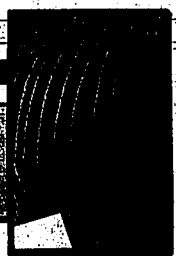

GNP figures ease worries of recession

WASHINGTON — The nation's economy grew somewhat more rapidly than previously thought during the final three months of last year, the Department of Commerce reported Thursday.

The disclosure, eased earlier fears that the United States may be poised for a serious recession. Revised figures show the gross national product — the nation's output of goods and services after adjustment for inflation — rose at an annual rate of 4.5 percent during the quarter, not the 4.2 percent pace that the department reported in its preliminary estimate a month ago.

The growth rate was the fastest in almost two years. The revised figures on output showed that the real gross national product rose \$42 billion (or an annual rate of 4.5 percent) during the fourth quarter of 1987 rather than \$39.2 billion (or 4.2 percent) previously estimated. The third-quarter rise was at a 4.3 percent annual rate.

The inflation rate for the fourth quarter was shown at 3.7 percent, the same as in the preliminary report.

The department said that consumer spending fell \$19.8 billion during the last three months of the year, rather than \$24.1 billion as previously reported, while real final sales, which are the broadest measure of business activity, rose 1 percent or \$9.9 billion, rather than 0.6 percent or \$5.3 billion, as reported

The revised figures showed the increase in business inventories at \$66.7 billion during the fourth quarter of 1987, down from \$68.3 billion estimated in the January report.

Thursday's report showed that the improvement in the trade picture was not as ebullient as the previous figures had indicated. The revised figures showed real net exports up \$2 billion during the quarter rather than the \$7.7 billion estimated earlier. In the third quarter, real net exports fell by \$5.7 billion.

Like the earlier estimates published in January, the new figures show a "slowdown" in consumer spending that's hurting businesses, particularly retailers, with billions of dollars' worth of unsold inventories. Analysts say that means manufacturers may have to halt their production somewhat until those stocks are sold off.

Bennett gives states 'mediocre' grade

WASHINGTON — Education Secretary William J. Bennett gave the states mediocre grades Thursday on an annual report card that showed dropout rates up slightly, college entrance test scores level and spending higher than ever.

"The news is not what it should be. Test scores are in a dead stall," Bennett said as he reviewed two wall charts crammed with statistics ranking the states on tests, graduation rates, teacher pay and other measures.

"In saying that I am disappointed, I think I speak for the American people," Bennett told reporters. "We're paying top dollar to educate our children, but we're sure not getting top return."

Mary Hatwood Futrell, president of the National Education Association, the nation's largest teachers union, said in an interview. "The time has come to halt the wall chart charade and for people to sit down and really talk about ways we can improve the quality of education for all young people in this country."

Asked if citizens should use the statistics as ammunition to vote down school levies, Bennett said that depends on how well the local schools are performing.

Nationally, Bennett said the graduation rate from public high schools in 1986 was only 71.5 percent, down from 71.7 percent in 1985.

The graduation rate is up from 69.5 percent in 1982, but it is far short of President Reagan's goal of a 90 percent graduation rate by 1990. Only Minnesota, with a 91.4 percent graduation

rate, has bettered that goal. Near it are Connecticut, 89.8 percent; North Dakota, 89.7 percent; Nebraska, 88.1 percent; and Iowa, 87.5 percent.

Idaho ranked 13th with a 79 percent graduation rate. The worst graduation rates are the District of Columbia, 56.8 percent; Florida, 62.0 percent; Georgia and Louisiana, both 62.7 percent; and Arizona, 63.0 percent.

It was the fifth straight year that an education secretary has released the controversial all-charts. Bennett's predecessor, T.H. Bell, initiated the practice.

The Class of 1987's scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test and American College Testing program were released last fall. The national

Campaign finance filibuster ends; vote today

WASHINGTON — A weary Senate ended 63 hours of continuous and sometimes cantankerous debate over campaign finance Thursday, leaving Democrats no closer to victory than when the filibuster began Tuesday.

By agreement between majority Democrats and stubborn Republicans, the talking stopped about 7 p.m., setting up a Friday vote on a Democratic cloture motion to force a vote on their campaign legislation.

The Senate will vote at 8 a.m. MST today whether to invoke cloture, or halt further debate on the bill. Democrats have the votes to pass the bill, but

they had virtually no hope of mustering the 60 needed to win Friday's cloture roll call. The expected loss could scuttle the divisive issue for the 100th Congress.

As the filibuster wound down, Majority Leader Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., made a final pitch for voluntary spending limits to counter the escalating cost of getting elected, with increasing amounts of money coming from special interest political action committees.

"The Senate should not be owned by an aristocracy of money," Byrd said. "Campaign reform gives the little guy an equal share. ... This business of the golden handshake — nobody likes it. Senators don't want to spend all their time going from fundraiser to fundraiser with their hand out begging for money."

Another advocate of spending limits, Sen. David Boren, D-Okla., conceded that "negotiations have fallen apart" because of GOP opposition to proposed voluntary spending limits on Senate campaigns.

"Give us a chance!" Boren shouted, urging his Republican foes to join in shutting off debate and allowing a floor vote on the campaign finance measure, which Democrats have the votes to win.

Boren promised that if GOP senators switched sides and provided the winning margin to invoke cloture, the Democratic bill would be open to all "legitimate, relevant" amendments the Republicans might propose to reach a compromise.

Panama armed forces stay loyal to Noriega

PANAMA CITY, Panama — The president on Thursday ordered the removal of Panama's strongman, Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega, but the military rejected the command and the man named as the new armed forces chief said he would not take the job.

President Eric Arturo Delvalle said Noriega would be succeeded by Col. Marcos Justines, the chief of staff. Late Thursday, Justines said, "I reject that order."

Noriega, under indictment in the United States on drug trafficking charges in the United States, is regarded as the key power behind the civilian government in Panama, headquarters for U.S. military operations in Latin America.

There was no immediate indication whether Noriega would comply with Delvalle's order. He has said he is innocent of all charges against him.

The police chief for the Defense Forces, flanked by colonels and lieutenant colonels at the Forces' central garrison, told Panamanian TV that no officer would replace Noriega.

"He is going first," Col. Leonidas Macias said, referring to Delvalle. "None of us wants the (Panamanian military) command, the commander stays and we all stay. The president goes," Macias said.

Washington called for Noriega to resign after U.S. grand jurors in Miami and Tampa, Fla., indicted him and others on drug trafficking charges on Feb. 6.

The U.S. indictment accuses Noriega of using his military position to let Colombian drug traffickers utilize Panama as a base for smuggling cocaine and marijuana into the United States. The charges said Noriega received a healthy kickback from drug profits.

Black calls for investigation into lawmaker's tie to PAC 5

BOISE — Rep. Ron Black, R-Twin Falls, has called for an investigation into another lawmaker's involvement with a political organization that planned to unseat him in 1988.

Black asked the attorney general's office whether Rep. Liz Allan-Hodge, R-Caldwell, should have to register as a lobbyist for PAC 5 because of \$3,000 in "consulting fees" earned from the conservative group during 1987.

"They say they're supporting candidates," said Black, who was one of two Magic Valley legislators elected in 1986 that PAC 5 organizers vowed to oppose in 1988. "When can legislators do political consulting without registering as a lobbyist?" Black asked.

Republican presidential candidate Pat Robertson said Thursday he couldn't understand all the fuss over his "throwaway line" about U.S. hostages in Lebanon, while Democratic candidate Michael Dukakis warned that if rival Richard Cheney continued to attack him, "I know what to do."

And Kansas Sen. Bob Dole, saying there is "tension in any campaign," fired two of his top campaign aides, consultants Donald Devine and David Keene.

"We're in the process of trying to tighten up on campaign resources," said the Republican candidate during an appearance in Jacksonville, Fla.

Robertson, in Birmingham, Ala., said he found it "hard to understand why there has been such an

incredible flap" over his remark Wednesday that he had known where U.S. hostages were being held in Lebanon.

He said the information had been passed along to the State Department at the time. But President Reagan, in his news conference Wednesday night, said of the information, "Isn't it strange that no one in our administration was ever apprised of that?"

A Robertson aide said the former television evangelist was referring to the passengers on a TWA plane hijacked to Lebanon in 1985. They were later freed.

Robertson had said of the hostages, "they could have been saved."

At news conferences in Birmingham Thursday, he said of his Wednesday statements, "I used that as a throwaway line to illustrate that the country needed to improve its methods for dealing with terrorists."

Suit alleges Stealth overcharges

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Four current and former employees of Northrop Corp. have filed a lawsuit charging the aerospace giant with overcharging the government by more than \$1 billion for development of the radar-directed Stealth bomber.

The Pentagon is investigating the allegations in the latest in a series of inquiries involving alleged mishandling by Northrop of military programs.

The Stealth is Northrop's "crown jewel," accounting for about half of its net income and a third of its work force.

In the 1990s, the Pentagon is expected to deploy 132 Stealth bombers at a cost of \$86.6 billion.

The plane, designed to be difficult to detect on enemy radar, is under development at Northrop's plants in Pico Rivera and Palmdale.

The investigation by the Air Force and the Pentagon inspector general's office was revealed Wednesday after a U.S. District court suit was filed by the one current and three former employees under the federal False Claims Act.

Under that act, citizens are allowed to sue on behalf of the government and share in any damage award.

Northrop spokesman Tony Canfield refused comment, citing company policies against responding publicly to lawsuits and against making statements regarding the

super-secret Stealth bomber.

The suit, which was sealed under procedures followed in such cases, accuses Northrop of double-billing, false billing and misrepresented charges, said Robert Kilborne, the attorney representing the plaintiffs.

Kilborne identified his clients only as an internal auditor, a former controller, a former avionics engineer and a former test equipment engineer.

The suit alleges that Northrop destroyed internal audits that turned up evidence of \$400 million in improper charges on development of the bomber, predicting that such overcharges may actually total \$1 billion.

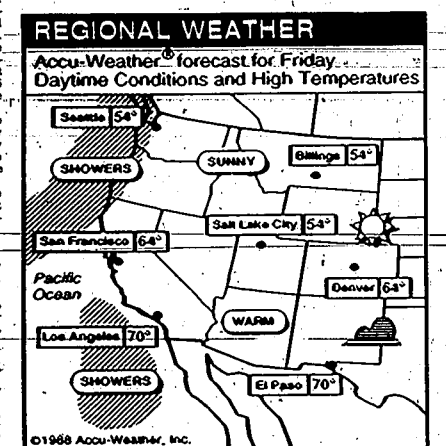
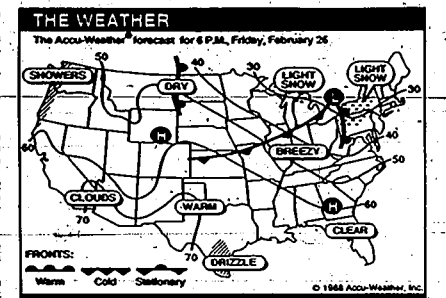

average on the SAT, scored on a scale of 400 to 1,600, was 906. The average on the ACT, which has a scale of 1 to 36, was 18.7.

Bennett praised his own ranking in the states. He placed Idaho 14th among states using the ACT with an average of 19.

He singled out South Carolina for praise, although its SAT average of 832 was again dead last among the 22 states where the SAT is the dominant test. He said South Carolina has picked up 17 points in the past two years, and he called it a precursor in efforts to hold educators more accountable for student performance.

The secretary said 43 states now require entering teachers to pass competency tests, up from 34 last year. They are not required by the District of Columbia, Alaska, Iowa, North Dakota, Utah, Vermont, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

Bennett said nearly 10 percent of high school graduates now take advanced college placement exams, up from less than 5 percent in 1982, and a larger proportion of seniors are taking the ACT and SAT. That "means we are succeeding in keeping score level despite a larger pool of test-takers," he said.

Test results "show that poor, black and Hispanic children are performing better and better," Bennett said, although he still a wide gap between minority and majority scores.

Bennett said that since 1976 black students' scores on the SAT have risen by 42 points, to 728, while white students' scores fell eight points to 836.

U.S. grand jury indicts 5

BOISE (AP) — A federal grand jury has returned a 16-count indictment against five people in connection with the 1986 bombings of a priest's house and three other buildings in Coeur d'Alene.

The indictment alleges the defendants were engaged in a series of criminal activities — including murder and attempted bank robbery — to resurrect The Order, a militant offshoot of Aryan Nations Church based at Hayden Lake.

It said one of the group's goals was to kill people viewed as hostile to the aims and purposes of white supremacy.

Named in the indictments were David R. Dorr, 37, currently in custody in Kootenai County; his wife, Deborah Dorr, 36, who surrendered Thursday to authorities in San Jose, Calif.; Edward Hawley, 24, in custody in Kootenai County; Olive Hawley, 29; and Robert Pires, 24, who is in federal prison.

U.S. Attorney Maurice Ellsworth would not comment on the whereabouts of Mrs. Ellsworth.

State fees concern Hodel

BOISE (AP) — Interior Secretary Donald Hodel has told the Idaho Land Board that the discrepancy between grazing fees charged on state and federal land could undermine his efforts to hold the federal fees in check.

In Boise on Thursday for a combination business-political visit, Hodel discussed a wide range of federal-state land issues with members of the board, headed by Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus.

He said he would look into several problems board members said have been slowing efforts to exchange isolated state lands for similarly-situated federal parcels in the drive to block-up state land holdings so they can be managed more efficiently.

Fee hike proposal may die

LEWISTON (AP) — The student president of Lewis-Clark State College at Lewiston has promised to drop his proposal to increase student fees \$20 a semester if the Idaho Board of Education raises student fees by \$40 a semester starting next fall.

"Nobody wants \$60 (a semester) tacked onto their fees," Steven L. Smith said, in a meeting with about 60 vocational students here Wednesday.

Smith emphasized that the Board of Education hasn't proposed increasing student fees yet and LCSC President Lee Vickers believes a student fee increase would be rejected by the board.

The \$70,000-in annual-revenue would be generated by a \$20 a semester fee increase and that would go to the Associated Students of LCSC under his proposal, he said.

U of I students fight idea

MOSCOW (AP) — Idaho college students will continue to fight a new method of financing construction on Idaho's campuses, according to a student leader at the University of Idaho.

Bradley Cuddy, UI student president, said Wednesday students opposing student fees as collateral for building bond sales. A bill doing that was approved in the Idaho Senate Education Committee Wednesday, and will be up for a vote by the full Senate.

Under the proposal, the Idaho Board of Education would use current student fees as collateral for bonds to finance the \$2.3 million renovation of the pharmacy building at Idaho State University, the \$5 million library at Lewis-Clark State College, the \$10.8 million library expansion at the UI, and the \$22 million campus school acquisition at Boise State University.

Hydro plant foes organize

BOISE (AP) — A coalition called Friends of the Payette has been formed to fight hydroelectric projects planned for the North and South Forks of the Payette River.

"We're trying to get folks together from all walks of life," said group spokesman Scott Montgomery, a kayaker and rather who belongs to the Hewlett Packard Whitewater Club.

Lands trade bill introduced by Stallings

WASHINGTON — Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, introduced in the House Thursday his proposal to swap private land along the South Fork of the Snake River in Idaho for federal forest land at the base of the Grand Targhee Resort in Wyoming.

Under the legislation, the U.S. Forest Service would be authorized to exchange 270 acres of land in the Targhee National Forest at the base of the resort, nine miles east of Driggs, Idaho, for parcels along the South Fork that resort owner Mory Bergmeyer plans to buy.

The proposal not only would protect a critical-reach of the river from development and insure its existence for the enjoyment of future generations, but help the economy of many communities in the Upper Snake River Valley," Stallings said in a statement placed in the Congressional Record.

"No taxpayer money would be involved in the exchange and it would be up to the forest service to identify the private properties for possible exchange, Stallings said.

The proposal hasn't met with unanimous support. Several state lawmakers from eastern Idaho have complained that the swap would mean property would be taken off local property tax rolls, reducing tax revenues.

But Stallings said his proposal would have little impact on county tax bases. "Most of the private land is currently taxed as wasteland or farmland," Stallings said, referring to properties that are taxed at relatively low rates.

The Stallings bill is cosponsored by Rep. Richard Cheney, R-Wyo.

Dioxin test slated

LEWISTON (AP) — The Potlatch Corp. paper mill at Lewiston will be among 17 mills tested for dioxin in the Northwest, according to plans for a joint federal-industry study.

Dioxin is a toxic substance that is believed to cause cancer in laboratory animals.

The study is planned by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the nation's paper industry. But the plan must first be reviewed by the federal Office of Management and Budget.

Corrections budget vote sparks fracas

BOISE (AP) — A conservative Republican on the legislative budget committee accused his colleagues of being vindictive Thursday as the panel wrapped up the 1989 Corrections Department budget without beefing up security within the overcrowded prison system.

Sen. Lee Staker of Idaho Falls lashed out at the committee after



losing every attempt he made over the two days of work on the department budget to add guards at various correctional facilities and improve services for inmates.

The Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee has been at odds with Corrections Director Al Murphy and the Corrections Board for months after learning that they diverted money earmarked for a prison chaplain, extra parole officers and other personnel to meet rising operating costs of the prison system.

"I'm going to protest the vindictiveness of this committee," he declared after the final Corrections Department budget vote was taken on Thursday.

In a series of often-close votes, the Republican majority on the committee refused to underwrite additional guards for the prisons at Orofino and Cottonwood, extra parole officers and start-up money to get

ready for the March 1989 completion of expansion at Orofino and the May 1989 opening of the new maximum-security prison in Boise.

But at the urging of Sen. William Ringert, R-Boise, and House Appropriations Chairman Kathleen Gurnsey, R-Boise, the committee agreed to turn the issue of start-up money for the new prison facilities over to a subcommittee for further study.

More AIDS bills cleared for final vote

BOISE (AP) — Two more bills to curb the spread of deadly acquired immune deficiency syndrome in Idaho have been cleared for a final legislative vote.

With little discussion and no dissent on Thursday, the Senate Health and Welfare Committee endorsed the House-passed bills mandating it a felony to knowingly transmit AIDS to another human and to set up an educational program for marriage license applicants.

The panel also sent a third House-passed measure to the full Senate for action, but it recommended a technical amendment before the final vote. That amended bill, which will have to be reconsidered by the House before it goes to Gov. Cecil Andrus, allows health officials to breach confidentiality of AIDS tests if that is necessary to protect public health.

All three bills are part of a seven-bill package drafted by Republican Rep. Russell Newcomb, a Twin Falls surgeon. Supported by the medical community, public health officials and the Andrus administration, the package has been called a reasonable response to the AIDS threat.

Two bills in the package were sent to the governor on Wednesday. One directs the Health and Welfare Board to issue guidelines protecting personnel dealing with accident and crime victims. The other requires organs and blood to be tested for AIDS before being transplanted or transfused.

The last two bills awaiting action in the House authorize the Corrections Board to provide inmates and prison guards with medical, counseling and educational programs on AIDS and mandate that people be tested for the AIDS virus before being allowed to donate organs or body fluids.

Clean fences to help farming

Open letters to Stu Murrell: Your intentions and purposes are worthy and correct in your proposal to have the grass-and-weeds grow up on roadway fences to provide cover and nesting for game birds. (I heard you on the radio Feb. 24, early morning.) But you should more fully understand the situation from a farmer's stand of view.

It is not just tradition to eliminate the fence row weeds and grass, but a practice that eliminates weed seed and kills bug cover (insect cover).

From a road man's (highway commissioner) point of view, the high vegetation causes snow drifts in the winter time and contributes to plowing cost and time in the winter and adds to spring break up of roads in the spring.

Farmers are intelligent enough to eliminate the height in the fall so the roads will be more drift-free in the winter.

We burn in the spring to eliminate what insects we can, though they may not go hand in hand with bird cover our customers and traditions for clean road fence lines go with clear winter roads, lower maintenance

roads and good farming practices.

Keeping flock is full-time job

I am having this letter written because Janet O'Crowley's article on coyotes made all shepherders sound lazy and dishonest. I am a shepherd and I have another side of the story.

I came from Chile to work as a shepherd on a three-year contract. Janet O'Crowley says: "When he is not actively shifting the herd, he is not off within viewing distance, neither are his assistant herders, the stock dogs. At night when coyotes are most likely to be shopping for lamb, the herder sleeps securely in his wagon." Just because Ms. O'Crowley doesn't see the shepherd, doesn't mean that he is not there.

I have sense enough to get out of the hot sun. I take good care of my sheep. I get up at 5 a.m. to start tending my sheep. I usually return once during the day to get food for myself and the sheep dogs.

I return again at 9 p.m. or later in the summer months, to eat again and sleep. With these long hours of keeping the sheep

safe during the day, I cannot stay awake all night waiting for a coyote, bear or cougar to sneak.

But in a bad area, I do sleep out in the open with my dogs and sheep to discourage the coyotes. I have slept within 100 feet of the sheep because my sheep dogs keep barking at coyotes and wouldn't settle down. They were warning me that coyotes were near.

At 1 a.m. the dogs started barking and the sheep started to move, so I got my gun and flashlight and went to check on the sheep. A coyote had killed two four-month-old lambs.

I know it was a coyote because they kill animals a different way than other dogs do. The coyotes just killed the lambs; they didn't attempt to eat them or take them away.

Ms. O'Crowley, I did not kill these lambs for food as you like to believe. I don't have to do that, my patron and I have an agreement about which sheep can be slaughtered for meat. He also brings me fresh and frozen meat and groceries every week.

My patron is also worried about keeping the sheep safe, and not both bring other animals. Last year we used an automatic siren and strobe light at night to scare off

other animals. This year he has bought some of the guard dogs that live with the sheep. These dogs are expensive to buy. They are also expensive to keep because they are large dogs and eat a lot of food.

Last year a bear killed two of my sheep. I saw more bears later in the season but I

didn't kill these just because they might kill my sheep.

I don't go looking for animals to kill. I only want to protect the animals that I am in charge of. Thank you for reading my side of the story.

Checks, balances are offset by maneuvers of greed, power

Government classes as taught in the government schools painted for most of us a rather rosy and idealistic picture of our government and political process.

Based on an existing constitution we were led to believe that greed and the abuse of power were kept in line by a system of checks and balances. Ours, they said, was a government of, for and by the people.

Unfortunately, despite our idealism and constitution, we have not done so well at keeping greed and abuse of power in check. Decisions by the politicians and bureaucrats that fill positions in our three branches of government are made more often in the interest of greed and abuse of power than in the interest of the people. Access to the decision making process and the ability to honestly debate the issues is much more limited than most would imagine.

As we close in on a very important decision for the people of this state, nation and in reality the rest of the world, the decision on building the Special Isotope Separator also known as SIS (INEL) at the Department of Energy's preferred site, I'd like to share the realities of my own experiences on an earlier project. That project was called the New Production Reactor (NPR). Like the SIS the purpose of the NPR was the production of weapons-grade materials for nuclear

press releases, TV and radio appearances, written letters to elected officials and now it was time to go to where decisions were being made.

Before I left I made appointments with the entire Idaho congressional delegation, which at that time included McClure, Symms, Craig and Hansen. I also made an appointment to see then Secretary of Energy Donald Hodel. I carried with me petitions and letters against the NPR from hundreds of people representing every area in Idaho.

Now it was not as if the NPR was not an important issue in which any of these men had no interest or knowledge. As I was informed by Sen. McClure the entire delegation from Idaho, then Governor John Evans and a group representing the Idaho Falls Chamber of Commerce had all gathered in Hodel's office the week prior to my trip to discuss building the NPR in Idaho at INEL. The voices for bombs had been heard.

When I arrived for my appointments, I was first kept waiting for some time before being passed off to some powerless and un-

educated aide. Symms, I was informed, was in Florida at the time. Hansen and Craig failed to show and McClure came to a meeting to basically inform me that "we're in power now." No discussion, no debate decisions are based on power and greed.

My experience at the heavily guarded Department of Energy's Forestall Building was even worse. Again arriving at the appointed time I presented myself to the guards at the desk. I explained that I was there to see Secretary Hodel. They looked shocked and amazed that a regular citizen should dare to try and see a man of such high station. After a phone call upstairs, I was informed that my appointment had been cancelled. I verbalized my displeasure at that happening and again after a few phone calls upstairs, I was told I could see "Mr. Number Two."

My briefcase, containing the letters and petitions against NPR from my fellow Idahoans, was searched and I was then allowed upstairs and directed to wait in some reading room. After 15 or 20 minutes, I was taken to number two's office — he wasn't there. I waited over a half an hour — still no show. An embarrassed secretary called around. I was once again informed he'd be there shortly. He never arrived — I was

then shoved off on an unsuspecting assistant.

Keeping my cool I explained the purpose of my visit. I voiced the concerns and the opinions of my fellow Idahoans toward the NPR. At this point I was told I was talking to the wrong people. I was talking to the energy section of the Department of Energy. The DOE has an energy side and a defense side. The energy side is fairly weak politically and has only about 25 percent of the DOE budget (which in 1986 was around \$2 billion).

To say the least, I was a little upset. I had expanded all along I was there to discuss the NPR and now after waiting and waiting, I was talking to the wrong people. I said I wanted to talk to the right people again after a few phone calls I was informed I had an appointment the next morning with the head of the defense section.

I showed up bright and early the next day for my appointment. The guards again acted as if I was nuts. They called upstairs and then once again informed me my appointment had been cancelled and tough luck. I demanded and got a phone number. Going across the street to a phone I called, I was told our concerns basically didn't matter and again tough luck — no recourse. I was "allowed" to leave my petitions and letters for the desk who would deliver them over to their government.

For some reason they temporarily backed off the NPR. It is not dead, however. In fact, it's ugly head shows quite often in DOE proposals and publications, but for us today, it is the SIS that we must deal with. Again it is the same shabby old politics of greed and power. Evans and Hansen have given way to Andrus and Stallings and there's a new secretary of energy, but McClure, Symms and Craig are still there and the god old boys from the Greater (than what?) Idaho Falls Chamber of

Commerce; they're all still singing that old song "Bring on the Bomb Money."

At the EIS (environmental impact statement) scoping hearings — the preliminary to the study — wimpy Bush Otter acting like a high school cheerleader, groveled before DOE officials saying, "We want it, we want it." He was joined in the chorus by representatives from Idaho Power and Mountain Bell — all this support before the questions had been asked.

After months of delay and on the heels of a dog and pony show by SIS supporters selling the economic and technical "apple of, of SIS and with little or no mention of its intended purpose (they did the same with NPR) the DOE has finally released the EIS on the SIS. It is a roughly 500 page document, very limited in its environmental scope (we don't discuss morals, policy, need, vested interest or public opinion).

"We the people have less than 30 days to digest this document and prepare for public hearings. It doesn't seem right considering that DOE has wasted at least a couple of months to prepare the document, worthless as it is. How can you only discuss part of the environment? Isn't it by definition the whole?"

That two of the major political figures in Idaho, McClure and Andrus, are also pushing for hearings on their disgraceful wilderness proposal the same week in March as the SIS hearings adds insult to injury.

We are bombarded daily by the projects and proposals of the greedy and powerful in and out of government there seems to be much less checkin' and balancin' going on out there than you'd think. But then again we see our world coming a tumblin' down we only need remember the words of Sen. James McClure, "we're in power now."

Batt's retirement made with regrets

BOISE (AP) — Veteran Republican state lawmaker Phil Batt of Wilder has made his retirement from the state Senate official, throwing his support behind fellow Wilder farmer George Vance to be his successor.

"I leave with regret," Batt told reporters Thursday. "However, it is time to move on. Public service, in my opinion, was never expected by our forefathers to be a lifetime career."

Batt said he would formally resign from the Legislature about 20 days after the current session ends, probably around mid-April, to assume the seat on the Transportation Board Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus named him to last week.

He said he would campaign to have Vance, a cousin of his, named to complete the current Senate term and then manage the campaign to get Vance elected in November as the new senator from the nine-

county southwestern Idaho district.

Batt, who served as lieutenant governor from 1979 through 1982 and was the unsuccessful GOP nominee for governor in 1982, is in his 16th year in the Legislature. He has been the chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee for the past two sessions after narrowly losing an intra-party race for President Pro Tem of the Senate.

Vance, 52, filled in for Batt during one legislative day earlier this month. He said he would make education a top priority if elected to the Senate.

Judge may try 7 plane crash suits

DENVER (AP) — A federal judge said seven lawsuits filed in Denver over the Nov. 16 crash of Continental Flight 1713 may go to trial in December and raised the possibility that a special judge could be named to handle settlements.

Twenty-eight people were killed and 54 were injured when the plane flipped over and crashed on a runway while taking off from Denver's Stapleton International Airport.

So far, seven damage suits have been filed against Continental Air-

lines and other defendants in Denver U.S. District Court, seven have been filed in federal court in Boise, Idaho, and one in Idaho state court.

During a discovery conference in Denver on Wednesday, U.S. District Judge Sherman Finesilver laid out a plan on how his court will handle the cases.

"These are seven cases of some complexity but not so complex that we can't go forward to trial in December," the judge said.

Finesilver said settlement talks in several of the lawsuits can pro-

ceed and raised the possibility that a U.S. magistrate or settlement master could be named for those lawsuits by April.

"It's not too soon for counsel to begin posturing themselves for settlement," he said.

Finesilver set up monthly conferences for March, April, June, July and August and urged that plans proceed for a depository for documents and exhibits at the University of Denver. The federal court lacks the space for the expected volume of material, he said.

Sheriff summoned for wire tap

GRANGEVILLE (AP) — Idaho County Sheriff Randy D. Baldwin has been summoned by the U.S. Attorney's office to appear before a grand jury.

Baldwin was served with a subpoena Tuesday by agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The agency apparently is looking into allegations that an employee of the sheriff's office used a telephone wiretap to record a conversation that one of his former employees, Travis R. Brecken of Kooskia, had with Idaho County Prosecutor Joy B. McLean.

The FBI refused comment on the case Wednesday, and U.S. Attorney Maurice Ellsworth at Boise said, "I can neither confirm nor deny anything pertaining to a grand jury."

But Baldwin acknowledged he received the subpoena to appear March 8.

McLean, who is in the hospital at Coeur d'Alene, said Wednesday she was not informed of the FBI's action.

But in earlier interviews, McLean said she had contacted the U.S. Attorney's office and the FBI after it became apparent to her that a conversation she had with Brecken had been recorded by the sheriff's office.

Baldwin said Wednesday he did record the conversation and he has a tape of that conversation. But, Baldwin said, he was within his legal rights to record the conversation and he sought legal advice before placing the wiretap on the telephone.

Baldwin said the wiretap came about during an internal investigation.

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
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Reporters seek clarification after Reagan news conference

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House attempted Thursday to clarify some of President Reagan's news conference answers, playing down his claim that outsiders were stirring up trouble in Israeli-occupied territories and arguing that an apparent contradiction with Secretary of State George Shultz on Iran arms sales was a

matter of interpretation. The regular White House news briefing, conducted by spokesman Marlin Fitzwater, was dominated by reporters' efforts to get clarification of Reagan's remarks at a nationally broadcast news conference Wednesday night. Fitzwater avoided saying Reagan had misspoken on any subject, but

he added detail, emphasis, elaboration and shading to several of the president's replies. "On some points, Fitzwater, however, said he could not elaborate, such as when asked to explain Reagan's remark that there is a great division even among the black people who are being oppressed (in white-ruled South

Africa). "It is a tribal policy more than it is a racial policy, and that is one of the most difficult parts here," Reagan said Wednesday night. Asked to explain, Fitzwater said, "I don't remember that specific reference. I don't have any elaboration on that." Reagan also had been asked

about violence in the Israeli-occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip, and the beatings and shootings of Palestinians by Israeli forces. He replied that "there is every evidence to believe that these riots are not just spontaneous and home-grown. ... We have had intimations that there have been certain people suspected of being terrorists, outsiders coming in, not only with weapons, but stirring up and encouraging the trouble in those areas."

representing justice for all." Fitzwater said the comments of Reagan and Shultz "are totally consistent as far as we're concerned." He added, "The president said the same thing (as Shultz) ... that they were partly influenced by outside sources." Reagan did not use the word "partly."

Lawyers claim Meesee unaware of plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Lawyers for Attorney General Edwin Meese III on Thursday denied that Meese knew of a plan to use Pentagon money to protect a \$1 billion Israeli pipeline project from attacks by Israel.

The plan was being promoted by Meese's longtime friend, E. Robert Wallach. Wallach's attorney, George G. Walker, confirmed the existence of two messages in December 1985 sent by Wallach to Swiss oilman Bruce Rappaport, a partner in the proposed Iraqi project.

selection of anything being said to him about any such plan. He wasn't aware of it. Earlier in the day at the Justice Department, Meese declined comment, telling a reporter: "I think my lawyers have said it all."

The Washington Post, which on Thursday disclosed the existence of the proposal to use Pentagon money, said the December 1985 messages plus another Wallach-to-Rappaport telex in Feb. 3, 1986, show that Meese supported the plan and that the late William Casey, then CIA director, endorsed it.

A Dec. 16 message from Wallach to Rappaport says that "I have assurance from my friend, that if necessary, he will engage new person on project." Wallach usually called Meese "my friend."

But Meese's lawyers denied that Meese was even aware of the Pentagon money plan, and Wallach's lawyer said that as far as he knows, Meese was never told about the Pentagon aspect of the pipeline project.

Walker said that rather than being a reference to Meese, the "he" referred to in that portion of the telex is someone else, probably National Security Staff aide David Wigg, who would explain the pipeline project in general terms to the new national security adviser, John Poindexter. He had taken over the post from Robert McFarlane on Dec. 4, 1985.

The attorney general was not involved in the plan to utilize defense department funds for the

project, gave no assurances about any such plan, and arranged no meeting for that purpose," said the statement by Nathan Lewin, one of Meese's lawyers.

Late in 1985, NSC aide Wigg came up with the idea of using Pentagon money to make secret payments to Israel to ensure that the Israelis would not attack the pipeline.

Wallach sent a Dec. 12, 1985 telegram to Rappaport relating that Wigg was attempting to determine whether or not Pentagon financing for the secret payments could be provided.

Walker's lawyer said that after consulting with his client, "there is nothing that I have or am aware of that (shows) Meese was aware of this particular portion of the project."

of documents including the two telex messages in December.

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Private convicted of being AWOL

FORT DIX, N.J. (AP) — An Army private who fled to the Soviet Union with his pregnant West German girlfriend was convicted Thursday of being absent without leave, but avoided conviction on the more serious charge of desertion.

Robert was described by a superior as "the most reprehensible, casual soldier" in his command. But defense attorneys contended Robert was confused and harassed, and wasn't cut out for the Army.

"I feel great!" declared Pfc. Wade E. Roberts, 22, as he left the Fort Dix courtroom with Petra Neumann, whom he married during his eight-month stay in the Soviet Union.

Courtroom spectators, mostly military personnel, gasped when Pauley rendered his decision.

The presiding judge, Col. Earl Pauley, gave the Riverside, Calif., serviceman a bad conduct discharge, and ordered him released from custody following the 14-day court-martial.

"I'm shocked," said Capt. Daniel Shivers, chief military attorney. He said the Army expected Roberts to be sentenced to the maximum AWOL penalty of a dishonorable discharge and one year's imprisonment at hard labor.

Roberts returned to the Philadelphia Naval Yard brig, where he had been held for the past three months, to pick up his belongings and went to an undisclosed location with Ms. Neumann, officials said.

To prove desertion, the military had to demonstrate that when Roberts left his base at Gijssen, West Germany, on Feb. 28, he never intended to return to the Army.

Pauley's verdict was a blow to the military, which eyed a conviction on a charge of desertion terminated by apprehension. That offense carries a maximum penalty of a dishonorable discharge and three

years in prison. They produced a half-dozen witnesses in an effort to show Roberts didn't like the Army, talked about leaving, didn't get along with his superiors and had disciplinary problems.

their client fled his unit when he was harassed by his superiors for, among other things, dating Ms. Neumann because she was German.

When he took the stand Thursday, Roberts testified that on the day he left, one of his sergeants said he was going to be court-martialed on unspecified charges. The sergeant also told him to stay away from German women, and that "I shouldn't have thoughts and feelings because I was a soldier," said Roberts.

He scaled a fence at the base, met Ms. Neumann at her nearby apartment and decided to seek asylum in Europe. He was denied asylum from five countries before choosing the Soviet Union.

The Soviet government pit Roberts and Ms. Neumann to work at a snake laboratory at Ashkabad, near the Iranian border.

But Roberts said he and his wife became disenchanted with Soviet life, and feared that if their son was born in the Soviet Union, he would be automatically granted Soviet citizenship.

Reagan's trip to be mirror of last meet

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan's expected trip to Moscow is likely to mirror in length and style the four-day visit to Washington last December by Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev.

Administration officials said Thursday that no dates have been fixed for the president's trip, but that tentative plans continue to be that it will fall sometime from mid-to-late-May to early June.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater told reporters this week he did not expect a summit date to be set until Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze meets in Washington late next month with Secretary of State George Shultz, who just returned from Moscow.

Gorbachev's visit was confined to Washington. In a strict observance of the rule of reciprocity, Reagan is expected to remain in Moscow. The administration is expected to completely discount the speculation that Reagan would stay in the Kremlin when he is in Moscow.

White House officials were encouraged by reports from Moscow that the Soviet Union believes a strategic arms agreement can be reached by signing at a May summit.

"We welcome it, if it means the Soviets are going to work at the negotiations just as hard as we will," an administration official said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

Reagan at the news conference Wednesday night, said Shultz' report on his talks in Moscow were encouraging.

"Progress continues to be made on our four-part agenda and the commitment remains to do all that we can to advance the cause of peace and to settle regional conflicts," Reagan said.

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AZT users show drop in levels

NEW YORK (AP) — The anti-AIDS drug AZT lowered virus levels and improved immune systems in more than two-thirds of 18 otherwise healthy carriers of the AIDS virus, according to a European study.

In a separate development Thursday, researchers at the University of Miami said that by using a combination of antibiotics they were able to prevent AIDS victims from contracting a deadly form of pneumonia.

The AZT study's results fall far short of what would be needed for doctors to recommend that healthy AIDS virus carriers begin taking AZT, which can have dangerous side effects, Dr. Samuel Broder, the director of AIDS drug testing at the National Cancer Institute, said Thursday.

Nevertheless, Broder said, it suggests that a recently initiated American study of AZT in healthy carriers "needs to proceed unimpeded."

"It's very important not to rush out and start using AZT in a situation in which its use has not been proven," Broder said.

The AZT study, published in the current issue of *The Lancet*, a British medical journal, found that levels of the AIDS virus "declined significantly" in 13 of 18 men who had longstanding AIDS virus infections but no symptoms of AIDS.

Levels of white blood cells called T4 cells — which are a necessary component of the immune system — and are killed by the AIDS virus — rose in 14 of the 18 subjects. No serious side effects were observed, said the study's authors: Frank de Wolf, Jan van der Noordaa and others from the University of Amsterdam, The Netherlands.

Rail workers report drug use on duty

WASHINGTON (AP) — The railroad industry is riddled with workers who drink large amounts of beer or use marijuana and other drugs on the job, two Conrail crewmen involved in last year's fatal Amtrak crash told Congress on Thursday.

Engineer Ricky L. Gates said he believed 10 percent or 20 percent of rail workers drink or use drugs on duty, while brakeman Edward W. Cromwell said the figure was more like 40 percent or 50 percent.

The two men told the Senate Commerce Committee that when they began their railroad careers 14 years ago, as many as 80 percent of their fellow employees used drugs or alcohol during working hours.

"It was almost every trip," Gates said of his early railroad years. "Originally, I thought I wasn't accepted... by my fellow employees because I didn't indulge with them."

"It was common practice to bring a bottle... or a case of beer," the 33-year-old Gates said.

Gates, who pleaded guilty to manslaughter for the Amtrak collision near Baltimore that killed 16 people and injured 176 others, said that at times he has stopped trains he was driving to obtain beer. He is an admitted alcoholic, and referred repeatedly during the testimony to "my disease."

Cromwell, who was granted immunity in the Amtrak case and was going to testify against Gates, told the lawmakers that workers' boredom and supervisors' "lack of concern" made drug and alcohol consumption commonplace.

Agents claim street war may erupt over heroin

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Two recently slain drug agents may have been victims of a war pitting old-line dealers and government agents against Asian gangs who are importing "Golden Triangle" heroin into California, officials said Thursday.

Emerging Thai, Cambodian and Laotian drug rings will likely clash with existing Hispanic, black and white gangs, opening the way for street wars like those in Miami in the 1970s and '80s, said John Hensley, the top drug enforcement officer for the U.S. Customs Service on the West Coast.

"If the Asians start mixing it up with the Mexican and black gangs, we may see the gun battles and murders that marked the old Colombian 'cocaine cowboy' wars in Miami a decade ago," Hensley said. "With the kind of money involved, either side could do the shooting."

Two Drug Enforcement Administration working undercover to crack an alleged Taiwanese heroin ring were gunned down in Pasadena earlier this month. Two alleged traffickers also were killed.

Investigators have said the alleged drug dealers were unaware

they were dealing with federal agents and had set up a drug purchase with plans all along to rob and kill their "customers."

Such violent confrontations are typical of the turf wars waged by smugglers and sellers, Hensley said.

In Miami during the late 1970s and early 1980s, "I was there during one turf battle between Colombians and Cubans and we (federal agents) were the only ones without automatic weapons," he said.

"We saw the turf wars there. If we don't get a cap on it now, it will become a reality here and we don't

want it to be a reality," he said.

The amount of Golden Triangle heroin, named for the fertile opium-growing area where Thailand, Cambodia and Laos meet, arriving in California during the last two years has increased dramatically. Three years ago, only about 15 percent of the heroin smuggled into the state was of the Asian variety, said DEA spokesman Roger Guevara.

"We now estimate that Southeast Asian heroin represents 50 percent to 80 percent of all the heroin coming into the country. It's a huge influx for Los Angeles, and it


has turned Los Angeles into a major transshipment center for New York," he said.

"The Asians, including the Taiwanese, have a ready supply and the potential growth of Asian gangs in heroin distribution can lead to more violence," Guevara said. "On the other hand, the blacks, Mexicans and the whites have always controlled the street heroin market."

It will cost some more lives to stop the war, the men agreed. Agents dealing with drugs and gangs are always more at risk than other agents, Hensley said.

Shultz urges Israel, Arabs to negotiate on occupied lands

JERUSALEM (AP) — Secretary of State George P. Shultz urged Israel on Thursday to negotiate a prompt and final agreement with the Arabs about the violence-plagued occupied territories.

"He said the 21-year Israeli occupation of the West Bank and Gaza Strip was the main reason for unrest that has cost at least 65 lives since Dec. 8.

"Its fundamental origin is essentially indigenous," Shultz said on the flight from Washington to begin a five-day peace shuttle in which he will present U.S. proposals to the Israelis and Arabs.

Shultz would give no details, but said his approach to both sides will go far beyond an interim arrangement for the occupied lands, where 1.5 million Palestinians live.

Egypt, Jordan and several other Arab nations have told the United States they reject the 1978 Camp

David formula for self-rule in the territories.

President Hosni Mubarak of Egypt called the plan, which helped produce the March 1979 peace treaty between his country and Israel, "a thing of the past whose time has ended."

"On the plane, Shultz told reporters "final status issues" must be taken up promptly, and "we have a proposal for that."

It is understood to be a two-step plan that would loosen Israeli controls immediately and lead to negotiations for a final settlement, even Palestinian statehood, by December.

The secretary said the "underlying problem" in the West Bank and Gaza is that people "don't have the basic rights of governance."

President Reagan said at a news conference Wednesday night that the violence was inspired from

outside. He cited intelligence reports but gave no details.

Shultz said the intelligence reports provide a "mixed picture," including interaction with outside forces.

In order to deal with the main problem, he said, "we seek among other things, consistent with Israel's security, to look at things that would help Palestinians gain legitimate rights."

Israeli control does not lend itself to "a stable situation" in the West Bank and Gaza, he said.

A "fundamental touchstone" of his plan are resolutions passed by the U.N. Security Council in 1967 and 1973 calling on Israel to cede territory in exchange for acceptance by its Arab neighbors, Shultz said.

The secretary said the U.S. package is not like a "cafeteria," permitting the sides to choose elements they like and reject the others.

He also rejected a Soviet proposal for an international conference in which the superpowers would play an active role, contending such arrangements are not likely to produce "good results."

Israeli Foreign Minister Shimon Peres, who had urged Washington for months to be more forceful, greeted Shultz at the airport and said: "There is no better alternative than to make the first step toward the long march to bring peace to our people and our area."

Peres said Israel was in the "most demanding period in our life."

Shultz responded: "Now is the time to work for peace and I'm convinced I'm bringing with me a workable proposal."

The big question is what Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir will say to Shultz when they meet on Friday. Until now, Shamir has resisted the

"territory for peace" formula long advocated by the State Department.

On Saturday, Shultz goes to Amman to see Zaid Rifai, Jordan's prime minister, and Damascus for talks with President Hafez Assad of Syria.

In the past, Shultz accused Syria of sponsoring terrorism and said it should be isolated.

Israeli soldiers kill 2 Arabs

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israeli soldiers shot two Arabs dead in the occupied lands and wounded several others Thursday, a day of strikes and violence that inaugurated the peace mission of Secretary of State George P. Shultz.

He will use Jerusalem as a base for five days of talks in Israel, Syria, Egypt and Jordan about U.S. ideas for ending the violence in the West Bank and Gaza Strip, which began Dec. 8, and reviving Middle East peace negotiations.

Israeli authorities prepared for more unrest Friday. The underground "United National Leadership of the Uprising" distributed leaflets last weekend urging a day of popular uprising in the occupied territories.

There have been calls for protest during the Shultz visit, and Israeli authorities fear Palestinians will use violence during the visit to

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Soviet missile pullout taken skeptically



BISCHOFSWERDA, East Germany (AP) — Communist officials and the state-run press said Thursday that Soviet troops began withdrawing SS-12 nuclear missiles from this town, where hundreds of people waved flags and showered troops with gifts.

Women pressed flowers on 150 Soviet soldiers and children gave them books, candy and other gifts in an orchestrated, two-hour ceremony at the train station. The troops have been here four years.

As the train loaded with 32 canvas-wrapped containers pulled away, the soldiers waved at the crowd and pressed the bouquets to the windows.

East German officials at the scene and the state-run ADN news agency said the containers held parts of dismantled SS-12 missiles and that the train was headed to the Soviet Union, where the missiles would be destroyed.

Western diplomats were skeptical.

"Until the arms treaty is in place, there is no way of confirming what we are seeing, and what we are being told is actually what it all appears to be," said one Western diplomat, who asked not to be identified.

In neighboring Czechoslovakia, the state-run CTK news agency said Soviet SS-12 missiles were withdrawn from the town of Hranice, southeast of Prague. It said a train carrying Soviet troops and 19 missile launchers left Hranice en route to the Soviet Union.

The commander of Czechoslovak missile units and artillery, Lt. Gen. Jan Krizan, was quoted by CTK as saying that Hranice was the "only place in Czechoslovakia where SS-12s were deployed."

The shorter-range missiles, which have a range of 300 to 600 miles, would be the first nuclear weapons to be removed from Central Europe under terms of a superpower arms treaty signed in Washington last December.

Soviet officials proclaimed the early withdrawal an "act of trust" that the U.S. Congress would approve the accord.

Military bands played and more than 1,000 residents waved small East German, Soviet and Communist Party flags in Bischofswerda, a city of 12,000 near the Czechoslovak and Polish borders.

Some people carried banners reading, "An Early Missile Withdrawal — Proof of our Will for Peace," and "Long Live the Soviet-German Friendship."

Fifty-four SS-12 missiles have been based in East Germany, at four separate sites, since 1983.

Defiance called for on black bans

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — The outlawed African National Congress on Thursday called for "resistance and defiance" against sweeping bans on black opposition groups, and church leaders planned nationwide protest services.

Anglican Archbishop Desmond Tutu, one of 12 black clergymen who met to discuss responses to the government crackdown, said he would not be surprised if the black majority turned to violence.

"We have nothing to show for our non-violent approaches," said the 1984 Nobel Peace Prize winner. "If violence erupts, what will be surprising is that it has taken so long."

Tutu and his colleagues, meeting in an office building draped with black streamers of mourning, called for "services of witness and protest"

to be held across the country Sunday.

Two major protests took place Thursday, involving more than 1,000 students each at multiracial universities in Johannesburg and Durban.

White business leaders condemned the restrictions imposed Wednesday, which ban political activity by 17 major anti-apartheid organizations and the 760,000-member Congress of South African Trade Unions, the nation's biggest black labor federation.

The business leaders said relations with workers could be undermined by the restrictions imposed on the labor group, which include prohibiting it from commemorating anniversaries of anti-apartheid events.

The outlawed African National

Congress, the main guerrilla organization fighting to end white-minority domination in South Africa, said the restricted groups "were committed to non-violent forms of struggle."

"It is not advocacy of or engagement in armed struggle that the regime fears, but the very expression of democratic opposition," the ANC said in a statement issued in Luanda, Zambin.

The government contends that most of the groups affected by the bans had links to the ANC, particularly the Congress of South African Trade Unions and the United Democratic Front.

CALGARY, Alberta — Americans pondering their lack of medals at the Winter Olympics might take some advice in at least one area from the leader of the Games.

To turn its ice hockey program around, says International Olympic Committee president Juan Antonio Samaranch, the United States should look closely at the Soviet Union.

"It is a pity the Americans are so weak in Olympic hockey, Samaranch said in an interview. "They are good players, but they have no cohesion. They have no coordination between them."

Described by their general manager as hockey's version of the Russian Rebels-of-Nevada-Las-Vegas, the Americans could score — 27 goals in five preliminary round games, second only to the 32 goals of the Soviets.

But while the U.S. defense gave up 27 goals, the defending gold medalist Soviets allowed just 10. The Soviets shut out Canada 5-0 in a first-round medal game Wednesday

night with a flowing, patterned style totally unlike the one Samaranch sees in the Americans.

"Everyone is playing his own game," the IOC president said. "When they have the puck, never, never, never do they hit the puck to one another. They run and shoot, run and shoot."

"And the Russians are playing another way."

In the interview, Samaranch said he was waiting for a reply to his latest letter to Fidel Castro, in which he urged the Cuban leader to change his mind and send a team to the Summer Olympics in Seoul.

He also reiterated his readiness to visit Pyongyang for discussions with North Korean leaders to try to

reverse their boycott decision over demands to share in hosting the Games.

"I am willing to go to Pyongyang if they really are ready to reach an agreement," Samaranch said.

And he said the high ratings for the Winter Games on ABC, despite the early departure of the U.S. hockey team, "show the interest of the Americans in the Olympics."

But Samaranch, appearing relaxed and occasionally glancing at the 14 TV monitors that bring all of the Olympic venues into his hotel suite, filled most of the 20-minute discussion with talk of sports and "the great success of these Games," which have been buffeted by scheduling problems caused by high

winds and warm temperatures.

"The problem of the wind was the only problem," he said. "We had bad luck because I am told that for 22 years, they never have had such windy days like this last week. But now, all is in order."

The weather problems common to most Winter Games are one reason that Samaranch feels the 16-day schedule adopted for Calgary should be retained.

"With 16 days, we were very lucky," he said. "We could postpone some events so that all these events can take place before the closing of the Games. We also need 16 days for the hockey tournament. If someone thinks it is too long, they can leave."

Thomas wins her points, but loses her judges

CALGARY, Alberta — The furor over Katarina Witt's costumes faded and now the judging of her short program and Debi Thomas' is on center stage.

Witt drew her second straight Olympic gold medal into eight, winning the short program in women's figure skating Thursday night but finishing second overall to Thomas. The gold medal will be decided Saturday night, and Witt hasn't lost a freestyle in six years.

Thomas, the 1986 world champion, beat or tied Witt for technical merit with all nine judges and the all-out crowd at the Olympic Saddledome went wild.

But those cheers quickly turned

to boos when the artistic marks were flashed. Only the American and Japanese judges gave Thomas first-place votes for the program.

Thomas sat motionless, but Alex McGowan, her coach, waved his hand in frustration and held his nose, saying, "No way, No way. It stinks."

"It hurts me when I see her skating so well and she's dropped in artistic marks when they raise Katarina. Katarina did skate well. I have no problem there; but I'm a little concerned it may happen again in the long program — no matter how well Debi skates, she will be dropped in the long."

Thomas skated a good program, Thomas said. "Of course, I hoped to have higher marks."

Witt watched Thomas, then applauded at the finish.

"I was very happy with my program because I did all my jumps," Witt said. "There was a lot of pressure on my shoulders but I think (the performance) was a good one."

Witt, performing ahead of compulsory figures winner Kira Ivanova and Thomas, skated a bouncy program to Broadway tunes including "Hello, Dolly."

Ivanova, of the Soviet Union, then botched a jump and her standings fell.

Thomas, second in the school figures, was next and performed an exciting display of jumps, including a difficult double loop-triple toe loop.

Although Witt does not lead through two disciplines, the 22-year-old ice queen from East Ger-

many is still in command. She has not lost in the concluding freestyle long program since 1982, to Elaine Zayak at the world championships.

Dressed in a blue showgirl's costume that has caused controversy for its daring, Witt zipped through the short program, worth 20 percent. Skating to music by Jerry Hermann, she had no problem with any of the seven required moves and her top-dancing footwork was outstanding.

Liz Manley of Canada also skated a clean, energetic program that, naturally, drew long and loud cheers from the fans. Manley, ranked fourth in the world, was first with the British judges and got third in the short program. That lifted her to third overall, just

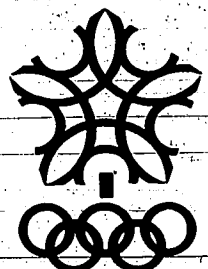
Tomba outduels Zurbriggen in giant slalom

CALGARY, Alberta — Italy's Alberto Tomba conquered a mountain, and now he's ready for the world. He won the giant slalom Thursday, another red-letter day for the Soviets at the Winter Olympics.

After their first day at the Games without a medal, the Soviets swept the women's 20-kilometer cross-country race. Raisa Smetanina won the bronze, and in her fourth Olympics, she now has won nine medals, more than any other woman ever.

At Mount Allen, young Tomba won his duel of Alpine royalty with Swiss ace Pirmin Zurbriggen and Swedish veteran Ingemar Stenmark. Tomba was the man. Stenmark was just another old



world." Zurbriggen was third, behind silver medalist Hubert Strolz of Austria, the Alpine combined champion.

It was a day of short sleeves, short skirts, short programs, and another rivalry was heating up on ice.

Debi Thomas of San Jose, Calif., took a slim lead over world champion Katarina Witt of East Germany going into the women's figure skating short program Thursday night.

With temperatures in the 80s, the sun was hot and so was Katarina's short program. It was choreographed to Broadway show tunes like "Hello, Dolly," and that's exactly what this is to the alluring Witt — a theatrical extravaganza.

She sprinkles her routine with fancy-step tap dance moves and graceful gestures, while Thomas got help from ballet star Baryshnikov to smooth out her athletic, triple-jumping routine.

Thomas said she took hope for victory from Brian Boitano's gold. "Brian and I won the worlds together in 1986," she said, "then we both lost together last year. Now that he won again, I know there is hope."

The medal will be decided Saturday night in a freestyle program, which both will skate to "Carriena." One way or another, it will add to the Soviet bloc's pile of medals.

The Soviets' cross-country sweep gave them a leading 25 medals, including nine golds, to 47 for East Germany, which has seven golds. The Soviets have 18 of the 21 cross-country medals offered at the Games, including five gold and five silver.

The 36-year-old Smetanina finished third to Tamara Tikhonova's gold, and she now has three golds, five silvers and one bronze in an Olympic career that began in 1976 at Innsbruck, Austria. Her ninth medal put her ahead of countrywoman Galina Kulakova, who also was a cross-country skier.

"She was my idol," Smetanina said. "I wanted to have one more medal than Kulakova. These are my last Olympics."

The United States, with only four medals overall, beat Switzerland 4-1 for seventh place.

With their victory, the Americans finished the same place they did in 1984. After Switzerland scored the first goal of the game, America scored five in a row, including two on power play. Kevin Miller's goal gave America a 5-1 lead after two periods.

Thursday night, the Soviets beat Canada 5-0, eliminating the host nation and birthplace of the game from any chance to win a gold or silver medal.

The day's Alpine gold belonged to Tomba, who arrived in Calgary this week with the admonition: "I am very cool."

He completed the two runs in 2 minutes, 6.37 seconds, 1.04 seconds ahead of Strolz and 2.02 ahead of two-time World Cup champion Zurbriggen, whose dream of an unprecedented five Alpine golds has produced only one gold in the downhill. The 31-year-old Stenmark was 30th after the first run and didn't bother to finish the second.

The 21-year-old Tomba has won seven of 16 World Cup races he entered this season and trails Zurbriggen by just six points in the World Cup overall standings.

Soto, Ojeda hoping to return to form

Hamppered by injuries last season, Mario Soto of the Cincinnati Reds and Bob Ojeda of the New York Mets are trying to prove they

won't be weak links in their pitching staffs in 1988.

Soto, who's been slow recovering from the shoulder injury that required arthroscopic surgery in August 1986, returned to spring training this week after receiving permission to delay his arrival so he could pitch in a game in the Dominican Republic.

Soto, 31, went six innings Sunday and pronounced himself ready for what could be his final comeback attempt with the Reds.

"I'm getting to the point where I think I can turn it loose," said Soto, who threw 80 pitches in the outing. "I've been throwing every other day for a month. If it's fine, fine; if it's not, it's not."

Soto is in the last year of a guaranteed contract that will pay him \$1.2 million this season. He is 8-12 with a 4.81 earned run average over the last two seasons.

Ojeda, meanwhile, is considered one of the biggest question marks in the Mets training camp. But be-

cause he answered concerns about his surgically repaired left elbow last September, he's hoping his status will not be in doubt much longer.

"I had surgery last year that was fairly major so I can understand why I'm considered a question mark this spring," Ojeda said Thursday. "But my arm doesn't hurt and the elbow is clean inside for the first time in 15 years. I feel I'm as close to 100 percent as I can be at this time of year."

Ojeda, who led the Mets with 18 wins and a 2.67 ERA in 1986, was 3-5 with a 3.83 ERA in 46 1-3 innings last season. That was encouraging, though, because he had been told after ulnar nerve surgery in May that he was finished until this spring.

Coming back in September didn't help the Mets catch the St. Louis Cardinals in the NL East, but it did provide a lift for Ojeda.

"I needed assurance that I could still throw the ball without my arm hurting," Ojeda said. "I don't think I realized until later how important it was for my peace of mind. But

going through the winter knowing my arm was fine took a lot off my mind."

Veteran Jose Cruz signed a one-year contract with the New York Yankees, and catcher Tom Nieto did the same with the Minnesota Twins. Terms of their agreements were not disclosed.

Cruz, 40, played 13 seasons with the Houston Astros, but wasn't resigned after hitting .241 with 38 runs batted in last season. The Twins obtained Nieto and pitcher Jeff Reardon from the Montreal Expos in exchange for Al Carowood, Neal Heaton and Yorkis Perez before the start of the 1987 season.

Nieto split last season between Portland and Minnesota. He batted .200 in 41 games with the Twins.

Cruz signed "Chief" Barry Larkin to a one-year contract for \$127,600, reducing the number of unsigned players in the Reds' camp to nine. Larkin, 23, hit .244 in 125 games last year when he made \$77,600.

"We've just got to hope it's not too serious," Mauch said. "It's just a damn shame for that to happen to a guy feeling so good and working so hard."

In Winter Haven, Fla., Boston Manager John McNamara said pitchers Tom Bolton and Steve Curry, who had been restricted because of minor arm stiffness, were given the green light to throw for the first time Friday.

Wrigley Field will probably get night baseball in 1988

CHICAGO (AP) — Barring court intervention, it looks like Wrigley Field will soon lose its reputation for daytime-only baseball.

After 72 seasons of the Cubs playing all home games in the daylight at the team's North Side ballpark, the City Council is poised to approve Mayor Eugene Sawyer's plan to allow night games this season and 18 in following years until 2002.

"Yeah! All right! Terrific!" said Joanne Budka, 31, a lights advocate who lives near Wrigley Field. "Night baseball is exciting. The Cubs need that."

But many residents complain that what's good for the Cubs is not necessarily good for the neighborhood.

They say night games in Wrigleyville, the neighborhood around the park, will mean rowdy fans leaving bars in the wee hours.

They complain that parking will be a major-league headache and that Wrigleyville lawns and streets will be full of litter.

"I'll move out," Noreen Gleeson, 27, declared Wednesday. "It will ruin the neighborhood."

The Cubs' owners, Tribune Co., also have threatened to move the team out of Chicago unless the city lifts its ban against lights at Wrigley Field. Cub offi-



cial says night games produce higher television revenues needed for the club to compete in those days of million-dollar player salaries.

On Wednesday, the council delayed a vote on the issue, but a special meeting was scheduled for today and supporters say they have the votes to approve it.

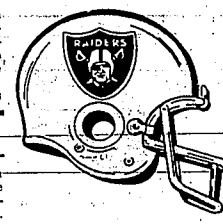
Some aldermen have accused Sawyer and his council allies of fashioning a plan that has few benefits for Wrigleyville residents. Alderman Bernard Hansen, whose ward includes the ballpark, says he may go to court to prevent lights.

A state law, also banning night games by restricting noise at Wrigley Field after dark, was amended last year to allow All-Star and postseason games. Legislators have said they would follow the city's lead in lifting the ban.

The other contenders are San Francisco's assistant coach Dennis Green, the only black under consideration, or one of three Raider assistants: Tom Walsh, Charlie Sumner and Sam Grunstein.

It also was learned that Washington Redskins assistant coach Joe Bugel, who reportedly withdrew as a candidate, was told recently by Davis that he was not the top contender for the job, as had been reported.

The Washington Times reported that Bugel withdrew as a candidate, quoting anonymous Redskins sources as saying the team's offensive line coach will remain with the defending Super Bowl champions. Bugel didn't return a phone call to The AP Wednesday.

Davis has been interviewing prospective candidates since the beginning of February and apparently still intends to take more time to

consider his options.

The job has been vacant since Tom Flores announced Jan. 20 he was retiring after nine years in the position. Davis said at that time he hoped to hire a replacement by the time the NFL meetings begin March 14.

One Raider official who requested anonymity laughed at the "front-runner" since a number of candidates for the job have been reported to be the "front-runner" at various times.

"The imagination of some writers has gone to Fantasyland," the team official said. "No one has been told they're the top contender."

Mark Etess, executive vice-president of the Trump Plaza hotel-casino, which is adjacent to the Convention Center, said the hall will be scaled for more 21,000 people.

Milton Chwasky, attorney for Butch Lewis, the attorney and advisor for Spinks, said the fighters probably will sign contracts next week. Agreement on prize money has been reached. The fight will be promoted by Don King.

Neither the unsigned contracts

nor Tyson's scheduled title defense against Tony Tubbs March 21 at Tokyo are expected to be stumbling blocks.

The biggest live-gate rights fee for a fight previously were \$7 million for the Sugar Ray Leonard-Marvelous Marvin Hagler middleweight title last April 6 at Las Vegas, Nev.

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Wood River residents howl over coyotes

HAILEY — Like coyotes across the canyon, people howled at each other all evening Thursday during a packed public hearing on the coyote predator problem in the Wood River Valley.

The U.S. Forest Service held the meeting to discuss what to do about marauding coyotes attacking some of the 20,000 sheep that graze on public lands in the Ketchum Ranger District.

The federal government has reports of 644 sheep killed on its land between June and September for a dollar loss of \$50,232. Just Forest Service land there were reports of 471 kills in 1986 and 376 in 1987.

"Our goal is not to kill every coyote in the country,

contrary to popular belief," said Mike Worthen, state director, Animal Damage Control.

So far, the Forest Service said five alternatives have been identified for resolving the predator problem.

These are:

- Limited predator control by Animal Damage Control but allowing hunters to kill coyotes when they kill sheep.
- Continue the current practice of calling and shooting coyotes or trapping or snaring them.
- Increase calling, trapping and snaring efforts.
- Use a full range of control methods including aerial hunting.

The meeting room was so full, people had to stand against the wall and sit on the floor. All the contrasts in the Wood River Valley were visible among those who

attended. There was the rancher wearing a cowboy hat and ram's head belt buckle and the woman with flowing hair and bright suede boots. There were government officials and a man with a pony tail wearing a T-shirt from the American Humane Society.

The most controversial proposals were the allowing of the Forest Service to hunt coyotes using a helicopter and the use of meat bait to attract the predators.

The aerial hunting would be done by the Animal Damage Control Unit of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Animal Plant and Inspection Service.

Worthen said the aim of using more aggressive measures is to provide a respite from the sheep killing problem.

The aerial hunting would be done in the middle of winter over a three-day period. Ed Waldapfel, Saw-

tooth National Forest spokesman, said he didn't know how many coyotes the aerial hunters would kill. Last year Animal Damage Control killed 18 coyotes, he said. Previously, control was limited to calling the coyotes and shooting them.

But many attending the meeting at the Blaine County Courthouse had other ideas besides aerial hunting.

"I would be more willing to let each sheepherder have three guard dogs and take it from there instead of using my money for something I have no interest in," said Jamie Ross, an outfitter, from Ketchum. "On public land you are using my money. You are hiring a civil servant to do it. I don't even eat lamb."

"You ought to try it, it's good," someone quipped.

O'Leary's drivers-to-be seek veto of driving age bill

TWIN FALLS — A group of O'Leary Junior High School students are taking a civics lesson seriously.

The students have collected 138 signatures from other students on petitions urging Gov. Cecil Andrus to veto a bill that will raise the driving age to 16. They also hope to take their case to the Legislature.

The petitions were drawn up by 14-year-old Domingo Kincheloe, the son of Harvie and Mry Kincheloe, after a discussion in a class about the bill.

"The kids said how they don't think it (raising the driving age) was fair. But they didn't do anything about it," Kincheloe said.

But he and a handful of students did something. They began circulating petitions at O'Leary.

It was important to fight the bill because driving was important to them, the students said.

"I have been looking forward to driving," said Kincheloe, who's been saving his money for driving lessons.

Some students need to drive to get to work, he added.

Another student, spreading petitions, 13-year-old Joshua Coates said, "We're responsible enough to drive at 14. I'm going to need to drive because I live five miles away from the school, and the buses don't run in the morning."

Scott Frazier, also 13, said he will be shut out if the driving age is increased in June.

"My birthday is in September and I want to get my license when I'm 14," he said.

Kincheloe said response to the petitions has been good.

"The kids are taking it seriously," he said.

Frazier said some students laugh at the petitions because they are already 14 and have their licenses.

The students want to expand their petition campaign to other schools and attend a legislative session. A hearing on the proposed bill will be held March 9 before the House Transportation and Defense Committee.

Although a little frightened about going before the lawmakers, Coates said he's ready. And, he thinks the petitions and the visit will have an impact.

"Yes, probably," he said.

The students already have the support of their parents.

Kincheloe's mother said her other children learned "to drive when they were 14-years-old."

"We taught them, and they gradually developed into competent drivers," she said. "I saw no big problems if the parents are aware and the kid is responsible. They have to prove to us they are trustworthy."

Joshua's father, Tom Coates, agreed.

"I really think most kids are mature enough at 14 to get their licenses," he said.

The parents are also proud of their children's budding efforts in the democratic process.

Mrs. Kincheloe said, "I'm glad Domingo has the initiative and knows how to go about it."

Added Tom Coates, "I think it's pretty neat."

School district consolidation proposals move to committee

BOISE Two proposals encouraging school districts to save money and eventually consolidate will begin rippling through the Idaho Legislature today.

Senate Education Committee Chairman Terry Sverdsten will introduce two parallel bills — high school consolidation and busing efficiency.

He said he'll offer consolidation for discussion because state funding to some smaller, remote districts totals \$6,000 per student, while most hover around \$2,000.

"It behooves us as legislators to be just as responsible about these dollars" as local district administrators, the Cataldo Republican said.

His committee gave unanimous consent



Thursday for him to offer both proposals in the Senate State Affairs Committee today. The deadline for introducing bills in his own committee expired Wednesday.

But the bills aren't expected to make a big splash.

"There wasn't as much resistance as we expected," said Sen. Laird Noh, committee vice chairman, who discussed consolidation by phone recently with several area superintendents.

"There is support to see how that all would fit together," said the Kimberly Republican.

Kimberly, Hansen and Murtaugh are districts often considered likely candidates for forced consolidation. But Sverdsten's proposal trends lightly, calling only for certain districts to plan, not act.

Kimberly Superintendent Richard Bauscher said his district already has been talking seriously with Hansen School District officials about consolidation. So the districts have a head start if they must file a written plan.

But costs to build new buildings and overhaul the combined educational program likely would knock down any savings from linking schools, he said.

"We just went through some figures to see what it would look like for Hansen and

Kimberly to get together," Bauscher said.

It was unclear Thursday which districts Sverdsten's proposal would affect because several criteria must be met.

The high school must have less than 300 students, be within 25 miles of another Idaho school and have more than one teacher for every 18 students. In addition, the money a district receives from the state is factored in.

"Hopefully, we're offering them a little bit of latitude," Sverdsten said.

At first blush, Cassia County and Murtaugh districts, along with the three in Lincoln County, appeared likely candidates among 40 fitting the attendance-standard statewide.

But Sverdsten said funding for the plan may narrow that field further. He said prospects were good for only about \$40,000 in

state funding for the studies, which would pay for only eight districts to conduct the \$5,000 studies.

"We're not trying to demand every district work this year to do this study," Sverdsten said.

A companion proposal calls for fixing the amount the state pays for busing. Since districts that operated more efficiently could then apply savings to other areas; Sverdsten said it would encourage keeping a closer eye of busing costs.

"If they become more efficient, they have more money to put somewhere else," Sverdsten said. "This might be an incentive to get down the road to get the districts to look at this."

The current system of simply reimbursing districts for their expenses, Sverdsten said, "encourages them to cheat."

Noted businessman, Cilek, dies at age 58

TWIN FALLS — Joe Cilek, 58 prominent Twin Falls businessman, was found dead at his home Thursday morning of an apparent heart attack, officials said.

Employees at Krangel's Hardware Store, which he owned, became concerned when he did not come to work Thursday. After he failed to arrive for a 9 a.m. appointment with Sue Jones, coordinator of the Twin Falls Business Improvement District, they notified his son, Joe, who found him lying in the snow.

He died about 10 p.m. Wednesday, according to Deputy Coroner Jim Mildon.

Cilek's wife, Jean, was in Boise on legislative business as a member of the Magic Valley Regional Medical Center Board of Trustees.

The business leader was credited by business associates as the "point man" behind the creation of Twin Falls Downtown Mall in the urban renewal project completed in 1970.

MVRMC discloses its finances healthy

TWIN FALLS — Financially, Magic Valley Regional Medical Center is healthy, despite a low number of patients last month, reported Finance Director Ken Fry Thursday.

The net income for the county hospital adds up to \$444,612 for the period between the beginning of the fiscal year Oct. 1 through January, Fry told the MVRMC Finance Committee. The amount is 41 percent over what was expected, despite the fact that in January patient census fell and operating income was 9 percent less than anticipated, Fry said.

Operating income includes patient revenue minus operating expenses and other deductions.

What kept the hospital from operating at a loss in January was interest income that boosted the net income up to about \$71,000 for the month, Fry said.

"Financially, we just don't do well with 67 patients a day as we had in January," Fry added.

The financial health of the hospital could be weakened, however, by salary increases that became effective this month.

Last month the Board of Trustees adopted a \$500,000 package of benefits to help remedy the nursing shortage at the hospital. In addi-

tion to wage hikes for employees, the package included bonuses for employees who help recruit nurses.

The cost of the package was not included in the hospital budget approved last fall.

"It's something we have to deal with," Fry said. "We're not really seeing the impact of that."

While January's patient numbers were lower than expected, the number of patients during February has been on target, he reported. But who can tell how long it will continue.

Each year the hospital staff has a more difficult time plotting trends on the number of pa-

Pertussis outbreak concerns health officials

TWIN FALLS — An outbreak of pertussis has health officials pointing to statistics that show children are not getting the immunizations that prevent the spread of potentially life-threatening childhood illnesses.

Cheryl Becker, nurse epidemiologist for the South Central District Health Department, has reported 11 cases of pertussis — also known as whooping cough — in the eight county area during the month of February. That's the same number of pertussis cases reported

in the district during the 12 months of 1987.

Statewide, 44 cases of whooping cough have been reported since Jan. 1 — more than four times the normal rate.

"Pertussis is the 'P' in the DTP immunization given to babies during their first year of life. Designed to prevent diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis, the DTP shot is to be given four times, beginning when the child is two months of age.

Pertussis is highly infectious, especially among young children who spend their days in day care or other settings where they are in

close contact with many other children.

The primary symptom of whooping cough is its persistent and distinctive cough, which typically lasts four to six weeks, Becker said.

About 1 percent of those stricken with whooping cough die, but the disease often leads to pneumonia and brain damage. Most pertussis-related deaths are among children under 1 year old, she added.

Pertussis has been found at both ends and in the middle of the eight-county district, indicating the probability that many other local children may be suffering from undiagnosed cases of pertussis, Becker said.

State immunization coordinator Robert Medlin said preventing an epidemic requires that at least 90 percent of the population be immunized. In a presentation to a meeting of state health officials in November 1986, Medlin noted a "loss of public confidence in immunization programs" and a resulting drop in the number of children who are immunized.

The most recent statistics show these trends are continuing, Medlin said during a telephone interview Thursday. Only about 76 percent of Idaho children under age 5 have

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Twin Falls Futures, a current downtown business group. He and his wife served as campaign chairmen for the United Way campaign last fall.

Rudy Ashenbrenner of Price Hardware, called him "one of the greatest additions to our community. As a businessman he was beyond-reproach and one of the finest persons I've ever known."

In addition to his involvement in the business groups, Cilek served on the Twin Falls Library Board, was active in St. Edward's Catholic Church and the Twin Falls Rotary Club.

He also was president-elect of the True Value National Hardware Dealers Association.

He came to Twin Falls in the early 1960's and first worked for the late Cap Kregel before purchasing the hardware business.

Cilek was the immediate past chairman of the Twin Falls Business Improvement District board. He earlier had served as president of the Off Street Parking group and also headed the Downtowners, a private group of business leaders no longer functioning.

patients to expect for budgeting purposes in the coming year, Fry said.

"We use to follow a pattern and look back five years and see a trend. But the trend seems to be going away," he said.

To prepare this year's budget, the staff looked back over five years and saw high census days in January and low ones in December.

"But that's been the opposite for us this year," he said.

Earlier this month, the fluctuation in the number of patients registered in some "scrambling" for nurses, he said. In mid-February, the hospital census jumped from 79 patients one day to 92 patients the next day. On Monday, there were 71 patients, but the next day 23 new patients were admitted.

The hospital budgeted for about 75 patients a day.

MVRMC and hospitals nationwide seem to be counting on one thing. And, that is the probability of

fewer patients than in the past, however patients will be sicker and will stay in the hospital longer, Fry said.

On another subject, Fry reported that the hospital received a favorable audit report from the Blue Cross of Idaho.

A company auditor found the hospital had overcharged about 15 to 16 patients a total of \$156, Fry said. The auditor compared the medical record with the bill on randomly selected cases of insurance customers.

"Last year there was a significantly larger overcharge of what had to be paid back," Fry said.

Fry also reported on the results of a Blue Cross study that compared patient charges during last year at hospitals of similar size.

MVRMC's daily charge to patients was 9.4 percent under the average for other hospitals of its size in the state, such as those in Boise, Idaho Falls and Pocatello, he said.

The audit report and study

weren't made available to the public.

Turning from census to capital equipment, the committee voted to recommend to the Board of Trustees the purchase of \$305,453 worth of equipment. The biggest ticket item was a new patient monitoring system for the intensive-care unit.

The net cost of the equipment is \$198,328, which includes a 10 percent discount through an Hospital Corporation of America purchasing agreement. HCA manages the hospital.

The cost of the new monitoring equipment was budgeted last fall, Fry said.

JCU Head Nurse Dave Silbernagel said the present monitoring system was purchased in 1982, but had technology of the 1970's. The equipment was also beginning to deteriorate, he said. Last year, there were 30 work orders to repair the system.

The proposed replacement system is modern, offering monitoring advantages that will improve the present services. "As Silbernagel said. With the purchase, the hospital will no longer have to rent some additional monitoring equipment at a fee of \$300 a month.

If the replacement is approved by the full board, the present system will probably be moved to the emergency department to provide closer monitoring of patients, Silbernagel said.

Fry reported that the hospital has been saved \$79,000 through HCA purchasing agreements on capital equipment. The hospital also receives discounts on supplies through the corporation.

The committee ended its meeting with a executive session to discuss unspecified personnel matters, acquisition of property and pending litigation.

Ross said he would rather pay a licensed hunter to kill the coyotes than have the government do the work.

"Hiring someone who is not a professional to do the work is not good, said Marvin Cox, a Castleford farmer and rancher.

There is more to the coyote problem than killing sheep, he said. Coyotes kill calves, deer and elk. The Idaho Department of Fish & Game places an economic value on the wildlife, Cox said.

He lamented what he said was a lack of communication and cooperation among the more than 50 people attending the meeting.

"We are all interested in environment, wildlife and livestock. There are two streets here. He (Ross) makes his living off the public land which is also mine. It would be awful nice to all get together, communicate and cooperate with everybody," Cox said.

Comments Thursday were evenly divided between those who favored doing what was necessary to take care of the coyote problem and

those opposed to using aerial hunting or poison to control the animals.

One woman suggested using lithium chloride to keep the coyotes away from the sheep.

But Guy Connolly, a researcher for Animal Damage Control in Twin Falls, said although lithium chloride is offensive to coyotes, placing it near sheep has never been successful in altering the coyotes' killing behavior.

A woman worried that her children might come across poison devices used to kill coyotes.

But Charles Kimball, a Hazelton sheep rancher, said if the coyotes aren't brought under control, the coyotes would be coming into town and attacking family pets and even children.

There was a lot of discussion back and forth whether coyotes have killed children.

Kimball said coyotes go after the best animals in the flock, even at night.

"If you could have a coyote pick your meat, you would never have a bad piece of meat," he said provoking laughter.

been immunized for the highly contagious disease.

In 1977, only 33 percent of Idaho's 2-year-olds were immunized. That prompted health officials to enact a publicity campaign urging parents to bring their kids in for the needed shots. By 1981, 85 percent of Idaho's 2-year-olds had been immunized.

Since then, those numbers have dropped steadily, and the most recent studies show that only 79 percent of the 2-year-olds in Twin Falls County have been immunized.

Among the reasons for not immunizing their children, Becker said some parents may be complacent about the risks — and the need — for immunizations.

Other parents are concerned about the risks of the much criticized DTP immunization itself.

In 1980, a Burley boy was paralyzed within 48 hours after a DTP shot. A 1984 decision awarded the family \$1.4 million in damages; the 9th U.S. District Circuit Court of Appeals upheld that decision last September.

Becker acknowledges the potential risks of immunizations, but is convinced those are outweighed by risks of going without shots. She said kids are more likely to suffer brain damage because of the illness than because of the vaccine.

Certain "red flags" can warn parents when their children are at risk for problems with the DTP vaccine, said Medlin. Health departments and pediatricians routinely screen children before giving the shot, asking if the child has previously had a severe reaction to a DTP immunization.

Children with a history of neurological disorders or convulsions, including epilepsy, should be evaluated before they receive the immunization, as should children who are taking cortisone, prodnison or certain anti-cancer drugs.

Reschedule the appointment if your child has a bad cold or is running a fever on the day he or she is to be immunized, advised Medlin.

If their children have not been immunized, parents should be aware of the symptoms of whooping cough. If they fear the child is infected, immediate testing and treatment can prevent spreading the disease to other children.

If the test shows the child has pertussis, family members, friends and classmates may be warned, and tested if necessary. "We'll do everything we can to stop it right there," Becker said.

Cost may also dissuade some parents from immunizations, and has prompted many physicians to send children to the health department for immunizations — a service added directly due to legal costs. Medlin said the state now pays \$9.60 per dose, up from \$7.69 paid last year. Most of that fee is for liability, not for the medication itself.

It's the magic of puppets

TWIN FALLS — If Randy Milligan is a gypsy artist, then his art medium must be gypsy puppets.

On the top floor of Lincoln School, Milligan sits through the remnants of 20-some puppets looking for useable scraps of fake fur, sponge and cloth.

"It looks like a barbershop after we're done," he says of his classroom-for-a-month.

Milligan, 38, is an artist in residence at Lincoln School. The puppets he and his students create are "as close to motherhood as I'll ever get," he says with a smile.

There's magic about puppets. "You're actually creating your own little Frankenstein monster ... It's the magic of it, making this unreal thing come to life," he says.

A native of Salt Lake City, Milligan has been involved in drama since he was in the fifth grade. His interest has taken him through acting, directing and writing. He has worked in film and video and in New York was an associate producer of independent technical films.

Puppets are not just toys to Milligan and puppetry is not child's play — it is a way of posing the children to what Milligan calls "that triple punch" — language arts (writing a script), fine arts (creating a puppet) and performance arts (performing with the puppets).

And, says Milligan, puppetry is one of the few artistic experiences that can incorporate those three learning experiences.

As part of Milligan's project, Lincoln's 655 elementary students have made a puppet — either a Muppet type, or what Milligan calls a "Sponge" — a puppet made from 1/2-inch sponge with a large mouth made from a plastic plate and a cloth body.

From the outside of the school building, the yet unfinished puppets look like so many white potted plants lining the windowsills of the fourth and six grade rooms. Milligan directs the basic design of the puppets and the children's imaginations give them individuality.

After completing their puppets many of the children will write scripts for puppet shows. The young children will perform poems and songs with their puppets while some of the older children have chosen to write plays.

Taking kids' art seriously

TWIN FALLS — On the wall is a menagerie of torn scraps of paper. The artist steps back, squints her eyes and turns her head slightly to the side.

"Do you see anything?" she asks the group of 7- and 8-year-olds.

Whispers of "yes" answer her query as the children's imaginations begin to perk.

The artist thinks the collage looks like a "funny-looking character in the city." One child sees a "fire with lots of smoke." Another sees a boat. And still another sees a solar scene with "fusions going off" on the sun's surface.

"I always tell the kids, 'look at your work, it's going to tell you what it's about if you look at it. You can't just look at it for two minutes. You have to really look at it,'" says Susan Schulz, artist in residence at Sawtooth Elementary School.

Schulz has been an artist in residence for eight years. "I love their (children's) art. That's why I do it," she says.

Her assignment is to spend a month sharing art and exposing the 739 Sawtooth students to art at their own level, not at a professional level, as well as leaving time for plenty of hands-on experience.

Funding for the artist in residence program is provided by the National Endowment for the Arts, the Idaho Commission on the Arts and the Sawtooth School PTO.

The lesson on collage was a lesson in negative space — the space which is not drawn on by the artist — says Schulz. As she gives her students basic instructions, she adds, "I don't want you to get bored. I want you to be interested at all times."

When they finish, Schulz stands with the child and she asks, "What does it look like to you?"

Clad in overalls with traces of grey in her hair, Schulz, 41, is a gentle contrast to the classroom teachers. As she enters the children's world she takes their art seriously — perhaps more so than the children do.

"The only thing that I get upset about is people not appreciating children's art. I think it's not appreciated near enough. The kids bring home a lot of art so it gets thrown away," she says.

Sothern's star still shines bright

KETCHUM — Perhaps it was the connection between playing a character named Tisha, having a real-life daughter named Tisha, and to top it off, having that daughter act in the same film. Or perhaps it was simply her ability to play the character role so well.

Whatever the reason may be, Miss Ann Sothern is still a force to be reckoned with.

Sothern was nominated last week for an Oscar by the Motion Picture Academy for Best Supporting Actress for her role in "The Whales of August." Even with five Emmy nominations to her credit, this is a long-awaited honor in Sothern's acting career — an honor which she holds dearly.

"I'm delighted to have been nominated for the Oscar," Sothern said during a telephone interview from her Ketchum home. "I consider a nomination a great tribute no matter what happens — the merit of my work is what is important."

Sothern has been paired up against some stiff competition. The other nominees for Best Supporting Actress include Olympia Dukakis

for "Moonstruck," Norma Aleandro for "Gaby — A true story," Anne Archer for "Fatal Attraction," and Anne Ramsey for "Throw Momma from the Train."

The day the nominees were announced Sothern said her phone was off the hook. Once she put the receiver back in place, it rang immediately. It was a friend wishing her hearty congratulations.

Sothern says she was indeed surprised to learn of the achievement. And her phone hasn't stopped ringing since.

Flowers and congratulations from well-wishers have flooded Sothern's home this past week. Sothern plans to attend the Academy Awards ceremonies April 11 in Los Angeles along with her daughter, actress Tisha Sterling and other family members.

The release of "The Whales of August" this December brought Sothern to the silver screen for the first time since her television series "Private Secretary" and "The Ann Sothern Show." She plays the role of Tisha, the flirtatious best friend and neighbor of Sarah, played by Lillian Gish.

Bette Davis plays Sarah's sister Libby, a blind, outspoken woman

who clings to Sarah in a mutual dependency brought on after the deaths of their husbands and the passing of years. And then there is Mr. Mararon, played by Vincent Price, a charming gentleman with roots in Czarist Russia who casts his attentions toward Sarah.

Artist has found her own niche

KETCHUM — Her paintings are warm, vibrant and generate an optimistic attitude which reflects her outlook on nature and on life. They also provide her with a chance to make a name for herself in the

wake of a famous family.

At 37, Joan "Muffet" Hemingway has put together her first one-woman show of more than two dozen pieces which will be displayed at Ketchum's Frieson Gallery of Fine Art through March 3.

"Her artwork is a love which started in her youth, but which has only developed in recent years.

"It's the most beautiful sense of being when you're painting," Hemingway says. "It's peaceful — I'm so focused when I'm doing it."

The oldest granddaughter of world-renowned novelist Ernest Hemingway and sister of actress Mariel Hemingway and model/actress Margaux Hemingway, Muffet — as her friends and family call her — says she developed an interest in painting when she was in grade school. It was painter Jack Albee, brother of playwright Edward Albee who wrote "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf," who taught her to paint when she was 9 years old.

From that early start with a paintbrush and canvas, Hemingway says she was also influenced by her travels with her family and by family friends who had talents and interests of varying appeal.

Hemingway studied ceramics at Idaho State University for one year and then studied liberal arts at the Sorbonne University in Paris. She traveled for six years throughout Europe, visiting and studying in the galleries and museums.

Hemingway says her favorite museums were those where early European modernists' work could be viewed. She was greatly inspired by "The 1872 Madison Exhibit in Paris. Her artwork has also been strongly influenced by Paul Klee, Pablo Picasso and Robert Motherwell.

When Hemingway returned to Ketchum six years ago, she continued her study of art with the help of local ceramist Jim Romberg and oil painting artists Debbie Edgars and Joe Baker.

Her abstract geometric paintings done in oils and pastels reflect Hemingway's interest in nature and the harmony and sense of balance of linear design.

Hemingway calls herself an outdoor person, spending time playing tennis, hiking or cross-country skiing after she disciplines herself to paint for at least two hours each day. Her studio is in her home where she lives with her parents.

casional artwork brought home from school.

"That advice brings back fond memories of when her own mother framed one of her artworks and put it on the wall. And she left it up there for months and she told me how it made her feel so good ... It made me feel like I must be able to do something good," says Schulz.

Schulz admits she is a realist in her own art - just as she is in her life-style. Although raised in Meriden, Conn., and a graduate of Rhode Island School of Design, she has traded the East-for-a-small chunk of the Oregon woods near Chiloquin. She enjoys painting what some people might consider

simple and ordinary objects - a child's lunchbox with apple, sandwich and chips spilling out, a cardboard box of wildflowers, an old car and one of the children's favorite paintings - a Levi's jacket hung over the back of a white wooden chair.

Her art, she agrees, is a "celebration of everyday objects."

Schulz encourages her students not to try to paint the easiest thing. "You look for things you aren't sure you can print and learn how to paint them as you go."

She carries a small watercolor set in her purse so her creative tools are always handy. Once, when she was painting a mountain scene she hiked daily to the site with her car was strapped to her back and left

her oil paints inside a hollow stump for convenience.

"I'm an artist who likes a visual experience. I sometimes look at things that maybe other people wouldn't notice," she says.

Visual art is not tedious, says Schulz. "Once you start drawing it is like meditation - you're gone," and there is no sense of time. That's what happens when you're in the right brain (the creative portion of the brain). It's wonderful. You're doing it from this other place that doesn't think it's tedious at all. The more you work the more you see."

At Sawtooth, Schulz is using a se-

ries of art lessons which build upon each other. They include:

- Collage, to make children aware of negative space.

- Self-portraits, to teach children to create a drawing using simple shapes.

- Student model portraits, drawing a person looking at them and observing the simple shapes and putting them together.

- Pen and ink lesson, experimenting with lines.

- Watercolor, mixing colors. Schulz and her students will open an exhibit for parents and public on March 10.

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
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Panic, alienation bump aside comedy in 'Having a Baby'

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

SHE'S HAVING A BABY (PG-13) John Hughes seems to be crafting a comic movie valentine to approaching fatherhood — with Kevin Bacon and Elizabeth McGovern as a young Midwestern couple beleaguered by suburbia and pregnancy. But is he? There is a nightmarish edge to this movie; it often gets ghastly cute, with surreal dream sequences and shock cuts differed from Hitchcock. Hughes mostly does not show the scenes where his couple are tender or loving with each other, and the film has an unpleasant, queasy feel. It is the least funny of his comedies, too fo-

cus on Jake's panic and alienation. But this unpleasantness may be exactly what audiences buy, what strikes them as contemporary; if so, there is plenty of it here.

BROADCAST NEWS (R) This film is so diabolically clever that you rather expect it to be heartless; in the way that so much surface cleverness can be. No such thing: This film goes right to the core of a modern romantic triangle, and while it is there, gives us a look at what all the news broadcasting business. But heartless is the wrong word for this movie: It is insightful and understanding and marvelous fun, while giving up none of its thoughtfulness, and all those leading actors — William Hurt, Albert Brooks and Holly Hunter — alternatively save the movie from alienating the audience and provide it with its greatest joys.

GOOD MORNING, VIETNAM (R) This dramatic comedy based on the 1985 Saigon gig of wildman Armed Forces despatcher Adrian Cronauer is mostly failed satire. It clings to the obvious like a drowning man to an afloat. But Robin Williams, as Cronauer, saves it; he explodes the center in berserk bursts of electronic-age surrealism, blasting away hilariously, ad libbing on camera. Williams is like a man possessed: a Crazy Eddie of showbiz dada. In his improvisations, he hotwires "Vietnam" into realms of quick-witted chaos, gives a fine, freezing cheery hello and goodbye to the hell of war and the purgatory of radio.

MOONSTRUCK (PG) This is an incredibly nourishing comedy, filled as it is like rigatoni with warmth, cheer and terrific snappy dialogue. As a young widow whose life sud-

denly shifts 180 degrees under the spell of an extraordinary Full moon from plain to juicy, Cher finally has a role that lets her comic sensibilities out for a romp. Cage attacks the role of Ronny — the guy Cher really falls for — with a nice balance between unbridled romanticism and tongue-in-cheek seriousness; he is marvelous. Everyone is, yet Olympia Dukakis, as

Cher's wise mama, seems to have an extra sheen of maturity and wisdom that moves her work from authoritativeness into memorable.

THE SERPENT AND THE RAINBOW (R) Wes Craven's ambitious, imaginative and largely successful blend of supernatural and political terror, high adventure and anthropology set in Haiti just as Duvalier

is taking flight. One could wish that amiable hero Bill Pullman, a Harvard anthropologist very much in the Indiana Jones mold, were a little less Superman and a little more Clark Kent, thus avoiding the great white savior stereotype. Still, it is a stunning, intensely cinematic experience. With Cathy Tyson, Zakes Mokae, Paul Winfield, Brent Jennings.

Oscar nominees not on video yet

HOLLYWOOD — During the weeks between the announcement of "Oscar" nominations and the award ceremonies, a movie boating major nominations is likely to do increased business in the home-video rental market.

But almost none of the movies that figured heavily in the Oscar nominations will be available on home video before the April 11 ceremonies. Only Media's "Street Smart," boasting the performance that made Morgan Freeman a candidate for a supporting actor Oscar, is

available. It has been in the stores since last fall. Freeman was nominated for his portrayal of a vicious pimp.

The reason almost none of the major nominees — "Broadcast News," "The Last Emperor," "Ironweed," "Wall Street" and "Moonstruck" — is on home video yet is because all were released to theaters late last year. Traditionally, movies, particularly big hits, debut on home video at least six months after their theatrical openings to allow as much time as possible for box-office revenues to pile up.

As expected, there has been no announcement yet about home-video release of best-picture nominees "Broadcast News" or "Moonstruck," both are still going strong at the box office. But Paramount disclosed weeks ago that it will debut another best-picture nominee, "Fatal Attraction," in June.

If Ann Sothern wins the supporting actress Oscar for Nelson Entertainment's "The Whales of August," you will be able to catch her performance on home video April 27. Paramount is releasing "The Untouchables," featuring supporting actor nominee Sean Connery, sometime in April.

 sent to have their puppets lip sync to Elvis Presley's "Hound Dog" or a popular rock song.

"I'm amazed how it just excites the kids," Milligan says of puppetry. "There's just something about seeing that unreal thing come to life that just catches your imagination." catches your attention. Even if you think it's stupid, the kids will be enthralled by it. And that's the thing I like about puppetry, that it makes adults children again."

Milligan calls himself a "gypsy artist" perhaps because his interest in drama takes him so many directions and so many places.

While attending college he became active in Shakespearean theater and began editing plays. Shakespeare's tragedies and comedies into 15-minute productions.

"Shakespeare was so versatile, able to do a lot of the junior high kids, yet with these 15-minute versions it was short enough that you could still listen to the Shakespearean language and yet not get lost in it," he says. "The only way we used to advertise them (for college productions) was 'Brevity is the soul of wit.'"

Milligan feels incorporating Shakespeare into puppet shows should be ideal, but he gets so diverted into other activities that he hasn't done it.

Milligan has three degrees from the University of Utah in fine arts and journalism. It was while working on his master's degree in theater direction that he first became interested in puppets and became involved in several puppet shows.

During that period, 1976-78, the pattern for the Muppets, created by Jim Henson was first published — a highlight for a puppeteer. Milligan confesses he was "ready to go off and join Jim Henson," at one point.

The Muppets were used extensively on "Sesame Street," one of the best shows on TV," says Milligan. "At the time the pace was so new and quick that there was nothing like it on television except commercials and that's exactly what they did, they patterned their show after a commercial 30-second or 60-second attention span."

He maintains that "part of art is patience. To be able to be that painter that goes back and adds a few more strokes ... to be that writer that goes back and reads his work one more time to change just a word or two ... to be that actor that rehearses day and night so that he can get that inflection ... the dancer that rehearses to get that movement just right. It's that ability to be able to have the patience to go back over a work that you have labored over for hours and hours but will return to again one more time to try and make it just a little bit better."

But because of the public's impatience for art, Milligan says, "There isn't time for art anymore. I think our artists are in trouble. There are a few artists that will continue doing their art no matter what and they're the ones that will keep art alive, but because of the hectic pace of the world and the rewards of artistry we're seeing a dying breed."

Milligan deems an artist as "someone who has a unique perspective on life and is able to express that perspective or that insight."

He adds, "I think everyone's got that unique vision of the world seen through their particular shade of rose-colored glasses. It's just that some people have trained themselves or have the talent to express themselves in one of the art forms."

Parents can stimulate creativity in their children, says Milligan, by spending time with them, talking to them about things, reading to them, telling stories and other activities rather than letting television fill the creative void.

Milligan and his elementary puppeteers are planning performances for each other and interested parents on March 4.

Neiwirth began studying piano at age 8 with Teala Bellini of Twin Falls. After high school he attended Hartt College of Music in Connecticut, and Manhattan School of Music in New York City. His 1980 debut in Carnegie Recital Hall

led to a finalist spot in the National Federation of Music Clubs Young Artist Competition in both 1983 and 1985.

In 1983, Neiwirth was the first musician to receive the Young Artist Grant sponsored by the Idaho Federation of Music Clubs. For two years he toured as a soloist for the Community Concerts Association and is currently teaching privately in Idaho Falls.

Patricia George, who will be performing with Neiwirth, is a teacher and director of Idaho State University's Flute Choir and Summer Flute Camp. A graduate of Eastman

School of Music, she has performed in symphonies and woodwind ensembles groups throughout the East Coast, in Texas, and travels with the Elkhorn Chamber Players. George has studied with Joseph Mariano, and world-renown flutists William Kinkaid and Julius Baker. She is married to composer Thom Ritter George.

Julianne Eberl, cellist and founder of the Elkhorn Music Festival Chamber Orchestra will round out the Monday night trio. Eberl holds degrees from New York City's Queens College and Antioch University. She has performed with symphonies and ensemble groups in New York, Massachusetts, Maine and Georgia. Eberl has recorded with the Lake Placid Sinfonietta, and is now teaching privately in Idaho Falls where she resides with her husband, Carl Eberl, conductor of

the Idaho Falls Symphony. Tickets for the concert are \$4 and are available at Judd's Books, Music Center, Warner Music, Ann's Hallmark in Twin Falls, the Bookmark in Jerome, Welch Music in Burley, and Sav Mor Drug in Buhl, or at the door. Proceeds from the concert will benefit the Twin Falls Music Club's Scholarship Fund which is available to promising young musicians throughout the Magic Valley.

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
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

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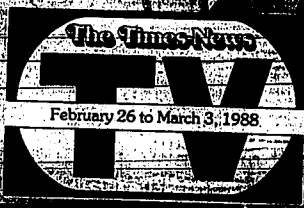

'30th Annual Grammy Awards' to showcase top recording stars

If there was an awards show for awards shows, the Grammy Awards, which air Wednesday on CBS would finish second — to the Oscars, of course.

Sure, the Academy Awards are overrated — but everyone from casual film fans to the stars themselves wants to see who wins what, and who comes with whom. The influence of the Grammys, on the other hand, is marginal. In the music industry, the top honor has always been the gold record (which measures sales), not the gold gramophone. And fans are usually indifferent.

The reasons? For one, the music business has no Hollywood, — no collegial, gossip-hungry locus of activity. For another, rock musicians have always been wary of black-tie affairs (although, as the musicians grow older, suspicions are disappearing — witness the immediate acceptance of the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame by artists and fans alike).

Most important, perhaps, the Grammy Awards encompass so many musical styles that artists can hardly be said to be competing with their peers. This year's Best Male Pop Vocal nominees range from Bruce Springsteen to Al Jarreau; for Album of the Year, Prince is up against Linda Ronstadt, Emmylou Harris and Dolly Parton, among others. Other awards recognize country & western, jazz, Latin, gospel and new age music — not forgetting soul gospel, tropical Latin and polka.

The Grammys have often served more as a publicity booster for artists in the lesser categories than as a measure of quality all around. But "The 30th Annual Grammy Awards," executive producer Pierre Cossette promises, will be different. In the top categories, 11-time winners Michael Jackson and Paul Simon are competing alongside Suzanne Vega, Los Lobos and Georgia Satellites, all full-time artists a year ago. Back as host is Billy Crystal, who won an Emmy for his role last year. And Jackson will per-



form live on the program. There are even rumors that Springsteen may show up.

Cossette says there's a simple reason for the Grammys' lack of luster. "TV pays no attention to the music industry, and that's a tremendous oversight."

The networks, he explains, refuse to accommodate live music. "Music is high-risk programming — you never know if Billy Joel is going to swear or something," he explains. "So the networks say, 'We need a script, a list of guests.' And the art-

ist just can't give them that."

Still, Cossette, who brought the Grammys to TV in 1971 and has served as executive producer ever since, feels the Grammys are superior to the Oscars.

"The Oscars are a press event, a shot heard round the world, but there's more excitement at the Grammy broadcast," he contends. "Since we've got live performers, we can get applause any time we want to. The Oscars could do that, but they don't — they put all these marginal awards in."

While he acknowledges the success of live music on such programs as "Saturday Night Live" and "Late Night with David Letterman," Cossette feels that the best music programming on TV is not on the broadcast networks.

Santa Barbara police may not be too happy with the NBC afternoon soap that takes place in their fair city, because cop Cruz Castillo (A Martinez) is such a bungler that he can't protect a flea. But the hour show has turned the corner, delivering a solid 16 share recently.

"It has become a media favorite," affirms Nancy Grahn, who plays the concise, outspoken lawyer Julia Wainwright who is in the midst of an emotional tug-of-war with lawyer Mason Capwell. "Offbeat types watch. So do businessmen and college kids. Why? Because it's sophisticated. I think of the show as the 'St. Elsewhere' of the afternoon, especially when Patrick Mulcahey is writing."

After two and a half years as Julia, cast after the initial chao, she emerges as an '80s role model who says the right things and thinks the right thoughts. Julia can hold her own intellectually, but is emotionally frazzled, according to Nancy. Yet the lawyer is strong and independent enough to raise a baby by herself.

At first, Julia remained on the periphery, an outsider with a few shows a month. Feeling wasted, Nancy asked to resign, but NBC wouldn't let her. Gradually, Julia began to take shape, with the actress battling to keep the part flexible and multi-dimensional. Nancy admits it was hard on her. But she believes there's a reason for everything and learned to change her attitude.

Julia Wainwright's love affair with Mason Capwell delights Nancy because problems between Julia and Mason parallel those of her friends. "Emotionally, Mason is closed off," says Nancy. "He may express himself intellectually, but when it comes to revealing love or pain to Julia he drinks and cuts her off."

"The drinking is no excuse. I let him have it because I don't think viewers should consider drinking as a defense. During a recent battle I realized Mason was afraid Julia would leave him, but he would do before admitting such a fear."

From Skokie, Illinois, Nancy Grahn trained at New York's Neighborhood Playhouse. For nearly a year she played Beverly on "One Life to Live," then invaded Hollywood. "I had a feel for acting," she explains, "and very supportive parents. I'm a lucky girl and for the moment I am making a good living."

ABC's 'Moonlighting' loses its glow

LOS ANGELES — If loyal fans of ABC's "Moonlighting" are gluttons for punishment, that may be an asset for watching the show this season.

Not within memory have television viewers had to put up with so much and gotten so little.

"Moonlighting" is the most disappointing show this season, and for those who loved the show it is a terrible thing to see it self-destruct right on the screen.

What made this show go, what gave it its charm and appeal, were the scenes between Cybill Shepherd as Maddie Hayes and Bruce Willis as David Addison. These two opposites, irresistibly drawn to each other in a love-hate relationship, made the screen sparkle with their witty repartee.

But Shepherd's pregnancy caused a dilemma for the show's producers. Instead of shooting around it, as most series do, they made it a part of the story. Alyce Beasley, who plays Miss Dipesto, was also pregnant, but on the show she ignored it. Besides, with her layered look, it was hard to tell.

It might have seemed a smart move at the time to incorporate Shepherd's pregnancy into the story. But it has turned into labor for the viewers.

Maddie, telling no one she was pregnant, went off to Chicago to brood with her parents. David was left to deal with her absence.

"Moonlighting" was left to slowly twist in the wind.

It was embarrassing watching the show deal with her absence. It squirmed and made up stories like someone caught in a lie. The whole point of watching "Moonlighting" was to see those two carry on like Spencer Tracy and Katharine Hepburn in "Woman of the Year." The cases they solved were merely an excuse to get them together so they could disagree.

And when Shepherd and Willis finally got back together, it wasn't any better. Forget the witty dialogue. "Moonlighting" turned into "Days of Whine and Roses."

Although Shepherd had twins, Maddie is still pregnant. She told David the baby's not his.

But the clincher was when she announced she had married a stranger — a whole new character, Dennis Dugan as a businessman.

she met on the train from Chicago on impulse. Maddie, married on impulse? Maddie, the woman who wouldn't cross the street on impulse? David is standing there with egg on his face, trying to grin through it. What a low blow. What a letdown for the audience.

Where is the famous "Dallas" shower when we need it? Tell us the season was only a dream and not a nightmare.

Maddie and David have become an unfunny, bickering couple who have overstayd their welcome. It was nice while it lasted, but the magic is gone.

Meanwhile, ABC has removed another show from its schedule. "Sledge Hammer!" a spoof on all those macho detectives, started out in the Nielsen cellar and never got out. The show deserved better.

It made its debut in September 1986 against CBS' "Dallas" and NBC's "Miami Vice." After that introduction to obscurity, ABC transferred the show to 8 o'clock Thursday, where it went up against NBC's "The Cosby Show." There it stayed until it was moved again, back to Friday against "Dallas" and "Miami Vice."

David Rasche stars as the title character, a one-man anti-crime crusade, whose idea of crime prevention is shooting a jaywalker. The show has parodied such movies as "Vertigo," "Play It Again, Sam," "A Clockwork Orange," "Dressed To Kill" and "Robocop."

It's a funny show, although its brand of satire may be difficult for some people to understand. But the main reason the show never gained an audience was its time period. It has never had a chance.

ABC says it will bring the show back later. It deserves a chance to be seen by a wider audience and not merely to be brought back in another bad time slot to play out its commitment.

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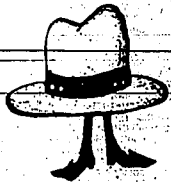
