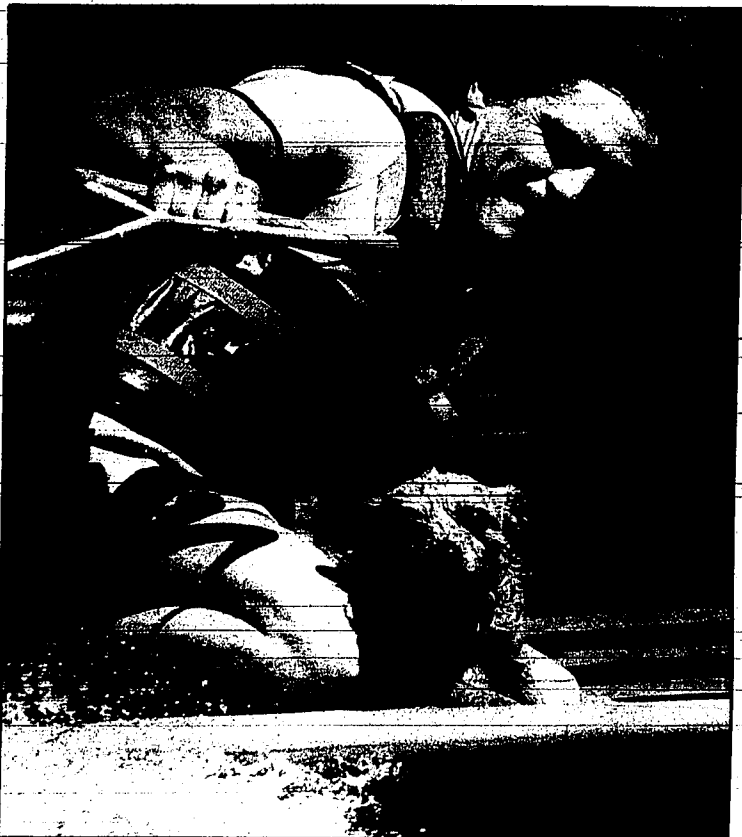

FAA proposes fines for airline violations

WASHINGTON (AP) - Fifteen of the nation's airlines face fines totaling nearly \$6.5 million for a variety of alleged violations of safety and security rules, the Federal Aviation Administration reports.

Chicago-based United Airlines could face a fine of \$1,300,000, the highest of the proposed penalties. The next highest proposed fine is against Hawaiian Airlines, \$1,169,000, followed by Continental, \$982,100; Eastern Airlines, \$893,600; Braniff, \$518,000; American Airlines, \$421,250, and Northwest Airlines, \$371,000.

The fines have been proposed in FAA letters to the airlines, and, in some cases, date back two or three years. If an airline can show a charge is unfounded, the fine can be reduced.

The FAA made the list of proposed fines available to The Wall Street Journal and The Washington Post in response to requests. The

agency released the documents to The Associated Press on Thursday.

The list of proposed fines includes numerous \$1,000 and \$2,000 penalties for alleged security violations, including failure to detect dummy weapons and failure to keep airplanes and other sensitive areas secure from intruders. But in most instances, the fines were for alleged security violations.

According to the FAA, \$705,850 of the fine pending against United was imposed after the airline removed vapor-seal covers from the wings of its 19-plane fleet of 767s for about a month. The covers, the agency said in its letter to United, are supposed to vent leaked fuel from the wing. Without them, the FAA said, there is a risk of fire.

A spokesman for United, Dan Sheehy, said it was too soon to discuss the proposed penalties publicly because "they are currently being discussed between United and the FAA. It really would be inappropriate to comment

U.S., Soviet Union settle differences in INF treaty

GENEVA (AP) - The United States and Soviet Union settled their differences Thursday on a historic treaty to scrap medium-range missiles and sent the agreement to the U.S. Senate in an effort to speed ratification of the pact before the Moscow summit.

Secretary of State George P. Shultz, winding up two days of talks with Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze, told reporters: "We have reached a completely satisfactory agreement on all of these issues."

The Senate postponed debate on the treaty Monday while some members accused Moscow of backsliding and leaving loopholes for cheating. But Shultz said the differences over verifying compliance with the pact were a result of implementing an unprecedented system of on-site inspection.

"Occasionally, they'll have an argument," Shultz said of the technicians who will carry out the agreement to destroy 683 Soviet missiles and 364 U.S. missiles with a range of 315 to 3125 miles. "That's life."

He called the settlement he reached with

Shevardnadze "absolutely satisfactory." It was initiated by Maynard Glitman, who negotiated the treaty, and Col. Gen. Nikolai Chervov, the senior arms control adviser to the Soviet military.

Shultz said Glitman and Lt. Gen. Colin Powell, the U.S. national security adviser, would fly to Washington on Thursday night to report to the Senate on Friday.

"I think it will be well-received," Shultz said. The Moscow meeting between President Reagan and Mikhail S. Gorbachev is scheduled to begin May 29.

Chief U.S. negotiator Max Kampelman and Soviet negotiator Viktor P. Karpov signed another document at the Soviet mission that guarantees any futuristic weapons developed in the intermediate-range also would be banned under the treaty.

Two of the principal stumbling blocks to verification of the treaty dealt with U.S. demands to inspect Soviet missile containers big enough to hold only a stage of a rocket and the issue of how much access U.S. inspectors will have to Soviet missile plants.

Idaho may be in for a severe fire season

BOISE (AP) - The quirkiness of weather patterns largely spared Idaho from the huge range and forest fires that ravaged California and southern Oregon last summer.

But those same weather patterns kept snowpack low in Idaho's mountains this winter, leading to a second year of drought conditions. Now the state's public land managers are watching nervously for the brief green-up of spring to turn to the dry brown of summer.

"The indications are we've got a real bad fire season coming," said Cleo Pearson, fire dispatcher at the U.S. Forest Service's Intermountain Region headquarters in Ogden, Utah. "If we don't get some moisture, it'll probably be worse than last year."

Last year was bad enough.

Almost 800 forest and range fires burned more than 260,000 acres statewide. The Boise and Payette national forests were hardest hit, with more than 66,000 acres charred. Thousands of acres more were blackened by fires allowed to burn out of control within designated wilderness areas.

Even cities were not spared. Arson fires started in tinder-dry grass along the Boise Front burned one path foothills home and several vehicles and forced the temporary evacuation of hundreds.

The Johnny Creek fire swept through hillside brush and juniper in an exclusive area of south Pocatello, forcing about 1,000 residents to flee and destroying one home.

But things could have been far worse. In normally lush southern Oregon, dry forests, careless campers and lightning combined in fires

that consumed more than 153,000 acres of timber. It was the worst fire season in the region's history and the worst statewide in 60 years.

Nationwide, 25,000 firefighters were mobilized against 71,000 fires reported to the Boise Interagency Fire Center, which coordinates support for all federal firefighting efforts. Those fires burned about 2.5 million acres.

The U.S. Forest Service spent more than \$260 million and the Bureau of Land Management about \$54 million on fire suppression last year - more than half in California.

In contrast, the Forest Service's Intermountain Region - which includes seven of Idaho's 10 national forests along with those in Utah, Nevada and western Wyoming - spent less than \$4 million on suppression. It cost the BLM about \$2.5 million to fight fires on its Idaho

Conservative PAC short on funds

LEWISTON (AP) - The conservative Idaho PAC-Five has been short only \$300 in its coffers and plans on sitting out the May 24 primary election.

PAC-Five backers say the 1988 Legislature held the line on taxes, so the group hasn't been able to stimulate much opposition this year to moderate lawmakers. In 1987, when lawmakers and the governor agreed on about \$100 million in new

taxes, PAC-Five was able to raise about \$6,000 from disgruntled conservatives.

But the organization, formed after moderates swept a number of ultra-conservative Republicans out of the Legislature in 1986, is mounting another fund drive this spring. And leaders of the group have the 1989 Legislature will raise taxes and rejuvenate contributions.

"What we're going to see is a swing back next year," predicts Robert M. Farrey of Nampa.

Mt. Home teachers decide to strike

MOUNTAIN HOME (AP) - Last-ditch talks to resolve the seven-month stalemate over a new teachers contract broke down Thursday in the Mountain Home School District, and teachers notified the school board that they would go on strike Friday morning.

School administrators began advising the district's 3,500 students and their parents that Friday classes would be canceled as soon as negotiators left the bargaining table after just 45 minutes.

The next negotiation session was not scheduled until Sunday morning.

Thursday's brief session followed overwhelming approval of the strike by the Mountain Home Teachers Association during a pre-class meeting Thursday morning. The strike vote was 146-38 with some 25 teachers not voting.

The walkout is the first among Idaho teachers since the Moscow Education Association association staged a nine-day strike last fall in its contract dispute, which also focused on non-economic issues.

Although Mountain Home Teachers Association President Neil Hillesland said teacher bargainers were prepared to meet with the board into the night,

Nelson makes short list for circuit court

TWIN FALLS - Twin Falls and Boise attorney Tom Nelson is on the short list of candidates for the Ninth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. The Times-News has learned.

Fifth District Judge George Granata Jr. of Burley is also mentioned as a possibility in Idaho legal circles, but this could not be confirmed Thursday.

Another unconfirmed candidate is Tim Hopkins, an Idaho Falls attorney. Other candidates are U.S. Attorney Guy Hurlbutt and federal bankruptcy Judge Ed Lodge.

Nelson, Lodge and Hurlbutt were interviewed in Boise about two weeks ago by representatives of the U.S. Department of Justice. Nelson and Hurlbutt are Republicans.

The vacancy occurred in the Ninth Circuit with the death last month of Court of Appeals Judge J. Blaine Anderson of Boise. The former Blackfoot attorney served since 1976. The Ninth Circuit encompasses federal courts

in Idaho, California, seven other western states, Guam and the Northern Mariana Islands. A seat on the 26-judge court has traditionally gone to an Idahoan.

The appointment is made by the President on the advice of a ranking member of the president's party in Congress. In this case that would be Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho.

McClure's office confirmed a number of names were under consideration but refused to reveal any. He was with the Boise office of the Twin Falls law firm of Nelson Rosahl Tolbertson-Tulman & Tucker.

John Rosahl of the law firm is McClure's campaign chairman. Nelson, one of Idaho's most prominent water lawyers, has represented Idaho Power Co.

He was a key player in negotiating the landmark Swan Falls water rights agreement between the state and the utility. The agreement determines the future use of all unappropriated waters in the Snake River.

Hurlbutt is associate general counsel of Boise Cascade and was U.S. Attorney in Boise from 1981 to 1984.

Nelson sounds like a reasonable candidate but there is a question whether he would pass muster with Attorney General Ed Meese, said Lloyd Walker, a Twin Falls attorney and prominent Democrat. Nelson may be too moderate for Meese, he said.

"I would be surprised if the slot were filled this year," said Walker.

Traditionally, in the last year of a president's term, judgeships are not filled, Walker said. The appointment would have to clear the Democrat-controlled Senate Judiciary Committee.

The Democrats might wait to see the outcome of the presidential election before acting. A Republican and immediate past president of the American Bar Association also says it's possible the position won't be filled before President Ronald Reagan leaves office.

"Every day that goes by makes it less likely," said Eugene Thomas, a Boise lawyer. Thomas is a Republican.

If the Senate can delay the nomination long enough and a Democrat gets elected president, the Democrats can control the nomination.

Crack in fuselage forces landing

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - An American Airlines Boeing 727 lost cabin pressure and had to make an emergency landing because of a 15-inch crack in the fuselage, an airline spokesman said today.

The cause of the crack, near the right wheel well, could take several weeks of study to determine, said American spokesman Steve McGregor. The incident occurred Monday, and Federal investigators examined the plane Wednesday.

A Boeing 727 lost the top of its fuselage less than two weeks ago over Hawaii, but McGregor said the incidents were not related.

American Flight 984, with 105 passengers and seven crew members, was en route Monday from Chicago to Philadelphia when it suddenly lost cabin pressure.

Oxygen masks were deployed automatically before landing. There were no injuries and no apparent disruption at Detroit Metropolitan Airport in Romulus, Mich., after the landing, officials said. No emergency was declared during the landing, McGregor said.

The aircraft was flown to American's maintenance center in Tulsa, Okla., and investigators from the Federal Aviation Administration and the National Transportation Safety Board were called in.

An investigator has obtained the portion of the aircraft with a crack in it and has sent it to our metallurgical lab here in Washington, and it is being examined by our lab people," NTSB spokesman Alan Pollock said today in Washington.

He said investigators would try to determine whether the crack was due by metal fatigue or some other cause, such as an impact on the fuselage.

He declined to say whether the crack could have been hazardous to

the aircraft and its passengers.

After the federal inspection, American replaced the cracked fuselage section and was testing the repaired jet today, McGregor said.

McGregor said the plane had made 39,983 takeoffs and landings, and "for a 727, that's not a high number of cycles."

The problem occurred less than two weeks after a 19-year-old Alaska Airlines Boeing 737 lost part of its upper fuselage while flying over Hawaii, killing a flight attendant and injuring 61 passengers and crew members. The cause was suspected to be structural failure.

But McGregor discounted the similarity between the two incidents.

"What happened to our jet was in no way related to what happened in Hawaii," he said.

Artificial heart emphasis changes

ATLANTA (AP) - The National Institutes of Health will step funding artificial heart research and will focus instead on smaller devices intended to assist rather than replace hearts, according to a report published today.

"While the (artificial heart) device seemed to work well, the biology didn't," said Dr. Claude Lenfant, director of the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute.

"The human body just couldn't seem to tolerate it. We were left wondering whether the idea of a permanent replacement will ever work," Lenfant said in an interview published in The Atlanta Constitution and The Atlanta Journal.

The decision means four institutions awarded contracts last year for artificial heart research will receive only about \$1 million of the \$5 million each was expecting over the next five years.

"This is a tremendous setback for scientific advancement in the field," said Dr. Donald Olsen, head of artificial heart research at the University of Utah, which received one of the contracts. He said the decision will set back development of a permanent artificial heart.

National Weather Service forecasters say El Niño apparently has broken up, raising the promise of more normal summer precipitation and snowpack next winter.

But, "When you're talking about normal precipitation in the summertime around here, that's not much," Weather Service fire-weather meteorologist Paul Werth said.

Spring rains provided a welcome delay to the fire season but did little more than moisten the outside of "large fuel" like trees and brush, left dry to the core by a second winter without significant snow.

"Really, all of the Pacific Northwest down into Nevada and California is still in the drought, even though we had a little rainfall the past two months," Werth said.

"And as far as rangeland fire, that could actually make conditions worse. The grass will be thick, and there'll be more fuel when it dries out. Come June, we'll see fires."

Unless spring rains continue into the summer, observers agree, the Northwest will need only a spark to set it ablaze by July and August. In some parts of the region, up to 16 inches over normal precipitation is needed to make up for what is experimentally called the "moisture deficit."

State Education Association officials said more than two-thirds of Idaho's 116 school districts, including Boise, have master agreements.

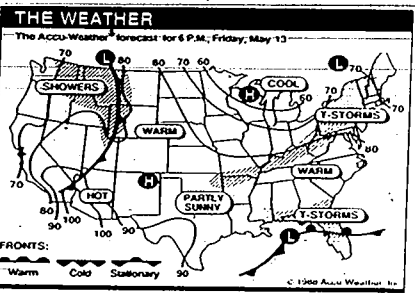

In wake of explosion, officials want to close Nevada plant

HENDERSON, Nev. (AP) — Officials in this city of 55,000 huddled on ways to close the Kerr-McGee Corp. plant Thursday amidst new speculation over the cause of last week's massive explosion that destroyed a similar rocket fuel oxidizer plant.

The Kerr-McGee facility is the only plant in the United States manufacturing ammonium perchlorate, an oxidizer for solid rocket fuel used in the space shuttle and some military missiles.

"Our city attorney is still working on what we have to do to legally close them down," Henderson City Manager Gary Bloomquist said. "We're not talking about closing them down permanently, although I'm not saying that couldn't be the final outcome. We haven't ruled out the option of forcing them to move."

The Henderson City Council was scheduled to meet late Thursday to consider the city's options. Bloomquist said one of those options

might be ruling the plant a public nuisance.

Meanwhile, company officials are expected to call a news conference later this week to blame the blast on a natural gas explosion. Officials at Southwest Gas Corp. deny any liability.

City and county officials expressed outrage Wednesday when the Kerr-McGee plant resumed production of the oxidizer. Plant officials had said last week they would wait to reopen

until authorities determined the cause of the blast May 4 that destroyed the Pacific Engineering & Production Co. (PEPCON) plant, killing two people, injuring 326 and causing \$73 million in damage. Kerr-McGee and Pacific were the only two plants in the country to manufacture the critical fuel component.

"We are doing all we can to force the county to seek an injunction against Kerr-McGee," City Councilman Michael Harris said. "We are not

going to take this lying down, I assure you."

Kerr-McGee resumed operations after being advised by PEPCON that a fire by a underground natural gas leak triggered the blasts.

Fire Chief Roy Parrish said Wednesday that PEPCON officials believe a gas leak fed the fire. He said, however, that the fire department would withhold judgment until it completes its own investigation.

Southwest Gas officials contested

that suggestion.

"Our evidence shows that our facilities and product were involved only after the explosion," said Dante Pistone.

"As far as we're concerned, our facilities are a victim of the explosion and not the cause," Southwest spokesman Dennis Hetherington said today. Hetherington said the company has been unable to inspect the site because of a court order denying anyone access to the blast site.

Lucky Peak project begins sending electricity to Seattle

BOISE (AP) — The first of three generators at the Lucky Peak hydroelectric plant has been switched on, sending current to Seattle and east to Boise Valley farmers.

Two more generators will come on line in the next two months. By the end of July, the 150-foot-long plume of water that explodes out of the Lucky Peak spillway will have vanished.

And Lucky Peak, built in the 1950s to provide irrigation water and control flooding, will acquire a third attribute, generating as much as 3.6

percent of Seattle's power.

The project took four years and just under \$100 million to build, with the first generator coming on line last week. Four Boise Valley irrigation districts are backing the power project and will realize royalties from it.

The first unit is producing, at full capacity, 11.5 megawatts of electricity for Seattle City Light.

"These units will use all the water normally released for flood control and irrigation," said Tom McCreedy, project manager of construction for

Morrison-Knudsen Inc.

When construction began in May 1984, the project was scheduled for completion by April 1988. Defects in the turbine "runners" — the flywheels that help convert surging water into electricity — caused the delay, McCreedy said.

The cost, however, is expected to be several million dollars less than expected, he added.

McCreedy said he expects all power-plant construction to be completed by September.

Work begins on Idaho Falls memorial for Vietnam vets

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Nearly three years after the site was dedicated, excavation began Thursday on the Idaho State Vietnam Veterans Memorial at Freeman Park in Idaho Falls.

The veterans group sponsoring the project, Idaho Freedom Bird, hopes the memorial will be finished by July 4.

"It looks like we're getting real close," Freedom Bird President Del Ray John said at a ground-breaking ceremony.

The group also came closer to its

fund-raising goal for the memorial Thursday, receiving a \$1,000 donation from the Idaho Falls Police Association. Another \$20,000 is needed to complete the project, John said.

Originally, the memorial was expected to cost about \$125,000, but donations of labor and materials have reduced the costs, John said, adding that Freedom Bird concentrated on buying materials for the memorial in Idaho.

"We want to make sure this is a

made-in-Idaho monument," he said.

Concrete will be poured into the Freeman Park site early next week, and Freedom Bird expects to take delivery of the "bronze" monument by June 1. John said the organization will welcome volunteer help in completing concrete work.

Building the memorial represents a healing process for Vietnam veterans, but also a healing between interests in eastern and western Idaho, John said.

Interstate will be rerouted

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The Idaho Transportation Department is launching a five-phase, \$76 million project to reroute Interstate 90 away from Lake Coeur d'Alene in the hills north of the city.

By 1992, construction crews are scheduled to complete more than seven miles of freeway between Coeur d'Alene and Wolf Lodge Bay.

That will replace a temporary, winding highway along the northern shore of the lake. Idaho State Police consider it a very dangerous, high-accident stretch.

"That's one of the 10 worst accident areas in North Idaho," said ISP Capt. Ed Strickfaden. "We probably patrol that stretch of road heavier than any other stretch in North Idaho. We have to have a visible presence there to get people to slow down."

Strickfaden said when the new stretch is complete, it will be much safer. Heavy traffic also will be eliminated from the lakefront stretch, allowing it to be used as a scenic route.

Crews are to blast a 200-foot wide roadway over steep hills and through forest and rock. The segment is one of the few not complete in the nationwide Interstate 90.

Family issues get lip service, but no legislative action

WASHINGTON—It is conceivable that if you scoured the halls of Congress long enough, you might actually uncover a quarried old-time miasmatic fog that would admit to a profound disinterest in the American family. But only off the record.

For the rest of the inhabitants of this famous hill, family has become a buzzword, a word about which people are allowed mixed feelings. Mention the family and everyone is for it, however they define it, and especially if you don't actually have to vote for it.

The women were responding to the congressional Democratic leadership, which has been truly slandering on family issues. Recently, House Majority Whip Tony Coelho (D-Calif.) told a reporter that the task for 1988 was "getting set for 1989." Full speed in place. There is also the persistent rumor that Southern Democrats told the leadership they didn't want to have to vote on any more liberal, anti-business matters.

Anti-business? "This bill requires the business community to own up to family needs," says Ann Koller of the National Women's Law Center. Many businesses have resisted the whole concept of mandated family leave. Monica McPadden of the BPW adds, "It's been made clear that if you vote for this, the Chamber of Commerce will cut off your PAC money."

The best deal for a politician may be to get credit for pro-family sentiments without doing anything to risk PAC losses. In national terms, in the presidential campaign of 1988, it may be easier and more politically savvy for the Democratic Party to keep family concerns as a "hot" campaign issue than to start solving them.

"It's taken as common wisdom that these issues are not only 'hot' but that the Democrats own them," says Joanne Howes, a voter analyst. The women most concerned with parental leave aren't going to desert to the Republican Party. George Bush isn't exactly wooing their vote. Indeed, the "quality circle" of seven that I met with is ambivalent about how much trouble to make and equally tired of politely waiting at the end of the line like "good girls" for family issues to get their turn.

"We haven't been able to put the message across to the Democrats: If you want the family issues to work for you, you have to do something," says Howes. In any "close election, voters must be shown that politics can produce solutions that are meaningful in their own lives. In this "hot" year, that means getting the family issues unstuck. The place to begin is just where the Family and Medical Leave Act begins: at birth.

In Washington, family issues are "hot." This political temperature has been duly recorded in almost every publication. The news comes complete with a chart of all bills responding to the alleged heat, from day care to health insurance.

But not one of these bills has yet been passed. Not one has yet come up for a floor vote. And it is entirely possible that not a single piece of family legislation will make out of this cauldron of concern to become policy during the life of this election-year Congress.

Let me give a case in point: The Family and Medical Leave Act. The bill in its current compromised form would ensure that a parent could take up to 10 weeks of unpaid leave after the birth or adoption of a child. They could do the same in case of the serious illness of a child or parent. The act would initially cover firms that hire 50 or more employees.

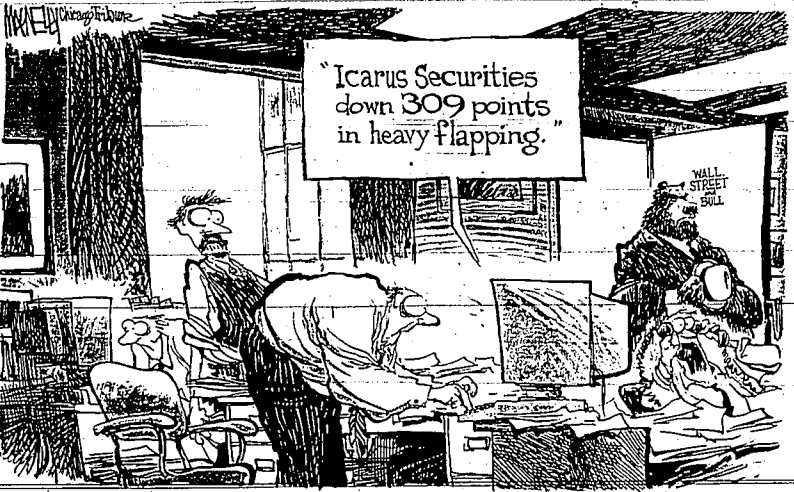
The notion embodied in this bill, that workers have responsibilities to families as well to jobs, is not exactly revolutionary. Nor is the mandate of 10 weeks of unpaid leave. It is a baby business step. If its sponsors had lived in the colonial days, they would still be writing, "Dear George, about the matter of ten."

Nevertheless this bill is stuck. And if this bill, which has a 150 co-sponsors in the House (including 20 Republicans) and would cost the federal government nothing, can't get to the floor for a vote, we can forget about the pricier and more controversial "family" matters. The parental leave bill, as Andrea Camp in Pat Schroeder's office says, "is the minimum you can do and still have credibility on the family issue."

The private roundtable of family lobbyists and leaders talked about this stuckness on May 9, using terms that ranged from "outrage to a more modest" "disappointment." "It distresses too strong a word?" asked one genteelly.

At the time of which she writes (1908) when

most of Magic Valley was just beginning to be settled, Oakley had been in existence for 25 or 30 years. Consequently, the lantern slide projections shown throughout the Midwest in the promotional exhibits of the Twin Falls Tract were actually pictures of Oakley's already established orchards and farms. As a matter of conscience, it was advertised as the Oakley-Twin Falls Tract during the promotional years. "Oakley" was later dropped from the title.

An article from a 1913 issue of the Oakley Herald gives a little insight into the role Oakley played in the early days of Magic Valley. That year it tells of an excursion train that left Buhl, headed for Oakley. Passengers were picked up at every stop along the way. At Buryley it combined with a train from Rupert. They were headed for the three day 24th of July celebration. Accommodations had been made for those who wished to stay over. The cost of the train ride was 2 cents per mile.

At the time, Oakley boasted of its thousands of fall grown trees, its 7 miles of concrete sidewalks and a water wagon that was continually watering down the roads, keeping them cool and dust-free.

The celebration itself consisted of the usual programs and parade, plus activities at the newly built Air Park - including ball games, horse races and swimming in a cement pool.

Arms treaty should reduce first strike vulnerability

U.S.-Soviet relations, which seemed headed for such great things only a few months ago, appear to be on hold. Only weeks away from the Moscow summit, a START agreement seems beyond reach. And Mikhail Gorbachev is complaining that the president continues to talk about peace through strength.

These atmospherics, however, should not blind us to the reality. U.S. strength and Soviet weakness have combined to afford the Reagan administration its chance to create a constructive relationship with Moscow. But to seize that chance, we have got to get our act together.

Let's begin by dispensing with the fashionable line that we cannot expect decisions on U.S.-Soviet relations until Gorbachev overcomes Ljuchov and the other bad guys and that somehow we must help Gorbachev to do so. De Tocqueville described the Soviet predicament best: "The most perilous moment for bad government is when it seeks to record its days." Gorbachev's trouble is that he has promised greater abundance of good things, but perestroika has not yet produced more cucumbers in Moscow. The first secretary's struggles with his rivals, therefore, need not have anything to do with his policy toward

the world or the idea that we've done the job because we propose to reduce arsenals by a poker player's bid of 50 percent. These are distractions from the real issue of how to sustain our deterrent, distractions that are compounded by the dis-agreement on fundamentals in Washington today. Party leaders, we have debated the future of our land-based missiles in the face of a rising Soviet capability to destroy them in a first strike. Now we must decide: Are we going to keep them in fixed sites, defending them with the first fruits of SDI? Are we going to go mobile, and if so, with the multi-warhead MX or the more survivable single-warhead Midgetman favored by the Scowcroft Commission of which I was a member three years ago?

We therefore need a statement from the administration of how the START treaty will affect this decision, how it will help to reduce the Soviet capability to devastate the most accurate, most reliable and swiftest part of our deterrent. That's what the treaty should be all about. If we cannot get that reduction, then we should not agree to a treaty either in principle or in detail.

The second item on the list is to restore some sense of cohesion in U.S.-Soviet relations. We are supposed to have a four-part agenda, which goes beyond arms control to include human rights, regional conflicts and bilateral issues. But just having the list does not mean that we have a policy. There must be a harmonious progression if a more meaningful relationship with the U.S.S.R. is to be achieved.

But where is that progression? The Soviet preference for arms control has dominated relations, while one by one, the broader political issues essential for the long-term are being negotiated only in fits and pieces of Moscow's choosing.

All of the human rights changes so far, for example, have not disposed the easier cases, such as family reunification or the release of all political prisoners. On regional issues, we are guarantors of an agreement on Afghanistan that requires our ally, Pakistan, to violate it if we are to sustain the mujaheddin as the Soviets withdraw. We have not even begun to grapple with the Soviet aid to the Sandinistas and the Salvadoran rebels; the strategic dimension of our trouble in Central America. Only on bilateral matters, such as consulates and cultural exchanges, have we substantive agreement.

This unhealthy trend of doing business

Another explanation is possible. The "stall" before the summit has as its purpose to make the American visitors anxious, the Soviets to set them up to decide outstanding issues on the quick, a la Reykjavik, relying upon the dramatic ambience to dull the critical senses. My own experience at these gatherings suggests that Gorbachev will be at his best as able as Brezhnev in recreating history - and the desire to make it mark in history - to his cause.

Statesmen with one eye on history, however, are apt to suffer from restricted vision. The only sure way to succeed is for our leaders to keep both eyes on the ball of the national interest. And what should we bring to Moscow?

At the top of the list should be a clear strategy for nuclear deterrence, which has kept the peace since the Second World War.

So let's put aside the talk of a non-nucle-

Chinese jetliner hijacked to Taiwan

CHINGHUANKANG AIR FORCE BASE, Taiwan (AP) — A Chinese jetliner with 118 people aboard was hijacked to Taiwan today by two Chinese men seeking to defect. The aircraft later took off for China but the hijackers remained in Taiwan, a military spokesman said.

The Boeing 737 left Chingchuan-kang air force base in the central Taiwan city of Taichung at 2:55 a.m. Friday (2:55 p.m. EDT Thursday) for Canton in southern China after refueling, said Wang Pao-hua, spokesman for the air base. The two hijackers asked for political asylum in Taiwan, he said.

The Government Information Office, however, said in a statement that the jet was headed for the British colony of Hong Kong on China's southern coast. It did not say whether the plane would later go somewhere else.

The hijackers carried fake guns and bombs, Taiwan Television Station Co. said. They and the passengers and crew members had left the Boeing after it landed in Taiwan.

In Beijing, the official Xinhua News Agency said the plane was hijacked to

Taiwan while flying to Canton from Xiamen in southeastern China 136 miles across the Taiwan Strait from Taiwan.

Xinhua said the plane was operated by the Xiamen Aviation Co., a subsidiary of the national flag carrier, the Civil Aviation Administration of China.

The television station said the plane landed at 9:07 p.m. Quoting unidentified sources, it said the plane was escorted by several military aircraft after entering Taiwan's airspace.

A Defense Ministry spokesman, who spoke on condition of anonymity,

confirmed the plane landed at the Taichung airport but refused to give any other details.

The television station said the plane carried 107 passengers, some of them foreigners, and 11 crew members.

It gave the names of the hijackers as Chang Ching-kuo and Rong Chung-yung, both aged 27 and workers in the southern city of Kunming.

The Nationalist government of Taiwan claims to be the legitimate ruler

of all China and has no formal contact with the Chinese Communist government. During the past year, however, the Nationalists have eased restrictions on contact between people across the Taiwan Straits.

On Feb. 22, a Taiwanese man who reportedly wanted to foster contacts with China attempted to commandeer a China Airlines domestic flight to Beijing. China Airlines is Taiwan's major airline.







Bush campaign appreciates Reagan's terse endorsement

WASHINGTON (AP) — George Bush at last has President Reagan's blessing for his race for the White House, but the president's terse statement of support, mispronouncing the name of his vice president, sent Bush aides scurrying to express enthusiasm for the endorsement.

Reagan delivered the long-awaited endorsement of his 1980 and 1984

running mate at a Republican fund-raising dinner Wednesday night, telling his audience he would "campaign as hard as I can" for Bush.

The president, bestowing his approval on Bush's campaign more than two weeks after the vice president mathematically clinched the GOP nomination in the Pennsylvania primary, came in a brief three sentences

at the conclusion of a 15-minute speech.

While Reagan's backing was never in doubt, the president had stuck to a promise to remain neutral as long as there were other challengers. Bush's remaining rival, Pat Robertson, announced earlier Wednesday that he would support Bush.

During his speech, Reagan men-

tioned Bush only three times, mispronouncing his name on one of those occasions as "George Bosh."

But Bush aides immediately stressed that they were pleased with Reagan's announcement, no matter how brief.

"It's a total endorsement," said Bush's chief of staff Craig Fuller. "I would not look for what wasn't said. I

would look for what was said. I'm fully satisfied. I don't think it gets any better."

Bush's press secretary, Stephen Hart, said "it looks like an endorsement to me."

Speaking at a \$1,500-a-plate banquet attended by more than 3,000 Republicans, Reagan concluded a speech about the accomplishments of his administration with these words: "I intend to campaign as hard as I can."

Report: Instructors drowned recruit

WASHINGTON — Navy recruit Lee William Mirecki screamed in fear and panic as his instructors in a rescue course pried his fingers from a swimming-pool-safety-rope and shoved his head under water in a struggle that left the 19-year-old student dead, according to navy investigators.

This week, two months after declaring Mirecki's March 2 death accidental, the Navy charged five instructors at the Navy Air Station in Pensacola, Fla. with involuntary manslaughter and charged the lieutenant in command of the Rescue Swimmer School with dereliction of duty.

Mirecki's death, which has shaken the Naval Air Training Command, also prompted officials to shut down training operations at the rescue school pending "a detailed review of its procedures," according to a navy spokesman.

Legal documents describe a frightened young recruit who was forced to continue a water rescue drill despite loud and vehement protests that he wanted to stop the voluntary exercise because he was "physically exhausted or afraid to train, or both."

The students, training as air crew members, were practicing search and rescue operations with instructors simulating panic-stricken victims forced to leap into the water because of an aircraft disaster.

Methodist Church criticizes Israel

NEW YORK (AP) — In the months of Israeli-Palestinian violence, various church organizations have criticized Israel as moving too hastily to curb disorder. Last week such criticism got tougher.

In one of the severest condemnations yet of Israeli conduct, the United Methodist Church said, "Israel's current iron-fist policy ... is totally unacceptable as civilized behavior."

The blast from this church of nearly 10 million Americans, second-largest in U.S. Protestantism next to Southern Baptists, came in a late-night finale of its governing conference and got scant news attention.

Rabbi James Rudin, interreligious affairs director of the American Jewish Committee, called the statement a one-sided expression of "selective outrage" against Israel without also criticizing Arab instigators of violence.

"Overall it's an unbalanced statement," he said, and the "harshness emanated from the church world toward Israel."

However, it was approved by an overwhelming 816-76 vote, urging the United States to stop all military and security aid to Israel until Israel ceases the repression of Palestinians in the occupied territory.

Administration backs request for F-18 jets

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration is backing Kuwait's request to buy sophisticated F-18 fighter-bombers for defense in the Persian Gulf, and has begun consulting Congress to help the plan get off the ground, U.S. officials said Thursday.

It would be the first sale of two-engine, 500-mile range F-18s to an Arab country, but State Department spokeswoman Phyllis Oakley said, "Kuwait obviously faces a threat in the gulf."

Israeli warplanes raid Lebanon

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Israeli warplanes blasted a Palestinian guerrilla base south of Beirut today in the eighth air raid on Lebanon this year, police said.

They said six fighter-bombers rocketed the targets near the Kharrub region town of Barja in three bombing runs. Barja is 16 miles south of Beirut.

The raid began at 6:05 p.m. and lasted 10 minutes. There was no immediate report of casualties or damage.

Police said the target appeared to be a base of the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine-General Command.

They said from the Lebanese port of Sidon, nine miles south of Barja, that smoke could be seen billowing from the bombed base.

Target date is 2000 for polio

GENEVA (AP) — The World Health Organization on Thursday endorsed a massive immunization campaign to protect all children against polio and eradicate the crippling disease by the year 2000.

Only half the world's children are immunized, and 275,000 new cases of polio occur each year, mainly in developing countries, according to WHO.

A committee of the 166-nation U.N. agency passed by consensus a resolution calling for the eradication program. Approval by WHO's full assembly is expected Friday at the final session of the agency's annual meeting.

Papal visit doesn't stop rebels

LIMA, Peru (AP) — Armed guerrillas today seized a seminary where Pope John Paul II is scheduled to speak this weekend, news reports said. Police said suspected rebels bombed a police bus and seriously wounded seven officers.

The violence followed a mortar attack late Wednesday on the Interior Ministry and a car bombing near a Lima military installation, according to police reports.

The violence comes just two days before the pope is scheduled to arrive in Peru. It was the heaviest round of attacks in the capital this year.

Police did not provide details, but news reports said a soldier guarding an officers' school was killed and two policemen wounded in the attack on the Interior Ministry.

Cancellation shocks Vatican

SUCRE, Bolivia (AP) — The Vatican today said it was shocked at what Paraguay's decision to cancel a meeting between Pope John Paul II and an opposition political group next week.

The chief Vatican spokesman, Joaquin Navarro, said the action announced Wednesday by Paraguayan President Gen. Alfredo Stroessner, Latin America's longest-ruling military chief, hindered "the exercise of the pastoral mission of the Holy Father."

Stroessner cited grounds of security for canceling the meeting, scheduled for Tuesday in the Paraguayan capital of Asuncion. He also charged the group would use a religious encounter for political ends.

The group, called Constructors of Society, has about 350 members and includes politicians, peasant farmers, Catholic laymen and lawyers.

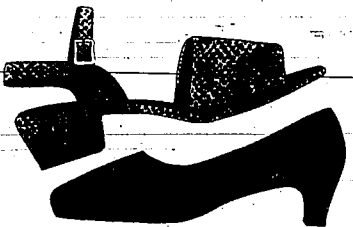

GOP contenders spar over school issues

KIMBERLY — Rep. Jerry Callen said Wednesday that property-tax overrides to fund school districts are not all bad. "I'm really not against the override process," said the two-term Jerome Republican.

The Legislature's support of public education was criticized this year because of the threat that property taxes would rise if state funding, through income tax, suffered.

Callen favored lower state funding, saying Wednesday that overrides allow a local check on spending and increasing taxes.

Callen is being challenged for his eight-county floterial seat in the Republican primary May 24 by Rep. Gary Robbins, R-Dietrich, and Odeen Redman, Albion.

Callen and Redman were among the GOP slate speaking Wednesday to nearly 50 people at a Twin Falls County Republican Central Committee meeting. Robbins had a previously scheduled engagement and was absent.

Educational issues, from funding to schools' consolidation, dominated the discussion.

Callen and Robbins have each said their race presents a clear philosophical choice on such issues as educational funding. Twin Falls GOP Women's President Jeanne Schlagenhauf asked Callen about that.

"I wonder how you think we can improve our educational system by withholding dollars," Schlagenhauf asked Callen.

"There's got to be some limit," Callen said. "Who can say what the state of Idaho can afford?"

Callen voted reluctantly during the 1988 session for a \$356 million public education budget. To avoid raising taxes at the state level, he said he preferred a \$351 or \$352 million budget.

In contrast, Robbins voted against \$356 million, holding out for the \$360-million range. He argued that a state-

level tax diet would simply bulge into local property-tax overrides.

But Callen says overrides allow for local oversight. "The community gets a chance to vote on these and I think it's working," Callen said. "You get them pinpointed for specific things."

Redman, president of the Albion Telephone Co., spoke of managing the state budget like a business. He didn't address specific public education funding or the philosophical difference between taxing income or property for education.

But he said, "I agree that you don't solve the education problem by throwing money at it."

Prospects for consolidating schools or districts stirred two contested primary races. Callen favored consolidation to cut district costs, but said it should occur at the local level.

"Consolidation is good, but I think it's got to come from the local level," Callen said. "To go up and mandate it, I see **DEBATE** on Page B2

TWIN FALLS — Today is the deadline to register at the County Courthouse for the May 24 primary.

The Twin Falls County Clerk's office will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. to accept last-minute registrations in what's been termed a slow turnout so far.

No identification or other records are necessary to register, as people will simply sign a document swearing that they have told the truth.

Registrants must have been residents of their county for at least 30 days and turn 18 before the election, which means 17-year-olds with birthdays on or before Nov. 8 may register today. Also, residents who have moved since the last election, should re-register to change the precinct in which they vote.

Secretary of State Peter Cenarrusa acknowledges it's hard to get people interested in primary elections, particularly one held in May, nearly six months before the general election.

In the primary, Cenarrusa said partisan voters must confine their voting to one party or the other, and cannot vote in both primaries.

Each legislative district in Magic Valley features a primary race, with two primary contests in the floterial races covering all of the Magic Valley.

The Republican floterial race pits incumbent Rep. Jerry Callen, R-Jerome, against Rep. Gary Robbins, R-Dietrich, and Odeen Redman, R-Twin Falls. Newcomb's decision not to seek re-election.

In addition, the three area districts each have a Republican primary. District 22, or Blaine, Camas, Gooding and Lincoln counties, finds Billy Emerson, James Martin and Tom Morrison squaring off to replace Robbins, who is running for Callen's seat.

District 23, or Twin Falls County, features Wandalee Anderson, Lee Barnes and Don Siplon running to replace Rep. Russ Newcomb.

District 24, or Cassia, Jerome and Minidoka counties, has Maxine Bell challenging incumbent Rep. Waldo Martens, R-Jerome.

All voters can vote in the nonpartisan judicial elections, but neither Supreme Court Justice Robert Bakes nor Court of Appeals Justice Roger Swanstrom have opposition. Write-ins are not allowed on the judicial ballot.

In the last general election, there were nearly 650,000 voters registered in Idaho, and 392,909 cast ballots, or 71.45 percent. But the turnout in the primary election that spring was less than half that of the general election. For the primary, 175,145 ballots were cast, for a statewide turnout of 34.23 percent.

Separate Bible study class recommended

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho Education Association Region IV executive board is urging teachers to support a Twin Falls School Board proposal to prohibit teaching creationism in science classes.

But it also recommends that the school board add a comparative-religion course or "Bible as Literature" course to its curriculum.

The Twin Falls School Board has an opportunity to strengthen the science curriculum with the exclusion of creationism, said Chuck Humphries, Region IV IEA president.

But Humphries, who teaches science at Buhl, said the board can

strengthen its curriculum by adding the two religion classes.

The committee issued a strong condemnation of teaching creationism in science classes.

"We oppose the inclusion of creationism in science classes. It simply does not belong in a science curriculum any more than astrology or flat earth theories," Humphries said. "But, at the same time, we believe students should learn about different religious viewpoints of the origin of life."

Humphries said the committee believes some of the support for creationism in science classes comes from people who believe moral values should be taught in school.

ble consolidation of Hansen, Murtagh, and Kimberly schools. She said that experience left her wishing for an alternative to total consolidation, but feeling that there probably isn't one. "I am concerned that our smaller schools cannot offer as much as the larger ones," she said. "But consolidation would mean that the children would not have the same kinds of one-on-one personal relationships with teachers or with other students."

Six years before consolidation will become necessary, "I feel that the government is eventually going to stop subsidizing small schools, and if a consolidation is going to take place, I would like to be in a capacity to help," she said.

Referring to what she calls teachers' "contract problems" with teachers, Burton said, "I would like to see better communication throughout the school system."

Gibson was born in Holland and moved to the United States in 1957. She graduated from high school in California, moved to Hansen 12 years ago and became a U.S. citizen last year. Today, she is a full-time homemaker who spends her spare time at school.

The mother of two children, ages 9

and 10, Gibson explained that she has always been active in PTO and in school fund-raisers. "As a homemaker, I have time to work with these kids," she said. "And, as a woman - and a mom - I see needs in a little different way than a man does."

Gibson said she would like to have the opportunity to follow up on school consolidation. "Our schools are really small, but I think we could offer our kids a lot more in the way of preparing them better for college."

For example, she said, Hansen High School doesn't have a counselor to help the students when they are out trying to make it into colleges. "I believe in our schools and our young people," said Gibson. "I also believe we can give our young people more than they are getting right now."

Ratto, 34, works with Ratto Brothers Construction and is the father of six children, ages 13 to 1 month. He was born in Poentello and schooled in the Wood River Valley. He and his family have lived in Hansen for three and a half years.

"One of the main reasons I want to

be on the school board is because I have four kids in the school system and two more who will eventually be there," said Ratto, who added that he has also been involved with kids in the scouting program most of his life.

"We have a good school district, but there are a few areas which would use some changes," Ratto said. "I would hope that, by serving on the board, I could encourage some of these changes."

Specifically, Ratto would like to see more class variety in the high school, "whether it be accomplished through consolidation, or a satellite dish to add extra classes, or something else."

Ratto also said he would like to see more harmony among the school board, superintendent, teachers and parents.

The Hansen School District 415 has a trustee board of five seats. Trustees serve a three-year term and must live in the zone for which they are running. Registered voters must live in the zone where a trustee is up for election to vote for a school board candidate.

Conflict at IU

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. — Indiana University basketball coach Bob Knight said Thursday he would decide within a couple of days whether he would move to the University of New Mexico, and published reports said there was serious friction between him and IU President Thomas Ehrlich.

Knight, talking to reporters before speaking Thursday night at a sports banquet in Merrillville, indicated he had not made up his mind whether he would leave Bloomington.

"I have not made a decision like

that since I've been at Indiana," Knight said. "It's time to make that kind of decision. It's a personal decision. I'll have to leave it at that. I'm not going to get into the whys or wherefores. I've got to make it in the next couple of days."

Knight also said salary and other financial terms would make no difference in his decision.

Officials in Albuquerque had hoped to announce the name of the new Lob coach by Friday, but said negotiations would likely continue until next week.

"As a result of complexities that have developed during the negotiation process with the candidates for head basketball coach at the University of New Mexico, a decision has been made to continue discussion through the weekend," New Mexico athletic director John Koenig said Thursday. "Our hope is a decision will be announced no later than next Wednesday, May 18."

The Indianapolis Star in its Friday editions reported that the greater emphasis on academics over athletics that first-year president Ehrlich has instituted had created a conflict with Knight.

"The clash there at the university has caused him to rethink his entire existence," Quinn Buckner, a former player under Knight who remains close to the coach, told *The Star*.

The newspaper also quoted unidentified sources as saying the coach was considering re-examining and looking for a major change in his life.

In an interview with *The Star*, Knight said his interest in New Mexico intensified last weekend when he and Koenig attended the Kentucky Derby together. Prior to that, Knight had unequivocally recommended Dave Bliss, his former Army assistant and current head coach at Southern Methodist, for the job.

Knight also repeated his statements of the last few days that changes at Indiana had weighed heavily on him. He has not elaborated

on these changes, but they appear to point to Ehrlich.

"He's really concerned about the people and there have been a lot of changes here and that's really concerned me for some time," Knight told *The Star*.

Knight, who has led the Hoosiers to three NCAA championships in 17 seasons in Bloomington, did not appear at a late afternoon rally for him outside Assembly Hall, where Indiana plays its home basketball games.

Campus police said an estimated 2,500 fans attended, some carrying signs of support for the controversial coach and epithets for Ehrlich.

"She has been jogging without pain," said Bell of the leg injury to his sophomore star, "but you can say what will happen if she tries; to run hard. We've told her just to run fast enough to win."

Bell said he wouldn't rule out Briggs running in more than the sprints if the pain stays away and indicated a third choice would be anchoring the 400 relay ahead of running the open 400.

If Briggs could run and win in two events, Twin Falls' title chances will be boosted. The Bruins have good quality points in Jennifer Hannah in the middle distances, Lisa Poocek in the hurdles, Molly Wallace in the quarter and Kris-Horner in the weights. In fact, that corps could account for seven first places. But Highland has deep depth and if Briggs is there, Highland's point totals will soar.

Hulseley eyes NFL

Ex-Tiger gets shot with Dolphins

LOGAN, Utah — Gary Hulseley finally has a spot in the NFL — if he can keep it.

"I'm pretty excited about it," said Hulseley, a former all-state defensive tackle at Jerome High School who signed a free agent contract last week with the Miami Dolphins. "I'm anxious to get out of school and get on with something else."

Hulseley, who will complete his studies at Utah State University later this month, was passed up in the April NFL draft due in part to two knee sur-

geries in three years.

"I think he's got a decent shot," said Doug Fiore, Hulseley's defensive line coach at Utah State. "He's got all the tools. What he didn't have was the kind of a senior season that the NFL looks for. They look for guys who are really dominating in seven or eight games, and Gary only really did that two or three times last year. Because of his knee surgeries, he was really up and down here."

Hulseley's knee was a concern of the Dolphins, who tested him before they offered him a free agent contract.

"It checked out all right," said Hulseley. "I don't have any trouble with

mobility and there's no pain."

"Gary had his surgery three years ago and came back and had a great junior season, but it was still bothering him, so he had more surgery a year ago," Fiore explained. "He was OK by the time the season started, but what he missed was the off-season training. Guys in his position train pretty much all year, working on strength and conditioning, and because of his surgeries he wasn't able to do that. That really put him behind everybody else."

But Hulseley, at 6 feet, 5 inches, 275 pounds, clearly has the physical at-

Fairytales do come true

Once upon a time there was a cowboy from Gooding named Dyrk Godby.

He lived in the country with his cowgirl wife and a horse named Mac. He strummed an old Gibson guitar and sometimes sang cowboy songs at the Frontier Bar in town. Often he painted pretty cowboy pictures late into the evening after his hat had been hung and his boots had been bedded down for the night.

One summer day, Dyrk was asked to sing cowboy songs and display prints of his cowboy art at the Twin Falls Art in the Park show at the City Park. He was singing to the audience when suddenly a fairy godmother appeared.

"I have a little girl who sings," the fairy godmother said to Dyrk.

She bought some artwork, then told him her girl's name was Brooke.

"I think you should meet her," she said.

So the fairy godmother invited Dyrk and his wife, Peggy, up to Sun Valley to meet her daughter.

Dyrk was nervous. He had never met a fairy godmother's daughter before.

But Brooke was very kind, as well as beautiful. She talked about horses. She showed them her house. Then she and Dyrk sang some cowboy songs together.

Dyrk talked to Brooke many times on the phone after that. He and Brooke, and a friend named Glen Nelson Jr., even wrote a duet over the phone.

"We need to see what we can do about recording it," said the fairy godmother. So she called her friend, Johnny Cash.

Johnny said, "Tell them to meet me on tour."

The fairy godmother put Dyrk and her daughter on an airplane. They flew to a big city in Missouri, where they met Johnny Cash and June Carter and Waylon Jennings and other cowboy country western singing types.

"Well, sing the song," said June Carter, when Brooke and Dyrk dropped into the dressing room 10 minutes before a concert was to start.

The young cowboy and the fairy godmother's daughter ended up singing the duet they had written in front of June Carter and 6,000 other people that night.

The next day Dyrk and Brooke followed Johnny and June to Illinois and sang again.

"Entertainment Tonight" caught their act and put them on TV. Johnny made arrangements for the pair to go to Nashville and record three duets. There they finished a demo tape which the fairy godmother planned to present to recording companies.

Next, the fairy godmother decided to send Dyrk, with Brooke, to Seoul, Korea, to tape a pre-Olympic special for television. When Dyrk got to the Olympic stadium, he surveyed the barn-sized stage surrounded by seating for 80,000 people.

He watched Bob Hope do his routine and Loretta Swit practice her lines. Rich Little told some jokes. Julio Iglesias, Sheena Easton, Gloria Estefan and the Miami Sound Machine and Jermaine Jackson rehearsed their numbers.

"I'm scared," thought Dyrk.

But the duet with Godby with all his heart that night.

And that's a happy ending - which is, in fact, the beginning of another story.

GOODING - Dyrk Godby, an artist known for his realistic renditions of life out West, has been doing a lot of singing lately.

"In fact, I've been singing since that day in the park," says Godby, referring to a day last summer when he met Brooke Shields' mother, Teri, in the Twin Falls City Park.

Teri, who is also Brooke's manager, heard Godby sing and suggested he get together with her daughter, who is interested in launching a country western singing career.

The two hit it off. Godby recently returned from Seoul, South Korea, where he and Shields, along with an international, all-star cast, taped a pre-Olympic variety special at Chamsil Stadium. The television pro-

duction will be shown in 20 countries around the world. Godby and Shields also sang during a dinner show hosted by Korean comedian Jonni Yune when they first arrived in Seoul. Godby says he was glad for the experience.

"We hadn't sung the song till that night - ever," says the 30-year-old Gooding native. "We just recorded it. In a studio you do your own thing and then the other person does his thing while the other one's getting coffee. Then they mix it all down and you're done. We never actually sat down together and sang this song aloud till that night at the dinner show."

During the dinner show, Dyrk sang "The Best of My Heart" with Shields, a duet they wrote together along with songwriter Glen Nelson Jr.

In the pre-Olympic show, which features top stars from nine different nations, Godby and Shields sang

No time for innocence

Tug of war's on over Tif's funds

WASHINGTON - Her name is Tiffany, she is 16 and the latest to follow in the rhinestone footsteps of Conny Osmond, the Cassidy boys and that ultimate champion of the bubble gum ballad, Michael Jackson. She's the latest to fulfill the grand American dream of being a pop star before you're old enough to have a driver's license, of bearing the cheers of thousands and having enough money to buy all the Benetton you could ever want.

Tiffany has sold more than 4 million copies of her first album, called, predictably, "Tiffany." Last September she promoted the record, which had languished for a year and half, with a tour of the nation's shopping malls, where she would sing among the soft pretzels and jean shops for 20 minutes accompanied by recorded tapes. By the end of the tour, she had triggered hundreds of record sales with each performance. Rock station programmers had started playing her single "I Think We're Alone Now," her version of the 1967 Tommy James and the Shondells bubble gum classic. By November she'd knocked Michael Jackson out of the No. 1 spot on the pop charts.

But this is not going to be an interview with Tiffany, because Tiffany isn't talking. The reason, it seems, is that - not unlike other 16-year-old girls - she is fighting with her mother, or only this battle is taking place in court.

According to court papers, Tiffany is seeking legal emancipation from her mother, Janie Williams, who in turn pictures her daughter as "brainwashed" by Tiffany's manager and producer, 45-year-old George Tobin. Tobin refuses to allow Tiffany to be interviewed. Williams says her daughter's petition charges her with alcoholism and interference with Tiffany's business affairs. Williams acknowledges a past drinking problem but says she has long since stopped.

Two weeks ago a California judge removed Williams as trustee of her daughter's \$100,000 trust fund - giving no public reason for doing so - and put it under the purview of the Bank of California and Tiffany's accounting firm. The royalties from the album and her three Top 10 singles are expected to total about \$2 million, of which Tobin under her contract

with him gets half. He also gets 20 percent of her concert and merchandising earnings. When she returns to Los Angeles this week at the end of her current 60-city tour, she will stay with her aunt or her grandmother, relatives of her biological father: The aunt, Tiffany's mother says, "we never saw until Tif became a star."

Tobin, reached at one of his two recording studios in North Hollywood, said he's had nothing to do with the custody fight and knows nothing about it. Until three weeks ago, however, according to the Los Angeles Times and an industry source, Tiffany was represented by Tobin's attorneys. Now she is represented by lawyer John Frankenhimer, who could not be reached for comment. And Williams said this week that Tobin "threatened" her with an emancipation petition several times over the past year, whenever she raised questions about her daughter's deal with him.

According to Williams' lawyer, Neal Goldstein, Tiffany's mother is pleased the judge's decision places Tiffany's money with reputable third parties, but unhappy about several aspects of the arrangement and distraught at the rift with her daughter. She may appeal the decision removing her as her daughter's trustee, Goldstein says. Goldstein also wonders how a 16-year-old girl could suddenly decide to hire a lawyer to file a petition under an obscure section of the California civil code, an action taken, he

Hi-fi nuts: Who are these big spenders?

Sally Reynolds, the managing editor of Absolute Sound magazine, one of the more rational and coherent of the high-end rags.

HARTFORD, Conn. — Though Edison's ingenious little wax cylinders were invented more than a century ago, the idea that recorded music actually sounds like the real thing is much more recent.

High fidelity, as the great name to be called, was first pursued in earnest in the 1950s, mostly by basement hobbyists who worked inventively with vacuum tubes and soldering irons. In those genteel Eisenhower days, the hi-fi nut became a stock comic type, a proto-nerd, and variety show wags milked all the available prurient humor from the terms tweeter and woofer.

Times have changed. The hi-fi nut is now an audiophile. His habitat, formerly the electronics parts supply store, is now the audio salon, with its banks of gleaming equipment, its solemn and reverential salespersons, its dimly-lit listening environments. And his appetite for sonic perfection has carried with it an ever-rising tab: From systems in the \$50,000 or even \$100,000 range now define the audiophile's domain.

This is the world known, with bragging straight-forwardness, as "high-end audio." It is a shadowy, clubby world, one that even the most woe-eyed and tireless consumers have very little awareness of. Yet with its \$24,000 (yes) turntables, its strident little magazines and most of all, its clear implication that whatever the average listener listens to music on should be hauled out to the curb and covered with a sheet, it is a world that fascinates—and infuriates—in about equal measure.

It is, in the first place, a world that is almost exclusively male. This fact understandably perplexes

Recording purchases skyrocket

The overall number of records, tapes and compact discs sold in the United States jumped by more than 14 percent in 1987 and the dollar volume of sales increased by nearly 20 percent, according to figures released by the Recording Industry Association of America.

Sales of compact discs soared by 93 percent over 1986; cassette sales were up 19 percent and LP sales continued to decline, slipping another 15 percent.

The upswing in total sales — to 706.8 million units in 1987 from 618.3 million units in 1986 — reverses a trend that saw unit sales decline in 1985 and 1986, even as the dollar volume increased due to the higher price of compact discs, compared to records and tapes.

Tobin's contract with Tiffany (her last name is Derwisch but she doesn't use it professionally) gives him exclusive rights to do so much as 23. He has the last word on what she sings and where, what she wears and whom she speaks with, if anyone, in the press. Even her "official" biography is subject to his approval.

He spent close to \$300,000 on her before she began to make any money, big money, and now occupies himself full-time with her career. It was he who chose MCA over Epic as her recording company, mainly, as he told Rolling Stone recently, "because their offices are one mile from my office, and if I want to get something done, I can drive down there and block their cars on their driveway with my car, which I have done, and not let them out until it's settled."

Tobin's arrangements with Tiffany are not unusual, the producer said, although other industry observers disagree. It is rare for a producer to get as much as 50 percent of a performer's record royalties, and a personal manager is more likely to make 10 percent — not 20 — once earnings reach Tiffany's current level, they said. the song again. It's an uptempo, country western love song," he says.

"Throw Momma From the Train" (Orion Home Video, VHS/Beta, \$89.98, Rated R)

"Throw Momma From the Train" could have been titled, "How to Kill Your Mother and Cure Writer's Block."

A hopelessly bad writer with a helion of a mother meets a college professor who can't get past the first three words of a book he's trying to write and despises his far more successful former wife.

Inspired by Alfred Hitchcock's "Strangers on a Train," the aspiring writer proposes a Hitchcockian double murder, and ensnares the unwitting professor in his plot.

You have to like a movie like that. Yet this film, a box-office sleeper starring Danny DeVito as the mother-hater and Billy Crystal as the writer, is the schlemiel professor, never quite fulfills the potential of its hilarious premise.

DeVito, who showed himself a true comic genius in his TV role as Louis DePalma in "Taxi," is only fleetingly funny in this film.

This also represents DeVito's debut as a feature film director and doesn't rev "Throw Momma" up to the

comic pitch one would hope for.

"Still," Crystal's energy and ingenious timing are enough to keep the film moving. And he gets hilarious help from Anne Ramsey who won a well-deserved Oscar nomination for her work as the Momma with the face of a harpy and a voice that makes nails on a chalkboard sound sweet by comparison.

As DeVito tries to draw Crystal into his matricide scheme, he says, "Look. Just meet her. Maybe she's someone you'd like to kill."

It is no small feat for a film to make matricide acceptable. And often very funny.

"Julia and Julia" Peter Del Monte's "Julia and Julia" is the kind of movie one would rather forget. It is so jumbled, so poorly written, acted and edited that it makes "Attack of the Killer Tomatoes" look

like a work of genius.

It is not a film one should pay money to see on the big screen. However, you won't be too angry if you merely rent a videocassette.

The story, oblique at best, revolves around Julia (Kathleen Turner) whose husband, Paolo (Gabriel Byrne) dies in a car crash on their wedding day. A few years later, still slouching through an uneventful and melancholic life in Trieste, she returns home one night to find Paolo and their son.

However, in this "new" life, Julia also has taken a lover, Daniel (Sting), who is given to brutalizing her.

Throughout the remainder of the movie, Julia roams from this "ghost" life to her "real" life. But it's hard to

separate illusion from reality.

It's also hard having any real feeling for the characters because, with the exception of Sting, they are transparent and not terribly interesting—especially Turner.

As an actress, Kathleen Turner's ability is questionable: She seems to be the end result of a well-olled hype machine. In "Julia Julia" she's about as convincing and compelling as a box of prunes, given to long intakes of air and misplaced angst, where she should be a confused, tragic heroine.

Nor is she particularly sensual—seemingly her strong point, if we are to believe this hype machine. Rather, she is largely neurotic.

Byrne does the best he can with a limp script, but remains tepid at best.

Australian 'Return to Snowy River' is a tiresome sequel

HOLLYWOOD — "Return to Snowy River" is more likely to bury the Western than revive it. The original, "The Man From Snowy River," released in 1982, was equally old-fashioned but also good fun and went on to become one of Australia's biggest box office hits.

This tiresome sequel makes the mistake of taking the most predictable and threadbare of stories and overwhelming it with great hunks of gorgeous travelogue footage coupled with an incessant, bombastic score that all but blasts the film off the screen.

Three years have passed, and now



the ranch hand Jim (Tim Burlinson), "the man from Snowy River," has acquired a sufficiently large herd of horses for him to feel qualified to claim the hand of his beloved, Jessica (Sigrid Thornton), the beautiful, strong-willed daughter of rancher Harrison (Brian Dennehy). Alas, the local banker (Rhya McConnochie), who seems to hold the entire community in thrall, will tender a loan so

desperately needed by Harrison only if Jessica marries the banker's handsome but surly son (Nicholas Eadie).

Director Geoff Burrows and co-writer John Dixon (who also wrote the first film's script) give this familiar frontier predicament an epic-scale treatment that cannot be sustained. About the only thing distinguishing this film from American Westerns is a sharper, nastier sense of class distinctions on the frontier, something the film makers might well have developed further.

Burlinson seems hopelessly bland and Thornton hopelessly locked into her role. The banker and his son are painted as villains of such deep dye it is a wonder they have not been given mustaches to twirl. Dennehy, as splendid an actor-as-is, seems-too young for his decidedly secondary part. What the film desperately needs is Kirk Douglas' larger-than-life presence as a Western icon.

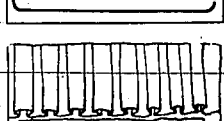
Much that is stirring and beautiful has to do with horses, especially Jim's taming of a magnificent wild stallion. At the same time, there's a sequence in which Jim's horse is shot from under him that is so graphic you have to wonder how safely it was staged. In any event, movies do not get much more impersonal than "Return to Snowy River" (rated PG).

'Biloxi' a nostalgic tale of bonding

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. The ratings are by the Motion Picture Association. Reviews are by Los Angeles Times writers.



BILOXI BLUES (PG-13) In Neil Simon's autobiographical play, he recalls his life and hard times as an Army recruit in 1945 in Biloxi, Miss. — and, as filmed by director Mike Nichols, the movie has marvelous moments and thoroughly engaging performances by Matthew Broderick and company. Nichols seems to have perfect pitch when he's working with Simon. He does not punch the jokes the way other directors do; he picks up the laughs on the way to something else — and he also gives the story a heroic visual style: mixing Norman Rockwell with Orson Welles and George Stevens. It becomes a darkly nostalgic, wisecracking male bonding comedy, with moments of honest pain and eerie romanticism.

STAND AND DELIVER (PG) This is not a perfect film — it really needs more textured writing and more complexity to the characters — but, caught up in Edward James Olmos' electrifying performance as an equally electrifying high school-math teacher, one may not notice. "Stand and Deliver" contains the thrill of watching closed minds unclench, of watching the diabolical intensity of the teacher who makes them blossom.

BEETLEJUICE (PG) Uproarious ghost comedy that is a dazzling display of the pop culture sensibility of director Tim Burton, director of "Pee-wee's Big Adventure." Alec Baldwin and Geena Davis are a ghostly New England couple who seek help from scuzzy "bio-exorcist" Michael Keaton to rid their home of an awful upscale Manhattan couple (Jeffrey Jones, Catherine O'Hara). With Winona Ryder, Sylvia Sidney, Dick Cavett, Robert Gould.

COLORS (R) With its violent drive-by shootings and its daytime shots of grade-schoolers dealing cards, "Colors" may feel like a bloody slice of the 11 o'clock news. But make no mistake, it is a movie — and for all its swiftness and authentic look — a disappointingly superficial one at that. A superb performance by Robert Duval as the older of a pair of cops who try to control the gang chaos — is whittled down to soap-opera size, undercutting everything. Also stars Sean Penn.

THE LAST EMPEROR (PG-13) The producers of this costly lavish epic have given free rein to the cinema's most voluptuous troika of imagists: director Bernardo Bertolucci, production designer Ferdinando Scarfioni and cinematographer Vittorio Storaro. Thus the story of China's last emperor and his struggles in a modernizing world becomes cool and distant, yet an absolutely unparalleled feast for the eye. Winner of nine Oscars, including best picture, best director.

percent of the magazine's roughly 20,000 subscribers were women. She is at work on a long piece for the magazine on this very issue.

There are no precise boundaries to the high-end universe. Enid Lumley, a columnist for Absolute Sound, says that to enjoy a "minimum, reasonable threshold" of sound, a person must be prepared to spend something like \$500. Know that figure, she says in the colorful lingo of the field, one is virtually doomed-to-be-listening-to-"dog meat."

Though the high-end sector is estimated to constitute only around 1 percent of the \$2 billion-a-year worldwide audio component business, it is a proud, dedicated 1 percent.

"A few years ago, we did a questionnaire of our customers, trying to learn more about them," says Sanford Berlin, chief executive officer of Madrigal Audio-Laboratories in Middletown, Conn. Madrigal produces, among other things, a power amplifier that costs \$11,000. "Usually if you get 5 percent response to something like that, you think you've done well. We got almost 50 percent. You see, these are not just buyers. They are enthusiasts."

Not surprisingly, the survey showed that more than half of these enthusiasts earned more than \$100,000 a year (The average age of these over-achievers was 37). Berlin and his colleagues insist, however, that a great number of Madrigal buyers are "blue-collar guys" who evidently just happen to have a penchant for spending chunks of their gross incomes on sound equipment.

"Interestingly, a large percentage of them identified themselves as musicians, even if they did not necessarily mean they played music for a living."

Regular non-audiophiles (i.e. those limping along with a \$2,000 or \$3,000 dog meat system) want to know: What is the deal here? Do high-enders hear better than everybody else, or what? More than a year ago, Stereo Review Magazine — a mass-circulation monthly not considered an audiophile publication — set the high-end community on its exquisitely sensitive ear with an experiment in which a panel

of experienced listeners found they had trouble distinguishing among a half-dozen amplifiers. The punch line was that the amps tested ranged from a \$220 job, to a \$12,000 handmade unit from one of the most exciting audio makers.

"The piece never said all the amplifiers sound the same," says Michael Smolen, the magazine's executive editor. "What this test showed is that there are differences, but so subtle that they don't really make a damn bit of difference."

Smolen, of course, was bombarded with indignant replies from manufacturers and owners, accusing the panel of flawed methodology. "We heard from everyone," he said. "One of the high-end magazines said it was going to do the test again and DO IT RIGHT! But after one excuse after another, they never did. I absolutely stand by what we said."

Even if no errors are ever found in the Stereo Review test, however, audiophiles have a smooth, all-purpose reply to those who question the tiny, incremental differences between their equipment and more reasonably priced stuff. It goes like this: If music

is really important to you, you will hear the differences, and you will consider these differences important enough to warrant spending a little extra dough to get them.

But manufacturers and retailers agree, sometimes reluctantly, that many of their best customers are not particularly musical people, and that their motives for buying this expensive stuff are something less than spiritual in origin. But if high-enders are indeed often ostentatious big spenders — eager — to reduce their friends and neighbors to vibrating mounds of envy, the stereotype (no pun intended) is not foolproof.

In the view of most people in the business, the high-end sector will always remain a tiny sliver of the overall industry. Exclusivity, after all, is part of the attraction.

Sanford Berlin puts it crisply: "Certainly consumerism at this level is unattractive. It's vulgar. But there will always be the person who can appreciate that difference, there can always be somebody with enough money for whom that difference is crucial, or so he thinks. And he'll spend his money to have it."

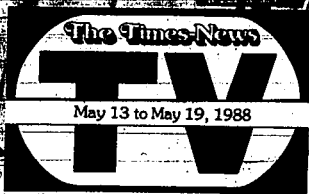

'St. Elsewhere' signs off — Page 2

After 6 years, and many rumors, NBC is cancelling 'St. Elsewhere'

Trying to tell people that "St. Elsewhere" is going off the air for good is a bit like the boy in the fable who cried wolf. Audiences have become so accustomed to "St. Elsewhere" cancellation rumors that warnings of its imminent demise are greeted with "yeah sure" skepticism.

This time, it's for real. "St. Elsewhere" marks its final episode next week, on May 25, bringing to an end six years of great television — and lousy ratings. Last season, it ranked a weak 62nd out of 104 regularly scheduled prime-time programs. In 1986, it was 59th. In 1982, its first year on the air, it was 86th out of 98 series. In the annals of television, "St. Elsewhere" just might go down as the best show hardly anyone watched.

But those who avoided it missed a show of rare quality. Long before the term "dramedy" was coined, "St. Elsewhere's" literate surgeons were fusing drama and black comedy into a program that consistently enlightened, provoked, outraged and entertained. The show's prankster writers gave the red pencil brigade at NBC's standards and practices division fits, not to mention the network's lawyers. Earlier this year, when the Humana Corp. succeeded in getting a restraining order against the producers at MTM Enterprises for suing the fictional Ecumena Corp. as a thinly veiled ruse, "St. Elsewhere" responded on air by having workmen drop the Ecumena sign on the pavement when removing it from the building.

Set in run-down St. Eligius Hospital, the program was dubbed "Hill Street Blues" in a hospital when it first signed on, due to its large ensemble cast and overlapping story lines. Prominent among the cast was the fatherly, cancer-stricken, Dr.

Auschlander (Norman Lloyd); conceited heart specialist Dr. Mark Craig (William Daniels), who was forever feuding with his wife, Ellen (Bonnie Bartlett); hard-luck intern Dr. Jack Morrison (David Morse), who was raped by two inmates; the libidinous Bobby Caldwell (Mark Harmon), who contracted AIDS from a female prostitute; Nurse Shirley Daniels (Ellen Bry), who killed known rapist Dr. Peter White (Terence Knox) by shooting him in the genitals while she seduced him in the supply room; the casual Dr. Wayne Fiscus (Howie Mandel); the rotund, insecure Dr. Elliot Axelrod (Stephen Furst); the passionate duo of Victor Ehrlich (Ed Begley Jr.) and Nurse Lucy Papandrea (Jennifer Savidge), and Dr. Donald Westphal (Ed Flanders), who in a fiery flash of integrity dropped his pants and mooned financially dogmatic hospital administrator Dr. John Gideon (Ronny Cox). It was the first time on American commercial television that bare buttocks were exposed. But there were other, far more noble, "firsts."

Almost five years before the con-

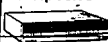

The Angels are back, but don't waste time looking for Charlie

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Four little-known actresses have been selected to star in an updated version of the late 1970s hit series "Charlie's Angels."

The four, selected from more than 20,000 interviewed, were introduced at a news conference last Thursday by producer Aaron Spelling and Fox Broadcasting. They will appear in "Angels '88" on the Fox network.

The show will not be a sequel of its predecessor, a private-eye series that ran on ABC from 1976 to 1981 and catapulted Farrah Fawcett to stardom. There won't be any Charlie, there will be four Angels instead of three, and one is black.

"This is the 1980s and we really wanted a black angel and we set out to find one. We found so many talented actresses it was a tough choice," said Spelling, creator of the original "Charlie's Angels."

"These angels will not report to any man," said Spelling. "The premise is that they're actresses whose show went up against 'The Cosby Show' and was canceled. They stumble upon a case and solve it."

"It's a contemporary show. We'll also see their private lives. They'll date, we'll get into sex, safe sex, but it's not going to be sexy. It's action-adventure with a lot of comedy."

The four actresses were introduced as Claire Yarlett, a blonde raised in an English convent; Karen Kopins, a brunette and native of New York who is appearing on "Dallas"; Sandra Canning, the first black Angel, born in the Virgin Islands, and Tea (pronounced TAY-a) Leoni, who was discovered in Boston and says her previous "occupation" was wind-surfing.

Spelling said he had a commitment from Fox for a two-hour movie and 13

episodes. "It is uncertain when the show will go on the air because of the two-month-old strike by the Writers Guild of America. Spelling said only the movie pilot has been written."

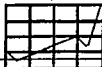
