White supremacists found not guilty

FORT SMITH, Ark. — Jurors acquitted 13 white supremacists Thursday of charges including conspiring to overthrow the federal government and to kill a federal judge and FBI agent.

sedition conspiracy, accused of wanting to overthrow the government and start an all-white nation in the Pacific Northwest. Five were accused of conspiring to kill the federal officials, and two also were charged with transporting stolen money across state lines. Six of the defendants are already serving prison terms for other crimes. The jury reached a verdict Wednesday on the charge involving the judge and FBI agent, but Arnold ordered it sealed until deliberations were complete.

The government said supremacist groups robbed banks and armored trucks of \$4.1 million, including about \$1 million that still is missing. The defense contended the conspiracy theory was made up by a key government witness, James Ellison, 47, who led a supremacist group in Arkansas and now is serving 30 years for racketeering. "The government was going to send a message to the movement. The movement sent a message to the government. The message was the same one God told pharaoh, 'Let my people

go," said Thom Robb, the national chaplain of the Ku Klux Klan, who hugged several of the defendants after the verdict was announced. Fitzhugh said it was not a political trial. "We weren't after them for what they believed or what they said, but what they did," he said. He declined to say whether any investigations of a similar nature are under way and said he did not know the cost of the trial. Burton Levinson, national chairman of the Anti-Defamation League

Stallings opens campaign for 3rd term in House

TWIN FALLS — As a storm brewed on the horizon Thursday afternoon, Idaho Rep. Richard Stallings announced he would seek re-election to a third term. "I'm not afraid to take the hard votes and take on the important issues," said the Rexburg Democrat. But during the blustery encounter in Twin Falls City Park, at least half the 40 people present actively protested Stallings' support of one tough issue — the Special Isotope Separator project. Some protesters, including Bill Chisholm, said the issue warranted opposing Stallings' re-election as a Democrat in the highly Republican 2nd Congressional district.

"It's a life-or-death issue — if we're all dead, who cares" who's elected, said Chisholm, of Buhl. "This is an opportunity for him to do the right thing." Still, Stallings' main challenger, Republican Dane Watkins, also supports SIS. And protesters applauded several of Stallings' other stands, including ones supporting civil rights legislation or opposing the MX missile and lethal aid to Nicaraguan rebels. SIS is a \$1 billion project aimed at purifying plutonium at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory for use in nuclear weapons. Stallings said he understood the issue pitted two facets against one another — the favorable allure of hundreds of jobs for eastern Idaho contrasted in Magic Valley against the morality of nuclear war. During an interview with the Times-News

earlier this week, Stallings said 80 percent of eastern Idaho supported SIS for its jobs. He conceded SIS opposition in Blaine County may run 10-to-1 against supporters. But he said his private polling found about 60 percent of the Magic Valley supports the project. Clouting that alleged Magic Valley support were opposition to SIS from the majority of 500 witnesses during hearings last week and the Snake River-area residents protesting Thursday. "This is not the time or the place to debate the SIS," said Stallings, closing the discussion on whether SIS should hinder his re-election. "You'll have to make that choice." Stallings fared better on other issues, drawing applause for his "tough decisions" and laughs for jokes about being the only Democrat in Idaho's four-man national delegation.

Referring to arguments for the consistency of having all Republicans, Stallings said, "I think it's hogwash. I am pleased to be an individual member of the delegation." He added that there are times when it's important for all four lawmakers to vote together — "when they agree with me on an issue." Following his campaign slogan, "As independent as Idaho," Stallings noted his opposing President Ronald Reagan on sending lethal aid to the Nicaraguan Contras, while also opposing the Democratic leadership in Congress on tax increases. But he did play on his seniority and majority membership in the House Agriculture Committee. He said that will be important to protect the federal sugar-beet program in 1989, when a new Farm Bill is drafted. "There is no issue more important to this community than agriculture," he said.

Bennett tries to aid tough kids

NEW YORK — U.S. Education Secretary William Bennett called on Catholic schools Thursday to enroll the "worst 5 or 10 percent" of public school students and ask state or local government to help pay for teaching them. His proposal, made in an address to the National Catholic Education Association's 85th annual convention here, was greeted warmly by Catholic educators but was challenged as unconstitutional by several leading public education groups. Bennett dubbed his proposal "Project Volunteers," Latin for good will. Parochial schools already have done an exemplary job teaching minority students, who make up 25 percent of their 2.5 million total enrollment, he told the gathering. But he said Catholic educators have not been effective — in talking outsiders how much better they've done with difficult students compared with many public schools. "The challenge is simple," said Bennett, a parochial school product himself. "Show educators around this country what works." • See TOUGH on Page A2

Attorneys ask court to dismiss indictments in Iran-Contra case

WASHINGTON — Attorneys for three of four defendants charged in the Iran-Contra case moved Thursday to dismiss the indictment on the ground that prosecution evidence is illegally based on their testimony to Congress. Lawyers representing former national security adviser John M. Poindexter, Lt. Col. Oliver L. North and businessman Albert Hakim contended that some of the evidence prosecutors used to obtain the 23-count indictment last month came from testimony the three gave to the House and Senate Iran-Contra committees. Poindexter, North and Hakim testified under grants of immunity from prosecution that prohibit independent counsel Lawrence E. Walsh from using their answers to congressional questioning as evidence against them. Even though Walsh tried to insulate his staff and grand jurors from publicity surrounding the hearings, given the widespread dissemination of immunized testimony throughout our society, the broad use of immu-

Panama's opposition splits; church won't mediate crisis

PANAMA CITY, Panama — The Roman Catholic Church said Thursday it was suspending its effort to mediate Panama's political crisis as the first major split appeared in the opposition to Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega. Marcos G. McGrath, the Catholic archbishop of Panama, said in a statement he was withdrawing his mediation offer for three reasons: • Opposition groups refused to talk to the government until it showed it was willing to discuss the departure of Noriega. • The archbishop had not received Noriega's explicit and personal backing of the initiative in writing. • There were no assurances that the four international leaders who proposed the talks could be present. The breakdown came a day after Noriega ordered the arrests of several leading opponents. The general has denied U.S. efforts to force his resignation. In another development, banking and diplomatic sources said Panama's banks would not reopen today, and possibly not next week. The government said last week it hoped to have banks functioning again Friday. Banking and diplomatic sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, said bank would not open Friday even on a limited basis. They said bankers feared the government would use their deposits if they reopened. The government, whose deposits in U.S. banks have been frozen, has not met public payrolls since the crisis began. The last of 1,300 additional U.S. soldiers arrived Thursday at Howard Air Force Base outside Panama City, competing a buildup meant to provide greater security for the Panama Canal, American installations and U.S. citizens. Late Wednesday, the government said it had issued arrest warrants for three leading opponents, including Delvalle, who has been in hiding in Panama. It also asked Interpol, the international police organization, to arrest Gabriel Lewis Galindo, a former ambassador to the United States, and Juan B. Sosa, who was Delvalle's envoy in Washington and remains there. In Washington, the State Department said Thursday the United States "would regard any efforts by" • See PANAMA on Page A2

Dukakis, Gore clash over charge of 'Stop Jackson' effort

NEW YORK (AP) — Sen. Albert Gore Jr. on Thursday accused the campaign of Gov. Michael Dukakis of trying to fuel a "stop Jackson" drive by suggesting that voting for Gore would only help Jackson.

Dukakis denied that.

"You have the flood of anecdotal reports from all over New York, that the Dukakis camp is making that statement in conversation after conversation after conversation," Gore said in a news conference at the New York Hilton. "That's something that really ought to stop."

Dukakis, asked if his campaign was spreading such a message, replied, "Absolutely not." He spoke as he left a state Democratic Committee meeting that heard separately from all three candidates.

"I don't believe that comment was ever made, and if it was, it shouldn't have been," he added later. And Jesse Jackson, asked about Gore's contention, said: "I do not know of that."

Later, at a forum sponsored by The Democracy Project, Jackson was asked about Louis Farrakhan, the controversial leader of the Nation of Islam, a Black Muslim group. During the 1984 campaign, Jackson urged voters to support Farrakhan even after he described Judaism as a "gutter religion."

Asked to describe his current relationship with Farrakhan, Jackson replied: "We do not have one."

Gore had raised the issue of a "stop Jackson" effort at the state party meeting.

"I fear that in other camps something else is going on behind the scenes," he said. "Last week the Wisconsin director of the Dukakis campaign was quoted publicly as saying, 'A vote for Gore is a vote for Jackson.'"

"In my opinion that kind of politics is insulting to Jesse, insulting to me and insulting to the Democratic Party," the Tennessee senator said. "Let me make one thing clear: A vote for Gore is a vote for Jesse, and if the Dukakis campaign wants to start a stop Jackson movement, I want no part of it."

Gore elaborated on his comments at a news conference later. While Jackson said he knew nothing of it, his campaign manager, Gerald Austin, said separately that earlier in the campaign it was Gore who used such tactics.

"In South Carolina, Gore said a vote for anyone but him was a vote for Jackson," Austin told reporters at

the Hilton. "So if the shoe fits, wear it. He's worn the shoe before."

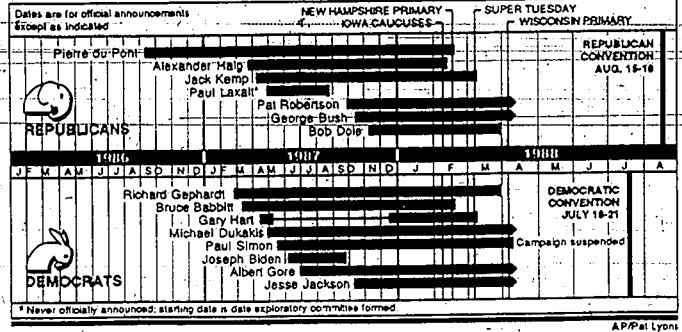
Dukakis has led Jackson in polls in the April 19 New York primary, with Gore lagging behind. Analysts have suggested that Jackson, who has drawn support from nearly all the black voters and one-fifth to one-quarter of the white voters in recent races, could prevail in New York if Gore moved his standing enough to split the remaining white votes with Dukakis.

Jackson, in his own news conference at the hotel, declined to take the offensive against his opponents, saying, "I intend to keep this campaign on a high plane."

But he did criticize Sen. Paul Simon of Illinois, who suspended his race Thursday but did not withdraw. That allows Simon to keep, as convention bargaining chips, the delegates he won in the Illinois primary. Otherwise they would go to second-place finisher Jackson.

"If one is not in the race one ought to indicate a form of honorable withdrawal at which time whoever got second place in that state will get these delegates," Jackson said. "That's what Mr. (Sen. Richard) Gephardt did. It was the honorable and the fair thing to do."

Simon quits chase, sort of

WASHINGTON (AP) — Illinois Sen. Paul Simon suspended his 1988 presidential campaign Thursday but held onto his 170 delegates in hopes of influencing the choice of a nominee at the Democratic national convention in July.

Jesse Jackson immediately blasted Simon for keeping the delegates, saying most of them were rightfully his.

"In a year that has already seen many surprises, no one knows what twists and turns may develop between now and then," Simon told a news conference. "There will be many encounters with fate before the contest is ultimately decided in a wide-open convention."

In a quasi-withdrawal, Simon said

he would no longer actively campaign for the nomination but said he technically would remain a candidate even though he conceded he has "no illusions that the nomination will come my way."

"I want to have an impact on who the party nominates," Simon said. "I want to have an impact on the whole process there (at the Atlanta convention), and on where we go."

Jackson, however, said Simon's move was a less-than-honorable one, and that he ought to release his delegates.

Rep. Richard Gephardt dropped out of the Democratic race last month. Simon showed early strength in the Democratic campaign, finishing a

close second in Iowa's first-in-the-nation caucuses. But he dropped to third in New Hampshire and failed to rebound as the primary season wore on, except for a lone win in his home state. His bid bottomed out Tuesday in Wisconsin, where he finished last with just 5 percent of the vote.

He blamed his campaign's precipitous decline on a failure to effectively communicate his message of traditional Democratic party values, and on a lack of money, but said he did not see his failure as a rejection of those values.

Simon said he would keep a lock on the 170 delegates he has won and an aide said he hoped to perhaps attract a few more by the time the party's last primaries end on June 7. At that point, Simon said, he will meet with the delegates and decide what to do next.

"I owe something to those delegates," he said. A total of 2,082 delegates is needed to nominate a candidate.

One effect of Simon's decision to nominally remain a candidate and retain his delegates is that he holds onto 47 at-large delegates won in the Illinois primary. Had he formally withdrawn from the race, those delegates would have gone automatically to Jesse Jackson, who finished second in Illinois.

16 political figures indicted

WILLIAMSON, W.Va. (AP) — A grand jury Thursday indicted two state legislators, the mayor and 13 other political figures in a mountain coal county already wracked by charges of job-selling and drug-dealing by local officials.

One indictment charged a state senator who was a former county commissioner with bribery in the alleged sale of the Mingo County sheriff's job in 1982 for \$100,000, and another indictment accused 15 others of viola-

tions of state election laws and conspiracy.

The 15 are accused of conspiring with Johnnie M. Owens, the former sheriff and former county Democratic Party chairman, and others to influence elections in 1984 and 1986 and law enforcement in the county.

The indictment charges this group of people with attempting basically to subvert the free election system in Mingo County, said special prosecutor James Colburn.

Others indicted included: Richard Joseph Scutari, 40, of New York, already serving 60 years after being convicted of racketeering in a trial in Seattle.

Bruce Carroll Pierce, 32, of Metairie, La., Wash., serving 100 years from Seattle for racketeering and 150 years after being convicted in Denver of violating the civil rights of radio personality Alan Berg by murdering him.

Andrew Virgil Barnhill, 31, of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., serving 40 years for racketeering.

Archie McBrearty, 60, of Gentry, Ark., serving 40 years for racketeering.

David Eden Lane, 48, of Denver, serving 40 years for racketeering and 150 years for Berg's death.

Richard Wayne Snell, 57, of Muse, Okla., sentenced to die for the murder of a pawn shop operator in 1983 and life in prison without parole for the 1984 slaying of an Arkansas state trooper.

Lambert Miller, 47, of Springfield, Mo.

David Michael McGuire, 25, of Greenville, Ill.

Ivan Ray Wade, 35, of Smithville, Ark.

William Wade, 68, of Smithville, father of Ivan Ray Wade.

of Brian Pith, said in a statement from New York that the verdicts were "a real setback in the war against organized hate."

"Although many of the defendants are already serving prison terms growing out of their extremist activities, the others, including the most important leaders, will now be free to once again promote their anti-democratic and bigoted aims. The outcome means that we must and will remain vigilant," Levinson said.

Beam celebrated his acquittal by going to a Confederate memorial opposite the court building and claiming victory against what he called the "Zionist occupation government."

"There are over 150 other political prisoners being held in ZOG's jails that need to be freed," Beam said.

"I think ZOG has suffered a terrible defeat here today. I think everyone saw through the charade and saw that I was simply being punished for being a vociferous and outspoken opponent of ZOG."

Beam's wife, Sheila, fainted and was carried a block to an attorney's office by her husband.

Maximum penalties for conviction would have included 20 years and a \$20,000 fine for seditious conspiracy, life for conspiracy to murder, and 10 years and a \$10,000 fine for transporting stolen money.

The trial started Feb. 16.

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the Noriega regime to attempt arrests or prosecutions of President Delvalle and the others for their activities in urging and supporting U.S. sanctions as the unlawful acts of an illegitimate regime.

A major rift appeared Thursday in the anti-Noriega opposition, as two parties split from the opposition alliance to form their own anti-government movement.

Their leaders argued that U.S. economic sanctions are hurting Panama's people more than they are damaging Noriega and the civilian government he controls.

Roberto Arosemena and Mauro Zuniga, leaders of the Popular Action Party, announced formation of the Popular Civic Movement in a break with the National Civic Crusade, an alliance of about 200 organizations that has led the 10-month-old effort to oust Noriega.

They told a news conference their movement also is backed by the Authentic Panamanian Party, the largest opposition political party.

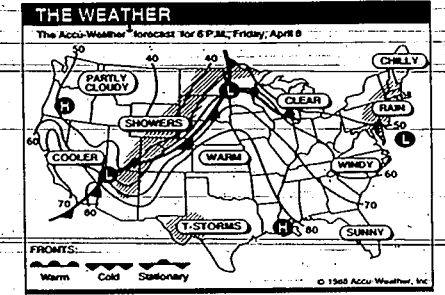
Washington has supported the Civic Crusade in its effort to remove Noriega as chief of the 15,000-member Defense Forces, which include the military and police. Noriega is under indictment in the United States on drug trafficking charges, which he denies.

Zuniga said the new movement rejects any U.S. influence.

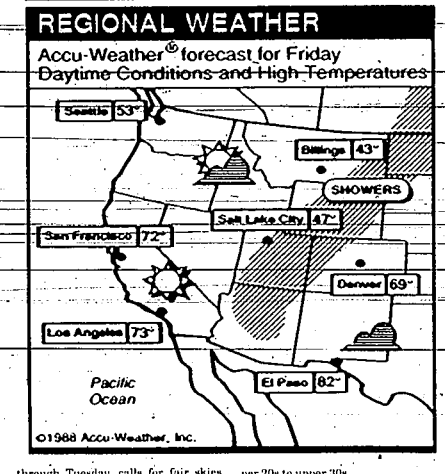
Snow in the Treasure Valley Thursday had reduced visibility to about one mile at the Boise airport, but little in the way of accumulation had occurred due to the warm ground temperature.

About 10 inch of precipitation had fallen at Boise as of 4 p.m. Highs varied widely on the southeastern part of the state was in the upper 60s instead of the frontal system while the southwest was in the 30s with snow falling. As of 3 p.m. Boise was 40 degrees cooler than the same time Wednesday.

Gusty winds were blowing over most of the southern part of the state, with velocities in southwestern Idaho near 30 mph while the southeast had gusts to 40 mph.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 73 degrees at Malin. Soda Springs reported the coldest at 29 degrees.

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"Seek out the poor, the disadvantaged, the disruptive, the dropout, and take them in; educate them; and then ask society for fair recompense for your efforts," Bennett said.

He said Catholic schools should ask state or local governments for "half the price, or two-thirds of the price, or something like that," of whatever it would have cost to teach such students in public school.

"I think there's a good deal of possibility for it," said the Rev. John Polard, director of education for the Archdiocese of Chicago which enrolls 180,000 kindergarten through 12th-grade students.

"We do not subscribe to the absolute separation of church and state that others who oppose us do. The so-called wall of separation is not in the (U.S.) Constitution," he said.

But "Project Voluntas" was condemned by Gary Marx, associate executive director of the American Association of School Administrators. "Every thoughtful American should be appalled by the secretary's remarks. He constantly hits people in the public schools below the belt and they are the ones who are working hardest to deal with the problems of at-risk youth."

Thomas Shannon, executive director of the National School Boards Association, called Bennett's proposal a welcome challenge to Catholic schools, but questioned its constitutionality.

"If the Catholic schools are going to do what they are supposed to do, that is, teach Catholic beliefs in an integrated way throughout the curriculum, it would be unconstitutional on its face" to support such schools with public funds, Shannon said.

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Unusual tactics nab foreign criminals

WASHINGTON (AP) — American authorities, often aided by friendly foreign governments, have had some successes lately luring or forcing criminal suspects out of safe havens abroad into the long arms of the law.

Some people call it kidnapping, but federal courts have generally approved the practice.

The latest dramatic case occurred this week when Honduran police acting on information from U.S. marshals arrested alleged international cocaine czar Juan Ramon Matta Bollasteros at his home in Honduras, and started him on a plane journey that ended in the federal penitentiary in Marion, Ill.

Matta, who escaped from a U.S. jail in 1971 and has been charged with subsequent drug offenses in the United States, also was sought for questioning in the murder of a U.S. narcotics agent.

Honduran legislators, citing a law against extradition of Honduran citizens, labeled the transfer a "kidnapping," but the U.S. Marshals Service called it "a major milestone in our worldwide assault on illegal drug trafficking."

The United States has extradition

treaties with more than 100 countries, but each accord is different and some require long and often fruitless court proceedings that frustrate U.S. law enforcement agents' desire to get their hands on suspects.

Getting other countries to help by using what are euphemistically called "non-diplomatic means" — as in the Matta case — are common, law enforcement authorities say, though no statistics on such arrests are published.

Police jokingly refer to these methods as "Mexican Extraditions," a reference to the longstanding Mexican practice of shooting suspects wanted in the United States across the border, where U.S. police are waiting.

In the Matta case, two countries helped. The Hondurans put him on a plane to the Dominican Republic without a passport. Officials in that country expelled him by placing him aboard a flight bound for New York. U.S. marshals aboard the aircraft arrested him immediately.

Last year, Carlos Lehder, a reputed drug kingpin from Colombia, was extradited to the United States at the request of the Drug Enforcement Administration.

Sometimes, the United States captures people abroad without overt assistance from foreign nations.

Last year, according to the FBI, undercover agents tracking Fawaz Younis, a suspect in the 1985 hijacking of a Jordanian aircraft, tricked him into going aboard a yacht in the Mediterranean Sea and arrested him under a U.S. law giving American courts jurisdiction to try suspected terrorists who act against U.S. citizens. Younis is awaiting trial in Washington.

In 1982, former CIA agent Edwin Wilson, who had fled to Libya after being indicted on weapons sales charges, was duped by an acquaintance into flying to the Dominican Republic.

Authorities there put him on a non-stop flight to the United States, where he was arrested.

Timothy Leary, the drug culture guru who escaped in 1970 from a California jail, was turned over to U.S. narcotics agents in Afghanistan even though the two countries had no extradition treaty.

Defense attorneys in some of the celebrated cases — notably the Wilson and Younis cases — have sought dismissal of charges on grounds the

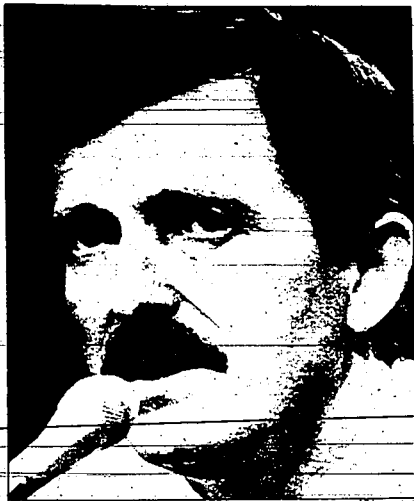
overseas arrests violated the defendants' rights by, in effect, kidnapping them.

Those requests, however, generally have been denied. The courts have said the manner of a suspect's arrest — even an abduction — is "not relevant in assessing guilt or innocence."

The only exception, based on a plea by a defendant brought back from Uruguay in the 1960s, would be a case in which the suspect's treatment, such as torture, was so outrageous it "shocked the conscience" of the court. Even then, a suspect would have to prove it was U.S. authorities who committed the torture.

Since 1974, the United States has been trying to extradite fugitive financier Robert L. Vesco to prosecute him on charges of looting \$224 million from an international investor's fund. Vesco first went to Costa Rica and the Bahamas. He has since emerged in Cuba, beyond the reach of American police.

The United States also tried for many months to arrange the arrest of Abu Abbas, alleged mastermind of the 1985 hijacking of the Italian cruise ship Achille Lauro, during which New Yorker Leon Klinghoffer was killed.

Drug smuggler aided Contras

WASHINGTON (AP) — A convicted drug smuggler told Congress on Thursday he flew weapons on Costa Rica for the Contra guerrillas and picked up cocaine to be illegally flown back to the United States.

But "I don't know precisely where the cocaine came from," Gary Betzner told a Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee.

Although Contra leaders repeatedly have denied any involvement in illegal drug dealing, Sen. John F. Kerry, D-Mass., said Betzner's testimony "makes it very clear that narcotics dollars were involved in the Contra support process."

Kerry chairs the subcommittee on narcotics and terrorism, which has been investigating the links between Latin American governments and the illegal drug trade.

Betzner, 47, who is serving a 27-year prison sentence for cocaine trafficking, said he made two flights from the United States to deliver weapons to the Nicaraguan Contras and returned each time with cocaine.

Both flights came in July 1984, Betzner said. Each time, he landed at a small airstrip in northern Costa Rica, near a large ranch owned by John Hull, an American who has been linked to the CIA and CIA efforts to aid the Contras. Hull met the plane each time

and watched as the small arocs, including M-16 rifles, mines and C-4 explosives, were unloaded, Betzner said. The plane was then loaded with cocaine, Betzner said, and he flew back to Florida. He estimated that he carried about 500 kilograms (1,100 pounds) of cocaine on each return flight.

At the time, according to Betzner, he was flying for George Morales, who built up a drug trafficking empire which included Morales' own air cargo company. Morales is now serving a 16-year prison term for cocaine trafficking.

Betzner said Morales told him he "had made a deal with the CIA to supply them (the Contras). He wanted me to fly guns and ammunition to the Contras — and bring some contraband back."

Betzner said he did not know the source of the weapons. Each time, he said, he went to a hangar at an Opa-Locha, Fla., air field where the plane already had been loaded.

Betzner said, "I was sympathetic to the Contras," although he cited money as his main motivation. He said he was paid \$360,000 for each flight.

Betzner also said that in May 1983, Morales paid him \$300,000 to fly a load of grenade launchers and anti-ship mines from Florida to the Tlopingo Air Base in El Salvador.

2nd nuclear test occurs

MERCURY, Nev. (AP) — A nuclear weapons test with an explosive force of less than 20,000 tons of TNT was detonated Thursday at the Nevada Test Site.

It was the second announced U.S. test of 1988. The Soviet Union announced its third test of the year Easter Sunday.

Energy Department spokesman Jim Boyer said the test, code-named Abilene, was detonated in a shaft 800 feet beneath the surface of Yucca Flat, 75 miles northwest of Las Vegas.

Boyer said he felt no ground motion at a control point a few miles from ground zero.

The test is in the lower range of those conducted at the desert site. All tests are announced as having an explosive range of less than 20 kilotons or 20 to 150 kilotons. Larger tests, which sometimes shake high-rise buildings in Las Vegas, are normally announced in advance.

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Questions arise over Reagan lease

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) — White House chief of staff Howard Baker on Thursday defended the propriety of President Reagan's secret leasing arrangement for a \$2.5 million estate and said the first family "may not like" all the publicity about the deal.

The White House refuses to say how much Reagan and his wife, Nancy, are paying for the three-bedroom, six bath home in the exclusive Bel Air section of Los Angeles that has a heated swimming pool and three-car garage.

Real estate sources estimate the monthly rent at \$12,000 to \$15,000, based on fair-market value.

Moreover, it is unclear why the Reagans are leasing the home instead of buying it outright. Also unknown are the identities of the 18-20 people who formed a consortium specifically to buy it for the Reagans.

The Reagans are planning to move into the home, at 668 St. Cloud Road, after he leaves office next Jan. 20.



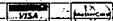
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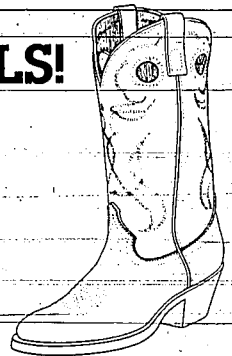
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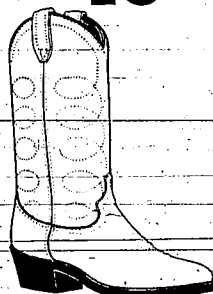
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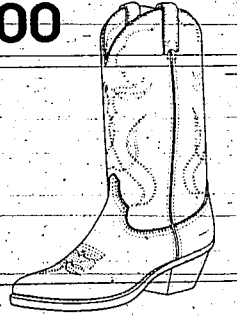
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A key question concerning creation, evolution and science

Ms. Mott, now that we agree that creationism is unscientific, what then pray tell is "scientific creationism?" (7/24/1988)

Indeed, scientific creationists themselves have often stated that scientific creationism can stand on its own scientific merits. Consequently, scientific creationism must be judged by the same standards as other scientific concepts. It must be supported by observations and experimental data, and it becomes as vulnerable to attack and refutation as any other scientific hypothesis. Furthermore, as a healthy scientific hypothesis, it should be supported by scientists who are not Christians as well as those who are.

The concept of evolution is part of a body of successful scientific study built up from many lines of inquiry and regularly accumulates reliable new evidence. Scientific creationism is a position built on assertions derived from only one of many possible interpretations of the Bible.

Tenets of religion and widely accepted scientific theories are beliefs. Scientific beliefs require evidence before they can claim to be convincing. At the same time religious beliefs are frequently held without substantiating evidence. Indeed, that is one of the qualities that justifies the term faith. This is of course, an important distinction.

Some have noted the historical errors of sci-

ence. Indeed, science never claimed to be infallible. Science works in specific ways and follows certain rules. Scientific theories unite the various observations we make in a coherent fashion and are the most useful explanations we know for natural phenomena. They are open to correction, improvement, or modification by new, more effective ideas that unite a wider spectrum of observations or which resolve previously observed conflicts. Creationists, however, follow none of these approaches in forming their ideas.

How does scientific creationism do when standing on its merits? Not very well, as you will see. Consider the testimony of the creationists and their witnesses at the 1981 Arkansas creationism trial (Science Jan. 8, 1982; Science Feb. 19, 1982; Paleobiology Aug. 1982; Attorney General Clark was defending the Arkansas creationists laws against the charges that isolated the separation of church and state. The crux of the trial was whether or not scientific creationism was scientific.

This trial gave the creationists the opportunity to showcase their best scientists and lay their case before the world. Here they could stand eyeball-to-eyeball with the scientific community, and present and defend their theories and best evidence. However, this showcase went badly for the creationists right from the beginning when many creation scientists admitted in their pretrial depositions that

what they practiced was not scientific.

On the witness stand Dr. Henry Morris, director of the Institute for Creation Research (the most important of the creationist groups), suggested the possibility that the fractures and scars on the moon and Mars "might be associated with Satan's primeval rebellion or his continuing battle against Michael and his angels. Furthermore, the well-documented association of certain UFO sightings with occultic influences and tendencies suggests that the rulers of the darkness of the world are increasingly imaginative in their battles for the minds of men. Angels, both good and bad, can be shown to have considerable knowledge and power over natural processes... this type of case warrants further research as a potential explanation for apparent disturbances in the stars and planets since their creation."

This guy is going to write science text books for my kids?

Meanwhile, Margaret Helder, a botanist and vice president of the Creation Research Society admitted in her deposition and again in the trial that there was no scientific evidence for a special creation. Chandra Wickramasinghe was flown in to be the star witness for the creationists. During cross examination, Wickramasinghe stated, much to the chagrin of the creationists, that no rational scientist could possibly believe the earth's geology could be explained by a worldwide flood, or that the earth was less than one million years old.

For some time the creationists have told their followers that they are not allowed to publish in scientific journals due to the "closed-mindedness of the scientific community." They were, however, unable to produce even a single article that had been refused publication. So much for conspiracy.

Of particular interest was the testimony of local science teachers and curriculum advisers who had attempted to outline a course teaching creationism. This testimony can be summarized by the statement of one of the teachers — "We just couldn't find any science to put in it... If Act 590 is upheld, I would not know what to teach."

Is it any wonder that Judge Overton ruled the way he did? — that creationism has no scientific or educational value. In his ruling based on testimony he stated that creation science does not fit the definition of scientific theory. He also stated that it also "fails to fit the more general descriptions of 'what scientists think' and 'what scientists do.'" He then went on to describe several concepts of creationism which do not meet the standards of science. In addition, he pointed out that no reputable scientific journal has published an article espousing creation science.

My question is, "Where is the science in creation science?"

Certainly if creationism were equal in scientific validity with evolutionary biology, it would only be right to give it equal time.

First, some observations about the issue: 1) This is obviously not only a strongly emotional issue, but educationally it is a critical one. We should remember that the creationists desire to exercise control over science curricula and science text books in the public schools.

2) My personal opinion is that theories of creation should be taught, but not as scientific concepts.

3) It is perfectly understandable that Christians would desire scientific confirmation of their concepts of creation.

Given the fact that there are interpretations of scripture other than those upon which the scientific creationists base their theories, it only stands to reason that Christians can believe in God as creator and not be obliged to believe that creation was effected as the scientific creationists advocate. Such being the case, scientific creationism must stand or fall on its merits as a scientific explanation of origins.

His position explained

At the end of 1987 a letter was sent to (the LBI) of the Land Bank, Farm Credit Systems, along with a financial statement. The bank had questioned my capability for carrying through the provisions for being in the Conservation Reserve Program of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Having satisfied the questions of the Land Bank in this respect, I persisted with negotiations for restructuring and attempted to use previously accepted points of settlement as a starting basis. I was then informed that a rewrite of rules and regulations stemming from the updated Agricultural Credit Act would not be available for Land Bank guidance until possibly May or June of 1988. I persisted nevertheless and was asked for additional financial details, in particular the real estate taxes owed from prior years default. This is an item which the Land Bank had long since agreed they would pay as part of a restructuring agreement.

Since then the Land Bank has continued to press for information more and more distant from the main issue of restructuring the Land Bank loan in accordance with actual market conditions, even though funds are already arranged for and available for annual payments.

I wish to point out that the only reason for being in bankruptcy in the first instance is to assure that the necessary farming equipment remains available for meeting the requirements of government programs already entered into.

In this regard, I attempted to drop out of bankruptcy when I assumed I was in good faith negotiations with the Farmers National Bank by arranging in orderly and market timely fashion the sale of equipment in which the FNB had a security interest.

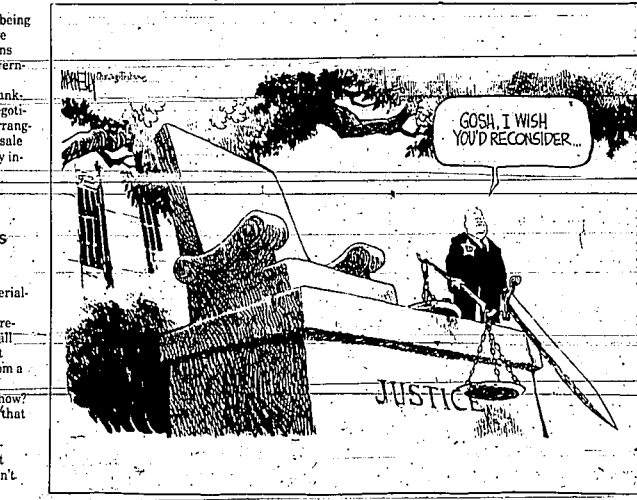

Minds of Americans lazy when confronting drug problems

WASHINGTON — Why are cocaine and heroin illegal while alcohol and tobacco are not?
 • Because cocaine and heroin are more addictive.
 • Because cocaine and heroin cause more violent behavior.
 • Because America wants to prevent a cocaine-heroin scourge.
 And the answer is: All of the above — and they are all wrong.
 Yet, as wrong as they are, the above reasons are generally accepted as to why a distinction

should be made between alcohol and tobacco on the one hand and illicit substances on the other.
 That these reasons stand in the face of contradictory facts is just an indicator of how lazy our minds have become when confronting the drug problem in this country.
 This short test was based on insights provided by Ethan A. Nadelmann, an assistant

professor of politics and public affairs at Princeton University; from an article in the latest Foreign Policy magazine titled "U.S. Drug Policy: A Bad Export."
 What this society has done, he says, is to make an essentially arbitrary judgment about which "high" is going to be allowed and which is not. The decision had nothing to do with relative safety of the drugs or morality. It was simply the "preference" of the majority for certain drugs and a certain "prejudice" against others.
 Nadelmann makes a case that cocaine and

heroin are safer than alcohol and tobacco; citing the fact that in 1985 fewer than 3,500 deaths were caused by the first two drugs while alcohol and tobacco cause nearly a half-million deaths every year.
 He adds that because of increasingly harsh criminal penalties imposed on adult drug dealers, many pushers have turned to widespread recruitment of juveniles as drug traffickers.
 Contradictions in accepting one kind of drug over another also resulted in the freezing of our national resolve to deal with the drug problem, he contends. Condoning drugs

known to do the most damage while condemning those about which little is known simply made a mockery of all drug laws.
 During a recent interview about his article, which I recommend to those who sponsor drug forums and seminars, Nadelmann pointed out that in most black areas "antidrug laws," which have done nothing to reduce the availability of drugs, also have nothing to do with people not using drugs. People choose not to use.

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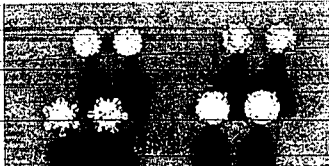
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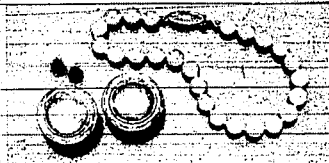
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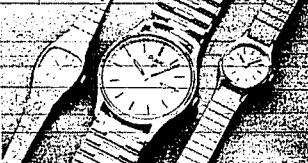
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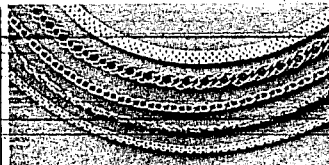
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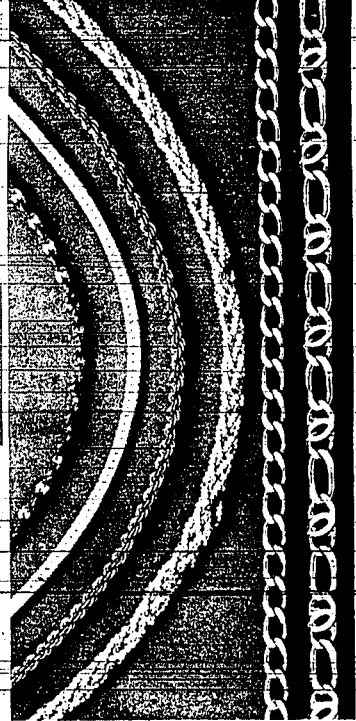
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Shuttle to have escape pole

WASHINGTON (AP) — A crew escape system using a 10-foot telescoping pole will be installed in the space shuttle Discovery in time for its scheduled Aug. 4 launching, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said Thursday.

The pole was selected over another escape system that would use rockets to pull astronauts from the shuttle in case the ship was about to ditch in the ocean.

The telescoping pole was selected as it has shown to be safer, simpler to operate, lighter weight and easier to support than the tractor rocket system," said Arnold D. Aldrich, a top shuttle program official.

In case of an emergency while the shuttle is in level, controlled flight, the astronauts would slide down the pole, which would carry them clear of the orbiter tail.

NASA said the pole, 126 inches long and made of lightweight aluminum

and steel, is 70 pounds lighter at 241 pounds than the rocket system. Top NASA officials have said all along they were uncomfortable with storing the explosive rockets in the crew cabin.

An escape system using either the pole or the rockets is of limited use and would not have been effective in the explosion of the orbiter Challenger in 1986. It would be of help in the event the shuttle must be ditched in the ocean because it could not reach orbit or a landing field.

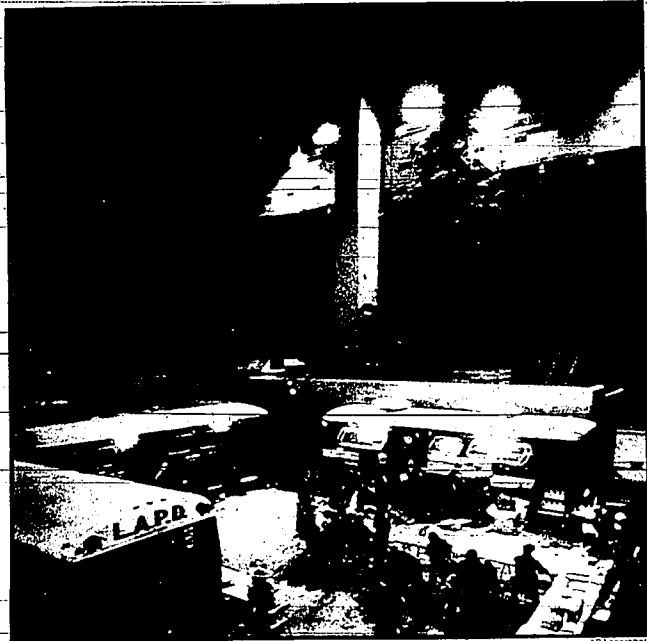
The Challenger astronauts died during ascent while the solid rocket boosters were still firing and attached to the shuttle. Engineers said the new escape system cannot be used while the shuttle is connected to the rockets.

"This decision completes the crew escape system package," a NASA statement said. "The agency already has replaced the spacecraft's hatch so it can be jettisoned with explosive bolts and is installing a partial pressure suit, oxygen equipment, a parachute, a life raft and survival equipment for each crew member."

Under the tractor rocket system, the astronauts would jettison the hatch, and one-by-one lie on a metal ramp that slanted out the door. They would attach a line to a small rocket housed-in an adjacent rack, and be pulled out of the hatch.

The pole system was tested in February and March, using a fixed pole that extended through a hatch-like opening in a C-141 cargo plane. Navy paratroopers completed 66 jumps, using a lanyard attached to their parachute harness to slide down the pole and descend to a safe landing.

During launch and landing, the extended pole will be pointed toward the closed crew hatch. It will be stowed while the shuttle is in orbit.

Police plan sweep for gangs

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Police are preparing for a weekend war on violent, drug-dealing street gangs with overwhelming support from police, and community leaders whose attention has suddenly focused on a long-festering problem.

The sweep by as many as 1,000 police officers will be the biggest in a series of mass patrols in gang-ridden neighborhoods. A 13-hour sweep which ended Thursday morning resulted in the arrest of 128 suspected gang members.

"We're out there to let these gang-bangers know that we're here, we're not going to go away, and this city belongs to the good people," said Detective Tony Celli, using the street slang for gang member.

"Such tough talk from the police is not new, but it has been adopted by elected officials who are backing words with financial support.

One city councilman joined the police chief in comparing the violence to Lebanon. Millions of dollars have been found to hire 400 more police officers and pay overtime to those working the gang sweeps. One county supervisor has sought reinforcements from the National Guard.

A mother's group, taking its cue from community anti-drug movements, has formed to fight gangs.

Violence has continued despite the sweeps, with five people wounded Wednesday in three "drive-by" shootings, a common style of attack in gang turf wars.

Gangs were blamed for 387 killings in Los Angeles County in 1987, and as many as 85 so far this year.

Police were tight-lipped about plans for the weekend sweep, refusing to elaborate on Police Chief Daryl Gates' promise to flood the low income and working class neighborhoods south of downtown with blue uniforms.

Incensed by the Good Friday gang shooting that killed one person and injured 12 — none believed to be gang members — Gates vowed to deploy 2,000 officers drawn from across the city and working on overtime.

"We're putting together a task force to suppress gang activity in the city wherever it's at," said Officer Bill Frio, a department spokesman. "We are not going to broadcast how and when we're going to do it."

In previous sweeps, officers have cruised the streets, concentrating on street-corner drug markets and stop-

ping people wearing gang colors. In the Wednesday-Thursday sweep, there were 210 arrests for a variety of misdemeanors, felonies and outstanding warrants, and 128 of those arrested were alleged gang members.

Gangs — including the Crips and the Bloods among blacks, and others for Hispanic youths — have long been active in the inner city, and police statistics show no dramatic increase in the level of violence. But authorities say traditional turf battles are giving way to drug-dealing wars here and throughout the West as Los Angeles gangs try to control distribution of "crack" cocaine.

Community attention focused on the problem when a woman strolling in the Westwood entertainment district near UCLA was cut down by gunfire in battle among gang members she didn't know.

The Good Friday shooting, in south-central Los Angeles rather than affluent Westwood, symbolized for many the gangs' disregard for life, and has given momentum to a new group called Mothers Against Gangs in Communities.

The group plans to push for anti-gang legislation, to help pay for the funerals of innocent victims of gang wars and to keep the issue before the public in the style of Mothers Against Drunk Driving.

The City Council supported Mayor Tom Bradley's supplemental-budget request for \$16 million to hire 400 police officers, largely because of complaints from residents of poor neighborhoods that they weren't getting enough police protection.

A police request for \$2.5 million to cover overtime for the gang sweeps, strongly supported by Bradley, was approved 3-0 by the city finance committee this week and approval by the City Council appears certain next Tuesday.

Councilman Zev Yaroslavsky, the head of the committee and Bradley's chief rival, said warning gangs were creating "homicide that's worse than Beirut." Gates compared the violence to Lebanon, Northern Ireland and South Africa.

County Supervisor Kenneth Hahn has repeatedly called for National Guard troops to patrol gang-plagued areas, but Gov. George Deukmejian has said he wouldn't consider such a request unless it has the support of the full Board of Supervisors.

Afghan agreement causes optimism

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviet-Afghan agreement under which the Red Army may start pulling out of Afghanistan by May 15 appears to meet U.S. conditions for ending aid to the warring parties, administration sources said Thursday.

President Reagan was described by his chief-of-staff, Howard Baker, as "cautiously optimistic." But Reagan still "wants to see the fine print," Baker told reporters in California, where Reagan is vacationing.

"We think an agreement now is clearly within reach," said one administration source in Washington who closely monitors Afghan developments.

Administration officials interpreted a statement issued by Kremlin leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev and his Afghan ally Najib as "an indication that they have agreed to our conditions, but we want to know that authoritatively," said the source, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The administration is waiting to hear from the Soviets on a proposal advanced by Secretary of State George P. Shultz on March 31. He said the United States — under what is being called a "gentlemen's

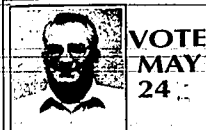
agreement" — would end its estimated \$600 million a year in covert aid to the Afghan guerrillas if Moscow cut off aid to the Kabul regime.

State Department spokeswoman Phyllis Oakley said Thursday that the United States has not budged from the Shultz formula, which embodies what diplomats call "the concept of symmetry."

"Our position is clear," Mrs. Oakley said. "Such an agreement must be a comprehensive settlement that provides for the prompt withdrawal of all Soviet troops, an independent non-aligned Afghanistan, self-determination for the Afghan people and the return of the refugees in safety and honor."

"Certainly we continue to adhere to the concept of symmetry and balanced reciprocal rights and obligations as the only logical interpretation of the Geneva instruments on non-intervention and non-interference," she said.

Two other administration sources involved with Afghanistan, also speaking on condition of anonymity, said the next step would be to seek agreement at the United Nations through interim Afghan government during the Soviet withdrawal.



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Agencies neglect radon problem

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal agencies involved in housing, hamstrung by a lack of congressional guidance, are doing little or nothing about the threat from cancer-causing radon, the General Accounting Office said Thursday.

Although environmental officials say radon causes up to 20,000 cancer deaths a year, the housing agencies see little responsibility to respond, the GAO, an investigative arm of Congress, said in a report.

The report scrutinized the Department of Housing and Urban Development, the Veterans Administration, the Farmers Home Administration and the National Park Service.

Sen. Frank Lautenberg, D-N.J., requested and released the year-long GAO study, called its results "disturbing."

"While millions of Americans are at risk, federal bureaucrats sit on their hands," said Lautenberg.

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Soviets, Afghanistan say withdrawal agreement is 'certain'

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union and Afghanistan said Thursday an agreement is at hand on ending the Afghan civil war and urged that a formal accord be signed in Geneva so the Kremlin can begin withdrawing its troops May 15.

The target date is two weeks before Soviet Communist Party General Secretary Mikhail Gorbachev and President Reagan begin their summit in the Soviet capital. Agreement on Afghanistan would resolve an issue that

has troubled relations for nearly a decade, prompting a U.S. grain embargo and keeping Americans home from the 1980 Olympics in Moscow.

Gorbachev and Afghan leader Najib issued a joint statement after meeting in the Soviet Central Asian city of Tashkent.

"There is certain to be a signed agreement" on political normalization," Tass quoted Gorbachev as saying while he toured a collective farm near Tashkent after the meeting. "I think both Pakistan and Afghanistan

will come to agreement, and that we and the Americans will agree to be guarantors."

The joint communique, distributed by the Tass news agency and read during the nightly news program "Vremya," omitted the usual criticism of positions taken by Pakistan and the United States at the Geneva peace talks. This omission could mean some behind-the-scenes compromise has been forged.

President Mohammed Zia ul-Haq said the Geneva records were ready

for signing, but U.N. mediator Diego Cordovez indicated problems remained.

"There are very difficult decisions and the only good thing — I think that is important — is that the political will is obviously there to take them," he told reporters in Geneva after the Soviet-Afghan statement was issued.

Gulbuddin Hekmatiyar, head of the seven-party Afghan guerrilla alliance, said in Islamabad, Pakistan, said it

was the "first step toward victory and a defeat for the Russians." He said the guerrillas "will try to intensify the war."

The statement was distributed by the official news agency Tass and published on the front page of the government newspaper Izvestia. It omitted the usual criticism of positions taken by Pakistan and the United States in Geneva, which could indicate a behind-the-scenes compromise.

Draft documents in Geneva call for

an end to outside aid for the rebels and U.S. officials have pressed for "symmetry," a simultaneous end of Soviet military aid to Najib's government.

Zia, quoted by Pakistan's official news agency, said: "According to unofficial reports, the two superpowers have agreed on the symmetry under which both would be able to provide continued assistance to their respective allies in Afghanistan." No details of the alleged agreement were given.

Panamanian citizens receive training for possible invasion

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) — In dusty fields and stadiums across Panama, civilians turn out by the hundreds for military training to repel what the government says is an imminent U.S. invasion.

"We get political speeches, and sometimes we see patriotic films," said Javier Ortega, a government housing ministry employee. "We do physical training and we have some weapons instruction."

The volunteer units, called "Dignity Battalions," formed, and have grown,

since the United States started announcing increases in troop strength in the former Panama Canal Zone in mid-March.

There is close-order drill, replete with slogans vowing death on behalf of the homeland and questioning the ancestry of all Yankees.

About 300 volunteers showed up on one field near the capital Wednesday night, and some said it is one of the smallest battalions in the country. The battalion in the western city of

Davis is said to have more than 1,000 participants.

Settlers vow revenge; soldiers kill suspect

KARNEI-SHOMRON, Occupied West Bank (AP) — Armed Jewish settlers vowed revenge Thursday and shouted "Expel the Arabs!" as they buried an Israeli girl stoned to death by Palestinians. Troops killed a man in the town where she was slain.

An army announcement said the Palestinian fatally shot in Beita was a suspect in the attack on a group of Israeli teenagers Wednesday in which 15-year-old Tirza Porat was killed. It said he did not obey an order to halt.

Two other Arabs were wounded in separate incidents in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip, which have been swept by violence since Dec. 8.

Soldiers arrested hundreds of Arabs and blew up five homes in Beita. Israeli settlers attacked two nearby Arab villages, beating residents, breaking windows and firing shots in the air.

Palestinians retreated to their

homes, fearing further revenge raids by vigilante groups.

An army investigation of Tirza's death said she was killed by a stone thrown by the mother of one of the dead Arab youths, according to Israel television and radio.

The army inquest also showed that a bullet fired from the weapon of one of the Israeli guards was found in Tirza's body, the media reports said.

Army investigators said they could not determine who fired the shot, but noted that the magazines of the two weapons were empty by the time villagers wrested them away from the Israeli guards, according to the media reports.

"Tirza Porat's only crime was taking a walk in her country," Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir told about 9,000 mourners who gathered under heavy guard at Jewish cemetery for the region. "God will avenge her blood."

Nicaraguans talk over details

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — Sandinista and Contra military delegations on Thursday discussed technical details of providing humanitarian aid to the rebels and controlling zones where the insurgents are to gather during a cease-fire.

A spokeswoman for the Contra umbrella organization, the Nicaraguan Resistance, said Thursday the rebels were refusing to discuss giving up their arms.

The talks were at the southern border town of Sapoa, where the two sides reached a cease-fire accord on March 23. That agreement requires them to reach a permanent truce to end the nearly 7-year-old war that the leftist government says has claimed more than 26,000 lives.

The two delegations decided Wednesday on the number and location of the zones where the rebels will gather during the 60-day cease-fire. It went into effect last Friday, although all the details were not worked out.

President Daniel Ortega warned Wednesday that the Sandinistas would launch an offensive against the Contras if they fail to comply with the March 23 accord.

Under that agreement, the rebels said they would gather in the cease-fire zones while their leaders negoti-

ated a more permanent truce. In exchange, the Sandinistas have pledged to carry out democratic reforms.

But the Sapoa talks have been marked by mutual distrust and differing interpretations of the vaguely worded plan.

Still unresolved were pledges of security for the Contras inside the cease-fire zones, how they would receive food and other supplies, who would control the areas and how compliance would be verified.

Food conference lacks agreement

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — U.S. and European officials disagreed Thursday over how to prevent food surpluses from building up in the developed nations when much of the Third World goes hungry.

The two-day World Food Conference, organized by the European Parliament, brought together 200 agriculture and development experts to discuss the problem of surplus food output in parts of the world and continuing shortages elsewhere.

U.S. Agriculture Secretary Richard E. Lyng said only an end to farm subsidies "will bring about the necessary reform."

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


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May be able to expedite release of Hailey man's family

McClure meets with family of Russian emigre

TWIN FALLS - Idaho Sen. James McClure, having met in the Soviet Union with the family of an emigre now living in Hailey, said Thursday he is optimistic the rest of the family will soon be able to emigrate. "I'm confident that we will be successful in making progress on seeing the Kotlyar family allowed to emigrate from Russia, and hope it will happen in the next several weeks or months," McClure told his staff in Washington, D.C., in a telephone call from Moscow Thursday.

McClure said he met earlier this week in Kiev with the relatives of Vadim Kotlyar, a reporter with the Wood River Journal in Hailey.

"It doesn't happen very often that a high official will take time to visit with one family," said Kotlyar, during a telephone interview with the Times-News Thursday. "If he can't help, no one can."

The Hailey man emigrated from the Soviet Union with his parents in 1976 and has lived in Idaho since 1987. For the past decade, the rest of his family has been denied emigration.

He said his family was particularly

grateful for McClure's half-hour meeting because they were mourning the loss of another relative who had long wanted to leave the Soviet Union. He spoke with his family by telephone Wednesday night.

"McClure's visit is especially heartening to them because my grandfather died a week ago and he always wanted to come to this country to be reunited with us," Kotlyar said.

Since 1978, the Kotlyars have sought permission to emigrate. Still seeking to leave Kotlyar's grandmother Lubia, an uncle Mark, aunt Oksana and a nephew, Uru. Kotlyar said his uncle has been refused

emigration on the "trumped up charge" of having access to state secrets because he was a scientist. Since applying to emigrate, Kotlyar said his uncle lost his job and has been a horse-rider for the past six years.

Referring to the delay in his relatives' application, compared to his own emigration, Kotlyar said simply, "It's been difficult after that time."

"It just doesn't make any sense to me that a society that seeks to join the Western world can still have the inhumane treatment of requiring families to be separated without any just cause," McClure said.

Kotlyar said his family has wanted to leave the Soviet Union for a number of reasons, including anti-Semitism directed at the Jewish family.

"Basically, my parents wanted to live in a different system," Kotlyar said. He hopes that McClure's visit and an upcoming trip by Secretary of State George Shultz will lead to his family's release.

"Prior to summit, the Soviets like to let our people to show their good will," Kotlyar said. "Hopefully, when Shultz goes, he will ask for our family in particular."

"We are very grateful for McClure's effort."

Most poor people said not at fault for their situation

TWIN FALLS - The media were challenged to "explode the myth that all poor people are lazy" during a panel discussion at CSI Wednesday night sponsored by the Sawtooth Press Club.

The five speakers, representing advocacy groups ranging from farm interests to health and legal services, all agreed that poverty in the U.S. carries a stigma which keeps many people from seeking help. They also agreed the vast majority of low income people are not at fault for their circumstances.

Man charged in burglary, attempted rape

TWIN FALLS - A Twin Falls man, who turned himself in to police Wednesday, was charged Thursday in connection with a two-month-old burglary and attempted rape.

Michael Brannon, 29, was arraigned Thursday on two felony charges - first-degree burglary and battery with the intent to commit a serious felony. Bail was set at \$100,000.

Police said Brannon turned himself in at the Twin Falls police station at approximately 5 p.m. Wednesday. A warrant for Brannon's arrest was issued following an attack which happened Jan. 31.

The January incident drew to a quick conclu-

sion after the victim, a 19-year-old Twin Falls woman, hit her assailant in the face with a baseball bat, records show.

Shortly after midnight on that date, Brannon, who has a lengthy criminal record in Twin Falls and other jurisdictions, allegedly crawled through an unlocked window of the victim's Twin Falls home.

The victim, watching television in the living room, was struck by the assailant in her head, neck and chest, and her shirt was ripped off, records show.

The victim told police Brannon lived nearby and had been at her residence earlier that night.

During the attack, the victim grabbed a bat and hit the assailant in his face, breaking his

glasses and knocking them from his head. According to records, Brannon allegedly "did not attempt to drag the victim from her home, but he stopped and ran away when a man, who had been sleeping in one of the bedrooms, ran into the living room."

On Feb. 3, the victim identified Brannon from a picture line-up consisting of five photographs.

Almost 10 years ago, Brannon was sentenced to up to three years in prison after he assaulted a Twin Falls police officer with a 12-inch butcher knife.

According to records, Brannon, 19 at the time, assaulted Mick Turner in the early morning hours of Jan. 7, 1978. The assault occurred at Turner's Twin Falls home.

Woman sentenced for falsifying forms

Renfro aided aliens who sought to gain seasonal worker status

BOISE - A Buhl woman has been ordered to serve four days in jail, after pleading guilty to federal charges that she helped alien farm workers fill out false statements in an attempt to qualify under a new work program.

Blanca Estela Renfro appeared before U.S. District Judge Marion Callister on Thursday.

Under a plea-bargain agreement signed earlier, she admitted four counts of filing false statements.

Callister ordered her to serve two weekends in jail, pay \$700 in fines and placed her on five years probation. She also was ordered to perform 20 hours per month of public service.

Maximum penalty on the charges was a fine of \$260,000

and up to five years in prison. Last month, the federal government agreed to drop charges against her husband, Fred Renfro, who faced similar charges.

In an earlier court appearance, Mrs. Renfro was described by Assistant U.S. Attorney Tim Lindquist as the key player in a scheme to falsify immigration documents for illegal aliens.

In a plea-bargain agreement, Mrs. Renfro pleaded guilty to four counts and the prosecution dropped 28.

The Renfros were named in a 68-count federal indictment handed down by a Boise grand jury in December.

Lindquist said the couple worked with illegal aliens and recruited others to sign documents in connection with the Mexican nationals had been in the country in 1985 and 1986.

Police seek suspect after motel robbery

MOUNTAIN HOME - A robber who apparently left a trail of clothing and ill-gotten money is being sought by police for holding up a Mountain Home motel during Thursday's early morning hours.

Lt. Dave Pursell of the Mountain Home Police Department said no arrests were made Thursday, but added that "we have a suspect that we're working on."

The Foothills Motor Inn, located near exit 95 off U.S. Interstate 84, was robbed at approxi-

mately 3:45 a.m., Pursell said. "The exact amount of money stolen was not determined, but police believe it was less than \$160.

No one was hurt during the robbery. Pursell said the robber "left a trail" leading to an abandoned vehicle, located roughly a mile away from the scene of the robbery. The trail included a coat and hat, and currency believed to have been taken during the robbery was found by the vehicle.

A computer check was run on the car, which was found to be "registered to a known robber," Pursell said.

Police found \$20 and \$5 bills outside the car,

and more money was discovered inside it.

Mariann Bate, of Mountain Home, was the only clerk on duty at the time of the robbery. She said the robber, who was alone, came in and simply demanded the motel's money.

"That was all he said. It didn't take very long," Bate said.

The clerk estimated the robbery took less than two minutes, after which the robber ran from the premises.

Pursell said the robber "indicated he had a weapon in his pocket, but he never pulled it out."

Forest Service chief differs with McClure wilderness bill

WASHINGTON - U.S. Forest Service Chief E. Dale Robertson says he opposes some of the special management provisions of Sen. James McClure's Idaho wilderness bill, particularly one requiring minimum timber sales to the Panhandle National Forest.

In an interview this week, Robertson said much of the bill "tracks" with the Forest Service's own plans for the national roadless forest lands in the state. But some of the bill's provisions would "eliminate the flexibility" the service desires to manage the forests, he said.

While not citing them by name, the chief indicated his concerns for provisions that would require the Forest Service to make available each year at least 40.5 million board feet of timber in the Bon-

ners Ferry ranger district and at least 283.5 million board feet in the Panhandle National Forest. McClure and his co-author, Gov. Cecil Andrus, included these provisions to protect the timber economy of the area.

"We are concerned about some of these special provisions like setting an ASQ (allowable sale quantity) by ranger district," Robertson said. "Now most of those special provisions that are in that bill pretty well track with the (Forest Service's) forest plans, but we believe the whole idea behind the National Forest Management Act and the planning process was that we look at each national forest every 10 to 15 years and update those plans based on the current and projected conditions."

By looking it into legislation you almost negate that flexibility that we look at things every 10 to 15 years, unless Congress wants to do it, like they're doing it in the

Alaska situation now (the Tongass National Forest). So we would prefer not to see all of these special provisions in that bill and let us handle it under the normal land-management planning process," the chief said.

A Lanky Arkansas native who speaks in a friendly, baritone twang, Robertson said most of the proposed wilderness areas in the McClure bill are "fairly close to our forest plans. There are some differences, but I don't see the areas proposed for wilderness are, you know, any major problem because they follow closely the forest plans."

Also during the interview, Robertson defended the Forest Service's timber program, saying that the Forest Service considers more than just profit and loss in deciding which timber to sell.

Said he opposes a bill that would repeal significant provisions of the law that re-

quires the Forest Service to sell a minimum amount of timber from the Tongass National Forest, the nation's largest.

Described as an ardent and astute conservationist, the Forest Service wants to turn national forests into "tree factories" with little regard for the environment or wildlife.

Robertson said the Forest Service is instituting this year an accounting system in all of its forests to monitor costs, which in 20 percent of the national forests by the Forest Service's own estimates, exceed timber sale revenues. According to the Wilderness Society, a key Forest Service critic, the timber program has lost up to \$400 million annually in recent years.

"I don't like below-cost timber sales any more than anybody else," he said. "Our long-range timber sales policy is that we don't make timber sales unless total benefits exceed total costs. And that's a lot different policy than in-

come exceeding cost. We're very concerned about community stability... So I'm not inclined to shut down a saw mill which in turn is the primary livelihood of a community just because we're losing a little money on our timber sales."

"Now there's some point you lose so much it ain't worth it, but we're not so narrow-minded that we just keep our eye on that bottom line and as soon as we get into the red we say to hell with the communities and the livelihood of people. That would be a terrible policy. The federal government has got to be more socially responsible than that."

Robertson said that he opposes major changes in the law that governs Alaska's Tongass National Forest for various reasons. He said that the current law allows timber sales below-cost timber sales.

Under a law passed in 1980, the Forest Service is required to sell timber at market prices. * See WILD on Page B2

Service is required to offer 450 million board feet of timber for sale annually in the Tongass to support the local timber industry. The Interior Committee recently approved a bill that would repeal the mandated sale and direct the Forest Service to renegotiate long-term contracts with the two companies that buy the Tongass timber.

"We feel committed to the economy and livelihood of the people of southeastern Alaska," Robertson said. "We've made commitments to Alaska, we've made commitments to the economy there, that we'll maintain the forest products industry and that's backed up not only by law, but by 50-year contracts. He warned that if the government

breaks the contracts it could end up paying millions of dollars in penalties. "We'll be buying two pulp mills at several hundred million dollars apiece."

Robertson appeared angry during the interview only when he was asked to respond to critics who say the Forest Service is turning national forests into "tree factories" that operated without regard for the environment or wildlife.

"It is not only not fair (to say that), it's just untruthful," the chief said. "It's not fact. It's just some rhetoric used to try to describe our multiple use management on the national forests. It's just not true. It's inaccurate to describe the national forests as tree factories."

"Our mission is multiple use management, and I think we're doing a good job of multiple use management," Robertson said. "It's true that there are some areas that are highly productive timberland that we're managing very intensively. On the other hand, we got 17 percent of the national forests, one acre out of six, that's in wilderness."

"But the bulk of the national forests is all of that stuff in between that we're trying to manage for all of the resources in the forest. And I think we're doing a better job for fish and wildlife today than we've ever done in the Forest Service."

"Being poor makes you an heir in the eyes of the media," Wood, Twin Falls County public defender. The media has a responsibility, he said, to show the desperate need for a safety net for the many people who have been put in jeopardy in the last few years.

"The county commissioners and local judiciary are not sensitive to the plight of the poor, Wood said, and the indignity that is a constant thorn in the side of the commissioners."

If a farm family loses its farm they are ashamed to ask for help, he said.

The defender urged that more attention be given by the media to persons who have overcome financial crisis and that poverty be portrayed "as a fact of life."

Some of the problems of the poor, he indicated, stem from lack of education and the necessity of being out "hustling for jobs on the streets at an early age."

Many of the people he represents are closed up individuals, he said, even though they work because they can't afford a lawyer on top of their other debts.

Helen Myers, of Idaho Rural Council, stressed the danger of

"losing the small family farm" and said there are more than 200 street people in Boise with no shelter other than the Salvation Army.

She said the press has reported widely on national farm problems but ignored the local level, citing the farm mediation bill which failed to pass in the last two sessions of the Idaho Legislature.

Winds contribute to pileups on I-84

Cassia County Sheriff Billy Crystal said the second accident, the more serious of the two, occurred around 7 p.m. on U.S. Interstate 84 roughly 10 miles south of Burley. Three tractor-trailers and a car were involved in the pileup.

Crystal said four adults were injured in the accident and were transported by ambulance to the

hospital. Three of the four people injured had to be extracted from their vehicles.

No one was seriously injured in the first pileup, which occurred on the interstate roughly 20 miles south of Burley. Crystal said that accident, which happened shortly after 6 p.m., involved three tractor-trailers and three cars.

Oregon makes largest cocaine bust yet

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — About 60 pounds of cocaine confiscated in a series of raids was most ever seized in Oregon, law enforcement officials said today.

The investigation by the FBI and Multnomah County Sheriff's Department was continuing, and authorities said they expected more arrests.

Eight people were arrested in Wednesday raids, the culmination of a six-month investigation.

The raids at seven Portland houses netted 27 kilograms of cocaine, one pound of tar heroin, 26 firearms, 11 vehicles and more than \$12,000 in cash.

The contraband was displayed on a large table during a news conference at FBI headquarters Thursday.

The eight suspects were charged with possession of cocaine with intent to distribute. If convicted, each faces a maximum 20-year prison sentence with no chance for parole.

Matthews said additional charges were expected against the men, whom he identified as illegal aliens living in Portland.

The drug ring was responsible for smuggling substantial amounts of cocaine and tar heroin into Oregon from Mexico, via California, the FBI said in a statement.

Matthews said the raids began after undercover officers agreed to buy 10 kilograms of cocaine. No shots were fired during the arrests.

We hoped for some results, and obviously we're pleased," Matthews said. "We're satisfied that this group has been terminated."

Matthews declined to speculate on what effect the seizure would

have on the area's drug supply, but said, "We think it will certainly interrupt people."

Multnomah County Sheriff Fred Pearce said the operation was a success because of the cooperation among federal, state and local authorities. "We have a large narcotics trade in this community," Pearce said, "and we need to continue to work cooperatively."

Pearce added that efforts to combat drugs must increase. "This will not stop the drug trade in Portland," he said. "But we are making a dent. We have to interdict the many sources of narcotics as well as the people who are using them."

MOSCOW (AP) — An attorney representing the first man in Idaho convicted of murder by torture told the Idaho Supreme Court that a judge improperly considered evidence not presented in trial in pronouncing the death sentence.

The high court, sitting in Moscow, on Thursday heard an appeal in the case of Gene Francis Stuart, 36, Orofino, was convicted in 1982 of first-degree murder in the death of 3-year-old Robert Miller.

Miller was the son of Kathie Miller, Stuart's live-in girlfriend, and died Sept. 19, 1981. Court records showed a three-year history of abuse, including repeated blows to the boy's abdomen.

The conviction was upheld by the Idaho Supreme Court in 1985. But Stuart's attorney, Robert Kinney,

argued Thursday that in sentencing Stuart to death, Schwam cited preliminary hearing testimony from an ex-wife and girlfriend that was never brought out in the jury trial held in Moscow.

The preliminary hearing testimony was presented by Stuart's wife, who alleged he tried to drown her, and by a former girlfriend, who alleged Schwam was "very disturbing."

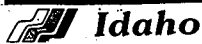

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Jones criticizes Andrus over legislative performance

BOISE (AP) - Republican Attorney General Jim Jones has joined the partisan finger-pointing over who was to blame for this winter's lackluster legislative session, but his criticism of the Democratic governor ended at the state's senior GOP senator as well.

Suggesting Gov. Cecil Andrus' performance was below that of even a "legislative rookie," Jones said Thursday that many of the bills Andrus proposed, particularly the package to curb child sexual abuse, were poorly drafted with no attempt to obtain a consensus among

affected groups.

"A continuing theme with the great majority of the governor's legislative proposals is the failure to reach out and seek input and comments of affected groups," Jones told reporters.

"It almost had the appearance from the governor's standpoint of trying to build issues for the campaign ... as opposed to trying to actually get anything done," he said.

Jones, who has been involved in a running feud with the governor over a variety of issues since last year, said he

would actively campaign on behalf of GOP lawmakers who become the target of Andrus' criticism this fall.

In response to questions, Jones said there were probably different circumstances to justify the decision by senior Republican Sen. James McClure and Andrus to work out a compromise on wilderness legislation without revealing its contents to environmental or industry groups until the deal was struck.

But he acknowledged that "when people draft a bill and say here it is, ... you open yourself up to the question of whether you

appropriately sought a consensus."

"Maybe it would have been better practice to go out and consult with the various groups," he said, speculating that McClure and Andrus may now regret having presented their plan on a "take-it-or-leave-it" basis.

"Any legislative rookie knows that affected groups need to be brought into the process so that they can have their input into legislative proposals," Jones said.

Even before it adjourned a week ago, the Republican-dominated Legislature was a repeated target of the governor's criticism

for its failure to meet his budget goals and its refusal to adopt the key parts of his anti-child abuse package and legislation restricting the export of raw state-owned timber.

Andrus blamed the demise of his child abuse bills on Republican pique over pride of authorship, and his staff maintained prosecutors and other interested groups were contacted about the package before it was introduced. The governor also blasted lawmakers for protecting big business tax-breaks that resulted in a state education budget he labeled woefully inadequate.

Fry gets tax panel GOP seat

BOISE (AP) - Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus has named Republican state Rep. Bob Fry of Horley as the GOP member on the state Tax Commission.

The selection of the two-term House member fills the vacancy on the four-member commission left by the Senate Republican majority's rejection of former GOP state party director and legislator Larry Jackson in a bitter partisan confrontation this winter.

Fry, 41, announced last month that he would not seek re-election from his four-county district. Andrus said Fry will assume the commission seat on April 18. His appointment to the job that pays about \$39,000 a year will be subject to Senate confirmation next winter.

"Bob Fry enjoys respect on both sides of the political aisle," Andrus said in a statement issued Thursday. "He's developed a reputation as a student of tax policy, and I have every expectation that he will be a strong addition to the Tax Commission."

Jackson, appointed to the commission last year, was ousted by Senate Republicans because of his active support of Andrus in the close 1986 gubernatorial campaign.

Although his party credentials were solid, Republicans called him a turncoat for failing to support GOP nominee David Leroy, and they accused Andrus of trying to pay off political debts with state appointments that have always been controlled by Republicans.

Two other members of "Republicans for Andrus" were also ousted by the Senate for the same reasons and a fourth withdrew before his name could be submitted for confirmation.

The partisan debate prompted introduction of legislation to abolish the full-time commission and replace it with a single, appointed director. That bill cleared the state Senate but died in the House.

Fry, a cattle rancher with a degree in agricultural economics, has been a member of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee. His term, if confirmed, will run through March 1993.

Liquor sale initiative under study

IDAHO FALLS (AP) - Merchants in Swan Valley and Irwin are considering a joint initiative to seek the right to sell liquor by the drink on Sundays.

Merchants say they are losing recreation business to nearby Alpine, Wyo., where Sunday liquor sales are permitted.

They would like Bonneville County commissioners to decide on Sunday sales. But commissioners have refused, so merchants say they are organizing the initiative, which would require a special election or placement on the November general election ballot.

County officials said an initiative probably could not be finished in time for the May primary. The county would have to have a special election, or place the measure on the ballot in November.

"We're talking about businesses that are barely keeping our doors open," said Spence Warner, owner of the South Fork Lodge.

Bonneville County allows Sunday beer and wine sales, but not liquor by the drink.

In 1986, the Idaho Legislature gave counties the option of allowing Sunday liquor sales and allowing bars to remain open until 2 a.m. But cities cannot opt for the Sunday sales and extended hours unless the county has adopted that policy.

Wrenn, Nelson beat elements to share lead in Masters

Augusta, Ga. (AP) — The wind blew for Larry Nelson and the cold grew for Robert Wrenn.

But each survived his battle with the elements to get a share of the lead Thursday in the first round of the 52nd Masters.

Each had 69s — Wrenn with a last-hole birdie — in conditions that rank among the most severe in the history of this old tournament.

The chilly winds produced scenes more common to a New England autumn than a Southern spring. It sent spectators burrowing under blankets and scurrying for warmer clothing.

Most of them were gone when Wrenn, a rookie in this event who played in the next-to-last group on the Augusta National Golf Club course, rapped in the eight-foot birdie putt on the final hole, only the third birdie of the day on the 18th.

"A heck of a way to end the day," said the Wake Forest product who is in his fourth year on the tour. "The last couple of holes, I was getting numb out there."

But he played in the worst of the tormenting winds that had the elite, international field of 90 searching their vocabularies for adequate words of description.

"Devilish," Ken Brown of Scotland said.

"Impossible," Davis Love III said. "Heartbreaking," Ben Crenshaw said.

"It was definitely one of the top four most difficult days I've seen here," said Jack Nicklaus, competing in his 30th Masters. "It may be THE most difficult, actually."

Nelson only smiled. "It wasn't windy, was it?" the 40-year-old current EGA champion said, his eyes twinkling.

"I didn't do anything really dumb. And I didn't do anything really smart. I just hit a lot of good shots and made a lot of short putts," he said.

That was an exception, too. More short putts were missed than made. "I backed away many, many times," said Crenshaw, one of the game's finest putters. "The wind

would rock you and you had to back off."

Seve Ballesteros, the mercurial Spaniard who has such a fascination with this event, four-putted for a double bogey on the 16th. He finished with a 73.

"In my 13 Masters, I have never seen conditions so difficult," Ballesteros said.

The 48-year-old Nicklaus, who has won this title six times, three-putted four times in a round of 75 that, he insisted, kept him in the hunt for still another green jacket.

"You cannot win the golf tournament on a day like today, but you can lose the golf tournament," he said.

That could have happened to some of the game's more celebrated performers.

Greg Norman, who has finished second in the last two Masters, struggled to a 77. Defending champion Larry Mize was one shot higher. And U.S. Open title-holder Scott Simpson had a 79.

But they were not alone in wind-raked misery.

"I saw some heartbreaking things

out there," Crenshaw said.

Lee Trevino, who has won the other three major championships twice apiece but has given up hopes of ever acquiring a Masters title, took a fat 81. So did Ian Woosnam of Wales, who led the world in money-winnings last season but has had limited success in the United States.

Arnold Palmer, 58, a four-time Masters winner, strained the patience of his loyal Army with an 80.

It was two shots back of the co-leaders to a polyglot lot at 71.

Bernhard Langer of West Germany, the 1985 Masters champion, managed to go one under par despite an aching back. He was tied with Sandy Lyle of Scotland, a two-time winner on the American tour this season, along with Mark Calcavecchia and Don Prouby.

Crenshaw, the 1984 Masters champion, Watson, a two-time Masters winner, and Gary Koch matched par 72.

"I was just creeping around trying to find something," Crenshaw said. "It was like survival," Watson

said. "I'm always amazed at what the wind does here. I don't think I'll ever figure it out."

Koch had a share of the lead until he got into a bunker, left it there and made triple bogey on the final hole.

Ballesteros, twice a winner of this title, was tied at 73 with a group that included Tom Kite, Ken Brown of Scotland, David Frost of South Africa, Love, Andy Bean, Gary Hallberg and Chip Beck.

Nelson, who won the 1983 U.S. Open and two PGA titles, matched two birdies against as many bogeys over the first 11 holes, then birdied the 12th from 10 feet.

He got a wedge to within 30 inches of the wind-blown flag on the 14th, went to 3-under with a 9-iron that coiled in about 2 feet from the cup on the 17th and preserved it with an 8-foot, par-saving putt on the final hole.

"I didn't try to do anything funny. I didn't try to do anything better than I could do," Nelson said.

Holyfield has sights set on heavyweights

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Evander Holyfield doesn't plan to stick around long if he unifies the cruiserweight title Saturday by beating Carlos DelLeon.

Not with Mike Tyson waiting. "I can dominate this division but what I really want is the heavyweight championship," Holyfield says. "And either way you go, you've got to go through Mike Tyson."

Holyfield intends to make this fight his last at 190 pounds, and his handlers are already anticipating a heavyweight title fight sometime next year against Tyson. It is a bout that could match two undefeated fighters in a huge money fight.

"I think it could be at least as big, if not bigger, than Tyson and (Michael) Spinks," said promoter Dan Duva.

Holyfield, who holds the World Boxing Association and International Boxing Federation 190-pound titles, has been planning a move into the heavyweight ranks for more than a year, and has been working with a

strength coach near his Atlanta home to strengthen his upper body.

Trainer Lou Duva said Holyfield weighed in at a solid 202 pounds before beginning training for the time. Holyfield was a light heavyweight, the division he won his first pro title in before moving up to the cruiserweight ranks.

"He credits some inspiration for the jump to heavyweight by the success that Spinks has had in moving directly from light heavyweight to fight as a heavyweight."

"Michael Spinks did enlighten me because he was a lot smaller than me," said Holyfield. "I said if this guy can do it, I can do it. It made my goal of being the heavyweight champion a lot more realistic."

First, however, he must beat DelLeon, who holds the World Boxing Council version of the 190-pound title.

The odds makers figure he will do just that, making him a prohibitive 9-1 favorite in the scheduled 12-round bout at Caesars Palace.

Clearwater steelhead season resumes today

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — A two-week emergency ban on spring steelhead fishing in the Clearwater and North Fork of the Clearwater rivers will be lifted by the weekend, the Idaho Fish and Game Commission decided Thursday.

After a telephone conference, the commission ordered the sport-fishing season reopened effective at midnight Friday. It cited increased stream flows and turbidity in the Clearwater drainage that have stimulated fish movement, resulting in a total count of 1,900 returning steelhead at the Dworshak National Fish Hatchery as of Thursday.

But Fish and Game biologists told the commission that more than 300 steelhead had entered the hatchery on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, and there should be no difficulty reaching the minimum egg production needs before the Dworshak fish ladder closes May 10.

Besides reopening the season, the Fish and Game Commission extended the season-closing date from April 15 to April 30 on the Clearwater and both the North Fork and South Fork of the Clearwater. The previous limits of two per day, four in possession and six per season were retained.

Travelers goes with Masters perfectly

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — The famed Green Jacket is symbolic of the Masters, but the bright, red Travelers Cos. umbrella has been almost as important to the prestigious golf tournament's refined wardrobe over the past three decades.

"The financial services company has sponsored the tournament in a subtle but effective manner for 30 consecutive years, making it the longest continuous corporate relationship with a televised sporting event."

"We look at the images generated by Travelers and the Masters as being very, very compatible," Richard P. Brown, a vice president of advertising and marketing, said Thursday as the tournament got under way at

the Augusta National Golf Club in Augusta, Ga.

"The image of the Masters is one of excellence, tradition and rich heritage and we like to think that Travelers is also looked upon that way by consumers," he said.

Tournament officials have been able to keep the Masters' rich tradition intact has been by resisting the temptations of the commercial dollar.

But that goal isn't compatible with that of a sponsoring company trying to gain name recognition. "One of the reasons the relationship has lasted so long is that both sides have compromised somewhat," Brown said. "We are very aware that the Masters doesn't want the tournament over-commercialized."

Bruins take first look at A-1 power

POCAHELLO, N.J. — Twin Falls High School's girls' track team could date its 1987 state Class A-1 championship to a year ago this weekend and an early-season loss to Highland.

TFHS Coach Duane Stands is hoping to start another run at the state championship this afternoon when the Bruins and Rams, for years the powers-that-be in eastern Idaho big-school track, get together at 3 on the District 25 oval with teams from Pocatello and Rigby.

"After we met Highland the first time last year, our girls just kept getting stronger," says Stands, whose team followed that six-point loss to the Rams by beating Highland three times in the next five weeks in the Gem State Conference meet, the Twin Falls Classic and the Region III championships. "I'm hoping for as the same this year. But we don't have the strength in the sprints that we did a year ago."

"On the boys' side, I think we're getting better," he continues. "We should certainly be competitive in the relays, the sprints and hurdles (and Bruin middle distance specialist) Jeff Dodds is getting stronger, although Highland has (defending state Class A cross-country champion) Frank Lee and a lot of depth. They have the defending state champion in the high jump, but I don't know what kind of long and triple jumpers they have. Certainly we're weak in the weight events, but I gather they're not particularly strong there either."

"The biggest difference between this meet and the Rams and Bruins first meeting of a year ago is that Twin Falls doesn't have a sprinter like Eva Talamantes as a counter-

weight to sophomore Julie Briggs, the defending regional champion in the 100- and 200-meter dashes and anchor in the sprints. Individually and as a relay team member, Briggs could account for between 12 and 24 points, which will be hard for Twin Falls to overcome.

By contrast, TFHS senior Jennifer Hannah is a favorite in the 800- and 1,600-meters despite the fact that Highland is the defending state girls' cross-country champion as well, and Hannah won't be challenged by anyone in the former event but her teammate Dana Robertson.

The meet's outcome may hinge on the hurdles and the long and triple jumps, which have usually been Twin Falls' strengths.

"Physically, we're in pretty good shape because we didn't compete last week and our shin splints have had a chance to heal," Stands says. "Competitively, we may not be as sharp because we haven't had a meet for two weeks."

The boys' competition will match the Bruins' unusually deep sprint corps against a Highland team led by junior Alan Tan and senior Rick Ockrey, an all-state wide receiver. Ockrey and his brother, senior Ron Marsh and another all-state end, Nick Brunkow.

"The relays should be interesting," Stands predicts. "We have a lot of depth and a lot of flexibility this year, but so does Highland."

The Bruins will have three more chances to see Highland before the Region III meet, which is scheduled for May 13 on this same track. Twin Falls and Highland will both compete in the Boise Relays in Boise April 23; take part in the Gem State Conference meet in Rexburg on April 23 and square off in the Twin Falls Classic on May 7.

Dark ages ending at Chicago's Wrigley field

CHICAGO (AP) — There was no thunder, no lightning, no wailing, no screaming. They didn't give over paradise as they did begin, installing lights Thursday at venerable Wrigley Field.

"It's about time," said Bud Hora, who figures he's spent 65 of his 75 years rooting for baseball's lightless, lovable losers. "I wasn't sure I'd see them in my lifetime."

More than five decades after the Cincinnati Reds played the first major league game under the lights of now-defunct Crosley Field, and 40 years after the Detroit Tigers became the last team to join baseball's fraternity of the illuminated, the Chicago Cubs are taking a swing at progress' best pitch.

"I grew up around Forbes Field (in Pittsburgh) and I can remember when they tore that down," said Don Gresko, the club's executive vice president, and the point man in the pitched battle between the Tribune Co., owner of the team, and neighborhood groups.

"Obviously there is something unique about day baseball, and I can understand that something will be lost," he added.

"But we intend to remain a predominantly day baseball team ... and when we added our own responsibility to baseball, the city, the community, we felt the most important thing was to retain Wrigley Field for the long term. Lights will enable us to do that."

A helicopter arrived at 8 a.m., and began the first of two dozen short trips alongside the left-field wall, pulling white steel girders to a crew of workmen on the upper-deck roof.

Cars stopped, pedestrians gawked, and more than one neighbor ran back to grab a camera. A nearby McDon-

ald's and Yum Yum donuts bustled with traffic, but no one asked who would throw out the first bulb.

"It is an event, I suppose," said Gresko. "But we didn't want it to turn into one. That's why we didn't give any advance warning."

The Cubs have not set a date for completion of the job, and the date for the first of six night games this season is still up in the air. The City Council vote last month that paved the way for the lights also limited the team to 18 lighted regular-season contests each season.

"I say, 'Hooryay,'" said 80-year-old John Santos. "But then I don't live in the neighborhood."

However, the ballclub insists it will remain a good neighbor, accommodating the community even in the design and position of the light.

All told, Wrigley Field will have just six banks of lights, three each on the left- and right-field decks. The 1,500-watt floodlights will sit atop 26 panels, whose latticework mirror the arches found throughout the 74-year-old structure.

The bleachers in left-center and right will remain exactly as they are.

"That was my big worry," Santos said. "I didn't take a position on the whole thing, but if they started fooling with the bleachers, they would have lost my vote — quick."

All the activity, however, failed to impress Sgt. James Kehoe, whose district includes Wrigley Field and whose job it will be to control crowds of up to 40,000 spilling into a quiet residential neighborhood at 10 p.m.

"Is this history being made? I don't know. Is this the end of an era? I don't know," he said.

"All I know is that it's busy around here now," he added, "and it's going to get busier still."

Lee Greenwood puts on special show

Dazzles once again

JACKPOT, Nev. — You can't capture lightning in a bottle, you have to watch it perform in its natural environment — and so it is with Lee Greenwood. You don't catch the total Lee Greenwood on record, you have to experience him first-hand.

A dash of Marty Robbins-like mischievous facial expressions, the bouncing dynamics of a Bill Carlisle, a smoothed-out Kenny Rogers-type voice with a wider range, an amazing instrumental virtuosity including a Boots Randolph-type saxophone explosion and some mellow keyboard work, and you have a sampling of a Greenwood performance.

At the Gala Room at Jackpot's Cactus Pete's last Friday night, Lee Greenwood played to a capacity crowd and dined each age and musical preference group with a smorgasbord of top-quality music with a dash of clever humor.

Greenwood and his band of excellent young musicians (including his son on drums) ran the gamut from pure country, through bluegrass, rock and roll, soul, to contemporary country and finished with the rousing "God Bless the U.S.A." that brought the crowd to its feet in an energetic hand-clapping climax. This same type of performance a few weeks ago, on the recent Bob Hope tour, caused the

comedian to say to Greenwood, "You stole the show!"

Between songs and at a news conference after the first show, Greenwood revealed his background and development as a songwriter and performer and gave a glimpse of some future plans. He also demonstrated the contrast as noticed with many performers, between an electrifying, sensuous stage performance and a quiet, intelligent and thoughtful demeanor offstage.

Greenwood's parents both demonstrated considerable musical ability, his father having more of a classical

background and his mother more country and western, although both shared a deep interest in jazz. From singing in church when he was just 8 years old, Greenwood developed his talents and learned to play 10 different instruments. But he considers the saxophone to be his primary one.

Greenwood was born in South Gate, Calif. near Los Angeles, but he grew up in the Sacramento area. Although music was a large part of his life, he also dreamed of playing baseball, a dream which was never totally fulfilled.

He made his first Las Vegas appearance at age 16. During those early Sacramento and Las Vegas years, Greenwood would sometimes play nine hours per night for \$25. Eventually, he ended up in Nashville, playing for Del Reeves. He also wrote for three years, including a Kenny Rogers hit.

Greenwood says his big "break" came when he recorded his first hit, "You Turn Me Inside Out." That was followed by a succession of hits, and even some lucrative advertisements, including a McDonald's television commercial.

Greenwood is aware of the need to keep his face and his music before the public. "Touring is the business," he says emphatically. "You have to tour, to keep the public continually aware of you. Only a few performers have been able to stay off the tour and still

remain popular."

He says he likes playing the "smaller circuit" because if an entertainer concentrates only on the large places, one can saturate them and the public won't come out for a repeat performance in the same year. He also says that ideally, he would rather play for more people at \$10 per person, than at \$20, which is just "too high" in his opinion.

Greenwood is considering doing a gospel album. He has had several gospel singles, such as "Listen to the Thunder." He expressed great admiration for Amy Grant's gospel work. He also likes newcomer Randy Travis and David Slater, and says that new singers have to continue to develop to ensure their longevity in the business.

And that's just what he's doing. Until this year, Greenwood has been on the road for about 260 days per year but has now cut back to 150. He likes to "unwind" by playing a variety of sports, especially baseball and tennis and enjoys horses.

Lee Greenwood leaves an indelible impression of a man who is a romantic, who loves his two sons and two daughters and his two grandchildren, and enjoys singing about love and devotion. He expresses an intense love affair with his country and the freedom it offers, and leaves his audiences with a feeling that "something exciting and satisfying has just happened here."

Novelist tries to encourage young writers

TWIN FALLS — Willo Davis Roberts has written 80 books, 17 of them for children.

The 60-year-old novelist had four young children at home when she began her prolific writing career in 1955.

"Otherwise, I'd have written more," she says with a smile.

Roberts and her husband, David, who is also a writer, have been telling students at elementary schools in Twin Falls this week that writing can be an interesting and lucrative way to make a living.

The grandmother of six is in the midst of a seven-week tour which has taken her and her husband on speaking engagements through eastern Washington and into Idaho. They'll speak to students in Ohio and Missouri before they head home to Granite Falls, WA, in their customized motorhome.

"One little boy asked me in Wenatchee last week, 'Did you pay for all these luxurious houses and—motorhomes with writing?' I said, 'Yes, and I think I won a convert to become a writer,'" says Roberts.

Roberts narrates a slide presentation which shows where she lives and the motorhome she and David use when traveling. She tells the elementary-aged students where her ideas come from and describes things her own children and grandchildren have done that have contributed ideas for her writing.

In addition, Roberts shows wildlife pictures her husband has taken to go with articles he's written for outdoor magazines.

"We tell them the story about the two o'clock grizzly bear that tried to open up your trailer when we were in Alaska and that's why we switched to a motorhome. We got a full-faced picture of him — not taken with a telephoto lens — from about this far away through a window," says Roberts, gesturing to indicate a couple of feet.

Roberts also meets with small groups of children who have shown an interest in writing. She describes the process a manuscript goes through before it becomes a published book, and shows them examples of a copy-edited manuscript, galley, page proofs and the initial proofs for cover illustrations.

"We talk about the way different il-

lustrators interpret the same story," she says.

Roberts has been addressing groups of children since she published her first children's book, "The View From the Cherry Tree," 13 years ago. The novel, which tells the story of an 11-year-old boy who witnesses a murder, was originally written as an adult mystery. Her publishers said they liked the book, but that it didn't fit their adult mystery format.

Roberts' agent decided to try it as a children's book, and it's been in print ever since.

"That's how I fell into writing for kids," she says.

Other popular books she's written for children include "The Girl With the Silver Eyes," the story of a young girl with supernatural powers, and "Don't Hurt Laurie," which addresses the subject of child abuse.

"They kind of surprise me," says Roberts. "I didn't have expectations of the kind of success the children's books have had — none of the adult books stayed in print more than two years at the most."

"Ten years ago I would have told you it's a tough way to make a living, writing for kids. I couldn't say that at all, now. The children's book market is booming and they expect it to boom at least another 10 years just because of the ages the children are becoming and the numbers of children that are coming up. It's a very good time to be writing for kids."

Roberts says she encouraged her own children to "learn something else to earn a living," yet all four, two daughters and two sons, also write.

"When I introduced my daughter to all the top science fiction writers in the United States — who she'd been reading since she was 8 years old — she really took off," says Roberts.

Roberts' books, which include mysteries, gothic and historical novels for adults, have been published in about 350 foreign editions and translated in 12 to 15 different languages. Germany, a country which Roberts says "buys almost everything," has done a radio production of "The View From the Cherry Tree."

Still, Roberts says she wishes "someone out in TV-land" would buy the rights to one of her novels for a movie.

"The kids that write to me all say, 'Why don't you make a movie out of this?' They don't realize that I don't. See **NOVEL** on Page D4

Photographers share travels

TWIN FALLS — Wesley Wada and his wife, Linda Anthis, return from their vacation at the close of each summer with a camera bag stuffed with photographs. That's really no big deal, except that the photos they shoot are not your average fast-print variety.

Wada, a professor of design and photography at the College of Southern Idaho, and Anthis, CSI's publicity photographer, have traversed the West for the past five years making beautifully executed pictures of sights most tourists don't take the time to see.

"People are not willing to go to such lengths to get a two-minute exposure," he says.

As self-described "loners," Wada and Anthis are more at home behind a lens than in the spotlight. They don't want to tell their ages and say they can't remember how long they have been married. "We're not the most aggressive people when it comes to promoting ourselves," he says.

Nevertheless, both photographers have shown their work extensively. Wada is a Denver native who has taught at CSI for the past 10 years. His work has been exhibited at the Boise College of Art and the Denver Art Museum. Anthis is a Twin Falls native, who Wada insists "is the best photographer in the family."

Though there are no immediate plans to publish their travel series, Wada and Anthis say they are eager to share their summer sojourns with the local community. Beginning today and continuing through May 6, CSI's Sunspot gallery will feature an exhibit of their work entitled, "Summer Residents — photographs from summer travels." The show is comprised of 24 photographs, including works in black and white, as well as in color.

The couple say they prefer working with black-and-white film because it allows for more subtle detail and art-

"Summer Residents — photographs from summer travels," by Wesley Wada and Linda Anthis opens today at the Sunspot Gallery located in the second floor of the Taylor Administration Building on the College of Southern Idaho campus.

The photography exhibit runs through May 6, and is free to the public. Viewing hours are 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. weekdays.

While most people's travel photos are sure to include sunburned Aunt Martha or other family members standing in front of designated points of interest, the photographs in this exhibit reflect dramatically different landscapes shot in Arizona, Utah, New Mexico and on the west coast from Northern California to Washington.

"We realize when we're traveling that we're seeing things that are disappearing," Wada says, referring specifically to a once-favorite spot in the Zion National Park. "While they try to avoid tourist haunts on weekends, Wada says he is often tempted to turn the camera around long enough to catch the busloads of travelers and the crowded hotdog stands prevalent at many so-called scenic sights. So far, however, he and Anthis have aimed their cameras only at billowy clouds, wilderness landscapes and the occasional architectural oddity.

Each spring, they pack their tiny camper van with an assortment of cameras, tripods and film, along with a tidal guide and a much-discussed itinerary.

"We know where we're going to go, but we don't know that we are going to get good photos," says Anthis.

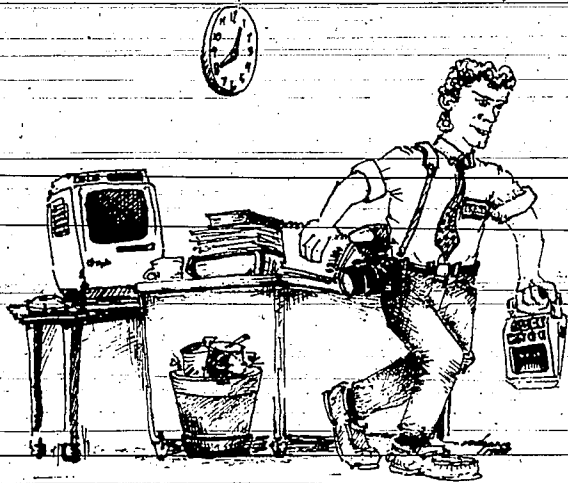

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
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Magichords mark anniversary

have anything to say about that. I would love to see movies made out of some of my books," she says wistfully.

In addition to her children's books, Roberts turns out a long historical novel once a year. "Madawaska," her latest adult literary effort, will hit bookstore shelves in May. Other adult titles by Roberts include "Destiny's Women," "Kaiting's Landing" and "To Share A Dream."

Roberts says she enjoys writing for children as a change of pace since historical novels take extensive research and "a lot more work." She can turn a children's book out in a month, even though it means working six to 10 hours a day, seven days a week. Several weeks ago she sent her latest children's novel, "Megan's Island," off

to a publisher. Roberts used to write for the Sunfire series, a collection of historical novels for teen-age girls. She dropped that after a difference of opinion with one of the editors over the content of a book called "Victoria."

"She wanted me to have my heroine in the Alamo at the time of the attack," she says.

Roberts refused to write the story that way because it would have been historically inaccurate.

"Any Texan historian is going to turn up their nose if I start fictionalizing that kind of thing," she says. "To tell you the truth, I have never read the book since it came out. Because she asked me to make changes, I did make a few of them. But there were some other ones that I said, 'No, I

won't change this. If they're going to be changed, you'll have to do it. I never read it to find out if she did it or not. I don't really want to know. So that killed that section of my career."

Roberts, who's written books for publishing houses like Doubleday, Lancer, Ace Books, Putman, Pocket Books and Atheneum, says she has long-standing, good working relationships with most of her editors. Her reputation as a best-selling author means that questions of content are not usually brought up.

"I'm pretty much in a position now where we can discuss things and if I say, 'That's the way I want it to be,' that's the way they leave it. I write the kind of books that I liked to read when I was a kid, and they're fun for me to write. They've all sold well

enough so that they're going along with me, whatever I want to do."

And Roberts says she doesn't write just to pay the bills. She loves her occupation.

"Even if no one was paying me, I'd still write something," she says.

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Best picture Oscar comes right down to wire

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — If the Academy Awards were based on box-office popularity, "Fatal Attraction" would eliminate its four opponents and win as best picture with ease.

If Oscars were based on media acclaim, "Broadcast News" no doubt would be the winner. The funny, incisive look-at-how-network-journalists-do their jobs under constant pressure captivated most critics, yet "Broadcast News" has been a disappointment at the box office.

Despite mediocre attendance and mixed notices, the home-stretch favorite for best picture of 1987 is "The Last Emperor," a mammoth epic centering on the life of Pu Yi, boy emperor of China and later puppet ruler of Manchuria for the Japanese. Bernardo Bertolucci was nominated for director and co-writer, but the actors were overlooked.

The thriller "Fatal Attraction" was by far the biggest moneymaker of the year, its combination of adultery and terror selling \$160-million worth of tickets in the United States and Canada.

"Fatal Attraction" also picked up nominations for Michael Douglas, Glenn Close and Anne Archer, as well as director Adrian Lyne and writer James Dearden.

Lyne, a graduate of British TV commercials, admits that he was sold on "Fatal Attraction" from the time he read the script.

"It was a page-turner," he said. "It was sent to me when I was in France. I sat down on some steps, and two hours later I was still on the steps, finishing it off. It was something I couldn't put down. I thought if I could provide the visual equipment and not screw it up, that it had a fighting chance of being as interesting a movie."

Lyne signed on with producers Stanley Jaffe and Sherry Lansing and worked with Dearden on the script. The director carries a tape recorder while preparing a film, and he made notes of matters he could use, such as his own son's attempt to demonstrate card tricks.

The three leading actors of "Broadcast News" — William Hurt, Holly Hunter and Albert Brooks — also were nominated for awards. James L. Brooks was named as writer and producer but, astonishingly, did not receive a nomination as director.

"I wanted to do a romantic comedy," Brooks said. "Just through a series of circumstances I wound up being around a number of network news people."

Brooks, who once worked as a news writer for CBS' "News," spent months hanging around in studios of Washington and New York for his research. The result is a verisimilitude that has attracted the praise of many network news people, including the curmudgeonly Andy Rooney.

Bertolucci amazed the film world by winning permission to film a movie with political overtones within China. More amazingly, he was able to shoot

inside the fabled Forbidden City, the shrine of Chinese history.

"The fact that this movie exists is another proof that China is changing," the Italian director said. "Only eight years ago it was inconceivable for the Chinese to let a Western filmmaker do a scene about the Red Guards, as at the end of the movie when you see the Cultural Revolution."

Nominee "Hope and Glory" is John

Boorman's valentine to his boyhood during the Battle of Britain. The writer-director-producer won triple nominations, but his actors received none. The movie's box-office performance has been less than impressive.

Despite the background of German bombings, the film is primarily comedic.

"For me as a child, the experience of the war was largely one of exhilaration, joy and fun," Boorman said.

"This is what the film is; it's great entertainment; it's very funny. There were moments of horror, when people were killed. As a child, you forget this very quickly."

"Also up for best film of the year is "Moonstruck," a romantic comedy about an excitable Italian family in Brooklyn. Cher, Vincent Gardenia and Olympia Dukakis are acting nominees, as well as director Norman Jewison and writer John Patrick Shanley.

"Moonstruck" has been a major success at the box office, doing more than \$50 million in business so far.

After a pair of heavy dramas, "A Soldier's Story" and "Agnes of God," Jewison was in the mood for a romantic comedy. "His first choice to play Loretta, the widow torn between two lovers, was Cher."

"For me, there has always been something 'streetly' about Cher, a lacking-in-pretension," the Canadian director said. "She's a very honest person — in person and on the screen. She looks Italian; although she's part

Armenian and part Cherokee."

Yet directors don't always get their first choice for lead performers, as was the case with "Fatal Attraction." As right as Glenn Close might seem for the role of the jilted Alex, director Lyne said Isabella Adjani was actually his first choice, since she had played a similar role in a French film.

"But after a few months of casting — I like to see everyone I can — I thought it would be more effective to go with someone who was not obviously sensual from the outset," he said.

"Glenn Close pursued the movie and was prepared to come in and test, which was unusual for a star."

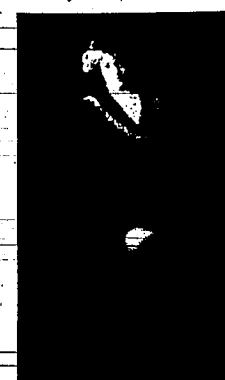
Randy Collier does it again

'Bright Lights, Big City' showcases a new Michael J. Fox

Jay McInerney's novel of redemption in the fast lane of the 1980s is a slim, ultra-thin volume set in the dimly-lit discotheques and cocaine-dusted bathroom stalls of New York City.

The film by James Bridges, equally slender, is so true to the book it seems that McInerney, who adapted it for the screen, could have handed in a copy of the novel in lieu of the final draft of the script.

But what might have been a pedestrian exercise in book illustration is, in the hands of Bridges, a simple, art-

istically told story that illuminates the spiritual themes in McInerney's novel instead of trivializing them.

The movie could as easily have been nothing more than a star vehicle for Michael J. Fox, a dubious choice to play the narrator (called Jamie in the film), but he nevertheless takes a pretty good shot at his most demanding movie role. He could have just come off as Alex Keaton on an all-night binge in the Big Apple.

As we meet Jamie, an aspiring writer-toiling as a fact-checker at *Stosdy Gotham* magazine, he has recently been abandoned by Amanda, his ambitious, vacuous fashion-model wife. Haunted by visions of the

mother who abandoned him by dying, he loses himself in shallow temptations of the flesh provided by Tad Allagash, his world-class bar-crawler best friend.

Kiefer Sutherland simply is Allagash. Phoebe Cates is blinding perfection as Amanda, who is more an idea than a character in the movie as in the book. Tracy Pollan plays Tad's down-to-earth cousin who represents Jamie's salvation.

Jason Robards steals scenes as an alcoholic has-been editor at Jamie's magazine. His son, Sam, has a small part as a club-goer. Swoosie Kurtz is the good-hearted co-worker who tries to help Jamie, but has her own agen-

da, and Frances Sternhagen as Clara, Jamie's boss, turns the villainess of the book into a palpable visage of authoritarian disapproval, even while warring up with tears when forced to fire Jamie for incompetence.

Dianne Wiest, as Jamie's beloved, dying mother is swathed in an almost Christ-like glow for her brief but pivotal role. In flashback on her death bed, she earnestly asks him what it's like being a young man — Does he sleep with many girls? Does he like it? Is it fun? Since the entire story turns on the believability of their love for each other, these moments are especially demanding on actors and director, and they work wonderfully.

The movie starts just like the book and ends just like the book and contains much of the dialogue exactly as in the novel. Bridges has gone with an odd, literal translation of a dream scene inspired by Jamie's obsession with the blaring tabloid-headline story of a "coma baby" implanted inside its dying mother's womb.

In the book, Jamie dreams of talking with "coma baby" through its mother's transparent belly. The scene is rendered unto "E.T." in the movie by way of special effects, which is OK since it is a dream, after all. Otherwise, Bridges' direction is unobtrusive and often quite lovely. Many of the shots — Gordon Willis was the cine-

matographer — would stand alone as photographs.

Those who have read the book will leave "Bright Lights, Big City" satisfied. Those who haven't will have to work a little harder to see beneath the surface.

"Bright Lights, Big City" went through several writers and a director before producers Sydney Pollack and Mark Rosenberg reverted to the basics of the book and put Bridges ("Urban Cowboy," "China Syndrome") on the job, under severe time constraints because of Fox's TV schedule. Despite those problems, the movie is a nice piece of work.

MV films feature comedy and drama

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by the Los Angeles Times reviewers.

BEETLEJUICE (PG). Uproarious ghost comedy that is a dazzling display of the pop culture sensibility of director Tim Burton, director of "Beetlejuice." Alec Baldwin and Geena Davis are a ghostly New England couple who seek help from scuzzy "bio-exorcist" Michael Keaton to rid their home of an awful upscale Manhattan couple (Jeffrey Jones, Catherine O'Hara). With Winona Ryder, Sylvia Sidney, Dick Cavett, Robert Goulet.

BILOXI BLUES (PG-13). In Neil Simon's autobiographical play, he recalls his life and hard times as an Army recruit in 1945 in Biloxi, Miss. and, as filmed by director Mike Nichols, the movie has marvelous moments and thoroughly engaging performances by Matthew Broderick and company. Nichols seems to have perfect pitch when he's working with Simon. He does not punch the jokes the way other directors do, he picks up the laughs on the way to something else. It becomes a darkly nostalgic wisecracking, male bonding comedy with moments of honest pain and eerie romanticism.

GOOD MORNING, VIETNAM (R). This dramatic comedy based on the 1965 Saigon pig of wildman Armed Forces deserter Adrian Cronauer is mostly failed satire. Director (but non-writer) Barry Levinson can't summon up the wit or bite of his "Diner" or "Tin Men." But Robin Williams, as Cronauer, saves it; he explodes the center-in-berserk bursts of electronic-age surrealism. Blazing away brilliantly, ad-libbing on camera, Williams hotwires "Vietnam" into realms of quick-witted chaos, gives a fine, freewheeling chummy hello and goodbye to the hell of war and the purgatory of radio.

JOHNNY BE GOOD (PG-13). This would be satire of big-time college football recruiting — with nice-guy high school players, furiously pursued and corrupted by unscrupulous schools — is so bad the NCAA might consider using it as punishment for the coaches who violate their regulations. Everything misfires here: They even use Judas-Priest's version of "Johnny B. Goode" for the end-credits; rather than Chuck Berry's.

THE LAST EMPEROR (PG-13). The producers of this costly lavish epic have given free rein to the cinema's most voluptuous trails of imagists: director Bernardo Bertolucci, production designer Ferdinando Scarfotti and cinematographer Vittorio Storaro. Thus the story of China's last emperor, and his struggles in a mod-

ernizing world becomes cool and distant, yet an absolutely unparalleled feast for the eye.

MASQUERADE (R). This is a sleek romantic thriller, with its every detail of life among the very, very rich — and sometimes famous. "Masquerade" is a densely plotted affair, full-of-twists-but-director Bob Swaim has saved his strongest ammunition for the role of the gentle, cripplingly rich heiress who is seduced by a slick ne'er-do-well — and Meg Tilly, playing the part, does not take a false breath. Between them, actress and director build a whole world of wealth and privilege and emotional starvation.

POLICE ACADEMY 5, ASSIGNMENT: MIAMI BEACH (PG). They're back. They're dumb. They're loud. They're running all over Miami Beach — those daffy, goofy, sex-crazed, lovable misfit cops — and they're not doing anything you haven't seen a hundred or so times before, though; because this is rated PG, there are more jokes about flatulence than perversion.

VICE VERSA (PG). For the second time in six months, a father and son switch brains; with comical "fish out of water" results. Director Brian Gilbert is a fine new film maker, but

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'Beetlejuice' tops week's box office

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Michael Keaton's portrayal of a manic ghost in "Beetlejuice" had enough magic to take the top box office position from "Biloxi Blues," while "Bright Lights, Big City" took third place.

The Easter weekend box office take was also a spring bonanza for studios suffering through the winter moviegoing doldrums. "Beetlejuice" raved in more than \$8 million for the No. 1 position.

In doing so, it knocked "Biloxi Blues," Neil Simon's nostalgic look at 1945 Army life, down a notch. The Simon yarn, starring Matthew Broderick as a boot camp private, made its debut at No. 1 a week earlier. Its \$8 million take put it in second place.

In third was "Bright Lights, Big City," starring wholesome "Party Lines" TV star Michael J. Fox as a pathetic drug user in a self-destructive relationship with a young model. It raked in \$5 million in its first week of release.

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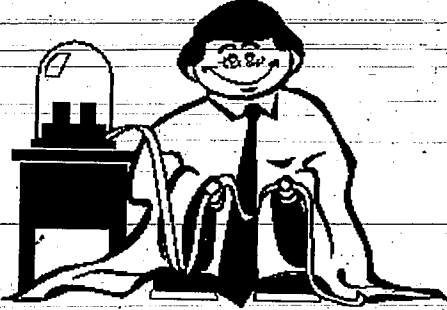
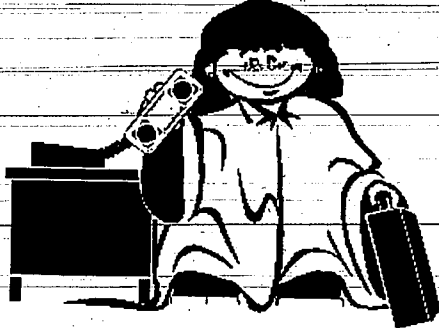

Oscar's turning 60 this year — Page 2

It's been 60 years now, and the voting rationale is still a mystery

One of our favorite pastimes is analyzing the Academy Awards. The ceremony itself remains strangely static: The glitzy musical numbers always look familiar. Presenters include Revered Stalwarts, Bright New Faces and Perennial Nominees. The most interesting presenters are multiple winners, such as Jane Fonda ("Kluge," "Coming Home"), but they are too seldom seen. (Fonda, for example, is not scheduled as a presenter this year, but she may show up.) So what captures our interest is the rationale behind the nominations and the awards.

The 60th Annual Academy Awards Presentation airs Monday, April 11, on ABC, and with previous winners for Best Picture including "Platoon" (1986), "Out of Africa" (1985) and "Amadeus" (1984), the movie-with-a-message-and-the-grand-epic-are-popular-bets. Of this year's nominees ("Broadcast News," "Fatal Attraction," "Hope and Glory," "The Last Emperor" and "Moonstruck"), "The Last Emperor" is a probable choice for its scope, while "Broadcast News" won widespread critical acclaim. "Hope and Glory" could have the same small-film appeal that gave "Chariots of Fire" an Oscar in 1982. "Fatal Attraction" is a highbrow slasher film, and "Moonstruck" may not be a "big" enough film.

Just as notable as the movies that are nominated are the ones that are overlooked. Once again, Steven Spielberg, whose "Empire of the Sun" won many strong reviews, was snubbed—perhaps his work is just too popular. But the same can hardly be said of John Huston, whose last film, "The Dead," was also overlooked by the Academy. Obviously, not everyone can be nominated, but politics and rivalry do seem to play a role in nomination process.

Two of the most hotly contested categories are Best Actor and Best Actress. This year's Best Actor nominees are Michael Douglas ("Wall Street"),

William Hurt ("Broadcast News"), Marcello Mastroianni ("Dark Eyes"), Jack Nicholson ("Ironweed") and Robin Williams ("Good Morning Vietnam"). Douglas and Williams are surprises, because they are popular stars rather than highly regarded actors, and both appeared in popular movies. (The Academy likes to consider itself highbrow enough to shun the most popular movies in favor of "art.") Hurt has won before ("Kiss the Spider—Woman"), Mastroianni is clearly not from Hollywood, and Jack Nicholson is from the Jack Lemmon school of Forever-a-Nominee. So who will carry away the trophy? Probably Douglas, for his triumph in two movies (the other is "Fatal Attraction"). He has a solid body of work behind him, and his turn may finally have come.

The Best Actress nominees are Cher ("Moonstruck"), Glenn Close ("Fatal Attraction"), Holly Hunter ("Broadcast News"), Sally Kirkland ("Anna") and Meryl Streep

("Ironweed"). The first three, once again, represent popular-appeal movies. Kirkland's was in a little-seen performance in a little-seen movie, and Streep has won before. Despite the stigma of Cher's glitziness, the award may come down to a battle between her and Hunter, who is a relative newcomer.

What can be said about this year's crop of movies? Popular movies were given more recognition, stories stressing the love of family and strong support groups flourished. Whether this signals a return to more traditional values remains to be seen—until someone says, "The envelope, please."

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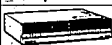

The big news on "Santa Barbara," the "manana, manana" soap, is that Cruz Castillo (A Martinez) finally married Eden Capwell (Marcy Walker), setting a soap opera record for postponements.

Was it too late? Did audiences really care anymore?

"I don't know," says A Martinez, who has been pushing for marriage the last two years between the cop and the rich girl. "I realize you never give soap audiences what they want, but perhaps we overdid all the delays. Now I hope the characters can go on to other dilemmas and use their marriage for support."

Cruz Castillo's life has had little relationship to reality. He has survived earthquakes, flash fires, boat accidents, jail and blindness. As a policeman, Cruz slunks the course, becoming a bad luck charm. "He wears his heart farther out on his sleeve than any cop I know," says Martinez, but he seems unable to protect a fly.

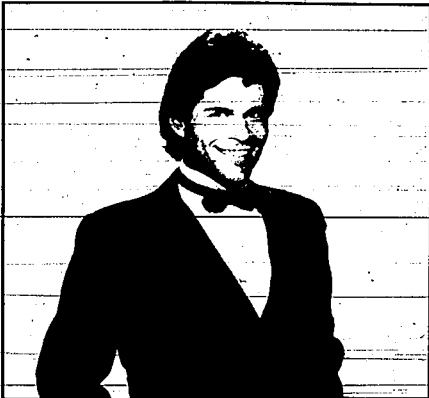
Asked what the bosses want from his well-meaning, inept character, Martinez replies, "I don't really know."

As producers change, definitions change. There is a clearer vision now with the latest producer, Jill Phelps, and Ann Howard Bailey, co-headwriter.

Martinez saves his sanity using perspective. "We give them fantasy. Audiences don't want real life in the afternoon. So the scripts are ridiculous. That's part of the job. When an actor blows, saying he can't handle the absurdity, we called it a reality attack. We have nothing to do with reality."

Yet the soap opera is slowly gaining fans, despite being programmed against "General Hospital." In France, it's a hit. The French come to Los Angeles and head straight for Santa Barbara. You see signs that read "We Speak French" in State Street shop windows.

It wasn't always that way for Santa Barbara inhabitants. The show was

so bad at first that the natives became disgusted.

And Martinez felt a glow when the soap travelled down to Mexico recently, receiving words of admiration from below-the-border performers. Martinez was out there regularly for four years for everyone to see, and that meant a lot.

Almost 20 years ago at UCLA, Martinez seldom found roles in student theater, and soon discovered that things were even worse for a Hispanic actor out in the real world. Still, he got enough work to keep going.

In attendance at the recent wedding was Carmen Zapata, once again playing Cruz's mother. It all started when Zapata and Martinez played mother and son way back on "Bonanza." "We've done this six times," says Martinez. "The last one was the best. We really connected."

Fans who have been watching "All My Children" regularly may remember that some six years ago a character named Sean Cudahy was sent to prison for killing nurse Sybil Thorne, and consequently disappeared from the show. All this is ancient history as far as soap operas go, but writers never forget. It seems that Sean has served out his sentence and will soon be returning to Pine Valley, much to the horror of some. Also returning will be the actor who played Sean back then, Alan Dysert. During Sean's six years up the river, actor Dysert has been busy creating pop and country songs, plays and a son, Cody Dylan.

News photographers click in new black comedy about Vietnam War

BANGKOK, Thailand — "You know what I really wanted to do — my fantasy — was to do a scene in front of the American Embassy in Saigon and raise the American flag once again," exclaimed David Hume Kennerly, executive producer of the television film "Shooter."

"Now that would have been a shot that would have gone around the world: 'Kennerly recaptures Vietnam.'"

Kennerly and the "Shooter" company recently wrapped up filming here in Thailand, which the one-time Vietnam combat photographer calls a "close second" since Saigon wasn't available.

"Shooter," the pilot for a possible fall series on NBC, is a black comedy about newsmen and war. The combination produces scenes that some may find outrageous or obscene, Kennerly concedes, but they are drawn from his own experiences and those of other photographers who covered the war.

"People who were in Vietnam will see this movie and say, 'That's right,'" he insisted, cackling as he recalled some of the episodes.

His enthusiasm for the project, loosely based on his 1979 autobiography of the same title, seems irrepressible, perhaps reflecting the determination that won him the 1972 Pulitzer Prize for news photography in Vietnam.

Kennerly, in an interview here, revealed in the absurd, whether telling war stories or recounting his career as a movie maker.

One character in "Shooter" is a reporter who sets up office in a massage parlor. "I don't think anyone's ever shown that on TV before," Kennerly said gleefully. "It's going to be a real eye-opener."

The film was shot in 26 days — two over schedule — in the steamy, traffic-stilled streets of Bangkok and the jungles of Kanchanaburi Province, the latest in a series of Vietnam-era movies made here.

The set designer, props man and special effects crew were drawn from a growing, international pool of professionals based in Thailand, which has been a shooting locale in the past for "The Deer Hunter," "The Killing Fields," "Saigon" and "Good Morning, Vietnam."

"Thailand is emerging as a world player in the thinking of movie producers," said Stephen Kline, Kennerly's longtime friend and fellow executive producer and script writer on "Shooter." "And everybody who goes out of here happy, which means just about everybody so far, becomes an ambassador for Thailand back in Hollywood."

"I'd come back here in a second," Kennerly said.

Bureaucratic, diplomatic and insurance hurdles have made foreign filming impossible in Vietnam, and increasingly difficult in the Philippines, once the major locale for movies about the Indochina wars.

Still, while Southeast Asia cannot be re-created on a Hollywood set, Bangkok presents some mixed benefits. Traffic, for instance, and heat.

"Everybody in this company lost weight," Kennerly related. "It was too hot to eat. We call it 'the Shooter Diet.'"

For the young cast, however, filming here was similar to the conditions that the fictional newsmen depicted in the film experienced when they arrived in Vietnam in the 1960s. Coping with the environment in Bangkok, day in and day out the world's hottest capital, gave the actors a taste of their characters' ordeal.

Said Steve Ford, who plays a young infantry officer in the film: "The heat was incredible, but it felt like you were in Vietnam."

Ford, who had a long run as a soap opera star in "The Young and the Restless," is the son of former President Ford, whom Kennerly served as White House photographer in the mid-1970s.

"Steve plays an army captain, and we kill him. I don't know if his father's going to be happy about that,"

Kennerly said, chortling.

The cast includes cameo parts for old friends and local amateurs. Two U.S. diplomats have bit roles, as do Kennerly and Klein. Dean Brelis, a veteran journalist and Time magazine's bureau chief here, plays the reporter who operates out of the massage parlor.

The script, laced with double-take repartee and bizarre incidents, revolves around two photographers who, while roommates and friends, compete without quarter when it comes to photos and women. Their colleagues at the fictional International Press Association, in the Saigon of 1967 include an assortment of characters who, in fact, could be found carrying cameras on most big stories. None is a stereotype, yet each is familiar.

At 26, Jeff Nordling, who plays one of the battling roommates, is the same age that Kennerly was when he first went to Vietnam. His counterpart is played by Alan Ruck. The female leads are Rosalind Chao and Carol Houston — who, Kennerly notes with wry pleasure, wears combat boots in his film but recently played Snow White in ABC's short-lived comedy "The Charmings."

Kennerly and Klein have been friends since they worked together on the Portland Oregonian 20 years ago.

As Kennerly relates the birth of "Shooter" as a TV movie, the two men had been working on bringing a story of photographers in Vietnam to the screen for about five years. They weren't having much luck until they connected with Gary David Goldberg, the creator of "Family Ties" and head of UBU Productions on the Paramount lot, who also had been interested in a similar concept.

With Goldberg's backing and clout, the script writers found themselves in a meeting with Brandon Tartikoff, president of NBC Entertainment.

"Basically, we just told him a lot of anecdotes, and when we walked out of that meeting we had a commitment for a script," Kennerly said.

Lower holiday viewing hurts all the networks

NEW YORK — The King of England and even Sophia Loren weren't enough to lure viewers to their sets over the holiday weekend, according to last week's Nielsen ratings.

The week ending April 3 was NBC's fifth weekly win in a row and its 24th win in the 30-week season, which ends in two weeks. NBC had an average rating of 14.6. ABC had 12.8 and CBS 12.6. The season-to-date averages are: NBC 16.2, ABC 13.8, CBS 13.5.

All three networks lost viewers on Easter Sunday. The three-network share, or percentage of the viewing audience, is an average 71 for the season. On Sunday it was 67, and 69 for the week.

CBS won the night with "60 Minutes" and "Mürder; She Wrote" leading into "The Woman He Loved," the story of King Edward VIII's abdication to marry Wallis Warfield Simpson, an American divorcee. The movie, starring Jane Seymour and Anthony Andrews, had a rating of 14.5 and a 25 share and ranked 27th.

The rating is a percentage of the nation's 88.6 million households with televisions. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

NBC launched the two-part "The Fortunate Pilgrim," starring Sophia Loren as matriarch of an immigrant family, but got only a 13.1 and 22 share to rank 40th out of 73.

NBC began the evening badly with a repeat of an Andy Williams special that got a measly 4.2 rating and 9 share and was the lowest-rated prime-time network show of the week. That, NBC said, provided a poor

lead-in for a repeat. "Family Ties," which landed in the bottom 10, perhaps the worst performances ever for the formerly top-10 show.

The highest-rated made-for-TV movie was last Monday's "Addicted to His Love" on ABC, which was 10th. On Sunday, ABC came in for the night with the theatrical film "Superman II."

The top-rated shows of the week were: "The Cosby Show" NBC, with a 25.1 rating and a 42 share, "A Different World" NBC, "Cheers" NBC, "Who's the Boss?" ABC, "Golden Girls" NBC, "ALF" NBC, "The Wonder Years" ABC, "Matlock" NBC, "Growing Pains" ABC and "Addicted to His Love" ABC.

NBC won in prime-time but continued in third place in news. The "CBS Evening News" was still No. 1 with a rating of 10.5 and a 21 share. ABC's "World News Tonight" had a 10.3 and 20. "NBC Nightly News" had 9.0 and 18.

NBC analysts say they are still baffled by the fall of their newscast to third place, despite research they say shows Tom Brokaw as the most popular of the three network anchors.

In prime time, though, NBC was cheered by "In the Heat of the Night," a sers based on the movie of the same name, which ranked 11th and equaled the 28 share of its premiere. Also, "Miami Vice" won its time period for the second time this season when it was moved to 10 p.m. EST last Friday.

Saturday NCAA basketball playoffs on CBS ranked 38th, but apparently gave a boost to "West 57th," which had a 20 share and wasn't among the bottom 10 for a change.

"I've heard a lot of horror stories about dealing with networks, but this has been the most positive experience I've had in my life. Perry Simon (NBC vice president for series development) had some really good, specific ideas that we bought, absolutely.

"That was last July. We've gone from A to Z in nine months."

Delivery date on the two-hour pilot

is early May. NBC's fall lineup is expected to be announced later that month, with "Shooter" a possible entry as a half-hour weekly series.

If it's slated, Kennerly faces a dilemma — though a pleasant one. No television series except the old "I Spy," he said, has been shot exclusively on foreign location. A hot series could bring the "Shooter" company back to blistering Bangkok.
