charger nicknamed the General Lee. The flimsy plots were fleshed out with spectacular car crashes, cheesecake from cousin Daisy, folk wisdom from Uncle Jesse and bumbling by Enos and Boss Hogg, strung together with some fine banjo picking and narrator Waylon Jennings' down-home drawl.

Now, "Willow Creek" brings back the two actors in a scenario that at first sounds like a virtual reprise of "Dukes." Wopat and Schneider, now playing brothers, cruise through woods of the Pacific Northwest in an 18-wheel tractor trailer, backed by the kind of mainstream country music that has provided both actors with successful second careers. They are bringing Christmas gifts to the impoverished village of Willow Creek, Alaska, the hometown of their fatherly friend Bensinger (Hoyt Axton), who is now in a wheelchair.

"I don't worry about the comparison too much," says Tom Wopat. "And neither does John. We just figured we'll take advantage of the publicity this provides us, and at the same time show that we have a greater range than the 'Dukes' role let on."

Both of them have insisted that "Willow Creek" isn't a reunion movie in disguise. And, believe it or not, they are right. The movie is an inspirational holiday fantasy, owing less to "Dukes" than to standard holiday movies such as "Houston Knights."

Wopat and Schneider, buddies on "Dukes," here play out a feud that began when Ray (Schneider) married Jessie (Kim Delaney), an old girlfriend of Pete's (Wopat). But that was a while back. Ray is now divorced, and Pete, a widower, has

a teen-age son, Mike (Zachary Ansley). Their rig is a borrowed vehicle, and the brothers are committed to bringing their truckload of joy to Alaska unharmed. Smash-ups, arguably the most interesting part of "Dukes," are strictly accidental here.

But "Dukes," for all its faults, never took itself too seriously, and "Willow Creek" is laden with ponderous themes and heavy-handed symbolism. Pete, the "reckless" brother, eyes the boss's secretary,

but remembers the joy of monogamy when he sees his estranged wife give birth to a son. Ray, the "serious" brother, listens to opera in the cab, naturally alienating brother Pete, a country fan; and son Mike, a heavy-metal head, right down to his leather pants and brass knuckles. And Willow Creek's resident Santa Claus (Antony Holland) climbs the town water tower, refusing to come down until his neighbors—gifts or no gifts—get the holiday spirit.

The movie ends with reconciliations, good feelings, holiday cheer and brotherly love, as the truck reaches its destination. It is meant to be inspiring, but "Christmas Comes to Willow Creek" inspires little more than nostalgia for the good old days, when "Dukes" would wrap up a story with a head-on collision and a cloud of dust.

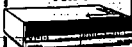

McClanahan portrays high society in adaptation of 'Little Match Girl'

Rita McClanahan knew from the outset that she'd probably be upstaged by 8-year-old Emilia Knight Fullerton when they set out to do "The Little Match Girl" (Monday on NBC).

Young William, better known as Billy Hamilton on "The Cosby Show," gets the title role in a story loosely based on Hans Christian Andersen's fairy tale but set in New England during the 1920s.

She plays Molly, a homeless orphan who is peddling her matches on Christmas Eve when she meets playboy Neville Dutton (William Youmans), the younger son in a wealthy and powerful family, and is invited to the Dutton mansion.

There she learns that despite the facade of holiday fun and feasts, the family has a sad side: Haywood Dutton has just sold some land that will leave several families homeless; a move that his estranged son Joe (Jim Metzler), a newspaperman, plans to reveal in print.

Before she's done, Molly offers the Duttons the gift of reconciliation, managing to get the family to repair its damaged and unraveled relationships.

"It's mostly just a very vague resemblance to 'The Little Match Girl,'" noted McClanahan. "That's a very sad story: the little match girl freezes to death. Our little match girl is an angel from heaven and then she disappears. At the end, she's gone. It's a real fairy tale."

McClanahan plays Frances, the wife of powerful and conservative Haywood Dutton (William Daniels of "St. Elsewhere"), whose disapproval of their son's wife — "poor white trash from the other side of the tracks," McClanahan said — has left a schism in the family.

"We made my character old-fashioned," explained McClanahan, "a woman who had grown up in the Victorian era and had retained that in her hairstyle and her manner and somewhat in the cut of her clothing/her whole demeanor."

McClanahan also invented profiles of her characters to explain to herself how Frances Dutton came to

be so cowed by her husband. "She's a nice woman, and she's not a wimp. I found it very difficult to walk that middle ground, when you're not playing someone flamboyant. It's very difficult to play someone straight. I much prefer playing someone self-centered."

So in McClanahan's mind, Frances Dutton slips out occasionally to visit her son and daughter-in-law and grandson, and to bring them Christmas gifts.

Creating a background to help understand one's character is something that stage-trained actors often do, she explained. "It's something I always do. When I started out (in television), it wasn't common, but the New York stage-trained actor learns to do this. In fact, on 'The Little Match Girl,' Halie Foote, who plays daughter-in-law Mary Margaret Dutton, works that way.

"There's that kind of break in a family's fabric for people who are ostracized because of something that the father disapproved of," McClanahan said.

Her own family, on the other hand, is a close one: Her 29-year-old son, Mark Thomas Bish, a guitarist, lives not far from her in Southern California; and so do two of her four nieces and nephews. In fact, she said that Rita McClanahan's very

name is testimony to family influence. She was known as Eddi-Rue until she was 21 and graduated from the University of Tulsa, about 200 miles from her hometown of Healdton, Okla.

"When my mother was pregnant, my Aunt Winona talked my mother into making an agreement that they would name one another's first born. So Winona did. She named me after her brother (William Edwin) and my mother (Dreda Rheua-Nell), and then a year and half later she had a daughter, and my mother named her Earla Sue. When she was about 15, she dropped the 'Earla.'"

As a high-school senior, McClanahan ventured to far-off Washington, D.C., to look at colleges.

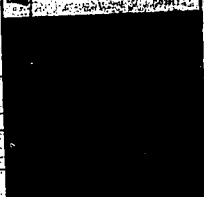

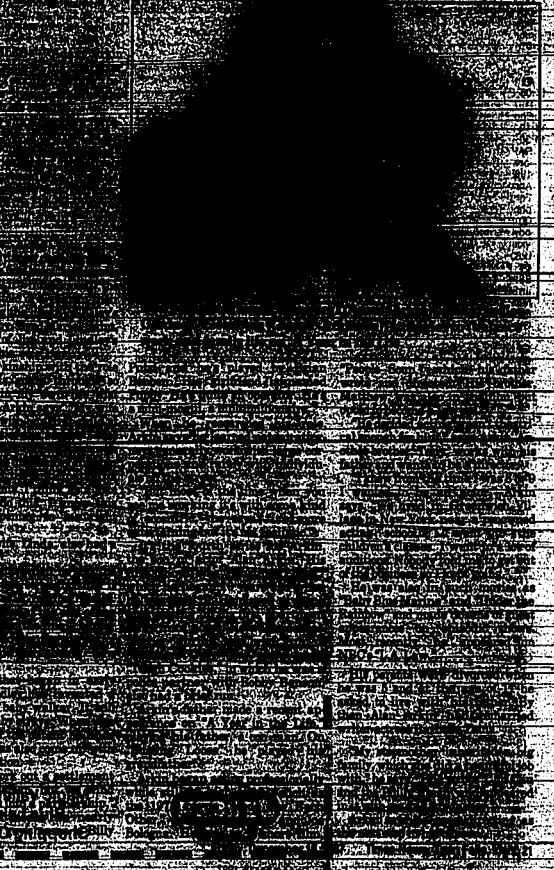

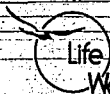

NBC announces two new series

WASHINGTON — NBC Entertainment Monday announced two new series for its Friday night schedule and the "flipflop" of "Hunter" and "J.J. Starbuck" from their current timeslots on Saturday and Tuesday, respectively.

Headed for the Old Series Home after its Friday, Jan. 15, broadcast will be "Private Eye." "Rags to Riches" will leave the 8 p.m. Friday timeslot after Jan. 22.

Premiering at 10 on Friday, Feb. 12, will be "Scopy Spoon," an action-adventure series starring Mario Van Peebles as "an unorthodox but savvy detective."

Premiering Friday, March 4 at 8 p.m. will be "The Highwayman," starring Sam Jones as "an undercover law enforcer operating out of a high-tech, 18-wheel truck."

"Hunter" will move to Tuesday at 9 p.m. on Dec. 29, while "J.J. Starbuck" shows up on Saturday at 10 on Dec. 26.

Wednesday we'll try to get details about what programs will fill in before the new series arrive.

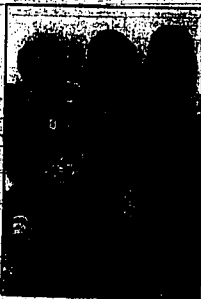
The game ran from 1 p.m. until 4:34 p.m. (Each rating point represents 15,851 local TV homes).

Mike Jensen, chief economic correspondent for NBC News, has signed a new five-year contract with the network. A network spokesman said Monday that Jensen had turned down a bid to be an anchor on the upcoming syndicated program "USA Today."

Mark Shields and David Gergen have joined the "The MacNeill-Lehrer NewsHour" as regular political analysts for the 1988 election year on the nightly PBS series.

Shields, a national political columnist, and Gergen, editor of U.S. News & World Report, will analyze campaign strategies, particularly those of the presidential race.

Shields is a Democratic insider who worked in the presidential campaigns of Robert F. Kennedy, Edmund Muskie and Morris Udall. Gergen was communications director for President Reagan from 1981 through early 1984 and also worked in the Nixon and Ford

administrations.

The Shields-Gergen team, which has had three tryouts on the "NewsHour" recently, signed for a minimum of 88 appearances through November.

CBS News Monday announced that Missis Rennie has been named national editor of CBS News; John Harris has been named London bureau manager; and Michael R. Whitney has been named Miami bureau manager.

Rennie, like Whitney a former senior broadcast producer for "CBS This Morning," replaces Cathy Lasiewicz, who earlier was named senior producer for "48 Hours." Whitney replaces Harris in Miami. Harris replaces Harry Radliff, who returns to New York as a senior producer for "CBS Evening News with Dan Rather." Whew!

ABC's "Good Morning America" has signed Jane Kaplan as its Los Angeles-based entertainment producer. She had been senior segment producer for "Entertainment Tonight" and before that an associate producer with "CBS Morning News" in New York.

Which reminds us, rival wags insist that when ET's Mary Hart co-anchors GMA all next week she's really trying out for Joan Lunden's spot on the show; if and when Lunden defects for a new syndicated show next fall.

The RWs point out that Jack Reilly, executive producer of GMA, used to have the same job at "Entertainment Tonight."

It's tough getting wide awake for those morning network shows, TV Column fans. A couple of years ago, on "CBS Morning News," Phyllis George asked comedian Billy Crystal if Fernando Lamas had ever called him to do a "Fernando" imitation. Only to be informed by Crystal that longtime screen star Lamas had passed away some years previously.

Monday, "CBS This Morning" co-anchor Kathleen Sullivan, interviewing "Wall Street" director Oliver Stone, asked Stone if his father, a Wall Street stockbroker, had helped him with the film. Only to be told, gently, when she persisted, that the senior Stone had passed away a couple of years ago.

John Goodman, a senior producer for "CBS This Morning," said Monday that originally the Stone interview was supposed to be conducted by co-anchor Harry Smith and that at the last minute Sullivan had been handed the research packet on Oliver Stone's background.

"The trouble was, the research was wrong," said Goodman. Stone has dedicated "Wall Street" to the memory of his father, Louis Stone, a dedication that appears at the end of the box office hit starring Michael Douglas and Charlie Sheen.

NBC News has taken vigorous exception to a survey, reported in Monday's TV Column, which stated that "NBC failed to cover a single protest" against Soviet policies between Nov. 30 and Dec. 30, at the conclusion of the Gorbachev-Reagan summit, while ABC and CBS ran 6 stories together on anti-Soviet demonstrations during those same 11 days.

NBC News took even more vigorous exception to a phrase we inserted in the report's language reminding readers that NBC had "lended that exclusive one-on-one interview with General Secretary Gorbachev," a juxtaposition that, to the network, implied that NBC had somehow "backed off" protest stories because of the interview.

NBC News vice president Tim Russert said Monday that "any suggestion that our coverage of human rights protests and reformers has not been extensive is, to say the least, charitably, incorrect. We have carried many reports on protests and will continue to do so."

Woody of "Cheers" has serious side to convert into serious drama

NEW YORK — Woody Boyd, the naive bartender on "Cheers," has moved to new digs this season and taken up acting, giving the actor who plays him, Woody Harrelson, a chance to stretch a little.

"I certainly want to show people that I can do something besides Woody Boyd. I like comedy, and I like making people laugh, but I want to do drama as well," Harrelson said while wolfing down carry-out Chinese food on a recent visit to New York.

Harrelson, 25, has in mind one day, playing a far different role. He'd like to make a movie based on his father's life and play the lead.

His father's life is indeed the stuff of high drama. Charles V. Harrelson spent much of his son's formative years in prison for murder and is now serving consecutive life sentences in a Texas prison for murder and murder conspiracy in the 1979 slaying of U.S. District Judge John Wood Jr.

Harrelson is reluctant to talk about his father, whom he didn't really know until he was grown, not because he's ashamed of him, he explained, but because he's afraid what he says will be misconstrued. He feels strongly that his father was convicted because of his prior prison record and because the FBI was under pressure to find the judge's killer.

"I don't know," he said quietly. "I feel kind of odd talking about Dad, because it's one thing for me to say it and have my personal feelings about it, but it's another thing for it to be read. I haven't done many interviews, but I've done enough to know that when I read it, it never seems to have the same tonality as what I was saying, which is why I've been very frugal when it comes to interviews."

His mother and father divorced when Woody was young, and he moved with his mother from Midland, Texas, to Ohio. He had little contact with his father as a youngster.

"He was injured, so he couldn't write," Harrelson said. "I didn't get close to him until when he was a

senior in high school. He came to Ohio."

Last year, Harrelson stood in for his father in a proxy wedding in Houston.

The government charged that Charles Harrelson was hired to kill Wood by Jamie "Jimmy" Chagra of El Paso, who was to be tried on drug charges by Wood, nicknamed "Maximum John."

Harrelson asserts his father's trial should have been moved to another city.

"It was in the town where the incident happened, in San Antonio which had been saturated with media coverage for a year and a half prior to the trial, and every time you saw my father's name it was convicted hit man Charles (V.) Harrelson." In fact, that's how he signs his letters — "C-H-M-C-V-H." He has a great sense of humor."

Harrelson notes bitterly that Chagra was later acquitted on murder conspiracy charges, yet his father remains in jail.

"As far as I'm concerned," he said, "it's not a dead issue. Ultimately I'm gonna do that movie, I'm gonna play his life."

Harrelson said he wouldn't try to write the movie about his father, because he would want it to be "objective." He has already written

a couple of plays that he hopes to get produced. They aren't exactly comedies, he said.

"I have a great deal of melancholy in my life. There's a lot of sadness, and it comes out in my work. I mean, there's humor there, but there's so much sadness, I think to myself, well, people aren't going to want to see this product."

The melancholy doesn't necessarily refer to his dad's situation.

"Well, I'm sure that maybe that contributes to some degree of sadness," he said, "but when I talk about sadness it's more my perception of the world and the chaotic state that it's in, and the way in which this world is completely run and contaminated by multinational corporations. It's all dreadfully sad."

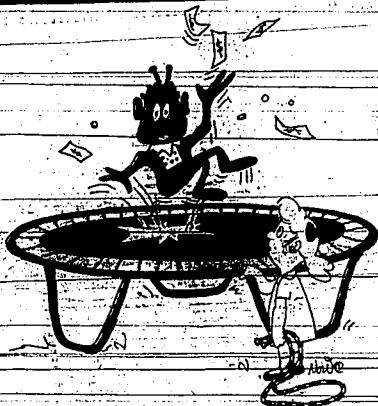
