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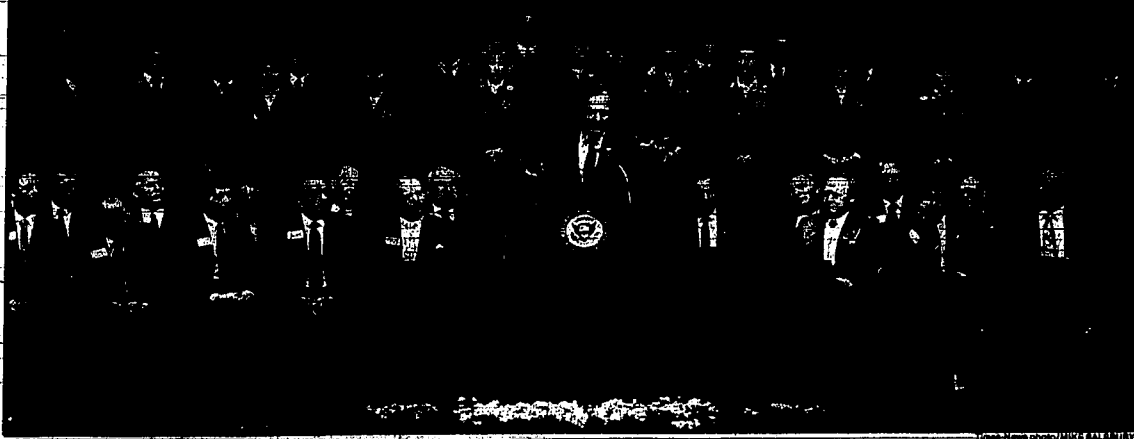
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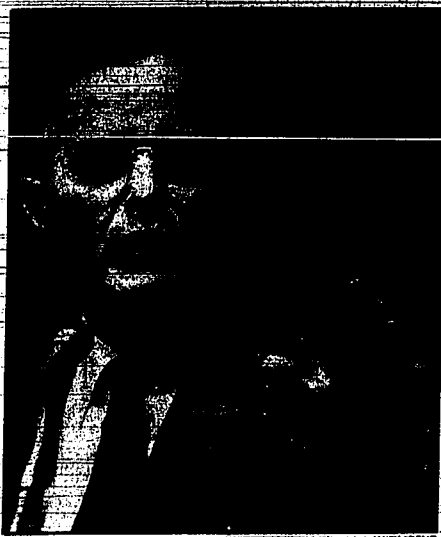

## Work force grows

WASHINGTON — Unemployment fell in April to 5.4 percent, the lowest it has been since 1974, with export-led hiring on factory assembly lines in the industrial heartland leading the latest spurt of new jobs.

The number of Americans at work rose by 606,000 last month, while those listed as unemployed fell by 191,000 to 6.8 million, dropping joblessness 0.2 percentage points from March's rate of 5.6 percent, the Labor Department said.

The rate was the lowest since June 1974 when it also stood at 5.4 percent but at time when the nation was well into a steep recession, in contrast to the current economic expansion.

"One of the best barometers of the state of our economy is to see more people working," President Reagan said in reaction to Friday's report. Private analysts agreed, although some of them repeated assertions they have been making since last September — when the jobless rate first dipped below 6 percent — that the tighter labor market is bound to push wages up soon and exert inflationary pressures on prices as well.

In a report adding to fears of inflation, the Federal Reserve Board said consumer installment debt grew by \$4.46 billion in March, a strong annual rate of growth of 9.6 percent. Consumer debt grew a 10.3 percent annual rate for the first three months of the year, compared with 7.2 percent for all of 1987.

## Medicare fortunes improve

WASHINGTON — Medicare's fortunes have improved and its trust fund now is not likely to run out of cash until the year 2005, while the Social Security old age fund should be solvent until the middle of the 21st century, the systems' trustees told Congress on Friday.

The 2005 date is three years later than was forecast a year ago.

The trustees, including three Reagan Cabinet members, said Social Security's old age fund also had achieved robust gains and predicted it "will have enough funds to cover expenditures for about 60 years into the future."

The board said Medicare's trust fund grew by nearly \$14 billion in calendar 1987 and finished the year with reserves of \$53.7 billion.

Assuming moderate economic conditions, the hospital insurance reserves were forecast to grow to nearly \$153 billion over the next decade before dwindling to nothing in the year 2005.

The trustees urged Congress to "take early remedial measures to bring future (Medicare) costs and finance into balance" and to "avoid the need for later, potentially precipitous changes."

They said the shortfall could be covered by a 14 percent cut in benefits, a 16 percent increase in the Medicare tax or a combination of both.

In the early 1980s, the trustees warned Medicare's trust fund would go bankrupt in the 1990s. Its financial picture has improved partly as a result of federal constraints on hospital payments.

The Medicare program provides hospital insurance for 28 million Americans 65 or older and 3 million disabled workers under 65.

# Bush aims to keep recovery rolling

TWIN FALLS — Vice President George Bush told 600 people at the College of Southern Idaho Friday he represents a continuation of the Reagan Administration's "unfulfilled agenda" for economic recovery.

"What we want to do is keep the economic recovery going," said the Republican presidential candidate, referring to a 5.4 percent national unemployment rate, the lowest since 1974.

He added that federal revenues are up, during the administration in which he's served seven-and-a-half years as vice president, despite a 25-percent cut in taxes in that time. He advocated a "flexible freeze" in federal spending, to prohibit increasing deficits while allowing the government to shift money as needed between accounts.

"In my view, that is the only way to keep the recovery going," Bush said.

He spoke to a capacity crowd at CSI's Fine Arts Center and answered questions during a roundtable discussion with regional media, including the Times-News.

### Scott's souvenir: A stick of gum

TWIN FALLS — The man who would be president flew out of Twin Falls in a driving rain, leaving behind supporters, protesters and one stick of Juicy Fruit gum.

As George Bush left Twin Falls at 11:25 a.m., 10-year-old Scott Kirchner pulled a picture and a stick of gum out of a manila envelope, mementos from a private tour of Air Force II that morning.

Bush stayed at the Holiday Inn the night before, where Scott's mother asked one of the pilots if her son could tour the plane.

"There's a doggie door in there, that Eisenhower put in and a pipe holder for President Kennedy," said Scott's mother, Marie.

In a private room for the vice president there's a telephone "where he could talk to anywhere in the world," Scott said.

And the cockpit, where Scott steered the stationary plane, has three seats.

"Four," his mother corrected.

"Three," Scott said.

Well, mother and son agree that Bush left without a stick of gum. Scott, while sitting in the vice president's seat, saw the popular gum in a pocket and pilfered a piece.

"Wrapper already wrinkled, the vice-presidential gum was safely in his envelope as he headed back to Lincoln school."

After being shot down in the war and then serving two terms as a congressman during the 1960s, Bush has also been U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations, chairman of the Republican National Committee and director of the Central Intelligence Agency.

In business, the Milton, Mass., native pioneered experimental offshore oil-drilling equipment in Texas during the 1950s. He is still a resident of Houston.

"I suggest that if someone were to sit down and write a curriculum for the next president of the United States, it would be almost identical to the background of this man," said McClure. "The kind of person you and I can be proud to call friend," he added before the standing ovation.

In turn, Bush said after the speech he relied heavily on McClure for advice on energy issues and for Western issues in particular. "I'm leaning on him now," Bush said.

Bush is the shoe-in Republican presidential candidate, since he already has enough delegates nationally for the nomination. While the Republican primary selecting Idaho's Republican delegates is approaching May 24, his visit focused on agriculture as he prepares for the general election contest.

Bush hustled into a 15-minute question-and-answer session after his CSI speech with an "OK, let's go." But the 63-year-old with graying temples then became the picture of calm, as he leaned back in his chair, gesturing only occasionally while fielding questions.

## Andrus tactics under fire

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Republican state Sen. Terry Sverdeten has leashed out at Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus for what he claims is the governor's dictatorial tactics in renewed negotiations on water quality regulations with the timber industry.

"As much as he would like to control everything on this issue, he'd better realize that he's just a governor, not a czar," Sverdeten said.

The focus of the Cataldo lawmaker's criticism was the governor's attempted dismissal of Intermountain Forest Industries Council Vice President Joe Hinson from a special committee negotiating a compromise on regulations protecting water quality in areas of timbering, agriculture and other activities.

## Developers seek speed-up

MOSCOW (AP) — The U.S. Forest Service is dragging its feet in reviewing a new plan to construct a dam at Elk Creek Falls near Elk River, developers of the project claim.

Leaders of Hy-Tech, Inc. of Lewiston maintain no public hearings are needed before construction begins on the redesigning project, which includes tunnelling through one of the basalt cliffs rimming the falls to divert water to a powerhouse near the base of the cascade.

But Clearwater National Forest officials say they are waiting for further information from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, which recently reversed its denial of Hy-Tech's license application for the plan to divert water from above the waterfalls for power production.

## Agency interested in Idaho

ST. ANTHONY (AP) — The U.S. Bureau of Prisons is still considering St. Anthony as a possible site for a minimum security federal prison, but it needs more time before making a decision.

"They want a return trip and more information on year-around work projects," said Mayor Merrill Basse after being informed the bureau had abandoned a potential site in Nevada.

Bureau representative Kevin McMahon met March 30 with local officials and toured the east campus of the Idaho State Youth Services Center and Fremont General Hospital.

## Hospitals protest changes

POCAHELLO (AP) — Pocatello's two hospitals have filed a formal protest over proposed changes in state Health and Welfare Department regulations for disposal of infectious waste.

The proposed changes to the hospital licensing regulations, if adopted, would require hospitals to dispose of anything ranging from face tissues to surgical gowns, that comes into contact with a patient.

Critics, contending the changes are a response to growing concern and fear over the spread of acquired immune deficiency syndrome or AIDS, claim the regulations are reactionary and go too far.

## Teachers clear strike vote

MOUNTAIN HOME (AP) — Mountain Home teachers have authorized a strike vote, but say a strike is not imminent.

Ruth Iredale, vice president and chief negotiator for the Mountain Home Education Association, said 122 of 166 local members voted to authorize a strike.

However, "We're doing everything possible to avoid a strike," she said.

The vote simply authorizes the teachers to take a strike vote depending on how negotiations progress, Iredale said. The next negotiations meeting is scheduled for May 12.

# Judge rules out sentencing guidelines

BOISE (AP) — A federal judge here has ruled that the Justice Department's tough, new sentencing guidelines are unconstitutional because they violate the separation of powers sections of the Constitution.

It was the first time the sentencing guidelines had come under legal review in Idaho since they were put into effect last year.

U.S. District Judge Marion Callister ruled from the bench Friday that the guidelines were unconstitutional, in a case involving four men arrested on drug-related charges.

The judge then sentenced the men to different sentences, depending on whether the sentencing guidelines are upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court or struck down.

Boise Attorney Philip Gordon, who represented two of the defendants, said he and other defense attorneys presented Callister with many related decisions from other federal court districts.

Gordon, who is of counsel with the Boise law firm of Sallas and Doolittle, said nearly 60 decisions have been

handed down on the constitutionality of the sentencing guidelines and they run 83-25 against the guidelines. But he said legal opinions differ, as evidenced by the fact that of three rulings on the guidelines in Southern California went 2-1 that they were unconstitutional.

Antonio Martinez-Ortega, Epifanio Sanchez-Lopez and his brother, Guillermo Sanchez-Lopez and Brijido Astorga-Ayon were arrested last Nov. 23 near American Falls. They were charged with conspiracy to distribute drugs, cocaine and heroin; two counts

of possession with intent to distribute drugs and Astorga-Ayon was charged with being an illegal alien in possession of a firearm.

The men were convicted after a trial. Defense attorneys, also including Boise attorney M. Karl Shurtliff and Rudy Barchas, contended the sentencing guidelines were improper.

Gordon said Martinez-Ortega would have been sentenced to 20 years in prison under the sentencing guidelines, but 20 years under existing federal law.

# Andrus gives support for Dukakis' candidacy

BOISE (AP) — Declaring the time has come for Democrats to unite behind Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis, Gov. Cecil Andrus has broken with Idaho's other superdelegates to the Democratic National Convention to endorse his fellow chief executive.

Idaho's other uncommitted delegates join him went unheeded, at least for the moment, among the state's other superdelegates.

"He talked to me about it, and I wished him well," said National Committeewoman Diane Peavy.

"Now is the time," Andrus said Friday in abandoning his uncommitted status to favor Dukakis. "It is clearly the time when we can help bring the nomination to Governor Dukakis before the convention in Atlanta."

The governor, who earlier this year said no one in the official Democratic field stirred his enthusiasm, maintained it was important now to clarify the party's nominee so Democrats could focus all their attention on battling Republicans for White House in November.

"There isn't any question he stands an excellent opportunity of becoming the next president of the United States," Andrus said.

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# Magic Valley

## Farmers praise Bush's interest in Magic Valley agriculture

TWIN FALLS — Chatting over homemade cinnamon rolls and coffee Friday morning at the Colner family farm, George Bush learned about Magic Valley agriculture.

Afterward, farmers and ranchers walked away from the brief meeting generally happy with the presidential candidate's perspective on farm policy and water law.

"I would not favor the elimination

of the (sugarbeet) program," Bush said. "I don't believe it will ever be done away with."

And he supported states' sovereignty in water law, a position dear to the organizer of this Twin Falls visit, Idaho's senior GOP Sen. James McClure.

"The federal government should be the authority of last resort, not first resort," Bush said. "I understand the traditional role of the states and I do not want to interfere with that."

The discussion featured eight

hand-chosen farming representatives gathered in the Colners' barn. The vice president escorted Marietta Colner, the matriarch of the four-generation farm, as they joined the others sitting on hay bales and huddling against bitter winds of the year's worst rainstorm.

Participants commended Bush for his attention and interest, voiced through comments and questions during the hour-long talk. Issues included federal land use and wilderness, irrigation farming and in-

ternational competition in agriculture.

"He really reinforced the sugar program," said state Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Deer. "That's the most important thing that he said, for our area."

State Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, had lobbied for states' water rights, criticizing the "apparent effort of FERC (Federal Energy Regulatory Commission) to change and squeeze off our lifeline by ignoring 100 years of water law."

Both lawmakers are respected state leaders within their party and both were satisfied with Bush.

"I thought he was a very calm, collected American leader," Noh said.

But several uninvited farmers questioned the size of the group visiting with Bush and whether the group represented smaller, struggling farmers.

"I'd like to talk to him about the Farm Credit Service and how it's abused," said Twin Falls County farmer, Walt Mueller, who is pre-

sident of the Idaho Rural Council. "The Farm Credit Service is bypassing its authority by ignoring the rights of first refusal" of its bankrupt farmer to buy back their land.

"He's my vice president too," said Mueller, who is also a Democratic legislative candidate.

Nevertheless, participants representing sugarbeets, potatoes, soil conservation, and sheep and cattle ranching said they were satisfied with the meeting.

## Bush shows wry sense of humor

TWIN FALLS — Describing his vice-presidential tenure under the shadow of President Ronald Reagan, George Bush proved Friday he has a sense of humor.

"It's been difficult hiding my charisma for the past seven-and-a-half years," Bush told an audience of 800 people at the College of Southern Idaho.

"He certainly needed a sense of humor during his Twin Falls visit."

The year's worst rainstorm, according to the National Weather Service, blew into town with a sprinkle Thursday night along with Air Force II. By mid-afternoon Friday, the storm poured a half-inch of rain and snow onto the city.

The storm's biting winds ruined photos opportunities and canceled a demonstration at a University of Idaho agricultural experimentation field.

But Republican Sen. James McClure, who brought Bush to Idaho, noted that farmers seeking a decision should be grateful for the contribution. He's taking all the credit," McClure said during a meeting with agricultural leaders.

Some of Bush's humanity also poked through during the Twin Falls stop squeezed into his schedule between southern California and Billings, Mont.

He thanked College of Southern Idaho officials for the "great honor to be on this campus of SUI — South Idaho University?" — before his speech.

And he drew laughs and applause by stumbling through a description of the Reagan administration.

"We've had some serious setbacks," he said.

But after the audience quieted, Bush proved he's a good sport.

"Sometimes I feel like the javelin competitor, who won the coin toss and elected to receive," he said.

## Stallings applauds Bush's sugar stand but favors Dukakis

WASHINGTON — Democratic Congressman Richard Stallings praised Vice President George Bush's stand on sugar beets Friday, but pointed out that Democratic candidate Michael Dukakis also supports beet farmers.

Thursday in Boise and Friday in Twin Falls, Bush told farmers that he supported keeping farm subsidies and quotas on sugar beets. Bush's position differs from that of President Reagan, who has urged a worldwide reduction of farm subsidies.

"Under a Bush administration, the (sugar) program would continue even though I would try very hard to expand markets abroad by breaking down barriers to American products," the vice president said.

Stallings said that he was "pleased that Mr. Bush is reversing the policies of the Reagan administration."

But he added that he was glad to hear that Democratic presidential

candidate Dukakis recognized the need to protect American sugar growers.

Last month Stallings said he would remain "uncommitted" as a "superdelegate" at the Democratic National Convention until he found out how the presidential candidates stood on sugar.

Friday he said that he was "leaning towards Dukakis; he's the only one left."

Dukakis still faces the Rev. Jesse Jackson in the race for the Demo-

cratic presidential nomination, but has such a commanding lead in convention delegates that he is almost certain to be nominated.

Bush already has garnered more than enough delegates to win the GOP's presidential nomination.

Dukakis has said that although he believes it is necessary to support U.S. sugar growers in the absence of international price control agreements, he is concerned about the effect of U.S. sugar policies on countries such as the Philippines and the Carib-

bean nations.

Those countries are limited in the amount of sugar they can export to this country by quotas.

But the Massachusetts governor added, and Stallings agrees, that many nations that export sugar to the U.S. prefer to sell a limited amount of sugar at higher prices than to sell a larger amount at the depressed world level.

Stallings and Dukakis agree that high sugar subsidies in the European Common Market are responsible for

the low world price of sugar and the need for American quotas on the importation of sugar.

"The culprit in this mess is the European Economic Community," Stallings said. "I really have been upset with the Reagan administration because it blames the EEC but still wants to eliminate the American sugar grower."

American raw sugar sold for about 22.1 cents a pound in February, according to a recent U.S. Department of Agriculture report.

## Police charge man with rape in Burley

BURLEY — A man believed to be from California was arrested late Thursday night after he allegedly raped and kidnapped the clerk of a Burley hotel in which he was staying, police officials said.

Jeffrey Keith Hoggan, 19, was arrested at approximately 11 p.m. after driving away from the Budget Inn, said Lt. Jim Hignens of the Cassia County Sheriff's Office. Hoggan allegedly robbed the hotel at that point prior to the rape and kidnapping, police said.

Court officials said Hoggan was arraigned Friday on a charge of rape, Minidoka County Prosecutor Charles Creason Jr. could not be reached for comment Friday, but police said they expect additional charges of armed robbery and kidnapping to be filed against Hoggan.

Court officials said bail was set at \$50,000. A preliminary hearing has not yet been scheduled.

Hignens said Hoggan provided police with a Burley address but is believed to be from California. The lieutenant added that he did not know how long Hoggan had been registered in the Burley hotel, located on U.S. Interstate 84 in Minidoka County.

Hoggan allegedly robbed the hotel sometime around 10:45 p.m., Hignens said. Cassia County authorities went to the hotel after a newly arrived clerk reported that the clerk going off duty was missing and there was no money in the cash register.

Hignens said arriving police saw the missing clerk and an unidentified man walking in the hotel's parking lot. "The male and the clerk got into a vehicle and sped off quite rapidly," he said.

Police followed the car and arrested Hoggan seven miles west of Burley on U.S. Interstate 84.

"It wasn't really a chase," Hignens said. "We just followed him until we had enough backup."

Officials from the Minidoka County Sheriff's Office and the Idaho State Police assisted in the arrest.

Following the robbery, Hoggan allegedly took the clerk back to his hotel room where the rape occurred, Hignens said. The clerk, in her early 20s, was "shook up" but did not require medical attention, Hignens said.

## Employment highest level in 7 years

**Job opportunities better than last year**

TWIN FALLS — Relatively good spring weather and a continuing positive outlook for Idaho's economy sent the state's jobless rate plunging last month as total employment stood at its highest level in over seven years, the Employment Department reported.

The department's preliminary estimate of April unemployment pushed the seasonally adjusted rate down a half point to a flat 5 percent, the lowest level since the rate dipped to 4.9 percent last September.

The Magic Valley's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in April matched the state level at 5 percent, holding constant from March, said Lon McDonald at the Job Service office in Twin Falls.

Employment was increased by 1,773 people over March here, he said. The large increase is due to the spring gear-up in April. Farm employment is in full swing and retail business is flourishing.

The Job Service has seen a real increase in job orders, McDonald said.

"There is more opportunity in the job market now than a year ago," he said.

It was the 16th straight month that the state jobless rate has run below year-earlier levels, underscoring the official optimism over Idaho's economic resurgence. The state rate in April 1987 was 6.1 percent.

The Idaho developments mirrored the job picture nationally as the country's April unemployment rate fell another notch to 5.4 percent, the lowest rate in nearly 14 years.

Nationwide, over 600,000 workers found jobs last month, and in Idaho the number of workers off the job fell by 1,800 while total employment was up by 4,800 from the revised March. Employment level of just over 408,000. April employment was at the highest level since December 1978 and just 5,300 jobs short of the record of 416,300 set in June 1979. A year ago, total employment stood at less than 400,000.

Another 3,000 workers joined the Idaho labor force last month, possibly launching a recovery from the dip below 430,000 experienced in March.

The jobless rate remained stable or fell from March in all the regions of the state except in Bon-

## Rain knocks out power, closes schools

TWIN FALLS — Friday's rainfall, the heaviest of the year, knocked out power in pockets of Twin Falls County, closed down a school district, precipitated rock slides and washed out roads.

"It's a nice day for January, and this is May 6," said Bill Galkin of the National Weather Service in Kimberly.

Galkin said the Twin Falls area had received half an inch of rain by mid-afternoon Friday, and another quarter inch was expected through the evening. "The heaviest previous rainfall this year was 47 inch on April 4."

Cold weather accompanied the downpour, as temperatures in Twin Falls were 30 degrees lower than normal. Galkin said the high temperature Friday was 41 degrees, recorded during the day's early morning hours.

Idaho Power Co. officials said the torrential rainfall, which started at 7 a.m., kept them busy throughout the day chasing power outages. The hardest hit area was Rogerson and Hollister, down in that area," said Sid Brewer, an engineering supervisor.

Officials were working non-stop to reconnect power in the southern Twin Falls County area. "We'll get parts of it back on, but they'll probably be working on it through the night," Brewer said.

The Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office received several reports of vehicle slide-offs on U.S. Highway 93, which runs through Hollister and Rogerson. No serious injuries were reported as of Friday afternoon.

Brewer said parts of Filer and Buhl also lost power throughout the day, though company officials were able to reconnect those areas before early evening.

Filer High School Principal Vanikotis said the Filer School District was closed Friday afternoon due to the weather's effects. "School was dismissed at 1:30, which was just as well because the power then went out here for about 45 minutes," Vanikotis said.

The district includes four schools — a senior high school, junior high school and elementary school in Filer, and an elementary school in Hollister.

Vanikotis said power at the Hollister Elementary School was knocked out shortly before noon, a circumstance which precipitated the closing of the other schools. The principal said the Filer-based schools were closed so older brothers and sisters could babysit their siblings stranded

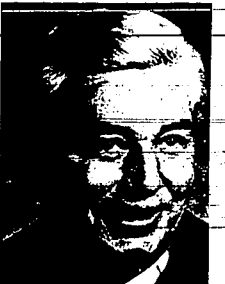

## Man robs Twin Falls hotel

TWIN FALLS — A Twin Falls hotel was robbed at gunpoint late Thursday night by a man who threatened to shoot the clerk and repeatedly told her not to look at his face, police said.

The robbery occurred at the Weston Inn on Blue Lakes Boulevard North, located just a few blocks from the Holiday Inn where Vice President George Bush was staying the night.

Pat Birmingham, a commander with the Twin Falls Department of Public Safety, said no arrests were made Friday in connection with the crime.

Between \$300 and \$500 were taken during the robbery, which occurred at approximately 11:30 p.m., police records show.

"Don't look at my face," the robber told the clerk, according to reports. "If I see you do, don't look at my face."

Mandi Blakley, the 21-year-old clerk on duty, also told police that the robber ordered her to give him "all the money in the drawer and stack it neatly."

According to police reports, the robber then told Blakley to go lay down in a back room for five minutes or he would shoot her.

The robber, who was armed with a blue revolver, was described as being approximately 6'3". He was reportedly wearing a white, long-sleeve sweatshirt and a white baseball cap.

He was estimated to be between 25 and 39 years old.

## Employee suffers man's bite

TWIN FALLS — A Twin Falls man was arrested Thursday on charges of petti theft and battery after he allegedly bit a store employee who was detaining him for suspected shoplifting, police officials said.

James Gruenwald, 21, was arraigned on the charges Friday and released on his own recognizance.

But when the 14-year-old boy peered inside the new acquisition after unscrewing the top this week, he found himself looking at an "in-tact detonating device. A unit from Mountain Home Air Force Base was called in for purposes of the shell.

"I've seen pictures of detonators so when I saw it I knew what it was," the boy said, and to be on the safe side, he had the bomb squad check the three shells already in his collection to make sure they were defused.

## North Idaho College faces some tough budget choices

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Limited financial support from state lawmakers this winter could force a re-evaluation of North Idaho College's role in the community, President Bob Bennett says.

"We'll have to rethink exactly what we're about if that kind of tight money continues," Bennett said. "We're just going to have to tighten our belts."

The college received an increase of \$129,800, or 4.3 percent, in state aid for the coming year even though the school's enrollment is jumping almost 500 students, or 9 percent. The increase mirrored the percentage hike granted the four state colleges and vocational education in a session that saw lawmakers hold the line on spending to avert a major election-year tax hike.

State support for the community colleges accounts for less than half of the schools' total budget. The rest

comes from local property tax, special funds and student fees.

Dean of Students Dave Lindsay and Faculty Assembly President Len Mattie said the school needs to take a hard look at how it spends its money.

"It's perhaps time the college took a look at where we're spending our dollars and look closely at what 'growth' really means," Mattie maintained.

# Guard suspected in \$2.5 million theft

CORINNE, Utah (AP) — A Wells Fargo armored car driver was charged Friday with robbing \$2.5 million from the vehicle while two guards slept in the vehicle's bunk section, authorities said.

In a complaint issued by U.S. Magistrate Ronald Boyce, Jared Layne Gray, 26, of Murray, was charged with embezzling and stealing the money during an interstate shipment of funds to the federal reserve bank in Salt Lake City.

Ex-Elder County Sheriff's Detective Ken Adams said that Gray "turned up missing and hasn't been seen since" the 6:30 p.m. Thursday incident at a Texaco service station and convenience store just off Interstate 15 in northern Utah.

An affidavit accompanying the complaint said the robbery was reported to authorities by the other two security guards aboard the Wells Fargo truck, Scott Redford and Dale Neilson, for whom hometowns were not available. The truck was on its way to Salt Lake City from Boise.

The FBI took over investigation of the robbery because it involved money headed to or from a federally insured

bank, said FBI agent Cal Ciega.

The Wells Fargo Armored Service Corp. office in Salt Lake City referred calls about the incident to the company's Atlanta headquarters, which in turn forwarded calls to the company's parent, Baker Industries of Parsippany, N.J.

However, a secretary for Communications Director Joe Allen said he had left for the day and no other company officials could comment.

No one was injured in the robbery, although the three guards all were armed. "No violence, no force, no struggles," Adams said, adding that apparently none of the guards ever brandished their weapons.

Detective Lynn Yeates and FBI agent Don Kirby said after the money was taken, the thief apparently blocked the 38,000-pound truck's front doors shut from the outside, trapping his co-workers inside the cab.

The affidavit, taken by the U.S. Attorney's Office from Kirby, stated that the trapped guards managed to get the attention of the service station attendant who then opened the truck's door.

Authorities declined to say whether there were any leads on Gray's whereabouts.

Kirby's affidavit said that he had been told by another agent that Farroll Gray, Gray's brother, had received a telephone call from Gray in which he allegedly said he had been involved in an armored car robbery, was all right, but sorry for any embarrassment the action would cause his family.

The affidavit said that Redford and Neilson were in the truck's bunk area asleep when Gray pulled the truck off the freeway. Redford told authorities that he heard noise in the section of

the truck where the money was loaded up.

Yeates said more than 30 law officers scoured the area without success and descriptions of the suspect were broadcast to police throughout the West.

The armored vehicle was impounded Friday for evidence processing at an undisclosed location.

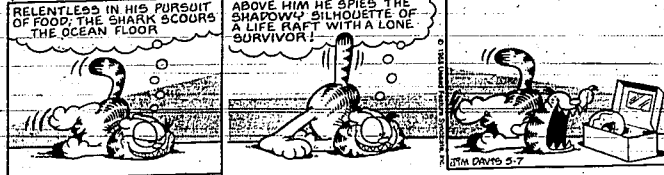

# Regan book irritates Reagan

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan expressed irritation Friday about an upcoming book by former chief of staff Donald T. Regan, saying "he's chosen to attack my wife and I don't look kindly upon that at all."

Regan's book, scheduled to be published this month, is said to reveal that Mrs. Regan used astrology to determine the timing of the president's speeches and travel.

The president has denied that any of his decisions have been influenced by astrology, in which the position of the sun, moon and stars are studied in the belief that they influence human affairs.

During a photo session at the start of a Cabinet meeting, reporters asked Reagan whether he felt betrayed or angered by Regan's book.

"Well, I will say this, that I would have preferred it if he'd decided to attack me, and apparently from what we hear he's chosen to attack my wife, and I don't look kindly upon that at all," the president replied.

Regan in the past has reacted sharply to criticism of his wife or suggestions that she interferes or has too great a role in administration decision-making.

Regan was frequently at odds with

the first lady before being forced out of his job early last year, and Mrs. Regan's opposition was widely believed to have been a factor in his ouster.

The president said he did not expect his former top staff aide and treasury secretary to send him a copy of his book, which is being published by Harcourt, Brace Jovanovich.

"I don't think he's going to send one unless I'm prepared to send a check in return," the president said.

Tom Dawson, a Regan spokesman, said Regan "has had and will have no comments regarding his book until it is published."

# FDA warns consumers of Humco Ipecac

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hundreds of thousands of bottles of Humco brand syrup of Ipecac, possibly containing a deadly poison, remain in American homes, the Food

and Drug Administration said Friday.

As many as 400,000 1-ounce bottles labeled Ipecac may actually contain oil of eucalyptus, which

could prove fatal if given to children, the FDA said.

The FDA initially announced a recall of the Humco brand Ipecac April 23.

# Edwin Meese plans to stay awhile

WASHINGTON (AP) — Edwin Meese III is quietly making plans to remain as attorney general at least until September.

Despite widespread speculation that the heat generated by Meese's legal problems will soon drive him from his post, there is "his latest flap a largely overlooked" clue from Meese himself about his determination to stay on.

Amid a stream of public disclosures about his assorted legal problems, Meese last month privately and

quickly accepted an invitation to make an official visit to Japan as attorney general Aug. 29-Sept. 1. Even though the trip itself has engendered controversy, he gives every indication of planning to go.

At Mc Krupin's restaurant, frequented by lawyers and lobbyists, political operatives and pundits, Krupin says, "They talk about Meese but they don't make any comments" about the propriety of Meese's actions. "Nobody knows if he's going to stay or go. They just talk about how long he'll stay."

Independent counsel James McKay is not expected to indict Meese in any of the handful of cases he has investigated, but McKay's public report is expected late this month.

McKay is expected to excoriate Meese for tolerating the appearance of conflicts of interest even where they may not in fact exist. Actions creating such appearances are forbidden by presidential order.

McKay then is likely to refer his evidence to Justice Department internal ethics officers for recommendations on whether administrative discipline by President Reagan is required.

# Tear-gases furor eases

WASHINGTON (AP) — A California tear gas manufacturer said Friday it no longer will sell its product to Israel following complaints from Arab Americans and human rights activists that the gas has been misused, causing deaths and injuries.

Burl Alison, a vice president of TransTechnology in Sherman Oaks, Calif., said the company's board of directors agreed on Thursday with the decision to stop selling to Israel for the time being.

TransTechnology, which makes tear gas at its Federal Laboratories in Saltsburg, Pa., has been under "tremendous pressure" from Arab-American groups to end the sales, she said.

Last month, several hundred people protested the tear gas sales to Israel at a "demonstration" outside the lab. Thirteen people were arrested for civil disobedience.

Mrs. Alison did not rule out the pos-

sibility that tear gas sales would resume, but she said that would happen only if the company can determine the chemical crowd-control agent is being handled properly.

The company wants "some confirmation that their (the Israelis) intent is not to use it as a weapon," she said.

There are no outstanding contracts to ship tear gas to Israel, and the final shipment was made earlier this year, Mrs. Alison said. She refused to provide a date. Sales to Israel comprised only a fraction of the company's business, she said.

At Mc Alison said the company had informed Israeli officials about the decision and "they don't like it." The Israelis told the company they "understand the pressures that have been put on us," she said.

"Although Israel has not contracted to buy more tear gas from TransTechnology," Mrs. Alison said, the Israelis want to purchase more of the product.

# Space storm may interfere

WASHINGTON (AP) — A geomagnetic storm is sweeping over the Earth and may interfere with satellite, radio and telephone communications, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration reported Friday.

The storm, which affects the Earth's magnetic field, struck Thursday evening and is expected to end by sometime Saturday or Sunday, said Joe Hirman of the Space Environment Services Center in Boulder, Colo.

Hirman said the disturbance originated in a huge flare that erupted from the sun on Wednesday.

It took about a day for the effects to reach Earth, and those peaked on Friday, he said.

Most notable for Americans will be the display of the northern lights, which is an electrical phenomenon induced by the current from the sun. Those were visible from Boulder on Thursday night, Hirman said.

# American hostages mistreated for escape attempts

PARIS (AP) — American hostages in Lebanon were brutally mistreated for trying to escape from their Palestinian captors, a freed French hostage was quoted as saying Friday.

Journalist Jean-Paul Kauffmann shared a cell recently with American Frank Herbert Reed who was "mistreated to the point

of being left prostrate," Kauffmann's sister, Marie-Genevieve Dagin, was quoted as saying.

Reed was director of the Lebanese International School when he was captured Sept. 9, 1986.

Mrs. Dagin's comments were reported by Agence-France-Presse one day after Kauffmann and two

other Frenchmen arrived in Paris following their release in Lebanon.

Kauffmann and the other Frenchmen, diplomats Marcel Carton and Marcel Fontaine, were released from Val-de-Grace military hospital Friday after receiving medical examinations.

Kauffmann, in his own interview Friday with the French news agen-

cy, said the remaining Western hostages in Lebanon were "my main concern. I ask their families to remain patient and stay confident." He was also quoted as saying he read the novel "War and Peace" 21 times during his captivity.

In a separate statement issued after the dispatch quoting his sis-

ter, Kauffmann said he intended to comment more about the other hostages next week and did not want anyone relaying his impressions until then.

A woman who answered Mrs. Dagin's telephone in Rennes on Friday said she was out of town and could not be reached.

Mrs. Dagin was quoted by AFP

as saying Kauffmann told her the American hostages held by the Iranian Shiite Moslem group, Islamic Jihad were "the object of brutality because they tried to escape."

There are 18 foreigners missing in Lebanon, including nine Americans. The hostage held longest is Terry A. Anderson, 40.

## Arab-American faces Israeli deportation order

JERUSALEM (AP) — The government Friday ordered an Arab-American leader of Palestinian resistance to leave the country and accused him of "preaching violence."

The United States and left-wing Israelis sought to prevent the deportation.

The move to deport 44-year-old Mubarak Awad was the latest Israeli action aimed at breaking the back of Palestinian resistance in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip. That resistance has been built on strikes and other protest techniques Awad advocated.

The United States asked Israel to delay Awad's deportation while U.S. Ambassador Thomas Pickering met with Foreign Minister Shimon Peres and asked Israel to reconsider the order, Israeli television reported.

In the occupied West Bank, Israeli troops blocked all commerce for the second straight day. The soldiers shut down shops and gas stations, halted transit and even chased away street vendors.

The government has been trying to force merchants to open and close on Israeli orders, not at the behest of opposing leaders, and troops have threatened to weld shut the doors of shops whose mer-

## French spy ends exile for bombing

PARIS (AP) — A French spy convicted in the sinking of the Greenpeace ship Rainbow Warrior and the death of a photographer on board was freed from his island exile Friday because she is pregnant.

Premier Jacques Chirac said.

Capt. Dominique Prieur's departure from Hao, a French military base, was announced about five months after the other agent convicted in the incident, Maj. Alain Mafart, was returned to Paris. Mafart had complained of a stomach ailment.

Mrs. Prieur's release also came two days before a presidential election that pits Chirac, a conservative, against Francois Mitterrand, the Socialist incumbent and heavy favorite.

The newspaper Le Monde said: "You can't make us believe that the captain's condition demands that her situation be arranged 48 hours before the elections."

Destruction of the protest ship in July 1985 at its berth in Auckland, New Zealand, was a fiasco for the French secret service. It was a dark hour for the Mitterrand administration but the agents, who pleaded guilty to manslaughter, were heroes at home.

Mrs. Prieur, 38, and Mafart, 37, were arrested after explosives attached to the hull sank the Rainbow Warrior, which was preparing to sail to the French nuclear test site in the South Pacific. A Greenpeace photographer was killed.

They were each sentenced to 10 years in a New Zealand prison but under an accord reached by the United Nations in 1986 were to remain in Hao for three years.

Mrs. Prieur is married to Joel Prieur, a Defense Ministry employee posted to Hao following the accord.

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# State's best vie in Twin Falls Classic today

**TWIN FALLS**—The numbers all favor the Boise area boys while the girls should have a dogfight for team honors Saturday when the annual Twin Falls Classic unfolds at Bruin Stadium.

This is perhaps the strongest field that assembles each year in Idaho as 11 schools from Twin Falls east collide with the eight of the Southern Idaho Conference. Since most of the schools will be bringing nearly full teams, the depth that carries into the fourth, fifth and six places, very often results in better competition than the regionally-diluted field at state.

Things get underway at 11 a.m. with the preliminaries in the high, 100- and 100-meter dash, followed by the 3200-meter final. The 200 preliminaries will follow the 3200. At the same time, the pole vault, triple jump,

boys-shot-and-girls-discus-and-girls-high-jumps will be going. The other field events start at 12:30 p.m. with the running finals opening at 2 p.m.

What actually is supposed to show up here Saturday are the top eight finishers from the Southern Idaho Conference finals in Boise Friday and Saturday and the Gem State Conference finals that were held Saturday in Rexburg. Of course, some latitude for injuries and discretionary changes will be allowed.

How the teams compare is another matter, too, because while both teams were cursed with wind, the tracks don't run exactly the same way.

Usually, the SIC comes into this one with considerably the best times but the Gem State manages to come up with a surprise or three and take

in a few more first places than suspected.

In the boys division, the Gem State boys have the best time in just two track events but rate a little better in the field competition.

Mark Denny of Madison's 15.4 is the best high hurdle time by a tenth of a second and Blackfoot's Randy Nated posted a 1:56 in the 800 for the best by nearly three seconds.

The Gem State also leads in the triple jump, long jump, Shotput and Pole vault.

But to emphasize how the strength as shifted in the SIC track world, Meridian and Centennial, both Meridian schools, took 14 of the 18 events in the SIC. And such perennial powerhouse as Borah scored just 41 points.

The SIC brings in some spectacular relay times but then the Nampa track

is wont to produce those historically. Meridian clocked "42.2" in the 400; 1:28.6 in the 800 and 3:20.7 in the 1600. Centennial had a 3:39.7 in the medley. Those compare with 43.8, 1:33.5, 3:30.2 and 3:50.8, respectively, for the Gem State.

The girls team division could be a major battle between Capital and Twin Falls but there is the kicker that if Highland sophomores Julie Briggs is entered in the long sprints, that will be a decided swing in points. Briggs ran only the 100 last week after sustaining a leg muscle pull the week before. She did qualify in the 200 and has been assigned a preliminary lane.

Capital had 113 points and Twin Falls 111 in their conference finals. Highland was close to the Bruins with 84—within Briggs' reach at least—

while Capital had a 38-point cushion over Centennial.

Capital won just one individual event on the track—the intermediate hurdles—while Twin Falls got two firsts from Jennifer Hannah in the 800 and 1600 and another from Molly Wallace in the 400. Twin Falls won two relays—and therein might lie the crux of this title chase. Capital has Bruins head-to-head in the medley and 1600. Capital has a two-second edge in the medley and is 1.6 seconds behind in the 1600. Its 1:48.7 is the best by nearly two seconds over Highland in the 800.

Hannah faces two tough and familiar foes in her specialties, Trina Henrie of Capital in the 800 and Michelle Brown of Borah in the mile. She had a two-second edge in the 800 but was

down three-tenths of a second in the mile on comparable scores. But a week earlier, Hannah won the Boise State two mile against Brown.

"The 800 is also critical for us," says Twin Falls Coach Duane Stands, "not only from the standpoint of Jenny running first but the possibility that Henrie and Lisa Reents (Boise) could displace (Bruin senior Dana) Robertson (from her usual second-place finish and eight points)."

Lisa White, Skyline, is the heavy favorite in the weights, a place that Kris Horner has to help the Bruins with second places to make the title charge stick.

From a Magic Valley standpoint, the best chances for boys titles apparently will come from Jason Duncan of Minico in the discus and Justin Bair, Minico, in the shotput.

The Jerome boys and girls are the defending champions of both the Cross State and the SIC.

Except for Burley, Caldwell and Mountain Home, the cast is basically the same as the group that Jerome handled easily in the Tigers A-2 Classic here 10 days ago. In that meet, the Jerome boys outdistanced runnerup Buhl 203-96, while the girls beat Wood River, the second-place team, 172-103.

"We're hoping for some decent weather," said Dunne. "If the weather is bad, I don't know if we'll run it. As far as we're concerned, and Buhl and Wood River are concerned, this is just a meet to get ready for district."

Although neither Mountain Home nor Caldwell appear strong enough to challenge Jerome's boys or girls, they should provide some good individual matchups. The best should come in the boys' 100 meters where a rematch is looming between Jerome's John Gourley and Caldwell's Mark Bartlett. Gourley, the defending state A-2 champion, edged Bartlett in the event at the Boise Relays last month.

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# NL chief Giamatti cuts three days off Rose's suspension

NEW YORK (AP) — Despite his explanation and videotapes, Cincinnati Reds manager Pete Rose managed to get only a three-day break Friday in his 30-day suspension for shaving an umpire.

A three-man review panel upheld the suspension imposed by National League president Bart Giamatti, but Giamatti snipped the length after hearing Rose's plea. It remained the harshest punishment for a manager in 40 years.

"I'm a whole lot disappointed. I thought then and now that the suspension is too long," Rose said. "It was wrong to touch an umpire, especially twice, but he provoked me by touching me in the face."

"I hate to say it, but I'd probably do it again if the same situation came up."

Rose was penalized for twice pushing umpire Dave Pallone in the ninth inning of Saturday night's Mets-Reds

game at Riverfront Stadium. Rose's \$10,000 fine was left intact.

"I thought I'd get five or 10 days and a couple thousand dollars," Rose said at a news conference at his hotel after the panel's decision. "I'll all be forgotten when we win the West."

Giamatti, who imposed the punishment on Monday, counted this week as part of the suspension, which will now end June 1 instead of June 4. Rose has not managed since Sunday because he underwent arthroscopic knee surgery.

"The committee carefully reviewed all of the videotapes of the incident, heard evidence from Mr. Rose and his representative, and heard a full explanation of the reasons for the suspension from Mr. Giamatti," the league's Executive Committee said in a statement. "In view of all of the evidence and testimony heard, and after careful deliberation, the executive committee unanimously upholds the 30-

day suspension imposed."

The panel which heard Rose's appeal consisted of Bill Bartholomew, board chairman of the Atlanta Braves; Claude Brubaker, president of the Montreal Expos, and Chub Feeny, president of the San Diego Padres and former NL president.

Giamatti immediately said he was pleased with the decision and then modified the suspension.

"I have heard Mr. Rose's explanation, and in light of his service to baseball and the remorse expressed, I will count the time he has spent away from the team this week as part of his suspension," he said.

Rose met with Giamatti before facing the review board, hoping to persuade him to reduce the suspension to two weeks, the Associated Press learned. Giamatti was said to be amenable to lessening the month-long penalty, but not to 14 days.

Rose will be permitted to be in uniform during the suspension but he cannot be in the dugout during the game.

Rose arrived at league headquarters with videotapes and accompanied by his lawyer, Reuven Katz, and Reds general manager Murray Cook.

"I was given the opportunity to present my case," Rose said. "I thought we had a strong case."

Giamatti previously cited unruly behavior by the fans as one reason for the stiff penalty. The umpires were showered with debris, forcing Pallone to leave the game.

"The garbage came on the field because of that bad call," Rose said, referring to Pallone's delayed call of a play at first base.

Rose said it was five minutes after he left the field before the debris was thrown.

"This was the one appeal we get. It's over and we accept it for that,"

Katz, Rose's attorney said.

The umpire, NL officials were flooded with phone calls from Reds fans who wanted to know if Rose won his appeal.

Rose said Giamatti has never acknowledged that Pallone poked the manager in the face.

"I gather Bart's whole problem is me pushing the umpire," said Rose, who earlier this week displayed a red mark on his chin, he said, was put there by Pallone's finger.

Pallone says the argument was so heated he does not know if he did poke Rose.

"I have no idea whether or not I touched him with my finger. I have seen film clips, still photographs and slow-motion stills and I still have not seen any evidence whether I touched him on the cheek," Pallone said.

The umpire made his first public comment on the episode to David Raymond, the Philly Phanatic mascot for

Phillies' home games and a radio reporter for WDEF in Wilmington, Del.

"The comments appeared in Rich Ashburn's column in the Philadelphia Daily News."

"I would never say that Pete just made this up," Pallone said of Rose's claim that the umpire had poked him, "but I can't honestly say whether I did or didn't."

Rose's penalty is the longest suspension for a manager for on-the-field behavior, and the most severe since 1947, when Brooklyn Dodgers manager Leo Durocher was suspended for conduct detrimental to baseball, despite of which Happy Chandler, then the commissioner never spelled out.

It reportedly included association with unsavory characters, including gamblers, heated run-ins with baseball people and a violent disagreement with Larry MacPhail, then part owner of the New York Yankees.

# Winning Colors, Private Terms rated as favorites in today's Kentucky Derby

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — The filly Winning Colors won't be the only lady in the Kentucky Derby Saturday at Churchill Downs.

Back for her 114th Derby appearance will be Lady Luck.

"My daddy always said he'd rather be lucky than good," said Jack Van Berg, who won the Derby last year with Alysheba.

Van Berg, who has been good, and lucky, enough to be the only trainer to saddle 6,000 winners, might need a special smile from the Lady Saturday.

He will saddle lightly regarded Miss Dancer in a field of 17 2-year-olds for the 1 1/4-mile Derby. If all goes to the post at 5:33 p.m. EDT, under scale weight of 126 pounds, the race will be worth \$786,200, with \$611,200 to the winner.

The early favorites are Private Terms, who has won all seven of his career starts, and Winning Colors, the filly who thrashed eight male rivals in the 1 1/4-mile Santa Anita Derby April 9.

However, the race generally is considered to be wide open.

Asked to handicap the race, Charlie Whittingham, who trains Lovely One and who has won more than 500 stakes, said, "Any one of a half dozen

could win — maybe a dozen. It just depends on who has the luck."

At the top of the stretch in the 1986 Derby, Bill Shoemaker, riding the Birmingham-trained Ferdinand, and Pat Day, aboard Ramage, gunned their mounts toward the same hole.

Ferdinand got there first and won the race.

"If you get in tough luck, like getting cut off, it's tough to come back again," said Charles Taylor of Windfields Farm, a co-owner of Canadian-bred Regal-Classic, Windfields-won the 1984 Derby with Canadian-bred Northern Dancer.

The luck of the draw appears to have been with Winning Colors and against Private Terms. The filly will start from post 11, while Private Terms will start from No. 16.

The most favorable Derby post-positions are generally believed to be from five through 12. However, Gato Del Sol won from No. 19 in 1983; Swale won from No. 15 in 1984; Ferdinand won from the rail in 1986 and Alysheba won out of the No. 3 last year.

Of course, there are worse things than a bad post position. Stalwart came down with a 102-degree fever Wednesday and wasn't entered.

Talking about the fickle fate and

seemingly eternal optimism that are integral parts of horse racing, Gary Jones, who trains Silvano, said, "A trainer once told me, 'I want to commit suicide, but I want to wait until Thursday so how my maiden runs.'"

As usual, the Derby, which will be televised by ABC, is a study in contrasts.

Winning Colors will be the 18th starter for trainer D. Wayne Lukas, who will be seeking his first Derby victory in his eighth consecutive appearance. Lukas' best Derby performance was a third with Partes in 1981.

Lukas raced a filly entry in 1984 when Life's Magic finished eighth and Althea was 19th.

Charles Hadry will be saddling his first Derby starter in Private Terms, who worked three-eighths of a mile Friday at 39 1/2 seconds. Grannicus, another Canadian-bred, sizzled the same distance in 35 flat.

Five jockeys will be riding in their first Derby. They are Chris Antley on Private Terms, Julio Pezua on Intensive Command, Pat Johnson on Sea Trek, Shaun Romero on Jim's Orbit and Ken Desormeaux on Purdue King.

The 55-year-old Shoemaker will ride Lovely One in his 26th Derby in a bid for a record-tying fifth victory. The Shoe won with Swaps, 1955; Tomy Lee, 1959; Lucky Debonair, 1965; and Ferdinand. The riders of five Derby winners were Eddie Arcaro and Bill Hartack.

Winning Colors will be the 35th filly to start in the Derby and will be trying to become the third to win. The winners were Regret, 1915, and Genuine Risk, 1980.

Kingpost will be trying to become the eighth gelding to win the Derby and the first since Clyde Van Dusen broke from the No. 20 post to do it in 1929.

Private Terms will be trying to become the fifth unbeaten winner of the Derby, joining Regret, Morvich, 1922; Majestic Prince, 1969; and Seattle Slew, 1977. The last unbeaten Derby starter was Air Forbes Won, who finished seventh in 1982.

Regal Classic or Grannicus could become the fifth Derby winner foaled outside the United States. Besides Northern Dancer in 1964; they were Sunny's Halo of Canada, 1969; and two colts foaled in England — Omar Khayyam, 1917, and Tomy Lee, 1959.

# Lohr holds lead in abbreviated tourney

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Bob Lohr retained the lead and only Curt Byrum could make a run at him Friday in the day-late completion of the second round in the \$1,388,889 Las Vegas Invitational golf tournament.

Lohr finished a second round 70 for a 136 total Thursday, before high winds forced an overnight delay for 71 players.

Byrum was among the group that returned in wind and cold Friday morning to finish second round play.

He dropped a 35-foot birdie putt on his final hole at the Desert Inn to stroke par 72 and move within one meter of the leader at 137, with two rounds to go in the shortened tournament.

The original format called for the 156 pros to play one round on each of three resort courses, each day with a different set of four amateurs. The field was to be cut after Friday's third round with the last 36 holes to be played at the Las Vegas Country Club.

But winds gusting to 55 miles per hour — the players at Spanish Trail said they were much stronger — caused the overnight delay in the second round and reduced the tournament to 72 holes.

The third round will be played Saturday. After 54 holes are completed, the 624 amateurs drop out and the professional field will be cut to the 150 scorers for Sunday's final round of the chase for a \$250,000 first prize.

Byrum was tied at seven under par with Peter Jacobson. Ben Crenshaw and Keith Clearwater were next at 138.

Of the five leaders, only Byrum had to finish second round play Friday.

And of the top five, Lohr, Jacobson, Byrum and Crenshaw all will play their third round at Spanish Trail, by far the most difficult of the three courses and the one that took the brunt of the damaging winds.

"Unfortunately, anyone who played at Spanish Trail Thursday afternoon is pretty much out of the tournament," said Greg Norman, who was among that group that played in the worst of the wind.

Norman, a former winner of this title who finished first and second in his last two starts, returned Friday to complete a 75 that put him at 143 through two rounds.

Masters champion Sandy Lyle also came back to Spanish Trail for seven holes Friday, finished off a 76 and was at 147.

First-round leader Bobby Wadkins went from an opening 64 to a wind-interrupted 79, including 41 on the back at Spanish Trail.

"It was cold and windy when we started this morning," said Byrum, who resumed play with winds gusting to 35 miles per hour and temperatures in the 40s.

"I knew I was in good position in the tournament, so I tried to think of it as a full day," said Byrum, who returned to face a 20-foot par-saving putt on his 16th hole. He missed it and went one over par for the day.

Byrum made par on his 17th hole, then ran in that 35-foot putt for birdie on his final hole that lifted him to within one of the leader.

# Bulls-Cavs bruising resumes

RICHFIELD, Ohio (AP) — Ron Harper and Craig Ehlo are bruised and battered from banging into Dave Corzine's picks, Michael Jordan is bruised and battered from banging into Harper and Ehlo.

Game 5 of the Cleveland Cavaliers-Chicago Bulls series, Harper says, "is going to be World War V."

The Cavaliers tied the first-round, best-of-five series 2-2 Thursday night, beating the Bulls 97-91 despite 44 points by Jordan.

Cleveland countered Chicago's multiple-pick offense, designed to free Jordan, by treating him roughly whenever he didn't have the ball, and occasionally when he did.

"This is brutal," Harper said. "With this being the first year in the playoffs for most of us, you have to be pumped all the time. It was a war out there."

Harper and Ehlo, assigned to guard Jordan, collected five fouls each in Tuesday's victory by Cleveland, but Jordan also had five, several of them for pushing off to get away from the persistent defenders.

Jordan, who was playing with a painful strained muscle in his rib cage, then fouled out in the closing seconds of Thursday's game.

"It was a hard-fought battle," Jordan said. "I don't think they have the momentum now. I don't think either team has the momentum. It's a short series, and now one break, one set over, one mistake can determine the outcome."

Harper led Cleveland with 30 points Thursday, 20 in the second half. He and Larry Nance also played brilliant defense at the end, with Harper blocking a Jordan shot, Nance blocking a Horace Grant shot and Harper stealing the ball from Corzine, all in the final two minutes.

"They react very well with their backs to the wall," Jordan said. "Now, this is a back-to-the-wall situation for us. We're trying to fulfill that next goal, and that's to get past the first round."

The Bulls have been to the playoffs each of Jordan's four years in the league, but they haven't yet made it to the second round with him. Cleveland, in the playoffs for only the second time in 10 years, hasn't been past the first round since 1976.

Chicago coach Doug Collins said it's critical for his team to avoid putting itself into a hole early in the game.

"We have to come out and play for 48 minutes," Collins said, "like we did

when we were 17 or 18 down. It seems like we have to be bleeding and on the verge of not getting it stopped before we get our game going."

Collins said it fitting that the Bulls and Cavaliers, who split their regular-season series 3-3, are tied in the playoffs.

"It's interesting. We came here with a 2-0 lead, and now they're what they were supposed to get," he said. "Now it's a game where you throw it up before 20,000 Chicago

The key for Chicago may be whether Jordan can score at least 50 points. He collected 60 and 55 in the first two games at Chicago, and the Bulls won both; when Cleveland held him to 38 and 44 at the Coliseum in Richmond, the Bulls lost.

"No, he's not getting any easier to read," Harper said. "He's got 1,002 moves. We know Chicago has that great player they can get the ball in the last two minutes of the game. We just can't let their crowd get us out of our type of game."

## Market task force deplores turf fights

WASHINGTON (AP) — The presidential task force appointed last fall to study the October stock market crash says progress toward reforming the market should not be sidetracked by turf battles among federal regulators.

A statement released Thursday by the New York office of Nicholas F. Brady, a Wall Street investment banker who headed the presidential panel, said the "flaws in the mechanisms that govern our equity markets are still in place and must be addressed."

The statement said debate over market reform "is concentrated on who should oversee the needed changes," rather than on what should be reformed, on which the statement said "there is much more agreement."

"Self-interest—and turf—battles among the regulators and exchanges cannot be allowed to stand in the way of necessary reform of a limited number of issues that cut across market places," it said.

The statement was released three days after Brady met with a Reagan administration working group which is formulating specific suggestions for reforming the markets.

That panel, headed by Treasury Undersecretary George G. Gould—comprising the chairmen of the Federal Reserve Board, Securities and Exchange Commission and Commodity Futures Trading Commission, is due to report to President Reagan later this month.

According to sources familiar with the group's work, it is unlikely to go along with the Brady panel's recommendation that the Federal Reserve or a coordinating committee of regulators should get authority to coordinate stock trading and stock index futures trading.

Brady is backing legislation sponsored by Senate Banking Committee Chairman William Proxmire, D-Wis., which would create a coordinating body chaired by the head of the Federal Reserve Board.

The Brady panel's statement warned that if it would be unable to abandon the development of appropriate legislation.

Two sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said it appeared that the working group was making progress toward an agreement on coordinated "circuit breakers," which

would halt trading when markets take an extreme dive or climb.

However, the sources said there was less agreement on coordinating margins, which set the amount of money required to make an investment—either the futures or stock market—although the margins work differently in each market, they currently are lower in the futures markets.

The five members of the Brady task force said "it is essential to harmonize the level of margins," adding that margin setting was too important to leave to the exchanges.

The Federal Reserve sets margins for stocks and stock options, while individual futures exchanges set their own margins.

"In the world of one market, it makes little sense to provide investors with different degrees of leverage depending on whether they enter through the stock or derivative (futures) door," the panel wrote.

Regarding circuit breakers, the Brady commission said it was encouraged by the work of the New York Stock Exchange and the Chicago Mercantile Exchange toward coordinating market halts.

However, it warned that "circuit breakers should not be set at levels that cause them to be triggered frequently."

The panel criticized a New York Stock Exchange move to restrict computerized program trading within the Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks swings up or down by 60 points.

That kind of circuit breaker, it said, "runs the risk of disconnecting the marketplaces, an outcome we believe would destabilize the market as a whole."

The Brady panel praised the efforts of the exchanges to expand trading capacity, easing the possibility that extremely high trading volume would cause a breakdown of the market.

"However, let us not fool ourselves. Merely increasing market capacity will not assure that a repeat of October will be averted," it said.

In addition to Brady, head of Dillon Read & Co., the panel members are Robert Krivy, chairman of Capital Guardian Trust Co.; John Opel, former IBM chairman; James C. Cotting, Navistar International Corp. chairman; and Howard Stein, Dreyfus Corp. chairman.

## Stocks falter on employment statistics

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market lost ground for the third straight session in slow trading Friday, faced with employment statistics that raised fears of tighter credit and higher interest rates.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks dropped 12.77 to 2,007.46, bringing its loss for the week to 24.87 points.

Declining issues outnumbered advances by more than 4 to 3 on the New York Stock Exchange, with 602 up, 845 down and 545 unchanged.

Big-board volume totaled 129,08 million shares, against 171.84 million in the previous session. The NYSE's composite index lost .63 to 145.83.

Before the market opened the Labor Department reported that the civilian unemployment rate fell to 5.4 percent in April from 5.6 percent the month before.

Wall Street had been warily awaiting the figures for several days, worrying that signs of continuing strength in the economy would build as a portent of increasing upward pressure on inflation and interest rates.

At first, the market advanced on the news, apparently because the reported increase in nonfarm payroll employment of 174,000 came "in to

ward the low end of advance estimates.

But as the session passed, prices headed lower while bond prices dropped and analysts described the job data as a likely negative for the inflation outlook.

"Hourly earnings rose a disquieting 0.5 percent," said economists at Merrill Lynch in their initial appraisal of the report. "Night labor markets will lead to further wage gains and rising inflation."

Losers among the blue chips included Merck, down 3/4% at 152. International Business Machines, down 1/2% at 110 1/2. Procter & Gamble, down 1/4% at 74 1/2. Ford Motor, down 1/4% at 49 1/2. General Electric, down 1/2% at 37 1/2.

Genentech fell 2 1/2% to 30 1/4. A company presentation prompted some analysts to scale back their expectations for sales this year of a Genentech drug used in treating heart-attack victims.

Trans World Airlines climbed 1 1/2 to 36 1/2. Directors approved a slightly increased offer from Carl Icahn, the company's chairman, to take it private by acquiring the approximately 28 percent of the stock still in public hands.

Micron Technology rose 1 1/2 to 23 1/2 on large volume in the over-the-counter market. The stock has recently been recommended by investment advisor Yale Hirsch and other analysts as a beneficiary of heavy demand and rising prices for computer memory chips.

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## Stocks falter on employment statistics

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market lost ground for the third straight session in slow trading Friday, faced with employment statistics that raised fears of tighter credit and higher interest rates.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks fell 22.77 to 2,007.46, bringing its loss for the week to 24.87 points.

Declining issues outnumbered advancers by more than 4 to 3 on the New York Stock Exchange, with 602 up, 845 down and 545 unchanged.

Big Board volume totaled 129.08 million shares, against 174.84 million in the previous session. The NYSE's composite index lost .63 to 145.88.

Before the market opened the Labor Department reported that the civilian employment rate fell to 6.4 percent in April from 6.6 percent the month before.

Wall Street was warily awaiting the figures for several days, worrying that signs of continuing strength in the economy would be read as a portent of increasing upward pressure on inflation and interest rates.

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At first, the market advanced on the news, apparently because the potential for a nonfarm payroll employment of 174,000 came in to

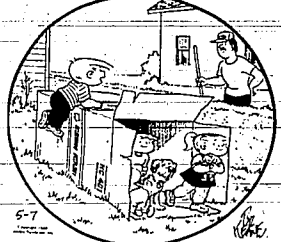

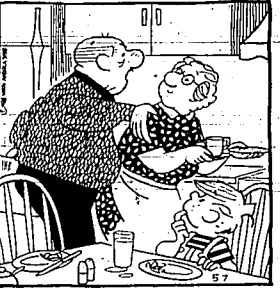

"None of us can stand other people having the same faults as ourselves."

Oscar Wilde, Well he have any trouble choosing the best suit to develop into today's slam. Nevertheless, not many will succeed in winning 12 tricks. Cover the East-West cards and try your luck at six no-trump.

South wins dummy's spade ace to lead a low club from dummy. Clearly the club suit offers today's best chance.

When East's jack appears, South faces a problem. Is East telling the truth or is he trying to talk South into adopting a different line? South decides to test once again and returns to dummy's spade king to lead another club. Horrors! East did have a singleton. Since the only chance left is with diamonds, South cashes his diamond ace and loses a finesse to East's queen. East shifts to hearts and South takes only nine tricks. Where did South go wrong?

It was right to start the bidding with the diamonds. However, South should have adopted a contingency plan. Instead of winning the first spade-in-dummy, he should have won it in his hand. He then cashes his club ace and enters dummy with a spade to lead club. East discards as South wins with his king. South now cashes the diamond ace and loses the diamond finesse as before. The difference is that dummy now has a spade entry to the long diamonds. If South had good luck in clubs is offset by good luck in diamonds.

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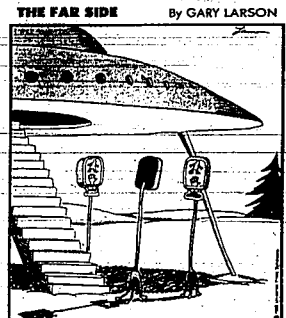

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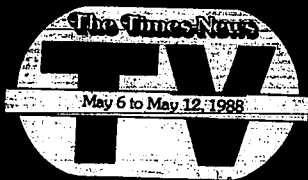

# 'The Caine Mutiny Court-Martial': a traditional, yet striking, remake

Of all the plays that made up the great 1950s golden age of drama, "The Caine Mutiny Court-Martial," which airs Sunday, May 8 on CBS, seems a curious choice of revival.

The 1954 courtroom drama, adapted by Herman Wouk from his Pulitzer Prize-winning novel "The Caine Mutiny," has no tenuous link to current events, as did NBC's recent production of "Inherit the Wind." Nor does it offer the chance to play a classic protagonist that "Death of a Salesman" offered Dustin Hoffman. Indeed, it seems a mere period piece.

But it is a natural for director Robert Altman, who initiated the new production and presented it to CBS. A one-time TV drama director who gained a reputation as a Hollywood iconoclast with the satires "M\*A\*S\*H" (1970) and "Nashville" (1975), Altman has lately adapted stage plays — among them, David Rabe's "Streamers" and Sam Shepard's "Fool for Love" for the movies, and Harold Pinter's "The Dumb Waiter" and "The Room" for ABC.

"The Caine Mutiny Court-Martial" reflects an unmistakably traditional sensibility. Indeed, the play depends on several somewhat outmoded dramatic conventions: the military as a citadel of honor and decency, the courtroom as a repository of law and order and the stage as a forum for ideas. While all three are challenged, the assumptions remain in place.

The play, and the fictional trial it depicts, explore the character of Capt. Queeg (Brad Davis), a career Navy officer and the commander of the destroyer USS Caine. In 1945, when the ship was being buffeted by a typhoon, Queeg was relieved of his command by young Lt. Maryk (Jeff Daniels). Now the war is over, and Maryk is on

trial for insubordination. Many of the participants in the trial feel that Queeg, a man given to fits of rash behavior, was unfit to command and that Maryk saved the ship and its crew. But others, including Maryk's defense attorney, Lt. Greenwald (Eric Bogosian), are reluctant to challenge Queeg because of his spotless Navy record.

The story, of course, is familiar from the 1954 movie "The Caine Mutiny," which starred Humphrey Bogart as Queeg and featured solid performances from E.G. Marshall, Lee Marvin and Fred MacMurray. But this production will not be mistaken for a remake. For one thing, Altman has adapted the stage play, not the film, and his use of hand-held shots, moving from the stand-to-the-gallery and back again; creates a sense of confinement missing from the more expansive movie.

Striking, too, is the cast. Playing Queeg is Brad Davis ("Midnight Express"), who, at 37, is a more plau-

sible Queeg than was the 55-year-old Bogart. Maryk is played by Jeff Daniels, Mia Farrow's imaginary lover in "The Purple Rose of Cairo." Greenwald is played by Eric Bogosian, the free-wheeling monologist whose "Talk Radio" was a downtown New York favorite last summer and will be a movie this fall. Playing the prosecutor, Cmdr. Challee, is Peter Gallagher, who held his own opposite Jack Lemmon in "Long Day's Journey into Night" and the recent miniseries "The Murder of Mary Phagan." And Michael Murphy, who plays Capt. Blakely, the president of the court, is a six-time Altman veteran who is currently playing the director's mythical presidential candidate in "Tanner '83," which will air on HBO until Election Day.

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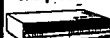

# John Reilly's Donely gives a bit o' the masculine appeal on 'Hospital'

With its resident Irishman, Sean Donely, "General Hospital" applies the old soap opera gospel: Never give the fans what they want.

Sean's charm has Tiffany all askew this spring. She thinks it's true love and plans an early wedding. But love takes a back seat this week when kidnappers sneak off with Sean and Felicia, determined to wring out their secrets. Sean isn't expected to crack, but Felicia may.

Thus, fans get to see two sides of Sean, who has been labeled one of TV's sexiest daytime stars — the lyrical Irishman with the dark, mysterious interior.

Brought in three years ago by producer Gloria Monty, Chicago's John Henry Reilly is finally being allowed to play a fellow countryman. It was Monty's idea and, over the years, the writers have fashioned the dialogue to fit John's rhythms and his cheery style. Peel away a few layers and Sean becomes part Reilly.

Monty not only wanted Reilly to entertain the women — her eye was on the male audience that is small but has vast potential. Businessmen wanted to see a man's man in the afternoon, according to Gloria. Sean became experimental bait, and soon proved Monty to be right.

A former salesman specializing in packaging design, Reilly switched careers after too many clients told him he should really be an actor. He moonlighted for a while in Chicago, doing voiceovers for commercials and industrial films until he realized he could make a decent living as an actor.

"I've always treated acting as a business," Reilly declared during a lunch break. "I'm not an irresponsible man."

But he remembers automatically jumping out of bed at 6 a.m. to shower even after he left the business world. "It took time to learn how to relax — not sell, sell, sell every minute. Now, when I have a day off, I don't do anything. It's wonderful."

Reilly sells "General Hospital" on

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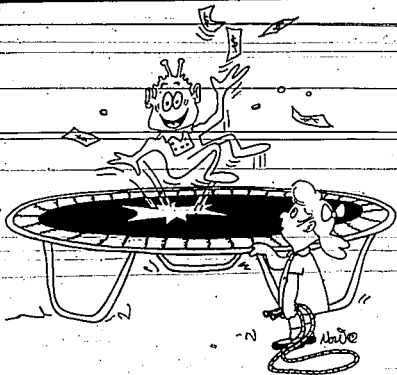

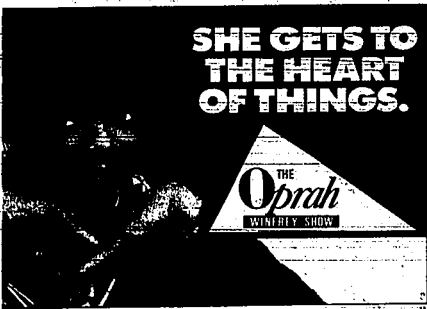

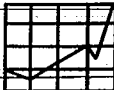

## Work force grows

WASHINGTON — Unemployment fell in April to its lowest since 1974, with export-led hiring on factory assembly lines in the industrial heartland leading the latest spurt of new jobs.

The number of Americans at work rose by 606,000 last month while those listed as unemployed fell by 191,000 to 6.6 million, dropping joblessness 0.2 percentage points from March's rate of 6.6 percent, the Labor Department said.

The rate was the lowest since June 1974 when it also stood at 6.4 percent but at a time when the nation was well into a steep recession, in contrast to the current economic expansion.

"One of the best barometers of the state of our economy is to see more people working," President Reagan said in reaction to Friday's report. Private analysts agreed, although some of them repeated assertions they have been making since last September — when the jobless rate first dipped below 6 percent — that the tighter labor market is bound to push wages up soon and exert inflationary pressures on prices as well.

In another report adding to fears of inflation, the Federal Reserve Board said consumer installment debt grew by \$4.46 billion in March, a strong annual rate of growth of 8.6 percent. Consumer debt grew a 10.3 percent annual rate for the first three months of the year, compared with 7.2 percent for all of 1987.

## Medicare fortunes improve

WASHINGTON — Medicare's fortunes have improved and its trust fund now is not likely to run out of cash until the year 2005, while the Social Security old age fund should be solvent until the middle of the 21st century, the systems' trustees told Congress on Friday.

The 2005 date is three years later than was forecast a year ago.

The trustees, including three Reagan Cabinet members, said Social Security's old age fund also had achieved robust gains and predicted it "will have enough funds to cover expenditures for about 60 years into the future."

The board said Medicare's trust fund grew by nearly \$14 billion in calendar 1987 and finished the year with reserves of \$37 billion.

Assuming moderate economic conditions, the hospital insurance reserves were forecast to grow to nearly \$163 billion over the next decade before dwindling to nothing in the year 2005.

The trustees urged Congress to "take early remedial measures to bring future (Medicare) costs and finance into balance" and to "avoid the need for later, potentially precipitous changes."

They said the shortfall could be covered by a 14 percent cut in benefits, a 16 percent increase in the Medicare tax or a combination of both.

In the early 1980s, the trustees warned Medicare's trust fund would go bankrupt in the 1990s. Its financial picture has improved partly as a result of federal constraints on hospital payments.

The Medicare program provides hospital insurance for 28 million Americans 65 or older and 3 million disabled workers under 65.

# Bush aims to keep recovery rolling

"What we want to do is keep the economic recovery going," said the Republican presidential candidate, referring to a 6.4 percent national unemployment rate, the lowest since 1974.

"In my view, that is the only way to keep the recovery going," Bush said. He spoke to a capacity crowd at CSI's Fine Arts Center and answered questions during a roundtable discussion with regional media, including the Times-News.

## Damage exceeds \$100 million

**HENDERSON, Nev. (AP)** — Damage estimates topped \$100 million Friday from explosions that damaged a rocket fuel plant, while city officials tried to calm residents by meeting with a neighboring company making the same product.

Union officers, meanwhile, huddled to review safety records of Pacific Engineering and Production Co., where a 1982 union letter wondered why the plant hadn't already been "blown off the face of the earth."

Jim Barnes, state industrial relations director, said Pacific underwent 11 inspections by the state Occupational Safety and Health Division over the last five years.

The inspections resulted in 10 citations as well as four fines for incidents Barnes termed serious. Executives of Kerr-McGee Corp., which manufactures the same ammonium perchlorate a mile from the earthquake-force blast that leveled Pacific, met with city officials amid calls from frightened residents to shut the second plant down.

## Crews probe refinery rubble

**NORCO, La. (AP)** — Workers wearing protective clothing and carrying oxygen tanks inhaled their way through hot, twisted metal Friday looking for four men missing since an oil refinery explosion killed three people and injured 42.

The catalytic cracking unit, used to break crude oil down into usable products such as gasoline, was at the center of the blast early Thursday at the Shell Oil Co. refinery.

The bodies of two of the victims were found Friday. The Occupational Safety and Health Administration and the Environmental Protection Agency sent investigators to the plant Friday to help in the search for the cause of the explosion.

Chemical engineers said they could find no record of an explosion by a catalytic cracker.

The city Department of Building and Safety issued the order because smoke alarms, exit lighting and other safety systems in the high rise were knocked out by the devastating blaze Wednesday night, said Russell E. Lane, the city's chief building inspector.

Lane said his department would not allow repair work on the 858-foot tower, the city's tallest, to begin until the building's steel superstructure was extensively tested to ensure that it had not been weakened by the fire's intense heat.

As about 75 firemen knocked loose glass and charred debris from the building's five burned-out floors to sidewalks, teams of arson investigators from the Los Angeles Fire Department and the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms continued investigating the fire's cause.

## Norway air crash kills 36

**OSLO, Norway (AP)** — A Norwegian airliner crashed Friday night on a domestic flight, killing all 36 people on board, the national NRK broadcasting company reported.

The television station said the plane crashed about 9 miles southwest of its destination, the Norwegian Sea coastal town of Broennesund, about 375 miles north of Oslo. All those aboard were believed to be Norwegian, it said.

The four-engine Wideroe Airline plane, carrying 39 passengers and three crew members, was flying north from Narmsos to Broennesund, a distance of about 75 miles.

## Poland jails labor leader

**WARSAW, Poland (AP)** — A labor leader in Gdansk was ordered jailed Friday for organizing an illegal strike and Lech Watala stirred workers with a speech in the city's strikebound shipyard after a young man tried to jump from a window.

Food and morale both were running low when the Solidarity leader gave his impassioned, impromptu speech to the strikers.

The government took steps to tighten its anti-strike laws one day after police crushed a 10-day-old steelworkers strike at the Nova Huta mill in southern Poland.

New signs cropped up that the government of Premier Wojciech Jaruzelski was broadening its counterblast against the worst wave of labor upheaval in Poland since a 1981 military crackdown.

Across town at the College of Southern Idaho, the vice president's speech struck a responsive chord.

Bush demonstrated an awareness of the issues important to Idaho farmers, said Jeff Siddows, president of the Idaho Wool Growers Association. He supports state rather than federal control of water rights. But he failed to mention the hotly debated public lands grazing issue.

"It's a polar issue," Siddows said. "He can't come out too strong on it because he'll alienate a lot of people either way he goes."

The Wool Growers would also like Bush, and the Republican Party as a whole, to reverse their positions and support the trade bill currently before Congress. It contains mechanisms for restricting lamb imports.

Bush's opposition to federal control of water also pleased local water lawyer Terry Uhling.

Two retired farmers also say they like Bush's agricultural ideas.

"If the government gets out of it, it would be a big help," said Harvey Maxson.

Along with more exports and the use of ethanol, which Bush supported during his speech, farmers could work their way out their current economic jam, Maxson said. He said Bush has the best potential of any candidate of ending federal farm subsidies.

Elmer Watt of Blackfoot said he's satisfied with farming during the Reagan era and also said the government's got to get out of subsidies.

"After all, he said, farming's been through rough times before and will again."

Outside, protesters against the proposed Special Isotope Separator marched in the chilly morning air near Jerome. Rep.-Jerry Calten's grandchildren, carrying the conservative Republican's campaign signs.

William Chisholm, Democratic legislative candidate and activist, led the protesters.

"He waved at us," Robinson said. Bush won another supporter.

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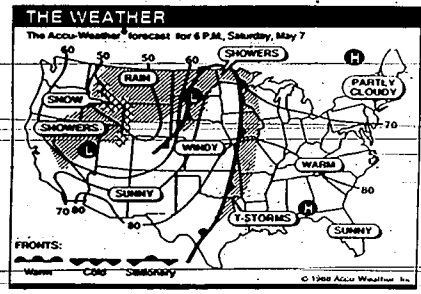

## Andrus tactics under fire

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Republican state Sen. Terry Sverdsten has lashed out at Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus for what he claims is the governor's dictatorial tactics in renewed negotiations on water quality regulations with the timber industry.

"As much as he would like to control everything on this issue, he'd better realize that he's just a governor, not a czar," Sverdsten said. The focus of the Cataldo lawmaker's criticism was the governor's attempted dismissal of Intermountain Forest Industries Council Vice President Joe Hinson from a special committee negotiating a compromise on regulations protecting water quality in areas of timbering, agriculture and other activities.

## Developers seek speed-up

MOSCOW (AP) — The U.S. Forest Service is dragging its feet in reviewing a new plan to construct a dam at Elk Creek Falls near Elk River, developers of the project claim.

Leaders of Hy-Tech, Inc. of Lewiston maintain no public hearings are needed before construction begins on the redesigned project, which includes tunnelling through one of the basalt cliffs rimming the falls to divert water to a powerhouse near the base of the cascade. But Clearwater National Forest officials say they are waiting for further information from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, which recently reversed its denial of Hy-Tech's license application for the plan to divert water from above the waterfalls for power production.

## Agency interested in Idaho

ST. ANTHONY (AP) — The U.S. Bureau of Prisons is still considering St. Anthony as a possible site for a minimum security federal prison, but it needs more time before making a decision.

"They want a return trip and more information on year-around work projects," said Mayor Merrill Rose after being informed the bureau had abandoned a potential site in Nevada.

Bureau representative Kevin McMahon met March 30 with local officials and toured the east campus of the Idaho State Youth Services Center and Fremont General Hospital.

## Hospitals protest changes

POCATELLO (AP) — Pocatello's two hospitals have filed a formal protest over proposed changes in state Health and Welfare Department regulations for disposal of infectious waste.

The proposed changes to the hospital licensing regulations, if adopted, would require hospitals to dispose of anything ranging from face tissue to surgical gowns, that comes into contact with a patient.

Critics, contending the changes are a response to growing concern and fear over the spread of acquired immune deficiency syndrome or AIDS, claim the regulations are reactionary and go too far.

## Teachers clear-strike vote

MOUNTAIN HOME (AP) — Mountain Home teachers have authorized a strike vote, but say a strike is not imminent.

Ruth Iredale, vice president and chief negotiator for the Mountain Home Education Association, said 122 of 165 local members voted to authorize a strike.

However, "We're doing everything possible to avoid a strike," she said.

The vote simply authorizes the teachers to take a strike vote depending on how negotiations progress, Iredale said. The next negotiations meeting is scheduled for May 12.

# Judge rules out sentencing guidelines

BOISE (AP) — A federal judge here has ruled that the Justice Department's tough, new sentencing guidelines are unconstitutional because they violate the separation of power sections of the Constitution.

It was the first time the sentencing guidelines had come under legal review in Idaho since they were put into effect last year.

U.S. District Judge Marion Callister ruled from the bench Friday that the guidelines were unconstitutional in a case involving four men arrested on drug-related charges.

The judge then sentenced the men to different sentences, depending on whether the sentencing guidelines are upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court or struck down.

Boise Attorney Philip Gordon, who represented two of the defendants, said he and other defense attorneys presented Callister with many related decisions from other federal court districts.

Gordon, who is of counsel with the Boise law firm of Sallaz and Doolittle, said nearly 60 decisions have been

handed down on the constitutionality of the sentencing guidelines and they run 83-25 against the guidelines. But he said legal opinions differ, as evidenced by the fact that of three rulings on the guidelines in Southern California went 2-1 that they were unconstitutional.

Antonio Martinez-Oreaga, Epifanio Sanchez-Lopez and his brother, Guillermo Sanchez-Lopez and Brijido Artaza-Ayon were arrested last Nov. 23 near American Falls. They were charged with conspiracy to distribute drugs, cocaine and heroin; two counts

of possession with intent to distribute drugs and Artaza-Ayon was charged with being an illegal alien in possession of a firearm.

The men were convicted after a trial. Defense attorneys, also including Boise attorneys M. Karl Shurliff and Rudy Barchas, contended the sentencing guidelines were improper.

# Andrus gives support for Dukakis' candidacy

BOISE (AP) — Declaring the time has come for Democrats to unite behind Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis, Gov. Cecil Andrus has broken with Idaho's other superdelegates to the Democratic National Convention to endorse his fellow chief executive.

Idaho's other uncommitted delegates, join him went unheeded, at least for the moment, among the state's other superdelegates.

"He talked to me about it, and I wished him well," said National Committeewoman Diane Peavey.


"Now is the time," Andrus said Friday in abandoning his uncommitted status to favor Dukakis. "It is clearly the time when we can help bring the nomination to Governor Dukakis before the convention in Atlanta."

"The federal government should be the authority of last resort, not first resort," Bush said. "I understand the traditional role of the states, and I do not want to interfere with that."

The discussion featured eight

hand-chosen farming representatives gathered in the Coimers' barn. The vice president escorted Marietta Coimer, the matriarch of the four-generation farm, as they joined the others sitting on hay bales and huddling against bitter winds of the year's worst rainstorm.

Participants commended Bush for his attention and interest, voiced through comments and questions during the hour-long talk. Issues included federal land use and wilderness, irrigation farming and in-

ternational competition in agriculture.

"He really reinforced the sugar program," said state Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo. "That's the most important thing that he said, for our area."

State Sen. Laird Nob, R-Kimberly, had lobbied for states' water rights, criticizing the "apparent effort of FERC (Federal Energy Regulatory Commission) to change and squeeze off our lifeline by ignoring 100 years of water law."

Both lawmakers are respected state leaders within their party and both were satisfied with Bush.

"I thought he was a very calm, collected American leader," Nob said.

But several uninvited farmers questioned the size of the group visiting with Bush and whether the group represented smaller, struggling farmers.

"I'd like to talk to him about the Farm Credit Service and how it's abused," said Twin Falls County farmer Walt Mueller, who is pre-

sident of the Idaho Rural Council. "The Farm Credit Service is by-passing its authority by ignoring the right of first refusal by its bankrupt farmers to buy back their land."

"He's my vice president too," said Mueller, who is also a Democratic legislative candidate.

Nevertheless, participants representing sugarbeets, potatoes, soil conservation, and sheep and goats ranching said they were satisfied with the meeting.

## Bush shows wry sense of humor

**TWIN FALLS** — Describing his vice-presidential tenure under the shadow of President Ronald Reagan, George Bush proved Friday he has a sense of humor.

"It's been difficult hiding my charisma for the past seven-and-a-half years," Bush told an audience of 800 people at the College of Southern Idaho.

He certainly needed a sense of humor during his Twin Falls visit.

The year's worst rainstorm, according to the National Weather Service, blew into town with a sprinkle Thursday night along with Air Force II. By mid-afternoon Friday, the storm poured a half-inch of rain and snow onto the city.

The storm's biting winds ruined photo opportunities and canceled a demonstration at a University of Idaho agricultural experimentation field.

But Republican Sen. James McClure, who brought Bush to Idaho, joked that farmers relying on irrigation should be grateful for the contribution. "He's taking all the credits," McClure said during a meeting with agricultural leaders.

Some of Bush's humanity also poked through during the Twin Falls stop squeezed into his schedule between southern California and Billings, Mont.

He thanked College of Southern Idaho officials for the "great honor to be on this campus of SIU" — South Idaho University? — before his speech.

And he drew laughs and applause by stumbling through a description of the Reagan Administration. "We've had some sex... setbacks," he said.

But after the audience quieted, Bush proved he's a good sport.

"Sometimes I feel like the javelin competitor who won the coin toss and elected to receive," he said.

## Stallings applauds Bush's sugar stand but favors Dukakis

**WASHINGTON** — Democratic Congressman Richard Stallings though I would try very hard to understand on sugar, bests Friday, but pointed out that Democratic candidate Michael Dukakis also supports beef farmers.

Thursday in Boise and Friday in Twin Falls, Bush told farmers that he supported keeping farm subsidies and quotas on sugar beets. Bush's position

differs from that of President Reagan, who has urged a worldwide reduction of farm subsidies.

"Under a Bush administration, the (sugar) program would continue even though I would try very hard to expand markets abroad by breaking out barriers to American products," the vice president said.

Stallings said that he was "pleased that Mr. Bush is reversing the policies of the Reagan administration."

But he added that he was glad to hear that Democratic presidential

candidate Dukakis recognized the need to protect American sugar growers.

Last month Stallings said he would remain uncommitted as a "superdelegate" at the Democratic National Convention until he found out how the presidential candidates stood on sugar.

Friday he said that he was "leaning toward Dukakis; he's the only one left."

Dukakis still faces the Rev. Jesse Jackson in the race for the Demo-

cratic presidential nomination, but has such a commanding lead in convention delegates that he is almost certain to be nominated.

Bush already has garnered more than enough delegates to be win the GOP's presidential nomination.

Dukakis has said that although he believes it is necessary to support U.S. sugar growers in the absence of international price control agreements, he is concerned about the effect of U.S. sugar policies on countries such as the Philippines and the Carib-

bean nations.

Those countries are limited in the amount of sugar they can export to this country by quotas.

But the Massachusetts governor added, and Stallings agrees, that many nations that export sugar to the U.S. prefer to sell a limited amount of sugar at higher prices than to sell a larger amount at the depressed world level.

Stallings and Dukakis agree that high sugar subsidies in the European Common Market are responsible for

the low world price of sugar and the need for American quotas on the importation of sugar.

"The culprit in this mess is the European Economic Community," Stallings said. "I really have been upset with the Reagan administration because it blames the EEC but still wants to eliminate the American sugar growers."

American raw sugar sold for about 22.1 cents a pound in February, according to a recent U.S. Department of Agriculture report.

## Police charge man with rape in Burley

**BURLEY** — A man believed to be from California was arrested late Thursday night after he allegedly raped and kidnapped the clerk of a Burley hotel in which he was staying, police officials said.

Jeffrey Keith Hoggan, 19, was arrested at approximately 11 p.m. after driving away from the Budget Inn, said Lt. Jim Higgins of the Cassia County Sheriff's Office. Hoggan allegedly robbed the hotel at gunpoint prior to the rape and kidnapping, police said.

Court officials said Hoggan was arrested Friday on a charge of rape. Minidoka County Prosecutor Charles Cresson Jr. could not be reached for comment Friday, but police said they expect additional charges of armed robbery and kidnapping to be filed against Hoggan.

Court officials said bail was set at \$50,000. A preliminary hearing has not yet been scheduled.

Higgins said Hoggan provided police with a Burley address but is believed to be from California. The lieutenant added that he did not know how long Hoggan had been registered in the Burley hotel, located off U.S. Interstate 84 in Minidoka County.

Hoggan allegedly robbed the hotel "sometime" around 10:45 p.m., Higgins said. Cassia County authorities went to the hotel after a report that Hoggan was arrested Friday on a charge of rape. Minidoka County Prosecutor Charles Cresson Jr. could not be reached for comment Friday, but police said they expect additional charges of armed robbery and kidnapping to be filed against Hoggan.

Court officials said bail was set at \$50,000. A preliminary hearing has not yet been scheduled.

Higgins said arriving police saw the missing clerk and an unidentified man walking in the hotel's parking lot. "The man and the clerk got in a vehicle and sped off quite rapidly," he said.

Police followed the car and arrested Hoggan seven miles west of Burley on U.S. Interstate 84.

"It wasn't really a chase," Higgins said. "We just followed him until we had enough backup."

Officials from the Minidoka County Sheriff's Office and the Idaho State Police assisted in the arrest.

Following the robbery, Hoggan allegedly took the clerk back to his hotel room where the rape occurred, Higgins said. The clerk, in her early 20s, was "shook up" but did not require medical attention, Higgins said.

## Employment highest level in 7 years

# Job opportunities better than last year

**TWIN FALLS** — Relatively good spring weather and a continuing positive outlook for Idaho's economy sent the state's jobless rate plunging last month as total employment stood at its highest level in over seven years, the Employment Department reported.

The department's preliminary estimate of April unemployment, pushed the seasonally adjusted rate down a half point to a flat 5 percent, the lowest since the rate dipped to 4.9 percent last September.

The Magic Valley's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in April matched the state level at 5 percent, holding constant from March, said Lon

McDonald at the Job Service office in Twin Falls.

Employment has increased by 1,773 people over March here, he said. The large increase is due to the spring gear-up common in April. Farm employment is in full swing and retail business is flourishing.

The Job Service has seen a real increase in job orders, McDonald said.

"There is more opportunity in the job market now than a year ago," he said.

It was the 16th straight month that the state jobless rate has run below year-earlier levels, underscoring the official optimism over Idaho's economic resurgence. The state rate in April 1987 was 6.1 percent.

The Idaho developments mirrored the job picture nationally as the country's April unemployment

rate fell another notch to 6.4 percent, the lowest rate in nearly 14 years.

Nationwide, over 600,000 workers found jobs last month, and in Idaho the number of workers off the job fell by 1,800 while total employment was up by 4,800 from the revised March employment level of just over 406,000. April employment was at the highest level since December 1979 and just 5,300 jobs short of the record of 416,300 set in June 1979. A year ago, total employment stood at less than 400,000.

Another 3,000 workers joined the Idaho labor force last month, possibly launching a recovery from the dip below 200,000 experienced in March.

The jobless rate remained stable or fell from March in all the regions of the state except in Bon-

## Rain knocks out power, closes schools

**TWIN FALLS** — Friday's rainfall, the heaviest of the year, knocked out power in pockets of Twin Falls County, closed down a school district, precipitated rock slides and washed out roads.

"It's a nice day for January, and this is May 6," said Bill Galkin of the National Weather Service in Kimberly.

Galkin said the Twin Falls area had received half an inch of rain by mid-afternoon Friday, and another quarter inch was expected through the evening. The heaviest previous

rainfall this year was 47 inch on April 4.

Cold weather accompanied the downpour, as temperatures in Twin Falls were 30 degrees lower than normal. Galkin said the high temperature Friday was 41 degrees, recorded during the day's early morning hours.

Idaho Power Co. officials said the torrential rainfall, which started at 7 a.m., kept them busy throughout the day chasing power outages. "The hardest hit area was Rogerson and Hollister, down in that area," said Sid Brewer, an engineering supervisor.

Officials were working non-stop to reconnect power in the southern Twin

Falls County area. "We'll get parts of it back on, but they'll probably be working on it through the night," Brewer said.

The Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office received several reports of vehicle slide-offs on U.S. Highway 98, which runs through Hollister and Rogerson. No serious injuries were reported as of Friday afternoon.

Brewer said parts of Filer and Buhl also lost power throughout the day, though company officials were able to reconnect those areas before early evening.

Filer High School Principal Harry Vanikiotis said the Filer School Dis-

trict was closed Friday afternoon due to the weather's effects. "School was dismissed at 1:30, which was just as well because the power men went out here for about 15 minutes," Vanikiotis said.

The district includes four schools — a senior high school, junior high school and elementary school in Filer, and an elementary school in Hollister.

Vanikiotis said power at the Hollister Elementary School was knocked out shortly before noon, a circumstance which precipitated the closing of the other schools. The principal said the Filer-based schools were closed so older brothers and sisters could babysit their siblings stranded

# New execution date set for Lafferty

PROVO, Utah (AP) — Ronald Lafferty, sentenced to die for the 1984 slayings of his sister-in-law and her infant daughter, was given a June 24 date with a firing squad Friday.

Fourth District Judge Boyd Park set the date and concluded that Lafferty, although not specifically charging a firing squad over lethal injection — a choice mandated by law — preferred the latter based on previous statements.

There were indications Lafferty would appeal the new death date, which would virtually assure his execution would be stayed.

Lafferty — his hands shackled behind him throughout the proceedings in a courtroom bristling with law officers in the wake of threats he made

Thursday at Utah State Prison — referred to his death sentence at trial and seemed to believe he was a victim of double jeopardy.

"You set a date. I didn't argue with that date. I was ready. You missed your chance," he said. "You play your games. I've never seen such silly-ass games in my life."

Lafferty and his brother, Dan, were

convicted in the 1984 slayings of Brenda Wright Lafferty, of Kimberly, and her 16-month-old daughter, Erica, in American Fork. Ronald Lafferty, a proponent of polygamy, said he had been pleased in a revelation from God to kill the two.

Ronald Lafferty was sentenced to die; his brother was given life in prison following a separate trial.

One participant who disagreed with a portion of Reagan-Administration policy was Jerome potato farmer Dick Marshall. He expressed concern about the "Canadian trade pact" giving that neighboring country an unfair advantage selling spuds to the Northeast.

"I think we were concerned that the fair trade agreement wasn't as fair as they say it is," Marshall said after the meeting. "I think it was good — he sounded concerned and listened to our problems. He got our message."

Tom Prescott, a Jerome cattle

rancher, discussed the problem of declaring too much wilderness in Idaho that would prohibit grazing on federal lands.

"We don't want the whole state turned down because it is restrictive," Prescott said.

In general, those assembled said the Farm Bill is working and should be given more time.

Jerome farmer Maxine Bell, who is a former Farm Bureau director, urged Bush to stay the course of the Reagan Administration's farm policy. She said later she'd been impressed with Bush's credentials, but that meeting him in person confirmed her support.

"I felt a great deal of intelligence," said Bell, who is also a Republican legislative candidate. "I felt he learned today and he would be a learning president."

In addition, Bush offered that reliability is the biggest hurdle facing United States exports to the Soviet Union. "The reliability of supply — we have to make sure there is not another grain embargo," as imposed by previous Democratic President Jimmy Carter, Bush said. "I pledge to not use food as a political tool."

neville County, where the one-tenth-of-a-point rise amounted to only a big tin area's traditionally low unemployment picture. No figures were available for the Panhandle, where the job picture might have been hurt by sluggishness in the timber sector.

Analysts said the decline in unemployment had been signaled by a significant drop in jobless benefit claims in the construction and food processing industries.

With all the state's food processors in full operation last month, unemployment benefit claims from that sector were down 54 percent while the construction sector saw a 35 percent decline in claims.

"Employment gains were evident in agriculture, construction, retail trade, services and federal government," department spokesman Bob Cooper said. "Good spring weather enabled farmers to prepare fields and plant crops. April showers helped them conserve irrigation water."

"There is considerable construction activity," Cooper said. "Homes, commercial buildings and highways are being built throughout the state."

Increased sales helped the gardening and home improvement retailers, while general merchandise retailers increased employment as they geared up for Easter, proms and the spring season, he said. There was also the

traditional spring employment surge in the restaurant and entertainment sectors.

Timber was the only sector left out of April's improved job picture, analysts said, and that was highlighted by the announcement earlier this week that nearly 180 workers were being indefinitely furloughed from the Polatch Corp. plywood mill in Lewistown.

"Unemployment remained high in the lumber and wood products industry as loggers were not yet back in the woods," Cooper said.

Department analysts have projected the state would pick up another 6,500 jobs this year while the average unemployment rate for 1988 will drop another two notches to 6.5 percent. Last year was the first of the 1980s to see the annual jobless rate fall below 6 percent.

### Man robs Twin Falls hotel

**TWIN FALLS** — A Twin Falls hotel was robbed at gunpoint late Thursday night by a man who threatened to shoot the clerk and reportedly told her not to look at his face, police said.

The robbery occurred at the Weston Inn on Blue Lakes Boulevard North, located just a few blocks from the Holiday Inn where Vice President George Bush was staying the night.

Pat Berningham, a commander with the Twin Falls Department of Public Safety, said no arrests were made Friday in connection with the crime.

Between \$300 and \$500 were taken during the robbery, which occurred at approximately 11:30 p.m., police records show.

"Don't look at my face," the robber told the clerk, according to reports. "Whatever you do, don't look at my face."

Mundi Blakley, the 21-year-old clerk on duty, also told police that the robber ordered her to give him "all the money in the drawer and stack it neatly."

According to police reports, the robber then told Blakley to go lay down in a back room for five minutes or he would shoot her.

The robber, who was armed with a blue revolver, was described as being approximately 6'3". He was reportedly wearing a white, long-sleeve sweatshirt and a white baseball cap.

He was estimated to be between 25 and 39 years old.

### Employee suffers man's bite

**TWIN FALLS** — A Twin Falls man was arrested Thursday on charges of petit theft and battery after he allegedly bit a store employee who was detaining him for suspected shoplifting, police officials said.

James Gruenwald, 21, was arraigned on the charges Friday and released on his own recognizance.

Gruenwald was arrested at approximately 12:40 p.m. Thursday at the Albertson's Food Center on Addison Avenue East. Gruenwald allegedly bit Jeff Peters, an Albertson's employee, on Peters' right thumb, left forearm and left index finger, police records show.

The altercation occurred outside the store when Peters, a 24-year-old Twin Falls resident, stopped Gruenwald after allegedly seeing him conceal a package of shrimp under the front of his pants, police records show.

Peters was taken to the Magic Valley Regional Medical Center where he was treated for the bite wounds.

### Boy's caution saves injury

**RUPERT (AP)** — Julie Nicholas wanted to give her teen-age son a gift he would get a bang out of it, and the one she picked out almost did.

Nicholas picked up what she thought was an ornamental World War II-vintage Japanese-made anti-aircraft shell at the local second-hand store in Burley last weekend to add to her son Nemo's collection of three other artillery shells in his room at home.

But when the 14-year-old boy peered inside the new acquisition after unscrewing the top this week, he found himself looking at an intact detonating device. A unit from Mountain Home Air Force Base was called in to dispose of the shell.

"I've seen pictures of detonators so when I saw it I knew what it was," the boy said, and to be on the safe side, he had the bomb squad check the three shells already in his collection to make sure they were defused.

## North Idaho College faces some tough budget choices

**COEUR d'ALENE (AP)** — Limited financial support from state lawmakers this winter could force a reevaluation of North Idaho College's role in the community, President Bob Bennett says.

"We'll have to rethink exactly what we're about if that kind of tight money continues," Bennett said. "We're just going to have to tighten our belts."

The college received an increase of \$129,800, or 4.3 percent, in state aid for the coming year even though the school's enrollment is jumping almost 500 students, or 9 percent. The increase mirrored the percentage hike granted the four state colleges and vocational education in a session that saw lawmakers hold the line on spending to avert a major election-year tax hike.

State support for the community colleges accounts for less than half of the school's total budget. The rest comes from local property tax, special funds and student fees.

Dean of Students Dave Lindsay and Faculty Assembly President Len Mattei said the school needs to take a hard look at how it spends its money.

"It's perhaps time the college took a look at where we're spending our dollars and look closely at what 'growth' really means," Mattei maintained.

**CORINNE, Utah (AP)** — A Wells Fargo armored car driver was charged Friday with robbing \$2.5 million from the vehicle while two guards slept in the vehicle's bunk section, authorities said.

In a complaint issued by U.S. Magistrate Ronald Boyce, Jared Layne Gray, 28, of Murray, was charged with embezzling and stealing the money during an interstate shipment of funds to the federal reserve bank in Salt Lake City.

Box Elder County Sheriff's Detective Ken Adams said that Gray "turned up missing and hasn't been seen since" the 6:30 p.m. Thursday incident at a Tesco grocery store and convenience store just off Interstate 15 in northern Utah.

An affidavit accompanying the complaint said the robbery was reported to authorities by the other two security guards aboard the Wells Fargo truck, Scott Redford and Dale Neilson, for whom hometowns were not available. "The truck was on its way to Salt Lake City from Boise."

The FBI took over investigation of the robbery because it involved money headed to or from a federally insured

bank, said FBI agent Cal Clegg.

The Wells Fargo Armored Service Corp. office in Salt Lake City referred calls about the incident to the company's Atlanta headquarters, which in turn forwarded calls to the company's parent, Baker Industries of Parsippany, N.J.

However, a secretary for Communications Director Joe Allen said he had left for the day and no other company officials could comment.

No one was injured in the robbery, although the three guards all were armed. "No violence, no force, no struggles," Adams said, adding that apparently none of the guards ever brandished their weapons.

Detective Lynn Yates and FBI agent Don Kirby said after the money was taken, the thief apparently blocked the 38,000-pound truck's front doors shut from the outside, trapping his co-workers inside the cab.

The affidavit, taken by the U.S. Attorney's Office from Kirby, stated that the trapped guards managed to get the attention of the service station attendant who then opened the truck's door.

Authorities declined to say whether there were any leads on Gray's whereabouts.

Kirby's affidavit said that he had been told by another agent that Farrell Gray, Gray's brother, had received a telephone call from Gray in which he allegedly said he had been involved in an armored car robbery, was all right, but sorry for any embarrassment the action would cause his family.

The affidavit said that Redford and Neilson were in the truck's bunk area asleep when Gray pulled the truck off the freeway. Redford told authorities that he heard noise in the section of

the truck where the money was locked up.

Yates said more than 30 law officers scoured the area without success and descriptions of the suspect were broadcast to police throughout the West.

The armored vehicle was impounded Friday for evidence processing at an undisclosed location.

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# Regan book irritates Reagan

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan expressed irritation Friday about an upcoming book by former chief of staff Donald T. Regan, saying "he's chosen to attack my wife and I don't look kindly upon that at all."

Regan's book, scheduled to be published this month, is said to reveal that Mrs. Reagan used astrology to determine the timing of the president's speeches and travel.

The president has denied that any of his decisions have been influenced by astrology, in which the position of the sun, moon and stars are studied in the belief that they influence human affairs.

During a photo session at the start of a Cabinet meeting, reporters asked Reagan whether he felt betrayed or angered by Regan's book.

"Well, I will say this, that I would have preferred it if he'd decided to attack me, and apparently from what we hear he's chosen to attack my wife, and I don't look kindly upon that at all," the president replied.

Regan in the past has reacted sharply to criticism of his wife or suggestions that she interferes or has too great a role in administration decision-making.

Regan was frequently at odds with

the first lady before being forced out of his job early last year, and Mrs. Regan's opposition was widely believed to have been a factor in his ouster.

The president said he did not expect his former top staff aide and treasury secretary to send him a copy of his book, which is being published by Harcourt, Brace Jovanovich.

"I don't think he's going to send one unless I'm prepared to send a check in return," the president said.

Tom Dawson, a Regan spokesman, said Regan "has had and will have no comments regarding his book until it is published."

# FDA warns consumers of Humco Ipecac

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hundreds of thousands of bottles of Humco brand syrup of Ipecac, possibly containing a deadly poison, remain in American homes, the Food

and Drug Administration said Friday. As many as 400,000 1-ounce bottles labeled Ipecac may actually contain oil of eucalyptus, which

could prove fatal if given to children, the FDA said. The FDA initially announced a recall of the Humco brand Ipecac April 29.

# Space storm may interfere

WASHINGTON (AP) — A geomagnetic storm is sweeping over the Earth and may interfere with satellite, radio and telephone communications, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration reported Friday.

The storm, which affects the Earth's magnetic field, struck Thursday evening and is expected to end by sometime Saturday or Sunday, said Joe Hirman of the Space Environment Services Center in Boulder, Colo.

Hirman said the disturbance originated in a huge flare that erupted from the sun on Wednesday.

It took about a day for the effects to reach Earth, and those peaked on Friday, he said.

Most notable for Americans will be the display of the northern lights, which is an electrical phenomenon induced by the current from the sun. Those were visible from Boulder on Thursday night, Hirman said.

# Edwin Meese plans to stay awhile

WASHINGTON (AP) — Edwin Meese III is quietly making plans to remain as attorney general at least until September.

"Despite" widespread speculation that the heat generated by Meese's legal problems will soon drive him from his post, there is in his latest flap a largely overlooked clue from Meese himself about his determination to stay on.

Amid a stream of public disclosures about his assorted legal problems, Meese last month privately and

quickly accepted an invitation to make an official visit to Japan as attorney general Aug. 29-Sept. 1. Even though the trip itself has engendered controversy, he gives every indication of planning to go.

At Mel Krupin's restaurant, frequented by lawyers and lobbyists, political operatives and pundits, Krupin says, "They talk about Meese but they don't make any comments" about the propriety of Meese's actions. "Nobody knows if he's going to stay or go. They just talk about how long he'll stay."

Independent counsel James McKay is not expected to indict Meese in any of the handful of cases he has investigated, but McKay's public report is expected late this month.

McKay is expected to exhort Meese for tolerating the appearance of conflicts of interest even where they may not in fact exist. Actions creating such appearances are forbidden by presidential order.

McKay then is likely to refer his evidence to Justice Department internal ethics officers for recommendations on whether administrative discipline by President Reagan is required.

# Tear gases furor eases

WASHINGTON (AP) — A California tear gas manufacturer said Friday it no longer will sell its product to Israel following complaints from Americans and human rights activists that the gas has been misused, causing deaths and injuries.

Burl Alison, a vice president of TransTechnology in Sherman Oaks, Calif., said the company's board of directors agreed on Thursday with the decision to stop selling to Israel for the time being.

TransTechnology, which makes tear gas at its Federal Laboratories in Salisbury, Pa., has been under "tremendous pressure" from Arab-American groups to end the sales, she said.

Last month, several hundred people protested the tear gas sales to Israel at a demonstration outside the lab. Thirteen people were arrested for civil disobedience.

Mrs. Alison did not rule out the pos-

sibility that tear gas sales would resume, but she said that would happen only if the company can determine the chemical control agent is being handled properly.

The company wants "some confirmation that their (the Israelis) intent is not to use it as a weapon," she said.

There are no outstanding contracts to ship tear gas to Israel, and the final shipment was made earlier this year, Mrs. Alison said. She refused to provide a date. Sales to Israel comprised only a fraction of the company's business, she said.

Mrs. Alison said the company had informed Israeli officials about the decision and "they don't like it." The Israelis told the company they "understand the pressures that have been put on us," she said.

Although Israel has not contracted to buy more tear gas from TransTechnology, Mrs. Alison said the Israelis want to purchase more of the product.

# American hostages mistreated for escape attempts

PARIS (AP) - American hostages in Lebanon were brutally mistreated for trying to escape from their pro-Iranian captors, a freed French hostage was quoted as saying Friday.

Jean-Paul Knuffmann shared a cell recently with American Frank Herbert Reed who was 'mistreated to the point

of being left prostrate," Knuffmann's sister, Marie-Genevieve Degin, was quoted as saying.

Reed was director of the Lebanese International School when he was captured Sept. 9, 1986.

Mrs. Degin's comments were reported by Agence-France-Press one day after Knuffmann and two

other Frenchmen arrived in Paris following their release in Lebanon.

Knuffmann and the other Frenchmen, diplomats Marcel Carton and Marcel Fontaine, were released from Val-de-Grace military hospital Friday after receiving medical examinations.

Knuffmann, in his own interview Friday with the French news agen-

cy, said the remaining Western hostages in Lebanon were "my main concern. I ask their families to remain patient and stay confident." He was also quoted as saying he read the novel "War and Peace" 21 times during his captivity.

In a separate statement issued after the dispatch quoting his sis-

ter, Knuffmann said he intended to comment more about the other hostages next week and did not want anyone relaying his impressions until then.

A woman who answered Mrs. Degin's telephone in Rennes on Friday said she was out-of-town and could not be reached.

Mrs. Degin was quoted by AFP

as saying Knuffmann told her the American hostages held by the pro-Iranian Shiite Moslem group Islamic Jihad were "the object of brutality because they tried to escape."

There are 18 foreigners missing in Lebanon, including nine Americans. The hostage held longest is Terry A. Anderson, 40.

## Arab-American faces Israeli deportation order

JERUSALEM (AP) - The government Friday ordered an Arab-American leader of Palestinian resistance to leave the country and accused him of "preaching violence."

The United States and left-wing Israelis sought to prevent the deportation.

The move to deport 44-year-old Mubarak Awad was the latest Israeli action aimed at breaking the back of Palestinian resistance in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip. That resistance has been built on strikes and other protest techniques and advocated.

The United States asked Israel to delay Awad's deportation while U.S. Ambassador Thomas Pickering met with Foreign Minister Shimon Peres and asked Israel to reconsider the order, Israeli television reported.

In the occupied West Bank, Israeli troops blocked all commerce for the second straight day. The soldiers shut down shops and gas stations, halted transit and even chased away street vendors.

The government has been trying to force merchants to open and close on Israeli orders - not at the dictates of uprising leaders - and troops have threatened to weld shut the doors of shops whose mer-

chants disobey soldiers' orders.

Authorities arrested an American-born Jewish settler in the fall shooting of a Palestinian shepherd. Israel radio said police would recommend charging the settler, Yisrael Zeev, with murder.

Zeev allegedly shot the Arab in the head Thursday when he refused to move his flock from near the Shiloh Jewish settlement near Ramallah, and some shepherds threw rocks at Shiloh guards, according to Palestinian reports and the radio.

In the occupied Gaza Strip, Israeli troops shot and wounded three Arab protesters in Gaza City. Shifa Hospital officials said. One of the victims was a 12-year-old boy.

## French spy ends exile for bombing

PARIS (AP) - A French spy convicted in the sinking of the Greenpeace ship Rainbow Warrior and the death of a photographer on board was freed from her island exile Friday because she is pregnant, Premier Jacques Chirac said.

Capt. Dominique Prieur's departure from Hao, a French military base, was announced about five months after the other agent convicted in the incident, Maj. Alain Mafart, was returned to Paris. Mafart had complained of a stomach ailment.

Mrs. Prieur's release also came two days before a presidential election that pits Chirac, a conservative, against Francois Mitterrand, the Socialist incumbent and heavy favorite.

The newspaper Le Monde said: "You can't make us believe that the captain's condition demands that her situation be arranged 48 hours before the elections."

Destruction of the protest ship in July 1985 at its berth in Auckland, New Zealand, was a fiasco for the French secret service. It was a dark hour for the Mitterrand administration but the agents, who pleaded guilty to manslaughter, were heroes at home.

Mrs. Prieur, 38, and Mafart, 37, were arrested after explosives attached to the hull sank the Rainbow Warrior, which was preparing to sail to the French nuclear test site in the South Pacific. A Greenpeace photographer was killed.

They were each sentenced to 10 years in a New Zealand prison under an accord reached by the United Nations in 1986 were to remain on Hao for three years.

Mrs. Prieur is married to Joel Prieur, a Defense Ministry employee posted to Hao following the accord.

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# State's best vie in Twin Falls Classic today

**TWIN FALLS** — The numbers all favor the Boise area boys while the girls should have a dogfight for team honors Saturday when the annual Twin Falls Classic unfolds at Bruin Stadium.

This is perhaps the strongest field that assembles each year in Idaho as 11 schools from Twin Falls east collide with the eight of the Southern Idaho Conference. Since most of the schools will be bringing nearly full teams, the depth that carries into the fourth, fifth and six places, very often results in better competition than the regionally-diluted field at state.

Things get underway at 11 a.m. with the preliminaries in the high hurdles and 100-meter dash, followed by the 3200-meter final. The 200 preliminaries will follow the 3200. At the same time, the pole vault, triple jump,

boys shot and girls discus and girls high jumps will be going. The other field events start at 12:30 p.m. with the running finals opening at 2 p.m.

What actually is supposed to show up here Saturday are the top eight finishers from the Southern Idaho Conference finals in Boise Friday and Saturday and the Gem State Conference finals that were held Saturday in Rexburg. Of course, some latitude for injuries and "discretionary" changes will be allowed.

How the times compare is another matter, too, because while both meets were "curbed" with wind, the tracks don't run exactly the same way.

Usually, the SIC comes into this one with considerably the best times but the Gem State manages to come up with a surprise or three and takes

in a few more first places than suspected.

In the boys division, the Gem State boys have the best time in just two track events but rate a little better in the field competition.

Mark Denny of Madison's 15.4 is the best high hurdle time by a tenth of a second and Blackfoot's Randy Nate posted a 1:56 in the 800 for the best by nearly three seconds.

The Gem State also leads in the triple jump, long jump, Shotput and Pole vault.

But to emphasize how the strength has shifted in the SIC track world, Meridian and Centennial, both Meridian schools, took 14 of the 18 events in the SIC. And such perennial powerhouse as Bonanza scored just 41 points.

The SIC brings in some spectacular relay times but then the Nampa track

is wont to produce those historically. Meridian clocked 42.2 in the 400, 1:28.6 in the 800 and 3:20.7 in the 1600. Centennial had a 3:39.7 in the medley. Those compare with 43.8, 1:33.5, 3:30.2 and 3:50.8, respectively, for the Gem State.

The girls team division could be a major battle between Capital and Twin Falls but there is the kicker that if Highland sophomore Julie Briggs is entered in the long sprints, that will be a decided swing in points. Briggs ran only the 100 last week after sustaining a leg muscle pull the week before. She did qualify in the 200 and has been assigned a preliminary lane.

Capital had 113 points and Twin Falls 111 in their conference finals. Highland was close to the Bruins with 94 — within Briggs' reach at least —

while Capital had a 36-point cushion over Centennial.

Capital won just one individual event on the track — the intermediate hurdles — while Twin Falls got two firsts from Jennifer Hannah in the 800 and 1600 and another from Molly Wallace in the 400. Twin Falls won two relays — and therein might lie the crux if this title chase. Capital won three SIC relays and will meet the Bruins head-to-head in the medley and 1600. Capital has a two-second edge in the medley and a 1.6 seconds behind in the 1600. It's 1:48.7 is the best by nearly two seconds over Highland in the 800.

Hannah faces two tough and familiar foes in her specialties, Tina Henke of Capital in the 800 and Michelle Brown of Borah in the mile. She had a two-second edge in the 800 but was

down three-thirds of a second in the mile on comparable scores. But a week earlier, Hannah won the Boise State two mile against Brown.

"The 800 is also critical for us," says Twin Falls Coach Duane Stands, "not only from the standpoint of Henry running first but the possibility that Henrie and Lisa Reents (Boise) could displace (Bruin senior Dana) Robertson (from her usual second-place finish and eight points)."

Lisa White, Skyline, is the heavy favorite in the weights, a place that Kris Horner has to help the Bruins with second places to make the title charge stick.

From a Magic Valley standpoint, the best chances for boys titles apparently will come from Jason Duncan of Minico in the discus and Justin Bair, Minico, in the shotput.

## CSI women shine, men falter in region; Town, Hibbard break personal records

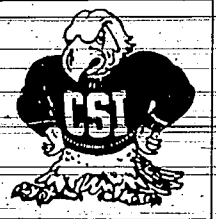

NEW YORK (AP) — Boston coach K.C. Jones was nervous, but Larry Bird kept his cool Friday night before he knew the Celtics had a game in the bank against the New York Knicks.

"How do you spell relief?" Jones asked after Boston's 102-94 victory gave the Celtics a 3-1 win in the best-of-five NBA playoff series. "This was certainly a test and a half. It was a knock down-drag out fight at the end."

Bird scored 10 of his 26 points in the fourth quarter, six of them during a decisive 25-11 Boston spurt in the final 6:09.

"I lost this game, the series was still in our favor," Bird said. "The Knicks would have had to play a perfect game to beat us at Boston Garden."

The final period had eight lead changes: the last one on a basket by Dennis Johnson that gave the Celtics an 87-85 edge with 3:38 remaining.

New York, behind rookie guard Mark Jackson, outscored the Celtics 27-11 to take a six-point lead in the fourth quarter, but Bird and Johnson led the way during the 25-11 run. Johnson had nine of his 19 points down the stretch.

"When you get down, you can't panic," Bird said. "You have to do what you've done all year. The secret to our success is getting the ball to the right people at the right time."

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Atlanta took an 83-79 lead on two free throws by Kevin Willis and Glenn Rivers' steal and dunk. But Paul Pierce's three-point throw for the Bucks and Moncrief took an inbound pass and fired in a 9-pointer to give Milwaukee an 84-83 lead with 7:03 remaining. The Bucks led the rest of the way.

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# NL chief Giamatti cuts three days off Rose's suspension

NEW YORK (AP) — Despite his explanation and videotapes, Cincinnati Reds manager Pete Rose managed to get only a three-day break Friday in his 30-day suspension for shaving an umpire.

A three-man review panel upheld the suspension imposed by National League president Bart Giamatti, but Giamatti snipped the length after hearing Rose's plea. It remained the harshest punishment for a manager in 40 years.

"I'm a whole lot disappointed. I thought then and now that the suspension is too long," Rose said. "It was wrong to touch an umpire, especially twice, but he provoked me by touching me in the face."

"I hate to say it, but I'd probably do it again if the same situation came up."

Rose was penalized for twice pushing umpire Dave Pallone in the ninth inning of Saturday night's Mets-Reds

game at Riverfront Stadium.

Rose's \$10,000 fine was left intact. "I thought I'd get five or 10 days and a couple thousand dollars," Rose said at a news conference at his hotel after the panel's decision. "I'll all be forgotten when we win the West."

Giamatti, who imposed the punishment on Monday, counted this week as part of the suspension, which will now end June 1 instead of June 4. Rose has not managed since Sunday because he underwent arthroscopic knee surgery.

"The committee carefully reviewed all of the videotapes of the incident, heard evidence from Mr. Rose and his representative, and heard a full explanation of the reasons for the suspension from Mr. Giamatti," the league's Executive Committee said in a statement. "In view of all of the evidence and testimony heard, and after careful deliberation, the executive committee unanimously upholds the 30-

day suspension imposed."

The panel which heard Rose's appeal consisted of Bill Bartholomew, board chairman of the Atlanta Braves; Claude Bruch, president of the Montreal Expos; and Chub Feeney, president of the San Diego Padres and former NL president.

Giamatti immediately said he was pleased with the decision and then modified the suspension.

"I have heard Mr. Rose's explanation, and in light of his service to baseball and the remorse expressed, I will count the time he has spent away from the team this week as part of his suspension," he said.

Rose met with Giamatti before facing the review board, hoping to persuade him to reduce the suspension to two weeks; the Associated Press learned. Giamatti was said to be amenable to lessening the month-long penalty, but not to 14 days.

Rose will be permitted to be in uniform during the suspension but he cannot be in the dugout during the game.

Rose arrived at league headquarters with videotapes and accompanied by his lawyer, Rouven Katz, and Reds general manager Murray Cook.

"I was given the opportunity to present my case," Rose said. "I thought we had a strong case."

Giamatti previously cited unruly behavior by the fans as one reason for the stiff penalty. The umpires were showered with debris, forcing Pallone to leave the game.

"The garbage came on the field because of that bad call," Rose said, referring to Pallone's delayed call of a play at first base.

Rose said it was five minutes after he left the field before the debris was thrown.

"This was the one appeal we get. It's over and we accept it for that,"

Katz, Rose's attorney said.

All morning, NL offices were flooded with phone calls from Reds fans who wanted to know if Rose won his appeal.

Rose said Giamatti has never acknowledged that Pallone poked the manager in the face.

"I gather Bart's whole problem is me pushing the umpire," said Rose, who earlier this week displayed a red mark on his cheek he said was put there by Pallone's finger.

Pallone says the argument was so heated he does not know if he did poke Rose.

"I have no idea whether or not I touched him with my finger. I have seen film clips, still photographs and slow-motion stills and I still have not seen any evidence whether I touched him on the cheek," Pallone said.

The umpire made his first public comment on the episode to David Raymond, the Philly Phanatic mascot for

Phillies' home games and a radio reporter for WDEL in Wilmington, Del.

The comments appeared in Rich Ashburn's column in the Philadelphia Daily News.

"I would never say that Pete just made this up," Pallone said of Rose's claim that the umpire had poked him, but "I can't honestly say whether I did or didn't."

Rose's penalty is the longest suspension for a manager for on-the-field behavior, and the most severe since 1947 when Brooklyn Dodgers manager Leo Durocher was suspended for conduct detrimental to baseball, details of which Happy Chandler, then the commissioner never spelled out.

It reportedly included association with unsavory characters, including gamblers; heated run-ins with base ball people and a violent disagreement with Larry MacPhail, then part owner of the New York Yankees.

# Winning Colors, Private Terms rated as favorites in today's Kentucky Derby

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — The filly Winning Colors won't be the only lady in the Kentucky Derby Saturday at Churchill Downs.

Back for her 114th Derby appearance will be Lady Luck.

"My daddy always said he'd rather be lucky than good," said Jack Van Berg, who won the Derby last year with Alysheba.

Van Berg, who has been good, and lucky, enough to be the only trainer to saddle 5,000 winners, might need a special smile from the Lady Saturday. He will saddle lightly regarded Din-a-Dancer-in-a-field-of-12 3-year-olds for the 1 1/4-mile Derby. If all go to the post at 5:35 p.m. EDT, under scale weight of 128 pounds, race will worth \$768,200, with \$611,200 to the winner.

The early favorites are Private Terms, who has won all seven of his career starts, and Winning Colors, the filly who thrashed eight male rivals in the 1 1/4-mile Santa Anita Derby April 9.

However, the race generally is considered to be wide open.

Asked to handicap the race, Charlie Whittingham, who trains Lively One and who has won more than 500 stakes, said, "Any one of a half dozen

could win — maybe a dozen. It just depends on who has the luck."

At the top of the stretch in the 1988 Derby, Bill Shoemaker, riding the Whittingham-trained Ferdinand, and Pat Day, aboard Rampage, gunned their mounts toward the same hole.

Ferdinand got there first and won the race.

"If you get in tough luck, like getting out off, it's tough to come back again," said Charles Taylor of Windfields Farm, a co-owner of Canadian-bred Regal Classic. Windfields won the 1984 Derby with Canadian-bred Northern Dancer.

The luck of the draw appears to have been with Winning Colors and against Private Terms. The filly will start from post 11, while Private Terms will start from No. 16.

The most favorable Derby post-positions are generally believed to be from five through 12. However, Gato Del Sol won from No. 19 in 1983; Swale won from No. 15 in 1984; Ferdinand won from the rail in 1986 and Alysheba won out of the No. 3 last year.

Of course, there are worse things than a bad post position. Stallwars came down with a 102-degree fever Wednesday and wasn't entered.

Talking about the fickle fate and seemingly eternal optimism that are integral parts of horse racing, Gary Jones, who trains Stallwars said, "A trainer once told me, 'I want to win, but I want to win with my maiden runs.'"

As usual, the Derby, which will be televised by ABC, is a study in contrasts.

Winning Colors will be the 13th starter for trainer D. Wayne Lukas, who will be seeking his first Derby victory in his eighth consecutive appearance. Lukas' best Derby performance was a third with Partiz in 1981.

Lukas raced a filly entry in 1984 when Life's Magic finished eighth and Althea was 19th.

Charles Hady will be saddling his first Derby starter in Private Terms, who worked three-eighths of a mile Friday in 39 1/5 seconds. Granacous, another Canadian-bred, sizzled the same distance in 35 flats in their first Derby. They are Chris Antley on Private Terms, Julio Perua on Intensive Command, Pat Johnson on Sea Trek, Shane Romero on Jinx's Orbit and Ken Desormeaux on Purdue King.

The 56-year-old Shoemaker will ride Lively One in his 26th Derby in a bid for a record-tying fifth victory. The filly won with Swale, 1985; Tom Lee, 1959; Lucky Debonair, 1965; and Ferdinand. The riders of five Derby winners were Eddie Arcaro and Bill Hartack.

Winning Colors will be the 35th filly to start in the Derby and will be trying to become the third to win. The winners were Regret, 1915, and Genuine Risk, 1980.

Kingpost will be trying to become the eighth gelding to win the Derby and the first since Clyde Van Dusen broke from the No. 20 post to do it in 1929.

Private Terms will be trying to become the fifth unbeaten winner of the Derby, joining Regret, Morvich, 1922; Majestic Prince, 1959; and Seattle Slew, 1977. The last unbeaten Derby starter was Air Force Won, who finished seventh in 1982.

Regal Classic or Granacous could become the fifth Derby winner foaled outside the United States. Besides Northern Dancer in 1964, they were Sunny's Halo of Canada, 1969; and two colts foaled in England — Omar Khayyam, 1917, and Tomy Lee, 1959.

# Lohr holds lead in abbreviated tourney

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Bob Lohr retained the lead and only Curt Byrum could make a run at him Friday in the day-late completion of the second round in the \$1,388,889 Las Vegas Invitational golf tournament.

Lohr finished a second round 70 for a 136 total Thursday before high winds forced an overnight delay for 71 players.

Byrum was among the group that returned in wind-and-cold Friday morning to finish second round play.

He dropped a 35-foot birdie putt on his final hole at the Desert Inn to stroke par 72 and move within one stroke of the leader at 137 with two rounds to go in the shortened tournament.

The original format called for the 166 pros to play one round on each of three resort courses, each day with a different set of four amateurs. The field was to be cut after Friday's third round with the last 36 holes to be played at the Las Vegas Country Club.

But winds gusting to 55 miles per hour — the players at Spanish Trail said they were much stronger — caused the overnight delay in the second round and reduced the tournament to 72 holes.

The third round will be played Saturday. After 54 holes are completed, the 624 amateurs, each day with a different set of four amateurs. The field was to be cut after Friday's third round with the last 36 holes to be played at the Las Vegas Country Club.

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Of the five leaders, only Byrum had to finish second round play Friday.

And of the top five, Lohr, Jacobsen, Byrum and Crenshaw all will play their third round at Spanish Trail, by far the most difficult of the three courses and the one that took the brunt of the damaging winds.

"Unfortunately, anyone who played at Spanish Trail Thursday afternoon is pretty much out of the tournament," said Greg Norman, who was among that group that played in the worst of the wind.

Norman, a former winner of this title who finished first and second in his last two starts, returned Friday to complete a 76 that put him at 143 through two rounds.

Masters champion Sandy Lyle also came back to Spanish Trail for seven holes Friday, finished off a 76 and was at 147.

First-round leader Bobby Wadkins went from an opening 64 to a wind-interrupted 79, including 41 on the back, at Spanish Trail.

"It was cold and windy when we started this morning," said Byrum, who resumed play with winds gusting to 35 miles per hour and temperatures in the 40s.

"I knew I was in good position in the tournament, so I tried to think of it as a full day," said Byrum, who returned to face a 20-foot par-saving putt on his 16th hole. He missed it and went one over par for the day.

Byrum made par on his 17th hole, then ran in that 35-foot putt for birdie on his final hole that lifted him to within one of the leader.

# Bulls-Cavs bruising resumes

RICHFIELD, Ohio (AP) — Ron Harper and Craig Ehlo are bruised and battered from banging into Browns' picks. Michael Jordan is bruised and battered from banging into Harper and Ehlo.

So far, Game 5 of the Cleveland Cavaliers-Chicago Bulls series, Harper says, "is going to be World War V."

The Cavaliers tied the first-round, best-of-five series 2-2 Thursday night, beating the Bulls 97-91 despite 44 points by Jordan.

Cleveland countered Chicago's multiple-pick offense, designed to free Jordan, by treating him roughly whenever he didn't have the ball, and occasionally when he did.

"This is brutal," Harper said. "With this being the first year in the playoffs for most of us, you have to be pumped all the time. It was a war out there."

Harper and Ehlo, assigned to guard Jordan, collected five fouls each in Tuesday's victory by Cleveland, but Jordan also had five, several of them for pushing off to get away from the persistent defenders.

Jordan, who was playing with a painful strained muscle in his rib cage, then fouled out in the closing seconds of Thursday's game.

"It was a hard-fought battle," Jordan said. "I don't think they have the momentum now. I don't think either team has the momentum. It's a short series, and now one break, one turnover, one mistake can determine the outcome."

Harper led Cleveland with 30 points Thursday, 20 in the second half. He and Larry Nance also played brilliant defense at the end, with Harper blocking a Jordan shot, Nance blocking a Horace Grant shot and Harper stealing the ball from Corzine, all in the final two minutes.

"They reacted very well with their backs to the wall," Jordan said. "Now, this is a back-to-the-wall situation for us. We're trying to fulfill that next goal, and that's to get past the first round."

The Bulls have been to the playoffs each of Jordan's four years in the league, but they haven't yet made it to the second round with him. Cleveland-in-the-playoffs for only the second time in 10 years, hasn't been past the first round since 1974.

Chicago coach Doug Collins said it's critical for his team to avoid putting itself into a hole early in the game.

The key for Chicago may be whether Jordan can score at least 60 points. He collected 60 and 55 in the first two games at Chicago, and the Bulls won both; when Cleveland held him to 38 and 44 at the Coliseum in Richfield, the Bulls lost.

"No, he's not getting any easier to read," Harper said. "He's got 1,002 moves. We know Chicago has that great player they can get the ball to in the last two minutes of the game. We just can't let their crowd get us out of our type of game."

## Market task force deplores turf fights

WASHINGTON (AP) — The presidential task force appointed last fall to study the futures stock market could make progress toward reforming the market, should not be sidetracked by turf battles among federal regulators.

A statement released Thursday by the New York office of Nicholas F. Brady, a Wall Street investment banker who headed the presidential panel, said the "laws in the mechanisms that govern our equity markets... are still in place and must be addressed."

The statement said debate over market reform "has concentrated on who should oversee the needed changes," rather than on what should be reformed, on which the statement said "there is much more agreement."

"Self-interest and turf battles among the regulators and exchanges cannot be allowed to stand in the way of necessary reform of a limited number of issues that cut across marketplaces," it said.

The statement was released three days after Brady met with a Reagan administration working group which is formulating specific suggestions for reforming the markets.

That panel, headed by Treasury Undersecretary George G. Gould and comprising the chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, Securities and Exchange Commission and Commodity Futures Trading Commission, is due to report to President Reagan later this month.

According to sources familiar with the group's work, it is unlikely to go along with the Brady panel's recommendation that the Federal Reserve or a coordinating committee of regulators should set authority to coordinate stock trading and stock index futures trading.

Brady is backing legislation sponsored by Senate Banking Committee Chairman William Proxmire, D-Wis., which would create a coordinating body chaired by the head of the Federal Reserve Board.

The Brady panel's statement warned that "it would be a mistake to abandon the development of appropriate legislation."

Two sources who spoke on condition of anonymity, said it appeared that the working group was making progress toward an agreement on coordinated "circuit breakers," which

would halt trading when markets take an extreme rise or decline.

However, the sources said there was less agreement on coordination margins, which set the amount of money required to make an investment in either the futures or stock market. Although the margins work differently in each market, they currently are lower in the futures market.

The five members of the Brady task force said "it is essential to harmonize the level of margins," adding that margin setting was too important to leave to the exchanges.

The Federal Reserve sets margins for stocks and stock options, while individual futures exchanges set their own margins.

"In the world of one market, it makes little sense to provide investors with different degrees of leverage depending on whether they enter through the stock or derivative futures floor," the panel wrote.

Regarding circuit breakers, the Brady commission said it was encouraged by the work of the New York Stock Exchange and the Chicago Mercantile Exchange toward coordinating market halts.

However, it warned that "circuit breakers should not be set at levels that cause them to be triggered frequently."

It also criticized a New York Stock Exchange move to restrict computerized program trading when the Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks swings up or down by 60 points.

"That kind of circuit breaker, it said, "runs the risk of disconnecting the marketplaces, an outcome we believe would destabilize the market as a whole."

The Brady panel praised the efforts of the exchanges to expand trading capacity, easing the possibility that extremely high trading volume would cause a breakdown of the market.

"However, let us not fool ourselves. Merely increasing market capacity will not assure that a repeat of October will be averted," it said.

Standard & Poor's industrial index fell 1.65 to 300.1, and S&P's 500-stock composite index was down 1.31 to 257.48.

## Stocks falter on employment statistics

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market lost ground for the third straight session in slow trading Friday, faced with employment statistics that raised fears of tighter credit and higher interest rates.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks dropped 2.77 to 2,007.46, bringing its loss for the week to 24.87 points.

Declining issues outnumbered advances by more than 4 to 3 on the New York Stock Exchange, with 602 up, 845 down and 646 unchanged.

Big Board volume totaled 129.08 million shares, against 171.84 million in the previous session. The NYSE's composite index fell .63 to 145.83.

Before the market opened, the Labor Department reported that the civilian unemployment rate fell to 5.4 percent in April from 5.6 percent the month before.

Wall Street had been warily awaiting the figures for several days, worrying that signs of continuing strength in the economy would pressure the Federal Reserve to raise interest rates.

NEW YORK (AP) — The market advanced on the news, apparently because the reported increase in nonfarm payroll employment of 174,000 came in to-

ward the low end of advance estimates.

But as the session passed, prices headed lower while bond prices dropped and analysts described the job data as likely negative for the inflation outlook.

Few will have any trouble choosing the best suit to develop in today's slam. Nevertheless, not many will succeed in winning 12 tricks. Cover the East-West cards and try your luck at six-trump.

South wins dummy's spade ace to lead a low club from dummy. Clearly the club suit offers today's best chance.

When East's jack appears, South faces a problem: Is East telling the truth or is he trying to talk South into adopting a different line? South decides to test once again and returns to dummy's spade king to lead another club. Horrors: East has a singleton. Since the only chance left is with diamonds, South cashes his diamond ace and loses a finesse to East's queen. East shifts to hearts and South takes only nine tricks. Where did South go wrong?

It was right to start with clubs instead of the diamonds. However, South should have adopted a contingency plan. Instead of winning the first spade in dummy, he should have won it in his hand. He then

trumps his club and returns to dummy with a spade to lead a second club. East discards as South wins with his king. South now cashes the diamond ace and loses the diamond finesse as before. The difference is that dummy now has a spade in hand to the long diamonds, and the bad luck in clubs is offset by good luck in diamonds.

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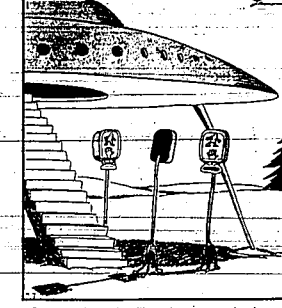

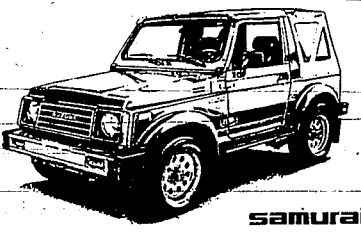
