Twin Falls police nab suspect in Illinois case

Man sought by FBI for threats linked to Aryan Nations

TWIN FALLS — A man wanted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation since December, 1985, for allegedly threatening to kill an Illinois judge was arrested in Twin Falls Wednesday, according to law-enforcement officials.

Andrew Schneider, 52, was arrested by Twin Falls police officers shortly after noon, said Tim Qualls, director of the Twin Falls Department of Public Safety. Schneider was arrested on misdemeanor charges of petty theft and resisting arrest after a security officer reported

witnessing Schneider shoplifting at a local drug store.

Michael Brooks, a special agent with the FBI in Twin Falls, said Schneider was taken to Boise Thursday where he was arraigned before U.S. Magistrate Judge Mikel Williams. Schneider, who police officials have linked with the white-supremacist Aryan Nations organization, was indicted more than two years ago by both state and federal grand juries.

According to federal and state officials in Illinois, the indictments

stemmed from a letter Schneider allegedly wrote and mailed more than two years ago. According to Bob Grooms, FBI spokesman in Springfield, Ill., Schneider threatened in the letter to kill Judge L.E. Ellison of the circuit court of Du-rue County, Ill., as well as members of the Illinois Supreme Court. The letter, signed by Schneider, was received by state supreme court officials on Dec. 3, 1985.

Schneider was indicted on Dec. 16, 1985, on a federal charge of mailing a threatening communication.

Grooms said. Two days prior to that, Schneider had been indicted on state charges of intimidation and threatening a public official, said Marc Bernabei, state's attorney for Bureau County.

"We have been looking for him since 1985," Grooms said. "It's been an extensive investigation."

Jack Narzewski, sheriff of Bureau County, described Schneider as "a very disturbed individual."

Schneider lived in the small town of Lamaille, located in the county's northeast corner, for approximately

16 years before being indicted in 1985, Narzewski said.

"He more or less terrorized a lot of people up there," Narzewski said. "There were a lot of people who were kind of afraid of this guy."

According to Brooks, Schneider will have to be positively identified as occurring in Boise before being sent to Illinois on the outstanding charges. The identity hearing has been scheduled for Jan. 12 at 1 p.m.

"Once they find out it's him, they can pull him on the next plane back with the marshals," Brooks said.

A detention hearing has also been scheduled for 1 p.m. today, at which time Williams will determine whether authorities can continue to hold Schneider in Boise without bond.

Officials said Schneider will probably face the federal charge rather than the state charges upon returning to Illinois.

"We're going to let the feds prosecute him," Bernabei said.

The misdemeanor charges filed against Schneider in Twin Falls will also probably be dropped, according to Qualls.

Soviet pullout Shultz sends favorable sign

WASHINGTON — The United States would cut off military aid to rebel forces before all Soviet troops were withdrawn from Afghanistan, provided the people of that country were free to "take control of their own destiny," Secretary of State George P. Shultz said Thursday.

His statement at a news conference seemed designed to encourage recent moves in Moscow to end its unsuccessful eight-year military occupation. One of the key conditions is an eventual suspension of American military support for the guerrillas who have harassed the Red Army.

The country if the United States is satisfied that independence and freedom for Afghanistan are assured."

If the Red Army pulled out in a peaceful atmosphere, "then you don't have the need for that continued support [and it would cease]," Shultz said.

He said U.S. economic and humanitarian aid to the resistance would be continued.

The war in Afghanistan is one of the points of tension between the United States and the Soviet Union. During a Washington summit last month, President Reagan was unable to get from General Secretary Mikhail S. Gorbachev a commitment to withdraw the estimated 116,000 Soviet troops over a few months' time.

In a pre-summit briefing, two White House officials also indicated U.S. aid to the rebels, which apparently includes potent, shoulder-fired Stinger missiles, would end once the Soviets retreated.

"We look for Soviet agreement to a firm schedule for withdrawal," Shultz said. "We think that schedule must be front-end-loaded so that once it starts there's a certain inevitability to it, thereby no turning back."

Shultz said Afghan refugees, which number more than 2 million or about one-fourth of the country's population, must be part of the process of forming a new government.

But, he said in a conciliatory way, "U.S. military support to the Afghan rebels could be withdrawn before the last Soviet troops are out of

Task force will propose daily limit on price swings of stocks, futures

WASHINGTON — A White House task force studying the October stock market crash will recommend daily limits on price movements of stocks, bonds and futures, a Reagan administration source said Thursday.

The Wall Street Journal, in Thursday's editions, said the study commission would recommend "a radical overhaul" of the government's regulation of the financial markets, including daily limits on price swings.

The Journal's story contrasted with an article in The Los Angeles Times, which said the task force would urge "relatively mild changes" and had rejected limits on price swings.

White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater declined to clear up discrepancies between the two

accounts. But a source who has read the report and spoke on condition of anonymity said the Journal's story was accurate.

In the panicky first days following a 508-point plunge in the Dow Jones industrial average on Oct. 19, President Reagan appointed former Sen. Nicholas P. Brady, R.N.J., to head the five-member Task Force on Market Mechanisms. It is scheduled to deliver its report to Reagan Friday afternoon.

"Price movement limits, which currently exist on the Tokyo Stock Exchange, likely would be opposed by Wall Street traders who say limits would simply drive trading to European and other foreign markets."

Critics also say limits would prevent the market from immediately reflecting real declines in value and could have a "gravitational effect," the theory that once stocks ap-

proach the limit they would keep falling until they hit the limit.

Fitzwater, while declining to reveal the contents of the Brady report, said the Reagan administration will move slowly on whatever recommendations are offered.

At the Securities and Exchange Commission, Chairman David S. Ruder, who was briefed Thursday morning on the contents of the report, also was tight-lipped.

The Brady panel, according to the Journal, also recommended consistent margin or credit requirements for futures and stocks. Currently, buyers must put up at least half the value of a stock in cash-investors in the futures markets can control the equivalent of a block of stocks with a down payment for less than would be required to purchase the underlying securities.

Senator quits camp after clash

RAMALLAH — Occupied West Bank (AP) — Israeli troops Thursday shot and killed a 16-year-old Palestinian and wounded seven other demonstrators during violent protests at two refugee camps in the occupied Gaza Strip, a U.N. official said.

A separate confrontation between stone-throwing youths and soldiers in the West Bank refugee camp of Kalandya forced a U.S. senator to cut short his visit there.

Sen. John Chafee, R-R.I., was forced to leave the West Bank's Kalandya camp near Ramallah soon after his arrival because of a violent confrontation between Israeli soldiers and a group of about a dozen students.

Sen. Chafee gave this report to the AP later in Amman, Jordan, about his experience.

"The students started throwing small stones, followed by bigger ones and then bottles," he said. "Soldiers fired tear gas canisters."

"We were upset at Israeli soldiers who had fired tear gas at the school compound which disrupted school and caused the students to leave."

Jones to offer law paring liability cost

BOISE — Every resident of Idaho averages a tax payment of \$16 per year for what is becoming increasingly expensive liability insurance for local government.

Attorney General Jim Jones and others are proposing a law to reverse effects of a 1986 Idaho Supreme Court ruling that officials expose the state to legal government to huge liability for third-party negligence. It also has sent the cost-of-that insurance soaring.

The goal is to restore the original intent of the Tort Claims Act, said Jim Weatherly, executive director of the Association of Idaho Governmental Officials, the Tort Reform Coalition.

Because of the court decision, governmental agencies now are responsible for actions by others that may cause problems, the officials said.

Jones said a news conference on Thursday he's working on legislation to make it clear that governmental agencies are liable when their negligence causes injury or problems. But when the agency is only indirectly involved, liability will be sharply limited.

The Idaho Trial Lawyers Association quickly criticized the attorney

general's plan, contending it was only a renewed attempt to deny citizens recourse for losses suffered at the hands of negligent governmental agencies. Spokeswoman Vivian Klein pointed out that the same measure was rejected by lawmakers last year and "this reshaped proposal should receive the same fate."

Jones estimated the change could save Idaho taxpayers \$5 million per year, or about \$5 for each resident. Most government agencies add to the property tax bill to pay for liability insurance.

This legislation is designed to restore the original intent of the Tort Reform Act, Jones said. "Recent Supreme Court decisions have tremendously expanded the potential liability of state and local governments to costly damage suits."

The ruling which triggered the action came on May 18, 1986, in 4th District Court damage claim filed against the Board of Corrections and private individuals by a University of Idaho student. She was injured when struck by a vehicle operated by an individual on probation from previous charges of drunk driving.

Snow, wind, cold grip South, East

Snow and strong winds socked the South on Thursday, snarling travel and closing schools, as a record cold held its grip on the Midwest and East.

Even the polar bears were kept inside their heated dens at the zoo in Columbus, Ga.

The weather has been blamed for 34 deaths since Saturday, including 15 by exposure. In addition, three Memphis, Tenn., youngsters died

when a space heater left too close to a bed sparked a house fire.

Record low temperatures for the date were reported in 11 cities from Grand Rapids, Mich., where it was 15 below zero, to Baltimore, where it was 8 degrees above zero.

Snow stretched from eastern Kansas to the Atlantic Coast, with nearly a foot in parts of Georgia, Tennessee and Mississippi, and 4 inches in North Carolina and 9 in Alabama.

The National Weather Service

predicted that snow and bitter cold would cover the Great Lakes across the Middle Atlantic coast and New England on Friday, and that snow would also continue over eastern North Carolina.

First lady Nancy Reagan canceled a trip to Nashville, Tenn., where more than 5 inches of snowfall had been scheduled to inaugurate a drug abuse prevention program and attend a performance at the Grand Ole Opry House.

Drunken-driving roadblock arrest unconstitutional, Boisean contends

BOISE (AP) — A Boise man contends his drunken driving arrest at a police roadblock was unconstitutional, but the state argued before the Idaho Supreme Court Thursday that the roadblock was a legitimate and effective deterrent.

Boise attorney Robert Elgel, representing David L. Henderson, called the 1986 roadblock by Boise police "probably one of the worst of this court or that this court has been asked to approve since its inception."

Henderson was among 11 people arrested when police stopped 942 cars at a two-hour roadblock on a major Boise road on May 25, 1986. It was the first and only known police roadblock in Idaho expressly aimed at drunken drivers.

Meanwhile, the court upheld a misdemeanor charge of driving under the influence of a northern Idaho man who refused to take a blood-alcohol test.

Donald Clayton appealed 1st District Judge Gary Haman's decision upholding the magistrate's order, arguing that Coeur d'Alene Police Officer Mike Moser acted improperly when arresting him for drunken-driving on Dec. 13, 1985.

Henderson refused to submit to a breath-alcohol test after his arrest, but later pleaded guilty to driving under the influence of alcohol under the condition that the execution of his sentence be stayed while he appealed the constitutionality of the roadblock.

Elgel told the Supreme Court on Thursday that since roadblock searches were considered without probable cause, anyone arrested as a result could not be freed under Idaho law to take a breath-alcohol test and could not have their driver's license suspended for refusing.

"That would effectively call into question the constitutionality of the roadblock might seek, he said.

"If you approve the roadblock, people will not take the test and you have, in essence, a scarecrow ... a roadblock with no teeth," Elgel said, adding that police manpower could be far more efficiently used to deter drunken-driving in other ways.

But Deputy Attorney General Myrna Stahman argued that police have clearly indicated they believe roadblocks, particularly those well-publicized in advance such as the one in 1986, are an effective deterrent to drunken driving.

She said the roadblock searches did not violate Henderson's Fourth Amendment rights because they were reasonable and conducted according to guidelines found acceptable by courts in other states, including California.

Ms. Stahman disputed Elgel's contention that roadblocks would be any potential for deterrence the roadblock might seek, he said.

Falls after police officers were informed of an apparent shoplifting incident at the Pay-Less-Drug Store. According to Qualls, police officer Robert Saldana — who was accompanied by the security officer who witnessed the shoplifting — located Schneider shortly thereafter at the nearby intersection of Addison Avenue and Ninth Avenue North.

Qualls said Schneider ignored Saldana's orders to stop, prompting the officer to use force to take him. Schneider was carrying a 45-caliber handgun at the time of the arrest, but he did not pull it on the officer, Qualls said.

"We were very fortunate we didn't have a shootout," Qualls said. The store's security officer, who asked not to be identified because his name was under cover, said the merchandise taken was worth less than \$50.

According to Qualls, Schneider "didn't cooperate at all once he was taken into custody." Schneider refused to give his name and would not answer any questions, Qualls said.

The man's identity was therefore ascertained through a search of his vehicle, Qualls said. A subsequent computer check run through the National Crime Information Center disclosed Schneider's status as a fugitive.

Narzewski emphasized Schneider's ties with certain right-wing organizations which are concentrated in the Northwest.

"He's very strongly in the Posse Comitatus and the Aryan Nations," Narzewski said. "That's why he was out there. He's a great follower of those people."

Narzewski added, "All the indications — his literature, his writings and his beliefs — point to Mr. (Wayne) Jones and the people out in Idaho."

Jones, a Twin Falls resident, is a member of the Aryan Nations, which is headquartered in the northern part of the state in Hayden Lake. The Rev. Richard Butler leads the organization, more formally known as the Church of Jesus Christ Christian.

Butler said Thursday he was "not aware of (Schneider's) name." "But we have thousands of members," Butler added. "I would have to run a computer check to be sure."

John Miller, a Jerome resident belonging to the Aryan Nations, said Thursday that he likewise was not familiar with Schneider. Police officers in Kootenai County, where the Aryan Nations is based, also said they knew nothing about Schneider, but added that their files apply primarily to individuals in the Northwest.

Jones could not be reached for comment. Bernabei said Schneider's alleged hostilities with Ellison dated back to late 1985 when the judge ruled

that Schneider was in violation of a local zoning ordinance. According to Bernabei, the dispute stemmed from complaints concerning the 16 semi-trailers which Schneider had on his property.

The semi-trailers "had derogatory remarks about public officials written on them," Bernabei said. "After the ruling was issued, Bernabei said, Schneider allegedly wrote a letter to the state's supreme court saying that if they didn't overturn Ellison's ruling, he would sue them, and the members of the supreme court would meet the same fate."

In connection with the zoning dispute, area law enforcement officials at one point searched Schneider's home. Bernabei said officers found guns and a couple of kegs which had previously contained gun powder.

According to Narzewski, officers also found material linking Schneider to the Aryan Nations and similar organizations. Additionally, Narzewski said they found a galva, which Schneider said he had built specifically for Narzewski.

Narzewski said Schneider had previously written him a letter accusing him of treason. He added that Schneider believed "everyone who is connected with the government is corrupt."

Narzewski said Schneider, who is described as having been a Civil War enthusiast, refinished antique furniture for a living.

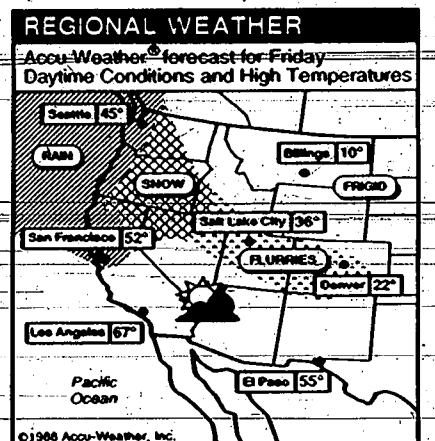
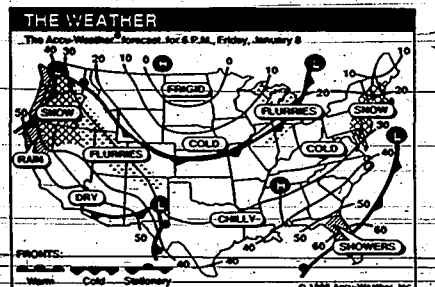
The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 40 degrees at Hagerman. Portland reported the coldest at 4 degrees below zero.

Thousands of homeless people flocked to already crowded shelters, prompting authorities to open new ones. In North Carolina, Gov. Jim Martin ordered that all the state's 101 National Guard armories remain open for the duration of the storm for those who need refuge.

Thirty people spent the night in a McDonald's restaurant near Walters, Okla., using borrowed blankets and pillows and sleeping wherever they could. The storm dumped up to a foot of snow on parts of Oklahoma.

"One you got somewhere, it was ridiculous to try to go any further," said Randy Bruce, the assistant manager of the McDonald's. "We stayed up all night giving away coffee."

Many flights were delayed or canceled in Atlanta, Nashville and Memphis, Tenn. North Carolina

and Wichita Mid-Continent Airport. In South Carolina, Greystone canceled bus service to Greenville and Columbia and Greenville-Spartanburg Airport opened and closed throughout the day. City buses were parked on Thursday in Birmingham, Ala.

Freezing rain, sleet and snow at Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport stranded thousands of passengers; who spent the night in lounges, bars and even in parked airplanes because no hotel rooms were available. American Airlines suspended all flights to the 200 of American's 350 flights from the airport were canceled.

Officials closed schools in parts of Georgia, Tennessee, Alabama, South Carolina, North Carolina, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri and Kansas.

In North Georgia, some snow plows gave up trying to clear mountain roads of up to 11 inches of snow.

The storm closed stretches of highways and caused hundreds of traffic accidents throughout the South, where snow and ice turned highways into skating rinks.

was liable for not properly supervising the motorist, since officials should have had a propensity for improper operation of a motor vehicle.

In a decision written by Justice Stephen Bistline, the court agreed, wiping out much of the immunity held by governmental agencies for their activities.

Jones said the ruling could mean that legal agencies would be responsible if a planning or zoning decision later caused injuries or problems, if a water life-ditch after a city inspection or something as simple as a traffic court decision later could be indirectly linked to negligent actions on the parts of others.

Weatherby said if the law is not changed, cities and other agencies doubtless would have to get much tougher on inspections and compliance with law. He said that could be

very expensive for all concerned. Ed Fridenstine, chief of the state's Bureau of Risk Management, said two recent claims against the state under the new court decision have cost \$500,000 to settle. He said the state's \$3 million reserve for liability claims has been increased to \$4.5 million. He estimates the state's exposure to liability has increased by 50 percent.

Weatherby said cities and counties have been "proceeding in back drafts" because they are not certain which activities could expose them to liability.

Jones indicated he expects opposition to the changes from Idaho's trial lawyers. He said he has attempted to negotiate with the group with little success.

"Trial lawyers may have a bone to pick with the legislation," he said. "I believe they will be less than supportive of it."

Expansion sought for agency

BOISE (AP) — Idaho residents figure they're getting ripped off by travel scams and false or misleading automobile advertising, judging from the complaints filed with the attorney general's office.

Attorney General Jim Jones says the complaints lodged with the consumer protection agency in his office show people lost \$379,391 last year. That in mind, he wants to greatly expand the agency.

It was reestablished with a \$80,000 appropriation from the Legislature starting last July 1, after being dormant for several years because lawmakers wouldn't fund it.

Jones told the Legislature's Joint Finance Appropriations Committee

on Thursday he wants \$190,000 more for consumer protection in the next state budget.

With the \$80,000 he has this year, Jones hired an attorney and a complaint handler. They've filed 848 complaints. The agency had another 240 active cases on file before that, or a total of 1,088 complaints.

"It has become apparent that our current efforts are only beginning to scratch the surface of a major problem," Jones said.

He said the small staff has been able to negotiate or reach some sort of settlement in 75 percent of the cases. It will take far more resources to deal with the remainder, he said, because most deal with

"scams" of some sort.

A report presented by Jones said the largest category of complaints deals with travel promotions. About a dozen companies figure in the complaints, most located in Florida or California. Jones said the Idaho consumer protection office can do little more than forward complaints from Idaho residents to the states involved.

The second-largest category concerns automobiles, including repairs, sales, warranties and advertising. Jones announced earlier that he's preparing legislation on automobile advertising because of the large number of complaints.

POCATELLO (AP) — The white-separatist television series that stirred emotions throughout much of southeastern Idaho for over a year is finally ending its run on the public access cable television channel in Pocatello.

City officials said the final segment of the "Race and Reason" series promoting the beliefs of the

white-separatist Aryan Nations Church of northern Idaho will be "broader next week."

The 36-part series began airing on the Pocatello cable system nearly 18 months ago, sparking debate within the community over what many felt were its racist views. It also mobilized the city's Human Relations Advisory Council

to develop programs that countered what were considered the most objectionable segments.

Sorenson voluntarily agreed not to air that program. Stoner is the founder of the Georgia-based Crusade Against Corruption and was convicted for the 1968 bombing of a predominantly black Alabama church.

ATA optimistic on revenue

BOISE (AP) — The president of Associated Taxpayers of Idaho gave state lawmakers their most optimistic revenue outlook of the week on Thursday, projecting growth in the range of 4 percent.

"Idaho's economy is improving," Russell Westerberg told the Legislature's Joint Revenue Projection Committee. "There are some encouraging signs."

Westerberg said the state could expect as much as \$685 million from the current tax structure during the budget year that begins in July. That would give lawmakers just enough money to pass a budget that would maintain government services for another year at their current level.

His outlook, however, was significantly

more optimistic than the forecasts the committee was given by various government and industry analysts earlier this week.

Nearly all those forecasts projected growth to continue at only about 2 percent through mid-1989, and two economists warned that under certain conditions "the state could be dragged into a wrenching recession late this year or early next year."

Legislative budget analysts have projected revenues from the current tax structure at just around \$670 million, and while the Andrus administration will not release its estimate until next week, there have been indications that it sees growth at around the same level.

Anderson's comment under-

scored the problem the budget-writing panel will face in the 1988 election-year session that officially opens Monday. That's the near certainty that available tax receipts to underwrite a new budget will run about \$15 million below the amount needed to maintain government services at their current levels for another 12 months.

"We've had worse situations," budget analyst Jeff Youtz told the committee. "But you can fund a minimum, maintenance-level budget without any tax increase. But it's going to be skinny. ... If you are intent on staying within available revenues, you are looking at a 3 or 4 percent, inflationary increase for everything, including public schools, and that's about it."

PUC to start phone service fund

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Public Utilities Commission has decided to start a universal service fund to help small, rural telephone companies cope with the cost of providing service.

The PUC announced on Thursday it will adopt a "cost-sharing mechanism" to keep local and long-distance rates affordable everywhere in the state.

That means creation of a revenue pool, funded by surcharges on all telephone users which will help small companies. The PUC started investigating the need for the pool

after several small Idaho companies declared they needed rate increases up to 500 percent.

The PUC has adopted an industry recommendation to add a surcharge to local residential and business rates, and a surcharge on within-state long-distance telephone calls. While not part of the companies' recommendation, the commission is proposing that half the revenue come from toll surcharges and half from local service surcharges.

The commission has given companies until late January to file ex-

ceptions and statements on the proposal, and to discuss how they would carry it out.

The commission staff estimates that in the beginning, the fund would require a surcharge of less than 0.10 cents per minute of in-state long-distance calling. A news release did not disclose the amount of the service charge surcharge.

The fund would be administered by an industry board such as the National Exchange Carrier Association under rules set by the commission.

White supremacist topic on 'Today'

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — North Idaho's battle against the white supremacist movement will be the topic of a segment on NBC's "Sunday Today" show on Sunday morning.

NBC producer Sam Hurst of Los Angeles and cameraman Keith Hathaway interviewed leaders of the Kootenai County Task Force and Aryan Nations leader Richard Butler on Tuesday and Wednesday.

They also filmed a task force executive committee meeting Wednesday afternoon in preparation for the 30-minute broadcast, to be anchored by Boyd Matson and Maria Shriver.

Criticism of F&G at Challis unjustified

There are many reasons why public employees and officials decide to leave public work, but lack of appreciation for their efforts by the public may well be near the top.

That reason has probably crossed the minds of some workers and officials in the Fish & Game Department this week, following an outspoken attack by some Challis residents on the Fish & Game decision to close the upper Salmon River to steelhead fishing.

We think the criticism is unjustified and based on shortsighted thinking.

The Challis folks obviously don't want to see the season closed, as it means a considerable contribution to the local economy.

But allowing a season on steelhead this year would be like eating seed corn or slaughtering baby calves without keeping a stock for replenishment.

For there to be a season at all, enough steelhead must return to the upper river. Eggs from that group become source of the hatchery development program, and thus the supply of future generations of fish in the years ahead.

Among those upset by the Challis response is Norman Guth, Fish & Game Commission chairman, who is from Salmon. "Fisheries managers tend to take for granted sometimes that everyone appreciates the improvements made over the years and the importance of protecting the resource," he said.

He was particularly disappointed with Challis Councilman John Walker, who said the commission was unfair in closing only the upper river to fishing, and thus hurting the Challis economy.

Maybe the commission should have closed the whole river, but in its effort to provide at least some sport fishing, it limited the closure.

The incident strikes us as a dammed-if-you-do, dammed-if-you-don't situation for Fish & Game, which has invested time, research and no small amount of money in developing the Salmon steelhead run.

Few agencies have been as aggressive, we also note, in the battle to prevent Idaho's steelhead from being taken downstream by Columbia River Indian tribes. For that, and other successful programs, we Idahoans should say "thanks."

Yes, there may be a year in which the steelhead catch is small or nonexistent on the upper Salmon.

But it is not only Challis businesses who have something at stake in this.

Ozone treaty prudent insurance policy

WASHINGTON — In December, President Reagan submitted for approval by the U.S. Senate a treaty to limit global production and consumption of chemicals believed to cause irreversible damage to the fragile stratospheric ozone layer.

Twenty-four nations signed the treaty in Montreal last September, among them 17 of the world's major producing and consuming countries. The Senate should expedite the ratification of the treaty when it reconvenes.

The accord provides for a near-term freeze, followed by scheduled reductions, in the use of several chlorofluorocarbon (CFCs) and bromine (halon) compounds. Depletion of the ozone layer caused by these synthetic chemicals would result in increased ultraviolet radiation reaching the Earth's surface, with potentially significant adverse implications for human, animal and plant life. In addition, "greenhouse gases," CFCs contribute to global warming and resultant dangers for agriculture and rising sea levels. Against these risks were weighed the costs of displacing chemicals useful in refrigeration, air conditioning, plastics, insulation, aerosol sprays, fireproofing and computers.

Several features of the Montreal treaty make it historic: For the first time, nations are attempting to impose controls on an important industrial sector before actual damages to human health and ecology occurred. This was not a response to a disaster, such as Chernobyl or the Rhine River spill; but a conscious preventative action, on a global scale, to protect future generations from potential dangers. The treaty came about through close cooperation between policy-makers and scientists, and was based on computer modeling and air measurements at the frontiers of modern science.

In the face of remaining uncertainties about the extent both of future ozone depletion and of potential deleterious effects, the parties undertook a unique process of risk assessment. Officials, scientists and representatives of industry and environmental groups met in a series of informal workshops, and achieved a degree of consensus even before the actual negotiations began. The United Nations Environment



Program played a critical role in this process. This small U.N. agency, under the leadership of Egyptian scientist Mostafa Tolba, sponsored the workshops and negotiations and provided an objective international forum without the extraneous political debate that has so often marred the work of other U.N. bodies.

Leadership by the United States, which had as early as 1978 undertaken major controls on CFCs, was also a major factor. Diplomatic initiatives, bilateral scientific and policy missions, and use of international media, all served to reach foreign policy-makers and populations — which in some countries were hostile or indifferent — with the rationale for controls. The eventual treaty was, in fact, based upon the structure and concept initially advanced by the United States last year.

U.S. environmental groups helped form foreign public opinion of the dangers of ozone layer depletion, while American industry was far ahead of European and Japanese producers in acknowledging its responsibility and supporting further controls. And the U.S. Congress, which had passed legislation for the most acceptable international accord were not attained, it was prepared to legislate unilaterally, with trade restrictions against

countries not accepting their share of this responsibility.

Write the Montreal treaty is not perfect; it does represent a prudent international insurance policy in response to a complex set of issues and uncertainties. The firm schedule for reductions of the controlled chemicals provides market incentives for industry to develop new technologies. Another significant element is that the treaty can be adapted to changing conditions, such as implications of the emerging scientific evidence on the Antarctic ozone hole.

Unfortunately, a few countries, notably Britain and France, swayed by their powerful chemical industries, participated only reluctantly in treaty negotiations. Several potential producers of these chemicals, such as India and South Korea, were conspicuously absent. So it is vital that the Senate maintain the momentum established in Montreal and continue U.S. leadership on this critical issue by prompt ratification of the ozone treaty.

'Things' consume that precious time

BOSTON — On my desk are two articles I diligently clipped and saved from this week's papers. They lie side by side on my desktop and, I must admit, in my brain.

The first is about time, or the lack of it, in our lives. If people drew up resolutions, I'd wish instead of resolutions, suggests the author, our first wish would be for more time.

The second article is one I should like under home maintenance. In it, an expert warns that any decent germ-killing owner of an ultrasonic humidifier should clean the tank every day. It's a cup of bleach.

As a certified humidifier owner and a bona fide citizen in pursuit of elusive free time, I find myself making a connection between this incongruous pair of messages.

Maybe the infamous time crunch of the '80s is not just a product of work and family pressures. Maybe we are not all just over-achievers who feel lazy unless we are listening to Swahili tapes while running three miles in a event sponsored by a worthy social cause.

Maybe part of the problem is the demands put on us by more and more things that, in effect, consume time.

Every thing, even the so-called time-saving device and energy-efficient machine, comes these days with an elaborate set of instructions for its care and feeding. Buying a machine has become more and more like buying a pet.

You get the feeling that you aren't worthy of owning a humidifier unless you promise to clean it with bleach. You don't deserve a coffee

maker unless you faithfully give it doses of white vinegar. You don't warrant a VCR unless you run the head cleaner through it routinely. And I haven't even mentioned the car.

As an owner, I am often guilty of thing-neglect. I am about as likely to get up every morning and pour bleach in my humidifier as I am to shove the pills from my swiveler. I have enough trouble remembering to floss.

But I am spiteful nevertheless to the ultimate way that THINGS devour time. By breaking. Without doubt, the two words that strike the deepest terror in the heart of a person whose life is contained in an Hour-At-A-Glance book are these: "It's broken."

This announcement conjures up two horror stories. One of them is a classic rendition of waiting for the Godot Repair Company. This is an outfit that estimates its time of arrival in your city as alternate Tuesdays between dawn and dusk. The other is a road tour that leads to a state-of-the-art and highly specialized factory-service representative. This is located in a handy next door to a motel where you may check in and wait.

In my experience, the amount of time spent

transporting broken television sets, answering machines and personal computers surpasses the amount of time spent transporting preschoolers to gymnastics classes they will not remember when they are in analysis. The amount of time spent waiting for a repairer to come to your house to fix a broken toaster surpasses the amount spent in a mental health clinic in Warsaw.

And still I haven't even mentioned the car. My own guilty culprit in this department is the vacuum cleaner. I live with it for. This is a machine that I have owned for so long that I am trying to enroll it in an HMO.

I know that I am not the only person who wastes time on the things that were supposed to free time, or enhance time. We have all become machine caretakers in one way or another. We buy some thing in the flush of desire, the rush of romance; it's only later that we realize we've made a commitment to it.

It insists on being cleaned. It demands to be fed bleach or vinegar. At the very best it sits there nagging you to make use of it for the manufacture of yogurt or popcorn or videotapes. At the very worst it forces you to take it to be fixed. It not only gives it takes, time.

This is one of the ironies of a thoroughly modern life. We are time-crunched. Not just by the number of things we have to do, but the number of things we have. In the late 20th century, things are more and more time dependents.

Now then, let's talk about the car.

High technology, as its name implies, uses the services of highly-trained professional people. These people are in demand; they can live anywhere they wish. Quality of life is important to them. To most though, quality of life is more than clean air and recreation.

For example, most have a passing interest in things cultural; something definitely lacking in most areas of our state. Efforts to alleviate the situation such as bringing National Public Radio to the Magic Valley seem to be going nowhere fast.

Education is another important factor to potentialists looking for a place to live. Schools must be top quality. These people more than most, are acutely aware of the value of education. Post-college educational opportunities are needed too. Both technologists and their spouses often wish further

training. The availability of commercial air travel is a big item. At present, Idahoans outside the Boise Valley must spend considerable time traveling to and from airports if they wish to get to the outside.

Granted there is air "service" into a few other locations but costs and schedules usually don't fit the needs of commercial travelers. A study of Idaho business and professional travel would probably reveal that most fly from Boise. Salt Lake or Reno is a must. Any major scientific operation is going to attract individuals of many diverse backgrounds. Communities seeking to be their home need to be willing to accept others' philosophies and opinions. Lack of tolerance will doom even the otherwise best site.

It's too bad we lost out this time, but we should keep it in perspective. It was really little more than a blow to our collective ego. Rather than fight the inevitable let's start to prepare for the next opportunity.

Estimates 'on target' in the West

Interest lagging in alien amnesty offer

BOSTON (AP) — A federal amnesty program for illegal aliens is sparking less interest than anticipated, resulting in the closing of some offices set up to process applications and cuts of others.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service originally estimated at least 2 million people would seek legal resident status under the Immigration Reform and Control Law's amnesty provision, which took effect May 5. The highest estimate used by immigration officials was 4.9 million.

With about four months to go before amnesty expires on May 4, about 1.2 million aliens have applied to change their legal status.

INS officials in Washington and in regional offices said they expected fewer than 2 million total applications by May 4 unless the rate picks up substantially.

Several said that projected numbers of those eligible under the program could have been too high. Others suggested that many illegal aliens fear to come forward, despite promises of confidentiality.

There is an initial fear factor out there, said eastern regional spokesman Charles Troy.

Applications reached a peak of

60,000 a week in late August, and were down to about 15,000 a week nationally by late December, the INS said. As a result, three of the nation's four regional legalization operations have cut back or re-assigned staff, and several offices have been closed.

In Massachusetts, officials originally estimated that 60,000 to 100,000 illegal aliens would qualify for the program. As of last week, 5,800 had applied.

The Springfield legalization office shut Monday, after averaging only about 24 amnesty applications a day instead of the 150 it was set up to handle. It had employed 18 people.

In Boston, the legalization bureau recently cut its staff from 18 to 10. In Connecticut, the New Haven office has reduced its staff from 18 to 2.

Under the amnesty provision of the immigration law, illegal aliens who have lived in the United States continuously since before Jan. 1, 1982, can qualify for the right to live and work here legally. Less stringent requirements apply for seasonal farm workers, who have until Dec. 1, 1988, to apply.

The low number of applications

has led to pressure in Congress for extension of the amnesty. A bill introduced last month by Rep. Charles Schumer (D-N.Y.) would stretch the application period to May 1989.

Troy, speaking by telephone from Burlington, Vt., said the 13-state eastern regional operation had the capacity to process 3,000 applications daily.

"Right now, we were averaging between 600 and 700 applications a day," said Troy. "When we analyzed our current workload we found we had more staff than needed, so we made appropriate cutbacks."

In Minneapolis-St. Paul, northern regional spokesman Andrew Canterbury said the anticipated figures for the 20-state region were 200,000 to 300,000 applicants.

"We have had to date around 125,000," he said Wednesday. "There is a move now to do a small amount of closing down a limited number of offices that had no business."

John Armstrong, regional outreach specialist for the 13-state southern region, also said applications appear to be lagging behind overall projections of 500,000, with 267,884 aliens submitting documen-

tation by Dec. 31. "We have 22 legalization offices and they are still open, (but) at some of the offices... the staffs have been reduced," he said from Dallas.

Western spokesman John Bellurdo said the four-state region had received about 700,000 applications, and has maintained all its staff and offices. Although about 500,000 more of the projected 1.2 million with less than four months to go, Bellurdo, contacted in San Pedro, Calif., said the region's operations were "right on target."

Troy said the illegal alien population differs in each region, and illegal aliens from Europe concentrated in the Northeast.

"In the Northeast... they may have a lot more to lose than someone on the southern border," he said. "Many... had to travel a great distance, and it's not really a question of them going back across a border and then walking back, or attempting to come back."

It could also be more difficult to reduce fears in the Northeast, with its splintered ethnic groups, than in the southwest, where news of the program has traveled fast among Hispanics, he theorized.

Child-safe lighters, goal of safety panel

WASHINGTON (AP) — Prodded by Congress and consumer groups, the Consumer Product Safety Commission said Thursday it is launching an effort to make cigarette lighters child-resistant.

Children playing with lighters were blamed for 7,800 fires leading to 120 deaths, 860 injuries and \$60.5 million in property damage in 1985, the agency said in announcing its action.

It concluded that cigarette lighters available today are not child-resistant. To provide such child resistance, changes in lighter design may be required.

The decision to act follows a two-year study of lighter safety that the commission conducted after receiving a petition from Diane Denton, a nurse at Keanter Children's Hospital in Louisville, Ky.

Congress and consumer groups have been critical of the agency for its slow start on the issue.

"Lighter makers... meanwhile, have stressed their efforts to maintain quality products and noted that they include warning labels on packages that lighters should be kept away from children."

Indeed, the commission study found that less than 1 percent of fires involving lighters could be traced to a malfunction of the

lighter itself. Instead, misuse by children was blamed for the largest share of the blazes.

The commission is expected to evaluate various possible lighter design changes in an effort to find ways to make lighters child-resistant.

It did not say what changes may be likely, but making it harder to operate the lighters may be one possibility because the study found that younger children usually need both hands to use the lighters.

The commission said its study of lighter-related fires found:

- Ninety-six percent of lighters involved in incidents were disposable butane models. That roughly corresponds with the market distribution of the about 500 million lighters sold annually in the United States.

- The children involved were usually less than 6 years old, primarily 3- and 4-year-olds.

- In most cases, the child used two hands to operate the lighter, one to steady it and the second to roll the wheel and press the fuel lever.

- Many of the children involved in fires had played with lighters before.

The commission said it will issue an advance notice of proposed rulemaking.

Shuttle's engines pass test

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — NASA has successfully tested and accepted for flight the three modified main engines that will power the first post-Challenger space shuttle flight, the space agency said Thursday.

The date for Discovery's first flight remained uncertain as engineers sought to learn why a protective carbon boot ring over a nozzle swiveling joint shattered during a Dec. 23 test firing of a redesigned solid fuel booster rocket. NASA officials have estimated the June 2 launch date will slip at least six weeks.

Two solid-fuel boosters burn for about two minutes and the liquid-fuel main engines for about 8 1/2 minutes to push a shuttle into orbit. The first of the main engines, said to be the world's most technically advanced powerplants, was delivered to the Kennedy Space Center by truck Wednesday night, and the other two are to arrive before February.

"Seeing a major piece of flight hardware delivered here is a morale booster, a motivation for the work force," said Lee Solid, director of launch operations for the engine's builder, the Rocketdyne Division of Rockwell International.

Each of the engines, fueled by liquid hydrogen and liquid oxygen, was ignited three times in tests that began last August at NASA's National Space Technology Laboratories in Mississippi. The final firing for each was a flight-duration burn of 520 seconds.

Based on analysis of test data, NASA said it has accepted all three engines.

USSR urges U.S. to drop binary arms

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviet Union urged the United States on Thursday to end its production of chemical weapons or risk "appropriate action."

The hint that Moscow might try to match the binary program advanced by the Reagan administration over considerable congressional opposition emerged at a news conference at the Soviet Embassy.

For the most part, the two Soviet officials who met with reporters spoke enthusiastically of prospects that the two sides could find a way to outlaw chemical weapons when negotiations resume in Geneva.

"The year 1988, if there is a political will on both sides, may enter history as the year of the beginning of chemical disarmament," said Sergei Kislyak, an embassy first secretary. "All the ingredients of the conventions are there on the negotiating table."

While negotiating with the Soviets, the administration has launched a program to produce binary chemical weapons that are otherwise harmless ingredients that become lethal when mixed.

Kislyak said "it creates a new situation which may require taking appropriate action" on the Soviet side.

Who will govern Afghanistan after Soviets leave?

MOSCOW — The Kremlin's expressed desire to pull out of Afghanistan in 1988 shows its eagerness to stanch a national wound, but ambiguity persists about the government the Soviets want to leave behind.

In the past two days, top Soviet diplomats have insisted that quick agreement on a peaceful resolution of Afghanistan's bloody military stalemate is within reach.

"A pattern of settlement has nearly been agreed upon," Foreign Ministry official Yuri K. Alexeyev told a government news briefing Thursday.

One Western diplomat said the statements this week were the

"most-practical" signal yet that the Kremlin is serious about seeking a rapid end to its 8-year-old military role in Afghanistan.

For the first time, the Soviets are also talking about the United States serving as a "guarantor" of a settlement, a phrase Moscow-based diplomats find highly significant.

Alexeyev, a deputy chief of the ministry's Near East Department, accompanied Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze on a three-day visit to Kabul that ended Wednesday.

It was the highest-level Soviet visit in a year, and Alexeyev said it showed the Kremlin leadership's

"seriousness and sincerity" in seeking an end to the bloodshed.

Before leaving Afghanistan, Shevardnadze said, "We would like the year 1988 to be the last year of the stay of Soviet soldiers in your country."

The Soviets rolled into Afghanistan on Dec. 27, 1979, to replace one pro-communist government with another. An estimated 135,000 troops remain to fight anti-Marxist insurgents who are backed by the United States.

Casualty figures have never been published, but Communist Party chief Mikhail S. Gorbachev has referred to the Afghan conflict as a "bleeding wound."

The Soviets have insisted that the United States agree to cease "outside interference" in Afghan af-

fairs as a condition for the troop withdrawal.

They have said their troops could be brought home within 12 months, and Alexeyev said Thursday that the withdrawal could be accomplished in less time.

U.N.-brokered talks are scheduled to resume next month between Afghanistan and Pakistan, which stands in for the rebels. Alexeyev said those negotiations could be the last.

Documents prepared at the negotiations, to which the superpowers are not direct parties, commit the two countries to serve as "guarantors" of an Afghan settlement, the Soviets now say.

That language was mentioned for the first time this week in Moscow.

The vaguest, and most tantalizing, passages in this week's Soviet statements refer to the government of Afghanistan and the political future of its Marxist president, Najib.

Najib said in Moscow last June he would seek to retain his "originate and leading role" for his People's Democratic Party of Afghanistan in the National Unity government he is trying to form.

This week's statements by Kremlin envoys, however, cast some doubt on their regard for Najib, and the kind of regime they want in power in Kabul.

Shevardnadze also said a different type of government could succeed a coalition, indicating the Soviets feel it is not of major importance.

Actor dies at age 71 of illness

LONDON (AP) — Trevor Howard, a master of the art of film and plays, died Thursday after more than half a century of acting. He was 71.

With his actress-wife, Helen Clancy, by his side, Howard died in a hospital at Bushey near London where he was taken two weeks ago suffering from influenza and bronchitis. The illness was complicated by jaundice, said his agent, James Sharky.

Howard won international fame in the 1946 film "Brief Encounter," a suburban love story with Colia Johnson played out in a dismal train station.

Other outstanding roles included his army officer in "The Third Man," a 1949 Graham Greene thriller set in Vienna with Orson Welles and Joseph Cotten, and the 1962 "Mutiny on the Bounty," in which he was the ship's captain, William Bligh, opposite Marlon Brando as mutineer Fletcher Christian.

He went on to make nearly 80 films, stamping them all with the rugged personality of his athletic figure, craggy face and gravelly voice.

The son of an English insurance salesman and a Canadian nurse, Howard said he became an actor in 1934 "because I couldn't think of anything else to do. I was offered a job selling umbrellas in Argentina, but I didn't think I'd be good at that."

As a "paratrooper" officer in World War II, he won the coveted Military Cross for bravery but made no mention of it in his "Who's Who" entry.

His film debut was a 1944 war story, "The Way Ahead," and he came to specialize in bluff and rugged English military officer roles.

Other famous films were "The Heart of the Matter," "Roots of Heaven," "Sons and Lovers," "Tom Ryan's Express," "The Charge of the Light Brigade," "Ryan's Daughter" and "Gandhi."

Despite his fame, Howard won few awards. He received a British Film Academy best actor award for "The Day After Tomorrow" in 1960 and William Holden in 1958; an Oscar nomination for "Sons and Lovers" in 1960; and a golden clown trophy from Venice for best English actor in 1967.

Syria talks Iran into delaying its winter offensive

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Syria has talked Iran into delaying its winter offensive against Iraq, and ending attacks on Kuwait, Arab diplomatic sources said Thursday.

The Syrian initiative could mark a breakthrough in attempts to end the seven-year Iran-Iraq war, which has threatened to engulf other nations in the strategic oil-rich region.

As Iran's main Arab friend and ally — a key ally — Syria is uniquely placed to mediate between Tehran and the Arab states, most of whom support Iraq.

There was no immediate confirmation from Tehran or other Arab capitals that Iran postponed its offensive. The sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity, gave no indication how long the Iranians

might hold off — unleashing a new push.

But there have been several indications that tension was easing the gulf despite the apparent failure of a 6-month-old United Nations cease-fire effort.

Iraq and Iran have halted attacks on a gulf shipping for nearly two weeks. Arab leaders have toned down their condemnation of Iran

and gulf-based Arab diplomats have urged unspecified "favorable gestures" from Tehran recently.

U.S. Defense Secretary Frank Carlucci arrived in Saudi Arabia on the last stop of a tour to assess the U.S. naval presence in the gulf region.

U.S. warships began to escort 11 U.S.-flagged Kuwaiti tankers in

only to protect them from attacks by Iran, which considers Kuwait an ally of Iraq.

The Syrian initiative, launched last month at the urging of Saudi Arabia, was aimed at opening up a dialogue between Tehran and the Arab nations of the six-member Gulf Cooperation Council to find ways to end the conflict.

Hungarian backs market economy

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP) — A leading Hungarian economist has criticized the communist system of planning and said a market economy functions even though it is imperfect.

The interview, published Thursday, Katalin Szabo said centralized planning and its attendant bureaucracy "makes for a longer road" to successful economic management. Szabo was interviewed by the economic weekly publication Idei.

Szabo, associate professor of political economy and editor-in-chief of Economic Review, said no communist country "could show proportional development."

"It is a happy accident that the planned proportional development has failed in practice," she told Idei. "The market is not perfect... but it does function."

Investigators join in fire inspection

TWIN FALLS — A cluster of investigators affiliated with various businesses and agencies will meet in Twin Falls today to begin a collective investigation into issues surrounding Tuesday's fire at the Magic Valley Marina.

Don Bailey, an agent with the Idaho State Fire Marshal's Office, will be arriving in Twin Falls this morning, Jensen said. He will be joined by two other investigators working for private businesses entwined in the fire's fallout.

Jensen said Loren Whitney

has been assigned investigative duties for Obchachka Wheat Insurance, the Twin Falls company which insured the destroyed boat dealership, Cal Gas, a Twin Falls company which had recently installed two overhead heaters in the business' display room.

The boat dealership, located about two miles west of Twin Falls on U.S. Highway 30, burned to the ground in Tuesday's early-morning hours. No official estimate of the damage has yet been established, but the business' owner, Joseph DiPietro, said Tuesday he calculated it at roughly \$350,000.

DiPietro said Thursday he welcomes what promises to be an extensive probe into the blaze, which local firefighters have described as being the largest fire in the area's recent history.

"I'm glad," DiPietro said, "I want to see everybody out there."

Idaho savings suffer decline

WASHINGTON — Savings and loan associations in Idaho suffered the worst cumulative percentage decline of assets of all S&Ls in the country last year, according to a new report by Sheshunoff & Company Inc., a private information and consulting firm that analyzes banking and thrift industries.

The report shows that Idaho's S&L assets dipped a record 39 percent — or an estimated \$363 million — in 1987. That is the worst state record in the nation.

The decline in assets were five times those experienced by Oregon S&Ls, the state that ranked 49th in percentage of assets lost — 8.8 percent of its \$8.8 billion portfolio.

Although those facts are true, they are not accurate, said Richard Allen, president of 1st Federal S&L of Twin Falls.

The decline in assets of Idaho S&Ls is almost entirely attributable to the collapse of two Ada County S&Ls — United First Federal and Provident Federal — and their subsequent sale to Washington Federal S&L, Allen said.

Although the two S&Ls reopened as branches of Washington Federal, and all their assets remain in Idaho, on paper their assets were transferred to Washington. So Idaho appears on paper to have lost 39 percent of its assets. In fact, those assets simply acquired a new owner.

Over the past year, Idaho thrifts retained reserves of \$933,023,000, the Austin-based consulting firm said.

The study, which the firm said was based on data collected from the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, contends that despite the percentage size of Idaho's losses, the losses from loan losses were more acute in Texas, and the Southwest, where loan values far outpaced Idaho's assets. Of the 50 states, Idaho ranked 48th in S&L assets.

Texas, on the other hand, ranked second in assets — \$99 billion — and faced losses of 1.7 percent, or \$97.3 million.

Although the vast majority of federally insured thrift institutions — 2,310 — are profitable, Sheshunoff contends, the losses of the nation's 690 unprofitable savings and loans, concentrated in the Southwest, severely damaged the industry's overall performance.

"When unprofitable savings institutions have extensive nonperforming loans in their existing portfolios combined with little new lending activity to dilute their effect, it is difficult for those thrifts to reverse their fortunes quickly," said Alex Sheshunoff, president of the consulting firm.

"If we move into a real estate recession in 1988, with a significant slackening in real estate loan growth, the difficulties facing many thrifts will become even more challenging," Sheshunoff said.

According to Sheshunoff's data, 1st Federal Savings & Loan Association of Twin Falls remains the largest Idaho-based firm, with assets of \$243.1 million.

Washington Federal S&L has more assets and more offices in Idaho than any other S&L but it not Idaho based.

Ranked second in 1st Federal Savings and Loan Association of Coeur d'Alene, with assets of \$205 million, and Home Federal Savings and Loan Association of Nampa, with \$185.6 million in assets.

Twin Falls' 1st Federal had a 6.2 percent decline in assets last year while 1st Federal of Coeur d'Alene increased its assets by 3.7 percent, Home Federal was up 0.3 percent last year.

The analysis included data on several other S&Ls in the state, including 1st Federal Savings & Loan Association of Idaho Falls, which had \$96.7 million in assets at year-end, a 2 percent more than the year before and 1st Federal Savings and Loan Association of Lewiston, with assets of \$91.8 million, a decline of 6.9 percent from the year before; Mountain States S&L had assets totalling \$82.9 million, up 3 percent.

Looking at asset figures alone doesn't explain much about the profitability or stability of an S&L, Allen said. The 5.2 percent decline in assets, he then showed, is the result of paying back a \$21 million loan. Last year that money was counted as a liability as well as an asset. This year it is gone from the balance sheet completely, so looking at the asset column alone gives a false impression of the firm having lost value, Allen said.

Mountain States S&L looks better than the other Idaho S&Ls in many categories in addition to assets.

The reason is because it has kept its delinquencies down, said Ronn Rich, Mountain States S&L's president.

Water districts appeal order

Want out-of-adjudication

TWIN FALLS — Attorneys for the Boise-Kuna, Nampa, Meridian, New York, Wilder and Big Bend Irrigation districts are appealing a district judge's order to include them in the Snake River adjudication. The districts filed a notice with 5th District Court late last month saying that they intend to appeal the ruling to the state Supreme Court, according to court documents.

Water District Number 67 and 67A in the Payette area has also filed a notice to appeal 6th District Judge Robert B. Keach's ruling.

The adjudication is a court-ordered determination of all the water rights in the Snake River Basin. The appeal is being filed because adjudications have already occurred or are occurring in the Snake River tributary sub-basins, said Don A. Olowinski, a Boise attorney representing the Boise-area district.

"The districts are concerned that if they have to go through another adjudication, they might lose some water rights that have already been determined, said Olowinski. In addition, the districts are concerned about the expense involved, he said.

The attorney for Water District Number 67 and 67A could not be reached for comment.

In a decision late last year, Hurlbutt said he decided to include all the districts in the adjudication because Idaho Code calls for a "carefully-balanced legislative compromise between up-river and down-river interests on the Snake River."

The inclusion of the sub-basins also bears on the participation of the United States in the adjudication.

The United States has federal reserved water rights on Indian reservations and wildlife refuge areas in the Snake River Basin.

Since the United States is sovereign over the states, in order for the federal government to join a state adjudication of water rights, it has to satisfy the requirements of a federal law known as the McCarran amendment.

The amendment calls for a general adjudication but there is disagreement among the various parties in the Snake River adjudication about what the amendments mean.

Hurlbutt came squarely on the side of more is better. He said, if the four sub-basins were excluded from the adjudication, the court would not have authority over the federal government.

In district court the state Department of Water Resources sided with those who want to exclude the lower Snake River from the adjudication.

The United States, Idaho Power Co., the Twin Falls Canal Co., the North Side Canal Co., the American Falls Reservoir District all objected to excluding the lower Snake River Basin from the adjudication.

The adjudication is expected to take 10 years and cost \$28 million with the money generated mainly from the sale of water rights.

Seminar to give an approach to exporting

TWIN FALLS — The biggest obstacle in the way of small businesses getting into exporting is financing. How do you climb Mount Everest when all you have ever done is climb a hill? asked Kenneth Keach, vice president of Barclay's Bank PLC in Seattle.

This Saturday, he is going to explain. Keach will be one of the featured speakers at an export financing seminar from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the College of Southern Idaho Shields building.

Robert Sebastian of the Export Center in Washington will also be presenting information.

The seminar will cover sources of export financing, preparing export loan proposals, computer assistance for assessing export potential, export market integration, and how to choose a position in the export market.

A company's export market position should be determined by its net worth and cash flow needs, Keach said. A small company needs to go out and make an immediate sale. It can't afford to take years of potential losses to eventually gain a market share.

A larger company can decide what size market share it wants, and go after it.

"You choose your degree of exposure relative to how much you can afford to play," he said.

Much, too, depends on what the product is, and what the other company's export plan is. If a company's business wants to export to selling to countries such as Iran is very risky, while other countries such as Switzerland are almost guaranteed, Keach said.

Keach said he will present a systems approach to exporting — the step by step requirements.

"It will give businesses a framework on which to

hang their own products, problems and experience," he said.

The seminar will be tailored to the interests and experience level of the audience.

"If they are ready, we will go beyond basic 101," Sebastian will help people compare their financial plan into the form that bankers use, so the process of getting financing can be expedited.

Both men will be coming to Twin Falls Friday night, and Keach says he has no plans. He would be happy to sit down with anyone to discuss an exporting plan for their specific business.

"One of my specialties when I'm not sitting around playing banker is strategic planning," Keach said. He can be reached through Tony Mabbutt in Dr. Mike Miller's office at CSB.

The cost of the seminar is \$25.

Child care could retain, recruit nurses

TWIN FALLS — Besides health care, Magic Valley Regional Medical Center may provide child care as a way to retain and recruit nurses.

The Finance Committee of MVRMC's Board of Trustees voted Thursday morning to recommend to the full board the establishment of an infant-care center at the hospital. The proposal will go before the board for review on Monday, said Hospital Administrator John Bingham.

Hospital employees have been asking the hospital to provide child care for six years, maybe longer, said Barta. Last spring a child-care committee was formed.

In a June survey, 45 employees indicated they would use such a center, she said. If approved, the center will provide care to up to 15 infants six weeks to 12 months old from 6:45 a.m. to 5 p.m. to accommodate nursing shifts. It will be located in a room on the third floor and staffed by one full-time and two part-time people.

Employees will be charged a competitive rate for the child care, Barta said.

"To test the waters" the center will be only open during the weekdays for a start, she added.

Space restrictions allow only infant care in the hospital, Barta said. Older children require outdoor play, for instance. In the future, the hospital may want to affiliate with an outside child-care center for older children of employees, Barta said.

When Trustee Frank Arana asked if a center should provide care during the critical weekends and off-hours, Bingham replied that a majority of nurses, "it's still a day problem." Husbands care for the children at nights.

Annual operating costs will be \$24,600, Barta reported. Start-up costs include about \$2,000 for remodeling and \$9,000 for supplies.

"Our goal is to meet our operating budget," she said.

Hospital Community Relations Director Sue Summers, who worked on the proposal, said the center is not meant to be a profit-making venture, but to be an incentive to recruit and retain nurses.

The service, which must be licensed under state law, should also cut down on absenteeism, stated the infant-care proposal. It's benefit will mean nurses will be available on short notice and for longer shifts.

A hospital in Kootenai County is the only one to offer child-care for employees, Barta said.

If the proposal is approved by the full hospital board, a center could be operating in mid-March.

In other business, Bingham provided the finance committee a list of 11 prioritized items to be studied, retained and recruit nurses. Specific items will be presented to the board at a later date.

The list was prepared by nursing committee and management with input from staff nurses, he said.

Topping the list was competitive salaries, followed by compensation for nurses to "float" to different areas of the hospital when needs arise and extra pay for different shifts and specialty nursing.

Child care for employees was no. six on the list, followed by a recommendation to look at different compensation for administrative and clinical nurses.

Other suggestions include working with the College of Southern Idaho to provide refresher courses to nurses who have been out of the

profession.

Study says majority of those who seek food are families

WASHINGTON (AP) — Children and their parents make up one-third of the homeless in 26 American cities, and the majority of those seeking emergency food are families, according to a study released recently by the U.S. Conference of Mayors.

"While terrific and Herculean efforts are being made by a number of very committed and conscientious Americans across our cities—the problem, folks, is just getting a lot worse each and every year," said Boston Mayor Raymond L. Flynn, chairman of the group's task force on hunger and homelessness.

A one-third increase over 1986, the report said. In New York City, the figure is 63 percent.

Two out of every three people requesting emergency food assistance are children or their parents, the survey found.

Overall, the task force found a 21 percent increase in the demand for emergency shelter between this year and last: Kansas City, Mo., had the biggest jump—44 percent—while Louisville, Ky., reported no change. Nearly one-quarter of the nationwide demand for shelter goes unmet, the survey found.

The report said the demand for emergency food assistance grew by 18 percent in 1987, and is expected to continue increasing in 1988. The demand in San Francisco and Trenton, N.J., increased by 30 percent.

"If the record number of people on America's streets and soup kitchens had been driven there by a natural catastrophe, many parts of our country would be declared disaster areas," Flynn said.

The study used statistics compiled by officials in the 26 cities. Since the method of gathering the figures varied, there is no margin of error.

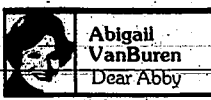
Flynn placed the blame for the "terrible human tragedy" on the Reagan administration for cutbacks in housing and welfare programs.

"America is a strong and healthy country, and it should not depend on volunteer contributions in order to meet the most fundamental obligation of all of society and that is to provide shelter, food, respect, and dignity to Americans," the mayor said.

Flynn said families with children are experiencing "the ordeal of homelessness" at an alarming rate. Children and their families make up 33 percent of the homeless population in the surveyed cities, nearly

Dollar's recovery spurs stock gains

NEW YORK (AP) — Stock prices bounced upward in late trading Thursday, recovering from some early selling to post their fourth straight day of gains. The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, down more than 20 points in early trading, closed with a 14.09 gain to 2,051.89. That extended its rise so far in the new year to 118.06 points.

Advancing issues outnumbered declines by about 3 to 2 on the New York Stock Exchange, with 946 up, 611 down and 428 unchanged. Big Board volume totaled 175.36 million shares, against 159.73 billion in the previous session.

Analysts said the dollar's fluctuations continued to set the mood for stock traders. Stocks encountered some selling early in the session as the dollar pulled back a bit against trading for foreign currencies. But as the day passed the dollar resumed the rally it began at the start of the week, and stock prices rebounded as well.

With its performance this week, the market's steepest gains in memories of the way it began 1987 with a record run of 13 consecutive up days for the Dow Jones industrial average. Over that span the average climbed 208.62 points and broke 2,000 for the first time.

Of course, the mood is considerably less exuberant this year, with memories still fresh of the crash in October. Still, the recent gains have provided support for followers of the so-called "January effect" — derived from studies showing a historical tendency for the market to rally in the first month of the year, with smaller stocks in particular attracting buyers.

Analysts said the dollar's fluctuations continued to set the mood for stock traders. Stocks encountered some selling early in the session as the dollar pulled back a bit against trading for foreign currencies. But as the day passed the dollar resumed the rally it began at the start of the week, and stock prices rebounded as well.

IDAHO FALLS — With a 2-3 Gem State Conference record, Idaho Falls can't afford another league loss — and that could spell a trying night for Twin Falls boys' basketball team, playing its first game in three weeks tonight in the Tigers' gymnasium.

The Bruins, who have lost five straight Gem State Conference games after opening with a non-league victory, know they have to control the tempo of the game against the Tigers, ranked fifth among Class A-1 teams in the current Associated Press poll.

"They are that quickness well with multiple defenses — full-court

Easley ready for second season in Pittsburgh

Logan Easley is still in the major leagues. He's still with the Pittsburgh Pirates. And because of the machinations that surrounded him last half of 1987, he's obtained a series of raises.

But most importantly, after a rehab of his right elbow, it appears the man who has called owner of the best split-fingered fastball in baseball will be able to pursue his vocation without pain.

Easley, who played infield and threw only righty until his sophomore year at College of Southern Idaho, saw things starting to unwind last spring — just after the Atlanta Braves had drilled him royally in a relief appearance on a Monday night game.

There was excessive pain in his right elbow, a condition that was aggravated by the hyperextension of his arm during the routine delivery of his bread-and-butter pitch.

Trouble was, before a player can be released, he must first be offered for waiver.

Oakland claimed him — leaving Logan to wonder where his future really was.

The Athletics said they wanted him; they would match a Pittsburgh offer but they wouldn't get into a bidding war.

Easley called Pittsburgh and the Pirates said they'd recall waivers on him, give him a raise and make another move to keep him off the draft list.

Soon after, Atlanta also made a move to obtain Logan's contract.

That caused Logan to take some pause because, as he noted to Atlanta, "I might be better off playing with you than against you because half of my ERA is against you guys."

Logan then went to four doctors without any real success, but finally was directed to a nationally known surgeon who operates on nothing but elbows.

This guy said Logan's problems were rather routine — stretched ligaments that allowed the bone ends too much play and allowed the bone to rub on bone, but more importantly, some time dislocation of the ulnar nerve.

The doctor said it was a routine plumbing job as far as he was concerned and, looking at the end of his career or a continuation.

Logan went along.

That's when he started getting the political education called professional sports.

Collectors can watch top movies anytime

TWIN FALLS — When Mary Johnson gets home after putting in a full day at work, she can't wait for her shoes, open a can of pop, and watch one of more than 60 movies she's taped on her videocassette recorder.

"We have very little free time for ourselves," says Johnson, who works at a research lab in Hagerman. "We felt like we didn't want to waste our time just watching whatever they'd picked for us to watch on TV. We wanted to be able to choose."

The Johnsons is one of an increasing number of households which contain one or more VCRs and an ever-expanding collection of movies on video tape. More than 40 percent of American families are estimated to have at least one VCR today. And researchers project that two-thirds of all households will have a VCR by 1990.

For many, ownership of a VCR also means an investment in a video store movie membership club. A lifetime membership fee of around \$20 entitles the owner to lower film rental rates.

Video West's four rental stores, which cover the Magic and Sun Valley areas, have enrolled more than 10,000 members. Another video rental store, Studio 2001, has 6,525 members in Twin Falls alone. Small town stores, such as Adventure Video in Huhl, can claim more than 1,000 members each.

In addition to renting films each week, Bob Watts, co-owner of Video West in Twin Falls, says there is a growing group of movie buffs in the area who have made a hobby of collecting their own copies of their favorite films. He calls these dedicated video enthusiasts "videophiles."

"They're people that are very interested in owning movies and having them available," says Watts. "They're getting into an age where the videos are replacing books to a certain extent."

"Say you come over to my house for dinner. Instead of just slipping on the old tube and watching TV, or sitting around and playing Elfenkory, I'd say, 'Well, I've got 80 or 90 movies in my bookcase. Would

you like to watch a movie?'"

Watts says that some videophiles take collecting more seriously than others. "While one might just keep copies of his favorite films around for sentimental reasons, another may have a room in his home that's reserved solely for his movie collection."

A big-screen TV, two or three VCRs, a library of movies — hook it up through a surround sound system and it's a kind of total environment," says Watts.

Dave Langdon, office manager at Southern Idaho Pipe and Steel, says his family watches seven to 10 movies a week.

"And that's not counting regular TV time," says Langdon. "That's just the movies we watch."

The family has a television upstairs, where most of their viewing takes place. There's also a big-screen TV downstairs, in a room dedicated to serious movie watching.

Langdon collects classics and comedies, as well as cartoons and G-rated films for his two young children.

"I don't keep very many dramas because they tend to lose suspense after you've watched them once or twice," he says. Comedies make a good collector's item, however, because they're always "easy to laugh more than once."

A longtime movie buff, Langdon often has a movie going while he's working on his computer downstairs.

"It's not real difficult for me to divert my attention and do both things at the same time," he says. "I feel I see more of the world through movies than I would ever be able to see otherwise."

Ken Pederson, a Twin Falls attorney, collects documentaries and what he considers "quality movies."

His collection of 150 video tapes includes most of Woody Allen's movies, science-fiction and foreign films. He has a 35-inch color TV hooked up to a hi-fi VHS stereo video recorder.

"I think it makes a big difference," he says of the sound quality. Pederson started a private video store in 1984.

TWIN FALLS — The question of the legality of recording movies off of TV, or duplicating a rented or borrowed copy of a film, is regularly debated.

Bob Watts, co-owner of Video West in Twin Falls, says making a copy is fine as long as it's for fun and not profit.

"Several years ago there was a case brought against SONY on a copyright infringement," says Watts. "The Supreme Court ruled on it, and as far as taking a movie and copying it for your personal use, really, there's nothing wrong with that," he says.

Watts says it's an area that has irritated the motion picture industry and that they keep coming up with ways to keep people from copying.

One deterrent has been a copy-guard system called Macrovision which makes the picture blink and colors blur on home-duplicated tapes.

"But as soon as they came out with that, immediately the market hit with a bunch of little devices that they call amplifiers that takes it right out," says Watts.

The general population copying for personal use has not hurt Watts' video business any.

"They still have to rent a movie and get a copy of it. And if they only own one VCR, then they have to rent another one. And they have to buy a blank tape. Our sales of blank tapes have gone up dramatically in the last couple of years," he says.

This year's sales of factory-produced movie videos have also quadrupled.

"It's been a popular gift," says Watts.

Large screen creates a media room

Large screen projection TVs will help create a media room in the home, says a new study by the Electronic Industries Association.

The study says that large screen projection TVs are not only a new category of objects of impulse buying, but also a new category of objects of impulse buying. They are being bought in large numbers.

Library discussions search for meaning

TWIN FALLS — Working — some of us live for our jobs, others just have jobs in order to make a living.

Beginning Wednesday and continuing through March, the Twin Falls Library will sponsor a reading and discussion series entitled, "Making a Living: Making a Life: Work and Its Rewards in a Changing America."

Series participants will read a book related to the subject of working prior to each of five meetings. They will then have the opportunity to discuss the books with guest speakers selected by the library staff to lead the group meetings.

"Reading and discussing books is not a new idea," says Linda Mitchell, project director. "But we're finding that there is renewed interest among adults who are out of school in reading books and then getting together to talk about what they've read. William Studebaker, from the College of Southern Idaho, will lead the discussion on Baker's book Wednesday at 7 p.m.

From tales of the American Dream come true, the focus of the series will shift to the American Dream gone sour with Arthur Miller's "Death of a Salesman." Miller's famous working tragedy centers on Willie Loman, a 63-year-old salesman who is fired when his young boss determines the old man's usefulness is over. After a lifetime of whipping the goddess of Success, Loman is left with feeling bitter and betrayed.

Fran Tanner, from CSI, will lead this discussion on Jan. 27.

The theme of retirement and approaching old age will be carried over into the next meeting when the group discusses Willa Cather's "The Professor's House," on Feb. 10. Cather's novel tells the story of a college history teacher who looks back on a life of achievement but discovers warning portals and other discouraging alterations that come with age. Unlike Miller's play however, Cather's central character comes to more hopeful conclusions.

The discussion will be led by James Hadden from Boise State University.

On Feb. 24, the group will read and discuss "Confessions of an Advertising Man," by David Ogilvy. Though advertising permeates our culture and helps drive our economy, this art is not always viewed as more than a friendly persuasion. Ogilvy's brief but engaging book

'Baby Boom' comedy laughs Perky aliens glow without batteries

The following are capsule reviews of some of the movies appearing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

BABY BOOM (PG-13) — Charles Shyer and Nancy Meyers ("Irreconcilable Differences") thrust a baby upon workaholic Manhattan career woman Diane Keaton, who terrifies and never prettier, with results that are hilarious and touching in this sparkling comedy that is as topical as yuppiedom but honors the great 30s tradition of sophisticated screwball comedy. With Sam Shepard and Harold Ramis.

LEONARD PART 6 (PG). In this grim mishmash, top-heavy with production values but short on humor, Bill Cosby plays a superspy turned San Francisco restaurateur who comes out of retirement to foil a crazed ecologist (Gloria Foster) who has a magic sphere capable of turning animals, even house pets, into killers. With Tom Courtenay, Moses Gunn, Victoria Rowell, Pat Colbert.

NUTS (R). Concerning the ageless social dilemmas of "Who decides someone else is nuts?" — producer/star Barbara Streisand has bitten off a huge chunk of social commentary, perhaps too large. Luckily for her, both she and co-star Richard Dreyfuss lavish great savage exchanges on each other (and the audience), and in the rip-roaring acting from them and the stellar supporting ensemble, much of the film's artifice is muffled and even enriched.

OVERBOARD (PG). Goldie Hawn is a rich harried lost overboard near Elk Cove, Ore., and remade into a Hollywood honeybunch of a housewife by father of four Kurt Russell — taking delicious advan-

tage of her temporary amnesia. Hawn and Russell are both good, but this overcooked variation on "Sweet Away" has a tacky visual style, pop-up wisecracks and no logical explanation for why all of Elk Cove seems to concur in the deception. It is a flimsy, superficially warm-hearted comedy where all the values and sentiments seem pre-cooked.

PLANES, TRAINS AND AUTO MOBILES (R). Writer-director John Hughes has made his film a catalog of worst travel experiences, but the movie's humor comes from Steve Martin, fastidious as a Siamese cat, trying to get away from curtain-ring salesman John Candy, who is actually the more resourceful traveler. The film is schizoid. It is best when Hughes turns the screen over to these two masters of physical humor, who are sometimes priceless but not often enough to have the great picture. Even on the humor of abuse, which either sits with you or leaves you de-tached and even mildly offended.

THREE MEN AND A BABY (PG). What we have here is an Americanization of Collie Serroux's "Three Men and a Cradle." Serroux's movie was fairly frothy, and this one is frothier still. The people who made it carry over much of the original's weightless, sweet-tempered flavor. Any movie in which Steve Guttenberg plays the sensitive guy would

seem to be in big, big trouble: it is like casting Fred MacMurray in a heartbreak post. But director Leonard Nimoy has the knack for relationships the writers seem to lack. And Tom Selleck seems here to find his true movie medium: the relaxed bachelor camaraderie here almost echoes the tongue-in-cheek ambience on "Magnum P.I." But without the baby, of course, the three men would be lost on their own.

WALL STREET (R). Here is a film with the slickest surface possible, a brave, alicious show of movie-making razzle-dazzle. It is fun for a while — sliding along director Oliver Stone's high-tech primer of life in the bull stock market — but eventually Stone's moralizing and Charlie Sheen's lack of emotional connection with the audience turns the film into something tiny, thin and close to moral bankruptcy. As such, we can be decently grateful for Michael Douglas' wizardly acting turn as the super-nasty corporate raider, Gordon Gekko.

Here's my theory: Steven Spielberg was captured by aliens, brainwashed and forced to become their public relations man. That's why he keeps making or backing the likes of "Batteries Not Included," a hilarious sci-fi fantasy about urban decay and perky aliens. Though directed by Matthew Robbins, it is an Amblin Entertainment feature rooted in the Spielbergian credo: Earthlings are gang bangers without the human apparatus.

In this case, the UFOs are Lilliputian beings, like anthropomorphic pie-tins. When hope is lost, they come to the aid of the residents of a New York tenement in a dispute with an unscrupulous real estate developer. Rejected by the preservation society and harassed by urban youths, the holdouts are about to give in when the we saucers land. They speed through the rubble, pip-squeak from another planet, battling their baby blue headlights and repartee toasters and tandy.

Troupers Jessica Tandy and Hume Cronyn prevail over the hardware, with Tandy — especially touching as the silver-haired Faye, happily lost in her own senility —

Cronyn is unendingly patient, as if Frank, coping with her delusions as he fights to save their home and the cat's that's their livelihood.

The developer hires some young thugs to smash up the place, but the aliens make it good as new again by morning. The inventor's assistant pledges to protect the beings, who meanwhile have built a scrap metal nest on the rooftop.

Casting tends to be erratic, with Michael Carmine as the Hispanic heavy gang amuses Frank's suit-and-sexually-intimidated present tenant Maria, sweetly played by "La Bamba" Elizabeth Pena. Dianne-Boutsekiris co-stars as the

upstairs artist who falls for Maria, who poses for him while baby aliens (born in an earlier scene) play in his paint pots. They may be only metal, but they are as adorable as humanoids.

Perhaps Spielberg and his pawns Robbins want to implant maternal instincts in the collective consciousness. Or maybe they just can't think of another story. The director's enfranchised must look to the stars for salvation. What a strange lesson to teach children — that they are basically helpless.

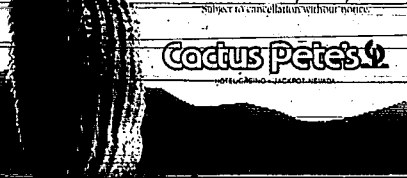
Well, "Batteries" is a strange Dianne-Boutsekiris-co-stars-as-the-and-otherworldly-benevolence.

For Leno, comedy's still a business

BOSTON — Jay Leno is seated at a table in his hotel suite, his long, blue-jeaned legs sprawled over the desk, the remains of a pizza still in the cardboard container next to his foot.

In a few hours, Leno would appear before a sold-out audience at Symphony Hall, but a few blocks from Emerson College where he once entertained in the college cafeteria. He has sent a limousine to pick up his parents in Andover, 28 miles north of Boston, and bring them to the show.

Leno, 37, is strangely unmoved by the joys of returning to his hometown as a star. He seems almost embarrassed by his growing fame and the status that comes with it: the permanent guest host slot on "The Tonight Show," starring Johnny Carson, his recent comedy special: the "Boyz n the Hills" address, the fleet of expensive cars in his garage.

The more famous he becomes, the less he wants to talk about it.

"I really live, day to day," said Leno, who seems noticeably when asked to comment on his success. "This is a business. This is a job; it's my work. I consider myself a journeyman comedian."

Given the chance, Leno would prefer to talk about his past as a struggling comedian. He is happily chronicling a career he says was "like watching the hands of a clock turn."

Take the audience wearing the coal-miner headlamps. It's a favorite story of Leno's from his early days as a comic performing in strip joints in Boston's red light Combat Zone and in dives across the country.

The club was called the Mino Shaft and the audience wore joke-miner lamps around their heads. Leno was forced to perform his comedy act while strippers twirled onstage. He stood in the dark, off to one side.

"Nobody could see me when I was talking and nobody cared about what I was saying," he recalls. "And when I looked out in the audience, all I saw was a bunch of lights on everybody's heads."

Leno began working as a comedian while still in college. He performed at Emerson and had several gigs at study halls at another college. During the summers, he traveled the minor-league comedy circuit around the country.

But while he recalls some "awful times," he also says that it was a great job compared to his classmates who were "working at Wendy's or someplace."

"I'd go to my dressing room and

there would be six nude girls," he said. "I loved it. I'm still kidding with all these strippers."

He worked as a Roller-Royce and Mercedes-Benz mechanic by day while he honed his comedy at night. He got his first break at a now defunct Massachusetts club, Lennie-on-the-Turmpike, in Saugus. Lennie Sogoloff, who owned the club, was a friend of Leno's at his Symphony Hall concert.

In 1977, Leno appeared on the "Tonight Show," the ultimate goal of many comedians, but said the impact on his career was negligible.

"A lot of people started with ruckered-up me like I was standing still," he said. "I'm not a gimmicky type of comedian."

Though Leno struggled as much as any aspiring comic, including sleeping in his car when he first moved to California, he rejects the angst associated with many comedians.

"I didn't even know how bad I was in the beginning," he said. "So, you just keep writing new jokes and new material. I have a job. The worst that can happen is that people don't laugh."

Fortunately for Leno, people do laugh. They laugh at jokes that seem antediluvian by today's standards. Jokes that hinge on four-letter words, sex and violence and heavy on his mother's difficulty working, the videocassette player and his father's attempts to fix everything with a screwdriver.

"If I look out into the audience and see a 70-year-old couple, why should I insult them?" he said. "I talk to audiences the way I talk with friends."

Leno sometimes sounds too good to be true. He talks admiringly of his wife of eight years, Mavis, who doesn't smoke or drink and visits his parents about 10 times a year. But according to his mother, what you see is what you get.

"He can't wait to get the tuxedos off," said Catherine Leno. "He likes to go-off and fool around with his motorcycles. I tell him, 'It's no wonder no one ever recognizes you on the street — you're always a mess.'"

Not all couch potatoes are mashed under skin

Amid the fevered pace and hyperactivity of these times, a word or two should be said in defense of the couch potato. I raise such a point with sheepishness, for I know that any sign of sloth flies in the face of contemporary mores. It suggests a deficiency of character. These days, goofing off is out.

The culture calls for the schedule to be checkbook, the platter to be full. We are expected to be up and about constantly, charging forward with determination and purpose. Look at all the achievers—actual and aspiring. See them bounding about in zeal, doggedly pursuing whatever they covet. They often break into a sprint late they arrive too late to do the deal or to cut off a rival at the pass.

Their family life, too, seems marked by increasingly frenetic diligence. For grown-ups and youngsters alike, calendars are clogged. Everyone is running to this activity or that appointment. "There is no space for mental meandering and no time to sniff the garden or bat the breeze."

Consider, in contrast, the more orderly world of the couch potato, whose goals are modest and expectations less exalted.

Couch potatoes are liberated from the tyranny of the race. Some have slowed to a saunter and faded back in the pack. Others dropped out during an early lapse or were blowed off the track by unruly competitors.

The 12-hour work days, power breakfasts and crisis conferences are not for them. They never bolt for quick trips to the coast.

They spend uncounted hours stretched out in hickies, in chairs and loungers, on a direct line of sight with the television. Drinks and cholesterol-laden snacks are at hand. They are surrounded by renting mailers, none of it daunting.

Couch potatoes tend to plumpness. They are a gentle and soft-edged group, generally without aggressiveness except when faunted by snoring know-it-alls who are barreling up the fast track.

Foking along in the slow lane, couch potatoes have more time to spend with their spouses and children, though not all of it may be the "quality time" much talked about by the high achievers.

They are generally driven, but couch potatoes are mildly curious about what is happening around them. In a desultory way, they dip into this and that. They watch a lot of TV, devour People magazine and favor paperback books that offer narrative pace and high suspense.

Because of their extensive exposure to the outlets of mass communications — mostly electronic couch potatoes are brimming with

knowledge. Some of it is even useful. They remember the assistant secretary of state for international affairs, Larry Bird's three-point percentage and the name and occupation of Oprah Winfrey's boyfriend.

Couch potatoes do not lend; they receive. They do not speak out; they change channels. They never become ministers of state or captains of commerce.

Still, couch potatoes deserve better than their image as indolent neophytes. Most of them are responsible and law-abiding folks who earn their way, pay their bills and tread a straight path.

They stand for stability, order and civility. They exemplify predictability, calm and steadiness. In today's hyped climate, these are no small contributions. Let's hear it for the sofa aptitude among us.

SNOW BUILD-UP
During the last few days of continued snowfall and snow build-up the City Street crews have had an increasing problem with snow being pushed out into streets and alleys from private property. City Code Section 6-2-9 (D) prohibits the obstruction of public ways except by special permit. Those who block or partially block streets, alleys, and sidewalks with snow removed from private property are violating the law. Coleman uses unusual character to advantage in "Slap Maxwell"

By PAUL ELIE

Slap Maxwell, the leading character in ABC's Wednesday-night series "The 'Slap' Maxwell Story," is TV's most intriguing cliché.

The character, played by Dabney Coleman, is a hard-drinking, hard-living sportswriter, a throwback to another age. But in the eyes of his colleagues, his persona is as outdated as the fedora he wears at work. To them, and to audiences, Slap seems like a pitiful but lovable parody of himself.

"He's a realistic myth," Coleman says. "He knows he's good at what he does, and beneath all that talent and wit he's always saying, 'I could have and I should have. But when it comes down to it, he wouldn't say it seriously.'"

In his private life and at the Ledger, the small-town newspaper where he works, Slap's cronies treat him in a manner that falls somewhere between ridicule and respect. He is badgered by his ex-wife Annie (Susan Anspach), rejected by the newspaper's staff secretary and his would-be girlfriend Judy (Megan Gallagher), berated by his editor Nelson (Brian Smiar) and roughed up by the enraged subjects of his columns. But a fawning office boy (Bill Calvert) and an all-knowing bartender (Bill Cobbs) are always around to boost his confidence.

"Slap lives in a state of turmoil," Coleman says. "He's volatile and he rubs people the wrong way. If he likes someone, he tries to hide it. But underneath he's got a warm



heart."

Coleman, 54, has pursued virtually separate careers in television and movies. In the movies, he is a well-regarded supporting actor. He has appeared in films ranging from the farcical "9 to 5" (1980) and "Tootsie" (1982) to the elegiac "On Golden Pond" (1981). Last summer, he did a hilarious turn in "Dragnet." "I have played some serious stuff, not just rascals," he points out.

His rascals most often find themselves in TV series. Coleman's best-known TV roles — Fernwood mayor Merle Jeeter in "Mary Hartman, Mary Hartman" and talk-show host Bill Bittinger in "Buffalo Bill" — were striking and unusual characters. "On TV, it's unique to have an outlandish personality and get away with it," he says.

"Slap Maxwell," like "Buffalo Bill," was created by Jay Tarses, who also created last summer's surprise hit "The Days and Nights of Molly Dodd." Tarses' shows are often praised for being more honest and ambitious than the usual sitcom. Coleman agrees.

"In the past, sitcoms haven't gotten involved as much with a character's history or with his future situation," he contends. "The character needs no past, has no future — and barely has any present, really. But with this, each episode is like a mini-movie."

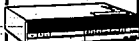

Sinatra to read script for 'Magnum'

Frank Sinatra has been reading a script prepared for him by the "Magnum, P.I." writers that would reprise his February 1987 role on the series as a retired New York cop.

Charles Johnson, executive producer of the CBS series, said if he has the time and likes it, Sinatra could join the cast for one of the five shows still to be taped in this eighth and final season.

So far, said Johnson, no decision has been made whether to do the series finale as a two-parter or a two-hour special (if the decision is for a two-hour finale, it could be delayed for the May ratings sweeps, he indicated).

The scripts for either version haven't been done yet but Johnson has a pretty good idea what they'll contain, though he declined specifics.

He does want to assure viewers they'll see "all the main characters come full circle and go on to other aspects of their lives, while remaining friends. And there's a very nice surprise in store for Magnum (Tom Selleck)."

Johnson also said that "we're going to deal with the character of Robin Masters," the invisible best-selling author whose poah Hawaii estate has been the home of Magnum and Jonathan Higgins all these years (in the first episodes, the late Orson Welles could be heard as their Master's voice, in radio and telephone conversations).

"It's been such a carrot for us. I don't know quite how we'll wrap it up. And I can't say we'll meet him."

Johnson, in Honolulu, said the final wrap-up, now scheduled for mid-March, is "going to be very difficult for us, since we've been together for so long." Johnson, who has been with the series six years, including the last two as executive producer, said there are 75 on the permanent staff in Hawaii and another 50 located in Los Angeles.

And the key to the "Magnum" success? Johnson guesses that it was "the stabilization of the writing staff in the third year of the series, when two or three writers established a cumulative narrative. Viewers were able to track the characters and we could bring people back once in a while."

As for plans for two additional episodes, to bring the total to 16 for the year, they are very much up in the air, according to Johnson. "A great deal depends on how long it takes to get the five remaining shows done. Usually it would be seven or eight days but it has been as much as 15 sometimes this year."

As of Dec. 31, NBC's "Today" show won the morning network race for the sixth week in a row with a 4.3 Nielsen rating and a 21 percent audience share (each rating point represents 886,000 TV homes).

ABC's "Good Morning America" was second at 3.9-20, while the month-old "CBS This Morning" was third at 2.1-11.

The week before, the new CBS show had zoomed to a 2.5-13, CBS' best rating in the morning time slot since the week ending May 29, 1987, and its best share since the last week in January of last year, when "This Morning's" predecessor began the long, slow one-and-a-half toward cancellation.

"Today" spent six straight weeks behind GMA shortly after the Nielsen polemeters were introduced in mid-September. NBC researchers reported Thursday, Dec. 31, with a hint of that self-satisfaction that researchers at every network seem to display whenever it's bad news for a rival, that for the fourth straight week, "Today" had recovered a well

enough to finish first with a 4.5-22 over the 13 weeks, compared with a 4.4-21 for GMA and a 2.2-11 for the one month of "CBS This Morning."

(Let's hope that New Year's Eve, amid the revels and the toasts, at least some of those NBC researchers resolved to be kinder to rival webs in 1988!)

The Arts and Entertainment cable network goes from 20 hours to round-the-clock, 24-hour service starting Jan. 1.

Charlie Rose is up for contract renewal at CBS News but his agent Richard Liebner and CBS News president Howard Stringer haven't had a serious chat yet.

Liebner said earlier this week that "we'd love some additional exposure" on the network for his client — who in four years has made "Nightwatch" something of a cult with the VCR and home video sets — but scotched rumors that any mention has been made of Rose becoming the regular replacement for Lesley Stahl whenever she takes time off from "Face the Nation."

Although Rose reportedly has had a nibble from another network, chances are good he'll remain with CBS and "Nightwatch."

The Public Broadcasting Service, a little slow with its audience figures, nevertheless claims that last season (October 1986 through September 1987) public TV averaged 96.8 million viewers a week, including 63.3 million in prime time. That's up from 92.8 million and 60.4 million viewers the year before.

"Shoah" registered the highest cumulative audience per episode of any program offered on PBS that year, with an 8.4-million viewer count. "The Story of English" was next at 5.4 million, followed by "Eyes on the Prize" at 5.1 million viewers.

While we're on the subject of public broadcasting, Congress finally voted the system \$232.5 million for fiscal year 1990 in the big budget bill signed by President Reagan Dec. 22. The Corporation for Public Broadcasting was originally ticketed for \$245 million as a compromise between the \$288 million passed by the House and the \$248 million approved by the Senate. But the across-the-board 4.26 percent cut applying to all nondefense discretionary appropriations reduced the final figure to \$232.5 million.

Fans anxiously await new episodes of "Days and Nights of Molly Dodd"

NEW YORK — It is a freezing cold night on the Manhattan street, and Blair Brown, playing Molly Dodd, comes out of the apartment building without a coat.

James Greene, playing Davey the doorman, notices the stunned look on her face. He drapes his coat around her shoulders and puts her in a taxicab.

A small crowd has gathered on the street to watch. They murmur to each other and nod approval when they're told that the filming is for new episodes of "The Days and Nights of Molly Dodd."

The show's 13-week-run last summer was a ratings success, and even though NBC has always said the series would be back midseason, fans were beginning to wonder where it was.

"Molly" doesn't have a time period yet, but NBC plans to put it back on the air and hope that the show's loyal following will return to it despite the confusing hiatus. The network had talked about resuming the show in mid-January but now has no firm date.

"The first day back, they start saying those words, and it's magic to me," said the show's creator, Jay Tarses. "It's like they were never gone. It fits 'em like gloves. It's like we didn't even take a break. We're back and it's so terrific."

"Molly" was Tarses' first show after he and former partner Tom Patechett parted following "Buffalo Bill," a brilliant comedy starring Dabney Coleman that was ultimately judged too inaccessible to a mass audience. Coleman now stars in Tarses' other series, "The Slap" Maxwell Story" on ABC.

Tarses' heart still belongs to "Molly," though.

"I think 'Molly' is such an elusive show," said Tarses. "I think it's really hard to capture what it is in words. It's a lot of things to a lot of people. I just think it's something very special and personal to me. I care about it desperately."

Brown has been doing movies and miniseries during the hiatus — "Hands of a Stranger" for NBC and a theatrical film that hasn't been released yet, "Stealing Home," with Jody Foster and Mark Harmon. After months in other roles, she had to become Molly again.

"We did the first shot and all looked at each other like, 'Well, where have we been?'" said Brown. "It does feel like sort of later that same day."

"What you really have to get back to is, do what you like to do, because that's all we ever did in the first 13. We had to get that same kind of cavalier spirit back this year — we're doing this in the dark and no one's over-going to see it."

In the new episodes, Molly gets

some new men in her life and a job in a bookstore.

"She does not become a publishing magnate," said Brown. "That is — what's different about Molly. On most shows — about women, she would end up the head of a publishing company. But she just works in a bookstore."

"It's going to open up a little bit more," said Tarses. "There's going to be more people. There's going to be more men in her life. There's going to be a lot more family kind of crises. It's just going to be more of the same. We're not ready to change it yet. If it ain't broke, you know, don't fix it, right?"

"In the first episode back we're going to try to fill people in a little bit on what transpired in the past year but without hitting anybody over the head," he said. "The people that like the show will find it again, we hope, and it's up to NBC to build a new audience if they can."

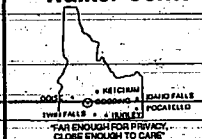

Some parting shots at television during 1987

HOLLYWOOD — Parting thoughts about TV in 1987: We had the the Gates of Wrath — Irangate, Gary Hartgate, Jim and Tammygate, Berk-Ginsburgate, Joan — Riversgate, CBS morning showgate and Fairness Doctrinegate among others.

—TV's Best Kept Secrets In 1987: One was "Mad Movies," which cable's Nickelodeon network says it is shifting to Saturday mornings.

"Mad Movies" is an outlandishly funny syndicated series redubbing old movies with new, incongruous dialogue. Fortunately, 26 of these half-hours were made before production was stopped in 1985. "Mad Movies" is an old and simple idea, but one executed with exquisite, side-splitting silliness.

Also deserving a bigger spotlight is "The Foreign Correspondents," a CNN half hour on Saturdays in which Washington correspondents from other nations share their views of American politics with host Mary Tillotson.

TV has no shortage of Americans talking about America. But here is

a candid, dispassionate, reasoned world view of ourselves that is simply unavailable elsewhere on a regular basis.

Meanwhile, describing any NBC program as a secret may be stretching things a bit. Yet three 1987 episodes of "Beverly Hills Buntz" — one of NBC's occasional "designated hitters" — received relatively little attention. Too little.

"Beverly Hills Buntz" is a wonderfully comedic spinoff from "Hill Street Blues" starring Dennis Franz as former New York Detective Norman Buntz, who is now a private eye in Los Angeles, and Peter Jurasik as his sidekick Sidney Thurston, formerly Sid the snitch.

The three half-hours were very funny because of the scripts and also the work of Franz and Jurasik as characters whose relationship is rooted in Ralph Kramden and Ed Norton. They are a raw, belching, snorting blast.

"Beverly Hills Buntz" is said to have a good shot at gaining permanency on NBC's schedule sometime in 1988, which would make it a secret no more.

● **WIMP** of the year: Apple Computers, for withdrawing its com-

—Dunces of the year: TV news people who have publicly applauded "Broadcast News" without realizing that they are precisely the types being mocked by James Brooks' new movie.

Therefore, before shooting began, the boys spent a series of evenings living it up; nightclubbing, going dancing and painting the town together. Though they became good friends in the process, it wasn't always easy, especially when you're walking around in public with Tom Selleck!"

Q: Isn't Carol Burnett so depressed about a new book she's working on that she's temporarily given up performing? — L.R.

A: Carol is a bit intense these days. But she's only cutting down just a tad on her always heavy

workload. She's currently involved in promoting the paperback version of her "One More Time" book, preparing a video plus two TV projects. In the meantime, Gilman is preparing a new show with an old theme — "Tales of Tinseltown," all about two young innocents who go to Hollywood looking for fame and fortune back in the 1930s.

Guy brings fresh air to "Different World"

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Forty-five minutes after she was hired, Jasmine Guy was on the set beginning her role as the stuck-up deb Whitley Gilbert on NBC's "A Different World."

She auditioned for the role in New York, where she had been living for seven years.

"They flew me out here and I had two more auditions," she said. "I read for the network twice, on Friday and on Monday morning. After the Monday reading I went straight to the studio and started work. That's how pressed for time they were."

Guy, with her pretentious Southern accent and her snooty ways, is perhaps the best thing on this listless spinoff from "The Cosby Show." The idea of the show was to send the Huxtables' second-oldest daughter, Denise, played by Lisa Bonet, to college, schedule the show immediately after "The Cosby Show" on Thursday night, and have

an instant hit. The show certainly has not missed as far as ratings are concerned. Most weeks, it and "Cosby" have been in first and second place in the rankings.

Critically, the show fizzled. Bonet's Denise is bland at best. But the show comes alive when Guy is on screen. It seems unlikely she'll get a larger role, since the show was created as a showcase for Bonet.

It's the first series for Guy, who has had guest roles on "The Equalizer," the miniseries "At Mother's Request" and the soap operas "Loving" and "Ryan's Hope." She was a regular dancer on "Fame," but she never had a speaking role.

It's been a long trip for Guy from high school in Atlanta to a network series in Los Angeles, but 1987 has been a banner year for her.

Early in the year, she was in the Off-Broadway play "Beehive," doing impressions of Diana Ross, Tina Turner and Annette Funicello.

Next, she had a starring role in Spike Lee's new feature film, "School Daze." Kadeem Harrison, who's also in "A Different World," stars opposite her in the movie. Guy plays a coed in a fraternity "little sister" group called the Gamma Rays. "I don't have an accent," she said, "so maybe America will really see that I don't talk like Whitley."

After that, she went to Paris for six weeks for a 1960s review in the mold of "Beehive."

In August she began work on "A Different World." Her character was a last-minute addition to the show. The pilot and several episodes had already been filmed without her.

She first went to New York on a scholarship to the Alvin Ailey Dance Center. She was a concert dancer for 2½ years. She was a dancer in the pilot of "Fame" and came to Los Angeles for 10 episodes.

Martha Raye's \$10-million lawsuit against David Letterman dismissed

WASHINGTON — A Los Angeles judge Dec. 17 dismissed actress Martha Raye's \$10 million suit against comedian David Letterman, ruling the NBC star was clearly joking when he said in a TV monologue on March 5 that she was a "condom user"....

Superior Court Judge Norman Epstein said "no one could reasonably understand (Letterman's remark) in a defamatory sense. The remark was delivered as a joke, apparently intended as a parody"....

The host of "Late Night With David Letterman" had said "I saw the most terrifying commercial on television last night featuring Martha Raye, actress, condom user"....

Raye sued for \$10 million, claiming the remarks implied she was "sexually promiscuous and unchaste" and "personally uses condoms in some form of deviant, aberrant or socially unacceptable....behavior"....

Letterman's attorney said he was trying to parody Raye's commercials for a denture adhesive. Raye's attorney earlier said his client may appeal the ruling "on the principle involved"....

In the first of what could be several changes soon in its Saturday night lineup, Fox Broadcasting has announced that "Boys Will Be Boys" debuts at 8 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 16....

"Boys" is the revamped — and retitled — version of "Second Chance," which featured Kiel Martin as a young chap who is reincarnated and given the chance to make good in life....

Not worth a third chance, the old show has remained in the 3.0 Nielsen range. Now Fox has dropped the concept and Martin. The rest of the cast (Matthew L. Perry, William Gallo, Demian Slade and Rende Heller) and their characters return as a bunch of fun-loving teen-agers coming of age in California. A Fox official explained that "the teen demographics were very high, even at 9:30 p.m."....

In the new lineup, "Boys" will kick off at 8 p.m. Saturdays, followed by "Women in Prison." The
