Army Engineers say utility must submit new plans

Niagara Springs dam may come out

BOISE — The concrete dam and wing walls at Niagara Springs may come tumbling down if the Army Corps of Engineers rules against Idaho Power Company and Rim View Trout Company.

Corps officials in Walls, Walla Walla, Wednesday, said Idaho Power failed to submit a proper application to build the concrete diversions at the site, located near a state park along the Snake River.

"Idaho Power admitted it was a mistake on their part," said Brad Daily, environmental resource specialist with the corps. "They built both structures, but only submitted plans for one."

Idaho Power spokesman Larry Taylor said Thursday that the company was "disappointed with what the corps has said."



Officials say the proper building application for Niagara diversions was not submitted. Corps said the structures built by Idaho Power to divert water from the Snake River at Niagara Springs, Idaho, are a violation of the law.

"After investigation, we found the Corps' records show that Idaho Power did not submit a proper application for the diversions," said Taylor. "The Corps' records show that Idaho Power did not submit a proper application for the diversions."

"We were told a permit was not required," Taylor said. "But we will comply and file for the application after the fact."

The corps is forcing Idaho Power to re-submit full plans for both structures.

In the process, the public will have a chance to comment and challenge at least one structure, construction of the dam, which would make Wendell resident Bob Taylor at least partially happy.

"I don't know if it's a good thing or not," Taylor said. "I don't know if it's a good thing or not."

Corps officials said they will require Idaho Power to submit a permit application, public comment required. If the dam is challenged, the Corps will have to decide if the dam is a violation of the law.

Contra aid compromise may emerge

WASHINGTON — President Reagan, facing a crucial vote next month on aid to the Contra rebels, is likely to settle on a sharply reduced figure of roughly \$50 million, most of it earmarked for nonlethal equipment, White House officials said Thursday.

The scaled-back amount, and the shift away from money designated for weapons, reflects the difficult battle the administration faces in Congress as a result of efforts by Central American leaders to reach a negotiated cease-fire in the Contras' war against Nicaragua's Sandinista government.

One White House official conceded that the administration, which had originally planned to seek \$270 million, will drastically cut its request after being "forced into it by the circumstances" in Central America and in Congress.

Others cautioned that arguments were still being made in the White House for sums above and below \$50 million; and that the figure could change. A senior White House official said that the staff will present a recommendation to the president today.

White House officials said that they are trying to determine the minimum amount needed to sustain the rebels for several months while the administration tries to determine whether a cease-fire will occur.

"People are looking at what you really need to provide the support" for the Contras, a senior White House official said, speaking on condition of anonymity. "You don't have to buy trouble for yourself" by seeking more than is needed or than can be obtained.

"We will be tailoring our request to maintain the Contras as a viable force — as much humanitarian aid as possible and as little lethal aid as possible," White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater said.

The administration maintains that the Nicaraguan government will renge on its agreements to make democratic reforms in the nation if the Contras dissipate as a military threat, while others contend the U.S. military aid is undercutting the peace process.

Reagan has said that the bulk of the assistance he will seek for the Contras would be non-lethal — "food, clothing, to keep them up and going," one official said.

"The weapons are there," the official said, adding that the military component would be mostly ammunition.

\$60,000 unaccounted for in Hart books

WASHINGTON — Gary Hart's debt-ridden 1984 presidential campaign has failed to account for almost \$60,000 in apparently excessive and possibly illegal campaign contributions, despite repeated efforts by the Federal Election Commission to settle the accounts, according to FEC computer records and documents.

FEC files also show that Hart's campaign received \$30,000 from two California fund-raisers the morning after Hart's second-place finish in the 1984 Iowa caucuses in a sale-and-leaseback transaction that is generally prohibited by federal election law.

In addition, the records raise questions about the Hart campaign's explanation of how a California video producer, Stuart Karl, underwrote thousands of dollars in campaign expenses in July 1984 in apparent violation of the law.

A Washington Post computer analysis of FEC records for Hart's 1984 race disclosed that \$69,746 in excessive contributions from 74 individuals have neither been refunded nor otherwise cleared from the books.

Federal law prohibits individuals from contributing more than \$1,000 to a candidate in each election. Campaigns routinely receive contributions from individuals who have reached the \$1,000 limit. The Post analysis disclosed:

— Many of those excess contributions typically are returned immediately by campaign staff workers, said Fred Eiland, an FEC spokesman. Others are deposited in campaign bank accounts, but the excess amount is later refunded and the refund reported to the FEC.

Hart did return a number of excessive contributions from his 1984 campaign, which is still at least \$1.1 million in the red.

Documents obtained from the FEC show that, beginning in March 1984, election officials repeatedly asked the Hart campaign to explain dozens of contributions made in apparent violation of federal election laws.

"We are in the process of preparing a detailed analysis of potentially over-limit contributions noted by the (FEC) auditors during their review," Moore wrote in a letter dated Aug. 7, 1985.

Moore also wrote that only \$3,023.50 in excessive contributions had "not yet been fully resolved, either by redistribution of the contribution to another person... or by refund."

FEC officials said Thursday that they had no record of the report promised by Moore, or of any other committee filings that resolved the challenged contributions.

Flying feline, owner reunited at airport

LOS ANGELES — Felix the frequent-flier feline huggard and nuzzled her owner Thursday in a joyful airport reunion arranged after the cat was rescued from the belly of a jumbo jet where she made her home for 28 days.

"Oh, look at her. She looks so well," cried Janice Kubeckel as the cat was put in her arms at Los Angeles International Airport.

"Look, Mommy. She's hugging you," said her 4-year-old daughter Nadine. "I missed you, Felix."

It was true. Felix put her front paws around Mrs. Kubeckel's neck and clung.

Felix, a 5-year-old calico and female despite the name, became a celebrity after she escaped from her traveling box in the cargo hold of a Pan Am Boeing 747 on a journey from West Germany to Los Angeles on Dec. 3. She flew more than 10,000 miles and made at least 64 stops on three continents before she was discovered by airline personnel.

On the 11-hour flight from London, she nibbled on the steak and caviar and took a nap on the lap of Jane Ford, a Pan Am employee who adopted her when she was put in quarantine after being found in London.

Mrs. Kubeckel and her husband, William, were moving from Frankfurt to Edwards Air Force Base, Calif., when they caught the cat, and Felix escaped from her box.

On Jan. 1, the bedraggled feline was enticed from the plane by Heathrow by Pan Am staff and given emergency medical hospital treatment. She had been discovered the day before by a baggage handler in London.

Holed-up Utah clan signals to officers

MARION, Utah — Polygamists accused of bombing a Mormon chapel flashed signals from their barricaded log house with a mirror Thursday as top church leaders and the governor pleaded for a peaceful end to the six-day standoff.

The flashing from a window was seen shortly before and then after a police plane made several low passes over the compound and dropped something.

Authorities refused to say what was dropped. On Wednesday, a helicopter was used to deliver a note urging surrender to the fugitives led by Vickie Singer and Addam Swapp.

"It was obvious to our people on the forward observation posts that they did have a mirror mounted behind the window and were moving some type of an object in front of the mirror — between the mirror and the window — obviously signaling something," said Doug Bodrero, deputy state director of public safety.

"We're hoping to make some type of interpretation of that," he said.

Earlier, the Mormon Church's governing body said in a statement: "Church buildings are vital, but lives are infinitely more important.

Damaged church buildings can be repaired or rebuilt, lost lives cannot."

The sixth day of the standoff passed relatively quietly. The holed-up clan fired 65 rounds at police floodlights Tuesday and Wednesday.

Early Thursday, observers ringing the 2½-acre compound and officers in a plane overhead saw three rifle-toting figures walking in the snow outside the homestead's main log house.

Police entreaties to open negotiations were not immediately successful. Authorities said storming the stronghold wasn't an option.

"We want them to know that we are watching, but we don't want to pressure them into any type of a violent confrontation and our plan is to carry that forth for the next several days if necessary," said Bodrero.

Gov. Norm Bangert visited officers at Marion and said he was pleased with their efforts to avoid bloodshed.

"We desire this to be resolved peacefully. We do not wish a confrontation, but neither do we wish those responsible to get off without paying the proper penalty," Bangert said.

Kiebert plugs for fuel tax hike to maintain Gem highways

BOISE (AP) — Failure to increase fuel tax revenues to maintain Idaho's \$6 billion highway network will cause the system to deteriorate to the point the state can no longer afford it, Transportation Director Kermit Kiebert is warning.

"We have many causes for concern for our transportation network," Kiebert told legislative budget writers on Thursday. "It's now when we have to reach into our own pocket. An investment in our highway system now will prevent systemwide deterioration in our highway network that we can't afford later."



The former Democratic floor leader in the state Senate used a myriad of statistics to underscore the Andrus administration request for a nickel increase in the state's 14.5-cent-a-gallon fuel tax.

Attempts to raise the fuel tax a year ago failed when House and Sen-

ate negotiators wound up in a stalemate over whether the increase could be two or three cents.

Because of that, the Transportation Department had to abandon its annual \$6 million seal-coating program this year, further aggravating the already deteriorated condition of the highway system. The backlog of needed maintenance is now approaching \$1 billion.

"Reducing maintenance is not a long-range solution to our funding problem," Kiebert said. "It only allows our highway system to deteriorate further. We must return to basics, and maintenance must come first."

Because of the severe revenue crunch in recent years, maintenance of the system has fallen to a 45-year cycle, more than twice the 20-year life expectancy for road pavement. With revenues from a nickel increase in the fuel tax, Kiebert said ground could be gained on that backlog. But the maintenance schedule would still be on a 30- to 35-year cycle, meaning road surfaces will still be wearing out faster than they can be maintained.

Analysts have said that the state will never be able to attain an adequate maintenance schedule until the federal government redirects money now being spent on inter-

state highways to primary and secondary roads. That could happen in the early 1990s.

Seventy percent of all industrial and commercial goods are being transported by truck, Transportation Board Chairman John Ohman said, and that "reflects Idaho's economic dependence on highways in order to compete in the marketplace."

"We must also consider that the Idaho motorist and tourists who come to our state have to operate their vehicles on highways with the increased number of trucks, Ohman said. "As a result, it is apparent significant improvements must be made."

Ohman said major commitments

were being made to improving the worst highways in the state including U.S. 95, Idaho's only north-south link.

"Fuel taxes provide the investment capital for rehabilitating and constructing user-owned highways that support economic growth and tourism," he said. "Our department emphasizes to you the critical need for increased fuel tax revenues."

But while Gov. Cecil Andrus has backed the nickel fuel tax hike, key lawmakers have called it excessive, and the Idaho Motor Transport Association has gone on record in support of no more than a three-cent increase.

At that level, the state would have little money available to cut into the maintenance backlog.

Condo buyers may get time to think

BOISE (AP) — After receiving complaints about high-pressure sales tactics used to sell condominium time-share programs in Idaho, a House committee has given preliminary approval to legislation giving buyers up to 72 hours to change their minds.

State can't bring tribes into Snake River case

FORT HALL (AP) — The state of Idaho has no authority to bring the Shoshone-Bannock tribes into the Snake River adjudication, according to the attorney general's office.

A letter filed in the adjudication proceedings by attorneys for Boise irrigators, had sparked concerns within the Fort Hall Tribal Business Council that the tribes would be forced into state court to defend their water rights.

"There appears to be some confusion among tribal members regard-

ing the state's position on the jurisdiction of the tribes," deputy Attorney General Clive Strong said. "The state has no authority to bring the tribes into adjudication because of the tribes' sovereign immunity."

Don Olowinski, attorney for the Boise irrigation districts, said the letter in question was filed to clarify jurisdiction over water rights claims.

"The tribes claim that the state has no jurisdiction over its water rights claims," Olowinski said. "The

state claims that it does. We're concerned that the Snake River adjudication will go forward for a period of time and we'll have to spend time and money participating in it and then find out that the tribes are correct.

"It wasn't my intention to confuse the tribes," he said. "All I wanted to do is clarify a legal position."

Earlier this week, Olowinski failed to convince 5th District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt and the Bannock, Kuna, Nampa, Meridian, New

York, Wilder and Big Ben irrigation districts should be excluded from the adjudication, and he used the issue of the tribes to argue his point.

The districts represented by Olowinski have already gone through or are going through their own adjudications and are trying to avoid the expense of another. They also fear the Snake River-wide adjudication, the largest ever in the West, could ultimately reduce their water rights.

Those districts, along with two others have appealed their inclusion in the adjudication to the state Supreme Court.

Legislative log

Introduced in Senate

SB1272 (Health and Welfare) — Exempts local health care establishments from state laws covering eating places.

SB1273 (Health and Welfare) — Prohibits Board of Nursing from denying licensure to graduates of approved one- or two-year courses.

SB1274 (Health and Welfare) — Requires a certificate ensuring that the donor of body parts for transplants is free of the AIDS-related virus.

SB1275 (Health and Welfare) — Requires the Board of Health and Welfare to establish a program that will protect from contact with the AIDS virus personal care workers in jurisdictions of incident or crime scenes.

SB1276 (Health and Welfare) — Requires a negative test results for the AIDS related virus before blood or another body part or fluid can be transfused, injected or transplanted in another person.

SB1277 (Health and Welfare) — Authorizes the Board of Corrections to provide medical and counseling services to inmates exposed to the AIDS related virus and educational and informational services to

help all inmates lessen the transmission of the AIDS virus.

Introduced in House

HR322 (Local Government) — Directs Legislative Council to undertake/complete reorganization of county laws.

HR310 (Transportation and Defense) — Urges Congress to move on Ways and Means to complete construction of the interstate system to the refurbishment and improvement of non-interstate system highways and bridges.

HR399 (Local Government) — Provides that county coroner where the incident causing death occurred be responsible for the inquest and all costs incurred.

HR400 (Local Government) — Changes law on county recording of documents to allow recording time of filing anywhere on the instrument instead of at bottom.

HR401 (Local Government) — Limits liability of county officials for public money or property when cause of such loss is fire, flood, earthquake or other natural or man-made disaster, or when caused by their job duty or criminal conduct of another person not a county employee or official.

HR402 (Agricultural Affairs) — Deletes re-

quirement for inspection of each licensed food service establishment at least once per year.

HR403 (Revenue and Taxation) — Provides that penalty for failure to file information returns also applies to failure to include all required information on the return.

HR404 (Revenue and Taxation) — Provides that minimum civil penalties for violations under the Business Tax Act shall be increased from \$10 to \$25.

HR405 (State Affairs) — Allows director of the Department of Law Enforcement to pay shift differential up to 3 percent for hours worked between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. on a regular basis.

HR406 (State Affairs) — Allows any person to obtain a liquor catering permit and to serve alcohol at private parties or conventions.

HR407 (State Affairs) — Removes restriction of a liquor licensee being able to pay a monetary penalty only once; allows licensee to pay monetary penalty in lieu of suspension of license.

HR408 (State Affairs) — Strikes prohibition on sale of alcoholic beverages on any state or national election day or any municipal election day during the time polls are open.

Higher night pay gains OK

BOISE (AP) — Employees of the Department of Law Enforcement would receive a shift differential for work between the hours of 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. under legislation given preliminary approval by the House State Affairs Committee on Thursday.

The legislation, which carries an estimated \$118,325 price tag, would allow the director of the department to pay up to 5 percent extra to employees whose assignments require them to work regularly between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m.

A statement with the bill said people who work varied shifts suffer disruption of their family lives and mental and physical stress. It pointed out that most private employers grant shift differentials.

Similar legislation was introduced in the Senate last session, but failed when other groups of state employees requested similar treatment.

Chairman Pam Bengson, R-Boise, said State Affairs would hold a hearing on the legislation on Tuesday.

Company advances opening day for mine

CHALLIS (AP) — With market prices for molybdenum continuing to strengthen, Cyprus Minerals Co. has decided to open its Thompson Creek Mine near Challis on March 1, about two months sooner than originally planned.

The mine is scheduled to start up by the end of the year, the company said. "If the market remains strong, Cyprus is positioned to operate the mill and plant for a longer period than previously planned."

The Thompson Creek operation got a boost late last November when the Bonneville Power Administration announced that it would implement a new rate schedule in January that would allow the molybdenum mine to qualify for lower power rates.

The special rates are granted by the federal energy wholesaler for U.S. companies in danger of closing permanently.

In December, the Reagan administration approved a request to reimpose a tariff on imports of subsidized foreign molybdenum that Cyprus and Idaho officials said had devastated domestic production of the mineral, which is used to harden steel.

Aeronautics chief named

BOISE (AP) — William C. Miller, a 44-year veteran of the Idaho Department of Transportation and manager of the state's highway safety program since 1980, has been named chief of the department's Division of Aeronautics.

Department director Kermit Kiebert, who told a legislative study committee last November that he wanted to end the public perception that Transportation was a "closed shop," announced Miller's appointment Thursday to replace Worthie Rauscher, who has retired.

Miller, 47, is a licensed airline transport pilot and has worked in military and civilian aviation since 1961. He is a lieutenant colonel in the Idaho Air National Guard.

Defense questions qualifications of state specialist in Rhoades trial

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The defense attacked the qualifications of a state fingerprint specialist Thursday after testimony that accused killer Paul Ezra Rhoades' fingerprints were not found on the gun used to kill Idaho Falls teacher Susan Michelbacher.

Defense attorney Stephen Hart argued during the fourth day of Rhoades' first-degree murder trial that Robert Kerchusky, a fingerprint specialist for the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement, had spent more time studying the various classifications of fingerprints than in obtaining and identifying fingerprints.

Hart has argued that the gun found outside the car Rhoades was driving when he was arrested in Wells, Nev., last March 25 was handled by a number of people before it was checked for fingerprints. Ballistics tests have shown the same gun was used to kill Mrs. Michelbacher.

Rhoades, 31, of Idaho Falls, is charged with first-degree murder, first-degree kidnapping, robbery, and an infamous crime against nature in her slaying last March 19.

Kerchusky testified Thursday afternoon that Rhoades' fingerprints were not identified on the 38-caliber revolver on Mrs. Michelbacher's vest. But he said the gun was found in the car he was driving in Nevada; which had been reported stolen by his mother, and on items inside the car including a blue woman's bracelet.

Earlier Thursday, three Nevada law enforcement officials testified that they took no special precautions in handling the gun found outside Rhoades' car.

Nevada Highway Patrol Trooper Mike McKenna testified that when he arrived at the abandoned car, he was checked for fingerprints. Ballistics tests have shown the same gun was used to kill Mrs. Michelbacher.

He picked up the gun by its grips and took no special precautions in handling it, the trooper said. He said he found a brown leather holster about 40 feet from the car.

Peter Omorato, a Nevada trooper who is in charge of evidence storage at the agency's Wells office, testified that he also had handled the weapon without taking any special precautions.

George McIntosh, district sergeant at the Wells office, also said he had handled the gun. He said it was not uncommon to find firearms in vehicles in Nevada, and there was no reason at the time for special precautions.

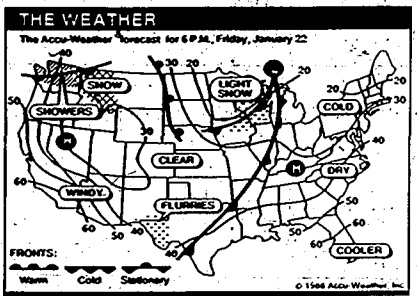
The gun was introduced into evidence Thursday.

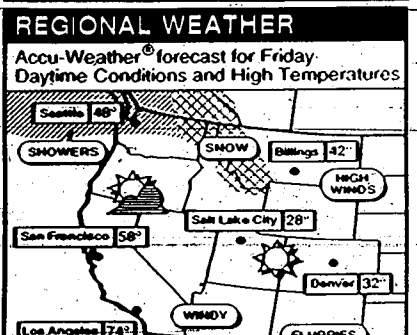

allowed. The legislation must be approved by both bodies to take effect.

"If you lose one, you can't go back (seeking a lesser amount), and if you lose, basically, that's the end of the resistance," said a White House official. "They'd lose an awful lot of momentum and it would be a terrible morale blow."

As the administration scales up a lobbying campaign intended to convince wavering members of the House and Senate to continue the hotly debated assistance program, leaders of the Sandinista government in Managua have unveiled a series of reforms intended to demonstrate compliance with the five-

month-old peace agreement reached by the presidents of Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua.

Thursday, the Sandinistas said that they would be willing to permit supplies of humanitarian aid from the United States to reach the Contras, through an international organization, if the rebels accept a cease-fire. The Nicaraguan government also said that it was willing to allow the Contras to establish a new political party or join existing parties for purposes of entering elections.

The proposal appeared to catch the Reagan administration by surprise, and the White House issued no comment.

In another development, intelligence sources disclosed in Washington that Soviet aid to the Sandinistas in 1987 totaled 21,700 tons of military materiel in 62 shipments — roughly equivalent in size to the record 21,900 tons believed to have been shipped to Nicaragua in 1986.

Included were more than 50 surface-to-air missiles, more than 80 mobile anti-aircraft guns, 30 armored reconnaissance vehicles, 30 armored personnel carriers, an seven attack and transport helicopters known by the designation HIND and HIP in the West. The shipments also included "a large amount of guns and ammunition, an intelligence source said.

Hart's 1988 campaign has been scrambling to explain his finances since The Miami Herald reported Wednesday that Stuart Karl had paid some of the 1984 campaign expenses in apparent violation of the law.

Reporters questioned Hart about the campaign finance issues at several campaign stops in New Hampshire Thursday. He referred to the 1984 payments by Karl as "loans" and noted that the FEC had approved the repayment arrangement with Karl.

"I'd like to challenge (The Miami Herald) to put as much effort into covering my budget and my policies as they do to questions like this," Hart said in Litchfield, N.H. "We'll see whether or not they're willing to report to their readers serious issues as well."

The Hart campaign said Wednesday that the \$15,802 in checks Karl wrote to vendors for material for a

rally at the Democratic National Convention in 1987 was billed to the campaign as part of a nearly \$96,000 debt.

The FEC records show a \$95,000 Hart debt to "Karl Video" of Newport Beach, Calif., as of June 30, 1984. Karl did not write his checks for the convention until July. The next Hart campaign finance report showed the debt-to-Karl was \$95,520. The Karl debt was settled for 10 cents on the dollar nearly two years later.

At Hart headquarters in Denver Thursday, Bernard Schneider said that all the checks written by Karl were included in reports to the FEC. He noted that the campaign's initial report listing a debt to Karl was not prepared until July 20, 1984, that it was updated the report on Aug. 20, 1984, and again in 1986 to show additional debts to Karl.

Neither Schneider nor Hart campaign manager Sue Casey was familiar with the sale and leaseback of computer equipment and the fur-

niture that took place after the 1987 Iowa caucuses.

FEC records show \$30,000 in receipts to the 1984 campaign the day after the Iowa caucuses in February for the "sale and leaseback" of the campaign's furniture and computer equipment. The payments were \$20,000 from David Stein, an Orange County, Calif., developer who was a major Hart contributor, and \$10,000 from Karl.

FEC rulings generally have barred campaign requests to sell equipment during campaigns because it might be seen as an effort to raise funds. Hart's records show that the campaign made lease payments to Stein and Karl in March and April, but none thereafter and the money owed was not listed as a debt.

Stein said Thursday, "I was looking to help get the campaign some funds, but I wanted to make sure it was legitimate." He said his lawyer told him the transaction was permissible.

Kiebert plugs for fuel tax hike to maintain Gem highways

BOISE (AP) — Failure to increase fuel tax revenues to resume maintenance of Idaho's \$6-billion highway network will cause the system to deteriorate to the point the state can no longer afford it, Transportation Director Kermit Kiebert is warning.



There are many causes for concern for our transportation network," Kiebert told legislative budget writers on Thursday. "It's now when we have to reach into our own pocket. An investment in our highway system now will prevent systematic deterioration in our highway network that we can't afford later."

The former Democratic floor leader in the state Senate used a myriad of statistics to underscore the Andrus administration request for a nickel increase in the state's 14.5-cent-a-gallon fuel tax.

Because of the severe revenue crunch in recent years, maintenance of the system had fallen to 74 percent of the level of the 20-year life expectancy for road pavement. With revenues from a nickel increase in the fuel tax, Kiebert said, ground could be gained on that backlog. But the maintenance schedule would still be on a 30- to 35-year cycle, meaning road surfaces will still be wearing out faster than they can be maintained.

Analysts have said that the state will never be able to attain an adequate maintenance schedule until the federal government redirects money now being spent on inter-

state highways to primary and secondary roads. That could happen in the early 1990s.

Seventy percent of all industrial and commercial goods are being transported by truck. Transportation Board Chairman John Ohman said, and that "reflects Idaho's economic dependence on highways in order to compete in the marketplace."

"We must also consider that the Idaho motoring public and tourists who come to our state have to operate their vehicles on highways with the increased number of trucks," Ohman said. "As a result, it is apparent significant improvements must be made."

But while Gov. Cecil Andrus has backed the nickel fuel tax hike, key lawmakers have called it excessive, and the Idaho Motor Transport Association has gone on record in support of no more than a three-cent increase.

Condo buyers may get time to think

BOISE (AP) — After receiving complaints about high-pressure sales tactics used to sell condominium time-share programs in Idaho, a House committee has given preliminary approval to legislation giving buyers up to 72 hours to change their minds.

Some legislators expressed concern that the bill might be extended to apply to automobile dealers, giving buyers time to change their minds. Crane said the proposal before the committee on Thursday involves only condo time-share programs.

The deal for a condo at Island Park turned out to be as described, the Foxes said. "We feel that Idaho needs to take a hard look at some of their laws and we would urge them to make some changes," they said.

After trying to make arrangements for the trips for a long time, they concluded the intentions were not to cheat, the couple said in a complaint to the consumer affairs agency of the attorney general's office.

State can't bring tribes into Snake River case

FORT HALL (AP) — The state of Idaho has no authority to bring the Shoshone-Bannock tribes into the Snake River adjudication, according to the attorney general's office.

Don Olowinski, attorney for the Boise irrigation districts, said the letter in question was filed to clarify jurisdiction over water rights claims.

York, Wilder and Big Ben irrigation districts should be excluded from the adjudication, and he used the issue of the tribes to argue his point.

Olowinski have either already gone through or are going through their own adjudications and are trying to avoid the expense of another. They also fear the Snake River-wide adjudication, the largest ever in the West, could ultimately reduce their water rights.

Flight 1713 crash raises concerns

Limit use of green pilots, FAA says

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Aviation Administration called on airlines Thursday to avoid teaming inexperienced pilots in the cockpit, citing concern about the experience level of the pilots in the crash of a Continental Airlines jet in November.

The agency also announced tighter restrictions on aircraft maintenance and released year-end statistics showing a 26 percent increase in the number of near-collision reports — 1,056 compared with 840 the previous year — filed by pilots during 1987.

Reports of near-collisions involving at least one commercial aircraft — jetliner or commuter — jumped 40 percent from a year earlier.

Of about 900 incidents investigated, 18 percent were found to have been "critical," with the aircraft having flown within 100 feet of each other, FAA officials said.

FAA Administrator Allan McArdor discussed the issue of pilot experience, airline maintenance and the near-collision statistics at a meeting with reporters.

In a speech to the National Aviation Club, he said "we are witnessing a crisis in public confidence in flying" but maintained that the airways are "safe and healthy" despite some areas of concern.

McArdor told reporters that the FAA has asked the airlines "to stress the importance of not putting two pilots in the same cockpit if

they both have relatively little experience in the type of airplane they are flying."

The warning, which McArdor suggested could turn into mandatory requirements if not heeded, grew out of the Continental accident Nov. 15 at Denver's Stapleton International Airport that killed 28 of the 82 people aboard a DC-9, including both pilots.

McArdor emphasized, however, that there is no indication so far that pilot inexperience was to blame for the crash, which occurred on take-off in a snowstorm.

The accident attracted FAA concern over how airlines team their flight crews because both crewmen had relatively little experience flying DC-9s — 198 hours for the captain and 36 hours for the 26-year-old co-pilot, who was at the controls.

The FAA advised air carriers to schedule their flight crews to avoid teaming pilots with little flight time on an aircraft. Furthermore, the agency said airlines should require the senior officer to fly takeoffs in poor weather if the co-pilot has less than 100 hours of flying time on the plane.

McArdor asked the carriers to "be prudent" on the flight crew staffing issue and take voluntary action to head off regulatory action by his agency.

Meanwhile, McArdor said the FAA has directed airlines to take steps that would reduce the amount of deferred maintenance on aircraft by making repairs more promptly.

He said carriers have been practicing "gamesmanship" in connection with making prompt repairs on equipment that does not directly interfere in a plane being considered airworthy. He did not single out any airline but said the problem is industrywide.

FAA officials said they recalled no recent airline accident that can be traced to failure to repair an item on the so-called "minimum equipment list" — an item where maintenance can be deferred. Some aviation safety experts have suggested that carriers are deferring work on too many such items to keep planes aloft.

The FAA's tighter rules require such repairs to be made promptly — during the first stop where repair facilities are available in some cases and within three days in the case of less crucial items, officials said.

On another topic, McArdor said he was somewhat disturbed by the 26 percent increase in near-collision reports filed by pilots in 1987, but that the numbers seemed to have declined sharply toward the end of the year and this month.

McArdor said that while he is concerned about these incidents, the figures do not mean a degradation of safety or that travelers face an increased chance of being involved in a collision.

"I can tell you that your odds of being killed in a mid-air collision are one in 27 million, but we want the slight risk to be even less," McArdor told the National Aviation Club.

High-tech ban shrinks

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States and its allies in a move likely to please exporters, plan to cut the number of high technology products banned for sale to the Soviet Union while exploring ways to tighten controls on goods left on the list, a U.S. official said Thursday.

Discussion of the list and new controls will come at an end-of-the-month meeting in Paris of the Coordinating Committee on Export Controls (COCOM) the agency established by NATO and Japan to coordinate national efforts to keep Soviet bloc countries from getting military usable technology.

For years, exporters of computers and other high-tech products from allied countries have complained that many of the products on the embargoed lists are readily available to the Soviets from non-COCOM countries in Europe and Asia.

They also assert that the list has not kept pace with advances in military technology, resulting in lost sales of products no longer used in high tech weapons systems.

A State Department official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the COCOM meeting in Paris would dwell on what he termed "streamlining" the list of sensitive products. He said items removed from the list would be "at the lowest level of technology, leaving only those things that are significant to military use."

"That will be the ultimate test," the official said.

Mecham worries about eavesdropping

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — As he faces criminal charges and possible recall or impeachment, Gov. Evan Mecham says he has yet another worry: Someone may be eavesdropping on him with laser beams.

The Republican governor told a group of lawyers earlier this week he suspects someone might be using the sophisticated electronic devices to spy on conversations at his Capitol office and his home, two attorneys said Thursday.

"That was just one of several things that were talked about," at the breakfast table before Mecham spoke Tuesday to the Phoenix Forum Breakfast Club, attorney Sam Ciutu said.

Mecham had called a Phoenix radio station's talk show Monday and was explaining to the lawyers why he had been listening to the program, said attorney Ernest Calderon.

Mecham told the lawyers he keeps the radio on all the time to keep laser beams out, Calderon said.

Laser beams are used in one form of electronic surveillance, according to experts in the field. These lasers can "read" vibrations in window glass caused by voices. Other noise in a room, such as a radio, would make it harder to interpret conversations.

Ken Smith, Mecham's press secretary, said there is continuing concern that the governor's office is the target of some sort of electronic surveillance, but that no evidence has been uncovered.

Mecham said in Tucson on Thursday that the alleged eavesdropping occurred "many months ago" and that no attempt was made to find out who was listening in. "We just set up some precautions so it wouldn't happen again," he said.

He acknowledged talking about the alleged eavesdropping during the breakfast meeting Tuesday.

"I said, 'Well, you have to be a little careful nowadays. I've found that I not only have to be careful what I say when I speak but I have to be careful in the office because we had intercepted a laser beam and also some other listening devices, but we took care of that,'" Mecham said.

Lawmakers who read reports about Mecham's statements reacted either with disbelief or mirth. "Frankly, I'm speechless," said Sen. John McCain, a Republican who last Saturday called for Mecham's resignation.

Verification remains an issue

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan said Thursday the nuclear arms treaty he hopes to sign in Moscow this spring presents more difficult verification problems than the one covering shorter-range missiles signed in December.

Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev said they hope to sign an agreement at their Moscow summit reducing by 50 percent the number of Soviet intermediate range missiles by '50 percent. They signed the Intermediate Nuclear Forces, or INF, treaty when they met in Washington last month.

In written responses to questions submitted by the Japanese newspaper Mainichi Shimbun, Reagan said the Strategic Arms Reduction Talks, or START negotiations, underway in Geneva are a top priority of his administration.

However, he added, "I don't wish to underestimate the difficulties of this task. In particular, a START agreement presents difficult verification challenges that go well beyond those we faced in INF."

Gephardt has worst attendance record

WASHINGTON (AP) - Presidential candidate Richard Gephardt missed more votes in Congress last year than any other member of the House or Senate, a study indicates.

Rep. Gephardt, D-Mo., voted in 18 percent of 488 roll-calls in the House, according to a count published in the journal Congressional Quarterly.

The next lowest figures were for other congressmen who spent much of the year running for new offices: 28 percent for Democratic Rep. Buddy Roemer, who was elected governor of Louisiana in October, and 31 percent for Rep. Jack Kemp, R-N.Y., who is campaigning for the GOP presidential nomination.

Five members of Congress are seeking the presidency. And with the exception of Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole of Kansas, the lawmakers had lower than average voting scores in 1987.

Dole, who is responsible for his party's Senate floor leadership, voted in 95 percent of 420 Senate roll calls while Sen. Albert Gore Jr., D-Tenn., voted in 43 percent and Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., 42 percent.

Overall, senators averaged 94 percent voting, Congressional Quarterly said, and House members averaged 83 percent.

Mark Johnson, a spokesman for Gephardt, said the voting statistics did not accurately mea-

sure the congressman's performance. "The bottom line is he has made a decision to run for president and feels he has done a very good job of balancing his respon-

sibilities as congressman and presidential candidate," said Johnson.

He listed several bills that he said Gephardt helped guide through Congress, including a

controversial trade measure passed by the House and a proposal that was enacted to help provide long-term health care to the elderly through special community nursing organizations.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Starting salaries for public school teachers are averaging nearly \$19,000 this year, the American Federation of Teachers said Thursday.

The union said the average salary for all teachers has topped \$28,000 this year, up more than 6 percent from 1986-87.

It released the salary figures in a preview of its 1988 salary trends report. The figures are based on contract settlements implemented since last August.

The union said starting salaries averaged \$18,600 to \$19,000 a year, and the average salary for all teachers ranged from \$28,160 to \$28,400.

There are 2.2 million classroom teachers in public schools.

NATO will hold summit

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan will travel to Brussels in March for a summit meeting of NATO leaders and a full discussion of our common alliance goals, it was announced Thursday.

Presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said the meeting will be held on March 2-3, and that Reagan probably would arrive a day early and leave a day later in conclusion. No other stops are being planned on the trip, he said.

Fitzwater said the leaders would discuss the strength of the alliance, the Senate debate over ratification of a U.S.-Soviet treaty to eliminate intermediate-range nuclear missiles, negotiations on curbing strategic weapons and his expected summit in Moscow with Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

Fitzwater said the United States and Soviet Union both hope to have a treaty ready by the Moscow summit to cut strategic weapons, but that an agreement is not necessary for the two leaders to meet.

"We can have a (Moscow) summit without being ready to sign a treaty, Fitzwater said. "That's our target, we hope to be able to do it but if we can't, we also believe that a summit would be very helpful in making progress on START and moving it forward. We have never linked the two."

Discussing the summit in Brussels, Fitzwater said, "The president looks forward to this important opportunity to meet with his NATO colleagues for a full discussion of our common alliance goals."

The president will be accompanied by Secretary of State George Shultz and Lt. Gen. Colin Powell, his national security adviser.

Reagan will meet with many of the same leaders again in June at the annual summit of the major industrialized democracies.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The final laboratory report from President Reagan's latest physical checkup showed no recurrence of any prostate problem, the president's doctor said Thursday.

The report from White House physician Dr. John Hutton was relayed to reporters by presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater.

Fitzwater said the test, known as a prostate antigen test, "has been returned and is normal."

"That completes all the tests taken out at Bethesda during the president's examination last week," Fitzwater said.

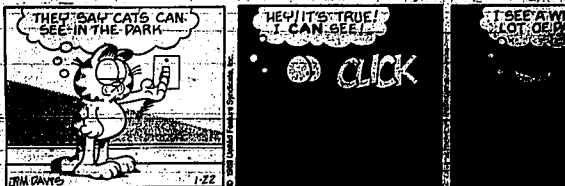

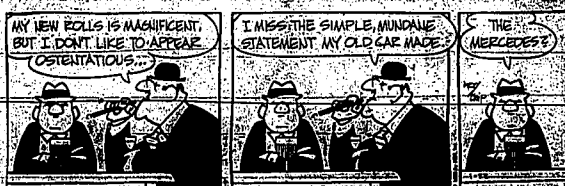

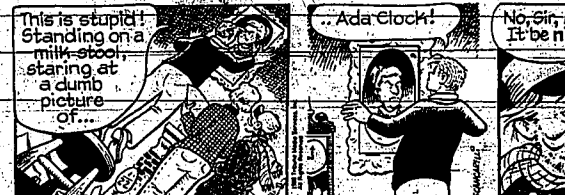

Aquino makes appointment

MANILA, Philippines (AP) - President Corazon Aquino named military chief Gen. Fidel Ramos as defense secretary Thursday to replace Rafael Iloilo, who resigned after charging that his proposals to fight the communists had been ignored.

Mrs. Aquino picked Vice Chief of Staff Lt. Gen. Renato de Villa, 62, commander of the Philippine Constabulary, to succeed Ramos. Both appointments are subject to congressional approval.

The announcement was made on national television after Iloilo, a West Point graduate and counterinsurgency expert, told reporters he was resigning because the 160,000-member armed force was too divided to be effective against the communists. He contended also that his proposals to remedy the situation had been ignored.

Iloilo, who was not considered one of the more influential Cabinet members, did not elaborate. But the 67-year-old former lieutenant general had been critical of the performance of the armed forces, which Ramos, 59, has led since Mrs. Aquino took office Feb. 25, 1986.

In an interview last year with The Associated Press, Iloilo complained that counterinsurgency operations were too brief and that the 24,000-strong rebel New People's Army had a better network of informants.

"The military can stand improvement," Iloilo told reporters Thursday. "Counterinsurgency operations are going very well but not to the level that I had expected."

Iloilo's views reflected those of disaffected middle- and junior-grade officers, who staged the bloody coup attempt which nearly toppled the Aquino government last August. Leaders of the coup attempt had demanded Ramos' ouster because of what they claimed was ineffectual leadership.

Ramos, himself a West Point graduate, has been credited with blocking about six coup attempts against the 23-month-old Aquino administration. He played a key role in the Feb. 22, 1986, military revolt which triggered the church-backed civilian uprising that drove his cousin, President Ferdinand Marcos, from power three days later.

Conference will address issue of global survival

LONDON (AP) - More than 100 religious leaders, politicians and scientists from around the globe will assemble at Oxford University in April to ponder human survival, organizers of the forum said Thursday.

Topics listed on a tentative program include terrorism and violence, pollution and conservation, family values and social ethics, education, communications and population control.

"The entire planet is in danger. The entire enterprise of life is in danger," the Very Rev. James Paris Morton, dean of the Episcopal Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York and co-chairman of the event, said at a news conference.

He said the forum will join the people who run civilizations and countries, and the people who inspire in the search for solutions to problems

that threaten destruction. Organizers said those attending will include the Dalai Lama, archbishop of Canterbury, Jewish and Islamic clergymen, members of legislatures from around the world, American astronomer Carl Sagan and Yevgeny Velikhov, vice president of the Soviet Academy of Sciences.

They will spend five days hearing speeches in open session and exchanging ideas in closed workshops.

Sgt. Paul Mital, a member of the Indian Senate and also co-chairman, said the disciplines involved are the pillars of the human race, and the delegates will be asked what they can do in a coordinated manner to resolve global problems.

Some troublesome areas will not be represented. The spokesmen said there would be no Shiite Muslim figures.

Israelis add police, ease curfews in Gaza

Jerusalem (AP) - Israel eased curfews on some Gaza Strip refugee camps so Palestinians could go to work Thursday, and assigned more police to an Israeli highway where Arabs threw firebombs at a school bus.

The bombs missed the bus and did not injure anyone.

A strike by merchants continued to paralyze Arab east Jerusalem. Riot police with truncheons patrolled the streets.

A visiting Red Cross official said there appeared to be no critical food shortages in refugee camps under curfew, which supported the Israeli position. U.N. officials who administer the camps in the occupied territories challenged his statement.

Defense Minister Yitzhak Rabin's decision to have soldiers beat protesters instead of firing on them brought this comment from the State Department: "We are disturbed by the adoption of

a policy by the government of Israel that calls for beatings as a means to restore or maintain order."

The Foreign Ministry declined comment on the American reaction.

President Hosni Mubarak of Egypt said he has a new plan for advancing Arab-Israeli peace efforts, which he is expected to discuss with President Reagan at a meeting in Washington this month.

Mubarak appears to want to calm the occupied territories.

Sakharov exploring idea of 'shadow world'

MOSCOW (AP) - Dissident Andrei D. Sakharov spent his years in exile working on how to prove the theory that a "shadow world" exists symmetrically with the known world, according to the Tass news agency.

The physicist had suggested the theory could be verified by monitoring "black holes," stars that are highly compressed, Tass reported Wednesday.

The news agency said an article Sakharov published in 1984 was the first to suggest the possibility of several dimensions.

Two years later, it said Sakharov turned his attention to a theory that black holes gradu-

ally "evaporate" emitting particles. It said Sakharov theorized that the idea of a shadow world could be checked by monitoring the particles emitted by black holes.

Sakharov helped develop the Soviet hydrogen bomb in the 1950s, but in the 1960s and 1970s spoke out for human rights in the Soviet Union. He was awarded the 1975 Nobel Peace Prize.

Authorities banished him to the closed city of Gorky in 1980 for speaking out again the Soviet military intervention in Afghanistan. He remained there until December 1986.

Australians report UFOs

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) - Police said Thursday they received two reports of unidentified flying objects, one of which looked like a huge egg cup, and that they were treating the matter seriously.

Four members of a family said the object shaped like an egg cup pursued their car along a remote stretch of outback highway Wednesday morning, plucked it from the ground and covered it in

ash, police reported.

Faye Knowles told police her speech and that of her sons changed during the encounter on the highway.

Crewmen of a tuna boat 50 miles away said a UFO buzzed their vessel a few minutes later and their voices became unintelligible.

"We were a little bit skeptical at first," said a police sergeant.

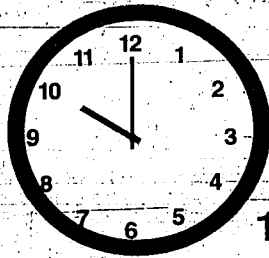

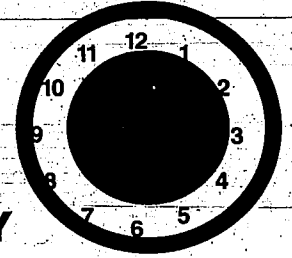

State commission grants Hutcherson parole

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho Commission for Pardons and Parole has tentatively granted parole to a former Rupert man who pleaded guilty in 1980 to first-degree murder in connection with slaying of two Pocatello men on Miller Dam.

The commission Thursday granted David Joe Hutcherson's request, and scheduled a starting date of Jan. 19, 1988, for the parole. The commission ordered Hutcherson to be on probation under intensive supervision for four to six months.

Although Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter writes letters opposing parole for similar cases, she didn't in Hutcherson's case because of conditions attached to the plea bargain resulting in Hutcherson's guilty plea to setting up a double murder.

In that deal, Hutcherson agreed to enter his plea of guilty to first degree murder before a law that lengthened the time a prisoner must spend in jail before being eligible for parole went into effect. In Hutcherson's case, he was eligi-

ble for parole in five years under the old law, and a minimum of 10 years under the new law, Baxter said.

At a parole hearing three years ago, Cassia County Prosecutor Stephen Bywater wrote a letter to the parole commission saying he and Jeff Stoker, who was Twin Falls County prosecutor when Hutcherson pleaded guilty, agreed not to oppose Hutcherson's parole. "My interpretation was that the state was bound not to oppose his parole, in spite of what I personally think of the case," Baxter said. Hutcherson, after a complex

negotiations, pleaded guilty to first-degree murder in 1980. The charges and subsequent guilty plea resulted from a double murder in 1979 on the bridge over the Snake River.

In that incident, prosecutors convinced Lincoln Blaine Harris, then living in Burley, to testify against Hutcherson and Danny Ray Jordan. In return, Harris entered a plea of guilty only to a charge of robbery, a key part of the case against Hutcherson, came from Harris' testimony. A court affidavit based largely on an interview with Harris told the story this way: Tony Fulmer of Rupert said

Steven Taylor and Paul Kennedy went to Hutcherson's house to deliver some \$20,000 worth of drugs on March 29, 1979.

After Hutcherson gave the two men barbiturates and showed a wash cloth in their mouths, Harris and Jordan drove the two men to Miller Dam in a 1977 Thunderbird. At the bridge, Jordan told Harris they were going to have to kill the two people in the truck. While the two men Taylor and Kennedy stood on the bridge, Harris cuffed his eyes. He heard a shot from Jordan, followed by a scream.

Eyes still closed, Harris held his gun at arms length and fired another shot. Then, Harris heard another shot and a scream.

The two threw their guns in the river and drove to the Oakley gravel pit. When they arrived, Hutcherson asked "did you shoot them? Are you sure they are dead?" Jordan said yes.

Jordan poured gasoline on the car and Hutcherson torched it. The three men left the scene and split up. See PAROLE on Page B3

AIDS bill receives favorable reception

BOISE — Rep. Russ Newcomb, R-Twin Falls, introduced the first part of his AIDS legislation in the Senate Health and Welfare Committee Thursday, and received favorable bipartisan support.

The committee voted to print Newcomb's four bills, and Chairman Denton Darrington, R-Declo, said the bills will come up for a hearing probably within 10 days.

Newcomb said the other four proposals will be introduced in the House Health and Welfare Committee next Tuesday.

Newcomb, a surgeon, told the Senate committee that he developed the AIDS package with five goals in mind: to inhibit the spread of the disease; reassure the public that the blood and organ supply was safe; develop an information base to track the disease; prevent accidental exposure to emergency personnel; and reduce liability to the state through the prison system.

"I tried to be as medically objective as possible with these bills," Newcomb said. The four proposals introduced in the Senate deal with blood and organ donors and providing education and testing in Idaho's prisons.



One bill would require all organ donors, including blood donors, be tested for HIV antibody. Currently, all blood is being tested.

A companion measure would require testing and certification of all medical facilities that provide blood and harvest organs.

Newcomb said 3 percent of the 47,436 confirmed AIDS cases contracted the disease through transfusions and tissue transplant.

A third measure would force the State Board of Corrections to provide educational and medical services to inmates exposed to AIDS. It would also provide general educational information to inmates about the disease.

Newcomb said he wanted to set a standard of care for the prisons to follow, and "shift the liability from the state to the inmate" if that person continues unsafe practices.

He was questioned about the cost of the programs, and said the state already is spending millions on testing and testing in Idaho's prisons. See AIDS on Page B3

Gooding couple faces charges of conspiracy

GOODING — A Gooding couple has been charged with conspiring to embezzle money in connection with the apparent theft of \$204,709 from Basterrechea Distributing Co. Lester and Sonia Branch are awaiting court appearances on grand theft charges for allegedly conspiring to divert Basterrechea funds into a bank account for a "Wego Systems." The charges were brought by County Prosecutor Lynn Nelson in Gooding 5th District Magistrate Court.

Court records show Sonia Branch was a bookkeeper at the Gooding trucking firm from August 1986 through October 1987. The complaint, filed Feb. 8, alleges that she set up the Jerome bank account and acquired a post office box at the Gooding post office in the name of

Wego Systems and that she and her husband were the only persons who could write checks on the Wego account.

The criminal complaint claims Sonia wrote 74 checks to Wego from Basterrechea business accounts from August 1986 through November 1987, and deposited them in the account that only she and her husband had access to. The checks totaled \$204,709, according to the complaint.

Louie Basterrechea, owner of the trucking firm, is quoted in supporting court documents as saying that none of the checks were authorized and none were used to pay legitimate debts owed by his company.

The complaint further alleges that the Branch couple forged at least one of the two signatures on each check. See CONSPIRACY on Page B2

Holmes, 38, pursues title of Tyson, 21

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. — Mike Tyson, the youngest heavyweight champion in history, and Larry Holmes, the oldest, will fight tonight at the Convention Center.

Holmes, 38-year-old grandfather, who announced his retirement Nov. 6, 1986, would succeed Jersey Joe Walcott as the oldest champion.

Walcott was 37 when he knocked out Ezzard Charles in the seventh round July 18, 1951.

"They'll say I'm too old; Holmes up, can't fight anymore," Walsh said of his decision to come out of retirement.

Upon leaving the official weigh-in Thursday, Holmes said, "I'll win. I'll fool everybody."

"I don't make predictions, but I can assure you a victory," the 21-year-old Tyson said.

Tyson is an overwhelming favorite to win the scheduled 12-round fight at the 16,000-seat Convention Center. It will be televised by HBO at about 8:27 p.m. MST.

"I believe I'm the best fighter in the world," said Tyson. "I believe he had his era. I believe nobody in the world can beat me."

"He's made for me," Holmes said.

"Face fighters are made for me. I can punch going back. Boxers give me trouble."

"A face fighter is one who leaves

himself open while attacking. Tyson is an attacker, and that is an important part of his defense. He keeps an opponent busy defending himself.

The champion, who weighed in at 215 1/2 pounds Thursday, possesses excellent quickness and handspeed.

Holmes, who weighed 225 1/2, had a great left jab, but in his last several fights it lacked its old snap and accuracy. The bounce was gone from his legs.

"Larry doesn't have the physical capabilities at this stage of his career," said Eddie Futch, who trained Holmes for 12 title fights.

Holmes feels his 21-month layoff — to have the second-loss overturned and he remains bitter about both defeats.

The former champion has trained in seclusion for several weeks at his hometown of Easton, Pa. He didn't arrive at Atlantic City until Wednesday afternoon.

Toneri takes step to open art gallery

KETCHUM — With 19 art galleries in Ketchum alone, who would think of opening another?

Five galleries have opened their doors for business here in the past two months, an indication that interest in the arts is flourishing in this resort community.

Twenty-year resident and well-known artist, Lynn Toneri, is among those who have taken the step to invest their time and money

in the business of running a gallery. Toneri does not see the large number of galleries as a hindrance to her success, but rather as a furtherance — one which she gladly acknowledges and supports.

"The more art galleries in town, the better it is for art sales," Toneri says, explaining it creates interest in art of all kinds as well as generates business for everyone.

'Raw' may be only clean word in movie

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing in the Twin Falls area. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

EDDIE MURPHY RAW (R) "Raw" may be the only three-letter word in the Twin Falls area's recent film in which Eddie Murphy hits what might be a Guinness record for non-stop, pointless scatology. It is as if he is in a speed-swearing contest with Richard Belzer. But Murphy, unlike Richard Belzer, uses his wit on the humanity beneath the jive. His technique is great, but his material here is squalid — mostly street wisdom on managing women. And the filming, by "Tally Ho" Shulless, is a lawncare commercial.

FOR KEEPS (PG) Not even Molly Ringwald's customary glow and bedrock believability make a smidgen of difference in this film. Muddled it is and muddled it remains. While the twin makers seem willing to move a little off the beaten track on their subject of teen-age pregnancy, the tone is akimbo — genuinely funny and insightful one minute; slagstick, sitcomish and mawkish the next. Peter Sarsgaard's charisma, while still intact, is too much for co-star Randall Batinkoff, a gangling newcomer. Credit "For Keeps" with one innovation, however. It's the first time within memory that a high school senior (Ringwald) has lured her man (Batinkoff) with a red Mustang — and a box of Pampers.

PLANES, TRAINS AND AUTOMOBILES (R) Writer-director John Hughes has made his "rehabilitation" most evident experiences, but the movie's humor comes from Steve Martin, fastidious as a Siamese cat, trying to get away from curtain-ring salesman John Candy, who is actually the more resourceful character. The film is schizoid. It is best when Hughes turns the screen over to these two masters of physical humor, who are sometimes "priceless" but not often enough to save the great patches based on the humor of abuse. The other parts of the film leave you detached and even mildly offended.

RETURN OF THE LIVING DEAD, PART II (R) Intentionally hilarious horror pictures about a zombie invasion of typical Southern California community. Written and directed by Ken Wiederhorn with considerable artistry and much humor. With Michael Kenworthy, James Karen, Thom Matthews, Dana Ashbrook.

THREE MEN AND A CRADLE (PG) What we have here is an Americanization of Coline Serreau's "Three Men and a Cradle." Serreau's movie was fairly frothy, and this one is frothier still. The people who made it carry over much of the original's weightless, sweet-tempered humor. Any movie in which Steve Guttenberg plays the sensitive guy would seem to be in big, big trouble; it is like casting Fred MacMurray as a heartbroken poet. But director Leonard Nimoy has the knack for relationships the writers seem to lack. And Tom Salkok seems here to find his true movie meter; the relaxed bachelor camaraderie here almost echoes the tongue-in-cheek ambience on "Magnum P.I."

THROW MAMA FROM THE TRAIN (PG-13) Danny DeVito's first directorial effort has the same rubicund explosiveness he puts into his performances. It is a comic version of Hitchcock's "Strangers on a Train" in which a hapless writing student (DeVito) — tormented by the world's meanest mother — tries to swap murders with his teacher (Billy Crystal). A thin idea, but the dialogue is often clever, and DeVito — abetted by "Blood Simple" cameraman Barry Sonnenfeld — gives the movie a lot of overripe, mock-film noir style. It is fun to watch.

WALL STREET (R) Here is a film with the slickest surface possible, a brave, simplistic show of movie-making razzle-dazzle. It is fun for a while — sliding along director Oliver Stone's high-tech primer of life in the bull stock market — but eventually Stone's moralizing and Charlie Sheen's lack of emotional connection with the audience turns the film into something tinnily, thin and close to moral bankruptcy. As such, we can be indecently grateful for Michael Douglas' wondrously acting turn as the super-nasty corporate raider Gordon Gekko.

Williams lights a fire under 'Vietnam'

HOLLYWOOD — There is such a wild-disparity between the overall quality of "Good Morning, Vietnam" and Robin Williams' lead performance; they almost seem to be operating in different reality zones, parallel worlds. The film itself — a dramatic comedy based on the 1965 Saigon gig of irreverent Armed Forces disc jockey Adrian Cronauer — is good-hearted but shallow. It is a piece of programmed irreverence, photogenic tropic, prefab compassion.

But Williams, as Cronauer, is so blazingly brilliant he detonates the center, exploding it in berserk blasts of electronic-age surrealism. When he does Cronauer's anarchic broadcasts — screeching "Goo-ood-mornin'—Vietnam!" — and launches into bursts of glibly, wildfire free association, punctuated with Motown and '60s rock — he is transformed. Suddenly, he is a human cable network, sipping through a hundred channels, a knife slicing through the molasses of the movie's soggy comedy. Williams at the mike is like a man possessed, purified, liberated. Startling chains of ideas and wild leaps of imagery pour out of him: he is like a Crazy Eddie of showbiz dad.

It is not surprising to learn that director Barry Levinson gave Williams his head and let him ad-lib on camera. Sprung loose, he will vault from a put-down of Fredy and the Dreamers to a crazed mishmash of devil worship. "The Twilight Zone," "The Wizard of Oz" and Hanoi Hannah: four chords weaving in frenzied counterpoint.

This energy carries over into his other scenes. While the rest of the actors — even the best, like Forest Whitaker as sweet, shambling sickle Garlick and Noble Willingham as a crusty, protective general — tend to get bogged down in one-note characters, Williams often triumphs over weak scenes by sheer timing. He snaps the lines and tweaks their tips with an offhand bravado. Almost single-handedly, he makes "Good Morning, Vietnam" special. Without him, it might be failed satire, clinging to the obvious like a drowning man to an anvil. The story seems to be in Levinson's special vein — a male-bonding comedy with socio-historical detail — and he and his regular cameraman, Peter Seav, give it a good, clear look: sunny, lighthearted and sharp, like a French or Italian quasi-documentary political thrill. But Levinson did not write this script and the characters rarely develop an inch beyond our first

view of them: None of the scenes, except for Williams' monologues, have the wit and bite of "Diner" or "The Man" — even the ones you'd expect to be similar, like the deejay-bulldozers who, presenting their disc jockies, censoring the news and driving their audiences crazy with playlists of Mantovani and Lawrence Welk. Apparently, Southeast Asia did not need either Mahatma Gandhi or Gen. Patton; it needed Wolfman Jack.

'Platoon' high on rental list before issue

HOLLYWOOD — When you go to your local store "rent" HBO's "Platoon" — available Friday because of the out-of-court settlement between HBO and Yestron last weekend — you may face two aggravations.

First of all, you might not be able to find it.

"Stores will probably be out of rental copies," said Frank O'Connell, HBO Video's chief executive office. "People may have that problem next week, in two weeks and in three weeks. The demand is much stronger than the supply. We hope to see that."

If you can find a rental cassette, however, another problem may surface: "There'll be a higher price for this movie in some places," O'Connell said.

Both problems are associated with the film's \$99.95 price tag, which is \$10 higher than the usual major-movie price. Unwilling to pay the extra money, retailers have not purchased as many copies.

O'Connell maintained that HBO went all-out to convince store owners to consider the profit, not the size of the investment: "Each cassette can rent a minimum of 100 times. That's about \$220 at the average rental price; the cost to the distributor is \$70 per cassette. That's a three-fold return on the investment."

To HBO's delight, some retailers are responding to the anticipated demand by ordering more copies. Initially, 351,000 copies were shipped to stores and distributors.

"We've made 15,000 additional copies and we'll probably wind up making at least 25,000 more," O'Connell said. "We've been told that over half the distributors have increased their orders."

Impromptu concert sparks rock awards

NEW YORK — It was a moment worthy of the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame archives — and that is probably where it will go.

Shortly after being inducted into the Hall of Fame, Bob Dylan, a black tuxedo jacket, stepped to the microphone in the Grand Ballroom of the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel for a spirited rendition of "Like a Rolling Stone," backed on the chorus by Mick Jagger, Bruce Springsteen and the Supreme Moods. Behind them stood an all-star band headed by a guitar army of John Fogerty,

As the musicians repeated the song's key phrase, "how does it feel," the audience roared and it seemed like no one on stage wanted this historic moment to end.

When Dylan finally brought the number to a close, host Paul Shaffer, musical director of David Letterman's TV show, walked over to the microphone to bid the audience good night. How could he ask

anyone to follow that? But several of the more than a dozen musicians on stage were ready for more.

Excited members of the audience could leave their chairs, the band went into a familiar Rolling Stones refrain. The crowd shrieked its approval as Jagger suddenly took off his jacket and began prancing across the stage, singing "I Can't Get No Satisfaction."

It is moments like these that have made the Hall of Fame induc-

tion ceremony the industry's most spectacular annual event — and it is a shame that the dinners are only seen by the estimated 700 musicians and industry executives in the ballroom.

But Bob Altshuler, vice president of press and public affairs for CBS Records and a member of the induction dinner committee, said the Hall of Fame board of directors has ruled out turning the dinner into a TV special for fear of violating the integrity of the ceremony.

She says she has been looking for the "just-right" place, a "good spot" in Ketchum to open a permanent gallery. When an opening came at the building which used to house an ice cream shop, Toni jumped at the chance.

Other artists and gallery owners are also getting on the bandwagon. Joseph Kinnebrew, a sculptor and painter from Whitty Island, Wash., recently opened a gallery called "Ojo." Gallery operator JoEllen Collins says Kinnebrew located

in the Sun Valley area because "the art scene is so good here."

This can be readily seen as hundreds of people turn out for each new gallery opening. It has become a social event which marks on their calendars.

With each opening, members of the Sun Valley Ketchum Gallery Association offer a three-hour opening for gallery-hoppers. Following an outlined map for this walking tour, the public gets a chance to meet the featured artist and view his work with the wine and champagne flowing.

While Ketchum and Sun Valley do not have the reputation of being one of the art capitals of the world, the growing number of galleries and the high quality of artwork which is regularly featured, are creating a reputation which adds to the overall quality of one's visit to the area.

Sun Valley Ketchum Chamber of Commerce director Wendy Queter says historically people have not come to the area specifically to see a particular art exhibit. The exhibit of the late John Lennon's art at the Friesen Gallery of Fine Art is an exception to that, however. Gallery

owner Andria Friesen and Jaquet both say they have received comments and inquiries about the Lennon exhibit indicating people were coming to Sun Valley this month just because the exhibit is here.

Ann Devereaux Puchner, writing in The Valley Magazine's summer 1987 edition, estimated that sales figures over the past three years indicates the gallery association has generated more than \$1 million in revenues. Members of the gallery association include Anne Reed Gallery, David R. Stoeklein Gallery, Friesen Gallery of Fine Art, Gail Severn Gallery, Kneeland Gallery, River Run Gallery, Steve Snyder Photographs Gallery, Stinson Gallery, Sun Valley Center Gallery and the Valley Artist Guild.

New to the area is the Clocktower Gallery, Davies-Reid Tribal Arts, Fine Art of the American West, Sun Valley Art Gallery, Turner Art Gallery, Trails West Gallery and T. F. Carns Gallery in Hailey. Ketchum also is the home of Canyonside Gallery, a poster gallery called Galerie 2000, Gallery 601, and the Larry B. Milligan Gallery.

True drama of southern bigotry in 'The Murder of Mary Phagan'

By EVAN LEVINE

In 1913, Mary Phagan, a 13-year-old girl who worked in an Atlanta pencil factory was found dead in the factory basement. Leo Frank, the Jewish factory manager from Brooklyn, was accused of her murder. He was subsequently sentenced to be hanged for the crime, spurred on by angry Southerners using Frank's religion and Northern background as fuel.

In a dramatic twist, Frank's sentence was commuted — the night before his execution had been scheduled — by Governor John M. Slaton, who had become increasingly skeptical about Frank's guilt. And in an even more dramatic move, the citizens of Atlanta took Frank's fate into their own hands. NBC presents Leo Frank's story in the miniseries "The Murder of Mary Phagan," airing Sunday, Jan. 24 and Tuesday, Jan. 26. Jack Lemmon makes a rare television appearance as Gov. John M. Slaton, and Peter Gallagher, who won a Tony Award for his performance in "Long Day's Journey Into Night" (in which he co-starred with Lemmon) plays Leo Frank. Robert Prosky, Richard Jordan, Kathryn Walker and Paul Dooley co-star.

"This was one of the most compelling stories I'd ever read," says the 32-year-old Gallagher. "I went after the role with guns blazing." But Gallagher came close to losing out on it because of his Irish features. "I knew that they wanted someone Jewish looking, but I thought it would be a bitter irony if there was any prejudice involved in the casting, since the story is about prejudice and its devastating effects," he explains.

Gallagher can't fully explain why he was so drawn to the role. "Frank certainly wasn't extraordinary in any way," says Gallagher. "He was a serious businessman who was dedicated to his wife. But the script and the background material were so fascinating to read, and the actors, many of whom I'd worked with on the stage, were so wonderful, I couldn't dream up a better cast. The whole thing was very acting. I loved doing it, because

everyone was so involved. There was so much life going on in everyone's eyes."

The background material Gallagher referred to for his research included books about the case, newspaper accounts from various papers, and Frank's personal letters. "I think what surprised me the most was how silent Leo was throughout the whole ordeal," Gallagher says. "He had unerring faith

in the judicial system, and he never lost that.

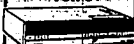

Q: What exactly is the story about veteran actress Olivia de Havilland making a fool of herself all over Europe by chasing a much younger man? — Y.T.

A: Olivia lives in splendid calm in Paris. She's adamantly single since her divorce from European businessman Pierre Galante. The couple's daughter, Gisele, 31, is a glamorous magazine writer who's making headlines of her own right now all over Europe. A: Steve? For sure. Recently, Allen was invited to appear at a book signing that took place in a Manhattan shop specializing in literature for the junior set. When introduced to the tots and their parents, Allen wryly noted the rather meager response the announcement of his name had engendered. He quipped, "A performer's ego suffers when the applause after his introduction subsides before he even makes it to the podium!"

Q: Isn't Sammy Davis Jr. much older than he claims and is very sick? — I.P.

A: Davis, 62, is the younger member of the old-line Hollywood "rat pack," which includes Frank Sinatra and Dean Martin, both at least eight years Sammy's senior. Recently, Davis entered a Hollywood hospital for hip surgery. When I asked him how he felt, he replied: "Well, outside of being 62 and going into the hospital for surgery, I feel fine."

Q: Can you detect any problems brewing in the marriage between Timothy Hutton and Debra Winger? — Y.L.

A: Hutton and Winger have been married for two years. Six months ago they had their first child, a son, Noah. Both continue to be highly prized Hollywood performers. In short, it appears the couple has it all. An advantage is that both Hutton and Winger are intensely private.

Intimate viewing of a Nielsen-ratings family

"They're here," says the little girl looking into the family television set in the movie "Poltergeist."

"Who were you talking about?" asks her mother.

"The TV people," replies the girl.

"The TV people" visited Brian Fischer's home in Olney, Md., many times between January 1983 and May 1987. These TV people didn't terrorize the Fischer family like the ones in Steven Spielberg's 1982 horror flick. But they were there, nonetheless — in their house, in their television sets, in their basement.

They knew which television programs the Fischers watched and when they watched them. They knew which sets were turned on and which weren't. They knew when the Fischer parents unplugged the sets in the children's bedrooms. In fact, they knew a lot about the Fischers. Each night for more than four years, they whirred and clicked inside the Fischers' television sets, quietly sending information about the family's television viewing habits to a larger creature far away.

These particular "TV people" were unobtrusive and for the most part invisible, but the gray boxes attached to the back of their television sets, the long-distance telephone calls and the occasional in-person visits reminded the Fischers that they were sharing their home with the A.C. Nielsen Co.

Nielsen had picked the Fischer household, like 1,500 other American households at the time, at random to participate in an electronic survey that determines television viewership. Households like the Fischers' had audimeters (audience meters) attached to their televisions, recording when each set was on and what channel was tuned. Members of another group of households were asked to record their viewing choices in a diary. This fall, the meter-diary system, was supplanted by a people-meter system. The people meter combines a meter with a push-button device that enables members of the household to tell the machine who is watching TV.

In both systems, the surveyed households represent the country's 88.6 million TV households. By compiling weekly viewing preferences

Nielsen (and other rating services in the market) determine what percentage of TV households are tuned to a particular show (this is the show's rating) and what portion of the sets-in-use are dialed in to that show (the share of the viewing audience). The system helps networks and advertisers determine what shows are hits and which are flops and how much a given show can command from advertisers.

On Thursday evenings at 8, for instance, about one-third of the TV households in the country are tuned to "The Cosby Show" (its rating) and nearly one-half of the TVs that are turned on at the time are dialed in to "Cosby" (its share).

Unlike the harassed suburban family in "Poltergeist," they hadn't moved out of their Olney house because of the "TV people," but like the folks in the movie, their first encounter with the Nielsen Co. was a bit alarming. A rapist had been terrorizing the Aspen Hill, Md., area for 18 months, so Betty Fischer was cautious when a man showed up at their door in the fall of 1982, saying he was a representative of the Nielsen Co.

"They didn't send a letter or anything at first. The guy just showed up," she said, "I didn't even want to open the door for him."

Betty told the man that they weren't interested, but the Nielsen representative didn't give up. "He kept saying, 'But you don't understand. You've been selected to be a Nielsen family.' He was persistent."

When the man refused to accept no for an answer, Betty called her husband at the liquor store in the District of Columbia that he owns with his brother Robert. He was similarly suspicious.

"We've always heard about the Nielsens, but that was something that you always just heard about," Brian Fischer said. "I told her, 'Don't let him in.'"

After the man left, Fischer called the A.C. Nielsen Co. headquarters in Florida to check his visitors' story. The company assured him that the representative was legitimate and that their house had been

chosen randomly according to their geographic location to participate in the Nielsen metered surveys.

"Betty and I both work (she is a patient-account representative for three surgeons), and at the time, we had 2½ children, so to speak. We were exactly what every TV station was trying to appeal to. They told us we were the perfect Nielsen family: station wagon ... a lot of TVs."

As their father related the Nielsen experience, the Fischer boys grew restless. With his permission, they bounded off into the next room and settled down in front of — naturally — the TV. Somewhere in the house, coffee was brewing; the telephone rang sporadically and a dog barked somewhere in the neighborhood. A freeze-frame of the typical American family.

But Nielsen claims that it picks households and not families. The households are chosen on geographic location rather than demographic makeup.

"They wanted the house. It could have been an elderly man and wife in the house. It was our particular house that they wanted," explained Fischer.

The Nielsen representative came by again, but the Fischers balked when he told them that a central monitoring unit would be put in their basement and that all of their television sets, their VCR and their video game would be hooked up to meters. Only a few years earlier, when the family had moved into their Olney home, Brian Fischer had spent a lot of money wiring the house for television antennas.

"I was nervous because I had just invested in a Sony, just like that one," he said, indicating the mammoth color set his children were watching at their grandparents' house. "At the time it was the newest thing they'd come out with. I said, 'No, I've got to turn it down. ... Thank you for choosing us, but I've got to say no.'"

The company offered to hide the wires behind the walls and assured him that Nielsen would pay for any damages incurred during installation. "Whatever we wanted," said Fischer. "They were professional ... nice ... accommodating."

The Fischers were offered several small benefits as well. The company

would pay for half of any TV repair bills during their tenure as a Nielsen family, contribute \$25 toward the purchase of any new television sets, and give the family \$5 a month for each television set they owned. The Fischers had six.

But for Brian Fischer, the biggest benefit was knowing that his family statistically represented about 52,000 other American households and that their viewing habits might be influential in determining what the rest of the nation's viewers watch. A rather weighty privilege.

"When we first started," he said, "Brad was 3, and I was thinking, 'The Nielsens are going to come out and the number-one show is going to be Sesame Street.' And the number-two show is professional wrestling! My boys like to watch wrestling."

He smiled at the recollection, but quickly added that he didn't think they alone could make or break a show. "I don't think Betty and I alone could do it. ... But if two or three of us (Nielsen families) got together and said, 'Hey, let's watch

ces might try to persuade the families to watch certain shows. To head off such sabotage, the company asks participating families to maintain anonymity.

"In fact, I had to get permission to do this (interview) because I had to sign (an agreement) that I wouldn't tell anyone for a year after that we were a Nielsen family. ... I called the Nielsen people and they said it was fine because they weren't using the house anymore."

Not that the temptation to tell friends and relatives about their "secret" house guest was overwhelming, but on a trip to California one year, Brian felt the urge to reveal their status as a Nielsen participant. The family visited Hollywood—where thousands of other TV people reside. These TV people can be found out in the open, in the posh restaurants, by palm-bordered pools, and in the corridors and offices of the production studios. They are the producers, writers, executives and the stars themselves. And when the Fischers came into contact with these particular TV people, the impulse to shed "Nielsen family" was a little stronger than it was back in suburban Maryland.

With Johnny Carson," Brian Fischer admitted, "I wanted to say 'Johnny! Nielsen here! We help you!'" He wanted to do the same thing when his family was denied, a request to visit the set of one of Betty's favorite daytime dramas. "I wanted to say, 'But we're a Nielsen family! ... We make you what you are! We represent a lot of people! ... I'll make sure we never watch that show again!'"

Back in Olney, months of Nielsen participation turned into years and the novelty of being a Nielsen household wore off. Fischer found himself checking the Nielsen ratings to compare his family's viewing habits with national statistics. But the rest of the family was disinterested. Monthly service checks had become routine, and their companions on the back of their TVs became unnoticeable. Sometimes, though, the Nielsen Co. would surprise the Fischers with its Orwellian vigilance.

Once, Betty Fischer recalled, "We took the TVs out of the children's rooms as punishment for not doing their homework. ... A day later the phone would ring. It would be them. They knew that we took them

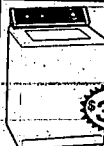

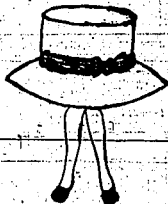

'Cheers' cheerfully takes long time for production of weekly episodes

HOLLYWOOD — NBC's "Cheers" keeps getting more and more successful. But producing the show just gets more and more difficult.

Not "more difficult" as in "not any fun." The three executive producers of "Cheers" — brothers Glen and Les Charles and their partner, James Burrows — insist that making the series, which consistently places in the top five in the Nielsen ratings, is definitely fun.

But the trio say that somehow, the witty comedy about the quirky personalities in a Boston bar — now in its sixth season on NBC — just never evolved into the efficient, streamlined, well-oiled production machine one might expect of a show that has lasted so many years, picking up 13 Emmys, including several for best comedy series, along the way.

Ted Danson, who stars as randy bartender Sam Malone, was only half joking when he offered this assessment of the show's progress in a recent telephone conversation: "It takes longer, our concentration is poor, and it's a frightening thing."

Just down the road on the Paramount lot where "Cheers" is filmed, another long-running NBC comedy, "Family Ties," consistently completes its taping sessions in approximately 90 minutes. The filming of "Cheers" before a studio audience sometimes drags on for three hours or more.

"It just doesn't seem to get any shorter," a bemused Glen Charles, 44, said in a recent interview at the "Cheers" production offices. "After the audience goes home, we're still shooting till 1 in the morning."

Although none of them can figure out why they have not managed to shorten the process over the years, one thing makes it easier: a loyal following. Unlike the early studio audiences, when the show was new and struggling in the ratings, today's crowds will stay for the duration, just to be in the studio with "Cheers."

The three producers, all veterans of MTM Enterprises and "Taxi," are

also all similarly low-key, mild-mannered and self-deprecating ("We're sorry we're boring," Glen Charles said cheerfully following an interview). And they give an extremely modest reason for the show getting on the air and remaining on the schedule in the first place:

When "Cheers" made its debut in the fall of 1982, the ratings were low. But back then, NBC, now the No. 1 network, was in third place — and since it was on the bottom, it had nothing to lose by taking chances.

"They kept us on because they were committed to quality shows, and also because they didn't have much of anything else," Glen Charles acknowledged. "And because of the atmosphere, we were pretty much left alone to do the show we wanted to do."

What the team wanted to do was a romantic comedy at a time when comedy was considered dead by the networks — the most popular genre in the early 1980s was the prime-time soap opera. "Cheers" also broke the mold of the popular 1970s comedies such as "All in the Family," which opted for topical, satirical humor rather than tongue-in-cheek romance. At the time, nobody knew for sure if the television audience was ripe for something different.

"With 'Cheers,' it was the kind of show that was an acquired taste for the NBC audience," said NBC Entertainment President Brandon Tartikoff, whom the three producers credit with helping to keep the show afloat.

"We did not have a lot of urban, sophisticated comedy (in 1982); it's not like we could put this show on after 'Different Strokes,'" Tartikoff said. "We knew we had to tough it out; our hope was that over time we would get the people who were not watching NBC, as well as the people who were not watching network television, period."

The strategy worked. Of course, the producers acknowledge that "Cheers" has benefited over the last several years from its Thursday night-time slot in the golden "what's-on-after-Gosby" lineup. But they also credit their success to the show's quality writing and the fact

that they happened to offer a dose of romantic comedy to an audience which had been starved for it. "I guess by the early '80s, people were ready for a little glamour and romance," said Les Charles, 39.

Not only did "Cheers" come along at the right time historically, Burrows gloated, but it also inspired some sincere and flustering TV imitations later down the line. Although the producers of "Moonlighting" might tell a different story, Burrows insists that "Cheers" bantering lovers, Sam and the hyper-intellectual waitress, Diane, enjoyed another incarnation on ABC's sophisticated, quasi-comic detective series. "Moonlighting's David and Maddie are really Sam and Diane," he said.

The three producers believe that "Cheers" has been able to avoid wearing out its welcome because they have relied on character humor rather than gags, and the characters they created are people the audience likes to have visit their living rooms. "We don't do hard-and-fast jokes. They are not jokes that would necessarily be funny if you told them on the street, but they're funny when the character says them," Glen Charles said.

The producers noted that this season's addition of a new character — the bar's new manager, Rebecca Howe, played by Kirstie Alley — has given the show's writers another avenue for fresh character humor.

But, the producers add, emphasis on character does not mean they de-emphasize humor. Though the jokes come from character, they had better be funny. Les Charles bluntly sums up TV's current, critically acclaimed crop of comedy-drama hybrids, the "dramedies" — such as CBS' "Frank's Place" and ABC's "Hooperman" — as "comedies that aren't funny."

The way they gauge how funny the show is, is the reaction of the studio audience — which, like Norm and Cliff, will always be a fixture at "Cheers." "If you get rid of the audience, you go tend to become Larry about your jokes," said Glen Charles. "Added to Burrows' laughter is the communal thing."

'Cheers' cheerfully takes long time for production of weekly episodes

HOLLYWOOD — NBC's "Cheers" keeps getting more and more successful. But producing the show just gets more and more difficult.

Not "more difficult" as in "not any fun." The three executive producers of "Cheers" — brothers Glen and Les Charles and their partner, James Burrows — insist that making the series, which consistently places in the top five in the Nielsen ratings, is definitely fun.

But the trio say that somehow, the witty comedy about the quirky personalities in a Boston bar — now in its sixth season on NBC — just never evolved into the efficient, streamlined, well-oiled production machine one might expect of a show that has lasted so many years, picking up 13 Emmys, including several for best comedy series, along the way.

Ted Danson, who stars as randy bartender Sam Malone, was only half joking when he offered this assessment of the show's progress in a recent telephone conversation: "It takes longer, our concentration is poor, and it's a frightening thing."

Just down the road on the Paramount lot where "Cheers" is filmed, another long-running NBC comedy, "Family Ties," consistently completes its taping sessions in approximately 90 minutes. The filming of "Cheers" before a studio audience sometimes drags on for three hours or more.

"It just doesn't seem to get any shorter," a bemused Glen Charles, 44, said in a recent interview at the "Cheers" production offices. "After the audience goes home, we're still shooting till 1 in the morning."

Although none of them can figure out why they have not managed to shorten the process over the years, one thing makes it easier: a loyal following. ...people who have the luxury of keeping their public and off-camera lives separate. Unlike the Ponn-Madonna union, this one seems in for the long haul.

Q: Among the many fascinating ingredients of "Wall Street," the expose of high-level shenanigans in the financial community, is the odd fact that Martin Sheen and Charlie Sheen, father and son in real life, carry over their family relationships onto the screen. Is this brand of casting a movie first? — P.G.

A: It's as old as the Hollywood hills. Among the many, many movies in which this brand of celluloid nepotism occurs is the current flick, "The Wild Pair," with Beau Bridges and his pop, Lloyd. Marlene Dietrich and her younger daughter, Maria Sieber (now Maria Riva), appeared together way back in "The Scarlet Empress," and little Liza Minnelli had a cameo as Judy Garland's daughter in the musical, "In the Good Old Summertime." Mia Farrow and mom Maureen O'Sullivan acted together in Woody Allen's "Hannah and Her Sisters." And the great John Huston directed his dad, Walter, in "The Treasure of the Sierra Madre"; and his daughter, Anjelica, in his final masterpiece, "The Dead."

Q: Isn't it true that actress Katharine Helmond, who co-stars on TV's "Who's the Boss?" is a bit of a dingbat? — A.R.

A: Anything but. Helmond, who's 55, is one successful actress, married for the last 25 years to actor David Christian. Helmond has

homes in four places, loves to have "lovely little dinners" with friends and fantasizes about playing a role in "Hamlet" on the London stage. She is, in short, a smarty. When people first meet her, Helmond tells me, "they're surprised that I'm rather reserved and quite organized." They expect Gracie Allen.

Q: Many reviewers have characterized the plot of "Broadcast News" as a variation on the triangle formula. As a budding scriptwriter, I was wondering how this description sits with James Brooks, who wrote the screenplay. — D.O.

A: It sits perfectly fine. Brooks also produced and directed this extraordinary film about the world of TV correspondents, which stars William Hurt, Albert Brooks and Holly Hunter. Brooks told me, "I hoped that I could create a triangle where no character is less significant than the other, thus maintaining a personal balance for each without choosing a hero. The only way I could construct such a triangle was to write it convincingly, not merely employ it as a plot device. By the way," Brooks amplifies, "this is essentially a romantic triangle. Yet, the protagonists' ambitious lives puts another corner on it — and that corner is their profession itself."

Q: How is Katharine Hepburn to work with? I have often heard she's a very demanding prima donna on the set. — V.C.

A: Let's just say Hepburn is exacting. While filming her latest project, a TV film titled "Guest Appearance," the 78-year-old ac-

trix lived up to her billing. She demanded — and got — some \$450,000 worth of antiques to decorate the set in order to "fit into" her part. She portrays a successful novelist who moves in with a Long Island couple. The all-too-human producer of the TV show complained to me that Hepburn's pricey request was "probably the biggest item in our budget" — outside of Hepburn's salary, of course.

Q: What's become of Anthony Delon, the son of French heart-throb Alain Delon? Is he still dating Princess Stephanie of Monaco? — D.S.

A: The younger Delon, 23, admits he may be a sex symbol in France — he's as good looking as his father — but "definitely not a playboy." Romantically, he's been linked with French actress Valerie Kaprisky. It's Delon's longest romance to date. After misfiring as a leatherwear designer, Delon hit upon his father's profession — acting. He also professes to being very serious about career and family; intending to have three children.

'Knots Landing' welcomes new black family

HOLLYWOOD — A new family has come to "Knots Landing." And the creative staff of CBS' long-running prime-time soap wants to make sure their arrival is significant by making sure that it is not.

The Williams family joined the series three weeks ago, moving into a home on the cul-de-sac in the fictional suburb of Knots Landing, Calif.

As it happens, the Williamses are black. As it happens, they are the first black principal characters on "Knots Landing" in its eight-year history. And, although ABC's "Dynasty" featured two major black characters several years ago, the Williamses also happen to be the only major black characters now featured on a prime-time soap.

Though very much aware that the Williams family represents a casting breakthrough of sorts for the show and the genre, David Jacobs, its creator and executive producer, says he and the show's writer-producers think the best way to make a statement in bringing in black characters is to say nothing at all about their being black.

"We decided to write it colorblind," Jacobs said. "It's just a new couple coming to Knots Landing, and here are their problems. We're not doing it this way because it's safe — we're doing it because it's good."

Larry Riley, who starred on stage and in the feature film version of "A Soldier's Story," plays Frank Williams, Lynne Moody, whose credit includes the TV medical comedy "E.R.," "Roots" and "Roots: The Next Generation," plays Patricia Williams. Kent Masters-King, a student at the Marlborough School for Girls in Los Angeles who has appeared in area theatrical productions and guest-starred on several TV series, plays their 12-year-old daughter, Julie.

Like "The Cosby Show," which features universal family problems rather than racial ones, "Knots Landing" will concentrate on relationships and a mystery plot involving the Williams family rather than stories involving racial prejudice or ethnic differences, Jacobs said.

Unusual circumstances will have forced the Williamses to leave their home, friends and professional lives behind to start over in Knots Landing — and lead Knots Landing residents to wonder why their new neighbors keep so fiercely to themselves.

"Knots Landing" producer Lawrence Kashta and executive script consultants Bernard Letchowick and Lynn Marie Latham agreed with Jacobs' colorblind philosophy, offering that an affluent black family moving into a predominantly white California neighborhood is not unusual in 1988 and realistically need not spur much

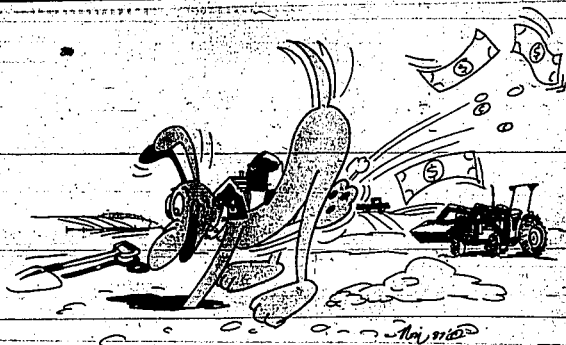
reaction from the residents. "It seems almost corny and old-fashioned to deal with (racial issues)," Letchowick said. "Our characters are not written black and white — all of our characters are gray."

Moody said she delights in her role as Patricia because it is one of the few parts she has been offered that makes no particular statements about racial issues. "That's what makes it special — I think it's going to be more universal, in appeal," she said.

"It kind of takes us backwards in time, to have to back up (and do stories about racial issues) I think because visually we are a black family, that speaks for itself."

Richard Shapino, an executive producer of "Dynasty," said that he thought the same way when his show introduced an extravagantly wealthy couple portrayed by Diahann Carroll and Billy Dee Williams in 1984. Carroll's character was eventually disclosed to be the half-sister of "Dynasty's" patriarch Blake Carrington. Both Carroll and Williams have since left the series.

Willis Edwards, president of the Beverly Hills-Hollywood branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, praised "Knots Landing" for its colorblind approach and for providing much-needed black representation in dramatic series, rather than just in situation comedies.
