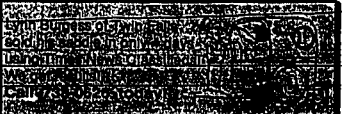

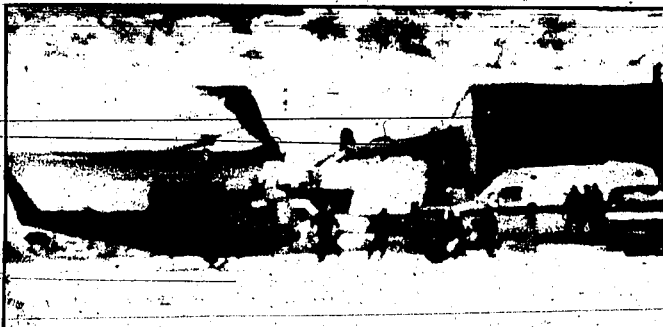

Officials try to allay AIDS fears

NEWARK, N.J. — Public health officials moved Thursday to allay fears that a New Jersey hospital's diagnosis of a second AIDS virus in the United States could lead to a new epidemic of the deadly disease. Blood supplies are safe and there is no evidence the virus, HIV-2, has spread beyond the West African woman diagnosed with the disease at the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey, officials said. "There is no immediate peril to the blood banks in the United States," said Dr. Stanley H. Weiss, a former investigator for the National Cancer Institute and now a professor of preventive medicine and community health at the university. "People in this country should not be worried about contracting HIV-2 at this time. That is not a public health problem in the United States at this time," he said at a news conference. In Washington, a Red Cross official said there are no plans now to test donated blood for the HIV-2 virus. "If evidence appears indicating that HIV-2 infection poses a threat to the safety of blood transfusions, the American Red Cross will introduce appropriate laboratory testing procedures," said Dr. S. Gerald Sandler, associate vice president for Red Cross medical operations. Assistant U.S. Health Secretary Dr. Robert Whitcomb also said the U.S. blood supply was safe. Dr. Gary Noble, deputy director of the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta who is in London for a world-AIDS summit, said the diagnosis of the woman, whom he identified as a native of the West African nation of Cape Verde, was "the first confirmed case of HIV-2 in the United States. She was diagnosed in December," he said.

Shots bring Utah standoff to close



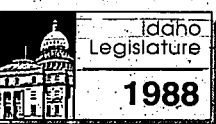

Polygamist clan leader wounded, officer killed

MARION, Utah — A quick burst of gunfire Thursday ended a tense, 13-day standoff between a polygamist clan and police. The shooting killed an officer and seriously wounded the group's leader, who was suspected of bombing a Mormon chapel. The shooting erupted just after dawn as police who had infiltrated the clan's compound used a police dog to try to isolate Addam Swapp and his brother from the log house they had left moments before, officials said. In the exchange of shots, the dog's handler was shot in the abdomen and Swapp fell in the snow with bullet wounds in the arm and chest, said John T. Nielsen, state public safety director. "It's my understanding that the officer was fired upon first, by whom we don't know yet," Nielsen said. He said an FBI agent was shot in the chest, but was unhurt because he was wearing a bulletproof vest. "In the succeeding, following moments after the gunfire, the agents moved in an armored personnel carrier to evacuate those who were wounded, and they came under extremely heavy gunfire from the residence," he said. However, the shots ended moments later and the clan's four other adults and nine children fled from the house in two groups with their arms raised above their heads. "We are very happy to report in this — that's if there's anything to be happy about in this tragic situation — that all of the children are safe," Nielsen said. "That was the number one priority of all of the officers." The siege had begun within hours of the pre-dawn bombing Jan. 16 of the Mormon Church's chapel a half-mile from this compound. That night, police talked by telephone with Swapp, who said the bombing was revenge against the church and state for the 1979 police slaying of polygamist patriarch John Singer. He told others he sought an armed confrontation to trigger Singer's resurrection. Nielsen said the decision to seize Swapp, 27, on federal warrants was made after a family friend delivered to police Wednesday afternoon Swapp's response to a letter from Norman Borleng, pleading with him to surrender. He said Swapp "declared his ranch and people an independent and free nation" and warned he would use any means to defend the 2½-acre compound. "It was not yelled. It was clearly taken as a threat that any attempt to effect an arrest of him would be met with force," Nielsen said. Vickie Singer, Swapp's mother-in-law and widow of John Singer, was taken from the compound to a federal court around midnight for arraignment on charges related to the Jan. 16 church bombing and gunfire which had punctuated the tense standoff. As Mrs. Singer, 44, was brought into the federal building in Salt Lake City in handcuffs, she was asked if her children were all right. "They're all being taken away from us," she said. Later, teary-eyed and wiping her nose, she pleaded innocent before a federal magistrate and was ordered to stand on the roof of the building. See STANDOFF on Page A2

State lottery legislation due to appear next week

BOISE — Legislation to start a state-operated lottery will be presented to a Senate committee next week, a lottery sponsor says. And the Idaho Supreme Court next Thursday will hear appeals from a district court ruling against the lottery initiative approved by voters in 1986. If the court upholds the initiative, Idaho could move quickly toward starting a lottery, says Eugene Spencer Smith, of the Vote-Yes For Idaho Economic Growth Committee, which sponsored the initiative drive. Also, a House committee debated Thursday legislation setting aside half the proceeds from the lottery in a special fund to help financially hard-pressed school districts build new classrooms. But the Education Committee eventually decided against introducing the proposal, sponsored by Rep. Gary



Montgomery, R-Boise, until it has a chance to gather more information or hold a full-scale public hearing. Smith said next week, lottery banker Sen. Mike Blockford, D-Kellogg, will present the State Affairs Committee with legislation starting the lottery. It stipulates a one-time allocation from profits to fund Idaho's Vietnam veterans memorial at Idaho Falls, but otherwise makes no commitment on how the lottery money should be used, Smith said. Smith said after the Supreme Court hears the lottery case, there are indications it plans to rule quickly. Voters in 1986 approved a lottery

initiative by a vote of 223,849 to 152,338. But a district judge ruled in a subsequent lawsuit that the Idaho Constitution could not be amended by voter initiative. The constitution has a ban on gambling, a \$139 million in revenue, proved a proposed constitutional amendment to remove that ban. It goes before voters in November and if approved; should remove the last legal barrier to a state lottery. Smith said the Supreme Court could rule against the initiative, which would mean no lottery unless voters approve the constitutional amendment in November. The court could approve the initiative, but refuse to let the Legis-

lature spend money on it. Smith said in that case, a private organization could be quickly set up to provide funding. With the new makeup of the Supreme Court, Smith said pro-lottery forces expect a 3-2 vote in favor of the lottery. New Justice Byron Johnson will be sworn in on Monday, succeeding the late Charles Donaldson. Montgomery told the House Education Committee he doesn't like the lottery. "But I'm a realist. It appears we will have it sooner or later," he said. "When we look at priorities, the number one is education," he said.

Porn foes will drop store suit

TWIN FALLS — The group of anti-pornography citizens suing the Front Page Book Store has decided to drop their lawsuit because they no longer have a target. The bookstore moved from its Blue Lake Boulevard North location earlier this week, leaving a vacant building and a sign on the door asking video club members to return their tapes. Attorney Brent Nielsen said Thursday. An anti-pornography group, called Determined Citizens Against Pornography (DCAG), has decided to ask 6th District Judge James May to dismiss the lawsuit. "As far as my clients are concerned, what they intended to achieve has been achieved," Nielsen said. "If this matter hadn't been filed, they believe the bookstore would still be there. Actually, they're very excited that they moved out." The complicated statute governing DCAG's lawsuit targets a specific geographical location for penalties. In other words, DCAG wasn't just suing the Front-Page but also was asking to close the actual building housing the bookstore. The intent of the statute, Nielsen said in an earlier interview, was to penalize landlords and property owners who allow pornography to be sold on their property. The statute is aimed at a place of See PAGE on Page A2

Sandinista, Contra agents launch talks

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica — Nicaragua's leftist government and Contra rebels began their first face-to-face peace talks Thursday, bringing sharply contrasting objectives to a Roman Catholic seminary in the San Jose suburbs. Negotiations were scheduled to start at noon but started an hour and 15 minutes late with a welcoming ceremony in a classroom of the seminary's campus-like instruction of cream-colored stucco buildings. They opened after President Reagan requested \$36.25 million more in aid for the rebels, whom the United States finances and trains; Congress is to vote next week on the request, all but \$8.6 million of which is for food, medical supplies and other non-military supplies. The House will vote Wednesday and if it approves the funding the matter will go to the Senate the next day. A close vote is expected. The administration has built ties to Nicaragua's policy around the Contras since they began fighting six years ago.

Governor offers apology to Aslett, pushes for stronger state schools

TWIN FALLS — Gov. Cecil Andrus publicly apologized to Twin Falls contractor Marvin Aslett for any possible embarrassment by suggesting him for the state Transportation Board. The public apology Thursday was unusual in that Andrus chose to make the statement at the Greater Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce 68th annual banquet, a normally upbeat affair. Aslett withdrew his name from consideration on Wednesday after it became clear that the Twin Falls contractor did not pass the Republican litmus test. Andrus had Aslett stand up before the more than 500 people attending the banquet at the Holiday Inn here. After Aslett received a round of applause Andrus said, "I apologize to Marvin Aslett if I caused him any undue embarrassment. I thought the election was over." Andrus joked that he knew he wasn't exactly talking to the Democratic Central Committee, a reference to Twin Falls County's heavily Republican orientation. But he said Aslett, owner of Circle A Construction, was highly recommended by the Associated

General Contractors and the state will be deprived of his expertise on an estimated \$139 million in road construction projects. Andrus said this was all due to "partisan politics." Republicans charged that Andrus' recent appointments were political and Aslett gave \$3,000 to the Andrus campaign. Andrus also used the event to shift some of the glow from the Trus Joist Co. success to light the way towards greater spending for education in the state. Late last year after an intensive state and local effort, Trus Joist of Boise decided to locate a window plant in Twin Falls instead of in Oregon. Trus Joist chief executive Walt Minnick flew to Twin Falls with Andrus and attended the dinner. "We must talk about educating children but it doesn't do any good if we don't have a job for them. If anyone in this room thinks that economic development and education don't fit hand in glove, I would like to know they are," Andrus said. Andrus is calling for an increase in the higher education budget as part of his \$703 million state budget proposal. But he needs four tax increase bills totaling \$33.5 million to make the proposal fly. He used the example of Micron

Technology's possible expansion in Boise from 1,700 to 2,700 employees as a reason for the state to improve its education system. Andrus said the top brass of the company is seriously considering taking the additional jobs to Oregon, Arizona or Missouri because they are not satisfied the educational system in Idaho is going to be able to train the kind of employees they want. The chamber selected KMVT-TV General Manager Lew Wagner, the 1987 chamber president, for his position. Twin Falls Bank & Trust, Jeff Harris of United First Federal Savings and Rex Lytle of Lytle Signs Inc. were introduced at the banquet. Jack Miller, southern district manager for Idaho Power Co., is the 1988 chamber president. "A winning team requires good communication, everyone understanding the objective and working to accomplish the goal. We have that team. I won't promise you another Trus Joist but we won't overlook any possibilities," he said.

Treasurer may join State Land Board

BOISE (AP) - For the first 20 years of Idaho statehood, the state Land Board was made up of four elected officials who supervised the management of public lands.

In 1910, the state auditor was added, making it a five-person board. In the 78 years since, the board has remained at that level.

A resolution approved by the House State Affairs Committee on Thursday calls for a constitutional amendment to add the state treasurer to the board.

"It would add the knowledge, wisdom and background of the state treasurer to the board," said sponsor Rep. L. Ed Brown, R-Pocatello.

He said the states of Arizona, California, Minnesota, North Dakota, Oregon, Washington and Wyoming have the state treasurer on comparable boards.

The incumbent in that position, Lydia Justice Edwards, told the committee in the first years of statehood, the state treasurer was a part-time position with little to do

other than bank state tax collections. The treasurer now invests an average of \$175 million per day, she said.

The treasurer, a Republican, said politics shouldn't be a factor in the makeup of the board. "It should not be handled on a partisan basis," she said.

The bill could come to a final vote in the House next week. If two-thirds of the members approve, and the Senate also passes the legislation, voters in the next general election would be asked to amend the Idaho Constitution to make the change.

Sponsors said there would be no cost, but Rep. Dorothy McCann, D-Wallace, pointed out that the election itself would have cost some expense.

Not all the questioning was serious. State Affairs Chairman Rep. Pam Bengson, R-Boise, asked Mrs. Edwards if the treasurer were added to the Land Board, if she then could file lawsuits against the board.

Mrs. Edwards' predecessor, Marjorie Ruth Moon, filed numerous lawsuits against the Land Board during her 24 years in the office.

Committee endorses nomination of Olson

BOISE (AP) - A Senate committee has endorsed the nomination of TrueJoist executive Jody Olson to the Public Employee Retirement System Board.

The Investment and Retirement Funds Committee on Thursday recommended Olson's confirmation by the full Senate without dissent.

Olson, vice president for corporate development at the Boise-based specialty wood products manufacturer, was appointed by Gov. Cecil Andrus in 1982.

Introduced In Senate

- SB1123 (State Affairs) - Precludes downward salary adjustment when a state worker's job is reclassified.
SB1301 (Local Government and Taxation) - Allows doctors serving on hospital district boards to contract with the district.
SB1302 (Local Government and Taxation) - Allows local taxing districts to issue revenue anticipation bonds and notes.
SB1303 (Local Government and Taxation) - Allows payment of personal property taxes on farm equipment to be paid in two installments.
SB1304 (Local Government and Taxation) - Repeals reduction to property taxes for vehicle license administrative fees.
SB1305 (State Affairs) - Requires political campaign reports on contributions from reporting committees to be filed within 30 days after information is filed by the non-reporting committee.

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Nitze speaks of safeguards

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan's chief arms reduction adviser testified Thursday that the Soviet Union's compliance with the new treaty banning medium-range nuclear weapons worldwide can be effectively verified and contains multiple safeguards to deter cheating.

Veteran diplomat Paul Nitze said checks — including on-site and short-notice inspections — are the most intrusive in the history of arms control.

"Taken together...they will increase the cost, complexity and probability of detection of Soviet cheating, and thus help deter it," Nitze told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee as it ended its first round of hearings on the Intermediate Nuclear Force (INF) treaty signed last month by President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev.

Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., continuing a one-man campaign against the pact, raised the possibility that the Soviets have hidden hundreds of undeclared and undetected multiple warhead SS-20 missiles and are prepared "to cheat on a massive scale."

"However, a fellow Republican, Sen. Daniel Evans of Washington, said Helms' attack on the treaty is based in part on 12-year-old press estimates and represents not just a 'red herring' or even a 'crimson whale' but 'a whole pod of crimson whales.'"

Several Republican and Democratic senators said there is no indication Helms' arguments have proved effective inside the committee or in the Senate as a whole.

Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., said he counts no more than eight to 12 votes against the treaty in the 100-member Senate. "Thirty-four votes are needed to prevent the two-thirds majority for ratification."

"I don't think he has picked up any followers and each of his points have been handily knocked down," Cranston said.

The treaty requires the destruction within three years of all U.S. and Soviet missiles with a range of 300 to 3,400 miles.

It bans all activities needed to maintain such a stockpile in Europe or elsewhere, including production, repair, storage and flight testing.

No trust in Soviets

WASHINGTON (AP) — Kremlin leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev's popularity is rising in the United States but most Americans still distrust the Soviet Union, according to a poll released Thursday.

The survey, part of a series called "Americans' Talk Security," also found that an overwhelming 79 percent of those polled favored the U.S.-Soviet treaty signed at the summit in Washington last December to eliminate the so-called "medium-range nuclear missiles." But 52 percent said the pact would not make the world much safer.

In a random telephone survey of 1,000 registered voters around the country, 72 percent said they had a favorable impression of Gorbachev versus 23 percent unfavorable, compared with 66 percent favorable and 22 percent unfavorable in a survey last October. The poll was conducted last time and 12 percent last time did not answer the question.

Of those who liked Gorbachev, the Soviet Communist Party general secretary, 21 percent said their impression was "very favorable" and 51 percent "somewhat favorable."

While most of those polled liked Gorbachev, 65 percent said "the Soviets cannot be trusted" to keep their end of an arms deal.

But I had \$8 or \$9 lying on my desk and that wasn't taken. And they didn't bother with a small portable electric typewriter."

Meese to review harassment claim

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorney General Edwin Meese III said Thursday he will review allegations of harassment in the FBI's investigation of opponents of the administration's Central America policy.

Essential spokesman Martin Fitzwater, meanwhile, said the White House has asked for information on the FBI's domestic surveillance campaign and that "we won't have any comment until we see what it's all about."

The Center for Constitutional Rights, a New York-based lawyers group, announced Wednesday that it had received more than 1,800 pages of government documents showing the FBI had investigated hundreds of organizations and individuals opposed to U.S. policy in Central America.

Among the groups named in FBI documents released by the center were the Southern Christian Leadership Conference in Atlanta, the Maynard Sikes in Chicago and the United Steel Workers union.

Meese said he has asked for a report on the surveillance from the FBI and would discuss the matter with FBI Director William Sessions.

"Then I will determine what action is necessary," he said.

William Webster, who was head of the FBI when the investigation took place, could not be reached for comment. A spokeswoman for the CIA, which Webster now directs, said she could be reached by the FBI. "It's an FBI matter," the spokeswoman, Sharon Foster, said.

The attorney general said he has received reports in the past from the FBI on its conduct of the surveillance of opponents of the Central America policy and that this will be an update to see what, if anything, of the (harassment) allegations are

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In drug trafficking Smuggler tells of pal in Panama

WASHINGTON (AP) — A convicted drug smuggler testified Thursday that Panamanian strongman Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega smilingly accepted a \$300,000 cash bribe in 1983 to become "a full-scale co-conspirator" in laundering huge profits from trafficking in marijuana and cocaine.

Steven Michael Kalish told astonished senators that he and Noriega were such close business partners that he lent the general a fancy Lear executive jet, bought with illegal drug proceeds, to fly to Washington for a meeting with President Reagan in November 1983.

Kalish, 35, a high school dropout from Houston who was imprisoned in 1984 as the mastermind of a multimillion-dollar drug operation, gave the first sworn public testimony implicating Noriega as an eager participant in a complex web of drug-related payoffs, kickbacks and official corruption.

Sen. William V. Roth, R-Del., who presided over the hearing by the Senate Permanent Investigations Subcommittee, said it was "nothing short of outrageous" that Panama's military rulers are "making lots of money by helping drug smugglers and money launderers ply their trade."

"Our national security interests are just as directly threatened by dope dealing and money laundering authorized or tolerated by public officials in Panama as our interests would be threatened by the closing of the Panama Canal," Roth said.

Noriega, who reportedly once had close ties with the CIA under the late Director William J. Casey, has consistently denied allegations of involvement in drug smuggling. The Reagan administration is pressuring Noriega to step down voluntarily and permit free elections leading to full democracy in Panama.

After a civil unrest erupted in Panama and the U.S. Embassy was attacked last June, the administration froze most of the

\$26 million in foreign aid to Panama. Last month, Congress voted to cut off virtually all economic and military assistance to Panama, eliminate its sugar export quotas and move against international development bank loans to Panama.

Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., the subcommittee chairman, said the revelations at Thursday's hearing might result in tightening U.S. banking laws aimed at halting money laundering by drug barons.

Nunn also expressed hope that Kalish's testimony would encourage Panamanian citizens to seek the ouster of Noriega, who reportedly is the subject of criminal investigations by federal grand juries in Miami and Tampa, Fla.

Kalish, who has served 43 months of an eight-year prison term on earlier drug-related charges, is cooperating with federal authorities in the hope of a lenient sentence next month on charges stemming from his drug arrest in Tampa in July 1984.

"That is when Kalish ended a business arrangement with Panamanian officials he said began in September 1983, when he first met with Noriega in an attempt to find a safe banking haven for \$300 million in profits from smuggling Colombian marijuana.

The day after he arrived in Panama City on a private jet, Kalish said, two middlemen arranged a meeting in Noriega's home and Kalish arrived carrying a briefcase stuffed with \$300,000 in cash. He said he made clear to Noriega that he wanted to invest "extremely large amounts" of illegal drug profits in Panama.

"As the meeting broke up, I left the briefcase and began to exit the room," Kalish testified. "Gen. Noriega called me back and said I forgot my briefcase. I told him it was for him, and he smiled."

At a party that night at the Panama Canal office, Kalish said, Noriega "was extremely friendly" and told him "he would do whatever he could for me. He also thanked me for the gift."

Reagan, Mubarak differ on peace route

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan joined Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak in deprecating violence in the Israeli-occupied West Bank and Gaza but the two leaders apparently differed Thursday on how best to revitalize peace prospects in the Middle East.

Reagan applauded Mubarak's call for a six-month cooling-off period and attributed the deaths and injuries to "allowing the Palestinian problem to fester," while the Egyptian leader called Reagan a "man of wisdom and conviction."

But after a brief arrival ceremony for Mubarak, making his first visit here in nearly 2 1/2 years, the two leaders faced off in private talks that a senior administration official described as "very animated and very frank."

This official, briefing reporters on grounds he not be named publicly, said that while Reagan embraced the notion of a cooling-off period, the administration was remaining non-committal on some points Mubarak is pushing.

Mubarak's proposal, among other things, called for the cooling-off period, a cessation of all Israeli settlement activities, respect for the political rights and freedom of movement of the 1.5 million Palestinians living in the West Bank and Gaza and a move toward convening an international peace conference.

Asked to describe to what extent Reagan voiced support for the five-point peace proposal advanced by Mubarak, the official said, "You're not going to find this (state visit) a breakthrough event. We did not get

into detail on each of the five of these."

"There was no specific discussion of how to implement the cooling-off period," he said. "We will now be in touch with the governments of Jordan and Israel."

Both Reagan and Mubarak said the violence involving Israelis and Palestinians brought a heightened sense of urgency to Mubarak's visit.

"The recent explosion of violence ... vividly reminds us that much remains to be done," Reagan said.

"The danger of allowing the Palestinian problem to fester is evident."

Department spokesman Charles Redman was asked who Reagan believes is at fault for allowing the Palestinian situation to grow more embittered. "He didn't say who is at fault. I am not going to ascribe fault. We all know that this problem in the Middle East is one of very long standing," he said.

Redman, describing a meeting that Secretary of State George P. Shultz held Wednesday with a group of Palestinians, said, "It was an opportunity to get the perspective of the Palestinians in the occupied territories. It was valuable for him to hear their views directly."

Asked whether these Palestinians are members of the Palestine Liberation Organization, Redman said, "I would say they are not. Palestinians who seek a peaceful resolution of the Israeli issues."

In both his prepared statement at the arrival ceremony and in his private talks with Reagan, Mubarak questioned how high a priority the Middle East has become during a presidential election year.

"We don't think this is going to be a wasted year," the administration official said. "We are not approaching this as a stand-down year in terms of U.S. diplomacy in the Middle East."

The official described the Reagan-Mubarak talks Thursday as "a very honest setting forth of the difficulties, as each leader saw the difficulties ... a catalogue of problems."

Contractor paid \$25,000 to Nofziger

WASHINGTON (AP) — Lynn Nofziger's lobbying firm received \$25,000 from a defense contractor a day before the former White House aide allegedly urged government officials to continue production of a warplane, according to testimony Thursday at Nofziger's trial.

Thomas A. Guarino, former executive vice president of Fairchild Republic Corp., manufacturer of the A-10 anti-tank aircraft, said he authorized the payment during a Sept. 22, 1982 dinner meeting with Nofziger and Stanton D. Anderson, a lawyer, who lobbied for the defense contractor.

The next day, Nofziger's company was paid \$25,000 by Anderson's law firm for his services to Fairchild Republic, according to a statement of evidence agreed to the prosecution and defense in U.S. District Court.

Guarino said he authorized the law firm to bill Fairchild for any payments it made to Nofziger.

Fairchild also paid \$50,000 to the New American Foundation, an educational arm of a political action committee that Nofziger headed, according to testimony.

The \$50,000 was paid in equal amounts of \$25,000 on Oct. 21, 1982 and Dec. 21, 1982, according to copies of the canceled checks put in evidence.

Among other things, Nofziger is charged with improperly lobbying National Security Council officials during a Sept. 24, 1982 meeting. Prosecutors have charged in court that Nofziger attended the meeting with Anderson to discuss continued funding of the A-10.

Senate wipes out anti-bias rules

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate on Thursday approved a measure that would effectively repeal 1975 regulations designed to prevent discrimination against women who have abortions or want them.

The 56-39 vote came on an amendment to the Civil Rights Restoration Act, a sweeping measure that has been a magnet for controversial issues since it was introduced in 1984 to reverse the effects of a Supreme Court decision limiting the reach of federal anti-discrimination protections.

The abortion amendment sponsored by Sen. John Danforth, R-Mo., said nothing in Title IX, the law barring sex discrimination in education, "shall be construed to require or prohibit any person, or public or private entity, to provide or pay for any benefit or service ... related to abortion."

The amendment would supersede Title IX regulations that say schools receiving federal funds cannot discriminate against women who have abortions and must, if they have comprehensive health plans, cover pregnancy, childbirth and abortion.

"The question is, do you believe that the refusal to provide or fund abortions constitutes sex discrimination?" Danforth asked.

Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, rejoined: "A woman could be bleeding to death and could be denied a life-saving abortion. A man who was bleeding to death could be saved. That to me is discrimination."

Metzenbaum and others accused Danforth of diverting attention from the major civil rights bill at hand and seeking to curtail abortion rights.

ATV settlement foes say protection slight

WASHINGTON (AP) — Opponents of a proposed settlement of federal lawsuits aimed at reducing deaths and injuries among young riders of all-terrain vehicles said federal lawyers were "smoked" into accepting an agreement that does little to protect the public.

"Nobody could have dictated a better settlement for the attorneys representing the ATV industry," Sen. Alfonse M. D'Amato, R-N.Y., told a House subcommittee. "They have scored a stunning victory over the consumers of this nation."

The settlement, reached last month by the Justice Department, the Consumer Product Safety Commission, and the ATV industry, requires that manufacturers stop selling three-wheel ATVs and provide free safety training to buyers of the four-wheel model.

But the agreement, which will become final Feb. 13 if approved by the court, includes no provision for a recall of the 1.5 million three-wheel vehicles currently in use. It also would permit the industry to resume sales of three-wheel ATVs if it can satisfy new performance standards adopted by the commission.

Rep. Doug Barnard, D-Ga., chairman of the subcommittee on commerce, consumer and monetary affairs, said the agreement's main deficiency is its lack of a recall provision that could reduce the number of ATVs in the hands of consumers.

More than 900 people have been killed riding ATVs in the past five years and nearly 7,000 injuries associated with ATVs are reported monthly, Barnard said the only way to reduce those statistics is to reduce the number of ATVs in use.

EEOC chairman admits 900 cases expired

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission admitted Thursday his agency deserves "harsh criticism" for allowing 900 age discrimination cases to expire before victims had a chance to win relief.

In an unusual assessment by a chief executive of his own agency, Clarence Thomas said the performance of commission officials "harms the charging parties, disgraces the agency ... and discredits those who have done their work conscientiously."

Testifying before the House Select Committee on Aging, Thomas appeared livid as he described his shock in learning that agency officials in several cities allowed the two-year deadline for taking action to expire.

Thomas, who has spent nearly six years at the helm of the agency founded to fight job discrimination,

said that "missing the statute of limitations in these 900 cases has been the most single devastating event in my tenure."

Thomas told committee Chairman Edward R. Roybal, D-Calif., "We are assessing the damage in each case. We will present a full report. No responsible person would miss the statute. We deserve harsh criticism for this occurrence. It will not happen again. We have warned people."

Kohl slates visit to U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl will visit here Feb. 17-19 to discuss East-West relations and other issues with President Reagan, the White House said Thursday.

Boris Yeltsin and Kohl will meet Feb. 19 after talks by Kohl with Cabinet members and other officials, said presidential spokesman Murlin Fitzwater.

He said the talks will focus on issues such as arms control, the North Atlantic Treaty Organization summit in March and the planned U.S.-Soviet summit in Moscow later in the spring.

Kohl's finance minister, Gerhard Stoltenberg, will be in Washington next week to see Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III and others. West Germany has been under U.S. pressure to stimulate its economy so that it will buy more U.S. goods.

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Soldiers face court-martial; Arabs report more beatings

JERUSALEM (AP) — The army said Wednesday it has court-martialed some soldiers and transferred others for beating Palestinians in violation of policy. Arabs reported more cases of severe beatings.

Palestinians at Al Amari, a refugee camp in the occupied West Bank, said soldiers dragged 10 residents from their homes shortly after midnight, put them on a military bus, then beat the captives and tossed them out of the bus one-by-one as it drove down the road.

Maj. Gen. Amram Mitzna, military commander of the West Bank, did not refer to those allegations but said there were "too many exceptions" to the policy of using beatings only on rioters while violence is in progress.

"We are checking each of the complaints that we get. We are dealing with this issue 24 hours a day," he told foreign reporters.

"We did (court-martial) a few, not more than a few. But we have also used means that we have in the army — talking, briefing and sending soldiers out of their units."

Riots began Dec. 8 in the West Bank and Gaza Strip, which Israel captured from Jordan and Egypt in the 1967 Middle East war. Thirty-eight Arabs have been killed by Israeli gunfire, according to U.N. figures, and the government said last week a policy of beating rather than shooting had begun Jan. 5.

President Reagan, opening talks at the White House with President Hosni Mubarak of Egypt, said: "The danger of allowing the Palestinian problem to fester is evident—and reinforces the urgency of moving toward negotiations."

Mubarak called Reagan "a man of wisdom and conviction."

accused Israel of "oppression" and said the violence must end immediately. Egypt is the only country to have made peace with Israel, signing a treaty in March 1979.

At his news conference, Gen. Mitzna cited a case in which three Palestinians near Ramallah were taken from their homes and beaten. The plan was to arrest them, but because they were beaten I ordered them freed."

Asked about reports that the three were dumped on a roadside, Mitzna said he thought Israeli soldiers took them to a hospital but was not certain. He said an inquiry was under way.

A 23-year-old Palestinian named Osama told reporters at Al Amari, about eight miles north of Jerusalem, that soldiers came to his home at 1:30 a.m. Wednesday and put him in a military bus.

Koop proposes AIDS screening for an entire American university

LONDON (AP) — U.S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop said Thursday he wanted to screen every student of a major American university this spring to help determine the incidence of AIDS among young adults.

Koop also proposed similar mass AIDS screening at a few high schools in the United States, but said the government had made no decision on either proposal.

He disclosed the plan at a world meeting on AIDS in London and gave details in an interview Thursday with The Associated Press.

The three-day conference, attended by health ministers from 114 countries and senior public health officials from 34 others, adopted a declaration backing the World Health Organization's global strategy on AIDS control and prevention.

Proclaiming 1988 the "Year of Communication and Cooperation About AIDS," the 650 summit delegates said they "can and will" slow the spread of AIDS, but offered no major new strategies.

Koop's plan for anonymous screening of students could prove

controversial. Civil libertarians have argued that anonymous screening is an invasion of privacy and that screening of a limited population could be the forerunner of mandatory nationwide testing.

The surgeon general said health officials had yet to choose a university, but it would likely be one in a large city with a student body of around 25,000. Plans call for the screening to take place some time this spring, Koop said, and it would likely be part of a one-day open-air, campus "gala" on AIDS prevention.

"The goal would be to test everybody in that university in such a way that it's done out in the open, above-board; everyone knows that the blood specimen is not in any way tagged," Koop said.

"That would give you a pretty good idea of the prevalence of AIDS in the age group in an urban setting," he added.

The incidence of acquired immune deficiency syndrome is highest among 20- to 24-year-olds, with male homosexuals and drug abusers among those most at risk.

AIDS is caused by a virus that damages the body's immune system, leaving victims susceptible to infections and cancer. It is spread most often through sexual contact, needles or syringes shared by drug abusers, infected blood or blood products, and from pregnant women to their offspring.

Blood tests can determine the presence of AIDS antibodies, indicating exposure to the virus, but a positive test does not necessarily mean a person will develop symptoms.

Koop said the screening would probably be conducted under the auspices of the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta or the American Medical Association.

He said anonymity would be guaranteed and those taking part would have no way of knowing the results.

"To me, it's not an invasion of anyone's privacy," he said. "It's an effort to help the public health people make some predictions about prevalence, which we sorely need."

Koop said he also hoped that such screening could be carried out at a few high schools in diverse parts of the country.

Arab protests center in Israel

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) — Despite six weeks of violent Palestinian protests in the West Bank and Gaza Strip, there have been no mass sympathy protests in the Arab world to match those in Israel itself.

Apathy and government action are to blame.

On one hand, those who demonstrate have been stopped, apparently because Arab governments fear such protests could lead to instability.

On the other, most of the Arab public — wary of defying authority, accustomed to reports of Israeli misdeeds, and perhaps satisfied by official condemnations — are content to keep their anger to themselves.

Last weekend, 30,000 Israeli Arabs and 60,000 Israeli leftists marched through Tel Aviv and Nazareth to protest Israel's occupation of the West Bank and Gaza Strip.

A day later, only 150 Palestinians tried to stage a similar march in Jordan. But, security men dispersed them and arrested five people.

For many Arabs, there's nothing shocking about hearing that Israel has used harsh measures against protesters. They have listened to accounts of alleged Israeli atrocities for decades.

But for others, there is a sense of outrage but no way to express it.

"I feel very sad and disappointed, outraged about the state of Arab political systems," said Assad Abdul-Rahman, a political activist in Amman. "I see Israeli television in Tel Aviv showing marchers in support of our Palestinian

cupation of the West Bank and Gaza Strip and I can't do that."

Abdul-Rahman heads the Abdul-Hamid Shoman Foundation, a major educational center in Amman, and is also a member of the Palestine Liberation Organization's central committee.

He said the problem throughout the Arab world is a "lack of democracy."

"We have systems in the Arab world that are afraid even of demonstrations that support them."

Arab governments have tried, to rally international condemnation of Israel through diplomatic channels, and have permitted a handful of official demonstrations.

One in hardline Syria, Israel's archenemy, drew thousands of people.

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Public outcry halts Soviet nuclear plant

MOSCOW (AP) — Public opposition stemming from the Chernobyl nuclear disaster has forced Soviet authorities to stop building a nuclear power plant near the Black Sea, a Soviet newspaper said.

The report, from the peninsula of Crimea, stressed that the protest was not an isolated incident.

"Twenty operating nuclear plants and almost all of those under construction are the subject of bitter disputes among local residents," it said.

The article said \$42 million was wasted when the project was scrapped in Krasnodar, a southern Russian city which was not directly affected by the 1986 Chernobyl accident.

Complaints said the power plant in Krasnodar, 50 miles north of the Black Sea, would have been located in an earthquake-prone area close to a nature preserve and health resorts.

The newspaper said the project was canceled after local officials launched an irresponsible campaign against the nuclear power following the fire at the Chernobyl plant.

The campaign took root among the people and opposition grew, it said.

Still, the report, which appeared Wednesday, excused the local population and blamed their reaction on a shortage of information about the project and incomplete reporting on nuclear issues.

The report said Krasnodar was not the only city to oppose a nuclear plant.

The Soviet Atomic Energy Ministry is now receiving letters from throughout the country expressing concern over the safety of such power plants.

"This situation is not so amazing," the writer commented. "We have read about anti-nuclear demonstrations in other countries, and about the referendum in Austria where it was decided that nuclear plant construction wasn't necessary at all, and about nuclear dangers in the United States."

Previously, nuclear power plants had been built in a city, the newspaper said, "but that was before Chernobyl."

On April 26, 1986, the four-reactor power station north of Kiev caught fire, killing at least 31 workers and spreading radioactive contamination over much of the northern Ukraine and southern Belyorussia.

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Troops search for hostage

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Syrian troops scoured Moalem west Beirut on Thursday for a kidnapped West German and a Christian radio said an Iranian delegation arrived in the city's Shiite slums, which the Syrians do not enter.

A police spokesman said Syrian soldiers, who have patrolled west Beirut for nearly a year, also were put on heightened alert late Wednesday a few hours after seven gunmen abducted the West German, 30-year-old Rudolf Schray. Syrian forces set up more

checkpoints, searched cars and frisked pedestrians, including uniformed policemen.

No group claimed responsibility for the kidnapping but suspicion focused on pro-Iranian Shiites believed to hold most of the 21 other foreigners missing in Lebanon, who include eight Americans. Held the longest — since March 15, 1985 — is Terry A. Anderson, chief Middle East correspondent of The Associated Press.

Voice of Lebanon, the Christian radio, said four Iranian officials arrived in the Shiite slums of south Beirut late Wednesday. It described them as the deputy chief of Iranian military intelligence, a ranking officer of the Revolutionary Guards and two other officers, but did not give names.

Atomic spies dies

BERLIN (DPA) — Klaus Fuchs, who was arrested in Britain in 1950 for passing valuable atomic bomb secrets to the Soviet Union and whose confession damaged Moscow's spy network, has died in East Germany where he was allowed to settle after serving nine years of a 14-year sentence. He was 76.

The official East German news agency, ADN, called Fuchs a "socialist scientist, teacher and communist and a faithful friend of the Soviet Union."

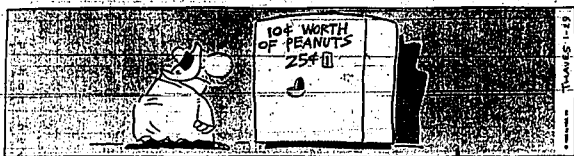
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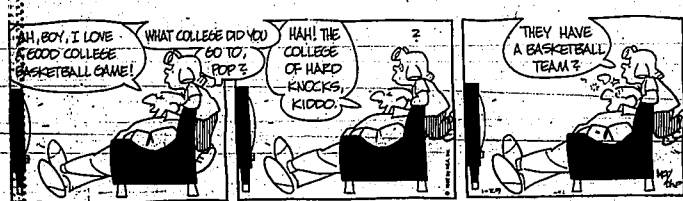
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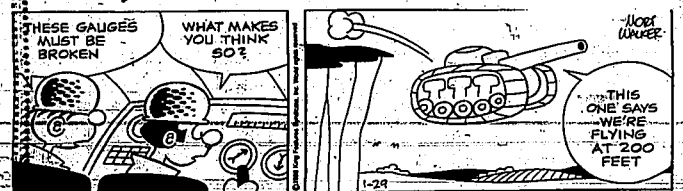

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—Space workers preparing for resumption of shuttle flights Thursday to pay silent tribute to the seven astronauts who died two years ago in the fiery Challenger disaster. It was one of many remembrances around the country.

Four buses stopped, cafeteria lines halted and hundreds of engineers, technicians and other workers poured out of buildings at 11:38 a.m., the moment when Challenger lifted off on Jan. 28, 1986.

Flags around the Kennedy Space Center were lowered to half staff for 73 seconds, the length of the fatal Challenger flight—while workers stood in silence. The air was chilly, the sky clear, a grim reminder of the frigid conditions that contributed to the space shuttle's destruction.

At the Johnson Space Center in Houston, workers held a 73-second observance while officials at the Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Ala., encouraged workers to observe the anniversary in their own way.

In Concord, N.H., students at Concord High School gathered at the beginning of classes to remember Christa McAuliffe, their city's social sciences teacher who died in the shuttle explosion. She was aboard NASA's first citizen-in-space and was to have taught lessons from orbit to schools around the country.

At McAuliffe's grave overlooking the New England city, flowers lay atop the black marble marker, deep snow partially ob-

scured the inscription. At Arlington National Cemetery near Washington, June Scoobe, widow of Challenger commander Dick Scoobe, placed wreaths at the Challenger Memorial Plaque and on Scoobe's grave. With her were a group of children representing schools which have raised \$45,000 for a Challenger Center. She is leading an effort to raise \$30 million to build the science education center.

NG Greater Love, a non-profit humanitarian organization, also placed a wreath at the Chal-

lenger plaque. The group runs friendship programs for families, especially children, of those who have died serving their country.

In Washington, Sen. John Glenn, D-Ohio, the first American to orbit the Earth back in 1962, issued a statement in which he said, "We owe it to the Challenger astronauts to pursue an aggressive space program. Their sacrifice will have meaning only if we learn from it and move forward."

A Buddhist temple in Honolulu planned a memorial service

at the gravesite of Ellison Onizuka, one of the Challenger crew members.

Tennessee legislators in Nashville read a poem and passed a resolution designating Thursday as Astronaut Remembrance Day.

Just before the Kennedy Space Center ceremony, center director Forrest S. McCartney spoke to workers over a television circuit and loudspeakers, saying, "As we make preparations to return the space shuttle to flight this year, it is appropriate to remember the men and women of the Challenger crew."

"Dick Scoobe, Mike Smith, Ron McNair, Judy Resnik, Ellison Sizuka, Greg Jarvis and Christa McAuliffe lost their lives in 'the difficult task of learning about and stretching the ability of humankind to work in space,' he said.

"Let us remember the greatest tribute we can pay them will be the successful launch of STS-26 and the resumption of a regular flight schedule."

STS-26 is the name for the next shuttle flight, the 26th, to be flown by Discovery, NASA on Wednesday set Aug. 4 as the new target launch date; a slip of two months from the previous date because of a nozzle part that failed during a December test firing of a redesigned solid fuel booster rocket.

A faulty booster-rocket joint led to the Challenger explosion, allowing flames to escape and touch off the external fuel tank 65 miles above the Atlantic Ocean.

Mourners honor Dallas patrolman

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — Officer John Chase, who died a senseless death in a violent world at the hands of a mentally ill vagrant, was laid to rest Thursday in a snow-curtained cemetery and eulogized as a galvanizing force for police support across the nation.

Nearly 1,000 people — 145 of them officers from Dallas and about 500 more from police departments across the Midwest as far as Chicago — came to bury the 25-year-old Chase, a newlywed killed Saturday with his own gun by a homeless man apparently encouraged to shoot by a few bystanders.

The death touched off a wave of vigils and demonstrations of support for the Dallas police, who on the day of the shooting blamed frequent City Hall criticism for placing officers in danger. Since then, police say, Chase's brutal death has become a symbol of the dangers on the streets.

Police officials, their badges masked with black tape and a few carrying a single red rose, stood at

attention, heads bowed, as taps was played. Some wept quietly as Chase's parents, brother, widow and other family members huddled by his flag-draped coffin in prayer.

"John Chase did not live long enough," said the Rev. Duane Gibson, who had married Duane and John Eaton just three months earlier. "But John Chase lived long enough to call to citizens for a renewal of spirit and attitude toward law enforcement."

"John is a symbol for you, whether you are an officer or citizen. He calls you to a new challenge — a challenge to restore the confidence and integrity of the people of the United States," said Gibson, senior minister at the First Baptist Church in Des Moines.

"In some way, the citizens of this nation are trying to say to John Chase, and his family and all law enforcement that we appreciate you."

Thursday's show of force and support by officers from Iowa, Nebraska, Illinois and Indiana as well as Texas created a funeral pro-

cession of some 120 squad cars, four buses and dozens of other vehicles.

"We wanted to show our respect and stay as united as we can," said Chicago police Officer John Ciszewski.

At the First Assembly of God church, where the funeral was moved because of its size, Chase's gold-framed portrait stood by the casket, surrounded by 75 floral arrangements.

At the cemetery adjacent to a corn field, bells quietly touched the crisp air as 11 rows of officers stood at attention. Dallas officers fired a 21-gun salute for their slain colleague, the second officer killed in the line of duty in two weeks in the city.

Dallas Police Chief Billy Prince hailed the support his department had received since Chase's death, and said he now believes the officer "didn't die for nothing."

"I hope his death represents a turning point in public support for law enforcement — not just in Dallas but all over," Prince said.

'Murder capital' gets morgue

MIAMI (AP) — For the past six years, a refrigerated trailer that was seized in a drug bust has been parked outside Dade County's woefully inadequate morgue, helping to handle the overflow of bodies.

Now fingers are crossed that a \$10.2 million state-of-the-art facility dedicated Thursday will end the crisis of overcrowding at the busiest morgue in the Southeast.

The new Joseph H. Davis Center for Forensic Pathology "compares right at the top in terms of the facility and technology," said Dr. Joseph Davis, 63, in his 30th year as Dade's chief medical examiner.

"It's going to be strange having so much room," Davis said at dedication ceremonies held under a carnival-style yellow-and-white tent. A crowd of people from the forensic and medical professions filled about.

The 88,000-square-foot center has more than seven times the total area of the county's existing morgue, including coolers that can hold 350 bodies. The old morgue could only store 28 bodies, with the refrigerator truck holding another half dozen or so.

The new morgue will have some of the most sophisticated equipment in the country, with such features as a high-speed photography research laboratory for studying the effects of bullets and other high-speed objects on the human body; a sterile autopsy room for obtaining bone and skin for burn and orthopedic cases; a studio for producing scientific videotapes; and special family rooms with closed-circuit television for body identification.

Norman Kasoff, director of operations at the medical examiner's office, says the old morgue was overcrowded almost since it opened in 1958.

"During the ribbon-cutting, I remember distinctly a county commissioner commenting this building would last 25 years," Kasoff said. "Like everything in Dade, the population boomed us. By 1961, 1962 the building was already obsolete."

At the time, the county population was about 800,000 and there were 80 to 90 murders a year, Kasoff said. Dade's population was 1.7 million in 1984.

In 1980, Miami had a record 573 murders, earning the city the label of nation's murder capital.

Although the level has dropped, with Metro-Dade police reporting 437 homicides in 1987, the morgue is still swamped with bodies from cocaine shoot-outs and the criminal side of the Mariel seafit, which brought nearly 125,000 Cubans here. The refrigerator truck, which

was acquired in a marijuana raid, became a permanent fixture.

The medical examiner's office handles about one-third of the county's 18,000 deaths annually. It performs about 3,600 autopsies, and reviews several thousand more cases before cremation, burial at sea or donation to a medical school.

Kasoff estimates that by 2025, some 4,600 cases involving just homicides, suicides, accidental deaths and unusual deaths will be handled at the county morgue.

"I feel happy we're going to get relief from our recent situation," said Davis, who at one time made building repairs himself in lieu of a maintenance crew. "I feel quite confident in 10 years ... the building we're moving into will still be new and adequate for Dade County, even if the population doubles or triples."

The 56-member staff will be moving late next month from dingy,

crowded and termite-infested quarters to the modern, spacious and well-lit three-building complex of brick, stone and glass.

In addition to a main lab with room for 17 simultaneous autopsies, there is a special morgue for decomposed or disease-contaminated corpses and a room for laying out a skeleton. A special research room will be equipped with two high-speed cameras capable of taking 168,000 pictures per second.

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Meyerhoeffer makes pitch for state funding

BOISE — CSI President Jerry Meyerhoeffer was ebullient Thursday after his budget presentation before lawmakers. After making his annual pitch for 50 percent state funding for the Twin Falls community college, Meyerhoeffer expressed confidence. "People are aware community colleges are a good bargain, and that we're doing a good job," said Meyerhoeffer, moments after his presentation to the Joint Finance and Appropriations Committee. "I think the 50 percent funding is going to go this year."

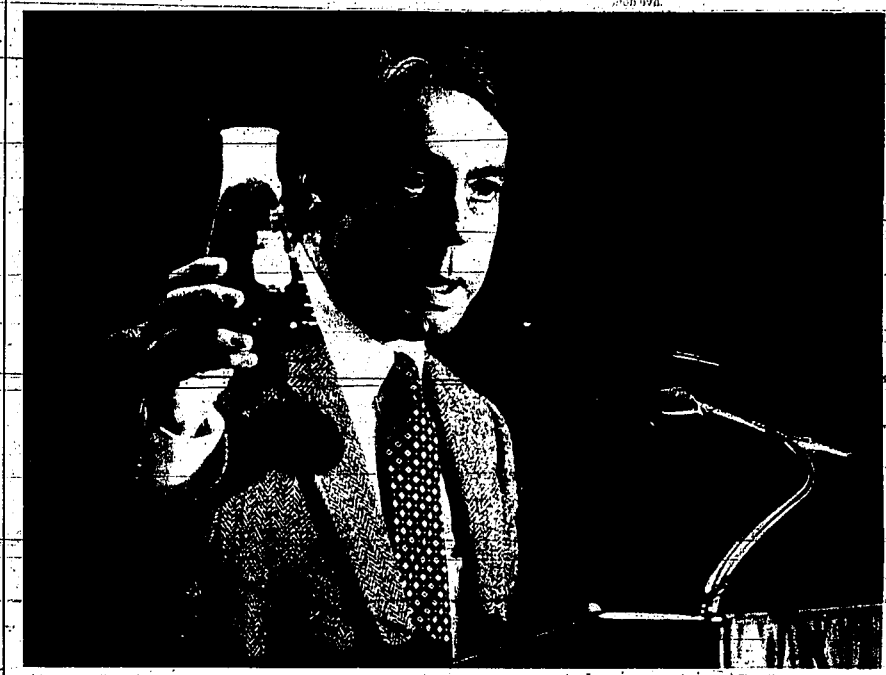


state's two junior colleges. If approved, CSI would receive an additional \$677,000 in state money, Meyerhoeffer said. "We realize it's a lot, that's why we're asking to do it over a period of time," he said. But two influential members of JFAC were less enthusiastic, and predicted the measure stands little chance of passage. "It's logical, but it's not practical," said Rep. Kitty Gurnsey, co-chair of JFAC. "It's

too unrealistic. And I think to bind us to a piece of legislation is wrong." Rep. Mack Neibaur, R-Paul, vice chairman of JFAC, was even more circumspect. "It won't go through this year," said Neibaur. "I'm not sure it will ever go through, although their request is not without justification." CSI has been arguing for years that the state should contribute more to CSI's funding, since CSI serves students throughout the state. CSI again produced statistics showing enrollment at the two-year college is up substantially, while enrollment at the state's four year colleges have barely increased. Since 1984, for example, CSI's enrollment has jumped almost 17 percent. During the same period, enrollment at the University of Idaho in Moscow declined 5 percent.

To meet demands, CSI last year hiked tuition and fees while it also raised the county mill levy close to the limit set by law. A chart showed that CSI's tuition has gone up 178 percent in seven years. County taxes have jumped 87 percent during the same period. But the state's share over the same time has only increased 17.7 percent, figures show. CSI last year received \$2.2 million in state money and another \$150,000 in liquor funds. Gurnsey said the issue of state funding versus local funding is a debate over philosophy. "Junior colleges were built by people in a local area to provide education for those areas," she said. "There is nothing that says

the state should fund those colleges at all." While Gurnsey commended the two junior colleges for doing a good job, she also said the state has done a good job in picking up the slack in funding. Neibaur said his instinct tells him that junior colleges can provide the same two-year education less expensively than at the state's four-year institutions. But he does not support 50 percent state funding because of worries that more state money will mean less local control. "They charge it off, but if we have a law mandating 50 percent state funding, then the state will take full control to protect its backside," he said. Black insisted his bill would not mandate 50 percent funding. "It would just encourage it," he said. "We" See FUNDING on Page B3

Vitamin C innovation may be a plus

TWIN FALLS — Human beings need vitamin C to live. "Without vitamin C, your gums bleed and you die in a hurry," said Dr. Blake Grant, director of Rangen Agriculture Research Center, in Hagerman. So do fish. If fish don't get enough, they get curvature of the spine. That's bad for the fish and bad for the fish industry. A deformed fish doesn't look very appetizing on a restaurant plate, no matter how much lemon and parsley is piled around it. Curved fish don't sell. But vitamin C is as difficult to keep in fish meal as it is to keep in vegetables that are being steamed. All the vitamins move into the water and disappear. Maybe not anymore. Rangen Corp. of Buhl will soon be marketing a new product that will have an impact worldwide on the aquaculture industry, on the Idaho economy, and eventually, on each-and-every-one-of-us," said Michael Workinginger, Rangen's

spokesman for the new product Thursday. "We discovered the process of making a more stable form of vitamin C," Grant said. "Whereas regular vitamin C is gone in minutes, this stuff can last for days. It's vitamin C with a tail on it." "We've dubbed it C-PLUS until our lawyers tell us we can't use it anymore," Workinginger said. They found a way to attach a phosphate molecule onto the vitamin molecule so oxygen can't tear it apart. Rangen plans to market the vitamin first as an additive to fish meal. Vitamin C is normally difficult to store in fish feed. "It is one of the major problems," Grant said. When it is exposed to heat, air or even water, the vitamin C oxidizes and breaks down. So fish meal has to start out with large quantities of the expensive vitamin to ensure there is at least a little left by the time the fish eat it. But the new modified vitamin C doesn't oxidize because its vulnerable flank is protected by the phos-

phate molecule that is attached to it. It can be stored, exposed to air, heat and water, and last much longer. When the vitamin enters the body of a fish or a human, certain enzymes take the phosphate away, so the vitamin can be used. It will be given a different brand name and will be sold to Rangen's competitors in the fish-meal business. How much C-PLUS will cost per unit, has not been determined, Workinginger said. The product could mean a big payoff for Rangen, which has a \$39 million potential on the human products market, Grant estimated. It will be available in two to three years, Grant predicted. "If you want to dress up a fish, that's where this thing is leading," Workinginger agreed. The new product doesn't mean a new plant or new jobs in the Magic Valley yet. The production is not labor intensive. It is being produced for Rangen now by Brose Chemical Co. in Twin Falls. "To the Magic Valley, C-PLUS will mean an economic shot in the

arm. We envision more dollars and with that, more revenues," Workinginger said. The modified vitamin was invented by Dr. Paul Seib, a professor at Kansas State University. The patent is owned by Kansas State University Research Foundation. Rangen, which has working arrangement with the foundation, spent over \$200,000 in research and development, and in purchasing the patent rights for the product. "They share those rights with Zeigler Brothers Corp. in Gardners, Penn." "The only obstacle left is getting approval from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, which tests the safety of all food products. Rangen was told the OK would come by mid-January, but they still wait. They are ready to roll the minute the approval comes. "This really is what I consider the tip of the iceberg," Workinginger said. Someday the food in the stores that says "vitamin enriched" will have C-PLUS in it, he predicted.

Jerome police nab juvenile wanted in Oregon murder

JEROME — A juvenile accused of recently murdering his mother and grandmother in Portland was on his way back to Oregon Thursday after being arrested in Twin Falls by the Jerome Police Department. Portland authorities identified the 17-year-old juvenile as Jamie R. Davis. According to Dave Simpson, public information officer for the Portland Police Department, Davis will be charged upon his return with two counts of aggravated murder in connection with the shooting deaths of his mother, Jennice Burnett, and his grandmother, Blanche Wilks. Burnett, 34, and Wilks, 63, were found dead Jan. 20 in their southeast Portland home. Simpson said both women had been shot one time in the head. Jerome police arrested Davis on a burglary warrant at approximately 1:15 p.m. Wednesday, according to Capt. Mito Alonzo of the Jerome Police Department. Davis was arrested at the Washington Park Apartments in Twin Falls. Portland authorities, who had contacted Jerome detectives concerning Davis prior to the arrest, interviewed Davis Wednesday night and thereafter arrested him on the murder charges. Davis was in tradition Thursday morning, after which he was removed to Oregon. Alonzo said Davis had been living in southern Idaho for "maybe a couple of months" though officials do

not know exactly where he was residing. "He was more of a transient just coming through," Alonzo said. "He made a few friends here apparently." Simpson said Portland officials will attempt to prosecute Davis, who turns 18 in one week, as an adult. "They probably shouldn't have any problem," he added. "Davis is scheduled to be arraigned in Portland's juvenile court today, Simpson said. Prosecutors are then expected to file a motion requesting that Davis be tried as an adult. If that motion is granted, Davis could be subject to all but one of the penalties applicable to an adult convicted of aggravated murder, Simpson said. Since the crimes occurred while Davis was a juvenile, he could not be given the death penalty. According to Alonzo, the Jerome burglary warrant stemmed from the Jan. 8 theft of Jerome of a large-caliber pistol. Police officers found that pistol in Davis' possession when making the arrest Wednesday, Alonzo said. "Whether it was the same gun used in the murder, we don't know," Alonzo said. "He had two guns in his possession." Davis was booked on local charges of burglary, possession of stolen property and possession of marijuana. Alonzo said police officers found a bag of marijuana in Davis' possession when making the arrest.

Callen defends alleged AIDS plot

BOISE — A Jerome legislator is distributing a pamphlet in the Statehouse that claims AIDS is a Communist plot to conquer the United States. Rep. Jerry Callen, R-Jerome, Wednesday defended giving the material to all 126 legislators. But legislators and a state health official said the claims were both absurd and a potential threat to AIDS prevention efforts. "Doctors have discovered that the AIDS virus was prepared especially for us — the U.S. — by Communist agents working as scientists for the World Health Organization," the pamphlet from The Fact Finder of the Phoenix, Ariz. reads. "The Kremlin decided that our conquest by AIDS would be easier and more effective than a nuclear holocaust."

"Whether you buy it or not, it is food for thought," said Callen, a former sheep and cattle feeder. "How could all of a sudden this virus show up all at once in three or four continents?" The pamphlet says the virus was created by combining sheep and cattle viruses and first was spread in 1972 among humans who received smokes vaccines in Africa. First, "Brazil and Japan." Then, in 1978, "Americans were infected by tainted hepatitis B vaccines." "It's crazy," said Rep. Russell Newcomb, a Twin Falls sturgeon who has authored a package of bills aimed at controlling the spread of AIDS. "They take a small amount of truth and make it instill fear in people." Judge denies request for special prosecutor

Search continues for missing plane, to no avail

HAILLEY — Searchers contended with avalanche dangers and diminishing funds in their unsuccessful effort Thursday to find the Halley-bound airplane that disappeared more than two weeks ago. According to Blaine County Sheriff Walt Fleming, more than 30 searchers spent the day combing the Prairie Creek area north of Ketchikan, but to no avail. The search, which had been suspended since Jan. 17, was resumed Wednesday after a pilot flying from Galena to Halley reported hearing over the emergency frequency a female voice communicating portions of the missing plane's identification number. "We still feel strongly that this is the best lead so far," Fleming said. The plane, a red and white

Cessna 180, disappeared Jan. 12 after taking off from Gooding, located 40 miles southwest of Halley. Two Halley residents, Dr. Robert Miller and Katherine Skuce, were aboard. Fleming said ground crews on Thursday had to abort a couple of missions because of the avalanche danger" spurred by warming weather. Of equal concern, however, were the financial strains imposed by the extended search. According to Fleming, the state pays up to \$1,000 for a search effort. But local officials ago exhausted that amount and now are in need of further financial assistance. On Thursday, Blaine County officials turned to private donors. The private donors responded. Fleming said more than \$3,800 rolled in from private sources. Most

of that money is going toward a county-hired helicopter service which charges \$400 an hour. "We got a tremendous amount of support within the county," Fleming said. Nancy McConaughy, administrative assistant with the Idaho Bureau of Aeronautics, said the bureau provided no assistance to searchers Thursday. "We sent up a plane for a half hour (Wednesday)," she said. "The pilot didn't pick up anything, and neither did our satellite." Referring to the local search efforts, McConaughy said, "If they want to fly around up there for six months, they can. But we can't continue to fly and fly." Part of the latest developments, McConaughy said Tuesday that the state agency would resume its

air search only if it received "a valid lead." She added, "If we do reopen the search, it's going to have to be strictly state money that would pay for it." The Civil Air Patrol, a federally funded agency now assisted in the initial stages of the search, has decided it will not resume its efforts based upon the leads now available. But, according to McConaughy, reliance solely upon state funds could prove to be problematic. "We were looking at the CAP originally because our search-and-rescue funds are just about depleted," she said. According to McConaughy, the bureau's search-and-rescue efforts are funded through pilot's registration fees, which are collected every two years. The division received See PLANE on Page B3

SAN DIEGO — It's a hard world to get a break in. Ask the Three Amigos, the Denver Broncos receiving trio of Vance Johnson, Mark Jackson and Ricky Nattiel, who have risen to stardom, only to find that it was never being anonymous. So, they could tell you a thing or two about fame.

One moment they were lovable moppets. The next, they were Three Friends, Inc. This is 1988, and there's a world to be won and the Vance was involved.

Next, they were selling a full line of Amigo accessories: the Amigo poster, \$5; the Vance poster, \$8; the orange sequined sombrero, \$10; T-shirts, baseball caps, sweat shirts and a video, not to mention the coming Amigo tour package to Cancun, Mexico, at \$700 per person, based on double occupancy. Honest.

And the next, they were on everybody's hit list.

Denver reporters passed around an underground nickname of their own: the Three Big Egos.

Opposing cornerbacks passed around worse than that. In the first round of the playoffs, the Vance announced an Amigo group goal of 250

yards — "without a conference, by the way," said Jackson, laughing.

Said, the Oilers' Patrick Allen when he found out about it: "We'll see if they can walk that walk. We already know they can talk that talk."

The Amigos settled for 112, 105 of them by the Vance, who was then separated after a play by a Houston linebacker, knocking him out of action for two weeks.

"I don't think he was trying to hurt me," Johnson said. "I think the guy was just trying to stop his momentum." Unfortunately, he stopped it on me.

Bronco Coach Dan Reeves could have been happier. When Johnson was released from the hospital and failed to report for treatment, Reeves fined him \$500. Johnson

had been off with the Amigos that day, spending 14 hours shooting their video, "The Touchdown Bandits" (MTV debut slated for Feb. 4, with the Amigos making guest appearances as VJs).

Nattiel could have been happier. The sycophant of the Amigos, he keeps having to swear he isn't resigning his commission.

Jackson found the going a little thick, himself.

"Anybody ask an Amigos question yet? someone ask me during a media break last week in Denver."

"Who're they?" said Jackson.

But the Vance?

He's home, such as it is.

"Don't believe anything" Vance says. About half of what he says isn't true.

Actually, the Amigos complement each other nicely.

The Vance does the heavy promotion work. Nattiel acts becomingly modest to prove that there's a conscience somewhere in this group. And Jackson busts everybody's chops.

It was at last year's Super Bowl that Johnson became this monster known as The Vance, christening himself while holding court at great length about his earnings, his hairdo, his paintings.

Not that he made any secret of his motives.

"I want to be famous," he said. "I want to be famous as hell. I can't tell you how famous I want to be."

Fate and another Super Bowl have provided a suitable vehicle. All that remained was to follow current merchandising trends for Super Bowl participants: One day your teammates nickname you. The next, you're filling articles of incorporation. The third, you're a cliché.

Why should anyone begrudge them? Look around, it's a mad circus. The media exploit the event, the participants exploit the media. Everyone gets what they want, unless there's someone out there holding out for good taste.

In Denver, a woman named Linda Kirchner painted herself blue, her horse orange and rode

With Pam Pember in the Pilot house, GFHS cruises on

LENNS FERRY — On Jan. 19, at the Valley High School gymnasium in Hazelton, Joy Schutte and the Viking girls' basketball team walked all over Glenna Ferry 49-38.

The key to the Vikings' victory?

They held Pamela Jo Pember to eight points.

Eight days later, Pember and the Pilots got sweet revenge in Wendell, knocking off Valley 58-52 and sending the Canyon Conference co-champions into the losers' bracket of the District 4 Class A-3 girls' tournament.

The key to the Pilots' victory?

Pamela Jo earned 38 points.

After the latest Glenna Ferry-Valley clash — and the Pilots' upset of league co-champ Declo two weeks ago in which Pember scored 32 points — there is little doubt as to who is the most dominating player in the Canyon Conference.

First-year Pilot Coach Doug Moore makes no bones about why his team has come out on top.

"I'm very pleased with the team's performance this year," Moore said. "If somebody would have told me (before the season began) we'd be 14-6 (at season's end) I would have laughed at them. Without her, we would not be where we are, but without the other players she wouldn't be where she is. She is the heart and soul of the team."

According to Moore, both defensive and offensive strategies revolve around Pember, who carries a double-digit average in both scoring and rebounding. Glenna Ferry's man-to-man defense is specifically designed to funnel the ball inside where the 6-foot, 1-inch senior can use her size to "swat the ball away."

Offensively, the Pilots' game plan is simple: get the ball to Pember.

"On offense, it is her job to get open so we can get her the ball," Moore said. "It's not selfishness; it's necessity."

What sets Pember apart from other centers in the conference, according to Moore, is her versatility.

"I think she can play both inside and outside," he said.

Although Pam was born in Twin Falls, the Pember family has lived in Glenna Ferry for the past 15 years.

Being the "second-tallest in her class," Pember began playing basketball in the fourth grade when sixth-grade teacher Ken Fast — and later Pember's varsity coach during her first three years at Glenna Ferry High — organized a girls' basketball program and encouraged Pam to participate.

Although her sport of choice is basketball, Pember's athletic accomplishments include a state A-3 high jump championship as a sophomore. Last year however, she took ill and was unable to perform up to her potential. Pember is unsure at this time whether or not she'll compete in the high jump this spring.

Pember cited the team experience that basketball has to offer over the one-on-one competition of track and field.

"I don't like single competition," Pember said. "That's why I run relays (in track). There's more competition in basketball."

After playing on the varsity level four years, three of those in a starting role, Pember has assumed the responsibilities of a role model and has had to undertake significant amount of pressure.

"I'm not a cheerleader," Pember said, and as far as pressure is concerned, "There's a lot more this year, than last year," she said, "but I don't show it."

Pember said she prepares for games quietly. On game days she silently walks through the game in her mind, reminding herself of her responsibilities.

At home, Pember said her parents are extremely supportive of her basketball endeavors, especially her mother.

"My mom really gets into it," she said.

Johnson fails to make U.S. Olympic Ski Team

Few Americans will ever forget the sight of Billy Johnson standing at the finish of the Sarajevo Winter Olympics downhill and raising his arms to the sky. On his face was a cocky grin that said, "Yes, I am the best in the world."

Not since the U.S. hockey team beat the Soviets for the gold medal at Lake Placid in 1980 had there been a more surprising U.S. victory in the Winter Olympic Games: Johnson, then a 23-year-old former juvenile delinquent from Troutdale,

Ore., had just done what no U.S. athlete before him had: beaten the proud Europeans at their glamorous winter specialty, the Alpine downhill race.

But it was the end rather than the beginning for Johnson. While his stunning victory momentarily delighted, his braggadocio on the winner's podium did not play well in the long run.

Johnson insulted his fellow racers on the World Cup circuit, quarreled with his coaches, humbled a nose-at-his-admirers, and bragged openly of the lucre his athletic triumph would generate. Four years and another Olympic

later, the star of the U.S. ski team at Sarajevo will not even make the U.S. team, according to U.S. team officials on the World Cup ski circuit here. The team will be named next week.

"He is just not in shape and he hasn't had any results," says U.S. downhill coach Theo Nadig. "It is perhaps sad but there are just many younger skiers racing with us now that are consistently better than he."

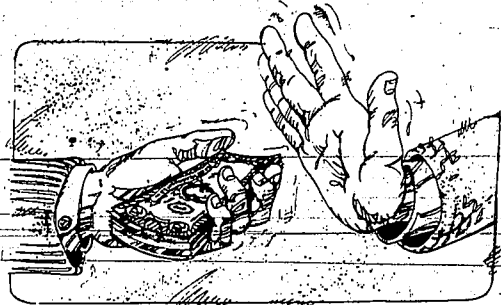

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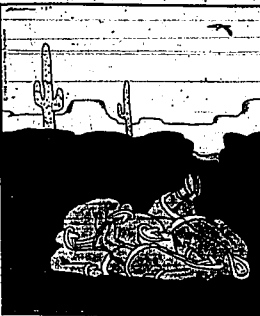

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

"Habit is habit, and not to be flung out of the window by any man, but coaxed downstairs a step at a time." - Mark Twain.

Your partnership has no problem reaching today's excellent grand slam. All you have to do is make it. Cover the 'East-West cards' and adopt a plan of play after the opening lead of a spade.

Using simple arithmetic, North gets the partnership to the grand slam in a record of two bids. (I've never heard of one being reached in one bid.) After dummy wins the first spade, how should South proceed? If South defers to habit, he will start his longest suit - in this case, clubs. The top clubs are cashed, and when East follows on the third club, what should South discard?

If the clubs split 3-3, it doesn't matter what South discards. There will be more than enough tricks for the slam. But what happens when clubs are 4-2 and the jack falls to drop?

The solution to the problem is to cash the top hearts and the top diamonds before starting the clubs. When the diamonds break, South has 13 tricks regardless of what happens in clubs.

The moral? Don't voluntarily subject yourself to discards until you determine which cards are of no value.

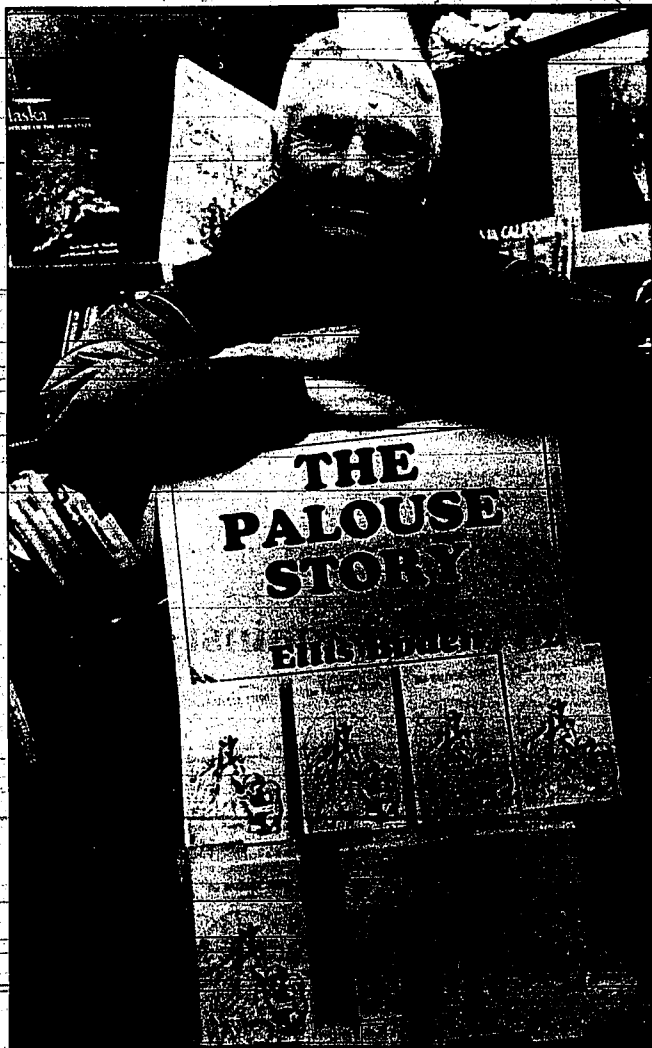

For those who believe in themselves Self-publishing takes character, courage

TWIN FALLS — Is there a novel you've written nestled in your bottom desk drawer? A story you've fled away, but not forgotten?

If there's a manuscript in your life which you feel merits publication, local authors have some qualified advice for you: Publish it yourself.

They are quick to caution, however, that self-publishing is only for stalwart individuals who are willing to take a gamble, can work hard without giving up, and who write well and believe in themselves and their books — even when everyone tells them they're trying to accomplish the impossible.

Local author LaRose Reese believes in a children's story she has written, illustrated and published called "Horse and Herman." The book is about a pair of quail, their 12 chicks and the adventures they encounter one summer. The storyline is true-to-life in terms of a quail's behavior and development, and the action takes place on a wooded hill in Hagerman.

Reese, who describes herself as an artist more than an author, never thought seriously about submitting the story to an established publishing house. Instead, she decided she wanted to produce it herself.

She first contacted a small printing company in Wendell, who referred her to Blue Lakes Insta Print in Twin Falls. They typeset the book, printed her watercolor illustrations in two colors and offered lots of sound advice.

"It was all new to me," says Reese cheerfully. "I took a while to decide on the size print and the colors we were going to use and this sort of thing. But there were not really any problems."

Reese's paperback is available at Jud's Bookstore and Made in Idaho in Twin Falls. It is also available at The Book Plaza in Burley, The Paper Peddler in Buhl, and the Hagerman Pharmacy.

She says she does have one word of caution for prospective self-publishers, however. "I think one thing I would tell them is that it will cost them more than they think," she says. "I've got about a \$3,000 investment." Reese's 500 autographed, first-edition copies of "Horse and Herman," which hit local bookstore shelves two days before Christmas, retail for \$8.95. About 160 copies have sold so far.

"I just called stores and made appointments and took the book in and showed it to them and asked them if they would put it in their store. Some of them I put in on consignment; most of them I have sold to the people who own the stores," she says.

Reese has also contacted two large book distributors and is waiting to hear if they'll handle her book.

"It's been kind of a neat experience. I found out that you sometimes expect people to say, 'No, I won't do that.' But everyone's been really nice. They say, 'We'll try to get that out of you.' Let's talk and we try it." So I feel very good about the reception I've gotten."

Ellis Bodon, author of "The Palouse Story," and his wife, Ethel, have become involved in small press in a big time way.

Bodon formed a corporate group called Gem Paperbacks Inc. last year for the sole purpose of publishing her husband's novel.

"The Palouse Story" is a fictionalized account of the Easter day gun battle in Pullman, Washington in 1949. The Palouse is a geographical area covering the territory southeast of Spokane, including Pullman, Moscow, Troy and Lewiston.

Boden, whose story was almost picked up by Doubleday — "they read it twice" — as well as generated interest from the Critics' Associated of New York, says he's "been through heartbreak hotel" with his book. But he notes that 75 percent of all new authors now are either self-published or published by subsidy publishing houses.

An author pays a subsidy-publishing house to publish a book, and in return, it takes care of all the printing details, promotion and marketing.

"Mark Twain published his first two works by himself and peddled the books from door-to-door," says Bodon. "The point is — if you have complete faith in your manuscript and you know it is good even if it's been rejected by the big publishing houses — do it. Do it yourself."

He says Spiro Agnew's first novel was subsidized by Nelson Rockefeller.

"When you have something that you feel is of value, you must be willing, if you've been rejected over and over, to put some money up front," says Bodon. "Very few publishing companies take risks on first-time authors anymore."

One hundred copies of "The Palouse Story" were first published by Tim Micklin Agency in 1976. All copies of the book sold, many to libraries. Since then Bodon has completely rewritten the manuscript. His wife had enough confidence in his book to initiate the corporate group and put up the money for a second edition.

Although he keeps the exact figure his wife invested in his novel confidential, Bodon says it may take "a mortgage-type loan" to cover the expenses involved in publishing a book.

But it didn't cost Bodon's wife any more to publish the book herself than it would have cost to have it published through a subsidy house.

"It was about the same. You relinquish control, though, if you go through a subsidy publisher," he says. "The Palouse Story" was typeset by Moore Publishing of Twin Falls. Binding was done in Salt Lake City. The Burley Reminder printing office printed the book and Gary Hollinger coordinated all the publishing details.

Gem Paperbacks also hired a commercial artist, a lawyer and an accountant. Carlton Press of New York City copy-edited the final draft. The corporation obtained business licenses in Washington, Utah and Idaho. And, being a corporation, Gem Paperbacks also has dealt with a corporate board.

"It becomes quite involved," says Bodon.

The author, who lives in Almo, says there is a stigma involved with publishing your own work.

"If you do your own, you risk the stigma of becoming an egotist, which is not the truth at all," Bodon says. "People seem to think you should be embarrassed if you do it. And that's not true. You should be very proud if you have something good."

Bodon says his wife does not expect to recoup her initial investment for some time. They are both encouraged by the success of the book.

New PBS documentary series takes look at 'Television'

LOS ANGELES — Michael Winship grew up as a first-generation child of television and has never gotten over his fascination with the tube.

"We lived over my father's drug store in Canandaigua, N.Y., and I was one of the first kids with the electronic baby sitter," he said. "I was into show business in a town that was far removed from it. I was the only person in town who got a copy of Variety."

Winship has now turned that fascination into an eight-part documentary series called "Television," which began Monday on PBS. He wrote and co-produced the series.

"Television" looks at 60 years, from the first fuzzy images to comedian Milton Berle to Neil Armstrong walking on the moon to Gary Shandling coping at his sitcom home on cable. It examines the comedies and dramas, the game shows and TV's impact on the political process. Edwin Newman is the host and narrator.

The series, which will conclude

March 14, is a joint production of WNET in New York and KCET in Los Angeles in association with Granada Television of England. Granada earlier had produced a series also called "Television."

In college, Winship studied political science. Then I worked on the McGovern (presidential) campaign in 1972," he said. "That cured me of politics."

He turned to writing as a freelancer for the Washington Star and eventually joined WNET as a publicist. He soon moved into production and in 1983 became head

writer for "Smithsonian World."

His wife, Kathleen Champion, is anchor for "The Wall Street Report" on public television.

Winship was working as a freelance writer and producer when he was asked to join the "Television" project by executive producer Jack Sameth.

"I came in in 1986 because Jack had an abiding interest in television," said Winship. "We'd worked on several shows together in the past. We immediately went to work on two fronts — deciding what we wanted to do with the series and

raising money. And in classic public television fashion it took more time to raise the money."

During this time both Winship and Sameth worked on other projects. Winship did more work for "Smithsonian World" and "Square One TV," a parody of television used by the Children's Television Workshop to teach math.

"I did a thing called 'Star Trek Bland Stand,' he said, "in which Spock and Kirk accidentally come to 'American Bandstand' and do 'Rate the Records.'"

A year ago, they set to work on

the series. Winship also began writing the companion book published by Random House.

"It was an enormous task condensing 60 years of television into eight hours," he said. "The spine of the series is looking at television through different program forms. It's not so much behind the scenes as what we saw on the screen."

"It's really a retrospective. We show comedy, drama, game shows, the news, live events and sports, plus the race to invent television. I think we all have the notion that

Ringwald moves into adulthood in 'For Keeps'

SAN FRANCISCO — Molly Ringwald, *Time* magazine cover girl dubbed "Queen of the Teens," is more attractive, articulate and strong-willed in person than most of the on-screen characters she has played in the teen-age angst movies, "Sixteen Candles," "Breakfast Club" and "Pretty in Pink."

Those teen flicks by film maker John Hughes are to the 1980s what "The Hardy Boys" and "Nancy Drew" books were to another generation. But Ringwald, perched on the edge of 19, is not about to be stereotyped as for-teens-only.

"The Pick-Up Artist" was Ringwald's first attempt out of the teen genre. "For Keeps," the Tri-Star Pictures movie that recently opened, is another. Hughes would probably not have dealt with its topic of teen pregnancy in the way director John G. Avildsen ("Rocky"

The Karate Kid") has.

"I thought that if ('For Keeps') dealt with the subject in a very interesting way, with a lot of humor, with a lot of romance, but still managed to paint a pretty realistic picture," Ringwald said in a recent interview here.

Ringwald has a no-nonsense attitude toward career and life. She incorporates in black top and skirt, brown jacket, white stockings and black pumps. The light-brown designer eye glasses complete the look. Carrot-red hair cropped oh-so-close belies the impression. Somehow, she is playing a role: Molly Ringwald, rising young woman executive.

"Lately, I've been receiving more adult films because I've gotten older and people have seen that I've aged a little bit so they're more apt to think of me for more adult roles than I used to be considered for," Ringwald said.

Would she choose not to an-

other teen role?

"Well, I don't want to say that I would never do anything because people always change their mind about things. I always change my mind. I find, about all kinds of things, it's a woman's prerogative."

Of the current crop of teen stars, many critics agree that Ringwald has one of the best chances of making the transition to adult roles because she can really act. Ringwald's first acting break was in 1977 when she played Kate in the West Coast stage production of "Annie." The next year, she became a regular on the NBC-TV series "Facts of Life." She won a Golden Globe nomination for her debut movie role in "Tempest," opposite John Casavetes and Susan Sarandon.

In "For Keeps," described as a romantic comedy, Ringwald plays Darcy Elliot, who becomes pregnant by her senior class boyfriend Stan Bobruze (newcomer Randall Batinkoff). Against the wishes of

their parents, they keep the baby and marry.

Does "For Keeps" reflect a particular social viewpoint?

"I don't consider it an anti-abortion film or a pro-life film in any way at all," Ringwald said. "I think that it's about two kids who make a choice. Whether or not it's the right one remains to be seen."

"These kids have no money, and they've lost a lot. They've grown up so much in one year, a crash course in life — too much for any kid, really. Who knows whether they're going to be able to make it."

Aykroyd, Matthau in control Molly of a depressed 'Couch Trip'

HOLLYWOOD — Psychiatrists have been such a traditional butt of movie humor since the '30s that the idea behind "The Couch Trip" seems a natural: a comic "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest" crossed with "Spellbound" and updated to the age of Dr. Toni Grant. In the film, a con man at the Cicerone prison mental facility, played by Dan Aykroyd, impersonates his own psychiatrist and film-fleams his way into a gig as replacement for Dr. George Maitland (Charles Grodin), Beverly Hills monarch of dial-a-neurosis radio.

Sounds foolproof. Not quite. This is a movie about double-shuffers and con men — and halfway through, you get the feeling the movie is double-shuffling you. "The Couch Trip" seems to have a first-class comic pedigree — Walter Matthau and Dan Aykroyd have done other "Saturday Night Live" alumni in the cast, director Michael Ritchie at the helm. But it often has the brittle surface and sharp, vacuous joy of a junkie artist working a crowd. And it is so slack and complacent that its pokes at complacency seem incoherent.

Aykroyd is playing a part that seems ideal for him: John Burns, mouth-mouthed Chicago con man, disguised as a psychiatrist "Frank Laird" (David Crenn). Unlike Laird and Matthau (Charles Grodin) in the film's best performance, Burns is a super-

Williams' Vietnam tale remains in front row

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Robin Williams' "Good Morning Vietnam" won the hearts, minds and dollars of moviegoers, who bought nearly \$11 million in tickets and kept the movie on top of the national weekend box-office list.

The movie from Walt Disney Co.'s Touchstone Productions earned \$10.8 million in its fifth week of release.

"Good Morning" was followed by Touchstone's "Three Men and a Cradle," which earned more than \$6 million and has grossed \$113.7 million in nine weeks of release.

In third place was Cher's romantic comedy "Moonstruck," earning \$4.8 million. "For Keeps," the Molly Ringwald tale about a teenage couple that decides to keep their child, was fourth with \$2.8 million.

"Broadcast News," the critically acclaimed film about the romance and career moves inside a network's Washington news bureau, was in fifth place with \$2.6 million.

Chuck Norris' Vietnam war hero returned in Cannon's "Braddock: Missing in Action III," which earned \$2.2 million in its debut week, good for sixth place.

"Throw Momma From the Train," followed with \$2.1 million, and "The Couch Trip" copped eighth place with \$2 million. Both films are from Orion.

Rounding out the Top 10 were two thrillers, "Night Of The Living Dead II," from Lorimar, which resurrected \$1.8 million in ticket sales, and "Attraction," still good for \$1.7 million during the weekend. "Fatal Attraction" has now earned more than \$186 million.

Studios used the weekend box-office to determine how well a movie

Most of the story's humor is on a lounge-act level, too. Why has comic virtuoso Walter Matthau been cast as the wasted sidekick, Becker, a part that seems more suitable for Bob Denver?

Most of the jokes are seen before they are felt. In the entire cast, only Grodin and Mary Gross manage some first-class comic moments: Grodin glowering as the psychotic psychiatrist and Gross clattering at his scared-siff wife. They are only doing the obvious — which is all the movie has to offer — but they do it with relish. Briefly, in their scenes, the satiric needle cuts through the flab, and this "Couch Trip" (MPA-rated R for language) comes alive.

'For Keeps' muddles through plot despite outstanding casting, theme

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. The ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

FOR KEEPS (PG). Not even Molly Ringwald's customary sly and bedrock believability makes a smidgen of difference in this film. Muddled "it is" and "muddled" it remains. With the film makers seem willing to move a little off the beaten track on their subject of teenage pregnancy, the tone is sexist, but generally funny and insightful: fun one-minute stappick, sitcomish and -mawkish the next. And Ringwald's charisma, while still intact, is too much for co-star Randall Batinkoff, a gangling newcomer. Credit "For Keeps" with one innovation, however. It's the first time within memory that a high school siren (Ringwald) has lured her man (Batinkoff) to a red Mustang — and a box of Pampers.

GOOD MORNING, VIETNAM (R). This dramatic comedy based on the 1965 Saigon gift of wildman Armed Forces deslay Adrian Conauer is mostly failed satire. It clings to the obvious like a drowning man to an anvil, and director, (but non-writer) Barry Levinson can't summon up the wit or bite of his "Diner" or "41 Men." But Robin Williams, as Cronauer, saves it: he explodes the center in berserk bursts of electronic age surrealism. Blazing away brilliantly, ad-libbing on camera, Williams is like a man possessed: a Crazy Eddie of showbiz dada. In his improvisations, he hurls "Vietnam" into realms of quick-witted chaos, gives a fine, freezing cheerly hello and goodbye to the hell of war and the purgatory of radio.

LEONARD PART 6 (PG): In this grim mishmash, top-heavy with production values but short on humor, Bill Cosby plays a superspy turned San Francisco restaurateur who comes out of retirement to foil a crazed ecologist (Gloria Foster) who has a magic sphere capable of turning animals, even house pets, into killers. With Tom Courtenay, Jesse Gunn, Victoria Rowell, Pat Colbert.

RETURN OF THE LIVING DEAD, PART II (R): Intentionally

horilous horror picture about a zombie invasion of a typical Southern California community. Written and directed by Ken Wiederhorn with considerable artistry and much humor. With Michael Kenworthy, James Kamen, Thom Matthews, Dana Ahbrook.

THROW MOMMA FROM THE TRAIN (PG-13). Danny DeVito's first directorial effort has the same rubidicid explosions he puts into his performances. It is a comic version of Hitchcock's "Strangers on a Train" in which a hapless writing student (DeVito) — commented by the world's meanest mother — tries to swap murders with his teacher (Dilley Crystal). A thin idea, but the dialogue is often clever, and DeVito — abetted by "Blood Simple" cameraman Barry Sonnenfeld — gives the movie a lot of overripe, mock-film noir style. It is fun to watch.

WALL STREET (R). Here is a film with the slickest surface possible, a brave, simplistic show of movie-making razzle-dazzle. It is fun for a while — sliding along director Oliver Stone's high-tech

PARK CITY, Utah — In this once-quiet ski town described recently by Park Redford as "more city than park," the 10th annual United States Film Festival concluded Sunday amid signs that it too is undergoing a not-necessarily-for-the-better transformation.

The exposure that Redford's Sundance Institute-sponsored festival affords to independent film makers is widely regarded as beneficial, but the festival's burgeoning size and popularity are threatening to erode the intimate, informal nature that has been the hallmark of the event.

In addition, the festival, which used to be populated almost entirely by film makers, has taken on a much more commercial atmosphere — with the presence of distributors, publicists, agents, managers and studio development executives.

This year's 10-day smorgasbord of independent films was the biggest ever — and, with about 33,000 tickets sold, the best attended.

There even seemed to be more "names" in attendance as well. Spotted during the week: Susan Sarandon, Rod Taylor, John Cusack, Michael Nesmith, David

Lynch, Isabella Rossellini and surprise visitor Dr. Ruth Westheimer, who said that the festival's atmosphere reminded her of "my days at the Sorbonne."

The festival's expanding profile was demonstrated during Saturday night's awards party. There was a cacophony of schmiering that barely ebbed enough to acknowledge the winners.

First place winners in the documentary and dramatic feature categories received \$2,600 from sponsor American Express and 100,000 feet of film processing, courtesy of Foto-Kem film laboratory, but got little attention from the audience as they took the stage to accept their awards.

Garfield Fox, who took top honors for her documentary "A Project: The Last Home Movie," (a project 11 years in the making) could barely be heard as she made her acceptance speech.

Bob Nilsson, who directed and co-starred in "Heart and Light," which won best dramatic feature film, didn't try to fight the crowd's noise and kept his remarks brief.

The scene Saturday was a far cry from the festival's first six years as a feisty gathering of cinematic renegades, said some long-time fes-

tival-goers.

Jane Sue Memell, who, with Jonathan Sanger, co-produced the "Discovery" program shown during the festival, recalled the festival's premiere in 1979.

"Nobody had even heard of Park City when a friend of mine was invited that year. We drove forever and found 100 people in the audience (the total attendance that year) when we got there. Today we had 100 people squished into a tiny room."

The trademark informal parties that always followed the last film of the night were hastily arranged at a festival-goer's condominium and always on a bring-your-own basis. It seemed that tickets could always be found for late-comers or those who couldn't afford to pay.

It was fun, but unprofitable. And Redford, whose dedication to independent film makers is unquestioned, sought to save the festival from extinction when he bailed it out of debt four years ago.

Deborah Shaffer ("Witness to War"), whose documentary on the Sandinista revolution, "Fire from the Mountain," was in competition, praised the festival for "treating the documentary seriously."

But the increased crowds worry even Redford, who said: "I don't think we can keep expanding to fill the need. ... There's a point where we have to cut it off."

That cut-off point may already have passed. While film makers attending the festival this year for the first time praised the fraternal environment, many regulars remarked on "how crowded" it was. What used to be informal late-night parties open to all are now planned by festival administrators and can be attended only after purchasing tickets.

For documentary award winner Fox, the late-night parties provided an important link with other film makers. "Our work is such an isolating experience, to be able to talk to other film makers at these parties is like therapy."

Despite the apparent growing pains experienced by the expanding festival, it remained the most important single festival for the independent film maker in the United States, said Lawrence Smith, who has worked as a festival programmer for all of the past 10 years.

"It's still the best way to meet and communicate with other film makers," he said. "I love it."

'Platoon' tops list of new video releases

Top new video releases making a debut on the market this week, include top money makers from last year.

Oliver Stone's movie of his experiences during the Vietnam War, "Platoon," was more of a public event than an artistic success. The movie crystallized many of the public's unresolved emotions about the war, and in a sense it offered a kind of mass catharsis and an opportunity to reopen the subject for debate.

For his efforts Stone won the Oscar for best director, and the film took the best-picture award as well.

Other titles that made stars of Charlie Sheen and Tom Berenger, in spectacularly well-made, especially sequences of the close-in jungle fighting, and what Stone manages to convey most vividly is his need to deal with the experience of the war.

"PLATOON," R, 1987, 111 minutes, HBO Video, \$99.95.

Peter Weller plays, 'Robocop,' a cop's cop who is shot to ribbons,

then rises from the dead — a bionic Lazarus who hunts down not only his killers but the creator who resurrected his body while attempting to murder his memory.

Dutch director Paul Verhoeven of "The Fourth Man" directed this, his first American feature, with sanguine pizzazz, achieving a ripping pace and a blood-curdling, darkly comic eloquence. This sleek sci-fi thriller is set in the murky, crime-ridden Detroit of 1991, and with its droll underpinnings and stunning images, it is to the cyborgs of the Motor City what "Blade Runner" was to the androids of L.A.

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Michaels gets Super Bowl help from experienced color analysts

A world-wide audience will tune in on Sunday, Jan. 31, to watch the drama of Super Bowl XXII unfold at San Diego's Jack Murphy Stadium. ABC's pre-game coverage starts at 2 p.m., with kickoff scheduled at approximately 4 p.m.

The play-by-play will be done by ABC's versatile Al Michaels, a veteran announcer who is used to working in pressure-packed situations. He tends to follow the philosophy of the late sportswriter Jimmy Cannon, who termed sports "The toy department of life." But his work in the "toy department" has always been marked by a serious professional demeanor. He has been selected as "Sportscaster of the Year" twice (1983 and 1986), he is a regular on "Monday Night Football," and he has broadcast the World Series. But this is Michaels' first Super Bowl assignment.

It is also the first Super Bowl assignment of one of his color analysts, Dan Dierdorf, a six-time all-pro who spent his entire 13-year professional career with the lowly St. Louis Cardinals. Dierdorf began working as a radio broadcaster in St. Louis while he was still a player and stepped up his broadcasting activities following his 1984 retirement. He joined CBS Sports as a play-by-play announcer in 1985, switched to color analysis in

1986, and moved over to ABC's "Monday Night Football" in 1987.

The second color analyst, however, is an old pro at this kind of thing. He's Frank Gifford, who led the New York Giants to an NFL championship in 1956 (in the days before Super Bowls), has been a regular on "Monday Night Football" since its second season in 1971, and has been involved in all the ABC-broadcast Super Bowls (the three networks have rotated coverage) since then.

Super Bowl XXII will be a challenge for all three broadcasters. There are more camera angles to consider, which means greater interaction with the personnel in the truck. And absolute concentration is needed if Michaels is to keep an even flow of commentary between himself, Gifford and Dierdorf. The camaraderie that this trio has shared on "Monday Night Football" ought to make the task easier. But they will be right in the goldfish bowl, as fans in more than 50 countries watch, listen and judge.

Their load will be lightened considerably if they find themselves

broadcasting a closely contested game, such as 1971's Super Bowl V, which capped off the first year of the merger between the NFL and the AFL. In that game, the Baltimore Colts, who had given the AFL credibility two years earlier, by losing to the AFL's New York Jets in Super Bowl III, defeated the Dallas Cowboys, 16-13, at the Orange Bowl in Miami. Super Bowl V also showed what the game means to players. In one of the few dramatic Super Bowls, first-year kicker Jim O'Brien's 32-yard field goal with five seconds remaining settled a fierce struggle between two evenly matched teams. As O'Brien was mobbed by his teammates, Cowboys all-pro defensive tackle Bob Lilly ripped his helmet off and tossed it with disgust.

interestingly, she seems to be deferential to the musical gifts of her well-regarded spouse. His special diet plus all that exercise has given Joe a definite edge as a comedian, Piscopo tells me.

Q: I found the movie "Wall Street" riveting in its depiction of the darker side of the business world. Since there was something vaguely reminiscent about the movie, I was wondering whether producer-director Oliver Stone was influenced by other films. — G.N.

A: Oliver Stone is the first to admit that there are strains of earlier movies running throughout "Wall Street," which stars Michael Douglas, Charlie Sheen, Daryl Hannah and Martin Sheen. Stone told me that he's long had a fascination for finance and Wall Street (his dad was a stockbroker). Stone's perceptions were sharply molded by pictures seen in his youth, such as "Executive Suite," "Patterns," "The Big Knife" and "Sweet Smell of Success" — all of which focused on the frequently ruthless and greedy underbelly of the power community.

Q: Any basis for those rumors about Madonna falling in love with John Kennedy Jr., President Kennedy's son? — A.R.

A: Not much. Seems that John and Madonna belong to the same New York health club. As you might expect, it's a swanky setup; one of the plushiest gyms in the city. Members have their own dressing rooms.

complete with showers and telephones. John and Madonna meet occasionally in the place. Despite all the rumors of romance, I'm told that there's nothing more between the couple than occasional grunts and pleasantries exchanged while doing leg lifts.

Q: I was impressed with the fantastic sets and apparent attention to historical detail brought into play for "Empire of the Sun," Steven Spielberg's movie epic that replicates the Japanese takeover of Shanghai following their bombing of Pearl Harbor. Is the film accurate? — D.K.

A: Mostly accurate, I'd say, although some slip-ups are bound to creep in despite the painstaking attention to detail. One interesting example is a scene showing a huge poster of the movie "Gone with the Wind." The poster depicts Vivien Leigh, with a sexily heaving bosom, being carried by Clark Gable up a staircase. Q: A newspaper feature about "The Phantom of the Opera," the Broadway mega-hit, devoted mucho space to the key scene where a huge chandelier crashes down onto the Paris Opera audience. The article refers to the strange circumstances surrounding the chandelier in the 1943 movie. Was that light fixture haunted, or something? — A.L.

A: Nothing quite that bizarre. When that version, starring Claude Rains, was in production, it was during World War II years, when

government strictures made the construction of such an elaborate chandelier (virtually the film's most important prop) impossible due to the high priority of lead used in crystals, which was vital to the war effort. Universal Pictures, which produced the film, asked its employees to round up cast-off crystal earrings, necklaces, lamps, goblets and assorted decorative objects. Once salvaged, studio workshops created the ornate, impressive chandelier seen in the movie — a monument to the studio's ingenuity. Apparently, the one used in the stage musical is just as spectacular, though sans the dramatic history.

Q: What's this about singer Vic Damone and actress Diahann Carroll having marital difficulties? — L.R.

A: Vic, who's pushing 60, recently suffered his second kidney stone attack. Damone's hospitalization kept him from participating in Bob Hope's celebrity USO tour. Diahann remained at Vic's side at the hospital and — after his speedy recovery — at an Arizona singing engagement. Both professionally and personally, the Damones are virtually inseparable, if not on cloud nine.

Q: We hear that ever since her divorce from Sylvester Stallone, Brigitte Nielsen has gone overboard in the sexpot department. Has she made any X-rated movies? — J.G.

A: It's true that Brigitte is no stranger to nudity before the cameras. But, she tells me, she poses nude "with style." No sleazy porno for her. Nielsen has been pursuing a singing career in Europe.

Genesse brings 'bad boy' vigor to clean-cut 'Bold and Beautiful'

Ah, the young men on "The Bold and the Beautiful" — handsome, clean-cut, clear-eyed, straight out of modeling class. Perfect white bread, answering to silly names like Ridge, Storm and Thorne.

Beautiful men, and boring. No wonder a bouncy kid called Rocco, so proud of his ridiculous spiked hair, gets all the mail.

From the other side of the tracks, on his own since age 13, street-smart Rocco has all the fun on "B and B." Because he's a Kung Fu specialist, Rocco even kicks a few thugs around while protecting Donna Logan (Carrie Mitchum).

The white-bread boys seem to be above any rough stuff. All they do is glow, mope about love and display the old profile.

Since the show concerns families in the Los Angeles fashion business, street-smart kids in outrageous clothes hardly belong. At least, that was producer Bill Bell's original game plan. Then Bell and the writers saw Bryan Genesse audition in New York and knew this kid had to be in the show.

So Rocco was born. As the writers watched Bryan on camera, they picked up on his tricks, such as Kung Fu, the wild hair and all that wonderful vitality. Instead of being the outsider carrying a chip on his shoulder, Rocco grew into a guiding force, counseling Donna to return home and studying business at night school while working in the Forrester fashion outfit.

Clearly, Rocco is going places. But Bell doesn't say where, preferring to let the Canadian actor play it day by day. Genesse doesn't know whether Rocco will rise through sales or design, but he will be on top long before the well-meaning Forrester sons.

In Toronto over the holidays, Bryan was spotted in a mall. One bold youngster yelled out, "You're a bad imitation of Rocco." Realizing Bryan was the genuine article, the kid took it all back.

Word got around in Toronto, that night in a club, a pair of bouncers stood guard to keep the admirer in place.

"When I want winter, I go home," says Bryan in Hollywood, referring to Toronto and his nearby home town of Welland.

A kid who knew he just had to be an actor, Bryan attacked New York City at 18, quickly landed an agent and, among other things, made the movie "Loose Screws" for Roger Corman. He spent only two months as a waiter.

Two years later, here he is in a Hollywood soap, brimming over with energy and good humor.

"I don't think people laugh enough," says Genesse. "We're all too gloomy."

As Rocco, he intends to change that.

There is a tradition of continuity in Hollywood. Deborah H. Quayle, who plays Carrie Davis on "Loving," spends much of her spare time watching old Barbara Stanwyck movies on videotape. This isn't just out of love for the femme fatale; actually, Deborah's mother, Helen Hansen, was Stanwyck's double in her movies of the '40s. Deborah watches the movies with an eye to picking out her mother in those scenes in which Stanwyck's back is turned. Still, all this exposure to Stanwyck's charms has rubbed off a bit. It seems Deborah's soap opera

persona is more than a little influenced by Stanwyck's classic performances.

'48 Hours' is entertaining but has short attention span

HOLLYWOOD (L.A. Times) — Calling Dr. Dan. Calling Dr. Dan.

It moved and grooved, it dappled and hypered, it lathered and Rathered: It was happy and snappy, teary and bleary. It was breezy. It was swift. It was nimble. It was musical. It was exciting. It was conversational and improvisational. It was motion and emotion, action and traction.

It was a swell time; popcorn time, show time.

In short, Tuesday's debut of "48 Hours," the new CBS News prime-time series devoting an hour each week to a single subject — was a microcosm of much of TV news itself, a chain of lickety-split impressions with no core.

Very entertaining, not very illuminating. It was like a Frederick Wiseman.

Headed by anchorman Dan Rather, an army of CBS News personnel spent two days monitoring Parkland Memorial Hospital in Dallas — from intensive care to volunteer clowns — and came away with a stunted, choppy, high-tech version of the famed *Waltz* documentary of the same hospital. CBS used all that everyone in this but its leader

pected to see William Paley empty bedpans.

The hour was threaded by the ongoing drama of a Thai man undergoing brain surgery, but otherwise the individually-reported pieces were too abrupt to convey anything beyond feelings — the predictable joys and traumas you would expect to find at any hospital. These were mainly punctuation marks without sentences. Helper without hamburger. They made "60 Minutes" segments seem like marathon documentaries.

For example, you wanted to hear so much more about the stress on intensive care nurses.

"I don't wanna get involved," said one. "I don't wanna be sad when that patient dies." Another noted that "AIDS alone is enough to scare you out of (nursing)."

But just as Bernard Goldberg's piece became fascinating, it ended. Time to move on.

Richard Roth's piece on the hospital's fiscal bottom line ran into the same brick wall. Soon after hearing that some still-groggy surgical patients are released without staying the night — appearing to raise all kinds of ethical questions — we heard another reporter on a different topic.

'48 Hours' offers realism

NEW YORK (AP) — Viewers turned voyeurs as CBS took them inside a big-city hospital for two days and two nights in the premiere of the weekly news show "48 Hours."

The show will offer the same right-there look at a different story each week, unanitized, without analysis nor pronouncements from on high. The broadcast was inspired by the network's documentary, "48 Hours on Crack Street."

The premiere spent 48 hours in Parkland Hospital, famous as the place where President John F. Kennedy was pronounced dead.

The fast-paced hour was a rush of images and snatches of dialogue:

A 16-month-old baby who has quit breathing recovers. A 77-year-old woman dies of cardiac arrest. A man comes in complaining of an overdose of an over-the-counter pain reliever. Another faces brain surgery to save his life.

Woman in delivery room: "Hurry! It's coming!"

Doctor: "OK, four births in the last five minutes. This is more typical of the Parkland we know and love."

Reporter interviewing nurse in the intensive care unit: "I'm listening to this lady wail and it's affecting me."

Nurse: "We're terrible people, aren't we?"

Reporter: "Are you afraid you're going to sound cold?"

Nurse: "Yeah."

Another nurse: "To tell you the truth, if I had it to do over I wouldn't have gone into nursing."

Future subjects might not be as dramatic as the hospital, but CBS News hopes the show will lend itself to breaking news stories when appropriate. CBS News already has shot 48 hours at Denver's Stapleton International Airport, and 48 hours in Miami.

It has a tough time period, opposite ABC's hit comedies. But viewers with a thirst for realism might find themselves addicted to "48 Hours."

Prime time soaps change format

HOLLYWOOD (L.A. Times) — The long-running soap operas "Dallas" and "Falcon Crest," plagued by declining ratings, are planning to drop their serial format to become episodic dramas if the shows are renewed by CBS for the 1988-89 television season.

CBS' other prime-time soap, "Knots Landing," will maintain its serial format, but will feature shorter story lines than it has in the past, bridging a few episodes rather than a full season, executive producer David Jacobs confirmed.

Those involved in the programs, all of which are produced by Lorimar Television, downplayed the question of whether prime-time soap operas are still viable, saying the changes are being made to freshen these well-worn series and for several economic reasons, including boosting their value in syndication.

Leonard Katzman, executive producer of "Dallas," who proposed the new format, said he did not do so because of slipping ratings or because the soap genre is dying, but because "the show is 'getting long in the tooth' and simply needed a fresh approach."

Lorimar's confirmation of its new approach comes on the heels of recent statements by CBS programming chief Kim LeMasters and his NBC counterpart, Brandon Tartikoff, that the night-time serial genre — the most popular on the air just a few years ago — is in trouble.

LeMasters told TV critics last week at CBS' semi-annual press tour that the prime-time soap may have been rendered obsolete by dramas such as "L.A. Law," which features both one-episode stories and stories that continue over several episodes.

Audiences for all four prime-time soap operas — the three on CBS and ABC's "Dynasty" — are down this season compared to last, ranging from 7.5 percent for "Knots Landing" to 18.8 percent for "Dallas." However, Arnold Becker, vice-president of research at CBS, said he attributes much of the decline to the changeover to a new audience measurement system this season and the rest to a normal dropoff in viewership as hit shows get older. Even with the ratings decline,

"Dallas," "Dynasty" and "Falcon Crest" continue to win their time periods, and "Knots Landing" runs second.

If CBS renews its three, as seems likely, 1988-89 will be their sixteenth season for "Dallas," the 10th for "Knots Landing" and the eighth for "Falcon Crest."

After Katzman proposed the format change for "Dallas," Lorimar thought it might improve "Falcon Crest's" performance as well. And the network was delighted with the idea, said Barbara Broglia, vice president of corporate communications at Lorimar.

"We tested it with audiences and they loved it," she said. "We think it's a very creative idea that everybody is excited about."

In the case of "Dallas," Katzman noted that it had started out as an episodic drama, then it gradually became a serial, which is when it really got hot. We now have done 10 years of that, and it changed the viewing habits of America. And we can do it again — but not by continuing in the vein we were in.

"I'm not sure that the (serial) form has necessarily run its course, but all the shows that are in that genre that are on now have been on for quite awhile, and you necessarily use up a lot of material," he added.

Katzman said the episodic format will give "Dallas" writers a chance to use guest stars for one episode rather than having to add a new character to the cast in order to bring him or her into the story. One possibility, he suggested, would be to have the character of Bobby Ewing, who was a high school basketball star, involved in one episode about the death of his coach and needing to find the coach's daughter

to convey a deathbed message. Guest stars playing both coach and daughter would only be needed once.

The episodic form would also allow series principals, whose salaries have escalated astronomically over the years, to appear in fewer episodes, thus saving money for Lorimar.

Katzman added that freelance script writers with fresh story ideas will now be able to write for the show instead of relying on staff writers to create a continuing plot that puts a principal character in crisis every week.

"How many times can you have Bobby and Pam move in and out of South Fork (the Ewing family ranch)?" he asked.

Katzman believes contained stories make each episode more viable for summer re-runs; serial dramas have performed unusually poorly in repeats and both "Dallas" and "Knots Landing" have not been aired in the summer at all in recent years. It also offers the company more options for selling the programs into syndication, since episodes will not have to be run in sequence.

"Knots Landing" producer Jacobs said that his show has been moving toward shorter story lines because, "My own unscientific opinion is that it was sometimes hard to follow a 'Knots Landing' story" so new viewers did not begin watching and tended not to return to the show if they missed it one week for a special program on another channel. He said shorter stories might encourage new viewers to tune in because of its subject or a certain guest star.

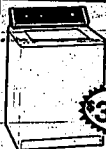

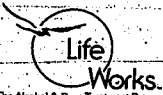

This really proved hairy and scary, because these animals were obviously on a different frequency. The atmosphere suddenly became extremely volatile; though I did my utmost to work with the substitutes, it wasn't easy." By the way, the new team is still in the film and can be spotted by an acute pair of eyes.

Q: It's common knowledge that Hollywood stars are usually obliged to change their

real names for professional purposes. Can you mention any big names who actually were allowed to hang onto the names they were born with? — F.L.

A: Many, many. Just a few examples are Shirley Temple, Lee Remick, Burt Lancaster, Christopher Reeve, Ava Gardner, Joseph Cotten, Henry Fonda, Angela Lansbury and James Stewart — all of whose names were considered euphonious enough to let stand by Hollywood's monicker-masters.
