Economic expansion speeds up

WASHINGTON - The U.S. economy grew at a surprisingly rapid annual rate of 3.9 percent from January through March, much better than previously believed, because of the biggest decline in the trade deficit in eight years, the government reported Thursday.

The Commerce Department said the gross national product, the broadest measure of economic health, was propelled during the first three months of the year by an export surge, a rebound in car sales and a boom in business capital investment.

The report represented a sharp upward revision from an initial estimate made a month ago that the GNP grew at a more modest 2.9 percent rate in the first quarter.

It provided fresh evidence that the economy has escaped unscathed from last fall's stock market crash, and it sent economists scurrying to revise up their growth estimates for the full year.

"We would have to say that not only was the stock market crash ignored, but the economy thumbed its nose at it," said Robert Dederick, chief economist of Northern Trust Co. of Chicago.

Allen Sinai, chief economist of the Boston Co., said he had revised his forecast to show GNP growth of 3.5 percent for all of 1988. That would be the fastest rate of growth since 1984.

The Reagan years are ending with a bang. The first quarter GNP report shows an economy that is amazingly strong and resilient for such an aging expansion, Sinai said.

All the good economic news is especially pleasing to Republicans in an election year when they hope George Bush will win the White House running on a platform emphasizing the peacetime record of 66 months of expansion since the last recession in 1981-82.

The economic growth in the first quarter was a far cry from the recession that some analysts had predicted immediately following it.

Judge refuses bail to Jagers

TWIN FALLS - Magistrate Judge R. Michael Redman denied bail Thursday to Jesse Ray Jagers, who sat unruffled and politely answered questions during his initial court appearance.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter argued that Jagers should not be given the opportunity to post bond, citing Jagers' juvenile criminal record and the gravity of the crimes charged.

"Mr. Jagers has an unstable residential and employment history," Baxter said. "He does have family in this area, but the nature and extent of those relationships are unknown."

Prosecutors have charged Jagers, 18, with first-degree murder in connection with the May 13 slaying of Virginia Westergren. Baxter argued that the maximum penalty for conviction, the death penalty, created the likelihood that Jagers would attempt to flee.

Redman appointed Twin Falls County

Public Defender Michael Wood to represent Jagers. Wood asked the court to post bail, saying that Jagers is a longtime area resident.

Redman rejected the request, exercising the authority given judges to deny bail for crimes which carry a possible death sentence.

"In the past we've had a split with the death penalty cases," Baxter said afterwards, referring to judges setting bail. "Sometimes they do and sometimes they

Soviets cancel summit session

HELSINKI, Finland - The Soviet Union canceled one of President Reagan's summit sessions next week with General Secretary Mikhail S. Gorbachev and objected to the makeup of a religious delegation scheduled to see Reagan, White House officials said Thursday.

Presidential spokesmen sought to minimize the last-minute glitches, which developed as Reagan and his wife Nancy attempted to overcome jet lag and rest up for the start of the summit in Moscow Sunday.

In Washington, meanwhile, the Senate neared pre-summit approval of the historic treaty eliminating intermediate-range nuclear missiles that Reagan and Gorbachev signed at their Washington summit in December. The Senate voted overwhelmingly to restrict a future president's power to change the U.S. interpretation of the treaty, settling the last major issue before floor action on the document.

Roman Popadiuk, a White House spokesman, said the decision to scrub one of Reagan's five face-to-face meetings with Gorbachev was "mutual." However, chief spokesman Martin Fitzwater had said earlier that U.S. officials sought an explanation.

Fitzwater, talking to reporters in this Finnish capital Thursday, said: "I regard it as routine." A second Reagan-Gorbachev meeting scheduled for next Monday was canceled by the Soviets for what the Kremlin cited as "some internal function."

Fitzwater said the Soviets had "a scheduling problem" with one of the Reagan-Gorbachev sessions, in particular one set for Monday afternoon.

"They needed the time for some internal function," he said, and his office later issued a statement saying the meeting had been canceled by "mutual decision."

There was no indication

\$1.1 trillion budget approved in House

WASHINGTON - The House passed a \$1.1 trillion federal budget for the 1989 fiscal year Thursday after negotiators from the House and Senate solved a month-long dispute over domestic spending.

The measure was approved by a 201-181 vote and sent to the Senate, where it was expected to be accepted after that chamber returns from its Memorial Day recess next month.

Twenty-six Republicans joined 175 Democrats in voting for the measure, which is moving toward its earliest congressional approval in years. The legislators, however, already have upheld their annual tradition of missing the April 15 deadline set in the law for completing the budget.

The spending plan would satisfy the limits placed on defense, domestic and international affairs spending that were set in last fall's budget summit agreement between President Reagan and congressional leaders.

It also would avoid automatic spending cuts under the Gramm-

Rudman balanced budget law later in the year by producing a deficit just under the law's \$146 billion deficit ceiling.

"It has been designed bipartisanly in good faith to avoid" the automatic cuts, said House Budget Committee Chairman William H. Gray III, D-Pa.

However, some lawmakers warned that Gramm-Rudman spending cuts could still be forced later this year—if the economy worsens.

"We should be scaling back spending below the summit levels," said Rep. Willis D. Gradison Jr., R-Ohio.

Under the law, the budget's deficit will be recalculated in August, and a weakening economy usually increases federal spending and reduces the taxes it collects.

The last dispute that negotiators from the two chambers resolved was over new spending in domestic entitlement programs. In such programs, formulas in the law automatically decide how much money will be spent.

The House wanted to increase

Sears considers move to Magic Valley Mall

TWIN FALLS - Sears, Roebuck & Co., the last bastion of the giant merchandisers downtown, is in the negotiating stages of moving out to the Magic Valley Mall.

"Sears is looking at it very seriously," acknowledged Bill McGuire, the store's sales manager.

"Nothing is definite," he added.

The Sears home office in Chicago is working on a package deal with Eric Development Corp. that involves several other Sears stores in other locations as well.

Eric Development of Salt Lake City owns and operates the Magic Valley Mall, among other malls around the Northwest.

An addition would have to be added to the mall's south side because all the other large spaces are occupied.

McGuire did not know when or if a final agreement might be reached between Sears and Eric. Eric President Rex Frazier said it is too early to comment.

"But if the move doesn't happen this time, eventually it will," McGuire said.

"The isolated downtown store is a thing of the past," he said.

Although his business has not slacked off

since the mall opened, McGuire said it would do even better on their own.

Downtown has become an area for specialty shops and business listings.

She Jones, director of the Downtown Business Improvement District, agreed and she sees that as a plus.

"Jones does not believe the loss of Sears would hurt downtown business. It is not directly in the sidewalk's downtown area, does not draw major traffic to the other stores," she said.

"However, it is a close-by department store. Its departure would leave a few merchants."

Immunity may obstruct Iran-Contra trial

WASHINGTON - The judge in the Iran-Contra case questioned Thursday whether congressional immunity given Oliver L. North and two co-defendants would make it a "practical impossibility" to try them on conspiracy charges.

The limited immunity granted North, a fired National Security Council aide and retired Marine lieutenant colonel; former national security adviser John M. Poindexter and arms dealer Albert Hakim might interfere with their getting a fair trial on the most serious charges in the case, U.S. District

Judge Gerhard A. Gesell said at a hearing. The judge also criticized the way the House and Senate Iran-Contra committees questioned witnesses last year, suggesting the defendants had not been treated decently by congressmen who probed questions with highly political remarks.

Gesell, however, made no ruling on the immunity issue, saying he hoped to make a decision by the end of June on defense motions to dismiss the indictment.

If any of the three defendants testifies, his co-defendants are entitled to use their immunized congressional testimony during cross-examination, the judge said.

In addition, retired Air Force Maj. Gen. Richard V. Secord, who testified on Capitol Hill without immunity, has indicated he wants to use the congressional testimony of North and Poindexter to help his defense in the case, Gesell said.

"As I see it, it is a practical impossibility to try the conspiracy counts in the context of rules on immunity, he said. "If you try them together you violate the immunities."

By the same token, Gesell added, trying the defendants separately "makes a conspiracy trial a farce. None gets the benefit of the other's testimony."

 lowing the Oct. 19 collapse in stock prices. However, economists now have begun to worry that inflationary pressures have begun rising because the economy is growing so rapidly.
 Those fears are present despite the fact that a GNP price index which measures changing market baskets of goods rose at an annual rate of just 1.7 percent in the first quarter, the smallest increase since late 1984.
 Analysts said this performance masked growing price pressures stemming from tight labor markets and the rising number of industries that are pushing against capacity constraints. Unemployment fell to a 14-year low of 6.4 percent in April.
 In a second report Thursday, the government said after-tax corporate profits rose just 0.5 percent in the first quarter of the year following a much larger 2.6 percent rise in the fourth quarter.

Bruce Steinberg, senior economist with Merrill Lynch in New York, said the weak profit rise in the first quarter would add to inflation pressures as companies seek to boost revenues by raising prices in coming months.
 "The inflation environment is deteriorating. The economy is growing too rapidly for stable prices," Steinberg said.
 Analysts predicted that the Federal Reserve, whose job it is to worry about inflation, will push interest rates higher to dampen demand. The central bank also has tightened credit conditions twice in the past two months.
 Frank Cappiello, a Wall Street investment adviser, said the fast GNP growth in the first quarter was adding to inflationary pressures and setting the stage for a recession next year.
 "What (the GNP increase) reflects is light from a dying star," Cappiello said during an appearance in Omaha. "You're seeing

the best growth in the economy. I think from here on in it will be dragged down by higher (interest) rates."
 But Beryl Sprinkel, the president's chief economic adviser, disputed that contention, saying there was no evidence of either recession or inflation threats in the GNP figures.
 "We had an upward revision in real growth, a downward revision in inflation and greater strength on the exports side," Sprinkel said in an interview. "These are all objectives of this administration."
 The administration's current forecast calls for GNP growth of 2.9 percent this year. With the first start, the economy could grow as slowly as 1.9 percent for the rest of the year and still reach that estimate.
 About 80 percent of the improvement in the GNP report from the previous estimate came from a bigger shrinkage in the trade deficit.

 that spending by \$100 million next year and \$1.3 billion over three years, while the Senate sought a \$500 million increase for 1989 and \$2 billion more over three years.
 Under the compromise, such spending will grow by \$376 million next year and by \$2.2 billion over the three years, with most of it being used for nutrition programs for the poor.
 The measure contains \$299.5 billion in new defense spending,

\$1.8 billion for international affairs and \$148 billion for domestic programs for the next fiscal year, which begins Oct. 1.
 The amount for the Pentagon is an \$8.1 billion increase over military spending this year, but below the amount that would have been needed to keep up with inflation.
 Education, health, social services and job training programs would all be given enough money to keep up with inflation. And selected other programs - including

those for AIDS research and treatment, anti-drug initiatives, space and air traffic control - would get enough new money to surpass the costs of inflation.
 The election-year measure would allow an additional \$1.4 billion in anti-drug spending to be provided later this year if Congress and the White House decide that an emergency exists. The extra money would have to be covered by spending reductions in other areas or by new revenues.

 Court officials tentatively scheduled Jaggers' preliminary hearing for June 9. Wood, however, is seeking a continuance for the hearing, which is supposed to be held within 14 days of the first appearance.
 Jaggers is being held in the

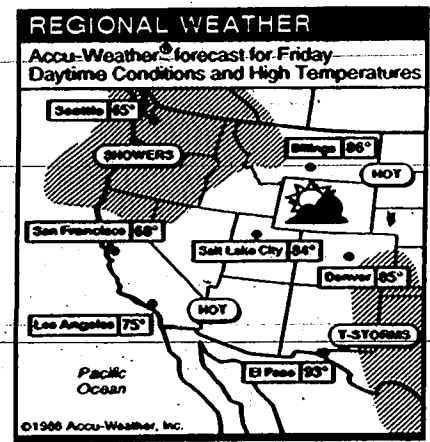
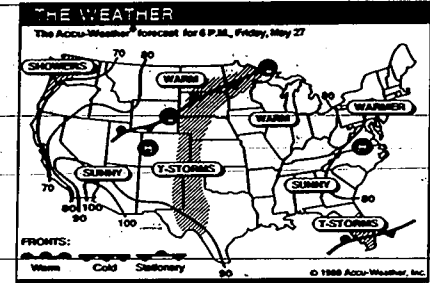
That matter will probably be discussed at a scheduling conference attended by the judge and both parties. Magistrate Judge Melvin Edwards has been assigned to the case.
 Jaggers, tanned and clean-shaven, was flanked at the afternoon hearing by Wood and a court security guard. Indicating the seriousness attached to the case by local officials, Twin Falls Sheriff Jim Munn guarded one door and a second security guard manned the other.
 Two deputies and a city detective sat in the relatively sparse gallery.
 Jaggers, arrested Monday in Las Vegas, remained calm throughout the 20-minute proceeding. His eyes looked straight ahead or at documents placed before him.
 Jaggers is being held in the

Twin Falls County Jail. Joel Horton, senior trial attorney in the prosecutor's office, sat with Baxter at the hearing. Baxter said Horton will be lead counsel on the Jaggers case.
 Easter handled three murder cases while a deputy prosecutor in Washington's King County, where Seattle is located. She said this will be Horton's first murder trial.
 Prosecutors have charged Jaggers with second-degree burglary and two counts of grand theft, in addition to murder. Police believe Westergren's killer stole the family's Buick and video-cassette recorder.
 Westergren, 79, was stabbed to death in her Buchanan Street home while her husband was visiting relatives in Portland. Jaggers previously did yard work for the Westergren family.

 whether the cancellation was related in any way to a Communist Party conference, the first of its kind since 1941, that is scheduled to open in Moscow after the summit.
 Another problem developed when word reached the presidential party that the Soviets had questioned the participation of one of the religious groups sched-

uled to meet with Reagan at the Danilov monastery on Monday.
 "The meeting itself is still on as far as I know," Fitzwater said. He said he did not know which religious group the Soviets objected to.
 Reagan also plans to meet separately with a group of Jewish "refuseniks" who had been unable to obtain exit permits for Israel. Fitzwater said he was unable to

verify a complaint that two persons had been intercepted by Soviet authorities on their way to Moscow from Leningrad.
 A White House official, speaking on condition he not be identified by name, said the administration had been assured that "everyone that's been invited will attend" the Monday afternoon session.

 The judge said he did not want to conduct four separate trials under a procedure sought by the defense. "Four individual trials is ridiculous," he said.
 Under the law, independent counsel, Lawrence E. Walsh is prohibited from using the immunized testimony of any of the three defendants as evidence against them.
 "I've searched hard to find a case - and I haven't found one - where it's fair to say that three of four defendants have been broadly immunized by governmental action," the judge said.
 Herbert J. Stern, a former federal judge representing Walsh, said the immunity grants won't prevent a fair trial.
 If Stern wants to question North about his congressional testimony, "all General Secord has to do is ask Colonel North for the same facts, and out it comes," Stern said.
 The four defendants are charged with conspiring to corrupt the sale of U.S. arms to Iran by diverting profits to the Contra rebels in Nicaragua during a time when Congress banned U.S. military aid to them.

The four are also charged with theft of government property and wire fraud in connection with the alleged diversion.
 In addition, North and Poindexter are charged with making false statements and obstructing investigations by

Congress and Attorney General Edwin Meese III into covert assistance given the Contras.
 Defense lawyer Barry Simon argued that most of the witnesses Walsh intends to call at trial were influenced by the immunized statements.

Senate restricts INF treaty interpretation

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate, nearing pre-summit approval of the historic treaty eliminating medium-range nuclear missiles, voted overwhelmingly Thursday to restrict a future president's power to change the U.S. interpretation of the treaty.

The 72-7 decision settled the last major issue before floor action on the Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces (INF) treaty.

Senate leaders said the final ratification could occur later Thursday evening.

"I hope that the Senate can complete work on this treaty yet this evening," said Senate Majority Leader Robert Byrd, D-W.Va.

Senate Republican Leader Robert Dole, R-Kan., agreed. "We can move on this, perhaps as early as this evening."

for the pact, according to Byrd and other senators.

Approval would mean the treaty could be pushed to Moscow before Reagan and Gorbachev meet Sunday at the summit. White House chief of staff Howard Baker was standing by to carry the ratification papers to Reagan.

The pact will be the first ratified by the Senate since the 1972 Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty. Also, it will be the first treaty to actually require the destruction of weapons, rather than simply slowing the build-up, and its far-reaching verification provisions include the first on-site inspections allowed by either superpower.

The Senate voted 96-0 approval Thursday of an amendment which incorporates into the treaty agreements reached two weeks ago by Secretary of State George Shultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze, dealing with weapons using "futuristic" technology and clarifying on-site verification rules.

The Senate has been working on the pact since last week, and the last major hurdle was cleared Wednesday when Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., the chief critic, dropped his opposition.

Byrd had scheduled a vote Thursday to halt the delaying tactics used by Helms and other GOP conservatives, but that vote was set aside when offstage negotiations reached the agreement permitting the final vote.

U.S. can monitor testing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Seismic technology is sensitive enough to confidently monitor all but the smallest Soviet underground nuclear tests, a congressional scientist said Thursday.

The conclusions could help to reach a ban on all underground testing, one of the unresolved issues between the two superpowers, said Rep. Dante Fascell, D-Fla., chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

Fascell called the study "an important contribution" to the effort to develop a test ban.

The study, carried out by the Office of Technology Assessment, an arm of Congress, was released as President Reagan rested in Helsinki, Finland, while en route to the Soviet Union.

Reagan will travel to Moscow this weekend for his fourth summit with Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev, and one of the issues on the agenda is underground nuclear testing.

The two leaders are expected to sign a pair of protocols designed to improve monitoring procedures.

Open-air tests are banned by a 1963 treaty, which set separate treaties signed in 1974 and 1976, limit underground tests to 150 kilotons. Both sides claim to adhere to the 1970s accords, although neither treaty has been formally ratified by the U.S. Senate.

U.S. consults Latin allies about Panama

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. diplomats held high-level consultations with Latin American democracies Thursday in search of new ways for encouraging military leader Manuel Antonio Noriega to leave Panama, a State Department official said.

Hours after the "collapse" Wednesday of the U.S. negotiating effort, Assistant Secretary of State Elliott Abrams said, ambassadors in Latin American capitals were ordered to meet with host-country presidents and foreign ministers on Thursday to discuss the issue.

The envoys were asked to tell these governments "what happened in detail and to ask for their advice in helping us move forward," Abrams told reporters after testifying before a closed-door hearing of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

Secretary of State George P. Shultz announced Wednesday the failure of the negotiation, which was aimed at inducing Noriega to resign as commander of the Panamanian Defense Forces and go into exile. As part of the proposed deal, U.S. drug-smuggling indictments against Noriega would have been dropped.

"Noriega, Panama's de facto ruler, rejected the proposal and Shultz said no further negotiations were planned.

"With Abrams at his side, Sen. Christopher Dodd, D-Conn., expressed regret over the setback, but many others in Congress seemed pleased at the outcome.

"Sen. John Kerry, D-Mass., said, "A lot of people are not upset that it fell apart."

Kerry said the negotiations hurt U.S. foreign policy "and also sent a terrible message with respect to our ability to do something about the narcotics traffic."

Panamanian Ambassador Juan Sosa, who is allied with forces opposed to Noriega, said "the United States should hold back" and let other initiatives go forward.

Sosa said the Reagan administration negotiated in good faith but should not have dealt with a terrorist. "The problem in Noriega is not an honorable person," he said.

Later, Sosa conferred with State Department officials on the possibility of a Central American diplomatic effort to resolve the crisis.

Ethics committee gets formal request to investigate Wright

WASHINGTON (AP) — Georgia Rep. Newt Gingrich filed a formal complaint with the House ethics committee today asking for an investigation to determine if House Speaker Jim Wright violated House ethics rules.

Gingrich's complaint, which was accompanied by a supporting letter signed by 71 House Republicans, asked for an investigation in four areas, including published reports that Wright received unusually high royalties of 55 percent from his book, "Reflections of a Public Man."

Common Cause, which calls itself a citizens lobby, urged the ethics committee last week to launch an investigation of Wright. While the panel was not required legally to respond to that request, Gingrich's complaint will require a formal vote on whether to launch an investigation.

Wright's book was published by a

printing company that received nearly \$300,000 in business from his campaign committee in 1985-86, the complaint said in asking for an investigation into whether Wright converted campaign funds from the sale of his book to his personal gain.

The complaint also cited reports of Wright's 1979 intervention with stock.



Interdependence requires free trade

Six times a year Prof. Warren Bennis and the University of Southern California School of Business Administration bring together about 30 of the area's chief executive officers for talking with heavyweight pundits like Henry Kissinger, Peter Drucker and Robert Reich.

"One meeting that I attended turned out to be quite interesting, particularly after dinner. We had spent most of the afternoon listening to two Harvard-type management consultants talk about international competitiveness and how we were losing in the Japanese."

"One of the CEOs, a venture capitalist, let go a real blast at their views. His criticism went something like this: 'You two represent all that is decadent in the United States — old East Coast money, America's biggest and least efficient companies and big government social solutions, Dukakis and the Democrats. Out here we're reaping billions of dollars into fast-growing small firms. The innovations that we'll harvest in the next 20 years if the government just leaves us alone, will make the recent Japanese successes pale in comparison.'"

"A lively exchange ensued, juxtaposing two dramatically differing viewpoints of how best to beat the Japanese — industrial policy vs. laissez faire-stimulated creativity. But both sides were missing the key point. It is not us against them anymore. It is not a competitive game. Like it or not, we are now in the same boat with the Japanese. And if the right-side oarsmen pull harder than the left, then the boat goes nowhere. Some people try to deny this perspective. When I was in Paris during the time of the Soviet nuclear-plant accident at Chernobyl, the French newscasts showed the nuclear contamination stopping at the French border. You had to wash your lettuce, but Russian radiation evidently did not have a passport. Then there is the acid rain in Canada or Prince Charles' banishment of hair spray from Buckingham Palace.

"But if you won't take the Sierra Club's word for it, how about Merrill Lynch? The stock-market crash of 1987 did not just happen on Wall Street. Tokyo, London, Hong Kong, New York — who followed whom over the board?"

"And what about Toshiba? It sells the Soviets computerized milling machines. The obvious response is to punish the Japanese manufacturer with a congressionally mandated boy-

cott of all Toshiba products. But bashing Toshiba hurts the company's U.S. partners and customers as well. IBM complains. Even the Pentagon prefers Toshiba laptop computers.

"The implications of this global-village view are clear. The key to world peace and prosperity is a thriving and unrestricted international trade. It may come as a surprise to most, but the Japanese have been continually reducing their trade barriers during the 1980s, even faster than their 1979 GATT agreements. President Jose Sarney is cracking the door open to Brazil. The Chinese are slowly relaxing their restrictions — in addition to la dolce in Peking, you can buy chicken a la tokon. And Mikhail Gorbachev's reforms in the Soviet Union — could we have imagined Big Macs in Moscow even five years ago?"

"All this international commerce creates interdependence while promoting capitalism and freedom. The pending free-trade agreement with Canada is a crucial breakthrough. We need comparable agreements with Japan and others. Indeed, I wonder what Latin American politics would look like today if we hadn't boycotted Cuban sugar so many years ago? Influence through trade makes more sense than Contra aid does.

"Restrictions on free trade are a vile virus indeed. I cannot think of a better use of America's military might than keeping the Persian Gulf open to commerce. And I cannot think of a worse example of congressional politicking than the omnibus trade bill that President Reagan vetoed Tuesday, only to have the House immediately vote to override. Three years of Capitol Hill kibitzing has created more than 1,000 pages of labyrinthine trade restrictions. The only way to understand the machinations of Congress on this one is to view the world through a xenophobia perhaps appropriate in times past.

"Wake up, America. Smell the coffee. Contemplate the reality that your fresh brew comes from Colombia, and that many of the other things that you take for granted come from some other foreign country as well.

USSR no longer an expanding empire

Hopes for a summit-time strategic-arms-reduction agreement have been dashed — in part by the rise of an unlikely coalition of Senate Democrats and Republicans who have grown wary of a Republican president in too much of a hurry to sign agreements with the Soviets. Will wonders never cease?

"I do not demean the president's considerable accomplishment in the arms-control arena to suggest that it is far better for the Senate to comb the signed treaty on intermediate-range nuclear forces for bugs than to watch passively as the administration rushes headlong into another treaty even more ambitious than the present one. Rather than doing the president a bad turn, the protracted ratification process only strengthens his bargaining position in the current round of negotiations.

"Because it is now unlikely that any major new agreement will emerge at the summit meeting, except perhaps for an agreement to meet again soon, what takes place outside the conference room is as important as what takes place inside. In Moscow, President Reagan must deliver his message directly to the people, addressing

the younger generation in particular. Breaking down the walls that divide East and West — the Berlin Wall, for one — must be the centerpiece of that message.

"After all, it is not the arms race that causes tension, but tensions that cause the arms race. It follows that the only way to end the arms race is to erase its causes. This, however, is easier said than done. For the tensions between the two great powers are the result of not transient misunderstandings or misperceptions, but of more profound and enduring differences.

"Americans are well enough aware of the Soviet threat to the United States. But let's face it: The United States is just as much a threat to the Soviet Union — not because of what we do but because of what we are. We are free, and freedom undermines the legitimacy of dictatorial institutions everywhere.

"As Abraham Lincoln discovered more than a century ago, one nation cannot forever remain half-free and

half-slave. So it is with the larger community of nations.

"That is why Americans look sympathetically on Mikhail Gorbachev's efforts at "glasnost" and "perestroika" — not only so that the peoples of the Soviet Union and of Eastern Europe may enjoy a measure of liberalization but so that the differences that so deeply divide us may thereby be diminished.

"Whatever Gorbachev's intentions, however, he has unleashed forces that will have consequences beyond his control. In the Soviet Union and even more so in Eastern Europe. What is so ironic is that while Washington has been preoccupied with containing an expanding empire, nary a thought has been given about what to do with an imploding one.

"Since the end of World War II the principal goal of American foreign policy has been the containment of communist expansion. Turning Marx on his head, the fathers of containment thought that if the Western world could hold the line long enough, the communist system eventually would collapse of its own internal contradictions. With virtually the entire com-

munist world now in upheaval, the much-maligned strategy of containment is looking better every day.

"In all their wisdom, however, the fathers of containment neglected to pass down any guidance at all about how to deal with the precipitous decline of communism. For as much as we desire to see the Soviet empire come unraveled, there exists the very real problem that an empire in disintegration may be even more destructive of international peace than a stable one.

"The collapse of that empire will be the world's greatest blessing and its greatest challenge. It may be the next U.S. administration that is called on to meet this challenge. To focus, at this historic moment, not on communism's decline but on America's decline, as so many expert analysts would have us do, is to miss out on the biggest story of the day. When Hungary again rises in revolt, or Poland, or Czechoslovakia, will we be prepared?"

Noriega regime intimidates country with beatings, threats

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) — The regime of Gen. Manuel Noriega has used detentions, beatings, threats and sexual harassment to intimidate Panamanians and quiet a quagmire of protest.

Noriega doesn't have to resort to slayings or to arranging for people to "disappear," as has happened in some Latin American dictatorships.

Panamanians "themselves" are the first to admit they are unaccustomed to violent abuse and are easily cowed by it.

"I took part in demonstrations until they detained me," said a 27-year-old lawyer, who asked not to be named for fear of reprisals. She was released af-

ter a half hour, but not before being insulted, threatened and fondled by policemen.

"We are not Nicaragua or El Salvador or Afghanistan. We don't have violence in our blood," said Ivan Romero, secretary-general of the opposition Christian Democratic Party.

Romero was detained, interrogated and beaten May 5 when he returned from the United States, where he had gone to take part in a conference. He was expelled to Miami the next day and allowed to return on Monday.

"There is a triumph of terror," he told The Associated Press in an interview. "This regime is waging psychological war, and it's winning."

The Defense Forces, which includes

police and armed forces and is under Noriega's command, was asked for comment but did not immediately respond.

Only three people have been killed in political violence since the U.S.-backed opposition campaign to oust Noriega began 11 months ago. There are no "disappeared," the enigmatic status that military regimes in South and Central America conferred on tens of thousands of opponents in past decades.

But there is a secret police, G-2, whose members have demonstrated ruthlessness. The corps is informed by street spies called "loads" whose pervasive infiltration of everyday life is taken for granted.

"We're not fighters, but a folkloric people; beach, sun and sea," said a young professional jailed and mistreated for a week last month. "I myself am that way. It's in our genes."

The man said he was suspected of

opposition activity and taken from his home after midnight by several agents to G-2 headquarters. He was stripped and his wrists handcuffed behind his back.

"Asthmatic and frail, he was forced

to stand under a cold shower for half an hour, punched in the face and abdomen and beaten on the legs with a rubber hose, he reported. Then he was beaten on the toes with a blackjack, a pain he describes as "terrible."

Soviets free up private co-ops

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet parliament approved legislation Thursday making it easier for private cooperatives to compete with state-run businesses and giving local authorities power to promote certain goods and services with tax breaks.

The Supreme Soviet, the country's nominal parliament, made some rare amendments to the law and held back the tax structure for further changes. The moves came in a three-day session that ended Thursday after much debate.

The Supreme Soviet normally only approves laws put forward by the ruling Communist Party. Debate over the cooperative law, which delayed the vote for a day, underscored a greater willingness and ability to speak out under Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev's policy of greater openness.

Officials said that in three months of public debate about the law before it reached the Supreme Soviet, 42 of its 50 articles had been amended.

The amended law, which passed unanimously Thursday as is traditional, goes into effect July 1.

"Local Soviets (governing councils) and other state bodies can set a preferential tax system for cooperatives and their members," said Alexei Pomarev, the head of a Supreme Soviet commission that reported on the cooperative law to the parliament Thursday.

The law, as initially presented, had given only national officials the right to give tax breaks.

The adopted law also guarantees that cooperatives cannot be run out of business by state-run enterprises. It allows them to conduct business with foreign companies and receive hard currency as payment; to own buildings and other property; and to appeal decisions by authorities not to license a cooperative.

Cooperatives are owned by the people who work in them and represent a small sector of the Soviet economy, which is dominated by state-run ventures.

The arrangement is permissible under Marxist theory, which teaches that workers are exploited if they work for anyone other than the state or themselves.

A law permitting formation of cooperatives has been adopted under Gorbachev. Soviet Premier Nikolai I. Ryzhkov said Tuesday that 14,000 cooperatives were formed in the first 18 months of the law and another 6,000 in the past three months.

Gorbachev has said he is depending on their development to provide consumer goods and services that the inefficient state-run economy cannot provide.

Restaurants are one of the most popular forms of cooperatives that have opened. Others have formed to make clothing, pump gas, make home repairs and provide other services.

The average industrial worker in the Soviet Union makes about \$320 a month.

Poll: Dukakis reaps benefits from negative views on Bush

WASHINGTON — Negative views of Vice President Bush and declining confidence in the future of the economy and the country have combined to help give Massachusetts Gov. Michael S. Dukakis an early, double-digit lead in a presidential trial heat for November.

The latest Washington Post-ABC News poll of 1172 randomly selected registered voters put Dukakis, the likely Democratic nominee, ahead of

Bush, who has clinched the Republican nomination, by a 53-40 percent margin. However, nearly half of each candidate's support is soft and could easily shift in coming months.

Last March, when the two men first emerged as probable general-election rivals, Dukakis led by 5 points. Tom Kiley, a senior political strategist for Dukakis, commented that the latest poll and similar findings by other news organizations "come out at a time when Dukakis appears to be a very impressive winner" in a series of

primaries against his lone remaining challenger, Jesse L. Jackson. "None of us suffers from the illusion we'll continue to see these margins. We expect a very tough race. But it's hard not to be encouraged."

The survey made it plain that at this point, Dukakis is benefiting more from voters' aversion to Bush and declining confidence in Reagan and his policies than from any deep-seated personal appeal.

Almost three of every five Dukakis supporters in the poll — 57 percent —

said they planned to vote for him largely because they don't want Bush to win, and not because they liked Dukakis. About two in five Bush partisans said they were voting against Dukakis.

It is unusual for such a high percentage of the vote to be driven by opposition to an opponent, and one Dukakis strategist said it means, "They (the Bush forces) are losing the election at this point; we're not winning it."

A Bush aide said the scarcity of

strong positive support for Dukakis indicated "they (the voters) really know nothing about him." But with a 67-10 percent favorable rating (compared to Bush's 60-37 score), Dukakis has what one campaign strategist called "a clean slate on which to write in the coming months."

Almost nine out of ten who strongly approve of Reagan as president support Bush; almost nine out of ten who strongly disapprove of Reagan back Dukakis.

Unfortunately, for Bush, disapproval of Reagan is at 46 percent in the latest poll, 9 points higher than it was at this point in 1984. The survey found 20 percent of the voters saying that Reagan's endorsement of Bush made it less likely they would support Bush, while only 11 percent said it would make them more inclined to back him.

To the extent that Bush is basing his campaign on extending the Reagan era, several other questions indicated it is a shaky foundation.

Bush gets tough with drug stance

Vice President George Bush on Friday proposed an international strike force to hit "quick and hard and often" at foreign drug operations. Democrat Michael Dukakis campaigned in California while a \$100 million state tax increase bill neared his governor's desk back in Massachusetts.

Bush, the all-but-sure Republican presidential nominee, also called for denying federal contracts to U.S. companies lacking "drug-free programs," a proposal an aide said could involve mandatory drug testing.

Democratic Dukakis and Jesse Jackson were concentrating on California, the biggest delegate-prize in the June 7 presidential primary finale, while Bush campaigned in New Jersey on his way to his Maine seacoast retreat.

For Dukakis, who has campaigned as a tax-cutting governor, the prospect of being saddled with an election-year tax increase loomed as he sought votes 3,000 miles away.

His state legislature gave approval to increases in income and cigarette taxes totaling more than \$100 million as a remedy for newly found budget deficits. A final vote was needed, but the legislation cleared its major hurdle over Republican objections.

Dukakis' top Statehouse aide Hale Champion said, "The governor's position has been, 'I'll take a look at it; I'm not supporting it.'"

With Dukakis leading Bush in recent polls, the vice president's pollster Robert Teeter said the Bush campaign is concerned but not panicking.

Noriega information demanded

PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP) — Democratic presidential front-runner Michael Dukakis pressed his demand Thursday for "a full explanation" of CIA ties with Panama's Manuel Noriega and ridiculed Vice President George Bush's comments on the subject.

Dukakis, campaigning in advance of California's June 7 primary, also gave the back of his hand to several of the vice president's recent drug proposals.

"The question is, 'Why haven't these been done the past seven years?' Isn't the vice president in charge of this effort?" he asked.

The Massachusetts governor also said it was "proper and appropriate" that House Speaker Jim Wright pledged his cooperation with any ethics committee probe into allegations of financial irregularities.

Beyond that, Dukakis offered no defense of the Democratic speaker, but he said Bush should not try to exploit any difficulties Wright might face.

"This administration has very serious problems," he said. "We've got a Justice Department that's a laughing stock and we've got this Noriega mess on our hands."

At a news conference, Dukakis also said, "I'm going to continue to insist on a full explanation from the administration about what's going on" concerning Noriega.

"Are there links with the CIA? Who were the people that were involved in drug-running and profit-skimming? And who was it in this administration who thought that that made sense?"

Simplot finally opens waste treatment facility

HEYBURN — A new \$5-million wastewater treatment facility at Simplot's Heyburn french fry plant should solve odor problems and allow the company to meet government water quality standards while increasing production.

Gov. Cecil Andrus dedicated the treatment system Thursday.

Several times in the last decade the plant exceeded legal limits for pollution of the Snake River. This led to potato plant production cutbacks and in November the company closed an ethanol plant at Heyburn because its op-

eration added to waste treatment problems, according to the company. The ethanol plant resumed production recently.

But with the new treatment facility, the plant will be able to meet government water quality rules, said Mike McMasters, state Division of Environmental Quality. The new waste treatment facility will significantly increase the potato plants' treatment capacity, says Bill Daniels, a Simplot vice-president.

The day's events included a speech by company founder J.R. Simplot, tours of the digester and a lunch at the Burley Inn. Robb Russell, regional administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, attended, as did area mayors and legislators.

With 1,200 workers, the plant is a major employer in the Burley-Heyburn area.

Andrus' presence is more than a sign of the Simplot company's politi-

cal clout.

The plant is a prized nugget in a drab economic landscape. Growth in Idaho residents' personal income has lagged behind the national average every year since 1985, according to the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis.

Simplot's digester is essentially a super-sized bathtub 272 feet by 540 and rising 24 feet above the ground. It can hold 22-million gallons of wastewater from potato and ethanol pro-

cessing.

The water is heated and micro-organisms placed in the digester literally eat the sugar, starch and potato solids. From there the water goes through other stages of treatment before discharge into the Snake.

The system works with existing treatment facilities, and Simplot says the set up will improve water conservation. Another benefit is the production of biogas that will supplement the plant's fuel needs.

Simplot says the new plant will also eliminate odors that waft over the area during aeration of the partially treated wastewater. The plant reduces the amount of organic material that could cause odors.

Simplot, like many other plants, discharges treated waste into the river under a federal permit system that limits the amount of discharge at certain flows.

The wastewater from the plant puts an additional burden on the river that "sits" has to biologically break down naturally occurring organic material in the water.

The river can only handle so much.

Prosecutors charge man in rape, kidnap

RUPERT — In measured tones covered by pauses, a hotel clerk testified Thursday that a Burley man raped and kidnapped her at the point of a sawed-off rifle.

She was the only witness called during a preliminary hearing held in Rupert, but one was enough. Magistrate Judge Donald Workman forwarded the case to district court after ruling there was sufficient evidence to believe Jeffrey Hoggan probably committed the crimes charged.

Prosecutors have charged Hoggan, 19, with rape, first-degree kidnapping, robbery and attempted infamous crime against nature. Minidoka County Prosecutor Charles Creason Jr. is also seeking an enhanced penalty since each of the charges was committed with a deadly weapon.

"He raped me," the hotel clerk testified. "I put my clothes back on, then he told me we were going to go to California in my car. (He said) we were going to be a couple, but first he wanted to get a knife and six-pack out of his car."

Hoggan allegedly raped the clerk May 5 after robbing Burley's Budget Inn, according to police reports. The desk clerk was working the hotel's swing shift alone.

Police arrested Hoggan later that night after he and the clerk drove away from the hotel. Hoggan, a Burley native, had moved to California but returned to the Mini-Cassia area several months before May, Creason said.

The hotel clerk sat sideways while testifying, leaning toward the judge. She spread her arms approximately three-feet apart when describing the length of the sawed-off gun used by her assailant.

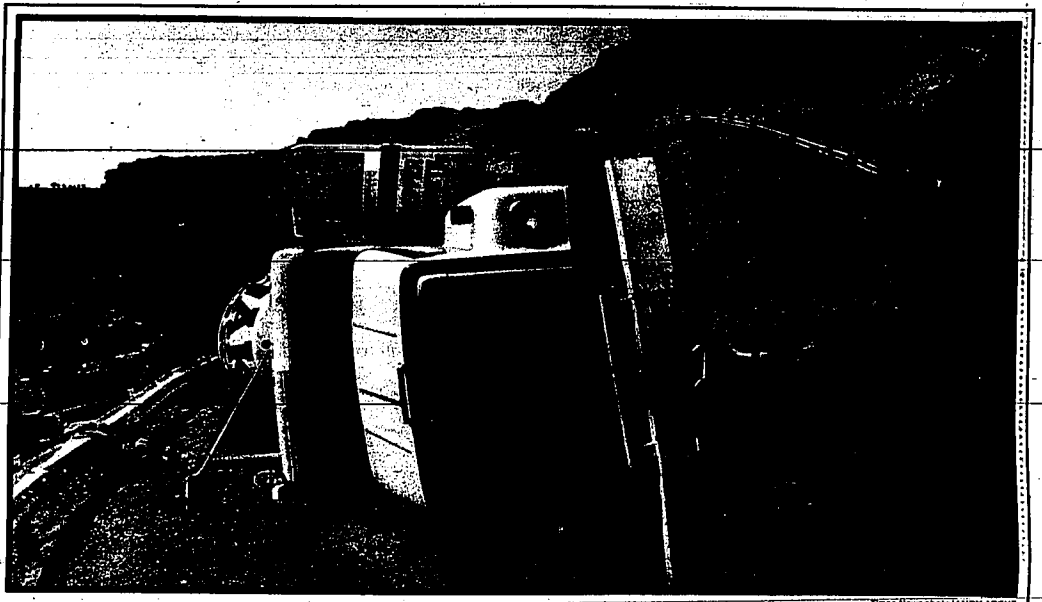
"Several times he threatened to blow my head off," the hotel clerk said. "I fully believed that at any point he was going to kill me."

Hoggan, wearing an orange prison jumpsuit, sat at a 90-degree angle to the witness stand. Throughout the hearing, he rested his head on his left hand, finger-combing his mustache and looking downward.

When the hotel clerk described the actual rape, Hoggan opened his left hand and covered his face.

The hotel clerk said she checked Hoggan into a room at approximately 5 p.m. that day. He came down to the lobby area a couple of times, the last time at 10 p.m.

Experimental drug seems to help AIDS girl

CHALLIS — Treatments with an experimental drug at the National Institute of Health seem to be doing some good for a 5-year-old Challis girl with acquired immune deficiency syndrome, her mother says.

Blood tests performed at the Bethesda, Md., facility last month indicate the white cell count in the girl's blood is back to normal and her T-4 cells — the ones affected by the AIDS virus — are building back up.

"Best of all, we've got signs of an immune system," her mother said. "She had a reaction to a tetanus skin test last time, which really excited everyone."

The blue-eyed, blonde-haired girl, who has been referred to by the pseudonym Nicole, contracted the AIDS virus from a blood transfusion at Primary Children's Medical Center in Salt Lake City after her premature birth at Steele Memorial Hospital in Salmon.

She was one of 30 children accepted into a pediatric clinical trials program last November at the National Institute of Health, where she began treatments with azidothymidine, or AZT.

The experimental drug has not been approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for use in children because of some potentially serious side effects. Although it appears effective in preventing AIDS-infected cells from multiplying, it may dangerously deplete the body's bone marrow and white-blood cell count, diminishing the ability to fight off infection.

Following six weeks of treatment at the Bethesda center last winter, Nicole came home Dec. 2 with a catheter implanted in her chest and a four-times-daily routine of taking medication disguised in a cup of juice.

She remains on a medication schedule of 7 a.m., 1 p.m., 7 p.m., and 1 a.m.

"Sometimes she's so tired, though, she doesn't even wake up while she's drinking her medicine," her mother said.

Her catheter lines must be flushed nightly to prevent coagulation and the threat of a blood clot traveling to her heart or brain. The bandage where the tubes exit her chest must be changed twice a week, and she travels back to Maryland with her mother once a month.

But because of her improved condition, she no longer must undergo spinal taps and her visits to NIH soon may be cut back to once a quarter.

Still, her father said the family's hope is tempered with realism administered by NIH doctors.

"Even with all the medicine, they're really quite frank with you," he said. "They really don't feel they'll find a cure for it for a long time."

And as healthy as Nicole appears now, AIDS is never far away.

"I don't think you ever get used to it completely," her father said. "Every morning you wake up and the uncertainty is still there."

He offered that prediction to 20 people, appropriately, at the Twin Falls Optimists Club. Idaho voted more than 70 percent in favor of conservative Republican President Ronald Reagan in the last two elections.

Evans outlined his reasoning for the Democratic Massachusetts governor's success against the anticipated Republican opponent, Vice President George Bush. And Evans offered other observations about the national race, including Dukakis' vice presidential options and expectations of the Rev. Jesse Jackson's role in the Democratic convention.

"It seems to me Bush has very serious problems nationally in his try for the presidency," said Evans. "All of these issues have come home to roost and they've come home to roost on George Bush's shoulders."

He listed Reagan Administration imbroglios including the Iran-Contra investigation, dealings with Pana-

manian leader Gen. Manuel Noriega and the latest revelations of the president's wife using astrology in charting the commander-in-chief's schedule.

"Whether it involves him or not, people expect him to be part of the administration," Evans said. "People are going to say 'Wow, how can you do that?'"

Evans, who first met Dukakis in 1976, gave one of the Democratic frontrunner's speeches. It expounded on the "Massachusetts Miracle" — reducing 12 percent unemployment in that state to virtual full employment — while also promoting daycare, full housing and equal opportunities for minorities.

"He's a down-to-earth, no-nonsense person," Evans said of Dukakis.

Asked who he thought were likely Dukakis choices for vice president, Evans said the list is probably still long and still includes opponent Jesse Jackson's name. But Evans said Georgia Sen. Sam Nunn and Texas Sen. Lloyd Bentsen are names prominently mentioned.

He added that Jackson, who is the only Democrat still campaigning against Dukakis, probably does not desire the vice presidency.

"What's going to happen on this aspect of the campaigning is very difficult to say," said Evans. At the least, Jackson will have the president's ear if Dukakis is elected, he said.

Mini-Cassia will get permanent CSI classrooms

BURLEY — The College of Southern Idaho has purchased United Methodist Church property in Burley to provide permanent classrooms for its Mini-Cassia students.

At a press conference Thursday, Jerry Beck, CSI's director of continuing education, said the college paid \$180,000 for the property at 1458 Overland Ave. The double lot includes a 1957 education building, which will be renovated for another \$170,000, and a 1917 church building, which will be torn down.

"We're very excited about the new facility," he said. "The Burley School District has been extremely generous in letting us use their classrooms at night. However, having a permanent facility will allow us to greatly expand our academic and noncredit programs."

The Methodist education building has nine classrooms in about 9,000 square feet. Two of these will be converted to computer labs. Each lab will contain 15 computers. One lab will be used mostly for the agriculture program and the other for the office occupations program.

Beck said permanent computer labs will allow vital flexibility.

"Today's students are often working adults who need to

No, not shoplifting, theft suspect insists, just a sociology experiment

MOSCOW (AP) — A 72-year-old Portland, Ore., man who says he shoplifts as a sociology experiment has been charged with second-degree burglary for allegedly stealing a \$3.79 pair of socks from a Moscow mall.

If convicted, Chester Heick faces a maximum penalty of five years in prison and a \$5,000 fine.

Both Latah County Prosecutor Craig Mosman and Win Moore, Heick's attorney, said they were unhappy to see Heick facing a criminal charge. But Mosman said it was the best way to ensure Heick gets psychiatric treatment.

A trial is scheduled Sept. 27 for Heick, who danced and sang a jingle during a court appearance Wednesday.

At the outset of the charging decision, the information was that here was a man who kept meticulous records about thefts he had committed and thefts he had planned, Mosman said. "Since that time, the concern is to be able to have a procedure to force him to get help, independent of the legal process or eventually to have that done by a judge's order."

After Heick was arrested at The Bon store on April 25, Moscow police searched his car and found a number of small retail items allegedly stolen from Moscow stores, 92 empty bags with the names of stores and dates written on them and a notebook in which Heick allegedly kept track of his activities, including shoplifting.

Police subsequently learned Heick

has been arrested four times for petty theft.

Heick has consistently maintained to his police and judges that shoplifting is his hobby. He says he does it as a social experiment "to see how people get away with it," and contends he returns the merchandise.

Heick sat silently through much of his preliminary hearing in 2nd District Court on Wednesday, but police and security personnel at the Bon testified that he regularly tosses off rhymed quips. During a recess, Heick walked to the back of the courtroom,

smiled, and broke into a dance step, singing "I have fun everywhere I go, from Oregon up to Eedah."

In finding there was probable cause to arraign Heick on the burglary charge, Latah County Magistrate William Hamlett said he had displayed the intent to steal merchandise from The Bon.

"I find no inherent reason that rhyming is indicative of a weak mind," Hamlett said. "The ability to respond in rhyme in stressful situations may be indicative of a strong, active and agile mind."

Pair plead innocent after major drug raid

EMMETT (AP) — An Emmett couple arrested in connection with one of the largest methamphetamine raids in Idaho is pleading innocent to 10 felony drug charges.

William Rankin Lavy and Patricia Elizabeth Swift will stand trial Sept. 12 on charges of manufacturing, possessing and delivering cocaine and methamphetamine.

Lavy is being held in the Gem County Jail in lieu of \$250,000 bond and Swift in lieu of \$10,000 bond.

Authorities recovered more than 40 pounds of methamphetamine in its liquid form in an April 30 raid of a

two-story ranch house southwest of Emmett, law enforcement officers.

Manufacture, refining and sale of the drug took place there, authorities said.

Sheriff William McConnel said federal authorities have begun procedures to seize property on the ranch.

More than two tons of chemicals used to process methamphetamine were found in the ranch house along with lab equipment and more than a pound of cocaine and powder methamphetamine.

Methamphetamine is a stimulant known as "speed" in street terms.

Winn, responding to an emergency call within Minidoka County, had his lights flashing and siren on as he headed westbound on Baseline Road. He attempted to proceed through the intersection at County Road 400 West without stopping when his car collided with a car driven by Mark May, Jarvis said.

May's car, a 1984 Buick, was northbound on the county road when it hit the patrol car's left rear end. Winn, a Rupert resident, apparently did not see May's vehicle, Jarvis said.

May, of Rupert, and his passengers were wearing seatbelts and were not seriously injured. The Buick stayed on its tires and came to rest on the side of the road.

Jarvis said the accident is still under investigation. Both cars were totaled.

uses the labs before and after work," he said. "Labs need to be open from at least 7 a.m. until 10 p.m."

CSI also plans to integrate its new Burley facility into Idaho's telecommunications network. This network, which has received funding from Idaho's Legislature, links several Idaho schools together via satellite microwave signals. Mini-Cassia students will be able to take tele-courses from the College of Southern Idaho, University of Idaho, Boise State University and Idaho State University.

Two of the classrooms in the new building will be combined to form an auditorium. The auditorium will allow CSI to bring plays and other fine arts activities to Burley. Special workshops and seminars will also be held in the auditorium.

CSI plans to move into the education building in time for fall classes. Beck predicted that, within a year, CSI will be offering at least one full-time program in Burley. Now it serves more than 550 Mini-Cassia students.

"Until now, people have only been able to be part-time

students here," he said. "Our office occupations program will probably be the first to be expanded to full time."

CSI plans to spend \$170,000 renovating and equipping the education building. The majority of that sum will be spent on installing the telecommunication signal and equipping a classroom to receive the satellite transmission. The remaining money will pay for building renovation.

Joan Edwards, executive director of the CSI. Idaho Foundation, said foundation members will raise money for the facility. They will be soliciting corporations and private individuals for donations.

The Methodist congregation will continue to occupy the main building until their new church at 27th and Almo Avenue is constructed. At that time, they will raise the main building, which is not structurally sound, and turn the property over to CSI.

CSI plans to convert the property, which is adjacent to the education building, to parking space.

organic material at one time. Too much can depress the amount of oxygen in the river, harming aquatic life, says the state Division of Environmental Quality. Trout as well as rough fish populate that reach of the Snake.

Last July Simplot and Ore-Ida in Burley feared they wouldn't be able to meet their permit requirements because of the low flows in the river. They voluntarily told the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Simplot exceeded the requirements for oxygen demand on the river once in February 1987 and also in 1986, according to state records.

The problems were more serious in March and April 1985. EPA issued a compliance order in September 1985 that called on the company to reduce its discharge points from two to one, making it easier to monitor the flow.

Simplot also exceeded the limits for oxygen demand during the 1977 drought, also a period of low flow, says Fred Zerza, Simplot spokesman.

The state and EPA are planning studies of the ammonia and oxygen content of the river at this reach. In

addition to Simplot, Ore-Ida foods and the cities of Burley and Heburn also discharge into the river. Studies will take place this fall when the flows are lower.

Simplot has been increasing the amount of waste in the digester since April and the facility will be at full capacity in July.

Simplot pegs its total investment in wastewater treatment since the plant

Controlling water overshadows need to preserve areas

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Protecting the state's right to control Idaho water is more important than preserving two natural areas in southern Idaho, several state political leaders say.

Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, said he has decided to keep his pledge to support water rights language proposed by Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, in bills that would provide federal protection to the City of Rocks in southern Cassia County and the Hagerman Fossil Beds near Hagerman.

But he admitted that the language, designed to ensure that no additional federal reserved water rights are provided in the bills, could prevent passage this year.

Stallings had been wavering after southern Idaho officials urged him to compromise on the water issue to get the two bills passed. He expressed his support for the language in a written response to Attorney General Jim Jones, who urged him not to compromise on water rights.

"It is essential that any new federal reserved water rights not be established in Idaho through congressional action," Stallings wrote. "Any water right established must be done under state law."

Environmentalists have argued successfully in court that wilderness protection or other federal preservation efforts inherently provide reserved water rights. Jones and many western political leaders say that threatens the traditional role of state control of water.

Paul Matthews of the Burley Chamber of Commerce, which supports protecting the City of Rocks, said Thursday that he did not agree with Stallings' decision.

"It is disappointing that they have

chosen to fight the battle with this piece of legislation because as a practical matter, there is no water up there by the City of Rocks," he said. "But I can see their reason behind it." Matthews said it had taken 30 years to get the major parties involved to reach a consensus on a City of Rocks protection program. But the agreement, which provides for federal, state and local cooperative management, could fall through if the bill does not pass this year.

A private developer has proposed building a trailer court in the area that Matthews said would threaten its natural characteristics. A moratorium on development in the area ends in July.

Jones said he supports both the Hagerman Fossil Beds and City of Rocks bills. But he said the water rights issue is more important than their passage.

"I'd like to see it passed but it comes to a point that you have to decide whether to compromise on principle," Jones said. "I think we cannot afford to compromise."

Stallings said he and Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, urged Rep. Bruce Vento, D-Minn., who chairs the key House subcommittee considering the bills, to support their approval.

"He was sympathetic but he was not awfully optimistic," Stallings said. "The water rights language is virtually the same as proposed by McClure and Gov. Cecil Andrus in an Idaho wilderness bill before the Senate. Stallings said that language, which he also supports, may stall that legislation as well."

"The bottom line is we are not going to give away the store on state water rights in any bill," said H.D. Palmer, McClure's press secretary.

Denver award lifts hopes of retirees

BOISE (AP) — A Denver jury award last week of \$1.35 million to 20 former long-time Mountain Bell managers for lost wages and benefits has lifted the hopes of several Boise-area telephone company retirees who are planning to go to court.

A six-person jury in Denver District Court resolved the first of several similar suits pending against Mountain Bell by ruling that the company had a special obligation to the 20 former managers. The jury also determined that the company did not defraud the plaintiffs.

"I think the award was deserved," said Robert Grime, of Boise, who retired in 1983 as an equipment engineer after 35½ years with Mountain Bell. "I don't think they can go any differently in our case," he said.

Grime is one of 620 non-Colorado residents from throughout the West who has sued Mountain Bell in U.S. District Court in Denver, claiming that the company gave managers false information on their retirement planning in the early 1980s. As a result, the managers lost severance pay and savings.

"I think the jury was more than fair with the company," said Dale Jauert, Boise. "I don't feel it's anything more than I've got coming."

Jauert said he retired in 1983 at age 61 after 33 years with the company. He was assistant manager of plug-in inventory control systems with Mountain Bell's Engineering Group in Boise at his retirement, he said.

In the suit decided last week, the retirees claimed that Mountain Bell promised them one year's salary under a management retirement plan, but in the early '80s told some employees the program was discontinued.

The 20 plaintiffs, with 600 years of

total service to the company, retired without the plan. They later learned that 1,200 workers received the severance benefits. They claimed Mountain Bell defrauded and deceived them.

Mountain Bell officials contended the plaintiffs did not qualify for the benefit and that misrepresentations occurred.

The jury agreed with the former managers on the management plan, but declined to award punitive damages.

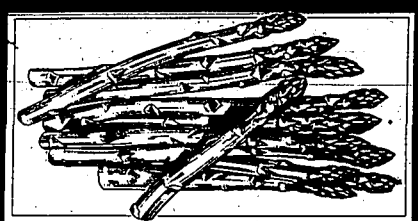

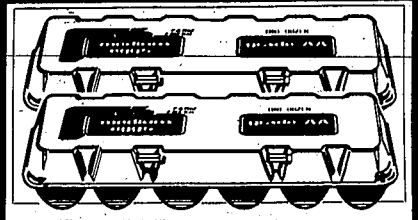

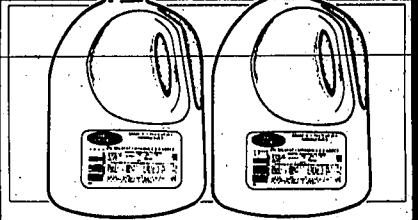

CSI faces Lakeland in world series opener

GRAND JUNCTION, Colo. — When College of Southern Idaho opens its share of the national junior college baseball world series Saturday afternoon, it will be going against a team of unknown reputation.

It isn't just because it is difficult to get a line on a baseball team, all nine hitters, the likely two or three pitchers, etc., that CSI will be in the dark about Lakeland, III. Coach Jim Walker says "I've never been much to try to scout by phone. You only hear things that worry you. I worry more about us. Keeping our team playing the game the way it should be. If we hit and catch it and our pitchers keep it down on their hitters, we should always be in the game with a chance to win," says the 14-year coaching vet-



er who has been here seven times now.

There's no doubt that Lakeland will be a good team. They come from the Great Lakes Region and we know they had to beat Triton to get here.

We also know that at one time Triton was something like 44-4 and ranked among the top couple-three teams in the nation. Lakeland is one of those huge junior colleges with something like 20,000 students. So you know they have the resources and driving power to field a nationally competitive team," the coach continued.

Another reason that Walker and the Eagles were unsure of what to expect is that the national tournament committee emphasizes that it doesn't want teams arriving in town early. In fact, it issues orders telling coaches not to bring their teams to Grand Junction before Thursday afternoon — some 36 hours before the first pitch is thrown in an area.

That unusual play, which obviously

didn't originate with the Grand Junction Chamber of Commerce, largely is due to the lack of practice area in the city, and everyone knows that baseball teams need a lot of room to practice. A team is allowed only a one-hour look-around the tournament field in a quick acclimation session. Mesa College's practice field is available for practice but is the only one available and teams are limited to an hour on Friday and short pre-game hitting drills the rest of the time.

Walker said righthander Don Emery, who has signed a scholarship letter with Brigham Young University, will get the starting nod. After that he's not certain how the pitching rotation will continue.

"I suppose that Billy Moeller will

get the nod for the second game despite what happened Tuesday (when he was shelled in two innings by Otero, Colo., in the district finals)," Walker said. "We'll be hoping he looks more like he did last week (in shutting out Utah Valley 17-0) than Tuesday (when CSI lost 8-1)."

After that, Walker said he and pitching coach Jim Dawson will play the staff by feel on a day-to-day basis. That has worked out well during the past season, particularly in the district finals when sophomore Corby Schroeder broke a six-week slump in shutting down Otero.

Walker said that relievers Tom Check and Kendall Bennett would probably stay up in the bullpen most of the time.

The national tournament is an unwieldy 12-team bracket, which means one-third of the teams have a built-in advantage of playing less games from the outset and more importantly, getting days off in the middle in both the winner and loser side.

CSI is not in that bracket.

"It appears we will be required to play every day," Walker admitted.

But the coach feels the team is coming into the event on a high mental plane, noting "they are the most excited bunch I've ever brought here.

They proved Tuesday they can plan extremely well when they are excited and up like they were against Otero in that last district game. We feel we can go quite a ways in this one."

Snappy practice readies field for Sunday's Indy test

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Mario Andretti whizzed around the track at 215.105 mph Thursday and left the way through a safe and productive final two hours of practice for the Indianapolis 500.

Thirty-one of the 33 starters in Sunday's race got onto the 2½-mile track during the only practice session of the week leading up to the \$4 million race.

"I'm very happy with the car," said Andretti, the 1969 Indy winner. "It's feeling right and the way we left it (in practice last Sunday).

"The engine was entirely rebuilt and it's back to where it was," he added. "Mission accomplished."

Since qualifications ended late Sunday afternoon, the track has been washed down by a heavy rain, cleaning away some of the slippery tire rubber from the asphalt surface.

Add to that the fact that Thursday was sunny and cool and you have almost perfect conditions for Indy-car racing.

"The track is in good condition," Andretti noted. "It's very clean."

Teammates Danny Sullivan and Rick Mears, the pole-winner, were close behind Andretti in the fast practice period.

Sullivan turned a fast lap of 214.694, while Mears, who set one and four-lap qualifying records of 220.453 mph and 218.049, respectively, was right behind at 213.118.

"The car couldn't really have felt much better," Sullivan said. "We're ready, but so are a lot of other people. Mostly, I think everybody is just happy that we're done with that (practice) without any serious problems."

Nobody came close to the laps over 220 and 221 that Andretti and Mears were throwing at each other in practice two weeks ago.

"This isn't the time for that any more," Mears said. "When you qualify, it's all speed. After you qualify, it's

balance and race setup that are important. You have to be able to run well with a changing fuel load and under all kinds of track conditions. You're trying to find just the right balance. Speed becomes secondary."

In the past two years, the so-called "Carburetor Testing" sessions on the Thursday prior to the race have been punctuated with crashes.

In 1986, an accident involving Dennis Firestone wound up letting first alternate Dick Simon into the race. Last year, both A.J. Foyt and Brazilian Emerson Fittipaldi gave their crews lots of work to do before race day by crashing during the session.

Thursday, there were seven caution flags for a total of 45 minutes, but the cautions were for debris four times, one track inspection, a low-in and an engine failure in the car driven by Randy Lewis.

"This was much better," Fittipaldi said with a smile after a safe 10-lap test with a fast lap of 210.270 mph. "The car feels very well balanced with a full fuel load, and the engine feels also very good. I'm looking forward to the race."

Two of Sunday's starters, Scott Brayton and rookie Dominic Dobson, did not take part in the final practice.

Butch Dennison, Brayton's crew chief, said, "The car had been rebuilt prior to Sunday, and we used that as our warmup day. We were pleased with the performance of the car and did not feel this morning's warmup was necessary."

Dobson was in a different situation, missing the practice because of a fuel system problem.

"I really wanted to be out there, but we've got work to do to get the car ready for Sunday and we didn't want to have to rush and mess anything up," Dobson said. "I hated missing the time on the track."

Johnson lifts Celtics over Pistons

BOSTON (AP) — Dennis Johnson scored six straight points in the last 1:25 of the second overtime on Thursday night and the Boston Celtics tied the NBA Eastern Conference final series at 1-1 with a 119-115 victory over the Detroit Pistons.

Johnson's heroics came after Kevin McHale made only the second 3-point basket of his eight-year NBA career tying the score 109-109 with five seconds left in the first overtime.

A basket by Joe Dumars with 1:39 remaining in the second overtime gave the Pistons a 116-113 edge, but Johnson tied it with 1:25 to go, then hit two free throws with 43 seconds and two more with nine seconds left to clinch the victory.

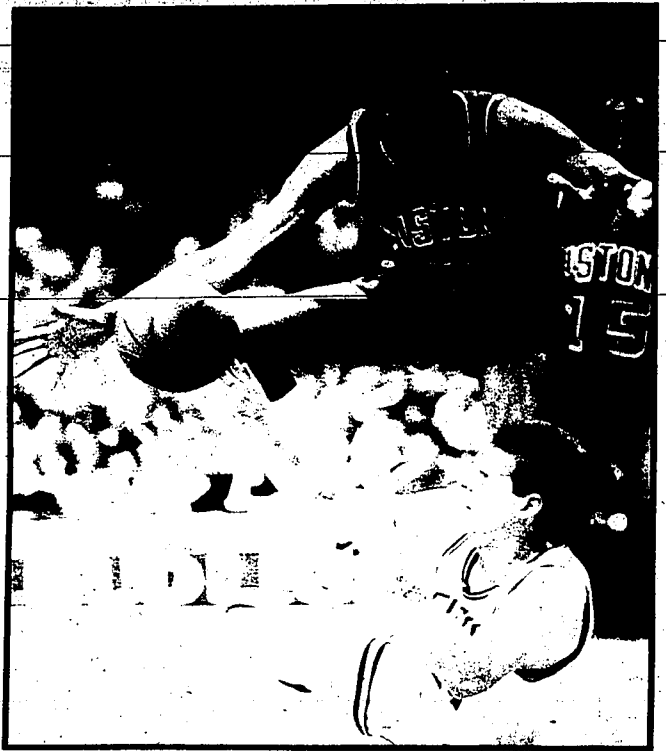

Pat Riley isn't feeling greedy as the Lakers come into Reunion Arena for two games against the Dallas Mavericks, starting Friday night.

The Los Angeles coach will be satisfied with just one win.

"It's academic and trivial to say, but all we've done is win two games," Riley said of the Lakers' 2-0 lead in the NBA Western Conference finals.

"Two years ago we won the first two (at the Forum) and they won two back there (at Dallas) and the series went six games.

"Our goal is to get one win, I don't care which game, and come back and wrap it up in five games."

Riley's plan may go awry if the Mavericks don't put together a good game — the series may go only four.

The Mavericks were soundly outplayed and soundly beaten in the first two games, losing 123-101

Wednesday night after a 113-98 defeat in the opener on Monday.

"You haven't seen the real Mavericks," Dallas forward Sam Perkins said. "Unfortunately, you have seen the real Lakers, though."

Dallas coach John MacLeod said he remains confident that the Mavericks still have a chance to derail the Lakers, who are seeking to become the first team to win consecutive NBA titles since 1969.

"We're going to have to react better to what they're doing defensive-

ly," MacLeod said. "And we're going to have to get back faster on defense ourselves.

"The homecourt itself won't change things. But there are five games left and we know we're going to play better.

"Right now our attitude is good," the Mavericks coach said. "We've learned a great deal and I hope we can apply it."

"Reunion Arena is a tough arena to play in," Riley said. "It's a rabid crowd. They're very good at home."

Oilers complete sweep of Stanley Cup series

EDMONTON, Alberta (AP) — The Edmonton Oilers, with Wayne Gretzky leading the way, beat the Boston Bruins 6-3 Thursday night to complete a four-game sweep and win the Stanley Cup for the fourth time in five years.

In establishing themselves as one of the great teams in NHL history, the Oilers took their place behind the Montreal Canadiens, who won five straight Cups in the 1950s and four straight in the 1970s, and the New York Islanders, who won four straight in the early 1980s.

The Oilers' four Cups have come in just nine years of existence in the NHL. The Bruins, by comparison have won only five in 64 years.

The Montreal Canadiens lead all Cup winners with 23.

Gretzky, who won the Conn Smythe Trophy as the most valuable player in the playoffs, had a goal and two assists as the Oilers scored five straight goals to win the title they were denied by Tuesday night's power failure that blacked out Game 4 in Boston.

Gretzky, who also won in 1985, became only the third player to win the Conn Smythe trophy. Bobby Orr and Bernie Parent were the other two.

Gretzky now has 262 career

points, by far the most in NHL playoff history.

The Bruins led twice before Esa Tikkanen tied the score with a power-play goal late in the first period.

Ex-Bruin Mike Krushelnyski put Edmonton ahead to stay 6:38 into the second period, converting Kevin McClelland's passout, before Gretzky made it 4-2 with his 12th goal of the playoffs and 81st career point offally.

Craig Simpson then scored with two seconds left in the second period, chopping Gretzky's pass out of the air and past Boston goaltender Andy Moog.

The assist was Gretzky's second of the game and 31st overall in the playoffs, breaking his own one-season record.

In the third period, Tikkanen scored at 1:21 to give the Oilers a 6-2 lead before Kasper scored his second goal of the night at 6:35.

As the final seconds counted down, the sellout crowd of 17,502 at the Northlands Coliseum rose as one, cheering the Oilers, who have won all four of their Cups at home.

Gretzky, one of nine Oilers who have been on all four championship teams, was presented with the Stanley Cup by NHL President John Ziegler, and began the first of numerous victory laps.

CSI signs 6-7 California prospect

TWIN FALLS — Ian Levy-Mayer, a 6-7 Israeli who has already played with some of the future basketball greats in the world, will become a College of Southern Idaho Golden Eagle, announces Coach Fred Trenkle.

Trenkle said the 17-year-old, who was considered the top player on the Israeli national junior team a year ago, comes to CSI from the California high school program that produced such outstanding prospects as Shawn Higgins two years ago and Chris Mills this year. He will join former prep teammate David Henderson here.

Trenkle said he isn't certain how he ended up with Levy-Mayer but suggested "I think I happened to step in at the right time and I suppose that none but the biggest NCAA Division I programs bothered to even scout the team because of Mills."

Trenkle said the whole thing was a whirlwind that didn't start until the coach went to California to evaluate another player who is considered one of the top five junior college recruits in the country.

"I'm sitting there watching this kinda skinny guy just eat, this star's lunch," Trenkle remembers. "So I start going through my program to see who has signed him. I couldn't believe he hadn't been grabbed."

"I talked to David and his dad and both said Ian has a great work ethic, is a hard practice player and wants to improve to the point of making his national Olympic team. So all three of us assaulted him one afternoon in his brother's home armed with our videos and everything. He didn't sign with us that day but he did the next."

Trenkle said Levy-Mayer has been offered several Division I scholar-

ships, including two by big okay schools, "but he felt he wanted something in a little bigger program and we told him we could offer him a good chance at something like that because I believe our program is as well scouted as any in the country."

Trenkle said Levy-Mayer would physically remind fans of former Eagle Jeff Rekowek, who started at University of Nebraska last year after helping CSI to a national fourth-place finish two years ago.

"He's quicker than Jeff and is working with weights every day so will be strong," Trenkle said. "I consider his quickness close to excellent; he can run the floor well and he is a great outside shooter. He was 91-99 at the foul line last season in high school. We think because of all the things surrounding him, he was a well kept secret. Now I'm excited to get him into

our program and see if my evaluation comes through."

Trenkle said he still is self-scouting his recruiting, noting only 6-2 freshman guard Anthony Williams, Seattle, and Levy-Mayer are new players on the roster.

"These two might be the best outside shooters we've had in a while and we currently are evaluating a 6-4 outside shooter who some say might be better," Trenkle said.

"We're still talking to some big people and I think we're very close on two of them at least. Also, two Division I coaches want to place some 6-7 athletes with us this year so we still have a lot of avenues open and recruiting lines out," he said. "This year I am in no hurry because we filled quickly last year and had to pass up a couple of transfer prospects who came open late."

Stock prices increase slightly

NEW YORK (AP) — Stock prices pieced together a small gain Thursday as the market absorbed the news of stronger economic growth in the first quarter of the year.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial rose 5.38 to 1,986.75.

Advancing issues outnumbered declines by about 4 to 3 in nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 787 up, 692 down and 643 unchanged.

Volume on the floor of the Big Board came to 194.26 million shares, up from 138.31 million in the previous session.

Nationwide, consolidated volume in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in three stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 187.65 million shares.

The Commerce Department said Thursday morning that the gross national product grew at a 8.9 percent annual rate, after adjustment for inflation, in the first three months of 1968. That was up from a previous estimate of 8.2 percent.

Many analysts had voiced concern earlier in the week that a stronger figure would reinforce investors' worries

about a possible revival of inflation and upward pressure on interest rates.

Rates rose in the government securities market following the news, amid conjecture that the Federal Reserve was tightening credit a bit further.

But brokers said traders evidently concluded that the revival had already been taken into account in stock prices.

Texas accounted for most of the Dow Jones industrial rise, climbing 3 1/2 to 50. Late Wednesday Carl Ichan, the company's largest shareholder, proposed to offer 860 a share to take it over.

USX, another company in which Ichan holds a stake, gained 1 to 30 1/4. Tenneco slipped 1/4 to 46 1/4 after gaining 1/4 Wednesday, when the company said it planned to put its oil and gas properties up for sale.

Newhall Land & Farming jumped 4 1/2 to 44 1/4. Late in the day the company said it wasn't involved in any talks about being acquired.

Long Island Lighting rose 1/4 to 1 1/4. The utility reached an agreement with New York state officials to settle a long dispute involving its

Shoreham nuclear power plant, which is to be dismantled.

Sears Roebuck led the active list, up 1/4 at 34 1/4 in trading largely attributed to strategies focused on the company's dividend.

U.S. Steel fell 1/4 to 17 1/4. The company reported lower earnings for the fiscal quarter that ended April 30.

As measured by Wilshire Associates' index of more than 5,000 actively traded stocks, the market increased \$9.37 billion, or 0.37 percent, in value.

The NYSE's composite index of all its listed common stocks added .46 to 144.23.

Nicaraguans renew talks

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — U.S.-backed rebels and leftist government officials sat down together Thursday in a renewed search for peace after more than six years of war.

The rebels, known as Contras, came with a new plan that deals with both military and political issues, but a leader said he was not optimistic about the outcome of the talks.

He said the rebels were prepared to make a "special effort" to achieve a definitive cease-fire.

Government spokesmen said the Sandinistas planned to offer political reforms to guarantee clean elections. They also planned to offer congressional representation to minority political parties not in the National Assembly; to set a timetable for municipal and other elections; and to change the makeup of the electoral council to assure pluralistic representation.

The delegations met under tight security at the Camino Real Hotel. Gen. Humberto Ortega, the defense minister, headed the government delegation.

The rebel representatives included the military leader, Col. Enrique Bermudez, who was making his first trip to Managua since the war started in late 1981.

Cesar said rebels have doubts about the outcome of the meeting because the government has not complied with a preliminary peace plan agreed upon March 23 in Sapo, a southern border town.

"We are not optimistic," he said.

U.S. target of Korean demonstrations

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Students shouting "Go Home Yankies!" attacked an American bank with rocks and firebombs Thursday, and farmers protesting U.S. agricultural imports hurled cow dung at police during a clash outside the National Assembly.

Prime Minister Lee Hyun-jai ordered a crackdown on violent protests and radicals, but the mandate seemed to have little effect on the wave of anti-American rage.

About 30 students dashed out of sidestreets and hurled rocks and firebombs at a branch in southern Seoul of the KorAm Bank, police said. Police said four people were arrested.

The bank, a joint venture between the Bank of America and Korean business groups, was not damaged. It had not yet opened for business and had shutters over the windows and entrance.

Riot police fired tear gas in front of the National Assembly building in Seoul to disperse farmers protesting plans to increase imports of U.S. agricultural products.

At least five people were injured. About 500 farmers, with two calves at the front, hurled cow dung and clashed with police after a rally attended by about 1,500 farmers. Police

hicked and punched the protesters, who shouted "Oppose American beef and its pressure to open the Korean market!"

One calf ran amok through 1,000 riot police surrounding the assembly compound.

The United States is pushing South Korea to widen its markets to American imports. The trade issue has fanned anti-U.S. sentiment.

The attack on the bank was the first on U.S. business interests in the wave of violent protests that have been aimed mainly at the United States.

Radical students blame the United States for the partition of the Korean peninsula and accuse Washington of supporting military rule in the South. They demand the withdrawal of the 42,000 U.S. troops stationed in South Korea under a mutual defense pact.

The Korean peninsula was divided by U.S. and Soviet troops that ended the Japanese occupation in 1945 at the end of World War II.

Last week, protesters hurling rocks and firebombs attacked U.S. cultural centers in Seoul and in the southern city of Kwangju and hurled home-made bombs at the U.S. Embassy in Seoul.

Syria announces truce in Moslem rivalry

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Syria announced a new truce Thursday in a 3-week-old bloodbath between rival Shiite Moslem armies in south Beirut, and it pledged to work for the release of foreign hostages believed held in the battle zone.

Details of the cease-fire were not disclosed. Lebanese officials said Syria is the country's most powerful broker, and would move into the disputed slums Friday to restore peace.

In south Lebanon, Israeli warplanes and helicopter gunships blasted Palestinian guerrilla bases and positions of the pro-Iranian Hezbollah in two separate raids.

Twelve combatants were reported killed and four wounded in the two assaults, the first overnight and the second on Thursday morning.

In Damascus, a Syrian government official said an accord to end the south Beirut fighting between the Syrian-backed Assad and Hezbollah was worked out late Wednesday in a meeting between Syrian President Hafez Assad and a Hezbollah delegation in Syria's northern port city of Latakia. He said Iran also approved the pact.

"Ending the fighting will create new hope for the hostages, and Syria will spare no effort to secure their release, regardless of their nationality," said the official, who requested anonymity.

There were no reports on whether the cease-fire accord might have given Syria any assurances regarding the hostages.

Most of the 18 foreign hostages, including two Americans, are believed held in the disputed 16-square-mile enclave by extremists linked to Hezbollah.

The hostage held longest is American Terry Anderson, chief Middle East correspondent of The Associated Press. He was abducted March 16, 1985.

Hezbollah is a group of Moslem Shiite fundamentalists believed to be an umbrella for smaller organizations, holding the foreign hostages.

Amal leader Nabih Berri, also Lebanon's justice minister, returned from Damascus on Thursday. He said the Syrians would enter the suburbs Friday with Lebanese police units.

"The deployment will not only be aimed at stopping the bloodbath, but it also will set the Lebanese, Arab and Islamic compass in the right direction," Berri said.

Police said 296 people have been killed and 1,000 wounded since the fighting broke out May 6.

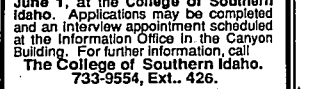

THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

"Our will is always for our own good, but we do not always see what that is." — Rousseau.

Both sides have their opportunities in the play of today's game. The defenders can always prevail, but only if they are careful. Declarer has a shot, but only if he throws out some bait.

The diamond queen goes to South's ace. East knows that his future now lies with the heart suit. How should he attack?

If he switches to the heart king, the defense is finished. After two heart winners are cashed, the suit blocks and South can discard his last heart on one of dummy's diamonds.

In all, South scores four trump tricks in hand; five diamonds and a club ruff in dummy.

Obviously East must lead a low heart at trick three. If South puts up his jack or 10, the defense is easy. West wins and returns a heart, and South loses three hearts and the trump ace for one down.

How does South improve his chances against East's accurate shift? He plays low instead of playing the jack or 10. If West gets greedy and wins the trick cheaply with his nine, there's nothing cheap about the result. The defenders once more get only two hearts, and South makes off with his unmakeable game.

Should West avoid declarer's crude trap? Yes, clearly. But only if he counts declarer's tricks and comes to the conclusion that it's now or never for three heart winners.

Fossil is official, so join the party

HAGERMAN — The Hagerman Horse has been declared the state fossil of Idaho and residents of Hagerman Valley are celebrating. Saturday is State Fossil Day and local residents have scheduled a variety of entertainment activities.

At 10 a.m., Ted Weasama, a geologist for the Bureau of Land Management, will lead a car caravan to the actual Hagerman Horse quarry site, where more than 125 full-bodied horse skeletons were excavated during scientific expeditions in the 1930s and in the 1960s.

The caravan will meet at Frog's Lily Pad restaurant at the south end of Hagerman and travel 16 miles across the Snake River and up to the hillside where an ancient bog has preserved animal bones for more than 3.5 million years.

Those going on this trip can expect to be back in Hagerman around noon.

A parade is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. Burt Holmes, an organizer of the day's events, says wagons, buggies, antique cars, equestrian groups and floats are expected in the parade.

● 10 a.m.: Ted Weasama, a BLM geologist, will lead a car caravan to the Hagerman Horse quarry site

● 1:30 p.m.: A parade is slated, speeches will immediately follow

Anyone is welcome to join the parade, Holmes says, and can call him at 837-4822 for more information.

After the parade, legislators, historians and geologists will give short speeches in the city park at the gazebo, where fossils will be on display.

The museum of the Hagerman Valley Historical Society will be open all day to display additional fossils, as well as Indian and pioneer relics.

Throughout the afternoon, mule-drawn wagons will offer free rides to the public. There will also be hot dog stands, fossil shirts and caps for sale as well as live music in the afternoon.

The Hagerman Lionsess Club will have food booths in the park with free fossil cookies for the kids.

Holmes says Fossil Day, sponsored by the Hagerman Valley Chamber of Commerce, is going to be an annual event.

"We hope to build it up for the centennial year (in 1990)," he says.

A bill signed by the state governor March 16 declared the Hagerman Horse as the state's official fossil. Also, a recent proclamation by the governor named May 23 as Fossil Day.

The celebration and the exhibit are free and the public is urged to attend.

in order to travel and paint. Since then, his paintings, many depicting the Southern Idaho landscape, have sold in prestigious galleries throughout the United States, including Park City, Utah and Washington D.C.

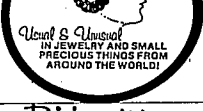

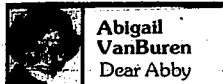

Who's liable when stores give credit that isn't due?

DEAR ABBY: "Cash Only" wrote to say that her daughter, who was "substantially under 18, unemployed and loves clothes," received a credit card from a major department store. ("Cash" is a single parent working full-time to support herself and her daughter and is struggling to stay afloat.) She said she phoned the store's credit department asking if there was an age requirement for credit card holders, and was told there was no.

in the various states, and if there isn't a law stating a parent is not responsible for merchandise purchased by a minor child, there ought to be."

Abby, in Illinois there IS a law. It's the Family Expense Act, which makes the head of a household — husband, wife or parent, if it's a single-parent household — liable for "family expenses."

The courts have construed this to

cover essentials such as necessary clothing. So if the daughter charged exotic perfumes, expensive dresses, furs, etc., her mother would not be liable.

But if any necessary garments of a reasonable quality and price, consistent with the family's established lifestyle, were bought by the daughter, her mother would have to pay for them.

The Wolfman's back, and TV's rockin'

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Legendary disc jockey Wolfman Jack says his new cable TV show spotlighting the golden era of rock 'n' roll rivals his old hit show, "The Midnight Special."

The new show is called "Rock 'n' Roll Palace." Beginning in June, the show will air locally in the Magic Valley on Saturdays at 6:30 and 9:30 p.m. on the Nashville Network.

The Wolfman, who portrayed himself in the 1973 movie "American Graffiti," is the host of this 30-minute program taped at Little Darlin's Rock 'n' Roll Palace in Kissimmee, Fla.

The bearded host says he does not miss doing "The Midnight Special," of which he was host for eight years, because the new program is so good.

"We have very special and wonderful people," the 49-year-old Wolfman said in an interview. "We had a magic and it comes out on the tube. The show comes on and goes off fast. Everyone was inspired and wanted to be there and wanted to perform. It was very magical."

Guests this season include the Diamonds, the Swingles, Tommy Sands, the Coasters, Dal Solumon, Brian Hyland, Joey Dee, Lou Christie, the Crystals, Bobby Vee, Martha Reeves, Mary Wells, Johnny Tillotson, the Platters, the Crickets, Lenny Welch, Freddie Cannon, Spencer Davis, Billy J. Kramer and the Tokens.

"On TV, there's not one show going after these acts," the Wolfman said. "This is the first show to come along and do this."

"It's real American music — what rock 'n' roll originally was before people turned it into acid and heavy music and upside down. From 1958 to 1964, that's real rock 'n' roll. Then the Beatles hit and everyone sounded like them. They didn't give our boys long enough. There were real classics from that era."

"The feeling of some of the music today is a little bit like that (era), but the purity of rock 'n' roll when it first came out was astounding," he said. "It was pure, simple, nothin' in heavy, nothin' but fun and romance. It had a good beat and you could dance to it. There were great ballads in those days."

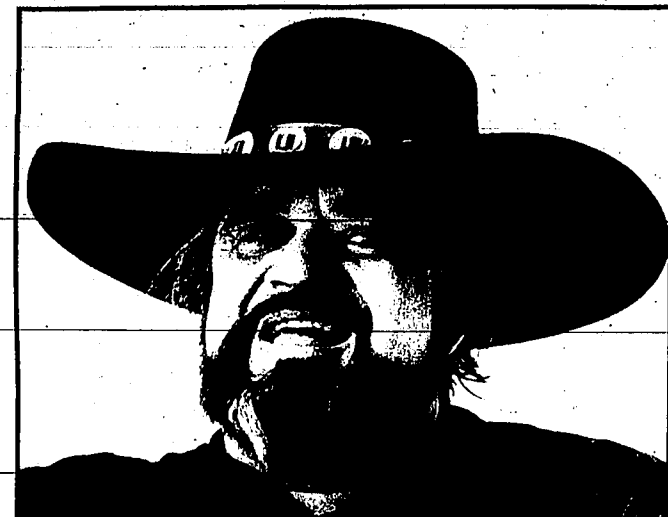
The Wolfman, who has a syndicated radio show on about 70 stations, said music today emphasizes the performer rather than the song.

"You don't go see Michael Jackson for the song but for his great entertaining and dancing. You see a \$2 million show. In the old days, you paid \$2.43 and saw 18 acts. Back then, everyone worked together. You try to put 18 acts together today and see what it costs you."

The Wolfman said he has many fond memories of "The Midnight Special," which he left in 1982 because the show was de-emphasizing live music, he said.

"There were some fine moments. I remember Ray Charles and Aretha Franklin and Billy Preston and at the end of each show we'd jam. This was very unusual for those days. For us to put them all together was very important."

The Wolfman really is Bob Smith, who grew up in a tough neighborhood in Brooklyn, N.Y. His character

emerged in the 1960s from XERB, a Mexican station with a signal that carried into the United States. He later was on XERB, another Mexican station.

Then he appeared in the George Lucas movie "American Graffiti," which starred Ron Howard, Richard Dreyfuss, Harrison Ford and Cindy Williams, and briefly featured Suzanne Somers.

"It took the Wolfman from a cult figure to the rank of American flag and apple pie," he said. "I made me legitimate. Most actors go all their life and try for that kind of opportunity. The Wolfman stumbled and fell into it. I am very lucky."

"So many people got started in that picture. It sort of became a classic."

He's not so complimentary of a later movie, "The Big Chill," which also featured '60s rock.

"It was kind of depressing, being about a funeral and all. But it did depict different kind of people in that age group. But I didn't particularly care for it."

After "American Graffiti," he began doing various advertising campaigns

and appeared in more than 40 network TV shows. He also had his own syndicated TV show, "The Wolfman Jack Show."

Todd Rundgren, the Guess Who, Leon Russell and Freddie King all wrote songs about him.

He currently is a deejay for radio station XTRA Gold in San Diego, Calif., broadcasting from his home in Beverly Hills, Calif.

His voice, he said, has been very valuable to him.

"It's kept meat and potatoes on the table for years for Wolfman and Wolfwoman. A couple of shots of whiskey helps it. I've got that nice raspy sound."

Rambo's back. This time it's for the dough

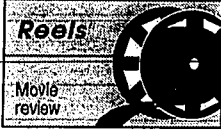
Now that they have had two opportunities to get it down, the formula for "Rambo III," the latest installment in the adventures of John Rambo, is as precise as E=mc squared. But as you might expect, the calculations here are on a much less sophisticated level. And by no means sophisticated, I mean like counting on fingers.

But working out the formula is all Sylvester Stallone and his associates are doing here. There is absolutely nothing in this third chapter of the Rambo story that we haven't seen in the previous two. Yes, the movie is full of empty action, minimalistic dialogue and more explosive material than the mind can fathom, but how could it not be? And yes, Stallone has developed his musculature to the point that he hardly seems human. (Oiled up, his arms look like varnished mahogany.) Also, he's grown his hair longer this time out, and this, together with the sleepy, suffering eyes, makes him resemble a Caravaggio Christ — but with pecs.

Judicious beyond your wildest imaginations would best describe what's been committed to film here, starting with the opening scenes in which we learn that Rambo has traveled to Thailand to become a Buddhist. Rambo's not your ordinary Eastern holy person, though. Every once in a while he journeys into Bangkok to whup the locals at stick fighting to raise money to help the monks build a monastery. Indeed, there are many paths to God.

What you're thinking is how could anyone even suggest such a notion without snickering? And it's an excellent question. But a good deal of what happens here is so outrageously lame-brained that it verges on camp.

To say that "Rambo III," which was directed by Peter MacDonald (who served as second unit director on "First Blood II"), is back-to-basics filmmaking would be a misstatement of the facts; not even the basics have



been grasped. The motions gone through here involve a mission, initiated by Rambo's Green Beret friend Colonel Trautman (Richard Crenna), to assist the rebels fighting the Soviets in Afghanistan. Trautman attempts to draw the stick-fighting Buddhist into the operation, but he will have no part of it. "My war's over," he says.

But the operation fails and Trautman is captured, so Rambo has to fight. (No, you don't understand, he has to.) After that, Rambo opens fire

and many Soviets die. And not in their sleep either.

Actually getting Rambo in the mood to fight is one of the staples of the series: he's skittish, this grenade launcher, and has to be properly motivated. The vet's reticence; at least as Trautman explains it, is the result of Rambo's not coming to terms with himself as a warrior. To help him "come full circle," Trautman tells him a little story — something about a sculptor clearing away the small pieces to reveal the beautiful sculpture that has always lived inside the stone. Rambo is like that sculptor, he says. "We didn't make you an incredible fighting machine. We just cleared away the small pieces."

In subsequent scenes, Rambo ponders this deeply, and perhaps there's nothing more wonderful — or funnier — in modern movies than watching Rambo think. Or try to think. Watch-

ing him turn this nugget over and over in his mind, you'd think you were witnessing the very birth of human thought.

It's in scenes like this one that we see how completely the star has given up even the pretense of being an actor. All of Stallone's preparation for the role seems to have been done in the weight room; he's become the chief exponent of the Mr. Universe school of acting. The camera pays such loving attention to the definition in his lats that the movie becomes merely an exercise in self-worship.

There have been some minor refinements, though that hardly seems like quite the right word. It is marginally less offensive, I suppose, to have Rambo killing Reds in Afghanistan than killing Reds in Vietnam.

But Rambo may, in fact, have out-

lived his usefulness. His moment may have passed. To some extent in the first film, but especially in the second, Rambo was the articulation of unexpressed sentiments in the culture, a projection of some of our baser national needs. And in that sense the character may have served a useful mythic function. In the earlier films, there was a sense of mission, of passion even, mixed in with the filmmakers' calculations; here only their most unmaking impulses are engaged. This time it was for his friend, the ad line says. But who are they trying to kid? This time it was for the dough.

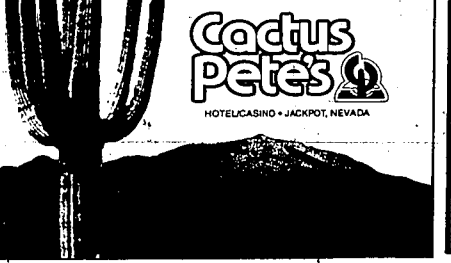

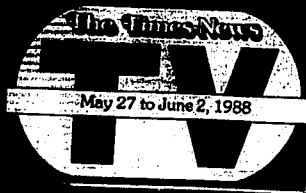

'To Heal a Nation' concentrates on the veterans, not the Vietnam War

"To Heal a Nation," which airs Sunday, May 29, on NBC, is one TV movie that truly reflects the spirit of Memorial Day. It depicts the efforts of Vietnam veterans to establish a war memorial in Washington, D.C.

The script, written by Lionel Chetwynd, is based on a 1985 book by Jan Scruggs, the founder of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund. Scruggs is a natural TV-movie protagonist: His life is remarkable, yet it seems to reflect the common experiences of thousands of vets. He enlisted in the Army at age 18, was wounded in Vietnam in 1969 and returned to the United States with three commendation medals and a Purple Heart. He earned a bachelor's degree and a master's degree in education and went to work as an equal-opportunity specialist for the Department of Labor. All the while, he took a special interest in the "delayed-stress syndrome" that afflicted Vietnam vets. In 1979, after seeing "The Deer Hunter," Michael Cimino's meditative film about vets' lives before and after Vietnam, Scruggs founded the memorial fund.

After obtaining congressional backing and support from Vietnam-era notables such as Gen. William Westmoreland and Sen. George McGovern, the proposed memorial met with logistical and political snags. But in the meantime, sympathy for veterans — and support for a monument — had grown. After four years of planning, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, a black stone wall

bearing the names of all the U.S. soldiers killed in the conflict, was dedicated on Veterans Day in 1982.

Like the memorial, the movie is likely to allay viewers' feelings of guilt. But because Scruggs was an enlisted soldier — not a draftee — it is unlikely to fall back on the simplistic anti-war posturing which, thanks to Hollywood, has come so easily to other Vietnam projects.

"People my age are too young to have had an opinion pro or con at the time," says Eric Roberts, 30, who stars as Scruggs. "So this is my way of making my personal statement, to add my two cents in saying, 'Welcome home, guys.'"

An Oscar nominee for his performance in the film "Runaway Train" (1985), Roberts also starred in the films "Star 80" (1980) and "The Pope of Greenwich Village" (1984). And he recently replaced John Malkovich as the star of the Broadway drama "Burn This," by Lanford Wilson, whose 1978 play "Fifth of July" was one of the earlier works to focus on a Vietnam veteran.

Now, the number of works about

the Vietnam experience — books, movies and TV productions — is staggering. But Roberts deliberately limited his research.

"I have three friends who were Green Berets — J.C. Pollock, David Maurer and Glen Walken," he explains. "I love and respect them, they're major figures in my life. So I asked myself how much luggage I wanted to bring to this. I knew I needed to confine myself, so as not to make a general statement, but a specific one. So I looked at my knowledge of these three vets."

He says their sense of distance from the war was especially valuable.

"There are guys who live it day and night, meeting all the time, wearing parts of their uniforms," he says. "But these three guys are not professional veterans, but men with lives."
