They're a-movin' on...

Job hunters leading way out of Idaho

TWIN FALLS — If Richard Pryor and his hapless silver screen family are moving to Idaho, they should have a clear path, because the majority of traffic is going the other direction — out of Idaho.

Idaho is the fourth most "outgoing" state in the country, according to a survey of 165,000 interstate moves conducted by Allied Van Lines.

In Idaho last year, 61.9 percent of the people relocating were going out instead of coming in. That's up from 1986, when 59.7 percent of the movers were leaving. Idaho was only the seventh least popular of the states then.

And local movement has all the appearance of an ant hill with a hose turned on it. Moving companies and truck-renters in Twin Falls can hardly keep enough wheels on the road to get all those border crossers over the line.

"We send 10 out for every three coming in," said Elmo Muir, manager of Allied in Twin Falls that serves the entire Magic Valley. "The ratio in March has been even higher — two vans in and 12 out."

"Things have changed here," said Frank Zambic, the U-Haul manager in Twin Falls. "Six years ago, we used to have to beg people to take trucks out of here, offering special deals."

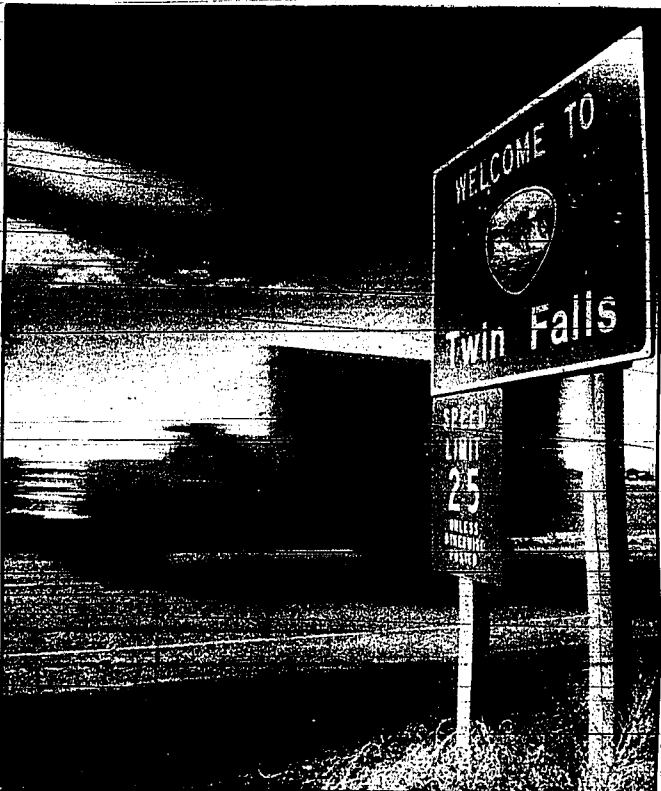
"But we've had more people moving out in the last six months than in all the seven years I've been here," he added.

Zambic's competition was in full agreement. Stasia Barry, manager of Ryder Truck Rental in Twin Falls said, "This is our biggest year since we started 14 years ago."

The Idaho exodus seems to be led in part by Twin Falls and other Magic Valley communities.

"There isn't any energy down there, as far as I'm concerned," said Phil Schnee, manager of U-Haul in Idaho. "We look at Nampa, Twin Falls, and Poocatello as depressed areas."

In the past year, there have been three one-way trucks out of the Twin

Falls U-Haul every week, and only one coming in, Zambic said. In the last month, the ratio has risen to four to one.

Ryder has averaged 16 families moving out each month, and 11 moving in.

All of Idaho's neighboring states are in better shape except Wyoming which, like Idaho, shows a deficit of movers in the Allied survey.

Montana and Utah are both main-

taining about an even flow of inbound and outbound traffic. Utah was an outbound state in 1986, but it moved into the ranks of the balanced states in 1987.

Washington, Oregon and Nevada are all "magnet states," according to Allied. They gained population, partly with the help of Idahoans.

The local moving experts all said that's where the majority of their customers are headed.

The destination for 21 percent of U-Haul customers statewide was Washington, and 10 percent moved to Oregon.

"In the state of Washington, primarily in Seattle, the equipment traffic is so heavy they can't park it, and Portland is getting about the same way," said Schnee. "People are going to the West Coast to get jobs."

Senate sets veto override vote today

BOISE — The Republican legislative majority pressed ahead Thursday with its modest \$366 million public school budget, undaunted by Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus' dramatic rejection of an identical plan a day earlier.

"I heard one message loud and clear from my constituents and that is, hold the line. We don't want more taxes," GOP Senate President Pro Tem James Risch of Boise said.

The Democratic minority, one stronger than the number needed to sustain the veto, was certain to uphold the governor's rejection of the appropriation Andrus said would drive the state back from its goal of a quality education system.

But the veto override vote was put off until today in a scheduling dispute between Democratic and Republican leaders.

The governor took another shot at the majority late Thursday morning when he agreed to let a \$300,000 increase in the \$2.3-billion annual budget for the Legislature become law without his signature. That bill had solid Democratic support in both houses.



"They can find money to take care of themselves, but they can't find the dollars necessary to educate your children, and that's wrong," Andrus said. Recognizing that the governor's veto will stand, the Republican-dominated Senate Finance Committee quickly snatched together a new \$366 million public school aid bill and introduced it about mid-morning. It particularly deflected a Democratic bid to increase the amount.

Leaders said the same action would be taken with their \$106.9 million higher education budget, which Andrus also said would be vetoed as woefully inadequate once it reaches his desk.

"The decision was made despite a flood of telephone calls to the Capitol from Idahoans responding to the governor's statement televised plea to lobby lawmakers to support his requests."

Andrus signs into law final AIDS legislation

BOISE — Gov. Cecil Andrus has signed into law the final pieces of a legislative package aimed at reducing the spread of deadly acquired-immune-deficiency syndrome in Idaho.

Without comment, the governor on Thursday approved the last two bills in the seven-bill package sponsored by Republican Rep. Russell Newcomb, a Twin Falls surgeon.

The bills require marriage license applicants to read a pamphlet on AIDS and impose a maximum 15-year prison term for intentionally infecting another per-

son with the disease. The other bills require organ and blood donors and the organs and blood they donate to be tested for the AIDS virus, set guidelines for personnel handling crime and accident victims, educational, medical and counseling programs for state prison inmates and guards, and mandatory testing of county jail inmates accused of certain sexual crimes.

Andrus and legislative supporters have called the package a reasonable approach to developing a public policy on a disease they believe is a major threat to public health.

Congress, White House welcome cease-fire in Nicaragua

WASHINGTON — Congress and the Reagan administration warmly welcomed a Nicaraguan cease-fire agreement Thursday, and some officials said it could usher in a new era of bipartisan U.S. policymaking on Central America.

"We consider this agreement to be an important step forward," said Secretary of State George Shultz, who added that the truce leaves "no excuse" for continued Soviet-like weapons shipments to the leftist Managua government.

House Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas, said the Nicaraguan agreement marks "a new chapter in the unhappy history of that war-torn country" and vowed to move ahead before Easter on

Symms renews call for presidential pardon for North

WASHINGTON — Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, speaking Thursday to demonstrators at the arraignment of Lt. Col. Oliver North, repeated his call for a presidential pardon for the former national security aide linked to the Iran-contra scandal.

"We cannot turn our backs on this fine American who willingly put his life on the line fighting the cancerous growth of communism on the North American continent," Symms told about 10 or 15

people who were protesting the arraignment in front of the U.S. Court House here.

Inside, North and former National Security Adviser John Poindexter were formally charged with crimes relating to the sale of weapons to Iran, and the subsequent diversion of profits to the Nicaragua contra rebels.

Meanwhile, Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, the only member of the Idaho delegation to oppose military aid to the contras, praised the 60-day cease-fire negotiated by the contras and the Sandinista government.

The administration might ask Congress to include in any humanitarian aid package a provision guaranteeing a speedy vote on a military aid re-

"This is exactly what opponents of additional military aid had hoped would occur," the Republican Democrat said in a statement. "I am optimistic that this agreement represents the first step to a lasting and permanent peace in the region."

Stallings said he hopes the Reagan administration will back the cease-fire. "We simply cannot blow this opportunity," he said. "It offers the best chance of peace in the region."

Symms had asked Reagan in a recent letter to pardon North and Poindexter, saying he believes "it would be a tragic mistake to allow these individuals to undergo prosecution."

Such a provision, he said, would help "to have a little strength visible in the picture even though it isn't

there." But Wright, appearing on the same program, suggested he would oppose such a provision.

He said the package should include food, clothing and medical assistance for the Contras. Asked whether the legislation should ensure an early vote on military aid if President Reagan asks for it, Wright said, "I want to emphasize positive things, and not anticipate failure."

Sen. Christopher Dodd, D-Conn., a leading Contra opponent, said, "This is a bad day for the cynics. A piece of paper has been signed by people who many thought would never be able to sit down face to face."

Guns silent in Nicaragua on first day agreement in effect

MANAGUA, Nicaragua — The guns were silent Thursday, the first day of an agreement between the government and Contra rebels that Nicaraguans pray will bring peace for the first time since 1981.

One man called it a miracle. During three days of negotiations that resulted in agreement Wednesday night, both sides had said it was the last chance for peace

in Nicaragua. The formal, 60-day cease-fire is to begin April 1, but they agreed to extend a truce declared for the talks.

Virgilio Godoy, president of the opposition Independent Liberal Party, said Thursday: "I believe that the agreement is a hope. ... It is not a question of saying now who won and who lost in the agreement, but that Nicaragua and thousands of mothers who have sons in the war won."

In a broadcast Thursday, the rebel Radio

Liberacion said, "The (Nicaraguan) Resistance has taken an initial step to end the hostilities in Nicaragua, a very significant step."

During the negotiations at Sapoa, on the Costa Rican border 90 miles south of Managua, president Daniel Ortega made a surprise visit and said it was time "to bury once and for all the military confrontation."

Leaders of the Sandinistas and the U.S.-sponsored Contras, stood side-by-side on a makeshift dais Wednesday night in Sapoa,

sung the national anthem together and signed the cease-fire.

During the three days, both sides retreated from hard positions, especially the Sandinistas, who stand to gain the most from an agreement that would virtually end the insurgency.

The Contras agreed not to accept military aid and to receive non-lethal supplies exclusively from neutral organizations. The Reagan administration, which has financed the rebels since they began fighting in late 1981, has

been seeking congressional approval of more funds.

Provisions of the agreement meet requirements of the regional peace plan signed Aug. 7 by all five Central American presidents — ending the fighting, granting political amnesty and restoring democratic freedoms.

Although the cease-fire does not begin officially until April 1, both sides said they would continue the battlefield truce they declared on Monday, the first day of negotiations.

 percent went to one of only eight states: Washington, Oregon, Nevada, Montana, Utah, Arizona, Colorado, and California.

Barry and Muir said the same of their customers.

However, Zambic, at the local U-Haul drew a different picture. The moves used to be directed — if there were jobs in Washington, people went to Washington. But now the pattern has a shotgun look to it, he said. It could be Oregon. It could be Massachusetts.

"Mostly they are looking for work," Barry said. "The Tupperware people, they can find work here, but it doesn't pay anything. They're off looking for more money."

Muir said Allied moved four Tupperware families to North Carolina and Tennessee in the last month. Some of his other customers this year, he said, were from Scott-Polar Refrigeration.

"When school is out there will be a lot more going," Barry said. She has

quite a few truck reservations for early June.

The inbound bunch come in basically two categories, the local experts said.

There are some young people that have jobs before they come, mostly corporate, Zambic said.

The majority, though, are retired people who left the area to go work in California or Utah, and now are back to stay, said Muir.

Things could be worse. At least they are in three other states. The latest survey ranked North Dakota the number one outgoing state for the fourth straight year with 68.2 percent of its relocators headed for the exit signs.

There were a total of 16 outbound states. After North Dakota came Iowa, Oklahoma, Idaho, South Dakota, Wyoming, Louisiana, Nebraska, West Virginia, New Jersey, Indiana, New York, Texas, Illinois, Wisconsin, and Ohio.

Texas was a new addition to outbound list.

Hawaii ranked as the top "magnet state" in the country for the second year in a row. Relocation activity in the Aloha state was 67.5 percent inbound.

There were 16 "magnet" states — ones that had more inbound than outbound traffic. Hawaii was followed by the District of Columbia then Rhode Island, Georgia, Nevada, Arizona, Maine, North Carolina, Vermont, Florida, Tennessee, Washington, Delaware, Oregon, South Carolina, and Alaska.

Maine and Delaware saw the most marked gains in comparison with 1986, and Alaska saw the greatest decrease with a 12.3 decline in inbound activity, the survey reported.

California lost its magnet state status in 1987, joining 19 other states with a relative balance between inbound and outbound relocations.

The ten states with the highest interstate moving volume both inbound and outbound were California, Florida, Texas, New York, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Ohio, New Jersey, Georgia,

Contractor licensing law wins endorsement

BOISE (AP) — A bill that could become Idaho's first statewide contractor licensing law in more than 20 years has been voted out of a Senate committee with do-pass endorsement. But it didn't come easy. After a 90-minute hearing before the Senate Commerce and Labor Committee, the committee voted 7-3 Thursday evening in favor of a contractor licensing law that already cleared the House.

"The real winners under a licensing law are the consumers," said Helen Kreizenbeck, Idaho Consumer Affairs Commissioner. Chairman Sen. Ann Raych, R-Idaho Falls, opposed the bill. Also voting against the measure were Sen. Mark Ricks, R-Rexburg, and Sen. Bert Marley, D-McCammon.

Marley did not make a statement. Ricks said it was a hard decision. "We ought to let the free enterprise system work," said Ricks.

Sen. Dennis Hansen, R-Soda Springs, also expressed fear that the measure would hurt part-time contractors in small communities, but voted for the bill.

It will be up for a final vote in the Senate within a few days. Idaho had a statewide contractor licensing law in the 1960s, but shortly after it was passed, it was blocked by a lawsuit and the Legislature repealed the measure in the next session.

 ommendations for \$362 million for public schools and \$110 million for the four state colleges.

Hundreds of calls poured into the Legislative Data Center and the governor's office, officials said. The vast majority supported Andrus.

"The legislators are hearing from the people," the governor said. "Unlike the leadership, they will listen... The response from the Republican leadership is, 'We don't care what you think, we're going to shove it down your throat.'"

But Risch discounted the telephone support the governor was receiving, attributing much of it to the Idaho Education Association. He pointed out that teachers represented by the asso-

ciation receive up to 85 percent of the state public school aid in salaries and benefits.

"We fully expect there will be more calls for more money in that the IEA has a substantially better telephone network than the taxpayers," Risch said.

To be the lobbying effort a chance for success, Democratic leaders said they would not comply with majority requests to expedite the next session of the rejected education budgets. That brought into question Republican hopes of adjourning the 74-day session this weekend.

The other roadblock to adjournment is balancing the \$686 million 1989 spending blueprint that Republicans put together to avoid an elec-

tion-year tax increase.

— Even with the much-criticized budgets for education, the spending plan is still some \$9 million over anticipated revenues. Risch and House Speaker Tom Boyd have discussed potential revenue packages, but no specific plan has emerged to cover the looming deficit.

— Critics contended the GOP-proposed support levels for education are so low they will undermine the progress made a year ago after hefty support increases financed by a \$100 million tax hike.

— But Risch and Boyd, maintaining that their budget balances spending needs against the ability of taxpayers to pay, countered that the Idaho school system was turning out some of the best prepared students in the nation. Simply spending more tax money would not necessarily improve it, they argued.

"Education remains our top priority," Boyd said, "and the facts prove we have done a good job of providing for it the best we can."

Edward K. Hall of Milbrae, Calif.,

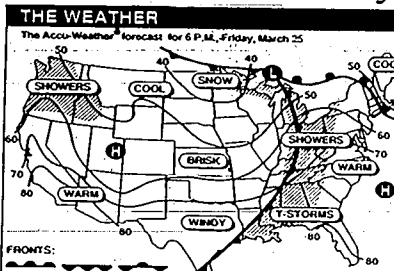

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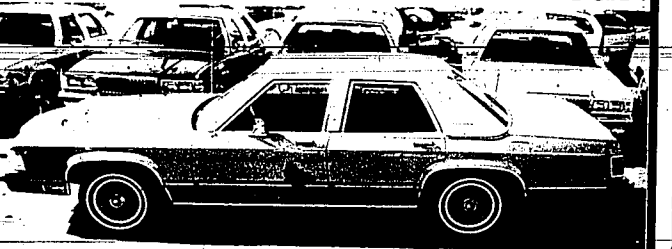

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North, Poindexter, 2 others deny guilt at arraignment

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former national security aides Oliver L. North and John M. Poindexter and two businessmen pleaded innocent Thursday to charges they ran the Iran-Contra affair as a vast criminal conspiracy and defrauded the government of \$17 million.

One by one, the defendants were called before U.S. District Judge Gerhard Gesell at their arraignment, and asked by courtroom clerk Barbara Montgomery, "How do you wish to plead?"

"Not guilty," replied Poindexter, President Reagan's former national security adviser, and North, a top assistant to Poindexter.

"Not guilty, your honor," responded retired Air Force Maj. Gen. Richard V. Secord and Albert Hakim, who controlled the money and procured the arms for the once-secret Iran-Contra operation.

All four defendants were released after their personal recognizance and told to report weekly by telephone to a pre-trial agency. Although criminal defendants are often asked to surrender their passports, Gesell said he would not impose that condition.

Dressed in conservative business suits, the four men made their first appearance in court since a federal grand jury, convened by independent Counsel Lawrence E. Walsh 14 months ago, handed down a 23-count indictment March 16.

North, wearing a Marine lieutenant-colonel's uniform, and Poindexter, a

retired Navy rear admiral, embraced before the judge entered the crowded courtroom.

The defendants are charged with conspiring to defraud the United States "by deceitfully ... organizing, directing and concealing" a program of support for the Nicaraguan Contras rebels at a time such assistance was banned.

The indictment also said the defendants "knowingly did embezzle, steal and convert-to-their-own-use part of the proceeds generated by the sale of weapons to Iran."

Although no exact figure was specified in the theft count, it was reported elsewhere in the indictment that the arms sales generated proceeds of some \$30 million while the government was paid only \$12.2 million for the weapons.

Gesell set no trial date but said he would hold an early hearing to determine whether evidence gathered by Walsh is free of taint and therefore admissible.

All the defendants except Secord testified before Congress under a grant of immunity from prosecution, preventing Walsh from using any of that testimony.

Walsh has said FBI agents assigned to his staff made sure that he wasn't exposed to any new stories involving the hearings or later developments. As he obtained his independent evidence, he filed it under seal with the court, Walsh has the burden of proving that his evidence was not

tainted.

"The court has an independent obligation to determine whether the prosecution up to this stage is or is not tainted," Gesell said. "This ought to get resolved and get resolved quickly."

Gesell ordered written motions on the taint question to be filed by April 7, and set a preliminary proceeding for April 12. A full hearing would likely be held later in April, he said.

Walsh pointed out he has hired retired federal judge Herbert Stern to argue such motions, and said he was ready to move ahead.

Gesell told the lawyers he would not allow a civil suit arising from the Iran-Contra affair, in which Secord and Hakim are defendants, to interfere with the criminal case. The civil trial had been set to begin June 27.

"It will not go forward," Gesell said. "A criminal case takes precedence. This case has got to take priority."

Outside the courtroom, a crowd of demonstrators gathered to show support for the defendants. Sen. Steven Symms, R-Idaho, called on President Reagan to issue an immediate pardon of North and Poindexter.

The defendants were met by a mob of reporters and supporters as they left the courthouse.

As Poindexter stood by silently, attorney Richard Becker said, "We are going to vigorously contest this case with all our strength and might."

North left through a separate door and did not get close to reporters.

DuPont to stop making CFCs

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Du Pont Co., producer of one-quarter of the chemicals destroying the Earth's ozone shield, plans to stop making them because of new research showing decay of the ozone, the company said Thursday.

The company gave no deadline for ending manufacture of the "fully halogenated chlorofluorocarbons," or CFCs. These non-toxic, non-flammable compounds that Du Pont helped develop in the 1930s are widely used as refrigeration fluids, cleaning solvents, plastic foam blowing agents and, outside the United States, as aerosol propellants.

"I don't see it in the near term," not for five years, but at the end of next year, period, policy makers and the chemical industry should know how rapidly the transition can take place," Joe Steed, environment manager in Du Pont's Freon Products division, said in an interview.

"Our intention is to move as smoothly as possible from these compounds into alternatives," Steed said.

Du Pont announced in January it had developed a substitute foam-blowing agent. Also, Petroferm Inc. has announced a replacement solvent for CFCs, and other chemicals are in the works at several companies.

On Thursday the company began notifying customers, competitors, employees and members of Congress of its new policy.

As recently as March 4, Du Pont said a proposal from three senators that the company immediately stop making CFCs was "unwarranted and counterproductive." The senators — Robert Stafford, R-Vt.; Max Baucus, D-Mont.; and David Durenberger, R-Minn. — had written Du Pont Chairman Richard E. Heckert, calling on him to redeem the company's mid-1970s pledge to end CFC production if a threat to health were shown.

Police arrest 111 in protest

NEW YORK (AP) — Hundreds of protesters demanding the government fight harder against AIDS marched Thursday in New York's financial district and 111 people were arrested for blocking traffic during the morning rush-hour.

An estimated 500 protesters marched inside police barriers in front of Trinity Church, with groups of about 20 people moving in waves to block traffic by sitting across streets and intersections.

"The only place we can raise these demands is on the street because the government is not listening to us," said Amy Bauer, 29, an organizer with ACT UP — the AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power. "The government is letting people die."

Police let them sit for half an hour, diverting traffic until it had backed up about 10 blocks, said Inspector Robert Baumer, commanding officer at the scene. Then they were carried onto a waiting police bus.

A second wave sat in the street to block the bus and was arrested. A third wave tried to block the bus and they too were arrested. Then the protesters started stacking traffic up by sitting down in different intersections.

Manufactured, true science often clash

It is sad that prominent people in our town do not believe in the citizen's right of choice. I am sure Mr. Hartgen, as a newspaperman, demands his right to know, yet denies that right to students.

He doesn't want students to have access to information that evolution may be wrong, and sees the science teacher to keep him from presenting evidence that is embarrassing to evolutionists.

Science has given us many useful things when the usual fast-food laws are used, but in evolution, we find that many men of science are biased.

All of the previously hailed "finds" of supposed early men, i.e. Pittdown man, Neanderthal man, Peeking man, Nebraska man, etc. have been found to be very carefully contrived hoaxes by scientists who wished to create a belief in evolution.

Let us consider some scientific facts. Science tells us that 14,300,000 tons of meteorite dust falls on the earth each year, the same amount falling on the moon. It tells us the earth and moon are about 4.5 billion years old. That much dust falling on these planets each year would leave a layer of dust of about 135 feet deep. Yet Neil Armstrong's footprints went into about 1/8-inch of dust, indicating a very young moon.

The moon rocks were dated by various radiometric techniques (carbon-14, potassium argon, uranium 238, etc.) that scientists tell us are so accurate they can date an artifact five million years old to within six months of its origin; yet the tests varied the moon rock ages from 70 million years to 28 billion years old; hardly very accurate for 4.5 billion year old items.

Science tells us 27.5 billion tons of sediment wash into the ocean each year. It also tells us there is 30.4 million cubic miles of earth crust above sea level, weighing 383 billion tons. By dividing the mass of 383 million billion tons by the 27.5 billion tons eroding yearly, it would take only 14 million years for the entire land mass to be washed into the seas, indicating a young earth. Yet the earth is supposed to be 4.5 billion years old which would allow enough time to wash away the entire land mass 70 times over.

Evolutionists would have us believe that life forms slowly evolved through many changes till they reached present day forms. If true, abundant evidence of this change should be everywhere. Instead, fossils show no transitional forms whatsoever. Complete,

perfected flora appear suddenly in the fossil record. Completed vertebrate forms came into the fossil record abruptly, without transitional change.

Yes, abrupt appearance suggests creation (gasp - I've used that obscene word). True science and abrupt appearance have very little disagreement. Manufactured science, such as the "early or pre-historic men" hoax, clashes violently with true science and abrupt appearance. Let Mr. Gerrish teach science, Mr. Hartgen, and stick to your newspaper business.

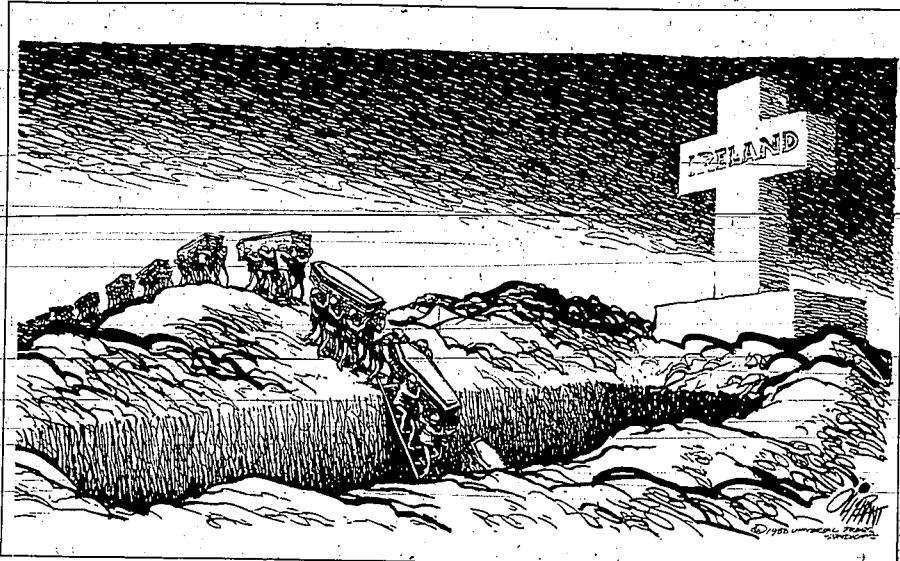

Postal service works for all

I am a letter carrier with the U.S. Postal Service in Twin Falls. I am not writing as an official representative of the U.S. Postal Service, but as an employee in defense of my employer and my job.

With the great cry to "privatize" the postal service sounding off in Washington and echoing throughout the rest of the country, there are many articles being written that are loaded with misinformation, leading the general public to incorrect conclusions.

Private firms that would like to get in on the mail delivery business now being served by the postal service have made no commitments to provide equal service with equal cost to every customer regardless of location. Sparsely populated areas such as ours would receive limited or sporadic service at best with the rural areas even worse and at significantly higher rates than the heavily populated urban areas. The postal service makes no such distinctions. We deliver the same service to all customers at the same rates regardless of geographical location. The cost of mailing is up since 1971 about 127 percent while the CPI (consumer prices) have risen 183 percent. If the cost followed inflation, a first-class stamp would cost more than 30 cents. Even at 25 cents it is still the cheapest in

the world compared with Canada at 28 cents, 34 cents in Britain, 49 cents in Japan and 50 cents in West Germany.

Mail volume has risen since 1971 by 76.5 percent to 153.9 billion pieces processed and delivered each year and still going up. That's an average of more than 508 million pieces per day (more than twice as much as Federal Express delivered all year and more than United Parcel Service delivered in all of 1987). Each postal employee handles about 192,000 pieces; an increase of 60 percent. Productivity growth between 1972 and 1986 according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics for the postal worker was up 22 percent compared with a 16 percent growth in the private sector. An increase in the labor force of 45 percent in private sector and 9.7 percent in the postal work force means that the postal service is serving more people more efficiently with less people.

The public trusts us and is satisfied with our service. A 1987 Roper Poll showed that nearly 90 percent of consumers are satisfied with their present mail service. The postal worker's wages barely keep pace with inflation, rising for the most senior letter carrier 191.6 percent since 1971 while the CPI rose 191.7 percent. We work in every variety of weather and circumstances. How

many private carriers will be willing to walk in deep freezing snow or in blistering heat for significant pay? One columnist suggested using our children to deliver mail. Would you want your child to face a mail thief or irate customer? Bless the children, but how many can get home with school work intact? Should they carry your payroll or retirement check? The postal worker is trained to do the job, efficiently and professionally.

This nation has had a government-organized postal system for over 200 years. That is just too much of an investment to turn it all over to a relative few whose only aim is to make a profit from the public. The U.S. Postal Service is not here to make a profit, it is here to serve the public, here to serve all America.

Policy should keep church, state apart

Mr. Carl Snow:
On behalf of the Idaho membership of Americans United for Separation of Church and State, I would like to commend the Twin Falls Public School District for the steps being taken to implement a new policy on the teaching of creationism.

We at Americans United encourage you to do so with the constitutional principle of church-state separation in mind.

In 1987 the Supreme Court ruled in the Edwards v. Aguilard case that a Louisiana law mandating the teaching of "creation science" alongside evolution in public school science classes was a violation of the First Amendment's religion clauses.

The high court firmly declared that creationism has a religious, not scientific basis, and declared that the Louisiana law "violates the Establishment Clause of the First Amendment because it seeks to employ the symbolic and financial support of government to achieve a religious purpose."

As Justice William Brennan put it, "Families entrust public schools with the education of their

children, but condition their trust on the understanding that the classroom will not purposely be used to advance religious views that may conflict with the private beliefs of the student and his or her family."

The Edwards decision is in keeping with a long line of Supreme Court cases that protect the religious neutrality of our public schools.

Because impressionable children of many religious perspectives attend public schools, the court has recognized that no particular religious doctrine may be introduced into the curriculum.

Classroom teachers, as representatives of the state and custodians of the public trust, have a special responsibility to avoid instruction based on sectarian religious dogma.

Public school authorities across the nation have recognized that the creationism movement is a "highly-welld attempt to establish religious indoctrination in the public school system in violation of

the Constitution and court decrees. Many have adopted policies that forbid school personnel to in any way require religious devotions or promote sectarian perspectives in the classroom."

The policy adopted by your school district should reflect this sound educational and legal philosophy.

Instruction that imposes a religiously based doctrine could leave the district vulnerable to a lawsuit. Given court precedent, it is not likely the district could win a costly, drawn-out legal battle.

Accordingly, I urge you to take the course required by law and instruct district teaching personnel to respect church-state separation in their classroom activities in Twin Falls.

Conclave delegates balance fears, aspirations for freedom

Approximately 250 delegates attended the First Amendment Congress here, from March 13 through March 15.

Delegates arrived from 35 states and the District of Columbia - from Georgia to Hawaii, from Montana to Texas. They represented such diverse groups as Eagle Forum, Common Cause, Asian American Free Labor, American Bar Association, National PTA, National Education Association, League of Women Voters, Congress of Racial Equality, American Library Association, American Civil Liberties Union, and the American Legion.

Many delegates were university professors, teachers, librarians, high school students, attorneys, broadcast and print journalists or public school administrators. One delegate was an ex-CIA man, another was a colonel in the U.S. Army, four were followers of Sun Myung Moon.

On the final day of the First Amendment Congress, these delegates voted against what ever fears they might have brought with them and voted for our freedoms.

The final resolutions of this congress were not only a rebuke of the secrecy of the Reagan administration, they were a vote of confidence in the great experiment that began 200 years ago, our democracy.

The three-day session of this congress was devoted to examining each clause of the First Amendment. There were workshops on freedom of religion, freedom of speech, freedom of the press, freedom of assembly, freedom of petition, censorship, obscenity and pornography, commercial speech, and even the issues of national security and the right of privacy as they relate to the First Amendment.

Delegates signed up for the workshops that they wished to attend and then debated the issues of their particular workshops. Each of those workshops then issued a preliminary resolution at the end of the day.

On the following day, delegates attended different workshops and debated other issues. If a delegate attended the freedom of religion workshop the first day, he might attend the freedom of assembly workshop the second day. These second-day debates used the previous day's resolutions as a starting point for discussion. The delegates could amend or delete sections of the preliminary resolutions that they

discussed, or they could cancel them entirely and begin anew.

And if no consensus was reached by a workshop or someone felt uncomfortable with the position taken by it, that person could offer a minority resolution.

There was no parliamentary trickery involved to achieve preplanned conclusions. These group sessions functioned like miniature town hall meetings. Each delegate was given an opportunity to express ideas, counter ideas, agree and disagree, argue, or even remain silent.

The work was taken seriously. As if in this microcosm of 250 people, we represented the citizenry of the United States. As if how we debated and how we voted might somehow offer a preview of what would occur if our nation were to call for a constitutional convention.

It seemed as if everyone present had entered into the serious intent of this three-day congress. Delegates argued with passion and sincerity. And because of the spirit of the occasion - working with the rights guaranteed by the First Amendment - despite our beliefs and anxieties, we respected one another's viewpoints. The hours were long, the debate worthy.

On the final afternoon of the congress, mod-

erators from each workshop session brought their resolutions to the floor of the entire congress for further deletions and amendments and final debate. A few new modifications passed or were defeated by close votes; most changes passed easily after point-counterpoint discussion. All of the final resolutions as amended were passed by an overwhelming majority.

Most of us were exhausted, yet subdued exhilaration, like small waves, rushed through the meeting hall. We had not allowed our fears to dominate our debate.

Certainly, those who would take time to attend a First Amendment Congress could be expected to have a great interest in the freedoms granted by that amendment. Certainly, those hundreds of delegates were not a true cross-section of America. And yes, the debates were probably skewed toward accepting the risk of liberty rather than the suppression of it.

Yet, I discussed censorship with parent delegates who feared that sexually explicit material would damage both children and adults. I debated censorship in a room where the Colorado president of Eagle Forum was present and where a member of the National PTA expressed her counter-opinion, and we came out of the session with a consensus resolution. So

liberal," according to one of the moderating attorneys, "that ACLU's national board wouldn't adopt it."

The resolution, to which he refers, was passed by the First Amendment Congress. It states that adults shall not be denied access to any sexually explicit material, and children will be protected only from that which is legally obscene. This resolution is a far more open reading of the First Amendment than the current status of constitutional law.

The congress also voted to return free press rights to the student journalists. Indeed, 91 of the resolutions rendered a freer understanding of the First Amendment than the federal government or the states now allow.

We of the congress balanced our fears against our aspirations for freedom. Rather than conspire against liberty, we voted to aspire - to soar, to breathe.

Perhaps this congress indicates that there is a new wind blowing across this nation - the crisp, fresh air of freedom. We can hope. We've had enough of the dank smog of dread and trepidation.

U.S. laughs off detection system

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States belittled Soviet technology for detecting nuclear missiles aboard ships and snubbed an invitation this week to see the process before the May 29-June 2 summit meeting in Moscow, a senior U.S. official said Thursday.

During three days of pre-summit talks in Washington this week, Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze offered to let the United States participate in an experiment to test the system in April.

Shevardnadze hailed the system as a technological milestone in missile detection that would help the superpowers achieve their goal of a summit agreement to cut long-range nuclear arsenals.

The senior U.S. official said, however, "we're not interested" because the system doesn't detect nuclear-armed cruise missiles, as the Soviets claim.

"The Soviets could not explain how this experiment would tell us more than we already know,"

the official said. "Such technology would not be effective under realistic conditions."

It could not, for example, tell the difference between nuclear warheads and atomic propulsion systems used on many surface ships, the official said.

"Our people know a great deal about the ideas that the Soviets have advanced, and we've looked into it carefully," the official said.

When they agreed in principle last December to hold a summit in Moscow, President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev said they wanted to sign an agreement to cut the numbers of long-range nuclear missiles and bombers by 30 percent to 50 percent.

With little progress — notably on the verification issues — during Shevardnadze's visit to Washington for three days this week, neither side predicted the agreement would be ready in time.

The senior U.S. official said, moreover, that

until the negotiators prove they can verify elimination of the various types of weapons involved, they won't know which ones will be covered in a treaty.

Another official, noting that the two nations also disagree on such explosive issues as Afghanistan, the Middle East, Central America and human rights, warned against expecting "easy solutions" to U.S.-Soviet problems.

The official described the most recent talks as "grueling," notably in the 11 hours of discussion on the regional hot spots.

At the White House, spokesman Marlin Fitzwater sought to dispel suggestions that the summit meeting — in the twilight of Reagan's presidency — would be a ceremonial and symbolic visit short on substantive accomplishments.

"During Shevardnadze's talks in Washington we made enough progress to keep going and presumably we will make more in the days ahead," the spokesman told reporters.

Senate to meet secretly on missile charges

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate prepared on Thursday to convene an unusual secret session early next week to allow allegations that the Soviet Union may be ready to hide a covert force of SS-20 missiles after ratification of the pact banning medium-range nuclear weapons worldwide.

The session, to take place on Monday or Tuesday, was demanded by Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., the leading opponent of the new treaty, to examine apparently highly classified and conflicting U.S. intelligence estimates, one of which is said to show a significantly higher SS-20 total than that declared by the Soviets.

Senate Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd of West Virginia said that for security reasons the Senate will meet for the secret session not in the chamber it normally occupies but in the historic

and smaller Old Senate Chamber nearby.

The newer chamber no longer meets requirements for a secret session because it is laced with television, radio, telephone and power cables, Byrd said.

Byrd announced the development as the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, in a stormy session, overwhelmingly rejected a move by Helms to require new intelligence evaluations of the SS-20 question.

The committee voted 15-2 against a proposed Helms' amendment to the treaty which would have required President Reagan to certify the accuracy of the Soviet claims that there are 650 SS-20 missiles and no more.

The declared weapons will have to be destroyed after the treaty takes effect.

Helms contends that at least 300 additional SS-20s are undeclared and "hidden," and he cited Defense Intelligence Agency reports which he said support his claim.

But Sen. Daniel Evans, R-Wash., said, "I don't believe President Reagan would have signed this treaty" if he believed the Soviets had successfully hidden a large force of SS-20 missiles.

Ambassador Maynar W. Glitman, the treaty's chief U.S. negotiator, said the pact is designed to meet the possibility that the Soviets might conceal some SS-20s by requiring the destruction of launch equipment and forbidding all flight testing.

Without the ability to test, Glitman said, "the reliability of the missiles steadily degrades over time."

Congress, budget chief clash over mails

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress and the Reagan administration clashed Thursday over who is at fault for recent cuts in postal services and what future would be best for the embattled mail system.

Federal budget director James C. Miller III and members of the House Post Office and Civil Service Committee sought to place blame for the postal cutbacks on one another — with both sides calling the accounting process "smoke and mirrors."

The Postal Service curtailed some window hours and halted Sunday collections and some sorting after the federal budget reconciliation bill required it to reduce spending without increasing revenues.

Postage rate hikes slated for April

3, boosting a first-class stamp price to a quarter, are unrelated to the dispute.

In addition to finding fault with one another for the agency's budget crisis, disagreements flared over proposals by Miller and others to "privatize" the

Postal Service by making it a private firm and opening mail delivery to business competition.

Miller said that plan would cut costs, improve efficiency and probably result in better service and lower costs for consumers.

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Pakistan clears path to Afghan settlement

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pakistan has removed a major obstacle to settlement of the war in Afghanistan by withdrawing its demand for formation of an interim government, a senior U.S. official said Thursday.

The Soviet Union, charging Pakistan with bad faith, had refused to complete an agreement for withdrawal of an estimated 120,000 troops from the war-torn country.

Initially, the United States supported the demand of its ally, which is negotiating terms of a settlement with the Afghan government through a United Nations mediator.

But the Reagan administration subsequently back-pedaled — while pressing its own demand that the Soviets cease their military aid to the Marxist government.

The U.S. official said Pakistan was now willing to have the Red Army re-

treat even while the U.N. mediator, Diego Cordovez, consulted with warring factions on formation of a transitional government.

"The interim government issue, which has been an obstacle, is now swiftly soluble," he said.

"The official, who played a leading role in talks here this week with Soviet officials, briefed reporters under rules that gave him anonymity.

Pakistan had contended that the safe return of millions of Afghan refugees to their homeland would not be possible under the current government in Kabul.

Secretary of State George P. Shultz on Wednesday night ruled out any agreement to end the war in Afghanistan unless the Soviet Union suspended military aid to the pro-Moscow government.

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Panama leader back from exile

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) — A leading opposition figure returned from exile Thursday and rejoined an increasingly desperate struggle to topple Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega.

"We have but one objective: to get rid of Noriega and build reconciliation and democracy in Panama!" said Ricardo Arias Calderon, the president of the Christian Democratic Party, in an address to a chanting, cheering crowd of about 300 people who greeted his flight from Costa Rica.

"I am profoundly moved to be back in my own land," he said.

The return of Arias Calderon, considered a presidential aspirant in elections scheduled for May 1989, came on the fourth day of a nationwide general strike aimed at ousting Noriega, who is the head of the 15,000-member Defense Forces and is the power behind the civilian government.

But despite almost unanimous support for the strike by business and industry, Noriega remained defiant, saying Wednesday night his opponents at home and in the United States don't "have the capacity" to overthrow him.

That feeling appeared to be shared by some strike leaders, who said it might take a revolt by fellow officers to remove Noriega as head of the Defense Forces.

"There are growing pockets within the Defense Forces that are against Noriega," said Jose Mulino, an attorney and opposition leader.

"What we don't know is if they will act."

But in his speech to a group of about 500 supporters, Noriega claimed the military was maintaining "its high moral and patriotic beliefs" despite a failed barracks coup last week.

Eleven officers were arrested in that failed plot. Noriega dismissed more than a dozen officers and shifted the assignments of other key personnel.

Still, the members of the Defense Forces are due to be paid today, and opposition leaders said their loyalty to Noriega could be tested anew if they don't get their paychecks.

Panama is out of cash because Washington cut off the supply of U.S. dollars, the Panamanian national currency, in a bid to drive Noriega into exile. The general was indicted in the United States last month on federal cocaine trafficking charges.

The government was unable to fully meet a \$33 million payroll for 130,000 public employees earlier this month, touching off a series of strikes and massive demonstrations by workers once considered loyal to Noriega.

The next semi-monthly paychecks for most government employees are due next week, following the military payday, and they could be stirred to renewed fury if the army gets paid and they don't.

There had been doubts whether Arias Calderon would be allowed to come home.

Street battles follow Israeli troop raids

HEBRON, Occupied West Bank (AP) — Soldiers shot two Palestinians dead in street battles Thursday after a night of Israeli raids in which Arabs were arrested and taken to schools converted into detention centers.

Seven Arabs were wounded in confrontations in the occupied West Bank, including a 12-year-old girl shot in the left leg in Tamouna, a village 10 miles west of Nablus, hospital officials reported.

Thursday's deaths brought to 109 the number of Palestinians killed since the Arab rebellion began Dec. 8 in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip, according to U.N. figures. One Israeli soldier has been killed.

Monsignor Michel Sabbah, Roman Catholic patriarch of Jerusalem, canceled the traditional Palm Sunday procession from the biblical Mount of Olives to Jerusalem's Old City because of continuing violence.

Ariel Sharon, the hawkish former

general who now is industry and trade minister, said Palestinians involved in the rebellion might be expelled from Israel and the territories it has occupied since the 1967 Middle East war.

Israeli warplanes raided Palestinian guerrilla bases on the outskirts of Sidon for the second straight day. It was the third Israeli air raid into Lebanon in a week and the fifth this year.

Soldiers have rounded up at least 700 Palestinians in the past week in nightly sweeps through villages and refugee camps aimed at removing leaders of the rebellion, and about 3,000 since the rebellion began.

Among those detained Wednesday night and early Thursday were several men believed responsible for the latest Palestine Liberation Organization leaflet, said Nahum Mendel, spokesman for the Police Ministry. He would not identify them or say how many were arrested.

An Islamic official in Hebron said about 200 imams — Moslem religious leaders — had been arrested in the West Bank city this week. He said, on condition of anonymity, that most were members of a fundamentalist group.

Many of those arrested were taken to half a dozen Arab schools the army converted into temporary detention centers, according to Mohammed Abdul Majid Melham, a Palestinian detained Sunday night in Halhoul High School, and other Arab reports.

Melham, a 45-year-old pharmacist, said he was held at the school with 12 other villagers from Halhoul, 2 miles north of Hebron, after a midnight roundup.

"Six soldiers and three intelligence officers came to my house. They handcuffed and blindfolded me, then they took me to the school," he said. "We were held in a large, open room. It

was very cold. There were no blankets or mattresses."

He said the detainees were transferred the next morning to a center near Hebron and he was released Wednesday.

Three army battle tanks, two transport vehicles and two tents could be seen Thursday from a slope overlooking the high school's walled compound.

School desks were piled near the wall-in-one-corner. Coils of barbed wire ran along the top of the wall and an Israeli flag flew from the roof of the three-story building.

Troops occupied three Arab school buildings in Hebron on Thursday and closed four in Ramallah in an apparent effort to thwart student protests ordered in a PLO leaflet.

An Associated Press photographer saw about 2,000 children streaming from the Ramallah schools.

Panel finds Israeli guilty of treason

JERUSALEM (AP) — A former nuclear technician who claimed he revealed Israel's atomic secrets for the good of humanity was convicted Thursday of espionage and treason and could be sentenced to 20 years in prison.

Mordechai Vanunu, 34, was found guilty by a three-judge panel after a trial that had been closed to the public since it began in September. His lawyer said the Vanunu would appeal the verdict to Israel's Supreme Court.

"Mordechai is very disappointed," said defense attorney Avigdor Feldman. "The court decided that he was a traitor, and he had hoped to be seen differently. But he is not broken. He is looking ahead to the appeal."

The conviction carries a maximum sentence of death. However, prosecutor Uzi Chasson said he would ask the court for a sentence of life imprisonment, which in Israel is limited to 20 years. Sentencing is set for Sunday.

Vanunu, who worked nine years at the nuclear facility in Dimona, was charged for revealing details of Israel's atomic capacity to the Sunday Times of London in October 1986.

The newspaper said Vanunu's information showed Israel had stockpiled the world's sixth-largest nuclear arsenal.

Israel never has responded directly to allegations of its nuclear capacity, saying only it would not be the first country to introduce such weapons into the Middle East.

No U.S. military effort

VIENNA, Va. (AP) — President Reagan said Thursday the United States is not going to play "big colossus of the North" and use military force to get Panamanian strongman Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega out of power.

In a question-and-answer session with high school students in this Washington suburb, Reagan was asked if he thought it would be necessary to resume U.S. military control in Panama to protect the safety of the canal zone.

"No, we're going to abide by the canal treaty (relinquishing the canal to the Panamanians by the turn of the century)," he replied. "And we're not going to be the big colossus of the North once again, coming in to ... our

smaller neighbors' place of living and business and trying to guide and direct them."

The president said the Panamanians "have a very difficult problem there. We think that they're moving toward solving it, with the reaction of the people to the man that has caused so much of this problem."

Reagan said the United States wants "to be of help in any way we can, and so we've helped them in that regard in the economic restraints that we've put down there so that there can be pressure focused on this particular individual."

"But there's no danger of us coming in with our power and muscle and saying, 'This is the way it has to be.'"

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
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
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
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

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — The slaughter of Kurdish civilians in Iraq poison gas attacks and Iranian warnings of retaliation underframe the growth of the chemical warfare arsenals of major Middle East powers.

Despite efforts to curb such weapons, their spread has added a dangerous new dimension to conflicts in the volatile Middle East. Their use, but not their production, is banned under a 1925 Geneva agreement.

The London-based Jane's Defense Weekly noted in a recent study that the use of poison and nerve gases since 1984 in the 7 1/2-year-old Iraq-Iran war has "changed the rules of war in the Middle East."

Tehran charges that Iraqi warplanes have dropped chemical bombs on several "villages" in northwestern Iraq after Iranian forces overran the Kurdish area in a ground offensive.

Western correspondents in Iran have reported evidence to substantiate Iranian claims that 5,000 Iraqi Kurds were killed and another 5,000 injured when Iraqi warplanes dropped chemical bombs on towns captured by the Iranians in northeast Iraq last week.

Nicholas Beeston of The Times of London reported from Halabja, one of

the towns that "hundreds and possibly thousands" of the Kurds, who have been rebelling against Baghdad for years, were killed.

Hashemi Rafsanjani, speaker of Iran's Parliament and Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's representative on the Supreme Defense Council, warned Thursday that Iran will be forced to use chemical weapons in retaliation if the Iraqi attacks continue.

The intensity of Tehran's accusations against Iraq in recent days has heightened fears that the Iranians may be seeking to justify using chemical weapons of their own.

U.S. State Department Spokesman Charles Rademan said Wednesday there was evidence Iran may already have fired chemical artillery shells into Iraq. He declined to elaborate.

"It's entirely likely that the Iranians could do so," said Don Kerr of the International Institute for Strategic Studies in London in a telephone interview.

"They've had these weapons used against them for a long time," Iraq, a signatory to the 1925 agreement, "has been condemned by the United Nations four times since 1984 for using chemical weapons."

The Iranians claim the Iraqis have

launched around 100 chemical attacks in that period, mainly against Iranian troops.

Iranian-backed Kurdish guerrillas fighting the Baghdad regime for autonomy have claimed scores of such attacks on their villages in the last year. But last week's bombing appears to have been the worst chemical attack in the Persian Gulf conflict.

"Iraq has the biggest chemical warfare army in the region, with sizable stocks of poison and nerve gases produced at three top-secret plants, Western military analysts told The Associated Press.

The sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Iraq is now producing Sarin, a highly lethal nerve gas that can kill in less than 10 minutes.

They said there are indications that the Iraqis are also working on germ warfare weapons.

The sources estimated that Iraq now produces 60 tons of mustard gas a month and four tons each of Sarin and Tabun, another highly lethal nerve agent.

Tabun, first developed by Nazi Germany before World War II but never used, is a colorless gas that attacks

the body's muscular centers and causes' asphyxiation within 15 minutes.

The sources said the Iraqi main production plant is at Samarra, a heavily guarded 10-square-mile complex ringed by Soviet-supplied Sa-2 anti-aircraft missiles 70 miles north of Baghdad.

On the other side, Iran's chief military spokesman, Khamal Kharrazi, has said his country is producing chemical weapons.

The analysts and diplomatic sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said Iranian chemical weapons are believed to be mainly mustard and phosgene gases.

Iran, Iraq trade attacks on capitals

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Iran and Iraq fired missiles into each other's capitals Thursday, and Tehran warned it would deploy chemical bombs if the United Nations fails to punish Iraq for using the outlawed weapons.

Both sides reported civilian casualties in the missile attacks; Iran said 10 people were killed in Tehran, and Iraq reported nine deaths in Baghdad.

Iran said its troops advanced further into Iraq's northeastern Kurdistan province, killing or wounding 1,000 Iraqi troops in a second push in the mountainous region in a week. Iraq denied the claim.

Persian Gulf-based shipping executives reported that the captain of the 267,589-ton Friendship 1, supertanker, on charter to the Iranians, reported a fire in the engine room as the vessel sailed in the gulf, raising speculation it may have been a victim of the Iran-Iraq tanker war.

But in a later radio message, he denied his vessel had been attacked and said the accidental fire had been extinguished, said the executives. They spoke on condition of anonymity.

In Amman, Jordan, Iran angrily pulled out of an Islamic conference after fellow Muslims denied its failure

to heed cease-fire calls and accused it of instigating bloody rioting in the holy city of Mecca last year.

The Iranian envoy to the meeting of the Organization of Islamic Conference, Mohammed Ali Tashkiri, flew out of Jordan at the head of his five-man delegation. He said the meeting was serving the interests of Iraq.

Iraq said nine people were killed and 59 wounded in a missile explosion in downtown Baghdad. Among the victims was a woman, killed in a hospital bed while breast-feeding her newborn baby. The infant was found alive in his mother's arms several hours later, the official Iraqi News Agency reported.

Iraq said it fired six long-range missiles into Tehran, a city of 6 million people.

The Iranian official Islamic Republic News Agency reported 10 civilians killed and 2100 wounded, when the missiles hit two schools, two mosques and two hospitals as well as shops and houses.

Iran's official Islamic Republic News Agency, monitored in Nicosia, said Revolutionary Guards fired two missiles into Baghdad, which has a population of 5 million.

But the Iraqi News Agency said only one projectile hit Baghdad.

Big Macs in Belgrade bring out crowds, cops

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — Communism suffered its first Big Mac attack Thursday as McDonald's opened a restaurant in Yugoslavia and police were called in to keep customers who lined up for hours from getting too unruly under the golden arches.

"I just wanted to taste genuine American hamburgers," said Milica Nikolic, a high school student who waited for three hours to taste her first Big Mac.

People curiously examined the renovated restaurant's plush interior and the backlit signs displaying the hamburgers, french fries, milk shakes and other fare more familiar in the West. It also featured amber-colored tables and floors, pastel-colored upholstery, modern art paintings and discreet illumination.

The fast-food outlet, located on a downtown square, had drawn crowds in recent days, and they began gathering long before it opened Thursday. Police kept watch on the lines of

customers snaking around the block, and they regulated the number who came inside to avoid overcrowding.

The opening of a restaurant in Belgrade has created such a sensation, says one today, a policeman said.

"I think this restaurant has no competition in Belgrade," said Milica Danic, a housewife who treated her son to a cheeseburger. "It is much cleaner, the service is faster, the interior is nicer and it is not too expensive."

The Belgrade media have suggested that the success of McDonald's in Yugoslavia depends on its acceptance by citizens long accustomed to a hamburger-like fast-food dish called the Pjeskavica: ground pork and onions on a bun.

"In fact, this is a clash between the Big Mac and Pjeskavica," said Vesna Miletovic, an official of Genex, a Yugoslav state-run enterprise that has contracted a joint venture agreement with McDonald's.

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Back to property taxes

Senate considers property permitting 11% hike per year

BOISE - Senate Republicans grubbing for a carrot Thursday to offer school districts, instead of more state funding, rooted out a pending property-tax bill circumventing the One Percent Initiative.

"Instead of ending the session on a negative note with lower funding, this would be a way to give them something through the local tax assessments," said Sen. Terry Sversten, R-Cataldo.

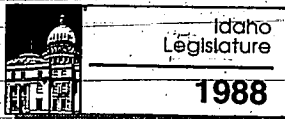
The proposal would allow districts such as Blaine County District, upon a majority vote from residents, to boost property taxes 11 percent a year instead of the current 5-percent limit. That would allow Blaine County to raise an additional \$370,000 for schools this year.

"It would take \$10 million in (state funding) to do what we're doing here," said Sversten, chairman of the Education Committee, referring to all districts that could take advantage of it.

"I strongly support it," said Blaine Superintendent David Noonan, whose district stands to gain nothing from any of the proposed increases in state funding.

The bill has passed the House and full Senate consideration is expected today.

Sversten said the decision to emphasize this bill originated in the Senate's Republican caucus Thursday morning, the day after Democrat-



Gov. Cecil Andrus vetoed a public education bill calling for \$356 million in state funding. The Senate Finance Committee also voted Thursday to send Andrus another bill with exactly the same amount of public school funding.

During his televised veto address Wednesday, Andrus predicted that without giving public education at least \$362 million, either the quality of districts would deteriorate or property taxes would rise.

"Pick your poison," Andrus said. But the property-tax bill's supporters countered it is not a choice between property taxes at the local level and income tax at the state level. They said their bill is a "tax equity" measure, allowing districts caught with low tax rates a decade ago to raise property tax rates by more than 5 percent limit imposed then.

Its purpose is to provide a little more fairness to these school districts," said Ezra Moore, of the Idaho School District Council.

Moore, who introduced the bill, said it was the product of an interim study committee. It is supported by the Idaho School Administrators

Association and Idaho School Boards Association, he said.

A simple majority of residents must approve the increase in an election.

Blaine County, with its high property tax values, suffers greatly from the 5-percent limit on raising property taxes and the state funding formula. The district receives only about \$350,000 in general funds from the state and would gain nothing more under either a \$356 million or \$362 million state budget.

Moreover, it's penalized by low tax rates in place a decade ago when the 5-percent limit went into effect, because it now can't raise basic property taxes more. Instead, Noonan said the district's \$1.6 million annual override elections will continue, with another one scheduled for April 1989.

But Noonan said the district would cut its override levy if this new bill allowing a bigger regular property tax rate is approved.

Once this measure is approved, a district may raise property taxes 11 percent a year without further votes. The upper limit is that total property taxes must not exceed 0.4 percent of total property valuation.

Regardless of its success, Noonan added that Blaine County supports Andrus' call for more funding.

"Even though it doesn't affect us, we recognize the importance of education across the state and we support the call for the \$6 million in additional support," Noonan said.

Hurlbutt declares mistrial

TWIN FALLS - Fifth District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt declared a mistrial in a marijuana-delivery case Thursday immediately after a prosecutor finished questioning a police confidential informant.

The case, initiated with an indictment charging 27-year-old Robert Wicklund with delivery of marijuana, is rescheduled for March 31.

Hurlbutt, Deputy Prosecutor J. Scott James and Twin Falls Public Defender Michael J. Wood declined comment on the motion for mistrial, which was worked out in private.

"I don't feel I can comment on the mistrial because it goes to the state of the case," James said afterwards.

Hurlbutt and Wood gave similar reasons for not commenting.

In open court, Hurlbutt said "certain information has come out" and based on that information, he decided to declare a mistrial.

A nine-woman, four-man jury had just been selected and listened to testimony from John Paul Baldwin Jr., who had acted as a police confidential informant during 1987.

Baldwin said he set up a marijuana deal with Wicklund in February 16, 1987. Wicklund has been indicted twice by grand juries on the charge. The first grand jury saw all its indictments thrown out because the county's jury selection procedure was invalid.

Baldwin also testified Tuesday and Wednesday in another drug case, which resulted in the jury conviction of Kathi Warr, 22, of delivering a half ounce of marijuana to Baldwin March

He faced heated cross-examination by Wood during the mistrial. Thursday, he was spared by the mistrial, which was declared just as Wood was about to begin his cross-examination.

But Baldwin did answer the prosecutor's questions, saying he met with Wicklund at 52 Chinton Lane on that February day in 1987 to buy marijuana.

Baldwin said he brought \$120 to buy the ounce of marijuana from Wicklund. Wicklund obtained a discount on the purchase, Baldwin said, and he paid only \$100.

Wicklund took him to Washington Park Apartments, then to 7th Ave. South, where the deal was completed.

However, James asked Hurlbutt after Baldwin's testimony if Baldwin could look at a police report to refresh his memory, indicating Baldwin gave the wrong address for the ultimate drug transaction.

Wood objected.

"This man said he could remember," Wood said.

Hurlbutt agreed with Wood, refusing to let Baldwin look at the police report.

James ended his examination of Baldwin at that point. Both sides agreed to a short recess, then went into Hurlbutt's chambers at 4:30 p.m. and returned to announce the mistrial.

Baldwin, who reversed his answers in Warr's trial, has signed an immunity agreement with prosecutors for four drug transactions in 1987 when he wasn't acting as a confidential informant.

Wicklund's case is the second case stemming from a September grand jury to go to trial. Many of the cases have been resolved through plea negotiations.

Kimberly decides against trees downtown

KIMBERLY - Following anonymous telephone threats, heated anti-tree arguments and bickering between city leaders, the City Council has said no to a donation of trees for a few blocks of downtown Kimberly and the money to plant them.

In the fourth meeting to address the topic, the council heard more public testimony Wednesday. A motion, "to plant trees, two or

three per block on each side of Main Street in one form or another this spring" had been made by Councilman Jack Wright, who offered to donate the trees, and seconded by George Nauman at the previous meeting, March 15.

"I'm very disturbed about this whole thing," said Nauman. He reported receiving three anonymous phone calls threatening to destroy the trees if they were planted. Nauman suggested delaying the decision to plant trees for a year or to let a group apart from the city handle the issue.

"I'm in favor of pursuing it further," he said, but "in light of public opinion, it's a foolish project" for the council to undertake.

Councilman Avis Allen reported receiving similar phone calls threatening to destroy trees. "I think it's a rotten idea for people to do that," said Mayor Jesse Posey.

At previous meetings, residents have complained that the eight-foot sidewalks are too narrow to allow trees, that the trees would need to be watered and cared for, that leaves from

A streak of bad luck

Company's 2nd fertilizer spill contributes to 'the greening of Idaho'

JEROME - April showers have come a month early for Biosoltech Management, Inc., a Twin Falls company with a penchant for bad luck.

One of the company's tankers spilled almost 1,400 gallons of non-hazardous, liquid fertilizer onto the northbound lane of U.S. 93 near the Perrine Bridge early Thursday morning when the truck lost two wheels after crossing the bridge.

The tanker hit the ground and ruptured, losing all its contents, said Jerome County Sheriff Elza Hall.

Terry Ihler, a Biosoltech plant manager,

said the fertilizer covered both lanes of the highway for about a half mile.

Hall said a section of the highway was closed for approximately half an hour following the accident, which occurred at 8:54 a.m. One lane was opened after it was determined by an official from the South Central District Health Department that the spill did not constitute an immediate health hazard.

The accident marked the second time within 10 days the company experienced a freak chemical spill, and on both occasions the fertilizer poured into borrow pits parallel to the highway.

"We're contributing to the greening of Idaho," Ihler said.

The driver of the tanker, 46-year-old Ken Sanford of Twin Falls, was not injured. Ihler

said there "was extensive damage to the trailer," and he estimated the company's total loss, including equipment damage and loss of chemicals, at a little more than \$6,000.

According to Hall, the accident apparently occurred because the lug nuts on the tanker's wheels had not been adequately secured.

Ihler said the company, for safety reasons, had on Thursday morning approximately one hour before the accident, taken the tanker truck to a Twin Falls tire shop where new tires and rims were put on.

"It's just a run of bad luck, but there's nothing we can do about it because nothing has been our fault to this point," Ihler said.

The company also lost approximately 1,400 gallons of non-hazardous fertilizer on March 22. See SPILL on Page B2

from Crime Stoppers - occasionally during 1987.

At most, he got \$500 and may get more if the cases he testifies in result in convictions.

On Thursday, James asked a Twin Falls detective what type of person he looks for to be a confidential informant.

"Basically, anybody you can get," said Detective Don Walden. "People in trouble, people who want money, people who have a grudge against somebody."

Baldwin, who said he knows of two or three other confidential informants in Twin Falls, said he started working for the Twin Falls police department in late 1986 or early 1987.

"I had a little sister down in Arizona who was 19, who got some PCP," Baldwin said. "It screwed her up big time."

"That's part of the reason he got started. In the past year and three months, he's bought drugs, testified, and says he's received death threats."

Baldwin grew up in a military family. Born in San Diego, he's lived in Rhode Island, Virginia, In-

diana and Arizona.

Recently, he worked on farms, in tire stores and for bean warehouses. In his spare time, he set up drug deals for the Twin Falls police.

"My girlfriend introduced me, and they asked what I could do for them," Baldwin said.

Baldwin set up drug deals. He would arrange a purchase, go to Walden and follow drug detective Ron Axتمان, get searched at the beginning and end of each deal, and carry out the deal with a wire strapped to him.

One incident exemplified his state of mind during a deal.

"I was scared sh—," Baldwin said. "They sent me in with a wire, and the wire kept slipping down."

"During the time he spent setting up drug deals, he also deliv-

ered outside jobs during most of his adult life, says he doesn't keep in touch with his family.

"Everybody falls me the black sheep of my family," he said. "I haven't talked to my parents for probably five or six months now."

And he's upset over how his supervisors, the police and the prosecutors, misled him.

"They didn't give me any training. They gave me the impression there wouldn't be any problems," Baldwin said.

Axtman and Walden both testified they told Baldwin he couldn't break any laws. But police did pay him a traffic citation he received in 1987.

He was cited for at least four other misdemeanors or traffic infractions during 1987. He's failed to make a court appearance in at least three of those cases, according to court records.

Baldwin isn't the type of man who gets invited to dinner in nice homes. He doesn't want to.

"I'm a loner," he said. "They could stick me out on a mountain for two months and it wouldn't bother me."

the trees would fall on the sidewalk and be blown into the entryways of buildings, and that the roots might damage the sidewalks or cause flooding.

Wright has already assured residents that the hardwood trees he would donate would not damage sidewalks or cause flooding.

Last Friday the council addressed the pipe issue at a work session to find alternatives to planting the trees on the sidewalk.

One alternative would be to plant trees in two islands, one at each end of the block. This would eliminate two parking places per block. The other idea was to plant the trees near the curb and place a parking block in the street to prevent cars from hitting the tree. This option would reduce the size of car that could park in the spot.

Wright responded with an offer to donate an additional \$500 for the project. He had already received offers to donate at least \$1,000 from local businesses supporting the project. The estimated cost of planting the trees is \$1,200.

In addition, resident Bryce Humphries offered to plant the trees as an Eagle Scout project.

"I'd like to help the board. It would be voluntary," he said.

Humphries was told by Nauman that he couldn't volunteer to do the work as long as this was a city project. Only city employees would be allowed to work on the project due to insurance liability coverage.

With the motion still on the floor, roll was called. Wright voted 'yes,' but was interrupted by Lewis, who attempted to have Wright disqualified as a voting member. Lewis said there was a conflict of interest since the propos-

al came from Wright.

City Clerk Edythe Widmer said based on previous conversations with the city attorney, she believed that any councilman has a right to vote on any motion. Lewis said he plans to take that up with the attorney for clarification.

"Allen" was called and voted "yes." Lewis was then called, but abstained until Nauman voted. Nauman voted "no," as did Lewis. With the vote tied 2-2, the mayor was called on to cast a fifth vote.

"The sun will come up in the morning whether we vote yes or no," Posey said. But Lewis and Nauman said that he must vote, that the discussion period had ended.

Posey hesitated, but then voted "no," defeating the project.

"Posey said after the meeting, 'I'm in favor of trees, but too many people are opposed. I can't be certain that there would be trouble with those who opposed the trees since they were so adamant.'

"This has thrown me for a loop," said Wright. He said he has spent his life helping cities find out how to get trees, not how to keep someone from donating them. There will always be threats, he said. "I believe it's right to plant trees," he said.

Though his proposal and offer were defeated, Wright remained optimistic. He said that some good has come from this effort. A letter has been written to Idaho Power to acquire a triangular piece of property north of town. Earlier some residents had asked that the trees be donated for a park at the entrance of the city, rather than for downtown.

"Never give up," Wright promised.

Valley board convenes

EDEN - Janet Bingham, president of SOS, a community group to help the Valley School District, asked the School Board what SOS could do at the grass roots level to circumvent the consolidation trend.

Although no consolidation bill now appears able to pass the Legislature this session, smaller school districts statewide may yet face absorption into larger districts as an economic measure.

Her main concern, Bingham said at the March board meeting, was getting information to parents in other small districts around the state.

Leigh Bell, SOS vice president, told the board he and his family had relocated from a metropolitan area that had experienced consolidation and that he, personally, could see no advantage in that type of merger. Bell suggested the board had already succumbed to the consolidation theory.

"The groundswell of opinion is in that direction," Board Chairman Keith Huettig said, and added that the board was trying to deal with the problem on a realistic basis.

Consolidation for Valley School District might mean merging with the larger Jerome District. Under one proposal that failed to make it to the floor of the House during the current legislative session, each county could have only one high school. Other guidelines call for a merger for high schools with an enrollment under 300, which are within 25 miles of larger school facilities or which exceed the state average of dollar expenditure.

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Rhoades hears death sentence, hurls chair at prosecutor

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A district judge on Thursday sentenced Paul Ezra Rhoades to die for the fatal shooting of an Idaho Falls teacher, prompting Rhoades to throw his chair at the prosecutor.

Rhoades, who was standing when the sentences were read, grabbed the chair in which he had been sitting and threw it at the prosecution table about 12 feet away.

As it slid across the table, Bonneville County Sheriff's detective Victor Rodriguez grabbed it before it hit

Prosecutor Kimball Mason or Deputy Prosecutor Sid Brown.

Rhoades struggled with deputies as they escorted him from the courtroom. His sister, Roberta, cursed at Mason after the sentence was read.

The victim's husband, J.A. "Bert" Michelbacher, showed no emotion. He and two friends were removed from the courtroom quickly.

Boyle sentenced the 31-year-old construction worker to death for first-degree murder, and first-degree kidnapping charges in the death of Mrs.

Michelbacher.

Boyle also sentenced the 31-year-old construction worker to life imprisonment without possibility of parole for conviction on robbery, rape and infamous crime against nature.

Mrs. Michelbacher disappeared March 19, 1987, and her body was found two days later in a field west of Idaho Falls. Rhoades was arrested for her death one year ago Friday at Wells, Nev.

Bonneville County Sheriff Richard Ackerman said he expects to transfer

Rhoades to the state penitentiary "within the next couple of days." He will join 15 other inmates on death row.

Rhoades will have to be returned for a trial beginning April 25 on charges of first-degree murder and robbery in the shooting of Idaho Falls convenience store clerk Nolan Haddon, who died two days before Mrs. Michelbacher.

He also faces sentencing May 9 in Blackfoot on conviction of first-degree murder and other crimes for shooting

Stacy Baldwin in February of last year.

At the start of the half-hour proceeding Thursday, Boyle said he had reached a decision "after a great deal of thought and soul-searching."

He said, "If ever a situation warranted the death penalty, it is manifested in this case."

Boyle said she was shot in the leg as she tried to escape, then shot repeatedly and raped. He said she was rolled onto her back and the final shot fired into her chest. "At this point, death must have come as a welcome relief."

Idaho river plan goes to House floor

BOISE (AP) — A comprehensive Idaho river plan was approved by the state House Resources and Conservation Committee, after a move to kill the measure was rejected minutes before.

The bill, sponsored by Sena Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, and Karl Brooks, D-Boise, gives the state more control over development of its rivers. Supporters say, without the plan, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission will dictate the future of Idaho's waterways.

FERC, which licenses dams, is required by law to refer to state water plans when issuing hydro licenses and water rights.

After 2 1/2 hours Wednesday, the Resources Committee approved the Senate-passed bill 12 to 8.

"I think they're a very responsible committee," said Noh, chairman of the Senate Resources and Environment Committee. "There were a lot of efforts going on today to educate committee members."

Such efforts included a letter



urging the bill's passage, signed by Gov. Cecil Andrus, Attorney General Jim Jones, Senate President Pro Tem James Risch and House Speaker Tom Boyd.

The measure would inventory the state's streams and recommend which ones should be protected and which developed.

The committee turned down an earlier attempt to kill the measure by the same vote.

Dissenters, such as Rep. Stan Hawkins, R-Ucon, doubted a state water plan would accomplish anything and needed further study.

"I think this bill is too broad and too far-reaching," said Hawkins, himself a hydro developer.

Andrus vetoes 2nd

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus has vetoed his second bill of the legislative session, striking down a proposal amending state laws on the use of tinted windows and windshields on motor vehicles.

Andrus notified the Senate Thursday he has no problem with the concept of the Senate Bill 1359, but was forced to veto it because of what Andrus called a serious flaw.

The legislation requires the Legislature to approve any rule or reg-

ulation needed to carry out the law.

"Such language is totally unacceptable to me, and I believe it should be unacceptable to you under the doctrine of separation of powers," the governor said.

Andrus said the executive branch of government in Idaho has exclusive power to prepare and carry out such rules.

"I believe very strongly in that fundamental concept," the governor said.

Censure clouds centennial

MOSCOW (AP) — Faculty leaders say the University of Idaho's centennial observance will be clouded unless the school removes a five-year-old censure order from a national academic organization.

Faculty members believe the UI administration should approach the Board of Education to change its policy on "financial exigency," the process of declaring a financial emergency and laying off tenured faculty.

"Everybody feels in the midst of all the ballyhoo of a centennial, it is disgraceful the institution is still under a censure," said Prof. Richard Dozier, former American Association of University Professors (AAUP) chapter president. "Frankly, I think all of us would like to know why something

hasn't been done before now."

The Faculty Council will ask the board to reconsider its 1985 decision on a financial exigency policy. That could lead to removal of censure.

"I am going to bring the matter up with the Faculty Council," said James MacDonald, council chairman. "We will probably develop some sort of resolution directed to the state board asking the state to do whatever is necessary to get the censure lifted."

At its national convention in 1983, the AAUP voted unanimously to censure University of Idaho over a declaration of a financial emergency in 1918. The school used that process to terminate 11 tenured faculty members in the College of Agriculture.

SIS foes bring in slate of experts

BOISE (AP) — Opponents of the Special Isotope Separation project brought in national experts to boost their case on the eve of hearings in Idaho on the project proposed at Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

And Chuck Skoro, head of the economics department at Boise State University, disputed the Department of Energy's estimates on the financial impact of the project. Skoro contended the risks for financial disaster are greater than minimum economic benefits the project would bring.

Hearings start today in Idaho Falls on the draft environmental impact statement for the SIS. The hearings continue Saturday in Boise and Monday in Twin Falls. More than 850 people have signed up to testify.

"The draft EIS is totally misleading," Dan Riecher, attorney for the Natural Resources Defense Council, said at a press conference in Boise Friday sponsored by the Snake River Alliance.

He passed around a disclaimer contained on the EIS, which said the government doesn't assume any liability for the statement and that opinions expressed aren't necessarily those of the federal government.

Riecher accused the DOE of claiming the SIS is necessary on the one hand, and on the other saying, "But don't blame us if we're wrong, and these aren't our opinions anyway."

Thomas Cochran, a physicist with the Natural Resources Defense Council, said the SIS, which would refine weapons-grade plutonium, is unces-

sary because of a reduction in nuclear weapons.

He cited comments by Energy Secretary John Herrington that the U.S. is "awash in plutonium."

"If we're awash in plutonium today, we're going to drown in it tomorrow," Cochran said.

David Allbright, senior staff scientist for the Federation of American Scientists, agreed. "We're entering an era of arms control."

If the SIS were approved, "the simple truth is the SIS plant could be canceled" later, he said.

Skoro disputed the DOE's contention that the SIS would have a great financial impact on the state.

He said the 440 jobs created at the site wouldn't go to Idahoans. "We don't have a lot of out of work nuclear engineers."

And he contended that more than 300 spinoff jobs would be service oriented and therefore low paying.

Skoro said an accident could threaten Idaho's agriculture and tourism industries, thus having a disastrous economic impact on the state.

In southeastern Idaho, Life-Guard Southeast Idaho spokeswoman Beatrice Brailford said long, crowded sessions could discourage people from attending.

"We're facing a seriously over-crowded hearing," she said.

Liz Paul, spokeswoman for Snake River Alliance, said earlier Friday that "people will be discouraged from even attending the hearings because of the sheer mechanics. The hours will be long and the rooms crowded."

Woman faces abandonment charge

EMMETT (AP) — A Caldwell woman accused of leaving her newborn baby at an Emmett hospital has been charged with desertion of a child with the intent to abandon it.

Kathryn Wilson, 39, was arraigned in Gem County court Wednesday, said County Prosecutor Bry Behrmann.

A woman who called herself

"Kathryn Mathews" gave birth to a girl Friday at Walter Knox Memorial Hospital, officials said. She left the facility Saturday, saying she wanted to get some clothes, and failed to return.

A preliminary hearing was set for April 13. Ms. Wilson was released on her own recognizance.

Behrmann said the maximum penalty for desertion is a \$500 fine and 14 years in prison.

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K-St. Wildcats hope Boilermakers look past them tonight

PONTIAC, Mich. - A loss to No. 3 Purdue in Friday night's Midwest Regional semifinals would end the season for the 20th-ranked Wildcats of Kansas State.

It was a 29-point loss to Purdue in December, however, that turned things around this season for Kansas State.

"That was the low point of our season," Kansas State Coach Lon Krueger said Thursday of the 101-72 loss that dropped the Wildcats to 5-3 after they opened the season with five consecutive victories. "We went in struggling and searching for an identity. That loss drove home the point that we couldn't compete against the best in the country with our philosophy of pressing and running."

Krueger and his staff headed back



to the drawing board and came up with a patient offense centered around 6-foot-5 Mitch Richmond, who led the team with a 22.8 scoring average.

So it will be a different pack of Wildcats, 24-8, that meets top-seeded Purdue, 29-3, after Kansas, 23-11, goes against Vanderbilt, 20-10.

"We caught them at a low time," Purdue Coach Gene Keady said Thursday. "That was their third straight loss and they were deciding who to play. It was the turning-point of their season."

Keady was also quick to point out that his team isn't the same as the one that beat fourth-seeded Kansas State

easily. "We have improved in some areas as well," he said. "Our free throw shooting has gotten better, as has our rebounding - and half-court - defense, and our bench is stronger. We're more confident and believe if we get the ball inside we can play with anybody in the country."

Senior forward Todd Mitchell agrees with Keady.

"We're a better team than when we beat them," said Mitchell, who is second on the team in scoring at 16.8 and leads in rebounding at 5.7. "We've done a lot to improve ourselves. People thought we couldn't get past the early rounds."

The first and second rounds of the NCAA Tournament were Purdue's stumbling blocks in each of the past five seasons under Keady. Victories over Fairleigh Dickinson and Memphis State ended that streak.

"People said we haven't played well in tournaments and some never thought we'd be here," said guard Troy Lewis, the Boilermakers' leading scorer at 17.8. "Now we have an opportunity for a special type season."

So does Kansas - if it can beat Vanderbilt and 7-0 center Will Perdue.

Jayhawks Coach Larry Brown also has a specific game to point to for his team's turnaround, and it was against Kansas State.

"They came in and beat us to snap our 56-game winning streak at home and I felt we turned the corner," Brown said of the 72-61 loss that dropped Kansas to 12-7 overall and 1-3 in the Big Eight. "We made some lineup changes and I felt good about that would happen. I felt good about the way the kids responded to each other and I wasn't worrying about wins and losses. They would take care

of themselves."

The sixth-seeded Jayhawks had used 12 different lineups because of injuries and academic problems but the one constant through it all was All-American Danny Manning.

"We have a bunch of kids who play well together and play hard and one phenomenal player in Danny and that's why we're here," Brown said.

Manning averaged 24.4 points and 8.9 rebounds in earning his second straight berth on the All-American team.

Vanderbilt Coach C.M. Newton knows his Commodores will have to neutralize Manning.

"Danny Manning is a great, great player. Not a great player but a great player," Newton said. "Great players are going to get theirs. You're not going to shut out a Danny Manning. We just can't let the others get theirs."

Newton said he would use zone and man-to-man defenses to try to contain Manning, who will guard Purdue.

"I have to try to keep my body between him and the goal and he can still shoot over you," Manning said. "Will's also a good passer and Vanderbilt can score from the inside and outside."

The Commodores, at No. 7 the lowest seed still alive in the region, scored from the outside last Sunday to beat Pittsburgh and advance to the round of 16.

"I do believe some of the momentum will carry over from the overtime," said Barry Goheen, who hit the 3-pointer against Pittsburgh that forced the extra session. "It's hard to say, but I think it will be to our advantage. We're on a roll right now."

"At the start of the second half, we were playing like we were waiting for something to happen instead of making something happen," Duke Coach Mike Krzyzewski said. "But we played winning basketball the last 10 minutes. We made a lot of good decisions."

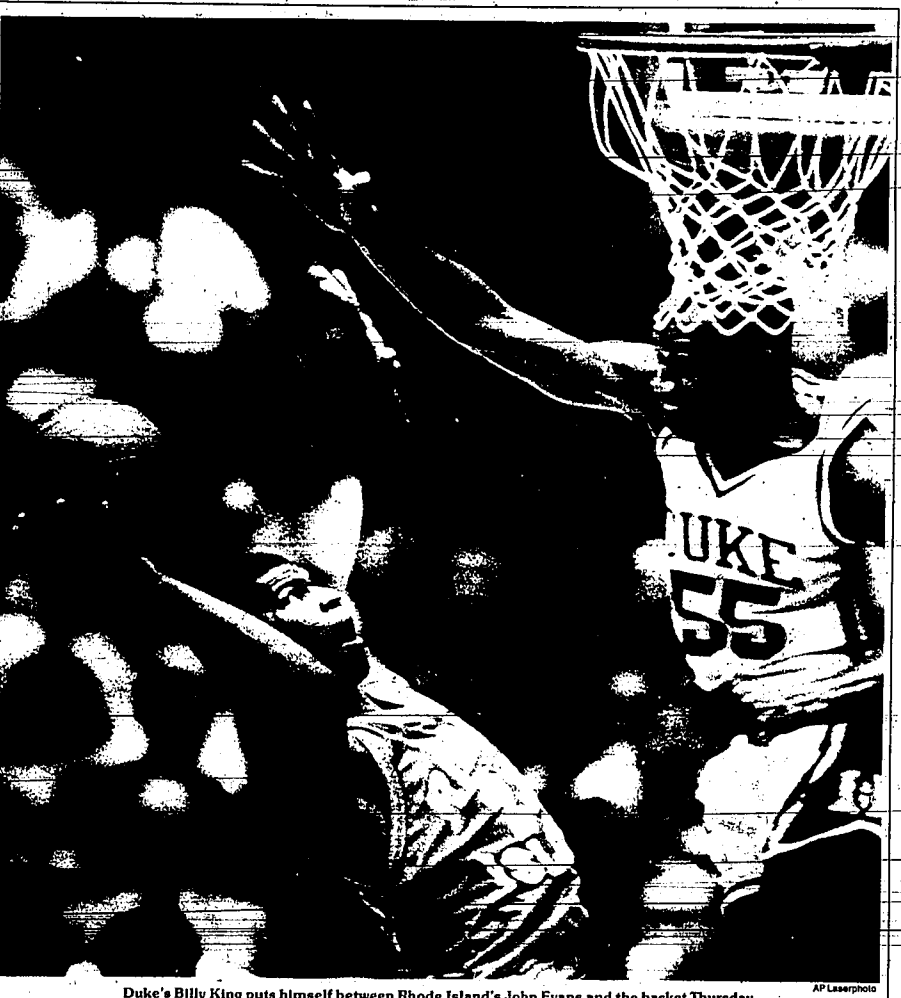
"This team isn't Danny Ferry and four clowns," Rams coach Tom Penders said of Duke. "They proved that tonight."

Second-ranked Arizona ready to meet the press tonight

SEATTLE (AP) - Arizona Coach Lute Olson says his second-ranked Wildcats will not try to force anything against Iowa's full-court press Friday night in their NCAA West Regional semifinal game.

"If you have the numbers (2-on-1, 3-on-2), you take advantage of the press," Olson said. "If not, you bring it out and play a half-court game. We won't try to break the press 3-on-3 unless it's the right three."

Arizona, 33-2, has been installed as a 7 1/2-point favorite against Iowa, 24-9, in a game that starts 30 mi-



minutes after the finish of the first semifinal game in the Kingdom.

North Carolina (26-6) and Michigan (26-7) play at 5:10 p.m. PST, with North Carolina favored by 1 point.

The winners meet in the Kingdom Sunday at 1:03 p.m. for the right to go to the Final Four in Kansas City. Olson, in his fifth season at Arizona,

said the Wildcats have to play smart to beat Iowa a second time. His Pacific-10 Conference champions beat Iowa in Iowa City in December.

Olson said Arizona's job is to make Iowa beat the Wildcats with something besides their strengths.

"Our players have to hold their feet. We can't be jumping into the air and leaving our feet on every fake and let them draw us into fouls," he said.

A lot of the Wildcats' on-court cool comes from guard Steve Kerr, who was ready to walk on at Cal State Fullerton when Olson offered him a

scholarship.

"It's unbelievable to look back and think about how things were back then," said Kerr. "I was just lucky. Coach Olson needed a couple of extra bodies. He took a chance on me and I'm just lucky the program was down at the time."

Iowa beat Nevada-Las Vegas 104-86 last Sunday to get to Seattle, the 15th time the Hawkeyes have

scored 100 or more points this season, a school record.

"It hasn't been a steady progression," said Iowa Coach Tom

Davis. "I thought we continued to improve on through December and into January going through a pretty tough part of our schedule. I thought we were really coming along in our half-court offense and defense."

Davis said his team then regressed after starting forward Al Lorenzen was sidelined by a back problem. He had to shuffle his lineup, moving Bill Jones from guard to forward and moving sixth-man Jeff Moe into a starting guard spot.

"Now, we're really continuing to improve again," he said. "I don't think

there's any question we ran into a little valley. I hope we haven't seen our peak. I hope the Las Vegas game isn't as high as we can be. But it may have been because it was such a terrific effort by all the players."

Arizona played deliberately in the game at Iowa City, but Davis said he expects the Wildcats to go at a faster pace at least part of the time Friday night.

"I would guess they'll try to play at both speeds," he said. "They can play a slowdown, but they also can run with the ball."

RANCHO SANTA FE, Calif. (AP) - Quarterback Dan Fouts, who directed San Diego's record-setting offense of the late 1970s and early 1980s, retired Thursday, saying his body could no longer take the battering of another football season.

"After 15 years, this body has taken about as many hits as it can," Fouts said in a news conference at his Rancho Santa Fe estate, about 20 miles north of San Diego. "It's just time for

me to move on to a new phase in my life. I feel fortunate that I have my health intact, that I have all my teeth, and that I have a few yet-unscrambled brain cells. Really, that's the way I want to go through the rest of my life. I want to enjoy it and I believe I will."

Fouts said his decision to retire was a mutual one by him and club officials. At no time was he pressured

into leaving, adding that he did not consider going to another team.

Fouts acknowledged there had been differences at times between him and some club officials, including owner Alex Spanos. But asked if he held any grudges, Fouts said, "No, there really aren't any. If I harbored ill feelings over everything that happened in the last 15 years, I'd be a wreck."

"I'm very happy with the decision, and looking forward to moving on."

The club reportedly reached a contract buyout agreement with Fouts last November in which the six-time Pro Bowler gave up all contractual guarantees beyond 1987 in return for an undisclosed bonus. 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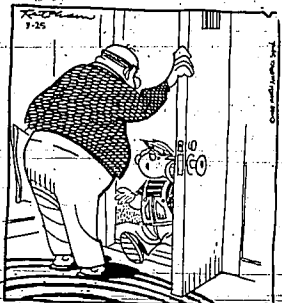

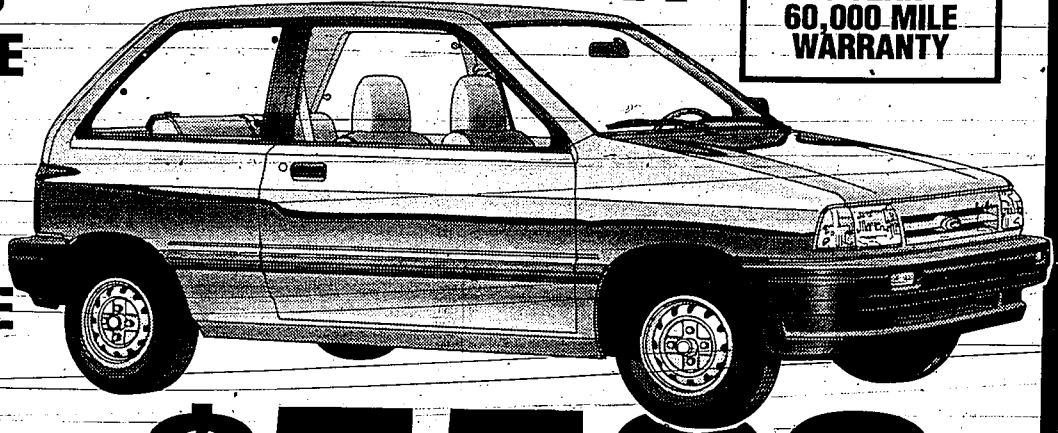

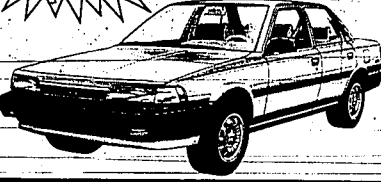

Unless South's club nine is a false card, a club return is dangerous because it will offer South a ruff and discard. A diamond shift seems hopeless, so the choice boils down to a safe trump or the more dangerous shift to hearts. Woodley East chose to return a "safe" trump. South won happily, drew another round and then attacked diamonds. The defenders took only three tricks, and South made his unmakeable game.

Let's go back to trick two. If West has a trump trick, the game will always fall. However, if West has the heart queen (more likely), then it's imperative for East to shift to hearts before South can take discards on dummy's diamonds. Therefore, East should shift to hearts after winning his club king. Ace and another establishes his heart jack, and he gets to cash it when he wins his diamond ace.

Actors feel part of bigger picture Play prompts thoughtful questions

TWIN FALLS — "No Christian wants to believe, he would deny Christ. But as I take on this role of Peter and stand beside a real fire with real people asking me if I know this man who is in so much trouble, I can see how easily it could happen."

Stan Backus of Twin Falls, who plays the role of the brazen and oh-so-human fisherman in Community Christian Church's presentation of "The Last Days of Jesus," says these words with a sad shake of his head. With his dark beard and dynamic voice, he is a believable Peter.

Some of his fellow actors, sitting around a small table inside the bright church, nod in silent understanding as they warm themselves after a chilling rehearsal in a biting Magic Valley wind.

Members of this church take on key historic roles for the second year running as they again present the re-enactment of the events of Easter in a three-part passion play.

Last night was the last supper and Garden of Gethsemane experience, this evening at 7 p.m. is the trial and crucifixion; and Easter morning at 7 a.m. is the resurrection account. All scenes take place at the church, located on Grandview Drive S. in Twin Falls.

The participants find that living the story is a humbling and moving experience — one that makes their own Christian commitment more personal and satisfying.

"When I see him (Fred Cogburn, who portrays Christ) on the cross, I imagine that he really is my son. How awful to see him in agony and suffering," says Ardean Duffel of Twin Falls, who takes on the role of Mary, the mother of Christ.

Duffel, and the rest of the cast, however, have access to information that the original participants did not. They know how the story ends and the impact it has had on the history of the world. They feel it is their privilege to relive the tragic and triumphant events and to share them with the audience — a special form of outreach to the community.

The cast says they gain as much from the audience as they give. Watching as the spectators are caught up in the story, their own roles become even more real to them.

"Last year as I was hanging on the cross, a young girl right below me just started crying uncontrollably. I really focused on her and it made my own role stronger," says Cogburn, also of Twin Falls, who indeed has an imposing part.

For this soft-spoken, gentle man, playing Christ for the second year is humbling and sobering; a role he feels ill-equipped to play. He says all he can focus on is the human angle — the pain and the rejection. He takes experiences of both from his own life and multiplies them hundred fold.

All the actors speak of unforeseen events that occurred last year and will undoubtedly happen again — little quirks that make the play more believable: Jesus spilling a goblet of wine and being reassured by one of the disciples... a makeshift crown of thorns that slipped down over the condemned Messiah's eye, smearing make-up so that the tragic face appeared bruised... unrehearsed dialogue that flowed beautifully in ad-lib scenes.

"You really have the feeling that you're taking part in something so much larger than you are," says Joel Stith, the director of the play and minister of the congregation.

"Everything seems to work together for a purpose," he says.

The cast has devoted many evening hours of rehearsal to the three-part play that they are offering free of charge to the public. They feel it's a moving re-enactment and want to involve and touch all those who attend.

"As Mary Magdalene, I am one of the first to see the empty tomb and tell the news," says Vicki Cogburn of her role in the Easter morning portion of the play.

"Last year I just grabbed this man in the audience and kept crying. He's alive! He's alive. He's risen from the dead! The look of shock on his face was wonderful. It really is a pretty shocking but special story," she adds.

"The others again nod in silent agreement as they pick up coats and kids and get ready to load up in cars that take them back to reality.

In the darkness below the raised figures, taunts and jeers pierce the night air. "What say you now, you king?" "If you are the Christ, come down from that cross."

"He saved others. Can't he save himself?"

Earlier this week, members of the Community Christian Church put the final touches on this particular portion of the passion play that they will present for the community tonight.

The trial, conviction and crucifixion of Jesus will be re-acted beginning at 7 p.m. in the parking lot of the building, located on Grandview Drive S. in Twin Falls.

The cast members present huddle together in the brisk air, praying it will be a bit warmer for the actual costumed performance.

Whatever the weather this evening, it will be easy to suspend reality. A large cement staircase becomes a raised

Roman courtyard on which Christ faces his angry fellow Jews and Pilate, the Roman governor for the troubled district.

A rutted gravel parking lot melts into the teeming streets of Jerusalem as the Messiah stumbles through them on his way to be crucified.

Three large crosses, constructed of fence poles and cemented into the ground behind the church, easily take on the feeling of Golgotha, a hill outside Jerusalem whose Hebrew name translates, "The Skull." One will hardly see the tiny platforms on each that support Christ and the two thieves. Torturous noise will be easily imagined.

Joel Stith, minister at Community Christian

and director of the three-portion play, invites the community to join his congregation in this moving real portrayal of Christ's last moments that is being offered to the public free of charge.

In the tradition of all passion plays, it seeks to capture the audience visually and emotionally as spectators become part of the re-enactment of a tragic real-life drama, which Christians feel changed the course of human history nearly 2000 years ago.

"It's one thing to see a picture in the Bible, and quite another to be that picture," says Fred Cogburn of Twin Falls who will be playing the part of Jesus for the second year running.

The church offered this production to the community last year for the first time, building permanent props like the crosses and a tomb, which have now become a part of the grounds. They hope to make this an annual event, increasing their outreach every year, and even involving members from other interested churches.

"There's no production of the passion play in the Northwest," says Stith, who has written many of the dialogue portions of the script.

Stith says productions in those areas are actually tourist events, and fantasizes about the possibility of making that work in our area.

"Can you imagine how exciting it would be to get the whole Christian community of a town working on something like this? We have 9½ acres out here. Who knows what we could do?"

Before the production in Twin Falls last year, Stith presented a similar play in The Dalles, Ore., for five years running, saying it became the "Easter Event" for that town.

The Community Christian Church calls its passion play "The Last Days of Jesus," and has broken the production into three parts.

Last night was the re-telling of the last supper and the betrayal of Christ in the Garden of Gethsemane. Tonight's production will center

on the trial and crucifixion and on Easter Sunday at 7 a.m., interested persons can watch for the resurrection re-enactment complete with an empty tomb.

Jim Evans of Heritage Alliance will be the featured speaker that morning, and a continental breakfast will be served.

Stith says he wanted to do the first two segments this week rather than during Holy Week, when they historically take place, because he didn't want to interfere with other churches' traditions.

A banker, employees of Layne Pump and Action Express, a funeral chapel office manager, children, teens and restless animals will all try to convey to you the emotions of days long past. In turn, the audience is asked to come in fitting costumes of the time and become part of the production.

Passion plays are for the common man. Performed in Middle Age Europe by villagers and townfolk, they became a living Bible for the uneducated who were unable to read, and by participating in the drama, audiences became convinced that the sacrifice of Christ was made for all time — for all men.

The 30-odd cast members of this Twin Falls production feel the play strengthens their own Christian faith as they live out the key roles and react to the audience.

O'Neill 100th renews dramatic interest

"Long Day's Journey Into Night," "A Moon for the Misbegotten," "Desire Under the Elms," "Mourning Becomes Electra" — the dark, haunting titles of four of his most famous plays proclaim that Eugene O'Neill was possessed by more than a touch of the poet.

Listen to his alter ego, young Edmund Tyrone, at the climax of "Long Day's Journey":

"I lay in the bowprit, facing stern, with the water foaming into swine under me, the masts with every white sail in the moonlight, towering above me. I became drunk with the beauty and the singing rhythm of it, and for a moment I lost myself — actually lost

my life; I was set free!"

In his dedication to his greatest play, wracked from his tormented memories during his final illness, O'Neill wrote to his wife, Charlotte Monterey: "Dearest: I give you the original script of this play of old sorrow, written in tears and blood."

For Eugene O'Neill this was no pseudo-poetic hyperbole. He unconsciously poured himself into his writing as no American playwright did before, or has since. His passion, and his fascination with the secrets of human relations — man and woman, father and son, son and mother, brother and brother — sometimes drove him far beyond the limits of credible sensibility. His flights of jagged-jangling speech can ring awkward today. Yet no other poet of the

American theater approaches his power or rivals his devotion to returning the stage to the heaven-and-earth, man-and-god mysteries of the Greeks.

After almost single-handedly lifting the American theater into the modern era and into the realm of respected art, and winning a Nobel Prize for literature in 1936 and four Pulitzer Prizes for drama, he suffered a decline in reputation as he weakened in late middle age. But as the 100th anniversary of his birth draws near, the first great native playwright has no real rivals. Eugene O'Neill remains America's greatest dramatist.

It would be useless to argue over whether "Long Day's Journey Into Night," indisputably O'Neill's masterpiece, is the greatest American play.

Certainly Tennessee Williams' "The Glass Menagerie" and Arthur Miller's "Death of a Salesman" have assumed classic status, too — although neither ascends to the tragic heights of O'Neill's poetic, funny, searing autobiographical account of his father, mother and older brother on one long day and night in their drab New London, Conn., cottage.

But in the '70s and '80s, O'Neill has proven an international favorite, with more plays in the performing repertory than either Miller or Williams. After Fredric March created the role of the miserly James Tyrone in "Long Day's Journey," Laurence Olivier, Ralph Richardson, Jack Lemmon and many other splendid actors undertook this modern Lear.

Jim Evans of Heritage Alliance will be the featured speaker that morning, and a continental breakfast will be served.

Stith says he wanted to do the first two segments this week rather than during Holy Week, when they historically take place, because he didn't want to interfere with other churches' traditions.

A banker, employees of Layne Pump and Actor Express, a funeral chapel office manager, children, teens and restless animals will all try to convey to you the emotions of days long past. In turn, the audience is asked to wear fitting costumes of the time and become part of the production.

Passion plays are for the common man. Performed in Middle Age Europe by villagers and townfolk, they became a living Bible for the uneducated who were unable to read, and by participating in the drama, audiences became convinced that the sacrifice of Christ was made for all time — for all men.

The 30-odd cast members of this Twin Falls production feel the play strengthens their own Christian faith as they live out the key roles and react to the audience.

O'Neill 100th renews dramatic interest

"Long Day's Journey Into Night," "A Moon for the Misbegotten," "Desire Under the Elms," "Mourning Becomes Electra" — the dark, haunting titles of four of his most famous plays proclaim that Eugene O'Neill was possessed by more than a touch of the poet.

Listen to his alter ego, young Edmund Tyrone, at the climax of "Long Day's Journey": "I lay in the bowprit, facing astern, with the water foaming into spume under me, the masts with every white sail in the moonlight, towering above me. I became drunk with the beauty and the singing rhythm of it, and for a moment I lost myself — actually, lost

my life. I was set free!" In his dedication to his greatest play, wrenched from his tormented memories during his final illness, O'Neill wrote to his wife, Carlotta Monterey: "Dearest: I give you the original script of this play of old sorrow, written in tears and blood."

For Eugene O'Neill this was no pseudo-poetic hyperbole. He unreservedly poured himself into his writing as no American playwright did before, or has since. His passion and his fascination with the secrets of human relations — man and woman, father and son, son and mother, brother and brother — sometimes drove him far beyond the limits of credible sensibility. His flights of jargon-jangling speech "can ring awkward today. Yet no other poet of the

American theater approaches his power or rivals his devotion to returning the stage to the heaven-and-Earth, man-and-god mysteries of the Greeks.

After almost single-handedly lifting the American theater into the modern era and into the realm of respected art, and winning a Nobel Prize for literature in 1936 and four Pulitzer Prizes for drama, he suffered a decline in reputation as he weakened in late middle age. But as the 100th anniversary of his birth draws near, the first great native playwright has no real rivals. Eugene O'Neill remains America's greatest dramatist.

It would be useless to argue over whether "Long Day's Journey Into Night," indisputably O'Neill's masterpiece, is the greatest American play.

Certainly Tennessee Williams' "The Glass Menagerie" or Arthur Miller's "Death of a Salesman" have assumed classic status, too — although neither ascends to the tragic heights of O'Neill's poetic, funny, searing autobiographical account of his father, mother and older brother on one long day and night in their drab New London, Conn., cottage.

But in the 70s and '80s, O'Neill has proven an international favorite, with more plays in the performing repertory than either Miller or Williams. After Fredric March created the role of the misty James Tyrone in "Long Day's Journey," Laurence Olivier, Ralph Richardson, Jack Lemmon and many other splendid actors undertook this modern Lear.

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SLC sculptor offers anti-nuclear art

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Making and selling Anti-Nuclear War Heads to people around the world was a natural outgrowth of his loving nature, says the sculptor—who believes they could help bring universal peace.

In an artist's cooperative which has survived 13 years on the city's industrial-residential-west side, Jim Piercy discusses his Utopia — a world free of the threat of nuclear war — and why he thinks his creations help. "Obviously, they're not bombs, but the products of nuclear bombs," says Piercy, nervously pushing wild hair away from his glasses.

The Anti-Nuclear War Head is a four-inch-tall ceramic sculpture with a mirror-like black finish. The exaggerated shape of the head resembles a mushroom cloud, representing potential annihilation, yet its skyward look signifies hope, Piercy suggests.

A peace activist, Piercy has sent heads to Mikhail Gorbachev and to astronomer-writer Carl Sagan. He has smashed them in the sand at the Nevada Test Site and has passed them out free to strangers in New York's Central Park.

The head he sent Sagan had a black finish; but was sprinkled with hundreds of tiny, brilliant stars.

"The head symbolizes the human struggle to cope with the bomb. Each of us must come to grips with this issue in our lives, and world leaders must prove the human equation can survive EMC2," Piercy said.

In a letter to the Soviet ambassador, Piercy wrote that his father was able to see the flash of above-ground nuclear tests during the 1950s.

"These tales have caused me great concern and have influenced my work as an artist," he said, adding that there are 50,000 nuclear warheads poised to destroy humanity.

"My plan is to make 50,000 Anti-

Nuclear War Heads as a symbolic gesture that disarmament must become a reality. I hope people who see the heads turned toward the listening sky will feel inspired to work for peace," Piercy said while putting the finishing touches on a rattlesnake sculpture.

Unusually, he acknowledges even peace activists must make a living. Southwestern art, rattlesnakes, cactus, silver-dollar belt buckles and the lot, sell better than political statements.

Piercy said he plans go to the Soviet Union with clay he mined from Utah and produce the sculptures for residents there.

"When I come back I'll bring clay from Russia and make them for American citizens," he said.

Educated at a private Catholic high school and at the University of Utah in Salt Lake City, Piercy's course of study and religious beliefs obviously influenced his pacifist position.

College work was in the left-brain pursuit of business, philosophy, and

linguistic courses; balanced by a healthy dose of right-brain work as an assistant-to-Massachusetts-artist James Forsberg, and two years teaching art in a small academy outside Seville, Spain.

His art, which has been exhibited in Spain, Germany and across the U.S., ranges from the easily-saleable western motif to paintings in several media, to his heads.

His Catholicism, he says, sent him the message to work for peace, something which ultimately led to the making of the War Heads.

"At age six or seven I knew people who expected we'd be involved in a nuclear war, but I really didn't know what it meant. As I got older and started to understand, I became frightened and wanted to do what I could to convince people to stop the madness," he said.

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'Cezanne Treasure' displays drawings that were picture-making rehearsals

NEW YORK — First, there were Picasso's sketches. Now there are Cezanne's.
The show of 114 Cezanne drawings, at the Museum of Modern Art through June 5, doesn't quite have the demonic drive of the startling exhibition of Picasso sketches that filled the Pace Gallery to bursting in 1986. But on its own terms, this show ultimately supports its title: It is, we can agree, "a Cezanne Treasure," with its own jewel-like quality. What it gives us, in place of Picasso's all-devouring hunger, is an analytical mind of a genius, a mind whose probing into the

basis of structure and form helped pave the way for Picasso's Cubism.
On loan from the Kunstnuseum in Basel, these drawings are culled from the Swiss museum's larger collection, 162 sheets in all, removed from five Cezanne sketchbooks. The drawings cover virtually the artist's entire career. There are youthful renderings that surge with a barely contained erotic tension, images of savagery and murder, quiet, frowning glimpses of family life, and mature works of a remarkable economy of line, executed around the turn of the century. And they include all his major themes: figures — and still lifes, landscapes (though surprisingly few of these) and

some pencil portraits whose acumen is initially surprising, since they are actually copies of art, modeled on Renaissance, Baroque and classical sculpture.
Though few of the drawings seem to have been "dashed off" — the multiple lines and reworkings of the images suggest the concerted effort that went into their creation — they have the freshness and immediacy that are among the great attributes of the medium. They come complete with spots and stains, and even, in at least one instance, a shopping list — Cezanne reminding himself, on a page that includes a drawing of a head and one of a bath, that he's out of pigments

and listing the colors he needs to buy. And though their charms are diverse, very few of those drawings will lead to that pleasing rush of connections we make when we recognize, in their early form, the elements of a great painting; but then, most of Cezanne's drawings were never intended as studies for a later work but are visual experiments meant to stand on their own.
There is a relationship of a sort to Cezanne's paintings; but it's a complex one.
Eventually, as we walk through the show, we come to sense a continuity of structure between Cezanne's drawings and his paintings.

O'Neill's plays carried array of stars to success

Hepburn's superb performance as the morphine-addicted, guilt-haunted Mary Tyrone is a key reason for the success of "Long Day's Journey Into Night." She gets especially strong support from Ralph Richardson as the miserly father and Robards as the gifted, self-destructive older brother.
Robson, who energizes "The Emperor Jones," is at the top of the list of powerhouse performers in O'Neill films.
The sometimes moving, sometimes ludicrous 1932 film portrays a railroad porter's transformation from limbo hustler to emperor of an exotic island.
Perkins belongs near the very bottom of the list for his laughably anemic love scenes with Loren in "Desire Under the Elms" in 1958.

Neil Simon's "Brighton Beach Memoirs" and "Biloxi Blues."
But other plays in the O'Neill canon have shown their powers to achieve new life on the stage. A truncated "Strange Interlude" with Glenda Jackson became the hottest ticket of the spring two seasons back on Broadway. And although Robards' return in "The Iceman Cometh," the play that made his reputation, had only a short run last season, Quintero's production won wide acclaim.
There are other O'Neill plays that have been revived, more or less successfully, within the last two decades after Quintero, Robards and Dewhurst helped to bring about O'Neill's re-emergence in the mid-'60s. Liv Ullmann did "Anna Christie" on Broadway in 1977. "Mourning Becomes Electra" was successfully revived by the Circle in the Square in 1972, and a year earlier at the American Shakespeare Theatre in Stratford.
Perhaps the finest realization of "A Touch of the Poet" brought Robards back to Broadway in 1978.

It is a role every ambitious older actor wants to play. And now it is being done in New Haven's Yale Repertory Theatre by Jason Robards, the most powerful O'Neill actor in America. Again, directing the play is Jose Quintero, the director who rescued O'Neill from obscurity in the '50s.
If "Long Day's Journey Into Night" continues to be performed year after year in American theaters and abroad; however, it is not alone. The continuation of its wrenching story, the tragicomic "A Moon for the Misbegotten," has twice played Broadway since its original production there in 1957. In 1947, during the darkest days of the playwright's reputation, a production of it closed out of town. Robards and Colleen Dewhurst, who now plays the mother, Mary, in "Long Day's Journey" at Yale, made it a hit that ran 813 performances in 1973 and was seen by millions on television. And Kate Nelligan undertook the role of Josie Hogan four springs ago, though the run was short-lived.
"Ah, Wilderness!" proves eternally popular, in its original form and its musical version, "Take Me Along."
O'Neill play is "Desire Under the Elms" — although there hasn't been a major New York production since the famous Quintero one with George C. Scott, Rip Torn and Dewhurst in 1963. But "Desire" has been kept burning by America's regional theaters. And it has an international life as well — as is evidenced by Hartford, Conn., Stage Company artistic director Mark Lamos's current assignment to stage it for Moscow's Pushkin Theatre, where it was first mounted in 1928.
The unceasing life in the theater of these plays would also assure O'Neill's reputation as America's most popular serious dramatist (although "Ah, Wilderness!" sometimes comes close in its youthful humor to

ing a deeper interest in the man who seized upon: the ground-breaking works of the great Scandinavians, Strindberg and Ibsen, and forged them into a new American drama. Like many of the works by those playwrights, O'Neill can seem almost unstageable. The fevered visions seem impossible to realize, as in O'Neill's insistent demand that the faces and scenery in "Mourning Becomes Electra" resemble masks, to emphasize the Civil War drama's correspondences to the "Agamemnon" trilogy of Aeschylus.
Yet all the difficulties O'Neill presents make the challenge of staging his plays all the more tempting. In all, he left behind 45 completed plays, plus "More Stately Mansions." The earliest of these are the so-called "lost plays," published without O'Neill's permission in 1950. Most, if not all, are probably better suited to study than to production.
The great late plays will be widely produced in 1988. But the ambitious works produced during the period of O'Neill's greatest popularity in the '20s and '30s, when his plays were published in matching sea-green volumes embossed with his tight signature and a Grecian sweep of wave, provide even more exciting opportunities for the centennial celebration.
Robards recalls with some satisfaction the Lincoln Center 1964 revival of "Marco Millions," which starred the young Hal Holbrook as O'Neill's model for American capitalism. As O'Neill's most sumptuous production, it might at last find wide acceptance in this era of theater spectacle if a producer could be found to undertake such a lavish venture.
An American "Strange Interlude," played at fuller length and less widely than the English version with the

too-mature, Jackson, also seems an idea whose time has come: "Long Wharf" John Tillingher has been working on such a project for several years. And a new "Anna Christie" also would be a most intriguing proposition — if the right northern European actress — Hanna Schygulla, perhaps — could be recruited for the part immortalized by Greta Garbo in her first talkie.
Most exciting of all would be a new version of "Mourning Becomes Electra," with its perverse, sexual entanglements and dark theatrical climax.
Obviously, not every play can be restored to life on the stage — even in a centennial year. Yet every O'Neill play generates a strange excitement on the printed page, even when a production seems impossible. "Lazarus Laughed," O'Neill's 1928 drama of Christian miracles and pagan Rome, hasn't been given a major New York revival since 1948. But the final speeches of the emperor Caligula contain electrifying, chilling writing:
"I must have been a little mad, Lazarus. It was one terror too many, to have been laughing your laughter in the night, to have been dreaming great yearning dreams of all the good my love might do for men when I was Caesar — and then to hear the old howling of mob lust, and to run here — and there — a high white flame amidst the fire — you Lazarus, dying!"

'Emperor' dazzles but lacks essential drama

Emly is the head that wears the crown in "The Last Emperor," Bernardo Bertolucci's lavish biography of Pu Yi, the sheltered sovereign who found himself out of work when China became a republic in 1912. Pu Yi's personal tragedy has become Ber-

tolucci's three-hour epic of obscurity; opulently visualized: It's docudrama that dazzles, but basically Pu Yi was a bore.

Based in part on Pu Yi's autobiography, "From Emperor to Citizen," the spectacular spans a 60-year period that saw the end of the Qing Dynasty and the founding of the People's Republic. Here Pu Yi thinks back on his

life as he is re-educated in a Communist prison — a journey from darkness to light, says Bertolucci, from caterpillar in brocade to drab Maoist butterfly.

But Pu Yi is most interesting as a larva — a 3-year-old placed on the Dragon Throne, the sleeves of his imperial robe dragging on the ground. He remains cloistered in the Forbidden

City until his ouster at age 18 by a republican warlord. For a few years, he dallies as a playboy, then returns to China in 1931 as a puppet emperor backed by the Japanese.

The Hong Kong-born John Lone plays the adult Pu Yi, a phlegmatic sort whose personality is reflected in the film's pace, already weighty with grandeur. Lone, an intense, energetic

actor, is dispassionate here by necessity. Pu Yi was an empty vessel, a boy who grew up without rules, a sense of reality or much education. Though forced to abdicate, he remained loyal, like Walter of Windsor. Only he was kept on the palace grounds, hermatically sealed in with 1,600 adoring eunuchs and a slew of courtisans.

Nevertheless, poor Pu Yi was as lonely as the script is bland. Aside from his wet nurse, who suckled him till he was a teen, he had no acquaintances until he got a tutor. That role falls to Peter O'Toole. His is not a grand performance, but at least now there's somebody else on the screen.

Bertolucci, a sensuous Marxist, paints a scene of creepy carnality and corrupted innocence when the knowing, Western-educated Wan Jung covers Pu Yi's pale face with sticky, red Revin kisses. Later, she too will be corrupted by a malevolent Japanese lesbian spy who plies her with opium as she nibbles her toes. This is, after all, a movie by the director of "Last Tango in Paris," who here is giving us an elegant parallel between drugged sexuality and political stupor.

But we need more than elegant parallels and lavish production values: We need tension, characterization, drama. Meticulously composed as it is, "The Last Emperor" is no drama.

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

'Emperor' dazzles but lacks essential drama

Empty is the head that wears the crown in "The Last Emperor," Bernardo Bertolucci's lavish biography of Pu Yi, the sheltered sovereign who found himself out of work when China became a republic in 1912. Pu Yi's personal tragedy has become Ber-

tolucci's three-hour epic of obscurity, opulently visualized. It's docudrama that dazzles, but basically Pu Yi was a bore.

Based in part on Pu Yi's autobiography, "From Emperor to Citizen," the spectacular spans a 60-year period that saw the end of the Qing Dynasty and the founding of the People's Republic. Here Pu Yi thinks back on his

life as he is re-educated in a Communist prison — a journey from darkness to light, says Bertolucci, from caterpillar in brocade to drab Maoist buttonfly.

But Pu Yi is most interesting as a larva — a 3-year-old placed on the Dragon Throne, the sleeves of his imperial robe dragging on the ground. He remains cloistered in the Forbidden

City until his ouster at age 18 by a republican warlord. For a few years, he dallies as a playboy, then returns to China in 1931 as a puppet emperor backed by the Japanese.

The Hong Kong-born John Lone plays the adult Pu Yi, a pligmatic sort whose personality is reflected in the film's pace, already weighty with grandeur. Lone, an intense, energetic

actor, is dispassionate here by necessity. Pu Yi was an empty vessel, a boy who grew up without rules, a sense of reality or much education. Though forced to abdicate, he remained toy royalty, like Walter of Windsor. Only he was kept on the palace grounds hermetically sealed in with 1,500 adoring eunuchs and a slow of courtiers.

Nevertheless, poor Pu Yi was as lonely as the script is bland. Aside from his wet nurse, who suckled him till he was a teen, he had no acquaintances until he got a tutor. That role falls to Peter O'Toole. His is not a grand performance, but at least now there's somebody else on the screen.

Bertolucci, a sensuous Marxist, paints a scene of creepy carnality and corrupted innocence when the knowing Western-educated Wan Jung covers Pu Yi's pale face with sticky, red Bowen kisses. Later, she too will be corrupted by a malevolent Japanese lesbian spy who plies her with opium as she nibbles her toes. This is, after all, a movie by the director of "Last Tango in Paris," who here is giving us an elegant parallel between drugged sexuality and political stupor.

But we need more than elegant parallels and lavish production values. We need tension, characterization, drama. Meticulously composed as it is, "The Last Emperor" is no drama.

'Police Academy 5' #1 at box office

Knocks 'Good Morning, Vietnam' out of top spot by grossing over \$6 million

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Police Academy 5: Assignment Miami Beach," starring the first success of the signed break movies by kicking "Good Morning, Vietnam" out of its long-held No. 1 position in the weekend national box office.

"Police Academy 5" from Warner Bros. earned \$6.1 million at 1,700 screens over the weekend, while Disney-Touchstone's "Good Morning, Vietnam," earned more than \$4 million and fell to second. It held first place for nine weeks.

The latest "Police Academy" movie features the whole wacky crew in Miami for a police convention.

Another debut movie, "D.O.A.," earned third place with \$3.7 million in ticket sales. The debut Disney-Touchstone film stars Dennis Quaid and Meg Ryan in a remake of the 1949 thriller of the same name. Quaid plays a fatally poisoned college professor who has 24 hours to find his killer before he dies.

The arrival of "D.O.A." in the Top 10 list gives Disney-Touchstone four of the films on the list, while MGM-UA and Warner Bros. each have two.

In fourth place was the father-son role switch movie "Vice Versa," which sold \$3 million in tickets, while "Masquerade" about the romance between an heiress and a scheming yachtsman, earned \$2.7 million for fifth place.

Cher's romantic comedy "Moonstruck" earned \$2.7 million for

sixth place. Its writer, John Patrick Shanley, won the Writers' Guild of America's honor for best original screenplay last week. The movie has been nominated for six Academy Awards.

The Tom Selleck-Ted Danson comedy "Three Men and a Cradle" was in seventh place with \$2.1 million, and reached a \$160.6 million cumulative gross that outdistanced the Michael Douglas-Glenn Close thriller "Fatal Attraction," which has earned more than \$149 million in six months of release. "Three Men" earned its gross in just 16 weeks.

"Off Limits," a story about two military undercover officers trying to solve a series of prostitute murders in Saigon during the Vietnam War, earned \$1.5 million.

In ninth place followed Roman Polanski's missing-person thriller "Frantic" with \$1.5 million, followed by Sidney Poitier's crime story "Shoot To Kill," with \$1.4 million.

'Masquerade' offers thrills

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

MASQUERADE (R). This is a sleek romantic thriller, with its every detail of life among the very, very rich — and sometimes famous — ringingly right. "Masquerade" is a densely plotted affair full of twists, but director Bob Swain has saved his strongest ammunition for the role of the gentle, crimping rich heiress who is seduced by a slick ne'er-do-well — and Meg Tilly, playing the part, does not take a false breath. Between them, actress and director build a whole world of wealth and privilege and emotional starvation.

switch brains, with comical "fish out of water" results (What is this: dueling high concepts?). Director Brian Gilbert ("Sharma and Beyond") is a fine new film maker, but he is defeated here by the obvious, shrill gags, standardized story line and the daffy gyrations of Judge Reinhold, who seems to be playing not a transmogrified 11-year-old but a hyperthyroid 8. There are redeeming factors: a crisp production and the surprisingly mature child actor Fred Savage (from "The Princess Bride").

GOOD MORNING, VIETNAM (R). This dramatic comedy based on the 1965 Saigon diary of wildman Armed Forces deejay Adrian Cronauer is mostly failed satire. It clings to the obvious like a drowning man to an anvil, and director (but not writer) Barry Levinson can't summon up the wit or bile of his "Diner," or "Tin Men." But Robin Williams, as Cronauer, saves it; he explodes the center in berserk bursts of electronic age surrealism. Blazing away brilliantly, ad-libbing on camera, Williams is like a man possessed: a Crazy Eddie of showbiz dada. In his improvisations, he hotwires "Vietnam" into realms of quick-witted chaos, gives a fine, freeringly cheery hello and goodbye to the hell of war and the purgatory of radio.

MOONSTRUCK (PG). This is an incredibly nourishing comedy, filled as it is like rigatoni with warmth, cheer and terrific snappy dialogue. As a young widow whose life suddenly changes in an extraordinary full moon from pliant to juicy, Cher finally has a role that lets her comic sensibilities out for a romp. Cage attacks the role of Ronny — the guy Cher really falls for — with a nice balance between unbridled romanticism and tongue-in-cheek seriousness; he is marvelous. Everyone is, yet Olympia Dukakis, as Cher's wise mama, seems to have an extra shovelful of maturity and wisdom that moves her work from authoritative into memorable.

MOVING (R). Not only does this stale sitcom of a picture miss the rich comic possibilities in the ordeal of a long-distance move, it also straitjackets Richard Pryor in a milquetoast role as a suburban husband-and-father.

VICE VERSA (PG). For the second time in six months, a father-and-son

Lincoln: Man not myth — Page 2

Vidal attempts to crack the myth of Lincoln, show his human side

Just as this year's presidential candidates tidy up their television images for the summer campaign, TV is revising the popular image of President Lincoln.

"Gore Vidal's Lincoln," an NBC miniseries airing Sunday, March 27, and Monday, March 28, promises to do what Vidal did in his best-selling historical novel: to dramatize the personal side of Abraham Lincoln, showing him to be a man with the same sort of quirks and contradictions that are so apparent in today's candidates.

"It's a demythologizing, I suppose," says Sam Waterston, who plays Lincoln. "But as such it's part of a long, dignified tradition. There have been demythologizations all along — and Lincoln was quite a demythologizer himself. So how much this changes your view of him will depend on how much of the myth you've absorbed."

That myth was formidable material for Vidal, who has tended to treat American political heroes as caricatures in other historical novels such as "Burr," "1876" and "Empire." In "Lincoln" however, he found a subject that could withstand his native cynicism. The book became Vidal's best-received historical novel and his biggest seller, revealing both the protagonist and the novelist as complex, ultimately admirable figures.

The miniseries only glances at the signal events of Lincoln's presidency. He is shown preparing his Gettysburg Address, for example, but not delivering it. It emphasizes instead his personal life, especially his marriage to Mary Todd (played by Mary Tyler Moore), whose severe, debilitating migraines, rash spending habits and unpredictable behavior gave Lincoln headaches of his own.

"It makes him that much more impressive, when you see that he's wholly human," Waterston says. "It's that much more hopeful for all of us, that by dint of conscience, a highly disciplined mind and a strong sense of

commitment this man could begin where we all begin — with bigotry and prejudice — and end up taking the stand that he did."

Waterston, best known for his portrayal of Vietnam correspondent Sydney Schanberg in "The Killing Fields" (1984), has turned an actor's hat trick of sorts during the past year. He has appeared in the Woody Allen film "September," filmed "Lincoln" in Richmond, Va., and stars in the two-man Broadway play "A Walk in the Woods," in which he plays an American arms negotiator.

The role of Lincoln, he says, came all too naturally to him. "For a long time I had it in the back of my mind that I'd like to play him — I thought it would be good compensation for being tall and thin and having a skinny face," he says. "Then I read the book and very badly wanted to do it."

He speaks highly of every aspect of the miniseries.

"This miniseries is beautifully filmed," he says. "Mary is marvelous; she's taken a very bold step away from what she usually does."

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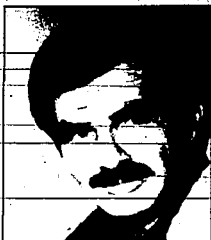
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Burt says he was nearly dropped

The Abbotts, the Newmans and the Chancellors pass the 15-year mark on "The Young and the Restless" this week, scarred but still standing after all the scratching, lovemaking and tribal warfare. Revenge, hate and the burning need for prestige keep the characters cooking.

Colorful Jack Abbott vows to do Victor Newman in after being hoodwinked in a money deal. Jill Abbott loses a man to her old enemy Kay, but will nail Kay in the next round. Young Philip whines because one boozey night with a girl ruined his life.

The new "Y&R" ingredient this spring is the psychotic Leanna Randolph, a troubled woman who hates men yet manages to get involved with three guys: her psychiatrist, Steve Lassiter; Jack Abbott, who plans to use her against Victor; and clever Victor, who's unaware he's flirting with a nut.

Boiling inside after a recent session with Steven, Leanna sneaks into a health club locker-room to confront undressed males. In a fury, she screams at the so-called studs, saying there's nothing more pathetic than the sight of men with their pants down. Then off she trots to drop photos of Jack, Stephen and Victor in boiling water.

Obviously, the writers see a bizarre future in store for the dotty Leanna, played by Barbara Crampton. It's new, demented blood for anniversary line, and a sharp turn from previous Crampton roles, such as "Days of Our Lives" victim Trista Evans.

Slim, blond, blue-eyed Crampton looks so sweet and innocent she must have a screw loose somewhere to stand out. The writers decided to play against her looks. After all, Barbara was a carnival kid traveling the fair circuit with her family, a gypsy who ran her own con game where suckers tried to throw a basketball into a deceptive hoop. It was a wonderful time for a kid, free to roam the grounds with gypsy pals, take all the rides and

NEW YORK — Because shows such as "Dynasty" must tiptoe around sex talk, Aaron Spelling Productions has set its new ABC show "Heartbeat" in a women's clinic, where it can be right out in the open, couched in the glow of healthy openness.

Oh, please, "St. Elsewhere," come back!

Wednesday's two-hour premiere features difficult childbirths, artificial insemination and numerous gynecological exams. To start off, there's an emergency birth that requires forceps and incisions.

Oh, honey, bring in the potato chips!

Kate Mulgrew plays hapless, overworked Dr. Joanne Springsteen, who founded the clinic with Dr. Eve Autry (Laura Johnson, who is married to Larry Hamlin of "L.A. Law"). Ben Masters plays Dr. Leo Rosetti, a pediatrician and object of Joanne's lust.

Ray Baker is psychologist Stan Gorskalk, who counsels the hospital's patients in matters psycho-sexual. In tonight's episode, he confides to another doctor that he and his wife haven't had sex in nine weeks. And the cobbler's children have no shoes.

The show wants to offer up-to-date health information, like tonight's debate over mastectomy vs. lumpectomy in cases of breast cancer. Women's fears are unlikely to be assuaged by Gorskalk's argument that patient Wendy (Kathleen Wilhoite) should be encouraged to face the fact that she very well might die. That should have 'em flocking in for mammograms.

Meanwhile, a couple who can't conceive are advised by the leering "fertility specialist" (Darrell Larson) to go for artificial insemination. After the procedure — yes, we get to be there — the nurse practitioner (Gail Strickland) gently suggests orgasm aids in successful implantation, and leaves the woman in a darkened examination room alone.

In between trying to hit the sheets with Leo, Joanne contends with a

friend who's pursuing a career and can't be bothered with an "incompetent cervix," meaning the baby will be born prematurely if she walks around too much. Joanne saves the day by borrowing a newborn from the nursery to convince the expectant mom she should stay in bed at least until the baby can be safely delivered after the next commercial.

Meanwhile, Eve confronts Wendy's sexist family doctor, who thinks Wendy ought to have a radical mastectomy instead of a lumpectomy. What good is a breast, anyway, says the doc? It's "just a piece of fat." Huffs glamorous Eve-in-her-spandex dress: "So are some of your body parts. Would you like to chop them off and replace them with silly putty?"

Some bad taste seems unintentional: Dr. Cory Banks (Lynn Whitfield) is in a crisis because her husband is off on a building job in Mexico, causing her to remark, "Sometimes I wish that whole construction project would get swallowed up in an earthquake."

With any luck, "Heartbeat" will get swallowed up by bad ratings.

Ratings war

Despite regular shows, CBS expected to rate last for first time ever

NEW YORK — CBS, once nicknamed "the Tiffany network," has found the glitter gone from its prime-time schedule this season and expects to finish last in the Nielsen ratings for the first time in '35 years of record keeping.

Though CBS regularly scheduled prime-time programs are getting better ratings than those of ABC, special sports programs including the Winter Olympics and the Super Bowl carried ABC ahead. The network also had the World Series this season.

In 35 years of A.C. Nielsen Co. television ratings, CBS has finished in first place 26 times. It was second the other nine seasons, including the past two won by NBC.

NBC's victory in 1985-1986 ended a six-year win streak by CBS and marked NBC's first time in first place since the 1950s. NBC predicts it will win this season by the widest margin ever.

NBC leads the other two networks this season with an average prime-time rating of 16.3. ABC is second with a 13.9, and CBS third with 13.6. The rating is a percentage of the nation's 88.6 million households with televisions. CBS would have to beat ABC by two full rating points each of the remaining four weeks of the season to tie for second place. In the most recent Nielsen, CBS was second, but only bested ABC by a third of a rating point.

The ratings are only used by the networks to negotiate the price of advertising, but a third-place finish, even by a small margin, is a blow to a network's prestige.

CBS continues to be in first place in evening news ratings.

ABC won the weekly Nielsen ratings during two full weeks of Winter Olympics last month, and CBS conceded it would finish last after three

new comedies were thrown into the breach without generating big ratings.

Of the new shows, "Trial and Error" finished second to last in the Nielsen rankings, a reprise of "My Sister Sam" was third to last and "Coming of Age" ranked 59th, "Eisenhower & Lutz," which was added to the already strong Monday lineup, only got as high as 31st out of 77 rankings.

CBS has been struggling to improve its ratings with younger audiences: Its highest-rated shows are the 20-year-old newsmagazine "60 Minutes" and the long-running "Murder, She Wrote," both of which are on Sunday. They are ninth and 10th respectively for the season to date.

CBS has three hours of prime-time news programming — "60 Minutes," "48 Hours" and "West 57th" — while ABC has only "20/20" and NBC has none.

Of its shows that are new this season, CBS can count only Friday night's "Beauty and the Beast" as a ratings success. Other new CBS shows, like "Frank's Place," "Tour of Duty" and "Wiseguy," have drawn critical praise but meager audiences.

The executive responsible for the 1987-1988 season schedule, former CBS Entertainment President B. Donald Grant, departed the network mid-season and was replaced by Kim LeMasters, who won't really make his mark on the network's schedule until next season.

Look for a major revamp of the CBS lineup next fall with new comedies due from GTG Entertainment, the production company of former MTM production chief and former NBC Chairman Grant Tinker, who has an exclusive deal with CBS. CBS will also have Mary Tyler Moore back in a comedy and another new show will feature her one-time co-star, Dick Van Dyke.

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A: President Carter was not a prolific signer of autographs when requested by admirers, and often empowered his secretary to sign for him. These autographs are easy to spot and have dubious value to collectors in the market. He also refused to use an Autopen, which was used by so many presidents before him, so most of his personal signing was confined to letters and official documents; hence their worth has soared.

Q: How is that wonderful science-fiction writer Arthur C. Clarke? Has he written anything lately? — G.C.

A: Distinguished sci-fi author Arthur C. Clarke is still going strong, and recently celebrated his 70th birthday. His latest book is "2061: Odyssey Three," out via Ballantine/Del Rey in hardcover. Clarke says, "I'm keeping very busy on four novels, a half-dozen books and two movies — I still have a good chance of seeing what really happens in 2001!"

Q: Little Richard was terrific on the Grammy Awards. He walked away with the show. Is there any chance that a new movie will come his way? — P.Y.

A: The star, whose real name is Richard Penniman, says as a follow-up Friday, March 25, 1988

to "Down and Out in Beverly Hills" of a few seasons back, he'd like to do a mystery. "I want to play a macho detective," says the flamboyant singer. "You know, the kind whose voice is so deep, it sounds like it's coming up from the basement! Now that I'm hot again, my life is on a big up-swing ... the sun is shining on my house, baby, and there's no chance of rain from now on."

Q: What's this about Joan Collins quitting the "Dynasty" TV series? Can that be true? — R.B.

A: For some time, Joan's been telling me that she might bow out for any one of a number of reasons — the working hours are too long, she wants to do other things, etc., etc. As I suspected all along, Joan's primary goal was to extract a sweeter deal from the show's producer.
