Noriega was indicted by a federal grand jury in Miami last month for accepting \$4.6 million to protect international drug traffickers using Panama as safe haven.

A ban on Panamanian goods will paralyze a \$412 million market representing 60 percent of Panama's total exports, Delvalle said. A ban on U.S. exports to Panama will affect a 30 percent slice of all Panamanian imports, he said.

Delvalle's representatives have been attempting to seize control of

Panamanian government assets in the United States through court action, but they are now government task power illegally.

In another development, the chairman of a House Foreign Affairs task force on international narcotics control said he will ask Congress to reinstate Reagan's recent certification of five Latin American nations as having fully cooperated with U.S. efforts to eradicate narcotics cultivation and trafficking.

Task force chairman Rep. Lawrence J. Smith, D-Fla., said he will introduce legislation next week to reverse the administration's action, and decertify Mexico, Bolivia, Peru, Uruguay and the Bahamas.

He said the evidence is clear to him that none are in full cooperation with U.S. anti-narcotics efforts.

Stallings votgs for aid plan, Craig opposes it

 WASHINGTON — Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, voted Wednesday for a Democratic-written \$30.8-million aid package to the Nicaraguan contra rebels, while Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, cast his vote against it.

The House rejected the package on a 208-216 vote Wednesday evening, thus killing any contra aid for the time being.

The aid package would have provided \$14.56 million for food, clothing and medicine for the contra, \$7.54 million for medical assistance to children who are victims of the Nicaraguan conflict and \$1.44 million in humanitarian aid to the Miskito and other Indian groups in Nicaragua. The money would be spent over four months.

"Every time the Reagan administration proposal the House rejected earlier this year, the Democratic package contained no military aid to the rebels," Stallings said.

"I am satisfied that the proposal offers the balance and compromise needed to mixture and maintain bipartisan U.S. policy in Nicaragua and Central America," Stallings said in remarks entered into the Congressional Record.

"It reconciles the two principal, but opposing, concerns that further aid to the contra will upset the peace process and that more aid is needed to pressure the Sandinista government," he said.

Bonnie Limbach, Craig's press secretary, said Craig rejected the Democratic measure, in part, because it would have directed the U.S. military to deliver the aid. President Reagan's aid package called for the Central Intelligence Agency to deliver the aid.

"The Democratic package also would have directed the president to negotiate directly with the Sandinista government. Limbach said Craig believes the conflict is a civil war and that only the contra and the Sandinistas should negotiate a settlement."

"Selling products below cost is a serious matter that can have a destructive impact on the competitive and free market place," Richardson said in his letter.

He wouldn't say what he would do if gas stations refuse to comply, but violating the law is a misdemeanor punishable by a \$500 fine or six months in jail.

In the Wood River Valley, Richardson is also looking into a price situation opposite of the one in Twin Falls.

Shoshone. For instance, Hailey Chevron was selling unleaded Wednesday for \$1.04 per gallon.

"It isn't illegal to charge high prices, but it is illegal to fix the price. You have to show in court that there is an agreement to do so," Richardson said.

Peavey said the attorney generally investigates in good faith, but in the meantime, people can buy gasoline from those stations in the Wood River Valley that charge less.

"This idea is to focus the wrath of consumers to get the other stations to come down in price."

Peavey said his research showed the Chevron station in Ketchum is among the cheapest in town selling gasoline for 99 cents per gallon. A spokesman for the station refused any comment.

And there is a station in Bellevue selling gasoline for a cash price of \$1.01 per gallon, Peavey said.

But Harold Nelson, who leases a Chevron station in Hailey, said he didn't think there was price fixing in the Wood River Valley. Some stations have to charge more than others, he said.

"There is no way we can match the little guys who sell cut-rate gas and groceries. We're a full-service station. We're staying as close as we can to the other guys around," he said.

"Every time the United States turns its back on the Contras, it puts us in a less favorable position," said Contra spokeswoman Marta Sacasa. "The Sandinistas will become even more intransigent and more hard line."

"We are fighting against an enemy that doesn't give these kinds of problems. The aid from the Soviet Union has not stopped flowing to the Sandinistas," Ms. Sacasa said.

Reagan, in a letter from Brussels, said the Democratic plan "does not meet the essential criteria of maintaining military pressure on the Sandinistas."

Wright called the dispute over the aid package "a battle for peace in Nicaragua and for a constructive role for the United States in Central America as opposed to a destructive role."

Reagan, in his letter, agreed that the vote represented "a watershed in our policies toward Central America." But he said the Democratic proposal would have led to rapid debilitation of the resistance and further encouragement of Sandinista intransigence.

"The Republican alternative," he said, "would see long and painful prospects for democracy and meaningful talks toward peace."

The Democratic package included about \$16 million in food, clothing,

medicine and shelter for the rebels, intended to last at least through June and \$14 million to set up a fund to help children injured in the seven-year Nicaraguan civil war.

On Feb. 3, the House defeated, 219-211, a \$36.2 million Reagan proposal that included money for weapons and other military equipment.

In debate Thursday, both sides argued that their version would best enhance a Central American peace process.

"Our opportunity today is to counter a united position on Nicaragua for the first time in eight years," said Rep. Leo Hamilton, D-Ind., a sponsor of the Democratic package.

"It says to the Contras that the United States is not going to provide them the means to make war. But neither is the United States going to turn away from them," Hamilton said.

Cease-fire talks between the two warring sides were stalled as the debate occurred in Congress.

Sen. John Peavey, D-Carey, asked the attorney general to examine why gasoline prices are as much as 17 cents per gallon higher in the Wood River Valley compared to

any comment.

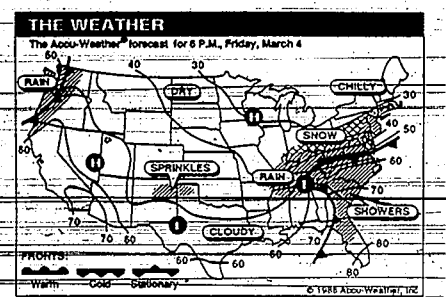

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Microwave beams target embassy

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviet Union has resumed bombardment of the U.S. Embassy in Moscow with low-intensity beams of microwave radiation, the State Department said Thursday.

"Microwave signals in the 5-11 GHz (gigahertz) range continue to be detected at the Moscow embassy chancery," the department said in a statement issued by its Bureau of Diplomatic Security.

The statement marked the department's first status report on the still-unexplained radiation problem since Nov. 10, 1983.

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Drug tests proposed for airline employees

Bill bans lie detector tests in workplace

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Transportation Department proposed a wide range of drug tests Thursday for more than a half-million airline employees from pilots to mechanics, although officials acknowledged they have no clear evidence of a drug problem in the industry.

Announcement of the drug testing program, which would go into effect after what may be a lengthy rulemaking process, came amid conflicting court cases on whether such tests are legal. A federal judge earlier this week declared random drug tests of civilian Army employees unconstitutional.

But Transportation Secretary Jim Burnley said drug testing — es-

pecially random testing — "is absolutely critical" in the aviation industry to make certain travelers are not endangered by a flight crew member, mechanic or other employee in a safety-sensitive job being impaired by drugs.

"We can't wait for weeks and months while these (drug testing) cases wind themselves through the courts," Burnley told a news conference. He said he was confident the department's testing program would eventually meet the court's approval.

The union representing more than 40,000 airline pilots accused Burnley of "headline grabbing" and questioned the need for a drug testing program in an industry where no drug problem has been shown.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Lie detectors, likened by one lawmaker to "20th-century witchcraft," would be largely banned from use in job interviews and the private workplace under legislation approved by the Senate on Thursday.

On a 69-27 vote, the Senate approved a bill co-written by Sens. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., and Orrin Hatch, R-Utah — normally adversaries on labor-management issues — outlawing about 85 percent of the current use of polygraph examinations.

Conservative opponents predicted that President Reagan would sign the legislation once a final ver-

sion of the bill has emerged from a Senate-House conference.

An estimated 2 million people, most of them jobseekers, are required to take lie detector tests every year and that number is growing exponentially, said Kennedy, who chairs the Senate's Labor and Human Resources Committee.

Hatch, the committee's ranking Republican, said an overwhelming majority of the tests are conducted in brief 15-minute sessions and under conditions that render false results between 15 percent and 50 percent of the time.

"I'm sick and tired of the way peo-

ple are using these devices," he said. "Some 320,000 honest Americans are branded as liars every single year. That's a stigma they have to wear every day the rest of their lives and careers."

Similar but more restrictive legislation was approved by the House 254-158 last November.

Kennedy said he planned to meet with Rep. Pat Williams, D-Mont., chief author of the House version, within the next two weeks to work out a plan for resolving differences between the two versions in a compromise that could win passage in both houses.

"They ban about 80 percent and we ban about 85 percent," he said, predicting the new prohibition will become law before the end of the year "with or without the president's support."

Just prior to the vote Thursday, after more than two days of debate, Senate opponents complained that the administration had softened its opposition after "breaching" last year to veto any polygraph bill.

"The administration does not have the backbone at this time to veto this bill," complained Sen. Dan Quayle, R-Ind. "They have folded up shop, caving like a house of cards."

Republican, Democratic races develop twists from 1980s

Once again, the New Hampshire primary has swayed the political field. Once again, the Republican and Democratic races are shaping up along familiar dimensions — but with some 1980s-style twists.

On the Republican side, the fight is starting to look like every GOP race since the 1950s — conservative vs. moderate. This year, however, the liberal wing of the party is dead on the presidential level. The last genuinely liberal Republican presidential hopeful, John B. Anderson, lost every primary in 1980. He finally dropped out of the race and ran as an independent.

This leaves the conservative candidates who seem to be right, righter, rightest — or more Reagan than thou.

Two of the most conservative Republican Rep. Jack F. Kemp of New York and former Delaware Gov. Pierre S. du Pont IV may have done poorly because they are not much more conservative than Vice President George Bush and Sen. Robert J. Dole of Kansas.

The contrast between Dole, who has been cast as the moderate, and Kemp, the die-hard conservative, makes the point well. In the 1980s, the liberal wing of the Reagan administration, according to Congressional Quarterly, Kemp voted against the Reagan program twice as much as Dole did — 24 percent vs. 12 percent.

Yet, during Reagan's first six years in office, the liberal Americans for Democratic Action and Kemp twice as liberal as Dole on important issues — 12 percent compared with 6 percent. The conservative

Americans for Constitutional Action and American Conservative Union, at the same time, rated Kemp as more conservative than Dole, but only slightly so.

The data are either misleading (after all, Kemp and Dole serve in different houses of Congress) or there are some subtle, and different voters or they show how close Dole and Kemp really are.

Voters, however, seem to be responding no though there are vast gulfs between them. In Iowa and New Hampshire, according to the New York Times-CBS News poll, Republican moderates were likely to back Dole. Conservatives and rock-solid Reaganites voted for Marion C. "Pat" Robertson in Iowa and Bush in New Hampshire.

If the Bush-Dole race takes the form of past Republican contests, Dole will probably do best in the Northeast and Midwest, where GOP moderates abound. Bush will run up his highest totals in the conservative heartland — the South and far West.

Already the historical patterns are re-establishing themselves: Iowa, which was friendly to moderate Republicans Gerald R. Ford in 1976 and Bush in 1980, went for Dole. In 1988 Bush took New Hampshire, an unusually conservative state for the Northeast, a state that Reagan carried in 1980.

These are, of course, crude generalizations.

There are states in each region, like Connecticut where Bush has family roots, that will be exceptions. Perhaps the greatest problem will be Robertson's ability to cut into Bush's natural base in the South and Dole's in the rural Midwest, where Robertson's brand of religious and political fundamentalism is strong.

The GOP nominee will have to walk a fine line between wooing the new voters: Robertson has drawn into the process and attracting the yuppies who may be the long-term best hope for Republicans.

If the Democratic race continues to shape up as a contest among Rep. Richard A. Gephardt of Missouri, Massachusetts Gov. Michael S. Dukakis and the Rev. Jesse L. Jackson, voters will begin to feel that they have seen it all before.

As in 1984, there will be a candidate of the Midwestern rust belt and traditional labor unions (Walter F. Mondale in 1984, Gephardt today), a spokesman for the new, high-tech industries who has ties to the Kennedys (Gary W. Hart four years ago, Dukakis in 1988), and Jackson drawing on the oppressed and dispossessed.

Just as Mondale, Hart and Jackson debated how the country should respond to these shifts, Gephardt, Dukakis and Jackson emerged last year as the chief spokesperson, respectively, for trade retaliation, increased productivity and greater control over multinational corporations.

The roots of this rift extend further back than 1984. Indeed, since 1960 there has been a division in the Democratic Party

that could be defined as liberal vs. moderate.

As with the Republicans, the ideological gap among Democrats has narrowed. The differences between Mondale and Hart or Gephardt and Dukakis, have more to do with which sector of the economy each favors than with broad differences in issues.

Only Jesse Jackson can claim to stand appreciably to the left of anyone.

These fissures have produced bases of support for each candidate. Gephardt's geographic base is likely to be the Southern and border states, the industrial Northeast and the states bordering the Great Lakes.

Dukakis should run best in New England. He is its favorite son and his wing of the party usually runs well where the service sector and high technology are important. The West, including delegate-rich California, is likely to prove hospitable as well.

The patterns are already emerging: Gephardt-like his fellow friend of Inbar Mondale, carried Iowa. As his fellow high-tech advocate Hart did in 1984, Dukakis, like Hart, swept New Hampshire.

Jackson, a Texas native, has the potential to draw many black voters from Gephardt's Southern flank. Moreover, white southern Democrats may be attracted by Tennessee Sen. Albert Gore Jr.

Gephardt and Dukakis also are well aware of the tricky balancing act that the Democratic nominee must perform. On one

side are the white Southerners, the main swing voters in recent presidential politics. Only by doing reasonably well with this constituency can the Democrats hope to regain the White House.

On the other side are black voters, whose level of turnout has often made the difference in statewide races, especially in the South and in the Northern industrial states where most blacks live.

Like the fine-line GOP must tread between Robertson and the yuppies, Democrats must balance Jackson with the good 'ol boys (and girls).

The race in each party boils down to a contest between two candidates.

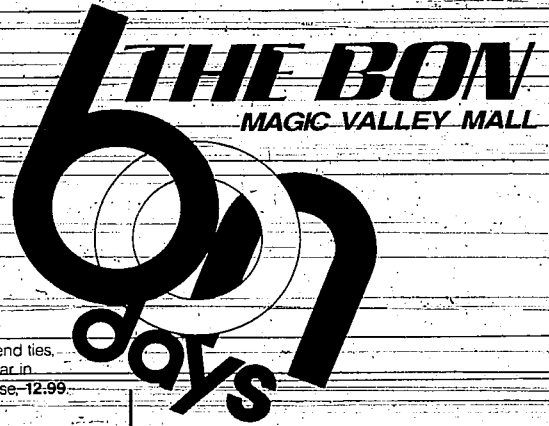
Should the Republicans stress the legacy of Reagan and choose Bush?

Should they go for a more down-home approach and opt for Dole? Or should they play the social issues and select Robertson? Should the Democrats go for hard hats and lunch-buckets with Gephardt or should they opt for computers and Belgian omelet with Dukakis? Or will they go for good old American populism with Jackson?

In neither party is the choice one of deep contrasts over issues. It may be that neither party offers a program that can deal adequately with the country's international economic and political decline. But by now we should be used to campaigns that avoid the really tough questions.

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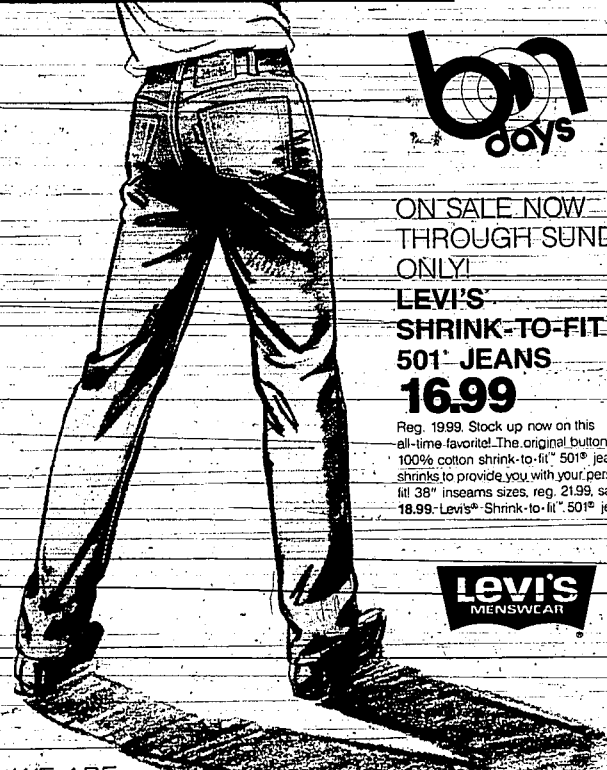

Election losses force tough racial choices for S. Africa

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — President P.W. Botha said Thursday that his party's election losses to the far right were "temporary disappointments," but they will force tough choices about his cautious reform of racial policy.

Leaders of the Conservative Party were jubilant about the decisive victory over the National Party in two parliamentary by-elections Wednesday. They said it shows increasing numbers of whites want apartheid strengthened and oppose even a token role for the black majority in national politics.

Botha must decide whether to appease those voters or move ahead with reforms in spite of them. The far right sees his goal of limited power-sharing as surrender. Most black leaders and white liberals reject it as inadequate.

One of the few black leaders showing any sympathy for Botha was Kenneth Mopeli, chief minister of the Qwaqwa tribal homeland, who said the election results "spell disaster for the country."

"They not only signify a triumph for the policy of partition and fragmentation of the country, but also mean that the principle of power-sharing espoused by the National Party has been effectively opposed," he said.

Under Botha's concept of power-sharing, South Africa's 26 million blacks would have a voice in national policy but the 5 million

whites would retain control. He is unlikely to push for changes dramatic enough to win support from major black leaders, but made clear Thursday he does not want to be seen as caving in to the far right.

Economic, social and political reform must continue, the president said, but he cautioned in the same statement: "Excessive demands of ton lead to excessive reactions."

Skiers take off on polar journey

CAPE ARCTIC, U.S.S.R. (AP)

Four Canadian and nine Soviet skiers set off Thursday under a hazy, primrose-colored Arctic sunset to cross the North Pole and make a statement about East-West cooperation.

The 19 men face not only a 1,073-mile trek, but also must eat and sleep in the same tent for 100 days.

The journey got off to a late and rocky start from the snowy fields of ice floes that link this northernmost tip of the archipelago known as Severnaya Zemlya — which means "Northern Land" — with the polar ice cap.

Their faith was tested on the eve of their departure when expedition leader Dmitri Shparo proposed expanding the Soviet team to nine members.

"It was an 11th-hour decision," said Canadian team leader Richard Weber, revealing some of the uncertainty his countrymen felt in allowing a further shifting of numbers in favor of the Soviets.

"But when we sat down, we couldn't come up with any good reasons why not." Weber and Shparo met with Western and Soviet reporters at a remote encampment on Sredny Island, 93 miles south of this departure point.

Shparo termed the Canadian concession "magnanimous."

Weber said Shparo informed him Wednesday that he didn't want to cut from the team any of the Soviets, who had been in training.

By morning, which arrives late on the Severnaya Zemlya, spirits were high and the explorers lumbered through crowded barracks weighing packs and redistributing gear.

An Mi-6 helicopter shuttled the skiers and a small group of journalists to the starting point, a windswept jumble of ice floes frozen into a single, white expanse that stretches 1,240 miles to the Canadian Arctic.

Tension flares on W. Bank

JERUSALEM (AP) — An Arab stabbed a teen-age Jewish settler in the back Thursday as he shopped for the Jewish Purim holiday in the occupied West Bank city of Hebron, the army and witnesses said.

Minutes later, angry Jewish settlers attacked photographers taking pictures there, witnesses said.

Elsewhere in the West Bank, Israeli troops wounded four Palestinians in violent protests.

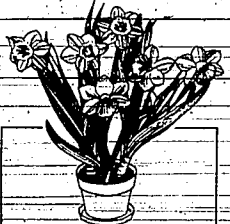
On the diplomatic front, U.S. Secretary of State George P. Shultz arrived in Israel Thursday night for a last-ditch effort to sell his peace proposal. He was met by Foreign Minister Shimon Peres, but no statements were made.

Legislators of Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir's right-wing Likud bloc have rejected the U.S. proposal, saying they will not agree to an international conference or to the exchange of land for peace.

The scuffles in Hebron, 20 miles south of Jerusalem, began shortly after a 16-year-old settler Aharon Peretz was stabbed.

The army said later Peretz was treated for slight injuries at a Jerusalem hospital and released.

A photographer on assignment for Time magazine was struck with her camera by enraged Jewish settlers. She fell to the ground unconscious, with a one-inch gash in her forehead that required five stitches.



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MOSCOW (AP) — A government spokesman said Thursday some people were killed in the southern city of Sumgait during weekend riots, which he said were provoked by "hoologans" reacting to rumors of ethnic confrontation.

Foreign Ministry spokesman Gennady Gerasimov gave the first official confirmation of deaths during the riots in the Caucasian republic of Azerbaijan, but would not say how many people were killed.

"Even one single life lost is already much too much," Gerasimov said when asked at a news briefing about a claim by Armenian dissidents that 17 people were killed at Sumgait, an industrial city of more than 160,000.

Trouble between ethnic Azerbai-

janis and ethnic Armenians began early last month with a dispute over Nagorno-Karabakh, a region just north of Iran and east of Turkey. More than three-quarters of the population is Armenian but it was made part of neighboring Azerbaijan in 1923.

Protesters in Nagorno-Karabakh demanded that it be joined to Armenia and peaceful protests spread to Yerevan, capital of Soviet Armenia.

Riots were reported Sunday in Sumgait, 160 miles from Nagorno-Karabakh.

"A group of mutineers, of hoologans, provoked disorders," Gerasimov said. "These riots involved people who fell for provocative rumors and instigations with respect to

what happened in Nagorno-Karabakh.

"Using the situation of spontaneity, the instigators of violence participated in actions which led to casualties."

On Wednesday, an employee of the television station in Baku, capital of Azerbaijan, said one or two people had been killed in Sumgait. He spoke in a telephone interview on condition of anonymity.

The television worker said 50-60 young ethnic Azerbaijanis who live in Armenia traveled to Sumgait last weekend and told relatives and friends about ethnic confrontations. He said "young hoologans" then went on a rampage and killed people.

Timetable for withdrawal set

GENEVA (AP) — Pakistan and Afghanistan agreed Thursday on a nine-month timetable for the withdrawal of Red Army troops from Afghanistan and said half the Soviet soldiers should be out of the country in the first 90 days.

The two points had long hindered progress toward a settlement aimed at ending nine years of fighting in Afghanistan, where an estimated 115,000 Soviet troops are backing the government against Moslem guerrillas.

But a U.N. report released Thurs-

day warned that success at the Geneva talks could leave another primary problem unresolved: the return of more than 5 million Afghan refugees who have fled to neighboring Pakistan and Iran.

The report said the refugees are unlikely to return unless the Afghan government of President Najib is replaced by one that includes opposition and refugee representation.

That didn't dampen the optimism of Afghan Foreign Minister Abdul Wakil, who told reporters, "Nothing

important stands in the way of concluding a settlement. From our side, things could be regarded as finalized."

He said U.N. officials had established that "all refugees want to return."

Agreement on the withdrawal timetable had been widely expected.

"When the U.N.-mediated talks began nearly six years ago, Moscow offered a four-year withdrawal span and gradually lowered this."

Last month, Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev said the estimated 115,000 Red Army troops could be out of Afghanistan within 10 months starting in mid-May if a Geneva settlement was signed by the middle of this month.

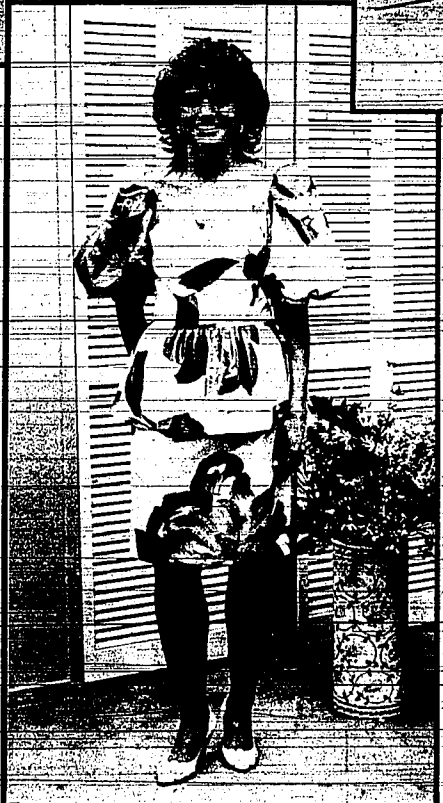
Wakil said he was confident that remaining "other issues," which he did not specify, also would be resolved.

"Pakistan could abide by the tacit and formal agreement not to raise anything new," Pakistan represents the insurgents in the talks.

Pakistan has said that a successful settlement must be accompanied by formation of a broad-based transitional government to replace the Afghan government.

Pakistan's chief delegate, acting Foreign Minister Zahir Noorani, reaffirmed that position to reporters after meeting with mediator Diego Cordovez, who shuttled between the two sides for 2½ hours Thursday.

"We are firmly convinced that a settlement without creating circumstances of peace and stability in Afghanistan will not persuade 6 million Afghan refugees to return," Noorani said.



German hostage released

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) — Pro-Iranian kidnapers freed West German hostage Ralph Schray in west Beirut on Thursday after holding him for five weeks, and he was turned over to the West German Embassy in Damascus.

The West German charge d'affaires, Klaus Auenhahn, refused to make any comments to reporters as he shuttled between the embassy and the Foreign Ministry about a mile apart in the Syrian capital.

He said it was "not worthwhile" for them to wait around, indicating that Schray would not appear in public.

This raised speculation the former captive may not be as well as Bonn portrayed him to be after his ordeal. The Bonn Foreign Ministry had said earlier that Schray, 30, was in "good physical condition."

Friedhelm Ost, the West German government's chief spokesman in Bonn, said only that the Syrian government had handed Schray over to embassy officials.

Schray, a Lebanese-born industrial engineer, was freed before dawn. A Syrian military source in the Lebanese capital said he was driven the 55 miles to Damascus under heavy Syrian escort.

On Wednesday, the Holy Warriors for Freedom claimed responsibility for Schray's abduction, and said he would be freed within hours as a result of Syrian mediation.

The official Syrian Arab News Agency said Foreign Minister Farouq al-Sharraf contacted his German counterpart, Hans-Dietrich Genscher, by telephone to report that Schray has been released and was safe in the hands of Syrian troops in Lebanon.

The agency said Genscher "expressed his deep gratitude to Syrian President Hafez Assad for all the efforts Syria has exerted and reiterated Bonn's determination to consolidate the traditional ties between the two nations."

Cuts slow space launches

WASHINGTON (AP) — Budget cuts imposed by Congress will lead to a slowdown in the Air Force's space-launch operations this year and layoffs of as many as 500 contractor employees, the service said Thursday.

The roughly 28,000 civilian employees who work directly for the Air Force Systems Command, however, should not have to endure any unpaid furloughs, the service added.

Gen. Bernard P. Randolph has ordered a slow-

down in operations at Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif., and Cape Canaveral Air Force Station, Fla., the service said. That move will force the contractors who operate the two space-launch facilities to trim their work forces and delay some scheduled space launches, the Air Force said.

The command also is offering early retirement to employees, cutting spending on travel, supplies and maintenance, and enforcing a hiring freeze.

Ozone hole may be growing

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The amount of methane gas in the atmosphere has risen 11 percent since 1978, possibly speeding the seasonal loss of protective ozone above Antarctica but blocking the same depletion over the rest of the Earth, researchers say.

"We're changing the atmosphere in a rather rapid way. It's hard to tell what the eventual consequences will be, but there are several ways it may have a strong impact on

man," said F. Sherwood Rowland, a chemist at the University of California, Irvine, whose study will be published Friday in the journal Science. The NASA-funded study by Rowland and UCI chemist Donald R. Blake also suggests that atmospheric methane could aggravate global warming by the "greenhouse effect," but that the rate of increase of the gas slowed slightly during the past five years. Methane is the major component of natural gas, but about 80 percent of atmospheric methane comes from decomposition in rice paddies, swamps and the guts of cows, with some contribution from wood digestion in termites, Rowland said. Humans are responsible for increased methane levels because they are raising more cows and growing more rice than ever and chopping down tropical forests, which provides food for more termites.


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
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
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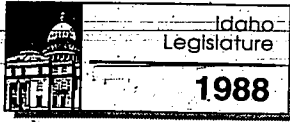
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Committee refuses to print bill for further discussion

No negotiators at bargaining table for teachers

BOISE — The House Education Committee gazed even the suggestion Thursday that teachers, in addition to school boards, be allowed to seat professional negotiators around the bargaining table.

Idaho Education Association lobbyist Jim Shackelford said the change would create "an even playing field" instead of the one dominated since 1971 by school boards and their paid assistants.

The IEA proposal called for either both sides hiring negotiators or neither side would. This would expand the current restriction against teachers fielding negotiators who are not full-time district employees.

But school boards and administrators countered that teachers already have the upper hand, through state-wide national coordination of such groups as IEA.

"They (school boards) simply don't have the financial resources to provide the support staff," said Rick Van

Hemert, executive director of the Idaho Association of School Administrators.

Twin Falls School District administrator Doyt Simcoe listed for the committee a half-dozen paid assistants the Twin Falls Educators' Association, used who were simply barred from direct negotiations.

"The teachers' association is very capable and competent in the skills associated with bargaining," said Simcoe, who has participated in negotiations since 1980.

Twin Falls Superintendent Carl Snow said after the

hearing there was no question IEA assists with paid employees, even though they are restricted from the bargaining chambers.

"They already do it, you know it," Snow said.

Following a breathless half-hour hearing that featured eight speakers, the committee rejected even printing the bill for further discussion.

Rep. Ron Black, R-Twin Falls, was the lone Magic Valley legislator supporting introduction of the bill while fellow Republican Reps. Celia Gould, of Buhl; Doug Jones, of Filer; and Russ Newcomb, of Twin Falls, each opposed it. Chairman Ernest Hale, R-Burley, votes only to break a tie and so didn't vote Thursday.

Opponents feared the proposal would mean neither side would have paid negotiators, so school boards would be victimized by the teachers network.

Gould asked Shackelford about teachers having support people down the hall from the talks, while board members would be more isolated.

"This is probably the most important obstacle to getting this law changed," conceded Shackelford, who noted teachers' negotiators could be down the hall in the caucus room.

Newcomb observed that school board members are lay people like legislators.

The amount of money paid negotiators was also discussed.

Often, district negotiators are hired by the Idaho School Boards Association, which paid \$6,000 for the Twin Falls team based in western Washington.

ISBA Executive Director Alan Smith justified the price tag because board members "can't run off to Portland for a week or 10 days to brush up on all they need to know."

On the other hand, Shackelford said after the hearing, "The IEA could take on someone like (IEA Regional Director) Terry Gilbert without having to pay any more money (and) instead of having him down the hall in the caucus room."

Input on Niagara dam site sought

WENDELL — A 30-day public comment period begins today on an Idaho Power Company permit application for a permanent dam and water diversion structure at Niagara Springs.

Burks has sent out petitions "the way from Burley to King's Hill and north to Stanley," he said.

"I'm getting pretty good support from just about everyone except Idaho Power," Burks said, with a shrug.

The petitions will be sent to the Army Corps of Engineers, which is collecting the public comment. The corps has the authority to issue or refuse the permit as part of its jurisdiction over all water diversion projects.

Last spring, Idaho Power applied for a permit from the corps to build a concrete water diversion structure at Niagara Springs for itself and Rim View. A permit was granted based on the plan submitted.

Through a misunderstanding of the requirements, though, Idaho Power and Rim View built the structure larger than the approved plan allowed and built an additional structure it had no permit for.

The result is an expense that has destroyed the aesthetic value of the springs, Burks said, in addition to diverting more water from the flow than the two companies are allotted.

The corps, which has jurisdiction over all water diversion projects, has forced Idaho Power to resubmit permit applications on the structure.

The corps will be sending out official notice of the permit request today, said Dean Hilliard, chief of the corps' regulation branch in Walla Walla, Wash.

A 30-day public comment period begins today. At the end of the 30 days, the corps will decide whether a public hearing should also be held, said Brad Daly, an environmental resource specialist with the corps in Walla Walla.

The corps will hold a hearing only if it decides new information could be obtained from it, Daly said.

"In this case a public hearing probably will not be warranted," he said. "It seems the concerns are mostly aesthetic ones."

But the decision about a hearing, also will be made based on the level of controversy, Daly said.

Trustee Ward Rulien asked Taylor if the district was considering any changes from the current practice of scheduling boys' games on weekends and girls' games during the week.

Taylor said the fourth district

had voted that the girls would play Tuesdays and Thursdays and the boys play Fridays and Saturdays, over the year.

"Some of the other states now in fact there was just a recent law in Montana — have been challenged about — equal time for boys and girls," he said. "This has been discussed in fourth district and it has been voted on, to

stay as it is. Until there is enough pressure from school boards or parents or whoever, I see it staying the same."

He said the procedure is to schedule the conference games first and then to schedule the fourth district games. He said Glenna Ferry is trying not to lose Mountain Home, because it has always been the best game.

Athletic Director Brent Taylor says it comes down to money. He also believes activities are not a luxury, but an important part of high school education.

The average honor student belonged to 12 different clubs and activities, according to the study.

"There is a great deal more to education than formal curriculum," Taylor said in a written statement. "Our school has the responsibility of providing an environment where not only academic but also social growth can take place. Academic help permeates that atmosphere where students can learn to deal with their moods and peer pressure. They learn to make different social adjustments when following rules and regulations, learning to budget their time and making realistic decisions concerning goals."

In contrast, the study showed that of the eight students who dropped out of school this year, not one was involved in activities.

The study did not address the participation of average students in extracurricular activities, nor address the influence of parental support.

The study also showed that during the the present school year, 76 percent of the student body is involved with activities affiliated with the Idaho High School Activities Association, including competitive sports, music and drama. At least 40 percent of all students participate in at least two IHSAA activities.

Taylor said that what he was doing was trying to show that activities do not hurt students, that they thrive on hard work. If they can get one student to stay in school because he is interested in activities, he is better off than dropping out, he said.

Loan of fire truck spurs negligence suit; dismissal sought

TWIN FALLS — An insurance company has asked 5th District Court to dismiss a lawsuit filed against it by two other insurance companies stemming from a 1985 fire that destroyed a \$200,000 Kimberly home.

The civil case stemmed from a Jan. 11, 1985, fire that destroyed the home of Charles and Doris Woodland. The Woodlands, who lived six miles south of Kimberly, sustained an estimated total \$326,812 loss in the fire.

Twin Falls County Mutual Fire Insurance Company asked 5th District Court to dismiss a lawsuit against

it, saying it only provided the fire truck and nothing more.

"The Woodlands did not have any kind of a contract with Twin Falls Mutual's attorney," said Leon E. Smith Jr., Twin Falls County Mutual had to do with this fire is that it's a fire truck — the fire truck that is on loan to Kimberly Fire Department."

The Kimberly Fire Department responded to the fire, along with trucks from Filer, Hollister and Hansen.

The fire apparently started in a fireplace and was controlled once firefighters say.

According to fire reports filed with the original com-

plaint, firefighters were called to the Woodland home shortly before 5 p.m. Jan. 11, 1985. About 4 a.m. the next day the last firefighters left after spending several hours extinguishing hot spots.

However, the lawsuit alleges that after the last firefighter left about 3 a.m. the next morning the fire re-kindled and substantially destroyed the Woodland home.

The Woodlands and their insurance company, North Pacific Insurance Co., sued the company that constructed the fireplace. That lawsuit, against Baxter and Company, resulted in Baxter's insurance company, North Pacific, paying a \$127,500 settlement.

Now, North Pacific and Farmers Alliance Mutual In-

urance Company, which insured Baxter, want to collect money from Twin Falls Mutual.

Both Woodland's and Baxter's insurance companies say Twin Falls County Mutual is guilty of negligence, negligent hiring and negligent performance of services.

But Smith argued both companies have given up their right to sue because of the first settlement.

"What they're trying to do is rope somebody else into that. They're going to sue the fire company and suing the people who provided the truck," Smith said.

"The fire was very difficult to extinguish because of the type of construction and the heavy use of cellulose insulation in the vaulted area of the ceiling," the reports said.

Collins, who had 10 points at halftime, wheeled inside for 21 for the game as fourth-ranked and top-seeded CSI, which just nipped Snow in a 64-61 upset, defeated the eighth-seeded Snow Badgers for an 84-78 victory.

The Eagles, now 29-3, will advance against the College of Eastern Utah in one tournament semifinal game tonight at 6 p.m. in the

Diablo College Fieldhouse. The fourth-seeded CSI Eagles got to the semifinals by beating the Malloy, 85-84, Thursday on a last-second shot by William Allen.

Third-seeded Salt Lake Community College sent sixth-seed North Idaho home on the short end of a 101-92 decision Thursday and will line up tonight at 8 against second-seeded Dixie College, which handled seventh-seeded Ricks with relative ease in the nightcap.

CSI, which just nipped Snow in Ephraim, Utah, last weekend, found itself behind 41-40 at intermission, although that was a two-point improvement from last Saturday night. The Badgers appeared to put CSI in difficult straights and moved ahead 56-51 in the first 3 1/2

minutes of second half.

But Snow, which to that point had shooting percentages of 75 percent, then missed five straight field goal attempts and Collins came to the fore. He hit a three-point goal and then two more field goals to put CSI up and Cito deSilveira added a follow shot.

The Eagles never trailed again, but it was tied at 65-65 with 7 minutes to play.

"I decided to go to my strength," Collins said, "go to the boards and play the best defense I can."

About the same time CSI got another bit of help when Snow's quick point guard Ron Green picked up his fourth foul and went for a rest with 8:08 remaining. Green's ball-handling and quickness had made

the Badgers pressure-proof and he picked up 21 points.

But near the two-minute mark, a Collins steal led to a slam by Bryan Tucker and CSI pretty well had things in hand at 79-70. The Badgers closed to within four points as the Eagles missed some free throws, but then Dale Karst, deSilveira and Keith Reynolds hit from the free throw line to the victory.

"It was typical of most tournaments — in the first round," said Coach Fred Trenkle. "This game reminded me very much of last year when we watched a team play, decided it was bad and almost lost to them the next day. I felt we worked hard defensively, but they were just knocking the ball down."

Trenkle referred to Snow hitting

15 of 23 from the floor in the first half and 28 for 45 for the night.

"They were getting all the loose balls and we definitely talked about that at halftime," Trenkle said. "They appeared to be the hungrier team and they got every loose ball, especially in the first half, and that's a sure sign of our not being ready. And I really thought we were ready for this one."

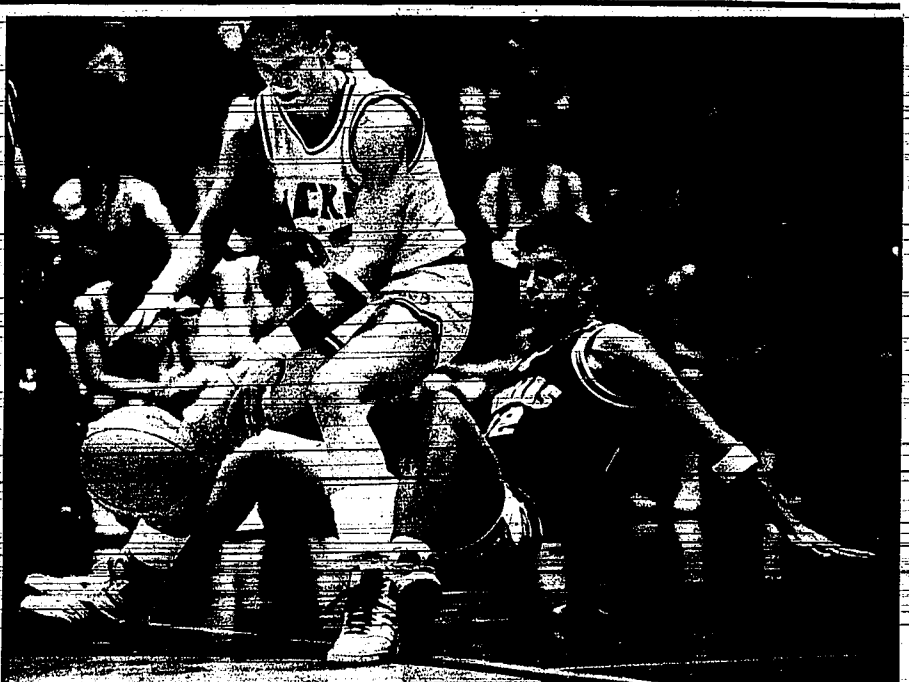

Nation's productivity declines sharply

WASHINGTON (AP) — Improvement in the nation's efficiency in churning out goods and services slowed by almost half last year despite revised figures showing higher output in the fourth quarter, the government said Thursday.

The Labor Department said productivity among non-farm businesses responsible for three-fourths of the nation's economic activity rose at an annual rate of 0.5 percent in the fourth quarter in contrast to a contraction of 0.2 percent reported in preliminary figures last month.

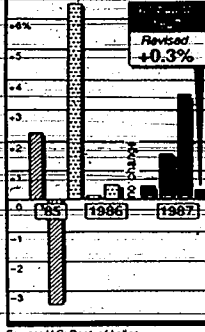
The revisions raised the productivity improvement for the entire year from 0.8 percent to 0.9 percent, slightly more than the 0.6 percent gain of 1986, despite the lowest hourly labor cost increase in more than four decades.

The efficiency improvements for the year were the smallest since 1982, when an economic downturn had cut output so much that productivity actually declined 0.6 percent from 1981.

"Anything less than 1 percent is a disappointing number," said Roger Brinner, an economist for Data Resources Inc. of Lexington, Mass., who gives you very little room to buffer

Productivity in manufacturing improved 3.3 percent over the year unchanged from the preliminary figures — with output up 4.3 percent and hours worked up 1 percent.

That combination dropped the labor costs associated with each product coming out of the nation's factories by an average 1.9 percent in 1987, the report said. "Frankly, we don't foresee much improvement in productivity this year," said Donald Straszheim, chief economist for Merrill Lynch. "Productivity improvements require rapid growth and we haven't been experiencing much of that lately."

Takeover speculation marks inconclusive trade

NEW YORK (AP) — Stock prices went their own extremely different ways Thursday in an inconclusive session marked by intense takeover speculation and some selling of blue-chip stocks.

The Dow Jones average of 30 big-name industrials slipped 7.80 to 2,063.93.

Advancing issues outnumbered declines by about 9 to 8 on the New York Stock Exchange, with 793 up, 707 down and 454 unchanged.

Big Board volume totaled 203.31 million shares, against 199.63 million in the previous session. The NYSE's composite index edged up

at 160.70. Koppers Co. jumped 6 1/2 to 51 1/2. An investment group including the Wall Street firm of Shearson Lehman Hutton Inc. began a \$45-million offer for the company, and traders quickly concluded that a higher bid or bids might be in the offing.

Takeover rumors and speculation swirled around such other stocks as Texas Eastern, up 2 1/2 to 32, and Firestone Tire & Rubber, up 2 1/2 to 49 1/2.

Home Depot rose 1 1/4 to 24 1/2. The stock was added to Standard & Poor's 500-stock composite index,

prompting by index funds set up to track the performance of the 500.

Bankruptcy court turns wine over to bank

BOISE (AP) — Idaho State Bank now owns nearly a quarter million bottles of Petros and Spring Creek wine, following a decision in U.S. Bankruptcy Court.

The wine has been stored in warehouses for two months while Boise winery owner Pete Eliopoulos and the bank fought over it in court.

Bankruptcy Judge Alfred Hagan Tuesday approved an agreement allowing the bank to take the wine.

Meanwhile, the settlement ensures that Eliopoulos may pursue in 4th District Court his multi-million-dollar claims that the bank interfered in the operation of the Winery at Spring Creek. The bank, headquartered at the Glenns Ferry, has denied the allegations.

The inventory includes Chardonnay, Riesling and other varieties. It is not known how the 20,000 cases of wine will be sold, said bank attorney Randall Paterman.

The wine has been valued at more than \$1 million, about the same amount the bank says it is owed by Northwest Land Management, which operated Spring Creek northwest of Boise.

Eliopoulos was the sole owner of Northwest Land; after acquiring the assets of winemaker Bill Broich and another partner in 1987, he closed down Spring Creek and opened the Petros Winery in the place. He later took Northwest Land into bankruptcy, thus leaving the wine inventory.

Meanwhile, other creditors of Northwest Land are opposed to the settlement. Eliopoulos has said their unsecured claims may total as much as \$1.5 million.

It is not clear yet whether all the wine can be sold. The "appellation" records, tracing the path of the grapes from the vineyard to the bottle, were missing until copies were found recently. But they must pass inspection by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms before the wine is sold.

Incentives, GM boost auto sales

LOS ANGELES (AP) — U.S. sales of new autos totaled 892,743 units in February, up from 874,806 units in the earlier comparable period.

Domestic cars alone rose 11.9 percent in February from 558,953 in 1987 to 629,063 in 1988. Imported cars rose 7.4 percent, from 217,855 units to 243,700 units.

Among the domestic auto manufacturers, Ford's sales rose 8.1 percent; Chrysler sales climbed 17.1 percent; and Volkswagen's sales rose 0.4 percent.

Honda's U.S.-built car sales fell 4.9 percent, while Toyota's U.S. car sales rose 3.7 percent. Toyota marked its first ever car sale in Corolla in the fall of 1986.

Mazda sold 1,826 U.S.-built autos, there are no comparable year-to-year figures, as Mazda started its U.S.-built auto production in September 1987.

Nissan, which has had dismal sales all year, reported that its U.S.-built car sales fell 37.0 percent in February.

In its attempt to live sales, Nissan announced that it was implementing its first ever cash-back consumer incentive program on some domestic and imported autos.

Among the imported vehicle manufacturers, Honda's sales fell 7.5 percent; Nissan's sales fell 42.8 percent; and Volvo's sales dropped 23.5 percent.

Subaru's sales dropped 21 percent, while Mitsubishi's sales fell 6.5 percent.

Sales of imported cars were up for Toyota, Mazda, VW, and Hyundai, however. They reported sales gains of 16.7 percent, 75.9 percent, 46.8 percent, and 16.0 percent.

NYSE chief will leave

NEW YORK (AP) — Robert J. Birnbaum will step down as president and chief operating officer of the New York Stock Exchange when his contract expires at the end of May and will be succeeded by Richard A. Grasso, the Big Board said Thursday.

Birnbaum, 60, who became NYSE president in 1985 after eight years as president of the American Stock Exchange, said in a statement he is interested in pursuing other interests and opportunities, including membership on corporate boards and possibly an association with a major law firm.

His successor, Grasso, 41, is a 20-year veteran of the NYSE who has served as its executive vice president for capital markets since 1986 and is a member of the exchange's management committee.

There was no indication that Birnbaum's departure was related to his performance during or after the 1987 stock market collapse.

The NASDAQ composite index for the day was 2,163.37, up from 2,159.50 the day before.

Grasso is known for his expertise with the exchange's computers and communications systems, which are becoming increasingly critical. He is responsible for upgrades of the systems that will allow the NYSE to manage volume of 600 million shares a day by June as efficiently as it manages 225 million shares currently.

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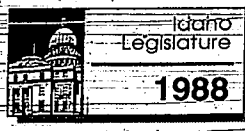


Senate approves abolition of full-time state tax commission

BOISE (AP) — After going through a bitter partisan battle on an appointment, a bipartisan majority of the state Senate approved legislation abolishing the full-time, four-member tax commission and turning over most tax matters to an administrator.

"We've had much conversation about politics this session," Sen. Herb Carlson, R-Engle. "This seems to me a move to put government back in the business of providing services to the people and this is an opportunity to move some politics."

The measure to the House for final action. The decision comes less than two months after the



battle over Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus' appointment of Republican Larry Jackson to a traditionally GOP seat on the commission. The Republican Senate majority staunchly opposed to Jackson's appointment because he had abandoned the party

two years ago to support Andrus' reelection campaign.

Under the Senate bill, sponsored by veteran Republican Phil Batt of Wilder and backed by Andrus, the current commission, which now oversees all aspects of tax policy in the state, would become a part-time board in mid-1989 responsible only for property tax policy.

"That was the commission's stature prior to 1987."

The remainder of state tax policy would be placed in the hands of a single administrator appointed by the governor with Senate confirmation.

Batt maintained that the commission's need to tend to other tax matters has allowed it to become less sensitive to county assessor problems and the property tax in general, creating a great deal of animosity toward the state among local assessors. Returning the commission to its former standing should help improve those relations, he said.

In addition, Batt said, "It's a chance to make government more efficient."

But opponents of the bill contended that instead of taking partisanship out of state tax operations it would only inject it. Sen. Rachel Gilbert, R-Boise, maintained that

the current commission has performed in a nonpartisan manner, but with equal numbers of Democrats and Republicans on the panel, lawmakers have always had free access to tax information.

"If you put an appointed person in the place of the four we have now, I'm concerned it will become partisan and unapproachable for Republicans as long as we have a Democrat as governor."

Batt agreed the concern was a valid one, but maintained that the principle undercuts itself since there has been no attempt to replace all other state agency directors with bipartisan commissions.

Law violation deliberate

DRIGGS (AP) — One of the people charged with operating a snowmobile in the Jedediah Smith Wilderness Area admits he broke the law but said it was a deliberate act to draw attention to the area.

David Hartshorn of Driggs said in an interview Wednesday he was one of the first 10 drivers to be charged the U.S. Forest Service with operating a motorized vehicle in a wilderness area.

Hartshorn said he's against a ban on snowmobiles in wilderness areas and is working to have the law amended. He said he is writing a letter to be presented at a wilderness hearing next Thursday in Idaho Falls.

Snowmobiles "do absolutely no harm in wilderness areas," he said.

Jury won't impose sentence

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — 7th District Judge Larry Boyle has refused a defense request to have a jury sentence convicted slayer Paul Ezra Rhoades for the murder of Idaho Falls teacher Susan Micholbacher.

Boyle ruled on the motion Thursday and at the same time rejected a defense request to select a jury for Rhoades' next trial in Coeur d'Alene.

Rhoades, 31, was convicted of first-degree murder in the slaying of Mrs. Micholbacher and is on trial at Blackfoot this week for a second slaying. In April, he faces a third first-degree murder charge in Bonanza, Idaho.

Idaho's laws require the judge to hold a sentencing hearing, to consider mitigating and aggravating circumstances before deciding whether to impose the death penalty or life imprisonment. Rhoades' sentencing hearing is scheduled to open March 16.

Prosecution offering case

BLACKFOOT (AP) — The prosecution began presenting evidence in a Bingham County courtroom Thursday in the second first-degree murder trial this year for convicted murderer Paul Ezra Rhoades.

Blackfoot Police Detective Paul Newbold described the details of the initial investigation into the slaying of Stacy Dawn Baldwin, a 21-year-old clerk at the Red Mini Barn convenience store in Blackfoot.

The case was found dead on Feb. 26, 1987, on a gravel road about three miles north of Blackfoot. Prosecutors contended Rhoades abducted and shot her to death after robbing the store about midnight on the day Mrs. Baldwin's body was found.

Lawyer heads rights group

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Coeur d'Alene attorney Norm Giesel has been named to succeed the Rev. Bill Wassmuth as head of the Kootenai County Task Force on Human Relations.

Giesel, 47, received unanimous endorsement by the task force board Wednesday night.

Wassmuth, whose home was the target Sept. 15, 1986, of a pipe bomb allegedly planted by white supremacists, announced in January that he was leaving his post as pastor of St. Pius X Church for undisclosed reasons.

ACLU sues over jail status

MOSCOW (AP) — Calling conditions at Nez Perce County Jail "deplorable, inhumane and cruel," the American Civil Liberties Union has filed suit against county officials.

Linda L. Pall, president of the Moscow ACLU chapter, filed the suit Wednesday in U.S. District Court in Moscow.

"It's not too surprising," Nez Perce County Commissioner Robert Huddleston said. "We realize the condition of the jail, and have done our best to make it as livable as possible."

Nez Perce County Sheriff Ron Koepfer said the timing of the suit surprised him.

Ms. Pall filed the class-action suit on behalf of Catherine Meisner, a Lewiston resident recently sentenced to 10 days in the jail on a drunken driving conviction.

The suit details complaints about overcrowding, temperature control, poor lighting and limited visitation rights.

Underground paper surfaces

REXBURG (AP) — An anonymous group of Ricks College sophomores has published an underground newspaper critical of the lack of discussion about the Mormon Church-owned school's strict behavior standards, including its recent decision to ban the cable television channel MTV from on-campus student housing.

The four-page flyer, entitled *Evian*, or naive spelled backwards, was distributed to both on-campus and off-campus housing units on Monday.

But Ricks College President Joe J. Christensen said the two-year college, operated by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, provides plenty of opportunities for students to express themselves.

Teacher tests receive nod

LEWISTON (AP) — New testing requirements for college graduates and out-of-state instructors who want to teach in Idaho's public schools were approved Thursday by the State Board of Education.

The board, meeting in Lewis Clark State College in Lewiston through Friday, endorsed the testing recommendation from the state Professional Standards Commission, a 17-member advisory panel.

It will require new teachers in Idaho public schools, effective Sept. 1, to obtain passing scores on the National Teacher Examination Core Battery tests in order to be certified.

With the requirement in place, Idaho's teacher-testing requirement will be among the most stringent in the nation, said Darrell Loale, supervisor of teacher education and certification for the Idaho Department of Education.

The board was expected today to discuss the possibility of establishing new testing procedures for the construction of academic buildings and improvements to existing structures at the state's universities and college.

Officials said there was a \$40 million backlog of such unfunded building projects, including a number required for institutions to meet program accreditation standards.

Hold-the-liners regain budget control

BOISE (AP) — Conservatives regained control of the legislative budget committee on Thursday after the loss of available cash into non-education budgets.

But Senate Finance Committee Chairman Atwell Parry said the tide may have turned too late to keep Republican leaders from having to come up with some kind of scheme to increase overall revenues.

"I don't know if we can get it back," the Melba Republican said. "The damage has already been done."

After two weeks of paring back spending in most state agencies to build up an informal reserve to underwrite increases in education support, the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee did about-face for the first three days of this week.

Spending enhancements for elected state officials, the judiciary and the Health and Welfare Department totaling over \$2 million completely

wiped out that informal reserve. That set the Legislature on course toward a woefully inadequate allocation to public and higher education without additional revenues.

Finally, on Thursday the traditional conservative majority reasserted itself, restoring the hold-the-line philosophy that had dominated early committee deliberations.

In a series of relatively close votes, the panel rejected Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus' request for increased compensation to foster parents and only partially financed a basic pay increase for workers at the state hospital in Orofino. A majority even agreed to modified provisions of a federally financed child support enforcement program for fear that eventually the federal money would be withdrawn and the state would have to start picking up the tab.

"The numbers are starting to come in, and simply put, we're overspending the budget," said Rep. Bob Geddes, R-Proton, who led the

charge to hold down spending.

"This is all we can afford," he said. "We know a couple hundred thousand dollars here and a couple hundred thousand dollars there and pretty soon we've broken the budget."

"We may at this point, have had our priorities mixed up," Geddes added. "If education is the high priority, then we've got to rein in on these other budgets. Every dollar we spend in there now comes from education."

House Appropriations Chairman Kathleen Gurnsey, R-Boise, said earlier this week a modest tax increase will be needed to balance the 1989 budget. But Senate Republican President Pro Tem James Risch has continued to disagree.

Risch maintained he has a plan to avoid red ink in the new budget blueprint, but he will not disclose what it is. He has only said the budget will be balanced without an election-year tax increase.

Andrus signs measure to end 'border wars'

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus signed legislation Thursday to end a "border wars" with Washington and Utah over taxes.

"It is a great step forward" in relations between the states, said Parke Girrard, director of the Idaho Motor Transport Association.

Idaho's tax agency has been trying to collect state income taxes from people who work in other states but travel in Idaho as part of their jobs. Particularly targeted have been railroad workers and truckers.

Andrus, at a bill-signing ceremony today, said he has been bothered with complaints from truckers.

State officials started working on a new law, specifically excluding double and multiple taxation, after the bordering states threatened retaliation.

Retaliatory legislation was passed by the Utah Legislature, imposing that state's income taxes on Idaho residents who work in the state or have income from Utah.

Andrus said he was advised that Utah Gov. Norm Bangerter planned to veto the Utah legislation as soon as Andrus signed the new Idaho measure into law. Bangerter was not immediately available for comment.

Washington officials also have been collecting retaliatory taxes

Andrus said he had no specific assurance that the Utah bill, but he said a delegation of Idaho legislators went to Olympia recently seeking cooperation to end the border friction.

Andrus said there would be some sort of reciprocal agreement with Washington. "I think their word is good," he said.

Rep. Tim Tucker, D-Port Hill, who shepherded the legislation through the House along with Rep. Donn Haagenstrom, R-Coeur d'Alene, called the bill signed by Andrus today "excellent legislation. It shows the Legislature can respond to concerns voiced by people outside the state."

United Transportation Union spokesman John Pino of Pocatello said many union members living in the Salt Lake City and Spokane areas got caught up in Idaho's effort to collect income taxes.

"This certainly will solve a lot of their problems," he said. And George Millward of the same union said, "It brings an end to the taxation problems and the threat of retaliation."

"Idaho intends to be a good neighbor," said Andrus.

Under the bill, any railroad worker or trucker earning less than 50 percent of income in Idaho, or who does not do a substantial amount of business in the state, will not have to pay Idaho income taxes.

McClure promises retaliation against FERC

WASHINGTON (AP) — Idaho Republican Sen. James McClure is promising retaliation against the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission if the agency continues what he calls its campaign to gain control over western state water rights.

"To assert as you have, that once a federal license is issued on any water resource, then there is exclusive control over every water use upstream from that federally licensed project is to declare war on the West," McClure told Commission Chairwoman Martha Heese on Thursday.

"I suggest the West will enter that war, and we'll all be losers,"

the senator declared during a hearing before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee.

McClure specifically cited the commission's ruling on a project at Horsehoe Bend in which state officials claim the federal agency has tried to usurp Idaho's control of upstream water appropriations from the Payette River.

"He warned that continued assaults on state rights like that one will eventually prompt Congress to curtail the commission's authority."

Rupert photographer earns accolades

Photographer of the Year entered his profession late

RUPERT — He never held a camera in his hands until he was a teen-ager. Then, as a senior at Minico High School in 1980, he bought a cheap camera he could use to take memory pictures of his friends. He never entered an amateur contest, not even at the fair.

"I wasn't even mildly interested in photography then," he says. Now he's Idaho's Photographer of the Year, owner of Pomerelle Portraits in Rupert, and on his way to national competition. Until he opened his own portrait studio three and a half years ago, Bob Maloney had never even taken a photography class.

While studying for a marketing management degree at Boise State University, Maloney got a part-time job at a photo finishing lab. "Seeing everybody's photo work led me to buy my own camera," he says. "I would study the prints as they came through the lab and figure out how I could improve on them."

He worked at the lab through college and for nine months after graduation in 1984. His interest in photography grew from "none, to mild, to intense."

Maloney began shooting family members, weddings of friends and relatives, always fine-tuning his hobby. Then he heard that the Rupert photographer was leaving, so my wife and I took a chance and moved down here, opening our own studio," he says.

The former photographer, John Sinclair, left big shoes to fill. Sinclair was a former Idaho Photographer of the Year who moved to Caldwell to enter the ministry. So Maloney began attending conventions, he also took two one-week classes at Brooks Institute of Photography, plus a couple of one-day seminars. He says, "In college I took a few fine arts classes, but never took anything on photography."

Most of what Maloney has learned has been by doing. "The more you learn, the more creative you get," he says.

Maloney joined the Professional Photographers of Idaho and entered his first competition three years ago with a picture of his sister and her baby. "The picture took an award and Maloney's zeal for winning was born."

"I started to take it seriously," he says. The next year he entered the contest again and came home with several more awards, finishing in the top five out of honor.

This year he took it all. He entered five prints in the competition, and all five won an award. In addition to being named Idaho's Photographer of the Year, Maloney was named to the court of honor (the five highest photographers in the state), won two judges choice awards, two Kodak Gallery awards and the photographer's choice award for the best print of the show. His fifth entry won a print of distinction award.

Each photographer enters five prints in the competition and the person scoring the highest accumulative total on all five prints is declared Photographer of the Year. Maloney says that while it's possible to score 100 points per print, anything over 80 points is considered a "print of distinction" and is eligible to hang at nationals. "Anything 80 or above is considered excellent," he says. "The highest score this year was the '84 I received for 'The Rebel'."

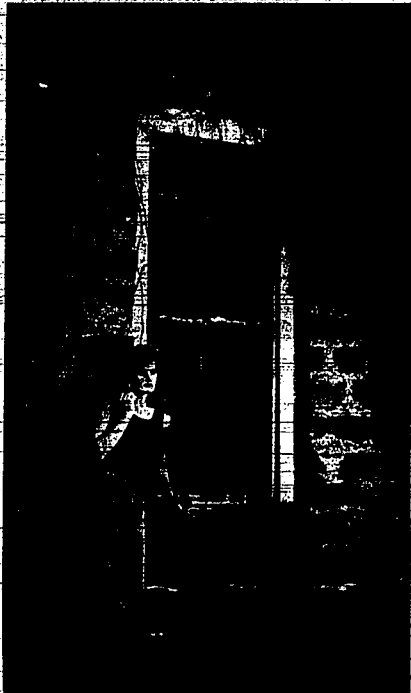
All five of Maloney's prints scored higher than 80, giving him a cumulative total of 407 points. Regional competition is in Salt Lake City March 27-29, then it's on to nationals at Orlando, Fla. July 9-13.

Maloney says he's especially excited about the trip to Florida, where he will be a guest at a banquet for Kodak award winners. He is working on slight changes in matting of his prints, which he hopes will be among the 266 prints to hang permanently in the Photo Division at Escott Center.

Only three of the prestigious Kodak Gallery awards are given in each state annually, two of which were won by Maloney. The third also came home to the Magic Valley, won by Randy Collier of Burley. The awards, Tiffany leaded crystal pyramids, are the dream of every photographer, according to Maloney.

Dilettantes' musical is a far cry from the past

TWIN FALLS — It's a family affair: Kids beg quarters from parents to buy a can of pop. Teen-agers poke at each other. Moms, dads, grandmas and grandpas, friends and acquaintances — mitt, round, the elementary school gym — all because it's that time of year again.

It's early March in Magic Valley, and preparations for the Dilettantes' annual musical production are shifting into high gear.

Lark Kyle, a teacher from Buhl, grades a stack of second grade papers between sprints of duty as a member of the Dilettante backstage crew.

Jim LaGrone, business manager, stands in a hallway, handing out promotional bumper stickers to anyone who looks old enough to drive.

Ten-year-old Tevya-Gilbert, cast member, waits patiently to practice her parts.

"It's a little rough now, but it will come together. They always do," says Jim Latham, a veteran of 19 musicals who plays the lead of Tevye in this year's production of 'Fiddler on the Roof'.

The play will be presented March 11, 12, 17, 18 and 19 at 8:15 p.m. at the College of Southern Idaho's Arts Auditorium.

A matinee will be performed March 13 at 2:15 p.m.

Vern Hedner, director, guides the players through the first three scenes during an evening rehearsal. A prompter, sipping soda, follows the script, calling out lines when action falters. Later, Hedner shrugs and smiles. "Think we're going to make it?" he asks.

Changes are they will. The Dilettantes have made it every year for the past 30 years. This year's production promises to be as popular as ever.

"It's one of the most lovable plays anybody could do," says Hedner.

'Fiddler on the Roof' tells the story of a man named Tevye, his wife, and five daughters,

who are Jews living at the turn of the century in Russia. Tevye is troubled by the outside influences of the world on his life. His daughters are beginning to rebel against the traditions of their faith and culture.

It creates a lot of conflict, a lot of good drama and a lot of good fun," says Hedner.

'Dilettante Week' to be proclaimed

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls Mayor Doug Vollmer will sign a proclamation at the city council meeting Monday night, proclaiming the second week in March as "Dilettante Week."

It is in honor of the Dilettantes' 30 years of promoting arts in the Magic Valley," says Esther Nicholson, publicity director for the local theater group.

Paul Smith, one of the founders of the organization, says that a special two page addition to the program of this year's production of 'Fiddler on the Roof' will outline the history of the Dilettantes.

Each night before the show, a member of the Dilettantes will also announce the group's 30th anniversary and ask people in the audience who have participated in productions in the past to please stand and be recognized.

There have been close to 2,400 people involved in the community musical productions in the last 30 years.

Smith says that the group is planning on creating a new, long-term scholarship fund in honor of the anniversary.

"We have made a commitment that \$5,000 from the show's proceeds will go to a permanent scholarship that will be an endowment for a scholarship," he says.

Jim Latham, 49, manager of Hance Seed/Bean Growers in Filer, has been involved with the Dilettantes since 1970. He played the part of Tevye when the Dilettantes first performed 'Fiddler on the Roof' before sell-out crowds in 1974.

"He's a great part," says Latham, smoothing his suit and peering behind him one huge haul. "The play is life. Tevye is life. It's probably the finest musical story that's been written up for a musicals go."

People identify with the musical because they relate to raising a family, and good times and bad times, he says.

"It's a realistic show. A lot of them are kind of superficial — just strictly for laughs. But this is a story for living," says Latham.

And cast members are able to make that living look like fun.

Latham, arms flailing, sings and stomps and wiggles across the gym floor. "Papa's got a brand new pair of the 67 member dual ball out songs like 'Tradition' and 'If I Were A Rich Man.' A Sabbath prayer is sung in resonant four-part harmony.

"There's some Jewish music," says Hedner. "The wedding song and Sabbath prayer are two of the most beautiful scenes ever done in musicals."

Latham, also a member of the Dilettante board of directors, says that he and other members of the cast spend three months a year, five nights a week, three hours an evening, preparing for opening night.

Board members spend an additional night a month all year round taking care of the business end of the organization.

The board reviews plays, oversees scholarship funds and decides what money in the organization needs to go where. People are recruited to take charge of sets, make-up, props and costumes. A play director and choreographer are chosen and arrangements for an orchestra made.

"There's a lot that goes into one of these things," says Latham.

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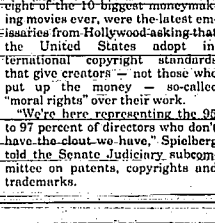
Directors ask Senate to grant artistic rights

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Aretha Franklin, Whitney Houston, U2 win Grammys

NEW YORK (AP) — Irish rockers U2 led the new wave and a Brill Building songwriting team represented the old guard with two awards each at a surprising 30th Annual Grammy Awards ceremony. Michael Jackson was shut out and Paul Simon won again for "Graceland."

"We don't see this as a peak for U2," lead singer Bono said Wednesday night after the socially conscious band topped its award for "The Joshua Tree," its 12-million-selling album. "It's just a beginning."

Simon, who won album of the year in 1987 for his South African project "Graceland," surprisingly captured record of the year honors in 1988 for the title cut, which featured backing vocals by the Everly Brothers.

But Little Richard stole the show at Radio City Music Hall by announcing, not once but three times, that he had captured the Grammy for best new artist. Richard, in a gold suit and sunglasses, finally broke down and declared one-time "Swain" dancer Jody Watley the winner.

"I have never received nothing — I'll never give me no Grammys, and I've been singing for years," the manic voice of "Tutti-Frutti" and "Sittin' on the Bench" proclaimed. "I am the architect of Rock 'n' Roll."

Veteran songwriting team Barry Mann and Cynthia Weil, joined by co-writer James Horner, won song of the year and best song written for a motion picture or television with their syrupy ballad "Somewhere

Out There," a tune performed by two mice in the animated movie "An American Tail."

The pair is the last remaining songwriting team from the Brill Building, the Manhattan offices where dozens of classic '60s songs were written.

"I don't think there can be a best song," Weill told reporters. "Every song is unique. I love the U2 song 'I Still Haven't Found What I'm Looking For,' but it's apples and oranges."

After U2 won album of the year for "Joshua," guitarist The Edge gave a rambling acceptance speech in which he thanked Bishop Desmond Tutu, Martin Luther King Jr., James T. Kirk, Peewee Herman, Jimi Hendrix, Dr. Ruth Westheimer "and sumo wrestlers around the world."

The band sat sipping beer in the audience during the three-hour show, which featured an electrifying live performance by Jackson. Jackson, who captured eight Grammys for his "Thriller" album in 1984, received no awards for its follow-up, "Bad," despite four nominations.

The Los Angeles-based band Los Lobos, whose version of "La Bamba" was a bigger hit than the original adaptation of the Mexican folk number by the late Ritchie Valens, came away with nothing despite four nominations.

And folk singer Suzanne Vega, with three nominations for her poignant song "Luka" about a battered child, also went home empty-handed.

"I was hoping it would win, but I was prepared for anything to happen," said Vega, a Greenwich Village favorite. "I'm a little disappointed. Springsteen won his second Grammy, best rock vocal performance, for his "Tunnel of Love" album but was not around to accept the award. The same was true of Simon and of Sting, who topped Jackson and Springsteen for best pop vocal performance on his "Bring on the Night" LP.

Aretha Franklin, the Grammy-winning woman of all time,

added two more to her 12 with best female R&B performance and best R&B performance by a duo or group for "I Knew You Were Waiting (For Me)" duet with George Michael.

One of Aretha's proteges, Whitney Houston, took best female pop vocalist for her evergreen single "I Wanna Dance with Somebody" from her "Whitney" album. Narada Michael Walden won the producer's Grammy for his work on Houston's second album.

"The world wants new faces in a way," said Walden, who beat the

Michael Jackson-Quincy Jones team. Quincy's won so many awards anyway, this is good. And he told me in private that he voted for me."

Jackson's "Bad" won just a single award: best engineered non-classical album with Bruce Swedien and Humberto Gatica receiving the Grammy.

The Grammys' two all-time leaders added to their impressive totals. Sir Georg Solti, conductor of the Chicago Symphony, won his 26th Grammy, for his recording of the Beethoven's 9th Symphony.

And Pianist Vladimir Horowitz, who had 20 Grammys entering the ceremonies, won two for best classical album for "Chopin, Op. 10, No. 3" and the President's Special Merit Award from the National Academy of Recording Arts & Sciences, which sponsors the Grammy.

Ladymith Black Mambazo, the South African vocal group featured on "Graceland" album, won a Grammy for best traditional folk recording for "Shaka Zulu." Simon produced it.

So far, the couple known popularly as Andy and Fergie have hobnobbed with Hollywood celebrities and "local business" and "political business" and taken a backstage look at a movie special-effects studio.

Earlier in the day, Andrew greeted American investors for a five-hour cruise aboard Her Majesty's Yacht Britannia by quipping, "Please don't think when you go to see Ben Voyage."

Andrew also expressed his appreciation for Wednesday's sunny skies, which followed days of rain during their visit.

Hampton gets Idaho degree

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP) — The "President of the Year" is now a University of Idaho Doctor of Humane Letters.

Jazz legend Lionel Hampton, for whom the university's School of Music was named last year, was awarded an honorary degree last week.

Commission publishes guidelines for grants

BOISE — A new edition of "Grants Guidelines" published by the Idaho Commission on the Arts is available.

The new guidelines reflect two major changes, according to Betty J. Brown, assistant director and grants officer. They are: 1. The application deadline has been moved up from April 15 to a postmark deadline of the last Friday in March (this year March 25) and 2. Grants in the Community Arts category will be made only for technical assistance.

Not-for-profit, tax exempt organizations in Idaho are eligible to apply for grants in one of three categories:

• Community Arts. Community-based arts organizations whose artistic products primarily involve non-professional artists. This may also include ethnic and traditional arts organizations.

community and assist with artistic development and management skills only.

• Arts Development. Community-based arts organizations whose artistic products may involve non-professional artists and that have demonstrated a potential for growth toward professionalism. This may also include ethnic and traditional arts organizations.

• Major Institutions. Well-established arts organizations that use professional artists and serve a constituency beyond their own community. This may also include ethnic and traditional arts organizations. Because grants in this category are for multi-year funding, grant recipients must submit a full application once every other year.

Centennial exhibit planned

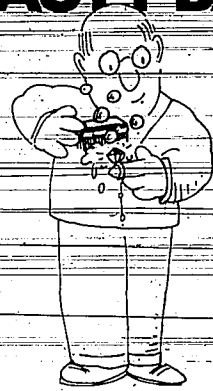
BOISE — The Idaho Commission on the Arts has issued a call for proposals from designers and exhibit planners for the development of a traveling statewide exhibit.

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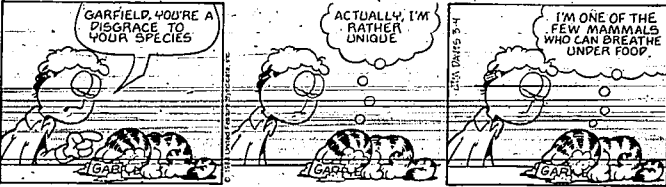
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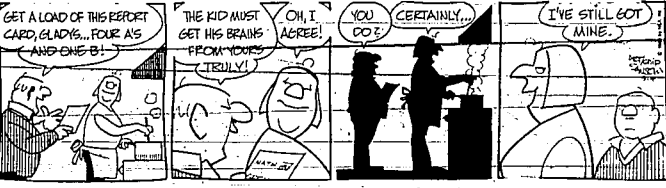

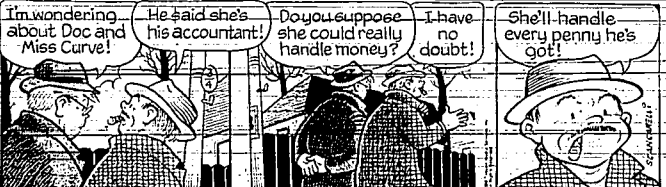

'Switching Channels' takes after 'His Girl Friday'

The Ben-Hacht-Charles-MacArthur play "The Front Page" has enjoyed a long career in film. The original was a 1931 talkie directed by Lewis Milestone and produced by Howard Hughes.

Howard Hughes had the brilliant idea of changing the reporter to a woman, and "His Girl Friday" was a 1940 hit with Clara Bow and Reginald Kessel. Billy Wilder went back to the 1930s era with Walter Matthau and Jack Lemmon in 1973.

Now comes "Switching Channels." It is patterned after "His Girl Friday," with Burt Reynolds as the domineering editor and Kathleen Turner as his star reporter and ex-wife. But something new has been added to the equation.

Changing from a Chicago newspaper to a satellite news network does surprisingly little damage to the timeless "Front Page" plot. If anything, the deadline urgency is more pronounced, given the competitive nature of TV news.

Wiser the filmmakers have gone astray in its apparent belief that "The Front Page" needed a heavy dose of farce. The result is more *Murphy Brothers* than *Hecht and MacArthur*.

Turner, star reporter for the news network, takes a rare vacation and falls in love with a dashing industrialist, Christopher Bauer. She returns to Chicago and talks her news-crazy boss and former husband, Reynolds, that she is quitting for married life. The wily Reynolds prevents her departure, and Turner agrees to one last assignment: the execution of an accused cop killer (Henry Gibson). When the condemned man escapes, the chase begins. Instead of the customary roll-top desk, the reporter hides

the escapes in the press room's copying machine.

The actors romp through their roles in high style. Reynolds is perfect as the fast-talking con artist, and Turner is credible as the energetic reporter. Reeve displays an unsuspected talent for comedy in the Ralph Bellamy role as the self-assured fisher. There is marvelous irony when the one-time Man of Steel is portrayed as a sufferer of acrophobia who panics in an elevator.

Where "Switching Channels" goes awry is with Ted Kottcheff's ambivalent direction, particularly at the frenetic, unfunny climax. Ned Beatty as the puffed-up politician overacts outrageously, and the media people are portrayed as gurgles and creaks.

Oh well, "The Front Page" will survive. Produced by Martin Ranshoff and written by Jonathan Reynolds, "Switching Channels" is rated PG, perhaps for language. Running time: 104 minutes.

'Broadcast News' skewers TV news while providing romantic comedy

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. The ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

SHES HAVING A BABY (PG-13) John Hughes seems to be crafting a comic movie valentine to approaching fatherhood - with Kevin Bacon and Elizabeth McGovern as a young Midwestern couple - encouraged by suburbia and pregnancy. But is he? There is a nightmarish edge to this movie; it often gets cold-cut, glibly cute, with surreal dream sequences and shock cuts pilfered from Hitchcock. Hughes mostly does not show the scenes where his couple are tender or loving with each other, and the film has an implausible, queasy feel. It is the least funny of his comedies, too focused on Jake's panic and alienation. But this unpleasantness may be exactly what audiences buy, what strikes them as contemporary; if so, there is plenty of it here.

BROADCAST NEWS (R) This film is so diabolically clever that you either expect it to be heartless, in the way that so much surface cleverness can be. No such thing. This film by writer-director-producer James L. Brooks (his first since "Terms of Endearment") goes right to the core of a modern romantic triangle, and while it is there, gives us a look at what ails the news "broadcasting" business. But heartless is the wrong word for this movie: It is insightful and understanding and marvelous fun, while giving up none of its thoughtfulness; and all three leading actors - William Hurt, Albert Brooks and Holly Hunter - alternately save the movie from alienating the audience and provide it with its greatest joys.

GOOD MORNING, VIETNAM (R) This dramatic canvas based on the 1965 Saigon pig of wildman Armed Forces deputy Adrian Cronauer is mostly failed satire. It

clings to the obvious like a drowning man to an axvil and director (but non-writer) Barry Levinson can't summon up the wit or bite of his "Diner" or "Tin Men." But Robin Williams, as Cronauer, saves it; he explodes the center in bursts of bursts of electronic-age surrealism. Blazing away brilliantly, ad-libbing on camera, Williams is like a man possessed: a Crazy Eddie of showbiz dada.

MOONSTRUCK (PG) This is an incredibly nourishing comedy, filled as it is like rigatoni with warmth, cheer and terrific snappy dialogue. As a young widow whose life suddenly shifts 180 degrees under the spell of an extraordinary full moon from plain to juicy, Cher finally has a role that lets her comic sensibilities out for a romp. Cage attacks the rules of *Romy and Michele* - really falls for - with a nice balance between unbridled romanticism and tongue-in-cheek seriousness; he is marvelous.

Newspapers rate children's books

LONDON — Assuming Johnny can read, the question remains: What should he read?

The Times of London and The Daily Telegraph have tried to answer the question with lists of classics recommended for children from 3- to 18-year-olds from a few books, notably J.D. Salinger's "The Catcher in the Rye" and the basic works for children, the lists had little in common.

The papers revealed a powerful pro-British bias, with David Holloway, one of the conservative Telegraph's panel of experts, commenting: "American universities tend to supply their students with reading lists containing thousands of titles. This is not only daunting but counterproductive."

So the Telegraph suggested the 100 books every youngster who has gone to school ought to have read by the time he or she finishes. The Times' panel of teachers, writers and critics came up with 50 titles. The Times went by age group and sticks to fiction, while the Telegraph cast a wider net, modern fiction, classics, translations, poetry, drama and entertainment.

The two papers found the most agreement on books for young children, with The Times recommending among others, the "White the Pooh" stories, Rudyard Kipling's "Just So Stories," "Charlotte's Web" by E.B. White and Maurice Sendak's "Where the Wild Things Are." The Telegraph, altogether weightier in its approach, opened with a category called core texts that included the Bible, Homer's "Iliad," Horace's "Odes," Geoffrey Chaucer's "Canterbury Tales" and all of Shakespeare's plays.

"Don Quixote," by Miguel de Cervantes, John Milton's "Paradise Lost," Boswell's "The Life of Samuel Johnson" and Charles Darwin's "The Origin of Species" rounded out the list.

However, against such high brow fare as E.B. White's "Charlotte's Web" and "The Lion and the Unicorn" of Western Philosophy, the Telegraph also suggested an entertainment list that ranged from Arthur Conan Doyle and Edgar Allan Poe to "The Big Sleep" by Raymond Chandler and Agatha Christie's "The Murder of Roger Ackroyd."

Its children's category included one American work, Mark Twain's "The Adventures of Tom Sawyer." Many of the others in the category were the same as chosen by The Times.

In its 12-18 category The Times ignored Shakespeare and the ancients but suggested Twain's "Huckleberry Finn," George Orwell's "1984," "The Diary of Anne Frank," "Jane Eyre" by Charlotte Bronte and "Pride and Prejudice" by Jane Austen.

There was Robert Louis Stevenson's "Treasure Island" alongside "The Lord of the Flies," William Golding's frightening tale of power.

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corrupted children. Salinger's "Catcher in the Rye" rubbed shoulders with "Emil and the Detectives" by Erich Kästner.

The Telegraph recommended 13 translations, among them Boris Pasternak's "Dr. Zhivago," Gustave Flaubert's "Madame Bovary," "The

Three Musketeers" by Alexandre Dumas, "The Plague" by Albert Camus, Franz Kafka's "Metamorphosis" and Gabriel Garcia Marquez's "One Hundred Years of Solitude."

"War and Peace" didn't make the list but "Anna Karenina" did.

'Heat of the Night' concentrates on relationship, not racial tension

The way Howard Rollins describes it, the premise of "In the Heat of the Night," the two-hour series pilot airing on NBC Sunday, March 6, sounds a lot like that of "Crime Story" or "Houston Knights," or "Miami Vice," or "The Equalizer," or "Magnum, P.I."

"There's murder, intrigue and mayhem," says Rollins. "Drug trafficking, unfaithful lovers. A sexual liaison. We cover all the issues."

"In the Heat of the Night," which co-stars Carroll O'Connor, is a sequel to the film that won the 1967 Oscar as "Best Picture." It is produced by Fred Silverman, who has adapted the '60s series "Perry Mason" and "The Andy Griffith Show" as TV movies.

The original film was risky business — a thriller about race relations with comic overtones. In it, a black Philadelphia detective, played by Sidney Poitier, returned to his native Louisiana to help solve a bizarre murder and clashed with a bigoted local sheriff, played by Rod Taylor.

The series pilot, though, muters racial tension — to such a degree that Rollins refuses to discuss the issue. Instead, he says, crime is a backdrop for a city cop/country cop relationship — between him — and O'Connor, who is playing his first recurring TV role since "Archie Bunker's Place" left the air in 1983.

"Law enforcement isn't central," Rollins says. "The criminality is secondary to the human situation. Rather than have shots coming from a gun, we explore the motivations, the nature of their relationship."

As the series progresses — NBC has ordered 13 episodes, and three have been filmed already — Rollins says the original film's concerns will fade even further into the

background.

"I'd like to go back to the beginning of the fork of the relationship — to examine their personalities, the influences on them and so forth," he says.

On TV Rollins, 35, has appeared in the miniseries "King" (1978) and

"Roots: The Next Generation" (1979) and the Western series "Wildside" (1985). But he is better known for his performances in the films "Ragtime" (1981) and "A Soldier's Story" (1984) — which, coincidentally, was directed by Norman Jewison, who directed the original version of "In the Heat of the Night."

Rollins says that Jewison encouraged him to take another series roll.

"He was pleased that something he directed still had life," he explains. "And he found the project interesting. So he said, 'Go for it, take a series.' He helped me make up my mind."

Although the South of the present is not the racially charged place it was in 1967, Rollins contends that the problems addressed by the new movie are still noteworthy.

"The issues are contemporary," he contends. "Sure, they've been dealt with before — but they're still in the news. So we're au courant, so to speak."

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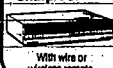

ble that they did their own mountain climbing, or did they use stunt men? — J.S.

A: The two men performed most of their own hazardous, high-altitude mountain climbing and aliding. Also, in many scenes, using doubles would have been too obvious. On the rare occasions where stunt doubles were called in, it was largely because of insurance requirements. "After all of that location shooting was finished," Poitier said, "I must confess my idea of heaven was to relax on a nice, warm Hollywood sound stage!"

A: That bit of Beatie baldersdash has been pooh-poohed by Harrison, who claims that People magazine and TV's "Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous" notwithstanding, "it's all rubbish. I have normal toilets like everyone else."

Q: Can you settle an argument? I claim that the famous Hollywood sign has stopped the 4 Times-News, Twin Falls, Idaho.

LA hills, originally contained different wording. A friend says it always read just "Hollywood." Who is right? — L.D.

Q: We hear Victoria Principal has been lured back to Dallas. That's good news! We missed her sexy Pam Ewing. — D.P.

A: So sorry it's not going to happen. The producers offered Principal \$200,000 to strip and take a shower with her screen husband in

NBC dramas usher in first phase of mid-season program changes

WASHINGTON — NBC Entertainment president Brandon Tartikoff, apparently immune to the complacency that usually afflicts first-place network executives, Thursday announced "the first phase" of midseason programming changes.

NBC is bringing in two new one-hour dramas, "In the Heat of the Night" and "Aaron's Way," and giving "Bronx Zoo" another try at the brass ring. The three new hours will result in the shift of a couple of series and the retirement to "hiatus" of a couple more.

Tartikoff said Thursday that the second phase, to be detailed in about 10 days, will include the return of "The Days and Nights of Molly Dodd" and "Beverly Hills Buntz" somewhere in the NBC schedule, during the week of March 27.

"In the Heat of the Night," loosely based on the award-winning 1967 movie, will air in the 9 p.m. Tuesday time slot starting March 15, but will premiere with a two-hour movie on Sunday, March 6. The TV version stars Carroll O'Connor and Howard Rollins in the roles made famous by Rod Steiger and Sidney Poitier.

"Aaron's Way" will take the 8 p.m. Wednesday time slot starting March 16, premiering with a two-hour movie the previous Wednesday. Merlin Olsen and Melinda Montgomery star in this story of an English couple who move to California to take care of their dead son's baby, born out of wedlock to a vineyard operator.

"The Bronx Zoo" will rejoin the schedule at 10 p.m. Wednesdays starting March 30, but will get an earlier look-see on Thursday, March 24, at 10 p.m., pre-empting "L.A. Law" that night. The series, which has appeared sporadically this season, stars Ed Asner as the principal of a tough South Bronx high school.

With the new series, "Hunter" will leave Thursdays at 9 to return to his old Saturday 10-11 time slot starting March 12. J.J. Starbuck, now in the spot, will head for the

bus. "A Year in the Life," now at 9 on Wednesdays, will move to 10 that same night for three weeks starting March 9 and will return to its regular time slot starting April 6.

Likewise, "Highway to Heaven," now seen on Wednesday at 8, will move to 9 that night for three weeks starting March 16 and then hit the Highway to Hiatus.

St. Elsewhere leaves the Wednesday-at-10 slot starting March 9 but will return later in the spring.

Tartikoff, appearing before the annual meeting of the National Association of Television Program Executives (NATPE) in Houston, also revealed that he will hold a "preliminary" talk with "Tonight" host Johnny Carson in Burbank next week about an extension of Carson's current big-buck contract with the network.

He also said he has held an "encouraging" conversation with Bill Cosby, whose "The Cosby Show" is No. 1 in the country, about returning for another season.

Phil Donahue interviews Judith Exner Friday-out in Los Angeles. The "Donahue" interviews will air here Wednesday.

Exner hit the headlines earlier this week with allegations, in an article written for People magazine by Kitty Kelley, that when she and President Kennedy were lovers, she carried correspondence between Kennedy and Chicago mob boss Momo Giancana and earlier had arranged a meeting in Florida between the mobster and then-candidate Kennedy.

Exner appeared on "Donahue" in 1977.

Cronkite has to cancel as debate moderator

CBS special correspondent Walter Cronkite Thursday canceled a scheduled appearance this Sunday as the moderator of a debate among Democratic presidential candidates in Houston after learning that without his knowledge an ad hoc network of some 125 stations had been set up to carry the debates around the country.

An appearance on such a widely circulated program would have violated Cronkite's contract with CBS, which reportedly pays him \$1 million a year (the former "Evening News" anchor also serves on the CBS Inc. board of directors), since the debate would plainly be in competition with CBS affiliates around the country carrying network sports programming.

Cronkite Thursday characterized the flap as a "major misunderstanding" that arose when an official of the National Television Programming Executives, which is meeting in Houston this week, asked him to moderate the debate a few weeks ago.

"My understanding from the letter NATPE originally sent me was that at the most it would be a regional hookup of maybe two or three stations, and that would not have been a problem. There was no mention of a national effort or about it being commercially done. I thought of it as a pro bono kind of thing, and interesting to do."

On returning from a trip to the Bahamas Wednesday, Cronkite found a script for Sunday's broadcast in the mail. He was surprised to learn, as he "gave the script a rundown," that there were commercial breaks scheduled during the debate.

Further inquiry revealed the extent of the syndication effort and Thursday he notified NATPE he would not attend. Cronkite said correspondence indicated the program is to be produced by Sun Broadcast Association.

Cronkite Thursday would say only, "I'm unhappy it happened and I'd like to think it was just a misunderstanding. I heard today a couple of the candidates may not show up, either."

One source familiar with the flap, but a little less charitable about the proceedings, told us Thursday, "I think once they had him they sold the thing using Walter's name. People try to do it all the time in the business."

Late Thursday, we were unable to learn if NATPE had found a substitute moderator for the event.

'Thirtysomething' — That extra something sets this drama apart

HOLLYWOOD — The director is on edge. The actors are on edge. The crew is on edge.

"Who are these people?" the director wants to know the minute he sees two unknown faces — of a publicist and a reporter — on the set during a recent filming of ABC's "Thirtysomething."

Soon after, the reporter and the publicist are standing on the edge of the scene, where series star Ken Olin will not see them.

Later, executive producers Marshall Herskovitz and Edward Zwick will explain they did not want Olin — half of the yuppie universe known as Michael and Hope (played by Mel Harris) — to think he was performing rather than acting.

The people in that room (the cast, the crew), they're of that room, they're of the furniture," says Zwick, adding, "When you're talking about things as emotionally potent as some of these things," sensitivity counts."

In another — to the bone — slice of "Thirtysomething" life, Michael is trying to cope with his father's impending death — and, as a result, his own mortality.

"He smelled like a father," Michael says in the scene, weeping. "I can't be a father. I'm just a kid."

By the time the scene is done, at least one crew member is wiping away tears.

Life on "Thirtysomething," it has been said, is so real it hurts. Since its debut this season, the hour-long drama (Tuesday nights) has been simultaneously praised and savaged for its attention to the most minute details of yuppie-dom (In the most recent Nielsen ratings it ranked 29th).

For people more concerned with world hunger than mortgage payments and finding the proper au pair, "Thirtysomething" has the hollow ring of baby-boomer narcissism.

For Herskovitz and Zwick — two successful, 35-year-old fathers who worked together on ABC's "Family" in the late 70s — this is familiar territory.

"I'm beginning to sense what it is

that drives certain people crazy about this show," Herskovitz says. "It's a perception of the show having to do with the notion that these people don't have real problems. That in life there are real problems; people are sick, chronically ill, dying."

Zwick says with characteristic enthusiasm, "We seem to be reaching people viscerally. In addition to those who seem to be its devotees, there are those who watch it with a sort of equal devotion, if only to be angered by it."

Though Zwick insists the show has no "therapeutic agenda," past programs have been used by some psychiatrists as catalysts for group therapy discussions, he says.

"I have my own crackpot theory about that," says Zwick as he twirls a miniature basketball and looks thoughtfully around his office, which is decorated with bright florals, plastic pink flamingos and bamboo-style furniture. "We're covering some ground that hasn't been as traveled on television — that for a lot of people is validating."

Those moments of validation are ennobled in life-altering moments of modernity. Ellyn (Timothy Busfield), Michael's partner, has walked out on his wife, Nancy (Patricia Wettie) and their kids, wondering if he ever really knew who she was in the first place. Ellyn (Polly Draper) is a successful but insecure professional. Gary (Peter Horton) is a college professor with a bad case of Peter Pan syndrome. Melissa is Michael's cousin, a photographer and a walking open wound.

On an average Tuesday night, the cast of "Thirtysomething" is likely to touch upon at least three topics worthy of an Esquire cover story.

"I've got a file as thick as your arm, from people who think we're eavesdropping on them," Zwick says. "They want to know where we put the microphones in their house."

Certainly, "Thirtysomething" goes deeper than most shows, in part thanks to superb writing. Which is why emotional topics such as this day's particular scene elicit emotional reactions.

"You're talking about things that are very close to a lot of the lives here, not just the actors, but also the crew," Zwick says. "It tends to be par for the course."

Not by coincidence, the producers point out, the actors who are parents on "thirtysomething" are parents in real life. And, says Zwick, "right now someone on our crew is going through a custody battle, someone else (associated with the show) is going through the sickness of a parent, someone else is going through a divorce, someone else is fighting with their brother. Tim

Busfield, who talks about separation on the show, went through a divorce in the last year and a half. It's all happening around us. All we're doing is looking at it closely."

And if critics of the show say it is all much ado about nothing, Herskovitz answers, "It's hard to make good drama when we don't have a bad guy with a gun holding the SWAT team at bay. You have to make drama out of people's weaknesses."

Addressing the vilification of the show, Zwick argues, "Who isn't a yuppie to some degree who has a

kid between the ages of 0 and 8, is in their 30s, and is trying to hold down a job and maybe a mortgage? All these things that were in the 1950s and '60s the Great American Dream are suddenly cast as these sort of self-loathing, vile pursuits."

Which brings Herskovitz and Zwick to the ultimate dilemma — how real is too real? How close is too close?

"It's something we face each week," Zwick says. "There's a real desire to be to the bone. We can't back away from that. That's a promise, in a sense, that we've already made."

'Sunday Today' to air Fidel Castro interview

NBC's "Sunday Today" will air at least 20 minutes this week of correspondent Maria Shriver's interview with Cuban President Fidel Castro, which took place over 4½ hours Wednesday night at the Presidential Palace in Havana.

Portions of the marathon chat, dealing with Castro's denial of drug deals in the Caribbean, were seen Thursday night on "NBC Nightly News With Tom Brokaw."

Among the subjects Shriver discussed with Castro: Republican candidate Pat Robertson's allegations of Soviet missiles in Cuba; the Cuban boycott of the upcoming Summer Olympic Games; and the dramatic days of the 1962 Cuban Missile Crisis. Castro comments on Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev,

President Kennedy and reported CIA attempts on his own life.

Castro reportedly has had some 100 requests from U.S. media for interviews in recent months (including one from Brokaw) and apparently gave Shriver a break, in part, because of the Kennedy connection (President Kennedy was her mother Eunice's brother).

NBC News sources were chuckling Thursday in Miami because during the long day spent with Castro (whom they first met at 11 a.m. Wednesday and left at 2:30 a.m. Thursday), the Cuban leader received a telex from CBS' Dan Rather requesting an interview. Rather had apparently heard of the NBC coup.

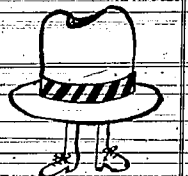

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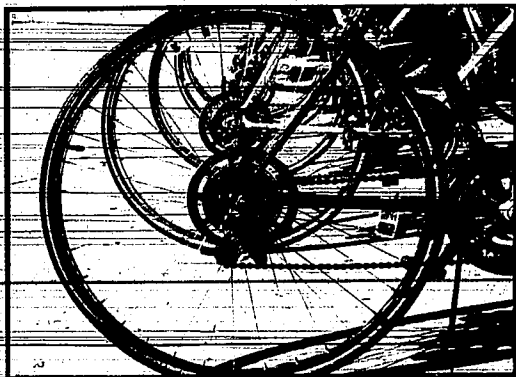


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
