## House passes trade bill, defies president

WASHINGTON — The House on Thursday passed a sweeping trade bill, delivering a sharp blow to President Reagan as supporters of the hotly disputed measure piled up enough votes to override his threat.

"Our future isn't in the past," House Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas, declared as he fought a move to return the bill to a House-Senate conference committee and drop a plant-closings provision that Reagan said he could not approve. "We can regain our competitiveness. ... We can be No. 1 again."

The final tally, 312-107, contradicted numerous forecasts that the bill's sponsors would fail to produce the two-thirds vote needed to override a veto.

But many lawmakers, even if they had their doubts, appeared to have no taste in an election year for going on record against a measure billed as a plan to upgrade American competitiveness.

The bill was a House-Senate compromise on two competing measures that passed both chambers last year. The measure now goes to the Senate, where Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., planned to begin debate today. He was shooting for a vote on final passage early next week.

The House passed the measure after defeating, 263-167, a move by Minority Leader Robert H. Michel, R-Ill., to throw the bill back to the conference committee and drop the plant-closings provision.

Reagan, on the road in Massachusetts, said he would veto the bill if it hit with the plant-closings provision intact. He also sent a letter to Michel, saying, "I want a trade bill."

"I will work vigorously to secure one," Reagan said. "And I will urge the leadership to schedule prompt action on a bill immediately after the Congress sustains my forthcoming veto of the current trade bill."

Controversy over the plant-closings provision overshadowed central features of the bill, which would streamline the way the United States imposes import curbs to aid U.S. industries and retaliate against international trade violations.

## Gem senators vote against paying internees reparations

WASHINGTON — Idaho's two senators Wednesday voted against a bill to provide reparations to Japanese-Americans held in concentration camps during World War II, saying the legislation would be too expensive.

The bill, which passed 69-27, would provide each of the estimated 60,000 living internees of the war \$25,000 and an apology from the federal government. It would cost \$1.3 billion, a sum Republican Sens. James A. McClure and Steven D. Symms feel is too high.

About 77,000 Americans and 43,000 resident aliens were interned following an order issued by President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1942 following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. Most of the internees were of Japanese ancestry.

In a statement made last year, McClure said he believed the internment of Japanese-American citizens was a dangerous trespass of Constitutional rights, and that he supported the formation of a commission to study the issue.

But McClure said "militant Japanese-American organizations" had demanded large reparations and that he did not feel that the U.S. government should make "across-the-board monetary awards."

Symms, in his remarks on the Senate floor while the bill was being debated, said he also believed the country owed an apology to the internees but opposed "attaching price tags to personal freedoms."

"I don't think \$1.3 billion of contribution means we're any sorrier than an earnest, formal apology," Symms said. "In fact, placing a price of \$20,000 per person on our democratic rights trivializes the 200 some years we spent trying to protect them."

Symms also said the bill could set a dangerous precedent and result in courts cluttered with \$20,000 claims.

## Bank heist siege in Mexico ends as gunmen flee, set hostages free

LOS MOCHIS, Mexico — Gunmen who holed up in a bank after a foiled robbery in which five people died let their 42 captives go Thursday and were allowed to flee with three Red Cross workers as hostages.

Police said the gunmen released the hostages 15 minutes later, when they abandoned an armored car in which they left the bank for a stolen pickup truck and station wagon.

Hostage Rosario Angulo, who drove the armored car, said only five gunmen fled, one of whom had an arm wound.

"I think the other two mixed in among the crowd at the moment of leaving the bank," said Rosario, 20. Most police officers had withdrawn from around the bank just before the seven men left, apparently as part of an agreement ending the 24-hour standoff.

Angulo said the robbers had "goats horns (sawed-off machine guns), ammunition and dynamite sticks."

When the armored car had reared away, a policeman shouted to hundreds of people outside the branch of the National Bank of Mexico: "Thanks to you, the hostages are safe!"

Spectators had urged officials to end the crisis peacefully and some had shouted "Freedom, freedom!" in support of the gunmen.

Gov. Francisco Labastida Ochoa told the Televisa network's afternoon news program the agreement allowed police to pursue the gunmen.

Soldiers were seen checking vehicles on highways leading from the city.

The standoff in Los Mochis, a city of 120,000 on the Gulf of California, began at 12:45 p.m. Wednesday when the gunmen took hostages after an alarm alerted police to the attempted robbery.

"Red Cross spokesmen said five people were killed and at least 15 wounded during the attempted robbery and ensuing standoff. They said the gunmen freed two men and two women Thursday morning.

Hundreds of police had surrounded the bank.

Hostages told the media by telephone during the siege the gunmen were getting them food and beverages.

Jesus Acosta, a spokesman for the local Red Cross, said one of its rescue workers was among those killed in a gunfight Wednesday between police and the gunmen.

## Treaty ratification 'concerns' president

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. — President Reagan said Thursday he is "very concerned" that the Senate may not ratify the pending U.S.-Soviet arms control treaty before he goes to Moscow for summit talks with Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

In a question-and-answer session after a speech to the World Affairs Council of Western Massachusetts, Reagan was asked by a law student what the effect on the talks would be if the Senate had not yet ratified the treaty.

"I think it would be very upsetting and would put a strain on the summit if the Senate has not ratified the treaty by the time we go there," the president said.

"We hope and pray that they will, but their scheduling of it has been such that I am very concerned we may

**Shultz, Soviet confer**

MOSCOW — Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze and U.S. Secretary of State George P. Shultz discussed human rights and regional conflicts Thursday but reached no breakthroughs despite a "constructive atmosphere" and less contention over Afghanistan.

Last week's signing of an accord setting a May 15 start for the withdrawal of Soviet troops from Afghanistan "certainly has been a positive development," said State Department spokesman Charles Redman.

He said the apparent improvement in the Afghanistan situation made that issue less contentious, but that the war and its consequences were not a "closed book." Questions of monitoring the pullout and helping Afghan refugees continue to confront U.S. and Soviet officials, he said.

A U.S. official who spoke on condition of anonymity said the meetings had produced "a modicum of progress" on several fronts.

## 'Mob yuppies' taking over crime as Mafia fades out

WASHINGTON — Organized crime increasingly is being led by "mob yuppies," men who believe that cost-benefit analyses mean more than traditional codes of honor and discipline, a New York State official told Congress Thursday.

Ronald Goldstock, director of the New York State Organized Crime Task Force, told senators the mob is changing so much that it "is likely to be rendered totally unrecognizable" by the year 2000.

He testified at the third of five scheduled hearings of the Senate Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations. All the sessions have focused on the differences between organized crime today and in past decades.

In previous testimony, former members of the Sicilian Mafia and the Cosa Nostra in this country complained to senators that the old-style mob family is dying both in Italy and the United States.

"More than a score are the non-traditional, criminal types," Goldstock said. "They are a 'mixture' of organized Colombians, Cubans, Jamaicans, American blacks, Asians, Russians and motorcycle gangs, said James R. Zazzali, a member of the New Jersey State Commission of Investigation.

Goldstock said that even now, the "Colombian drug cartels are a much greater problem than the traditional La Cosa Nostra."

# Judge says trial to continue in case against tobacco firms

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Evidence in a closely watched cigarette liability case is sufficient for a jury to consider whether three cigarette manufacturers conspired to cover up the dangers of smoking, and the trial should continue, a judge said Thursday.

"The evidence presented... permits the jury to find a tobacco industry conspiracy, vast in its scope, devious in its purpose and devastating in its results," said U.S. District Judge H. Lee Sarokin.

At the same time, Sarokin dismissed a claim that the three companies used in the liability case — Liggett Group Inc., Philip Morris Inc.

and Lorillard Inc. — caused Rose Cipollone's lung cancer by not marketing a safer cigarette.

The judge's comments came in a 33-page opinion requested by the cigarette makers, who asked for dismissal of the case and an end to the trial that began Feb. 1.

The companies are being sued by Mrs. Cipollone's husband, Antonio Cipollone of Lakewood, whose wife died at age 58 in 1984 after smoking for 40 years. Attorneys for Cipollone completed their case two weeks ago, alleging that Mrs. Cipollone was a victim of a campaign by the cigarette makers to undermine warnings about the

dangers of smoking.

In the opinion that was pointed at times, Sarokin said the jury should be allowed to consider the conspiracy and punitive claims in the case.

Sarokin said evidence indicated the companies conspired to conceal and misrepresent information on the dangers of smoking and to "refute, undermine and neutralize information coming from the scientific and medical community."

He said the evidence also indicated the companies tried to "confuse and mislead the consuming public in an effort to encourage existing smokers to continue."

# Airlines about to snuff out smoking lamp

WASHINGTON (AP) — Aboard thousands of airline flights the smoking lamp is about to be extinguished.

The federal ban on cigarette smoking on domestic flights of two hours or less — about 80 percent of the total — takes effect at 12:01 a.m. Saturday, before dawn, some avid smokers are reconsidering train travel while others search for ways to keep their tobacco urges under control, at least for a few hours.

Government and airline industry officials said Thursday they expect the new smoking restrictions to cause few problems, although some confusion may exist for the first few days.

"On the whole I think we're in reasonably good shape on this," said Transportation Secretary Jim Burnley, whose department issued the new restrictions earlier this month in compliance with a law enacted by Congress last year.

The Transportation Department and the Federal Aviation Administration have come under some criticism, however, for not pushing the airlines hard enough to publicize details of the new restrictions and avoid passenger confusion.

"The airlines do not have a uniform policy to inform the public" about the new rules, said Susan Bianchi-Sand, president of the 21,000-member Association of Flight Attendants.

# U.S. guards detect more intruders

WASHINGTON (AP) — American troops guarding U.S. facilities in Panama detected two groups of intruders this week and in one case drew gunfire, the Pentagon said Thursday.

Dan Howard, the Defense Department's chief spokesman, said the latest incidents occurred on Tuesday and Wednesday nights near bases on the Pacific Ocean end of the Panama Canal.

They followed two other incidents last week, in which one Marine was killed accidentally and a group of Marines fired on what they described as a group of 40 to 60 armed intruders.

The incident Tuesday, the more serious of the two this week, occurred around midnight near an ammunition storage depot next to the U.S. Naval Station-Panama, Howard said. An Army sentry stationed there spotted three men who had crossed "inside the perimeter of the site," he said.

"The guard's report indicated that the intruders wore berets and carried small arms and bags. An intruder fired shots at the (U.S.) guard. The guard returned the fire, remained at the sentry post and requested assistance."

"The intruder then fired again. A Marine quick-reaction force (of 12 men) was sent to reinforce and assist in the search of the area. A security sweep of the area was completed during darkness with negative results, but the investigation continues. There were no casualties during the incident," Howard added.

The second incident occurred around 8 p.m. Wednesday when three U.S. sentries manning an observation post to the west of Howard Air Force Base detected roughly 30 intruders approaching the base, the spokesman said.

"The soldiers fired on the intruders, and they also fired two Claymore mines as a diversion," he continued.

gained "this treaty didn't bring this issue into the proceeding," Byrd said.

He said he has no objection to opening debate on the pact on May 9, if the issue of futuristic weapons is resolved by then. But he said that once debate begins many amendments will be offered to the treaty by opponents.

"I don't know how much time it will take," Byrd said.

The pending treaty, covering intermediate and shorter-range missiles, was signed by Reagan and Gorbachev at their summit meeting in Washington in December.

When the two leaders met again in Moscow May 29 to June 2, one of the issues confronting them will be a treaty still being negotiated that would cover longer-range interconti-

mental nuclear missiles.

Of this treaty, Reagan said, "There is a great question as to whether it could be ready for signature at the summit."

"We don't want a fast treaty," he said. "We want a good one."

In his speech to the group, which was billed as a scene-setter for the upcoming summit, Reagan proclaimed a "period of realistic engagement" between the United States and the Soviet Union.

"Even while freedom is on the march, Soviet-American relations have taken a dramatic turn, into a period of realistic engagement," Reagan said.

"Two of the most basic rights that we have called on the Soviets to comply with," the president said, "are the

right to emigrate and the right to travel. How can we help but doubt a government that mistrusts its own people and holds them against their will?"

"And what better way would there be to improve understanding between the United States and the Soviet Union than to permit free and direct contact between our two peoples? In the new spirit of openness, why doesn't the Soviet government issue passports to its citizens? I think this would dramatically improve U.S.-Soviet relations."

On Afghanistan, Reagan told his audience, "Now the Soviets say they have had enough."

"But let me say here that the next few months will be no time for complacency, no time to sit back and congratulate ourselves."

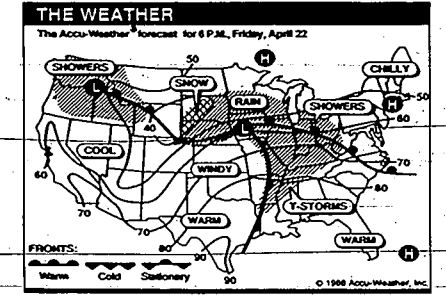
## Clouds, showers to hang around

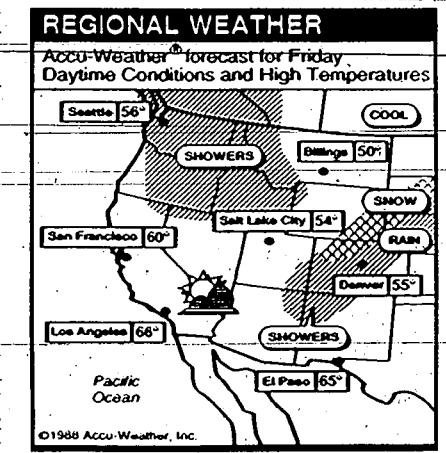
Caldwell, Prairie and Wood River Valley:

Republican critics of the plant-closings provision cited business fears that plant-closings notice would reduce credit.

However, Rep. Augustus Hawkins, D-Calif., said it would be a mistake to allow such an important measure to become hung up on one provision. "It is so modest, so watered down, so full of exceptions" that it probably will be enacted, he said.

Debate focused heavily on the provision that would require all but the smallest employers to give 60-day notice of upcoming plant closings and large-scale layoffs. The measure contains a number of exceptions for companies that suddenly find themselves in an emergency.

The centerpiece provisions would streamline the system under which the United States imposes import curbs and other means to aid industries threatened by foreign competi-

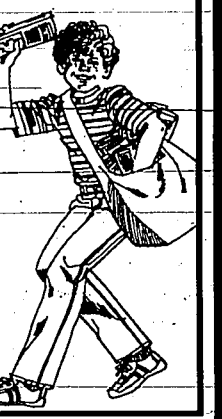
The bill was sponsored by the two Democratic senators — from Hawaii, Daniel K. Inouye and Spark M. Matsunaga, and Republican Sen. Ted Stevens of Alaska. It is almost identical to one passed 243 to 141 by the House last September.

Both of Idaho's congressmen, Democrat Rep. Richard H. Stallings and Republican Rep. Larry E. Craig, voted in favor of the House bill.

Inouye, a Japanese American who lost his right arm fighting in World War II, said the \$20,000 tax-free payment was only a token.

"They were determined by the government to be security risks, without formal charges," Inouye said. "If I was interned, \$20,000 is too little. How do you compensate a fellow American for the stigma of being branded as disloyal?"

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**Williams wanted a warning**

BOISE (AP) — State Auditor Joe Williams says he asked for an attorney general's opinion on whether appointed state officials must be confirmed by the Idaho Senate so he could warn any candidate for his job they would have to face the process.

Williams, who celebrated his 84th birthday last week, asked Attorney General Jim Jones for legal advice whether anyone appointed to replace him would have to be confirmed.

"The answer was yes. Under a 1969 state law, passed after a 1968 constitutional amendment, appointments by the governor to fill vacancies in state offices must be confirmed by the Senate," Williams, who is in his 30th year in the job, said he has no immediate plans to resign.

But in view of what happened to recent appointments of Gov. Cecil Andrus, Williams said he wanted to be able to warn any prospective replacement they would have to go through confirmation.

**43 transport mishaps likely**

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Federal officials predict there will be 43 accidents during the 25-year program for shipping nuclear waste from the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory to a repository in New Mexico.

But those projected accidents, ranging from tire blowouts to rollovers, should not result in any contamination of emergency personnel or the environment.

"They don't expect any releases," said Kenneth Gregg, an emergency services technician involved in the program. Materials like tools, gloves and rags that have become contaminated with low-levels of elements like plutonium during nuclear weapons production will start being shipped from INEL to the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant in Carlsbad, N.M., this October.

**Craig readies anti-drug law**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, plans to introduce a "no nonsense" anti-drug bill which will include a mandatory death penalty for any person, who knowingly or willingly contributes to the death of others in drug-related crimes.

"This is a strong, no-nonsense bill which will endure victory in the war on drugs," said Craig. He and Rep. Clay Shaw, R-Fla., announced the bill at a news conference here Thursday.

The bill creates a national Drug Policy Board. It is to coordinate direction of U.S. drug policy and mesh domestic programs with anti-drug efforts in other countries.

The bill increases funding for Coast Guard anti-drug efforts and restricts ships from drug-producing countries to specific ports in which their cargo can be quarantined and hand-searched. Ship owners will be required to pay extra inspection costs.

Also included are drug tests for parolees and people on probation; residential drug treatment centers for pregnant women, assistance to other countries to fight drugs and \$200,000 for each of three years to construct prisons.

**Jury finds Boisean guilty**

BOISE (AP) — After deliberating for 11 hours over two days, a 4th District Court jury has found Jerry Brazzell, 36, Boise, guilty of second-degree murder.

The jury of five women and seven men returned the verdict Thursday. Brazzell is to be sentenced May 25 by District Judge Alan Schwartzman.

In addition, the jury found Brazzell guilty of using a firearm to commit the crime, which will subject him to an additional sentence. Brazzell was one of two men charged after the shooting death of Tony Kline, 28, last summer at Meridian. The second defendant, Michael Williams, goes on trial next month.

**Ricks commences centennial**

REXBURG (AP) — Ricks College has ushered in the year-long celebration of its centennial with the graduation of its second largest class ever.

Bishop Henry Eyring, former president of the Mormon-operated junior college and now a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints' Presiding Bishopric, was the main speaker during Thursday's commencement exercises for the award of 1,563 associate degrees.

The only larger graduating class was in 1984 when 1,621 degrees were awarded.

**Argonaut denies retraction**

MOSCOW (AP) — The budget officer of the state Board of Education has been refused his demand for a retraction of the University of Idaho student newspaper editorial that labeled him "naughty little Eddie."

Ed Cisek, who was attacked in the editorial in The Argonaut for a proposal to finance campus construction with student fees, said Thursday he would talk to his attorney before deciding whether to take legal action.

Earlier in the day, Angela Curtis, news editor of the student-run publication, said Cisek's demand was just an attempt to intimidate the paper.

The March 1 editorial questioned Cisek's statement last winter that there was no intent to impose a fee on students at the same time the Board of Education announced it would discuss the possibility of establishing a fee to pay for new academic buildings and refurbishing old ones.

**Canyon County studies jail**

CALDWELL (AP) — Canyon County officials have been advised that the county jail is too small and does not meet national standards.

Local officials here have launched a new task force, charged with studying the need for a new jail, and coming up with ways to fund it.

**Andrus urges child abuse crackdown**

SANDPOINT (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus said here Thursday night the state of Idaho is not doing enough to fight child abuse.

"I am concerned that child abuse is not viewed as a serious crime by some members of the legal community. I am concerned that adult offenders sometimes are being treated with more sympathy than their child victims," Andrus said.

His prepared testimony opened a

hearing on child abuse problems, sponsored by the Commission for Children and Youth. It was the first of a statewide series of 11 sessions, designed to gather input from the public on child abuse problems.

The governor called child abuse "a terrible, terrible thing. We know that it's scary for children for life, that they suffer for years and years after being hurt by adults who were supposed to care for them, and care about them."

"I am worried that we are not doing enough to protect our children," the governor said.

He called for public input on the problems.

"If you are satisfied with the way a case has been handled, we need to know that," he said. "But if you are not satisfied, we need to know where the problems have been so we can attempt to solve them."

Private citizens will have priority to

testify at the hearings, the governor said. "This should not become a forum for public officials to make political speeches," he said.

Several bills on child abuse were introduced in the last legislative session. Most stalled in the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Andrus also announced that Joan Chase, Lewiston will receive the National Child Labor Committee-Lewis Hine Award this year.

**Idaho income increase exceeds national rate**

BOISE (AP) — The Commerce Department's reported 5.3 percent increase in Idaho's per capita income last year outpaced the projections of state government analysts and marked the first time in four years that the state's growth rate was higher than the national rate.

The federal agency said its preliminary figures show 1987 per capita income for Idaho hit \$11,820, over \$100 above the estimate included in the most recent state economic forecast issued last January.

Even after adjustment for inflation, which ran at 3.7 percent last year, the real spending power of Idahoans, based on the federal figure, increased by 1.6 percent, the largest jump since 1983.

State economic development specialist, Alan Porter said Idaho's 5.7 percent 1987 unemployment rate, the lowest in the 1980s, coupled with strong profits in key industries like timber and a surge in the livestock

market might be responsible for the improved income picture.

But the administration's top economic analyst, Michael Ferguson, questioned the accuracy of the new figure, citing a number of other federal statistics that would tend to moderate the growth rate in Idaho. He said those other figures tend to support the state economic forecast of 4.3 percent per capita income growth last year. That growth level more closely mirrors the increase in individual state income tax collections, which was running at about 4 percent after adjustment for tax law changes.

Despite the Commerce Department's projected jump, Idaho remained among the bottom 10 states in the country in nominal per capita income. But only 13 other states, all outside the West, posted growth rates higher than Idaho. Idaho's 5.3 percent rate compared to a 4.8 percent increase nationally and 3.6 percent for the Rocky Mountain states.

**Cities attract growth**

BOISE (AP) — Idaho, as in the rest of the Pacific Northwest, is turning into a region where almost all of the growth and job opportunities are concentrated in the population centers, a state report says.

Population increases, more jobs and construction spending all indicate general stagnation in rural areas of the state but, thriving growth in the population centers of Ada, Canyon, Bonneville and Kootenai counties.

That's the report from the Division of Financial Management in its monthly newsletter, "Idaho Outlook," published Thursday.

As evidence that "Two Idahos" are developing, the agency said between 1980 and 1985, Idaho's population grew by 60,000 and 60 percent of the growth occurred in Ada, Canyon, Bon-

neville and Kootenai counties. Population in those four counties went up 9.4 percent. The rest of the state grew by 4.2 percent.

Between 1982 and 1987, total employment in Idaho went up 13,100 but in the four counties it increased 21,600. Employment dropped in more than half of Idaho's counties during the period, DFM said.

Ada and Bonneville counties have consistently averaged nearly 2 percentage points below the statewide unemployment rate, the report said. But both Canyon and Kootenai have had higher than average unemployment.

Construction reports also indicate growth is occurring in small pockets of the state.

## To eliminate mine-laying in gulf, get rid of the mine-layers

WASHINGTON — The recent exchange of hostilities in the Persian Gulf reminds us of the recurring tragedies that have yet to be resolved in American security policy.

The first is that we proceed from crisis to crisis without clearly stated national goals, reacting to, rather than controlling, the diplomatic environment in which we work.

The second is that our national political leaders have yet to comprehend the proper way to use force, and by seeking to minimize the risk of casualties in the short term, vastly increase those risks over the long term.

And the third is that the military commanders and troops in the field continue to serve their national leaders far better than their national leaders serve them.

The American Navy has operated with exceptional skill in the Persian Gulf, despite the administration's introduction of an unwieldy and in some cases inappropriate force structure, and despite its hesitance to use its forces as other than diplomatic symbols, floating targets that are invitations to an international incident.

Last week the Iranians took the administration up on that invitation, again sowing a mine field in international waters — an act of war — and scoring a hit on an American warship. The superb skill of the crew saved the ship. Retaliatory acts occurred this week, and in the end the Iranian navy was dealt a serious setback. The numbers are still coming in, but it appears that two frigates are destroyed, a guided missile PT boat is sunk and a number of "boghammar" gunboats are done away with.

Oh, yes. And we also shot the hell out of two oil platforms. It is important to remember the oil platforms, because they were the only intended targets of an administration that is now basking in the glory of a military success that it did not direct.

As we examine the superb performance of the Navy this week, it

should be remembered that the administration again chose a minimal course of retaliation against Iran, one that in itself would neither have deterred the Iranians nor insulated our sailors from further actions by Iran. Conducting target practice on a couple of oil platforms was hardly designed to send chills up the spine of the average Iranian sailor, particularly those who make a living laying mines. Nor would it have affected the ability of the Iranian military to again perform an aggressive mission at the time and place of its choosing, using American warships and sailors to communicate its foreign policy to the world, and just possibly — as in Beirut — to win the tragedy sweepstakes and put America on its ear.

As it was, a few foolhardy Iranians

got in the way of the work on the oil platforms, a few others attacked a U.S.-owned tugboat and a Panamanian barge with U.S. citizens aboard, and then two frigates attempted to pull out of port at Bandar Abbas, firing a stray round or two at some American aircraft. Local commanders determined that "hostile intent" existed in each case, and the Iranian naval assets were quickly destroyed.

In other words, military commanders on the scene took the type of action that the administration has been too fearful to direct itself, the type of action that should have been taken five months ago and the only type of action that can ensure the operational security of our forces in the Gulf.

The administration has carefully nurtured the notion of "proportional response" with respect to our Persian Gulf activities. One would imagine that 25 years of failure would be enough for any concept. Proportional

response doomed us in Vietnam, enabling the enemy to adjust continually, and even to control the tempo of the war. Those in the military who watched Vietnamese railroad tracks and bridges destroyed (and then quickly replaced) in exchange for attacks on people know full well that the destruction of Iranian oil platforms in exchange for attacks on people will not work. The way to eliminate mine-laying is not to blow up oil platforms, or even to continually sweep mines. It is to eliminate the mine-layers. If we are not prepared to do so, we have no moral right to expose dozens of U.S. ships and thousands of U.S. lives to the consequences of our cowardice.

Politicians adore proportional response. It gives them the best of both worlds. On the one hand, they are supporting retaliatory action. On the other, they are not supporting the type of action that will cause them to

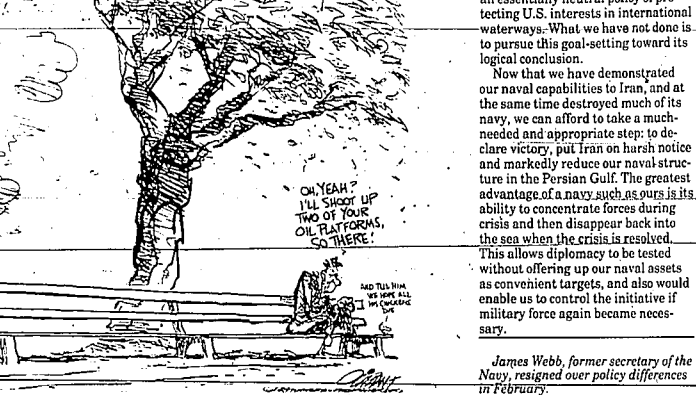
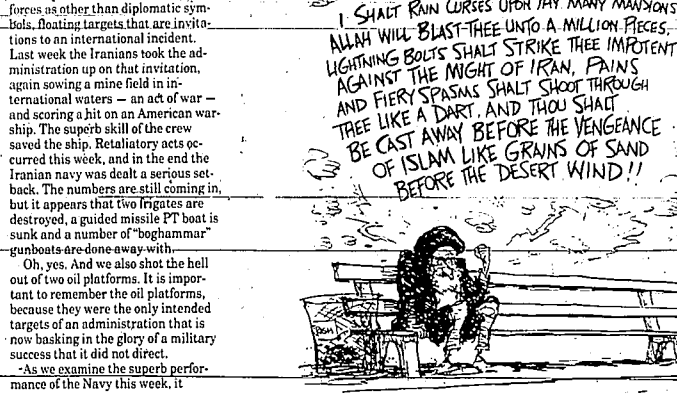
be accused of being, well, warlike. But military people desire proportional response, and in my view quite rightly so. It is like kicking the shins of a man with a machine gun. You do not take his capabilities away, and you do not demonstrate to him that you are serious about using your own capabilities. And you must nervously await his reaction, at the time and place of his choosing.

It is conceivable that the Iranians did not even marginally comprehend the power of our military until it destroyed half of their navy in a few hours. Such lack of comprehension directly affects political machinations, and the administration's leaders are at fault for not having made the Iranians aware sooner. If retaliatory force is necessary, it must be properly directed, but it must also be ruthless and overpowering. It must anticipate an adversary's next move, and preempt it. After the mine-laying inci-

dent of last October, appropriate use of force would have called for the elimination of much of Iran's navy, particularly its mine-laying assets. Instead, the mine-layer that was intercepted was sunk after some debate as to whether it might be better to give it back. If we had taken appropriate action last fall, it is questionable whether the USS Roberts would have been damaged last week.

There is, of course, another alternative readily available. Our Persian Gulf operations have been conducted under the umbrella of a hazily defined set of national goals, without a clear articulation of when these responsibilities will end. It is rather disingenuous to justify current force levels by continually chanting that we have been in the Gulf for 40 years, since 38 or 39 of those years saw an American presence of two or three non-combatants. Last year, after a good bit of travail, we succeeded in defining and narrowing our military objectives to an essentially neutral policy of protecting U.S. interests in international waterways. What we have not done is to pursue this goal-setting toward its logical conclusion.

Now that we have demonstrated our naval capabilities to Iran, and at the same time destroyed much of its navy, we can afford to take a much-needed and appropriate step: to declare victory, put Iran on harsh notice and markedly reduce our naval structure in the Persian Gulf. The greatest advantage of a navy such as ours is its ability to concentrate forces during crisis and then disappear back into the sea when the crisis is resolved. This allows diplomacy to be tested without offering up our naval assets as convenient targets, and also would enable us to control the initiative if military force again became necessary.



## Even a partial admission is not sufficient to open the door

BOSTON — He is everywhere these days. Looking rested and tanned and sage. Dispensing advice and experience. In tiptop form. He even looks good on television now.

Watching Richard Nixon's speech before the American Society of Newspaper Editors in Washington, I could not decide whether to hold my nose or take notes. Confronted with full page reviews of his book, I cannot decide whether to be intrigued or appalled.

If Nixon had been convicted of a felony, surely he would have been paroled by now. This is the case for rehabilitation. If, on the other hand, he is welcomed into the fold of respected elder statesmen, doesn't that neutralize wrongs into misdemeanors? This is the case for exile.

What is the relationship between forgiving and forgetting? I ask the same question when the ads come on my set showing Dow Chemical at its best. The young woman and her grandfather are walking together down a country road. As she talks about her work at Dow saving farms

and farmers, my mind flashes back to the Dow products that were dropped on Vietnamese villages.

At times I wonder if I am to become a crazy lady in my middle age, one of an ever-diminishing band of people still yelling at the television set.

"What about Watergate?" "What about napalm?" At other times I wonder if that would be better or worse than becoming one of those even-handed people who say, "To be fair, we must balance the Watergate break-in and the China breakthrough, must balance napalm and Saran Wrap."

Do I want my moral compass to become a clock, so that wrongs are diminished with time? If not, do I want

to be tied to a clock that stopped? Do I, do any of us, know when and whether to let go of past wrongs?

Most of us have faced dilemmas like these, even in everyday life. I have been a witness to marriages where one partner died in the other on the way out the door. His or her behavior was "unforgivable." We all said so. Yet almost all were at some time, to some degree, forgiven.

Indeed, the partner who remains publicly wronged, timelessly bitter, is almost inevitably criticized because he or she hasn't, we all agree, "moved on." When are we supposed to move

on and when are we supposed to stand steady, witness to personal and public history?

The classic moral example — too uniquely evil to have wider meaning — is the Holocaust. Our fear of forgetting is such that we put up memorials and are appalled if the swastika reappears as some pop emblem. Yet even here, we expect the grandchildren of Holocaust survivors to be allies with the grandchildren of Nazis.

Times change. People change. The person who carried the candle of a cause for one generation can be disparaged by the next for carrying a

grudge. The Sixties still argue about "Hanoi Jane" Fonda, while the Eighties identify her as the star of an exercise tape. There comes a generation that knows not Sacco and Vanzetti, Joe McCarthy, and then Watergate.

Some 42 million Americans have been born since Richard Nixon was forced to resign from office.

Underlying much of the resistance against rehabilitation, against forgiving, is the fear that our old enemy, the old wrong-doer will be able to claim victory after all, simply by outliving the rage.

He or she will have gotten away with it, whether the "it" is a personal or public wrong. Our memories are short, our sense of history is slight, the infamous and famous alike get homogenized into that morally neutral category called "Celebrity."

But it seems to me there is a criteria, though imperfect, for rehabilitation. It's something quite old-fashioned that I would call confession or repentance.

An admission of guilt, an expression of sorrow may be a better standard by which to judge a friend or corporation or an ex-President than mere time or punishment. Without repentance, a new image may be nothing more than a p.r. job to whitewash the past. Without repentance, forgiving can mean forgetting. This can whitewash the past, prove that what happened wasn't so bad if it wasn't worth remembering.

I am not one of those people who measure cardiovascular health by how fast their pulse returns to normal when Richard Nixon appears on a television screen. But how does he describe his attack on the Constitution that we call Watergate? Apart from the fact that it was wrong, it was stupid.

That is just not enough. Not enough to buy my vote for admission into the circle of elder statesmen. Not enough, Mr. Ex-President.

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# Gore exits presidential race; retains delegates

Ends campaign

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Albert Gore Jr. gave up his 1988 White House bid Thursday, offering the strong suggestion that he harbors hopes of a future campaign and moving to protect the delegates he has won so far.

"It hurts to have come so far and have fallen short," Gore told a Senate office room crowded with supporters. "But there will be other days for me and for the causes that matter to us."

The Tennessee senator ended the race deeply in debt after waging a long-shot campaign that challenged the traditional dominance of Iowa and New Hampshire. It succeeded in the South, where he won favor as a mod-

erate, but fell flat elsewhere.

Gore said he would technically remain a candidate to permit his delegates to attend the Democratic National Convention.

In suspending his campaign, he delivered some of the most eloquent lines of his campaign, praising each of his opponents, excoriating Republican George Bush, and pledging support for the eventual nominee.

"I want no part of a stop Jackson or a stop Dukakis movement," Gore said. "The only man I want to stop is George Bush."

"I will not be the Democratic nominee for president in 1988," Gore said. "The nominee is going to be Michael

Dukakis or Jesse Jackson. I'm going to do everything I can to help them do what I set out to do, and that is to put a Democrat in the White House."

Gore exited with a joke after a failed campaign that he said lasted 10 months and a million miles.

"I was doing great until I turned 40," he said.

Gore amassed 423 Democratic National Convention delegates during his campaign, according to The Associated Press count. His decision to suspend his campaign rather than quit the race means the two remaining active candidates cannot pick up delegates he has already won, but who have not yet been chosen.

Under party rules, Jackson would have gained 34 of Gore's delegates immediately, while Dukakis would have gotten 29. Illinois Sen. Paul Simon's decision to suspend his campaign denied Jackson another 47 delegates he would have inherited in this manner.

Gore said he spoke with both Dukakis and Jackson and that both were "comfortable" with his decision to hold onto the delegates. He said the move would protect Democratic leaders who backed him in states where delegates had not yet been chosen, naming Georgia as an example.

He said he planned no endorsement and repeated his oft-stated contention that he has "no interest" in the vice

presidential nomination, though he left that door open.

"I'm not trying in any way to broker a convention that is not going to be brokered anyway," he said.

Gore's withdrawal was assured by his dismal third place showing in New York, a 10 percent finish that capped six weeks of frustration for Gore since his six-state victories on Super Tuesday in the South. New York had become his last chance to get back into contention.

Gore is saddled with a debt of more than \$1.5 million, run-up-in-borrowing for his campaign in Super Tuesday states and after that in an effort to break through outside the South.

# Contras need supplies desperately

WASHINGTON (AP) — Many Nicaraguan rebels are desperately in need of food but are not entitled to receive U.S. assistance until the Sandinista government and the Contras agree to terms for resetting the rebels in cease-fire zones, a U.S. official said Thursday.

The official said that based on talks he had last week with Contra leaders, the food situation for the estimated 12,000 rebels stationed inside Nicaragua "is getting very desperate."

Many are beginning to sell off what few assets they have for food while others are buying on credit, promising merchants repayment once deliveries begin on the \$47.9 million U.S. humanitarian aid package approved by

Congress three weeks ago, the official said.

The Agency for International Development official, who briefed reporters on condition of anonymity, said the first truckloads of food for rebel camps inside Honduras arrived this week. He refused to say how many rebels are stationed on the Honduran side of the border with Nicaragua.

The shipments were sent from the Honduran capital of Tegucigalpa after being inspected by independent observers, including Honduran clergymen, to ensure the deliveries contained no lethal equipment, the official said.

He said the shipments contained 69,000 pounds of beans, rice and other

food items. AID is managing the assistance program.

The leftist Sandinistas and the Contras reached a temporary truce on March 23 that allows for humanitarian aid for the rebels once they are settled in mutually agreed cease-fire zones.

But talks on establishing ground rules for the seven zones that have been agreed to are at an impasse, leaving rebel forces in a precarious position.

The official said there are one or two known instances in which Contra troops have used their weapons to obtain food, and he said more such instances can be expected if the talks drag on inconclusively.

# Aspin says U.S. overreacted

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States "may have shot ourselves in the foot" by overreacting with this week's military attacks on Iranian oil platforms and ships in the Persian Gulf, Rep. Les Aspin, chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, said in remarks released Thursday.

"There is good reason to suspect that the mines that prompted Monday's retaliation were not laid by Tehran authorities, but by some Iranian radicals looking to start a fight," the Wisconsin Democrat said.

Aspin admitted that "I cannot prove this. No one at this time can prove who ordered the laying of the mines — or why."

Aspin's analysis was contained in a

speech he will deliver Friday morning to the Washington Forum, a private group. A text of the speech was released Thursday evening.

White House spokesman Bill Harlow, asked for comment, said, "I don't usually engage in debates over speeches."

At the Pentagon, officials said there would be no comment until they had read Aspin's speech.

"We may have shot ourselves in the foot," said Aspin. "Our restrained policy in the Gulf worked superbly until now. We had shown sufficient force to convince Iran to back off, without reacting so bloodily as to generate the 'martyrs' that the (Iranian) radicals use to inflame public passions."

# Budget deficit slightly lower

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal government ran up a \$29.1 billion budget deficit in March, but the amount of red ink in the first six months of the fiscal year was 3.5 percent less than the same period last year, the Treasury Department said Thursday.

The deficit last month topped a \$23.9 billion shortfall in February and a rare, \$16.1 billion surplus in January, which occurred because Social Security checks that month were mailed early and were counted as part of December's spending.

# Ships head for the Gulf

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy is deploying 18 ships to the Persian Gulf region over the next week in a long-planned and routine series of rotations, the Pentagon said Thursday.

Defense Department spokesman Dan Howard said he was announcing the ship movements to head off speculation the United States had already decided to increase the size of its Middle East force.

Howard said earlier this week the administration was reviewing its gulf policies following clashes Monday with Iranian forces. But he stressed Thursday that review was continuing and the new deployments involved ships earmarked for "a changing of the guard."

"It's been scheduled for some time. It's not a reinforcement," the spokesman said.

The Navy tries to limit to six months the maximum deployment for any warship.

Howard said five ships would leave East Coast ports on April 28. He identified them as the destroyer John Hancock and the frigates Fairhull, Halyburton, Nicholas and Robert C. Bradley.

# Firebombs mar Israel's 40th anniversary festivities

JERUSALEM (AP) - Israel celebrated its 40th birthday Thursday but in the violence-ridden occupied territories it was called Firebomb Day, proclaimed by the P.L.O.

Military jets roared over Jerusalem and Israel honored veterans of the independence war, who fought five Arab armies in 1948.

Soldiers were on alert in the West Bank and Gaza Strip, which Israel has occupied since the 1967 war, but Palestinians managed to throw a firebomb at a military patrol in Bethlehem.

Journalists were barred from much of the West Bank and Gaza, and the 1.5 million Palestinians who live there are prohibited from entering Israel for the rest of this week. Curfews in 23 towns and refugee camps affected about 400,000 Arabs.

Palestinians were on general strike in much of the occupied lands, following the instructions of a Palestine Liberation Organization leaflet.

Violence has swept the territories since Dec. 8 and at least 169 Palestinians have been killed. An Israeli soldier and civilian

also have been slain.

New details emerged Thursday about the assassination of Khalil Wazir, the PLO military commander also known as Abu Jihad (Father of the Holy War).

Israeli sources said an Israeli commando team carried out the operation under the direct command of Lt. Gen. Dan Shomron, military chief of staff, and took documents from Wazir's home in a suburb of Tunis.

They also told The Associated Press, speaking privately, that the government approved the mission on two other recent occasions but it was scrubbed both times

for technical reasons.

Wazir was killed early Saturday. A Tunisian report said the job was done by Israeli commandos and Israeli sources confirmed it, but government officials have declined comment.

Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir said, when asked about it Thursday:

I suggest that we stop talking about this because I don't want to continue discussing it. I don't think anyone has anything to say about this.

faces international criticism both for the reported assassination of Wazir and the tough methods it uses in the occupied territories.

Shamir acknowledged the criticism on Israel radio, but added: "This, too, will pass. ... I think we are coming close" to ending the violence in the West Bank and Gaza.

The fundamentalist Muslim Brotherhood, however, released a 12-page booklet called "Humus" (Zeal) that urges an even more intense struggle.

## Higgins faces trial for spying

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - The pro-Iranian kidnapers of Lt. Col. William R. Higgins said Thursday the Marine officer will be tried on charges of spying for the United States.

"This criminal will be turned over today to the tribunal of the oppressed to try him for the crimes he has committed," the Organization of the Oppressed in Earth said in a typewritten statement delivered to the Reuters news agency office.

Higgins, 43, of Danville, Ky., was serving with a U.N. observer group in south Lebanon when he was abducted by gunmen Feb. 17 near the ancient port of Tyre, 50 miles south of Beirut.

The statement came three days after the Christian-run Voice of Lebanon radio station claimed Higgins was killed during clashes between pro-Syrian and Iranian-backed Shiite militias in south Lebanon earlier this month.

It could not be known whether Thursday's communique was meant to refute the radio report or set the stage for announcing Higgins' death.

Thursday's Arabic-language statement from the Shiite Moslem group was accompanied by a black-and-white photograph of Higgins, apparently to prove its authenticity.

The picture showed the balding Higgins with a "stubble" gray beard, wearing a dark field jacket, his eyes looking down and away from the camera. It was the first photograph of Higgins released by his captors since his kidnapping. It was not known when it was taken.

The statement said among the charges Higgins faced was "spying for the criminal United States on our Lebanese and Palestinian peoples" and "active participation in American conspiracies against our Moslem people."

## 29 from jet arrive home

KUWAIT (AP) - Hostages freed in Algiers from a hijacked Kuwait Airways jet arrived home Thursday to a tumultuous reception after being released by nine Moslem gunmen, who slipped away.

Western diplomatic sources said they had clear evidence the hijackers had reached Beirut after the end of the 15-day siege. Officials at the Beirut airport denied they landed there.

The captor of Kuwait, Sheik Jaber al-Ahmed Al-Sabah, and Crown Prince Sheik Saud Abdullah Al-Sabah led a group of government officials and relatives who were at the Kuwait airport to meet the former captives.

The special Kuwait Airways Boeing 767 carrying the 22 passengers and seven crew members touched down Thursday night after a six-hour flight from Algiers.

Two other hostages released early Wednesday were Saudi Arabian citizens and were flown home in a private executive jet.

The gunmen, who murdered two hostages while the hijacked jumbo jet was in Cyprus last week, disappeared before dawn Wednesday after abandoning their attempt to force Kuwait to release 17 pro-Iranian terrorists jailed for bombing the U.S. and French embassies in Kuwait in 1983. Both slain captives were Kuwaitis.

Kuwait refused any concessions to the hijackers but Algeria apparently promised them passage to a country of their choice.

## Special ISP program targets truckers

TWIN FALLS — For Clifford West, a trucker with small flaps of skin hanging from his bespectacled eyes, an Idaho State Police inspection Thursday was flowing smoothly until the equipment check was completed.

"That's when they asked to see my logs, and that's when I started hemming and hawing around," he said.

West had driven more than 90 hours in the last seven days. The

law allows him 80. The state police, who inspected West's truck and papers Thursday afternoon at the Hollister Port of Entry, fined the trucker \$300 and suspended his truck-driving privileges for three days.

"It's good that they do these things, it really is," said West, while standing by his blue Peterbilt truck. "I was running way too many hours, and it's the company that makes me do it."

West, a Colorado Springs resident who drives for Werner Enterprises, was hauling Kellogg's Corn

Flakes from California to Montana.

Cpl. Gary Brush of the ISP said West was one of many truckers who were cited for violations this week. As part of the Motor Carrier Safety Assistance Program, the state police have been in the Twin Falls area since Sunday, kicking tires and checking drivers' logs.

Capt. L.J. Nickerson, Idaho's MCSAP coordinator, said the program's inspectors were concentrated in the Twin Falls area as part of a "saturation-type patrol." At daily or weekly intervals, the program's 12 inspectors are shuttled through-

out the state checking for trucking violations. State police spend no more than a week at one site because the truckers notoriously efficient communications network quickly alerts them of hot spots, Nickerson said.

Brush said the violations found this week "hurry" the state's SAP in 1976, and the state adopted the program in earnest in 1984, Nickerson said. He and other ISP officials had little but praise for the program.

"We've had everything," Brush said. "We always have everything."

Idaho was selected as a pilot state for the federally funded program in 1976, and the state adopted the program in earnest in 1984, Nickerson said. He and other ISP officials had little but praise for the program.

"We've had a decline in major truck accidents," Nickerson said. "That's not saying let's our program that caused it, but we like to think it has."

Brush said each inspector will examine about eight trucks a day. The inspection's scope is virtually unlimited, according to officials. Inspectors scrutinize the steering, suspension, frame, tires, lights and other possible equipment defects. They check to ensure compliance with hazardous materials regulation. They look for drugs. They peruse shipping papers, registration, insurance and a driver's log books.

Brush, a Pocatello resident who worked at the Hollister Port of Entry Thursday, said the most common violation is brakes.

Prior to MCSAP, truckers were primarily regulated at the federal level. Such regulatory agencies adopted MCSAP Idaho incorporated the federal regulatory code into its statutory scheme.

Nickerson said more than 40 states have adopted the program since the early 1980s. But while the country may be pampered with such regulatory agencies, truckers have apparently not turned themselves being pulled over at every other turn.

West, who has been trucking for the last three months and has traversed 40 states, said the examination was his introduction to the regulatory powers that he had.

"This is the first time I've ever been inspected, the very first," he said.

## Burley Mall may face foreclosure action

BURLEY - The holders of the multimillion-dollar mortgage on the Burley Mall in southeastern Idaho have scheduled a foreclosure sale in August after defaulting Southmark Corp. in their loan payments.

Bob Cart, Southmark's regional director in San Diego, said he did not know what the company planned to do about the action, but negotiations were continuing between Southmark and the two insurance companies that hold the mortgage.

"The main thing we are trying to impart to the merchants is we don't think anybody is going to close down the shopping center," Cart said, predicting a settlement

will be reached before the Aug. 19 sheriff's sale.

Mall manager Diana Lassiter said it is not something for either customers or merchants to worry about. The mall, which has been open for 10 years, has gained four new tenants since December, and sales in all 17 stores have been good, Lassiter said.

Attorneys for Pacific Mutual Life Insurance Co. and one Life Assurance Co. took the action when Southmark stopped making monthly mortgage payments after December. It is seeking more than \$2.5 million in the foreclosure proceeding.

The actions being taken by the insurance companies are merely the normal steps taken in this kind of mortgage restructuring negotiation process, said Lassiter.

Earlier this month, the insurance companies notified mall tenants that they should begin sending their rent payments to Pacific Mutual, not Southmark, until the mortgage default is resolved.

"Evidently, the mortgage company thought they needed to take this step," Cart said. "It is the choice each merchant has to make whether to send the rent payment to us or to the mortgage company."

Southmark officials said "none of the mall tenants has expressed concern over the situation, and in fact leasing activity has picked up in recent weeks."

"This is just part of the negotiation process with the mortgage holder," Lassiter said.

## Veteran officer is charged with DUI following accident

TWIN FALLS - Jim Kistler, commander in charge of training with the Twin Falls Department of Public Safety, has been charged with driving under the influence of alcohol after a one-car accident at about 2 a.m. Saturday.

Attorney Greg Fuller is representing Kistler, who has pleaded innocent to the charges.

An affidavit filed by Idaho State Trooper Pat Mooney in court says the 43-year veteran of the Twin Falls police force had an alcohol level of between .16 and .17.

Idaho law requires a blood-alcohol level of 10 before charges can be filed.

Tim Qualls, director of the Department of Public Safety, said Kistler hasn't been disciplined. "I have no intentions of making any recommendations until I can

find out if the man's guilty," Qualls said.

Kistler had a one-car accident near the grade leading to the Army Corps of Engineers' new Magic Valley Hatchery.

According to an affidavit Mooney filed in court, Kistler said he lost control of his vehicle. Mooney estimated Kistler's speed at 55 mph in a 35 mph zone.

"I could smell a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage on his breath as he talked to me," Mooney wrote in the affidavit. "He admitted to have been drinking. He said that he had a couple of beers after the accident."

Idaho State Patrol Sgt. Glenn Schwartz said earlier this week that the accident occurred at 2:20 a.m., was reported at 2:32 a.m., and Mooney arrived at the scene at 2:49 a.m.

"A 12-pack of Coors light was found at the scene," Mooney wrote.

"There were four full cans of beer out of the 12."

Mooney gave Kistler two field evaluations, which Kistler failed, according to the affidavit.

He then took Kistler, who lives at 2081 Elizabeth Blvd., to the Twin Falls police station for a breath test.

Kistler failed the test, then exercised his rights against self-incrimination and declined to be interviewed.

Kistler, who said he had no passengers in his car, suffered a head laceration in the accident. His 1985 Mercury Lynx sustained about \$3,000 in damages, Mooney said.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter declined to comment on the case.

Asked when she will comment, Baxter said, "I suppose when we make a decision on something worth commenting about."

## Castleford schools struggle with deficit

CASTLEFORD - The Castleford School District is facing a budget deficit next year because of reduced enrollment and rising costs.

Superintendent Ron Erickson told the school board at its meeting Tuesday night that some cuts or cutbacks will have to be made in school operations.

"If ADA (average daily attendance) is down, we will lose approximately \$67,000 next year," said Erickson. "We have about 28 students graduating (this year) and only about 13 coming in."

Erickson said increasing costs, such as insurance, will add up to another \$8,000. Building needs to meet Occupational Safety and Health Administration and insurance requirements total \$63,000, although the district hopes to handle these over the next few years.

"We'll take care of the immediate things first such as replacing a water pipe and repairing the leaking elementary and gym roofs," said Erickson.

He listed several options the board could take to make up the deficit. These included: cutting the athletic director and two classroom aides; not hiring a new music teacher; eliminating the foreign language and home economics programs; cutting the business education program and social studies to half-time programs; and releasing one teacher.

"These things will affect our accreditation," said Erickson, "and if we cut the vocational-education programs we'll lose lots of the vocational equipment. No curriculum, no equipment."

"This equipment includes typewriters, calculators, a computer and home economics equipment."

The board members are considering other options and will hold a special budget and curriculum meeting Tuesday night at 7 p.m.

## 3 contend for party chairman post

BOISE - The new chairman of the Idaho Democratic Party should be no stranger to party workers.

Each of the three men seeking to succeed Mel Morgan as state chairman is a long-time party veteran, with years of working to elect Democrats.

Morgan, 69, resigned after six years as party chief to accept a state job with the Department of Transportation. Anna Wilson, Osborne, state vice chairman, is acting chairman. A temporary state chairman will be selected at the Democrat state convention in Pocatello in June.

After the election, the party will elect a permanent chairman next year.

The announced candidates are Conley Ward Jr., Boise attorney and former member of the Public Utilities Commission; Twin Falls attorney Lloyd Walker, who was state chairman from 1962-65, and Wally Wright, Pocatello, retired labor leader.

All three have been sending letters to party leaders in an effort to drum up support. And all three stress their party experience.

Wright, who spent 37 years as an officer, business manager and international representative for the International Association of Machinists, said he has worked for Democrat candidates since the days of Democratic Sen. Glen Taylor (1945-49).

"My experience in the labor movement has given me the ability to work with a broad selection of both labor and management," Wright said.

Walker says Democrats are heading toward "a marvelous political year" and he wants to be part of it.

Walker also says he goes back a long way to the first Frank Church campaign in 1956. In 1968, he and John Glasby were state co-chairmen for the ill-fated Robert Kennedy presidential campaign.

## Minidoka board restores programs

RUPERT - In a measure designed to rebuild district staff and programs to pre-deficit levels of two years ago, the Minidoka School District Board has voted to re-institute eighth grade sports.

The full program will include boys' football and wrestling and girls' volleyball, basketball and track will be provided for both sexes.

Estimated cost of the total program is \$21,500, which includes \$9,000 in startup costs for equipment. Superintendent "Gene" Snapp said that the cost will be partially offset by the increased activity fees and gate receipts.

In support of the program, Trustee Russell Holland said, "Our kids have been handicapped without it. We're the only district around who doesn't offer it."

Board Chairman Bob Harmon said he had received numerous calls in support of the program, and Snapp said a major advantage of the sports program was that students were involved

in "school-related activities rather than street activities."

Two years ago the district found itself \$250,000 in the red. To get back to nothing, the district cut the positions of a counselor, an English teacher, a principal, and a librarian and a psychologist from its budget and pared extracurricular activities.

With the district back in the black, an additional principal position has been added and a half-time psychologist added. That position will

Religion, politics are examined

POCATELLO (AP) — Mentioning religion and politics in the same breath usually is an invitation to disaster. But those often divisive issues struck a harmonic chord Tuesday during St. John's Campus Parish services on Christianity and politics in the United States.

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On a national level, presidential candidates Republican Pat Robertson and Democrat Jesse Jackson have aroused heated debate about the ramifications of mingling Christianity and politics. Two key issues their campaigns raise are whether morality can be legislated and whether a minister as president would impose his specific

Suspect pleads guilty to conspiracy charge

BOISE (AP) — Robert Pires, 24, pleaded guilty here Thursday to a federal charge that he and others took part in a conspiracy of crimes that included several 1986 bombings in Coeur d'Alene.

Pires and four others are named in a federal indictment released in February accusing them of taking part in crimes aimed at reviving "The Order," a violent offshoot of the white supremacist organization, Aryan Nations, of Hayden Lake.

White Mortuary & Crematory

The charge to which Pires pleaded guilty Thursday carries up to \$250,000 in fines and up to 20 years in prison. Pires already is serving a federal prison term on related charges.

The indictment charges all five defendants with violating the federal racketeering statute and one count of conspiracy. It charges them with a number of criminal enterprises, including "murder" and attempted murder, counterfeiting and robbery. The goal was to raise money to further white supremacist organizations.

Inviting prison names rejected

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Board of Correction decided that "Owyhee View" or "Southern Desert" didn't portray the proper image of a maximum security prison.

So board members decided to call the new prison being built south of Boise exactly what it is — Idaho Maximum Security Prison.

"It connotes exactly what kind of place it is," board member L. James Koutnik said. "It's not a flower garden or a country club. It's a maximum-security prison."

Board member Wendell Miller suggested calling the facility Central Prison to commemorate the state's 100th birthday.

But Chairman Robert Anderson said he wasn't sure he wanted to commemorate the year that the state had to spend \$30 million for a prison while "schools are going to hell."

Idaho has had to expand prison facilities because of overcrowded conditions that have brought inmate lawsuits, and Corrections Director Al Murphy said a name is needed in a hurry because some state employees have begun calling the project "SPUD."

Tim McNeese, assistant director, said the Corrections Department has received suggestions ranging from Owyhee View Prison to Southern Desert Correctional Facility. The prison is being built next to the main facility in the high desert from which the Owyhee Mountains are visible.

Board members said some states name their prisons after people. To which Murphy responded, "I don't want to hear 'Happy Al's Correctional Facility.'"

The vote was unanimous for Idaho Maximum Security Prison.

# Jurors watch videotape of shootout at Singer compound

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A videotape of the Jan. 28 shootout between FBI agents and a polygamist clan revealed two figures walking outside the family residence as 11 gunshots shattered the quiet morning air.

Jurors donned headphones and watched a television monitor as the two-minute tape was played Thurs-

day during the federal trial of four clan members accused of holding police at bay for 13 days following the bombing of a Mormon chapel in Marion.

The segment, an excerpt from a 45-minute videotape, was recorded by Summit County Sheriff's Reserve Deputy Grant J. Evans, who had been

stationed in the Marion cemetery 500 to 800 yards from the clan's farm when the siege-ending confrontation took place.

The tape barely discerns two people walking toward the clan's main residence. Seconds later, a sequence of three gunshots are heard, followed by one shot, a group of four shots and then three more.

The surprised reaction of Evans and other unnamed individuals with him are also picked up on the tape.

"Jesus Christ!", Evans muttered when the first shots broke out.

"Boy, those were shots there, buddy," another man exclaimed.

"You betcha. Was they fired at us?"

The deputy, who apparently moved momentarily when the shooting began, swinging the camera's angle off

the farm, then noted on the tape that the two people seen walking ducked when gunfire erupted and ran around the back of the house.

FBI agents testified earlier in the trial that the two were clan patriarch Addam Swapp, 27, and his 19-year-old brother, Jonathan Swapp, who were walking toward the main house from a goat pen when two attack dogs were ordered to subdue them.

As the dogs were released from another home on the compound, six to 10 shots were fired from the main house, killing state Corrections Lt. Fred House. Instantaneous shots fired by agents John Butler and Richard Intellini wounded Addam Swapp.

The Swapp brothers, clan patriarch Vickie Singer, 44, and Mrs. Singer's son, John Timothy Singer, 21, are standing trial on charges ranging from possession and use of a bomb to attempted murder of federal agents.

The Swapp brothers appeared in court Thursday in plaid shirts, minus the buckskin jacket Addam Swapp has worn throughout the eight-day trial and a coat once owned by slain polygamist patriarch John Singer, which Jonathan Swapp began wearing Wednesday.

After the videotape was played, a larger television screen was wheeled into the courtroom and jurors viewed a tape and series of still photographs of the view from the bedroom of John Timothy Singer toward the home of Singer son-in-law Roger Bates, where the FBI attack team and House had been stationed.

FBI agent Nicholas Repasky, who took the pictures, said under cross-ex-

amination that the evidence simply showed various vantage points from the window.

State prosecutors have said John Timothy Singer is their prime suspect in House's death and that homicide charges will be filed when the federal trial ends.

In other testimony Thursday, Richard Graham, a retired FBI agent and metal detection expert, said he swept a large swath of the Singer property with a high-powered detector for seven days after the standoff ended.

Graham testified he found three dozen spent and live bullets in several areas around the main Singer home, including 29 .30-caliber casings, two live .30-caliber rounds, two .22-caliber casings, a live .38-special cartridge and casing and three .30-06 casings.

Snow was cleared around the Bates house, Graham said, so that he could more carefully examine that area.

## Montana county pays for legal entanglement

HAMILTON, Mont. (AP) — Justice is justice.

So when a Ravalli County truck was cited for exceeding maximum payload, the county prosecuted itself, found itself guilty and fined itself \$350.

But not before it paid out \$1,150 in legal fees to prosecute itself — and defend itself against the prosecution.

The tangle of legalisms consumed nine months, and even those involved say it got more complicated than was necessary.

But Ravalli County Justice of the Peace Nancy Sabo, who rendered the final verdict, said it was a matter of principle.

"The message is, it doesn't matter if it's a county agency. Everyone is supposed to obey the law," Sabo said. "It's the same penalty I would impose on any private person charged with the same offense."

The case began last August, when county road employee Kevin Hatch was cited by a state officer for driving

an overloaded county truck on U.S. 93. The truck's legal limit was 73,280 pounds; Hatch's load weighed 121,800 pounds.

County Attorney John Robinson said he couldn't prosecute the case because it would be a conflict of interest.

So, the county instead hired local attorney Jeff Langton as special prosecutor, at the cost of \$712.

It then hired local lawyer George Corn to defend itself against Langton's prosecution. The tab was \$450.

After months of dickering, the county finally agreed to plead guilty. Sabo imposed the fine — to be paid from the county road department, half going to the state and half back to the county general fund.

She also imposed another \$1,750 in fines, suspended on the condition the county keep a clean record for the next year.

There was no immediate word on who would supervise the county's probation.

## FCC fines California porn dealers millions

WASHINGTON (AP) — The FCC Thursday ordered two California dial-a-porn operators to pay fines totaling \$1.2 million for failing to restrict access of obscene messages to children and nonconsenting adults.

"It's time we took steps. The ultimate in sleaze deserves the ultimate penalty," said FCC Commissioner James H. Quello. "They need to know we mean business."

The companies, Audio Enterprises, Inc., and Intercambio, Inc., were each fined \$600,000 for violation of statutes banning the interstate transmission of obscene material and failure to restrict such transmissions from minors and nonconsenting adults. The maximum fine is \$50,000 for each day of violation.

An FCC spokesman, Gerald Brock, said the \$600,000 fines were based on the amount of money the companies made during the commission's monitoring process.

In an 11-month period, Audio Enterprises made \$650,000 off calls to one line, the spokesman said.

Thursday's order resulted from an FCC investigation triggered by complaints alleging that unimpeded access to the messages resulted in the molestation of one 10-year-old girl and so disturbed one teen he had to enter weekly psychiatric therapy.

The companies have 30 days to pay or seek reduction of the fine.

Earlier commission dial-a-porn rules had mandated the "blocking" of such messages through access codes, message scrambling or use of credit card numbers.

Upon being notified last December of the complaints, both companies said they did not have the capacity to provide access screening and denied the messages were obscene. Intercambio also argued that it had not violated the regulation because it never intended to transmit interstate or to minors.

The commission staff is investigating complaints about two other dial-a-porn companies, Ramrod Enterprises, Inc. and 2001 Enterprises.

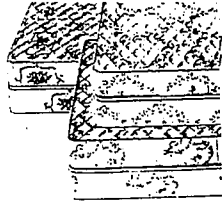
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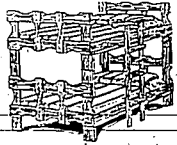

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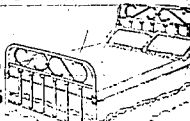

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# The tradition continues: Baltimore loses 15th straight game

MILWAUKEE — Frank Robinson is getting a lot of advice lately. But the manager of the 0-15 Baltimore Orioles would prefer a well-pitched game and some timely hits, all at the same time.



"I've gotten all kinds of phone calls and advice, but not many of those people can play positions," Robinson said. The Orioles extended their own major league record for losses at the start of a season to 15 on Thursday with a 7-1 loss to the Milwaukee Brewers.

The Orioles broke the major league record with their 14th straight season-opening loss Wednesday night. No. 15 not only sunk them deeper in the record books but also was a franchise record for consecutive losses. It

"I don't think we've been fouling up on fundamentals. It's just that we're not performing well. We're not pitching well, and today we didn't hit. Those are two things we have to be patient with, and hopefully players will come around and perform the way they're capable of performing."

Baltimore starters Mark Thurmond, Mike Boddicker and McGregor lasted a combined nine innings in the three games of this series and gave up 18 hits and 18 runs to the Brewers, who have won five straight after ending a seven-game losing streak.

Milwaukee right-hander Chris Bosio earned his third win in four deci-

sions Thursday with an eight-hitter and lost his shutout in the eighth on a double by Terry Kennedy and single by Rene Gonzales.

Baltimore, which entered the game with a .201 team batting average, scored 11 runs in the first two games of the series but now has only 29 in its 15 losses. The Orioles now have been held to one run five times and shut out three times in the skid.

"They hit the ball well again, but Bosio pitched well," Brewers Manager Tom Trebelhorn said after Milwaukee ran its season record to 5-0 against the Orioles.

"You've got to beat the teams behind you and Baltimore is the only one behind us," Trebelhorn said.

Paul Molitor, who played third base for the first time since last June, sin-

gled to right to begin the third, moved to second as Robin Yount reached on an infield hit and scored on Glenn Braggs' broken-bat single to center.

Rob Deer doubled in Yount, and Greg Brock gave the Brewers a 4-0 lead with a ground ball double down the first base line, scoring Braggs and Deer.

After Joey Meyer grounded out, Schroeder sent his first homer of the season over the fence in left and reliever Oswaldo Peraza replaced McGregor.

The Brewers tacked on another run in the fourth on Jim Ganter's double and two wild pitches by Peraza.

Milwaukee has now beaten the Orioles in 20 of the teams' last 23 meetings, including 10 straight at County Stadium.

And professional bowling? What could be easier? The bowlers push themselves away from the bar just long enough to walk a ball five or six steps and roll it down a wooden lane a few dozen times every Saturday afternoon for thousands of dollars. A nothing activity.

Well, it's high time somebody exposed pro bowlers for what they really are: unrecognized pain addicts hooked on a little appreciated and much misunderstood sport — yes, sport.

If bowling isn't physically demanding, then why must these rollers for dollars sometimes painfully perform with chewed-up pitching thumbs bloated to the size of knockwurst, hands cracked, calloused and sometimes bleeding, wrists separating from throwing arms, elbows and shoulders burning with tendonitis and bursitis, and backs that feel like exposed nerve endings? And, if it isn't mentally stressful, why are some bowlers burned out at 30? Why do others suddenly find themselves locked in a catatonic trance just as they are about to deliver a ball?

The Professional Bowlers Association Tour sometimes more resembles a sadomasochistic event concocted by the Marquis de Sade.

Longtime physical trauma has been further aggravated by a new generation of "crankers" spawned by Mark Roth, the all-time leading money winner. He introduced the so-called "Boom Ball Era" a decade ago with a revved-up hook that has since been copied by a growing list of injury-plagued apostles.

The cranker cups the ball with a curled wrist, the thumb coming out at the release point as the fingers rotate up the side of the ball in a wrenching

twist that produces violent torque. On contact, the cranker explodes the pins like a mortar-shell. Everybody is cranking, or trying to, in an attempt to win big on the tour these days.

In the 60-foot distance to the pins, a slow-motion camera once counted 28 revolutions on Jimmy Keeth's cranker as it sped 18 mph to the target. (A bowler with a good hook gets only a dozen revolutions.) Lefty John "The Buzz Saw" Cant produced 2 1/2 revolutions from the time the ball left his hand until it touched the alley. He had to leave the tour with arm injuries.

"In the 1980s, the tour has produced a whole new school of crankers," said Mike Sands, PBA tour press director. "We're seeing more and more bowling-related injuries to the wrist, elbow and shoulder. Today's style could shorten some careers."

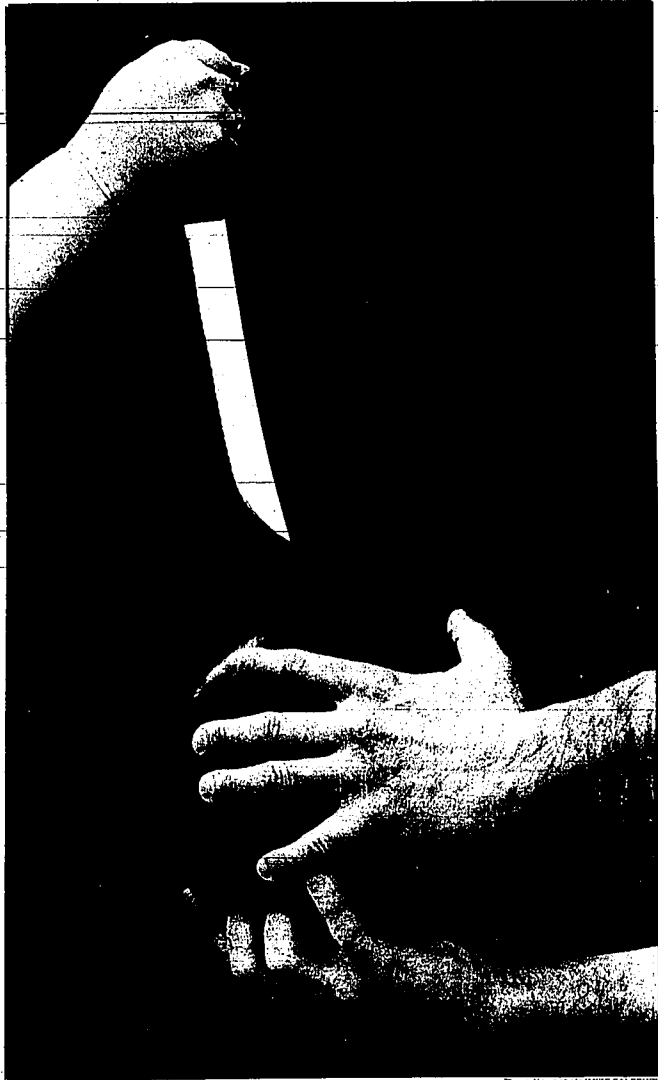
Seven-time titlist Steve Martin, 29, is considering retirement because of unbearable pain in the tendons of his wrist.

Roth shrugged off the casualty reports. "I've been bowling 27 years," he said. "Something is going to wear out eventually." He wears a wrist-to-elbow bandage. He received an anti-inflammatory injection a few days ago. One of the tour's bleeders, his pitching hand sometimes resembles raw hamburger. More and more, bowlers are taking time off to heal.

"Mark's hand is scary," said Roth's friend, Red Burnham. "The back of his thumb knuckle is raw, and his palm is cracked and calloused. Once he had to pull out of a tournament to have his bleeding hand stitched together. Many of the guys bowl in pain throughout their careers."

Last week, 1988 Masters winner and former Golden Gloves boxing champion Mark Fahy had his thumb-nail drilled to drain infection and reduce swelling of a thumb three times its normal size. He had three of his balls drilled wider to accommodate his still-swollen thumb, which contin-

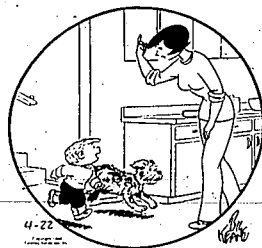

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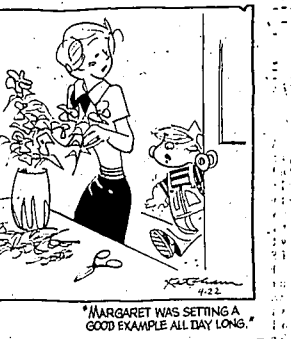

## Mobile DJ Vanderpool uses a 'sixth sense'

Reading the crowd,  
he tries to please all

TWIN FALLS — It's a toss-up. Is the disc jockey or the audience having more fun?

To Sid Vanderpool, mobile disc jockey and founder of Music Magic, a mobile disc jockey can't have fun unless the crowd is enjoying itself.

"I care about everybody at the dances. I want everybody to have fun," says 26-year-old Vanderpool of Jerome. Drawing upon what Vanderpool calls his "sixth sense," he "feels" what the crowd is feeling and adjusts his visual and audio performance accordingly.

"Some people get high off of drugs, some people get high off of booze, cigarettes, fast cars. I get a high off of making people dance," says Vanderpool.

He is one of a growing number of mobile disc jockeys who take their library of music wherever they can find a receptive audience.

Not only does Vanderpool play at school dances and proms, he also spreads some "Music Magic" at weddings, parties, mall openings, class reunions and even fashion shows.

He admits his own musical skills are limited. "I can't play an instrument but I can play a turntable."

Unlike a live band, mobile DJs don't take intermission breaks, but play continuously throughout the night. They have an enormous selection of music of all types (Vanderpool has an inventory of 7,000 songs) and can cater to any taste and almost any request. Many of the shows have special lights, flavored fog and even fireworks.

"We can give them (the audience) what they want...we're kind of unlimited," he says.

There is a growing demand for the mobile DJ service, says Vanderpool. An average high school rock band usu-

"Hold 'em close," he advised the teens as he played Madonna's "Crazy for You."

He works the crowd, watching as different groups respond to their favorite type of music.

Standing behind his DJ box with a mass of 45s at his side he manipulates two turntables, a tape deck and a CD player, all the while adjusting a myriad of lights for just the proper effect for the song.

Although he seldom dances in the crowd himself, he is constantly moving to the beat.

Vanderpool's DJ skills are the result of hours and hours of practice, sitting inside his garage in Jerome talking to himself, feeding records back and forth and introducing records.

He has always liked speech and drama. "I always enjoyed getting up in front of people and being crazy. And that's what it takes. It takes a crazy man to get up there and have fun in front of total strangers."

He spent several years helping other mobile DJs set up

their shows and says he was the creative mind behind the original Fastrax concept.

Vanderpool estimates he has put \$30,000 into his system. And he invests a large part of himself to make sure his audiences have fun.

"At Halloween I'll wear some of the most outlandish costumes. Because it's going to make everybody who's in costumes feel at home. They're going to say...if he looks that stupid I don't look stupid at all."

As usual, his goal behind it all is to get everybody dancing, to get the hesitant dancers to forget about anybody

looking at them and "get out there and move to the music."

Vanderpool has music dating back to 1901 and can play everything from Benny Goodwin to Glenn Miller all the way up to Madonna, Clarence D'Arby and The Jets.

He catalogs his music by date, position on the charts, and type. For a class reunion he can easily pull music from the high school era the class was in. He still takes his complete selection to the reunion, though, because he finds playing only music from the high school days makes reunion members "feel old" and they enjoy having more current hits.

A DJ can make or break a dance by how he reacts to the input he receives from the audience. If one particular type of music doesn't seem to appeal to the crowd he'll keep playing until he finds the niche, says Vanderpool. Although the majority of the crowd might like a certain

## 'thirtysomething' bluntly explores living from grown-up perspective

HOLLYWOOD — During an interview on a quiet afternoon in his Los Angeles office, psychiatrist Mark S. Gouleton discussed the problems of a group of friends in their 30s, struggling to cope with life in the '80s.

Elliot and Nancy's marriage is breaking apart because of its festering core of anger. "I wouldn't be surprised if their parents were abusive," Gouleton offered. New parents Michael and Hope are earnest, well-meaning but neurotic. "Those are usually people who have been neglected; it didn't surprise me that Michael's father was neglectful and driven," he noted. And free-wheeling Gary and Melissa, both single, are so afraid of intimacy that they refuse to have close relationships at all.

Gouleton suddenly paused and laughed. "Now, don't make it sound like I'm in a psychotic delusion and I think that these are real people," he pleaded.

For the record, Gouleton, an assistant clinical professor of psychology at the University of California, Los Angeles with a private psychiatry practice, does not suffer from psychotic delusions. And Elliot and Nancy, Michael and Hope, Gary and Melissa

are not real people — they are the main characters on "thirtysomething," ABC's naturalistic drama that explores the everyday problems of grown-up baby boomers with blunt honesty and almost excruciating detail.

Elliot, Nancy, Michael, Hope, Melissa and Gary, as well as Ellyn, the other member of the "thirtysomething" group, are the subject of a lot of talk these days. Gouleton and many other therapists and educators are making

"thirtysomething" a part of their practice.

Some therapists, especially those working with people in their 30s, are discovering that having their clients watch and discuss the interactions of these TV characters can help them better understand their own relationships with their families and the opposite sex.

"I have people coming in (who comment about 'thirtysomething') all the time," said Los Angeles psychologist

# 'D.O.A.' dazzles with images but lacks essence

In "D.O.A.," the new thriller starring Dennis Quaid and Meg Ryan, the screen is alive with dancing, slushing, crackling images. Watching it, you immediately feel plunged into a dizzying atmosphere that's part film noir, part amusement park; it's as if your theater seat had suddenly transformed itself into a Tilt-A-Whirl and you are spinning round and round inside the compositions.

Admittedly, what we have here is filmmaking as dazzle-making—flamboyant style—as content. But in "D.O.A.," style is more than content's essence.

For the first several minutes you may think that directors Rocky Morton and Anneli Jenkel, the British filmmaking team whose first film gave Max Headroom to the world, are geniuses-in-the-making. They approach the screen here as the abstract expressionists approached their canvases, splashing light and shadow in bold strokes, layering in globs and drips of pinwheeling color, and the effect is that of an ever-shifting kaleido-

scope of fractured imagery. But as the film progresses — and the downside of their hyperbolic visual style begins to show — the geniuses begin to look merely like brilliant technicians, wunderkinder-garblers playing with their cinematic toys.

"D.O.A." is a remake of a 1949 thriller by Rudolph Mate, the brilliant cinematographer turned journeyman director. Though it has acquired a certain reputation, the original was not by any means great. But it did have two things: a kind of B-movie purity and one of the greatest hooks in movie history.

The update has retained the latter and little else. The premise is beautifully simple: A man — in this version a university professor and blocked novelist named Dexter Cornell (Quaid) — is slipped a dose of slow-acting poison and, with only a day or so to live, sets out to find his own murderer.

Here's something grimly irresistible about the story of a walking dead man, and the directors have done a compelling job of putting us inside the doomed consciousness of the protagon-

ist. But, as presented here, the situation is also borderline funny.

The humor springs from the film's milieu, which is a highly competitive English department at a Texas university. Unlike the previous version, this "D.O.A." is on one level a thriller about academic jealousy and infighting — the killer's motive here isn't loot, it's tenure. And in this atmosphere, the old saying "publish or perish" takes on a sinister new meaning.

The script is witty in a glibly literate way, and laden with both pop-and-high-culture references. There's a lot of playful inventiveness on display here. But the cleverness is mixed in with bloat and pomposity. It plays smart without actually being smart. Or smart enough.

It's the clumsy plotting, though, that weights the film down and finally drags it under. The story lines in film noir are often hopelessly tangled and convoluted — look at "The Big Sleep" — but this one is padded out with dead ends and false leads. A lot of screen time is devoted to a subplot featuring Charlotte Rampling, and as

red herrings go she's pretty delectable, but she's a red herring nonetheless. All she contributes to the affair is a shot of mannequin swank.

Dennis Quaid contributes something more — a star's genuine self-confidence in his own watchability. This is something quite different from real acting; something that turns on the axis of sex appeal and personal magnetism. In a sense, Quaid is miscast in the role of a burnt-out case. He's still too vital, too full of cocky life, to pass for a man who's given up. And yet because this is primarily a star turn, with Dennis Quaid playing Dexter Cornell, movie star, he doesn't really seem wrong for the character. And, with his hair slicked back to emphasize his matinee idol's hairline, he's like a '40s star recast in modern noir terms and enormous fun to watch.

As Sydney, the beguiling freshman who is accidentally pulled into Dex's nightmare, Meg Ryan is a distillation of teen-age gooniness. She's smart, but not so you'd notice. Ryan, who also appeared with Quaid in "Innerspace," does wonderfully dippy,

things with her lines. They either tail off in funny directions or evaporate in a pixilated vapor. And her squished-up, not-quite-beautiful face is wonderful for comedy. She's what you'd imagine Carole Lombard would've been like had she been a Valley Girl.

Ron Furst, who has recommended that some of his clients watch the show on a regular basis. "The show is a new, almost meticulous exploration of day-to-day life. It's the petty stuff that therapists end up dealing with all the time."

At least 25 psychotherapists, teachers, members of the clergy, social workers and university professors have asked ABC to provide videotapes of certain episodes of the first-year drama series to use as a grist for discussion with clients, students and counseling groups. (The network has provided tapes on a case-by-case basis.)

About the same number have written to the producers praising the show for its realistic depiction of human relationships — not only individual therapists but also mental health organizations, including the University of Texas psychology department, the American Association for Counseling and Development, the Huntington Counseling Center of Balboa, Calif., and Hospice of the Valley, a Phoenix hospice for the terminally ill.

For some of his clients, Goulston recommends certain "upcoming" episodes based on their subjects. "I write to the producers pointing out his own tapes of particularly poignant episodes. He said that while "thirtysomething" may not explore different problems than other family dramas, it is unusual because the characters talk in detail about what they are feeling and thinking. "It's the only TV show I have used," he said.

Therapists interviewed for this story praised "thirtysomething" for not offering easy solutions to life's problems. Episodes these therapists have asked their clients to watch for discussion in their therapy sessions include one entitled "Couples," which recounts an argument from the point of view of each participant; shows exploring Michael's reaction to discovering that his father is terminally ill and his attempt to return to normalcy after his father dies; and one in which Michael and Hope, who are Jewish and Christian, respectively, try to figure out what to do during the holidays.

The Rev. Charlie Hedges, 38, a pastor at South Coast Community Church in Irvine, Calif., recently used a videotape of the "Couples" episode at a weekend retreat for singles in their mid-20s through early 40s. He wanted to encourage them to see other people's point of view, in hopes of improving their own relationships with the opposite sex.

"When they see the videos, the principles come to life," he said. "I would like to have a tape of every one of those shows for our library."

"The show was built for this baby-boom generation," Hedges continued. "It's an introspective generation. Now we're evaluating ourselves with the same rigor with which we used to evaluate our culture."

Psychology columnist Joyce Brothers noted that although using drama and literature in therapy is not a new idea, the fact that "thirtysomething" examines day-to-day problems as soap operas do, makes it particularly apt for use in therapy.

"It seems easier for people who are unable to delve into their own problems to talk about the soap opera characters to open a door to their own problems," she said.

"Thirtysomething" is in that mode. It would really be difficult for someone to identify with Mike Hammer, for instance, but it is easy for someone to identify with a family that has the same problems that everyone has."

Whether the problems of "thirtysomething's" young, affluent characters are representative of those of the majority of the population is debatable. Some critics have blasted the

program for dwelling on the narrow concerns of a privileged group. One critic dismissed it as "a weekly diet of yuppie whining, nagging and complaining."

Therapists interviewed for this story concede that the show's subject matter may be more relevant to the young and affluent than the rest of the world. "This is not a show you would recommend to one of the homeless," Goulston said. "Being introspective is a luxury."

Still, most of them believed that the basic relationships explored in the show make it worthwhile viewing for clients of all socioeconomic groups.

Unless the narcissism of megalomaniacs — it's a soap opera about life, regardless of your cultural background," Furst said.

Goulston said that even those who claim to hate the show are offering him insights into their character when they explain why.

"When you're in your 30s, you get competitive with the show," he said. "There is a real need to discount the characters, to get away from the real feelings it triggers. When they (clients) say 'So-and-so is too analytic, they're really preening too much.'"

Goulston said that the nature of "thirtysomething" imposes a special responsibility on its writers. "What I would caution them about is the same thing I would caution a therapist about," he said. "There is something very seductive about it; you have to be very careful not to toy with people."

Producers Marshall Herskovitz and Edward Zwick, who have extensive personal experience with therapy, both their own and that of family and friends, say they are gratified by all the attention the show is getting

among psychologists but have mixed feelings about becoming therapy gurus.

"I have a problem with the idea of people giving a television show any weight whatsoever," Zwick said. "Part of that is a responsibility I feel a little bit uncomfortable with. This is drama; this is entertainment — we're not

presuming to answer the deepest and most abiding questions of people's lives.

"One of the reasons people may be glomming onto the show is absence of community, the lack of real discussion of problems. The show could occasionally be a substitute for that, and I find that a little bit scary."

type of music; he makes sure to throw in a few "curve balls" so everybody's musical tastes are covered.

"We throw in a little bit of the Beach Boys, a little bit of Elvis here and there. Some people say it's stupid to do so — we even throw in a little bit of country here and there. That's covering the people that won't come up and request country because they think they are going to be heckled by everybody," says Vanderpool.

"You work the crowd like the sea. They're flowing in and out, different age groups...different types of people have different tastes...you watch the tide roll out and the new wave roll in."

Just as music tastes differ, so do the types of dancers. There's bug stompers — people out there who look like they're stomping cockroaches. The airplane people — people with their arms out like airplanes. The strutters — people who really get into the music and are strutting around. And cowboys who alternate stepping left then right — and don't necessarily wear cowboy boots.

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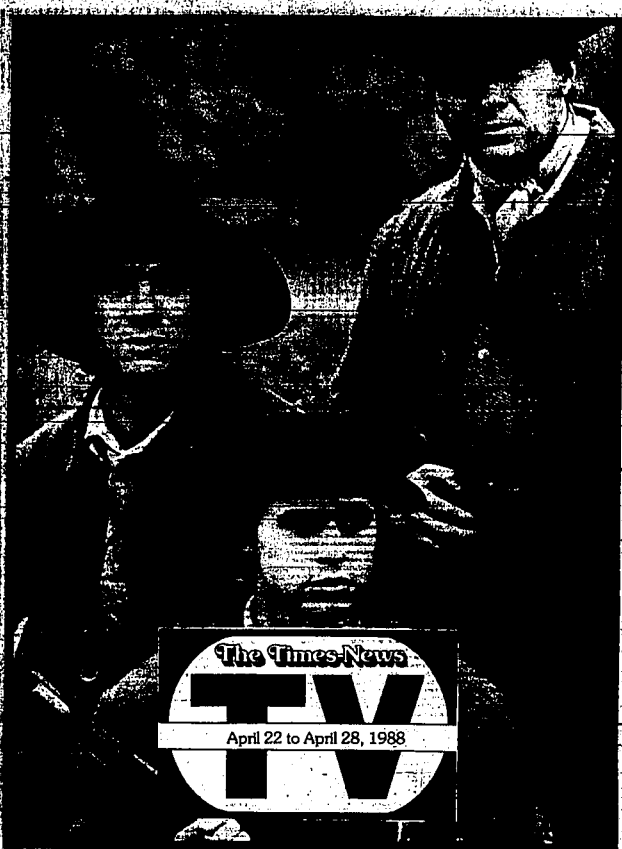

# 'Shot heard around the world' is brought back with 'April Morning'

CBS's "April Morning," which airs on Sunday, April 24, tries to bring our revolutionary roots back to life.

While there have been many fateful mornings in the course of American history, the title of this "Hallmark Hall of Fame" production (based on the Howard Fast book of the same name) refers specifically to April 19, 1775 — and the firing of the "shot heard 'round the world."

"April Morning" is not so much about war as it is about coming of age. Chad Lowe (you know his older brother, Rob) is Adam Cooper, a 16-year-old who discovers manhood on the battlefield of Lexington.

Tommy Lee Jones, whose intensity makes his one of the most laudable performances in "April Morning," plays Moses Cooper, the boy's father. With Moses' death at Lexington, neighbor Joseph Simmons (Robert Ulrich) jumps in as surrogate father. He guides Adam through the war experience, while having to say lines like, "Don't fire until you smell the King's breath," and "You want to sleep a boy, but woke up a man."

Veteran character actor Rip Torn makes a special appearance as Solomon Chandler. An irascible loner, Chandler is initially criticized by the colonists, but later goes on to lead their guerrilla-like attacks on the plodding British troops. Chandler eventually redeems himself by giving up his life to save Adam.

"This is the most inspiring project I've ever worked on," says Jones, whose film credits include "Coal Miner's Daughter" and TV's "The Executioner's Song," for which he won an Emmy. Indeed, the themes of "April Morning" — patriotism, community and quiet heroism — are the same

ones echoed by the film's director, Delbert Mann ("Marty").

"The story of the genesis of the country is not a sterile thing," says Mann. "It's not a dead thing, past and gone."

"Those people at Lexington made some terrible sacrifices at dawn on that cold morning in April 1776. And every American is, today, the direct beneficiary of their sacrifice."

"April Morning" doesn't just toe the history-textbook line, however. The film contains a number of emotional subplots, including a father-son conflict between Moses and Adam. ("According to my father, there's nothing I can do right," complains the latter.)

There's also a teen-age romance between Adam and Simmons' daughter Ruth (Meredith Salenger). Ruth's parents trust her, so they allow her to roam the woods at night with Adam alone. In the world of "April Morning," sex is virtually non-existent, and Adam chastely buses Ruth a handful of times. Perhaps this keeps in line with the image of women in the CBS film; all are strong, stoic types who derive their identities from the men they have attached themselves to.

While "April Morning" has a fair amount of histrionics as well as history, the battle scenes may disappoint. "Platoon" — fed war-film buffs will be frustrated by the pop-gun sound effects and agonizingly slow battle scenes. But you can't rewrite history to satisfy high-tech sensibilities.

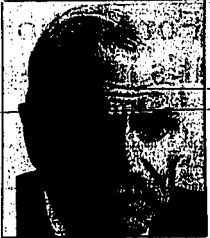

# For the bold and beautiful people it's just one bad turn after another

Bill Bell really knows how to hurt a good woman. Just when Beth Logan (Nancy Burnett), mother of four on "The Bold and the Beautiful," is reunited with her true love Eric Forrester (John McCook) after a cancer operation, producer Bell resurrects Beth's long-lost husband, Stephen (Robert Pine).

Talk about a killjoy, Bell gives the long-suffering Beth a moment of happiness, then takes it away. It's a mean trick.

A shrewd move, though, because the new soap needs a jolt. Usually, the handsome offspring of the Forrester and Logan clans whine and ficker over romance and ambition, self-absorbed to the point of audience boredom.

To stir folks up, pick on a decent woman left in the lurch by a man, forced to work and raise kids. Hit her where it hurts. Beth Logan has taken so many low blows that one more won't matter.

Nancy Burnett, who plays Beth, understands Bell's plotting. The producer is a big family man, and his new soap is about the strength of families when the going gets rough. With family support you can endure almost anything.

"In my fantasy," says Nancy, "Eric and Beth find happiness. They fell in love at college. Then Eric suddenly marries Stephanie. Beth is stunned and marries on the rebound. Finding Eric again after all these years seems a just reward."

But not dramatically. Nancy Burnett is hot this spring, a pivotal figure. She must hold her resentful children together, deal with Grandma Logan, who wants her son back, and not lose touch with the disappointed Eric.

The frazzled woman could easily take to drink. Bell wants grit and fiber from Beth, not sunshine and laughter.

Burnett sees parallels between Beth's life and her own. A local beauty, trained at Los Angeles City College rather than UCLA because of a superior theater class, Nancy married

early and scrambled for local theater roles.

It hasn't been easy. There have been droughts between jobs, pain over her choices and the realization that sometimes, if you want something too much, you may never get it.

Of course, it's Nancy's fault. She claims she wanted to be an actress at the age of two. Later, a stepfather threw ice water on her career by saying, "But, honey, you're not blonde."

Nancy Burnett knows what plugging away requires — not giving up, but not going crazy about rejection either. She can show her wounded look and square her jaw, and when she smiles the room lights up. But that isn't in the cards on "The Bold and the Beautiful."

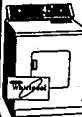

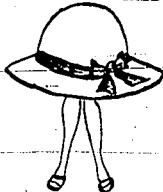

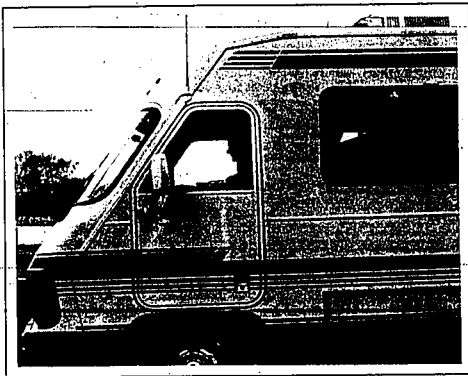

# End of TV season has networks evaluating the extent of erosion

NEW YORK — NBC won its third television season in a row Tuesday and is already looking toward another win next season when its Summer Olympics coverage could give it a jump on the competition if the writers' strike continues.

If the 6-week-old strike isn't settled soon, ABC and CBS might not have new shows ready for air in September and could be forced to continue summer reruns — and that could speed a continuing defection of viewers to cable and other alternatives.

NBC, meanwhile, will start the season with the historically high-rated Olympics, and NBC's Vice President for Research Projects Gerald Jaffe said Tuesday that advertising interest in the Olympics is "picking up."

NBC topped off the season by winning the final week, though the 60th Annual Academy Awards on ABC was the No. 1 show of the week, according to the A.C. Nielsen Co. figures.

NBC ended the season with an average, prime-time rating of 16.0. ABC, which had been third for three years running, eked out second with a 13.7, thanks to the World Series, Super Bowl and Winter Olympic. CBS was third for the first time ever, with 13.5. The rating is a percentage of the nation's 88.6 million households with televisions.

NBC had never won a season before 1985-86. This was NBC's biggest win yet, and the biggest margin of victory for any network since CBS won in 1963-64.

But Nielsen ratings showed the three-network average down 9 percent from last year. That figure was disputed by Jaffe, who said his own comparison of more extensive local-market surveys showed a network decline of only 3 percent.

He attributed the discrepancy to inaccuracies in Nielsen's new people meter audience measurement system.

Last week, CBS released preliminary figures from a competing ratings company, AGB, that showed CBS coming in slightly ahead of ABC. Nielsen is still the ratings company used by advertisers to negotiate advertising rates, though. CBS has esti-

mated that the lower people meter figures will cost the networks a combined \$50 million in advertising revenues.

The three networks have hired a consulting firm to scrutinize the new ratings system, said Bill Rubens, NBC vice president for research. The results are expected sometime this summer.

Whether 9 percent or 3 percent, though, the networks are losing viewers to cable, independent stations and VCRs.

Jaffe said the decline is reversible if networks can put on enough popular shows like "The Cosby Show," which increased total network viewing on Thursday night.

"The 3 percent is not immutable," Jaffe said. "There is no law of nature that says the networks will decline 3 percent every year, ad infinitum."

"The Cosby Show" was the No. 1-rated show for the third year in a row, followed by its spinoff, "A Different World," ABC's "Cheers" and "Golden Girls," ABC's "Growing Pains," "Who's the Boss?" NBC's "Night Court," CBS' "60 Minutes" and

"Murder, She Wrote," and ABC's new show, "The Wonder Years."

Of the two new shows that made the top 10, both were significantly helped by their popular lead-ins, "A Different World" by "Cosby" and "Wonder Years" by "Who's the Boss?" The only other new shows to make even the top 30 were NBC's "My Two Dads" at 21st, "The Days and Nights of Molly Dodd" at 28th, and "Aaron's Way" at 30th. The latter two premiered late in the season.

Despite the lackluster performance by the new shows, Jaffe predicted a third of them will be renewed, following the pattern of previous years.

The networks have parted company with big-event, multipart miniseries. Of 12 miniseries last year, all but two were two-parters. The top-rated "Elvis and Me" on ABC had rating of 24.5.

New ratings are measured quarterly, not by season, but beginning with the traditional television season in September when Nielsen converted to the people meters, "NBC Nightly News" dropped into a third-place slump.

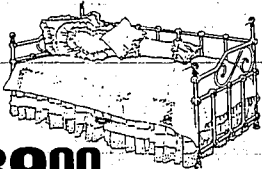

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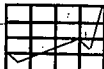
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
