## INEL may join Super Fund cleanup site list

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho National Engineering Laboratory may be added to the national Super Fund list of the most hazardous waste sites in the United States, said a spokesman for the U.S. Department of Energy.

"It is possible we will be a Super Fund site," said Cliff Clark, energy department environmental scientist at INEL on Thursday.

"If we are on the Super Fund, EPA will list the whole site, but the problems are centered in only a small por-

tion of the 690 square miles," he said. The possibility of adding the federal laboratory west of Idaho Falls is being evaluated by EPA, said Randy Smith, deputy director of EPA's hazardous waste division in Seattle.

The investigation of INEL's hazardous waste problems and the cleanup are likely to be expensive, and in some cases lengthy.

The figure of \$30 million has been bandied about just to complete the investigation phase, said Wayne Pierre, EPA's Resource Recovery and Conservation Act senior compliance officer in Seattle.

"From start to finish the investiga-

tion and cleanup could take three to 30 years," he said.

There are already four Super Fund sites in Idaho including the Pacific Hide and Fur site in Pocatello and the Bunker Hill Mine in northern Idaho.

Because of the environmental problems at the site, last July 10 the energy department and EPA worked out an agreement to look at potential problems and plan corrective action.

EPA's agreement with the energy department, that owns and runs INEL, took years of negotiations.

If INEL were made a Super Fund site, it would have a higher profile in

In some cases, EPA has received INEL plans to deal with the hazardous wastes problems at the site. Pierre said. For instance, INEL recently sent EPA a plan on contamination at radioactive waste management com-

plex. Pierre said.

INEL is cooperating with EPA on this and the relationship is not adversarial, he said.

"The approach we take is we do what's right but we also do what is reasonable," Clark of the energy department said. INEL also has an obligation to the taxpayers, he said.

Some of the hazardous waste problems relate to practices at the site that stopped years ago, said Clark of the energy department.

There are some 350 "solid waste management units" at INEL that need to be evaluated to find out

## Shultz calls troop dispatch signal to Ortega



Men of 82nd Airborne board C-141 at Pope AFB Thursday for their flight to Honduras

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State George P. Shultz said Thursday the 3,200 U.S. combat troops airlifted during the day to Central America are not there in a "shooting capacity" but to signal opposition to Nicaraguan aggression.

Senior Democrats in Congress quickly questioned President Reagan's decision to send the troops, with Senate Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd Jr. of West Virginia calling it an "overreaction."

Officials on both sides of the issue predicted the military situation would remain the controversial case. Contreras said that divided Congress for several years. And there was dispute among lawmakers as to whether Nicaragua had indeed invaded Honduras.

Shultz told a Senate committee that the troops airlifted to Honduras were dispatched to "get people's attention to what is happening in Central America" and to say to the Honduran government, "We are your friends. We stand with you."

But senior Democrats challenged Reagan's justification for the action.

"It's an overreaction," said Byrd. "We've heard the administration cry 'Wolf, wolf, before. I don't know when they're crying 'Wolf, wolf.'"

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., introduced legislation requiring Pre-

ident Reagan to obtain congressional approval before sending more troops to Honduras. He called the Reagan troop decision "a reckless escalation of the failed policy of aiding the Nicaraguan Contras."

Not all Democrats agreed, and Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole of Kansas sprang to Reagan's defense, declaring that Contra rebels are being overrun and "slaughtered by the hundreds."

He called on the president to immediately resubmit a package of military and logistical aid for the Contra rebels and said: "Does it make sense, even as thousands of communist troops cross the border of a free country in this hemisphere, for members of Congress to make excuses for (Nicaraguan) aggression, while accusing introduced legislation requiring Pre-

## Wright, Demo leaders rip Reagan for deploying troops to Honduras

WASHINGTON — House Speaker Jim Wright and some fellow Democratic leaders on Thursday criticized President Reagan's decision to send some 3,200 troops to Honduras as unjustified and "potentially dangerous," but others in Congress said the president had little choice.

"I know nothing that justifies sending troops," said Wright, D-Texas, who has made himself Reagan's most visible congressional critic on Central America policy. "Some in the White House have been trying to do everything, desperately, in their power to keep the war going."

But a leading backer of Nicaragua's Contra rebels, Senate Intelligence Committee Chairman David Boren, D-Okla., said the president had no choice but to send U.S. troops after the Nicaraguan's leftist Sandinista government reportedly attacked rebel camps inside Honduras.

He called the incursion a reaction to defeat of Contra aid legislation in the House on March 3.

"The Sandinista government has given its answer to Congress," Boren said. "This is their way of saying, 'Thank you very much. You have taken the pressure off of us. We think we have this won in Washington. Now we're going to do what we've always

intended and crush the resistance forces."

Members of Congress on both sides of the divisive Contra aid issue said the incursion and the U.S. response would not change most members' minds about whether to support new aid. But some congressional moderates said the issue had been revived, and said they would press for quick action on renewed "humanitarian" help for the rebels.

"It is important for us to move as quickly as we can toward putting together an aid package acceptable to the president and to the Congress," said Rep. Jim Slattery, D-Kan.

## Planes raid Sandinista headquarters

MANAGUA, Nicaragua — Planes from Honduras attacked a Sandinista military headquarters in northern Nicaragua at noon Thursday, said President Daniel Ortega's office said they caused no casualties or damage.

Reporters on the scene confirmed the raid, which came the day after Honduras accused the Nicaraguans of sending thousands of soldiers across the border in pursuit of U.S.-supported Contra rebels.

A Reagan administration source in Washington said the Honduran air force had carried out the attack. However, a Honduran armed forces spokesman in Tegucigalpa, the capital, denied the armed forces had crossed into Nicaragua and said rockets were fired at Sandinista forces in Honduran territory.

Nicaragua has committed an estimated 6,000 soldiers to an anti-rebel operation in an area running from the central region to the border, with most of them at the frontier.

Manuel Espinoza Enriquez, spokesman for Ortega, said the attack on

## March 24 arraignments set for North, Poindexter

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former national security adviser John M. Poindexter, Lt. Col. Oliver L. North and two arms dealers were ordered Thursday to appear March 24 for arraignment on criminal charges arising from their roles in the Iran-Contra affair.

The arraignment was scheduled by U.S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell, who will try the case brought by independent counsel Lawrence E. Walsh against Poindexter, North and retired Air Force Maj. Gen. Richard V. Secord and

his former business partner, Albert Hakim.

A lone picketer circled the U.S. Courthouse carrying signs that read "Free Oliver North" and "Hog Walsh" to protest the return Wednesday of a massive indictment against the former National Security Council aide and his three co-defendants.

The picketer's views reflected the sentiments of two congressional Republicans who last year investigated the sale of U.S. weapons to Iran and the diversion of proceeds to the Nicaraguan Contra rebels.

## Higher education funds scrape through

BOISE — The \$105.9 million appropriation for higher education scraped through the Idaho House Thursday, but both Democrats and Republicans decided to slow-down a bit before tackling the public school appropriation.

Over Democrat opposition, the House voted 45-39 for a higher education appropriation that was more than \$4 million lower than recommended by the governor. The measure now goes to the Senate, where GOP leaders are confident it will be approved and sent to Gov. Cecil Andrus.

But the Senate-approved public education appropriation of \$356 million, \$8 million under the governor's recommendation, was delayed a bit.

Both parties caucused on that subject Thursday afternoon.

Rep. Richard Adams, D-Grangeville, minority caucus chairman, said his party remains opposed to the public school funding level.

"We are generally against it and continue to

support the governor's recommendation," said Adams. He said Democrats have no desire to compromise on a figure somewhere between the \$356 approved by the Senate and the governor's recommendation of \$362 million.

"In fact, a few members want a higher budget (than the governor's budget)," said Adams.

Under normal procedures, the public school budget bill won't come to a final vote in the House until Monday, and Adams said his side wants the bill to wait until next week.

GOP Caucus Chairman Michael Simpson, R-Blackfoot, said his 64-member caucus discussed the need for generating more revenue for the next

state budget, but didn't get into the education budget.

Assuming the \$356 million budget passes, he said, it appears the Legislature will have to come up with about \$9.5 million in additional revenue.

But it appears that repealing the investment tax credit won't be an option. That has been recommended by the governor. The last two sessions, and in recent weeks, Andrus has stepped up his efforts to win industry support for the proposal.

Simpson said the GOP caucus discussed investment credit repeal and rejected it. The Republican majority also talked about cutting all budgets by 1.4 percent, as a means of erasing the \$9.5 million deficit, and rejected that, he said.

"A pretty good majority" was against repealing the tax credit, he said.

Other ways to raise money were discussed by the caucus, Simpson said, and another party meeting was planned for Friday morning.

## Jury finds Searcy guilty

RIGBY (AP) — A jury on Thursday found Barrington Eugene Searcy guilty of first-degree murder in the death of Ashlon store operator Teresa Rice.

The jury deliberated just over three hours before returning the verdict at 5:10 p.m.

Searcy also was found guilty of robbery and using a firearm in the commission of a felony.

Sentencing was set for May 27. He could receive the death sentence.

Searcy told jurors he was the trigger man, but argued that his addiction to cocaine was the driving force behind his actions.

## Judge cancels evaluation

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Seventh District Judge Larry Boyle has canceled a psychological evaluation of convicted murderer Paul Ezra Rhoades after a defense attorney objected.

However, Boyle said he was canceling the appointment with the understanding that the defense doesn't plan to introduce any evidence of Rhoades' psychological condition at a sentencing hearing on Monday.

Boyle will sentence Rhoades for his conviction of first-degree murder in the death of teacher Susan Michelbacher. Rhoades also faces sentencing in Bingham County for a first-degree murder conviction of Blackfoot store clerk Stacy Dawn Baldwin.

He faces another trial later this year on a first-degree murder charge in the death of clerk Nolan Haddon, who was killed in Idaho Falls.

## Blackfoot endorses SIS

BLACKFOOT (AP) — The Blackfoot City Council has adopted a resolution urging the Department of Energy to locate the Special Isotope Separation project at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Mayor C. Dean Hill said he wanted to have the resolution in place and ready to present at the hearing on the SIS scheduled for March 25 in Idaho Falls.

## Court grants utility fees

BOISE (AP) — A 5th District Court has awarded Idaho Power Co. more than \$465,000 in litigation expenses and attorneys' fees in what the company said may be Idaho's largest award of defense costs.

The judgment, to be paid by insurance companies and others, results from claims that Idaho Power caused a Ketchum shopping center fire in 1983.

A Blaine County jury last fall found the utility was without any liability for the fire that gutted the center. The verdict came after the company said it repeatedly told the plaintiffs in the case that their claim was frivolous and the utility would seek reimbursement of its expenses in defending itself against the multimillion-dollar suit.

## Workers exposed in plant

POCATELLO (AP) — The exposure of three workers to a radioactive solution at Idaho National Engineering Laboratory took place in a plant that already had been partially shut down for violations found in an inspection.

The exposure, characterized by INEL officials as mild, took place Tuesday at the Idaho Chemical Processing Plant, which is used to reprocess spent nuclear fuel from government-owned reactors.

## Drug suspect denied bond

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A federal judge has turned down requests from an Idaho Falls man for release on bond pending his trial on drug charges.

U.S. District Judge Marion Callister also turned down a request from Linus Warren Bowman, 57, to suppress several items of potential evidence seized last April.

## Licensing bill wins approval

BOISE (AP) — After two days of testimony expressing almost unanimous support for a contractor licensing bill, the House State Affairs Committee has reversed itself and approved the measure.

Last week the committee voted 10-9 against sending a contractor licensing bill to the floor for a vote.

On Thursday, the committee gave a "pass" to a comprehensive licensing bill. It was not a recorded vote and there was a strong minority vote against the bill.

Under normal procedure, the bill will come up for a final House vote next week. But its Senate prospects are uncertain, because legislative leaders are trying to make it the last week of the session.

State builder groups sharply criticized last week's defeat of the bill, and the committee agreed to reconsider. On Wednesday and Thursday, a parade of witnesses ranging from consumers to the head of large contractor associations urged the committee to approve the bill.

Homebuilder spokesman Paul Pusey said Thursday it's one of the few times the construction industry has been able to agree on major legislation.

# Fuel tax increase up for Senate vote

BOISE (AP) — House-passed legislation boosting the state fuel tax to 18 cents a gallon, a measure designed to help the state trim a backlog of nearly \$1 billion in needed highway work, has been cleared for a final Senate vote.

With little discussion, the Senate Transportation Committee on Thursday sent the 3 1/2-cent fuel tax hike to the floor on a 6-4 vote.

The five Democrats were joined by Republican Roger Fairchild in supporting the increase. Republican Phil Batt of Wilder, who is joining the



adequate support out there for 3 1/2 cents."

GOP critics opposed the amount of the increase. Committee Chairman C.A. Smyser, R-Parma, has consistently maintained the motor transport industry in the state and most individual motorists cannot stand any hike above 3 cents.

Transportation Board after retiring from the Legislature this spring; abstained from the voting.

"It's very clear that in order to do the projects, especially sealing and re-coating, we need 3 1/2 cents," said Sen. Bruce Sweeney, D-Lewiston. "There's

agreement on the amount of the increase and the tax remained unchanged.

A driving force behind the hike is the need for the state to come up with \$1.6 million to secure over \$60 million in federal highway funds.

"It means jobs," said Democrat Michael Blackbird of Kellogg, citing statistics suggesting that each million dollars in road construction generates some 60 jobs in the state.

In addition, the 1989 Transportation Department budget is based on the success of the increase.

## House moves to open path for tax votes

BOISE (AP) — For years, Idaho's cities and counties have been coming to the Legislature and asking lawmakers to remove a limit on property tax increases, says Rep. Golden Linford, R-Rexburg.

He convinced the House on Thursday to pass his bill allowing individual counties to remove the limit — if at least 55 percent of the voters agree.

The House voted 49-32 to send the measure to the Senate. It faces an uncertain fate in the Local Government and Taxation Committee. That panel, headed by conservative Sen. Veal Crystal, R-Idaho Falls, has been the traditional burying ground of bills attempting major changes in tax law — especially those which might allow higher taxes.

After voters approved the One Percent Initiative in 1978, the Legislature responded by placing a 5 percent limit on annual property tax increases by local units of government.

Linford told House members the Legislature has been allowing exceptions to the limit, that little by little have "demolished the wall" against property tax increases.

Rather than having cities and counties continually ask the Legislature to remove the limit, he said, it would be better for each county to decide individually if they want to do so.

Linford was opposed by the other representative from District 33, Rep. Stan Hawkins, R-Boise. Hawkins said the way the proposal was worded, voters wouldn't know they were removing the last traces of the One Percent Initiative.

# Spirits high among troopers as 82nd Airborne heads south



Face painted for camouflage, an 82nd member waits to go

FORT BRAGG, N.C. (AP) — Smiling and waving, hundreds of young paratroopers boarded transport planes Thursday and flew to Honduras for training exercises prompted by reports of an incursion by Nicaraguan forces.

"We're 100 percent ready," said Lt. Jim Cooper, smearing camouflage paint on the face of Lt. Steve Swinley as they prepared to leave from neighboring Pope Air Force Base.

"Give 'em hell," added Sgt. Dwight Royal of Fayetteville.

President Reagan on Wednesday night ordered the deployment of an infantry brigade task force of 3,200 men consisting of two battalions of the 82nd Airborne at Fort Bragg and two from the 7th Infantry Division at Fort Ord, Calif.

Reagan called the move "a measured response" to the Nicaraguan troops movement and to a request for assistance from the Honduran president.

The 2,000 combat-ready soldiers from Fort Bragg and 1,200 from Fort Ord were flying to Palmerola, the

main center of U.S. military operations in Honduras and about 125 miles west of an area where heavy fighting was reported Wednesday.

Meanwhile, the Rhode Island National Guard said that 100 military police and engineers who had previously been scheduled to fly to Honduras on Friday will go ahead with plans for road-building exercises despite increased military activity in the country.

Adjutant Gen. John W. Kiely said the guardsmen will be deployed far from any potential conflicts between Nicaraguan troops and the 3,200 U.S. infantry and airborne soldiers.

Troops began leaving Pope shortly after 7 a.m. on the first of 26 C-141 planes that were taking off every 30 minutes, said Lt. Gen. John W. Foss, commander of the 18th Airborne Corps.

Many of the soldiers kissed their wives and girlfriends goodbye at marshaling points on the sprawling base.

No such farewells were possible for some of the troops at Fort Ord who were engaged in an exercise when word came that two battalions would

go to Honduras. Many of the men taking part in the training exercise were unable to get in touch with relatives before departing.

"We've all got swollen eyes, and we're sticking together," said Karen Brylewski, a civilian base worker who runs a support group for families of servicemen at Fort Ord.

She said she talked to her husband by telephone before he left and "he said some of the guys are crying, but everybody has to be strong. We're just hoping and praying nothing serious comes of this."

From Fort Ord, the troops and supplies were carried on dozens of trucks to Travis Air Force Base, where the first C-141 lifted off at 9:29 a.m. MST. "I expect it to go on all day," said Air Force Maj. Wayne Crist.

The first planeload of troops from Fort Bragg arrived at Palmerola at 9:15 a.m. MST in the operation code-named "Golden Pheasant" by the Pentagon, according to local radio stations transmitting from there.

In Washington, White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said the

complete deployment would take about 27 hours.

About 800 of the paratroopers were to parachute into a landing area about five miles from Palmerola on Thursday night or Friday morning, Foss said.

The U.S. troops will conduct training exercises with Honduran soldiers, including patrols, small unit training, mock air assaults and airborne operations, said Maj. Gen. Carl W. Stiner, commander of the 82nd Airborne Division.

Stiner said the troops were also bringing three light observation helicopters, four Cobra gunship helicopters, one Blackhawk UH-60 helicopter, a command vehicle and ammunition.

He said another combat-ready battalion from Fort Bragg had been placed on alert.

As the young soldiers — the average age is 23 — began boarding the C-141s early Thursday, many smiled and waved at television cameras and others raised their weapons in the air.

# Reports of Nicaraguan troop moves set off flurry of activity

WASHINGTON (AP) — Intelligence reports that Nicaragua had sent forces into Honduras set in motion a flurry of activity over a 30-hour period that culminated in President Reagan's decision to send ground forces to Honduras.

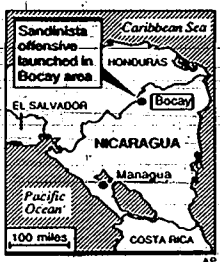
For the previous two weeks, the administration had noted with alarm Sandinista preparations for an offensive in the heavily jungled Bocay Valley in northern Nicaragua. They had begun within days after the Feb. 29 cutoff of U.S. aid to the Contras.

The administration kept quiet about the Sandinista activities until Tuesday, when State Department spokesman Charles Redman said the preparations foreshadowed "the largest offensive we have seen the Sandinistas undertake."

Later in the day, two Pentagon officials who briefed reporters at the State Department seemed to undercut Redman somewhat by being less categorical than the spokesman about Sandinista intentions.

But those discrepancies were quickly forgotten when, soon after the briefing ended, initial reports that the offensive had started began to reach Washington. As outlined by Secretary of State George P. Shultz and other senior administration officials who asked not to be named, the ensuing period was one of intense activity as the government decided on an appropriate response.

The magnitude of the attack surprised officials. Several thousand Sandinista troops attacked Contra posi-

Hours after the initial reports of the offensive had been received in Washington, Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega confirmed them. But he made no reference to a Sandinista border crossing into Honduras.

By Wednesday morning, about 18 hours after the first reports of the Sandinista penetration, the U.S. ambassador to Honduras, Everett Briggs, met with President Jose Azcona and discussed the possibility of U.S. assistance to Honduras.

Azcona consulted by telephone with the presidents of Guatemala, El Salvador and Costa Rica to tell them of his concerns. He also called Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega to demand the withdrawal of the Sandinista forces.

By early afternoon, a Nicaraguan military spokeswoman denied that an "invasion" of Honduras had taken place. At mid-afternoon, Ortega went on national radio to say that there

had been "cross-fire from Honduran territory against our forces."

He neither confirmed nor denied the presence of Nicaraguan soldiers in Honduras. But House speaker Jim Wright, D-Tex., said Nicaraguan Foreign Minister Miguel D'Escobar had confirmed by telephone the border-crossing but that the Sandinista forces were retreating back into Nicaragua.

In late afternoon, Honduran Air Force pilots flew over the area and reported the Sandinista troop concentrations back to Azcona. At 5 p.m., Azcona met again with Briggs and handed him a letter asking for U.S. ground troops.

Briggs later relayed the request to Assistant Secretary of State Elliott Abrams, who passed it on to National Security adviser Colin Powell.

Powell and White House Chief of Staff Howard Baker briefed Reagan at his residence at 8 p.m., and the president then decided to comply with the request.

The White House made the formal announcement at 10 p.m. Wednesday, emphasizing that the 3,200 troops to be sent to Honduras would be deployed far from the scene of hostilities and would not engage in combat.

tions on the Nicaraguan side of the border and upwards of 1,500 troops penetrated Honduran territory. They also pounded Contra positions with heavy artillery and aerial bombardment.

One apparent aim was the destruction of a Contra military supply depot which the rebels consider vital to their survival. Another was to enhance the Sandinista bargaining position for cease-fire talks with the Contras that are scheduled to begin Monday in a southern Nicaraguan town.

On Capitol Hill, there were expressions of skepticism by Democrats about the early reports. Some felt that the administration claims were too self-serving to be taken at face value.

After all, the administration had been trying for months to fashion a strategy for winning congressional ap-

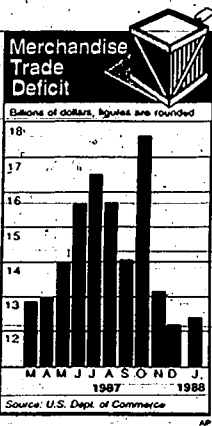

# Economists unworried over slightly wider U.S. trade deficit



WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. merchandise trade deficit widened to \$12.44 billion in January, the government reported Thursday, but economists said the 1.9 percent increase was too small to cause alarm.

Both exports and imports fell — exports by 10 percent to \$22.33 billion and imports by 9 percent to \$34.77 billion. The trade deficit is the difference between the two.

Analysts said the export drop was expected and happens every January. But the decline in imports was greeted as good news and a further indication that the trade balance is slowly improving.

The Commerce Department said that January's deficit was up from \$12.20 billion in December, but down from those of \$13.21 billion in November and \$17.63 billion in October.

If the January level continued for 12 consecutive months, it would yield an annual trade deficit of about \$149 billion. In 1987, the merchandise trade deficit was \$171.29 billion.

"There was a seasonal decline in exports, which have dropped in January every year of this decade," said Commerce Secretary C. William Verity. "There is obviously a long way to go

to eliminate the trade deficit. But we are on the right track."

Private economists appeared to agree. "We tend to be very impatient and all expect dramatic improvements every month. But the trade numbers are very time consuming to change," said Jay Goldinger, chief economist for Capital Insight, a Los Angeles brokerage house. "It's a large vessel and it can't move that quickly. But I believe the ship continues to travel in the right direction."

The January report represented a slight setback after two consecutive monthly improvements and reclaimed some of the gains won from surging exports at the end of 1987. But there were some bright spots.

For instance, the deficit with Japan — still the largest single-country imbalance — fell by 17.6 percent in January to \$3.95 billion, its lowest level since December 1986.

Imports of Japanese cars registered a 19.5 percent drop in January alone, to \$1.62 billion.

And the nation showed its first surplus in nearly three years with Britain, with exports overtaking imports by \$75 million.

For all Western Europe, the deficit declined 51 percent, to \$1.33 billion.

A weaker dollar — worth roughly 50 percent less now than it was three years ago against Japanese and European currencies — is credited with making U.S. goods more competitive abroad and imports more costly at home.

However, the deficit worsened in January with trading partners who have not seen the same degree of dol-

lar devaluation against their currencies.

It was up 77 percent with Canada to \$1.12 billion, up 20 percent with Taiwan to \$1.32 billion, up 19 percent with South Korea to \$910.9 million and up 16 percent with the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries to \$1.03 billion.

Unlike many other government economic statistics, the monthly trade figures are not adjusted for seasonal

fluctuations, although they will be starting with April.

Because exports always fall after the Christmas season, analysts suggested that the January figures were misleading and overstated the actual trade deficit.

The report comes several days after the Commerce Department reported that the current account deficit — an even broader measure of the trade balance than the merchandise figures

## Study sees improved mail service from private firms if done properly

WASHINGTON (AP) — Allowing private companies to go into the mail delivery business could improve service, but such a drastic change must be phased in gradually, the President's Commission on Privatization says.

Over time, the government monopoly on delivering letters should be ended, with immediate steps to allow private firms to deliver advertising and to operate in rural areas, the commission recommends.

The mail recommendations are part of a detailed report on privatizing various government operations, scheduled to be released today at the White House.

Other aspects of the study include developing a system of private air traffic control towers; issuing vouchers for low-income housing instead of building public housing units; selling the government's \$250 billion loan portfolio; and issuing vouchers for public school education.

In general, the study reports, the benefits of switching to a competitive mail delivery system would outweigh the problems, although the change-over could be confusing and costly.

The overall costs of postal service should be reduced through competition, the commission concluded, and efficiency could be improved. The report noted that the growth of competition in parcel delivery has provided consumer with more alternatives and price competition.

Officials of the U.S. Postal Service said Thursday they could not comment on the report until they have had a chance to study it.

However, major unions representing postal workers already have fired a volley at the study based on preliminary reports of what it would contain.

If mail delivery is opened to competition, private companies will skim off the money-making city delivery routes and leave the more expensive rural deliveries to the Postal Service, the National Association of Letter Carriers contended. The American Postal Workers Union also has opposed privatization plans.

Such a change would destroy the nation's system of universal service, the letter carrier's union charged, "rural and inner-city residents would not be served by private firms and would receive reduced service at exorbitant postage rates."

Former Postmaster General Preston R. Tisch last fall termed the idea of privatization a "dubious" solution, contending that the changeover would be "chaotic and impractical."

The conservative Heritage Foundation, however, has lent its support to at least limited privatization, calling for rule changes to allow private firms to deliver third-class advertising mail and for increased contracting out of postal services.

The recommendations of the priva-

tization commission are more sweeping, however. If tempered with the caution that the changeover could be confusing, as was the switch from a telephone monopoly to a system of competing systems.

Changing to a private system could cause problems for many of the Postal Service's 800,000 workers, and tax money could be required to assist in finding new jobs and in retraining, the study indicates.

"Here is a rundown of the basic postal service recommendations of the commission:

- Open mail delivery to competition, but on a gradual basis with compensation for postal workers and managers for loss of benefits and earnings.
- Consider turning the Postal Service into a private business, perhaps by selling stock in the agency to its employees.
- Immediately end restrictions on private firms delivering third-class advertising, widely known as "junk" mail.
- Immediately open up rural delivery to competition.
- End restrictions on private firms placing mail in letter boxes at people's homes.
- Ease restrictions on delivery of express mail.
- Actively pursue all possibilities for contracting out services.

## Shultz tries persuasion

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State George P. Shultz made a fresh attempt Thursday to persuade Israel that a Mideast peace conference would not be stacked in the Arabs' favor.

Shultz said the United States would not attend — or remain — at a conference designed to replace direct Arab-Israeli negotiations.

"The conference will be specifically enjoined from imposing solutions or vetoing what had been agreed bilaterally," Shultz told the Senate Budget Committee.

He testified after concluding four days of talks with Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir. The Israeli leader left for Los Angeles and then home without accepting Shultz's plan to open negotiations on Palestinian self-rule by May 1 and on a Middle East settlement by December.

In meetings with Shultz and a two-hour White House session Wednesday with President Reagan, Shamir concentrated on his objections to the peace conference.

## Camp visit off

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan and his wife Nancy will remain at the White House this weekend to give the first lady a chance to recuperate from a bout of laryngitis, the president's spokesman announced Thursday.

White House physician John Hutten recommended she take it easy and advised the couple to cancel their regular weekend visit to the Camp David, Md., presidential retreat, spokesman Martin Fitzwater said.

The first lady canceled a planned trip to Nashville, Tenn., on Wednesday because of her voice loss.

## Ireland recalls St. Pat

DUBLIN, Ireland (AP) — Ireland cast aside its economic woes and the latest violence in Ulster to stage its biggest ever St. Patrick's Day parade Thursday, celebrating the Irish patron saint as well as the capital's 1,000th birthday.

A record crowd of 300,000 people, including thousands of American tourists, thronged the three-mile parade route from St. Stephen's Green to O'Connell Street, the main thoroughfare.

Many adorned their lapels with sprigs of shamrock, the wild clover that is Ireland's national emblem.

About 6,000 people took part in the parade of dancers, marching bands and historic-theme floats. Skies were overcast but the rain held off.

March 14-20 was designated St. Patrick's Week in honor of Ireland's patron saint and Dublin's millennium celebrations, with daily displays of Irish folk music, dance and street theater.

In Northern Ireland, St. Patrick's Day celebrations were heavily overshadowed by Wednesday's outbreak of sectarian violence when a Protestant gunman shot and threw grenades at Catholic mourners burying

three Irish Republican Army guerrillas in Belfast. Three people died and 68 were wounded.

Mourners wearing shamrocks and green armbands attended the funeral Thursday of a slain IRA guerrilla a day after the bloodbath at Milltown Cemetery. The service was peaceful.

The violence had little-visible impact on the Dublin parade. It was a day to set aside thoughts of an unemployment rate near 18 percent, high taxation and an emigration outflow estimated at 30,000 a year.

Prime Minister Charles Haughey reviewed the parade from a stand outside the General Post Office where rebels launched the Easter Rising of 1916 against British rule.

Organizers said crews from more than 80 TV stations in the United States and Canada photographed the parade.

Government offices, schools, banks and most businesses were closed in the south, but many industries, offices and department stores stayed open in Northern Ireland, where the majority is Protestant and doesn't regard St. Patrick's Day as a national holiday.

## Blacks get month stay of sentence

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Supporters of the "Sharpeville Six" celebrated by singing freedom songs Thursday when a judge granted a one-month stay of execution 15 hours before the black prisoners were to be hanged.

Justice Willem Human, who sentenced the five men and one woman to death three years ago for complicity in a mob killing, said there was new evidence that a key prosecution witness had perjured himself during the trial.

There have been worldwide calls for clemency for the six.

Scores of blacks inside Pretoria Supreme Court broke into applause when Human announced his decision. Several hundred more people outside cheered, raised clenched fists and sang freedom songs before police ordered them to disperse.

## Israeli army begins brutality trials

JAFFA, Israel (AP) — Israel began its first major trials on Thursday of soldiers charged with brutality in the Arab rebellion, and Palestinians wounded an Israeli with gunfire for the first time since the violence began Dec. 8.

Israeli warplanes raided Palestinian guerrilla bases in the mountains south of Beirut, and newspapers said Secretary of State George P. Shultz may return to the Middle East early next month to promote the U.S. peace plan.

## Israelis hit PLO base from air

AYNAH, Lebanon (AP) — Israeli warplanes divedbombed a Palestine Liberation Organization base in Druse-held territory above Beirut on Thursday in the deepest air raid into Lebanon since January.

Police said one guerrilla was killed and another was wounded along with his 2-year-old son. It was Israel's third air strike against Palestinian targets

in Lebanon since January. The air strike came a day after guerrillas in south Lebanon fired Soviet-made Katyusha rockets into northern Israel, shattering windows and damaging citrus trees. No casualties were reported.

The new assault was mounted by six Israeli fighter-bombers, demolishing a two-story building. The raid came a day after rockets landed in northern Israel, causing light damage.

Authorities increased restrictions in the occupied territories, which already include travel bans and a cutoff of telephone service to the outside. A military official said must get approval to bring \$1,000 or more from neighboring Jordan, where most hold citizenship and have family.

The rules are intended to hamper the Palestine Liberation Organization

in organizing and financing the protests. Trials beginning Thursday involved the burial alive of four Arabs by an army bulldozer Feb. 5 in Kfar Salem, a West Bank village, and the beating Feb. 24 of two Palestinians near Nablus, which was photographed by a CBS News crew.

Neighbors soon rescued the buried Palestinians. The beating was televised around the world and aroused international protest.

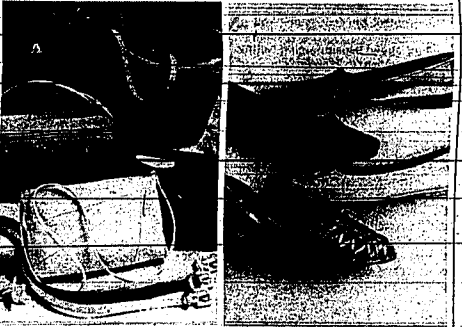

## DWR: Feds declare water war on the West

BOISE — The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission hammered "one more nail in the coffin" of Idaho's right to allocate its own water, according to Department of Water Resources Director Keith Higginson Thursday.

Referring to a FERC decision he received Monday concerning a Twin Falls County hydropower project, Higginson said, "We find that completely untenable."

And U.S. Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, has called FERC's reasoning "a declaration of war on the west."

This issue illustrates a classic example of the conflict over who holds final control of water allocation: the states or federal government. Officials say FERC's reasoning undercuts Idaho's discretion in granting future water rights because existing rights would become etched in stone.

This facet of the states' rights conflict surfaced in a FERC decision in January for a hydropower project along the Payette River at Horsehoe Bend. FERC simply referred again to its Horsehoe Bend decision in ruling on a proposed Rock Creek hydropower project in Twin Falls County, within a

## EPA, FERC clash over Auger Falls hydro plan

WASHINGTON — Disputing a Federal Energy Regulatory Commission staff recommendation to build the Auger Falls hydroelectric project near Twin Falls, the Environmental Protection Agency says the project would seriously threaten adjacent wetlands.

In a letter to EERC, Robert Burd, EPA Region-10 water division director, said the EPA also has reservations about the proposed Star Falls project, which received an unfavorable review by the FERC staff.

Burd said that both projects would have a "major" impact on wetlands along the Snake River. The letter is an official response to a draft environmental impact statement by the FERC staff for four hydro-projects proposed for the Snake River near Twin Falls.

In that document, released last November, the FERC staff recommended construction licenses for the Auger Falls project and a design alternative for a project at Milner Falls. The report says these two projects, with FERC-designed measures to limit

environmental damage, "would be economical and would not significantly harm" the Snake River basin's environment.

The FERC staff recommended against licenses for the other proposals — the projects at Star Falls and at Twin Falls — on economic or environmental grounds.

In the letter, the EPA official said the FERC staff failed to discuss in its environmental impact statement the impact the Auger Falls project would have if future water uses upstream become more important.

For Horseshoe Bend, FERC rejected DWR's contention that water licenses should be conditional, so that water for a project could potentially

be cut back if future water uses upstream become more important.

DWR's argument is called "subordinating" water rights. Otherwise all potential future projects or uses upstream, throughout a river and its tributaries, could be ruled out.

"You may use whatever flow is available at your diversion but it is subordinate to possible future uses of the water," said Higginson, explaining DWR's appeal. "Without that, we're dead in the water in this state."

"It would be an unthinkable situation to find ourselves in 'Idaho,' Higginson added.

Nevertheless, it is precisely this situation in which Idaho increasingly finds itself. FERC rejected DWR's and Idaho Power Co.'s arguments for subordination at Rock Creek, just as it had for Horseshoe Bend.

Higginson noted that the Horseshoe Bend decision is still under appeal.

Critics of FERC's increasing authority say the power to control the water is still under appeal.

## New county jail bids point towards start

TWIN FALLS — Today at noon, the Twin Falls County Commissioners will fill Sheriff Jim Munn's heart with joy.

After opening bids Thursday for the construction of the long-awaited, new Twin Falls County jail, the three commissioners say they will announce which company will construct the facility at noon today.

"Can we expect a hole by one o'clock?" Munn asked after the announcement.

All the bids came in lower than the county's \$3.8 million estimate for the 30-bed, 27,303-square-foot jail. Russell Corporation of Boise submitted the lowest at \$3.2 million, and McAlvin Construction Inc. was next at \$3.3 million.

Close to 20 people crowded into the county commissioners' office Thursday to hear County Clerk Dick Pence read the seven bids on the project.

"I think the only thing I have to do is get hold of Russell Corporation and see if they are comfortable with their bid," said Joe Conrad, the county's architect for the project.

Munn, who stood at the end of the commissioners' table during the bid opening, has been the brunt of a controversy over Twin Falls County's aging jail.

The current jail, built in the early 1900s, was the target of an October 1985 lawsuit alleging conditions were inadequate. The county signed a stipulation

agreeing the current jail had problems. The county agreed to make improvements to the present jail, place a cap on the inmate population in Twin Falls County and hold an election for a jail bond.

That election succeeded last May when voters agreed to the proposal for the jail to be built on a site adjacent to the courthouse.

But since the February 1986 stipulation, Munn has been forced to shuttle prisoners in and out of the county-at-a cost of up to \$20,000 a month.

After the bids were opened, Conrad said construction could conceivably begin in a couple weeks.

"That's when I can wallow in the hole," Munn said.

Munn's obvious relief in the potential of having a new jail adjacent to the courthouse has been delayed. Shortly after the county's voters approved the jail bond, Twin Falls mechanic Arlo Kent filed a lawsuit challenging the procedure used by the county in the election.

That lawsuit was dismissed in 5th District Court in July and the Idaho Supreme Court ruled against Kent Sept. 16.

But in the meantime, the county's bond counsel, Chapman and Cutler, of Salt Lake City, wouldn't give the county permission to sell the bonds necessary for the construction.

Now, construction appears imminent.

"Hey, we're on our way," Munn said, clapping his hands.

## UPRR agreement makes sense now

SHOSHONE — For the first time in more than 30 years, a written sublease is prepared for county and school district use of Union Pacific Railroad land in Shoshone.

The land, located on the east side of Shoshone, has been leased from UPRR by the city of Shoshone for decades. The site is used for the county fair and rodeo grounds, for the high school athletic field and city summer baseball program.

Improvements to the area include the rodeo arena, now more than 10 years old, permanent fair display buildings, construction of which began in the early 1950s; newly renovated bleachers; athletic field lighting and a new concession stand.

Fair Board Chairman Ken Haight, asked the city, at a recent council meeting, to draw up a written contract between the city, county and school district defining acceptable uses, lease fee and maintenance costs assigned to each entity.

Traditionally the three entities have shared the cost of the UPRR lease, which was renewed earlier this year for a five-year term at an annual cost of \$100.

The three have also shared mainte-

nance and improvement costs, but no written agreement between the three seems to exist. City Clerk Ron Beien said he has been unable to locate any such sublease in the city's files.

The county also searched its files about two years ago when a tort claim for property damage was filed against the rodeo board, but no agreement was found.

City Attorney Howard Adkins will draw up the sublease agreement, which will require UPRR approval.

Councilman Jerry Baltazor asked Adkins to look closely at city liability in allowing other entities to use the site.

"We are really hanging out there now," he said.

Haight said the County Fair Board also needs to have clear guidelines on liability and acceptable uses for the site.

He said the board would like to build an outdoor stage at the west end of the 4-H display building on the fairgrounds. He also said the board would like to ban open containers of alcoholic beverages on the fairgrounds during the annual Lincoln County fair.

Adkins will present the proposed sublease to the city in the near future. The agreement will have to be approved by the railroad as well as each entity.

## Board OKs Thornsberry, Rutledge

TWIN FALLS — Former Buhl High School Principal Dale Thornsberry will be the new principal of Robert Stuart Junior High School beginning next fall.

Thornsberry's appointment was approved by the Twin Falls School District Board of Trustees at a special meeting Thursday morning.

O'Leary Junior High School Vice-Principal Randy Rutledge was also named the new principal of Sawtooth Elementary School for the 1988-89 school year.

Stuart principal Jack Watts and Sawtooth principal Keith Turner announced last month their intentions to retire at the end of this school year.

The candidates were recommended to the board by selection committees, Superintendent Carl Snow said.

Thornsberry is now serving as assistant to the

executive director of the Idaho High School Activities Association. He had served four years as an assistant principal and 11 years as a high school principal. Altogether, Thornsberry has 23 years in education. He received his masters of education degree from Idaho State University.

"We are very, very pleased," Snow said. "He is an outstanding individual."

Thornsberry resigned from his Buhl job in 1986 after the Buhl School Board of Trustees decided not to renew his contract. However, the board reversed its decision after a public show of support for Thornsberry.

During his 18 years in education, Rutledge has had five years experience as an elementary principal and two years as a junior high school vice principal.

Rutledge received his graduate and undergraduate degrees from colleges in California.

"We felt he conducted himself with confidence and poise during the interview," Snow said.

Personnel Director Keith Farnsworth said 31

people applied for the elementary position and 41 people applied for the junior high job.

Selection committees pared down the list to six finalists, whose work and academic backgrounds were thoroughly checked, he said.

Snow said that two of the out-of-state finalists withdrew because the salary range was low.

"They would have had a tremendous cut (in pay)," Snow said.

The salaries for Thornsberry and Rutledge are still under negotiation, he said.

The district will begin a search immediately for a replacement for Rutledge.

Board Chairman Calvin Lamborn said he was impressed with the number of applicants.

"I think we have a good reputation," he said.

On another subject, the board approved an agreement with the City of Twin Falls for two easements on district property related to the construction of a new city swimming pool.

The city is leasing district property near Sawtooth Elementary School for the pool.

## Evolution vs. creationism debate airs at press club meeting

TWIN FALLS — Start talking evolution versus creationism and you're sure to run smack dab into disagreement.

Such was the case Thursday afternoon at a meeting of the Sawtooth Press Club.

Terry Gilbert, regional director of the Idaho Education Association, which represents teachers, debated 6th District Judge R. Michael Redman, who also hosts a Christian radio

show, on whether creationism should be taught in the classroom. About 30 people came to listen.

The topic was spurred by a complaint to the Twin Falls School District Board of Trustees by Times-News Managing Editor Stephen Harten and wife Jan. The couple claimed O'Leary Junior High School teacher Phil Gerrish was teaching creationism in a science class, which they considered the promotion of religion.

Gerrish admitted to teaching creationism, but claimed it was a scientific theory just like evolution. The issue was not religious, but of academic freedom to present a balanced view, he said.

As a result of the complaint, a school district committee is preparing a policy on the teaching of creationism as related to curriculum.

At the debate, Gilbert said this was not an issue of academic freedom.

"As a representative of teachers, I'd be the first to stand up and say this is an academic freedom issue," he said.

According to several court rulings, creationism is not science, he said.

In an Arkansas case, a judge noted that "creationists don't take data and compare data. Creationists take the Bible literally and attempt to find scientific support," Gilbert said.

"Creationism may be good religion, but it's bad science," he added.

He asked the audience not to be fooled by what he called the fallacies of taking the Bible as a scientific account. Pope John II even said the Biblical account states the relationship between God and man, but it is not provided as a scientific treatise, he said.

The creationists only recognize two

earth-origin models: evolution and creationism," he said. But no one has suggested the theories of the earth's origins from the religion of the Hindus and American Indians as acceptable alternatives.

If creationism is to be used as a balanced, then others should be included, Gilbert said.

"I want testimony in that classroom. I want the flat earth theory in that classroom," he said. "Let's forget about the integrity of science."

Religions and their contributions to society have their place in philosophy

classes or history of religion classes," he said. Students should be exposed to the Bible as literature.

"Creationism is based on the first 11 chapters of the Bible. It is religion," Gilbert said. "It is not science."

"It is an issue of academic freedom," Redman said of the Gerrish case. "If the teacher was attempting to impose religion, it is up to those who supervise him to deal with that improperly. But it was proper for Gerrish to offer different views of the origin of man."

# House panel votes to hold crime victim protection measure

**BOISE (AP)** — The Idaho news media received both a victory and a warning at a legislative hearing Thursday.

The victory was over legislation pushed by Attorney General Jim Jones to protect crime victims and witnesses from having their names released to the public. On a voice vote, the House Judiciary, Rules and Administration Committee voted to hold the bill indefinitely. That usually is a killing motion.

But at the same time, members of the committee served notice they want something done about protecting the victims of crimes, particularly those involving sexual offenses, from having their names or addresses made public.

News media executives protested the Jones bill as being unnecessary, because Idaho newspapers, radio television stations do not make a practice of printing the names and addresses of rape victims.



The legislation from Jones would have forbidden police or prosecutors from releasing the names of crime victims if the victims asked that personal information be withheld. It would apply to sexual incidents, crimes of violence, malicious-harassment and violations of civil rights.

Jones told earlier hearings he started working on a proposal to forbid police and prosecutors from releasing the names, addresses and telephone numbers of crime victims after an incident in Moscow.

Jones earlier told the committee the name of an attempted rape victim was published by the local news paper. He made no reference to the incident on Thursday.

But James E. Shalley, publisher of the Moscow Idahoan and the Palouse Empire News, brought copies of the story, showing the victim's name was not disclosed. He said he has received no apology from Jones for the false information Jones put out.

Rep. Bruce Newcomb, R-Burley, told the committee the victim was his daughter, who at the time was a 20-year-old University of Idaho student.

He apologized for telling the committee the name had been published when in fact it had not. "She thought it (her name) had been in the paper," he said, although his daughter's name was used by a local radio station, KREL.

After a 90-minute hearing, it became apparent that the bill was headed for defeat. Rep.

Sam Clark, R-Pocatello, proposed a hastily drawn amendment, limiting the information restriction to victims of sexual crimes. That was voted down.

Also testifying were Stephen Hartgen, managing editor of the Twin Falls Times-News; Jeanine Sweet, Boise broadcaster and president of the Idaho Press Club; Allen Derr, Press Club board member and Boise attorney; and Steve Bagwell, city editor of The Idaho Statesman.

Rep. Gary Montgomery, R-Boise, told committee members he wanted something done to protect the rights of victims and witnesses in certain crimes.

He said he detected "a hint-of-arrogance" in testimony from Shelley and the other news media representatives.

"They feel that the First Amendment right as it relates to the press is absolute, that everything else must give way," he said. "The

victim's rights ought to get the highest priority," he said.

"I fail to see how the spread of a victim's name all over the front page is more important," he said.

"He said it is evident that mistakes are made. 'More restraint is needed than I've seen,'" he said.

"We need something better than what we have before us," said Rep. Jerry Decker, R-Eagle. "We could do something for both the victims and the witnesses."

"We have a very delicate arena here. Why don't you come back and visit with us?" he said, to the news media executives.

Rep. Russell Newcomb, R-Twin Falls, brother of Bruce Newcomb, said he felt victims need more protection.

"I don't see adequate procedures to protect her when she is put at risk," he said.

flow of water also controls the state's destiny. Alternatives for reducing FERC's authority are being weighed.

McClure told FERC Chairman Martha Hesse about his opposition to FERC's Horsehoe Bend decision last January. His remarks came during her appearance before the federal Energy and Natural Resources Committee March 8.

"When you assert, as you have, that once a federal license is issued on any

water project, you then have exclusive control over every upstream water project from the federally approved project, it is a declaration of war on the west," McClure said. "I suggest the west will enter that war and we'll all be the losers."

FERC officials could not be reached for comment late Monday.

Higginson said there are only two ways to stem FERC's increasing authoritarianism. Change will require either a court battle or arguing for the

integrity of Idaho's Constitution, or a Congressional change in the Federal Power Act that empowers FERC.

Higginson said Idaho's Constitution calls for state control over water rights, which he argued is being weakened by FERC's recent decisions.

"We simply must find a way to allow the states to have some say over their own destiny," McClure said. "If we do not find that, under the Federal Power Act and the other statutes we have enacted, short-term decisions we are going to have a pitched battle in the Congress of the United States."

would have on adjacent wetlands.

In EPA's own study of the Snake River basin, Burd said, "We have identified significant water quality and wetland impacts that must be avoided in order to adequately protect the environment. Corrective measures may require substantial changes to the preferred alternative

or consideration of a new alternative."

Burd said the Auger Falls and Star Falls projects "could significantly degrade the water quality of the mainstem Snake River" by decreasing dissolved oxygen content and increasing temperatures and plankton growth, which could threaten fish.

Burd said the EPA is "very concerned" about the fate of wetlands near the projects.

The bill has passed the Senate and is due before a House committee Monday.

"We're hoping the House will favorably consider it," Higginson said.

"It is not proper to say 'God did it,' then shut up," Redman said. But it was proper to say "God did it, according to Christians."

A school board policy should not restrict a teacher to teaching just one thing, he said.

The magistrate also said Gilbert misstated some of the court cases on creationism. "This must correct, a U.S. ruling on a Louisiana case, said teachers were within their rights to teach creationism. The court had found that the state's intent to specifically promote religion in schools wasn't constitutional."

There was no evidence to support evolution, Redman said.

"Most Darwin evolutionists today are in the public schools," he added. "Textbooks are full of lies in the sense that they have information that's not true."

With creationism as one extreme and evolution at the other, there are many other theories in between, he said. Scientific theories consistent with the Bible shouldn't be ignored.

The big bang theory says there was an explosion of light and energy, Redman said. That's how the creation of the world is described in Genesis, he said.

"That doesn't make the big bang theory religious," he said. "What is the ultimate force that sets evolution in motion? At that point you are probably talking religion. You are definitely talking religion because you don't have any evidence."

Redman admitted there were some people in the creationism movement who want to "sneak religion into the classrooms." But he was "sick" of textbooks that pushed only one point of view.

Wandalee Anderson of Kimberly said, "Time after time we find evolution is taught as fact."

Other theories have been shut out and "that's what I'm opposed to," she said.

If students are told they evolved from animals, they then won't feel an obligation to live like descendants from God, Anderson said.

"I think young people today act

more like monkeys than men," she said.

Ironically, Redman used quotes from Darwin and Gilbert used passages from the Bible to support their sides.

In addition to drawing interest at the meeting, creationism has been the subject of several telephone calls and letters to the Twin Falls School District.

Of the more than 60 telephone calls, a majority have been supportive of Gerrish, Superintendent Carl Snow said. The district has also received many letters with about "100 to one" behind creationism, he said.

The board asked that any comment about the subject be in writing and submitted to the district office. The comments will then be forwarded to the committee preparing the policy.

Snow said he wouldn't release the letters the district has received so far because they are addressed to the district administration or committee members, whose names were not released.

# UP calls Pocatello workers

## Inquiry considers pharmacy, drug death link

MOSCOW (AP) — Second District Magistrate Judge Stephen Calhoun will preside over an inquiry into the death of a Princeton, Idaho woman who may have been the victim of a mistake by a mail-order pharmacy.

Latah County Prosecutor Craig Mosman originally had considered calling for a coroner's inquest, but said a magistrate's inquiry was more flexible. The inquiry is an informal, fact-finding proceeding before a judge. The inquest would have required the

seating of a jury.

Calhoun normally handles cases at Nespera, the county seat of Lewis County.

Iris Hemmelman, 70, died Jan. 28 of a brain hemorrhage at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center at Lewiston. An autopsy showed her blood had a toxic level of Coumadin, a blood-thinning agent often prescribed for heart patients.

The Coumadin tablets were found in her prescription bottles labeled

"prednisone," an anti-inflammatory drug that had been prescribed to her.

Wayne Hemmelman, her husband, said they purchased their medication from National Prescription Services of Las Vegas, because it was the only way Blue Cross of Washington would pick up the tab. Washington state employees are covered by Blue Cross.

Officials at National Prescription Services have said their records indicate no mistakes were made, but later conceded they were possible.

### Panel agrees on state merit pay raises

BOISE (AP) — Legislative budget writers reached agreement on distribution of some \$800,000 for merit raises to state workers today, resolving the final issue standing between them and conclusion of a marathon budget-setting process.

After an hour of wrangling over the merit pay issue resulted in adoption of a compromise proposal giving all agencies half the amount in merit pay that they were left short in financing for basic pay increases.

Only the Corrections Department, which has had serious trouble retaining guards, and the Commerce Department and Tax Commission received amounts higher than that.

The action on the merit pay question left some \$160,000 earmarked for merit increases unspent. That savings will reduce the deficit lawmakers have to make up to balance their proposed 1989 spending plan. As much as \$8 million will have to be raised to avoid any red ink.

The final session of the committee today concluded 53 hours of meetings over 23 days to set the 1989 budget that totals about \$686 million. That is \$17 million below the governor's request.

It was the longest period ever taken by the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee to set a state budget, officials said.

### Officers move Dallas to New Mexico prison

BOISE (AP) — Corrections Director Al Murphy said Claude Dallas is being moved from the Nebraska State Prison to a facility in New Mexico today.

Murphy said Dallas was being moved because Nebraska officials were having problems with space in their prison.

Murphy would not say where in New Mexico Dallas was being moved for security reasons.

Dallas, an Idaho prison inmate who is serving two life terms in the shooting deaths of two Idaho Fish and Game officers, was moved to the Nebraska State Prison last fall.

That move came after a jury found him innocent of escaping from the Idaho State Prison on Easter Sunday 1986. Dallas was captured in California about a year after his escape.

ATLANTA (AP) — Herbert Crook sparked in a pair of decisive second-half scoring runs with 12 of his 22

points, carrying Louisville to a 70-61 victory over Oregon State in the opening round of the NCAA Southeast Regional Thursday night.

Crook scored eight points in an early 14-4 burst that created a nine-point lead. He came back with four more in a 10-0 run that made it 54-39 with 9:25 left in the game.

The Cardinals, 23-10, advanced to a second-round battle on Saturday against 19th-ranked Brigham Young, a 98-92 overtime winner over North Carolina-Charlotte earlier Thursday night.

Saturday's other second-round match will pair Auburn, a 90-86 winner over No. 11 Bradley, against fourth-ranked Oklahoma, which crushed Tennessee-Chattanooga, 94-66.

# Michigan holds off Boise State's closing rush to win 63-58

SALT LAKE CITY — The "gee whiz" factor maybe the only reason the Boise State Broncos are not in the quarterfinals of the NCAA western regional basketball tournament.

Michigan guard Gary Grant, a



"I think we had too much respect for them early," said BSU Coach Bobby Dye after his team fell 63-58 to 10th-ranked Michigan in a first-round game here Thursday. "That was my big fear going into the game — that we would be too much in awe."

The awestruck Broncos came back strongly in the second half with their adhesive defense but a 16-point deficit was too much to overcome. Boise State's season ended when designated gunner Brian King bounced a 25-foot three-point goal off the rim with two seconds left and Michigan rebounded.

"They played a very deliberate style that gave us trouble," said Wolverine Junior Center Loy Vaught, the only Michigan player to score more points in the second half than he did in the first.

"They played a two-three zone in the second half," explained Wolverine forward Terry Mills. "But it was high and really gave our guards a lot of trouble. We weren't able to post up."

It was a bizarre for the Wolverines, the Big Ten's leading offensive team. They shot 66 percent from the field — 73 percent in the first half — and came out with a season-low of 63 points.

"I thought we played an excel-

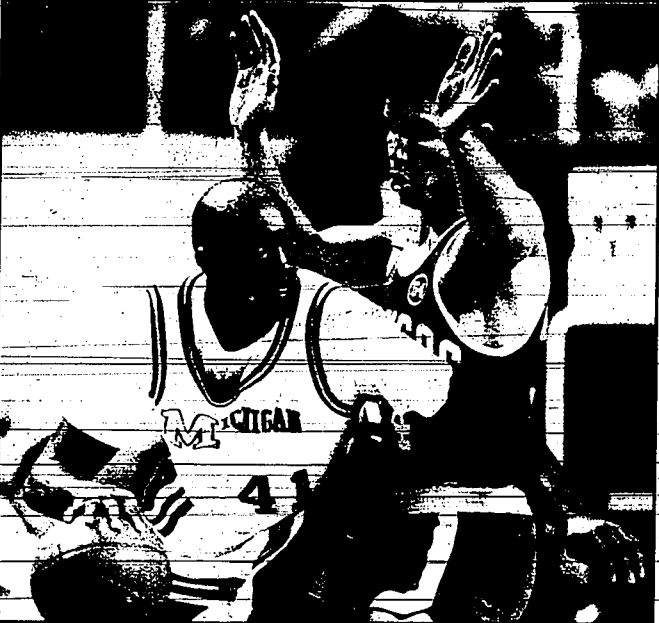
lent first half and I was very concerned at halftime because we had a 16-point lead and we'd played almost flawless ball," said Michigan Coach Bill Frieder. "You look at Boise State and their biggest loss this season was by six points at Wyoming."

"Neither of our guards played well for about a seven-minute stretch," said Frieder. "I'm not sure if it was fatigue or Boise's great play that made us so sluggish in the second half."

The Wolverines were anything but sluggish in the first, exploding to an 18-6 lead at the 10-minute mark and topping out at 18 points with a 10-0 left in the half.

"We didn't put enough pressure on them early," said Bronco senior guard Doug Usitalo. "We didn't cuff the passing lanes and it cost us. Once we got behind the eight-ball, we didn't stay together as we should have."

After falling behind by as many as 17 points, the Broncos began their comeback at the 5:55 mark when Mike Sanor hit two free throws and Arnell Jones converted a steal by Usitalo that cut the deficit to 24-17. Vaught missed the second of a two-shot free throw opportunity and the Broncos rebounded and were fouled. Usitalo hit two free throws to bring BSU within six points at 5:14.

The deficit stayed there until King, a sophomore Dye uses in just such situations, tanked a 22-footer with 16 seconds left to make it 61-58 Michigan.

A few seconds later, BSU's Greg Dodd fouled Mills who missed the front end of the bonus. The rebound was knocked over the baseline by Michigan's Rice with five seconds left.

Dye spent his last timeout. "We were looking to tie it. We

had the right guy taking the shot," Dye said.

King rang into double pressure from Robinson and Grant as he crossed the time line, took a few steps, hesitated and put his shot up. Michigan's Mike Griffin rebounded, was fouled and hit both free throws to put the game away.

"What happened on that play is exactly what we wanted to happen," said Frieder. "Under no circumstances were we going to foul

him because too many crazy things happen when you foul."

"He had to rush it a little," said Dye. "It just didn't go."

Bronco junior Wilson Foster put the final game of BSU's 24-6 season into perspective.

"I don't think we were intimidated or nervous," he said. "Whoever executes the best and rebounds the best is going to win the ball game whether they've been to 6 tournament before or not."

## Loyola sets point mark on Wyoming

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Bo Kimble scored 29 points Thursday as No. 16 Loyola, Calif., reced to its 25th consecutive victory by beating No. 13 Wyoming 119-116 in the highest-scoring NCAA Tournament game ever.

By winning the only first-round matchup of ranked teams, Loyola, 28-3, advances to Saturday's second round in the West Regional against second-seeded and seventh-ranked North Carolina, which beat North Texas State 83-65 earlier Thursday.

Loyola, which led the nation in scoring with 110.4 points a game, and Wyoming combined for 234 points, seventh more than the record of 227 set in 1970 when Iowa beat Notre Dame 121-106. Iowa's 121 points is the record for points by a team, a mark tied in 1977 by Nevada-Las Vegas.

## Sullivans can't save NFL holdings

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Commissioner Pete Rozelle said Thursday he saw no way the financially troubled Sullivan family could retain control of the New England Patriots, and added that he hopes the confused status of the team will be resolved within a month.

The Patriots' plight was discussed for about 20 minutes at the owners meeting ended with an agreement that a committee composed of Rozelle and three owners would continue to work with the Sullivans to resolve the problem.

The vote to do that was 26-2 with Cincinnati and the Los Angeles Raiders opposing. Tampa Bay owner Hugh Downs was added to a committee consisting of Rozelle and owners Norman Braman of Philadelphia and Ralph Wilson of Buffalo who were appointed in January to monitor the Patriots situation.

And while both team founder Billy Sullivan and his son, Chuck, whose family is about \$125 million in debt, said they were happy with the outcome, Rozelle said:

"We're going to make a sale, solve their credit problems and have an owner. Billy Sullivan may have some future interest in the team but I see no way we can avoid the sale of the controlling interest in the franchise to resolve the problem."

The owners also discussed at their final session the continuing problem of drafting undergraduates who become ineligible for college play by signing with an agent or for some other malfeasance.

Rozelle said league officials would meet with representatives of the NCAA, but conceded that without cooperation from agents, there could be no final resolution.

The New England situation was curious.

Both Billy and Chuck Sullivan emerged from the meeting talking about the support they had been given by the other owners.

"The message was one of friendship, support and affection to help us achieve reorganization," said Chuck Sullivan, owner of Sullivan Stadium, which has declared bankruptcy to avoid bid sale at auction.

And Billy Sullivan said: "I'm very happy about it."

Rozelle asked after Rozelle's statement that they would have to be left out of any sale, Billy Sullivan replied:

"If I had the answer to how this would come out, I'd be known as Solomon rather than Sullivan. I have neither his wisdom nor his wallet."

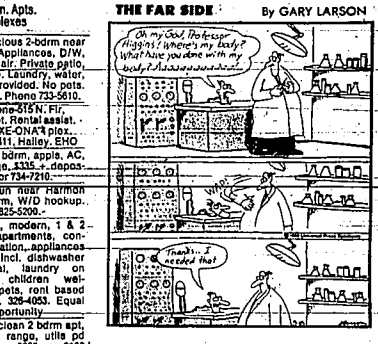

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE

"How many things, both just and unjust, are sanctioned by custom?" —Rerecne.

What's the best way to play today's club suit to avoid losing a trick? If you're quick with an answer, think again. You may be relying on custom rather than on accurate analysis.

South wins the first trick with his diamond king and quickly realizes that his only hope lies with bringing home the club suit. He has five top winners in the other suits and no chance at all of developing another winner. How best to attack the clubs?

If South—first-cashes dummy's king to guard against a singleton queen with West, the play is made from habit and guards against nothing. Had West held a singleton queen, East would still hold a club stopper and the game would not make.

In today's layout, the singleton queen does fall, but not from West. There is no safety play to pick up West's singleton queen but there is one against East. Instead of cashing dummy's club king first, South should cash his club ace. When East drops the singleton queen, South cashes his jack to confirm the position, and then in finesse to dummy's club nine brings in the suit.

## CDs offer best sound around

TWIN FALLS — If you haven't been inside a record store lately, be prepared.

You won't find many records anymore. What you will find are rows upon rows of compact discs — or "CDs" as they are called, not to be mistaken for the kind you buy at a bank.

According to the most recent issue of Compact Disc Magazine, CDs are now outselling records, and with more than 12,000 titles in circulation, they are gaining fast on audiocassettes.

Bruce Jesse, vice-president of advertising and promotion for MusicLand, says the chain's 616 stores are responding to customer demand for the superior sounding compact disc. If the recording industry has anything to say about it, the compact disc will someday make long-playing record albums obsolete.

"We're noticing more and more new releases shipping on CD before LP, never mind simultaneously," write the editors of The Green CD Catalog magazine in the introduction to their January/February 1988 edition.

New album releases on CD range from \$9.95 to \$17 per disc, more than the standard LP price. Of course, in order to be able to play a CD, you'll first have to purchase a special player for home or car. Local audio equipment merchants say you

can expect to spend anywhere from \$300 to \$3,000 for a unit which can be readily connected to an existing amplifier.

Why make the CD investment?

"Almost perfect sound," says Dan Schofield,

says Armstrong. "They say they can hear the difference and it sounds wonderful." Currently, Magic Valley radio stations have not converted to CD, but Armstrong says he thinks every radio station will eventually follow the major market.

zine reported 2.5 million compact disc players in American homes and cars at the end of 1987. But that number is expected to rise dramatically this year as American consumers — always hungry for high tech — gobble up compact disc players.

Jennifer Thompson, a sales representative at the Audio Warehouse, says CD players are becoming an increasingly popular item in her Twin Falls store. "Most of the people who come in don't know much about CD players. But when you let them hear it and tell them why it sounds so good and that they're going to last, they want it," she says.

CDs are a by-product of computer and video technology.

Ever since Thomas Edison and Emile Berliner introduced sound recordings at the turn of the century, records have been made by creating a physical "analogue" of the original sound waves which appear as wiggly grooves carved onto the surface of the record. The sound is then recovered by dragging a stylus through the groove.

In its June 1985 comparison of compact disc players, Consumer Reports Magazine reported that "the destructive force of the stylus against the groove and the attendant distortion in the sound has been reduced but never entirely eliminated in analog recordings."

But CD technology, introduced in the U.S.

You don't have to spend a fortune to bring CD's incredible sound into your home or car.

## Hollywood protests film altering ban

WASHINGTON — Film actors and directors took their campaign against coloring and altering movies to Washington Tuesday, seeking either legislation to protect their "moral rights" or similar protection through U.S. adherence to the 100-year-old Bern international copyright treaty.

Veteran actor Burt Lancaster, appearing at a National Press Club news conference with James Stewart and half a dozen other industry spokesmen, said:

"What this is all about is the fact that what an artist makes belongs to him, no matter who owns the product."

Stewart made an eloquent plea on behalf of Frank Capra, director of "It's a Wonderful Life."

"Frank is in bad health and just found out that 'It's a Wonderful Life' has come into the public domain," Stewart said. "To his horror, he also found that it was being colorized. It broke his heart." The white-haired actor said that

he saw the result and felt "the human side of the story was completely gone." Even worse, Stewart said, was that representatives of Cable News Network — whose owner Ted Turner had the film colored — told him that Joseph Walker, Capra's longtime cameraman, assisted in the transformation. But Stewart said Walker's daughter later categorically denied the story.

Elliot Silverstein, speaking for the Directors Guild of America, said other values than moral ones are at stake. He cited the estimate by the Motion Picture Association of America that piracy of U.S. films by nations not belonging to the Bernie treaty may cost the industry as much as \$1 billion annually. He implied that U.S. adherence would enable Washington to press other nations to join.

Director Peter Bogdanovich attacked primarily the coloring of black-and-white movies, but he also warned that other technical changes may further destroy the integrity of films.

## Arts poll: Interest rising, participation dropping off

**NEW YORK** - A national poll on Americans and the Arts Tuesday showed videorecorder recorder ownership up, leisure time continuing to drop and overall attendance at arts events down for the first time in 15 years.

But there was a bright side to the survey, the fifth conducted since 1973 by the cultural pollster Louis Harris. He said it found "public interest in the arts" "staggeringly higher than anyone ever dared imagine."

And, he said, the sharp rise in VCR ownership - now estimated at 55 percent of all households - portends a new arts market that could earn \$2 billion annually in sales and rentals of taped performances of musical comedies, plays, operas, ballets and recent pop and classical concerts.

Harris spoke at a Lincoln Center press conference, where his poll, funded by Phillip Morris Companies, was released. It was based on a March to April phone survey last year of 1,051 persons aged 18 and over.

The survey said that leisure time has shrunk at a "rapid rate" because of an increased number of families where both spouses work, which led to the rise to 62 percent of the number of women now in today's workplace from both desire and economic necessity.

Leisure time has dropped from 26.2 hours a week in 1973 to 16.2 hours last year, and "I suspect it's going to get worse before it gets better," Harris said.

His survey said the loss of leisure hours poses "a threat to all leisure-time enterprises."

# Success of UI's jazz festival proves not all music fans live in Chicago or L.A.

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP) — The University of Idaho's annual jazz festival has carved a distinctive place for Moscow in the American jazz scene, according to artists and promoters.

"Dizzy (Gillespie), Ray Brown, Gene Harris these are names that are recognized internationally," said George Butler, a vice president at Columbia Records in New York. "Festivals like this one are very positive for the industry."

The Lionel Hampton-Chevron Jazz Festival wound up its 21st year recently with performances from trumpeter Dizzy Gillespie and Hampton's own New York Big Band.

Performers, audiences and setting are what define the character of a festival, jazz artists agree. And increasingly, regional festivals in rural settings are drawing jazz celebrities and larger crowds.

"For one who loves the music, festivals like that are ideal," said Martin Williams, a jazz archivist for the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D.C.

Less pressure on musicians and smaller crowds make for more intimacy between performer and audience, Williams said. "It's far preferable to the larger sprawling jazz set-

tings typical of the business."

As the number of night clubs featuring jazz dwindles, he said, festivals like UI's are becoming a more common forum for performers.

"There seem to be more festivals every year," said a spokesman for the Newport Jazz Festival in New York. "Everyone wants to have one."

Musicians agree.

Saxophonist Buddy Tate has lived in New York since he joined Count Basie's band in 1939. He performed with the Tommy Flanagan Trio at this year's festival.

"This festival is one of the biggest I've seen, and I'm not just saying that," Tate said. "It's comparable to a festival in The Hague (in Holland), but even then, see, that doesn't have a school connected with it."

Many performers enjoy the ability to be involved with education in jazz that UI provides. That educational component which brought some 6,000 students to campus has given the festival prominence, and has led to funding from the National Endowment for the Arts.

"What caught their eye was the renaming of UI's school of music to the Lionel Hampton School of Jazz," said

Edward Birdwell, who helped coordinate National Endowment for the Arts involvement. "It seemed to be an odd thing to happen out in the middle of the Northwest."

Tate said Hampton's personal interest in UI's program has impressed other musicians.

"I've known him when he was rich and when he was poor, and this has been one of his greatest thrills," said Tate. "Names like his are going to help a cause. You get a Dizzy or a Hampton or a Brown on the bill and people know it's going to be good."

Hampton's legacy will be an enduring one, according to pianist Gene Harris, who played piano with the Ray Brown Trio all three nights of this year's festival.

"I really can't be with us forever," Harris said. "We must all go sometime. But I believe this festival will go on forever, either as the Lionel Hampton Jazz Festival or some other artist. I feel it will be the Lionel Hampton Jazz Festival."

Drummer Jeff Hamilton, 34, rose to fame with Woody Herman's Band, which he joined in 1975. He's currently playing with the Monty Alexander Trio in Los Angeles, and came to UI's jazz festival for the first time

this year.

Said Hamilton, who set in on drums for the Ray Brown Trio: "This festival is among the best. It's not a Montreux; it doesn't go on for the whole month of June say, but in talent and relaxed feel and wanting to play here, it's among the best."

The size of the audience and its response to the music set the tone of an artist's performance, musicians said.

Added Tate: "Audiences here are warmer and they're hip. It's a very intelligent audience. European audiences are like that. I love everything here."

Hamilton also is impressed by audiences on the Palouse.

"What I like is the great reception we're getting, not just on the bandstand, but from the people who drive us around and the people we're meeting," Hamilton said. "It's a more natural setting, and more relaxed."

Gene Harris said there's no reason to believe that true jazz enthusiasts only live in New York or Los Angeles.

"Believe me, human beings are the same everywhere," said Harris, who lives in Boise. "For anyone to try to make you think that people from one place or another have some sort of corner on enjoyment, on laughter, that's just wrong."

## Writer brings poetry to Salmon kids

SALMON, Idaho (AP) — This small rural town, named for the river that passes through it, may soon lay claim to another distinction apart from being the "white-water capital" of the world.

Salmon may soon become known as the city with the largest number of published poets per capita.

Nearly 1,000 Salmon students in grades 4 through 12 will experience the thrill of seeing their writing in print this spring when New York poet Shegyl Noethe returns here in May with a published anthology of their work.

"Seeing one's work published in a book is the most rewarding thing to a writer," she said.

Noethe began teaching poetry to Salmon students in November under the sponsorship of the Steele-Reese Foundation. A published poet, she is employed by the New York-based Teachers and Writers Collaborative, which places writers in classrooms for

the benefit of students and teachers alike.

Her three-month Salmon residency marks the first time the program has reached beyond New York. In the three years she's been with the collaborative, Ms. Noethe spent most of her time working in classrooms in the South Bronx and other New York "war zones."

"The kids here are very different than those I've taught back in New York," she said. "There isn't the sense of tragic-comedy you find there — drugs, beatings. The perspective is different."

"These kids are natural hot springs of nature writing."

Although she may have arrived at her occupation in a roundabout way, Ms. Noethe's previous experience as a mime and a teacher of deaf-mute and autistic children has proved invaluable in enabling her to reach out to students in innovative ways.

A native of Minneapolis, Minn., she

credits a fifth grade teacher who told her she was going to write like Hemingway someday with giving her the courage and conviction to become a writer. She says that experience convinced her that one person can make a difference in someone's life.

"I believe one person can turn a child's self-esteem and belief systems around and make them work for the child, because that's how it worked for me," she said.

Although her students may think they're just learning how to read and write poetry, Ms. Noethe has an ulterior motive in mind. She not only brings a new understanding and appreciation of poetry to the classrooms, but often subtly imparts a new sense of self-awareness, and self-worth through writing.

"Discovering writing is like discovering you have a third arm," she said. "It gives the students a new outlet, another way to cope and to express who they are."

You know the problem: One of your favorite movies from last year is being released on videocassette this week, so you head for the video store only to hear this from the clerk: "Sorry, I'm all out of that one."

Courage. Home video companies are trying to kill that problem — and one of their own — with one stone: the multi-pack.

With the January release of "Predator," CBS-Fox pioneered this promotional scheme, one that could cause consumer frustration and put

more money in the pockets of the video companies. Essentially, the plan offers retailers a discount for multiple purchases, from two to six copies each, of major movies.

With "Predator," the Arnold Schwarzenegger action movie, the company gave retailers a discount for buying in two-packs. Jim Fifield, president of industry kingpin CBS-Fox, said that the plan resulted in a 60 percent increase in sales.

"You force the small store owner to buy at least two copies," said Fifield, whose company is also offering the James Bond movie "The Living Daylights" in bargain multi-packs. "The

store that might only buy nine copies would buy ten. Those extra single copies add up."

Other companies, including HBO, RCA-Columbia and Vestron, have joined the multi-pack parade. Vestron's four-pack has a twist. Buy three copies of a hot title, "The Running Man" (another Schwarzenegger actioner, a May 11 release), and get one that is less desirable — an obscure Patrick Swayze movie called "Steel Dawn." But it remains to be seen whether even a discounted "Running Man" will enhance the appeal of "Steel Dawn" for retailers.

RCA-Columbia is promoting a four-

pack of "Someone to Watch Over Me," the thriller starring Tom Berenger that is due April 28. "With our plan, the fourth copy is returnable," said RCA-Columbia president Rob Blattner, who expects to boost the movie's sales by at least 25 percent. "We want to influence the retailer who would 'Someone' to buy four."

And what if a dealer does not want to buy a multi-pack? He may be out of luck getting certain films at the same time as competitors. With "Predator," single copies were not available until 10 days after the release of the double-packs.

# New video tapes range from sublime to banal

WINTER KILLS: Rated R; 1979; 97 minutes; Embassy Home Entertainment; \$29.95.

Richard Condon, who wrote the novel on which "The Manchurian Candidate" was based, also provided the source material here, and in adapting it, the writer-director William Richart has adopted just the right wiggled-out, black-comic tone.

He's helped tremendously in this by his first-rate cast — John Huston, Jeff Bridges, Dorothy Malone, Richard Boone, Sterling Hayden, Anthony Perkins, Eli Wallach — all of whom perform as if they'd wandered over, half-stewed, from the nearest bar. The plot revolves around Bridges' efforts to track down the conspirators responsible for the assassination of his older brother, the president.

But this intricate, conspiracy-theory story isn't what captures our attention; it's the ghoulish sense of camp paranoia that Richart shows in telling it. Huston, who let his actors romp and mug similarly in "Beat the Devil," is deliciously raunchy here as a Joe Kennedyesque patriarch. (He plays one scene with his robe open, in a pair of bright red bikini briefs.) And as his younger, less ambitious son, Bridges acts as if he were freshly hatched and hasn't yet adjusted to the light. The film, which was Richart's first — his second, "A Night in the Life of Jimmy Reardon," was just the first of a series of films that would call a complete success: as a director, he never seems fully in control. But the level of ambient weirdness is very high and very beguiling.

THE FRINGE DWELLERS; PG; 1986; 98 minutes; Sony Video; \$29.95.

There's something of Toni Morrison's "Beloved" in this unsettling look at the hardscrabble lives of Australia's contemporary aborigines. Set in a shantytown in Queensland, the intimate, almost documentary drama focuses on a tragic teenager, Tribby Comeney (Kristina Nehm), who wants a better life for herself and her delightful family. Her first objective is to move the happy-go-lucky Come-aways (played by an aboriginal cast) out of their shack and into a real house; her second is to make a career for herself in the Oz of Sydney. Tough and determined, Tribby is quite willing to do anything, anything at all, to

achieve her goals.

She succeeds in moving the Come-aways to a white neighborhood, but they are miserable away from their extended tribal family. Clearly, they'll never catch up with the Joneses — and not much care. Tribby is the Australian answer to Spike Lee's "trainsees whites." It's her ambitions — and ultimately her shocking actions — that prophesy the death of a culture. Bruce Beresford, director of such American films as "Tender Mercies," returns to his homeland to adapt this Nene Gae novel with his wife Rhoisin, who cowrote the spare, affecting screenplay. Though it's compassionate and at times humorous, the ending is definitely a shocker.

SAXOPHONE COLOSSUS: A PORTRAIT OF SONNY ROLLINS; Not rated; 1987; 101 minutes; Sony Video; \$29.95.

Robert Mugge has already done fine cinematic profiles of Al Green, Ruben Blades and Sun Ra, and though this is primarily a performance documentary, it brilliantly captures one of the great saxophonists in jazz — probably his most revered living improviser — during one of his most intensely creative periods. There are some interview segments with the modest musician, his wife and three prominent jazz critics who shed some light on Rollins' development and career, as well as a few historical clips, but the film focuses on two startling performances. The first is by Rollins' quintet in concert at a rock quarry concert site near his home in Uptate New York (which inspires a pile-driving, expansive and thrilling "G-Man," as well as one of Rollins' classic unaccompanied solo flights, during which he breaks his heel) and the world premiere of his Concerto for Saxophone and Orchestra in Japan, where Rollins is under the adulation he deserves. This section is more formal than one expects from Rollins, but it is a real gem of the romantic current that often courses below his fiery improvisations. His music is always revealing, so is this loving tribute.

MONSTER SQUAD; Rated PG-13; 1987; 82 minutes; Vestron Video; \$89.98.

This horror-comedy spoof about an unspecified town that breaks out in a rash of old movie monsters was written by Shane Black and Fred Dekker.

And I can just hear the story conference jokes now. Sample entry: "We got a script here from Black and Dekker. 'Oh, yeah? Well, when they're finished with rewrites have them come over and sand my floors.'"

Actually, this explains a great deal — this movie plays as if it were written with a power tool. The basic premise is that the forces of darkness — represented here by the Mummy, the Frankenstein monster, Dracula and the Creature from the Black Lagoon — are threatening to fitch an amulet that controls the balance of good and evil, and with it, cast the world forever in shadow. And standing between them and the eternal awfulness is a gang of profane little brats who call themselves the Monster

Squad. Mostly this unapologetically scrambled mixture of "Goonies," Hardy Boys — adventures, "Ghostbusters" and Abbott and Costello movies is a bunch of bad actors in bad makeup. Added to this are heavy types of kids: cute, intolerably noisy, smart-alecky kids and not-so-cute, noisy, smart-alecky kids. There are parents, too. The kind you only find in movies. The kind who look soulfully into the eyes of their progeny and say, "Do me a favor, willya? Put your basic lid on it." And that, ladies and gentlemen, is the funniest line in the film.

# Fine performances highlight 'Masquerade'

**HOLLYWOOD** — Occasionally, one performance marks a film forever. "Masquerade" is a sleek romantic thriller, with its every detail of life among the very, very rich — and sometimes famous — ringingly-right.

This is evil under the most felicitous pen in imaginable corruption acted out in the perfection of a Southampton oceanfront cottage, whose spare, elegant rooms speak of uninterrupted decades of money.

A densely plotted affair about the yearning for money and the yearning for love, the film keeps a nice ironic eye on its privileged, amoral young and not-so-young. But director Bob Swaim ("La Balance") has saved his strongest ammunition for the leading role, a gentle, crippled rich young heirless who, under the spell of love, seems to unfold right before our eyes.

Meg Tilly is Olivia Lawrence and she does not take a false breath. The silent unwinding of her character from a cocoon of shyness takes you back a good long ways, to Joan Fon-

taine's performance in "Suspicion," and in these less innocent times, Tilly's role is more complex and her work more finely drawn.

The recent death of her mother has left Olivia one of the East Coast's richest young women. It has also left her Tony Gateworth (the burning-eyed John Glover), her mother's fifth husband, a sort of seamy residue from the bottom of the marital barrel. Lean, alcoholic, preternaturally nasty, Gateworth will not quit the family estate, brings his own cool girlfriends around (Dana Delany, acidly good) to litter up the place, and has only filthy invective when the quiet Olivia begins to see a Hampton newcomer, Tim Whelan (Rob Lowe).

Whelan and young policeman Mike McGill (Doug Savant) are the film's two unimpeached young. The equivalent of a seagoing ski bum, Whelan captivates the racing sailboat obsession for its rich, older owner, while bedding the owner's petulant young wife (Kim Cattrall). McGill, nursing a crush on Olivia since grade school, has given up talk of law school for a berth on the local police force.

And almost nothing is what it seems. This is '80s film noir, but noir

played by the very young, in the vivid colors and clean lines of a Bruce Weber photograph. The darkness is all below the surface. (The cameraman is the brilliant David Watkin, who's done everything from "Yentl" to "Chariots of Fire," and from "Out of Africa" to "Moonstruck." His lenses make these pure seaside settings into a watercolorist's dream. And the effortlessly fine production design is by John Kasarda.)

Dick Wolf's screenplay could have slipped over into melodrama in a second. But Swaim, American born and French trained, is too elegant a director for that and far too controlled. He goes for neat razor cuts, not bloody chunks of melodrama. And so, like Polanski's "Frantic," the picture is full of small, impeccably realized rules — by Glover, Delany, Cattrall, Maive McGuire as Olivia's beautiful aunt — that together create an undercurrent of malaise beneath a glossy surface (The film's R-rating is for its nudity and sexual situations and brief violence).

A lot also hangs on the growing love between the heirless and the seagoing stud. Whelan does not know the

meaning of the word "guilt"; he has simply been in the catbird seat his life long because of his looks and his suppleness with women. Now, possibly, he begins to feel the stirrings of decency and of real emotion. Because of the nature of the role, because we are not meant to know what Whelan is thinking or feeling at any moment, Lowe's casting works. And his pink-checked, super-handsomeness seems to fit right in with the Eastern preppies and wired jaws. It is not a great performance, but it is a start.

Besides, Swaim wisely keeps our attention on Tilly, and between them, actress and director build a whole world of wealth and privilege and emotional starvation. They understand that old money like this is not extended pinkies or "Dynasty" — it is Olivia Lawrence's dowry clothes, her foghorn-voiced, her slightly-dirty walk — and her sure-footedness on her sailing boat, her assurance among the old family lawyers. There are funny bits of observation too: the

stiff-elbowed handshake of Gateworth's condescending girlfriend, like the password of a secret society.

The way that Ivan Passer, Czech born, saw the Santa Barbara, Calif.,

seats of power in "Cutter's Way" is the way that Swaim — American, yet recently removed from American life — sees the Eastern Establishment, Chilling, very chilling.

## Rich comedy recalls the war

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. The ratings are by the Motion Picture Academy and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**HOPE AND GLORY (PG-13)**. In his brilliantly evocative and warmly comic semi-autobiographical reminiscence of a boy's life during the Blitz, John Boorman gives us a world of bomb shelters, gas masks and random death — a nightmarish landscape that also somehow becomes the greatest playground imaginable, liberation in its most glorious and frightening form. Following the "World War II London experiences of Grace Rohan (Sarah Miles) and her children, the film catches every contradictory nuance of an embattled civilian population: the fear, the breakdown, the heightened awareness, the rollicking sensuality.

**THE LAST EMPEROR (PG-13)**. The producers of this cool lavish epic have given free rein to the cinema's most voluptuous troika of imagists: director Bernardo Bertolucci, production designer Ferdinando Scarfotti

and cinematographer Vittorio Storaro. Thus the story of China's last emperor and his struggles in a modernizing world becomes cool and distant, yet an absolutely unparalleled feast for the eye.

**MOONSTRUCK (PG)**. This is an incredibly nourishing comedy, filled as it is like rigatoni with warmth, cheer and terrific snappy dialogue. As a young widow whose life suddenly shifts 180 degrees under the spell of an extraordinary full moon from plain to juicy, Cher finally has a role that lets her comic sensibilities out for a romp. Cege attacks the role of Ronny — the guy Cher really falls for — with a nice balance between unbridled romanticism and tongue-in-cheek seriousness; he is marvelous. Everyone is, yet Olympia Dukakis, as Cher's wise mama, seems to have an extra shen of maturity and wisdom that moves her work from authoritative into memorable.

**MOVING (R)**. Not only does this state sitcom of a picture miss the rich comic possibilities in the ordeal of a long-distance move, it also straggles like a milquetoast

role as a suburban husband and father.

**SHE'S HAVING A BABY (PG-13)**. John Hughes seems to be crafting a comic movie valentine to approaching fatherhood — with Kevin Bacon and Elizabeth McGovern as a young Midwestern couple beleaguered by suburbia and pregnancy. But is he? There is a nightmarish edge to this movie; it often gets cold-cute, ghostly cute, with surreal dream sequences and shock cuts pilfered from Hitchcock. Hughes mostly does not show the scenes where his couple are tender or loving with each other, and the film has an unpleasant, queasy feel. It is the least funny of his comedies, too focused on Jake's panic and alienation. But this unpleasantness may be exactly what audiences buy, what strikes them as contemporary; if so, there is plenty of it here.

# Remake draws parallels between 'monkey trial' and current events

By PAUL ELIE

Three-time presidential candidate William Jennings Bryan was one of turn-of-the-century America's most prominent political figures. Shortly before his death in 1925, the Scopes "monkey trial" made him one of the country's most controversial religious figures as well.

And with "Inherit the Wind," the 1955 play (and 1960 movie) based on the trial, lawyer Matthew Harrison Brady — and with him Bryan, on whom Brady was based — came to symbolize a classic character type: the fervent fundamentalist.

Now, Kirk Douglas plays Brady in a new version of "Inherit the Wind," airing Sunday, March 20, on NBC.

"The Bryan character has changed," Douglas says. "I've made him more of a cross between Pat Robertson and what's-his-name, Jimmy Swaggart."

The trial, held in Tennessee, brought high-school teacher J. J. Scopes to court for teaching that human ancestors were apes. Bryan represented biblical literalism and criminal-lawyer Clarence Darrow defended Darwin's theory of evolution. Caustic journalist H. L. Mencken gained national recognition with his coverage of the trial. Scopes was convicted, fined \$100 and forgotten. Both fundamentalism and the theory of evolution lived on.

The new version, conceived by Douglas and produced by his son, Peter, emphasizes the friendship between Brady and the Darrow figure, Henry Drummond (played by Jason Roberts). And it draws parallels between the Scopes case and current events.

"It's more relevant now than when it first opened," says Douglas. "We have Robertson, now we have President Reagan trying to bring prayer back into the schools. And this issue of creationism, of human origins, is more divisive than it was then."

Given the sensationalistic coverage of TV evangelism during the last year, one would expect to remake to vilify the fundamentalist. But Douglas says

that his Brady is more appealing and convincing than the ones created by Ed Begley (on stage) and Fredric March (in the 1960 movie).

"I was intrigued by the complexities of the Bryan character," he says, "and I've tried to create an impression that goes down to the very depths of my being. People have to believe him, and believe that I believe him."

Douglas, 71, is feeling changes himself. "I've had something of a turn in my religious views," he says. "I never addressed myself to religion. But as you mature, the more you experience of life, you begin to accept that there's a pattern. Every morning you go out to get the paper, and every morning the sun comes up. That's not accidental."

Ironically, "Inherit the Wind" is now frequently read by junior high school English students. Teachers doubtless have advised students to watch and, one hopes, to make up their own minds. But Douglas says the movie isn't meant to be educational.

His congressional appearance — which thrilled the actor — was in his capacity as a banking investor. One congressman couldn't resist this comment: "Dr. Rogers, you've been in Korea too long."

**Q: Isn't the story of Gary Hart's marital infidelity being prepared**

**for major motion picture treatment? — B.S.**

**A:** All I can tell you, based on reports from Hollywood insiders, is that a movie about a U.S. senator whose extramarital monkey business destroys his presidential campaign is in the works. Actor Barry Bostwick, who told me about the project, will play the senator. But, there is an interesting additional point: The politician's wife also gets to fool around a bit on the side. The film's not based on anyone specific, Bostwick tells me with a straight face, but on a novel by Joan Didion. Why, of course.

**— ROYAL BABY:** There was much talk that the duchess of York might be expecting more than one child. She had been taking the fertility drug Clomid, which is known to produce multiple births. But a sonar exam revealed that Fergie was carrying one child.

**Q: I was shocked at the sudden death of that beautiful little child actress, Heather O'Rourke. Had she finished another film before she died? — L.G.**

**A:** Yes, Heather's last movie is MGM's "Poltergeist III," which she completed late last year. Metro-toppers toyed with the idea of releasing it earlier than planned, but decided it would be in very poor taste. It will be released as originally scheduled, in June.

There are moments when "General Hospital" can be fun, when the light touch offers brief relief from all the schemes, double dealings and emotional outbursts.

A cue to "General Hospital's" gentle foolishness is Aunt Charlene, a scalawag supposedly monitoring her niece, the conniving Lucy Coe. These two are full of playful larceny, plus a shot of gaiety in a pinch.

Aunt Charlene was written by Ann Marcus for Marie Cheatham, who spent eight years playing Marie Horton on "Days of Our Lives" and a decade on "Search for Tomorrow" as Stephanie the voluptuous bitch.

"Aunt Charlene happens to be a composite of all the women in my life," says Marie. "She's my mother who went through seven marriages, my aunt down in Texas, me and a few others."

Playing her past, her family on the afternoon soap has Marie on cloud nine, because Charlene is in her bones. Besides, the job came in the nick of time. Marie was on the last day of her unemployment money, down to living off squash from her garden.

Wes Kenney called from "General Hospital" with a job offer. "But I'm carrying a few more pounds," said Marie, reminding Wes of their years together on "Days."

"Bring your pounds along," said Wes.

Kenney meant "bring your gaiety along." He had a new team in mind—Lynn Herring (Lucy) and Marie.

"I love Lynn Herring," adds Marie. "She looks and listens to you. So many of these kids just mouth words and never look you in the eye. There's no contact. Not with Lynn. Sometimes I think we're cut from the same cloth."

Marie grew up in Texas. She lived with relatives after her father, William Pershing Hatcher, died outside of Rome as General Brady's World War II armies moved in from the Mediterranean.

"Daddy got tired of watching the

boys he trained go off and get killed, so he went," Marie explains.

When her mother remarried, Marie moved in with relatives. She picked cotton, made quilts, and tried various churches, always sampling the lunch fare.

Along the way, at Baylor University, Marie got the acting bug and went to Los Angeles for TV work before her New York stint. Cheatham loved New York, lived it up, and moonlighted in the theater.

Still, her roots are in the soil. "I like to dig," she admits. "I'm at peace in my garden raising flowers and vegetables."

Part city lady, part farmer, Marie Cheatham can survive most anywhere. She credits her Indian ancestry. "It's called 'You don't give up.'"

# Restrictions heavy, but TV portrait of Soviet Union not compromised

NEW YORK (AP) — Filming a documentary inside the Soviet Union cannot occur without omnipresent government officials, state-selected interviewees and limited access to certain areas.

Despite the restrictions, executive producer Ira Miskin said he didn't believe his seven-hour documentary, "Portrait of the Soviet Union," was compromised.

Many of the Soviets who appear in the film to be shown in installments on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday on Ted Turner's SuperStation TBS, are members of the Communist Party, hand-picked by the government to appear in the film. Officials from Gos-telradio, the state broadcasting committee, accompanied his crews on nearly every shoot.

"At the end, we had to rely on our own judgment," said Miskin. "And you also see the pictures. You can say anything you want over pictures, but the pictures — what's going on the frame — don't lie."

Nevertheless, the result is a flattering depiction of life in the Soviet Union — an official portrait, beautifully photographed, showing only the occasional wart.

The series does mention the Soviet Union's problems, but only those that have been raised in the state-controlled media: bureaucratic sluggishness, shoddy workmanship, complaints about consumer goods and housing.

Larger problems are inexplicably absent, given the briefest of mentions, or left for viewers to discern for themselves. These include the struggles over Jewish emigration and human rights, the explosive nature of the nation's more than 100 nationalities, the issue of who really wields Kremlin power, and the massive military budget and the war in Afghanistan.

"I think the films do look to some degree pro-Soviet," Miskin said in an interview. "I think that our intention was for certain aspects of it to look

pro-Soviet. Not pro-Soviet government, but pro-Soviet people."

The first episode, which is about the ethnic Russians, is fairly typical. There is poet Yevgeny Yevtushenko, the one-time rebel who is now part of the establishment, reading a few lines from his epic work about the Holocaust, "Babi Yar." That's the only reference to anti-Semitism in the Soviet Union in the entire seven hours.

Miskin, who is of Russian extraction and Jewish, said he could not "in good conscience" overlook the problems of Soviet Jewry, but he added that "it's a much more complicated

story than can be done in this kind of survey piece. It's a story that deserves its own hour.

"So to the extent that we ignored Jewish emigration, we could not ignore the fact that anti-Semitism existed and exists in the Soviet Union. It is a fact of life. You gotta mention it. We did," he said.

What gets more than a mention is music and dancing.

There's dancing by Leningrad ballerinas and Russians dressed as Cossacks by the Georgian state dance troupe and bemedaled Red Army veterans.

So much foot-stomping and high-kicking is in the series that some viewers may get the impression the biggest name in the Soviet Union isn't

Lenin or Stalin, but Danskin.

Miskin, who also did the upbeat "Portrait of America" series for TBS, said he wanted to draw in the general audience with the music and dance, then give viewers an understanding of the Soviet lifestyle, politics and economy.

Such an overemphasis on dance weakened the segment that profiled the peoples of Georgia and Armenia, Miskin said.

One troubling part comes in the episode on central Asia, in which an official involved in the restoration of mosques is allowed to deliver the statement: "Times change. Islam is not so popular now."

The documentary allows the statement to go unchallenged, even though there are 45 million Moslems in the Soviet Union — 16 percent of the population — and many practice their faith regularly despite Kremlin oppression.

Miskin replied that "our perception was ... the general consensus seems to be that Islam is a mile wide and an inch deep, rather than a mile deep and an inch wide. ... So, we couldn't find a way to challenge it, essentially."

The strongest of the segments by far is the sixth hour, a moving piece on how World War II affected the Soviet Union. Miskin does a good job of blending historic war footage and poignant interviews with elderly widows and veterans.

Other episodes look at life in Siberia and the Baltic republics. The final hour summarizes the series and features a lot of footage from the Goodwill Games, the international sports competition that Turner conceived with the Soviets.

Elsewhere in television:

**CABLE ESTIMATES** — Nielsen says its surveys show cable continuing to grow rapidly across the country, up to 51.1 percent penetration in February 1988, compared to 50.5 percent last November — which was the first time cable penetration was found in over half of U.S. television homes.

# NBC keeps #1 spot despite pre-emptions

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Last week's Nielsen network ratings were skewed by heavy pre-emptions for Billy Graham's fund-raising and college basketball, but NBC wasn't pre-empted from the No. 1 position.

With only five weeks left in the television season, ABC is more solidly entrenched in second place, thanks to high ratings for the three weeks it carried the Winter Olympics.

NBC won the week ending March 13 with an average, prime-time rating of 16.9. CBS was second with 12.7 and ABC third with 11.8. The season-to-date averages are NBC 16.3, ABC 14.0 and CBS 13.6.

To make up the 0.4 rating point it lags behind ABC, CBS would have to

beat ABC by 2.0 rating points each of the remaining five weeks of the season, an unlikely prospect.

NBC had the top five shows last week: "The Cosby Show," a repeat, followed by "Cheers," "A Different World," "Night Court" and "Golden Girls." The rest of the top 10 shows were: "Murder, She Wrote," CBS; "The People's Choice Awards," CBS; "60 Minutes," CBS; "Growing Pains," ABC, in its new Wednesday time period, and "Aaron's Way," NBC.

"Aaron's Way," a new series starring Merlin Olsen as the patron of an Amish family trying to cope in Califor-

nia, made its debut at No. 10, the best showing of a slew of new series getting spring tryouts.

"Growing Pains" was strong enough to pull "Head of the Class" into 11th place.

Katharine Hepburn proved she is still a ratings draw. Her NBC movie "Laura Lansing Slept Here" was 12th.

The premiere movie of ABC's new series "Probe" did well, landing in 28th place, but its regular time period on Thursday didn't make a dent in the ratings and was ranked 60th out of 68.

CBS did make some headway against NBC's Thursday lineup with the debut of "48 Hours" in its new time period. The heavily promoted documentary on runaways ranked 34th with a rating of 22.9 and a 20 share.

The rating is the percentage of the nation's 88.6 million households with televisions. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

Though the week was not considered typical because of the large number of local stations that pre-empted network programming for basketball and Billy Graham, it appeared that NBC had helped its Friday lineup with the addition of "Highwayman" and "Sonny Spoon" before and after "Miami Vice," which was boosted to 29th place, only five spaces behind CBS' "Dallas."

Viewers weren't exactly thrilled by the networks' Super Tuesday coverage. CBS' two-hour special that started at 8 p.m. EST was the lowest-rated of the three, with a rating of 5.7 and a 9 share. NBC's one hour wrap-up at 10 p.m. did best with a rating of 8.5 and a 16 share. ABC ran two hours from 9-11 p.m. and rated a 7.2 and 12 share.

The lowest-rated shows of the week were: "Buck James," "Probe," "Ohara," "West 57th," "Hotel," "Barry Manilow, Swing Street," ABC's Super Tuesday coverage, "The Thorns," CBS' Super Tuesday coverage and "The Redeye Express."

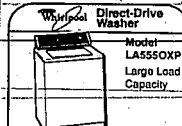
