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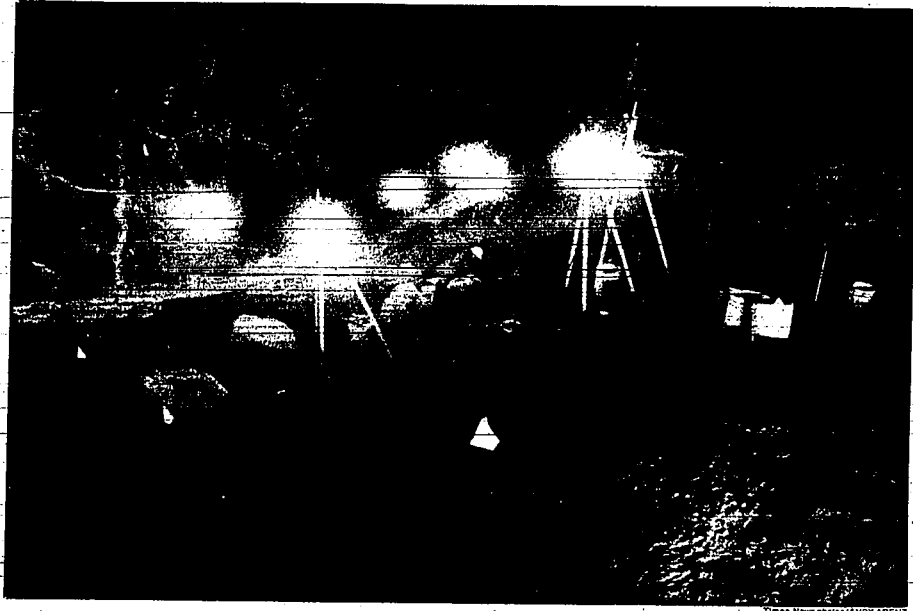

15,000-year quest at Wilson Butte

Crew peeling back milleniums in cave

EDEN — In the recesses of Wilson Butte Cave, archaeologists crouch in partitioned squares of dirt.

Trowels and brushes in hand, they painstakingly peel back millenniums of history one year at a time.

Wilson Butte Cave has attracted local archaeological buffs for decades. The cave's artifacts also intrigue professional archaeologists, and some consider Wilson Butte among the most significant archaeological sites in North America.

An archaeological excavation is currently underway which may help confirm that prehistoric man visited the cave 15,000 years ago. This evidence of human occupation would be 3,000 years earlier than any previously found in North America.

Wilson Butte's 15,000-year-old artifacts were first discovered during a 1959-60 excavation led by archaeologist Ruth Gruhn, now at the University of Alberta in Canada. Some scientists, however, remain skeptical of Gruhn's findings.

Gruhn has returned to Wilson Butte with her husband, Allen Bryan, after a 28-year hiatus in hopes of si-

lencing the doubting Thomases.

"The oldest dates from our first excavation were from bone. It would be better to get them from charcoal," Gruhn says.

Since the initial excavation, amateur collectors have destroyed many of the cave's artifacts. According to John Lytle, Bureau of Land Management District archaeologist, the cave lay unprotected even though it is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

"It's on public land, and the BLM couldn't do anything because it's so remote," Lytle says. "In the future, we'll probably put a gate across the cave's entrance or set up some sort of electronic device."

Fortunately, most of the damage was limited to the soil's upper layers.

"The purpose of this excavation was to confirm that there are still undisturbed areas," says Bryan. "We've found that there is still a lot here."

A lot of sweat and dirt was expended before the archaeologists could reach this optimistic conclusion. Gruhn, Bryan and their four person, full-time staff work seven days a week. None of them are paid.

Korean march attempt fuels blazing battle

SEOUL, South Korea — Radical students hurling hundreds of firebombs tried to march to communist North Korea on Friday as riot police fired volleys of tear gas to drive them back.

About 5,000 students, yelling anti-American slogans and shouting "Unite our fatherland," tried to march out of Yonsei University in Seoul to head for the border 30 miles to the north to press for reunification of the peninsula.

Waves of students hurling firebombs charged out of the university's main gate to attack thousands of waiting riot police. Several officers hit by firebombs screamed as they were covered in blazing gasoline.

Other students pelted police with rocks and broken bricks as lines of riot troops battled to drive them back into the school.

Police surrounded the sprawling campus after the government banned the unification march as a threat to national security. Violent fighting erupted at the school Thursday when students screaming "Skin the Yankers!" clashed with riot police trying to prevent them from assembling.

Scores of policemen and students were injured Thursday. Officers with burns or blood pouring from cuts were

dragged away by comrades or slumped exhausted against walls. Student leaders said at least five protesters were hurt seriously.

Students took two captured officers away with their hands tied and their fate was not known. Police made scores of arrests.

Running clashes were reported Thursday in at least eight provincial cities between police and students trying to reach the capital for the march. More than 200 students were arrested in Kwangju and street fights also took place in Suwon, Taeju, Teseon, Mokpo, Chung, Iri and Kyongju.

Eight thousand riot police in green combat fatigues and visored helmets fired thousands of tear gas bombs as 20,000 students stormed off the Yonsei campus, and more volleys came from 15 armored vans. Other students trying to reach the campus joined the fray.

"March to North Korea!" students shouted through clouds of tear gas that swept over the scene like fog banks and glowed orange when a firebomb hit a policeman or a wall.

Students armed with wooden and metal clubs charged from streets around the campus, repeatedly forcing police back during the four-hour battle.

North's trial first; may be dual event

WASHINGTON — The prosecution picked Oliver L. North to be the lead-off defendant in the first of four Iran-Contra conspiracy trials but suggested trying him with former national security adviser John M. Poindeexter.

Independent counsel Lawrence E. Walsh notified U.S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell of his selection of North but also asked the judge to consider the alternative of empanelling two juries for one trial of the fired National Security Council aide and his former boss.

Walsh, who also proposed a joint two-jury trial for arms dealers Albert Hakim and Richard V. Secord, said this procedure still would protect each defendant's constitutional rights against the judicial use of immunized congressional testimony.

Gesell ruled Wednesday that four separate trials were necessary to allow one defendant, say North, to use the immunized congressional testimony of Hakim or Poindeexter, for example, as evidence to defend the charges against him.

The judge ruled that because the independent counsel statute dealt with wrongdoing by high-level government officials, North and Poindeexter should be tried first. He gave Walsh until Friday to designate the lead-off defendant.

In court papers, Walsh said his proposal for two dual-jury trials "would meet the court's interest in protecting the rights of the defendants while alleviating the enormous burdens on the government of trying each defendant sequentially."

In a two-jury trial, one panel would hear the evidence against one de-

First lady should be a wife first, Nancy declares

WASHINGTON — First lady Nancy Reagan, in her most extensive defense of her role in official White House issues, said Thursday that she will continue to protect her husband and "if that interferes with affairs of state, then so be it."

Her impassioned remarks broke weeks of silence that followed publication of at least three "kiss-and-tell"

books by former White House aides painting an often unflattering portrait of her involvement in a wide range of White House matters.

"There's one thing on which any first lady must be a stone wall: The first lady is first of all a wife," she said in a speech delivered to about 1,000 spouses of participants in the World Gas Conference meeting in Washington.

Her comments surprised some of

President Reagan's most senior aides, as well as others in the White House West Wing, where the Oval Office is situated, and drew several bursts of applause for her defense of her involvement in the presidency.

As the Reagan presidency winds down, the first lady has become a center of attention, largely as the result of the disclosures in "For the Record," Donald T. Regan's account of his

three years as White House chief of staff.

Regan wrote that her interest in astrology led her to take a direct hand in the preparation of the president's schedule and the timing of, among other things, the signing of the U.S.-Soviet treaty eliminating medium-range nuclear weapons from the superpowers' arsenals.

Team isolates virus causing AIDS-like disease

WASHINGTON — A California research team has isolated from an African blood sample a strain of virus that can cause a fatal AIDS-like disease by infecting, but not killing, cells in the human body.

Jay A. Levy, leader of the University of California at San Francisco team that made the discovery, said Thursday that the new isolated strain may be an important new tool in the

development of an effective drug against the AIDS virus.

A University of Alabama-Birmingham team isolated still another new virus strain from the family that causes AIDS-like disease in Africa, George M. Shaw, leader of that team, said it appears to be less virulent than virus strains identified earlier.

Both studies of the new virus strains are reported in today's issue of the journal Science.

The new strains found by the re-

searchers are both strains of human immunodeficiency virus two, or HIV2.

This virus is a subtype of the HIV1 that is blamed for the AIDS epidemic in the United States.

Both HIV1 and HIV2 have been found in AIDS patients in Africa, but only one patient has been found in the United States to be infected with HIV2. That patient, who died in this country, is believed to have been infected in Africa.

Levy said his group isolated its strain of HIV2 from a blood sample taken from a native of Mali who was hospitalized in Ivory Coast, a West African nation. He said the patient suffered from chronic diarrhea and weight loss and died last fall from neurological complications, all symptoms seen in AIDS patients.

But Levy said the researchers are unable to say how the virus caused these disease symptoms.

Court will reconsider ban on gay soldiers

SAN FRANCISCO — A federal appeals court agreed Thursday to reconsider its landmark ruling that struck down the Army's ban on homosexual soldiers.

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals granted the Reagan administration's request to refer the case to an 11-member panel for a hearing.

The action removes the legal effect of the Feb. 10 ruling in which a panel of the court ruled 2-1 that 1981 Army regulations providing for discharge on the grounds of homosexual orientation were unconstitutional.

The armed services' right to base discharges on homosexual conduct has been upheld by the courts. But the appeals court, in a case involving a discharged soldier from the Seattle area, said the Army's regulations went further into the realm of personal privacy by applying to sexual orientation, regardless of conduct.

The government contended the ruling failed to defer to the Army's judgment in matters of discipline and morale and also was inconsistent with the Supreme Court's 1986 ruling upholding an anti-sodomy law in Georgia.

The 25-judge appeals court did not state a reason for referring the case to an 11-member panel or give details of its vote. No date was set for a hearing.

Pilot training may tighten

WASHINGTON — The Federal Aviation Administration is considering tightening training requirements for commuter airline pilots, requiring them to undergo the same training as commercial jet pilots.

The changes would require commuter pilots to perform maneuvers in sophisticated flight simulators during training or at an annual refresher course and to fly additional hours following training and checkouts called "initial operating experience." The FAA requires similar tests of pilots and initial operating experience of pilots who work for major airlines.

The changes are among improvements to pilot rules developed by an industry-pilot task force appointed by FAA Administrator T. Allan McArthur last fall.

Army helicopter crashes

KRUMBACH, West Germany (AP) — A U.S. Army UH1H helicopter hit a power line Thursday and crashed in a field along a heavily traveled highway, killing the three-man American crew, a military spokesman said.

The crash occurred near Hittinstetten village in the Krumbach district, 50 miles west of Munich, said spokesman Sgt. 1st Class John D'Amato of the 56th Field Artillery Brigade in Schwabach, Germany, 24 miles east of Stuttgart.

He said the victims' names were withheld until families were notified.

3 Canadians escape prison

MONTREAL (AP) — Three inmates shot a guard and took two hostages Thursday while escaping from one of Canada's oldest and most notorious prisons.

The guard at Laval Institute was seriously wounded, but the hostages were later released in apparently good condition, said Paul Fournier, a spokesman at the federal maximum-security prison just north of Montreal.

The hostages — a woman, prison guard and the driver of a car the inmates commandeered outside the prison — were found walking on a road about 20 miles southeast of the prison.

Fournier said earlier the guard taken hostage was believed wounded by gunfire, but later denied it.

Police throughout the Montreal area launched a search for the inmates.

The breakout began Thursday morning in the prison paint shop.

Senate limits lie tests

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate passed and sent to President Reagan on Thursday legislation that would limit the use of lie-detector tests by private employers.

The legislation, which was approved 69-24, also would prevent employers from taking adverse actions against employees solely on the basis of the test results.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., chairman of the Senate Labor Committee, said the legislation "will put an end to decades of injustice."

Bush, Dukakis trade barbs

on domestic, foreign plans

The presidential contenders looked south Thursday, with Democrat Michael Dukakis pleading a better relationship with George Bush traveling to Texas and launching his harsh point-by-point attack yet on Dukakis.

In a news conference in his adopted hometown of Houston, Bush said, "We differ, the governor and I, a great deal on domestic and foreign affairs." He said he was eager to spell out those differences because "I am convinced the country doesn't want to swing left."

Bush, who wrapped up the GOP nomination in April, met in Houston with the Hispanic caucus to the Texas Republican convention, then went to the convention floor to address the delegates.

In his speech, the vice president branded Dukakis "an 'out-of-mainstream' politician" with a "flawed world view."

"He's old-style '60s liberalism," Bush said in his Democratic rival. He said Dukakis would raise taxes, harass Americans with IRS audits, weaken national defense and formulate an isolationist foreign policy.

The Dukakis camp quickly fired back, defending Dukakis' record on crime and his plan to collect unpaid

taxes before considering tax hikes.

"It's clear that the vice president doesn't think that his own record or vision can bring him the votes he needs in November," said Dukakis spokesman Leslie Dach.

Recent polls show the vice president trailing Dukakis by 10 points or more, but Bush said he wasn't worried. "I feel really relaxed about it," he said. "I really do. We're not playing-act. I like fighting back."

In Boston, Dukakis, who mathematically locked up the Democratic nomination with a four-state primary sweep on Tuesday, held his second meeting with Costa Rican President Oscar Arias in many months. He urged the U.S. government to encourage democracy in Central America through economic assistance rather than military force.

"We did have an opportunity once again to talk about concerns that he has and I have and all of us have about Central America, about his leadership in bringing peace to the region and about the opportunity economically for development," Dukakis said.

The Massachusetts governor promised that if elected he would "develop a new relationship based on respect" with the leaders of Central America.

Arias, asked by reporters if he wanted to endorse Dukakis, said, "I'm

sure we'll be a good friend of whoever you decide to elect." However, noting Dukakis' ability to speak Spanish fluently, Arias added, "Perhaps it's easier, we can get along in the same language. That helps."

Dukakis' discussion with Arias, who won the 1987 Nobel Peace Prize for his Central American peace plan, also included current U.S. problems with Panamanian ruler Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega.

Dukakis, speaking in Spanish to a reporter traveling with Arias, said attempts to remove Noriega should involve consultation with Central American leaders — consultation he said the administration has neglected.

Arias and Dukakis also took part in commencement ceremonies at Harvard University, where the Costa Rican president delivered the keynote address and the governor joined the school's procession.

Earlier in the day, Dukakis escorted his wife, Kitty, home from Massachusetts General Hospital, where she underwent surgery six days ago to repair two herniated discs in her neck.

Doctors said she will have a hernia neck brace while she recuperates, but will be allowed to recover the brace by the time "I or husband" formally receives the nomination at the Democratic National Convention in July.

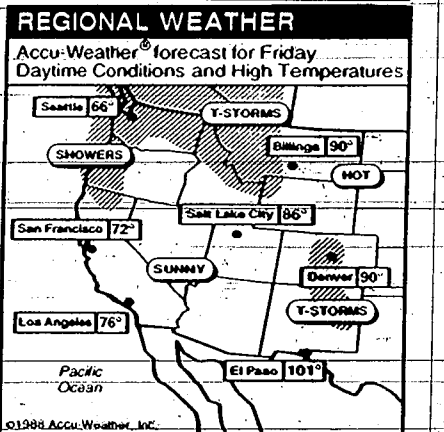
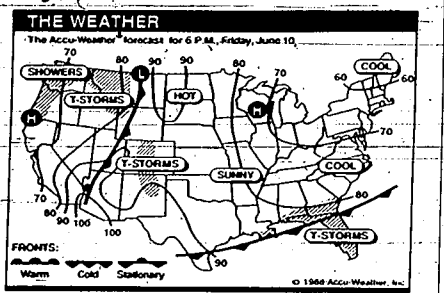

Low temperatures sweep nation

Thunderstorms rumbled through much of the South on Thursday from the Carolinas across the Gulf Coast states to eastern Texas, and temperatures were unseasonably low across much of the nation.

The storms produced golf ball-sized hail south of High Point, N.C., and one-inch hail at Lillington, N.C., between Raleigh and Fayetteville.

Thunderstorms also developed in the western Plains and in the Colorado Rockies. Small hail was reported near Colorado Springs, Colo.

Rain was scattered over southwest

Oregon and northern California, with the heaviest rain along the coast.

Rain was widespread along the East Coast from southern New England to the southern Appalachians.

Temperatures soared to over 100 degrees Thursday in southwest Texas and the southeast corner of New Mexico while much of the nation had afternoon temperatures in the 60s and lower 70s.

The cool temperatures extended as far south as northern North Carolina, the Tennessee Valley and northern Arkansas and as far west as the eastern portions of the northern and central Plains.

A frost and freeze advisory was posted for Friday morning for northern Michigan, a freeze warning for the northern mountains of western Pennsylvania, with scattered frost in Wisconsin, New York state and northern New England.

Detroit had a record morning low for the date of 40 degrees, which was 54 degrees less than Monday's record high. Flint, Mich., tied a record low of 35 just two days after a 91-degree record high.

Other record lows for the date Thursday were Duluth, Minn., 31; Miami Beach, Fla., 69; and Toledo, Ohio, 38.

to do laundry and shop for food," says Gruhn.

The archaeological team is only excavating a back of the cave. Most collectors have stayed away from the area we're working in," says Gruhn. "It's rocky so you can't use a shovel and there aren't a lot of artifacts back there."

"Because they cannot use shovels, the team patiently removes dirt with trowels and pieces it in buckets. The buckets are taken by wheelbarrow to conveyer belts leading out of the cave."

"The conveyer belts are critical to us," says Mark Druss, a BLM employee at the site. "Can you imagine how much work it would be to bring the dirt out by hand? It would be impossible."

The conveyer belts drop the dirt into what Lytle calls the "super gas-

powered shaky thing." This contraption resembles a giant vibrating sieve and separates medium-sized artifacts from soil.

The dirt is then carried to a water stove which is able to extract minuscule bones. "A lot of small bones will stay buried until a water washing," says William Akersten, curator of vertebrate paleontology at the Idaho Museum of Natural History.

Akersten holds a tiny gopher jaw between his fingers. "Bones like this can tell us what the environment used to be like," he says. "Animals are tied to certain environments. We learn a lot if we find bones from a type of mouse that only lives in forested mountain areas."

All artifacts are analyzed and categorized in a mobile science laboratory on loan from Idaho State University. According to Gruhn, ISU is lending them the lab-on-wheels because Wil-

son Butte artifacts will be displayed at ISU's Idaho Museum of Natural History.

"The findings from the first excavation are in their permanent collection, too," says Gruhn. "Ideally, they should be kept together, although we may arrange for a temporary display at Twin Falls' Harrett Museum."

The current excavation ends during the last week of June. However, Gruhn and Bryan hope to return to Wilson Butte to conduct further research. They plan to ask the Canadian Social Science and Humanities Council for a research grant.

"Now that we've confirmed that undisturbed deposits are still here, we'd like to do more excavations," says Bryan. "We can confirm the 15,000-year date if we get some good dates with charcoal rather than only mammal bones."

defendant and the other would consider the case against the second defendant. One of the juries would leave the courtroom before a defendant introduced evidence prejudicial to the other, such as immunized congressional testimony.

Walsh cited seven previous multi-jury federal court trials in which the procedure was upheld on appeal.

This included a 1982 dual-jury bribery trial of two District of Columbia officials. U.S. District Judge Charles Richey empaneled two juries because one of the defendants had given a confession that was inadmissible against the other.

All the defendants except Secord, a retired Air Force major general, were

given limited grants of immunity from prosecution by Congress to compel their testimony before the congressional Iran-Contra hearings last year. Walsh cannot use the immunized testimony of a defendant against that individual.

But Gesel has ruled that the defendants could use each other's immunized testimony to help their defense.

In his filing Thursday, Walsh said it would be logical to try Poindexter and North together because they both are accused of "using their positions of trust and power to facilitate and protect an illegal financial and logistical network" to help the Nicaraguan rebels by privately raising money and diverting profits from the U.S.-Iran arms sales.

North, a retired Marine lieutenant colonel, and Poindexter, a retired Navy rear admiral, are accused of "numerous acts of obstruction of justice and false statements intended to cover up the activities of the 'Enterprise' Walsh said.

Similarly, Hakim and Secord, former business partners who brokered the arms deals through a series of foreign companies and secret Swiss bank accounts, are both charged with conspiracy to pay illegal gratuities to North by setting up a \$200,000 trust fund for his family, Walsh said.

All-four defendants are charged with conspiracy to defraud the government, theft of government property and wire fraud.

And, if that interferes with affairs of state, then so be it," she said.

Although Mrs. Reagan made no mention of the recent books, her comments appeared to respond to the published criticism of her forceful role, in the view of some White House staff members.

Larry Speakes and Michael K. Deaver, a longtime Reagan adviser who served as deputy White House chief of staff, also have written books providing looks at life inside the Reagan White House, which included references to Mrs. Reagan's role.

The first lady has drawn attention — much of it critical — for her efforts to fend off White House aides and others while Reagan has recuperated from a variety of medical procedures, including the surgery he underwent in July 1985 to remove a malignant tumor growing in his colon, as well as during the recuperation period after the attempt on his life in March 1981.

"A president has advisers to counsel him on foreign affairs, on defense,

on the economy, on politics, on any number of matters," Mrs. Reagan said. "But no one among all those experts is there to look after him as an individual with human needs, as a flesh-and-blood person who must deal with the day-to-day problems of the most powerful position on earth."

"Take, for example, when the president is hospitalized. Yes, there are demands of government, but there are also basic personal rights every president should not be denied," she said. "As a wife, I believe my husband has as much right to a normal recuperation as any first lady need make apologies for looking out for her husband's personal welfare. It's an important, legitimate role for a first lady to look after a president's health and wellbeing."

Police drop drug charges

BOISE (AP) — Questions about the way police obtained evidence have prompted the city of Boise to drop misdemeanor drug possession charges against a teen-ager who may have been wrongly linked with giving drugs to three children.

The charges were dropped against Michael Lee Clements, 18, on the condition that Clements not bring any claims against law enforcement authorities.

Clements was arrested last December as police were searching the home of a kindergarten child, who told them he had found the LSD he and two first-graders had taken on the kitchen floor at home.

Driver charged in accident

BLACKFOOT (AP) — A Shelley man has been charged with vehicular manslaughter and drunken driving in connection with an accident earlier this week that left a 10-year-old boy dead.

John James Bell, 20, will face a June 17 preliminary hearing on the felony charges, that also include leaving the scene of an accident. He was being held in the Bingham County Jail in lieu of \$50,000 bond.

Authorities said Bell was driving a motorcycle Tuesday evening when he hit Jimmy Colvin as the boy walked along the residential street.

Bell faces a maximum penalty of seven years in prison and \$7,000 in fines on the manslaughter charge and five years in prison and \$5,000 in fines on each of the other two charges along with suspension of his drivers license for one to five years.

Dumping upsets Indian tribe

FORT HALL (AP) — Shoshone-Bannock tribal officials are pressing for action to stop flagrant illegal dumping of trash and farming waste by others on the sacred sites of the Fort Hall Reservation.

"The problem seems to be getting worse," Tribal Land Use Commission member Emaline George said.

Mostly prunings, old furniture and full trash bags, the dumping has really begun to offend tribal leaders since piles of waste were recently discovered near old burial grounds, hunting and fishing areas and protected sites like the Cedars just west of the old Fort Hall townsite.

State receives AIDS grant

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare has received a \$328,000 grant from the federal Centers for Disease Control to establish new programs for prevention of acquired immune deficiency syndrome among Hispanics, American Indians and blacks.

Officials said district health departments, the Idaho AIDS Foundation and minority organizations will contract to provide programs and services under the grant.

In addition, the money will underwrite more extensive training for police and emergency personnel and increased investigation of AIDS cases.

Firm cleared of liability

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The private security firm of former Kootenai County Sheriff Rocky Watson has been cleared of liability for a 1984 fire that caused more than \$2 million in damage to a Coeur d'Alene lumber mill.

First District Judge James Michaud has ruled that no facts were provided to show the Watson Agency breached its duty to Idaho Forest Industries.

Idaho Forest Industries and its insurer, Harbor Insurance Co., sued the Watson Agency in May 1985 for \$2 million, alleging negligence that resulted in a fire at the Atlas Tie Mill.

The suit accused the Watson Agency of negligent hiring, retention, training and supervision of Mark Hammer, the security guard on duty the night of the fire. Kootenai County Fire Department Capt. Ron Sampert was quoted in court documents as saying it was his "guess" the fire was deliberately caused by Hammer, but Hammer has denied the allegation.

Jacobs enters guilty plea

BOISE (AP) — Victor M. Jacobs, charged with being one of nine people involved in a major drug-dealing ring in Idaho, pleaded guilty in U.S. District Court here Thursday.

Jacobs, who listed a Boise address, was ordered by U.S. District Judge Harold Ryan to spend six weeks at some sort of jail-type treatment facility for drugs. He also was placed on five years probation and fined \$50.

Jacobs is one of nine people arrested earlier and charged with conspiracy dating back to 1983 to manufacture and distribute a controlled substance, methamphetamine.

Funds set for Idaho trail

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House Appropriations subcommittee has approved nearly \$5 million for construction of the Idaho-Washington Centennial Trail.

The subcommittee action on Wednesday, which must still be endorsed by the full Appropriations Committee and both houses of Congress, earmarked over \$1.3 million toward the \$2.4 million cost of the trail in Idaho and \$3.6 million toward the \$7.4 million cost in Washington.

Court rules against pre-trial testimony

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court on Thursday struck down the use of testimony from a preliminary hearing in a later criminal trial where the witness was not available to testify.

Because of the rather informal and preliminary nature of a preliminary hearing, the use of such testimony is unfair to the defendant, the Supreme Court said in a 4-1 decision.

The ruling overturns the aggravated "battery" convictions of Richard Elsondo. He was convicted in a Canyon County case of beating his 74-year-old uncle, Cruse Galindo, and was sentenced to up to 14 years in prison.

Key witnesses in the trial were the victim, Elsondo's sister, Martha; and his daughter, Christina, witnesses to

the beating. Martha, the sister, testified at the preliminary hearing. But although subpoenaed, she failed to appear and testify at trial. Over the objections of the defense, her preliminary hearing testimony was admitted at Elsondo's trial and he was convicted.

The Court of Appeals, citing a 1981 ruling by the Idaho Supreme Court, ruled that was permissible.

The Supreme Court decided Thursday to overturn the 1981 decision and return to a 1989 standard barring the use of preliminary hearing testimony in criminal cases.

In a decision written by Chief Justice Allan Shepard, the majority said preliminary hearings are not full-scale trials, in which both sides stage

complete investigations and get into lengthy cross-examination.

Rather, they are "a truncated proceeding conducted in a relatively informal manner for which the purpose is to make a finding of probable cause, as contrasted with the establishment of guilt beyond a reasonable doubt."

At preliminary hearings, the defense has little reason to cross-examine prosecution witnesses, the majority said, since "only television lawyers customarily demolish the prosecution in the magistrate's court." It also would be considered a tactical error to engage in extensive cross-examination, since that might reveal more evidence the prosecutor could use later.

Justice Stephen Bistline agreed with the result, but said he would

have rejected the preliminary hearing testimony because in his opinion, the prosecution did not make a good faith effort to get the witness to testify.

In another decision released Thursday, the court unanimously reversed a 7th District Court decision in a Bingham County medical malpractice lawsuit and ordered the trial reinstated.

District Judge James Herndon granted judgment for two Blackfoot doctors sued by the parents of a 2½-year-old girl who died of what was later diagnosed as acute gangrenous appendicitis.

Herndon ruled that testimony of a Boise doctor could not be admitted because it was not established that he was board-certified in the specialties of pediatrics or surgery.

White supremacist says he's conspiracy target

BOISE (AP) — White supremacist Keith Gilbert says he isn't about to change his political philosophy or to apologize to anyone for it.

And he maintains that his prison sentence Thursday on four race-related charges was part of a conspiracy by his Kootenai County neighbors to get rid of him.

"I am the victim of a conspiracy by

these people to shut me up and get me out of town," he told U.S. District Judge Harold Ryan, shortly after he was sentenced to an extra 18 months in prison.

Ryan said he felt Gilbert was simply maintaining he was innocent of four charges of civil rights violations through threatening people, including children, because of their race.

"A jury has found you guilty," the judge said, and advised Gilbert he could appeal if he feels he is innocent.

Gilbert, 48, already is serving a state prison term that will run until at least 1992 on 35 counts of welfare fraud. The state alleged he collected welfare checks for his children for many months after he no longer cared for them.

Ryan ordered Gilbert to serve six months on each of three counts. Each sentence is to run consecutive to each other and after he completes his state sentences. A fourth, six-month sentence was made concurrent to the others.

U.S. Justice Department attorney Mike Williams, with the Civil Rights Division in Washington, D.C., recommended prison terms of one year each on the four counts.

Because of Gilbert's previous con-

duct, the maximum sentence was justified, he contended.

But Gilbert's attorney, as the defendant himself, maintained Gilbert didn't do anything wrong.

Gilbert was active in the white supremacist Aryan Nations organization headquartered at Hayden Lake.

Because of "a backlash" to the white supremacy activities, attorney Thomas McCabe maintained, the federal government decided to "get" Gilbert and other white supremacists.

"I'm convinced that if the government wants to get someone, and sends out enough feds and FBI agents, they will find something that violates federal law. They cast a very fine net and came up with nothing," McCabe said.

"I didn't do the things I was accused of doing," said Gilbert.

Police arrest suspect in double murder case

POCATELLO (AP) — A suspect in last weekend's double murder outside a Nampa convenience store was taken into custody Thursday afternoon near the Greyhound Bus Depot in Pocatello, police said.

David Leslie Card, 27, was picked up as he walked along a city street, Pocatello Police Chief Norm Probst said.

His mother, Helen Sullivan, was also taken into custody, but authorities said no charges were expected to be filed against her.

Card was wanted by Nampa Police in connection with the pre-dawn shooting of Eugene Morey, 42, and his wife Shirley, 40, as they sat in their car outside the store Sunday morning.

The Moreys, contract carriers for the Idaho Press-Tribune in Nampa, were shot in the neck and head numerous times as they folded their pa-

pers for delivery. Authorities said the gunman apparently walked up to the car and fired repeated shots through the windows.

Details of Card's arrest were sketchy, but Probst said the arrest came shortly after police received a teletype from Nampa authorities stating that Card was possibly traveling through the area in a 1977 pickup truck. Minutes later, police units spotted the truck parked at the Greyhound Bus Depot.

"There was no resistance from the suspect, and no weapon was found on him," Probst said. His vehicle has been impounded and a warrant will be obtained to search it.

The chief said Card would be initially interviewed by Pocatello police and then returned to Nampa after the warrant is processed.

Controversial project given second look

NAMPA (AP) — A second straight year of drought has breathed new life into the environmentally controversial proposal for a new dam on the Boise River at Twin Springs.

Directors of the Basin Project Board of Control, searching for options to increase needed agricultural water supplies, are taking a hard look at the project just below the confluence of the middle and north forks of the Boise River.

"I think it's the only thing to do," said Donald Lenz. "We should go ahead with it. I think it's long overdue."

But Bureau of Reclamation officials predicted another dam on the river would draw strong opposition from environmental groups.

A 1968 study of the proposed Twin Springs project, 42 miles east of Boise, showed its reservoir would inundate 7½ miles of the river's north fork and 14 miles of the middle fork.

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Official sees dry irrigation time ahead

BOISE (AP) — Despite three months of above-normal precipitation, Idaho farmers still can expect a dry irrigation season, said Hal Anderson of the state Department of Water Resources.

But, with three wet months — March, April and May — in a row, "it looks like we've broken the drought cycle," Anderson said, noting that until March, Idaho had had 16 consecutive months of below-normal precipitation.

This would not be a bad water year if Idaho had not had a drought in 1987, he said.

Southern Idaho's precipitation has been about 80 to 85 percent of normal, and northern Idaho's about 90 percent of normal, he said. However, because of the drought last year, reservoir levels are only 65 to 70 percent of normal in southern Idaho and 75 to 85 percent in northern Idaho.

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
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Shultz's peace trip results in frustration

Secretary of State George Shultz has completed what apparently will be his last trip to the Middle East in his effort to stir life into the American plan for an Arab-Israeli peace.

The Shultz shuttle arose from the hope of capitalizing on the shock of the Palestinian uprising in the West Bank. But it followed the course of the secretary's earlier diplomatic initiatives in the area in producing principally frustration.

Without Israel's consent to discuss an exchange of territory for peace, Shultz was unable to draw in Jordan. Without King Hussein's consent to prompt direct talks, he was unable to draw in Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir. Shultz is consoled chiefly by the thought that there is a value in sustaining American diplomatic involvement.

Shultz said the Israeli occupation of the West Bank is a "dead-end street." It is, The American government, most people elsewhere and perhaps half the Israeli electorate so believe.

But other Israelis believe that the occupation, even when it brings an uprising, is a difficult but manageable stage on the way to absorption or annexation of those territories.

Shamir speaks for those Israelis and perhaps for some others who believe that his hard-line approach is better suited than Shimon Peres's relative moderation to produce someday a suitable Arab negotiating partner. Shamir could be re-elected in November.

King Hussein helps him by playing hard to get. So does the Palestine Liberation Organization, which is using the uprising not to move toward a negotiation with the United States and Israel, but merely to firm up its position within Arab ranks.

Currently the Israelis are much taken with the notion of warming up relations with the Soviet Union.

The two countries remain far apart in their approaches to a Middle East peace, but that is not keeping Moscow from widening diplomatic contacts with Israel, allowing more Jewish emigration and promising new cultural and religious privileges to resident Soviet Jews.

In 1989, after elections in Israel and the United States, no doubt there will be a period of further testing of the diplomatic possibilities.

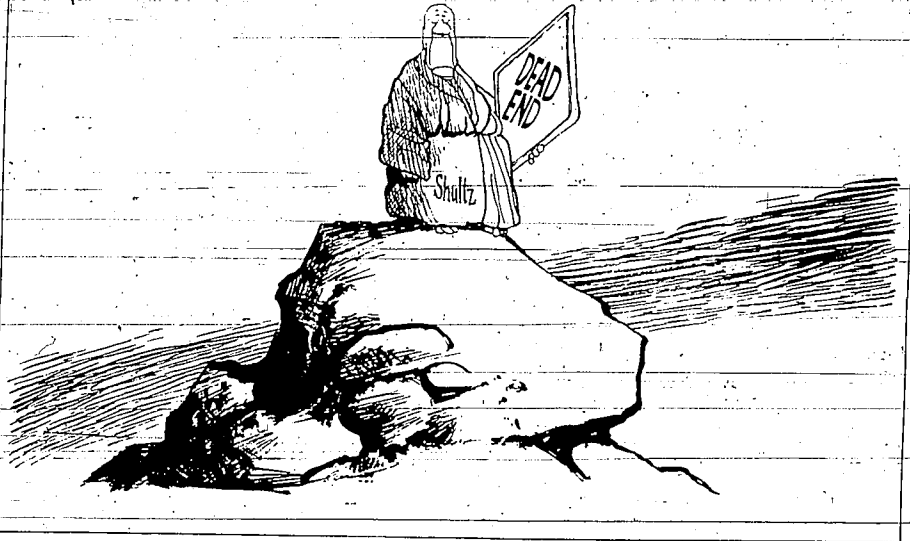
It should not be overlooked, however, that Israel wasted a very large opportunity during the Reagan years. In Ronald Reagan Israelis have had an American president deeply devoted to their welfare who offered Israel a solid and secure foundation on which it could have launched a bold peace bid.

Instead, the Shamir government used the Reagan time just to make huge advances in aid and bilateral cooperation with Washington, while spurning Washington's approach to peace.

This leaves Israel more dependent on its one foreign patron and more estranged from the Palestinians, necessarily its one partner in any reach for peace.

Control of waters should stay in Idaho

Your recent articles discussing my roll in passing the Swan Falls Agreement made for interesting political reading but missed the point entirely.

The issue is who should control the Snake River, the federal government or the people of Idaho. I think control over Idaho's rivers and streams belongs in Idaho. My opponent apparently disagrees. I voted to keep Idaho in control of Idaho's water. Stallings' actions have jeopardized Idaho's rights and the Swan Falls Agreement and left the control over the Snake River in question.

The Idaho Legislature passed the "Swan Falls Agreement." The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission refused to ratify the Idaho passed agreement. That sounds to me like federal control of Idaho's water! That is not what I or any other member of the Legislature agreed to when we voted for the "agreement" and I don't think Idaho's farmers and ranchers would agree either.

I stood on the Milner Dam recently. There was no downstream flow below the dam. For every foot of water FERC demands be turned downstream there will be a corresponding reduction in the amount of water flowing into the Milner-Gooding, Northside and Twin Falls canals, not to mention the pumping projects.

Control of the water is the issue. I believe the control ought to stay in Idaho where it belongs.

FBI program chills free use of libraries

The telephone rings — twice, three times. A voice interrupts:

"FBI"
"This is Charles Levendosky at the Star-Tribune. Can I have your name?"

"Why?"
"Why? I'm with the Star-Tribune and I have a few questions."

"What questions do you want to ask?"
"Excuse me, sir, let me first get your name, so I know whom I'm talking to."

"Well..."
"You have a problem with that?"
"Generally, we do."

The preceding is an excerpt from a telephone conversation I had last week with an agent from the Casper office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. I was trying to track down some details on the FBI's Library Awareness Program and whether that program had been instituted in Wyoming.

I quote portions of the conversation to make an obvious but often overlooked point: The modus operandi of intelligence agencies is secrecy.

Those who work for federal agencies like the CIA, the Intelligence Division of the FBI, and the National Security Agency should be the last people to ask to define the limitations of the rights guaranteed to American citizens by the First Amendment.

What attitude toward a free exchange of information can one expect from agencies whose people are even reluctant to give their names in telephone conversations with representatives of the press?

Yet, President Reagan in the fall of 1984 signed National Security Decision Directive 145, giving the National Security Agency authorization to limit access to all "sensitive but unclassified information." Generally, so-called "sensitive information" is available to anyone with a library card, or a modem and some computer savvy.

The definition of "sensitive information" was then expanded from a lean concept, "unclassified national security-related information" to a flabby paranoid's dream, "Other government interests...related but not limited to the wide range of government or government-derived economic, human, financial, industrial, agricultural, technological, and law enforcement information." Thanks to former National Security Advisor John M. Poindexter.

The subtle thrust of the FBI's "nosing around for spies in libraries" program is actually aimed at isolating sensitive but unclassified information.

The argument put forth in its recent report, "The KGB and the Library Target, 1962-Present," can be summed up this way: The Soviets have found

American libraries to be enviable sources of technological and scientific information.

The Soviets want that information. Although all the material in these libraries is unclassified, some of it is "sensitive" and can aid the Soviets' military efforts. Therefore, the FBI has aimed its program at surveillance of those who seek sensitive information. (Such researchers could be Soviet spies or in the employ of the Soviets.) The net effect is a chilling of the free use of libraries.

The FBI's Library Awareness Program creates, de facto, without naming it so and without removing material, a new secret classification — information for loyal Americans only. Be a loyal American, take an FBI agent to the library.

The next logical step will be to require a citizen to sign a loyalty oath before granting a library card. No doubt there are those prepared to argue that access to libraries is a privilege not a right — no matter what the First Amendment means.

Why all this secrecy? The president's directive 145 focused on the "mosaic theory" of secret information: Isolated bits of sensitive but unclassified data taken in the aggregate may reveal highly classified information.

The mosaic theory is not a new concept, though it may be relatively new to the world of spies and counterespies. Bits of data are like pieces of a jigsaw puzzle — they have odd juts and jags. They give clues about the bits of data which fit into them.

When a physical anthropologist projects the likely size of one of the families of early man based upon a mere fragment of a skull and a broken femur dug out some 700,000 years after they had settled into a layer of earth, that's the mosaic theory at work. Time and the earth's dark secrets can be revealed, even though only shards of data exist. It

doesn't matter how securely the earth has locked away its secrets.

More information than during any other presidency: Unclassified data already in the public domain has been classified. Once-declassified material has been reclassified. This administration's info-phobia is not merely unwise because it initiates a seriously anti-democratic tradition; it is ultimately self-defeating.

Think of the body of all information as a vast flat field. Imagine that we can draw two concentric circles to enclose some of the information: The inner circle to fence in classified data; the outer circle to fence in sensitive data. Sensitive information, by its nature and the revelations of the mosaic theory, is closely allied to classified information.

It's obvious that to quarantine more information in the inner, classified circle, the circumference of that circle must increase. When the circumference of the inner circle enlarges, then there is more room for information to touch the outer edge of that circle. Thus more data becomes known as sensitive, and thereby the outer circle must also increase its circumference.

The more sensitive material there is, the greater the opportunity to cross that inner fence into the realm of secret data. That's what the mosaic theory means.

The conclusion must be that the more information the government classifies, the more classified material will inevitably be revealed. The government defeats its own purpose by unjustly expanding what information is classified as secret.

It would be far wiser to severely narrow the circle of classified data — far wiser to risk freer access to new sensitive information so that we can continue our technological leadership through a nation unafraid of sharing ideas.

If you invite a nameless FBI agent to the library invite him to read — not to look over your shoulder.

Trade deficits improve but not as fast as first thought

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Commerce Department released new figures Thursday showing that the country's huge trade deficits are improving, but not as quickly as previously believed.

The department's new statistics for the first time in two years adjust the monthly numbers for normal seasonal changes in shipping patterns.

With seasonal adjustment, the trade deficit for March turned out to be \$11.9 billion, 22 percent higher than the previously reported \$9.7 billion figure.

The non-adjusted figure, the best showing in three years, had been hailed by the Reagan administration as solid evidence that the country's trade problems had finally turned around.

The administration said the new figures still show an improving trend, noting that the average monthly deficit for the first three months of the year was \$12.5 billion, compared to an average deficit of \$14.3 billion in the final three months of 1987, a decline of 13 percent.

The non-adjusted figures showed a sharp 21 percent drop from the fourth quarter to the first quarter.

"The trade deficit is on a downward trend, exports are increasing and it's a very encouraging picture in terms of the foreign trade deficit," said presidential spokesman Martin Fitzwater in an assessment that was echoed by private economists.

"The seasonally adjusted figures show that trade is slowly turning and that should be the story for the rest of the year," said Allen Sinai, chief economist of the Boston Co. "There is no reason to be discouraged by the new figures."

Commerce Undersecretary Robert Ortner said the revised figure had been anticipated, given the fact that U.S. export sales always climb sharply during March and the seasonal adjustment would take that into account.

Most government statistics are adjusted to factor out fluctuations which occur on a seasonal basis, such as the normal drop in housing construction during winter months. But the government was forced to abandon seasonal adjustments of the trade figures for two years because of problems with collecting the data on a timely basis.

With that problem solved, the government will resume reporting seasonally adjusted trade figures beginning with the April trade report, scheduled to be released next Tuesday.

Ortner said that the deficit so far this year is running at an annual average of \$150 billion, about what the administration has been expecting. The merchandise trade deficit hit a record \$170.3 billion last year.

The annual figure for 1987 was revised slightly from an original figure of \$171.2 billion. The 1986 figure was also revised to

show a deficit of \$155.1 billion. The changes in the annual totals reflected more complete data rather than any effect from seasonal adjustments which will not change annual totals.

The February deficit, which had originally been reported at \$13.8 billion, was raised to \$14.4 billion while the January deficit, originally reported as \$12.4 billion, was lowered by the seasonal adjustment to \$11.3 billion.

Government statisticians hope that the seasonal adjustments, by smoothing out the month-to-month volatility will ease some of the extreme reactions financial markets have had to the monthly trade figures.

Bad trade figures were blamed for adding to the pessimistic mood right before last October's stock market crash. Just two months ago the original report on the February deficit, which was much higher,

than had been expected, sent the Dow Jones industrial average down by 101 points, its fifth worst loss ever.

The seasonal adjustments will cover about 80 percent of U.S. trade. One major exception will be oil imports. The government said it could not detect any seasonal pattern to these shipments so they will not be adjusted.

Before 1986, the government had always adjusted the monthly import and export figures to smooth out seasonal shipping patterns. However, it was forced to abandon the practice when a tide of imports overwhelmed the ability of the Customs Service to process the trade information on a timely basis.

In some months, the so-called carryover of late information from previous months accounted for 50 percent of the new monthly total. That figure has now been reduced to around 3 percent per month.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate voted 69-27 Thursday to choke off a filibuster that has blocked action on a bill permitting the death penalty for major drug dealers who kill police officers.

The decision sets up a vote on the bill today that supporters and opponents agreed probably would result in approval.

"This sends the message that we're not going to tolerate the kind of warfare we're seeing on the streets of our cities," Sen. Alfonse D'Amato, R-N.Y., chief author of the bill, told his colleagues.

But opponents such as Sen. Daniel Biondi, D-Wash., derided the measure as an election-year attempt to appease public demands to do something about illegal drugs. They also noted the death penalty already exists in many states and it hasn't deterred drug pushers.

"Once again, we're going for an election-year slam dunk on drugs," Evans said, noting that a similar bill was proposed in 1986. "We're taking precipitous steps to indulge our own political vanity."

vice used in the Senate to end a filibuster. Opponents began an effort to talk the measure to death after D'Amato originally attached it as an amendment to the defense budget bill.

But D'Amato dropped his amendment on the defense bill two weeks ago, leading to Senate approval of that measure, in return for a promise by Senate Democratic leaders to allow floor action on a separate death penalty measure.

Senate approval would send the bill to the House, where it faces an uncertain future. It would go to the House Judiciary Committee, which has in the past steadfastly refused to send such a measure to the floor.

D'Amato's bill provides that the death penalty can be imposed on people who are convicted in federal courts of running a drug ring and who are then separately convicted of killing law enforcement officers or private citizens. It applies to federal laws, but could also be followed by individual states.

Before invoking cloture, the Senate killed, 65-31, a proposed amendment that would have imposed a penalty of life imprisonment without parole.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — A pair of wild pigs that wandered off course got hit by an F-16 fighter, forcing the pilot to eject as the jet veered off a runway and crashed at Jacksonville International Airport.

The pigs were killed. The \$16 million jet was destroyed late Tuesday.

Lt. Col. Sam Carter was rolling down the runway at 160 mph after landing when saw "a brown blur" and felt a bump before his Air National Guard jet veered toward a ditch and a stand of pines.

Carter, who has flown jets for more than 24 years, including sorties over Vietnam, ejected before the aircraft plowed into the woods. The remains of a pair of wild pigs were found scattered on the runway.

"It's a very inglorious way for a \$16 million aircraft to come to an end," said Carter, bruised but otherwise unharmed. "It was the first time I had ever bailed out."

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Bush, White House endorse expanded Medicare legislation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Newly passed legislation expanding Medicare to help the elderly deal with the costs of serious illness, received favorable mention from the White House and the right arm of Vice President George Bush on Thursday.

"The president is very concerned about long-term health care," he has said a number of times. "White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater said, "We don't want to forecast the final action on this bill, but we look favorably upon it."

Bush, who flew to Houston to campaign for the presidency, endorsed the measure in a statement issued a statement through his of-

ice.

"The legislation which passed yesterday will, for the first time since the founding of Medicare, extend benefits for our seniors," the vice president said. "Now they do not have to live in fear that their life's savings would be wiped out by a prolonged hospitalization."

The legislation, the first major expansion of Medicare in 23 years, is more ambitious than the proposal originally laid out by the president. However, Secretary of Health and Human Services Otis Bowen has said he will recommend that Reagan sign it.

The measure passed the Senate, 86-11, on Wednesday and was sent

to the White House.

The new legislation provides a kind of safety net for Medicare beneficiaries faced with extraordinary expenses from acute illnesses such as cancer.

It also introduces a general prescription drug benefit into the Medicare program for the first time, applying to those who run up more than \$600 a year in drug bills.

The expanded benefits are estimated to cost \$32.6 billion over the next five years and are to be paid by the potential beneficiaries through an assessment of \$4 a month on Medicare premiums of \$2 million covered individuals.

Protecting a witness costly chore

WASHINGTON (AP) — It costs an average of \$18,200 a year to protect a federal witness, and \$35,500 to conduct a state or federal wiretap, the Justice Department said Thursday in a report on crime and justice.

The study by the Bureau of Justice Statistics also found that it costs \$13,200 a year to house a federal prisoner and that crime victims who receive compensation under various state programs are awarded an average of \$3,000 a year.

The U.S. Marshals Service operates the witness security program for 5,200 people who testify for the government in major criminal cases and, facing possible reprisals, are given new identities and relocated at government expense.

Some \$46 billion in federal, state and local taxes was spent on both criminal and civil justice systems in the United States in 1985, the report said, referring to a figure published in an earlier study.

The data, based on information gathered from 1980 to 1986, was issued at a news conference where Attorney General Edwin Meese III underscored the impact of crime.



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Wright promises public response

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Speaker Jim Wright promised on Thursday a full public response to conflict-of-interest charges against him as the House ethics committee met to discuss the scope of its investigation.

"I am supremely confident, when all of it is seen out on the table in the sunlight it will be absolutely clear to everyone" that no House rules were violated, Wright, D-Texas, told reporters.

He said he was filing briefs Thursday with the committee, and had written and would soon release to the public a narrative account explaining his side.

The ethics committee last week began reviewing a complaint filed by Rep. Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., charging Wright with violating House rules. Common Cause, a non-profit group which pushes for tighter government ethics standards, also called for an investigation.

Citing published reports, Gingrich, a political foe, accused Wright of improperly lobbying U.S. officials and the late Egyptian President Anwar Sadat on behalf of oilmen with whom he had financial relationships.

The complaint also questioned the propriety of Wright's receiving royalties several times the standard rate for a book he wrote that was published by a friend and campaign contractor.

It also was reported earlier this week that Wright used one of his Capitol Hill staffers to help com-

pile the book, "Reflections of a Public Man." The employee's work on the project included a trip to Texas at taxpayer expense.

The speaker has begun work on another book. An aide collaborating with him on that project said it was being done outside of official work time.

Gingrich subsequently conceded that one of his aides worked on a book he wrote.

Wright's supporters have called the charges a Republican effort to deflect criticism of ethical lapses in the Reagan administration and the current controversy surrounding Attorney General Edwin Meese III.

Reagan blames drug use on the 1960s

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan said Thursday that America's problem with drug use in the workplace stems in part from students of the 1960s and 1970s who experimented with illegal substances and retained their "destructive drug habits."

In many ways, our country is still paying for the erosion of our values and the decline in self-responsibility that occurred in the 1960s and the 1970s," Reagan said in a speech to corporate leaders trying to drive drugs from the work site.

"The students of that period who used illegal drugs in high school or college have, in many cases, taken their destructive drug habits with them into their places of employment," Reagan said.

Drug users at the workplace, Reagan said, "pose a threat to their co-workers and represent a corporate crisis and a national catastrophe."

The president said that what was once defended as a victimless crime "is costing America billions of dollars a year in lost productivity."

In his speech to the National Con-

ference on a Drug-Free Workplace, Reagan did not advance any new steps to combat drug abuse.

The Cabinet-level National Drug Policy Board is deliberating proposals to take away student loans and deny drivers' licenses for anyone convicted of using drugs and impose federal penalties for drug dealing near public housing projects.

But sources say the panel is split, and that Education Secretary William J. Bennett is trying to steer the administration away from adopting such harsh proposals.

Reagan did not mention the panel's proposals.

"The president said there are 'limits on what can be accomplished' in fighting the supply of drugs, so the battle against drugs must be directed against the user."

"Because so long as there is a demand for illegal drugs, there will be a powerful financial incentive for drug traffickers to satisfy that demand," Reagan said.

The president said he believed there has been a major change of attitude in America "about drug use and

that "the momentum has shifted from those who celebrated the drug subculture to those who just say no and help others do the same."

"It is this change in attitudes that I believe makes total victory in the war on drugs not just possible but ultimately certain," Reagan said.

The National Drug Policy Board also is considering whether to endorse withholding federal aid from state and local governments, colleges and universities and other publicly financed institutions if they don't adopt the anti-drug proposals, which are still in the discussion stage.

Under current law, educational institutions receiving federal aid are required to certify that they have drug abuse prevention programs.

Attorney General Edwin Meese III chairs the policy board, but Bennett is trying to steer the Reagan administration away from some of the proposals, according to administration sources speaking on condition of anonymity.

A spokesman for the Department of Education, Loye Miller, declined comment on Bennett's views.

Policy board members are discussing having student loan recipients'

sign a document stating that being a convicted drug user can mean loss of the loan.

They also are discussing making it a federal crime to sell drugs near public housing, similar to the federal schoolyard law making it a federal crime to sell drugs in the vicinity of schools.

Another proposal under discussion at the policy board calls for state governments to refuse to issue first-time drivers' licenses to minors who have been convicted of drug use. The federal government would enforce this by threatening to withhold federal transportation funds.

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House OKs science budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House approved a two-year, \$4.2 billion spending plan for the National Science Foundation on Thursday after trimming the measure down to comply with President Reagan's request.

The bill, which continues programs that give government grants to researchers, was approved 405-5 and sent to the Senate.

The bill as approved by the Science and Technology Committee had envisioned \$210 million more spending than the president requested. By

voice vote, the House approved an amendment by Rep. Sherwood Boehlert, R-N.Y., to cut that amount.

The House also added a provision offered by Rep. James Traficant, D-Ohio, giving domestic firms an advantage in bidding against foreign companies for government science contracts.

The bill included language prohibiting the science foundation from spending money in cases in which employers have not taken steps to ensure a drug-free workplace.

Officials recommend testing for hepatitis B

ATLANTA (AP) — Federal health officials recommended Thursday that all pregnant women be tested for hepatitis and that newborns of infected women be vaccinated to prevent 3,500 babies a year from becoming potentially doomed hepatitis carriers.

The Centers for Disease Control, which in 1984 recommended type-B hepatitis tests for women in high-risk groups — such as injectable drug abusers and some venereal disease patients — said Thursday that many obstetricians don't know what the high-risk groups are, and the plan has not worked.

"It is now evident that routine screening of all pregnant women is the only strategy that will provide acceptable control" of mother-to-child hepatitis B transmission, the CDC said in its weekly report.

Each year in the United States, about 16,500 babies are born to mothers with hepatitis B infections, the CDC said. About 3,500 of those infants become chronic hepatitis B carriers, and it is estimated that more than 25 percent of them will die of liver cancer or cirrhosis.

The CDC's Immunization Practices Advisory Committee now recommends that pregnant women be tested for hepatitis B during an early prenatal visit. If a woman is infected, her baby should receive hepatitis B immunoglobulin, preferably within 12 hours of birth, to provide immediate protection, and hepatitis B vaccine within seven days and again at 1 month and 6 months.

Such a routine is between 85 percent and 95 percent effective in preventing a child from becoming a chronic hepatitis B carrier, CDC researchers said.

The CDC also recommends screening household members and sexual partners of infected women and vaccinating them if appropriate.

"Hepatitis B vaccine is the first human vaccine that can prevent both serious chronic disease and a uniformly fatal type of cancer," the CDC noted.

Still, vaccinating every newborn child in the United States for hepatitis B is not practical from a cost standpoint, said Dr. Mark Kane, a CDC hepatitis specialist. A child's vaccine regimen costs \$60 or more, he noted.

Birth control vaccine appears promising

NEW YORK (AP) — An experimental birth control vaccine shows promise for blocking pregnancy for six months without significant side effects, a preliminary study suggests.

The vaccine stimulated the immune system of women volunteers to disrupt the action of a key hormone needed for pregnancy, researchers said.

The vaccine's effectiveness could not be tested directly because the women had been surgically sterilized. But the immune system reaction appeared to be strong enough to work, researchers said.

The study is described in Satur-

day's issue of *The Lancet*, a British medical journal, by scientists from Australia, the World Health Organization, in Geneva, Switzerland, and Ohio State University, in Columbus.

Scientists in several laboratories have been developing long-lasting contraceptive treatments. Some experiments focus on injecting microspheres that release a drug at a controlled rate, providing contraception for up to six months.

Several foreign governments have approved use of match-stick sized capsules that are implanted just under the skin of a woman's arm under local anesthetic.

Airport suffers fire damage

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — A fire swept through the domestic passenger terminal at Sydney's airport early Thursday, but no injuries were reported.

The fire caused severe damage to a first-class lounge, the terminal's roof and a baggage check-in area and forced hundreds of workers and passengers to flee the building, a spokesman for Australian Airlines said.

The blaze started in an air-conditioning duct and caused millions of dollars in damage, said the spokesman, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Flights were delayed for up to three hours by the blaze and eight were canceled. The cause of the fire was being investigated.

Czechoslovak to stand trial

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — A Czechoslovak Catholic activist who published underground religious literature will stand trial next week on charges of subversive activity, an emigre source reported Thursday.

The trial of Ivan Polansky, 62, will take place in Banska Bystrica, central Slovakia, on Monday, said the source who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Polansky, who reportedly suffered a heart attack before his arrest, has been in custody for six months. The Czechoslovak Committee for the Unjustly Prosecuted said Polansky has been denied transfer to a prison hospital.

He was accused in the indictment of "publishing and distributing unofficial religious and other literature." If convicted, he could receive a maximum of 10 years in prison.

Embassy reacts to threats

BEIJING (AP) — The U.S. Embassy issued an "urgent notice" to Americans on Thursday after China warned that terrorists from an other country may be planning attacks on Americans living in the Chinese capital.

The unprecedented warning caused the U.S. Embassy to issue an alert to the 1,500 Americans living in China that they should take measures to protect themselves, said U.S. consular official Dewey Pendergrass.

The embassy said high-level Chinese public security officials told the embassy Wednesday of possible terror attacks on Americans by an unspecified third country. The Chinese did not give specific information about the terrorists or what kind of attacks might be planned.

Violence mounts in Israel

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israeli soldiers killed a Palestinian and wounded four on Thursday, one of the most violent recent days in the occupied lands, and Arabs mounted another general strike to begin the seventh month of their rebellion.

At least 203 Palestinians have been killed and more than 5,000 injured since the uprising began Dec. 8, and 5,000 Arabs are in prison. An Israeli soldier and a Jewish settler also have been slain.

Stores were closed and public transport halted Thursday in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip, and in Arab east Jerusalem, but the army said many Palestinians ignored the general strike.

A 40-year-old Arab motorist died of a heart attack after his car was stoned as he passed the Dheishir-refugee camp near Bethlehem, the army said. Israeli radio said camp residents stoned several Arab-owned cars, apparently to enforce compliance with the strike.

Cave-in destroys

Yugoslav homes

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — Eight homes were destroyed in the Ribnjak mining town of Tuzla when a 65-foot-wide hole opened beneath them and escaping gas caught fire, a newspaper reported Thursday.

No injuries were reported. A dozen people fled their homes before they were destroyed by the 50-foot-deep hole in the salt-mining town 90 miles west of Belgrade, the daily Vecernje Novosti reported.

Escaping gas caught fire at the bottom of the sink hole when it formed around noon Wednesday.

"It happened with a bang and when I looked through the window all I could see was dust," Mensur Jasarevic, a Tuzla citizen, said.

Ibrahim Imamovic, a professor in Tuzla, said underground water dissolved salt deposits causing the earth to cave in.

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Contras reject Sandinista government's proposal for peace

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) - The leftist Sandinista government and the U.S.-backed rebels exchanged proposals Thursday detailing concrete measures and timetables for disarmament and for democratic reforms.

The rebels known as Contras rejected parts of the government's proposal, including the key rebel demand that the government grant civil liberties before the rebels give

up their weapons.

They objected to the Sandinista plan for amnesty, the definition of separation of party and state and the lack of a definite time schedule for allowing democratic freedoms.

"These are fundamental for the (Nicaraguan) Resistance and makes the difference between an agreement or no agreement," rebel leader Alfredo Cesar told journalists.

The Contras maintained that Thursday's talks, which were to continue into the evening, were the last.

The government proposal, presented Thursday morning by Gen. Humberto Ortega, called for a gradual political amnesty, with the first 200 prisoners freed after the signing of an agreement and the last coming on Sept. 28.

The rebel proposal called for all

of the prisoners to be freed within five days of an agreement. Contra leader Aristides Sanchez said it would be a "show of good faith."

The rebels said there are 4,207 political prisoners, while the International Red Cross, seen here as sympathetic to the government, put the figure at 3,324.

The Contras also demand the armed forces totally be separated from the ruling Sandinista Nation-

al Liberation Front in name as well as actions. The government agreed to the "separation and independence of the powers of the state."

The rebels want a clear timetable

for enacting political freedoms, including complete pluralism, freedom of expression, the right to strike, electoral reforms and guarantees of a mixed economy.

Ambassador's home fired upon

LIMA, Peru (AP) - Leftist guerrillas attacked the U.S. ambassador's residence with mortar fire Thursday, damaging the roof with one blast but causing no injuries, embassy and police officials said.

Ambassador Alexander Watson was eating breakfast in the two-story, colonial residence and his wife and infant daughter also were at home when a 60 mm mortar shell exploded at 6:30 a.m., embassy spokesman Jago Escodi said.

"The ambassador thought at first it was the backfire of a car. It was not a big explosion," Escodi said.

It was the third attack at U.S. government buildings in Lima since April 1986.

Police said three members of the pro-Cuba Tupac Amaru Revolutionary Movement fired three mortar rounds at the building and escaped in a waiting car.

"We heard about two. They found bits and pieces of one on the roof and one elsewhere on the grounds," Escodi said.

He told The Associated Press that the exploding shell destroyed a ramp and lighting fixture on the roof. He said there were no injuries and no other damage.

The ambassador's residence is located on the edge of downtown, on tree-lined Arequipa Avenue, one of the city's main boulevards. The building and gardens are enclosed behind a 10-foot-high concrete wall.

Peruvian police frequently guard the outside of the wall and embassy security agents patrol the zone in vehicles.

Police said the mortar was fired from a block away.

In April 1986, Tupac Amaru rebels exploded a car containing 130 pounds of dynamite at the side of the rear wall enclosing the compound. The explosion damaged the wall but caused no damage to the residence.

The ambassador then was David Jordan. Watson has held the post since late 1986.

Escodi said the guerrillas Thursday left fliers commemorating the death of a pro-Cuba guerrilla leader, Luis de la Puente, who launched his insurgency on June 9, 1965. He was killed in combat four months later and his group broken up.

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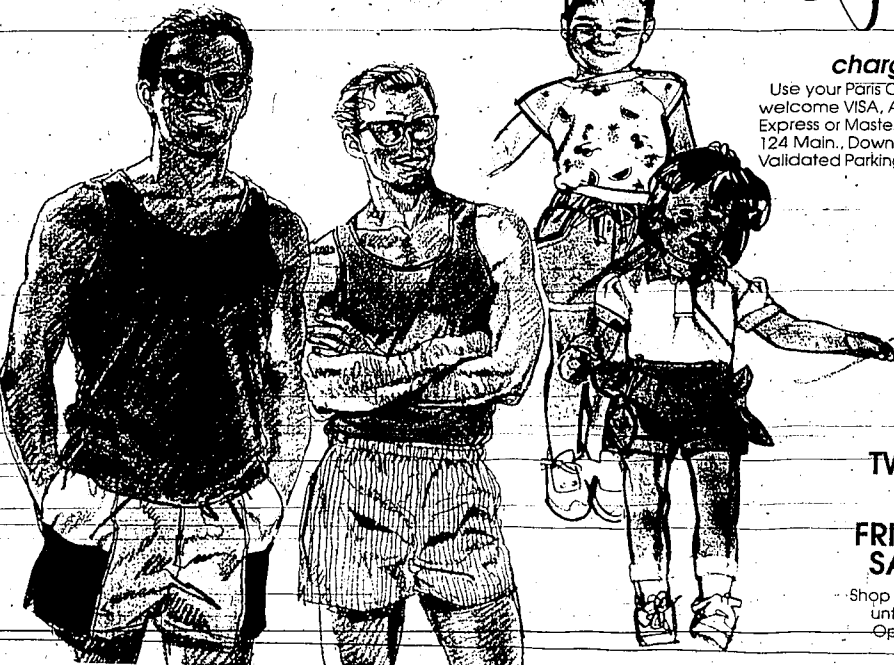
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South Africa will reimpose emergency

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) - The national state of emergency is expected to be reimposed for a third year, government television reported Thursday night.

The South African Broadcasting Corp. said Law and Order Minister Adriaan Vlok had bricked a presidential advisory session on the security situation in the country, indicating that the state of emergency and detention without trial remained necessary.

The state of emergency expires August 5. Vlok said without such measures revolutionaries would create chaos and cause suffering for millions of people.

The statement came the day after the biggest and longest general strike ever waged among blacks had ended.

Despite the banning of apartheid groups and restrictions on their leaders, more than 2 million blacks stayed away from work.

Arab leaders support PLO

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) - An Arab summit called to discuss the PLO-guided rebellion against Israeli rule in the West Bank and Gaza Strip ended Thursday with agreement by rich Arab nations to subsidize the uprising.

Eight delegation chiefs, including the four wealthiest nations, devised a formula in a 24-hour meeting for subsidies to the Palestinians and to Syria and Jordan, which are in the forefront of the confrontation with Israel.

In a communique issued at the end of the three-day summit, the 21 Arab League members again designated the Palestine Liberation Organization as the "sole legitimate representative" of the 5 million Palestinians.

They also agreed to oppose any peace initiative that excludes PLO participation and to demand an international peace conference giving equal status to all concerned parties, including the PLO.

Sources close to the delegates said Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, Qatar and the United Arab Emirates agreed to "specific sums" that would be provided for the uprising and to Syria and Jordan.

Chief PLO spokesman Bassam Abu Sharif told reporters, however, that the Arab leaders agreed to keep the precise sums a secret.

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Cattle association forms political action group

TWIN FALLS - Idaho settlement have lacked a degree of political focus. But Thursday, the Idaho Cattle Association became the first agricultural organization in the state to form a political action committee.

Members of the association's board of directors decided putting their money where their mouths are may yield them better results.

"There are some folks in the Legislature that take agriculture for granted," said ICA Executive Director Gary Glenn. Forming an ICA-PAC will help ensure

that legislators who are supportive of the cattle industry will be re-elected, he said.

Political action committees exist for the sole purpose of contributing money to political campaigns in the name of a specific issue or industry-oriented group.

"Agriculture should be able to support candidates who support them like other sectors of business do," he said.

Glenn pointed out that only two incumbent legislators were defeated in the primary last month, and both were ICA members. Rep. Waldo Martini was defeated by Maxine Bell in District 24, and Rep. Jerry Cullen was narrowly beaten by Rep. Gary Robbins in District 25.

Glenn asserted that, at least in the Dis-

trict 25 race, "if the cattle association had had a PAC, the results of that election would have been different."

Contributions will be collected from ICA members and from cattle-related businesses.

Candidates will receive donations solely on the basis of their support for cattle industry issues, and not their party affiliation. The ICA-PAC board will have active members of both the Democratic and Republican parties. Contributions will be limited to state-level races for now.

The board also voted to support retention of the state investment tax credit. A petition drive is proceeding to get a measure on the November election ballot to

eliminate the investment tax credit. The ICA opposes repeal because the credit is a useful tool for cattlemen, it encourages investment and more jobs, and the state revenue generated from its repeal would be minimal, said Jim Little, a cattleman from Emmett.

"We will be encouraging Idahoans not to sign the petition to even put it on the ballot," Glenn said.

The ICA board also voted unanimously to take the following actions and positions: Oppose repeal of the Hatch Act, a law that prohibits federal employees from running for public office, or being involved in politics beyond the precinct level. The bill to repeal it has passed the U.S. House and

is in the Senate now.

Urge the National Cattle Association to push Congress for repeal of the "Beer tax." This tax is part of the new tax law that changed pre-production agricultural expenses from being immediately deductible to being capitalized and then deducted over several years. The new system makes farmers wait longer to get their money back from the government.

The committee also voted to urge Idaho's entire congressional delegation to co-sponsor the bill.

Support reinstatement of credit for high school vocational agriculture classes upon admission at all Idaho state universities.

Beer will quench softball thirsts

RUPERT - Rupert softball fans will be able to drink beer at the city's adult softball diamond this summer.

The city council unanimously approved at Tuesday's meeting an exception to the town's ban on alcoholic beverages in public parks. The vote will allow beer at Fluke Park during scheduled adult softball games.

Roger Manning of Rupert, the only person who showed up to debate the issue, opposed the motion, saying the city was "taking a dangerous substance - alcohol - and making it easier to get."

"I would just hate to see our city expanding its use," Manning said. Mayor Bill Whitton said the council was "not authorizing rowdiness or drunkenness at the games and that the situation would be closely controlled."

The measure was first proposed to the council last year by the Mini-Casias Men's Softball Association.

After a trial period last summer, the council has now approved the motion for the remainder of 1988. If there is a significant increase in the amount of rowdiness at the games resulting from the beer, the council may refuse to renew the measure for next summer, said Councilman Dwynelle-Altred.

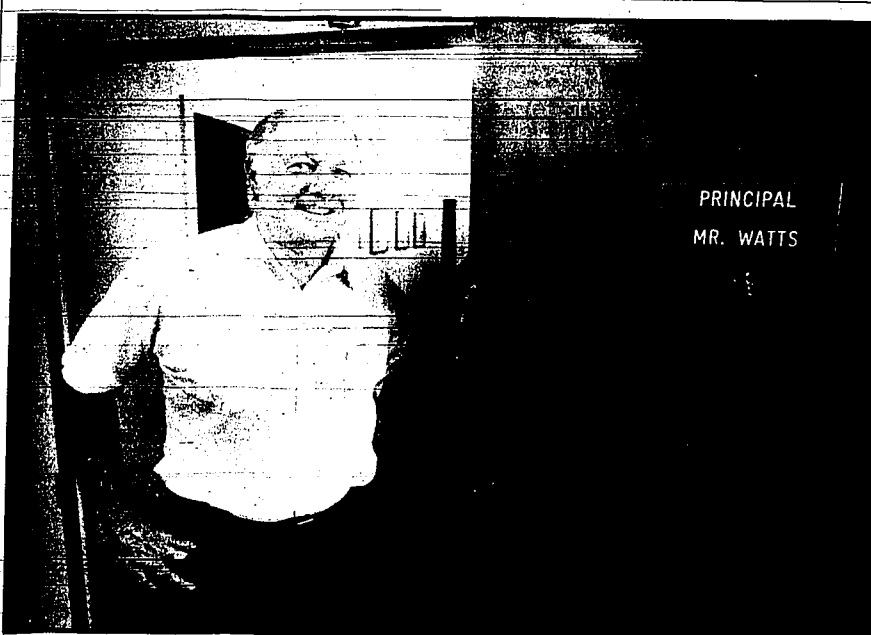
The measure is expected to draw tourism dollars to the city that would otherwise have been spent in nearby Burley, which has no restrictions on drinking beer in parks.

Organizations sponsoring the softball games will be required to register the events with the city's recreation department and leave a \$50 deposit to cover costs for cleaning. No glass containers will be allowed.

Besides Fluke Park, Big Valley Park also is affected by the motion. That park, primarily used for youth baseball games, will be open to beer only during the one adult game that will be registered with the city.

In other action, the council approved two more permits for fireworks vendors, bringing the total number to five. The permits are

Watts retires from Robert Stuart

TWIN FALLS - It's hard to imagine 600 junior high students keeping a secret. Especially a plump-juicy secret. Yet students at Robert Stuart managed to take retiring Principal Jack Watts completely by surprise when they held a farwell assembly in his honor.

"You should have seen his face," says Diane Clark, a secretary at Robert Stuart. "We told him there was a problem in the gym, and we needed his help. When he walked in, the whole school was sitting there, and the band started playing 'Hail to the Chief.'"

Jack Watts has been the "chief" at Robert Stuart Junior High since the school opened in 1963. After 25 years at Robert Stuart, Watts says, "There comes a time for retirement, and I'm at that point."

Watts' retirement marks the end of a career in education spanning 37 years. His career began in Texas where he taught school for five years. "He's proud to be a Texan," says Clark. "Sometimes his friends call the office

and ask to speak to the governor of Texas."

Watts moved to Idaho in 1956 and spent three years as vice principal at the old O'Leary Junior High on Shoshone Street. He then served as Morningstar's principal for four years before transferring to Robert Stuart.

"I've been in this business for a long time," Watts says. "Nothing ever stays the same of course. The kids have become more sophisticated because of TV and societal changes. I think it's more difficult to be a teacher or principal now because our mistakes are more visible."

Any mistakes made by Watts seem to be inconsequential - his employees praise him with gusto.

"He was my vice principal when I was in junior high," says Nancy Larson, a Robert Stuart secretary. "Now I've worked for him, too, and I can say he is just fantastic. He works so well with the kids. We all have a special relationship, and it's going to be hard to see him go."

Many teachers and administrators attribute the close bond among Robert Stuart's

staff to Watts' leadership.

"He's been wonderful to work for. He is so positive," says Arlene Teater, a world geography teacher at Robert Stuart for 21 years.

"We've never had to deal with internal problems that other staffs do," says Clark. "We know we can go directly to him with a problem and fix it, so we end-up not having the problems."

Teater and Clark are two of nine employees who plan to leave Robert Stuart along with Watts. "Most of the people leaving are retiring," says Clark. "After being with Jack all these years, they are going to go when he does."

Watts' long record of dedication has inspired a campaign among employees, parents and students to rename the school "Jack Watts Junior High."

The School Board rejected our proposal, but we don't want to see the issue die," says PTA Co-President Barbara Allen. "We feel they were too involved with the creation/issuance of the time to give it complete consideration. We're going to try again in July."

Study reports on ski visitors

SUN VALLEY - Most winter visitors to this resort community have been here before, and when they come back they spend more money, according to a study conducted by a Seattle marketing firm.

The results of the study by the Sun Valley-Ketchum Chamber of Commerce, along with the firm's recommendations for future Sun Valley-area marketing plans, were recently delivered to the Sun Valley-Ketchum Chamber of Commerce.

The study is the latest effort by Sun Valley to try to reclaim its once-prominent place in the national ski scene.

While the 66-page report contains few surprises, John Wells, a property manager and president of the Sun Valley-Ketchum Chamber of Commerce, said it provides useful information for advertising strategies.

"More than anything else, it substantiated ... the assumption that a lot of us had made over the course of our business careers here in Sun Valley about our visitors," Wells said.

"It brought more clearly ... that we have to continue to work hard, and work harder in the future to retain our repeat guests," he said. "We definitely have to work harder, I believe, at introducing Sun Valley to new skiers."

Sun Valley Co. management has come under fire for a slide in the number of skier days since 1982. A recent Boise State University College of Business study buttressed charges of lax management.

The number of skier days, after exceeding 600,000 in the 1981-82 season, slipped to 558,000 in 1986-87. The number, however, edged back up last season, totaling about 530,000, Wells said.

After conducting 939 interviews in January, February and March in Lookout Restaurant on Bald Mountain and Cincobbi Square in Ketchum, MACS found that 64.6 percent of Sun Valley's winter visitors had been there before. The average repeat visitor had been to the resort 13.3 times.

Meurville, the first-time visitor was found to travel less frequently and spend less on vacations than the repeat visitor.

MACS also developed a profile of the "typical" winter visitor to Sun Valley.

Hagerman council will discuss possible regular police patrol

HAGERMAN - A workshop has been scheduled to figure out an agreeable contract for police patrol in Hagerman.

City council members will meet at 8 p.m. Tuesday at city hall with Gooding County Sheriff Robert Aja and the Gooding County commissioners to renew a police contract.

At issue is the desire by city officials to have an assigned deputy and a regular patrol around school during busy traffic hours. Hagerman, which has no police force, is serviced by a Gooding County deputy assigned to the town but who lives in Bliss. City officials contend the arrangement does not provide Hagerman with continuous service.

But Aja has said Hagerman already has 24-hour protection from other deputies as well, and that the town's payment of \$1,500 per

month to the county is not enough for additional coverage.

At the Hagerman City Council meeting Tuesday, Aja and Commissioner Robert Tupper were unable to agree with council members on details of the contract. They did agree that more time and discussion are needed. "We just want to reach a satisfactory agreement on both sides," Mayor Merle Owlesley said.

In other business, Owlesley said the city is sending \$250 to the State Department of Lands for a sewer pipeline extension permit. Plans are to extend the pipeline about 140 feet into Snake River. Now, the pipeline ends at the river's edge and a chemical reaction in the stagnant water causes an unpleasant odor for nearby residents.

Owlesley said the city will advertise for bids on the extension as soon as the permits are granted. The council accepted a bid to

pave streets behind the city park and in front of the senior citizens center, and seal-coat several blocks of Lake Street. The winning bid of \$3,355 was from Winn and Co. of Buhl.

"The council decided to buy a loud-speaker system for the city park. Owlesley said people giving speeches during the recent Fossil Days could not be heard well. The new system will be kept at city hall for future city events or for rent to other groups.

"The city filed to renew its claim to all the water from Potter Springs. Cost for the spring's output of five cubic feet-per-second is \$500 plus a permit fee of \$50.

On June 28, work will resume on East Avenue to finish the project of installing a perforated pipe to collect ground water draining from farm area above the city. The construction work is scheduled to be completed in early August.

TWIN FALLS - Sen. Steve Symms says Dane Watkins will turn into a good candidate for the U.S. House of Representatives.

"Dane is going to develop into a very good candidate and has potential to be a good representative," Symms said. Watkins is campaigning against Rep. Richard Stallings for Idaho's 2nd District.

"When it goes Democrat, they think they can fool other areas into electing Democrats, Symms said. Symms already threw his support behind Watkins with a fund-raising letter last week. In the letter, Symms said Watkins helped craft the Swan Falls water rights legislation.

"That point has been disputed by parties who did the actual work to put the agreement together."

"He cited Stallings' opposition to funding the Contras in Nicaragua as a 'liberal' vote, but wouldn't say whether Stallings' position was inconsistent with Idaho's residents."

"It was out of line with what was good for America," the junior senator said. "Sometimes you have to explain a vote to constituents. It's a matter of perspective with what's wanted by constituents."

Symms also said he will probably vote against a wilderness bill supported by Gov. Cecil Andrus and Sen. James McClure.

"Wilderness is a policy that keeps people out," Symms said. "I probably will vote against the bill, asking for language that will release land under consideration but not approved for wilderness sooner."

"I think the day will come when people will look at all this wilderness nonsense and say what we need to do is manage all this land," Symms said.

He said wilderness is a land that keeps people away from forests, a claim he has not made and that is disputed by environmentalist groups. Placing more restrictions on forest land is "pathologically irrational," he said.

"I happen to be on the side of that issue that we have enough wilderness in Idaho," he said.

Prosecutor wants crackdown on porn

WASHINGTON (AP) - Utah's top federal prosecutor has urged Congress to crack down on "dial-up" parveys and obscenity on cable television by supporting a new anti-pornography bill proposed by the Reagan administration.

U.S. Attorney Brent Ward said in a statement before the Senate Judiciary Committee Wednesday that the bill would prohibit for the first time the broadcast of obscenity by cable and subscription television.

Ward said the new bill would give U.S. attorneys the capability to prosecute TV obscenity cases the

same way they now handle those involving printed materials, movies and video cassettes.

He said the bill would strengthen existing federal law by making obscene dial-up a felony, rather than a misdemeanor offense. Sexually indecent calls, rather than obscene ones, would remain a misdemeanor.

"I speak to you now as the only U.S. attorney so far to attempt to prosecute a dial-up-porn company," Ward said. "The fact that I have been alone in bringing such prosecutions, however, is not so much a sign of disinterest by the Depart-

ment of Justice as it is a sign that the law has been inadequate."

A recent attempt to cure the inadequacy was passage of the Helms-Bliley Bill, signed recently by President Reagan.

"However, even Helms-Bliley is seriously deficient in one important aspect," he said. "Under this law, obscene dial-up messages will be punishable only as misdemeanors."

When the Helms-Bliley Bill was studied by Congress, the Justice Department strongly urged that dial-up-porn be punishable as a felony, he said.

Mecham aide says loan was common knowledge

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) - A former top aide to Evan Mecham testified at Mecham's criminal trial Thursday that it was "general knowledge" that he borrowed \$350,000 to finance his 1986 campaign.

Edith Richardson, who was special assistant to the former governor, told the jury. "I felt it was general knowledge... It was just common knowledge that there was a loan."

The defense witness testified she learned, probably early in 1987 although she was not certain when, that developer Barry Wolfson had provided the money.

"Everyone knew... anyone in the campaign," that there was a major loan, Mrs. Richardson testified.

Other witnesses in the trial have testified that they may have had some general knowledge of a loan, but that they did not know Wolfson was the source.

One previous defense witness, Dean Sellers, who signed a \$10,000 note to back part of the loan, testified Wednesday he had assumed at the time that it was coming from a bank and that he did not know Wolfson's role.

Former top Mecham aide Donna

Carlson, a prosecution witness, testified last week she was "distressed" when she learned about the loan in August 1987.

Evan and Willard Mecham, who was his brother's 1986 campaign treasurer, are charged with concealing the loan on financial statements required by the state.

Meanwhile, Thursday attorney took a formal deposition from Rose Mofford during a closed "session" at her home. The deposition was to be used in lieu of Mrs. Mofford's testimony in court, because she still has been suffering ill effects from a mild concussion.

Collision kills Heidi Hempleman

WENDELL - The daughter of Twin Falls County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman was killed early Thursday when his head-on by a car traveling the wrong way on Interstate 84.

Heidi Hempleman, 20, of Twin Falls, died after being taken to the St. Benedict's Family Medical Center in Jerome, Idaho State Police said. The collision occurred around 12:30 a.m., and Hempleman died less than an hour later.

Lewis Howard, 60, of Gooding, was driving his 1978 Ford four-

door east in the westbound lanes of Interstate 84 near Wendell when he struck Hempleman's car, a 1981 Subaru. Police used extrication equipment to remove Howard, who was taken to the Magic Valley Regional Medical Center.

Hospital officials Thursday afternoon listed Howard in serious condition.

Cpl. Pat Mooney, the investigating officer, said officials administered blood-alcohol tests to Howard after he was taken to the hospital. The results had not been

obtained by late Thursday afternoon, and the accident remained under investigation.

Police closed the highway's westbound lanes for approximately one hour to clean up the wreckage. The fast lane remained closed until 3:45 a.m.

Hempleman was wearing her seatbelt, police said. Howard was not wearing his seatbelt and was pinned under the dashboard.

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Seattle cuts number of bused students

SEATTLE (AP) — The number of students bused for integration in Seattle will be halved by 1989, school officials said Thursday after the first major city to desegregate its classrooms without a court order adopted a system to educate many pupils closer to home.

Seattle is adopting a cluster-school concept designed after one instituted in Cambridge, Mass., in 1981. The plan divides Seattle into eight racially balanced clusters, each with six to 10 schools from which parents have a "controlled choice" of schools.

Michael Alves, a Massachusetts consultant who has worked on similar efforts across the country, pronounced the plan "first-rate" after it was adopted unanimously Wednesday

night by the city's seven-member school board.

"It will maintain desegregated schools, it should work in a way that is fair, and if I think it is constitutionally defensible," Alves said.

Seattle's black civic leaders were among those who had to be convinced that changing the 10-year-old busing plan would not mean a return to segregation.

Lacy Steele, president of the Seattle chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said he was impressed with the work done by Superintendent William Kendrick and his planners, who spent two years on the cluster program.

The plan "should result in less black students being bused because

they have borne the brunt of the busing," Steele said. "We say, on the surface, it seems to be a fair plan."

Some schools will be closed and other programs consolidated to save as much as \$2 million the first year and as much as \$3.7 million annually in future years, Kendrick said.

Parents in each neighborhood would pick from two middle schools and two high schools. Several other schools still would be available to the whole city at each level, with "magnet" programs attracting those desiring special approaches or concentrations of study.

Depending on families' choices, the plan may be totally voluntary, said Donna Dunning, director of district relations. If not, school assignments

will be made on a first-come, first-served basis.

Administrators say at most, 4,000 students will be bused for desegregation, compared with between 10,000 and 11,000 now riding buses to keep a racial balance.

Changes in the 10-year-old desegregation plan also were needed because the minority population in the schools climbed from 35 percent in 1977 to 52.5 percent this school year, partly reflecting a white exodus to private and suburban schools, officials said.

"It's a plan that many people said needed major surgery," Kendrick said. "We will change the perception that kids are bused all over the country. We will see kids coming back into the public schools from the private schools," he said.

INEL keeps idle reactor on standby

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — An idle reactor at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory will be kept on standby — as researchers decide whether it should be converted into a cancer treatment center.

The Power Burst Facility, a research reactor proposed as the source of a neutron beam for bombarding deadly brain tumors, will not be shut down during the assessment of the Boron Neutron Capture Therapy program.

But the program has been restructured to incorporate recommendations from a team of medical experts at the National Cancer Institute.

INEL will continue the cancer research despite the team's critical report in April, Department of Energy officials said Thursday. That team said the reactor should not be converted nor should human clinical tests be conducted until preliminary research is done.

The Energy Department approved a scaled-down program aimed at determining whether the therapy is promising enough to warrant reactor conversion and tests on humans.

"At least we're officially recognized now as a program," said Peter Dirkman, the government's special programs director at INEL.

Boron Neutron Capture Therapy involves loading a tumor with a boron compound, which absorbs neutrons readily. As the neutrons "excite" the boron atoms, they emit radiation that is usually lethal to tumor cells without damaging surrounding healthy tissue. The main tumor targeted is glioblastoma multiforme, which is the most deadly brain tumor.

INEL researchers will test the boron compounds and then send them to Brookhaven National Laboratory in New York, where the compounds will be tested on dogs with brain tumors. Federal officials will review the

overall program next year to determine if conversion of the nuclear reactor is justified. It costs about \$2.25 million to keep the research reactor on standby but would cost about \$60 million to decontaminate and decommission it.

Language in the Senate's 1989 Energy and Water appropriation bill would direct DOE to carry out the research after meeting the cancer institute's concerns.

Idaho Sen. James McClure, who inserted the language in that bill, said it helped DOE decide to continue supporting the program.

Woman will face trial on child abuse charge

OREM, Utah (AP) — An Orem woman charged with abusing her 6-year-old son by starvation was bound over for trial in district court after a physician testified the boy's growth has been permanently stunted.

Fourth Circuit Judge Joseph Dimick ruled there was probable cause to hold Loretta Larsen for trial on one count of second-degree felony child abuse and one count of class A misdemeanor child abuse following a preliminary hearing Wednesday.

Larsen, 33, was ordered to appear for arraignment Friday before 4th District Judge Ray M. Harding.

Dr. Moreno Robbins, a Provo pediatrician, performed a physical on the boy three days after his mother's April 5 arrest by Orem police and found that the youth was severely malnourished.

Robbins testified during the preliminary hearing that it never will be possible for the boy to obtain his normal body size and weight.

The 6-year-old's weight — 31 pounds — was equivalent to the size of a 2½-year-old, and his height — 38 inches — equal to that of a 2-year-old, Robbins told the judge.

Larsen's ex-boyfriend, Kim Shaw, testified that the boy, one of

five Larsen children, went without food for up to three days at a time and was forced to eat dog food.

The boy and a 3-year-old daughter were with their mother when she was arrested. The two children were taken to Orem Community Hospital for examinations and released to the state Division of Family Services that day.

All five Larsen children remain in state custody. Her other children, all boys, are 12, 9 and 7 years old.

Shaw said Larsen couldn't decide why she treated the one boy differently than her other four children, but she told him one reason was because her mother and stepfather spoiled the boy while she was in prison.

Larsen gave birth to the boy while in prison on a drug-related conviction in 1982. He was in his grandmother's custody until Larsen was paroled in 1983.

Shaw contacted police April 2. He said that day Larsen asked him to leave the house for several days, but he decided to move out permanently.

He went to a neighbor's house, informed them of the situation and then set up an appointment to talk with police later that afternoon.

Council seeks to ban any additional dams

BEND, Ore. (AP) — Additional dams on the Klamath River in Oregon and Kootenai River in Montana, both home to rainbow trout, would be banned under a Northwest Power Planning Council plan.

The council's proposal would protect all rivers in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and western Montana with important fisheries, including about 12,000 miles of Idaho streams.

The council held the hearing on the banks of the Deschutes River upstream from two Portland General Electric Co. dams that destroyed salmon and steelhead runs before the Warm-Springs-Indian-Reservation.

The council's intent is to prevent

similar destruction from occurring elsewhere in the region, said Norma Paulus, Oregon's sole representative on the council.

If the proposal by the council is approved in August, Kootenai dam and a similar project proposed by the city of Klamath Falls on the Klamath River would be banned.

Laurel Yokom, a Bend resident and member of the Sierra Club, said the council's plan would die unless people spoke out in favor of it.

"It's time to say something," she said. "I don't want to wait until former Interior Secretary James G. Watt or someone else gives up our rivers for development."

Company unsure of disposal site of hazardous material

ROBINS AIR FORCE BASE, Ga. (AP) — A Missouri company says it has not decided where the nearly 1 million pounds of hazardous waste flow to Robins Air Force Base from Canada for hauling to Missouri will be disposed.

A spokeswoman for AmerEco Environmental Systems Inc. said the PCB-contaminated material, which will be trucked over the next 10 weeks from Robins to the company's Kingsville, Mo., headquarters, could end up in chemical dumps in five states for disposal.

AmerEco spokeswoman Shelly Matlock said Wednesday that the waste could be incinerated or deposited in chemical dumps in Alabama, Arkansas, Nevada, Texas or Utah.

The material comes from 17 outdated radar stations in Canada, built in the 1950s by the U.S. Air Force. A 1985 agreement called for the wastes to be disposed of in the United States.

The wastes began arriving at Robins on Tuesday and were greeted by environmental groups opposed to the placement of the material at the base.

Critics, including environmental groups in Georgia and elsewhere, say bringing the material to Robins means each shipment will have to travel 900 miles through five states to Missouri.

PCBs, or polychlorinated biphenyls, are liquid chemicals that were used to insulate electrical transformers and

capacitors until the Environmental Protection Agency found that they caused cancer in laboratory mice a decade ago.

Bus company employees file complaints of unpaid wages

BOISE (AP) — More than a dozen Boise School Bus Co. employees have signed complaints with the Idaho Department of Labor seeking their share of more than \$60,000 in unpaid wages.

Ken Flatt, labor compliance officer with the department, said Wednesday that the amount owed was "one of the biggest mass non-payment of wages I have seen. This kind of thing happens all the time, but it is unique in that it affects this many people."

Boise School Bus Co. has about 117 employees, including drivers, mechanics and office help, who were not paid for the last two weeks of May.

But Boise School Board President Quentin Horn said that while he empathized with the employees, there is nothing the school district can do for them.

"Legally, we're in a position where

we can't get involved with it," Horn said. "The responsibility is not ours. It's up to (Boise School Bus owner Terry) Kirkman to try and find his way-out-of-his-own-problem. He has other avenues and resources he will have to tap."

The school district was ordered last week to make any outstanding payments to Idaho First National Bank, a Boise School Bus creditor. A \$90,000 payment — which includes employees' pay for the last two weeks of May — already has been forwarded to the bank.

Earlier this week, the school board unanimously decided to cancel its contract with Boise School Bus. Safety-related problems that have emerged in the past year, coupled with a perceived lack of financial stability, were the reasons given by board members, for firing the company.

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Lakers salvage second series tilt

Los Angeles credits defense for keeping NBA hopes alive

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP) — The Los Angeles Lakers took a page from the Detroit Pistons' defensive handbook Thursday night and avoided being written off in the NBA Championship Series.

"Everybody got closer to their man," Magic Johnson said after the defending champion Lakers' 106-96 victory that averted the best-of-seven series 1-1. "We doubled and rotated. We didn't let Vinnie (Johnson) and A.D. (Adrian Dantley) get into their rhythm like they did in the first game."

"We were a lot more active on the defensive end," Lakers coach Pat Riley said. "The team is mystifying to me. Even after being together all these years, it seems they really have to be humbled to be at their best."

The Pistons, who held opponents under 100 points in 11 of their previous 13 games, including Game 1, had a chance to become the first team to win the first two games of the finals on the road. But they couldn't overcome 32.5 percent shooting in the first half.

"They were aggressive all night on defense," Pistons coach Chuck Daly said. "They knew they had to do it. They were so active. We were one step slow and did not make our open shots."

"They did what they had to do to win and that was the bottom line," Pistons center Bill Laimbeer said. "We shot horrendously in the first half and we weren't as aggressive."

James Worthy scored 25 points for the Lakers, including two key re-

bounced baskets during a decisive 11-2 spurt in the fourth quarter.

The Pistons, who upset the Lakers with a first-half blitz in Game 1, rallied from a 12-point deficit in the third quarter to tie it 80-80 early in the fourth period.

After two free throws by Johnson, Worthy sandwiched a rebound basket and a triple around a dunk by Detroit's John Salley, giving the Lakers an 86-82 lead with 6:17 left. Worthy, who grabbed 10 rebounds, later made it 91-82 with a layup.

Dennis Rodman, who scored 10 of his 12 points in the fourth quarter, led a rally that got no closer than three points.

Byron Scott added 24 points for the Lakers, while Johnson, who missed practice with the flu on Wednesday, had 23 points and 11 assists and Kareem Abdul-Jabbar had 15 points for Los Angeles. Dantley, who scored 34 points in the opener, led Detroit with 19.

With the victory, the Lakers rekindled their hopes of becoming the first team to repeat as NBA champion since the Boston Celtics won consecutive titles in 1968-69.

But they must win at least one of the next three games at the Pontiac Silverdome to force a sixth game at the Forum. Games 3, 4 and 5 are scheduled for Sunday, Tuesday night and Thursday night.

Los Angeles handed the Pistons only their second defeat in their last seven road games. Detroit won twice at Chicago, defeated the Celtics in two of three games at Boston Garden

and upset the Lakers 105-93 in Game 1 of the finals at the Forum.

A defeat Thursday would have made the Lakers the first team ever to lose the first two games of the championship series at home.

Los Angeles held the Pistons to 13 field goals in 40 attempts, 32.5 percent, and took a 49-39 halftime lead.

The Pistons, who led by 17 at half-time of Game 1, closed the gap to 58-55 with 7:32 left in the third period on consecutive baskets by Rick Mahorn and Joe Dumars.

The Lakers quickly built the margin to 12 with a 17-8 spurt during which Scott had six points, including a steal and dunk that made it 75-63 with 1:22 remaining in the quarter.

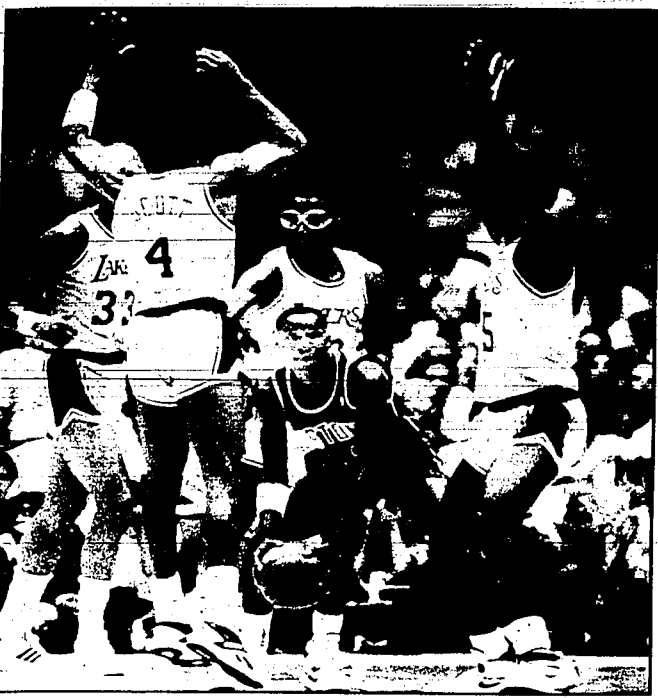
Three straight baskets by Detroit cut into the deficit again before the Lakers took a 76-69 advantage into the final 12 minutes.

Mahorn, who started the first game but played only 10 minutes because of a lower back strain, scored six points as the Pistons started the fourth period with an 11-4 run, tying the score 80-80 with 8:26 left.

Johnson scored all 11 of his first-half points in the second quarter, including a three-point play with 3:39 left that triggered a 10-2 run.

The spurt, which saw Abdul-Jabbar score five of his nine second-quarter points, extended Los Angeles' lead from 37-35 to 47-37.

The Lakers, who fell behind 14-4 en route to losing Game 1, missed their first five shots Thursday night and trailed 61-with 8:57 left in the first quarter.

Both sides claim progress in Kentucky cage investigation

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Depositions given by Emery Worldwide Air Freight employees regarding a package allegedly containing \$1,000 that was sent to a University of Kentucky basketball recruit's father were inconsistent with past stories, according to one attorney.

"But another attorney contended the seven employees' testimony did not stray from their earlier accounts. The lawyer for UK assistant coach Dwane Casey, who allegedly mailed the package, said he found discrepancies in the stories.

"Based on what we have heard, I would be very surprised if the NCAA did anything to the University of Kentucky or to Dwane Casey," attorney Joe Bill Campbell of Bowling Green

said Wednesday. "There's just a whole lot of major inconsistencies."

The Los Angeles Daily News reported in a copyright story in April that an Emery package sent by Casey to Claude Mills, the father of recruit Chris Mills, popped open in transit March 31. When the package was examined in Emery's Los Angeles station, a videocassette and \$50 200 bills were found inside.

"On Tuesday, the Lexington lawyer representing Emery, Burl McCoy, said in an interview with the Lexington Herald-Leader that seven employees of Emery's Los Angeles office stood by their stories during the depositions.

"There was no recanting," McCoy said. "They all testified that the pack-

age came open during the sort, it was looked into and that there was a cassette and money in it."

"I think they (the Emery employees) probably saw \$1,000," Campbell said Wednesday. "But not one of them testified that Dwane Casey put the \$1,000 in the package. What I can prove is no money was in the package when it left the UK basketball office."

Casey has said he did not put \$1,000 in the package and Claude Mills has said the package did not contain the money when it was delivered to his Los Angeles home.

Campbell acknowledged that none of the Emery employees recanted earlier statements that the package contained \$1,000. But he said no evi-

dence was given to indicate Casey or a UK basketball staff member placed the money inside.

"I've said from the very beginning: 'This is a swearing contest,'" Campbell said. "It's the credibility of my witnesses against what they (the Emery employees) had to say. And the more inconsistencies that you have ... not only among themselves, but from previous statements they had given, the more credible my case becomes."

"However, Fred Peters, a Lexington attorney for Emery, called the inconsistencies Campbell cited "minor details."

In his first public comments on the controversy in almost two months, Casey told reporters Wednesday that he was happy with the testimony

given by Emery employees.

In another development, Campbell said Wednesday that he plans to file a defamation suit against Emery on behalf of Casey, unless Campbell and Emery lawyers can reach a settlement.

McCoy said there was no any evidence from the depositions to show there was a conspiracy against UK.

Campbell said he will prove there was no money in the envelope when it left the UK office through testimony from a temporary services secretary who checked the package before it was sent.

He said a crucial issue was determining that none of the seven Emery employees who testified saw the package pop open, Campbell said neither

the driver who first discovered the unsealed package nor the supervisor to whom he took it could say how the package became unsealed.

None of the Emery employees could say how the package popped open, McCoy said.

"They said it was common for the adhesive to come loose on larger packages when they were not meant to carry videotapes," McCoy said.

The testimony also indicated it was routine procedure for opened packages to be examined and then ressealed, he said.

Other discrepancies, according to Campbell, involved whether the \$50 bills were old and worn or whether they were crisp and the color of the videocassette box.

Twitty and Roberts share tourney lead

HARRISON, N.Y. (AP) — Veteran Howard Twitty, looking for his first victory since 1980, compiled a bogey-free, 5-under-par 66 Thursday to share the first-round lead with Loren Roberts at the \$700,000 Westchester Classic.

Twitty and Roberts played in the same group and took advantage of the improved afternoon weather at the Westchester Country Club.

"It was quite pleasant," said Roberts, who had seven birdies.

But it was far from pleasant for the morning starters, who played in a cold rain and gusty winds.

"Miserable," said Steve Elkington

of Australia, one of three men in the morning half of the field able to shoot a 68. "It was a day you just try to hang in there."

Some of the major foreign stars were unable to handle the conditions. Masters champion Sandy Lyle of Scotland, British open title-holder Nick Faldo of England and Bernhard Langer of West Germany — all morning starters — had 74's.

Seve Ballesteros of Spain, a former winner of this title and a playoff loser last year, had an eagle-3 in a morning round of 72. Greg Norman of Australia also played in the morning and shot 73.

David Robinson of Navy, the 1987 College Player of the Year and the NBA's No. 1 draft choice, and sophomore Rex Chapman of Kentucky, who had just made himself available for the NBA draft, were among the Olympic hopefuls who gathered at the campus of Georgetown University to prepare for a seven-game European trip.

Officials said the 11 players would participate in closed practice sessions daily through next Tuesday.

Bill Shapland, director of sports information for Georgetown, said the media would have an opportunity to talk to Coach John Thompson on Friday afternoon. He said the press would receive no information on Thursday's practice, which was to be held for two hours beginning at 10 a.m. Thursday.

Shapland highly discouraged any member of the media from gathering outside the gymnasium Thursday night in an effort to get information. At the Trials, all practices were closed, and scrimmages, at first closed to the media, were opened to eight pool reporters.

Earlier this week, Thompson told

the Washington Post he was closing practices because "practice is a workshop where we put together the team. ... it's not a matter of trying to inconvenience the press or the fans. My main concern is structuring this team."

Those who arrived for Thursday's practice included: Alonzo Mourning, the only high school player at the tryouts last month; Florida's Dwayne Schintzius; Iowa's B.J. Armstrong; Virginia Tech's Binbo Coles; Arizona's Steve Kerr; St. John's Shelton Jones; and Clemson's 6-foot-10 sophomore Elden Campbell.

Former Georgetown guard Gene Smith and current Hoyt Charles Smith also were asked to participate.

Shapland said Oregon's Anthony Taylor will not attend the tryout in order to participate in an NBA try-out camp.

The 11 players are among the 27 who advanced from the Trials last month. The remaining 16 are to begin gym workouts at Georgetown on July 27, and the final camp will be held in late August.

The final roster will have 12 players.

The Select Team will begin its European schedule on June 17 against the Dutch national team in Kotka, Finland. They will then play the national teams of Britain, Finland and as well as a team of Austrian All-Stars before closing the tour on June 25 in Spain.

Hornung loses suit in Kentucky appeal

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — The NCAA was within its rights to disapprove of Paul Hornung as an announcer on college football games, the Kentucky Supreme Court ruled Thursday.

The decision overturns the \$1.1 million judgment Hornung had obtained against the NCAA during a trial of the case.

Hornung, now a Louisville businessman, had been hired to do football commentary by WTBS-TV, an Atlanta-based station that is carried across the country by cable outlets.

In 1981, the station won the rights to broadcast a certain number of college football games and Hornung, who won the Heisman Trophy at Notre Dame and starred with the Green Bay Packers, was told his name would be submitted to the NCAA as an announcer for those games.

On March 29, 1982, the NCAA Television Committee met with WTBS officials to make plans for the upcoming season. The 19-member committee was given a list of four people the station wanted to use as announcers for the games.

NFL players open suit for strike game pay

WASHINGTON (AP) — Denver Broncos linebacker Ricky Hunley testified Thursday that he and his striking teammates were in good enough shape to play football last Oct. 18, three days after the NFL Players Association ended its 24-day strike.

Hunley, speaking before an administrative law judge of the National Labor Relations Board, said, "I was in condition to play football, and so were the rest of my teammates. ... except those on injured reserve."

Judge Benjamin Schlesinger is being asked to determine if the league discriminated against players for union activity by refusing to allow them to participate in games Oct. 18-19. The NLRB general counsel has already ruled against the NFL in the complaint, but the league filed an ap-

peal and is now presenting its side of the case.

The hearing, in which the NFLPA is asking for back-pay totaling at least \$20 million, is expected to last six weeks.

The majority of the striking players returned to work Oct. 15, the day after the clubs' reporting deadline. The league refused to allow the players to compete in that weekend's games, choosing instead to stage one final week of contests featuring mostly replacement players.

The NFL contends that the players were not physically ready to play in games that weekend after being inactive for 24 straight days, and the decision to keep them off the field had nothing to do with their union activity.

Riots mark Korea's countdown to games

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Radical students bombarded police with firebombs and rocks Thursday as Seoul began a 100-day countdown to the start of the Olympic Games, and North Korea reiterated its demand to co-host the Games.

Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts and a selection of Seoul citizens, from housewives to taxi drivers, joined in marking the 100th day before the Olympics open in the South Korean capital by raising the flags of the 161 competing nations in City Hall Plaza.

Traditional instruments played Korean tunes and a marching band of women dressed in blue shorts, white boots and rainbow sashes sounded a fanfare while thousands of people

Play to the first trick is the most important point of many hands. Playing hastily or automatically at that time often throws away a makeable game.

Since West was reluctant to choose a major-suit lead, he hit upon the lucky choice of the diamond eight. South saw no dangers in this suit, so he ducked comfortably in dummy. East winning the queen. With little future in that suit, East shifted to the spade jack and South was trapped. If he finessed his queen, the defenders' spades would be established quickly. If he went up with the ace, the defense would get three spade winners after East had won his club ace.

"How do you like those spooky leads?" complained South. "Against any normal defense, I have an easy nine tricks (or more)."

"You should have known the diamond eight was a top-of-nothing lead," chastised North. "You gave the enemy an opportunity and they were quick to cash in."

South makes his game if he goes up with dummy's diamond ace at trick one. After the club ace is gone, South has a clinch nine tricks regardless of how the cards lie. It was his lazy and thoughtless duck at trick one that led to defeat, and South's minus score was well deserved.

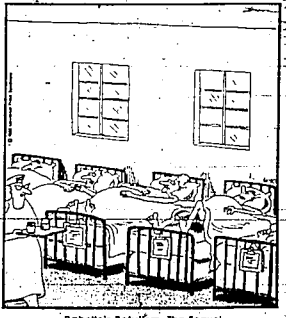

JEROME — While other Magic Valley residents spent sunny spring afternoons working on their lawns and gardens, Mike and Cindy Winterholler watched another kind of flower bloom.

Their Northside Playhouse production of "My Fair Lady," directed by Mike Winterholler, opens tonight in the Jerome High School Auditorium.

Cindy Winterholler assists her husband and handles the many details of production. She says she was always too shy to step before the footlights herself, but she gets a thrill watching braver souls. She also delights in knowing that she is a vital part of what happens on stage.

She falls in love with her mentor, Professor Henry Higgins, a crusty bachelor. The poor, unwashed and cream of London's society are played by the same fast-changing chorus.

Winterholler says this has been his most demanding directorial venture. The complexity of scenes, depth of the characters and difficulty of the music have made this a "growing experience for everybody," he says. Shauna Fuller plays Eliza. "She expresses every emotion — excitement, disappointment, heartache, anger, unrequited love," Fuller says

of her character. Michael Fisher is a handsome and energetic Higgins. "It's a delicious part," he says. Fisher, who directs the Magichord's barbershop group and has been active in a number of musical ventures locally, says he feels a responsibility to his audience. Video guru Caplan foresees bright future for marketers

JACKPOT, Nev. — Allan Caplan swears he didn't know the difference between Beta and VHS when he first got into the business. Today he is a video guru.

Wherever he speaks, video retailers flock to listen. And for good reason. Now Caplan not only understands the difference between Beta and VHS, he has a vision of video's future — a fairytale future that includes home delivery and, someday, fiber optic technology that will allow viewers to dial up a film on the telephone.

"Home delivery should be in place soon," he says. "Delivering movies via fiber optics is being tested in Florida right now, but it should take a while before that becomes a reality."

However, he scoffs at the suggestion that phone delivery will put video retailers like himself out of business, asserting that video stores are "the theaters of the '90s."

Caplan came to Jackpot on Wednesday to deliver this message to members of Idaho's Video Software Dealers Association. Discounting his tie which had tiny images of Marilyn Monroe printed on a conservative burgundy background, Caplan didn't look much like a video guru. He is a bearded, portly man, who seems older than 40. But when he speaks, Caplan lights up with a charisma that's strictly Hollywood.

"I have a pantcup Robin Williams inside me," says Caplan, adding that

he is the "most noted, and the most notorious" man in the video business.

He was a video game buff but knew little else about the business when he opened Applause Video; in Omaha, Neb. in 1983.

He learned fast. In five years Caplan has increased his retail holdings to 85 video stores, most located in the midwest. He's not ashamed to admit that he has built his empire on free popcorn, aggressive marketing schemes and bullying suppliers.

This year Caplan will share his formula during 60 to 80 seminars that will be attended by video dealers

across the nation. He is also an outspoken member of the board of directors of the Video Software Dealers of America.

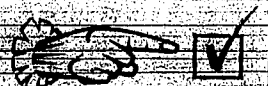
Caplan maintains that the video market has become the largest source of revenue for filmmakers. With video, even the dogs can break even. Take the film "Malone." Caplan says the Burt Reynolds action/adventure cost \$5 million to make, but earned less than \$1.5 million at theater box offices. Yet the first day the film was released on video, sales topped \$5 million.

"Will they break even? It's hard to tell," he says. "But without us, they certainly would be in the hole."

If video has been kind to the dogs, it has been more than generous with the

Summer television represents 'worst-case scenario'

When I was young to know any better, I firmly believed that prime-time television was cosmically linked to the school year. It was part of the natural rhythm of life. When school was out, prime time was over. And when September rolled around, there were new books, new pencils, new teachers and new television shows.

Not this year.
I fear we are facing an endless summer.

The Writers Guild of America strike has taken its toll, and one can

only imagine the white-knuckled panic behind the scenes at the networks now that the production schedules have fallen far behind.

No. 1 NBC, which disclosed its fall programming plans this week, remains as it has for the past couple of seasons, in the best shape. NBC is fortunate, of course, because it has the summer Olympic Games to help bridge the significant programming gap created by the strike. Reborn ABC will talk about its 1988-89 sea-

son May 23. Third-place CBS, however, can go only so far as to say that its fall season won't start until at least late October.

Somehow, CBS's assessment seems the most realistic. Maybe it was because my parents taught me to always prepare for the worst, even if there wasn't the slightest chance that the worst would happen. When it comes to television, however, worst-case scenarios seem to be the norm.
Considering the way the networks have been limping along since the strike began, with series such as NBC's "L.A. Law" falling short of

their full-season run, etc., we are already in a weakened state.

This is going to be Death Valley days all the way — and I do not mean this series.

How bad could it be, you ask? Well, CBS ran off what seemed like every crummy pilot it had on the shelf last year in its "Summer Playhouse." 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'Today' stint may be Snyder tryout

Talk about deja vu. Viewers of NBC's "Today" show this week might be forgiven for feeling trapped in a time warp back to the mid-1970s, when newsmen Tom Snyder was holding down the network's revolutionary late-night "Tomorrow" program.

Snyder is the first of three fill-in hosts for regular "Today" co-anchor Bryant Gumbel, who is taking a short leave to prepare for his anchor role on NBC's coverage of the Summer Olympic Games, scheduled to begin Sept. 16 from Seoul, Korea.

Is the "Today" show getting a potential tryout for a network return by Snyder? Reports are persisting that Gumbel and NBC are having problems coming to terms on a new contract.

Now hosting a nightly talk show on the ABC Radio Network, Snyder has been all around the broadcast dial since his pointed, personal, interview style was seen on the eight-year run of "Tomorrow" and NBC's not particularly successful weekly magazine show, "Prime Time."

Actually, some "Today" viewers may not flash back to the red Snyder at all, but to Dan Akroyd's

pretty savage "Saturday Night Live" takeoffs on the egoistic newsmen.

Snyder left NBC in 1981, as the renamed "Tomorrow Coast-to-Coast" was canceled to make way for "Late Night With David Letterman," and became a local soft-news anchor on WABZ-TV in New York. No less controversial there, he was suspended briefly in 1983 for making an obscene gesture on camera (although he apparently did not realize he was on the air), departed in September 1984 and was out of broadcasting until joining Los Angeles' KABC-TV in 1985 as a special projects correspondent.

Children and TV still concern many

House OKs measure limiting advertising on children's TV

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House on Wednesday approved a bill to reimpose limits on advertising during children's television programs.

Lawmakers voted 328-78 for the measure, a bipartisan compromise opposed by the Reagan administration as "inimical to the spirit of the First Amendment."

During debate on the bill, Rep. Edward J. Markey, D-Mass., said, "For far too long, we have allowed children's television to be driven solely by commercial considerations."

"It is time to put the interests of children back into the equation," said Markey, who is chairman of the

House telecommunications subcommittee.

Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldi, R-N.J., ranking Republican on the subcommittee, said the measure "strikes a balance between financial support for children's programming and the desire to shield children from overexposure to commercial messages."

The bill would limit commercials in children's programs to 10 1/2 minutes per hour on weekends and 12 minutes per hour on weekdays.

It also would require the Federal Communications Commission to consider, when deciding whether to renew a TV station's license, whether the station had complied with the advertising limits and served the educational needs of children in its overall programming.

The FCC abandoned its children's TV advertising limits four years ago on the theory that commercials would be regulated by marketplace forces.

The bill would give TV stations until Jan. 1, 1990, to comply with the ad limits, and it would allow the FCC to modify the time standards after Jan. 1, 1993.

Opponents say the measure is misdirected and raises constitutional questions.

An administration statement said: "Attempts such as this one, to inject

the federal government into programming and advertising decisions that are properly those of television broadcast licensees, are inappropriate, ill-advised and inimical to the spirit of the First Amendment."

The House compromise was stripped of earlier proposals to prohibit programs that feature toy manufacturers' products, referred to by critics as "program-length commercials."

Legislation pending in the Senate would ban such programs. No hearings have been scheduled on the Senate bill, which is sponsored by Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio.

Markey said that because of difficulties in defining "program-length commercials," issues regarding such shows may be better left to the FCC and the courts. However, the Massachusetts Democrat said he will raise the issue in Congress if the issue isn't resolved satisfactorily by the commission or the courts.

Senate curtails violence

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate voted approval Wednesday of a bill designed to curb violence on television.

The measure, sponsored by Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., exempts members of the television industry from federal antitrust laws for three years to allow them to work together to develop voluntary standards on TV violence.

The bill was approved on a voice vote. The action sends the bill to the House, where the Judiciary Committee plans to hold hearings shortly.

A similar bill, also sponsored by Simon, was approved by the Senate in October 1986, but the measure was a casualty of an end-of-the-session logjam in the House.

The TV networks and others in the TV industry have argued that antitrust laws prevent them from taking joint action to develop standards on violence.

In hearings last year before the Senate Judiciary Committee, experts cited studies and reports that excessive violence on TV incites aggressive behavior in children.

The American Civil Liberties Union, however, found constitutional problems with the bill because it would set a precedent for government to influence the viewpoints presented in the media.

blackwaters. Caplan says advance video sales of "E.T.," which will be released on Oct. 27, have already reached \$100 million — making it the biggest grossing video yet.

"People are so excited about 'E.T.'s' release that we have already sold over 3,300 units in Omaha," he says.

However, "E.T." fever may turn into "E.T." hysteria this fall, because Caplan says it may be the first time in history that a video manufacturer won't be able to keep up with demand. "They have to record the film at

real-time, and there might not be enough time left," he says.

While there are a few production companies now working on low-budget entertainment projects strictly for video, Caplan says the industry will continue to rely on mega-budget films that premiere on the big screen. But, he says, consumer demand for video is motivating production companies to release a movie soon after its theater run in order to take advantage of movie advertising.

"Rambo III," which only recently made its appearance in theaters, will

be available on video Oct. 6, Caplan says. "Willow" could be out on video as soon as January.

Caplan says first-run films will remain the big draw for video consumers, but in the future, smart retailers will also cater to special markets such as senior citizens.

"The gray market is just waiting to be tapped," he says. "They don't want to watch 'The Barbarian Brothers,' they probably don't even want to watch 'Fatal Attraction.' What they want to see are films they grew up with, films like 'San Francisco' and 'Auntie Mame.'"

Caplan says there are also 10,000 older movies out there just waiting to be put on to video — maybe not "classics" in the strict sense of the word, but films that would otherwise have been lost to younger audiences.

When video began, a number of marketers saw "how-to" tapes as ideal television textbooks. Unfortunately the public hasn't seen it that way. Caplan says how-to tapes will continue to be a staple in most video stores, but they will also continue to be shelved in the darker, out-of-the-way corners, far from the glibly entertainment vids.

However, the children's video market will keep growing, he says. In fact, Caplan says any video retailer who wants to be tops will not only offer films for the little ones, the store will also have a children's play and reading area.

"We have castles in all our stores," he says. "You know when parents take their children out for fast food, the kids always vote for the place with the playground — I'm betting kids will also demand to go to the video store with the castle."

East Germans deny Stallone Berlin entry

BERLIN (AP) — Actor Sylvester Stallone, whose manic Rambo character is famous for waging war with communists, had some unkind words for glasnost after he was refused entry Thursday into East Berlin.

Border guards gave no explanation for refusing to allow Stallone to enter the communist city, said his spokeswoman, Ana Weinert.

"Stallone, in West Berlin to promote his new movie 'Rambo III,' wanted to tour the Pergamon Museum in East Berlin."

"I was just going there to look at a museum, and they look at me like the enemy," said Stallone, quoted by his publicist, John Bloch.

"President Reagan called them the 'evil empire' yet they let him in. I told it the way it is in movies. So much for glasnost," Stallone said, referring to the Soviet policy of openness.

The latest installment of Stallone's Rambo series pits his hero against Soviet troops in Afghanistan.

Earlier Thursday, the 43-year-old film star arrived at the Berlin Wall Haus am Checkpoint Charlie museum just as West Berlin resident Johannes Georg Ehrhart and his East German girlfriend were demonstrating how he smuggled her out of East Berlin on May 27.

Ehrhart, 35, said he had met Liane Suendermann, a 22-year-old East Berlin nurse, through broadcasts on an illegal private radio station.

He explained how he drove regularly to East Berlin and eventually hatched the plan to smuggle Ms. Suendermann out with a fake passenger seat in his car.

After the re-enactment of the escape, Stallone paused to have his picture taken with Ms. Suendermann and said: "It just goes to show how important human rights are, and what people will go through to be free."

Mickey Gilley abandons 'cowboy chic'

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Singer Mickey Gilley, whose earthy Texas nightclub was the focus of the movie "Urban Cowboy," hasn't set foot in the honky-tonk for two years.

And he hasn't regularly worn a cowboy hat for three years.

Eight years after John Travolta and co-star Debra Winger launched a fad known as "cowboy chic," Gilley has broken the ties that symbolized him as the country music singer most associated with the craze.

The 62-year-old performer is in litigation over the nightclub in Pasadena, Texas, where most of the 1980 movie was filmed. He claims an associate has let the cavernous club get run down.

"I drive by the club all the time, but I've not been in it for two years," Gilley said in a telephone interview.

"The business has practically died. The parking lot used to be full; now you can count the cars. I think it's just a matter of time until it goes under."

And his cowboy hat, part of the Western attire that became fashionable because of the popularity of the movie, has seen its last roundup.

"I've got hair; there's nothing to cover up," Gilley said. "I don't feel like a cowboy hat is something that's going to make or break my career. People had fun with that era's my dad, too. People wonder where's my hat, but I haven't worn one now for three

"Don't the Girls All Get Prettier at Closing Time."

Now, the era is a memory just like the mechanical bulls featured in the movie.

"Everything has its day," he said, reflecting on the "cowboy chic" heyday. "Nothing lasts forever. People don't realize that the 'urban cowboy' fad had gone on in Texas for years and years.

"People had fun with it. When 'Urban Cowboy' hit, it affected the whole world. Travolta brought everything to front and center. It was like a billboard going up."

"Had it not been for him playing that part, it would not have had the impact. He had done 'Saturday Night Fever,' and this was 'country night fever.' It was a different lifestyle, and it worked."

"Everyone became a cowboy or cowgirl. It was like when the Beatles came over and everyone grew their hair long and shook their heads. Everyone wanted to be part of what was happening. I'll remember it forever."

In the movie, Travolta learned how to ride a mechanical bull at the nightclub in order to win the favor of Winger, who was then a relatively unknown actress.

Today, Gilley is not sure the devices were such a good idea. They were contraptions, ridden as one would a bull, whose gyrating was controlled by an operator.

"It was a rodeo training device and should never have been put in an en-

tertainment establishment in the first place," Gilley said. "We still have suits pending over it."

Nevertheless, nightclubs such as Gilley's spring up across the country, many of them with mechanical bulls. Some were converted discos and were patronized by customers in snappy cowboy hats, shiny cowboy boots and stylish Western wear.

"I probably remember the impact on country attire the most," Gilley said. "It was the first time you could walk into a casino in Las Vegas or Reno or Lake Tahoe or Atlantic City and see guys in cowboy hats. It changed the mood. It had its flash in the pan."

Gilley, whose cousins are rock 'n' roll star Jerry Lee Lewis and the Rev. Jimmy Swaggart, has had 17 No. 1 records in a 14-year career.

He's on the road 115 days a year, down sharply from his peak era.

"I got to the point I wouldn't do golf tournaments," he recalls. "Back then, it was money, money, money. I was playing every place they threw in front of me."

"I wish I had cut in half what I did. I wanted to make as much money as quickly as I could. It was like a dragon: You feed it to keep it. The fire was coming out of his mouth," he said.

"I'm happier with my performing now because I'm working less and ending up with more money than during 'Urban Cowboy' because I'm able to do it with less people."

"Back then, I had a lifestyle of airplanes and buses and trucks. I did stupid things. I prostituted myself for the money."

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'Big' stars Tom Hanks in refreshingly grown up production

HOLLYWOOD — Forget about those other body exchange comedies. The hands-down winner is "Big," which manages to be funny, warm, sophisticated and above all, imaginative, from start to finish.

It is also a personal triumph for Tom Hanks. "Nothing in Common" and now "Big" confirm his position as the screen's premier young light comedian. Hanks recalls the amiable charm of the young Jimmy Stewart and Jack Lemmon, yet his bemused personality is as contemporary as the vuppies he plays so well.

Right away, "Big" sets itself apart from "Like Father, Like Son," "Vice Versa" and "18 Again" in that the wackiness occurs not between two differ-



ent people but between Josh Baskin's nearly 13-year-old body and the one that he will possess at age 30. Writers Gary Ross and Anne Spielberg tap into what must be a virtually universal wish when little Josh (David Moscow) expresses his longing to be grown-up. What adolescent, at one time or another, does not want to escape the restrictions and frustrations of being a kid?

With his 12-year-old mind and 30-year-old body, Josh, who lives with his

parents on an inviting tree-lined street in Cliffside Park, N.J., winds up across the Hudson in the perfect place, a toy company, where his unique perspective on what kids really like is swiftly noticed by its top executive (Robert Loggia).

There is a boyishness about Hanks that makes him perfect casting as a man with the mind of a child. That mind happens to be exceptionally bright and agile, making his survival credible, but there is nothing that can compensate for experience. Josh realizes he has to be on his toes, yet cannot resist the joking gross-outs with food, for example. And then there is the matter of his sexual naivete.

Indeed, "Big," which has been directed by Penny Marshall with verve and impeccable judgment, drops a child's innocence into the corporate rat race as if it were a depth charge.

Loggia's Mac MacMillan is a warm, shrewd, open-minded tycoon unconcerned about his newest lieutenant's eccentricities as long as he keeps coming up with such terrific ideas (The two do a soft-shoe routine on an outside keyboard at F.A.O. Schwartz that is a pure delight). A relentless corporate ladder-climber (John Heard) naturally perceives Josh as a dire threat.

So does Elizabeth Perkins' ambitious Susan, who unhesitatingly turns her charms on Josh as she has on so many men before him. It is she who will have the greatest impact on Josh, and vice versa. The role allows Perkins to transform Susan from a hardened office combat veteran to a beautiful, loving woman who regains her sense of values as well as her sense of fun.

"Big" is a quality production

through and through, starting with the terrific fresh look cinematographer Barry Sonnenfeld brings to it, and including Judianna Makovsky's costumes for Josh, which express precisely the stages of his evolution in taste from boy to man.

The greatest thing about "Big" is that its makers have known how to end it in a thoroughly satisfying fashion, which is always the challenge — and often the stumbling block — of fantasy. In never confusing what is childlike with childishness, "Big" (MPAA-rated PG) is actually a refreshingly grown-up comedy, for the entire family.



TOM HANKS Emerges as top comedian

Current films offer both drama, comedy

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. The ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

CROCODILE DUNDEE II (PG). Inevitable but almost as much fun as the first outing with that archetypal Australian bloke, played with such winning ease by Paul Hogan. This time out, Crocodile's lady (Linda Kozlowski, a New York reporter, is endangered by a Central American drug buggin, sending the couple deep in hiding in the Australian bush. Nothing special as an action adventure but thoroughly effective as a projection of a wily but heart hero. With John Meillon, Charles Dutton, Hechter Ubarry, Juan Fernandez.

BEEBLEJUICE (PG). Upstairs, almost comely that is a dazzling display of the pop culture sensibility of director Tim Burton, director of "Pee-wee's Big Adventure." Alec Baldwin and Geena Davis are a ghostly New England couple who seek help from

suzy "bio-exorcist" Michael Keaton to find their home of an awful upscale Manhattan couple (Jeffrey Jones, Catherine O'Hara). With Winona Ryder, Sylvia Sidney, Dick Cavett, Robert Goulet.

COLORS (R). With its violent drive-by shootings and "its" daytime shots of grade-schoolers denling crake, "Colors" may feel like a bloody slice of the 11 o'clock news. But make no mistake, it is a movie and — for all its swirling motion and authentic look — a disappointingly superficial one at that. A superb performance by Robert Duval as the older of a pair of cops who try to control the gang chaos — is whittled down to soap-opera size, undercutting everything. Also stars Sean Penn.

FUNNY FARM (PG). Not about a farm, and not particularly funny either — though Chevy Chase has his moments and co-star Madolyn Smith has even more. An urban yuppie couple, sportswriter and wife, retreat to the countryside for a literary haven and learn the horrible consequences

of answered prayers. But the movie has a shallow satiric conception of small-town America — "The Egg and I" with drab yokels and bad yokels — and though George Roy Hill gives it a smooth finish, it is neither celebration nor nightmare enough to churn up any comic intensity.

RAMBO III (R). The third Rambo movie — in which the one-man attack squad spreads his worldwide vendetta to Afghanistan — is an awe-struck memorial by writer-star Sylvester Stallone to his own musculature, a would-be pop IIIIad loony with self-regard. Fast, loud, murderously professional, with more than \$60 million worth of explosions and spectacle, it is also a real talk-back-to-the-screen picture: a genetically swollen self-parody, loaded with howlers; an unconsciously camped-up homoerotic male-bonding adventure rife with beefcake and grandiose phallic symbols.

WILLOW (PG). Here we have a perfectly agreeable tale of magic, little people, heroic warriors, babies among

the bullrushes and a wicked queen who must be overthrown lest the world be engulfed in evil. If it evaporates from memory with the airiness of a bubble bath, at least it leaves a friendly glow and a sense of a magical world lovingly evoked. This evaporation is too bad, because producer George Lucas so clearly wants his films to do good and to carry positive messages. Willow (Warwick Davis) and Madmartigan (Val Kilmer) very nearly bring it off, but in the end they are engulfed as effects overwhelm character and this slim story.

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Dundee holds top movie spot

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Australian adventurer Mick Dundee left his competitors down under as "Crocodile Dundee II" bit-off 60 percent more of the weekend box-office gross than its nearest rival, the Tom Hanks comedy "Big."

Schweseter, Stallone's blood-and-thunder film "Rambo III" slipped to third place, while the Chevy Chase comedy "Funny Farm" cultivated enough money to harvest the No. 4 spot, plovling the George Lucas-produced, Ron Howard-directed fantasy "Willow" into fifth place.

"Crocodile Dundee II," the comedy sequel starring Australia's Paul Hogan, hunted up \$12.72 million, compared with \$8.22 million for "Big," which Hanks portrays a boy who gets his wish to become a grownup.

"Rambo III," in which Stallone's John Rambo shoots, bombs, stabs and otherwise maims numerous Soviet soldiers in Afghanistan, ranked third, grossing \$7.69 million for the weekend.

"Hanks' portrayal of a sports-writer seeking country-style relaxation in "Funny Farm" reaped nearly \$5.66 million.

The medieval fantasy, "Willow," which cost \$35 million to produce plus \$20 million to make prints and for advertising, dropped two place to fifth, grossing just over \$5 million for the weekend.

"That's not bad," insisted John Krier, president of Exhibitor Relations Co., which compiles the box office takes. "It shows possibilities of holding well."

After the top five films, weekend grosses dropped sharply.

"Colors," the Sean Penn-Robert Duval, cops-versus-street gangs drama, brought in \$1.45 million, while Michael Keaton's ghostly comedy "Beetlejuice," scared up \$1.42 million.

"Friday the 13th Part VII" slashed another \$900,166 out of filmgoers' wallets.

Oscar-winning "Moonstruck" and the Robin Williams comedy "Good Morning, Vietnam," showed staying power, grossing \$612,375 and \$540,891, respectively, after more than two dozen weeks in release.

Joel takes pure-American rock to the USSR, and wins them over

He sings about the kind of people who buy their paintings at Sears, drink beer on car hoods during hot summers, and watch their dreams scuttle away from them.

Even before his brand of urban rock 'n' roll hit the charts in 1974 with the "Piano Man" album, Billy Joel was to Long Island what Bruce Springsteen was to New Jersey. And Joel, who turns 40 in less than a year, is still going steady in the summer of '88. On Wednesday, June 15, ABC airs "A Matter of Trust: Billy Joel in the USSR," a recap of the tour that brought this Hicksville, N.Y., native's middle-class ballads and doo-wop celebrations behind the Iron Curtain.

"The show could drop dead. Some countries don't know me as well as other countries," Joel is shown saying after a rendition of "Angry Young Man" leaves a Russian audience politely clapping. That's the pattern of the special — concert footage intercut with backstage patter and Joel's comments on the tour in general.

Throughout the one and a half hours of "A Matter of Trust," we see the Russians' gradual acceptance of Joel's music as they move from stony attentiveness to stage-slaming, hand-clapping euphoria.

"It's a contact sport," Joel explains at another part of the program. "The point of rock 'n' roll is craziness."

"Once you rocked, they went nuclear," enthused one of Joel's entourage. Beams Joel: "At the end it was a Detroit crowd. It felt like somebody stabbed me in the hand — it was great."



At times, "A Matter of Trust" can be self-indulgent, playing more like a travelogue or home movie than a concert tape. Joel's second wife, model Christie Brinkley, is almost an obstacle in this special; she doesn't do much more than run around with a cam-corder and intermittently ask her husband how his voice is holding

up.

"A Matter of Trust" doesn't have as much music as Joel fans might crave, but it does offer some interesting footage: Joel overturning a piano on stage when his crew doesn't dim the lights; singing to his daughter Alexa Ray, who is seated atop the piano; jamming with a Georgian choral group; befriending a Russian during a circus visit.

While Joel's Russian is limited to the occasional "spasibo," he does manage to communicate with the Russians he meets. Nonetheless, "A Matter of Trust" remains a-political — meaning that Joel never gets up and starts stumping for the Stars and Stripes.

"I'm not making political speeches on stage," Joel explains. "Let the music speak for itself."

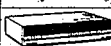

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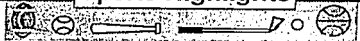

cause the Berlin Wall and various other locations seem totally real. How can they have possibly been taken in this tension-filled area? — F.D.

A: Leo Penn, the film's director, told me that all footage of this infamous wall is authentic, except for a startling tracking shot at the opening, when the camera peers into a nearby apartment window in East Berlin. The filmmakers were granted partial access to Checkpoint Charlie, as well, though Penn admits that some East German airline runway footage, where much heavy action takes place, had to be grabbed on the sly by a second unit camera crew, which then smuggled it out of the divided city. The picture stars Martin Sheen, Sam Wanamaker and Sean Penn.

Q: I hear that invincible Chuck Norris sports a brand-new look and style in his upcoming movie, "Hero and the Terror." Is he softening up? — D.B.

A: In a way, yes. Chuck, who plays a Santa Monica police detective in this crackling suspense thriller, decided that it's time to switch from the unassailable image he is identified with. Therefore, you'll now see the new Chuck as warm, vulnerable and even funny. Just one example of the new Chuck-Norris is a sequence where Chuck attempts to place his girlfriend in a hospital's maternity ward, where our hero suddenly faints. Though this impromptu moment wasn't written in the script, the producers opted to leave it in the finished print as a tender, revealing and life-like footnote to his character, circa 1988.

SETTING RECORDS: Play-

wright Neil Simon ought to get some kind of award as America's busiest writer. This fall Mr. Prolific has three projects set to go — two plays: "Rumors" and "Jake's Women," plus "A Foggy Day," which is a new musical using music from recently discovered, never published works by Ira and George Gershwin.

A: It's as old and as prevalent as show business. Mae West, Ethel Merman and Tallulah Bankhead were all guilty at one time or another of using their clout to oust overly promising performers who threatened to steal their thunder, proving that the show must go on — but only if nobody else hogs the spotlight. Plus, John Barrymore was notorious for giving the heave-ho to pretty cast members who wouldn't drink and/or sleep with him.

Samuel Beckett agrees to direct three of his works for television

Two University of Maryland professors have persuaded Samuel Beckett to preserve his vision of his work by directing for the first time his three most famous plays for television. Production of English and French versions of "Waiting for Godot," "Endgame" and "Krapp's Last Tape" will begin in Paris in September, with release of the first play on videotape expected next summer.

Even Roman Polanski, not a man one imagines as easily surprised, was stunned when he heard.

"I went to Beckett to ask to do a movie of 'Godot' and he said no!" Polanski told the professors when asked if he would like a part in the play. "How did you buggers get the rights?"

A reasonable question: As Beckett's French publisher told Maryland literature professors John Fuegi and Mitchell Lifton, "For 36 years, I've been saying no to people" on behalf of the playwright.

The 82-year-old Beckett, one of the century's greatest dramatists and perhaps the one who has best captured the despair and resilience of modern humanity, guards his privacy and his work adamantly. He never gives interviews, rarely directs and once threatened to sue an American theater that had staged a production of "Endgame" he believed diverged from the play he had written.

The story of how the Maryland project came about is — predictably, considering Beckett's involvement — complicated and highly idiosyncratic, involving an actor who began his career as an inmate in San Quentin, the creation of a production house at the University of Maryland that will attempt to do for television and film what a university press does for books, and almost four years of work by two jocular academics who delight in ribbing academia and American television and will serve as co-producers of "Beckett Directs Beckett."

"He was quite opposed to it at first," says Lifton of Beckett. "Essentially I said, 'We're not inter-

ested in doing an adaptation for television. We're interested in your direction of your plays. We're interested in these being the benchmark productions — not the only interpretation, but those to which others will always have to refer.'"

Lifton's eloquence was supported by Rick Cluchey, who was sent to San Quentin in the '50s for kidnapping and other offenses, and discovered Beckett's work while there. Cluchey founded an inmate drama troupe and began a correspondence with Beckett. After he was paroled, he continued to perform and direct Beckett's plays with his group, the San Quentin Players (which has since acquired members with no criminal records), worked for several years with the playwright in Europe and two years ago appeared in a Beckett-directed production of "Krapp's Last Tape" in New York.

Though some reviewers have been less than awed by Cluchey's performances, he won the Italian Drama Critics Award in 1985 for his performances in the three plays Fuegi and Lifton will produce, and he and his company have become Beckett's unofficial proteges.

Cluchey, who met Lifton 30 years ago while working at a theater in San Francisco, acted as go-between to bring the would-be producers and aging writer together. Casting for the French productions is not complete, and whether Polanski will participate is undecided. The San Quentin Players will do the English versions of the play, as Beckett insisted.

"He has worked with them for so many years now," Fuegi explains. "It's a little like a musician having an instrument — I hate to reduce the company like this, but he feels he can get exactly the right tonalities from this group. He feels they really understand the nuances of his work."

In explaining the value of these shows for future scholars and interpreters, Fuegi and Lifton compare them to imagined productions staged by Sophocles, Moliere and Shakespeare somehow captured and handed down to us. Because Beckett

habitually reinterprets and rewrites his plays, as he directs them, this "Godot" will also, in a sense, be a new work.

"If you look at Rich (Cluchey's copy of 'Godot'), there are huge sections of it that are cut," says Fuegi, "and then you'll find that all kinds of new lines have been written in." Beckett's direction, says Fuegi, "is very meticulous and very, very nuanced, and he's a hands-on director — costuming, set, movement, tone of voice. Some people have described it as 'almost a choreographic kind of directing.'"

Beckett actually directs through another person, German director Walter Asmus, with whom he has collaborated for years.

"We don't even know — nor do we care — how often Beckett will be in the theater," says Lifton. "Asmus is himself an extremely accomplished director, but in this circumstance serves as the conduit for Beckett." In at least one past Beckett-Asmus production, in London in 1984, Beckett ended up attending every rehearsal and shaped a "Godot" that some critics found refreshingly approachable and warm.

Adding yet another layer to the productions will be the cameras recording the action. Beckett, who has directed some of his other plays for West German television, is no TV naïf, but at one point in the discussions he said to Lifton, "Wouldn't it be nice if the camera could just sit in the audience?"

"I said, 'And which seat would you give the camera?' He said, 'Oh, you film people are so crafty, so crafty!'" Lifton remembers with a smile, obviously enjoying having sparred with the master.

The crafty film people will have four cameras, and the result — they hope — will be a work of art made for television, not merely what Fuegi and Lifton call "a simple reproductive rendering of a theatrical production."

In final form, "Beckett Directs Beckett" will include a documentary on Cluchey and a group discussion of Beckett's direction by a panel of scholars and theatrical professionals.

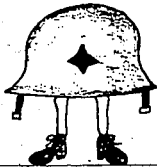

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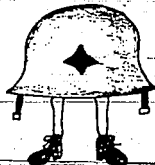
