Magic Valley residents oppose SIS

Lineup at 6th hearing solidly against project

TWIN FALLS — Some hobbled to the podium on crutches and others cried when they got there.

A minister spoke as did a mother carrying her baby in her arms. A developer drove to Twin Falls from Boise just to testify. And one of the more powerful speeches was delivered by a Twin Falls physician.

The message at the Thursday hearings on the special isotope separation project was unequivocal: They didn't want the SIS, a project to purify plutonium for use in nuclear weapons.

And unlike the hearings here Monday, many of the nearly 50 people who testified at the Canyon Springs Inn were from the Magic Valley.

On Monday, those opposing the project were mainly from the Wood River Valley. Supporters included unions and the chambers of commerce in Twin Falls and Burley.

The U.S. Department of Energy wants to build the \$600 million SIS plant at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory west of Idaho Falls. Thursday's hearing in Twin Falls was the last of six by DOE.

Dr. A.C. Emery, a Twin Falls internist, said when he was in high school and the federal government

was conducting above ground atomic tests, he remembered the assurances that the tests were safe.

He said he didn't think much about it at the time; but eight years later when he was working his way through the University of Utah Medical School he started seeing the victims of the fallout.

Numerous children were brought in car pools from southern Utah with thyroid cancer and leukemia, he said.

The children with thyroid cancer had necks twice their normal size. They were slowly and painfully being strangled to death," Emery said.

There is not a lot of thyroid cancer in children, he said. Eventually, he learned that these were the victims of the atomic tests in southern Utah.

"These children are every bit American heroes as those who died on Normandy beaches," Emery said.

He said the energy department denies responsibility for the illnesses even though the medical evidence is compelling that radioactivity caused their cancer.

Emery said he brought up the cases of the southern Utah children to illustrate the type of people the public is dealing with at these hearings. Energy department officials sat in the front rows and listened without exception.

Legislators come close to balanced budget, head for home

BOISE — After two days of trying, the Idaho Legislature finally approved a package of revenue bills Thursday to nearly balance the next state budget, clearing the way for final adjournment of the 1988 session.

The House adjourned just before 7 p.m. MST and the Senate about 30 minutes after.

The tax package, which included an increase in individual income tax liability for Idahoans, cleared the Senate

by relatively comfortable margins after passing the House with only a handful of votes to spare.

The action on the revenue bill brought anticipated tax receipts within about \$2.4 million of the Republican leadership's 1989 state spending blueprint. Leaders maintained that in a two-thirds of a billion dollar budget a difference of less than one-half of a percentage point is so close that no economist could call the spending plan out of balance.

But Gov. Cecil Andrus, who pressed for a spending plan \$17 million higher at \$793 million, charged that the legislative estimates were overstated

and would only aggravate severe financial problems next year.

Final adjournment of the 81-day-old session was held up following passage of the tax package by a dispute in the Senate over a minor appropriations bill for Andrus. Democrats wanted the House-passed measure taken up but Republicans, who have been battling the governor all session, forced the bill to die.

Democrat C.E. Bilyeu of Postlelone questioned the fair play of the majority but Senate Republican President

Pro-Tem James Risch of Boise said that measure was being treated no different than hundreds of others now dead in committee.

House Speaker Tom Boyd of Genesee conceded he was not totally satisfied with the revenue solution, but Risch called the session a hard-working one that dealt with many issues that received little or no public attention.

The revenue package, put together in a closed-door House Republican caucus early in the day, will freeze the

personal exemption on the state income tax at last year's level of \$1,900 per person. That will mean Idahoans will pay a total of \$1.9 million more in tax on their 1988 income than they were scheduled to. The exemption was to increase to \$1,950 this year, \$2,000 next year and then be indexed to inflation after that.

The pollution fund raid passed the House on a 44-39 vote and the Senate on a 23-14 vote while the sales tax repeal cleared the House on 43-39 vote and the Senate on a 32-6 vote.

White House tightens dollar flow squeeze

WASHINGTON — The White House announced steps Thursday to encourage American companies to withhold payments from Panama and warned that mandatory action will be considered if the voluntary measures are not sufficient.

The action follows the disclosure that some American firms are paying taxes and fees to Panama for doing business there, undercutting the economic sanctions imposed by the United States to force the ouster of strongman Manuel Antonio Noriega.

On Capitol Hill, meanwhile, the Senate voted 92-1 to approve a resolution urging President Reagan to act at once to cut off the flow of dollars from U.S. corporations to the Noriega regime.

Announcing the new action,

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said the Justice Department will take part in legal cases by private parties who owe debts to Panama, declaring President Eric Delvalle is the legitimate leader of the country. The U.S. Treasury Department will help establish an account for payment of funds in these cases.

Moreover, the Internal Revenue Service will issue guidance explaining how tax credits can be claimed for Panamanian income taxes paid into an account at the Federal Reserve Bank in New York, instead of to the Noriega government.

Panama has received an infusion of an estimated \$19 million in quarterly tax revenues. About \$5.5 million of that money reportedly came from taxes and fees paid by U.S. companies doing business in Panama.

Senate approves Contra aid measure, 87-7

WASHINGTON — The Senate gave lopsided approval Thursday to a \$48 million humanitarian aid bill that would break a one-month drought in the flow of U.S. supplies to Nicaragua's Contra rebels and send medical care to war-injured children.

Approval on an 87-7 vote sent the measure to President Reagan, who has promised to sign it into law.

that rebel fighters can be sustained in the field as they wait for agreement with the leftist Sandinista government on a long-term cease fire and a reconciliation between the two warring sides.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said Reagan, who leaves Washington today for a 10-day vacation, wanted to sign the bill before he leaves. "I would think he would sign it almost immediately after receiving

it," Fitzwater said.

Congress had twice earlier this year rejected aid proposals for the rebels, and their last U.S. support had expired on Feb. 29.

The easy passage of the bill in the Senate, and a day earlier in the House, was made possible by a March 23 accord for a 60-day truce between the Contras and the Managua regime reached after talks in Sapoá, Nicaragua.

Sen. Christopher Dodd, D-Conn., noted that the aid bill fell short of the desires of Contra supporters, who would have preferred to send weapons to the rebels, and also rebuffed rebel opponents who oppose sending any aid.

"This package strikes a balance, and is for the sole purpose of supporting that agreement in Sapoá," Dodd said during a harmonious floor debate on the measure.

Blasting sparks may have ignited fire in Idaho silver mine

KELLOGG — An underground fire that flared at Sunshine Mining Co.'s Kellogg silver mine, the nation's largest, may have been started by sparks from dynamite blasting, officials said Thursday.

At least 16 miners were evacuated where a blaze 16 years ago killed 91 miners, officials said.

Sixty-six miners were evacuated within 30 minutes when the blaze at the 3,100-foot level was reported by a shift supervisor Wednesday night, said Jack Cowley, personnel director for Sunshine's Kellogg operation.

One miner who assisted in the evacuation remained underground for about two hours awaiting emergency aid.

"Smoke was detected, and immediately communications went to crews

to evacuate," said Don Hullinger, human resource manager for Sunshine's precious metals group.

The mine was closed to workers Thursday. The company hoped to reopen once the fire was snuffed, perhaps today.

A team from Central Mine Rescue, the coordinating body of regional mine rescue agencies, descended below and breathing apparatus, went underground and directed piped water into the area where the fire was confined,

said Hullinger. Others served as monitors.

The affected area, or raise, about 200 feet high and 40 feet wide, had been isolated. Smoke was still coming from the area Thursday afternoon, and it was unclear what the fire's status was.

In addition to piping water, mine rescue crews worked to cut off oxygen to suffocate the fire.

While the cause was not immediately known, the fire may have been

started by sparks from dynamite blasting, said Hullinger.

He said shift workers had set off sticks of dynamite powder to loosen a plug in an ore chute, and left over sparks may have fallen on wood lining the chute.

The 3,100 level in the Sunshine Mine is the mile-long main ore haulage tunnel. The tunnel runs on a shaft and the Jewel Shaft, which is connected to the surface.

In hard rock mines as found in Idaho's Silver Valley, fires usually are confined to the timber used to support ground openings such as tunnels — or drifts and crosscuts in mining terminology — and timbered ore chutes.

The mine, which reaches depths as much as 6,600 feet below ground, was the site of a fire on May 2, 1972, that ignited in a duct at the 3,400-foot level. Ninety-nine miners died from carbon monoxide poisoning in the Northwest's worst mining disaster.

Senate upholds Andrus veto of exemption for tax transfer

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus has seen his veto of a sales tax exemption for internal property transfers upheld by the Senate's Democratic minority.

The Republican-dominated House voted 60-21 Thursday to override the veto only hours after the governor returned the bill, warning it would just aggravate the state's current budget crisis.

But in one of the last acts of the session, Senate Republicans fell two votes short of the two-thirds majority needed to override. The 26-16 vote saw Ralph Lacey of Pocatello as the only Democrat to abandon the governor. Republican Rod Beck of Boise was absent.

The bill attempted to clarify that property



transferred between entities with common ownership would not be subject to the state's 5 percent sales tax.

Ten Democratic legislators in the Senate supported the bill originally. Floor Leader Bruce Sweeney of Lewiston said Thursday he now believed it was drawn to loosely, agreeing with

Andrus about its potential financial impact.

"Due to the increasing uncertainty surrounding the state of Idaho's budgetary and revenue situation," Andrus said in his veto message, "I must conclude that now is simply not the time to enact into law measures that further erode the state's revenue base."

It was the seventh time this session the governor has vetoed legislation.

He maintained the bill could cost the state some \$1 million annually at a time when lawmakers continue struggling to balance their modest 1989 state spending blueprint. But when the bill was considered by the Legislature, analysts said the revenue impact was uncertain. They said it could be negligible

ranging up to as much as \$100,000 a year.

They also questioned how successful the state Tax Commission could be in forcing payment of sales tax on such internal transactions.

The commission began trying to collect taxes on these transactions about 18 months ago, but so far all attempts have been challenged in court.

Supporters of the bill, which passed the House overwhelmingly and the Senate unanimously, maintained that it would be improper to collect sales tax on the original purchase of an item and then try to collect a second sales tax payment when that item is transferred internally — from an individual to his corporation or partnership, for example.

The bill, they said, recognizes that collection of sales or use tax is not appropriate when property is taken out of the right-pocket and put into the left.

The governor's veto came as Republican legislative leaders completed action on a combination of revenue bills to balance their much-criticized \$686 million budget.

"The need to balance the state budget must be taken into account before action is taken to further deplete revenue," Andrus said.

The financial calculations being used as a basis for the final legislative action on revenue did not reflect any economic impact from the bill Andrus vetoed.

Contractor licensing law goes down by single House vote

BOISE (AP) — Most legislators acknowledge few votes generally are changed in even the longest, most emotional debates.

It may have happened in the Idaho House on Thursday, as opponents of a contractor licensing bill carried the day by a single vote after much emotional debate and after losing earlier decisions.

The House voted 42-41 against legislation sponsored by Rep. Jerry Decker, R-Eagle, to give Idaho its first state contractor licensing bill in 22 years.

The first time the House had the bill, it won 48 yes votes. On Wednesday Decker had 47 votes when the House voted to accept the bill with Senate amendments.

But on Thursday, when the bill came up for final action, that number dwindled by six and the measure lost

by a single vote.

The bill went through a similar battle in the Senate, being amended, defeated by a single vote, reconsidered and then passed on another narrow vote.

Opponents of the bill attacked it on many grounds, ranging from constitutional to specific, with some House members saying they were against licensing anything.

"They always say licensing is to protect the consumer. That seldom is the goal," said Rep. Michael Simpson, R-Blackfoot. He said licensing usually is used by established companies to keep competition out.

The legislation started with an interim study committee, which itself was badly divided on contractor licensing. House and Senate committees held five major hearings, some lasting hours, and received testimony

from most of the state's major building and construction organizations that the legislation was needed.

Numerous private individuals, most with stories of being cheated by incompetent or dishonest contractors,

also urged legislators to approve the bill.

But opponents argued there was little real support by the public for the bill, and it was an attempt to keep small, individual contractors out of

the market.

The battle to get the legislation up to a final vote ruffled some feelings. But in the end, House Speaker Tom Boyd presided both sides for their sincerity on a volatile issue.

Rep. Harold Reid, D-Craigmont, who is in his 28th year in the Legislature, called it "almost a rerun" of a 1965 state contractor licensing law that caused so much controversy it was repealed in the next session.

"I caught more flak over that than anything else we passed that year," he said.

That law, which was blocked by contractor lawsuits before it went into effect, was the state's last attempt to enact a state contractor licensing law. Opponents argued this year's measure would trigger similar court battles.

Caldwell broadcaster Nelson Whitson, substituting for Rep. Elizabeth Allan-Hodge, R-Middleton, said the bill was unnecessary and would be anti-competitive. He likened it to a work permit, and said it would be just as logical to license the news media.

Rep. Ron Black, R-Twin Falls, said that as far as he can determine, contractors favor the proposal.

"It will help the person who is trying to get started and wants to play by the rules," said Rep. Dean Hagenson, R-Coeur d'Alene. "It will hurt those who are trying to cheat. And it is about time," he said, criticizing the "smoke" and "misinformation" put out by opponents.

Navy report critical of Boise firm's work

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy has continued to award contracts for specially fabricated weapons containers to a small Idaho company despite clear findings of shoddy workmanship and delivery delays, the service's inspector general has concluded.

The performance of the Yanke Container Corp. has been so poor that the Navy should immediately "initiate debarment proceedings" to block the Boise, Idaho, concern from receiving additional contracts, added Rear Adm. M.E. Chang in an audit report.

Moreover, the Navy needs to determine why its buying agents continued to use Yanke Container and why the service failed to take ad-

vantage of "numerous opportunities to default the contractor or demand consideration (penalty payments) ...," the report states.

"Yanke Container Corp. contracts indicate a clear inability to perform to contract with regard to delivery and product quality," Navy auditors found. "This inability has been repeatedly demonstrated in contracts since 1982."

Yanke handled nine of the 19 contracts it received since 1982 by delivering 312 defective new containers, resulting in over \$118,000 in additional cost to the Navy, the auditors wrote.

"Seven contractors were extended and five were delivered delinquent to contract."

University has trouble filling jobs with women

MOSCOW (AP) — The University of Idaho has more trouble attracting qualified women to fill faculty and administrative posts than qualified men, President Richard Gibb says.

But Gibb said Wednesday that he is not willing to pay women higher salaries than equally qualified men to lure them to the Moscow campus.

"What kind of premium should we put on it? Does it mean paying them more than the male? No. I don't think we should aggressively pursue it in that manner, and I would hope we don't have to," he told a small gathering at the UI Women's Center.

Women account for only 8 percent of the full professors on the UI campus. But Gibb said he is aggressively seeking more female candidates.

UI is hampered by being "off the beaten path," Gibb said, and it may take an extra effort to lure outstanding women applicants to the institution. Adding to the problem is a smaller pool of women in academia compared to men, a situation he said affects all colleges.

"I think it is correct to say there aren't as many well-qualified women candidates as we'd like," he said. "I think you'll find the number of male candidates exceed women at most institutions across the country. It's true at Harvard, it's true at MIT ... it's a national problem."

Betsy Thomas, Women's Center director, told Gibb many female UI faculty members have difficulty finding women colleagues to critique their work, such as articles written for publication.

"If I wanted someone to review my work, I'd get the best person I could and I guess I wouldn't care what their sex or their religion is," Gibb replied.

Isolation may hinder St. Anthony in trying to land federal prison

ST. ANTHONY (AP) — St. Anthony's distance from major population centers may be its biggest drawback in trying to attract a federal prison to the eastern Idaho community, officials say.

A representative from the federal Bureau of Prisons was in St. Anthony Wednesday to look at the east campus of the state Veterans Services Center as a possible site for a minimum security prison for federal inmates.

The bureau is looking at St. Anthony because of its proximity to the Targhee National Forest, where inmates could do public works projects.

Kevin McMahon of the Bureau of Prisons and Clair Beasley, deputy regional forester for the Forest Service's Intermountain Region, met with local officials to explain what they are looking for in a prison site to house 300 to 500 minimum-security, nonviolent, mostly white-collar offenders.

"We're not looking for bare ground.

We are looking for existing structures that we can move into tomorrow and start operation next month, something we can quickly activate," McMahon said.

Beasley said the community has two things going for it — community and political support and the national forest. "What you're going to bump into is the geographic location and proximity to population centers," he said.

Tony Skoro, special assistant to the Idaho Board of Corrections, said the state has other possible sites if the bureau decides against St. Anthony.

The bureau is expanding rapidly because of a federal law eliminating the federal parole board, he said. Federal prisoners no longer will serve any portion of their sentences on probation.

The bureau is developing eight sites, and plans to begin work on 10 to 12 more soon, McMahon said. There

are 49,000 inmates in the federal prison system, which operates 48 facilities nationwide. The inmate population is expected to swell to between 70,000 and 75,000 in the next five years.

"We are 63 percent over our rate of capacity right now," he said.

McMahon said the bureau looks first at finding a facility where inmates can work in a proper setting, such as a national forest.

The bureau then looks at the utility base. St. Anthony City Clerk Lila Gold said the city's sewer system could handle the additional load and that the city is completing work on a new water storage facility.

Fifty percent of the people hired to work at the prison at first and most of those hired later would come from the community. The facility would employ 100 to 125 people and pump \$2.5 million to \$5 million into the local economy each year, he said.

Rhoades' lawyers want him returned

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Attorneys for twice-convicted murderer Paul Ezra Rhoades have asked a judge to return him from the state prison's Death Row so they can prepare his defense for a third murder trial.

That request was filed in 7th District Court this week along with one asking for a status report on material being reviewed by Judge Larry Boyle and on other material prosecutors previously were ordered to give to defense attorneys.

Rhoades has been held at the Idaho State Penitentiary south of Boise since March 24, when Boyle sentenced him to death for the kidnapping and murder of Idaho Falls special education teacher Susan Mitchellbacher.

Senate should add own INF inspection

Senate ratification of the treaty to dismantle every medium-range Soviet and American nuclear missile in the world would not change big-power relations with Europe so much as it would reflect changes that probably could not be prevented.

So even though the Senate will take a month to debate the treaty, starting in mid-April, the chances of rejection are slim, because of the consequences of killing the document signed by President Reagan and Soviet General Secretary Mikhail S. Gorbachev at their Washington summit meeting last winter would be true turmoil in Europe. There is some concern among nations in the Western alliance that removing Soviet SS-20 and American Pershing 2 missiles would increase the Soviet threat in Europe. But going back on a treaty that the president had signed would cut Europe's confidence in American leadership even further.

It is even conceivable that a rejection could weaken Gorbachev among more conservative communist leaders to the point where he would lose ground in his campaign to drag his nation into modern times.

The treaty, which the Foreign Relations Committee sent to the Senate floor by a 17-2 vote Wednesday, probably already has squirmed through most of the ambushes that could be set for it by die-hard opponents of better relations with the Soviets.

It even survived one ambush that was sprung, by accident or design, by the White House itself.

Having built the record, as one member notes, neither Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., nor any other senator will be able to make false claims about loopholes in the treaty during floor debate and have the outcome depend on one senator's word against another's.

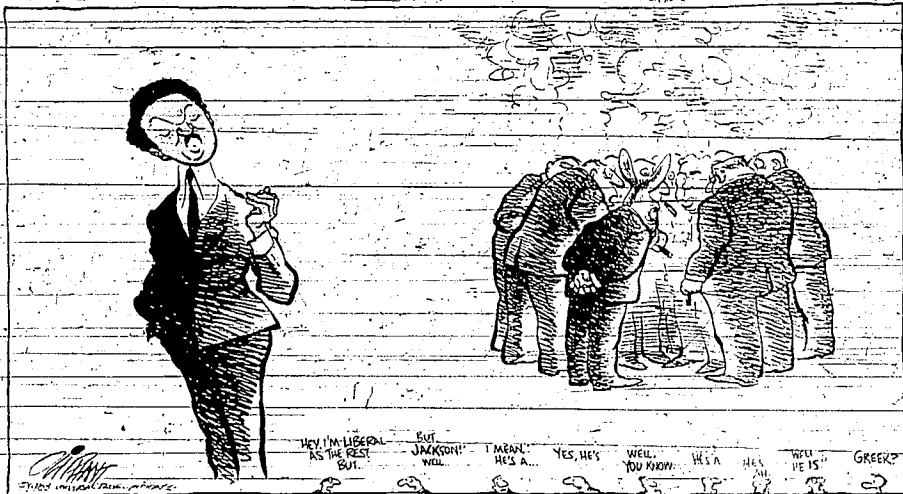
The treaty was reported out of committee with one last protective device—a clause that says flatly that the treaty means what administration officials said that it means during the game of 135 questions.

The Senate will now add its own inspection of the treaty to that of the committee and the administration. In the end, the Senate should add its own hearty endorsement to the first step back from the nuclear arms race in two decades. The Senate should also make its share of making certain that the treaty not only does an entire class of nuclear weapons vanish but that it also points the way to larger cuts in even larger missiles.

They are telling people "trust me"—don't worry about what we're doing—we'll take care of you.

Find out how the Department of Energy has taken care of the people in Hanford, Washington near the Savannah River Project or the hundreds of other little sights the DOE has hit and run from. Beware of the Trojan Horse bearing gifts.

Have you ever wondered why they are looking for a new home? The DOE states that they want to move to a more politically favorable environment. Can we translate this to mean that since Idahoans buying such hard limits economically, we would be willing to accept the SIS and

Jackson drive upsets U.S. political stability

In the wake of Jesse Jackson's primary successes, especially his big victory in Michigan, the battle for the Democratic nomination suggests the following comparison: After passage of the Civil Rights Act, some restaurant owners did not want blacks in their establishments—not because they were racists but because they were afraid that their regular customers would stay home. With Jackson now at the door, the Democratic Party is in much the same position as those restaurant owners.

There is a good chance that the party won't be able to keep him out, however, any more than those business-minded restaurateurs could keep blacks out. Despite his second-place finish on Tuesday, Michael S. Dukakis in Connecticut, Jackson continues to do better than polls or pundits have predicted. His crowds are larger,

his following more intense. He could win the California primary. He could win the Democratic nomination.

Some of my Republican friends are jubilant about all this, believing that the Republicans are again almost sure to win in November. In effect they are saying Jesse Jackson will be the savior of George Bush. Jackson may indeed prove a toppable. But I don't share in the widespread Republican enthusiasm. The prospect of a Bush-Jackson race should give us all pause.

In the first place, the center of gravity of American politics will have moved considerably to the left. Faced with that prospect, Bush's advisers are likely to conclude that Bush, too, could safely shift a little to the left in an attempt to pick up the votes of disaffected centrist Democrats. The instinct of moderate Republicans is always to minimize differences between them and the Democrats, whom they perceive as enjoying greater legitimacy in the policy arena. One Bush campaign worker tells me that such a strategy is right now under active consideration by Bush's advisers.

The implications for the country are potentially serious. Right now, for example, the United States has on the arms control bargaining table at Geneva an extreme proposal to reduce our nuclear arsenal by 50 percent. This is worrisome because there is no guarantee that the Soviets will comply with any promise that they may make to implement similar reductions. Normally in an election year such a proposal would go nowhere because the Republicans would appreciate the possibility that the Democrats could move to their right on the national security issue. That was how the Democrats captured the White House in 1960, after all, when John F. Kennedy played up the "missile gap."

The possible renunciation of Richard A. Gephardt or Albert Gore Jr. would have stirred such fears in GOP backers, and we could be sure that Ronald Reagan's risky arms-cut proposal would be stillborn. But with Jackson as his potential adversary (and I suspect that the same reasoning may apply to Dukakis), Bush is likely to embrace the Reagan position without fear of a rightward Democratic response. In fact, the Reagan-Bush arms-reduction proposal, which to date has received little attention, is more dramatic—because it is more concrete—than anything that even Jackson has offered. Half of our nuclear submarines could be dismantled, for example.

Reagan still remains loyal to Meese despite troubles

WASHINGTON (AP)— Presidents can be reluctant to fire their closest aides, and President Reagan, who has shown great loyalty to top advisors in the past, is unlikely to oust his long-time friend, Attorney General Edwin Meese III, White House observers say.

"He's been a friend for over 20 years," Reagan told reporters Wednesday in response to questions about whether he would oust the attorney general, who faces mounting legal problems. "I have every confidence in him."

His statement recalled the time in the summer of 1984 when the president, arriving in Dallas for the Republican National Convention, was quizzed about whether he would oust Labor Secretary Raymond Donovan, who faced a federal indictment.

Reagan declared that he wouldn't give in to a "lynch mob atmosphere."

When Donovan finally was indicted, he saved Reagan the decision by resigning immediately.

Reagan so dislikes firing top aides that an embittered Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. had to try at least twice to quit before the president finally accepted his resignation in June 1982.

Reagan didn't fire Interior Secretary James Watt after he made offensive remarks about blacks, women, Jews and the handicapped in 1983. Watt offered to step aside.

"After watching Ronald Reagan and reading about him all these years, I've come to the conclusion that it is a matter of leadership style that dictates that he not fire people," said Robert A. Bonatti, who was Reagan's labor adviser early in the administration.

"He never gets on the side of firing people and he always defends people who are under attack."

Reagan has said steadfastly that he thinks public officials ought to be presumed innocent until found guilty in court. He's even gone further than that with two major figures in the Iran-Contra affair, saying he believes former national security aides Oliver North and John M. Poindexter are innocent of charges they conspired to defraud the government.

Reagan's close association with Meese goes back to his days as governor of California from 1967-75, when Meese was a valued counselor.

During his first months in the presidency in 1981, writes Reagan biographer Lou Cannon, "Reagan valued Ed Meese's advice above all others, believing that Meese would see to it that conflicting points of view were put into his without coloration."

In quintessential Reagan style, the president threw his arm around Meese when reporters tried to question him about the attorney general early last fall, just after the two had appeared in the White House press room to announce Anthony M. Kennedy's selection for a Supreme Court vacancy.

But Reagan is not the only president who has shown great loyalty to his aides. A former high-ranking official in the Carter administration, describing the difficulty that Jimmy Carter had in ousting budget director Bert Lance, said "it's always difficult for presidents to let go of people close to them, and that was true of Lance, and it's certainly true of Meese."

"These are the toughest issues for presidents to face," said the source, speaking on condition of anonymity. "Presidents do sometimes swing the axe, however. President Eisenhower ousted top aide Sherman Adams and President Johnson got rid of close associate Walter Jenkins. Gerald Ford eased out Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz."

"It's a major problem for all presidents," said the University of Virginia's Larry Sabato. "But few presidents have been as reluctant and as proud as this president to ditch people who become political liabilities. Eisenhower thought it was important to be cleaner than a hound's tooth."

Spring forward Sunday

WASHINGTON (AP) — It's time to rearrange the light in our lives.

Daylight-saving time returns at 2 a.m. Sunday the day that clocks should be shifted an hour forward.

This annual change, which equates confusion every year, may complicate even more lives this time by coming on Easter, a day when church attendance is higher than normal.

So, to avoid arriving for services an hour late, remember to set the family clocks one hour ahead before retiring Saturday night.

Although known as "daylight-saving time," the annual change doesn't really save any daylight, or time.

It simply moves an hour of light from morning to evening by delaying both sunrise and sunset an hour.

That means that some children wind up waiting for school buses in the dark, for example, in exchange for more time after school to play ball or join the family in backyard cookouts.

The idea has been attributed to various people, including Benjamin Franklin, but it was William Willett of England who launched the eventually successful campaign for the idea in 1907.

More time for evening recreation, less need for costly artificial lights, and a possible reduction of evening crime were cited as major advantages.

It was the energy saving that prompted first use of daylight-saving time, in Germany in 1916. Other countries followed during World War I, returning to standard time afterward and resuming daylight time during World War II.

It was simple confusion that finally led to the adoption of the U.S. uniform time system in 1966. Previously, the tradition of allowing local communities to decide for or against daylight time had resulted in a crazy-quilt pattern of time differences.

Today, daylight time is in effect in all areas of the country except Arizona, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, American Samoa and the part of Indiana in the Eastern time zone.

Surveys have found that daylight time is generally more popular in urban areas, where the afternoon and evening leisure time is appreciated.

Rural areas seem to be the focus of opposition, largely because of the loss of morning light for travel to work and school and adjusting to the change in dealing with livestock, since animals don't observe differences in time differences.

The actual effect on people seems to vary considerably by geography.

The standard time zones were set up to be about an hour wide. That means it should be the same time throughout an area covered by the apparent movement of the sun in about an hour.

But even though the clock times are the same, sunrise and sunset actually take place on the eastern edge of a time zone about an hour before these events arrive at the western edge of the zone.

AIDS virus changes as disease advances

WASHINGTON (AP) — The virus that causes AIDS actually changes and grows more powerful as the immune deficiency disease progresses, according to studies at the University of California in San Francisco.

In a report to be published Friday, Dr. Jay A. Levy, professor of medicine at UCSF, said he and a group of researchers discovered the changing virus by studying blood samples taken over a four-year period from four men who were infected by the human immunodeficiency virus, or HIV.

The scientists found that as the AIDS patients became sicker, the virus seemed to evolve and strengthen.

"It's surprising," Levy said in an interview. "The virus doesn't just stay the same, but actually changes its biologic features. It looks like the same virus, but it's probably evolving within the individual."

The studies started while all four of the "randomly selected" subjects tested positive for the HIV virus, but had not yet developed AIDS. Three of the men later developed AIDS and two died. The fourth continues to have no AIDS symptoms, even though he tests positive for the virus.

In the three who developed AIDS, Levy said the HIV viruses isolated from their blood samples became more and more virulent as their symptoms intensified. Virulence was tested by exposing the isolated virus to cells in test tubes.

Levy said that when the subjects were experiencing the most severe AIDS symptoms, the HIV from their blood was able to multiply more readily. It also could "more easily infect cells and would attack a broader variety of cells."

Viruses isolated periodically from the AIDS subjects who remained without AIDS symptoms, however, did not show any change in virulence, Levy said.

Levy said it is obvious that the virus must be able to reproduce, or replicate, in order to evolve this increasing virulence. As a result, he said, if researchers can stop the virus from replicating, then it could be kept harmless, even though it continued to live within the patient.

"You wouldn't get rid of the virus. They are kept for the lifetime of the individual," said Levy. "They would just never become strong enough to cause disease."

The UCSF researchers now are searching for the HIV genes responsible for increasing its virulence and its ability to replicate.

Shultz hopes for Arab-Israeli talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State George P. Shultz was set Thursday to try again to persuade Arabs and Israelis to open negotiations by May 1, but the outlook was uncertain.

Shultz headed for Rome, planning to go on to the Middle East on Sunday, where he also hoped to make headway on Lebanon in discussions with Syrian President Hafez Assad. It will be Shultz's second intensive tour of the Middle East in a month.

"We have had very active consultations with all of the parties," Charles E. Redman, the State Department spokesman, said. "Of course, the secretary will be arriving back in the region on Sunday night and that will be the chance to directly assess the reactions to the proposal and to see if we can't get something moving" on Middle East talks.

The State Department's director of Lebanon, Jordan and Syrian affairs, April Glaspio, already is in Damascus where Shultz will see Assad next week.

U.S. and diplomatic sources said the Syrian leader may be interested in arrangements for a new distribution of power among vying sects in Lebanon's 12-year-old civil war.

Shultz flew first to Rome for Easter observances and talks with Italian officials. He is shopping for a new home for 72 U.S. F-16 jet fighters that Spain will export from the Torrejon air base near Madrid in 1991.

Italy is a prime candidate, along with Portugal and Turkey.

Then Shultz flies to Israel on Sunday to begin a five-day Mideast venture that also will take him to Jordan, Syria, Egypt and Saudi Arabia.

The mid-March deadline he set for a reply to his plan for negotiations has passed. But impeded by violence on the Israeli-held West Bank and in Gaza — 123 Palestinian Arabs and an Israeli soldier have been killed in less than three months — Shultz is determined to keep trying.

U.S. officials find some hope in the fact that while Israel, Jordan and Syria have not accepted the plan they

also have not rejected it. Only Egypt has given its endorsement.

The plan calls for a Mideast conference in April to launch the negotiations. They would open on May 1 and deal with providing some form of self-rule to Palestinian Arabs on the West Bank and in Gaza.

Israel would deal with a joint delegation of Jordanians and Palestinian Arabs to last three years.

Meanwhile, negotiations on an overall settlement of the Arab-Israeli dispute that also would involve Syria would begin in December.

Primarily because of Syria's key role in the Middle East, Shultz had drawn inside into the discussions after several years of icy relations, U.S. officials said.

Committee approves extension for legalization of aliens

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Judiciary Committee on Thursday approved a measure to give illegal aliens until Nov. 30 to apply for legalization, extending the current May 4 deadline.

Most Democrats supported the extension, and most Republicans opposed it. The 22-12 vote sent the proposal to the full House, where it faces heavy opposition.

The general amnesty program applies to aliens who came to the United States illegally, but have lived in the United States continuously since before Jan. 1, 1982.

Legalization was a cornerstone of the landmark law signed in November 1986 to slow massive illegal immigration. The program was included as

a balance to the legislation's enforcement provision: financial penalties against employers who knowingly hire undocumented workers.

The Reagan administration opposes the extension. Alan C. Nelson, commissioner of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, said this week that even talk of an extension was "a major threat to the program" because aliens would become confused and delay their applications.

But the majority of committee members, while praising the INS' current attempt to publicize legalization, and the May 4 deadline, contended the media campaign began too late to reach all those who might apply.

Rep. Charles E. Schumer, D-N.Y.,

said Congress should "err on the side of humanity" because it takes time to convince illegal aliens the INS "has changed... from the hunter to the friend of the immigrant."

The program initially gives temporary residency to those who can prove through documents that they have resided "continuously in the United States since before Jan. 1, 1982."

A federal judge, meanwhile, ordered the Reagan administration Thursday to broaden its standard for determining whether illegal aliens who had overstayed tourist and student visas can now obtain amnesty under the 1986 immigration law.

U.S. District Judge Stanley Sporkin ruled "that the regulation requiring

that such illegal aliens be known to immigration authorities as of Jan. 1, 1982, violated Congress's intention that such people be known to any U.S. government agency."

The decision applies to non-immigrant aliens who illegally overstayed their tourist or student visas or otherwise violated the terms of the legal visit to this country.

Sporkin ruled that Congress intended the law to mean that any government record — such as tax or Social Security documents — could be used to document that an illegal alien was known to federal authorities as of Jan. 1, 1982.

As for the general legalization program INS figures show that through

March 29, some 1.1 million applications have been received. More than 300,000 have been received from a special program for agricultural workers.

The agricultural program is not involved in the extension, although both programs would end Nov. 30 if the new deadline is approved.

Of those applications that have reached the decisions that have been approved and the remainder are in the pipeline, the INS says.

Applicants receive a temporary work permit when they apply for legalization, and therefore can stay in the country while awaiting a decision.

If the applicant gains temporary residency, he or she is then on the road toward permanent residency and citizenship.

INS figures show the number of applicants has been increasing. As the May 4 deadline approaches, for instance, 16,800 people applied the week ending Jan. 22, while for the week ending March 11, there were 36,820 applicants. The total was 36,830 for the week ending March 18.

Judiciary Committee Chairman Peter W. Rodino Jr., D-N.J., said studies have indicated that 4 million to 5 million illegal aliens could be eligible for legalization, although even supporters of the extension admitted nobody really knows the figure.

Latin America opposes Reagan on Nicaragua, Panama

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. officials point proudly to how many Latin American countries have become democratic in recent years, but on the hemisphere issues of most concern to President Reagan — Nicaragua and Panama — it's hard to find one willing to align itself with American policy.

On Tuesday, a day when the administration was issuing veiled warnings about the possibility of military intervention in Panama, a regional conclave in Caracas, Venezuela, decided that the United States had already gone too far in its campaign against military strongman Manuel Antonio Noriega.

"We urge the U.S. government to revoke immediately the coercive measures it has adopted against Pana-

ma," the Latin American Economic System said in a communique after a two-day meeting. Nations ranging from rightist Chile to Marxist Cuba signed the declaration.

The underlying message was clear: the 26 countries are worried that the United States is setting a precedent in Panama that could be used against any one of them in the future.

This concern for future outwights the distance that many have for Noriega, hamed in two federal narcotics indictments. They believe they themselves might be an American target some day if they get caught smuggling drugs to the United States or

run a foul of U.S. policy in some other way.

Over the past month, the administration has contributed to Panama's economic collapse through measures that have had the effect of aggravating an acute cash shortage in Panama.

It has, for example, taken steps to deny Noriega access to some \$50 million in official Panamanian funds deposited in U.S. banks and has withheld a \$6.5 million payment due to Panama for services related to Panama Canal operations.

But many in Congress, where opposition to Noriega is virtually unanimous, believe the administration has not gone far enough. Some advocate a comprehensive trade embargo.

The administration has moved

against Noriega in the name of restoring democracy in Panama, but none of the democracies which now dominate the hemisphere has seen fit to back the U.S. actions.

The one source of comfort for the United States concerning Panama is that the only nations that have provided overt support for Noriega are Cuba and Nicaragua.

Another frustration for the administration has been the persistent refusal of Latin American nations to support the Nicaraguan Contra rebels. Some countries, such as Mexico, have fought U.S. policy since the beginning while many others fessed the issue by refusing to take a stand.

Asked for an explanation, U.S. officials say many nations have expressed support for the Contras in pri-

vat but refuse to do so publicly.

The reason, officials say, is that these countries fear a left-wing backlash at home if they side with the United States. To ensure domestic tranquility, disassociation from U.S. policy has been a time-honored tactic.

All this generates considerable hand-wringing among administration officials. The United States was once routinely accused of backing unpopular dictators against the wishes of their subjects.

But, particularly in the case of Panama, the United States has not been able to count on Latin American support even when it takes an assertive

stand against a strongman like Noriega.

A generation ago, it was relatively easy for the United States to win diplomatic support in the hemisphere. With minimal opposition, Washington orchestrated the diplomatic and economic isolation of Cuba's revolutionary government and won Latin American support, with some exceptions, for its armed intervention in the Dominican Republic in 1965.

The sole recent instance in which the United States and Latin America have been in harmony was in 1979, when there was a common effort to bring down the Somoza family dynasty in Nicaragua.

PTL scandal coverage earns a Pulitzer

NEW YORK (AP) — The Charlotte Observer on Thursday won the 1988 Pulitzer Prize for public service for its coverage of the PTL financial scandal that brought down Jim and Tammy Bakker and created turmoil in televangelism.

The North Carolina paper, the Wall Street Journal and The Miami Herald each took two of the awards.

In its criticism of the public service award, one of six Pulitzers awarded to Knight-Ridder papers, the prize board said the Observer revealed misuse of funds by the ministry "through persistent coverage conducted in the face of a massive campaign by PTL to discredit the newspaper."

The other prize-winning Knight-Ridder papers are the Inquirer, the Herald, and the St. Paul Pioneer Press Dispatch.

In the arts, novelist Toni Morrison — whose failure to win other writing awards over the past year caused a literary controversy — received the Pulitzer for fiction for her novel "Beloved." "Driving Miss Daisy" by Alfred Uhry and "The Making of the Atomic Bomb" by Richard Rhodes won the prizes for drama and general

non-fiction, respectively.

Winners reacted gleefully to the news. "I'm in a state of slack-jawed dumbfoundedness," said Tom Shales of the Washington Post, who won the criticism award for his writings on television.

Tim Weiner of the Inquirer celebrated his national reporting award for a series of reports on a secret Pentagon budget used to sponsor defense research and an arms buildup by climbing on a desk and lighting up a stogie, while listening to his colleagues' applause.

Weiner said he felt as if he had just received a "\$10 million check from Ed McMahon. I'm just a very happy guy and very lucky."

Pulitzers for general news reporting went to the Alabama Journal of Montgomery for an investigation of the state's unusually high infant mortality rate, and to the Lawrence (Mass.) Eagle-Tribune for stories that showed flaws in the Massachusetts prison funding system.

The Chicago Tribune's Dean Bequet, William Gaines and Ann Marie Lipinski won the Pulitzer for investigative reporting for stories on "the

self-interest and waste that plagued Chicago's City Council."

Daniel Hertzberg and James B. Stewart of the Wall Street Journal won the Pulitzer for explanatory journalism for stories about an insider trading and about the day after the October stock market crash. The Journal's other Pulitzer — for specialized reporting — went to Walt Bogdanich for a series on faulty testing by medical laboratories.

Thomas J. Friedman of The New York Times won the Pulitzer for international reporting for what the Pulitzer board termed "balanced and informed coverage of Israel." Friedman also won a Pulitzer for international reporting in 1983.

The Miami Herald's two awards came in commentary and feature photography. Dave Barry won the former for what the board called "consistently effective use of humor as a device for presenting fresh insights into serious concerns." Michel duCille won the latter for photographs of the decay and rehabilitation of a housing project with a cocaine problem.

Other journalism awards included:

— Feature writing, to Jacqui Banaszynski of the St. Paul Pioneer Press Dispatch for her series about the life and death of an AIDS victim in a farm community.

— Editorial writing, to Jane Healy of The Orlando Sentinel for editorials that protested overdevelopment of Florida's Orange County.

— Editorial cartooning, to Doug Marlette of the Atlanta Constitution and the Charlotte Observer.

— Spot news photography, to Scott Shaw of the Odessa (Texas) American for his pictures of little Jessica McClure being rescued from the well into which she had fallen.

Other arts awards included:

— History, "The Launching of Modern American Science 1846-1876," by Robert V. Bruce.

— Biography, "Look Homeward: A Life of Thomas Wolfe," by David Herbert Donald.

— Poetry, "Partial Accounts: New and Selected Poems," by William Meredith.

— Music, "12 Etudes for Piano," by William Bolcom.

Northeast falls behind the West in population

WASHINGTON (AP) — The densely settled Northeast has become the nation's least populated region, falling behind the West for the first time, the Census Bureau reported Thursday.

The bureau also projected that Texas will surpass New York for second place behind California in population by 1995.

And between now and the year 2000, half of all U.S. population growth will occur in just three states: California, Texas and Florida, the report said.

The projections are based on assumptions about trends in births, deaths, immigration and movement within the country, bureau demographer Signe Wetron explained.

The Northeast has been declining in its share of the U.S. population, with less gain in than other areas, Wetron said in a telephone interview. It is the one region with the highest share of population in the older ages, and has low birth rates.

Population shifts to the South and West in recent years have drawn away many people in the prime ages of 18 to 24, "so the (Northeast) region is left with more older people, and it's left without anybody to have more kids," she said.

The Northeastern states, relatively smaller in land area than other parts of the country, remain the most densely packed, however. New Jersey leads the nation with more than 1,000 people per square mile.

Between 1987 and 1988, the Western region increased from 49.6 million people to 50.5 million, the report said. At the same time, the population of the Northeast edged upward from 60.1 million to 60.3 million, to

slip into last place.

The 1988 estimates listed the South with 85.1 million people, followed by the Midwest with 59.6 million.

Historical records show that, while it was the center of early American development, the Northeast hasn't actually been the most populous region since 1820, when the South edged ahead. It remained second until 1880, falling to third behind both the Midwest and South.

By 1990, the projections call for the South to have 87.3 million people, followed by the Midwest, 59.8 million; West, 52.3 million; and Northeast, 50.6 million.

By 2000, the counts are expected to be 96.9 million for the South; 59.6 million for the Midwest; 59.4 million for the West; and 51.8 million for the Northeast.

By 2010, the report added, the West could replace the Midwest as the second-most-populous region.

State population projections showed California remaining unchallenged as the largest state, growing from 28 million people today to 29.1 million in 1990 and 33.5 million in 2000.

Texas is expected to surpass New York for second rank by 1995. The Empire State now leads Texas 17.7 million to 17.2 million, but by 1995 Texas is projected to have just over 19 million people, with New York at only 17.9 million.

Florida is expected to remain the fourth-largest state, although by the year 2010 it may be closing in on New York as well, the Census Bureau said.

By the year 2000, Illinois will have replaced Pennsylvania in fifth place and Georgia will move into 10th, displacing North Carolina, the report said.

The U.S. population was projected to grow from 243.3 million in 1987 to 267.7 million in 2000.

Tornado season arrives for 3 months in nation's midlands

DALLAS (AP)—Rumbling spring thunderstorms have announced the beginning of the unofficial tornado season that runs from April through June across Texas and other prairie states in the nation's midland.

From 1961 through 1986, there have been an average of 118 tornadoes in Texas per year, according to the state

meteorologist's office in College Station.

More than 60 percent of those occur between April and June, records show. In April and June an average of 18 to 19 tornadoes occur each month, but in May, when weather conditions are the most unstable, that average increases to about 36.

A few twisters were already

recorded in early March in Texas but they did little or no damage. A tornado that touched down Tuesday in central Louisiana, near Bunkie, destroyed two brick homes.

"People should have plans of what they'll do in tornadoes. If they wait until it gets there, it's going to be too late," said Buddy McIntyre, a forecaster with the National

Weather Service.

Last May 22, a killer storm hit the small West Texas town of Saragosa, killing 30 people and injuring 162. In mid-November, 11 people died in East Texas when a series of tornadoes trashed towns from Cherokee County to the Gulf Coast.

"A tornado is such a devastating kind of storm. No matter how

much preparation you do there is some property damage and some loss of life. But there are some things you can do to protect yourself and property," said Lauren Chernow, a spokeswoman for the governor's division of emergency management.

One is to know the difference between the tornado watches and tornado warnings issued by the

weather service. A watch means weather conditions are suitable for development of a tornado, and people should keep a careful lookout for potential funnel clouds. A tornado warning means one has already developed and has been spotted. Take cover immediately and don't go outside.

Roberts prayed for Swaggart

TULSA, Okla. (AP)—Oral Roberts prayed with fellow TV evangelist Jimmy Swaggart after Swaggart was suspended from his ministry, but did not recommend Swaggart's immediate return to the pulpit, a spokesman for the Tulsa evangelist said Thursday.

Swaggart, of Baton Rouge, La., stepped down from the pulpit Feb. 21 after admitting a moral lapse, reportedly hiring a prostitute to pose nude. On Wednesday, his lawyer announced he would return May 22 in defiance of an order issued the previous day by the Assemblies of God General Presbytery at Springfield, Mo., that he stay away for at least a year.

The May 22 date coincides with the end of a three-month suspension recommended by the church's Louisiana council. The Rev. Mike Evans, of Euleus, Texas, said Wednesday that Swaggart told him last month of Roberts' prayer.

"Oral Roberts called him up and told him that he saw demons with long fingernails digging the flesh into Jimmy Swaggart's body and he cast those demons out of his body," said Evans.

After the conversation with Roberts, Swaggart, 52, felt he was released from sin, Evans said. "I think that was an act of the rationale behind Jimmy's decision to return to television after three months," Evans told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

Roberts' son, Richard Roberts, said Thursday: "I would prefer not to give the details because it was a confidential line together and I don't think it would be appropriate for me to give any of the details. If anyone is to report that Oral Roberts is recommending that Jimmy Swaggart defy the Assembly of God—ruling from Springfield—that is not accurate. My dad had nothing to do with his decision. We believe that that is a matter that Jimmy Swaggart must make his own decision."

Wall Street 'whiz kid' files guilty plea

NEW YORK (AP)—A 23-year-old Wall Street "whiz kid" pleaded guilty to mail and securities fraud charges Thursday, admitting he bilked \$10 million from scores of investors and spent the money on himself and friends.

"I obtained money from investors, and told them I would invest their money in securities. Instead I spent the money on art, automobiles, two homes and furnishings," David Bloom told U.S. District Judge David Edelstein.

Bloom, a 1966 graduate of Duke University, faces five years in prison and a maximum fine of double the amount lost by investors on each count.

Edelstein set sentencing for May 12. No sentencing agreement accompanied his guilty plea.

Several months before his scam was revealed, Bloom was profiled in a New York Times Sunday magazine feature on new art collectors.

According to court papers, Bloom "to was not licensed as an investment adviser," used his client money to buy \$5.6 million in art work, a \$1.9 million East Hampton beach house, an \$830,000 Manhattan apartment, \$800,000 in furnishings for the two homes, and two cars worth \$200,000.

The defendant also bought numerous pieces of expensive jewelry and deluxe trips to the Caribbean for himself, relatives and friends, federal prosecutors charged.

Investors were kept papers indicating their investment, was turning a profit, and sometimes prompting them to turn over more money, said prosecutor Robert Platz.







Defendant pleads guilty

TWIN FALLS: Two weeks of drug trials ended Thursday in a subdued courtroom when 27-year-old Robert Wicklund pleaded guilty to a reduced charge in return for future testimony.

One week before, Wicklund sat in a courtroom facing 12 jurors and an indictment for delivering a half-ounce of marijuana to a police undercover informant.

But fifth District Judge Daniel Harbutt declared a mistrial shortly after the undercover informant started testifying. The grounds for the mistrial were kept secret until Thursday.

James' agreed to reduce the charges against Wicklund to possession of marijuana less than three ounces and agreed to an lesser sentence against Wicklund.

James said he was not sure one of the witnesses could make the trial. But he said, "We still think it was a good case."

Fifth District Judge Daniel Mechl agreed to the bargain and sentenced Wicklund to 60 days in jail, suspended 50 of those days and gave him credit for time already served. Since Wicklund already spent 10 days in jail, he won't have to return to jail.

In addition, Wicklund has agreed to testify in the marijuana-delivery trial of Andrew Huttsell, which is scheduled for May.

Deputy Prosecutor J. Scott James said Wicklund's mistrial was declared because of an oversight in the prosecutor's office.

With the case now resolved, James said he failed to copy both sides of a cassette tape provided to Wicklund's attorney, Public Defender Michael J. Wood. The tape contained recordings of two trips the police confidential informant made to Wicklund to buy drugs.

When the informant, John Paul Baldwin Jr., testified about the first trip, Wood had no idea what he was talking about, James said.

Because prosecutors are responsible for providing all evidence to defense attorneys before a trial, James said the mistrial had to be granted and a new trial scheduled.

Thursday, James, Wood and Wicklund announced a plea bargain hammered out over the past week, cancelling the new trial.

Four defendants of grand jury indictments faced trials in the past two weeks. The grand jury, which met in September, handed up 17 indictments. Most of the 17 defendants reached plea bargains with the prosecutors' office.

Of the four trials in the past two weeks, two resulted in convictions. Kathy Warr, a 22-year-old Washington Park townhouse resident, will be sentenced in about a month for delivering a half-ounce of marijuana to a friend. She was convicted last week.

Wednesday, a jury found Sherland K. Hawkins, a 31-year-old Twin Falls resident, guilty of aiding the delivery of a half-pound of marijuana and selling psychotropic mushrooms to a state undercover narcotics agent.

Groundbreaking held for jail

The county hosted an official groundbreaking ceremony for its new jail, mandated in part by a lawsuit filed by inmates which also put a cap on the inmate population in Twin Falls County.

Munn, who has been running a time-consuming and expensive shuttle service to other

counties to comply with an agreement reached over the lawsuit, smiled his way through the ceremony.

County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman gave Munn two gifts at the ceremony: a folding shovel to break the ground and a construction hard hat.

"I present this helmet to Jim Munn, because I know every spare minute he's going to be over here checking it out," Hempleman said.

Munn threw a shovel full of dirt for the official groundbreaking ceremony, just before Hempleman dug a deeper hole with a backhoe

although the two weren't alike.

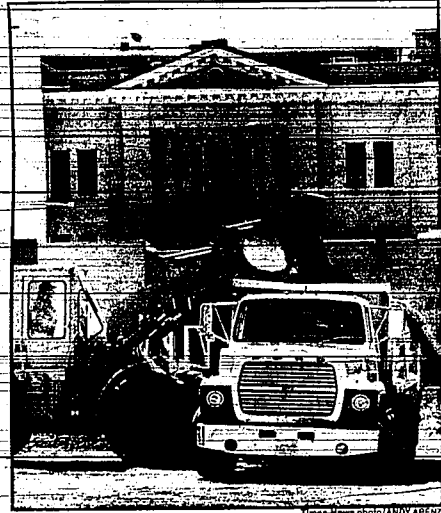
Several pieces of heavy equipment were already at work moving dirt around the old Olavary Junior High School site.

The project is expected to be completed in 200 days, meaning the inmates can begin housing and its prisoners by next spring at the latest.

With the courthouse closed for the ceremony, more than 50 people attended the ceremony on a bright sunny day.

Last May, county voters decisively passed the \$3.8 million bond election to build the new jail.

Kent challenges bond election

TWIN FALLS: Arla Kent has again filed suit against Twin Falls County officials over the jail bond election, despite the fact groundbreaking ceremonies for the new jail took place Thursday.

As in a previously unsuccessful lawsuit filed in 5th District Court, Kent claims the election was invalid because the county didn't register voters. This time around, Kent is seeking more money and has filed in U.S. District Court.

Ironically, Gov. Cecil Andrus signed into law today a bill that will require counties to register voters for bond elections.

Kent, a Twin Falls diesel mechanic, filed his lawsuit March 11 in federal court in Boise. He named Attorney General Jim Jones, Secretary of State Pete Cenarrusa and Deputy Secretary of State Ben Yaarsa as defendants. Other defendants include the Twin Falls County Board of Commissioners, Clerk Dick Pence and Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter.

Kent is also seeking \$250,000 in punitive and property damages.

Hempleman had no comment on the new law.

Yaarsa's only comments were that it seems to us that this same issue is being hashed and already decided in the state courts.

Kent claims the county should have registered voters before the May 12 election, where voters overwhelmingly approved the issuance of \$3.8 million in bonds for the construction of a new jail.

On the advice of bond counsel, the county had required that voters sign oaths attesting

Newcomb ends first term with development tax bill

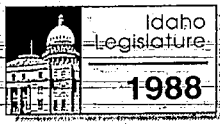
BOISE: Twin Falls City secured a tax break for building developers this week under a law that also solidified Rep. Russ Newcomb's reputation for steady, thorough work.

"When he does something like this, he studies the issues pro and con and makes an intelligent decision," said Twin Falls Mayor Doug Vollmer.

Newcomb, 53, R-Twin Falls, drafted the bill for tax-increment financing and carried it through both chambers of the Legislature, testing for it. The law allows developers to pay the same property taxes after improvements are before, until the debt on the improvements is paid off.

For instance, Newcomb said a \$10,000 lot could be improved to be worth \$100,000, but the owner would only pay taxes on the \$10,000 until the additional \$90,000 was paid off. The only exception is that school taxes will still be levied against the full \$100,000 value, he said.

"It will help places like downtown and help with developing more projects downtown," Newcomb said. "It's a way of financing and improving the tax base."



The financing bill became Newcomb's swansong of success as a freshman lawmaker serving Twin Falls County. Despite that success, including passage of a package of AIDS legislation he drafted and other Medicaid programs he helped expand, Newcomb has announced he will not seek reelection to a second term this year.

"He's going to be tough to be without," Vollmer said. "He's very dedicated."

Newcomb was praised for approaching issues during his term in the Legislature with the studious precision marking his surgical profession at Twin Falls Clinic and Hospital.

But it was that medical practice and the threat of losing his full-time employment and 14 years seniority at FPCOH that forced his decision to discontinue lawmaking for now. He said after he gets his marital house in order and finishes raising three of his four children

through college, he may return. Newcomb served on the Education, Judiciary, Rules and Administration and Health and Welfare committees. His medical experience is credited in the H&W committee with helping defuse the hysteria and political ramifications of identifying the subject of AIDS in Idaho.

"His involvement depoliticized the issue," said H&W Chairman Chris Huoper, R-Boise. "We didn't have a House vs. Senate bill, or governor vs. Legislature, or leaving vs. right-wing."

Newcomb's package of seven bills all became law. They call for testing transplant organs and limbs, requiring educational pamphlets be distributed with marriage licenses and making the knowing transmission of the fatal blood and semen-borne disease a felony.

Following a trip to Washington, Newcomb said, "I realized they were trying to legislate their AIDS policies out of fear and not information."

"I thought maybe somebody ought to research all the major educational information and add some thoughtful direction on this," Newcomb said.

"There's no doubt in my mind we're doing much better job than

Panamanian government closes; thousands go unpaid

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) — Panama's government closed on Tuesday after the long Easter weekend left thousands of public employees without paychecks for the second time in a month, facing a bleak holiday.

Industries shuttered by an 11-day-old general strike, the largest congregation of people were found in the agency food lines. Leaders of the National Civic Crusade were meeting to plot new strategies in their frustrated effort to force out Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega.

Some 200,000 employees were not paid because of the strike, which has been closed since March 3. The Rev. Laurino Duran, head of a Catholic Church relief society, said his organization was feeding 9,000 families a day in the capital and some other parts of the country.

FORST, West Germany (AP) — A U.S. Air Force jet fighter slammed into the middle of this small town and exploded Thursday, killing the American pilot and at least one resident, injuring 16 people and forcing scores to evacuate.

North Carolina State's Valvano reported headed for UCLA

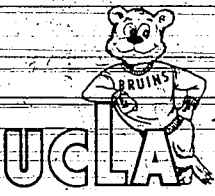

RALIEGH, N.C. — If Jim Valvano is about to leave his dual roles at North Carolina State to become basketball coach at UCLA, he has made it a well-kept secret, according to school officials.

As Valvano, basketball coach and athletic director at N.C. State, was in Kansas City, Mo., Thursday, while reports circulated that he would succeed Walt Hazzard.

Hazzard was fired as Bruins head coach on Wednesday, and The Los Angeles Herald Examiner reported Thursday that UCLA officials had offered Valvano a five-year, \$2.5 million contract.

The newspaper quoted sources as saying Valvano was "90 percent certain" to accept the offer and that

In those unpublished interviews with a Raleigh newspaper, Valvano spoke of the future at N.C. State, touching on Duke's chances at winning the Atlantic Coast Conference's third national title of the 1980s. One of those three NCAA titles belongs to him, captured in 1983 at Albuquerque.

Valvano, 42, also talked about upgrading the facilities at N.C. State with money from the NCAA Tournament.

Weedon said he hasn't talked with Valvano since Tuesday and said he has seen nothing to indicate his boss was about to go.

"I saw it on ESPN. Calls started coming in and that's how I got word of it," he said.

Weedon wouldn't speculate on whether Valvano would leave, but he

said it would be a major blow to the program.

"Hock, anytime you lose a coach of Jim Valvano's quality, it's difficult to recover," he said. "All of this is premature, hopefully. But with change, there's always turmoil. There's a period of turmoil, a period of apprehension."

Valvano could not be reached for comment at his Kansas City hotel Thursday afternoon. He was scheduled to attend a dinner honoring the national championship coaches.

Valvano, who previously was head coach at Iowa, succeeded Norm Sloan as Wolfpack head coach in 1980, and after successive winning seasons, he guided the Wolfpack through the West Regional en route to the national championship in 1983. He made the Final Eight in 1985 and 1986.



Since the championship, Valvano has parlayed his success into local television and radio commercials, several books and even a line of sportswear. He also travels as a motivational speaker, and once did a commentary for NBC in the middle of the 1985 season and also was an analyst for CBS during that season.

Rumors of Valvano leaving N.C. State are nothing new. After last year's first-round departure in the NCAA tournament, he was touted as the head coach of the New York Knicks of the NBA. But while he was the popular choice in New York, he remained in Raleigh.

After refusing the Knicks job, Valvano said it was his intent to stay in Raleigh.

"As I have said before, nothing has changed for me as far as N.C. State is concerned," he said. "I'm very happy here. My family is happy here."

In the midst of the 1986 basketball season, Valvano applied for the athletic director's job at N.C. State, and he assumed the new role in July of that year.

His record at N.C. State is 169-93 and his career mark is 305-190 in 17 seasons.

TWIN FALLS—College of Southern Idaho baseball coach Jim Walker told his charges following Thursday night's 4-2 loss to the Lewis-Clark State javier today in the opening round of the CSI-Treasure Valley Community College Invitational Tournament that they must learn to win their close games.

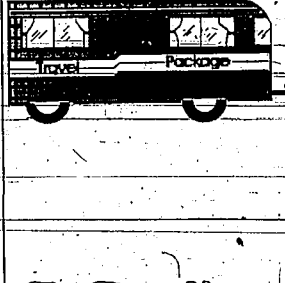

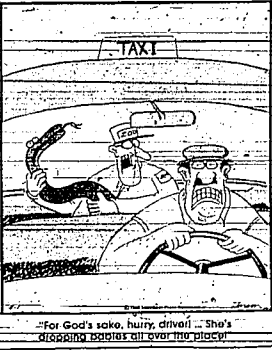

West follows suit normally with his deuce declarer will be forced into his only winning chance: For the King, 10 and nine still out. South must play for an original K-4 of spades with East, and his play of the ace drops East's king. South then has no more losers and makes his game.

What happens if West false-cards by dropping either the 10 or the nine of spades under South's Jack? He gives South another option. If South believes that West started with the 10-9 doubleton, he will return to dummy in hearts and push dummy's spade queen through West, trying to pick up the suit. Teaching, commissions keep Youngman busy

TWIN FALLS — Is bigger better? For mural painter Mike Youngman, bigger is at least more freeing. "It's a chance to do something on a grand scale," says the College of Southern Idaho art instructor as he relaxes in the basement studio of the Harrett Museum.

Around him are half-finished cut-outs of Mayan gods, paintings of the ancient civilization's religious carame-

nies and even carvings depicting that culture's rich heritage. All are props for the current Mayan exhibit at the museum, extras that Youngman designs to enhance the displays.

He's a busy man. Teaching art, creating for the museum and doing his own painting and drawing, till his hours.

With commissions, he is able to let himself go, putting his considerable talent onto a larger-than-life canvas and creating dramatically large pieces of art that change the en-

tire mood of a room.

Youngman, who received his master's degree in fine arts from Utah State University, was teaching art at Filer High School in 1974 when he and Kent Jeppesen, a photography teacher at CSI and fellow artist, went into business painting murals. Their commissions took them all over the state.

In Boise, the Morrison Knudsen Center sports a scene of construction sites on one of its walls. The employee lounge of the Blue Cross building is

the home of a mural depicting the roaring '20s, complete with early balloonists and plenty of mustached men.

Locally, the Sandpiper restaurant has a serene seascape and many pri-

vate residents have walls with various landscapes and even tennis players splashed across them.

Youngman's own kitchen doubles as a jungle, complete with monkeys, exotic birds and a tiger. But he says

he had to paint a bona constrictor out of the scene because it made his wife nervous.

Youngman says he was able to make ends meet on the murals alone. See MURAL on Page D2

Mural inspires group effort

FILER — Remote mountain peaks tower above verdant rolling hills that shelter a tiny rustic village. Beyond them, an impossibly blue ocean shimmers as it fades into the horizon.

The actual setting of this idyllic scene is on the island of St. Helena, but a beautiful depiction of it rests on a wall in the lunchroom of Filer High School, center of mural painter Mike Youngman and several students of his College of Southern Idaho art center.

Youngman says he took the project on at the request of the four women who ran the school's lunch program. They were tired of bare walls.

What they have to view now is a 9½-x26-foot masterpiece that brings to the Magic Valley, the warmth of this mid-Atlantic island that was once home to an ex-

iled Napoleon.

Youngman says he brought many samples of prospective murals for the cooks to choose from, allowing them to narrow the field to five so that the students could vote.

"We wanted to do it democratically, because it is something they'll be looking at for a long time," he says.

The island scene, taken from a National Geographic photo, was chosen by an overwhelming majority of the student body, supplanting Youngman and the CSI students who worked with them. They had assumed the high schoolers would opt for a desert scene or a collage of historic Idaho photographs.

Because the scope of the project was so large and had to be completed during the 1987 summer vacation, Youngman knew he would need help. He asked four of

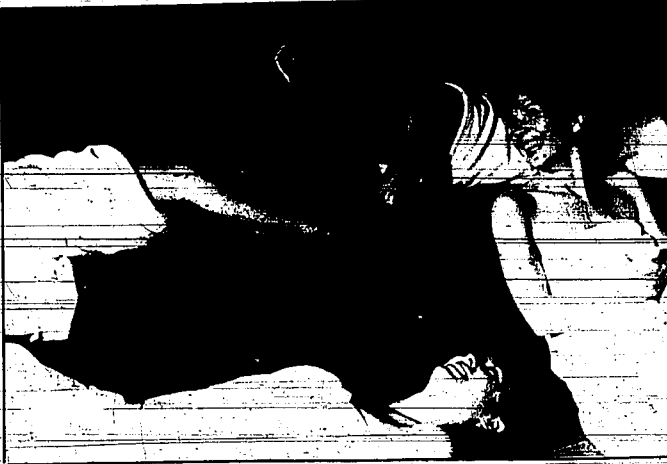

SUN VALLEY — The best of contemporary world cinema will be presented next week during the third annual Sun Valley Film Festival sponsored by the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities.

Nine films can be seen during the five-day festival beginning April 8 at the Sun Valley Opera House. Each has been hand-picked by program consultant Lawrence "Loe" Smith, a member of the Utah Film Commission and director of the Independent Competition at Park City's U.S. Film Festival.

"Cinema, at its most basic level, is a communicative medium," Smith says. "Its message can be translated, universally regardless of language barriers. Cinema speaks all languages and speaks to all peoples."

"The international representation of the selected films gives an around-the-world sampling of the invigorating new work that is being done, South of 35°."

The selection of films which might not otherwise be available for viewing in our area include an impressive lineup. "Babette's Feast" has been nominated for an Academy Award for Best Foreign Film, and actor Marcello Mastroianni has been nominated for an Academy Award for Best Actor for his performance in "Dark Eyes."

"Patti Rocks" is described as a funny, terribly profane and poignant bullfight on the battle between macho men and liberated women. The only film to ever be rated X purely for its language, it underwent minor revisions and received an R rating.

The schedule of films is as follows:
• April 8, 7 p.m.: "The Decline of the American Empire," described as a witty Canadian film. It is a very modern, very hip, very adult story of a group of contemporary French Canadians and gives a wonderfully frank examination of men and women's attitudes towards one another and is full of variations on the idea of happiness. The film is rated R.

• April 8, 9 p.m.: "Patti Rocks" is one of the most controversial movies on the subject of sex. This American film has drawn comment from around the country in recent weeks for its use of language, with commentary in Vogue, Cosmopolitan, Playboy, the Los Angeles Times and on The Today Show.

• April 9, 5 p.m.: "The Brave Little Toaster" is a touching but funny cartoon for children and grown-ups created by former Disney animators. It is the story of a group of appliances, apparently abandoned by the owner of the cabin in which they reside, who decide to leave the cabin to go off in search of the young son of the cabin owner. New York columnists declare 'gossip' war

CNN will produce Spanish newscast

HOLLYWOOD — After more than a month of negotiations, Cable News Network announced last week that it had agreed to produce a weeknight newscast in Spanish for a major Spanish-language television network — a first for an English-language broadcaster.

Officials at the Atlanta-based network said that CNN would produce a 30-minute newscast titled "Noticiero Telemundo-CNN" beginning May 31 for the Telemundo Television Group, one of two national Spanish-language networks in the United States.

"We are very excited about joining forces with CNN, the prominent electronic news-gathering organization in this world," Henry R. Silverstein, Telemundo's president and chief executive officer, said in a prepared statement.

"This project demonstrates Telemundo's continuing commitment to provide high quality, entertaining and relevant programming."

In addition to the evening news, CNN will also produce a 60-minute weekend news-in-review show titled "Resumen Semanal Telemundo-CNN" and five daily news briefs, which remain to be scheduled.

Company officials declined to disclose the financial details of the agreement.

Telemundo owns and operates 16 affiliates nationwide. The media conglomerate, owned by Reliance Capital Corp., claims to reach 60 percent of the nation's Latino households.

Hudmark Cards Corp. was the first U.S. media conglomerate to carve out a Spanish-language TV empire. It owns 11 stations nationwide as well

as Univision, America's largest Spanish-language programming network.

The CNN-produced program will replace a program currently being produced by the Miami-based Hispanic American Broadcasting Corp. titled "Noticiero Telemundo-HBC."

Officials at Hispanic-American Broadcasting Corp. were not available for comment.

NEW YORK (AP) — James and Suzy are having a tiff. And to the delight of gossip-loving New Yorkers, they're having it out in public — in the columns they write for New York Newsday and the New York Post.

In a column that combined the tact of Joan Rivers with the politesse of Sean Penn, Suzy called Revson "a liar," "a rat," a "know-nothing," "a nut," "a jerk" and "a snake." Among other things.

To be sure, Suzy admitted she had written about the party, thrown by Metropolitan Museum Chairman (and New York Times Publisher) Arthur "Bunny" Bulfinch, in advance. She said it was the only way she could get out of town for her vacation (which was "heaven").

"And yes, she said, it's true that some of the people she said were at the party never did show up."

is unimpressed. "I'm not joining it," he said. "I refuse to join it even if she asks me."

Foreign film nominations show the personal

HOLLYWOOD — For many years French filmmaker Louis Malle didn't think he wanted to deal with a very traumatic memory of his childhood. "It was like my secret, something I didn't want to talk about, even less so make a film about," he said. "But it stuck with me so vividly that 10 years ago I decided to give it a try."

The result of his painful recollection is "Au Revoir Les Enfants" ("Goodbye, Children"), one of the five nominees for the Academy Award for best foreign language film of 1987.

"Au Revoir Les Enfants" epitomizes the kind of films entered this year in Oscar's foreign-language category. Most of the movies are highly personal, either in the subject matter or the years of devotion given to the project by the filmmaker. The other nominees are

"Babette's Feast" (Denmark), based on a short story by Jack Dinesen, tells of two unmarried and very pious sisters who take a French political refugee, Babette, into their home in Norway in return for housekeeping. She later repays them with her art: the feast. The director, Gabriel Axel, spent 14 years trying to get his movie made.

"Coursea Completed" (Spain), about a depressed worker who escapes to the seashore after a fall and is followed by an old flame and his bothersome son. The film was co-written, produced and directed by Jose Luis Garcia.

"The Family" (Italy), an epic history of 80 years in the life of a Roman family, told with loving care by Ettore Scola ("La Bal").

"Pathfinder" (Norway), written and directed by Nils Gaup, a tale of revenge by a lapp boy whose family is

killed in a raid.

Malle — based — "Au Revoir Les Enfants" — on his experience as a boy of 11 during the German occupation of France. His well-to-do Paris family sent him to the safety of a Catholic boarding school in Fontainebleau. There he became friends with a brilliant Jewish boy who was being hidden from the Gestapo by a priest. The ruse was uncovered, and three Jewish boys as well as the head priest were sent to their deaths in concentration camps.

"I began writing notes when I was making a film of the same period," Lacombe, Lucien (1974). Malle remarked in an interview, "I decided there were little things there, but not necessarily a film."

"After I had been working in America a few years, all those things came back, maybe because I was far from home. My childhood returned so

strongly that I tried to put it into a screenplay.

"Maybe I decided to make peace with (my memories)," he said. "Also I reached the point that I thought I should give it away, that it was interesting enough to make it into a film so other people could share it with me."

"From that point I was really exhilarated and excited. I wasn't sure I would make a good film, but I was sure the material was really strong. Once I had the first draft of the screenplay, I started preproduction and I worked with great enthusiasm. It was like a deliverance in a way."

"Malle told his associates from the beginning that he would not make the film unless he found two remarkable children for the leading roles because they had to carry the whole movie. After interviewing hundreds of Parisian boys over a five-month period, he found his actors: Gaspard Manesse

and Raphael Pejo, both inexperienced in film work.

Axel is a Danish director who has divided his career between his native land and France. He became obsessed with a Dinesen story about a woman who escaped a 19th-century French revolution to serve as cook for a pair of devout spinsters in a remote Danish village. Formerly a world-class chef, the refugee (Stephane Audran) devotes her entire winnings in a lottery to a feast in honor of the spinsters' late minister-father.

"Fourteen years ago when I tried to make the film, the French said, 'OK,' the Danes said, 'no,'" recalled Axel, who needed the backing of both countries. "I went from producer to producer to producer, and they said, 'You can't make a film with no story, no action, no dialogue.' They did not see the possibilities."

— Axel needed between \$2.5 million

and \$3 million to make "Babette's Feast." He could understand the Danish reluctance. "There are only 5 million people in Denmark, and even if everyone of them went to the movie, it would not be enough to show a profit."

The Danish Film Institute finally provided 75 percent of the budget. When rave reviews and the Academy nomination, the investment seems secure.

Following his success with "Babette's Feast," Axel hopes to film a project he has nurtured for 20 years: a version of "Hamlet" based on the earliest histories of the saga from which Shakespeare borrowed his plot.

"The histories tell of the prince returning to Denmark to kill the uncle who murdered the king," Axel said. "But the original has a happy ending. Hamlet marries Ophelia, and they live happily ever after."

'Milagro' offers human theme

Robert Redford produces a story with universal meaning

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) — "The Milagro Beanfield War" is a story of one man's battle for the right to water for his northern New Mexico fields, but it has a universal theme — the fight to preserve a traditional way of life, the author says.

The story, and the film version produced by Robert Redford and Mocoema Esparza that opened in major markets two weeks ago, will reinforce people who oppose the impersonal march of progress, says John Nichols, author of "Milagro."

"Yeah, hopefully books like mine or a film like 'Milagro' can help to create an atmosphere where people struggling at all levels of society have just a little more on their side," the Taos resident said in a telephone interview.

Nichols, who won't see the movie until its New Mexico premiere, said the story celebrates the fight against the "fascist, nihilistic, anti-hero, everybody-out-for-themselves-oriented" aspects of society.

The main character, handyman Joe Mondragon, bucks the political and economic system when he illegally diverts water from a resort development into his once-abandoned beanfield.

Such wars have punctuated the modern history of northern New Mexico. In Nichols' and Redford's view, the buying or stealing of water and land for commercial enterprises threatens to wipe out the traditional, subsistence farmers, descendants of Spanish settlers, by making their simple lifestyle impossible.

In most of his 19 years in New Mexico, Nichols has embraced and participated in traditional causes.

In the early 1970s, he lampooned state water officials in editorial cartoons, designed and distributed protest flyers against the construction of a dam and researched titles to find out who really held the land and the power in Taos Valley. In recent years, the fight has been against a proposed mining slurry reservoir and a bypass road that is eating up farmland around Taos.

"It is not acceptable for progress, American-style, to throw away cultures or human beings, to commit cultural genocide on anybody that gets in the way," Nichols said.

Nichols expected to be treated well by Redford and Esparza in their film version of his 1974 novel.

"I've always had a real trust for Mocoema Esparza and Robert's instincts. And both of them certainly have a long track record of real concern and involvement in everything from the environment to culture, things I believe are important causes," said Nichols.

Redford is well-known for his environmentalist work and Esparza is a film chronicler of the Hispanic world.

The New Mexico premiere of the movie will be joined by parades, art shows, contests, and \$400- and \$600-receptions to benefit a sheep-and-wool cooperative, a private community grant foundation, an Albuquerque theater group and the legal aid agency of northern New Mexico.

"Obviously, my hope is that once all the glamour and the hoopla die down over the film, that it will be a loving and compassionate movie with, you know, important cultural and political points to make that will endure," said Nichols.

Many residents of Truchas, the mountain village where the film was shot, got parts in the movie or had other jobs with the production and will attend a special showing of the film.

Truchas embraced the film after the project was rebuffed by residents of Chimayo, a small village about 30 miles northeast of Santa Fe.

Redford had approached residents of Chimayo because the town's old buildings and central plaza were ideal for scenes in the movie.

But a small group of Chimayosos opposed the project, saying it would disrupt their lives, and Redford was forced 10 miles upstream to Truchas.

Nichols said he was not surprised.

"I thought they had every right in the world to protest the filming in their town, and what's more, the people, the press and everyone else should have respected that right without question," said Nichols. "Believe me, I think the integrity of the community is a lot more important than making temporary bucks off a film."

Oscar beats humble origins

CHICAGO (AP) — The origins of the Oscar, a golden symbol of artistic triumph, are more down to earth than many of the glitzy stars who take home the greatly cherished statuette.

Far from the studios, sun and sea of the California West Coast, is a cluster of brick buildings in a residential-industrial neighborhood of Chicago. Under a cloak of security, this is where the trophy manufacturer R.S. Owens & Co. creates the Academy Award prize.

Winning the Oscar contract may not compare with winning the Oscar itself. However, it was a coup for Owens seven years ago and remains a source of company pride: The statuette used to be made by Dufferin Inc. at a small manufacturing plant in Crystal Lake, Ill., some 25 miles northwest of Chicago.

With 300 employees, Owens makes about 95 percent of the most prestigious awards in the country, includ-

ing the television industry's Emmys, advertising's Glens, the Super Bowl trophy and the Miss America awards. But Oscar tops them all.

Most people don't know the names of awards in other fields, much less what they look like, said Bernice Estka, who handles the Oscar account for Owens.

"Oscar, you know," she said.

Each model of the muscular knight, who holds a sword and stands impassively on a reel of film, is hand cast from a single steel mold.

Oscar was designed by Cedric Gibbons, then head of the MGM studio's art department. He sketched the prototype on a tablecloth in 1927. Sculptor George Stanley transformed the sketch into the coveted statuette.

The trophy was named Oscar by longtime Academy employee Margaret Herrick, who took one look at the statuette and declared that it re-

mined her of her Uncle Oscar, Eska said.

The design has remained unchanged since 1927, and the mold, which was turned over to Owens with the contract, is kept in a vault.

"Not even Owens nor the Academy of Motion Pictures Arts & Sciences, whose members vote to decide the winners, would reveal the price tag on Oscar."

"I like to say that they are worth a million dollars to the people who receive them," said Owen R. Siegel, founder and chief executive officer of the trophy company. "Once you have got an Oscar — you've made it."

"If we say it only costs a certain amount to make, what does that do to the image?" said Patrick Stockstill, the Academy historian who will hand the Oscars to presenters at the 60th annual awards presentation on April 11.

'Biloxi Blues' heads top box office offerings

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Neil Simon's "Biloxi Blues" about a recruit from Brooklyn who gets his Army basic training in the Deep South, stood front and center in first place at the nation's box office over the weekend.

The autobiographical film starring Matthew Broderick and directed by Mike Nichols earned more than \$7 million in its debut week to lead four new movies during spring break. The movie is based on Simon's Broadway play.

Pallets make fine art in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES — Daniel Van Meter's back yard is unusual, to say the least.

Behind half a dozen junked cars, an old bus, washing machines, water heaters, an old out-house and even a turret from a battleship stands Los Angeles Historic-Cultural Monument No. 184 — the Tower of Wooden Pallets.

Constructed by Van Meter in 1951, the 22-foot-tall tower is made up of about 2,000 wooden pallets that were tossed out by a brewery. The pallets are stacked in a 22-foot-wide circle and placed on top of each other in brick-like fashion. Beneath the structure is the grave of child buried in 1869.

In 1977, the Fire Department declared the tower "an illegally stacked lumber pile" and a fire hazard.

A year later, it was named a landmark by the city Cultural Heritage Commission, joining such other historical-cultural monuments as the Watts Towers, the Hollywood sign, the Venice canals, a 1,000-year-old oak tree and the zeppelin Catalina.

"Maybe we were drunk," joked a former commissioner when asked why the Tower of Pallets, as it is known officially, was designated a landmark.

But to its creator, 74-year-old Van Meter, the tower is a special place to get away from the turmoil of urban society.

"I have a place where it is quiet, despite the apartments, the noise of the boulevard and the hum and screeches of the rat race on the freeway 200 feet away," he said.

At night, Van Meter, who climbs to the top of the tower and looks at the moon and the stars. "To me, this is a spiritual place."

Tucked away at the end of Magnolia Boulevard in the Sherman Oaks neighborhood of Los Angeles, a few feet from the San Diego Freeway, is Van Meter's house. The house and 2½ acres, where Van Meter has lived since 1947, is the only single-family residential property left on the block,

which has been developed with a condominium complex, a fire station, an office building and a private school.

Van Meter's property is filled, some might say littered — with historical memorabilia. There are wooden wagons that date to 1912, rusty old cars, washing machines, water heaters, a boat, a kitchen sink, an old out-house and sheds full of other dusty stuff. A red gasoline pump, advertising gas for 24¢ a gallon, stands beside a 1938 city bus.

With every stem, Van Meter tells a story. "That was used to build the first road from Los Angeles into the San Fernando Valley," he said, pointing to an old wagon.

Van Meter, who says he is a descendant of John Quincy Adams, has been interested in history since he began picking up coins and artifacts as a child. A founder of the American Independent Party and supporter of former Alabama Gov. George Wallace's 1972 presidential campaign, Van Meter loves to talk politics. But his first love appears to be collecting his toral memorabilia.

A life-long bachelor who has held odd jobs, Van Meter's most unusual item is the tower.

Van Meter got the pallets as a result of a labor dispute at Schlitz Brewing Co. Union workers at the brewery refused to repair the pallets, which were slightly damaged. They wanted the company to hire workers from another union to make the repairs. The company stacked the pallets outside the brewery until the dispute could be settled.

"Then they got word that some big shots from back East were coming to inspect the brewery," Van Meter said. He said the supervisor at the plant wanted to get rid of the pallets before the executives arrived. Van Meter said he offered to take "a few" off the company's hands.

When five truckloads of the pallets arrived at his door, "I decided I had to do something with them," Van Meter said. He decided to build the tower because he wanted a place to look out across the Valley.

Neil Simon's comedy 'Biloxi Blues' makes nostalgia humorous

Neil Simon's humor marks the spot where Jewish angst and dinner theater come together, the kind of easy-listening comedy that has made him America's most popular playwright. With "Biloxi Blues," the master of glib nostalgia becomes an honest humorist, a mellow autobiographer in an endearing adaptation of his Broadway play.

It is a reverie of revelry and lost virginity; a wartime sequel to the disastereously adapted "Brighton Beach Memoirs." Set in 1943, this boot-camp diary is narrated by Simon's alter ego Eugene Morris Jerome (Matthew Broderick), the embryonic playwright in Dixieland. On the troop train south, Eugene recalls from the horny, hungry, hell-bent, smelly recruits. "It was hard to believe these guys had mothers and fathers who worried about them," he says of the group, the stock ethnic assortment bound to skirmish their ways into each other's hearts.

The terrain is familiar, with its "pen-hut" and powdered eggs, its golden-hearted harlot and insane drill sergeant. But the perspective is a little different.

Eugene is a sweet-natured iconoclast, an adolescent who comes of age as an artist and trite as it may sound, the military also makes him a man.

His friend Epstein (Corey Parker), a stubborn Jewish intellectual, sets an example, refusing to give up his ideals despite persecution from the other GIs. "Once you start compromising your thoughts, you're a candidate for mediocrity," he warns. The line is a turning point for Eugene.

Epstein objects conscientiously to the Army's training practices and foolishly, single-handedly, tries to change them by butting heads with Merwin J. Toomey, a slightly deranged drill sergeant with a plate in his head. Eugene is caught in the cross-fire when Toomey threatens both their lives. It's a case of "Full Metal Jacket," with schmaltz, an odd twist that shows there is risk in Simon's repertoire.

Cast as Toomey, Christopher Walken wobbles precariously between madness and stability, like a grenade without its pin. He's an intriguing character. If his freedom raises his voice, a welcome change from the "your-mother-wore-combat-boots" type. Except for Epstein and the racist Polish guy who acts like a goat, the other boys blend into a khaki mush. There's also a memorable performance by Park Overall, who reprises

her stage role of the earthy, whiskey-voiced prostitute who teaches Eugene a thing or two.

Of course, success or failure rests almost entirely with Broderick, who is irresistible in the role he also played on-stage in both "Brighton Beach Memoirs" and "Biloxi Blues." He practically is Eugene by now, completely comfortable with the character and a master of talking to himself. He gives us a wide-eyed soldier boy who's a capitiating cross between Charlie Sheen and Henry Youngman, a fox-hole vaudevillian.

And he looks as if he stepped out of a Norman Rockwell. The look suited the romantic vision of director Mike Nichols, who is making his first film with Simon, though they have worked together on four plays. Nichols wanted to capture the ingenueness of the '40s, when America had wide eyes, rosy cheeks and a good cause. "It was one of your better wars," Eugene recalls. "We liked the songs. We liked the uniforms. We liked that everybody liked us."

Sometimes, as in the epilogue, Eugene gets a little sappy — Simon couldn't stop himself entirely — and sometimes the scenes seem as disconnected as a boy's game of GI Joe.

"Biloxi Blues" is rated PG-13 for vulgarities.

'The Woman He Loved:' British romance with an American twist

"It's a very important love story. Anthony Andrews intones, "one that so affected British history that it must go down alongside the romances of Henry VIII."

Surely, Andrews is stretching it, grasping for a lofty, English-y comparison as he dishes out "Napoleon and Josephine"-style hyperbole. But he's right — to a degree: "The Woman He Loved," a CBS movie airing Sunday, April 3, deals with one of the oddest knots in the British-royal-family tree: King Edward VIII's marriage to an American divorcee.

Andrews stars as Edward (called David by family and friends), Prince of Wales. In the mid 1930s, he fell in love with Wallis Simpson (played by Jane Seymour), an American woman who had already been divorced once and remarried. After the death of his father, George V, in 1936, Davis ascended to the throne as King Edward VIII — and stepped into a dilemma. In royal society, Americans were unsuitable, and divorcees were anathema. A twice-divorced American was beyond the pale. But Edward and Wallis persisted. Wallis obtained a divorce from her second husband, Ernest Simpson. And ultimately, British Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin told Edward he must either end the affair or abdicate as king.

"There was a certain degree of naivete' involved," Andrews says. "Edward really believed that his charm would persuade everyone. And she believed that official rules were one thing, but that in fact Edward's opponents would never go through with it. She thought that as king he would just override them."

Edward abdicated in December

1938; after only 10 months as king. He and Wallis left the country and married, living principally in France, with Edward, now Duke of Windsor, serving as governor of Bermuda during World War II. Edward's brother, George VI, ascended to the throne, and England moved on. But memories of the romance and the constitutional crisis it brought on remain firmly planted in the public consciousness.

"If you grow up in England, the story is very familiar," Andrews says.

"And one's parents were absolutely a part of it. It's still quite fresh in every one's memory."

At first, the story's very Englishness might make it seem inaccessible to American TV audiences. But, as Andrews has discovered, Americans seem to enjoy British culture precisely because of its impenetrability. His best-known role, for instance, was as Sebastian Flyte in the British miniseries "Brideshead Revisited." Sebastian was steeped in Oxford, Roman Catholic and English manor traditions that seemed to Americans, arcane — and, hence, appealing.

As a result of the popularity of "Brideshead Revisited" as a PBS import, Andrews has appeared in a number of American TV projects, including "The Scarlet Pimpernel," Agatha Christie's "Sparkling Cyanide" and the recent miniseries "Bluegrass," in which he played Irish horseman Michael Fitzgerald. Andrews has almost become an accent for hire.

Appropriately, "The Woman He Loved" weds American and British sensibilities. "It has a very PBS quality to it," Andrews says.

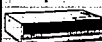

NBC's unfortunate 'Fortunate Pilgrim' is wooden, tedious

NEW YORK — "The Fortunate Pilgrim," based on novelist Mario Puzo's sweeping saga of an Italian immigrant family in search of the American dream, is, unfortunately, a tedious, wooden melodrama in its adaptation for TV.

NBC will air the two-part, five-hour miniseries on Sunday and Monday, April 3-4.

Sophia Loren, whose husband, Carlo Ponti, produced "The Fortunate Pilgrim," stars as plucky-matriarch Lucia Corbo, whose first husband is killed in a factory explosion, and whose second husband, played by Edward James Olmos of "Miami Vice," succumbs to insanity. Her children, meanwhile, get tuberculosis, arrested and the neighbor's wife pregnant.

Hal Holbrook arrives in Part 2 as a Scotch-French doctor who romances Lucia. John Turturro, who made his mark playing malevolent types in such films as "To Live and Die in L.A." and "Five Corners," is eldest son Larry.

The movie, a period piece set in the 1920s and '30s, was shot against an almost sepia-toned backdrop by director Stuart Cooper, who did the miniseries "The Long Hot Summer." This one was filmed on location in Yugoslavia, but the sets look more like a studio backlot. Also, inexplicably, the dialogue sounds dubbed much of the time.

Cooper's rudimentary direction is matched only by the pedestrian script. Drama needs conflict. The fluffy "I'll Take Manhattan," even with broadly drawn characters and plotlines, worked because it at least had structure.

"The Fortunate Pilgrim" is a muddle. The central conflict seems to be Lucia's dream for a home in the country and success for her children running up against her offspring's constant moral lapses, illnesses and scrapes with neighbors and the law. An early symbol of evil is a laughably Snidely Whiplash-like landlord.

Character perseveres

The result is a meandering plotline composed of a series of unconnected events, most of which have no buildup or ramifications.

In John McGreevey's script, as well, character development consists of simplistic dialogue, although it doesn't help us connect with them to switch actors every hour or two as the children age.

A sample scene: Early in Part 2, son Vinnie goes to comfort sister-in-law Luisa who is weeping after being insulted by her husband, Larry. We have seen these two only in passing, so this is supposed to establish their characters.

"Too bad you didn't get to finish high school. I probably won't either," Vinnie says at one point.

"You should. Vinnie, you're so smart," says Luisa.

"Mom depends on me. That's the way it is," he replies.

"You're too kind," she says. "You're always doing things for other people."

The miniseries does have the dubious honor of stifling a fine cast.

Loren is becoming something of a TV movie regular — she was in "Courage" last season and before that "Aurora" and "Sophia Loren: Her

Own Story" — and she is still a charismatic screen presence.

Olmos, who plays enigmatic Martin Castillo on "Vice," does a good job with smoldering, Frank Corbo, convincing us by strength of performance that Lucia could indeed fall in love with this troubled man.

Annabella Sciorra makes an impressive television debut as Octavia, Lucia's headstrong eldest daughter. Also notable is Yugoslavian actress Mirjana Karanovic who plays Clara, a married woman who becomes pregnant by Larry.

even her memoirs.

Q: Isn't it true that former friends Gary Hart and actor Warren Beatty have stopped speaking to each other? — C.W.

A: No, it isn't. Despite all that's happened to the two of them — Hart's well-publicized troubles and Beatty's colossal movie flop, "Ishtar" — the two are fast friends. My West Coast spy spotted the two dining in a restaurant near Hollywood not long ago. They turned a lot of heads, but remained aloof to other diners. They chatted like close buddies all through dinner.

Q: My grandson told me that my favorite star, Cyd Charisse, has done a music video with a pair of British singers. Now I know Cyd is 65 and a grandmother, so how is this possible? — T.D.

A: Well, Cyd is a year younger, but your grandson is correct. Cyd met a two-man group called the Blue Mercedes in London and they told her she'd been their favorite when they were children. A line in their hit single, "I Want to Be Your Property" is "I want to dance like Cyd Charisse." So Cyd agreed to appear if they'd come to Hollywood to shoot the video and they

did.

FAME, AT LAST: In the '70s when they were ready to cast the remake of "A Star Is Born," Cher was a frontrunner for the role.

But Warner Bros. decided she wasn't a big enough box-office star. A Warners executive called Cher to tell her she was rejected in favor of Barbra Streisand, who got the role co-starring with Kris Kristofferson. But now with the fabulous success of "Moonstruck," no one would turn down Cher.

Q: A history of the movie colony, which was given to me for my birthday, noted that the films made during Hollywood's golden era frequently contained overt plugs for other films produced by the same studio. Is this still done? — D.K.

Strangely, this plugs the movies of rival studios Columbia and Dino De Laurentiis, respectively, rather than Metro's own

product.

Q: Isn't Elizabeth Taylor so crazy about jewelry that she'll do anything to land an expensive new rock? — U.L.

A: No question that Taylor genuinely adores jewelry. I spotted her one recent rainy Hollywood Sunday in an expensive restaurant with a lot of other high-powered personalities around. Elizabeth was most attracted to none other than Pin Zadora. Why? Because Pia's rich husband had given her a diamond wedding ring that was big enough to impress even Taylor. She even yanked a candle off the table to better check out the jewel.
