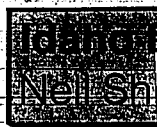
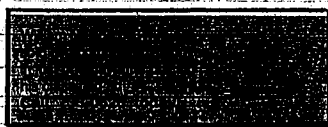
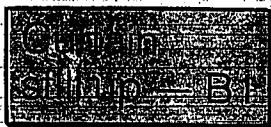

Drug charges name Noriega

Federal law enforcement officials said Noriega was indicted Thursday by federal grand juries in Miami and Tampa, Fla., on charges of racketeering, cocaine trafficking and money laundering. The indictments, which have been long expected, were sealed by a federal magistrate, but the U.S. attorneys in the two cities scheduled announcements for today.

Officials said one of the indictments focuses in part on Noriega's dealings with Cuban leader Fidel Castro, who reportedly mediated a 1984 business dispute between the Panamanian and members of a Colombian drug cartel.

Noriega was quoted by CBS News as dismissing the indictment as "strictly political."

Noriega, who leads Panama's national guard, has turned himself into a virtual dictator in his strategic country, which includes the 48-mile-long canal between the Atlantic and Pacific.

In secret studies prepared before the decision, the State Department and CIA laid out a range of possible Panamanian reactions to the indictments, from an anti-Noriega coup by military dissidents to a political reprisal by Noriega against U.S. military and diplomatic facilities in the nation.

\$48 million falls short of tab for easements

Protecting SNRA views costly procedure

TWIN FALLS — Since 1972, the U.S. Forest Service has spent \$48 million acquiring 77 scenic easements in the Sawtooth National Recreation Area near Ketchum and it will require more money to complete the process, said Sawtooth National Forest officials.

The forest service also lacks the management tools to protect the scenic easements it has acquired, according to a forest service management review of the SNRA conducted last year.

A scenic easement is a contract in perpetuity between a private landowner and the forest service to preserve views or allow public access to some private areas such as banks of the Salmon River.

The review points to continued problems related to public and private conflicts in the SNRA.

"This is a great deal more expensive than ever anticipated and it

has become a bidding game by private landowners," said Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho.

There is a real question about whether these easements can be enforced, he said.

The property owner still controls the land. Many of the landowners have doubled and tripled the total value of property," Craig said.

Craig formed a citizen advisory committee last November to study whether it made sense to shift management of the SNRA to the National Parks Service. Craig wants to increase the tourism potential of the SNRA, that Craig says by the forest service's own admission is mismanaged.

The notion of national park status for the SNRA got a flat rejection last year in southern Idaho with conservation groups and outfitters saying they preferred leaving the area under forest service direction. Craig's first district does

not even include the SNRA.

In a poll of Craig took of his constituents 67 percent said they would leave the Sawtooth/White Cloud area alone while 46 percent said they would opt either for a national park or a combination national park/recreation area.

The idea of national park in the Sawtooths has been considered and rejected before. One reason for rejection in recent years is parks service management is perceived by some Idahoans as being too restrictive. People said they wanted to continue traditional activities such as hunting and grazing. However, Craig said grazing would be possible in a national park today.

The SNRA was created by Congress on Aug. 22, 1972, to assure preservation and protection of natural, scenic, historic, pastoral and fish and wildlife values. Another objective was to enhance recreation. Grazing and hunting are allowed in the SNRA, one of a

Gem court hears case on lottery

BOISE — The 1986 lottery initiative approved by more than 60 percent of Idaho voters was not an independent authorization of a state lottery, but a legislative act violating a constitutional ban on lotteries, says an attorney seeking to void the initiative.

There was no silent revolution in the fall of 1912 in Idaho," Boise attorney Steve Thomas argued Thursday before the state Supreme Court. "No fourth department of government was formed by the initiative amendment."

Thomas was representing Russel Westerberg and the Associated Taxpayers of Idaho Inc., which filed one of two lawsuits in January 1987 challenging the constitutionality of the lottery initiative.

The other suit, which was consolidated with the first, was filed by Help Idaho Thrive and Idaho Allied Christian Forces Inc. Both name Gov. Cecil Andrus and the Idaho State Lottery Commission, which was formed by the lottery initiative.

The Idaho Supreme Court heard arguments Thursday on an appeal of 4th District Judge Gerald Schroeder's decision last March agreeing with those challenges.

The court's deliberations come as Idaho prepares for next November's vote on a constitutional amendment approved by the 1987 Legislature that would allow a lottery, regardless of the fate of the initiative.

John Kurtz, the private attorney handling the lottery case for the state, said the amendment to the Idaho Constitution approved in

Demos to offer Contra aid plan

WASHINGTON — Congressional Democrats who deal with the issue were slow to President Reagan's Central America policy but got Thursday to produce an alternative that will sustain the Nicaraguan Contra rebels while stimulating regional peace efforts with promises of economic development aid.

There was no make-sure those who were into this battle are not left high and dry," said House Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas. He promised to bring a new package of purely humanitarian aid for the Contras up for action within three weeks.

The House, with only a dozen Republicans in the majority, voted 219-211 Wednesday night to kill Reagan's request for \$38.2 million in new aid for the rebels fighting Nicaragua's leftist Sandinista government.

The package included arms, radio and other logistical military support as well as food, clothing and medicine. Weapons and ammunition accounted for only \$1.8 million of the total but were at the root of the opposition.

Despite the death of the president's package, the Senate went through the motions of a debate Thursday that gave senators the opportunity to speak and vote on the issue. The lawmakers voted 51 to 48 in support of the plan, but the vote was purely symbolic and had no binding effect.

The White House issued a statement late Thursday saying

has reaffirmed its belief in the freedom fighters in Nicaragua.

This vote sends an important signal to the Sandinista government that American leaders remain concerned about the peace process and will be watching its progress very carefully," said presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater.

White House may decide to declassify Meese note

WASHINGTON — The Reagan administration may decide to declassify a memo to Attorney General Edwin Meese, III that mentions a payoff plan involving an Israeli political party, the independent counsel investigating Meese disclosed Thursday.

Independent counsel James McKay met last Friday with White House officials and "freed assurances" that every effort would be made to minimize any encumbrances on his investigation stemming from classified information, McKay's office said in a statement.

On Wednesday night, White House counsel Arthur G. Sulzberger Jr. told McKay that an interagency task force would be formed to "review and reassess the classification of any information related to his investigation," said McKay's statement.

The task force would have the authority to override an earlier State Department recommendation to McKay that the document, written in mid-1985 by longtime Meese friend Robert Wallach to the attorney general, be classified.

Meese has refused to discuss the memo or the grounds that it is classified and the document is a central part of McKay's criminal investigation of Meese.

Twigg claimed \$354 million was the maximum commitment the state could make to public schools without a major tax increase. Couples sue over failed sale

BOISE (AP) — Two eastern Idaho couples have filed a federal lawsuit seeking more than \$2 million from a Kansas man they contend used fraud to convince them to sell him their businesses.

The complaint was filed Wednesday in U.S. District Court in Boise by Cole and Ellen Clement of Lewistown and T. Ross and Louise Clement of Idaho Falls.

They contend Ronald E. Sexton of Shawnee Mission, Kan., intentionally misled them into signing a memorandum of intent on Aug. 14, 1986, to sell their businesses to Sexton's Franklin Investment Group Ltd.

The Clements control, through stock ownership, Idaho Fresh-Pak Inc., Lewistown Investment Co. and Golden Valley Packers Inc.

The sale to Sexton apparently fell through.

Group contests garbage fee

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The Kootenai County Property Owners Association has made good on its promise to appeal a lawsuit against the county over a solid-waste disposal fee.

Association attorney Roland Watson has asked the Idaho Supreme Court to overturn a Dec. 22 district court ruling dismissing the group's claim that the fee was an unconstitutional tax.

Watson said that although 1st District Court Judge Richard Magnuson ruled against the association, "case law elsewhere in the state is in our favor."

The association alleged in a lawsuit filed in 1986 that the \$64 solid-waste disposal fee county commissioners established in November 1984 was an ad valorem tax and a general-revenue-raising measure in violation of the state constitution.

Plea made for investigation

BOISE (AP) — A Canyon County man wheeled his paralyzed wife into the governor's office here Thursday, asking Gov. Cecil Andrus to look into the county's handling of a traffic accident when left his wife crippled.

Mike Hart, 54, alleged that Canyon County's handling of the accident was "reckless, inept and irresponsible" because the other driver involved was not charged with anything more serious than reckless driving.

He asked for an "in-depth and thorough" investigation of the way the case was handled.

Mike Mitchell, Andrus' chief of staff, received a package of letters and other material from Hart. He immediately asked Mack Richardson, director of the Department of Law Enforcement, to investigate and make a recommendation within two weeks.

Hart's wife, Rosalinda, who was 35 at the time, was critically injured April 4, 1986, in traffic accident in a Canyon County country road intersection near Nampa.

Tax breaks fail to get break from panel

BOISE (AP) — Tax breaks, even for industrial development, or to keep businesses in Idaho, did not win favor Thursday from the House tax committee.

The Revenue and Taxation Committee twice rejected proposals from Rep. James "Doc" Lucas, R-Moscow, to grant property tax breaks.



Lucas asked the committee to approve introduction of legislation granting the Appalachian Club of Moscow exemption from personal and real property taxes. He said it would cost about \$27,000 per year in county tax revenue.

Last year, when the organization was considering moving its headquarters and 60 jobs from Latah County, Lucas said he asked Lt. Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter to lobby members of the organization to stay.

He said Otter promised club officials he would seek legislation granting a tax break if the organization remained in Idaho. He said the city of Indianapolis offered tax concessions and \$60,000 in relocation

expensed if the club would move to that city.

"It's a \$3 million industry, the kind we like, with no smokestacks," said Lucas.

The issue is settled, and club members voted to remain in Idaho, Lucas said.

To fulfill Otter's promise, he introduced the committee to print and introduce the legislation.

"If there anything else we could do to encourage them to stay in the state," asked Rep. Golden Linford, R-Rexburg.

Rep. Harold Reid, D-Craigmont, said it was wrong for the Legislature to be thinking about granting special tax breaks to an existing company.

"A commitment was made. We are honoring that commitment by introducing this legislation," said Rep. Robert Fry, R-Horseshoe Bend.

Reid said Otter had no authority to say legislation would be introduced. "There is no authority to do that other than by a majority vote of this body," he said.

Rep. Claud Judd, D-Orfino, tried to get the resolution introduced but couldn't get a second to his motion.

On a voice vote, the committee ordered the proposal returned to Lucas.

The same fate also befell a second Lucas proposal.

Parents, police, officials question driving age

BOISE (AP) — Police, parents and school officials are urging a state Senate committee to endorse legislation raising Idaho's legal driving age to 16.

"What we're asking is that you help us protect our children," Carolyn McCarter, the mother of a 13-year-old, told the Senate Transportation Committee on Thursday.

The panel put off a vote after a 90-minute hearing on the issue. But Chairman C.K. Smyser, R-Parma, said the bill would be considered early next week, predicting it would be sent to the full Senate for approval.

Leaders seek chaplain funds

BOISE (AP) — A coalition of Idaho legislative leaders is petitioning legislative budget writers to ensure that future funds to staff the new prison chapel are not diverted to other purposes.

"We need a chaplain more than ever... to be a contact between the men and the outside," Orville Stiles told the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee on Thursday.

The House-Senate panel called the special hearing after members expressed anger that Corrections Director Al Murphy decided to divert the \$40,000 earmarked last winter for a full-time chaplain and additional security at the new prison chapel to cover additional operating expenses at the prison.

"We were all quite concerned that the Department of Corrections did not in fact fill those positions that were authorized last year," Rep. Brent Broeksome, R-Boise, said. "I was as shocked as others to find those positions were not filled."

Stiles presented the committee with petitions bearing hundreds of signatures demanding that the chapel, which was privately financed, be staffed full-time for use by inmates at the main prison.

In addition to offering spiritual counseling to inmates, Stiles said a full-time chaplain "can be very valuable inside a prison" because both inmates and prison authorities can use him as a go-between to head off potential trouble.

Kennedy nomination will enhance court

After one of the most partisan and intense battles last fall over the nomination of Judge Robert Bork to the U.S. Supreme Court, the unanimous approval Wednesday of Judge Anthony Kennedy to the position was anti-climactic.

This nomination ended with a whimper, not a bang. Kennedy won appointment by a 97 to 0 vote, with even Senate liberals like Sen. Edward Kennedy of Massachusetts echoing his praises.

Recent Supreme Court nominees have had a way of turning out to be more pragmatic and less ideological than their appointing presidents would sometimes like, and it is clear that Justice Kennedy was not, to many in the administration, "pure" enough in ideological terms.

But what was a liability to Ed Meese and Patrick Buchanan was an advantage to the majority of moderates with whom the decision rested in the Senate.

They had drawn a line in the dust over the appointment of Bork and Douglas Ginsburg, and the administration took the clear hint that no one much to the right of center had much of a chance.

The question now is what kind of Supreme Court justice Kennedy will make. By his record, he is a man of both moderation and literal interpretation of the Constitution, but not a hard-liner, who would dismantle its protections on human rights.

He is no proponent of the police state which Meese and many prosecutors would create; he knows that the role of the police is not just to put people in jail, but to do justice. In short, he is a man to whom the balance of protections is primary.

In these times, in which special interests and narrow perspectives dominate American politics from the courthouse to the halls of Congress, he is likely to bring both judgment and wisdom to decisions.

That would be a fitting end to a bitter battle:

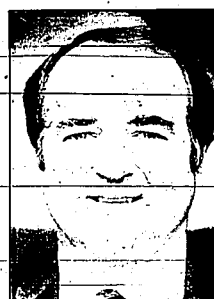

In our democratic process in which the educational system is publicly supported, we have no other choice but to come to our patrons for financial support and approval.

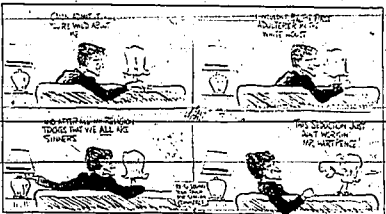

Many qualified persons could sit on Transportation Board

Idaho law is very clear. No more than two of the three members of the Idaho Transportation Board may be of the same political party.

The law exists for very good reasons. With millions of dollars to spend on potentially lucrative contracts and with intense individual, local and regional interest in road projects, Departments of Transportation, in Idaho and throughout the nation, have historically been the focus of the scurrilous side of politics.

You do not have to be around Idaho government very long to hear stories about the "good old days" when promises of the right road project (or sometimes a good paying state job) were instrumental in gaining the votes to pass key legislative proposals.

In Idaho, in the late 1950s, under the leadership of Gov. Len Jordan, the legal framework was created to minimize, as much as possible, political influence within the highway transportation system.

A three-member citizens board was created with the provision that no more than two members of one party could sit on the board as a means of insuring a bipartisan approach and that both major political parties would be represented to keep an eye on each other.

The first chairman of that board was a man of impeccable integrity, Rosco Rich Sr. of Burley. For the most part, the system has worked well ever since. In recent years the board has been comprised of two Democrats and Republican Lloyd Barron, Fairfield, Mr. Barron, after yeoman service, will step down this month.

In January, after appointing the Senate Democratic majority leader as the new administrative director of the Department of Transportation, Governor Andrus

announced he would submit to the state Senate the name of Marvin Aslett to take the place of the one Republican, Mr. Barron.

Mr. Aslett was not the candidate submitted to the governor by the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, but rather was sponsored by the Associated General Contractors of Idaho.

It is the role of the state Senate to advise and consent to the nomination of such appointments. While the spirit of the law clearly intends that both major parties be represented on the Transportation Board, technically conformance might be met with the two existing Democrats and the Independent, there would then be no more than two members of one political party on the board.

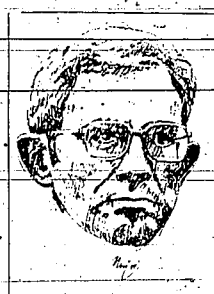
Could the Senate find evidence that Mr. Aslett was at least an Independent? "A source close to Mr. Aslett advised Twin Falls Republican Chairman Mark Stubbs that the nominee

had contributed several thousand dollars to the campaign of Senator Steve Symms and President Reagan. The senator's staff could find no records of such contributions."

Further, a check of federal records in Washington, D.C., showed heavy donations to Governor Andrus, John Evans, and the Ted Kennedy for President campaign. Mr. Aslett's company also donated to the Frank Church campaign.

No support for any Republican could be found. In talks with Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce last week, he offered no further evidence, according to my discussions with chamber officers.

A letter then was provided to Mr. Stubbs indicating that Mr. Aslett had been invited to join an "inner circle" U.S. senatorial group in Washington, D.C. Officials close to Senator McClure advised me that such letters do not indicate post support for Republicans, but are often part of broad mailings designed to

solicit new money into campaign coffers.

So there we have it. When confronted with the evidence, Mr.

Aslett, who enjoys the reputation of a capable and honorable man, asked the governor to withdraw his name.

At no time did the governor or I wish to discuss the matter with senators from Twin Falls County or the chairman of the transportation committee.

We might hope that the citizens of the Magic Valley, and particularly those who have worked so hard and so effectively to stimulate economic development for our area, might enjoy at least the same standing with the governor as the Associated General Contractors.

If the governor is sincere about representation for our area on the Transportation Board, there are many well qualified individuals who will meet the requirements of the law.

I am a deaf person and have lived most of my life in the Magic Valley. I was a student at the Idaho State School for the Deaf and the Blind in Gooding. The experiences I had there were good, but they did not realistically prepare me to function as a deaf adult in a hearing world.

I was not an outstanding student and I take credit for my lack of studying and attentiveness in school, but I don't feel that the opportunity to develop my potentials to their fullest was stressed or offered at the ISSDB.

I am an intelligent person but it may not

seem that way as judged by the hearing majority. My written English skills are poor. I had to have help putting these words in the right English order.

I don't feel I belong here some days because I can't communicate or speak in English as well as hearing people. It's real frustrating to live in a world of silence sometimes. Maybe if my abilities were developed in English as well as American Sign Language as a child at the ISSDB, I wouldn't be treated and feel like such an outsider today.

There are no easy solutions to the many problems a deaf person experiences. I'm not

wishing the world to fix the world for me, but I would like to see the ISSDB as well as others in Magic Valley to support our basic need to communicate through more closed caption TV or interpreters for local news. Whether you choose to acknowledge our existence and special needs is up to you as the hearing majority. But we are here, we are deaf and we have experiences and ideas to share with you that you could benefit from. Please stop ignoring us and our special needs. We're like to belong with you, in our own special way. This begins with communication that is understood by us.

Bill with noble-sounding intent would legislate indifference

BOISE — Maybe Attorney General Jim Jones is right or all. Maybe Idahoans don't need to know when their next door neighbor has been brutally murdered. Maybe it is none of their business. But it does seem odd.

Although I was a child at the time, I remember very vividly the news years ago that a woman was beaten and murdered in New York as she pleaded for help to people watching from their windows. No-

body lifted a telephone to call police. It was national news at the time, and it shocked people in the small town in Colorado where my family lived.

Imagine not knowing your neighbors well enough to want to help. Imagine turning a blind eye to someone in need. Imagine not feeling a shred of civic duty.

Now the attorney general of the state of Idaho, a state still small enough where people know their neighbors, wants to legislate indifference.

Jones introduced a bill this week that at first glance appears to fly in the face of human nature, although the intent sounds noble.

Jones wants to protect victims of crimes and witnesses of crimes from having their names splashed across the front pages of newspapers.

Jones argues follows the lines that if a person has been victimized by a crime, murdered for example, that person has suffered enough.

So Jones is suggesting victims' rights bill to shut off public access to police records. Jones' bill would

prohibit police from releasing the names, addresses and phone numbers of victims and witnesses.

What that means is that if your next door neighbor is murdered, and 10 police cars rush to the scene with their lights flashing, and you venture outside to find out what's going on, forget it. It's none of your business. Go back in your house. Draw the blinds. Watch Wheel of Fortune.

Now, let's just suppose, the police come knocking on your door to ask if you heard anything unusual the night before.

"Excuse me, my name is Sgt. O'Malley, and I'm inquiring about one of your neighbors, who was killed. Could you tell me if you heard or saw anything strange yesterday?"

"Who was killed?"

"I'm sorry, I can't release that information. Would you please just answer the question."

"But where did it happen?"

"I'm sorry, I can't release that information. Would you please just answer the question. Did you know the victim personally? Did the person hang around with any suspicious characters?"

"Who?"

"The name, I can't tell you the name."

"I don't have any idea what you're

talking about."

"Thank you. I'll be going now." Presumably the public plays no useful function in helping police do their jobs.

Now, apparently, does the public have any right or need to know if there has been a rash of burglaries in their neighborhood.

From now on, the only news the

community needs to know is that a burglary was committed on Sunday in Twin Falls. It might have happened next door to you. It might have happened across town. Unless someone is captured and accused of the crime and brought to trial, you'll never know.

If Jones' bill is passed — and why wouldn't it be, it's a laudatory measure? — it would also make it difficult to find out if anything unseemingly happened to a public official. Say Jim Jones, for example.

If South American hoologans, for some reason, decide to kidnap the Attorney General of the State of Idaho and spirit him away to some place very, very bad, the police would not be allowed to tell the public.

So what are the secretaries in his office going to say if Jones doesn't show up for work for the next six months?

"I'm sorry. He has a cold." Or, "I'm sorry, the attorney general is indisposed."

But maybe you don't want to know. Maybe Idahoans have gotten to the point where they just don't want to hear any more bad news.

Maybe Idahoans just don't care what happens to their next door

neighbor or public servants like Jim Jones.

Maybe Jim Jones is right.

Idahoan explains his vote

Although I would rather have delayed the vote, given the choice, I must oppose the President's package.

For a long time now, I have supported a negotiated, peaceful settlement to the conflict in Nicaragua. Finally, we are starting to make progress.

I would strongly urge the President to supplement the Aries peace process by initiating direct, bilateral talks with the Sandinistas. In this effort, we can ensure that the Soviets are kept out of the region. This is a must.

A vote for military aid would short-circuit the progress and destroy the peace process. In that event, the Sandinistas would surely renege on the concessions offered thus far. This is not likely to be the final vote on this issue. The Sandinistas know that.

In the past weeks, the Sandinistas have taken important steps to implement the Aries peace plan, which was signed last August. Nobody can possibly know today whether the Sandinistas are sincere. We need more time before that decision can be made.

The Aries peace process is still evolving and results are now beginning to show. But it is premature to gauge its ultimate success.

The vote today is fraught with risk. The President is gambling that a vote for his package will not destroy the peace process.

In contrast, the House leadership is gambling that the Sandinistas will keep their promises and continue the progress toward democracy in Nicaragua despite the cut-off of military aid to the contras. At this point, I will bet on the latter.

Despite the rhetoric, we do not disagree about the goals. Earlier this week, I met with President Reagan and asked him directly whether he seeks to overthrow the Sandinista government. He said that he does not.

We agreed that our goal is to bring democracy to Nicaragua so that the people of Nicaragua, in free and fair elections, can decide who should run their government. The debate here, then, is only about the best way to achieve that goal.

It has only been in the last six months, since the peace plan was agreed to, that the Sandinistas have begun to make concessions.

While I don't deny that the contras have had an effect on the government, not even the Administration believes the contras can win the war.

It is a critical to recognize that the contras, without the peace plan, provide no hope of returning democracy to Nicaragua. The contras alone merely ensure a long-term conflict that continues the death, suffering and poverty of those people caught in the middle of the conflict.

A no vote does not abandon the contras. But other factors are more important, particularly the peace plan itself. The President's contra aid package violates a central element of the plan.

I am willing to provide additional humanitarian assistance, such as food, clothing, and other items. Those items can be distinguished from the 'non-lethal' aid in the President's package, which by definition includes such items as helicopters, jeeps and radios — instruments of war.

Rep. Richard Stallings, a Democrat from Rexburg, represents Idaho's Second Congressional District in Congress. On Wednesday, he proposed Contra aid package, which was defeated by a 219 to 211 vote.

Perle endorses arms treaty

WASHINGTON (AP) — Richard Perle, former Pentagon official and a leading arms control skeptic, said Thursday the Senate should ratify the new arms-reduction treaty with the Soviet Union but should not hesitate to change it first.

"Unlike some who argue that the treaty is politically and conceptually flawed, I believe it is sound in these respects and should be ratified," Perle said. "Indeed a failure to ratify the treaty could do grave harm to our political and security interests."

But Perle, who as assistant secretary of defense helped draft major provisions of the pact, said he doubts Soviet compliance with it can be adequately verified.

He urged the agreement be amended to permit the deployment of long-range cruise missiles with non-nuclear, conventional warheads.

But he said the Senate should reject "killer" amendments that would render the treaty unacceptable to the Soviets.

Bennett backs the classics

WASHINGTON (AP) — Higher education is losing credibility because of "faculty trashing of Plato and Shakespeare" in trendy, soft-headed courses that are displacing the classics, Secretary of Education William J. Bennett charged Thursday.

In a speech that drew sparks from college professors, Bennett warned that the nation's campuses are "at a crossroads (and) may soon face a day of reckoning."

The American people are beginning to wonder whether the emergence of the new university professor told 400 presidents and deans at the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities.

George A. Drake, president of Grinnell College in Iowa, told Bennett, "I suppose every one of us in this room has faculty members that we think speak nonsense."

"It wouldn't be a college or a university unless we provided an arena where nonsense could be spoken ... debated and, conceivably, refuted," said Drake. If the college atmosphere is right, "students will stand up in class and say it's nonsense."

Ladell Payne, president of Randolph-Macon College in Ashland, Va., said some of Bennett's criticisms were based on "misleading and inaccurate information."

They "leave us less than comfortable with the notion that you are seriously interested in the problems," Payne said.

Richard Bendisen, president of American University, said afterwards, "There are even a few government officials who say foolish things. I think I heard one this morning."

Markets seek reform chance

WASHINGTON (AP) — The heads of four major stock and futures exchanges said Thursday that Congress should give the markets a chance to reform themselves before imposing any new regulatory structure.

Executives from the American Stock Exchange, National Association of Securities Dealers, Chicago Mercantile Exchange and Chicago Board of Trade agreed that market officials and federal regulators ought to do a better job of coordinating policy.

But they asked the Senate Banking Committee to hold off before tinkering with the apportionment of power among federal agencies.

Increased regulatory coordination among markets is clearly needed and can be done within the existing regulatory framework," said Joseph R. Hardiman, president of the National Association of Securities Dealers, which runs the over-the-counter stock market.

The Securities and Exchange Commission regulates stock and stock options trading, the Commodity Futures Trading Commission oversees futures trading and the Federal Reserve Board sets margins — or borrowing limits — on buying stocks.

Auto dumping charge likely

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. automakers, quietly encouraged by the Reagan administration, are trying to prepare a major trade action accusing Japanese companies of illegally "dumping" vehicles by maintaining prices at artificially low levels, industry and government officials said Thursday.

They said the proposed challenge — likely to focus, at least initially, on sales of light-duty trucks, a fast-growing segment of the industry — will contend that Japanese companies have not raised prices enough to reflect the recent increase in the yen's value against the dollar.

The case could open the way to other major dumping cases based on exchange rate changes, rather than on more traditional grounds.

However, industry and congressional sources, speaking only on condition of anonymity, said the auto industry is having a hard time settling on tactics, and the precise form of the complaint has not yet been determined.

Auto company executives have been encouraged to file the action by top Reagan administration officials, including Commerce Secretary George William Verity, industry officials said. Verity has publicly warned Japan that it faced possible dumping charges if it continued to hold down import prices in the face of a rising yen.

Gardner visits sinking site

ANACORTES, Wash. (AP) — Gov. Booth Gardner and top environmental aides Thursday toured the shipping lane where a barge sank with a load of crude oil, and the governor said he wants strict safety conditions added to leases for offshore drilling.

Gardner said the oil spill in Rosario Strait illustrates why he is reluctant to see offshore drilling off the Northwest Coast.

He also said he and Oregon Gov. Neil Goldschmidt had just sent the Reagan administration a letter opposing certain leases for offshore drilling and seeking safety precautions added to any leases granted by Interior Secretary Donald Hodel.

Gardner said the effort to salvage the sunken barge appeared to be a responsible one, although a great amount of risk to the ecology of the inland waterway existed.

The barge, operated by Olympic Tug and Barge Co., sank Sunday about 80 miles north of Seattle in a busy shipping lane separating British Columbia and Washington state.

Motherhood law bogs down

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Efforts by legal and medical experts hoping to shape the future of surrogate motherhood on the heels of a New Jersey court's groundbreaking decision ... bogged ... down ... quickly Thursday.

Twenty-six participants in an American Bar Association conference aimed at drafting a model state law found they could not agree on an all-inclusive definition of surrogacy or on just what constitutes a "commercial" surrogate agreement.

"We have two days to come up with something," said moderator Robert Aronstein, a New York City lawyer. "It's a big task."

If the two-day conference can reach agreement, its proposal prob-

ably will be sent to the ABA's policymaking House of Delegates in August. If approved, the proposal would spark ABA lobbying efforts in state legislatures.

Much of Thursday's discussion focused on the New Jersey Supreme Court ruling a day earlier in the widely publicized Baby M case. The state court said surrogate motherhood for money violates New Jersey's adoption laws.

The decision ended a dramatic legal fight between a woman artificially inseminated and the man whose sperm was used. They previously had signed a contract under which the woman would surrender all parental rights and would receive \$10,000, but she later changed her mind.

The New Jersey court ruled that the contract was illegal.

"What we first have to decide is whether surrogacy should be prohibited under all circumstances," said Gary Skloff, of the Livingston, N.J., lawyer who represents Baby M's father, William Stern, and his wife.

Only one conference participant, William L. Pierce of the National Committee for Adoption, supported a total ban on surrogate motherhood.

Harold Cassidy, of the Red Bank, N.J., lawyer representing Baby M's surrogate mother, Mary Beth Whitehead-Gould, said surrogacy amounts to "forcing women through subtle inducements" to give up their children, an act that should only be a last resort.

'Star Wars' test launch hits snag

Cape Canaveral, Fla. (AP) — The launch of a "Star Wars" research satellite carrying 16 simulated Soviet nuclear missiles was postponed Thursday because of a potential problem with the Delta rocket, NASA said.

The launch was not immediately rescheduled.

Instruments indicated trouble with an oxygen vent on the Delta's second stage with five minutes to go in the countdown, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said.

Guerrilla foray into Israel leaves 3 dead

KIBBUTZ YITFAB, Israel (AP) — Arab guerrillas on a hostage-taking mission penetrated Israel from Lebanon on Thursday and hurled grenades at Israeli soldiers.

Two soldiers were killed before troops fatally shot one guerrilla and captured another.

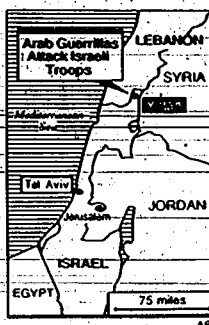
A third Israeli soldier was wounded and a fourth guerrilla escaped back into Lebanon in the heavy pre-dawn fog, military officials said.

It was the fourth infiltration attempt in less than three months and brought to nine the number of Israeli soldiers killed in those attacks.

Israeli officials linked the attempt to eight weeks of violent Palestinian unrest in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip.

The Palestine Liberation Organization denied that its faction claimed responsibility for the attack in a statement released in the coastal Lebanese city of Sidon.

Maj. Gen. Yossi Peled, head of the northern command, warned Israelis lying along the northern frontier to be prepared for further attacks be-



the operation, sneaked into Israel about two hours before dawn, army officials said.

As they were crossing an electrical fence at the border, they ran into an Israeli patrol, the officials said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

A 20-minute firefight broke out on a rocky hillside about one mile from Kibbutz Yitfab, a communal settlement about 120 miles northeast of Tel Aviv where 550 Israelis live.

"They fired rockets at us and threw hand grenades," the force commander, Lt. Avi, said on Israeli radio. "We charged twice."

Avi, whose first name was not given, said one guerrilla surrendered, yelling "Stop! Stop!" in English, and soldiers searched on land and in the air for two hours before finding a second guerrilla, who was killed in a fight with grenades and automatic weapons.

Military officials said the third guerrilla had not actually crossed the border fence when the patrol initially approached, and he ran back into Lebanon.

At Kibbutz Yitfab, many Israelis woke up to the sound of gunfire and exploding grenades. About half an hour later, a kibbutz siren sounded along with a code word that let the Israelis know guerrillas had infiltrated Israel.

"I got dressed and all the men went to the perimeter of the kibbutz to stand guard," said Kibbutz treasurer, Boaz Edal, 46. "The army fired flares until dawn to keep the area lit."

Jenny Jardine, a 26-year-old immigrant from Long Island, N.Y., said she has lived on the kibbutz for nine years and has never been so frightened. "I never think they will actually get into the kibbutz, but I was more scared this time because they got closer than before."

Riki Kaplan, a kindergarten teacher, said teachers also spoke to the children from the kibbutz. "During the day, some of the children were afraid to go outside, but we told them it's okay, our soldiers are out there," she said.

Protests in the West Bank and Gaza Strip began Dec. 8 and have left at least 43 Palestinians dead.

Clashes on West Bank add to Arab casualty list

JERUSALEM (AP) — Palestinian protesters set fire to a bus and an Israeli civilian shot and wounded an Arab stone-thrower in clashes in the West Bank on Thursday.

In the West Bank, Arab reports said seven Palestinians suffered gunshot wounds in clashes with Israeli soldiers. The army said two Arabs were wounded, and soldiers shot three others, including a 10-year-old boy who was in serious condition, in an overnight clash near the village of Burka.

Israeli leaders saw the latest clash on the Lebanon border as an attempt by Yasser Arafat's Fatah guerrillas to recover lost prestige in the West Bank and Gaza Strip.

The PLO is trying to demonstrate its ability to participate in and even to influence the events in the occupied territories, Lt. Gen. Dan Shomron, armed forces chief of staff, said on Israel Radio. "The influence is actually very small. And they try to act in the way that they know: against civilians."

Israel also protested a PLO-sponsored plan to send 100 Palestinians deported activists backed to Israel on a Greek-owned ship scheduled to leave Feb. 10.

Foreign Minister Shimon Peres accused the Greek government of an "unfriendly act" by failing to prevent the voyage.

Sandinista says war continues

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — President Daniel Ortega said Thursday the rejection of further aid for the Contras rebels by the U.S. Congress will strengthen peace efforts, but it does not make the war disappear.

President Reagan is meeting with the National Security Council, studying ways to continue the war against Nicaragua, Ortega said in a news conference the day after Congress turned down the Reagan administration's request for \$38.2 million for the anti-Sandinista rebels.

"If the president of the United States tells the North American people and the international community that he has decided to cut off all kinds of military aid and financing to the mercenary forces and begin a direct dialogue with the government of Nicaragua on security matters and direct the Contras to cease fire, then, yes, we would be able to say we are on the road to peace," he said.

The leftist Sandinista government generally refers to the U.S. as the president of the United States who has been waging a guerrilla campaign against the Sandinistas since late 1981 as "mercenaries."

Ortega said the defeat for Reagan on Wednesday might strengthen peace efforts. But it does not make the war disappear. Because it (the war) is promoted, financed and organized by the U.S. administration.

State-run radio on Thursday cited an anti-rebel report from their area and take advantage of political amnesty.

The rebels, in a clandestine Radio Liberation broadcast, said: "The Nicaraguan Resistance will continue. The people's desire for liberty will be achieved. The station reportedly broadcasts from El Salvador and is jammed in Managua."

Ortega also issued a call for Nicaraguans to stay alert to defend the 8-year-old leftist revolution.

Storm sinks Greek vessel

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — Iraqi warplanes set an Iranian tanker on fire in the Persian Gulf. The Greek-owned freighter crippled by Iranian gunboats sank while under tow Thursday in seas churned by a fierce sandstorm.

The 15,241-ton freighter Marc registers in Panama and was en route about 60 nautical miles off Jebel Ali in the United Arab Emirates, salvage executives said. It had been set afire in the attack Saturday in the northern gulf, and the crew abandoned ship.

Iran's raid on the tanker was its 18th on Iranian shipping since Jan. 31 and the first this month. More than 450 ships have been attacked by both sides since the Iran-Iraq war began in September 1980.

In London, Lloyd's Shipping Intelligence Unit identified the target as the 2,651-ton Mokran, owned by the Iranian government tanker company.

It is one of the vessels that carry oil from the huge Kharg Island oil terminal, which Iraq bombs regularly, to make the oil flow to other waters about 450 miles down the gulf.

Lloyd's reported a fire in the engine room and crew's quarters, and said the Mokran was being assisted by tug.

Hurlbutt dismisses second drug indictment

TWIN FALLS — A second drug indictment from a September grand jury was dismissed Thursday after a judge ruled prosecutors presented inadequate evidence and gave improper legal instructions to the grand jury.

Fifth District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt ordered the cocaine-possession indictment against Barbara Murray dismissed; the second indictment he has thrown out in two days.

Murray's indictment was based on a small black box found in her purse during a drug raid on Feb. 19, 1987. In that black box were traces of a white powder. Police officers didn't test the powder during the raid, saying they were afraid a field test would use too much of the powder and prevent a laboratory test.

In addition, prosecutors didn't introduce the laboratory report as evidence to the grand jury, instead asking the police officer about the test.

Hurlbutt ruled the police officer's testimony about the laboratory report was inadmissible, leaving the grand jury only with the officer's visual examination to consider.

"How do you visually identify drugs?" prosecutors asked in the grand jury hearing, according to portions of the transcript reprinted in Hurlbutt's opinion.

"Just like you identify a Styrofoam cup or a microphone; you just get to know the consistency, how it's made-up, how it's packaged, what it looks like; what it smells like, it just gets to be common knowledge after you deal with it for awhile," the officer answered.

Hurlbutt said that was unacceptable.

"Cocaine is not a microphone or a Styrofoam cup," he said.

Hurlbutt wrote that the officer offered no testimony

about the unique features of packaging, the looks of the substance past the fact it was a white powder, or the smell of the substance.

"His conclusion that the substance was cocaine was based solely on his seeing residue in a container which was of so little quantity that it could not be field tested without using it all up," the judge wrote. "This single observation, without more, is legally insufficient to establish that the substance is cocaine."

Hurlbutt also said prosecutors improperly told the

grand jury that Murray had been previously charged with possession of marijuana found in the same purse with the black container.

However, prosecutors never told the grand jury Murray was acquitted of the charge in a magistrate jury trial.

"This prejudice is particularly extreme in this case, because the defendant was acquitted by a jury on the charge of possession of the very marijuana the prosecutor repeatedly mentioned to the grand jury," Hurlbutt said.

"The transcript of the grand jury proceedings leaves one with the distinct impression that the defendant was convicted of the marijuana charge."

"Even if the defendant had been convicted of possession of the marijuana, this evidence would not have been admissible in the state's case," Hurlbutt said.

He also said the grand jury was prejudiced because prosecutors didn't properly instruct the grand jury on the legal meaning of a charge of possession.

Eleven defendants have challenged indictments from the September grand jury, which indicted 17 people.

Murray's is the second decision issued by Hurlbutt. Hurlbutt and other 5th District Judges Daniel Meehl and James May are expected to issue decisions on the cases.

Neither Meehl nor May have issued decisions on the cases.

Roark plans appeal of transcript secrecy

TWIN FALLS — Attorney R. Keith Roark asked 5th District Judge James May for permission to appeal a decision to keep grand jury transcripts secret before his clients' cases go to trial.

Roark asked May for the permission Thursday. May ruled against Roark's request to let the grand jury transcripts be made public at a hearing Jan. 20.

Roark said he wanted to appeal the decision "so we can take this matter to the Idaho Supreme Court to determine the issue without sending the defendant through the expense and trauma of a jury trial."

Most appeals are filed after a defendant has been tried by a jury.

Deputy Prosecutor J. Scott James said the unusual move should only be granted when there is substantial disagreements over the law. There is none in this case, James argued.

May took the matter under advisement and will issue a decision later.

Roark is representing two defendants of grand jury indictments. Eleven of the 17 indictments handed up by a September grand jury are being challenged.

Groups want pornography suit dropped

Argue over payment of fees

TWIN FALLS — What appeared to be the final act of a pornography lawsuit was acted out Thursday by six attorneys in a Twin Falls courtroom packed with more than 30 people.

But the judge said the law may not allow the curtain to fall and the play to end.

The civil lawsuit filed by the group Determined-Citizens Against Pornography (DCAG) against the Front Page Bookstore and its landlord is dying because all three parties want the suit dismissed.

However, at the hearing, they argued to a standstill over who is responsible for attorneys' fees.

Fifth District Judge James May, who saw the suit land in his court after two other judges were disqualified by the parties in the suit, threw some cold water on the plaintiffs at the end of the hearing.

"The only way all this can be dismissed is if all the parties can stipulate to some of these points," May said. He took the motions under advisement and will issue a decision later.

"All of the parties are not willing to stipulate to dismissal on all the issues in the case," May said. "It seems to me the remaining issues require a trial of the case as if the dismissals were never filed."

The Front Page bookstore, which DCAG said was selling pornography and therefore should be closed, moved out of its Blue Lakes North location last week.

DCAG promptly moved to dismiss the lawsuit, saying its action can only be based on a geographic location and since there was no bookstore in the building there were no grounds for its lawsuit.

The Front Page also asked the court to dismiss the lawsuit for the same reason.

Attorney William Tway, representing former landlords Jay and Barbara Moyle, agreed to dismiss the suit at Thursday's hearing but wanted to retain rights such as claiming attorneys' fees from DCAG or filing other lawsuits on the matter.

"We don't have any objection to dismissing this case, but we don't want to waive any rights," Tway said.

DCAG attorneys said they wanted to be able to refile the lawsuit if the Front Page opens at another location and tries to sell similar material to the evidence gathered by DCAG for this suit.

Front Page attorney R. Keith Roark said dismissing the suit is appropriate because the store moved out, but there could be some argument over who is going to pay the attorneys.

Tway said the Moyle's told DCAG members in October that the Front Page's lease was not going to be renewed. It was to expire Feb. 29.

In addition, the Moyle's told Scott Fife at least three years ago the lease was not going to be renewed, Tway said.

"So they filed the suit as of December, knowing the lease would not be renewed," Tway said. "Because of that, Tway argued, they should pay the Moyle's attorneys' fees."

DCAG attorney Gordon Nielsen of Boise said the claim by the Moyle's and the Front Page that DCAG

Barley commission poll sows uncertainty

TWIN FALLS — The almost even split in the barley commission poll sowed uncertainty among farmers who disagree about what the numbers mean and what the Legislature will do with them. The 53 percent vote in favor of a commission is far from the clear mandate proponents had hoped for.

"It's going to make them (legislators) wonder when half the state wants it and the other half is against it," said Shirrel Silvester, president of the Twin Falls County National Farmers Organization.

"Fifty percent of the people's perception is that commissions don't do anything," said Dick Parrott, a barley grower near Twin Falls.

The poll was taken to get the opinion of the growers and thus to help the Legislature decide whether or not to create a barley commission. The primary reason the

measure failed last year was because the collective opinion of the growers was not known.

John Gibson wasn't surprised by the close vote. The president of the Twin Falls County Farm Bureau said, "There was a lot of non-voters this—I know a lot of farmers who voted both ways."

"Some of them are tired of commissions. They say commissions don't do everything they say they are going to do. Others like them for the research part. And that's very important," he said.

Fifty-three percent of the barley growers statewide growing 49 percent of the barley voted for the four-member commission and an assessment of 40 cents a ton on commercially sold barley. An additional 5 percent voted for a commission with some changes to the proposal such as a reduction in the assessment and making the assessment voluntary.

"Fifty-three percent said they supported our proposal outright," said Tim McGreevey, executive director of the Idaho Grain Producers Association that pro-

posed the commission. "But really 58 percent of the growers that voted favor a barley commission in some form and that's very positive."

The vote did not breakdown evenly on a regional basis. In the southern, south-west and northern Idaho, some form of commission was supported by 63 percent to 67 percent of the growers, accounting for 60 percent to 71 percent of the barley crop in their regions.

Southcentral had the highest support in the state, McGreevey said.

In eastern Idaho, though, where 55 percent of the state's barley is grown, producers of 54 percent of the region's barley voted against the commission in any form.

"If I were in the Legislature, I'd look to the guys who are earning their living raising barley. I wouldn't ask the diversified guys so much," Parrott said.

"In three of four districts it passed overwhelmingly."

Hansen still owes for campaign

BOISE — More than three years since he lost an extremely close election to Democrat Richard Stallings, former Idaho congressman George Hansen still owes \$32,423 in unpaid debts.

Campaign finance reports covering the second half of 1987 were received at the secretary of state's office here on Thursday after being filed with the U.S. House of Representatives.

They showed Hansen owes \$32,423 from the 1984 race, in which the seven-term incumbent was defeated by a Democrat, Stallings, who subsequently defended the seat in the 1986 election.

"The final margin, 170 votes, was one of the closest in state history in a major election."

Connie Hansen, George Hansen's wife, lists a debt of \$5,577 from her unsuccessful bid for the Republican 2nd District nomination in 1986, while Hansen was serving a federal prison term.

Legislators ask Stallings to go slow on plan to save habitat

BOISE (AP) — Eight eastern Idaho state legislators are urging Rep. Richard Stallings to proceed cautiously with plans to preserve wildlife habitat along the Snake River. They say that would take much taxable property from the tax rolls, and the school districts involved already are hard-pressed to find enough tax money to operate.

"It seems to us that the proposal is very short-sighted given the present taxation structure of the state and more particularly the area affected, Bonneville County," said the letter. It was dated Wednesday and made public on Thursday. Those who signed the letter, all Republicans, included Sen. Lee Staker, R-Idaho Falls, and Representatives Con Mahoney, Tom

Leitcher, Preston Brimhall, Ralph Sizelo, Golden Linford, Reed Hansen and Stan Hawkins. Stallings announced earlier in the week that he plans to introduce legislation on the land trade. As outlined by the U.S. Forest Service, the trade would preserve wildlife habitat on the Snake Fork and give Grand Targhee Ski Resort more land for development. It will

take up to two years to develop the trade, the Forest Service said. Congressional approval will be needed to allow the Targhee National Forest to exchange land across the Idaho-Wyoming border, officials said. Under the proposal, Grand Targhee owner Mary Bergmeyer would purchase important wildlife land along the Snake Fork east of Heise

or other sensitive private lands adjacent to Targhee National Forest. Then he would trade that acreage to the Forest Service for 240 acres at the foot of the ski resort, where lodge and restaurant facilities are located. The legislators told Stallings the property involved could be developed for recreation use and eventually could be worth \$10 million.

That would generate much property tax to help meet local needs, they said. And since the homes involved would be summer and recreation homes, they would not qualify for the homeowners' exemption for lower property taxes. "Our property taxes are some of the highest in the state. Our schools are struggling with the funding inequities," the legislators said.

Swapp pleads innocent in federal court date

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Adam Swapp, the 27-year-old polygamist leader whose contempt for a corrupt society fueled a 13-day standoff with authorities, pleaded innocent Thursday to federal charges stemming from the bombing of a Mormon chapel. Swapp's appearance in federal court came only hours after he was released from a hospital where he spent exactly a week recuperating from bullet wounds sustained when members of his polygamist clan opened fire on law enforcement officers, killing state Department of Corrections Lt. Fred House.

The five other adult members of the clan, including matriarch Vickie Singer, were arraigned Jan. 28 and all but Swapp's wives, Heidi and Charlotte, were denied release to federal halfway houses during detention hearings this week. Swapp, wearing leg shackles and blue jail trousers with a white T-shirt, closely watched U.S. Magistrate Ronald N. Boyce as the judge read from a grand jury's four-count indictment charging Swapp with possession of a destructive device; use of a destructive device; aiding and abetting; and assault on a federal officer. A man who identified himself as Swapp phoned a television station a day after the Jan. 18 bombing of the Kamas Stake Center, claiming responsibility for the explosion, which he said was law enforcement officers' first by law enforcement officers nine years ago of the slain patriarch, John Singer. Asked how he wished to plead, Swapp responded in a drawn out, clear voice, "not guilty." Defense attorneys William Morrison and John Butcher then told the judge they needed more time before a detention hearing is held, and Boyce

scheduled the hearing for Feb. 11. Swapp, who propped up his bandaged left arm during the brief arraignment, was released from the University of Utah Health Sciences Center at 9:35 a.m. Thursday to the custody of U.S. marshals, said spokesman John Dwan. Vickie Singer faces charges identical to Swapp's, while her daughter, son John Timothy Singer and Swapp's brother Jonathan were charged with one count each of being an accessory after the fact. John Timothy Singer, left paralyze from the waist down by a logging accident three years ago, is a suspect in the shooting of House. The state was expected to file a homicide charge by week's end, authorities said. An emergency medical technician who treated Swapp moments after he was shot said the injured man blessed and cursed him during a

brief ambulance ride down the main road from the Singer compound in Marion to another waiting emergency vehicle. "He said, 'By the power of ... something ...' invested in me, I bless the hands that heal me, and he put his hands on me. That really bothered me ... I thought, here's this guy bleeding to death and he's blessing me. What the hell is this?" said Rick Jackson, a member of the North Summit ambulance crew.

Driver's identity still uncertain

ELKO, Nev. (AP) — An autopsy was conducted Thursday on the man who is believed to have been the driver of a car that crashed in a fire here, but test results are not expected to be available before next week.

Police Chief Gordon Pobes said the Washington County coroner Vern McCoy confirmed to Reno that he had completed the examinations of the bodies of the man and of a service station clerk who was shot to death in an apparently unrelated robbery a short time before the fire crash.

The coroner declined to re-

lease the results of his autopsy, saying the information was relayed to the Nevada Division of Investigation, which is overseeing the dual investigations in Elko County.

The division did not return calls to the Associated Press in Reno on Thursday and Pobes said investigators did not tell him what the autopsies revealed, either.

The investigation began Monday night when clerk Barbara L. Nichols was found shot to death by a \$125 robbery of the gas station where she worked in Carlin, 20 miles west of Elko.

A few hours later, a Nevada Highway Patrol officer returning from the Carlin investigation spotted a car outside Elko that matched the description of the Vega belonging to Victor Wade, 68, of Malad, Idaho.

Wade was being sought in the shooting deaths of Vern Weaver, 63, of Provo, Utah, and Erven Wade, 62, of Sandy, Utah. Their bodies were found by a fourth brother on Saturday at the family ranch in Malad.

While investigators earlier suspected the Carlin slaying and the Elko incident were connected, Kirby said that had all but been eliminated.

Israeli, Arab officials debate at ISU

POCATELLO (AP) — A debate broke out at Idaho State University's Frank Church Symposium on Foreign Affairs between the Israeli consul general and several Palestinian sympathizers.

The symposium sponsored by the International Affairs Council at ISU, is entitled "A World View of the Middle East."

Yacov Sella, the Israeli consul general based in San Francisco, was the target of some pointed remarks during Wednesday's session from the other panelists, and from a number of Arab students and professors in the audience.

Sella got little support even from his U.S. ally, William Pierce, a State Department spokesman who sat quietly while the anti-Israeli members of the audience suggested that Israel was opposed to peace in the Middle East, and planned to expand its land holdings even further.

The current violence between Israeli soldiers and Palestinian refugees in the occupied territories on the West Bank was the most common topic of discussion.

Egyptian Consul General Aly Tapozada said the world was "shocked and horrified by the indiscriminate shooting" of Palestinian protesters.

He said Israel was employing many of the same oppressive tactics as South Africa uses against black protesters in that country.

Meanwhile, Michael Mazzoui,

Middle East historian from the University of Utah, said Israel cannot be allowed to manifest the same kind of brutality "toward the poor and the oppressed" as the Palestinians inflicted on Jews by the Nazis during World War II.

Sella admitted that the shooting incidents in the occupied territories were "nothing any Israeli is not troubled about. ... It's not something we are enjoying."

However, he said "surrounding Arab states and the Palestinian Liberation Organization have been the biggest stumbling blocks to removing the Palestinian refugee camps. When Egypt held the Gaza Strip and Jordan the West Bank, those countries never did anything to assimilate the refugees or eliminate the camps, Sella argued.

When Israel took over those areas after the 1967 Six-Day War, they found the refugee camps in the same condition they were in when Israel left them in 1947, he said.

The Israelis have tried to negotiate directly with the local leaders of the Palestinians living in Israeli-occupied territory, but the PLO has used terrorism to intimidate the local leaders from conducting public negotiations, he said.

Every member of the United Nations Security Council but the U.S. has consistently voted against resettlement of the Palestinians in Israel, Sella said, and "that's part of the hypocrisy."

Critics of Israeli policy pointed out that that country refuses to accept a call to an international conference to settle the Middle East situation.

An international convention is gaining more acceptance with the United Nations, and even within part of the Israeli government, said Egypt's Tapozada.

"We do not have the right to use even the smallest chance for peace," he said, "but the Israeli government remains the biggest obstacle to an international conference."

Tapozada said Egypt remains willing to serve as a broker between Israel and other Arab countries, but to succeed, Egypt needs Israel's help; it's a two-way street."

"No evidence has been presented to court that the Moyles were contacted on this matter," Nielsen said. "This matter is clearly obscene under the statute and no evidence was given to the court that the lease was to be terminated."

Nielsen claimed the lease could have been terminated in 1986.

Rosenheim said the evidence should be presented and argued at another hearing.

"We need to find what the plaintiffs knew and when they knew it to determine the matter of attorneys' fees," Rosenheim said.

Chris Roysen, another attorney for the Moyles, said the DCAG's actions have been "odd."

The anti-pornography group asked for a hearing two weeks ago to combine a required pre-trial hearing with the actual trial. May ruled at the hearing that DCAG hadn't filed the proper papers to ask for the combination.

"Essentially they came in, they screwed around and didn't even follow the procedures of the statute," Rosenheim said.

Brent Nielsen, DCAG's Twin Falls attorney, argued the first time he was officially notified of Moyle's action was when he received a counter-notice from the Moyles.

At the end of the hearing, Brent Nielsen indicated DCAG would be

willing to dismiss the suit without the stipulation they could refile later.

But other points remained, and the issue of attorneys' fees still stands in the way of settlement and could force a trial.

The plaintiffs are ready, willing and able to go ahead with a trial, Gordon Nielsen said. "If there still needs to be an action, the plaintiffs are ready to go forward."

Tway said he has already commissioned a preliminary study from Boise State University on the types of magazines and videos DCAG says are pornographic and is ready to complete a comprehensive study if the suit goes forward.

"We're prepared to fight, should this turn into a fight," Tway said.

"The plaintiffs are ready, willing and able to go ahead with a trial," Gordon Nielsen said. "If there still needs to be an action, our plaintiffs are ready to go forward."

But Rosenheim said DCAG is in a bad legal position and should be forced to pay the Moyles' attorneys' fees.

"We're talking about First Amendment rights here, and Mr. Nielsen thinks a group of people could put something in a complaint and say it's obscene," Rosenheim said. "Through their maneuvers, they have gotten themselves in a position where they can't even prove their case."

DCAG's action was filed under an

Idaho moral nuisance law, written in the early 1970s and rarely used. DCAG attorney Gordon Nielsen helped write the law while he was Idaho attorney general.

The law allows a group of citizens to file a lawsuit on behalf of the state government against a store selling pornography.

If a judge rules the pornography is obscene, he can shut the store down, confiscate the inventory, arrest proceeds, and prohibit business from using the store for one year.

However, the law also makes clear that citizens are acting on behalf of the government. "If they refuse to dismiss the suit and DCAG doesn't want to pursue it, Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter may have to take it over."

"I'll do whatever the judge orders me to do," Baxter said last week. "Just hope he gives me the money to do it."

She estimated a few years ago a similar suit against the Front Page would cost \$68,000 a year.

The fact private citizens can bring lawsuits against pornography worries Rosenheim.

"That a private citizen can bring this action is a problem—the manner in which this action has been filed is positively shocking," Rosenheim said. "That store was there because a market in there. If this store leaves, somebody will come in and take that market."

And that says the majority want a barley commission in this state," said McGreevey.

"Opinions about what the Legislature may do with the issue are as varied as the interpretations of the poll results."

"I don't think the legislators dare pass it when half the state doesn't want it," Silvester said.

The Legislature was looking for some direction and generally the votes were positive. We are confident that we will have a barley commission this year," McGreevey said.

"I'm not going to try to second guess what the Legislature is going to do," said Don Suchan, a barley grower near Paul—who is on the

board of the Idaho Grain Producers Association. But he believes the poll results strengthen the position for a commission.

The Grain Producers are going to go ahead and pursue the commission with the Legislature, he said.

"If the wheat commission goes up there and lobbies for it, it'll probably pass," Silvester said.

"The NFO hasn't decided yet whether to organize a lobby against the barley commission. The Twin Falls County unit meets next week to discuss the issue."

If the commission does become reality, the NFO will try to get one of its staff on the board, because it will need NFO's marketing expertise, Silvester said.

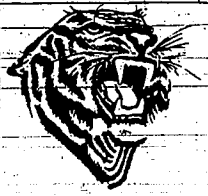
Tigers, Wolverines meet in rematch

JEROME — Last time, without senior forward Glenn Leavitt, Jerome beat Wood River by 21 points in Hailey.

So what is Jerome High School boys' basketball coach, with Leavitt back in the lineup, expecting from tonight's South-Central Idaho Conference and District 4 rematch with the Wolverines?

"I expect a tough game, and a lot closer game than last time," said Allen, whose defending state-champion Tigers are currently the unanimous choice as the No. 1 A-2 boys' basketball team in Idaho in the Associated Press poll. "Last time they shot 28 percent, they'll do a lot better than that this time."



The reason, as Allen points out, is that there's a lot more at stake this time.

"If we beat Wood River, we get the top seed in the (postseason) district tournament and a first-round

bye," he said. "That's important, because Wood River is an excellent ballclub and Buhl is playing very well right now — they scored 84 points the other night against Gooding. I sure don't want to have to play that first night of the district tournament."

Jerome, 15-2 for the season, 3-1 in the SCIC and 2-0 in District 4, will get that bye with a victory tonight. But should the third-ranked Wolverines, 12-3 overall, 2-1 in the SCIC and 1-1 in District 4, beat Jerome tonight and if both teams defeat Buhl on the road later this month, the top seed will come down to the toss of a coin.

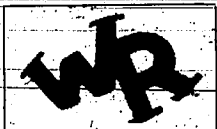
Back when District 4 A-2 was a four-school-family — before Burley moved up to Class A-1 and Region III — being the No. 1 seed in the

postseason tournament wasn't an overwhelming advantage; in fact, top seeds had a long history of mortality in the A-2 district tournament. But with the current three-team district and its first-round bye for the No. 1 seed, that's changed.

"The first-round bye is a definite advantage with our league as balanced as it is," said Wood River Coach Dick Reich.

Although Leavitt, Jerome's No. 3 scorer and No. 2 rebounder, returned from a knee injury earlier this week, the Tigers lost sweet-shooting senior guard Shawn Thompson to a leg injury in a victory over Middleton last weekend. The prognosis for Thompson, a 17-point-per-game scorer, is uncertain.

"It's the kind of an injury that



will either heal quickly or put him out for a long time," said Allen. "They're evaluating him, so we won't know for sure for awhile."

That's significant because Thompson's zone-busting outside shooting was the key to the Tigers' victory over the Wolverines last time.

"With Shawn shooting as well as he did last time, it forced them to

come out after him and that gave us a chance to do some other things offensively," said Allen. "Without him, I'm sure they'll pack back in and try to force us to beat them from the perimeter."

Reich doesn't think beating Jerome without Thompson will be any easier than beating the Tigers without Leavitt.

"If anything, it's going to give them an extra body inside, and that's an area where we don't match up with them very well anyway."

Reich says the keys for Wood River will be shot selection and poise.

"They definitely outplayed us last time around. I was disappointed, but I think we were a little tight. We were playing in front of a

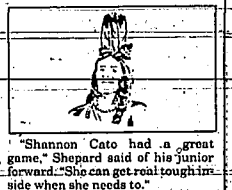

Maravich defect repairable

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Doctors who reviewed coroner's documents believe Pete Maravich still might be operable after the former basketball star underwent an operation similar to common bypass surgery.

Maravich, college basketball's all-time leading scorer and a member of the NBA Hall of Fame, collapsed after phoning in a pickup basketball game at a Pasadena church Jan. 17 and died shortly later. He was 40.

The documents also revealed for the first time that Maravich had complained of chest pains in the final six months of his life, the Los Angeles Times reported in its Thursday edition.

Previous reports had indicated Maravich also complained of intense pain in his right shoulder.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF. There are as many preferences as there are men. - Horace. 'I'd much rather finesse against a king than a queen,' explained South. 'Against kings, I can go in either direction. Against kings, there is no choice. Therefore, I have two chances to be wrong with queens, only one chance with kings.' That's the convoluted logic South offered after losing today's game. The game would have been cold if North had been declarer. However, since North and South each had a doubleton spade, they had no way to know who should be the first to declare no-trump. On the North's spade queen was covered by East's king, it became obvious that South needed to score his nine tricks on the run. And since South had these prejudices about kings over queens, he took the king finesse to suffer a quick one down. On the North's spade queen that was his "finesse" against a 50-50 chance, so "with no clear choice between clubs and diamonds, why shouldn't declarer indulge a harmless prejudice?" To improve the 50-50 chance of either finesse succeeding, South must combine his chances. First he should play the top diamonds in hopes of finding a doubleton queen. If that fails, he falls back on the 50-50 club finesse. This sequence of plays gives up nothing other than a huge bonus. (If when a doubleton (or singleton) diamond queen appears.

Nell Shipman's perseverance won her honors, acclaim in the movies

SUN VALLEY — During an era when Hollywood filmmakers had never heard of Idaho, the "girl from God's country" was hard at work filming silent movies on location in the wilds of northern Idaho. That "girl" was Nell Shipman, a silent movie actress whose name was a household word in the 1920s. But without the perseverance of — Boise State University professor, Shipman's work nearly 70 years ago, and the extraordinary job she did of filming on location at Priest Lake, would have faded into obscurity.

While conducting research on Idaho writer Tom Trusky, a professor of English, ran across an article in a 1925 issue of the Atlantic Monthly magazine in which Shipman describes her adventures at Priest Lake. Intrigued by the idea that anyone — let alone a woman — would build a remote lakeside film studio and bring along with her a menagerie of more than 70 wild animals, Trusky delved into the task of uncovering the hitherto

lost Shipman films.

On Tuesday night, Trusky will talk about his research as well as present two of Shipman's films in a showing sponsored by the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities in cooperation with BSU's Hemingway Western

Studies Center.

"Trail of the Northwind" is a 20-minute black and white silent film set in the ice and snow of an Idaho winter — and filmed entirely at Priest Lake in 1923.

The other film, "Something New," was rediscovered this past summer uncatagolged in the film archives at the University of California, Los Angeles. It is a 60-minute black and white silent movie filmed in the Mojave Desert and includes a dubbed theater organ sound track by Boise organist Doug Lemmon.

The Canadian-born silent film writer, director and star came to Idaho's Priest Lake from Hollywood in 1922. Shipman brought along a "troupe" of Academy Award-winning cinematographer, a doomed-lover/producer/actor Bert Van Tuyle, her 10-year-old son Barry and more than 70 wild animals, including bears, cougars, skunks and opossums.

Shipman was a movie-maker who insisted on the humane treatment of animals, something which other Hollywood filmmakers ignored at the time.

She was familiar with Idaho, having traveled as a young girl with her family doing vaudeville acts in such places as Lewiston and Coeur d'Alene. After her success in the movie, "Back to God's Country," which was filmed on location in Alberta, Canada and included a brief nude scene of Shipman — only the second American silent movie to be so risqué — she gained a sense of independence from Hollywood and came to Priest Lake. In the summer of 1922 she built Lionhead Lodge at the northern shore of Priest Lake, to house her film studio.

The four years Shipman spent in Idaho with her new lover and assistant director, Van Tuyle, was a "mid-life crisis" in which she acted, only for Shipman it did not end happily ever after.

A feature movie "The Grub Stake" was completed with hopes of giving financial balance to the fledgling production company. However, bad luck followed what Shipman. The bankruptcy of the company which purchased the dis-

tribution rights to the film created a great hardship for her efforts.

By the fall of 1923, Shipman had lost most of the film crew, her animals were becoming hungry, winter setting in and Van Tuyle was dealing with the aftermath of a frostbitten foot.

His condition worsened as the winter months progressed until by mid-winter he went insane and fled Lionhead Lodge by dog sled and then by foot across the frozen lake. Shipman, desperately followed him until he collapsed and she could get him medical attention.

National headlines described the valiant rescue and Van Tuyle recovered, returning to Lionhead Lodge to continue filming.

However, their romance ended sharply when Van Tuyle threatened Shipman on Christmas Day 1924 after seeing her dancing mals, including bears, cougars, with a visitor at the lodge.

Shortly thereafter, a news account claiming Shipman had been starring her animals evaporated all hopes of obtaining funding for her newest film, "The Purple Trail."

She denied the charges, but was forced to close the lodge in 1925 and give away the remaining animals.

Shipman spent the next 10 years writing screenplays, novels and short stories, but they seemed to follow the same ill fate as her previous film attempts.

Her 1928 screenplay "Abandoned Trails" was being turned into a movie, when it's star collapsed, bringing an abrupt halt to production. The filming of her novel, "Hot Oil," was scheduled to begin, but the star, Will Rogers, returned from Alaska. He was killed in a plane crash enroute to the states.

Finally, in 1936, Shipman's screenplay "Wings in the Dark" was made into a movie starring Myrna Loy and Cary Grant.

"She was absolutely dedicated to her art," Trusky says when describing the actress/writer/director/manager he never met. "She was obsessed by with sexual assault and exonerated; and in a recent episode was told some of the facts of life by another of the firm's attorneys.

The impact on Drake's hitherto successful but little-known acting career is hard to predict, but he is savoring the moment, particularly the question that is invariably asked of producers, writers, hairdressers, reporters or anyone else who might have any connection to "L.A. Law": "Is that actor really retarded?"

"It is the question du jour," says Scott Goldstein, one of the show's producers. "What Larry does is thread the needle between what is real and what is fiction, and that is no mean feat."

Drake's speech, hair style, dress and manner are so different from his character's that it is difficult to match the two of them at first, but he is now recognized in public even if few people know his real name — and he hears, although always secondhand, the question of the day.

"They never ask me, 'Are you

man's life and his newfound friendship with Barry Shipman, now 74, Trusky describes Shipman as a person with a charismatic character, an impressive female figure exuding confidence in real life and coming up the heroine in all her films. She was stunning on the screen and a person truly interested in women's rights, Trusky says.

All in all, Shipman produced six films at Priest Lake and through Trusky's efforts, Boise State University has acquired six in which Shipman starred. BSU's Hemingway Western Studies Series has also published Shipman's autobiography, "The Silent Screen and My Talking Heart."

It is a 60-minute black and white silent movie filmed in the Mojave Desert and includes a dubbed theater organ sound track by Boise organist Doug Lemmon.

The Canadian-born silent film writer, director and star came to Idaho's Priest Lake from Hollywood in 1922. Shipman brought along a "troupe" of Academy Award-winning cinematographer, a doomed-lover/producer/actor Bert Van Tuyle, her 10-year-old son Barry and more than 70 wild animals, including bears, cougars, skunks and opossums.

Shipman was a movie-maker who insisted on the humane treatment of animals, something which other Hollywood filmmakers ignored at the time.

She was familiar with Idaho, having traveled as a young girl with her family doing vaudeville acts in such places as Lewiston and Coeur d'Alene. After her success in the movie, "Back to God's Country," which was filmed on location in Alberta, Canada and included a brief nude scene of Shipman — only the second American silent movie to be so risqué — she gained a sense of independence from Hollywood and came to Priest Lake. In the summer of 1922 she built Lionhead Lodge at the northern shore of Priest Lake, to house her film studio.

The four years Shipman spent in Idaho with her new lover and assistant director, Van Tuyle, was a "mid-life crisis" in which she acted, only for Shipman it did not end happily ever after.

A feature movie "The Grub Stake" was completed with hopes of giving financial balance to the fledgling production company. However, bad luck followed what Shipman. The bankruptcy of the company which purchased the dis-

'L.A. Law' character helps dispell myths about retardation

LOS ANGELES — After half a lifetime of dinner theater, regional Shakespeare, light musicals and old jobs, Larry Drake had been given a part much of the nation may never forget.

At 38, he was a very good character actor with enough work at places like the Old Globe Theatre in San Diego to pay the rent on his four-room duplex in Echo Park. He had never been good at hustling movie and television parts and felt no aching hunger for fame and fortune. He cared about his friends and his work, books, baseball and

old movies, and that was about it.

But this particular part — the role of an office messenger named Benny Stulwicz on "L.A. Law" — was special and he wanted it to work.

Stulwicz is mentally retarded. He is someone who laughs and cries and thinks and desires and dreams like anyone else, but does it at a slower speed, with some of the hard edges missing, a 45 record occasionally playing at 33 1/3.

He went off to talk to experts and eventually found one generous and thoughtful man, 28-year-old Jeff Miller of Malibu, who had many of the secrets of Benny Stulwicz,

locked inside him.

The results, seen in a succession of "L.A. Law" episodes over the last few weeks (the show airs Thursdays at 9 p.m.), have rocked American television and marked the beginning of the end of a stereotype hampering the lives of more than 6 million Americans with similar disabilities.

Drake's sensitive, unconventional portrayal of a man facing the death of his mother and his own sexual awakening has riveted viewers just as it is scoring the highest ratings in its two-year history.

What began as just an interesting, one-shot part to provide

a case for the fictional firm's novice attorney has now become a recurring role, its life limited only by the imaginations of "L.A. Romance exists in 'Broadcast News'

The following are capsule reviews of films playing locally in the Magic City. The ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the opinions are by the Los Angeles Times.

BROADCAST NEWS (R) This film is a diabolically clever, witty, in the way that so much surface cleverness can be. No such thing. This film by writer-director-producer James L. Brooks (his first since "Terms of Endearment") goes right to the core of a modern romantic triangle, and while it is there, gives us a look at what ails the news-broadcasting business. But heartless is the wrong word for this movie. It is insightful and understanding and marvelous fun, while giving up none of its thoughtfulness, and all three leading actors — William Hurt, Albert Brooks and Holly Hunter — alternately save the movie from alienating the audience and provide it with its greatest joys.

FOR KEEPS (PG) Not even Molly Ringwald's customary glow and bedrock believability make a smidgen of difference in this film. Muddled it is and muddled it remains. While the film-makers seem willing to move a little off-the-beaten-track on their subject of teenage pregnancy, the tone is skittish — genuinely funny and insightful one-minute; slapstick; sitcomish and mawkish the next.

GOOD MORNING, VIETNAM (R) This dramatic comedy based on the 1965 Saigon gig of wildman Armed Forces deejay Adrian Cronauer is mostly failed satire. It clings to the obvious like a drowning man, trying to give an impression of war. Barry Levinson can't summon up the wit or bite of his "Diner" or "Tin Men." But Robin Williams, as Cronauer, saves it; he explodes the center in berserk bursts of electronic age surrealism. Blazing away from his microphone on camera, Williams is like a man possessed: a Crazy Eddie of showbiz dada.

LEONARD PART 6 (PG) In this

grim mishmash, top-heavy with production values but short on humor, Bill Cosby plays a superdry turned San Francisco restaurateur who comes out of retirement to foil a crazed ecologist (Gloria Foster) who has a magic sphere capable of turning animals; even house pets, into killers. With Tom Courtenay, Moses Gorn, Victoria Rowell, Pat Colbert.

MOONSTRUCK (PG) This is an incredibly nourishing comedy, filled as it is like rigatoni with warmth, cheer and terrific snappy dialogue. As a young widow whose life suddenly shifts 180 degrees under the spell of an extraordinary full moon from plain to juicy, Cher finally has a role that lets her comic sensibilities out for a romp. Cage attacks the role of Ronny — the guy Cher really falls for — with a nice balance between unbridled romanticism and tongue-in-cheek seriousness; he is marvelous.

THE SERPENT AND THE RAINBOW (R) Wes Craven's ambitious, imaginative and largely successful blend of supernatural and political terror, set in Haiti just as Duvalier is taking flight. One could wish that amiable hero Bill Pullman, a Harvard anthropologist — very much in the Indiana Jones mold, were a little less Superman and a little more Clark Kent, thus avoiding the great white savior stereotype. Still, it is

a stunning, intensely cinematic experience.

THREE MEN AND A BABY (PG) What we have here is an Americanization of Celine Scorsau's "Three Men and a Cradle." Scorsau's movie was fairly frothy, and this one is frothier still. The people who made it carry over much of the original's weightless, sweet-tempered flavor. Any movie in which Steve Guttenberg plays the sensitive guy would seem to be in big, big trouble; it is like watching Fred MacMurray as a heartbroken poet. But director Leonard Nimoy has the knack for relationships the writers seem to lack. And Tom Selleck seems here to find his true movie motor; the relaxed bachelor camaraderie here almost echoes the tongue-in-cheek ambience on "Magnum P.I."

THROW MAMA FROM THE TRAIN (PG-13) Danny DeVito's first directorial effort has the same ribcudng expositiveness he puts into his performances. It is a comic version of Hitchcock's "Strangers on a Train" in which a hapless writing student (DeVito) — tormented by the world's meanest mother — tries to swap murders with his teacher (Billy Crystal). A thin idea, but the dialogue is often clever, and DeVito — abetted by "Blood Simple" cameraman Barry Sonnenfeld — gives the movie a lot of overlap, mock-film noir style. It is fun to watch.

'The Big Easy', hot out on cassette

The story is dumb, the actors are numb, the sets are cheesy and the director barely keeps up. Directed by Gary O'Quinn — who created Kong and Conan shows for the Universal Studio tour. **MASTERS OF THE UNIVERSE**; Rated PG; 1987; 106 minutes; Warner Home Video; \$89.95.

What you end up dealing with when assessing summer movies is degrees of dumb: funny dumb, smart dumb, dumb dumb. "Revenge of the Nerds II: Nerds in Paradise" is a variation on the latter. This is a movie that doesn't just make you feel stupid, it makes you feel as though your head has been hollowed out and pumped full of Cheez Whiz. Directed by Joe Roth, it is a prime example of the diminished-capacity summer movie aesthetic. You could sum up what goes on by saying: The nerds are put down for being nerdy. Nerddiness triumphs. The End. **REVENGE OF THE NERDS II: NERDS IN PARADISE**; Rated PG-13; 1987; closed captioned; 92 minutes; CBS-Fox Video; \$89.98.

At first glance, Gary Busey may strike you as too robust and solid to play Busey Holly, but when the music gets in him, and he begins to move, spreading his legs wide and bouncing to the rhythm, your reservations vanish. The casting couldn't be more perfect in the "super" fantasy. Anatomically overdeveloped Dolph Lundgren muscles in on the action in this kids' fantasy based on the

movie-is-low-budget, but-the-D movie treatment fits the subject especially early on when Holly and his sidemen, played by Don Sward and Charles Martin Smith, are playing at roller-rinks around Lubbock, Texas, and practicing in a garage. The association, a conservative group that has not been happy with mass-media handling of extradition in the past—has decided after a great deal of discussion to present "L.A. Law" an official commendation during its California state convention in February.

And viewers who have wondered so long about Larry Drake's own background will have a new puzzle to decipher—next month. Heidi Hennessey, a San Francisco woman who has some mental retardation, will play Ivy, Stulwicz's first romantic partner, in an episode scheduled for Feb. 18.

"My fear was that it was going to seem like apples and oranges," Drake says, but Hennessey had been on stage and on television before, and a look at the film afterward confirmed "that it worked very well."

Larry Drake grew up the second of three sons in Tulsa. His father was a draftsman in the oil industry, his mother a housewife. In high school Drake was as tall as he is now, 6 feet 3, and although not quite the hulking, nearly 300-pound figure he would become, he was encouraged to play football. But the high-top shoes blasted his ankles.

"I was always the slowest guy on the team and I remember doing the 100-yard dash one day and pulling a groin muscle and going as over teakettle and landed on my back with one leg straight up in the air and unable to move and thinking to myself that maybe it's time to quit."

He fared better as the class wit and one of its most prominent actors. His grades were good. His father, obsessed with the fact that no one in the family had ever graduated from college, sent him in 1967 to the University of Oklahoma.

After a disastrous freshman year spent sleeping late, socializing and nursing the shock of failing to interest any fraternities, Drake dropped out to work at a gas station and acquire the smoking habit that torments him to this day. After a spur-of-the-moment trip to the Appalachian Trail that he says he took to think things over, he returned to the university and began to take acting seriously.

Two instructors from Yale, Char-

les C. Suggs and Robert Greenwood, showed him he had the talent to find new depths in parts he assumed he could do in his sleep, such as Jud Fry in "Oklahoma!" By 1971, while he was slowly completing his degree, he earned his room and board by acting in dinner theaters, living in rooms behind the stage. In 1974 he moved to Dallas and appeared in scores of productions there and on road tours into the Midwest and South.

By 1980 he was deep into "my 30-year-old crisis."

"My girlfriend had left, the lease was up on my apartment, and I had no money left in the bank, and my family was falling apart and going crazy," he says. He decided to move to California. Los Angeles seemed not so different from Tulsa and Dallas and he considered himself too experienced, and too weak in musicals, to compete with the hordes of golden-throated young actors crowding auditions in New York.

He had a silver Honda Civic and a small apartment in Hollywood, but for more than a year could find no one who would pay him to act. He loaded trucks, checked accountants' figures, typed student-loan forms and checked automobiles coming off ships.

A part in a 1982 television film, "Dark Night of the Sorcerer" came his way. He played a mentally retarded man who is falsely accused of molesting a little girl and is gunned down by angry citizens of his small town. By the end of the five-half-hour his character is dead. The ghost, who wreaked vengeance for the rest of the movie was played by another actor.

About that time, producers at the Old Globe in San Diego discovered Drake's versatility—he won an award for playing seven different roles, including—two women, in "Greater Tuna." Soon he was spending more than half the year in San Diego performing Shakespeare and other repertory standards. A steady, almost regional theater, and a school teacher, but it was enough so that Drake could forget about odd jobs and enjoy his other interests.

His close friend Charles Edward Pogue, screenwriter for "The Fly"

and "Psycho III," found himself drawn to Drake as someone "who's got a brain and can sit down and talk to you about things outside this business, which—gets a bit incestuous." Both men enjoyed books and old movies, particularly the stylish classics of the 1930s.

"They talked into the early morning about their craft and other subjects, Drake spun pet theories, such as his view that the stage was like his favorite spectator sport, baseball, a constant improvisation, while film had a regimented game plan, like football."

"Windmills of the Gods" one more addition to Sheldon's collection

By PAULELIE

When it comes to miniseries, Sidney Sheldon is a master of the game.

"Windmills of the Gods," which airs Sunday, Feb. 7, and Tuesday, Feb. 9, on CBS, is the fourth miniseries based on a Sheldon best seller. And just as adaptations of "Rage of Angels" (1983) and "Master of the Game" (1984) helped define the miniseries in the early '80s, "Windmills" — along with next month's "Noble House" and next season's "War and Remembrance" — will indicate whether the form is strong enough to enter a third decade.

But Sheldon claims that he writes his novels in an ivory tower of sorts, withdrawing to his Palm Springs home for months until he finishes the first draft. Never, he claims, does he consider the novel's final resting place: television.

"When I'm writing a book, I'm thinking only about books," he says. "It's a work of the imagination. I'm never thinking about a movie or visualizing any stars in the leading roles."

Had he visualized his leading players, he couldn't have chosen a more likely cast. "Windmills" stars Jaclyn Smith, who starred in "Rage of Angels" and its sequel, "Rage of Angels: The Story Continues" (1986). Her co-star is Robert Wagner, who starred in the '70s series "Hart to Hart," which Sheldon created. The miniseries, which was filmed in the United States, England, France and Yugoslavia, also features David Ackroyd, Christopher Cazenove and Ari Meyers.

"It's wonderful," Sheldon says effusively. "Bob Wagner is wonderful, and Jackie does the best job she's ever done. There are very good people in the small parts. And the production is marvelous. Nothing was spared."

Sheldon, who will turn 71 on Feb. 11, began working in Hollywood when he was in his 20s, and wrote such hits as "The Bachelor" and the "Bobby Soxer" (1947). He produced the '60s series "The Patty Duke Show" and "I Dream of Jeannie." Then, in his 50s, wealthy and successful, he began to write novels. 2 Times-News, Twin Falls, Idaho

His first, "The Naked Face" (1969), was a flop. But from "The Other Side of Midnight" (1974) and "Bloodline" (1977) through "Rage of Angels" (1980) and "If Tomorrow Comes" (1986), each has been more popular than the last. "Windmills of the Gods" topped best-seller lists the week it was released last February.

One reason for the popularity of Sheldon's books, of course, is the exposure provided by the subsequent miniseries.

"It's hard to say what part of their success is a result of

miniseries," he says. "Yes, there's a definite swell in my readership when a miniseries airs. But at the same time, the success just seems to feed on itself."

Although Sheldon often serves as executive producer of the miniseries, he claims that he plays only a minor role in the adaptation of his books. "I'm more concerned about who writes it than who stars in it," he says.

Once, though, working on a miniseries allowed him to revise the original story. "In 'Rage of Angels,' I let a little 'boy character die," he explains. "And right away I started getting letters — irate letters. 'How could you do this? I'm despondent!' I'm mourning him like he was my own! It got so bad that when we got around to making the miniseries, I let him live."

as is Ann-Margret herself. She flat-out won't talk about Presley, with whom she co-starred in the flick "Viva Las Vegas." All she'll say at this point is, "He was a wonderful man." Fact is that she and Elvis were very, very close friends. The fact also is that Ann-Margret boasts of her 20-year marriage to manager-husband, Roger Smith. Still, there have always been rumors and they have persisted over the years.

Q: We hear that Michael Jackson made a TV commercial for a big soft drink company that was so bad, it was canned. Anything to it? — O.P.

A: Jackson finished more than a year ago a lengthy Pepsi commercial that hasn't yet been aired. The blurb-features a segment showing Michael engaging in a series of stunts — jumping over cars and other physical feats. The commercials will be aired this year at a recording industry awards ceremony — the Grammys — and will get limited play-on successive weeks via the "Family Ties" TV series. After that, it'll be off the air. How come? "It's not good," says one critic.

Q: What's this about the son of the late Tyrone Power changing his name to avoid confusion with his famous father? — E.H.

A: You're referring to Tyrone Power Jr., the 28-year-old offspring of the strikingly handsome screen hero. Power died in 1958, following a massive coronary suffered in Spain while filming a dueling scene. The senior Power was only 44 at the time. Tyrone Jr. resembles his father. He has his extraordinary dark eyes. That's a decided benefit since the junior Power is also a movie actor. If he changed his surname, he says, "There would be peals of thunder from heaven."

Q: In actress Jill St. John's new cookbook, there's a dedication to "the memory of Lance who taught me almost everything I know, in or out of the kitchen." That's her late husband, but I thought that was a bitter divorce so why would she remember him so fondly in the book? — E.O.

Q: Did Lana Turner's daughter murder her mother's lover in the 1950s strictly by accident or not? — L.R.

A: According to Cheryl Crane, Lana's daughter by her first marriage to the late Stephen Crane, here's how it happened. Cheryl recounts the incident — in which Lana's mobster boyfriend, Johnny Stompanato, was stabbed to death in 1958 — in her new book, "Detour: A Hollywood Story." Cheryl, 14 at the time, overheard a violent quarrel between Stompanato and her mother. She writes that she confronted him — while holding a kitchen knife. "Johnny was coming at (Turner) from behind, his arm raised to strike. I took a step forward and lifted the weapon. He ran on the blade. It went in."

Q: We've heard that Ben Vereen is so broken up by the death of his daughter that he's dropped out of show business completely. — R.R.

A: No question that Ben's still very shaken by the accidental death of his 16-year-old daughter, Naja. She was killed Dec. 2 in a freak accident in New Jersey when a tractor trailer fell on the car in which she and her mother were riding. (Her mother was not injured.) But Vereen has decided to embrace rather than retreat from performing. He'll be in four upcoming segments of the "J. J. Starbuck" TV series, Ben tells me. "The only

therapy now is work."

Q: A fan magazine claimed Heather Locklear has an inferiority complex, but didn't elaborate. Can you? — M.R.

A: It shouldn't come as a surprise that even the most beautiful actresses in Hollywood — a town awash in gorgeous women — are prone to self-doubts. Heather, the 26-year-old sexpot on TV's "Dynasty," says she often regards herself as a "geek. I think of myself as this bony, scrawny girl who makes a fool of herself all the time." That may come as something of a shock to fans of "Dynasty." As to her incredible good looks, Heather cautions, "Don't see me in the morning. I look scary."

Q: Is French actor Yves Montand really considering running for the French presidency? It's true he has always been outspoken politically. — G.L.

A: Montand denies he has any intention of being a candidate, although in a recent poll in France 29 percent of the voters said they would support him.

Q: We enjoyed Walter Matthau's performance as a seedy con man in the new comedy, "The Couch Trip," a spoof of the world of high-priced shrinks. What's his real opinion of this profession? — B.W.

Dusay's trouble in 'Santa Barbara'

There's some new blood on "Santa Barbara." Pamela, a damaged, vindictive ex-wife of C.C. Capwell, comes out of nowhere to stir up trouble between C.C. and his wife Sophia.

Rather than simply supplying bubble-headed surfing youngsters making messes to be fixed by their parents, "Santa Barbara" is leaning toward mature witches.

Last seen on "Capitol" as the scheming Myrna Clegg, an ambitious mother consumed by hate and envy, Marj Dusay gives Pamela the hooded look. You're never quite sure how Pamela will react.

"Myrna Clegg was a Sherman tank," says Marj. "No subtlety in her bones. Pamela has vulnerability, and she may enjoy the fete-a-tete with an uneasy C.C. while winning her two boys back."

Pamela didn't settle down in Montecito without weapons. One of those giant oil rigs out in the Channel belongs to Pamela. And that means a hefty bank account — power — despite Sophia's sabotage plan to shoot down the rig.

Pamela settles in for a decent run, a crafty survivor taking pains in needling C.C. Meanwhile, Marj goes back to prime time as Blair's (Lisa Welchel) snobbish Manhattan mother on "The Facts of Life" for a spinoff. In its ninth and final season, "Facts" is offering three spinoffs in March, hoping that one will take hold.

Pilots aren't taken seriously by Marj Dusay. She has made 10 over the years and watched them go down the drain.

"You can't predict anything about the business of a working actor," declares Marj in her role as Kansas Film Commissioner. Every year, Marj, born and raised in the small town of Russell, lectures to theater arts students at the University of Kansas, explaining the Hollywood facts of life.

"I use can't, a good deal," Marj admits. "And I make it clear there is no system out here. I try to motivate and to depict reality. If I had listened to myself as a student I doubt if I would be here now."

Married to a budding psychiatrist taking his residency in San Francisco, Marj broke in via commercials and a comedy improv

group. Along with Richard Dreyfuss, Marj came to L.A. with the group and soon had voiceovers, more commercials and TV guest roles. She never looked back as a character actress, usually with a job.

Vincent of 'Beauty and the Beast' holds strong attraction to sensitive female fans

HOLLYWOOD — The women of America have fallen in love with a Beast.

When CBS asked Ron Koslow to create a television series based on Jean Cocteau's 1946 film "Beauty and the Beast," both the network and the writer-producer expected the show, like other fantasy programs, to appeal most strongly to a female audience. The network was banking on that attraction when it scheduled "Beauty and the Beast" to air Friday nights as lead-in to its two soap operas, "Dallas" and "Falcon Crest," which also attract large female viewership.

But no one expected that Vincent, the Beast of this romantic fantasy-drama, would become TV's most unlikely sex symbol.

Recently, fan mail for Vincent has been flooding the production office at a rate of several hundred letters per week. The show, which opened the season ranked 44th in the networks' prime-time ratings, has recently inched up to 36th. It has won its time slot every week against regular series programming, though it has occasionally lost to specials aired opposite it.

"Beauty and the Beast," first unveiled at the annual meeting of representatives of CBS-affiliated stations here last summer, was met with suspicion by the mostly male group, some of whom called it "that weird show." Network executives soothed them by explaining that the series could have the same appeal as the bizarre 1978 hit "The Incredible Hulk."

Instead of comic-book aficionados, however, "Beauty and the Beast," a Ron Koslow Films and Witt-Thomas production in association with Republic Pictures, has attracted women — women who have willingly forsaken the monozygotic Don Johnsons, the slick Harry Hamilins, the sensitive tough-guy Tom Selleck types and the roguish Bruce Willis because they are dazzled by the beauty of the Beast.

Who is this guy, anyway?
The actor behind the Beast is Ron Perlman, 37, a family man, best

known for his portrayals of a prehistoric tribesman in the feature film "Quest for Fire" and the tragic hunchback in "The Name of the Rose," adapted from the brooding Umberto Eco novel.

Koslow, who wrote the show's pilot episode, created the character. Rick Baker designed the elaborate Beast makeup, which takes five hours to apply.

Koslow, Perlman and Baker all love Vincent enough themselves to offer their own unscientific theories on why women have fallen for the 6-foot-2, 206-pound, excessively hairy gentleman with the cascading blond locks, the feline face, the superhuman strength, the heart of platinum and the dulcet voice that seems created solely for reading Browning's "Sonnets From the Portuguese."

And though it may not have been

the first notion to occur to the network's research department, experts on the psychology of relationships call the outpouring of feminine passion as natural as rain.

First, a few details of Vincent's history: The Beast is a freak of nature, born grotesquely deformed and left to die but miraculously rescued by a man he calls Father (Ray Dotrice). Father, a scholarly recluse who had created his own world in the maze of steam tunnels beneath New York City, gave Vincent a classical education, a noble spirit and shelter from the pain and ridicule he would have experienced in the world above.

Vincent is in love with Catherine Chandler, a wealthy socialite lawyer, played by Linda Hamilton. In the pilot episode, Catherine was attacked in the street; her face bru-

tally slashed. Like Vincent, she was left to die until rescued and nursed back to health by the Beast; she did not see her savior until the bandages came off.

Shocked at first, Catherine came to appreciate Vincent for his heart rather than his appearance. The two continue a secret, chaste and tragically impossible romance. Moreover, Vincent can sense Catherine's emotions and instinctively knows when she is in danger.

Psychologist Lonnie Barbach, a member of the clinical faculty of the University of California, San Francisco and author of the recently published book "Erotic Interludes: Tales Told for Women" and seven other books on relationships and sexuality, says the Vincent-Catherine relationship perfectly fits most women's romantic ideal.

Barbach said that the beauty-beast relationship is a classic one in which two lovers are separated, by an insurmountable barrier — in this case, being from different species.

Some writers have suggested that the chaste romance might be particularly apt in the era of AIDS; Barbach disputes that theory, saying that such appeal is historic and timeless.

"That's why the romance novels are so popular," she said. "There's often a great deal of disparity between the two people — a poor

woman and a very wealthy man (for example). It's purer than pure. The women who are looking to these novels are looking to be rescued, to be taken care of — to being nurtured, to being treated as if they were some precious jewel."

Barbach added that the fact that the romance cannot be consummated only adds to its appeal. "He adores her and he cherishes her. Who cares about the sex?" she reasoned.

Jerald Jellison, a professor of psychology at the University of Southern California who specializes in personal relationships, said Vincent possesses two of the top five attributes that research indicates women want most in a man — understanding and an idealistic sense of romance. He said the need for nurturing is particularly strong in people who hold low positions of power, a group that includes many women.

Jellison said the Beast's plight taps into a need common to both men and women — to be appreciated despite their appearance, or to be loved for giving that gift to someone else.

"There is a very, very strong appeal to the person who is misunderstood, the loner," he said. "And part of the appeal is you can see their real worth, you can see beyond the surface, you are fighting to get in there and touch the person. It's kind of a savior complex."

Conversely, Jellison said, people want that respect, and tune in to

"Beauty and the Beast" because their spouse may be too busy watching football to provide it.

"We want people to treat us with more understanding. You shouldn't worry about me because I'm a little overweight, because I smoke, because I'm not as pretty as someone else," he said.

Koslow calls his "Beauty and the Beast" "a classical love story in contemporary terms," and said he believes the Beast's ability to sense Catherine's feelings provides a consummation that is in some ways deeper than sex.

He modestly attributes much of the Beast's appeal to Perlman's acting ability. "Aside from his voice, which is pretty magical, he is really able to plumb the depths, to get to the core of an emotion and just strip-mine it," he said.

And Perlman, with equal modesty, attributes the phenomenon to Koslow's conception of the Beast.

"This character is so incredibly attractive in who he is, humanistically," he said. "It's as classical a role as I've ever had, Shakespeare included."

"I think now is the best time for it (the show). I have complained for years that the media, on every level, have given the world more than it wants or needs to know. What this show is is a return to Gothic romance — the main thrust of the drama is unspoken, not acted out. That consummation is supplied by the viewer, and I think the viewer is grateful without ever knowing why."

Perlman would not turn over any of his fan mail, believing it would be ungentlemanly to print private correspondence in a newspaper. (He also has turned down countless requests to promote products in Beast makeup. "He's not there to be exploited.")

But he discloses that in addition to the usual requests for dates or personal data, he also receives letters from people who have physical deformities or terminal illnesses who empathize with the Beast's life. "They're very literate letters — we're reaching a very educated audience," he said.

Perlman added that he hopes more men will begin to tune into the show, because he thinks it offers hope to them as well.

"If you've ever been turned down as a young guy, asking a girl for a date or to the prom, you have to deal with it: 'Don't they know that just because I'm not beautiful, I might show them the best time they've ever had? That's the Beast.'"

mother, Ingrid Bergman, came from. What's the reason? Is she trying to learn something of her heritage?

A: Pia has no plans for such a move. Her career is going well, she likes New York and she recently spent \$300,000 for a weekend house in Sherman, a quiet little Connecticut town.

Q: Didn't Loretta Swit go to South Korea strictly as a publicity trick to hype reruns of the "M.A.S.H." TV shows? — L.M.

A: Loretta went to Seoul, Inchon and other South Korean locations recently to film segments of "The Korean War Stories" TV special to be aired in May. Since she had acted in "M.A.S.H." for 10 1/2 years, her trip won a lot of publicity because of the obvious association. Still in all, Loretta was shaken by her visit, which included a visit to the hostile North Korean border. "You feel the tension, the imminent danger and violence," Loretta told me. Wonder if she was referring to the headline writers?

The other is a syndicated special, "Milton Berle: The Second Time 'Round," comprising excerpts from the old TV shows.

Super Bowl gives ABC first place in ratings

NEW YORK (AP) — It was the lowest-rated Super Bowl since 1974, but Sunday's championship game between the Washington Redskins and the Denver Broncos gave ABC first place in the weekly ratings last week, its first win since the World Series last October.

According to A.C. Nielsen Co., ABC won the week ending Jan. 31 with an average, prime-time, rating of 18.2. NBC was second with 16.1 and CBS third with 12.1. NBC leads for the season with 18.4, CBS's second with 18.6, and ABC third with 13.4.

The "CBS Evening News" continued its winning streak, now 19 in a row, with an average rating last week of 12.6 and a 22 share. "NBC Nightly News" was second with an 11.4 and a 20. ABC's "World News Tonight" had an 11.2 and a 19.

CBS' news program got a bump in the Tuesday ratings, the night after Dan Rather engaged in a combative live interview with Vice President George Bush during the "CBS Evening News." The rating for Monday was 13.1; Tuesday's was 14.7. A Super Bowl XXXI was the highest-rated, prime-time show of the week

with a rating of 41.9 and a 62 share. That was the lowest-rated since Super Bowl VIII between the Minnesota Vikings and Miami Dolphins which rated a 41.6 but a 73 share of the audience.

The rating is a percentage of the nation's 88.8 million households with televisions. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

The rating for the game dropped off steadily, especially after the second quarter when Washington took the lead. Washington won, 42-10. Denver scored all 10 of its points in the first quarter.

The rest of the top 10: "The Cosby Show" NBC, "Super Bowl XXII Post-Game Show" ABC, "A Different World" NBC, "Growing Pains" ABC, "Golden Girls" NBC, "Cheers" NBC, "Who's the Boss?" ABC, "Night Court" NBC and "The Murder of Mary Phagan, Part 1" NBC.

"The Murder of Mary Phagan" was a two-part miniseries starring Jack Lemmon. Part one aired Sunday, Part two ran Tuesday and will be included in the Nielsen ratings released next week.

ABC premiered its critically praised "The Wonder Years," a

nostalgic, half-hour comedy, after the Super Bowl. It ranked 13th with a rating of 17.9 and a 31 share. ABC plans to put the show in its regular weekly lineup in March.

NBC expected to lose the week because of the Super Bowl on ABC, but was pleased to have its highest-rated Friday night yet, thanks to the absence of CBS' regular lineup and to a high-rated repeat of the TV movie "The Six Million Dollar Man and the Bionic Woman," which ranked 22nd. A repeat of "Miami Vice" ranked a respectable 32nd in the ratings.

But a Wednesday experiment with "Cheers" and "Beverly Hills Buntz" didn't succeed. "Cheers" was nine rating points lower on Wednesday than on Thursday. "Buntz," which followed it, fell to 56th in the rankings.

The lowest-rated shows of the week were: "West 57th," "Live and Let Die," "St. Elsewhere," "Ohara," "The Thorns," "Houston Knights," "The Law and Harry McGraw," "Sledge Hammer!" "Our House," "The Charmings" and "On the Edge."

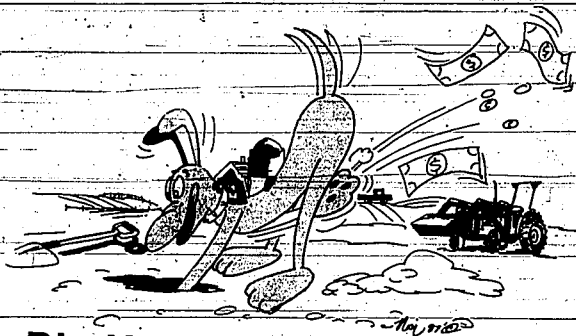

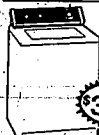


