## Deal with social problems now, Andrus asks

BOISE — Gov. Cecil Andrus opened the 1988 session of the Idaho Legislature on Monday, urging more attention to social problems before they become expensive.

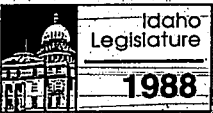
"We must help children at risk," the governor said in his annual State of the State message. "Let me put it to you in very plain terms — we can pay now or pay later. It costs less and makes more sense for us to pay now," he said.

Andrus outlined his 13-point program only in broad terms. He won't come up with specifics on how to pay for them until he presents his budget on Wednesday.

Legislative leaders generally praised Andrus' goals, but said they were reserving judgment until the governor reveals how he will raise the money for them.

"At noon on Wednesday, it will mean more to me to learn what it will cost," said House Speaker Tom Boyd-R-Genese.

Both chambers elected new leaders. Senate Democrats picked Sen. Bruce Sweeney, D-Lewiston, as new majority floor leader. He moves "up" from assistant floor

leader and Sen. Gail Bray, D-Boise, moved into that job. The old majority leader, Kermit Kiebert, resigned after the Senate chose a new state Transportation director.

Sen. Marguerite McLaughlin, D-Orofino, was running but dropped out when Bannock County Democrats decided to back Mrs. Bray.

"I'm not chicken, but I can count," said Mrs. McLaughlin.

In the House, Blackfoot dentist Rep. Michael Simpson was elected new GOP majority caucus chairman. He succeeds Dean Sorensen, who resigned from the Legislature and was replaced by his wife, Sheila.

### Governor endorses Newcomb's package of AIDS bills

BOISE — A major legislative AIDS package received the support of Gov. Cecil Andrus in his State of the State message Monday. To the delight of the bill's sponsor, Twin Falls Rep. Russell Newcomb.

"I'm very flattered," said the Republican legislator and surgeon. "It took me by surprise."

Andrus briefly touched on the AIDS issue toward the end of his 25-minute speech. He called it a "serious threat to public health, not a political football."

Andrus then looked straight at Newcomb, who sits within spitting distance of the speaker's podium, and said Newcomb's proposals "are worthy of your careful consideration."

Newcomb is drafting 16 separate bills dealing with AIDS. His proposed legislation calls for mandatory AIDS testing in three areas, and voluntary education for couples applying for a marriage license.

Specifically, Newcomb is preparing legislation that will require mandatory testing of blood and organ donors and donors of semen for artificial insemination.

In addition, Newcomb wants mandatory testing of prisoners at the time they enter and leave prison.

The legislation would also require blood to be categorized as a hazardous substance to insure that laboratories, hospitals, nursing homes and police "incinerate or properly sterilize" the blood before disposing of it.

Newcomb said his legislation is a package de-

signed by the Idaho Medical Association, the Idaho Hospital Association, and Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.

Andrus' remarks caught the attention of Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Deer, chairman of the Health and Welfare Committee.

"I think the governor's endorsed Doc Newcomb's package, that's bound to help," Darrington said. "AIDS is not a partisan issue. It cuts across party lines."

As a signal that the issue will occupy a major part of this year's debate, Darrington has scheduled an information meeting on AIDS with the Idaho Medical Association at the Idaho State Capitol.

"I think the hardest thing about AIDS is how does it relate as a major health threat to the general public," Darrington said. "I think the threat must be gigantic."

Simpson defeated Rep. Reed Hansen, R-Idaho Falls. Vote totals were not announced from the Republican caucus, but other reported candidates dropped out before Monday's vote.

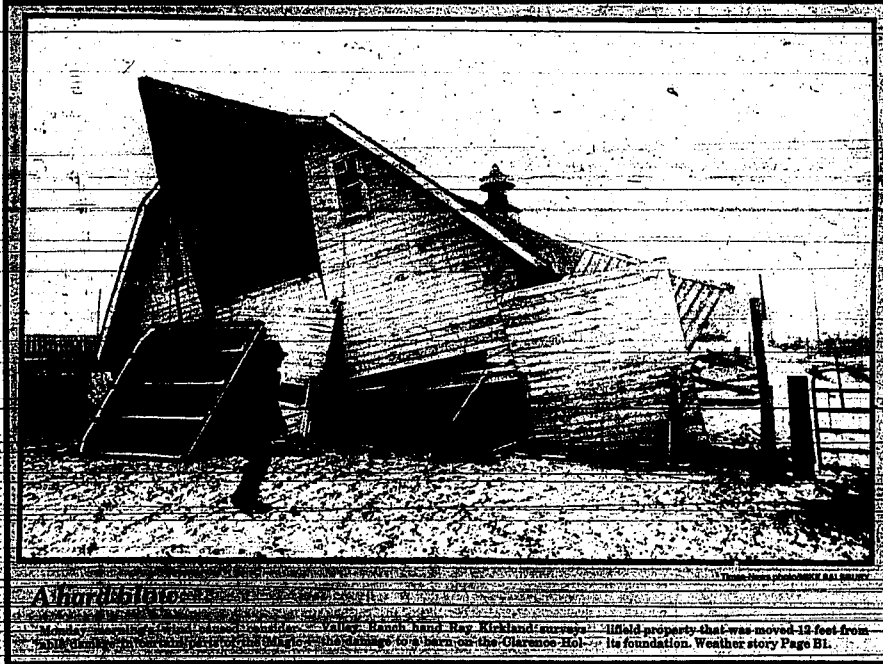
In his second State of the State speech since being elected governor

in 1986, Andrus said Idaho's economy has improved. He said he will work at economic development, and proper funding for education, must continue if it is to be successful.

He called upon the Republican-dominated Legislature to continue

last winter's bipartisan partnership must not be seen as a one-time event. Every year we must make an investment in our future.

"We have our legs under us again, our heads are up, more sure in our step, more firm in our resolve, more clear in our course," Andrus said. "But last year's step forward

### Hospital officials say Local control better for a cancer center

TWIN FALLS — Magic Valley Regional Medical Center officials explained Monday why local is better when it comes to plans for a hospital cancer treatment facility, on which construction could start in about one year.

But Twin Falls resident Harry Moore said that even if MVRMC had such a facility, he'd still travel to Mountain States Tumor Institute in Boise to receive his treatment because of that facility's experience.

"You ask any patient going to MSTI. They are the nicest people in the world," Moore told the MVRMC Board of Trustees. "If you had a facility here, I would (still) go to Boise."

Trustee Dr. A.C. Emery said others may feel the same way as Moore. But a MVRMC-operated facility will provide local control.

"We want the citizens of this community to have some say," Emery said.

Hospital Administrator John Bingham reported to the board at its regular meeting the status of the hospital's plan to develop and build a cancer treatment center. He presented a preliminary timeline that showed it could be about one year before the planning phase to the construction of a center to be located at the hospital.

This Thursday, architects are going to meet with hospital staff to discuss a site plan for the proposed center. After Thursday, he may better know when construction might be able to start, Bingham said.

Bingham also provided a historical view of when the hospital began talking cancer treatment and background to "clear up some misinformation."

He said the hospital's cancer treatment facility will provide mid-range radiation therapy. As a result, an affiliation with a larger cancer center — such as MSTI — is required to gain expertise and to provide patients with higher-range radiation therapy.

No tax dollars will be involved in the building of the cancer center, Bingham said.

The hospital board had voted in December to start the development of a cancer facility at the urging of medical staff. In its recommendation to the board, the medical staff also suggested the MVRMC cancer treatment center affiliate with a larger cancer facility.

MSTI, an arm of St. Luke's Medical Center, had planned to announce Christmas Eve its intention to build a \$2-million satellite in Twin Falls. But MSTI withdrew its plans after its officials found out about the MVRMC decision to proceed on its plans for a center, MSTI said.

### 'Downwinders' bitter at rejection of suit

SALT LAKE CITY — News of the U.S. Supreme Court's rejection of a lawsuit claiming open-air atomic weapons tests caused cancer in downwind residents was received Monday with bitterness by plaintiffs.

"This government of ours isn't going to admit it did anything wrong," said Marilee Laird of Central City, Nev. "It's just like the Contra (hearings) — you can't believe a damn thing they say any more."

In rebutting an appeal in the 1979 lawsuit by some 1,200 residents of southern Utah, northern Arizona and southern Nevada, the high court upheld a 10th Circuit Court of Appeals decision last April 20 overturning a Utah federal judge's 1984 award of \$2.6 million in 10 of 24 representative cases.

The suit alleged the government

was negligent in failing to properly warn people living downwind of the Nevada Test Site about the dangers of fallout from the above-ground nuclear blasts conducted from 1951 to 1962.

Ralph E. Hunaker, the lawsuit's lead attorney, and former U.S. Interior Secretary Stewart Udall, another plaintiff-lawyer, said in telephone interviews from Phoenix that the ruling left survivors of the atomic tests no further remedy except through Congress.

However, neither attorney was op-

timistic about congressional action on behalf of their clients. In 1985, the Senate rejected a fallout compensation bill sponsored by Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah.

"I feel very sorry for these people, they deserve a remedy from somewhere. Maybe Congress will come through for them, but this is the end of the line as far as legal action," Hunaker said.

"I think it's a sad day for the country to have a rich and powerful nation like ours hide behind a moldy 18th Century doctrine, it's pathetic," Udall said.

### Hart, Simon targets in Democrats' Iowa debate

SIoux CITY, Iowa (AP) — Gary Hart came under fire from one of his rivals for skipping the debate Monday night, while Illinois Sen. Paul Simon was challenged to defend a deficit-cutting plan described as a "puppy-chasing" effort.

Four Democratic presidential candidates traded familiar — but occasionally sharp — jabs in the two-hour campaign debate, but former Arizona Gov. Bruce Babbitt zeroed in on Gary Hart, wherever you are.

Hart had decided to skip Monday night's debate, campaigning instead in New Hampshire, and Babbitt attacked that decision.

When Hart decided to rejoin the Democratic presidential field, he made a point of saying he would take his political case directly to voters, Babbitt said.

"He said he was going to take his case to the people," Babbitt said. "It looks to me like the people are here. It looks to me like the people are in Sioux City."

The four were winding their way through the debate when Babbitt

drew a laugh from the crowd of about 1,000 when he said: "My first question is for Gary Hart. I know that Gary Hart is not here tonight. I'm not sure where he is."

Organizers had attempted to lure Hart, but were unable to persuade him to attend.

Most of the serious criticism was directed at Simon, who has generally fared well in most polls in Iowa, though Hart has held the lead in some recent polls. Iowa holds its key precinct caucuses Feb. 8.

During the campaign, Simon has been criticized for "proposing" big

spending programs while favoring a constitutional amendment for a balanced budget. In response, Simon last week said he would favor an increase in income taxes for the wealthy if the money is needed to balance the budget.

Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis challenged Simon to justify a job program "that costs billions of dollars" instead of programs such as welfare reform that Dukakis said would actually save money.

"That's a much better approach,"

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# Climate loosens up for Takeshita visit

WASHINGTON (AP) — Although major trade frictions remain, the political climate for Takeshita's visit this week is far less tense than when his predecessor, Yasuhiro Nakasone, was here last spring. The falling dollar, which has battered Japanese exports, appears to be a prime reason for the recent partial easing of strains.

The yen rose in value by 34.1 percent against the dollar in 1987, helping to drive up the price of Japanese goods to American consumers. As a result, the \$56 billion annual U.S. trade deficit with Japan — the main impetus behind anti-Japanese sentiment in Congress — recently has begun to show signs of declining.

Takeshita is his first visit to the United States since taking office in November, arrives in Washington on Tuesday for three days of talks with President Reagan and other leaders.

Economic issues loom large on

the agenda for the meeting of leaders of the world's two largest economies.

Although relations between the United States and Japan appear to be improving, some divisive trade issues remain. Among them:

— **SEMICONDUCTORS:** Takeshita is expected to press for removal of the remaining \$165 million in sanctions imposed on Japanese electronics products by the United States in a computer-chip trade war.

— **CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS:** Alleged Japanese refusal to allow U.S. companies to bid on big construction projects, like the \$8 billion Kansai International Airport in Osaka, provoked Congress late in 1987 for ban Japanese firms from participating in U.S. public works projects.

Takeshita is expected to protest this prohibition, while Reagan is likely to press for greater access to Japanese projects for U.S. contractors.

# Nofziger's trial starts

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former White House political director Lyn C. Nofziger, sporting a Mickey Mouse tie that is his trademark, presided over his own trial Monday on charges he illegally lobbied former administration colleagues.

"I think we're going to win this thing," Nofziger told reporters outside the U.S. Courthouse as he arrived for the first day of jury trial Monday on charges he illegally lobbied former administration colleagues.

"I know there was no intent to do anything wrong," Nofziger said. "I am innocent of anything and so I feel that the jury will find that to be the case."

Prosecutors won a key pretrial victory when U.S. District Judge Thomas A. Flannery ruled they didn't have to prove that Nofziger intended to violate the lobbying restrictions on former public officials.

Nofziger is accused of four felony counts of lobbying White House officials within a year of leaving the president's staff.

He is the first person to be accused of directly violating the post-employment restrictions on former government officials contained in the Ethics in Government Act.

Nofziger, 63, is accused of lobbying Attorney General Edwin Meese on behalf of the pharmaceutical company, and Meese's deputy, James Jenkins, in 1982 on behalf of Westech Corp.

# High court to rule on vaccine dispute

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court said Monday it will settle a potentially costly battle by deciding whether the government may be forced to pay damages when a vaccine it licenses causes the disease it was intended to prevent.

The Reagan administration is arguing that if the government is held legally responsible in such cases it may withdraw entirely from licensing new vaccines.

The justices agreed to hear an appeal by the parents of a Pennsylvania boy who contracted polio after receiving a dose of oral vaccine.

In a busy return from a four-week holiday recess, the court also:

— Refused to hold the government financially responsible for the deaths and diseases allegedly caused by years of open-air atomic weapon tests in Nevada. The court rejected an appeal by some 1,200 people who either lived downwind from the test site or had relatives who did.

— Agreed to decide in a Pennsylvania case whether the mother of an illegitimate child may sue the alleged father for support more than six years after the child is born.

— Agreed to use a case from Milwaukee, Wis., suburb to study whether communities violate free speech by banning all picketing of private homes.

— Announced it was expanding its

study of the constitutionality of a federal law aimed at promoting charity among teen-agers. The justices now will examine whether parts of the statute may be salvaged if they decide it promotes religion unlawfully by giving federal aid to church and other religious groups.

— Said it will decide whether federal lawyers procedurally botched a

contempt-of-court case against the Providence Journal. The Rhode Island newspaper says it was justified in defying a judge's order not to publish FBI information about a Mafia boss.

— Refused to reinstate the triple-murder convictions of former boss Rubin "Hurricane" Carter and co-defendant John Artis. New Jersey prosecutors are uncertain whether

they now will seek a third trial in the 22-year-old case.

— Let die some, but not all, of the lawsuits filed by Vietnam veterans against seven manufacturers of the herbicide Agent Orange. The court let stand rulings that the manufacturers, as military contractors, are immune from being sued over the alleged health effects of the herbicide.

# Privacy of trash arguments heard

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two lawyers from California talked about privacy before the Supreme Court Monday.

At issue: Do you have a right of privacy in the garbage you put in a plastic bag and haul out to the curb?

California courts said yes, ruling that police officers must obtain court warrants before searching through such discarded garbage.

Michael J. Pear, deputy district attorney for Orange County, Calif., told the nation's highest court that the state courts were wrong.

"There is no expectation of privacy here," Pear argued.

But Michael Garoy of Santa Ana,

Calif., a lawyer who represents two people arrested on drug charges after police sifted through their garbage, said most reasonable people expect the contents of their garbage bags to remain unrevealed to the outside world.

"An opaque garbage bag reveals much — about lifestyles, — contains many secrets," Garoy said.

When he discarded garbage to be subjected to public view, Justice Antonin Scalia suggested, "Don't you have dogs in California?"

The justice added, "It's pretty risky to leave your garbage out when there are dogs around anyway."

Garoy argued that there are great differences between governmental searches of someone's garbage and a dog's sniffing or a search by a snooping neighbor.

When Justice Thurgood Marshall asked whether California residents legally may stop their neighbors from searching through their trash put out for pickup, Garoy said they can.

— But Pear said they cannot.

# NASA to test backup part for shuttle

WASHINGTON (AP) — NASA said today it will use a backup design for a space shuttle booster rocket part that failed last month and if it passes testing, shuttle flights could resume July 15.

"If the alternative part passes rigorous testing and our other schedules are met, July 15 is the earliest we could fly," Rear Adm. Richard Truly's associate administrator for space flight, told a news conference.

Last week, Truly estimated the latest delay in resuming launches at six to 10 weeks and today he said that "hadn't changed." The space agency had been aiming for a June 2 launch of Discovery.

The shuttle fleet has been grounded since the explosion two years ago of shuttle Challenger and the deaths of its seven crew members.

The accident was blamed on a faulty joint in one of two solid fuel booster rockets. Flames escaped through the joint and touched off the large external fuel tank.

Following a full-scale test firing of a replacement booster on Dec. 23, officials announced the new joint worked fine. A week later, they reported an inspection of the rocket showed that a carbon boot ring that protects a nozzle swiveling joint had cracked, but it did not affect the performance of the rocket because it occurred during a scheduled move after the firing was completed.

The boot ring is critical to the shuttle's performance because it allows the booster nozzle to swivel around the booster. The ring design was a new one being tested for the first time and was supposed to have been the final configuration.

The backup ring design was tested successfully last August.

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# Officials arrest bomb suspect

BERLIN (AP) — Police on Monday arrested a 27-year-old West German woman they suspected planted a bomb in a West Berlin discotheque that killed two American servicemen and prompted a retaliatory U.S. raid on Libya.

Christina Gabriele Endrickigt, 27, was arrested on Monday night after the April 5, 1986 bombing of the La Belle discotheque for two Palestinian terrorists authorities have linked to Syria. The blast, also killed a Turkish woman and wounded 224 people.

The United States cited a Libyan link to the bombing as justification for air raids 10 days later that Western diplomats said killed at least 100 people in Tripoli and Benghazi.

Information about Endrickigt remained sketchy.

She and a man who was not identified were arrested in the northern port city of Luebeck at 2:40 a.m., said Volker Kaehne, a spokesman for the West Berlin Justice Department. West German television said the two had been living in a house there.

Kaehne gave no details of the arrest. Security sources said there was no gunfire.

Kaehne said authorities had received a tip from people he refused to identify, following a trail of documents from West Berlin to Luebeck. He would not elaborate.

On Sunday, Kaehne announced that police were seeking Endrickigt and were offering a reward of 160,000 West German marks (about \$83,000) for information leading to her capture. He said a warrant had been issued for her arrest on Dec. 30.

Security sources said she was believed to be with her 3-year-old son.

Kaehne said Endrickigt was being brought to West Berlin and questioned about the bombing on Tuesday. He refused to discuss her background.

U.S. officials said after the La Belle bombing that they had intercepted radio messages from the Libyan embassy in East Berlin that implicated Libya in the attack. The transcripts, however, have not been released to the public by West German investigators.

The security sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said they had always suspected an Arab connection in the La Belle bombing, with Libya and Syria suspect, and that such possible links were still under investigation.

In Washington, State Department spokeswoman Phyllis Kaitera said Monday that the United States remains convinced that Libya is responsible, at least in part.

"We will be following the Berlin investigation closely and with special interest in the possibility that another government, in addition to the government of Libya, may have been involved," she told reporters.

# U.S. still links Libya

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration insisted Monday it had sold intelligence that Libya was behind the April 1986 bombing of a discotheque in West Berlin, despite fresh evidence from West Germany that Syria played an important role in the attack.

In justifying the air raid against Libya 10 days after the bombing of the La Belle disco, President Reagan alluded to the interception of at least two messages from the Libyan People's Bureau in East Berlin to Tripoli. And administration officials were sticking to that position.

"We have clear and convincing evidence of Libyan culpability in the La Belle bombing," said Phyllis Kaitera, a State Department spokeswoman.

Other U.S. officials said the evidence consisted of transmissions from the Libyan People's Bureau, or embassy, in East Berlin before the bombing and a confirmation of the explosion afterwards.

The transcripts, however, have not been released to the public or West German investigators.

The Libyan embassy changed its methods of communicating with Tripoli after Reagan alluded to the intercepts publicly, said one official, speaking on condition of anonymity.

# Two killed in Israel occupied territories

BETAN, Occupied West Bank (AP) — Two prominent Jewish settlers shot and killed a Palestinian teenager Monday in the West Bank, and Israeli troops killed an Arab who tried to grab soldiers' rifles in the Gaza Strip, the army said.

It was the first confirmed instance of Jewish civilians killing Arabs in the violence that began Dec. 8 in the occupied lands, where 1.5 million Palestinians live. Israel captured the West Bank and Gaza Strip from Jordan and Egypt in the 1967 Middle East war.

Many of the 66,000 Jewish settlers in the territories carry weapons.

Army spokesmen said the settlers opened fire on Arabs who stoned their car outside Betin, 10 miles north of Jerusalem. Ahd Motti Nabham, 15, and other Arab witnesses said the youths did not throw stones and the civilians started shooting after their car was stopped by a roadblock of burning tires.

Soldiers shot another Palestinian dead in the Gaza Strip city of Khan Yunis when he tried to jump a trooper and seize his automatic rifle, the army said.

A third Palestinian died Monday of wounds he suffered last week, bringing the official count of Palestinians killed to 31 since Dec. 8. More than 200 have been wounded and about 9,000 arrested.

Five Palestinians were wounded Monday, including one shot in both feet by the Jewish settlers in Betin.

In the Gaza Strip, the army faced protesters Monday who blocked streets with boulders, scrap metal, tree branches and overturned gar-

bage bins.

Arabs, many with their faces painted, tried to break through the Associated Press reporter Karin Laub. The left front passenger window was broken and the rocks injured Mark Levine, a journalist for the Canadian Broadcasting Corp.

In the walled Old City of Jerusalem, AP photographer Anat Givon saw soldiers arrest children despite protests from one of the mothers. The woman, who would not give her name, said her son was 11 years old.

# Israel gives visa extensions, warning to Soviet delegates

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel granted month-long visa extensions to visiting Soviet delegates but warned that the Soviets would be expected to leave unless Moscow opened its doors to an Israeli delegation, government officials said Monday.

The tough talk reflected an apparent deterioration in Israeli-Soviet relations, which were severed in 1967 but warmed in the months prior to the U.S.-Soviet summit in Washington in December.

The Israelis made their condition known in a meeting with Soviet delegation head Georgi Martirosov Sunday, the same day Israeli officials revealed the arrest of a businessman suspected of spying for the Soviets.

"We said we were willing to extend the visas for a period of one month with the stipulation that we expected to be able to send a delegation to Moscow in return. It's a matter of principle," Foreign Ministry spokesman Ehud Gol told The Associated Press.

Martirosov said the Kremlin was considering the Israeli request, but did not say whether it would be accepted, Gol added.

"If they don't agree, we'll say goodbye," said another Israeli government official who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Martirosov, reached by telephone, refused to comment.

The Soviet consular delegation has been in Israel since this summer on a mission aimed at reviewing Soviet property holdings and speaking to Soviet citizens living in Israel.

Israeli officials initially hoped the delegates' presence would lead to a de facto renewal of relations which Moscow broke after Israel captured Arab land in the 1967 Middle East War.

But officials in Jerusalem have complained that the Soviets have shown less interest in developing relations with Israel and improving the situation for Soviet Jews since the Washington summit.

# AIDS summit meeting set

GENEVA (AP) — Health ministers from 120 countries have accepted invitations to participate in the first such "summit meeting" on AIDS this month, a World Health Organization official said Monday.

Jonathan Mann, head of the WHO's special program on AIDS, said the Jan. 26-28 meeting would be the first such gathering of ministers held to discuss a single health problem.

The ministers will discuss methods for educating people about AIDS and preventing the spread of the virus, taking into account social and cultural backgrounds, Mann said. The meeting will be co-sponsored by WHO and the British government.

Mann repeated WHO's estimate that 160,000 people will contract AIDS in 1988, doubling the estimated number of victims since the epidemic began a decade ago.

He said that until now 73,747 cases have been reported to WHO, but that the actual number is believed to be double that because many cases go unreported.

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# Iraqi planes raid Iran tankers, shatter lull

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — Iraq said Monday its warplanes raided two Iranian oil tankers, sending a message that it has resumed Gulf shipping that had encouraged hopes for a truce in the 7-year-old war.

Maritime officials confirmed at least one Iranian ship hit in raids Sunday night. One said it was a tanker carrying an air strike on Abu Musa, an island base for Iranian speedboats — assaults on merchant vessels.

There were increasing reports of broad efforts to achieve a cease-fire in the war, which has resulted in more than 1 million casualties on both sides and raids on about 450 commercial ships, most of them from neutral countries.

Karen Brinkman, an envoy of Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev, told reporters that the Kremlin "would not hesitate" to back a U.S. proposed arms embargo if Iran does not accept the call for a cease-fire issued in a U.N. Security Council resolution July 20.

But, he said, U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar will make "new efforts" to end the conflict, which began in September 1980.

President Hosni Mubarak of Egypt, on a tour of the area, held a news conference in Abu Dhabi and praised Arab efforts "to mediate to end the bloodshed in the Gulf."

He said without elaboration that Egypt "will offer military aid if the gulf states are in danger," but denied reports that he already had agreed to send troops to the region.

A communique broadcast by official Baghdad radio said Iraq had scored five hits on two "large maritime targets," a standard reference for Iranian tankers, at 9 p.m. and 11 p.m. Sunday.

Lloyd's Shipping Intelligence Unit in London said Iraq raided the 280,476-ton super-tanker Eschscholtz on Sunday. The steamed south from Iran's main Kharg Is-

land export terminal with a full load of oil.

It said the vessel, owned by the National Iranian Tanker Co., made its way to Larak Island in the Strait of Hormuz, the narrow entrance to the gulf.

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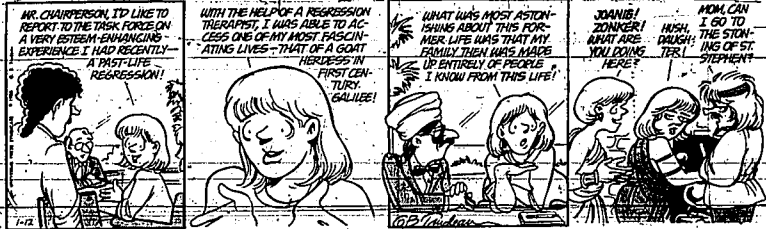

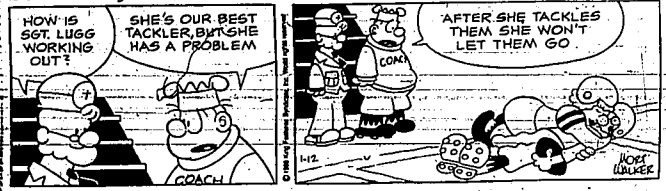

## CPA named to commission

**BOISE (AP)** — Nolan G. Young, an Idaho Falls accountant, was named Monday to the Idaho Personnel Commission, along with McCall attorney Bill Killen.

The appointments were announced by the governor's office, along with two appointments to the board which controls state construction funds.

Young succeeded former legislator H. Ford Koch, Boise, whose term has expired. Young's term runs until July 1, 1989.

Young was the Republican candidate for state auditor in 1982, losing to Democrat G. Williams.

Along with Republican Larry Jackson, who Andrus appointed to the state Tax Commission, Young served on the Republicans for Andrus Committee in the 1986 governor election and toured the state in behalf of Andrus.

Both must be confirmed by the Idaho Senate this session, and Republicans already have vowed a battle against the Jackson confirmation.

Killen will replace Anne Solomon, Coeur d'Alene, who resigned. Reappointed to the Personnel Commission were Morrison-Knudsen Co. executive Richard Chastain and longtime Democrat Party leader Emily McDermott.

## Sale set for Dallas defense

**BOISE (AP)** — The son of a former Idaho Fish and Game officer is raising money in an effort to parole killer Claude Dallas from the Nebraska State Penitentiary.

Jack Wayne Chappell, Grandson is the unofficial chairman of a benefit livestock auction to be held in Elko, Nev., on Jan. 31. Proceeds from the sale will go to the Claude Dallas Legal Defense Fund.

Dallas was convicted of voluntary manslaughter in the slayings of Idaho Fish and Game officers Bill Pogue and Conley Elms on Easter Sunday 1986. He escaped from the Idaho State Penitentiary on Easter Sunday 1986, was recaptured almost a year later and was acquitted of the escape.

In September, he was transferred to the Lincoln, Neb., prison, where he is serving the remainder of his 30-year prison term, which began in February 1983.

Chappell said the loose-knit committee working on the auction wants Dallas paroled because they think he has been a model prisoner. He did not elaborate.

## Crash kills snowmobiler

**ISLAND PARK (AP)** — A Rexburg man was killed near here when the snowmobile he was driving struck a tree, an Idaho State Police dispatcher said.

Edgar Blair Covington, 49, was dead at the scene following the accident Friday afternoon. It near the Island Park Lodge, the dispatcher said.

After the machine hit the tree, tracing Covington, it went for another 70 feet and hit another tree before coming to a stop, the dispatcher said.

## Judge suppresses evidence

**REXBURG (AP)** — A notebook containing written statements that prosecutors contend could link Barrynton Seary to the July 15 slaying of Teresa Rice will not be admitted as evidence at his trial, a judge has ruled.

7th District Judge H. Reynolds George ruled Friday for a defense motion to suppress the notebook as evidence. The first-degree murder and robbery trial for Seary is scheduled to open March 7 in Fremont County.

Seary, 21, is charged with shooting Mrs. Rice at Jack's Highway Shopping Center and taking approximately \$1,180 in cash, silver dollars and dimes. Mrs. Rice was shot twice sometime after she closed the store the night of July 15.

Seary was arrested Sept. 17 in Rexburg. He is being held without bail in the Madison County jail in Rexburg.

George ruled police should have obtained a search warrant before seizing some of Seary's mother, Bonnie Seary, Rexburg. One of the bags contained the notebook.

## Worker's death investigated

**BOISE (AP)** — The Occupational Safety and Health Administration will investigate an accident that killed a construction worker at the Boise Town Square site last week.

Norman Boepple, 44, Boise, was injured at the site Wednesday. He died of severe head injuries about 12:45 p.m. Saturday at St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center.

Boepple was on a ladder and lost his balance when a partially constructed wall shifted. He fell about 15 feet into a stairwell.

Results of the investigation should be available in about a month, OSHA inspector Ryan Kuehlich said.

One other worker has been killed and four others injured at the site during the past four months.

# Brief storm hits state, closes schools

A severe winter storm roared through Idaho early Monday, leaving slick roads, closed schools and a blizzard of snow.

More snow was in the forecast for Monday and the rest of the week, but, "It's nothing like what the frontal passage gave us," said Jack Sands of the National Weather Service Boise.

Though gusts of winds up to 40 mph were predicted for Monday,

Sands said the high winds that reached 68 mph during the frontal passage had moved out of the state.

The brief, intense storm that moved through in the pre-dawn hours brought blizzard conditions, high winds and forced the closures of several schools.

The central Idaho mountains and southeastern Idaho took the brunt of the storm, which had moved out of the state by 9 a.m. today.

Brief power outages were reported throughout the state.

A Teton County sheriff's office dispatcher said all major roads out of the valley were closed. She said the valley experienced blizzard condi-

tions through the night and district schools were closed.

A Wyoming Highway Department spokesman said Teton Pass was closed about 7:45 a.m. Monday because a blizzard reduced visibility to zero and avalanche danger was high. He said it probably would be closed at least through Tuesday.

Law enforcement agencies were plagued by a rash of accidents caused by slick roads but no serious injuries were reported.

Avalanches closed one lane of traffic on U.S. 93 Sunday, and three slides came down on Lost Trail Pass north of Salmon. Highway crews expected to have it cleared by late morning.

High winds reached the Pocatello area about 5 a.m., where gusts of up to 68 mph were reported, officials said.

An avalanche closed Idaho 21 at Grand Junction on Sunday, and numerous snowdrifts were reported between Idaho City and Lowman.

# Governor among prospective jurors in Rhoades trial

**BOISE (AP)** — Gov. Cecil Andrus was among the approximately 120 prospective jurors Monday being evaluated by attorneys to decide the fate of accused-slayer Paul-Ears Rhoades.

However, Andrus was among the jurors excused Monday afternoon, when individual questioning of jurors was to begin. He was excused at noon, in time to deliver his state of the state message at 1 p.m.

Jury selection began on the opening day of the second session of the 49th Idaho Legislature.

A jury is being empaneled to try Rhoades on charges he killed teacher Susan Michelbacher last spring. He also is accused of murder in two other deaths, but is being tried separately on those charges.

The jury is being selected in Ada County, but the trial will be held in Bonneville County's Seventh District. Judge Larry Boyle said he didn't expect the trial to begin before late this week, and predicted it would last at least 10 days.

Andrus signed the extradition warrant to bring Rhoades back to Idaho from Nevada, where he was arrested last spring.

During a group questioning Monday, 7th District Judge Larry Boyle read a list of witnesses and asked prospective jurors if they knew, or were related to any that would be called.

Andrus raised his hand and said he knew Darrol Gardner, a private investigator in Bonneville County, who is to be called as a witness for the prosecution. Gardner is a former warden at the Idaho State Penitentiary.

Andrus also knew the judge, Andrus said, bringing laughter from other prospective jurors.

Responding to Boyle's question whether the trial location of Idaho Falls would pose any particular hardships, Andrus asked if movement would be restricted, and Statehouse.

whether jurors could talk with staff and attend meetings at night and during recesses.

Boyle said jurors would be able to communicate with families and businesses, and each would be given a credit card to charge the calls to Bonneville County. "Yes, governor. We will give you a Sprint card too," Boyle said.

Andrus, prospective juror number 33, was among those dismissed for the afternoon. Jurors 11 through 100 were instructed to call after 6 p.m. Monday and get instructions for when to report back to the court room for individual questioning.

Andrus, who served as Interior Secretary under President Jimmy Carter, is in his third term as Idaho governor.

Boyle began examining jurors who might be asked to decide whether Paul-Ears Rhoades is guilty of killing Mrs. Michelbacher.

It's one of three slayings in eastern Idaho Rhoades is accused of committing, along with robbery, kidnapping and other charges. He will be tried separately in the other cases.

The crime occurred in Bonneville County, but defense attorneys successfully argued it would be impossible to pick a fair and impartial jury in that area because of massive pretrial publicity about the case.

After a 12-member jury and alternates are chosen, it will be taken to Idaho Falls for the actual trial.


In Ada County, jury lists are made up from registered voters and those who have driver's licenses in the county. Almost no one is excused from reporting.

Courtroom security was tight. Court marshals used metal detectors to screen everyone entering the Ada County Courthouse, where the jury was being selected just across the street from the Statehouse.

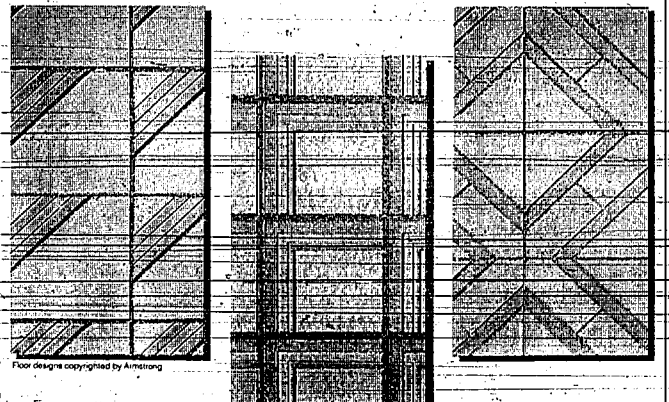

Judge orders Amoco to cough up \$85 million

CHICAGO (AP) — Amoco Corp. environmentalists' system, was ordered Monday to pay \$85.2 million to France and about 90 other plaintiffs for damages caused when the supertanker Amoco Cadiz ran aground off the Brittany coast a decade ago and spilled 68 million gallons of oil.

The case was heard in Chicago because Amoco is headquartered here, but McGarr was required to apply French law in determining the amount because the accident occurred there.

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# Boyington a victim of cancer

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) — World War II flying ace Gregory "Pappy" Boyington, the Marine aviator who led the famous Black Sheep Squadron, shot down 28 Japanese planes and won the Medal of Honor, died Monday at the age of 76.  
Boyington died about 4 a.m., said Nancy Hinds, operator of a hospice for terminal cancer patients.  
Boyington wrote a book about his exploits with the Flying Tigers and

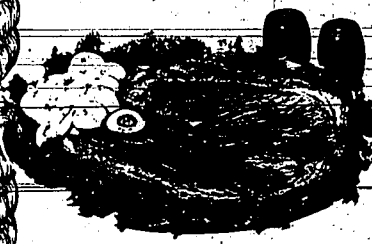
the Black Sheep Squadron titled "Baa Baa Black Sheep" that was a best seller in 1958 and was the basis of a television series starring Robert Conrad.  
Boyington, born Dec. 4, 1912 in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, was credited with shooting down six Japanese planes in 1941-42 with the Flying Tigers. Gen. Claire Chennault's American Volunteer Group, in combat over Burma and China.

When Marine surgeons said a broken leg would end his combat flying, Boyington molded a group of pilots rejected by other squadrons into the Black Sheep, a crack squad.  
Boyington operated in the central Solomon Islands during 1943-44.  
Boyington spent the war's final year and a half as a Japanese captive after his plane was riddled by bullets and crashed in Rabaul harbor, New Britain, in January

1944.  
The day he was captured, Boyington was credited with his 28th confirmed kill, tying the record set by Capt. Eddie Rickenbacker in World War I. He had also won the Medal of Honor and the Navy Cross.  
Later, Boyington officially was credited with shooting down 28 enemy planes, he said in a 1972 interview with The Associated Press.

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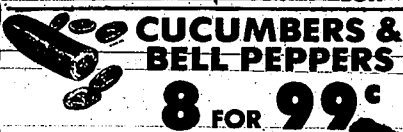
