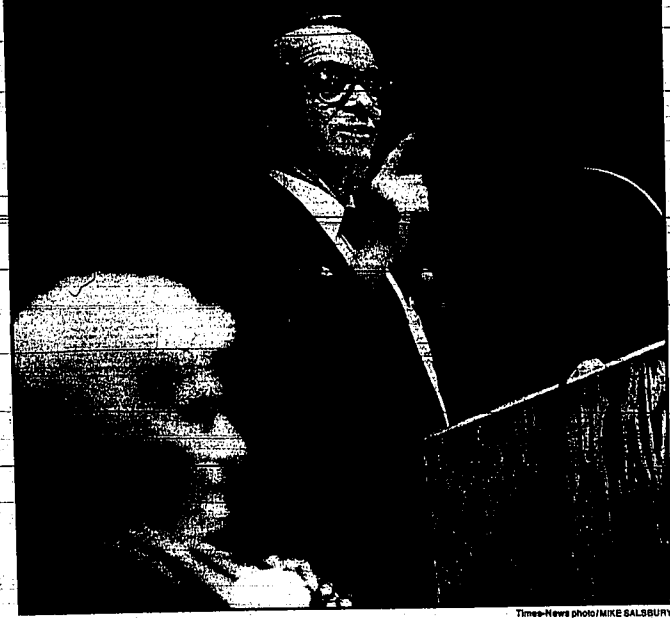

## Boyd discusses U.S. 95; promises no new taxes

TWIN FALLS — Idaho House Speaker Tom Boyd focused on potentially unpopular themes Thursday to illustrate the need for elected officials to represent their constituents.  
"He (Abraham Lincoln) said he would be guided by their (constituents) will," said Boyd, who was keynote speaker at Twin Falls County Lincoln Day Banquet. "How many of you legislators have thought about that?"  
But the specific points he covered in his speech likely will not be entirely popular. He said simply that no new taxes would be raised to fund Idaho education, during the same speech in which he lobbied for funding highway improvements along U.S. 95 in his district.  
State Republican leaders shared the "dis- with-Boyd for his homecoming, having been born in Filer and being a graduate of Twin Falls High School. Featured were Lt. Gov. Butch Otter and State Treasurer Lydia Justice Edwards. They had an audience of 150 people.  
Boyd-quoted Lincoln, in his

speech honoring that first Republican president, to describe the quandary facing elected officials on some issues. An example, he noted, was the shepherd who frees a sheep from a wolf's jaws, only to be praised for his intervention by one, while criticized by the other.  
Referring to currently-proposed education budgets, Boyd was interrupted by applause as he said, "The Republicans in the House this year are committed to not raise taxes."  
The Genesee representative said he understood that schools from the University of Idaho from his neck of the woods to the College of Southern Idaho in Twin Falls all wanted more money, but he promised "this Legislature its committed to hold the line."  
He acknowledged that Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus was a catalyst in 1987 to help raise public education funding more than 10 percent. "But the Republican representatives had to be involved this year or it wouldn't have been moving," Boyd said.  
"There will be an increase this year. It won't be as voluminous as last year, but there will be an increase," Boyd added. "We want to

do it within the constraints of the money we have available."  
But as what he called his only political statement of the night, Boyd lobbied the audience and seven legislators present to support funding highway improvements along U.S. 95, "what we call the goat trail."  
He said the improvements would remove bottlenecks along the route, to improve trucking commerce to Lewiston barges. But while conceding that he lived 25 miles from the barge, he said Magic Valley and the rest of the state would benefit from farming exports.  
"I guarantee to you it is an economic advantage for Magic Valley to move their products north to Lewiston," he said.  
He said a series of bills would be introduced in the next few weeks and he suggested people should let their representatives know which they supported, if any.  
"We'd like a little support for some help to dedicate part of the fuel tax to pay for those improvements," Boyd said.  
"Honest to God, ladies and gentlemen, we ought to get these two ends of the state joined together," he said, as he was again showered with applause.

## Reagan announces space privatization

WASHINGTON — President Reagan unveiled a national space policy Thursday to turn commercial space activity over to private industry and start scientists developing the technologies needed to send humans beyond the moon.  
Reagan said he will ask for \$100 million in next year's federal budget to get the research started.  
The policy also pledged to remove any government roadblock to allowing private industry to launch rockets and place satellites in orbit.  
"It shifts the major responsibility for space development from pub-

lic to the private sector," said C. William Verity, the Secretary of Commerce, at White House briefing. "Think of this policy as a leader that will restore America's leadership in space."  
James C. Fletcher, the NASA administrator, said the policy clearly establishes that the first time, the United States has a long-range goal of expanding human presence and activity beyond Earth orbit into the solar system.  
Other than the \$100 million for the new technology program called "Pathfinder"—the new policy did not spell out how much of the joint federal-commercial partnership will cost. Whatever the cost, it will

be borne long after Reagan leaves office.  
In the budget proposal he will make to Congress next week, the President asks \$1 billion for the space station, which will be built in the next decade and be in operation by 1995. NASA had asked for nearly twice that much.  
Jim Burnley, the transportation secretary, used the occasion to announce that his department had completed approval of the nation's first commercial launch license, which will permit Convair, Inc., a Lanham, Md., company, to launch a series of sounding rockets for an unnamed European industrial.

## Wilderness bill reaches final form

BOISE — Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, and Gov. Cecil Andrus have reached final agreement on a bill to protect the Idaho wilderness bill they negotiated during a series of meetings last year.  
McClure said Thursday that he would introduce the bill when the Senate returns to session next week.  
"It's a done deal," Andrus said Thursday in Idaho Falls.  
He and McClure shook hands in late December on a proposal to designate 18 areas totaling more than 1.4 million acres as wilderness, but it has taken their staffs the past six weeks to put the plan on paper. Both men agree to reflect their intentions, stalling McClure's original plans to introduce the bill late last month.  
The proposal has come under attack by environmentalists, timber interests and recreationists as setting aside either too little or too much acreage. Some criticism also has been leveled at provisions of the plan that would establish a number of "special management areas" containing almost 616,000 acres.  
"This bill is not going to make everyone entirely happy, because it is a compromise in the truest sense of the word," McClure said. "I hope that we give reason the opportunity to prevail over emotion on this issue."  
The Senate would act on the bill during the congressional hearings on the legislation to be conducted in Idaho during the second week in March. Expected locations for the

## Commuter planes would be affected FAA proposes recorder rule

WASHINGTON — Commuter aircraft, which carry nearly 30 million people a year, would have to be equipped with "black box" recorders to assist in crash investigations, under a regulation proposed Thursday by the Federal Aviation Administration.  
The recorders — a flight data recorder to monitor aircraft performance and a cockpit voice recorder to preserve crew conversations — are already required on larger jetliners.  
The regulation was submitted Thursday for publication today in the Federal Register.  
The National Transportation Safety Board for years has urged that commuter planes, which normally have 30 or fewer seats, have such recorders because the devices often are essential in pinpointing the cause of an accident.  
In recent years, at least a half-dozen accident investigations were hampered because the plane had no such devices, NTSB spokesman Mike Benson said.  
Additional focus has been put on the issue in recent years because of the sharp increase in the number of people who fly on commuter aircraft — 28.4 million people in 1986, about twice as many as in 1981, according to the Regional Airline Association. No figures were available for last year, although the number was expected to have increased.

The FAA's proposed rule, which is expected to be made final within a few months, would require a cockpit voice recorder on turbine-powered commuter planes of six seats or more within two years.  
It also would require flight data recorders on all turbine-powered commuter planes of 20 or more seats and all new turbine-powered commuter planes of 10 or more seats.  
Operators of planes having 10 to 19 seats would not have to install existing aircraft with the devices, although larger commuter planes would have to be retrofitted within two years of a final rule.  
A flight data recorder keeps track of air speed, engine power and plane position during flight, while the cockpit voice recorder monitors conversations in the cockpit on a continuous 30-minute loop recording.  
The recorders, which actually are orange in color, have been dubbed "black boxes" because often they are found amid the charred wreckage after an aircraft accident. They have for years been required on large jetliners of more than 30 seats.  
The rule also for the first time would require a flight data recorder on some large general aviation aircraft used for business and other private purposes.  
These planes do not carry commercial passengers but are turbine-powered, require more than one pilot and have at least 10 seats.

## Judge in Carey cases receives anonymous threat

TWIN FALLS — The 5th District judge handling several foreclosure and fraud cases against Carey residents has received a written but unsigned threat that he may place himself in "legal peril" if he does not promptly and effectively perform his duties.  
Fifth District Judge Phillip Becker said a man who identified himself as a

deputy sheriff from Blaine County delivered a packet of information containing the threats Tuesday.  
The information included a one-page letter with the word "notice" printed one-half inch letters on the top and the bottom.  
Becker said he was incensed at the threat but it would have absolutely no influence on his decisions.  
"That threat means nothing," he said. "You can't start letting people start

threatening judges, or anybody."  
"A little threat can become a big threat and can go a long ways," Becker said.  
Blaine County Sheriff Walt Felsing said he is investigating the incident, which Becker thinks may have involved one of Felsing's patrolmen.  
"It just irritates me that they think they can walk in here and intimidate me," Becker said.  
Becker said the man who delivered the threat identified himself as a Blaine

County deputy sheriff and said he was a "process server." The Gooding County Sheriff's office is also investigating the incident.  
Becker is handling the foreclosure and fraud cases after 5th District Judge James May disqualified himself from the cases late last week.  
The cases involve several "right draft" suits by Carey residents to Idaho banks. These right drafts, which look like checks and supposedly can be redeemed at a Mex-

ican bank, have proved to be worthless, the banks say.  
The Carey residents demanded title to cars they recently purchased after sending the drafts to the banks.  
The use of those right drafts is under investigation by the Idaho Department of Finance.  
Similar schemes, apparently involving other front companies, have resulted in federal and state indictments in Kenosha, Wis.

## Conservative group gives Idaho senators high marks

WASHINGTON — If there's any doubt that Idaho Sens. James McClure and Steven Symms make up one of the most conservative teams in the Senate, new ratings by the American Conservative Union dispel it.  
McClure, the senior senator from Payette, received a conservative rating of 98 percent, while Symms, of Caldwell, re-

most conservative in Congress.  
The ACU gave Rep. Larry Craig, R-First District, a rating of 88 percent, while Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Second District, received a 33 percent rating.

# Andrus takes his campaign for school aid across the state

Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus, fighting to salvage his second round of significant education spending hikes, accused Republican lawmakers on Thursday of shortchanging the children of Idaho and forcing a multimillion-dollar tax hike on property owners.

Taking the campaign for his \$362 million public school aid plan to Idaho Falls, the governor lashed out at a Republican effort to hold the increase in state aid to only 3 percent, \$354 million, just to avoid raising taxes in an election year.

As Andrus was stumping in eastern Idaho, a problem developed with the Republican state employee pay raise plan that is critical to the GOP drive to hold the line on spending this year. A miscalculation of the actual number of employees covered by the plan has resulted in the possibility that agencies could get more money for raises than lawmakers originally intended.

Because of that, legislative budget writers canceled their plans for setting the 1989 budget today. Senate Finance Chairman Atwell Parry, R-Melba, said the joint committee would wait until it gets a clear picture from Republican leaders on just how the pay-hike plan should be implemented.

But that delay could give the governor just that much more time to build public pressure on the Legislature for his spending package.

After last year's unprecedented budget hikes, Andrus said the Idaho Chamber of Commerce, the GOP plan is far less than "the minimum we can do and still continue to build on the progress we made a year ago."

"To date, your legislators have not come to grips with the reality of what they are thinking about doing," the governor said. "That kind of thinking simply shortchanges our children."

"I'm here to ask your help to make sure they understand the situation," said Andrus, recalling his trip to eastern Idaho a year ago that seemed to break open the 1987 budget debate. He said if the state does not provide adequate support, property owners will have to turn around opponents to repeal of the \$15 million investment tax credit.

the cornerstone of his package to finance the budget. That bill was held up by not definitely killed by House tax writers earlier this week.

The board of directors for the Boise Area Chamber of Commerce went on record earlier in the day in support of the repeal bill, reversing the stand the chamber took more than a month ago in opposition to any tax increase this year. Officials said the decision was prompted by the need to invest in the state's educational system.

And the Boise State University Alumni Association said it would announce today that Mountain Bell Telephone Co. and several other Idaho corporations along with past repeal supporter Albertson's would formally back the governor's call for repeal of the credit.

"We are concerned about the level of funding for education that might be approved by the current Legislature," spokesman Dyke Nally said at the Capitol.

Democratic Congressman Richard Stallings tried to give Andrus a boost. He warned lawmakers the state would have to bear an increasing share of future financial responsibility for education.

"There will not be a lot of additional support coming from the federal," Stallings told House and

Senate members. "In fact, in the next year we're going to see some belt tightening. So it means the state is going to have to find the revenues to maintain these levels."

Stallings said corporate officials still have a dim view of Idaho's educational system and the state has to take steps to create an atmosphere that will reduce the export of young people.

At almost the same time Stallings was pressing state lawmakers, Andrus and four eastern Idaho business leaders were touring the Dora Erickson Elementary School, underscoring the point that economic expansion goes hand in hand with quality education. ## Measure raising kindergarten age passes House, faces Senate test

BOISE (AP) — Legislation boosting to 5 the minimum age for entering kindergarten has sailed through the Idaho House and faces its next test in the Senate.

The House voted 68-14 on Thursday for legislation moving the minimum age for entry into kindergarten to age 5 by Aug. 15 of the entering school year. Present law allows children who do not turn 5 until Oct. 15 to start kindergarten.

But sponsors of the legislation, which included a 35-year education veteran and former elementary school principal, argued that it is too early for some students.

"What is the hurry?" asked Rep. Herm Steger, R-Boise, a former school administrator. "Why do we have to hurry a child through school to graduate by age 18?"

The legislation, which is endorsed by several educational organizations, advances the entering age to Sept. 15 in the next

school year and makes it Aug. 15 the year after that.

Sponsors said that while many children are ready to enter the school system at an early age, some are not. Those who enter school too early tend to have problems keeping up, they said, often having to repeat the early grades.

Rep. Tom Loertscher, R-Idaho Falls, passed out statistics compiled from an Idaho Falls district which showed there is no relationship between birthdays and those who later drop out, struggle through school or are diverted to non-academic programs.

Steger said his statistics from Boise-area districts show there is a relationship between early entry into the school system and later problems.

Rep. Cella Gould, R-Boise, said there is pressure to succeed in the classroom. "It is wrong to give children stress before they are ready for that stress," she said.

"Don't put children in a situation where they have to catch up forever," said Rep. Ruby Stone, R-Boise.

Rep. Chris Hooper, R-Boise, said the bill's theme runs directly against his experience as father of three children.

"We are individuals. The system ought to be able to cope with individuality. This bill doesn't," he said.

"This is a step in the right direction," said Rep. L. Ed Brown, R-Pocatello, although he said further attention should be paid toward restructuring or reorganizing the early grades.

Rep. Leanna Lausen, D-Mountain Home, said letting a child start school when he or she is emotionally ready could be a great gift. "It would be the gift of self-esteem. It will make them believe they can be successful in their school years," she said.

## Newcomb casts only negative vote as panel approves judicial pay hike

BOISE (AP) — With only one dissenting vote, the House Judiciary, Rules and Administration Committee has approved bills granting the state's top judges 5 percent pay raises in each of the next two years.

Rep. Russell Newcomb, R-Twin Falls, was the only dissenting vote as the committee endorsed the two proposals Thursday.

Two judges, including a man who left the state judiciary recently after a 25-year career, told the committee pay raises are necessary to allow Idaho's court system to continue attracting top-notch people.

If the measures become law it will cost people who file civil actions \$1 more to pay for the raises. The filing fee would go to \$46. Everyone convicted of criminal violations also would have \$1 added to their court costs. Those costs now are \$15.50.

"Don't let us become the Mississippi of the Western states in judicial salaries," said 2nd District Judge John Bengtson of Moscow.

The amount of pay is not important, said Edward Lodge, who last month was sworn in as a federal bankruptcy judge. When he retired as a 3rd District judge, Lodge had 25 years on the bench, making

him the senior member of the state's judiciary.

The issue is, is it high enough to recruit top people to the bench?" Lodge told the committee.

In response to a question, Lodge said he did not want to leave his job as a district judge, but felt he could not pass up the federal job.

He now makes \$10,000 per year more than he would have made as a state judge, and next October will make \$20,000 per year more.

"I love the trial court, I'd love to be there right now," Lodge said.

In 1985 and 1986, Idaho judges received pay raises that moved them up from among the lowest-paid in the nation.

Courts administrator Carl Bianchi said with the raises, district court judges would get \$61,740 per year. But he said that still is \$3,000 to \$6,000 per year lower than the average of Western states.

Only Montana, which has the lowest judicial salaries in the nation, will be lower than Idaho among Western states, he said.

U.S. District Court justices of the Idaho Supreme Court, now at \$59,750, would go to \$62,738 on

July 1 and \$65,871 effective July 1, 1989.

District judges, now at \$56,000 except for administrative judges, would go to \$58,800 and then to \$61,740 in 1989.

There was no debate among committee members. After the meeting, Newcomb said he voted against the bill because he wanted to preserve the right to vote against the legislation on the House floor.

He said he might oppose it because the Legislature is working hard to hold down spending in other areas — and some might think it wrong to grant a small group a relatively big pay increase.

## Time to cooperate on cancer center

Before emotions get any higher and positions harden to the point that saving face is more important than making progress, we think it is time for all the parties in the hospital cancer center dispute to, as the saying goes, come and reason together.

You do not have to look very far in Twin Falls to see the results of when officials paint themselves into a corner in pursuing policies the logic for which is obscure.

In the case of the cancer center, there is now a window of opportunity, in our view, for all parties involved to find a way to jointly build a center which will be both economically viable and meet the patient needs of the valley.

That window is due to the need for the Magic Valley Regional Medical Center to complete a detailed cost feasibility study on the cancer center, a process which is expected to take a couple of months.

That feasibility study is likely to show that the center is not viable, either in terms of patient care or in economic terms, unless both MVRMC and the Twin Falls Clinic are participants.

In short, without cooperation, there will be no quality cancer treatment center here.

An aging population and gradual, valley-wide growth could change the numbers. But even if the project were viable by MVRMC without help, we think the emotional and political climate strongly suggest that MVRMC should not go this one alone.

The risk of economic failure and the "line in the dust" by the Clinic doctors, as stated elsewhere on this page, reinforce that conclusion.

A wise editor once told us that there are only two issues in community news: government and money.

At least in some sense, the cancer center dispute is about money, or more specifically, about which institution will reap the financial rewards of cancer care: MVRMC, the Clinic, or the Mountain States Tumor Institute of Boise.

For a compromise to work, there has to be willingness from all three to share the profits. All three will have to bend on this point.

From our perspective, we think a solution may lie in a contract arrangement, in which MSTI, which has a demonstrated track record in cancer treatment, would set up a center under contract with both the hospital and the Clinic.

On the economic side, we think MSTI should be given the "lead" position; that is, the contract should give them the lion's share of the financial reward, in exchange for a long-term commitment to serve the Magic Valley community.

This would require both cooperation from the Clinic, as well as a decision by MVRMC and the Twin Falls County Commissioners to set aside its own cancer center plan.

MSTI, in our view, has both the expertise and the support of a sizable group of Twin Falls doctors.

Its presence in the valley would be a great advantage in recruiting both additional medical facilities and other businesses.

Without cooperation, this dispute threatens to dissolve into petty bickering, turf protection and blind greed.

The time for that cooperation is now, not after feelings are further hurt and positions hardened.

Life in the Magic Valley offers many plusses. High-quality cancer treatment should be one of them.

We hope that reasoning together by all parties concerned will bring that about.

## Physicians support center under MSTI

This paper is written to clarify the position of the physicians practicing at the Twin Falls Clinic & Hospital in regards to the controversy surrounding placement of a cancer treatment center in our city.

The 15 physicians at the Twin Falls Clinic & Hospital strongly support the placement of a cancer treatment center under the auspices of Mountain States Tumor Institute as opposed to Magic Valley Regional Medical Center for the following reasons:

1. Quality of care for cancer patients will be more optimal from an established and proven first-class cancer treatment center.
2. Our confidence in the oncologic physicians at MSTI over the past 20 years.
3. Our discussions with MSTI comparing the quality and type of radiation therapy unit they have planned for the Magic Valley as compared to the services planned by MVRMC.
4. Our knowledge that 37 to 40 percent of all cancer patients coming from the Twin Falls Clinic & Hospital. These patients will continue to be referred to MSTI despite the development of a cancer treatment center at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, at least until that cancer treatment center is proven to be equal to the cancer treatment center presently available at MSTI.

5. Our belief that a local cancer treatment center is a marginal investment even with 100 percent local support. Without 100 percent local support, it would be disastrous and a financial drain on the hospital's budget.

6. The statements made concerning the development of a local independent cancer treatment center have been made without careful financial feasibility studies preceding that commitment.

7. This further demonstrates the irrational and irresponsible decision-making process governing the policies of our county hospital. If this were their money, you can be sure a feasibility study would have been done before any commitment was made.

8. The argument for local control is totally groundless and although sounding good, has no logical reasoning behind it.

9. We know from discussions with MSTI that they will play no role other than minimal ancillary support in a local cancer center without an absolute controlling interest.

10. The attraction of top quality oncologists to this city without 100 percent support from the

entire medical community will be all but impossible.

We physicians at the Twin Falls Clinic & Hospital strongly support a local radiation cancer treatment center and do not argue the need for such a unit. We feel that the question lies in who is going to establish that center.

For the above-mentioned reasons, we at this point strongly support MSTI. Given the above-mentioned facts, we would strongly urge the county commissioners to closely review not only the economic feasibility of a Magic Valley Regional Medical Center unit, but more importantly, the questions concerning quality of patient care.

It is our hope that after the commissioners' review, Magic Valley Regional Medical Center's hospital administration and board will reconsider their commitment to the development of a local cancer unit.

# Jerome farmer-legislator is brutally honest about his work

BOISE — It's hard to dislike a fellow who is so brutally honest. I'm thinking, of course, of Waldo Martens, the nicest guy you ever want to meet.

He's a farmer from Jerome and a state legislator serving in his second term.

And in his own small way, he has impressed quite a few people.

"You know, I don't think I've ever seen Waldo Martens rise to debate," said Rep. Steve Antonio, R-Rupert, a quiet man in his own right. The other day, Waldo was chatting about the Legislature and the

He wanted to leave on Idaho. "I've worked hard all my life," he said while sitting in the high-back, black semi-gloss fake leather chair in the chambers of the House of Representatives. "I didn't come up here to work harder than I work at home. I picked the easiest committee I could find."

Waldo Martens just might be the only man in history ever to make that claim in public, in the chambers of the state Legislature, to a reporter.

It's almost had a Mercedes Benz on it.

That's not to say there aren't dozens of lawmakers who feel the same way. Who slog through the Legislature with no idea what's going on. Who sit in their chairs and listen to debate in committees or on the floor and wonder, "Who cares?" But Waldo Martens had the

gumption, the courage, the spirit to sit boldly in the House and say, "I didn't come up here to work hard."

His words struck like thunder. Nearly knocking Paul Republican Rep. Mack Neibaur out of his chair. "Now, Waldo, don't say that," said Neibaur, sitting two seats down. "You came up here to work hard." "No, I didn't," Martens said. A man who sticks by his word. A man who says what he means and means what he says.

We are now in the 32nd day of the 2nd Regular Session of the 49th Idaho Legislature. To date, 315 bills have been introduced and 10 bills have been passed in either the House or the Senate. All this for a mere \$18,300 a day, the cost of keeping 124 lawmakers in business.

But after 32 days, not one bill has gone to the governor for his signature.

Naturally, legislation should not be hurried. A really good law never comes out of the Legislature unless it's been allowed to fester.

But this year, legislation appears to be dying from boredom. Lobbyists have been caught napping in the foyer. Reporters have been interviewing each other for stories.

"What's going on?" "Nothing. What am I missing?" "Nothing." "People from all walks of life are beginning to wonder, 'Why aren't they doing anything?'" "Personally, I think Waldo said it

for everyone. Now some people might think that such a brash, brassy, brutally honest statement could cause Waldo some trouble at the polls in November. Voters can only take so much honesty, and then they get testy.

But I believe honesty should be rewarded. Dozens, nay, thousands of people travel to Boise every year and pretend they're doing something fruitful when everyone knows they're not.

Waldo Martens makes no pretensions. He's a man for our times. A politician for the 80s. A Renaissance kind of guy.

So re-elect Waldo Martens. You may not be getting a lot, but by getting, you know what you're getting.

# Conservative group finds congressional shift to the left

WASHINGTON (AP) — The American Conservatory Union said Thursday that Congress moved far to the left on the political spectrum last year, a finding that matches an assessment by the group's ideological rival.

Releasing its annual ratings of congressional activity, the ACU said the House had an overall score of 37 on a 0-100 scale that awards high marks for votes supporting positions taken by the conservative organization. The House's score for 1986 was 42.

The Senate last year had 40 ACU points, a drop of 10 from its total in 1986 before Democrats retook control of the chamber and brought a more liberal bent, especially from the House Democratic freshmen from the South.

The ACU scorecard was similar to the annual congressional ratings released Wednesday by the liberal Americans for Democratic Action. The ADA rated Congress as a body in a moderate-to-liberal camp.

For the first time in the 40 years the ADA has rated Congress, the House and Senate simultaneously scored above 60, meaning they supported ADA positions more than half the time.

Dan Casey, executive director of the ACU, said that he did not know how his group's 1987 ratings compared to those done by the organization since 1971.

He said that from the ACU's standpoint, the 1987 showing by Congress was at "its lowest point during the Reagan years."

Members of Congress are "moving further to the left ... moving in a direction we do not find attractive,"

## FBI classifies public material during probe

WASHINGTON — The FBI assigned a "secret" classification to material circulated publicly by a conservative group, and sent to more than 50 field offices in an investigation of opponents of the American Constitution Central America policies, according to an FBI document and interviews.

The conservative group aide who compiled the information said Thursday he found it "sent what humorous" that the material was classified, and "became part of a major investigation."

The aide, Mike Boos of the Young America's Foundation of Reston, Va., said he sent the same material to about 500 conservative individuals and organizations in the Washington area, and published it in a conservative newsletter, "The American Sentinel."

FBI spokesman Ray McElhaneey said the material contained allegations of criminal wrongdoing over which the FBI has criminal jurisdiction, and the bureau was "duty bound to check it out."

McElhaneey said he did not know why the public material was classified when it was received in 1984, even though Boos told the bureau in his cover letter that it would be published in the newsletter.

The July 32, 1984, FBI letter to 33 field offices, which accompanied Boos' material, was declassified last September and released recently to the New York-based Center for Constitutional Rights, which filed a Freedom of Information Act lawsuit to obtain the material.

The center was representing the Committee in Solidarity With the People of El Salvador — CISPES — which was the focal-point of the FBI investigation.

The center said the surveillance of CISPES that began in 1981 branched out to include other organizations opposed to U.S. policies in Central America.

## Booster test is successful

HUNTSVILLE, Ala. (AP) — A redesigned booster for the space shuttle was test-fired with a deliberate flaw Thursday, and NASA engineers said the test appeared to show the new rocket could withstand the leak that destroyed Challenger.

"This test would have prevented another Challenger," said Jim Thomas, technical assistant to the manager of the solid rocket motor project at Marshall Space Flight

Center, where the test was conducted.

In the test, hot exhaust gas was allowed to lick through deliberately flawed joints and reach the relay, many of which simulated the kind of leak that blew up the shuttle Challenger and killed its seven crew members Jan. 28, 1986.

On Challenger, the flaming gas got past the O-ring, which sealed a joint between segments of the rocket, and ignited the shuttle's huge external liquid fuel tank.

Keene said that 91 percent of the House Democrats scored below 30, compared to 72 percent in this category in 1986.

In the Senate, the Democratic score fell from 25 in 1986 to 14 in 1987. Republicans dipped from 72 in 1986 to 70 last year.

"We noted a continued polarization in the House and Senate ... that has picked up in part because of the Democratic control of the Senate," Keene said.

He cited his discussion of the 1987 voting records of presidential candidates to one man: Sen. Albert Gore, D-Tenn., who has positioned himself to the right of his Democratic rivals and is basing his early hopes on primaries in the South.

Keene displayed a chart showing that among 13 southerners in the Senate, Gore's 6 points were the lowest.

"There is some credibility gap between the claim Sen. Gore is moderate-to-conservative and the reality," Keene said.

"The ACU awards points only for votes actually cast by a lawmaker. Gore missed eight of the 22 votes that were used to evaluate the Senate."

The scores for the other presidential hopefuls serving in Congress were: Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., 0; with 13 missed votes; Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., 77, no missed votes;

Sen. Dick Gephardt, D-Mo., 99, missed votes in 20 House rollcalls rated by the ACU; and Rep. Jack Kemp, R-N.Y., 94, seven missed votes.

The ACU's lifetime averages for each is: Gore, 11; Simon, 7; Dole, 77; Gephardt, 15; and Kemp, 87.

Four senators, all Republicans, got perfect marks from the ACU for 1987: Phil Gramm of Texas, Jesse Helms of North Carolina; Bill Armstrong of Colorado and Don Nickles of Oklahoma.

Of this group, only Armstrong got a zero in the ADA's liberal ratings. The ADA and ACU did not use the exact same roll calls in their ratings.

Eleven Democratic senators got zeroes from the ACU: Alan Cranston of California; Tim Wirth of Colorado; Chris Dodd of Connecticut; Joseph Biden of Delaware; Daniel Inouye and Spark Matsunaga of Hawaii; Simon; Paul Sarbanes of Maryland; Edward M. Kennedy of Massachusetts; Paul Kennedy of Missouri of New York; and Claiborne Pell of Rhode Island.

In the House, 14 Republicans were rated 100 by the ACU. Zeroes went to 97 representatives, all of them Democrats except for Stewart McKinney, R-Conn., who voted against his death position six times before his ACU last year.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fewer Americans are rushing to file their federal tax returns this year, but those who do are finding the average refund up by almost 20 percent from 1987, the Internal Revenue Service said Thursday.

During the first five weeks of the year, the IRS received 9.4 million returns, down 17.6 percent from the 11.08 million for the same period a year ago. The average refund was \$656, compared with \$648 at the same time last year.

These returns, due by April 15, are the first since

most of the big new tax law enacted in 1986 took effect. And although some errors are turning up, the IRS said, there have been no big surprises.

"Early indications are that the filing season is going pretty much as expected," Robert LeBaube, director of the IRS taxpayer-service division, told reporters. The drop in the number filing early returns is not significant, he said.

In fact, the number of couples and individuals who delay filing has been growing each year.

# Nofziger convicted of illegal lobbying

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan's onetime political director, Lyn Nofziger, was convicted Thursday of illegal lobbying in top White House aides by jurors who said they had no trouble finding evidence of influence peddling.

"The evidence just kept coming in all the time," said Thomas Braxton, the foreman of the federal court jury that convicted Nofziger of three counts of illegally representing private clients at the White House within a year of his resignation from Reagan's staff in January 1982.

The jury, which deliberated about six hours, cleared Nofziger of a fourth illegal lobbying charge and acquitted his partner, Mark A. Bragg, of a single aiding and abetting allegation.

Nofziger, the first former high government official convicted under the revolving door provisions of the Ethics in Government Act of 1978, attacked the statute as a "lousy law" and compared his offense with "running a stop sign."

"I feel I am innocent. I don't think I did anything wrong," said Nofziger, 63, whose lawyers vowed to appeal the convictions.

The former White House political director, who dates his association to the president back to Reagan's days as governor of California, could receive a maximum two-year sentence and a \$10,000 fine for each of three convictions.

But lawyers familiar with the case said it was unlikely the former presidential aide would be given a prison term at his sentencing, which was set for March 25 by U.S. District Judge Thomas A. Flannery.

Independent counsel James C. McKay said he found the verdict depressing because "I just hate to see someone get convicted of a felony. But we felt we had to do our job."

But McKay said "we think the jury's verdict confirms what we felt from the beginning, that we had a case to make."

White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater said "We won't have any comment" on Nofziger's conviction.

The jury's verdict was announced at 11:55 a.m., nearly 90 minutes after the panel began its second day of deliberations. Nofziger appeared somber when the first conviction was announced but reached across the defense table in an attempt to shake Bragg's hand when the acquittals were announced.

Nofziger's wife, Bonnie, fought back tears as she left the courtroom.

Nofziger was convicted of appealing to then-president counselor Edwin Meese III in an April 8, 1982, memo for help getting Westech Corp. a \$32 million no-bid Army contract.

# Powerful aftershock rocks Southern California

WHITTIER, Calif. (AP) — A strong earthquake rocked a wide area of Southern California on Thursday, injuring at least 25 people and triggering a fatal heart attack, but apparently causing little damage.

"I felt like Joshua at the battle of Jericho," said Dwight McDonald of the California Highway Patrol in downtown Los Angeles.

The quake, measured at 5.0 on the Richter scale, struck at 7:25 a.m. in the Whittier Narrows area, 15 miles east of downtown Los Angeles, said Jacquelyn Dreher, a spokeswoman for the California Institute of Technology in Pasadena.

She said the location meant it was another aftershock of the

powerful Oct. 1 quake that measured 5.9 on the Richter scale and was followed by a 6.2 quake on Oct. 4. The combined tremors caused \$368-million in damage in Los Angeles and Orange counties and were blamed for at least seven deaths.

Thursday's was the 35th aftershock to measure above 3.0 on the scale.

"I just sat there saying 'Well, here we go again,'" said Renee Wilbur, 31, an office worker at a California Youth Authority school in Whittier. She sprained a knee diving under a desk for cover, a repeat of the injury she suffered in the Oct. 1 quake.

A 67-year-old Hacienda Heights man died at Queen of the Valley

Hospital in West Covina after suffering a heart attack at his home during the quake, said spokeswoman Cathleen Rodman. She said injuries, including two elderly paraplegics who brought the man in, attributed his death to the tremor.

At a Presbyterian intercommunity hospital in Whittier, at least 20 patients were treated for various injuries, including two elderly women who were admitted, said spokeswoman Maria Adams.

# Recruiting Marines possible KGB goal

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department failed to seek further investigation of more than 500 infractions by Marine security guards at U.S. embassies at a time when Soviet spies apparently were mounting a worldwide effort to recruit them as agents, a House subcommittee chairman said Thursday.

Rep. Dan Mica, D-Fla., said a preliminary investigation by the General Accounting Office, a congressional watchdog agency, "indicates there may have been a KGB worldwide effort to recruit Marines" at U.S. embassies for the last decade. The KGB is the Soviet spy agency.

The GAO report, dated last week, said that over the last six to 10 years, State Department officials collected in their files well over 500 cases of Marine guards in Asia, Eastern Europe and Western countries engaging in black marketeering or fraternizing with Soviet bloc personnel, Mica said. His staff put the number at 587.

The belated investigation of such incidents has produced "half a dozen cases which have major potential problems" of espionage, he added.

Mica, who chairs the House subcommittee on international operations, said that it was a standard Soviet technique to try to get U.S. personnel involved in such prohibited behavior as a means of interfering them into espionage.

Nevertheless, Mica said, the State Department departed from standard procedure by not relaying these cases to the Naval Investigative Service for further investigation when they came up.

# Teen-ager shoots 3 in fight at school

PINELLAS PARK, Fla. (AP) — A teenage boy pulled a gun during a fight in a high school cafeteria Thursday, shooting three people before he fled, officials said.

The assistant principal at Pinellas Park High School, Richard Allen, and a woman teacher were shot when they reportedly tried to break up the fight. A boy believed to be a student was also injured, said an unidentified Pinellas Park police spokeswoman at the scene.

A police officer who refused to give his name over the phone indicated a fourth person may have been shot as well. He also said two youths were arrested shortly after the shootings, but refused to give further details immediately.

"Details even to us are so sketchy at this time," said Carol Jackson, a spokeswoman for the county schools.

David Wade, a student standing near the teachers when the shooting started, said Allen grabbed one of the kids by the arm, then there was a pile-up of two students and two teachers.

"The kid pulled a gun out and fired a shot into the floor," Wade said. "Then he shot Mr. Allen in the head. I saw blood all over the floor so I started running. I heard two more shots after that."

## Doctors report 'epidemic of violence'

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israeli soldiers are epidemically beating Palestinians in an "epidemic of violence" in the occupied territories, and injuries are often more debilitating than gunshot wounds, U.S. doctors said Thursday.

Dr. H. Jack Geiger of the Boston-based Physicians for Human Rights said the group visited hospitals in the West Bank and Gaza Strip and found evidence that army brutality had become "the norm" in putting down anti-Israeli unrest.

"We collected medical evidence of an uncontrolled epidemic of violence by the army... on a scale and severity that might not be clear to the public," said Geiger, of the City University of New York.

"If this were a war, (much) of what we have seen would be re-

garded as atrocities," he told reporters.

Also on Thursday, scattered anti-Israeli protests occurred in the Tel Aviv arab village of Taibe near Tel Aviv, in Arab East Jerusalem and the West Bank City of Ramallah, the army and police said.

In Taibe, 10 Palestinians were arrested after protesters went on a rampage smashing the windows of shops, stoning cars and beating two Israeli drivers of a noodle delivery van, police said.

An army spokesman said the doctors' report was "simplistic" and denied the military had a policy of beatings to punish Palestinians. "The policy is to use force to disperse a violent demonstration," he said.

He said cases of excessive beat-

ings had occurred in the past, but they were investigated and "It's been brought under control."

Geiger and three other U.S. doctors spent one week visiting hospitals in the West Bank-Gaza Strip and Israel on a mission organized by Physicians for Human Rights.

At Gaza City's Shifa Hospital on Wednesday, an Associated Press reporter accompanied the doctors on a tour of wards filled with dozens of Arabs with beating injuries and gunshot wounds.

A Palestinian doctor showed the group a wooden truncheon reinforced with metal bands that was cracked in half. He said Israeli soldiers broke it while beating a 75-year-old Arab man.

The American doctors examined

Youssef Hamad, 40, of Gaza City, whose arms and legs were in casts. Large bruises covered Hamad's back, and several of his ribs were broken. His handaged head was covered with 12 deep gashes, the doctors said.

Hamad said he was beaten by 10 soldiers.

Geiger said Hamad's injuries illustrated that Israeli soldiers beat Palestinians who are rarely able to fight back. "There is no way in the world anyone could get these kinds of injuries resisting arrest," Geiger told the AP.

Dr. Jennifer Leaning of Harvard University showed reporters an X-ray of an Arab's broken hand and said the fracture occurred as the victim "warded off blows."

## U.S. initiative to draw Shamir counterproposal

JERUSALEM (AP) — Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir opposes two key elements of a U.S. peace initiative and is preparing alternative proposals he will present in Washington next month, Shamir aides said Thursday.

The American plan calls for an international conference in April to launch talks on an interim solution in the Israeli-occupied territories based on a Palestinian self-rule. Negotiations on a final settlement would begin in December, regardless of the out-

come of the autonomy talks. Shamir opposes an international conference and rejects the proposed timetable for the talks, said Yossi Ben Aharon, director general in the prime minister's office, in an interview with Israeli radio.

Ben Aharon said the timetable could render the talks meaningless because the parties would know that whatever they decided could be reconsidered as final discussions on a final settlement began.

## Bangladesh death toll climbs to 80

DHAKA, Bangladesh (AP) — Rioting broke out in three cities near the capital Thursday, a day after election violence left at least 80 people dead, officials said.

Opposition leaders blamed the government for the bloodshed. Government officials blamed it on overzealous supporters of local candidates and said they planned to reschedule some balloting.

Police said they arrested 65 people as rioting in Nabinagar, Sarail and Brahmanbaria Upazilas on Thursday left at least one person dead and 80 injured.

Home Secretary Kamaluddin

Ahmed said 80 people were killed and 476 injured in violence during town council polls held nationwide Wednesday.

"Such a large-scale violence was unexpected," he said. "It was mainly because of intense personal rivalry between the candidates."

Reports from police and journalists said supporters of rival candidates fought with guns, clubs, homemade bombs and rocks during the voting. Follies died were ransacked by rioters.

Two others were killed at Dhaka Medical College Hospital on Thursday and another in Sarail, 35 miles

northeast of Dhaka, officials said. The official injured list only includes those admitted to hospitals. Kamaluddin said. Others who were injured may have stayed away from hospitals for fear of being apprehended by police on rioting charges, he said.

At least 100 people were killed, nearly 8,000 injured, 120 vehicles set ablaze and 12 houses destroyed, according to a report in the newspaper Inqilab. It is owned by the government's Religious Affairs Minister, Maulana Abdul Matin.

Most of the country's 70,000 po-

licemen armed with rifles and 250,000 semi-policemen, known as "ansar" and armed with bamboo truncheons were on guard at the polling centers.

Home Ministry officials, speaking on condition of anonymity, said 65 security officers and election officials were kidnapped by angry mobs during the election.

A senior official at the election commission, speaking on condition of anonymity, said voting was postponed in some areas and new polling dates were to be announced shortly.

## Millions of Afghan refugees bring turmoil to Pakistan's border cities

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — Millions of refugees, the bond of Islam and tribal loyalties that blur the border have put Pakistan at the center of the Afghan drama, and the cost in money and turmoil has made it eager for a solution.

The battle in the mountainous neighboring country is between about 200,000 Moslem insurgents and a combination of the government's 50,000-member security forces and an estimated 115,000 Soviet soldiers.

Fighting began nearly 10 years ago, after a communist takeover in April 1978. Soviet military forces entered the fray in December 1979.

Money and military hardware for the guerrillas comes from the United States, and to a lesser extent China and some Middle East countries. Most of it passes through Pakistan, where 3.5 million Afghan refugees live in border cities and camps that serve as headquarters and supply points for insurgents.

The Pathan and Baluch tribes span the frontier, which had been open from the partition of Pakistan and India in 1947 until the guer-

rilla war closed it.

Playing host to the largest concentration of refugees in the world has put a crippling strain on Pakistan's limited economic resources. Officials report a surge of trade in illicit weapons and drugs.

More than 300 people have been killed and hundreds more wounded by terrorist bombings. Pakistani officials blame them on agents of the Kabul government trying to stir resentment against Afghan refugees.

President Mohammad Zia ul-Haq's influence with the insurgents and the burden of the refugees, were the main impetus for U.N.-sponsored talks between Pakistan and Afghanistan. They began in Geneva in April 1982 and the ninth round is scheduled for March 2.

Only indirect talks have been held, with U.N. mediator Diego Cordovez acting as go-between, because Pakistan considers the government in Kabul a Soviet puppet.

Moscow has refused to participate, claiming it has only a "limited military contingent" involved in the war.

Because of these circumstances, Pakistan often speaks for the United States and the guerrillas as well as itself.

In a recent example, Zia linked formation of a transitional Afghan government to Pakistan's acceptance of an agreement on Soviet troop withdrawal.

Pakistan wants hostilities ended so the refugees can go home.

"Let's face it, this war is spilling over onto our soil," a Foreign Ministry spokesman said.

The Kremlin's offer to pull out in 10 months, beginning in May, and signs of progress in Geneva leave it up to Pakistan to persuade the insurgents to be flexible.

So far the resistance leaders have refused to accept peace until the last Soviet soldier has left Afghanistan and a Moslem government has been installed in Kabul.

On Saturday, however, Zia telephoned Yunis Khalis, leader of the main guerrilla alliance, and persuaded him to meet with Cordovez. The U.N. mediator was on a diplomatic shuttle between Pakistan and Afghanistan at the time.

**Sphinx shows signs of collapse**

GIZA PLATEAU, Egypt (AP) — A chunk of limestone has fallen off the 4,600-year-old Sphinx, and authorities said Thursday if the cracking monument is left untreated its entire right shoulder will collapse.

The first significant break on the statue since 1981 occurred Sunday, six days after a sandstorm battered the Sphinx and the famed Giza pyramids nearby.

Culture Minister Farouk Hosni surveyed the damage Thursday and said the monument must be studied to decide what restoration efforts should be taken.

## Iran celebrates anniversary with attacks

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — An Iranian gunboat attacked a Norwegian supertanker in the southern Persian Gulf on Thursday as Iran marked the ninth anniversary of its Islamic revolution with massive pro-war demonstrations.

Iraq said it sent "waves" of warplanes on "devastating raids" into the Iranian hinterlands to strike at a series of economic and industrial targets.

In Tehran and other cities, millions of Iranians paraded in the streets, chanting "war, war until victory" and pledging loyalty to Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, the official news agency reported.

It also reported that Iranian jet fighters bombed Iraqi troops south of the Iraqi port city of Basra, the latest indication of renewed activity by Iran's air force.

The gunboat attack, Iran's sixth of the month, set the 290,000-ton Norwegian supertanker Happy Kari afire as it was sailing through

the Strait of Hormuz about dawn, with a cargo of Kuwaiti crude oil, according to gulf-based shipping officials.

The Iranian warship was believed to be a British-built craft that regularly preys on neutral commercial vessels in the southern gulf. Asked if he could identify the attacker, the Norwegian vessel's master, Capt. Haukon Lisbeth, called it "the frigate Nasty."

## Symms opposes INF treaty; cites Soviet missles

## Senator reaffirms conservative stance during Twin Falls stopover

TWIN FALLS — Republican Sen. Steve Symms said Thursday he planned to vote against the pending U.S.-Soviet nuclear missile treaty, despite his expectations of full Senate ratification.

"This could really change the balance of power in Europe... You have to have something that is offset by these," Symms said. "We're checkers players while the Soviets are chess players."

His comments came during a noontime Kiwanis Club meeting attended by about 75 people at the Twin Falls Club. Symms braved through a 45-minute press conference as part of a seven-city Idaho visit during the Senate's Presidents Day recess.

His talks focused on the need for supporting a continued conservative agenda, such as funding Nicaraguan rebels and the U.S. military to the Persian Gulf, with an eye toward the 1988 elections.

As a member of the Senate's Armed Services Committee, Symms traveled to the Persian Gulf in January. He said U.S. soldiers were doing a fine job, but that the Navy should not limit itself to protecting only ships bearing U.S. flags.

"I think when we allow piracy to happen when the U.S. Navy is in

the area...we'll lose a little credibility," Symms said.

In addition, he criticized a House vote last week against funding the Nicaraguan contras as a "mistake."

"The partisanship in Congress has reached an all-time high in the 13 years I've been there and this is pure politics in trying to stick it to (President Ronald) Reagan," Symms said. "I don't think it's going to get any better in the next year."

He said he supported fellow Sen. Bob Dole's quest for the presidency because the Kansas Republican may bridge the widening gap between Congressional Republicans and Democrats on such issues as routing federal budgeting.

"That's why I'm backing Bob Dole, because he has very good connections on both sides of the aisle," Symms said.

During the 1986 elections, he said Republicans also need to recapture control of the Senate. — feat he considers possible because four Democratic senators are retiring — and look toward the House of Representatives in 1992.

## Stover waives his preliminary hearing

BOISE — A former Twin Falls elementary school principal charged with the shotgun slayings of his wife and two daughters has waived a preliminary hearing and has been bound over to district court for trial.

William Murray Stover, 50, appeared Thursday in Boise before Ada County Magistrate John Vohlow, who scheduled his arraignment March 2 before 4th District Judge Alan Schwartzman.

Stover, who looked drawn at Thursday's hearing in handcuffs, shackles and an orange jail jumpsuit, was returned to the Ada County Jail without bond.

He is charged with three counts

of first-degree murder and one count of using a firearm in the commission of a felony in the Nov. 30 slayings of his wife June, 50, and daughters Kristina, 16, and Korrine, 13.

They were found shot to death at the family's duplex west of Boise. Stover had slashed his wrists and was taken to a Salt Lake City hospital for about a week of treatment before being returned to Idaho to face murder charges.

Authorities said Stover had left his job as principal at Twin Falls Harrison Elementary School last spring and was having financial problems at the time of the shootings. The family had moved to Boise and Stover was working as an insurance salesman.

## CSI explores interest in aerospace program

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls-Sun Valley Regional Airport and College of Southern Idaho officials are exploring options for offering an aerospace-science educational program.

CSI Academic Dean Roy Strawser attended an airport board meeting Tuesday to gauge interest in the program and agreed to further study the proposal.

Private pilot John Hilzman had been single-handedly promoting the educational program to receptive board members.

He said the deadline is March 1 for the state Board of Education to review new programs, "we're not going to meet that this year." Other programs, such as one at Boise State University or one proposed at North Idaho College, must be

considered when establishing new curriculum.

But Hilzman said that would offer a year to examine the proposal. He said he is consulting with officials offering a similar program in North Dakota.

Airport board members were uniformly interested in examining the plan.

"If North Dakota can do something, we should be able to do it," said board member Dr. Greg Kadlec. "I don't see anything discouraging us from getting behind this thing."

Hilzman said the program would cost little airport or CSI money because planes could be supplied by a FBO, or fixed-base operator, a company that rents and services planes. He said Cesaña, an airplane manufacturer, is already interested.

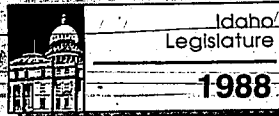
## House passes two more AIDS bills

BOISE — A bill making it a felony to knowingly expose a person to the AIDS virus and another measure requiring marriage couples to read an AIDS brochure before receiving a license both easily cleared the House Thursday.

"I feel real good about it," said Rep. Russell Newcomb, R-Twin Falls, who drafted seven AIDS measures. "I think people feel this package is a good start."

Of the two bills that passed the House, one provides up to a 15-year prison sentence and a \$5,000 fine if a person is convicted of knowingly transmitting the AIDS virus. The bill allows two defenses: one if sexual activity took place between consenting adults after full disclosure. The other defense is if a person transmits the disease after being told by a doctor he was noninfectious.



"This venereal disease has no cure and will result in slow death of the victims of the crime," Newcomb, a Twin Falls doctor, said.

With no debate, the measure passed by a 74-0 vote. It now goes to the Senate.

Rep. Jeanne Givens, D-Coeur d'Alene, carried the other bill dealing with marriage licenses. Before receiving a marriage license, each couple must complete a confidential questionnaire and read an educational pamphlet on AIDS. The pamphlet is designed to provide information on how the disease is contracted and encourage individuals to be tested for AIDS if they have been at high risk of exposure.

Givens called the legislation "well-crafted and well thought out."

"The pamphlet is straight forward, factual and sane," she said. "This is a sensible legislation."

Again, there was no debate and the measure passed on a 74-1 vote.

Rep. "Bill" Taylor, R-Nampa, cast the lone dissenting vote.

"I think it's a waste of money and there's no need for it," Taylor said after the vote. "The brochure is redundant. Don't we all know what causes AIDS?"

Taylor said he also doubted people would read the educational pamphlet, prepared by the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.

## BID taxing bill overcomes 1st hurdle

BOISE — A second attempt to allow business improvement districts to tax owners of empty buildings had better success in a House committee Thursday.

But some members of the House Commerce, Industry and Tourism committee were skeptical of the proposal.

"The committee, however," did unanimously approve introduction of the bill after members were assured by Deputy Attorney General Daniel Chadwick that the measure was necessary and not just a Twin Falls bill.

On hand to support the proposal was former Twin Falls Mayor Emery Peterson and Ellen Moss, manager of the downtown Boise BID.

Moss said the Boise BID was assessing owners of vacant buildings at one-fourth the rate charged to retail businesses, and there were no complaints.

But Moss said there are "gray areas" in the present law.



Peterson said it would be better to go through the Legislature rather than the courts to clarify the law.

Twin Falls, the first city to form a BID, had to sue when a few business owners refused to pay.

Although the city was successful, Peterson said the city prefers "not to go that route again."

"We don't know if a judge would rule in our favor," he said.

Peterson said it was only fair to assess vacant buildings because the money helped maintain all property values.

He said the Twin Falls BID has received conflicting legal advice on whether the current law

allows owners of a building to be assessed after a business moves out.

But some members of the committee seemed unconvinced that the problem needed legislative action.

"We've been through this in Nampa, and we didn't feel we had to come to the state," said Rep. Robert Schaefer, R-Nampa. "I'd encourage you to keep it at the local level."

Rep. "Liz" Allan, R-Idaho, R-Galveston, asked Peterson if any owners of vacant buildings were informed of the proposed legislation.

"Only through the news media," Peterson said. "But I'm inclined to believe most know unless they're absentee."

Peterson said if the measure is approved, the city council would hold public hearings and every property owner in the BID would be notified before the change.

Rep. Gary Robbins, R-Dietrich, said he had a problem with legislation that dealt with the problem after the fact.

But Chadwick said there were no problems with the language of the bill. And he said the issue of conflicting legal opinions "was valid."

## Valley board postpones action on asbestos regulations

HAZELTON — Valley School Board members opted not to take action yet on the Environmental Protection Agency's new asbestos regulations. Superintendent Arlyn Bodily told board members this week that he would be attending a presentation by an accredited inspection company before the end of the month and he hoped to have more complete information after that meeting.

Bodily said that the school had received a clean bill of health on asbestos inspections twice before, but the changing regulations make another inspection mandatory.

Under the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act, all schools must be inspected by an accredited inspector to locate all asbestos-containing materials.

Bodily said this can be anything from glue under the floor tiles to pipe fittings to ceiling tiles.

The schools must develop a plan for removal and replacement of those materials and submit the plan to the state for approval by Oct. 12. The plan must be implemented by July 9, 1989. The school district will be responsible for the costs of the inspections and the renovations that might be required to replace the asbestos-containing material.

Schools not meeting the deadlines can be fined up to \$5,000 a day.

Also at the meeting, the board discussed the feasibility of bringing David Brumbach, executive director of the Maryland AIDS Foundation, to the school and community for an acquired immune deficiency syndrome information and prevention program. Bodily said turnout at some earlier community presentations had been poor. But he said he felt that the AIDS problem was

here to stay and the topic might generate more interest than usual.

Teachers appearing before the board touched on subjects from arts and humanities to computers and school library facilities.

Karen Rogerson, art teacher from the Kimberly School District, outlined for the board the values of the art and humanities programs used in Kimberly. Stressing the importance of stimulating the right, creative side of the brain as well as the left, logical side, she cited the use of mind mapping, a new method of using color and pattern to stimulate both sides of the brain in the learning process.

"Art is a medium of expression available to everyone," she said, adding that students who were not especially good at speech or writing were often able to express themselves on the drawing board.

High school science teacher Dale Hammond briefed the board on the progress of the computer in the classroom. Basic software, computers are now being used as tools in all types of classes from math and chemistry to music, he said.

Gorin Hunter, Valley High School librarian, told the board students should be better able to use the library's resources when she completes the card file of available books. Hunter said she also hopes to have the opportunity to get more students using the library facilities at the seventh and eighth grade levels.

Superintendent Bodily said after the meeting that the high school and Hazelton Elementary School had received full accreditation from the state Department of Education, but that the Eden Elementary had been advised to replace its health textbooks by 1990.

# Weather hinders plane search

TWO military helicopters and three fixed-wing Civil Air Patrol planes, one from Wyoming, flew over areas west of Granite Peak, which is 12,799 feet in Montana's highest, and some areas along the Stillwater and Roscud rivers, Haskamp said.
Weather prevented any planes from searching Thursday in Idaho, he said. But Idaho authorities said he is confident that most of the Idaho section of the route already has been searched.

SOME places in the Cooke City area have received six to eight feet of snow since Sunday, Haskamp said. Bizarre conditions in the Beartooths have allowed only a few hours of searching time since the plane disappeared.
Yesterday even the snowmobile trails up by Cooke City were closed, Haskamp said. They got about 30 inches night before last.
Stillwater County Sheriff Greg Noose, who is coordinating the ground search, said avalanche danger is too great to let ground crews go into the area now. Crews from Beartooth Mountain Rescue of Billings will be ready to go in this weekend, when snow may be more stable because of warmer weather, Noose said.

### COOKE CITY, Mont. - Search planes ventured into lower levels of the Beartooth Mountains Thursday, but not into the highest areas along the Montana-Wyoming border where an airplane carrying three Idaho men may have gone down on Sunday.

"It was extremely turbulent up there," said Fred Haskamp of the Montana Aeronautics Division. "Very high winds, and blowing snow on the ground, of course."
Forecasts indicated little improvement for Friday, he said.

Idaho authorities have identified the three aboard the plane as Ron Johnson, 34, Bill Crafton, 36, and Randy Mittelstaed, 33, all of Buhl, Idaho. Mittelstaed was listed as the pilot.

### COEUR D'ALENE (AP) - Tribal members here had mixed reactions to Kootenai County's preliminary proposal to put a new landfill on the Coeur d'Alene reservation near the Settlers community.

The county has designated a 320-acre tract 20 miles south of Coeur d'Alene as its top prospect among three possible sites, and Browning-Ferris, a Houston waste management firm, has proposed to lease the property from the tribe for a landfill operation.

### Under the proposal, top preference for jobs would be given to the tribe, along with hefty lease and dumping fees.

The county, which has given itself until June 1 to choose a landfill site, has held preliminary talks with tribal leaders.
Editor Donna Curtis reported in the February issue of Coeur d'Alene County Fires, a monthly journal for firefighters, that tribal members were caught by surprise when their leaders talked with representatives of Browning-Ferris at the Jan. 16 council meeting.

### Curtis said in a telephone interview Wednesday that tribal members are concerned about lack of information about the proposals and the potential for environmental damage.

She wrote in her article: "Ex-

### Appeals court strikes down rail drug testing

**SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - The Supreme Court has struck down a federal drug testing program for railroad workers after a 9th Circuit ruling that the program violated the Constitution.**  
The Supreme Court ruled in a 5-4 decision that the drug testing program was unconstitutional because it violated the Fourth Amendment's protection against unreasonable searches and seizures. The 9th Circuit had previously ruled that the program was unconstitutional because it required workers to submit to random drug testing without any suspicion of wrongdoing. The Supreme Court's decision is a significant victory for civil liberties advocates and will likely impact other federal drug testing programs.

## There's new life in the arts council

A total restructuring is under way

**TWIN FALLS** — Members of the Magic Valley Arts Council are reorganizing.

They're recruiting new leadership, rewriting bylaws, re-grouping committees, and renewing their dedication to developing an environment where arts can flourish.

"There's a very optimistic atmosphere," says John Haux, board member and former president of the organization.

The arts council, which has existed since 1979, was formed to help coordinate performing and graphic arts events in the Magic Valley.

Another function of the council has been to encourage local businesses and civic organizations to support the arts, and to further the concept that art has an economic impact on a community.

Shawna Fuller, president of the Renaissance Academy and member of the council, says she feels the individual groups which make up the arts organization are finally working together towards a common goal.

New officers and committees, regular meetings, and long-range planning have given the member groups a different perspective, she says.

"Now we all have realized, all of us in the arts organizations, that we do need to have kind of a common denominator," says Fuller.

"The common denominator is the Magic Valley Arts Council. We can all work together instead of working apart."

At the forefront of the council's reorganization effort is Allan Frost, a Twin Falls ophthalmologist and patron of the arts.

Frost, 45, was named president of the Magic Valley Arts Council last October. Both Haux and Fuller praise the eye doctor's organizational skills.

"Dr. Frost provides some excellent leadership and has established some good organizational methods," says Haux.

Fuller says Frost is the "kind of person that can assume everyone's different opinions and come out with something that is fair and just for everyone."

Frost himself, however, is quick to point out that there are many people working with him behind the scenes.

"It's not my baby," he says. "There are a lot of people spending time on this thing."

Frost and new board members Donna Brizzo, Rose Marie Deerr, Homer Pringle and Gary Babel

were chosen for leadership positions, not only because of their proven interest in the local arts, but also because of their lack of allegiance to any one arts organization.

Members of the council want a new board that had no prior connection with any of the specific arts organizations. Frost says they want to get as many people involved with the council as possible, however.

"We want to build a potential audience out there who will be informed about what's available in this community," he says.

The Magic Valley Arts Council would also like to see a larger share of that audience made up of area young people.

"The youth are important to us," says Frost.

Frost sees himself as a facilitator. See COUNCIL on Page D4.

## New showings opening in Ketchum

**KETCHUM** — As this ski resort area gears up for one of the busiest weeks of the winter season, many of the art galleries are joining in by holding gala openings tonight for their featured artists' new showings.

Members of the Sun Valley/Ketchum Gallery Association as well as independent galleries are holding open houses from 5 to 8 p.m. this evening. The public is invited to come and meet many of the artists whose works are being shown. These exhibits will run through March 4.

The watercolors of Theodore B. Villa are featured at the Kneeland Gallery at 271 First Avenue North. In his most recent paintings, many of them in a large format, Villa has appropriated Greek statues as models for his depiction of native American beaded garb, a juxtaposition of two traditional cultures within a modern, high-tech world. Antique Indian artifacts from the Pawel-Baczka collection and antique Navajo weavings from the Mark Winter collection, will also be exhibited.

Nestled in the oversized evergreens next door to the Kneeland Gallery, is the River Run Gallery where the featured artist will be painter Fran Larsen. Larsen's subject matter is the world of the Pueblos, the Spanish villages and the intruding Anglos — a multicultural with native American mystical and allegorical components. These views of the Southwest are enclosed in Larsen's own hand-carved frames which serve as extensions of the paintings themselves.

The Friesen Gallery of Fine Art, at 391 First Avenue North, will feature the art of Joan Hemingway, Ketchum resident and granddaughter of Ernest Hemingway. Her love of nature and linear design is evident in her pastel and oil pieces.

Even though the works are very modern, geometric and colorful — certainly not nature drawings — the forms come from nature. "I've interpreted what I see in my own way," Hemingway says.

The Sun Valley Center Gallery, in the Walnut Avenue Mall, opens an exhibit by Ketchum artist, Julie Scott. All of the acrylic paintings in Scott's new series reveal the artist's fertile imagination. Scott garnered recognition in last summer's 45th Idaho Biennial exhibition. She received an Award of Distinction for her painting "Golden-Biscuit." That painting was purchased by the Boise Museum of Art for the gallery's permanent collection.

Scott's new paintings on canvas and paper continue with this theme of barren landscapes, bobbing-bercans and mythical intimacies of man and animal in their personal environment.

Ketchum woodworker Paul Bates has collaborated with Scott in a new series of wooden relief plaques which will also be featured in this exhibition.

# Good, evil mix just right in 'Serpent'

**HOLLYWOOD** — Wes Craven's "The Serpent and the Rainbow" does for the old Caribbean zombie movie what Steven Spielberg's "Raiders of the Lost Ark" did for the serials. It preserves all the spooky fun of a movie like "The Exorcist" while drawing upon all the sophisticated resources of big-budget modern film making: richly photographed authentic locales, wondrous special effects and amazingly acute sound recording.

Actually, "Serpent" is riskier than "Raiders" because instead of being a period piece, it is set in Haiti just as Jean-Claude Duvalier is being driven into exile. The result is an ambitious, entertaining, though not flawless — feat of the imagination, a highly visual and skillful blending of supernatural

and political terror, high adventure and anthropology.

The book of "revolution Haiti" in which Harvard anthropologist Dennis Alan (Bill Pullman) arrives has all the tumult, vitality, poverty and danger of the opening sequences of London-on-the-edge-of-chaos-in-"Sammy and Rosie Get Laid."

What Alan, who is in quest of trance powder for medical research, quickly learns from dedicated psychiatrist Marielle Coline (Cathy Tyson), the beautiful call girl of "Mona Lisa" is that within the voodoo blend with Christianity, there is a rejection of the duality of good and evil — represented, respectively, by the rainbow and serpent.

Coline may have no conflict with her scientific training and her religious beliefs, but in Haiti, clearly evil has the upper hand. Indeed, the key proposition of "The Serpent and

the Rainbow" which was inspired by anthropologist Wade Davis' book of the same title, is that the implacably sinister Peytraud (Zakes Mokae), a leader of the feared Ton-Ton Macoutes, actually defuses potential protesters by turning them into zombies.

Craven, the cult horror picture director, in a major career advance, and his writer, Richard Maxwell and A.R. Simon, project and sustain an aura of suspense, action and romance sufficient to persuade us to go along with this notion.

Where their audacious and highly sensual mix of the documentary, the supernatural and classic Hollywood adventure tale does not quite jell is that adventure traditionally calls for a larger-than-life hero. Alongside clear respect for Haitian culture and the country's awesome political and economic problems, Alan emerges as an old-fashioned white liberator. He may be of nor-

mal build, but he can dispatch a trio of large and muscular Ton-Ton Macoutes with a couple of karate chops. Indeed, Alan's emergence as a kind of great white savior is lots queerer in effect than the film's deliberate scare tactics.

"The Serpent and the Rainbow" works anyway, but would have worked better had the hero been played by a black actor. Luckily, Pullman, in his first starring role after key appearances in "Ruthless People" and "Spaceballs," has an amiable, natural presence.

Also lovely in a typical leading-lady role, and Paul Winfield draws on his strong presence to fill in his one-dimensional good guy part as a nightclub operator who is also a voodoo priest. Mokae, the distinguished South African actor, is a thoroughly terrifying villain whose glare is as chilling as his torture devices. Brent Jennings has much humor as a clever and brave con man. John Lindley's cinematography, Brad Fiedel's ethnic-flavored score — which includes special percussion tracks by eminent drummer Babatunde Olatunji — and Jay Beckheide's eerie and acute sound design are all superb.

As Duvalier's plane takes off at the end of "The Serpent and the Rainbow" (rated R for sex, violence and nudity), Marielle exclaims that for Haiti, "the nightmare is over." If only that had proved true.

## 'Moonstruck': Nourishing, snappy, warm ... and funny

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**MOONSTRUCK (PG)**. This is an incredibly nourishing comedy, filled as it is like rigatoni with warmth, cheer and terrific snappy dialogue. As a young widow whose life suddenly shifts 180 degrees under the plain to juicy, Chor finally has a role that lets her comic sensibilities out for a romp. Cage attacks the role of Ronny — the guy Cher really falls for — with a nice balance between over-the-top romanticism and tongue-in-cheek seriousness; he is marvelous. Every one is, yet Olympia Dukakis, as Cher's wise mama, seems to have an extra sheen of maturity and wisdom that moves her work from authoritative into memorable.

**THE COUGH TRIP (R)**. "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest" mixed with "Spellbound" and updated to the era of Dr. Toni Grant and competitors. A son-mental patient posing as his own psychiatrist, becomes the rage of the Beverly Hills dial-a-neurosis talk shows. How can you miss with an idea like this? Just watch the movie. Despite apparently good comic credentials — from director Michael Ritchie; Dan Aykroyd; Walter Matthau and others — it has the brittle surface, empty ideas and vacuous jive of a bunco artist working the crowd. One plus: Charles Grodin, as a psychotic shrink, has some funny, nasty moments.

**FOR KEEPS (PG)**. Not even Molly Ringwald's customary glow and bedrock believability make a smidgen of difference in this film. Muddled it is and muddled it remains. While the film makers seem willing to move a little off the beaten-track — on the subject of teen-age pregnancy, the tone is skittish — genuinely funny and insightful one minute; slapstick, sitcomish and mawkish the next. And Ringwald's charisma, while still intact, is too much for co-star Randall Batinkoff, the gangling newcomer. Credit "For Keeps" with one innovation, however. It's the first time within memory that a high school siren (Ringwald) has lured her man (Batinkoff) with a red Mustang — and a box of Pampers.

**THREE MEN AND A BABY (PG)**. What we have here is an Americanization of Colin Coombs' "Three Men and a Cradle." Serreau's movie was fairly frothy, and this one is frothier still. The people who made it carry over much of the original's weightless, sweet-tempered fun. Any movie in which Steve Guttenberg says the sensitive guy would seem to be in big, big trouble; it is like casting Fred MacMurray as a heartbroken poet. But director Leonard Nimoy has the knack for relationships the writers seem to lack. And Tom Selleck seems here to find his true movie meter; the relaxed bachelor camaraderie here almost echoes the tongue-in-cheek ambience on "Magnum P.I." But without the "baby" of course: the three men would be lost on their own set.

**BROADCAST NEWS (R)**. This film is — so diabolically clever that you rather expect it to be heartless, in the way that so much surface cleverness can be. No such thing. This film by writer-director-producer James L. Brooks (his first since "Terms of Endearment") goes right to the core of a modern romantic triangle, and while it is there, gives us a look at what ails the news broadcasting business. But heartless is the wrong word for this movie: It is insightful and understanding and marvelous fun, while giving up none of its thoughtfulness and all its heart. Lead actors — William Hurt, Albert Brooks and Holly Hunter — alternately save the movie from alienating the audience and provide it with its greatest joys.

**GOOD MORNING, VIETNAM (R)**. This dramatic comedy based on the 1965 Saigon gig of wildman Armed Forces deejay Adrian Cronauer is mostly failed satire. It clings to the obvious like a drown-

ing man to an anvil, and director (but non-writer) Barry Levinson can't summon up the wit or bite of his "Diner" or "Tin Men." But Robin Williams, as Cronauer, saves it. He explodes the explosive in beret bursts of electronic age surrealism. Blazing away brilliantly, ad-libbing on camera, Williams is like a man possessed; a Crazy Eddie of showbiz dada. **HOLLYWOOD** They do not make romantic movies like they used to.

Among the great romantic dramas available on cassette: CBS-Fox's "Casablanca" (1942), with Humphrey Bogart and Ingrid Bergman, is everybody's favorite doomed-lover movie. Not far behind are MGM-UA's "Gone With the Wind" (1939) and Nelson Entertainment's "Wuthering Heights" (1939) — in which the love between Cathy (Merle Oberon) and Heathcliff (Laurence Olivier) is so strong that it stretches beyond the grave.

The two great post-'60s, doomed-lover romantic movies are HBO's

"Elvira Madigan" (1967) and Paramount's "The Way We Were" (1973) — possibly the definitive opposites-attract love story, with Barbra Streisand and Robert Redford.

Other fine, rapturously romantic movies include Disney's animated "Sleeping Beauty" — about the handsome prince and the sleeping maiden — Paramount's "Roman Holiday" (1953), starring Gregory Peck and Audrey Hepburn, and CBS-Fox's "Love Is a Many-Splendored Thing," a 1955 ten-jerker featuring William Holden and Jennifer Jones.

# Artist hangs in there — live

NEW YORK (AP) — Sometimes, Stephen Taylor Woodrow can't wait to be off the wall. Especially after six or seven hours of posing as one of "The Living Paintings" at a Manhattan art museum.

"You get panic attacks. You think, 'Everyone's staring at me,'" said Woodrow, a British performance artist, whose piece explores the relationship between art and its audience. "When I exit, they see every little bit going into my mouth."

Five days a week, Woodrow — covered with black spray paint — attaches himself to a harness and dangles from a canvas on a wall at the New Museum of Contemporary Art in SoHo.

Beside him hang artists James Melloy, painted red, and Dale Devereux Barker, in blue.

"They're like traditional portrait scenes," said Woodrow, citing the precedent of "the English artist (J.M.W.) Turner, who tied himself to the mast of a ship to see what it was like in a storm."

"But our hanging here, I suppose, is fairly untraditional," he conceded.

Each living painting portrays a mood. Melloy slouches and seems bored, but agrees to shake hands with an onlooker; Barker, looking shy and sad, tentatively extends his hand to be touched; Woodrow — the hostile one — frowns, bristly gestures to a middle-aged woman to move closer. They yank her hair.

"Are these for sale?" wondered museum-sour Paul Zimmerman, a Brooklyn artist-writer. "Can you buy one of these guys and hang him in your living room?"

You can't, but the artists receive an honorarium for hanging out in the museum, which charges \$2.50 admission.

"It's wonderful, but somewhat scary as well," noted Harriet Behnech. "I just arrived here from Dublin, and this sums up New York, somehow."

Brash New Yorkers who come to watch can laugh, ask questions or dish out insults. But the artists cannot answer. "Because painting is a visual media," Woodrow said before climbing the wall.

Consequently, he said, paintings are intensified. "I'm always angry."

Once Woodrow snatched a handbag. "It does funny things to you. I do things I wouldn't normally do," he explained. "And it can get boring in a way. So rifling through a bag for something to eat or something to do becomes legitimate."

"But in a way, it's also a genuine interest in people; you have some physical contact," he added.

Asked about a report that he had spit at his audience, he replied, "I'm just a little bit messy with my food. It's also a way of getting people away."

Woodrow insists that he and his colleagues are not that interesting. "People are disappointed when they meet us in real life, because we're just real folks."

The piece toured England for 18 months. The New York audience, Woodrow said, is "slightly more aggressive, perhaps slightly more intense."

After the exhibit closes Sunday, Woodrow will take it to Athens before returning.

His next work may be loosely based on the theme of living furniture.

Another "wall piece," still in the embryonic stages, may have a "living food" theme — perhaps focusing on "The Great British Breakfast."

# Photographers take aim at a year in the life of Idahoans

BOISE — Ready, aim, shoot! Photographers across Idaho are taking aim at a new project that is part of the state's Centennial celebration. The project, endorsed by the Idaho Centennial Commission, is called "Photographic Visions — Contemporary Photography in Idaho" and is being sponsored by the Idaho Photographic Workshop of Boise and the Idaho Photographic Society of Sun Valley.

The project started out to be "A Day in the Life of Idaho," but representatives for the groups said they realized they couldn't pick just one day or season that would depict the variety of life in this state, nor would a single day be broad enough to cover all the kinds of creative visions Idaho photographers have. So the project was opened up for a full year and set up far enough ahead of the Centennial for an exhibit to be mounted that will travel the length and breadth of Idaho during 1988-90, as well as for a book to be published, if the Centennial Foundation so desires.

These groups have issued a challenge to all Idaho photographers to think about what this state means to them and translate it into a visual image.

The exhibit schedule is expected to include stays in Ketchikan, Tivoli, Edulau, Twenteeville, Salmon, Moscow, Caldwell, Coeur d'Alene, Sandpoint and Idaho Falls. The photographs also may visit smaller towns if arrangements can be made to borrow a large trailer from the University of Idaho.

...leading to council-business, says the board is also looking into the possibility of hiring a part-time executive director. The director would help coordinate arts activities and offer advice to each of the arts organizations.

"If that ever comes to pass, then I think it will be less of a time commitment for each of the individual board members," he says.

None of the board positions are paid.

Frost says a "very approximate" estimate of the council's current finances is about \$100,000. To raise more money, a long-range planning committee is thinking of co-promoting a series of local concerts. Board members are also considering applying for developmental funds from the Idaho Commission on the Arts.

"Though the council has just recently reorganized, Frost says he and other members of the board of directors are receiving positive feedback from other members of the council.

"I think one of the things that we need to be wary of is that we don't try to do too much, too fast," says Frost. "We want to build a viable organization, but we want to do it in an organized manner."

"I think in a year, if we can work very hard, we can present some sort of organized program and informational format to the public for a variety of arts events."

of policies set forth by council members. And his gentle demeanor at a recent board meeting indicates the council has selected the best man for this role. Speaking in a quiet but authoritative tone, Frost conducted the meeting paying close attention to participants' comments and procedures, but also taking time out to listen and to allow members of the audience to air their views.

"I think I see my role as being more of an organizer and one who tries to see that things get done that we follow our bylaws and our mission statement and try to achieve our goals for the year," he says.

Frost thinks the Magic Valley Arts Council is the first organization in the state to attempt to foster cooperation among regional art groups. The council publishes a newsletter and calendar and hopes to work more closely with the media to publicize arts events.

"There are two or three other arts councils in the state, but they are primarily just for cities alone," he says.

Frost says that changes in the organizational structure of the group have streamlined the council's decision-making process.

The original set of bylaws provided for a larger board of directors, including voting representation from each member arts organization.

The new set of bylaws calls for a nine-member board of directors and no voting rights for member organizations. Instead, the council has a board of advisors made up of one representative from each member group.

"Their purpose is to advise the board of directors and help us make decisions about situations that require some sort of expert opinion," says Frost.

# Winter Olympics appears on ABC for unprecedented sixteen days

CALGARY, Alberta — It snowed here at Christmas.

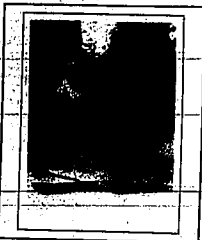
That might not seem too unusual, considering that this western Canadian city of 650,000 people is located 136 miles north of the Montana border. But for Winter Olympics organizers, the snow was truly heaven-sent. Calgary, on the lee side of the spectacular Canadian Rockies, is prone to warm "chinook" winds that can make a midwinter day seem like spring. In February, you can never be sure if it will be 60 above or 40 below.

That's why millions have been spent on snowmaking equipment at ski runs, why an indoor speed skating oval was built, and why some 100 miles of refrigerated pipe was installed at the luge and bobsled runs. Organizers say they are prepared for any weather condition, but the Christmas snowfall didn't hurt, especially after one of the warmest late autumns on record.

The snow made ABC breathe easier, too. The network paid a record \$309 million for broadcast rights to these XV Winter Games, which will be anchored by Jim McKay, and plans 100½ hours of coverage over 16 days (Feb. 13-28).

The 16-day Winter Olympics, the longest run ever for a Winter Games, enables ABC to get three weekends of coverage during the all-important February "sweeps" ratings period. Calgary's North American locale also means that ABC can air events live in lucrative prime time. In 1984, due to the time difference between the United States and Sarajevo, Yugoslavia, ABC was beaming back Olympic events after the scores were already known. And knowing the score in sports is even worse than knowing the end of a movie.

Much of ABC's hopes at Sarajevo were pinned on the U.S. Olympic hockey team, which pulled off the famous "Miracle on Ice" at Lake Placid in 1980, defeating a powerful Soviet team for the gold medal. Mike Eruzione, who scored the winning goal in 1980 and is now ABC's hockey analyst, doesn't expect another miracle in Calgary.

"Realistically, we have a chance for a bronze medal," says Eruzione. The Soviets, Swedes, Czechs and home-soil Canadians are all expected to be tough.

Here's a look at some of the other key events:

**FIGURE SKATING:** In the men's competition, America's Brian Boitano and Canada's Brian Orser are expected to vie for the gold. Tops among the women are Katarina Witt of East Germany and Debi Thomas of the United States.

**ALPINE SKIING:** Downhill/ski events will be held at Mount Allan, 56 miles west of Calgary. The only American to win a gold in downhill was Bill Johnson in 1984, but he ripped knee ligaments and had back surgery last winter and is unlikely to repeat. Switzerland's Pirmin Zurbriggen is considered the man to beat. The top U.S. women are Debbie Armstrong and Tamara McKinney.

**COVER STORY:** Jim McKay will be anchoring ABC's coverage of the Winter Olympics in Calgary, Canada. Prime-time coverage of the XV Winter Olympics airs every day from Feb. 13 to Feb. 28, and additional daytime coverage airs on weekends.

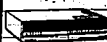

Her latest bits onstage include low-cut gowns showing lots of leg and cleavage, a generous portion of sexy witticism and even a fruit-basket Headdress. All this is accompanied by plugs for Somers's latest TV series, "She's the Sheriff." Best of all, Suzanne changes costumes eight times during her act, all the while entertaining audiences with sometimes off-color references.

**Q:** I've heard that George Burns was no angel during the time he was married to his late partner, Gracie Allen. True? — M.S.

**A:** Burns, who turned 92 on Jan. 20, first teamed up with Gracie in 1922. The couple began a 35-year smash-hit career in vaudeville and wound-up-on-weekly-television-before Gracie announced her retirement in 1958. She died on Aug. 29, 1964. Legend has it that Burns was indeed a hellraiser during his marriage. Comedian Milton Berle recounts the time that he and wife Ruth met Burns. # Burnett and daughter Carrie star in sentimental thriller "Hostage"

NEW YORK — The CBS Sunday movie "Hostage" rises above typical made-for-TV contrivances because of fine performances from Carol Burnett and her daughter, Carrie Hamilton, and the unlikely emotional bond between their characters.

Hamilton plays Bonnie Lee Hopkins, a prison inmate who talks tough, but dutifully writes her mother every day, filling pages with chatty, pathetic accounts of prison life.

Burnett plays Martha Madden, a wealthy widow who has only a fragile relationship with a grown daughter who lives in California and has just left after a brief, strained visit.

Martha's protected world collides with Bonnie Lee's when the girl breaks out of prison in a desperate attempt to escape her vicious, backwoods father, played by New York stage actor Leon Russon. He has threatened to kill her upon her release from jail, where she was serving time for an unsuccessful attempt to murder him.

After commandeering a prison bus, stealing a car from two teenagers and getting recognized by a gas station attendant, Bonnie Lee prowls a shopping center parking lot before selecting Martha as a hostage.

She shoves Martha into her car at gunpoint and forces her to drive aimlessly until Martha finally decides to take the fugitive home. There she tries to slam the door on the gun-toting girl and a struggle ensues. Bonnie Lee, ferocious in her desperation, quickly gets the upper hand.

But in the hours that follow in the beautiful, empty house, Bonnie Lee begins to display clues to her barren life. She attacks the canopied bed in Martha's daughter's abandoned bedroom. At one point, Martha, her face still swollen from blows landed in their fight, gently helps her select an outfit from her daughter's closet.

Gradually Martha earns the girl's tentative trust. When the father comes upon them, threatening them both and revealing the abuse

that drove Bonnie Lee to shoot him, it is Martha who takes up the gun to protect them. He flees.

Bonnie Lee asks Martha to take her to New York City to hide. By the time they get there, Bonnie Lee is still playing kidnapper, but Martha no longer views her as a threat.

At this point, the plot becomes rather contrived, with the father easily finding the two in Manhattan. Brief reference was made to his being a farmer, but why does he own a police scanner? How does he know how to incapacitate another man with a single, expert blow, as he does in a restaurant men's room?

When he confronts Martha and Bonnie Lee in the dining room, Martha asks, "How'd you find us?"

"I told you, I'm a bloodhound, and she's my blood," is his inadequate explanation.

For the most part, writer Stephen Foreman's dialogue is spare and realistic, and the story moves quickly along, leaving little time to dwell on unlikely plot twists. The end is predictable but effective.

Burnett, well-known as a comic actress, has also made a name for herself in such serious fare as the TV movie "Friendly Fire." She is excellent as the bored, lonely Martha, whose repressed maternal needs are released by the trapped emotional thrashings of Bonnie Lee.

Hamilton is called upon to portray both violent criminal and vulnerable child, which she does with great effect. The movie is not the first time she has worked with her mother. Burnett once guest-starred on "Fame." Hamilton was a regular on the series.

Hamilton, 24, is also a rock musician and played the lead in the not-yet-released movie "Tokyo Pop." She and her mother are collaborating on a book, "Under One Roof," about mother-daughter relationships. They have also lectured about their handling of Hamilton's drug problems in her teens and plan to take their sobriety message to the Soviet Union this summer.

Burnett recently performed with a younger daughter, Erin, in the TV movie "Plaza Suite."

# NBC highlights Brokaw as cool and calm

WASHINGTON — A scant 48 hours after Dan Rather and Vice President George Bush went at it on "CBS Evening News," NBC News introduced a 10-second promo during the "Chiefs" broadcast Wednesday night featuring quotes from Time, USA Today and The Philadelphia Inquirer that read:

"Intelligent and low-keyed' ... 'Capable' ... 'Calm, Collected' ... Tom Brokaw and the NBC Nightly News."

Last week, NBC News' primetime Brokaw promotion quotes (from The Washington Post, The New York Times and The Boston Globe) read: "'incisive' ... 'refreshing' ... 'the guts to go along with the glory'."

An NBC News spokesman, asked by a wide-eyed reporter Thursday if there were some connection between Monday's Rather broadcast and the sudden switch of adjectives,

was reassured that "you can't be that dumb." ...

Speaking of 48 hours, the CBS News series of the same name, anchored by Rather Tuesday night, took a good swipe at Las Vegas, Nev., prompting the mayor of Lourdes West to complain that "once again, Dan Rather lost his objectivity." Mayor Ron Lurie dubbed CBS' portrayal of his city "an insult."

Poor Dan! A Times-Mirror Gallup Survey conducted Wednesday and released Thursday showed him third-ranked among the three network anchors following the Monday Night Fight. ...

A poll of 642 persons around the country showed Brokaw leading with a 79 percent favorable rating, with only 8 percent unfavorable. ABC's Peter Jennings was close by with a 78-7. But Rather scored only a 68-26.

In a similar poll (from a Target sample) taken last October, November, Brokaw had a 79-8, Jennings

74-7 and Rather a 73-4. ... Back in June 1986, a similar poll placed Rather way at the top of the heap with an 81-10, compared to a 74-9 for Jennings and a 69-9 for Brokaw. ...

Rather's approval rate with Republicans slipped from 80 percent in April of last year to 68 in November and to 50 percent in Wednesday's poll. Among Democrats he rated an 87 last April, a 79 in November and an 81 this week. Among independents, he had an 83 in April, a 70 in November and a 66 this week. ...

Well, as Uncle Airwaves always said, when it rains, it pours! Friday night on "NBC Nightly News" the winner of this year's Publishers Clearing House prize will be announced during the first commercial. ...

A year ago, a similar announcement on "CBS Evening News" raised the average for Mr. Rather & Co. from a 13.0-23 to a very nice 16.1-28 for that night. A similar jump on NBC Friday night could wipe out whatever ratings gains CBS had this week following the Monday Night Fight (each rating point represented 874,000 TV homes last year).

One good piece of news Thursday for Dan: The CBS affiliates board decided not to take any formal action in the wake of a flood of viewer calls around the country following Monday's show. ...

"The board decided it was not an actionable board item and it would be inappropriate for the board to make any kind of comment," said Benjamin Tucker, chairman of the affiliates group. "We encouraged local stations to express their concerns and their viewers' concerns to CBS News." ...

Phil Jones, vice president and general manager of KCTV in Kansas City and immediate past chairman of the board, had earlier said, "I think initially we had a group that was distressed and that has lessened by several measures since (Tuesday). I think part of it was Rather's handling of the situation on the 'Evening News' Tuesday night." ...

The 11-member board held a conference call Thursday, Tucker, who is executive vice president of Retlaw Broadcasting, said about half of the 20-minute call was devoted to the Rather situation.

# Eccentric English sleuth keeps viewers guessing on 'Mystery!'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Inspector Morse drives a 1957 Jaguar, drinks ale, ignores evidence and, in the shadow of Oxford University, solves crimes on intuition while listening to Mozart.

Another eccentric English sleuth. You can find Morse, played by John Thaw, on PBS "Mystery!" this Thursday when a series of three two-part shows continues.

Thaw isn't well known in this country, but he played tough cop Jack Regan in the British TV series "The Sweeney," sort of an English "Starsky & Hutch."

He was Sir Francis Drake a few seasons ago on Masterpiece Theatre's "Drake's Venture." Last year, Thaw went to Zimbabwe to play Kruger in "Cry Freedom," then co-starred with Glenda Jackson in "Business As Usual."

Thaw was in this country to promote the new show for Mobil's "Mystery!" He came in with a contingent of English actors, producers and directors to talk about "Mystery!" and "Masterpiece Theatre."

"Inspector Morse works in Oxford; where the crimes are much gentler than they are in London,"

said Thaw. "He's a detective who specializes in murder. If he were at Scotland Yard, he'd be in the murder squad, but in Oxford, it's just Morse."

"We film in Oxford, which is just beautiful. We film some scenes at the university. The old buildings are wonderful. I've never gone to a university, but when we film there, I wish I had."

Inspector Morse is taken from the mystery novels written by Colin Dexter. Morse has no first name, although Thaw jokes it's "Inspector."

Morse was named after Sir Jeremy Morse, chairman of Lloyd's Bank. Although Morse works in Oxford, he's a member of the Thames Valley Police.

Dexter, who wrote the books while an examiner at Oxford University, is a noted creator of crossword puzzles.

"You'll see because of his crossword background that he constructs very complicated stories," said Thaw. "It takes a lot of attention. He drops in clues, like in a crossword puzzle. If you can spot them you can beat Morse at his own game."

Unlike Sherlock Holmes, Inspector Morse works solely on intuition. "I think one of the reasons he's so

popular is that he often leaps to the wrong conclusion," said Thaw. "People can identify with him because he's not omnipotent."

Morse has a sidekick, Sgt. Lewis, a diligent, typical English copper, and Morse usually leaves it up to Lewis to do the investigating.

"Morse will go home, put on a Mozart record and wait for a call from Lewis," he said. "He drinks only real ale, which is made from hops and water. It's the way beer was 200 years ago. It's becoming very popular in England again."

Kavin Whately plays Sgt. Lewis and Peter Woodthorpe is Max, the pathologist.

On Feb. 18 and 25, Morse investigates the murder of a deaf man in "The Silent World of Nicholas Quinn." Quinn is a member of the group that administers British student exams abroad, and Morse suspects someone has been selling exam secrets.

In the final episode, March 3 and 10, "Service of All the Dead," Morse investigates several murders, including that of a church warden, Sir Michael Hordern (the pastor in "Paradise Postponed") plays a retired headmaster.

Thaw was doing a play in Canada when producer Kenny McBain contacted him about the role. He read the Dexter books McBain sent him, but was still a little skeptical.

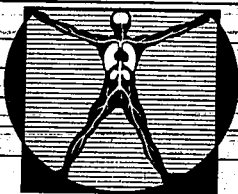

# Prime-time goes sensational during sweeps

HOLLYWOOD (L.A. Times) — Natalie Green could have saved her virginity for marriage.

Instead, she will lose it during sweeps.

Saturday night, 21-year-old Natalie, one of the young boarding-house residents in NBC's comedy series "The Facts of Life," will have her first sexual experience with her truck-driver boyfriend, Snake. In life, it probably had to happen someday. In the competitive world of television, it had to happen during sweeps.

It is a fact of life: While the networks flood their schedules with lavish new miniseries, movies and special programming to hype their ratings during the sweeps months of February, May and November, they also call on many of their regular series to make each episode a special event.

"It comes down from the very top, and it happens at all three networks," says producer ("Rags to Riches") and former network executive Leonard Hill. "They live by this irrationality... They light firecrackers trying to get attention. It's klieg lights. Give us flash and sparkle at

a certain time of year."

Some examples from the current month: Michael Landon loses his angel's wings and falls in love on "Highway to Heaven." Dolly Parton goes to Hawaii. "Mr. Belvedere" goes to Atlantic City. Sherman Hemsley, former star of "The Jeffersons," locks horns once again with his former co-star, Maria Gibbs, on her current NBC comedy series "227." Teen heartthrob Scott Baio turns up on NBC's "My Two Dads," and Joe Namath appears on CBS' "Kate & Allie."

Viewers of NBC's courtroom drama "Matlock" and Fox Broadcasting's comedy "Married... With Children" will get a chance to cast a telephone vote on how a sweeps episode will end. And the very tall, very bald winners of the nationwide Bull-Loke-Alike contest will appear on NBC's "Night Court" along with the real Bull-Shannon (played by Richard Moll), as Bull prepares to attend a meeting of the Big, Bald, Burlly Balliffs of America.

Most TV series producers deny that the sweeps control their creativity, but they agree that sweeps are no ordinary time of year. Early in the season, discussions begin with the network about which

episodes might be earmarked for sweeps, the period when ratings on every TV station in the country are taken for the purpose of setting advertising rates.

Though no rules exist by which the network determines what is sweeps material, one can expect more births, deaths, murders, marriages, remote locations, outrageous stunts and guest stars. Or episodes that feature one key visual element that lends itself to promotion spots — such as another "Facts of Life" episode this month in which Natalie's house mate, Blair, accidentally dyes her hair green.

Irma Kalish, executive producer of "Facts of Life," said the network is more interested in identifying appropriate sweeps episodes than in imposing its own ideas of what should be in them.

"They (the network) didn't tell us to do a show about one of the girls having a sexual experience, but when they heard we were planning it, they stated it for sweeps," she said. "We've never had any problem; we're always thinking of shows that could be big for sweeps."

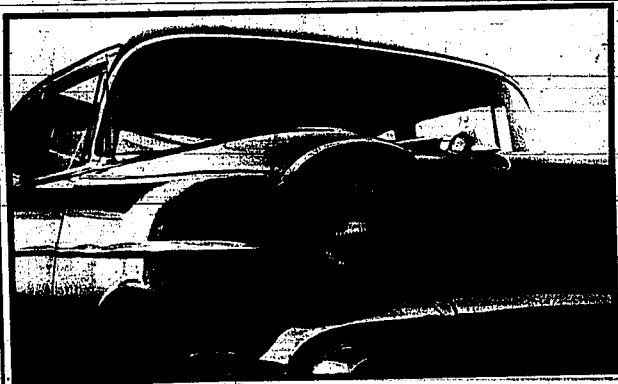
