Tapes indicate normal takeoff for Flight 1713

WASHINGTON — Pilots of Continental Flight 1713 had no clue of a problem as their DC-9 roared, apparently at proper speed, down the slushy runway at Denver's airport and began climbing routinely last November.

But within seconds came the sound of a stalling engine, an explosive, a bang, more engine stalling and impact, according to documents released by government investigators Thursday.

The sequence from first sign of trouble to impact with the ground covered only 4.3 seconds.

The documents, including a transcript of a cockpit tape, provided no evidence that would point directly to the cause of the Nov. 15 crash that killed 28 of the 82 people aboard the flight that had been bound for Boise, Idaho.

A National Transportation Safety Board spokesman emphasized that the investigation has yet to determine whether the apparent engine stall caused the crash or whether

the stall itself was the result of other factors that already may have caused the plane to lose its proper aerodynamics.

Ted Lopatkiewicz, the spokesman, said several key reports, including one on the condition of the two engines and a close analysis of background sounds from the cockpit recording, that might reveal engine performance have yet to be completed.

An engine compressor stall could be caused by slush or ice going into the engine, perhaps during takeoff.

But aviation experts said such a stall might also have occurred if the plane lost its normal angle of attack, causing an interruption of air flow through the turbine.

Ice contamination on the wings or an unusual wind gust might cause a plane to lose its proper attitude and cause an interruption of engine airflow, experts have suggested. Both possibilities remain under NTSB investigation.

Witnesses have said that Flight 1713 rocked dramatically from side to side seconds after liftoff, followed

by a wing tip striking the ground and the plane flipping on its back. It broke into three pieces.

The documents made public Thursday confirmed the plane had been thoroughly deiced. The sound of the deicing fluid hitting the aircraft could be heard on the tape as the plane rested at the special deicing area used by Continental aircraft at Stapleton Airport.

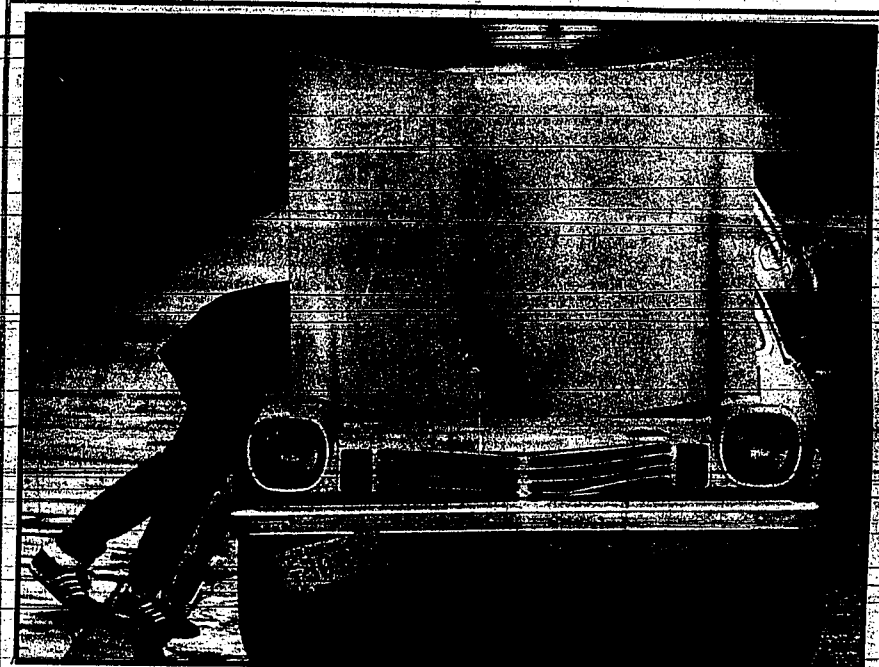
Capt. Frank Zvonik, 43, and his younger co-pilot, Leo Edward Bruecher, 26, who had flown only one previous trip on a DC-9 and

would be at the controls, marveled about the deicing procedure.

"It's like going through a car wash," remarked Zvonik. A flight attendant came into the cockpit the tell the pilots that some of the fluid was seeping into the cabin through the door. She was told that was because the cabin had yet to be pressurized. And the crew laughed.

The deicing was completed 23 minutes before the plane took off and the pilots requested clearance from

Bork leaving federal bench

WASHINGTON — Robert H. Bork is resigning as a federal appeals court judge, saying he wants to serve in a public campaign of "miseducation" that he started in his nomination to the Supreme Court, the White House announced Thursday.

President Reagan reluctantly accepted Bork's request to step down from the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia after six years, effective Feb. 6. He called the conservative judge's defeat in the Senate "a tragedy for our country."

"All Americans are the poorer today for not having your extraordinary talents and legal skills on the high court," Reagan told Bork in a letter.

There had been hints in recent weeks that Bork was ready to shed his judicial robe in favor of a public speaking campaign to answer accusations of philosophical extremism raised against him during his confirmation battle last summer and fall.

Bork's decision was made public in an exchange of letters released by the White House, between the judge and Reagan. Bork's resignation letter was dated Jan. 7, and the president's acceptance was dated Thursday.

As Bork made known his plans to commence a campaign to "speak, write and teach" about law and about the judgeship confirmation process, both he and Reagan reiter-

ated their views that the process has become too politicized.

"There is a lot of misunderstanding of the role of courts in this country and I intend to engage in the debate about what the role of courts is," Bork said outside his home Thursday afternoon. "I expect to write and speak more freely about issues than I can as a judge."

Bork added: "I am very grateful to the president for his letter to me. I truly appreciate it."

The 60-year-old Bork, a longtime faculty member at Yale Law School, first came to national attention in the 1973 "Saturday Night Massacre" during the Watergate scandal.

As U.S. solicitor general, he agreed to fire special prosecutor Archibald Cox after Attorney General Elliot Richardson and Deputy Attorney General William French Smith had resigned, refusing to comply with then-President Nixon's order.

Bork's nomination encountered fierce opposition from a wide variety of liberal interest groups almost the very moment that Reagan chose him last July 1 to succeed the retiring Justice Lewis F. Powell Jr. on the Supreme Court.

Civil liberties feminist and other groups charged that Bork would turn back the clock on civil rights, an accusation he and his largely Republican backers strongly denied.

Even before the Senate's 58-42 rejection of Bork's nomination Oct. 23, there had been indications he was dissatisfied with his life on the appeals court and did not plan to stay there.

Takeshita pledges aid in improving economy

WASHINGTON — Japanese Prime Minister Noboru Takeshita pledged on Thursday to work for an era of "dialogue and cooperation" with the United States to improve the world economy, but U.S. calls continued for more specific steps by Japan to reduce its trade surplus.

Sen. John Danforth, R-Mo., said Japanese leaders have made promises before, yet the trade gap grows. On one of the current major sore points, U.S. inability to penetrate Japan's construction market, U.S. Trade Representative Clayton Yeutter said a proposal "brought by Takeshita falls short of expectations and that the Reagan administration would consider retaliatory action.

Takeshita, on his first visit to the United States since taking office in November, vowed after a three-hour meeting with President Reagan on Wednesday to work to improve relations between the two nations, stabilize financial markets and play a larger role in helping the world's debtor countries.

He expanded on those themes Thursday in a speech and question-answer session at the National Press Club, the only speaking engagement on his three-day trip to Washington.

"The Japanese-American alliance is now entering a new age in which it must not only serve the interests of our two countries but must also contribute to a better future for the entire world," he said.

Utahns among slimmest in 25-state weight study

ATLANTA (AP) — West Virginia state residents are widely considered trimmer and "Hawkins" and Utahns are slimmest of all, according to a 25-state study by federal health researchers that found Americans' weights seem to vary by state.

Forty percent of the West Virginians surveyed in the 1986 study by the national Centers for Disease Control qualified as overweight, the agency reported Thursday. In Hawaii and Utah, the figure was 14 percent.

Utahns had 14 percent of their men overweight, 15 percent of their women, and 16 percent for both sexes, according to the study.

Andrus' spokesmen defend tax hike plan

BOISE — The Andrus administration took defense of its \$33.5 million tax increase package into the halls of the Republican Legislature Thursday as the governor's spending plan appeared to have stronger public support than many lawmakers believed.

Officials from the governor's budget office deflected criticism of two key components of the tax package — the elimination of the 5 percent sales tax exemption for the value of trade-in merchandise like cars and the extension of the sales tax to repair services.

The director of the Idaho Automobile Dealers Association called the trade-in proposal "the wrong way to do it" and claimed the repair tax discriminated against labor-oriented repairs while leaving other services



tax free. He said the plan could hurt consumer confidence.

But education supporters of the administration plan for another infusion of money into schools remain a poll indicating more than half the state backs that spending priority and nearly half would pay higher taxes to see it accomplished.

The first full day of debate on the new budget blueprint opened before the Legislature's joint Revenue Projection Committee, where Auto Dealer's Association Director Robert

Contract funds go for pay hike for prosecutor's office staff

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter is using money from a contract with the city of Twin Falls to give herself and her employees pay raises instead of hiring a fifth prosecutor as originally planned.

Baxter said the change in plans results from a breakdown in negotiations over courthouse expansion that would provide room for an extra prosecutor.

Fifth District Judge Daniel Hurlbut has approved Baxter's request to amend her budget to reflect the new salaries.

Under the contract, the city is paying Baxter's office \$19,000 a year to prosecute the city's misdemeanor cases.

So Baxter and the employees in her office sat down and just decided to split up the caseload and money, in a "reasonable fashion."

Under law, county prosecutors are required to handle all of a county's felony cases, but cities are responsible for providing misdemeanor prosecutions.

Under the contract, the city is paying Baxter's office \$19,000 a year to prosecute the city's misdemeanor cases. Baxter is using money from a contract with the city of Twin Falls to give herself and her employees pay raises instead of hiring a fifth prosecutor as originally planned. In October, when the new budget year begins, Baxter's salary was increased from \$34,500 to \$36,000 at that time.

the deicing pad, according to the transcript. But a mix-up by controllers apparently allowed at least one other aircraft to move ahead of the 737-400 in the takeoff line.

The pilots became irritated by the delay and reminded the tower they had been first for takeoff on the airport's north side. Six minutes later the plane was told to taxi into position for takeoff. Another two minutes passed before the plane began its departure.

Aside from discussions about the deicing process, nothing was said by the pilots about possible ice accumulation, and the transcript provides no indication that either pilot specifically checked for ice contamination on the wings after the plane left the deicing pad.

The transcript confirmed that Bruecher, who had only 38 hours of flying time in a DC-9 and none in

snowy conditions, was at the controls.

"I've got the brakes on. You've got the airplane," Zvonok told his co-pilot.

A controller relayed information that another Continental pilot had noticed "a little crud on the runway" during takeoff.

"A little crud," replied Bruecher as the crew continued through its preflight checklist. Zvonok cautioned the co-pilot, "Don't slide."

Then came clearance to take off. According to the transcript, neither pilot indicated any sign of trouble as the plane raced down the slushy runway.

There's a hundred knots, looking for one-thirty-nine," Zvonok advised, indicating the jet was gaining proper speed. Seconds later the aircraft reached the point where takeoff could no longer be aborted, then they were lifted off the concrete.

Still, there was no sign of a problem.

"Positive rate," advised Zvonok six seconds after liftoff, a phrase usually indicating the aircraft was attaining proper lift and the landing gear could be retracted.

Three seconds later the first unusual sound, similar to an engine compression stall, could be heard.

Then came an explosive from Bruecher and another sound of an engine stall and a "bang" followed by two more compressor stalls, and the sound of impact.

As usual, NTSB officials declined to discuss the factual reports which were released without analysis.

It could not be determined Thursday what the "bang" referred to. One NTSB source, speaking on the condition he not be identified, said it is not believed to have been a major factor in the crash.

"Zvonok" and "Bruecher" were among those killed.

Hendelizer claimed the loss of the trade-in exemption could seriously curtail new car sales. If that happens, he warned, revenues from the sales tax could actually decline.

"In some instances, that loss of the trade-in deduction is going to have an impact on consumer decisions," conceded chief administration economist W. Ferguson. "But I don't think it will be great."

Ferguson also defended the governor's conservative \$665.6 million revenue estimate that forced proposal of the tax-increase plan. He

estimated that significantly higher economic turmoil over the next 18 months that could be caused by national and international conditions.

Legislative Auditor Bruce Henderson echoed Ferguson's warnings in offering his forecast for revenues of under \$671 million, acknowledging that the last several million dollars of that projection could in no way be counted as certain.

"It is clear that what we have to look forward to is slow growth, and that's the best we have," Barton told the panel, which will come up with a formal revenue forecast next week. That number will guide budget and tax writers in putting together a new spending plan.

Earlier in the day before the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee, Budget Director Martin Peterson tried to ease concerns of budget writers about the policy impacts of the two bills.

Rep. Robert Geddes, R-Preston, raised concerns that sales-tax schemes, each raising over \$11 million annually, would hit hard at farmers still struggling to overcome low market prices. And Sen. Wil-

liam Ringert, R-Boise, feared the repair tax would only open the way to sales tax on other services.

Peterson assured both their fears were unfounded. He said farmers will retain their current production exemption from the sales tax and pay only 4 percent of the proposed new taxes on their farm equipment.

As for opening the way for sales tax on all services, he said some like restaurant meals and lodging are already taxed so "I don't view this as a great shift in policy in the state of Idaho."

Meanwhile, the Idaho Education Association released a public opinion poll it said supported Gov. Cecil Andrus' contention that the people will back his new tax and spending plan that includes a 7.5 percent increase in state aid to education for the year beginning in July.

The statewide poll showed that over half the 513 randomly selected respondents supported another increase in the state education budget this year, and nearly all of them would pay higher taxes if that was what it took.

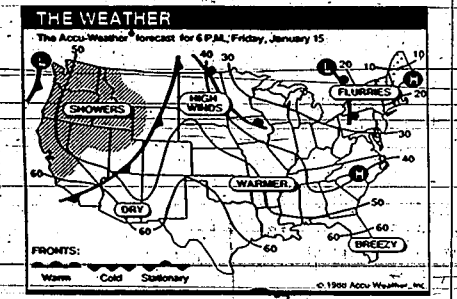

and they do tend to be very health-conscious people.

"But all of this is, to some degree, conjecture. ... We don't have any solid answers."

Twenty-five states and the District of Columbia participate in the CDC's Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System, which measures public participation in behavior that can be harmful to health.

To get an idea of state-by-state weights, researchers asked people by telephone for their weight and height. The results are then plugged into a formula, and respondents over a cutoff point are deemed overweight.

Behind West Virginia came Wisconsin and North Dakota, each at 93 percent overweight.

Here is the formula for figuring the CDC's Body Mass Index: weight in kilograms, divided by the square of height in meters. Men with an index of 27.8 or more are deemed overweight; for women, the cutoff is 27.3. For example, a 5-foot-10, 193-pound man would be at the exact cutoff point.

This is the first year CDC has used this height-weight formula, but applying it to 1984 and 1985 survey results found no distinct trends over the three years, the agency said.

Pregnant women were excluded from the study.

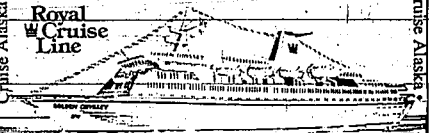

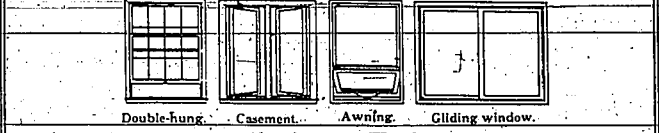

Hill proposes bigger business tax break



BOISE (AP) — Republican Boyd Hill rejected Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus' attack on the state investment tax credit Thursday and won committee approval to increase his own bill increasing the business tax break the governor wants to completely eliminate.

Even though analysts estimated the boost in the tax credit would cost the state \$25-million in revenue, the House members from Meridian contended the move would ultimately benefit the entire state by expanding businesses and creating new jobs.

"My position is that any investment in Idaho is good," Hill told members of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee.

The committee voted 13-5 to print and introduce Hill's proposal to expand Andrus' current 3 percent investment tax credit to 5 percent. The proposal also calls for expansion of tax breaks for new jobs.



A key provision of the governor's budget plan this year calls for repeal of the 3 percent tax credit. Andrus estimates that would add \$15 million to tax revenue.

Hill wants to go the other way, increasing the tax credit by 66 percent.

"When we reduce taxes for somebody, we have to increase taxes to others. Whose taxes do you want to increase?" asked Rep. Chris Hooper, R-Boise.

Hill refused to answer directly, saying he felt the additional economic activity that would be spurred by the expanded tax break would more than offset its cost.

When Hooper insisted that if spending is at a certain level, and if one source of tax revenue is cut another must go up, Hill said spending isn't inflexible.

"We don't necessarily have to spend a certain amount of money," Hill said.

On the first vote on the legislation, only the four committee Democrats and Hooper voted against it. The bill will return to the committee.

The Legislature last session debated the investment credit at length. Sponsors of legislation to repeal the tax break pointed out that even a pro-business president, Ronald Reagan, allowed the tax to be repealed at the federal level.

They said only a few Idaho companies reap most of the benefit from the tax break. And instead of spurting creation of new jobs, most companies were getting the tax credit for routine replacement purchases of equipment and other facilities.

Rep. Harold Reid, D-Craigmont, said testimony before the Legislature's Revenue Projection Committee indicates that when companies

buy new equipment, it displaces workers. He said logging companies indicate they can produce the same with 40 percent fewer employees with modern equipment.

"If they don't modernize, we may lose that industry," said Hill.

Hill contended that when the governor makes a proposal, it is routinely printed and introduced as a courtesy. He said it makes sense to have the opposing view given the same courtesy.

Society condemns plan for wild area

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The national conservation group for which Gov. Cecil Andrus served as a consultant in the early 1980s has condemned the Idaho wilderness plan he and Sen. James McClure have proposed.

The Wilderness Society announced Thursday that it would oppose passage of the bill when it is introduced in Congress later this month.

Tom Robinson of Boise, the society's Intermountain regional director, said Andrus and McClure's determination not to make any changes to their proposal "left us no alternative but to oppose it."

The Wilderness Society said the 2.4-million-acre proposal for designation in the bill would not provide protection for enough of the 9.3 million acres of "roadless" land in Idaho national forests under wilderness consideration.

Several provisions of the bill also would threaten the entire wilderness system, the society said.

"There are matters-of-principle and precedents at stake," said Steve Strickland, the society's chief counsel in Washington. "This proposal contains provisions and language that are simply inconsistent with the purposes and intent of the 1964 Wilderness Act."

Specifically, the group opposes language in the proposal that would mandate the harvest of 40.5 million board feet of timber annually in northern Idaho's Bonners Ferry Ranger District. More than 3 million board feet of that timber would come from prime grizzly bear habitat.

Richardson also said special management language proposed to allow timber harvests while protecting elk and water quality essentially was "hard release" that would prevent a future wilderness consideration.

"This package — and I emphasize package because they said it was take-it-or-leave-it — is totally unacceptable," Richardson said.

Andrus worked as a consultant specializing in corporate relations for the society after finishing his term as secretary of the Interior under President Carter in 1980.

Marc Johnson, the governor's press secretary, said he had no comment on the society's position.

McClure spokesman H.D. Palmer said the society's opposition was premature since the final language has not yet been written.

"They cannot have seen the bill," he said. "They are obviously reacting to press reports or what others say the bill does."

Robinson traced maps used by Andrus and McClure to introduce their proposal. The maps are being circulated through the state's conservation community.

Gov. Frank Andrus' natural resource aide was scheduled to be in Washington, D.C., on Friday to work with Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee staff to finish the language for the bill, Palmer

said. Maps of the proposal soon will be available at McClure's field offices.

Southern Idaho conservationists have reacted to the Andrus-McClure plan with a mix of disappointment and anger.

"It's a pretty bad bill," said Jerry Jayne of Idaho Falls, an Idaho Environmental Council board member.

"We'll work for major improvements but they need to be so major to make it acceptable it's more likely it wouldn't go."

"This bill is worse than no bill at all," Ralph Maughn, a Sierra Club representative in Pocatello, said the bill was only a starting point.

"Andrus and McClure deserve credit for trying to resolve this issue," he said. "Unfortunately what they've produced is not acceptable as written."

Maughn said despite Andrus' and McClure's position opposing changes, he thinks the bill can be fixed in Congress.

"I think there is always a tough bargaining position, but I rarely see any political issue that is really take-it-or-leave-it," Maughn said.

Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, said although he generally supports the Andrus-McClure proposal, he was planning some changes when the bill gets to the House. He said he would like to add an area around Diamond Peak in the Lemhi Mountains that was negotiated between Maughn and off-road vehicle lobbyist Clark Collins of Pocatello.

Stallings said he also was open to making other changes if they are necessary to getting a bill approved.

Jayne said he welcomed the Wilderness Society's opposition, which he was based in part on Idaho conservation groups' displeasure with the bill.

"If we rolled over and said this is a pretty good bill they would have too, and there would be no chance of stopping a bad bill," he said. "They got the right message, because all the conservationists I talk to think this is a completely inadequate bill."

Forest post filed

BOISE (AP) — The supervisor of the Ochoco National Forest in Prineville, Ore., has been named to succeed Jack Lavin as supervisor of Idaho's Boise National Forest.

Dave Rittersbacher will report for duty Feb. 29 to take over for Lavin in charge of the 3-million-acre forest.

Lavin announced his retirement Jan. 2.

Rittersbacher has worked for the Forest Service since 1963, with assignments on seven national forests in three states. While in charge of the Ochoco forest, he led a national pilot study seeking ways for the Forest Service to do business more responsively and productively.

Tax aid due for elderly

BOISE (AP) — State tax officials say a lot of people may have trouble with their tax returns this year, thanks at least in part to complex new federal tax laws.

pitched him as a moderate who appealed to conservatives. He is widely respected.

Robbins then found himself in the midst of a quandary. Both Jones and Hansen were good friends whom he supported. Newcomb was a fellow Magic Valley lawmaker whom he liked.

What to do? Robbins decided to go with Hansen. Hansen had experience.

He could work well with Boyd. He already had a base of support. And they were friends.

Robbins then got on the horn to fellow Republicans. "I asked them if they were firmly committed to a candidate," he said Monday. "I told them Russ was a super guy, but he needs campaign experience. I found Russ' support was soft. They hadn't made a definite commitment."

By last Thursday, Newcomb found his support dwindling. On Sunday, Newcomb's camp called Simpson's camp. They met for six hours to decide who had the best base, and who should run.

Simpson could pull the most votes, but he was not the best candidate, insiders said. He had an attitude problem, they said.

But Newcomb and Black, who were key votes in Boyd's whisper-victory last year, were uncomfortable with Hansen's backers: Rep. Jerry DeCard of Eagle and

Rep. Dean Haegenson of Coeur d'Alene, bragging with a swagger from up north. So Newcomb and Black threw their support to Simpson, who won

33-31. In the process, Newcomb and Black yelled foul against Robbins, whom they accused of "heavy-handed" tactics.

Robbins said Newcomb, especially, has shown his true political colors and aligned himself with the "conservative side of the party" that blocked progress in the state.

Black on Tuesday said there has been no conservative swing. "We just wanted to send a message," Black said. "Haugenson and DeCard take credit for everything the speaker does. We wanted to show them how easily there can be a shift in support."

Black also denied that any deal had been struck between Simpson and Newcomb.

"I asked what Newcomb's role got in return for siding with Simpson, Black said, 'self-satisfaction in sticking it to the big boys. So there."

McCure has crucial role

Congressman Richard Stallings deserves thanks from Idahoans for his successful effort to produce the Swan Falls Water Rights Agreement. In November of 1987 the House of Representatives passed this legislation by a vote of 398-0.

Although the agreement had already been passed by both the House and Senate in the fall of 1986, the President vetoed the larger bill to which the legislation had been attached.

The legislation is once more in the domain of the Senate. Because Stallings worked successfully with Sen. James McClure during the 1986 effort, I hope that McClure will once again assist his legislation's passage on the side of Congress.

The Swan Falls Water Rights Agreement was a negotiated settlement between the State of Idaho and Idaho Power Company, which sought to end longstanding contention. This was done by restricting development through a moratorium on State processing of water rights applications. Thousands of water rights permits and applications are still in limbo today.

Instead of recognizing this legislation as a reasonable negotiated solution to a decade-old problem, some people are spreading misinformation to undermine this legislation. The Idaho Official Gazette expressly states that the federal government's authority over the Snake River is not in any way altered or expanded by the legislation. This is not Uncle Sam telling us what we can or cannot do. It is simply a federal stamp of approval on a settlement negotiated right here in Idaho, by Idahoans, for Idahoans.

This agreement was not an easy one to reach. Many interests had to be considered: recreation, fish and wildlife, energy production, irrigation and other uses all had to be considered. Let us not risk losing the signed agreement we negotiated by beginning to bicker anew. Urge McClure to hasten this legislation through the Senate as he did so well in 1986. And thank Richard Stallings for the time and energy he has put into this complex and long-un-

Letters/Cancer treatment center coverage sparks comments

Not impressed by reports

Four of me MSTI cancer patients attended the MVRMC meeting last Monday night and listened carefully to the presentation put on by HCA employee John Bingham and his associates. A glossy picture was presented of the many cancer patients who are treated there to offer the citizens of Twin Falls and surrounding Magic Valley areas:

We were not impressed, even after one HCA official told us we now have a Regional Medical Center and not just a community county hospital. It was visible from their presentation that they know little or nothing about the treatment of cancer patients though they say they had been discussing cancer care with not only MSTI for over a year but also with other facilities such as North Puget Oncology near Seattle, Washington as late as just last week.

In the last two articles in the Times-News regarding this issue they reiterate the fact that MVRMC is indeed looking to other facilities other than MSTI. On Monday it was stated "MVRMC officials said they hope to affiliate their center with another cancer facility, such as MSTI, and on Tuesday, Bingham stating "As a result, an affiliation with a larger cancer center — such as MSTI," followed by "is required to gain expertise and to provide patients with higher range of care."

MVRMC has no plans now nor in the near future to offer that service to the cancer patient which means that we will have to go to MSTI in Boise anyway. In my opinion, I think it best for the patient to have that "total" care in a facility such as MSTI with their oncology expertise in the field of oncology, keeping updated on the latest in cancer care even after their 20 years of proven capability to thousands of Magic Valley Residents they have served, and are continuing to serve.

It's not mandatory for the facility to be di-

rectly adjacent to a hospital. In my case the only time I walked through the tunnel over to St. Lukes was for a chest x-ray and once in the past five years for a bone scan where they shoot you full of radioactive dye. I was fortunate not to have been hospitalized during chemotherapy but if that does happen then we patients have the choice of just what facility we want to be in.

Scrrips Clinic in La Jolla, a major cancer treatment facility, has four satellite clinics within a 40 mile radius; one in San Marcos, Escondido, the Lawrence Welk complex and a huge new facility opened a couple of years ago in Rancho Bernardo. There are many other health care professionals and major hospitals in Escondido, Vista, Rancho Bernardo, Oceanside and San Diego all again within a 40 mile radius of the area.

All providing excellent care to the patient but with one added revenue, namely giving the patient a choice of hospitals where they would like to be served.

Dr. Emery stated in Tuesday's paper: "others may feel the same way as Moore. But a MVRMC-operated facility will provide local control. Local control of what? The patient, their treatment, the money, their hospitalization and their care?"

Bingham said "no tax dollars will be involved in the building of the cancer center, Fine, but don't think you are not going to pay the price for their folly of wanting "local

control," patient costs for everything will go up until then up some more.

Dr. Hoffman who is heading the committee overseeing the MVRMC cancer project said "We want to equal or exceed the kind of quality care now available." He can't be serious.

There is no way a ground floor operation, any new business for that matter does not experience years of aches and growing pains and many mistakes.

Only here we are talking about people's lives not just nuts and bolts, fabrics, new malls, tire shops, housewears and specialty shops that have been built in Twin Falls the past two years.

To equal MSTI's performance and proven expertise in treating all types of cancer patients would be quite enough by the year 2000 but to exceed the services available now at MSTI is beyond comprehension.

Dr. Emory skirted my question as to whether MVRMC had done a feasibility study on a cancer treatment center located on the hospital campus.

"At this point I sincerely believe that competition could be a very healthy visible means of ensuring that the cancer patient here in Magic Valley not only has a choice but is guaranteed the very finest treatment possible by a MSTI-based facility here in Twin Falls.

I implore you to reconsider your decision

MSTI and continue with your plans for a 2.5 million facility, located at the present location serving both Twin Falls and County and Hospital, MVRMC and other area hospitals in Magic Valley.

If MVRMC wants to go ahead with their own plans then that will of course be their decision. In my opinion, they should give their plans of local control and big bucks for cancer care as I stated in my original article on December 31, 1987.

Unpaid loans sought

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration announced Thursday that it will be tapping credit cards and paychecks and even seizing cars to collect an estimated \$80 billion in delinquent loans and taxes owed the U.S. government.

"We're indicating to people who willfully refuse to pay their debts that there is no such thing as a free ride," Attorney General Edwin Meese III said. "Obviously," he added, "making a substantial collection effort for that amount of money helps a great deal toward reducing the red ink of the federal government."

Meese, along with Budget Director James C. Miller III, announced the crackdown during a conference at the Justice Department.

Both said the government has been making an effort in recent years to track down debtors, but that the amount of outstanding loans and taxes had grown anyway because of "billions in farm debts and improved computer tracking of delinquent debts."

But Meese and Miller said the Justice Department would be taking some new steps in what they are calling "Operation Deadbeat." Among their planned actions during the next few months:

- Pushing proposed federal debt collection legislation, which would give the federal government more authority to collect loans and overcome some of the unevenness in state laws.

- Collection of debts from federal prison inmates.
- Docking salaries and, in more extreme cases, seizing cars and boats.

- Contracting with private attorneys to collect the money.

- Allowing those who owe the government money to pay their debt with MasterCard or Visa.

"The problem is when people get away without paying the loans, the burden falls on the ordinary taxpayer," the honest taxpayer," Miller said. "It's simply not fair to let people get off the hook and get away without paying these loans."

Miller said that the Internal Revenue Service is owed about \$50 billion in delinquent taxes, an about \$32 billion in outstanding loans.

Campaign chairman steps down

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The general finance chairman of Bob Dole's presidential campaign said Thursday he was stepping down from the post until questions regarding his business activities were resolved.

Dole himself, trying to quell a controversy over a real estate deal involving his wife's blind trust, said earlier in the day in Denison, Iowa, that the official, David Owen, would probably be leaving the campaign post.

The Republican candidate made his comment as Don Campbell, deputy director of the Office of Government Ethics, said his agency would be exercising its "supervisory capacity" to take a look at the transaction.

Dole told reporters that neither he nor his wife had done anything wrong. "It's not this or there," Dave Owen may have a problem, but that's his problem," said the Kansas senator.

Owen said he was not asked by Dole to step down and that he decided to "temporarily suspend" his campaign activities after consulting with campaign leaders.

Ex-associate of Meese enters plea

NEW YORK (AP) — Attorney General Edwin Meese's former lawyer and his ex-financial manager pleaded innocent Thursday to racketeering charges in the Wedtech scandal, along with a business partner, who said the prosecution was politically motivated.

The lawyer, E. Robert Wallach, who has known Meese for 30 years and was paid more than \$1.3 million in stock and fees to help the Wedtech Corp. win federal contracts, said after his arraignment that his activities on behalf of the defense contractor were dedicated and lawful.

He called the charges "contrived and a distortion of the facts" and said the motivation for the charges, which stem from a year-long criminal investigation by the office of U.S. Attorney Rudolph Giuliani, would become known at trial. He did not elaborate.

Wallach said the assistance he gave Wedtech was "consistent with 30 years of working with the disadvantaged and minorities."

Air wing probably will be recalled

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration has reluctantly concluded it will have to withdraw one of NATO's front-line air wings from Spain because the Spanish government won't bend on a demand they be removed, government officials said.

That conclusion will prompt U.S. negotiators to refocus their goals in upcoming talks on a new

batting accord to preserving American access to other military facilities such as the Navy port at Rota, said government sources who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Publicly, the United States will continue to stress that negotiations on a new accord will resume late this month or in early February and that all options are still on the table.

Scientists develop valuable technique for AIDS detection

WASHINGTON (AP) — Scientists have developed a new technique for searching out the AIDS virus in cells that is expected to be a valuable tool for researchers studying a variety of viral and genetic

diseases. A report on the joint project by scientists at the federal Centers for Disease Control and the Cetus Corp. of Emeryville, Calif., is published in Friday's issue of Science magazine.

While the technique gives scientists a new way of looking closely at the structure of viruses, it does not replace the basic screening test now used.

Israel detains 10 activists

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israeli authorities detained 10 prominent Palestinians Thursday, apparently on suspicion of inciting resistance to Israeli rule in the occupied territories. Seven were released later, two of them on bail.

A 30-year-old Palestinian was fatally shot in an army firing range 10 miles southeast of Bethlehem and an investigation was under way, army spokesmen said.

According to U.N. figures, at least 35 Palestinians have been killed since unrest began Dec. 8 in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip.

About 250,000 Palestinians were under curfew Thursday night as part of new efforts to quell the rioting, Israeli television said. The television said the army imposed or extended the curfews on about a

dozen refugee camps in the occupied territories.

Palestine Liberation Organization chief Yasser Arafat said in Baghdad he would recognize Israel's right to exist, by accepting the appropriate U.N. resolutions, if it and the United States accept PLO participation in an international conference on Middle East peace.

Arafat, in an interview with The Associated Press, also said the "uprising" in the occupied territories demonstrated that "Palestinians will for an end to the occupation."

Israel's Foreign Ministry called the Arafat proposal "double talk."

The Lebanese army delivered four Arafat captives from the occupied territories to a Marxist faction of Palestinian guerrillas in south Lebanon.

In New York, the U.N. Security Council demanded that Israel let the four men return. The resolution passed 14-0, with the United States abstaining.

Yasser Arafat considers coexistence

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — Yasser Arafat said Thursday he will recognize Israel's right to exist if it and the United States accept PLO participation in an international Middle East peace conference.

He said such a conference must be based on all U.N. resolutions, not just No. 242. In that resolution passed after the 1967 Middle East war, the Security Council called for recognition of Israel's right to exist within secure borders in return for its withdrawal from occupied territories.

"We would accept 242" in the context of a conference, Arafat said in an interview at his military headquarters in Jaddiriya, a southern suburb of Baghdad.

"As this will be under U.N. auspices, that means the full legal force of all U.N. resolutions, including 242 and 338" would be recognized, the Palestine Liberation Organization leader said.

He said resolutions passed by the U.N. General Assembly supporting Palestinians' right to an independent homeland and calling for Israel's withdrawal from land seized in the 1967 war also must be included in the forum.

Iranians send greetings, attack tanker

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — An Iranian warship radioed "happy voyage" to a Dutch-owned tanker, then blasted it for an hour with machine guns, ammunition rocket-propelled grenades on Thursday, injuring two people, crewmen said.

The dawn attack on the 35,731-ton Petrobruit tanker was Iran's first shipping strike of the year. It apparently was in retaliation for Iraqi raids this week on Iranian oil traffic that broke a nine-day calm in the Persian Gulf.

Iraq claimed later Thursday its aircraft hit a large vessel off the Iranian coast at 9:20 p.m. The planes returned safely to base, according to Iraqi news agency. The tanker, monitored by the British Broadcasting Corp. in London.

Iran, meanwhile, praised Syria for efforts to arrange talks with the Gulf Arab states threatened by spurs of the Iran-Iraq war, and a diplomat in Abu Dhabi said such a meeting was likely to occur soon in the United Arab Emirates.

In the ground war, Iran and its Kurdish rebel allies claimed they wiped out five Iraqi battalions, killed or wounded 700 soldiers and captured 600 in a second day of fighting in rugged northeastern Iraq.

Colombia declares an emergency

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — President Virgilio Barco declared a state of emergency in Medellín, where a car bomb exploded this week and 10 people were shot dead in a war between rival drug traffickers.

Barco cited "now and monstrous criminal acts" in Colombia's second-largest city in his announcement on radio and television Wednesday night.

On Wednesday, a car bomb exploded at the Medellín home of Pablo Escobar Gaviria, a reputed drug kingpin wanted in the United States. The explosion killed two watchmen and caused widespread damage in the luxurious neighborhood.

The government considers Medellín to be in a state of emergency, the president said. Local authorities are taking new measures to end this alarming chain of events.

Weather hinders search efforts for plane

HAILEY — Snow and freezing rain prevented a squadron of planes from searching on Thursday for the single-engine aircraft that disappeared Tuesday during a flight from Gooding to Hailey.

"It's been a ground search today, Blaine County Sheriff Walt Fleming said Thursday. "We're really soaked in up here. It's been snowing all day."

Jim Conder, safety and informa-

tion officer for the Idaho Bureau of Aeronautics, said 24 aerial search missions had been launched Wednesday to find the red and white Cessna-180 carrying two Hailey-area residents. Searchers were also able to send four planes over the area on Tuesday after having been apprised of the plane's missing status late that afternoon.

But officials with the bureau said bad weather kept all but two planes from scouring the area on Thursday.

"We've got planes sitting all over

waiting to go, but we need a break in the weather and the forecast doesn't show any changes," said Nancy McConaughy, the bureau's administrative assistant.

State and local officials would not release the names of the two people aboard the plane, but they have officially been identified as Dr. Robert Miller and Katherine Skuce. Fleming said he would not confirm the names because the two individuals' family members have not yet been contacted.

Hospital officials said Thursday that Miller, a member of the Idaho Emergency Physicians Group, commutes in his Cessna to the St. Alphonsus and St. Luke's regional medical centers in Boise.

Conder said the plane left the Gooding Municipal airport at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday. The flight to Hailey, located about 40 miles northeast of Gooding, would normally take between 20 and 25 minutes, he said.

Officials picked up a signal from a plane's emergency locating transmitter early Wednesday. Conder

said the signal is relayed to a satellite that passes overhead every 30 minutes. Transmitters are often tripped inadvertently. The signal was not repeated, although searchers checked where it might have originated, he said.

Fleming said between 20 and 30 people conducted Thursday's ground search, making use of skis, snowmobiles and four-wheel-drive vehicles. But deep snow in the area could hide any wreckage, until warm weather arrives.

"We're doing about everything we can possibly do at this time," Conder said.

Dennis Looali of the Bureau of Aeronautics said the air search had extended all the way north to Galena Summit and west to Soldier Mountain.

Conder said the search planes scanned the probable route of the plane in a grid pattern Wednesday and expected to narrow down the area they cover to the immediate flight plan.

Drugs seized in search are admissible

TWIN FALLS — Fifth District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt has decided drugs seized from a 1973 Lincoln Mark IV for a grand jury drug case can be admitted at trial.

Seward Benjamin King, who challenged the validity of a search warrant used to search his car, was indicted Oct. 1 for the possession of methamphetamines with the intent to deliver.

In a challenge filed later that same month, he said the warrant used to search his car was invalid because a police sergeant "did not establish the need for the search wasn't trained to identify amphetamines."

Therefore, King argued his Fourth Amendment rights to be free of unreasonable searches and seizures by police were violated.

Hurlbutt ruled that Idaho Bureau of Narcotics officers had a reasonable, factual suspicion King was carrying drugs when they stopped his car at the Hollister Port of Entry. That suspicion justified the stopping and a cursory search of the car at the port, he said.

However, police tried to get a search warrant the following day. They failed to prove their case to the District Magistrate Judge R. Michael Redman.

The next day, the officers brought a trained dog, named "Cinder" down to sniff the car. Cinder was trained to sit when the odor of co-

caine was detected.

Cinder sniffed King's car, sat near the trunk, and the narcotics officers obtained a search warrant from 5th District Magistrate Judge Charles Brumbach the next day.

But Hurlbutt ruled the state didn't even have to go through a legal maze to obtain the search warrant because the state established probable cause to search the car at the Hollister Port of Entry.

Under legal arguments adopted by federal courts, narcotics officers had enough information to seize the car, impound it and search it two days later, Hurlbutt ruled.

"It's irrelevant that a warrant was obtained to search the defendant's car," Hurlbutt ruled. "Probable cause existed to seize and search the defendant's car without a warrant at the Hollister Port of Entry and two days later while the car was impounded."

By ruling that the narcotics officers' decision to get a warrant before searching the car was irrelevant, Hurlbutt rejected arguments by King's attorney, Golden Bennett.

Bennett argued in a hearing Nov. 23 that because the police decided to get a warrant before searching, they were bound by the validity of the affidavit they presented in support of that warrant. Bennett argued that affidavit — the one based on Cinder's sniffing — wasn't valid.

Bennett didn't argue the two-day

Appeal made in infant's death Attorney argues sentence too stiff

BOISE — Gary Staten, a Hazelton man who pleaded guilty in the 1985 starvation death of his 11-month-old daughter, has suffered enough and should not serve a 6-month jail term imposed by a magistrate judge, Staten's lawyer told the Idaho Court of Appeals Thursday.

Staten, 32, and his wife, Rosemarie, pleaded guilty in February 1986 to misdemeanor charges of injury to a child, after their daughter Tanya Lynne died Feb. 3, 1985, of pneumonia and malnutrition.

Fifth District Magistrate Judge Nathan Higer sentenced both to the maximum jail term of six months, but later waived the sentence for Mrs. Staten.

"No one knows better than Gary Staten the tragedy his actions have caused," said Twin Falls lawyer Daniel Mink, who represented Staten at the appeals hearing in Boise. "The 6-month sentence does not serve justice."

But Deputy Attorney General Peter Erbland said the court should not question a judge's discretion in sentencing if he follows state guidelines.

"It is not our function to second guess that, as long as the record supports him," Erbland said.

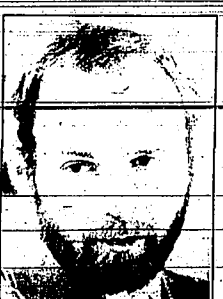
The Statens were originally charged with involuntary manslaughter, but pleaded guilty to the misdemeanor charge after a plea-bargain agreement with Jerome County Prosecutor Mark Gause.

Gause had argued that the couple's failure to get medical help for the child and their belief in holistic treatment led to the baby's death.

Coroners said Tanya weighed just 10 pounds at the time of her death. She suffered from bronchial pneumonia and severe skin lesions, symptoms often associated with malnutrition.

Mink said that when Tanya came down with a cold in November 1984, the Statens treated their daughter with fruit juices and vegetables.

"He thought, she was getting better, and he realized his mistake too late," Mink said.

Staten should have been granted probation instead of a jail term, Mink said, because Staten had no criminal record, and because he has publicly admitted his medical beliefs were wrong.

"No greater deterrance than the death of his child was needed to make him change his medical beliefs," Mink said. "Are the best interests of society served by probation and treatment, or by throwing him in the county jail for six months?"

Erbland repeated Higer's claim that the tough sentence would deter those who follow similar health beliefs from avoiding medical professionals in emergencies.

"Sentencing in this case took into consideration a message to society," Erbland said.

Erbland also quoted Higer's ruling at the sentencing hearing, when the judge said "my sentence is well worth it if it prevents the death of another child."

Mink argued that Tanya's death would be enough to keep many from following in the Statens' medical beliefs, and the jail term was excessive.

"Many people who buy into these beliefs will see the death of this child and will do their best," Erbland said.

Alger claims delay tainted eyewitness

BOISE — Timothy Alger, one of the men who led local police on a high speed chase that included a gun battle in 1984, was back in court Thursday appealing his conviction on a related charge.

Eyewitness identification of Alger as one of two men who robbed a Boise Albertson's store at gunpoint in March 1984 was flawed, Alger's attorney told the Idaho Court of Appeals.

Alger, a native of Washington state, was convicted of armed robbery and using a firearm in the commission of a felony in August 1986.

Fourth District Judge Robert Mynshouse sentenced Alger to 10 years in prison for robbery, with a 15-year enhancement for the firearms charge.

But Amil Myshin, an Ada County public defender representing Alger,

said during oral arguments on his appeal that there was about 20 months between the robbery and eyewitness identification of Alger through photographs.

That length of time, along with the procedure used by police, may have tainted the identification by the time the case went to trial, Myshin said.

"There's no question in anyone's mind when they walk into court and see a person there with orange clothing and chains that the defendant is, or who is to be identified," he said.

But Deputy Attorney General Michael Henderson said there was "nothing unnecessarily suggestive" about police procedures in witness' identification of Alger. Even if there was, Henderson said there was no "very substantial likelihood of irreparable misidentification" in

Fair board reviews electrical work contracts

TWIN FALLS — Construction on the new produce building for the Twin Falls County Fair and Rodeo has slowed because of bad weather, but contract negotiations are continuing for the building's electrical work.

Fair Manager Dan Peters told the fair board at its monthly meeting that the price of wiring the building has dropped from around \$4,900 to possibly below \$4,000.

On other business, the board decided to hold prices steady for rental spaces and study awarding cash premiums instead of checks.

Peters said he is still negotiating with Hardy Electric and Lang Electric to wire the produce building.

Discussion then turned on whether to install sheet rock in the building's ceiling or leave it open as originally intended. If trusses haven't been ordered yet, sheet rock

might improve air circulation in the building.

Board member Gary Grindstaff said he spoke with contractors and found a ceiling would require fewer lights and a lower charge for electrical work, to offset the additional \$800 to install sheet rock.

"They say there's enough savings over our light fixtures to save the \$800," Peters said.

He added that he's heard ceilings help control the flow of air, so that the building may be cooler with fans and the ceiling. He said he would check with specialists to confirm that.

But board member Don Kramer said, "The building is not designed to put sheet rock on."

Board member Emmett Harrison opposed putting in ceiling, saying, "I don't think we should change horses at the first stream. I don't think we have the money to do that."

Board President Stan Snow said trusses have already been

ordered, "we're done."

But he added, "if it was the difference of \$800, then I think we might as well spend it."

Peters said he will check whether trusses have been ordered so the board can decide whether to order different ones and install sheet rock.

In other business, the board unanimously decided to stick with the same rental rates for indoor exhibits, despite proposals showing "Twin Falls" rates are cheaper than those in Pocatello and Boise.

Buhl accepts insurance offer on floor repair

BUHL — The Buhl School Board voted Tuesday to accept an offer from Industrial Indemnity Insurance Co. to replace the gym floor of the district's middle school, which had been damaged by water.

A letter from the insurance company confirmed that it will pay 60 percent of the estimated costs for total replacement of the gymnasium floor.

That would amount to a payment of \$20,500, which is \$4,000 more than the company would actually have to pay. The extra \$4,000 shows good faith on the part of the insurance carrier, said Superintendent Gus Spiropoulos.

It would be after talking to Les Meider, one of the two bidders, and after reviewing the proposal from R & R flooring of Boise, he estimates the total replacement of the floor would cost from \$45,000 to \$60,000.

"It would be the best replacement of the school district to accept the settlement and place it in the plant facilities fund, earmarked for replacement of the gym floor," said Spiropoulos.

He said he would recommend the board to plan on replacing the floor this summer, because the district's expenditure would be about \$25,000 to \$30,000. The district should plan for such a large expenditure and build it into the next budget, he said.

He added that after talking with coaches and several other staff members, that immediate replacement was not paramount at this

time, and waiting for budgetary inclusion within the next year or so would be a situation that all could live with, without causing any great adverse effects.

The board of trustees accepted Spiropoulos' recommendation unanimously.

The board also stated that specifications will have to be developed for total replacement of the floor, and new bids would be asked for, based upon those specifications. Trustees also agreed with the superintendent's suggestion that he investigate the cost of professional floor maintenance, until the actual replacement takes place.

In other actions, Spiropoulos reported that the second set of bus inspections by the bus contractors had been completed in compliance with the state regulations, and that the policy manual for transportation procedures is being updated. A supplement including individual registered rider's names, mileage and drivers of the routes will be sent to the board at a later meeting.

The next regular meeting of the board, which would have been Jan. 26, was changed by action of the board to Jan. 28 at 7 p.m. in the mid-district library. The superintendent will be attending a school activities meeting on the 26th.

In final action, the board accepted proposed changes in Bell Rapids Bus Route No. 13 and tabled a proposed emergency route for the same location.

An executive session was held after the regular meeting was adjourned.

Police apprehend man wanted in Idaho Falls

TWIN FALLS — A man wanted by the Idaho Falls police department for allegedly attempting to run over one of its officers was arrested in Twin Falls Tuesday, continuing a recent string of high-profile arrests made by local authorities.

David Holm, 26, was arrested by Twin Falls police at approximately 1:20 p.m. Tuesday in the 2200 block of Orchard Drive East. According to police reports, the arrest was made following identification of Holm through the National Crime Information Center.

Twin Falls police lodged a charge

of resisting arrest against Holm, who is expected to be taken to Idaho Falls on a number of other counts.

Earl Harryman, a detective with the Idaho Falls police department, said Wednesday that Holm is wanted on several counts, including burglary, forgery and assault. At least one of the charges stem from an incident in which Holm allegedly attempted to drive his vehicle over one of the police department's officers.

Harryman said he could not release further information on the charges.

The arrest marks the third time within a week that Twin Falls police department has apprehended an individual wanted by law-enforcement

authorities outside its jurisdiction.

On Jan. 6, local police officers arrested Andrew Schneider, 52, on misdemeanor charges of petty theft and resisting arrest. Schneider, who had been wanted by the FBI for more than two years, was ordered removed to Illinois at a hearing Tuesday in U.S. Magistrate Court in Boise.

Schneider had been indicted by both state and federal grand juries in December, 1985, for allegedly threatening to kill members of the Illinois Supreme Court and one of the state's circuit court judges.

Twin Falls police also arrested Kenneth Leo Schram at a local hotel between 11 p.m. and midnight

Friday. Schram, 31, allegedly escaped Jan. 2 from a jail in Jackson County, Ore., prompting an extensive search encompassing Oregon, Idaho and Washington.

Michael Brooks, a special agent with the FBI in Twin Falls, said Wednesday that Schram was being held in Oregon on state charges of bank robbery. Schram was also wanted by federal authorities on a charge he had robbed a bank in Albany, Ore., Brooks said.

An identity/indentation hearing for Schram is scheduled for 2 p.m. today in U.S. Magistrate Court in Boise, Brooks said. It is expected that Schram will thereafter be removed to Oregon.

RUPERT — The three Heyburn residents arrested in Arizona Jan. 7 have waived extradition and will be returned to Rupert "within the week," according to law-enforcement officials.

According to Terry Quinn, a detective with the Rupert Police Department, the Arizona authorities discovered the license plates had been stolen following a routine check. Shortly thereafter, the police also unearthed information that the car had likewise been reported stolen.

If King had won his challenge, police would not have used the evidence seized in the search of his car at trial. No trial date has been set.

King, although indicted by a grand jury, chose a different legal tactic to fight his case than the 11 people who were indicted by the grand jury and challenged the indictments.

Those defendants are saying the use of a grand jury was improper and their charges should be dropped. It is scheduled for those motions to be heard on Jan. 19.

A total of 17 indictments have been unsealed from the grand jury.

Two days after the March 19, 1984, robbery of the Eastgate Albertson's, Alger and another man later convicted in the robbery, Jeffrey Morris, were involved in a high-speed chase and gun battle with law enforcement officials in Jerome and Twin Falls counties.

Twin Falls Police officer Larry Strohnberg was wounded in the chase.

Morris was captured, but Alger remained on the loose and led police on another chase before being captured on a ledge in the Snake River Canyon the next day.

The two men escaped from the Jerome County Jail on May 20 and were recaptured later in Missouri.

Myshin argued Thursday that 80 percent of the evidence Alger's trial was about those incidents rather than the robbery itself. He said while there might have been some relevance, the "prejudicial nature" of the evidence outweighed any value it might have had.

But Henderson contended the Twin Falls evidence showed Alger's "consciousness of guilt," and also linked him firmly to evidence directly related to the Boise robbery, including weapons and disguises.

Myshin also urged the court to return the case to Newhouse to change the language of Alger's sentence, specifically to remove the reference to the firearms enhancement being "consecutive."

"That language effectively makes what should be an enhancement an entire separate sentence which cannot begin until the armed robbery sentence is 'topped out,' or about two-thirds of the time is served, he said.

Six felony charges were filed against Alger in Jerome County. However, though charges were dismissed by 5th District Judge Phillip Becker because Alger wasn't brought to trial in time.

In his order dismissing the charges, Becker blamed Mark Gause, who was Jerome County prosecutor at the time.

Becker said Gause had a nine-month period of time to pursue the case after Alger was caught in Missouri, but Gause failed to notify the court that Alger was available for trial.

The Court of Appeals took Thursday's arguments under advisement.

Idaho banks still having problems

BOISE (AP)—Several of the 16 state-chartered banks in Idaho continue having financial problems, and state Finance Director Belton Patty says it probably will be 1990 before they can be resolved.

"I don't want to underestimate some of the problems that are out there, but I also don't want to raise undue alarm," Patty told legislative budget writers Thursday.

"We have several problems," he said. "We do have institutions with more loan problems than are warranted."

"I'm not in a position at this point to guarantee that we will be successful in resolving those problems, Patty said. "But I'm optimistic that we are working on solutions that will be successful."

He emphasized that none of the state-chartered banks was in any imminent danger of failure. The state has had only one bank failure in three decades. That was the 1986 demise of the First Bank and Trust of Malad, which had the heaviest agriculturally weighted loan portfolio in the state.

Patty said the bulk of the current banking problems have also been caused by agricultural loans, and he said there has been no geographic concentration of problem banks in the state.

"We're not without problems, but they're nowhere nearly as severe as many other states in the union, even surrounding states," he said.

But, Patty added, "It will take two years before all the institutions are in the conditions he would like to see them in."

Patty is asking the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee for another bank examiner to bolster the department's monitoring of the industry in Idaho.

State prison expansion begins soon

BOISE (AP)—Formal groundbreaking ceremonies will be held here and at Orofino next week to launch construction of state prisons that will eliminate the prison overcrowding problems.

Groundbreaking will be in Boise Monday afternoon for a 248-bed high-security prison near the main state prison. The next day, groundbreaking will hold at Orofino, where a 100-bed addition will be built to existing facilities.

Autos bring retail sales strong finish

WASHINGTON (AP) — A spurt of automobile buying in December produced a strong finish for retail sales in 1987, belying a year of weak growth, the government said Thursday.

The Commerce Department said retail sales rose 0.7 percent in December to a seasonally adjusted \$126.7 billion, \$900 million more than in November.

It was the largest month-to-month gain since August, when car buying fueled by sales incentives pushed overall retail sales up by 1.6 percent.

For all of 1987, retail establishments sold \$1.61 trillion worth of goods, just 3.6 percent more than in 1986. It was the weakest year-year growth since the 2.8 percent increase in 1982, a recession year.

Department stores and other general merchandise establishments sold 5 percent more in December than they did during the same month a year earlier, an indication that the October stock market crash failed to discourage Christmas shoppers.

House-spokesman Marlin Fitzwater called the report "good news," and Undersecretary of Commerce Robert Ortner said, "It would appear that the stock market crash is a non-event, self-contained on Wall Street."

The retail sales report came as financial markets awaited the release today of the November trade deficit. Economists are expecting lackluster retail sales to continue this year and are hoping an increase in sales abroad will help keep the economy growing.

The National Association of Manufacturers, in a report Thursday, predicted that U.S. net exports could surge by as much \$40 billion in 1988, largely due to declines in the value of the dollar that have made American goods more competitive in world markets.

Car sales shot up 2.4 percent in December, showing signs of recovery from the fall slump that followed the expiration of dealer incentives at the end of the summer.

Autos were down 0.7 percent in November. Excluding autos, retail sales rose 0.2 percent in December, following a 0.3 percent rise in November.

Sales of durable goods, big-ticket items expected to last more than three years, were up 1.7 percent after inching up 0.2 percent a month earlier.

Sales of non-durable goods rose 0.1 percent, matching the increase in November.

The overall growth in retail sales came largely in the first eight months of 1987. Sales inched up only 0.1 percent in November, after falling 0.9 percent in October and 1.7 percent in September.

Sales — figures are adjusted to smooth out seasonal variations but do not exclude the effect of rising prices. The 3.5 percent boost in 1987 did not keep pace with the Consumer-Price Index, which rose at an annual rate of 4.7 percent for the first 11 months of the year.

The 1987 sales increase, compared with a 5.4 percent rise in 1986, 7 percent in 1985; 10.1 percent in 1984 and 9.5 percent in 1983.

Korean visitors

Olympic ski team trains in Sun Valley

SUN VALLEY — Winding their way through the Northwest in route to Calgary, a group of Olympic competitors stopped off at the Sun Valley area this week to "climatize" themselves to higher elevations.

The South Korean men's Olympic Nordic ski team got a chance to train at the Sun Valley Nordic Center plus the groomed trails at Galena Lodge and Lake Creek. It was their coach and Ketchum resident, Dick Hunt, that led them back to his old stomping grounds.

So what is a Ketchumite doing training South Korean athletes?

Hunt took the coaching job in November of 1987, becoming the first outside coach hired to train a South Korean team. It was a move the Koreans made to enable their team to compete better in the Asian Winter Games, Hunt explained.

The Asian Winter Games involve regional competition among the Pacific Rim countries such as Japan, China, Mongolia, North Korea and South Korea.

Hunt said the Koreans also had more interest in doing well in the Winter Olympics because they are the host country for the Summer Olympics this year.

Since winters in Korea are only eight to 10 weeks long, Hunt has taken his team around the world in search of suitable snow for training. Last winter they skied in Czechoslovakia. Since June they have had daily training sessions at Dochstein Glacier near Salzburg, Austria.

The five-member team left Sun Valley Thursday for more racing and training in Libby, Whitefish and Bozeman, Mont., followed by a trek through British Columbia and over to Alberta, arriving just in time for the start of the Calgary Olympics Feb. 13.

The Koreans have not had extensive training in cross-country skiing before, but Hunt is somewhat optimistic about their prospects at the Olympics.

"We're not gonna win any Olympic medals, but I think they're going to do a lot better than they've ever done before," he said.

There are four Olympic Nordic events with the 16-

kilometer and 30-kilometer races requiring the classical racing style of the kick-and-glide method, and the 4-by-10-kilometer relay and the 50-kilometer race using the newer skating technique.

Hunt said the Koreans will be the team to beat at Calgary, followed closely by the Soviets with all other countries closing in behind.

Having lived in Hailey and then Ketchum since 1979 after his retirement as captain with the Los Angeles Fire Department, Hunt was glad to return to the Wood River Valley for a brief visit.

Hunt, 52, is well suited to coach an Olympic team. He competed in both the 1960 Olympics at Squaw Valley, Calif., and the 1964 Games at Innsbruck, Austria, as a speed skater. Being self-taught without the assistance of any coaches, Hunt placed 13th in the event and held the U.S. national championship for 10 years.

Hunt has remained active in sports, speed skating competitively until he was 32 and continuing with daily workouts. About 10 years ago, Hunt took up cross-country skiing when it was gaining popularity in the United States and found it, too, was something he could do well.

After competing in Nordic races throughout the country, Hunt served for a time as a coach for the U.S. Olympic cross-country team until he moved on to coach the South Koreans.

"I love coaching," Hunt said. "I don't do it for the money or the travel. I coach for the challenge of creating something — it's a chance to put everything you've learned to use."

There has been one drawback in coaching the Koreans, however. The language barrier has been a challenge.

Hunt said because the Korean language is difficult to learn and since he does not expect to be at this position for an indefinite time, he chose not to try. A translator is not available, either.

Instead, he communicates through the use of body movements and facial expressions, a self-made sort of sign language. One of the team members is beginning to learn some English which makes things a little easier, Hunt noted.

Horner trades Valper for St. Louis

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Free-agent pitcher, Jason Valper, traded to the St. Louis Cardinals for a four-year \$5.1 million contract.

After turning down a three-year \$4.5 million offer from Atlanta, and failing to find a job with another big league team in a tight free-agent market, he signed with Yakult, of the Japanese Central League, for \$2 million, including benefits and incentives.

Yakult had offered Horner \$3 million for 1988 and \$11 million total in a multi-year pact. Last season, he batted .327 with 31 homers and 73 runs batted in.

Horner's agent, Bucky Woy, indicated that it wasn't easy to reject the Japanese offer.

"I've been in this business 23 years and I never thought I'd turn down \$10 million," Woy said. "He needs one season (in the majors) plus a few odd days and then his position is fully vested. He really wanted to get back."

And the 30-year-old first baseman

said he couldn't pass up an opportunity to play for St. Louis. He said he grew up following the team.

"It's been a dream of mine to play for the Cardinals," he said. "They've been such a great team over the years, and with all the family I still have in this area... what an absolutely perfect fit for me. It just makes all the sense in the world for my career right now."

Horner is the first major free-agent acquired by the Cardinals since the team signed catcher Darrell Porter in December 1980. Maxvill was forced to shop the free-agent market after Clark, the first baseman who carried the team to the NL East title last season, bolted unexpectedly to the New York Yankees as a free agent.

A veteran of nine seasons in the major leagues, Horner has a career batting average of .278 with 215 homers. In 1986, his last with Atlanta, he hit .273 with 27 home runs and 87 RBI.

Dawson files for arbitration

NEW YORK (AP) — Andre Dawson of the Chicago Cubs, the National League's most valuable player last season, filed for salary arbitration Thursday and his agent indicated he would ask for an award in excess of \$2 million.

Six other players filed Thursday — infielder Darrell Evans of the Detroit Tigers, right-handed pitcher Mike Cubie of the Kansas City Royals, shortstop Dick Schofield of the California Angels, outfielder Mike Marshall of Los Angeles Dodgers, catcher Mickey Tettleton of the Oakland Athletics and right-handed pitcher Frank Williams of the Cincinnati Reds.

Players have until midnight Friday to file. There are 115 other players still eligible.

Dawson signed a \$600,000 contract with the Cubs last winter, a \$1-million reduction from his 1986 salary with the Montreal Expos. Dawson's agent, Dick Moss, had given then-Cubs General Manager Dallas Green a blank contract. Green filled in the salary and added \$200,000 in bonuses, all of which Dawson earned.

"I think this would be a year that they should offer Andre a blank contract," Moss said.

Moss said that Dawson would ask for a record amount in arbitration. Players and clubs must submit figures by Monday. The most awarded to a player in arbitration was the \$1,976 million given to first baseman Don Mattingly of the New York Yankees last year.

Don Greenko, a Cubs vice president, said Thursday that the club was willing to offer Dawson a two-year contract, but that the Cubs took advantage of the outfielder last year.

"Number one, Dick Moss was the one who proposed that unique contract to us, we didn't force it on them," Greenko said. "Number two, with the range of money we are talking about, that would make up for any perceived shortfall."

Dawson, who hit 49 home runs and drove in 137 runs last year, becoming the first player from a last-place club to be voted MVP, began negotiations asking for a \$10-million, four-year contract.

Showdowns: Pocatello and Minico have just 1 loss apiece

POCATELLO — Call it Pocatello High School Coach Ron Kress' January Surprise.

The Indians, picked to finish seventh in a pre-season Gem State Conference coach poll conducted by *The Times-News*, are currently 7-1 for the season and awaiting the arrival of top-ranked Minico High School (6-1) tonight for a Region III boys' basketball showdown.

Four days Kress' team that after losing four starters off a team that won the Gem State Conference championship a year ago?

"We're playing sound fundamentals," says Kress, whose Indians are the only team in Region III with a 9-0 record following a 56-41 thumping of crostown rival Highland Wednesday night. 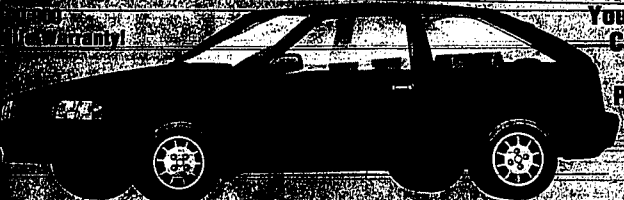

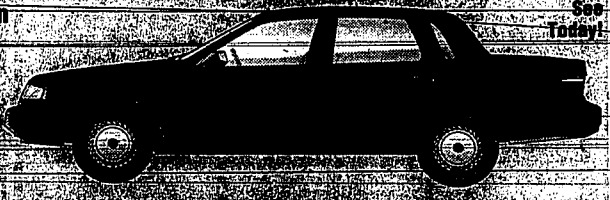

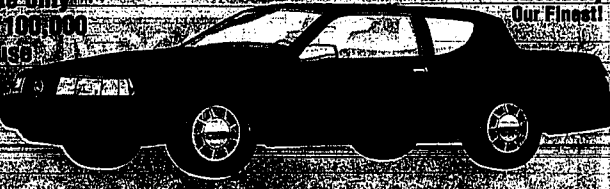

HOLY RETURNS! BATMAN COMES BACK!

KETCHUM — Holy comeback, Batman!

Winterfest parade watchers will get a firsthand look at this year's Grand Marshal, Adam West, but it's not likely he'll be wearing the costume most people know him by.

West hung up his Batman suit long ago, but when he is recognized on the street, people still whisper, "Holy moly, there's Batman!" Today West roams Ketchum streets unbothered by onlookers, one of the many reasons he and his family chose to make their home here. West, along with his wife Marjorie, and their two children, Nina, 11, and Perrin, 8, moved here a year and a half ago from Pacific Palisades, Calif., after frequent summer and winter vacation visits to Sun Valley spawned their love for the area.

West, now 49, refers to himself as a semi-recursive sort and tries to keep a low profile. Serving as Grand Marshal is a step away from that, but one which he does gladly to help the community.

"One of the charms of living here is the fact I can kind of get lost," West says as he sits back, relaxed, wearing denim jeans, a red, white and blue knit shirt — and looking like he could still fit into his looser costume. "You don't have the pressures, the pace, the rhythms of the big city."

And since West usually travels across the country and around the world on film assignments, he figured he might as well "commute" from Sun Valley as from Los Angeles.

Although West has worked hard over the past 20 years to create an acting career apart from the Batman identity, he graciously accepts the fact that people still think of

him in that role.

In fact, when West talks of his "Batman days," a genuine spark comes to his eyes and his voice changes, just as the transformation years ago when philanthropist millionaire Bruce Wayne turned into Batman — righter of wrongs and protector of truth and justice for Gotham City.

The "Batman" series began mid-season in 1966-67 and ran twice weekly for three years. The show received top ratings with a storyline which was intentionally corny.

Today Batman has become a cult figure of sorts. The series airs daily to 415 million viewers in 104 countries and more than \$1 billion worth of merchandise bearing his likeness has been distributed over the years. There are Batman fan clubs and conventions and even a couple of books have been written on the Batman phenomenon.

West goes with the flow to help

perpetuate the Batman mystique, even though he receives no residuals from airing of the series or merchandising.

"When you see people having fun with you and enjoying, laughing and remembering things like whole scenes from the show, it's very pleasant," West says.

The instant popularity of the show along with its continued fame over the test of time is not surprising to West. He says early on producers realized the show would have longevity if it had a universal appeal.

A broad family appeal was successfully integrated with the action, color, special-effects and gaudy performances, targeting children, college-aged kids and adults, with each age level relating to the show for differing reasons. The show has now gone through three generations.

Kagan's totems ready for display

TWIN FALLS — A forest of bronze and steel totem and column structures by Ketchum artist Rod Kagan is being displayed at the Herrett Museum Art Gallery at the College of Southern Idaho through February 19.

The exhibition, entitled "Rod Kagan's 15 Years," features geometric images welded into sculptured columns reminiscent of Native American totem poles.

Fourteen sculptures, a representative sample of Kagan's work over the last 15 years, range in size from a 2-foot-high abstract of a female figure to several 12-foot-tall totem images.

A 10 minute videotaped interview with Kagan, made by Mike Green, the Herrett's curator of exhibits, and Charles Lemmon, a KSNV reporter, is also part of the exhibition.

Kagan says that though some of his sculptures look like totem poles, the resemblance ends there. "Actually, other than the relation to totem poles," says Kagan, "these are my own ideas. I call them totems because they have different sections to them like the regular totems would have and different designs. They're four different sections and four different forms. The sculptures all joined together."

The 47-year-old, self-taught art-

ist says the totems are just images he likes.

"The ideas are difficult to execute," he says. "As you build one you have plenty of ideas for the others. The process takes several weeks to build one, so there's lots of time to daydream about what you want to do next."

Kagan's daydreaming has translated itself into a successful career.

"After years working in a family-owned butcher business in Peapack, N.J., Kagan relocated to Ketchum.

"It was primarily for the skiing and a different lifestyle," he says. "And to start a new career — the whole thing."

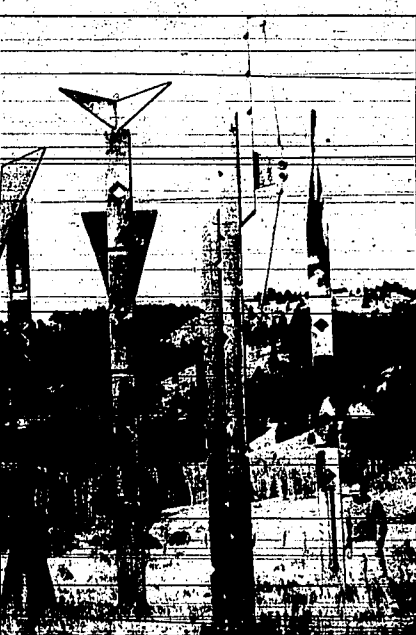
Kagan says he wouldn't call himself an artist as a child, but he did tinkered with hot rods and build models. He acquired a welding outfit at the age of 16 in order to customize a 1932 Ford.

"I certainly built lots of things. All kinds of things. I was good with my hands." He says, "Basically, the ability to weld is where it all started. I know how to construct metal objects."

In 1974, Kagan used the metal from some old mine machinery to construct his first steel sculpture, a geometric form.

"The Lady," 1974, became a prototype for several later pieces, including "Reclining Lady Bronze."

Film festival provides variety for film goers

PARK CITY, UTAH — About this time last year, the sloping streets of Park City offered an odd mix of

visitors. There were the usual crowds of people in colorful sweaters and ski pants, lugging poles and skis through this resort town and heading to lift lines.

Then, there were those in street clothes, lining up to see the many, varied and new series of independent films that were part of the United States Film Festival.

Starting today, cinema will invade the slopes again with the beginning of the 1988 U.S. Film Festival.

The event, which ends Jan. 24, is presented by the Sun Dance Institute, established in 1980 by actor-director Robert Redford to nurture American filmmaking. The festival also has the cooperation of the Utah Film Development Office and KSL Radio and Television.

The festival has everything for the film fan, film student and filmmaker.

A series of seminars focusing on different aspects of movie-making will be held throughout the week of the event, featuring panelists who are often found behind the scenes.

This year's seminar offerings range from exhibition to marketing to financing of independent films. Stunts and special effects is the topic of a Tuesday discussion. Scheduled panelists include Bobby Riggs,

effects professional on such films as "Black Widow" and "Runaway Train," and Bobby Herron, a 36-year veteran with more than 400 credits.

Time magazine film critic Richard Schickel is one of the panelists for a seminar entitled, "Independents Abroad: How do we measure up?" The discussion will be held Jan. 23.

Among a handful of informal luncheon discussions is a program of the National Geographic Society, with producers from the award-winning and popular series.

A tribute to longtime independent filmmaker Samuel Fuller is a highlight of the festival. Several of Fuller's films, including "Hull and High Water," "Fixed Bayonets" and "Underworld USA" will be shown. Fuller will be present Jan. 22 for a screening and discussion of his work.

Argentine cinema will also take the spotlight. "Dogs of the Night," "Evita: Listen if you want to" and "The Night of the Pencils" are just a few of the films scheduled.

The sight of movie stars roaming around — the festival is not uncommon, but the real celebrities of the event are the films, many of which are entered in the festival's 1988 Independent Film Competition.

During past festivals, films such as "The Big Easy" and "Woody Allen's 'Radio Days'" have premiered.

This year's offerings include a diversity of topics and stories — See FILMS on Page D2

...1987, which now resides in the Ring Building in Washington D.C.

His work has been shown in museums throughout the Northwest and California and he has received several awards, including a National Endowment for the Arts Fellowship Grant. Five of his sculptures were featured in a 1982 issue of Architectural Digest. That year he also completed a commission for a large outdoor sculpture installed at the Datsun Headquarters in Los Angeles.

In 1986, he was commissioned to design two 50-foot steel columns which now stand in Omaha. Last year he was asked to create an 8-foot-high bronze Chanukkah Menorah for the Hebrew Boulevard Temple in Los Angeles. He currently has an ongoing exhibition at the Sun Valley Center Gallery.

Kagan estimates he's completed "easily" 500 sculptures of various shapes and sizes over the last 15 years. The sculpture prices range, from \$2,500 to \$12,000.

"I hold some for myself, but the majority of them are sold," he says.

He sometimes makes a sculpture in three different sizes so it can be shown indoors as well as outdoors and "so that people can own them in different price ranges and with different needs."

"Not everyone wants a huge thing in their backyard," he says. Kagan modestly ascribes his success to the location of his rural

Ketchum studio, in addition to active camping, in places like Los Angeles.

"I happen to be in an area where lots of people come from all over the country to ski," says Kagan. "They hear of my work, so they visit the studio. That's probably the single biggest reason that I sell what I happen to be in the right spot."

Kagan's work is comprised of geometric shapes easily made by the direct, welding method he uses. None of his sculpture is cast.

Curator Michael Green says that Kagan has recently begun working with horizontal sculpture, creating what the artist calls "reclining totems."

"Conceptually, it's different because a totem is something that is vertical. So as soon as you start making them horizontal, you start dealing with that totem concept. You're changing the idea a little bit," says Green.

Kagan says he wants people to come away from the exhibition with a sense of what can be done with metal.

"I would want them to have a sense of what you can do by bending, cutting—and forming metal into these different images. It's a very different fabrication than just building machinery," he says.

'Momma' manages different humor style

LOS ANGELES — A comedy about ANGELES seems an unlikely choice for "Holiday Momma," but Orion's "Holiday Momma From the Train" has managed to break through on the year-end sleeper, amassing \$25 million in ticket sales in its first 25 days.

It's no surprise to Billy Crystal, who stars in the film with Danny DeVito and was involved in the production from the beginning.

"This movie is a little on the edge, which I find refreshing," he said. "The only possibility of its being dangerous is that what it says to people is that this is a brighter kind of thing. That's wonderful about 'Momma' is that it's different, not the usual kind of thing."

"I've always tried in my career not to do the usual thing. I think people love the film for that reason. It's strange, it's very funny, it's refreshing."

"Momma" is indeed strange — today's "bubblegum" comedies. Crystal is a luckless teacher at a twit-bit college, stricken with writer's block because his wife stole his manuscript and she made millions as a bogus novelist. DeVito is a man married with a harried mother, played with murderous ferocity by Anne Ramsey.

Inspired by Alfred Hitchcock's "Strangers on a Train," DeVito meets Crystal and suggests a double murder. Crystal doesn't take the idea seriously, but DeVito does.

"You get the audience to accept the premise of the audition to meet from the train because of how interesting the two characters are," Crystal says "during" a lunch break on his current film, "Memories of Me."

The comics work so well together that you might think they are longtime buddies. Not true. They met only once — at a party at MGM — before joining to do "Momma."

Martin makes travelogue into a comedy experience

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and are as follows: **G**—General Audiences; **PG**—Parental Guidance Suggested; **PG-13**—Parents Strongly Cautioned; **R**—Restricted; **TV**—Television.

PLANES, TRAINS AND AUTOMOBILES (R)—Director John Hughes has made his film a catalog of worst travel experiences, but the movie's humor comes from Steve Martin, fastidious as a Siamese cat, trying to get away from curmudgeon salesman John Candy, who is actually—the more resourceful traveler. The film is schizoid. It is best when Hughes turns the screen over to these two masters of physical humor, who are sometimes priceless but not often enough to save the great patches based on the humor of abuse, which either sits well with you or leaves you detached and even mildly offended.

BATTERIES NOT INCLUDED (PG)—An enchanting fantasy rooted in harsh reality, as an elderly couple and several of their neighbors struggle to hold out in their old Lower Manhattan apartment house against a ruthless developer—but

with the unexpected help of little creatures from outer-space. A holiday family treat from Steven Spielberg's Amblin Entertainment.

OVERBOARD (PG)—Goldie Hawn is a rich-harried host, overboard near Ellis Cove, Ore., and remade into a Hollywood housewife of a housewife by father of four. Kurt Russell—taking devious advantage of her temporary amnesia. Hawn and Russell are both good, but this overkill is variation on "Sweet-Avex" has a tacky visual style, pop-up wisecracks and no logical explanation for why all of Ellis Cove seems to concur in the deception. It is a flimsy, superficially warm-hearted comedy where all the values and sentiments seem pre-cooked.

THREE MEN AND A BABY (PG)—What we have here is an Americanization of Coline Serreau's "Three Men and a Cradle." Serreau's movie was fairly funny, and this one is funnier still. The people who made it carry over much of the original's weightless, sweet-tempered flavor. Any movie in which Steve Guttenberg plays the sensitive guy would seem to be in big-big trouble; it is like casting Fred MacMurray as a heartbroken Fred. But director Leonard Nimoy has the knack for relationships the writers seem to lack. And Tom Selleck seems here to find his true movie meter; the relaxed bachelor camaraderie here almost echoes the tongue-in-cheek ambience on "Magnum P.I."

Grammy award nominations released; U2 tops honor list

NEW YORK (AP) — The Irish rock band U2 was nominated Thursday for four Grammy awards for its platinum "The Joshua Tree" LP.

Mega hit-maker Michael Jackson had four nominations for "Bad," his first album since the historic "Thriller" LP, and song stylist Whitney Houston received three.

U2, which took the United States by storm last year, was nominated for record of the year, album of the year and song of the year — their first-ever Grammy mentions.

The band, which also received a best rock vocal performance nomination, scored three singles off the album "The Joshua Tree" and played to sold-out stadiums nationwide.

"I guess these Paddies did all right for themselves," said Larry Kallen, drummer and founder of the rock band. "I'm proud of my publicist, Paul Wasserman."

Barry Mann and Cynthia Weil, Linda Clark, publicist for Los Lobos, said she awakened all five band members with the news that they had been nominated for their rendition of "La Bamba," a Mexican folk tune made popular by the late Ritchie Valens.

"They just said 'Wow. That's really neat.' They weren't quite aware. They're very thrilled and honored," Clark said.

The group received a Grammy in 1984 for Best Mexican-American performance for the song, "Anselma," which was on their first album, "And a Time to Dance."

Houston and Vega were in good company in the best-pop female vocal category, joining past winners Carly Simon and Barbra Streisand along with newcomer Belinda Carlisle.

Joining Jackson as best pop male vocal nominees were Bruce Springsteen, "Brilliant Disgrace," Sting, "Bring on the Night," Elton John, his live version of "Candle in the Wind," and Al Jarreau, "Theme from Moonlighting."

Springsteen was also cited for best rock vocal performance for "Tunnel of Love" album, and for best rock instrumental performance with the E-Street Band for "Paradise by the Sea." U2 was nominated in the best new artist category for "Rattle and Hum."

The best jazz instrumental performance category includes an interesting matchup between brothers Branford and Wynton Marsalis. Branford was nominated for his "Contantial" album.

And the most overall mentions went to opera singer Kathleen Battle with five. She was nominated for best classical vocal soloist performance and sings on four of the five nominees for best opera recording.

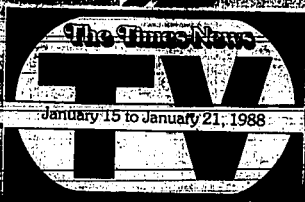

CBS' new show "48 Hours" tries slice-of-life approach to tv news

By PAUL ELJE

"It's two days in the life," say executive producer Andrew Heyward of "48 Hours," CBS News's newest prime-time program. "As disparate, as entertaining, as editorially worthy as two days can be."

The show, which premieres Tuesday, Jan. 19, will pursue a strategy that CBS introduced last year in the well-received documentaries "48 Hours on Crack Street" and "Seven Days in May," zero in on a subject, mobilize a crew, and blitz a location, with the hope that short-production-time will be offset by up-to-the-minute immediacy. Each show will be filmed, start to finish, in 48 hours.

"CBS Evening News" anchor Dan Rather is the show's host, and Bernard Goldberg is the principal correspondent. Much of the other "48 Hours" staff will be drawn from CBS's regional news bureaus — which had led some critics to wonder whether the show is a cost-cutting measure by the network.

Heyward denies the charge that by "borrowing" correspondents and minimizing production time, "48 Hours" is cutting corners.

"I reject the notion that we're being superficial, just because we're working quickly," he says. "Yes, there is less scripting and narrating than in a conventional documentary. But we don't just show up on location and hope for the best."

"And though we are more closely

tion served up by the nightly news. As ABC's "Nightline" has demonstrated, a no-nonsense program with a flexible format can walk the line between headline news, long-range investigative journalism and less urgent trend and lifestyle pieces.

"We have a huge advantage over other long-form programming in that we can work so quickly," Heyward says. "We'll work with as little as four days lead time in the most crucial situations. The more we can narrow the framework, the more powerful a tool it will be."

Heyward joined "The CBS Evening News" in 1981 and served as its executive producer from May 1986 until he was asked to helm "48 hours" last October. He oversaw CBS's coverage of the 1986 Reagan-Gorbachev summit and produced "Seven Days in May," a profile of daily life in the Soviet Union.

He refutes the suggestion that "48 Hours" is a showcase designed to mollify Rather, who may be asked to share his "Evening News" chair with a co-anchor. "To my knowledge, there are no plans for a co-anchor," he says.

Usually soap opera awards pop up in June with the Emmy telecast, but NBC jumps the gun on Monday, January 18, at 3 p.m. by airing the Eleventh Annual Soap Opera Digest Awards from the Aquarius Theater in Hollywood.

Are you ready to witness two hours of TV's inordinate need for self-congratulation?

At least the nominations come from the fans, readers of Soap Opera Digest, voting for categories like Super Couple, Best Villain and Villainess, Best Hero and Heroine.

Judging from the votes, viewers don't think the way the Emmy folks do. For Best Show, "Santa Barbara" vies with "Days of Our Lives" and "As the World Turns." No mention of ratings leader "General Hospital," the popular "The Young and the Restless" or the terrific "All My Children."

It comes as no surprise that NBC, home base for "Days" and "Santa Barbara," should telecast a show in which their products shine so brightly. An NBC spokesman says, however, that the network decided to carry the Awards before the nominees were selected.

Prime time soaps are also included in the program, with "Dallas," "Dynasty" and "Knots Landing" up for Best Show.

The award categories do provide a few laughs, particularly in the Humor category for actor and actress. Humor in the afternoon?

Hah! But Robin Mattson ("Santa Barbara"), Margaret Reed ("As the World Turns") and Arlene Sorkin ("Days of Our Lives") will stand up with straight faces.

For a final touch of irony, clap for Brenda Dickson ("The Young and the Restless"), Susan Howard ("Dallas") and Victoria Principal ("Dallas"), all nominated and all currently unemployed.

CHANNEL CHATTER

Every now and then, two soap stars who have made it to prime time find themselves working together and comparing notes about their soap days. Kristian Alfonso, who was a regular on "Days of Our Lives," for some time, guest stars as John Stamos' girlfriend in ABC's

PBS' American Playhouse offers top-notch drama for this season

NEW YORK — American Playhouse, public television's acclaimed weekly drama anthology series, will launch its seventh season on Monday, Jan. 18, with a three-part, four-and-a-half-hour adaptation of Eugene O'Neill's seductive drama, "Strange Interlude," starring Kenneth Branagh, David Dukes, Jose Ferrer, Rosemary Harris, Ken Howard, Glenda Jackson and Edward Petherbridge.

The miniseries, about a manipulative woman determined to love and, if need be, destroy the men in her life, will be televised on three consecutive nights — Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, Jan. 18, 19 and 20, at 9 p.m., over the Public Broadcasting Service (PBS).

The new season of American Playhouse, which moves to Wednesday nights at 9 from its accustomed Monday evening time period, also includes a two-part dramatization of one of the most publicized criminal trials of recent history — "The Trial of Bernhard Goetz," with Peter Crombie in the title role; the TV premiere of Richard Wright's searing novel of racism in America, "Native Son," starring Carroll Baker, Matt Dillon, Victor Love, Elizabeth McGovern, Geraldine Page and Oprah Winfrey; the public television premiere of Eugene O'Neill's classic drama, "A Long Day's Journey Into Night," starring Jack Lemmon; and an adaptation of "Suspicion," Alfred Hitchcock's psychological thriller transplanted to the 1980s, with Anthony Andrews and Jane Curtin recreating the screen roles of Cary Grant and Joan Fontaine.

Season VIII of American Playhouse also celebrates the centennial of Eugene O'Neill, America's only Nobel Prize-winning playwright, who would have been 100 years old on Oct. 16, 1988. In addition to O'Neill's "Strange Interlude" and "Long Day's Journey Into Night," the series will offer Lanie Robertson's one-hour biographical portrait of a difficult and pivotal period in the life of Eugene O'Neill. Entitled "Journey Into Genius," the drama stars Matthew Modine as the budding young playwright

whose actor-father James O'Neill's powerful presence haunted him all of his life and influenced his writings.

The new season also features: The television premiere of Lanford Wilson's memory play, "Lemon Sky," set in southern California during the 1950s, which stars Tom Atkins, Kevin Bacon and Lindsay Crouse;

"The Return of Hickey," starring Zach Galligan, Edward Herrmann, Robert Joy and Nicholas Roe, an adaptation of one of Owen Johnson's humorous short stories which appeared in The Saturday Evening Post at the turn of the century;

"Land of Little Rain," a film biography starring Helen Hunt and Nicholas Roe, a little-known American writer at the turn of the century who found spiritual and artistic emancipation through a deep personal connection to the Native American experience; "The

"The Revolt of Mother" and "Pigeon Feathers," two stories celebrating the families of America's heartland — the first by Mary Wilkins Freeman and the second by John Updike;

And the television premiere of the recent theatrical feature about a father-son relationship, "Billy Galvin," co-starring Karl Malden, Joyce Van Patten and Lenny Von Dohlen.

In addition, the Season VII schedule includes new adaptations of Clifford Odets' "The Big Knife," a searing drama about the Hollywood film industry in the 1940s, and Robert Anderson's "I Never Sang For My Father," which will star Harold Gould, Daniel J. Travanti and Dorothy McGuire. Also set is "The Thin Blue Line," a fascinating real-life story of an accused killer who may have been wrongly convicted for the crime of murder.

Q: We know that Jack Benny's daughter and Gary Cooper's daughter do a "Daughters of Famous Fathers" talk on the lecture circuit. We were thinking of other offspring who could do the same thing. What about Danny Kaye's daughter Dena? It would certainly be interesting to hear what she has to say about her famous father. — B.T.

A: That will never happen. Danny's will specifically forbid any invasion of privacy, and stipulates that Dena would be disinherited if she writes a biography, or does anything else on her father's behalf.

Q: I see where my favorite author Irving Wallace is getting ready to launch yet another

book. Where does he find the time to research all this fascinating detail he puts into his best-sellers? — B.W.

A: Irving's next page-turner will be a return to the political suspense genre with which he's had so much success, entitled "The Guest of Honor," and he modestly gives much credit to his librarian! As far as I know, he's the only author in the world who employs his own full-time librarian. The librarian works at Wallace's Brentwood, L.A. home, to supervise a collection of 44,000 books owned by Irv and son David Wallechinsky — many rare, out-of-print, etc., from all over the world.

NEW YORK (AP) — Television signals of all major league baseball games will be scrambled this season, making them unavailable to satellite dish owners.

Hughes Television Network of New York, which will handle transmission of TV signals for the 26 teams, last month signed a contract with the baseball commissioner's office to scramble the signals.

General Instrument Corporation of San Diego will handle the scrambling under a contract with Hughes according to a source here.

Mark Medress, a General Instruments vice president, confirmed that an announcement would be made Thursday, but declined further comment.

Until now, all baseball signals have gone unscrambled and thus were available to anyone with a satellite dish.

The scrambling means that all stations wishing to televise pictures of major league games would have to get permission from the commissioner's office and pay a fee.

Uneasy truce exists between film and TV

LOS ANGELES — Television is not the truth. Television is a circus, a carnival, a traveling troupe of acrobats and storytellers, sideshow freaks, lion tamers and football players.
 Those ringing words by the late Paddy Chayefsky spoken with Academy Award-winning fervor by the late Peter Finch as the raving anchor Howard Beale in "Network," signaled the film world's most slashing attack on the medium that once threatened Hollywood's existence.

Television has been the subject of the movie world's fear, suspicion and disdain ever since Uncle Miltie first flickered on the home screens in 1948. The latest treatment of the television world is "Broadcast News," James L. Brooks' dissection of the ins and outs of network journalism.

During the late 1940s and through most of the '50s, Hollywood considered television its enemy. Neighborhood movie houses were shutting down because Americans were staying home to watch "Your Show of Shows" with Sid Caesar and Imogene Coca and "I Love Lucy."

The movie industry was so paranoid that MGM had a strict rule: Interior scenes could not display tele-

vision sets, even though most American homes had them. Studios also forbade their stars from appearing on the upstart medium.

Columbia Pictures' Harry Cohn broke the anti-TV stand by selling series through a subsidiary, Screen Gems. Walt Disney started a weekly show to raise the money and garner publicity for his theme park Disneyland. Studios discovered the publicity value of television, and recognized it as an added source of income. An uneasy coexistence developed.

Warner Bros. tried to cash in on the Milton Berle phenomenon by starring him in the semi-autobiographical "Always Leave Them Laughing" (1949). The studio also offered Liberace in "Sincerely Yours" (1955). Both films bombed, proving that the public would not pay for stars they could see at home for nothing.

A more acerbic view of television was offered by two 1950s films; both perhaps inspired by the popularity of Arthur Godfrey.

"The Great Man," with Jose Ferrer as star, director and co-writer, investigated the dark past of a lovable TV personality. Elia Kazan's "A Face in the Crowd" cast Andy Griffith as a homespun humorist turned megalomaniac. A remake is being considered, with Whoopi Goldberg in the Griffith role.

Television journalism has long been a movie target. News crews often play the villain role, clamoring for pictures and quotes as a character emerges from a courtroom or hospital.

TV reporters and producers have often been portrayed as unscrupulous, willing to do anything for a story. In the British-made "Stardust," a news broadcast allows a famous rock star to die on live TV. In "The Howling," broadcaster Dee Wallace Stone turns into a werewolf before viewers' eyes.

As a TV reporter in "Eyewitness," Sigourney Weaver romances William Hurt in order to win a scoop on a murder case. Jane Fonda exploits Robert Redford for a national news story in "The Electric Horseman" until she falls for him. Fonda mended her scruples in "The China Syndrome," pursuing the story of a nuclear meltdown as a TV reporter.

The role of the network anchor was explored with the blackest of humor in "Network." Finch as the news commentator becomes a messiah to the people and an embarrassment to his sponsors.

In Richard Brooks' little-seen "Wrong Is Right," Sean Connery portrayed a Walter Cronkite figure with loose principles—until he uncovers a worldwide CIA plot.

ABC's "The Thorns" premieres to loud boos

NEW YORK (AP) — Mike Nichols' new comedy series for ABC, "The Thorns," starts off promisingly enough with Dorothy Loudon crooning the catchy theme song, "We're All Right."
 "We've millions of unemployed, "And beggars we can't avoid, "It's pitiful, dear, "But we're all right."
 Unfortunately, we're not, because the show that follows is pretty pitiful.

"The Thorns," premiering Friday at 8 p.m., seems less a comedy than a mystery — How did esteemed film director and former comedy writer Mike Nichols create something so funny?

The show wants to be different, a tart, satirical slap at the me-first mentality of the '80s. But in the premiere episode, it quickly reverts to sitcom formula, complete with contrived moral ending.

Producers Hugh Wilson ("Frank's Place") and Jay Tarses ("The Slap Maxwell Story" and "The Days and Nights of Molly Dodd") are going great guns without laugh tracks. So why does Nichols' show resort to canned hee-hawing? One character complains about the smell from the Chinese restaurant next door. Replies another, "What do you want me to do? Have them deported?" Har har har har har.

"The Thorns" is set in a posh New York townhouse wherein dwells an unsympathetic social-climbing family uncomfortably reminiscent of Fox's execrable "Down and Out in Beverly Hills," with touches of "The Perfect Party" and "The Louds" thrown in.

Director John Bowab's video verite style is rather interesting, but the cast is packed with top New York stage actors, such as Kelly Bishop, a Dowdy winner for "A

Chorus Line," Marilyn Cooper, a Tony winner for "Woman of the Year," and Tony Roberts, known to movie buffs as Woody Allen's frequent sidekick.

In the opening episode, "Death and Transfiguration," Ginger Thorn (Bishop) is panicking over the evening shindig she's planned to propel the family into the social register. Meanwhile, her husband, Sloan (Roberts), is explaining to the children why they can't find the family dog. It seems Sloan, weary of Fido's stultence, had him euthanized.

Now that we're smuggling down to get to know these lovely people, Sloan's mother (Cooper) calls to report that a fire has destroyed her Brooklyn apartment. Sloan invites her to stay with the family, rejecting Ginger's suggestion that his mother tough it out in a hotel.

"You couldn't care less if your mother was in a hotel or in a ditch," notes Ginger.
 "But how would it look?" Sloan reasons.

Amid this social relevance roams a contemptuous French maid named Toinette (Mary Louise Wilson) who smokes cigarettes and talks like Maurice Chevalier. Cricket (Lori Petty), an au-pair-girl from Queens, wears crop-tops, rides a motorcycle and has to fend off the advances of Mr. Thorn while Mrs. Thorn is running upstairs to the bedroom with the architect.

The Thorns have reproduced, unfortunately. Adam Bleak plays 18-year-old Chad, Lisa Rieffel is Joey, 14, and Jess Tendler plays Edmund, a 7-year-old who traumatized by the death of the dog, to the point he assumes its identity.

Sloan's mother, Rose, is supposed to be the receptacle of all that is so good and honest in the world by vir-

due of appearing at the cocktail party in her nightgown.

But the theme song is good. It was written by John Kander and Fred Ebb ("New York, New York," "Cabaret") and seems to contain the real philosophy behind the show: "You'll find in the long run 'It's rich that endures. 'We're upping our income. 'So why don't you up yours?"

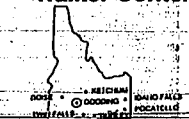

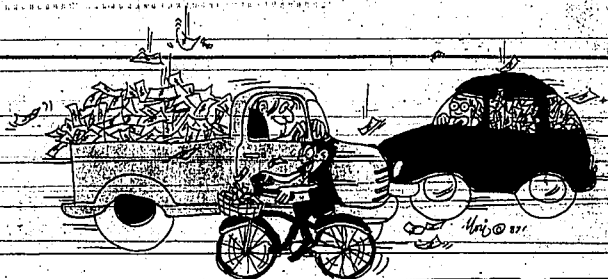
