\$365 million in school aid receives approval

BOISE — With the Senate Republicans' apparent agreement, legislative budget writers on Thursday approved \$356 million in 1989 state aid to public schools, signaling what GOP leaders predicted were the final days of the 1988 session. "It's a very clear signal to us that we should be able to wrap this thing up in the immediate future," Senate President Pro Tem James Risch, R-Boise, said.

The spending level mirrored the apparent consensus reached two days ago among at least the 22 Senate Republicans needed to pass it. All Senate Republicans on the budget committee and over half the House Republicans ultimately supported the proposal. It remained \$6 million below the recommendation of Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus and \$2 million below the level state Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans has said is the minimum in state support needed to avoid dete-

rioration of the education system or major local property tax hikes. Evans had asked for \$377.5 million in state support, calling that the level needed to continue the progress made in the past year after lawmakers allocated an unprecedented \$343 million allotment to public schools. 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Mediation bill may be facing fatal troubles

—BOISE—Farm creditors circled the wagons Thursday to ward off a bill requiring them to meet with their broke farmers before foreclosing. But Magic Valley lawmakers sponsoring the bill shot holes in most of those complaints during a Senate Agricultural Affairs Committee hearing. Still, the bill may be in trouble after testimony from Boise lawyer Bill Russell, speaking as a private citizen, who said the bill is plagued by technical flaws. The House has already passed the bill. No committee vote was cast Thursday on whether to send the bill to the Senate floor. Russell was among the last to speak during the 3½-hour marathon session. Committee Chairman Herb Carlson, R-Eagle, said he personally asked for Russell's neutral analysis. Russell said his firm handles about the same number of farm creditor and farm debtor cases. He said the major problem was the undefined term "good faith," which creditors must follow during the mandatory mediation process. Russell said that section could tie up farm credit in ways bankers couldn't anticipate. Since the mediator determines "good faith," farmers will strive for a finding of bad faith during mediations to help future court battles, he said. And Russell said jurors virtually always side with an administrative decision in court cases. "Basically, all that's going to be left is how much are the punitive damages," Russell said. "If I represent a debtor, I will go after this letter" of bad faith. He added that he would recommend to his lending clients that they not offer credit to farmers if this bill passes. The bill would allow either farmers or their creditors to ask for neutral, third-party mediation through the attorney general's office within 17 days of a foreclosure notice being sent. The full Senate passed a similar mandatory mediation bill during the 1987 session, when all 10 current committee members supported it. But observers fear creditors have kindled dissension that could kill the bill in committee this year. Bob Lane, of Idaho First National Bank, testified, "We

Panama sanctions in works

WASHINGTON — President Reagan met with top advisers Thursday on the U.S. effort to force Panama's strongman out of office and probably will order sanctions imposed in the next few days, administration sources said. Reagan is weighing five sanctions, for the most part economic in nature, designed to put further pressure on Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega to step down, the sources said. The White House deliberations came as the House overwhelmingly demanded the ouster of Noriega, and the opposition ambassador to the

United States predicted Noriega's overthrow "within a few days." While the president did not reveal his decision to aides during a White House meeting, "there seems to be a consensus to invoke all these measures in the near term," said one official, who demanded anonymity. The sources said the sanctions debated at the meeting included: • Withholding the next U.S. payment of about \$7 million for Panama Canal operations and putting it into an escrow account; • Withholding U.S. fees for use of an oil pipeline that carries Alaskan oil across Panama; • Canceling all trade preferences

extended to Panama as a Third World country and participant in the Caribbean Basin Initiative; • Increasing border surveillance of all Panamanian individuals and goods moving across U.S. borders; • Stepping up efforts to discourage other countries from doing anything that assists Noriega's hold on Panama. The House voted 367-2 for a non-binding resolution that noted allegations of drug trafficking, murder, money laundering and racketeering against the Panamanian Defense Forces, which Noriega heads. It called on Reagan to "consider seriously" additional economic and political sanctions.

Little 'give' in testimony

—IDAHO FALLS—Despite Sen. James McClure's plea that Idahoans be willing to "give a little" to resolve a 25-year-old wilderness controversy, testimony at a public hearing in Idaho Falls indicated little willingness to compromise. Testimony was largely split between those who want more of the state's 9-million-acres-of-roadless land preserved, and those who believe more wilderness will stunt Idaho's economic future. Bonneville County Commissioner Wylie Snarr said local schools and governments depend heavily on revenues derived from land-based industries such as timber, mining and agriculture, and additional wilderness would destroy job opportunities. "More wilderness will have a deleterious effect on funds generated from utilization of these lands," he said Thursday at the first of three hearings being conducted by the Senate Subcommittee on Public Lands, National Parks and Forests. There were 142 people scheduled to testify during the day. Other congressional hearings were scheduled Friday in Boise and Saturday in Coeur d'Alene. In his opening remarks, McClure said he and Gov. Cecil Andrus were "very honest and sincere" in crafting the Idaho Forest Management Act and urged wilderness to help end the quarter-century conflict over management of Idaho's public lands. "Idaho needs its public lands for recreation, for economic stability and growth, and for the combinations of uses that provide the greatest good to the greatest number of Idaho's citizens, and to the citizens of the nation," he said. "It takes leadership to forgo a compromise and it takes courage to give a little to get a little," McClure said. See WILD on Page A2

Minimum pay of \$5.05 gains nod

WASHINGTON — An increase in the federal minimum wage from \$3.35 to \$5.05 an hour was tentatively approved Thursday by the House Education and Labor Committee. The original bill before the committee called for an increase of 60 cents in 1989, 40 cents in 1990 and 40 cents in 1991. The committee adopted, on a vote of 18-14, an amendment by Rep. Carl C. Perkins, D-Ky., which added a 40-cent increase in the fourth year, on Dec. 31, 1991. The full committee was unable to take action on all the pending amend-

ments and will continue debate on the bill next week. The Senate has a companion bill, sponsored by Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., chairman of the Labor and Human Resources Committee, which would raise the minimum wage to \$4.65 over a three-year period. The Beckins amendment was approved essentially along party lines except that two Democrats, Reps. Austin J. Murphy of Pennsylvania and Timothy J. Penny of Minnesota, joined the Republicans in opposing the proposal. Rep. Stephen J. Solari, D-N.Y., read from a letter written by Labor Secretary Ann McLaughlin, who said

senior White House advisers would recommend to President Reagan that he veto any legislation increasing the minimum wage. Current law allows employers of workers who regularly receive tips—such as waiters and waitresses—to count the tips as earned wages equivalent to 40 percent of the minimum wage. Thus, a restaurant owner could pay a worker \$2.01 an hour, with the remaining \$1.34, 40 percent of today's \$5.35-an-hour minimum wage—coming from tips. Under the Robinson amendment, the tip minimum would be raised to 50 percent of the minimum.

Driving age law hauls heavy load

BOISE — Legislation raising Idaho's minimum driving age from 14 to 16 has been sent from a House committee to the House floor. But it may be so loaded down with amendments that passage is uncertain. The Senate already has approved raising the minimum driving age in Idaho to 16, with exceptions for those who must work on farms or who must drive because of family situations. If it is amended in the House, it must go back to the Senate for more consideration, with the amendments attached. These exceptions draw some of the committee opposition, with some lawmakers saying they wanted to amend the bill to take them out. The House Transportation and Defense Committee sent the bill to the House floor Thursday afternoon, and even the measure's sponsor said it needed amendments. Sen. Rod Beck, R-Boise, told the committee that if the bill passed, it should be changed to delay the effective date. As it now stands, the new law would take effect July 1. Bill Dutton of the Department of Education said that would be right in the middle of summer drivers' education classes conducted by school districts, and it would be possible that many teenagers would pass driver's ed only to find that under a new law they couldn't get a license. Dutton suggested Sept. 1 or Sept. 15 to start the new law. Rep. Ernest Hale, R-Burley, suggested an amendment that if any young driver was convicted or pleaded guilty to any infraction, misdemeanor or felony involving a motor vehicle, driving privileges would be revoked.

Dole cuts staff, TV ads; Kemp heads for the locker room

Republican Bob Dole, clobbered by Vice President George Bush in the Super Tuesday contests, cut back staff and television advertising on Thursday.

Dole, however, insisted he was "in this one to win," despite polls putting him far behind in the Illinois primary race. Bush said whatever happened, his campaign would "go about our business, do our job."

Bush, meanwhile, declared himself personally disturbed at the breaches of ethics he'd seen in government, and said Thursday he would set up a

White House ethics panel if elected president.

Dole pulled television commercials off the air in Illinois and laid off more than half his staff Thursday. And a source said his campaign advisers discussed whether Dole should suspend campaigning before the Illinois primary on Tuesday.

An ABC News-Washington Post poll, published in Friday's editions of the Post, indicated Dole trailed Bush in Illinois, 58 percent to 31 percent. However, national campaign spokeswoman Dale Tate said Dole intended to remain a candidate. "We're not pulling the plug on the campaign," she said.

Later, Dole aides, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the possibility of dropping out was discussed, but the Kansas senator would keep campaigning at least through Tuesday's Illinois contest.

Dole issued a statement Thursday night stating he would withdraw from the race if he did not drop out, "I'm in this one to win."

The Dole developments came the same day that Bush's Super Tuesday victories claimed another Republican — Jack Kemp. And Democrat Gary Hart was preparing to quit the Democratic race.

Kemp withdrew from the GOP field after a string of third- and fourth-

place finishes in the early primaries and caucuses. But the New York congressman hinted that he would be interested in the No. 2 spot on the ticket.

"Obviously you don't make plans to run for vice president," Kemp said at a Capital Hill news conference. But he called the idea "a very interesting and awesome thought. . . . Would I think about it? The answer to that is yes."

Kemp refused to endorse any of the remaining Republican contenders. "They're all Reagan conservatives," he said.

Hart, who polled no more than 5 percent of the vote in any of the Super Tuesday primaries and won no convention delegates, planned to announce his withdrawal from the campaign at a news conference on Friday.

Donor-side sources who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the departure would mark the second time "the one-time Democratic candidate" had quit the 1988 race.

about Dole, Bush's reaction was: "We'll go about our business, do our job."

Democrat Richard Gephardt, who ran a poor fourth among Democrats on Tuesday, said Michigan could decide his fate.

Republican Pat Robertson, who finished a distant third to Bush and Sen. Bob Dole in the Super Tuesday contests, said, "Strange things happen in politics, so I have no reason to get out." However, Robertson, campaigning in Chicago, said he planned to buy no television ads in Illinois, which has its primary next Tuesday.

He said he expected to pick up a bit of support from conservatives who had backed Kemp.

Bush flew to Illinois to press his campaign for the 82 GOP delegates at stake in the state's primary. And he quickly took up a new issue, saying he was "tired of being embarrassed by scandals surrounding public officials, though he named no names."

said: "So in your testimony, don't just say what you want, but say what you'll give."

If approved by Congress, the McClure-Andrus bill would create 1.4 million additional acres of wilderness and designate 611,000 acres for special management. Currently, Idaho has 9.5 million acres designated as wilderness.

Despite McClure's plea, opponents raked the bill, calling it "totally inadequate" to safeguard Idaho's wild lands.

Idaho Conservation League President Rick Price of Pocatello said it does not fulfill the basic intent of the 1964 Wilderness Act and its language needs to be changed and boundaries expanded to protect wildlife and people whose existence depends on it.

"Unless there are major changes in the bill as written, Idaho will be better off without it," Price said.

County commissioners from Teton, Fremont and Lemhi counties also spoke against the bill, contending Idaho needs no more wilderness. They said wilderness will create economic hardships and increase noxious weed problems on public and private lands.

Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, questioned what the additional wilderness would do "for the working men and women of Idaho and what are the ramifications of not passing any bill at all."

Randy Foutch of Denver, regional exploration manager for Anschutz Co., said designation of the Palisades area as wilderness would hamper exploration of the spot with the most potential for oil and gas in Idaho.

The company is in the process of drilling its fourth

exploratory well in the area along the Wyoming border, but it has not found oil yet.

However, he said a discovery could result in millions of dollars in royalties to the state. "Passage of this bill might not allow this economic potential to be realized," he said.

Ketchum City Councilman Bill Vanderbilt said he had to oppose the bill on economic grounds as well, but because it did not go far enough.

"The primary commodity our area has to sell is quality of life and the most marketable portion of that quality is wilderness, federal designated wilderness, not de facto wilderness," he said. "We cannot market de facto wilderness any more than timber companies can market poor quality of trees in our area or the mining industry can market the lack of minerals."

Andrus used the same theme in defending the proposal. "I would submit in Salmon, Idaho, that a person is just as welcome to cash a paycheck from an outfitter or guide as someone with a check from the local sawmill," he said.

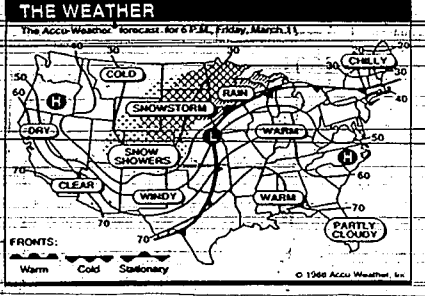
Conservation groups were the most adamant in their opposition. In addition to their desire for more acreage, they opposed the special management areas, water rights language and other provisions, including one that would designate any two-track trail in the proposed wilderness areas as a road.

The bill says roads cannot be closed if they can be used by four-wheel-drive vehicles.

"Any divot laid by a jeep will be called a road and will be taken out of wilderness," Price said.

Risch said the decision to allocate budget support will be critical to the budget session which he hopes to get together in the coming days.

"That does not include a general tax increase," Risch said. "All other options will be examined."

He declined to discuss what those options might be. But later on the Senate floor, State Affairs Chairman Phil Barr, R-Wilder, mentioned that delaying for a year a corporate income tax change called the "water edge" that would reduce the tax liability of multinational companies operating in Idaho by \$3.5 million.

"That temporary tax increase had been discussed early in the legislative session when it became apparent that more money would have to be raised and Republicans remained firmly opposed to the governor's proposed repeal of the \$15 million investment tax credit."

But even GOP lawmakers said tinkering with the water's edge proposal was bad tax policy, sending the wrong signals to key contributors of the economy who had been promised the change two years ago.

Among other options reportedly being discussed was the temporary increase in individual income taxes by delaying adoption of the changes in the personal exemption and standard deduction. Those changes approved last year would save individual taxpayers some \$7.8 million on 1988 returns.

During the budget committee deliberations on public school support, House Appropriations Chairman Kathleen Gurnsey tied the governor's investment tax credit repeal to a \$357 school budget, hoping to lure a combination of Democrats and Republicans representing large school districts.

But she got only two votes for the well-crafted proposal — hers and Boise Republican Rep. Brent Brockmeier's.

Plane crashes into houses
 WARREN, Mich. (AP) — A cargo plane loaded with truck parts nosedived into a residential neighborhood just after taking off early Thursday and exploded into flames, setting two houses afire and killing the pilot and a sleeping couple.
 Neighbors, who had been reading, watching television or sleeping, dashed to rescue the victims' three daughters and the occupant of the second house.

The twin-engine Beechcraft 13 flown by Thomas Bissard of Pontiac had just taken off on a flight from Detroit City Airport, not Detroit's main airport, to Fort Wayne, Ind., with a shipment of truck suspension parts for a General Motors Corp. plant.
 The plane hit a garage belonging to Iris Eady and a van before crashing into the bedroom of Norma and Harold Richardsons and exploding. Firefighters fought for about 45 minutes before bringing the flames, which also damaged Eady's home, under control.

Lobby fee benefits Meese
 LOS ANGELES (AP) — A \$150,000 payment to a friend of Attorney General Edwin Meese III for work on an Iraqi pipeline project ended up in stock-trading accounts that was apparently used to benefit Meese's finances, a published report said Thursday.
 The money, a legal fee intended for attorney E. Robert Wallace, went through two accounts before being deposited in October 1985 in a pooled account used to trade stocks on behalf of Wallace, Meese and others, documents obtained by the Los Angeles Times showed.
 The discovery indicates the fees Wallace received for lobbying the White House, with Meese's help, on the pipeline project, were later used to Meese's financial advantage, despite vigorous denials by lawyers for both Meese and Wallace, the paper said.

Secord denies infiltration
 BOSTON (AP) — Retired Air Force Maj. Gen. Richard Secord and another man involved in the Iran-Contra scandal on Thursday flatly denied involvement in any government effort to infiltrate the organizations of fringe politician Lyndon LaRouche.
 Secord said in a telephone interview that he was passing on a message from an associate when, in a memo to National Security Council aide Oliver North, he mentioned an apparent effort to collect information against LaRouche.
 Secord, a principal in North's private Contra-resupply network, said he was not aware of any government plot to infiltrate LaRouche organizations.

Contras, Sandinistas agree
 MIAMI (AP) — The Nicaraguan Contras on Thursday dropped a demand that had blocked peace talks with their homeland's Marxist government, agreeing to the open agenda proposed by the Sandinistas.
 The rebel group made the announcement at a news conference here where its leaders bitterly criticized the United States for cutting off Contra aid.
 "The United States has once again abandoned an ally," said Adolfo Calero, one of six directors of the Nicaraguan Resistance. "But we have been abandoned before. We will continue our efforts."
 Calero said the rebels will now accept the proposed open agenda for talks in Sapoa, Nicaragua, and suggested the talks begin March 16.

Settlement satisfies Army
 WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army and one of its largest contractors, Bell Helicopter/Textron Inc., have negotiated an \$88 million settlement to dispose of allegations the company overcharged for helicopter spare parts over a three-year period.
 The settlement, considered one of the largest ever in a defense contracting case, is scheduled to be signed and finalized on Friday, said Dan Howard, the Pentagon's chief spokesman.
 Under terms of the agreement, Bell will pay the government \$69 million within the next 30 days. The government also will have its choice of about \$11 million in spare parts inventory, Howard said.
 "Additional provisions of the agreement make it worth somewhere in the neighborhood of \$88 million."

Nancy's skin patch gets OK
 WASHINGTON (AP) — Nancy Reagan had a small patch of skin scraped from her right upper lip on Saturday and tests later found it to be non-cancerous, her press secretary said today.
 "It was from too much sun," said Mrs. Reagan's spokeswoman Elaine Crispin.
 The procedure marked the second time in five years that the first lady has had a growth removed from the area. In 1982, a growth was removed that was diagnosed as a basal cell carcinoma.
 "The first lady had a little scraping" done to remove the skin patch and no stitches were required, Mrs. Crispin said. She was informed of the results of the tests on Monday, the spokeswoman added.

Budget proposal irks NASA
 WASHINGTON (AP) — NASA officials warned Congress on Thursday that the space station program would be destroyed if money is diverted to build an unmanned scientific and manufacturing facility in space.
 At the same time, the space station budget came under attack elsewhere in the Capitol, when Rep. Edward P. Boland, D-Mass., pressed for more money for housing programs next year and said if that money is not allocated, then Congress will "kiss goodbye to the space station."
 Boland said "it would take \$1.5 billion to restore" the cuts in housing funds to the level needed. Unless Congress finds another source for those funds, he said, "you can kiss goodbye to the space station."

Students oppose non-deaf president

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gallaudet University students declared Thursday that Elisabeth Ann Zinser, the new president of the school for the deaf, is unwelcome on the campus and vowed to keep her out, although a congressman wants her to learn firsthand about the students' concerns.
 Students have been protesting the selection of Zinser, who is not deaf and does not know sign language, and their demonstrations have halted virtually all instruction for four days. They have promised to continue their protests until she resigns.

They threatened to seize the president's campus house and office if Zinser made her way past students blocking entrances to the school.
 The doors to the administration building were chained shut Thursday.

and no administrators were seen on campus.
 In other action on Thursday, one of the two deaf finalists for the school presidency withdrew his support for Zinser and said he would back the student protesters.
 A day earlier, I. King Jordan, dean of the school's college of arts and sciences, had said he was supporting Zinser for the post of the school. But Jordan told a student rally on Thursday that he could no longer support the new leader.
 "I must now publicly affirm my support for the point of view held by the Gallaudet community," Jordan said. Zinser's whereabouts Thursday could not be determined. University officials would not reveal at which hotel she was staying.

Student leader Greg Hlibok said students were willing to meet with Zinser, but intend to tell her and Jane Bassett Spilman, chairwoman of the school's board of trustees, that "there will be no dialogue, no compromise. That's what we're promising."
 "We want her out, and we intend to tell her she isn't welcome here, that she's not our president," Hlibok added.

Rep. David Bonior, D-Mich., who is a member of Gallaudet's board of trustees, said in a statement Thursday he suggested to Zinser that in the next few days she consult with the faculty, students, staff and alumni "to experience the passion with which they view the appointment of hearing president."
 "The time is long overdue for Gallaudet University to have a deaf president," Bonior said.

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 "We want her out, and we intend to tell her she isn't welcome here, that she's not our president," Hlibok added.

Soviets still ship arms to Nicaragua

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon doesn't know whether the sale of Japanese machine milling equipment helped the Soviet Union build quieter submarines, according to a top Defense Department official.
 "The Soviet-Union was building quiet propellers for its subs three years before the Toshiba equipment was exported between 1983 and 1985," said Richard Armitage, assistant secretary of defense for international security affairs.
 Armitage's assessment was contained in a letter outlining the Pentagon's opposition to congressional proposals which would limit or ban the sale of Toshiba products in the United States.

Their American counterparts, making it easier for the United States to keep track of the Soviet subs. Both sides are continually seeking to develop quieter submarines.
 Armitage's views were outlined in a letter to Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., chairman of the House Armed Services Committee. The letter was released Thursday.
 "The indignation felt in the United States is understandable," Armitage said. He added that "Perhaps some Americans don't fully realize that many Japanese feel a similar indignation complemented by acute embarrassment."
 "The actual damage done from the Toshiba Machinery diversions is difficult to assess," Armitage said.
 "Despite allegations of tens or even \$100 billion in damages, our Navy cannot determine the direct costs of this diversion to U.S. national security because the Soviets had quiet pro-

pellers three years before the first diversion and we had already planned programs to deal with this development," he said.
 A conference committee of 20 House members and seven senators is trying to work out House-Senate differences on an omnibus trade bill, and one of the unresolved issues involves Toshiba.

Toshiba officials admitted last year that a subsidiary company had sold the Soviet Union machine tools for making quiet submarine propellers.
 Navy officials have said in the past that Soviet subs were noisier than

Mill tools may help Soviets

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviet Union is continuing to ship arms to Nicaragua at a fast pace despite efforts by the U.S.-backed Contra guerrillas and Sandinista government to negotiate a peace accord, the Pentagon said Thursday.
 During the first two months of 1988, the Nicaraguans received 3,100 metric tons — or 3,400 regular tons — of weaponry and war materiel worth an estimated \$100 million, the Pentagon said.

The equipment was delivered in 10 crm shipments in January and February, the Defense Department said.
 If that pace is sustained, the Nicaraguans will receive at least 18,600 metric tons of weaponry this calendar year, compared with an estimated 21,700 metric tons delivered in 1987.
 Last year's arms deliveries to Nicaragua were valued by the Pentagon at \$666-million and arrived in 62 shipments.
 The January-February estimates are contained in an unclassified assessment of the Nicaraguan military buildup that is updated periodically by the Defense Department for administration leaders. It was released on request by the Pentagon's public affairs office.
 Including the latest estimates, the Pentagon maintains the Nicaraguan government has received arms valued at more than \$2.4 billion since calendar year 1980.
 The new update was prepared at a time when President Reagan is working with lawmakers to fashion an aid program for the Contra guerrillas. U.S. aid to the Contras was cut off Feb. 29 after the House refused to endorse an administration plan for military and humanitarian aid and then rejected a Democratic alternative to provide just humanitarian aid.

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Covert actions bill veto probable

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan would veto any bill requiring him to tell Congress about all covert actions within 48 hours after they start, Defense Secretary Frank C. Carlucci said Thursday.
 Carlucci, who was national security adviser before being named to the defense post last November, made the statement as a House Intelligence subcommittee continued hearings on a bill overhauling the procedure for White House cooperation with Capitol Hill on intelligence matters.
 Administration officials had suggested previously that a presidential veto of such legislation was likely, but Carlucci's statement marked the first time a top administration official had flatly promised a veto.

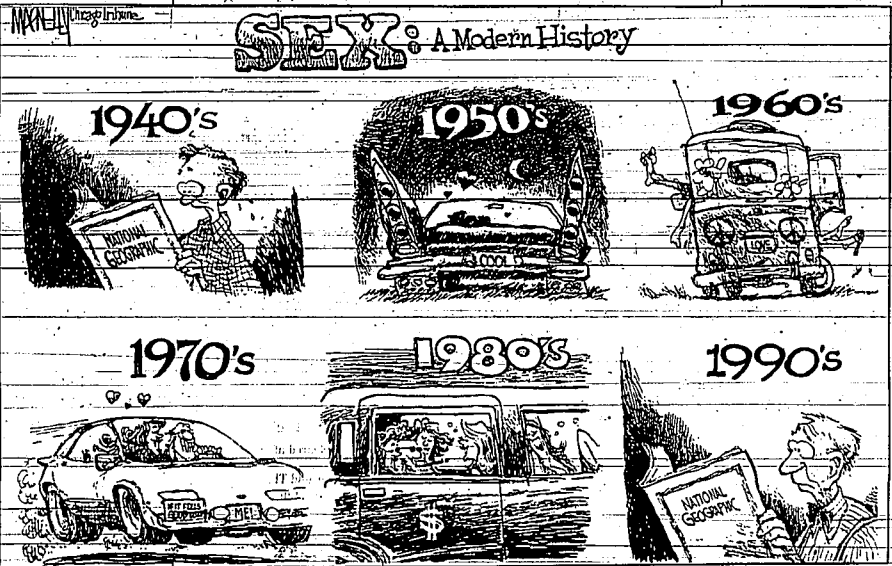
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Unified voices will assist development

On March 3rd, 25 members of the chambers of commerce in Magic Valley got together for lunch at the Canyon Springs Golf Course, the idea of Teresa McKinster, president of the Burley Chamber; chambers meeting together as representatives of thousands of businesses in the southland.

Dr. Mike Chenor assistant to the president of the College of Southern Idaho gave a brief talk and I took some notes which I will repeat here, as I believe they are of utmost importance.

Gooding County is in the unique position of having many (including all of Hagerman Valley) of the tourist attractions of the southland within its boundaries.

It also has four separate chambers of commerce, four economic development councils (each town), and five highway districts. It has neither a senator nor a representative of the state Legislature, although we do have some able representation from other counties of the southland.

Palestinians are citizens

The Arabs/Palestinians — are these a persecuted people? As an interested observer of up-to-date (current) affairs I have long suspected the media of projecting exaggerations into events abroad, inflating and distorting truth beyond respected limits.

My suspicion has been confirmed after having been only three months in Israel. It would be a gross misrepresentation to deny extent of the problems in the "occupied" territories. A truly objective perspective on severity and importance of particular events is impossible to achieve but one cannot help but despair at the way in which "news" has become an entertainment extravaganza. Unable to find sufficient protest, violence and anarchy at home, it's all too easy an alternative to seek it elsewhere.

Contrary to media propaganda reports of an anti-Israel nature, and to what many believe, the Arabs/Palestinians are full-fledged citi-

zens, enjoy every civil right, possess same status in law as Jewish Israelis. In summary, they enjoy the highest standards of living and liberty of any Arabs in Middle East. Compare the condition of 700,000 Arabs in Israel with that of pitiful remnants of Jewry in Arab countries.

Jews have been living in Arab lands/countries for 2,000 years. Under Arab dominance they were always third class citizens subject to harassment and persecution. There were 900,000 Jews in Arab countries in 1948 — now fewer than 25,000. Now there are 700,000 Arabs in Israel as against 150,000 in 1948, a four-fold increase. It's not all bad for the Arabs.

Education and literacy of Arab population in Israel is higher than in any Arab country. Literacy rate among Arabs in Israel is 95 percent, same as for Jews. There are 700 Arab educational institutions in Israel with about 200,000 students — 17 times as many as in 1948.

When state of Israel was created, 90 percent of Arab children attended school, highest ratio of any Arab population. Universities and technical institutions are freely available to Arabs. All religious communities in Israel enjoy full protection of the state. All are free to exercise their faiths. The holy sites are administered by their own internal affairs.

In contrast to non-Israeli, world (Arab) Arab women enjoy same status as men. Leaving the administered territories to future analysis, it is of interest to consider the status of Arab/Palestinian citizens in Israel, a country attempting to survive as the only Jewish country in the world — 9,500 kilometers in area, not even as large as the state of New Jersey, USA.

Rioting, vandalism plague West Bank

HEBRON, Occupied West Bank (AP) — Palestinians rioted near Jewish enclaves and Jews drove down Arab streets early Thursday firing at houses and savaging cars, the army and witnesses said.

Soldiers wounded three Arabs. Troops shot and critically wounded two other Arabs in the occupied Gaza Strip, hospital officials said.

In a new leaflet issued Thursday, underground Palestinian strike leaders told residents of the occupied territories to take revenge on Jewish settlers, Palestinians who aid Israel and those who sympathize with Jordan.

Leaflet No. 10, signed by the PLO's United Leadership of the Uprising, also ordered all Arab policemen to resign and told Palestinian merchants to boycott Israeli products and reduce prices charged to Arabs.

Two alleged collaborators have been reported killed since Arab riots began Dec. 8 in the West Bank and Gaza Strip, which Israel captured from Jordan and Egypt in the 1967 Middle East war. At least 87 Palestinians have been killed by Israeli gunfire or beatings, and hundreds have been wounded.

Police detained "Moussa" and "Ali Darwish," who were free pending trial on charges of printing thousands of PLO leaflets in east Jerusalem, Israeli radio reported.

Jews in Hebron, a city of 50,000 Arabs with two small Jewish enclaves, said they were awakened shortly be-

fore midnight by Arabs shouting "Slaughter the Jews" and "God is Great!" Some settlers said they rushed into the street and fired warn-

ing shots because they feared attacks on their homes.

Rabbi Moshe Levinger told The Associated Press the Arabs "ran down

near the synagogue. They wanted to enter Jewish homes. We responded by throwing stones and firing in the air. If we hadn't stopped them ... there would have been a slaughter of Jews, men, women and children."

Noam Arnon, another resident of the 40-family Beit Hadassah complex where Levinger lives, said Arabs did not attack Jewish homes.

The area military commander also disputed Levinger's claim. Arab residents of Hebron said they were awakened early Wednesday by an onslaught of settlers raiding their neighborhoods.

An AP reporter saw seven vandalized cars, including a station wagon with all its windows smashed and another gutted by fire. The cars were in four divergent locations, some more than a mile from any Jewish settlement.

The owner of the burned-out car, Khader Kafishei, reported seeing a Jew set it ablaze and pointed to bullet holes in the windows of his home.

'Hero mother' dies in hijack shootout

MOSCOW (AP) — A Soviet "hero mother" led her sons and other members of a musical family in desperate attempt to hijack an Aeroflot jet to London by hiding weapons and a bomb inside their instruments, Soviet media said Thursday.

Iraq offers truce in war against cities

BAGHDAD, Iraq — Iraq offered Iran a conditional truce Thursday in the current round of the "war of cities" that has inflicted heavy civilian casualties in both Iraq and Iran over the past 11 days.

A statement read over Radio Baghdad said that the truce would go into effect at 1 p.m. Greenwich Mean Time Friday if Iraq also stopped its attacks on Iraqi cities.

In Ankara, Turkish Prime Minister Turgut Ozal said Thursday that both Iran and Iraq had agreed to end the missile attacks with Tehran reportedly scheduled to stop its offensives at 3 p.m. GMT and Iraq stopping at 1 p.m. GMT, as announced, Ozal said.

Ozal said the warring countries had communicated their decision to him, after an appeal from him on Wednesday.

Recent Iraqi statements had consistently vowed to continue the missile and air strikes on Tehran and other Iranian cities until Iran accepted July 15 U.N. Security Council resolution for a complete cease-fire.

Iraq has launched 55 missile strikes on Tehran, Qom and Isfahan, as well as air raids on several other Iranian towns in the most recent flare-up.

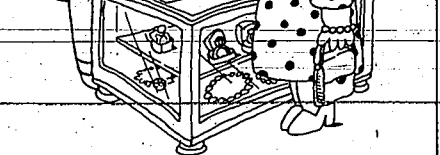

NOTTINGHAM, England — Audrey Hepburn and Olivia de Havilland were two famous names who played her, but Robin Hood's sweetheart Maid Marian was about as real as the celluloid heroines that Hollywood produced—and that's official.

The city fathers of Nottingham near Robin Hood's hunting ground of Sherwood Forest have produced a pamphlet exploding much of the Robin Hood myth.

The ballad singers and Hollywood romantics have created a legend that bears little resemblance to historical facts, the officials say in the brochure, which is aimed at the thousands of tourists who visit the area each year.

While the real Robin Hood of the Middle Ages might not have been the swashbuckler portrayed by Errol Flynn, he was at least real, as was his foe, the Sheriff of Nottingham.

But Friar Tuck is just as much a fiction as Maid Marian, and Little John, Robin's trusty and jovial sidekick, was in fact a grouchy rebel constantly at odds with the outlaw leader.

An exhibit called "Vienna 1938" has been mounted at City Hall. There are similar displays about the Nazi era at Linz, where Hitler spent his youth; Salzburg, Innsbruck and Graz, where the Nazi swastika was raised over the city hall even before German troops arrived.

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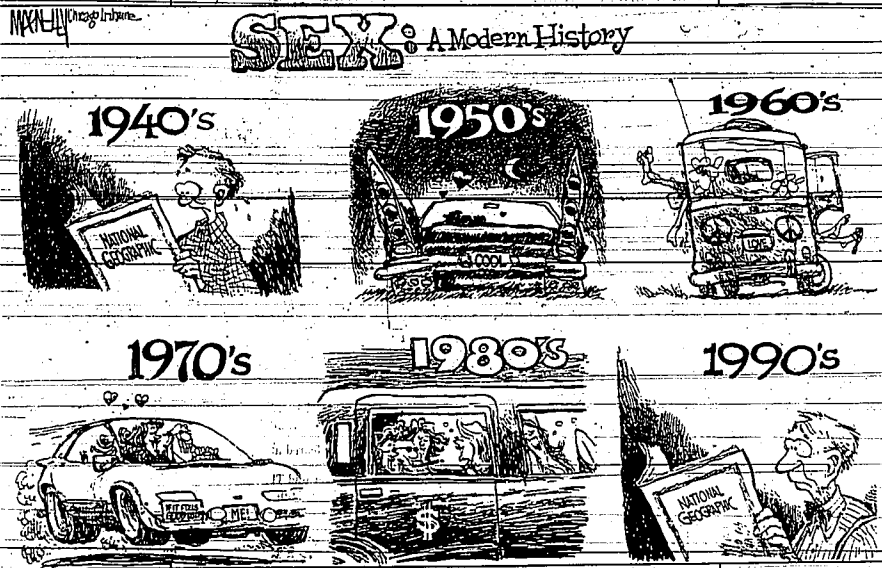

Palestinians are citizens

The Arabs/Palestinians — are these a persecuted people? As an interested observer of up-to-date (current) affairs I have lately suspected, the media of projecting exaggerations into events absent, inflating and distorting "truth" beyond respected limits.

My suspicion has been confirmed after having been only three months in Israel. It would be a gross misrepresentation to deny extent of the problems in the "occupied" territories.

A truly objective perspective on severity and importance of particular events is impossible to achieve but one cannot help but despair at the way in which "news" has become an entertainment extravaganza. Unable to find sufficient protest, violence and anarchy at home, it's all too easy an alternative to seek it elsewhere.

Contrary to media propaganda reports of an anti-Israel nature, and to what many believe, the Arabs/Palestinians are full-fledged citizens, enjoy every civil right, possess same status in law as Jewish Israelis. In summary, they enjoy the highest standards of living and liberty of any Arabs in Middle East. Compare the condition of 700,000 Arabs in Israel with that of pitiful remnants of Jewry in Arab countries.

Jews have been living in Arab lands/countries for 2,000 years. Under Arab dominance they were always third class citizens subject to harassment and persecution. There were 900,000 Jews in Arab countries in 1948 — now fewer than 25,000. Now there are 700,000 Arabs in Israel as against 150,000 in 1948, a four-fold increase. It's not all bad for the Arabs.

Education and literacy of Arab population in Israel is higher than in any Arab country. Literacy rate among Arabs in Israel is 95 percent, same as for Jews. There are 700 Arab educational institutions in Israel with about 200,000 students — 17 times as many as in 1948.

When state of Israel was created, 90 percent of Arab children attended school, highest rate of any Arab population. Universities and technical institutions are freely available to Arabs. All religious communities in Israel enjoy full protection of the state. All are free to exercise their faiths. The holy sites are administered by their own internal affairs.

In contrast to non-Israeli world (Arab) Arab women enjoy same status as men.

Leaving the administered territories to future analysis, it is of interest to consider the status of Arab/Palestinian citizens in Israel, a country attempting to survive as the only Jewish country in the world — 9,500 kilometers in area, not even as large as the state of New Jersey, USA. Again the lower structures if properly finished for a more esthetic appearance and the lower-falls-restored-and-spilled-over-top-of instead of underneath would resemble the lower falls somewhat, also it is needed.

Rioting, vandalism plague West Bank

HEBRON—Occupied West Bank (AP) — Palestinians rioted near Jewish synagogues and Jews drove down Arab streets early Thursday firing at houses and savaging cars, the army and witnesses said.

Soldiers wounded three Arabs. Troops shot and critically wounded two other Arabs in the occupied Gaza Strip, hospital officials said.

In a new leaflet issued Thursday, underground Palestinian strike leaders told residents of the occupied territories to take revenge on Jewish settlers, Palestinians who aid Israel and those who sympathize with Jordan.

Leaflet No. 10, signed by the PLO's United Leadership of the Uprising, also ordered all Arab policemen to resign and told Palestinian merchants to boycott Israeli products and reduce prices charged to Arabs.

Two alleged collaborators have been reported killed since Arab riots began Dec. 8 in the West Bank and Gaza Strip, which Israel captured from Jordan and Egypt in the 1967 Middle East war. At least 87 Palestinians have been killed by Israeli gunfire or beatings, and hundreds have been wounded.

Police detained Moussa and Ali Darwish, who were free pending trial on charges of printing thousands of PLO leaflets in east Jerusalem, Israel radio reported.

Jews in Hebron, a city of 50,000 Arabs with two small Jewish enclaves, said they were awakened shortly before

midnight by Arabs shouting "Slaughter the Jews!" and "God is Great!" Some settlers said they rushed into the street and fired warning shots because they feared attacks on their homes.

Rabbi Moshe Levinger told The Associated Press the Arabs "ran down

near the synagogue. They wanted to enter Jewish homes. We responded by throwing stones and firing in the air. If we hadn't stopped them ... there would have been a slaughter of Jews, men, women and children."

Men Arnon, another resident of the 40-family Beit Mahasrah complex where Levinger lives, said Arabs did not attack Jewish homes.

The area military commander also disputed Levinger's claim.

Arab residents of Hebron said they were awakened early Wednesday by carloads of settlers raiding their neighborhoods.

An AP reporter saw seven vandalized cars, including a station wagon with all its windows smashed and another gutted by fire. The cars were in four divergent locations, some more than a mile from any Jewish settlement.

The owner of the burned-out car, Khader Kalifeh, reported seeing a Jew set it ablaze and pointed to bullet holes in the windows of his home.

Levinger claimed 500 Arabs were rioting and came to within 100 yards of Jewish homes. He said about 50 settlers defended the homes.

Army spokesmen said 20 to 30 Arabs were involved in each of three disturbances in Hebron, and Jewish settlers set one Arab car ablaze. Soldiers wounded three Palestinians in the legs when rioters trapped their jeep, the army said.

City fathers debunk myth

NOTTINGHAM, England — Audrey Hepburn and Olivia de Havilland were two famous names who played her, but Robin Hood's swashbuckler "Maid Marian" was about as real as the celluloid heroines that Hollywood produced — and that's official.

The city fathers of Nottingham near Robin Hood's hunting ground of Sherwood Forest have produced a pamphlet exploding much of the Robin Hood myth.

The ballad singers and Hollywood romantics have created a legend

and that bears little resemblance to historical facts, the officials say in the brochure, which is aimed at the thousands of tourists who visit the area each year.

While the real Robin Hood of the Middle Ages might not have been the swashbuckler portrayed by Errol Flynn, he was at least real, as was his foe, the Sheriff of Nottingham.

But Friar Tuck is just as much a fiction as Maid Marian, and Little John, Robin's trusty and jovial sidekick, was in fact a grouchy rebel, constantly at odds with the outlaw leader.

Waldheim apologizes for Austrian atrocities

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — President Kurt Waldheim, himself accused of war crimes, apologized on Austria's behalf Thursday for atrocities Austrian Nazis committed after Adolf Hitler made his native land part of Germany 80 years ago.

"We must not forget that many of the worst Nazi hangers were Austrians," he said in a TV speech. "There were Austrians who were victims and others who were perpetrators. As head of state of the republic of Austria, I wish to apologize for Nazi crimes committed by Austrians."

About 15,000 Viennese gathered for a rally outside City Hall on the first of four solemn days marking the "Anschluss" of March 11, 1938, when German troops marched into Austria and were greeted by cheering crowds.

Among the speakers were survivors of concentration camps and Paul Gross, who leads Vienna's community of 6,000 Jews.

Austria's Jews "cannot forget" that 65,000 were killed by the Nazis and many more thousands had to flee, Gross said. "We should never let that stain of shame on the history of this city be forgotten," he declared.

Security was tight because of a

bomb scare early Thursday. Police removed cars parked nearby two hours before the rally began. City officials prepared thousands of black ribbons bearing the words "50 Years, March 1938, Never Again."

An exhibit called "Vienna 1938" has been mounted at City Hall. There are similar displays about the Nazi era at Linz, where Hitler spent his youth, Salzburg, Innsbruck and Graz, where the Nazi swastika was raised over the city hall even before German troops arrived.

Dozens of events are planned during the four days. He did not mention his own service in Hitler's army or a report last month on his conduct as a lieutenant in the Balkans from 1942 to 1945.

'Hero mother' dies in hijack shootout

MOSCOW (AP) — A Soviet "hero mother" led her sons and other members of a musical family in desperate attempt to hijack an Aeroflot jet to London by hiding weapons and a bomb inside their instruments, Soviet media said Thursday.

Two of the hijackers committed suicide and the woman was shot dead by family members as a police assault team stormed the plane that had been flown to an airstrip near Leningrad on Tuesday, the reports said.

In a series of unprecedented reports on a Soviet hijacking, the official media said members of the musical Ovechkin family opened fire with the weapons and set off a bomb after the plane landed.

Five of the hijackers died in the assault, as did three passengers and a stewardess, Tass said. The first report of the hijacking appeared in the media on Wednesday and said that seven people had died.

The family, led by their mother, Ninel Ovechkin, was from the southern Siberian city of Irkutsk, where the flight originated. They had recently performed in Japan, said the government newspaper Izvestia.

Mrs. Ovechkin once was named a Hero Mother of the Soviet Union, an honor bestowed on women who bear many children.

Deputy Civil Aviation Minister Ivan Vasin told Izvestia that the hijacking was "the most dramatic he could recall in his long career."

Eleven hijackers commandeered the Tupolev-154 jet as it was en route to Leningrad after a fueling stop in

the Ural Mountains city of Kurgan, and they told the pilot to fly to London, Tass said.

"Eyewitnesses pointed to three leaders among the criminal team — Vasily and Oleg Ovechkin and their mother Ninel Ovechkin, a plump, fashionably dressed woman of over 50," Tass said.

"They had brought the weapons and explosives aboard the plane in their musical instruments," the news agency said.

About 3 p.m. Moscow time, while the Tu-154 with 77 people was over the Volodga region east of Leningrad, the hijackers sent a note to the cockpit.

Izvestia quoted the note as saying: "Fly to a capitalist country (London). Don't fly any lower. Otherwise we'll explode a bomb."

The flight crew contacted the ground, and a plan was worked out to dupe the hijackers into thinking they were landing in Finland.

The assault team was waiting when the Tu-154 touched down at a field near Leningrad, Tass said.

A.F. Bystrov, a member of the assault team, told the nightly news program "Vremya" that the hijackers had shot their way into the cockpit to press their demands to flee the country.

Iraq offers truce in war against cities

BAGHDAD, Iraq — Iraq offered a conditional truce Thursday in the current round of the "war of cities" that has inflicted heavy civilian casualties in both Iraq and Iran over the past 11 days.

A statement read over Radio Baghdad said that the truce would go into effect at 7 p.m. Greenwich Mean Time Friday if Iran also stopped its attacks on Iraqi cities.

In Ankara, Turkish Prime Minister Turgut Ozal said Thursday that both Iran and Iraq agreed to end the missile attacks; with Tehran reportedly scheduled to stop its offensives at 3 p.m. GMT and Iraq stopping at 1 p.m. GMT as announced, Ozal said.

Ozal said the warring countries had communicated their decision to him, after an appeal from him on Wednesday.

Recent Iraqi statements had consistently vowed to continue the missile and air strikes on Tehran and other Iranian cities until Iran accepted July's U.N. Security Council resolution for a comprehensive cease-fire.

Iraq has launched 55 missile strikes on Tehran, Qom and Isfahan, as well as air raids on several other Iranian towns in the most recent flare-up.

Andy Gibb dies at 30

LONDON (AP) — Andy Gibb, who followed his brothers, the Bee Gees, to pop stardom but saw his career falter after he became heavily involved with drugs, died Thursday at the age of 30.

The Australian-born Gibb died at John Radcliffe Hospital in Oxford, 50 miles northwest of London, at 8:45 a.m., a hospital statement said. The cause of death was not given, according to a spokesman for Island Records Ltd. who asked not to be identified.

Press Association, the domestic British news agency, said Gibb was admitted to the hospital on Monday, discharged, and readmitted Wednesday night after complaining of stomach pains.

Gibb, who at times sang in a falsetto voice, had a string of hits in the late 1970s and early 1980s and was twice nominated for Grammy Awards. His chart-toppers included "I Just Want to Be Your Everything," "Love Is Thicker Than Water," "Shadow Dancing," "Everlasting Love," and "Our Love (Don't Throw It All Away)."

Despite his successful solo career, Gibb never fully emerged from the shadow of his older superstar brothers, Maurice, Robin and Barry, who formed the Bee Gees. Last year, Gibb went into bankruptcy proceedings.

In 1982, Gibb acknowledged he became heavily involved in drugs and dropped his career after the breakup of his highly publicized relationship with television star Victoria Principal.

Three years later, he entered the

Betty Ford Rehabilitation Center in Rancho Mirage, Calif., for treatment of a cocaine habit.

"This is really a shock," said his Miami lawyer, John Kozjak. "The last time I saw him, he looked perfectly healthy to me. He was playing tennis."

"Gibb had been living in Miami," Gibb's manager, Robert Stigwood, said in New York. "He was very sad and deeply distressed, and sorry. I have been in touch with his parents and brothers. I will miss him."

Dick Ashby, the Bee Gees' representative in Miami, said Gibb's mother, Barbara Gibb, was with him when he died.

The record company spokesman said Gibb signed a contract with Island Records two months ago and was due to work on a new album this spring.

Gibb was divorced from his wife, Kim, in 1978. The couple had one child, a daughter, Peta, 12.

In October, court papers filed in connection with his bankruptcy proceedings in Miami showed Gibb earned only \$7,755 in 1986 and lived rent-free while playing guitars loaned him by his brothers.

At the time he estimated his debts at more than \$1 million and his assets at less than \$50,000.

In addition to his singing career, Gibb had a stint as a co-host on TV's "Solid Gold," the syndicated musical variety show, but he was fired in 1982 for missing too many tapings.

Prince Charles escapes avalanche; friend dies

KLOSTERS, Switzerland (AP) — Prince Charles escaped an avalanche while skiing today, but the snowslide killed one of his friends and injured another.

Buckingham Palace identified the dead man as Maj. Hugh Lindsey, a former equerry or aide, to Charles's mother, Queen Elizabeth II. A woman in the party, Patricia Palmer-Tomkinson, suffered leg injuries, the palace said.

The palace said Charles was not injured. But witnesses said the prince looked distraught, and one said he was weeping and shaking as a helicopter arrived to pick him up.

Charles's wife, Diana, and Sarah Ferguson, his pregnant sister-in-law, were not on the slopes at the time, the palace said.

Swiss authorities said the snowslide on Mt. Gotschnagrat near Klosters began about 300 feet above a group of six skiers that included Prince Charles. The prince and three other people were unharmed.

The palace said the party was skiing off the main ski run and was stationary when the avalanche began at

2:45 p.m.

"All members of the party were in a position to take avoiding action with the exception of Maj. Lindsey and Mrs. Palmer-Tomkinson, who were both caught in the avalanche," it said.

Lindsey, 34, was a serving army major and a friend of Charles and Diana. He was married to a Buckingham Palace press secretary who was expecting a baby, the palace said.

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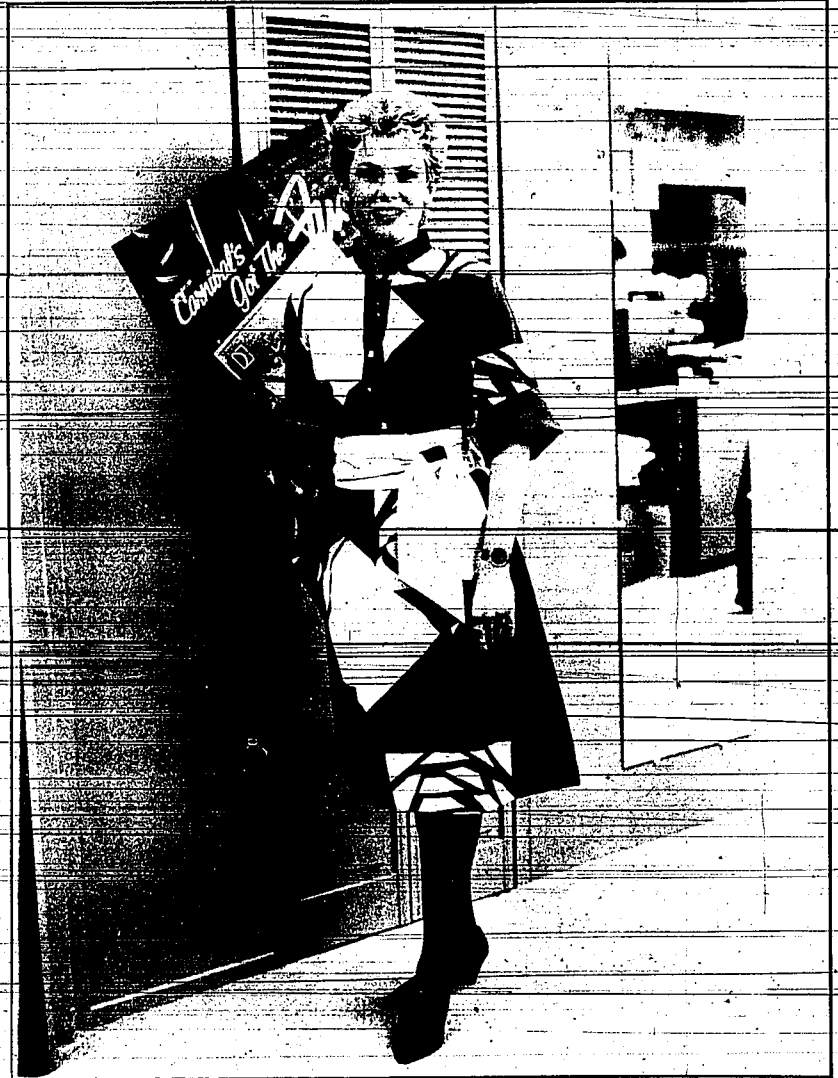

Drug charges refiled

"Here we go again," said Monte Carlson, who represents one of the women, Ketchum resident Barbara Murray. "You have to hand it to K. Baxter, she's a never-say-die gal."

The prosecutor's office has recharged Murray with possession of cocaine.

Murray originally was charged with misdemeanor possession of marijuana in February 1987 and was found innocent by a jury. She also was indicted for possession of cocaine in June 1987. It was dismissed because of improper jury selection. She was indicted for possession of cocaine in October 1987, but it was dismissed because of insufficient legal evidence and improper grand jury instructions.

The other woman, Juwena Diaz of Twin Falls, has been charged with possession of marijuana with intent to deliver.

Diaz was originally charged with possession of cocaine in February.

Trustees reorganize services

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls School District Board of Trustees voted to redo its special-services departments and spend up to \$38,479 for asbestos abatement.

With its vote, the trustees combined Testing Ancillary Services and the Special Education Department.

Administrators said there will be no loss of positions or changes in services or salaries as a result of consolidation.

The Special Education Department consists of the special-education staff, while ancillary services include psychologists, the Gifted and Talented Program and programs for hearing and communication disorders.

Assistant Superintendent Keith Tolzin said the reorganization of the departments had been discussed for at least two years.

Representatives from the State Department of Education recommended the consolidation last spring, he said.

Superintendent Carl Snow said increased psychological services will be a benefit as Ancillary Services Director Larry Watson moves from Administration to move counseling and testing. Special Education Director Bill Feusahrens will head the new combined department.

Tolzin said there will be a benefit in having to prepare one budget instead of two. There will be other benefits in terms of communication, planning and record-keeping, he said.

Some aspects of the consolidation

Residents support status quo during airport hearing

HAILEY — While Hailey is adamant in its demand to gain 60 percent control of Friedman Memorial Airport, residents of other Wood River towns argued Wednesday that one town should not control the economic lifeline of the area.

In front of a standing-room-only crowd of nearly 100 people at a county public hearing, the majority of residents, valley businessmen and area business owners stood to voice support for maintaining the present composition of the airport commission.

The board is currently made up of two representatives each from Hailey and Blaine County, plus representatives from Bellevue, Ketchum and Sun Valley. However, since Horizon Airlines installed a new microwave landing system that uses a landing path over the city of Hailey, the city of Hailey has demanded it control half the voting seats on the board.

The landing system has installed to make air transportation more reliable, by allowing Dash-8 jet flights to land in worse weather than instrument landings allowed previously and at night.

Sun Valley Co. general manager Wally Huffman said Wednesday that the issue of who should control the airport has polarized the Wood River Valley community, and it is Sun Valley Co.'s position that the present make-up of the airport commission is one which represents the entire valley.

"If there were to be any change to the make-up of the commission to reweight it, that reweighting should not allow veto power by any political entity," Huffman said.

Mike White, Elkhorn Resort manager, said he had lived under the flight paths of two airports previously and could sympathize with Hailey residents. But the airport is the "lifeline" of the resort community, he said.

Sun Valley Aviation manager

Wayne Werner said after working here for six years and attending most airport commission meetings, he has seen the commission act professionally. "It would be a terrible crime to the community if we didn't have fair representation," Werner said, agreeing the present make-up is justified.

There were those who felt a need for change, however.

Hailey resident and Sun Valley Co. employee Barbara Pidgeon said she felt the city of Hailey was acting in response to what their constituents desired. A Hailey town meeting last September drew over 200 people, with the majority speaking against Horizon Airline's use of the microwave landing system, saying the flights over town were noisy and created a safety hazard. Residents also voiced concern over late evening curfew hours.

Hailey resident Tom Teitze said most of Hailey's people would agree the airport is a boon for the whole valley, but he said, "I think Mr. Huffman would feel quite differently if the planes were all of a sudden approaching over his Sun Valley resort."

Although Hailey Mayor Paschal Drake, who also is employed as the airport manager, and Hailey City Councilwoman Mary Anne Mix attended the meeting, neither spoke.

Hailey City Attorney Keith Roark had advised the council not to participate in the public hearing. He said that since Hailey had made it clear to the county that Hailey is entitled to half the voting representatives of the airport commission, the city should consider Wednesday's public hearing to be only about who the county commissioners wanted to appoint to the other board positions.

Roark has maintained that since the airport is in Hailey and has used local tax money only from county and Hailey coffers, Hailey should have half the seats on the airport commission.

Speaking on behalf of the cities of Bellevue, Ketchum and Sun Valley, Wednesday, Councilman Ron Reese of

Idaho Power may ask PUC for surcharge

TWIN FALLS — Idaho Power Company may ask the state Public Utilities Commission for an unspecified surcharge on electrical bills to cope with low water conditions in the Snake River Basin, said a company spokesman on Thursday.

But no Bonneville Power Administration rate increase is foreseen despite low water conditions, said Robert Reed, a BPA spokesman in Portland.

The company estimated conditions that were close to the actual drought when it drew up its rates, said Reed. BPA also relies on the upper Columbia River while IPC's hydro system is tied more to Snake River flows.

The snowpack in the BPA region is 67 percent of normal, that is the tenth worst year in 67 years of record keeping, he said. The snowpack this year is about the same as last year, Reed said.

Flow of the Snake River at Lower Granite is 61 percent of average, according to the Northwest Power Planning Council staff.

IPC is looking at all possible means to cut expenses short of layoffs, said spokesman Larry Taylor.

Since 1984, the company reduced its workforce by 200 people through attrition and employee retirement, he said.

Among the economy measures is a plan to defer construction that requires a lot of materials, Taylor said.

During the 1977 drought, the PUC authorized about a 10 percent surcharge to all classes of Idaho Power customers, said Mike Gilmore, PUC attorney.

Idaho Power's last rate order assumes the utility could generate 1,100 megawatts of hydroelectric power this year, instead, IPC expects to generate only 790 megawatts through water power, said Taylor.

The mix of generation between

Agency wants energy conservation

TWIN FALLS — A regional electricity planning agency is struggling to get wider acceptance of energy conservation measures, particularly in new housing, said its members Thursday.

Energy conservation measures, such as adding home insulation, reduce the need to build more electrical generating facilities, said Jim Litchfield of the Northwest Power Planning Council staff.

The council met in Twin Falls Thursday, the second day of two days of meetings.

The council has conservation standards for both new residential housing and new commercial buildings.

The Bonneville Power Administration and other utilities

such as Idaho Power Company are giving builders financial incentives to build energy-efficient structures, said Litchfield.

The incentives take the form of paying builders money to adopt energy efficient building standards. Another incentive is helping builders market energy-efficient homes and paying buyers moving to purchase homes.

The homes are marketed under the Super Good Certs slogan.

In Idaho and western Montana, BPA will continue to make consumer payments in these programs in 1988 to the tune of \$17 million, Litchfield said.

However, by 1990 BPA will begin to reduce payments as the federal power-marketing agency sees acceptance of the conservation standards increase, said Sydney Berwager, director of BPA's division of resource management.

Russians to study NWPPC model

TWIN FALLS — Russians and Americans are used to sitting down at the bargaining table over weighty issues of world peace and nuclear destruction.

Now the Soviets will be coming to Portland next week to hash out a softer line: home insulation.

A group of Russians from the Soviet equivalent of National Academy of Sciences will take a look at the Northwest Power Planning Council's model conservation standards, said Jim Litchfield, council staff member on Thursday.

It's the Northwest Power Planning Council standards

they want to look at and talk about conservation programs generally," he said.

The regional power-planning agency is far ahead of other similar agencies in the United States in passing a code of model conservation standards for residential and commercial buildings, he said.

With Siberian winters, the Russians have an interest in conserving heat, too. They are not as interested as the Americans in the financial savings from conservation. Instead, they focus on items such as measuring heat flow in a building, Litchfield said.

Council staff will bring up projects such as the Hood River where every home in the Oregon community was weatherized, Litchfield said.

Oklahoma lawyer speaks in favor of teaching creationism

TWIN FALLS — An Oklahoma lawyer and author told Twin Falls teacher Phil Gerrish what he probably wanted to hear — that teachers have the right to teach creationism in public schools.

John Eidsmoe from Broken Arrow, Okla., not only talked creationism, Christianity and the Constitution Wednesday evening, but he attempted to make a case about the evils of evolution.

Eidsmoe relayed his messages to a mostly receptive crowd of about 80 people at the College of Southern Idaho. The lecture was coordinated by Gerrish, an O'Leary Junior High School teacher who taught creationism in his science class during a section on the earth's origins.

As a result, Times-News Managing Editor

Stephen Hartgen and his wife, Jan, filed a complaint with the Twin Falls School District.

The district appointed a committee to prepare a policy on the teaching of creationism as related to school curriculum, administrators announced Tuesday evening.

Gerrish contends that creationism is a scientific theory, like evolution. To prohibit his ability to bring this balance and supplemental curriculum to his classroom will crush his academic freedom, he says.

On Wednesday evening, Eidsmoe sided with Gerrish's stand, although he didn't mention the teacher specifically.

"My belief is that a teacher who wants to present a balanced approach is free to do so," Eidsmoe said.

Refusing teachers the opportunity to bring creationism into the classroom is a violation against their right to religion and academic right, said Eidsmoe, a former law professor at

Oral Roberts University and a personal friend of Gerrish's.

The deeper issue, Eidsmoe said, was the troubling influence of evolution on philosophy, law and how people view the Bible.

Evolution says man is part of a natural process and a product of his environment, implying that man isn't to be held accountable for his actions, Eidsmoe said.

He also provided the missing link between evolution and no-fault insurance.

"No-fault divorce, no-fault insurance, it's the same as the denial of human responsibility," he said.

The Biblical view of law is that it is God given, unchanging and related through the Scripture, Eidsmoe said.

By taking the Biblical accounts literally, he added, personal rights are implied.

"Thou shalt not steal," that conveys the right to property," he said. The commandment

against killing conveys right to life.

But that Biblical view was being eroded by evolution through the rise of "legal positivism," he claimed. That means there are no divine absolutes and that law is man-made, evolving and guided through its evolution by judges.

From an evolutionist view, "you have to believe that man doesn't have any more rights than an ape and an amoeba. The evolutionist has no firm philosophical basis," he said.

Eidsmoe came down hard on the judiciary branch, claiming it was usurping the powers rightfully belonging to lawmakers. With their rulings, judges make laws, he said. And, with each ruling the law is changed.

"That's all law is is a command of the higher authority," Eidsmoe said. But the higher authority was man and not God.

Anarchy and tyranny will result "unless you believe in the higher authority of God," he

said. "That's what's left if we reject the law of God."

Evolution also has implications on interpretations of the Constitution, which differ from that of the founding fathers, he said.

At the end of his presentation, Eidsmoe cautioned those present not to conclude that people who believe in this evil evolution are not necessarily "evil persons."

Throughout his presentation, Eidsmoe peeled off a plethora of quotes from people ranging from Thomas Jefferson to Oliver Wendell Holmes to Attorney General Edwin Meese. Some quiet "amens" were sprinkled in among the audience response.

In the crowd were familiar faces, including Twin Falls School Board Chairman Calvin Lamborn.

Lamborn said he attended the meeting because he was curious. Although he found it interesting, much of Eidsmoe's lecture wasn't pertinent to the current issue, he said.

Jones says legislation could save money

BOISE (AP) — Legislation pending before the Senate Judiciary and Rules Committee could save state and local government between \$5 million and \$15 million a year, says Attorney General Jim Jones.

In a speech to the Loss Prevention Conference here Thursday, Jones urged support for legislation limiting governmental liability for indirect actions. The bill covers damage claims over such things as inspection and closing functions, and supervision of people on parole and probation.

"The bill will provide taxpayer relief of up to \$5 million at the state level and up to \$10 million at the county and city level," Jones said.

He said if the measure does not pass, it will have serious impact on local government.

Recent Idaho Supreme Court decisions have tremendously increased the possibility local government will be exposed to liability claims for carrying out its duties, Jones said.

The decisions have opened government to liability for claims of alleged negligence in the issuing of licenses, making inspections and related functions, he said.

The attorney general listed cases involving alleged negligent supervision of parolees, inspections of fire hydrants, brand inspections and other things.

Since said the master plan must be completed and submitted to Gov. Cecil Andrus by Oct. 12.

The work will take time because the company is expected to collect more than 500 samples of materials to test for asbestos, Simcoe said.

In other business, the trustees also reviewed a proposed policy on standardized testing.

"We don't have a policy on testing and we're seeing more state mandated testing," Watson said.

Tests are used as a supplementary tool to help evaluate students, show achievement trends and results of the district's instructional programs, the policy states. But teacher evaluation of students is not the "paramount importance."

Bellevue presented the Blaine County Board of Commissioners a letter stating the three cities' position on the restructure.

The cities called for maintaining the current seven-member airport commission, including representatives from each of the three cities.

They also suggested all bodies involved go into open negotiations to compromise and reach a reasonable agreement, as well as clarifying a length of terms for the body.

The desire to change to a 50/50 structure is flawed, Reese said, explaining the latest proposal for three members each from Haley and the county leaves no means to break a deadlock in case of a tie vote.

The public hearing had been called for the county commissioners after requests came from the three cities and the Sun Valley/Ketchum Chamber of Commerce to allow a forum for the

commissioners to receive input on the issue. The commissioners had decided in a Feb. 8 closed executive session meeting to go along with Haley's demands to have a 50/50 split between the city and the county, eliminating voting representatives from the three other communities.

After making comments suggesting the commissioners thought the present composition of the airport commission was satisfactory, county resident Leonard Harlig asked the commissioners what made them change their minds on the issue.

Commissioner Robert Gardner said what it came down to was Haley's refusal to accept anything other than a 50/50 split, saying it would take the county to court if the county persisted in allowing other entities to allow seats on the board.

The threat of legal action and the implications involved with loss of federal funding for airport projects and

delays in dealing with safety issues were valued above keeping the present board makeup, Gardner said.

The only person to come up with any alternative suggestion was Harlig, who serves as a commissioner on the county's planning and zoning board. Harlig's suggestion to break a deadlock situation would be to have the airport commission comprised of five members from Haley, two members from the county and one member each from Ketchum, Bellevue and Sun Valley.

Under the gavel of Commission Chairman Rupert House, the hearing discussion was limited solely to the composition of the airport commission, and not other airport matters. As such, the meeting was limited to an hour.

The commissioners adjourned without making a decision. They will take the matter up Tuesday at 9 a.m. in open session.

While Tolman suggested the board take more time to review the proposal, Board Chairman Calvin Lamborn said the district should move along.

"My concern is that there will be a tremendous rush at the last minute," Lamborn said.

1987. It was dismissed at a preliminary hearing. She was indicted for possession of more than three ounces of marijuana in June 1987. It was dismissed because of improper jury selection.

She was indicted for possession of marijuana with the intent to deliver in October 1987. Again, the charge was dismissed.

All the charges in both the Diaz case and the Murray case stem from a single raid at Diaz' house at 277 Alexander St. by Twin Falls City Police and state narcotics agents.

Carlson said he hoped the prosecutor's office would drop the case against his client, Murray.

"I'm really disappointed," Carlson said. "Whatever lessons she's (Murray) supposed to learn, she's learned by now."

But Carlson added, "We're never going to lay over and play dead."

Charges against the women ran into trouble earlier for several reasons.

A police officer testified in a September grand jury that the amount of white powder, allegedly cocaine, that Murray allegedly had in her purse during the Feb. 19 raid was so small that officers couldn't field test the substance.

That was part of the reason the October grand jury indictment against

Murray was thrown out. Carlson has requested a preliminary hearing.

The Diaz case will be heard in front of the same judge who heard the earlier charges. 5th District Magistrate Thomas R. Cushman presided over a March 1987 preliminary hearing involving Diaz where Twin Falls Detective Ron Axman refused to disclose the identity of an informant who led him to Diaz' house.

Axman's refusal led to dismissal of the charges.

Once again, Cushman will rule on the case this spring, one year and two dismissed grand jury indictments after his original ruling.

hydro and thermal sources (coal and gas fired power plants) is different than what the PUC assumed, he said. IPC will try to a greater degree than the PUC expected on the more expensive thermal sources, he said.

IPC is appealing the rate order the assumed more hydro generation. The state Supreme Court has not ruled on the case yet. In that rate order the PUC granted IPC a \$2.9 million increase of its \$300 million rate request.

"We look like we won, but we have some average shortfalls here. Rates pressure average streamflow of 22,000 cubic feet per second at Brownlee Dam.

Last year we have averaged 12,500 cfs. This year, expect 13,100," Taylor said.

Surplus power sales that IPC uses to boost its income have also been sharply reduced because of low oil and gas prices in surplus states, said Taylor.

The companies are making their own electricity rather than buying hydro.

The standards cover a building's heating system, the type of lighting, air-conditioning, refrigeration and the building shell.

In Twin Falls, the council's conservation standards are not part of the city's building code, said Gary Young, city engineer.

In addition to conservation matters, the council, with its Idaho members based in Boise, works on power planning issues and ways to make up for fish and wildlife damage resulting from dam construction.

It was created under the Northwest Power Act of 1980 and includes two members from each of the participating states, Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington.

The council staff plans to look at a number of issues in 1988.

They will examine how much transmission line capacity is enough, said Litchfield. This relates to the competition to build new power lines to the south and southwest to tap the lucrative Sunbelt market.

Another upcoming task will be to update the region's 1986 power plan.

The controversial protected areas designation issue will be discussed at the council's April 13 and 14 meeting in Missoula, Mont.

The staff proposal identified rivers and streams to be protected from hydro development. The proposal also drew the ire of state water interests and politicians.

The council will accept public comment on the plan through the April meetings, said Ed Shets, council executive director. To date the council has received 400 to 500 comments on the plan, he said.

Association 'appalled' at demise of Gem licensing measure

BOISE (AP) — Representatives of building contractor associations said Thursday afternoon they were "appalled" by a House State Affairs Committee vote shooting down an industry-approved statewide contractor licensing bill.



The measure, with solid industry support, was ordered held in committee on a 10-9 vote.

Later in the day, the Building Contractors Association of Southwestern Idaho, the Idaho Building Contractors' Association, the Associated General Contractors of Idaho and the Eastern Idaho Contractors' Association held a news conference to complain about the action and urge the committee to reconsider.

But the two chief sponsors of the legislation, Rep. Dean Haugenson, R-Coeur d'Alene, and Rep. Jerry Deckard, R-Eagle, said they had no immediate plans to fight the battle again.

"At this time, we find it difficult to understand why barbers, beauty par-

lors and auto dealers are required to be licensed, when the builder who constructs your home or office building is not," the association said.

Members said the bill defeated by State Affairs was the first to draw a consensus of support from the industry itself.

Idaho had a statewide contractor licensing law in the 1960s. But as soon as it was enacted, contractors won a court order blocking it and the next session of the Legislature repealed it.

Earlier, sponsors of the legislation said it is necessary to protect both the public and also honest contractors from unethical competitors.

"We need to keep a level playing

field so the honest operators have a chance to survive," said Deckard.

House Bill 721 makes it illegal to be a contractor without a license. It requires licensed builders to provide reasonable performance bonds, to carry at least minimum liability insurance and to provide unemployment and workmen's compensation benefits to employees.

"Most importantly," the association said, "it provides an opportunity for consumers, suppliers and subcontractors to seek redress in the event of problems arising from any construction project performed by a licensed contractor."

But opponents in State Affairs ar-

gued that the regulation required could put small contractors out of business, even though a contractor-legislator said the cost would be minimal.

Rep. L. Ed Brown, R-Pocatello, said people in his area, especially the small, specialty contractors, opposed the legislation. One contractor said it would lead to "minimization of contractors."

Rep. James Stoicheff, D-Spalding, said he felt a simpler bill would be better, one doing little more than require contractors to register.

He said the committee has listened to a lot of "horror stories" about contractor abuses, but there is an infor-

mation on the extent of the problem or even how many contractors there are in the industry.

Haugenson, who is a contractor, told committee members it's hard for honest operators to compete, because there are so many small contractors who refuse to pay workmen's compensation, buy liability insurance or make unemployment payments.

Rep. Wayne Sutton, R-Midvale, said he was concerned the regulations might be too expensive for small contractors.

"We also need to think about protecting the consumers," said Rep. Ruby Stone, R-Boise.

Bill involving governor in pardons passes Senate

BOISE (AP) — Legislation requiring the governor to approve or reject sentence commutations or pardons for felons convicted of specific serious crimes has been narrowly approved by the Idaho Senate.

On a 21-19 vote Thursday, the Senate sent the measure, opposed by Democrats and Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus, to the House for final action.

Senate Judiciary Chairman Roger Fairchild, R-Fruitland, said the move would "help keep the incorrigibles where they belong."

Under the bill, made possible by a 1986 constitutional amendment giving the Legislature control over pardon and parole matters, any commutations or pardons approved by the Commission on Pardons and Parole involving murder, voluntary manslaughter, rape, kidnapping, lewd conduct with a child and manufacture or delivery of drugs would have to be signed by the governor to be valid.

Fairchild maintained that the board is too far removed from the electorate to be responsible to the public feeling on the sensitive issue of freeing criminals. Currently, the five-member board is appointed by the

three-member Corrections Board, which is appointed by the governor.

"If anything goes wrong, seriously wrong, there's nobody the people of Idaho can turn to," Fairchild argued, pointing out that 37 other states have similar requirements.

"It puts a politically accountable person in the last decision step," he said.

But opponents, led by Sen. Cecil Gray, D-Boise, and Ron Beitelbacher, D-Grangeville, contended the plan would just inject politics back into the system, opening the way for impropriety. Mrs. Gray specifically referred to the case in the late 1970s when the governor of Tennessee was indicted for selling pardons.

And to underscore the point, Beitelbacher proposed totally revamping the law to make the commissioners elected officials, an idea Fairchild said was "not a bad concept," but one he and a majority voted against.

Fairchild also pointed out that a solid Democratic majority with a few Republicans defeated a proposal last year to make commission members direct appointees of the governor rather than the Corrections Board.

Highway 95 funding shift clears Senate

BOISE (AP) — The state Senate Thursday approved legislation diverting millions of dollars of state fuel tax receipts from the Department of Law Enforcement to upgrading U.S. 95, the only land link between north and south Idaho.

On a 31-7 vote, the bill was sent to the House for final action. But prospects for passage of the measure there were unclear. The House has already rejected another funding proposal for Highway 95, and the impact of the Senate-passed bill would aggravate an already critical general revenue situation facing legislative leaders.

But Senate Transportation Chairman C.A. Smyser, R-Parma, supported by all the central and northern senators, argued that the state's economic development efforts would not be completely successful until there was an adequate highway linking the northern and southern parts of the state.

"This physical barrier we have does not need to continue," Smyser said. "The only problem we have is money."

The bill would phase out fuel tax support of the state Department of Law Enforcement over the next three years, shifting that money to road improvements, particularly U.S. 95. It would also lock into law the 48 percent of primary highway spending allocation now being given the road that has been carried a good decade by leaders of both political parties.

Based on current figures, about \$2.5 million in fuel tax money would be shifted from the Department of Law Enforcement to the highway work in the new 1989 budget, \$5 million in the 1990 budget and \$7.5 million in the 1991 budget and the budgets after that.

Reid challenges Stallings

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The Republican Party lacks a viable candidate to run for Idaho's 2nd District congressional seat now held by Democrat Richard Stallings, says an Idaho Falls woman who plans to run for the seat.

Janet L. Reid, 42, announced her campaign on Tuesday. She said she has been gathering signatures on nominating petitions and plans to have 600 by the time she files for office.

The filing period for Idaho's May 24 primary election opens March

21 and closes April 16.

Diane Watkins, former state senator, is the only potential candidate to surface so far, but Ms. Reid said Watkins hasn't generated much enthusiasm among Republicans to run for the seat.

Watkins was among a GOP nomination field running for the six-person primary election two years ago, but lost the primary election to Mel Richardson of Idaho Falls.

As for Stallings, Ms. Reid said, "I don't feel he's listening to his constituents."

Shepherd eyes House

LEWISTON (AP) — David Shepherd of Lewiston is abandoning his hopes for the Democratic presidential nomination to vie for the Democratic nomination in Idaho's 1st Congressional District in May.

Shepherd said he is taking himself out of the presidential race because he comes from a small state, is only 48 years old and "belongs in Congress."

A logger-baker-developer, Shepherd ran for U.S. Representative in 1984 and 1986.

"They say the third time is a charm," he said.

Last year, he planned to test local

support for his presidential bid with three fund-raising dinners in the Panhandle, but the only people attending were one reporter, Shepherd and the caterers.

He said he is currently an apartment manager at Lewiston.

Bonnars Ferry lawyer Bruce Robinson is the only other Democrat in the May primary so far, and Shepherd charged Wednesday that Robinson only has one issue: turning U.S. Highway 95 into Interstate 11.

"If that's all he can do, the best of luck," Shepherd said.

Anti-tax hike group files complaint about lobbying endeavors for IEA

BOISE (AP) — A Boise group calling itself the No Tax-Hike Committee has filed a complaint with the state over a lobbying effort for the Idaho Election Association.

The group presented Deputy Secretary of State Ben Yursura with a two-page complaint alleging the IEA paid \$10,000 for lobbying effort by David D. Ripley and Associates, a Boise company.

"This level of harassment amazes me," Ripley said later, describing the group's appearance at the secretary of state's office as "kind of a media event."

Ripley said he would respond in writing when requested to do so by the secretary of state's office, but said he felt his company had done nothing wrong. "It's highly arguable whether

we needed to file in the first place," he said.

Ripley said it appeared that the group was harassing him because his organization played a role in defeating a group of ultra-conservatives in the last election, including Republicans Gene Winchester of Kuna and Robert Forrey of Nampa.

Yursura advised the No-Tax-Hike Committee if it wanted to file a formal complaint, it would have to use the proper forms. Under normal procedure, Yursura said he would forward the complaint to the parties involved for response.

The complaint was based on a Feb. 10 story in a Boise weekly newspaper, This Week. The story alleged that Ripley's company conducted a secret lob-

bying effort for the IEA, without registering with the secretary of state's office as a lobbyist as required under the Idaho Sunshine Law.

Peter Watt, Jim Auld and Jack Kitchens of the No-Tax-Hike Committee issued a statement that the failure to register as a lobbyist was "a deliberate attempt to avoid disclosure."

The statement said Ripley registered as a lobbyist Feb. 16 after a telephone inquiry from Yursura, but said that was not voluntarily and in good faith but happened because of Yursura's inquiry.

The statement also quoted Yursura as saying the violation was the worst since inception of the campaign finance reporting laws in Idaho. Yursura said the group's statement was not correct.

Girls spend night in cold

MOUNTAIN HOME (AP) — Two Mountain Home girls spent a bitterly cold night in the Danskin Mountains north of town after abandoning their car Tuesday.

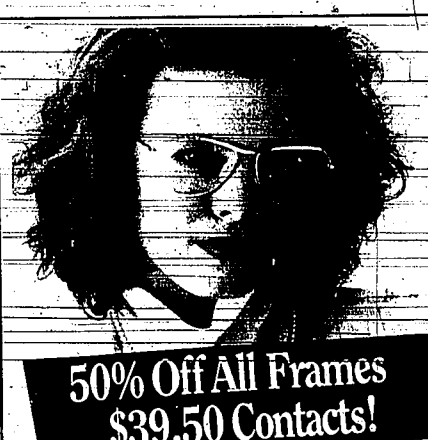

Wearing only light jackets and tennis shoes, the girls endured temperatures of about 10 degrees above zero. They had one blanket between them.



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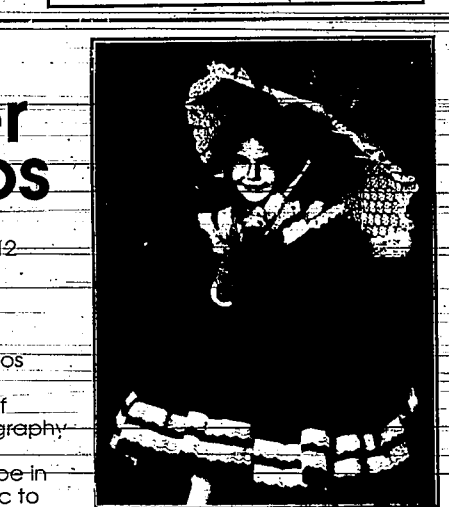
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CSI takes final step before nationals

CSI has never won a bi-regional playoff on the road, losing to Arizona Western in the days of the three-game playoff back in 1974. CSI twice has beaten the Matadors in bi-regionals in Twin Falls but has lost at Mesa, Ariz., and dropped a homecourt finale to

Dixie College (when Dixie was part of Region 1) in 1979.

"It is a school record that we know and believe we can change," says CSI Coach Fred Trenkle. "Certainly, Arizona Western is a very respectable team because you don't win a regional without being pretty good. But I feel if we play basketball here, we can tend to business."

Arizona Western Coach Jim Amick, who was profiled prior to losing to CSI in Twin Falls two years ago, maintains things haven't changed much to two years.

"We've got five or six good kids playing pretty well," he said with a smile, adding he wasn't sure his team could handle a nationally ranked

team.

But Amick has one solid statistic in that six individuals are averaging double figures.

Arizona usually is paced by 6-foot-7-inch freshman Kevin Cutler who averages 16 points and 12 rebounds per game. He is being recruited by a large number of Division I powers.

"If you want to know how good he is, just ask Tank," Amick said in reference to CSI freshman forward Tank Collins. They're both from Pomona and they've played against each other a lot.

Amick also has 6-8 center Kerry McIntyre with a 16.3 scoring average; Tim Crawford, a 6-5 forward, and 14 points per game; 5-10 guard James

Lloyd, 12 points, and 5-7 guard B.J. Carter, 17 points. The sixth man with the big numbers is Dave Truell, a 6-4 swingman, who is averaging 12 points.

All that adds up to 88 points-but Amick says it also indicates a major weakness on his team.

"Our top six get basically all our points. If you can hold a couple of them or get them in foul trouble, our point production drops off immediately. We don't have the depth we hear that CSI has," he said.

Amick said his philosophy on offense remain close to what CSI fans could remember from two years ago. "We will run if there is any chance. We have not changed that," he said.

He also said that the Matadors probably are considered a zone, defense team by other clubs but noted "we probably play more man this year than we ever have."

With that knowledge, Trenkle completes the comparison of the Eagles' task this week to that of last week.

"In St. George we had to contain their guards to win — (Snow's Ron) Green in the first game, (CEU's Kelvin) Lee in the second game and (Salt Lake's Jerry) Sommer in the third," he said. "We were able to accomplish that but the difference here is that Arizona Western has two excellent, quick guards. I understand they build a lot of their offense around

Stingy Grizzlies derail Spartans' A-1 title hopes

POCATELLO — For 10 quarters of basketball over the last three months, Skyline High School's team played second-best to top-ranked Minico.

So Grizzly Coach Jim Lewis decided to do something about it here Thursday in the first round of the Idaho Class A-1 boys' tournament.

"We spent the first half trying different kinds of defenses, and we finally decided the kids were just getting confused," he said. "So we decided to go out in the second half in a 2-3 zone and just play basketball."

The result was a horror story for the Spartans, a 53-43 loss that ended Minico's hopes for a state championship against a team that it had beaten by 25 and 10 points during the regular season.

"I can't speak for these kids, but I thought we were ready for this game," said Minico Coach Craig Dexter afterward. "There certainly were no surprises in what Skyline did today."

The loss threw the Spartans into a 9 a.m. encounter in the Holt Arena this morning against Lewiston, a 51-49 loser to Nampa in another first-round game Thursday. The Grizzlies, whose 15-12 record is the second-worst in this tournament, will play 10-14 Nampa this afternoon at 4:45 in one semifinal.

In Thursday's other first-round games, second-ranked Pocatello defeated Caldwell 57-45 and fourth-rated Idaho Falls beat third-rated Borah 57-51.

Idaho Falls plays Pocatello for the third time this season at 8:05 p.m. in one semifinal, while Borah and Caldwell will get together in a 10:40 a.m. loser-out contest.

Skyline put four players in double figures and held Minico to 31 percent shooting.

"When we were even after the first half, I felt we had a good chance to win the game," said Lewis. "After we got up by six or seven, I think we got them a little frazzled."

Minico led by one at the intermission, but hit just seven of 22 shots

from the field in the second half, or 22 percent. Skyline, meanwhile, shot 56 percent in the second half and 47 percent for the game.

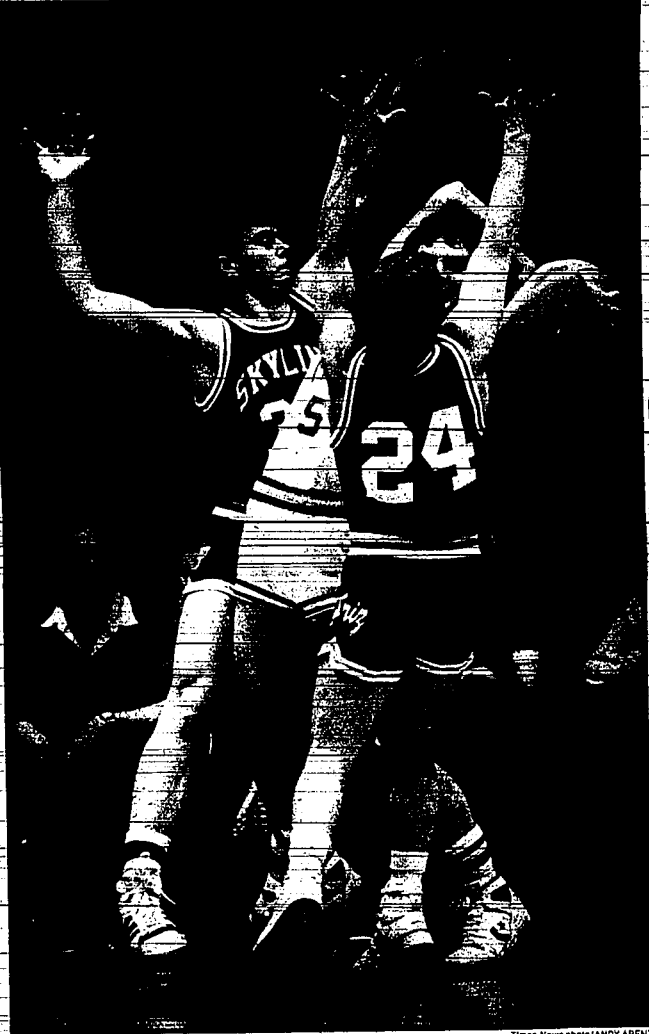

BOZEMAN, Mont. — Idaho State forward Rodney Harris poured in 10 of his 17 points in the final 10 minutes here Thursday to help fourth-seeded Idaho State outlast Weber State 58-57 in the second round of the Big Sky Conference basketball tournament.

The defending league champion Bengals will move into the conference semifinals tonight against top-seeded Boise State, a team that has beaten them three times this season.

The other semifinal game will pit third-seeded Montana State, a 60-54 winner over Montana in Thursday's other second-round game, against second-seeded Idaho. That game will be played at 9:10 p.m.

Both games will be televised in the Magic Valley by Nampa TV station KTVI, cable channel 6.

Emballt Weber State Coach Larry Farmer was not hanging his head over Thursday's loss, which

ended the Wildcats' season at 9-21.

"I can't (Idaho State) there enough credit," said Farmer. "They've played us four times this season but we four times. After the last Northern Arizona game, it was the first time in my coaching career I walked off the court with my head down because I didn't feel we gave our best effort. Tonight I walked off the court with my head up because the players played 110 percent."

"Our game plan was to take the best open shot because of the man de-

fense they were playing," Farmer continued. "We were going to penetrate inside, get some fouls and make some foul shots if we didn't score inside."

While the taste of victory Thursday was sweet, ISU Coach Jim Boutin said the Bengals have their work cut out for them tonight.

"We certainly need to do a few things better tomorrow than we did tonight," he said. "Troy Miles is going to have to shoot better tomorrow. He was 0-for-8 tonight. I told him after tonight's game that I have as much confidence tomorrow as I did tonight. We need outside shooting."

"I feel like the pressure is off us now," Boutin continued. "We came in seeded fourth and we're in the semifinals. Boise State is seeded first and they are supposed to win. I hope that we can play well and keep the game close and have a chance to win."

Harris' two free throws with 1:15 left put the Bengals ahead for good at 54-53 after Weber had rallied in the second half and taken a brief lead.

With 23 seconds to play, Michael

Green hit a tough driving shot in the lane to give Idaho State a 56-53 edge.

Burley's Greg Boyd of Weber was fouled with six seconds left and made the first shot but missed the second intentionally in hopes his team could grab the rebound. Harris snarled the ball, was fouled and sank two free throws for a 58-54 edge with just four seconds to go.

A desperation three-point shot by Anthony McGowan of the Wildcats at the buzzer was good and cut the final margin to just one point.

Idaho State controlled the first half and took its biggest lead at 24-12 with eight minutes to play and held a 32-27 halftime edge.

Weber got the first four points of the second half and then both teams went cold as defenses took over. Each team managed only six points during the first eight minutes of the second half before Weber State rolled off nine points in a row and went ahead for the first time since early in the game.

A layup by forward Rico Washington, who led the Wildcats with 24

points, gave Weber a 41-38 lead at the 10-minute mark, and the game was close from there on.

Idaho State, 16-12, also got 12 points from Jim Rhoad and 10 from Chase Brown.

Washington was the only double-figure scorer for the Wildcats Boyd and fellow guard Timmy Gibbs, who combined for 54 points in an upset 96-98 overtime win Wednesday over Nevada-Reno, managed only three points between them against Idaho State.

Art from the REAL WORLD

Herrett commercial art exhibit includes
the work of three Magic Valley natives

TWIN FALLS — In 1964, New York artist Andy Warhol turned an effete art establishment on its ear when he painted a Campbell's tomato soup can and dared to call it art.

Warhol's purpose — or at least one of them — was to force his audience to consider the famous label as a work of fine design. His efforts brought mixed reviews. Yet today Warhol is remembered as a genius, and the commercial art he admired — labels, packages, posters and other advertising — is winning its rightful place on the walls of America's museums.

Last week in Twin Falls, the Herrett Museum introduced its own exhibit of commercial art — works curator Mike Green calls "Art from the Real World."

The featured artists are three former Magic Valley residents, Stephanie and Mark Gerber and Chris Butler. Their artworks include posters, book covers, paper sculpture and illustrations.

Besides reading an occasional tale by Edgar Allan Poe, Stephanie Gerber doesn't like horror stories. But she and husband, Mark Gerber, have carved out

Commercial artist sees work as fine art

TWIN FALLS — Chris Butler is one commercial artist who has paid his dues.

Born and raised on a farm near Eden, Butler decided when he was still a little boy that he wanted to be an artist — either that or a drummer. He eventually gave up his rock and roll dreams, but not his artistic aspirations.

Butler graduated from Valley High School in 1970, studied art at the College of Southern Idaho and Utah State University and then moved to Seattle to try to earn a living with his scribbles.

From Seattle, Butler moved to Los Angeles where he inhaled smog for eight years, just long enough to establish a reputation and contacts with advertising agencies around the country. Now, after 14 years in commercial art, Butler, 35, has retreated to Colorado and clear air.

The artist spends his workdays turning out pen and ink drawings and intricate paper sculptures for clients like American Express, Toyota and Natural Light Beer. And he never has to leave his cramped, 300-square-foot studio in downtown Boulder because a network of agents in New York, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Denver do the legwork for him.

"I couldn't have done this if I hadn't established myself first in a larger market," Butler said during a telephone interview. "You have to establish yourself as a free-lance commercial artist and

there are probably just three places in the United States that you can do that — New York, Los Angeles or Chicago."

Butler wouldn't discuss his income, but his drawing board is so hot these days that he says he won't touch a paper sculpture assignment for less



than \$3,000. "And right now I'm buried in paper sculpture," he says.

While much of his work is contracted through advertising agencies, Butler has never worked at an agency himself because he says he wouldn't

want to work for one client all the time. He only half-jokingly says, "Take Jockey for example, I don't want to be doing underwear for 10 years."

Still, Butler is a commercial artist through and through. "My job is to sell a client's product," he says. Butler gets annoyed by people who ask him when he is going to "do something original" instead of just commercial pieces.

"I think of my work as fine art," he says. "Every time I pick up my pen it's original. Always."

The artworks on display at the Herrett attest to Butler's originality, as well as his healthy sense of humor. In a drawing entitled "Inventing the Wheel," Butler takes a stab at critics — perhaps even his own — when he depicts a prehistoric man with hammer and chisel in hand pounding away at a piece of rock that is beginning to look like a wheel. Meanwhile, his cohorts and even a dinosaur stand by laughing at the oddly rounded sculpture.

In another drawing entitled "Baby Sitter," Butler recreates a couch quarterback who sits mesmerized before a portable television, cigarette and beer in hand, while the youngster he is supposedly caring for lies qualling beneath the babysitter's deriere.

The exhibit also includes two of Butler's finely detailed paper sculptures, "Turkeys" was commissioned for a company calendar and consists of a tangle of knobby turkey legs and beaks. "Carousel," the other paper sculpture on display

a niche for themselves designing covers for novels dealing in horror, suspense and the occult.

Gerber is a petite brunette, with short curly hair and an innocence that makes it difficult to believe she has a skull in her closet — along with a monk's robe complete with hood, and other "props" the couple uses for their paintings.

Mark Gerber is no ogre either. He'll look you straight in the eye when he claims that there are some good, and then there are some bad horror novels. Most, he says, center on "disgusting ways for people to die," and the worst center on children in danger.

"The book I'm reading now is really the most offensive novel I've ever read," he says. "I really wonder whether we'll do the cover."

If the couple turns down the assignment, it will cost them \$1800 to \$2500, their usual fee for a book cover. Unlike fine art, which may or may not sell in the artist's lifetime, commercial art pays the bills. The Gerbers say the top illustrator of romance novels commands between \$5,000 to \$6,000 each.

"My mother would love for us to do a romance," Stephanie says. "But we don't have the feel for it."

The Gerbers do have a "feel" for horror, however. Adjectives that might describe their work include "bloody," "disturbing" and in some cases, even "disgusting." But their paintings can also be described as "riveting," "creative."

Jesse Colin Young avoids commercialism

KETCHUM — After 24 years of making music, Jesse Colin Young has come full circle.

Starting out in an era when people wrote songs from the heart to convey a message, Young has seen an ominous commercialism invade the music industry, leaving in its wake musicians who create music for the sake of selling records.

"He has tried both routes, and is now what he considers to be back on course — that is, writing and playing what he says is 'just music.'"

"I sense in America there is a growing desire, because I have it myself, to have music without commercial intent," Young said during a recent telephone interview from Eureka, Calif., where he was performing.

At 45, Young is once again touring the United States after returning from a tour of Japan. He will be in Sun Valley this week for two performances at the Creekside Restaurant. "But don't rush out to buy tickets, his Thursday and Friday night concerts were sold out a week in advance."

After his Sun Valley concerts, Young will take a couple of weeks off before he's bound for Vienna, Va. for another stint in his performing circuit.

His is the story of a traveling musician/one whose fame takes him here and there and back again. It's those many nights on the road that inspired the title cut of his latest album, "The Highway is for Heroes," released last year.

"Highway" is an all-out effort to put together an album which Young says would satisfy him artistically and would have a market at the same time. He says the album has challenged him to get back in touch with his roots, which are deep in acoustic folk music, while also making an album suitable for the '80s.

"I'm spoiled," Young admits. "I've been doing music freely — just playing what comes to mind."

But it hasn't always been so.

Young started out that way in the '60s as a folk singer, making his first of 19 albums in 1964 with a borrowed guitar. Forming a band called "The Youngbloods," his first big hit, "Get Together," came in 1967 and soon became an anthem for the times.

As the protest songs of the '60s became outdated, Young tried his hand at electrified rock and roll, but says he never felt comfortable playing to large stadium crowds.

After recording eight albums with "The Youngbloods," Young struck out on his own to perform solo with album successes such as "Light Shine" and "Song for Julie."

Young did have a go at playing hardball when he tried making an album that would be a commercial success for Elektra Records. Young wrote songs with Wendy Waldman and two of his favorite singers, Danny O'Keefe and Michael McDonald. Background singers from the Eagles and Pablo Cruz were also used.

Three years and a quarter of a million dollars later, "The Perfect Stranger" was not the commercial success Young had hoped for.

After that experience, Young says any future albums would be different.

"If I'm going to be unsure about making any money out of this record ("Highway"), then damn it, I'm going to have fun," he says. "I enjoyed it — it was my labor of love."

With the bulk of Young's music done before MTV gave birth to a new age of music videos, he has yet to turn a song into a video. But he says he would love to have the chance. While he thinks most music videos are "ridiculous," Young does

give some credit to those that have artistic merit and have something to say.

Controversy is something Young is not shy of. He performed in the first "No Nukes" concert with David Bromberg. He also raised funds with Jackson Brown to win a lawsuit which saved a stand of giant redwoods. And together with Bonnie Raitt and Chris Williamson, Young supported the American Indian Movement.

"This same rebel spirit shines through when Young names his two 'personal heroes' — Jacques Cousteau and Helen Caldwell."

Young says he admires Cousteau because he's an adventurer whose scientific discoveries are permeated by a love for this planet.

"He shows us how to save this world from destruction, not by threatening us, but by showing us the planet's beauty in the kindest, most poetic, sweetest way," he says.

Caldcott, Young's other hero, is an Australian pediatrician who founded Physicians for Responsibility. She was the first to take note of the rise in childhood cancer and discovered it was due to radium mining and testing in the South Pacific. She then started a grassroots effort against nuclear armament, Young says.

"That caring spirit is evident in Young's 'The Highway is for Heroes.' It is a warm collection of contemporary songs which you can sit back and absorb, listening and feeling the music — an element which is lacking in much of today's music. If you were not fortunate enough to get one of the tickets for his Creekside performance, a listen to Young's new album may have to do. Or you may want to search through your dusty old albums and listen again to those famous words, 'Come on people now, smile on your brother, everybody get together, try to love one another right now...right now.'"

and "finely executed." Consider "Secret Mansion," one of the most haunting paintings on display at the Herrett. In this painting, the Gerbers portray a man in a derby hat standing in front of a Victorian-style mansion. A steel trap casts his shadow on the sidewalk, but in place of a man's form, there is a pool of blood.

"A lot of people ask if it bothers us to do this kind of work," says Mark. "We tell them, 'no it's illustrating a book, an idea, we're not painting a skull with blood coming out of its eyes.'"

Stephanie adds, "It's somebody else's story, not mine."

The Gerber's story begins in Twin Falls. They met in kindergarten and graduated together from Twin Falls High School in 1974. She attended CSI for one year before transferring to Utah State University to study commercial art. Mark attended the College of Idaho for two years before joining Stephanie at Utah State. Although they insist they never "dated," they say their romance began after college, during the long hours they spent hunkered over drawing boards in the advertising department at the Times-News.

"One of the reasons I was attracted to Mark was the art," she says.

"People expect us to compete," adds Mark. "But we don't."

After they married eight years ago, the Gerbers decided to make the move to New York City. There, they knocked on at least 150 doors including advertising agencies and book publishers.

"It's all a matter of being in the right place at the right time," says Mark. Stephanie finishes his sentence, adding, "So you want to be in as many different places as you can."

While many husbands would be annoyed at their spouse finishing for them - even if it is just an often expressed thought - Mark and Stephanie are different. Their book covers serve as a testimony of their unique ability to collaborate, or to finish what the other has begun.

To the untrained eye, their painting appears to have been done by the same person. But Stephanie says their respective styles did "start out that way." Mark did pen-and-ink work. My painting was much more realistic than his."

Mark says he has had to work to learn a more detailed style of painting, and that he does not have the patience, like Stephanie, to work on a minute scale. Very often it is she who puts the finishing touches on a drawing that her husband began.

"Sometimes I'll finish while he sleeps," Stephanie says.

The Gerbers say it takes two to six weeks to complete a painting which is to become book cover. Often times they are giving the manuscript and asked to come up with their own ideas. Other times they are told exactly what the design should be and even what colors should be used.

Mark says it takes him anywhere from hours to days to come up with an idea he likes, adding that they do some of their best brainstorming during the 70-mile drive from the home in Connecticut to New York City.

After initial sketches have been approved by an art director, the Gerbers fine tune their drawings and then begin to paint. Most often it is Mark who comes up with the initial concept and who starts the drawing, but they say they will trade creative responsibilities depending on other jobs they are working on at the time.

"I love working together," says

Stephanie. "I would hate to not do it." Mark agrees. "We're together most of the time - at least 22 hours a day," he says. "I talk to a lot of couples who say they are glad to go to work to get away from their spouses. Not us."

When they are not working together, the Gerbers spend time doing drawings and paintings that call their "fine art." And while they say they did not want to someday have the more time to devote to their fine art projects, they never want to stop their commercial endeavors.

Twenty-four years ago, critics claimed no one would want to hang Andy Warhol's soup cans on their wall and today very few would want to hang a cover from a horror book.

"We used to insist there was a huge difference between fine and real - or commercial - art," says Mark. "But a lot of your best artists are in advertising. They're doing solid drawing and solid painting. A lot of people probably look at ads and book covers and don't think of who did it, who's behind it. Maybe an exhibit like this one will help."

at the Herrett, is a change of pace from Butler's humorous works. This piece is a beautiful and finely detailed portrait of a young woman whose hat ribbons unfurl in the wind as she rides a carousel pony.

Butler says he first taught himself paper sculpture while he was a junior in college. Now, he says, his sculptures command a high price not necessarily because it takes so long to do one, but because they are so unique.

"When a company hires me, they buy a style," he says. "It's like when Norman Rockwell was hired by Crest - they didn't want him to come up with ideas as much as they wanted his style."

Rockwell is kind of a hero for Butler, who says that the magazine illustrator helped to bring art to the people. "Ask a farmer in Idaho about his well, he says. 'Magazines, posters and things like that are a better gallery for art than the Met.'"

Butler says he wouldn't mind if someday he could devote more time to his recreational artwork or if his work became as well-known as Rockwell's. But he will always be just what he is - a commercial artist who pays his dues and takes the rewards where he can find them.

"When America Express calls and asks, 'Do you want to do four posters to be distributed throughout the world,'" he says, "You can't turn that down."

She's just finished a 50-city tour, is making numerous TV appearances and is returning to do shows in Las Vegas, where she is again drawing sellout crowds.

NEW YORK (AP) - The American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers announced Monday that it will produce a memorial tribute to composer Frederick Loewe in a Broadway theater on March 28.

Confirmed to perform and/or speak are Julie Andrews, Richard Harris, Louis Jordan, Robert Gault, Agnes de Mille, Kitty Carlisle Hart and Herman Levin, who produced Loewe's most famous musical, "My Fair Lady."

Kon Sunshine of ASCAP said the tribute will be announced later. The tribute will be free and open to the public.

Loewe and lyricist Alan Jay Lerner also wrote the songs for "Brigadoon," "Paint Your Wagon," "Camelot" and the movie "Gigi." Loewe died Feb. 16; he was 86.

Heartthrobs and brat packers are also political activists

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Actor Rob Lowe is best known for his "Brat Pack" movie roles and romances with actress Melissa Gilbert and Princess Stephanie of Monaco.

But the heartthrob of the teenybopper set also is an active crusader against toxic wastes.

He and other young screen actors such as Ally Sheedy, Judd Nelson, Daphne Zuniga and Alexandra Paul, are "just a few of Hollywood's new breed of politically active actors."

They represent a new generation of artists who have, like athletes, a tremendous effect at being role models for young people," said California Assemblyman Tom Hayden.

"They're taken more seriously with Americans than politicians because people know them. ... It's a very healthy tonic for an apathetic generation."

Hayden was a founder of Students for a Democratic Society, one of the most visible student radical organiza-

tions of the 1960s, and is the husband of actress Jane Fonda, another celebrity activist.

In 1985, the Haydens became curious about the true interests of the so-called Brat Packers, who had been lauded selfish and self-centered by critics. They invited a few to their Santa Monica home, including Tom Cruise, Kelly McGillis, Demi Moore, Emilio Estevez, Gilbert, Nelson and Lowe.

Once the Haydens saw an interest was there, they formed Network, an educational group that explains political issues to actors and introduces them to politicians.

"They are incredibly effective at motivating and opening up your minds," Sheedy said of the couple. "It's not something where they're trying to brainwash you in any way. There's no pressure at all."

Her involvement in Network prompted the young star to "War Games" and "The Breakfast Club" to throw a mixer with Sen. Alan Crum-

ston (D-Calif.) for her actor friends. "It was so much fun. It was so exciting," Sheedy said.

Another Hollywood activist group, Young Artists United, was formed two years ago by Paul, who starred in "Dragnet," and filmmaker Daniel Siskel. YAU involves young people in such social issues as teen suicide and drug and alcohol abuse, rather than political issues.

Some YAU members include Sarah Jessica Parker, star of "A Year in the Life," Eric Stoltz of "Mask" and most of the Network members.

YAU plans to put about 30 of the young actors on a bus caravan this April and cruise the Southern California beach communities, urging young people to register to vote.

"I think there's a major transformation going on in the people of this generation from the 'me' generation to the 'we' generation. They realize they can accomplish a lot united," said the 23-year-old Siskel.

For fear of alienating their fans, actors generally remained aloof from politics until the 1980s, when Hollywood threw its support behind President Roosevelt and his social policies.

Hollywood staged massive support for World War II, with war bond rallies and entertaining the troops abroad. Some notable, especially Charlie Chaplin, supported the Soviet cause, and their activities would haunt them later.

The postwar period brought McCarthyism, when many careers were harmed — or ruined through "blacklisting" by association with leftist causes. The reaction caused many actors to eschew support of any issues or candidates, and continued into the 1960s.

However, the Civil Rights Movement brought out such actors as Martin Luther King Jr., and anti-Vietnam War, environmental issues and women's rights

also rekindled Hollywood's social consciousness. This will be a busy year for Network, said spokesman Patrick Lippert. Members will start meeting presidential candidates at private meetings in the spring and will probably become active in the 1988 elections.

Last September, members of both groups worked against Robert Bork's confirmation to the U.S. Supreme Court by staging a post-card-writing campaign with their peers.

In October, Nelson ("Billionaire Boys Club," "The Breakfast Club"), Helen Slater ("Supergirl"), Esai Morales ("La Bamba") and Mary Stuart Masterson ("At Close Range") traveled to the Soviet Union to film a documentary for the National Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy.

Zuniga ("Spaceballs") and Paul visited Nicaragua, where Paul rode in a Soviet-made helicopter with Sandinista forces.

Everyone was saying two years ago this is the most self-centered, selfish generation in years," Lippert said. "But what you see is the most idealistic group of young people. You see them getting involved in so many things, and reaching out to their generation."

However, not all Hollywood observers are jumping with praise for the political meanderings of brat packers.

"It's striking that not one of these stars has a dissenting view other than what's the norm in Hollywood," said Michael Medved of PBS' "Sneak Previews."

"It's absolutely nonsensical that Alan Cranston should follow Rob Lowe's advice to vote against Robert Bork for the Supreme Court," he continued. "Rob Lowe, Daphne Zuniga and Gregory Peck (who did an anti-Bork commercial) — we take their position seriously because they're pretty. It's scary."

'Bacall on Bogart' is fine biography

HOLLYWOOD — Class tells, always has and always will. And the mounting of "Bacall on Bogart" Friday night on PBS' "Great Performances" series is a class act down to its smallest detail.

The first American television biography of Bogart to have his widow's participation, this affectionate account of his life, minus a previous wife or three, is studded with the crucial people of his career, writer-directors John Huston, Richard Brooks, Peter Bogdanovich, screenwriters Julius J. Epstein and Budd Schulberg; Katharine Hepburn, Ingrid Bergman, Van Johnson and Al Stewart.

Bacall, looking splendid, strides authoritatively down between Warner Brothers' sound stages to tell us sternly that she will be talking about Bogart the actor and his craft. Do not be crestfallen; the bedrock stuff that made Bogart so singular is here in abundance.

Richard Brooks is one of the best at distilling it: being a tough guy, he says, had little to do with muscle or a general level of irascibility. "It has to do with living 24 hours a day and being able to handle it. It was that ability that made Bogart 'the mature heroic figure that we remember forever.'"

This is a careful biography, requiring viewing for any Bogart lover but also wonderfully satisfying for the care its makers — director David Healy, who co-produced with Joan Kramer, and writer John L. Miller — have taken with its aesthetics.

The film clips, which for once are allowed to run amply and in context, are sometimes set off by each particular movie's opening credits, so we get a visual sense of each of the periods that Bogart's 75-film career touched. And when "The Maltese Falcon" is discussed, not only do we learn about its two earlier botched adaptations, we see 1931's "Dangerous Female" and 1936's "Satan Was a Lady" and

compare for ourselves. The parade of early roles — all those forgettable, ingratiating juveniles, heavies of every variety from cowboy to Latino, and the lowest ebb of all, 1939's "Return of Dr. X," in which Bogart wears pince-nez with a white streak in his hair — are leaced with Bacall's tart comments. When she moves into their work together, she illustrates Bogart's considerable influence on her work with film-clip examples, fascinating stuff.

"Bacall on Bogart" was shot last year, but it benefits enormously by the presence of John Huston and Ingrid Bergman, sadly gone before the program was made. The Huston footage is the most brilliant interview.

One for the BBC, in which he sports a horse-blanket plaid jacket and a foot-long cigar, tells the details of "The Maltese Falcon," Huston's adaptation and first directing job. It was precisely because he was a neophyte director that George Raft turned the project down, Huston confides. The second footage, about "The African Queen" was part of a Director's Guild interview from the early '80s, by which time Huston had his white whiskers.

These marvelous moments are further enlivened by co-star Katharine Hepburn's pungent observations on the location and Bogart's general foot-dragging attitude toward every thing foreign — and by home-movie footage by Bacall.

The Bergman interview, about "Casablanca," and the general hysteria that surrounded its ending, comes from a David Frost special, and it too has a fine, dry chaser in the form of comments by the estimable Julius Epstein, co-writer with his twin brother, Philip, of the screenplay. Natty, as well as wickedly incisive, Epstein in 1987 somehow manages to look younger than anyone else on the screen.

"Bacall on Bogart" opens with Bacall's "Got a match?" and closes with a moment from "Dark Passage" as Bogart, his face suffused with love, takes his wife into his arms on a veranda.

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Syndicated shows are hottest sellers

HOUSTON—America should rest easy—at not be able to sleep at all depending on one's perspective, knowing that "Wheel of Fortune" and "Jeopardy!" are scheduled to remain on the air until at least 1992.

The top-rated syndicated shows remained among the hottest sellers of the annual convention of the National Association of Television Program Executives (known as NATPE International), which recently concluded here.

The convention is the market place at which stations around the United States decide which syndicated programming to buy for the fall season.

Jeopardy! "Wheel of Fortune," "Jeopardy!" and a few other shows that have already been sold to enough stations to guarantee their appearance in the fall—a "firm go," in TV parlance—the future of many shows for sale here remains up in the air as station executives hold off making final decisions about their fall schedules.

Conventional and serious fare Linda Ellerbee, former host of ABC's acclaimed but low-rated "Our World" history series, was on hand trying to launch a late-night news program called "And So It Goes." MCA offered "My Secret Identity," a special-effects action-comedy that seemed popular with programmers shopping for something to please young viewers. From Turner Broadcasting Services came "Portrait of the Soviet Union," seven hours narrated by Roy Scheider, featuring film footage from Soviet-located Western cameras have not been allowed to film before.

But, as usual, the long list of shows that could possibly air in the fall also featured more than a touch of the bizarre.

That fact was reflected at MGM-USA Television's selling booth in Houston's ranch-sized George R. Brown Convention Center. There, executives, dressed head-to-toe and entered a dark, special-effects-laden chamber to watch a promotional videotape for the company's "The Twilight Zone" series. At its end, a disembodied voice warned: "Beware as you enter the NATPE zone, which makes the Twilight Zone look like a reality show."

That was not too far from wrong. "Even the list of new shows with 'firm gos' was a little scary: 'USA Today: The Television Show' promises to report 'Wednesday's news on Tuesday,' and Lorimar Television is producing "A Nightmare on Elm Street: Freddy's Nightmares," based on the adventures of movie-dom's gruesome national child-slayer Freddy Krueger.

The screen genre emerged as one of the major trends at the convention, although some program buyers voiced concerns that too many horror shows could alienate their audiences unless saved for the late-night hours, when young males dominate the audience.

Along with the skinless Freddy, there was a death-by-death news program, "Unpleasant-Incarnation," where proposals for a television version of "War of the Worlds" from Paramount series from Tribune Entertainment called "Monsters"—with a "24 creature featured every week" in "24 exciting stories for the monster in everyone"—and Tribune's slightly creepy "Spectacular World of Guinness Records," whose promotional material featured a gentleman wearing a hooded garment entirely covered with bees.

There were two new medical programs: MGM-USA's "Group One Medical" (a firm go) and Lorimar's "Family Medicine Center," which is not yet guaranteed for fall.

Renovated Wendell theater will soon host talent show

WENDELL—When Wendell residents realized art and drama classes were no longer being offered in their local school, instead of bewailing the loss of cultural opportunity for youngsters, they went to work.

A garage in back of the building was remodeled to provide dressing and makeup rooms for their old Ass Theater.

Like an aging starlet's show business comeback, the abandoned movie house was transformed into the Wendell Community Arts Theater.

Two successful community productions have drawn capacity crowds, says Ellen Cox, a retired teacher and enthusiastic council member.

"These events were free but now all are funds are used," she says, so there will be an admission charge. There is when an admission March 19 when a talent show will be presented at 7:30 p.m.

Performers of all ages are invited to participate, she says. Interested persons should contact Roger—or Merri—Ann—King, directors, at 536-2946. They are being assisted by Ann Bronsma and Becky Ashmead.

Admission for the talent show

will be \$1 for children under 12, \$1.50 for everyone over 12 and \$5 per family.

"We need more performers, an audience and funds," Cox says.

Jack Hyder, treasurer of the arts council board of directors, will receive: donations from individuals, businesses or organizations.

Acts already signed for the talent show include a family singing group, Mike Gillson, a blind pianist from Wendell, a junior high group which has composed a song, and a family dance ensemble.

Cox says the purpose of the arts council is to provide a means for residents, especially young people, to have some cultural art experience and to develop talents that people in the community have.

While they are aware of the many drama groups functioning in Twin Falls, it is difficult for youths, especially children, to participate in productions out of their home town, she says.

When the dozen persons met in May 1987 to launch the effort to fill this community need, she says they resolved "to broaden the scope and interests of the community through exposure to and activities in a cultural arts program and to provide a back-up for local talent."

Under the leadership of Ramona Allen, retired teacher, a musical play celebrating the bicentennial of the U.S. constitution was presented last summer. Last fall another capacity audience of 300 attended a musical, "Play It Smart—Stay Safe from Drugs" featuring more than 100 local children and involving 18 adults.

Formation of the arts council has also brought support from the Idaho Arts Commission to bring in groups to the community, Cox says.

Ford claims that he's growing more mature

NEW-YORK (AP) — "Star Wars" and " Raiders of the Lost Ark" made him a hero.

His most recent effort leaves Solo and Indiana Jones in hyper-space. In the just-released Roman Ford-leader thriller "Frantic," Ford's cocksure quality disappears — he portrays a bespectacled father and husband caught in a situation beyond his control.

It follows "Witness" and "The Mosquito Coast," two other movies where Ford shucked invulnerability for more complex and sensitive roles. In his next film, the Mike Nichols comedy "Working Girls," he has a Cary Grant-type part.

"I'm not an ingenue anymore," the 45-year-old actor said.

"I'm not trying to make a transition into a different kind of person. I do whatever I think is appropriate for that character to tell the story," he said during a recent interview.

"But this is also filtered by growing older," he said, regarding his reading glasses in his right hand. "I mean, 'Star Wars' was almost 15 years ago. I am 15 years old. In fact, I revel in it. I've been more interested in those characters that are more mature."

In "Frantic," Ford grows more uncomfortable every scene. He plays a California heart surgeon at a medical conference in Paris. Terrorists kidnap

his wife, but police and U.S. officials believe she willingly left him. He wants a sensuous young French woman who provides clues to the abduction and joins him in a struggle to find his wife.

"The whole thing depends on this doctor, this fish-out-of-water, reaching this emotional exhaustion, where he does things that are well outside of his nature and experience," said Ford.

A concern for his real-life wife's safety led Ford to Paris. Polanski and the part. He accompanied his pregnant wife, screenwriter Melissa Mathison ("E.T."), to meetings in Paris on another project with Polanski, the director of "Tess," "Chinatown" and "Rosemary's Baby."

"After the first few days, Roman described the film to me and it sounded interesting," Ford said.

The script was in French, a language the actor does not speak. Roman stood up and for two hours he told me the movie," Ford said. "He played all the parts, and it was great. When it was over, I said, 'if you'll right that down in English, I'll do it.'"

Ford calls himself "mono-manual" during filming, but always returns to his ranch in Wyoming to "go grocery shopping, pick up the laundry, work on the fence, plow the snow, read a little, fish a little, and go cross-country skiing."

"I wouldn't be able to do it (acting) if I wasn't able to get back when it was over," he said.

After decade, bluegrass kings give up

WASHINGTON—On Feb. 20, the Johnson-Mountain Boys, one of the hotter and more soulful groups ever to play bluegrass, called it a day after 10 years.

Though they hailed from Montgomery County, Md., where they're no Johnson-Mountain, they'd recently been voted "The Best Traditional Bluegrass Group in America" in Bluegrass Unlimited. Their six-Recorders albums had taken their place with the best in bluegrass history. They were a regular mainstay on the national festival circuit. They'd played in 38 states, 10 countries and at both the White House and the Grand Ole Opry.

They'd always been something of an anomaly — young musicians in their 20s and 30s playing original music in a fiercely traditional style rooted in the '40s and '50s. But now they felt they had nowhere to go, that interest in bluegrass, particularly among young people, was waning and

that they had to get out while they were still young enough to find other careers.

So they quit at the pinnacle of their popularity.

One fan called from England, begging them to reconsider. Grown men wept during their final rounds of concerts. Walt Saunders of Washington radio station WAMU, which plays more bluegrass than any other radio station in the country, called it the greatest tragedy in hit bluegrass since 1963.

A lot of people are saddened by it, but most also understand how hard it is to make a living in the music business and the demands it makes on you," says Dudley Connell, the band's founder, guitarist, singer and chief songwriter. "Anybody that's ever played any kind of grass-roots music has thought about (quitting) from time to time. Artistically, it's very rewarding, but monetarily it's very hard to make ends meet playing a type of music that is not accepted by the general public."

Still, it was a large general-public that packed the elementary school in Luckett's, Va., for the Johnson-Mountain Boys' farewell concerts — which were also filmed for public television and recorded for a possible live set for Rounder. "Requests," a final studio album with songs chosen by the band, will be a time, not that long ago, when Washington was considered the Bluegrass Capital of the World. There was a time, longer ago, when bluegrass was something more than blip on the nation's cultural monitor. But like jazz, another indigenous American music, bluegrass has always been a minority affair.

"Jazz and bluegrass will always appeal to a limited number of people," says Jerry Gray of WAMU, which programs 45 hours of bluegrass every week. "Neither will ever be very popular, but they will always have hardcore supporters."

Bluegrass artists, Gray says, "have

got to be so dedicated to their art that they're willing to work for nothing. Ron Thomason (leader of the Dry Branch Fire Squad) says that for anybody in bluegrass to retain their identity and their credibility, they should be in it part-time, that 'there's no way you should ever try to depend on it for a living.'"

"That point of view figured in the Johnson-Mountain Boys' decision. When mandolin player and founding member David McLaughlin decided to leave in September to go into real estate — telling the trade magazine Grassroots, "I don't want to live poor the rest of my life"—it was the sign, the boys didn't realize they'd been waiting for.

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Dana Carvey of Saturday Night Live co-stars in comedy

MV film offerings focus on comedy

NEW YORK (AP) — Dana Carvey, the Church Lady of "Saturday Night Live," is taking another stab at the movies. But this time will be different.

"It's the first time I've ever been in a film and gotten to be funny," said Carvey, who co-stars in "Moving" with Richard Pryor.

Carvey plays "a very upstanding young man named Brad Sanders. Pryor is moving his family from New Jersey to Idaho. Sanders is hired to drive Pryor's prize Saab Turbo to the new home."

"And it's not until later that he finds out in a world renowned 10-person schizophrenic," Carvey says.

"We mostly see three of them. We see him as a straight person. We see him as a sort of Norman Bates-type character — kind of weird. And we see him in a character like Dennis Hopper in 'Apocalypse Now.' No one can get close to him. Sort of a burned-out character."

Carvey describes the movie as "a fun, free-flowing comedy." He was allowed to improvise, allowed to flesh out his characters.

Pryor was incredibly generous to me, and just a gentle, sweet person to work with, just generous. There was none of this 'Gee, do you want to do?' It was totally, 'What do you want to do?' and 'Go ahead.' It was nice."

For a long time, Carvey was pegged as the bland nice guy, an innocent kid. He was in 1985's 'Tough Guys' as the probation officer of aged convicts Burt Lancaster and Kirk Douglas. He also was pigeonholed in a series of TV shows, including Mickey Rooney's straight man in a short-lived 1981 NBC sitcom, 'One of the Boys.'

Then, in October 1986, he finally got his chance to do comedy on television with 'Saturday Night Live,' introducing audiences to the Church Lady, burned-out rock singer Derek Stevens, Lord Christie and a host of other characters, personalities and voices.

Newsweek magazine credited him with "almost singlehandedly rejuvenating" the show.

Now in his second season on the show, Carvey is changing his reputation. The self-righteous, judgmental Church Lady will only be doing two or three more appearances this year, Carvey says. Many of the weekly guest hosts want to do the skit, but he is concerned about burning out the character.

This season his characters have included Hans, who, with Franz ("SNL" regular Kevin Nealon) offer physical fitness instruction on TV.

"They have some of the same elements as the Church Lady, with a superior attitude, but totally the other way. Instead of being a 54-year-old spinster, I'm a 25-year-old Austrian weight lifter."

Hans and Franz epitomize "vanity obsession with being fit" — characters who say, "I'm superior to you, because I have these muscles," Carvey says.

"That's what the real fun of playing these characters is. It's making fun of those people who really feel they have the truth and the answers for every body. Self-righteous, arrogant, I'm superior to you' people drive me nuts."

Carvey has had other movie offers but has turned them down, because he didn't find the characters very likable.

"Mostly, they were kind of glib, and I just feel that's not my style," he says.

"I want to find a different style, someone who's a little more vulnerable than funny, and then evolves. My whole thing is that everybody's sort of pretending, just a little bit, that they're a little bit stronger than they are. Everybody."

Film highlights Idaho locales

TWIN FALLS — The following are films playing locally in the Magic Valley. The ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by the Los Angeles Times.

MOVING (R): Not only does this state sitcom-of-a-picture enter the rich comic possibilities in the world of a Robin Williams as Cronauer, who is; he explodes the center in bursts of electronic-age surrealism. Blazing away brilliantly, ad-libbing on camera, Williams is like a man possessed: a Crazy Eddie of showbiz dada. In his improvisations, he hotwires "Vietnam" into realms of quick-witted chaos, gives a fine, freezingly cheery hello and goodbye to the hell of war and the purgatory of radio.

GOOD MORNING, VIETNAM (R): This dramatic comedy based on the 1965 Saigon gig of wildman Armed Forces desjag Adrien Cronauer is mostly failed satire. It clings to the obvious like a drowning man to an anvil, and director (but non-writer) Barry Levinson can't summon up the wit or bite of his "Diner" or "The Mirror."

SHE'S HAVING A BABY (PG-13): John Hughes, seems to be crafting a comic movie valentine to approaching fatherhood — with Kevin Bacon and Elizabeth McGovern as a young Midwestern couple being nagged by suburban and pregnancy. But is he? There is a nightmarish edge to this movie; it often gets cold-cut, phastly cute, with surreal dream sequences and shock

cuts pilfered from Hitchcock. Hughes mostly does not show the scenes where his couple are tender or loving with each other, and the film has an unpleasant, queasy feel. It is the least funny of his comedies; too focused on Jake's panic and alienation. But this unpleasantness may be exactly what audiences buy, what strikes them as contemporary; if not, there is plenty of it here.

SHOOT TO KILL (R): If anyone cared to chart the impoverished state of the big commercial American movie in the late 1980s, "Shoot to Kill" would be a good place to start. The film greets the fine Sidney Poitier's return to the screen with threadbare white man-black man jokes and even

misfire-show humor that he has avoided for decades. At base, in this case, it is a badly screenwriting that brings Poitier and Tom Berenger, Richard Masur and a host of other fine actors to their knees.

These videos call for review

The following are capsule reviews of new video tapes:

BEVERLY HILLS COP II; Rated R; 1987; 105 minutes; Paramount Home Video; \$39.95.

"Beverly Hills Cop II," the sequel to the hugely popular Eddie Murphy comedy about a brash Detroit detective working undercover in Guest Central, has sleek lines and goes from zero to 90 in nothing flat. It's not really a movie, it's a racing machine, built for speed, not for pleasure. Watching it shakes you right down to your bones; you're trembling when you walk out — but not from laughter.

Tony Scott, who also directed "Top Gun," is the master blaster of the movie business. He and the film's producers, Don Simpson and Jerry Bruckheimer, have found the mass audience's solar plexus — and they hammer away at it — mercilessly. Granted, the movie gives the sort of total-body experience that television can't provide. On the other hand, there's nothing you can get from it that you can't get from jacking your Walkman up full blast and hopping in the dryer.

Emilio Estevez and Richard Dreyfuss play a squad-car odd couple in this suspenseful action-romance-comedy. Mellow, middle-class and hardy two-fisted, these two Seattle sleuths are the antithesis of traditional action heroes.

Estevez, packing a few extra pounds, actually looks so much like Wayne Newton that you expect him to break into "Danke Schoen." He's the settled mother hen of the duo — a Lacey to Dreyfuss' single, unstable Cagney. After blowing an easy collar in a local tune factory, the two draw an unpopular assignment. Reluctantly they stake out the apartment of the former girlfriend of a psychotic cop-killer (Aidan Quinn) who breaks out of prison in the violent opening scenes. For Dreyfuss, it's love at first sight when the seductive subject (Mandeline Stone) of their stakeout comes within binocular range. Using improper procedures, Dreyfuss contrives to meet her, thereby setting the stage for a romantic farce ala "Rear Window." Despite his bent for hardware, director John Badham ("Blue Thunder" and "WarGames") shows a surprising flair for affairs of the heart.

GLES; No rating; 1987; 54 minutes; Warner-Reprise Home Video; \$19.98.

There's never been a better female rocker than Chrissie Hynde of the Pretenders. With her tough-tender duality, she manages to invest her brilliant songs with the aggression of rock and the sensitivity of the poet. This 16-video compilation is drawn from Pretender singles released between 1979 ("Stay Your Sobbing") and 1986 ("My Baby"). The videos are seldom complex and never pretentiously arty; they have the feel of home movies, albeit increasingly better ones as the band evolves. Hearing these excellent songs fueled by ringing guitars and eloquent pulses, captivated by Hynde's sensual vocals and rough but engaging veneer, one wonders why the Pretenders weren't even more popular than they got to be.

ABC's 'The Wonder Years' means well, but is too stiff, melodramatic

The pilot episode of ABC's "The Wonder Years," which premiered following the Super Bowl, closes with an unintentional bit of irony.

It is 1968, and 12-year-olds Kevin Arnold (Fred Savage) and Winnie Cooper (Danica McKellar) are sitting in the woods. The sun is setting, and Percy Sledge's "When a Man Loves a Woman," a steamy soul number about the power of adult love, plays behind them. Winnie's brother has just been killed in Vietnam; Kevin has come to console her. As the woods grow dark, they embrace.

By itself, the scene is predictably, but forgivably, melodramatic. But the song cheapens the gesture; an unguarded moment is made comic. No matter how hard Kevin and Winnie try to make their affection real, they seem to be faking.

The same is true of this well-meaning series, which will air regularly on Tuesdays starting March 15. Neil Marlene and Carol Black, the married couple who created "The Wonder Years," have tried to capture the period's innocence, as well as its controversy. The series promises to revise hackneyed characterizations of '60s culture: "the mindlessness of the TV generation" and "the anonymity of the suburbs." But the memories dramatized here are collective ones, owing more to other TV shows and Time magazine-style trend-watching than to real life.

"Those really were the wonder years for us there in the suburbs—the golden age of kids," the narrator, a grown-up Kevin (Arye Gross), explains in the pilot. Kevin is the youngest of three children in an all-

too-typical suburban family. His brother (Jason Hervey) is a bully; his sister (Olivia D'Abo) is a budding flower child; his father (Dan Lauria) is a gruff workaholic; his mother (Alley Mills) holds the household together.

With a light touch, such a premise might succeed. But the premiere episode, at least, is disappointing. As a drama, it is overly melodramatic. In the course of a half-hour, Kevin enters Robert F. Kennedy Junior High School, he and Winnie fall in and out of puppy love and Winnie's brother is killed.

As a re-creation of the late '60s, it is cloying. Like the movie "The Big Chill" (1983) and the current ABC series "Thirty-something," "The Wonder Years" uses music, clothes and slang as emblems of the baby-boom generation. But this series telegraphs its intentions in a way that makes even those projects seem subtle. As cultural symbols—love beads—fishnet stockings and go-go boots seemed contrived on "The Brady Bunch," 15 years ago. They are virtually unwatchable now.

To set the tone of the series, "The Wonder Years" employs devices far older than any baby boomer: snippets of news footage to establish the setting, snapshots that "come to life," a wise and wistful narrator much like the one played by Richard Dreyfuss in "Stand by Me" (1985). In fact, "The Wonder Years" recalls nothing so much as that film, a sentimental drama about growing up in a small town in the 1950s.

Nostalgia for childhood, it seems, transcends time and place—but not clichés.

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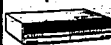

His daily soap was better training than theater acting, McCook says

In New York City a few weeks ago, having a drink with his wife Laurette Spang, "The Bold and the Beautiful" John McCook noticed a waiter scrutinizing him.

"If you're who I think you are, you look a little older on the screen," said the waiter.

Known as Eric Forrester on the show, McCook smiled. The waiter continued, "I'm an actor and, to be frank, some of us had a few laughs when your show started a year ago. It was so pretty. The kids were so pretty. But I have to tell you, the show is really good now."

Naturally, McCook agrees. Character attitudes are set and, with a year of story behind them, the actors know where they're going.

"We move slowly in the daytime," says John. "But we moved up to six or seven-in-the-ratings-and-have-been-there-ever-since. That's unusual."

Known as dashing Lance Prentice on "The Young and the Restless" for five years, McCook now plays show patriarch Eric Forrester, who's not too old to have a romance while his unhappy wife Stephanie (Susan Flannery) schemes.

McCook and Flannery are the two pros surrounded by kids, there to set examples, give encouragement, and play the steady influences. No wonder it took almost a year before Eric began dallying with his old love, Beth Logan (Judith Baldwin), this winter.

"I have my own work so there's not a lot of time to help others," McCook admits. "But the kids can learn by watching Susan. She's very, very good at fleshing-out moments, getting the most out of simple things. We have our own troubles seeking more texture, and that's fun. Sometimes I walk away, failing over lack of feeling. The kids see that and emulate. That's what I did in my summer stock days."

McCook remembers those summer stock musicals of the '60s, seeing new actors every week, some with acting

talent and no voice, and others vice versa. "Out of 50 stars I could name four who were gracious, secure, calm and able," John noted. "I think you'll find that same percentage in business, in everything."

McCook claims daily experience on a TV soap to be better training than even his theater training. "In 10 days here you're going to learn enough to work with anybody in front of a camera. But that's just the beginning."

"The kids on 'The Bold and the Beautiful' have learned about marks, timing, how to move—the automatic things. Some stop there. And those aware of this go to drama class on the side."

The new soap is over a year old now. "People like to be in on a new show," the actor admitted. "You can see everybody growing. But if we become too successful, politics will force us into the 60-minute format. I hope we will remain a half-hour show where character reigns over plotting for a few years more."

From the NFL to networks: All-pros become TV all-stars

When the Super Bowl and Pro Bowl are over, familiar NFL names and faces are gone from television for six months. Right? Wrong.

There is, of course, the glut of commercials featuring retired NFL players and other former professional athletes.

But a surprising number of former pro-football stars—far more than athletes from any other sport—have made the leap to prime-time network television stardom. It's flickering stardom for some, but stardom nonetheless.

Last week Merlin Olsen, the former all-pro defensive tackle of the Los Angeles Rams debuted in "Aaron's Way," his third—yes, his third—television series.

This time he plays the head of an Amiah family that finds itself in the world of contemporary California.

Meanwhile, over at NBC Fred Dryer, the former all-pro defensive end of the Los Angeles Rams, has quietly become one of television's more enduring leading men: he's heading for his fifth season as "Hunter."

Dryer and Olsen lead a team of performers who were outstanding football players and who have, over the years, combined to give television its own all-pro team.

Of the 13 players on the All-Pro TV team, eight were defensive linemen. That's no surprise to Dryer. "Now we know," he said. The former New York Giants and Los Angeles Rams defensive end said he has always contended that "defensive linemen have more personality" than the other players.

"Quarterbacks are boring," he said, sounding much like the playfully sarcastic Hunter. "Running backs don't know where they're going. They just want the ball. Wide receivers are always looking downfield, and offensive linemen are neuter. The only ones with personality are the defensive linemen, and the linebackers have a little." Thus, if you add Dick Butkus,

nine of the 13 selections have "more personality."

Dryer's "Hunter" has been signed for a fifth year, topping Olsen's four years as Jonathan Garvey on "Little House on the Prairie," and Alex Karras's four years as George Pappadopolis on "Webster."

Dryer actually began preparing for an acting career before he retired from the Rams. He worked as a network analyst for NFL games but turned down a two-year contract renewal when he decided he wanted to make acting a career.

He began studying with acting teacher Nina Foch in 1980, two years before he ended a 13-year pro career. He set out to be as good an actor as he was a player, turning down several roles those first years, because he didn't feel they would help him in the long run.

"I wasn't just looking for a job. I wanted to establish a career," he said. His selectiveness in the second year of his acting venture restricted his earnings to \$5,000.

"If you're single-minded, prepared and have the desire to do something, you can. When I was playing football, I was always in shape, always prepared. I knew what I was doing and never went to sleep on the field. I took that philosophy and applied it to acting. It's been a very big advantage.

"You have to put in the time to be proficient anytime you start down a career road. I'm lucky. I have a career behind me. It's not like someone floundering for their first shot at making it. I feel I'm capable of doing this. I enjoy it. I'm being paid big money to go to school.

"I was 21 when I started pro ball, and I really wanted to make it big. Now I'm 41, very happy and very satisfied doing what I'm doing."

Dryer has directed four episodes of "Hunter," and has signed to direct two more this year. "In football you don't have much to look forward to (after your playing days), maybe being an assistant coach. In acting, there's directing, writing, producing, a lot more

diversification. You can get lost in the different levels of this business."

On Saturday night NBC moved "Hunter" back to its Saturday slot following "The Golden Girls." The show reached a No. 8 ranking in that slot and was rated a Top 20 show there after a shaky start on Fridays opposite "Dallas." In January and February "Hunter" was moved to Wednesdays and played opposite some hit episodes of "Moonlighting" and the Winter Olympics but still ranked in the middle of prime-time shows. Old "Hunter" shows are now in syndication in this country and around the world.

Dryer, at 5-6 and 219 pounds (10 less than he weighed as a player), cuts a striking figure as the hard-nosed Sgt. Rick Hunter, who often employs unorthodox tactics to nail his man. He has also given the character vulnerability and compassion.

As Variety noted in a recent issue: "Best of all is Dryer, upon whose capable shoulders 'Hunter' rests. Dryer is so good-looking and so adept at the slam-bang tough-guy action that it's easy to overlook what a good actor he's become. He is as underrated as the show itself."

The work and recognition do not come easy. Except for a couple of weeks at Christmas time, Dryer works 12 hours a day and five days a week for nine months. He and co-star Stephanie Kramer are on the set virtually all the time.

"We do 22 shows a year," said Dryer. "That's the equivalent of 11 feature films. We shoot a one-hour show every seven working days. We never have enough time. Acting, writing, directing, location—everything suffers at times."

"In football, game day was Sunday. Doing this, your brain has to be engaged all the time. Where should I be? What do I say? How do I say it? How do I look? You have to be a couple of steps ahead of yourself all the time."

CNN anchor Shaw makes it a foursome

WASHINGTON — The week before Mikhail Gorbachev arrived in the United States for the December arms summit, President Reagan granted a rare interview to the four major networks' anchors.

That's right, four: Peter Jennings of ABC, Dan Rather of CBS, Tom Brokaw of NBC, and Bernard Shaw, Washington anchor for CNN.

Although he had already interviewed Reagan in October, Shaw agreed that the prime-time news special in which he questioned Reagan along with the three other anchors was a high-profile symbol of CNN's hard-earned respectability.

"That conversation the week before the summit was a turning point, I suppose you would have to say," said Shaw in an interview at his anchor desk at the CNN bureau. "I went back and asked (White House Chief of Staff) Howard Baker about that, and he said, 'We regard you as the fourth network, and that's why we included you in the interview.'"

The Reagan interview turned a lot of unsought attention on the low-key Shaw, a former correspondent for ABC, CBS and Westinghouse Broadcasting, who recalls idolizing Edward R. Murrow as a child in Chicago and at 13 declaring, "I want to be a CBS News correspondent."

After stints with Westinghouse and CBS, then covering Latin America for ABC, Shaw joined CNN in 1980. He wanted to be an anchor, and "there was no room at the inn at ABC, a lot of other talented people standing in line." Plus, he was encouraged to join the then-fledgling 24-hour news network by friends Daniel Schorr and George Watson, the Washington bureau chief.

The next year, John Hinckley shot President Reagan outside a Washington hotel where Reagan had just delivered a speech. Shaw had finished his news update summarizing the speech and switched back to CNN headquarters in Atlanta when a staffer told him someone had

fired shots at the president's motorcade.

"I screamed to the control room to tell Atlanta to come back to us right away," Shaw said. Shaw filled viewers in with the sketchy information he had, then switched back to Atlanta, but Reese Schoenfield, then president of CNN, ordered Atlanta to go back to Washington and stay there.

"And they did, and there we were," said Shaw. He was on the air for 10 hours.

"I was pretty conscious that day of my demeanor, tone of voice and facial expressions," he said, "because that camera magnifies everything, and I was determined to be as low-key as possible, as factual as possible and as dispassionate as possible. A story like that requires no heat."

Low-key is the operative word in describing Shaw's style. He considers the celebrity aspects of his job "corruptive" and prefers to spend his free time with his wife, Linda, and their two children. Besides "going better" in his job at CNN, Shaw, 47, says his only ambition is to write books, fiction and non-fiction.

He's a perfectionist who constantly worries about improving his performance and the network's. He said that when he left the air after the Iowa and New Hampshire primaries, he lay awake for hours "replaying in my head what we did — what we did right, what we did wrong, what I could have done better."

"He does his homework every time and worries over it like it's his first time, and calls afterwards to be critiqued on it," said CNN Executive Vice-President Ed Turner. "I don't know anybody as good as he is, in my 30 years in the business, at his specialty, which was a job once done brilliantly by (Walter) Cronkite, before him by (Robert) Trout, people who can sit with a breaking story for hours on end and have lost the vital threads that you have to keep hold of. It's grueling to be on the air for 10 hours on end, it's also fulfilling."

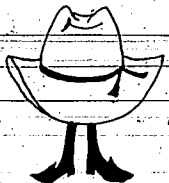

ula, Dryer makes time for a daily phone call to his daughter Caitlin, who will be 4 on April 12. He is separated from her mother, actress Tracy Vaccaro, and his weekends and three-month hiatus from the show are planned around their daughter.

"I don't ever foresee anything monopolizing my time so that I can't see her as I want to. She needs to have time with her father. I don't want to look back in 10 or 15 years and see that I ignored my daughter. I couldn't live with that. It's easy to make excuses and other commitments and then say, 'She loves me and understands. I feel good about my relationship with my daughter. I never want to lose sight of this.'"

Dryer has been compared to Clint Eastwood and doesn't mind at all. "To have one-tenth of his success would be great. It's flattering."

Dryer's film credits include "Death Before Dishonor" and "Cannonball Run II." He has made guest appearances on "Cheers," "Lou Grant" and "Laverne & Shirley" and had roles in telefilms "The Marshall of Slade Town," "Girls Life," "Force Seven," "The Pursuit of D.C.—Collins," "Starmaker" and "The Kid From Nowhere."

Show business has not crowded football out of Dryer's mind. "I miss certain individuals, those good, close friendships that come about from working hard together to become the best you can. I always knew football wasn't forever. I miss Sundays. I did something well. Then I stopped doing

it. I can never do it again. It was a great foundation for the rest of my life."

But Dryer doesn't miss some of the pain of playing pro ball. The most painful injury he suffered was a hip pointer, a severe bruise of the hip bone. "Most all others were related to the artificial turf," he said. And, yes, there was the Giants game in 1980, when two toenails were ripped off and he played the second half with a sock full of blood.

When Dryer played collegiate ball at San Diego State, his offensive line coach was Joe Gibbs, now head coach of the Washington Redskins. But Gibbs left after Dryer's first spring semester. "I remember he was always chewing gum. Always talking, always aware of a player's point of view and had a lot of knowledge to pass along. Don Coryell and John Madden were on the same staff. It's great to see (Gibbs) become so successful."

As Dryer signs on for a fifth season as Sgt. Rick Hunter, Merlin Olsen is making a fresh start in "Aaron's Way," which got a two-hour premiere last week and will air on Wednesday nights.

"When I first saw the script, I asked myself, 'Did they write this for me? I love this role. After watching lapses of the first few episodes, I'm very excited.'"

Olsen knows a little about kicking off a new show. After four years in a supporting role in "Little House on the Prairie," he launched "Father Murphy" and "Fathers and Sons." The painful part of starting a new

show, he points out, is "pure and simple, the workload. To take on the title role of an hour-long series means giving up a big chunk of your life. On the up side, the joy of starting a new show is that the project is new, exciting and challenging. I always relished a new challenge, something that's not easily accomplished."

He said that spirit goes back to his childhood in Logan, Utah. People told him even though he was big, he couldn't play football, because he was unco-ordinated.

He went on to become a two-time All-America at Utah State, and three-time Academic All-American, graduating summa cum laude in finance. His 15-year career with the Rams included a record 14 consecutive Pro Bowls and a spot in the Hall of Fame.

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
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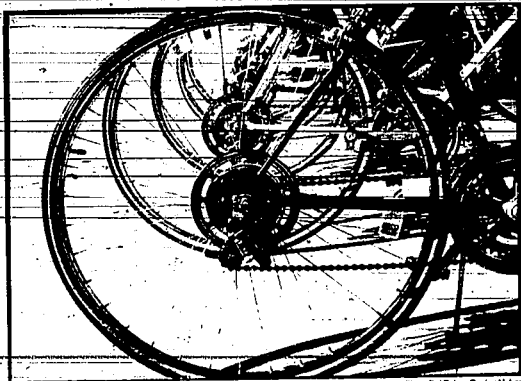


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
