## SIS fight fades

### Compromise in House bill OK's design

WASHINGTON — House adoption of a compromise on financing for the billion-dollar Special Isotope Separation plant proposed for eastern Idaho has averted a heated congressional fight that backers said could have had a serious impact on the project's future.

"We won a short-term battle," Idaho Democratic Congressman Richard Stallings said. "We are all right through 1989, but there are a couple of things that are really going to make a difference for the SIS down the line."

The compromise, endorsed by the House Thursday as part of its version of the 1988 defense authorization bill, allows the Department of Energy to spend \$26 million for planning and design of the plant, planned for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

But it bars any expenditures on actual construction, including site preparation until at least March 1. By that time, the Energy Department is expected to submit to Congress various reports on the safety and alternatives to the laser-driven, weapons-grade plutonium reprocessing plant.

The compromise, sponsored by House Armed Services Committee Chairman Les Aspin, D-Wis., headed off a fight over Texas Democrat Albert Bustamante's proposal — to bar any spending on the project until the administration can justify it on a number of grounds.

Stallings had said he would vigorously fight that move, and both sides maintained they had the votes to prevail. House leaders stepped in, however, to avoid the confrontation.

"The bottom line is that, in a very difficult environment, ... the SIS walked away alive and well on schedule," Aspin said.

The Senate is also considering provisions similar to those in the House in its version of the bill. Any differences between the two bills are to be worked out by negotiators later.

Since no construction work was scheduled before March 1 at the INEL, Stallings said the prohibition in the compromise would not have any real effect on the project that would cost about \$1 billion to construct and another \$2 billion to operate during its seven- to eight-year mission. Up to 400 people would be employed on construction and 750 during operation.

The project's future, however, will rest with the next national administration and its positions on issues like arms control, Stallings said.

Anti critics of the project maintained the prohibition against construction was a significant victory in their bid to stop the SIS, claiming a change from past year when financial support for the project was actually increased.

## Bush is leaving nothing to chance

TWIN FALLS — Vice President George Bush arrived in Twin Falls with enough national delegates in hand to win the Republican presidential nomination.

So why visit the strongly Republican Magic Valley, an expected gimme in his national campaign? Because Bush is leaving nothing to chance.

Bush will cultivate agricultural experience as he hears about commodities competition abroad and the domestic Western issue of federal land management.

But his appearances are set against a backdrop of uncertain support in the traditionally strong Republican region, according to a Democratic poll of the 2nd Congressional District.

Three agricultural events scheduled during his Twin Falls visit offer the opportunity to size up Bush on agricultural issues after the fall of his primary competitor, Sen. Bob Dole of Kansas.

Scheduled are a private discussion with about 18 farming representatives at the Coiner family farm, a visit to an experimental agricultural field

- 8:50 a.m. — Bush travels to a nearby University of Idaho agricultural experimentation field.

- 9:35 a.m. — Bush speaks at CSI.
- 11:05 a.m. — Bush departs for Billings, Mont., aboard Air Force II. Spectators hoping to catch a glimpse of the vice president at the Twin Falls-Sun Valley Regional Airport will be allowed outside the runway fence.

and a public address on farming at the College of Southern Idaho.

Farmers and ranchers from across Magic Valley expect no parting of the wedge during Bush's respite. But they welcome the visit as an opportunity to personally describe Idaho's concerns to the Republican's presidential heir apparent.

"I don't really expect anything is going to change overnight," said Tim Coiner, who will be driving Bush around the family farm. "But if he has the intention of helping, it would be

nice for him to kind of lighten the farming imports, to compete at a fair level."

"I want him to know how important the beet industry is in southern Idaho," said Rupert farmer George Grant, who is president of the Idaho Sugar Beet Growers.

Grant is also among the group scheduled to meet Bush personally at the Coiners. He said he'd like to express his fears about foreign governments subsidizing their crops and creating increased competition abroad.

especially from the European Economic Community, which is now a sugar exporter instead of the importer of several years ago.

"We think we can compete against anybody, given a level playing field," said Grant, who farms 800 acres with his two sons.

While unsuccessful in his presidential bid, Dole's support for the sugar beet program was clear. Bush doesn't have the Kansas senator's voting record.

"I think we felt a little more comfortable with Dole because of his being a supporter of the sugar beet industry and, of course, he was in the Senate, whereas Bush doesn't really have that experience or that record," Grant said.

"Hopefully he will be a little bit stronger on trade issues."

Tom Prescott, a Jerome rancher, also expects to meet with Bush. He'd like to discuss multiple uses of federal land, a uniquely western issue.

"When they're back in Washington,

even good guys get Potomac Fever," Prescott said. "Hopefully we can tell him about some of the problems and successes in the livestock business."

The chairman of the governing board of the U.S. Bureau of Land Management's Shoshone District grazes about 1,000 head of cattle for beef production. He said he'd like to talk about mingling grazing with environmental concerns such as soil and water protection.

"Sometimes — we're perceived — as butting heads a little bit, but it's just been 'misunderstanding,'" said Prescott, who grazes 1,000 head for beef production.

He said Bush may know about ranching from his background in Texas, but that federal land use may be a new concept.

"We're looking forward to it (the meeting) to familiarize him with the problems we've had and the successes we've had," Prescott said.

In general, Republican officials call Bush's visit a rallying cry for party faithful, a time to consolidate their forces.

"Obviously a visit to Idaho means nothing (politically) anywhere else,"

## His hands do the talking to an enthusiastic airport crowd

TWIN FALLS — George Bush let his hands do the talking for him as he greeted a throng of enthusiastic onlookers at the Twin Falls airport Thursday night.

The vice president grabbed his loose-collared neckties — pointing to the cluster of ties hanging from surrounding officials' necks, repeatedly thrust his thumbs toward the overcast sky, shook hands while going

through a short line of welcoming officials and then pressed the flesh with numerous children through a chain-link fence.

"I touched his coat," said 13-year-old Tammy Dalton of Twin Falls. "I thought it was really neat."

More than a hundred people came out to the airport to greet Bush. Children sat on parents' shoulders or stood on posts to get a look through the barbed wire laced on top of the separating fence.

Other Twin Falls residents lined

Washington Street South, the road taken by the vice president's motorcade from the airport into the city.

"You're all dressed up," joshed the casually dressed Bush from atop the airplane ramp, "C'mon."

"I think he has an edge of importance that makes us feel honored in Twin Falls to have him here," said Mark Stubbs, the first person who greeted Bush after he departed Air Force Two.

Bush, who has sewn up the Republican nomination for president, was

accompanied off the plane by U.S. Senators James McClure and Steve Symms, the latter sporting a cowboy hat, and State Sen. Jim Risch, R-Boise.

Bush had only one word for the contingent of press officials packed onto an elevated platform: "Votes."

"That was the vice president's answer to a question asked by Carol Stephens of Twin Falls radio station KTFI. In a stentorian voice booming off the press platform, Stephens asked Bush what he hoped to accomplish while in Idaho.

As the vice president walked toward the group of fenced-off onlookers, a light drizzle began to fall from the partly sunny skies.

Bush is scheduled to leave Twin Falls for Billings, Mont., at 11:05 a.m. today.

Stubbs said Bush made small talk with the assembled group of welcoming officials. "He's very amiable, a very warm person," Stubbs said. Stubbs, who is Twin Falls County

## Amnesty program a success, INS commissioner declares

WASHINGTON — The amnesty program that pulled in more than 1.6 million aliens seeking to live legally in the United States won't be extended and "has proceeded very successfully" despite not hitting the 2 million mark the nation's top immigration official said Thursday.

"We'll take our 85-percent, batting average on that as quite good," Immigration and Natu-

ralization Service Commissioner Alan Nelson told a news conference. He said INS officials had been making a "rough estimate" a year ago when they predicted the program would attract 2 million undocumented residents.

He said the one-year amnesty application period which ended at midnight Wednesday would not be prolonged even in the face of two court rulings. He said the courts "have both been extremely narrow in their holdings."

A federal appeals court in Manhattan ex-

tended the midnight deadline for aliens with children born in the United States who are receiving welfare benefits. A federal judge in Washington extended the midnight deadline for a broader group — those aliens who overstayed their visas.

Hispanic groups say some 100,000 aliens could be eligible under that ruling, but Nelson questioned the figure.

"The numbers we believe are very small and there's also a lot of question as to what the

ulings are," the INS commissioner said. "No one should read these court decisions as any indication that they're going to be extensions here, other than there might be, some very narrow ones," Nelson added.

But Charles Kamasaki, director of policy analysis for the National Council of La Raza, a Hispanic advocacy group, said it was possible there could be "a crazy quilt pattern of judicial extensions" for the amnesty program, which

Congress refused to extend last week.

Kamasaki pointed to class-action cases in federal courts in California, one involving people who were out of the country for extended periods after 1982 and the other for people who left the United States briefly after the amnesty program began and returned.

In addition, he said, there have been 15 changes in the INS regulations since the amnesty program went in effect last May.

# Crews search for missing worker in wake of Nevada blast

HENDERSON, Nev. (AP) — President Reagan was asked for federal disaster aid Thursday for this city rocked by an exploding space shuttle rocket fuel plant while crews searched for a worker missing since the blasts dug a 400-foot-wide crater.

Concessions from the blasts shattered windows 10 miles away in Las Vegas, jolted airplanes in flight, peeled off roofs, upended cars and threw workers through walls. Broken windows and cracked foundations were common in Henderson.

The fire and explosions were caused by an equipment malfunction, said Pacific President Fred Gibson Jr. U.S. Sen. Harry Reid, D-Nev., toured the site after taking Reagan in a letter to declare Henderson a federal emergency disaster area.

The tattered body of Bruce Bernard Halper, 56, vice president of operations at Pacific Engineering, was identified Thursday morning.

## Democratic survey shows Bush with slim lead in Gem 2nd District

WASHINGTON — Idaho's conservative Second Congressional District would appear to be friendly territory for Vice President George Bush,

Reagan creamed Democratic opponent Walter Mondale nearly 4-to-1 in the Magic Valley in the 1984 election. Idaho was second only to Utah in Reagan support that year.

A present McClure ad issued the call still heard today, as it characterized his campaign as the "Most Important Balancing Act of All Time."

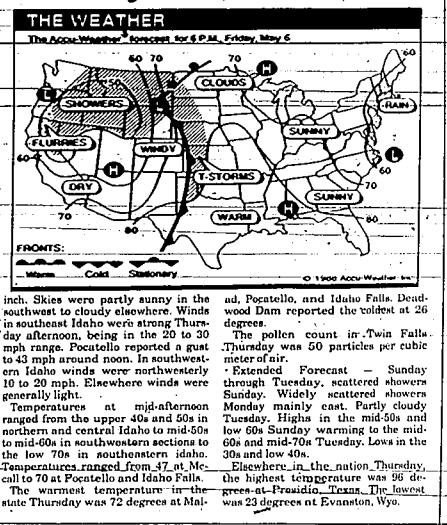
But a recent Democratic poll suggests otherwise. Bush leads Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis, the likely Democratic nominee, 44 percent to 42 percent, a virtual dead heat, according to Rep. Richard Stallings, the two-term Democrat who represents the district.

Cooper & Secrest Associates Inc., of Alexandria, Va., conducted the poll for Stallings between April 18 and 20, according to the Roxburg Democrat's top aide, Gary Catron.

Reagan received 74 percent of the vote in Idaho through the 1984 presidential election. In an interview, Alan Secrest, the firm's president, said his polling shows that even conservative Republicans are "less than enthusiastic" about Bush, who has garnered more than enough delegates to win the nomination.

The Los Angeles Times has been publishing a popular astrology column, by the acknowledged dean of American astrology writers, Carroll Righter, who died Sunday at 88. The column has been nestled appropriately with the funny papers, where it has dispensed gentle and usually useful advice: "Be more aware of the needs of your mate, and improve the situation at home considerably. Budget your money more carefully tonight."

Astrology can, though, be a bit of a problem when taken too seriously. A perfectly healthy 7-year-old we once knew refused to go to school for two days because the astrology column told him to stay close to home.

So now there is an uproar when it is disclosed that the astrologer's divining arts are not unknown in the White House. Nothing serious, you understand, no questions of policy are governed by them, just matters of scheduling, and perhaps the timing of the signing of a treaty.

Not to worry—larger illusions have been let loose in the land than the signs of the zodiac.

My own theory about the "trickle down" drug theory goes like this: The administration in the so-called national interest of supporting Nicaragua's "freedom fighters" trades guns for cocaine, unloads the sporadic snow in Florida and Texas to buy more guns, then tests us to see how far the drug has spread.

Our "trickles" into urine bottles will reveal just where the cocaine has trickled down into the general population.

Far-fetched, you say? Lies, you say? Yes, my theory is factitious; sadly however, evidence is mounting that a few officials in this administration were not only aware that some of our covert operators had sponsored a guns-for-drugs network to help supply weapons to the Contras, but that these same officials are now attempting to cover up this large scale drug trafficking.

This suspicion, if eventually proven, injects an ironic interpretation into Reagan's "War on Drugs" slogan.

ABC World News Tonight with Peter Jennings on April 7 aired a piece of investigative journalism which indicates that a guns-drugs connection existed in the network to supply arms to the Contras, prior to the Ollie North operation.

According to the ABC report, "For three years, from 1985 to 1988 the Contras fought the Marxist government of Nicaragua with weapons made in the communist bloc, bought by Israeli agents with American financial support and delivered by a U.S.-Israeli air lift which wound up, incredibly enough, delivering illegal drugs to the United States."

Later in the report, ABC's chief correspondent Richard Threlkeld asks rhetorically, "And what was the American connection in all of this?" then answers, "Our sources tell us it included the late William Casey's CIA and ... Felix Rodriguez, a former CIA agent and

counter insurgency expert, active in aiding the Contras. Although Rodriguez denies it, Jose Blandon, Noriega's former intelligence aide, confirms there was such a network and says Rodriguez was in fact a key figure."

Evidence shows that a Columbian drug cartel with its own airplanes and supply network in place was contracted for a covert operation to run guns to the Contras. Presumably, the drug cartel's payoff was free passage of drugs into the United States. It is equally possible that some of the money from drug sales was used to buy more weapons for the Contras.

On April 8, The New York Times carried a story about testimony given the day before by

three Nicaraguan rebels to the Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee on terrorism, narcotics, and international operations chaired by John Kerry, D-Mass. The testimony, although conflicting, agreed on one central point: A Contra faction took contributions from convicted drug dealer, George Morales, in exchange for refueling his planes that were carrying drugs to the United States. More importantly, to quote the Times story, "Mr. Morales and a pilot who worked for him told the committee that they had exchanged cocaine from the Contras for guns with CIA knowledge."

In May 1988, six months before the public knew anything about the Iran-Contra affair, the Christie Institute filed a civil lawsuit against a number of private individuals behind these covert Contra operations. Listed among the defendants in this lawsuit are retired Major Gen. Richard Seard, retired Major Gen. John Singlaub, former CIA officials Thomas Clines and Theodore Shackley, Ira-

nian entrepreneur Albert Hakim, and Contra chief Adolfo Calero. While those who watched the Iran-Contra hearings are familiar with the names of these defendants, most are not familiar with the institute which filed the suit.

The Christie Institute is an interfaith center for law and public policy, located in Washington, D.C. The institute is a non-profit organization, supported by foundations, mainstream churches and private donations. The Christie Institute grew out of the legal work involved in the Karen Silkwood case, the case which alerted the public to the dangers of the nuclear industry.

Since Silkwood, the institute has won civil suits against the Ku Klux Klan and the American Nazi Party. On behalf of citizens of Harrisburg, Pa., it prevented the dumping of radioactive wastes into the Susquehanna River from the Three Mile Island nuclear reactor. And it won a dismissal of murder charges in a frame up against the first black mayor of Tchula,

Miss., since the Civil War. This brief summary should establish the center's credentials: The attorneys and investigators who work for the Christie Institute are neither left-wing nor right-wing crazies.

In January of last year, the chief judge of Miami's U.S. District Court, Judge James Lawrence King, agreed to hear the Christie Institute's lawsuit under RICO, the federal racketeering statute. The case is scheduled to go to trial on June 27.

In filing evidence for a lawsuit, the institute subpoenaed documents and conducted over 40 depositions. On March 29, the institute submitted a 500-page Declaration of Plaintiffs Counsel in support of a motion to postpone the trial date in order to investigate certain illegal activities further. The declaration contains powerful interlocking evidence indicating a connection between U.S. government officials or former officials and drug trafficking. This evidence is not only taken from depositions but from congressional testimony, affidavits, news stories, memos, and congressional reports.

True, until the trial we won't hear the other side of the story. Yet, from diverse sources and different investigators, we're gleaming a pattern. It isn't pretty; it's devastating. While the president smiled into TV cameras and told us how we are winning the war against drugs, some covert operative somewhere in Central America was fueling an old DC-6C loaded with 1,000 kilos of cocaine, headed eventually for the streets of New York City and Los Angeles. Americans are paying the price of government secrecy—the unchecked government actions that are its inevitable result.

Meanwhile, a letter from First Lady Nancy Reagan arrived yesterday to tell me that May 8 to 14 has been designated as National "Just Say No to Drugs" Week.

What do you do when the puffin behind the dealer in the street is government operative? Is it possible for a citizen to "Just Say No to the CIA"? Not even Congress has been able to do that.

# Explosion at Shell Oil refinery kills one

NORCO, La. (AP) — A spectacular explosion and fire that ripped off roofs and doors rocked a Shell Oil Co. refinery Thursday, killing one worker, injuring 42 people and leaving six people missing, authorities said.

"It went boom, and then boom again," said Adam Mashia, 65, who lives less than a mile from the plant. "It knocked me to the floor and as I was getting up, it knocked me down again."

About 2,500 residents of nearby homes were evacuated while the fire raged out of control for 5½ hours, but most were allowed to return at mid-morning. The fire was under control but still burning at mid-afternoon, and Shell officials said they planned to let it burn itself out.

Rescue workers would have to wait for the fire to go out and the rubble to cool to enter the refinery, said Fred Foster, manager of the Norco-Shell complex. He said there was no speculation on the cause.

The force-of-the-blast-left-wide spread damage throughout town, and heavy black smoke hung in the sky. Virtually all windows were shattered, doors were blown out of their frames and roofs lifted out of place.

"I've never seen so much damage in Norco, even when hurricanes have hit," said Ikey Lucas, director of the

St. Charles Emergency Operations. The shockwave from the 3:30 a.m. blast shattered plate-glass windows as far away as New Orleans, 20 miles down the Mississippi River. People 45 miles away said they felt the blast.

Alan Migliore, who lives about three blocks from the refinery complex, said: "I was sleeping in the kitchen and it knocked me to the floor. From there, I looked up and could see that the whole area to the Shell was on fire. ... It blew both of the front doors in, and the denbolts took the frames out."

Damage at the refinery complex alone was expected to run into the millions of dollars, according to Shell spokesman Phil Schwin. The accident ruptured the catalytic cracker, which converts crude oil to gasoline, and seriously damaged control rooms and

other facilities. It also damaged the water system, which hampered firefighting efforts, officials said.

The refinery sits amid the heavily industrialized corridor along the Mississippi River between New Orleans and Baton Rouge. Next to it is the Shell chemical plant, which had broken windows from the blast. Just inside the gates of the complex

was a sign with the familiar Shell logo, saying "Complex Safe Days 616." As the fire continued, workers took the sign down.

Wendy Jacobs, a Shell spokeswoman, said 92 of the plant's 1,600 employees were on duty when the explosion occurred.

The dead man was identified as a Shell employee, but his name was not made public.

## City's worst fire kills 1, hurts 40

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A helicopter plucked office workers from the roof of the West's tallest building as fire gutted four floors of the 62-story First Interstate Bank Tower and left one person dead and 40 injured early Thursday.

A sprinkler system was being installed in the 655-foot skyscraper but was not quite complete. "It looked like Dante's Inferno," fire Capt. Steve Varney said. "Everything that was burnable, burned down. It was just metal and that was red hot."

A small but undetermined number of people were working in the office tower when the blaze broke out about 10:30 p.m. Wednesday. During the workday the building is occupied by 3,500 people.

"It could have been a 'Towering Inferno.' It could have been worse," said City Councillman John Ferraro. The 1974 movie 'The Towering Inferno' depicted a Los Angeles office building fire.

Some workers fled down stairs in thick smoke. Others fled to the roof as the fire roiled around the 12th through 15th floors and rained glass and flaming debris on downtown streets.

Four helicopters with searchlights swooped around the rooftop, and one helicopter lifted 10 people to safety, officers said.

"We came out and we couldn't

see anything but smoke," said Radmila Radich, a cleaning woman who escaped.

Firefighters wearing air tanks had to lug hoses down stairs from the roof and up from the ground to attack the flames. Some air tanks ran out, and firefighters had to do without them, said Fire Chief Donald Manning.

"They had 2,000-degree temperatures they were fighting," Manning said of the 300 firefighters. "The individuals in there were committed so far in on the fire that they would run out of air, they could not back out. They had to stay there and fight that fire or they knew, as they told me, they were gonna die."

No damage estimate was immediately available. The cause of the blaze was under investigation, said fire Cmdr. Donald Anthony.

If a sprinkler system had been operating, "it would probably would have contained the fire to a very small area," Anthony said.

A preliminary inspection indicated the structural framework remained sound, said Frank Kroker, an official of the Department of Building and Safety.

A cleaning supervisor, Zora Imamovic, said that while she and five others made their way from the 58th floor to the roof to be flown to safety.

## Covert dumping in lake suspected

NEW YORK (AP) — Measurements of historical levels of radioactive carbon in California's remote Mono Lake suggest that nuclear waste may have been secretly dumped there in the 1950s and perhaps again in the 1970s, researchers said Thursday.

"We think radiocarbon had to be added to that lake in large quantities," said Wallace Broecker of Columbia University's Lamont-Doherty Geological Observatory in Palisades, N.Y. The researchers used various techniques to rule out other possible sources of radioactive carbon, such as atmospheric testing of atomic bombs.

"Increases found in other nearby lakes and in the ocean can be attributed to the bomb testing, but Mono Lake's increase is far too great for that," Broecker said in a telephone interview.

Mono Lake is one of the nation's most important bird sanctuaries and a scenic wonder that attracts hundreds of thousands of visitors each year, said Martha Davis, executive director of the Mono Lake Committee in Los Angeles, an environmental organization formed to protect the lake.

Millions of birds either make their homes there or use the lake as a way station during long migrations, Davis

said. It is dotted with strange columns of tufa, a limestone rock built up from calcium deposited by the lake.

The principal threat to the lake is the diversion of water upstream to supply the water needs of Los Angeles. The radioactive dumping that Broecker and his colleagues think is likely to have taken place poses no threat to humans or wildlife at the lake, Broecker said. The radiation levels are too low.

Residents of Los Angeles are drinking water from streams supplying the lake, not from the lake itself, which is extremely salty.

The lake's levels of the radioactive form of carbon known as carbon-14 have increased by 60 percent since the mid-1950s, Broecker said — about four times more than would have been expected from fallout from atomic bomb tests.

The radioactive waste that Broecker thinks was dumped there could have come from radioactive samples used in medicine, from nuclear reactors or from nuclear weapons research, Broecker said.

"In the 1950s, people had lots of these things, and what were they doing with them?" Broecker said.

# Briefly

## Medi-Cal abortions upheld

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The conservative-dominated California Supreme Court refused Thursday to let the Legislature cut Medi-Cal payments for abortions for poor women, a stinging defeat for anti-abortion groups.

It is the 10th straight year that state courts have overturned the Legislature's budget restrictions, which would have eliminated state funding for all but a small fraction of Medi-Cal abortions.

"It means that over 80,000 poor women in California are going to continue to have the right to abortion, and that the Legislature can't restrict their reproductive choices to only childbirth and sterilization," said Martha Kegel, associate director of the American Civil Liberties Union of Northern California.

## Memorial week scrapped

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — A city commissioner has withdrawn a resolution calling for a week of official mourning for Benjamin Linder, the former Portland resident shot to death by Nicaraguan rebels.

Commissioner Mike Lindberg withdrew the resolution at Wednesday's City Council meeting, which about three dozen people, many wearing badges reading "No Honor for Treason," attended.

Lindberg later said he withdrew the resolution because he didn't want the hearing to become a forum for a debate over U.S. policy in Central America.

"I was afraid that what was supposed to be a simple memorial would end up being hurtful and damaging to the family," he said.

Linder, 27, was killed in an attack by the U.S.-backed rebels, known as Contras, on April 28, 1987, while he was working on a hydroelectric project in rural Nicaragua.

## Saliva blocks AIDS virus

CHICAGO (AP) — Preliminary studies have found that human saliva contains a factor that blocks the AIDS virus from infecting cells, indicating the body may have a natural defense against the deadly disease, researchers said Thursday.

Isolating and understanding the inhibitory element in saliva may help researchers learn how to naturally prevent transmission of the virus, said Philip Cox, head of clinical studies at the National Institute of Dental Research and senior investigator in the study.

A report on the study appears in the May issue of the Chicago-based Journal of the American Dental Association.

## Wider airline probe sought

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House panel on Thursday approved a resolution urging the Department of Transportation to broaden its probe of troubled Eastern Airlines and its parent company, Texas Air Corp.

On a voice vote, the Public Works and Transportation Committee sent the legislation to the full House, giving the carrier's labor unions another victory in their ongoing war against the company's executives.

"The managements of Texas Air and Eastern have embarked on a campaign of intimidation, threats and unfair labor practices ...," said Rep. Glenn Anderson, D-Calif., the committee's chairman. "There are valid questions about the safety of Eastern when employees and management are preoccupied with the labor dispute and may be distracted from their duties."

## New NSA head nominated

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan has nominated the admiral in charge of Navy intelligence operations to become the next director of the super-secret National Security Agency, the Pentagon said Thursday.

Assuming Senate confirmation, Rear Adm. William O. Studeman will be promoted to vice admiral and replace Army Lt. Gen. William E. Odom, who is retiring on Aug. 1.

## U.S. deplors Polish violence

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House said Thursday it deplored Poland's use of violence to squelch the latest outbreak of labor strikes and suggested the Polish government seek "a dialogue" with the Solidarity labor movement.

Taking note of reports that Polish police on Wednesday used percussion grenades against strikers to end a 10-day-old walkout at a Krakow steel mill, White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater said the administration was "watching with concern."

# Public teacher pay averaging \$28,031

WASHINGTON (AP) — Public school teachers now earn \$28,031 on average and in 10 states the typical teacher earns more than \$30,000 a year, the National Education Association said Thursday.

The average classroom teacher, with 15 years of experience, got a 5.6 percent pay raise last year that boosted her- or his salary by \$1,477

from the 1986-87 level of \$26,534. The union did not estimate how much salaries will rise this fall, but if teachers get another 5.6 percent increase, they will be earning \$29,800 on average for the 1988-89 school year.

Teacher salaries have risen sharply in the 1980s amid widespread concern about lagging standards in the class-

room and waning interest among college students in entering the profession. Recently, however, with starting salaries topping \$20,000 in some places, interest in teaching has picked up.

Secretary of Education William J. Bennett, in a critique last week on the impact of school reforms, said teacher salaries have risen 20 percent after adjusting for inflation since 1980-81.

But the NEA said that over the past decade, including the steep inflation years of the late 1970s, teacher salaries are up only 7.3 percent after inflation.

The union said there were 2,275,209 classroom teachers in the public schools this year, 25,251 more than in 1986-87.

# 2 teams climb Mt. Everest, telecast from 'top of world'

KATMANDU, Nepal (AP) — Two teams reached the summit of Mount Everest from opposite sides Thursday and broadcast stunning pictures of snow-capped peaks and the rugged, snow-covered Himalayas rising above the clouds at the top of the world.

It was the first time two parties had scaled the world's highest mountain simultaneously, and it was the first live telecast from the summit.

The 10 climbers wept and congratulated each other. Some fell to their knees after wading through waist-deep snow to the 29,028-foot peak.

They were from Japan, China and Nepal, the nations that received the live broadcast.

"This is the greatest event in the history of climbing," said Kunga Sherpa, the leader of the team that climbed from the Nepal side, as a camera recorded the breathtaking panorama.

Images were relayed by satellite from a small camera attached to the

helmet of Japanese climber Susumu Nakamura.

"We made it!" the climbers gasped, their voices rasping in the thin air. Most wore goggles and oxygen masks along with their red, blue and yellow parkas. Eyebrows were coated with ice in temperatures of about 30 degrees below zero.

They stretched bright-colored banners across the summit and scooped dry, powdery snow into small bottles. One poured whisky on the snow to honor mountaineers who have died trying to conquer Everest, including Hidetaka Mizukoshi. He died of a heart attack on a climb last month.

The teams began their assaults on Everest last month from base camps on the south face in Nepal and the north face in Tibet.

After the rendezvous, in another first, three climbers who scaled the south face descended by the north and three who ascended the north face went down via the south.

More than 200 people were involved in the project, the most ever for an Everest expedition.

It was timed to mark the 35th anniversary of the first conquering of Everest — on May 29, 1953, by Edmund Hillary of New Zealand and Tenzing Norgay, his Sherpa guide. Nearly 200 climbers have reached the summit since then.

Sir Edmund, who was knighted for his feat, could not be reached for comment Thursday. Earlier this week he said of the simultaneous assaults, "I think some of the expeditions nowadays are on the gimmicky side," but conceded that "it's one method of raising money."

"The ones I admire are those who do a tough and difficult new route and do it cleanly and with style," he said.

Hillary now is his country's ambassador to India, Nepal and Bangladesh. Tenzing, called "Tiger of the Snows" by other Sherpas, died in 1985.

# Hostages welcomed home amid speculation about deal

PARIS (AP) — Three Frenchmen freed by pro-Iranian kidnappers in Beirut came home Friday to a nation and families and friends who had awaited the day for three years.

Premier Jacques Chirac hinted that France might restore diplomatic relations with Tehran.

Diplomats Marcel Carton, 62, Marcel Fontaine, 45, and journalist Jean-Paul Kauffmann, 44, arrived at the military airport of Villacoublay outside Paris in a government jet.

Iran said its intervention brought about the release of the three. Tehran television, monitored in Cyprus, quoted Ali Reza Moayyeri, a deputy prime minister for political affairs, as saying Iran interceded "for humanitarian reasons."

French government officials denied they struck a deal for the hostages' release.

Carton, Fontaine and Kauffmann appeared shaken and shaky as they walked slowly down the airplane steps.

Kauffmann drew back uncertainly when his 13-year-old son, Alexander, approached him. Then, when he recognized him, Kauffmann's expression changed to one of delight at how much the boy had grown.

Alexander put his hands on his father's shoulders and looked him in the face silently. Their eyes filled with tears.

"As we all know, the liberation of our hostages falls into the framework of our relations with Iran," said Chirac, who greeted the men at the airport. "It's the authorities in Tehran who intervened with the captors so that they would free our countrymen."

France and Iran broke diplomatic relations July 17 after an Iranian Em-

bassy employee, Wahid Gordji, refused to submit to questioning about bombings in Paris in September 1986. Gordji was allowed to leave Paris two days after two French hostages were freed in Beirut.

"It's an incredible day," Kauffmann told reporters. "But it's also a day which remains overshadowed because we are just three."

The journalist for the weekly magazine L'Evenement de Jeudi said earlier that Michel Seurat, the 39-year-old researcher captured with him on May 22, 1985, probably died of cancer, rather than having been executed, as claimed by the kidnappers.

Carton and Fontaine were kidnapped March 22, 1985.

Kauffmann praised Seurat's courage and said Seurat encouraged his companions during his early days in captivity.

# Troops put halt to Arab trade

TAPPAH, Occupied West Bank (AP) — Israeli troops barking orders through megaphones demanded a three-day halt to all West Bank commerce Thursday and threatened to weld shut the shops of defiant Arab merchants.

Near the village of Beita, where an Israeli teen-ager was slain last month, hundreds of Jewish settlers trudged along a mountain path waving Israeli flags. They chanted "Expel the Arabs!" and vowed not to leave the occupied West Bank.

In the occupied Gaza Strip, troops fired tear gas at about 150 children who set tires ablaze and raised the Palestinian flag to protest the army's closing of Aab schools.

Israeli troops ordered the ban on West Bank commerce to punish Arab residents for a one-day strike Wednesday that was called by the Palestine Liberation Organization.

Soldiers ordered shops to stay closed until Sunday, and they threatened to weld shut the shops of merchants who disobeyed the mandate.

In Jericho, the army shut down the West Bank's largest vegetable market, and stores were ordered shut in Nablus, Jenin, Tulkarem, Hebron and Bethlehem.

In Nablus, troops erected roadblocks and prevented Arab taxis and buses from leaving the city to punish residents for adhering to Wednesday's work stoppage, which paralyzed the occupied territories.

Businessman Saed Kenaan of Nablus said the army action was aimed at creating dissension between Palestinians and the underground leaders who order the strikes.

"It's clear the Israelis are trying to give a wedge between the people and the leaders," Kenaan said. "But people are aware of the Israeli games."

In Gaza City, scores of school children chanting "PLO yes, Israel no!" hoisted the Palestinian flag onto a pole at a school run by the United Nations Relief and Works Agency, an Arab reporter said. The Palestinian flag is outlawed in Israel.

Troops fired tear gas to disperse the children who erected barricades of boulders and set tires ablaze in front of the school, the reporter said.

# A-plant's far away, city is assured

HONG KONG (AP) — China's construction of a nuclear power plant 43 miles away does not require Hong Kong to draw up an emergency-evacuation plan, a report released Thursday said.

The report, drawn up for the British colony by the United Kingdom Atomic Energy Authority, said Hong Kong is far enough away from the Daya Bay plant that only monitoring and possibly control of foodstuffs was needed in case of an accident, a government statement said.

The report called for establishment of a hot line between the Daya Bay Control Center and Hong Kong's Royal Observatory.

The Daya Bay plant is scheduled for completion in 1991. After the Chernobyl nuclear plant accident in the Soviet Union in 1986, nearly 1 million Hong Kong's 5.7 million residents signed petitions calling for the scrapping of Daya Bay.

# Israeli-backed militiamen blow up Lebanon homes

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israeli-backed Lebanese militiamen blew up dozens of homes in a southern Lebanon village Thursday in the final stage of an assault by Israeli troops against Arab guerrillas.

Defense Minister Yitzhak Rabin said more similar raids by the militiamen could be expected.

Israeli television said the South Lebanon Army destroyed about 60 houses in the village of Maydoun, which Israeli officials said was used as a base by the radical Shiite Moslem militia Hezbollah, or Party of God.

Israeli troops seized about 20 suspected guerrillas and brought them back to Israel during the two-day thrust into Lebanon that ended Wednesday, Israeli sources said on condition of anonymity.

Israel said at least 40 guerrillas were killed in the operation, most of them Hezbollah members killed Wednesday in Maydoun, two miles north of Israel's self-proclaimed security zone in southern Lebanon. Two of the three Israeli soldiers killed in the assault were buried Thursday.

Sheik Subhi Tofeli, a Hezbollah leader, said only 10 of his guerrillas were killed. He also said the Hezbollah would avenge the attack.

"We shall retaliate. The battle with Israel is still in its initial stage," he told a news conference in Mashghra, four miles north of Maydoun. "The torch of resistance will continue to burn despite Israel's attacks."

Lebanon protested the raid and requested an urgent meeting of the U.N. Security Council to condemn the operation. U.N. officials said the 15-member council likely would meet Friday.

Lebanese Ambassador Rachid Fakhoury, in a letter made public Thursday, said the Lebanese government holds Israel, the Security Council and the United Nations responsible for this fresh act of aggression.

According to Lebanese reports, Israeli soldiers blew up homes and bunkers in Maydoun after the fighting ended and used bulldozers to bury the rubble and the bodies of the dead guerrillas.

# 17 killed, 23 freed after bloody assault on grotto hideaway

NOUMEA, New Caledonia (AP) — An assault team stormed a secluded island cave in this French Pacific territory Thursday and freed 23 hostages in a bloody rescue mission that left 17 people dead, authorities said.

Fifteen of the dead were Melanesian separatists holding the captives, and two were rescuers, said Bernard Pons, France's minister for overseas territories.

The team pelted the cave with tear gas canisters, forcing most of the estimated 30 captors out, Pons told reporters in the capital, Noumea. A particularly violent battle ensued, he said.

Three members of the assault team and three captors were injured in the nearly seven-hour battle in the thick

underbrush of Ouvea island in the Loyalty island group, he said.

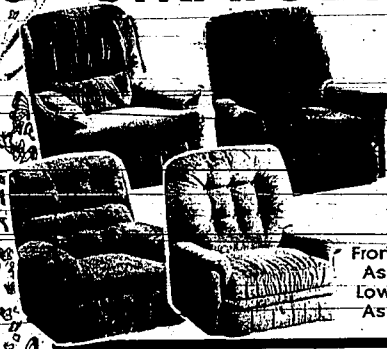
The hostages — 22 gendarmes or armed police, and an assistant prosecutor — were seized in two groups on April 22 and April 27 by Melanesian separatists seeking independence for the island and protesting French-dominated regional elections April 24.

The hostages freed their manacled hands with a key that had been sneaked in earlier and defended themselves with two pistols also obtained before the attack, Pons said.

Taking advantage of the smoke created by tear gas bombs, the hostages were able to escape through a chimney in the back of the cave, he said.



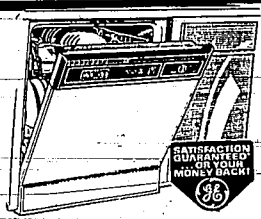

**Rain-X doesn't care for Rooney's satire**

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — A Scottsdale-based company that markets a product called Rain-X is suing Andy Rooney.

The company is displeased with remarks the commentator made April 17 on CBS's "60 Minutes." In short, Rooney said Rain-X doesn't work.

The lawsuit, filed Wednesday in U.S. District Court in Phoenix, names Rooney and CBS Inc. as defendants.

Unelko, the company that markets Rain-X, is seeking \$15 million in punitive damages, saying Rooney's comments tarnished the reputation of its product.

Rain-X is a liquid that, when applied to a vehicle's windshield, is supposed to make rain and snow roll off more quickly to improve visibility.

An attorney for CBS, Douglas Jacobs in New York, said that when Unelko demanded a retraction, CBS officials asked them to make an official request by letter, but Unelko declined.

CBS had "60 Minutes" anchor Mike Wallace read a letter on the air Sunday from race-car driver Mario Andretti praising Rain-X. But Wallace also noted that Andretti is a spokesman for Unelko.

The mission could be a hospice for AIDS patients, a home for abused mothers and children or a home for unwed mothers, Bishop Daniel M. Buechlein said Wednesday.

"It's not a question of if, it's a question of when," said Buechlein.

**Comedian Youngman to reign over Brooklyn**

NEW YORK (AP) — Henny Youngman remembers the Brooklyn neighborhood where he grew up as tough.

"My neighborhood was so tough," he said, "I played a nightclub there — my boss used to stab me good night."

Youngman has been selected as the homecoming king for the sixth annual Welcome Back to Brooklyn festival, and the legendary comedian is already dusting off some lines for the June 12 affair.

Youngman follows singer Connie Stevens, comedian Danny Kaye, singer Ben Vereen and comedian Don DeLuise as the reigning monarch of the festival, expected to draw 20,000.

Born in London in 1906, Youngman came to Brooklyn as an infant.

"I've got a lot of Brooklyn jokes," he told New York's *Newsday*. "Thousands of them, committed to memory. Consider yourself warned."

He paused. He couldn't resist. "Take Brooklyn, Please," he said. "And I'm taking it."

**'Popcorn king' given honorary degree**

WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. (AP) — Popcorn king Orville Redenbacher will receive an honorary doctor of agriculture degree from Purdue University on May 16 for his more than 40 years of corn research.

"This is truly an honor to receive such a degree from my alma mater," said Redenbacher, a 1928 graduate of Purdue.

"After all, Purdue not only pioneered research in popping corn hybridization, but they also helped begin my 'pop' to the top in the popcorn industry," said Redenbacher, 80, who now lives in Coronado, Calif.

Redenbacher worked as a county extension agent and then as a farm manager in Indiana before establishing Chester Inc., a diversified agricultural company, in Valparaiso in 1952. He marketed his popping corn personally, traveling across the country to persuade store owners to carry it and appearing in his own commercials.

**Broderick — doesn't want fame to stop**

NEW YORK (AP) — Actor Matthew Broderick wants you to like him — and you, and you, and you ....

"I'm frightened that it will end, and that people won't like me anymore," Broderick said in an interview published in Sunday's *Parade* magazine. "I have hard time deciding what to do next. It's always agonizing for me."

**Rocket joints pass test**

BRIGHAM CITY, Utah (AP) - Morton Thiokol Inc. engineers say two of three joints on the company's redesigned space shuttle booster rocket passed their preliminary qualifying tests with flying colors.

Dave Mobley, NASA deputy project manager for the redesign effort, said Thursday that engineers have inspected both the aft and center field joints and found both had worked during April 22's full-scale rocket test-firing as designed. Results of tests on the forward joint are expected Friday.

Mobley said that engineers found even the center field joint, which had an intentional flaw built into it during the test-firing at the Morton Thiokol plant 25 miles west of here, did its job in preventing the escape of super-hot gases.

"We had an intentional flaw in that one to test our sealing ability and it held exactly what we wanted it to do," Mobley said.

Two more full-scale qualifying tests of the booster are planned for June and July, and the shuttle launch is tentatively set for Aug. 4. He said the center field joint flaw in the J-seal, allowed gases to reach insulation and the joint's O-ring, but the ring held.

"There was no damage to the O-ring at all," he said. "There was no evidence the gas got past" the ring.

Failure of an O-ring seal is blamed for allowing the gas to escape from a booster used on the Jan. 28, 1986, launch of the shuttle Challenger. A presidential commission found the gas ignited an exterior fuel tank, triggering the explosion that destroyed the Challenger and its seven-member crew about a minute after liftoff.

**Lafferty due new warrant for execution**

PROVO, Utah (AP) - Condemned killer Ronald Lafferty, who claims he murdered his sister-in-law and her baby in a fire, will appear in 4th District Court today for issuance of a new death warrant.

Assistant Utah Attorney General Sandra Sjogren said she will ask Judge Boyd Fox to set an execution date because she has not heard from Lafferty's attorneys that he will continue his appeals.

Defense attorney Gary Weight said he intends to file a new appeal with the U.S. Supreme Court this week, but Sjogren said she has not formally been notified of any new appeals.

Lafferty has until May 18 to appeal to the high court, which customarily issues stays of execution during such proceedings.

Ronald Lafferty and his brother, Dan, were convicted in the 1984 slayings of Brenda Wright Lafferty, formerly of Kimberly, Idaho, and her infant daughter in American Fork.

Ronald Lafferty, who claimed to have had a revelation ordering the victims to be killed, was sentenced to die. His brother was given life in prison.

Under Utah law, condemned killers have the choice of lethal injection or firing squad.

**Nevada woman dies in collision**

POCATELLO (AP) - A 35-year-old Elko, Nev. woman, Loren Thompson, was killed Wednesday afternoon in a traffic accident at a rural intersection near here.

Idaho State Police officers said the accident occurred at 5:26 p.m. after a car driven by Leroy Bertu, 43, Pocatello, pulled away from a stop sign at Cemetery Road and struck the Thompson vehicle.

Thompson was declared dead at the scene. Her three-year-old daughter, Lyncei Thompson, who was in a child safety seat, was uninjured. Bertu was not injured, and two passengers in his car were treated and released at a local hospital.

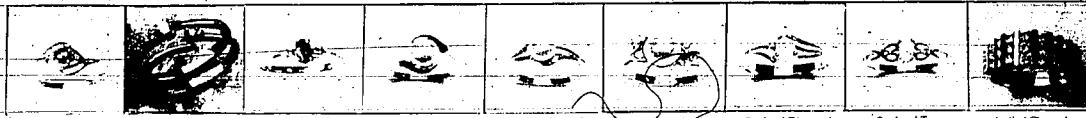

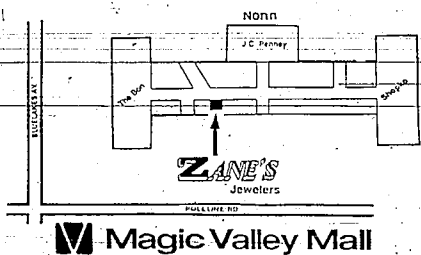

System favors abuse offenders, critics charge

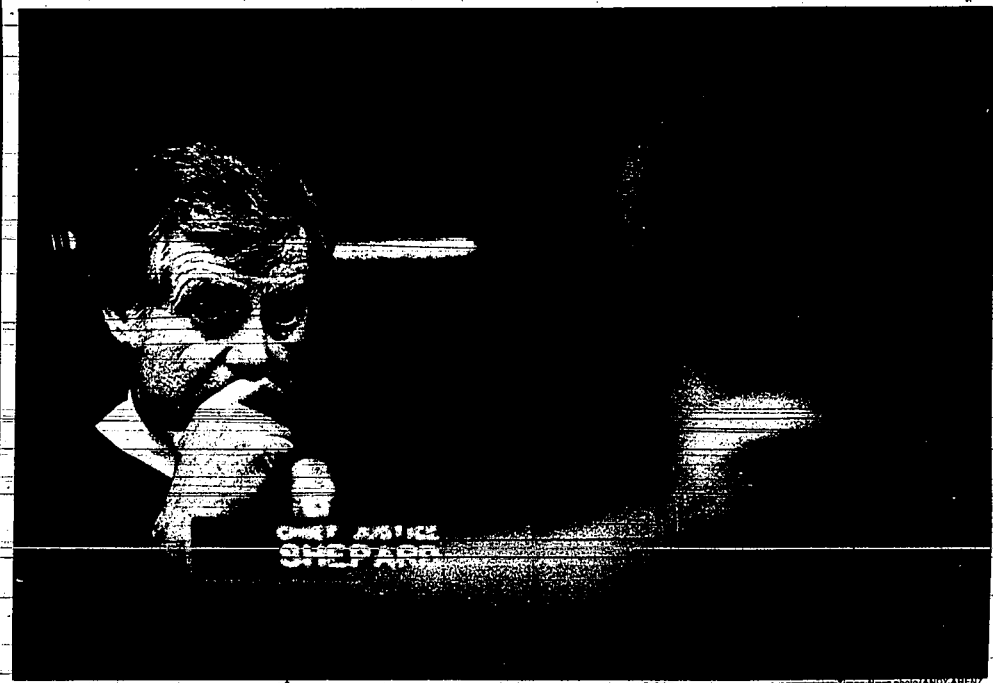
Yet many wary of mandatory sentencing

TWIN FALLS — When an 8-year-old Twin Falls girl told her teacher last June 4 she'd been sexually molested the night before, Idaho's criminal justice system lumbered into action. The successful case featured the teacher reporting the incident immediately and Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter filing charges. A jury later convicted the 41-year-old molester, Gary G. Cliff, after the girl testified against him. But the girl had to wait to testify until February, after numerous trial delays, and sentencing is still pending nearly a year after the crime. "The court system is barbaric with its blasted time delays," said Donna Stalley, a court-appointed guardian helping children through these cases. The case was spotlighted during a governor's Commission on Children and Youth hearing Wednesday that attracted 75 parents, lawyers and children's advocates. The

subject was child abuse, which is drawing increased community attention and thus better reporting, as in the case above. There were 844 incidents of physical or sexual abuse or neglect reported to authorities in Magic Valley during 1987. While reporting is increasing, critics said the criminal justice system seemingly protects offenders more than their victims. Stalley said offenders are rewarded for becoming more sophisticated. "This is a court saying to pedophiles they should keep 'em young and keep 'em retarded, so they can't testify," said Stalley. She added that court delays almost always requested from defense lawyers help the offender, because delays fog the child's memory and desire to prosecute. But Baxter testified that constitutional rights guaranteed all citizens, including these offenders, were the source of most of their frustration.

"We can't keep the child off the stand because they (defendants) have the subpoena power to put the child on the stand," Baxter said. An emotional roller-coaster of testimony carried both praise and criticism for Baxter's handling of the cases, while chilling reminders of victims' suffering remained the standard by which cases were measured. Baxter said defendants' rights, including confronting their accusers before and during trials, often traumatize the child victim. Faced with losing these cases to juries, who throw up their hands when forced to choose between an adult's and a child's version of an intimate event, Baxter said plea bargaining is often the accepted alternative. Many parents said defense lawyers step across the line of fairness by badgering small children into confusion or recantation. "Two years later I still shake when I think about what

my daughter went through on that (preliminary hearing's witness) stand," said one mother of an abused child. "The defense attorney badgered her, discrediting her talk." Despite securing a conviction later by plea bargain, she said her 7-year-old daughter remained angry for a long time afterward, playing with butcher knives and wanting to kill the offender and his attorney. "It was devastating," she said. "They (defense lawyers) are not meeting the needs of their clients, they are traumatizing the child," said Panni Janes, head of the guardian ad litem program. Suggestions included having a child testify on closed-circuit television, for greater privacy. Parents welcomed a proposal for mandatory minimum sentencing, to ensure convicted offenders spend time in prison. But prosecutors and other specialists continued their warnings that mandatory minimums would lead to more trials, and thus less convictions, than plea-bargaining. See ABUSE on Page B2

High court hears award dispute arguments

TWIN FALLS — Punctuated with questions from the Idaho Supreme Court's newest justice, two attorneys argued Thursday whether a 1987 district judge's order increasing a jury's malpractice award was proper. An attorney for the physician who lost the case said the jury's verdict against Carole Dick, a Twin Falls radiologist, was the result of a compromise in the jury room. "The plaintiff can't accept the value of a potentially tainted verdict, and then reap the benefit of new trial on damages alone," said Jeremiah Quane, who represents Dick. Quane says 5th District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt was wrong when he ordered an increase in damages from \$356,714 to \$1.09 million after James and Lillian Smallwood of Jerome asked for a new trial. The Smallwoods said the jury's award was too small. Smallwoods' attorney, Marcus Nye of Pocatello, said

Quane supported his pleas for a new trial with opinions and not facts. "All appellants come forward with is we know what compromise verdicts are," Nye said. Quane theorized that the jury, which rendered the verdict with nine of 12 members, had to compromise to even come to a verdict against Dick. "In exchange for a compromise, they would award a portion of damages to get a verdict," Quane said. "It's a classic, classic case of compromise." In his order, Hurlbutt said the Smallwoods would get a new trial limited to damages if they didn't accept the larger award. But Dick appealed Hurlbutt's order and the two attorneys argued the case Thursday before the Idaho Supreme Court. "The attorneys scarcely started their prepared remarks before Justice Byron Johnson, the newest member of the court, began asking questions. The Smallwoods sued several physicians after a 1981 traffic accident in which Smallwood suffered a frac-

Smallwood was treated at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center after the accident. Two days after the accident, he fell as he was going to the bathroom and felt sharp pain in the thoracic area of the spine. Doctors then discovered Smallwood had a fractured vertebra that severed his spinal cord. He is now a paraplegic. Every other physician involved settled with the Smallwoods before trial, but Dick decided to take the case to trial. She read the X-rays ordered by other physicians. At trial, her defense attorney argued that two other radiologists in the Magic Valley agreed with her report. In addition, Quane said, the other physicians never ordered a full spine X-ray even though Smallwood's back pain persisted. Both Smallwood and Dick sat through the oral arguments Thursday. Two of the supreme court's five justices were absent. Retired district judges Arthur P. Oliver of Pocatello and James Towles of Coeur d'Alene replaced Justices Robert Bakes and Robert Huntley.

Violent melee triggers state investigation

RUPERT — State officials have been called in to investigate a violent supermarket melee last week during which the Rupert mayor kicked a man being arrested on a charge of shoplifting, officials said. Rupert Mayor Bill Whitton kicked Robert Artero-Flores, who was lying on the floor of the Rupert IGA store after a tangled struggle with a host of store employees, customers and police officers. Flores was hospitalized with head and neck injuries and eventually placed in intensive care after the incident. Whitton has defended his actions in a prepared statement, saying Flores was resisting arrest in a violent manner, threatening everyone in the vicinity. A police officer handcuffed Flores but the man started struggling again, Whitton said. As Flores lay on the floor, Whitton said the man tried to bite him, and he instinctively kicked out at Flores. "He (Flores) knew there was a risk of injury when he created this situation, so he should not complain about the results," the mayor said. "If he thinks he has a claim for his injury, he can pursue it-but I have let this prosecuting attorney know I don't want a court in this matter and I don't want any of the charges against Mr. Flores dropped because of this incident," the mayor's statement said. Don Hiebert, an investigator with the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement, said Thursday he plans to arrive in Rupert early next week to start an independent inquiry into the matter. Minidoka County Prosecutor Charles Creason Jr. requested the state department investigation. "The man was injured and required medical attention, and any time that happens with law enforcement officials it is appropriate to have an outside agency look at it, particularly when there's a city official involved," Creason said. Creason added that he will request the appointment of a special prosecutor if the state's investigation uncovers misconduct on the part of city officials. Creason said Whitton, who is in his 11th year as Rupert's mayor, "was in the store and was involved in the scuffle with this fellow." Whitton said he welcomed a state inquiry, but said Flores brought his problems on himself by resisting violently and screaming obscenities when store employees tried to arrest him. "An independent investigation will clear the air in this matter. I will be happy to cooperate in the investigation," Whitton said. Flores, 27, was arrested in the Rupert IGA store during the late-night hours of April 28. When police officers arrived at the scene, they observed three men sitting on Flores in front of the checkout stand, "according to police records. Store employees stopped Flores when he tried to leave the store after allegedly putting a carton of cigarettes down the front of his pants. Witnesses' statements said Flores attempted to hit one of his detainers with a bottle of wine vinegar and tried to kick another man in the groin. Officers with the Rupert Police Department responded in unusually strong force because the incident was mistakenly called in as a robbery instead of a theft, Police Chief Paul Fries said. Three police officers were involved in the

Fireworks wholesaler alleges illegal seizure

Line to coast may be finalized soon

POCATELLO — Idaho Power Co. Chairman Robert O'Connor predicts a revised plan by his utility and several others for a major transmission line from Idaho's Magic Valley to Southern California could be finalized this summer. In Pocatello Wednesday for the company's annual stockholders meeting, O'Connor said construction of the line between Jerome and the Los Angeles-San Diego area could occur in the early 1990s. "It would enable us to make firm power sales of our system," O'Connor said. Those sales would command higher prices than the spot market sales the company is now capable of making. O'Connor said the utility is negotiating with other companies and in the process of signing let-

ters of intent: Idaho Power would own the northern section of the line and other companies would own its southern stretch, he said, providing no estimate of the project's cost. Idaho Power's transmission line proposal, competing with a similar plan being promoted by Idaho potato magnate J.R. Simplot, was developed after the company last year pulled out of a large consortium of utilities trying to put together a transmission line project. Divergent interests among the members of that consortium have slowed its progress significantly. O'Connor said Idaho Power continued to pursue the transmission line plan because it should have excess generating capacity through the next decade. He maintained it is the only utility in the Northwest that generates more power than it needs.

The Southern California area's electrical needs are growing by 1,000 to 2,000 megawatts a year or nearly as much as Idaho Power's total annual generation, he said. Supplying even some of that need on a firm basis, he added, would be a major boost to ratepayers because of the higher price those power sales commands. The proposed line would start from the Midway Substation near Jerome, recently acquired from Pacific Power & Light Co. The acquisition was made possible following Federal Energy Regulatory Commission hearings on Utah Power & Light Co.'s proposed merger with PacifiCorp, PP&L's parent company. O'Connor said there was a long-standing dispute between Idaho Power and PP&L over ownership of the Jerome substation, but the matter was resolved when Idaho Power intervened in the federal merger hearings.

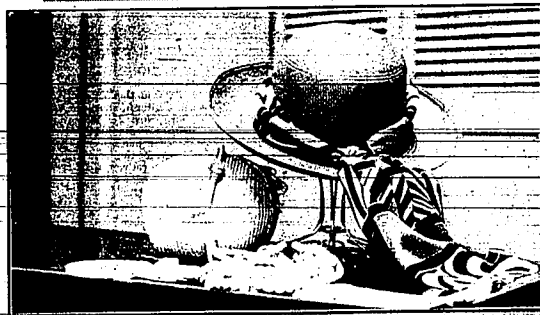



# CSI begins quest for school's first regional men's track title

SPOKANE, Wash. — After missing by eight points last year, the College of Southern Idaho's men's track team will try again today and Saturday to win its first Region 18 junior college championship.

The Eagles, Ricks College, Treasure Valley Community College and host North Idaho College will get together at the Community Colleges of Spokane Stadium in the renewal of event Ricks has dominated for the past several years.

Competition will begin at 4:30 p.m. MDT today with the running event preliminaries and the field events. The running event finals will commence Saturday at 11 a.m. MDT.

The track title is the only Region 18 championship that has eluded CSI.

"On paper, I'd say we have an excellent chance of winning it," said CSI Coach Rick Neill. "We don't have the dominant athlete like Joey Johnson that we had a year ago, but we have the potential of placing first in a number of events. Last year at Reburg we had a dropped baton in a relay

race, a second-place finish by the two-time national (junior college) high jump champion (Johnson) and an athlete who didn't finish two of the events he started. That's a 10-point swing, at least."

Ricks' men's team is weaker than usual because the school kicked several athletes off the track team for violating Ricks' code of conduct.

"You've got to figure that with those guys, they would have finished 1-2 in the hammer, 1-2 in the shot and 1-3 in the javelin," said Neill. "Instead of those points going to Ricks, now they're probably going to go to North Idaho."

On the women's side, it's going to be all Vikings, Neill predicted.

"There's nobody who can touch them," he predicted. "The only question is how many they'll qualify for nationals."

The CSI women's chances were hurt by injuries suffered by freshman quarter-miler Eva Talamantes and freshman jumper Sandy Rowland, which will apparently keep both out of the regional finals. Talamantes, who won the state high school Class A-1 400-meter championship last year as a Twin Falls High School senior, sustained a stress fracture three weeks ago at the Bob Gibb Classic in Boise and won't be ready to run this weekend. Rowland, who had the second-best mark in the long jump headed into regionals, hurt her leg in practice this week.

In addition to the team championship, also at stake will be the number of athletes who will qualify for the Na-

tional Junior College Athletic Association meet, which will be held in Odessa, Texas, May 19-21. CSI has qualified three athletes so far: freshman Johnny Menifee in the high jump, sophomore Jay Burke in the 110-meter-high hurdles and freshman Julie Hibbard in the discus.

"Potentially, we could qualify five or six more," said Neill. "Charles Tennant went to nationals last year in the 800, and I don't see why he shouldn't be able to qualify again. Menifee went to the indoor nationals in the triple jump and Oralina (Casiano) went in the 800, so they certainly have a chance. (Roby) Bartholomew has the best time in the region in the 400 hurdles and has a shot, and I would think (Todd) McKay should be able to make it in the 10K (10,000 meters)."

What concerns Neill about the men's regional title is Ricks' depth.

"You don't win track meets with first places, you win with seconds and thirds," he said. "We really can't compete with Ricks' numbers, so we're going to have to win some seconds and thirds ourselves."

In addition to Bartholomew, a sophomore from Jerome who has the top time 400 hurdles time this season of 54.36 seconds, and Burke, a sophomore from Wendell with a pacesetter 14.64-second high hurdles, CSI's men have the best athletes in seven other events. Menifee, a freshman from Federal Way, Wash., has both the top high jump of 6 feet, 9 3/4 inches and the pacesetter triple jump of 49-7. The Eagles have the best qualifying time in the 4x400-meter relay (3:18).

## Bruin golfers sweep regional, but five teams going to state

BURLEY — Twin Falls didn't surprise anyone by taking both the boys' and girls' Region III high school golf titles here Thursday afternoon, but its margins of victory may have raised a few eyebrows.

The Bruin boys carded a 309 team score on the par-71-Burley Municipal Golf Course, just one stroke better than second-place Minico's 310.

The Bruin women on the other hand, left their competition in the dust, tallying a 261 team score, 65 strokes better than second-place High-Jana's 326.

When all was completed however, all of the region's boys' and girls' teams qualified for next week's state tournament at the Avondale Golf and Tennis Club in Coverdale.

The boys' teams needed a combined score of 325 to qualify for the state tourney and the girls' needed a 340 total.

Under new state rules adopted this year, a qualifying standard of 325 has been established as a repurchase, as it were, for teams to advance to the state final.

Highland finished third in boys' competition with a 318, followed by Burley's 321 and Pocatello squeaked by with a 325.

Minico's girls finished third with a 337 and again, Pocatello squeaked by with a 340 total.

Simply put, the Bruin boys, who won the Gem State Conference championship earlier in the spring, were not satisfied with their effort.

Last year, Twin Falls took the Region III championship with a 292 performance. This year, however, after the first nine holes were completed the Bruins were on a pace that would lead their score over 320 strokes. But thanks to a redeeming back-nine effort and an unexpected 75 from junior Tim Capps, Twin Falls, which had won the two regional tuneup tournaments earlier this spring, was able to stay ahead of the Spartans and the Gem State Conference's top golfer Scott Erling.

Erling, the CSC season medalist, topped the regional medalist honors with a one-over-par 72.

Bruins Kellie Jones and Karen Irwin both shot 83 to grab girls' medalist honors.

All five of the Bruin boys agree that they one of the top five teams in the state, along with Borah, Capital, Coverdale and perennial power Lewiston.

Bruin coach Paul Slover agreed.

"We have the ability (to finish in the top five)," he said. "I don't know if we have the ability to

win. Everybody's goal is to make it to the second day. We'll take it one step at a time."

Slover said Capps' performance Thursday was a shot in the arm for the Bruins. Capps has struggled throughout the season and his 75 was the team's low score.

### Rupert watercolorist feels inspired

TWIN FALLS — Committed artists are in a sense truly starving artists, according to Gloria Adams of Rupert. It is the love, respect and experiencing of the art that "feeds your soul," says Adams.

Adams, a 41-year-old watercolorist, is the featured artist at the fifth annual Idaho Art Show and Auction scheduled Saturday evening at the Holiday Inn.

Sponsored by the Twin Falls Junior Club and Canyonside Gallery, proceeds from the art show will benefit three local agencies, the Guardian Ad Litem, Senior Citizens Center and YPCA After-School Program.

Ron Hicks, owner of the Canyonside Gallery, who will jury the artwork, has known Adams for several years and says Adams' inspiration is "She has to paint. She is motivated from within."

Adams calls herself a learning artist.

"Learning is probably the greatest experience an artist can have and I truly love it," says Adams.

"I have never yet painted a one masterpiece. I hope to hell I never do. Because if I ever did what would be the sense of me continuing on? I'd better retire that paint brush if I couldn't ever do my better," she says.

Tucked into a corner of Rupert's town square is Adams' small-doll shop, a business she says is "a means of support of my love of the arts."

She spends long hours there as a merchant and as an artist. Dolls in glass cases can gaze at Adams' framed watercolors while Adams herself is found daily in her small studio in the shop painting.

Art is an illusion of an interpretation of someone else, says Adams. "Each artist will project their work in a different way, which is beautiful."

As a fifth grader in Eugene, Ore., Adams sold her first artwork — a wood cut entitled "Through the Port-hole."

At age 16 she asked her parents to buy a set of real oil paints and claims "if it would have been possible for me to derive my own pigments from roots of actual plants I would have loved to created in that sense, too."

Her parents were always extremely supportive of her involvement in art although neither is an artist.

About 1976 Adams began working with watercolors and pen and ink, combining the two into a very popular

artwork, says Hicks.

Shortly thereafter she became acquainted with Ronnie Lee Vanek, a popular young Magic Valley artist. They were married for eight years before his death from cancer in August of 1985.

"Ronnie was more of a source of inspiration to me than any one individual because we had such a close relationship. He was a man in my life that meant an awful, awful lot," she says.

Vanek was a beautiful person and a philosopher in his own right, says Adams. He often said it was the quality of what you have and not the quantity which was important.

Her work with Vanek were extremely valuable and encouraging years for her growth in art and his

death was equally discouraging. For a period of seven months after he died Adams couldn't paint.

"I wanted desperately to perform with my work but I just couldn't cross the bridge," she says.

Finally, one day while wanting desperately to experience art, she sat down and painted and has continued ever since.

Adams classifies herself as a strictly emotional painter and paints "from an inner feeling."

"I truly feel for myself that art is an experience within the individual — putting on a form. You're just putting forth merely an image and projecting an image of something — whether it makes the viewer happy, sad, tranquil...It can speak softly or it can

### Art auction benefits 3 local charities

TWIN FALLS — Sixty pieces of art will be auctioned off Saturday night with proceeds going to aid three community organizations. The occasion is the fifth annual Idaho Art Show and Auction sponsored by the Twin Falls Junior Club and Canyonside Gallery. It will be held at the Holiday Inn beginning at 7 p.m. for the art preview and silent auction.

## Ridley Pearson sets a new thriller in Seattle

# UNDERCURRENTS

TWIN FALLS — I consider any novel that keeps me awake and frightened past 9 a.m. worth reading, and Ridley Pearson's latest mystery, "Undercurrents," is that kind of book.

During an interview with the Times-News last fall, Pearson described his nascent novel as a "police procedural" and "a murder thriller about a serial killing in Seattle and the investigation run by a disenchanted detective."

"Undercurrents" is a sexy story centered on Lou Boldt, a disheveled cop and Tums addict, who stalks a porn-crazed murderer with a supply of brown paper bags in his left pocket and disposable surgical gloves in his right.

The story is written in the third person — the reader knows only what the detective knows so must piece together the clues one at a time.

Pearson doesn't give his detective or his readers much to go on, and that's probably what keeps us all

working at solving the mystery. Evidence found at the opening scene includes an empty pack of Marlboros and a strange, red fiber. Along the way Boldt also uncovers the possibility of a copycat murderer — and worse yet, the copycat could be someone on his team.

Pearson does a good job dissecting a complex criminal investigation and offering it up to the reader piece by piece.

In preparing to write "Undercurrents," the author spent several weeks in Seattle talking to police investigators and the city coroner. The extent of that research is evident throughout the book, and is most vividly displayed in Pearson's description of a waterlogged cadaver that washes up on a Puget Sound shore.

But the novel suffers at times from too much gore and too many details. Midway through, Pearson attempts a turgid discussion of the Puget Sound currents along with how the tides might drag a body back and forth. It's all too technical, bogging the story down just when it should be rolling along.

Perhaps Pearson doesn't know when to stop. He told the Times-News that he spends an average of 75 hours a week grinding out thrillers on his word processor from a log home in the Wood River Valley. "Undercurrents" is his sixth book in five years. He has also composed more than 300 songs and a number of musical scores for animated films and documentaries. His efforts have paid off. In 1987,

Pearson surpassed Stephen King on the Northwest best-seller list with his third novel, "Seizing of the Yankee Green Mall." "Undercurrents" promises to bring further success even before publication. St. Martin's Press has pledged to print at least 50,000 hard-cover copies and to follow next year with 500,000 paperbacks. Martin Bregman, producer of "Scarface," "Dog Day Afternoon" and "Serpico," has purchased the film rights to the book.

If a movie is made, "Undercurrents" probably won't suffer from the transition to the screen. It might be improved.

Pearson's dialogue is often stilted and lacking in color, especially the scenes between Lou Boldt and his estranged wife, Elizabeth. During one emotion-charged moment, Boldt offers boring platitudes. Perhaps Pearson never intended for us to like Boldt, but with such predictable scenes, he certainly doesn't give us a live, three-dimensional character to judge.

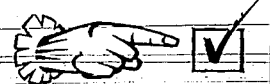
Boldt seems to have difficulties communicating with all the women in his life, and that may be because Pearson had difficulty with those characters too. In describing women, he often uses sexual clichés which undercut some of the fine writing elsewhere in the book.

Daphne Matthews, the police psychologist and Boldt's fantasy love in-

terest, is repeatedly likened to a thoroughbred horse. Boldt nicknames her "Duffy," and is consistently unnerved by her thick mane of dark hair which she swishes in his face. Their eventual lovemaking doesn't seem to fit the characters and even borders on the ridiculous.

Even with its faults, "Undercurrents" is a good mystery story. The novel's last 150 pages motivates us to discover who done it. The serial killings are solved a little too soon for my taste, but finding out the identity of the copycat killer kept me reading until the very end.

## BSU project plans to catalog and preserve Idaho writings

# Garner, Willis shine brightly in 'Sunset'

No one is better qualified than Blake Edwards to create a movie about the early days of Hollywood: He is a third-generation filmmaker, his grandfather was a silent film director, his father was an assistant director and production manager. His daughter, Jennifer, a promising actress, makes it four generations.

The latest movie from the prolific Edwards ("Breakfast at Tiffany's," "The Great Race," "10") is "Sunset,"

an affectionate, funny, exhilarating glimpse at what Hollywood in the 1920s might have been. "Give or take one or two lies," as one of the characters explains.

Based on a book by Rod Amateau, Edwards' script contains a delicious idea: the teaming of Wyatt Earp and Tom Mix to solve a Hollywood murder case. The juxtaposition of an authentic Western hero and a gaudy star of horse operas makes a splendid metaphor. And Edwards adds another element from movie lore: the bootlegging Mafia.

The plotting of "Sunset" becomes a bit convoluted for easy comprehension, and the heroics grow far-fetched. But the movie rolls along with Edwards' faultless pacing, and most of all, by the inspired casting of James Garner and Bruce Willis. They are the slickest screen pairing since Paul Newman and Robert Redford.

The two mythic heroes are brought together when Earp comes to Hollywood as technical adviser for a movie in which he will be portrayed by Mix. After an early-antagonism, the pair develop a mutual respect and visit a luxurious Hollywood brothel.

When one of the leading ladies of the evening turns up dead, Earp and Mix are plunged into a web of intrigue that leads to the doorstep of studio head Alfie Alperin (Malcolm McDowell), once a silent movie clown. Blake

Edwards, who has a long history of battles with studio bosses, must have delighted in making one of the villains of "Sunset."

The story involves a wide range of characters, including the dead woman's daughter (Mariel Hemingway), a crooked cop (Richard Bradford), the oily studio police chief (M. Emmet Walsh) and an underworld lord (Joe Dallesandro). They interweave, sometimes confusingly, but most of the moments unweave at the end. Garner is a marvel to watch, his quiet authority dominating every scene. But Willis also shows his best big-screen form yet, capturing the flamboyance of Mix as well as his self-mockery.

The Tri-Star Pictures release was produced by Tony Adams. The rating is R, for language and sexual content. Running time: 101 minutes.

## 'Casual Sex?' shows few redeeming virtues

HOLLYWOOD — Think that "Casual Sex?" might interest you? Think again. Except for the credits songs, the only really good thing about this movie is the way it proves that one does not have to be a man to make lewd, preposterous comedies. Women can, too.

The movie is set mostly at an swinging bucolic health farm where good buddies Stacy (Lea Thompson) and Melissa (Victoria Jackson) journey in pursuit of aerobics and eros and where they encounter a needle-brained rock singer (Stephen Stills), a bouncy exercise instructor (Jerry Levine), a macho bozo from Jersey (Andrew Dice Clay) and various other neurotics, lechers, jouts and extras in tight trunks.

The movie is another example of that onerous '80s staple, the "daffy, goofy, sex-crazed guys" comedy — though here the parts of the bimbos are played by men, and the traditional guys roles by women. Instead of acting daffy, goofy and sex-crazed, the women are compassionate, supportive and sex-crazed.

One wonders why these film makers — director Genevieve Robert and executive producer Ivan Reitman — wanted to do the movie in the first

place. It is like staging a Feydeau farce in which the characters crawl out from under the beds to deliver sermons on fidelity, or disengage themselves from their amorous bouts to offer advice on birth control — then hop right back under the beds and into the bouts.

Who is kidding whom here? It is easy to see that the original script had a much different tone; its raunchiness keeps "peeking" through; the new, cleaned-up veneer like a leech caught in plastic.

If the script is dubious, the direction matches it. The pace is so lugubrious one might think the actors are refusing to jump on their cues because they are afraid of catching something.

The cast is less directed than exploited. Thompson crinkles constantly; Jackson does her whining bimbo bit; Clay reprises his gross-macho stand-up comedy character; Mary Gross pops in and out like a guest hysteria; and Jerry Levine looks so much like Barry Manilow or Martin Short that the crew might consider reuniting act: a New Age-Three Stooges routine where they sweat each other with mystic crystals. Meanwhile, the best answer if anyone asks you out for an evening of "Casual Sex?" (MPAA-rated: R) is a vow of abstinence.

speak very loud. When people buy art it's a very personal thing to them."

She tells her potential clients to buy for their own feelings. "If a particular piece of work... says something to you, that's the piece that you should own."

"The most gratifying compliment an artist can be paid is when art is purchased," says Adams.

Adams doesn't know how many ribbons she has won for her work. The ribbons stay with the painting and if the painting is sold the ribbon goes with it. It is the work itself, the piece that won the ribbon that should retain the ribbon, says Adams.

Adams is a great believer in original artwork which leave something for the imagination to enhance. "You will look at that piece many times and you will see different images at different times and find yourself always enjoying that piece for what it is."

Artists are not born with brushes in their hands, says Adams. Heredity may contribute an interest but an artist also needs a respect for all mediums of art, in general and must have a desire to participate.

The quality of the beginning artist's work isn't important because the artist will learn, says Adams, who admits to "laughing hilariously" at some of her earlier works.

"As long as there's the interest and skill the talent will evolve."

She enjoys painting landscapes and outdoor scenes. "I just happen to be a fond lover of God's Green Earth," she says.

Each artwork inspires her to do another, all the while learning more of her craft.

"I still have not touched any of the top highest esteem that I hope to attain. I hope I can continue going on and learning and doing, it is the experiencing of the art that feeds the soul."

# Shocked widow offers AIDS warning to the complacent

**DEAR ABBY:** I am a 69-year-old, college-educated, retired professional woman.

My husband — a professional man — died of AIDS three years ago. He was not in a high-risk group. Because he was a family man, and because AIDS was unknown in our area, the doctors never thought to test him for the virus until about a week before he died.

The results were positive, but these did not come back until after his funeral, and more important for me, after the death certificate was signed. So the certificate bore no stigma, and there was no publicity.

Because not much was known at the time (at least around here) about how AIDS is transmitted, our adult children were tested for the virus at the same time I was.

Now, of course, we know that testing the kids was unnecessary because they neither had sex nor shared needles with my husband, and had no contact with his blood.

Naturally, their tests were negative. I, on the other hand, tested positive, and was tested again to make certain there was no mistake. Positive again.

I want to make it absolutely clear that there was no anal intercourse or only normal penile-vaginal (missionary) intercourse in my case.

I was told that the odds of a straight, monogamous, drug-free person getting this disease is about 5 million-to-1, but that doesn't help if you're the one in 5 million!

So far, I am still healthy but I have the virus — the virus I got from "normal" intercourse.

Abby, I implore you to alert your reading audience to my message. If this happened to me, it can happen to any straight, monogamous woman.

There may be many, perhaps thousands, of women like me. There are no records on us because as I understand it, only full-blown AIDS, and perhaps AIDS-related-complex cases, are reported to the CDC. Carriers are not reported. And if these women are like me, they are telling NO ONE.

Of course, I am not sexually active. But those who are must inform their partners, and insist on the use of a condom, which may still carry some risks, but is considerably safer. To do otherwise is tantamount to murder.

**DEAR WIDOW:** You are courageous to have written, and I thank you for wanting to warn other women. The message here is: A sexually ac-

tive monogamous woman can be at risk from "normal" intercourse if her partner is infected with the AIDS virus.

**DEAR ABBY:** I have some good news for the 60-year-old Ohio farmer who, though married, had not experienced marital relations for many years.

The last 12 years of a previous 35-year marriage were also void of all marital relations. As a healthy male, this caused me considerable frustration. At 53, I wondered if I had become impotent.

At age 66, my sexless marriage was terminated when my wife died. Shortly after, I ran into a former high school sweetheart whose marriage had been terminated (unknown to me) 12 years earlier! Our romance resumed and we were married on Valentine's Day.

Abby, I have no idea how old one must be when the bells stop ringing, but at 65, they rang again for me, and life was every bit as exciting (romantically speaking) as it had been 40 years ago.

It takes the right partner to return

love and affection in the same manner it is given. Thank God for my lovely bride!

## Shakespeare pays visit

**TWIN FALLS** — The Idaho Shakespeare Festival will be bringing its Shakespeare tour to Twin Falls High School and Filer High School on May 11 and May 13.

Shakespeare is a two-part program geared to high school junior and senior English students, exploring the world and works of William Shakespeare. The program was developed to increase appreciation and understanding of Shakespeare, and to give students the opportunity to experience the plays as they were meant to be performed, rather than merely read in the classroom.

## Critics pan Madonna in 'Speed-The-Plow'

**NEW YORK (AP)** — The play was praised but the critics were not as kind to Madonna, making her Broadway debut in "Speed-The-Plow," David Mamet's scathing comedy about two Hollywood producers and a temporary secretary.

"No, She Can't Act" headlined the New York Daily News. Its drama critic, Howard Kissel, called "Speed-The-Plow" "Mamet's clearest, wittiest play," but added "I bet it would be even funnier with an actress."

Clive Barnes of the New York Post agreed. He said the rock star "sounds more as if she were auditioning than acting, and the audition is scarcely for the big time. There is a genuine, resticent charm here, but it is not yet ready to light the lamps on Broadway."

Frank Rich of The New York Times was more positive. He said Madonna "serves Mr. Mamet's play much as she did the Susan Seidelman film "Desperately Seeking Susan" with intelligent, scrupulously disciplined comic acting."

"She delivers the shocking transitions essential to the action, needs only more confidence to relax a bit and fully command her speaking voice," the Times said.

Madonna's role is the smallest in the three-character play, and she is on

stage less than half the time. The play also stars Joe Mantegna and Ron Silver.

But it has been Madonna who sold tickets. "Speed-The-Plow" originally was scheduled to open at the 299-seat Mitzl Newhouse Theater in Lincoln Center but ticket demand was so great that it was moved to the 1,058-seat Royale Theater.

Even so, the Lincoln Center Theater, which produced the play on Broadway, deliberately downplayed Madonna's role in the production. It declined all interviews for the star and kept publicity to a minimum.

By the time the show opened Tuesday night, it had a good but not overwhelming advance sale of \$500,000. With the favorable reviews, the box office expected to take in more than \$100,000 the day after the opening, said Merle Debuskey, a spokesman for the show.

Mantegna and Silver, who play the sleazy Hollywood producers, were universally lauded. Linda Wiener, writing in Newsday, called Mantegna "irresistible," and she said Silver delivered "a riveting breakthrough performance." Said Rich, "The men could not be better. Mr. Silver gives the performance of his career."

## SIS fight fades

Compromise in House bill OK's design

WASHINGTON — House adoption of a compromise on financing for the billion-dollar Special Isotope Separation plant proposed for eastern Idaho has averted a heated congressional fight that backers said could have had a serious impact on the project's future.  
"We won a short-term battle," Idaho Democratic Congressman Richard Stallings said. "We are all right through 1989, but there are a couple of things that are really going to make a difference for the SIS down the line."  
The compromise, endorsed by the House Thursday as part of its version of the 1989 defense authorization bill, allows the Department of Energy to spend \$26 million for planning and design of the plant planned for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

## Bush is leaving nothing to chance

TWIN FALLS — Vice President George Bush arrived in Twin Falls with enough national delegates in hand to win the Republican presidential nomination.  
So why visit the strongly Republican Magic Valley, an expected gimme in his national campaign? Because Bush is leaving nothing to chance.  
Bush will cultivate agricultural experience as he hears about commodity competition abroad and the domestic Western issue of federal land management.  
But his appearances are set against a backdrop of uncertain support in the traditionally strong Republican region, according to a Democratic poll of the 2nd Congressional District.  
Three agricultural events scheduled during his Twin Falls visit offer the opportunity to size up Bush on agricultural issues after the fall of his primary competitor, Sen. Bob Dole of Kansas.  
Scheduled are a private discussion with about 18 farming representatives at the Coiner family farm, a visit to an experimental agricultural field

• 11:05 a.m. — Bush departs for Billings, Mont., aboard Air Force II. Spectators hoping to catch a glimpse of the vice president at the Twin Falls-Sun Valley Regional Airport will be allowed outside the runway fence.  
... and a public address on farming at the College of Southern Idaho.  
Farmers and ranchers from across Magic Valley expect no parting of the water during Bush's respite. But they welcome the visit as an opportunity to personally describe Idaho's concerns to the Republican's presidential heir apparent.  
"I don't really expect anything is going to change overnight," said Tim Coiner, who will be driving Bush around the family farm. "But if he has the intention of helping, it would be nice for him to kind of limit the farming imports, to compete at a fair level."  
"I want him to know how important the beet industry is in southern Idaho," said Rupert farmer George Grant, who is president of the Idaho Sugar Beet Growers.  
Grant is also among the group scheduled to meet Bush personally at the Coiners. He said he'd like to express his fears about foreign governments subsidizing their crops and creating increased competition abroad,

especially from the European Economic Community, which is now a sugar exporter instead of the importer of several years ago.  
"We think we can compete against anybody, given a level playing field," said Grant, who farms 800 acres with his two sons.  
While unsuccessful in his presidential bid, Dole's support for the sugar beet program was clear. Bush doesn't have the Kansas senator's voting record.  
"I think we felt a little more comfortable with Dole because of his being a supporter of the sugar beet industry and, of course, he was in the Senate, whereas Bush doesn't really have that experience or that record," Grant said.  
"We'll have to see," Grant added. "Hopefully he will be a little bit stronger on trade issues."  
Tom Prescott, a Jerome rancher, also expects to meet with Bush. He'd like to discuss multiple uses of federal land, a uniquely western issue.  
"When they're back in Washington,

even good guys get Potomac Fever," Prescott said. "Hopefully we can tell him about some of the problems and successes in the livestock business."  
The chairman of the governing board of the U.S. Bureau of Land Management's Shoshone District grazes about 1,000 head of cattle for beef production. He said he'd like to talk about mingling grazing with environmental concerns such as soil and water protection.  
"Sometimes we're perceived as butting heads a little bit, but it's just been misunderstanding," said Prescott, who grazes 1,000 head for beef production.  
He said Bush may know about ranching from his background in Texas, but that federal land use may be a new concept.  
"We're looking forward to it (the meeting) to familiarize him with the problems we've had and the successes we've had," Prescott said.  
In general, Republican organizers call Bush's visit a rallying cry for party faithful, a time to consolidate their forces.  
"Obviously a visit to Idaho means nothing (politically) anywhere else,"

## His hands do the talking to an enthusiastic airport crowd

TWIN FALLS — George Bush let his hands do the talking for him as he greeted a throng of enthusiastic onlookers at the Twin Falls airport Thursday night.  
The vice president grabbed his loose-collared necktie and — pointing to the cluster of ties hanging from surrounding officials' necks, repeatedly thrust his thumbs toward the overcast sky, shook hands while going

through a short line of welcoming officials and then, pressed the flesh with numerous children through a chain-link fence.  
"I touched his coat," said 13-year-old Tammy Dalton of Twin Falls. "I thought it was really neat."  
More than a hundred people came out to the airport to greet Bush. Children sat on parents' shoulders or stood on posts to get a look through the barbed wire laced on top of the separating fence.  
Other Twin Falls residents lined

Washington Street South, the road taken by the vice president's motorcade from the airport into the city.  
"You're all dressed up," joshed the casually dressed Bush from atop the airplane ramp. "C'mon."  
"I think he has an edge of importance that makes us feel honored in Twin Falls to have him here," said Mark Stubbs, the first person who greeted Bush after he departed Air Force Two.  
Bush, who has sewn up the Republican nomination for president, was

accompanied off the plane by U.S. Senators James McClure and Steve Symms, the latter sporting a cowboy hat, and State Sen. Jim Risch, R-Boise.  
Bush had only one word for the contingent of press officials packed onto an elevated platform: "Votes."  
That was the vice president's answer to a question asked by Carol Stephens of Twin Falls radio station KTFI. In a stentorian voice booming off the press platform, Stephens asked Bush what he hoped to accom-

plish while in Idaho.  
As the vice president walked toward the group of fenced-off onlookers, a light drizzle began to fall from the partly sunny skies.  
Bush is scheduled to leave Twin Falls for Billings, Mont., at 11:05 a.m. today.  
Stubbs said Bush made small talk with the assembled group of welcoming officials. "He's very amiable, a very warm person," Stubbs said.  
Stubbs, who is Twin Falls County

## Amnesty program a success, INS commissioner declares

WASHINGTON — The amnesty program that pulled in more than 1.6 million aliens seeking to live legally in the United States won't be extended and "has proceeded very successfully" despite not hitting the 2 million mark, the nation's top immigration official said Thursday.  
"We'll take our 85-percent batting average on that as quite good," Immigration and Natu-

ralization Service Commissioner Alan Nelson told a news conference. He said INS officials had been making a "rough estimate" a year ago when they predicted the program would attract 2 million undocumented residents.  
He said the one-year amnesty application period which ended at midnight Wednesday would not be prolonged even in the face of two court rulings. He said the courts "have both been extremely narrow in their holdings."  
A federal appeals court in Manhattan ex-

tended the midnight deadline for aliens with children born in the United States who are receiving welfare benefits. A federal judge in Washington extended the midnight deadline for a broader group — those aliens who overstayed their visas.  
Hispanic groups say some 100,000 aliens could be eligible under that ruling, but Nelson questioned the figure.  
"The numbers we believe are very small and there's also a lot of question as to what the

figures are," the INS commissioner said.  
"No one should read these court decisions as any indication that they're going to be extensions here, other than there might be some very narrow ones," Nelson added.  
But Charles Kamasaki, director of policy analysis for the National Council of La Raza, a Hispanic advocacy group, said it was possible there could be "a crazy quilt pattern of judicial extensions" for the amnesty program, which

Congress refused to extend last week.  
Kamasaki pointed to class-action cases in federal courts in California, one involving people who were out of the country for extended periods after 1982 and the other for people who left the United States briefly after the amnesty program began and returned.  
In addition, he said, there have been 16 changes in the INS regulations since the amnesty program went in effect last May.

# Bush pledges farm industry, water protection in Boise visit

BOISE (AP) — Vice President George Bush promised to talk about farm and Western problems in a campaign appearance here Thursday evening, and he did just that in a speech to a crowd of about 1,200.

He promised to protect farm industries such as Idaho's sugarbeet farmers from unfair, subsidized competition. He said he likely would support the Special-Isotope Separator proposed for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

And the vice president said if he's elected, he will tell the federal bureaucracy that his policy is that "water belongs to the states, not the federal government."

Bush squeezed in a round of news media interviews, about a half-hour spent working through a crowd of cheering hands and a brief speech in Boise. About 1,200 turned out for the speech.

He got a warm, enthusiastic reception in Boise — in a state which gave the Reagan-Bush ticket more than 72 percent of the vote four years ago.

In a "regional roundtable" with a handful of reporters, Bush was asked about farmer concerns that the administration might abandon tariffs or import quotas protecting protect domestic sugarbeet growers from subsidized foreign competition.

"It is my feeling that the American farmer can compete with anyone," the vice president said. "But they can't compete against subsidized sugar."

He said one of the first things he would do if elected would be to call an economic summit on agriculture, aimed mainly at expanding markets.

"We are not going to make unilateral concessions," he said.

Sen. James McClure, who introduced Bush, a close friend, presented him with a set of personalized Idaho centennial license plates declaring, "Bush 88." Bush said he'd have to buy a car to put them on.

Senate President Pro Tem James Risch, R-Boise, state chairman of the Bush campaign, told Republicans to unite behind the vice president.

"We have had a spirited primary, and it is over," he said.

Bush was asked if he supported the proposed Special Isotope Separator designed for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

"He said he didn't know all the details of the SIS project, but would support it."

"We have to have facilities to keep our arsenal strong," he said. "We can't let our guard down."

Today, Bush leaves the Magic Valley in late morning for similar appearances in Billings, Mont.

When Bush has run with President Ronald Reagan in Idaho, he's done extremely well. In 1980, the Reagan-Bush ticket carried Idaho by 180,000 votes, getting 66.4 percent. Four years ago, the margin was 189,000 votes and Reagan-Bush polled 72.36 percent. That was second only to Utah in margin of victory in the presidential election.

Republicans have won presidential elections in Idaho since 1968, and most political leaders concede that if Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis wins the Democratic Party nomination, there's little chance he will defeat Bush in Idaho.

State GOP Chairman Blake Hall said when he visited with Bush a couple of weeks ago, the vice president said he particularly wanted to win back the 2nd District congressional seat in Idaho. It has been held the last four years by Democrat Richard Stallings, but was held by Republicans for the 20 years before that.

# Snowpack figures emphasize continuing drought

BOISE (AP) — Despite April's heavy showers, the latest snowpack measurements from the U.S. Soil Conservation Service show that Idaho's drought continues.

"Maybe we're over the below-normal precipitation pattern we've been in, but we're not really out of the woods as far as the water supply situation is concerned," Jerry Beard, snow survey supervisor for the Soil Conservation Service, said.

The SCS's May 1 snowpack survey shows more snow at higher elevations than a year ago. But that is offset by reservoir levels pulled well below normal by two consecutive dry winters, Beard said.

The snowpack was lower last year, but more water was stored in the reservoirs from previous years.

Precipitation was above normal in almost every part of the state last month, Beard said. It ranged from 159 percent of normal in northern Idaho to 95 percent of normal south of the Snake River. The Boise area received 136 percent of normal.

Unfortunately, that precipitation has not showed up as surface runoff. Beard said the water has been absorbed by the dry soil instead of making its way into streams and reservoirs.

"It will help range conditions and recharge the groundwater, but it certainly doesn't help someone trying to fill a reservoir," he said.

"The Boise River basin, for instance, dropped from 62 percent of normal snowpack on April 1 to 46 percent on May 1.

Ordinarily, that should indicate a good runoff, Beard said. Instead, the river is flowing at 63 percent of normal because of the high absorption rate.

And it is forecast to flow at 53 percent of normal through July, said Bill Odenbreit, a hydrologist at the Idaho Department of Water Resources.

Still, it is better than the situation in south-central Idaho, one of the driest areas in the state. Flows on the Big Wood River, for example, are 38 percent of normal, the National Weather Service said.

Beard said that river is running clear, not muddy. "It doesn't show any impact of runoff," he said.

The Big Wood watershed is only 44 percent of normal, said Gale Roberts of the SCS in Hailey. The Little Wood and the Lost River watersheds both are at 33 percent of normal, he said.

"Spring and summer rains will make or break some of those basins," Beard said.

Stream flows will peak in mid-May, Beard predicted, about two weeks earlier than normal but later than last year. Statewide streamflow forecasts will be released in a few days.

Jack Hansen, chief of water operation and recreation for the Bureau of Reclamation, said Lucky Peak, Arrowrock and Anderson Ranch reservoirs collectively are usually 72 percent full on May 3. Last year they were 80 percent full.

This year, he said, they are 50 percent full.

Beard said Lake Lowell in Canyon County is at 75 percent of normal, compared to 83 percent last year. Elsewhere in southern Idaho, Magic Reservoir is at 34 percent of normal while Cascade Reservoir is at 107 percent of normal.

Beard said the panic over the second dry year in a row has subsided. Irrigators "are concentrating on how they're going to cope. They're making the best of a bad situation."

# BLM will accept help monitoring rangelands

BOISE (AP) — If drought conditions continue this summer, the Bureau of Land Management may need help monitoring livestock grazing on southern Idaho rangeland and streamside areas, BLM officials say.

David Brunner, BLM district manager, told the Ada County Fish and Game League the BLM will gladly accept offers from clubs and volunteers who wish to help monitor livestock grazing.

Brunner said the Boise District has six range employees charged with monitoring 200,000 acres of critical streamside habitat over 5.2 million acres this summer.

During a drought, cattle are drawn to streams and creeks and as a result, may destroy streamside habitat, which helps support hundreds of wildlife species. That cattle also foul the water.

Fish and Game League members criticized the BLM for allowing some rangeland and streamside areas to become grazed into the ground in last year's drought.

"The area out there has been grazed to death," said Bill Mullins of Boise. "We see (the range) being destroyed, but you say you don't have the management personnel to do your job."

"We ought to say, let's cut down on the number of cows grazing in this country," he said.

The BLM can not reduce the number of livestock grazing on public lands without five years of monitoring data to confirm the range is being overgrazed, Brunner said. However, grazing can be reduced during times of drought or other emergencies, he said.

Stan Boyd, executive director of the Idaho Wool Growers Association, denied that the BLM let livestock operators abuse rangeland during last summer's drought.

"They're right on top of it," Boyd said.

"They're all over us all the time," Boyd conceded—some areas were overgrazed during the drought, but added, "This year, we're aware of it, and we'll be ready."

Brunner said grazing permittees in the BLM's Owyhee and Brunson Resource areas were told to delay for two weeks before releasing livestock onto public range.

"It shouldn't come as a shock" that livestock operators may have to release late and come off public range early, Brunner said. "We've already told them up-front, and I haven't had one operator who has come to me to complain."

# Boise Project board raises allocation of water

BOISE (AP) — The Boise Project Board of Control has voted to raise the guaranteed allocation of water to irrigators in the districts it governs to 1 acre-foot per acre.

That still is only about one-third the normal 3 acre-foot farmers and others normally receive, but is an improvement over the board's initial allocation of 0.773 acre-feet made in April.

Board manager Carl Padour said a wet April meant a net gain for the Boise River reservoir system.

# Finals streak into Moscow

MOSCOW (AP) — Final examinations at the University of Idaho have apparently revived the once-popular fad of streaking.

Moscow police arrested one student and were still looking for another man Thursday after two officers witnessed a pair of naked men racing through a street intersection.

Patrolmen John Roys and Neil Odenberg were discussing stolen street signs with two other university students when the men raced pass early Thursday morning. One eluded capture, but student Dwight Boshaw, 21, was charged with indecent exposure and released on \$100 bond.

"What can I say?" Prosecutor Craig Mossmir commented. "It's finals. The pressure is really on."

# Chair to Kellogg

BOISE (AP) — Rep. Hilde Kellogg, R-Post Falls, has been appointed as the new chairman of the House Local Government Committee.

House Speaker Tom Boyd, R-Geneseo, announced the appointment on Thursday. Mrs. Kellogg replaces former representative Robert Fry, who resigned to serve on the state Tax Commission.

But unless there is a special session, the appointment will be in name only. The Legislature adjourned for the year at the end of March.

"The increase we had in storage since the start of irrigation season," he said. "The river production was greater than the demand, so we could store some water."

Padour said the current cool weather has both advantages and disadvantages. Irrigators who use reservoir water want the weather to warm

up and stay warm, ensuring a quick snowmelt and a runoff that can be stored.

But those who depend on natural river flow prefer the cool weather because it slows the snowmelt and will make the flows last longer.

Last year, the board's initial allocation was 1.25 acre-feet, and it eventually delivered an average of 1.6 acre-feet, Padour said the board declined to estimate this year's eventual total.

At its June meeting it will look at what is in storage and adjust the allocation accordingly, he said.

"They didn't want to forecast," he said. "They just decided to work with what they have."

So now there is an uproar when it is disclosed that the astrologer's divining arts are not unknown in the White House. Nothing serious, you understand, no questions of policy are governed by them, just matters of scheduling, and perhaps the timing of the signing of a treaty.

Not to worry. Larger illusions have been let loose in the land than the signs of the zodiac.

ABC World News Tonight with Peter Jennings on April 7 aired a piece of investigative journalism which indicates that a guns-for-drugs connection existed in the network to supply arms to the Contras, prior to the Ollie North operation.

According to the ABC report, "For three years, from 1983 to 1986 the Contras fought the Marxist government of Nicaragua with weapons made in the communist bloc, bought by Israeli agents with American financial support and delivered by a U.S. ferry air lift which wound up, incredibly enough, delivering illegal drugs to the United States."

Later in the report, ABC's chief correspondent Richard Threlkeld asks rhetorically, "And what was the American connection in all of this?" then answers, "Our sources tell us it included the late William Casey's CIA and ... Felix Rodriguez, a former CIA agent and

counter insurgency expert, active in aiding the Contras. Although Rodriguez denies it, Jose Blandon, Noriega's former intelligence aide, confirms there was such a network and says Rodriguez was in fact a key figure."

Evidence shows that a Columbian drug cartel with its own airplanes and supply network in place was contracted for a covert operation to run guns to the Contras. Presumably, the drug cartel's payoff was free passage of drugs into the United States. It is equally possible that some of the money from drug sales was used to buy more weapons for the Contras.

On April 8, The New York Times carried a story about testimony given the day before by

three Nicaraguan rebels in the Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee on terrorism, narcotics, and international operations chaired by John Kerry, D-Mass. The testimony, although conflicting, agreed on one central point: A Contra faction took contributions from convicted drug dealer, George Morales, in exchange for refueling his planes that were carrying drugs to the United States. More importantly, to quote the Times story, "Mr. Morales and a pilot who worked for him told the committee that they had exchanged cocaine from the Contras for guns with CIA officials."

In May 1986, six months before the public knew anything about the Iran-Contra affair, the Christie Institute filed a civil lawsuit against a number of private individuals behind these covert Contra operations. Listed among the defendants in this lawsuit are retired Major Gen. Richard Seard, retired Major Gen. John Singlaub, former CIA officials Thomas Clines and Theodore Shackley, Ira-

nian entrepreneur Albert Hakim, and Contra chief Adolfo Calero. While those who watched the Iran-Contra hearings are familiar with the names of these defendants, most are not familiar with the institute which filed the suit.

The Christie Institute is an interfaith center for law and public policy, located in Washington, D.C. The institute is a non-profit organization, supported by foundations, mainstream churches and private donations. The Christie Institute grew out of the legal work involved in the Karen Silkwood case, the case which alerted the public to the dangers of the nuclear industry.

Since Silkwood, the institute has won civil suits against the Ku Klux Klan and the American Nazi Party. On behalf of citizens of Harrisburg, Pa., it prevented the dumping of radioactive wastes into the Susquehanna River from the Three Mile Island nuclear reactor. And it won a dismissal of murder charges in a frame-up against the first black mayor of Tehuila,

Miss., since the Civil War. This brief summary should establish the center's credentials. The attorneys and investigators who work for the Christie Institute are neither left-wing nor right-wing crazies.

In January of last year, the chief judge of Miami's U.S. District Court, Judge James Lawrence King, agreed to hear the Christie Institute's lawsuit under RICO, the federal racketeering statute. The case is scheduled to go to trial on June 27.

In filing evidence for a lawsuit, the institute subpoenaed documents and conducted over 40 depositions. On March 25, the institute submitted a 300-page Declaration of Plaintiffs' Council in support of a motion to postpone the trial date in order to investigate certain illegal activities further. The declaration contains powerful interlocking evidence indicating a connection between U.S. government officials or former officials and drug trafficking. This evidence is not only taken from depositions but from congressional testimony, affidavits, news stories, memos, and congressional reports.

True, until the trial we won't hear the other side of the story. Yet, from diverse sources and different investigators, we are piecing a pattern. It isn't pretty; it's devastating. While the president smiled into TV cameras and told us how we are winning the war against drugs, some covert operative somewhere in Central America was fueling an old DC-6 loaded with 3,000 kilos of cocaine, headed eventually for the streets of New York, City and Los Angeles.

Americans are paying the price of government secrecy — the unchecked government actions that are its inevitable result.

Meanwhile, a letter from First Lady Nancy Reagan arrived yesterday to tell me that May 8 to 14 has been designated as National "Just Say No To Drugs" Week.

What do you do when the pusher behind the dealer in the street is a government operative? Is it possible for a citizen to "Just Say No to the CIA"? Not even Congress has been able to do that.

# Explosion at Shell Oil refinery kills one

NORCO, La. (AP) — A spectacular explosion and fire that ripped off roofs and doors rocked a Shell Oil Co. refinery Thursday, killing one worker, injuring 42 people and leaving six people missing, authorities said.

"It went boom, and then boom again," said Adam Mashia, 65, who lives less than a mile from the plant. "It knocked me to the floor and as I was getting up, it knocked me down again."

About 2,500 residents of nearby homes were evacuated while the fire raged out of control for 5½ hours, but most were allowed to return at mid-morning. The fire was under control but still burning at mid-afternoon, and Shell officials said they planned to let it burn itself out.

Rescue workers would have to wait for the fire to go out and the rubble to cool to enter the refinery, said Fred Foster, manager of the Norco-Shell complex. He said there was no speculation on the cause.

The force of the blast left widespread damage throughout town, and heavy black smoke hung in the sky. Virtually all windows were shattered, doors were blown out of their frames and roofs lifted out of place.

"I've never seen so much damage in Norco, even when hurricanes have hit," said Ikey Lucas, director of the

St. Charles Emergency Operations.

The shockwave from the 330 a.m. blast shattered plate-glass windows as far away as New Orleans, 20 miles down the Mississippi River. People 45 miles away said they felt the blast.

Alan Migliore, who lives about three blocks from the refinery complex, said: "I was sleeping in the kitchen and it knocked me to the floor. From there, I looked up and could see that the whole area of the Shell was on fire. ... It blew both of the front doors in, and the deadbolts took the frames out."

Damage at the refinery complex alone was expected to run into the millions of dollars, according to Shell spokesman Phil Schwin. The accident ruptured the catalytic cracker, which converts crude oil to gasoline, and seriously damaged control rooms and

other facilities.

It also damaged the water system, which hampered firefighting efforts, officials said.

The refinery sits amid the heavily industrialized corridor along the Mississippi River between New Orleans and Baton Rouge. Next to it is the Shell chemical plant, which had broken windows from the blast.

Just inside the gates of the complex

was a sign with the familiar Shell logo, saying "Complex Safe Days 616." As the fire continued, workers took the sign down.

Wendy Jacobs, a Shell spokeswoman, said 92 of the plant's 1,600 employees were on duty when the explosion occurred.

The dead man was identified as a Shell employee, but his name was not made public.

## City's worst fire kills 1, hurts 40

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A helicopter plucked office workers from the roof of the West's tallest building as fire gutted four floors of the 62-story First Interstate Bank Tower and left one person dead and 40 injured early Thursday.

A sprinkler system was being installed in the 869-foot skyscraper but was not quite complete.

"It looked like Dante's Inferno," fire Capt. Steve Varney said. "Everything that was burnable burned down. It was just metal and that was red hot."

A small but undetermined number of people were working in the office tower when the blaze broke out about 10:30 p.m. Wednesday. During the workday the building is occupied by 3,500 people.

"It could have been a Towering Inferno." It could have been worse," said City Councilman John Ferraro. The 1974 movie "The Towering Inferno" depicted a Los Angeles office-building fire.

Some workers fled down stairs in thick smoke. Others fled to the roof as the fire raged around the 12th through 15th floors and rained glass and flaming debris on downtown streets.

Four helicopters with searchlights swooped around the rooftop, and one helicopter lifted 10 people to safety, officers said.

"We came out and we couldn't

see anything but smoke," said Radmila Radich, a cleaning woman who escaped.

Firefighters wearing air tanks had to lug hoses down stairs from the roof and up from the ground to attack the flames. Some air tanks ran out, and firefighters had to do without them, said Fire Chief Donald Manning.

"They had 2,000-degree temperatures they were fighting," Manning said of the 300 firefighters. "The individuals in there were committed so far in on the fire that they would run out of air, they could not back out. They had to stay there and fight that fire or they knew, as they told me, they were gonna die."

No damage estimate was immediately available. The cause of the blaze was under investigation, said Fire Cmdr. Donald Anthony.

If a sprinkler system had been operating, "it would probably would have contained the fire to a very small area," Anthony said.

A preliminary inspection indicated the structural framework remained sound, said Frank Kroker, an official of the Department of Building and Safety.

A cleaning supervisor, Zora Imamovic, said that while she and five others made their way from the 58th floor to the roof to be flown to safety.

## Covert dumping in lake suspected

NEW YORK (AP) — Measurements of historical levels of radioactive carbon in California's remote Mono Lake suggest that nuclear waste may have been secretly dumped there in the 1950s and perhaps again in the 1970s, researchers said Thursday.

"We think radiocarbon had to be added to that lake in large quantities," said Wallace Broecker of Columbia University's Lamont-Doherty Geological Observatory in Palisades, N.Y.

The researchers used various techniques to rule out other possible sources of radioactive carbon, such as atmospheric testing of atomic bombs. "Increases found in other nearby lakes and in the ocean can be attributed to the bomb testing, but Mono Lake's increase is far too great for that," Broecker said in a telephone interview.

Mono Lake is one of the nation's most important bird sanctuaries and a scenic wonder that attracts hundreds of thousands of visitors each year, said Martha Davis, executive director of the Mono Lake Committee in Los Angeles, an environmental organization formed to protect the lake.

Millions of birds either make their homes there or use the lake as a way station during long migrations, Davis

said. It is dotted with strange columns of tufa, a limestone rock built up from calcium deposited by the lake.

The principal threat to the lake is the diversion of water upstream to supply the water needs of Los Angeles. The radioactive dumping that Broecker and his colleagues think is likely to have taken place poses no threat to humans or wildlife at the lake, Broecker said. The radiation levels are too low.

Residents of Los Angeles are drinking water from streams supplying the lake, not from the lake itself, which is extremely salty.

The lake's levels of the radioactive form of carbon known as carbon-14 have increased by 60 percent since the mid-1950s, Broecker said — about four times more than would have been expected from fallout from atomic bomb tests.

The radioactive waste that Broecker thinks was dumped there could have come from radioactive samples used in medicine, from nuclear reactors or from nuclear weapons research, Broecker said.

"In the 1950s, people had lots of these things, and what were they doing with them?" Broecker said.

# Briefly

## Medi-Cal abortions upheld

**SAN FRANCISCO (AP)** — The conservative-dominated California Supreme Court refused Thursday to let the Legislature cut Medi-Cal payments for abortions for poor women, a stinging defeat for anti-abortion groups.

It is the 10th straight year that state courts have overturned the Legislature's budget restrictions, which would have eliminated state funding for all but a small fraction of Medi-Cal abortions.

"It means that over 80,000 poor women in California are going to continue to have the right to abortion, and that the Legislature can't restrict their reproductive choices to only childbirth and sterilization," said Martha Kegel, associate director of the American Civil Liberties Union of Northern California.

## Memorial week scrapped

**PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)** — A city commissioner has withdrawn a resolution calling for a week of official mourning for Benjamin Linder, the former Portland resident shot to death by Nicaraguan rebels.

Commissioner Mike Lindberg withdrew the resolution at Wednesday's City Council meeting, which about three dozen people, many wearing badges reading "No Honor for Treason," attended.

Lindberg later said he withdrew the resolution because he didn't want the hearing to become a forum for a debate over U.S. policy in Central America.

"I was afraid that what was supposed to be a simple memorial would end up being hurtful and damaging to the family," he said.

Linder, 27, was killed in an attack by the U.S.-backed rebels, known as Contras, on April 23, 1987, while he was working on a hydroelectric project in rural Nicaragua.

## Saliva blocks AIDS virus

**CHICAGO (AP)** — Preliminary studies have found that human saliva contains a factor that blocks the AIDS virus from infecting cells, indicating the body may have a natural defense against the deadly disease, researchers said Thursday.

Isolating and understanding the inhibitory element in saliva may help researchers learn how to naturally prevent transmission of the virus, said Phillip, head of clinical studies at the National Institute of Dental Research and senior investigator in the study.

A report on the study appears in the May issue of the Chicago-based Journal of the American Dental Association.

## Wider airline probe sought

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — A House panel on Thursday approved a resolution urging the Department of Transportation to broaden its probe of troubled Eastern Airlines and its parent company, Texas Air Corp.

On a voice vote, the Public Works and Transportation Committee sent the legislation to the full House, giving the carrier's labor unions another victory in their ongoing war against the company's executives.

"The managements of Texas Air and Eastern have embarked on a campaign of intimidation, threats and unfair labor practices ...," said Rep. Glenn Anderson, D-Calif., the committee's chairman. "There are valid questions about the safety of Eastern when employees and management are preoccupied with the labor dispute and may be distracted from their duties."

## New NSA head nominated

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — President Reagan has nominated the admiral in charge of Navy intelligence operations to become the next director of the super-secret National Security Agency, the Pentagon said Thursday.

Assuming Senate confirmation, Rear Adm. William O. Studeman will be promoted to vice admiral and replace Army Lt. Gen. William E. Odom, who is retiring on Aug. 1.

## U.S. deplores Polish violence

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The White House said Thursday it deplored Poland's use of violence to quell the latest outbreak of labor strikes and suggested the Polish government seek "a dialogue" with the Solidarity labor movement.

Taking note of reports that Polish police on Wednesday used percussion grenades against strikers to end a 10-day walkout at a Krakow steel mill, White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater said the administration was "watching with concern."

# Public teacher pay averaging \$28,031

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Public school teachers now earn \$28,031 on average and in 10 states the typical teacher earns more than \$30,000 a year, the National Education Association said Thursday.

The average classroom teacher with 15 years of experience, got a 5.6 percent pay raise last year that boosted her or his salary by \$1,477 from the 1986-87 level of \$26,534.

The union did not estimate how much salaries will rise this fall, but if teachers get another 5.6 percent increase, they will be earning \$29,600 on average for the 1988-89 school year.

Teacher salaries have risen sharply in the 1980s amid widespread concern about lagging standards in the class-

room and waning interest among college students in entering the profession. Recently, however, with starting salaries topping \$20,000 in some places, interest in teaching has picked up.

Secretary of Education William J. Bennett, in a critique last week on the impact of school reforms, said teacher salaries have risen 20 percent after adjusting for inflation since 1980-81.

But the NEA said that over the past decade, including the steep inflation years of the late 1970s, teacher salaries are up only 7.3 percent after inflation.

The union said there were 2,275,209 classroom teachers in the public schools this year, 25,251 more than in 1986-87.

# 2 teams climb Mt. Everest, telecast from 'top of world'

KATMANDU, Nepal (AP) — Two teams reached the summit of Mount Everest from opposite sides Thursday and broadcast stunning pictures of azure skies and the craggy, snow-covered Himalayas rising above the clouds at the top of the world.

It was the first time two parties had scaled the world's highest mountain simultaneously, and it was the first live telecast from the summit.

The 10 climbers slept and congratulated each other. Some fell to their knees after wading through waist-deep snow to the 29,028-foot peak.

They were from Japan, China and Nepal, the nations that received the live broadcast.

"This is the greatest event in the history of climbing," said Kunga Sherpa, the leader of the team that climbed from the Nepal side, as a camera recorded the breathtaking panorama.

Images were relayed by satellite from a small camera attached to the

helmet of Japanese climber Susumu Nakamura.

"We made it!" the climbers gasped, their voices rasping in the thin air. Most wore goggles and oxygen masks along with their red, blue and yellow parkas. Eyebrows were coated with ice in temperatures of about 30 degrees below zero.

They stretched bright-colored banners across the summit and scooped dry, powdery snow into small bottles. One poured whiskey on the snow to honor mountaineers who have died trying to conquer Everest, including Hidetaka Mizukoshi. He died of a heart attack on a climb last month.

The teams began their assaults on Everest last month from base camps on the south face in Nepal and the north face in Tibet.

After the rendezvous, in another first, three climbers who scaled the south face descended by the north and three who ascended the north face went down via the south.

More than 200 people were involved in the project, the most ever for an Everest expedition.

It was timed to mark the 35th anniversary of the first conquering of Everest — on May 29, 1953, by Edmund Hillary of New Zealand and Tenzing Norgay, his Sherpa guide. Nearly 200 climbers have reached the summit since then.

Sir Edmund who was knighted for his feat, could not be reached for comment Thursday. Earlier this week he said of the simultaneous assaults, "I think some of the expeditions nowadays are on the gimmicky side," but conceded that "it's one method of raising money."

"The ones I admire are those who do a tough and difficult new route and do it cleanly and with style," he said.

Hillary now is his country's ambassador to India, Nepal and Bangladesh. Tenzing, called "Tiger of the Snows" by other Sherpas, died in 1985.

# Hostages welcomed home amid speculation about deal

PARIS (AP) — Three Frenchmen freed by pro-Iranian kidnappers in Beirut came home Friday to a jubilant nation and families and friends who had awaited the day for three years. Premier Jacques Chirac hinted that France might restore diplomatic relations with Tehran.

Diplomats Marcel Carton, 62, Marcel Fontaine, 45, and journalist Jean Paul Kaufmann, 44, arrived at the military airport of Villacoublay outside Paris in a government jet.

Iran said its intervention brought about the release of the three. Tehran Television, monitored in Cyprus, quoted Ali Reza Moayyeri, a deputy prime minister for political affairs, as saying Iran interceded "for humanitarian reasons."

French government officials denied they struck a deal for the hostages' release.

Carton, Fontaine and Kaufmann appeared ashen and shaky as they walked slowly down the airplane steps.

Kaufmann drew back uncertainly when his 13-year-old son, Alexander, approached him. Then, when he recognized him, Kaufmann's expression changed to one of delight at how much the boy had grown.

Alexander put his hands on his father's shoulders and looked him in the face silently. Their eyes filled with tears.

"As we all know, the liberation of our hostages falls into the framework of our relations with Iran," said Chirac, who greeted the men at the airport. "It's the authorities in Tehran who intervened with the captors so that they would free our countrymen."

France and Iran broke diplomatic relations July 17 after an Iranian Em-

bassy employee, Wahid Gordji, refused to submit to questioning about bombings in Paris in September 1986. Gordji was allowed to leave Paris two days after two French hostages were freed in Beirut.

"It's an incredible day," Kaufmann told reporters. "But it's also a day which remains overshadowed because we are just three."

The journalist for the weekly magazine L'Evenement de Jeudi said earlier that Michel Seurat, the 39-year-old researcher captured with him on May 22, 1985, probably died of cancer, rather than having been executed, as claimed by the kidnappers.

Carton and Fontaine were kidnapped March 22, 1985.

Kaufmann praised Seurat's courage and said Seurat encouraged his companions during his early days in captivity.

# Troops put halt to Arab trade

TAPPAH. Occupied West Bank (AP) — Israeli troops barking orders through megaphones demanded a three-day halt to all West Bank commerce Thursday and threatened to weld shut the shops of defiant Arab merchants.

Near the village of Beita, where an Israeli teen-ager was slain last month, hundreds of Jewish settlers lined along a mountain path waving Israeli flags. They chanted "expel the Arabs" and vowed not to leave the occupied West Bank.

In the occupied Gaza Strip, troops fired tear gas at about 150 children who set tires ablaze and raised the Palestinian flag to protest the army's closing of Aab schools.

Israeli troops ordered the ban on West Bank commerce to punish Arab residents for a one-day strike Wednesday that was called by the Palestine Liberation Organization.

Soldiers ordered shops to stay closed until Sunday, and they threatened to weld shut the shops of merchants who disobeyed the mandate.

In Jericho, the army shut down the West Bank's largest vegetable market, and stores were ordered shut in Nablus, Jenin, Tulkarem, Hebron and Bethlehem.

In Nablus, troops erected roadblocks and prevented Arab taxis and buses from leaving the city to punish residents for adhering to Wednesday's work stoppage, which paralyzed the occupied territories.

Businessman Saeed Kenaan of Nablus said the army action was aimed at creating dissension between Palestinians and the underground leaders who order the strikes.

"It's clear the Israelis are trying to drive a wedge between the people and the leaders," Kenaan said. "But people are aware of the Israeli games."

In Gaza City, scores of school children chanting "C.O. yes, Israel no" held the Palestinian flag outside a school run by the United Nations Relief and Works Agency, an Arab reporter said. The Palestinian flag is outlawed in Israel.

Troops fired tear gas to disperse the children, who erected barricades of boulders and set tires ablaze in front of the school, the reporter said.

# Israeli-backed militiamen blow up Lebanon homes

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israeli-backed Lebanese militiamen blew up dozens of homes in a southern Lebanon village Thursday in the final stage of an assault by Israeli troops against Arab guerrillas.

Defense Minister Yitzhak Rabin said more similar raids by the militiamen could be expected.

Israeli television said the South Lebanon Army destroyed about 30 houses in the village of Maydoun, which Israeli officials said was used as a base by the radical Shiite Moslem militia Hezbollah, or Party of God.

Israeli troops seized about 20 suspected guerrillas and brought them back to Israel during the two-day thrust into Lebanon that ended Wednesday, Israeli sources said on condition of anonymity.

Israel said at least 40 guerrillas were killed in the operation, most of them Hezbollah members killed Wednesday in Maydoun, two miles north of Israel's self-proclaimed security zone in southern Lebanon.

Two of the three Israeli soldiers killed in the assault

were buried Thursday. Sheik Subhi Tofelli, a Hezbollah leader, said only 10 of his guerrillas were killed. He also said the Hezbollah would avenge the attack.

"We shall retaliate. The battle with Israel is still in its initial stage," he told a news conference in Mashqra, four miles north of Maydoun. "The torch of resistance will continue to burn despite Israel's attacks."

Lebanon protested the raid and requested an urgent meeting of the U.N. Security Council to condemn the operation. U.N. officials said the 15-member council likely would meet Friday.

Lebanese Ambassador Rachid Fakhoury, in a letter made public Thursday, said the Lebanese government holds Israel, the Security Council and the United Nations responsible for this fresh act of aggression.

According to Lebanese reports, Israeli soldiers blew up homes and bunkers in Maydoun after the fighting ended and used bulldozers to bury the rubble and the bodies of the dead guerrillas.

# 17 killed, 23 freed after bloody assault on grotto hideaway

NOUMEA, New Caledonia (AP) — An assault team stormed a secluded island cave in this French Pacific territory Thursday and freed 23 hostages in a bloody rescue mission that left 17 people dead, authorities said.

Fifteen of the dead were Melanesian separatists holding the captives, and two were rescuers, said Bernard Pons, France's minister-for-overseas territories.

The team pelted the cave with tear gas canisters, forcing most of the estimated 30 captors out, Pons told reporters in the capital, Noumea. A "particularly violent battle" ensued, he said.

Three members of the assault team and three captors were injured in the nearly seven-hour battle in the thick

underbrush of Ouvea island in the Loyalty island group, he said.

The hostages — 22 gendarmes, or armed police, and an assistant prosecutor — were seized in two groups on April 22 and April 27 by Melanesian separatists seeking independence for the island and protesting French-dominated regional elections April 24.

The hostages freed their manacled hands with a key that had been snatched in earlier and defended themselves with two pistols also obtained before the attack, Pons said.

"Taking advantage of the smoke created by tear gas bombs, the hostages were able to escape through a chimney in the back of the cave," he said.

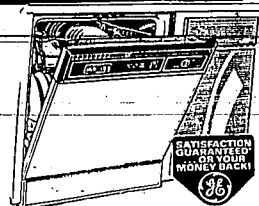

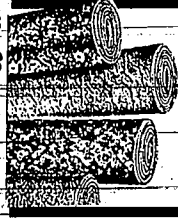

## A-plant's far away, city is assured

HONG KONG (AP) — China's construction of a nuclear power plant 43 miles away does not require Hong Kong to draw up an emergency evacuation plan, a report released Thursday said.

The report, drawn up by the British colony by the United Kingdom Atomic Energy Authority, said Hong Kong is far enough away from the Daya Bay plant that only monitoring and possibly control of fission products was needed in case of an accident, a government statement said.

The report called for establishment of a hot line between the Daya Bay Control Center and Hong Kong's Royal Observatory.

The Daya Bay plant is scheduled for completion in 1991. After the Chernobyl nuclear plant accident in the Soviet Union in 1986, nearly 1 million Hong Kong's 5.7 million residents signed petitions calling for the scrapping of Daya Bay.

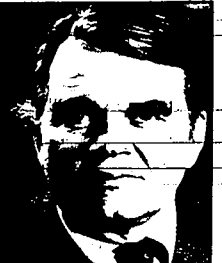

CBS had "60 Minutes" anchor Mike Wallace read a letter on the air Sunday from race-car driver Mario Andretti praising Rain-X. But Wallace also noted that Andretti is a spokesman for Unelko.

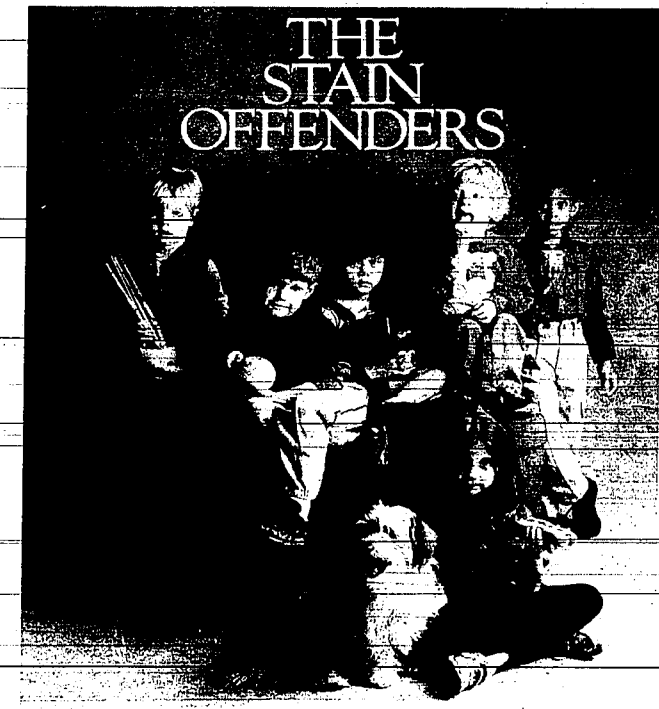

"I'm frightened that it will end, and that people won't like me anymore," Broderick said in an interview published in Sunday's *Parade* magazine. "I have hard time deciding what to do next. It's always agonizing for me."

The 26-year-old star of "Bixie Blues" also said he still has mixed feelings about his car accident in Northern Ireland last year which killed two women.

"Traffic accidents happen all the time. I don't personally feel responsible for the accident," said Broderick. "But of course in some ways I do. That's what's so upsetting. All I can do is be with people whom I love and who love me, and try to go on with my life."

**Rocket joints pass test**

BRIGHAM CITY, Utah (AP)—Morton Thiokol Inc. engineers say two of three joints on the company's redesigned space shuttle booster rocket passed their preliminary qualifying tests with flying colors.

Dave Mobley, NASA deputy project manager for the redesign effort, said Thursday that engineers have inspected both the aft and center field joints and found both had worked during April 22's full-scale rocket test-firing as designed. Results of tests on the forward joint are expected Friday.

Mobley said the engineers found one of the center field joint which had an intentional flaw built into it during the test-firing at the Morton Thiokol plant 25 miles west of here, did its job in preventing the escape of super-hot gases.

"We had an intentional flaw in that one to test our sealing ability and it did exactly what we wanted it to do," Mobley said.

Two more full-scale qualifying tests of the booster are planned for June and July, and the shuttle launch is tentatively set for Aug. 4.

He said the center field joint flaw, in the J-seal, allowed gases to reach insulation and the joint's O-ring, but the ring held.

"There was no damage to the O-ring at all," he said. "There was no evidence the gas got past" the ring.

Failure of an O-ring seal is blamed for allowing the gas to escape from a booster used on the Jan. 28, 1986, launch of the shuttle Challenger. A presidential commission found the gas ignited an exterior fuel tank, triggering the explosion that destroyed the Challenger and its seven-member crew about a minute after liftoff.

**Lafferty due new warrant for execution**

PROVO, Utah (AP)—Condemned killer Ronald Lafferty, who claims he murdered his sister-in-law and her baby on orders from God, will appear in 4th District Court today for issuance of a new death warrant.

Assistant Utah Attorney General Sandra Sjogren said she will ask Judge Boyd Park to set an execution date because she has not heard from Lafferty's attorneys that he will continue his appeals.

Defense attorney Gary Wright said he intends to file a new appeal with the U.S. Supreme Court this week, but Sjogren said she has not formally been notified of any new appeals.

Lafferty has until May 18 to appeal to the high court, which customarily issues stays of execution during such proceedings.

Ronald Lafferty and his brother, Dan, were convicted in the 1984 slayings of Brenda Wright Lafferty, formerly of Kimberly, Idaho, and her infant daughter in American Fork.

Ronald Lafferty, who claimed to have had a revelation ordering the victims to die, his brother was given life in prison.

Under Utah law, condemned killers have the choice of lethal injection or firing squad.

**Nevada woman dies in collision**

POCATELLO (AP)—A 35-year-old Elko, Nev. woman, Leona Thompson, was killed Wednesday afternoon in a traffic accident at a rural intersection near here.

Idaho State Police officers said the accident occurred at 5:26 p.m. after a car driven by Leroy Bartu, 43, Pocatello, pulled away from a stop sign at Cemetery Road and struck the Thompson vehicle.

Mrs. Thompson was declared dead at the scene. Her three-year-old daughter, Lynet, Thompson, who was in a child safety seat, was unharmed. Bartu was not injured and two passengers in his car were treated and released at a local hospital.

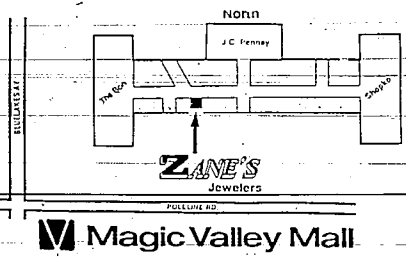

## System favors abuse offenders, critics charge

**TWIN FALLS** — When an 8-year-old Twin Falls girl told her teacher last June 4 she'd been sexually molested the night before, Idaho's criminal justice system lumbered into action.

The successful case featured the teacher reporting the incident immediately and Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter filing charges. A jury later convicted the 41-year-old molester, Gary G. Cliff, after the girl testified against him.

But the girl had to wait to testify until February, after numerous trial delays, and sentencing is still pending nearly a year after the crime.

"The court system is barbaric with its blasted time delays," said Donna Stalley, a court-appointed guardian helping children through these cases.

The case was spotlighted during a governor's Commission on Children and Youth hearing Wednesday that attracted 76 parents, lawyers and children's advocates. The

subject was child abuse, which is drawing increased community attention and thus better reporting, as in the case above. There were 844 incidents of physical or sexual abuse or neglect reported to authorities in Magic Valley during 1987.

While reporting is increasing, critics said the criminal justice system seemingly protects offenders more than their victims. Stalley said offenders are rewarded for becoming more sophisticated.

"This is a court saying to pedophiles they should keep 'em young and keep 'em retarded, so they can't testify," said Stalley. She added that court delays almost always requested from defense lawyers help the offender, because delays fog the child's memory and desire to prosecute.

But Baxter testified that constitutional rights guaranteed all citizens, including those offenders, were the source of most of their frustration.

"We can't keep the child off the stand because they (defendants) have the subpoena power to put the child on the stand," Baxter said.

An emotional roller-coaster of testimony carried both praise and criticism for Baxter's handling of the cases, while chilling reminders of victims' suffering remained the standard by which cases were measured.

Baxter said defendants' rights, including confronting their accusers before and during trials, often traumatize the child victim. Faced with losing these cases to juries, who throw up their hands when forced to choose between an adult's and a child's version of an intimate event, Baxter said plea bargaining is often the accepted alternative.

Many parents said defense lawyers step across the line of fairness by badgering small children into confusion or recantation.

"Two years later I still shake when I think about what

my daughter went through on that (preliminary hearing witness stand)," said one mother of an abused child. "The defense attorney badgered her, discrediting her talk."

Despite securing a conviction later by plea bargain, she said her 7-year-old daughter remained angry for a long time afterward, playing with butcher knives and wanting to kill the offender and his attorney.

"It was devastating," she said.

"They (defense lawyers) are not meeting the needs of their clients, they are traumatizing the child," said Penni Janas, head of the guardian-ad-hoc program.

Suggestions included having a child testify on closed-circuit television, for greater privacy.

Parents welcomed a proposal for mandatory minimum sentencing, to ensure convicted offenders spend time in prison. But prosecutors and other specialists countered their warnings that mandatory minimums would lead to more trials, and thus less convictions, than plea bargaining.

## High court hears award dispute arguments

**TWIN FALLS** — Punctuated with questions from the Idaho Supreme Court's newest justice, two attorneys argued Thursday whether a 1987 district judge's order increasing a jury's malpractice award was proper.

An attorney for the physician who lost the case said the jury's verdict against Carole Dick, a Twin Falls radiologist, was the result of a compromise in the jury room.

"The plaintiff can't accept the value of a potentially tainted verdict and then reap the benefit of new trial on damages alone," said Jeremiah Quane, who represents Dick.

Quane says 5th District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt was wrong when he ordered an increase in damages from \$356,714 to \$1.03 million after James and Lillian Smallwood of Jerome asked for a new trial. The Smallwoods said the jury's award was too small.

Smallwoods' attorney, Marcus Nye of Pocatello, said

Quane supported his pleas for a new trial with opinions and not facts.

"All appellant comes forward with is 'we know what compromise verdicts are,'" Nye said.

Quane theorized that the jury, which rendered the verdict with nine of 12 members, had to compromise to even come to a verdict against Dick.

"In exchange for a compromise, they would award a portion of damages to get a verdict," Quane said. "It's a classic, classic case of compromise."

In his order, Hurlbutt said the Smallwoods would get a new trial limited to damages if they didn't accept the larger award.

But Dick appealed Hurlbutt's order and the two attorneys argued the case Thursday before the Idaho Supreme Court.

The attorneys scarcely started their prepared remarks before Justice Byron Johnson, the newest member of the court, began asking questions.

The Smallwoods sued several physicians after a 1981 traffic accident in which Smallwood suffered a fractured back.

Smallwood was treated at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center after the accident. Two days after the accident, he fell as he was going to the bathroom and felt a sharp pain in the thoracic area of the spine.

Doctors then discovered Smallwood had a fractured vertebra that severed his spinal cord. He is now a paraplegic.

Every other physician involved settled with the Smallwoods before trial, but Dick decided to take the case to trial.

She read the X-rays ordered by other physicians. At trial, her defense attorney argued that two other radiologists in the Magic Valley agreed with her report.

In addition, Quane said, the other physicians never ordered a full spine X-ray even though Smallwood's back pain persisted.

Both Smallwood and Dick sat through the oral arguments Thursday. Two of the supreme court's five justices were absent. Retired district judges Arthur P. Oliver of Pocatello and James Towles of Coeur d'Alene replaced Justices Robert Bakes and Robert Huntley.

## Violent melee triggers state investigation

**RUPERT** — State officials have been called in to investigate a violent supermarket melee last week during which the Rupert mayor kicked a man being arrested on a charge of shoplifting, officials said.

Rupert Mayor Bill Whitton kicked Robert Artero Flores, who was lying on the floor of the Rupert IGA store after a tangled struggle with a host of state employees, customers and police officers. Flores was hospitalized with head and neck injuries and eventually placed in intensive care after the incident.

Whitton has defended his actions in a prepared statement, saying Flores was resisting arrest in a violent manner, threatening everyone in the vicinity. A police officer handcuffed Flores but the man started struggling again, Whitton said.

As Flores lay on the floor, Whitton said the man tried to bite him, and he instinctively kicked out at Flores.

"He (Flores) knew there was a risk of injury when he created this situation, so he should not complain about the results," the mayor said.

"If he thinks he has a claim for his injury, he can pursue it but I have let the prosecuting attorney know I don't want a coverup in this matter and I don't want any of the charges against Mr. Flores dropped because of this incident," the mayor's statement said.

Don Hiebert, an investigator with the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement, said Thursday he plans to arrive in Rupert early next week to start an independent inquiry into the matter. Minidoka County Prosecutor Charles Creason Jr. requested the state department investigation.

The man was injured and required medical attention, and any time that happens with law enforcement officials it is appropriate to have an outside agency look at it, particularly when there's a city official involved," Creason said.

Creason added that he will request the appointment of a special prosecutor if the state's investigation uncovers misconduct on the part of city officials.

Creason said Whitton, who is in his 11th year as Rupert's mayor, "was in the store and was involved in the scuffle with this fellow."

Whitton said he welcomed a state inquiry, but said Flores brought his problems on himself by resisting violently and screaming obscenities when store employees tried to arrest him.

"An independent investigation will clear the air in this matter. I will be happy to cooperate in the investigation," Whitton said.

Flores, 27, was arrested in the Rupert IGA store during the late-night hours of April 28. When police officers arrived at the scene, they "observed three men sitting on Flores in front of the checkout stand," according to police records.

Store employees stopped Flores when he tried to leave the store after allegedly putting a carton of cigarettes down the front of his pants. Witnesses' statements said Flores attempted to hit one of his detainers with a bottle of wine vinegar and tried to kick another man in the groin.

Officers with the Rupert Police Department responded in unusually strong force because the incident was mistakenly called in as a robbery instead of a theft, Police Chief Paul Fries said. Three police officers were involved in the

## Fireworks wholesaler alleges illegal seizure

**TWIN FALLS** — A Twin Falls fireworks wholesaler and his wife are suing the city over the seizure of \$25,000 of fireworks last September.

Bruce and Phyllis Weaver say the city's seizure of the fireworks during a fire inspection was illegal. They want the city to pay them for the fireworks and the courts to declare the city's and state's fireworks laws unconstitutional.

The Weaver's attorney, Randy Stoker, says the fireworks were seized without a search warrant. The city had permission to be in the building from Elmo Muir, who owned the building, but not from the Weavers, who occupied the building on Canyon Road.

"Basically, the city officials went to Mr. Muir, said we want to make fire inspection of your building, went in, looked around, ran across these fireworks and seized them," Stoker said.

City officials declined to comment on the case.

Beyond the illegal search, the Weavers raise a host of legal issues not often seen in Twin Falls courts, like saying the city code is unconstitutional.

"Because Weaver is a licensed wholesaler of fireworks under federal statutes dealing with interstate commerce, any impingement on those rights by state or city law violates the U.S. Constitution, the Weavers claim.

Weaver holds a federal license to wholesale fireworks and a city permit for safe and sane fireworks.

## Line to coast may be finalized soon

**POCATELLO** — Idaho Power Co. Chairman Robert O'Connor predicts a revised plan by his utility and several others for a major transmission line from Idaho's Magic Valley to Southern California could be finalized this summer.

In Pocatello Wednesday for the company's annual stockholders meeting, O'Connor said construction of the line between Jerome and the Los Angeles-San Diego area could occur in the early 1990s.

"It would enable us to make firm power sales off our system," O'Connor said. "Those sales would command higher prices than the spot market sales the company is now capable of making."

O'Connor said the utility is negotiating with other companies and in the process of signing let-

ters-of-intent. Idaho Power would own the northern section of the line and other companies would own its southern stretch, he said, providing no estimate of the project's cost.

Idaho Power's transmission line proposal, competing with a similar plan being promoted by Idaho potato magnate J.R. Simplot, was developed after the company last year pulled out of a large consortium of utilities trying to put together a transmission line project. Divergent interests among the members of that consortium have slowed its progress significantly.

O'Connor said Idaho Power continued to pursue the transmission line plan because it should have excess generating capacity through the next decade. He maintained it is the only utility in the Northwest that generates more power than it

The Southern California area's electrical needs are growing by 1,000 to 2,000 megawatts a year or nearly as much as Idaho Power's total annual generation, he said. Supplying even some of that need on a firm basis, he added, would be a major boost to ratemakers because of the higher price those power sales commands.

The proposed line would start from the Midpoint Substation near Jerome, recently acquired from Pacific Power & Light Co. The acquisition was made possible following Federal Energy Regulatory Commission hearings on Utah Power & Light Co.'s proposed merger with PacifiCorp, PP&L's parent company.

O'Connor said there was a long-standing dispute between Idaho Power and PP&L over ownership of the Jerome substation, but the matter was resolved when Idaho Power intervened in the federal merger hearings.

 physical arrest of Flores and another officer waited outside, Fries said.  
 "I think the petty officers did a very good job," Fries said. "They did what they're trained to do."  
 Flores, who was bleeding from a cut above his eye and possibly suffered a broken nose, was taken to the Minidoka Memorial Hospital after being apprehended. According to court records, Flores suffered a seizure while at hospital and was placed in intensive care.  
 Creason said Flores was not released from the hospital until late the next day. Don Pates, Flores' doctor, said he could not release any information on Flores' injuries without the patient's written consent.  
 According to court clerks, Flores has hired Isaac McDougall, a Pocatello attorney, to represent him on the criminal charge.

Creason said Flores so far has been charged only with petty theft, a misdemeanor. "I think there's likely to be a charge of resisting (arrest), but it hasn't been filed yet," he added.  
 Flores is scheduled to make an initial appearance on the criminal charge May 27.  
 According to court records, an alcohol content test was administered at the hospital and Flores registered at 0.057. That reading is just under the state's legal limit of 0.1 for intoxication.  
 Court records reveal an extended battle to apprehend and detain the 160-pound, five-foot, seven-inch Flores. Pictures on file in court show coffee cans, cigarette packs and various other items scattered about the supermarket floor where the altercation took place.  
 While he was being booked, officers found in Flores' possession a small tooth brush, two packs of dog vitamins, a box of dog flea collars and 18 cents.  
 Flores is currently on probation after being convicted on a grand theft charge late last year. After serving four months in prison, Flores was placed on five years probation March 21 for having stolen a car in September.

# CSI begins quest for school's first regional men's track title

SPOKANE, Wash. — After missing by eight points last year, the College of Southern Idaho's men's track team will try again today and Saturday to win its first Region 18 junior college championship.

The Eagles, Ricks College, Treasure Valley Community College and host North Idaho College will get together at the Community Colleges of Spokane Stadium in the renewal of event Ricks has dominated for the past seven years.

Competition will begin at 4:30 p.m. MDT today with the running event preliminaries and the field events. The running event finals will commence Saturday at 11 a.m. MDT.



The track title is the only Region 18 championship that has eluded CSI. "On paper, I'd say we have an excellent chance of winning it," said CSI Coach Rick Neill. "It's the dirt arm of the dominant athlete like Joey Johnson that we had a year ago, but we have the potential of placing first in a number of events. Last year at Rexburg we had a dropped baton in a relay

race, a second-place finish by the two-time national (junior college) high jump champion (Johnson) and an athlete who didn't finish two of the events he started. That's a 10-point swing, at least."

Ricks' men's team is weaker than usual because the school kicked several athletes off the track team for violating Ricks' code of conduct.

"You've got to figure that with those guys, they would have finished 1-2 in the hammer, 1-2 in the shot and 1-3 in the javelin," said Neill. "Nine out of those points going to Ricks, now they're probably going to go to North Idaho." On the women's side, it's going to be all Vikings, Neill predicted. "There's nobody who can touch them," he predicted. "The only ques-

tion is how many they'll qualify for nationally."

The CSI women's chances were hurt by injuries suffered by freshman quarter-miler Eva Talamantes and freshman jumper Sandy Rowland, which will apparently keep both out of the regional finals. Talamantes, who won the state high school Class A-1 400-meter championship last year as a Twin Falls High School senior, sustained a stress fracture three weeks ago at the Bob Gilb Classic in Boise and won't be ready to run this weekend. Rowland, who had the second-best mark in the long jump headed into regionals, hurt her leg in practice this week.

In addition to the team championship, also at stake will be the number of athletes who will qualify for the Na-

tional Junior College Athletic Association meet, which will be held in Odessa, Texas, May 19-21. CSI has qualified three athletes so far: freshman Johnny Menifee in the high jump, sophomore Jay Burke in the 110-meter high hurdles and freshman Julie Hibbard in the discus.

"Potentially, we could qualify five or six more," said Neill. "Charley Tennant went to nationals last year in the 800, and I don't see why he shouldn't be able to qualify again. Menifee went to the indoor nationals in the triple jump and Oralia (Casiano) went in the 800, so they certainly have a chance. (Rob) Bartholomew has the best time in the region in the 400 hurdles and has a shot, and I would think (Todd) McKay should be able to make it in the 10K (10,000 meters)."

What concerns Neill about the men's regional title is Ricks' depth. "You don't win track meets with first places, you win with seconds and thirds," he said. "We really can't compete with Ricks' numbers, so we're going to have to win some seconds and thirds ourselves."

In addition to Bartholomew, a sophomore from Jerome who has the top time 400 hurdles this season of 54.56 seconds, and Burke, a sophomore from Wendell with a peacocking 14.64-second high hurdles, CSI's men have the best marks in seven other events. Menifee, a freshman from Federal Way, Wash., has both the top high jump of 6 feet, 9 1/4 inches and the peacocking triple jump of 49.7. The Eagles have the best qualifying time in the 4x400-meter relay (3:18).

## Bruin golfers sweep regional, but five teams going to state

**BURLEY** — Twin Falls didn't surprise anyone by taking both the boys' and girls' Region III high school golf titles here Thursday afternoon, but its margins of victory may have raised a few eyebrows.

The Bruin boys carded a 309 team score on the par-71 Burley Municipal Golf Course, just one stroke better than second-place Minico's 310.

The Bruin women on the other hand, left their competition in the dust, tallying a 261 team score, 65 strokes better than second-place Highland's 326.

When all was completed however, all of the region's boys' and girls' teams qualified for next week's state tournament at the Avondale Golf and Tennis Club in Couer d'Alene.

"The boys' teams needed a combined score of 325 to qualify for the state tourney and the girls' needed a 340 total.

Under new state rules adopted this year, a qualifying standard of 325 has been established as a reimbursement, as it were, for teams to advance to the state final.

Highland finished third in boys' competition with a 318, followed by Burley's 321 and Pocatello squeaked by with a 325.

Minico's girls finished third with a 337 and again, Pocatello squeaked by with a 340 total.

Simply put, the Bruin boys, who won the Gem State Conference championship earlier in the spring, were not satisfied with their effort.

Last year, Twin Falls took the Region III championship with a 292 performance. This year however, after the first nine holes were completed the Bruins were on a pace that would lead their score over 320 strokes. But thanks to a redeeming back-nine effort and an unexpected 75 from junior Tim Capps, Twin Falls, which had won the two regional tournament championships earlier this spring, was able to stay ahead of the Spartans and the Gem State Conference's top golfer Scott Erling.

Erling, the GSC season medalist, copped the regional medalist honors with a one-over-par 72. Bruins Kellie Jones and Karen Irwin both shot 83 to grab girls' medalist honors.

All five of the Bruin boys agree that they one of the top five teams in the state, along with Borah, Capital, Couer d'Alene and perennial power Lewiston.

Bruin coach Paul Slover agreed. "We have the ability (to finish in the top five)," he said. "I don't know if we have the ability to

win. Everybody's goal is to make it to the second day. We'll take it one step at a time."

Slover said Capps' performance Thursday was a shot in the arm for the Bruins. Capps has struggled throughout the season and his 75 was the team's low score.

# Private Terms favored to win Ky. Derby

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Private Terms, an unbeaten colt, and Winning Colors, a filly who has embarrassed the boys, are the Kentucky Derby favorites, but Hall of Fame trainer-Charlie Whittingham thinks it's anything but a two-horse race. "I don't think the half dozen can win," said Whittingham, who will saddle Lively One, the runner-up to Winning Colors in the Santa Anita Derby.

"Maybe a dozen. It just depends, who has the luck."

A field of 17 was entered Thursday for the 14-mile Derby at Churchill Downs. Posttime is 3:33 p.m. MDT, Saturday.

"The horses you've got to respect are the horses who been tested and who have been consistent — Private Terms and Winning Colors," said D. Wayne Lukas, who trains Winning Colors.

"I think Charlie Hadry's horse (Private Terms) is the most consistent," said trainer Jack Van Berg, who won the Derby last year with Alysheba and who will send out longshot Din-a-Dancer Saturday.

"Then there's the filly and Woody's horse (Forty Niner trained by Woody Stephens) is awful good right now."

and Charlie Whittingham ain't sitting here for his health."

Private Terms, unbeaten in seven starts, including the Wood Memorial in the 6-2 early favorite. Winning Colors is next at 3-1, followed by the Stephens entry of Forty Niner, the 1987 2-year-old champion, and Cofa, the Tampa Bay Derby winner, at 5-1.

A fear of rival trainers that at Winning Colors will get free on the lead as she did in 1½-mile Santa Anita Derby when she led all the way in beating Lively Time by 7½ lengths.

"If she runs back to that race, she'll be tough," said Pat Day, who will ride Forty Niner.

Forty Niner, Seeking The Gold, Din-a-Dancer and Purdue King are expected to go with the filly. Proper Reality, who won the Arkansas Derby, also could join the hunt early.

"We're going to run our race," Lukas said. "If Woody or somebody else wants the lead, they can have it."

"Our natural way is a 45-46 first half, a 1:09-1:10 three-quarters, a mile in 1:34, and hopefully she'll keep on winning."

Whittingham was hoping the filly would draw an outside post.

"If the filly draws 18 or 19," he said before he knew how many would be entered, "they've got really run her to get into position. This race is a mad scramble into the first turn."

Winning Colors, who will be ridden by Gary Stevens, drew post 11. Lukas said, "That's fine. She'll have a straight shot for the first quarter of mile."

"It's a most overrated thing," Lukas said of the importance of post position.

Stephens agreed after Claiborne Farm's Forty Niner drew the No. 17 post.

"I'd just as soon have what I have," Stephens said, "because I've got the filly on the inside of me. I'm going to put her on her, you know that."

The stretch running Cefis, ridden by Eddie Maple and owned by James P. Ryan and Robert Kirkland, drew the No. 2 post.

Swale won the 1984 Derby for Stephens from the No. 15 post and Cannonade won the 23-horse Derby in 1974 for him from the No. 2 post.

One trainer unhappy about his post position was Hadry, who, after Private Terms drew No. 16, said, "I don't like it, but there's nothing I can do about it."

Private Terms, who likes to race fairly close to the pace, will be ridden

by Chris Antley in his first Derby. Louisiana Derby winner Risen Star, who beat Forty Niner by a head in the Lexington at Keeneland, will start from the rail under Eddie DeLaune. Seeking The Gold, ridden by Randy Romero, the runner-up to Private Terms in the Gotham and Wood Memorial, drew the No. 8 hole, stretch-running Brian's Time, the Florida Derby winner ridden by Angel Corfido, drew No. 5.

Before the draw, Lukas had expressed more concern about who would be on either side of Winning Colors than about her post position. He said he hoped for experienced jockeys who could keep their mounts straight on the break.

Sea Trek drew inside the filly, while Proper Reality will be outside her. Sea Trek is ridden by Pat Johnson, will be making his Derby debut. Proper Reality will be Bailey's third Derby mount.

While feeling post position is overrated, Lukas thinks an overlooked edge he has is "the five pounds we're getting from these colts."

Winning Colors will get a five-pound set allowance, meaning she will carry 121 pounds while the other starters each will carry 126.

"If I complete at the best level possible next year, there'll be nothing to stand around for, nothing more to accomplish," Lewis said.

Milot, who played nine seasons with the Redskins, started 98 of the 117 games he participated in. The Penn State product was a fixture in the lineup until the latter part of last season, when an injury forced him out of action.

## Klein: Chargers were high

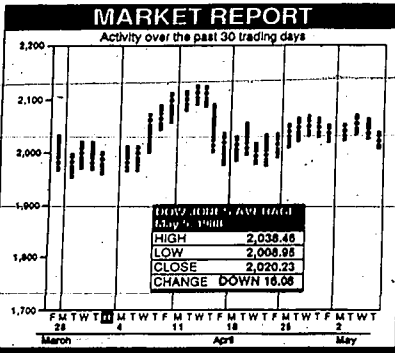

## Traders turn wary as stock prices decline



**NEW YORK (AP)** — Prices fell the second straight session in the stock market Thursday as traders warily awaited the latest monthly report on employment.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, down 22.05 on Wednesday, fell another 16.08 to 2,020.23.

Declining issues outnumbered advances by about 5 to 3 in New York Stock Exchange-listed trading, with 559 up, 925 down and 608 unchanged.

Big Board volume came to 171.84 million shares, against 141.32 billion in the previous session. The NYSE's composite index dropped 78 to 145.51.

The Labor Department is scheduled to report Friday on the employment situation for April. Economists generally expect the data to show continuing job gains.

But analysts say investors may well respond negatively to any evidence of increasing strength in the economy, interpreting it as a portent

of mounting inflationary pressures and an upward influence on interest rates.

Wall Streeters reason that the Federal Reserve is likely to give the employment figure considerable weight in deciding whether or when to tighten its credit policy.

Yields on long-term Treasury bonds have lately been hovering around 9 percent. If they were to go much higher, brokers say, they would stand to pose a formidable competitive threat to stocks.

General Motors led the active list, down 1/4 at 75 1/2 on volume of more than 26 million shares. Analysts said much of the activity in the stock market was short-term trading strategies keyed to the company's impending quarterly dividend.

Bethlehem Steel dropped 7/8 to 19 1/2. The company announced an offering of 10 million new shares at \$19 apiece.

Among other blue chips, International Business Machines lost 1/4 to 111 1/4; Sears Roebuck 1/4 to 35 1/4; Merck 1/4 to 155 1/4; DuPont 1/4 to 84, and American Telephone & Telegraph 1/4 to 26 1/2.

Kraft rose 1 1/2 to 53 1/2. The company said it would sell its Duracell battery business, use the proceeds to buy back as many as 12 million of its shares, and increase its dividend.

Kaiser Steel Ltd., which said its directors appointed a committee to consider a sale or buyout, jumped 2 1/2 to 18.

Cooper Cos. gained 2 1/2 to 14 1/4. The company said it would put each of its principal businesses up for sale after the government proposed its plans to sell its contact lens operations to Sabring-Flouge Corp.

On the downside, Learcorp dropped 1/2 to 16 1/2 on word that Asarco ended talks about acquiring the company.

As measured by Wilshire Associates' index of more than 5,000 ac-

tively traded stocks, the market lost \$1.84 billion, or 0.53 percent, in value.

Nationwide turnover in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 199.05 million shares.

Standard & Poor's industrial index fell 1.87 to 301.66, and S&P's 500-stock composite index was down 1.53 at 258.79.

The NASDAQ composite index for the over-the-counter market lost 2.11 to 379.51. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index closed at 302.39, down 1.15.

## April auto sales drop after strong first quarter

**DETROIT** — After extremely strong sales in the first quarter of 1988, total U.S. automobile sales dropped 3.9 percent in April, the auto industry reported Wednesday.

The decline was led by a steep drop in sales at General Motors.

Among the domestic auto manufacturers, auto sales fell 5.8 percent in April, while sales of imported vehicles rose 1.6 percent for the month.

"Sales have been unusually strong for the first three months of 1988, boosted by incentives," said Cynthia Certo, an auto analyst with Integrated Automotive Resources, a Wayne, Pa., research firm. "They've leveled out a bit for April. Some of the incentives have expired since then."

The most important result of the April sales is that GM, despite its increased sales push, is still in the weakest position of the "Big Three" auto manufacturers," said Dennis Spurduto, an auto analyst with Argus Research in New York.

Analysts said that although GM has implemented similar incentive programs as Ford and Chrysler,

Chrysler is very strong on its pricing and Ford is strong on its product. These strengths — as well as increased competition from import vehicles — continue to whittle away market share from GM.

GM's auto sales dropped 14.2 percent in April, giving it a 35.0 percent share of the entire auto market. This is down from the 39.1 percent share that GM had in April 1987. GM's share of the domestic auto market, also fell. GM took a 48.3 percent share of the domestic market, compared with 53.0 percent last year.

Ford's auto sales dropped 1.4 percent in April, giving it a 28.6 percent share of the domestic auto market, up from 27.3 percent last year. Ford's share of the entire auto market — including imports — was 20.7 percent, up from 20.2 percent last year.

Chrysler's continued to be strong in April. Its sales rose 8.8 percent, giving it a 14.6 percent share of the domestic auto market, up from 12.6 percent the previous year. Chrysler took 10.6 percent of the entire auto market, an increase from the 10.2 percent it received the year before.

Despite price increases due to the devaluation of the dollar against the yen, sales of imported autos gained slightly. The imports took a 27.5 percent share of the entire auto market, up from 26.0 percent in the previous April. The import totals do not include the transplants, which are autos built by foreign auto manufacturers in plants located in the United States.

Among the major import manufacturers, Toyota's sales rose 0.4 percent. Honda's sales increased 1.2 percent, and Nissan's sales rose 7.3 percent. A few imports did not fare as well. VW's sales dropped 25.0 percent, Volvo's sales fell 21.5 percent, and Subaru's vehicle sales dropped 5.8 percent.

Light trucks account for an increasing amount of business among many auto manufacturers. Chrysler's sales of light trucks rose a steep 18.0 percent in April, from 71,918 units in 1987 to 84,897 units in 1988. Ford's light truck sales fell 2.9 percent in 1987, to 124,549 units in 1988. GM's light truck sales rose 1.4 percent, from 137,472 units in 1987, to 139,360 in 1988.

The best defense against today's game is not easy to spot. Attacking the right suit is not enough. One must also lead the right card.

East wins the heart ace return. A safe heart. A lifeless heart return makes things safe for South, not for East.

Obviously it's best to shift to clubs. The best hope for winning four defensive tricks lies with finding the club king with West. But which club should East lead?

If he shifts to a routine fourth-best deuce, West's king drives out dummy's ace. When the king comes West's club-captain goes to East's queen, but that ends the "defense." South can now claim 10 tricks.

Look at East's club spots once again. The Q-10 behind dummy is present. Inter-club possibilities. If East is lucky, enough to find the club king, with West, he should play to take advantage. It leads the club 10 instead of the deuce, and the trump is trapped. South covers, and West and dummy, when the trump finesse loses to West's king, a club return nets East two club winners.

### Rupert watercolorist feels inspired

TWIN FALLS — Committed artists are in a sense truly starving artists, according to Gloria Adams of Rupert. It is the love, respect and experiencing of the art that "feeds your soul," says Adams.

Adams, a 41-year-old watercolorist, is the featured artist at the fifth annual Idaho-Art Show and Auction scheduled Saturday evening at the Holiday Inn.

Sponsored by the Twin Falls Junior Club and Canyonside Gallery, proceeds from the art show will benefit three local agencies, the Guardian Ad Litem, Senior Citizens Center and YFCA After-School Program.

Ron Hicks, owner of the Canyonside Gallery, who will jury the artwork, has known Adams for several years and says Adams' inspiration is "She has to paint. She is motivated from within."

Adams calls herself a learning artist.

"Learning is probably the greatest experience an artist can have and I truly love it," says Adams.

"I have never yet painted a one masterpiece. I hope to hell I never do. Because if I ever did what would be the sense of me continuing on? I'd better retire that paint brush if I couldn't ever do any better," she says.

Tucked into a corner of Rupert's town square is Adams' small doll shop, a business she says is "a means of support of my love of the arts."

She spends long hours there as a merchant and as an artist. Dolls in glass cases can gaze at Adams' framed watercolors while Adams herself is found daily in her small studio in the shop painting.

Art is an illusion of an interpretation of someone else, says Adams. "Each artist will project their work in a different way which is beautiful."

As a fifth grader in Eugene, Ore., Adams sold her first artwork — a woodcut entitled "Through the Porthole."

At age 16 she asked her parents to buy a set of real oil paints and claims "if it would have been possible for me to derive my own pigments from roots of actual plants I would have loved to 'created' in that sense, too."

Her parents were always extremely supportive of her involvement in art although neither is an artist.

About 1976 Adams began working with watercolors and pen-and-ink, combining the two into a very popular

artwork, says Hicks.

Shortly thereafter she became acquainted with Ronnie Lee Vanek, a popular young Magic Valley artist. They were married for eight years before his death from cancer in August of 1985.

"Ronnie was more of a source of inspiration to me than any one individual because we had such a close, close relationship. He was a man in my life that meant an awful, awful lot," she says.

Vanek was a beautiful person and a philosopher in his own right, says Adams. He often said it was the quality of what you have and not the quantity which was important.

Her years with Vanek were extremely valuable and "encouraging" years for her growth in art and his

death was equally discouraging. For a period of seven months after he died Adams couldn't paint.

"I wanted desperately to perform with my work but I just couldn't cross the bridge," she says.

Finally, one day while wanting desperately to experience art, she sat down and painted and has continued ever since.

Adams classifies herself as a strictly emotional painter and paints "from an inner feeling."

"I truly feel for myself that art is an experience within the individual — putting on a form... You're just putting forth merely an image and projecting an image of something whether it makes the viewer happy, sad, tranquil... It can speak softly or it can

### Art auction benefits 3 local charities

TWIN FALLS — Sixty pieces of art will be auctioned off Saturday night with proceeds going to aid three community organizations. The occasion is the fifth annual Idaho Art Show and Auction sponsored by the Twin Falls Junior Club and Canyonside Gallery. It will be held at the Holiday Inn beginning at 7 p.m. for the art preview and silent auction.

At 8 p.m. the main auction will begin. Tickets are \$3.50 and can be purchased from any Junior Club member, YFCA, Judi's Bookstore, Canyonside Gallery or Made in Idaho.

## Ridley Pearson sets a new thriller in Seattle

TWIN FALLS — I consider any novel that keeps me awake and frightened past 3 a.m. worth reading, and Ridley Pearson's latest mystery, "Undercurrents," is that kind of book.

During an interview with the Times-News last fall, Pearson described his nascent novel as a "police procedural" and "a murder thriller about a serial killing in Seattle and the investigation run by a disenchanted detective."

"Undercurrents" is a suspense novel centered on Lou Boldt, a disheveled cop and Jung addict, who stalks a porcerized murderer with a supply of brown paper bags in this left pocket and disposable surgical gloves in his right.

The story is written in the third person — the reader knows only what the detective knows so must piece together the clues one at a time.

Pearson doesn't give his detective or his readers much to go on, and that's probably what keeps us all

working at solving the mystery. Evidence found at the opening scene includes an empty pack of Marlboros and a strange, red fiber. Along the way Boldt also uncovers the possibility of a copycat murderer — and worse yet, the copycat could be someone on his team.

Pearson does a good job dissecting a complex criminal investigation and offering it up to the reader piece by grisly piece.

In preparing to write "Undercurrents," the author spent several weeks in Seattle talking to police investigators and the city coroner. The extent of that research is evident throughout the book, and is most vividly displayed in Pearson's description of a waterlogged cadaver that washes up on a Puget Sound shore.

But the novel suffers at times from too much gore and too many details. Midway through, Pearson attempts a turgid discussion of the Puget Sound currents along with how the tides might drag a body back and forth. It's all too technical, bogging the story down just when it should be rolling along.

Perhaps Pearson doesn't know when to stop. He told the Times-News that he spends an average of 75 hours a week grinding out thrillers on his word processor from a log home in the Wood River Valley. "Undercurrents" is his sixth book in five years. He has also composed more than 300 songs and a number of musical scores for animated films and documentaries. His efforts have paid off. In 1987,

Pearson surpassed Stephen King in the Northwest best-seller list with his third novel, "Seizing of the Yankee Green Mail." "Undercurrents" promises to bring further success even before publication. St. Martin's Press has pledged to print at least 50,000 hard-cover copies and to follow next year with 600,000 paperbacks. Martin Bregman, producer of "Scarface," "Dog Day Afternoon" and "Serpico," has purchased the film rights to the book.

If a movie is made, "Undercurrents" probably won't suffer from the transition to the screen. It might be improved.

Pearson's dialogue is often stilted and lacking in color, especially the scenes between Lou Boldt and his estranged wife, Elizabeth. During one emotion-charged moment, Boldt offers boring platitudes: "Perhaps Pearson never intended for us to like Boldt, but with such predictable scenes, he certainly doesn't give us a five, three-dimensional character to judge."

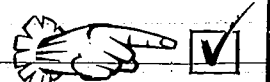
Boldt seems to have difficulties communicating with all the women in his life, and that may be because Pearson had difficulty with those characters too. In describing women, he often uses sexual clichés which undercut some of the fine writing elsewhere in the book.

Daphne Matthews, the police psychologist and Boldt's fantasy love in-

terest, is repeatedly likened to a thoroughbred horse. Boldt nicknamed her "Debby," and is constantly unnerved by her thick mane of dark hair which she swishes in his face. Their eventual lovemaking doesn't seem to fit the characters and even borders on the ridiculous.

Even with its faults, "Undercurrents" is a good mystery story. The novel's last 150 pages motivate us to discover who done it. The serial killings are solved a little too soon for my taste, but finding out the identity of the copycat killer kept me reading until the very end.

## BSU project plans to catalog and preserve Idaho writings

The archive, he says, will attempt to keep track of current writers. Guilford says the archive project will also "go back to the past and look at people like Vardis Fisher," collecting as much of their writing-related material as possible.

# Garner, Willis shine brightly in 'Sunset'

No one is better qualified than Blake Edwards to create a movie about the early days of Hollywood. He is a third-generation filmmaker; his grandfather was a silent film director; his father was an assistant director and production manager. His daughter, Jennifer, a promising actress, makes it four generations.

The latest movie from the prolific Edwards ("Breakfast at Tiffany's," "The Great Race," "10") is "Sunset,"

an affectionate, funny, exhilarating glimpse at what Hollywood in the 1920s might have been — "give or take one or two lies," as one of the characters explains.

Based on a book by Rod Amateau, Edwards' script contains a delicious idea: the teaming of Wyatt Earp and Tom Mix to solve a Hollywood murder case. The juxtaposition of an authentic Western hero and a gaudy star of horse operas makes a splendid metaphor. And Edwards adds another element from movie lore: the bootlegging Mafia.

The plotting of "Sunset" becomes a bit convoluted for easy comprehension, and the heroics grow far-fetched. But the movie rolls along with Edwards' faultless pacing, and most of all, by the inspired casting of James Garner and Bruce Willis. They are the slickest screen pairing since Paul Newman and Robert Redford.

Edwards, who has a long history of battles with studio bosses, must have delighted in making one of the villains of "Sunset."

The story involves a wide range of characters, including the dead woman's daughter (Mariel Hemingway), a crooked cop (Richard Bradford), the oily studio police chief (M. Emmet Walsh) and an underworld lord (Joe Dallesandro). They interweave, sometimes confusingly, but most of the elements unweave at the end.

Garner is a marvel to watch, his quiet authority dominating every scene. But Willis also shows his best big-screen-form-yet, capturing the flamboyance of Mix as well as his self-mockery.

The Tri-Star Pictures release was produced by Tony Adams. The rating is R, for language and sexual content. Running time: 101 minutes.

## 'Casual Sex?' shows few redeeming virtues

HOLLYWOOD — Think that "Casual Sex?" might interest you? Think again. Except for the credits songs, the only really good thing about this movie is the way it proves that one does not have to be a man to make lewd, preposterous comedies. Women can too.

The movie is set mostly at a swinging bucolic health farm where good buddies Stacy (Lea Thompson) and Melissa (Victoria Jackson) journey in pursuit of aerobics and eros and where they encounter a needle-brained rock singer (Stephen Stollen), a bouncy exercise instructor (Jerry Levine), a macho bozo from Jersey (Andrew Dice Clay) and various other neurotics, lechers, louts and extras in tight trunks.

The movie is another example of that onerous '80s staple, the "daffy, goofy, sex-crazed guys" comedy — though here the parts of the bimbos are played by men, and the traditional guys' roles by women. Instead of acting daffy, goofy and sex-crazed, the women act compassionate, supportive and sex-crazed.

One wonders why these film makers — director Genevieve Robert and executive producer Ivan Reitman — wanted to do the movie in the first

place. It is like staging a Feydeau farce in which the characters crawl out from under the beds to deliver sermons on fidelity, or disengage themselves from their amorous bouts to offer advice on birth control — then hop right back under the beds and into the bouts.

Who is kidding whom here? It is easy to see that the original script had a much different tone; its raunchiness leaps, peaking through the now-cleaned-up veneer like a leech caught in plastic.

If the script is dubious, the direction matches it. The pace is so luridous one might think the actors are refusing to jump on their cues because they are afraid of catching something.

The cast is less directed than exploited. Thompson crinkles constantly; Jackson does her whining bimbo bit; Clay reprises his crass-macho stand-up comedy character; Mary Gross pops in and out like a guest hysteric; and Jerry Levine looks so much like Barry Manilow or Martin Short the three might consider a joint act. New Age Three Stooges routine where they sweat each other with mystic crystals. Meanwhile, the best answer if anyone asks you out for an evening of "Casual Sex?" (MPAA-rated: R) is a vow of abstinence.

# Shocked widow offers AIDS warning to the complacent

**DEAR ABBY:** I am a 69-year-old, college-educated, retired professional woman.

My husband — a professional man — died of AIDS three years ago. He was not in a high-risk group. Because he was a family man, and because AIDS was unknown in our area, the doctors never thought to test him for the virus until about a week before he died.

The results were positive, but these did not come back until after his funeral, and more important for me, after the death certificate was signed. So the certificate bore no stigma, and there was no publicity.

Because not much was known at the time (at least around here) about how AIDS is transmitted, our adult children were tested for the virus at the same time I was.

Now, of course, we know that testing the kids was unnecessary because they neither had sex nor shared needles with my husband, and had no contact with his blood.

Naturally, their tests were negative. I, on the other hand, tested positive, and was tested again to make certain there was no mistake. Positive again.

I want to make it absolutely clear that there was no anal intercourse — only normal penile-vaginal (missionary) intercourse in my case.

I was told that the odds of a straight, monogamous, drug-free person getting this disease is about 5 million-to-1, but that doesn't help if you're the one in 5 million!

So far, I am still healthy but I have the virus — the virus I got from "normal" intercourse.

Abby, I implore you to alert your reading audience to my message. If this happened to me, it can happen to any straight, monogamous woman.

There may be many, perhaps thousands, of women like me. There are no records on us because as I understand it, only full-blown AIDS, and perhaps AIDS-related-complex cases, are reported to the CDC. Carriers are not reported. And if these women are like me, they are telling NO ONE.

Of course, I am not sexually active. But those who are must inform their partners, and insist on the use of a condom, which may still carry some risks, but is considerably safer. To do otherwise is tantamount to murder.

The last 12 years of a previous 35-year marriage were also void of all marital relations. As a healthy male, this caused me considerable frustration. At 63, I wondered if I had become impotent.

## Shakespeare pays visit

**TWIN FALLS** — The Idaho Shakespeare Festival will be bringing its Shakespeare tour to Twin Falls High School and Filer High School on May 11 and May 13.

Shakespeare is a two-part program geared to high school junior and senior English students, exploring the world and words of William Shakespeare. Clive Barnes of the New York Post agreed. He said the rock star "sounds more as if she were auditioning than acting, and the audience is screeching at the big time. There is a genuine, reticent charm here, but it is not yet ready to light the lamps on Broadway."

Frank Rich of the New York Times was more positive. He said Madonna "serves Mr. Mamet's play much as she did the Susan Seidelman film 'Desperately Seeking Susan,' with intelligent, scrupulously disciplined comic acting."

She delivers the shocking transitions essential to the action and needs only more confidence to relax a bit and fully command her speaking voice," the Times said.

Madonna's role is the smallest in the three-character play, and she is on

stage less than half the time. The play also stars Joe Mantegna and Ron Silver.

But it has been Madonna who sold tickets. "Speed-The-Plow" originally was scheduled to open at the 299-seat Mitzi Newhouse Theater in Lincoln Center but ticket demand was so great that it was moved to the 1,068-seat Royale Theater.

Even so, the Lincoln Center Theater, which produced the play on Broadway, deliberately downplayed Madonna's role in the production. It declined all interviews for the star and kept publicity to a minimum.

By the time the show opened Tuesday night, it had a good but not overwhelming advance sale of \$500,000. With the favorable reviews, the box office expected to take in more than \$100,000 the day after the opening, said Merle Debuskey, a spokesman for the show.

Mantegna and Silver, who play the sleazy Hollywood producers, were universally lauded. Linda Winer, writing in Newsday, called Mantegna "irresistible," and she said Silver delivered "a riveting breakthrough performance." Said Rich, "The men could not be better. Mr. Silver gives the performance of his career."

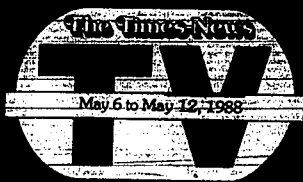

# 'The Caine Mutiny Court-Martial': a traditional, yet striking, remake

Of all the plays that made up the great 1950s golden age of drama, "The Caine Mutiny Court-Martial," which airs Sunday, May 8 on CBS, seems a curious choice of revival.

The 1954 courtroom drama, adapted by Herman Wouk from his Pulitzer Prize-winning novel "The Caine Mutiny," has no tenuous link to current events, as did NBC's recent production of "Inherit the Wind." Nor does it offer the chance to play a classic protagonist that "Death of a Salesman" offered Dustin Hoffman. Indeed, it seems a mere period piece.

But it is a natural for director Robert Altman, who initiated the new production and presented it to CBS. A one-time TV drama director who gained a reputation as a Hollywood iconoclast with the actresses "M\*A\*S\*H" (1970) and "Nashville" (1976), Altman has lately adapted stage plays — among them, David Rabe's "Streamers" and Sam Shepard's "Fool for Love" for the movies, and Harold Pinter's "The Dumb Waiter" and "The Room" for ABC.

"The Caine Mutiny Court-Martial" reflects an unmistakably traditional sensibility. Indeed, the play depends on several somewhat outmoded dramatic conventions: the military as a citadel of honor and decency, the courtroom as a repository of law and order and the stage as a forum for ideas. While all three are challenged, the assumptions remain in place.

The play, and the fictional trial it depicts, explore the character of Capt. Queeg (Brad Davis), a career Navy officer and the commander of the destroyer USS Caine. In 1945, when the ship was being buffeted by a typhoon, Queeg was relieved of his command by young Lt. Maryk (Jeff Daniels). Now the war is over, and Maryk is on

trial for insubordination. Many of the participants in the trial feel that Queeg, a man given to fits of rash behavior, was unfit to command and that Maryk saved the ship and its crew. But others, including Maryk's defense attorney, Lt. Greenwald (Eric Bogosian), are reluctant to challenge Queeg because of his spotless Navy record.

The story, of course, is familiar from the 1954 movie "The Caine Mutiny," which starred Humphrey Bogart as Queeg and featured solid performances from E.G. Marshall, Lee Marvin and Fred MacMurray. But this production will not be mistaken for a remake. For one thing, Altman has adapted the stage play, not the film, and his use of hand-held shots, moving from the stand to the gallery and back again, creates a sense of confinement missing from the more expansive movie.

Striking, too, is the cast. Playing Queeg is Brad Davis ("Midnight Express"), who, at 37, is a more plau-

sible Queeg than was the 55-year-old Bogart. Maryk is played by Jeff Daniels, Mia Farrow's imaginary lover in "The Purple Rose of Cairo." Greenwald is played by Eric Bogosian, the free-wheeling monologist whose "Talk Radio" was a downtown New York favorite last summer and will be a movie this fall. Playing the prosecutor, Cmdr. Challee, is Peter Gallagher, who held his own opposite Jack Lemmon in "Long Day's Journey into Night" and the recent miniseries "The Murder of Mary Phagan." And Michael Murphy, who plays Capt. Blakely, the president of the court, is a six-time Altman veteran who is currently playing the director's mythical presidential candidate in "Tanner '88," which will air on HBO until Election Day.

ON THE COVER Brad Davis plays Capt. Queeg in "The Caine Mutiny Court-Martial," which airs on CBS Sunday at 8 p.m.

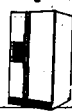

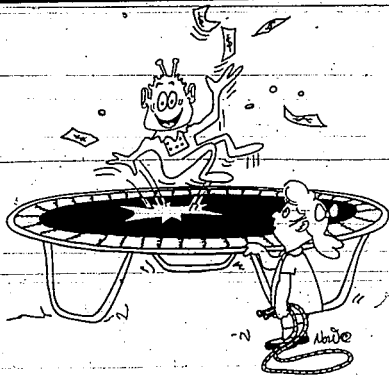

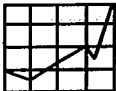
