## Deal with Congress set \$1.1 trillion budget



President Reagan holds copy of Fiscal 1989 budget

**WASHINGTON** — President Reagan proposed Thursday his smallest Pentagon increase but sharply higher spending for AIDS research and airline safety in a \$1.1 trillion fiscal 1989 budget that was largely pre-ordained in a deal with Congress.

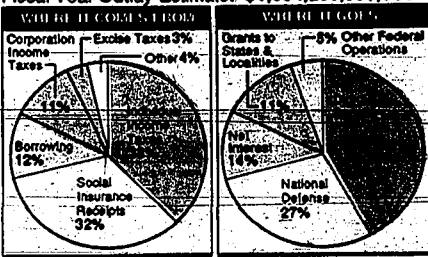
This budget does not fully reflect his priorities, the president said in his message accompanying the last spending plan he'll see through to completion. "But ... abandoning the deficit reduction compromise would threaten our economic progress and burden future generations."

The spending plan contains only hints of the "Reagan revolution" years as it strives to comply with the administration's agreement with congressional leaders last November to reduce the federal deficit.

The agreement set overall spending limits for domestic, military and foreign aid spending. Reagan has already signed the tax increase required under the agreement, adding \$14 billion to the Treasury's receipts for next year.

The president's plan envisions overall spending of \$1.094 trillion, offset by \$955 billion in receipts. That includes a deficit of about \$129.5 billion in the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1, within the guidelines of the Gramm-Rudman

- \$1.3 billion for AIDS research, a 38 percent increase.
- An increase of \$1.5 billion, or 8 percent, on education.

## Election year a major factor in Reagan's fiscal '89 budget

**WASHINGTON** — President Reagan's \$1.1 trillion election-year budget represents more political accommodation than the seven that preceded it.

It gives Republicans a host of projects to champion and Democrats a chance to join them in fleeing town early to campaign.

Instead of the deep domestic spending cuts and hefty defense increases that marked past Reagan budgets, the new spending outline

"It's a rather unique year," Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III conceded on Thursday.

## Reagan offers support to Marine officer's kin

**LOUISVILLE, Ky.** — The family of the Marine who kidnapped this week in Lebanon suffered a second blow Thursday when his 72-year-old father died.

"He never knew that his son had been taken captive. It was a blessing that he didn't know," said Harold Fisher, the officer's brother-in-law.

Relatives of Lt. Col. William Richard Higgins learned he had been kidnapped by Islamic revolutionaries in Lebanon when they called his wife in Washington, D.C.

offered all the support he knew how to give," said Fisher.

Higgins' wife, Marine Maj. Robin Higgins, works in the Pentagon's public affairs office.

Fisher is married to Higgins' sister, Mary, who did not attend the news conference.

Fisher said the family was happy that Higgins, whom they call Richard, had chosen to serve his country as a United Nations observer.

"We have confidence that our government will do what is best and necessary for our country and for his safety," he said.

Higgins, 43, was grabbed as he returned from a meeting in Tyre with officials of Justice Minister Nabih Berr's Shiite Amal militia to discuss efforts to free foreign hostages in Lebanon.

A caller claimed that a previously unknown group called the Islamic Revolutionary Brigades was responsible for the kidnaping and accused "the officer of being a CIA agent."

Asked about the chances for Higgins' release, Fisher said, "It could be two days, two years or never. It's a sad situation."

## Stroke death rate falls but it's still 3rd

**SAN DIEGO** — The death rate from strokes is falling about 6 percent annually, but the disease will still cost Americans nearly \$18 billion this year, according to a medical report released Thursday.

Despite its declining mortality rate, stroke remains the third leading cause of death in the United States after heart disease and cancer.

A report released by the American Heart Association showed that stroke also continues to be a major financial burden.

This year, the association estimates that \$2.2 billion will be spent on hospital and nursing home care alone for stroke victims, who are often left paralyzed by their disease. When doctor and nurse bills, medicine and lost productivity are added, the total annual cost of stroke in 1988 will be an estimated \$12.9 billion.

In 1985, the last year for which statistics are available, about 600,000 Americans suffered strokes; 152,700 of them died.

About a third of all stroke victims need help caring for themselves.

Not all the statistics are, however, "The decline in stroke death rate has been leveling off in recent years," said Dr. Philip Wolf of Boston University Medical School.

For the past four decades, the death rate from stroke has been dropping at a rate of about 5 percent a year. But since 1970, the decline has averaged 8 percent a year.

No one knows precisely this cause of death is becoming less common. However, the number of heart attacks is also falling, and many experts believe the same factors are involved in curbing both diseases.

"A lot of people think the control of blood pressure, cholesterol, and lifestyle, and smoking cessation are the main health consciousness are affecting stroke (blood vessel) disease in general," said Dr. Louis R. Caplan of the Medical School in Boston, a chairman of the heart association's stroke council.

## Court at full strength as Kennedy takes oath

**WASHINGTON** — Anthony McLeod Kennedy took his place Thursday as the 14th Supreme Court justice in U.S. history, restoring the court to full strength for the first time in eight months and inheriting a pivotal vote on key issues.

"I do solemnly swear that I will administer justice without respect to persons and do equal right to the poor and to the rich," Kennedy, 51, said in a brief courtroom ceremony witnessed by some 450 invited guests.

He then took his seat at one end

of the high court bench reserved for the Supreme Court's newest member.

After a private reception, Kennedy went to the White House to take a second oath of office in the presence of President Reagan.

"Justice Kennedy has shown a consistency and a courageous dedication to preserving ours as a government of laws, and that's why I nominated him," the president said.

"He won the respect of his colleagues and of the entire legal community," Reagan said.

"Lawyers and judges of all persuasions characterize him as fair, open-

mined, and scholarly."

Kennedy gave a thumbs-up salute with both hands after the audience in the East Room of the White House applauded him following his oath taking.

"The Constitution of the United States is the single idea, the single fact, the single reality, the single moral principle that sets the United States apart from other nations, now and throughout history," Kennedy said. "I shall honor that Constitution."

Kennedy was Reagan's third choice to succeed Justice Lewis F. Powell, who retired June 26.

Reagan's first choice, Robert H. Bork, was rejected in a bitter Senate battle and the next appointee, Douglas H. Ginsburg, withdrew after admitting he smoked marijuana as a law professor.

Seven justices were on hand as Attorney General Edwin Meese III, dressed in the traditional long-sleeved morning coat, formally presented Kennedy's commission of office to the court.

Kennedy, wearing a judge's robe, placed his hand on the family Bible and recited the oath administered by Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist.

## Budget writers approve funds to repair welfare computer

**BOISE** — Legislative budget writers on Thursday grudgingly approved a multimillion-dollar emergency appropriation to fix the fouled-up state welfare benefit computer.

"I don't think we have any choice," conceded Rep. Brent Brokome, R-Boise, as the panel approved siphoning \$1.8 million from the anticipated general revenue surplus.

The money is to cover costs of correcting problems with the system and to reimburse

the federal government will match the state money in financing the overall recovery plan for the Eligibility Program Integrated Computer System. Officials said the department will need another \$425,000 in 1989 state funds, matched by the federal government, to complete the entire recovery program.

"It's the only handful of protest votes in the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee. But Rep. But persisting problems 15 months ago delayed benefit payments for months for many poor Idahoans and the repair program has dramatically driven the cost of the system skyward.

Welfare officials say they just about have all the problems resolved.

The allocation was the largest of the emergency 1988-budget requests considered by the panel, and even at the amount in question the surplus is still expected to run around \$2.8 million when the budget year ends in June.

In an apparent attempt to keep that GOP spending plan alive, the committee tapped a number of accounting techniques as it continued to squeeze general tax money out of various agency budgets so it can be funneled toward education, the priority spending item to most lawmakers.

# House sidetracks pair of bills beneficial to state employees

BOISE (AP) — State employees didn't fare well when the Idaho House sidetracked work on a package of bills on pay and fringe benefits.

The two bills that would have been most beneficial to state workers were sidetracked and put up for major amendments Thursday. Two lesser measures scraped through the House and passed to the Senate, one on a narrow 44-34 vote.

The legislation came from an interim study committee on state employee working conditions.

One would have allowed state agencies to grant lump-sum bonuses up to \$1,000 for outstanding performance. If the Board of Examiners approved, the \$1,000 limit could



might have enough votes to change the bill. "I'm just trying to bring a little sanity into state government," he said. "Our pay system has gone a little bit haywire."

He argued that Idaho has a state merit system, designed to properly reward employees for the work they do, with merit increases permitted for outstanding performance.

"Bonuses, whether merited or given to a friend of the administrator, have no place in our government," he said.

Sponsor Rep. Ruby Stone, R-Boise, said one-time bonuses would allow agency chiefs to reward outstanding employees, even those not in line to receive pay increases be-

cause they are at top scale.

She said it would boost the morale of state employees.

A similar fate befell a companion bill. It would have removed limits on the amount of unused sick pay state employees could convert into cash to pay for health insurance premiums when they retire.

"I don't think we should pay them sick pay unless they are sick," said Rep. Mack Neibaur, R-Paul.

Rep. Pam Bengson, R-Boise, said the system encourages state employees not to use their sick leave, but to come to work and do their job.

Rep. Emerson Smock, R-Boise, called the sick-leave plan "a good thing. It helps peo-

ple get money on the job and work," knowing they can stay on under retirement to help with insurance costs.

A third bill won routine approval and went to the Senate. It allows state employee pay raises to be in 2.5 percent increments. "State" increases now are 5 percent.

The fourth bill allows some state workers to use overtime hours worked toward the calculation of their longevity benefits. Some lawmakers predicted it could be used by teachers to claim overtime pay.

Sponsors said the legislation was designed for Department of Transportation employees, who routinely work overtime during certain seasons, and would not benefit teachers.

## Council may amend protected rivers plan

BOISE (AP) — The Northwest Power Planning Council may amend its protected rivers plan to make it more palatable to Idahoans, Idaho council member Jerry G. said.

Goller said he will propose new language in April that would lift a recommended hydro ban on protected streams and instead ask developers to "prove power" projects would not harm fish and wildlife.

He also wants to trim the list of Idaho streams slated for a protected status to exclude those with existing dams.

When announced last fall, the Power Council's intent was to block hydroelectric development on about 12,000 miles, or one-third, of Idaho's streams at the request of the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

But after receiving hundreds of letters and talking with many Idahoans, Goller said the council would be oversteering the bounds by calling for a prohibition of hydro development on protected streams.

"You're getting into de facto

zoning and regulation if you go that far," he said. Goller's former boss, Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, has criticized the council for that reason, saying it is an advisory board only.

The eight-member Power Council that coordinates hydro development with fish and wildlife restoration programs includes members from Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington.

Sen. Leland Nix, R-Kimberly, and Sen. KBY-Brooks, D-Boise, co-sponsored a bill last week asking the state be excluded from the Power Council's plan.

The bill also calls for the development of a comprehensive river plan, which would pinpoint streams needing protection and those available for development.

Goller said both plans can proceed without conflict.

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission would still have the final say on approving private hydro projects.

However, federal law stipulates that FERC would have to consider the Council's fish and wildlife plan.

## Goodwill visit made over border conflict

OLYMPIA (AP) — It was hands-across-the-border Thursday when a delegation of Idaho legislators visited the Washington capital to establish better communication between the two states.

The meeting was prompted by a series of rhetorical border wars between the two states, mostly over tax problems.

"There have been some sticky wickets, but for now there's a truce," said Idaho House Speaker Tom Boyd, R-Genesee. "I guess you could call this goodwill trip," he said.

The delegation met with Gov. Booth Gardner, state Auditor Bob

Graham, Secretary of State Ralph Munz and members of the House and Senate.

"This is really a continuation of our hands-across-the-border program" that was initiated last October during a legislative summit held in Coeur d'Alene, said Rep. Jerry Decker, R-Boise.

That summit was arranged by Washington Sen. Jim West, R-Spokane, and Idaho Rep. Dan Haugenson, R-Coeur d'Alene.

"It's better to talk face-to-face than to talk through the press," Decker said.

Idaho Lt. Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter

cited interstate boat registration concerns, licensing and reciprocal sales-tax issues as items of concern to both states.

He also said interstate trucking and rail travel, interstate transportation of hazardous materials and waste, and higher education are other areas of concern.

Delegation members also told Gardner that bills are before the Legislature designed to ease tensions that arose when Idaho ordered 502 Washington railroad employees who work on freight trains passing through the Idaho panhandle to pay Idaho's income tax.

In effort to calm the situation, the Idaho Legislature last year raised the minimum taxable income for out-of-state workers from \$1,000 to \$3,300 for single individuals and \$5,400 for married couples filing jointly.

The Idaho Supreme Court is currently considering whether the tax order was constitutional.

In oral arguments before the high court last week, Attorney William Nielsen of Spokane said there was no "substantial economic contact" to justify the June 1983 Idaho Tax Commission Order.

There also was some joshing during the meeting with Gardner.

"We thought if we arrived, and you weren't here, we'd take over the state," Boyd told Gardner.

## Panel could assist families, state

BOISE (AP) — The sponsor of a bill to form an Idaho Commission on Family Relations says it could strengthen the family unit and save the state money in the bargain.

"When you talk about another commission, a lot of people go, 'Oh gosh, not another one of these,'" Rep. Preston Brimhall, R-Idaho Falls, said.

His proposed bill, headed to the House State Affairs Committee, calls for setting up a 15-member Idaho Commission on Family Relations. The panel selected by the governor would have a three-year

lifetime, disbanding in June 1991. Brimhall said its cost would not be more than \$20,000 per year.

"Hopefully, they can give us some ideas on how to strengthen marriages, parents and families," he said.

The commission would make recommendations only.

Brimhall, who serves on the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee, said family breakups contribute greatly to swelling budgets in the departments of Health and Welfare and Correction.

He suggested starting with couples considering marriage. Counties could set up seminars at no charge about the responsibilities of a family for prospective spouses or married couples.

Brimhall said the commission would include a district judge as chairman; the director of the state Department of Health and Welfare as vice chairman; the director of Corrections Board; three ministers; a family counselor; divorced men and women with children; and teachers.

## Senate judiciary chairman against bill limiting information on crimes

BOISE (AP) — The chairman of the state Senate Judiciary Committee has vetoed a bill to restrict legislation restricting publication of information on victims of violent crimes, signaling the likely demise of that bill.

Sen. Roger Fairchild, R-Fruitland, said the restrictions on Wednesday he would not support the legislation Attorney General Jim Jones says is critical to preserving the rights of victims of violent crimes.

"Problems such as this, you've got to trust the media to be responsible," Fairchild told the editors. "I'd leave the discretion, but I urge you to have guidelines... so that discretion doesn't get abused."

In addition to Fairchild's opposition, Deputy Attorney General Pat Cole said the bill, introduced in the House several weeks ago, was being withdrawn and a new measure would be drafted, reflecting the problems such restrictions would impose on the media.

Under the legislation, law enforcement officials would be precluded from releasing the names or addresses

of crime victims, including murder victims, until a suspect was assigned in any specific case. The editors contended that such a restriction would create problems with accuracy and undermine the ability of the media to inform readers and viewers about public safety.

"You've raised some legitimate points," Jones said. "We would be willing to look at that."

Jones maintains the principle of the bill is needed to protect the privacy of crime victims and relieve some of the concerns many have about testifying against their alleged assailants. But editors, labeling the measure a "cover-the-cops-but-bill," contended there were only a handful of cases in which the media has not exercised the kind of responsibility Jones has been seeking with the bill.

On another media issue, the managing editors reached a consensus on support of a possible compromise to resolve the controversy over public access to government records.

Without dissent, the editors supported creation of an ad hoc committee to negotiate a comprehensive bill covering access to public records. The deal calls for compet-

ing legislation on the issue to die this season with legislation approved to implement the U.S. Supreme Court decision voiding Idaho's closed preliminary criminal court hearing law and to make permanent a compromise bill on access to police records. That law would be involved negotiations on the overall open records law.

The issue of access to records rose to the forefront after a state Supreme Court decision that declared every government record public unless specifically designated as confidential.

Fairchild and Kole both warned the editors they were losing the public access battle to specific bills that have been passed over the last two years closing off access to various government records.

"You'll lose this battle by default," Fairchild said in urging the editors to become directly involved in the legislative process. "There are times when you're just going to have to get involved."

Fairchild and Kole both told the editors that in the absence of a comprehensive law they will lose the fight for access to individual bills closing off various categories of public records.

## Board backs recovery lane

BOISE (AP) — The state Transportation Board has backed construction of a \$2.1 million "recovery zone" as the best way to increase safety along the lava rock median of Interstate 15 north of Blackfoot.

"We believe it is the best option under all circumstances," Board Chairman John Ohman of Idaho Falls said after Thursday's decision.

The public and eastern Idaho lawmakers showed the most support for the 56-foot recovery zone alternative among the four options reviewed by the board, Ohman maintained.

The zone would give motorists running off the main highway pavement into the median an area to regain control and return to the roadway before hitting rock on plunging into one of the canyons along the 3 1/2-mile stretch of interstate. Federal and state research shows 88 percent of motorists entering recovery zones correct their vehicles without mishap, officials said.

## Accountability needed in funding of Idaho's public schools

The 1988 session of the Idaho State Legislature has now been in session for 30 days, or one-half of its allotted time of 60 days. One can now repeat an old adage that says, "The more things change, the more they remain the same."

The remaining eternally prevailing problem is still facing the members, and that is what to do about funding for public schools. Perhaps a little review would be in order.

That included, of course an additional \$29 million for public school support or an increase over the previous year of 12.1 percent.

1985 and 1986 that much more conservative Legislature increased funding for public schools just short of \$100 million; \$33.5 million increased in 1984; \$55.65 million increased in 1985 and \$10 million increase in 1986 for an average percentage increase for the three years of 12.6 percent per year.

Now if you compare those figures with the 1987 figures you must agree that we ex-

ceeded the effort made last year. It remains to be seen, of course, whether or not the record appropriations for '84, '85 and '86 will be exceeded in the next two years. Don't bet on it.

Could it be that the present Legislature is still wanting to find out just how much good is being produced with the \$125 millions of dollars in increases over the past four years?

And, of course, the insatiable appetite of the Idaho Education Association is still not satisfied.

An incisive news reporter might find it interesting to check the record once in a while instead of being a lackey to the propaganda cranked out of bureaucratic machinery.

We can and should all agree that our public schools should be properly and sufficiently funded, but sometimes, someplace, somewhere there should be accountability.

Why is it that our percentage of increase to public school funding is far exceeding the rate of cost-of-living?

I have often complained that we are administratively too heavy in Twin Falls County. Why couldn't the several school districts be administered by one superintendent?

Of course it could be done, and at a savings of more than \$200,000 per year! The principals would still be managing each school and most likely be doing a better job and could even see substantial increases in their salaries.

So I say, "How soon we forget, and yet how well we should remember." Think about it.

The support services such as x-ray, CT-scanner, medical lab, are all utilized during diagnostic procedure. Hospitalization occurs usually during surgery (if necessary).

The majority of cancer patients are "out-

patients." If a person is too ill, they do not have a radiation treatment. Rarely are patients hospitalized for chemotherapy (an injection and oral drug treatment).

As a cancer patient, I wouldn't think twice about going to "any length" for ongoing treatment to expand my life expectancy. Advocates for MSTI would like to hear from the 30-38 percent of cancer patients who have flat out refused to do the same? Please call 734-8236 or 734-8238.

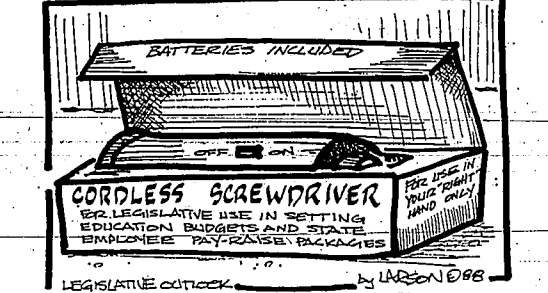

## After New Hampshire, conservatives turning pessimistic

The GOP delivered another surprise to the pollsters and a setback to Sen. Bob Dole of Kansas.

Also to conservatives, I listen to add.

The foreboding that I detected among conservatives after Iowa has deepened into pessimism after New Hampshire.

Two-thirds of the Republican vote in the first primary of 1988 went to one or other of the two "moderates" - Vice President George Bush and Dole - while a meager one-third went to the three conservatives combined.

After seven years of President Reagan, no hint of succession to conservative leadership within the Republican Party has even remotely been established. If this is not an opportunity lost, I don't know what is.

Many conservatives are admittedly relieved to find the water in Dole in trouble. He went to New Hampshire with a big boost, smiled on the hustings, gained in the polls and finished 10 points behind Bush.

When the results came in, Dole told Tom Brokaw of NBC that Bush should "stop binging" about his record. Dole could soon blaze ruinously into anger if he makes good on his promise to hit back. Dole comes across as Richard III without the crown - or, as a friend of mine put it, not entirely jokingly, as "Richard Nixon without the moral uplift."

But this scarcely helps conservatives. In the next few weeks the media spotlight will focus on the ding-dong Bush-Dole battle. Meanwhile, Rep. Jack Kemp of New York and Sen. Delaware Gov. Pierre S. D'Amato will find themselves short of cash and attention. It will be all that they can do to stay in the race.

Religious broadcasts that Robertson's fifth-place finish may move the zealous grin from his face, but his grating troops and plentiful cash will keep him in the presidential race until the New Orleans convention. Fred Barnes of the New Republic believes that Robertson

has peaked, but conservative columnist Pat Buchanan told me that he thought Robertson "has more surprises in store for us." I'm with Buchanan on this.

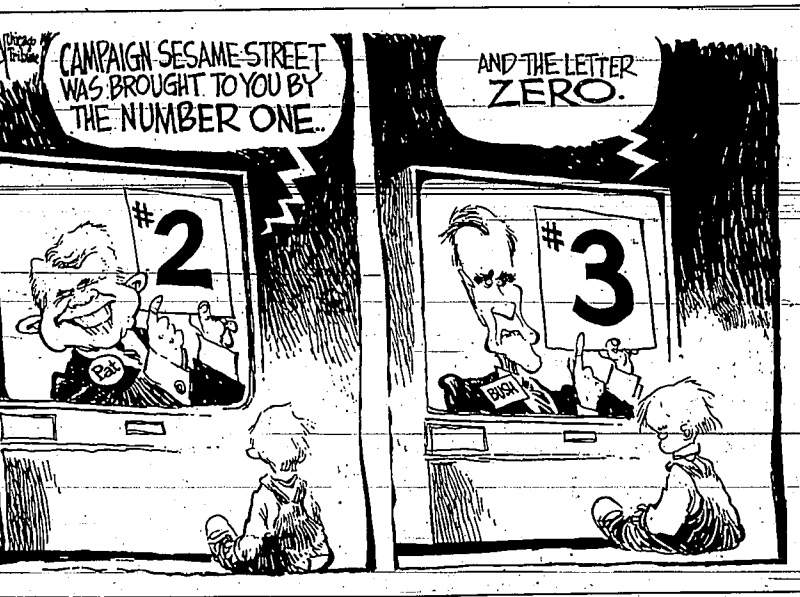
There's still a possibility of a deal-locked convention, but the odds now favor Bush. Most conservatives whom I know believe that he would nonetheless contrive to lose in November. Christopher Hitchens of the Nation told me the other day that the liberals have all along been hoping for a Bush nomination, seeing him as beatable. The liberals fear Kemp, but he has not prospered.

On the Democratic side, former Gov. Bruce Babbitt of Arizona and former Sen. Gary Hart of Colorado are effectively out of the running, although Hart will no doubt tag along for the fun of it and a minor role in Atlanta. "I love New Hampshire!" he said after his 1984 victory there. Now he will be glad to put it behind him.

An ominous note for the Democrat: Jesse Jackson has done better this year in both Iowa and New Hampshire than he did in 1984. The lack of party registration in many of the Southern states holding primaries on Super Tuesday, March 8, will permit conservative Democrats to cross over (perhaps voting for Robertson), leaving Jackson a potential Democratic winner. He seems destined to play a major role at the convention.

Sen. Paul Simon of Illinois is said to be in financial straits, and may not be able to continue. I held a brief for Simon, but his television ads pointing to inconsistent voting by Rep. Richard A. Gephardt of Missouri were perfectly legitimate.

One of the more absurd developments in 1988 has been the charge that such comparisons are "negative campaigning." It sometimes



seems that the press wants to reserve unto itself an exclusive right to decide which issues are germane.

The 16-point margin of victory by Gov. Michael S. Dukakis of Massachusetts may well be less impressive than it seems. Given the proximity of his home state, Dukakis was the neighborhood, if not the favorite, son. His liberal views and consistent support for gay rights

legislation may well hurt him in the South, possibly to the advantage of Sen. Albert Gore Jr. of Tennessee. Gephardt is now the Democrats' most formidable candidate: He wisely embraced the accusation by his more liberal opponents that he had supported Reagan's tax cuts; supply-siders believe that this could put him on the road to victory in November.

Democrats won the White House

in 1960 and 1976 by campaigning to the right of Republicans on national-security issues. Since arms control and summery render Republicans vulnerable on this score once again, it will be interesting to see if Gephardt risks such a rightward move. If so, he will be accused of opportunism, but the prospect of victory may tempt him.

In recent years and for both parties the primaries have devolved all

too quickly into two-man races. This year it is my hope that a larger field will persevere longer. There are still many laps to run. Why shouldn't voters have the opportunity to choose from among several rather than between two candidates?

# Reagan declares AIDS high priority

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan on Thursday declared that AIDS is his "highest public health priority" and asked Congress for a 38 percent budget boost, to \$1.3 billion, to combat the deadly and spreading disease.

In addition, the budget envisions spending \$786 million under Medicaid and Medicare to care for people already suffering from the illness. Congress consistently has appropriated more than Reagan requested for AIDS, but the general outlines for the fiscal 1989 proposal were worked out in closer consultation this year and Congress is more likely to vote a large addition this year.

For example, Reagan's initial request for AIDS spending for fiscal 1988 was \$534 million, compared with the \$621 million eventually approved by Congress.

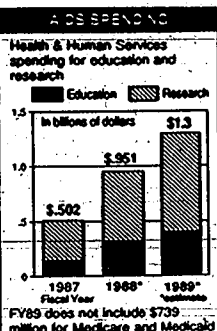
For fiscal 1987, Reagan initially requested \$213 million for AIDS and Congress wound up allocating \$502 million.

The huge jump for AIDS spending stands out even more starkly when compared with the net increase of 5.8 percent proposed for overall operation of the 260 programs administered by the Department of Health and Human Services, which oversees roughly a third of all federal spending.

The total HHS budget is to rise from \$376.1 billion to \$396.8 billion. But the bulk of that — nearly 96 percent — goes for so-called entitlement programs such as Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid, over which the administration has marginal control because basic eligibility criteria — including treatment of AIDS patients — are laid down by law.

Social Security's old age and disability programs alone are expected to grow by \$14 billion, or 6.4 percent, to \$233.8 billion. That includes money for new recipients coming out of the aging population as well as an anticipated 4.2 percent cost-of-living increase next January for all 38 million beneficiaries.

Medicaid, the state-federal health program for poor people, will cost the federal government \$32.7 billion in 1989, up 7 percent from \$30.7 billion currently.



Much of the Medicaid increase is attributed to additional spending on AIDS patients, an estimated 40 percent of whom qualify for the program either when they first contract the disease or soon afterward because they become unable to work.

Medicaid spending on AIDS is estimated at \$376 million this year and is budgeted to grow to \$600 million next year.

Medicare spending for 33 million elderly or disabled workers is projected to rise to \$84 billion from \$79.9 billion.

The most controversial part of the HHS budget is likely to be Reagan's proposal for \$1.2 billion in Medicare cuts he says are necessary to meet the "deficit-reduction" targets that Congress and the administration agreed to in December.

Those differences largely boil down to disagreement over whether Congressional Budget Office projections of overall Medicare spending are more accurate than those projected by the Office of Management and Budget.

Deficit negotiators agreed previously to cut \$3.5 million from Medicare and the administration argues that the \$1.2 billion cut in its proposal will be needed to meet that target.

# Committee calls for Biaggi expulsion

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House ethics committee recommended Thursday that Rep. Mario Biaggi, a 10-term New York Democrat convicted of accepting illegal gratuities, be expelled from Congress for violating its rules of conduct.

The committee issued a three-sentence statement: "The Committee on Standards of Official Conduct today filed a report with the House recommending that Representative Mario Biaggi of New York be expelled. The report will be made available as soon as it has been printed by the U.S. Government Printing Office. Neither the committee nor its staff will have any further comment on this matter."

Biaggi, once the most-decorated policeman on the New York City force, could become the first congressman since 1980 and only the second since the Civil War to be drummed out of the House.

The committee's recommendation must be approved by a two-thirds majority of the House to become effective.

Biaggi vowed to fight; and accused the committee of acting in haste.

"I am bitterly disappointed by the committee's action, coming as it does before my appeal has even been heard," he said in a statement. "This fight is far from over. I will take my case directly to the floor of the House," he added.

Biaggi said he would ask his colleagues "one straightforward question." "If my appeal is successful, but comes after action by the House that results in expulsion — how do I recoup the loss of my House seat?"

"The answer to this question rests solely with my colleagues in the House. I appeal to their sense of fairness and justice and urge them to withhold action until my appeal is completed," he said.

The last congressman to be expelled was Rep. Michael "Ozzie" Myers, D-Ea. Myers, convicted in the Abram bribery scandal, was captured on videotape taking \$50,000 from an undercover FBI agent. Before Myers, no House member

had been expelled since the Civil War.

The committee could have recommended a wide range of sanctions, including expulsion, censure, reprimand, fine, or loss of seniority.

Biaggi, 70, pleaded with the ethics committee in December to keep his Bronx, N.Y., congressional seat. His lawyers had asked the panel instead to reprimand the congressman, chairman Julian Dixon, D-Calif., said at the time.

But the committee counsel recommended expulsion and more than a month later, the members chose to invoke their harshest punishment. Biaggi was sentenced in November to 2½ years in prison and fined \$500,000.

# Toxic chemical leak forces evacuation in Ohio

FREMONT, Ohio (AP) — Hundreds of people around this northwestern Ohio city were evacuated Thursday as a toxic chemical that leaked from a oil company pipeline snaked its way through the Sandusky River toward Lake Erie.

At least three people were treated for injuries after an estimated 100,000 gallons of toluene, an octane enhancer, spilled Wednesday from the Sun Co. pipeline south of here.

Five hundred people, including 300 residents of Old Fort, a town 10 miles to the south, were evacuated late Wednesday and early Thursday because of the fumes, and Sandusky County Sheriff Dave Gangwer said up to 5,000 people could be evacuated along Fremont's riverfront.

"It could get worse," Gangwer said. "It depends on how slow it moves, and it's slowing down rapidly."

Meanwhile, the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency told officials in Fremont to stop drawing water from the Sandusky River because part of the chemical had flowed into the river near Tiffin, nearly 20 miles upstream.

Gary Rothfelder, assistant superintendent of Fremont's water plant, said about 4 million gallons, one day's normal supply of water, was in reserve tanks and the city would close its water intake valves as the spill arrived.

Toluene is a flammable chemical that can produce irritating or poisonous gases, according to an emergency response guidebook published by the U.S. Department of Transportation.

The spill was detected around 6 p.m. Wednesday after Sun workers noticed that pressure had dropped

in the pipeline, which carries the chemical from a Sun refinery in Toledo to a refinery in Marcus Hook, Pa.

Sonya Elam, a spokeswoman for the Ohio Disaster Services Agency, said the chemical spilled in a swampy area in Seneca County, south of Fremont, population 22,000, and then leaked into Sugar Creek, a tributary of the Sandusky River. The Sandusky River flows north into Lake Erie, 10 miles north of here.

Ms. Elam said Ohio EPA workers were building a road into the swampy area and setting up a dike

to contain the chemical.

Bob Arnet, an environmental safety coordinator for the Tulsa, Okla.-based Sun Pipe Line, said authorities had not located the leak.

"It's been shut off, but it's still leaking," Arnet said.

Neither EPA nor Sun officials could estimate how much of the chemical had entered the Sandusky River.

Two emergency workers were treated at Tiffin Mercy Hospital after they fell through ice and into contaminated water, while a volunteer firefighter was treated after inhaling the fumes.

# Feds order suspension of ionizing air guns

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal regulators on Thursday ordered an immediate suspension of the use of an industrial device which has leaked tiny particles of radioactive polonium at plants around the nation.

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission also ordered a 3M Corp. recall for inspection all 45,000 of the suspect devices, ionizing air guns used to control static electricity and remove dust from product containers.

Roberto Bernero, deputy director of NRC's office of nuclear materials safety, said that of 828 plants inspected so far, "detectable" — though virtually harmless — contamination had been found at 118 sites. Of those, he identified 39 plants where the radiation exceeded the reportable limit of .005 microcuries.

"This is an incomplete list," said Bernero. "It changes daily."

Last week, the NRC issued successive recalls of particular 3M models used in the food, beverage, cosmetic and drug industries, involving about 2,600 units. The latest order affects all industries and applies to all the devices made since they were first marketed in 1965.

Echoing earlier reports, NRC and Food and Drug Administration officials said Wednesday they still have no evidence that the faulty devices have posed any health hazard, either to workers at plants where radioactive contamination was found or to consumers of the products made at those facilities.

Bernero said in more than 1,000 tests of product samples, there was only one instance in which radiation was detected, involving a food supplement made by Ross Laboratories of Altavista, Va. In that case, the amount was so low it could have involved naturally occurring radiation, he said.


But he cited another case, involving Moto Photo of North Dartmouth, Mass., where he expressed greater concern about what the inspectors don't know, rather than what they found. That facility is in a shopping mall, he said, and how much of the leaked radioactive material "might have been tracked out into the mall is just unknown."

NRC Chairman Lando Zech said


the suspension and broadened recall order was necessary in light of a growing list of plants where inspectors found the devices had failed, leaking microscopic ceramic spheres containing polonium 210, which emits a weak form of radiation incapable of penetrating the skin but which could prove harmful if ingested in sufficient amounts.

Bernero said NRC investigators had found evidence in internal 3M records that from 0.04 percent to 0.9 percent of the guns, depending on the model, were faulty, even though the company reported far lower failure rates.

# Reagan's budget plan would reduce forces, weapon funds

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan on Thursday proposed a \$294 billion military budget that would reduce active-duty forces and kill cherished weapons programs to comply with a congressional freeze on his ambitious arms buildup.

For the first time in a presidency that had earmarked \$2 trillion for defense, Reagan proposed significant cuts to American troop strength — a drop of 34,000 men and women or 1.66 percent. He postponed, perhaps killed, such long-standing goals as providing the Navy a 600-ship fleet.

He called for retiring hundreds of helicopters and more than a dozen ships sooner than expected, urged Congress to give up development of the mobile Midgame nuclear missile and abandoned the ASAT satellite-killing rocket. Navy kills, Air Force and Air Force

spy planes also fell victim to his budget ax. All told, Reagan asked for budget authority totaling \$299.5 billion for military programs, of which \$294 billion would actually be paid out during the year starting Oct. 1.

The fiscal 1989 totals represented increases from the \$291.4 billion in budget authority and \$285.4 billion in outlays set for this year — but not enough to compensate for inflation, the president said.

Unlike past years, the administration already had agreed with Congress — on the table — for military spending. That was done last November in a deal to reduce the national deficit, when the White House agreed to accept \$299.5 billion in budget authority and the \$302.4 billion it really wanted.

Unveiled Thursday, then, were the details of how the administration had scaled back to reach the

new targets. Defense Secretary Frank C. Carlucci described the changes as painful and risky, but done to a clear set of priorities that emphasized quality over quantity.

"We've made the hard choices here," he said at a Pentagon news conference. "We have traded off a smaller force in order to maintain a quality force."

To illustrate what he meant, Carlucci cited a request to provide military personnel a 4.3 percent pay raise next year instead of the 2 percent planned for civilian workers; a small increase in spending for operations and maintenance to ensure adequate training and deployment schedules; and continued production of existing modern weapons such as the M-1A1 tank and the AH-64 Apache helicopter.

In upping the 26.1 percent of federal outlays that would go to defense in fiscal 1989, Carlucci said

the administration would not abandon certain longstanding priorities. For example, the Pentagon wants \$4.65 billion for the Star Wars missile defense system, compared with \$3.55 billion this year. An additional \$492 million is being sought for Energy Department work on Star Wars.

The Pentagon is also asking to continue work on a rail-mobile version of the MX missile, and is requesting \$1.4 billion for another Trident nuclear submarine, Carlucci said.

On the other hand, the combined active-duty roster of the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps will be reduced gradually this year from 3,172,000 to 2,133,000 and then held at that level throughout fiscal 1989, Carlucci said.

The Air Force will be hit the hardest, giving up about 23,000 jobs toward the total 34,000 being cut.

The Army will deactivate a motorized infantry brigade at Fort Lewis, Wash., and cancel the scheduled activation of two light infantry battalions in Alaska. The Navy will scrap plans to establish a 14th air wing at the Miramonte, Calif., Naval Air Station and retire 16 frigates and one submarine it wanted to keep. The Air Force will deactivate two fighter wings and start deactivating a third.

In other moves, Carlucci and Pentagon comptroller, Robert Helms said:

—The Army will retire 450 Vietnam-era utility helicopters and 170 scout copters; cancel the Aquila surveillance drone program and stop production of Copperhead laser-guided artillery shells; cancel development of the Anti-Tactical Missile and develop only one new light helicopter instead of two.

—The Navy will give up its goal of reaching a 600-ship fleet in fiscal 1989, setting for 580. If Congress and the next administration agree, the Navy might hit the 600-ship level in fiscal 1992. The Navy also will kill its one blimp program and cancel development of a new model of the Intruder attack jet, the A-6F.

—The Air Force will deactivate the 474th Tactical Fighter Wing at Nellis Air Force Base and one other — either the 401st Air Wing now in Spain or another one if a new European home is found for the 401st. It will reduce its operation of SR-71 surveillance jets, relying more on satellites; cancel development of the ASAT satellite-killer rocket, and place the space shuttle launch base into Vandenberg Air Force Base into "mothball" status.

—Carlucci said he was recommending to Congress that it kill development of the single-warhead Midgame nuclear missile.

## Improved economy seen in farm budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — A recovering farm economy and cutbacks already ordered by Congress are expected to be main planks in President Reagan's budget proposals for financing the Agriculture Department in the 1989 fiscal year.

Details of the USDA plan were scheduled for release today as part of a proposed \$1 trillion federal spending blueprint for 1989, which begins Oct. 1.

The only major new legislative proposal for commodity programs would be an overhaul of the U.S. sugar program, which currently includes protective import quotas and price supports. Administration officials say sugar should be more competitive and the current support of 18 cents per pound should be reduced to 12 cents or lower.

Most of the cutbacks in the farm commodity programs were already endorsed by Congress in the Food Security Act of 1985 or in subsequent legislation. The

\$76 billion deficit reduction package, approved in December, for example, included a long list of money savers that will spill over into next fiscal year.

Cutbacks in target prices for major crops; changes in basic formulas for price support; loans to farmers; and many other adjustments and reductions were approved by Congress, and are reflected in the proposed budget for USDA operations.

Department economists say parts of the farm sector are still ailing severely, but overall there has been a strong recovery.

Net cash income, the difference between gross cash income and cash expenses, may be in the range of \$50 billion to \$65 billion, down from a record of \$87 billion in calendar 1987.

Last year's peak was due in part to record federal payments to farmers of about \$17 billion. This year's direct payments may drop to around \$15 billion.

## Tax break sought for students' parents

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan asked Congress on Thursday for a new tax break to help parents finance a college education for their children.

In a budget recommendation only a few days old, Reagan called for requiring all state and local government employees to pay a tax for Medicare coverage. He proposed a permanent tax benefit for owners of shares in mutual funds and an expanded break for independent oil producers.

In general, Reagan's proposed budget for the 12 months beginning next Oct. 1 reflects his reluctance to recommend tax expenditures that would worsen the federal deficit, and his opposition to raising taxes to cut that deficit.

However, in his written message to Congress, the president noted that "costs of post-secondary education have increased substantially in recent years, often faster than

inflation. As a result, parents may have difficulty bearing these costs unless they establish a savings program for this purpose when their children are young."

To help solve that problem, Reagan said he will propose that Congress exempt from taxation the interest earned on certain bonds that are redeemed to pay for college or vocational education of a taxpayer, spouse or dependent.

The tax exclusion would be targeted on lower- and middle-income taxpayers and would be phased out as incomes rise. Neither the limitation on how much interest could be excluded nor the phase-out level has been decided by the Reagan administration.

The idea is not a new one; in fact, several bills with a considerable amount of support are pending in Congress to achieve the same goal. One bill, by Rep. Pat Williams, D-Mont., would allow a family to buy a

maximum of \$2,000 worth of tax-free bonds per year. If the bonds were cashed for any purpose other than education, the interest would be taxed and the owner would have to pay a 10-percent penalty.

Williams' bill would allow the interest exclusion for regular savings bonds that students already own, assuming those bonds are used to finance an education. Reagan's proposal would allow the benefit only for bonds issued after 1989.

The administration estimates its proposal would cost the government \$10 million next year. By 1991, that would rise to \$100 million.

Other revenue proposals in the budget would:

—Require all state and local government employees to pay the 1.45 percent Medicare tax. Most workers, including state-local employees hired after March 31, 1986, already pay the tax as part of their Social Security payroll tax. The pre-

sident wants all hired before that date to pay as well, on grounds most of them are eligible for Medicare benefits through their spouse or by having worked previously in a non-government job. This would cost those workers \$1.6 billion in 1989 and \$2.1 billion in 1990.

—Make permanent a one-year tax break enacted in December for owners of mutual-fund shares, saving those shareholders \$400 million a year.

—One provision in the 1986 tax overhaul allows deduction of miscellaneous expenses — such as union dues — only to the extent they exceed 2 percent of adjusted gross income. The law also requires mutual funds to pass along to shareholders certain costs of managing the funds, which must be reported as income. Without the special tax break, many shareholders would have no way of deducting those costs.

## Minimal growth plan set for water projects

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration on Thursday called for continued minimal growth in the building of dams and irrigation projects, proposing only six new construction starts for fiscal 1989.

The budget plan for the year starting next Oct. 1 would leave the Bureau of Reclamation with no new starts for the second straight year and would finance only six new ventures by the Army Corps of Engineers.

That is less than half the 13 new corps starts the administration sought in its fiscal 1988 budget. Congress, where water projects are viewed as a measure of a member's job performance, raised the number to 21.

The proposed fiscal-1989 corps budget totals \$3.298 billion, the bulk of it earmarked to continue work on 157 projects under construction and to operate and

maintain more than 650 completed projects.

The total for the corps' flood control, navigation, recreation and environmental repair activities is only about \$52 million more than Congress appropriated for the current fiscal year.

Spending by the Bureau of Reclamation, an Interior Department agency operating in the West, would total \$1.07 billion in fiscal 1989, just \$13 million more than Congress approved for fiscal 1988.

The bureau's budget calls for increased spending to cure environmental problems caused by irrigation systems — a course the bureau set last year as part of a major redirection of its activities.

The redirection, which includes shifting the majority of the bureau's Washington staff to Denver, was tied to a growing shortage of Western rivers to dam.

## Proposed increases for science, space

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan's 1989 budget would raise spending on general science by 20 percent, to \$13.1 billion, and provide for machines to probe the outer space above Earth and the inner space of particles on Earth.

The budget boosts spending for science and research programs by \$2.2 billion, and includes start-up funds for the superconducting super collider in the Department of Energy and the space station in the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The spending plan also provides money to the National Science Foundation to establish 10 to 15 new basic science research centers over the next five years.

About \$400 million in the budget would go to the Energy Department for the start of construction on history's largest pure science machine, the superconducting super collider. This device, which would include an underground tunnel more than 50 miles long, would be the world's most powerful proton collider. Its goal is fundamental research into the basic nature of particles smaller than the atom.

A number of states are competing for the super collider, but the final decision on the site has not been made.

Energy's science budget authority for 1989 would total \$1.2 billion, a 49 percent increase over the 1988 level. Most of the increase would go to the collider.

At a briefing on the NASA budget, space agency Administrator James Fletcher said the president's budget follows a policy that "clearly commits the United States to space leadership as a fundamental objective" and establishes for the first time a long-range goal of putting astronauts on other planets.

NASA's total budget would increase by about 20 percent, from \$9.4 billion in 1988 to \$10.97 billion in 1989.

Almost \$1 billion of the outlay would go for start-up construction of the space station, a permanent orbital base that NASA plans to have in operation in the mid-1990s. Space agency officials had hoped for another \$500 million, but the project has been resisted by some in Congress.

The space budget also includes start-up funds for the Pathfinder Project, a research program designed to develop the basic technology needed to send astronauts to Mars sometime in the next century.

NASA also would receive more than \$1 billion additional in its space flight budget in 1989.

## Last mine sweepers leave aboard Okinawa

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — U.S. mine sweepers on Thursday ended a six-month Persian Gulf tour of duty that senior U.S. officers said proved frustrating for the pilots but fulfilled the mission.

Four RH-53D Sea Stallions, all that remained of eight sent out in August, were aboard the helicopter-assault carrier OKINAWA as it sailed down the gulf, escorted by a frigate and bound for home port in San Diego.

The 18,000-ton carrier is the first major ship to be withdrawn from the Navy's gulf-based escort squadron since the buildup of international naval forces in the strategic waterway last summer.

Its departure is part of a rotation of warships that will reduce the Middle East Force from 17 to 16 ships by early next month, U.S. officials say.

The other four helicopter mine sweepers returned to the United States in November aboard the

Okinawa's sister ship, Guadalcanal. They were brought to the gulf hastily after the Beiroutin, a Kuwaiti tanker sailing under the U.S. flag, struck a mine, believed, planted by Iran.

Although Assistant Defense Secretary Richard Armitage said in Washington that the helicopters would remain "on standby" to redeploy to the gulf if needed, that appeared unlikely.

Their role has been sharply reduced since November, when six wooden-hulled, ocean mine sweepers arrived to replace the more expensive, difficult-to-maintain aircraft.

In the last phase of the changeover, the amphibious landing ship Trenton will become "mother ship" for the Korean War-vintage mine sweepers.

It will also carry several Marine Corps helicopter gunships that could scout for mines, although that is not their primary mission.

TYRE, Lebanon (AP) — Moslem militiamen searched rain-drenched citrus groves and valley caves Thursday for Lt. Col. William R. Higgins, and their leaders threatened to go after his kidnappers unless the U.S. Marine is freed soon.

"We want Higgins back and we have no red line as far as this case is concerned," said Daoud Daoud of the moderate Shiite militia Amal, the dominant force around the ancient port of Tyre.

U.N. peacekeeping troops and about 1,500 Amal militiamen virtually sealed off a 300-square-mile area.

An anonymous telephone caller claimed responsibility for Wednesday's abduction in the name of a previously unknown group. He claimed Higgins, who commands U.N. truck observers in south Lebanon, is a CIA agent.

The abduction brings the number of foreign hostages in Lebanon to 25, including nine Americans. Most are believed held by pro-Iranian Shiite extremists, whose main Hezbollah militia has been challenging Amal's dominance in south Lebanon.

An Arabic-speaking man said in the telephone call that a Western news agency in Beirut had contacted the Islamic Revolutionary Brigades, and declared:

"William Higgins has joined the hostages. He will only come out after he is tried on grounds that he is one of the directors of the CIA in Lebanon. Higgins is now out of Beirut after he was brought out from the south."

He said a statement and photograph of Higgins would be released soon. There was no way to authenticate the claim.

Higgins, a 49-year-old native of Danville, Ky., heads the 76-member observer group attached to the U.N. Interim Force in Lebanon, the peacekeeping force in south Lebanon known as UNIFIL. Officers under his command represent 16 nations.

Daoud is military commander of Amal, the Shiite militia led by Justice Minister Nabih Berri. He said in south Lebanon: "We're capable of confronting the people who've carried out the abduction if need be, but I hope a quick, happy ending will be accomplished."

He and senior aides told reporters they would continue the capture. They still were in an area southeast of Tyre, which is 60 miles south of Beirut.

Timur Goksel, spokesman for UNIFIL, agreed. "We do not have any reason to believe that he is out of the south," Goksel said at headquarters in Naqura, just north of the Israeli border.

When Higgins was seized, he was violating U.N. rules for travel by Americans in dangerous areas, Goksel said, but the colonel "felt he couldn't abide by these restrictions."

Higgins felt that as chief, he should be out with his men and know what they are doing.

American members of U.N. forces are restricted to the headquarters area and are supposed to travel in Lebanon only with a U.N. military escort, he said.

An Amal spokesman, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said: "Despite heavy rain, the search has been completed in areas north and east of Tyre. We are focusing now on Wadi Jilo southeast of Tyre."

Wadi Jilo, six miles southeast of Tyre, is a stronghold of the Iranian-backed Hezbollah, or Party of God.

Hezbollah is believed to be an umbrella for factions holding most of the captive foreigners. The hostage held longest is Terry A. Anderson, 40, chief Middle-East correspondent of The Associated Press, abducted March 16, 1985.

Higgins' father died Wednesday in Louisville, Ky., of congestive heart failure. The family learned of the abduction while trying to notify the Marine officer that William F. Higgins was near death.

Daoud said his aides met at Leb-

anese army barracks in Tyre, with UNIFIL officers led by Lt. Col. Tor Planting of Finland to coordinate the search effort.

"We hope the kidnappers will have no chance of slipping out with their captive," the Amal spokesman said.

Care manned by plainclothes Amal security men blocked roads along the Litani River from the Mediterranean coast to the slopes of Mount Hermon about 25 miles inland.

Uniformed militiamen with sub-machine guns and rocket-propelled grenade of Tyre to the kidnap scene three miles south of the city, the spokesman said.

"Our men are searching villages in an 800-square-kilometer (300-square-mile) area north, east and south of Tyre," he said. "U.N. troops block the southern exits of the region."

Berri has issued orders that "no one sleeps until we get the man (Higgins) back," the spokesman said, adding that Amal is "anxious to protect and safeguard UNIFIL, regardless of the nationality of the peacekeepers. Amal views Higgins' abduction as a deliberate challenge."

UNIFIL operates in predominantly Shiite areas frequently caught in the crossfire of Israel's battles with Palestinian guerrillas and Shiite extremists loyal to Iran.

Security sources said French U.N. officers had interviewed a Lebanese bus driver who claimed he saw the abduction from a few yards away.

Higgins was the third U.N. official kidnapped in south Lebanon in three weeks.

## Israelis impose new restrictions to end violence

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel imposed tough rules on the occupied territories Thursday intended to trip up Palestinians economically unless they stop strikes, withholding of taxes and other acts of civil disobedience.

Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir said he would not trade concessions for an end to 10 weeks of riots in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip. "Those who incite and resort to violence should not come away with any reward," he said.

An economic boycott of Israel has become a growing accompaniment to the violence in the occupied lands.

Israel's new restrictions are designed to hinder the flow of PLO funds into the territories, and re-

quiring merchants to prove they have paid taxes could curtail the daily trade in produce and other goods across the Albany Bridge between the West Bank and Jordan.

Arrests were reported Thursday but no casualties in confrontations between soldiers and protesters in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip, where U.N. officials say 55 Arabs have been killed in the violence that began Dec. 8.

News photographers saw a Jewish settler fire shots into the air at the Dheisheh refugee camp to disperse stone-throwing young Palestinians, and protests were reported in Arab neighborhoods of Jerusalem.

Soldiers arrested 21 Arabs suspected of inciting and participating in riots in Burka, a West Bank village, Israeli radio said. The military confirmed arrests were made, but said disclosing the number would violate policy.

Jerusalem police plan an operation involving 1,500 officers, some brought in from West Bank towns, who will perform round-the-clock guard duty in Arab neighborhoods starting Sunday, the radio said.

It said police also would arrest suspected ringleaders in an effort to curb disturbances that are expected

later this month when Secretary of State George P. Shultz visits Israel. City spokesman Rafi Devara confirmed the report.

Increasing numbers of the 1.5 million Palestinians in the West Bank and Gaza have adopted passive resistance to oppose Israeli occupation, which began when the territories were captured from Jordan and Egypt in the 1967 Middle East war.

Leaflets and radio broadcasts urge them not to pay taxes to the Jewish state, work for Israelis or buy Israeli-made goods.

Only about 100,000 Palestinian who worked in Israel before Dec. 8 now do so. Only a small percentage of Palestinians have paid taxes so far this year, according to the Arab-run Palestine Press Service and such Israeli sources as the army's information center.

Militants put pressure on Palestinians to keep up the boycott. A teenager stabbed a fellow Arab in the face Thursday, apparently because he drove Palestinians to work in Israel, Israeli radio said.

"If the trend continues and takes root, it will become a serious problem," said a senior official in the military government that administers the territories.

He said the new financial restrictions require Palestinians to prove they have paid their taxes before they can travel abroad or import export goods, and also must register when they bring \$1,000 or more into the country. The previous limit was \$5,000.

The limitation on money is intended to make it difficult for the Palestine Liberation Organization to support Arabs who stay away from their jobs.

Restrictions on imports and exports could have a serious effect on the daily trade with Jordan on which Palestinians in the West Bank are heavily dependent.

"We hope this, combined with other measures, will help quell the disturbances," said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

## Pakistan may face civil war after withdrawal

## Russia's ruling Politburo drops Yeltsin

MOSCOW (AP) — Communist Party leaders Thursday dropped Boris N. Yeltsin, the outspoken former Moscow party boss, from the ruling Politburo and promoted officials charged with reforming economic planning and party personnel.

In a wide-ranging address to about 300 members of the policy-making Central Committee, party leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev said the Soviet Union faces a "most serious" economic problem and he called for "free competition of minds" under his policy of greater openness.

Gorbachev also said the Central Committee should devote a future session to the problems of the more than 100 nationalities that populate the Soviet Union. Ethnic groups in the Baltic states and elsewhere have been agitating in recent months for greater autonomy or outright independence.

Outspoken protégé ousted

The official Tass news agency announced the leadership changes at the end of a two-day meeting of the Central Committee, which had been called to approve broad reforms in education.

The Central Committee "freed" about 200 nationalities from their duties as a candidate member of the Politburo, Tass said.

Yeltsin had been an outspoken supporter of Gorbachev's policy of greater openness but it led to his ouster when his criticism apparently went further than Gorbachev was willing to allow.

On Nov. 11, Gorbachev ousted Yeltsin as Moscow party leader after the strapping 57-year-old had criticized the slow pace of reform and the leadership style of the party. Yeltsin had made his critical speech at the last meeting of the Central Committee on Oct. 21 and had offered to quit.

Purported copies of his speech that were circulating in Moscow and printed in some Western newspapers said he had even criticized the style of Gorbachev's wife, Raisa.

After his ouster as Moscow party leader, Yeltsin was transferred to first deputy director of the State

Also named a non-voting member of the Politburo was Yuri D. Maslyukov, 50, who was chosen Feb. 6 as chairman of the State Planning Committee.

Maslyukov replaced Nikolai V. Talyzin, who had been criticized by Gorbachev. Talyzin was shunted to chairmanship of a little-known government commission, but retained his candidate status on the Politburo.

Maslyukov, a defense industry expert, was first deputy chairman of the Planning Committee in 1982-86.

Gorbachev has called on the planning committee and other Moscow-based government organs to leave day-to-day economic management to local officials and instead concern themselves with long-range planning.

Oleg P. Baklanov, 56, minister of general machine building, was chosen to become a secretary of the Central Committee.

The Soviet leader said a drop in world commodity prices and the loss of income from alcohol sales due to his campaign against drunkenness had hurt the Soviet economy. The Soviet Union depends on oil and natural gas for a substantial percentage of its export income.

"Now that the situation in the world market has changed and the prices of fuel and energy resources have declined, that we are forced to reduce the production and sale of wines and vodka in the name of preserving the population's general health the country's economy is confronted with a most serious financial problem," Gorbachev said.

He said top priority is improving food, housing and consumer goods, and said his policies have made progress in those areas.

Gorbachev rejected claims that his reforms are pulling the Soviet Union away from socialism. At the same time, he defended his policy of "glasnost" or greater openness, and criticized the mistakes of former leaders Josef V. Stalin, Nikita S. Khrushchev and Leonid I. Brezhnev.

Gorbachev reiterated Soviet criti-

cism of U.S. conservatives and some European leaders for urging the Western Alliance to upgrade its weapons systems to make up for U.S. missiles that will be withdrawn from Europe.

Addressing the issue of Afghanistan, Gorbachev said the war there long had a "direct and deep impact on the feelings of Soviet people." He said he had been seeking a way out of Afghanistan since he took power almost three years ago.

Gorbachev said Feb. 9 the estimated 115,000 Soviet soldiers could be pulled out in a 10-month period beginning May 15 if U.S.-sponsored talks can agree.

## Demjanjuk's family shouts at prosecutor

JERUSALEM (AP) — "You're a liar!" John Demjanjuk's wife screamed at a prosecutor Thursday as the year-long Nazi war crimes trial of the retired Ohio auto worker ended.

"Shame on you! Shame on you! You have no heart!" Vera Demjanjuk shouted.

Mrs. Demjanjuk, 63, her daughter, Irene Nishnik, and son, John Jr., mounted the stage of the converted movie theater where the trial was held to confront prosecutors.

Security guards pushed the sobbing women out of the courtroom. The sounds of a scuffle could be heard followed by an angry expletive from Demjanjuk's son.

Demjanjuk, 67, appeared startled but did not otherwise react. The Ukrainian-born defendant is accused of being "Ivan the Terrible," a brutal guard who operated gas chambers that killed 850,000 Jews at the Treblinka death camp in Nazi-occupied Poland.

Demjanjuk insists he is an innocent victim of a mistaken identity. He was stripped of his U.S. citizenship in 1981 and later extradited to Israel to stand trial for war crimes.

Holocaust survivor Mordechai Fuchs also interrupted the session, tearfully waving an aging photograph of his parents and three brothers and sister who were killed at Treblinka.

"I was among the dead, and I am here in court today," the (defense) lawyers are liars," sobbed Fuchs, 63, who said he escaped death by jumping from the train transporting his family to Treblinka.

The three-judge panel is expected to issue its verdict in April. The proceeding, which began Feb. 16, 1987, was the first war crimes trial in Israel since Nazi mastermind Adolf Eichmann was convicted and hanged in 1962.

The lengthy proceedings were broadcast live on television and radio. Initially, spectators waited hours in line for seats, but interest waned and the final session was sparsely attended.

The Demjanjuk family's emotional outburst came after defense attorney John Gid ended his final arguments, and prosecutor Michael Shaked rose to respond to accusations that the prosecution withheld documents that could exonerate Demjanjuk.

## Dissidents say Lithuanians beaten

MOSCOW (AP) — Dissidents reported Thursday that police and soldiers beat hundreds of Lithuanians with rubber sticks as they gathered to mark the anniversary of their republic's brief independence. A Soviet spokesman denied the reports.

The clash occurred Tuesday in Vilnius after foreign correspondents had left the Lithuanian capital, the dissidents said. The Soviet Foreign Ministry took Moscow-based reporters to Vilnius on Sunday on an organized trip, but they returned Tuesday.

There was no way to verify the reports of the Moscow-based dissidents, because telephone lines of Lithuanian activists have been cut. In trying to telephone the activists, The Associated Press received recordings advising callers to summon operators.

Vadim Perfiljev, a Soviet Foreign Ministry spokesman, was asked whether the incidents in Lithuania occurred.

"Discussing when something which didn't take place, took place, it's very difficult," Perfiljev said at a regular briefing. "Around certain events in Lithuania and other Baltic republics there are a lot of provocations. The more they are far away from those republics, the more they are in evidence."

The Moscow-based dissidents Alexander Ogorodnikov and Alexander Podrabinek said they received their information from Nijole Sadunaite, a Roman Catholic activist who lives in Vilnius.

About 2,000 people gathered in St. Anne's Church and another 2,000 in St. Nicholas Church in the evening on Tuesday, the 70th anniversary of Lithuania's declaration

of independence on Feb. 16, 1918, according to Ogorodnikov and Podrabinek.

Lithuania and its neighboring Baltic republics of Latvia and Estonia were independent until they were absorbed into the Soviet Union in 1940. That action never has been recognized by the United States.

The dissidents said that after the services, worshippers tried to march to a square beside the city's former Roman Catholic cathedral, which is now an art gallery.

Worshippers intended to put flowers and wreaths on monuments to Lithuanian nationalist figures, but police and soldiers beat many of them with rubber sticks as they walked, according to Ogorodnikov and Podrabinek. Police detained hundreds of the demonstrators, including some who were driven outside the city and left in remote areas, they said.

In one hospital, 160 people were taken for injuries suffered in the beatings, Podrabinek said.

Before foreign reporters left Vilnius, they saw police and civilian officers patrolling near churches, a historic cemetery and in the center of Vilnius. The reporters were followed in cars, and on foot as they visited Lithuanian activists and traveled in Vilnius.

They did not see any nationalist protests, but they were allowed to cover an officially sponsored demonstration Monday called to protest alleged U.S. interference in Baltic affairs.

## Soviets report satellites fail to reach orbit

MOSCOW (AP) — Three Soviet satellites designed to test space navigation equipment failed to reach proper orbit and burned up in the atmosphere, Tass said Thursday.

Tass said Cosmos 1917, 1918 and 1919 were launched Wednesday, but on Thursday "entered dense layers of the atmosphere and ceased their existence."

The booster rocket placed the apparatus unit holding the satellites on an interim orbit, but the system then malfunctioned and the satellites fell from orbit, Tass said.

In August, Tass announced that a 10-ton satellite had failed to reach orbit. The report apparently was the first time Soviets announced beforehand that their satellites was dropping from orbit.

That satellite fell into the ocean without causing any damage or injuries.

## Expansion of prenatal care for poor wins House support

**BOISE** — A plea to expand medical care for poor pregnant women received wide support in the Idaho House Thursday.

"The ultimate goal is to have low-income families have healthy babies," said the bill's co-sponsor, Rep. Deanna Vickers, D-Lewiston.

"In short, by providing this health care, we are raising the chances of delivering healthy babies."

Rep. Brent Brocksome, R-Boise, the other co-sponsor, estimated the bill would cost \$1.6 million in state money, which would be matched by \$3.3 million in federal money. The money is expected to help 1,200

poor women receive prenatal medical care.

The measure passed 67-11 in the House and will now be sent to the Senate.

Twin Falls pediatrician Paul Miles has worked through the Idaho State Perinatal Project, which he founded, to educate officials statewide to the advantages of prenatal care.

In 1986, Idaho's infant mortality rate hit an all-time high and surpassed the national rate for the first time. Of babies born that year, 186 died in their first year of life for causes often linked to a lack of prenatal care.

One of Miles' primary recommendations was to expand Medicaid so

pregnant women could receive necessary prenatal care regardless of their ability to afford it. He noted that every dollar spent on prenatal care reduces the need for three or four dollars spent birth on complications from low birthweight and prematurity.

State leaders from both parties took notice.

"Dr. Paul Miles and the local hospital (Magic Valley Regional Medical Center) really deserve the credit for bringing this issue forward," Brocksome said.

Brocksome co-chaired an interim committee with Sen. Ann Rydalen, R-Idaho Falls, and recommended extending Medicaid for prenatal care to pregnant women whose families

earn 75 percent of poverty level.

Gov. Cecil Andrus addressed prenatal care in his State of the State message and his recommendation for accepting women at 67 percent of poverty level in the figure incorporated into the bill.

Brocksome explained that eligibility would be calculated from 67 percent of the federal poverty level, which stands at \$459 in monthly income for a single person or \$617 for two people and so on.

"If it is successful, we might want to come back and fund 100 percent of the poverty level," Vickers said.

But some legislators criticized the bill for taking away local control from county commissioners, who otherwise rule on qualifications for indigency.

"Anyone can be found indigent, it seems to me," said JoAn Wood, R-Rigby.

"I feel a bit frustrated that we're asking taxpayers to pay the bill for others who can't afford it," she added, noting that her children postponed having children until they saved for medical care. "I have a problem with how you qualify for being poor according to this bill."

"It's always as if we have to take care of them from the womb to the tomb and how long can we do that," said Rep. Ruby Stone, R-Boise. "We've got to stop paying for everything."

Wood Stone were among 11 representatives opposing the bill.

But Brocksome said the bill eases

the local burden on county taxes by shifting payment to state general fund, where every dollar is matched by \$2.67 in federal money.

"Counties will still be required to pick up the cost of these that do not meet the increased eligibility (through indigent budgets)," Brocksome added.

"I share your frustration," said Rep. Christopher Hooper, R-Boise, who is chairman of the House health and welfare committee. "But we're already paying for these services (through indigent medical bills) after the child is born. If we're going to pay for it, let's at least get a healthy baby out of it."

He said Rydalen will likely carry the bill as it moves to the Senate.

## Hagerman horse nears fossil fame

"We have a lot of fossils in Benewah County, and I thought we ought to have information about them," McCann said with a smile on her face after the vote. "In fairness, I think we should consider our fossils well."

Rep. Ralph Peters, R-Jerome, was delighted with the 76-1 vote.

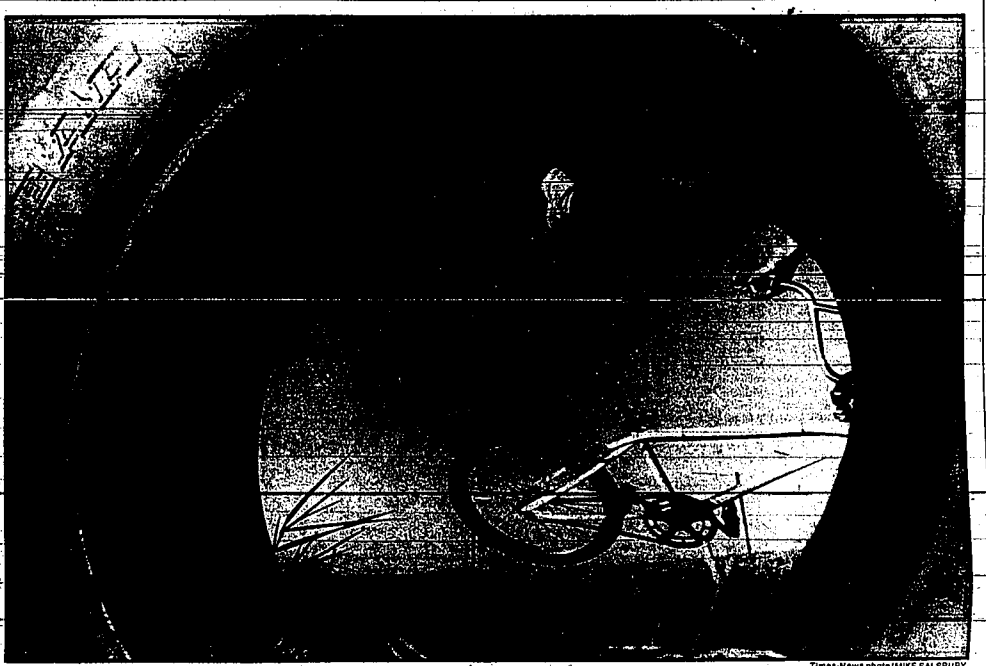
Peters said he expected the bill to gallop through the Senate.

## Grant gets seniors out in full force

**RUPERT** — Minidoka County senior citizens showed up in force before the Rupert City Council this week to support an application for a community development block grant, and gave their support to sewer system improvements while they were there.

The \$20,186 grant would be used to build an addition to the senior citizens' center for the storage of fruits and vegetables for their hot lunch and meals-on-wheels programs.

Whitton said it was one of the best turnouts of people in the community that he has seen in a long time. He thanked the seniors for "coming out to support something you believe in."

## Muldoon residents voice opposition to park

**BELLEUE** — Adamant Muldoon residents clung to their subdivision's covenants, controls and restrictions, rejecting the proposed baseball/sooccer field project at a public meeting held in the Bellevue Elementary School recently.

Bellevue Recreation League spokesman John Umek claims that the park project complies with the Muldoon subdivision covenants, which are in effect until the year 2008.

"Still some residents insist that a neighboring park was not what they had in mind when they bought into the subdivision."

"Our covenants define the intent to have a single family, low density, five-acre lots here," said Muldoon resident Larry Henderson.

Of the 19 Muldoon lots, only one is exempt from the covenants. Exemption is only granted with unanimous lot owner approval. As one individual owns two lots within the subdivision, the recreation district seeks 17 lot owner approvals.

"I was under the impression that we had a democratic, majority rule here, but I see that one person can dictate what you can and can't do," said Umek.

Bellevue City Council supported the recreation league's intentions to secure Muldoon lot No. 19 when it came up for sale last summer.

Umek explained that he's been searching for a suitable lot for over two years.

Glenda Warner of Boise "currently owns" the lot, though the non-profit Recreation League has deposited approximately \$1,300 on the property and has leveled, seeded and brought water service out to the property.

Though Bellevue City Council said that they have \$40,000 in savings which they would dedicate to this project, property must be annexed into the city before the city can buy it, since Bellevue is a chartered city.

As a chartered city, Bellevue can only annex properties which border existing city boundaries.

Since Umek believed that the proposed baseball/sooccer field complied with Muldoon's covenants, controls and restrictions, and that the covenants would expire upon lot No. 19's annexation into the city, originally, he did not seek Muldoon lot owners' approval.

The recent public meeting was designed to answer any Muldoon residents' questions. Scott Seifres of the Recreation League proposed that a board of Muldoon property owners could control the park by designating its restrictions.

Still, some Muldoon property owners refused to con-

sider any park. Donna Johnston, who lives directly across the street from the proposed park, cited potential noise, traffic, trash, weeds and trauma to her horse as her reasons for objection: "If you could give me absolutes, then fine. But I keep hearing maybe, probably, mostly," she said.

Other Muldoon dwellers supported the planned park wholeheartedly. "We live in Muldoon and don't see how this use of one lot would threaten any other lot," said John Gosh. He said, "I don't understand the opposition. Everywhere else it would be a benefit to live next to property maintained as a park."

The recently resigned county planning and zoning director, Ed Nighbor, encouraged the Recreation League to research local experience with present parks and discern their uses and abuses. He also suggested a meeting exclusively for Muldoon property owners where they could openly express their opinions.

Umek said, "It looks like that if one out of 17 owners is against it, we're down the tubes."

Ex-councilmember Teresa Bergin, who presided over the public meeting, concluded it, saying, "Bellevue has a dire need for a park like this — there are more and more kids here who can't just wait five years to play ball."

## Hearing dates firm despite conflict

## Bellevue treatment site irks area owners

**BELLEUE** — Property owners south of Bellevue have told the City Council that they don't want a proposed wastewater treatment facility built in their neighborhood.

At the third public hearing on the proposed project, approximately two-thirds of the 60 people in attendance were county residents concerned over sites, even though the meeting had been called to discuss funding and acceptable service rates.

The three proposed site locations for the proposed 12-acre lagoon are within a 30-acre area south of Bellevue along Gunnel Road.

"We sit on property included in (parcels A, B and C) but we don't have a vote in Bellevue," complained Gary Gutches.

Rance Bara of Ellsworth Engineering addressed county residents concerned over property devaluation.

Bara said that aerating the lagoons takes away the odor of stagnant lagoons, "except when nature turns the lagoon over, which happens twice a year."

Bara also said that landscaping and fencing would screen the facility.

But Judy Gutches countered, "You won't tell us that the property value will drop, but have you ever seen it go up?" In response, Bara cited a case where the irrigation water did enhance surrounding property values.

# 'Hate is our law, revenge is our duty,' defendant says

PORT SMITH, Ark. (AP) — A federal court jury trying 74 white supremacists saw a videotape Thursday in which a defendant said, "Hate is our law, revenge is our duty."

The statement by Richard G. Butler, 69, of Hayden Lake, Idaho, was made along with the statement that so long as "the alien is in the land" and occupies "the seat of power" the hate-revenge scenario is in order.

The videotape, which Butler knew was being made, was presented by the government to support its charge that Butler and nine other defendants conspired to overthrow the government by force, which has a maximum penalty of 20 years in prison and a \$20,000 fine.

Five defendants are charged with plotting to murder a federal judge and an FBI agent, which has a maximum penalty of life imprisonment. Two are charged with transporting stolen money, which has a maximum penalty of 10 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

The statement was taped by Peter Lake of Los Angeles, a writer and television producer, when Lake visited Butler's Aryan Nations compound at Hayden Lake in 1983 and when Butler participated in a cross-burn at Los Angeles in scarlet Ku Klux Klan regalia.

One of the filmed incidents was the initiation of two men as Aryans

warriors by Butler. They took an oath, given by Butler, "to obey all lawful orders of your superiors."

Lake said he viewed himself as an investigative reporter, that he went to Hayden Lake under an assumed name, and that he was investigating the group to make a report for a Los Angeles TV station and a magazine, "The Rebel."

Under cross-examination, he said that he carried three .45-caliber pistols on an airliner in his luggage on the trip, that he lied to Butler and took the initiation as an Aryan Warrior "insincerely," that no one ever told him that as a warrior he would have to kill or bomb or try to overthrow the government by violence, and that his companion, a convicted felon, on the trip also was armed.

Lake also testified that he overheard, and tape-recorded secretly, a conversation in which another defendant, David Lane, attempted to locate an important telephone facility he wanted to blow up. Lane cross-examined Lake on this point, learned that Lake did not contact any law enforcement agency about the purported plot to blow it up, and asked why Lane didn't contact anyone. "I didn't believe you," Lane answered. "When you told me about an explanation of why Lake didn't believe him, Lake said, 'Because you seemed like a

crackpot, Mr. Lane."

Lake, though, he began to think the Aryan group was serious; Lake said.

One defendant, Ardie McBrearty, made his own opening statement, telling the jury that the government's case was "a little truth here, a little truth there, and a whole lot of imagination in between." The government "could make the poem 'Mary Had A Little Lamb' sound sinister," he said.

McBrearty painted himself as a tax protester who has been under Internal Revenue Service surveillance for years because of his anti-tax activities.

Lavoy N.C. Deddy LaRene of Detroit said his client, the Rev. Robert Miles of Cohasset, Mich., "believes passionately and speaks passionately" about his beliefs and that his beliefs include the belief that the races should be separate.

"He speaks of being at war with the government," LaRene said, but in any position for a cause "sometimes rhetoric — heart, emotion — overcomes caution" and some exaggeration enters in.

"Years later, we might wish we had guarded our tongues," he said, identifying Miles as "a cheerleader for the government."

LaRene testified that he persuaded Miles to coach telling his players to go after the opponents, "cripple them, go in there and kill them."

# Proposal to waive tuition for dozen future teachers revived by panel

BOISE (AP) — A proposal to waive college tuition for a dozen Idaho students a year who promise to become teachers was killed and then revived by a House panel.

Rep. Jennie Givens, D-Coeur d'Alene, told the House Education Committee Wednesday her bill would help keep "the best and brightest" Idaho students at home by offering free tuition and fees to students at the state's college and universities.

Givens said 40 percent of Idaho's top high school seniors leave the state for college.

The bill's supporters include deans at the University of Idaho and Lewis-Clark State College; the Associated Students of the U of I; Boise State and Idaho State universities; the Idaho Education Association; and Teachers in Space Barbara Morgan of McCall.

The bill would waive fees for three entering students each year at BSU, ISU, the U of I and LGSC.

To qualify, students must be at the top of their high school classes, get satisfactory grades and agree to teach school in Idaho for at least two years after graduation.

But the measure was opposed by Richard D. Sperring, executive director of the Board of Education, because no funding would be provided to make up for lost fees.

Committee members complained the bill would not benefit students at junior or private colleges, and said the bill would be longer, perhaps four years.

The committee first voted 10 to 8 to kill the bill, but then agreed to send it to a subcommittee, chaired by Rep. Tom Giovannelli, D-Coeur d'Alene.

Giovannelli said he thought the subcommittee could amend the bill to get the full committee's support, "if it just was not done to be held in committee and die," he said.

Givens said the measure is important. "We need to get our absolutely best and brightest in the classroom teaching our kids."

IEA President Peggy Park said passage of the bill would improve morale for students and teachers. "Society is sending messages that teachers are not a valued profession," Park said.

Dale Gentry, dean of the College of Education at the U of I, said scholarships dedicated to aspiring teachers in Moscow are just \$19,600 a year. The bill "would create interest in education," Gentry said.

The fee waivers would cost the state about \$50,000 a year.

In a letter on NASA stationery, Morgan called the bill "one of the best and most cost-efficient ways to improve education in Idaho and keep talented teachers in the state."

Sperring, however, said the measure "would tend to open the door to problems in the future in finding solutions" without appropriate funding.

## CRP sign up deadline's today

TWIN FALLS — Installing filter strips on cropland next to streams and other bodies of water may qualify farmers for the USDA's Conservation Reserve Program, and at the same time provide many ecological benefits, according to officials with the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service.

Farmers wishing to enter cropland into the program should register today, the deadline for the present sign up.

The USDA recently announced that filter strips are eligible for CRP even if they are not installed on highly erodible land. They must remove additional sediment that would normally reach a stream of body of water.

Any farmer who plans to establish filter strips of grass or grass and trees — 33 to 98 feet wide adjacent to a stream — filled a body of water is eligible for CRP. In return, USDA makes annual payments and shares the cost of establishing grass or trees on the land.

"By installing filter strips, a farmer can keep the water he or she uses clean and at the same time benefit wildlife and soil conservation," said the agency. Filter strips provide both food and cover for many different kinds of wildlife. Furthermore, an improvement in water quality provides more food and safer spawning areas for fish.

It also said that the changes in the CRP eligibility requirements will benefit the cropland that drains to the filter strips.

"Filter strips reduce erosion in these areas by providing a safe place for water to leave the field," he said. "This prevents the formation of gullies and the substantial loss of soil."

A number of farmers wishing to install filter strips are expected to enter into the program. The response we've received from farmers so far has been very positive," Alt said.

In Idaho, about 631,600 acres of land have been contracted in CRP so far, and nationally, some 23 million acres. The national program goal is to retire 40 to 45 million acres of land by the end of 1990.

CRP is administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, with assistance from other USDA agencies including SCS and the Forest Service.

able for outside funding, the city of Bellevue would be responsible for the \$10 million. The homeowner's cost would be approximately \$23 per month for a 20-year period. In addition, each homeowner would have a hook-up fee.

Though the citizens present expressed interest in connecting to Halley's Wastewater facility, Mayor Mike Ivey dismissed that alternative. He said, "We discussed this with Halley, and we weren't talking about them coming down the valley when they ran out of room."

Wayne Douthit, formerly with Bellevue's Planning and Zoning Commission, questioned the urgency of the project.

"I wonder whether we're rushing it — after all, we have a system

that's working," he said. The city currently has no sewage-treatment system, relying on private septic tanks.

Douthit also questioned whether Bellevue city dwellers want the population increases that the sewer project is designed to handle.

Councilman Ron Reese said, "The crunch already exists." He cited studies which revealed higher than average nitrate levels in Bellevue's 56,117 parts per million.

City Administrator Milton Walsh said that he will proceed to file a pre-application for the CDBG, thus fulfilling its public hearing requirement. The motion to file this pre-application received a unanimous vote at the February Bellevue City Council meeting with the following opening.

By a raised-hand vote, the group also unanimously showed support of the city's efforts to secure a wastewater treatment plant grant, and awarded Mike Layey, an engineer with CH2M Hill, recounted the city's long-term problems with its wastewater system. He said more than \$8 million was spent between 1977 and 1981 trying to solve its problems.

"The city has done everything that had to be done, everything they could do, in the face of total disaster to alleviate this problem," Layey said.

Layey said the system should have served the city for 20 years, but began to break down shortly after it was installed. A number of factors entered into the problem, including the earthquake several years ago.

Whitton said Environmental Protection Agency has given an absolute maximum but no more grant. A wastewater can be run into the Snake River after July 1.

"It's been a case of great grief," Whitton said. "In times of peak flow we were unable to get it into the lagoons." Whitton was quick to point out that the city only dumped into the river intermittently, and that raw untreated sewage was never dumped.

A master plan was drawn up recently to comply with EPA regulations, but Layey said it is "already out of date."

Whitton said in trying to follow government guidelines, they originally felt the best way to solve the problem was to go in and tear out the lines. "We know now, however, that the best and most economical way is to add additional pumping capacity to the system," he said.

The lines were too small to add larger pumps. "We'd just blow out the line by making the pumps bigger," Whitton said. The use of additional pumps stationed along the sewer routes would pick up the effluent and move it along without damaging the system.

Layey and Public Works Director Eric Peterson spent Tuesday in Boise discussing the problem with various agencies, "trying to get in tune with all the regulatory agencies," Layey said. "We've come back with good news, and have come up with a lot broader help from the agencies who have funds available."

According to Layey, the EPA would participate in funding these items made too small originally which will be necessary to increase capacity of the system. The administration will put Rupert on a grant track program to free money up in either fiscal 1988 or 1989.

Whitton said the city is proud to be a part of the program you've put together down there at the center," he said.

Dow Jones' average of 30 blue chips dropped 14.58 to 1,886.41 after closing slightly above 2,000 in the week's first two sessions.

Industry holds high operating level

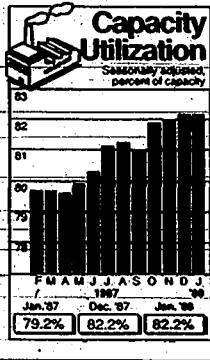
WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. industry operated at 82.2 percent of capacity in January, matching the December level as the highest operating rate in almost eight years, the government said Thursday.

The administration, which today released its latest economic forecast as part of its 1988 budget, is counting on a resurgent manufacturing sector to keep the country out of a recession during this presidential election year.

Many private economists, however, believe that growth will slow considerably, especially during the early part of 1988, as businesses cut back on orders in an effort to work down high levels of unsold goods.

Steel and other makers of primary metals saw their operating rates drop to 69.6 percent of capacity last month, down from 91.2 percent in December.

For all of manufacturing, the operating rate was unchanged at 82.4 percent of capacity. Producers of durable goods, such as steel and autos, saw operating rates decline to an average of 79.9 percent of capacity, 0.1 percentage point below the December level.

DETROIT (AP) — Ford Motor Co. earnings rose to \$912 million in the fourth quarter and hit \$4.6 billion for 1987, both records, as Ford outearned General Motors Corp. for the second consecutive year, the company announced Thursday.

Ford will release profit-sharing details Friday, Ford spokesman Tom Ezub said checks will be up substantially from the average \$2,100 payout workers received for 1986.

## Boise St. ambushed by lowly Weber St.

OGDEN, Utah — Boise State came off town Thursday night renowned for its belt-buckle defense and the ability to shoot free throws in the clutch.

But 40 minutes after the opening tipoff the Broncos discovered lowly Weber State had turned the tables on the Big Sky Conference frontrunners and defeated them 60-56 before a 3,578 fans in the Dean Events Center.

The loss was just the third in Big Sky Conference play, and Boise State stayed firmly in the driver's seat in the league standings because of second Idaho's loss at Nevada-Reno Thursday.

For 19 of their previous games, the Broncos applied constant pressure on the opponents, wearing them down and defeating them. By crunch time, Boise players are converting free throws as they attempt to run out the clock.

But this time the script was switched to the Wildcats' liking.

These same Wildcats, who won for only the fourth time in Big Sky play and the sixth time overall Thursday, did the things that have helped Boise to a 19-4 record.

"We just didn't shoot the ball well in either half and in the second half, couldn't hit a free throw to save ourselves," said BSU Coach Bobby Dye. "It was tough to win when you can't hit your shots."

The Broncos had one of their weakest outings from both the field and free throw line. They shot 48 percent in the first half and 42 percent in the second. Wilson Foster was the lone Bronco to convert a free throw in eight team attempts.

"Weber State did a pretty good job from the line, and what did we do? One of eight?" asked Dye. "The thing was our shot selections wasn't bad, but that's what happens when the ball isn't going down for you."

While the Broncos couldn't seem to buy a basket, the Wildcats were shooting slightly better than 49 percent from the field and converting 16 of 27 free throw attempts. The chief enemy for Boise was Rice Washington, who was a near-perfect 10 of 11 from the field in scoring a game-high 24 points. When the BSU defense collapsed to stop him, Tim Gibbs (4.4 points) and Calico Glenn (8 points) in the second. See BSU on Page C3

# A very bad day for the USA

## Jansen falls again in bid for a medal

CALGARY, Alberta — Dan Jansen fell again in his last chance to win a medal in his sister's memory, and with America's medal chances failing too. Brian Boitano brought new hope of gold Thursday night at the Winter Olympics.

Jansen fell in the 1,000-meter speed-skating race, four days after his first fall and the death of his sister, Jane, to whom he had dedicated these Olympics.

"It was very disappointing," Jansen said. "But what happened in the past week has just put things in an absolutely different perspective. I don't feel as bad as I could."

Boitano overtook Soviet Alexander Fadeev, the leader after compulsory figures, with his short program Thursday night. He finished the program, looked up and mouthed the words "Thank you, God," then bowed to the crowd.

"With all the pressure going on out there, I can't be happier," said Boitano, 1986 world champion from Sunnyvale, Calif. "I think this is one of my all-time best, and I'm very proud of it."

Through six days of the Olympics, America has just one medal, a bronze in pairs figure skating. Boitano can add to that Saturday night in the men's freestyle, and it could well be gold.

After the short program, Boitano was first, followed by world champion Brian Orser of Canada, who actually won the short program. Fadeev blew the lead when he bobbed a combination triple axel-double loop jump.

Fadeev, 1985 world champion, is considered a weaker freestyle skater than either Boitano or Orser, although the Soviet has been working on a quadruple jump he may try in the long program. No skater has ever landed a quadruple jump in competition.

It was a day of disappointment for other American Olympians. There was a downhill skier with a broken leg, Pam Fletcher. There was a luger, Bonny Warner, without a medal even though she had America's best finish ever in an Olympics. And there was a brave, persistent hockey team that could

not overcome the Soviets. And then there was Jansen. "I couldn't believe it," he said. "I think I was on a gold-medal pace. What happened — it's hard to say why. For some reason it did happen."

Jansen, 22, the world sprint champion from West Allis, Wis., appeared to have the race in hand, passing each intermediate timing point quicker than any of the previous skaters in the 1,000 meters, including the winner, Nikolai Gultsev. He could have won. "That's something we'll never know," said Jansen's brother, Mike. Then, on the backstretch of the

final lap, he tipped over on the outside edge of his right skate and fell. He sat on the ice and rocked back and forth with his face buried in his hands. Occasionally, he would stare skyward in disbelief, looking for answers. There were none.

"I felt really good through the whole thing," Jansen said. "I came out of that turn at 600 meters and felt very, very strong in the backstretch. I felt like I was accelerating, and I put my right skate down, and it caught the outer edge. I couldn't roll back over, and I was down."

Nick Tometz finally helped Jensen off the ice, although he was unhurt physically. The pain was mental and it was excruciating. It was his parent in his face.

After he left the ice, he embraced his fiancée, Canadian speed skater Natalie Grenier, and cried in her arms.

He fell, too, last Sunday, just hours after his 27-year-old sister Jane, died of leukemia. That time he fell on the first turn of the 500 meters, one of his best events. He chose to stay for the 1,000 meters rather than return home, but now he goes home with a medal.

"I've had so much support all week, from friends, family and people I don't know around the world, in the States and in Canada," Jensen said. "It's just really helped a lot." A lot of them said how proud they were of me — to go out there and try my best. It really lifted my spirits."


Finishing behind Guliaev of the Soviet Union, Jensen was Jens-Uwe Mueller of East Germany and Soviet Igor Zhelezovskiy.

# Top A-2 seed, SCIC title at stake this weekend

**BUHL**— This business of deciding which is the best Class A-2 high school boys' basketball team in the Magic Valley, and the corollary question as to which will be the champion of the South-Central Idaho Conference, is getting complicated.

As it stands, top-ranked Jerome (18-4) and second-ranked Wood River (14-4) both have 2-1 records in the battle for the top seed in the three-team district postseason tournament, pending their regular-season ending contests at Buhl (Wood River Tuesday) and Jerome (next Tuesday). Should Buhl win those two games, there would be a three-way tie.

Enter the SCIC, or more specifically the Burley Bobcats, who although they represent a Class III school that competes in Region III, are also members of the SCIC. The first tiebreaker among the three District 4 A-2 schools is comparative SCIC records.

Burley has played 19 games this season and won four of them; all four were SCIC games, which means that if the Bobcats beat Wood River in Halley Saturday night, the 5-16 Cats will be the league champion.

Ironically, that could be good news for Wood River — which beat the Bobcats by 10 points in Burley last month — and very bad news for Jerome and Buhl, which have both lost to the Bobcats twice.

Confused?

"Basically, what it means is that if we beat Buhl, we've got it (the top seed in the postseason tournament)," said Wood River Coach Dick Richel. "That's because even if Jerome beats Buhl next week, they would still have a worse SCIC record than we would on the basis of their two losses to Burley."

Jerome and Wood River, the best two A-2 teams in the state this week in the Associated Press poll, split their regular-season meetings.

For Burley, which has to worry about the top-ranked teams in Class A-1 in the forthcoming Region III postseason tournament, an SCIC title would be a good way to top off a disappointing season.

"It would be a great way to go into our tournament," said Burley Coach Steve Jensen. "It would give us a lift because there are some good A-2 teams in the SCIC this year."

The only way that Jerome could go into the A-2 district tournament with the top seed is if Buhl beats Wood River tonight and the Tigers defeat the Indians next Tuesday.

Game time is 8 p.m. tonight in Buhl and the same hour in Halley on Saturday.



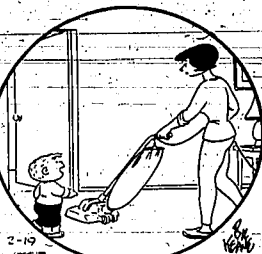

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

It was easy for today's East to find the right switch at trick two. Not so easy was tabling the right card.

West got the defense off to a great start by choosing not to lead from his diamond honors. Why the more popular diamond lead? South would collect two diamond winners and become a big favorite to win nine tricks.

When the actual club lead was won by East's king, it was obvious to East that he should switch, and just as obvious, the diamond suit was a standout choice. But which diamond?

If East leads a routine fourth-best at trick two, South has an easy time. He ducks to dummy's nine, West wins the jack and the defense is finished. East gets only his ace of spades, and South gets an overtrick.

With dummy's diamond nine in full view, East should prevent a duck-by-South by leading his 10 instead of the deuce. South has no counter for this alert defense, and instead of scoring only two tricks, South is held to eight tricks.

Conventional leads are OK as far as they go. But one must not be so bound by convention that he becomes blind to the winning play.

ANSWER: To South's. On the top side of a single raise, but not strong enough for more aggressive action.

**TWIN FALLS** — Perhaps the words scrawled on the rafters of cabin in Interlochen, Mich., best: "Use what talents you possess. The woods would be very silent if the only birds who sang were those that sang best."

To 17-year-old Renae Barkman of Twin Falls, the simple, yet profound statement she discovered while attending a music camp last summer was an inspiring guidepost in her music career.

Barkman will be a guest youth soloist with the Magic Valley Sym-

phony Tuesday night, along with two other teen-agers, Cy Gilbert, Twin Falls and Melodie Mecham, Hazelton. Both Gilbert and Mecham are 15.

They share a common denominator of talent, determination and perhaps most important of all — hours of hard work. In addition, each has struggled with discouragement and frustration.

The three auditioned this fall to perform with the 60-piece orchestra led by Carson Wong.

Barkman, the daughter of Murray and Kathy Barkman, is a junior at Twin Falls High School. For the Youth Soloists Concert she will play clarinet for "Clarinet Concerto

in E Flat Op. 26" by Carl Maria von Weber.

Music is an important outlet for Barkman, who due to health problems has been restricted in her extra-curricular activities.

As age 1½ she was stricken with juvenile rheumatoid arthritis. The disease is in remission now although it did affect the mobility of her legs and she still suffers pain on occasion. Fortunately for Barkman it is now not affecting the agility of her hands.

She has studied clarinet for eight years and piano for six.

"What has become important to me is my music and studying and practicing," says Barkman who

spends two hours a day in her music practice. She is also a serious high school student, a member of the Office Education Association and takes her turn at household chores.

Her interest in clarinet began when she joined the fourth grade band at the Twin Falls Christian Academy. She made the decision to play clarinet on her own, choosing clarinet, she says, because the flute looked too hard.

Last summer Barkman attended the eight-week music camp in Michigan, an experience she felt enriched her life in many ways.

A shy and serious teen-ager, she met and befriended many other tal-

ented young people who shared her love and devotion for music.

"The music really brings you together. I was amazed at how many friends I had," she said of her camp experience. She has written a poem and essay about her experiences.

The camp was different, interesting, and challenging. "I often wondered, what am I doing here? It seems that everyone is better than I am," Barkman recalls of that time.

During a period of discouragement at the camp when she felt her desire to be a musician was "just a foolish dream," Barkman discovered the message on the rafters — a discovery that gave her the determination to rededicate herself to her music.

The most thrilling moment of Barkman's life was during the final concert at the camp, when she played Liszt's "Les Preludes" with 638 other aspiring musicians.

"It sent chills up and down my spine to think about it — not only was I playing with my friends, but with some of the best musicians in the world. Some of them are tomorrow's concertmasters, conductors, performers and teachers," she wrote of her experience.

Barkman has played with the CSI Concert Band since she was in eighth grade and has participated in music festivals for four years.

She is critical of her — music performance. "I've got to be the best (I can) or I'm mad," she says.

To Barkman, music is a whole world of itself. "Something you can do when you're mad or when you're glad."

In the future she looks forward to studying music education in college and becoming a music teacher.

Cy Gilbert didn't waste any time getting into music. As young as age 6 he had decided he wanted to be a musician.

"I just got the feeling that I wanted to play the flute," he says.

His mother wasn't quite so excited and Gilbert says he had to "beat the lynch" for a couple of years before

**HAILEY** — William Shakespeare's classic comedy, "Much Ado About Nothing," has been given a Latin flair by The Acting Company, a professional repertory group from the John F. Kennedy Center. The ensemble will present this play at the Wood River High School Auditorium on Tuesday at 7:30 p.m.

## Drifters and dreams brought to life

"I don't think of them as kids because it's not me out there. It's Lenny," says Howard Miller.

Miller, who teaches drama at both junior high schools in Twin Falls, will share the stage with a cast of college students next week in a College of Southern Idaho production of John Steinbeck's poignant drama, "Of Mice and Men."

Director Tony Mannen says he chose Miller because of the part of Lenny, a big man with the mind of a 6-year-old, required an actor who was large enough to be believable in the role. Miller's ample proportions, flaming red hair and full beard, and his ability to project a wild-eyed image fill the bill nicely.

It is a play that has a special meaning for Mannen. "I saw James Earl Jones and Kevin Conroy in it on Broadway in 1974," he says. "It was the best piece of theater I've ever seen in my entire life."

Mannen hesitated to do the show for many years because he did not want to color that memory.

But this year, there are an unusually large number of men in the drama department at CSI. Thinking of shows for them, Mannen could not ignore Steinbeck's gripping tale of dreamers and the realities of Western America in the '30s.

Lenny and his partner George, played by Gary Winterholler, are drifting ranch workers who dream of having their own spread. Their progress is hampered by Lenny's inability to control his temper and manage his physical power.

"He's a gentle man who doesn't know his own strength," says Miller, who finds the part a challenge. A basic rule in acting is that, when on stage, an actor

must react to what is going on around him and pick up cues quickly. But Lenny is on stage for most of the play and often is oblivious to the people around him.

"It's like the world is revolving around him and I can't pay any attention," says Miller as his fingers idly toy with a piece of string, a mannerism he is working on for the part.

The ranch on which the bitter-sweet action of the play unfolds, is peopled by a cast of cowboys and drifters with dreams of their own. Derrick Hansen plays the richly textured part of Candy, an old man with a withered arm. The boss of the spread is played by Robert Speyer who teaches anthropology at CSI.

Students Ike Adams, Kelly Ramirez, Clay Wallace, Bashar

Abrasser, Kyle Leuze and Randy Probasco round out the cast.

Sjnan Zimmerman is assistant director for the show.

Miller and Mannen have worked together numerous times before. The most recent was their production, with Richard Call, of "American Buffalo" at the Renaissance Academy in June 1987. Their mutual respect is obvious when they talk about working together.

Although both men insist there is a clear-cut division of duties between them as actor and director on this project, they admit that Miller has made directorial contributions with Mannen's blessing.

Kyle Leuze, who was a student in Miller's acting class in ninth grade, says he feels a little self-conscious, wondering, "if I'm liv-

ing up to his (Miller's) expectations."

But, Leuze adds, "Tony and Howard both know what they are doing and I'm glad that they give me their guidance."

The play will be staged in the round in an attempt to seat more people. In response to sell-out crowds and long waiting lists for tickets for past productions, the play will be presented six times. Patrons are encouraged to reserve or purchase their tickets before Feb. 23.

Performances will be at 8:15 p.m. on Feb. 24-27, 29 and March 1 in Fine Arts room 119. Tickets, at \$3 for the public, \$2 for seniors and students, are available from the CSI Theater Box Office in the Fine Arts Building, 733-9554, ext. 339.

# The big surprise: Who's not on the list

**HOLLYWOOD** — What's that? You say Spielberg has been nominated for six Academy Award nominations, including best picture and best director?

Right and New Hampshire went for Pat Robertson and Gary Hart. Mother Teresa got thrown out of a bar, and the Los Angeles Raiders traded for a quality quarterback.

The list of Academy Award nominees is always just a little bit harder to explain than it is to swallow, but the 4,000 voting members of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences could themselves give this year's list a hard time.

Their generosity with "Fatal Attraction" would be enough to make 1987 a very special year, but it was the omissions that sent our jaw crashing against our chest. As usual, the directors' branch of the academy (all nominees except best picture are voted by branches) provided the most stunning news.

Two years ago, the directors failed to nominate Steven Spielberg, while Spielberg's "The Color Purple" was receiving 11 nominations elsewhere.

Last year, they left off the name of Randa Haines, whose "Children of a Lesser God" was being nominated for best picture by the entire body of academy voters.

This year, the directors ignored Spielberg again, though Spielberg's "Empire of the Sun" got six nominations. Even more shocking was the omission from the list of director nominees of James L. Brooks.

Before Wednesday, Brooks' "Broadcast News" was considered a front-runner for the best picture Oscar, along with Bernardo Bertolucci's "The Last Emperor." Because no movie has ever won without its director, at least being nominated, the directors' branch has seriously reduced the chances of "Broadcast News."

How could Brooks have been overlooked by his fellow directors? His script was nominated for best original screenplay. His three stars — William Hurt, Holly Hunter and Albert Brooks — were all nominated for acting awards.

Has Brooks been too successful for his own good, an explanation that was used by many people to explain the directors' snub of Spielberg for "The Color Purple"?

The parallel does not really hold. The quality of "The Color Purple" was vastly more controversial than the quality of "Broadcast News." People who liked "The Color Purple" accused the directors' branch of exercising petty jealousies. Those who did not like the film said the directors were merely exercising their integrity.

It is hard to know what they exercised this year. "Broadcast News" was discounted by some people as being no more than a slick feature-length sitcom, the implication being that Brooks simply did what he learned to do best as a writer for the "Mary Tyler Moore Show."

If that is what was on the directors' minds, what were they thinking of when they voted for Norman Jewison's "20th Century Fox's 'Broadcast News' is a sitcom, then MGM was merely counter-programming with "Moonstruck."

Maybe the directors do vote against success. Certainly Brooks has had two winning Oscars for writing, directing and producing his first feature, "Terms of Endearment."

The directors, who passed on

Stanley Kubrick for "Full Metal Jacket," were far from being alone in their balloting oversight. The actors' branch, in particular, made some ill-fated choices.

Steve Martin, considered by many critics the best comedy actor of his generation, was once again ignored, this time for "Roxanne." Martin won the best actor award from the Los Angeles and national film critics associations, but could not convince his peers.

Also left off the best actor list was John Lone, star of "The Last Emperor." The movie received nine nominations — more than any other film — but the actor who was asked to virtually carry it was not nominated. Amazing.

The snubbing of Barbra Streisand for "Nuts" was not surprising, considering her lack of popularity in the industry. But the fact that "Nuts" and particularly the performance of Richard Dreyfuss, was shut out seems a little severe.

There was some pleasant news among the jolts. The directors branch nominated "Hope and Glory" director John Boorman, recognizing the most glaring omission made by the Directors Guild of America last week.

The actors' branch ignored studio Oscar campaigns and placed Albert

Brooks ("Broadcast News") and Denzel Washington ("Cry Freedom") in the supporting actor categories where they belonged.

The writers' branch nominated Tony Huston for the adapted screenplay for "The Dead," while the director's ignored what many critics believe will come to be regarded as the late John Huston's best film. The writers also gave a nod to Kubrick for co-writing "Jackal."

The actors were able to ignore the hype of the Lillian Gish and Bette Davis pairing in "The Whales of August" and vote a best supporting actress nomination for the one great performance in the film, Ann Sothern's.

Like this year's presidential campaign, the 1987 Oscar race appeared months ago to be more wide open than in any years. The nominations have, if anything, put the outcome even more in doubt.

Bertolucci's "The Last Emperor" received the most nominations and it has the size, scope and social airs that the academy traditionally loves to honor.

But the fact that its star was not nominated suggests that the film's most common criticism — that it is cool and uncompelling — may deflect its support as the final Oscar voting deadline draws near.

## Patty Loveless to perform

TWIN FALLS — Patty Loveless, a new country singer in the upcoming pack of female traditionalists, will perform Monday night at 9 p.m. at the Elks Lakes Country Club in Twin Falls.

Loveless has been compared to legends such as Reba McEntire and Patsy Cline. Reviews of her singing

claim she has a strong, hearty voice that can produce both hot country rock and traditional ballads. After a failed attempt at recording an album, Loveless returned to Nashville in 1986 to give it one more shot. She succeeded with her first MCA album, "Patty Loveless," which is due later this year.



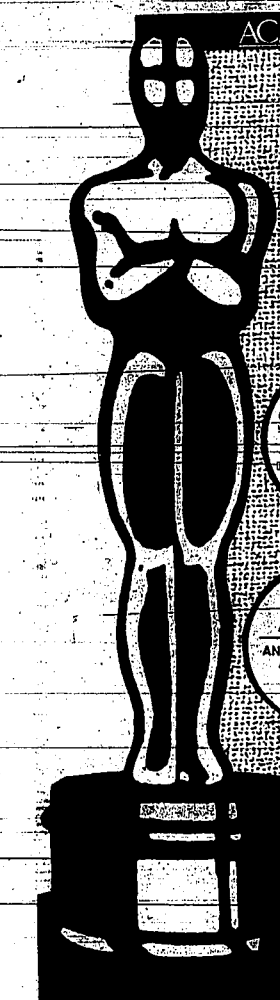

Continued from Page D1 she finally let him begin lessons in third grade.

"I seemed to enjoy it (playing flute) from the first second I blew on it," he says.

Gilbert, the son of Terry and Cheryl Gilbert, will play "Concerto for Flute" by Luciano Donizetti during the concert.

During the first few years Gilbert was faced with the problem of being too small to hold the flute properly. His mother sat by him as he practiced to encourage and help him.

"I thought my role was to stop him at those rough spots (in the music) and say, 'this is where you need work,'" says his mother.

It's been several years since it was necessary to sit with him, though, and today Gilbert practices faithfully in the small music room in his home. He watches the sun rise in the morning as he walks back and forth—seldom-sitting with his flute and arms lifted high as a proper flutist plays.

Gilbert is an eighth grade student at O'Leary Junior High where he also serves on the student council. He also plays viola. "Both instruments help me to play better on the other," he says.

As with his companion soloists, he feels the sacrifice of time has been well worth the rewards of his developing talent. When asked, Gilbert recalls having had to miss out on safety patrol in elementary school so he could put in his early-morning practice.

Sports is another sacrifice he has made, says his mother. "I think Cy isn't really as aware because he so willingly made the choice, but I think he has sacrificed sports because he's very good at soccer or anything that has to do with it. But he has been unwilling to take a chance on becoming physically injured in any way. Either his mouth getting hit or his fingers becoming sprained."

Gilbert's wall in Gilbert's music room is a photo of his dream—a \$4,000 Mateki flute. Gilbert is saving his money with the intent to buy the flute in the future. He mows lawns and shovels for neighbors, saves birthday money and always appreciates the music. In addition, he has gotten to music camps.

He has attended CSI Music Fest two years and attended the Columbia Flute Society's camp in Wenatchee, Wash., last summer.

The Wenatchee camp was particularly rewarding to Gilbert who was able to get in touch with different kinds of flutes. "He was able to practice on the piccolo, alto and bass flutes."

Gilbert is enthusiastic about his upcoming performance with the symphony and feels prepared for the concert. "I've done my homework. I'm excited," he says.

Melodie Mecham's mother had music in mind when she gave her baby daughter a name 13 years ago. Today, after six years of piano lessons and performances, young Mecham carries on the family's love for music.

"I think my mom always wanted a child that played the piano because I think that was one of her favorite instruments," says Mecham, an eighth grader at Valley High School.

Mecham's mother, Monika, who was born and raised in Twin Falls, loves music. Mrs. Mecham's mother was a gifted German singer. Mecham's father, Kay, plays trumpet and also comes from a musical background.

Mecham is a bubbling 13-year-old. A good student, she is involved in a variety of activities and is currently president of her eighth grade class.

"She tries her hardest" to practice 1 1/2 to 2 hours a day, and although it's hard to get down to practicing, "it's all worth it," she says.

"My parents will not let me do anything unless I have my piano done. I've had to give up some things before because of my piano and it hasn't been fun. So I've learned from that," says Mecham. Still, she doesn't resent her parents' pressure to practice. "I know I'm going to appreciate it when I get older because...this (teen-age activities) won't really matter to me that much when I get older."

She enjoys playing classical music and listening to it. "It's really relaxing because I have lots of stress, like piano studies and school, and lots of things to do, so I think it's really enjoyable to sit and relax and listen to music."

She has her eye aimed at becoming a concert pianist and has played in a variety of concerts, music festivals and accompanied her mother and sister, Natascha, on duets.

She will play "Piano Concerto in G Major, Allegro Moderato" by Joseph Haydn in the Youth Soloist Concert.

When not at the keyboard, Mecham enjoys skiing, skating, shopping with friends and reading.

and "Doing things that other teenagers do."

She compares herself to Jane Eyre, the heroine of a novel she recently finished. Like Jane, she is quiet, keeps things to herself and doesn't express her feelings, she says.

Her family is very supportive of her music, although occasionally someone will complain they have memorized a piece better than she due to all the listening they have done.

Mecham, too, is a perfectionist in her music. "I have a lot of determination and I am determined to get it right and go far."

And there have been times she wanted to quit. "Sometimes I actually hate the piano," she says.

Actually before this concert there are times when I am really frustrated and I feel like crying, just crying, because I just cannot get this right and I'm scared. And

there are just times when I just need to take a breath, kind of. Because with all the excitement plus the "trill," there's some "mixed feelings," says Mecham. "I have to sit down and I just have to say to myself that this is coming and I cannot give up now and I have to do this because I'm going to have to be prepared. It's something I'm going to have to do. I usually can scare myself into doing it. Sometimes I kind of go beyond my limits but I just have to think to myself that I can do this."

Piano has added something to her life, she says. "In a way it's improved it, it's just made it more interesting. It's kind of given me a calm spirit... Through playing the piano it just relaxes me and I know that if I ever need to be relaxed or if I ever need to forget about everything and enjoy something I like to do then I usually just go and play and sight-read and it's really fun."

# Clavell's 'Noble House' mini-series portrays ruthless pursuit of power

By LYNN HOOGENBOOM

James Clavell is a member in good standing of a very select group — authors who have such large popular followings that connecting their names to a TV project automatically confers higher ratings. That's why NBC has made a point of referring to the miniseries based on his 1981 best seller about intrigue, infighting, feuds and vendettas among British businessmen in Hong Kong as "James Clavell's Noble House."

The four-part miniseries, airing Sunday through Wednesday, Feb. 21-24, Pierce Brosnan stars as Ian Dunross, the tai-pan (or head) of the Noble House, a fictional Hong Kong trading company. Deborah Raffin co-stars as Casey Tcholak, an American businesswoman, and Ben Masters plays Linc Bartlett, her boss, who may or may not be planning to destroy the Noble House.

In Hong Kong, Clavell explains, capitalism may exist in its purest form, unfettered by the regulations that blunt its sharper edges in the United States. And, yes, there really are businessmen in Hong Kong who still carry on ancient family feuds. But Clavell doesn't think their behavior is much different from what is found in New York, London or Los Angeles.

"If you've seen the movie 'Wall Street,' that's the same thing," says Clavell. "You don't mean to tell me these people aren't ruthless? And what about T. Boone Pickens? The Hunt brothers?"

And no, it's not just the money. "We're talking about the top bananas," says the 63-year-old author. "After a certain level, it's the power. They want the top slot. They want to be tai-pan."

Clavell, whose father was a British naval officer, was born in Australia. He and his parents assumed that he would follow in his father's footsteps, but World War II (during which he spent three and a half years in a Japanese POW camp) and its aftermath scoured him on a military career. "I'd seen the quality of senior officers in the British Army, and I didn't like what I saw," he says. "My family had been in the services for hundreds of years

— almost since there was a navy. And I suddenly realized that these guys put in a lifetime of service — for what? I think personally all soldiers are betrayed."

Clavell moved to the United States and eventually landed in Hollywood, where he wrote screenplays and directed. In 1962, he published his first novel, "King Rat,"

about a group of Allied soldiers in a Japanese POW camp. In 1968, inspired by the success of the James Michener novel "Hawaii," he traveled to Hong Kong to research a projected novel that would follow the fortunes of a group of British families in Hong Kong. It was to be structured around four key years, starting in 1841 and ending in 1963. Once he started writing, however, he ran into a problem: He had written more than 500 book pages and had only covered five days.

After my editor finished laughing — as you're doing now," Clavell tells a reporter, "he said, 'Well, how does it look?' I said, 'Very good.'"

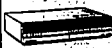

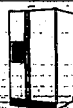

One look at the color screen and the answer is clear. He's white. She's black. Daytime's second interracial marriage is about to take place, and endure.

The first — 10 years ago on "All My Children" — lasted 24 hours. The groom expired the day after the wedding. Then "Days of Our Lives" experimented with an interracial romance, hastily terminating the affair after a public furor.

To tall, blonde David Wallace, interracial marriage is no big deal. His generation doesn't give it a thought. "We've gone beyond all that nonsense," says David. "This marriage is going to last more than one day. That doesn't mean Simone and Tom won't fight. We have to hold the audience's interest. The day before the wedding I learn that Simone is pregnant, and I'm furious, wondering if the baby is really mine."

Married to Lisa Trusol, who plays Melissa on "Days of Our Lives" a few hundred yards away from the "General Hospital" stages in the Sunset-Gower Studios, Wallace knows the answer to marital problems. # Linda Kelsey in new comedy runs home day-care center

LOS ANGELES — Linda Kelsey, with two toddlers of her own, feels at home when she's working on the set of her new NBC comedy series, "Day by Day."

In the new series, getting a tryout on NBC, Kelsey and on-screen husband Doug Sheehan give up their jobs to stay home and run a day-care center.

She was a lawyer, and he was a stockbroker, and they feel a need to devote more time to their new baby than they did to their teen-age son. One of the show's creators is Gary David Goldberg ("Family Ties").

"Gary said I was in his mind from the beginning," said Kelsey. "I knew him, because he produced 'Lou Grant.' I didn't know, however, if I was the only candidate or one of many. He wondered why I was so tentative. I told him, 'Gary, I don't know how many people you're seeing, but I'd really love to be in it.' He said, 'You are it. There's no one else.'"

"Gary says it's the story of his own life. He's wanted to do this for several years. When he was a struggling writer in Berkeley he and Diane Meehan had their first child. They ran a day care center at home. It's a situation filled with such comedy."

Goldberg was also responsible for getting a child-care center built at Paramount Studios, where the show is filmed. Kelsey frequently brings her two children, Sophia Nellist, 4, and Margit Isabella, 8 months.

NBC is going all out to launch "Day by Day." It will be telecast Monday, Feb. 29 and Thursday, March 3, then begin its regular schedule on Sunday, March 8, replacing "My Two Dads," which will temporarily become a roving "designated hitter" on the NBC schedule.

"Sophie sometimes plays on the set with the kids before we start work," Kelsey said. "When it's time to start filming, up goes her hand and she says, 'I'm not in this!' Which makes me very happy. At home she can work her father's computer and is teaching herself to read."

She and her husband, Glenn Strand, a computer systems analyst, live in Ojai, 70 miles north-

west of Los Angeles. She commutes by limousine. "I take a little nap in the car and when I get home I'm refreshed," she said.

Kelsey starred for five years as reporter Billie Neyman in "Lou Grant," and after that was in the TV movie "Baby Girl Scott" and the miniseries "Nutcracker: Money, Murder and Madness."

"I haven't done a lot since 'Lou Grant,' but it was by choice because I had two children," she said. "Then six months ago I did a play and it whetted my appetite to get back to work."

She says it was her frequent appearance on "The Mary Tyler Moore Show" that led to her casting in "Lou Grant."

"Being a guest star, I thought, was the easiest thing in the world," she said. "I could do some shopping, run errands. In a series I'm there all the time. When I was a guest star I didn't realize that Mary was in almost every scene."

"One show was based on 'All About Eve,'" she said. "I come in all innocent and take over Sue Ann Nivans' job. I was Eve Harrington to her Margo Channing. Betty White was nominated for an Emmy for that show."

She was a guest on such shows as "Doc," "M-A-S-H" and "The Rockford Files," and most of producer Quinn Martin's shows, such as "Streets of San Francisco" and "Barnaby Jones."

"Those were great shows for the actors," she said. "You could get in Quinn Martin's repertory company and do his shows. Those were great parts. You were the murderer. I thought then I'd never do a series. All of the good parts went to the guest stars. Things have changed so much now. Look at 'L.A. Law' with its wonderful parts for the regulars."

"Day by Day" has 12 children, five of whom have speaking roles.

"They saw 600 children," she said, "and interviewed them apart from their parents. The two key questions were 'Do you want to do this?' and 'Do you want to do this many different ways?' We wanted kids who wanted to do it, not those whose parents were pushing them. We got kids who want to be here."

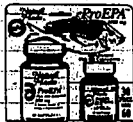

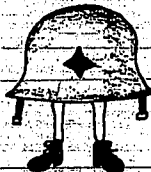

NEW YORK — The ratings for the first two nights of Winter Olympics weren't high enough to win the week for ABC, but did push the network into a tie with CBS for second place on the season.

ABC's highest-rated show of the week wasn't the Olympics, but the conclusion of the two-part miniseries "Elvis and Me," the highest-rated miniseries this season.

The first two nights of the Olympics varied wildly in ratings. An estimated 25 million viewers saw Sunday night's coverage, featuring pairs figure skating. It was in the top 10 with a 19.7 rating and 30 share. But Saturday's coverage of hockey was in the bottom-10 with a 9.9 rating and 17 share.

ABC said the first two nights of its coverage compared favorably to the 1984 games, which opened on a Tuesday and Wednesday and had a combined rating of 13.8 compared to the 15.5 this year.

When all is said and done, the Olympics coverage is expected to aid ABC in its battle with CBS for second place this season. NBC already has first place clinched.

NBC handily won the week ending Feb. 14 with an average primetime rating of 16.2. ABC was second with 14.9. CBS was third with 14.2. After winning 19 of the 21 weeks so far in the season, NBC has an aver-

NBC's new "Sonny Spoon," starring Mario Van Peebles as a chameleon private eye, premiered last Friday with so-so numbers, ranking 49th.

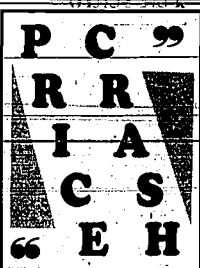
